Editorial

As yet, nobody has apportioned the blame or otherwise of the Bantry Bay disaster and it is not our intention to try. The disaster and the following inquiry does, however, set us thinking and we wonder if a disaster of a similar magnitude could happen here. Of course, we have no ships here with explosive cargoes, but we do have dangerous loads passing through by road and rail and with a denser population in this area we believe we are in constant danger.

Day by day we have petrol lorries and gas lorries very obviously passing through, possibly explosives and for all we know radio active material. What, if a serious accident should happen in the middle of the town with these, would be our fate? What would be the position if several tanks of acrylin were ruptured passing through the station with a northerly or southerly breeze blowing? What would be the position if any of these accidents occurred at night when people are asleep in bed ? The mind boggles at the possible consequences of such accidents.

There is no serious danger, we are told, but then we heard the same of Bantry. We have also read of the dreadful disaster at the Spanish holiday camp when a lorry load of gas exploded. We have also heard that a train with acrylin tanks was derailed some time ago, although at the time the acrylin tanks were empty. What if they were full ?

Day by day, night by night loads of petrol, gas, and goodness knows what else, hurdle through the town at a fast speed, frequently ignoring the speed limits. the 'law of averages' indicates that there will be an accident one day and we have no indication when or where it will be just a simple accident with no serious consequences. It is a very disturbing thought, especially at night.

Should there not be some very serious legislation about the carrying of dangerous cargoes through built up areas ? (Any area for that matter). Should such loads be allowed to hurtle through towns, especially at night ? Should there not be some advance notice when lethal loads are passing through an area ? Do all politicians live in 'safe' areas and therefore choose to ignore a serious problem ? Do we have to wait until a few hundred people die, or are maimed before something is done ?

These are questions which deserve alot of consideration. They concern your welfare. What are you going to do about it. It is not up to your neighbour, it's up to you ! Do something before it's too late !




Our Annual Trip to the Sea-side at Skerries took place on Sunday, the 12th August. The Day was lovely and both Children and adults had a lovely time.

Community Council News




We are having an open meeting in the Parish Hall on Tuesday August 28th at 8.3D p.m. to discuss this and a large turnout is requested.





MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY PLAYGROUP

contd. from Last Issue

The biggest success of the year is our children. The numbers on our Books have now reached 34. Of those 20 are an age for the Senior Room. We usually have an attendance of 17 per day. The change that has occured in the 6 months since the beginning of the group is quite extra-ordinary. Each of the children have their own personality, and one of the most pleasant aspects of Playleader is getting to know them all.

The independence which is so import ant and yet the need for mother which is still so much part of the 3 year old. But now they are all familiar with the Playleaders and each other. The roles are interchanged a dozen times in one session. Mother one minute, baby next, auntie in the following game, space man when the mood changes, the choice is endless - and the enjoyment boundless. The children who joined the group as shy and rather reluctant to socialise, now mingle and chat quite happily. The jigsaw genius shows some other person where the mistakes are. The Mother gets lunch for her brood, while the book-worm gathers the faithful few to listen to the often repeated favourite story which has been learned by heart. There are no longer those "sho only stand and watch" so to speak, all now contribute in some way or other to the activity which buzzes on throughout our sessions, The shy ones whose colours are so extravagent and draw admiration from others.

It is fascinating to watch and learn from each one. How important acceptance is, how necessary discipline and rules are in order to feel safe. What fun it is to be a girl for a change, the strange sensation of silk or satin against legs which are normally encased in denim The pride of achievement and success when one has mastered the task, be it jigsaw or the knack of setting pegs in boards The praise thus merited is so valued, it is placed along side Mum's pleasure on being shown a portrait of herself Speech has shown a marked improvement and vocabulary has increased The toddlers have also benefited greatly from this first two terms of social experience Many Mums have said the children are less frustrated They are easier to communicate with and


they share more readily They have facilities in the group which many would not have at home Their mums enjoy the contact with each other and find the group an outlet for their energies They have worked hard in the day to day running of the sessions as well as the special events

The year so far has been hard and demanding for all of those involved The children have played hard, the parents and friends collected equipment and finance items for sale and experience-We all look back with pleasure on the fun and hard work, achievement and worry. The good has definitely out weighed the bad. It has been all in all a very satisfying year. Let's hope we can continue along the road to success at the same rate in the future.

SEQUEL:-

Having thrived up to the Summer of '78, the playgroup closed for the school holidays. We had said Goodbye to one of our leading lights -Kaye Harte, when she had moved to Cork. Next we had the bitter sweet experience of saying farewell to the school goers. They had each a special part in the first year of the playgroup Now we must look forward to the beginning of the new year in September. During the Summer various pieces of equipment were painted and renovated. New toys and books were acquired. I, Carmel Hogan went away on a resedential training course with the IPPA. In September, our roll book crammed, and enthusiasm blazing we reopened. The first week or two was fairly chaotic, but that was only to be expected, as a new group of children got to know each other and myself and Mary Simon (who now attended full time also as Playleader).

We called an A.G.M. and had almost total attendance by both fathers and mothers. As usual with any nonprofit making group Fund raising was high on the list of priorities. Various ideas were put forward and the two most favoured were a Supper Night and a raffle. A sub. committee was formed and plans were made. Looking back, I begin to wonder if perhaps the 'FATES' were against us, The Supper Dance plans were foiled on a number of fronts The disappointment was intense, and a raffle did



not hold much attraction. Mean-while I became ill and had to leave Mary Simon to hold the fort having been dropped into things at the deep end. She was coping admirably when disaster struck again, Mrs. Delaney had to go into hospital and would not be available to transport the children up and down. This was great loss as the convenience of collection, and the joys of the Bus Ride were a great advantage we felt. The number of children attending dropped as colds and flu took there toll, Even when Mrs. Delaney had recovered and no one could ever say she delayed one day longer than she actually had to, the changed weather brought our numbers down to an average of 10 However, we all looked forward to the New Year, and perhaps leaving all our bad luck behind us. But our cruel opponent the weather again managed to interfere with our best laid plans. The pipes in the Geraldine Hall froze over and burst and we could not open as planned. Suitable alternative accommodation proved impossible to find for our children and equipment

We held a meeting last week in the Geraldine Hall. Having seen the wonderful work that has been done and how well the hall looked, we determined to continue. Our flagging spirits revived, and we look forward to the completion of the Hall and the re-opening of our School. Let us hope that a favourable change in our fortunes will come around, and that Maynooth will not loose a valuable community service, in this the year of the child. We hope to improve the facilities we provide for the children and increase the involvement and pleasure of the adults.


HELLO CHILDREN



1- Minutes of Previous A.G.M. & supplementary notes on Special General Meeting.




Maynooth Athletic Club contd.


