

ISSUE No. 103 RELOCATION OF MAYNOOTH POST OFFICE The news that Maynooth Post Office was to be relocated from present location in the Main to O'Brien's Shopping Centre Street began to circulate in the first days immediately before Christmas last. Following various representations received on the matter. the Chairman of Maynooth Community Council, Proinnsias Breathnach, sent an urgent letter to the Chief Executive of An Post expressing concern at the proposed move

1. The inconvenience it would to most users due to the location of the shopping centre on the other side of the town from the main residential districts. Particular concern was expressed concerning the plight of old age pensioners.

on four grounds:

2. The effect the move would have on the town centre.

3. The lack of consultation on the matter with the local community, given that the Post Office is a major public facility.


4. The need for a full-scale Post Office, run directly by An Post, in a town of Maynooth's size and status.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community Council on January 6, it was decided to formally oppose the move, and to organise a house-to-house petition. Petition forms were distributed without delay to all Council members.

The matter was discussed at a special meeting of the full Council on January 13. This meeting showed that, except in a few areas, the vast majority of residents were opposed to the move. In all, 1,150 signatures were obtained on the petition.

At this meeting, the following motion was carried by a majority of 31 votes to one, with one abstention:

"That, while having no objection to the person appointed postmaster, Maynooth Community Council objects to the relocation of Maynooth Post Office from the town centre, and calls on An Post to rescind the move." Meanwhile, the Chairman of the Community Council received a reply from An Post in which it was stated that An Post was obliged to operate as a commercial enterprise, would base decisions such and where to locate post offices as commercial considerations only. on The letter confirmed that Mr. Bill Donovan, the Manager of O'Briens Supermarket, had been appointed Postmaster in Maynooth and that the Post Office would be located in a temporary premises in the shopping centre pending the construction of a permanent unit in the coming six months. The letter stated that no suitable premises could be found in the Main Street, although position of Postmaster had the been advertised twice. Finally, the letter stated that the volume of business through Maynooth Post Office was too small to justify upgrading to full post office status.

The Community Council was subsequently presented with three petitions objecting to the move: one, with 903 signatures, collected by 17 traders in the Main Street and Greenfield Shopping Centre from among their customers; one containing the signatures of 37 local traders; and one, containing 145 signatures, collected at the Annual New Year's Dinner of Maynooth Old Folks Committee. The Council Chairman then wrote to the Chief Executive of An Post and the Chairman of An Post, Mr. Fergal Quinn, seeking an urgent meeting in order to present them with the four petitions and to discuss the issue. This is the latest position as these notes are being written.

Letters have also been sent to An Post by the authorities of Maynooth College (which provides most of the Maynooth Post Office's business) and the College Student Union, both objecting to the relocation. At its January meeting, the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council decided to support the position of Maynooth Community Council, as a result of which the County Development Officer wrote to An Post objecting to the move, citing the County Council's view that the move was not in keeping with the proper development of the town of Maynooth.



Dear Editor.

While I thought your condemnation of certain behaviour that occurred at Hallowe'en justified, the intemperate language used lessened the impact. It is true that there is more and more anti-social behaviour creeping into the celebration of this festival, and the question is: how can this trend be reversed?

First, let us agree that children dressing up as witches and goblins and calling around to neighbouring houses is good innocent fun; it is when we come to bonfires, bangers and firecrackers that the trouble starts.

Firecrackers and bangers are illegal and should not be sold in Ireland, yet not only is the use of these on the increase, we find certain misouided parents buying them for their children. Boys soon grow tired of setting off bangers in the open, so they start putting them through letter boxes and throwing them at people - I have seen a number of young children hadly frightened as a result of bangers exploding near them.

Apart from presenting an obvious fire hazard, bonfires attract crowds of outsiders into an estate and so provide an opportunity for rowdyism and vandalism. This year old tyres were thoughtlessly provided by certain business people so that the bonfires were on a massive scale. When the fires die down the adults go home and leave unsupervised bands of youths to roam about, some of them setting fire to dustbins and throwing missiles at houses and cars.

Parents who excuse such behaviour by saying that "boys will be boys" and that, anyway "it is part of our tradition", are being very complacent. The parents who allow their sons to roam about after dark on Hallowe'en must ask themselves just what those sons are up to. Many respectable parents are genuinely upset when told what their "nice boy" has done in the name of fun. (continued)

What then is the answer? I would make the following suggestions: 1. The Newsletter should advise parents in its October editorial to supervise their children, specially teenage boys, at Hallowe'en and to require them to be in -doors at a reasonable hour; 2. Parents should ensure that their children do not use bangers or firecrackers under any circumstances:

3. Bonfires should be kept small and should be well supervised Young people should be reminded that it is possible to have fun without resorting to anti-social behaviour.

Perhaps your readers might add their own suggestions - or would they prefer to stick their heads in the sand and profess that there is no cause for concern?

It only remains to thank the former Newsletter Committee for the very valuable service that it has provided for our community over the past ten years, a service that is too frequently taken for granted, I say, "Well done to you alland may the new committee keep up the good work".


MAYNOOTH EMPLOYMENT OFFICE

Following representations from Maynooth Community Council, a letter was received from Barry Desmond, T.D., Minister for Social Welfare, concerning the facilities at Maynooth Employment Office. The Minister acknowledged that the existing facilities are inadequate, but pointed to the difficulties encountered in finding alternative premises. A premises had been purchased for this purpose, but had been refused planning permission following objections from local residents.

As a short-term measure, the signing-on schedule is being rearranged in order to reduce the length of queues. In the meantime, the possibility of opening additional employment offices in the area currently served by Maynooth (which includes Leixlip and Celbridge) is being investigated.


Access, Visa accepted

Fees for higher level courses can be quite high, as is the cost of maintaining a student in full-time education. The Bachelor of Arts course in Maynooth College cost £808, the Bachelor of Science cost £991 in the 1985/86 academic year. Courses in Bolton St. cost from £317 to £620. However, grants are available in certain circumstances, as follows:-

3. Range of Courses Available:

Over the last ten years, the range of courses in higher education has expanded. There are one year certificate, National Certificate, National Diploma, Bachelor Degree courses available in Universities, NIHEs, RTCs, DIT, and other colleges in business, engineering, science, humanities, art/design. And it is not essential to have an honours leaving certificate to be accepted on to Certificate and Diploma courses. Parents and students who are interested in finding out what is available around the Maynooth area can get more information from the Directories in the Community Information Centre. There are over twenty institutions within a twenty mile radius of Maynooth where students can follow higher education courses.

Vocational Education Committee

Scholarships

These scholarships are administered by the local Vocational Education Committee (VEC) - care of the Technical School in Naas, in the case of Maynooth residents - and these scholarships may be obtained by students who intend to follow courses of at least two years' duration in the DIT, RTCs, NIHEs, Colleges of art as well as a number of other colleges. The means test and grant levels are the same as those for the Higher Education Grants Scheme, but a student needs only two honours and three passes in the Leaving Certificate including Irish and English. Application should be made to the VEC by 31 August.

European Social Fund Grants

These grants cover one and two year courses in the RTCs (nearest one to Maynooth is Carlow), and colleges of technology (eg. Kevin St) in areas 'such as Engineering, Science, Secretarial Studies, Business Studies etc. The grants are not means tested, and amount to £464 per annum if the student is living at home, or £1,160 per annum if living away from home. The Community Information Centre has a list of courses covered by this scheme.

Other Grants & Scholarships

Maynooth College provides a scholarship for one resident of Maynooth parish, or any of the adjoining six parishes (to the value of £808 in 1985). The scholarship is awarded on the basis of a means test and the leaving certificate result, and is usually offered to a student who would not be eligible for any other grant. There are a number of other scholarships and bursaries which may be availed of in other universities and colleges. Again, further details available in the Community Information Centre.

C.I.C. Contd

The Higher Education Grants Scheme This applies to students following full-time courses of at least two vears' duration in the Universities. Teacher Training colleges, DIT, Regional Technical Colleges (RTCs), NIHEs. The grant is administered through the local authority - Kildare County Council in Naas, for Maynooth residents. To qualify, students must be aged at least 17 years on 1 January following the Leaving Certificate. They must also have passed five subjects in the Leaving Certificate with four honours and one other pass grade. The four honours may be reduced in certain circumstances, e.g. an honour in Maths be counted as two honours, will as would an honour in Irish. There is also a means test applied. In 1985, a student whose parents had six dependent children and an income not exceeding £16,546 would be eligible for a grant of one guarter of lecture fees. On the other hand, a student whose parents have two dependent children and whose income does not exceed £8.880 may be eligible for the maximum grant covering lecture fees plus the maximum maintenance grant of £1,160 if the student has to study away from home, or £464 if he or she can live at home. If family circumstances change later on, the student may be eligible for an increased grant. Applications for this grant may be made to the local authority before 31 August, and after the leaving cert results have been issued.
