Editorial

To the newly elected Community Council, congratulations and every success, as also to the new co-opted members who, though not appointed at the time of writing, will probably be installed by the time the Newsletter reaches our readers.

Although the new Council will have its hands fairly full setting up a Constitution, Standing Orders and sub-Committees. Might we respectfully suggest a few matters requiring attention.

Firstly, and a very thorny one, the question of itinerants must be dealt with immediately, before it gets out of hand altogether - and it is likely to, with the squatters being disturbed at Tallaght. It is a delicate matter but must be faced. Our town must be straightened up, these insanitary camps cleared and the unsightly mounds of weed and clay removed. Something can be done and pressure has to be applied to all sources to have the situation cleared up once and for all.

The second matter is equally important but perhaps not so difficult to solve. It is the question of litter. The town has got unsightly altogether, specially at weekends. Quite a deal of the litter, but far from all, is dropped by children and here parents can help. Most of the remainder is dropped by grown-ups thoughtlessly, but a large amount is caused by birds rooting in the open bins provided, in particular, on Sunday mornings. In this matter of bins, it is time that the general public woke up and reported vandalism of the larger closed bins which had to be withdrawn on this account.

If these two matters can be attended to quickly, the new Council will have made a really wonderful start to their term of office, will have done a great service to the Town and they will have won respect and co-operation of practically everybody in the area.

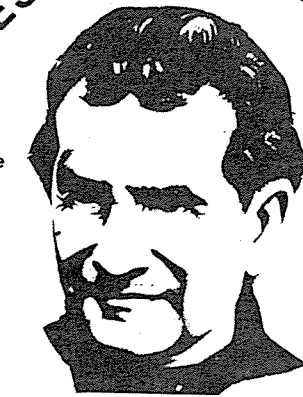

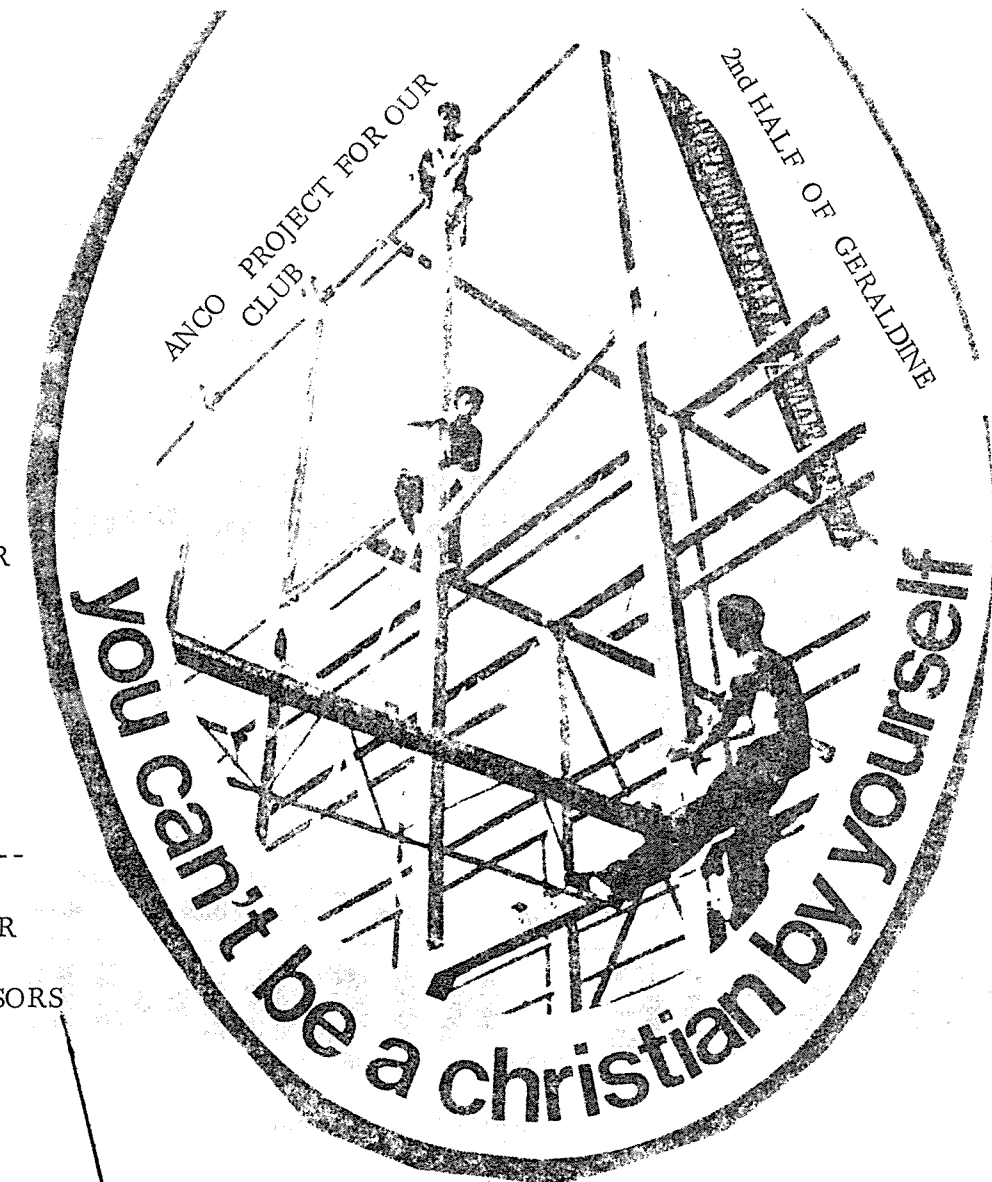

Main Street Trees.
Despite repeated requests, and a

The Area Engineer has again assured

Other Works, delays deplored.

other councillors. At 4 successive
meetings, Cllr. Stagg pointed out
the near impossibility of attending

to other duties and also fulfilling
the heavy schedule of County Council
meetings. He questioned the desirability
of dual mandates.

The other works programme is des-
igned to give each councillor discretion
over the allocation of £5,000 each
to be spent on local improvement
works. Councillors co-operate on
the funding of local projects and
therefore must meet and agree on
same before the works can be put
in hand.

area.
2. Drainage & upgrading of footpath

4. Improvement to road linking New-
town & Greenfield.
5. Improvement to surface of square
at O'Neill Pk.
6. Provision of footpath & drainage
at Moyglare Rd.
7. Surfacing of back entrance to
Greenfields.
8. Provision of footpath in Leinster
St.
9. Improvement to condition of foot-
path in Parsons St.

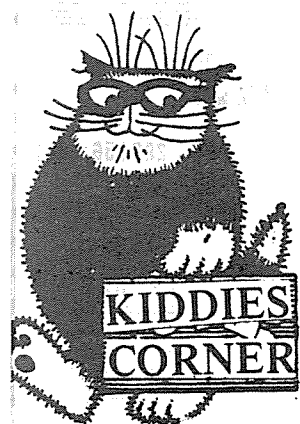
LARAGH RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

Because the Lions appreciate that the reason the club was formed was to try and safeguard the Youth of Maynooth against DRUGS, and because it is their policy to be associated with what they consider to be worthy projects, down came three Lions to visit our club, (no silly, Don Bosco did not drive them, they used their own cars). Results, yes. They are going to be associated with us. Next issue we will tell you what they decide. They had a chat with our Co-Ordinator, Gerry Myers S.D.B. (as this is a Salesian project), and our old pal in charge of central heating, Mick Bennett, and needless to say, our Chairman and various members of the committee. Isn't that great news.

HOLIDAYS AT PALLASKENRY:- Club members only between the ages of 14 and 17 are invited to spend a holiday under supervision at the Salesian College, Pallsakenry. The cost to each young person will be £28.50. The accommodation will be in tents and each person will have to bring their own sleeping bags. The indoor swimming group will be available to the group and also the following activities:-

1. Fishing for perch & roach in Bleach Loch.
2. Orienteering in the college grounds or Curragh Chase.
3. Hard surface football & basketball.
4. Hanball alleys.
5. Tennis court.

Right along the Royal Canal, there is some kind of fever spreading. SO NOW MAYNOOTH, IT IS UP TO YOU. ARE YOU GOING TO STAND BY AND WATCH YOUR COUNTY COUSINS ENJOYING TO THE FULLEST THEIR AMENITY, WHILE YOU NEGLECT YOURS?.

Soon we will call a public meeting to find out how much interest there is in this project in our area. The small Geraldine committee could not go it alone (those youth workers never did turn up at the hall). We can put the wheels in motion, then it is up to everybody to throw their weight behind us. The club development fund, (300 Club), had another successful year and we would like to thank the people of Maynooth for their continued support for our club.

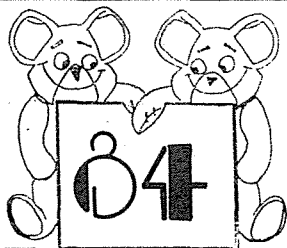
