



Editorial

The daily newspapers from time to time can make rather depressing reading. Times have certainly changed and one is inclined to wonder what has happened to the "ISLAND OF SAINTS AND SCHOLARS". Whatever about Scholars, the Saints seem to have taken quite a beating.

In the not so distant past, one could walk the Streets and even the lonely roads with mor or less complete safety but, of late, it appears to be getting more dangerous for young and old alike to be on the streets at all. With frightening regularity we read of attacks and interferance with young and old, robbery, rape and goodness knows what else. If the situation is allowed to deteriorate much further, it will be very dangerous indeed to use the roads and streets, at all, especially after dark.

We wonder exactly why this state of affairs should be and why it is that nothing seems to stem this side of lawlessness. There are many theories, of course, but nothing very definite seems to come to light. Many blame television, or films or books but perhaps the more likely is lack of parental control. There is a saying that says, more or less -- "As the young shoot is trained, so the tree will bend" (or words to that effect).

These, however, are theories that require alot of discussion and are being considered by people who are trained for such matters. The real question for us is "What can we do ourselves about the unfortunate situation". We can, for one thing all be on the lookout for any lawless or unorderly conduct, take a note and report it to the proper authorities. It is a well known fact that we Irish are not inclined to report matters to the Garda, whom we pay to protect us. It is an old Irish trait from our 'occupation' days when it was considered to be 'helping the enemy'. It is time we overcame this trait and got over the 'informer' Complex. The only ones who fear or dispise an 'informer' are those who have something to hide and are therefore not worth consideration.

Another way we can help is by not leaving ourselves open -- Do not carry large sums of money on your person, or, if you do - do not allow it to be seen. Ladies and girls, do not travel about alone in the late evening or at night if possible . it is not cowardly, it is sensible. Young girls in particular -- do not hitch lifts from strangers on your own particularly at night or late in the evening .. it is highly dangerous. We cannot stress this enough. It is amazing that girls will still hitch lifts at all, particularly after the recent unfortunate occurances in the County.

There are many other ways of helping to stem this recent wave of crime if we only be sensible and have a bit of courage. If we do not try to help ourselves matters will only get worse.

I am to refer to representations which you have made from time to time regarding the provision of a bus terminus at the Greenfield Estate, Maynooth, and I am to inform you that Coras Iompair Eireann are satisfied with the side at the junction of the Celbridge/Straffan Road. Maynooth. The provision of a turning point here would involve building a new piece of road and it would require a special allocation of money.

The matter has been referred to the Road Design Section so that a proper scheme can be prepared and arrangements are being made to make provision for the finance, to carry out this work, in the 1980 Estimates.






ST. MARY'S BRASS & REED BAND



I would like to avail of the services of your Newsletter once again to thank all my friends and neighbours in Maynooth for the help they continue to extend to me and to the work here in Pakistan, particularly the development projects here in the Diocese of Rawalpindi. Last year I appealed for help to build a Church - Community Centre in one of the outstations of the parish of Sargodha, a place called Bhalwal. I am happy to be able to tell you all that the project is now complete and we have the first Mass there on Christmas Day. The amount contributed to this project by my friends in Maynooth was £1500. This was a tremendous help because without it our building would be without a roof today. The usefullness of such a building for community building is absolutely marvelous. We plan to have adult literacy programmes there: a sewing centre for girls who have never been to school; a centre for a young boys' club and a place in which the community elders can meet and plan for community activities. And of course it will be a place in which the people can pray and attend their monthly Mass.

I will be 15 years in Pakistan in 1980 and all through these years I have received continous help from my friends in Maynooth. I would like to thank especially Mr. Gerard MacTiernan, and his helpers for their untiring work. Also Mrs. Hannah Flood of Main Street as well as all my many friends who have never failed in supporting the

work here. The very fact that one is remembered with love and that the interest in what goes on here has never weakened, is in itself a tremendous source of courage and hope.

May I also thank all those concerned with the Newsletter for their work. My family send the Newsletter to me every month and that helps me to keep abreast with all that is going on at home. I enjoy reading the Newsletter every time.

I never fail to say a prayer for you all, especially at Christmas.

May God bless you all and grant you all a very Happy and Holy Christmas and many blessings in the year ahead.

ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE, MAYNOOTH

EXTRA MURAL STUDIES PROGRAMME - SPRING

A series of Short Courses are being held in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, during the forthcoming term. These courses are designed to help adults (young and old) understand and reflect on many of the changes, which are affecting their lives to-day. These short programmes of participative learning will, in general, be given by members of the Academic Staff of the College.

MONDAY: SPACE-AGE ASTRONOMY

This short course of six lectures with discussions is designed to provide a general introduction to the splendours of Astronomy. An account will be presented of such objects as Red Giants, White Dwarfs, Pulsars and Black Holes while special emphasis will be given to recent results obtained with satellites and deep space probes. The treatment will be entirely non-mathematical and participants require no previous knowledge of physics or astronomy.

- LECTURER: Dr. Susan McKenna-Lawlor, F.R.A.S. Dept. of Experimental Physics, St. Patrick's College, Maynooth
- TUESDAY: OPERA APPRECIATION The lectures will illustrate (with recordings, etc) the development of Opera from the 18th to the 20th century, including a detailed discussion on selected Operas from the German, Italian and Russian 19th century traditions, and an Introduction to Opera of the 20th century. References will be made to Operas being produced in Ireland during the coming year.
- LECTURER: Mr. Anthony Quigley
- WEDNESDAY: CHILD CARE DEVELOPMENT AND GUIDANCE This course examines the different aspects of the growth and development of young children and early adolescents. The role and functions of parents in child development are studied with the help of practical examples. This course is particularly suitable for parents of young children, teachers, etc. During this course, the problems of child development as presented by the participants will also be discussed, etc.
- LECTURER: Dr. John Cullen and Members of the Dept. of Psychiatry, U.C.D.
- THURSDAY: YOUTH LEADERSHIP The aim of this course is to provide the participants with a basic knowledge of the psychological, emotional and social processes associated with adolescence and with the behaviour patterns which result from these processes. In this context the course hopes to introduce the participants to some basic practices of youth work, e.g. setting up youth clubs, club structures and programme planning. The course should be of benefit to people working with youth and those working in youth organisations and youth clubs.
- LECTURER: Mr. Tom Collins, M.A. and Members of the Centre for Adult & Community Education.
- VENUE: The Courses will be held in the New Arts Block (New Campus). Each course will begin at 8.00 p.m. and conclude at 9.30 p.m. The fee per single course is £4.00 and enrolment is on the opening night of the course or by advance booking on application forms received from The Secretary, Centre for Adult & Community Education, St. Patrick's College, Maynooth Telephone 286261 Ext.203.

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


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ANONYMOUS LETTERS







A great night was had by 61 people which included many children of members, at the Pantomime in the Gaiety, when seven of the children made their 'debut' on the stage and did their party piece.




Dear Councillor,

Editorial

In all walks of life and, particularly in local affairs, there are projects of various kinds that are not fully covered by the benevolent State or Local Authority. There are also items which might, or should properly be covered by Government or Local Authority and which somehow do not seem to get done except by the strenuous pu shing of some local group or organisation. At such times it is quite common to hear the cry - "Somebody should do something about it" but unfortunately there are very few civic spirited enough to actually do something.

The position has been reached here in Maynooth where there are many things that' 'somebody should do something about' but there does not seem to be any rush by anybody to take the necessary action. We have, (or is it had?) our Community Council which was, some years ago, elected with a great flourish of trumpets and which did, at the beginning, make considerable headway on our behalf, but which has now apparently stagnated and run itself out. That is should 'run itself out' is not a great surprise because, apart from the fact that it received little support during its lifetime, it can easily have been said to have received considerable hindrance. After the first few years (or even within the first year) interest started to wane on the part of the public and even on the part of some of the Councillors. The few really interested ones tried hard to keep things moving but it would appear that even they have now given up the battle and it is hard to blame them.

We have, in these columns, many times berated the people of Maynooth for apathy or, in plain words, for laziness in looking after their own interests, for lack of public spirit and true co-operation and nowhere is this more apparent than in the demise of the Community Council. We have just heard that what appears to be the final meeting of the Council on Tuesday last did not even produce a quorum.

The Community Council is not the only disgrace to the town as a whole - the lack of co-operation in the completion of the Sports Field is another. We could go on and on about lack of public spirit but it is too depressing. It would appear that there is practically nobody left who will give a few miserable hours in the year of their leisure time to make Maynooth into what could be one of the finest towns in Ireland to live in. WAKE UP MAYNOOTH , you are missing alot by sheer laziness.



The Maynooth delegates attended a Meeting of the Constituency Council on Thursday 7th February. An item of major interest was the forth coming re-drawing of constituency boundaries and many were of the opinion that Maynooth may be dropped from Dublin County West and revert to Kildare Constituency. The monthly Branch Meeting was held on Sunday 10th February at 11.30 a.m. Councillor Emmet Stagg, who attended, gave details of correspondence from Malachy Jenkin in which he promises to expedite repairs to some footpaths in the town and also to sections of the Maynooth-Dunboyne Road. An engineers report is pending on the siting of the Tank in Maynooth Mart, which has been a subject of some controversy recently. A list of defective E.S.B. lights and a list of areas prone to flooding were given to Councillor Stagg who will also expedite the connection of 16 more houses on the Moyglare Road to the new sewerage system.

The Maynooth Branch of the Labour Party is growing at a phenomenal rate. Thanks to the tireless work of the Committee, membership has snowballed and numbers have increased four fold in 2 months. This must be some kind of a record !! Many people have expressed interest in attending our next meeting which will be held, as usual, in the Geraldine Hall at 11.30 a.m. on the 2nd Sunday of the month. When one considers that we have not yet begun to canvass the hundreds of newcomers to the area, the signs are indeed promising that the 'Labour Party' has a decisive role to play in Maynooth.





MOTION - "That further public lighting be provided at Laraghbryan"

I recommend that extra public lighting be provided at the above loccation in the interest of pedestrian safety. I shall arrange for it to be included in the 1980 orders in conjunction with the estimates.

* *

QUESTION - "Can this Council indicate its plans for the conservation of Carton Avenue, Maynooth." ?

The conservation of Carton Avenue, Maynooth is an Objective of the County Development Plan. This Avenue is in private ownership and its amenty aspects have been safeguarded. If the trees come under threat, the placing of a Tree Preservation Order would be considered.

The trees are important in that they form a continuous link between Carton and Maynooth College, the planting being continued along the Main Street, which trees incidentally, were also owned by the Carton Estate.

It would be worthwhile public acquisition if the Council were to acquire and manage the Avenue as it stands.

MOTION - "that this Council would make the necessary arrangements to acquire amenity lands in Maynooth and also in other towns in the County with expanding populations"

As part of its policy for the provision of amenity and recreational facilities within the county, Kildare County Council, some years ago, identified the three priority areas in which land should be obtained for amenity and recreational purposes as Leixlip, Celbridge, and Newbridge.

The availability of land for amenity purposes in the adjacent to these 3 towns has been investigated and progress has been made in regard

to the acquisition of land for amenity purposes in the Newbridge area. The possible availability of land for amenity purposes in Leixlip and Celbridge is being investigated in respect of certain specific areas of land, and if the matters which are outstanding can be resolved satisfactorily, the Council will be advised.

A major factor in relation to this matter is the availability of finance to acquire land and to carry out development work. The finance available to the Council is limited in this regard.

Should it be decided to add Maynooth to the list of towns I have already mentioned, an effort can be made to try and identify suitable land in this regard and any suggestion which the Councillors for the area may have, or any assistance they may be able to give in identifying lands which may be available for sale, at a reasonable cost, would be welcomed.

* * *

Re:- condition of the footpath between Laraghbryan and Maynooth.

I refer to your representations of the 3rd. instant, regarding the above, and I wish to inform you that the Area Engineer carried out the cleaning and maintenance of the above footpath, but no money is available this year for any improvement to be carried out to same. The engineer has indicated that he will keep the improvement of the footpath in mind and the necessary finance may be available early in the new Year.


EVERYONE WELCOME

MOTION- "That Bord Na Mona be asked to ensure that adequate supplies of fuel are available to the people of County Kildare "

I have made enquiries with Bord Na Mona regarding fuel supplies in the current year.

The position is that, the Bord sold 650,000 tons of machine turf in the year ended March 1979, and it is intended to sell an equal amount of turf in the year ending March 1980. I am advised that all the turf which could be produced this year was produced. Inaddition to this, briquette production has been at a peak for some time now, and a total of 350,000 tons of this fuel is being produced per annum at the moment. A briquette factory at Littleton, County Tipperary, is under construction at the moment, and fuel from it should "come on steam" in 1981.

There has been a very substantial growth in the demand for the Bord's fuel in recent years and the Bord is making every effort to meet this demand.

QUESTION - "Would this Council consider with favour the establish-- ment of any further Museum's in the County, under the auspices of the National Museum"?

The general principle of the establishment of a Museum in this County is an objective of the County Development Plan and a site has been ear-marked at Claregate Street and outline plans have been prepared.

The establishment of a central Museum in Kildare would stand a great chance of achievement if as suggested it came under the auspices of the National Museum. 1 consider that it would be worthwhile if the Council are agreeable to issue a request to the National Museum to support the Council's project.

Re:- Provision of Litter Bins on the N4 at the entrance to O'Neill Park, Maynooth

* * *

I refer to your representations regarding the above matter, and I wish to inform you that the Area Engineer is arranging to supply the small type of litter bin. The large type of litter bins are too expensive to provide out of maintenance.

I refer to your representations regarding the resurfacing of the footpath from the village to the Roman Catholic Church at Maynooth,

* * *

It is extremely unlikely that anything can be done on this footpath in the current year because of the current restraints on Local Authorities' spending. However, I have asked the County Engineer to examine the footpath and to include finance for its resurfacing in the 1980 Provisional Estimates, if he considers this approiate.

Subject to the granting of suitable allocation, the work could proceed in the current year.

MOTION - "That this Council would make arrangements to undertake the provision of the second phase of the Maynooth Housing Scheme at Greenfield"


In relation to above Notice of Motion from Councillor B. Durkan, it is noted that the first phase of 37 houses is at present in progress and due to be completed in April 1980.



In reply to your letter of the 5th Dec. 1979, I desire to inform you that the current number of applications received for the new houses in Maynooth is sixty-eight.

As you know, the batch of nine sites are being developed at the present time by direct labour and while the exact cost is not yet known it is felt that the price of each site to successful applicants will be in the region of £2,500 to £3,000 each.

Editorial

Although the danger of war is no nearer now than it has been for many years past, it is no harm to consider from time to time how we are prepared should the worst happen. Prepared, not in the military sense, but in the sense of survival as it is highly unlikely that we will be actively engaged in a coming war but it is to be expected that we may be effected by the spill-over from atomic warfare in the line of radio-active fall-out. A recent article in the Sunday independent which many of you probably read covered this pretty well. It pointed out that atomic explosions in Britain could, if the wind were in the right direction, produce fall-out in this area. It is therefore important that we should be prepared.

Contrary to what some people think, there is quite alot we can do to protect ourselves from atomic fall-out and there is no reason why we should not all survive if we do what is right. The Government are providing for this in the Civil Defence Service and have plans made for all contingencies. The implementation of these plans however depend on there being a properly organised Service in each area with trained personnel. The trouble is that should a war situation arise, we might not have sufficient time to organise the areas so it is important that in peace time we prepare.

If we consider our own area here from the fore-going, we are in trouble should there be a sudden emergency as there are not sufficient personnel in the Service to cope. On a rough estimate in a wartime situation we would require 50-60 trained or at least semi-trained WARDENS to look after Maynooth and the surrounding area. At the moment we understand there are only four. When the service commenced some 20 - 25 years ago, there were 20 - 25 members but time has taken its toll and most of these are now dead or left the area. It is therefore im portant that we should rebuild the Service in this area in our own interests.

Apart from the Warden Service there are also the Casualty, Rescue and Fire Fighting Services so there is room for young and old. The Dictrict Warden in this area, Ted Kelly of Main Street, is in charge of recruiting and he is anxious that any volounteers should contact him or drop him a note and he will con tact them with a view to arranging training. The training course, we under stand is minimal with just a very odd refresher so duties are not demanding.

The group took in Rouen on the next day with its Cathedral, Big Clock (Gros Horloge) and Square, where Joan of Arc was burned.





LABOUR PARTY NEWS


The monthly meeting was held on 9th March in the Geraldine Hall. In order to keep up our momentum in recruiting new members to the Labour Party, we intend to invite a Senior member of the Party (perhaps a T.D. or Senator) to address a public meeting in Maynooth, at which all will be welcome. More details on that next month. We will also be actively canvassing in the area once a month ; Councillor Emmet Stagg and a representative of the Committee will be calling doorto-door, and your comments, queries, or complaints about local matters will receive a sympathetic hearing. The Social Evening mentioned last month has been tentatively arranged for July 18th in the Hitchin' Post and we hope to engage the services of Ronnie Medford and his Band. Confirmation of the date and quest artist will be given in next months report and tickets will be available at £1.50 each.

The only bright note in the dis cussion about local roads and amenities was the report that the Straffan Road footbridge is now under construction. Councillor Stagg will use his good offices to investigate the reasons for the non-completion of the footpath on the Dunboyne Road which is still awaiting a coat of Tarmac. The problem of holes being dug by a JCB and left unfilled near Leinster Cottages will be looked into and the leaning Traffic Bollard of Maynooth, which is in the same area, will have to be repaired as it is in a dangerous condition.

The County Council is short of money for much needed repairs to the Celbridge and Dunboyne roads and this lack of funds is reflected in the meagre number of houses built by the County Council in the past year. We may not be paying rates on our houses any more, but we are all paying in the long run for the shortage of money available to Local Authorities.

There have been 126 applications for the 38 Local Authority houses now nearing completion in Maynooth and Councillor Stagg made the point that local people will not get priority over other applicants from within the county. As the County Medical Officer makes the final decisions as to the allocation of these houses. any local people who are applying and who have pressing medical or social problems because of their present living conditions should enclose a note to this effect with their application. Where possible, the claim should be substantiated by a Doctor's report or a letter from a Social Worker.

The housing and health situation is not going to improve in 1980, as Co. Kildare is restricted to a 10% rate increase, against an expected in flation of 15 - 20%, and the government

has allocated £3 m less to the Eastern Health Board this year.

In an area where inflation is likely to be of the order of 25%, this is a savage cut-back to vital services. With the grim prospect of our Local Authorities having to go to the Banks in order to borrow money for the dayto-day running of their affairs, the future looks bleak indeed.

The next meeting of the Branch will be held on Sunday 13th April at 11.30 a.m. in the Geraldine Hall.



Many people probably saw on T.V. recently the six part documentory on the micro-processor. The series traced the history of the computer, the affect it is having today on society, industry, finance and the in fluence it will have in the develop ment of these and many other areas in the future. Indeed, there are few areas which will escape the influence of the micro-processor. Among the many theories put forward were the abolition of money as we know it today, changing work habits and patterns, world wide instant communication, futility of nuclear war etc. etc. All in all, it was a very thought provoking series and like all aids the mighty microprocessor has its good points and its bad ones. However, one thing is certain the micro-processor is here to stay.

It is very important, therefore, that people are educated in its uses and workings.

The Department of Education is introducing a course in Computer studies next year on an experimental basis and students in the senior cycle in some schools will have the opportunity of taking it as an optional extra in the Leaving Cert. examination. Students attending Post-Primary School in Maynooth are fortunate that they will be able to participate in this pilot course because not along is there a "'Mighty Micro" in the school but there is also a teacher qualified to teach the course as set out below.

NOTES FROM CLLR. DURKAN

CIIr. Durkan reports that he has again expressed his concern at the delay in the completion of the houses in Greenfield, the new completion date appears to be the end of June. This is most unsatisfactory, since great hardship is caused by the continued postpone ment of the completion of these hous es and consequently their allocation.

At a recent Eastern Health Board meeting CIIr. Durkan welcomed the revised qualifying income guidlines for elegibility for Medical Cards, but suggested that the income limits should be revised on a quarterly basis in order to keep in step with current rates of inflation.



Maynooth's new branch library will have an exhibition area in front of the building and the new Celbridge building will have accommodation on the first floor.





The administrative officer replied that in all there should be 175 starts in 1979 and the Department would require to give £1.8 million to complete these. An indication had been received from the Department that this amount would be available. As far as new starts are concerned, in 1980, it is noted that Schemes at Celbridge (20 houses plus 6 private building sites) and Newbridge (50 houses plus 50 private building sites) are next on the Council's Priority Lists.

Editorial

The mere mention of itinerants can, at times, be rather emotive and can rise many to a passion. Whilst some arguments can be put forward in their defence there is no doubt that they can, and do frequently, cause a great deal of distress and annoyance to settled people.

A recent rumour that an itinerant settlement was to be set up at Maynooth on the old site for the swimming pool, at the back of Main Street, has proved to be untrue and many will give a sigh of relief. It does not, however, eliminate the itinerant problem in our area.

A run around the roads skirting the town will often show as many as five to six encampments in the area and certain places are completely fouled, after successive camps, with litter ranging from rags to car bodies, etc. The streets are thronged, from time to time, with begging children who should be at school whilst their parents can be seen later in the evening rolling out of the pubs and driving off in rickety vehicles that should not be on the road at all.

Members of the settled community can only look at this and wonder if there is not a special set of laws for these people who seem to thumb their noses at the laws governing the rest of us. Should we, in the settled community, litter the area we would soon be under the observation of the law. Should we not send our children to school, or if we sent them out to beg daily, or if we left them to sleep on wet straw, they would soon be taken into 'CARE'. If our children were allowed by us to do violence to other children we, and they, would soon receive the full brunt of the Law.

Why then do it inerants appear to be allowed to ignore the laws of the land ? Why do they appear to be a privileged class who cannot be touched by existing law? Why are they not treated like us ? These are fair questions and have not been adequately answered by the Authorities.

Maynooth has far more than its share of itinerants and of the depredations of many of them, and if the Authorities will not ban them from this area, they are entitled to protect our persons and property. If something is not done to crub their activities around here shortly people may tend to take matters into their own hands and ugly incidents may occur. The Authorities cannot say that they have not been warned and they will have to accept the responsibility.







LABOUR PARTY NOTES



The rubbish dumped at Rail Park boreen will be cleared and a "NO DUMPING" sign erected.


The grass in Laraghbryan Cemetery has been cut and arrangements are being made to have it removed.

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

Department.





HANDING ON THE FAITH IN THE HOME contd. from June issue

It is not so much a question of handing on a set of truths or facts. It is a more a matter of keeping hands linked with the young faithful who will follow us. It is a matter of training and forming the next "relay team" of young believers.

If we have the precious gift of faith today, this is because the parents and fam ilies of the past knew it was their primary duty as Catholics, to teach the faith to their children.

We in Ireland must never imagine that parents do not need to teach religion be cause we have Catholic schools to do that.

Unless there is religion in the home the most excellent school or teacher will never completely make up for what is missing in the children's experience.

Parents remain and always will remain the first and the most important teachers of the faith to their children.

No teacher, no religion programme, no priest even, will ever replace the parents in that task, will never make up fully for their neglect. No priest can dispense parents from their obligation ; because the obligation comes from God.

OUR CATHOLIC SCHOOLS AND TEACHERS :-

Our Catholic schools do an outstanding job in teaching religion. Our Catholic teachers have done more for the faith in Ireland than any other group of lay men and women. We do not perhaps fully realise the way in which the Church in Ireland, through the work of Catholic teachers, pioneered the practice of the lay apostolate.

The whole Church in Ireland, the Bishops, the clergy, the parents, the whole Christian community, owes an immense debt of gratitude to those dedicated men and women, who are the Catholic teachers of Ireland. We Bishops gladly take this opportunity of expressing to them our appreciation, our admiration and gratitude.

Dear Parents, we beg you to make no mistake about it : no school, excellent though our schools are, no teacher, dedicated and gifted though our teachers are, will ever have the influence on your childrenJs religion that you yourselves have. On you yourselves, more than on anyone else, the religious life and future of your children depend.

It is not enough, therefore, for parents to make sure that their children faithfully attend school. Parents must also take a real interest in the way their children in school are being taught religion, and in what they are being taught. They must let the children see that they are interested. Children, particularly small children, just love to talk at home about what they learned that day at school. Children are hurt and may lose interest in religion classes unless parents make the time to listen to their little gospel stories to admire their work-books and listen to their children explaining what these mean.

THE NEW CATECHETICAL PROGRAMME

The way of teaching religion nowadays is greatly changed from the past. The world has changed so much in the past ten years that it is not surprising that the ways of teaching religion had to change too, if religion is to be related to today's very different world. The new primary religion programme is a great boon.

But because the programme is new, parents need help to understand it, and to know what lies behind it. They need help to understand how the religion taught through the new programme is the same integral and identical faith as the one that they learned in the old Catchism. It is only the words and expressions, and the methods used in religion classes, which have changed.

The faith itself has not changed. The faith itself does not, cannot, will not, ever change from that one true faith of our fathers.

The whole pastoral programme which we are launching with this Letter is planned so as to help parents and the whole community to play their part in making the new religion programme the great means for renewal of the faith in our land which it can be and should be, and which it will be, if we all play our part.

WE SPEAK TO CHILDREN TOO

We Bishops want to speak also to the children themselves. To you children your Bishops want to say :

"When you come home from school each day, be sure to talk to your parents, about what you learned in religion class today. Show your parents your religion book. Explain the pictures to them. Tell them the interesting stories you have leaned about Jesus.....

Show your parents all the ways you hold your hands when you are praying 'OUR FATHER' Sing for your parents the prayers you learned to sing in school. Be sure never to forget your morning prayers. Never go to bed at night with out asking Mammy or Daddy or both of them to pray your night prayers along with you, "

LOVE IN THE HOME

Parents, now we turn to you again. There must be religion in your homes. There must be faith in the home. But there is no faith without love. St. John tells us : "God is love"

If children do not find love in their home, then something goes wrong with their belief in God. Parents may not always realise that the way husband and wife love one another is a very important part of the religious training of their children.

In far too many homes there is a sad lack of tenderness, and a gruff avoidance of signs of affection, between husbands and wives.

There can be sullen lack of trust and openness, between children and parents, Young people have a very great need of understanding and acceptance, of affection and security.

Dear parents, the greatest need your children have is that you should take time to spend with them, that you should take time to talk with them, that you should make time to listen to them. You may ask, what all this has to do with religion. But religion is involved in all this. God is being made present through love in the home. Or God is being excluded through lovelessness in the home.

Pope John Paul said in Limerick -

"Married people must believe in the power of the sacrament of marriage to make them holy. They must believe in their vocation to witness through their marriage to the power of Christ's love. True love and the grace of God can never let marriage become a self-centred relationship of two individuals living side by side for their own interests"





GRANGEWILLIAM



The most intriging thing I have found about Ireland is that just when you least expect it you turn a corner, and there is a beautiful building. It could be very old, 12th or 13th cen tury or a bungalow of the thirties while cottages have a timeless quality all their own. The larger cottages built by the government, with the brick trim, around the turn of the century and still scattered around. little gems of terraces, identical, but somehow presenting much more character than their modern counterparts. Why people don't build large cottages now with all the mod. cons, instead of a five bedroom status symbol with Spanish Arches I will never understand.

On walks, fields can unexpectedly present you with a ruin of a church, a tumble down cottage or an elaborate bridge just for the cattle. The sense of someone having been there before is rather comforting. This feeling of being the next in a long line of people doing the same thing has never been stronger than at Grangewilliam.

Walter Fitzgerald Duke of Leinster was a historical fruit and nut case. history was his hobby and his passion. His occupation being Duke, and we'll assume gentleman, he had ample opportunity to indulge himself as an active member of the Kildare Arch eological Society. Right on his very door step was Grangewilliam Cemet ary in use since at least the 4th & 5th century. With all the estate workers of Carton at his disposal, Walster in 1902, had Grangewilliam cleaned and tidied and personally went around examing each stone carefully. He found two stones worthy of note and commented on them in the Journal of the Kildare Archeological Society. One, historicly unimportant was nevertheless quite interesting. It read:-

> Here lies old Joe an honest man Say more of Mortal if you can Joseph Foster died 1781 an employee of Carton.



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
Convent Lane The other was an opham stone im portant enough to show 'an earlier era of life in the Maynooth area'. Where he found it he didn't say but we know where it is today in the bowels of the National Museum where it can be visited by appointment only. At least it's warm and dry and cared for by a very nice young woman who assured me that she had looked in on it for me and that it was doing very well for its' age. The last time somebody asked after it was in 1932 and then it seemed to have been mislaid. As for the other it was left to fend for its' self in Grangewilliam somewhere on the north side but since that is the old est the most overgrown part it has so far failed to come to light.

We, Ann Kelly, Eithne Bean, Eláine Bean, John Bean, K. McKeogh, June Eiffe of An Taisce, Leixlip, Charlie Pegley and myself (Suzanne Pegley) have been working now at Grangewilliam since the beginning of June. Grangewilliam continued.

We have been up there at least twice a week but so far have made hardly any impression overall. We are moving slowly for two reasons; firstly we are only enthusiastic amateurs and therefore inexperienced in this kind of work and secondly we have't half the equipment we need. We have the sum total of one saw, one scythe, one knife, and two broken slash hooks. We had hoped that af ter Supple and Father Roew's appeal there would be people working on their family plots with all sorts of amazing implements and then we would only need to go around in between the very old plots. There has been a few families who have been cleaning their own plots including an elderly Mr. Nevin who seems to be one of the very few people today who knows how to use a scythe.

Grangewilliam is, as I have been told over and over, a County Council graveyard but how can they spend time and manpower and that means money on a cemetary which is full and there fore closed. Its' residents are past expressing their approval at the ballot box, maybe they do express their disapproval by nocturnal wand ering but who is close enough to know, and most graveyards don't have a residents association to put forward their proposals for improvements. So it comes down to us to do the work of the County Council no matter how much we may dislike the idea. It is either the roads or the cemetaries and the priorities are the roads.

If the Irish population continues to let their past slip into decay it 's much talked about unique character



will be lost. Progress of the 20th century must not become the new god to which all these smaller examples of previous achievements are sacrificed. From the cast iron pumps at the side of the road to old Mrs Murphy's stone cottage, threatened by housing development, the shop front that a chain store wants to cover with slick plastic and jazzy advertizing, the cobbles and curb stones about to be obliterated by tarmacadam and back again to the like of Grangewilliam all over Ireland.

Now that "sport for all" has toned up those flabby muscles, come up to Grangewilliam and see how well they work pitted against a half an acre of nettles, branbles and tall grass. Regardless of whether you have a family plot there or not, any one is welcome to come and help.

The farm which represented possibly the most outstanding agricultural holding to be offered on the market this Season attracted considerable interest. The property was purchased in trust.


The Joint Auctioneers expressed themselves satisfied with the sale price and mentioned that they presently required farms of nature for dis appointed underbidders.

EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

All the evidence points to the fact that children's learning is closely dependent on their experience and particularly on their social experience. Contact with adults is very important but so also is contact with other children. The most important part of the young child s environment is the home.

'Education has a resemblence to the Kingdom of Heaven ; it is both within us and amongst us, yet is also lies ahead. The elect possess it and hope to father in those who are not yet saved. But what on earth it is, is seldom made clear ' (R.S. Peters). We need to clarify what education is because many parents have the point of view that education is something that has to be gone through to achieve a desirable outcome, like a well-paid job of a position of prestige in the community. Success is good, but many very successful people suffer from ner vous breakdowns. Indeed, their very success is because they are driven on by anxiety which catches up on them in the end.

Many good mothers aim at having their children good and well-behaved. Although this appears plausable, yet those who are compelled to be good and to conform to social demands by fear and strict discipline suffer from a crushed individuality. This is a very short term view where the child learns only to follow the customs of the community, while the right aims should be to pursue such as love, generosity, loyalty, and honesty. The reason why a man should be moral is that he achieves his highest fulfilment as a member of the Community,


In order, to formulate well thought out and functional aims and objectives. it is vital to know the subject matter you are dealing with. In this case

we are observing the development of a child and learning how she or he functions. Our aims should be to adopt the standard of mental health which means the full development of the child's whole personality. A few weeks after birth the child has strong and deeply-rooted in stincts to imitate in order to adapt itself to life. The first year the child is engaged with primitive in stincts and potentialities. From two and a half to four, the child is concerned with the organization of his personality, and this can be discussed under four main headings : the phases of imitation, suggestibility, identification and the formation of the Ego ideal.

IMITATION: The child takes over the action of his parents and others and develops standards of behaviour. So what the parents are the child becomes. A vital point to remember is what the child imitates depends on environmental influences which are the parents at this early stage. To help you become more aware of how deep-seated the influence of imitating can be is when a mother smiles, shouts, frowns, or becomes nervous, the impulse passes from the eye to the brain and to the very same centre in the motor area of the brain that activated the mother's action. Speech is the most valuable acquisition gained by imitation at this stage. Imitation is a transition from infantile dependence of the mother to independence in doing things for himself, He learns easier when shown how to do it than by bing told, so imitation is more effective than teaching. The parents would need to be careful to be and do what they want the child to be and do because abnormalities arise from a child imitating a parent's bad example. It is so difficult in later life to cure the young adolesent of bad habits or abnormalities.

The child has explored his world by imitation but now wants to control it.

Everyone knows the tantrum stage and it is the self-willed phase. His aggress -iveness should normally develop in to self.confidence. Self.will is the foundation of the will and is the source of determination, confidence, resolution, perseverance, and all the qualities which make a strong character. A sound foundation must be allowed to take root other wise abnormalities of aggressiveness take hold, such as sullenness, sulkiness, unable to meet his responsi lities. Perhaps he is a good boy but sapless, spineless, and without initiative and very often falls into a state of insecurity, an xiety and fear, easily led astray by others. Why do these abnormalities develop ? When the parents want the child to be good and docile they punish, use threats and appeal to fear which teaches the child by these very actions that initiative does not pay and he suffers for it in the long run.

SUGGESTIBILITY: Up to now the child has been engaged in the doing of things and controlling his immediate environment, and character formation had emerged. He now takes over the moods, feelings, ideas and attitudes of mind of those around him. Unlike his former stage, he has become an xious to please and to co-operate. He is mentally and emotionally dependent on those around him and absorbs their feelings and emotions. Suggest ibility is psychic dependence. Like father like son. If the father shows anger, the child will take over his mood and become angry; likewise if he is loving, the child adapts this feeling. Suggestibility provides security if good example is given. It is a struggle for existence as it en ables the child to acquire the exper iences of others and to profit by them. This drive for security (imitating moods, etc.) avoids the dangerours process of trial and error. Suggestibility is a subconscious process because it is a function of the sub-cortical centres

of the brain. The higher cortex deals with reasoning and criticism.

IDENTIFICATION: Imitation develops to identification, such as, playing the role of a soldier, carpenter, shop keeper, etc. The child not only says that he is that person and enacts the role of being a soldier. He is not mere ly like the person whom he identifies himself but he is that person and all his acquired characteristics. By living these various lives the child learns many skills and enable him to choose a career which is suited to him. These identifications persist into adult life. Identification can be taken as intro jection as explained above, or as pro jection by ascribing his feelings and desires to his toys. The child mostly identifies himself with persons he loves and admires. There are two motives for identification - love and power which are two qualities a child most desires and needs. The child tends to identify with the loving and lovable people and are the most desirable characteristics. Power encourages him to grow up and adapt to the world.

Abnormalities arise when a child identifies with an undesirable character who appears strong and ruthless and perhaps a bully. The child becomes a bully just as in the normal way he becomes a carpenter or a shopkeeper. The child needs protection and sec urity and so keeps in with those to assure this protection. An identific ation which is based on fear can re tard a child : "You must do as I tell you, or else ... " This leaves no room for initiative, spontaneity or selfdiscipline, it paralysises and later often ends in rebellion and delinguency. Another form derived from fear is taking on the parents severe personality and condemn himself as his parents did which leads to obsessional compulsions and neuroses.

This impersonation is of great value for it enriches his personalty and within limits, gives him the opportunity of incorporating these characteristics that

tune with his temperament. There fore the child should have opportunities to a variety of people and not in the company of one person only because he has as many selves as the people. If the lone person has bad inclinations. he can identify with someone else who is lovable, such as the teacher, You can draw from this, that the child can develop his own moral or immoral standards of right and wrong by the process of identification.

EGO-IDEAL : This is a direct out come of the previous phases. The child now has become conscious of himself, leaves behind him the pre vious identification but utilizes the character which becomes part of his own personality. He has established a guiding principle of life within himself and can now direct all his native impulses and so harmonize his personality. A healthy ideal is capable of directing all the forces of the personality to a common end. If by identification with a severe parent the childJs ego ideal will repress the native impulses and weaken character. A too easy going ego ideal had not the power to control and guide the impulse.

WHAT HAS TAKEN PLACE AT THIS STAGE ARE :-

1) The formation of a duality in the personality (not to be confused with a dual personality). The child has to face and cope with the difficulties and problems and safeguard himself from danger. Not only from outside himself but with dangers from within, derived from his own impulses. This

is the struggle of conflicts of what he is and what he ought to be . it is between the natural and spiritual self.

2) The emerging of self.consciousness is the moral self achieved by identific ation with the personalities incorporat ed into his own personality. This duality enables the child to see him self as others see him, to observe his own behaviour and match it against what he should be.

3) Self.criticism analysises the impulses of the natural self, so that the actions of the personality should be rightly directed and harmonized. A child builds a moral conscious on the processes of suggestibility and identification and as a result develops the adoption of an Ego.ideal (natural and moral self).

Well this is your child-at the age of four, and what alot of education has taken place. If it is in the right direction, it has been helped by loving understanding and encouragement. There were no roughness or pampering. It can be truely said that your child of four has all the ingredients of an adult and is more 'adult' than those of nine to teenage. Next time | will cover the latter stage and we will be in a position to formulate towards a goal.

Suggested reading - The Scriptures, Vatican Documents 2. These have the answers towards a fuller personality and help you to educate your child towards freedom,

Ann Sayers, Timahoe A.C. got 3rd in the 400m. Ann is improving her running very steadly this Season.


Maynooth A.C. Girl - Patricia McGarry, who won the Kildare Championship. in the Discus event went on to come 3rd in the National Event.








Editorial

Many of our older citizens will remember Maynooth as a quite, peaceful and safe town to live in where one could live in tranquility to a ripe old age. The town was so guite that the church or College bell almost shattered the stillness while rowdiness or vandalism was suppressed almost before it began. The town was safe for young and old alike and even an infant could wander across the road without serious danger. It sounds almost ideal and was to an extent.

This leaves us wondering at the present volumn of noise in the Main Street where it is now impossible to carry on a conversation over the din of traffic, etc. . Where we dice with death even at the traffic lights and where we look out in the morning to see what fresh vandalism the hooligans have perpetrated during the night. - Where we have to keep our children more or less under lock and key because it is too dangerous to let them out about the town they live in.

Apart from the danger of traffic there is the added danger of dangerous materials passing through by road and rail much of which passes through at night, at high speeds - much of it highly dangerous. This is brought through a dormer town, a university town, which should be peaceful and quiet.

This brings us to the question of what the national and local Authorities are doing for us. They make regulations about the transport of dangerous material which, even before, the Bill becomes Law, are designated as 'mickey mouse' and 'entirely ineffective'. They promise us a bye-pass road for twenty or thirty years and they have not yet even made up their minds where the road should run. They send their Fire Chiefs and, we assume (only assume their fire personnel to a seminar to learn what to do should there be an escape of acrylin but not telling the public of how to save themselves in such a situation. Why ? Public Authorities are not allowed to scare the public - they just allow them to die in ignorance even though they might be saved by proper instruction.

Of course, we are told that the Authorities and industrialists take adequate precautions for safety of the road and rail cargos. Whiddy Island had the most 'up to date' fire control ? The trains at Mallow and Dalkey were absolutely safe ? and, of course there was no danger of fire in the hotel in Bundoran ? - to mention but a few instances.

Is it not time that we in Maynooth had a good look at the dangers that surround us and see that adequate steps are taken to protect us and, equally as important, to instruct us in how to protect ourselves. After all the general public do not know the serious dangers about them or how to protect themselves against chemicals etc.

By the way, if you think this does not concern you just think tonight of what would happen if a few tanks of acrylin burst in the station (Is the wind blowing in your direction) or think of what a merry fire five or ten thousand gallons of petrol would make under your bedroom window. See if it distrubes your sleep. !







Two celebrated authors Penelope Mortimer & Bryan McMahon are the judges for this year's Hennessy's Short-story literary awards, for which Michael J. Harding of Maynooth is one of the nineteen writers in contention.

The awards are in their 10th year and are recognised as the most important awards for new Irish short-story writers. Each award carried a prize of £150 together with an inscribed Trophy.

LABOUR PARTY NOTES

The September meeting was held on Sunday 7th in the Geraldine Hall and was well attended. There were many items of business for dis cussion, as no meeting was held in August due to holidays.

APOLOGY - In the last issue of the Newsletter we stated that the Labour Party was the only polit ical party represented at a recent Maynooth Development Association Meeting, where the main topic for discussion was the proposed Swimming Pool for the Town. This statement was incorrect, as Fine Gael was represented at the meeting by Councillor Bernard Durkan. This branch recognises the fine work done by Councillor Durkan on behalf of the people of May nooth and we apologise for our incorrect statement

LOCAL MATTERS:- After representations on behalf of Carton Court by Joe Cunningham T.D. the Department of Posts and Telegraphs will investigate the feasibility of providing a telephone Kosk in that area.

Kildare County Council have indicated to us that the cost of providing a foot path to Laraghbryan Cemetery would be prohibitive, but remedial work would be carried out as far as fund allow.

Work will shortly commence on the new Public Library for which £130.000 has been allocated.

Councillor Stage has informed us that Carton Court is to be taken over by the County Council. but the footpaths in the Estate have to be finished by the Developer before this can take place.

Part of the footpath at the Bus Stop in the square will be repaired as it is prone to flooding The ESB have been informed about the lights which are out of order in Greenfield.

The area Engineer has recommended the provision of a light at the Straffan end of the footbridge.

People who think that they might be eligible for the Free Fuel scheme this Winter should watch for details in the daily Newspapers. Last year. only 1/3 of the allocation was taken Councillor Stagg informed the meeting that he had received a letter from the Chairman of C.I.E. in which he agreed that Maynooth should have a Commuter train service. He went on to say that the Government will not provide money at this time to provide the service, although it had been a stated objective of Fianna Fail in the past.

From the County Council we also learn that the proposal to provide bicycle lanes from the town to the housing estates is not feasible as the roads are too narrow and there is no money available to widen them. Kildare County Council has been granted only about 10% of the estimated £1.5m required to provide new houses this year. The Council now has no option but to borrow money

at commercial interest rates in order to provide this vital service. The Maynooth Branch considers this situation to be very serious and, at the Annual Conference of the Lab our Party in Cork next month, our three delegates will be tabling a resolution that the Labour Party executive bring pressure to bear in order "that adequate monies be released to provide housing in both the private and public sectors"





MAYNOOTH POST PRIMARY SCHOOL

The Maynooth Post Primary School the "Youngest" Vocational School in Kildare opened its doors in 1971 It is the only Primary School in Maynooth having taken over from a SecondaryTop that existed in the town. The original enrolment was 120 pupils, boys and girls. The original building consisted of 4 rooms kindly loaned by the Presentation Convent. The present single storey building plus prefabs is nicely situated close to to the hostels attached to the University at the West end of the Town. The present enrolment is 460 pupils and the Staff has increased from 8 to 30, of the eight "founding fathers" six are still with us. Buiochas le Dhia.

The school has a very comphre hensive range of subjects cater ing for technical and academic abilities. Group, Intermediate and Leaving Certificate examin ations are sat for and the school has an impressive record in these examinations. Many of our students have gone on to third level studies at both University and Technological Colleges. Last year three of our past pupils were facilitated with H.Dip hons. in the school, not only did they make the difficult transition from pupil to teacher, and colleague but passed their examination with honours as well.

Despite lacking gym facilities the school has a strong tradition of sport participation and our record is excellent due no doubt to the efforts of our full-time P.E. Teacher.

Educational Trips have been an exciting feature of past years in the school. Pupils and teachers have fond memories of trips to England, Scotland and France as well as frequent outings to the Abbey Theatre and other educational attractions.

The School has a happy relationship with town and college. Its facilities are availed of e.g. night classes, summer camp - sports, and its doors are always open to the Community. The last nine years have seen a spectacular development of this school, to such an extent that its resources are stretched to the limit. However it is hoped that the long awaited and promised extension will bring relief and leave room for further development of our facilities to the benefit of the people of Maynooth who have always supported their school.

Most the 54 first year students who arrived that September morning were Past Pupils of the Convent, Of These TR - four have gone to University and have now completed their Degrees.

This Summer Mark Cullen got his Honours Degree in Economics -Congratulations Mark.

John Bean and Ann Kelly, Thomas Nelson returned to their old school in September 1979 as Higher Diploma Students to teach. The school were very proud of them and felt that they were a great credit to the School. Sister Maeve Sullivan and Sean Clarke joined them as H.Dip Students. 
Editorial

We have been very lucky here in Maynooth not to have received the attention of vandals to any large extent in recent years but, unfortunately, the tide seems to have turned and a recent rash of vandalism is, to say the least, upsetting. The stealing and burning of cars, interference with and damage to private and public property etc. is bound to cause public un-easiness and cannot be tolerated.

It is not by any means certain that all the damage is being caused by locals (and we truly hope it is not) but such holliganism from any quarter must be put down. Years back a taste of a hobnail boot applied firmly to an appropriate spot was a great preventative and would probably have been commended in the Courts but fortunately, or unfortunately, it is not to be recommended in this present age.

A good substitute for the ''boot in the tail end'' is for all of us to have a bit of public spirit and courage and report the perpetrators of vadalism to the police or other suitable person. In Ireland, unfortunately, there is still a reluctance to assist the police in carrying out their duties by a section of citizens. It goes back, of course, to our history of occupation by Britain but today this is absurd.

Damage to property (public or otherwide) is usually perpetrated out of boredom and more frequently by older teenagers. Usually a lack of something constructive to do is at the back of it. It is therefore necessary that we should see that our young people have an outlet for their excess energy, and that outlets, such as evening classes, clubs and associations be used by them to the best advantage. Many, if not most, of these young vandals, or prospective vandals , have a very generous streak in them and this could be directed in the right way to give them the outlet they require. Parents and social workers could help alot in this. At the same time it is also up to us to see that vandals do not get away scot free.



A WINTER WARNING BE BRIGHT | THAT'S THE ADVICE THE NATIONAL ROAD SAFETY ASSOCIATION GIVES TO PEDESTRIANS

Pedestrians on the road at night assume they can be seen easily by drivers. They can't - and many pedestrians are making what could be a fatal mistake.

If you walk on the road at night wearing a dark overcoat you can be sure that most drivers will not know you are there until they are practically on top of you. Light coloured clothing will improve things but the best answer is to wear a strip of relfective material in the form of an armband.

Reflective material has been devol oped especially for pedestrian use. The principle of retro-reflective material is not new. We are all familiar with reflective road signs and licence plates that light up in car headlight beams. These reflect light back to its source the driver sitting behind the wheel Pedestrians wearing reflective material can be seen in the headlights of a car up to 500 feet away.

Reflective armbands are an inexpensive and highly effective road saf ety aid at night. They are meant to be worn by all ages. To be safe you must be seen. A reflect ive armband ensures that you are see by drivers-in good time.

A road safety anorak with reflect ive material incorporated into the design of the garment is now manufactured and marketed in Ireland. The extra cost involved is tiny but the garment ensures that the child wearing it can be seenseen easily by drivers, it get over the problem of losing or for -


getting an armband and children who might not enthusiastically take to wearing an armband will wear a road safety anorak without complaint.

In the matter of wearing armbands

we in Ireland are far behind most countries in Europe , where pedes trians and cyclists at night take much greater care of themselves. A whole range of safety aids for night walking or cycling including reflect ive tyres for bicycles, finds a ready market.

While the volume of traffic at night is lower, more accidents occur dur ing the hours of darkness. Of the total of 628 persons killed on the roads during 1978, 226 were pedestrians, who are one of the most vulnerable groups on the road. The National Road Safety Association again this Winter pleads with pedestrians of all ages, for their own safety, to protect themselves with a reflective armband.

Children going to and from School, joggers, dogwalkers, those who go to the local for a drink - in fact all who walk on the road at night - are literally lost without their armband.

CLLR. DURKANS NOTES

As a results of questions raised by Councillor Durkan, the following replies have been received.

The County Council has stated that they will provide 10 lights on the straight road through, Greenfield as soon as possible.

That due to the low accident rate and the potential hazard of widening the road no benefit would be gained by providing a right turn land at the College Campus on the N.4.

That repair to the road at The Crescent, Old Greenfield will be carried out as soon as possible.

That due to the limited finances available it was only possible, in regard to the Avenue at Carton Maynooth, to mow the grass, clear the ivy from the walls and clean the undergrowth and brushwood. A couple of Park seats may also be erected. Next year depending on Finances it is hoped to provide more seats and carry out re-seeding and re-planting.

That it is not possible to fence off the area being used by it inerants at Blacklion, Maynooth due to the access needed by land owners.

That as regards the housing scheme of 37 houses being con structed by Achill Ltd. the contractors have abandoned the site. As the legal notice has now expired the Council are seeking another contractor to have the scheme completed.

CIIr. Durkan reports on major plans for the development of the Co. Hospital Naas, which included the creation of new permanent posts of Consultant Surgeon, Consultant Anaesthetist : Consultant Physician, and other supporting post at Consul tant level. The plan also includeds

the provision of a second large Theatre.

The entire package, represents the up-grading of Naas to full General Hospital status, a long sought after objective by all those involved in the Health services in the County.







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LABOUR PARTY NOTES

The monthly meeting was held on Sunday 5th October in the Gerald ine Hall. Councillor Emmet Stagg was in attendance and the main topic for discussion was Housing. Council lor Stagg reported that the Builder who has been building the Local Authority Houses in Maynooth has gone bankrupt. Fittings, which presumably had not been paid for, were removed from the houses, despite the presence of the Gardai. This is a major setback to the housing needs of the area, as these homes are already over due for completion. The County Council will be tendering for the completion of the houses and any interested parties may contact Council lor Stagg.

The County Council are not now in a position to pay out housing loans, not even the £600,000 which has already been sanctioned. The Council has now an overdraft of £400,000 the interest on which will be charged against next years rates.

As we have stressed in the past. the Maynooth Branch holds very strong views on the subject of Housing, and the following motion will be forwarded to Clane Divisional Council for proposal at the next Divisional meeting . "In view of the deteriorating housing situation in Kildare, where there are over 1000 families on the waiting list for houses, Maynooth Town Branch proposes that this Meeting should request the County Council to explore other avenues for Housing finance, e.g. Building co-ops in each earea under the auspices of the County Council.

Three delegates from the Branch will be travelling to Cork to attend the 3 day Labour Party Annual Conference, a report on which will be issued later. The Branch, which is in a very healthy financial state, will defray most of the delegates expenses.

It was decided to forward a cheque for £10 to the Labour Party H.Q. as a donation towards the cost of a presentation to Brendan Halligan,

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who recently resigned as General Secretary of the Labour Party.

The next meeting will be held in the Geraldine Hall on Sunday 9th November at 11.30 am. and we look forward particularly to seeing some of the people who expressed interest in the Party during our recent courtesy calls to the Housing Estates.


standing of "Youth" as he was the greatest Youth Leader the world has ever known.

INGREDIENTS:

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METHOD :-

Cut pork into 1" cubes and toss in seasoned flour and fry in deep hot oil until Golden Brown. Add rashers, onion, muchrooms and bay leaf and lastly add in stock, cider and peppers. Reduce heat and cook for 1 hour. Stir occasionally.

PORK & BACON PIE contd.

Meanwhile cook apples in a sauce pan with just enough water to stop them from burning. Cook to a pulp then sieve and add sugar.

Make pastry. Sift flour with salt into mixing bowl. Cut fat into the flour with a knife then rub in with finger tips. When the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs, make a well in the centre and gradually add water, mixing quickly with a knife. Add just enough water to give a firm dough.

When pork is cooked, arrange onto dish and garnish with plaited pastry. Put into over for 10 minutes. Serve hot with apple sauce and sprig of parsley.

This dish can be served hot with vegetables or cold with tossed salad.

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THE BOYS' PRIEST *********

THE BOY

John Bosco was born on August 16th, 1815, in Northern Italy. His father died when John was only two. All during his childhood poverty stared the boy in the face. His desire was to study so as to become a priest, but dis appointment met him at every turn. His oldest brother Joseph was helpful, but his step brother, Anthony some ten years older than John was a real nasty fellow. He was against the boy studying. "He's a farmer like us' was the refrain John heard from Anthony .

One day an old retired priest met John returning with his mother from a village mission service and was very impressed by the lad's brilliant memory. He volunteered to tutor the boy privately. All went well for a few months with John making great progress. "Don't worry lad", the old priest used to say "You'll go to high school and to the seminary, I'll see to that" John idolized him. But one morning he rushed to the rectory to find the good priest dying. With his last breath the old Priest thrust a key into the boy's hand and muttered, "The cabinet over my desk....money for your studies...it's all yours'' However after the funeral a long forgotten nephew appeared and claimed the dead man's things, including the key and the money. Through it all John kept up his good spirits. Some day he would be a boy's priest.

THE FIRST STEP

"Get these books out of here" Anthony snarled. "Look at me, I'm big and strong, and I can't read or write " "That's nothing to brag about " John answered picking up the books and making for the door, "look at our mule he's as strong as you, and he can't read or write either !"

That sounds funny to us, but to Margaret Bosco it meant such trouble. If John was ever to become a priest, she had better get him started now. At the age of twelve John left home for the nearby town of Castlenuovo, which had a public high school. After school John worked at any trade he could find ...tailor, blacksmith, carpenter, waiter, any thing for money to buy him food and clothing. He did three years of high school in two, and finished with honours.

In 1837 he entered the diocesan seminary. Now he earnestly prepared him self for the work he was sure God was calling him to do. Four years later to his mother's unspeakable job, John was ordained and said his first Mass at the altar where he used to serve as an altar boy. Now everyone called him 'Don' (father) Bosco.



LOVE IN THE HOME contd. :-

Young people in their teens often complain that they cannot communicate with their parents. But we want to speak to teenagers too. Teenagers, we want you to ask yourselves whether you try hard enough on your side to communicate with your parents. You expect your parents to listen to you, to trust you; but this has to work both ways. You must listen to them. You must trust your parents; you must believe in their love for you. It is mean and selfish to be pleasant and cheerful outside home, but to be silent and surly at home. It is selfish to expect to find love in your home, unless you are genuinely trying to spread love there your selves.

PRAYER IN THE HOME :-

Prayer in the home is the very heart and essence of handing on the faith in the family. It is sad and very disturbing fact that, at least in some urban areas family prayer seems to be on the decline. We must stop that downward slide. We must start the upward climb. Which of us will for get Pope John Paul's last special request to us, just before he left for Shannon and America ?

"Your homes should always remain homes of prayer. 
PRAYING WITH YOUR CHILDREN :-

TOWARDS FREEDOM - Article 111 EDUCATION

In my last articles, we learnt to observe the growth of a child to the age of four and how he organ ized his personality based on ident ification. From the age of four he has standards and these depend on the Ego-Ideal derived from his parents and those whom he had close contact with. He is no longer suggestible as he was from one to four, he now reasons and wants to know the "why" for everything. Even though the child feels indep endent, he depends on his parents for knowledge of the world. Par ents need to use great patience in answering these questions, other wise the child looses confidence.

It is an age of individuality and ego-centricity. He needs to prove himself to others :- "See how fast I can Swim" or "I can do better than you" etc. He needs self.assurance as he consolidates and builds up his individuality. It is necessary to direct his powers and energies into something constructive such as games and hobbies. Praise goes a long way to help him achieve his goal. If he is not encouraged or recognised for his achievements he will be inclined to play in a world of fantasy. His activities usually exercises patience, per severance and self-discipline. He may appear to be very happy and content, but it is not healthy to escape from the world of reality.

In this case the two sides of his personality (mentioned in-last issue) become divided which is not unlike a dual personality. The two personalities should be united.

Self-confidence is built upon achievement. From four to seven years, a child's imagination is practical and there is a very narrow margin between wish and fact. Often the child will relate what he wishes as fact and the imagination bridges the gap. With adults, we know achievements are imagined before made effective. Such im agination helps the child to overcome his problems. The child may be afraid to Swim but if he imagines himself winning a race he will build up courage to ac hieve this image. Children will tell imaginative 'lies' when they


are not given the normal outlets for their achievements. The best way to treat these 'lies' is to encourage them towards real achievement and not to scold. For a short period a child of six or seven moves away from the individualistic level towards the next social phase. Don't be surprised if your little son says he is really in love with the girl next door. This is characterized by friendship and devotion and is heterosexual.

The period of seven to twelve is

closely akin to the life of the 'prim itive man' because the child is also interested in camping, hiking, Red Indians (bravery and courage), fishing (a great skill in self discipline), climbing and such activities that support survival. The child has tremendous vitality and is very healthy. His reserves of energy are small and has not great staying power, yet he recuperates very rapidly. His moods change as quick as his interests but are short lived. Boys and girls in this age group have a natural instinct to collect objects of all sorts and store them away. This is believed to be the "primitive man" instinct to store in anticipation for the future, e.g. winter months where food is not easily available. This mode of life must be res pecte and has its importance in their future adult life. At this age, the child is very sociable and works for the good of the community. Qualities of leadership are noticed depending on his former development of the earlier periods of life.

The parents may notice the child's interests in them is slipping away and that they do not play an import -



ant part in his life. Just take an in terest in what they are doing and 'be with it' as far as you can. Children resent arbitrary authority and the more they are punished the more un controlled they become. The child at this stage is not concerned with adults but more with the social group that he has conformed to and does as the others do. For the child's mental development it is best to provide him with the opportunities and the means to buy the materials to live the primitive man's activities. His choice of materials may come from junk and the like and are apt to be more creative and imaginative

than having expensive and factory finished objects.

He is psychologically independent of his parents and will learn to discriminate for himself which is based on the opportunities he had to organize his personality. This age group is full of fantasy. They read and live the fairy tale stories and lives of the heroes. The conflicts of good and evil are worked out by the good fairy and bad step mother or witch. The children have been sub jective in their daily tasks and it is through fantasy they become objective through hearing the life stories of others. It is believed that fairy stories are smybols of the children's own problems and the hearing of these stories, which they project their own lives, will build up courage to achieve the image of their heroes. Fantasy leads them to abstract ideas and helps them solve their problems objectively. The projection of their problems into the lives of their heroes so forcably have a lasting effect on their lives.

The next stage leads us to the most debated and worrying period of a child's life. This 'child must be recognised as becoming a young adult. It will be our next topic.




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MAYNOOTH TOWN A.F.C.


