

MAYNOOTH VISTA by Newcomer.

Anybody writing a column for a monthly publication is at a distinct disadvantage. If the writer treats with a subject that is current at the time of his writing ten chances to one it will be old hat by the time of its appearing in print and he must therefore confine his remarks to on-going topics or run the risk of having to eat his words in consequence of subsequent developments having caught up with him before his article appears. Editors take a poor view of their contributors asking for their articles back for amending the day before a magazine is due to go to press.

I have stuck my neck out on a few occasions and had my head chopped off - or partly chopped off - by events which ensued between writing and publication. Last month in the NEWSLETTER was one of these.

Subsequent to my writing about the blocking of jobs for our Graduates by the National Teachers a compromise was come to by allowing those already chosen for jobs to attend The Teacher Training Colleges for a year before taking up work. Big Deal! It does nothing to improve class numbers in the present year and damn little for brotherly love.

It does not tempt me to ask the Editor to amend anything that I wrote.

At last, as I write, the Government has announced its intention to introduce a bill for the abolition of existing ground rents. I see some danger there. If we, in the New Estates, buy out our ground rents, who is going to finish these estates where the developers have gone into liquidation or bankruptcy? Do we also buy that liability?

It is possible, of course that the bill will cover such a contingency but the White Paper not having vet been published it is not possible to tell. If I might make the sugestion to our Community Council it is something they might actively pursue with whatever similar bodies they are in touch or with out local T.Ds. to ensure that the residents are not left holding the baby if they take up the option to purchase.

To expect the County Council to do anything if the matter is not covered in the bill would indeed be a forlorn hope. Exist. ing conditions in these estates would deter any redisent from wishing to own the land on which his house stands and the No Rent Campaign could go on into the new century as a result.

Which brings me, finally, to the Community Council itself. Is it hiding its light under a bushel or is it another "talking shop"?

Could we be allowed to know what it has achieved other than was already being done by other action groups and taken over - since its inception? And when I say "achieved" I mean done completed - finished with-

out any hedging or side tracking or circumlocution. Let's have a list in next month's NEWSLETTER.

(I know the Editor won't like that last paragraph. but being a fair man I bet you he prints it!)

Editorial

In a University town such as ours, it is almost impossible, during the Academic Year, at least, to get away from students, that is, of course, if we want to get away from them .

The word 'Student' can sometimes be a highly emotive word to some, a very attractive word to others or, to the majority perhaps, a very ordinary word. A very few of the townspeople have run foul of a student or two and the word is inclined to rouse the blood pressure. We are inclined to hear a lot of these type of student. On the other hand some have had a very pleasant association with students and we do not hear enough of these. But to the majority the word 'student' rouses little or no emotion whatever and these people are not sufficiently informed of the 'real student', nor, perhaps are the students sufficiently informed of the 'real townspeople'. What it really boils down to is that there should be quite a lot more contact between student and townsperson.

Just to keep matters in proper perspection, for less well informed, our student friends have made very considerable mark on the town since the college has been opened up, and we are sometimes inclined to overlook this. They have put in endless work organising our young people, by way of youth clubs, Scouts, play groups, etc. and, it is to our discredit that we have not helped sufficiently in this work. Students have also, from the very first, taken a keen interest in our older citizens and have helped very considerable with the entertainments and fund raising etc. More important still they have organized regular visits to elderly people in their homes and have done endless work for them. Students also have subscribed very substantially to charitable work in the town and have actively assisted those in distress. This is practically unknown in the town and it is great credit to these young people that they have handled this work in a truely christian manner. Among the other contributions of the students to our community are: assisting 'slow learners' in our schools, giving grinds to our primary and secondary pupils, giving sports instructions, baby sitting etc.

We have only scratched the surface here of the various ways in which students have enriched our community and have unfortunately been taken for granted by us. It is not too often either that any of us parade the student virtues whilst the vices of the few are frequently paraded. It is hoped that students past and present will accept this as an acknowledgement of our thanks to them.

To compliment what they have already done, we understand that the Student Union are anxious to take an even more active interest in the town and a representative of the Union sits on the Community Council. It is expected we shall be hearing alot more in the



SCHOOLS IN MAYNOOTH

Maynooth today can boast a very wide range of educational establishments. We have pre-school groups, a Montessori School, two National Schools, a Post-primary school, a recognised college of the National University of Ireland, and a Pontifical University.

At the primary school level Maynooth has what has come to be the general pattern throughout the country the national school, statesubsidized and denominational, co-educational or single-sex, under the direction of the parish clergy or of a community of religious, with the recent addition of boards of mangement. To most people it comes as a surprise to learn that when the National Board of Education was created by the British Government in 1831 one of its major ains was to "unite in one system children of different creeds", ad the then Chief Secretary at Dublin Castle expressed it in a letter to the Duke of Leinster, the first president of the Board. Even more surprising to many people is the fact that, before the National Schools were established, Maynooth, in common with the rest of Ireland, far from being without schools, already possessed a sizable mumber of primary schools. We have quite a lot of detail concerning these because during the early decades of the nineteenth century the education question was causing sufficient concern to the government to warrant a large scale investigation into the exact number of schools and of children attending them. The Commissioners of Irish Education Inquiry asked for information from both the Protestant and Catholic Clergy of every parish under a number of headings.. The answers were compared and collected and tables of the schools in each area prepared. The headings under which the Commissioners asked for information were:- The name of the school master or mistress; his or her religion; his or her total income; a description of the premises where the school was held and an estimate of their cost; the average attendance of pupils. Protestant & Catholics, girls and boys; whether the school received financial help from any of the educational Societies or from local patrons; whether the scriptures were read in the school and if so, which version. For Maynooth the returns gave a total of six Primary Schools in 1824, catering for 232 children, 138 boys and 84 girls.

These are areas on which the New Government made specific promises before election, but so far have not fulfilled.





LETTER

The following letter was received from Rev. Liam Dunne S.V.D. to his many friends in Maynooth.

P.O.Box 107 WEWAK E.S.P. 22nd Dec. '77

Dear Old Folks, & Committee Members,

Here I am again writing to you from my parish of Boram, on the outskirts of Wewak. It is a great pleasure to be in contact with you again through this letter. How have things been for you during the year which has just gone by? I hope well. For myself, with little variation in the seasons, it is hard to believe that a whole year has gone by since I came here.

Since the 28th September, the Anniversary of my departure from my home in Ireland, I have been in my own parish house in Boram. I am enjoying the house very much, as I can meet people there, because in my parish where people can see and meet me and because I can rest and relax in my own way when I come home from a day out in the bush. Right now, I am really very happily involved in my work and enjoying it. Right now, I am involved in visiting every single village and compound to hold a Bible Service or say a Mass in preparation for Christmas.

Another interesting development which I have discovered in myself is that I have become more outgoing in some of the villages ere there are those new groups such as the Assemblies of God, the Jehovah's and so on.

One of the villages in my parish, Sawarin, was formerly all Catholic. Now it is mostly Jehovah. Because of the confusion this change brought to the people many are now nothing. It is now my hope to be able to bring the majority of them back to our Church. As a pastor, I feel it is my duty to go and 'inform' the people about the Church which they really belong to, through Baptism and which they left because of confusion. I had a talk with one of the Jehovah's last week and I was surprised by his message. Renewal is the vital task everywhere in the Church here. Education too! Before, in some places, people ioined these new Churches because they were promised something. It is well known that A. of G's attract people with rides in lorries and free books, and such things. Anyway, please remember this work in your prayers and masses.

During the past year I have remained in excellent condition. I am as white as you always knew me. Coming to the tropics does not seem to guarantee a nice brown colour. Even when I go to swim at Wom beach, where the Japanese surrendered after the war I don't even get sunburnt.

To my delight I don't have any problems here with the weather. Right now. we are in so called rainy Season, which mean that every so often we get cloudy days. This means cool days and sometimes nice winds. These are always followed by sunny days and so there is always variety. The food too is agreeable here. In fact, in town now I see that there are Australian turkeys on about every meat shelf. Plum puddings are also available in tins

while one shop sells Erin Foods & soups, and vegetables.

Among some of my pleasant diversions here are my visits to Irish Sisters and their communities. Here in Wewak itself, we have about four Irish sisters of Mercy and one Francisan Missionary of Mary. In Ireland, they are based in Loughglynn, Co. Roscommon. There are others around the dioscese too. Only last week a new FMM. arrived from Rialto, to work in another big town called Lae. Unfortunately, just the other day one of my good friends, Sr. Mary Scanlon, from Kerry, went altogether to Australis. In January Sr. Abina will go on transfer to Australia

She by the way has been the. first person from Papua New Guinea to visit my home and family, since I came here. She is from Co. Cork. Right now as I write to you, there is another priest at home in Killarney from our neighbouring dioscese of Aitape. He is Fr. Dennis Dennehy from Artigallivan. He brought some mail for my family and for two friends in Killarney so I hope that somebody will meet him. I must add that I have no shortage of friends among the people here too. It is interesting to get to know the local teachers, the members of the civil servants and such people. One of the things which might surprise you about the people here is that there is a very strong regionalism in the Country. The people from the East Sepik, Wewak, have nothing in common with the people from the mountains and the

islands and so they are not always happy to see these outsiders getting work in their province. One of the big jobs for the country and the government here is to hold all these different people together in 'Papua New Guinea'. Recently, I saw and heard the P.M. Michael Somare. He was addressing the graduate teachers from all over PNG. who were getting diplomas from the Dioscesan 'Kaindi T.T.C. '

During the past few months the people of my parish have brought a lovely new altar for the Church. This was made possible by showing films on Sunday nights against the wall of my house. The people also bought some nice cloth which we hung up behind the altar for our Confirmations. Our next 'big' item is going to be the Microphone set up which is vital since the Church is built across the road from the oil fired electricity power station. Can you imagine trying to make vourself heard above that noise?

Another project which I am trying to get off the ground is a Youth Club. But finding the people with the dedication and the ability is hard. One of the big tasks of everybody in the country now is to help the many pupils who have had to leave school after primary school. Example:-In My Mandi village school, there are 28 pupils in the 6th class. Only 7 of them can go on to high school. 21 must leave. They will be lucky to find more education somewhere else now. They could become the troublemakers of tomorrow so everybody is being encouraged to help in whatever way they can to make these children of society. There are so many things to do...if I only had time!

Now.....Can I ask you a favour?
Could I ask you to send me
some simple religious magazines,
such as the Word, Messenger,
Reality, & especially CTS pamplets
for the parish here? Some
little holy pictures would
be good too. Now, I am
only asking for your help if
you see some old editions
of these things around the
place.

Well, at this point I will sign off, so that there will be some space left for writing a personal note to you.

The following programmes will be televised on R.T.E., commencing Sunday 29th January, 1978, at 10.30 a.m. and on following Sundays at the same time:


29th January: Folm - "The Special Percent", produced by St. Michael's House, dealing primarily with the cause, incidence and in a very special way, the care of moderately and severely handicapped.


th February: Part 3 of "The Special Child" film, made in association with the Hester Adrian Unit in Mancherster. In two parts, it deals with care and management and a psychologist shows how to develop the capacities of mentally handicapped children in certain tasks - walking, feeding, dressing, fine motor play, language development, etc. Basic guidelines and principles demonstrated which could be used as a basis of tackling tasks.

12th February: Second part of "Care & Management" programme above.

19th February: Part 5 of "The Special Child" programme on physical handicap, dealing largely with the problems of the cerebal palsied child. A Paediatrician explains the cause of problems, and a psycotherapist demonstrates correct handling of a child and how to undertake everyday physiotherapy at home. The programme ends with a look at a Resource Centre where a variety of mobility, sitting and feeding aids are shown.

All the films are of special interest to Parents and Friends of the mentally handicapped children.







I have just about succeeded in getting my head above the snow to pen my monthly few lines and then not without some editorial pressure. My idea of the good life during those unpredictable months of February and March is to flee the country entirely or to curl up for the greater part of the day before a roaring fire with a good book and an inexhaustible jug of punch. Alas! I can afford to do neither so like you. I must suffer on and hope that better weather conditions are really only round the corner.

The telecommunications problems which we are suffering while I write have brought to mind something I have been wondering about for some time past. I understand that there is some proposal to allow a remission of the rental charges on telephone to old people living alone. It seems to me to be of little value as a means of preventing untimely deaths or alleviating hardship. If the elderly person has not already a telephone in the house it may take a year to have one put in and if as a result of the concession the demand rises in proportion to the number of elderly citizens living alone half of them will be dead before installation - even on a priority basis.

Now, let me stress, the concession applies only to an old person living absolutely alone. If there are two elderly people husband and wife, brother and sister, two sisters, or two old unrelated people the 'phone bill must be paid in full. So far so good!

Right! The one old person gets a telephone. Where in the house is it to be sited? If in the hall and the old person has an accident in the kitchen how does he or she get to the telephone?

If it is on a table in the kitchen and she - or he - collapses over at the sink or the cooker how does she get to the 'phone, even if she is conscious, which is unlikely. Isn't it a bit cock-eyed?

If somebody is in distress a telephone is quite useless, unless there is another person there to summon help. Unless the lone individual were to go round the house all day with the telephone strapped to his chest and half a mile of flex attached to allow manoeuvreability I doubt if the gesture of free rental will be much of an asset.

There would be some sense in granting the concession to two or more elderly people living together where there would always be one person capable of 'phoning for Priest, Doctor, or Ambulance but otherwise it strikes me you might as well give our lone Senior Citizen a half-dozen rockets to fire through the window should he require help.

I wonder who thought up such a marvellous piece of crass stupidity and thought it was the greatest thing since the sliced loaf?



OUR HERITAGE

Since the Reformation in the sixteenth century successive English Governments attempted to use education to convert the people of Ireland to English ways in language, religion and culture. An act of parliament of the reign of Henry V111 was entitled "An act for the English Order, Habite, and language ". It directed. among other things, that the incumbent of a benefice, that is the Clergyman who was entitled to the living should "Keep or cause to be kept a school to learn English, if any of the children of his Parish should come to him to learn the same". There were further attempts to achieve similar results by legislation. An act of parliament of 1570, during the reign of Elizabeth 1, ordered that there was to be a free school in every diocese, with an English Schoolmaster. These schools were to built at a charge of the County and the salaries of the teachers were to be paid by the diocese. The intention here was to provide English-style second level or grammar school education while the parish school was to look after elementary or primary schooling.

The parish school system as set up by the act of Henry V111 never flourished. The schools seem to have only begun to appear early in the eighteenth century and by this time tended to concentrate their efforts on converting Catholics to the Established Church rather than an English language and customs. By the early nineteenth century the authorities recognised that they were inadequate and ineffective as far as their original purpose was concerned. They were also very few in number. The Commissioner of Irish Education Inquiry in 1824 found only 782 parish schools in existence, in a total of 1,242 benefices.

A benefice or living might contain a single parish but could also combine two or more parishes in a union which would then make a single benefice. This explains why the total number of benefices was considerably lower than the total number of parishes in the country which was near 2,500.

In 1824 the Education Commissioners classified as parish schools all those to which the incumbent of the benefice paid an annual contribution of 40 shillings. This was the original contribution fixed by the authorities and by the early nineteenth century inflation had made it, in the words of the Commissioners, "utterly inadequate at present". So it is not surprising to find that most of the Parish Schools that did exist were pay schools, that is they charged fees, and many sought help from various support societies, which will be discussed in a later article. Maynooth Parish School in 1824 was school No. 5 on the list compiled by the Commissioners. It was run by Samuel Brett, was a pay school, and received no help from the Societies. Ten children, just over 4% of the total number of school going children in Maynooth, attended it, which supports the view that the parish school system had failed to achieve its original objectives.



Maynooth Parish School dates at least from 1702. This date is mentioned on a stone tablet preserved in the parish Church. The tablet was taken from the wall of the old school-house adjoining The church. This was demolished in 1859 when a new Parish School House was built near the Duke's Harbour on the Royal Canal, the present front section of the Geraldine Hall.

The tablet is inscribed as follows:- "This school-house was built Anno Domini 1702, with a legacy left by Mr. John Foulkes, wherein the master, that inhabiteth, is to teach the boys of the parish, and to have his freedom in the house." The school-house actually taken down in 1859 was not the original one of 1702 but a later one built by the first Duke of Leinster in 1770 as commemorated in the tablet to be seen on the east wall of the church, but it may well have stood on the same site.

"James duke of Leinster,
having at his sole expence,
repair'd, and beautified this church
and also having built the adjoining
Vestry-room and School-house,
the Parishioners have erected
this Memorial of their gratitude. A D MDCCLXX


This tablet has a charm of its own because the stone mason found he had

left out the second "i" in "parishioners" and then inserted it :"parish oners"

The parishioners also paid for the maintenance of the school-house, and in the Vestry books there are records in 1805, 1806, and 1810 of payments for repairs and painting. In 1820, after the closure of the Charter School in Maynooth (to be discussed in a later article) it was decided to pay £10 to a school-master to teach the "poor Protestant Children of the union gratis", and a committee was appointed to access the school and to "ascertain that the Schoolmaster fulfils his duty". However the school was listed in 1824 as a pay school, not a free school, and there was no mention of a salary paid by the parish, so it does not seem that this resolution had been put into effect.

The Residents of Rail Park at a Meeting on February 3rd elected a new committee for the coming year.

At a subsequent meeting of the Committee the following officers were elected.

CHAIRMAN - John Read SECRETARY - Mrs Bradshaw Treasurer - Paul Sherlock

It was agreed that the Association approach the Kildare Co. Co. with a view to having the estate taken over, and to pursue this vigorously.

You may have seen that the Council is at present using the entrance to Rail Park as a dumping ground for their gravel etc. We will ask the County Council to restore the entrance to its former state at least.

The inadequancy of the public lighting on the Straffan Road from Canal Bridge to Carton Close will also be brought to their attention and we will also ask them to erect the foot bridge that has been promised for some time now.

Residents at the Meeting expressed the opinion that the position of the ground rent be re-investigated, as you may know the present Government is preparing a new Bill

on this and it was agreed to delay action until this became law. In the meantime we will seek legal advice and be prepared. Legal advice was also to be sought in the position of Developer not completing the Estate.

The attention of the Committee was drawn to the fact that some person was making anonymous 'phone calls, as the Secretary of the Rail Park Residents Association. Would this person whoever they may be, take note that any further occurences of this nature will be brought to the notice of the Gardai.

Her many friends in Maynooth were delighted to learn that Pope Paul V1 had awarded to Miss Weafer the "Benemerenti" Medal, which is given for distinguished service to the Church. Miss Weafer, a member of an old Maynooth family, had already been tending the altars in the parish church for some vears when in 1941, in conjunction with the local clergy, she organized the 'Altar Society'. She remained it's President until she left Maynooth in 1977. 





Editorial

It used to be a quiet town - Maynooth we mean, of course - but, unfortunately this is not altogether the case now. At one time a man or woman could walk the streets at any hour of the day or night without being annoyed or molested but the situation appears to be changing. We are hearing more and more reports of people being threatened, assaulted (mainly of a minor nature) but perhaps even worse for all we know. This is something that we, in this town, cannot allow.

Least anybody should rush in here and say "Yes, these noisy students are at it again" we hasten to add that we are not referring to students in this particular instance but, if the 'bush telegraph' is correct, to young thugs born and reared in Maynooth, as well as some unknown.

It is not for us to go into details of any one incident but sufficient to say they are happening and not sufficient is being done about it. Again, if reports be correct, drink is the root cause of these incidents but we are told that "What's in sober comes out in drink"

For our own good, it is absolutely necessary that any serious misbehaviour or thuggery should be reported at once to the proper authorities and we should insist that appropriate action be taken. It is absolutely essential that this type of bad behaviour must be stamped out ruthlessly or there will shortly be no peace in this community and everybody (and we mean everybody) must join in to help stamp it out. Everybody, and again we say everybody, must give the police any details they can that will help out thuggery of any shape or form.

We would appeal to parents to keep a close eye on their children - where they are, and who they are with. We would appeal to those serving drink to refuse drink to those who have too much taken (and we don't mean drunk) and to serve a minimum to the local thugs (and, in the main, these are well known). Also drink should not be served to anybody under age under any circumstances - and, again, most of the people serving drink know who is under age and who is not. To students we say, conduct your 'parties' in a better manner and, if you must have a party keep quiet about it, don't advertise it generally and you will have no gate crashers.

In general, be vigilent at all times and do all you can to help stamp out this bad behavious before it gets out of hand. Always help the authorities in every way you can - let nobody put you off by remarks of any kind, - you will be only doing your duty to yourself and others.

SCHOOLS IN MAYNOOTH

In 1824 only 10 of the total of 232 children listed as attending school in Maynooth went to the Church of Ireland parochial school. Of the rest 115 went to the free school under the patronage of the Catholic Clergy & Parishioners, and the Duke of Leinster, and the other 107 went to the pay schools conducted by Mary Roe, James Reilly, John McSweeny and the Rev. Andrew Staunton. This distribution means that Maynooth does not quite fit the general pattern at the time. The Commissioners inquiry into the state of Primary Education found that the overwhelming majority of school-going Irish children went to pay schools' otherwise 'hedge schools'. These schools were defined by the Commissioners as schools which were unconnected with any Society that supported Schools of a particular demonination, and which were "held by individuals for their own profit". Out of a total number of Irish School Children of about 565,000 the number in independent pay schools was about 400,000, which is about 73%. But in Maynooth nearly 50% of the school going children attended the free school conducted by John Deane and Elizabeth Mahon, and patronised by the Catholic Parish and the Duke of Leinster. This school fell into another category defined by the Commissioners as "supported by the collections and subscriptions of the R.C. inhabitants of certain parishes, and under the superintendence of the R.C. priests."

The difference between these two types of school is explained by the historical background. Schools run by Catholics were illegal under the system of Penal Laws and to circumvent this the system known as the hedge schools developed during the 18th century. There was usually no fixed school house, but the teacher moved around the country, staying in an area for as long as parents were prepared to pay, in money or food or lodgings. The school house might be a barn, a shed or the shelter of a hedge depending on the time of year. As the enforcement of the laws was gradually relaxed schools became more permanent. Because they were a way of livelihood for the teacher they were called "pay-schools" as well as "hedge schools". Because Irish parents wanted education for their children the schools multiplied and flourished. Because there was no way of ensuring uniform standards the quality of the education provided varied enormously, from schools taught by very incompetent schoolmasters & schoolmistresses to the many schools , particularly in the South of Ireland, where Greek and Latin as well as mathematics, geography and history were taught to a high standard. The schools in Maynooth 1824 taught by Mary Roe, James Reilly and John McSweeney fall into this category but we do not know just what subjects each taught or how good the schools were.

The free school under Catholic patronage was one of a newer type to arrive on the Irish Scene. Once legal restrictions on Catholic Schools were removed at the end of the eighteenth century the Catholic ecclesiastical authorities began to aim at developing a net-work of schools linked to the Catholic parish Clergy.

In 1824 there were only 352 schools of this kind in the country, but the Catholic Archbishop of Dublin, Dr. Daniel Murray, explained to the Commissioners that the Catholic Authorities were reluctant to have Catholic Children attend schools where the Parish Priest had not access to the children or which were not under Catholic super-

Our heritage continued.

Another pointer to the Catholic authorities policy in primary education at the time, and one which seems to still exist today, is seen in the slightly different form, the description of these schools takes in the returns sent in by the Protestant and Catholic local clergy respectively. The Protestant return describes it as one co-educational school of boys and girls, while the Catholic return divides it into two single - sex schools. This trend to favour separate sex schools was noted as a consistent Catholic policy by a later education report on Foundation Schools in 1835 - 6 which pointed out that convenience and economic considerations made separate single - sex schools more attractive to the Catholic Authorities who were dealing with large numbers of pupils than to the Protestant Authorities who found that the small numbers of pupils they were dealing with made the coeducational school the only viable one, and sometimes failed even to do that. This Catholic policy has continued in Maynooth up to the present day.

The education commissioners inquiring into the existing school system in 1824 - 5 among other things asked whether schools were connected with any of the societies. None of those in Maynooth at the time were, but there had been one in Maynooth until just a few years previously. These societies emerged during the eighteenth century after the outlawing of Catholic education by the series of acts of parliament passed during the reigns of William and Anne at the end of the 17th and the beginning of the 18th centuries. The earlier idea of parish and diocesan Protestant Schools had failed to provide education for Catholic Irish Children and now a new pattern emerged in efforts by voluntary Protestant groups, using money raised by themselves and government subsidies, to educate the Catholic children of Ireland, and hopefully to convert them to the Protestant religion and to loyalty to the English crown. Most of the societies date from the end of the 18th century when the Church of England and the Church of Ireland experienced a religious revival and evangelical fervour, but the Maynooth school was the creation of the earliest of these societies, established in 1733 by royal charter which led to its schools being known as "Charter Schools". The charter described the objectives of the plan as aiming to have "the children of the popish and other poor natives . . . instructed in English tongue and in the principles of true religion and loyalty in all succeeding generations". The method adopted to achieve this was the establishment of boarding schools so that the children could be removed from all harmful home influences which might militate against the success of the education. But as parents could not be forced to send their children to the Charter Schools there was always a problem in providing pupils, and many of these were orphans and foundlings. Maynooth Charter School was founded in 1749 and was closed by the Society in 1819, just five years before the Education Commissioners investigated the School Situation.



"All these schemes have advanced a step further since the last meeting," added the C.E.O.


Next he said that tenders for the erection of Droichead school had been invited.






Electrical points must not be overloaded; a lot of appliances wired to one point can lead to overheating and a serious risk of fire. The ideal is "one appliance, one socket". Keep flexes short and replace them when worn. Never allow the flex of an electric kettle to drag over the cooker; and don't run flexes under floor coverings — they can be chafed or damaged without being noticed. Never run an iron or other appliance off a light socket and never leave an iron unattended when it is plugged in. All appliances not in use should be unplugged.

GAS APPLIANCES




Gas and air may form an explosive mixture. If you have a gas cooker or water heater, make sure you are ready to light it before you turn on the gas—especially when lighting the oven. If the pilot light does not ignite the burner at once, turn off and see whether the pilot light is properly alight.




If you are using bottled gas (appliances) follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully when changing cylinders. If possible, cylinders should be kept outside and changed outside. If they must be kept inside, make sure they are well away from heat and have good ventilation. When the appliance is not in use, close the valve on the cylinder. Check the flexible hose periodically for signs of age or cracking.

HEATING APPLIANCES



Keep heaters well away from curtains and furniture. Ensure that appliances are securely sited against being knocked over. Never move or refuel an oil heater when it is alight. Keep it clean and well maintained; and refuel out of doors if possible. Convector heaters get dangerously overheated if clothes are draped over them, depriving them of air circulation necessary for their proper working.

OPEN FIRES



In rooms used by children or old people, always have a fire guard fixed in front of a fire. Never leave a room without putting a spark guard in front of a fire. Don't bank a fire up too high — the chimney could catch fire or burning fuel fall out. Don't use petrol, paraffin, etc. to light the fire.

Don't hang a mirror over a fireplace — it invites people to get too near a fire; don't put anything on a mantelpiece which a child might try to get at.

Burning soot falling down from a chimney may set fire to furniture and carpets. Sparks flying out of the chimney may set fire to surrounding property.

Have the chimney swept regularly — at least once a year.



It is advisable not to smoke in bed. "Nodding off" with a lighted cigarette can be fatal. If you must smoke in bed, be careful about putting out your cigarette; and see that the ashtray is stable.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF FIRE-

A PLAN OF ACTION SHOULD BE PREPARED SO THAT EVERY MEMBER OF THE FAMILY KNOWS WHAT TO DO.

CALL THE FIRE BRIGADE AT ONCE — there is **no charge** for the services of the brigade.

GET EVERYONE OUT OF THE HOUSE. Plan safe escape routes for your family NOW — even if you never have to use them.

Do everything possible to REDUCE DRAUGHTS which may fan the fire. Close all doors and windows, even in rooms away from the fire.

You can then try to extinguish the fire, but only if you can do so without endangering life.

If the chimney goes on fire, move furniture and carpets away from the fireplace, if possible.

IF YOU HAVE TO

Throw whatever bedding or other soft materials are to hand onto the ground to assist in breaking your fall.

Lower yourself full length from the window sill before letting go — this will reduce the distance of free-fall.

IF CLOTHING CATCHES FIRE...

A person whose clothing catches fire should be laid on the floor and rolled in blankets, rugs or a thick coat.

If your own clothing catches fire, roll on the floor to put out the flames.

For a fire involving fats or oils —

Do not use water directly on burning fats or oils. Never carry a pan of burning fat. To extinguish a pan of fat on fire, turn off the heat and cover the pan with a lid, a plate or a damp cloth, smothering any spilled fat with a damp cloth as well.

For a fire in electrical equipment —

Unplug the appliance involved or switch off the current at the mains. Then you can use water to extinguish the fire. Water must never be used on live electrical equipment.



The spread of fire and smoke through open doorways may result in people being trapped and overcome by smoke, and hot poisonous fumes. If you are trapped upstairs by fire, the best thing to do is to go into a room (preferably one looking onto the street), **shut the door behind you** and put a rug or blanket at the bottom of the door to keep out the smoke. Then shout for help from the window. Do not jump unless you are forced to do so; unnecessary injuries are caused in this way.



Editorial

The response from the community to the notice for Nominations to the new Community Council is, to say the least of it, disheartening. Not nearly sufficient nominations have been received to form anything like a representative Council for the coming three years. In an endeavour to try and rectify this, the Council have decided to extend the date of receipt of Nominations to 8th May next. (Additional Nomination Papers are available at Leavy's Shop, Greenfield and Barry's, Main Street, if required).

This apathy on the part of the public is somewhat typical of the interest generally in the Community Council for some time past, or since its inception for that matter. It is as though people believe that having elected a Council they themselves have no duty towards it. Time and Time again the Council asked for assistance to carry out projects without response from the electors. It is time. it was understood that such a Council is not elected to do all the work themselves but are there to organise projects that they consider necessary for the betterment of the town and community. All townspeople are then expected to pull their weight, both manually and financially, to carry out these projects. The Council members are expected to do a bit too but not all the work.

This leads to the question "IS A COMMUNITY COUNCIL NECESSARY AT ALL" and it is a question that must be answered now as Maynooth Community Council will cease to exist if a lot more interest is not shown.

Apart from the fact that there are so many things to attend to around the town and which must be organised systematically, there is the future function of Community Councils. There is a tendancy in governments in recent years to pass on part of its adminsistration to County Councils and they, in turn, are expected in the future to pass on local affairs to be handled by local or community councils where such councils exist. It is therefore absolutely necessary that our Council should continue to exist so that our town may derive the maximum benefit from this. Also, in the interim, County Councils are more inclined to listen to Community Councils as time goes on and Maynooth will be the loser if we have no Council to speak for us.

We hope therefore that people will rally around now and allow their names to go forward for election to our Community Council and, particularly, when a next Council is elected that the public in general will come forward and help in the improving of our town with both manual and financial help.

The Church of Ireland Primate, Archbishop Hugh Boulter of Armagh, an Englishman and an active political supporter of the English Government, explained the motivation behind the Charter School project in a letter to the bishop of London in 1730. "I can assure you" he wrote "the papists here are so numerous, that it highly concerns us, in point of Interest, as well as Concern for the Salvation of these poor Creatures, who are our Fellow Subjects, to try all possible means to bring them and theirs to the knowledge of the true Religion". The scheme was one of the rather few positive attempts by the resident gentry in eighteenth century Ireland to achieve some degree of social reform. The plan for these schools was first financed by private donations and later received substantial Government Support, as well as the royal charter. Schools were established all over Ireland, but the scheme totally failed to achieve its original purpose of converting the Catholic Irish, and the scandal caused by reports of inefficient and corrupt management, neglect of the children and exploitation of their work was a considerable embarrassment to the authorities.

Conditions within the Charter Schools were revealed to the Public in 1784 when the English philantrophist - John Howard published an account of his visits to the schools. They caused such an uproar that the Irish House of Commons set up its own committee to carry out a separate inquiry. This committee reported back in 1788. The report included evidence given by Sir Jeremiah Fitzpatrick, inspector - general of prisons, who visited the schools in 1786 and 1787, and from John Howard who saw them again in 1788. They found that in many schools the children were badly fed, badly clothed, badly treated and badly educated. The Education Commissioners in 1825 themselves visited the schools and found that conditions had not improved in the interval. This they found hard to explain in view of the earlier reports and concluded that the House of Commons had expected that the publication of the damning evidence would have been in itself sufficient to bring about a cure. This obviously had not happened. The Commissioners found instances of cruelty, exploitation of the labour of the children at the expense of their education, and particularly noted the instances of severe punishment meted out to children who complained. "No offence that a Charter School child can commit", they commented, "seems to be less pardonable than daring to utter a complaint. " If we add to this the fact that the public at large rated the unfortunate "Charter School brats" at the very bottom of the social scale, it is not surprising to find the Commissioners asking themselves what had gone wrong. It is interesting that they finally concluded that the basic fault of the system, greater even than the publicised mismangement and abuses, was that they took the children away from their home environment and family support. They were founded, the Commissioners explained, on "the mistaken principles of a system of Education which separates children from their kindred and which turns them out into life when just arrived at Maturity, without Friends or Relations, and without that practical experience which Children under ordinary circumstances usually acquire."

Maynooth Charter School seems to have been one of the better run establishments. Robert, 19th earl of Kildare, who died in 1744, left £500 "for building a charter school at Maynooth". His son James, 20th earl and, from 1766, first Duke of Leinster, also contributed and the school was built and opened in 1749. Later the building was taken over by the Presentation Nuns when they came to open a convent school in Maynooth. The Annals of the Presentation Convent describe the building as the Nuns found it in 1824, "a little two storey house with door and three windows in the upper storey". The present convent lane is called Charter School Lane on eighteenth century maps of Maynooth.

There are a number of reports on conditions in the Maynooth Charter School. It was visited twice by Sir Jeremiah Fitzpatrick in 1786 and again in 1787. He mentions the Master, one Henry Ogle, and goes on "This house, which contains thirty-nine boys, is tolerably commodious, with a convenient garden, but being constantly f,lagged with limestone, the ground floors are constantly damp in wet weather, which might be easily remedied by flooring them with tiles or fire-stone. Many of the boys were barefotted, which the Master said they prefer, and others are deficient of clothes. There are seventeen beds, all in very good order and clean. I recommended that fires should be made up in the damp rooms, as some of the childrenhad croups, and that three more beds should be set up, so as to have but two in a bed. The childrens health is impaired by the constant discharge of saliva in spinning flax, but the exercise in the garden recovers them. There is no usher allowed. In June 1787, I found matter more pleasing to me". Sir Jeremiah explicitly included the Maynooth school among those he found "in the best order" though none was "to his entire satisfaction".

John Howard, also giving evidence before the House of Commons Committee reported a visit to Maynooth on April 26th, 1788, where he found "thirthy - five healthy boys. The house, bed-rooms and bedding were perfectly clean. Ten or twelve boys were at work in the garden which contains about three acres (Irish), and is kept in the nicest order by the Master and his boys. The allowance for diet is 3d per day. There is no infirmary, which is less necessary where the boys are thus employed."

We were going to have great fun explaining to the German's that here was the football team from Maynooth, fully equipped to take them on, without gear or ball.

This first day started the ball rolling on what was to be for me, and I'm sure, for every other person on this trip the happiest and most unforgettable memory to take with us through life.

The porter at Crewe Station must have thought here is a typical mad Irishman, as I ran up and down the platform, like a lunatic, after John Nolan - who was busily occupied buying cake at the Station Shop - unaware that the train was moving off without him. He was back on the train and it was I who nearly got lost in the long run.

Our few hours in England were enjoyable but the thoughts of everyone were on the following day when we would arrive at Frankfurt - we were both excited and a little apprehensive. On being met by the Leaders of the German Club at Frankfurt Station, apprehension soon faded, for it was obvious by their greeting that everything would go great. From the first day the friendship between the German's and Irish was truely cemented, it became a group of people living, sharing and enjoying themselves.

What did we do? - Indoor football training, a meeting with the Lord Mayor of Bischofsheim and a Disco on May 1st. This introduces the Fraulines into the picture and they remained very much part of it until the end of the trip.

Perhaps you felt that the Old Community Council was not truly reflective of the feelings of the area and therefore did not warrant your full support. This is a situation full of disaster. No Committee can exist without the general body of the Community behind it, whether or not they are critical of its aims or fully in accord.

Your support is vital Your criticism is vital Your views are vital Your antagonism is vital

We are therefore making one last effort to keep the Council in existence by holding a public meeting in the Geraldine Hall on Tuesday June 6th at 8 p.m. Everybody is welcome particularly those already involved in other Associations.

Your attendance is vital to the betterment of our Community.

In order that the NEWSLETTER continue in existence, whatever the fate of the Council itself, it was proposed, seconded and carried that the Newsletter Committee will be a complete and separate entity with no connection whatever with the Community Council itself.

Editorial

Many of the older residents in the town will be almost amused at our bringing up the question of a road by-passing the town. They will have heard this matter discussed over the past twenty years or thirty, but beyond rumours that the road will pass here, or there, or yonder, they have seen no move from the Authorities in the matter whatsoever, in all that time.

Be this as it may, the matter of traffice through the town has now become a serious problem. Not alone the volumn of traffice but the weight and speed through the town has reached the stage where something serious must be done.

Perhaps people living on the Main Street suffer most from the various aspects of the problem, as they probably suffer all the inconveniences. Noise, is perhaps, the most annoying and those who have not to live with it both day and night cannot fully appreciate this. Perhaps you have tried to carry on a conversation on the Main Street when heavy traffic is passing and which may gibe you some idea of this form of inconvenience. Damage to houses through heavy trucks vibrating walls continuously is another hazard while all townspeople suffer from the sheer volumn of traffic in the daytime and the speed of the traffic during the periods of low volumn. In the daytime the speed of cars and trucks is bad enough but at night it is no exaggeration to say that some vehicles pass through the town at speeds approaching 100 miles per hour.

Speed zones have been set for the whole town but these are more renowned for being broken than kept. Vehicles completely ignore the zebra crossing, although, to be fair, most drivers stop. Unfortunately, however, the pedestrian does not know if a speeding car is going to give way. Children are very vulnerable on the crossings, and very likely to be ignored by motorists. (We might add here that only one pedestrian crossing is not sufficient in the town

The town is approaching complete traffic congestion and it looks as if nothing will be done about it until we protest in a strong manner to the Authorities. We are told that the road which was supposed to by-pass Maynooth is started but work has ceased at the Dublin County Boundary. We are informed rightly or wrongly, that Meath Co. Council are holding up matters on some technicality about payments. If this is the case, it is an absolute disgrace. It is up to us to put pressure on our County Councillors and T.D.s and urge them to have our plight properly aired in the right places.

In the meantime, we feel sure there is something can be done to improve the situation. Better controlled crossings can be erected, perhaps a 'washboard' surface could be put on the roads at each end and through the town to slow traffic to a reasonable pace. Stricter watch could be kept on speed violations and failure to respect the zebra crossings. These things would help but the only real solution is to press for the completion of the by-pass.





OUR HERITAGE

Mary Cullen

While Maynooth Charter School was never included among those in which the worst abuses were disclosed it seems to have been considered to be less than satisfactory by the authorities of the Incorporated Society which maintained the schools. They eventually closed Maynooth School "suppressed" it in their own words. on May 5th 1919 and the house and lands were handed back to the Duke of Leinster. This was Augustus Frederick the 3rd duke and the grandson of Tames the first duke. Just eighteen months before the school was closed down it was inspected again. This time the visit of inspection was organised by the Society itself, which was disturbed by the fact that conditions in its schools had failed to improve even after the publicity given to the findings of the official enquiry. On behalf of the Society the Rev. Elias Thackeray visited Maynooth Charter School on December 12th 1817. He reported no gross abuses but it is clear that he found conditions far from satisfactory. The boys' attainments in reading, spelling, and writing he thought "limited". The bed-rooms were too crowded and the beds and bedding not clean enough. More care, attention and cleanliness were needed in his opinion. Linen was changed only once a week, and he was quick to notice that the judicious use of black stockings allowed of "too infrequent changes". The school had no catechist at the time of his visit. The local Committee which was supposed to supervise the running of the School assured him that things were improving, but it is clear that the Rev .Thackeray was not happy with the over-all situation, and the Society seems to have concurred.

It has already been noted that in 1824, five years after the suppression of the Charter School, nearly half the school-going children in Maynooth attended independent, privately run pay-schools, those conducted by Mary Roe, James Reilly, John McSweeney, and the enigmatic Rev. Andrew Staunton, the very existence of whose school was ignored by the local Church of Ireland vicar. The three private schools run by Catholics catered for both boys and girls, and two of them, and also Staunton's school, had both Catholic and Protestant pupils. Since these schools all charged fees and yet the combined number of children who attended them nearly equalled the numbers attending the free schools supported by the Duke of Leinster and backed by the Catholic Clergy it seems that they must have enjoyed some reputation. We do not know anything of them individually nor how long any one of them had been in existence. Of there nature schools run by an individual in his or her own house were likely to be relatively short-lived. Since the repeal of the penal laws prohibiting Catholic run schools towards in the end of the 18th century private schools had proliferated. But we do know that there had been schools run by Catholics in Maynooth at least as far back as 1731, in spite of the laws forbidding there existence. Defiance of various aspects of the penal legislation led to an Inquiry on the State of Popery in that year, and it noted the existence of "several" popish schools in Maynooth.

As for the quality of the education given in these schools, again we are ignorant of them individually, but there is the evidence given by the English philanthropist, John Howard before the Committee of 1788. He said "At the cabins on the road side I saw several schools, in which, for the payment of 3/3d Irish per quarter, children were instructed in reading, writing and accounts. Some of these I examined as to their proficiency and found them much forwarder than those of the same age in the Charter Schools. They are clean and wholesome, and consisted of the children of both Protestant and Catholic parents".

The somewhat discredited Incorporated Society was followed by others which instead of establishing their own boarding schools, gave financial aid to schools which met their requirements. These included the London Hibernian Society, the Baptist Society, the Association for discountenancing Vice and Promoting the knowledge and practice of the Christian Religion. the Sunday School Society, and the Lord Lieutenants Fund. None of these earnest organisations achieved much success in their endeavour to convert the people of Ireland. The reason for their failure was the refusal of parents to send their children to schools that were suspected of proselytism. In 1815 the state began to give an annual grant to a new organisation for the Education of the Poor, popularly known as the Kildare Place Society. The aim of this society was to maintain non-denominational schools throughout the country, and its board was composed of both Protestants and Catholics. It had a certain amount of success but ran into difficulties as the Catholic Church authorities began to expand the network of schools under their control and the management of the Society became more Protestant dominated. It was this situation that led to the major government enquiry into the shole position of elementary education throughout the country, and then to the decision to establish the "National Schools". But before the National School system was launched in 1831 Maynooth had acquired another school with the arrival of the Presentation Sisters in 1823

SPONSORED CYCLE TOUR

While the eleven riders whose ages range from 15 - 68 are training and practising earnestly for their long ride, the canvassers are working equally hard to recruit sponsors at as much per mile as they can coax out of them. extensions, site-buying and eventually the building of an additional School and Church.










FLOWERS AND ART

The "influence of floral arrangement in art" was the subject of a most interesting talk given by antique expert, Mrs. Fegan. Maynooth at the monthly meeting of Kells and District Horticultural Society. She illustrated her talk with numerous and often unusual objects d'art.

Mrs. Fegan pointed out that the Romans used Laurel wreaths to decorate their. coins. This tradition of . using floral arrangements on metal continued down through history to the present time she said.

During the 16th century nutmeg was used to camouflage the smell and taste of meats which were not too fresh. Soon all the tables of the rich had nutmeg graters. The speaker showed a grater

made from silver (about 1730) This was decorated with flowers.

Many people had tiny decorated bottles from the Georgian era which they believed were used as perfume bottles. However Mrs. Fegan claimed that these were used for holding white spirit which ladies of the period used for cleaning off their finger-tips.

Next Mrs. Fegan showed a magnificent gold sewing set made in 1815 decorated with Accanthus leaves. She also showed some items which illustrated how iris decorations became popular after Napoleon and the French invaded Egypt.

She then turned to the subject of floral decorations on fabrics. To illustrate her talk she used silks from India and lace from Carrickmacross, Limerick and Kildare.

She opened the eyes of the membees to the use of flowers in unusual and also most ordinary things around them.

Mrs. Sarah Angel, also from Maynooth, arranged spring flowers in antique vases.

The most original and interesting talk and the floral arrangements were enjoyed by all the members and their friends.

Editorial

The recent tragic fire in Straffan and the serious fire in O'Connell Street, Dublin before that, emphasis the need for vigilance and an escape route when confronted with fire. Most houses and buildings in Maynooth are only two stories high but this should not lead to complacence. Time and time again lives have been lost through ignorance or stupidity.

Precautions should be taken at all times to ensure that everyone has the best possible chance of escape. This does not mean that doors should be left open. On the contary all doors should be closed. This prevents draughts reaching the fire and may gain you valuable time. At the same time all exit doors and passages from the premises must be kept clear of obstruction, to allow quick access to the outside.

It is worth remembering which of your neighbours has a long ladder as this may be the only means of excape for people trapped in upstairs rooms. A strange thing about fires is that they very often start under stairs, possibly because many people use this space for storage of papers, paints etc. In humid weather fires can be started by instantaneous combustion on there own, so make sure that all storage spaces are kept tidy and well ventilated.

Combustible materials such as old papers, rage, paints etc. and particularly gas containers of any kind should not be kept in the house whether in use or not. In fact the gas cylinder for cookers should be situated outdoors.

Commonsense really is the greatest help in dealing with all kinds of accidents, so remember keep your head on all occasions and you will save lives and property. One further point for residents in the Maynooth Area is that it is quicker to ring the Local Fire Brigade direct rather than dial 999. The number of the Local fire brigade and ambulance is 286222 and this number should be kept in a convenient place, known to all members of the family.

We would ask every person to seriously consider their own premises and rectify immediately any faults they find. It is much better to spend some time and effort now than to have to do it later, perhaps in the middle of the night.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION IN PAKISTAN

by Sean P. Smith

The adult literacy programme described in the course of this article has been in progress in Sargodha, Pakistan, for a number of years. Some introduction to Sargodha and its surroundings may therefore help to bring the project into focus.

Sargodha is the District Headquarters for an area of approximately 500 square miles. situated in the heart of the Province of the Punjab in Pakistan. In a recent census the population of Pakistan was realised at 75 millions; the Punjab Province accounts for the larger percentage of this

In this region is the Diocese of Rawalpindi covering an area of about 3000 square miles - Sargodha is at the south-east corner of the diocese. For many years education was one of the chief efforts in the diocese with numerous schools catering for all classes of people. In 1972 the Government decided to nationalise education, the result being that most of these schools were lost to the diocese.

At present, the literacy rate in Pakistan approximates to: Muslims 16%, Christians 11%. Christians form about 1% of the entire population. It is claimed in most quarters that the standard of education if falling.

It can be readily appreciated that many people have never been to school: people who have never experienced education do not realise its value, hence parents, on the slightest pretext, do not send their children to school. The United Presbyterian Mission saw this many years ago and then went into the field of Adult Literacy, helping adults to read and write.

They worked out a system of which an adult with minimum intelligance can learn to read and write within six months. In 1972 the Catholic Clergy we: e asked to join in a training programmed at Sargodha and to co-operate with the U.P. mission in this project. The Diocese gave some financial help for this, and very soon the programme got under way with a new spirit. The Course lasts for six months. Each centre has one teacher with not less than 15 students. The method is very simple. It consists of visual aids, and instead of having to learn the complicated native Urdu alphabet the Student learns a system of sounds. The method is so simple that a student who has passed eight class at school can pick it up in a week's course and teach it quite easily. Each centre is in progress daily for one hour. Most teachers take on the job after their ordinary work.

The big difficulty is keeping the people's interest alive. At the end of 1976, as interest had waned, a new

revival was considered necess-

Thus experts from the head office of Adult Literacy in Lahore were invited and they conducted a refresher course for teachers. The teacher is the one who has to keep up the life and the interest in the centre. He has to encourage people to come and to come regularly. Very often educationally deprived people do not keep very good time and the least distraction will cause them to stay away. So, the first refresher course was aimed at reviving the spirit of the teachers and to getting the centres going at full speed again, and to having these kinds of refresher courses at least once every three months.







At a meeting held in the Geraldine Hall on the 20th August, 1974 the following members were elected to form a committee.

This committee was formed to promote the building of Handball courts in Maynooth.

At a Maynooth Development Association meeting late September 1974 the Development Association agreed to proposals put forward by the above Committee to erect a 40 x 20 Handball court. Due to its size it would be suitable for both Handball and Squash. The Development Association informed us that we could expect no financial assistance from them towards the project and this was accepted. At the time we were acting on the advice of the advice of the late Mr. John Barnwell who was extremely interested in the project. He gave us a site on the land belonging to the Geraldine Hall and not in the Sports field. There was even talk about it joining the Swimming Pool so that changing rooms and showers were shared etc. Mr. Barnwell encouraged us all to go ahead as quickly as possible and he gave us as much help as possible to pursue this end; what a pity he has passed on.

At a further meeting headed by Mr. Barnwell and in consultation with the Architects Bacon & Kelly it was decided that the project should be

expanded to include squash courts as well. It was envisaged that as Handball was unlikely to produce enough money to make it self sufficient the Squash courts would produce enough cash flow from membership to pay for the project, employ a Caretaker and also to help maintain the Geraldine &all and Sportsfield. A sikver Circle was formed and a great number of members were collected.

On the 30th April , 1976 Full Planning Permission for the erection of two Squash Courts at the Harbour field Maynooth was applied for, after consultation with some of the Development Association by Bacon & Kelly Associates, our architects, and it was only then that the Maynooth Development Association told us that if these courts were erected that not a penny could be collected for their use.

Mr. Barnwell, during his office, had not indicated this, as in fact he said the Trustees could charge as long as it was not on the Sports field. It is a great pity we were not given the facts before we had invested £600for plans and paid £300 to the architects.

We think it would be benefical if the Community as a whole were to be informed as to :-

- (1) The terms of the Trustees Constitution?
- (2) Who are the Trustees?
- What are they doing?
- (4) Should they prevent a Community project being completed.

There have been various rumours that the money collected by the Handball & Squash Club has been misplaced or misused. This is entirely untrue.

The facts are that at present there

£300 as the fee included supervision of building, etc.

As will be seen from this figure £2,487 was invested. During the Silver Circle £2,400 approximately was paid out making nearly £5,000 of an investment by the Community of Maynooth towards the building of Squash and Handball courts. It is a great disappointment that we were unable to fulfill this confidence. However, the money will remain invested until another Club starts to complete the courts for the Community. We promise that any committee who provides this facility can approach us at any time and we will give any assistance possible.

Finally, we would like to give our thanks to all people and children who spent so much of their time collecting for the Silver Circle and all the people who supported this venture.





Editorial

The mounting death and injury toll on our roads has reached overwhelming proportions, although we are pleased to note that the figure for the last month or two have shown a downward trend. We trust, indeed, that the figures will show a further substantial reduction with the introduction of the Breathalyser Test and that we eventually see the end of one of the worst aspects of the road carnage, the drunken Driver.

Apart from the drunken menace, all of us who drive should make a point of taking more care and devoting more attention to the road when we are behind the driving wheel. One careless moment may cause the loss of a life or serious injury to an innocent person, not to mention the unseen misery caused to their families and relatives.

Even if we do not drive, we can help by being good pedestrians, by giving due consideration to those who are driving, by being attentive to young children playing on or near the roads and not least of all be getting ourselves versed in how to help injured parties who have been involved in accidents. Nobody, these days, can be at a loss by attending a course of First Aid lectures and many a life has been saved by having well instructed First Aider at or near the scene.

This need for early attention to accident victims accentuates an extraordinary recent decision by the Authorities in removing the ambulance from
Maynooth Fire Station. This decision, to the lay man at least, is incomprehensible. When one would be expecting an improvement in the service,



OUR HERITAGE

Mary Cullen

The Presentation Sister belonged to a recently established Irish Order founded by Nano Nagle, a Corkwoman and an outstanding pioneer in the development of Catholic Schools in Ireland. Years before the relaxation of the penal laws prohibiting schools conducted by Catholics, Nano Nagle had quitely opened schools for the education of poor children in Cork City. She naturally kept the venture as quiet as possible, and even her closest relatives were unaware of what she was at for some time. For this reason there is some doubt as to the exact date of her first school, but it seems to have been 1754 or 1755, or perhaps even some years earlier. Within a matter of months she was catering for 200 children, and the pressure from parents led to an extension of the system, and to the opening of schools for boys as well as girls. By 1769 she had two schools for boys and five for girls. She was anxious to ensure that the schools would be established on a permanent basis and with the Bishop of Cork, invited the French Ursuline Nuns to come to Cork. Nano Nagle built them a Convent, and the Ursulines arrived in Cork 1771. The order took root and flourished but turned out not to be exactly what Miss Nagle wanted. The Ursulines taught the well off as well as the poor and their rule of enclosure limited their activities. Nano Nagle wanted an order devoted only to the poor, and to all their needs, including home visitation and nursing as well as education. So while continuing to support the Ursulines, she gathered together a group to found a new religious congregation committed only to the poor and unhampered by a rule of enclosure. This began in 1775 as the Sisters of the Charitable Instruction of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Ironically after Nano Nagle's death in 1784 her Nuns themselves came to feel that they too needed a rule of enclosure if they were to survive, and the congregation was finally raised to the standing of a religious order in 1805 with the new title of 'Society of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and with solemn vows and a rule of enclosure. This meant that the sisters were limited to educational work, but they anticipated that the arrival of the Sisters Of Charity of St. Vincent De Paul would provide for the visitation and nursing of the poor and the sick.

The Maynooth foundation was made from the Richmond Convent in Dublin. One of the most active agents in persuading the Nuns to come to Maynooth was Rev. Dr. Francis Anglade, Professor of Moral Theology in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. The College had been established in 1795, largely as a result of the French Revolution which had caused the closure of most of the colleges on the continent, and especially in France, where students for the Irish Mission had been educated during the penal days. The Irish Catholic bishops had presented a memorial to the Lord Lieutenant asking him to obtain royal sanction for the endowment of "academies or seminaries" to educate students for the priesthood in Ireland. They then extended the scheme to include the education of lay students as well. The result was an

act of the Irish Parliament in 1795 to provide for "the better education of persons professing the Popish or Roman Catholic religion". Among the early academic staff of the College were a nember of ex professors and lecturers from continental Colleges who had become refugees from the French Revolution. Dr. Anglade was one of these. He was appointed to the Staff of Maynooth in 1802, first as Professor of Logic, Metaphysics and Ethics, and then in 1810 as Professor of Moral Theology. He taught in the College until 1828, when he resigned, and lived there until his death in 1834. He is buried in the College Cemetary and his protrait can be seen in the residential students' reflectory.

According to the annals of the Maynooth Presentation Convent Dr. Anglade "endowed that establishment with a considerable amount of funds". More money and later income came from the family of one of the founding Nuns, Mother M. Augustine, Drumgoole, and the Duke and Duchess of Leinster are also named as "among the chief contributors", though no details of their contribution are recorded. The New Community of four Nuns lived for a year in a small "hut" or "house" on the Dublin Road, and then in December 1824 they "removed to the old Charter School, which comprises part of the present convent.". This gift to the Nuns of the Charter School Buildings explains part at least of the Leinsters' contribution. A collection was made for building schools and the foundation stone was laid by the Marquis of Kildare in 1826. The work went ahead quickly and by 1828, in addition to their primary school, the nuns had opened an industrial school, at the request of the Duchess of Leinster. In this Straw Hats, Bonnets, Frocks, Shirts, and surplices were made and sold, with the Duchess acting as Chief Patron and Agent.

In the meantime the government enquiry into the whole position of primary education was proceeding, and the final decision reached was to set up a National Board of Education, composed of both Protestant and Catholic Members, and to be responsible for the allocation of government financial support for primary education. The Board was established in 1831 and the Duke of Leinster was its first President.



Here for instance is a set of office regulations for a Burnley cotton mill in 1852

- (1) Godliness, cleanliness and punctuality are the necessities of a good business.
- (2) This firm has reduced the hours of work and the clerical staff will nowonly have to be present between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. on weekdays
- (3) Daily prayers will be held each morning in the main office. The Clerical staff will be present.
- (4) Clothing must be of a sober nature. The clerical staff will not disport themselves in raiment of bright colours, nor will they wear hose, unless in good repair.
- (5) overshoes and topcoats may not be worn in the office, but neck scarves and headwear may be worn in inclement weather.
- (6) A stove is provided for the benefit of the clerical staff. Coal and wood must be kept in the locker. It is recommended that each member of the clerical staff bring in 4 pounds of coal each day during cold weather.
- (7) No member of the clerical staff may leave the room without permission from Mr. Rogers. The calls of nature are permitted and the clerical staff may use the garden below the second gate. This area must be kept in good order.



SHOPPING CENTRE

COMMUNITY EDUCATION IN PAKISTAN continued.

In Spring (March) 1977, a week's training course for teachers was held, attended by over thirty people. Again, the experts from Lahore conducted the course. The course turned out 25 more teachers, not all from the sargodha area. About 10 new centres sprang to life after this course. At present, there are 39 centres in the Sargodha parish. These are supervised by two full-time supervisors, who have followed a special course. They must visit each centre at least once every two weeks to see if things are going according to plan. When the centre is ready to take a test, the director is informed and tests are taken, the director is informed and tests are taken. The course is in five stages, the completion of each stage is followed by a test and successful candidates are allowed to go on to the next stage.

The teachers are paid per capita on the successful completion of each stage, and they receive a bonus if the course runs on schedule. At the end of six months a final test in reading and writing is taken, when the

This, of course, is very little to pay for literacy. If 100% success is not guaranteed. nevertheless, a considerable mumber of people are helped to read and write. With more finance the courses can be extended and made more attractive for all concerned.

This accounts for the main elements of the adult literacy programme in Sargodha. which without our Christian Missionaries, would be work left undone.

Education is basic for any kind of progress and development. By helping parents to read and write it is hoped, in turn, to give a better future to the education of their children.

MAYNOOTH FIANNA FAIL

At our last monthly meeting which was attended by Brian Lenihan T.D. Minister for Fisheries and Forestry Liam Lawlor T.D. Charlie McCreevy T.D., and councillors Terry Boylan, Maura Byrne, and Peadar Cosgrove. Also in attendance was Gerard Brady member of the National Executive.

The meeting was informed that the following roads, recently widened would be surfaced this month:

(a) Road from Newtown/Maynooth towards Ladychapel.

(b) Road from Balraheen Cross to Baltreacy Cross.

We were also told that two third miles of the road in Greenfield Cottages had been widened, and the County Engineer would not be in favour of widening the remainder of this road as this would only encourage additional traffic on the road, and might make this junction with the Newtown! Maynooth end more dangerous

The council has been asked to restore the footpath at Greenfield The County Engineer has been asked to recommend the provision of a pedestrian pathway from Mullen Canal Bridge via the Harbour, to connect

with Leinster Street.

Suggested schemes to be financed from envirolment grants. Amenity and open space allocations:

- (a) .The square £500
- (b) Parson Street Fill in and Grass £1,500
- (c) Development of former swimming pool site £2,000

At long last one of our Housing Estates Rail Park is to be taken over by the Council. This estate was left in an unfinished condition from the services point of view, because of financial difficulties on the part of the developers. A costed schedule of the outstanding items was sent to the devopers and his insurers, in the sum of slightly in excess of £7,000 for completion by the council of the above works. This sum was made available to the Council within the last month. Because of pressure of work on the Council's labour force in this area, it is necessary to obtain quotations from outside contractors for this work. These quotations are at present being sought and the work will commence when acceptable quotations for the different works are received. We hope to have word of the other estates shortly.

In answer to a request by the Cumann for a full time fire officer for Maynooth. We were told by the County Manager that the Fire Brigade Service is a part time service throughout the Country, except in the larger cities. The Council will keep under review the requirements of the fire brigade service having regard to the growth in population. With regards to the removal of the ambulance from Maynooth station, it appears that some difficulty has arisen over insurance, it is hoped to have the matter rectified shortly.

With regards to the Bridge on the Newtown road, we are still asking the Council to provide a footbridge for same. The Minister has requested C.I.E. to inspect this bridge to ensure that it is in a safe condition.

The Cumann hold their meetings on the third Tuesday of each month. New members welcome this includes the youth of Maynooth. Next meeting 19th December at 8.30 p.m.





OUR HERITAGE

In 1836 there were five schools in Maynooth, one large convent national school, one large boys schools, an infant school, a private boys pay school offering a secondary type curriculum, and a small parish school. The Parish School has not been found viable as a national school, presumably because the number of pupils, 10, was too small, and it was hoped to amalgamate it with the large, 65 pupils, boys' school. This attempt, if made, did not succeed and in 1844 the larger boys' school became attached to the National Board as a national school (11th Report of the Commissioners of National Education). The parish school continued on its own and, somewhere between 1836 and 1870 the infant school and the private boys' school disappeared. By that time the convent was running an infant school for both girls and boys, and both private schools no doubt found it difficult to meet the competition of free, or virtually free, state subsidised schools, expecially once the population of Maynooth probably did not provide a substantial demand for second-level education. By 1870 also the original purpose of the National Board had been completely reserved so far as the provision of mixed denominational education was concerned, and it was accepted that most of the schools receiving grants were in practice denominational. The census report of 1871 lists only three schools in Maynooth, the boys' national school with 88 pupils, all Catholic; the convent national school with 162 pupils, all Catholic; and the Parish School with 10 pupils, all Protestant Episcopalian. The relative diversity of school managment and the mixing within schools of both seces and children of different religious denominations had disappeared, with the exception of the co educational parish school, and the co.- educational infant school within the convent. Otherwise a pattern of single-sex, and single-denomination, statesubsidised schools under the control of the local clergy or a religious order had been established. The pattern of primary education has survived into the 20th century and up to the present day with very little change
The recent introduction of boards of management to the national system has broad -ened the base of authority but the schools are still denominational and single-sex. In fact the latter characteristic has absolute in Maynooth since the parish school ended its existence and since the recent transfer of the infant boys classes from the convent to the boys national school

From 1840 the boys' national school was housed in Pound Lane in what had been the Catholic Chapel and what is now the Band Hall When the present Catholic Church was built and opened in 1840 the boys' school moved in to the vacated premises. It stayed there until it moved to a new building on the Moyglare Road in 1943.

In recent years there have been developments in Maynooth outside the primary education area, in the provision of nursery schools, and post-primary education and university education. In the 1960s a wave of change began to shake the Irish education system. An inquiry carried out by the Department of Education and the O.E.C.D. (organization for Economic Co-operation and Development) produced the report INVESTMENT IN EDUCATION

in 1965. This revealed some startling statistics. Nearly one third of the children who attended primary school ended their formal education when they left and did not go on to any form of second level education. Of the two thirds who did go on, only ¼ stayed to take the Leaving Certificate examination, of these only one fifth went on to university. Even more disturbing were the figures which showed that the children from professional and white-collar families, 20% of the working population, gained about 65% of university places while manual workers, about 25% the working population, gained only 2%. Apart from these difference, people in more prosperous, and populated areas had a much better chance because they had access to more schools with better facilities. Vigorous attempts to remedy the inequities that had been revealed followed. These included state monies for free post primary education, free school transport, university grants, and the development of the vocational system, especially towards the establishing of regional Colleges of Technology.

In the meantime Maynooth Boys' National School had begun to provide second level education. This had begun in the early 1960s when the energetic head-master Mr. Frank Walsh organised what was known as a "Secondary top' to a national school. This allowed boys in Maynooth to proceed to take the Intermediate and Leaving Certificate examinations. Understandably the range of subjects was limited, and of course girls still had to travel elsewhere for second level education.

Under the Investment in Education report the Department of Education carried out a survey of available facilities for post-primary education throughout the country. The representatives of the Department considered that Maynooth could support a viable secondary school, but only one and that it would have to be co-educational. This was not acceptable at that time to the Catholic authorities of the Archdiocese of Dublin, and it seemed that Maynooth would be left without any provision for second level education. as the Department proposed to phase out secondary tops. At this stage a group of interested parents came together, formed a committee, and campaigned for a secondary school in Maynooth. The campaign involved Meetings and discussions with various interested parties, including the then Archbishop of Dublin, the then Minister for Education, and the C.E.O. of the Kildare Vocational Educational Committee. The V,E.C. offered to establish a co-educational Post-Primary school in Maynooth, providing second level education up to Leaving Certificate Standard. The Department of Education sanctioned this and the school opened in September 1971. For its first year it occupied the old Charter School premises by kind permission of the Sisters of the Presentation Convent who had recently built a new school building on their grounds Then

in 1972 the post-primary school moved into its new building on the Moyglare Road in MERRY CHRISTMAS






