In view of the continued and unacceptable high crime rate in North Kildare, Deputy Bernard Durkan, has submitted proposals to the Minister for Justice for the re-organization and redeployment of Garda strength in the area involving a new Garda Station in Leixlip, and the provision of extra patrols in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge.

These patrols would give much greater efficiency in the use of manpower.

The Minister has replied as follows: "The Garda authorities are making a comprehensive report on policing in the North Kildare area, and hope to finalise the report within two to three months." Re. Maynooth Garda Station he states: "Garda authorities say that the present opening hours of the station are so fixed as to make as many members as possible available for outdoor patrol duty while maintaining a reasonable office service. The mobile patrols operate from Naas. These matters will all be considered in the current review of policing arrangements in North Kildare".

3. Bond Bridge (Pucks)

Further to the Co. Engineer's agreement to Deputy Bernard Durkan's proposal for a complete re-alignment of Pucks Bridge, the Co. Engineer has now requested a report from the consulting engineers. The approximate cost of the work is £500,000.

4. Mullen Bridge

The County Engineer has informed the County Council that he has requested a report from the consulting engineers re. widening Mullen Bridge and correcting of the entrance to the Canal bank.

The Minister for the Environment. has informed Deputy Durkan that he has allocated £157,000 for the improvement of county roads in Kildare. In determining the allocation for each county the solutions to offer. The Workers' Party ies collected in local charges, which is used to fund work on county roads and other services. Following representations by Deputy Durkan, Kildare County Council will carry out repairs to Convent Lane (£3,000) and Kilmacredock Green Lane (£5,000).

6. Allocations

Deputy Bernard Durkan, speaking at a District Executive meeting of Fine Gael in Celbridge, informed the Officers of the following allocations being made available for the various services, by the Department to Kildare County Council.

Sanitary Services £1,802,000 Housing Authority £3,160,000 Roads £ 157,000

7. Maynooth Employment Exchange

A request by Deputy B. Burkan to the Minister for Social Welfare to improve the facilities at the Maynooth Employment Exchange has resulted in the following reply:

"The branch manager has been endeavouring to obtain suitable premises. He purchased a property some time ago but was refused permission to convert it for an employment exchange. With regard to privacy it is accepted that there is little privacy in the office. The only solution would be for a claimant to make an appointment to call to the office during off-peak times. When the manager is successful in obtaining a new premises the provision of private facilities will be pursued."

hat does an Assertiveness Training burse offer? First of all, it provides ch participant with the opportunity learn how to deal better with the partular situation(s) that are causing her fficulty at the moment. Practising asrtive behaviour is central to the work of e Course. The ground is prepared for is practice by learning about the theory assertiveness and by gaining a clear iderstanding of the skills that go to ake up assertive behaviour. Fundaental to all of this is an understanding d acceptance of our Basic Human ights. At its root, our problem is often ie to the fact that we don't feel enled to ask, or to say "No." or to init, or to express an opinion. So, the burse is a blend of theory and pract-

The 20-hour Course usually runs over sues, including Building Self-Esteem, Copa period of 10 weeks and costs £45 (negotiable in certain circumstances). There iative. is usually a maximum of 12 participants in each group. The participants, along with the tutor, provide an atmosphere of support and encouragement for each other as they apply the theory and practise the skills in appropriate ways in their lives outside the group.

The Course deals with Background Material such as Basic Human Rights and Definitions of Types of Behaviour: Assertive, Aggressive, Passive and Indirect. It teaches the General Assertive Skills of Clear Communication, Repetition, Coping with the Response and Body Language. It also works in depth on Skills for Particular Situations: Saying "No", Making Requests Assertively and Assertiveness in Sexual Situations. And, finally, it addresses other Important Is-

ing with Rejection and Taking the Init-

The Course is based on the work of Anne Dickson, author of "A Woman in Your Own Right: Assertiveness and You". The Irish women who have been trained in this country by Anne Dickson have formed Redwood Ireland, an Association of Professional Assertiveness Trainers. Redwood Ireland is being officially launched in the week 8-13 September.

There will be a Free Introductory Talk on Assertiveness Training in the ICA Hall, The Harbour, Maynooth on Wed., 3 September at 8.00 pm. The next Course in Maynooth will start on Monn. 8 September and will be run on Mon. mornings until mid-November. For further information contact Emer Mc Dermott at (01) 286482.

treet Talking is a new section of the Newsletter which will focus on the shops and sinesses of Maynooth. These concerns are at the centre of the town, literally and uratively, and contribute as much to the community as do the various clubs and ociations which have regularly featured in our pages. So, any news of events, or ilections on the commercial life of the town will be welcome here.

ver the next few months we will be profiling different aspects of the retail outlets in the town. We begin with a look at the town's bookshops.

Maynooth is fortunate in having two good bookshops already — and apparently ere are prospects of a third in O'Brien's Shopping Mall shortly. The two established ops are the University Bookshop inside the grounds of the college, and Rye River oks in the Centrepoint Shopping Arcade. Bookshops are a valuable resource in any mmunity, putting people immediately in touch with a vast range of entertainment, ormation and culture.

Rve River Books is run by Oliver Frawley, a Clareman who opened his doors October 1984. His was a pioneering venture - he was the first tenant of the arcade iich replaced Noone's garage on the corner, and along with The Country Shop opsite has taken the lead in opening up the "West End" of town. He stocks a broad nge of titles, with the national bestsellers in paperback like maeve Binchy's novels d books with a film or TV tie-in selling well - The Colour Purple and Out of Africa ing recent titles which aroused interest. He also carries some more specialised matal, in view of the special nature of Maynooth; religious and spiritual works are in ady demand, and there are also course related books for the schools and university. is the only bookshop at present keeping a stock of second-hand books on the elves. There is always the possibility of picking up study material at a bargain price, id a wide spectrum of meaty paperback fiction on a sale or exchange basis. At this ne of year the demand for school textbooks is at its height, and Rye River Books excellently situated to provide a year-round service to post-primary students, whose hool is just up the road. He has a good selection of cards and stationery, and even a ix of second-hand LPs to browse through. Oliver makes a particular point of welming browsers, who pop in just to find out what is on the shelves and maybe glance rough a volume or two. His attitude is in the best traditions of bookselling, treating ooks as something more than merely a commodity.

John Byrne's University Bookshop is well=known to the college staff and students it because of its situation at the heart of the Main Campus is probably less freiented by townspeople. John hopes that this will soon change, however, as more and ore people become aware of what he has on offer. And while the imposing college tes may look forbidding to some, he points out that intending visitors to the bookop will have no difficulty in entering and, as an extra bonus, to stroll through part f the college grounds is to experience one of the loveliest environments for miles bund. To get to the bookshop, simply bear to the left once through the gates and on you will see the corner-premises which contain the shop. John Byrne has some elve years' experience of the book-trade with leading Irish companies. For a numr of years he managed the university bookshop for Kenny's of Galway, but at the art of this year he took over on his own behalf and began injecting the new life that mes with increased personal commitment, much to the satisfaction of all on campus. hn is a Maynooth man, and is assisted in the shop by Bernadette Stanley. Asked hat John was like to work with, she pointed out that she had been there with him r eight years, so he can't be all that bad. Much of the University Bookshop's stock geared to the college courses, and while this does provide a ready market it also ings problems of its own, meeting time deadlines and number requirements while aling with a whole range of specialist publishers and suppliers. John Byrne's bookop will become more prominent in the opening weeks of the school-year, when he Il be opening a stall in the post-primary school for three weeks or so to supply necsary texts.

During the summer, when the students are away, the University Bookshop has a ady flow of customers from the various summer-schools and also from tourists visitg the college. To these last he is able to supply postcards, but has to disappoint equent requests for slides of the college. Surely an opening for a photographer here!

The University Bookshop is open from 8.30 through to 6.00 during term-times, onday to Friday. During vacations you are likely to find it closed at lunch hour. ye River Books opens six days a week, from 10.00 to 6.00 throughout the year.

News is that two more units are to open in the Greenfield Shopping Centre -ainderette and a coffee-shop.

Following the spate of accidents on the Cross Lane at Paddy Malone's house, we have requested, by petition, that stop signs be erected and that a speed limit suitable to a residential area be enforced.

We are requesting that the stop signs be erected at the crossing in order to stop the flow of traffic from Brian Noone's Garage to Convent Lane.

Further action will be taken by the residents if our request is not met with approval. Cllr. Stagg will be submitting the petition on our behalf to Kildare Co. Council and will add his voice to ours in support of the proposal.

Fuel Schemes

there are two separate fuel schemes in xistence.

Cheap Fuel Scheme

This scheme applies in the following owns: Arklow, Balbriggan, Bray, Cork, Dublin, Drogheda, Dundalk, Dungarvan, Dun Laoire, Enniscorthy, Gorey, Kilcenny, Limerick, New Ross, Waterford, Nexford, Wicklow.

It is operated by the local authority in each town.

2. National Fuel Scheme

Applies to everyone except those covered by the Cheap Fuel Scheme. It is means tested and each claim is assessed on its merits. Anyone whose only source of income is a Social Welfare or Health Board payment other than Unemployment Benefit or Assistance or Disability Benefit is likely to get assistance under the scheme. Apply to the Community Welfare Officer at your Local Health Centre. The C.W.O. attends at Maynooth Health Centre on Fridays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Both schemes operate from October to April.

Vouchers are given to those eligible and these can be used to buy any fuel. The value of the voucher is £5 per week, at present.

Local Social Service Councils, St. Vincent de Paul Society or other voluntary organisations sometimes give help with fuel. Further information can be got from Social Service Councils.

People with exceptional heating needs may be able to get further assistance under the Supplementary Welfare scheme (apply to the Community Welfare Officer).

Free Electricity Allowance

A free electricity allowance is available to certain pensioners who live alone or with a dependant and who are registered consumers of electricity. Those eligible are:

(a) People aged 66 and over and getting (i) any pension from the Dept. of Social Welfare, (ii) a British or Northern Ireland Retirement Pension, (iii) a Garda Widow's Pension:

(b) People who are getting Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance, Blind Pension or Invalidity Pension.

The allowance consists of relief from the Is it a Bank, or is it normal fixed charge and 300 units per month period between October and March and 200 units per two month period during April-September.

Under what is known as the "Group Account" Scheme a voucher, cashable at Post Offices, is available to those who would normally be eligible for the allowance but who are not registered conusing slot meters.

Free Bottled Gas Allowance

If you would otherwise qualify for a free electricity allowance but cannot avail of it because you are not connected to the ESB system, you may qualify for the bottled gas equivalent of the electricity allowance.

You must be living in a remote area a grant from the Department of Industry and Commerce and Energy or Roinn na Gaeltachta for the installation of bottled gas equipment.

Free Television Licence

If you have been awarded a free electricity allowance by the Department of Social Welfare, or would have got the allowance but cannot avail of it because and on Fridays from 6.30 pm to 9.30 pm. you do not have an electricity supply in your own name, you may obtain a free television licence.

This scheme only covers the cost of colour TV licence you must pay the extra cost yourself.

a Building Society?

No, it's a Credit Union. Many Maynooth residents may not be aware that there is an alternative to the traditional banking system in Maynooth. The Credit Union, started in Leixlip over 15 years ago, has had a branch in Maynooth for a number of vears.

STRAFFAN ROAD/LINK ROAD COMMITTEE

lune a letter accompanied by a map, outlining proposed alterations to the Straffan ad, was distributed to residents of estates on the road, by Councillor Emmet Stagg.

The purpose of these alterations was to convert Straffan Road into a link road to by-pass which is to be completed within the next few years. However, it was only en confronted with the scaled plan, that many residents realised the disruption d dangerous implications which arise from the dimensions envisaged.

An emergency meeting of those people immediately concerned was called by Mr. ed Leavy, who is also Trustee of the Maynooth Sports Park in the Harbour. At this eting a Committee was elected to co-ordinate a campaign of opposition to the plan proposed. We engaged a solicitor, Mr. Patrick Neligan, and an engineer, Mr. Colm ssett, to act on our behalf. Our solicitor wrote to the County Engineer outlining in and detail our opposition and requesting a meeting of our Committee with Council

Copies of this letter were sent to our local and national representatives, many of nom have since replied to our alternative suggestions, as provided by our Engineer,

While this plan is to convert the Straffan Road into a link road to serve the byss, it must be stressed that it is a plan which is "independent" of the by-pass plan. other words, maps of this plan were not on display at the by-pass public enquiry.

For those who have yet to see the proposed plan in map form, the following is a ort summary of its features and implications.

Although the road at the moment is approx. 27ft wide, it is proposed that it be dened, from Noone's Garage to near the Square, to approximately 52 ft wide, iniding footpaths of 11 ft. This in our view is inviting the motorists who pass this ad to use it as a speedway, near estates where the young population is spiralling

At the entrance to Old Railpark and Railpark estates, waste areas will be formed, here the existing road will no longer be used. These areas, in our opinion are very ely areas where temporary dwellers would settle, and further aggravate an already ronic problem in Maynooth.

Those people who own land along this road, stand to lose a significant area of nd, which can never be compensated for, and which will also detract from the sthetic appearance of the area. Residents of Straffan Way may not realist that they and to lose approx 21 ft off their green area.

Those residents of estates in the Newtown area, e.g., Cluain Aoibhinn, Beaufield, c., will either have to cut across through Old Greenfield onto the Straffan Road to t onto the by-pass or drive down into the village and up the length of the Straffan bad. The Council may make this road a cul-de-sac in order to erase this problem, it surely this will also cause inconvenience to the residents of Old Greenfield.

Eventually, we fear that the alterations envisaged in this plan, will cause an inease in the amount of juggernaut traffic which will come into Maynooth via the Dunyne Road, (already causing considerable damage, annoyance and danger to residents the Convent Road, etc.) and travel through the village centre, onto the Straffan bad.

Surely the object of a by-pass plan should be to by-pass the town/village, rather an to increase traffic which is both dangerous and undesirable. We support Cllr. ernard Durkan's suggestion of a ring road, which we will be pressing the Council to cept.

Further details of our campaign will be distributed to all the residents of Mayboth in the coming weeks via handouts to be distributed in all homes. We urge you support us in our campaign to protect Maynooth from the major and long-term iplications of this plan.


CHICKEN HIBERNIA

MAYNOOTH: IT'S SCENERY, CHARACTER, ETC.

A Mr. and Mrs. C. Hall produced a best selling guidebook in 1842 entitled "Ireland: It's Scenery, Character etc." They passed through Maynooth and were not impressed by either its scenery, or indeed, its characters i.e. its clerical inhabitants.


Maynooth "consists of one long and broad street; the dwellings, of a class between houses and cabins, at either side, having an air of exceeding discomfort. The "hotel" is a long rambling building, the rooms of which remind one of the "hose" in the "sixth stage" - "a world too wide", and seem utterly unused to the intrusion of guests. At one end of the town is the entrance to Carton, the seat of "Ireland's only Duke": at the other, are the ruins of the ancient castle, the famous stronghold of the earls of Kildare, and the "Royal College of St. Patrick". The college is a peculiarly ungainly and ungraceful structure; it appears to have been originally a mansion of moderate size, the which additions have been made from time to time, and where elegance and uniformity have been sacrificed to convenience".


Hasn't changed much has it? Particularly when you look at the convenience in the Square to which elegance and uniformity have been sacrificed!

And what about the characters?

"The Maynooth priest ... being, at his outset utterly ignorant of society of a better order than his native village supplies and having, as a matter of course, contracted the habits of those among whom his boyhood was passed; reading not to enlarge his mind, but to confirm his narrow view of mankind - he enters the college, where he mixes, exclusively, with persons under precisely similar circumstances. Here, it is not reasonable to believe, all that is objectionable in his previous habits and education will be strengthened rather than removed;"





NATURE TRAIL

The Wild Duck

here are a number of sepcies of Wild Duck that live in Ireland. One of the most ommon is the Mallard. The mallard can be found in every county. The male mallard s called a drake and the female is called a duck. The drake can be more easily picked but because of its beautiful coloured feathers, it has a green neck and head, it has a busy time for the M.A.D.E. committee plue area on its wings and a bringt plumage, where as the duck is a mottle brown. At he end of Summer both the male and female loose their feathers, this is called moultng, they do not fly a great lot while this change is occurring. They can live up to 15 (Monday).

The mallard breeds in Spring and early Summer, the nest is built of reeds, grass, vater roots, and when the eggs are laid they are covered by light down from the duck. The eggs are pale green in colour and vary in number from 8 to 15, they take 28 days to hatch and when the young are born they are yellow and dark brown in colour. The duck has webed feet, and the female duck brings its young to the water at a very early stage to learn to swim and to eat. It eats plants, small fish, frogs, snails, slugs and flying insects. The mallard is a very fast flyer, its main enemies are th fox, mink, and of course man, during the shooting season, from 1st September to 31st January. The mallard can be seen feeding on small ponds, lakes and rivers, the mallard can be seen preening its feathers by pressing its oil glands near the tail, this process is done a number of times each dat and this leaves the feathers waterproof. Mallards usually fly in large numbers and some of them migrate to warmer countries and return in

The Hedgehog

The Hedgehog is a very timid creature and can be found living in garden fields and woods. It is completely covered in sharp spines and is brown in colour, the hedgehog is often seen wandering in the evening time in quiet spots in search of food. Its main diet is snails, earthworms, birds' eggs, fruit ... apples, blackberries, gooseberries. The hedgehog makes its nest under an old shed, or in a wall or hedge, the nest is made of dead leaves, grass and twigs. They breed in the Spring and Summer, the litter numbers 5 to 6, the young stay in the nest for about 3 to 4 weeks before venturing out to scratch the ground for food. In Winter the hedgehog stays in its nest to protect itself against the cold weather, this is called Hibernation. They may live up to 10 years. Their main enemies are the fox and the badger, and of course a great number of them are killed while crossing the roads.



T BLACKLION

ildare County Council plan to build a alting site at Blacklion to accommodte Maynooth's indigenous travelling opulation. The site will cater for 15 amilies, will have running water and anitation and is due to be completed nd ready for use in the Spring of 1987. lanning permission has been obtained nd the building is now out for tender. o date a copy of the plans at the site /as unavailable for inclusion in the Newsetter to accompany this article.

The plans to build a halting site for ravellers will have many implications. firstly it will get them off the roadside nto a tarmacadamed site fully equipped vith running water, sewerage, and regular efuse collection. This will greatly imrove the living conditions of the travellrs whose poor living conditions coupled vith the damp climate, poor hygene, ack of toilets, dirty water, or no water, nuddy paths have led to impaired health and rampant disease. Bronchitus and heumonia are among the common repiratory diseases suffered as well as gastro-intestinal diseases, skin conditions und infestations of all kinds, (all third vorld illnesses). When we talked to the ravellers about the new halting site for Blacklion they welcomed the idea saying hat they would be more than willing to nove into it, and make use of it, their only wishes being that it would be stricty for Maynooth Travellers, and that the County Council would not enclose the nalting site with high walls as they have ione in many of the halting sites in Dublin. As one traveller remarked 'As far as I can see the walls were built to hide us away from the settled people out in my opinion Ireland can't hide the ruth they have us, so they can't hide us forever"

Education


The education of Travellers in Maynooth has been fairly successful to date, both primary school and the post-primary school contributing to this. However, as one of the teachers in the school remarked many of them start school late, only stay for a short period of time mainly because they fall back in the class and find it difficult to cope with that. Teachers would agree that travellers' children are no less intelligent than others and will make good progress given regular attendance and normal home condition. But for travelling children, home conditions are not normal. About 50% do not attend at all. Even the regular attendants seldom obtain maximum educational benefit and need much additional help and encouragement. Their handicaps are many. The building of a halting site at Blacklion and the settlement of travellers in Maynooth means that education facilities must be provided for them. Sr. Raphael in Presentation Convent said that she would continue to educate the travellers in the classroom and if necessary would apply to the Dept. of Education for an extra teacher to cater for them. However, the school system itself, its practices and curricula are unsuited for the travellers' needs. There has been successful education programmes organised in the past where special classes were set up, with the aid of an assistant teacher who is usually a traveller who can help communicate and identify problems. Usually they concnetrate on looking at the travellers own values and attitudes, own location in history, identity, economic activity and status (many involved in tinkering and horse dealing in the past). V.E.C. are experimenting with a programme of work suitably flexible to attract these young-It includes general education, crafts, cookery, simply woodworking,

sport and embraces continuing help with numeracy and literacy deficiencies.

Perhaps Maynooth could take advantage of such a scheme and set an example for the rest of the country.

An Ghaeilge: dearcadh na ndaoine agus Meán cumarsaide.

Castar daoine orm go minic nach bhfuil mórán dea-thda acu i leith na Gaeilge na aon ghné den chultur dúchasach. Dé ghnáth deireann siad rud éigin ar nós, "We hate Irish because it was rammed down our throats at school," Déanaim mo dhícheall a chur ina luí ar an té a dhéanann a leithéid sin de ráiteas gur dearcadh cúng atá aige /aici,nár cheist a bheith ag caitheamh anuas ar an teanga fein ach gur chóir an locht a chur ar an chóras a d'fheach leis an Ghaeilge a mhúineadh ar dhóigh mhí-thaitneamhach Tá an easpa measa ar an teanga le feiceáil go forleathan agus gan cuma air go bhfuil feabhas ag teacht ar an scéal. Cuireann sé íonadh agus díomá orm nuair a fheicim an dreach mí-shásta a thagann ar dhaoine go minic nuair a thugaim an teagan Gaeilge de m'ainm doibh.

Ar an dochuair, tá neart daoine sa Ghaeltacht a bhfuil an dearcadh caolaigeanta céanna acu i leith na teanga is atá ag roinnt de mhuintir na Galltachta. Tá aithne agam ar chainteoirí dúchais de chuid an lar-thuaiscirt a bhfuil deargfhuath acu ar an teanga atá leo ón chlaoibhán; tá ceangal déanta acu ina n-aigne idir an Ghaeilge agus an cultúr ar thaobh amháin agus bochtaineacht, aineolas agus seanaimsearthacht ar an taobh eile. Feictear dóibh go bhfuil se ábalta freastal níos fearr a dhéanamh ar a gcuid riachtanas. Ní thuigeann siad tábhacht na teanga agus is beag duine a dhéanann iarracht muinin aisti a mhúscailt iontu.

Tá raidhse téarmaí nua tagtha isteach i gacha an domhain (go háirithe ó dheireadh an chogaidh) le cur síos ar niche nua aoiseacha; ní tharla seo, áfach, igcús teangacha mionlacha ar nos na Gaeilge. Is trid na meáin chumarsáide a chuirtear eolas go for leathan ar fhocal nua; sa tír seo tá an Ghaeilge ag braith cuid mhór ar RTÉ le seo a dhéanamh ach tá an eagraíocht beag beann ar an teanga. Ní chraoltar ach uimhir bheag cláracha Ghaeilge in aighaidh na seachtaine agus is beag ceann díobh sin a bhíonn ar árd-chaighdeán (sampla maith is ea 'Trom agus Eadrom' de lag-iarracht RTÉ clár spéisiúil Gaeilge a chur ar fáil). Ní fhéadfaí a rá go bhfuil éacht déanta ag an nuachtáin sin de shíor ag mairgní faoi mheath na Gaeilge in áit iarracht a dhéanamh muinin as an teanga a mhuscairt i ndaoine. Tá sé de dhualgas ar 'Anois' (áta ag fáil deontais ón rialtas) cur ina lui ar dhaoine gur féidir trácht ar rudaí nua-aimseartha trí mheán na Gaeilge (tá mé ag smaoineamh go háirithe ar rudaí ar nós roc-chéol a bhfuil dúil ag an

borradh fuithi ach rachaidh sí i léig tuilleadh.
