Editorial

Many of the older residents in the town will be almost amused at our bringing up the question of a road by-passing the town. They will have heard this matter discussed over the past twenty years or thirty, but beyond rumours that the road will pass here, or there, or yonder, they have seen no move from the Authorities in the matter whatsoever, in all that time.

Be this as it may, the matter of traffice through the town has now become a serious problem. Not alone the volumn of traffice but the weight and speed through the town has reached the stage where something serious must be done.

Perhaps people living on the Main Street suffer most from the various aspects of the problem, as they probably suffer all the inconveniences. Noise, is perhaps, the most annoying and those who have not to live with it both day and night cannot fully appreciate this. Perhaps you have tried to carry on a conversation on the Main Street when heavy traffic is passing and which may gibe you some idea of this form of inconvenience. Damage to houses through heavy trucks vibrating walls continuously is another hazard while all townspeople suffer from the sheer volumn of traffic in the daytime and the speed of the traffic during the periods of low volumn. In the daytime the speed of cars and trucks is bad enough but at night it is no exaggeration to say that some vehicles pass through the town at speeds approaching 100 miles per hour.

Speed zones have been set for the whole town but these are more renowned for being broken than kept. Vehicles completely ignore the zebra crossing, although, to be fair, most drivers stop. Unfortunately, however, the pedestrian does not know if a speeding car is going to give way. Children are very vulnerable on the crossings, and very likely to be ignored by motorists. (We might add here that only one pedestrian crossing is not sufficient in the town

The town is approaching complete traffic congestion and it looks as if nothing will be done about it until we protest in a strong manner to the Authorities. We are told that the road which was supposed to by-pass Maynooth is started but work has ceased at the Dublin County Boundary. We are informed rightly or wrongly, that Meath Co. Council are holding up matters on some technicality about payments. If this is the case, it is an absolute disgrace. It is up to us to put pressure on our County Councillors and T.D.s and urge them to have our plight properly aired in the right places.

In the meantime, we feel sure there is something can be done to improve the situation. Better controlled crossings can be erected, perhaps a 'washboard' surface could be put on the roads at each end and through the town to slow traffic to a reasonable pace. Stricter watch could be kept on speed violations and failure to respect the zebra crossings. These things would help but the only real solution is to press for the completion of the by-pass.



While Maynooth Charter School was never included among those in which the worst abuses were disclosed it seems to have been considered to be less than satisfactory by the authorities of the Incorporated Society which maintained the schools. They eventually closed Maynooth School "suppressed" it in their own words. on May 5th 1919 and the house and lands were handed back to the Duke of Leinster. This was Augustus Frederick the 3rd duke and the grandson of Tames the first duke. Just eighteen months before the school was closed down it was inspected again. This time the visit of inspection was organised by the Society itself, which was disturbed by the fact that conditions in its schools had failed to improve even after the publicity given to the findings of the official enquiry. On behalf of the Society the Rev. Elias Thackeray visited Maynooth Charter School on December 12th 1817. He reported no gross abuses but it is clear that he found conditions far from satisfactory. The boys' attainments in reading, spelling, and writing he thought "limited". The bed-rooms were too crowded and the beds and bedding not clean enough. More care, attention and cleanliness were needed in his opinion. Linen was changed only once a week, and he was quick to notice that the judicious use of black stockings allowed of "too infrequent changes". The school had no catechist at the time of his visit. The local Committee which was supposed to supervise the running of the School assured him that things were improving, but it is clear that the Rev .Thackeray was not happy with the over-all situation, and the Society seems to have concurred.

It has already been noted that in 1824, five years after the suppression of the Charter School, nearly half the school-going children in Maynooth attended independent, privately run pay-schools, those conducted by Mary Roe, James Reilly, John McSweeney, and the enigmatic Rev. Andrew Staunton, the very existence of whose school was ignored by the local Church of Ireland vicar. The three private schools run by Catholics catered for both boys and girls, and two of them, and also Staunton's school, had both Catholic and Protestant pupils. Since these schools all charged fees and yet the combined number of children who attended them nearly equalled the numbers attending the free schools supported by the Duke of Leinster and backed by the Catholic Clergy it seems that they must have enjoyed some reputation. We do not know anything of them individually nor how long any one of them had been in existence. Of there nature schools run by an individual in his or her own house were likely to be relatively short-lived. Since the repeal of the penal laws prohibiting Catholic run schools towards in the end of the 18th century private schools had proliferated. But we do know that there had been schools run by Catholics in Maynooth at least as far back as 1731, in spite of the laws forbidding there existence. Defiance of various aspects of the penal legislation led to an Inquiry on the State of Popery in that year, and it noted the existence of "several" popish schools in Maynooth.

As for the quality of the education given in these schools, again we are ignorant of them individually, but there is the evidence given by the English philanthropist, John Howard before the Committee of 1788. He said "At the cabins on the road side I saw several schools, in which, for the payment of 3/3d Irish per quarter, children were instructed in reading, writing and accounts. Some of these I examined as to their proficiency and found them much forwarder than those of the same age in the Charter Schools. They are clean and wholesome, and consisted of the children of both Protestant and Catholic parents".

The somewhat discredited Incorporated Society was followed by others which instead of establishing their own boarding schools, gave financial aid to schools which met their requirements. These included the London Hibernian Society, the Baptist Society, the Association for discountenancing Vice and Promoting the knowledge and practice of the Christian Religion. the Sunday School Society, and the Lord Lieutenants Fund. None of these earnest organisations achieved much success in their endeavour to convert the people of Ireland. The reason for their failure was the refusal of parents to send their children to schools that were suspected of proselytism. In 1815 the state began to give an annual grant to a new organisation for the Education of the Poor, popularly known as the Kildare Place Society. The aim of this society was to maintain non-denominational schools throughout the country, and its board was composed of both Protestants and Catholics. It had a certain amount of success but ran into difficulties as the Catholic Church authorities began to expand the network of schools under their control and the management of the Society became more Protestant dominated. It was this situation that led to the major government enquiry into the shole position of elementary education throughout the country, and then to the decision to establish the "National Schools". But before the National School system was launched in 1831 Maynooth had acquired another school with the arrival of the Presentation Sisters in 1823

FLOWERS AND ART

The "influence of floral arrangement in art" was the subject of a most interesting talk given by antique expert, Mrs. Fegan. Maynooth at the monthly meeting of Kells and District Horticultural Society. She illustrated her talk with numerous and often unusual objects d'art.

Mrs. Fegan pointed out that the Romans used Laurel wreaths to decorate their. coins. This tradition of . using floral arrangements on metal continued down through history to the present time she said.

During the 16th century nutmeg was used to camouflage the smell and taste of meats which were not too fresh. Soon all the tables of the rich had nutmeg graters. The speaker showed a grater

made from silver (about 1730) This was decorated with flowers.

Many people had tiny decorated bottles from the Georgian era which they believed were used as perfume bottles. However Mrs. Fegan claimed that these were used for holding white spirit which ladies of the period used for cleaning off their finger-tips.

Next Mrs. Fegan showed a magnificent gold sewing set made in 1815 decorated with Accanthus leaves. She also showed some items which illustrated how iris decorations became popular after Napoleon and the French invaded Egypt.

She then turned to the subject of floral decorations on fabrics. To illustrate her talk she used silks from India and lace from Carrickmacross, Limerick and Kildare.

She opened the eyes of the membees to the use of flowers in unusual and also most ordinary things around them.

Mrs. Sarah Angel, also from Maynooth, arranged spring flowers in antique vases.

The most original and interesting talk and the floral arrangements were enjoyed by all the members and their friends.

I am indebted to Mrs. E. C. Porter, Balrath Road, Kells, for the above excellent Summary of the talk.
