Editorial

In a report on Maynooth College some years ago, a reporter finished his article thus:-

"Outside in the village where the roadside limes take the slanting sunlight, a Civic Guard is sitting, his chair tilted against the wall, his cap tipped indulgently from his head, his feet stretched out to the tall tulips - even the Law is cloistered in peace"

These words may not be absolutely exact but are sufficiently close to the original to show that even a reporter writing on Maynooth College was struck by the attractiveness of the trees in the streets. Not alone he, but other travellers passing through remembered Maynooth as the "pretty little town with the trees" Practically the first remark of a returned emigrant would be "Ah! the trees are still there" or "The trees are as beautiful as ever" or even "The trees are bare, but they are still beautiful". Deep down in us, we are proud of 'our trees' and they form, to an extent, the character of the town.

Our character, however, in recent years is taking a bit of knocking about, and the face of Maynooth' is showing a bit gap toothed to all and sundry. We, first of all, were a bit disturbed when the E.S.B. hacked the trees somewhat for their electric wires, and then again when C.I.E. hacked the other sides for their buses. As time went on high lorries took their toll but, unfortunately, and most insidious The County Council seems to have administered what looks like the final blow. When relaying the roadside kerb some years ago, they exposed the roots of the trees on the north side of the town by omitting kerbing at the foot of practical ly each tree. This blow is only now becomeing apparent. As tree after tree on this side is now becoming unsafe from years of water logging at the base, and one by one the trees are being cut down. To the older residents each disappearing tree is almost like the death of an old friend - a friend that had its own little character and is to be mourned.

The cancer, as we may call it, is growing in pace and with several other trees now showing some signs of decay, it seems as if we are shortly to lose all the trees on one side. Even as it stand now the town is starting to look dishevelled and it is high time that either the trees that have been removed are replaced or a complete replant should be made. It is only fair that those who destroyed should restore, and more and more people are asking that the Council, as the chief destroyers, should start immediatly to restore. We trust our Councillors for the area, and, in particular, our local Councillors will take up the matter for us without delay.

It would not be fair to ask us to accept just small saplings as a replacement and we would expect strong part matured lime trees to once again restore the most attractive aspect from the College gate up along Main Street, through the Avenue right into Carton. It can never be the same as it was, but we would want a good substitute.

BAND BULLETIN



Music was fast becoming not only the mirror of contempory Society but its conscience, as Bob Dylon, the Pop Prophet puts it :-

How does it feel To be on your own With no direction home Like a complete unknown Like a rolling Stone?

The teenage mood is expressed in the words of one girl who said after Dylan's concert - "He's all of us. he's all the things we always felt but could never eloquently express "

The Pop Audience ranges from teenagers to those in their late twenties. The Music Critics of 'Time' made an interesting study of American Pop Fans on the basis of what he calls 5 general types according to dress manner - consumption, age and musical taste.

- 1) HEAVY METAL Music character- seil him to the public. ised by amplifiers, drums, loudspeakers at maximum volume. This aud ience can be trouble for the concert managers. They jump on seats, fling lighted matches on the stage. Vomiting from too much liquor is considered a status symbol. If they do not have tickets they break in
- 2) THE LISTENERS These are youths in early twenties. They know about music and musicianship and appliand rather than scream as do the Heavy Metal.
- 3) SQUEAKY-CLEANS This is an orderly audience - Fans of poetic love ballads. Girls Outnumber Boys.
- 4) THE GLITTER TRIPPERS -The fastest growing audience in American Pop and has created its stars. They wear the most unusual clothes. A concert is an excuse for the group to show off their fienery.
- 5) THE EVENING OUTERS This is an orderly crowd dressed conventionally. They are usually young people who have graduated from other groups.

THE WORLD OF POP STAR

A Pop star is no longer his own man. He belongs entirely to his fans. Every word and gesture of his becomes the object of Hero Worship, even to the point of stirring his fans to mob frenzy.

To dispel a popular myth - stars are not born - some are made. David Cassidy's rise to fame proves this.

He was featuring in the TV series 'The Patridge Family" when promoter Wes Farral wondered why no one asked him if he could sing. Wes called in 60 song writers who wrote 300 tunes for David. One of them "I think I love you' clicked and sold 3.6 million copies within the year. Cassidy was a Star.

The Pop world has also a highly commerialized side to it which involve certain aspects that are far from honest. Once a Star is "on the make" a whole prom otional machinery is set in motion to

FRAGILE WORLD OF IDOL

Though the Pop scene has made many a star, it has also meant down fall of many others.

To begin with the Public is fickle. A writer describes the life of Stevie Wonder "life is a circle of indecision. chaotic, scheduling and the totally unexpected he just doesn't have days or nights and he's seldom thinking more than ten minutes ahead".

This rat race accounts for some of the queer capes which some of the

Pop Idols cut over stage to humourthe Fans. It partly explains why Elton John has 40 pairs of glasses one even with windscreen wipers or why Ian Anderson signs prancing and hopping on one leg.

The Psychological pressures take this toll on lives of the stars in differeny ways. Isolotionist tendencies in some like Cassidy and Osmond and a more tragic instance of the price of fame is Jimi Hendrix the black superstar. He was at the height of his popularity when at the age of 27 he allegedly committed suicide by taking an overdose of barbiturates - - a victim of the World that had catarpulted him to fame. CONCLUSION :-

SO WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED

ABOUT POP 2

In short it includes a language, a music, a commercialized business. an experience, a way of life - in a word . a culture which has to be evaluated on each count. It has it's seemy side as well. Some aspects of Popscene play up less acceptable features of Society such as Drugs and promiscuous sex.

There are fundemental questions to be asked which I cannot answer or try solving for you. Does Pop auth entically represent your aspirations as a young person ? Is it artificial put on which covers up the real issues of today.

You must answer these personally, all I can say is that POP is here to stay for better or for worse.



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

The October Meeting was held at 11.30 a.m., in the Geraldine Hall on Sunday 4th. Minister of State Joe Bermingham and Councillor Emmet Stagg were in attendance. The Chairman welcomed Councillor Stagg to the Meeting after his long absence through illness and the following matters were roted for action by The county Council.

- 1) Unauthorized dumping in the new Town Park.
- 2) Provision of a Rubbish skip for cleaning up Laraghbryan Graveyard.
- 3) Closing the rere entrance to Carton Avenue
- 4) The condition of the footpath from Coonans to Greenfields.
- 5) Lighting problems in Old Greenfield

From Deputy Bermingham, - there was an acknowledgement of represent - ations made to him requesting that a wooden floor be provided in the new Post Primary School extension, as it was felt that a concrete floor would not be suitable for P.F. Classes.

Deputy Birmingham also furnished us with a reply from the County Council to the effect that flooding in the Leinster Cottages and New Park areas would be attended to by the Engineer when next he is working in those areas.

Both Deputy Bermingham and Councillor Stagg addressed the meeting on the subject of Housing, which we in Maynooth Branch feel is of major importance in the development of the County. Deputy Bermingham reported that £1/2 million of the £30 million raised recently by the Government for Housing has been allocated to Kildare, and he has had discussions with the County Manager with a view to starting 100 new houses. Councillor Stagg reported that the 38 new houses in Greenfield will be allocated very soon and highlighted the fact that there have been over 300 applicat ions for those houses. He went on to say that although there are 3000 families on the Housing List in Kildare, the County Council does not have enough

money to finish houses which have already been started.

We intend to run another Cabaret Night in the near future, the venue will be the Hitchin' Post - and we hope that those who supported us in the past will do so again. Details of the date and artist will be in next month's issue.

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

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PSYCHOLOGY OF ART

The first aims of the Art Teacher should be to bring about the highest degree of correlation between the childJs temperament and it's modes of expression.

. . . . create an eye that sees a hand that obeys a soul that feels

Life itself is the only preparation for drawing. Once we have lived. the inner spark of vision does the rest. Whatever preparation the child had for life will be manifested through his rise of colour and drawing.

The expressions of children's drawings can be seen through their "states of mind" but it needs a trained mind to interprete it.

THINKING - extravert - enumerative introvert - organic

extravert - decorative FEELING introvert - imaginative

SENSATION extravert - impressionist introvert - expressionist (haptic)

INTUITION extravert - rhythmical pattern structural form

(A balanced state of mind is the happy medium between extravert and intravert. We possess both)

Many studies have been attempted in relationship of personality characteristics to colour preferences. Co operativeness, mental capacity, outstanding gifts, interests, temperament, initiative and intelligence were all studies in relation to the colour choices.

Studies were done on famous artists, among them were :-

El Grego - introverted sensation - type,

Rembrandt . difficult to characterize, chief role in his orientation to life through sensation, extraverted

Rubens - extraverted sensation . type sensuous enjoyment of the object.

Pierre della Francesca: extraverted intuitive- type, external objects, was not of 'sensuous hold, but intuitive apprehension, concerned with concreteness, its formal qualities, abstract proportious of the object and relation ship which existed between one object and another. More usually expressed in architecture.

Children also draw spontaneously, reaching out of the external world and cap able of becoming the main factor in the adjestment of the individual to society. This reaching out is recognised by three distinct activities in art.

A - Self-expression - innate to communicate his thoughts, feelings, and emotions to other people.

B - Observation - desire to record his sense impression, to clarify his conceptual knowledge, to build up his memory, to construct things which aid his practical activities.

C - Appreciation - response to the modes strong admixture of introverted feeling or have addressed to him, his response of expression which other people address to values in the world of facts: reaction to A and B.

> ""One of the most important tasks of culture is to submit man to the influence of form, even in his merely physical life; to make this life aesthetic by in-

troducing the rule of beauty wherever possible; because only from the aescan morality develop " - Schiller. From a formal point of view eleven stages of development have been distinguished by Dr. Ruth Griffiths -(Imagination in early childhood)

Purposeless pencillings - purely muscular movements from shoulder. usually from right to left.

Imitative pencillings . the over master- all that interests him, in a subject. ing interest is still muscular, but wrist movements have replaced arm movements, and finger movements tend more by the association of ideas than to replace wrist movements. Usually in an effort to mimic the move- views of the face are attempted, but ments of an adult draughtsman.

Localized scribbling - the child seeks to reproduce specific parts of an object - a stage transitional to -

Line - age 4 - Visual control is now progressive. The human figures becomes the favourite subject with circle for head, dots for eyes, and a pair of single lines for legs. More rarely a second circle may be added for body, and more rarely still, a pair of lines for the arms. It is usually for feet to be represented earlier than arms or body. A complete syn thesis of parts is unobtainable and often unattempted.

Descriptive Symbolism - age 5 - 6. Human figures now reproduced with tolerable accuracy, but as a crude

symbolic schema. The features are localized in the roughest way and each thetic, and not from the physical state, is a conventional form. The general 'schema' assumes a somewhat different type with different children, but the same child clings pretty closely, for most purposes and for long periods. to the same favourite pattern.

Descriptive Realism - age 7 - 8 - The drawings are still logical rather than visual. The child Asets down what he knows, not what he sees : and is Purposive pencillings - the scribble is still thinking, not of the present in dividual, but rather of the generic type! He is trying to communicate, express. or catalogue all that he remembers, or The 'schema' becomes more true to detail; items, however, are suggested by the analysis of percepts. Profile perspective, opacity, foreshortening and all the consequences of single ness of viewpoint are still disregarded. There is a gathering of interest in decorative details.

> Visual Realism - age 9 - 10. The child passes from the atage of drawing from emory and imagination to the stage of drawing from nature. There are two phases :-

- 1) two dimensional phase out line only is used.
- 11) three dimensional phase, solidity is attempted. Attention is given to overlapping and perspect ive. A little shading and occasional foreshortening may be attempted. Landscapes are attempted.

Repression - age 11 - 14 - This stage sets in most commonly about the age of 15, and is part of a child's natural development. Progress in the attempt to reproduce objects is now at best laborious and slow, and the child becomes disillusioned and discouraged. Interest is transferred to expression through the medium of language, and if drawing continues the preference is for conventional designs and the human figure becomes rare.

Artistic Revival - early adolescence From about the age of 15, drawing for the first time blossoms into a genuine artistic activity. Draw ings now tell a story. A clear distinction between the sexes is now evident. Girls show a love of richness in colour, of grace in form, of beauty in line; boys - tend to use drawing more as a technical and mechanical outlet.

But by many, perhaps by most, this final stage is never reached. The

repression at the previous stage has been too complete.

The psychology of Art is a major study but these few points may help you to be more observant and tolerant of your child. As children are in development, it would be better for parents to consider their attitude towards their child. Most parents, if not all. say they are the best parents and will usually place the onerous on their child's behaviour. The purpose of the articles on Education Towards Freedom and this present article is to help parents to understand their shortcomings also.

Teaching Art in school, I get to know the pupils very well and one over riding temperament in Irish Society is fear. May I relate just one such incident. The class was asked to draw a man, woman and themselves. One boy had done a real work of Art on his man assessment which revealed that his standard was of a highly gifted pupil. He refused to draw a woman which represented his mother. I insisted that he should do the assignment; he stood up with clenched fists as if ready to box. In cases like this, teachers need to know their pupils well and this boy had a very good relations with me. His view of a woman was very inhibiting because of the domineering and indifferent attitude of his mother. His scoring here was low and the same was recorded of himself drawing. So his innate high intelligence and his maternal pressures left him, fighting to exist in a Vocational School in stead of passing freely through it and meriting a place in the University (His education ended at Group Cert.)

GREAT OLYMPIANS

ROME 1960

When the Olympic Games were revived in 1896 the 1500m were won by an Australian named FDWIN : FLACK in 4 mins 32.2 secs. -64 years passed before another Australian won this Race. He was HERB ELLIOT and he did it in a record shattering time of 3 mins -36,6 secs

In 1948 a fab housewife FANNY BLANKERS -KOEN, known as the flying dutch woman, set the crowd alight with her display in London.

To the Jubilant thunder of the crowd she hurled, and ran opposition to the ground. She took all 4 Gold Medals :-

100m - 11. 9 secs 200m - 24.4 secs 80m Hurdles - 11, 2 secs, Member of 4 x 100 winning relay

Never before in the history of the Olympics had a Woman put in such a staggering performance.

No more elegent form has ever graced the Olympic running Trace than Straw-hatted WILMA RUD -OLPH. In 1960 she won 100m and 200m and as a member of the Winning U.S. relay-team she brought her telly to 3 Gold.

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She attributed her running skills to a basic cause :- as the 17th child in a family of 19 she had to be fast off the mark at mealtimes.

During the 1st half of the 20th C. the Olympics were dominated by the Americans. Then in 1950 's the Russians entered the scene 3 of their greats are as follows:-

1) TAMARA PRESS - the most fearsome sight ever seen in Women's Ath letics. The strongest woman in the World. At Toyyo (1964) she hurled the discus 187 feet 10.5 inches. Almost double the distance hurled by Robert Garret who won the men's discus in the 1st Olympics (1896)

She also won 2 gold in Shot Putt (1960,

- 2) Irina Press (Tamara's Sister) won her Country 2 more gold in 80m Hurdles 1968 and Pentathion (1964)
- 3) VLADIMIR KUTS . reigned supreme at the 1956 Melbourne Olympics. He set a new world record in 5,000 m and 10.n000m.

During his career he is reported to have run the equivalent of twice round the World.

BERLIN 1936 - HITLER took personal charge of the games to turn it into a show piece of Nazi-Superiority. But the real hero of Berlin was neither Hitler or any other Nazi but a modest Negro from the United States named JESSE OWENS. He won 4 gold medals shattering Hitler's dream. - 100m 200m, Long Jump, 4 x 100m relay.

At the long Jump final when the German Ludz Long, equalled Owen's leap of 25ft. 91/2 ". Hitler stood up and raided a Nazi Salute. But Owen's came back with an incredible 26 ft 51/4" which was to remain unbeaten for 25 years. Hitler could take no more and stormed out of the Stadium refusing to make the presentation of Medals.
