
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



The patter of little feet on the estate has increased in volume over tha last few months. Many congratulations to the proud parents involved.





## Community Council.

The Branch has taken the initiative in organising a meeting with a view to setting up a Community Council. A meeting has been arranged for Tuesday 31st January, in the I.C.A. Hall. Every voluntary organisation in the Town is invited to send delegates to the meeting. The meeting will be jointly chaired by

Fr. Brendan Supple P.P.

Ted Kelly (Maynooth Newsletter) and

Cllr. Emmet Stagg.

The Branch will take no active part in the meeting as it is envisaged that the Community Council should be non-political.

Members of Community Councils from Leixlip, Celbridge & Clane will address the meeting on the merits and requirements of Community Councils. The Branch feels that it is vitally important that Maynooth be centrally represented on a properly organised and united basis. Further on this in the next Newsletter.



Leinster Cottages.

Following representations by Cllr. Stagg, the County Engineer, J.A. Carrick, has stated that this area will now be swept on a regular basis and that weeds & grass will be removed from the sides of the lanes.

## Securing of Pound Park.


The County Engineer has informed Cllr. Stagg that he has now received locking bollards which are to be used to stop lorries etc. using Pound Park as a back entrance. He will arrange to have the bollards erected as soon as possible.

## Phase 2 & 3 Greenfields.

With regard to the condition of the back entrance to the above, the County Engineer has stated that while some provision will be made in the estimates for this type of repair, critical maintenance will be attended to first. Cllr. Stagg has tabled a motion asking to have this repair included in the works programme for 1984.

## Phase 4 Greenfields.

Cllr. Stagg has been informed that following his representations, cleaning



of the estate will be carried out on a routine basis, depending on the amount of money available for such work in 1984.

## Bond Bridge, Newtown.

Following motion tabled by Cllr. Stagg,

"That traffic lights and a raised footbridge be erected to make it safe for pedestrians."

The County Engineer says that he has recommended special levies developments affected by this for bridge as there is little hope of getting any money from any other source for this project. In the meantime he will seek the necessary finance in the coming year for lights at a cost of £13.000 (estimated).

## Amenity Land.

Cllr Stagg has tabled a motion asking the Co. Council to acquire land in Maynooth for amenity purposes and that local groups be contacted to assist with the financing.

Geraldine Hall Restoration Committee. Following his representations the Co. County has approved the payment of a grant of £900 to this project.

Road between Greenfields and Newtown

The County Engineer has stated that the more urgent defects were attended to recently but further work will depend on whether amounts are included in the estimates for 1984.

## Drainage at 348 Greenfields. The Executive Engineer says that extensive cleaning of the main surface drainhas been carried out andf further relaying of pipes and cleaning of the catch-pit on the roadside will also be undertaken.

Road between Rail Park and bridge. The County Engineer has stated that a hedge cutting order will be served should a verbal request fail. Also a public light will be ordered when the finance becomes available.

Other matters.

1. Palm trees at Coonan's House in The Square, which are obscuring public light at that point.

2. Repairs required to the houses in phase 4 Greenfields.

3. Removal of cars dumped in the Boreen, opposite Mart.


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Seeing that we are into a new year, we would like to take this opportunity of wishing our many friends and their families every peace and blessing in 1984.



## Award.

The first big triumph of the new cross country season came not on a cross country course at all, but with the announcement by the National Juvenile Body G.C.L.D., that Grainne Farelly had been awarded the cross country 'Athlete of the Year' award for 1982/3.

To those who have witnessed or read about her achievements of the past couple of seasons, this award came as no surprise as she has simply been unbeatable at Kildare, Leinster and All-Ireland level in both age groups for which she was eligible. 

Val Ledwith of Meath, several times winner of this event and Mick Fearon of Louth, were the popular choices to take this title, but after Fearon had been relegated to third place, it was the fast finishing McNamee who overhauled Ledwith to go on for a convincing victory.

There were many other fine performances at these championships as well. Mary Farrelly was just pipped at the post in Ladies O/30 having to be content with the Silver Medal on this occasion. 


## Ras Atha Cliath.



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
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## NEW LOOK PARADE ST. PATRICK'S DAY

The next issue of the Newsletter will be the May issue and all articles for inclusion should be handed in on or before 15th April.




has come to the stage now when matteres are being passed over the General Public to do their part. It is up to the people now nominate possible Representatives for each area and Nomination pers are attached to this issue.

## AMPAIGNING FOR CARTON


'he house and landscape garden t Carton, is regarded as the finest eritage property of its type in he country. Yet unlike the finest istoric houses and gardens in other iuropean countries, Carton is closed o the public and has not been open since 1976. Furthermore it s threatened by development plans which could spoil its historic and cenic value. Carton is a priceless national asset, which has great potential for Ireland's tourism industry. That its future is threatened, highights the lack of an effective government policy to manage our heritage.

To inform the public about Carton and to stimulate wider debate about its future, an energetic programme is being organised by the Carton Committee, which is based in Maynooth and has strong local support. Public lectures are being organised for early May, to be held at Maynooth College.

he programme will culminate in public symposium and debate on he afternoon of Saturday 19th May, again at Maynooth College, it which all will be welcome. The heme will be the value of Carton and the need to save it for the hation. Speakers will include Professor Kevin B. Nowlan, of University Colege Dublin, President of An Taisce; Meagher, Planning Office for Niall Co. Kildare; Matt McNulty, who was instrumental in opening Malahide Castle to the public; Peter Marlowe, National Trust, Nothern Ireland; and the Carton Committee's Chairman, Dr. Paddy Duffy. The Minister for Culture, Ted Nealon T.D. is scheduled to attend and the chairman of the whole afternoon session will be Dr. James White.

The house and demesne at Carton are of magnificent architectural and scenic quality. Other European countries value such properties as assets, not liabilities, and they are cherished and preserved for their historic, cultural and educational value, not to mention the much needed tourist revenue which they attract.

With the lack of any programme of protection for heritage houses, linked to the requirements of tourism, and both Government & Bord Failte



have been at fault here, the Carton Committee is performing a vital role in alerting the public to the dangers facing Carton, a house and garden which are one of Ireland's great national treasures.



Following replies received by Bernard Durkan in reply to his representations:-C.I.E. regret that they are unable to improve the service until the new electrified service comes into operation on the Brav/Howth line. They are also examining the posibility of opening a station at Confey and extending the service to Kilcock.

The County Engineer states that the provision of a footbridge at Bond Bridge would cost about £125,000. However due to the condition of the two bridges it is considered that major repair work is necessary rather than a footbridge. The Council is seeking the asistance of C.I.E. and the Board of Works to help with the financing. This together with special development levies would enable the bridge replacement work to be undertaken at an early date.

The electricity supply to the area should improve with the new 38 thousand volt transformer at Moneycooley now in operation.

The Minister of the Environment has made the allocations to allow local authorities to continue the projects approved and commenced

last year under the Environment Works (Special Projects) Scheme.

A proposal to that the Maynooth/Dunboyne road be put in a proper state of repair will be pu before the next meeting of the Clane Area Committee.

Resurfacing of the East side of the Square will be undertaken later in the year.

not afraid ti invest money to create employment, for instance, in the construction industry where the majority of materials used are home based materials. Fianna Fail are a careing party, a party for the workers.




The County Engineer states that, 1. The roads design section are investigating the re-design of the traffic lights at the Square.

Motions concerning the following were submitted by Bernard Durkan, 1. A grant towards the re-stocking with fish of rivers and streams affected by pollution.

2. That industrial sites be available close to large centres of population to encourage industry in the high unemployment areas.

3. That Anco environmental projects be encouraged to provide recreational amenities throughout Kildare.

4. That services and facilities be improved in line with the collection of water & refuse collection charges and that a more equitable system be considered for such charges. 5. That all steps be taken to ensure there is no recurrence of the pollution of rivers & streams which resulted in contmination of the water supply and fish kills.



#### CARTON LECTURE

Those who took the trouble to go to the public lecture in the College Arts Building on Tuesday evening May 8th, were well rewarded for their effort. After a short introduction by the distinguished architect, Dr. Maurice Craig, in which he outlined the threat to Carton from the population explosion in the greater Dublin region, Dr. Arnold Horner of the Geography Department in U.C.D. gave a lecture on the creation of Carton from the time of the Earl Tyrconnel in the 17th Century οf to the time of the Second Duke of Leinster in the 18th Century. He showed that in the early 17th Century, builders were more con-

cerned with defence than aesthetics, but with the peace following the restoration of Charles 2nd, the view from and towards a mansion was carefully considered, so that, in a sense, landscaping was born.

What made Dr. Horner's talk so fascinating, were the slides, many of them of contemporary maps and drawings, which he used to illustrate his points. From his presentation, one could grasp the extent to which the entire demesne of Carton and the village of Maynooth was a work of artistic creation, an idea that was conceived and then executed after an enormous expenditure of time. money and effort. The same artistic concepts which influenced



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landscaping in Europe, from the 17th Century insistence on straight lines and geometric patterns a la Versailles to the 18th Century preference for curving lines and naturalistic effects, were also at ywork in Carton.

The closing speech by Dr. Paddy Duffy of St. Patrick's College, restated the case for preserving Carton. both for its historic and amenity value, and emphasised that while the demesne was the brainchild of the landlord class, it was also the product of local labour and skills

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#### FIANNA FAIL NOTES

A meeting of the Maynooth Cumann was held in the I.C.A. Hall on Tuesday 8th April. There was an extremely latge attendance and many new members were welcomed into the Cumann. Cllr. Gerry Brady was present and the guest speaker was Mr. Desie O'Malley, shadow Minister for Energy.

Mr. O'Malley talked on energy related matters and its consequence in relation to the national economy, following which a tremendous welcome was given, as was fitting for a man of Mr. O'Malley's calibre and commitment. Among matters discussed was the new electricity generating station at Moneypoint, Co. Clare, which commenced construction under the Fianna Fail party around 1978 and was then planned to come on stream in phased stages only in relation to national industrial growth demands other than could be supplied by the existing turf-fueled generating stations.

Under the present Government, all phases of the Moneypoint station were fully developed at gigantic cost, at a time when usage demand was decreasing, due to the Governments overtaxation policies, with the result that the plant must now be used on "100% imported fuel





BIRTHDAYS

The County Secretary informed Cllr. Stagg that discussion had taken place with Dublin Co. Council about the need for additional water supply or North Kildare area to cater for iuture development (Rathcoffey Group Water Supply Scheme included). It was indicated that an addition half million gallons per day would be required in the short term. Dublin Co. Council indicated that this supply could be made available as soon as improvements at the Treatment Plant at Leixlip are completed, in approx, twelve months time.

Replying to a query by Cllr. Stagg, the County Architect stated that inspection showed the principal damage to the gate piers at Carton Avenue (town end) was to the cap stones. The piers also need pointing, as also the flanking walls. These only came under the control of the Council ielatively recently and the maintenance and repairs could be initiated in the very near future.




15th May. Kore 8, Maynooth 2.





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# **Editorial**






It was agreed to have each Monday night as a worknight to clean up and maintain the green area in the Crescent. Work by members has already commenced on the green and it is already looking much better.

It is, indeed, heartening to know that, following the Lions Club Lecture on the Drug Problem, etc. some short time ago, a group of concerned people got together to see what could be done resulting in the birth of Bru Bosco Youth Organisation. Their Club house, the Geraldine Hall, was in a very poor state and, again with the generous aid of the Lions Club material was provided and, with the help of the AnCo Youth Training Scheme, a lot of valuable work was carried out on the premises - or, should we say, is being carried on. There is quite a bit more to be done still and it is hoped that the generosity of the ordinary people will help to complete it. A number of local young men are employed in the process, AnCo providing wages for them.

It looks therefore as if 'The Year of the Youth' has got a start ahead of time in our town. This is excellent news and we feel it would be a great pity if the work did not go ahead for the coming year at least. In an effort to do so, Bru Bosco are endeavouring to take up a further project of reclamation, or perhaps we should say revitalisation of the Royal Canal in this area and it would be possible to have a further thirty to forty young people employed when this gets under way. This project would also be under AnCo who would pay the workers wages with the exception of the foremen, whose wages would only be part paid, the local community being expected to provide the balance. This would mean a small contribution from all of us, but, at the price of having so many young people employed and receiving technical training, it would be well worth our support.

The Royal Canal Preservation Society are also prepared to co-operate and, as a matter of fact, a Branch may well have been formed in Maynooth before this Newsletter reaches you. The Society helped a similar project in Kilcock with outstanding success.

It would be ungrateful here not to mention the names of two people who have helped very much in these projects very quietly and without advertisement. Firstly Mr. Bernard Durkan, T.D., who has been invaluable in obtaining the grants, technical assistance and other administrative assistance. Secondly we mention Mrs. Peig Lynch and her fine body of helpers in Bru Bosco who have borne the brunt of the work and worry. Without these people nothing at all would have been arranged.

The AnCo representative in charge of the Maynooth project must also get our unreserved praise for his dedication, assistance and kindness.

It is hoped that the young people themselves who will be benefiting from these projects will really appreciate what is being done and will remember that even though they are not employed in the projects, they too can help. It is now over to you, readers, to give your assistance and, if possible, financipl support to the project. Even if you have not a lot to give, a little helps.


#### Clean-up Week


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


Ballynacargy Harbour - restored 1981.



Traffic previously carried by the Canal was switched to the rails and in time the canal was used mainly as a watersource for the steam engines. Bye-traders, however, continued their trade and the last boat passed through in 1950. Ten years later the Canal was closed to navigation. It is important to note that it was never abandoned. RESTORATION In 1974 a number of people with like views about the amenity potential of a restored Canal met and, as a result The Royal Canal Amenity Group came into being. Many levels in the section east of Mullingar had dried out, lock gates had rotted away, reduced water levels resulted in luxuriant weed growth which, because of it's unsightly appearance became a dumping water (13m) ground and a health hazard. PAST Built between the years 1795 and 1810 the Royal Canal has had a chequered history. It was the second canal to link Dublin with the Shannon and though Restoration in progress 1982/83 Voluntary work parties, organised by the Group, quickly set about restoring the towpath and cleared the Canal bed of all kinds of rubbish. Realising that full restoration was not possible without new lock gates, the Group entered into an agreement with AnCO, the Industrial Training Authority Under the terms of the agreement, the R.C.A.G. had to obtain premises, heat and light them, purchase the raw materials and the capital equipment. AnCO provided the labour force as part of a Community Youth Training Programme. At the time of writing, 1982, 12 pairs of gates have been manufactured and more are under construction. To ensure continuity of supplies to the factory it is imperative that we maintain funds.

We needed to give our members something more. It was not hard to think of the answer. Most of our members were YOUNG and UNEMPLOYED. What they needed most of all was HOPE FOR THE FUTURE and overnight, almost, an "ANCO PROJECT WAS BORN",

OBJECTIVE of AnCo project is to give youth training and employment. HOW? By giving work experiences and wages, it teaches skills, use of time, gives the young person a value in being employed. It also enhances his dignity as a human being, and gives him/her a sense of achievement and of personal identity.

But needed to run this was money to buy materials, which Bru Bosco had not got. What we collected last year was spent on the first half of the hall, but as Salesians, optimism was our KEY word and Don Bosco brought the LIONS CIUB to the rescue. That the AnCo project was passed so quickly was due to Bernie Durkan, That it was able to take off the ground immediately was due in the first place to the Trustees of the Hall who gave permission for the ANCO PROJECT to take place there, but principally to the LIONS, who donated the vast bulk of the roofing materials because they believed in what we stood for as Salesian Co-operators - to protect our youth, keep them healthy, busy and contented, and prevent DRUGS getting a grip on our town. This donation by the Lions enabled us to put eight young people to work under our foreman, local tradesman Bartley O'Flaherty. There are now twelve working on the Geraldine, PLEASE TAKE A STROLL DOWN TO THE GERALDINE AND SEE WHAT A FANTASTIC JOB IS BEING DONE, Apart from admiring the new roof, stop and take a look at the lovely job the boys and girls have done on the old boundary wall

DID YOU KNOW? a PRESERVATION ORDER has been put on the facade of the Geraldine, built 1859. I am sure all will agree that as the Geraldine is being restored to its former glory, the Harbour of the Royal Canal must now be restored to compliment it. So Bru Bosco had another AnCo Project passed on the Royal Canal.

<u>With the long term objective</u> being to employ 20 more young people by Mid-September and 40 by December , finance is needed to buy materials for SAID work. While <u>AnCo</u> pays the wages, the local community is <u>expected</u> to supply machinery and materials, which cost money.

HOW DO YOU HELP? - By supporting all the fund raising activities which we hope to run. Everything happened so fast we had not time to organise any social events. Many of you could run a morning coffee or a house bingo or a cake sale in your own homes. The Athletic Club is organising a "Fun Run" for us in October. All of you lads and lassies who like to run for pleasure will help by simply joining in the 10K. Many Maynooth Gents and Ladies will be running in the City Marathon. If you are not already dedicated to a cause, why not run for your own town, since the local community stand to benefit from the amenities created by the work, which, when it is finished, will open up a whole NEW WORLD of WATERWAYS to you, your children and posterity. The community will have to realise it has a moral responsibility to make sure this opportunity is not passed UD.

Should this financial backing not be forthcoming, the project will be put in jeopardy, which would indeed be a terrible pity. We have been in touch with the Royal Canal Amenity Group who have promised

us every help. We will be concentrating on the 13th to the 14th Lock. Take a look at the map seen elsewhere in the Newsletter and you will see that this section of ours has been holding up the whole navigation of the Canal. All sections of the Amenity Group are very excited about the possibility of Maynooth restoring their section. Their enthusias-



m is really catching. The 13th Lock at Pikes Bridge has two gates already

repaired and one waiting to be put in place. The gates for the 14th Lock at Jacksons Bridge (Blakestown) are already made. All that is needed is a few dedicated adults (tradesmen) to put them in place. While the AnCo Group are working on the Harbour there is nothing to stop Voluntary work parties going ahead with the lock gates on Saturdays or Sundays.

There will be a Canal Meeting before this Newsletter is in print and a branch of the Royal Canal Amenity Group will be formed in Maynooth. If anybody who reads this wishes to join this group and work with them, get in touch with the writer, who will hopefully be able to put you in contact with whoever is in charge. As previously stated, the intention of the Bru Bosco Committee is to form a complete new committee coming out from Bru Bosco to look after the Canal project.

We have been literally running around in circles looking for money to buy materials to keep us moving. Bernie Durkan again came to the rescue and succeeded in getting £300 on account from the Kildare County Council, which was greatly received, but spent in one hour. So far we have not been able to get anything from the Youth Employment Agency. Bernie has been trying very hard, without success. Personally I cannot accept that we are not entitled to some kind of grant from them. We are first time employers, we do pay P.R.S.I. and P.A.Y.E., we have made jobs for 12 youths and we hope to make jobs for 20 more in the near future. What the 12 are doing is restoring the Geraldine so as it can be used as a YOUTH CLUB. What we will be doing is restoring the Royal Canal and providing an amenity, not alone to the people an children of Maynooth, but to all inland water lovers from Dublin right through to Abbeyshrule.



This week there are 26 of a committee doing the runs of the houses making people aware of our projects and needs. Over the next six weeks, the following fundraising activities will be taking place: House Bingo; Sponsorship from the Athletic Club 10K Run; Individual sponsorship from Dublin City Marathon; Poker Session; Disco; American Tea Party; Marquee Dance.





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## Triumphant Performance by American Pianist. George Kelver The concert was arranged for the

For many years, Mr. George Kelver, Buffalo, New York, has been a reqular visitor to Ireland, having first come as a member of the U.S. Armed Forces to Northern Ireland Second World War, In during the years George, since more recent the death of his beloved wife, has spent the summer months in Maynooth. In the course of these visits be familiar figure to many herame а Maynooth, who came to love in this friendly, extrovert man, and appreciate and understand his deeplyfelt attachment to our country and its people.

George Kelver, though, was no 'ordinvisitor. In the United States arv' particularly in his home town and of Buffalo, New York, he is a wellknown and respected classical-music pianist and teacher. He has shared his great talent and love of piano music with the people of Maynooth during his many visits. His friends looked forward to his return each summer and his concerts at Maynooth College. At these concerts we had the additional pleasure of hearing the music and song of Fr. Noel Watson, Professor of Music at the College and Mrs. Ita McCormack, Rail Park.

In the summer of 1983 while in Maynooth, and some days after the concert that year, tradedy struck George Kelver. He suffered a serious 'stroke', leading to major surgery and weeks of recovery in Dublin hospitals. On his return home all were saddened by the fact that it was unlikely that he would ever again return to Ireland. His future as a pianist seemed over.

But George came back to Maynooth in the summer of 1984 and spent three months with us, much to the surprise of everyone. There was no music that year however, as the tragedy of 1983 had left its mark

were all in for a further major surprise this summer of 1984. Not only did George return, but he was again planning a concert! But how was he to do it? We all knew the effect which his illness had on his right arm and hand.

evening of 11th July at the Arts Music Room, St. Patrick's College. His friends gathered expectantly as 8 p.m. approached and soon the room was packed to capacity. Fr. Noel Watson introduced the programme and George took his place at the concert piano, having informed us that he would play all his pieces with the left hand only! He opened his programme with superb renderings of the National Anthems of the United States and Ireland, Surprise, appreciation and applause followed during the remainder of the evening as George followed one glorious piece with another:- Melody from Weber's Opera "DER FREISCHUTZ"; "Cavalina" from the Deerhunter: Werder's "Swamp Scenes": Lehar's "Merry Widow" Waltz; "A round of Old Tunes" and more, Mrs, McCormack afterwards expressed astonishment at his playing of Lizst's "Hungary's God" - this score required considerable dexterity in the use of the keyboard. Mrs. Ita McCormack accompanied herself while singing, beautifully as always, the "Londonderry Air". Fr. Noel Walson, Tom Lysaght and George finalised the concert with a trio at the piano of "Stars and Stripes Forever" that famous Souza march. The performance of this piece had to be repeated to satisfy those present. Those of us present could hardly believe what we saw and heard. George and his friends had treated us to a musical evening comparable to the best given in the past. It was incredible that such music and sound could be created beautiful bν one hand only, and the left hand at that! What tremendous effort and patience it must have taken to perfect such playing. All the music had either been written for the left hand or arranged by George for the left hand.

George is now back home in Buffalo. He has indicated that he will not be back. We know he returned home this time with great sadness and a sense of loss as he finally admitted that his many years of association with Ireland and Maynooth were at an end. But knowing George it is hard to imagine that he will not return again. In any event, on behalf of everyone in Maynooth, we wish him well - we wish him good health, happiness and continued success, incredibly, as a pianist and teacher. He shared his music with us when in the whole of his health and shared it again, unbelievably, when others would have acknowledged and succumbed to the effects of such a disability as he suffered.

The best of luck, George, and God bless. When you return we will again welcome you home.

## FIANNA FAIL NOTES

A meeting of the Maynooth Cumann was held in the I.C.A. hall on Tuesday 10th July, 1984. On local matters, ClIr. Gerry Brady informed the meeting that after much representation at Council level he has now got sanction for finance availability to install telephone kiosks at College Green and Cluain Aoibhinn estates Maynooth.

Cllr. Brady pledged that he is giving urgent attention to the matters of having road lighting provided at O'Neill Park, and to having the speed limit signs at the Movolare Road moved back to conform with Garda consent, which has already been given for this safety measure. Also Cllr. Brady said that in the interests of child safety, the speed limit signs on the Celbridge Road parallel to Lawrence Avenue must be moved back to an appropriate distance and enforced. In this regard, immediate action will be taken through the proper authorities.

At the meeting, grave disquiet was expressed with the Government's foreign borrowing and national financial management policies. It was widely felt that the P.A.Y.E. tax and the P.R.S.I. tax, along with the indirect taxation levels, were basically unjust, and unequitable in their formula, and were directly responsible for the high levels of unemployment prevailing. Such taxation levies on employees were also considered to be grossly unfair, and frustrating to employeres, when, after granting salary and wage increases to staff, such increases are almost totally absorbed by taxation, thereby depriving the unfortunate employer of even any staff motivation, and creating a system whereby employees are used as a vehicle to transmit money from their employers to the exchequer.

If the story were to end there, and the monies thus accrued by the exchequer put to good and proper use, things might not be so bad, as monie circulated in any form in the confines of the country is always to the natinal good in one form or another. However, it was felt that the possibility existed of a frightening dimension of the exchequer being used as a Whiz Kid Millionire' Dole Office, and the strange handouts of taxpayers' money to such people perhaps being transferred to foreign sources of private investment. The question is, "Could this happen?" Would any government allow in excess of 220,000 on the dole, and deprived of jobs because of monies being transferred out of the economy otherthan that of normal and necessary business? The government should immediately go on record and assure the nation in this regard.

Architect is preparing a plan for the provision of a children's Play Area and a Band Stand at Pound Park. These are to be provided from funds raised locally.

3. The Engineer reports that he has no objection to a minor extension of the speed limit at Dillons Row and this will be placed before the Traffic Committee at its next meeting.
4. There are no funds available for the provision of public lighting in Pound Park in the current year.
5. The Council is seeking commercial sponsorship for the provision of litter bins in Pound Park.


The competition for October is a fun one. Ladies, do bring along to that meeting an old childhood picture of yourself. The fun will be in trying to identify present members from the photos on show.







A branch of the Divorce Action Group has been set up in Maynooth. The group was formed as a result of the increase in marital breakdown in Ireland over the last few years. Most recent estimates say that there are in the region of 70,000 broken marriages at this stage, and the problems arising out of this situation are legion. Because the Constitution bans the enactment of divorce legislation, there is no legal way of ending a marriage which has irretrievably broken down. More and more people are coming to realise that the introduction of divorce is essential. However, a referendum to enable the constitutional ban on divorce to be lifted must be held, before any progress can be made.

The Maynooth Divorce Action Group, composed of a number of local residents, intends to campaign for a referendum to be held in the near future. Already, letters have been written to all Kildare constituency T.D.s. to ascertain their views, and these have received a largely favourable response.

A well-attended fund raising barbecue was held in August, and a public meeting at which the issues will be fully debated is being planned for late October.







We invited children to come whatever activity they wanted to tend, most activities not requiring y advanced booking. However, there ere exceptions where activities were aited to a fixed number of places id naturally, then people had book. Activities were varied, the bre popular were the films, the azy games, the outings, the swiming and the treasure hunts.

e had tours of Dublin Airport and aldonnel Aerodrome. A trip around ablin Castle, the Bottle Factory and ara St. Fire Station by night was ranged with the Gardai. There were ays at the Hellfire Club and the igar Loaf mountain. In Maynooth we eld canoeing on the canal and bating in Robertstown. We had cycng trips, picnics and nature walks. shing, fancy dress, art and cycling impetitions were run. Crazy games ere held in the Harbour and the 1rm trip was an occasion when over D children invaded McMylers farm. he Harbour clean up was one vent which surprisingly had almost D people picking papers and cleaning p the area. We also held a Tennis ournament and a Maynooth Minilini Marathon. Once a week we took group to Stewards Hospital for wimming and our Bar-B-Que had at over 250 children. Fifty pounds of ausages, twelve loaves of bread, ten allons of orange and buckets of pop orn were devoured. To close the roject we held a Tramps Ball in he Parish Hall where we gave out ny prizes that had been won. In all 94 children took part in the project t one stage or another.

## Gates Unstuck

Following an accident at the gates of Laraghbryan Cemetery, Cllr. Stagg contacted the Area Engineer who organised temporary relief that allows the gate to be opened.

The styles at this entrance are not working satisfactorily and Cllr. Stagg has now been assured that remedial action will be taken by the Council to restore/maintain the entrance and that the gate, styles and stonework will be included in the project.

Renewed representations have also been made to restore the piers at the entrance to Carton Avenue.

## Main Street Trees

Since the removal of the illegal advertising hoardings from the trees in the Main Street, they have been replaced by new signs. Cllr. Stagg has made representations to the Co. Secretary on

the matter and he has been informed that the new signs will be removed.

## Dangerous Corners at Laragh

Cllr. Stagg has received the following reply from the County Engineer to a motion tabled on behalf of Laraqh Residents Association, concerning the elimination of the dangerous corners at Gibbons and Coughlans at Laragh.

"Having examined the above locations, I find that whereas improvements to sight lines would be possible by relocating the boundary lines, the actual priority standing of this work would not justify the expenditure involved given the current financial position.

Furthermore immediate improvements could be accomplished by topping of the hedges by the landowners concerned."

## Gate at Laraghbryan Cemetery

Cllr. Stagg has made representations to the Co. Council concerning the damage caused to Laraghbryan Cemetery gate. The matter has been passed onto the Area Engineer for his attention.

## Footpath - Kingsbry to Crescent, Straffan Road.

The County Engineer has replied as follows to a motion tabled by Cllr. E. Stagg which requested the construction of a footpath from Kingsbry to the, Crescent, Straffan Road, and that the footpath be financed from the development levies available from the Kingsbry. development.

'The roads content of the levy paid to date is unlikely to provide a footpath along the length required. Some road widening and drainage would be involved. The money would probably be more effectively spent or used in conjunction with other finance to provide a more continuous and substantial improvement."

## Stop Signs - Leinster Cottages

The following motion was tabled by Cllr. Stagg on behalf of Lyreen Residents Association:

"That Stop signs be erected on the lane that runs parallel with Main Street, Maynooth, at the junction at Patrick Malone's house."


