

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
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
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Maynooth Community Council

Comhairle Phobail Mhá Nuad

At the November meeting of Maynooth Community Council, the Chairman expressed the Council's condolences to Willie Saults, the Council's Minutes Secretary, on the recent death of his father. A period of silence was observed.

Two new Council members, Seamus Smyth (representing Maynooth College Executive Council) and Claire Casey (representing Maynooth CollegeStudent Union) were welcomed to the meeting by the Chairman.

The Chairman reported that a joint working party, including representatives of the Community Council, Maynooth College, and Maynooth Post Primary School, has been established to pursue the development of a major Sports Complex in Maynooth.

There was a lengthy discussion on the itinerant situation at the meeting. An official of the County Council is to be asked to attend the next meeting of the Community Council to provide information on the County Council's intention regarding this matter.

A public meeting is to be held in the near future with a view to re-establishing the Tidy Towns Committee.

The Council is investigating the possibility of establishing a Community Information Centre in Maynooth. Members of the public who would be interested in participating in this (volunteers will be needed to run the Centre) should contact the Council Secretary, John McGinley (Tel. 285293).

Other Council Matters

The Community Council organised a public meeting on October 20 to discuss the issue of local authority charges. The meeting, which had an attendance of about 150 people, was addressed by Bernard Durkan,

T.D., M.C.C., Emmet Stagg, M.C.C., Gerry Brady, M.C.C., and a representative of the Association of Combined Residents' Associations (ACRA). On Nov. 16, a delegation from the Community Council appeared before the Clane Electoral Area Committee of Kildare County Council to make representations on behalf of Maynooth concerning the forthcoming County Development Plan. The Community Council is compiling a comprehensive dessier on improvements which need Area, All members of the public are invited to send in submissions for this dossier. These should be sent, as quickly as possible, to Jim McManus, Architect, Main Street (beside Hula Bou).



nard Durkan, T.D., has received following information from Mr. m Kavanagh, T.D., Minister for Environment, in reply to various uiries:

The Minister has approved the sing of loans by Kildare Co. Council ich would include £30,000 for development of the burial ground Laraghbryan.

Regarding plans to introduce toll on any of the proposed by is roads in Kildare, the Minister ited that the making of such scheme is a function reserved elected members of a local author, and no such scheme has been mitted to the Minister for his proval.

On the subject of the proposed pass which would facilitate Kilcock, laynooth and Leixlip on the N4, d also the Newbridge by-pass, was expected that documentation cessary to hold a public inquiry each of the proposals would available by the end of 1985, the meantime, the local authority proceeding with the design of ese schemes.

4. Regarding the amount of money allocated to Co. Kildare for the maintenance of main and county roads by way of block grants, the Minister stated that the overall road grant allocation to Kildare Co. Council since 1981 (including that for the Naas by-pass) has been reasonable relative to other areas. Also, in recent years, in addition to the block grant, special grants have been provided for strengthening works on regional roads. New grant commitments notified in 1984 to Kildare Co. Council total £450,000. The following are examples of Block Grant Allocations from 1981 to 1983:







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I.D. System - Re: Under-Age Drinking



So ended another days outing for the Club, and all are looking forward to round two of the Kildare Championships on Sunday November 11th in Carbury.


November 11th, 1984.

Maynooth Castle, a national monument in the quardianship of the Commissioners of Public Works, is undergoing a major scheme of conservation works costing approximately £75,000. The works are designed to secure the preservation of the structure and includes securing wall tops and replacing cut stonework where necessary. Conservation work has been completed on the Keep and is in progress on the Gatehouse. The works are scheduled for completion ın 1986.

Maynooth Castle is one of the outstanding thirteenth century castles in Leinster both from an architectural point of view. The exact date of the buildings is not recorded but it is clear from the general character and details that they are of the thirteenth century. The Castle is rich in the history of Kildare and was used at various times by some of the Earls of Kildare. Its history is also intimately linked



At a well attended meeting of the Community Council on Dec. 10th last, members were informed by Proinnsias Breathnach and Jim Mc Manus of their oral Submission on The Draft County Development Plan to Kildare Co. Council. The Submission made at a meeting on Nov. 16th was attended by County Councillors from the Clane electoral area, Discussion centred on many topics - in particular the plan for Itinerants in Maynooth and in the County; and the alternate uses of the "Thing" in the square. Although included in the oral and written submissions this particular item will be treated as a separate issue. Suggested uses of the building are of as, (i) tourist office, (ii) Community Centre. The County Council stated that all proposals would be entertained and carefully looked into.

Mrs. Maura Cullen informed the Council on the progress of the Canal Project Group. Work was being carried out near Laraghbryan and Maura appealed for more volunteers to help. We are delighted for the R.C.A.G. that their function prior to Christmas in the Hitchin Post was a success. It was pleasing to note from Maura that C.I.E. will contribute to and help the R.C.A.G. and that the Board of Works intend certain restoration of the canal.

Financ

In relation to Subscriptions from Voluntary Organisations, it was pointed out by Peter Nevin (Treasurer) that the response so far was quite slow. The Community Council ask all Voluntary Organisations to please forward their £10.00 subscription. The Council have so far managed on a small intake of funds but as projects advance this year, more funding will obviously be required. The Subscription may be paid to our Treasurers Peter Nevin or Ann McStravick or indeed through any Council member.

There then followed reports from the Sub-Committees of their activities. On Social Services, Leo McGlynn reported that with the help of Gerry Colreavey (Maynooth College), up to twenty five people had volunteered to assist in the setting-up and running of an Information Centre in Maynooth. 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NOTES FROM BERNARD DURKAN, T.D.

Deputy Durkan received the following from the County Engineer re the continued presence of itinerants on the Moyglare Road.

"The construction of proper footpaths, drainage and landscaping on the Moyglare Road is, in my opinion, most desirable and would help to alleviate the problem referred to. However, due to the present extremely difficult financial situation for road maintenance, I see little prospect of being able to undertake this work in the near future and I feel the real solution will have to await the construction of an itinerant site in the area.

Regional Technical College, Kildare Following an enquiry to the Minister for Education as to whether consideration will be given to the siting of a regional technical college in Co. Kildare, the Minister replied that the Regional Technical Colleges in this country were set up to serve designated regions. The southern part of Co. Kildare is served by Carlow Regional Technical College while the northern part including Naas is served by the City of Dublin third-level colleges. The Government has given a commitment to the establishment of new Regional Technical Colleges in the Greater Dublin area, one of which will be located in Tallaght. There are no plans to provide a Regional Technical college in Naas.

Enquiries re New Garda Sub-Division for Kildare and New Station for Leixlip.

Having been asked to consider the possibility of creating a new Garda sub division in Kildare with particular reference to north Kildare (Leixlip, Celbridge, Maynooth) and also the possiblity of providing a Garda station in Leixlip, the Minister for Justice has replied that there are no proposals for either of the above at present. Both would require additional manpower on indoor duty, at the expense of outdoor operational duty. Therefore it is necessary to examine the possibility of improving the existing service by allocation of additional manpower and other resources before embarking on structural changes or establishing a new station in any area.

Since the beginning of 1984, one extra Garda has been allocated to both Celbridge and Maynooth. New communications equipment has been installed

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
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LABOUR PARTY NOTES

A discussion on the 1985 Annual Conference took place and the following resolution was submitted by the branch for the Conference Agenda:

Annual Conference

Affirms that the National Plan 'Building on Reality 1984-87', which forms the basis of the Coalition's policies is in the main in direct contradiction to Labour's socialist policies as enshrined in the Party Programme and endorsed by successive Annual Conferences;

Affirms that the Programme for Government agreed at the Special Conference in Limerick in 1982 did not give a mandate to Labour Ministers for such a plan;

Directs therefore, the Parliamentary Labour Party to withdraw immediately from Coalition;

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Resolves that in all future General Elections Labour shall campaign exclusively on its own independent socialist policies and shall not enter any electoral alliance with either of the two conservative parties, Fianna Fail or Fine Gael:

Further Resolves that Labour shall not participate in any Coalition or give support to any minority Government.

Conference believes that by standing independently on socialist policies and campaigning on behalf of working people, the trade union movement and young people on such vital issues as jobs, taxation, housing Labour can rebuild electoral support and move toward achieving the ultimate objective of a majority Labour Government.

Conference will be held in City Hall Cork on 3rd, 4th and 5th May. Our Branch will have its usual strong delegation in attendance.

The County Engineer has agreed to have the matter investigated as a matter of urgency.

The Branch notes the very large number of pedestrians using this unlit section of roadway and are mindful of the near fatal accident there recently. Urgent action is now required.

Sewerage Improvements

A bill of quantities has been prepared for the required extension to the sewerage works in Leixlip which serves the Maynooth area and a draft advertisement for the contract has been submitted to the Dept.

The sewerage collection system on the south side of Maynooth is now at full capacity and problems have emerged in the system, notably at Cluain Aoibhinn. The system has been surveyed by a company of consultant engineers and their report has been submitted to the Dept. of Environment for approval to the required enlargements.

Grants for Maynooth

Cllr. Emmet Stagg has informed the Branch that the following grants have been paid by the Co. Council:

- 1. £1000 for improvement work at the 13th lock on the Royal Canal. 2. Increase of grant to Maynooth Summer Project from £150 to £200. 3. Further grant of £200 to the Salesian Co-Operators and Bru Bosco towards restoration work at the Geraldine Hall.
- 4. Grant of £500 to Maynooth Development Association towards the

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Grant for 1984 and 1983 to Maynooth Brass and Reed Band, A condition of this grant is that the band give a public recital at least once a year. We are glad to record that already in 1985 this condition has been ably met and we look forward to future renditions during the year.

Other Works Schemes

The Branch notes that the resurfacing of the roads in Leinster Cottages has been completed under the above scheme.

Cllr. Stagg has informed the Branch that a number of other projects are still outstanding and that he is pressing to have these completed at an early

Road Through Kingsbry Estate

Following representation by Cllr. Stagg the County Engineer contacted the Site Developers, Naughton & Glennon concerning the condition of the road through Kingsbry. The developers agreed that due to wet weather in November and December cost of providing a tennis court. the roads in the estate had become

rather dirty. The County Engineer instructed the developers to have the roads swept as often as required to keep them reasonably clean, and this they undertook to do.

Public Light - Doctors Lane

Cllr. Stagg has requested the provision of a public light at Doctors Lane as a matter of extreme urgency. This lane is used by residents of Doctors Lane as well as those attending the doctor's surgery.

Derelict Site, Parsons St.

The Housing & Environment Section of Kildare Co. Council has replied to representations by Cllr. Stagg concerning the condition of the derelict site beside No. 2 Parsons St., stating that the matter is being investigated and whatever action seen necessary will be undertaken.

Completion of Carton Court

Representations have been made by Cllr. Stagg concerning the unfinished estate at Carton Court. In one part of the estate the roads and footpaths have not been completed and public lights have not been erected. The County Manager has replied stating that the matter is receiving attention.



From the County Manager, Kildare County Council.

I have received your letter regarding complaints about correspondence not being dealt with by the Council's staff and I am to inform you that I am surprised that this is happening, in view of the instructions which have been given to all sections to respond to correspondence promptly. I have again repeated my instructions to the various sections but I would be glad to get details of specific instances where correspondence has not been dealt with, so that the matter can be further investigated.

From County Secretary, 20/12/84.

Further to your representations on behalf of the Salesian Co-operators and Bru Bosco regarding their application for grant assistance towards the restoration of the Geraldine Hall, I wish to inform you that Kildare Co. Council has approved a further payment of £200 towards the project and paying order will issue shortly.

From Area Manager, C.I.E. 20/12/84.

I refer to your letter of 6th December to our Secretary, which has been passed to me for attention.

Maynooth station is served daily by all of the mainline trains operating between Connolly station and Sligo in both directions, From Monday, 26th November last due to lack of support two of the evening commut -er trains, Dublin/Maynooth, were withdrawn. We have had some adverse reaction from public representatives about the reduction in service who

contend that the provision of new stations at specific areas on the Dublin/Kildare border is essential in order to enable the Maynooth line to reach its full potential. We accept this line of thinking but simply the capital is not available to build new stations or re-furbish existing ones.

Regarding the possibility of introducing a cross radial bus service from Clonee/ Maynooth/Naas, this has been considered in the past but was not economically feasible. However, in view of your representations the matter will be considered again and if possible the service will be introduced, even if only for a trial period.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT MATTERS

A delegation from the Community Council recently travelled to Naas to make an oral submission to Kildare County Council concerning the forthcoming County Development plan. The main items emphasised by the delegation were:

- I. The need to proceed with the Maynooth By-pass as soon as possible. The link road between Maynooth and the By-pass should not pass through the town centre.

 2. The need to maintain a Green Belt between Maynooth and neighbouring towns, and to draw up a proper plan for future residential development in Maynooth.
- 3. The need for a Plan for the Town Centre, to ensure that future developments are in keeping with the existing character of the area.
 4. The urgent need to provide a multi-purpose Sports Complex.
 5. The need to tackle the itinerant problem.
- 6. The need to prevent commercial redevelopment of Carton Estate, the County Council to make every effort to have the Estate taken into public ownership and developed as a park and heritage centre.

In addition to the above, the Community Council has since submitted to the County Council a list of more specific local needs requiring urgent attention. These include:

- 1. Proper lighting, road surfaces, drains and footpaths on the roads from the Town Centre as far as Cluain Aoibhinn and Kingsbry/Carton Court.
- 2. Adequate safety measures at the bridges on the above two roads.
- 3. Ramps on housing estate roads to prevent speeding.
- 4. Re-alignment at junction between Celbridge and Straffan Roads in the interests of the safety of pedest-rians and motorists.
- 5. Extend footpath and improve lighting on Moyglare Road.
- 6. Introduce one-way traffic flow at the Square.
- 7. Redevelop "The Thing" in the Square.
- 8. Traffic control measures in Leinster Cottages area.
- 9. Exclude heavy traffic from Convent Lane and reroute via Blacklion.

AMUSEMENT ARCADE



Conditions:

- Development shall be carried out in accordance with plans lodged by applicant on 12.3.82 save as conditions hereunder otherwise require. Amusement arcade shall be open only between 11.00am and 11.00pm.
- 3. No advertising signs to be erected without prior consent of Kildare Co. Council.
- 4. No gaming machines to be installed in amusement centre.
- 5. Before development is commenced, the developer to arrange for payment to Kildare Co. Council of contribution of £275 towards expenditure which the Council has or may incur in respect of the provision of water and sewerage services which facilitate the proposed develop-

Cllr. Stagg has referred the reply to Maynooth Community Council and it is understood that the Council have decided to appeal against the decision. Maynooth Labour Branch urges all organisations and individuals who have the interests of young people in the area at heart to support the Community Council's appeal against this decision.

Royal Canal Restoration

Following a request for assistance with the provision of lock gates for the Royal Canal in the Maynooth/ Kilcock area, which would ensure that the canal was navigable throughout the Kildare Section by 1986. Cllr. Stagg has tabled the following motion at Kildare Co. Council:

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CLLR. G. BRADY NOTES

Following representations made by Cllr. Brady on behalf of the residents of Old Greenfield regarding the back road to Old Greenfield from the Newtown Road, the County Engineer has replied that repair work will be undertaken in late February or early March 1985.

The County Engineer stated that it had been agreed that the planning of both by-passes would go ahead hand in hand. However, the survey of the Newbridge by-pass had been going ahead for a couple of years and the line for the northern by-pass had not been ascertained until recently. It was hoped that the public inquiry in relation to the Newbridge By-Pass would be held in April or May and that the public inquiry in relation to the northern by-passes would not be held until towards the end of the year. The monies provided for advance planning on the northern by-passes would be used for soil and aerial surveys and should be adequate for the current year.

ROAD GRANTS 1985

Following circulation of a letter from the Department setting out the allocation of Road Grants for 1985, Cllr. Brady expressed disappointment at the allocation of only

£280,000 for advance design on the N4 and N7 and noted that in addition the N7 had got a further allocation of £580,000. He stated that the traffic on the northern

route was now very heavy and this was particularly evident in the town of Leixlip.

He understood that advance design for both the northern by-pass and the Droichead Nua By-Pass were of equal priority and asked why the Newbridge By-Pass now appeared to have priority over the by-passes of Lucan, Leixlip, Maynooth and

What is Break Away?

Break away is a holiday scheme for children with mental handicap. During the year the children go on holidays for up to two weeks, at any one time, to a family in the community. The idea is to provide a home from home setting, giving both parents and children a break.

Why was Break Away set up?

Traditionally in Ireland, the emphasis was on residential care for people with mental handicap. In recent times, this emphasis has changed and families care for their children a lot of strain on the family. Families need support in caring for thei. child and the opportunity to have a break is all important.

Break Away was set up to meet this need and to give families the option of a family type holiday for their child.

Break away is an inter agency scheme and began in Dublin in 1981. Twenty eight children were placed on a holiday in that first year. The scheme was extended to the north east of the country in 1982, and a total of eighty children placed. In 1983 the scheme expanded and over one hundred children were placed. In 1984 the numbers placed

were similar. These figures indicate the success and demand for the scheme, and also highlight the need for a large pool of host parents. i.e. parents willing to give a child a holiday.

What are the benefits in Break Away?

The benefits in Break Away are threefold. For the parents, host parents and most important of all. the child. Take David's story......

David is a 7 year old boy, who lives with his parents and three sisters. He does not find it easy to play with other children, because he has difficulty in making himself understood. He also finds it hard to do things other children do. David is mentally handicapped. During the day he attends a special school, where he is being taught to feed himself, dress himself, and is presently being toilet trained. He can be very demanding and active, and his family need a break from time to time. For the past few years, David has gone to a Break Away Host Family for his holidays. He adapted well to the change because of the loving care this family gave him. His parents enjoyed the break and felt secure that he was in good hands. The Host Parents found that caring for him was rewarding, challenging and enjoyable for all the family.

David's story very much reflects the feelings of most Host Families in the scheme.

What can you expect if you become a Host Parent?

All host families who apply to the Break Away Scheme, take part in a preparation course. This involves discussions on various aspects of caring for a child who is mentally handicapped, including ways of coping with very specific needs, behaviour etc. It also gives Host Parents an opportunity to look at the implications for their own family. The preparation involves visits to the centres the children attend by day, and numerous opportunities to get to know the child they are taking and his/her family. Every effort is made to ensure the child goes to the family who can best meet his needs.

When the child is on holidays with the Host Family, a link is maintained with the staff and there is a 24 hour telephone back up service. Every effort is therefore, made to ensure that if problems arise, they can be sorted out promptly. A further safety, of contracts and insurance cover is built into the scheme.

The Host Parents receive payment in recognition of the extra work and responsibility that is involved.



The 3lst January 1985 marked the inauguration of DON BOSCO VOLUN-TARY SERVICES at the Salesian House, Maynooth, Co. Kildare. The DON BOSCO VOLUNTARY SERVICES is a response to the critical unemployment situation in Irish society, and is being initiated as a major on-going International Youth Year Project.

There are thousands of young unemployed people in this country, most of whom are receiving unemployment benefit from the state without being given the opportunity of making a positive and worthwhile contribution to society. A substantial amount of "work" could be tackled at community level if the resources, were available. One of Ireland's greatest resources is her young people. However there is a danger that they will lose their natural idealism and drive if left unemployed for long periods. Involvement in DON BOSCO VOLUN-TARY SERVICES would allow them experience the fulfilment of making a worthwhile contribution to society in general and to their local area in particular. This is confirmed by the success of similar type projects in the U.S.A.

The need for such a voluntary service in Ireland was stressed in a recent E.R.S.I. Report entitled Employment and Unemployment: Policy for Ireland (L.R.S.I. May 1984), edited by Conniffe and Kennedy, p. 266, where the authors identified the role of a "Third Sector". This Third Sector combines Voluntary Organisations, Private Enterprise and Public Support in a joint venture to contribute to alleviate the scourge of unemployment and sees this as a hope for the future.

EDITORIAL

Many things spring to mind as a subject for this Editorial but two in particular come to the fore.

Firstly we think of the dreadful crime wave now sweeping the country. No doubt some of this can be blamed on the Northern Troubles, but by no means all.

There are as many people as there are views on the subject over the past wenty years or so - some say the Courts are too lenient, some that parents are avoiding their responsibilities, etc., etc. Even the schools are blamed - yes, everything and everyone but the criminals themselves.

The fact of the matter is that things are now getting out of hand and, as the older generation know, there was less crime when retribution was wift and severe. Parents chastised their children – responsible people reported misdemeanours of children to their parents and, if not listened to they passed he complaint to the Gardai, or other responsible authority. TEAMWORK SCHEME FOR YOUTH **EMPLOYMENT**

TEAMWORK is a scheme operated by the Department of Labour to help local organisations provide temporary employment for their young people. Any young person aged between 17 and 25 who has been unemployed for at least six months is eligible, and may be employed for up to 12 months on a suitable project or combination of projects. A grant of £ $\mathfrak D$ per week is available towards the employment costs (including PRSI) of each young person. If at least 5 persons are employed under the scheme, a grant of £105 per week is available to employ a supervisor. A grant of 15% of the employment grant is available towards running costs. Should 20 people be employed under the scheme, a management grant of £850 per person is payable.

Among the types of project which can be supported under the scheme are:

Youth projects and programmes Holiday camps and summer projects Playgroups and creches

Meals on wheels

Helpers in day-centres, homes, hospitals, drop-in centres, and people's own homes.

Performing arts.

Sports coaching for school-children. Organisation of community games and other sports events.

Help with disadvantaged groups e.g. mentally and physically handicapped; unemployed and people of limited means.

The one hundred and forty eighth Annual General Meeting was held at the Reg Office on Sunday 24th February 1985 and drew a large number of members. Benny Farrelly presided.

The Balance Sheet as prepared by Frank Donnelly F.C.A. Hon. Auditor (who was unable to attend) was read by Kevin Murphy (Asst.Sec) and this showed that the Society was still in a very strong financial position.

Paddy Nolan, Secretary, in his report stated that during 1984, 27 members died at a cost of approx. £7,000. This showed a running loss of £2,000. Despite these figures, assets remain at £6,000.

The Funeral Grant during 1984 was £250 and he was glad to report that the Grant was being increased to £275 in 1985. Despite the loss of 27 members during 1984, membership remains at 532, and application for membership is very encouraging.





BERNARD DURKAN, T.D. NOTES

The cifollowing are extracts from a report, received from the County Manager. Bernard Durkan has some reservations about the report which he has outlined to the County Manager.

A recent survey has been carried out in County Kildare and elsewhere throughout Ireland to determine the number of travelling families located in the county at a specified

The travellers have been sadly neglected to date in the overall housing policy of the Council. Most of the families do not yet want a house. They require serviced sites for the parking of their caravans. The Council has on a previous occasion decided that serviced halting places should be provided in those locations where families traditionally or frequently stop.

All sections of the community and organisations within the community have a moral responsibility to assist and co-operate with the local authority as a housing authority in tackling the problem of providing proper

facilities for the families of travellers permanently based in County Kildare.

I now therefore recommend once again that the policy of Kildare County Council should be to provide serviced halting places for the accommodation of travellers and their families in the following locations:

Athy, Newbridge, Monasterevin, Maynooth, Kildare.

Each serviced site should be in a town of reasonable size with access to schools and health services. The sites should only be developed in those towns where the present frequent on a regular and traditional basis. The sites should be fully serviced and should be capable of catering for 4-6 families.

The Council would not of course be allowing transients or traders into these fully serviced sites as they would be solely utilised to accommodate the families permanently residing in County Kildare.

For the transients and the traders it will be necessary to develop separate sites. These sites need not necessarily be in towns or villages but can be located on the National Routes through out County Kildare as follows:

- (a) N4 Dublin Leixlip Maynooth - Kilcock - Moyvalley
- (b) N7 Dublin Naas Newbridge - Kildare - Monasterevin.

Address by Proinnsias Breathnach, Chairman, Maynooth Community Council. Friday, March 15, 1985

the decision to re-establish Maynooth community Council last year presumbly reflected the fact that many eople felt that certain needs existed, and that a Community Council was he best means for tackling these eeds. However, I am sure that I a house-to-house survey was one in Maynooth, there would be wide variety of views about what he needs of the town are, and low they should be tackled.

by own view is that the Community council's functions are three-fold:

- nooth in dealings with outside bodies especially the County Council and state agencies and departments.
- To support, and act as a coordinating body for, the various voluntary organisations which are helping to make Maynooth a better place to live in: at last count there were more than 60 of these organisations.
- To identify areas not catered for by existing organisations where the Council could take initiatives of its own.

When the Community Council met for he first time in June of last year, it onsisted of 34 elected members, to which three co-opted members have ince been added. This constituted wide spectrum of people with differint political viewpoints, different backrounds, different views on what ieeded to be done and how to lo it, different personal capabilities ind levels of interest and enthusiasm. liven such a large and disparate group, it takes a lot of feeling one's vay before agreed objectives can je identified, and working structures an be created for effectively pursuing hese objectives. A lot of initial experimentation is required, as people ize each other up, and as furniture s moved around until most people ind a niche which matches their nterests and abilities.

n this context, it is worth reminding purselves that, unlike long-established ural and small-town communities, he majority of the population of

Maynooth is relatively new to the area and much of it is a transient population. This means that a lot of the Council members were strangers to one another, and that they varied greatly in terms of their familiarity with Maynooth, and in their perceptions of what kind of place it is, or should be.

There were, therefore, a lot of teething problems to be got over: however, although I would not for a second suggest that they have all

been a bit of modification of the initial sub-committee structure, in an attempt to arrive at the most effective arrangements for getting things done. At this point, it may be useful to outline briefly the kinds of work these sub-committees have been doing.

1. Communications:

The main project undertaken by this sub-committee is the setting-up of a Community Information Centre. This project has recently been given

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been overcome, I do believe that the Council is now beginning to get its act together. In order to involve as many members as possible in the work of the Council, and to avoid simply becoming a talking shop, it was decided at an early stage that the Council's work would best be carried out through the medium of a set of sub-committees, each of which was expected to identify appropriate projects which they could undertake. There has inevitably

the go-ahead by the National Social Service Board, the central co-ordinating body for Community Information Centres, and a 12-week training course for volunteers is to begin on March 26 next. We have got 36 volunteers so far for this course, but there is still room for anyone interested. Apart from running a drop-in centre where people can come at certain hours with inquiries, it is envisaged that the Community Infor-

mation Centre will organise public lectures and distribute information material on matters of public concern such as health, diet, drugs, social welfare and taxation. In addition, it is hoped to keep a central register of coming events, in order to avoid clashes between local groups, to compile a register of local businesses and services, to put together an information brochure on the area for tourists, and eventually establish a Town Museum.

The Communications Sub-Committee will also be taking over the Community Newsletter, which has been run for 10 years now by a small and very dedicated committee. It is hoped to expand the Newsletter and bring it out more frequently, and towards this end, an application has been made to the Youth Employment Agency for financial assistance towards employing some young people on this project.

2. Youth Affairs:

Talking about young people, the Youth Affairs Sub-Committee adopted as its first project the introduction of an ID scheme for young drinkers in the town. This involves providing young people aged 18 or over but who may not look the age with an ID card which can be presented in the town pubs. This will allow potential under-age drinkers to be effectively distinguished. The success of this scheme depends on the co-operation of those serving in the pubs, but so far, all the pubs have pledged their co-operation. The scheme comes into operation on April 1. and the first session for issuing ID cards takes place in the Post-Primary School on Monday, March 25, at 730pm.

Education:

The Education Sub-Committee has already been involved in providing after-school classes in gymnastics for young school-children in the area. They are now making plans, with help from the Eastern Health Board, for a series of lectures on the emotional development of young people, which should be of great benefit to both teenagers and parents at

a time when relationships between parents and children seem to be coming under growing stress within society in general.

This sub-committee has been

4. Residents' Associations

devoting its attention to co-ordinating profests concerning the poor communal TV service in Maynooth, and a leaflet on this is to be circulated shortly. This sub-committee is also taking responsibility for setting up a Tidy Towns Committee, and each Residents' Association is being asked to nominate volunteers to act on this committee. The sub-committee also hopes to help out with this year's summer project by encouraging each Residents' Association to organise a project in its own area.

5. Social and Recreational:

This is a newly-created sub-committee whose first task was to organise the St. Patrick's Day Parade and, despite very short notice, they have put in a tremendous amount of work, the fruits of which should

be seen on the day. This sub-committee will also be organising the National Milk Run in the Maynooth area on April 21, the proceeds of which will go to the Conquer Cancer Campaign. All offers to participate and take sponsorship cards will be gratefully received. This sub-committee, we hope, will also organise a series of events to coincide with the Community Games during the summer.

6. Planning and Development:

This sub-committee has spent a considerable amount of time drawing up a submission on behalf of the Maynooth area for the County Development Plan which is currently being revised. In addition, the sub-committee has compiled a long list of more immediate matters requiring attention around Maynooth and this has also been sent to the County Council to be attended to. The sub-committee has also made representations to CIE concerning the local train service, and to the Gardai seeking a better police service in the area.



7 Sports Complex:

The Community Council is pursuing the idea of a sports complex to be developed jointly with Maynooth College, on the grounds that a joint project is more likely to get state funding in these austere times, and also that a joint project will provide a better range of facilities than two separate projects. A joint committee involving the Council, the College, and the local schools has been meeting weekly over the last two months. An outline proposal for the complex, involving both outdoor facilities (including playing fields and a running track) and indoor facilities (including a swimming pool) has now been drawn up and will shortly be submitted to the appropriate funding authorities.

Finally, the Community Council is anxious to make the most of the recent scheme for youth employment – the TEAMWORK scheme – launched by the Department of Labour. Under this scheme, £ 10 per week is provided per person employed, and any kind.

All of the Councils sub-committees have been asked to propose appropriate projects, and letters will shortly be going out to local organisations seeking similar proposals. If 20 jobs can be created, a substantial management can be made available under the scheme. We would appeal to all individuals and groups with ideas for this scheme to please forward them to us.

Hopefully, this review of the workings of Maynooth Community Council will have given the impression that

progress will have been made towards achieving the Council's major stated objective of promoting "the wellbeing of the inhabitants of the Maynooth area".

TEAMWORK

TEAMWORK is a community managed scheme designed to help local organisations provide temporary community-based employment for their young people.

Bringing TEAMWORK to your locality is relatively simple as there is a minimum of red tape. Basically, funding will be given to a community group to provide young unemployed people with work on community projects; for example, running youth services, organising meals on wheels, sports coaching, providing playgroups. The list is endless (see the suggestions under *Types of Projects*). Most worthwhile projects will be considered. TEAMWORK aims to help the community to help young unemployed people. Equally, the community benefits by getting worthwhile services which would not be otherwise available. Young people get an opportunity to work for a realistic wage while making a genuine contribution to their own community.

Who can sponsor TEAMWORK?

Voluntary non-profitmaking organisations, which have primarily social or cultural objectives, for example a youth or community group, can act as a sponsor. But you must be able to show that you can manage the project.

What sort of projects will TEAMWORK aid?

All projects of benefit to the community will be considered, except for the following:

- projects for the purpose of private gain;
- projects which avoid normal labour and training costs;
- projects which would have been carried out without assistance from the Programme, or which substitute for funding from other State sources;
- projects which could cause displacement of existing jobs;
- projects which contain a substantial element of trading;
- projects of a construction nature as these are carried out under the Community Youth Training Programme which is run by AnCO.
- projects which are essentially training programmes.

How long will projects last?

The minimum duration of a project must be six months (26 weeks). However, a combination of tasks may be used to make up the minimum period. And, although a project may last more than a year, no individual participant may stay on the Programme for more than 52 weeks.

What are the responsibilities of a sponsor? Your responsibilities are similar to those of any employer. Naturally, you will plan the project, be responsible for insurance, training, supervision, health and safety.

Is this an equal opportunities programme? No programme can have a ratio of more than two to one of males to females or vice-versa. It is State policy that all schemes should reserve 3% of their places for disabled people. The National Rehabilitation Board can advise.

Is there much paperwork involved?

Paperwork is minimal. Sponsors will have to record, deduct and pay PAYE and PRSI payments. Weekly returns are made to the Department of Labour. A separate bank account will be opened for the project. This is the bulk of the paperwork involved. Details are given in the notes to the application form.

Who can take part?

Any young person between the ages of 17 and 25 who has been unemployed for more than six months can join TEAMWORK. All workers on a project must be registered with, and recruited from the National Manpower Service.

What grant is available to sponsors?

There is a grant of £70 a week available towards the employment costs of each young person. The sponsoring organisation is responsible for deducting PAYE, as well as employer's and employee's PRSI. Normal hours should be worked and statutory holidays should be allowed.

Who will supervise the projects?

Each group of five to ten people will be organised by a full-time Supervisor. Projects of 10 to 20 will have two Supervisors. For groups of less than five, supervision from within the organisation will be considered.

Who pays the Supervisors?

A grant of £105 a week is available towards the employment costs of a Supervisor.

Will other costs be covered?

Projects may claim approved running costs up to a maximum of 15% of the total labour grant. Other costs will have to be met by the sponsor. Evidence of availability of additional funds will be required.

How about very large projects?

An organisation which can provide simultaneous employment on an on-going basis for over 20 young people per year can become a Managing Agent. In this case, a grant of up to £850 per annum instead of the 15% mentioned above will be paid for each TEAMWORK place. It is envisaged that this grant will enable the employment of a full-time manager.

This is an unique opportunity for you to help your community and its young people. To succeed, TEAMWORK needs sponsors. If you think there is a worthwhile project in your area, fill in the accompanying application form.

Types of Projects

The scope of TEAMWORK is wide ranging. Here are some of the categories of activity which might be aided under the scheme. This list is not exhaustive and applications for projects not listed will be considered. Projects undertaken in any category must set out a clear programme of work including measurable objectives and timescale.

Youth Services

- youth projects and programmes;
- drop-in/information centres;
- holiday camps, summer projects, hostels;
- supplement management staff by providing administration back-up; carrying out research; compiling local directories, brochures, etc;
- Support voluntary workers.

Local Development Projects

 action oriented research into community needs and priorities in, for example, job creation, economic development and other self-help areas.

Social Services

- community information bureau;
- playgroups and creches;

day and unemployed centres;

meals on wheels:

Community Services

 helpers in day centres, homes, hospitals, drop-in centres and people's own homes;

Cultural, Drama and Artistic Activities

- performing plays, music etc.;
- exhibitions and events:
- art and cultural centres;

Sport Activities

- coaching young people;
- organise events;

Miscellaneous

- literacy and numeracy;
- aides and attendants at special schools: e.g. mentally handicapped;
- tourism advice centres.

Any combination of these together with other ideas could be considered; for example, a Community Services Centre combining a Community Information Service, a Drop-In-Centre, summer projects, creche etc. Such a centre could take the initiative by seeking to identify and meet local needs.

How do we apply?

- 1. Each project application must clearly outline the benefits to participants by including job specifications and work programmes.
- 2. Following receipt of an application, an initial onthe-spot examination of the work project proposals will be made by the Department of Labour. After approval, inspections will be carried out from time to time to check on progress.
- 3. The initial instalment of the grant will be paid subject to receipt of:
- written confirmation of starting date;
- confirmation from NMS that workers have been recruited through that service;
- confirmation of insurance cover;
- standard declaration of indemnity;
- sponsor's PAYE registration number;
- bank and bank account number.

Insurance

Neither the Youth Employment Agency nor the Department of Labour will be responsible for compensation arising out of any injury or accident involving any person, including the workers, during the course of the project. Sponsors must protect themselves against such an eventuality by taking out adequate insurance cover. Grant approval will be

conditional on the project organisers providing proof of such cover and, also, furnishing a statement indemnifying and holding harmless the Department of Labour and the Youth Employment Agency against all compensation claims, costs or expenses arising out of or connected with the operation of the project.

Accountability

All moneys paid by the Department in respect of a project must be lodged in a separate bank account.

All grant-aid paid by the Department in respect of each work project must ultimately be accounted for by the submission of a professionally certified audited statement.

Any unexpended portion of the grant must be refunded to the Department.

If, during the course of a work project, the Department is not satisfied that the conditions of the scheme are being met, a refund of the grant-aid will be requested.

If you have other questions, the Youth Affairs Section of the Department of Labour will be happy to deal with them.

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ditorial

ast month we commented on the punishment for crime, or rather the lack of it. Since then various views have been expressed in the daily papers, etc. for and against sterner punishment for crime. We feel, however, that we cannot subscribe to the scene of the pudgy little boy being told to Tell Mummy (or Daddy) you are sorry" and watch him running away with its nasty little smirk hidden behind his hand. We believe that a smack or wo on the butt tends to put a bit of sincerity into the "Sorry Mum" part. The short sharp shock helps us all to keep ourselves in line, or the fear of it.

t is not 'punishment to suit the crime' that we intended to write on this ssue but of the effect of crime on the victims. Apart from punishing the perpetrator, is it not time we spared serious thought for the victims? People eft entirely disoriented, in dire straits mentally and physically. Are these not the people who are <u>first</u> in need of our attention and sympathy? These are the people on whom we should first be spending the money – not on central heating and videos for criminals in the first instance.

When ordinary people have been mugged, robbed or burgled, especially the elderly, life can become completely disrupted. They often lose confidence in everything and everyone. Their self confidence can be completely shattered, they do not know which way to turn and have even been known to die of sheer terror. Are these not the people who really require our first thought?

We have been told of a new society or organisation being formed to look after the victims of crime and who are presently looking for people to be trained in how to comfort and care for crime victims, help to allay heir fears and, as far as possible, bring them back on the road to normal ife. As can be imagined, one would require some training to be able to to this – hence the necessity for the new organisation. What more rewarding work could one do?

Ean anyone in this area spare the time to take on such work? It is mostly a job for more mature people rather than the very young – although young beole can help doing the more physical jobs, fund raising etc. We say fund faising in so far as there is that in-between time for a victim where a small donation or short term loan is more or less essential. This would leave the more mature available for counselling, etc.

f any individuals, or perhaps even the Community Council, feel they could give time for this good work, they can get details from Gay Byrne, R.T.E., Donnybrook who would put them on the track of the organisation being tormed.

An organisation such as this in the area would fill a most important and growing need, and training now is essential to be ready when the need arises (Even as it is, a few elderly people, in particular, could avail of such service at the moment). Maynooth has never had a reputation for lack of Christian charity and it will certainly not, we feel sure, be lacking now.

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iocial Employment Scheme launched by Department of Labour

The Minister for Labour, Mr. Ruairi Juinn, T.D., has officially launched he Social Employment Scheme in innovative new programme to illeviate the problem of long-term inemployment. At a press conference n Dublin (Friday, 22nd Feb. 1985) he Minister revealed the full details if the Scheme for which the Exheguer will provide £29 million luring 1985.

The Scheme is targeted to achieve iart-time, paid employment for 10,000 ong-term unemployed persons in the surrent year. A sizeable number if projects have already been subnitted for consideration and it not anticipated that availability if suitable projects will be a limitition. In summary, the details of the cheme are as follows:

Long-term unemployed persons (those unemployed for a year or more and are currently in receipt of unemployment assistance) will be offered employment on approved projects on a part time basis.

Participants will be required to work an average 2 1/2 day week which can also take the form of alternate working weeks - for which they will be paid a weekly wage of £ 70. The scheduling of the work is discretionary subject to a minimum of 40 hours work in a 2 week period.

During the period in which participants are not working within the scheme, they may engage in other employment for reward.

In order to ensure the maximum benefit for the largest number of long-term unemployed persons, individual participation on the scheme is limited to one year.

In general, qualifying projects must be seen as contributing to the welfare of the community but, in any event, cannot be geared to private profit and cannot displace existing jobs.

The scheme, therefore, has particular significance for local authorities, voluntary groups, community associations and, indeed, individuals who advance acceptable schemes to improve local amenities, provide youth services, restore historic monuments or provide badly needed social services to deprived sectors of the community.

SAMPLE PROJECT AREAS

Secretarial Help for Residents' Associations: Residents' Associations can apply for Secretarial Help in the form of part-time administrators paid for under the Scheme.

Support Staff in Schools: Schools without a provision or the resources to employ support staff i.e. ground staff, general maintenance people, may use the scheme to enhance services to pupils.

Artistic Endeavours: It is hoped to utilise artistic skills for the benefit of the community. Among the schemes proposed in this context is the employment by Local Authorities of town artists, the provision of public entertainment i.e. street theatre, hospital concerts, etc.

Community Care Projects: Unemployed people can gain a personal benefit and provide a community benefit through the application of their skills to community care projects. These might include renovation of the residences of the old and the infirm, services to the disabled and child minding.

Sports and Youth Projects: Sporting organisations are invited to examine the potential of the scheme for the provision of coaching and other support services. Projects of this nature have already been proposed and are under consideration.

Environmental Projects: A number of such projects put forward by Wexford County Council are indicative of the type of environmental project being proposed by Local Authorities. They include:

The development of a new town nark in Wexford Town.

The creation of an amenity area and access to the beach for residents of a new estate in Rosslare.

The further development of the Ferrycarrig Heritage Centre as a tourist amenity.

Preservation and improvement of local beaches which are an important economic resource in the County.

- 2. Erect "CHILDREN AT PLAY/GO SLOW" signs at entrances to all roads in the estate.
- 3. Tarmac road at end of Greenfield Drive (opposite no.60) and rebuild wall there.
- 4. Erect bollards at end of road beside No. 19, Greenfield Drive.
- 5. Replace faulty street light. 6. Replace missing water mains covers on footpaths.
- Repair road at entrance to Laurence Avenue from Celbridge Rd.

(2) Old Greenfields

- 1. Repair road through Old Greenfields from Straffan Rd. to Newtown. 2. Provide street light at corner
- of old Greenfields and McKenna's lane. 3. Extra street lights on the old
- lane in Greenfield. 4. Repair existing street lights
- throughout area.
- 5. Trim hedges in area.

- 6. Better cleaning service needed.
- Repair footpaths throughout area.

(3) Celbridge Road

Recommend prominent advance warning signs for motorists (including request to keep to own side when passing over crown of bridge). Also better lighting, and possibly pedestrian lights, on bridge. 10. 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- 3. In the interests of safety, road markings creating a right-turn lane for traffic entering the Arts Block from the Maynooth direction should be installed.

£800 towards kerbing at the Square, Kilcock.

£500 towards piping of ditch at Rail Park, Maynooth.

£1800 to be divided among the following jobs:

- a) footpath at Rail Park, £400 b) public lighting at Straffan Rd.
- c) footpath renewal at Parsons St.
- d) landscaping, Kilcock Rd. £300
 The above jobs, with the exception of No. 3, 5 a) and 5 b) have been completed and in the case of 5 b) an order has been issued to the E.S.B. for implementation. The outstanding work will be attended to hopefully within the next 4 or 5 weeks.

On the question of public lighting for the Main Street/Harbour area, I have checked the records and find that 2 No. lights have been recommended since 1982".

Local Elections

Members of Maynooth Labour Branch have expressed satisfaction that their nominee for the Local Elections in the Maynooth/Leixlip/Celbridge area was unanimously selected to be the Party's candidate for the Co. Council elections on June 20th, and that he is now ratified by the A.C. The Branch members are confident that Emmet Stagg, on the basis of his work for the public in Maynooth, will get a greatly increased vote on this occasion.

The Nth. Kildare Selection Conference also selected David Moynan, Convent Road, as Director of Elections for the two electoral areas in North Kildare. With his unlimited zeal and undoubted organisational ability our campaign is bound to be successful.

Traders Invited In

The Branch have learned with dismay that a motion tabled and pursued by Cllr. Bernard Durkan at a recent Co. Council meeting will have the effect of issuing an unlimited invitation to Street Traders from outside the area

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ALL TYPES OF GRAVE MEMORIALS UNDERTAKEN

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(including Dublin) to invade and set up for business in Maynooth. The motion runs as follows:-

"That this Council would consider designating specific street trading areas in the various towns throughout the county where there is such a requirement".

The motion was moved by Cllr. Durkan who said that it was timely for the Council to designate specific street trading areas in order to regularise matters in this area. A report from the Council's planning section advised that the County Development Plan should set out the Council's general policies in regard to casual trading, and it recommended that the plan should contain a statement to the effect that the Council would use its

powers under Section 7 of the Casual Trading Act to designate areas in Athy, Kildare, Droichead Nua and Maynooth. The report indicated that at the conclusion of the development plan review, specific sites in these towns could be designated.

Cllrs. Stagg and Brady expressed concern about the obstruction by casual traders of footpaths in Maynooth, Cllr. Stagg also pointed out that casual traders would be attracted into Maynooth, an area in which he felt there was no requirement for street trading. He also referred to the fact that Maynooth was not a traditional area for street traders.

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or any member of the Committee

Cllr. Brady proposed an amendment to the effect that designation be confined to traditional trading areas. His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Stagg. The amendment (which in effect would have excluded Maynooth from being designated) was strenuously opposed by Cllr. Durkan.

The County Manager indicated that it was not clear, in the absence of amending legislation, that overflow of casual trading outside designated areas could be controlled. An earlier High Court decision had established law in this matter in favour of the casual traders.

Cllr. Brady's amendment was put to the meeting and defeated on a show of hands. Cllr. Durkan's motion as originally tabled was put to the meeting and carried on a show of hands.

Maynooth Labour Branch have now sent a circular to all business people in Maynooth advising them of the very serious consequences for the commercial life of Maynooth which will have a detrimental effect on the livelihoods of proprietors and on the employment content generated by the services they provide.

The point was also made of the Environmental consequences as evidenced by the litter strewn streets of Athy and Kildare.

The Branch has formally lodged an objection to any inclusion in the County Kildare Development Plan to have Maynooth named as a town where a "Designated Trading Area" will be established.



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Taking in Charge of Cluain Aoibhinn and College Green

At a meeting of the Clane Area Committee of Kildare Co. Council held on 15th March, it was decided on the proposal of Cllr. A. Groome, seconded by Cllr. E. Stagg, that the estates of Cluain Aoibhinn and College Green should be taken in charge by the Council.

Piping of Ditch, College Green
The acting County Engineer informed the above meeting that advice from the Council's solicitors had confirmed that no liability attached to the Council regarding the open drain at College Green. He went on to say that the Bond deposited by the developer of Cluain Aoibhinn would be checked to ascertain if there were sufficient funds remaining to complete outstanding works in Cluain Aoibhinn and to pipe the ditch at College Green.

Disregard to Trees

Cllr. E. Stagg has made representations to Kildare Co. Council concerning the damage being caused by the erection of a signpost for "Manor Court" on the tree at Flood's house. The sign is fastened to the tree by "four bolts". The continual damage being caused by building contractors to the trees on the Main Street must stop. They should be fined a considerable sum of money for this total disregard of public property.

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


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COMMUNITY GAMES

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
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COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTIONS - JUNE 20TH

LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Labour Annual Conference

Eleven delegates from Maynooth and Maynooth College Branches attended the Party's Annual Conference which was held in Cork on 3rd, 4th and 5th May, At the Conference Cllr. Emmet Stagg was elected to the Party's Administrative Council (National Executive). Having headed the poll on the first count he was elected with a 20% surplus.

A resolution from the Branch, which was first put forward by Mrs. Bridie O'Brien and which dealt the injustices of the Eileen Flynn case was ably moved at the conference by Michael Quinn. The resolution was accepted by Conference and was supported by Minister for Labour Ruairi Quinn T.D., who promised amending legislation to prevent such cases arising again.

Bond Bridge Petition

To counteract resistance and delaying tactics by certain elected representatives in the area to proposed improvements to Bond Bridge, which have been accepted by the Co. Engineer as the best interim solution, Maynooth Labour Branch have organised a petition of those most directly involved in using this very dangerous bridge. The petition reads as follows:

Petition to Kildare County Council Requesting Improvements Bond Bridge Maynooth

We the undersigned residents of Cluain Aoibhinn, College Green and Newtown Maynooth hereby demand that Kildare County Council now act on the Motion tabled by Cllr. Emmet Stagg, which was passed by the Council and accepted by the County Engineer as the best interim solution for the improvement of Bond Bridge. The motion reads as follows:

"That traffic lights be put on Bond Bridge Maynooth to regulate the traffic to move in one direction only at a time and that a raised footpath be erected for the length of the bridge and the area approaching it to make it safe for pedestrians"

We wish to again bring to your attention the absolutely deplorable condition of the road surface at this bridge and the constant danger of a fatal accident to pedestrians, particularly school children and senior citizens.

You will be aware of the use of this route by heavy grain and cattle

We believe that the improvements outlined can be implemented quickly and can be financed from development levies paid and payable in this part of Maynooth.

Our members have now reported with the Co. Council.

Other Works 1985

Kildare County Council have decided to continue the Other Works Scheme in 1985 whereby each Cllr. has discretion over the allocation of £5000 for projects of his choice. Cllr. Emmet Stagg has informed the Branch that he has decided to provide for the following projects from his allocation:

- 1. Provision of a public light outside 286/28 7 Greenfields Lane (£200) 2. Provision of a light outside McDonaghs in Doctors Lane (£200) 3. Relocation of lights at Laraghbryan to area near graveyard entrance (£150)
- 4. Landscaping, topsoiling, seeding and curbing of area in front of O'Neill Pk. on Dublin Road (£1000) 5. Repairs to footpath at entrance to Railpark (£250)

The finance has now been provided for these projects and the Area Engineer is urged to have them completed as soon as possible.

A number of projects which were financed in 1984 from Cllr. Stagg's allocation have not yet been completed. These include:

that in excess of 90% of all residents in Cluain Aoibhinn, College Green and Newtown have signed the petition. It is now being lodged 1. Traffic Island at entrance to Celbridge Road to make crossing safe for pedestrians.

2. Resurfacing and drainage of The Crescent, Straffan Road.

We demand that the Council carry out these works without further delay.

Update on Casual Traders

Our circular which went out to business people in Maynooth, concerning the designation of a trading area in specific casual Maynooth, has met with a good response. A circular was also issued by Mr. B. Durkan to businesses which attempted to deny the serious situation that has now arisen. We have replied to the business people and have corrected allegations

Allegation "To Misconstruct Mr. Durkan's Motion"

No attempt was made to 'misconstruct' Cllr. Durkan's motion: in we issued the full text of the motion as submitted by him. did not circularise an 'excerpt the Council minutes' as stated Mr. Durkan; we circularised complete minute (Ref. 28/385) this has now been accepted as a true record of the proceedings of that meeting by all councillors including Cllr. Durkan. If the minutes are 'incorrect and are not a true record' as he alleges the question

must be posed; Why did Cllr. Durkan not attempt to have them corrected?

"No Mention of Maynooth"

This Official Council Minute clearly shows that Maynooth was not merely 'mentioned' but that it was positively proposed that Maynooth and other towns would have designated areas .for Casual Street Trading. It clearly is the opinion of the Council Planning Staff that there is 'such a requirement' in Maynooth and Cllr. Durkan with his colleagues, by refusing to accept the Brady/Stagg amendment confirmed that opinion as Co. Council Policy.



Water Quality

Following many complaints about brown deposits in the water supply in the area and an unpleasant taste Cllr. Stagg has raised the matter with the Council and has been informed as follows:

"The North Kildare water supply is provided from the Dublin County Council treatment works at Leixlip. Because of the demand this plant is operating beyond its design capacity. This causes an element of the filter bed to be carried through into the supply and causes the brown deposit complained of. Required chlorination of the water supply so produced causes the 'bad taste' complained of. While both the deposits and taste are unpleasant neither are harmful to users.

Work is now under way to double the filtering capacity of the treatment works at Leixlip. This work will be completed in 1985 and will eliminate the causes of the complaints."

Sign Removed

Following strong protest by the Branch a sign advertising 'Manor Court Flats' which was bolted to a tree on Main St. has now been removed.

This type of illegal and damaging behaviour of commercial interests is to be deplored and the Co. Council are urged to take legal proceedings for damages against any future offenders.

Greenfield Lights

The following reply has been received to representations made by Cllr. Stagg:

I have received a report from the ESB that repairs were carried out in this area during January and February 1985. There were two outstanding lights to be connected opposite site 4 and house no. 1202 at that time, but these were connected on 16th April 1985.


Itinerant Settlement Sites

The Council have agreed to raise a loan of £500,000 for land acquisition for Local Authority Housing and for settlement accommodation for travelling families.

(6 workers plus supervisor) Duties

To find out community views on improvements needed in local environment and services, plus additional services needed (with a view to providing the latter via a communitybased enterprise); skills available in locality (especially among the unemployed); services available locally; future employment and school accommodation needs; etc.

4. Town Museum Project

(2 - 4 workers)

Duties

To compile and create information displays relating to local history, etc. To create scale models of the Castle (as it looked when originally built) and Carton House. To assemble available artifacts, implements, etc. relating to history of the area. To compile a tourist guide to the area.

5. Directory of Maynooth

(1 - 2 workers)

Duties

To compile and publish a directory \(\shcap \) of all local businesses and services, voluntary organisations, public events,

6. Creche

(1 worker)

Duties Provide secretarial/administrative services to the Centre.

The above proposals provide for about 25 jobs for young people plus 3 supervisors. This would justify payment of a management grant which would allow the employment of an administrator whose functions would include supervising those for whom a special supervisor is not otherwise provided, looking after the paperwork relating to wages, PRSI, etc., managing the Community Office which would be required for the scheme, identify further projects, provide for training facilities where required, etc.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

A Chara,

We refer to a recent circular letter from the local Labour Party, which sought to misconstruct a motion, tabled by Bernard J. Durkan, T.D. and passed by Kildare County Council.

The Molion

"That this Council would consider designating specific street trading areas throughout the County in the various towns where there is such a requirement".

The reason for the motion:

To allow the County Council to exercise some control and authority over the street trading now taking place in a number of towns throughout County Kildare. While some

towns have been traditional market areas, Newbridge in particular is now having serious problems, with street trading spreading in a disorganised fashion and in such a way as to impede access to business premises and cause traffic chaos. This obviously cannot be allowed to continue there or elsewhere and while street traders, vegetable stalls, fish and chip vans etc. do give a service, they should nonetheless be controlled by the Planning Authority, otherwise the situation will get out of hand. The Planning Act as well as the Casual Trading Act must be invoked.

The Council staff in a reply to the motion did mention Maynooth as one of the towns where street trading areas might be designated

but this is not relevant, since the motion clearly states "in towns throughout the County, where there is a requirement". Thus there is no way that the motion can have a detrimental effect on Maynooth. It will not encourage any traders into the area, it will however allow the County Council have some control over street traders who set up in opposition to business

From the text of a recent circular it would appear that the author or authors have not Casual Trading Act nor seem to understand the for its introduction. The Act is there not to create casual trading areas but to control them.

Therefore, the recent circular is nothing more than a cheap political gimmick to advance the cause of its authors in the run-up to I the local elections.

Finally, the business people as well as the entire community in Maynooth need not fear that Bernard J. Durkan will ever do other than represent their very best interests.

Street Trading

The motion: "That this Council would consider designating specific street trading areas throughout the County in the various towns where there is such a requirement".

for those who want cheap tricks to get votes for the election it is important to the reasons for the above motion, as submitted by Bernard Durkan, T.D.

It is to allow the Co. Council to exercise some control and authority over the street trading now taking place in a number of towns in Kildare. Some towns have traditional market areas, and Newbridge in particular is now having serious problems with street trading spreading in a disorganised fashion and in such a way as to impede access to various business premises and to cause traffic chaos. This cannot be allowed to continue there, in Maynooth or elsewhere, and while street traders, vegetable stalls and fish and chip vans may give a service, they should also be controlled by the Planning Authority. It is important for everybody that the Casual Trading Act and the Planning Act are invoked.

Bernard Durkan's motion asked that this be done where there is such a requirement. He did not invite in any traders as suggested by Cllr. Stagg, nor does the motion employ any such statement.

We are glad to notice that they (the Labour Party) are concerned about posters and such like having a detrimental effect on our environment. It is just a short time since they were engaged in sticking posters of a libellous nature on

church walls, bus shelters, trees and other places of note, and another party would probably have been blamed for the offence were it not for the fact that the culorits were apprehended at 4,00 in the morning

These are just two points which we wish to cover, but with a local election coming up it is the opinion of the branch that to write long letters on issues of this matter is to abuse the spirit of the Newsletter. The Newsletter is non-political and it is our fervent wish that it will continue in the future to serve the people of Maynooth to the same high standard.

it a meeting of the Carton Committee eld in Maynooth College on Monday lay 27 under the chairmanship f Dr. Patrick Duffy, the members resent decided that we had entered critical stage in the fight to reserve this unique estate. The ommittee had succeeded in two f its primary objectives, to prevent ezoning of Carton for residential urposes, and to discourage potential uyers who might wish to exploit arton commercially, and this had nsured that the purchase price f the estate was now hovering t the level obtaining for agricultural There was also evidence hat the owners, Powerscreen Ltd., vere anxious to sell and this presened the government with a unique pportunity to acquire the estate or the nation.

population explosion projected or the Eastern Region in the recent RDO report made the need for uture amenity space extremely rgent and Carton was ideally ituated to suit this function. The committee saw the estate with ts lake, outbuildings and forests is ideally suited for family recreatonal pursuits on the lines of those provided at Lough Key Forest Park, while the house could be utilised by the National Museum to display urniture and other bulky items it present in storage. Whatever he exact nature of the development, he important thing was to preserve he integrity of the entire estate.

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as it was the survival of buildings such as the stables, the boat houses and the Shell Cottage that made the place unique.

Three decisions were reached:

1. To send a press release to the newspapers emphasising the need for the government to purchase Carton now as the opportunity to acquire it at a moderate price may never arise again and delay may lead to deterioration in the condition of the house and outbuildings;

2. To emphasise the folk park potential of Carton so that any expenditure of public monies on its purchase will be seen to benefit the people as a whole;
3. To visit Carton.

In keeping with the last item, a visit was arranged for Thursday June 13, and this passed off successfully. The house was obviously being maintained by Powerscreen, the lawns were being mowed and the ornamental pool was in the process of being cleaned. On the way to the house, the writer saw a cock and hen pheasant feeding driveway, a swan sailing on the artificial lake and a heron flying to the heronry on one of reminder the islands, all these of another aspect of the estate. its importance as a refuge for wildlife. Many visitors were impressed by the rolling green parkland to the rear of the main building and another was surprised to learn that the entire estate, including the boundary wall, was still intact.

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At a time when so much of our heritage is being destroyed by indiscriminate development the chance to preserve this beautiful estate for our children and their children's children must not be lost through indifference or inaction.

The argument that in a time of economic hardship public money should not be squandered on acquiring an estate is as shortsighted as it is spurious; money spent to enhance the quality of life of our people and to preserve their cultural heritage is not squandered. The ancestral home of the Fitzgeralds of Kildare, the family that gave us GARRET MOR, Silken Thomas and Lord Edward, must become the Versailles of Ireland. We call on the government to act NOW.

Editorial

The ordinary motorist, unfortunately, falls in for a lot of 'flak' from time to time but we make no apology for firing our 'guns' today. While, by far, the greater number of motorists are considerate from a larger to a lesser extent, there is a percentage who have little or no consideration for others. These are our target.

What mainly is in our minds at present is the use of the public footpath for parking. The footpaths are for pedestrians and it is they who have the main right on them. Cars have no rights at all! On the other hand, our footpaths are fine and wide and it is not unreasonable to overlook some parking on them. It is at this point that the inconsiderate, boorish (or whatever you like to call him) driver takes over and spoils everything.

It does not seem in any way wrong that house owners on the Main Street should be allowed to park on the footpaths, as near the kerb as practicable, leaving the roadside parking available for others. This is, of course, assuming they will drive slowly and carefully and not cause any hazard or obstruction to others and, in fairness to these people we say they are mostly careful and considerate. With roadside parking then available there is no reason for others to drive on the paths.

The present situation is that some drive on the paths needlessly, speed along at the very doorsteps, park their cars anywhere, in the middle of the pathway, up tight to doorways and sometimes two and three abreast across the path. We have seen cattle trailers (stinking to the high Heavens) parked right across people's doorways, not to mention vans, lorries and even tractors at times. This is intolerable! It is grossly unfair to those living on the Main Street. Some, particularly the elderly, are almost in terror leaving their houses while parents of young children live in dread. Might we say at this point that parking on the footpaths at night is equally dangerous and those visiting the pubs have ample time to spare and can easily find suitable parking not on the footpath. Indeed some of these people should not be driving cars at all in the condition they leave the pubs.

Let us appeal to people to be reasonable - if they must drive on the pathways to drive as slowly as is possible - to park at the edge of the footpath, in single file and to give the pedestrians every courtesy.

There is a cure for such parking which can be used as a last resort, that is to have parking on the pathways completely banned. This will present a lot more problems for the motorist.

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BERNARD DURKAN, T.D. - NOTES

The following replies were received by Bernard Durkan to eighteen motions submitted by him to Kildare Co. Council:

- 1. From the County Engineer on 15th July last: "That work has already started on the rear access to the houses at Old Greenfield and that it is hoped to have it completed shortly."
- 2. From Co. Engineer, 12th July: "That, while desirable to have a footpath at The Crescent, Straffan Road, money is not available in the current year to carry out the work. It will be in mind for next year."
- 3. From Co. Engineer, 15th July: "That preparatory work should be completed this month (July) on dressing the surface of the road at Greenfield (from Newtown to Straffan Road) but surfacing may be deferred due to the bad weather. Hopefully it should be completed in August."
- 4. To a motion that the Council should proceed to the completion of development at Cluain Aoibhinn, the Co. Engineer stated that develop-

- ment of this estate was not completed due to developers going into liquidation. Messrs. Naughton and Glennon, developers of the adjoining estate (College Green) carried out some resurfacing of the road and relaying of foul sewers, as part of their planning requirement. A list of principal defects in the development has been compiled and some could be financed from the £3,600 lodged as bond in 19 3.
- 5. Reply from Co. Engineer, 9th July: That although parts of Kingsbry Estate are completed, the developers have not completed their portion of the development nor have they made any request to have any portion of the Estate taken over. If a request is received and the work completed, it is possible that the Estate, or portion thereof, could be taken over.
- 6. The County Secretary, on 15th July, replied that a traffic management plan is being prepared for the Square. Plans have been submitted to the Gardai for approval.
- 7 The Co. Engineer replied on 15th July, "That a survey was carried out on trees at Main Street, etc. and 36 trees need attention."

The cost, by a qualified tree surgeon, would be £4-5,000. The report recommended the removal of seven trees and replanting with similar trees at an additional cost of £2,000.

- 8. On 15th July, the Co. Engineer stated "That flooding at Dunboyne Road is being investigated. Trial holes were dug to determine the level and location of a surface water culvert. It is hoped that joining up to this culvert will produce satisfactory results in the next two or three weeks."
- 9. The Co Engineer on 15th July stated "That bollards will be erected between Carton Court and Greenfield in order to deter the use of this area as a short cut for motorists."
- 10. The Co. Engineer, on 15th July stated "That the provision of lights on Straffan Road as provided in the 1984 Estimates will be proceeded with although the sum designated, £300, may not be sufficient to provide more than one light. This will be provided at the Black Spot shown on the map (point B)."
- 11. The Co. Engineer on 12th July stated "That the Road Design

Section did not consider that a controlled crossing was needed on the Celbridge Road between Rail Park and St. Laurence's Road!

12. The Co. Engineer on 15th July stated: "That £10,000 has been allocated for the repairs to the defective sewer that overflows at Greenfield Drive, Maynooth Park, Straffan Way and Laurence Aye. Work to commence later this year.

- 13. With regard to the freezing of water mains at Greenfield Estate, the Co. Manager stated that the pipes would have to re-layed at a cost of £25,000.
- 14. The Co. Engineer on 21st May stated "That the only portion of Greenfield Development outstanding are the two turning areas at an estimated cost of £ 750 in 1983. He is prepared to do this work but for the problem, as previously, of the money being held by the Residents' Association."
- 15. The Co. Engineer on 30th July stated that "The Council could not do repairs on the Barrogstown-Kilmacraddock Road due to the financial situation. Due to the increased traffic on it the sides are seriously undermined and patching would not suffice. Limited repairs will however be carried out."
- 16. The Co. Engineer on 1st August stated that "landscaping and footpath improvements on the Kilcock Road will continue after the holidays. There are no plans to do landscaping, other than levelling out of road grant monies."
- 17 The Co. Engineer on 29th July stated that "The extension to Laraghbryan Cemetery has been fenced and maintained in the form of grass cutting, weeding etc., which commenced on 24th July and it is hoped to repeat the work in the next few weeks."
- 18. To a motion about landscaping work on the approaches to Laraghbryan Cemetery, the Co. Engineer on 1st August gave a similar answer to No. 16 above.



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CLLR. G. BRADY NOTES

following representations made to C.I.E., Cllr. Brady has received the following reply:

C.I.E. would be willing to extend services on Route 66 to the estates mentioned if a suitable turning facility were available. However, the locations you suggest, examined by our engineers, would not be suitable as they stand.

The junctions of Straffan Road and Kingsbry and Carton Estates are too small to permit us to turn a bus without entering the estates in a reverse movement. Since it is our intention to implement OPO on the buses involved, reverse movements would be unacceptable in such areas on safety grounds. Regarding the shopping centre car park, which is understood to be private property, it is doubtfu that there would be sufficient free space to enable a bus to turn with safety.

It is doubtful that a turning point on the junction of Straffan Road and Celbridge Road would be acceptable on safety grounds, and there safe point for the bus to await its passengers on the route back to the village.

However, the substantial number of houses in the area would seem to justify an extension of the bus service: there are a number of areas along the Straffan Road, fronting on to Kingsbry, Carton and Greenfields where the Kildare Co. Council could possibly construct a suitable turning facility, and if this were provided, we would then provide the necessary bus service.

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MAYNOOTH CUMANN FIANNA FAIL

STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

A small number of students staying in Maynooth cause problems from time to time through noisy parties, vandalism, etc. Most students obtain their accommodation through the College Residence Officer and are bound by a strict set of rules. Residents or Residents! Associations experiencing any problems from students should report these to the Residence Officer for investigation. However, action can only be taken where there is a positive identification of the individuals involved or at least the houses in which they are staying.

The Residence Officer has suggested to us that a lot can be gained from attempts to cultivate good relations between student houses and their neighbours. It is suggested that residents who have student houses beside them should call on the students after they have settled in after a week or so and

introduce themselves, expressing the hope that they will all be good neighbours. They might offer their help to the students if they are experiencing any difficulties e.g. unwanted visitors, burst pipes, failed heating systems, etc. They might also suggest to the students that they would appreciate being informed in advance, as a matter of courtesy, of any forthcoming parties. A friendly, rather than aggressive, approach, it is suggested, can produce good results.

Another problem with many student houses is that they are left untended during the summer, leading to unsightly overgrown gardens, etc. Some Residents' Associations have an arrangement whereby absentee landlords make an annual payment to the Association which, in turn, keeps the grass cut. In the case of student houses, the College Residence Officer is willing to contact landlords on behalf of Residents' Associations or individual residents who wish to come to such arrangements or otherwise make representations about the maintenance of the houses in question.

SHOP FRONTS COMPETITION

The judges inspected every commercial establishment in the village, Maynooth Shopping Centre and Greenfields Shopping Centre. On the basis of criteria such as: general maintenance, originality/character, harmony with the surroundings. presentation of window display, and the level of effort put into improvements the following awards were made.

1st Prize - Cassidy's Roost

The refurbished exterior of this fine building adds considerably to the character not just of the street, but of the entire area in the vicinity of the crossroads. There was much evidence of a considerable

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amount of care for the appearance of the building and the imaginative use of plants and flowers was appreciated.

The judges differed regarding the addition of new seating outside. Though welcome in principle, there was some divergence as to whether the best colour scheme had been chosen to blend with the remainder of the facade.

2nd Prize - Coupes

This restaurant was particularly appealing, with its simple yet tasteful lines. It was reminiscent of a continental pavement cafe and is a pleasant feature of the Mall.

3rd Prize - Hula Bou (North side of Main St.)

This is a very elegant shop which has retained well the old facade. The paintwork is particularly fine and the colour chosen (purple) is very effective in adding to the tastefully designed exterior. The window display is also excellent.

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MAYNOOTH

TIDY ESTATES COMPETITION

The judges inspected all the housing estates on the afternoon of Tuesday 2nd July. They paid particular attention to open grass area/play areas, the general level of maintenance apparent in the estates, the front garden displays, the state of verges, kerbsides, walls, fences, shrubbery and the appearance of the houses themselves. On this basis the following awards were made.

1st Prize - Greenfield Estate

This is a large, mature estate which is particularly well maintained. The care devoted to its open spaces distinguished it from all the others and was by far its best attribute. Generally the gardens were well kept and tidy and the houses maintained in good condition. Inevitably, in such a large estate there were eyesores, but allowances were made because of the scale of the development. The most unfortunate

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aspect in this estate was the variable choices of walls, fences and hedges when more harmony might have been achieved had some greater uniformity been decided on with cooperation by the residents. Overall though this was a most pleasant estate, tidy and markedly litter free.

2nd Prize - College Green

A new estate, but clearly one of the best managed in the town, College Green is characterised by its simple yet very attractive gardens. It is extremely clean and well designed, particularly helped by the fairly uniform fencing arrangement. At the extremities of the estate a less high standard was apparent in parts.

Building Repairs

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3rd Prize - Rail Park

A pleasant bungalow development, generally well kept. Some unkempt gardens and verges, and grass growing in the gutters in places detracted from the appeal of this estate as a place to live.

Commendations

Greenfield Phase 1; Leinster Park.

COMMENTS ON OTHER ESTATES Greenfields

Neat, well maintained houses with some particularly fine gardens. The loss of the grass verge and the lack of care given to the green area at the entrance detracted a bit from the visual impression of this area.

Carton Court

A disappointment overall. Some houses and gardens were very pleasing, and indicated what the potential of the estate is and was intended to be in the original development. But poor impressions were created by numerous overgrown gardens, indifferently kept houses and badly maintained open spaces.

O'Neill Park

A pleasant place with particularly attractive gardens. The houses were in very good repair generally. A lack of maintenance of the communal parking area detracted a little from the area. Some more imaginative use of the residual grassed area in the centre of the square could have been achieved.

Greenfield Phase 3

A self enclosed community with a large grassed open space crossed by a potentially attractive path. Some houses obviously suffered from disrepair and neglect was also apparent for many, though not all, gardens. A proliferation of dogs was apparent.

Greenfield Phase 4

Despite its relative modernity this was probably the worst estate visited. No attention to open spaces/common areas was apparent and litter and rubble existed in the street.

The Crescent (Greenfield)

Potentially a very attractive setting and a well laid out development. Some houses attractively painted.





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Tidy Estates Contd.

The open space is however badly kept and stands in stark contrast to that immediately on the other side of the road.

Doctor's Lane

A small cluster of pleasantly situated houses. Gardens, the roadside verges, and the small grassed area at the entrance could have been better.

Leinster Park

Well planned substantial bungalow development. Gardens and houses well kept. Two small areas of open space leading on to the canal exist. One of these could have been better maintained.

Leinster Cottages

A variable mix. Some excellently kept houses and some not so good.

Cluain Aoibhinn

An attractively laid out estate. The facade and woodwork of several houses had obviously been allowed to deteriorate, together with the gardens.

The Girls U/13, U/15, U/16 all reached the finals of the $4 \times 100 \text{m}$ events, and also deserve congratulations for so doing.



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Editorial

Mike Murphy had a story on the radio last week, about the two statues that stopped to watch a County Council Worker - but he didn't move! A joke, yes, but a day or so later we began to wonder if, in fact, the joke wasn't a fact. Our water was cut off, due to the incompetence of some official or another, for several days - not just one, but several officials were at fault for the outrage. Outrage it was to cut off the water from several towns, leaving 20,000 to 25,000 without water to drink, wash, or whatever. A supposed tanker service was substituted for the water supply but, again, no indication was given to victims as to when or where this service might be available.

It was a custom, for years back, to insert notices in the Leinster Leader, of impending cuts off and notices were also displayed in shop windows. This appears to have been discontinued (We don't know why). A notice to be read in the churches on Sunday would have made sense but a notice over the radio on Sunday afternoon was a waste of money, even if it was the easy thing to do and needed little or no effort. A little forethought would not have taxed the intelligence of the County Officials.

Another little matter springs to mind - Who was responsible for the standby equipment? Why was it not in good working order? When was it last inspected and who was responsible for having it in order? Was the responsible person standing still like the rest? Is that person still doing the same job? If so, why?

Jokes like Mike Murphy's do not arise from nothing. They would not be jokes at all unless there was truth behind them. They would fall flat without the grains of truth. It is obvious to anyone (except apparently County Officials and, to some extent Councillors) that there is a great deal of truth in the 'Jokes'. Council workers (office and manual) are notoriously slow and even the perennial 'Our workers do a great job' cannot cover up the fact that, all over the country, in every County, Council workers are notoriously slow.

It is time that there was a serious shake up of workers. It is time also that Councillors, who represent the electors, thrashed out, in the open, for the information of the public, who is responsible for the incompetence and inconsideration, particularly this latest affair. It is no use saying that 'it is no use crying over spilt milk'. The milk may be spilled but there is mopping up to be done, so let us see it done well publicly. Let it appear, if the statues stop to see us (the Electors) that they will know that we move.



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

PORTS COMPLEX & BLACKLION SITE

he following extract from the inutes of the July meeting of the Community Council refers to use subjects:

Chairman reported that ie College Trustees will not be land available for the pro-Sports Complex, as they tend to use it for college buildings. the College authorities supportive of the general was indicated that the ustees might be prepared to provide indoor sports facilities. Gym/Sports Centre, which use only a fraction of the ind originally requested. The Exec-Committee suggest that the Council be approached provide land at the Blacklion te for the proposed sports complex. his should not interfere with the roposed halting site for travellers idigenous to the area, as the alting site would only require

a small portion of the land. If necessary the indoor facilities could be on college land and the outdoor facilities at Blacklion.

The following points were raised and discussed:

- that the separation of indoor and outdoor facilities is not feasible;
- that children going to Blacklion could be in danger from the traffic on the main road.
- It was pointed out that, at this stage, all these are very tentative plans. the Executive Committee have contacted the three County Councillors for the area, with a view to arranging a meeting with the County Council to discuss the future use of the Blacklion site and are awaiting replies. Since the County Council is already committed to receiving a deputation from Maynooth Community Council to discuss the itinerant situation, it is proposed that the discussion

be broadened to include the role of the County Council in providing recreational facilities for the town.

Re the siting of the halting site, and Council housing at Blacklion, it was affirmed that the County Council proposals are definite and it was also pointed out that the proposed housing estate is against the County Council's own County Development Plan.

It was also pointed out that the siting of the Halting Site is under the total control of the County Manager, without reference to the County Councillors. This does not apply to the council housing.

Further discussion on the use of the Blacklion site is deferred until the meeting with the Kildare County Council has occurred.

Bond Bridge

Maynooth Labour Branch has expressed its deep dissatisfaction at the lack of progress in improving the scandalously dangerous Bond Bridge at Newtown.

At the request of the Branch Clir. Stagg has now asked the Co. Council to have the proposed traffic lights, raised footpath and one way system put in place (funds are available for this) immediately if the Council cannot find the funds required for a new bridge.

Further delay on this project will surely result in death or injury to pedestrians or motorists using the bridge.

Rowanstown Cul de Sac

Following a successful notice of motion tabled by Cllr. Emmet Stagg the Co. Council have now carried out required restoration to the Rowanstown cul de sac. Funds for this work were provided from development levies paid by builders in the area.

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ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP MAYNOOTH

It gives me great pleasure to give you our first progress report on our efforts at restoring our section of the Royal Canal, i.e. from the thirteenth to fourteenth lock.

We commenced work on Monday 15th October 1984 with our AnCo supervisor Larry Buggy, Phillip Mc Dermott, our very able foreman, and some very eager young people. We started by cutting back hedges and bushes that were almost in the canal, and, with the help of wheelbarrows, J.C.B.s., and a Dredger, moved mountain of rubble, clay and stone (which we held on to). At this point we would like to thank Fred Leavey for his invaluable help in making it possible for us to dispose of approx. 2,000 tons of said Rubble and Silt.

We have sod walls right around the harbour field with a new entrance to lead down to the tennis court and out through the playground area in the hope that this will discourage people from taking a short cut across the harbour field. The new path from the railway station to the health centre is, I am sure, very welcome to commuters.

The bridge has already been repainted and, at the moment, the old Harbour wall is being rebuilt; sore backs, cut hands and broken nails are the order of the day. The work was - and still is - very hard, and, in Winter, really severe, but always very, very rewarding. There is a great sense of achievement

with every foot of path reclaimed and every brick that goes to rebuild the wall.

Our last meeting was held on Tuesday, 1st Octobner, in the I.C.A. Hall. The meeting was well attended and various topics were covered including a good discussion on the performance of the government. Members were pleased to hear of the reduction of inflation, reduction in the cost of petrol which will be 22p cheaper after successive reductions during the past few months. The meeting was glad to hear that, as a result of government policy, another reduction in interest rates will take place reducing repayments by £40 to £120 depending on the size of the loan.

A detailed discussion took place of the £5000 grant which is available to local authority householders. The following is some information which may be of interest to readers:

The grant is non-repayable and available for a local authority tenant of 3 years standing or a local authority tenant purchaser buying a private house and giving up a local authority dwelling suitable for letting to a private applicant.

This applies to second hand houses as well as new houses.

Those buying a new house will also be able to avail of the £3000 mortgage subsidy and the £1000 grant for new houses, which, in effect, means a £9000 grant.

This would meet the requirements of all the estates mentioned, the people of Celbridge, college students etc. who wish to travel to Maynooth on a daily basis."

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



The committee, and AnCo, without whose involvement the restoration would not be possible; (although they are causing us a little concern at the moment regarding the availability of funds, though it is hoped this is only for a short period) are delighted that a number of our youths working on the canal have recently secured apprenticeships and full-time employment, which was helped in no small way by the work experience gained and by the example and leadership given by the site foreman.

Community Information Centre

COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Each month we will issue information in this column which we hope you will find useful and interesting.

The subject this month is the House Improvement Grant cover and how much people can get under the scheme.

The scheme is operated by the Department of the Environment and covers six specific areas of house improvements:

- Putting in a water supply or installing sewerage facilities the most you can get is £200.
- Building a bathroom or shower, building an extra bedroom to relieve overcrowding, building a chimney and fireplace with backboiler in a house which hasn't got a chimney, or for major necessary works, the most you can get for each of these jobs is £600.
- If you are doing a number of different improvement jobs at the one time there are upper limits on the total grant you can get. These upper limits are £1,000 or £1,400, depending on the type of home improvements carried out.
- The maximum grant given in any particular case will be limited to two thirds of the cost of the work. You will always have to pay at least one third of the costs involved yourself.

Application forms are available at the Community Information Centre.

There is a grant available to elderly people called the 'Essential Repairs to House Grant'. This is operated by Kildare County Council and details are available from the Information Centre or from Kildare County Council.

This grant might not be available from all Local Authorities.





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PLANNED PROGRAMME FOR THE RESTORATION OF THE

ROYAL CANAL AT MAYNOOTH (which will ultimately become part through navigation of the Canal from Dublin to the River

Phase 1: To rebuild harbour walls from Mullins Bridge to Canal Footbridge together with providing a boating slipway at the entrance to the harbour.

Phase 2:

- (a) To provide natural stone seating around the harbour area
- Build a stepped entrance to the Canal Walk at Mullins Bridge and continue re-pointing of Mullins and Bond Bridges.

Phase 3: Clear banks of the Canal to provide for walkways, the first of these walkways will be from Mullins Bridge to Bond which would provide a very pleasant circular walk through the village and Canal areas. Whilst Phase 3 is underway a planned programme of landscaping will also take place together with re-dredging of the Canal bed.

It is also hoped that we may shortly be in a position to refurbish the Canal footbridge as this bridge is a very important feature of the harbour area.

It may be necessary from time to time to be flexible with the restoration programme depending on the weather and the availability of funds and materials. The estimated time scale for the full restoration of the Maynooth Project will be approximtely 3 - 4 years.

On behalf of the unemployed in North Kildare and arising from the information provided by local Labour branches in Maynooth and Celbridge, I have been pressing for some time to have adequate facilities provided in Maynooth Employment Office, where large numbers of unemployed are required to register on a weekly

Each week long queues form in the public street and unemployed men and women are forced to stand in all weathers in full public view to qualify for unemployment payments. It is no longer acceptable that the inadequate facilities at Maynooth Employment Office continue to be used when the spacious community hall, which was built by contributions and is owned by the Parish of Maynooth, lies vacant during the hours required. I know the Parish Priest of Maynooth and Barry Desmond to be men dedicated to the welfare of others and I now offer my services to them and to any others involved in assisting with the removal of any technical difficulties that stand in the way of allowing the use of Maynooth Community Hall for registration of the unemployed. If we cannot provide employment for our people we have a duty as a Christian and caring community

PRESS RELEASE - CLLR. EMMET STAGG to provide facilities that allow the unemployed to apply for the benefits to which they are entitled in a dignified and self-respecting setting.

> I have also pressed the Department of Social Welfare to provide separate facilities in the Celbridge area. At present the unemployed in Celbridge must walk four miles to Maynooth (there is no bus service) queue in the public street to register and then walk home again.

In reply to my latest representations Barry Desmond has stated "In view of the increasing population in the Lucan/Leixlip/Celbridge districts my Department is undertaking an examination of the feasibility providing an additional local office in the area. The position of the people in Celbridge will be borne in mind in formulating future plans for the area."

While this reply holds out a promise of improvement in the future I am aware from long experience that such departmental examinations as suggested are regularly protracted and fruitless. On behalf of the unemployed in my area I now demand that the Minister for Social Welfare. Barry Desmond T.D., takes whatever action is required to provide suitable premises in Maynooth and to open an office in Celbridge.

These are required before the onset of Winter and delay is not acceptable.

Tony Smith Memorial Walk

The money will be presented to the Old Folks Committee on Sunday November 10th. We would also like to thank the owners of Carton Estate for giving us permission to hold the walk in Carton this year, and also Gerry Durack who sought permission on our behalf.

On behalf of our senior citizens, once again many thanks to all those who sponsored our walkers.

Vacant Council Houses

The Branch at its recent meeting welcomed the success of the scheme whereby occupiers of Council houses may avail of up to £10,000 in grants if they vacate their houses and purchase or build an alternative family home. Families who are in need of housing can then be housed in the houses thereby vacated.

There are 4 such vacant houses now in Maynooth and the members expressed serious concern at the unacceptable long delays in allocating these houses. Not alone are the houses open to vandalism and squatting but young deserving families are unnecessarily delayed in very bad conditions.

Public Light Entrance to Kingsbry

The County Engineer has replied to representations by Cllr. Stagg concerning the provision of a public light to serve entrance and approach to Kingsbry Estate as follows:

"The order for erection of this light has been placed with the

ESB. It has proved difficult to get the ESB to adhere to a timetable but every effort will be made to get them to erect the light before the winter."

Visibility at Entrance to Kingsbry

Following representations by Cllr. Stagg concerning the improvement of visibility at the entrance to Kingsbry, the County Engineer has informed Cllr. Stagg that agreement has been reached with the developer to have the advertising signs at the entrance moved back and to remove a section of the hedge along the Straffan Road.

Public Lights - Kingsbry

Concerning the above, Cllr. Stagg has been informed that an application has been made to the Co. Council by the ESB in respect of 18 no. public lights for the completed sections of Kingsbry Estate. The ESB will be notified without delay that the Council are prepared to take these lights in charge and it is then a matter for the ESB to have the lights connected to their network.

Condition of Roads at Greenfield Estate

In reply to representations by Cllr. Stagg on behalf of Greenfields Residents Association, concerning the condition of roads at Greenfields, the Co. Engineer stated:

"The Residents Association are holding money due to the Council arising from earlier road surfacing and the agreement reached at an earlier meeting was that they should forward same to the Council to enable the remaining surfacing to be attended to. The cost of this work would be £ 750."

At a recent Celbridge Area Committee meeting the Council restated its position on the matter, stating that the money due to the Council must be paid before the remainder of the surfacing of roads can be completed. Cllr. Stagg has written to Greenfields Residents Association urging that they take the required action to finalise this matter.

Faulty Sewerage - Greenfield Estate

Following representations by Cllr. Stagg on behalf of Greenfields Residents Association, concerning the faulty sewerage in the estate, the Co. Council have now provided the required finance to resolve the problem and work will begin in November.

Extension of Speed Limit - Celbridge

A motion tabled by Cllr. Stagg concerning the extension of the speed limit on the Celbridge Road to near the bend beyond St.Laurence's Avenue has been accepted.

The proposal now goes before the Traffic Technical Committee.

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
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REPLY FROM CLLR. STAGG TO NOVEMBER EDITORIAL

was amazed at the near hysterical outburst contained in your Editorial of the November issue, and the gross distortion of my clear statement on the possible use of the Parish Hall in Maynooth as a centre for registration of the unemployed.

Your editorial accuses me of personally 'not being affected' by any changes in the use of the Hall. While I do use the hall facilities in a nersonal capacity duite frequently and could thereby be so affected my proposals were made in my public, not personal capacity. I act on behalf of the sixty-three decided to elect me to my present position in the recent poll, I have a right and duty and mandate to act on their behalf.

did not ask to have the Hall harided over to the Dept. of Social Welfare or to anybody else as you stated. I suggested that the Hall might be used as an alternative to the present totally unacceptable Labour Exchange during office hours when it is otherwise not in use - i.e. that this facility which was provided from funds from the public be used to sheller the least well off (the unemployed) in our community when they are required to sign on to prove that they are unemployed. No disruption of the present uses of the Hall would occur and no interruption of the present entertainment is suggested except by your editorial.

I think that we should now remind ourselves that we are in a deep economic recession and that the numbers registering as unemployed in Maynooth have dramatically risen from 396 in 1981 to 2078 in 1985. Many of those who have lost their jobs or who never had one and who are forced to queue n all weathers to claim their meagre

benefits are the self same people who provided the funds to build the Parish Hall in the first instance when they were better off than now. I confirm my helief that these people, men women and vouths: are at least entitled to shelter when it is available and unused when they need it. Your editorial would seek to deny them this available facility which can be provided without distuption to other present users of the premises, and which would generate an income that could be used to advantage for the development of the existing premises.

I was shocked by your Pontius Pilate stance of 'if the Government won't do it why should we' and can only hope that you are not representative of the Maynooth Community Hall Committee and those they represent, and that they will examine my proposals from a more caring point of view than was displayed in your editorial.

On the approach to Christmas, being the season of goodwill to all, I wish to restate my determination to continue the struggle to have adequate facilities provided in Maynooth for the registration of the unemployed, and I seek assistance from all in this regard. If we cannot wish the unemployed a prosperous New Year at least we can offer them sheller. We can and should do so. Emmel Stagg



Our last meeting was held on Tuesday 5th November in the I.C.A. Hall. There was a good attendance and many topics were discussed including the 'Jobs and Fair Tax' package additional employees in the 1986/87 tax year, and grants for hotels and questhouses which should give a major boost to both the tourism and construction industries. There will also be an improved Employment Incentive Scheme and the Natural Gas grid will be extended providing about 1,000 jobs.

There will also be new measures introduced to ensure that nobody pays more than their fair share of tax and nobody pays less, Employer/ Employee committees will be set up in individual businesses to ensure that PRSI and PAYE payments are deducted and transmitted promptly.

The new house improvement grants scheme will make about 1,500 jobs in the Construction industry. Employers and trade unions have welcomed the range of these imaginalive and positive decisions. 

SOCIAL EMPLOYMENT SCHEME

Maynooth Community Council has recently taken on six workers under the Social Employment Scheme operated by the Department of Labour. Under this scheme, workers are paid £ D per two-and-a-half day week to work on projects of benefit to the community. In the case of Maynooth, the project in question is the Information Directory being compiled by the Community Council in conjunction with Maynooth Community Information Centre and Maynooth Public Library.

The Information Directory aims to provide a complete listing of all businesses, services and voluntary organisations operating in the Maynooth area. In addition, the Directory will contain information on useful public services, and a diary of events of possible direct interest to Maynooth residents. There will also be items on local areas of interest, geared both to visitors to Maynooth and local residents who would like to know more about the local area.

Entries in the directory listings are free, but there is a charge for special advertisements. Any business, group or organisation which has not done so should leave details of their name, address, etc. at the Library (Main Street) or ring 286399. We would appeal to all local firms to respond generously when approached to support the Directory over the next few weeks.

The supervisor of the project is Gerry Colreavy, who has already made an important contribution to the life of the town through his work in getting the Community Information Centre off the ground. We are glad to be able to avail of the services of someone with such interest and commitment as Gerry has.

While the Social Employment Scheme does provide additional grants towards the supervisor's wages and running costs, there are still many costs which will have to be borne by the Community Council, such as employer's PRSI contributions, insurance, and part of the supervisor's wages. In all, these are likely to involve the Council in the expenditure of over £2,000 over the 12 months

during which the scheme will last. However, the Council feels that this is a worthwhile commitment because of the employment created and the benefits to the local community of the Directory and other projects which the workers will be undertaking eventually. We would therefore appeal to all Maynooth residents to support generously our fund-raising activities over the coming year.


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Another subject of interest to many people is that of Home Helps. Home Helps are provided on the basis of need, and family and income factors are taken into account when the assessment is being made. A Home Help, whether full-time or part-time depending on the circumstances, may be provided in the following cases:

- 1. to an elderly person who is incapacitated, house-bound or for any other reason might have to enter an institution if help was not available
- 2. to a family because of illness, death or an inability to cope with day to day difficulties
- 3. to a sick person or an ex-patient during convalescence, where the person might otherwise have to enter an institution.

Some Home Helps are employed directly by Health Boards and some by voluntary organisations with Health Board support. Application can be made through the family doctor, Public Health Nurse, Social

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Workers or directly to the Health Board. In cases where Home Helps are employed by voluntary organisations application can be made through the organisation.

The fact that a person has a Medical Card does not entitle them to a Home Help. Equally, the fact that a person does not have a

Medical Card does not mean that they cannot get a Home Help. basis of need and the person may be asked to make a contribution lowards the cost of the Home Help if they have sufficient means to do so.

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



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

At the recent meeting of Maynooth Labour Branch a long discussion took place on the Labour Party Bill that has been moved in Dail Eireann that seeks a referendum to remove the constitutional prohibition on divorce and that would enable Dail Eireann to introduce legislation allowing divorce in certain circumstances.

It has been Labour Policy for some time now that special support should be provided for families experiencing difficulties and also that divorce should be available to couples whose relationships have irretrievably broken down. Members pointed to the fact that such legislative measures were included in the ioint programme for Government and calls on all F.G. T.D.'s to honour that commitment by voting for the Labour Bill. It was noted that f.f. have again displayed their now usual cowardice and opportunism by refusing to state their position on this most important issue.

O'Neill Park

The landscaping which includes kerbing, filling and seeding at O'Neill Park, is being carried out with finance (£1000) provided by Clli-Stagg under the 'Other Works' scheme. This work has nothing to do with representations from Cllr. Durkan who didn't provide penny towards the project we saw his claim in the issue of the Newsletter we thought the cuckoo had arrived early, or was it a magpie. Just keeping the record straight.

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Bridge at Newtown

It is noted that no action has been taken on the repairs to the bridge at Newtown. The Co. Engineer had earlier indicated to Clli. Stage that he preferred the proposal for complete re-alignment of the bridge and if the required £1/4m wsa not forthcoming for this that he would go ahead with an interim proposal to have the bridge surfaced, a footpath and barrier erected; and traffic controlled by traffic

Cllr. Stagg has informed the branch that he is now pressing the Council to go ahead with the interim proposal as finance is not available for re-alignment.

Kingsbry Estate

Arising from representations from Clli. Stagg the public lights have now been switched on in Kingsbry and have been taken in charge

by the Co. Council. Also the hedge on the Straffan side of the entrance has been cut back at his request and has made the exit considerably safer.

We note that the main road in this estate is in a deplorable state again and that the public light at the entrance has not been erected. Cllr. Stagg has been requested to pursue both.

Lights from Cluain Aoibhinn to

The following motion has been tabled by Cllr. Stagg for the next meeting of the County Council:-

"That adequate public lighting and footpaths be now provided from Bond Bridge Maynooth to the entrance to Cluain Aoibhinn estate and that the road in this area be drained and re-installed. Finance for this project to be provided from the development levies collected from the developers of the housing estate in the area." A report on the result of this motion will be published when available.

Kingsbry Levies

The following reply has been received by Cllr. Stagg from the County Manager Mr. J.G. Ward:

I am to refer to your letter of 18th September regarding development at Kingsbry, Maynooth, and I am to inform you that Drumconnor Construction Company Limited have been levied with a specific contribution of £4,100 for public lighting and footpaths under planning permission reference 22 7/84. To date a sum of £2,600 has been collected and lodged for the provision of

these services. I have requested the County Engineer to arrange to have the appropriate works carried out when the total contribution has been fully paid by Drumconnor Construction Co. Ltd.

Public Lights

Kildare County Council have now placed orders with the E.S.B. for public lights at the following points:-Old Railpark (near Christy Farrelly's)

- 2. Back Lane, Leinster Cottages
- 3. Entrance to Laraghbryan Cemetery Finance for these lights was provided by Cllr. Stagg from the 1985 'Other Works Scheme'.

Dunboyne Road - Convent Lane

"That this Council would undertake immediate repairs to the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, particularly at Convent Lane."

Extensive strengthening and improvement works have been undertaken in the Old Carton and Kildate Bridge area of the Dunboyne Road. The Convent Lane area is in need of improvements also and it is hoped to attend to the drainage aspects at Dillons Row Comer in the near future.

Railpark, Maynooth

"That this Council would as a matter of urgency undertake road repairs at the cul-de-sac, Railpark,"

Extensive drainage and strengthening is required on this roadway but as the finances for this level of operation are not available interim emergency repairs will be attended to in the coming month.

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Laraghbryan Cemetery

"That Laraghbryan Cemetery be tidied up and the extension to same be properly fenced and mainlamed."

Grass culting was carried out on two occasions during the summer months. The required level of main-Tenance cannot be achieved given the current level of finances and shortage of manpower. The extension has been adequately fenced and cut during culting of the older section.


Old Carton

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
