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

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
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MAYNOOTH SUMMER PROJECT REPORT 1985

"Cloudburst and steady downpour now for days"


The summer of '85 has been rather appropriately summed up in Healy's 'Gifts of Rain', But like all



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

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REPLY FROM CLLR. STAGG TO NOVEMBER EDITORIAL

was amazed at the near hysterical outburst contained in your Editorial of the November issue, and the gross distortion of my clear statement on the possible use of the Parish Hall in Maynooth as a centre for registration of the unemployed.

Your editorial accuses me of personally 'not being affected' by any changes in the use of the Hall. While I do use the hall facilities in a nersonal capacity duite frequently and could thereby be so affected my proposals were made in my public, not personal capacity. I act on behalf of the sixty-three decided to elect me to my present position in the recent poll, I have a right and duty and mandate to act on their behalf.

did not ask to have the Hall harided over to the Dept. of Social Welfare or to anybody else as you stated. I suggested that the Hall might be used as an alternative to the present totally unacceptable Labour Exchange during office hours when it is otherwise not in use - i.e. that this facility which was provided from funds from the public be used to sheller the least well off (the unemployed) in our community when they are required to sign on to prove that they are unemployed. No disruption of the present uses of the Hall would occur and no interruption of the present entertainment is suggested except by your editorial.

I think that we should now remind ourselves that we are in a deep economic recession and that the numbers registering as unemployed in Maynooth have dramatically risen from 396 in 1981 to 2078 in 1985. Many of those who have lost their jobs or who never had one and who are forced to queue n all weathers to claim their meagre

benefits are the self same people who provided the funds to build the Parish Hall in the first instance when they were better off than now. I confirm my helief that these people, men women and vouths: are at least entitled to shelter when it is available and unused when they need it. Your editorial would seek to deny them this available facility which can be provided without distuption to other present users of the premises, and which would generate an income that could be used to advantage for the development of the existing premises.

I was shocked by your Pontius Pilate stance of 'if the Government won't do it why should we' and can only hope that you are not representative of the Maynooth Community Hall Committee and those they represent, and that they will examine my proposals from a more caring point of view than was displayed in your editorial.

On the approach to Christmas, being the season of goodwill to all, I wish to restate my determination to continue the struggle to have adequate facilities provided in Maynooth for the registration of the unemployed, and I seek assistance from all in this regard. If we cannot wish the unemployed a prosperous New Year at least we can offer them sheller. We can and should do so. Emmel Stagg

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

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

Our last meeting was held on Tuesday 5th November in the I.C.A. Hall. There was a good attendance and many topics were discussed including the 'Jobs and Fair Tax' package additional employees in the 1986/87 tax year, and grants for hotels and questhouses which should give a major boost to both the tourism and construction industries. There will also be an improved Employment Incentive Scheme and the Natural Gas grid will be extended providing about 1,000 jobs.

There will also be new measures introduced to ensure that nobody pays more than their fair share of tax and nobody pays less, Employer/ Employee committees will be set up in individual businesses to ensure that PRSI and PAYE payments are deducted and transmitted promptly.

The new house improvement grants scheme will make about 1,500 jobs in the Construction industry. Employers and trade unions have welcomed the range of these imaginalive and positive decisions. The construction industry both through the CIF and the building umons were particularly warm in their response to the package.

SOCIAL EMPLOYMENT SCHEME

Maynooth Community Council has recently taken on six workers under the Social Employment Scheme operated by the Department of Labour. Under this scheme, workers are paid £ D per two-and-a-half day week to work on projects of benefit to the community. In the case of Maynooth, the project in question is the Information Directory being compiled by the Community Council in conjunction with Maynooth Community Information Centre and Maynooth Public Library.

The Information Directory aims to provide a complete listing of all businesses, services and voluntary organisations operating in the Maynooth area. In addition, the Directory will contain information on useful public services, and a diary of events of possible direct interest to Maynooth residents. There will also be items on local areas of interest, geared both to visitors to Maynooth and local residents who would like to know more about the local area.

Entries in the directory listings are free, but there is a charge for special advertisements. Any business, group or organisation which has not done so should leave details of their name, address, etc. at the Library (Main Street) or ring 286399. We would appeal to all local firms to respond generously when approached to support the Directory over the next few weeks.

The supervisor of the project is Gerry Colreavy, who has already made an important contribution to the life of the town through his work in getting the Community Information Centre off the ground. We are glad to be able to avail of the services of someone with such interest and commitment as Gerry has.

While the Social Employment Scheme does provide additional grants towards the supervisor's wages and running costs, there are still many costs which will have to be borne by the Community Council, such as employer's PRSI contributions, insurance, and part of the supervisor's wages. In all, these are likely to involve the Council in the expenditure of over £2,000 over the 12 months

during which the scheme will last. However, the Council feels that this is a worthwhile commitment because of the employment created and the benefits to the local community of the Directory and other projects which the workers will be undertaking eventually. We would therefore appeal to all Maynooth residents to support generously our fund-raising activities over the coming year.







A Home Help, whether full-time or part-time depending on the circumstances, may be provided in the following cases:

- 1. to an elderly person who is incapacitated, house-bound or for any other reason might have to enter an institution if help was not available

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



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

At the recent meeting of Maynooth Labour Branch a long discussion took place on the Labour Party Bill that has been moved in Dail Eireann that seeks a referendum to remove the constitutional prohibition on divorce and that would enable Dail Eireann to introduce legislation allowing divorce in certain circumstances.

It has been Labour Policy for some time now that special support should be provided for families experiencing difficulties and also that divorce should be available to couples whose relationships have irretrievably broken down. Members pointed to the fact that such legislative measures were included in the ioint programme for Government and calls on all F.G. T.D.'s to honour that commitment by voting for the Labour Bill. It was noted that f.f. have again displayed their now usual cowardice and opportunism by refusing to state their position on this most important issue.

O'Neill Park

The landscaping which includes kerbing, filling and seeding at O'Neill Park, is being carried out with finance (£1000) provided by Clli-Stagg under the 'Other Works' scheme. This work has nothing to do with representations from Cllr. Durkan who didn't provide penny towards the project we saw his claim in the issue of the Newsletter we thought the cuckoo had arrived early, or was it a magpie. Just keeping the record straight.

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Bridge at Newtown

It is noted that no action has been taken on the repairs to the bridge at Newtown. The Co. Engineer had earlier indicated to Clli. Stage that he preferred the proposal for complete re-alignment of the bridge and if the required £1/4m wsa not forthcoming for this that he would go ahead with an interim proposal to have the bridge surfaced, a footpath and barrier erected; and traffic controlled by traffic

Cllr. Stagg has informed the branch that he is now pressing the Council to go ahead with the interim proposal as finance is not available for re-alignment.

Kingsbry Estate

Arising from representations from Clli. Stagg the public lights have now been switched on in Kingsbry and have been taken in charge

by the Co. Council. Also the hedge on the Straffan side of the entrance has been cut back at his request and has made the exit considerably safer.

We note that the main road in this estate is in a deplorable state again and that the public light at the entrance has not been erected. Cllr. Stagg has been requested to pursue both.

Lights from Cluain Aoibhinn to

The following motion has been tabled by Cllr. Stagg for the next meeting of the County Council:-

"That adequate public lighting and footpaths be now provided from Bond Bridge Maynooth to the entrance to Cluain Aoibhinn estate and that the road in this area be drained and re-installed. Finance for this project to be provided from the development levies collected from the developers of the housing estate in the area." A report on the result of this motion will be published when available.

Kingsbry Levies

The following reply has been received by Cllr. Stagg from the County Manager Mr. J.G. Ward:

I am to refer to your letter of 18th September regarding development at Kingsbry, Maynooth, and I am to inform you that Drumconnor Construction Company Limited have been levied with a specific contribution of £4,100 for public lighting and footpaths under planning permission reference 22 7/84. To date a sum of £2,600 has been collected and lodged for the provision of

these services. I have requested the County Engineer to arrange to have the appropriate works carried out when the total contribution has been fully paid by Drumconnor Construction Co. Ltd.

Public Lights

Kildare County Council have now placed orders with the E.S.B. for public lights at the following points:-Old Railpark (near Christy Farrelly's)

- 2. Back Lane, Leinster Cottages
- 3. Entrance to Laraghbryan Cemetery Finance for these lights was provided by Cllr. Stagg from the 1985 'Other Works Scheme'.

Dunboyne Road - Convent Lane

"That this Council would undertake immediate repairs to the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, particularly at Convent Lane."

Extensive strengthening and improvement works have been undertaken in the Old Carton and Kildate Bridge area of the Dunboyne Road. The Convent Lane area is in need of improvements also and it is hoped to attend to the drainage aspects at Dillons Row Comer in the near future.

Railpark, Maynooth

"That this Council would as a matter of urgency undertake road repairs at the cul-de-sac, Railpark,"

Extensive drainage and strengthening is required on this roadway but as the finances for this level of operation are not available interim emergency repairs will be attended to in the coming month.

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Laraghbryan Cemetery

"That Laraghbryan Cemetery be tidied up and the extension to same be properly fenced and mainlamed."

Grass culting was carried out on two occasions during the summer months. The required level of main-Tenance cannot be achieved given the current level of finances and shortage of manpower. The extension has been adequately fenced and cut during culting of the older section.

Old Carton

"That this Council would undertake repair of potholes on road between Confey, Leixlip and Old Carton, Maynooth."

This roadway has deteriorated due to large increase in traffic volumes and inability of maintenance allocation to arrest this deterioration. Filling of potholes will be attended to but it is not possible to strengthen, widen and maintain road now. * * *

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

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

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

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RELOCATION OF MAYNOOTH POST OFFICE

The news that Maynooth Post Office was to be relocated from its present location in the Main Street to O'Brien's Shopping Centre first began to circulate in the days immediately before Christmas last. Following various representations received on the matter, the Chairman of Maynooth Community Council, Proinnsias Breathnach, sent an urgent letter to the Chief Executive of An Post expressing concern at the proposed move on four grounds:

- 1. The inconvenience it would cause to most users due to the location of the shopping centre on the other side of the town from the main residential districts. Particular concern was expressed concerning the plight of old age pensioners.
- 2. The effect the move would have on the town centre.
- 3. The lack of consultation on the matter with the local community, given that the Post Office is a major public facility.
- 4. The need for a full-scale Post Office, run directly by An Post, in a town of Maynooth's size and status.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community Council on January 6, it was decided to formally oppose the move, and to organise a house-to-house petition. Petition forms were distributed without delay to all Council members.

The matter was discussed at a special meeting of the full Council on January 13. This meeting showed that, except in a few areas, the vast majority of residents were opposed to the move. In all, 1,150 signatures were obtained on the petition.

At this meeting, the following motion was carried by a majority of 31 votes to one, with one abstention:

"That, while having no objection to the person appointed postmaster, Maynooth Community Council objects to the relocation of Maynooth Post Office from the town centre, and calls on An Post to rescind the move."

Meanwhile, the Chairman of the Community Council received a reply from An Post in which it was stated that An Post was obliged to operate as a commerçial enterprise, would base decisions such where to locate post offices commercial considerations only. The letter confirmed that Mr. Bill Donovan, the Manager of O'Briens Supermarket, had been appointed Postmaster in Maynooth and that the Post Office would be located in a temporary premises in the shopping centre pending the construction of a permanent unit in the coming six months. The letter stated that no suitable premises could be found in the Main Street, although position of Postmaster had been advertised twice. Finally, the letter stated that the volume of business through Maynooth Post Office was too small to justify upgrading to full post office status.

The Community Council was subsequently presented with three petitions objecting to the move: one, with 903 signatures, collected by 17 traders in the Main Street and Greenfield Shopping Centre from among their customers; one containing the signatures of 37 local traders; and one, containing 145 signatures, collected at the Annual New Year's Dinner of Maynooth Old Folks Committee. The Council Chairman then wrote to the Chief Executive of An Post and the Chairman of An Post, Mr. Fergal Quinn, seeking an urgent meeting in order to present them with the four petitions and to discuss the issue. This is the latest position as these notes are being written.

Letters have also been sent to An Post by the authorities of Maynooth College (which provides most of the Maynooth Post Office's business) and the College Student Union, both objecting to the relocation. At its January meeting, the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council decided to support the position of Maynooth Community Council, as a result of which the County Development Officer wrote to An Post objecting to the move, citing the County Council's view that the move was not in keeping with the proper development of the town of Maynooth.

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
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

Dear Editor.

While I thought your condemnation of certain behaviour that occurred at Hallowe'en justified, the intemperate language used lessened the impact. It is true that there is more and more anti-social behaviour creeping into the celebration of this festival, and the question is: how can this trend be reversed?

First, let us agree that children dressing up as witches and goblins and calling around to neighbouring houses is good innocent fun; it is when we come to bonfires, bangers and firecrackers that the trouble starts.

Firecrackers and bangers are illegal and should not be sold in Ireland, yet not only is the use of these on the increase, we find certain misquided parents buying them for their children. Boys soon grow tired of setting off bangers in the open, so they start putting them through letter boxes and throwing them at people - I have seen a number of young children hadly frightened as a result of bangers exploding near them.

Apart from presenting an obvious fire hazard, bonfires attract crowds of outsiders into an estate and so provide an opportunity for rowdyism and vandalism. This year old tyres were thoughtlessly provided by certain business people so that the bonfires were on a massive scale. When the fires die down the adults go home and leave unsupervised bands of youths to roam about, some of them setting fire to dustbins and throwing missiles at houses and cars.

Parents who excuse such behaviour by saying that "boys will be boys" and that, anyway "it is part of our tradition", are being very complacent. The parents who allow their sons to roam about after dark on Hallowe'en must ask themselves just what those sons are up to. Many respectable parents are genuinely upset when told what their "nice boy" has done in the name of fun. (continued)

What then is the answer? I would make the following suggestions: 1. The Newsletter should advise parents in its October editorial to supervise their children, specially teenage boys, at Hallowe'en and to require them to be in -doors at a reasonable hour; 2. Parents should ensure that their children do not use bangers or firecrackers under any circumstances:

3. Bonfires should be kept small and should be well supervised Young people should be reminded that it is possible to have fun without resorting to anti-social behaviour.

Perhaps your readers might add their own suggestions - or would they prefer to stick their heads in the sand and profess that there is no cause for concern?

It only remains to thank the former Newsletter Committee for the very valuable service that it has provided for our community over the past ten years, a service that is too frequently taken for granted. I say, "Well done to you alland may the new committee keep up the good work".

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MAYNOOTH EMPLOYMENT OFFICE

Following representations from Maynooth Community Council, a letter was received from Barry Desmond, T.D., Minister for Social Welfare, concerning the facilities at Maynooth Employment Office. The Minister acknowledged that the existing facilities are inadequate, but pointed to the difficulties encountered in finding alternative premises. A premises had been purchased for this purpose, but had been refused planning permission following objections from local residents.

As a short-term measure, the signing-on schedule is being rearranged in order to reduce the length of queues. In the meantime, the possibility of opening additional employment offices in the area currently served by Maynooth (which includes Leixlip and Celbridge) is being investigated.

If they want ontinue their studies and obtain ualification (and nowadays it etting more and more difficult obtain any job without some her education or training), will have to apply for admission courses very soon, either through Central Applications Office CAO) or to the college itself.

Applications for admission to courses:

Central Applications Office (CAO) ents who want to follow courses he Universities, National Institutes Higher Education (NIHEs), and Dublin Institute for Technology i) must make application through CAO, Tower House, Eglinton Galway, by 1 February. The lication fee is £17. There is period of grace until 1 March, en the student can still apply £25). After 1 March, the applicin is late, but may still be accepfor a fee of £40. However, place on the preferred course y not be available, even if the didate is qualified.

dentscare advised to take great e in filling in the order of course eferences on the application m. Always list courses in strict der of preference, as places allocated, as they become ailable, on the basis of the order preference listed. Parents should icuss with their children the nsequences of their course preferces, as they affect their possible reer options. Copies of the applicon form should be kept. Course eferences may be changed up 1 July, but there will be no farantee that the new course roice will be available. After July, for a fee of £18, students ay alter their preferences, but e restricted to choosing courses one college only.

Other Institutions:

Students who want to do courses in other institutions have to apply directly to the colleges, usually around March, but the earlier the better.

2. Grants

Fees for higher level courses can be quite high, as is the cost of maintaining a student in full-time education. The Bachelor of Arts course in Maynooth College cost £808, the Bachelor of Science cost £991 in the 1985/86 academic year. Courses in Bolton St. cost from £31 7 to £620. However, grants are available in certain circumstances, as follows:-

3. Range of Courses Available:

Over the last ten years, the range of courses in higher education has expanded. There are one year certificate, National Certificate, National Diploma, Bachelor Degree courses available in Universities, NIHEs, RTCs, DIT, and other colleges in business, engineering, science, humanities, art/design. And it is not essential to have an honours leaving certificate to be accepted on to Certificate and Diploma courses. Parents and students who are interested in finding out what is available around the Maynooth area can get more information from the Directories in the Community Information Centre. There are over twenty institutions within a twenty mile radius of Maynooth where students can follow higher education courses.

Maynooth Community Information Centre is located in the Public Library (upstairs) Main Street.

Opening hours are:

Mon. - 2-4 - Wed. 10-12 2-4 - Thur. - - 7-8 Fri. 10-12 2-4 -

Vocational Education Committee Scholarships

These scholarships are administered by the local Vocational Education Committee (VEC) - care of the Technical School in Naas, in the case of Maynooth residents - and these scholarships may be obtained by students who intend to follow courses of at least two years' duration in the DIT, RTCs, NIHEs, Colleges of art as well as a number of other colleges. The means test and grant levels are the same as those for the Higher Education Grants Scheme, but a student needs only two honours and three passes in the Leaving Certificate including Irish and English. Application should be made to the VEC by 31 August.

European Social Fund Grants

These grants cover one and two year courses in the RTCs (nearest one to Maynooth is Carlow), and colleges of technology (eg. Kevin St) in areas such as Engineering, Science, Secretarial Studies, Business Studies etc. The grants are not means tested, and amount to £464 per annum if the student is living at home, or £1,160 per annum if living away from home. The Community Information Centre has a list of courses covered by this scheme.

Other Grants & Scholarships

Maynooth College provides a scholar-ship for one resident of Maynooth parish, or any of the adjoining six parishes (to the value of £808 in 1985). The scholarship is awarded on the basis of a means test and the leaving certificate result, and is usually offered to a student who would not be eligible for any other grant. There are a number of other scholarships and bursaries which may be availed of in other universities and colleges. Again, further details available in the Community Information Centre.

C.I.C. Contd

The Higher Education Grants Scheme This applies to students following full-time courses of at least two years' duration in the Universities. Teacher Training colleges, DIT, Regional Technical Colleges (RTCs), NIHEs. The grant is administered through the local authority - Kildare County Council in Naas, for Maynooth residents. To qualify, students must be aged at least 17 years on 1 January following the Leaving Certificate. They must also have passed five subjects in the Leaving Certificate with four honours and one other pass grade. The four honours may be reduced in certain circumstances, e.g. an honour in Maths be counted as two honours. as would an honour in Irish. There is also a means test applied. In 1985, a student whose parents had six dependent children and an income not exceeding £16,546 would be eligible for a grant of one quarter of lecture fees. On the other hand, a student whose parents have two dependent children and whose income does not exceed £8.880 may be eligible for the maximum grant covering lecture fees plus the maximum maintenance grant of £1,160 if the student has to study away from home, or £464 if he or she can live at home. If family circumstances change later on, the student may be eligible for an increased grant. Applications for this grant may be made to the local authority before 31 August, and after the leaving cert results have been issued.

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
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


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FINE GAEL NEWS

Dunboyne Road - Convent Lane


"That this Council would undertake immediate repairs to the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, particularly at Convent Lane."

The Maynooth By-Pass

Details of the Maynooth By-Pass Road (which will also by-pass Lucan, Leixlip, and Kilcock) were released by Kildare County Council.

The road will be built to motorway standard, which means that there will be limited access points, with other roads either passing under or over the new road.

At the Leixlip end of the County Kildare section, the new road begins with an interchange (i.e. access point for feeder roads) just south of the existing Leixlip-Lucan road between Tara Co-Op and the Toyota garage. The road then passes south of Leixlip between the built-up area and the IMP meat factory on the Celbridge road (which will pass over the new road).

The road carries on westwards to the north of Celbridge and approaches Maynooth just to the south of Ballygoran Cross on the Celbridge-Maynooth road. The latter road will pass over the by pass road, while other roads in this area will be re-aligned. The new road will intersect with the Straffan Road passing over the by-pass, and slip roads providing access to the by-pass.

The new road will then pass under the Rathcoffey Road at Perry Twomey's (beyond Cluain Aoibhinn). It will also pass under the Treadstown Laragh, Brangstown-Laragh, and Kilcock-Clane Roads before eventually merging with the main Galway Road west of Kilcock. There will be some re-alingning of local roads along the Maynooth-Kilcock stretch of the by-pass.

This means that the only access point to the by-pass between Kilcock and Lucan will be at the Straffan This has several implications. It means that all traffic from the Maynooth area and to the north seeking access to the motorway will be channelled onto the Straffan Road, which passes through the residential district of the and along which there is very heavy pedestrian traffic. It will also put considerable extra pressure on the road bridge the station, which is already extremely inadequate. It is also likely that Old Greenfield Lane

would be heavily used by traffic

from the Cluain Aoibhinn/College

Green/Beaufield/Newtown area.

At the moment, a large volume of heavy traffic comes into Maynooth from the Dunboyne direction. This might be intesified by the availability of the by-pass, with the result of attracting a lot of heavy vehicles through the town centre and out of the Staffan Road. On the other hand, other proposed road improvements in the Dublin area, including the Western Ring Road and the new Navan Road section at Clonsilla, could

also have the effect of diverting

much of the traffic which currently comes through Maynooth from the north side.

Maynooth Community Council will be discussing these and other aspects of the by-pass with Kildare County Council's engineering staff. Already, a suggestion that the link road from Maynooth to the by-pass be located to the east of the town (perhaps Blacklion via a new section of road linking with the Grangewilliam -Ballygoran Road) is being examined by County Council engineers.

Any groups or members of the public who have reservations about the proposed by-pass (maps of which may be viewed in Maynooth-Public Library) should send these in writing to the County Council or the Department of the Environment All objects will be given the right to appear before a Public Inquiry which is to be held sometime during the coming summer. The plans may be altered depending on the Inquiry findings. Constrution of the by-pass may begin towards the end of 198 7.

All through the years we have stood outside our favourite hostelry on a Friday Evening choking on the exhaust fumes belching forth from the confusion of buses, articulated trucks and luggage laden cars as they crawled through the Main Street, and we have prayed for the relief of a by-pass operation, before we asphyxiated. And now, our prayers have been answered - or have they?

When is a by-pass not a by-pass? we note that the only access to the new motor -way between Leixlip and Kilcock is going to bring more traffic through the Main Street and through a road which has resembled for years, the worst trenches in the Somme. Have the Engineers worked out how much extra traffic is going to be generated by the Straffan Road interchange with the by-pass?

The money for the motorway will come from State and EEC funds. Who's going to pay the millions of pounds it's going to cost to make a road out of the post monsoon river bed that passes for the Straffan Road? At the moment it is obvious that the County Council can't afford to keep two lumps of tarmac together, never mind build a new access road. Over the years we've watched our roads disintegrate with nothing being done to maintain them effectively. The budget raised car taxes, and what is the money being spent on? Certainly not on raods in Kildare. We're paying for the pot holes in punctured tyres, shattered suspensions, broken bones, and dry cleaning bills. Protests please, to Kildare County Council.

So, you didn't get any Valentine's cards, and the cheque is still in the post, and you haven't seen the three-year-old recently? Have you thought of looking in the new post box which erupted in the Main Street recently? It has an opening so large that we're told you could lose an arm and a leg in it; and also extract whatever letter takes your fancy. Reading your neighbours' love letters is made even easier by the ludicrous timing of the postal collections - last collection 2.30pm which means that the mail posted in the afternoon piles up inside until it spills out onto the street. What kind of service is that, other than for people with steaming kettles and an insatiable curiosity?

Finally some good news. The editorial committee is delighted with the response to last month's new look edition - which was sold out within a few days. We have received so much material this month that we have considerably increased the number of pages, still excellent value at 20p.

We welcome contributions in the form of news, views, abuse, but because of space limitations we are going to have to ask our contributors to limit their contributions to no more than 500 words and our deadline for submission will be applied, impartially but without mercy. BLACKLION SITE

Following the Council's meeting with the members of the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council a reply from the County Manager has been received regarding this matter. The reply reads as follows

"The Council has bought land at Blacklion Maynooth, in order to enable it to develop a fully serviced halting place which will cater for 6 families at maximum. The site will be developed in accordance with standards laid down by the Department of the Environment and will be supervised by the Council through the appointment of a caretaker. 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

DUBLIN

Lock gate construction is continuing at the RCAG/ AnCO workshop in Watling Street. Three pairs of gates destined for the 5th lock at Cross Guns were completed in November and are being stored temporarily at CIE's Inchicore Works. A full set of new gates for the 2nd lock. The RCAG applied to the Inner City, Section of Dublin Corporation for further financial assistance towards the cost of this work, and is also seeking a grant to complete the restoration of the last two locks within the City, the 6th lock at Shandon Gardens and the 7th lock at Liffey Junction.

The RCAG has received an amenity grant from Dublin County Council of £10,000 towards the cost of completing the restoration of the lith Lock at Ashbrook. Timber for new middle and tail gates has been delivered to Watling Street and it is hoped to complete the gates by early summer.

LUCAN & LEIXLIP

The boat store and its surroundings near Leixlip are taking on a new look thanks to another AnCO Project sponsored by the Dublin Branch of the RCAG. The boat store has been painted externally and the walls are to be rendered. Inside an upper floor has been constructed over part of the area to increase the storage capacity of the building. A piped stream running through the site has been uncovered and cleaned out and at the time of writing the pipes are about to be replaced. This has delayed the work of landscaping and develop ment of the site as an amenity area, but hopefully

this will get underv the very near future.

At the 13th lock the new gate needed for full restoration is on site awaiting New paddles installation. and guides for the land sluices are being made in Watling Street and will be installed shortly. Meanwhile, the level immediately below the lock is being dredged for a distance of about 200 yards to remove a build-up of silt deposited by a drain which enters the canal a few yards below The JORB Deey Bridge. drag line is being used for this work. The IORB will also be used to clean out the lock chamber as soon as the machine is modified to accept a grab in place of the drag bucket.





is a broad training and xperience course to assist oung adults make the transion from a school envirnment to a work envirnment.

he course has been running ince 2 December 1985 nd the trainees have now uccessfully completed he first two 'modules' resections. The first section llowed trainees to explore nd discuss various issues slating to work and prearation for a working envirnment. We looked at opics such as interviews, rade Unions, Uemployment nd Decision-Making. nportant part of this section as to allow the trainees) decide on a plan of action or themselves which they ust acheive by the end the course. Such decisions e seen as very important trainees are challenged take responsibility for peir actions and work wards an aim set for nemselves. Such aims clude gaining apprenticeips, improving technical tills and of course, being a better position to get job.

Interviews,

ection 2 of the course onsisted of two weeks ractical work training shops, garages, offices

and other workplaces. With the generous cooperation of various employers in the area, the trainees got a chance to experience working in a real work environment and the demands made by that position. It gave them an opportunity to use their knowledge and skills and, with the employers help, to identify areas they needed to improve On the whole, the work training went very well. The trainees enjoyed their work and in most cases managed to learn useful skills. A few of them gained apprenticeships and the promise of a full-time job

present the trainees are on part 3 of the programme which is practical skills training. The group have now joined ranks with another group of trainees from Naas to participate in various workshops where they will learn skills such as upholstery, furniture making, crafts, mechanics, home maintenance, woodwork, computers and secretarial procedure.

from the course, which

was a very satisfactory

situation for all concerned.

At this stage some trainees have decided to specialise in one particular skill which they feel can benefit them while others have chosen a combination. Whatever their choice the programme encourages them to work in an area that suits their interests, their potential, meet local skill requirements and is in line with overall employment trends.

The question most often posed in relation to the course is "Will the trainee be guaranteed jobs from It would be entirely it?" dishonest of me or anyone else to answer 'yes' given the current unemployment situation combined with the youth and inexperience of the trainees. However we are working on the trainees employment situation in 2 ways; first the prog-

ramme can put some trainees in a better position to get one of the few jobs going around by improving their skills, knowledge and experience over the six-month period. Secondly we are exploring the whole idea of self-employment with the trainees. We encourage them to look towards the long-term and covers the possibility of using their skills to set up their own business as individuals in a community-based workshop. We look forward to working with the Maynooth Community Council and other interested groups and individuals towards this end.

We would ask any employers in the Maynooth area who may be looking for staff in the near future to contact us about the trainees on the course. An. honest and accurate assessment of the trainees' work and personal skills will be supplied. We can also help employers with salary arrangements for a limited period up to May, 1986. Therefore, if you have a vacancy or an idea which will help some young person to find employment why not contact us at the address listed below.

Finally, the Community Council and in particular Siobhan Hall, must be thanked for all their work in publicising the programme and helping us to get it off the ground. The Bru Bosco Youth Club also proved of immense help especially by making the Geraldine Hall available for parts of the course. The M.A.D.E. group were most co-operative in sharing their own facilities with the trainees. To these and all other associated with the course a sincere thanks.

ST. PATRICK

When he was a young boy he was captured by Irish raiders who brought him to Ireland. He was sold as a slave to a chieftain named Miliuc and he put Patrick on Sliabh Mish herding swine.

At the end of six years he escaped and went on board a ship and he succeeded in reaching his own people once more.

St. Patrick wanted to become a priest so he spent some time studying in a monastery near Tours in France.

In 432 A.D. Patrick landed with a band of monks at Saul in County Down and celebrated his first Mass on Irish soil. St. Patrick wished to obtain permission to teach the Christian faith so he travelled form Saul to Tara. At that time Laoghaire was the High-King and when St. Patrick reached Slane a fire was

lighted at Tara in honour of the pagan festival. All other fires were forbidden until the Tara fire had burned out and when the High-King was told that a fire had been lit on the hill of Slane he immediately set out with his soldiers and druids.

When St. Patrick had spoken to him a change came over the King and he gave Patrick permission to teach in every part of the country

From Tara he went to Connacht where he spent a Lenten season.

On a mountain known as Croagh Patrick, St. Patrick built a Church at Armagh and made it the ecclesiastical capital of Ireland.

St. Patrick died at Saul in the year 46l A.D. and he was buried in Downpatrick. He was very successful and he brought Christian Religion all over Ireland. As well as putting the snakes out of the country he also founded many monasteries and schools.

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
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




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MAYNOOTH POST OFFICE

Following its special meeting of January 13th last to discuss the relocation of Maynooth Post Office, Maynooth Community Council wrote to An Post seeking an urgent meeting with the Chairman and Chief Executive to discuss the issue. The near-unanimous vote of the Council condemning the move was brought to An Post's attention, as were the various petitions which the Council has assembled.

On January 22nd, two senior executives from An Post came to Maynooth to meet the Chairman of the Community Council, Proinnsias Breathnach, about the matter. The executives stated that they had originally wanted to keep the Office in the Main Street, that the application to locate in O'Brien's Shopping Centre was only suitable one they had to explain what was inadequate with the other applications which proposed to provide town centre premises for the Post Office. The Community Council chairman emphasised that the Council was unable to accept An Post's position and would continue to campaign for the return of the Post Office to the Main Street.

On February 3rd, a deputation consisting of Proinnsias Breathnach (Community Council), Joseph Buckley (Main Street Traders) and Carol Barton (Old Folks'Committee), met with Mr. Bill Donovan, the new Postmaster. The deputation pointed to the massive popular opposition to the Post Office's relocation, and to the great inconvenience which the move would cause to most Post Office customers, especially the old and infirm, and mothers with young children. The deputation emphasised that there was no objection to Mr. Donovan's appointment as Postmaster, and acknowledged his kind gestures to the town's old folk over the years.

Mr. Donovan replied that he was already committed to locating the Post Office in one of the new units currently being constructed

at the back of O'Brien's Supermarket. He had gone to considerable expense in having the temporary premises built, and while he might be prepared to move back to the Main Street when a suitable premises became available, he did not indicate any possibility of such a move in the immediate foreseeable future.

The Community Council has since

written to Mr. Donovan expressing its continuing dissatisfaction with the relocation of the Post Office. Council also drew attention to the very unsatisfactory situation regarding the post box which was placed in the Main Street outside the old Post Office building, in relation to frequency of collections security. The Council has also made some suggestions to Mr. Donovan for improving pedestrian access to the new Post Office, in terms of footpaths, pedestrian crossings, and regulation of traffic flow around the Shopping Centre.

The Community Council has also made further representations to An Post on the matter. the considerable media coverage which the controversy has obtained, and a wide range of protests from organisations and individuals from the Maynooth area, An Post has remained unyielding.

The controversy has raised major questions concerning the democratic rights of communities and the public answerability of state bodies providing crucial community services such as An Post. It is vital that the pressure be kept on, in order that such organisations are no longer allowed to ride roughshod over the wishes of their clients and customers, and that the monopoly powers vested in An Post are abused no further. All readers, there -fore, are urged to write to the Chief Executive of An Post at the GPO, Dublin I, and to send copies of their letters to their local representatives.

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

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
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

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CARTON NEWS The Carton Committee is arowing

increasingly anxious about the future of Carton House and Demesne. Within the past twelve months in the Dublin region a number of Houses have received publicity either as a result of their sale. their imminent destruction or their takeover by Dublin County Council. Unfortunately for Carton, its location in Cc. Kildare whose council is poorer than Dublin's, has prevented it from being taken over and developed as an important regional amenity by the Local Authority. On the other hand, Kildare County Council has shown itself to be very favourably disposed towards Carton and the retention of House and Demesne as an integral unit. The government, and Mr. Nealon's office in particular, are also favourably disposed towards Carton and The Taoiseach is also keen to see the House and Demesne restored. Nothing concrete has happened, however, to raise one's hopes about Carton's future security and the fear is that it will fall through the grid of "favourable intentions".

We are increasingly anxious about the limbo-land in which the property now exists. It has been very much out of the public eye of late and there are signs around the demesne of gradual neglect. The perimeter wall is damaged in a few places; one of the sets of piers on the Dunboyne Road has been badly damaged; the statuary is neglected and the trees show clear signs

of decay and neglect. The boat house looks increasingly forlorn and the Shell House shows evidence of abuse in its surroundings. The House itself continues in a tolerable state of repair; how long it can remain so, in its present unoccupied state, is anybody's quess.

The Carton Committee continues to hope that its proposals for the development of this 1200 acre demesne as an amenity resource of national importance can still be realised. Its aspirations were outlined in an exhibition - currently displayed in Castletown House submitted for the National Heritage Award. The long-term plans would see the demesne being developed as a parkland, not only for use as a recreational and amenity resource, but also as an historical reconstruction of an 18th century demesne in association with the Great House and its accompanying suite of yards. The carriage yards, carpenter's yard, kitchen yard etc, the House and all the other elements of the built environment of Carton can be presented, not just as museum pieces, but as authentic buildings with continuing utility. The House, for example, was of considerable interest to the National Museum. It now appears that with the completion of the Royal Hospital at Kilmainham, the Museum's interest has turned desperately elsewhere. The government cannot make up its mind ... We all know it's got no money; it also seems to suffer from planning paralysis when it

comes to the National Museum. The Carton Committee, also, of course, emphasises the importance of Carton in context. The village of Maynooth is the estate village of the Dukes of Leinster, and with a little consideration and planning on the part of the inhabitants, might be restored to a semblance of its former elegance. In this context, the Committee was pleased to see the interest in the Community Council's shopfront competition. There is no doubt that there will be economic gains to be obtained from reestablishing Maynooth's historic distinctiveness (in the way of intercepted through traffic. for example). The decision of An Post, however, to relocate the Post Office away from the Main Street is a blow to plans to upgrade and strengthen the status of the village's most important street. The post office must be viewed as a primary function of the Main Street and if Maynooth is going to a developerity heritage potential as a future tourist resource the central location of the Post Office is essential. The Carton Committee would therefore support the current campaign to restore the Post Office to its Main Street location.

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

DEAR EDITOR

In response to the letter in the March edition of the Maynooth Newsletter, I wish to point out a few inaccuracies and comment on the letter itslef.

Firstly, the writer stated that there has been no rent increase for the last three years. This is untrue. In 1984 (one year ago) the rent paid by students in a self-catering arrangement rose from £13.00 to £14.50.

While the rent paid by students in a full-board arrangement did not actually rise in monetary terms, since 1985 (this academic landladies are no longer obliged to provide a packed lunch for their tenants, thus reducing the cost incurred by landladies. (Full Board £42).

Secondly, the writer stated that some students are not placed inthe type of accommodation

Entranting to the standard sta requested by them and thus leave landladies "high and dry" during the year. This again is inaccurate, in that in the vast majority of cases students are placed in the type of accommodation requested. However, for various reasons of their own some students decide during the year fthat they would prefer to live elsewhere. There is nothing that can be done to alleviate this.

> While dthere is the possibility that the rents will be increased this year, I would like to add that in present times students simply cannot afford to pay out a large sum of money every week for rent.

> Hoping these facts will be noted in reference to this topic in future.

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

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



MAYNOOTH FIRE BRIGADE

Maynooth residents are very fortunate to have the services of the eight members of the brigade, who all live and work in Maynooth, available on call, twenty four hours a day, seven days a week. They are alerted by bleepers which they carry everywhere. When a call for assistance is received by Fire Officer Michael O'Riordan, he relays the message to the fire men wherever they are. The Brigade will be recruiting soon. The upper age limit is 55 years. and members must be in good health, and be extremely fit.

On average, the Brigade is called out between 250 and 300 times a year. In the last two weeks in February this year, there were 22 calls. calls are not always to do with fires or road accidents. The Brigade has rescued cats in trees, a child stuck in a chimney, a dog in a drain.

Unfortunately, some calls turn out to be bogus, wasting valuable time, and possibly having tragic consequences for someone in real need at the same time. The Brigade must turn out for all emergency calls, as they cannot afford to waste time in establishing whether callers

The majority of fire calls are for chimney fires, and for attendance at these there is a fee of £20 - not much when the potential for disaster is considered, but it would be cheaper to clean the chimney regularly.

Michael O'Riordan and other members of the Brigade are happy to advise the public on questions relating to fire prevention and fire safety. Michael will talk to any Resident's Association or other organisations who want to inform themselves on the He can be contacted at 285555. For the benefit of

readers of the Newsletter, Michaell and Lenny Murphy gave some advice on what to do if a fire breaks out, and most important how to ensure that a fire doesn't break out in the first place.

If a fire breaks out

- The best way to extinguish a fire is to smother it, withdrawing the oxygen it needs to keep going. Never throw water on burning fat or oil. But, the best advice is to get out fast.
- Close all doors, as this helps to contain the fire in the room, preventing it from spreading rapidly. Most internal doors are designed to withstand fire for at least 30 minutes.
- Ring the fire brigade at 285555 as this will put you in touch directly with the Maynooth fire brigade. Otherwise, ring 999 and ask specifically for the Maynooth Service.
- Never go back to retrieve belongings - your life is worth more than property. Wait for the fire brigade; they have the equipment to enter burning buildings.



How to prevent fire

- Develop a system of nightly checks. The last person to bed
- pull out all plugs
- put the firequard in front of the fire
- empty ashtrays
- close all doors
- overload sockets. rats can chew through wires, causing potential fire hazards.
- Hold a fire drill. Imagine there is a fire in the house and each room. Establish an assembly point so that everyone gathers in the same place, making it easier to spot if someone is
- Install a smoke detector somewhere around the hall and bedrooms. Most loss of life in fires at night is caused by smoke and toxic fumes given off by the synthetic materials that most modern furniture is made A smoke detector is fairly inexpensive, and Michael O'Riordan can give advice on where to buy one and the best place for installation.

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
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GREENFIELD ESTATE RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION.



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REPORT OF STATES OF STATES

WOMEN AT WAR.

The admission of women to the armed forces in recent years was rightly hailed as a victory for Women's Lib., but, as the saying goes, "there is nothing new under the sun," for in ancient Ireland the woman had the right, nay, was duty-bound to take her place beside her man on the battlefield. The Roman, Solinus, was prompted to write in 238 A.D., "The Hibernian woman is warlike beyond the rest of her sex, she places the first morsel of food in her child's mouth with the point of a sword." (The same chap also tells us that there were no snakes in Ireland in his time, thus depriving St. Patrick of one of his better tricks.)

The life of Cúchulainn was profoundly influenced by three female warriors. In his youth he learned his "Many, varied and wondrous arts of war" from the Scottish teacher Scathach. This newly acquired knowledge he used to overcome the Heroine Aoife and force her into marriage with him. She bore a son, raised him as a warrior and on reaching manhood sent him against

Cúchul ain to exact vengence for her earlier humiliation. In ignorance Cúchul ain slew his only offspring on Baile strand in Co.Louth.

The Tain bo Cuailgne (cattle raid on Cooley) which led to the death of Cuchul ainn was organised by Maeve, Queen of Connaught. She is portrayed as the out and out villian of the piece, wrongly so, as she was simply indulging in the national pastime of the day (i.e. cattle rustling).

Nor were the women of the Fianna any less warlike. One night Fionnn Mac Cumhail, leader of the Leinster Fianna, threw a party at his fort at Allen, during which he had a bit of a row with one Goll Mac Morna,

Chief of the Connaught Fianna. One thing led to another and soon everybody was at each other's throats and as the chronicler said, "Bad was the place for a mild smooth-fingered woman, or a weak, infirm man or an aged, long-lived elder". When proceedings were eventually halted and the place cleared, 1,100 of Fionn's people were found dead and Goll had lost II men and 50 women. There was certainly no discrimination against the female of the species, in matters of war at any rate.

High King of Ireland at that time was Cormac Mac Airt and when asked by his son Cairbre for his opinion of women, answered bitterly "I can hardly describe them. Their advice is foolish, they are forgetful of love, headstrong in their desires, fond of folly, prone to rash engagements, given to swearing, proud to be asked in marriage, tenacious enemies cheerless at the banquet, rejectors of conciliation, prone to strife, of much garrulity. Woe to him who desires or serves a bad woman. Woe to every man who has a bad wife." 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
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
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MAYNOOTH MORTALITY SOCIETY

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

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

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

KINGSBRY ESTATE

Cllr. Stagg has informed the Residents Association in Kingsbry Estate that he is pursuing the following:-

- I. Provision of additional public lighting between the entrance of the estate and Rail Park. The County Council have been requested to provide these lights from the development evies collected from the developer of the Estate.
- 2. Arrangements have been made for a joint inspection of possible sites for the bus stop and turning point by the Council and C.I.E. engineers. It is hoped that this matter can be quickly resolved.
- 3. Cllr. Stagg has requested the County Council to have the Developer of Kingsbry keep the main road in a state suitable for use and in accordance with his planning permission.
- 4. Information has been requested on the Council's plans for improving Straffan Road and Mullen Bridge in view of the proposed use of this road as the intersection link of Maynooth to the new By-Pass.

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DONAL O BUACHALLA AND THE MAYNOOTH MEN OF 1916

Donal O Buachalla was in close contact with Padraig Pearse as early as 1906 when Pearse defended him in a court case in Celbridge. O Bucahalla had been summoned for putting his name in Irish on the shop. He lost the case and refused to pay the fine in lieu of which a roll of cloth was confiscated from the shop.

A local man, Patrick Fitzsimons, paid the fine, redeemed the roll of cloth and returned it to O Buachalla.

In the same year he started a branch of the Gaelic League in Maynooth. Support, however, was not forthcoming and it ceased to function after about a year.

When Padraig Pearse opened his school, St. Enda's, in Rathfarnham in 1908 O Buachalla's eldest son was among the first admitted. He attended it for eight years and completed his Leaving Certificate there in 1916.

In 1914 Donal O Buachalla became active in the volunteers and formed a company in Maynooth. They held their meetings in what was then known as the general hall on the Main Street, where Fusciardi's Take-Away is situated today. He set about arming his men and in a short while he acquired an ample supply of shotguns and cartridges, his own personal weapon was a fine Mauser Rifle which he had bought and trained himself An order was placed to use. with Henshaws, the local Hardware store, who had a factory in Clonsilla, to produce a quantity of pikes, a most effective weapon against the mounted lancers, they expected to encounter. (These pikes, it is understood were used in O'Connell St., during Easter Week).

Volunteers were raided several times for arms but nothing was ever found.

A .22 rifle was used for target practice and when the English stopped the entry of arms and ammunition into Ireland during the Great War, O Buachalla and a comrade crossed to Liverpool, acquired 5,000 rounds and smuggled it into Ireland so that training was not interrupted.

The Rising was planned for Easter Sunday but O'Neill's countermanding order in the morning papers of that day stopped mobilisation. However early on Monday a bread van driver brought news to Maynooth that there was shooting in Dublin. The Rising was on after all.

By 7 p.m. on that evening the Maynooth men were making their final preparations in the big store at the back of O Buachalla's shop, present were Tom Byrne, Patrick Colgan, Pat Weafer, Tom Harris, Joe Ledwidge, Jack Maguire, Jim Tyrell, Mattie Maguire, Tom Morgan, Dr. Ted O'Kelly, Patsy Kirwan, Jack Graves and Willie Regan. (The latter two actually worked for O Buachalla in his shop). The group filed out, lined up two abreast and marched down the Main Street towards the College. On the way they were joined by Oliver Ryan. Two Policemen who were following them were sent on their way when Ted O'Kelly brandished his revolver and threatened to shoot them.

At the College they met the Vice-President who tried to dissuade them from their venture but they were adamant and he (Canon James McCaffrey) finally granted them absolution. On the advice of Tom Byrne who fought with the Boers in the Boer War, they went on foot to Dublin along by the canal to avoid opposition they might encounter along the way. They spent the night in Glasnevin Cemetry and marched through the empty streets on Tuesday morning. On reaching the G.P.O. they were greeted with a resounding cheer and warmly welcomed by Pearse.

Because he was in possesion: of a rifle, Donal O Buachalla was first sent to Parliament St., to deal with snipers on top of City Hall. From there he was recalled to the tower in Cleary's as O'Connell St., was at the mercy of members of Officers Training Corps in Trinity Collège who were reputed to be "fairly good shots". When soldiers were seen to have entered Mc Birney's he was moved to Arnott's tower from which vantage point he had a clear view of proceedings in Mc Birney's. At the end of the week he was brought back to the G.P.O.

When the cause was seen to be lost evacuation was attempted but most of the rebels were rounded-up. O Buachalía, however, managed to evade the cordon of soldiers by walking up Moore Street. He was leading towards Broadstone Station in the vain hope of catching a goods train to Maynooth. He slept out that night and the following morning was confronted by a soldier in Dominic Street who fired a shot at him. Luckily, the bullet passed through the padding of his coat, causing no bodily harm. He was then arrested and taken to join his captured comrades.

Of the Maynooth men only Pat Weafer and Joe Ledwidge managed to make their way home. The others were all arrested and shipped across to England where they were interned in Nutts -ford, Stafford and in camps in North Wales.

At first there was great resentment towards the men of 1916, but the execution of the leaders effected a change of heart among the ordinary people of Ireland and when the prisoners were released in June of 1917 they were hailed as heroes. Their idealism, courage and nobility and the honourable way in which they conducted their

affairs has been recognised around the world as a watershed in Irish history. Go mbeidh a leitheidi ann aris.

Donal O Buachalla went on to represent Kildare in Dail Eireann for many years. He became the last Governor-General the 29th of November, 1963, and Information for this article.

THE TEACHERS STRIKE

Will there be an end to the teachers strike? After the government's decision not to honour the arbitrators award it looked a certainty for a strike which the government would lose. Surely they would have to pay the teachers in the end? But this hasn't happened and instead of bringing matters quickly to a head the teachers have matched the governments cynicism with their own brand. Striking for the middle three days of the week so that they still get paid 4/7th of their salary they have tried to use threat of examination cancellation to force the governments hand. This teachers action thus causes maximum disruption of the students and worries for their parents while having the minimum effect on the teachers pay. It is difficult to sympathise with either the government or the teachers as the twardy squabble continues into the summer. We have a right to expect better leadership and example from both sides.

BUILDING ON REALITY

No not government policy but the way housing is being developed in Maynooth, Have you noticed how all the houses now being built in the new developments are, to a large extent, identical. Where is there any variety? Apart from a few exceptions like the apartments in the square and Leinster Park the choice for the home buyer (and especially the second or third time home buyer) is limited. Compare us with Celbridge where there is apparently a far greater choice in a large variety of differing locations. This may not seem to be a problem right now but then neither was Clondalkin ten years ago.

ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL

There is an article in the Newsletter this month discussing the problem of litter and pollution - and what a problem it is. With so many looking for work it seems crazy that in some places around the town you go wading through litter as though it were leaves in the Autumn. Everybody seems to complain about it but nothing gets done. On a more particular note there is the problem of domestic animals turned loose to roam around the estates and soil pavements, roads and gardens(not their owners). Apart from the obvious health hazards created by our furry friends there are identical problems like them being traffic hazards and their interfering with bins. This is a problem that will have to be tackled. Those who throw litter often cannot be caught but animals belong to individuals and those individuals must be held reponsible for the actions of their pets.

Hope to see you here again next month.

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

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
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WORLD RECORD ATTEMPT

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Tom McGarry and Tommy Carey threw over 17000 darts to notch up a score of 338,394 at O'Connors Hibernian House pub in Celbridge. Before a capacity audience, they threw darts from 10 am. to 11.15 p.m (the first 30 mins behind closed doors) with just three 25 minute breaks.

It is estimated they walked 27 miles during the event and the rigours they endured were apparent the following day when Tommy Carey's right hand was swollen to twice its normal size and Tom McGarry's right elbow and wrist were also badly swollen. Tommy Carey was understandably said to be "crashed out" on Sunday and had to get some medication for his hand but Tom McGarry defied all logic when he went to play in the Kildare section of the National mixed pairs competition in the Brownstown Inn. "I didn't do so well. I was not able to throw but felt I could not let my partner down" he said. The present world record for 12 hours was set up over eighteen hours with lengthy breaks. But the Celbridge men made their bid in just 13 hours and even then they broke the world record that applied early last year.

Since then, however, it has been upped to a score of 408,000. They were confined to 13 hours because of the pub licensing laws but they feel confident they could have broken the record if they had the 18 hours. "We will very definitely be trying again," said Tom McGarry.

They had to undergo three months hard training to have any chance of holding out until the end. This involved leg and arm exercises "There is great strain on the right arm and leq. I wouldn't advise anyone to attempt it without training. A few tried it but had to give up half way through" said Tom McGarry. The pair were throwing seven hands per minute for the first three hours. They increased to eight hands per minute and for the last three hours they were throwing nine hands per Although aware of the need for training, they did not realise how much the feat would affect them. They had a doctor on call all day but he was not needed.

About 7 p.m. they hit what is known as the "Wall" and would never have continued but for the encouragement of the on-They did not falter either, despite knowing after the first three hours that the world record was beyond them on the basis of 13

He played once for Leinster and won, and reached two All-Ireland finals. The Social Club and the local Care of the Aged Committee will benefit from sponsorship.

The scores were being verified during the week by Kildare Darts Organisation and, later by the I.N.D.O. The two are delighted with their performance and did not think they would do so well. They thanked the bar staff and supporters, without whom they could not have completed the feat.

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

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

Maternity Allowance

There are two Maternity Allowance schemes. One is a special scheme for employed women who have a certain level of social insurance contributions and who are entitled to maternity leave. Under this scheme you get a weekly allowance of 70% of your average weekly earnings in the previous tax year, subject to a minimum of £7.05 per week. This is payable for fourteen weeks. As and from April 6,

1986: the relevant stax year is April 1984 to April 1985. A person who is entitled to the Maternity Allowance for employed women but who hadn'tan income for that year will be paid the minimum rate of £ 7.05.

The general Maternity Allowance scheme is for women who have been employed in the past but are not in employment at the time they apply. Women who have become unemployed could qualify. Again you need to have a minimum social insurance contributions record. If you qualify you get an allowance for twelve weeks. Pay-related Benefit is payable for the last nine weeks if you are eligible for it. Apply to the Department of Social Welfare, Gandon House, Amiens Street, Dublin I. Telephone:

Application forms are available in the Information Centre.

Tax Relief on Medical Expenses

In certain cases it is possible to claim tax relief on medical An individual who expenses. spends more than £50 a year on "health care" can claim tax relief on the excess over £50. Similarly in the case of a family the excess of £100 can qualify for tax relief.

"Health Care" is defined as prevention, diagnosis, alleviation or treatment of an ailment, injury, infirmity, defect or disability, and includes care which is received by a woman in respect of a pregnancy other than routine medical care. It does not include routine ophthalmic treatment or routine dental treatment.

Doctor's services, hospital services, prescribed drugs and medicines and other services such as physiotherapy may attract this type of tax relief. However, you are not entitled to tax relief on any expenses which you have incurred and which are reimbursed or may be reimbursed from any source such as a Health Board, V.H.I., or other health insurance, or compensation from your employer.

You apply for tax relief on a special form (Med I) which you send to your local tax office. If you are eligible you will get a repayment of tax.

Charges Remain

The publics faith in local public representatives suffered a severe set back at a regency meeting of Kildare County Council, in which it was considering the Councils Budget for 1986. Two motions were before the meeting: One was put forward by F.F. and proposed that the estimates be accepted without the inclusion of local charges: (An amendment to this by Cllr. Stagg that showed an alternative savings to the charges was rejected by the Council with F.F. Support). The second motion was tabled by Bernard Durkan: This accepted the budget as presented and an increase in the charges from £50 p.a. to £60 p.a. (This was amended to reduce the charges to £50 p.a.)

The F.F. motion was carried by 14 votes to 9. However at this point all F.F. councillors walked out of the meeting, in the full knowledge that they left behind a majority in favour of Durkan's motion and the charges. Durkan's motion was duly carried by 9 votes to 4. F.F. have by their walk out ensured the continuation of local charges in Kildare for another year. Despite their firm promises to the electorate that they would do the opposite, They can never be trusted again.

Bus Service to Straffan Road

A meeting between Council and C.I.E. Engineers was arranged by Cllr. Stagg on Wednesday the 26th of March. To examine the best possibilities. Various sites for stops and turning points were inspected and a decision is expected shortly. The Branch welcomes the progress in providing this badly needed service.

Bord Telecom Activity

The placing of telegraph wires underground will improve the visual amenity of our town, and is to be welcomed. However the methods being used by the organisations involved are leaving our road and footpaths in a dangerous and unacceptable condition: Strong representations have been made at our request to Bord Telecom by Cllr. Stagg.

Travellers Halting Site

At a recent meeting of Kildare County Council Cllr. Stagg expressed dissatisfaction at the long delay in aquiring "Department Approval" for the halting site for travellers at Balcklion, Maynooth. The County Council had acquired the land and submitted it's plans and the approval of the local

community, through the community council, had been received. It was unacceptable that the project should now be delayed by lack of action by the Department that had first urged the Council to act on this matter, he said.

Employment Exchange

It was noted at a recent branch meeting that the reorganisation of 'Signing On' times at the employment exchange has eliminated the extremes of excess queueing. However the branch are not satisfied that the changes meet our earlier complaints and we are pressing ahead for the acquisition of suitable alternative premises or the temporary use of the local community hall. Until those who are unemployed can draw their unemployment benefit and assistance allowances in dignity and privacy we will continue to campaign on this

FIANNA FAIL CUMANN NEWS

The following is a letter from Coras lompair Eireann to Cllr. Gerry Brady.

I refer to your letter of the 7th of March concerning services in the Celbridge area.

There are at present, substantial service levels from Celbridge and Maynooth to Dublin on routes 67 and 66 respectively, while there is no direct bus service between Celbridge and Maynooth.

We are very much aware of the pace of development of the towns of North East Kildare. We are also aware that each is still heavily dependent on Dublin city and county for employment and to an extent for higher education, shopping, services and leisure. What is less certain is the interrelationships between Leixlip, Celbridge and Maynooth, and which of the resulting travel needs can be satisfied by public transport.

Such information can really only be determined by intensive household - level surveys. About a year ago we began to advise local representatives, resident associations and the Council that AnCO could arrange a Community Survey Program which would study travel needs. Such information would be an invaluable basis for public transport in the area. AnCO can only act if they are approached directly by the community. Despite continous exhortations on our part, no such approach has been made. Perhaps you could again discuss this with the local associations.

S NATIONAL MANPOWER SERVICE - AT WORK IN YOUR LOCAL AREA.

The National Manpower Service (N.M.S.) is the point of access for all state-sponsored man power initiatives. While responsibility for the operation and administration of individual programmes may rest with other agencies, i.e. AnCO, Y.E.A, and CERT, N.M.S. Placement Officers can always provide the necessary linkages to the most appropriate service.

Whether you are an unemployed person seeking work or training, an employer with jobs or work experience place to offer, or a community leader with ideas for a local work project, your local placement officer will be able to make an initial and speedy assessment of your situation and steer you in the right direction.

Mr. Des Murray is the Placement Officer for the North Kildare Area (Celbridge, Leixlip, Kilcock, Maynooth). Based at Quadrant House, Chapelizod, Dublin 20. Des Murray holds a clinic each Tuesday and Thursday at 2 p.m. - 4 p.m. in the Library, Main Street, Maynooth, Co. Kildare.

"NO JOB" - MAYBE WE CAN

The first step of any job seeker/changer should be to contact the local National Manpower Officer. Remember, that even though they have more job seekers than jobs on their book, they did place 25,000 in jobs last year.

If the National Manpower Service cannot get you a job straight away they can give advice on job and training opportunities or perhaps place you on one of the employment schemes, such as the Work Experience Programme. Below is a brief summary of some of the employment schemes run by the N.M.S.

THE WORK EXPERIENCE

PROGRAMME: Designed for first time job seekers who find themselves in the catch 22 situation "No Job, No Experience". The programme is aimed at young people under twenty five and are placed with co-operating firms as supplementary personnel over a period of twenty six weeks. Each trainee is given an allowance of £34.50 per week whilst on the training scheme.

SOCIAL EMPLOYMENT SCHEME: The aim of the scheme is to provide a year's employment, working on projects which will be of benefit to the community for those who have been unemployed for a year or more and are over 25. Each participant of the scheme is paid £70 for a 2.5 day week and £15 for a dependent adult. Participants may undertake other remunerative employment on the remaining days without compromising their entitlements. Funding is also available stowards the cost of Supervisor and materials.

There are over fifty vacancies presently available on the Social Employment Scheme in the North Kildare Area so if you are eligible and interested. Des Murray would like to hear from you.

ENTERPRISE ALLOWANCE SCHEME:
This scheme is designed for unemployed people with a worth-while idea for self—employment. In lieu of their social welfare payment a married person will recieve £50 per week and a single person £30 while setting up their business. The allowance will be paid for a maximum of 52 weeks. In some circumstances they may qualify for a lump sum payment to acquire capital expenses.

THE YOUTH SELF-EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMME: This has the same objective as the Enterprise Allowance scheme but operates differently. Under a special arrangement with the Bank of Ireland, the Youth Employment Agency guarantees a major part of loans to young people for approved self-employment projects,

EMPLOYMENT INCENTIVE SCHEME:

Employment subsidies are available to employers taking an additional worker who has been registered as been unemployed. Subsidies of up to £60 per week are available in respect of employers over twenty five years of age who have been without work for a year or more. The N.M.S. will advise employers how to avail of this scheme and, when requested, will recruit suitable candidates.

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IRISH GEORGIAN SOCIETY

The Irish Georgian Society was formed in 1958 to work for the preservation of Ireland's architectural heritage, with

particular reference to the Georgian period, It carries out rescue and repair work and has helped to save many buildings that were abandoned to the mercy of wind and weather, such as Tailor's Hall and St. Catherine's Church in Dublin. Three Georgian houses on the north side of the Liffey are at present being restored with the help of the Society. Its main achievement has been the saving of Castletown, the magnificent Palladian house in Co. Kildare, which for sixteen years served as the Society's headquarters and to which members enjoy free access, Castle -town became the first house

open to the public in the Dublin area: the Historic Irish Tourist Houses and Gardens Association (HITHA) was born here, as was the Festival of Music in Great Irish Houses which takes place in June each year. It is now owned and run by an independent body, the Castletown Foundation.

In the unfortunate absence of an Historic Buildings Fund in the Republic, grants are given to privately owned houses -Ledwithstown, Glencullen, Freame Mount, etc. Rescue operations have been carried out on numerous follies, gateways, columns, temples funeral monuments and chapels which do not demand much subsequent maintenance. new owner is being sought for a marvellous rococo ceiling that could be moved from a decaying house. In the past, for instance, a new home was found through the Society for the Browne's Hill entrance gates, now at Lyons, Co. Kildare, when they were threatened with the bulldozer by the Land Commission.

We made video recordings of the interviews (thanks to the Team in the S.V.D.) and replayed them to see our mistakes and rectify them. came a two-week work experience, in a job environment on which we were assessed as to how we co-operated in work and our overall attitude towards work. This was very beneficial to those without previous experience of a job.

On this course we are treated like full-time adult employees and work in six workshops (Mechanics, Woodwork, Crafts, Office Procedures, Computers and Upholstery) in These were set up by from Naas also on the course and both groups work in an atmosphere of equality and close harmony with each other.

In Woodwork we make coffee tables, stools and chairs, buy and restore old furniture and pass it on to upholstery The machanics for covering. workshop in Neas V.E.C. school is laid out as a fully equipped garage where cars, lawnmowers, chainsaws, etc are repaired. There is a fully qualified mechanic as overseer and adviser. crafts (baskets, trays, rugs, cushions, bags, soft toys, lampshades and pottery) are mainly done by the girls and along with the woodwork are available for sale to help fund our work.

We look forward to enquiries from employers in the Maynooth, Kilcock, Leixlip, Lucan and Celbridge areas. Give the youth of today a chance to show our full potential. HISTORY OF THE CLADDAGH

The origin of the Claddagh Rina is lost in antiquity but there are, chiefly, two stories both associated with one of the "Tribes of Galway", the Joyce Family.

One of the stories tells of Richard Joyce, who when en route to the West Indies was captured by Algerian Pirates and sold as a slave in Algiers to a Turkish Goldsmith. He. observing that Joyce was tractable and ingenious, instructed him in his trade at which he bacame adept. Later, by order of King William II of England, all British Subjects detained in slavery were released; and in spite of substantial inducement to stay, Joyce returned to the City of the Tribes and pursued the business of a Goldsmith To this man, also is attributed the Claddagh Ring. Some told he brought designs from Algiers as many of the older rings were stamped with his intials and anchor signifying 'Hope' but could also have obtained the design from his relative "Margaret of the Bridges". The Claddagh Ring became popular

The Ring shows two hands clasping a heart which wears a crown and often there is a phrase: "Let Love and Friendship Reign". are two ways to Claddagh Ring. worn on the right hand, with the crown turned inwards it means that the wearer still has an unoccupied heart! Worn on the right hand with the crown pointing out, towards the kncukles is an indication that there is a suitor under consideration. And, with an air of pride and finality, if worn on the left

out, the wearer is already married.

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WHO'S PAYING FOR THE ROADS?

The Irish road system is now so inefficient that it costs freight operators 25% more per hour than EEC average freight transport costs, according to Con Power of the Confederation of Irish Industry. This reduces tension, increases energy level, brings about a feeling of well-being, good health and a positive attitude to life.

Everyday Maynooth and its environment is being polluted. Though the problem has been highlighted year after year no action has been taken to reduce or prevent it. It just gets worse and worse.

Pollution - the very word conjures up visions of Sellafield spewing nuclear waste into the Irish sea, or clouds of poisonous sulphur - dioxide following from the stacks at Moneypoint, or silage effluent seeping silently into a stream or river. Though the pollution affecting Maynooth is just as dramatic or newsworthy as these it is no less insidious in its effect on our environment and our enjoyment

of it. The one consolation is that the solution to this problem lies in our own hands. We don't have to rely on 'THEM' to do something. The reason is simple Maynooths pollution is LITTER, and the polluters are those of us, adults and children, who thoughtlessly drop our cigarette packet, match box, crisp bags, sweet papers, coke cans, lollipopsticks or bus ticket on the street. While individually these items seem harmless, together they represent an eyesore making our town shabby and untidy. Not the kind of place you would stop, never mind live.

The solution to the problem is simple. We must each become an environmentalist. This doesn't mean we have to join Greenpeace or any trendy organisation. It means that each of us has to make a resolution not to drop our litter on the street but to use the litter bins or better still to take our unwanted rubbish home and to dispose of it there. MAYNOOTH BY-PASS

Submission to Public Inquiry

Maynooth Community Council supports, in principle, the construction of the Maynqoth By-Pass. While accepting that the By-Pass will have a negative impact on some businesses in Maynooth, the Council considers that, on (5) balance, the By-Pass will be of benefit to the town. It will be of particular benefit to the large number of Maynooth residents who commute daily to the Dublin area. The removal of very large volumes of through traffic from the town centre will considerably enhance the environmental amenity of the town and contribute significantly to the conservation of Maynooth's (6) historical and architectural heritage. The By-Pass will also increase greatly Maynooth's attractiveness as a place to live, which in the long run will boost the town's business life.

Maynooth Community Council's main concern, therefore, is with the link road between Maynooth and the By-Pass. The Council accepts, in principle, that the Straffan Road should be used to provide this link. This will be advantageous to the great majority of the residents of Maynooth who live on the south and southwest sides of the town, while it will also divert a large volume of local traffic from the town centre, particularly during rush hours.

It is, however, absolutely necessary that 4. major improvements be carried out on the Straffan Road before it will be suit- 5. able to serve as a link road to the By-Pass. Even with existing volumes of traffic, this road is extremely inadequate. Accordingly, Maynotth Community Council calls for the full and immediate implementation of the improvement plan for the Straffan Road submitted by Kildare Co. Council to the Department of the Environment. This plan provides for:

- Widening of the road to 10 metres throughout the stretch from the Town Square to the interchange with the By-Pass, including the town railway/canal bridge.
- Footpaths to be laid on both sides of the road within the built-up area.
- Pedestrian lights to be provided at the entrance to Greenfield Lane.

- The road to be re-aligned on the Straffan sde of the bridge.
- The Clebridge Road to meet the Straffan Road at right angles.
- Right-turning lanes to be provided at all junctions.

In addition to the above, Maynooth Community Council seeks the following:

- (1) One-way system to operate in the town square.
- All cut-stone structures and items of historical/architectural value which will be disturbed by roadwidening and associated work to be restored as far as possible. This to include walls, the old horse watering station near the square, the ball alley near the bridge, and the bridge itself.

- Particular care needs to be taken to make the access road to the railway station, between the railway and canal segments of the bridge, as safe as possible.
- Satisfactory public street lighting along the link road.
- As this road carries a very heavy volume of pedestrian traffic, proper surfacing and roadside drains are required to prevent drenching of pedestrians during wet weather.
- Since the widening of the Straffan Road will inevitably lead to speeding traffic, strict traffic policing is required in the interests of pedestrian and cyclist safety (as well, of course, as the safety of vehicle drivers and passengers).

Maynooth Community Council is particularly concerned that the use of the Straffan Road as the By-Pass link will mean that drivers from the built-up Newtown district of the town will use Greenfield Lane to get access to the By-Pass, as this lane provides a direct link to the Straffan Road.

Greenfield Lane (see map) is narrow. poorly lit, poorly surfaced and passes through a residential area with large numbers of children and older residents. However, it is also dead straight for most of its length, and this will inevitably encourage speeding and hence constitute a public hazard. Large volumes of through traffic will also detract from the amenity of those living along the lane. As most of Newtown has been zoned for further residential development, this problem will only get worse over the years.

Maynooth Community Council is aware that Kildare Co. Council has tentative long-term plans to build a new road which will link the Straffan Road directly with Newtown (see map). However, these plans are dependent on further



Fort Apache - The Bronx

The gun totin' business people of Maynooth are fighting back against the wave of crime hitting our quiet village. The shutters are going up all over Maynooth, and the reason is the hordes descending on us from the Metropolis, Looting all in sight, and disappearing over the horizon before the Garda Station has opened for business. We may have a most efficient firebrigade and ambulance service to attend to any emergency, but the hard-pressed garda who arrives at your doorstep after your house has been cleaned out has either walked, cycled, or driven his own car from the station and that is if you are lucky enough to have been done before 3.00 in the morning. The nearest squadcar is based in Naas so don't expect any high-speed chases after your precious videos and stereos.

The scare headlines should not be allowed to promote a siege mentality in us. However, there are disturbing indications that crime is not only a foreign import. 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Interview with

MRS. DALY OF O'NEILL PARK

One of Maynooth's Oldest Ladies

Born on the 26th of October in 1896 in Moyglare, Mrs. Daly formerly Monahan, is presently Maynooth's eldest lady. She was educated in the Presentation Convent until the age of fourteen and then she found employment in service with the Duke of Leinster who then resided at Carton House. After a short spell there Miss Monahan found employment with a Sir Walter Nugent, the owner of a 100 acre estate in Multifarnham, Co. Westmeath and she stayed with him for 2 and a half years. She was then approached by one of the ladies of Carton House and she returned to service in Carton where her duties included laundry and daily work.

A year later leaving Carton to be married Miss Monahan may have imagined her days of service in such houses were over, though this was not to be. Mrs. Daly had 3 children the eldest of whom was not even 5 years old when her husband died. She then worked for Mr. Gannon in the place where her husband had worked for 5 years as a Farm Manager, until such a time as the farm was sold. At that time her parents were very supportive of her, and she returned home.

As fate would have it she returned to Carton House where she was provided with her own apartment. The only conditions she had to abide by was that she had to be in by 10 o'clock each night. The Duke of Leinster left Carton, and now lives in England and has a son who would be the now Earl of Kildare.

Informed of a vacancy in Derrinstown House, Ladychapel, a house owned by the Duchess of Westminister, Mrs. Daly was a successful applicant and so began a term of 29 years service in all. The Duchess only occasionally visited the house and on one occasion she requested that Mrs. Daly would accompany her to Loughmore in Scotland, another residence of the Duchess. While there the Duchess entertained many guests and at one particular lunch party Mrs. Daly was presented to Princess Anne by the Duchess, in the kitchens of Loughmore. After six months Mrs. Daly then returned to Derrinstown.

A regular visitor at the Annual Dublin Horsehow Mrs. Daly kept an interest in events and followed with pride the fortunes of the Great Arkle (who died in 1970 and is now on show in the Irish National Stud in Kildare) who was owned indeed by the Duchess of Westminster

(and in more recent times the Duchess won the Grand National with a horse called Last Suspect).

The Duchess retained the house in Derrinstown and the services of Mrs. Daly up to two years ago when the house was sold to Arabs.

Mrs. Daly recollects fond memories of her time with the Duchess and a particular highlight of her service was a cruise on the Rhine with the Duchess which took place in 1975.

Among other things Mrs. Daly spent 3 months in Zambia visiting her daughter who was a nurse there. Other recollections of life in Maynooth were the memories of Kildare winning the All Ireland Final in 1927, and the Easter Rising in

Mrs. Daly is a very fit and alert lady, her secret is cycling (in her young days she thought nothing of cycling from Maynooth to Dun Laoghaire and back, to spend the day by the sea) and just simply being active. It is not uncommon for Mrs. Daly to make a 9 mile cycle to Clane to visit her daughter.

Marquetry dates back to the year 11 A.D. where it has been discovered in tombs of pharoes. Since the 1760's it has become a decorative finish to all types of furniture especially in the Louis XVI and Regency period. Today it is used more extensively in the creation of pictures of scenes (country, seascapes, buildings).

Today a subject is chosen and drawn or traced on a veneer then each piece is cut out and substitute veneer is replaced into the cutting giving alternative colour and grain.

In Ireland Marquetry is fast becoming a lucrative craft which anyone young or old, can do, given a little patience. The May Meeting of the Maynooth Branch of Fine Gael was held on Wed. 14th May, 1986 in the I.C.A. Hall, Maynooth.

Mr. Philip McDermott, Chairman, Celbridge District Executive was welcomed to the meeting.

Many varied topics were discussed including the satisfactory outcome of:

Water Supply at Doctor's Lane, Maynooth Funds have now been made available by the Minister for the Environment and Kildare Co. Council to carry out the necessary improvements to the water

Unsecured Loans for Home Improvements Mr. John Boland, T.D., Minister for the Environment announced recently that he

has increased from £1,000 to £2,000 the amount of the unsecured loan which may be advanced by housing authorities for house improvement works carried out on or after 1st May 1986.

Reduction in interest rates charges to Local Authorities on future Local Authority House Mortgages

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. John Boland, T.D. notified local authorities on 2nd May, 1986 of a reduction of 11/2% in the rate of interest (i.e. from 10½ to 9%) on loans borrowed by them from the Exchequer. The new interest rate, which is the lowest for over 11 years, will help to ease the burden of loan charges on local authorities which has continued to grow despite the large State subsidies. The reduced rate will apply to loan charges on all loans advanced on or after 1st May, 1986 from Local Loan Funds and to existing loans advanced since 1st February, 1982 at a variable interest rate. A fixed interest

rate applies to earlier loans. The loans are used by local authorities to finance capital expenditure on local authority housing, sanitary services, fire service, libraries swimming pools and other environmental projects.

The reduction in the interest rate will also apply to new loan advances from 1st May 1986 by housing authorities for the purchase, construction or improvement of houses. The new rate will result in significant benefits to persons availing of these loans and to the house building industry.



A type of contributory health insurace for everybody, along the lines of the H.I., subsidised where necessary for cople unable to afford the full cost. It thought that this would involve major vings for the exchequer, as it would rece hospitals to become self-reliant on unds received in payment for services ndered rather than on state grants, hich are often somewhat arbitrary. uch a system already works in other runtries such as Canada and Australia.

It is thought that this system would so make treatment more equitable, by moving many of the existing distincons between the treatment available to me in contrast with what is available to thers. For example, at present for some lments such as arthritic hips, operations re available much sooner to V.H.I. patnts than to Public Health patients.

The transfer of resources away from igh-technology hospitals to community-ased services. As hospitalization is so xpensive and not always necessary for ertain patients (e.g. sick old people living lone who have to be hospitalized beause they have nobody to care for hem), a well developed community-are service could be both more beneicial to the sick and cheaper for the exhequer.

- dealth Policy for new services where vailable. This would help to eliminate ompetition between hospitals for the ame type of treatment, e.g. heart transplants, and would avoid the unnecessary luplication of expensive equipment.
- !. A very strong and determined health ducation/preventative medicine programme would also focus on the need for areful planning and development of good housing.



MALAYAN CHICKEN

You will need:

6 jointed Chicken Legs

Salt & Pepper

4 Table spoons of Oil 12 oz. tin of Pineapple pieces

2 teaspoons Soya Sauce

2 teaspoons Worcester Sauce.

1 teaspoon Arrowroot.

1 Red Pepper

1 Green Pepper.

What to do:

Season the chicken well. Heat the oil in large frying pan, add the chicken and cook for 10 minutes. Drain off the pineapple and add to chicken along with Soya and Worcester Sauce. Mix arrowroot with a little pineapple juice until creamy, add 3/4 of peppers to mix, then add mix to pan. Bring to boil stirring continuously until thickened. Cook for 20 minutes stirring occasionally. Arrange chicken on serving dish (hot) pour the sauce over chicken and garnish with red and green peppers. This meal serves 4 people.

A NEW MONTESSORI SCHOOL FOR MAYNOOTH

PATRICIA DOYLE will be opening a Montessori school for children aged 2½- 6 years in the Maynooth area this September. She is a university graduate and a fully qualified A.M.I. Montessori Directress. She has teaching experience in Ireland and she spent two years teaching in Japan. Thus she has worked with children of a wide variety of backgrounds. She would now like the local children to avail of this highly successful method of education.

Many of you ask who or what is Montessori?

Dr. Maria Montessori was born in 1870 in Italy. By studying the child from birth through all stages of growth, she showed how the child's inner development can be best helped to produce a fully balanced adult. Dr. Montessori felt that the goal of early childhood education should be to cultivate the child's natural curiosity and love for knowledge. He would then continue in his search for knowledge all through his life. Dr. Montessori believed that there is in every child between 0 and 6, a special kind of sensitivity which enables him to absorb impressions from his environment. She calls this, "the absorbent mind". For instance, a (Maria Montessori - THE ABSORBENT two-year old learns his language without MIND). formal instruction or the conscious effort which an adult must make to master a foreign language.

So Dr. Montessori reasoned that this experience could be enriched by a prepared environment: a classroom where he could handle materials which would demonstrate basic educational information to him. She believed that a young child can learn to read, write and calculate in the same natural way that he learns to talk and walk. In a Montessori classroom the

equipment invites him to do this at his own periods of interest and readiness.

A Montessori school is neither a babysitting service nor a play school. Dr. Montessori described it as a navishing place for the child. It is designed to meet his needs for self-construction and to reveal his personality and growth patterns to us. The environment must be carefully prepared for the child by a knowledgeable and sensitive adult i.e. the trained Montessori Director/Directress. This Director/Directress must be the dynamic link between the child and this specially prepared environment. Each child works individually at his own pace, so there is a non-competitive atmosphere. Montessori classrooms show that children of different ages help one another. A child of three will take interest in what a five-year old is doing and the other child becomes a teacher for

At no other age has the child greater need of intelligent help, and any obstacle that impedes his creative work will lessen the chance he has of ever achieving perfection."

Skills Foundation Programme Exhibition in Maynooth

An exhibition of items produced on a Skills Foundation Programme in Maynooth was held at the Post Primary School on Friday 9th and Saturday 10th May, 1986. This event represented the culmination of 6 months work by a group of 27 unemployed young people from the general Maynooth area. The course was designed and funded by AnCO and implemented by the Adult Education service of Co. Kildare V.E.C.

The Exhibition was opened by Mr. Paddy Power, T.D., Chairman of Co. Kildare V.E.C. He complimented all the people associated with the course for the high standards achieved and for putting on such a high class quality exhibition. In particular he gave a special word of praise to the trainees on the course for having produced goods of such a very high quality. He said this type of course demonstrated the latent talent held by young people and the great potential they possessed. In concluding he wished the trainees every success for the future.

Mr. Power's sentiments were also echoed by other speakers. Commins, C.E.O. of Kildare V.E.C. said that the course represented a good example of what can be achieved when two state bodies -AnCO and the V.E.C. - co-operated in responding to the needs of the local community. Mr. Francis Walsh, Chairman of the Community Council, expressed the hope that this type of programme would continue to be developed and implemented in the future. On behalf of the Community he expressed a sincere word of thanks to all those who helped with the course.

Mr. Noel Dalton, Adult Education Organiser and Course Co-ordinator thanked the large crowd who attended the exhibition which represented to the trainees the depth of interest and concern felt by the local community on the issue of unemployment. He went on to say that unemployment is probably the greatest social and economic challenge to face Ireland since the mass emigration of the 1950's. While there were many proposed solutions to the problem of unemployment, he felt that there is scope for a serious and significant intervention through such courses as the Skills Foundation Programme. Commenting on the background to the course, he said the programme was designed for people who have left school early i.e. before completing the Leaving Certificate cycle. Most of the trainees would have never experienced what it was like to work full-time in a permanent job. The personal attitude of many of the trainees before the course was one of no hope and a belief that no one gave a damn about their position. Many trainees would believe that there is no liklihood of an improvement in the near future. He said that a rather frightening trend among many of our unemployed people is the belief that the only solution to their personal plight is emigration. The programme sought to meet the trainees needs by concentrating on five areas:

> (1) building up the motivation and enthusiasm of trainees.

- (2) helping trainees identify skills which are most suitable both to their own talents and energies and to local job opportunities and community needs.
- (3) providing trainees with an industrial environment within which various skills can be acquired and positive work attitudes developed.
- (4) developing creativity in the application of the skills to make products or provide services, and to using the skills for job-seeking purposes.
- (5) providing relevant job experience.

that fact. Furthermore, the positive a meaningful and successful career. response from the trainees has also been very encouraging

For the future Mr. Dalton said he would like to see the Skills Foundation Programme expanded and developed. In particular he would like to see a Community Enterprise and Resource Centre developed in Maynooth which would act as a focal point for unemployed people in the community. In general the functions of such a Centre could be summarised as

- Start-up facilities (workshops, secretarial help, Management advisory service etc) for unemployed people in the community.
- A link-up facility for individuals or groups in the community who have already started their own business (e.g. in the home) and who would

benefit from such a service.

- A training facility for people who have already started their business but are located outside the centre.
- (iv) Workshop and Training facilities for unemployed people to generate ideas and skills relating to new enterprises.

He said that if we are serious about a significant response to the issue of unemployment then it is imperative that an integrated facility along the above lines is established in Maynooth.

In conclusion he thanked all those who co-operated in running the programme -Mr. John O'Brien and Catherine Corcoran the course managers, the instructors, the Community Council and in particular Ms. Siobhan Hall. For helping with local facilities he thanked the Scouts, M.A.D.E., Mr. Tom Ashe and the Don Bosco Youth Club. The I.C.A. were complimented on preparing an excellent buffet for those Given the time and financial constraints attending the Exhibition. Finally he under which the course operated he felt thanked the trainees for their effort and that these objectives were achieved for contribution and he expressed the wish the majority of the trainees. The work that they would look back on the course on display bears adequate testimony to as being of benefit to them in developing

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SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS THE PLEASURES AND PROBLEMS OF LIVING IN MAYNOOTH

A survey of 119 Maynooth residents was carried out in April by the partcipants in the Community Development Course organised by Maynooth College. The survey, which is part of a larger project, shows a picture of a community generally happy with life in Maynooth. 89% of those surveyed could name positive aspects to living in Maynooth. However, 86% could also point out problems and needs.

Almost half of the residents questioned regard the physical environment as a positive attribute of Maynooth. The rural/urban setting, the relative peace and quiet, and the cleanliness of the air were mentioned. Almost one third referred to the social environment, the general friendliness and neighbourliness, and above all, people considered that Maynooth is a good place to bring up children. Another important feature of Maynooth is its relationship with Dublin. "It's near enough to commute but far enough to avoid the pollution and other problems of urban living", was the opinion of over a third of those questioned.

However, lest we get carried away with visions of paradise, there are also a host of problems. Perhaps we are fortunate in that the problems identified are not as serious as those facing other communities. Few people mentioned drugs, and only 12% referred to unemployment. However, the lack of recreational facilities was mentioned by almost half of the group. They cry was "nothing for young adults, nothing for teenagers, cinema, no swimming pool". There was the fear that more problems may arise as our young population increases, to find nothing constructive to do with their leisure. Other problems identified were the appalling roads (17%), transport (9%), services e.g. shopping (13%), and a whole host of others, ranging from lack of public seating, general untidiness, to the 'thing in the square'.

Despite the fact that there are 66 organisations in Maynooth, and despite the cries that there is nothing to do, only 35 people said they belonged to local organisations i.e. less than one third. One per-

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son, having bewailed the lack of things to do, sheepishly admitted that she couldn't persuade the children to go swimming, and she herself hadn't the interest to become involved with what is going on already. It appears that some people are less inclined to take responsibility for their own leisure pursuits, leaving others to provide, whether on a commercial or a voluntary basis. The voluntary organisations would be only too happy to give people something to do!

An encouraging note is that involvement increases the longer people are resident. so that over half of those who have lived in Maynooth for over 10 years are involv-

ed, compared with just 14% of those who have lived here for less than 5 years. The survey also covered questions relating to Maynooth Community Council, and how people perceived its role in the community, as well as the Newsletter.

The second annual sponsored cycle organised jointly by the Boys National School and St. Mary's Band takes place on Sunday, 15th June.


The event follows the same routes as last year and moves off from the Parish Hall at 3.00 pm.

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

GARDEN HINTS

In the past the gardeners' activities were closely linked to the seasons. This was particularly so when it come to planting rose trees and shrubs because these plants were grown in the ground and lost a lot of roots when lifted they could only be transplanted when dormant. This meant planting had to be done between November and March when weather and soil conditions were far from pleasant. If you did not get your planting done during this time then you lost a full year. The use of container grown rose trees and shrubs frees the modern gardiner from these constraints and means that planting can be done at any time of the year, even in the summer months of June, July or August, so there is no need to put off until next year what you have not yet

Whether planting bare-rooted or container grown subjects attention to a few points will ensure success. Firstly ensure the soil is well prepared. It is no use digging a small hole in a piece of rock-'ard ground and expecting a plant to thrive. You must dig the soil around the planting area to get it into good condition. Then open a hole large enough to take the plant roots. Work some more mosspeat and bonebeal into the bottom of the hole, place your plant in position and plant with your foot then rake the surface even and water well with container grown subjects which dry out rapidly in warm weather.

It is a good idea to water them well a few hours before planting. Some of the roots at the bottom of the mass of roots should be teased out before planting. Should the weather become dry after planting help your plant by watering it. This is best done in the evening.

The lawn is such a large element of most gardens that its condition can affect the general appearance of the garden. If your lawn is weedy there is still time to apply fertiliser and weedkiller, use either a general fertiliser which includes a weedkiller or apply sulphate of ammonia and follow it three weeks later with a spray of a selective weedkiller. Fertiliser should be applied before rain or washed in by hose. Mowing has an important affect on the quality of a lawn. It should be done regularly at least once a week during the summer and not too close.

Summer besides bringing better weather also brings a host of pests and diseases. Regular spraying is necessary to keep these at bay.

On roses "Multi-Rose" controls greenfly, blackspot mildew and caterpillars while feeding the plants at the same time.

For apples, pears, blackcurrants and gooseberries use "Nimrod T" to protect them from mildew, scab, and leaf spot, while Sybol 2 will protect them from the ravages of a host of insects.

Finally there is still time to plant a selection of bedding plants to give you a summer long display of colour right up to the first frosts of winter. Don't let the poor spring weather get you down, get out and get at it.


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
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SCOUT NEWS

TO BE HELD IN POST PRIMARY SCHOOL, MAYNOOTH

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SPORTS COMPLEX COMES CLOSER

At their June meeting, the Trustees of Maynooth College agreed to lease a site for the construction of an Indoor Sports complex to be shared jointly by the College, the Maynooth community, and the schools of the town. The site in question is on the Kilcock Road, just beyond the footbridge, in front of the Student Union building.

Detailed proposals for the Complex have already been drawn up by a committee drawn from representatives of the College, Maynooth Community Council, and the local schools, and plans have been provided by the College architects. The proposed complex, to be developed in phases, provides for a main building, including a sports hall (with allowance for a second hall if demand justifies it), squash and handball/racquetball courts, table tennis, snooker, exercise room, TV room, Physical Education lecture room, indoor games room (darts, cards, etc.), offices, long-desired indoor heated swimming pool. If fully developed, the overall proposal will cost an estimated £2.5 million.

There are many advantages to the idea of a jointly shared complex. One single complex would provide a wider range of facilities, and to a higher standard, than two separate developments. There will also be savings in terms of running and management costs. It is expected that, if approved, there will be a 100% grant for the College's share of the Complex, thereby reducing the amount of local fund-raising required. A shared Complex will also be used more efficiently, as there will be considerable day-time use by College students and staff during term, while during holiday periods when the local community demand would be at its highest, most of the students will be away from the College. This applies particularly to the swimming pool, given the high running costs of such

It is envisaged that the Complex will be vested in a Board of Trustees made up of representatives of the College, the Community Council, and educational interests. There will also be a Management Committee which will be responsible for allocating the use of the facilities among applicant groups and individuals. The Complex will have a full-time manager.

The Joint Committee has been waiting for the College Trustees' decision to participate in the project. Now that this has been given, a submission will be prepared over the coming weeks for forwarding to the Department of Education, which is responsible for sporting facilities for both educational institutions and community groups. It is impossible to say at this stage how long it will take the Depart-

ment to process the submission.

OUTDOOR SPORTS

Meanwhile, Maynooth Community Council has also been seeking the use of the County Council site at Blacklion, on the Dublin Road, for the development of outdoor sporting facilities. At a recent meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the County Council, it was agreed in principle to make the site available, and Council officials are to come back to the next meeting of the Committee (on July 7th) with specific proposals concerning how this should be arranged. It is hoped to develop two full soccer pitches on the site, plus an all-weather pitch and a running track. Further details will be provided in due course.

- 4. In supporting this motion I supported the abolition of charges and recognised that the Manager could collect arrears as heretofore.

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
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MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY **COUNCIL NOTES**

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Bob's Kitchen Corner

Green Stuffed Peppers

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4 good-sized peppers, red or green 2 tablesp, oil 1 small onion, finely chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 225g (8 oz) minced beef or lamb 400g (15 oz) can of tomatoes 50g (2 oz) cooked rice 1 teasp. ground cinnamon salt and pepper

Set over Gas 4, 180 C (350 F)

Method

Cut the tops from the peppers and remove the seeds. Blanch in boiling water for 3-4 minutes and drain.

Heat the oil in a frying pan. Add the onion and garlic and cook for a few minutes. Stir in the meat and continue cooking until the meat is well coloured about 5-6 minutes. Drain the can of tomatoes. Reserve the juice, add the tomatoes to the pan with the cooked rice, cinnamon, salt and pepper. Combine all the ingredients well together. Stuff the peppers with the mixture pressing it down well with the back of a spoon. Any remaining mixture can be cooked separately in tin foil. Place the peppers in an overproof dish. Pour the tomato juice around the peppers. Cover the dish with a lid or tin foil and bake in the over for 30 minutes. This is a complete meal in itself. Serv e it with crusty bread to soak up the juices.


RURAL RETREAT FOR BEER CHIEFS



A SERVICE TO BE USED

Maynooth Community Information Centre' was formally opened on 28th May by Mr. Noel O'Sullivan Head of Information of the National Social Services Board, the national body which supports Community Information Centres all over Ireland. Mr. O'Sullivan presented a framed certificate of registration of the centre to Mary McGinley, Maynooth

At a reception in the Library to mark the occasion, Mr. O'Sullivan paid tribute to the dedication of the eighteen volunteers staffing the centre, and in particular, he acknowledged the role of Cerry Colreavy who pestered him to the extent that he finally agreed that there was a need for a centre in Maynooth.

He reminded the attendance that the service is free, non directive and all above, confidential. Clients of the service are quaranteed taht whatever is said within the centre will never be repeated outside.

Mr. Ward, the County Manager praised all concerned with setting up the centre. There is a vital need for information in our society, and the location of the centre in the Library premises is particularly apt, as the Library is a prime source of information in itself. He warmly acknowledged the role of Mlaynooth Community Council in setting up the centre, with the wish that more communities would get involved in local affairs to the same extent. In this context, he reffered very favourably to the submission made by the council to the recent hearing on the proposed by pass road.

The Chairman of the Community Council, Proinnsias Breathnach, in a brief speech thanked Mary McGinley and the volunteers, Gerry Colreavy, and the Library staff, all of whom have contributed to the success of the centre so far. He wished it well for the future, and strongly advised the people of Maynooth to make the maximum use of this essential service.

FAMILY INCOME SUPPLEMENT (F.I.S)

F.I.S. is designed to supplement the income of low wage earners in full-time employment. To qualify you must have dependent children for whom you receive the Child Benefit (formerly Children's Allowance),

F.I.S. is dependent on family size and family income. The amount, of F.I.S. you get is one-third of the difference between you weekly income and the maximum income for each family size. This may be further restricted by a maximum supplement based on family size. For example, a family with two children and a gross income of £90 per week would get F.I.S. of £10 per week:

Maximum income for two child family £120.

Actual family income £90 Difference £30

One-third of difference £10

Maximum supplement for two child family is £14.

F.I.S. was improved in the Budget and the improved scheme took effect on April 10, 1986. Those already receiving F.I.S. at that date will continue to receive F.I.S. at the old rate until a year from the time when they first started to receive it. When they have to re-apply at that stage they will then get the new rates.

SUMMER CHORES

by Plantsman

July is a month when gardeners can relax a little and enjoy the results of their labours. However, there are a few chores to be attended to if the initial display of colour and freshness is to be maintained right through to the end of autumn.

In common with all living things the only reason for the existence of a plant is to perpetuate the species. Therefore once a plant has blossomed our Committee. and set seed it has achieved its objective and will go into decline. To prevent this and ensure the plants continue to produce fresh growth and flowers it is important to remove the faded blooms from roses and bedding plants e.g. antirrhinums, dahlias, salvias, petunias, on a regular basis.

Nothing looks worse than an un-Routine clipping is tidy hedge. essential if a dense even growth is to be maintained especially with growing types such as grisolinia. and lonicera. Even young newly planted hedges should be lightly clipped to encourbushy base. hedges shape is all improtant. The should always be narrower This ensures that than the base. the older shoots at the bottom of the hedge receive enought light to keep them green and active rather than dead and leafless, as is all too frequently the case. If your hedge is dull and lifeless a dressing of a general fertiliser spread along the base and watered in will soon restore its vigour.

In the vegetable garden weeds should be controlled by routine hoeing or hand weeding. Vegetables such as carrots, turnips, and lettuce should be thinned

to give the plants space to develop. With carrots thinning should be done in the late 'evening and the thinnings removed immediately. The reason for this is that the carrot rootfly, the bane of every gardener, is attracted by the smell of the carrots but is not active in the evening. Though the season is late and crops are less developed than normal pests and diseases can be expected to strike very much on time this year. This is especially true of potato blight. Even newly emerged shoots can be affected and should be sprayed particularly during warm humid spells. Watch for caterpillars on your cabbage and spray at the first sign of damage.

If the weather should become dry for any lenght of time remember to water plants especially those which were planted this Spring. It's best to water in the evening as the plant roots can take up the water during the night before it is evaporated by the sun.

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THE SQUIRREL.

There are two species of squirrel that live in Ireland, the Red and the Grey. The squirrel is a Mammal and is of the rodent family. The Red squirrel is a native of this country, whereas the Grey was brought into Ireland hundreds of years ago from America. The Grey squirrel has become very common to our woods, parks, and even towns, and the Red has become rare. Disease and the cutting of forests are probably the main reasons for the decline of the Red squirrel. Squirrels breed between January and September, their nest is called a drey and is built in high trees, of moss, twigs, leaves, or in the holes of old trees. The nestlings vary in the number between I-6, when they are born they are naked, blind, deaf and toothless. Squirrels eat nuts, acorns, fruit, berries, seeds, roots and the shoots of young trees. They Grey squirrel will also eat the eggs of birds. Squirrels are highly excitable and they are very inquisitive, they

have sharp hearing and eyesight. A squirrel will 7 years, the long bushy tail of the squirrel helps to balance about in the itself when leaning branches of trees. The coat of both the Red and Grey vary in colour from Summer to Winter. Squirrels have a number of enemies, especially while feeding on the ground, stoat, fox, cats, and sometimes hawks.

As September arrives the swallows can be seen gathering on telegraph wires, and this is the time that they return to South Africa. It is not known how the young birds find their way, perhaps they can tell by the sun and stars which way to go, sometimes when there is heavy cloud and fog they get on their route. So when you are out walking keep you eyes alert to see if you can pick out this welcome visitor.

Talking to Phil Brady recently in his lounge on Main St., he recalled for us the changes that have taken place in the licensing trade since he first went into the business. He remembered the Firkins, Kilns and Hogsheads of plain porter and stout arriving on the Guinness trucks. Topping a firkin or kiln was a refined art, the tap was gently driven home and displaced the bung with one final firm stroke. Brute force was not called for. The hogsheads were set aside for bottling and some 72 dozen bottles of stout could be drawn from one. These were then set aside for two or three weeks to mature.

Woman were seldom seen in public houses and those who did frequent them adjourned to the snug for privacy. Videos and pool were unheard of and entertainment consisted of rings, cards and the occasional sing-song. Choice of drink was limited to stout, plain porter, whisky, gin, wine and of course the jars of stone giner beer which the children loved so much.

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

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


Dear Editor,

Dear Editor.

One of the most distinctive features of the architecture of Maynooth is the wide footpaths in the Main Street. However, in typical utilitarian fashion, the residents of the area perceive these footpaths mainly as carparks — and even alternative roadways (one recalls an Editorial in a past issue of the Newsletter calling for the erection of speed limit signs on the footpaths!). No doubt we have all been guilty at one time or another of this presumably illegal practice — to which, one might add, the local Gardai turn a blind eye.

Whatever about the environmental aspects of the practice of parking on the footpaths, there is also a safety aspect involved. A recent nasty accident experienced by one of our esteemed senior citizens may have been due to the obstruction caused by cars parked in this way.

With the building of the Maynooth By-Pass now imminent, the opportunity presents itself of making Maynooth, freed from choking through traffic, an architectural and environmental showpiece. Footpaths clogged with vehicles would have no place in such a scenario. Railings, park seats and raised kerbs at the entrances to side alleyways would greatly improve the Main Street visually, while restricting the ability to park on the footpaths.

But where would we park our cars then? For a start, much more use could be made of the Town Centre Mall, while an approach to the management of the Leinster Arms to make their extensive carparking facilities available for day-time public use might receive a positive response. It has frequently been remarked that the Irish have not come to grips with the fact that today's levels of car ownership are not compatible with yesterday's car parking habits. Perhaps we in Maynooth could think about making a start.

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
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WORKERS PARTY NOTES

Water charges

Clir. Colm Purcell describes Kildare Co. Council's policy of disconnecting water supplies to people who refuse to pay service charges as a mafia-like tactic to extort the double tax. He points out that the Council has enough legal machinery without having to resort to these methods. Clir. Purcell has proposed that a prohibition be placed on future disconnections; however, a similar motion from him was defeated last December following an alliance between Fianna Fail and Fine Gael.

Peace Camp

As Workers' Party Youth's contribution to Peace Year, a week long camp is to be held at Dowdstown House, Navan, from August 9th to 16th. Activities will include social and political education, video and music workshops, joint projects with local youth groups, activity learning and sports events. The Referendum

While the result of the referendum to amend the constitution is a cause of great disappointment, especially to those suffering the problems of marital breakdown, Cllr. The Celbridge electoral area, where Maynooth is located, recorded a majority in favour of the amendment. This was achieveded in part by the enthusiastic campaign carried out by the combined forces of the Workers' Party, Divorce Action Group and the Labour Party. Cllr. Purcell paid tribute to the spirit of co-operation shown by these What was particularly notegroups. worthy about the majority "yes" vote in the Celbridge electoral area was that it was achieved without the active participation in the campaign of either of the main political parties (or of the Progressive Democrats), which shows how much out of touch these parties are with the electorate in this area. There must now be a full debate on the implications of the special privileged position which successive governments have conceded without question to the church. and there is an urgent need to separate the functions of church and state.

Congratulations

The Branch feel that this is an overdue honour to the hard-working Deputy who has always been available to his constituents. Branch members are delighted to have a Maynooth person elected to the post and look forward to a continuation of the excellent service provided by Deputy Durkan.

Birmingham Six/Guildford Four

People of Kildare may be interested to note that Deputy Bernard Durkan was a member of an all-party delegation which visited London recently. Deputy Durkan with Senator Michael Smith visited the Maguire family, Gerry Conlon and John Walker at Long Lartin Prison, Worcestershire, to hear their case, along with others who have been accused of bombings in Birmingham and Guildford. The all-party delegation are now hoping that their efforts will help towards an early release for those still in prison, and a clearing of their good names.

Doctors Lane

The Minister for the Environment has informed Deputy Bernard Durkan, that he has agreed to provide funds to carry out improvements to the water supply at Doctors Lane. The new 4" line through Doctors Lane will link to the 8" line on the Straffan Road, and a 3" line on the Dublin Road. This will improve the water pressure in the Dublin Road area. It should be noted that a hydrant will also be located on the spur off the proposed main for a fire fighting service to the housing scheme at Doctors Lane. The scheme is being financed from the Small Schemes Programme 1986.

Newtown/Cluain Aoibhinn/College Green/Beaufield


Following numerous representations by Deputy Bernard Durkan, for road improvements at Newtown affecting Bond Bridge (Pucks) over the Canal and Railway, the Co. Council have discussed the matter and have agreed that the proposal as outlined by Deputy Durkan provides the better solution to the problem. The options were:

- (a) The creation of a single traffic system controlled by traffic lights (this was submitted by another Councillor).
- (b). The complete re-alignment of the road and bridge (submitted by Deputy Durkan). This proposal is more costly but it provides a permanent solution to this very serious problem.

The County Engineer now agrees that Deputy Durkan's proposal for road and bridge re-alignment is the best option and has now submitted outline plans to the Department of Environment for their approval. The finance for the re-alignment is to come from development levies, Department grants and loans. If the improvement should be of benefit to the people of Newtown, Cluain Aoibhinn, College Green and Beaufield.

Moyglare Road

The County Engineer has informed Deputy Durkan that the Council will carry out footpath and road improvements on the Moyglare Road. Monies for same will come from development levies.



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Divorce Referendum

The result of the divorce referendum was a disappointment nationally but in North Kildare there was a 55% yes vote. The Branch would like to thank those who supported us in the matter and the members of D.A.G. with whom we worked.

Greenfields - Phase 3 - Water Pressure

Following representations by CIIr. Stagg concerning the water pressure in Greenfields Phase 3, he has been informed by the County Engineer that a small scheme interconnection to the 16" Ballygoran line is planned for late July. The hydrant flows in the area should be much improved by 1st August.

Convent Lane - Road Repairs

The Branch are pleased to learn that following Cllr. Stagg's proposals at the estimates meeting of Kildare Co. Council, savings of over £100,000 were achieved and it was agreed to spend this money on road repairs.

£3,000 is to be spent on urgent repairs to Convent Lane which has been in a deplorable state for a number of years.

Bond Bridge

Arising from a motion tabled by Cllr. Stagg, seeking to progress the necessary improvements to Bond Bridge, the Co. Engineer has now committed himself to raising the necessary funds to have the bridge replaced. This will be achieved by means of development levies, government grants and loans to a total estimated cost of £500,000. The Co. Engineer was hopeful that work would start within one year. There is no doubt that the continued pressure which was exerted on the Co. Engineer by Cllr. Stagg, and the support for the original proposal

from the residents of the area has forced the Co. Engineer into now committing himself to one proposal or the other, rather than his previous vagueness about the problem.

The Avenue

Concern was expressed at a recent Branch meeting about the deplorable state of the Avenue: Cllr. Stagg has been requested to press K.C.C. to have the grass cut.

Garda Matters

The Minister for Justice has informed Cllr. Stagg that a review of policing arrangements, and opening hours of Maynooth Garda Station is at present being carried out and will be completed in two months time.

Maynooth Labour Youth

We are pleased to report that our disco and live rock show held in the parish hall on Friday, 18th July was a great success. Over 200 attended and the group Rocklaw were a hit. We wish them well in the future. Our thanks to the parish hall committee for all their help. NATURE TRAIL

The Owl PEADER HAREN

The Owl is a bird of prey, and there are a number of species that live in Ireland. It is a very distinctive bird and can be easily recognised by its very large eyes and slow distinctive flight. It feeds on small birds, mice, voles, moths and young rats. They hunt by flying on the wing low over the ground, or by waiting on a convenient perch and then drop onto their prey with a sudden pounce. It has a very silent flight when hunting and depends on its very good sight and hearing to hunt at night. It carries off its prey in its talons and tears it apart with its hooked bill. The Owl can be found in heavy wooded areas,old church yards and old farm areas. It rears its young in a hole in an old tree, in a wall, or in a disused crows nest, the nestlings can vary in number from two to four and they depend on the parent birds until they are able to fend for themselves. It is a very quiet and secretive bird, and it ranges in its own area for hunting and breeding. A lot of these birds are killed at night when they fly low across the country roads by cars, if by chance you come across an injured Owl, give me a shout and I will find a good home for its convalescence

The Badger

The badger is a very common animal in Ireland but it is not seen very often, as it usually leaves its home, called a sett, after dusk and returns before sunrise after feeding. It is greyish in colour and it has a very distinctive colouring to its face, black and white stripes. It has very few natural enemies, a lot of them are killed while crossing the road by cars, there is a widespread belief that the badger is a carrier of Bovine Tuberculosis and for this reason it is killed and gassed by some farmers, so as to protect its livestock. A male badger is called a boar and a female


is called a sow, during February and March two to three cubs are born and they are very dependant on the parents. The badger cleans out its sett on a regular basis, straw, hay, leaves, it can be seen airing at the mouth of the sett and is restored before nightfall. The badger has a long snout and sharp claws which it uses for digging and probing the ground for worms, insects, berries, mice, and It has poor sight but a keen sence of smell. The badger lives in woods and if you happen to come accross one, stay very still and the badger will just carry on about its business as if you were not even there at all, and you can study its behaviour at close range.

At the time of writing this article the project has just completed its second week. So far, the weather has been much kinder than last years. At the end of the first week's registration we had approximately 350 children on our lists. Our activities have been many and varied. Perhaps one of the biggest gatherings of young people so far has been for the clean-up of the playground. Further afield we have taken groups to the fun park in Clara-Lara, Co. Wicklow. An item of great interest to the teenagers on the group was our Dublin-by-night trips with the Garda Junior Liaison Officer. This involved a tour of the Garda H.Q., the bottle factory, Dublin Airport and Tara Street fire station. The weekend of second week has the first of the project camping trips, this one being to Smarmore Castle, Co. Louth. There have been plenty of new people volunteering to help with the running of the project and for their help we have been very grateful. We hope to have a more detailed report of the activities of the project in the next issue of the newsletter.

CARTON COURT RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

The Rise and Rise of Carton Court Residents Association.

Readers of last edition will have noted that a new Carton Court Residents Assoc. has been formed. Carton Court has been without a properly constituted assoc. for several years.

The first meeting of the Association set about improving the estate's last position in the 1985 Tidy Estates Competition. The dedication of the many residents who worked from dawn to dusk over a one week period has proved Carton Court proudly reworthwhile. ceived the first place trophy at the Harbour Field on Sunday 6th July.

To crown this success Carton Court Ladies Team won the 7-a-side soccer competition and the tug-o-war competition.

At our meeting of the 7th July priority issues were identified:

1. The problem of Absentee Landlords who invariably leave their properties in an appalling condition.

(We note that some of them live in housing estates in areas such as Castleknock, where we are sure that the problems associated with rented homes does not exist, and are certain that the same Absentee Landlords would be in the vanguard of objectors to the all-night parties, vandalism and the dirty, weed-ridden properties have on the environment of others).

To the Landlords, the message from the Association is "we have had enough".

- 2. A delegate from the Association met with officials of Kildare Co. Council and Local Public Representative, regarding the taking over of the estate by Kildare Co. Council. The Association is determined to ensure that the people of Carton Court are not left with an unfinished estate because of unscrupulous speculators and inadequate laws.
- 3. The Association believes that sufficient analysis of the traffic patterns and environmental issues which will result from the by-pass link road through the built-up areas of Maynooth has not taken place.

The Association has been informed that they will lose some open space which was planned as an amenity when original planning permission for the estate was granted. (If it was necessary at the time that planning permission was granted, surely it is still necessary).

If this amenity with its 20-year plus of tree and hedge frontage has to be lost, the Association is demanding that a decorative wall of suitable height be provided as some compensation, and that trees be planted inside the wall. Association noted that what is good

enough for the Hermitage Golf Club is good enought for the residents of Carton Court.

The philosophy of our new association is that it will not be an elite group of dogooders. It is our belief that any association can only survive with the cooperation of the majority of residents and must act in consultation with the residents. It is up to all the residents of Carton Court to support their association.

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
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
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MAYNOOTH G.A.A.



MAYNOOTH TOWN F.C.

A brief history.

Maynooth Town F.C. came into existence in 1972 when the players and officials of Ballygoran United and Maynooth St. Mary's, two clubs that had been formed by separate bands of soccer enthusiasts a few years previously, decided to join forces. Prior to 1972, both teams had been competing in the recently formed Counties Section of the Leinster Junior League with a fair degree of success. The decision to join forces meant that more rapid progress could be made, and the decision to join the Dublin seciton of the League resulted in a dramatic improvement in standards. Interest grew so quickly that a second team was entered in the League, to be followed by a third team soon after. The club rapidly established a reputation as a force to be reckoned with in Junior football and many highly respected teams learned to their cost not to underestimate Maynooth Town, especially in Cup competitions. 1976-77 season was the most successful to date, when the First Team reached the final of the Sheeran Cup (the major trophy in the League) and won the Cruise Cup (another improtant trophy). They also finished runners-up in their division and went on to achieve a place in the Premier Division, the highest grade in the League. Inevitably there were some lean years as standards everywhere improved but more success was not to be denied and in 1981 the Third Team won their division, becoming the first team in the Club's history to actually win a division. The decision to switch the second team to Saturday football at the beginning of the 80's was a great success, as they have raced to success after success, winning Division Two and Division One in successive seasons and also capturing the Mithen Cup, the numbers one trophy in Saturday football. The season just ended was another triumphant one, with the first team winning promotion back to its rightful place in the premier division, and also taking the Watkins Cup.

The Club caters for three teams and also works in close co-operation with Maynooth Schoolboys' Club who run three underage teams and have developed many fine players over the years. With such a large membership, facilities are obviously important, so it may come as a surprise to those not familiar with the Club that it has never enjoyed the luxury of a settled home in all the years of its existence. Indeed many of the original club members can remember playing where several of the housing estates in the Maynooth area now stand! To be constantly relying on the goodwill of

landowners is obviously a very precarious way of existing, especially with such large numbers involved. Nevertheless, the hardworking Committee continues to press on in the hope that a permanent base can be established. A development fund has been set up for this purpose and it is to be hoped that, with thesupport of the public authorities and our local representatives, the name of Maynooth Town will continue to figure proudly in the honours lists for many years to come.


TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

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
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
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
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Tips on Carpet & Furniture Maintenance

Firstly we will establish that carpets are generally the most expensive single item in your house, therefore hard to replace. So it would be sensible to look after

Here are a few tips on looking after them.

Problems on spillage i.e. wine, coffee, milk, could be removed by pouring soda water over the spillage while wet, then rub with a dry cloth. Chewing Gum is simply resolved by puting ice cubes on and freeze the gum. Then strike the gum with a sharp edged instrument, this will cause it to break up.

Scrubbing the carpet with detergent or shampoo is not recommended as you are only cleaning the surface of the carpet. Consequently when the shampoo drys it crystalizes and binds the fibres together. It may look well for a few days but after that it tends to look dead and dull.

It never hurts to brush a carpet with a stiff broom once in a while.

The plack marks around the edges and under the doors can be removed. although many carpet cleaners will say they can't. It only needs an extra bit of effort, but it has to be done by ex-

If you are deciding to call a carpet cleaner in, make sure the firm is proficient and if they are using what is generally known as the steam cleaning method. Make sure they buff up the carpets first. This has two functions, firstly it loosens the carpet fibres and injects a detergent into the carpet. Secondly as the fibres are loose the carpet will dry much quicker as the air can circulate through the carpet. Remember the longer the carpet takes to dry the less chance of it being cleaned properly.

Furniture

There are only a few tips regarding this aspect. Most suites these days are Dray-Ion of various quality, tapestry and silk linen. Covers on the backs and arms of chairs are very practical and some quite attractive laces and embroideries.

One piece of advice would be, not to wash covers in the machine as its risky. Sometimes a lot of cheaper draylon covers can tend to shrink. Most marks can be removed.

Maynooth Community Council celebrated two years in office at its meeting in June. The Council was set up following elections held in May 1984 and since then has been working very hard at its programme for Maynooth. Already a number of achievements can be recorded, while achievements to come are still at the gestation stage.

Over the last two years, the council has organised two very successful St. Patrick's Day Parades. The recent Community Fortnight was very successful in bringing together on the playing fields, on the dancefloor and in the Square, residents of Maynooth who rarely venture past the confines of their privet hedges. Bringing people together is a very important aspect of the Council's work.

Perceptible improvements in the environment in the estates can be indirectly laid at the Council's door, as they have fostered an awareness among residents of the appearance of their surroundings by organising the tidy estates competition.

There are many other examples, large and small which may be given to show that the Council is working away in the background. However, a major aim of the Council is to improve economic circumstances in Maynooth as well as the social and recreational aspects of life. Already, the Council is a major employer. There are eight people currently employed by the Council under the auspices of state employment schemes, all working in the Council's offices located in the Mall, behind the Main Street. The Council is working on a number of feasibility studies for future enterprizes which showed help to reduce the problems of unemployment in the area.

All of this cannot be carried out without a lot of hard work and dedication on the part of the people on the Council and on the Council's sub-committees, and the support and co-operation of the business and residential communities of Maynooth.

A recent survey in Maynooth showed that the people surveyed were generally unaware of who their local councillors were, so the Newsletter decided to reveal all to readers, to strip the mask of anonymity from the hard working community councillors. Unfortunately, only twenty of the councillors were available for the camera, and we apologise to those who remain to blush unseen.

However, the names and addresses of all councillors are published here. All residents are entitled to contact them with any problems, suggestions, or ideas related to making Maynooth a better place for all to live in.

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MAYNOOTH MORTALITY SOCIETY NOTES

We the undersigned report the following statement on behalf of the Committee from Mr. J. Donnelly F.C.A. Hon. Auditor, Re. our Accounts for Year Ended 31.12.1985.

During 1985, 18 members died at a cost to the society of £4,950 (The grant being £275 per member).

Contributions earned £7,201 and interest on investment made £326.

This shows a profit for the year of £2,532 this added to previous years surpluses show that the assets of the society are now approx £10,000.

Whilst this is very encouraging there are still a small number of members who fail to pay their Annual Subscription This is most unfair to the members who are prompt in their payments.

The Committee unanimously agreed that if all outstanding arrears are not paid by the end of Sept. 1986, by defaulting members that they will forfeit all claim against the society and be excluded from future membership of the society, (please note under no circumstances will previous members who have defaulted, be allowed to re-join).

The committee would also like members to clear their annual subscription by Oct. 1986. This would enable us to have our balance sheet by the A.G.M. and our returns to the Registrar of Friendly Societies that much earlier.

> NEW EXPLORER CLUB FOR CHILDREN

In September, a weekly Explorer Club for children aged between 7 and 12 will start in Maynooth. Such clubs are already well-established in Dublin City and County, but up to now the nearest one to Maynooth has been based in Lucan.

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
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Grants and Scholarships for Third Level Education

The following is some information on grants and scholarships, most of which are applied for when the Leaving Certificate results come out.

The Higher Education Grants Scheme:

This applies to students following fulltime courses of at least two years' duration in the Universities. Teacher Training Colleges, Dublin Institute of Technology, Regional Technical Colleges. NIHEs. The grant is administered through the local authority (Kildare County Council, St. Mary's Naas for Maynooth residents).

To qualify, students must be aged at least 17 years on 1st January following the Leaving Certificate. They must also have passed five subjects in the Leaving Certificate with four honours and one other pass grade. The four honours may be reduced in certain circumstances, e.g. an honour in Maths will be counted as two honours, as would an honour in Irish. A means test is also applied. In 1986 a student whose parents have six dependent children and an income not exceeding £16,546 would be eligible for a grant of one-quarter of lecture fees. On the other hand, a student whose parents have two dependent children and whose income does not exceed £8,880 may be eligible for the maximum grant covering lecture fees plus the maximum maintenance grant of £1,160 if the student has to study away from home, or £464 if the student can live at home. If family circumstances change later on the student may be eligible for an increased grant.

Application for this grant must be made after the Leaving Certificate results come out and before 31st August, to the Local Authority.

Vocational Education Committee Scholarships

These scholarships are administered by the local Vocational Education Committee (C/O Technical School, Naas for Maynooth residents) and these scholarships may be obtained by students who wish to follow courses of at least two years' duration in the DIT, RTCs, NIHEs, Colleges of Art, as well as a number of other colleges. The means test and grant

levels are the same as those for the Higher Education Grants Scheme, but a student only needs two honours and three passes in the Leaving Certificate including Irish and English.

Application should be made to the VEC by 31st August.

European Social Fund Grants:

These grants cover one and two year courses in the RTCs and Colleges of Technology in areas such as Engineering, Science, Secretarial Studies, Business Studies etc. The grants are not means tested, and amount to £464 per annum if the student is living at home or £1,160 if living away from home. A list of courses covered by this scheme is available in the Community Information Centre.

Other grants and scholarships:

Maynooth College provides a scholarship for one resident of Maynooth or any of the six adjoining parishes (Kilcock, Clane, Celbridge, Leixlip, Kilcloone, Dunboyne). Application forms may be got from The Scholarships Board, President's Office, St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.

There are a number of scholarships and bursaries which may be availed of in other universities and colleges. Further details available in the Community Information Centre.

Special Grants Scheme for Mature Women Students:

This is a new scheme operated by the Office of the Minister of State for Women's Affairs, for 1986/87. Application forms and details may be got from The Office of the Minister of State for Women's Affairs, Department of the Taoiseach, Government Buildings, Dublin 2 -Phone number (01) 689333 Ext. 347.

Closing date for receipt of applications is 30th September 1986.

For 1987 Leaving Certificate students, the Information Centre has information on colleges and courses and applying for admission to these colleges.

The Community Information Centre is upstairs in the Public Library, Main St., Maynooth. Centre's opening hours are: 10.00-12.00 Wed. and Fri. 2.00-4.00 Mon. Wed. and Fri. 7.00-8.00 Thurs.

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





Bubbling over with Joy. Following Carton Court's great victory in the Tidy Areas Competition is Kevin Connolly, Chairman of the Residents Association.

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
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TIDY AREAS COMPETITION - JUDGES' COMMENTS

The judges inspected all the housing areas on the afternoon of Tuesday 2nd July. They paid particular attention to open grass areas/play areas, the general level of maintenance apparent in the estate, the front garden displays, the state of verges, kerbsides, walls, fences, shrubbery and the appearance of the houses themselves. On this basis the following awards were made.

First Prize

CARTON COURT

This area has shown a vast improvement over the past year. A maturing estate, its open plan approach to garden fronts was particularly appealing and effective, with well maintained and displayed front gardens, well-stocked with shrubs and flowers. The area was tidy, neat and quite clear of litter. The open spaces were well tended and attractively planted and particularly distinctive feature was the hedge skirting the Straffan Road, enclosing the open space. This should be retained and might benefit from some maintenance. The gutters and verges were extremely well kept. The one negative feature of the development is the final phase which could be enhanced significantly by a general tidying up of the area and additional planting.

Second Prize

COLLEGE GREEN

An attractive new estate, which has maintained its high standard over the past twelve months. The attractively low wooden fences separated well-kept and colourful gardens. The impact of the cream/brown colour combination of houses and fences was effective. There was clear evidence of attempts to improve the periphery of the estate, with rock gardens and tree plantings.

Third Prize

GREENFIELD ESTATE

As the largest estate, this was the most difficult to evaluate because of the diversity of tastes reflected in gardens, fences and walls. Lawrence Avenue was the most pleasing sub-area, with nicely planned and planted trees in the open space. The open spaces, verges and hedges throughout the estate were reasonably well maintained. The negative impact of the variety of garden walls might be reduced by the use of a uniform colour and by planting more spreading shrubs. A greater attempt might also be made to reduce the amount of litter in the vicinity of the shops.

COMMENDATION Greenfield phase one.

COMMENTS ON OTHER ESTATES

Greenfield phase one.

This is a very pleasant cul-de-sac, with very attractively presented cottages at the entrance.

Greenfield phase two.

This is a potentially attractive cul-de-sac that would benefit greatly from extra trees and shrubs and less individualism in house facades.

Greenfield phase three.

Regrettably, a poor initial impression was conveyed by the sight of an abandoned and stripped car at the entrance (first impressions are often the most lasting). The area would benefit enormously from some co-operative grass cutting and tree planting.

Greenfield Lane

If the Council improved the road surface and if the hedges were tidied up, and fences attended to, this area would be immensely improved.

Rail Park

In general this was a tidy and pleasant estate with a good variety of trees and with some beautifully maintained houses whose impact, however, was marred by the presence of a number of poorly maintained properties. In addition, the open spaces, verges and gutters need attending.

The Crescent (Greenfield)

Lots of potential here, but no improvement in the last year. The open space is its most attractive feature but it is very poorly maintained.

Manor Court

Credit is due here for good design which adds to the atmosphere of the town centre. Although the development is unfinished it has potential but needs ongoing maintenance of accompanying grounds.

Parson's Street

This represents a very attractive unity of houses and open spaces, very well maintained (and might possibly be further enhanced by a better use of colour co-ordination on the houses). The open space, College entrance, the Castle, Church and Kelly's house distinguish this area very much.

Cluain Aoibhinn

This is a tidy, mature landscape which has potential but which is spoiled by a few badly-maintained houses and a certain blandness which might be broken by colour contrasts in fences, houses and gardens.

Town Centre

As the historic centre of Maynooth, this is the most distinctive part of the built environment in Maynooth. It deserves careful attention and a possible radical re-appraisal of recent developments. The tree-lined Main Street is the community's principal asset, which is marred by a number of plastic shop-fronts but contains a growing number of restored and original buildings. The Square is distinguished by the presence of Brady's traditional Public House at one corner, the ivy-clad residence at the other and the potentially attractive terrace on the east end (which might be more colourfully painted) but the grass triangle is poorly maintained. Some finger Sign Posts should be removed and the public conveniences and shelter are quite incongrous in appearance and location.

O'Neill Park

A tidy and pleasant environment with well maintained houses. Gardens and estate could be improved by extra trees and vegetation.

Leinster Park

A pleasant bungalow development, that is unfinished. It is poorly sign-posted. The entrance, with its poor road surface and unkept hedges could be improved.

Doctors Lane

A pleasant but undistinguished cul-de-sac.

Leinster Cottages

Attractive country town cottages, nicely maintained in the main.

Kingsbry, Beaufield.

Due to the fact that they were still in the process of completion it was difficult to judge these areas. Beaufield, however, showed considerable potential in its excellent landscaping endeavours, in marked contrast to Kingsbry.

GENERAL REMARKS

In general, there was a significant overall improvement and a noticeable increase in litter-free areas, which it was hoped will continue to be maintained. Evidence of tree planting in many areas was quite impressive, and a number of places would benefit from further efforts in this direction. The cleaning-up and maintenance of many of the open spaces in the residential areas was impressive. In conjunction with the extensive restoration of the Royal Canal and Harbour and the gradual restoration of the Town Centre, the image of Maynooth is improving significantly. There is clear evidence of a growth in communal effort in virtually all parts of the town and this is highly commended by the judges.

The town centre contains some significantly improved areas. Although there are a considerable number of plastic signs, the unit of shops extending from the Leinster Arms to the Roost deserves special mention. The Leinster Arms is one of the most important buildings in the Main Street which suffers somewhat from an over-indulgence in largely unnecessary Neon Signs. The second important group of shops extends from the Elite to Brady's Public House. The Library is a particularly fine example of a simply re-constructed Main Street building. The CPL Motors have maintained a nice traditional shop front, which has been somewhat spoiled by the addition of a plastic sign. O'Brien's Shopping Centre has been colourfully renovated. However, the front veranda is poorly maintained and the glass frontage is unimaginatively plastered with an over-abundance of posters. It could be improved significantly by the addition of some attractive art work features. The americanisation of "center" in 5 foot letters on the front is unfortunate.

Finally, a number of further criticisms might be made. Firstly, a bad impression is created by the derelict site opposite the entrance to Greenfield Lane on the Straffan Road. The public telephone opposite the Garda Station looks to be continually vandalised. The judges would appeal to the landlords of rented accommodation in the housing estates to make a greater effort to maintain the external appearance of their properties.

The Environmental Sub-Committee of Maynooth Community Council is indebted to the judges for making their services available and for preparing the above detailed report.

SHOP FRONTS COMPETITION — RESULTS JUDGES' COMMENTS

The judges inspected every commercial establishment in the village, Maynooth Shopping Centre and Greenfields Shopping Centre. On the basis of criteria such as: general maintenance, originality/character, harmony with the surroundings, presentation of window display, and the level of effort put into improvements, the following awards were made.

First Prize THE COUNTRY SHOP

This comprises the major part of an interesting terrace facing west-bound traffic through Main Street. It is tastefully restored in traditional manner, with simplicity being the main theme throughout — in stonework, pebbledash and colour scheme.



Second Prize ALAN FRAZER LTD. TOP OF THE CROP (on Main St.)

The most appealing aspect of these premises is that, despite their contrasting retail functions, the original unity of the shop front has been maintained. The window displays in both were effective in their simplicity.

Third Prize THE GERALDINE ARMS (CAULFIELDS)

Caulfield's Lounge Bar has consistently maintained a high standard of sign writing over many years, which has undoubtedly set standards for other retailers in Main Street.


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

FRENCH BOYS' CHOIR VISITS MAYNOOTH

The Douai Boys' Choir of France performed to a small, but enraptured audience in Maynooth College Chapel on July 1. The Choir members were enthralled with the College Chapel, with its magnificent architecture and furnishings, and its wonderful accoustics.

The Choir visited Maynooth as part of an extensive tour of Ireland, which covered a wide range of venues from Bangor to Tramore. Maynooth Community Council hosted the 45 members of the Choir during their stay in Maynooth, and the Council is deeply grateful to the Salesian Fathers especially Fathers Smyth and Delahanty, for making their hostel available. The Council is also grateful to the Maynooth College authorities and staff for facilitating the concert, to the Maynooth Venturers and Girl Guides for acting as stewards, and to Deirdre and Elizabeth Kennedy for acting as hostesses and as interpreters.

The Council is particularly indebted to the members of its Youth Affairs Sub-Committee who put in tremendous work in organising the visit and catering for the Choir during their stay.

LUXURY IN KILDARE!

The owners of Carton Estate, Powerscreen International, made the house and the 1000 acres of ground available to the Tyrone Gaelic Football team for the weekend before their clash with Down in the Ulster Final in July. The team spent the weekend watching video recordings of their opponents, working out in the grounds as well as in the playing fields in the College. The facilities were the envy of other teams not so fortunate to attract such generous sponsorship. The Tyrone connection arises from Powerscreen's factory in Tyrone, where some of the players and their families are employed.

MAYNOOTH PLAYS HOST TO ROYALTY

The Spanish invasion of Maynooth was given a royal welcome when the King and Queen of Spain, accompanied by the President of Ireland and Mrs. Hillery paid a courtesy call to Maynooth College on July 2, as part of their official visit to Ireland

The entourage arrived in Maynooth by car, and then proceeded to the magnificent College Chapel, where the royal couple were welcomed by Monsignor Michael Ledwith, President of the College and Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, in the presence of College staff, their guests, and other dignitaries. College staff presented the party with gifts of books and Belleek china.

Historically, there are strong links between Ireland and Spain, as many Irish priests were trained there, especially in the Irish College in Salamanca, which was founded in 1592, and which continued in operation until 1936 when it was closed following the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War.

An extensive collection of books, documents, vestments, pictures, and other treasures were moved to Maynooth College from Salamanca and other Spanish sources, and a selection of these were displayed in the College Chapel for inspection by King Juan Carlos and Queen Sofia. At the College to greet the visitors were the last Rector of the Irish College to Fr. Alexander McCabe, and fourteen other Irish priests who graduated from there. Fr. McCabe had met the King's grandfather, King Alfonso on a number of occasions in the Irish College.

Following the speeches and presentations, the entourage were entertained to a recital by Maynooth's own St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band. They then boarded a helicopter and left for County Clare.

PROGRESS ON THE ROYAL CANAL

The visual effect of the work on the canal would have escaped the notice of very few over the past months, but a lot of people may not be aware of the overall plan and aims of the committee of the Royal Canal Amenity Group (Maynooth Branch) who look after the project.

Restoration of the Canal

One aim is the restoration of the harbour and canal between the 13th and the 14th lock. This includes the restoration of the harbour walls with the construction of a boat slipway, clearing the banks, dredging the harbour and canal. The first stage is to complete the stretch between Mullen and Bond Bridges, piling and raising the height of the island in the harbour, which is to be left as bird sanctuary, by popular demand, land-scaping the harbour field banks, and the provision of seating in the harbour area.

Employment and training

Another aim is to give work experience and training to unemployed young people through the AnCO training scheme. Forty young people over the past 18 months have worked on the scheme, and a number of these have gone on to permanent jobs, helped by the Foreman in charge of the project, Phil McDermot who takes more than just a passing interest in the welfare and prospects of the trainees.

Finance

We have encountered a lot of problems — the biggest of which is the lack of money. To date, we have done fairly well at fund raising and have received donations from private, public and commercial bodies in the Maynooth area. We have also been fortunate in obtaining grants from AnCO and the County Council. At the time of writing we are planning a fund raising event on the 26 July, on the Grand Canal from Robertstown. Let's hope it goes well, and is well supported.



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
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DRAMATIC TIMES IN MAYNOOTH CASTLE

August 12th marks the centenary of the death of Sir Samuel Ferguson (1810-1886), poet and antiquarian. Originally from Belfast, Ferguson spent his adult life in Dublin, and in the 1830's he toured Kildare and Carlow. Soon afterwards he wrote a series of historical tales, the longest of which is called 'The Rebellion of Silken Thomas', A large part of this story tells of the siege and capture of Maynooth Castle in 1535. The imposing ruins had obviously made an impression on Ferguson calling to mind the stirring events of three centuries before. Here is his description of the castle as first seen by the story's hero, Sir John Talbot, brought there, a captive of the Geraldine party:

"Day broke, and presently the sun rose red and broad before them. They were, then, travelling eastward; and when the knight tore open the curtain of the litter and looked forth, the broad plains of Kildare and Dublin lay many a mile ahead. The whole landscape was glistening in the dewy light of sunrise; blue hills bounded the horizon on either hand, but before them the rich champaign extended unbroken to the level skyline, and there, full against the red orb itself, like some black gigantic sentinel before the gates of day, stood the great tower of a castle, dusk, huge, and half obscured in the very radiance it interrupted. "It is the Keep of Maynooth!" exclaimed the wretched knight, and dropped his head upon his hands in despair.

The story was last printed in 1887. Perhaps some local publisher should bring it out again!

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



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Here are a few tips which will make it more difficult for burglars to visit your home.

Locks and Bolts

Burglars usually enter a house by the rear window or door, so make access to this area more difficult by fitting a side gate and keeping it locked at night and when away from the house.

Use a mortice deadlock (5 lever) and a 6 inch bolt, fitted with substantial screws on the front and back doors. Fit a night chain and a spyglass on to the front door to allow you to ckeck out late callers.

Fit mortice bolts or window security catches on all windows.

If you have wooden or glass panels in doors, an ornamental wrought iron frame could be fitted and bolted into position.

Other Precautions

Never leave your house empty with unlocked windows or doors.

If you are leaving the house empty for any length of time, let a neighbour know.

Ask the neighbour to draw the living room curtains at night and put on a light, but arrange for curtains to be opened by day.

If you will be away for a longer period ask the gardai to keep an eye on your property. They will be happy to oblige.

Cancel milk and newspapers and ask a neighbour to make sure that leaflets etc. are not left sticking out of the letterbox.

Keep a dog to deter the burglars, if you have enough space.

Install a burglar alarm, although these can be expensive.

Keep valuables out of sight and do not leave cash or jewellery in an unoccupied house.

Finally, most security precautions will act as a deterrent. The really determined burglar may succeed in entering your house, so make sure that your property is adequately insured.

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

Taoiseach's visit

Dr Garret Fitzgerald will visit the Co. Kildare Constituency on Monday, Sept. 8th. He will commence in North Kildare and will probably visit Maynooth around noon before moving on to Naas.

2. Policing in North Kildare

In view of the continued and unacceptable high crime rate in North Kildare, Deputy Bernard Durkan, has submitted proposals to the Minister for Justice for the re-organization and redeployment of Garda strength in the area involving a new Garda Station in Leixlip, and the provision of extra patrols in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge.

These patrols would give much greater efficiency in the use of manpower.

The Minister has replied as follows: "The Garda authorities are making a comprehensive report on policing in the North Kildare area, and hope to finalise the report within two to three months." Re. Maynooth Garda Station he states: "Garda authorities say that the present opening hours of the station are so fixed as to make as many members as possible available for outdoor patrol duty while maintaining a reasonable office service. The mobile patrols operate from Naas. These matters will all be considered in the current review of policing arrangements in North Kildare".

3. Bond Bridge (Pucks)

Further to the Co. Engineer's agreement to Deputy Bernard Durkan's proposal for a complete re-alignment of Pucks Bridge, the Co. Engineer has now requested a report from the consulting engineers. The approximate cost of the work is £500,000.

4. Mullen Bridge

The County Engineer has informed the County Council that he has requested a report from the consulting engineers re. widening Mullen Bridge and correcting of the entrance to the Canal bank.

The Minister for the Environment. has informed Deputy Durkan that he has allocated £157,000 for the improvement of county roads in Kildare. In determining the allocation for each county the solutions to offer. The Workers' Party ies collected in local charges, which is used to fund work on county roads and other services. Following representations by Deputy Durkan, Kildare County Council will carry out repairs to Convent Lane (£3,000) and Kilmacredock Green Lane (£5,000).

6. Allocations

Deputy Bernard Durkan, speaking at a District Executive meeting of Fine Gael in Celbridge, informed the Officers of the following allocations being made available for the various services, by the Department to Kildare County Council.

> Sanitary Services £1,802,000 Housing Authority £3,160,000 Roads £ 157,000

7. Maynooth Employment Exchange

A request by Deputy B. Burkan to the Minister for Social Welfare to improve the facilities at the Maynooth Employment Exchange has resulted in the following reply:

"The branch manager has been endeavouring to obtain suitable premises. He purchased a property some time ago but was refused permission to convert it for an employment exchange. With regard to privacy it is accepted that there is little privacy in the office. The only solution would be for a claimant to make an appointment to call to the office during off-peak times. When the manager is successful in obtaining a new premises the provision of private facilities will be pursued."

First of all, it provides ch participant with the opportunity learn how to deal better with the partular situation(s) that are causing her fficulty at the moment. Practising asrtive behaviour is central to the work of e Course. The ground is prepared for is practice by learning about the theory assertiveness and by gaining a clear iderstanding of the skills that go to ake up assertive behaviour. Fundaental to all of this is an understanding d acceptance of our Basic Human ights. At its root, our problem is often ie to the fact that we don't feel enled to ask, or to say "No." or to init, or to express an opinion. So, the burse is a blend of theory and pract-

The 20-hour Course usually runs over sues, including Building Self-Esteem, Copa period of 10 weeks and costs £45 (negotiable in certain circumstances). There iative. is usually a maximum of 12 participants in each group. The participants, along with the tutor, provide an atmosphere of support and encouragement for each other as they apply the theory and practise the skills in appropriate ways in their lives outside the group.

The Course deals with Background Material such as Basic Human Rights and Definitions of Types of Behaviour: Assertive, Aggressive, Passive and Indirect. It teaches the General Assertive Skills of Clear Communication, Repetition, Coping with the Response and Body Language. It also works in depth on Skills for Particular Situations: Saying "No", Making Requests Assertively and Assertiveness in Sexual Situations. And, finally, it addresses other Important Is-

ing with Rejection and Taking the Init-

The Course is based on the work of Anne Dickson, author of "A Woman in Your Own Right: Assertiveness and You". The Irish women who have been trained in this country by Anne Dickson have formed Redwood Ireland, an Association of Professional Assertiveness Trainers. Redwood Ireland is being officially launched in the week 8-13 September.

There will be a Free Introductory Talk on Assertiveness Training in the ICA Hall, The Harbour, Maynooth on Wed., 3 September at 8.00 pm. treet Talking is a new section of the Newsletter which will focus on the shops and sinesses of Maynooth. These concerns are at the centre of the town, literally and uratively, and contribute as much to the community as do the various clubs and ociations which have regularly featured in our pages. So, any news of events, or ilections on the commercial life of the town will be welcome here.

ver the next few months we will be profiling different aspects of the retail outlets in the town. We begin with a look at the town's bookshops.

Maynooth is fortunate in having two good bookshops already — and apparently ere are prospects of a third in O'Brien's Shopping Mall shortly. The two established ops are the University Bookshop inside the grounds of the college, and Rye River oks in the Centrepoint Shopping Arcade. Bookshops are a valuable resource in any mmunity, putting people immediately in touch with a vast range of entertainment, ormation and culture.

Rve River Books is run by Oliver Frawley, a Clareman who opened his doors October 1984. His was a pioneering venture - he was the first tenant of the arcade iich replaced Noone's garage on the corner, and along with The Country Shop opsite has taken the lead in opening up the "West End" of town. He stocks a broad nge of titles, with the national bestsellers in paperback like maeve Binchy's novels d books with a film or TV tie-in selling well - The Colour Purple and Out of Africa ing recent titles which aroused interest. He also carries some more specialised matal, in view of the special nature of Maynooth; religious and spiritual works are in ady demand, and there are also course related books for the schools and university. is the only bookshop at present keeping a stock of second-hand books on the elves. There is always the possibility of picking up study material at a bargain price, id a wide spectrum of meaty paperback fiction on a sale or exchange basis. At this ne of year the demand for school textbooks is at its height, and Rye River Books excellently situated to provide a year-round service to post-primary students, whose hool is just up the road. He has a good selection of cards and stationery, and even a ix of second-hand LPs to browse through. Oliver makes a particular point of welming browsers, who pop in just to find out what is on the shelves and maybe glance rough a volume or two. His attitude is in the best traditions of bookselling, treating ooks as something more than merely a commodity.

John Byrne's University Bookshop is well=known to the college staff and students it because of its situation at the heart of the Main Campus is probably less freiented by townspeople. John hopes that this will soon change, however, as more and ore people become aware of what he has on offer. And while the imposing college tes may look forbidding to some, he points out that intending visitors to the bookop will have no difficulty in entering and, as an extra bonus, to stroll through part f the college grounds is to experience one of the loveliest environments for miles bund. To get to the bookshop, simply bear to the left once through the gates and on you will see the corner-premises which contain the shop. John Byrne has some elve years' experience of the book-trade with leading Irish companies. For a numr of years he managed the university bookshop for Kenny's of Galway, but at the art of this year he took over on his own behalf and began injecting the new life that mes with increased personal commitment, much to the satisfaction of all on campus. hn is a Maynooth man, and is assisted in the shop by Bernadette Stanley. Asked hat John was like to work with, she pointed out that she had been there with him r eight years, so he can't be all that bad. Much of the University Bookshop's stock geared to the college courses, and while this does provide a ready market it also ings problems of its own, meeting time deadlines and number requirements while aling with a whole range of specialist publishers and suppliers. John Byrne's bookop will become more prominent in the opening weeks of the school-year, when he Il be opening a stall in the post-primary school for three weeks or so to supply necsary texts.

During the summer, when the students are away, the University Bookshop has a ady flow of customers from the various summer-schools and also from tourists visitg the college. To these last he is able to supply postcards, but has to disappoint equent requests for slides of the college. Surely an opening for a photographer here!

The University Bookshop is open from 8.30 through to 6.00 during term-times, onday to Friday. During vacations you are likely to find it closed at lunch hour. ye River Books opens six days a week, from 10.00 to 6.00 throughout the year.

News is that two more units are to open in the Greenfield Shopping Centre -ainderette and a coffee-shop.

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


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BRU BOSCO NOTES



Fuel Schemes

there are two separate fuel schemes in xistence.

Cheap Fuel Scheme

This scheme applies in the following owns: Arklow, Balbriggan, Bray, Cork, Dublin, Drogheda, Dundalk, Dungarvan, Dun Laoire, Enniscorthy, Gorey, Kilcenny, Limerick, New Ross, Waterford, Nexford, Wicklow.

It is operated by the local authority in each town.

2. National Fuel Scheme

Applies to everyone except those covered by the Cheap Fuel Scheme. It is means tested and each claim is assessed on its merits. Anyone whose only source of income is a Social Welfare or Health Board payment other than Unemployment Benefit or Assistance or Disability Benefit is likely to get assistance under the scheme. Apply to the Community Welfare Officer at your Local Health Centre. The C.W.O. attends at Maynooth Health Centre on Fridays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Both schemes operate from October to April.

Vouchers are given to those eligible and these can be used to buy any fuel. The value of the voucher is £5 per week, at present.

Local Social Service Councils, St. Vincent de Paul Society or other voluntary organisations sometimes give help with fuel. Further information can be got from Social Service Councils.

People with exceptional heating needs may be able to get further assistance under the Supplementary Welfare scheme (apply to the Community Welfare Officer).

Free Electricity Allowance

A free electricity allowance is available to certain pensioners who live alone or with a dependant and who are registered consumers of electricity. Those eligible are:

(a) People aged 66 and over and getting (i) any pension from the Dept. of Social Welfare, (ii) a British or Northern Ireland Retirement Pension, (iii) a Garda Widow's Pension:

(b) People who are getting Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance, Blind Pension or Invalidity Pension.

The allowance consists of relief from the Is it a Bank, or is it normal fixed charge and 300 units per month period between October and March and 200 units per two month period during April-September.

Under what is known as the "Group Account" Scheme a voucher, cashable at Post Offices, is available to those who would normally be eligible for the allowance but who are not registered conusing slot meters.

Free Bottled Gas Allowance

If you would otherwise qualify for a free electricity allowance but cannot avail of it because you are not connected to the ESB system, you may qualify for the bottled gas equivalent of the electricity allowance.

You must be living in a remote area a grant from the Department of Industry and Commerce and Energy or Roinn na Gaeltachta for the installation of bottled gas equipment.

Free Television Licence

If you have been awarded a free electricity allowance by the Department of Social Welfare, or would have got the allowance but cannot avail of it because and on Fridays from 6.30 pm to 9.30 pm. you do not have an electricity supply in your own name, you may obtain a free television licence.

This scheme only covers the cost of colour TV licence you must pay the extra cost yourself.

a Building Society?

No, it's a Credit Union. Many Maynooth residents may not be aware that there is an alternative to the traditional banking system in Maynooth. The Credit Union, started in Leixlip over 15 years ago, has had a branch in Maynooth for a number of vears.

STRAFFAN ROAD/LINK ROAD COMMITTEE

lune a letter accompanied by a map, outlining proposed alterations to the Straffan ad, was distributed to residents of estates on the road, by Councillor Emmet Stagg.

The purpose of these alterations was to convert Straffan Road into a link road to by-pass which is to be completed within the next few years. However, it was only en confronted with the scaled plan, that many residents realised the disruption d dangerous implications which arise from the dimensions envisaged.

An emergency meeting of those people immediately concerned was called by Mr. ed Leavy, who is also Trustee of the Maynooth Sports Park in the Harbour. At this eting a Committee was elected to co-ordinate a campaign of opposition to the plan proposed. We engaged a solicitor, Mr. Patrick Neligan, and an engineer, Mr. Colm ssett, to act on our behalf. Our solicitor wrote to the County Engineer outlining in and detail our opposition and requesting a meeting of our Committee with Council

Copies of this letter were sent to our local and national representatives, many of nom have since replied to our alternative suggestions, as provided by our Engineer,

While this plan is to convert the Straffan Road into a link road to serve the byss, it must be stressed that it is a plan which is "independent" of the by-pass plan. other words, maps of this plan were not on display at the by-pass public enquiry.

For those who have yet to see the proposed plan in map form, the following is a ort summary of its features and implications.

Although the road at the moment is approx. 27ft wide, it is proposed that it be dened, from Noone's Garage to near the Square, to approximately 52 ft wide, iniding footpaths of 11 ft. This in our view is inviting the motorists who pass this ad to use it as a speedway, near estates where the young population is spiralling

At the entrance to Old Railpark and Railpark estates, waste areas will be formed, here the existing road will no longer be used. These areas, in our opinion are very ely areas where temporary dwellers would settle, and further aggravate an already ronic problem in Maynooth.

Those people who own land along this road, stand to lose a significant area of nd, which can never be compensated for, and which will also detract from the sthetic appearance of the area. Residents of Straffan Way may not realist that they and to lose approx 21 ft off their green area.

Those residents of estates in the Newtown area, e.g., Cluain Aoibhinn, Beaufield, c., will either have to cut across through Old Greenfield onto the Straffan Road to t onto the by-pass or drive down into the village and up the length of the Straffan bad. The Council may make this road a cul-de-sac in order to erase this problem, it surely this will also cause inconvenience to the residents of Old Greenfield.

Eventually, we fear that the alterations envisaged in this plan, will cause an inease in the amount of juggernaut traffic which will come into Maynooth via the Dunyne Road, (already causing considerable damage, annoyance and danger to residents the Convent Road, etc.) and travel through the village centre, onto the Straffan bad.

Surely the object of a by-pass plan should be to by-pass the town/village, rather an to increase traffic which is both dangerous and undesirable. We support Cllr. ernard Durkan's suggestion of a ring road, which we will be pressing the Council to cept.

Further details of our campaign will be distributed to all the residents of Mayboth in the coming weeks via handouts to be distributed in all homes. We urge you support us in our campaign to protect Maynooth from the major and long-term iplications of this plan.


CHICKEN HIBERNIA

MAYNOOTH: IT'S SCENERY, CHARACTER, ETC.


Maynooth "consists of one long and broad street; the dwellings, of a class between houses and cabins, at either side, having an air of exceeding discomfort. The "hotel" is a long rambling building, the rooms of which remind one of the "hose" in the "sixth stage" - "a world too wide", and seem utterly unused to the intrusion of guests. At one end of the town is the entrance to Carton, the seat of "Ireland's only Duke": at the other, are the ruins of the ancient castle, the famous stronghold of the earls of Kildare, and the "Royal College of St. Patrick". The college is a peculiarly ungainly and ungraceful structure; it appears to have been originally a mansion of moderate size, the which additions have been made from time to time, and where elegance and uniformity have been sacrificed to convenience".


Hasn't changed much has it? Particularly when you look at the convenience in the Square to which elegance and uniformity have been sacrificed!

And what about the characters?

"The Maynooth priest ... being, at his outset utterly ignorant of society of a better order than his native village supplies and having, as a matter of course, contracted the habits of those among whom his boyhood was passed; reading not to enlarge his mind, but to confirm his narrow view of mankind - he enters the college, where he mixes, exclusively, with persons under precisely similar circumstances. Here, it is not reasonable to believe, all that is objectionable in his previous habits and education will be strengthened rather than removed;"



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NATURE TRAIL

The Wild Duck

here are a number of sepcies of Wild Duck that live in Ireland. One of the most ommon is the Mallard. The mallard can be found in every county. The male mallard s called a drake and the female is called a duck. The drake can be more easily picked but because of its beautiful coloured feathers, it has a green neck and head, it has a busy time for the M.A.D.E. committee plue area on its wings and a bringt plumage, where as the duck is a mottle brown. At he end of Summer both the male and female loose their feathers, this is called moultng, they do not fly a great lot while this change is occurring. They can live up to 15 (Monday).

The mallard breeds in Spring and early Summer, the nest is built of reeds, grass, vater roots, and when the eggs are laid they are covered by light down from the duck. The eggs are pale green in colour and vary in number from 8 to 15, they take 28 days to hatch and when the young are born they are yellow and dark brown in colour. The duck has webed feet, and the female duck brings its young to the water at a very early stage to learn to swim and to eat. It eats plants, small fish, frogs, snails, slugs and flying insects. The mallard is a very fast flyer, its main enemies are th fox, mink, and of course man, during the shooting season, from 1st September to 31st January. The mallard can be seen feeding on small ponds, lakes and rivers, the mallard can be seen preening its feathers by pressing its oil glands near the tail, this process is done a number of times each dat and this leaves the feathers waterproof. Mallards usually fly in large numbers and some of them migrate to warmer countries and return in

The Hedgehog

The Hedgehog is a very timid creature and can be found living in garden fields and woods. It is completely covered in sharp spines and is brown in colour, the hedgehog is often seen wandering in the evening time in quiet spots in search of food. Its main diet is snails, earthworms, birds' eggs, fruit ... apples, blackberries, gooseberries. The hedgehog makes its nest under an old shed, or in a wall or hedge, the nest is made of dead leaves, grass and twigs. They breed in the Spring and Summer, the litter numbers 5 to 6, the young stay in the nest for about 3 to 4 weeks before venturing out to scratch the ground for food. In Winter the hedgehog stays in its nest to protect itself against the cold weather, this is called Hibernation. They may live up to 10 years. Their main enemies are the fox and the badger, and of course a great number of them are killed while crossing the roads.

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

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RAVELLERS' SETTLEMENT

ildare County Council plan to build a alting site at Blacklion to accommod-te Maynooth's indigenous travelling opulation. The site will cater for 15 amilies, will have running water and anitation and is due to be completed nd ready for use in the Spring of 1987. lanning permission has been obtained nd the building is now out for tender. To date a copy of the plans at the site was unavailable for inclusion in the Newsetter to accompany this article.

The plans to build a halting site for ravellers will have many implications. firstly it will get them off the roadside nto a tarmacadamed site fully equipped vith running water, sewerage, and regular efuse collection. This will greatly imrove the living conditions of the travellrs whose poor living conditions coupled vith the damp climate, poor hygene, ack of toilets, dirty water, or no water, nuddy paths have led to impaired health and rampant disease. Bronchitus and heumonia are among the common repiratory diseases suffered as well as gastro-intestinal diseases, skin conditions und infestations of all kinds, (all third vorld illnesses). When we talked to the ravellers about the new halting site for Blacklion they welcomed the idea saying hat they would be more than willing to nove into it, and make use of it, their only wishes being that it would be stricty for Maynooth Travellers, and that the County Council would not enclose the nalting site with high walls as they have ione in many of the halting sites in Dublin. As one traveller remarked 'As far as I can see the walls were built to hide us away from the settled people out in my opinion Ireland can't hide the ruth they have us, so they can't hide us forever"


Education


The education of Travellers in Maynooth has been fairly successful to date, both primary school and the post-primary school contributing to this. However, as one of the teachers in the school remarked many of them start school late, only stay for a short period of time mainly because they fall back in the class and find it difficult to cope with that. Teachers would agree that travellers' children are no less intelligent than others and will make good progress given regular attendance and normal home condition. But for travelling children, home conditions are not normal. About 50% do not attend at all. Even the regular attendants seldom obtain maximum educational benefit and need much additional help and encouragement. Their handicaps are many. The building of a halting site at Blacklion and the settlement of travellers in Maynooth means that education facilities must be provided for them. Sr. Raphael in Presentation Convent said that she would continue to educate the travellers in the classroom and if necessary would apply to the Dept. of Education for an extra teacher to cater for them. However, the school system itself, its practices and curricula are unsuited for the travellers' needs. There has been successful education programmes organised in the past where special classes were set up, with the aid of an assistant teacher who is usually a traveller who can help communicate and identify problems. Usually they concnetrate on looking at the travellers own values and attitudes, own location in history, identity, economic activity and status (many involved in tinkering and horse dealing in the past). V.E.C. are experimenting with a programme of work suitably flexible to attract these young-It includes general education, crafts, cookery, simply woodworking,

sport and embraces continuing help with numeracy and literacy deficiencies.

Perhaps Maynooth could take advantage of such a scheme and set an example for the rest of the country.

Cuireann sé íonadh agus díomá orm nuair a fheicim an dreach mí-shásta a thagann ar dhaoine go minic nuair a thugaim an teagan Gaeilge de m'ainm doibh.

Ar an dochuair, tá neart daoine sa Ghaeltacht a bhfuil an dearcadh caolaigeanta céanna acu i leith na teanga is atá ag roinnt de mhuintir na Galltachta. Tá aithne agam ar chainteoirí dúchais de chuid an lar-thuaiscirt a bhfuil deargfhuath acu ar an teanga atá leo ón chlaoibhán; tá ceangal déanta acu ina n-aigne idir an Ghaeilge agus an cultúr ar thaobh amháin agus bochtaineacht, aineolas agus seanaimsearthacht ar an taobh eile. EDITORIAL

The Indian summer we enjoyed in mid-September brought the first bit of sustained sunshine this year. Unfortunately the children were all back at school and so could not benefit from it to the fullest extent. It seemed a pity that they had to come home on these fine afternoons only to confront an hour or more of homework. After the year we have had, there is a strong case for letting them off homework — even giving a day's holiday — at the first sign of blue skies!

More generally, wherever three or four parents are gathered together at this time of year, the talk turns to homework and how much the children are getting. Certainly, we know that things are getting competitive in the secondary, and even maybe in the primary level, but how much thought is given by our educators to the usefulness and purposes of homework. Time out of school can be a valuable opportunity for our teenagers and children to broaden their interests in sports and clubs, and to develop social skills; all too often this side of life is retarded by the constraints of school preparation.

Does more mean better where homework is concerned? Does a large quantity of homework indicate a teacher is concerned for his or her pupil's progress? Or does it indicate that the insufficient work is being done during class hours? Let's hear from you on this — parents, teachers and pupils!

Ever tried to find your way to a particular house on one of Maynooth's estates? Finding the number can be a chancy and random as filling in a bingo-card. This seems to be because the house numbers are simply the builders' lot numbers, and do not necessarily correspond to any logical arrangement. Residents might care to test themselves on how well they know the numbering of their own estate; then think how confusing it is for a visitor, or for a delivery service. And when the fire or ambulance services are trying to locate an address, vital minutes are often lost.

Perhaps the residents' associations would consider putting up some indication at the end of each road of the house numbers in it — as is already the practice in some Leixlip estates. Meanwhile, individual householders could ensure that their own number is clearly displayed and where it will get some light at night.

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

FINE GAEL NOTES

Many topics of national and local interest were discussed including the forthcoming visit of An Taoiseach - Dr. Garret FitzGerald, T.D.

The following replies were received to representations made by Deputy Bernard Durkan on many varied issues:

1. Kidney Lithotripter -

Meath Hospital:

The Minister for Health - Mr. Barry Desmond has informed Deputy Bernard Durkan, that he has allocated a substantial grant towards installing a Kidney Lithotripter at the Meath Hospital. The Litotripter which is used to disintegrate kidney stones by the use of shock waves, is for use nationwide.

2. Bank Interest Rates & Charges:

Deputy Bernard Durkan received the following reply from the Minister for Finance - Mr. John Bruton, re: bank interest rates & charges:

"In general terms the level of interest rates in Ireland is determined by the trend in international interest rates, by the level of domestic inflation and by the supply of, and demand for, money in Ireland, Therefore, this Government has areatly improved the interest rate climate by taking measures to control public expenditure and borrowing in order to lower the rate of inflation, ease the tax burden and reduce the balance of payments deficit. At present the prime overdraft rate of the Associated Banks is 10 per cent, its lowest level since 1978."

3. Extension of 66 Bus Service to Greenfield, Kingsbry & Carton Estates in Maynooth:

Deputy Bernard Durkan has received the following reply after continuous representations on behalf of residents in the above areas:

"We are willing to extend Route 66 along the Straffan Road provided Kildare County Council construct a suitable turning facility. The precise location of such a facility has been the subject of some discussion between ourselves and the County Council in recent months, but at this stage the matter rests with the Council, as the provision of a suitable turning facility is, in our view, the responsibility of the Council".

The Charges

The following motion has been tabled by Cllr. Emmet Stagg and Cllr. Kieran Coleman:

"That Kildare County Council re-affirms its opposition to charges for domestic water and collection of domestic refuse and hereby decides that all such charges be abolished by the Council from the first of January, 1987. The Council, as part of this decision to abolish Local Charges, hereby instructs the County Manager not to include these charges in the Estimates for 1987."

The motion now tabled gives another opportunity to all those opposed to the charges to abolish the charges in County Kildare once and for all.

It is noted that those Councils who have abolished the charges have not reduced the level of service provided to the public while those authorities who have retained the charges have not enhanced the services provided.

Removal of the iniquitous charges will be a major step in the reform of an unacceptably harsh taxation code.

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ADULT EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES IN MAYNOOTH

Autumn is the time when people start thinking of the long Winter nights ahead, and sometimes, coupled with a desire for self improvement, the thought of enrolling in courses comes to mind.

Maynooth is well catered for when it comes to courses for adults. Closeness to Dublin means that it is not too difficult to attend any one of the hundreds of courses from Aramaic to Zebra Stuffing available all over the city.

In Maynooth the choice is more limited, but there is still a wide selection. The MADE centre caters for those who want to do courses during the day. In the pre-fab in the Post Primary School students of all ages can learn how to write creatively, speak French or Irish, flower arranging or self defence, dance, or just get out of the house, while any children they might have are looked after in the creche on the premises.

In the Post Primary Shoool on the Moyglare Road, classes are held on Monday evenings, and you can begin to learn how to play golf, type, make clothes, lose weight, arts and crafts, french, photography, cookery, and very relevant for Maynooth, with its rural hinterland, farm accounts. The classes in both the MADE centre and the Post Primary School all started in the week beginning the 29th September.

The College opens up its doors in mid-October to people wanting to study for extra-mural certificates or diplomas in computers, social studies, counselling, Japanese studies, word processing.

Unfortunately, some of these courses are fully booked up, so places are not available. However, anyone who is interested in taking these courses should make enquiries at the addresses listed below. 

Stop Signs — Double Lane — P. Malone's The residents of Leinster Cottages and Pound Lane have been campaigning for some time to have the speeding through the area eliminated. Stop signs were requested in order to stop the flow of traffic from Biran Noone's Garage to Convent Lane at Double Lane. This we expected would ease the problem. A number of crashes have occurred at this point. A recent circular to the houses in the area indicated that our proposal was accepted and was recommended by the Garda authorities.

The Association has been informed that this is not so and that the Garda recommendation is for stop signs on all the roads leading on to Pound Lane and Back Lane.

This is totally unacceptable to the residents, as it would make a bad situation worse by giving an unimpeded flow to the large volume of traffic that now uses this unofficial by-pass of the Main Street.

At our request a motion has been tabled asking the Council not to accept the Garda recommendation and to have the matter referred to the Traffic Technical Committee of the Council. We will continue to campaign to make our area safe for local residents.

THE HARBOUR FIELD

The Harbour Field, located between the Canal Harbour and the Straffan Road, has long been used as a sporting facility by the people of Maynooth. Originally the property of the Dukes of Leinster, the field is currently owned by the Hon. Noll-Cain. the previous owner of Carton, who held on to a number of such properties in the area when he sold Carton.

After its establishment some twenty years ago, the Maynooth Development Association took an interest in the development of the field, and invested an amount of money in it, including the uncompleted running track and the present goalposts. In 1983 the field was leased for 999 years at a nominal annual rent to a board of seven trustees. Although associated with the Development Association, these trustees are, legally, a separate and independent entity. According to the lease, the field is to be used for bootball "and suchlike activities", athletics and other recreational activities with the trustees' permission.

In recent times, the field has not been used to its full potential and has become somewhat overgrown around the edges. With the wonderful restoration work being done on the Canal Harbour, it seems desirable that the Harbour Field itself should be landscaped, in order to transform the whole area into a topclass amenity and environmental showpiece. In addition, some form of regular management of the field is needed in order to allow the local community to get the maximum benefit from the field's recreational potential.

Accordingly, Maynooth Community Association, and the Council has applied to the Department of Labour for a grant to do a proper landscaping job on the

While the past summer has seen good use being made of the field by local groups, it is clear that some form of regular "supervision" is required in order to avoid a "free-for-all". The Community Council is prepared to make its services available in order to regularise the use of the field. What the Council is proposing is that groups who wish to use the field on a regular or once-off basis would put their names on a diary to be kept in the Community Council office. This, hopefully, would prevent a situation where different groups would be trying to use the field at the same time, which could produce an impossible situation.

The Community Council is trying to arrange a meeting with the trustees to discuss these proposals. In the meantime, the Council appeals to all interested groups to abide by the system outlined above. While the Council has no legal right to impose this system on anyone, the Council hopes that everyone will recognise the need for the system, and that a mature and responsible approach will allow difficulties to be sorted out if they

Maynooth Divorce Action Group reviews its committment to the political task of removing the constitutional ban on divorce and the introduction of divorce legislation. We will campaign on many fronts:

- As a legal remedy to marriages that have irretrivably broken down.
- As the freedom to establish families as people choose.
- As the right to live in a society whose laws are not dominated by any religion.
- And as a fundamental issue of civil rights and democracy.

Divorce will remain an issue for those demanding the right to remarriage, civil rights and a secular society. D.A.G. is now broadening its political campaign to encompass issues of relevance to separate people and single parent families, such as:

- Illegitimacy
- Nullity
- Social Welfare and service policy (Ben efits, Sheltered Homes, State Mediation Services, Housing Assistance to working men and women in the home etc.).
- Family Law and Free Legal Aid Reform.
- Succession and Matrimonial property
- Separation of Church and State in all areas of family and marriage law.
- Children's rights, Maintenance and custody.

These are just some of the many areas that played a major part in the Referendum and it is these issues that we will be confronting.

With regard to organisation, the main lesson to be drawn from the Referendum campaign is that we cannot rely on the main political parties to campaign on this issue. Our own membership must be increased in order to have a good organisation for the next Referendum.







NATURE TRAIL

The Rabbit

The wild rabbit, found in every part of Ireland, has a soft thick greyish fur, a keen s ence of smell and very good hearing. The eyes are to the side of its head and it can see to the side as well as to the rear and front. The front teeth of the rabbit never stop growing and for this reason the rabbit never stops eating, grass, bark from trees, cabbage and roots. The rabbit has very sharp claws for digging and for fighting with its own kind to defend its territory. They keep their bodies clean by licking their front feet and then rubbing the body and ears. Most rabbits live in large groups for safety and breeding and when danger is near they hit the ground with their back feet and scurry away into their burrows. Most rabbits feed at dawn and dusk, and they sleep lying stretched out in the sun near to the burrow. The male rabbit is called a buck and the female a doe. The doe carries its young for about 25-30 days and usually has 4-6 kittens as they are called. The young are covered up with soft grass and fur from the mother which she pulls from her body to keep them warm, the kittens cannot see or hear and have no fur when born, but by the time they are two weeks old they can be seen running near to the mouth of the burrow and close to the mother, correctly you should contact Kildare The doe has about five litters of kittens each year and they breed from January to September. Their main enemies are hawks, the fox, owls, and man, a lot of them are able from the post office or library. killed crossing the roads, the dreaded disease of Myxomatosis has accounted for the destruction of thousands of rabbits over the years.

The Salmon

The Salmon is a large silver/grey fish with black spots, it migrates to this country in large numbers to spawn. It comes from countries like Iceland and Greeland, by the time it reaches here it is very tired as it does not eat during this period. The female (hen) Salmon when it comes up the rivers, scoops out holes in the river bed with its tail and body and lays its eggs, the male (cock) salmon then fertilizes the eggs. The Salmon comes back to the same river in which it was born to breed, it finds its way to this river by the individual taste and smell of the river water. The young salmon called smolts stay in the rivers for about three years and then move off towards the sea where it grows very quickly with the abundance of sea food. Their main diet are small fish and insects. In the last number of years the Salmon numbers have decreased due to a lot of factors, pollution, high technology radar attached to the fishing boats and illegal poaching.

CAN YOU VOTE?

During the recent constitutional referendum a number of Maynooth Residents were denied a vote because their names had been omitted from the voters' register, or their electoral status had been incorrectly given. One person had been recorded as being allowed to vote only in local elections, despite being an Irish

If you found yourself without a vote, or if you have recently changed address, you should make sure that your name is down for next year's voters' register. You can check the register in the post office or in the public library, and if you are not registered, or are registered in-County Council, using the form avail-

The draft register for 1987 will be published on 1st December 1987, and amendments must be made before 15th January 1987.

Inaredients 227 gr/8 oz Sugar 1 egg 1 teaspoon mixed spice 1 lb. Marmalade 340 gr/12 oz mixed fruit 1 cup boiling black Tea 397 gr/14 oz self raising flour

Method

Overnight place fruit in mixing bowl and cover with hot tea, leave to soak overnight.

Following day do not strain off liquid, add beaten egg, spice, marmalade, sugar, then gradually add flour. Mix all ingredients together and place into a 175 mm/ 7" square baking tin which is greased.

Bake in pre-heated oven 180 degrees centigrade/360 degrees fahrenheit Mark 4 gas, for 1½ hours on middle shelf.

Turn out to cool and store in airtight container.

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

CAROUSING IN CARTON IN 1849

The King and Queen of Spain who visited Maynooth in July, were not the first Royal visitors to be entertained to Maynooth musical revels

Queen Victoria recorded in her diary for Friday 10th August 1849 how "three old and tattered pipers" serenaded herself and Albert and sundry others to the strains of the Irish Pipe in the grounds of Carton House. Fortunately, St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band have acquired new uniforms, and a more varied assortment of instruments since then.

Queen Victoria spent all of four hours in the environs of Maynooth on that hot August day. Her journey by horse and carriage took an hour and a quarter from the Vice-Regal Lodge in the TAOISEACH VISITS MAYNOOTH Phoenix Park to Carton, not much slower than a badly congested Friday afternoon run from Dublin on the 66 bus.

On her way, she passed the "Preember 7, with a vacancy created in his paratory College for Maynooth", spying a number of Maynooth sutdents. Were they swotting for repeats?

The party then embarked into car-

riages and jaunting cars, and went for a drive. "The people riding, running and Dr. FitzGerald then proceeded to driving with us, but extremely wellbehaved; (phew, thank heavens for that!), and the Duke is so kind to them that a word from him will make them do anything". Despite the hot weather (it was, after all, a different century), the locals "kept running the whole way, and in the thick woollen coats which it seems they always wear here". Two years after the Great Famine, which devastated much of Ireland, the people of Maynooth appear to have been an energetic lot. The party proceeded down "an entirely new road, cut out of the solid rock, through a beautiful valley, full of the finest trees. growing among rocks close to a piece or water. We got out and walked across a wooden bridge to a very pretty little cottage, entirely ornamented with shells. e.c. by the Duchess". The shell cottage is still there, as is the wooden bridge.

She returned to the house in the jaunting car, squashed in between Albert and the Duke, and taking her leave of the hosts, returned to the Phoenix Park via Lucan and the Strawberry Beds and was home for tea a little after five o'clock.

MAYNOOTH WOMAN APPOINTED TO TOP UNICEF POST

Sally Fegan, whose mother, Pamela Fegan, owns the Country Shop craft shop and restaurant in Maynooth, has been appointed UNICEF Representative in Uganda. She is the first Irish person to be appointed to the position of Country Representative and one of the few women to hold this post.

Sally will be responsible for UNI-CEF's \$10 million programme of assistance to Uganda, incuding water supply and sanitation projects, and child health and nutrition services. She has worked in UNICEF for seven years, spending four years in Liberia before moving to Uganda three years ago, where up to her new appointment, she worked as UNICEF Programme Officer (Health).

The posting to Uganda has its moments of excitement as well as danger. Sally was in Uganda during the coup in 1985, and she was also involved in the Corridor of Peace established by UNICEF to fly supplies to five million people in Southern Uganda, who had been cut off for six months.

The Fegan family are delighted with Sally's success in reaching such a responsible position within a relatively short time. The Newsletter extends its congratulations to Sally, with the hope that Maynooth people will help Sally and all her colleagues by giving generously to appeals from UNICEF for funds for assistance for the Third World.

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
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COLLEGE NOTES

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

























Editorial

What does it say about us as a community when a dumped van is premitted to remain in the same spot for several years, where litter is strewn around the street, where disused buildings are allowed to grow derelict and infect the local landscape, where grass verges are overgrown and weeds are abundant, where the standard of street furniture is just 'unacceptable', where the area around the public toilets is a disgrace?

It seems to say that we as a community just do not care about the environment in which we live. We can all contribute to enriching our environment - simple suggestions would be to place our sweet papers, our cigarette papers and all the wrappings produced by modern living in one of the many bins provided for the purpose. If the bin is full to overflowing - just bring it home with you, don't add to the overflow. And if you see someone dropping litter in the street - challenge them politely but firmly - Maynooth is your

Then, all those areas in public ownership - take responsibility for the area in front of your house - be conscientious about clipping around trees and removign weeds from kerbs. Regard the area between your boundary and the roadside as your responsibility. It doesn't take much extra time - but think of the pleasure that living in a clean, obviously cared for environment can give. If that alone doesn't appeal, then think about the increase in property values! for other areas, complain loudly and long to the county council - who are responsible for maintaining street furniture and public toilets, as well as to businesses who pollute the visual environment with masses of plastic signs.

Dear Editor,

I would like to take the opportunity offered by your editorial in last month's edition of Maynooth Newsletter to comment on the subject of homework.

At the outset I must make it clear that my views apply to the student in the Post-Primary sector only.

Second level schools have to contend with an educational system which is almost totally exam orientated. The examinations are mostly written and are based on extensive syllabi which must be covered if students are to do well. I have no hesitation in saying that it would be impossible to get through these courses without regular wellplanned and structured homework. How can anybody seriously expect a teacher of higher English, Irish or any other Leaving Certificate subject to teach a lesson, test the student's ability to assimilate and reproduce that lesson - all within the space of 40 minutes? It is not possible.

The pressure on students to do well in exams is increasing at an accelerating pace and most parents expect teachers to respond to this pressure by trying to ensure that the courses are well covered and This is done by utilizing the class teaching time to a maximum and by testing students through homework. Few parents would thank any teacher or school if valuable limited class time was used to give and correct homework. When well-informed parents discuss education it is far more likely they are concerned about the points rat-race rather than the fact that their child gets too much homework. We as teachers might like it to be otherwise, but as long as the examinations system prevails homework must remain an integral part of that system.

Hospital Services Card

The Hospital Services Card is given to people in Category II of the Health Service. The income limite for Category II was increased to £14,000 from 1 June 1986. This means that anyone whose income in the tax year 1985/86 was less than £14,000 is in Category II for one year from 1 June 1986.

Those whose income was below this level should apply to their local Health Board for a Hospital Services Card. The usual proof of income is a P60 which employed people get from their employers or, in the case of self-employed people, an agreed assessement from the Revenue Commissioners.

A Hospital Services Card, if awarded, covers the applicant and dependants.

A married couple are assessed separately if each has an independent income. If only one has an income then the other spouse is his/her dependant. This can result in a strange anomaly; a married couple with one income of £15,000 are both ineligible for Category II, while a couple each of whom earned £13,000 would both be eligible for Category II.

Children, up to 16 years, are considered to be dependants of the higher income earner.

All students between the ages of 16 and 25 who do not have a Medical Card, are entitled to a Hospital Services Card. They have a special application form which must be signed by the school or college.

Another group entitled to Hospital Services Card regardless of income are certain former voluntary contributors to social insurance. People in Category II

are entitled to free in-patient services in a public ward, free out-patient services, and free maternity services. Those with incomes above £14,000 are in Category III. They are entitled to free maintenance in a public word they must pay the consultants' fees themselves.

Application forms for Hospital Services Card and the Students' form are available in the Community Information Centre.

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KILDARE'S TRAVELLERS

A recent report by the Economic and Social Research Institute on "The population structure and living circumstances of Irish Travellers: Results from the 1981 census of traveller families" in July shows that Kildare is among the counties providing housing services to the fewest travellers. In 1981, there were 185 travellers in Kildare and of these only 25 or 16% were in housing, while the rest were living on the side of the road.

Despite impressions to the contrary the number of families in Kildare remained fairly constant between 1961 and 1981. There were 34 families in 1961, 19 in 1973. 31 in 1977 and 32 in 1981.

The families seen in 1981 were fairly mobile, with much movement in and out of the county. Only 19 of the families surveyed in 1981 had lived in Kildare the previous year. The other 13 families had come in from surrounding counties. Seven families who had lived in Kildare in 1980 were living in other counties in 1981.

The halting site proposed for Maynooth is designed to accommodate ten families, so, effectively one-third of the families in Kildare will be in decent accommodation before long. This should help to improve the lot of the travellers as well as resolving some of the problems caused to the settled community by the presence of roadside encampments.

The report points out that travellers are characteriesed by high infant mortality and low life expectancies, and they are set apart from the rest of the Irish population both by the quality and quantity of their lives. The authors of the report conclude that the circumstnaces of travellers are intolerable and that no decent society can afford to ignore their plight.

Mr. Kenny undertook to explore each of these options, and to report back as soon as possible. The deputation thanked the Minister for meeting them, and looked forward to hearing further from him at an early date. In the meantime, the Working Party is to obtain the services of a quantity surveyor to provide more detailed costings

of the proposed complex.



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SPORTS COMPLEX DEPUTATION MEETS MINISTER

A deputation from the Maynooth Sprots Complex Joint Working Party met Mr. Enda Kenny T.D., Minister of State in the Department of Education with special responsibility for community recreational facilities, on October 15 last in Department of Education offices in Marlborough Street, Dublin. The deputation included Pat Dalton, the Bursar of Maynooth College; Colm Buckley, the College's Buildings Officer; Tom Ashe, on behalf of Maynooth schools, and Proinnsias Breathnach, on behalf of Maynooth Community Council. Also present were Bernard Durkan T.D., M.C.C., who arranged the meeting, and the Private Secretary to the Minister for Justice, Alan Dukes T.D.

Speaking on behalf of the deputation, Proinnsias Breathnach pointed to the rapid growth in Maynooth's population, with some 1,200 pupils now enrolled in the town's schools. The population of the area is projected to more than double over the next 20 years. Maynooth College is also growing, and with over 2,000 students, has no proper indoor sports facilities. This is in contrast with UCD and Trinity College, where excellent facilities have been provided in recent years.

The Maynooth Sports Complex proposal was an innovative one, said Proinnsias Breathnach, and reflected the unique nature of Maynooth as a university town, with most of the college-students living in the town and depending on it for most services. The proposal offered an efficient, intense level of usage throughout the year of a single facility, rather than the separate developemen of two facilities in the one area, which when fuel companys offer better might otherwise be the case.

The College Trustees, comprising the Catholic Bishops of Ireland, had already given a concrete expression of their commitment to the proposal by agreeing to make available a site for the complex on College land. The college's student body was willing to put aside a portion of student capitation fees to help fund the development. while a considerable amount of money had already been collected locally towards the swimming pool component of the complex.

- 1. A cabinet decision to make special funding available for the project.
- 2. Funding through the Higher Education section of the Department.
- 3. An allocation from the National Lottery, due to commence next February. CONCERNS ABOUT THE STRAFFAN ROAD

The Celbridge Area Committee Kildare County Council met a deputation from Maynooth Community Council on 17th October, to discuss the proposed upgrading of

Maynooth by-pass. The committee were presented with a written submission outlining the concerns among residents living in the vicinity of the road. The chief concerns are about the

inevitable increase in traffic using the road - including heavy vehicles. The safety of the large numbers of pedestrians using the road may be at risk. Residents are also concerned that extra traffic from housing areas to the west of

the town may be diverted through Greenfield Lane to gain access to the by-pass. The realignment of the road, it is feared may lead to dumping on the abandoned stretches to the side of the new road.

The community council made a number of positive and constructive suggestions in its submission as to how the situation may be improved. These include the construction of a relief road to the east and south west of Maynooth which they urged the council to bring forward as a matter of urgency.

The community council also requests the council to reconsider their realignment plans in favour of proposals outlined in their submission.

In conclusion, the community council requested they be fully involved in further discussions on the matter.

The County Engineer, Mr. J. Carrick, referred to the fact that financial constraints ruled out the prospect of a relief road for the time being, but that funding was available for upgrading the Straffan road. He undertook to examine the Community council's proposals and to furnish further information in due course.

The full text of the community council's submission will be published in the next issue of the Newsletter.

KEEPING THE HOUSE WARM THIS WINTER

HEATING THE HOME is a major cost for most people in Ireland. With winter on its way again it is time for us to think about insulation and fuel

There are two ways to save on heating bills: (1) buy and use fuel economicly and (2) keep the heat in by the proper insulation of your home. It is better to buy fuel in bulk and in the off peak Summer season prices. This off peak buying also applies to buying the heaters


themselves. Modern fire places with back boilers will heat radiators as well as water. Electric storage heaters allow be happy to advise on the heating system best suited to your needs. heating systems. Of course the best always depends on the circumstances in your home

If you use an automatic heating system you can save fuel and get the maximum comfort by timing the heat to the Straffan Road, which is to be the sole access road from the Maynooth area to the come on half an hour before you get up and to go off half an hour before you go to bed. By turning the heat down by one degree you can save 8% on your yearly bill.

> Insulation is important to get the best value from your heating. Eliminate draughts from doors, windows and masonry as 40% of heat can be lost this way. Cover the gap in the door where the letter box is with a flap of material. Unused fire places can be covered with hardboard to keep the room warmer. Double glazing should be considered as grants of up to £800 are available for window replacement. Most radiators give off heat into the wall. You can make them more efficient by placing metal foil behind them. Old carpets can be laid out in the loft to help prevent heat loss but proper insulating material is better.

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AnCO COURSE

On Monday 29th September, 23 new "girls" started in the Convent School — the old part — there was not a blue blouse or royal blue pinafore in sight or a "mammy" bringing in their daughter for the first time. In fact some of the new "girls" had already left their children to school. The "girls" were starting an AnCO Return to Work Course designed for married women who had given up work to rear their children and who now wished to resume their careers.

The course is being organised and run by Margaret Hodgins B.A. (Mod) and Colette Cowlard B.A. (Mod) from Irish Psychological Services.

Both are external trainers for AnCO as they have the necessary skills, qualifications and experience for the specific type of course.

The programme for the course includes Personal Development, Viewing

the Job Market and Options open to Women, Deciding what each woman has to offer and discovering their skills, Tuition in 'Job Seeking', training in new technology (computers, word processors), In-Company training and Time Management. Margaret and Colette have emphasised that the learning is two way the women have a lot to offer to them as well as their giving the women their knowledge, and expertise.

The course runs from 29th Sept. until 19th Dec.


USE AN OLD-FASHIONED clothes peg as a 'key' to get the most out of tooth paste tubes. Slip the peg over the end of the tube when about half the paste has been used. Twist the tube around the peg to get all the paste out.

Stop cord unravelling by using sticky tape or nail varnish at the end.

Matching the key to the lock. Use different shades of nail polish to mark each key and lock. It will save you going through every key on the key ring.

Broken Glass. A pad of damp cotton wool is just the thing for picking up tiny fragments of broken glass. Dab the affected area and the pieces of glass will stick to the pad which can then be thrown away.







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
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WEEKEND IN GALWAY by Rita Murray

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
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ONLY THE FITTEST SURVIVE

We all laughed heartily and glided back into earth's atmosphere.

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

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
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STREET TALKING

By the time you read this, Maynooth Main Street should have an important new addition with the provision of an 'automatic teller' or PASS machine at the Bank of Ireland. Scheduled to come into use on October 30th, it is to be installed on the front wall of the bank building in place of one of the windows. Manager Larry Ayers is delighted to see this new service coming available to Maynooth. He has been waiting some time for its installation. He emphasises that it is intended primarily as a service for the people of Maynooth and round about, but he does admit that the position on the main road to Galway and the west has helped secure it for the town. "There has been a PASS machine at our Lucan branch for some time", says Larry Ayers, "but it is sited well off the main road".

Not only through-traffic will benefit from Maynooth's facility; Bank of Ireland PASS can also be used by customers of the Northern Bank and the Ulster Bank. When contacted by the *Newsletter*, the

local branch of the Allied Irish Bank said they had no immediate plans for an equivalent 'Banklink' machine at Maynooth. Indeed, they are biding their time and looking forward to the time when there will be complete interchangeability among all 'automatic tellers', with customers of any bank able to use any machine.

The arrival of 24-hour automatic banking at Maynooth will not neon the loss of the personal touch at the Bank of Ireland, of course. Larry Ayers, now in his eighth year here as Manager, and the Assistant Manager Tony McGowan hope that the services of the new facility will free the staff to give even better attention to customers' needs. Things are on the move among the 'live' staff of the bank as well, as Helen Tully is moving to the Monasterevin branch, but the other friendly faces of the staff - Dolores Coffey from Enfield, Patricia Reilly who lives in Clebridge, and Aisling Neill who travels down from Templeogue will, we hope, be with us for some time yet.

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SATELLITE TV? NOT YET.

The announcement was made a fortnight ago by the Minister for Communications that he was giving cable TV companies the go-ahead to relay satellite signals for an experimental period in 1987. The Newsletter contacted Celbridge Relays which supplies cable television to Maynooth about the possibility of the service being extended to Maynooth. Paddy Hayes of Celbridge Relays says that he has an active interest in the matter, but does not see satellite signals being relayed to Maynooth in the near future. There are not enough VHF channels available on the present system. Large companies like Dublin Cablesystems have invested a lot of money in the necessary equipment, and are already recouping it from their subscribers who are paying about £125 per annum. 'Would Maynooth subscribers be prepared to pay two-and-a-half times their present cable rental?' queries Mr. Hayes.

A number of factors remain to be resolved. The position may be clearer after the AGM this month of The Cable Association of Ireland. Wath this space! Watch that box!

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NATURE TRAIL

The Hawk

The two species of Hawk that we most frequently see in this country are the The Kesteral Sparrow and Kesteral. can be seen most frequently while hunting, it hangs nearly motionless in the sky, at this stage it is facing the wind and when it spots something small moving on the ground, it drops down and carries its prey away in its talons. The talons are very sharp and it also has a curved beak for tearing its food and also for killing. The main diet of the hawk are mice, young rabbits, birds, the Sparrow Hawk is usually seen flying very fast on country roads, very low over the ground. Hawks have very keen sight and the slightest movement will draw their attention, they are not very good nest builders and they may use an old crows nest in a wood. They usually lay 4 to 5 eggs in the month of May, the eggs are brown with blotches of dark brown, the eggs are incubated for about 4 to 6 weeks. The young hawks stay in the nest for about six weeks and they are fed by both parents. They learn to fly very quickly but stay in and around the nest area in the woods where it is safe for them. A lot of them are shot and poisoned, thisis not right as these birds are a protected species.

The Oak Tree

The Oak Tree can be found in most parts of Ireland but it is most common to the South-East of the country. The bark on the tree is very rough, it flowers in the month of May and the female flower develops into the Acorn. It grows very quickly when it is palnted in deep rich soil, growing to a height of 70-120 feet and it will live for several hundred years. Years ago it was used in the building of bridges, boats, and houses, it has great durability. The Oak is Ireland's longest living native tree.

WASTE DISPOSAL

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FROM JAMES O'HAGAN, STRAFFAN

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VISIT OF DEPUTY PROINSIAS DE ROSSA TO MAYNOOTH

On Friday 3rd October last, Deputy Proinsias De Rossa, accompanied by Cllr. Colm Purcell and other members of the Workers' Party, visited the North Kildare area. His first port of call was Maynooth. Outside our tiny and rather depressing-looking Employment Office he chatted for a while with some unemployed persons. He thought it scandalous that people from Celbridge were sometimes forced to walk to and from the Employment Office here because they simply could not afford to pay the cost of four bus trips (via Lucan). He argued that the present system of subcontracting out Employment Offices to the private sector should be terminated. Furthermore, he said, all Exchanges should provide under the same roof the jobseeking services of Manpower and the Youth Employment Agency as well as those relating to unemployment payments. He went on to stress, however, that at a more fundamental level what is urgently required is a comprehensive job-creation programme based on such things as the proper utilisation of our natural resources, especially our land and our mineral deposits, and the development and expansion of our forestry, fishing and construction industries. The Workers' Party is dedicated to bringing about these necessary changes in the Irish economic structure, he stated.

The next stop was at the Students's Union in St. Patrick's College, where Cllr. Purcell introduced the Deputy to Student President, John Lawlor. There followed a useful and informed discussion of the current inadequate grant-aid scheme and the plight of those students whose parents just failed to pass the stringent means-test for inclusion in that scheme. The differences pre-venting the student unions on the island from forming a united and solid front were also discussed at some length.

Cllr. Purcell then brought Deputy De Rossa to meet a family of travellers presently situated at a most dangerous bend on the Maynooth-Celbridge road. Pat Mc Donagh explained that for all its obvious disadvantages, their present location was preferable to the rat-infested one previously occupied opposite the Cattle Mart on the Dublin road. Cllr. Purcell informed Mr. MdDonagh that plans were already under way to provide a fully-serviced site for a number of traveller-families in the Maynooth area.



PROTECTING YOUR HOME

Don't Invite Crime. When you are leaving home never leave the garage door open as such an omission is an invitation to the thief. Curtains and blinds drawn in the day time will interest the thief. Darkened rooms with curtains drawn back are a sign that you are not in. When going out leave a light on in a room (not the hall) and draw the curtains.

Notes on the door, uncollected milk or newspapers are another sign that you are away. Then going on holiday ask a neighbour to keep a watch on your property and collect milk, papers, etc. Always notify the Gardai when going away and give them details of who the key holder will be.

Don't help the housebreaker. Keys left under the mat or on a string inside the letterbox is the easy way in for the thief. Make sure doors and windows can not be opened by a thief. Do not leave upstairs windows open because a thief may climb the drain pipe or use a ladder. Secure your ladder and tools so a thief can not use them to break into your house - lock them in the shed.

Keep the burgler out. Most burglers get in through insecure windows and doors. To ensure peace of mind it is advisable to check the fittings and fastenings in your home. Garda Crime Prevention Officers will provide advice on locks, alarms and other security equipment.

Fit all outside doors with good-quality five lever locks, preferably the type that can not be retracted without using the key. Put bolts on the top and bottom of doors. Fit all windows with good locks also.

Safeguard your property. Write down the serial numbers of items such as TVs. videos, sterios, etc. Take photographs of valuables such as jewelry or ornaments. Keep your cheque book seperate from cheque cards and always in a secure place. These simple procedures can help you recover stolen property.





HALTING SITE FOR MAYNOOTH TRAVELLERS

Kildare County Council's plan to build a halting site at Blacklion to accommodate Maynooth's indigenous travelling people has been further advanced by the selection of a tender by Kildare County Council, which was submitted to the Department of the Environment in August 1986. We are now in a position to publish a copy of the site plan, courtesy of Councillor Emmet Stagg, who supplied us with site plans, specifications and other information.

Contrary to what we published in our September issue, the site will consist of six family bays and not ten.

The tendered cost is £137,500. Each family will have its own bathroom, comprising shower, toilet and wash-hand basin, as well as a washroom with sink and hot water cylinder. The development will have a caretaker's office, surface dressed play area and a livestock compound; waste skips will be provided.

Kildare County Council will also be developing fully serviced halting sites in Athy, Monasterevin, Kildare and Newbridge. The Council will not allow transient travellers or traders into these sites and they will be used solely to accommodate the families permanently residing in these towns. In 1982 a survey conducted by Kildare County Council showed that there were thirty-four families which were indigenous to Kildare and would be the responsibility of Kildare County Council.


Sites away from takins and villages on the national primary routes will be purchased for the use of transient traders and travellers as follows:

- (a) N4 Dublin-Leixlip-Maynooth-Kilcock-Moyvalley.
- (b) N7 Dublin-Naas-Newbridge-Kildare-Monasterevin.

Effectively, this would mean that travellers native to an area would go to the fully serviced site and all _"_swould be directed to the nearest transient site; thus in theory eliminating indiscriminate camping in towns, villages and along roadsides.

Further progress on the Blacklion development, which is located behind the lay-by on the Dublin Road, must await the approval of the Department of the Environment. However, Kildare County Council still hopes to have it completed and ready for use in Spring 1987.

Drawing of Site Plan for Halting Site for Travellers at Blacklion, Dublin Road.



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
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
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The men behind the wire — Nicko Farrell and Phil Brady enjoying the Senior County Football Final in September, when Sarsfields beat Leixlip.

MAYNOOTH BYPASS

ACCESS ROAD PROBLEMS

The proposed up-grading of the Straffan Road as the sole access road from the Maynooth area to the Maynooth By-Pass road has given rise to much concern among residents living in the vicinity of the Straffan Road. This concern is focused on two main aspects:

- (1) The generation of extra traffic on the road.
 - (2) The realignment of the road.
- (1) The use of the Straffan Road as the sole access road to the by-pass is certain to lead to a very considerable increase in the level of traffic on the road. This will include not only locally-generated traffice but also much traffic coming from the Navan Road direction north of Maynooth. A lot of the latter traffic will consist of heavy vehicles. The proposals to upgrade and widen the Straffan Road to accommodate this extra traffic will. in the view of local residents, lead to a significant increase in the speed of traffic using the road. This combination of extra traffic and extra speed constitutes a major danger to the local resident population, especially to young children. The Straffan Road, it should be noted, passes through the main residential area of the town, with a very large and growing population, and with a high level of pedestrian flow - especially when the large student population is also taken into account.

A particular point of concern for residents in the Greenfield Lane area is the prospect that this Lane will be used by motorists from the housing estates to the west of the town in order to gain access to the by-pass. This is a narrow but very straight roadway, with obvious potential for dangerous speeding traffic. As the main Council housing estates in Maynooth are located just off this road, local residents are quite concerned for their future safety.

Maynooth Community Council believes that Kildare County Council has long-term plans for building a relief road to the east of Maynooth skirting existing and future housing estates in this area. This road offers the potential for solving many of the problems which will arise from the use of the Straffan Road as the access road to the by-pass. By linking the relief road to the Dunboyne Road at Blacklion, on the Dublin Road leading out of Maynooth, traffic coming

from the north would be diverted away from the town centre, with consequential benefits not only for the Straffan Road area, but also for the environmental amenity of the historic town centre. This proposal would also solve the long-standing problem of congestion along Convent Lane, at the entrance to Maynooth from the Dunboyne Road. In addition, the relief road would serve to divert the large volume of heavy traffic generated by Maynooth Livestock Mart away from the town centre.

The long-term County Council plans also provide for an extension of the relief road to the southwest of the town to serve the housing estates in that area. This offers the solution to the problem of traffic from this area using Greenfield Lane in order to get to the by-pass.

Accordingly, Maynooth Community Council calls on Kildare County Council to bring forward, as a matter of urgency, their plans to build the above relief road, in order to alleviate the public safety and environmental hazards which will arise from the proposal to use the Straffan Road as the access road to the Maynooth By-Pass.

- (2) Regardless of the construction of the Maynooth By-Pass, the Straffan Road requires improvement. However, the plans for upgrading and realigning the road drawn up by the County Council are unsatisfactory for a number of reasons, as follows:
- (i) The section between the Town Square and the Canal/Railway bridge is to be widened on the west side. This will involve impinging on the Harbour Field, a valuable community facility. It will also inevitably involve the destruction of the ball alley adjacent to the bridge. Maynooth Community Council submits that the widening should be done on the east side of this stretch.
- (ii) The town bridge is also to be widened. Maynooth Community Council is concerned that this will not involve the bridge losing its essential character. The bridge has recently been repointed by the AnCO workers involved in the canal restoration scheme, work which

may have been a waste of time if major alterations are to be carried out on the bridge. Apart from the bridge itself, there are cut-stone walls and other similar constructions in the vicinity which will be affected by road widening, and Maynooth Community Council is anxious that these should be restored to the fullest extent possible.

(iii) It is proposed to realign the road immediately south of the bridge. This will involve abandoning a short section of the existing road at the entrance to the cul-de-sac leading into Railpark townland. There is concern that this could become a handy backwater for dumping refuse and also for accommodating travelling families. There is no need to emphasise the problem being experienced in Maynooth by indiscriminate parking by travellers. Maynooth Community Council suggests that the County Council consider not realigning the road at this point, which would be less necessary if the stretch from the Square to the bridge was widened on the east side.

(iv) On the stretch between Greenfield Lane and The Crescent, there are a number of houses on the west side which will lose some of their front gardens due to road widening. The occupants of these houses feel that the road widening should be confined to the other side of the road, where no houses would be directly affected. This would be more feasible if there was no realignment on the preceding stretch.

All told, therefore, there seems to be a strong arguement for reappraising the plans for improving the Straffan Road along the lines indicated above, and Maynooth Community Council calls on Kildare County Council to reconsider its proposals in close consultation with the Community Council.

In conclusion, Maynooth Community Council is of the opinion that the implications of the construction of the Maynooth By-Pass have not been sufficiently considered, and wishes to be fully involved in the further discussions on the matter which are clearly necessary.

MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

First of all I would like to apologise for an error in the November article on Hospital Services Card. The income limit since June 1 1986 is £14,500, for Category II.

Social Welfare Equality Legislation In mid-May 1986 the special low rates of payment for Unemployment Benefit, Disability Benefit, Injury Benefit and Invalidity Pension, were abolished. They had applied to married women and young people under the age of 18 years without dependants.

People under 18 without dependants now receive the normal personal rates payable but their Unemployment Benefit still lasts for only 156 days.

Married Women now recieve the normal personal rates payable with other changes as follows:

Duration of Unemployment Benefit. (U.B.). In the past married women only received this payment for 312 days. They now receive it for the normal 390 days. As this is an increase of 78 days there is special provision for married women whose U.B. ran out before May 15th 1986, but after February 14th 1986, i.e. within 78 days (at 6 days a week) before the changeover. Starting on 15th May 1986, they get Unemployment Benefit until 390 days singing on are up. (For example, if a married woman's UB. ran out after 312 days on 12th May she would have got nothing for 3 days until 15th May but she would then have qualified for a further 75 days).

Unemployment Assistance. (U.A.) From mid-November 1986 married women can claim Unemployment Assistance. However, where both husband and wife are claiming U.A. the total payable will only be equal to the previous total payable to a married man and his wife as an adult dependant.

Dependency. The new rules on dependency come into effect in mid-November. From that date (17th for Disability Benefit, 19th for U.A., 20th for U.B.), a husband is no longer automatically assumed to be the breadwinner,

and a wife is no longer automatically assumed to be a dependant and children are no longer automatically assumed to be dependants of the father only.

From mid-November 1986 if the spouse of the claimant has a gross income of £50 per week or more, then he or she is not regarded as a dependant and no adult dependant's allowance is paid; further, only half of the normal child dependant's allowance is paid. If the spouse of the claimant is also receiving a social welfare payment no adult dependant's allowance is payable after mid-November 1986, but, as a transitional measure, where a man was receiving the adult dependant allowance before that date and now loses it because his wife is also a claimant he will continue to receive £10 extra a week for a maximum of one year. Where both spouses are claimants each will only receive half of the relevant child dependant's payments.

This latter is the subject of the planning application. Its owner is to be congratulated for his discretion in informing the clientele that 'adult videos' are to be had only on application at the counter. At least it's better than leaving them on open display.

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The street was literally brought to a standstill at lunchtime on Thursday, 6th November, while a giant water-whfeel was hoisted by crane out of Kavanagh's Mills. The huge 120 ton crane was brought in to remove the wheel as part of the reorganisation of the yard. and for several minutes the 13 ton wheel, which is twenty-feet in diameter, hung high in the blue sky like some object from outer space. It had been manufactured early in the nineteenth century by a local firm, Walsh's of Celbridge (has anyone got further information on this enterprise?) and stood in the Lyreen mill-race generating power until the mill switched to electricity in 1960. It can now be seen standing in its new resting place around the corner by the Galway Road, an impressive relic of an out-dated (but pollution-free) technology.

FIANNA FAIL NEWS

At our November meeting the following items were raised:

Bond Bridge

Cllr. Gerry Brady has made representations to Kildare County Council to have above bridge redesigned. Cllr. Brady has been informed by the County Engineer that he has recommended the appointment of a consultant to prepare a design for this bridge. He considers this work urgent and has sought funds from the Dept. of the Environment. The proposal for lights will be deferred for the present so as to concentrate on the new bridge.

Traffic outside Presentation Convent National School

Cllr. Brady has made representations the Road Safety Officer to have the above matter investigated. The proposals to solve this problem are as follows:

- 1) A large sign on the Dublin Road to be erected.
- A diamond shaped standard school sign to be erected on Dunboyne Road.
- After road surface area has been renewed suitable road markings will be made.

All of the above should help ease traffic congestion at peak school times.

Faulty Drainage at The Square

Further to representations made by Cllr. Brady relief work at the Square has been completed to correct faulty drainage. The efficiency of the drainage system has already shown evidence of major improvements.

Re-Alignment of the Straffan Road, Maynooth.

Cllr. Brady has submitted the following motion and it is now on the agenda for the next meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council:

"That the Council review the proposed re-alignment of the Straffan Road, Maynooth".

Kingsbry Estate, Maynooth

CIIr. Brady has been advised by Kildare County Council that the approved plans for Kingsbry include the retention of the existing hedge between Kingsbry Estate and Greenfields Estate.

Cllr. Brady has made further representations to Kildare County Council on behalf of Kingsbry Residents Assoc. requesting that a wall be erected around the entrance to the estate due to the proposed re-alignment of Straffan Road, which will increase traffic in the area. The possibility of sound barriers being erected along the by-pass near the estate has also been requested.

Representations to C.I.E.

Cllr. Brady has made further represe tions to C.I.E. in connection with the possibility of providing a turning point for buses at Straffan Road. This matter has been an ongoing problem and Fianna Fail in Maynooth hopes it will be resolved soon.

Cllr. Brady has written to C.I.E. requesting an improvement in their services in the North Kildare area. He has particularly suggested that a cross radial

bus service is required to connect the important towns of Maynooth, Celbridge and Leixlip. The service would allow more people to use the commuter train system and also a greater flexibility for commuting to everyone.

Computerised Housing List

Cllr. Brady advises that all those who have applied for housing to Kildare Co. Council should apply again before 31st December, 1986, in order to be included on the new computer system.

Tony Smith Memorial Walk

Our annual walk in aid of Maynooth Senior Citizens was held on Sunday, 5th October. We would like to thank all who participated and their sponsors. The amount collected is expected to be in excess of last year's total of £1,123, and will be handed over to the Senior Citizens Committee at a function in December. We would also like to thank Maynooth Brass and Reed Band who led off the walk andthe owners of Carton Estate, through which the walk was held.

Charges Abolished

The branch has learned with delight of the success of the campaign against 'Local Charges'. This was brought to fruition with the acceptance by Kildare Co. Council of a motion by Cllr. Emmet Stagg which instructed the Co. Manager not to include the charges in the estimates for 1987. We congratulate Cllr. Stagg on his dogged persistance on this issue which marks a major step towards tax equity. All others who were involved in the campaign, including ACRA, NATO, KRALC are also to be congratulated.

It is notable that the closeness of a general election had a marked affect on the voting pattern of Cllrs. on this issue. Fine Gael councillors who only 6 months ago were most zealous in their support of these inequitous charges were noticable only by their silence on this occasion. The fear of the retribution of the electorate at the ballot box resulted in the quick abandoning of their 'fiscal rectitude'!

Bond Bridge Improvements

The branch has been informed by Cllr. Stagg that Kildare Co. Council have decided not to implement the short term plan to make the bridge safe but instead will seek to have the bridge replaced with a totally new bridge.

This very expensive alternative to the proposal supported locally is dependent on EEC grants that have not been applied for, on loans that have not been sanctioned and on development levies most of which have not been collected. It is unlikely to see the light of day until the early 1990's, if at all.

Those supporting this 'alternative scheme' must bear full responsibility for the continued danger to pedestrians and motorists in the interim.

Our branch still believe that the short term proposal for traffic light control and raised footpath should be implimented pending the arrival of the grandoise scheme now envisaged. We will continue to work towards achieving this solution.

Kingsbry

Following representations by Cllr. Stagg, the developers of Kingsbry were requested to carry out repairs to the Main Road, through Kingsbry. We are pleased to note that this work has been undertaken.

Light Railpark Lane

Cllr. Stagg has been informed by the Co. Manager, that a public light will be provided at Railpark Lane in the near future. The cost of the light has been funded, from a special allocation, adopted at this year's estimates meeting of Kildare Co. Council on the proposal of Cllr. Stagg, for the provision of public lights in areas where senior citizens live.



WORKERS' PARTY NOTES

Council Housing Rents

Since 1973, rents for local authority housing throughout the county have been set by the Department of the Environment in consultation with the National Association of Tenants Organisations (NATO). The government has recently decided to devolve the setting of rents to the local authorities. Workers' Party is opposed to this on the grounds that some councils, under severe financial pressure, may be inclined to raise rents to unacceptable levels, leading to great discrepancies between local authorities. At the October meeting of Kildare County Council, Councillor Colm Purcell moved a motion that the

Council reject the devolution of this function. However, the motion was defeated. The Workers Party will closely monitor the situation to ensure that unwarranted rent increases are not implemented in Kildare.

University Grants

Due to problems experienced with the payment of Third Level Education Grants, Kildare County Council at its October meeting agreed to a suggestion made by Councillor Colm Purcell to discuss the matter with a deputation from Maynooth College Students Union.

Improvement of Dunboyne Road

Councillor Colm Purcell has been informed by Kildare County Council that £3,000 from a special Dept. of Environment grant has been allocated for the strengthening of the Dunboyne Road at Maynooth.

Abolition of Local Charges

At its October meeting, Kildare County Council passed a motion, seconded by Councillor Colm Purcell, to exclude local charges from the Council's estimates for 1987. This indicates the Workers Party's outright opposition to this unfair form of double taxation since it was first introduced. Ultimately, the credit for the removal of the charges must go to the householders of Kildare, whose refusal to pay the charges rendered their implementation unfeasible. It is still the County Council's intention to collect the arrears from the charges, which will be opposed energetically by the Workers Party.

Irish Neutrality Under Threat

A proposal to fundamentally alter the Treaty of Rome — in effect, the constitution of the EEC — is to be put before the Dail in the current session. If accepted, this proposal could undermine Ireland's longstanding neutrality in foreign affairs by committing is to adhering to foreign policy as framed by the EEC at large.

The proposal — called the Single European Act — could also seriously weaken Ireland's economic bargaining position by removing our power of veto over key communition decisions. The Workers Party urges all readers to oppose this measure and make their opposition known to TDs, fellow-workers, and other acquaintances.

Social Welfare Equalisation

The local branch posted leaflets in the Maynooth area which highlighted the problems arising from the way in which equality in social welfare has been used to the detriment of low income families. Anyone with queries or problems on this issue can contact Colm Purcell.

TIDY TOWNS PUBLIC MEETING

The public meeting organised by the Environmental Committee of Maynooth Community Council to discuss the Tidy Towns issue attracted an attendance of about twenty-five, including Bernard Durkan T.D., Chairman of Kildare County Council.

The meeting began with the showing of a Bord Fáilte video on the Tidy Towns Competition, after which Community Council Chairman, Proinnsias Breathnach went over the judges' report on Maynooth, which emphasised litter and poorly-presented approach roads as the main drawbacks detracting from the appearance of the town. In the lively discussion which followed, a number of other problem areas were identified, with "The Thing" in the Square drawing particular criticism. Several good ideas for improving matters were put forward, such as producing a video on Maynooth to be shown in the schools, involving the schools in tackling the litter problem, getting different clubs and groups to 'adopt" different areas of the town for maintenance, and even hiring the IRA to blow up "The Thing"!

All those who attended are to be invited to future meetings of the Environmental Committee to draw up and implement a plan of action. 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


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
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
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MAYNOOTH I.C.A.

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CARTON COURT MAYNOOTH RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

This Committee has formally set out its objections to Kildare Co. Council regarding the proposed Link Road to the By-Pass. The Committee foresees great dangers in having the Link-Road running through the heart of a densely populated residential area and which is contrary to the whole concept of By-Pass planning.

Our objections are as follows:

(1) The increased volume of traffic which will be attracted to the link road from Leixlip, Dunboyne and points North, will cause considerable danger and annoyance to the residents of all estates adjoining Straffan Road.

(2) Traffic on the Straffan Road travels at a very high speed at present and the widening of the road will invite motorists to further increase speed through this residential district along which there is a high level of pedestrian

flow including Primary School children, Secondary and Third Level students etc.

(3) The loss of a substantial portion of green area, which can never be compensated for and which will bring traffic dangerously close to the front row of houses on the Straffan Road. This will also result in a massive increase in noise levels and pollution.

Little progress has been made regarding the taking-in-charge of the estate by Kildare Co. Council. All Councillors (in the Celbridge Electoral Area) and all our Dail Representatives have been circulated requesting their support. However, it appears that Kildare Co. Council will move only when it suits them.

At a meeting with Kildare County Council in July, a special request was made to provide public lighting on the "Back Road" (Sites 54-74). However, four months and much correspondence later, no progress at all has been made. Perhaps Kildare Co. Council will act as Santa Claus this year and provide the lighting.

Many people have expressed their dissatisfaction to a proposal to site a CIE bus turn-around at the entrance to All Councillors, Kildare the estate. Co. Council and CIE have been informed that this proposal is unacceptable.

We hope to run a function sometime after Christmas which will help to cement new friendships made during the football tournament and the clean-up of the estate. A Happy and Peaceful Christmas to all our Residents and we look forward to a prosperous New Year for all.

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NATURE TRAIL

The Pike

The pike is a fish which can be found in most of our rivers, lakes, and ponds, canals. aware that they can not be seen at night It is a preditory fish, and it's main diet consists of small fish, frogs, rats, and young if they are wearing dark clothes - the ducks. The pike has a grey/green back, greenish sides with yellow spots and a white same applies to cyclists. November to belly, it has a very large mouth and sharp teeth. Fishing for pike can be good sport but they are easily killed when hooked, if played up and down against the current, hours and during these three months baits and small fish can be used to entice them. The pike lives in overgrown stretches of river and lake, it grows very quickly if there is an abundance of small fish to be found. The female spawns in early spring where the river or lake is spread onto the nearby fields, it can be found throughout most of Europe. They make very good eating if boiled and then baked in the oven and cut into steaks. Pike weighing 30/ 40 lbs. are often in the bigger lakes and they can be classed as specimins, the German fisherman treats the pike the same way as we do Salmon ... a delicacy.

The Robin

The robin is a very distinctive bird and can be easily recognised by its red breast, it is very common in our backyards and surrounding fields, it is a very popular bird. It feeds on worms, larvae, insects and bread. It is easy to tame as a friendly back garden bird, it has a very inquisitive nature. It sings a very sweet song from the top of thegarden tree, it keeps its own territory in which to feed, breed, and live, if another robin strays into its territory the existing robin plucks out its chest to show its red breast and this is usually enough to frighten off the intruder. The female and male (hen & cock) pair off in November/December, it builds its nest in a low area, side of a wall, an old tin can, or in a shed. The nest is made up of twigs, dead leaves, lined with feathers and hari, the eggs, numbering 4/5, are a brown in colour with darker brown blotched on places, they may breed twice in the year. Whenever incubation is in progress the cock feeds the hen, when the young start to come out from the nest they are speckled brown and have no red breast. It takes about six months before it gets the adult plumage, then they go off to fend for themselves, and to find a new territory.

With the winter upon us why not build yourself a small bird tray in the back garden, one post with a tray on top, and you can put out bread in the cold mornings. When you have that done why not observe the different species that may frequent your garden for feeding, keep a note of them in an old copy and compare them with your school friends, any bird that you can not recognise, take down its colour, size, its behaviour and then call into your local library to consult some of their fine books on Nature, it can be very interesting.

BE SAFE BE SEEN

We sometimes wonder are pedestrians January have the shortest day-light from about 5.00 pm onwards, especially on a wet day, motorists can be almost 15 feet from pedestrians before they can be seen. By wearing reflective arm bands or such safety devices great danger can be avoided. So next time you walk to the village at night wear something bright or reflective bands.

Bhí go lear de dhream liobrálach na tíre seo a raibh ionadh agus díomá orthu nuair a vótáil thar seasca fán gcéad den lucht vótála in aghaidh an cholscartha i mí Mheitheamh na bliana seo; bhí siad den bharúil go bhfé: dfaí a bheith ag braith ar an aos óg chun vótáil i leith leasú an bhunreachta. 
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
The mill of Maynooth brings traffic grinding to a halt. Photo shows mill wheel in Kavanagh's being loaded up in November.
