Dear Gerry,

I am happy to tell you that I have approved the commencement of work on the extension to Maynooth Post-Primary School.

My department's building unit will shortly be issuing the formal letter of approval in the matter to the Co. Kildare Vocationał Education Comm ittee.

Signed :- J.P.Wilson, Minister for Educ 3rd. Nov. '80 Dear Councillor,

I am directed by the Co. Manager to refer to previous correspondence and to representations in regard to development at Newtown, Maynooth, and concerning the points raised, I wish to make the following obser vations :-

(1) Normal E.S.B. requirements will be looked for in street lighting in all locations

(2) There is no finance available in the bond for Cluain Aoibhinn to provide a tennis court. However, the layout for Meadow View includes a tennis court and will be considered as part of that development and covered by the bond of £35.000.00

(3) The security in the sum of £35,000,00 will'be by way of insurance bond or bank bond, or failing that a cash deposit of a similar sum for the entire development.

THE BOYS' PRIEST


THE FIRST BOY

December 8 th 1841 Don Bosco was vesting for Mass. From the cold outdoors a boy sneaks into the sacristy for a bit of warmth. The sacristan swings his cane widly and sends him out. "Call that boy back !, he's my friend " Don Bosco shouts. Don Bosco had met his first boy, an orphan out of work, and easy mark for some swindler. For such as him the prison gates swung wide But just now a friendly word, a smile from the lad and the promise open. that he will return for a catechism lesson. The following week there were seven boys. Then week after week they increased in number, coming to Don Bosco every Sunday for catechism lesson, for confession and mass and then for whole day's fun in the open country side. Thus began Don Bosco's work for boys. Like all beginnings it was painful. He and his boys were pushed from pillar to post. The work was misunderstood by the clergy and looked upon with suspision by the city police. There were a lot of bills to be payed. There were harsh words and insults at times. But Don Bosco was not easily put off and kept going. He trusted that God would not let him down.

THE SHED

Don Bosco's first permanent school was a broken down shed in Turin's underdeveloped tenement district. Though the neighbourhood was bad, Don Bosco took the building and adjoining piece of land for a playground. Today on that very spot stands a magnificent marble-studded Basilica to 'Mary help of Christians'-- Don Bosco's Madonna -- plus a large school for students, shops for trade courses, a hugh publishing house and the headquarters of the SALESIAN SOCIETY..it all started in a shed. In 1854, Don Bosco who now harboured orphans in a larger house, opened the first workshops to teach his boys trades. And who was the teacher ? Don Bosco himself. In addition to his priestly duties he still found the time to teach carpentary and shoe repairing, to write books, find work for his boys, run the Sunday Boy's Club and Cathecism classes and to think up new ways of spreading his work. "Give me sould" was his motto, the "souls of boys". His first dream was now paying off..

CLLR. B. DURKAN NOTES

The following are some replies received by Cllr. Durkan on items of local interest.

TRAFFIC WARDEN :-

The Co. Secretary informed Cllr. Durkan that the Road Safety Officer had been instructed to investigate the matter of the appointment of a Traffic Warden to service the Convent School

HOUSING :-

in a reply to a notice of motion by CIIr. Durkan at the September Council Meeting, the Administrative Officer stated that, if there is sufficient finance avail able to start schemes for the provision of private sites, 30 such sites will be provided at Maynooth.

FOOTBRIDGE:-

The Co. Engineer informed CIIr. Durkan that the ramp on the footbridge at the Town Bridge is not yet complete. The approach is to be made less steep but, as only a small amount of bituminous matter is required, they will have to wait until a full load is being ordered.

SOLID FUEL COOKERS :- Co. Architect informed CIIr. Durkan that all recently built Old Persons Houses have solid fuel cookers fitted as standard, as will future houses. The cost of replacing room heaters, where fitted, with solid fuel cookers will be approx. £600.

POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL - Good news for Maynooth at last. Par ents of children attending this School will be glad to hear that the contract for the extension has been approved and work can com mence shortly. This is most welcome news, which was conveyed. to Clir. Durkan by Deputy Mark Clinton, M.E.P./




ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING :-.

INVESTING :- 10 Cubs were invested in a ceremony in the S.M.A. Hostel on Saturday Nov. 15th.




The Children's costumes were very colourful. Eoin Byrne, and Joan Howard Williams did the judging, and a hard job it was. Everybody had entered into the


EDUCATION TOWARDS FREEDOM

Adolescence is the period of transition between childhood and adult life. Within this period their are three distinct phases; a) puberty; b) transition period; c) late adolescence.

a) Puberty starts between 12 and 14 years where the adolescent enters the gang stage. This term is not to be associated with those who are involved in vandalism or even toughness. These stages are deviations caused by unhealthy development. Accompanying the puberty stage is physical growth and biological development. The youth grows rapidly, is awkard and lacks co-ordination due to rapid growth of limbs. In primitive days this puberty stage had an easy passage to the next and the psychological and physical development balanced, passing just like former stages of early child hood by not having a chrises in life.

Today, it is well observed that their is a wide gap between the physical and psychological and mental development of the adolescent, due to environmental stress and delinquency is constantly associated with this stage but it does not mean that they mentally unbalanced or completely devoid of moral standards. There are various reasons for delinquency caused by environmental stress, such as, poverty stricken or broken homes (family conflict or giving bad example); spoilt and lonely children (both parents out working): and poor environment of city subcultures and many others.

One major factor that causes sex perversions is that early childhood experience often come to light or surface in adolescence because of the upsurge of sexual life at this period. Repression of childhood sex development, as mentioned in former articles often give rise to strange duality which I will not speak about here.



This is very often found in middle class Society with high-minded prin ciples and often very religious。

b) The transition period emerges at 14 to 16. The starting of this stage is often recognized by the young adolescence moodiness. They tend to isolate themselves and go for walks etc. alone. The gang spirit looses their interest and they pass from friends of same age to opposite sex. This temperament change is caused by the transition from grouping with the same sex to the heterosexual phase.

It is often found that instead of attraction to the opposite sex of their own age, the boy plays the man to his mother and cares for her needs with tenderness and admiration. The girl devotes her self to the minute attention of her Father just as her mother would. In both cases the adolescents play the adult role. Observing these characteristics, adolesences have won the name of being generous.

The home has a vital part to play in their healthy development. The adolescent is learning the adult way of life by exercising this art of chivalrous love. If relationships in the home are not healthy, they may become insensitive which will effect their re lationships in marriage and parenthood later on.

As was mentioned of former stages, play identification and imagination help each stage towards the next and collectively these stages prepare the child for future adulthood. The same is happening to the young adolescents when they play either mothers or father's role and is keeping alive the heterosexual feelings in a non-sexual form. It is enacting marriage and like most play is anticipatory. It develops confidence


in their relationship with their complimentary sex. Living in a healthy envir onment, qualities of character, such as tenderness and devotion develop. The adolescent of 15 or so soon passes from this egocentric period to interpersonal relations.

c) Later adolescence is between 16 to
18 years and it is the heterosexual
(opposite) phase. The first stage of
love emerges.

Various elements predominate such as the desire to attract, at another time romance takes hold. The girl wants to be beautiful to attract and the boy wants to show his strength and manliness. Beauty and strength in volve health so that both are looking for a healthy companions. Romance soon follows and 'falling in love' takes its place. As was earlier mentioned. that there is a wide gap between biological and mental development, adolescence should not be encouraged to go 'steady'. Dating is different. The adolescent may have dates; the greater number of boys and girls 'dated' the greater the prestige but more important is the greater experience of various types of char acters. Such as experience allows them to choose and select the type of part rer suitable for them to share a complete loving relationship forever. Unfortun ately, many never pass the stage of rom ance and after six months marriage, they are confronted with the grim facts that they don't know what love is.

Next article will be the long awaited topic of Aims and Objectives of Schools. It was necessary to inform you of your child's psychological development in order to make a choice of school. Getting to know your child with the limited (repeat limited) information, puts you in a better position to make this crucial choice.

(1) The major task of early adolescence can be regarded as having to do with the conquest of thought - to take his mental constructions as objects and reason about them. It is only around this time children spontaneously introduce concepts of belief, intelligence and faith into their

definitions of their religion. In addition to conceptualizing their own thoughts, they also do the same with other people. Be cause of their egocentrism in their psychological development they fail to diffentiate their own thoughts from those of others. In other words, if they are critical of themselves, they feel others think the same, So it could be said, adolescence are acting to an imaginative audience . This imaginary, is in part at least, would account for a variety of typical adolescent behavious and experiences (being self.conscious). Gathering of young adolescence are unique in the sense that each one is an actor to himself and an audience to others. The lovely part of this imagination is that they have a tendency to confide in a personal God and instead of looking for gifts they seek guidance and support.


MAYNOOTH SWIMMING CLUB

from all in "MAYNOOTH SWIMMING CLUB" we will be looking forward to Swimming as one for the Community Games.


At the moment all Sessions are in full swing and great enjoyment is being had by all our Swimmers. Present sessions will end early in December and will resume again in January.
