ditorial

It for law in Ireland has reached, it would appear, a very low ebb, people are somewhat bewildered. Every day we hear and read of sections of the public apparently doing as they like in complete disregard of the law of the land. Worse still, nothing seems to be done in these cases. Even the Courts do not seem to be above reproach since, even if they do not always break the Law, some recent Court decisions certainly do not appear to be dispensing Justice, and after all they are supposed to be the Courts of Justice.

The behaviour of politicians also does not lend itself to assurance to the public in general. Some of the shenanigans of our politicians recently would put the 'Banana Republic' in the shade and is not a pattern to our youth. Apart from the apparent or presumed interference in Court cases, the political gossip and lying that has surfaced from time to time is, to say the least, disgraceful.

The enforcement of Law and Order is heading hard to catch up with our police service - before long both will be non-existent. We must admit that the police force is rather overstretched at present but that is not the reason either. More could be done to stem the lawlessness that is rife at present.

If taken to task the lawyers, law makers and law enforcers, it is only fair that we take the general public to task too. Disrespect for law is creeping in bit by bit, even with the best of us. Small things perhaps - breaking speed limits, parking offences, pedestrian offences; etc. Furthermore a form of civil disobedience is creeping in, people pick and choose what taxes they want to pay, etc.

These things add up to make us a lawless nation without touching on the real criminals who kill, rob, plunder apparently quite freely. But something must be done and it is up to us, the general public, to have the matter defined and put right. Basically we have a good police force (there are a few black sheep) despite the propaganda of the criminal element and it is up to us to help that Force to enforce the laws and help to clean up this horrible mess. We must help them or Ireland is going to slide into a sad mess where decent people will be unable to live.





The highlights of the submission on the Draft County Development Plan may be summarised as follows:

The Provision of a Sports Complex to be given top priority by Kildare County Council as regards the Maynooth area

Full backing of Kildare Co. Council sought for Royal Canal project

Any development of itinerant trading sites in Maynooth to be part of a co-ordinated plan for the time at County level

Public conveniences in the square to be re-developed for more attractive uses

Detailed development plan to be drawn up for town centre

Construction of by-pass road to proceed as early as possible

Improve the safety of roadways in Maynooth area

No commercial development of Carton Demesne to be allowed

Kildare Co. Council in their Draft Plan have promised to "Co-operate

with any community effort to enhance the visual and physical characters and amenities of the town."

The Community Council looks forward to co-operating with the County Council in the pursuit of their common aims and will seek an oral hearing to discuss the details contained in the Draft Plan.

- (v) Suitable accommodation be found for the Employment Exchange and the provision of an Advice Centre
- (vi) Organisation of I.D. Card System re under-age drinking
- (vii) Series of public lectures dealing with teenagers' relationships with parents and society. Also the arrangement of classes for 7-12 year olds in gymnastics, drama, music etc. Other projects are also being worked on and further news of these will be given in the next edition of the Newsletter.

Finally the Community Council wish to stress that a meeting is being sought with the County Council concerning the itinerant situation in Maynooth.

The Council also passed a vote of sympathy with Peter Nevin, the Council's Joint Treasurer, on the recent death of his father, Mr Michael Nevin.

Gates Unstuck

Following an accident at the gates of Laraghbryan Cemetery, Cllr. Stagg contacted the Area Engineer who organised temporary relief that allows the gate to be opened.

The styles at this entrance are not working satisfactorily and Cllr. Stagg has now been assured that remedial action will be taken by the Council to restore/maintain the entrance and that the gate, styles and stonework will be included in the project.

Renewed representations have also been made to restore the piers at the entrance to Carton Avenue.

Main Street Trees

Since the removal of the illegal advertising hoardings from the trees in the Main Street, they have been replaced by new signs. Cllr. Stagg has made representations to the Co. Secretary on

the matter and he has been informed that the new signs will be removed.

Dangerous Corners at Laragh

Cllr. Stagg has received the following reply from the County Engineer to a motion tabled on behalf of Laragh Residents Association, concerning the elimination of the dangerous corners at Gibbons and Coughlans at Laragh.

"Having examined the above locations, I find that whereas improvements to sight lines would be possible by relocating the boundary lines, the actual priority standing of this work would not justify the expenditure involved given the current financial position.

Furthermore immediate improvements could be accomplished by topping of the hedges by the landowners concerned."

Gate at Laraghbryan Cemetery

Cllr. Stagg has made representations to the Co. Council concerning the damage caused to Laraghbryan Cemetery gate. The matter has been passed onto the Area Engineer for his attention.

Footpath - Kingsbry to Crescent, Straffan Road.

The County Engineer has replied as follows to a motion tabled by Cllr. E. Stagg which requested the construction of a footpath from Kingsbry to the Crescent, Straffan Road, and that the footpath be financed from the development levies available from the Kingsbry development.

The roads content of the levy paid to date is unlikely to provide a footpath along the length required. Some road widening and drainage would be involved. The money would probably be more effectively spent or used in conjunction with other finance to provide a more continuous and substantial improvement."

Stop Signs - Leinster Cottages

The following motion was tabled by Cllr. Stagg on behalf of Lyreen Residents Association:

"That Stop signs be erected on the lane that runs parallel with Main Street, Maynooth, at the junction at Patrick Malone's house."

The County Engineer has replied stating that he discussed the matter with the local Garda Sergeant. His initial response was to disagree with the policy of erecting the signs at the location suggested because the main traffic route in this back area is the roadway parallel to the Main St. in Maynooth.

However, the County Engineer now sees the reason behind the request and would be agreeable to having the signs located as described. He goes on to say that he is not in a position to have the signs erected without the consent of the Garda Síochána.

Rowanstown Cul de Sac

Damage caused to Rowanstown lane during the building of College Green will be corrected following representations by Cllr. Stagg. The County Engineer has replied to a motion tabled by Cllr. Stagg as follows:

Meanwhile, "the show must go on", so here goes with a brief summary of what's been happening on the playing fields over the past month or so. The first team have really been flying high and have not lost since the first day of the season. They must have a great chance of the Division 1A Sunday title on this form. Some recent results:
