Maynooth Information Directory

An Information Directory, listing the various business, public services and voluntary organisations in the Maynooth area has just been published.

The Directory is a joint venture of Maynooth Community Council, Maynooth Community Information Centre and Maynooth Public Library. The gathering of information for the Directory was carried out by a team of workers employed under the Social Employment Scheme, under the direction of a Committee whose members were drawn from the three sponsoring organisations.

The Directory also includes several maps, an account of the history of Maynooth, and information on places of interest in the Maynooth area. Copies of the Directory will be distributed free of charge to all houses in Maynooth and surrounding district. In addition, copies will be made available in local shops for the benefit of visitors to the town. The cost of production has been covered by the sale of advertising space in the Directory.

At a reception to launch the Directory, held in Maynooth Public Library, special presentations of the Directory were made to Mrs. Ann Daly, Maynooth's oldest citizen, Owen Byrne,

MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

The Community Information Centre has been in operation for six months. We are very happy with the response to the Centre and we hope that it will develop into a very important service for the area.

DEAR EDITOR

In response to the letter in the March edition of the Maynooth Newsletter, I wish to point out a few inaccuracies and comment on the letter itslef.

Firstly, the writer stated that there has been no rent increase for the last three years. This is untrue. In 1984 (one year ago) the rent paid by students in a self-catering arrangement rose from £13.00 to £14.50.

While the rent paid by students in a full-board arrangement did not actually rise in monetary terms, since 1985 (this academic landladies are no longer obliged to provide a packed lunch for their tenants, thus reducing the cost incurred by landladies. (Full Board £42).

Secondly, the writer stated that some students are not placed inthe type of accommodation

Entranting to the standard sta requested by them and thus leave landladies "high and dry" during the year. This again is inaccurate, in that in the vast majority of cases students are placed in the type of accommodation requested. However, for various reasons of their own some students decide during the year fthat they would prefer to live elsewhere. There is nothing that can be done to alleviate this.

> While dthere is the possibility that the rents will be increased this year, I would like to add that in present times students simply cannot afford to pay out a large sum of money every week for rent.

> Hoping these facts will be noted in reference to this topic in future.

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
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

MAYNOOTH FIRE BRIGADE

Maynooth residents are very fortunate to have the services of the eight members of the brigade, who all live and work in Maynooth, available on call, twenty four hours a day, seven days a week. They are alerted by bleepers which they carry everywhere. When a call for assistance is received by Fire Officer Michael O'Riordan, he relays the message to the fire men wherever they are. The Brigade will be recruiting soon. The upper age limit is 55 years. and members must be in good health, and be extremely fit.

On average, the Brigade is called out between 250 and 300 times a year. In the last two weeks in February this year, there were 22 calls. calls are not always to do with fires or road accidents. The Brigade has rescued cats in trees, a child stuck in a chimney, a dog in a drain.

Unfortunately, some calls turn out to be bogus, wasting valuable time, and possibly having tragic consequences for someone in real need at the same time. The Brigade must turn out for all emergency calls, as they cannot afford to waste time in establishing whether callers

The majority of fire calls are for chimney fires, and for attendance at these there is a fee of £20 - not much when the potential for disaster is considered, but it would be cheaper to clean the chimney regularly.

Michael O'Riordan and other members of the Brigade are happy to advise the public on questions relating to fire prevention and fire safety. Michael will talk to any Resident's Association or other organisations who want to inform themselves on the He can be contacted at 285555. For the benefit of

readers of the Newsletter, Michaell and Lenny Murphy gave some advice on what to do if a fire breaks out, and most important how to ensure that a fire doesn't break out in the first place.

If a fire breaks out

- The best way to extinguish a fire is to smother it, withdrawing the oxygen it needs to keep going. Never throw water on burning fat or oil. But, the best advice is to get out fast.
- Close all doors, as this helps to contain the fire in the room, preventing it from spreading rapidly. Most internal doors are designed to withstand fire for at least 30 minutes.
- Ring the fire brigade at 285555 as this will put you in touch directly with the Maynooth fire brigade. Otherwise, ring 999 and ask specifically for the Maynooth Service.
- Never go back to retrieve belongings - your life is worth more than property. Wait for the fire brigade; they have the equipment to enter burning buildings.



How to prevent fire

- Develop a system of nightly checks. The last person to bed
- pull out all plugs
- put the firequard in front of the fire
- empty ashtrays
- close all doors
- overload sockets. rats can chew through wires, causing potential fire hazards.
- Hold a fire drill. Imagine there is a fire in the house and each room. Establish an assembly point so that everyone gathers in the same place, making it easier to spot if someone is
- Install a smoke detector somewhere around the hall and bedrooms. Most loss of life in fires at night is caused by smoke and toxic fumes given off by the synthetic materials that most modern furniture is made A smoke detector is fairly inexpensive, and Michael O'Riordan can give advice on where to buy one and the best place for installation.

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



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WOMEN AT WAR.

The admission of women to the armed forces in recent years was rightly hailed as a victory for Women's Lib., but, as the saying goes, "there is nothing new under the sun," for in ancient Ireland the woman had the right, nay, was duty-bound to take her place beside her man on the battlefield. The Roman, Solinus, was prompted to write in 238 A.D., "The Hibernian woman is warlike beyond the rest of her sex, she places the first morsel of food in her child's mouth with the point of a sword." (The same chap also tells us that there were no snakes in Ireland in his time, thus depriving St. Patrick of one of his better tricks.)

The life of Cúchulainn was profoundly influenced by three female warriors. In his youth he learned his "Many, varied and wondrous arts of war" from the Scottish teacher Scathach. This newly acquired knowledge he used to overcome the Heroine Aoife and force her into marriage with him. She bore a son, raised him as a warrior and on reaching manhood sent him against

Cúchul ain to exact vengence for her earlier humiliation. In ignorance Cúchul ain slew his only offspring on Baile strand in Co.Louth.

The Táin bó Cuailgne (cattle raid on Cooley) which led to the death of Cúchul ainn was organised by Maeve, Queen of Connaught. She is portrayed as the out and out villian of the piece, wrongly so, as she was simply indulging in the national pastime of the day (i.e. cattle rustling).

Nor were the women of the Fianna any less warlike. One night Fionnn Mac Cumhail, leader of the Leinster Fianna, threw a party at his fort at Allen, during which he had a bit of a row with one Goll Mac Morna,

Chief of the Connaught Fianna. One thing led to another and soon everybody was at each other's throats and as the chronicler said, "Bad was the place for a mild smooth-fingered woman, or a weak, infirm man or an aged, long-lived elder". When proceedings were eventually halted and the place cleared, 1,100 of Fionn's people were found dead and Goll had lost II men and 50 women. There was certainly no discrimination against the female of the species, in matters of war at any rate.

High King of Ireland at that time was Cormac Mac Airt and when asked by his son Cairbre for his opinion of women, answered bitterly "I can hardly describe them. Their advice is foolish, they are forgetful of love, headstrong in their desires, fond of folly, prone to rash engagements, given to swearing, proud to be asked in marriage, tenacious enemies cheerless at the banquet, rejectors of conciliation, prone to strife, of much garrulity. Woe to him who desires or serves a bad woman. Woe to every man who has a bad wife." It must be understood that this chappie never came under the calming influence of Nell McCafferty, who's gentle persuasion would have prompted a different response.

Women were eventually exempted from military service through the influence of Columcille at the Synod of Druimceat in 590 A.D. Labour in vain, for the locals ignored him and promptly returned to their old ways with renewed gusto. Anyway, we find St. Adamnan re-enacting the selfsame law with considerably more success, for from then on the female warrior disappears from the Irish scene.

Well....Almost....who can forget Grace O'Malley, Queen of West Mayo at the close of the sixteenth century? About to give birth on board one of her gallies, she was attacked by marauding Moors, and when informed that the day was going against her all-male crew, rose from her bed, rallied her men, turned the tables on the opposition, captured their ship for good measure and returned to her motherly duties as though nothing had happened.

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
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MAYNOOTH MORTALITY SOCIETY

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

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

The meeting was closed with an address by Emmet Stagg. He commended the branch on its efforts in the Local Elections and applauded the work done in the community declaring that "Socialists are good citizens".

He called for increased community opposition to Water and Refuse Rates and asked for a greater emphasis within the branch on Socialist Education.

LOCAL CHARGES.

As we go to press Kildare County Council are involved in a critical examination of its budget to find an alternative to the Water and Refuse Charges. Already the County Managers Estimates have been rejected by the Council because the unpopular unjust charges were included, and a special all party committee has been established to examine alternatives.

The Maynooth Labour Branch fully supports the opposition of Cllr. Stagg to these charges and notes his long and oftensingle handed campaign in the Council against them. We also welcome the recent U-Turn by a majority of F.F. Cllrs on the issue in response to the wishes of the The persisting of all F.G. Cllrs. in supporting these charges regardless of what alternatives have been put forward is we believe a measure of their arrogance and contempt for It is hoped popular opinion. that a majority of Cllrs. will agree on an acceptable alternative to charges and that they will be a thing of the past when this issue is published.

KINGSBRY ESTATE

Cllr. Stagg has informed the Residents Association in Kingsbry Estate that he is pursuing the following:-

- I. Provision of additional public lighting between the entrance of the estate and Rail Park. The County Council have been requested to provide these lights from the development evies collected from the developer of the Estate.
- 2. Arrangements have been made for a joint inspection of possible sites for the bus stop and turning point by the Council and C.I.E. engineers. It is hoped that this matter can be quickly resolved.
- 3. Clir. Stagg has requested the County Council to have the Developer of Kingsbry keep the main road in a state suitable for use and in accordance with his planning permission.
- 4. Information has been requested on the Council's plans for improving Straffan Road and Mullen Bridge in view of the proposed use of this road as the intersection link of Maynooth to the new By-Pass.

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DONAL O BUACHALLA AND THE MAYNOOTH MEN OF 1916

Donal O Buachalla was in close contact with Padraig Pearse as early as 1906 when Pearse defended him in a court case in Celbridge. O Bucahalla had been summoned for putting his name in Irish on the shop. He lost the case and refused to pay the fine in lieu of which a roll of cloth was confiscated from the shop.

A local man, Patrick Fitzsimons, paid the fine, redeemed the roll of cloth and returned it to O Buachalla.

In the same year he started a branch of the Gaelic League in Maynooth. Support, however, was not forthcoming and it ceased to function after about a year.

When Padraig Pearse opened his school, St. Enda's, in Rathfarnham in 1908 O Buachalla's eldest son was among the first admitted. He attended it for eight years and completed his Leaving Certificate there in 1916.

In 1914 Donal O Buachalla became active in the volunteers and formed a company in Maynooth. They held their meetings in what was then known as the general hall on the Main Street, where Fusciardi's Take-Away is situated today. He set about arming his men and in a short while he acquired an ample supply of shotguns and cartridges, his own personal weapon was a fine Mauser Rifle which he had bought and trained himself An order was placed to use. with Henshaws, the local Hardware store, who had a factory in Clonsilla, to produce a quantity of pikes, a most effective weapon against the mounted lancers, they expected to encounter. (These pikes, it is understood were used in O'Connell St., during Easter Week).

Volunteers were raided several times for arms but nothing was ever found.

A .22 rifle was used for target practice and when the English stopped the entry of arms and ammunition into Ireland during the Great War, O Buachalla and a comrade crossed to Liverpool, acquired 5,000 rounds and smuggled it into Ireland so that training was not interrupted.

The Rising was planned for Easter Sunday but O'Neill's countermanding order in the morning papers of that day stopped mobilisation. However early on Monday a bread van driver brought news to Maynooth that there was shooting in Dublin. The Rising was on after all.

By 7 p.m. on that evening the Maynooth men were making their final preparations in the big store at the back of O Buachalla's shop, present were Tom Byrne, Patrick Colgan, Pat Weafer, Tom Harris, Joe Ledwidge, Jack Maguire, Jim Tyrell, Mattie Maguire, Tom Morgan, Dr. Ted O'Kelly, Patsy Kirwan, Jack Graves and Willie Regan. (The latter two actually worked for O Buachalla in his shop). The group filed out, lined up two abreast and marched down the Main Street towards the College. On the way they were joined by Oliver Ryan. Two Policemen who were following them were sent on their way when Ted O'Kelly brandished his revolver and threatened to shoot them.

At the College they met the Vice-President who tried to dissuade them from their venture but they were adamant and he (Canon James McCaffrey) finally granted them absolution. On the advice of Tom Byrne who fought with the Boers in the Boer War, they went on foot to Dublin along by the canal to avoid opposition they might encounter along the way. They spent the night in Glasnevin Cemetry and marched through the empty streets on Tuesday morning. On reaching the G.P.O. they were greeted with a resounding cheer and warmly welcomed by Pearse.

Because he was in possesion: of a rifle, Donal O Buachalla was first sent to Parliament St., to deal with snipers on top of City Hall. From there he was recalled to the tower in Cleary's as O'Connell St., was at the mercy of members of Officers Training Corps in Trinity Collège who were reputed to be "fairly good shots". When soldiers were seen to have entered Mc Birney's he was moved to Arnott's tower from which vantage point he had a clear view of proceedings in Mc Birney's. At the end of the week he was brought back to the G.P.O.

When the cause was seen to be lost evacuation was attempted but most of the rebels were rounded-up. O Buachalía, however, managed to evade the cordon of soldiers by walking up Moore Street. He was leading towards Broadstone Station in the vain hope of catching a goods train to Maynooth. He slept out that night and the following morning was confronted by a soldier in Dominic Street who fired a shot at him. Luckily, the bullet passed through the padding of his coat, causing no bodily harm. He was then arrested and taken to join his captured comrades.

Of the Maynooth men only Pat Weafer and Joe Ledwidge managed to make their way home. The others were all arrested and shipped across to England where they were interned in Nutts -ford, Stafford and in camps in North Wales.

At first there was great resentment towards the men of 1916, but the execution of the leaders effected a change of heart among the ordinary people of Ireland and when the prisoners were released in June of 1917 they were hailed as heroes. Their idealism, courage and nobility and the honourable way
