





By now you may or may not have read our "URGENT APPEAL". If not you will find it in the advertisement page. We have a serious problem, which will inevitably lead to the closing down of our Cub Pack and Scout Troop if it is not solved in the very near future.

Just for the moment let us leave the problem aside and take a look at the aims and policy of our organization. C.B.S.I. is for and about young people and their development. In its scope it caters for young people from nine years of age to twenty years of age. In particular the spiritual, moral, cultural and physical development of its members are given serious consideration. This is achieved by the various programmes in the different sections of the organization.

Here in Maynooth we have three sections. 'The Cub Pack'' -'The Scout Troop' and 'The Venturer Group', All three sec-



tions have a programme to suit the age range they cater for and they are designed so that the young person can progress from one to the other easily. According to age each section has a programme which teaches the young person various skills, helps them to make decisions for themselves and teaches them the importance of group work. 



A great night was had by 61 people which included many children of members, at the Pantomime in the Gaiety, when seven of the children made their 'debut' on the stage and did their party piece.


A half days outing will take place to an Grianan on 14th April, 12 members will attend a weeks course at this college in September.






Dear Councillor,

Editorial

In all walks of life and, particularly in local affairs, there are projects of various kinds that are not fully covered by the benevolent State or Local Authority. There are also items which might, or should properly be covered by Government or Local Authority and which somehow do not seem to get done except by the strenuous pu shing of some local group or organisation. At such times it is quite common to hear the cry - "Somebody should do something about it" but unfortunately there are very few civic spirited enough to actually do something.

The position has been reached here in Maynooth where there are many things that' 'somebody should do something about' but there does not seem to be any rush by anybody to take the necessary action. We have, (or is it had?) our Community Council which was, some years ago, elected with a great flourish of trumpets and which did, at the beginning, make considerable headway on our behalf, but which has now apparently stagnated and run itself out. That is should 'run itself out' is not a great surprise because, apart from the fact that it received little support during its lifetime, it can easily have been said to have received considerable hindrance. After the first few years (or even within the first year) interest started to wane on the part of the public and even on the part of some of the Councillors. The few really interested ones tried hard to keep things moving but it would appear that even they have now given up the battle and it is hard to blame them.

We have, in these columns, many times berated the people of Maynooth for apathy or, in plain words, for laziness in looking after their own interests, for lack of public spirit and true co-operation and nowhere is this more apparent than in the demise of the Community Council. We have just heard that what appears to be the final meeting of the Council on Tuesday last did not even produce a quorum.

The Community Council is not the only disgrace to the town as a whole - the lack of co-operation in the completion of the Sports Field is another. We could go on and on about lack of public spirit but it is too depressing. It would appear that there is practically nobody left who will give a few miserable hours in the year of their leisure time to make Maynooth into what could be one of the finest towns in Ireland to live in. WAKE UP MAYNOOTH , you are missing alot by sheer laziness.



An item of major interest was the forth coming re-drawing of constituency boundaries and many were of the opinion that Maynooth may be dropped from Dublin County West and revert to Kildare Constituency. The monthly Branch Meeting was held on Sunday 10th February at 11.30 a.m. Councillor Emmet Stagg, who attended, gave details of correspondence from Malachy Jenkin in which he promises to expedite repairs to some footpaths in the town and also to sections of the Maynooth-Dunboyne Road. The heavy rain of the past few days have contributed to these problems.

An engineers report is pending on the siting of the Tank in Maynooth Mart, which has been a subject of some controversy recently. A list of defective E.S.B. lights and a list of areas prone to flooding were given to Councillor Stagg who will also expedite the connection of 16 more houses on the Moyglare Road to the new sewerage system.

The Maynooth Branch of the Labour Party is growing at a phenomenal rate. Thanks to the tireless work of the Committee, membership has snowballed and numbers have increased four fold in 2 months. This must be some kind of a record !! Many people have expressed interest in attending our next meeting which will be held, as usual, in the Geraldine Hall at 11.30 a.m. on the 2nd Sunday of the month. The date to remember is the 9th March and all are welcome. When one considers that we have not yet begun to canvass the hundreds of newcomers to the area, the signs are indeed promising that the 'Labour Party' has a decisive role to play in Maynooth.

Money is expected to be available this year to start work on it and it is expected that the Library will be on a large scale to cater for Maynooth's expansion as a University Town.





MOTION - "That further public lighting be provided at Laraghbryan"

I recommend that extra public lighting be provided at the above loccation in the interest of pedestrian safety. I shall arrange for it to be included in the 1980 orders in conjunction with the estimates.

* *

QUESTION - "Can this Council indicate its plans for the conservation of Carton Avenue, Maynooth." ?

The conservation of Carton Avenue, Maynooth is an Objective of the County Development Plan. This Avenue is in private ownership and its amenty aspects have been safeguarded. If the trees come under threat, the placing of a Tree Preservation Order would be considered.

The trees are important in that they form a continuous link between Carton and Maynooth College, the planting being continued along the Main Street, which trees incidentally, were also owned by the Carton Estate.

It would be worthwhile public acquisition if the Council were to acquire and manage the Avenue as it stands.

MOTION - "that this Council would make the necessary arrangements to acquire amenity lands in Maynooth and also in other towns in the County with expanding populations"

As part of its policy for the provision of amenity and recreational facilities within the county, Kildare County Council, some years ago, identified the three priority areas in which land should be obtained for amenity and recreational purposes as Leixlip, Celbridge, and Newbridge.

The availability of land for amenity purposes in the adjacent to these 3 towns has been investigated and progress has been made in regard

to the acquisition of land for amenity purposes in the Newbridge area. The possible availability of land for amenity purposes in Leixlip and Celbridge is being investigated in respect of certain specific areas of land, and if the matters which are outstanding can be resolved satisfactorily, the Council will be advised.

A major factor in relation to this matter is the availability of finance to acquire land and to carry out development work. The finance available to the Council is limited in this regard.

Should it be decided to add Maynooth to the list of towns I have already mentioned, an effort can be made to try and identify suitable land in this regard and any suggestion which the Councillors for the area may have, or any assistance they may be able to give in identifying lands which may be available for sale, at a reasonable cost, would be welcomed.

* * *

Re:- condition of the footpath between Laraghbryan and Maynooth.

I refer to your representations of the 3rd. instant, regarding the above, and I wish to inform you that the Area Engineer carried out the cleaning and maintenance of the above footpath, but no money is available this year for any improvement to be carried out to same. The engineer has indicated that he will keep the improvement of the footpath in mind and the necessary finance may be available early in the new Year.


EVERYONE WELCOME

MOTION- "That Bord Na Mona be asked to ensure that adequate supplies of fuel are available to the people of County Kildare "

I have made enquiries with Bord Na Mona regarding fuel supplies in the current year.

The position is that, the Bord sold 650,000 tons of machine turf in the year ended March 1979, and it is intended to sell an equal amount of turf in the year ending March 1980. I am advised that all the turf which could be produced this year was produced. Inaddition to this, briquette production has been at a peak for some time now, and a total of 350,000 tons of this fuel is being produced per annum at the moment. A briquette factory at Littleton, County Tipperary, is under construction at the moment, and fuel from it should "come on steam" in 1981.

There has been a very substantial growth in the demand for the Bord's fuel in recent years and the Bord is making every effort to meet this demand.

QUESTION - "Would this Council consider with favour the establish-- ment of any further Museum's in the County, under the auspices of the National Museum"?

The general principle of the establishment of a Museum in this County is an objective of the County Development Plan and a site has been ear-marked at Claregate Street and outline plans have been prepared.

The establishment of a central Museum in Kildare would stand a great chance of achievement if as suggested it came under the auspices of the National Museum. 1 consider that it would be worthwhile if the Council are agreeable to issue a request to the National Museum to support the Council's project.

Re:- Provision of Litter Bins on the N4 at the entrance to O'Neill Park, Maynooth

* * *

I refer to your representations regarding the above matter, and I wish to inform you that the Area Engineer is arranging to supply the small type of litter bin. The large type of litter bins are too expensive to provide out of maintenance.

I refer to your representations regarding the resurfacing of the footpath from the village to the Roman Catholic Church at Maynooth,

* * *

It is extremely unlikely that anything can be done on this footpath in the current year because of the current restraints on Local Authorities' spending. However, I have asked the County Engineer to examine the footpath and to include finance for its resurfacing in the 1980 Provisional Estimates, if he considers this approiate.

Subject to the granting of suitable allocation, the work could proceed in the current year.

MOTION - "That this Council would make arrangements to undertake the provision of the second phase of the Maynooth Housing Scheme at Greenfield"


In relation to above Notice of Motion from Councillor B. Durkan, it is noted that the first phase of 37 houses is at present in progress and due to be completed in April 1980.





Dear Councillor,

In reply to your letter of the 5th Dec. 1979, I desire to inform you that the current number of applications received for the new houses in Maynooth is sixty-eight.

Applications received to date for developed private building sites amount to about 50 which indicates a demand for such sites and, obviously the development of further private building sites will have to be considered in 1980. As you know, the batch of nine sites are being developed at the present time by direct labour and while the exact cost is not yet known it is felt that the price of each site to successful applicants will be in the region of £2,500 to £3,000 each.




