
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SPORTS COMPLEX COMES CLOSER

At their June meeting, the Trustees of Maynooth College agreed to lease a site for the construction of an Indoor Sports complex to be shared jointly by the College, the Maynooth community, and the schools of the town. The site in question is on the Kilcock Road, just beyond the footbridge, in front of the Student Union building.

Detailed proposals for the Complex have already been drawn up by a committee drawn from representatives of the College, Maynooth Community Council, and the local schools, and plans have been provided by the College architects. The proposed complex, to be developed in phases, provides for a main building, including a sports hall (with allowance for a second hall if demand justifies it), squash and handball/racquetball courts, table tennis, snooker, exercise room, TV room, Physical Education lecture room, indoor games room (darts, cards, etc.), offices, meeting room, changing rooms (with showers), and a refreshments/kitchen area. The plans also provide for the long-desired indoor heated swimming pool. If fully developed, the overall proposal will cost an estimated £2.5 million.

There are many advantages to the idea of a jointly shared complex. One single complex would provide a wider range of facilities, and to a higher standard, than two separate developments. There will also be savings in terms of running and management costs. It is expected that, if approved, there will be a 100% grant for the College's share of the Complex, thereby reducing the amount of local fund-raising required. A shared Complex will also be used more efficiently, as there will be considerable day-time use by College students and staff during term, while during holiday periods when the local community demand would be at its highest, most of the students will be away from the College. This applies particularly to the swimming pool, given the high running costs of such facilities.

It is envisaged that the Complex will be vested in a Board of Trustees made up of representatives of the College, the Community Council, and educational interests. There will also be a Management Committee which will be responsible for allocating the use of the facilities among applicant groups and individuals. The Complex will have a full-time manager.

The Joint Committee has been waiting for the College Trustees' decision to participate in the project. Now that this has been given, a submission will be prepared over the coming weeks for forwarding to the Department of Education, which is responsible for sporting facilities for both educational institutions and community groups. It is impossible to say at this stage how long it will take the Depart-

ment to process the submission.

OUTDOOR SPORTS

Meanwhile, Maynooth Community Council has also been seeking the use of the County Council site at Blacklion, on the Dublin Road, for the development of outdoor sporting facilities. At a recent meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the County Council, it was agreed in principle to make the site available, and Council officials are to come back to the next meeting of the Committee (on July 7th) with specific proposals concerning how this should be arranged. It is hoped to develop two full soccer pitches on the site, plus an all-weather pitch and a running track. Further details will be provided in due course.





Dear Editor.

Please permit me space to reply to the letter in your last issue by P. Finnegan, of Crodaun, Celbridge,

The letter pretends to deal with 'Facts' but is riddled with half truths, misinterpretations and downright concoctions

- 1. Up to 1986 the power to set the rate to collect the water and refuse charges was vested in the County Manager, and elected Councillors had no power in the matter
- 2. The collection of arrears for the years prior to 1986 is also the sole legal prerogative of the County Manager and is not affected by any vote of the County Council members.
- . - 6. I did not propose re-negotiation of an agreement with the Trade Unions on this occasion but I have previously made such proposals when I found that an existing agreement served neither the County Council, its employees nor the public, and when I find the need I will do so again.





MOYGLARE ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

The County Engineer has informed Cllr. Stagg: Substantial improvement works are planned for Movglare Road and have been provided for through development levies in planning permissions recently granted for development in the area. These development levies have so far not been paid but this matter is being pursued and it is hoped to carry out improvement work to the value of approximately £20,000 in the near future.

EXTENSION OF BUS SERVICE TO STRAFFAN ROAD






YOUNG HISTORIAN AWARD

Green Stuffed Peppers

Serves 4 An unusual and very tasty dish

4 good-sized peppers, red or areen 2 tablesp, oil

1 small onion, finely chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 225g (8 oz) minced beef or lamb 400g (15 oz) can of tomatoes 50g (2 oz) cooked rice

1 teasp. ground cinnamon salt and pepper

Set over Gas 4, 180 C (350 F)

Method

Cut the tops from the peppers and remove the seeds. Blanch in boiling water for 3-4 minutes and drain.

Heat the oil in a frying pan. Add the onion and garlic and cook for a few minutes. Stir in the meat and continue cooking until the meat is well coloured about 5-6 minutes. Drain the can of tomatoes. Reserve the juice, add the tomatoes to the pan with the cooked rice, cinnamon, salt and pepper. Combine all the ingredients well together. Stuff the peppers with the mixture pressing it down well with the back of a spoon. Any remaining mixture can be cooked separately in tin foil. Place the peppers in an ovenproof dish. Pour the tomato juice around the peppers. Cover the dish with a lid or tin foil and bake in the over for 30 minutes. This is a complete meal in itself. Serve it with crusty bread to soak up the juices.







In our article on the above in the June issue, the accompanying map was inadvertently left out. It shows the new road between Straffan Road and the Newtown area which Maynooth Community Council is seeking in order to take pressure off Greenfield Lane, which will otherwise be heavily used by motorists heading for the junction with the By-Pass on the Straffan Road.

It has since been learned that the Department of the Environment has approved the County Council's plan to up-grade the Straffan Road (outlined in the June issue). This plan does not include the proposed new link road with Newtown. It is hoped that the up-grading will be carried out in advance of the completion of the By-Pass.

A SERVICE TO BE USED

Maynooth Community Information Centre' was formally opened on 28th May by Mr. Noel O'Sullivan Head of Information of the National Social Services Board, the national body which supports Community Information Centres all over Ireland. Mr. O'Sullivan presented a framed certificate of registration of the centre to Mary McGinley, Maynooth organiser.

At a reception in the Library to mark the occasion, Mr. O'Sullivan paid tribute to the dedication of the eighteen volunteers staffing the centre, and in particular, he acknowledged the role of Cerry Colreavy who pestered him to the extent that he finally agreed that there was a need for a centre in Maynooth.

He reminded the attendance that the service is free, non directive and all above, confidential. Clients of the service are guaranteed taht whatever is said within the centre will never be repeated outside.

Mr. Ward, the County Manager praised all concerned with setting up the centre. There is a vital need for information in our society, and the location of the centre in the Library premises is particularly apt, as the Library is a prime source of information in itself. He warmly acknowledged the role of Mlaynooth Community Council in setting up the centre, with the wish that more communities would get involved in local affairs to the same extent. In this context, he reffered very favourably to the submission made by the council to the recent hearing on the proposed by pass road.

The Chairman of the Community Council, Proinnsias Breathnach, in a brief speech thanked Mary McGinley and the volunteers, Gerry Colreavy, and the Library staff, all of whom have contributed to the success of the centre so far. He wished it well for the future, and strongly advised the people of Maynooth to make the maximum use of this essential service.

FAMILY INCOME SUPPLEMENT (F.I.S)

F.I.S. is designed to supplement the income of low wage earners in full-time employment. To qualify you must have dependent children for whom you receive the Child Benefit (formerly Children's Allowance),

F.I.S. is dependent on family size and family income. The amount, of F.I.S. you get is one-third of the difference between you weekly income and the maximum income for each family size. This may be further restricted by a maximum supplement based on family size. For example, a family with two children and a gross income of £90 per week would get F.I.S. of £10 per week:

Maximum income for two child family £120. Actual family income £90 Difference £30 One-third of difference £10 Maximum supplement for two child family is £14.



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SUMMER CHORES

by Plantsman

July is a month when gardeners can relax a little and enjoy the results of their labours. However, there are a few chores to be attended to if the initial display of colour and freshness is to be maintained right through to the end of autumn.

In common with all living things the only reason for the existence of a plant is to perpetuate the species. Therefore once a plant has blossomed our Committee. and set seed it has achieved its objective and will go into decline. To prevent this and ensure the plants continue to produce fresh growth and flowers it is important to remove the faded blooms from roses and bedding plants e.g. antirrhinums, dahlias, salvias, petunias, on a regular basis.

Nothing looks worse than an un-Routine clipping is tidv hedge. essential if a dense even growth is to be maintained especially with growing types such as the faster grisolinia. and lonicera. privet, Even young newly planted hedges should be lightly clipped to encour-With bushy base. dense ade a hedges shape is all improtant. The should always be narrower top This ensures that than the base. the older shoots at the bottom of the hedge receive enought light to keep them green and active rather than dead and leafless, as is all too frequently the case. If your hedge is dull and lifeless a dressing of a general fertiliser spread along the base and watered in will soon restore its vigour.

In the vegetable garden weeds should be controlled by routine hoeing or hand weeding. Vegetables such as carrots, turnips, and lettuce should be thinned

to give the plants space to develop. With carrots thinning should be done in the late 'evening and the thinnings removed immediately. The reason for this is that the carrot rootfly, the bane of every gardener, is attracted by the smell of the carrots but is not active in the evening. Though the season is late and crops are less developed than normal pests and diseases can be expected to strike very much on time this year. This is especially true of potato blight. Even newly emerged shoots can be affected and should be sprayed particularly during warm humid spells. Watch for caterpillars on your cabbage and spray at the first sign of damage.

If the weather should become dry for any lenght of time remember to water plants especially those which were planted this Spring. It's best to water in the evening as the plant roots can take up the water during the night before it is evaporated by the sun.

We have reached the end of another season and so it is time to reflect on the successes that have been achieved and to look forward to what the future may hold. 

There are two species of squirrel that live in Ireland, the Red and the Grey. The squirrel is a Mammal and is of the rodent family. The Red squirrel is a native of this country, whereas the Grey was brought into Ireland hundreds of years ago from America. The Grey squirrel has become very common to our woods, parks, and even towns, and the Red has become rare. Disease and the cutting of forests are probably the main reasons for the decline of the Red squirrel. Squirrels breed between January and September, their nest is called a drey and is built in high trees, of moss, twigs, leaves, or in the holes of old trees. The nestlings vary in the number between I-6, when they are born they are naked, blind, deaf and toothless. Squirrels eat nuts, acorns, fruit, berries, seeds, roots and the shoots of young trees. They Grey squirrel will also eat the eggs of birds. Squirrels are highly excitable and they are very inquisitive, they

have sharp hearing and eyesight. A squirrel will live up to 6 or 7 years, the long bushy tail of the squirrel helps to balance it about in the itself when leaning branches of trees. 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




Talking to Phil Brady recently in his lounge on Main St., he recalled for us the changes that have taken place in the licensing trade since he first went into the business. He remembered the Firkins, Kilns and Hogsheads of plain porter and stout arriving on the Guinness trucks. Topping a firkin or kiln was a refined art, the tap was gently driven home and displaced the bung with one final firm stroke. Brute force was not called for. The hogsheads were set aside for bottling and some 72 dozen bottles of stout could be drawn from one. These were then set aside for two or three weeks to mature.


Woman were seldom seen in public houses and those who did frequent them adjourned to the snug for privacy. Videos and pool were unheard of and entertainment consisted of rings, cards and the occasional sing-song. Choice of drink was limited to stout, plain porter, whisky, gin, wine and of course the jars of stone giner beer which the children loved so much.



Dunstown Major, which won 34 races and took coursing cups at Navan, Kilcock and the Clarke Cup in the Old Carton meeting (tradition has it that coursing has been held in Offilas, Old Carton from earliest times in Irish hsitory). Occasional visitors to the coursing meetings were the writer Miles na gCopaleen and the poet Patrick Kavanagh both of whom Phil got to know. He also became acquainted with Lord Frederic Fitzgerald and Anne, Duchess of Westminster who visited his premises from time to time.
