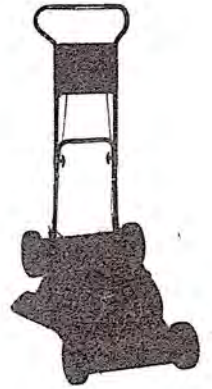

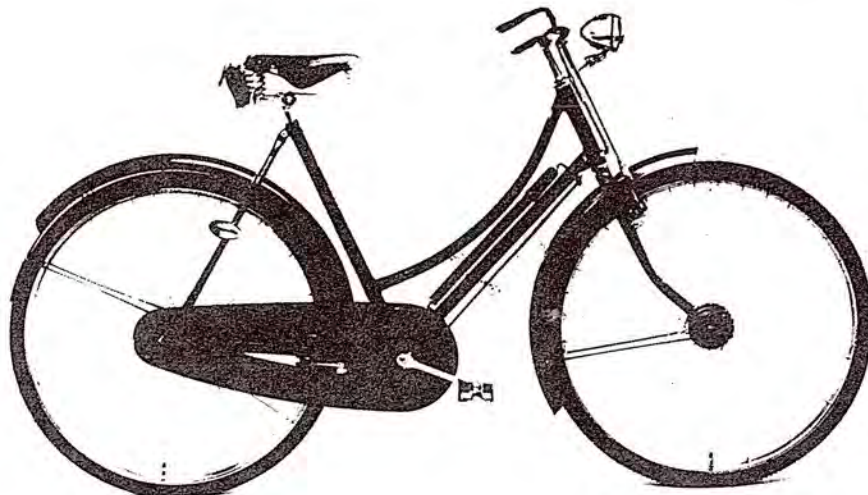

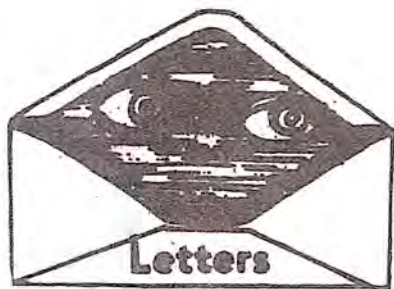

## to the Editor

Dear Sir,

I should be grateful if you would allow me through the courtesy of your journal to pay sincere tribute to the 'Maynooth Lord Mayor Committee' for the amount of hard work they put into the recent fund-raising campaign on behalf of the Maynooth Boys' National School Extension.

The figures speak for themselves, a profit of £13,784.63, with all expenses paid. All concerned have reason to take pride in their efforts, and there is the additional bonus that in the course of the campaign they generated a great fund of good-will. And I take this opportunity of thanking the people of Maynooth and all the others who contributed so generously to this worthy cause.

It would be wonderful if I could say that their gigantic efforts were sufficient to defray the local expenditure for the exten-

sion of the School. But since our contribution amounts to £25,000, with the real possibility of a further considerable contribution when the work is completed, owing mainly to increasing costs and the contribution we must make towards furnishing the new class-halls, the inescapable fact emerges that we must find ways and means of finding additional money to meet our commitments. In addition we have the imminent prospect of doing our part towards the extension of the Girls' School, and of finding the money to pay for a site for a new mixed School in the Greenfield area. I need hardly say that the Priests will do their utmost to look for a considerable grant from 'SHARE' to meet the last mentioned commitment.

If the Schools were the only responsibilities of the Parish, our job would be difficult enough. However, as everybody knows, the Priests are also responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the Churches and Parochial buildings and for these purposes they must rely entirely on the good-will and generosity of parishioners. Unfortunately, with the very steep increases in electricity for heating and lighting together with our annual insurance bills, and bills for altar-breads, wine, missalettes and necessary repairs and cleaning, our current account is considerably over-drawn.

For all of these reasons, I welcome the very heartening news that the 'Lord Mayor Committee' are anxious to diversify their activities on behalf of the Parish and to invite Parishioners in general to take a more active part in working for the common good. The propose to call a General Meeting to outline proposals that they have in mind and to invite opinions and active commitment. In a University Town such as ours it would be indeed surprising if such efforts were not crowned with success.

After the Annual Audit which takes place at the end of June, I hope to be in a position to give a more detailed breakdown of the financial situation of the Parish and with the kind consent of the Editor it will be published in this Journal.

Once again I thank the Lord Mayor Committee and all who helped their efforts, and I pray that God may reward them for their generosity.

## CONFIRMATION DAY

Thursday June 12th 1980 was a memorable day for 84 boys and 83 girls in the Parish of Maynooth. It was their Confirmation Day. The weather was not altogether what we might hope for in June. But surely the genial and cheerful Bishop Forristal, who was performing his 25th Confirmation, dispelled any gloom occasioned by the lack of Sunshine. Certainly, the music and singing was heart-lifting and reflects credit on their teachers, especially Mr. Pearse O'Connell who conducted and Sister Aquinas who played (A thought : would it not be wonderful if these splendid singers were to come together on each First Friday for the Sodality Mass ?)

The Bishop addressed himself first to the boys and girls and then to the adults. He reminded the former that confirmation marked their taking on of the full responsibilities of being followers of Christ. The Holy Spirit is given to them to help them to do this and they prove

they mean it by showing love for our neighbour.. On a practical level, he suggested that they could begin doing this by setting aside some of their "Confirmation Money" to help a worthy cause. At the end of the Mass he invited them to take a pledge not to drink intoxication drink, at least, until they were eighteen.

To the parents he spoke of the importance of good example. He reminded them of Pope John Paul 11's request to Irish Parents in Limerick - revive the practice of Family Prayer. Bishop Forristal said it is not enough to tell your children ' say your prayers' but they must pray with them and he stressed the central importance of the Sunday Mass and Holy Communion.

Before administering the pledge to the young people, he appealed again to parents to set a good example by their use of alcohol.

It would be wrong to end this short account of Confirmation Day in Maynooth without praising the wonderfully devout conduct of the children, the beautiful reading of the lesson and bidding prayers, the mellifluous singing of the psalm and the admirable decorum of the servers, who although very young were also very correct. But no wonder ! -- they were under the able direction of our Master of Ceremonies and Surrogate clerk - Declan Barry. As the Bishop said afterwards "he kept us all in our place !"

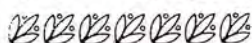

As our County Councillors know, or should know, formal and informal discussions on the possibility of providing an alternative traffic route to the West, by bye-passing Maynooth and Leixlip, commenced more than twenty or thirty years ago (or even earlier still). Obviously our Councillors of years back were far-sighted enough to see the coming dangers, and discomfort to the townspeople by the ever increasing traffic. This was at a time when few, if any, could envisage even today's traffic volume let alone what is expected in future years. As yet we have not heard of any definite plan to re-route the traffic and give us a reasonable chance of living our lives in comparative peace.

Perhaps the Councillors of today are now aware of the plight of the people of Maynooth (We are reluctant to believe that they are insensitive) and, if not, it is their public duty to acquaint themselves of the situation. Perhaps they are not aware of the constant noise, especially from, large trucks, to which the townspeople are exposed day and night (and we are told of noise being used 'UP NORTH' as a form of torture) or of the sheer frustration of waiting for ages to find a mannerly driver who will permit a pedestrian to cross the busy road (the crossing of which has come to be an experience of terror for the elderly). These are, to name but a few, of the 'joys' of living in the town with no mention of the damage to property through buildings being continually shaken by the heavy traffic.

It is, of course, the duty of each citizen to accept a certain amount of disruption of living to facilitate the majority but there is a limit to what any section of the community can be expected to endure and the losses they are expected to suffer. Not alone have we in Maynooth reached the limit but the limit has been far exceeded.

We are demanding now that immediate steps be taken to divert traffic from this town to allow us to live our lives in reasonable peace again. Not stop-gap measure, we hasten to add, to allow traffic to move more freely through the town at an increased rate, but measures to take the bulk of the traffic away. There is a point at which all people will revolt and we in Maynooth are more or less at this point now. Unless we see immediate steps being taken to rectify matters, not long winded discussion, we shall have to put our own plans into action to protect ourselves.

In the meantime, we suggest that, since the present speed limit of 30 m.p.h. is not being observed in the main, that traffic should be slowed to 10 m.p.h. That further controlled pedestrian crossings be installed and that heavy traffic, motor cycles and other noisy vehicles be banned from the town after say 9 p.m. to 8 a.m.

From inquiries, the townspeople of Leixlip and Kilcock would endorse our views.

## GREENFIELD ESTATE RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

We start with some miscellaneous items. Residents should know that where house improvements are carried out by a registered builder the labour part of the cost is allowable for income tax relief. The smaller of the Association's two mowers has been repaired for £90, and is available for cutting the public greens only. A ladder is available for hire at 49 Laurence Avenue. In answer to a request for a 'skip' for the Estate, Kildare County Council tell us that 'due to financial constraints, it will not be possible to provide this service for you during 1980. Finally residents are kindly requested not to park cars at the top of the triangle in Maynooth Park in the path of the school bus wanting to turn there.

The 'Evening Press' of a few weeks ago carried an article with the heading: 'Priest lashes out over revelries'. It was the curate of Renmore parish in the suburbs of Galway calling for 'action by community groups and residents associations to ensure that late-night disturbances (i.e. by people in rented houses in the area) are not allowed recur'. There may regrettably be some among us here in Maynooth who have had experience of this themselves. It is a delicate matter calling for much tolerance and efforts at understanding, both ways. The newly-elected President of the Students' Union, Martin Kennedy, has met the Committee and has pledged himself to do all he can to promote harmonious relations in the year to come.

The Sports Day is fixed for Sunday, June 29th, on the Green in Maynooth Park, and will be over by the time this appears. Let us hope the sun shines. (Well, did it?)

## EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

Parents have been asking me many questions about education and expressed a state of bewilderment as how to bring up their children. I felt it would help parents, if I wrote a few articles in the Maynooth News-letter to answer some of their problems in coping with a changing world. Times have rapidly changed from their own childhood days where the upbringing of children was a simple matter. Their parents had simple rules and standards of behaviour to which the children had to conform.

In the Victorian period : "The child had to be obedient, docile, well-behaved, seen and not heard, and made to fit in with social requirements and moral standards. The sooner we started drilling him into this conformity the better. To make a child of good behaviour was the height of the Victorian mothers' ambition, and to lick him into shape, the prerogative of the father when he came home from work." (the Schoolmaster. 1906)

We cannot overlook the fact that under these restrictions, women and men of great insight, inventiveness, exploration and self dedication initiated the progress of our present day. We are indeed grateful to them for the preservation and building up again of our shattered culture. Under these strict conditions, families developed and children were none the worse for their strict upbringing.. Where the failure lay in the Victorian period and in our own times is that strictness without love and security repressed the child and this is the basis of neurotic disorders.

What was the driving force that changed our society to a more liberal attitude ? In the 19th cent. the greatest influence came from clinical and school observ-

ations of the psychologists and psychoanalysts. Freud's theories were misinterpreted and educationalists translated his teachings into a blunt understanding that repression produces neurosis.

Child Guidance Clinics and "Free Schools" sprung up on the principles that a child should never be frustrated or disciplined. (What they termed as repression, Freud was speaking of restraint and self-control).

Our Country has been saved from the horrors of war which releases primitive impulses and so results in greater freedom but a licence in freedom without aim, for example, Ira Wile, an American child psychologist, tells an amusing story illustrative of these 'progressive' methods: 'A Mother who came to one of these schools with a view to entering her son was being interviewed by the head-mistress in a lobby when the dinner bell rang, and out rushed all the children. One bumped into her on this side and one on that, but no apology was made until at last one boy bumping against her said 'I beg pardon !' -- whereupon the headmistress remarked to the mother, 'You must excuse him, he is just a new boy !'

Ireland is somewhat twenty years behind our neighbouring countries and this attitude is growing and is

apparently accepted in some of our schools today. It is this liberalism that has our parents bewildered because some teachers accept these standards.

Throughout the ages, there has been many theorist bringing forward their own point of view as being the truth. Before the last two wars, Aristotle's teachings were widely studied and accepted. He was very clear on the need for discipline known as the doctrine of habituation. He relates: "There is a time when it is not possible to give a child freedom because he is at a stage where he had not the wisdom or experience, nor the ability to take a long view and to calculate consequence which freedom demands. Therefore, submit him to discipline, to law, to control, to develop the habit of doing the right thing. Only when he reaches the stage of habituation can we trust him to freedom.....laws are to ensure that those courses of action which experience has shown to be beneficial are followed, and to eliminate those courses of action which experience has proved to be harmful and injurious to Society and its members.

To discard laws is to discard experience.....once a thing is not forbidden, it may be felt not only to be permitted but to be encouraged"

Education towards freedom contd.

We may take our inspirations from the great masters but Our Great Master, Jesus Christ teaches us that the balance in law is to love our neighbours as ourselves. The message given to those responsible are, a Christian must produce an example to attract and not to repel. Freedom without responsibility can do no - thing but harm, so to possess leadership, is to be involved in respon - sibility of those who are led.

Parents today would not lay down rules for their own sake as so much depends on the circumstances and they should be understood that they are concerned mainly with behaviour. If we are guided on principles, which depends on our aims and objectives, we reason why we do these things, and what will it lead to , then we vary our treatment in accordance with those ends.

Your daughters or sons are not with you all day, they spend much time in school under the guidance of teachers. It is not the task of the

teachers to lead the students in one direction or the other along a specific path, but rather to place material at their disposal, which will enable them to form their own opinion. It is the teachers responsibility to create an atmosphere, through which the students spirit can enter life in full freedom. It is an "education towards freedom". Many parents and teachers fail in their responsibility towards children/ students as in the American 'progressive method' and allow them to develop themselves at the expense of the others.

As a follow up from my last statement,

in my next article, I will deal with how relevant and vital it is to know fully what are the aims and objectives of the school you have chosen for your child. Usually these are written in booklet form and a copy made available to each teacher, thereby promoting unity in "education towards freedom". Another article will deal with the psychology of art - a powerful force in emotional development towards "freedom"

## THE MEANING OF MISSION

(Part 111 )

It can be truly said that the surest sign of an authentic Christian life in any century is the vitality of the Mission Spirit.

A well documented development of recent times has been the transition of the Church in Mission areas from a Church so named into a new "young Church", with its own (local) Clergy, Sisters and Brothers. How true are the words of Pope John XXIII "I would rather see one native Bishop consecrated than a thousand converts made". And why? Because the local Bishop is a sign that the missionary Church has taken root. This new growth has been a speedy process with nations gaining independence in Africa and Asia. We have an Irish parallel here. With independence, nations and peoples begin to realise their own individual value and to become aware of a separate identity, which moves them to seek for cultural roots and to protect their heritage. The need for a native Clergy was presaged in the proclamations of successive Popes, a living reality that is providentially present with us to-day.

The "young Churches" are now established in their own right alongside the "older Churches" and some in a spirit of partnership have changed from "receiving Churches" into giving Churches" While the presence of non indigenous missionaries will be needed for many years to come. increasingly there is now an indigenous Clergy to minister in the local Church. A problem arises where the number of ordinations is not keeping pace with the increasing number of Catholics. This is where lay people have discovered an important role, especially as catechists.

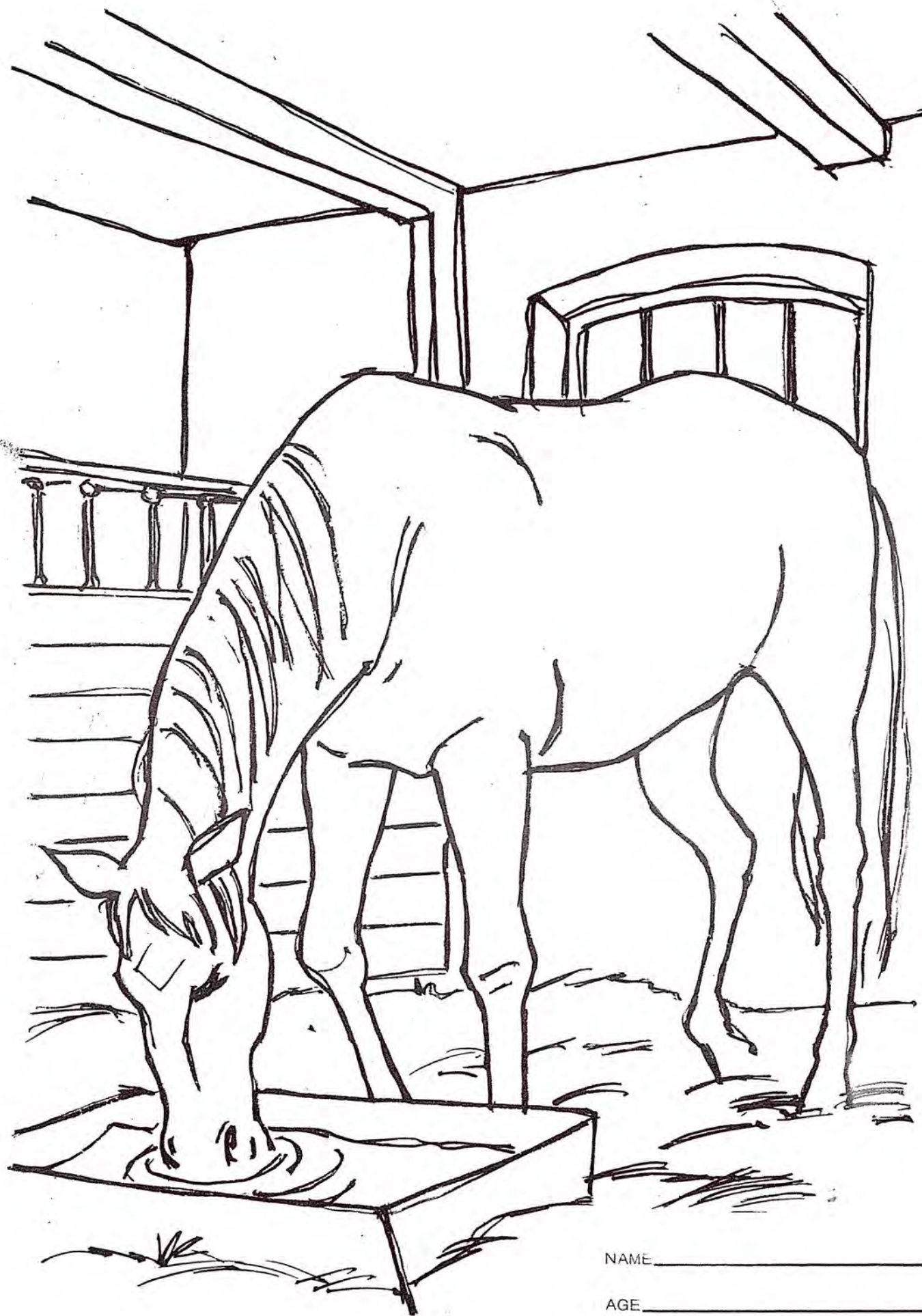

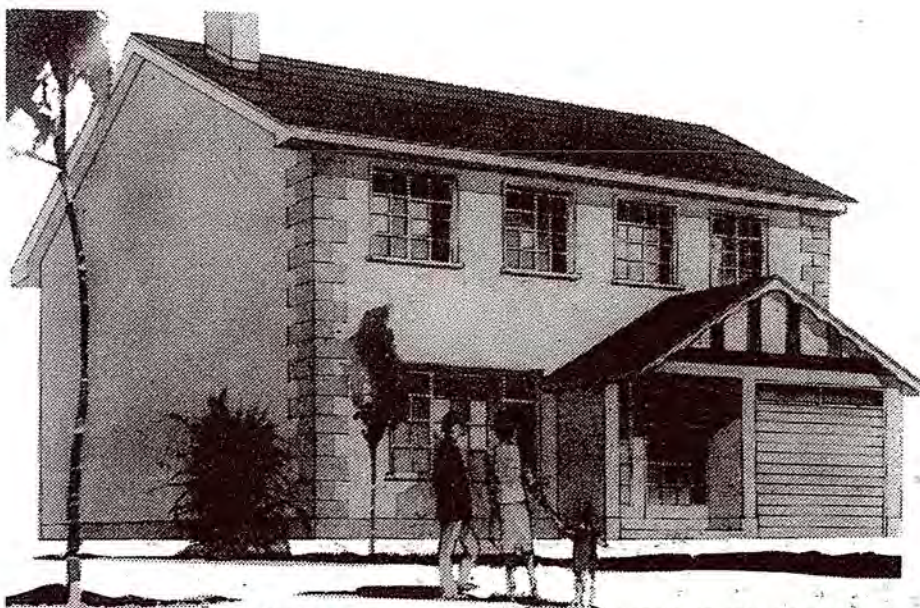
