

MAYNOOTH DIVORCE ACTION GROUP

A branch of the Divorce Action Group has been set up in Maynooth. The group was formed as a result of the increase in marital breakdown in Ireland over the last few years. Most recent estimates say that there are in the region of 70,000 broken marriages at this stage, and the problems arising out of this situation are legion. Because the Constitution bans the enactment of divorce legislation, there is no legal way of ending a marriage which has irretrievably broken down. More and more people are coming to realise that the introduction of divorce is essential. However, a referendum to enable the constitutional ban on divorce to be lifted must be held, before any progress can be made.

The Maynooth Divorce Action Group, composed of a number of local residents, intends to campaign for a referendum to be held in the near future. Already, letters have been written to all Kildare constituency T.D.s. to ascertain their views, and these have received a largely favourable response.

A well-attended fund raising barbecue was held in August, and a public meeting at which the issues will be fully debated is being planned for late October.



icited we received approximately £500 in cash and about £1000 worth of equipment, which was fantastic. We had book sales and dinner parties. Various people ran house Bingo for us. Youngsters ran Sales in their gardens, yet would you believe it, we are gone into the red again.

The Project turned out to be much greater than we had anticipated; as can be seen, the whole Hall, School House excepted, has been re-roofed, the Domes replaced, with timber, glass and lead flashing. We found it necessary to replace

the whole sewerage sytem. Toilets had to be gutted, walls plastered, chimney relined, fireplaces rebuilt, all electrical fittings in the second half of the Hall and Function Room re-wired. As it stands now, it will be near Christmas before the Hall is completed. But when it is, the YOUTH will have a Club Hall to be proud of and Maynooth will have a Hall that can be handed down to posterity. The Committee of Bru Bosco are looking forward to the day when the Public can see for themselves all the work which has been done. It is far superior to the original building. Meanwhile, do not pass without admiring both the roof and the pointing on the surrounding wall, because it is the work of the Youth of Maynooth.

There are 12 Youths and one Foreman working on the hall; three girls and nine chaps. We are losing five who are going to finish training in different directions, and we say good luck and well done. e had tours of Dublin Airport and aldonnel Aerodrome. A trip around ablin Castle, the Bottle Factory and ara St. Fire Station by night was ranged with the Gardai. There were ays at the Hellfire Club and the gar Loaf mountain. In Maynooth we eld canoeing on the canal and pating in Robertstown. We had cycag trips, picnics and nature walks. shing, fancy dress, art and cycling impetitions were run. Crazy games ere held in the Harbour and the arm trip was an occasion when over 3 children invaded McMylers farm. he Harbour clean up was one vent which surprisingly had almost D people picking papers and cleaning p the area. We also held a Tennis ournament and a Maynooth Minilini Marathon. Once a week we took group to Stewards Hospital for wimming and our Bar-B-Que had at over 250 children. Fifty pounds of ausages, twelve loaves of bread, ten allons of orange and buckets of pop orn were devoured. Clearly all this took a lot of organising and a great deal of generosity on the part of the people of the area. There are many people who deserve to be thanked and in doing so you run the risk, as usual, of omitting someone. If I do, it will certainly not be intentional.

Our immediate problem was of a financial nature and while we charged for some activities, we tried to keep this at a minimum for the sake of the children. Actually, on average it cost less than £2 per week for a child who took part in all the activities of the project. We got a County Council Grant of £150 for which we are very grateful to Bernard Durkan T.D. for all the work he did in this area and for other help he gave during the project and to the other councillors. Financial contributions were also made by the A.I.B., the Bank of Ireland and the Ulster Bank. Individual donations were received from Fr.
