



Easter 1980


Dear Toni.

Greetings from the warm and sunny Philippines !

Toni, remember me ? It's me, Julio! How are you and your family. ? It's been a long time since you heard from me. Did you ever get the Christmas greetings I sent you ? I wrote several people in Maynooth (Mr. & Mrs. Peale & Kathy Morgan ; Mr. & Mrs. Walsh; and to a certain Mrs. who lives near the new campus, I'm sorry 1 forgot her name, but she is a very nice lady. She is very active in the Old Folks' Association, but there were no replies, so I don't know if they got my letters. Anyway, it's Easter time and I would like to take this opportunity to say 'hello' and to tell you of the past activities I was doing here in the parish of San Jose. There are only two of us in the parish - my PP and myself.

I think I wrote you last time that the busiest time here in the Philippines is December. I just looked up our records and saw that in December alone we had 655 Baptisms, 20 Marriages, 22 Funerals. On Christmas day itself we practically stayed inside the Church the whole day for Baptism. It was good the morning was nice and cool. Oh, but the afternoon was really hot - Philippine weather !!!

My cassock was white when I wore it, it was grey when I took if off ! Oh yes, indeed ! That day we baptized 260 children. Oh, you should have seen the children all over our convent. Most of them crying,



screaming, some looking for their mothers (they got lost too !) ; and some mothers trying to keep their children happy and contented stuck sweets, lollipops, crackers (some even breast-fed their babies during baptism itself) into the mouths of their babies.

I am also in-charge of the catechetical department of our parish. 1 have 10 catechists helping me, and they teach religion and prepare the children for the First Holy Communion Even in Ireland this is a big event for the children and parents, so it is here in the Philippines. The parents of the children though they are poor prepare also something for their children, perhaps a newlywashed white T-shirt or a new one if they could afford it.

We started since October of last year and we hope to finish the First Holy Communion of the children by the end of March. Plenty of children ? Oh, yes, indeed ! You see, we Filipinos love children so we always make sure that we have plenty of them all the time. Preparing the children for communion takes a long time you know. All in all we will have 1100 children who will have received their First Holy Communion by the end of March.

School year here in the Philippines is nearly over and then summer begins. We have the so.called "summer camps" at this time of the year. Our major seminarians go to different parishes all over the Philippines (where the Divine Word Missionaries are) and they help in the formation of the basic christian communties (BCC). It is a great help for us for in this way we are able to reach the far out boundaries of our parish. And the

people learn how to keep their christian community alive in the spirit of the Lord.

I will tell you more about this next mail. As of now I must close this letter for I still have to attend to "my flock". Give my loving regards to your children and to your husband


we shall be carrying out experiments but these shall not interfere with the reception '

1. Dried Milk, eggs, cheese.

2. Tins of mackerel, sardines, meat. Reedyx Dianxs Hows x CROOSER HOS X

- stews, casseroles and ready dinners as follows : 3. Tins of fruit and milk puddings 4. Jars of orange juice and /or Ribena
- Packets of soups and boyril cubes 5.
- 6. Packets of oatmeal flakes or Weetabix

7. Jars or tins of Horlicks, Cocoa or Drinking Chocolate

- 8. Packets of 'instant' potatoes
- 9. Packets of crackers and plain
- biscuits . Digestive or Goldgrain,
- 10. Packets of rice, comflower, custard 11. Packets of tea and sugar.
- 12. Packets of flavoured or natural complan.

If you buy one food from each number per week, you can build up your Emergency Dry Food Store.



NEW MEMBERS WELCOME

Letter to Ger, Brady Further to your letter dated 25th February 1980, concerning the Lucan/ Leixlip/Kilcock by - pass I investigated the matter and the current position is as follows:-

The Road Development Plan makes provision for a new route from Dublin to west Kilcock. The line initially envisaged resulting from the Dublin Transportation study is being re investigated at present taking account of recent development works, in,line obstructions etc. It is envisaged that the new route would avoid towns on the existing route, but construction standard has not yet been determined.

The Road Development Plan envisages substantial completion of work by 1989. but achievement of this will depend on progress in planning and land acquision and other relevant considerations.

Major improvements are also provided for in the Road Development Plan for sections of the existing route:-Notice of Motion - 'That this Council take immediate steps to put the road at Kilmacraddock into a proper state of repair

The damage to this road at Kil -

MAIN STREET,

macraddock was due to some work done by a Local Group Water Scheme. I shall ensure that the Group Water Scheme put the road in a proper state of repair. It is mainly drainage and muck. When the above work is completed I will arrange to have the road patched where necessary.

I refer to representations made by you concerning the refuse collection service to Kilmacraddock and Barroughstown in the Maynooth area, and wish to inform you that a water scheme is presently being constructed along this route, and this is preventing access by the refuse collection vehicle. As soon as this work is finished and the road restored, normal weekly collection will resume.

CHAPELIZOD BY-PASS - Dublin Corporation has rejected its engineerJs plans for the by-pass. It is understood that the objections relate to specific sections of the proposed line and that the Corporation is investigating an alternative to that section.

PALMERSTOW'N/BALLYDOWD SECTION

On 20th November, 1989 the Minister confirmed a Compulsory Purchase Order for the lands necessary for this section of the road. The planning and execution of the proposal is now a matter for Dublin County Council.

LUCAN BY-PASS - Outline proposals for a by-pass of Lucan ware submitted to the Department by Dublin County Council. The proposals envisage a new road to dual carriageway standard over a distance of 4.5 km towards Leixlip. Further details were re quested from the Council and these are Well done Mary.

Kildare Co. Co. has agreed, at the request of Cllr. Durkan, to seek a meeting with representivies of C.I.E. to discuss public transport in the County.

Following representations made by CIIr. B. Durkan the Co. Engineer has stated that immediate attention will be given to the roads in and around Maynooth, with reference to potholes, particularly on the Dunboyne Road, and the Square.

Clir. Durkan has been informed by Kildare Co. Co. that the developer is attending to the landscaping at Carton Court.

At a recent Co. Co. meeting Cllr. Durkanrequested that an amenity grant be made available to the Royal Canal Amenity Group to assist that group in it's efforts to develope the canal to it's full potentials and the motion was agreed unanimously.

At the same Meeting he asked the Council to investigate the possibility of providing further amenity lands in Maynooth, in accordance with the Co. Development plan, and the Co. Manager has agreed to meet a deputation to discuss the matter.

The Footbridge :- has arrived at the local Co. Co. depot at the Harbour and will be placed in position shortly.



NOTES FROM BERNARD DURKAN



At a recent Co. Co. meeting CIIr. Durkan complained about the poor telephone service in the County, and the Minister has been asked to take the necessary steps to improve same. Also at a recent Co. Co. Meeting CIIr. Durkan expressed his extreme annoyance that no financial provision had been made by the Minister in the current year for the improvement of the road at Collestown . between Maynooth and Leixlip - which is regarded as one of the most dangerous roads in the Country.

YOUTH EMPLOYMENT :-

CIIr. Durkan reports that the Department of Education is to continue the Youth Employment Scheme in the current year.

Under the Scheme, grants are made to Youth, Sport and Community Associations for the employment of young people on suitable work projects.

This year, in addition to the normal grants payable in respect of the wages of young workers, the Department will also consider requests for assistance towards the cost of materials, where a building project is undertaken, as well as a contribution towards the employment of skilled adult workers, where it is felt that such aid is necessary for the satisfactory execution of the project.
