MAYNOOTH BAND 50th Anniversary

This year St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band will celebrate the fiftieth Anniversary of the reformed Band in 1931. Maynooth has had a band for something in the region of 200 years but there were short periods during which the Band lapsed and the few years before 1931 was one of these periods. It is interesting to note that there is a record of a prominent person visiting Maynooth in the seventeen nineties being greeted by the 'Local Band'. The Band is also on record as having been in attendance at the funeral of Charles Stewart Parnell. It is however, the reconstituted Band of 1931 that is now about to celebrate its 50th Anniversary.

The Band was reconstituted with the help of Rev. Fr. Grogan C.C. at the time in Maynooth and Happily a photograph of the 'new' Band is still available and is shown elsewhere in these columns.

It would be interesting in this year to try and trace the History of the Band in Maynooth.

Editorial

It is, indeed very pleasing to note that the number of serious accidents on our roads has shown a decrease for the past year but this is no reason for any complainency as the number of accidents in general shows no improvement. It is probable that the greater use of seat belts has helped to prevent death or serious injury in some cases. There is, however, no real improvement in ordinary good manners on the road (and too often on the footpath as well). It must be admitted that the congested state of our roads here contributes greatly to the bad manners but it is not an excuse. Drivers who cannot control their feelings even in congested traffice are not fit to drive at all. On the other hand, drivers who display bad manners in ordinary or light traffice have no right to have a driving licence at all.

Bad manners on the road can also be displayed in where and how you park your car and need not be confined to driving only. Those for instance who park across the gateway to somebody else's premises, who park out on the road whilst having a chat, who double park, who park dangerously at corners, junctions or crossings, all blat ently show their bad manners and contempt for other people's rights. Another fine display of bad manners is shown by the person who drives on the footpath to a shop doorwhile there is adequate parking space on the roadway at or near the shop.

All things considered, it is strange to see how many people brand themselves publicly as unmannerly so-and-sos by the way they use or park their cars. Stranger still, very many of these people would be highly offended if we were to consider them unmannerly or churlish.

LABOUR PARTY NOTES

The Annual General Meeting of the Branch was held on Sunday 11th January in the Geraldine Hall, and was well attended. Joe Bermingham T.D. addressed the Meeting and spoke on Unemployment and The Economy. There was no shortage of material for his address and he cited the forthcoming 250 redundancies in the Meat Packers, 50 in Sallins, and reported on the fact that unemploy ment in Newbridge, which many would regard as Kildare's Industrial Show piece, has increased by Staggering 300%. With inflation running at 3 times the level projected by the Government, Deputy Birmingham painted a grim picture indeed of the economic state of the Country.

At the recent Constituency selection Conference, Deputy Joe Birmingham and Councillor Emmet Stagg were selected to contest two seats for Kildare. As a result of his nomination Councillor Stagg is resigning as Secretary of Kildare Constituency Council, and he made the point that the key issue in the next General Election must be the state of the economy. He went on to say that problems such as the situation in Northern Ireland (which has often been the scape-goat for our own domestic ills) can hardly be used for political capital by any political party, since there is general agreement between the 3 main parties in their approach to the subject.

The Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer gave their reports on the year's proceedings and the most important points were:-

- (1) Meetings were held regularly, punctually, and were well attended
- (2) Membership have grown to nearly 40 paid-up members.
- (3) The Branch has been involved in every aspect of local affairs, e.g. Housing, Road Reparis, provision of footpath, E.S.B. light ingcharity work etc. Most of this work has been channelled through Councillor Stagg to the County Council.
- (4) The Branch is in a very healthy financial position and is geariing itself for the next General election.

the November Meeting of the Branch, that there is a new Builder on the Greenfields site. The houses are expected to be finished early in the New Year, and anyone who had applied for the private sites should contact Councillor Stagg. Also in the Green fields, area, the County Council are involved in the purchase of land along side the Railway line. This scheme would entail building a new road parallel to the Railway and building houses on the land which at the moment forms part of the back gardens of the existing houses. As stated previously in this column, the Maynooth Town Branch views the present housing situation with alarm, and intends to explore every avenue to help provide this basic ingred ient of Family life. To this end, act ing on a request from this Branch, the Kildare Labour Councillors have tabled a motion for consideration by the County Council, the text of which is as follows:-

"That Kildare County Council embark on a programme of building houses for sale to those who would normally qual ify for Council sites; and that a scheme be organised by the Council whereby prospective house purchasers would lodge savings with the Council, thereby making the programme of home.building self-financing"

No doubt this proposal will draw some heavy flak from those bureaucrats who see it as their duty to point out the shortcomings of other peoples' suggestion. Of course there would be legal, financial, and administrative problems to be tackled, but if the Building Society can make huge profits from catering for private house purchasers, why should it not have a non-profit making body, under the auspices of the County Council catering for Council house purchasers? We await the outcome of this issue with interest.

Joe Bermingham T_•D_• was in attendance at a meeting and gave a report on un - employment in the County. It has risen by an incredible 50% in the past year. There are no 100 less people in employment with the County Council than there were 2 years ago. These depressing

statistics do not argue well for the Governments promise of full employment by 1982.

The County Council acknowledged reports from Councillor Stagg on defective E.S.B. lighting, defective manhole covers at Cluain Aoibhinn and Greenfields, damaged trees in the square, and a request for a Litter Warden to operate at week-ends. These items will be reported on as they are processed by the Council. After representations by Labour T.D. Joe Bermingham the Dept. of Posts and Telegraphs have finally decided to provide a Telephone Kiosk at Carton Court.

MR. STEPHEN RYNNE - The death in December last of Mr. Stephen Rynne came as a great blow to the County as a whole. His sterling work in the County will be remember ed for many a year to come.

Born in England, he came to Kildare more than fifty years ago and was a student at Clongowes Wood College. He became well know as author and broadcaster and his radio programme were followed with interest by a large audience. Mr. Rynne was married to authress Alice Curtayne and lived with his family at Downings, Prosperous.

Always interested in local matters he took great interest in Muintir Na Tire and lent his full aid in particular to the very successful Roberstown Branch with its Annual Festa. He was President of Muintir na Tire for some considerable time. Among his other interests, was the restoration of the Canals and the success of the organised fishing and shooting in the Prosperous area is also indicative of his assistance and advice.

This NEWSLETTER also owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Rynne for his help and advice freely given us and for many contributions in the early days.

Men of Mr. Rynne's calibre are few and far between and his generosity will be long remembered in this County and elsewhere. Let us remember him in our prayers.

EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

The former articles were only a guide to help you understand your child's development. Much of the gaps will be filled by personal experience, as awareness that only experience can give. The child's spiritual and academic development was taken over by the Church and School and parents were led to feel inadequate. Due to findings of research groups, these governing bodies have been enlightened that the parents are the prime educators and by sending them to school meant that they were delegating their authority. If it is delegated author ity, the parents should be the inspirators when the objectives of a school are being developed. For example, a recent survey has shown that the majority of parents wish to send their children to schools run by religious. Why?

It is that the same process, such as the mental faculties, biological functions are used to live both a Christian life and a secular life. If these faculties and functions are tapped in only one area, or a weak presentation of it, the second area is not called to operate or at least on a very limited standard. In other words, if religion and secular activities are divorced, the strong one takes hold and dictates or suppresses the other. In schools run by religious, religion and secular life are integrated and balanced and both support each other. This leads to a fuller personality and so greater performance.

These governing bodies have very subtly handed authority to parents by covering their own misgivings and blaming the parents. I have made much research into such allegations and found that the "culpable" parents were themselves victims of the governing system. 8 would go so far as to say, that some learned their bad ways from the indoctrination and example given them when being educated by that system. Hence we have much vandalism, delinquency,

broken marriages, etc. These deviant ways develop when one is demotivated. (very important to remember this)

In my very first acticle, I said every school should have aims and objectives. Why are objectives important? All groups, like all people need to know where they are going in order to know the means to get there. It is the best way to respond to the nature of the group and the one best assured of the individual. Objectives should be chosen so that they will be realizable (achievable) and will respond to needs. As previously mentioned, people are spiritual, physical, psychological and academic. If we analyse our own environment we will become aware that there have been more technical applications in the temporate sphere but there is more possibility for success in the spiritual. All Christ's means were ordained to his objectives to save mankind according to the will of the Father-teaching His Apostles. When a company organizes for automoblies to go on the market, they are going to organize for the best possible way to assure this aim. Objectives help to function the movement of the group. If those in authority (including parents now) are unsure of their objectives then the school children will be unsure. The word has no meaning until such time as the Spirit puts life and meaning into it.

What is an objective? It is a result which we wish to attain, situated at the levels of realizations (achievements), and not of the level of the enterprises' nature - it concerns what we do and not what we are (e.g. what we want to do). It is necessary to have a plan for carrying out objectives and an effecient leader who will co-ordinate the activities and integrate the whole. Adjusting and correcting may be necessary. Only the results are evaluated (not persons or activities).

There are three basic philosophical elements to be considered when developing objectives:-

1) Favour the personal committment at all levels. Each one is responsible at his level of the functioning of his

objectives, his work and control.

2) Favour participation at all levels. Those on a lower level are often more competitent to specify at what can be done on an operational level.

Therefore, one must have recourse to all information and suggestions that they will bring.

3) Permit everyone to be autonomous in the evaluation and control of the results. It is through committment that they control and exercise their responsibility to the very life of the enterprise. In order to assure the effecient functioning of the organization, it is necessary to know the exact nature of the group: what it is and not what it does - nature - who I am - attitudes of life. This leads into a much finer analysis. It is very wrong thinking to prepare a child for a job. Would you like me to start a course to prepare you for old age? The answers you give apply to the way you treat children !!! They have the same answers but have no say in the matter. They say "Please let me live"

Here's a little bit of homework for you,
There are seven steps in developing
objectives. Read the following
guidelines and plan what your aims
and objectives are - not what you
think they should be out as they are
with you now. Next issue, I will
go through a similar process.

SEVEN STEPS :-

- 1) define the nature of the group school children.
- 2) define the objectives;
- 3) make plans;
- 4) organize
- 5) integrate the members;
- 6) direct;
- 7) control.

Editorial

Being a University town has some advantages, particularly that we are under the eye of the whole country, but it can have disadvantages as well. One of the disadvantages is that we attract the attention of undesirables.

On several occasions lately we understand that young women have been accosted by some of these undesirable in the late evening and even, in one case, in the middle of the day in the public street. Some of these cases have been resported to the police but we believe there are others that may not have been reported. As far as we know none of the cases involved assult with the exception of one which involved assault of a minor nature.

We do not wish to be alarmists but, at the same time, there have been two cases of assault and murder in the County and it is only prudent that our womenfolk should be warned and should, if possible, take reasonable precautions if moving around alone late in the evening. It is also prudent that men and women alike should be on the look -out for incidents of this nature and be ready to lend a hand if necessary.

It is also important that all such cases of accosting should be reported to the Gardai, with as full a description of the person who approaches them. It is, of course, unlikely that a victim will remember all details but little things remembered can build up to a clear picture.

There is no shame in being a victim of such an incident and it is important that all incidents be reported. Police are trained to deal with such matters and it is quite likely that it will be a Ban Garda who will interview the victim. Remember your silence may be the cause of another's misfortune.

If you know of anybody who has been accosted and who has not reported the matter, encourage them to do so - it will help to build the picture. Everybody else - be watchful.



The Budget increased from £2 to £3 the weekly value of fuel vouchers under Urban Authority & Health Board Schemes. Arrangements for payment of this increase are as follows:-

- 1) Pensioners who get their Fuel Vouchers at Post Offices (other than Cork City) will receive an extra £2 voucher every second week beginning on Friday 6th February and continuing until 17th April. An addition £1 voucher will be issued on Friday 24th April.
- 2) In the case of those who get fuel vouchers other than at post offices the issuing sources Health Boards Urban Authorities and Employment Exchanges are making arrangements for payment of the increased allow ance as soon as possible.



Here I am again with a request to have a letter of thanks and appreciation published in The Newsletter. I am grateful to you for publishing all my letters in the past. Thank you and all those involved in the NEWSLETTER. I receive it from home regularly and it helps to keep up to date with people and events around the home-town.

I want, once more, to extend sincere thanks to Mrs. Hannah Flood and her helpers for the very successful Sale of Work which was held on November 9th last. It was a very successful venture in every way. It is difficult for a chap like me to express in words how much I appreciate the efforts made at home to give support to the work here. But it is really fantastic. It is truly sad that the good that people do is often over shadowed by the much publicity given to people's mistakes.

I don't want to appear dramatic or sentimental, but the hard fact is that life here gets a bit tough at times. There often appears more 'downs' than 'ups' One is inclined to see the hole more than the doughnut. Then along comes the Sale of Work at home and that much needed kick or injection is received. Here we have a group of people, inspired, no doubt, by one good leader, who, also faced the ups and downs of life in this time of all kinds of crisis, are prepared to forget their own problems and help some people many miles away. But this surely is in keeping with the idea of Missionary work. The Church at home is also missionary and this effort ing its missionary mandate. With this kind of support from home one is ready to face life with renewed vigour. One feels like a forward with the backs playing well.

There is another group of helpers I would also like to mention with thanks and they are Gearoid McTiernan and his little group of collectors. These

are the people who are there all the year round. Their weekly collect -

ions down through the years have been of enormous help in the work here.

And what do I do with all the money! Well, let me just run through a few things we have been doing during 1980. First of all our Adult Literacy programme could continue with many people learning to read and write. Then we renovated a community centre in one of the slum areas of the city of Sargodha - a place called Nuri Gate Basti. We also constructed a small chapel close by in a village that also serves as a community centre of some kind. We took a group of 60 school boys to the mountains camping during the summer. We plan now to build a centre for evening Adult Literacy classes and sewing work in a newly constructed village. The people have built their own houses there but of very poor quality and there is no place for community activity. We also plan a housing scheme for very poor people. This will involve a lot of money and at the moment I haven't a clue where it will come from, but, if it is God's will money will even come from heaven.

So, these are the kind of projects the help that comes from home is used for. I can assure you that the help received is treasured and used in the best possible way.

Dear Old Friends & Senior Citizens of Maynooth,

To those of you who wrote to me dur . ing the year, a very happy Christmas; to those of you who did not, a happy Christmas; and to those of you who weren't planning to send me a Christmas card - I can only hope that the weather won't be as cold as your hearts! In the midst of your guilt, maybe you'll find time to spare a prayer for the likes of us.

When I was on the receiving end of these sort of 'general' letters from the missions, I resolved never to be party to the writing of one. Before pressures of time, work and inability to get acceptable cards, my resolve has melted. Please excuse your being bundled together with all my other friends, but I assure you you're in good company!

I met a good many of you during my unexpected safari in Ireland during the Summer, and those of you who didn't meet me undoubtedly heard of my illness and operation. I returned to Zambia in mid-September, and rejoice to report that I seem to be in superb ecclesiastical health, thanks to the good Sisters of the Bons Secours in Cork, and to the outrageous 'spoiling' by many of you on my travels around the Country. With my illustrious forerunner, St. Paul, I too can say ,

"Forgetting the things that are past, and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal" (Phillipians 4). Beir Buadh agus beannacht - Fr. Aodhan.

To all of you who were so kind to me, a thousand thanks ; it speeded up my healing Greetings of the warmest (900 in the process considerably, I'm quite sure.

Well, since my return, I've been labouring in the vineyards of Holy Cross Parish, Kabushi and St. Kizito's, lubuto, two adjoining parishes in the Copperbelt city of Ndola. If the vinedressers were up to the mark the sun is certainly not lacking to to produce abundant fruit for the Son. My companion-in-arms is a volunteer diocesan priest from Tuam, but also living in the house with us is another Tyrone man, Fr. P. J. Gormley, who teaches in a local secondary school. My Classmate Fr. Pat O'Mahony, whom many of you know is back from the language school, astonishing all and sundry with his proficiency in Cibemba. He is temporarily in charge of a parish in Kitwo, an hourJs drive away.

Indeed none of the dozen or so SMA Fathers here are more than an hour's drive away : that makes for good morale, and I'm glad that all are well

For myself, I suppose it's a question of ! familiarity breeding content, to adapt a wellknown (phrase. Respect, not contempt comes with knowledge of the Babemba. For all the wretchedness of their lives, they can teach us alot about happiness, not to mention about how to celebrate lituray. Even I, the strong advocate of musically lively liturgies, sometimes find it just a Bit too much ! Their enthusiasm for the faith out weighs any disadvantages in working with them. Please continue to pray that this young Church may mature into a sturdy and vibrant adult Christian community.

It is nice to know that ones friends are always thinking of one, and how they would be 'pleased' to wipe out the city of Dublin, Bantry Oil stores, and just a few other little portions of the Country. 'With friends like that who needs enemies?' We are not referring just to England but apparently America and the Adefender of small nations' Russia all seem to have the same sweet thoughts.

Factual or fanciful we have, however, to seriously consider our situation either as neutrals or beligerents and see what we can do about our situation. An a tomic bomb dropped on Dublin would seriously effect us. Even at this distance from the city we would be in the area of, at least, light damage to property and, of course, we would be at serious risk from fallout. With all the current unrest in the world and talk of 'when the next war commences' it would be stupid of us not to consider what we can do to protect ourselves should the worst come to the worst.

There are those who take the gloomiest view and say that there is nothing we can do but wait to be eliminated and this is just a fallacy. Yes, if a bomb drops close to you, there is no need to worry (except perhaps for your immortal soul and that is in your own hands). In fringe areas such as Maynooth, we have to consider how we will be placed after the bomb has gone off and how to protect ourselves from fallout. By following the routine laid down it is quite possible to survive and live a long life afterwards but one must consider the situation now and have ones plans made. How better to instruct yourself on these matters than by joining the Civil Defence services now and being ready if and when the time comes. The Chief Civil Defence Officer, St. Mary's Naas or any other Civil Defence personnel can tell you what to do.

Consider the matter well - one day your life might depend on it. A few hours training might make a difference in the long run.

CIIr. BERNARD DURKAN NOTES

The Eastern Health Board replying to a question by Cllr. Durkan on the number of Children in Kildare awaiting ORTHODONTIC treatment (i.e. for dental defects) was informed that there are 1,290 children awaiting assessment. Due however to a shortage of trained personal etc. it was not possible to deal rapidly with all cases but additional personal is being trained and it is hoped to speed up the process.

In reply to a further question by ClIr.
Durkan on the number of children
requiring 'Speech Therapy', the
number of sessions each child can
expect, and if the situation was satisfactory?

The Board stated that there are 291 children awaiting assessment (being seen at the rate of 5 per week) and 225 assessed children in need of regular therapy also seen at the rate of 5 per week.

(Note . It would take 58 weeks to see each child and 45 weeks to treat each child .N ot at all satisfactory).

Further replies from the Co. Council on CIIr. Durkan's enquiries.:-

- 1) The Council has agreed to provide ramps at a Number of kerbs to fac ilitat Wheel Chairs etc.
- 2) The Council intend to convert 'The Pound' at Mill Street into a small Park. Levelling work has been carried out.

3) (Re allocation of private building sites at Maynooth & Celbridge). It was hoped to allocate available sites this month but the provision of additional sites would depend on Capital allocation and the priority adopted by the Councillors.

PRESS RELEASE !

Clir. Bernard Durkan, speaking to Branch Members in 'Leixlip' called for the re-opening of the Railway Stations in Leixlip, Maynooth, Kilcock & Enfield, in order to facilitate Commuters. He said that it was ridiculous to have these Stations closed and the Western line underutilised , when the Main Road from Kilcock to Dublin was suffering from severe traffic congestion. He said that the same case could be made, for the re-opening to Commuter traffic of the Stations in many of the major Towns in Co. Kildare, and that if elected in the forthcoming general election, he would strive to achieve that objective.

He also stated that as a first step in this direction, a 'skeleton' commuter service could be provided i.e. one Train at peak hours, morning and evening could stop at each of the stations, even on a temporary basis in order to evaluate the need.

Clir. Durkan said that the number of working hours saved by the public if the service is provided must surely benefit our economy.



GERARD BRADY'S NOTES

- (7) The Department of P & T are to contact Mr. Brady following his representations to them re phone services for Cluain Aoibhinn Carton Court Maynooth Park.

Letter re Carton Avenue.

I am directed by the County Manager to refer to the matter of Carton Ave., Maynooth, which was raised recently at the Clane Area Sites Committee Meeting, and the position in regard to this property is as follows:-

- 1) The Kildare County Council, on ascertaining that Carton Avenue was available for purchase, obtained a valuation therefor and entered into negotiations with Carton Properties Ltd. for the purchase of the Avenue 11 acres approx. for the sum of £10,000.
- 2) Carton Properties Ltd. agreed to sell the Avenue to the Council for this sum so that it could be developed as an amenity area subject to right of access through the town gate to the existing gate lodge.



- 4) On the basis of this information, The Council proceeded to secure the boundary along both sides of the Avenue, inclusing the closing off of at least three field gates which appeared to open on to the Avenue.
- 5) Subsequen to this action, correspondence was received from Messrs. John J O'Hare & Co. Solicitors, on behalf of Messrs. J. P. & M. Doyle Ltd., claiming that their company had an agree ment with Carton Properties Ltd which gave them certain rights across the Avenue, linking land on both sides, and copy of the appropriate section of the agreement, which appeared to in dicate that J.P. & M. Doyle Ltd. had a right of way at three points across the Avenue, was submitted. On the basis of the extract from the Deed of Conveyance, the Council's sol icitors advised that J.P. & M. Doyle Ltd., as the owners of the land on either side of the Avenue, had a right to cross the Avenue for all purposes on foot and with or without horses, cattle, other farm stock, farm implements and machinery, over three defined passageways 15 ft. wide.

J. P. & M. Doyle Ltd. also had per mission to lay a 12" pipe across the Avenue.

These rights are subject to J. P. & M. Doyle Ltd. keeping the gateways at the opening secure so as to prevent stock straying from their lands on to the Avenue. They are also required to keep the crossing points in clean condition and in repair, and they are further obliged to maintain the boundary fences on each side of the Avenue in good repair and condition so as prevent stock trepassing on the Avenue.

While the crossing points are somewhat of an inconvenience, the obligations placed on Messrs. J. P. & M. Doyle Ltd in relation to these rights, and the responsibility which they have for the maintenance of fencing, minimeses the inconvenience to a very great extent. It is considered that the rights of way referred to will not create any problem and that the development of Carton Avenue will provide a much needed amenity in Maynooth and will ensure the preservation of the Avenue. The entrance to the Avenue from the rear has been fenced off so as to prevent trepass on the Avenue from that area. The provision of a gate at this end of the Avenue will be considered when the scheme for its develop ment is being prepared.

I hope the above clarifies the position for you and if there is any further information you require, please let me know.







Dear Gerry,

I am happy to tell you that I have approved the commencement of work on the extension to Maynooth Post-Primary School.

My department's building unit will shortly be issuing the formal letter of approval in the matter to the Co. Kildare Vocational Education Comm ittee.

Signed :- J.P.Wilson, Minister for Educ 3rd. Nov. '80 Dear Councillor,

I am directed by the Co. Manager to refer to previous correspondence and to representations in regard to development at Newtown, Maynooth, and concerning the points raised, I wish to make the following obser-vations:-

- (1) Normal E.S.B. requirements will be looked for in street lighting in all locations
- (2) There is no finance available in the bond for Cluain Aoibhinn to provide a tennis court. However, the layout for Meadow View includes a tennis court and will be considered as part of that development and covered by the bond of £35.000.00
- (3) The security in the sum of £35,000,000 will'be by way of insurance bond or bank bond, or failing that a cash deposit of a similar sum for the entire development.

Regarding the present/contributions to services, this matter of the contribution to services will be reviewed when the annual estimates of the Co. Council are considered.

THE BOYS' PRIEST

THE FIRST BOY

December 8 th 1841 Don Bosco was vesting for Mass. From the cold outdoors a boy sneaks into the sacristy for a bit of warmth. The sacristan swings his cane widly and sends him out. "Call that boy back !, he's my friend" Don Bosco shouts. Don Bosco had met his first boy, an orphan out of work, and easy mark for some swindler. For such as him the prison gates swung wide But just now a friendly word, a smile from the lad and the promise that he will return for a catechism lesson. The following week there were seven boys. Then week after week they increased in number, coming to Don Bosco every Sunday for catechism lesson, for confession and mass and then for whole day's fun in the open country side. Thus began Don Bosco's work for boys. Like all beginnings it was painful. He and his boys were pushed from pillar to post. The work was misunderstood by the clergy and looked upon with suspision by the city police. There were a lot of bills to be payed. There were harsh words and insults at times. But Don Bosco was not easily put off and kept going. He trusted that God would not let him down.

THE SHED

Don Bosco's first permanent school was a broken down shed in Turin's under-developed tenement district. Though the neighbourhood was bad, Don Bosco took the building and adjoining piece of land for a playground. Today on that very spot stands a magnificent marble-studded Basilica to 'Mary help of Christians'-- Don Bosco's Madonna -- plus a large school for students, shops for trade courses, a hugh publishing house and the headquarters of the SALESIAN SOCIETY. it all started in a shed. In 1854, Don Bosco who now harboured orphans in a larger house, opened the first workshops to teach his boys trades. And who was the teacher? Don Bosco himself. In addition to his priestly duties he still found the time to teach carpentary and shoe repairing, to write books, find work for his boys, run the Sunday Boy's Club and Cathecism classes and to think up new ways of spreading his work. "Give me sould" was his motto, the "souls of boys". His first dream was now paying off..

Meanwhile may we take this opportunity of wishing all our friends in Maynooth, a very, happy, peaceful Christmas, and a Prosperous New Year.



EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

Adolescence is the period of transition between childhood and adult life. Within this period their are three distinct phases; a) puberty; b) transition period; c) late adolescence.

a) Puberty starts between 12 and 14 years where the adolescent enters the gang stage. This term is not to be associated with those who are involved in vandalism or even toughness. These stages are deviations caused by unhealthy development. Accompanying the puberty stage is physical growth and biological development. youth grows rapidly, is awkard and lacks co-ordination due to rapid growth of limbs. In primitive days this puberty stage had an easy passage to the next and the psychological and physical development balanced, passing just like former stages of early child hood by not having a chrises in life.

Today, it is well observed that their is a wide gap between the physical and psychological and mental development of the adolescent, due to environmental stress and delinquency is constantly associated with this stage but it does not mean that they mentally unbalanced or completely devoid of moral standards. There are various reasons for delinquency caused by environmental stress, such as, poverty stricken or broken homes (family conflict or giving bad example); spoilt and lonely children (both parents out working); and poor environment of city sub-c . cultures and many others.

One major factor that causes sex perversions is that early childhood experience often come to light or surface in adolescence because of the upsurge of sexual life at this period. Repression of childhood sex development, as mentioned in former articles often give rise to strange duality which I will not speak about here.

This is very often found in middle class Society with high-minded prin - ciples and often very religious.

b) The transition period emerges at 14 to 16. The starting of this stage is often recognized by the young adolescence moodiness. They tend to isolate themselves and go for walks etc. alone. The gang spirit looses their interest and they pass from friends of same age to opposite sex. This temperament change is caused by the transition from grouping with the same sex to the heterosexual phase.

It is often found that instead of attraction to the opposite sex of their own age, the boy plays the man to his mother and cares for her needs with tenderness and admiration. The girl devotes herself to the minute attention of her Father just as her mother would. In both cases the adolescents play the adult role. Observing these characteristics, adolesences have won the name of being generous.

The home has a vital part to play in their healthy development. The adolescent is learning the adult way of life by exercising this art of chivalrous love. If relationships in the home are not healthy, they may become insensitive which will effect their relationships in marriage and parenthood later on.

As was mentioned of former stages, play identification and imagination help each stage towards the next and collectively these stages prepare the child for future adulthood. The same is happening to the young adolescents when they play either mothers or father's role and is keeping alive the heterosexual feelings in a non-sexual form. It is enacting marriage and like most play is anticipatory. It develops confidence

in their relationship with their complimentary sex. Living in a healthy environment, qualities of character, such as tenderness and devotion develop. The adolescent of 15 or so soon passes from this egocentric period to interpersonal relations.

 c) Later adolescence is between 16 to 18 years and it is the heterosexual (opposite) phase. The first stage of love emerges.

Various elements predominate such as the desire to attract, at another time romance takes hold. The girl wants to be beautiful to attract and the boy wants to show his strength and manliness. Beauty and strength in volve health so that both are looking for a healthy companions. Romance soon follows and 'falling in love' takes its place. As was earlier mentioned. that there is a wide gap between biological and mental development, adolescence should not be encouraged to go 'steady'. Dating is different. The adolescent may have dates; the greater number of boys and girls 'dated' the greater the prestige but more important is the greater experience of various types of char acters. Such as experience allows them to choose and select the type of part er suitable for them to share a complete loving relationship forever. Unfortun ately, many never pass the stage of rom ance and after six months marriage, they are confronted with the grim facts that they don't know what love is.

Next article will be the long awaited topic of Aims and Objectives of Schools. It was necessary to inform you of your child's psychological development in order to make a choice of school. Getting to know your child with the limited (repeat limited) information, puts you in a better position to make this crucial choice.

(1) The major task of early adolescence can be regarded as having to do with the conquest of thought - to take his mental constructions as objects and reason about them. It is only around this time children spontaneously introduce concepts of belief, intelligence and faith into their

Be cause of their egocentrism in their psychological development they fail to diffentiate their own thoughts from those of others. In other words, if they are critical of themselves, they feel others think the same. So it could be said, adolescence are acting to an imaginative audience . This imaginary, is in part at least, would account for a variety of typical adolescent behavious and experiences (being self-conscious). Gathering of young adolescence are unique in the sense that each one is an actor to himself and an audience to others. The lovely part of this imagination is that they have a tendency to confide in a personal God and instead of looking for gifts they seek guidance and support.





Our Seniors competed in the Kildare Novice_Championship, in Leixlip. The 8 man team all_completed the course and the biggest cheer at the end was for





Editorial


Election fever is in the air again, rightly or wrongly. At the time of going to press, at least, no official promouncement has been made but the signs are there and the betting is that we will have an election in the month of May.

This time more than any other it is most important that we cast our vote and more than just cast our vote, we must cast our vote wisely. Not for many years has the economy been in such a delicate state and in need of a serious boost and the employment situation is getting worse. It is therefore a time for serious thought by us (the Electorate) and important that we do our duty without fail.

Unfortunately at election times things tend to get a bit confused with money been suddenly found by the Government for this or that opoular grant or such like and one wonders why these little goodies can appear suddenly at such a times. Against this we have the Opposition parties promising the sun, moon, and stars with perhaps a comet or two thrown in for good measure. It tends to become bewildering to the ordinary man in the street and he is inclined to bog down in the sudden melee.

In circumstances like this it is far better to forget about these suddenly found gifts and promises (and most of them are just this) of the immediate present and take a look at the basic questions, viz. 



Letter from Kildare Co. Council.

I wish to refer to your respresent ations concerning housing develop ments in Maynooth, namely Cluain Aoibhinn and Greenfields.

With regard to Cluain Aoibhinn, an enforcement Notice has been served on the developer that the estate be completed in accordance with the planning permission.

As a condition of the permission, a cash deposit was lodged with Kildare County Council in lieu of an insurance bond conditioned for the completion of the estate. In addition, a planning permission for a housing development adjoining Cluain Aoibhinn specifies that certain work is to be carried out in remedying and rectifying certain matters in Cluain Aoibhinn Estate.

The Council is keeping the situation under observation and will take all necessary steps to ensure the com pletion of the estate by the devel -

With regard to Greenfields, an enforcement Notice for the completion of the estate was served on the developer and court proceedings taken. The developer was fined on two occasions by the Court. I have been informed by the Court Clerk that, to dates, the fines have not been paid.

The Council is considering, in conjunction with its legal advisers what appropriate action should now be taken to ensure that the estate is completed in accordance with the original planning permission and the requirements of the Enforcement Notice.



You will be pleased to know that the fund-raiding part of our present ground-rent campaign is going well and that we have reached the hitherto elusive target-figure of £20,000. We are now nearing the end of our door-to-door canvassing and will soon close the money-raising part of things so as to get down to real business. Every resident is being given the opportunity of saying a free yes or no to the present offer or of giving a commitment to pay in the near future. After that, it will be a matter between the individual resident and the ground landlord. and the tacit solidarity among residents of the estate over withhold ing payment of ground-rent will no longer obtain.

The plan of campaign from now on is being carefully considered. When cutting the Greens for the second time, the handful of volunteer residents, doing so have had to be satisfied with two or three small motor mowers, and this involves a lot of work. (By the way, if you happen to see reside nts cutting or raking grass, please don't think that that is their business; all hands are very welcome. We know we did not notify you of the first cutting: we will try to do so in future, so that the Committee can rely on volunteers to at least help with the patch in front of their houses.)

Grass-cutting is annoying but we will have to try and organize some way of tackling it on a year-to-year basis.



I wish to refer to a report on "Community Games Art" written by Peig Lynch in your recent issue. Peig asked the undersigned and Kildare Executive of Community Games to take note of the fact that 300 entrants had competed in the competition in Maynooth. This reference was prompted by the fact that the County Executive had to limit the number of competitors for the County Finals to one per age

group per area. I would like to assure Peig and your readers that the latter decision was taken with great reluctance, since it is our aim to strive for maximum participation. The facts are :-

If we allowed three entrants per area we anticipated entries of 850-870 children. We, unfortunately have not at our disposal either the facilities to cater for nor the personnel to supervise such a large number of competitors. EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

You probably have done your home work by now or you may have wait ed for me to give you the answers. If you tried to make up your own mind about what aims and objectives you wish to have in the school your child attends, then you will understand more fully the high standard that should be maintained in every school. I will now take each stage of the guidelines given in March issue.

NATURE OF THE GROUP -: Education must become co-existant with life and must become a pract ical success. Education methods are separated from biological and social life. Former articles dealing with child development brought out in a general way how the child grows up. This biological maturation is an innate process and will grow from infancy to adulthood, without formal education but needs a suitable social environment (mainly the home) to pass through in the ordered sequence. Lacking an ordered sequence, mainly caused by parental pressures, the child's development becomes distorted.

The nature of the group we are speaking of is developing persons whose needs are biological, spiritual, physical and intellectual and that they are in a situation where maturity is unfolding and developing abilities, potentials, character and traits present at birth. Note that I say present at birth, because if the innate dispos ition is not already present, it is impossible to reach such stages of development. To try to exercise a child to such standards that are beyond him can cause confusion. This sort of pressure is often implimented by both parents and teachers in order

to achieve results either for the child, parents, or school's good name. Have natience because there is no organ ism that requires a longer period of adjustment than man. Environments have strong influence over the nat ure of the group.

OBJECTIVES :-

Schools have varing objectives and this is largely influenced by the environment and ability of the pupils. Objectives are to ensure that pupils are being educated towards the best preparation for successful adjustment to living working and leisure in the community after they have left school. But it is necessary that the pupils aspire to live these commitments here and now. Preparing them for a job does not fulfil this need. The Plowden

Report is based on a highly recommend ed research on Education in schools in England, has this to say: "At the heart of the educational progress lies the child. No advances in policy, no acquisitions of new equipment have their desired effect unless they are in harmony with that nature of the child. unless they are fundamentally accept able to him "(para 9)

If I were seeking aims and objective in a school this is what I would expect to be an integrate part and one which I have adopted myself over the years and had very lasting results.

The pupil is a fully human person created by God and for God.

Planning can be arranged into three

1st: objectives we seek as a result of our teaching - qualities of mind, know ledge, skills, values that we wish pupils to acquire.

2nd - programmes of activities and work to achieve the objective in 1st. This consists of an outline of the instruction , discussions, visits, exercises, laboratory work, etc.

3rd - contents or subject matter of the activities (what ground is being covered) to reach these objectives.

It will become obvious that when planning Aims and Objective, it is necessary that the entire professional staff is involved in decision-making and that they be autonomous. Parents will recognise their role in planning aims for the school. Unfortunately many parents are more concerned about getting a good job - a short term objective which only caters for mainly physical security and redundancy can put a sharp end to that achievement.

The head of the school should be a hard worker and so give example to his teachers. Much depends on the organizational climate - which is how the head treats his staff. For example.

* Is the head easy going, flexible or a hard core ? continued.

EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

- * Does he allow leadership to emerge from his staff or
- * Does he choose to have his favourites around him?
- * Is he the authoritarian who controls his staff closely, works them hard and provides for little social satisfaction. Yet in this the teaching staff derive satisfaction from their task achievement, are limited to basic organizational
- * Is he the one who creates the happy family atmosphere and exerts little leadership or control and is disinclined to be critical. In this the staff moral is diminished through have little sense of task achievement.
- * Does he have a paternal control and constantly busy within the school. Very often this is considered as interference rather than leadership. Little heed is paid and so little achieved.
- * Is he impersonal, controlling aloof, arbitrary and unconcerned with teachers as people? This does not give leadership or example and little is achieved either with staff social relationships or achievements.

It is the practise of many parents when considering the admission of their child to a particular school to wish to visit it before hand. They visit classrooms and as the head interviews them, they in turn and at the same time are observing him. One can make basic assessments of the head's attitudes by the kept or unkept staffroom, hall entrance, his office, corridors and classrooms. Once the parents have made a choice of a particular school, it does not mean that that particular school has passed the required standards. The parents themselves may have poor standards or in many cases have no other choice. I have seen very unkept schools, whose

entrance halls were no better than the public convenience.

Teachers are best motivated when there is a close relationship between desire for involvement and actual involvement and participation in decision-making. There is no doubt that teachers want to be involved but all too often they

arrangements of minor details - should pupils wear runners to school: etc. Within our schools there appears to be a potent threat in educational organ ization that end (aims) are superseded by means in which it is done. How often have we heard heads and teach ers say that their school is better than the other school (s) because of the complex equipment installation. What really matters is how it is used and some teachers may achieve the same results without the elaborate equipment.

INTEGRATE THE MEMBERS :-

The planning and organization of aims and objectives should have the bases and provision for scope and continuity. Inappropriate teaching methods can cause sterile relationships. An effect- of committment, all necessary for a ive pastoral system has an educative function and it can successfully ach ieve integration. The pastoral team has the moral education of the pupil at heart and establishes a healthy re lationship between pupil and teacher. Integration of the pastoral and curriccular stops and teaching staff from looking outside the school for the scources of the problems with pupils. (many of the problems are created from within the school itself). This leads to an open mind, a belief in one self and others and hence a profess ional outlook. The pastoral and the

curricular have identical aims, one of which is the development of instrinsic (nature) motivation in pupils. The pupil who has developed instrinsic motivation has acquired patterns of behaviour such as manipulation of ideas: the habits of problem-solving; a questioning approach to life and values professional and social adjustment.

CONTROL - All aims and objectives must be evaluated and if necessary adjustment made. Healthy criticism brings progress but a head who feels "better than others" is usually com paring his own strongest points against the weakest points of the schools being criticized. He must pull down in order to raise himself

It is up to the parents now to get involved in education. Let is not be said that they have never been in formed of their duties towards the education of their child or that they do not know how to go about it. You may have been pushed aside at one time, so it is up to you to become involved. Teachers put their backs up when parents do not know their place but to come on an honest participation, you would no doubt be truely welcome.

I promised to write an article on the Psychology of Art and perhaps in the October issue, it will be published.






MAYNOOTH JUNIOR BADMINTON

THE PSYCHOLOGY OF ART - Part 1

Art, and consequently aesthetics. are fundamentally dependent on con scious perceptions and the exper ience of emotions and feelings. They stage of development. Some of these would not exist if consciousness did not exist. Principles of technique are laid down but not principles of creation. Art critics only make in terpretations of the artist's creations. Art is pattern informed by emotions.

As mentioned in former articles in Education Towards Freedom, the in tensive bond between body and soul is in children another deep-seated in. one of the characteristic qualities of childhood. Adults try to conceal their feelings and emotions but child - occupy themselves with it and to ren display them in no un-certain way. try and give it form. There is no They show their anger by stamping their feet and hopping up and down when they are excited or happy. Child- even in early childhood, than artisren should have the freedom to ex artistic activities.

It is often wrongfully thought that artistic activities is letting them get something out of their system. Other ming etc. Art is formative, both in the environment and in the soul of the child, in that it develops a different inner attitude as is required for each one. For example, a cautious child can be persuaded to be more daring, an exuberant child more circumspect. a weak-willed child more persevering, an obstinate child more adaptable and so on.

Referring back to the former articles. the most deeply rooted habits and patterns of behaviour are, those which form when a child is at the copying deep seated pattern of behaviour, mainly basic positive or negative attitudes towards the environment and other people-lie hidden beneath the threshold of consciousness and cannot come to surface.

Rudolf Steiner relates: "As teach ers, we could help to make permanent stinct: to participate in everything they meet in the outside world, to other form of activity which is more suitable for cultivating this instinct tic activity. Through this activity press the feelings in their souls through a person learns to enter with all the qualities of his soul and with every fibre of his body into the battle with a problem which is important not because its solution will bring any material gain but simply because it is humanly interesting. Thus activities do this such as, fames, swim-the basis is laid in the child for the canacity of taking a real interest in the world around him in later life, "

> It is not enough in the early school years simply to let the children express them selves and their experiences in colour. If children are allowed to draw and paint freely according to their temperament. it can often happen that in fact they be come more involved in themselves and their emotions instead of being able to free themselves. For example, unruly

choleric children might steep themselves in repeatedly painting burning cities, or melancholic children become more gloomy, painting morbid things like gallows scenes. The function of "letting off steam" can only be limited to reducing tension but in the depths of the soul not a great deal is affected.

The teacher should try to give the children a feeling for the hues, tones, perspectives and spaces of colours. Gradually, the children begin to realise that there are colours which obtrude for instance all nuances of red and yellow, and colours which recede, for example, blues and violets. Green is more neutral. When they have learnt to allow the forms to arise out of the gestures of the colours, it will be quite natural for them when illustrating a fairy tale or legend to choose scences in which people and things can grow out of the harmony of colours.

In helping children to come to terms with their temperaments, painting can be in valuable help. If cholerics were allowed to choose their own colour exercises they would spread drmatic shades of red all over the paper at the expense of the other colours. Sanguines would hast ily paint something small and bright and joyful somewhere on the paper and then start clamouring for a new sheet. The phlegmatics would spread something large and rather boring over the whole page. It is more therapeutic to learn to use the whole sheet of paper in a balanced and economic manner and to do what the colours want and not what one's mood demands.

THE WORLD OF POP - by Martin McCormack S.B.D.

In distress a fan once wrote to pop star Johnny Hollyday thus! "The other day when you were singing you threw away your necktie . An irrestible force compelled me to run and grab it. But another youngster was quicker than I. I prayed, I cried, I begged, there was no use. He wouldn't give it to me. I was sad even to the point of death. Please send me a neck tie, a button or anything you like. I beg you please write to me. Send something. Do not leave me in despair. If you do not send me a neck tie or a button send me at least a pair of socks"

At a David Cassedy Concert in London in 1977, 2 young girls were seen rolling up and down the isle, kicking and scratching one another, shouting out obscenities and rather unladvlike jargon. . . . Why did it happen ? The 2 girls were arguing about who was going to marry David, said an onlooker and that started the fight.

Crazy, just crazy, call it what you like, but this is the world of POP. A world full of good and bad trips, inconsistencies and types, laughter and tears. It's a world of Guitars and amplifiers and of course, high decibels.

In this article and next I hope to take you on a trip to the world of Pop. It's a difficult world to understand. It is a world ruled by "STARS" who be long entirely to their fans. The fan identifies with his Star. He feels the wealth and happiness are his own. The psychologists call this "A mechanism of projection". It's a dangerous state to be in for it takes you away from the world of reality.

I'm in no way saying that Pop and everything is always bad or dangerous. Far from it. I feel it serves as a mirror of life for those who care to listen. It has alot to say about the world and its problems, particularly the world of Youth (where as a Sal esian I've a particular interest).

The lights flicker dimly, a giant spotlight focuses on stage. On comes the announcer and shouts over the noise, "Okay, Kids, this is the moment you" ve all been waiting for "..... a girl in the front row faints. Another tries to get on the stage.

Dozens hold their breath in anticipation. In a moment they are all about to see their dream Star. . . . then all hell is let loose.

You are now in the centre of the Pop World. What is all this Mass Hysteria about. What is Pop ?

It seems to defy definition to put it down as "popular music" is to say all and say nothing. Everyone of my readers has his/her own idea of Pop and within its fold one finds a limitless range of Musical styles. The names themselves denote a wide siversity: old groups: new groups: groups never heard of before and some never to be heard of again!

One thing is certain POP definately represents a break in the classical Music Tradition as envisaged by the 'greats' of Western Music like Bethoven or Wagner (etc.) Their Music was conventional, in so far as it was built on a definite theme and developed harmoniously up to a climax. To envoke a response classical Music needs intelligent listening and hence its usually termed 'High-brow'

In Pop the issue is different; the words live and get their meaning as it happens, meaning comes from situation. The Musical expression - mere noise to the uninitiated - is characterised by the endless variety of sounds. Pop is more than a trend in Music its a way of Life.

FOP AS MUSIC

Pop music has become a running com mentary on the changing lives of the "NOW" generation. It has tried to verbalize and clarify their problems as a common language, a forum to Communicate with their brothers and sisters, throughout the world - a release for pent up feelings. Conse quently it is lived at different levels of intensity, expressed in different types of Music and describe the range of human emotions and problems - from those of the uncertain teenager down to more serious problems of life; solitude, desolation and so on. To mention a few off the styles of Pop lets briefly look at 4 :-

- * the foot-tapping music from Jam aica and West Indies with its simple melodies almost hypnotic in its beat. It appeals primarily to the feelings and the listener is almost compelled to dance. Bob Marley who died recently popularized this across the globe.
- * The earsplitting variety is variously termed 'Rock' - 'Acid' - Psych edelic' - lyrics here are f or the most part illeverant. It moves in a world of amplifiers and is characterized by its deafening sound.
- is anything that grandma can hum, whistle or sing. It has a message to preach and its melodies have a sameness which dependence "We did all we could, why belie the poignancy of the Words.
- the lighter side of Pop is represented in style called "Bubble Gum" in the West. A simple lyric for most part expressing teenage problems of Love, Sorrow etc. usually its a passing faze.

Musically speaking, Pop at its worst. is a passing phenomenan easily forgotten. But since 1967 it has been gradually achieving a status as an art form. There is always a danger of dismissing Pop because of the groups. Beat groups voice their protest in Music as well as words. The Punk scene is a recent example of this.

Technical reasons such as recording equipment have helped Pop to grow. The L.P. with its longer playing time has opened up new vistas for improvisation. Groups can now experiment. verying beat, reducing sound levels. prolonging climax. Beside the electric guitar and the organ have given

In a report on Maynooth College some years ago, a reporter finished his article thus:-

"Outside in the village where the roadside limes take the slanting sunlight, a Civic Guard is sitting, his chair tilted against the wall, his cap tipped indulgently from his head, his feet stretched out to the tall tulips - even the Law is cloistered in peace"

These words may not be absolutely exact but are sufficiently close to the original to show that even a reporter writing on Maynooth College was struck by the attractiveness of the trees in the streets. Not alone he, but other travellers passing through remembered Maynooth as the "pretty little town with the trees" Practically the first remark of a returned emigrant would be "Ah! the trees are still there" or "The trees are as beautiful as ever" or even "The trees are bare, but they are still beautiful". Deep down in us, we are proud of 'our trees' and they form, to an extent, the character of the town.

Our character, however, in recent years is taking a bit of knocking about, and the face of Maynooth' is showing a bit gap toothed to all and sundry. We, first of all, were a bit disturbed when the E.S.B. hacked the trees somewhat for their electric wires, and then again when C.I.E. hacked the other sides for their buses. As time went on high lorries took their toll but, unfortunately, and most insidious The County Council seems to have administered what looks like the final blow. When relaying the roadside kerb some years ago, they exposed the roots of the trees on the north side of the town by omitting kerbing at the foot of practical ly each tree. This blow is only now becomeing apparent. As tree after tree on this side is now becoming unsafe from years of water logging at the base, and one by one the trees are being cut down. To the older residents each disappearing tree is almost like the death of an old friend - a friend that had its own little character and is to be mourned.

The cancer, as we may call it, is growing in pace and with several other trees now showing some signs of decay, it seems as if we are shortly to lose all the trees on one side. Even as it stand now the town is starting to look dishevelled and it is high time that either the trees that have been removed are replaced or a complete replant should be made. It is only fair that those who destroyed should restore, and more and more people are asking that the Council, as the chief destroyers, should start immediatly to restore. We trust our Councillors for the area, and, in particular, our local Councillors will take up the matter for us without delay.

It would not be fair to ask us to accept just small saplings as a replacement and we would expect strong part matured lime trees to once again restore the most attractive aspect from the College gate up along Main Street, through the Avenue right into Carton. It can never be the same as it was, but we would want a good substitute.

BAND BULLETIN



Music was fast becoming not only the mirror of contempory Society but its conscience, as Bob Dylon, the Pop Prophet puts it :-

How does it feel To be on your own With no direction home Like a complete unknown Like a rolling Stone ?

The teenage mood is expressed in the words of one girl who said after Dylan's concert - "He's all of us. he's all the things we always felt but could never eloquently express "

The Pop Audience ranges from teenagers to those in their late twenties. The Music Critics of 'Time' made an interesting study of American Pop Fans on the basis of what he calls 5 general types according to dress manner - consumption, age and musical taste.

- 1) HEAVY METAL Music character- seil him to the public. ised by amplifiers, drums, loudspeakers at maximum volume. This aud ience can be trouble for the concert managers. They jump on seats, fling lighted matches on the stage. Vomiting from too much liquor is considered a status symbol. If they do not have tickets they break in
- 2) THE LISTENERS These are youths in early twenties. They know about music and musicianship and appliand rather than scream as do the Heavy Metal.
- 3) SQUEAKY-CLEANS This is an orderly audience - Fans of poetic love ballads. Girls Outnumber Boys.
- 4) THE GLITTER TRIPPERS -The fastest growing audience in American Pop and has created its stars. They wear the most unusual clothes. A concert is an excuse for the group to show off their fienery.
- 5) THE EVENING OUTERS This is an orderly crowd dressed conventionally. They are usually young people who have graduated from other groups.

THE WORLD OF POP STAR

A Pop star is no longer his own man. He belongs entirely to his fans. Every word and gesture of his becomes the object of Hero Worship, even to the point of stirring his fans to mob frenzy.

To dispel a popular myth - stars are not born - some are made. David Cassidy's rise to fame proves this.

He was featuring in the TV series 'The Patridge Family" when promoter Wes Farral wondered why no one asked him if he could sing. Wes called in 60 song writers who wrote 300 tunes for David. One of them "I think I love you' clicked and sold 3.6 million copies within the year. Cassidy was a Star.

The Pop world has also a highly commerialized side to it which involve certain aspects that are far from honest. Once a Star is "on the make" a whole prom otional machinery is set in motion to

FRAGILE WORLD OF IDOL

Though the Pop scene has made many a star, it has also meant down fall of many others.

To begin with the Public is fickle. A writer describes the life of Stevie Wonder "life is a circle of indecision. chaotic, scheduling and the totally unexpected he just doesn't have days or nights and he's seldom thinking more than ten minutes ahead".

This rat race accounts for some of the queer capes which some of the

Pop Idols cut over stage to humourthe Fans. It partly explains why Elton John has 40 pairs of glasses one even with windscreen wipers or why Ian Anderson signs prancing and hopping on one leg.

The Psychological pressures take this toll on lives of the stars in differeny ways. Isolotionist tendencies in some like Cassidy and Osmond and a more tragic instance of the price of fame is Jimi Hendrix the black superstar. He was at the height of his popularity when at the age of 27 he allegedly committed suicide by taking an overdose of barbiturates - - a victim of the World that had catarpulted him to fame. CONCLUSION :-

SO WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED

ABOUT POP 2

In short it includes a language, a music, a commercialized business. an experience, a way of life - in a word . a culture which has to be evaluated on each count. It has it's seemy side as well. Some aspects of Popscene play up less acceptable features of Society such as Drugs and promiscuous sex.

There are fundemental questions to be asked which I cannot answer or try solving for you. Does Pop auth entically represent your aspirations as a young person ? Is it artificial put on which covers up the real issues of today.

You must answer these personally, all I can say is that POP is here to stay for better or for worse.



The Chairman welcomed Councillor Stagg to the Meeting after his long absence through illness and the following matters were roted for action by The county Council.

- 1) Unauthorized dumping in the new Town Park.
- 2) Provision of a Rubbish skip for cleaning up Laraghbryan Graveyard.
- 3) Closing the rere entrance to Carton Avenue
- 4) The condition of the footpath from Coonans to Greenfields.
- 5) Lighting problems in Old Greenfield

From Deputy Bermingham, - there was an acknowledgement of represent - ations made to him requesting that a wooden floor be provided in the new Post Primary School extension, as it was felt that a concrete floor would not be suitable for P.F. Classes.

Deputy Birmingham also furnished us with a reply from the County Council to the effect that flooding in the Leinster Cottages and New Park areas would be attended to by the Engineer when next he is working in those areas.

Both Deputy Bermingham and Councillor Stagg addressed the meeting on the subject of Housing, which we in Maynooth Branch feel is of major importance in the development of the County. Deputy Bermingham reported that £1/2 million of the £30 million raised recently by the Government for Housing has been allocated to Kildare, and he has had discussions with the County Manager with a view to starting 100 new houses. Councillor Stagg reported that the 38 new houses in Greenfield will be allocated very soon and highlighted the fact that there have been over 300 applicat ions for those houses. He went on to say that although there are 3000 families on the Housing List in Kildare, the County Council does not have enough

money to finish houses which have already been started.

We intend to run another Cabaret Night in the near future, the venue will be the Hitchin' Post - and we hope that those who supported us in the past will do so again. Details of the date and artist will be in next month's issue.





PSYCHOLOGY OF ART

The first aims of the Art Teacher should be to bring about the highest degree of correlation between the childJs temperament and it's modes of expression.

. . . . create an eye that sees a hand that obeys a soul that feels

Montessori

Life itself is the only preparation for drawing. Once we have lived. the inner spark of vision does the rest. Whatever preparation the child had for life will be manifested through his rise of colour and drawing.

The expressions of children's drawings can be seen through their "states of mind" but it needs a trained mind to interprete it.

THINKING - extravert - enumerative introvert - organic

extravert - decorative FEELING introvert - imaginative

SENSATION extravert - impressionist introvert - expressionist (haptic)

INTUITION extravert - rhythmical pattern structural form

(A balanced state of mind is the happy medium between extravert and intravert. We possess both)

Many studies have been attempted in relationship of personality characteristics to colour preferences. Co operativeness, mental capacity, outstanding gifts, interests, temperament, initiative and intelligence were all studies in relation to the colour choices.

Studies were done on famous artists, among them were :-

El Grego - introverted sensation - type,

Rembrandt . difficult to characterize, chief role in his orientation to life through sensation, extraverted

Rubens - extraverted sensation . type sensuous enjoyment of the object.

Pierre della Francesca: extraverted intuitive- type, external objects, was not of 'sensuous hold, but intuitive apprehension, concerned with concreteness, its formal qualities, abstract proportious of the object and relation ship which existed between one object and another. More usually expressed in architecture.

Children also draw spontaneously, reaching out of the external world and cap able of becoming the main factor in the adjestment of the individual to society. This reaching out is recognised by three distinct activities in art.

A - Self-expression - innate to communicate his thoughts, feelings, and emotions to other people.

B - Observation - desire to record his sense impression, to clarify his conceptual knowledge, to build up his memory, to construct things which aid his practical activities.

C - Appreciation - response to the modes strong admixture of introverted feeling or have addressed to him, his response of expression which other people address to values in the world of facts: reaction to A and B.

> ""One of the most important tasks of culture is to submit man to the influence of form, even in his merely physical life; to make this life aesthetic by in-

troducing the rule of beauty wherever possible; because only from the aescan morality develop " - Schiller. From a formal point of view eleven stages of development have been distinguished by Dr. Ruth Griffiths -(Imagination in early childhood)

Purposeless pencillings - purely muscular movements from shoulder. usually from right to left.

Localized scribbling - the child seeks to reproduce specific parts of an object - a stage transitional to -

Line - age 4 - Visual control is now progressive. The human figures becomes the favourite subject with circle for head, dots for eyes, and a pair of single lines for legs. More rarely a second circle may be added for body, and more rarely still, a pair of lines for the arms. It is usually for feet to be represented earlier than arms or body. A complete syn thesis of parts is unobtainable and often unattempted.

Descriptive Symbolism - age 5 - 6. Human figures now reproduced with tolerable accuracy, but as a crude

symbolic schema. The features are localized in the roughest way and each thetic, and not from the physical state, is a conventional form. The general 'schema' assumes a somewhat different type with different children, but the same child clings pretty closely, for most purposes and for long periods. to the same favourite pattern.

Descriptive Realism - age 7 - 8 - The drawings are still logical rather than visual. The child Asets down what he knows, not what he sees : and is Purposive pencillings - the scribble is still thinking, not of the present in dividual, but rather of the generic type! He is trying to communicate, express. or catalogue all that he remembers, or The 'schema' becomes more true to detail; items, however, are suggested by the analysis of percepts. Profile perspective, opacity, foreshortening and all the consequences of single ness of viewpoint are still disregarded. There is a gathering of interest in decorative details.

> Visual Realism - age 9 - 10. The child passes from the atage of drawing from emory and imagination to the stage of drawing from nature. There are two phases :-

- 1) two dimensional phase out line only is used.
- 11) three dimensional phase, solidity is attempted. Attention is given to overlapping and perspect ive. A little shading and occasional foreshortening may be attempted. Landscapes are attempted.

Repression - age 11 - 14 - This stage sets in most commonly about the age of 15, and is part of a child's natural development. Progress in the attempt to reproduce objects is now at best laborious and slow, and the child becomes disillusioned and discouraged. Interest is transferred to expression through the medium of language, and if drawing continues the preference is for conventional designs and the human figure becomes rare.

Artistic Revival - early adolescence From about the age of 15, drawing for the first time blossoms into a genuine artistic activity. Draw ings now tell a story. A clear distinction between the sexes is now evident. Girls show a love of richness in colour, of grace in form, of beauty in line; boys - tend to use drawing more as a technical and mechanical outlet.

But by many, perhaps by most, this final stage is never reached. The

repression at the previous stage has been too complete.

The psychology of Art is a major study but these few points may help you to be more observant and tolerant of your child. As children are in development, it would be better for parents to consider their attitude towards their child. Most parents, if not all. say they are the best parents and will usually place the onerous on their child's behaviour. The purpose of the articles on Education Towards Freedom and this present article is to help parents to understand their shortcomings also.

Teaching Art in school, I get to know the pupils very well and one over riding temperament in Irish Society is fear. May I relate just one such incident. The class was asked to draw a man, woman and themselves. One boy had done a real work of Art on his man assessment which revealed that his standard was of a highly gifted pupil. He refused to draw a woman which represented his mother. I insisted that he should do the assignment; he stood up with clenched fists as if ready to box. In cases like this, teachers need to know their pupils well and this boy had a very good relations with me. His view of a woman was very inhibiting because of the domineering and indifferent attitude of his mother. His scoring here was low and the same was recorded of himself drawing. So his innate high intelligence and his maternal pressures left him, fighting to exist in a Vocational School in stead of passing freely through it and meriting a place in the University (His education ended at Group Cert.)

When the Olympic Games were revived in 1896 the 1500m were won by an Australian named FDWIN : FLACK in 4 mins 32.2 secs. -64 years passed before another Australian won this Race. He was HERB ELLIOT and he did it in a record shattering time of 3 mins -36,6 secs

In 1948 a fab housewife FANNY BLANKERS -KOEN, known as the flying dutch woman, set the crowd alight with her display in London.

To the Jubilant thunder of the crowd she hurled, and ran opposition to the ground. She took all 4 Gold Medals :-

100m - 11. 9 secs 200m - 24.4 secs 80m Hurdles - 11, 2 secs, Member of 4 x 100 winning relay

Never before in the history of the Olympics had a Woman put in such a staggering performance.

No more elegent form has ever graced the Olympic running Trace than Straw-hatted WILMA RUD -OLPH. In 1960 she won 100m and 200m and as a member of the Winning U.S. relay-team she brought her telly to 3 Gold.

- 3) VLADIMIR KUTS . reigned supreme at the 1956 Melbourne Olympics. He set a new world record in 5,000 m and 10.n000m.

During his career he is reported to have run the equivalent of twice round the World.

BERLIN 1936 - HITLER took personal charge of the games to turn it into a show piece of Nazi-Superiority. But the real hero of Berlin was neither Hitler or any other Nazi but a modest Negro from the United States named JESSE OWENS. He won 4 gold medals shattering Hitler's dream. - 100m 200m, Long Jump, 4 x 100m relay.

At the long Jump final when the German Ludz Long, equalled Owen's leap of 25ft. 91/2 ". Hitler stood up and raided a Nazi Salute. But Owen's came back with an incredible 26 ft 51/4" which was to remain unbeaten for 25 years. Hitler could take no more and stormed out of the Stadium refusing to make the presentation of Medals.
