





replacing cut stonework where necessary. Conservation work has been completed on the Keep and is in progress on the Galehouse. The works are scheduled for completion ın 1986.

Maynooth Castle is one of the outstanding thirteenth century castles in Leinster both from an architectural and historical point of view. The exact date of the buildings is not recorded but it is clear from the general character and details that they are of the thirteenth century. The Castle is rich in the history of Kildare and was used at various times by some of the Earls of Kildare. Its history is also intimately linked with that of Maynooth College.

Steps are being taken by the Commissioners to have the Castle vested in them so that they can plan for its long-term preservation and presentation to the public. The work at the Castle together with the restoration work carried out by the Commissioners of Public Works at Taghadoe Round Tower is indicative of the good work being done by them in the context of the preservation of the monuments of Kildare.

MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At a well attended meeting of the Community Council on Dec. 10th last, members were informed by Proinnsias Breathnach and Jim Mc Manus of their oral Submission on The Draft County Development Plan to Kildare Co. Council. The Submission made at a meeting on Nov. 16th was attended by County Councillors from the Clane electoral area, Discussion centred on many topics - in particular the plan for ltinerants in Maynooth and in the County; and the alternate uses of the "Thing" in the square. Although included in the oral and written submissions this particular item will be treated as a separate issue. Suggested uses of the building are of as, (i) tourist office, (ii) Community Centre. The County Council stated that all proposals would be entertained and carefully looked into.

Mrs. Maura Cullen informed the Council on the progress of the Canal Project Group. Work was being carried out near Laraghbryan and Maura appealed for more volunteers to help. We are delighted for the R.C.A.G. that their function prior to Christmas in the Hitchin Post was a success. It was pleasing to note from Maura that C.I.E. will contribute to and help the R.C.A.G. and that the Board of Works intend certain restoration of the canal.

Finance

In relation to Subscriptions from Voluntary Organisations, it was pointed out by Peter Nevin (Treasurer) that the response so far was quite slow. The Community Council ask all Voluntary Organisations to please forward their £10.00 subscription. The Council have so far managed on a small intake of funds but as projects advance this year, more funding will obviously be required. The Subscription may be paid to our Treasurers Peter Nevin or Ann McStravick or indeed through any Council member.

There then followed reports from the Sub-Committees of their activities. On Social Services, Leo McGlynn reported that with the help of Gerry Colreavey (Maynooth College), up to twenty five people had volunteered to assist in the setting-up and running of an Information Centre in Maynooth-Extra mural classes are to be organised in St. Patrick's College to introduce the idea. Volunteers are still required - so if interested please contact Leo McGlynn or your Council representative. We are happy to say that since the December meeting, premise, for the Information Centre have been acquired. They are situated above the Public Library in the Main Street.

Tom McMullen, on Education, stated that his committee were continuing their work on setting up extra curricular activities. An approach would be made to Mr. O'Connell for use of the Primary School and a list of teachers from college students







NOTES FROM BERNARD DURKAN, T.D. Deputy Durkan received the following from the County Engineer re the continued presence of itinerants on the Moyglare Road.


"The construction of proper footpaths, drainage and landscaping on the Moyglare Road is, in my opinion, most desirable and would help to alleviate the problem referred to. However, due to the present extremely difficult financial situation for road maintenance, 1 see little prospect of being able to undertake this work in the near future and I feel the real solution will have to await the construction of an itinerant site in the area.

Regional Technical College, Kildare Following an enquiry to the Minister for Education as to whether consideration will be given to the siting of a regional technical college in Co. Kildare, the Minister replied that the Regional Technical Colleges in this country were set up to serve designated regions. The southern part of Co. Kildare is served by Carlow Regional Technical College while the northern part including Naas is served by the City of Dublin third-level colleges. The Government has given a commitment to the establishment of new Regional Technical Colleges in the Greater Dublin area, one of which will be located in Tallaght. There are no plans to provide a Regional Technical college in Naas.

Enquiries re New Garda Sub-Division for Kildare and New Station for Leixlip.

Having been asked to consider the possibility of creating a new Garda sub division in Kildare with particular reference to north Kildare (Leixlip, Celbridge, Maynooth) and also the possiblity of providing a Garda station in Leixlip, the Minister for Justice has replied that there are no proposals for either of the above at present. Both would require additional manpower on indoor duty, at the expense of outdoor operational duty. Therefore it is necessary to examine the possibility of improving the existing service by allocation of additional manpower and other resources before embarking on structural changes or establishing a new station in any area.

Since the beginning of 1984, one extra Garda has been allocated to both Celbridge and Maynooth. New communications equipment has been installed



also, which should be in operation

Gardai, compared with 37 at the end of 1981, and part of the area formerly served from the station is now served from the station at Ronanstown, opened in January 1984.




A discussion on the 1985 Annual Conference took place and the following resolution was submitted by the branch for the Conference Agenda:


Further Resolves that Labour shall not participate in any Coalition or give support to any minority Government.

Kingsbry Estate

In response to requests from residents of this new estate, Cllr. Emmet Stagg recently tabled a motion at Kildare Co. Council requesting that a footpath from the entrance to the estate to the Crescent on Straffan Road and Public Lights in this area be provided from development levies collected from the developer.



The County Engineer has agreed to have the matter investigated as a matter of urgency. The Branch notes the very large num-

ber of pedestrians using this unlit section of roadway and are mindful of the near fatal accident there recently. Urgent action is now required.

Sewerage Improvements

A bill of quantities has been prepared for the required extension to the sewerage works in Leixlip which serves the Maynooth area and a draft advertisement for the contract has been submitted to the Dept. of Environment.

The sewerage collection system on the south side of Maynooth is now at full capacity and problems have emerged in the system, notably at Cluain Aoibhinn. The system has been surveyed by a company of consultant engineers and their report has been submitted to the Dept. of Environment for approval to the required enlargements.

Grants for Maynooth

Cllr. Emmet Stagg has informed the Branch that the following grants have been paid by the Co. Council:

1. £1000 for improvement work at the 13th lock on the Royal Canal-2. Increase of grant to Maynooth Summer Project from £150 to £200. 3. Further grant of £200 to the Salesian Co-Operators and Bru Bosco towards restoration work at the Geraldine Hall.

4. Grant of £500 to Maynooth Development Association towards the cost of providing a tennis court. the roads in the estate had become



Representations have been made by Cllr. Stagg concerning the unfinished estate at Carton Court. In one part of the estate the roads and footpaths have not been completed and public lights have not been erected. The County Manager has replied stating that the matter is receiving attention.

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





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CLLR. G. BRADY'S NOTES

In reply to representations made by Cllr. G. Brady, the following letters have been received from Kildare Co. Council and from the Area Manager of C.I.E.

From the County Manager, Kildare County Council.

I have received your letter regarding complaints about correspondence not being dealt with by the Council's staff and I am to inform you that I am surprised that this is happening, in view of the instructions which have been given to all sections to respond to correspondence promptly, I have again repeated my instructions to the various sections but I would be glad to get details of specific instances where correspondence has not been dealt with, so that the matter can be further investigated.

From County Secretary, 20/12/84.

Further to your representations on behalf of the Salesian Co-operators and Bru Bosco regarding their application for grant assistance towards the restoration of the Geraldine Hall, I wish to inform you that Kildare Co. Council has approved a further payment of £200 towards the project and paying order will issue shortly.

From Area Manager, C.I.E. 20/12/84.

I refer to your letter of 6th December to our Secretary, which has been passed to me for attention.

Maynooth station is served daily by all of the mainline trains operating between Connolly station and Sligo in both directions. From Monday, 26th November last due to lack of support two of the evening commut -er trains, Dublin/Maynooth, were withdrawn. We have had some adverse reaction from public representatives about the reduction in service who

contend that the provision of new stations at specific areas on the Dublin/Kildare border is essential in order to enable the Maynooth line to reach its full potential. We accept this line of thinking but simply the capital is not available to build new stations or re-furbish existing ones.

Regarding the possibility of introducing a cross radial bus service from Clonee/ Maynooth/Naas, this has been considered in the past but was not economically feasible. However, in view of your representations the matter will be considered again and if possible the service will be introduced, even if only for a trial period.



So ended an enjoyable day's sport, and although the weather was cold, it was bright and dry, and surely cross country sport must be as good a way of keeping fit as any. * * * *





9th, Margaret Noonan 14th and Marie Gleeson 14th, silver medals were secured.


