HOLY FATHER'S MAYNOOTH VISIT

THE PROGRAMME FOR THE MAYNOOTH VISIT WILL BE AS FOLLOWS:-

11 p.m. - Sunday 30th September, until Pope's arrival .- All-night Vigil at St. Patrick's College. This will consist of successive periods conducted by clergy of the different diocese with various themes (such as peace, Our Lady, The Holy Father etc. etc.). This will be relayed from the College Chapel to the public outside. Booklets will be available on that night to follow the various devotions

8 a.m. - Monday 1st October, Holy Father arrives by helicopter at St. Patrick's College, and will be visible to the general public while he proceeds to College Chapel to address the Seminarians. This will be followed by an address to the parishioners and general public from the open air dais.

9. a.m. - Holy Father again drives through the general public in open vehicle to the helicopter and departs

9.30 a.m. approximately Concelebrated Mass.

There will be a special area reserved at the College for Maynooth parishioners only. Admission tickets to this area will be distributed to each household prior to 30th September.

People wishing to attend must be in position in the College by 7 a.m. on Monday morning.

TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENTS

As from 11 p.m. on Sunday 30th September all traffic will be stopped from passing through MAYNOOTH. After that time no cars whatsoever will be allowed into or near the town without special Police Permit.

CAR PARKS will be provided on all approach roads to facilitate visitors to the town.

Again we stress no cars whatever will be allowed to be parked on any road or footpath in or near the town. Local car owners must have their cars off the road.

Traffic will not resume until sometime after 10 o'clock on Monday.

These arrangements are subject to alteration.

WARNING

Once a crowd is gathered there is no doubt there will be pick-pockets present. People are advised to leave jewelry, handbags, wallets, and such like at home. All bags and packages will be searched.

Local Residents who are within walking distance of the College are urgently asked not to use cars during this period.

Parking will not be permitted in the Town or in the College.

It should be impressed on those wishing to attend the ceremonies during the Holy Fathers visit to the Phoenix Park, Knock, Galway and Maynooth, that they may have to be away from home longer than they anticipate, as the traffic jams will be very big.

PRESIDENT'S OFFICE, ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE, MAYNOOTH.

It is understandably a cause of great joy to Ireland that His Holiness Pope John Paul 11 will be its guest from 29 September 'till 1 October. For the first time in history a reigning Pontiff will step on Irish soil and speak to the Irish people in their own fields and churches, pray with them and bless them in their own homeland. Regretfully his stay of three days will not permit him or the people to make the sort of contact that I am sure both would wish. Many cities and areas of Ireland would dearly like to have the Holy Father visit them even for a very short period; but it just is not possible. It is indeed a privilege for us all in Maynooth that the Pope will most likely spend part of his valuable Irish time in our midst.

John Paul 11 is a man of peace who has known the horrors of war. His homeland, Poland, has suffered from partition, religious persecution, centuries of conflict. Time and again since he became Pope this man 'who has been called from a distant country' has appealed for peace in the world. His visit to Ireland should mark the

occasion for us to renew out prayers and efforts for peace in our own troubled country; of one thing we can be certain: Pope John Paul understands what it is like to live with conflict, and his prayers on behalf of Ireland will be prayers from a sincere and understanding heart.

It would be superfluous here to dwell on his career as student, professor, President of a seminary, Archbishop, His intellectual ability and strong personality have been well and rightly stressed by commentators on television and in the newspapers all over the world. During the past year I have had the privilege of meeting him twice and attending his Mass several times. A man of God, prayerful and profound, he is also clearly a man at home in the world, a man of humour and humanity. We talked briefly about Maynooth : he was well aware of the proud tradition of the college as one of the world's greatest seminaries.

He was very pleased when I presented him with a copy of one of the periodicals published in the College, the Irish Theological Quarterly, which contained a learned article from his pen, written in 1976 when he was Archbishop Karol Wojtyla of Cracow. He expressed the

wish to see Maynooth some day; little did I think that within a few months that wish would be realised, and the College which has received so many distinguished persons during the course of its long history would in 1979 be given the supreme honour of receiving the Holy Father himself.

Details concerning the papal visit have yet to be completed. Because of his tight schedule his visit to the College will inevitably be brief. I am very senitive to the fact that, while in the College, he will be in the parish of Maynooth. I hope to make every effort to ensure that the people of the parish will have an opportunity of seeing the Holy Father, and hopefully, joining with him in prayer. According as more information concerning the visit is available l shall keep the parish informed. Meanwhile let us all pray that his visit to Ireland and to Maynooth will be a joyful one. Through his presence amongst us may blessings come upon our country, north and south, and, in a special way, may God's favour rest upon the Parish and college of Maynooth.

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ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE PHOENIX PARK

The following are some of the points that will effect the people from Maynooth who are going to the Phoenix Park on Saturday September 29th.

- 1) No traffic will be allowed past Lucan. From there a shuttle Bus service starting at 5 a.m. will operate to Stewart's Hospital in Palmerstown, and then you will have to walk to the Phoenix Park.
- 2) For the return journey the shuttle Bus service will again operate from Steward's Hospital in Palmerstown to Lucan with the last Buses running at about 11 p.m. on Saturday night.
- 3) There will be supervised car parking at Lucan.
- 4) All the Bus services from Lucan to Palmerstown will be express i.e. no stopping in between.
- Some Rail Stations which are now closed may be opened for the occasion. Check the National Papers for full details.
- 6) On arrival at the Park Gate everyone will be issued with sticker for your lapel. These stickers will have a Number and a letter. The number and letter will

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be clearly marked by big poster and this will be your spot.

- 7) It might be unwise to encourage anyone under 7 years to attend.
- 8) There will be avenues between each group of 1000 people and the Pope will drive down these after the Mass. Nobody will be more than 25 metres away from him as he passes.
- 9) There will be seating for the sick only. Everybody else should provide their own seating such as camp stools etc.
- 10) Go in your Parish Group if possible.
- 11) The Park will be open at 6 a.m. First comers will get the best places. The ceremonies will begin at 9.15 a.m.
- 12) During the Mass many people will be a long way from the altar. Binoculars would be a help.

These points are part of the general instructions being issued to the public. Further instructions apply to the sick and the Stewards, which can be got from the local organising Committees. There will be upwards of 500,000 people in the Park for this unique occasion but if everyone co-operates with the stewards there will be no fuss or cause for alarm.

Again we must stress that people will be a long time away from home. There will be no catering facilities in the Park, so bring sandwiches and flasks. Also bring warm clothing and rainwear particularly for the children and elderly.

Finally let us add a word of warning. In all crowds no matter what the occasion, pickpockets operate. So watch your possessions. It will be a pity if this unique and glorious event was marred by the loss of a purse, wallet, or other article.



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COAT OF ARMS OF POPE JOHN PAUL 11

The coat of arms of Pope John Paul 11 is intended as an act of homage to the central mystery of Christianity, the Remdemption.

And so the main representation is a cross, whose form however, does not correspond to the customary heraldic model. The reason for the unusual placement of the vertical section of the cross is readily apparent if one considers the second object inserted in the coat of arms -- the large and majestic capital M. This recalls the presence of Mary beneath the cross and her exceptional participation in the Redemption.

The great devotion of the Holy Father to the Virgin Mary is manifested in this manner, as it was also expressed in his motto as Cardinal Wojtyla: TOTUS TUUS (All yours). Nor can one forget that within the confines of the ecclesiastical province of Krakow, there is situated the celebrated Marian shrine of Czestochowa, where the Polish People for centuries fostered their filial devotion to the Mother of God.

Editorial



Maynooth is 'My Own Place' and has been so for many , many years and in my opinion biased though it may be, there is not a better place in which to live. You've got a University. first class Primary, Secondary and Vocational Schools; Childrens' Recreational Complex, Fire Brigade, soon-to-be-completed Medical Centre. the best Brass and Reed Band in the County and a host of Clubs and Associations to meet the needs of all ages. It speaks volumes for Maynooth that so many "runners-in" have become part and parcel of town life and have in fact taken up the challenge to make "My Own Place" a town of which to be proud. Apart from all these "necessities" where else can one find so many quiet, leafy lanes within a stone's throw of the Metropolis of Dublin. We in Maynooth have all the ingredients within it's confines to make it the envy of all who cross it's historical borders.

There are many peaceful walks so very close to the Town and perhaps those not too familiar with out treasures may like to don some walking shoes and join me on one of these. Let Is head out across the Pedestrian Footbridge? and up past Straffan Way and past the Hayshed-Garage-or-whatyou-may-call-it on your left. We then turn left at the twin olde-worlde cottages at Moneycooley (the turn before Dowdstown Stud to those not well versed in local Geography) where you are intoxicated, or otherwise by the pugent pine scents intermixed with fresh farmyard aromas wafting on the light Autumn breezes from the general direction of Brady's wooded farmland. Fortified, or otherwise, by these you then make the steady uphill climb and take the next turning left down towards Ballygoran Cross. Here on your left is one of the finest panoramic views in Maynooth where a lush carpet of green pastures rolls softly downhill broken only by the winding silver ribbon of road at Dowdstown. Freewheeling down through the 'Cross'

watch for the neat little cottages dotting the journey towards Pike Bridge and the Main Road. On the way you are again struck by the visual and aromatic splendour of a pine wood, this one surrounding Grangewilliam Stud, the approaches of which, in keeping with Stud Farms in general, are a sight to behold. Just past the Stud

you'll find some very fine newly built houses and past these on your right stands Grangewilliam Cemetary, stark and lonely amidst wide rolling fields. Because of its situation the Cemetary has become somewhat neglected but it is well worth braving the livestock to cross the field. scale the stile and explore the ruins of the old Church and the surrounding time worn headstones. Local rumour has it that St. Patrick once celebrated Mass in this Church and the inscriptions on the headstones are not a million years past his time either. Leaving here and reaching the Main Road we follow Carton Wall until it turns right at the Back Lane, near the lay-by, but travelling with it until we meet the bottom of Carton Avenue. 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

When the College opened in 1795 the number of students was 40. By 1799 it had grown to 119, and 1809 it was 250. This explains why the college itself had to grow steadily from the very beginning to try to accomodate them all. Even so during the early years Senior Students had to live outside in lodgings in the village. Between 1797 and 1829 new buildings went up, behind and to each side of Stoyte House and then behind at right angles to form three sides of a square. Meanwhile another chapter in Maynooth's History had opened and closed.

Today both the College and the Town are proud of the development of a University open to lay students and clerics, men and women. Not many people realise that in the early days there were lay students at Maynooth also, though only males in those more chauvinistic days. It will be remembered that the Act of Parliament under which the College was founded provided for an establishment for the education of "persons professing the Roman Catholic religion" This was intended and clearly worded to include lay students as well as candidates for the priesthood. The Irish bishops had originally wanted an institutfor the education of priests only but their political allies, including Edmund Burke, had pressed strongly that lay students whould be included. Plans for building accomodation for them was being discussed as early as 1796. The first lay students seem to have started in the College in 1800. Two years later the College acquired a new building for them. They bought Riverstown Lodge which today is the administrative centre, housing the offices of the President and the Bursar. Riverstown House is the oldest building on the campus. It was built by the same John Stoyte who later built and gave his name to the origin -al nucleus of the College. Riverstown House appears on a 1781 Map of Maynooth town on which there is only space at the territory later occupied by Stoyte House. Mr. Stoyte leased the house and grounds to Dean and Mrs Craddock. After her fusband's death Mrs. Craddock sold the property to the trustees. The lay College continued until 1817 when it closed down. It was developed in some respects as a separate establishment from the Ecclesiastical College, and a separate set of trustees was set up. The students however seem to have mixed for meals and some classes and in some of their leisure time. An interesting comment on the influence of the lay students upon their clerical coll. eagues comes from Dr. Healy, the author of the Centenary History of the College. Dr. Healy, who later became archbishop of Tuam, remards that the "mixing of the students may also help to explain the existence of that spirit of insubordination, which about this time was undoubtedly exhibited by some students of the Royal College" and considers that it was not altogethe, a matter for regret that the lay College closed down in 1871.

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OUR HERITAGE

were in a delicate position when they wished to look for increased money grants from the government for a sizable extension. Many people in England - and some in Ireland - sincerely believed that giving any money for the education of Catholic priests was in itself an immoral act. But just as fear of the influence of the French Revolution had helped to make the government favourable to the establishment of the College, now in the 1840s fear of Daniel O'Connell's Repeal Movement helped to win more money for its expansion. The Prime Minister, Sir Robert Peel made "the maynooth Grant" part of his policy of conciliation of Irish Catholics in the hope of winning them away from Repeal. Emotions ran high in the Parliamentary debates but the trustees got an increase in the Annual grant and a lump sum of £30, 000 for building and renovation. They engaged the English Architect Augustus Pugin to design the new buildings. Pugin was the most famous exponent of neo Gothic Architecture, an attempt to recreate the Gothic style of the middle ages. Three sides of another square went up between 18rt and 1850, the beautiful neo-Gothic front which forms the fourth or west side of St. Joseph's Square, and behind that two other sides.

Student life was hard in those early days. Cardinal O'Fiaich in his book 'MA NUAD' quotes a letter home from a student who was at the College between 1798 and 1802:-

'Our rooms are extremely cold; there being only one fire in the house I live in. The regulations of the house are very severe. We rise at six o'clock every morning; the business of the day begins with prayer, mediation and Mass, then study to breakfast; then half an hour of recreation; study again till 2 o'clock; then the English professor gives class till 3 o'clock; then dinner after which we have recreation for an hour. Then the business of the evening begins. At 9 o'clock we have prayers. Everyone is then to repair to bed.

We have bread and milk for break-fast and supper. We have flesh meat to dinner every day unless on fish days... The Duke of Leinster often visits us here. He is the most agreeable and affable gentleman I ever saw. Every Wednesday almost we visit his Demesne which is most spacious and beautiful, and of endless variety"

Today's students would find the time table somewhat restrictive though we may all envy the weekly visit to Carton.

Student numbers continued to grow and reached 450 by 1844. Between 1832 and 1834 two new buildings were added behind and to the south of the central block and behind Riverstown House. These were called Rhetoric and Logic Houses. But even with these the College was seriously overcrowded, with two. three, four or even more students sharing a bedroom. The trustees

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NUCLEAR POWER

contd. from Last issue

PART 2 - In part 1, I had a look at some of the problems which arise in connection with nuclear power. Here I present some of the arguments frequently heard, and why each of them has to be looked at in a different light in the context of nuclear power.

The greatest argument in the pro-nuclear camp seems to be that everything has risks. More people are killed in cars than in most wars. Alcohol ruins the lives of individuals and families.

Smoking shortens the lives of many people who smoke and possibly even of those who do not smoke such as the passengers in a bus or an unborn baby whose chances in its future life may be adversely affected. But strangely enough these risks are of a different sort to the ones involved in dealing with radio-activity. An individual may ruin his life but that does not ruin all human beings. One suicide does not lead to genocide. But radioactivity knows no bounds. The damage it does now may not be seen now, yet it can affect future generations of human beings, transforming them in some unknown fashion. The nuclear plant does not just do damage to the people who voluntarily work in it but also to all life in its vicinity. Here, the risk is not just that of an individual life but of a complete ecological system At present, there is much concern about the effect that the indiscriminate killing of seals and whales etc., is having on the balance of nature. The extinction of each species of life-form leaves a gap which will cause unknown change: in other life-forms which surround it. Such extinction is to be guarded against

Yet we may be practising just such an execution upon ourselves. Nobody is free from the effects of atomic radiation due to experiments (with bombs mostly) already carried out. Each of us has a larger than 'normal' amount of radiation in his or her system. Normal radiation is that which occurs without the aid of man and under which we have evolved.

What then are the economics of having nuclear energy? We need it in order to have enough energy to sup-

ply electricity to factories which will give more jobs in the future. Future is a relative term. The future in this context is a time of about thirty years starting about ten years from now. Will there be a future after that? That is the real question! Does it guarantee the jobs? Obviously not. With the present system of job creation the total number of jobs planned cannot be attained. It will not change in the future. "The best laid plans o'mice and men ... 'etc. In this case the grief and pain may be more than we bargained for. This is not to say that there is no point in trying to plan for future jobs. Of course it is necessary. But looking to nuclear power as a means of solving our energy problems is like looking to Dracula to solve a problem of blood shortage - he will solve the problem, but at a cost. What is needed is something which is based on our own natural re sources.

In business-life it is recognised that there are a number of strategies or possible ways of approaching any problem. Here are two. One may try for short-term goals and leave the long-run to take care of itself. As the economist Keynes said; In the long-run we are all dead' The 'we' in Keynes' statement meant individuals. As far as the individual is concerned there is no point in being concerned with success years after his life may be over. But the same cannot be said of communities or of countries. If by 'we' is meant 'a nation' then the statement makes slightly more horific reading.

The other strategy is to look for long-term results and lay the sound basis for this in the present. Short term set-backs may have to be encountered but an enlightened people will see the benefits that may be gained by this policy. This is true for all planning - and short-sightedness by builders of houses around Dublin has been condemned by many. (cf. N.I.E.C. report on planning 1970).

It is not unthinkable that house purchasers would accept less crowded estates, better built houses, more access to services, and many other things which would help them enjoy life in their chosen abode even though this may have

meant waiting a little longer to get such a place. Condemnations of nuclear power plants after their use will be too late.

Nuclear power is a short-term solution. It is hoped that fusion methods of producing energy will be found before the problem gets too large for Ireland. But why have anything to do with the problem? The only answer seems to be that the politics of the matter dictate that one does not just say that one is European - one must be seen to be European. And that may involve the use of nuclear power for other things as well as generating electricity; for instance, bombs. There are other ways of generating more electricity. It is obvious that we should be spending our money and energy on attempts to develope these rather than having anything to do with a system which is only beginning to cause nightmares for the people involved with it in other countries.

P.S. Murphy's Law states that if anything can possibly go wrong, sooner or later it will! And Murphy's Law has not been broken yet.

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


