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Editorial

1979 has been designated as International Year of the Child and, no doubt, we in Ireland should play our part. It is fitting, therefore, that we in Maynooth should do our share.

Why should we have a Childrens' Year? Why all the fuss? Don't we always look after our children? But do we? Children, we are told, are 'the wealth of the nation but we do not always appreciate our wealth and utilize it as we should. All adults do not give children the attention they merit and too many of them are neglected. Children are people and need to be treated as such, deserving our keenest attention. They are the future caretakers of to-morrow's Ireland and it is our duty to see that they are properly trained, spiritually, morally and physically to carry out this task.

We do not intend to deal here only with actual physical or neglect of children, which is abhorrant to any reasonably minded person and which, obviously, must be an important study this Childrens' Year. We must also call to mind the very many children who suffer, to a lesser extent, from mediocre upbringing, lack of appreciative parents and those children of deprived parents, who through no fault of the parent, do not get a reasonable chance in life.

It is only right that adults (parents or not) should use this Year to take stock of their treatment of children. They should consider the problems of the younger generation, try and rectify them, see that children have the means and proper direction to make them good citizens in every way. See that they have proper study facilities (not necessarily at school), facilities for body development and leisure and, most important of all, see that children are given assistance and direction to help themselves. Do not just put your hand in your pocket and hand out a few miserable shillings and feel that you have done your duty - there is far more to helping children.

There are many things we can do here in Maynooth, so organise and try and make this an outstanding year for the younger generation in all respects. Do not wait for the next man to make the first move - go ahead and try and get things moving yourself. What about finishing the SPORTS FIELD for a start and work on from there ? Get going now !

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The Feast of ST. VALENTINE

The name Valentine belonged to several Saints of the early Christian Church but the most likely originator of the Festival as we know it was a third. Century Christian executed for his faith on February 14th 270 a.d.

The story goes that while in prison he restored the sight of his jailors blind daughter whom he had befriended. It is said that on the night before his execution he wrote her a farewell note signing it "From your Valentine"

Among the earliest known Valentine greetings is one by a French nobleman captured at Agincourt and imprisoned in the Tower of London in 1415. His Valentine to his wife can still be seen in the British Museum.

Henry V111 who, with six wives, had more cause than most for sending Valentines, established St. Valentines Day by Royal Charter in 1537.

Queen Victoria herself sent 2,500 printed Valentines during her reign - an average of 40 cards per year!

Perhaps the most elaborate Valentine ever was one sent to Empress Eugenie, widow of Napoleon 11. It is said to have cost £4,500 even in those days and must have been quite a work of art!

OBITUARY

Michael, formerly a men's hairdresser in the Town was deeply interested in all aspects of the area. and worked closely with the various societies and organisations throughout his life time. PUBLIC LIGHTING

In reply to a question by Councillor Boylan, the Co. Secretary agreed to include questions for the Co. Engineer at the next meeting, on the advisability of public lighting from the town to Cluain Aoibhin and also of the advisibility and of extending the Newtown Canal and Railway Bridge for pedestrians.

The Co. Secretary also informed Cllr. Boylan that the design of the Kilmacraddock/Maynooth Water Scheme has been approved and that tenders are being sought for the work for costing.

Cllr. Boylan also made inquiries about the public lighting and sweeping of Leinster Park, which matters are to be investigated.

In addition Cllr. Boylan was informed that the Gardai Authorities are investigating the question of a "Stop" sign at the College.


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ST. MARY'S BAND

EVERYONE WELCOME

PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE ETC.

Cllr. B. Durkin has informed us that the pedestrian bridge over the canal is now ready for delivery on Sunday February 18th. The delay, we understand, was due to industrial action at the suppliers.

All along ClIr. Durkin has been making every effort to have the matter expedited and has made strong representation to ensure that the erectors keep this deadline.

Among other items followed up by Cllr. Durkin is the question of itinerants. In a letter the Council set out its policy as follows:-Firstly to appoint a Social Worker to deal exclusively with itinerants. to try and re-house and integrate regular families, subject to the recommendation of the Co. Medical Officer and Social Worker. Secondly (for transient families) to set up suitable serviced sites as halting places in Naas, Newbridge, Athy, and Maynooth and to acquire land for this purpose.

The Councillor was also informed that the Council will erect a 'Dangerous Bend' sign at Laraghbryan West beside the small group of houses there.

The Secretary also informed the Councillor that there are no funds this year to complete the footpath to Cluain Aoibhin Estate but the matter will be considered with the 1980 estimates. The Secretary also stated that it is hoped to do some work on the Barrogstown - Kilmacradock Road this year.

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The Beginning & The End

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I was nearly inseperable from my rather unglamerous blue cardigan from September to May. During the summer I forsook it for a chic little number with a matching tank top, but as the temperature dropped we were back together again.

It wasn't always out of shape and middleaged. I remember the day my mother bought it for me. It was my first nursing job and one of the requirements was a navy cardigan.

The pockets began to bulge; often filled with hands (mine), large numbers of handies, contraband oranges and even a raw egg, which, only to prove crime doesn't pay broke while in my pocket. I recall I only put the pocket under the tap, without removing the cardigan, student nurses are notoriously lazy when off duty.

By this time it has passed its' prime and was worn exclusively for going to and from work. How ever night duty has a nasty habit of recurring and out into public life it came once more.

Two golden rules of nursing: never run (this does not apply to the pursuit of men) and never wear your cardigan while on the wards. But by the time three years of training are up, the fear of God and Matron have gone out of you and rules are bent completely out of shape. Anyhow who in their right mind would

take off a warm cardigan, in the depths of winter, in the middle of the night just to see if everyone is still breathing? Things got so that in the end I would simply roll up my sleeves and carry on, with result the poor cardigan showed its' age more and more.

It had suffered its' own mishaps Babies had christened it more than once, it's seams had weakened and a moth got it in the back one tropical summer when I neglected it. 8t even suffered abuse from my husband, not surprisingly, when I wore it to bed.

The end was not worthy of the long service; rather grubby but maintaining a brave front, into the washing machine it went. Fifteen minutes later (too late) I realized the water was near boiling.

It is folded carefully away now in my bottom drawer, it deserves something better than the rubbish bin-

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

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
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to the Editor

My dear Friend among the Old Folks of Maynooth,

I am delighted to take this opportunity of writing to you once again for Christmas. For many of my friends it has been such a long time since I wrote to you but then we can only adopt the local attitude of 'Maski' when things get bogged down etc. They would say "Why get in a huff over something"?. That comment reminds me of the headmistress in our local girls Secondary School, who said to me the other day "I'm sure God did'nt make life to be so hectic". However, that is how it is and has been.

I am still working as the parish priest of Boram, the place with the airport, the haspital, the police, the beaches and so much more. In addition to that, I have been working as the Diocesan Health Secretary for the past nine months, a job which has kept me very busy. This job has meant my going to a week long conference in Mount Hagen, running a course for 28 people in our Province for members of the Health Committees, looking after the worries of the 16 nurses or so, from all over the diocese who are working as Catholic nurse's in more remote parts of the bush. These are the places where the government nurses don't like to go. I also gave a recollection to a group of about 40 aid-post orderlies in Timbunkee, on the Sepik. M'y trip there, by mission plane was paid for by the government. The biggest work involved in all this is trying to find new nurses to keep the centres open.

I am happy to say that despite all this work for the "health" of the province, my own health is first class. I am in really good form. D.G. It always remains one of the things about which I can be happy. Many is the time I heard said, "if you have your health then you have everything." Now it means a lot to me.

So what has been happening in Boram during the year. One happiness is to see the Parish Church improving.

A few months ago, a final year student from the Government High School came and painted the back wall of the Church in a nice local design. Since than a crew of workers have started to put in . new windows, so far, 3 out of 12. This work was a big priority due to termites and rotting. This time hard wood is being used for the frames so they should last now for a very long time. Around the gardens too many people from the parish have been involved with making the grounds more beautiful by planting shrubs and flowers etc. So I think that we shall have a nice

place here when someone else comes from Ireland for a holiday here. Did you know that the Provincal of the SVDs in Ireland was here for the reretreats during this year?

Talking about Irish people here, I am's sorry to say that one of my friends in the army recently left for Australia. via Dublin. Their names are Strunks. The Missus is from Glasnevin area, where her mother has still got a little store. Her maiden name was Kit Whelan and she too worked in the Bank of Ireland. I expect that they are going to pay a visit to my home while they are home so that will give me a lot of pleasure. Next year or the year after another good friend is going to Ireland. She is Sr. Anne Francis O'Carroll, Wexford, and a Mercy nun here. She is going to go to Maynooth for the course in Mission Studies.

The other night we had the graduation of 121 teachers from our Catholic Teachers Training College. A good night!

Well here we are again coming to another Christmas. As always it is full of excitement and anticipation. Needless to say the work in the Parish is also building up. I am hoping that one of the highlights this year will be our Carol Service which I hope the "Choir" of the parish will hold in three different places, I must say the "choir" is not great by any means but the fun of participating has been good. On the Friday before Christmas, we are hoping for another "first" here. That will be a party for the very sick people in house sik, that should read hospital. This will be prepared for them by the members of the parish. During the evening we will probably show some slides of Pope John Paul 11, sing and eat. Let us hope it tums out good. Christmas will be a busy time as usual with all the various functions.

Tomorrow, I will have two groups in regeiving their First Communion in

two different places. On the 22nd December I will have a wedding. Last night I had a mass of farewell for the Sisters of Mercy in Yarapos, the girls secondary school. Several of them are going into different works now. One is in fact going from teaching into pastoral work.

Here, today, the sun is shining. But it has not been for a few days. Our rainy season is back again. Man I have seen some rain now which literally came in buckets. The other day I was out in one such shower cutting the big six feet high pitpit grass and other stuff right through such a downpour. It was nice. No need to worry about sunburn then.

How are things with you? Are you keeping well? I guess that you are getting ready for Christmas in your own way, with cooking and baking and shopping.


Here now in PNG the children in all the schools will be going on their summer holidays this week. will give us a bit of a break too. With the holidays there is always the increase in the unemployed school leavers too. This is a dreadful problem. Can you imagine this situation. If there are wr pupils in a class, nine can go on to high school for two or three or four years. Of this nine six must be boys and only three girls. After two years in high school the numbers will be weeded down again and the weak will have to leave.

In February, our provincial government hopes to have it's first elections to the Provincial Assembly of the East Sepik Province. For the past two years we have had an interim government.

Well dear friends, I will now say good bye for the present. All the best to you this Christmas feast. My wish is that it will be a spiritual occasion in your family. That is what can bring us together as we wish. All the best for you in 1979.


While there is no doubt in our minds now that the children of the town understand the subject of keeping our town tidy it would be wonderful if these children will now put their knowledge into practice and help to keep our town tidy. We are not saying for one moment that children are the worst offenders, (from observation we would say they are not) but if all children put their litter in the bins, perhaps they might then shame our untidy adults into doing their share also.

ACRYLIN: Might we again raise our voices about the passage of dangerous chemicals, etc. through our town or any other town for that matter. It is a subject that is receiving quite a bit more notice lately, and since the unfortunate Whiddy Disaster there has been alot of re-thinking on the question of transporting these items.

We mentioned acrylin some time ago in these columns and this is not the only dangerous substance passing through. Petrol - gas- explosives, to name but a few pass through here on a regular basis, often in heavy lorries and tankers moving at an excessive speed. Excessive for the open road let alone for passing through a town. There seems to be little or no legislation to conver the safety factor in transporting such items and the vehicles carrying them are not always clearly identifiable.

In so far as the 'common' man is concerned it is not possible to get any proper assurance that these items are safely stowed and, in the event of an accident, in, say the middle of the town, it is quite possible that the whole village could be wiped out. Remember, the Whiddy Island set up was supposed to be safe until it was blown apart. Do we have to wait for the same sort of thing before we know that we are safe?

It is up to us to raise our voices and see that our politicians press for a proper safeguard to be introduced without delay. See your local representative and put the matter to him. Demand that he brings the matter to the Dail quickly whether he is in government or not.

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MAYNOOTH FINE GAEL

The monthly meeting of the Branch was held in the Geraldine Hall and among the large attendance was deputy Mark Clinton and Councillor Bernard Durkan. The Secretary reported a considerable increase in membership and the Chairman Mr. W. Coonan extended a warm welcome to all members old and new.

The recently removal on food subsidies was vigorously condemned, as the chief victims of such rathless treatment were the old, the poor and the parents of families, who have to provide such necessities from an income which is already overburdened.

Mr. Clinton mentioned that he had lodged a strong protest about the recent increase of 21/4% on mortaged repayments. Originally the Government tried to justify the increase by stating it was necessary to prevent a rush of Capitol out of the country to benefit from the increase in English Bank Rates. However, since the restrictions on the movement of money had been imposed the reason given for the 21/2% increase was no longer valid.

Mr. Clinton believed it was the duty of the Government to immediately instruct the Building Socities to reduce their interest rates by at least that amount. Deputy Clintons remarks were loudly applauded as the amount of money paid by householders in the Maynooth area each year to already wealthy Building Societies must be Colossal.

Road widening at Blakestown --As soon as the necessary finance is made available by the Department the road improvements, will be continued.

Public Lighting --

The first phase of public Lighting in Maynooth is well advanced and should be completed within two months.

Carton Court -Two public lights to be erected at
this location.
Cluain Aoibhinn -Every possible pressure is being
exerted on the Developer to have
this estate completed.

Picnic area at Blacklion -It is hoped that funds will be available in the current year to complete this project.

Rail Park Estate -The Roadstone strike followed by
the very inclement weather prevented the Council area Staff from
completing the landscaping. Every
effort will be made to proceed rapidly with the work and on completion the estate will be taken in
charge.

Telephone Kiosk At Ladychapel --The Council is at present examining the site proposed by the Department of Post and Telegraphs.



As one of the many students who live half the year in Maynooth, 8 feel I have been able to observe the community here through the eyes of an outsider. The people here are both friendly and helpful, but what is more important, the fact that Maynooth has branches both of Care of the Elderly and Kare amongst others, illustrates the willingness of the people to show responsibility towards others, and an anxiousness to give a little of themselves in return for what they receive.

However, I have noticed that there is one area where the people have overlooked the chance to share with their fellow men and that is in the Sacrament of the Mass. I have attended Mass here on a few occassions and it is hard not to notice both the lack of response and further the fact that so many people leave Mass as Communion begins. To me this is a great pity because this is the one hour on a Sunday where we have an opportunity to crown all our good actions of the week through prayer, gain strength to carry us through our difficulties and most important

of all come together as a Community and share in the Sacrifice of the Mass, yet all of this is lost through what appears to be apathy. It is sad also, in the fact that it is this example upon which our Younger Generation must base their attitudes, seeing their elders as their Guides

I think that in both of these areas lack of response and early departure from the service are not intentional but merely a justification of the plea that people get nothing out of Mass and I feel that people should assess fully in their own minds firstly, what God means to them in the everyday life and secondly how they can relate this to their worship at Mass and to their motives for attending the service.

Finally I believe that if we allow God to enter every aspect of our lives then our communial Mass on Sunday will be our opportunity to adore God and also to thank him for our success during the week.

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

My dear friends everywhere,

Greetings to you all in the Lord Jesus Christ. Each year I have tried to contact you all at this time of year. Letter writing is not & never has been my strong point and maybe some of you will find this effort very impersonal. But please see it as an effort on my part to thank you all and to let you know that I am thinking of you and praying for you at Christmas. In this short letter, I would like to give you a very short report on the work you are all helping me to do. out here with your prayers and material help.

If you glance at a map of Pakistan you'll probably find two important cities marked; one in the north of the country, Rawalpindi, and one in the centre, Lahore. Both are historical cities but especially Lahore. n between these two cities, in a good map of Pakistan, you'll discover Sargodha. It is an agricultural city, a centre for the many, many farmers in the area around. We have 15,000 Catholics in this area. Some live in the city itself and the others scattered around in communities in the various villages. Since the people live a good distance from the main Church and form their own communities, we have to visit them often and administer the Sacraments. So that the pastoral work in our parish involves a lot of travelling. The parish is an old one. It was established by the Capuchins of the Diocese of Lahore and taken over in 1939 by the Diocese of Rawalpindi, then manned by the Mill Hill Fathers. Af present I am the parishpriest. My assistant is a Pakistani, Fr. Younas Azad. Father John Taylor helps out in the parish on week-ends. He is working in the Hostel for boys we have here attached to our technical School. He is a Mill Hill Father from England. On an ordinary Sunday we have seven Masses in different places. From September until April Father Younas and myself are constantly on the dusty

and bad roads touring the various villages, saying Mass and administring the Sacraments and also helping people to tackle their problems.

To give your an idea of the kind of activities we are involved in here let me tell you about some of our projects. At the main Church here in Sargodha we have a large Church Our house is just beside the Church. 8n the same compound there is a technical school for boys. There are two hundred boys in this school. The school is managed by us. A Mill Hill Brother is the chief technician and he is assisted by a staff of Pakistani technicians, mostly old students of the school.

One hundred and ten boys stay in the hostel attached to the school. These are all Christian boys. The school has a great record. Most of the boys get work quickly after they have passed out. Since the majority are Christians, we aim at building up the Christian Community and in this way help in the development of Pakistan.

Right next door to us and the Church we have the Presentation Sisters. They have two schools for girls. They also have a boarding school for girls who live in the far oif villages and who otherwise would not have a chance of education. The Sisters also help out in Pastoral work. They organise catechism in various places and in the Government school for boys, which is also next door to us. This school was begun by us but was nationalised in 1972 and is now Government property. A group of German Sisters have a hospital just up the road from us. They run an execellent place and cater for many of the maternity cases of the area, especially the difficult ones.

Outside the main Church area, we have, as I say, many small communities living in villages and specially areas in the city which are called 'bastis'. In 13 of these we have a

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small Church or community centre. We build some of these with help from collections made by my dear friend Gerry MacTiernan and helpers in Maynooth. Also, The Little Way Association, London help us. In five of these centres we have small preparatory schools. Children who would not have gone to school at all, through our small schools, get used to the idea of school. Then we have an adult Literacy programme and some of the classes are held in the small community centres. This project has had some success. We have had the pleasure of seeing people learn to read and write and thus become freer and better human beings.

The 'Basti' Churches and small village churches have had the effect of getting the people closer together; becoming aware of their community and working together. And so we are trying to build more and more of these small churches. We try to get the people to contribute as much as they can and seek help elsewhere to complete the job. At present we are trying to build such a church in a place called Bhalwal, 30 miles from Sargodha. We need £2000 to complete the job. So, if you have a few pence left over after Christmas please put it in my name in the Allied Bank Ltd., Maynooth. I can get the money out through the bank. In this way you will be helping the people in Bhalwal to become better people and a better Christian Community. You can drop me a line telling me about your donation, if you like.

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We also have five Conferences of St. Vincent de Paul Society very active in the parish. The members are poor themselves but by working together and planning they have been able to help people poorer than themselves. Also they have started a Fair Price shop and a couple of tailoring centres for boys. Through the latter they have helped boys to find work and to start a new way of life. The conferences also act as a Parish Council, taking part in the organising of parish functions with great success.

These are some of the many things that we do here in Sargodha. It is a very active place and the Church is really alive here. A lot of the work I do is done with your help. I am extremely grateful for all you have done and for all your prayers. Please remember Sargodha this Christmas. Please pray for us all here. I will not forget you in my humble prayers. May God Bless you all and may the Light of Christ be re-kindled in all your hearts and in your lives this Christmas.

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



Lucan Slim Fit

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Editorial

Taxation at the present moment is a very emotive word (almost a dirty word) and doubtless there is a lot of reason for it. We have seen the Government put on a tax and then, on agitation, withdrawing it. We have also seen an enormous demonstration by P.A.Y.E. workers to draw attention to this side of the question. As to who is right or wrong we do not intend to adjudicate. Money must be found to run the country or else, like any household lacking funds. it will fall apart.

The real question to be answered is - Who is to pay the Taxes and in what proportion? Of course, we all feel we are victimized as far as the taxman is concerned and this is only human nature. We should, however, only be asked to pay our just share and the important words here are 'just share'. Certainly the P.A.Y.E. worker, who has not additional source of income and this covers most workers in this category, is more than paying his 'just share'. While some self employed people and workers doing 'nixers' are getting away wholesale with tax evasion. This only increases the burden on those who are honest with their tax returns or who just cannot escape the net.

That tax evasion is rampant among those who have the opportunity is no secret and is distressing to those who have to pay. It is well known that if all paid their full taxes, it would mean a substantial reduction all round. There is certainly a serious injustice to ones neighbour and a suitable remedy will have to be found rapidly if there is not to be quite a deal of chaos in industry or a general refusal to pay tax.

It is not sufficient to say that at some future time steps will be taken to rectify matters. After all, one section of the community got an almost instant reply to their agitation and why not the rest. Unfortunately, the P.A.Y.E. worker is easy meat and there is no trouble in collecting from him (or her of course). To the taxman it is 'easy pickings' and, like the rest of us he (the taxman) takes the least line of resistance. It is now on the cards that something has to be done to ease the situation and the operative word is OWICKLY.

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OUR HERITAGE

Mary Cullen

Maynooth Post Primary School is an example of modern trends in education It is run by the County Kildare Vocational Education Committee, but the education it aims to provide marks a development far beyond the original purpose intended for such schools. These schools originated with the Vocational Education Act of 1930, and were then seen as one half of a split-level system of intermediate education. One level was the secondary school, feepaying and privately owned, most often by a religious order, but with increasing financial support from the government. The secondary school provided an almost exclusively academic education. The Vocational Education Act provided for the other level, free publicly owned schools providing a quite different type of education. Under the Act Vocational Education Committees were appointed by the County Council or the Corporation, the local rating authority. Money came from local rates and government subvention. The committees were to provide both "continuation" and "technical" education. "Continuation" education was to continue the education begun in primary school and prepare pupils for jobs. The emphasis in Vocational Schools was on practical skills, commercial courses, domestic economy, woodwork, and metalwork, mathematics and mathematical drawing, with Irish and English also included. A network of schools all over the Country emerged supplying this kind of education. A much more limited network provided "technical" education, which trained students for specific trades and professions.

Since 1930 educational thinking has come to question the whole idea of a split-level educational system. It has been argued that all young people need to learn practical and manual skills as well as academic subjects, and that a well rounded education should provide both. It . has also been argued that to channel children into such different systems as soon as they leave primary school is to virtually close off any possibility of choice or personal decision on the part of the child and is socially derisive. Recent years have seen a tendency for secondary and vocational schools, instead of continuing to run forever on parallel lines, to begin to converge. Some secondary schools are broadening their academically oriented curriculum to include manual skills, while vocational schools are broadening their curriculum to include a wider range of academic subjects. Maynooth Post-Primary School is one of the leaders in this trend. Its pupils have available to them a range of subjects, including the tradional vocational school metal work, woodwork, technical drawing, commercial courses, domestic economy, and also a wide range of academic subjects including mathematics, languages, history & geography, and science subjects, all of which can be taken to Honours Leaving Certificate standard. The school has a big advantage in that it is the only post-primary school in the town and so has the opportunity and incentive to cater for pupils aiming at a wide variety of jobs and careers. This in itself is an educational experience for the pupils and allows a broadening of horizons and new possibilities of choice and development. When we add to this the fact that the vast majority of young people in Maynooth taking part in second-level education attend the Maynooth Post Primary School, the result is a school that can be in a real sense of the word a "Community" school.

Another community aspect of the vocational education system is the provision of educational facilities for anyone who wants to learn more about anything. If a required minimum number of people ask for instruction in any particular subject it will be provided. This allows people to fill in gaps in the education they have already received, to take examinations such as the Intermediate and Leaving Certificates, or to branch out simply for pleasure, into totally new areas. Maynooth Post-Primary School runs a wide range of evening classes, and another complementary range is provided by St. Patrick's College.

This bring us to a unique part of our heritage. Maynooth is the only town of its size in Ireland to offer primary, post-primary and university education, plus the national seminary for the education of priests for the Irish Dioceses. St. Patrick's College was founded in 1795. For two hundred years, since the end of the sixteenth century to the end of the eighteenth, Irish Catholic Clergy had been educated on the continent in the great Irish Colleges, in

This was because their education in Ireland was forbidden by law. By the end of the eighteenth century the situation was changing. The penal laws were incompatible with the critical rationalism of enlightment thought, and they were gradually relaxed. The French Revolution closed Clerical Colleges and comfiscated their property, and anyway the Irish Catholic Bishops feared the effect of revolutionary France on Irish Clerical Students.

The Irish bishops met in December 1793 and prepared a memorial which the Archbishop of Dublin, Dr. Troy, presented to the Lord Lieutenant in January 1794. It stressed the constant loyalty and good affection to the government displayed by the Catholic hierarchy, their fears that Catholic Students sent abroad might be "contaminated by the contagion of sedition and infidelity" as well as their view that the existing Irish University, the University of Dublin with its one college, Trinity College, would not be suitable for the education of Irish priests, and asked for the King's permission "for the endowment of academies or seminaries for educating and preparing young persons to discharge the duties of Roman Catholic Clergymen in this Kingdom, under ecclesiastical superiors of their own communion".

The bishops original idea was to establish four seminaries one in each province. As the memorial suggests their first thoughts also concerned only the education of priests, but they extended this to include laymen on the advice of Edmund Burke, the Dublin born lawyer who had become one of the best known figures in the English debate on the corruption of political life and the balance of power between crown and parliament. Burke also advised the bishops to avoid any connection with Trinity College and not to accept any control by the State over the running of their college. Others disagreed with these proposals and thought that the unity of Irish People of different religious denominations would be better served by a system whereby Catholics and Protestents were educated together. Henry Grattan took this view and so did the United Irishmen and some Catholics. Grattan presented a petition,, signed by many Catholics, opposing the scheme on these grounds. In spite of the petition the Scheme went ahead and received Statutory Sanction in an Act of the Irish Parliament of 1795, entitled "An Act for the Better Education of Persons professing the Popish or Roman Catholic Religion"

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

Editorial

"Aimless living spills over into violence" - A heading in the Irish Independent on Easter Monday and there is a lot more in this heading than appears at first glance. Indeed, when fully considered, it could be said to sum up a large portion of the ills of the present day with special emphasis on youth. Aimlessness leads to boredom and selfishness and so to violence in its many forms.

Violence need not necessarily be physical and probably its commonest form, and, to some extent its worst, is calousness or lack of consideration for ones neighbours. It is very apparent in young people today but not necessarily confined to the young as it is quite apparent and all the more reprehensible, in many of the not so young. Selfishness is quite apparent in all walks of life and can only be remedied by a little self-giving by all, By self giving we do not mean the odd shilling or two given in charity to offset the prick of conscience when we are spending the pound or two in the bar at night No, what is needed is actual physical self-giving which leads to interest in ones neighbour, ones community and, ultimately, ones country.

Everybody's self-giving need not necessarily take the same form, indeed it would not be for the best if it was. Some can fulfill themselves in helping the elderly, in visiting the housebound, in helping the needy, whilst others might prefer something physical such as community work through the Community Council, through some of the local clubs, associations, or organisations. The important thing is that they would give their assistance and skills to the betterment of the community as a whole regularly (and regularly is the important word).

The important thing is that everybody should devote some time (not just money) although this too can sometimes be important, to serving the community they live in. This is just as important to the spirit of the community as excercise is to the physical health of the individual Just as good health cannot be maintained without exercise, a spiritually strong community cannot be had without involvement - regular involvement by all members of the community-Make it a point therefore of involving yourself fully in your community whether it be in a football club, the Band, Community Council or anything else as long as it keeps you regularly involved.

A friend recently asked me only half joking 'well what are you go-ing to do with the rest of your life?" Without even considering the more serious side of the question, I was almost stunned to realize I was nearing that nebulous almost mystical stage of my life -- middle age. Having you noticed how there is often an almost imperceptable pause and furtive glance to one side when those, dare I suggest, condeming words are nearly whispered "she's ...well ... middle aged."

When I was 17 I honestly didn't consider there was life after thirty but here I am teethering on the brink of what appeared from a distance a virtual abyss of staid conservatism. Thirty is, they say, prime time. "They" are obviously over forty and looking back over their shoulders to when they could run upstairs without puffing and still get into size 12 without taking a deep breath, and that's all a myth, you puff at thirty too.

Now I'm here it isn't too bad, after all I didn't break any records getting thus far, I just waited around and here I am, simple enough. Well maybe not so simple with today's traffic you have to work hard to reach thirty.

Thirty is of course a very psycological age. Twentynine is still the media man's image but CLANG. overnight, finished. For example how many of the heriones in popular pulp fiction (you know the books you enjoy but are afraid to admit) are over twenty let alone thirty?

Over thirties are reserved for the more serious side of the literary scene but there they are either the seductive villiness or a hardened career woman who wouldn't thank you even if she did get the hero in the end, not that she ever does.

I think I've gotten used to being thirty, well you have to don't you. All I ask is that you be gentle with women who look you in the eye and say "I'm thirty today" think of what it all means and say "you don't look a day over twenty nine" My resident cynic reminded me that although I was thirty I was in my

All lives were lost in the holocaust which I shall always remember. I overheard the firemen talking among themselves later about how they would have been in time to save the family if they had not been called out on the previous call which turned out to be a "BOGUS CALL". I departed the scene then because I knew I was about to be sick. You see, I had put through that "Bogus Call" twenty minutes earlier.

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NOTES FROM CLLR. **BERNARD DURKAN**

1) Motion tabled by Cllr. Bernard Durkan at a recent meeting of Kildare County Council.: -

that 'this Council would consider the recreational amenity's available within the County having regard to the population increase envisaged in the Co. Development plan ' -Proposing the motion Cllr. Durkan stated that he was responding to repeated representations from voluntary groups in the North Kildare area and in particular the newly developed areas, requesting additional active recreational facilities and he pressed the need for urgent action in the matter.

In response to the motion the County Architect submitted a Preliminary Report on recreational needs of each town and village. - In the case of Maynooth the report states that 21.5 acres would be required to meet the mimium active recreational needs by 1982. Cllr. Durkan congratulated the Co. Architect and his staff for the production of such a comprehensive report, but stated that "While the needs were identified not enough was being done to

remedy the situation and he suggested that perhaps an increase in the levy paid by developers could be channelled in this direction" In any event unless something definite is done in this regard in the near future increasing land prices will make it impossible to provide these facilities in later years when the population and the requirements will be much greater.

Motion tabled by Cllr. Bernard Durkan at Kildare Co. Council.

2) That this Council would consider the potential of the Royal Canal as an amenity and tourist attraction.

Cllr. Durkan stated that while tremendous work was being done by voluntary groups including the Royal Canal Amenity group to re-open the Royal Canal as an amenity he felt that such groups were not getting sufficient official support and he suggested that the County Council - C.I.E. - and the Department of Environment get together in order to discuss what arrangement might be made to develope the "ROYAL" to the same extent as the Grand Canal.

This was unanamously adopted by the Council.

3) Speaking on his Motion "that this Council would again approach C.I.E. with a view to providing a suburban, Rail passenger service to Maynooth and other major towns in North Kildare.

Cllr. Bernard Durkan stated that he had raised this matter on numerous occasions and that it was ridiculous that while almost 20,000 vehicles per day passed by road through towns like Maynooth a possible alternative transport system was not being utilised. He suggested that at comparatively little cost on a temporary basis two trains (one at peak time in the morning and one in the evening, could stop at Maynooth, Kilcock & Leixlip to facilitate commuters and if the response from

the public was sufficient a permanant service should be established"

It was agreed that the Area Rail Passenger Manager, of C.I.E. would be invited to the next meeting of the Co. Council to discuss the matter further.



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PLAYGROUP

With Community Week in the offing and 1797 being 'The Year of the Child' it might be a good time to draw attention to the existence of the Maynooth Community Playgroup, I am Carmel Hogan and I am one of the playleaders.

The need for a Community Playgroup was evident to many mothers and a group of about fourteen came together to form a founding committee. The Playgroup opened in September 1977 and with the help of Bazaar, some cake sales, lots of hard work and most of all the generosity of parents, friends, neighbours, the Development Association and the Community Council, we acquired a good selection of toys games, and equipment.

Both children and parents thoroughly enjoyed the first year. We had two sessions running each day, one for todd ers with their mums and one for those over three, The Geraldine Hall became our 'School' three mornings a week, and Mrs. Delaneys Bus added greatly to the pleasure of the journey there and back. Our numbers averaged seventeen in the senior session and the toddler's numbered varied with the weather. In July 78 quite a few of the children went to the big school. We were sorry to say goodbye, but felt that we had helped to make that important step a little easier.

Our books were open again in September and we had a wonderful start with about thirty children applying to join. Then, I think, Lady Luck looked the other way. I got sick and was unavailable up to Christmas. Mrs. Delaney

had to go into hospital and so we had no bus. Our storage wardrobe was forced open and some of our favourite toys stolen. The grain which we had used instead of sand was attracting mice and being soiled by cigarette butts, chewing gum etc, and was no longer an attractive prospect. After Christmas we whipped up all our enthusiasm and determination, made arrangements to reopen a week after the schools and yet again our best efforts were foiled, this time by the burst pipes and no heating in the hall.

By then we were all feeling very dispondent and had almost decided to throw in the towel, so we called a meeting to decide our fate. When we saw what a terrific overhaul the Geraldine Hall had been given, the clouds began to show their silver lining. Now if our bad luck has finished, we hope to reopen after the Easter holidays. We hope to see all our old friends again. We would be very grateful for donations of a four leaved clovers, and lets hope we will fare better in the future than we in the recent past. Carmel Hogan

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YOU MIGHT AS WELL KNOW

F.I. Atlux

- 1) That the Amenity Grant for Kildare County Council for the present year is £74,000 and that the proposed expenditure includes work on Maynooth Park.
- 2) That the total Roads Grant for Kildare County is £1,733,000 and all Maynooth will see of that is £3,000 for the provision of car parking.
- 3) That a plan has been prepared for Pound Lane, Maynooth to allow for nine parking places along the frontage and that it has been forwarded to the County Engineer.
- 4) That the Department of the Environment has given the County Council an extra grant of £80.000 for important maintenance works on the national route network in the county and on major roads in the urban areas having a high employment content, and that Kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip are likely to get £24,000 of that sum.
- 5) That an improvement grant of £32,000 has been allocated to the Maynooth/Leixlip road at Blakestown.
- 6) That the Department of the Environment notified the Kildare County Council during 1978, that consider-

ation for capital finance for the construction of one new Swimming Pool in Kildare County would be given and the County Council submitted a proposal for a pool in Kildare Town. To date that loan application has not been sanctioned by the Department. While the Department is aware that a pool is proposed for Maynooth pending the release of finances for the Kildare Pool further progress towards providing a pool for Maynooth can not be made. But the outlook for your great-grand children is comparatively good.

- 7) That there is only one optahlmist for County Kildare sppointed by Eastern Health Board while one-hundred-and-fifteen full time and a number of part time psychiatrists are employed in the Health Board area. It may be a consolation to you to know that it is a lot easier for you to have your head examined than your eyes. Congratulations to Dr. William Cowhey for drawing attention to this ridiculous situation.
- 8) That work has commenced on the new Health Centre at Maynooth at a cost of one quarter of a million pounds.
- 9) That the County Engineer says that as there is quite an amount of building work going on in the area there is no point at present in repairing the road or reconstructing the paths at the Newtown end of Greenfield Road, Maynooth.

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- 10) That a resolution has been passed by the Association of Vocational Education Colleges that a Regional Technical College be set up in Nth. Kildare and run in co-operation with St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. The resolution was proposed by the County Kildare V.E.C.
- 11) And finally, that some individual is seeking planning permission to change the use of out-offices to include shops and offices at Main Street, Maynooth, Co. Kildare.

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REGIONAL TECHNICAL COLLEGE FOR MAYNOOTH?

Kildare VEC is to press for the setting up of a regional technical college - or colleges - at the annual congress of the association of Vocational Educational Colleges at the end of March. A resolution to be put before their congress was moved at the Committee's February meeting by Mr. John Colgan of Leixlip.

Mr. Colgan told the meeting that with the development of Kildare North of Naas and particularly in the Kilcock - Maynooth-Celbridge - Leixlip area there was a good case for a RTC to serve that area and perhaps south Meath & west Co. Dublin. He said that Co. Dublin VEC had forecast some 600 to 800 students seeking third-level education in that region by 1981 who might be served by such a college.

Speaking afterwards Mr. Colgan said that he envisaged such a college complementing the role of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, possibly sharing staff and some resources and being located fairly near to the Maynooth College. He said that Carlow Regional Technical College which served Carlow and South Kildare attracted most of its students from within five mile radius of the college. Meetings of Community Councils from Finglas in a ring around to Clondalkin last year had earlier felt, on the basis of rough school figures, that such a College for this area was a practical proposition. They had found favour with a possible location at Luttrelstown, near Lucan.

The act passed by the Irish Parliament in 1795, "An act for the Better Education of Persons professing the Popish or Roman Catholic Religion", gave power to Trustees to do something that was until then illegal, that is to establish, endow and maintain a seminary or college for the education of Catholics. The Trustees were to make all appointments, rules and statutes, and were to act as visitors. The act named twenty one Trustees. These included the heads of the four chief courts in Dublin, Chancery Exchequer, King's Bench and Common Pleas, and so included the Lord Chancellor - John Fitzgibbon, Lord Clare. The four Catholic archbishops and six other bishops, the president-elect of the college, Dr. Hussey, and six Catholic laymen were also named as Trustees. The first four Trustees were appointed in virtue of their office and these were dropped in 1800, so that the Trustees numbered seventeen from then on. £8000 was provided for the first year and was then continued as a yearly grant.

The first task of the Trustees was to find a location for their new establishment. Dr. O'Fiaich tells the story through a sequence of advertisements and reports in the newspaper the DUBLIN EVENING PRESS. The issue of 25 June carried this notice:

"Wanted in the vicinity of Dublin a large building with some acres of ground, for the esta blishment of the Roman Catholic College, lately endowed by Act of Parliament. Proposals in writing will be received by the most Rev. Dr. Troy, Richard Strange Esq. Eccles Street and the Rev. Dr. Hussey, No 12, Ushers-quay.

On 2nd July the Dublin Evening Press commented on progress :-

"The trustees of the Catholic College have not yet been accomodated with a situation to their liking for the establishment of their Seminary. Several situations have been mentioned for their choice, and amongst them Stillorgan house and demesne - the house of Mr. Mitchell near Glassnaeven - the house and concerns of the late Judge Helen at Mespill bank, corner of Donnybrook road. Their object is a situation so contiguous to town as to facilitate the accomodation of day students of the laity"

On 30th July the final decision was reported.

We can assure the public from undoubted authority that the Catholic Committee have taken Mr. Stoyte's elegant house at Maynooth, with the castle, for a seminary for their Clergy"

The choice of Maynooth is interesting since it appears that the first intention of the Trustees was to set up the College in Dublin. One later suggestion was that a location away from the distractions of Dublin may have on reflection seemed "more favourable to the morals and studies of the House". But it seems generally agreed that the Duke of Leinster made an offer of his property on terms so favourable that the Trustees found them hard to refuse. The rent he asked for the leese was £72 (Irish) a year, and this was agreed to be substantially below its current market value. It seems that William Robert, 2nd duke of Leinster, was determined to have the new College located in Maynooth if at all possible. This enthusiasm fits well with what we know of him and his father the 1st Duke. The earls of Kildare had returned to live at Maynooth, in Carton, in 1739, and since then had been actively involved in partriot politics which led to the achievement of a relatively Independent Irish Parliament, "Grattan's Parliament", in 1782, had supported liberal policies generally including Catholic emancipation, and had worked hard at developing and beautifying both Carton and the village of Maynooth. Since

1750 a programme of rebuilding in Maynooth had been undertaken, and by 1795 the nucleus of the town as it still is had been created, the wide main street, fronted by two-storied, slated dwelling houses and the symmetrically laid out street of smaller houses behind them. It was the second duke also who was generally regarded as being responsible for the bringing of the Royal Canal to Maynooth. The originally planned route would not have passed close to the town but a loop detour to the south was incorporated to satisfy the Duke, who was one of the original shareholders in the Company. This detour involved enormous additional cost as it required the building of the Ryewater Aqueduct, the huge embankment near Leixlip by Louisa Bridge, to carry the canal over the river. The added prestige of the new College, and no doubt the hope that its presence would stimulate industrial development, attracted the second duke as part of a programme to build up his estate village.

The house offered to the Trustees had been recently built by John Stoyte, the steward of the Leinsters, who leased it and the land around it from the duke. The Trustees actually leased a holding of just over 58 acres which included both the house and the old Fitzgerald Castle. The land on which the castle stood was returned to the third Duke in 1820. Once the location was decided events moved quickly. Appointments were made and the College opened for business on 1st. October 1795 with four professors and about forty students. As many more students were expected. The Trustees at once looked for tenders for additional buildings. The plane and estimates of the architect Michael Stapleton were accepted and the first new buildings, the extensions on both sides of Stoyte House which can be seen directly facing you as you enter the main gates, were erected over the years 1797 - '99. The Lord Lieutenant, Lord Camden, came from Dublin to lay the foundation stone on 20th April 1796. He was received with due solemnity by the authorities, and also with great enthusiasm by the students who, Dr. Healy says, met the vice-regal party outside the town and escorted it "in procession through the streets, marching to the music of their band towards the College gates". Not only this, but the Lord-Lieutenant was also entertained by Odes in Greek and Latin composed by professors and recited by students. The foundation stone was duly laid but its exact where-abouts have never since been discovered.

Under the Public Health (Ireland) Act of 1878 as amended, a Sanitary Authority may make charges for water supplied by them, but an Urban Sanitary Authority shall not make a charge for a supply for domestic purposes supplied within their district except to business premises and certain specified institutions.

In other words, because you and I live in Maynooth, which is not an urban area, we must pay for our water while those who live fourteen miles away in city or town are exempt from any such charge.

This is obviously blatant descrimination.

I have been given the argument that the charge is so small in relation to the service rendered that nobody but a crank would worry to raise the matter.

Well and good! And if the water rent were a stable charge there could even be some merit in that contention, despite the descrimination against non-urban dwellers but it is not a stable charge. Unlike your Ground Rent - which A.C. R.A. is so strenuously fighting - which cannot be increased there is no limit to what you may be charged for your domestic water.

Kildare County Council, as Sanitary Authority, empowered to fix charges by section 7 of the Local Government (Sanitary Services) Act of 1962 has increased your water rent for the year ending December 1978 by one hundred per cent:-

Perfectly legal! The only way they needed to tell you that they intended to do so was by an insertion in any two newspapers circulating in their area. Did they pick the National Dailies? Not on your life! You might see it there and be warned!

The charge made by a Sanitary Authority may be fixed from time to time by any one of the following methods:

- 1) The quantity of water supplied
- 2) The rateable valuation of the premises supplied.
- 3) The purpose for which the water is required.
- 4) The description of the premises supplied.
- 5) Any other matter which the sanitary authority consider suitable

AND -- Wait for it !

may be fixed either without or subject to any maximum or minimum limit.

KILDARE COUNTY COUNCIL opted for method 2 above and the schedule of charges for water consumed on a domestic basis was as follows for the year ending December 1977.-

Rateable Valuation less than £5

Presumably, therefore, while the Rateable Valuation would not have altered for 1978 the relevant charges would all have been doubled, except possibly in the case of those households paying 12½%. That I would not know as I do not subscribe to either of the provincial

weeklies in which the Council so widely promolgate their notices of such matters.

Having given all I know of the ways and means of this inequitable charge let me sow in your mind the thought that has sprouted in mine. Will the water rent for 1979 be increased again by one hundred per cent or more and so, from year to year, until the Kildare County Council recovers from non-urban householders the equivalent of the monies lost to them by the abolition of rates?

Perhaps one of our Residents' Assoc. would approach A.C.R.A. and draw attention to this discriminative charge,

Better still, why not attend every local meeting of each of the Political Parties and inform the candidates that your votes in the Local Government Election will go only to those

who will have the Council abandon this unjust and out-dated imposition.

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Text from Speech made by Gerard Brady at recent Maynooth Fianna Fail Cumann

WHAT FIANNA FAIL GOVERNMENT has done on P.A.Y.E.

Fianna Fail understands and sympathises with the frustration felt in the P.A.Y.E. sector of the tax burden they are called upon to bear. We were well aware of popular feeling among P.A.Y.E. tax-payers under the Coalition, and in our Manifesto we undertook to provide substantial relief if we were elected.

Since coming to office, the Government has demonstrated its practical concern and set about that task before recent protests began.

In the 1978 budget the Government gave the biggest tax concessions ever in the history of the State.

The concessions in the 1978 and 1979 Budgets actually doubled the tax free allowance for married people compared with the Budget allowance of the last coalition budget in 1977. Also, the single man's allowance has increased by £450.

In the tax year 1976/77 a married man with two children on the average industrial wage paid 16.6% of his earnings in income Tax. In April 1979 he will pay 12.6%

The proportions of his earnings that goes in tax is 4% less than under the coalition. Furthermore, Fianna Fail have abolished his rates and his car tax.

In working towards a better tax system the Fianna Fail Government is committed to -

- 1) Easing the burden of the P.A.Y.E. Tax payer
- 2) Tackling the problem of an adequate yield from farm Taxation
- 3) Mounting a vigorous campaign against evasion.

The best way the Government can go about forging an updated Tax system with fair play for all, is to engage in wide ranging and detailed consultations with representatives of the trade union movement, the business community and the farmers. This is precisely what we are doing.

Everybody recognises the complexity of the problem. No matter how the sums are done the cost of the ser-

vices in a modern state add up to a massive amount.

Neverthless in pursuing policies of tax reform the Government is committed to social progress and continued growth in the economy.

The Minister for Fisheries and Forests has taken up the following problems for Maynooth, with Kildare County Council, following representations from Gerard Brady and Maynooth Fianna Fail Cumann.:-

- 1) The extension of a refuse collection to Ballygoran
- 2) That the roadway from nine mile house to the Hitchin' Post be brought up to a reasonable standard, and that a white line be provided as a safety measure
- 3) The cleaning of the road through old Greenfield, Maynooth
- 4) The poor conditions of all roadways leading from Maynooth
- 5) Extension of footpath from Maynooth on the Kilcock Road.
- 6) That all remedial or preventative measures be taken in relation to the poor condition of the bridge on Newtown Road, Maynooth, and that a footbridge be provided on same.
- 7) The completion as soon as possible of the footpath outside the last six houses in Cluain Aoibhinn.
- 8) The provision of lights from Maynooth to Greenfield
- 9) That a 'Stop' sign be provided at the exit from St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, on to the main road.

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

FROM CLLR. BERNARD DURKAN COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

The Secretary of the Co. Council made the following replies to questions submitted by Cllr. Bernard Durkin. (Due to lack of space the question and replies have been condensed)

- Q. Provision of bus turning point on Straffan Road ?
- R. Finance not available this year to acquire land for turning point. Arrangements being made for inclusion in provisional estimates for 1980
- Q Urgence of repairs to road surfaces throughout the County?
- R. Inclement weather prevented work on roads. Insufficient funds available for such repairs (only small increase in money available for 1979 which, with inflation V A T and heavy expenditure on road gritting and salting in the frosty weather, will leave a considerable shortage of fiance for road works) Some areas where heavy lorry traffic, pipelaying etc are causing damage may find the problem acute
- Q Concerning availability of grant of assistance to Kildare Federation of Youth Clubs

Whether or not the Council can offer grant assistance will depend of type of proposals submitted by the Federation of Youth Clubs. A grant to the Federation of £100 re drama festival approved by the County Council in 1978 has been held up through relevant information not being supplied by the Federation

- Q. Indication when Department of Environment was likely to sanction Laragh water scheme?
- R. Design data, etc. handed to Co. Engineer on 13th March last for approval, when approved it will be passed to Department which will aran age and organise the scheme. It is not possible

to give exact date of clearing by Dept. of the Environment.

- Q. Position re cleaning up or piping of river at Parson Street ?
- R. Some cleaning carried out last year. Piping river not necessarily best, propsect of landscaping being investigated.

In relation to an extension of Bus Services, Cllr. Durkan proposed that at peak periods the No. 66 Bus should proceed over the Town Bridge and on to Celbridge via the Celbridge Road - this would serve both Railpark and Greenfield. The Celbridge Bus, No. 67 could operate in the opposite direction.

This is being investigated at present and a report will also be presented.

Councillor Bernard Durkan strongly pressed for the introduction of a suburban Rail service for Kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip when C.I.E. officials attended a recent meeting of Kildare County Council. Since the response from C.I.E. was not satisfactory Cllr Durkan proposed that a deputation from County Council meet the Minister in the presence of the C.I.E. officials, and this was agreed. Information on the outcome will be available later.

PROGRESS ON THE PEDESTRIAN FOOTBRIDGE

Councillor Durkan reports that the bridge is already fabricated and ready for delivery.

It appears that there are some differences between C.I.E. and the County Council over way-leaves, and as soon as these items are resolved the bridge will be placed in position.

JOB CREATION PROSPECTS - NORTH KILDARE

Cllr. Durkan reports that replies received by him from the County Development Officer states that the Council has been pressuring the I.D.A. to provide factories at Kilcock and Leixlip. A.N.C.O. has also stated that they will consider any project or scheme which might come under their Youth Training Programme.

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

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TIDY TOWNS REPORT

The rather critical editorial in the October 1978 Newsletter sparred the comnunity council into responding quicky, by appointing a small sub committee John Joe Costin, Tony O'Farrell and Leo Bean, to see what immediate steps could be taken to improve our ranking in the Tidy Towns Competition. We decided first of all to examine the adjudicators reports and endeavour to rectify the criticisms made, in the reports of the previous three years,

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT:-

This, the adjudicators measure by the presentation of the towns streets, buildings and open spaces. Their impression of Maynooth last year, was one of limited community effort. They alluded to the obvious indifference of too many of the towns inhabitants to the appearance of the town.

To create an awareness of the need for greater tidiness and community involvement an art competition was held in January. The response was overwhelming. We hope, that the zeal of all those who entered the competition will be translated into action during the Summer. A small effort on all our parts will significantly reduce the litter on our streets.

DERELICT BUILDINGS:-

We hope to improve the appearance of the derelict buildings around the town, by getting the exteriors painted or whitewashed.

We would be glad for any volunteers who could help with this work, during the long summer evenings of June.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS:-

In previous years the appearance of a number of buildings were criticised in the Tidy Towns report. We were very pleased by the very positive response Mr. Myles Doyle, Maynooth Cattle Mart made to our submission on planting trees in his carpark to screen the mart. He went to considerable expense, to implement the proposals we put to him. In doing so he has considerably enhanced not only hid own property but also the main approach to the town.

Directly across the road the County Council, likewise, have completed a very praiseworthy roadside improvement at O'Neill Park. Committee work is made easy by such immediate and positive actions.

We discussed with the County Council the various improvements, we plan to undertake in cleaning up areas, developing open spaces and tree planting. These were enthusiastically endorsed in most cases. Already the Council have commenced phase (1) in developing the open space by the river.

The realignment of the wall and road has created new vistas in Pound Street. We hope progress will continue throughout the summer on further works in this area.

SHOP FRONTAGE:-

The tidy town adjudicators frown upon plastic facia on shop fronts, neon signs and large plastic symbols overhanging the streets. The use of these materials is being criticised with increasing frequency. These materials do not harmonise with our Main Street, which is one of the best laid out Streets in Ireland. Traditional shop fronts such as 'Coonans' have been praised in former reports. We are confident that the latest improvements by shop owners will also elicit some praiseworthy comments from adjudicators

Kevin McNamara, has not only put up very attractive window blinds on his shop front but he has also agreed to take down the plastic signs which hang from the wall

The Leinster Arms have already shown a similar enlightened approach in removing the sequined signs from their lovely

MAYNOOTH SPORTS FIELD DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Gerry Brady has been informed by Deputy Paddy Power T.D. that £10,000 has been granted to the above project. This grant will cover the employment of eight young persons for twent five weeks.

FOLLOWING REPRESENTATIONS from Maynooth Cumann and Gerard Brady, Deputy Paddy Power has received the following letter from Kildare County Council.

Dear Deputy Power,

I have received your representations on behalf of Mr. Tony Kennedy, 111 Carton Court, Maynooth, who is the Secretary of the Residents' Assoc., at Carton Court.

The position here is that planning permission has been granted to Tony Vaughan in respect of the development at Carton Court and the County Council has been contact with Mr. Vaughan, reregarding compliance with the various conditions imposed at the time planning approval was granted. I may add that in this case, planning approval was granted on appeal to the Minister for the Environment, as the County Council had refused planning permission because of deficiencies in services and other problems regarding open space and access roads. However, planning permission was granted and the County Council had to have regard to this planning permission and endeavoured to include con-ditions which would, in fact, provide for open space and for improved road services for both the residents of Carton Court and of the adjoining Greenfields Estate.

So far, the developer has refused to respond to the request made by the planning authority regarding the development and I have now given instructions that the file be referred to the Council's solicitor so that appropriate High Court Action may be taken. I have been in touch with the Dublin authorities concerning problems relating to developers not completing estates and I have ascertained that in recent months, the Dublin County Council have been taking cases to the High Court, with success.

In so far as there are defects in individual houses, this is a matter for the purchasers of the houses to pursue through their own legal advisors. When an individual purchases a house from a developer, he enters into a contract, that the purchaser would have some person available to advise him in relation to the condition of the house which is being bought and also in relation to the over-all development of the estate. It is imperative, therefore, that householders who have subsequent grievances should pursue these grievances with the developer on foot of any contract agreement which was entered into between the purchaser and the developer. The Council cannot get involved in fighting legal issues on behalf of tenants of houses as the residents would have their own legal remedy, and consequently, Mr. Kennedy or the Residents' Association should be advised to take appropriate legal action on their own account.

I trust the foregoing explains the position for you.

- 1) That the Eastern Health Board is to go ahead with the provision of an ambulance service to be located at Maynooth health centre The ambulance to cover the north of the county has been bought and it appears now to be a question for the Health Board as to the cost of the service.
- 2) That in the current builsing programme of County Kildare V.E.C. working drawings for Maynooth are at present being considered by the Department. The Parent Teachers Association has presented a video-casette recorder to the school
- 3) That the Government has given approval in principle for the transfer of the Royal Canal from C.I.E. to the Office of Public Works, Implementation of the transfer which will require legislation, is being planned. One wonders if the "jingle-jangle of the old triangle" will reach as far as Maynooth?
- 4) That the County Manager thinks that there are traffic problems in kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip where the road is a disgrace to the rest of the country. Perhaps some one mentioned the sixty-six bus crash at Leixlip bridge?
- 5) That according to a study on third-level education by County Dublin Vocational Education Committee 7,000 to 10,000 places will be needed within County Dublin by 1991, It is suggested that the University

- at Maynooth might be able to play a greater role if adequate transport by road and rail were provided. Maybe the Office of Public would provide canoes for students if they have taken over the canal by 1991. They would be a lot safer going under Leixlip bridge than going over it. (I know! It's the Liffey goes under Leixlip bridge not the canal but the crack was worth while)
- 6) That the County Development Officer told Kilcock Court that development had been restricted in ?aynooth but that the Minister had reversed planning permission refusals offhand on a number of occasions. The County Council were fined for polluting the Lyreen River on August 29th and December 14th. 1978 but denied that they had allowed uncontrolled development in the area.
- 7) That the builders of Greenfield Estate were charged with failing to complete the estate in accordance with the terms of planning permission. It was estimated that it would cost £23,000 to complete the development. The Court was told that the money from the sale of ground rents was to be applied to the carrying out of the work and that the sale was still proceeding. A considerable sum would come out of the ground rents sale! Shades of A.C.R.A.! The bond lodged with the County Council amount ed to about £8,000 including interest

The survey demonstrates the large numbers which commute, the high frequency of commuting both amongst car and bus users and the need for a regular rail service. 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




The competition for June was won by Mrs. O'Reilly with 2nd place going to Mrs. Satchwell.

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
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THE EUROPEAN CONNECTION



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MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY PLAYGROUP

The following essay was entered by The Maynooth Community Playgroup, for a National Competition for Community Playgroups, held by the Irish Preschool Playgroups Association in 1978. The results were announced at the A.G.M. in May '78 and the Maynooth group won first prize of a Playhouse.

ESSAY:-

In the summer of 1977 Kay Harte and Mary Cullen felt that one of the things necessary but missing from life in Maynooth was a Community Play group. They canvessed their friends. acquaintances and any one who would perhaps like to be involved in such a venture. With some talk, door knocking and the local grapevine there soon was a group of about 12 women interested in being actively involved and some others who wished to see the group succeeding and who were willing to help in any way they could, It was decided then that the group should (a) be available to anyone who wished to be involved. (b) it should operate with two playleaders in constant attendance and the other mothers helping on a rota basis. (c) that a minimum fee be charged and (d) that opening hours would be 9.30 to 12.00 on Mon. Wed. and Fri. morn-

Having outlined the operation, the group then got down to practicalities. The premises were supplied by the trustees of the Geraldine Hall. Mr. D. Breen the caretaker was especially helpful in every way. The rent was set at £1.00 a week and an increase to £2.00 was negotiated when the oil heating was used. The building consists of one large hall and one room about 20ft. X 20ft. At first the main hall only was used. This needed a lot of bright posters to make it more pleasant. Our equipment was gathered from all sources willing to supply and consisted of lots of soft toys, a dress up box, various off-cut blocks, some bean bag toys, a playdough table and much to our delight one of the dads Mr. Kiersy supplied us with a lovely selection of Nursery Lego, a large Storage wardrobe and a number of unusual crayons. We also found the ideal solution to our need for and difficulty in getting sand - a box of grain. Mrs. Robinson supplied the first lot and Kavanaghs the local mill has promised to replenish our supply as necessary. Then, as the cherry to top the cake, Mrs. Donnelly who was not even involved heard about us and gave a

beautiful piano. Tables were cut down to size and we went into action on the 12th September with Kay Harte and myself, Carmel Hogan as full time playleaders.

Funds were next on the Agenda. As the whole idea was to charge only 30p per week (50p once the heating went into use) fees could not be relied on to provide finance for equipment. A fund raising Bazaar was decided upon and September 17th was the big Day. All and sundry worked tirelessly to provide a very interesting array of stalls. Small bracelets and necklets were made from beads, and along with dinkies, soldiers and sweets were wrapped up for a lucky dip. Everybody made popcorn, a bargain at 5p a bag. One of the ladies decided to make fizzy orange and lemonade which was sold at 5p per glass-This proved to be a very profitable We had a second-hand clothes idea stall and home produce. The Bric-a-Brac department provided bargains for all and many diets were forgotten when cream flans and luscious gateaux appeared on the cake stall The local Post-man "BENGY" provided the gamblers with fun and high hopes with his mouse Derby, But the biggest (in-every sense of the word) success of the afternoon was the visit from the McVitie Bear. The afternoon was enjoyed by all and earned the group £195

As interest grew in the group and its activities, many people expressed interest in further study of children Mrs. Cullen then arranged with Fr. Liam Carey of Maynooth College for a course in Child Development The course was given by Miss Ann Hickey who teaches in Rutland St. Pre-School. The course attracted not only playgroup mothers, but also private playschool leaders and other interested mums and dads. The course included a visit to the Pre-school. All who attended enjoyed it and benefited from Ann Hickey's knowledge and experience.

With winter then well and truly on the way and the distance to the hall seeming longer in the rain and bitter wind, we decided to investigate the possibility of the provision of a mini bus to collect and deliver the children. All mothers felt the children benefited from the joyride and the comfort thus provided. Mrs. Delaney was contacted and a very reasonable rate agreed with her.

The children in the group aged from 1½ years (with mothers) to 4 years old. After much thought and a day long visit to Rutland St. by Kaye and I, we were convinced of the necessity of dividing the group into 2 sections - one for toddlers and one for 3 year upwards.

The division was quite simple and made use of the smaller room for the Seniors as we felt the toddlers need space for running. When Una Walshe of 'Lets Pretend' gave us a demonstration of her toys we purchased equipment to meet the requirements. I am Playgroup Leader of the Senior Session with mothers on Rota

The emphasis in the Senior Room is on extension of concentration and lengthening the attention span. We now have a totally absorbing story of Rhyme session of 15 minutes. The atmosphere in the room is generally comfortable and peaceful, although we naturally have the odd invasion of cowboys with guns made from construction sets, and jigsaw cars racing along highways of blocks and even a knight complete with cloak and lance. However, this does show that the stimulation is working, does nt it !

The Mother and Toddler Session, under the watchful eye of Kaye operates simultaneously with, but independent of the Senior Session. The Play Leader of the mother and toddler session is also the administrator of the Playgroup ensuring that biscuits for snacktime stocked, fresh Playdough is made, the everlasting queue for the toilet is attended to in time, and that the grain and toys used at the session are tidied up at 12.00. There is now another duty for the administrator, ensuring that the Fruit/Veg. Co-op goes smoothly and that the budget balances, but I will deal with that later.

The equipment for the Mother/ Toddler Session has increased. One of the Fathers, Pat Tynan, was commissioned to make a slide/climbing frame and some easel/black-boards. We covered a large low table with Formica and it is used for Finger Painting. We have one difficulty with painting, washing facilities are not good. While the size of the hall does prove a problem when it comes to heating, it also means that we have space to run and play football, but are dry and safe as well. Kaye, who is Playleader/Administrator in the Toddler Session, keeps watch for boredom which might indicate a need for more detailed and demanding tasks provided in the Senior Room She also plays the Piano and tells stories to the little ones.

We are very pleased with the group from various points of view, firstly the fact that those involved are from both the old and new communities in Maynooth. We have had an enormous amount of help from the fathers of our children. One turns on the heating every morning, others provided us with equipment, another showed films at our recent Film night (more about that later). The parents of our children are not the only ones who have helped us towards success. Many friends contributed in time, effort and materially. Neighbours baked for our most recent fund raising function (a Cake Sale which incidentially made £45 to top up our rapidly vanishing Bank Balance). O'Brien's Super-Market supplies us with biscuits at a reduced price. Mr. Breen has cut off table legs, painted and repaired them and given us a large storage The Community Council have

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given us some financial help and have promised this as an on-going backing.

The Playgroup has had a number of events to involve the parents more fully in our activities. There was a Demonstration of Patchwork guilting held during one of the Mother/ Toddler Sessions. It was fascinating and many interested outsiders took advantage of the invitation to attend and enjoyed it thoroughly. We hired the IPPA films on 'Play with Paint, Clay and Sand' and Una Walshe & Phil Saunders attended. Una & Phil pointed out items of interest and thus helped the audience to ask many thought provoking questions. Phil Saunders then gave a fascinating talk on Children Painting which she illustrated with some charming examples from her own playschool children.

The Fruit and Vegetable Co-op which I mentioned earlier has been going for almost a month. One of the mothers travels into L. Reilly's, a wholesaler who agreed to supply us with fruit and to help us to get bargains at the vegetable market. The only profit we make is to cover the cost of travel to and from the city. The co-op serves two purposes, it saves us all some money and it means most mums see us at least once a week on pick up date.

OUR HERITAGE

Mary Cullen

The first President of the New College was Dr. Thomas Hussey. He had studied at the Irish College at Salamanca, and had later been appointed Chaplain at the Spanish Embassy in London. Here he made friends in the literary and political worlds, and was close to both Dr. Samuel Johnson and Edmund Burke. He developed talent as a diplomat and King George 111 employed him on a diplomatic mission to Madrid. He was involved in the discussions of the Irish Bishops concerning the Catholic College project, and became its first President. Two years later in 1797, he was appointed Bishop of Waterford so his period of active connection with the College was limited.

A number of the early teaching staff in the College were French Scholars who had been forced to leave France by the revolution. Among them were Dr. Lewis Delabogue, a former Professor at the Sorbourne, who was appointed Professor of Moral Theology at Maynooth. Another professor of Moral Theology was Dr. Francis Anglade who had been a Professor at the University of Paris. Dr. Anglade, it will be remembered, later played an active part in bringing the Presentation Sisters to Maynooth in 1823. Dr. Peter Delort, formerly of the University of Bordeaux, became Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy, and Abbe Darre, Professor of Logic, Metaphysics and Ethics.

A very interesting collection of portraits of members of the early staff of the College hang in the Resident Students refectory.

The College began its work during a very disturbed period of Irish History. The Society of United Irishmen, founded in 1791 as an open organisation working for parliamentary reform and the end of religious discrimination, had since then been outlawed and was now an underground secret society committed to rebellion. Its organisation was spreading throughout the counties of Ireland and the government was doing its best to suppress it. The authorities of the College, which was of course a state supported institution, had to tread carefully. During the early months of 1798 rumours of impending rebellion became more insistant each day. The Trustees instituted an inquiry and purge of the Student Body to discover and get rid of any who had United Irishmen affiliations. Sixteen students were expelled during May, just before the rising began. At least one of the expelled students was later executed for his participation in the rebellion, and the College did not escape accusation of widespread disaffection among its membership.

During these early years the number of students was growing and the college grew to accommodate them. The building of wing extensions at either side of Stoyte House had started immediately, and next came two blocks at right angles to each wing and forming, with the Stoyte House block, three sides of St. Joseph's Square. As one enters the square through either of the arches

visible from the front gate on the right is New House, and on the left are Humanity and Dunboyne Houses. The history of the Dunboyne Establishment is one of the most bizare and human stories of the early years of the College. Its central character is John Butler, the Catholic Bishop of Cork from 1763. The bishop was a member of the Dunboyne Branch of the great Butler family. In 1786 his young nephew, Lord Dunboyne, died and left the Bishop heir to the baronage and estates, and torn between commitment to his office and the duty, as he saw it, to marry and produce heirs to carry on the direct line. Though he was now over seventy years of age he petitioned the Pope for permission to marry, and was refused. He then conformed to the Established Church and married a cousin. Pope Pius VI wrote to him that he had 'shuddered with horror' at his 'excess of depravity' and tried to persuade him to repent. A contemporary Ballad lamented that

"In Cork of late for a small estate
A spiritual Lord revolted
From that noble ecclesiastical state
To which the Pope exalted...

"I'm sure you're worse than Henry the Eight Who put away his consort, Your virtuous spouse you did forsake When the Holy Church you abandoned"

The Barons of Dunboyne held estates in Tipperary which were entailed and so could not be left to outsiders, and the estates in Meath which were not entailed. When 21st Baron died in 1800 he bequested his property in Co. Meath to the Trustees of Maynooth to use for the benefit of the College. His sister contested the validity of the bequest. The penal laws which had made it illegal for Catholics to bequeath land had been repealed by this time, but it was argued that person who "re-lapsed" into Catholicism from Protestantism could not benefit under the new legal position. So the question was whether or not Lord Dunboyne had been received back into the Catholic Church before he died. If he had it was claimed that his bequest to the College was invalid, but if he had died a Protestant the bequest was valid. So when the case was tried at Trim in 1802 the Trustees' case was that he died a Protestant, and the case for the plaintiff was that he died a Catholic. The only witness who could say of his own knowledge what had happened was the Rev. William Gahan who had visited the baron during his last illness and he pleaded the secrecy of the confessional and refused to say. For this he was committed to Trim Gaol for a few days for contempt of court. The jury found that Lord Dunboyne had died a Catholic, but the Trustees' counsel raised technical objections and the judge advised an agreed settlement. This was reached and the Trustees were ceded estates yielding a yearly rental of £500. The Government added a yearly grant of £700 and the Trustees used the money to found a school of Post Graduate Students called ever since the Dunboyne Establishment.





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NUCLEAR POWER -- WHAT IS INVOLVED ?

In recent times the idea of using nuclear power to supplement other forms of energy creation has been presented to the people of Ireland. It has been presented almost as a fait accompli. In this fashion it is being treated as just another source of energy, something only slightly removed from using turf to generate electricity. This is not the case. The use of nuclear power is vastly different from any other type of resource. What is involved is not yet fully understood even by leading scientists. But some things are easily enough understood -and they do not encourage thoughtless implementation of such a power source. In this article I would like to give a simple outline of some of the problems and arguments.

PART 1 -- THE PROBLEMS

The core of a nuclear reactor is not a very complicated affair. The construction, running and maintenance of a reactor is no more a problem to th technicians involved than are the same operations in connection with the familiar automobile. But the core is a dangerous place. And the complications arise in attempting to solve the problem of how to keep the danger at bay. The dangers are involved with the process which takes place in the uranium in the core. The process is called fission. Fission, you may know, is what happened in the great atomic explosions that devastated Nagasaki and Hiroshima in Japan at the end of the last war. When uranium fissions, the atoms disintegrate each disintegration releasing energy which causes further disintegrations of other atoms. The end result is a splitting of many atoms at once, with the release of a great quantity of energy -- usually called an explosion !

A nuclear reactor controls this explosion by allowing only some atoms to disintegrate at a time. But what comes out of the atoms that do take part in the process? The answer is energy in the form of radiated heat plus other radiations, many of which are extremely dangerous to life. The heat is used to generate electricity (by turning water to steam, which then turns the turbines of the generators). The other radiations are hopefully caught by the layers of insulation that surround the core.

But some may escape - and that is the first problem. It is of the utmost importance that as few as possible of these radiations come in contact with any life-form. Under control, they can be used in surgery to destroy cancerous cells. Without control, they can do serious damage to vital cells in any living thing. The vital cells may be the ones which contain the genes, by which each species passes on its characteristics to its off-spring. Hence, some three feet or more of concrete surrounds each nuclear reactor core. Does it stop all the unwanted radiation? The simple answer is no. It is a fact that even six feet of concrete would not stop all the radiation. The reason is that the radiation obeys the laws of probability. Unlike large objects, small objects have a certain chance of doing some things and a chance of not doing them. For example, if you hold a torch against your palm in a dark room, you will still see a faint glow of light (as well as an outline of your bones - which is the principle of X-rays). Some of the radiated light gets through, some does not. Similarly, other forms of radiation can pen-etrate concrete. They can never be blocked 100%. The aim is to block about 99% or so of them. Three feet of concrete will do this. But is cannot be forgotten that the 1% which escape are still lethal.

The second problem is that everything that has come into contact with the core or its surrounds is contaminated. i.e., contains and emits lethal amounts of radio-activity. One of the biggest problems is water which has been used to cool the core. This has to be contained in huge tanks until its radiation level has decreased to an acceptable rate. This could take many, many years and in the meantime there is always the risk of leaking or of evaporation as too great a rate. Alternatively, it may be dissipated in the ocean over a period of time and hopefully never gather in a concentrated amount. These solutions to the problem are not real solutions. They merely transfer the problem to a later date and a different set of people.

The third problem is that the fuel used uramium - is reduced to three things, basically. These are, more uranium, waste, and plutonium. The uranium and plutonium can be used again and so are not problems. But the waste is a problem. In fact it is probably the biggest problem of the whole industry. Where can it be dumped so that it will not harm anyone now or in the future? The only good place is in the sun. There are two reasons why this is not done. When rockets are sent into space there is always the danger that they will not make it -- they may fall back to earth with disasterous results. The other reason is one of economics. The costs of putting waste on the sun would be so great that the whole purpose of using

the nuclear reactor in the first place to get cheap energy - would be defeated. The alternative is to find a place for it on earth - at a reasonable cost ! The cost is measured in today's money terms and the place is usually a deep mine or the bottom of the sea, places where changes are unlikely to take place for quite some time (according to our way of thinking) But the waste matter is dangerous for millions of years and in that time anything could happen. The waste could be thrown up with terrible results for anyone living at that time. One of the hidden questions which arises from all this is, Will there be people in the future ? In one million years time? This is unanswerable. Yet we cannot presume that there will not be any. Neither can we pass on our now unsolveable problems in the hope that answers may be found in the future.





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ETHIOPIAN TRADITIONS

Ethiopia is a predominantly Christian Country where old traditions are observed, and the Ethiopians, like the Irish, are very conscious of their heritage.

The Ethiopian Orthodox Church has similar features to other Christian Churches. Many of its practices belong to the very early church, as in the past Ethiopia has been isolated from outside religious influences by Islamic settlements. This legacy can still be discerned in the Arabicsounding chant of the religious services. The historian Gibbon in "Decline and Fall", has written:-

> "Encompassed on all sides by the enemies of their religion the Aethiopians slept near a thousand years, forgetful of the world by whom they were forgotten".

Ethiopians observe the Julian calendar - the year beginning in September like the Jewish year. Being an ancient church, there is an interesting miscellany of Saints and Saints' feast days.

New Year's day, September 11th., is the feast of St. John the Baptist, closely followed by the festival of Maskai, celebrated on September 27th. This commemorates the finding, reputedly in the 14th century, of fragments of the "True Cross" believed to have been brought to Ethiopis from Alexandria. In addis Ababa the festival coincides with public ceremonies - the decorative motif consisting of Maskal daisies, the national flower of Ethiopia. Millions of those yellow flowers emblazon the countryside in a riot of colour at this time of the year.

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The Ethiopian Christmas (January 7th) has not suffered Western-style exploitation, and is marked by a special game called genna, which is played on Christmas day. A primitive form of hockey played by men, it continues throughout the shole day. this being summertime in Ethiopia.

Epiphany, the feast of Timkat - one of the big holidays . begins on January 18th, and lasts for 72 hours, in the Capital, arks called tabots are carried, and a night of vigil is observed by the priests.

Easter, the other major festival of the year, coming as it does at the end of the lenten fast, is brought to a conclusion by feasting and merriment. Everyone wears national costume and it is a time for paying respects and for reconcillation. .

Religious services in Ethiopia can be very striking - the glittering vestments of the priests, the elaborate processions in which rainbow-coloured umbrellas are carried, the chanting and exuberant participation; on such ceremonial occasions the unique character of Ethiopia can be seen.

In addition to the religious festivals there are other public holidays; but as yet, it is difficult to assess what forms of public participation may be called for in recognition of more recent developments in this country

Shown in photograph are examples of some small Ethiopian crosses-

The cross is one of the most important of the Ethiopian Church emblems. 8n every church crosses in wood and silver bearing the picture of the crucifixion can be seen The crucifix is unknown, as graven images are not allowed.

On Sundays and for constant service, the priest uses a large cross of bronze, while for festivals, the large silver cross with the picture of Our Lord is borne forth.

The Ethiopian cross is generally the Greek cross with elaboration. It is used on all religious occasions, and attached to a cord or fine chain, it is worn around the neck of nearly all Christians.

It has been said that the devotion which Ethiopian Christians have for the cross can never be fully realised by anyone who has not witnessed the Feast of Maskal.

The fragment of the true cross which by tradition, originally went to Alexandria, was eventually brought to Ethiopia and is preserved in the Church of Egziaber Ab in the monastery of Gishen in the awe-inspiring mountains of Ambasel deep in the Woolo Governorate-General.

Editorial

As yet, nobody has apportioned the blame or otherwise of the Bantry Bay disaster and it is not our intention to try. The disaster and the following inquiry does, however, set us thinking and we wonder if a disaster of a similar magnitude could happen here. Of course, we have no ships here with explosive cargoes, but we do have dangerous loads passing through by road and rail and with a denser population in this area we believe we are in constant danger.

Day by day we have petrol lorries and gas lorries very obviously passing through, possibly explosives and for all we know radio active material. What, if a serious accident should happen in the middle of the town with these, would be our fate? What would be the position if several tanks of acrylin were ruptured passing through the station with a northerly or southerly breeze blowing? What would be the position if any of these accidents occurred at night when people are asleep in bed? The mind boggles at the possible consequences of such accidents.

There is no serious danger, we are told, but then we heard the same of Bantry. We have also read of the dreadful disaster at the Spanish holiday camp when a lorry load of gas exploded. We have also heard that a train with acrylin tanks was derailed some time ago, although at the time the acrylin tanks were empty. What if they were full ?

Day by day, night by night loads of petrol, gas, and goodness knows what else, hurdle through the town at a fast speed, frequently ignoring the speed limits. the 'law of averages' indicates that there will be an accident one day and we have no indication when or where it will be just a simple accident with no serious consequences. It is a very disturbing thought, especially at night.

Should there not be some very serious legislation about the carrying of dangerous cargoes through built up areas? (Any area for that matter). Should such loads be allowed to hurtle through towns, especially at night ? Should there not be some advance notice when lethal loads are passing through an area ? Do all politicians live in 'safe' areas and therefore choose to ignore a serious problem ? Do we have to wait until a few hundred people die, or are maimed before something is done ?

These are questions which deserve alot of consideration. They concern your welfare. What are you going to do about it. It is not up to your neighbour, it's up to you! Do something before it's too late!



contd. from Last Issue

The biggest success of the year is our children. The numbers on our Books have now reached 34. Of those 20 are an age for the Senior Room. We usually have an attendance of 17 per day. The change that has occured in the 6 months since the beginning of the group is quite extra-ordinary. Each of the children have their own personality, and one of the most pleasant aspects of Playleader is getting to know them all.

The independence which is so import ant and yet the need for mother which is still so much part of the 3 year old. But now they are all familiar with the Playleaders and each other. The roles are interchanged a dozen times in one session. Mother one minute, baby next, auntie in the following game, space man when the mood changes, the choice is endless - and the enjoyment boundless. The children who joined the group as shy and rather reluctant to socialise, now mingle and chat quite happily. The jigsaw genius shows some other person where the mistakes are. The Mother gets lunch for her brood, while the book-worm gathers the faithful few to listen to the often repeated favourite story which has been learned by heart. There are no longer those "sho only stand and watch" so to speak, all now contribute in some way or other to the activity which buzzes on throughout our sessions, The shy ones whose colours are so extravagent and draw admiration from

It is fascinating to watch and learn from each one. How important acceptance is, how necessary discipline and rules are in order to feel safe. What fun it is to be a girl for a change, the strange sensation of silk or satin against legs which are normally encased in denim. The pride of achievement and success when one has mastered the task, be it jigsaw or the knack of setting pegs in boards The praise thus merited is so valued, it is placed along side Mum's pleasure on being shown a portrait of herself. Speech has shown a marked improvement and vocabulary has increased The toddlers have also benefited greatly from this first two terms of social experience. Many Mums have said the children are less frustrated are easier to communicate with and

they share more readily They have facilities in the group which many would not have at home Their mums enjoy the contact with each other and find the group an outlet for their energies They have worked hard in the day to day running of the sessions as well as the special events

The year so far has been hard and demanding for all of those involved The children have played hard, the parents and friends collected equipment and finance items for sale and experience. We all look back with pleasure on the fun and hard work, achievement and worry. The good has definitely out weighed the bad. It has been all in all a very satisfying year. Let's hope we can continue along the road to success at the same rate in the future.

SEQUEL:-

Having thrived up to the Summer of '78, the playgroup closed for the school holidays. We had said Goodbve to one of our leading lights -Kaye Harte, when she had moved to Cork. Next we had the bitter sweet experience of saying farewell to the school goers. They had each a special part in the first year of the playgroup. Now we must look forward to the beginning of the new year in September. During the Summer various pieces of equipment were painted and renovated. New toys and books were acquired. I, Carmel Hogan went away on a resedential training course with the IPPA. In September, our roll book crammed, and enthusiasm blazing we reopened. The first week or two was fairly chaotic, but that was only to be expected, as a new group of children got to know each other and myself and Mary Simon (who now attended full time also as Playleader).

We called an A.G.M. and had almost total attendance by both fathers and mothers. As usual with any non-profit making group Fund raising was high on the list of priorities. Various ideas were put forward and the two most favoured were a Supper Night and a raffle. A sub. committee was formed and plans were made. Looking back, I begin to wonder if perhaps the 'FATES' were against us. The Supper Dance plans were foiled on a number of fronts The disappointment was intense, and a raffle did

not hold much attraction. Mean-while I became ill and had to leave Mary Simon to hold the fort having been dropped into things at the deep end. She was coping admirably when disaster struck again, Mrs. Delaney had to go into hospital and would not be available to transport the children up and down. This was great loss as the convenience of collection, and the joys of the Bus Ride were a great advantage we felt. The number of children attending dropped as colds and flu took there toll. Even when Mrs. Delaney had recovered and no one could ever say she delayed one day longer than she actually had to, the changed weather brought our numbers down to an average of 10 However, we all looked forward to the New Year, and perhaps leaving all our bad luck behind us. But our cruel opponent the weather again managed to interfere with our best laid plans. The pipes in the Geraldine Hall froze over and burst and we could not open as planned. Suitable alternative accommodation proved impossible to find for our children and equipment.

We held a meeting last week in the Geraldine Hall. Having seen the wonderful work that has been done and how well the hall looked, we determined to continue. Our flagging spirits revived, and we look forward to the completion of the Hall and the re-opening of our School. Let us hope that a favourable change in our fortunes will come around, and that Maynooth will not loose a valuable community service, in this the year of the child. We hope to improve the facilities we provide for the children and increase the involvement and pleasure of the adults.



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
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HOLY FATHER'S MAYNOOTH VISIT

THE PROGRAMME FOR THE MAYNOOTH VISIT WILL BE AS FOLLOWS:-

11 p.m. - Sunday 30th September, until Pope's arrival .- All-night Vigil at St. Patrick's College. This will consist of successive periods conducted by clergy of the different diocese with various themes (such as peace, Our Lady, The Holy Father etc. etc.). This will be relayed from the College Chapel to the public outside. Booklets will be available on that night to follow the various devotions

8 a.m. - Monday 1st October, Holy Father arrives by helicopter at St. Patrick's College, and will be visible to the general public while he proceeds to College Chapel to address the Seminarians. This will be followed by an address to the parishioners and general public from the open air dais.

9. a.m. - Holy Father again drives through the general public in open vehicle to the helicopter and departs

9.30 a.m. approximately Concelebrated Mass.

There will be a special area reserved at the College for Maynooth parishioners only. Admission tickets to this area will be distributed to each household prior to 30th September.

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People wishing to attend must be in position in the College by 7 a.m. on Monday morning.

TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENTS

As from 11 p.m. on Sunday 30th September all traffic will be stopped from passing through MAYNOOTH. After that time no cars whatsoever will be allowed into or near the town without special Police Permit.

CAR PARKS will be provided on all approach roads to facilitate visitors to the town.

Again we stress no cars whatever will be allowed to be parked on any road or footpath in or near the town. Local car owners must have their cars off the road.

Traffic will not resume until sometime after 10 o'clock on Monday.

These arrangements are subject to alteration.

WARNING

Once a crowd is gathered there is no doubt there will be pick-pockets present. People are advised to leave jewelry, handbags, wallets, and such like at home. All bags and packages will be searched.

Local Residents who are within walking distance of the College are urgently asked not to use cars during this period.

Parking will not be permitted in the Town or in the College.

TEA & SANDWICHES

It should be impressed on those wishing to attend the ceremonies during the Holy Fathers visit to the Phoenix Park, Knock, Galway and Maynooth, that they may have to be away from home longer than they anticipate, as the traffic jams will be very big.

They should therefore take sandwiches and flasks with them where-ever possible, also rainwear and warm clothing. This applies particularly to the elderly and the children.

Remember there will be no catering facilities for the public at any of these centres.

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PRESIDENT'S OFFICE, ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE, MAYNOOTH.

It is understandably a cause of great joy to Ireland that His Holiness Pope John Paul 11 will be its guest from 29 September 'till 1 October. For the first time in history a reigning Pontiff will step on Irish soil and speak to the Irish people in their own fields and churches, pray with them and bless them in their own homeland. Regretfully his stay of three days will not permit him or the people to make the sort of contact that I am sure both would wish. Many cities and areas of Ireland would dearly like to have the Holy Father visit them even for a very short period; but it just is not possible. It is indeed a privilege for us all in Maynooth that the Pope will most likely spend part of his valuable Irish time in our midst.

John Paul 11 is a man of peace who has known the horrors of war. His homeland, Poland, has suffered from partition, religious persecution, centuries of conflict. Time and again since he became Pope this man 'who has been called from a distant country' has appealed for peace in the world. His visit to Ireland should mark the

occasion for us to renew out prayers and efforts for peace in our own troubled country; of one thing we can be certain: Pope John Paul understands what it is like to live with conflict, and his prayers on behalf of Ireland will be prayers from a sincere and understanding heart.

It would be superfluous here to dwell on his career as student, professor, President of a seminary, Archbishop, His intellectual ability and strong personality have been well and rightly stressed by commentators on television and in the newspapers all over the world. During the past year I have had the privilege of meeting him twice and attending his Mass several times. A man of God, prayerful and profound, he is also clearly a man at home in the world, a man of humour and humanity. We talked briefly about Maynooth : he was well aware of the proud tradition of the college as one of the world's greatest seminaries.

He was very pleased when I presented him with a copy of one of the periodicals published in the College, the Irish Theological Quarterly, which contained a learned article from his pen, written in 1976 when he was Archbishop Karol Wojtyla of Cracow. He expressed the

wish to see Maynooth some day; little did I think that within a few months that wish would be realised, and the College which has received so many distinguished persons during the course of its long history would in 1979 be given the supreme honour of receiving the Holy Father himself.

Details concerning the papal visit have yet to be completed. Because of his tight schedule his visit to the College will inevitably be brief. I am very senitive to the fact that, while in the College, he will be in the parish of Maynooth. I hope to make every effort to ensure that the people of the parish will have an opportunity of seeing the Holy Father, and hopefully, joining with him in prayer, According as more information concerning the visit is available l shall keep the parish informed. Meanwhile let us all pray that his visit to Ireland and to Maynooth will be a joyful one. Through his presence amongst us may blessings come upon our country, north and south, and, in a special way, may God's favour rest upon the Parish and college of Maynooth.

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ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE PHOENIX PARK

The following are some of the points that will effect the people from Maynooth who are going to the Phoenix Park on Saturday September 29th.

- 1) No traffic will be allowed past Lucan. From there a shuttle Bus service starting at 5 a.m. will operate to Stewart's Hospital in Palmerstown, and then you will have to walk to the Phoenix Park.
- 2) For the return journey the shuttle Bus service will again operate from Steward's Hospital in Palmerstown to Lucan with the last Buses running at about 11 p.m. on Saturday night.
- There will be supervised car parking at Lucan.
- 4) All the Bus services from Lucan to Palmerstown will be express i.e. no stopping in between.
- 5) Some Rail Stations which are now closed may be opened for the occasion. Check the National Papers for full details.
- 6) On arrival at the Park Gate everyone will be issued with sticker for your lapel. These stickers will have a Number and a letter. The number and letter will

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be clearly marked by big poster and this will be your spot.

- It might be unwise to encourage anyone under 7 years to attend.
- 8) There will be avenues between each group of 1000 people and the Pope will drive down these after the Mass. Nobody will be more than 25 metres away from him as he passes.
- 9) There will be seating for the sick only. Everybody else should provide their own seating such as camp stools etc.
- 10) Go in your Parish Group if possible.
- 11) The Park will be open at 6 a.m. First comers will get the best places. The ceremonies will begin at 9.15 a.m.
- 12) During the Mass many people will be a long way from the altar. Binoculars would be a help.

These points are part of the general instructions being issued to the public. Further instructions apply to the sick and the Stewards, which can be got from the local organising Committees. There will be upwards of 500,000 people in the Park for this unique occasion but if everyone co-operates with the stewards there will be no fuss or cause for alarm.

Again we must stress that people will be a long time away from home. There will be no catering facilities in the Park, so bring sandwiches and flasks. Also bring warm clothing and rainwear particularly for the children and elderly.

Finally let us add a word of warning. In all crowds no matter what the occasion, pickpockets operate. So watch your possessions. It will be a pity if this unique and glorious event was marred by the loss of a purse, wallet, or other article.

CLEAN SWEEP


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The coat of arms of Pope John Paul 11 is intended as an act of homage to the central mystery of Christianity, the Remdemption.

And so the main representation is a cross, whose form however, does not correspond to the customary heraldic model. The reason for the unusual placement of the vertical section of the cross is readily apparent if one considers the second object inserted in the coat of arms -- the large and majestic capital M. This recalls the presence of Mary beneath the cross and her exceptional participation in the Redemption.

The great devotion of the Holy Father to the Virgin Mary is manifested in this manner, as it was also expressed in his motto as Cardinal Wojtyla: TOTUS TUUS (All yours). Nor can one forget that within the confines of the ecclesiastical province of Krakow, there is situated the celebrated Marian shrine of Czestochowa, where the Polish People for centuries fostered their filial devotion to the Mother of God.

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Editorial



When the College opened in 1795 the number of students was 40. By 1799 it had grown to 119, and 1809 it was 250. This explains why the college itself had to grow steadily from the very beginning to try to accomodate them all. Even so during the early years Senior Students had to live outside in lodgings in the village. Between 1797 and 1829 new buildings went up, behind and to each side of Stoyte House and then behind at right angles to form three sides of a square. Meanwhile another chapter in Maynooth's History had opened and closed.

Today both the College and the Town are proud of the development of a University open to lay students and clerics, men and women. Not many people realise that in the early days there were lay students at Maynooth also, though only males in those more chauvinistic days. It will be remembered that the Act of Parliament under which the College was founded provided for an establishment for the education of "persons professing the Roman Catholic religion" This was intended and clearly worded to include lay students as well as candidates for the priesthood. The Irish bishops had originally wanted an institutfor the education of priests only but their political allies, including Edmund Burke, had pressed strongly that lay students whould be included. Plans for building accomodation for them was being discussed as early as 1796. The first lay students seem to have started in the College in 1800. Two years later the College acquired a new building for them. They bought Riverstown Lodge which today is the administrative centre, housing the offices of the President and the Bursar. Riverstown House is the oldest building on the campus. It was built by the same John Stoyte who later built and gave his name to the origin -al nucleus of the College. Riverstown House appears on a 1781 Map of Maynooth town on which there is only space at the territory later occupied by Stoyte House. Mr. Stoyte leased the house and grounds to Dean and Mrs Craddock. After her fusband's death Mrs. Craddock sold the property to the trustees. The lay College continued until 1817 when it closed down. It was developed in some respects as a separate establishment from the Ecclesiastical College, and a separate set of trustees was set up. The students however seem to have mixed for meals and some classes and in some of their leisure time. An interesting comment on the influence of the lay students upon their clerical coll. eagues comes from Dr. Healy, the author of the Centenary History of the College. Dr. Healy, who later became archbishop of Tuam, remards that the "mixing of the students may also help to explain the existence of that spirit of insubordination, which about this time was undoubtedly exhibited by some students of the Royal College" and considers that it was not altogether a matter for regret that the lay College closed down in 1871.

were in a delicate position when they wished to look for increased money grants from the government for a sizable extension. Many people in England - and some in Ireland - sincerely believed that giving any money for the education of Catholic priests was in itself an immoral act. But just as fear of the influence of the French Revolution had helped to make the government favourable to the establishment of the College, now in the 1840s fear of Daniel O'Connell's Repeal Movement helped to win more money for its expansion. The Prime Minister, Sir Robert Peel made "the maynooth Grant" part of his policy of conciliation of Irish Catholics in the hope of winning them away from Repeal. : Emotions ran high in the Parliamentary debates but the trustees got an increase in the Annual grant and a lump sum of £30, 000 for building and renovation. They engaged the English Architect Augustus Pugin to design the new buildings. Pugin was the most famous exponent of neo Gothic Architecture, an attempt to recreate the Gothic style of the middle ages. Three sides of another square went up between 18rt and 1850, the beautiful neo-Gothic front which forms the fourth or west side of St. Joseph's Square, and behind that two other sides.

Student life was hard in those early days. Cardinal O'Fiaich in his book 'MA NUAD' quotes a letter home from a student who was at the College between 1798 and 1802:-

'Our rooms are extremely cold; there being only one fire in the house I live in. The regulations of the house are very severe. We rise at six o'clock every morning; the business of the day begins with prayer, mediation and Mass, then study to breakfast; then half an hour of recreation; study again till 2 o'clock; then the English professor gives class till 3 o'clock; then dinner after which we have recreation for an hour. Then the business of the evening begins. At 9 o'clock we have prayers. Everyone is then to repair to bed.

We have bread and milk for break-fast and supper. We have flesh meat to dinner every day unless on fish days... The Duke of Leinster often visits us here. He is the most agreeable and affable gentleman I ever saw. Every Wednesday almost we visit his Demesne which is most spacious and beautiful, and of endless variety"

Today's students would find the time table somewhat restrictive though we may all envy the weekly visit to Carton.

Student numbers continued to grow and reached 450 by 1844. Between 1832 and 1834 two new buildings were added behind and to the south of the central block and behind Riverstown House. These were called Rhetoric and Logic Houses. But even with these the College was seriously overcrowded, with two, three, four or even more students sharing a bedroom. The trustees

NUCLEAR POWER

contd. from Last issue

PART 2 - In part 1, I had a look at some of the problems which arise in connection with nuclear power. Here I present some of the arguments frequently heard, and why each of them has to be looked at in a different light in the context of nuclear power.

The greatest argument in the pro-nuclear camp seems to be that everything has risks. More people are killed in cars than in most wars. Alcohol ruins the lives of individuals and families.

Smoking shortens the lives of many people who smoke and possibly even of those who do not smoke such as the passengers in a bus or an unborn baby whose chances in its future life may be adversely affected. But strangely enough these risks are of a different sort to the ones involved in dealing with radio-activity. An individual may ruin his life but that does not ruin all human beings. One suicide does not lead to genocide. But radioactivity knows no bounds. The damage it does now may not be seen now, yet it can affect future generations of human beings, transforming them in some unknown fashion. The nuclear plant does not just do damage to the people who voluntarily work in it but also to all life in its vicinity. Here, the risk is not just that of an individual life but of a complete ecological system At present, there is much concern about the effect that the indiscriminate killing of seals and whales etc., is having on the balance of nature. The extinction of each species of life-form leaves a gap which will cause unknown change. in other life-forms which surround it. Such extinction is to be guarded against

Yet we may be practising just such an execution upon ourselves. Nobody is free from the effects of atomic radiation due to experiments (with bombs mostly) already carried out. Each of us has a larger than 'normal' amount of radiation in his or her system. Normal radiation is that which occurs without the aid of man and under which we have evolved.

What then are the economics of having nuclear energy? We need it in order to have enough energy to sup-

ply electricity to factories which will give more jobs in the future. Future is a relative term. The future in this context is a time of about thirty years starting about ten years from now. Will there be a future after that? That is the real question! Does it guarantee the jobs? Obviously not. With the present system of job creation the total number of jobs planned cannot be attained. It will not change in the future. "The best laid plans o'mice and men ... ' etc. In this case the grief and pain may be more than we bargained for. This is not to say that there is no point in trying to plan for future jobs. Of course it is necessary. But looking to nuclear power as a means of solving our energy problems is like looking to Dracula to solve a problem of blood shortage - he will solve the problem, but at a cost. What is needed is something which is based on our own natural re sources.

In business-life it is recognised that there are a number of strategies or possible ways of approaching any problem. Here are two. One may try for short-term goals and leave the long-run to take care of itself. As the economist Keynes said; In the long-run we are all dead' The 'we' in Keynes' statement meant individuals. As far as the individual is concerned there is no point in being concerned with success years after his life may be over. But the same cannot be said of communities or of countries. If by 'we' is meant 'a nation' then the statement makes slightly more horific reading.

The other strategy is to look for long-term results and lay the sound basis for this in the present. Short term set-backs may have to be encountered but an enlightened people will see the benefits that may be gained by this policy. This is true for all planning - and short-sightedness by builders of houses around Dublin has been condemned by many. (cf. N.I.E.C. report on planning 1970).

It is not unthinkable that house purchasers would accept less crowded estates, better built houses, more access to services, and many other things which would help them enjoy life in their chosen abode even though this may have

meant waiting a little longer to get such a place. Condemnations of nuclear power plants after their use will be too late.

Nuclear power is a short-term solution. It is hoped that fusion methods of producing energy will be found before the problem gets too large for Ireland. But why have anything to do with the problem? The only answer seems to be that the politics of the matter dictate that one does not just say that one is European - one must be seen to be European. And that may involve the use of nuclear power for other things as well as generating electricity; for instance, bombs. There are other ways of generating more electricity. It is obvious that we should be spending our money and energy on attempts to develope these rather than having anything to do with a system which is only beginning to cause nightmares for the people involved with it in other countries.

P.S. Murphy's Law states that if anything can possibly go wrong, sooner or later it will! And Murphy's Law has not been broken yet.

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



Editorial

It is not unusual, particularly at Christmas time to read of dreadful disasters of various kinds. Perhaps it is only that at this time of the year we are more receptive to the misfortunes of others. There are, no doubt, disasters at other times of the year but at the Festive Season it seems to disturb us all the more. Accidents (mini-disasters in themselves) which should not happen at all seem to occur in profusion around this time and our hearts go out to all concerned, who like ourselves, are preparing to enjoy Christmastide.

It is, of course, commendable that we should, at any time, feel deeply for our neighbours J misfortunes but how often do we our selves contribute to our neighbours J misfortunes as well as our own. Careless in or about the home seems to cause the greater bulk of accidents. Something left on the stairs, an unmarked poison bottle, an untied or untended ladder, an unscreened fire, a faulty electric cable - these seem to be the chief causes of accident in the home. Parents in particular should be always alert for hazards in the home. This can be done, even from an armchair, as long as one raises oneself when something looks to be out of order. Common sense tells us what is dangerous but the vital thing is to rectify any matter immediately it becomes apparent.

Outside the home care is just as important as not only our own families but our neighbours are concerned. Perhps the most frightful form of carelessness outside is careless driving or even more deadly driving under the influence of drink. This latter form unfortunately seems to be more prevalent at Christmas time - the 'Season of Goodwill'. Surely anybody who drives with even a moderate amount consumed is not showing 'goodwill' to anybody. Please do not drive with even a moderate amount of drink on you, or, better still, if you have to drive do not drink.

As well as doing something about the lesser accidents, or mini-disasters we can also do something about major misfortunes. Even this might not happen with a little more forethought. Train accidents, for instance, usually happen through forgetfulness or carelessness on somebodys part, and the recent accident in North America that has caused so much hardship and unhappiness might not have happened had there been a little more forethought about the cargo being carried. To avoid kindred accidents in our area we have to keep our eyes open for hazards and, most important, make sure that our national or local authorities act to minimize such hazards. Make sure that our public representatives make proper regulations for the carriage of explosives, nuclear material, gas and petrol through our area so that our friends and relations may not be calling to Maynooth one day to see the hole in the ground that was our town.




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MAYNOOTH ATHLETIC CLUB

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
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


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ST. MARY'S BRASS & REED BAND


















MAYNOOTH ARTIST

CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES

To the 'man' in the street, the idea of organised Civil Defence Services are rather a hazy notion and while most of us consider that they are necessary we have not given them a great deal of consideration. Could you, for instance, list the several Services involved? Unless you are an active member of one of these Services, it is unlikely that you can.

Civil Defence (as it is more commonly called) is an organisation of four services linked together in a single unit, comprising Warden Service, Auxillery Fire Service, Casualty Service, Welfare Service and Rescue Service. It is an individual service but trained to work together should disaster strike All the services are geared to assist the civil population and are not in any way a military organisation..

The Warden Service is geared to give_ warning of disaster to the civil population and to direct them to places of safety or to instruct them on how to protect themselves. Like all the other services in Civil Defence its primary duty will be in its own area but, in some circumstances may be asked to assist in other areas. Its greatest asset is its local knowledge of the area and the population residing there. When fully organised each unit can contact every person in its area within minutes of any eventuality and being in contact with neighbouring units can elist their assistance at

short notice. Each Warden is instructed in methods of protection of households in wartime from explosives, fire, or nuclear attack. He is trained to read instruments to monitor radio active fallout and to advise the public on the best form of protection. Other duties may include assisting the police, in refugee or crowd control. In general the Warden Service is the information centre.

The Auxiliary Fire Service speaks for itself and members are instructed in the use of all forms of fire fighting equipment and fire control.

The Casualty (or as it is sometimes call - The First Aid) Service is also more or less self explanitory its members being trained to deal with casualties in every eventuality.

Any of these Services can act fully only when they are numerically strong and in this area they are not what they should be. Would you consider joining any of the above Services ? The duties in peacetime are not demanding initial training usually comprises 6 - 8 lectures on successive weeks with just occasional seminars or exercises after that. There is also a certain amount of social activity and the Services as a whole are noted for their cheerful and happy spirit.
