#### COURSE IN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Readers, who are involved in voluntary groups which aim to help the community, should be interested in a course which will be run by the Adult Education Department of Maynooth College, in conjunction with Maynooth Community Council. An evening course in Community Development will begin in early October, and the course will cover very practical aspects of community and voluntary work, as well as exploring some more theoretical issues.

Some of the very practical topics will be:  
Planning and decision-making in voluntary organisations.

How to organise and run meetings.  
The functions of officers in an organisation.

How to deal with state and voluntary bodies which can help your group.  
How to work with people.

More theoretical issues will be explored, including:  
What is Community Development?  
How is Maynooth community structured?  
What does the future hold for Maynooth?  
The experience of other community groups.

The course will also provide an opportunity for participants to draw up a development plan for their own organisation.

# Editorial

Mike Murphy had a story on the radio last week, about the two statues that stopped to watch a County Council Worker - but he didn't move! A joke, yes, but a day or so later we began to wonder if, in fact, the joke wasn't a fact. Our water was cut off, due to the incompetence of some official or another, for several days - not just one, but several officials were at fault for the outrage. Outrage it was to cut off the water from several towns, leaving 20,000 to 25,000 without water to drink, wash, or whatever. A supposed tanker service was substituted for the water supply but, again, no indication was given to victims as to when or where this service might be available.

It was a custom, for years back, to insert notices in the Leinster Leader, of impending cuts off and notices were also displayed in shop windows. This appears to have been discontinued (We don't know why). A notice to be read in the churches on Sunday would have made sense but a notice over the radio on Sunday afternoon was a waste of money, even if it was the easy thing to do and needed little or no effort. A little forethought would not have taxed the intelligence of the County Officials. Another little matter springs to mind - Who was responsible for the standby equipment? Why was it not in good working order? When was it last inspected and who was responsible for having it in order? Was the responsible person standing still like the rest? Is that person still doing the same job? If so, why?

Jokes like Mike Murphy's do not arise from nothing. They would not be jokes at all unless there was truth behind them. They would fall flat without the grains of truth. It is obvious to anyone (except apparently County Officials and, to some extent Councillors) that there is a great deal of truth in the 'Jokes'. Council workers (office and manual) are notoriously slow and even the perennial 'Our workers do a great job' cannot cover up the fact that, all over the country, in every County, Council workers are notoriously slow.

It is time that there was a serious shake up of workers. It is time also that Councillors, who represent the electors, thrashed out, in the open, for the information of the public, who is responsible for the incompetence and inconsideration, particularly this latest affair. It is no use saying that 'it is no use crying over spilt milk'. The milk may be spilled but there is mopping up to be done, so let us see it done well publicly. Let it appear, if the statues stop to see us (the Electors) that they will know that we move.

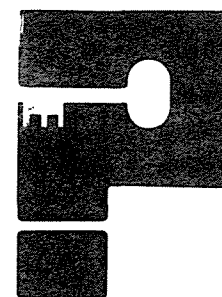

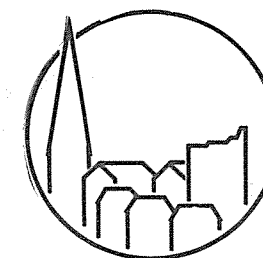

#### Local History Department

The Local History Collection, housed at the County Library Headquarters, consists of books, maps, photographs, manuscripts and other records which have been collected over a large number of years with a view to assisting those interested in researching aspects of the county's history. There is also our extensive collection of material on general Irish history. Access to the Local History collection is by arrangement, during opening hours at Droichead Nua branch.

Donations of material relating to the history of Co. Kildare are welcome; potential donors are reminded that today's records are the local history sources for tomorrow's historians.

#### Museum & Exhibitions Department

A small museum, containing items of social and historical interest, mainly donated or lent by residents of the County, has been established at County Library Headquarters. Visitors are welcome, by arrangement, and visits by school classes are

particularly encouraged. As with the Local History Collection, donations of material are welcomed. A collection of Quaker memorabilia is housed in the Ballitore branch, which is located in the restored Quaker meeting house.

Exhibitions are frequently held in branch libraries. Some use material from the library's own resources, while others are travelling exhibitions lent by such sources as the National Library of Ireland and the Public Record Office. Others feature the creative work of Kildare residents. Ideas and suggestions for exhibitions are welcome; in particular we would encourage exhibitions which have a Kildare connection, either by reason of the material involved, or because they represent the creative work of residents of the County.

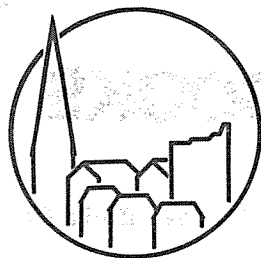

# Maynooth Community Council

## SPORTS COMPLEX & BLACKLION SITE

The following extract from the minutes of the July meeting of the Community Council refers to these subjects:

The Chairman reported that the College Trustees will not be making land available for the proposed Sports Complex, as they intend to use it for college buildings. However, the College authorities are still supportive of the general idea. It was indicated that the trustees might be prepared to provide land for indoor sports facilities, e.g. a Gym/Sports Centre, which would use only a fraction of the land originally requested. The Executive Committee suggest that the County Council be approached to provide land at the Blacklion site for the proposed sports complex. This should not interfere with the proposed halting site for travellers indigenous to the area, as the halting site would only require

a small portion of the land. If necessary the indoor facilities could be on college land and the outdoor facilities at Blacklion.

The following points were raised and discussed:

1. that the separation of indoor and outdoor facilities is not feasible;
2. that children going to Blacklion could be in danger from the traffic on the main road.

It was pointed out that, at this stage, all these are very tentative plans. The Executive Committee have contacted the three County Councillors for the area, with a view to arranging a meeting with the County Council to discuss the future use of the Blacklion site and are awaiting replies. Since the County Council is already committed to receiving a deputation from Maynooth Community Council to discuss the itinerant situation, it is proposed that the discussion

be broadened to include the role of the County Council in providing recreational facilities for the town.

Re the siting of the halting site, and Council housing at Blacklion, it was affirmed that the County Council proposals are definite and it was also pointed out that the proposed housing estate is against the County Council's own County Development Plan.

It was also pointed out that the siting of the Halting Site is under the total control of the County Manager, without reference to the County Councillors. This does not apply to the council housing.

Further discussion on the use of the Blacklion site is deferred until the meeting with the Kildare County Council has occurred.

## LABOUR PARTY NOTES

### Public Sector Pay Freeze

At a recent meeting of the Branch, the following resolution was passed unanimously:

"Maynooth Labour Branch condemns the recently announced Government statement that proposes a Pay Freeze in the public sector. In defence of the principle of free collective bargaining and in the knowledge that many in the public sector have very low incomes the Maynooth Branch calls on the Parliamentary Labour Party to defeat this proposal in the Dail."

The motion has been referred to the Kildare Constituency Council and Administrative Council of the Labour Party.

### Kildare Labour News

We are presently preparing the next edition of Kildare Labour News, which will be published before Christmas. Once again we will have articles from national figures. Circulation for the Christmas edition is hoped to be over 10,000 copies.

### Tony Smith Memorial Walk

Sponsorship for our Annual Walk for Maynooth Old Folks is going well. Let's hope that the weather is good on October 13th.

### Maynooth College Freshers Day

Maynooth College Branch of the Labour Party have sought permission from the Students Union to have a 'Labour Stand' at the 'College Freshers Day'.

Information will be available on the history and current policy of the party and students will be afforded an opportunity of joining

the party.

Among those in attendance at the Labour Stand will be the National Youth Officer, Pat Montague, and Administrative Council Member Cllr. E. Stagg.

### Association of Traders and Business People

Earlier this year the Maynooth Labour Branch proposed the formation of a Traders/Shopkeepers/Business People Association who could act in concert in promotion of their own interests, the interests of the Maynooth Community and for the promotion of employment. We received a positive response at that time to our proposal but deferred further action on the matter in the face of accusations of political mimicry by a local political opponent.

We believe that we can now proceed with our offer of assistance in forming such a group and feel the time is now opportune following the recent spate of unsolved robberies in the town. We believe that such a group could effectively organise a 'Community Watch' in Maynooth in co-operation with the Gardai.

With this and the above objectives in view the Branch have contacted all traders and business people in the town. It is hoped that an early and fruitful conclusion can be reported.

### Bond Bridge

Maynooth Labour Branch has expressed its deep dissatisfaction at the lack of progress in improving the scandalously dangerous Bond Bridge at Newtown.

At the request of the Branch Cllr. Stagg has now asked the Co. Council to have the proposed traffic lights, raised footpath and one way system put in place (funds are available for this) immediately if the Council cannot find the funds required for a new bridge.

Further delay on this project will surely result in death or injury to pedestrians or motorists using the bridge.

### Rowanstown Cul de Sac

Following a successful notice of motion tabled by Cllr. Emmet Stagg the Co. Council have now carried out required restoration to the Rowanstown cul de sac. Funds for this work were provided from development levies paid by builders in the area.

### Footpath from Flood's Corner to Manor Flats

The following motion has been tabled by Cllr. Stagg: "That the footpath from Flood's Corner to the new Manor Flats be resurfaced and that the cost be paid from the development levies collected from developers in the area."

### Free Fuel & Footwear Schemes

Applications should now be made to the Eastern Health Board by those wishing to avail of the above two schemes.

The FREE FUEL SCHEME applies to those in receipt of longterm social welfare payments as their only source of income provided they live alone or with the following persons only:

- (a) Dependant Spouse or Children
  - (b) Incapacitated persons
  - (c) Others receiving similar payments
- The amount payable is £5 per week for the 6 months from October to March.

The FOOTWEAR SCHEME applies to those with children under 18

years of age and who are in receipt of one of the following payments:

- A. Supplementary Welfare Allowance from the E.H.B..
- B. Unemployment and Disability Benefits and Assistance
- D. D.P.M.A. and Infectious Diseases Allowance. Payment varies from £10 to £16 per child.

Application can be made at the Health Centre or at the Advice Centre operated by Cllr. Stagg in Caulfields each Saturday.

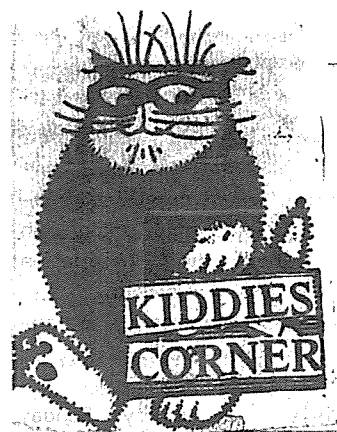

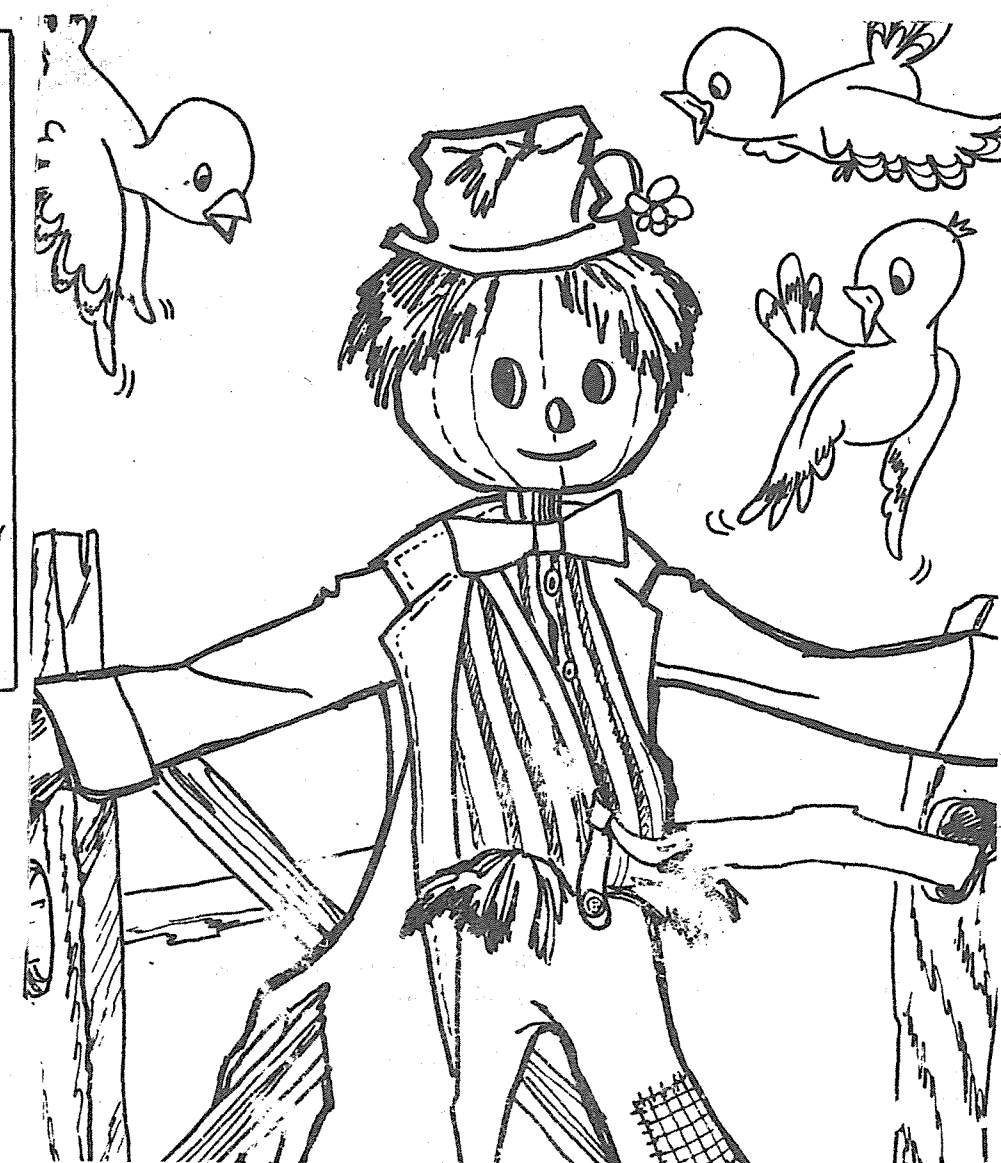
