



ditorial





At the November meeting of Maynooth Community Council, the Chairman expressed the Council's condolences to Willie Saults, the Council's Minutes Secretary, on the recent death of his father. A period of silence was observed.

Two new Council members, Seamus Smyth (representing Maynooth College Executive Council) and Claire Casey (representing Maynooth CollegeStudent Union) were welcomed to the meeting by the Chairman.

The Chairman reported that a joint working party, including representatives of the Community Council, Maynooth College, and Maynooth Post Primary School, has been established to pursue the development of a major Sports Complex in Maynooth,

There was a lengthy discussion on the itinerant situation at the meeting. An official of the County Council is to be asked to attend the next

meeting of the Community Council to provide information on the County Council's intention regarding this matter.

A public meeting is to be held in the near future with a view to re-establishing the Tidy Towns Committee.

The Council is investigating the possibility of establishing a Community Information Centre in Maynooth. Members of the public who would be interested in participating in this (volunteers will be needed to run the Centre) should contact the Council Secretary, John McGinley (Tel. 285293).

Other Council Matters

The Community Council organised a public meeting on October 20 to discuss the issue of local authority charges. The meeting, which had an allendance of about 150 people, was addressed by Bernard Durkan,



The Minister has approved the sing of loans by Kildare Co. Council ich would include £30,000 for development of the burial ground Laraghbryan.

Regarding plans to introduce toll on any of the proposed by is roads in Kildare, the Minister ited that the making of such scheme is a function reserved elected members of a local authorand no such scheme has been mitted to the Minister for his broval.

On the subject of the proposed pass which would facilitate Kilcock, lavnooth and Leixlip on the N4, d also the Newbridge by-pass, was expected that documentation cessary to hold a public inquiry each of the proposals would available by the end of 1985. the meantime, the local authority proceeding with the design of ese schemes.

4. Regarding the amount of money allocated to Co. Kildare for the maintenance of main and county roads by way of block grants, the Minister stated that the overall road grant allocation to Kildare Co. Council since 1981 (including that for the Naas by-pass) has been reasonable relative to other areas. Also, in recent years, in addition to the block grant, special grants have been provided for strengthening works on regional roads. New grant commitments notified in 1984 to Kildare Co. SPORTS COMPLEX


