

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
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## **Community Council Notes**

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


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
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
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#### **TAE KWON-DO NEWS**


In the senior Destruction section, John McLoughlin took gold in two events and a bronze in his pattern section.

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
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

#### **GLIDER PILOTS DO IT OUIETLY**

The Maynooth members of the Dublin Gliding Club have participated in another active year's flying for the club during 1992 - the fortieth since its foundation. The club first started flying in September 1952.

Apart from getting in as much gliding in Ireland as the weather conditions permitted, Michael O'Reilly of Beaufield travelled to Hungary during the summer to fly there. It was not entirely a trip into the unknown, as the home club had entertained Hungarian visitors in the past, and he was in a group of three or four who travelled together. Apart from the opportunity to fly new types of sailplane and to experience the central European atmospheric conditions - very different to the Atlantic conditions on this island - he completed two notable flights: a gain of height over 6,500 feet, and a duration flight that lasted five hours and sixteen minutes. These meet two of the three flight requirements for the award of the Silver C Certificate - of which only just over fifty have been issued by the Irish Gliding Association during its existence.

Peter Denman of Leinster Park completed his Silver C in July with a flight from Gowran Grange, near Naas, - where the club now has its base - to Kilkenny Airfield. He also remembers a flight a few weeks later which took him from Gowran Grange over Athy and Carlow and then back - a triangle of nearly 100 kilometres. He also had a notable flight in Kerry which took him along the mountains and corrie lakes up over the Conor Pass near Dingle.

The club operates all the year round at weekends: the hangar and airfield are signposted on the Ballymore Eustace Road out of Naas - not far from Punchestown. Practice flying continues in winter . Another Maynooth flyer, Siobhán Ní Fhoghlú is currently at the pre-solo stage. The club has two two seater training gliders, with enclosed cockpits and full dual controls, and there are several qualified instructors. Come fly with us! - new members are always welcome. Or take one of the five day courses especially for beginners, which are held in late July / August. If you want to know more, contact Peter Denman at 6285464.

#### CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS Question

I was very impressed by the way our local Citizens Information Centre handled a very complicated problem for my sister. As my children are all at school, I have some spare time and would be interested in volunteering for this type of work. Can you tell me what this would involve, do I have to be an expert at anything or are there particular qualifications required?

#### Answer:

Like ourselves, the 80 C.I.C.s around the country provide information on topics like social welfare, health services. redundancy, income tax, housing, family law, consumer affairs and local organisations and activities. We also help people to get entitlements by helping them to fill in forms and if necessary, we contact government departments or other agencies on their behalf. In addition we help people who are appealing against decisions and from time to time may even accompany them to an appeal.

You don't have to be an expert at anything and whilst there are no special qualifications required we do look for the following qualities -


BEING - • a good listener • tactful • able to observe absolute confidentiality • dependable and resourceful • interested in helping people • and having a sense of humour.

Training will be provided and you would be expected to attend for duty at the Centre for two hours at least once a fortnight. You will normally have at least one other volunteer on duty with you. You may get a number of people calling with enquiries. You may also have telephone enquiries and perhaps written enquiries to deal with. You will have information in the centre on most topics and even if you do not have it there and then, there is a backup service that you can contact to get the information. We have local specialists to help us with difficult enquiries and a professional backup service from the NSSB. Anyone interested in becoming a C.I.C. volunteer should contact the Organiser at their nearest C.I.C., who will be happy to answer any further questions about the Service. The Centres are listed in the Golden Pages.




#### **DUSTIN'S DIARY**


#### THE LAWNMOWER MAN


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#### ODE TO A BYGONE AGE

#### Apple and Cheese Pleasers.

140g / 5 1/2 oz butter 50g/2oz soft brown sugar 1 egg 1 teaspoon vanilla essence 75g/3oz plain flour 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon pinch of salt 115g/4 1/2 oz rolled oats 100g / 4oz raisins 1 Apple diced

Cream together the butter and sugar. Beat in the egg and vanilla. Sift the flour and the cinnamon, baking powder and salt. Fold into the creamed mixture with the remaining ingredients. Drop heaped teaspoons full of the mixture onto greased baking sheets. Bake in a preheated oven (190 degrees celsius /375 degrees Fahrenheit, gas mark 5).

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#### **GARDA TALK**

#### SAFE DRIVING

Freezing weather - the cold, rain, ice and snow, has its effects on all of us, but to drivers it is particularly dangerous. Anyone contemplating a journey in these conditions should take a little time out and make a few checks on their car.

You should check your type pressure (including the spare), clean your windows, mirrors and lights. When you set out on your journey, and encounter any of the following elements follow this advice.

#### FOG:

- 1. Slow down Fog deceives.
- 2. Use dipped headlights.
- 3. If you have fog lights, use them.
- 4. Keep a safe distance from the vehicle in front.

#### SNOW:

- 1. Remove all snow from the windows and mirrors.
- 2. Accelerate gently brake gently.
- 3. Use the main roads where possible.
- 4. Most important slow down.

#### ICE:

- 1. In the comforts of your car, you may be unaware of the drop in temperature outside - Be aware.
- 2. BLACK ICE You can't see it, but reduced road noise tells you that it is there.
- 3. Above all slow down and take your time.

Carry de-icer, jump leads, and in severe weather carry a shovel and warm coat. FOREWARNED IS FOREARMED.

Bad weather also increases the risk of being involved in a traffic accident. We have discussed the legal requirements surrounding traffic accidents before but some people are still not sure on the correct procedure that should follow.

1. If you are the driver of a vehicle which has been involved in an accident, keep your car at the scene.

2. Prevent a further accident. Warn other motorists.

3. Summon help.

4. If there are injuries, do not move the injured, summon a doctor or Ambulance.

5. Call the Gardai, or report it in the first instance to the nearest Garda Siochana station.

6. Obtain the name and address of the driver of each car, and the name and address of the owner, together with registration details and particulars of insurance.

7. Inform your Insurance Co., and contact your solicitor.

This is not in comprehensive detail and you are advised to consult a solicitor for further information.

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
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#### GARDENING HINTS.

January has arrived again and the ground may be frozen over but hopefully you are not, and there are still many things to be taken care of in your garden.

If you have not already pruned your established apple trees they can be pruned from November until February. Pear trees may also be pruned during this month. Use good quality tools and make sure they are sharp to reduce the risk of disease. If you are a beginner in the craft of pruning do not attempt any drastic treatment, too little pruning is safer than too much. If your tree is suffering from a disease there are various winter sprays on the market that will treat a variety of infections, so consult your local garden centre to find out which spray is appropriate to combat the disease which has infected your tree. Evergreen trees will be protected from damage by a heavy snowfall by tying the branches with twine. An example of this may be seen if you take a stroll through Maynooth College from the main entrance down towards the post office. On your right-hand side there are trees with string tied around them. Alternatively, for the less choice specimens, if you see the branches laden down with snow, just shake it off! Remember that a blanket of snow could damage a plastic greenhouse and will also cut down on the light entering into all transparent structures such as cloches or cold frame.

So get to work and you will be reaping the benefits later on in the year.



#### 'THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST'





## Muintir Ma Nuad

## Rt. Rev. Monsignor Míceál Ledwith. President of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.



Born in Wexford in 1942, and educated at St.Peter's College, Monsignor Ledwith arrived in Maynooth in 1960 to commence his studies for the priesthood. The system he entered then was vastly different to the one experienced by today's students, the College being at that time a large, almost self-contained establishment apparently re-

mote from the life of the town. With between 600 - 700 people living and working there, it was not perhaps the quiet, peaceful haven we envisage a seminary to have been. Monsignor Ledwith remembers there being at least 30 thriving societies and clubs at the time, the one in which he was most interested being the bee-keeping society, which had strong outside links with the Kildare bee-keeping society. After initially obtaining his B.A. Hons in Philosophy he then studied theology to Doctorate level and was then appointed to the staff in 1971 as Lecturer of Dogmatic Theology only two days after defending his dissertation. Since then he has remained in St. Patrick's, with only short absences, up until the present day. He was appointed Professor in 1976, Vice-President of the college in 1980 and finally President in 1985. He also holds positions on various committees concerned with the furtherance of education.

Since becoming President, Monsignor Ledwith has overseen enormous new developments and renovations of the older buildings. The new student halls of residence, sports facilities and restaurant have been built and major restoration work has been completed, both to the exterior and interior of the old campus. This renovation work may not be immediately visible to the untrained eye, but as Monsignor Ledwith observed "The sign of good restoration is it's invisibility". Work is also in progress for the new Callan science building, to be completed by October 1993. The money for this project comes from European funds according to Monsignor Ledwith, and is a tribute to, and a recognition of, the hard work and commitment of the science departments of the college which have led to significant new developments in their areas.

In relation to the upcoming Bicentenary celebrations, Monsignor Ledwith looks forward to close co-operation between the town and the college, as this special event will attract some thousands of visitors to the town. Already involved, as Chairman, with the Castle Restoration Committee he looks forward to meeting even more representations of the various clubs and societies in Maynooth, so that more ideas may be taken on board as to the presentation of Maynooth as a unique university town. He has already had consultations with the local authorities in regard to the resurfacing of the town's pavements, envisaging not just tarmacadam but an attractive interlocking cablestone or brick surface with complimentary street lights - perhaps modelled on those in the Phoenix Park. As there will be a conference of 100 - 150 Heads of European Universities held, for the first time in Ireland, in May 1993 in the College. Monsignor Ledwith as its Chairman is hoping that the local authorities may see the value of presenting Maynooth in its most favourable light.

When asked about the education and values he hoped St. Patrick's would impart to its intending priests, he stressed the need for providing the people with the best priests possible. Whilst giving the students a first class academic education, St. Patrick's also makes sure they do not go out into the world without sound social education. The students visit jails, hospitals, youth clubs and also receive practical education in the social services including marriage guidance counselling. Monsignor Ledwith sees this aspect of their training as vital in order to be able to be of use in today's society where the pressures on family life have become so great.

With student numbers now standing at approx. 4,000 he feels that this should remain stable in order to retain the college's image as an intimate and personal one.

Monsignor Ledwith looks forward to the coming years as an era of even greater co-operation between the town and the college to the benefit of both.

## **Political Party Notes**

#### JANUARY SALES

In an effort to prolong the season of goodwill, retailers, in their wisdom, came up with the idea of the January Sales. Maynooth shoppers will know that this idea is close to the hearts of all our shopkeepers.

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#### DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

#### **Election Outcome**

Given the unprecedented national surge to Labour, which was replicated in the Kildare constituency, Democratic Left's candidate, Councillor Catherine Murphy, did well to increase her vote over the 1989 outcome by six per cent. The Democratic Left vote grew very substantially in the Celbridge Electoral Area, by some 39 per cent. In Maynooth the rate of growth was even higher, at 43 per cent.

There was clearly an acknowledgement here of the excellent work being done locally by Catherine Murphy as a Town Commissioner and County Councillor. This work will continue. However, outside North Kildare, it is clear that Democratic Left had not yet established its identity, which is hardly surprising given that the party was only established a few months ago. We are confident that we will be knocking on the door next time around!

In the meantime, we wish to thank all those who supported us in the election. We are also grateful for the warm welcome we received on the doorsteps everywhere during our canvass.

#### SEASON'S GREETINGS

By the time these notes appear in print, it will be too late for us to wish our readers a Happy Christmas. It is not clear at the time of writing what kind of government will materialise. However, whatever the outcome, we take this opportunity to wish you all a prosperous and socialist 1993!

#### How Maynooth Voted.

#### The Overall Result in Kildare.

The 1992 General Election produced significant overall changes in the way the Kildare constituency voted. As elsewhere, there was a big increase in the Labour vote (up from 17% to 27%). mainly at the expense of Fine Gael (down from 29% to 22%). However, this swing was not enough for the newcomer Jack Wall to deprive Bernard Durkan of the last seat.

While the overall Fianna Fail vote fell by only two points, it showed big internal changes, with Charlie McCreevy benefitting at the expense of both his running mates, Sean Power and Sean O'Fearghail. However, tight transfers saw Power safely taking the fourth seat. The relative balance between Alan Dukes and Bernard Durkan remained much the same within the Fine Gael vote. The Progressive Democrat vote increased substantially, from four to seven per cent. While Catherine Murphy increased her vote slightly, Sean English fell back considerably.

#### Celbridge Electoral Area.

As in previous elections, Celbridge Electoral Area (Ardclough, Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth) behaved somewhat differently from the rest of the constituency. Labour led the way with 32%, with Fianna Fail at 27.5% and Fine Gael at 21%. Democratic Left's Catherine Murphy also scored well here with ten per cent, confined mainly to her Leixlip base.

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#### Maynooth Overall Result.

Whereas the Maynooth vote was fairly evenly divided between the three big parties in 1989, this time Labour moved decidedly ahead, with 36% of the total. The strength of Bernard Durkan's Maynooth base was clear in that Fine Gael (27%) were ahead of Fianna Fail (25%). The Labour gains were made at the expense of the other big parties, as the minority vote remained much the same. There was a significant switch among Fianna Fail voters: where Sean Power got the bulk of the party vote in 1989, there was a major swing to Charlie McCreevy this time.

#### Local Trends in the Maynooth vote.

The typically efficient tally carried out at the Kildare count (carried out together by all parties under Charlie McCreevy's direction) allows us to see how each of nine polling districts (seven in 1989) voted. The Labour vote was distributed quite well through all the boxes, but was exceptionally strong in Box 54 (Old Greenfield) at 55%. The other party votes were correspondingly weak in this area. The Progressive Democrat vote was by far the lowest in this box.

Labour's poorest showing (26%) was in Box 53 (mainly the college). This trend against Labour among College voters (mainly clerical students) has been noted before, and presumably reflects the rural background of most of these students, with little tradition of voting Labour. Fianna Fail, by contrast, did best in this box (31%), while their worst performance (20%) was in Old Greenfield.

The Fine Gael vote was more variable than the other big parties. They did best (35%) in Box 52 (Carton Court, Cluain Aoibhinn, College Green), followed (at 33%) by Box 56 (mainly Town Centre and outlying townlands). Their worst showings were in Old Greenfield (20%) and Box 51 (mainly Beaufield) (22%).

Of the minority parties, John Dardis (PDs) did best in Beaufield and Box 55 (Greenfield Drive and Kingsbry); Catherine Murphy scored highest in the familiar ultra-left territory of Rail Park and Laurence Avenue (Box 59), while Sean English did particularly well in Greenfield Drive/Kingsbry).

Because Maynooth was divided into two extra polling districts in 1992, the division of areas between boxes is quite different, so that direct comparisons in voting trends between areas is not possible. The most comparable boxes are Box 57 in 1989 and Box 59 in 1992, which mainly cover Rail Park and Laurence Avenue. This comparison indicates a doubling of the labour vote, with Fine Gael suffering mostly, but Fianna Fail also down quite a bit.

The corresponding report to this in the Newsletter after the 1989 election referred to Labour doing best in local authority estates and Fianna Fail and Fine Gael doing best in private housing estates. While this remains true, what is noteworthy about this election has been the ability of Labour to greatly increase its vote among private house owners. This is as true of Maynooth as anywhere else.

#### CITIZEN'S INFORMATION CENTRE NOTES

#### Information For Regular Part-Time Workers

Ouestion: Do the regulations on part-time workers apply to everyone who works part-time?

Answer: No! The regulations only apply to people who are classified under the regulations as "Regular Part-time Workers", that is, an employee who:- 1) has worked for at least 13 weeks for the same employer and 2) is normally expected to work for at least 8 hours per week for that employer.


Question: How do "Regular Part-time Workers" benefit from these new regulations?

Answer: The regulations bring them under the Labour Laws which up until then only covered people who worked for 18 hours per week or more. These are:- The Minimum Notice and Terms of Employment Act: The Redundancy Payments Act: The Unfair Dismissals Act: The Maternity (Protection of Employees) Act: The Protection of Employees (Employer's Insolvency) Act: The Worker Participation (State Enterprises) Act: Holiday entitlements were also extended to Regular Parttime Workers.

Question: Do the regulations mean that "Regular Part-time Workers" are entitled to redundancy payments, maternity leave, minimum notice etc., under the various Acts covered? Answer: "Regular part-time Workers" will only be entitled to these if they fulfil the requirements under each Act in the same way as full-time workers have to. For example:-For Minimum Notice you must have at least 13 weeks of "continuous" employment. If there is not a 26 week break in service it is "continuous". The amount of notice you get will depend on the length of your service: -13 weeks to 2 years service = 1 weeks notice: 2 to 5 years service = 2 weeks notice 5 to 10 years service = 4 weeks notice: 10 to 15 years service = 6 weeks notice: 15 years += 8 weeks notice. For Redundancy you must have 2 years "continuous service". (Periods of layoff if not more than 26 consecutive weeks do not break "continuous service"). The amount of statutory redundancy is related to age, length of service and earnings. For Unfair Dismissals, you must have been employed for at least 1 year except if the dismissal is alleged to be because of pregnancy or trade union membership. For Maternity Protection of Employees i.e. giving a female employee entitlement to 14 weeks maternity leave with the right to return to work, you do not have to have been in employment for any particular length of time. But, in effect, Regular Part-time Workers will have to have at least 13 weeks service. For Worker Participation on the board of semi-state bodies you must have at least 1 year's continuous service. Question: What about the Holidays (Employees) Act? Answer: The holiday entitlements of full-time workers were more or less extended to part-time workers but they are calculated in a different way. Holidays for full-time workers are related to hours worked e.g. those who work 120 hours per month or 1,400 hours per year are entitled to 3 weeks annual leave. "Regular Part-time Workers" are entitled to 6 hours holidays for every 100 hours worked. So if you worked for 10 hours for 50 weeks you would be entitled to 30 hours leave. This would in effect give you three weeks leave (three 10 hour weeks). Time spent on annual leave is counted as working time when calculating holiday entitlements.

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#### Question: What about public holidays?

Answer: Generally those who have worked 120 hours in the five weeks before a public holiday are entitled to a day off or payment in lieu. Regular Part-time Workers are entitled to the public holiday, an extra day or a day's pay, if they work for the employer for at least 13 weeks. This is so, even if it is not a normal working day. An average day's pay can be worked out by adding the number of hours worked over the previous 13 weeks and dividing by the number of days worked.

Question: Can a Regular Part-time Worker get Unemployment Benefit if unemployed?

Answer: Whether or not you get UB will depend on your social welfare record, being available for work and genuinely looking for work. You could for instance be working for 1 to 3 days as a Regular Part-time Worker and claiming U.B. for the other days. The social welfare week is 6 days: you must be signing on for 3 days in any 6.

Question: Does a Regular Part-time Worker pay PRSI?

Answer: Every employee aged 16 to 66 years should be included in PRSI but what you pay and the cover it gives you will depend on your class of insurance. This is set out under social welfare legislation. A Regular Part-time Worker will be insured at Class A, with cover for all benefits, if earning £25 per week or more. Short term payments such as Unemployment, Disability and Maternity benefits and long term payments such as the Contributory, Old Age and Widows Pensions. If you earn eass than £25 per week you are in Class J with cover for occupational injuries only.

Juestion: If I earn £10 from one employer and £20 from nother should I be in Class A?

Answer: Yes! You should let both employers know that you have other earnings which bring you over £25 per week. Question: What if I only earn over £25 some weeks?

Answer: You are Class A for those weeks in which you earn :25 or more and Class J for those weeks in which you earn less han £25. For example at the end of the year you could have 20 lass J and 32 Class A contributions on your social welfare ecord making up your 52 weeks. Only the Class A will count or claims (other than occupational injuries). The requirements ary with the benefit claimed. Social welfare claims i.e. Unemloyment Benefit, Disability Benefit, Dental, Optical and ural Treatment depend on you having 39 Class A type ontributions in the "contribution year". The requirement will ary with the benefit claimed.



#### **GO GLIDING !**

How do I get into gliding? And how much does it cost? Two questions which arose in response to last month's article about the Maynooth stalwarts who fly with the Dublin Gliding Club, and which will be answered here. A glider is a highly efficient aircraft, characterised by its sleek lines and long slim wings that span fifty or sixty feet. The basic flying controls are similar to those of a light aeroplane, with control column, rudder pedals, instrument panel etc. inside a cockpit enclosed under a perspex canopy. There is no engine, as the whole point of gliding is to use the air currents and meteorological conditions to stay aloft by soaring like the birds. The gliders are launched by being towed to 2,000 feet or so by a tug-plane, after which the glider pilot releases the tow rope and flies off to explore the air. For anyone who has yearned to experience the joy of flight, and the exuberance and challenge of controlling a precisely manoeuvrable aircraft - as opposed to using an aircraft as a means of getting rapidly from one spot to another - then a glider offers the most satisfying possibilities.

Learning to fly one takes time: the club attitude is that the pilot



hould be fully competent to cope with any eventuality likely ) arise before he or she is sent solo. Thus the emphasis is on fficient training rather than on rushing people through to that rst solo and then tidying up any loose ends afterwards. But the arning curve is rapid and the series of exercises so structured at there is always something new to learn - controlling the ircraft in the air, planning circuits and landings, and then the ore specialised techniques of "thermalling". The emphasis is n "hands-on" instruction in the air, using the enclosed twoater training aircraft under the guidance of a qualified inructor. From the very first flights pupils are encouraged to fly e aircraft themselves as much as is practicable.

), what about those questions at the beginning? Well, to learn fly with the Dublin Gliding Club one has to be a member of e club - but it is possible to take out membership on a trial is before making a full commitment, and there are a number ways for interested beginners to sample the sport. One is to ke out a one month 'Temporary Membership''. This costs 0; it includes your first instructional flight, and for a month ereafter you can fly at the club rates. Each flight cost £8.00 hat is the cost of the launch and the use of the glider; there is charge for the instruction. Each instructional flight genery lasts about fifteen minutes or so; as the learning in the air fairly intensive, that is about the most suitable span for full ncentration required by beginners. The Temporary Memrship is an ideal way to sample the range of club activities, there is a lot to do on the ground as well, with gliders to be de ready for launching. At the end of the month you can cide whether or not to pay a subscription as a full member ances are you will be hooked! The club flies on Saturdays 1 Sundays right throughout the year, weather conditions mitting. There is also the possibility of taking out One Day mbership for £20, which includes the cost of one launch: s is ideal for someone who just wants to be taken up for one t, to say "I've experienced gliding!"

ring the summer, the club will be running a series of oneek courses between July 26th and August 20th. These isist of eight training flights, together with introductory ures, briefing sessions, and ground handling procedures. : fee of £195 - Students and u/18's £150 - includes all flying ground instruction, with additional flights at club rates if ired (and there is a discount of £20 for early bookings). these rses are an ideal way to get started - they provide a centrated programme for a small group of people. You i't get to fly solo in a week - that takes upwards of sixty iches - but you will learn to enjoy flying. 
#### Canal Safety

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#### RECIPES

MINESTRONE SOUP

50 g/2oz haricot beans 1.75 litres/3 pints stock 2 carrots, chopped 1 large onion, chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 2 leeks, trimmed, thinly sliced and washed 3 tablespoons/3 tablespoons oil 25 g/1 oz butter 1(396 g/14oz) Can Peeled Tomatoes 1 tablespoon tomato purée bouquet garni salt and pepper 50 g/2 oz spaghetti, broken up Parmesan cheese

Soak the beans in 600 ml/1 pint of the stock overnight. The following day add a further 600 ml/1 pint stock and simmer gently for 1 hour.

Fry the carrot, onion, garlic and leeks in a mixture of oil and butter until soft - about 5 minutes - and until just beginning to colour. Add the remaining ingredients (except the spaghetti and cheese), the beans, all the stock and bring to the boil. Cover and simmer gently for 1 hour or until tender. Add the spaghetti and continue cooking for 10-15minutes until tender. Discard the bouquet garni, adjust the seasoning and serve sprinkled with Parmesan cheese.

Serves 4-6

#### Re: Apple and Cheese Pleasers from January Newsletter edition.

The list of ingredients should have included 1/2 teaspoon of baking powder and 100 g/4 oz of grated cheddar cheese.

Cauliflower cheese with bacon and onion

1 large cauliflower, broken into florets salt and pepper 225 g/8 oz streaky bacon chopped 2 onions, chopped  $40 \text{ g/}1^1/20\text{ oz butter}$ 25 g/1 oz flour  $300 \text{ml}/\frac{1}{2}$  pint milk 2 tablespoons cream 150 g/5 oz cheddar cheese, grated nutmeg parsley sprig to garnish

Cook the cauliflower in boiling salted water for 10 minutes. Drain well. Meanwhile, gently saute the bacon until golden. Remove from the pan. Saute the onions in the bacon fat and butter until softened. Add the flour and cook, stirring, for one minute. Gradually blend in the milk and bring to the boil, stirring continuously. Remove from the heat and add the cream and all but one tablespoon of the grated cheese. Stir in the reserved bacon and season with salt, pepper and nutmeg. Pour over the cauliflower in an ovenproof dish. Sprinkle with the reserved cheese. Bake in a moderately hot oven (190°C/375°F / gas mark 5) for 30 to 40 minutes until golden and bubbling. Garnish with parsley.

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



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
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#### GARDA TALK

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#### GARDENING HINTS.

Plant Onion sets, such as reliable Giant Fen Globe, 6 in. apart in double rows 15 in. apart. Just bury the bulbs so that the birds can't see them and tweak them out.

Clean up rock gardens, removing clogging leaves and topdressing pockets with an equal-parts mix of sifted top-soil, course grit and peat, plus a whitening of bonemeal.

Take cuttings of overwintered Chrysanthemums, rooting them in trays of sharp sand in good light and gentle heat.

Continue planting trees and shrubs, and stake trees before filling in the planting hole, to avoid damaging the roots. Wash cloches for warming soil before planting out heat-raised and well hardened-off lettuces next month.

Sow half-hardy annuals, such as Lobelia, Petunia, Antirrhinum and Zinnia in pots of gritty compost and raise them in a propagator or on a warm windowsill.

Now to the middle of March is the time to plant or move Snowdrops, while the leaves are still green and even while they are still in blossom.

That dingy corner of the garden can be turned into a beauty spot with a packet of climbing Nasturtiums allowed to romp about as they will. More over they will sow themselves for next year. Many hardy annuals will do this.

If you have a pool or pond or water garden or whatever you like to call it, don't forget to break the ice.

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
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

These include the best equipment available - open and closed slides climbing frames swings etc. all echoing the jungle theme and all fully supervised by expert and friendly staff. The play areas are divided into two. One for under five year olds where they can play without being jostled by the older children, and one for the six to fourteen year olds who can face the challenge of Tarzan's world. For the comfort of the adults there is a restaurant area overlooking the play area where parents can see there children play in safe hands and so can relax themselves. Parties are catered for also with varying menus and an option of a birthday cake provided. The price for a party also includes 75 minutes of play-time - a very good idea for harassed parents who used to wonder what to do when the MacDonald burger was over! Jungle World plans to extend its play area and provide cartoon shows in the future and hopefully will provide an ideal venue for school tours - teachers please take note! There are limited parking facilities but as Mr. Michael Wiley of Jungle World commented - "Kildare County Council, if they have any plans to promote Leixlip as a good business town will have to spend

money to do a lot of re-surfacing. You cannot make money without spending it". We are sure all the local residents and businesses in Ralph Square will echo that sentiment. So how about it - Councillors.

Jungle World brings a lot of custom into the area and with a little co-operation will be able to bring a lot more. Surely that is worth some expenditure.

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

#### LABOUR PARTY NOTES

#### Emmet Stagg T.D. Minster of State.

The local branch at the January meeting congratulated Emmet on his well earned promotion to the rank of Minister of State at the Department of the Environment. Emmet has special responsibility for Housing and Urban Renewal. We are convinced that with Emmet Stagg's hard work the only people on the housing list after the five years of this government will be new applicants.

#### Kildare County Council.

As a result of Emmet Stagg's promotion he automatically has to give up his seat on Kildare County Council. The Labour Party Branches in the Celbridge area have selected John McGinley as their nominee for this vacancy. We expect that long standing practice will be adhered to by Fianna Fail and Fine Gael Councillors and that John will be unanimously coopted to Kildare County Council.

Public Toilet Building (The Thing).

At long last it is going. Compulsory purchase orders appeared in the Leinster Leader on Christmas Eve for both the Toilets and the E.S.B. Sub-Station. The thing will be demolished to make way for the re-alignment of Straffan Road with the main street.

The work is likely to begin next autumn. Detailed plans for the landscaping of the new square have not yet been finalised and when they are we will make you aware of them.

All of those involved in the long campaign to have this eye sore removed deserve our congratulations. Particular thanks must be given to Hannah Flood, The Community Council and our own John McGinley for their perserverence.

#### DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

#### Bond Bridge

In response to representations made by Meadowbrook Residents Association, Councillor Catherine Murphy has been in touch with Mr. John Carrick, County Engineer, in relation to the County Council's plans to improve Bond Bridge. In his reply, Mr. Carrick stated that the County Council had submitted proposals for widening the bridge to the Department of the Environment some three years ago, but that funding for the project has yet to be approved.

In the meantime, the County Council has been collecting development levies from recent housing developments in the Newtown area in order to cover the Council's portion of the cost of upgrading Bond Bridge. Some of this money has been spent on preparatory work for a reinforcing wall, in conjunction with an existing housing project adjacent to the bridge in question.

Councillor Murphy has since written directly to the Department of the Environment seeking further clarification of the status of the bridge widening proposal, and is awaiting a reply. Maynooth Post Primary School

Councillor Catherine Murphy has recently received replies from the Chief Executive Officer of County Kildare VEC and from the County Development Officer concerning the badly needed extension to Maynooth Post Primary School. The school has been seeking an extension for many years, but a

recent offer from the Department of Education to provide £45,000 towards additional accommodation has been rejected as totally inadequate.

At its December meeting, the VEC agreed to request the Minister for Education or a senior official of the department to meet the CEO, a delegation from the VEC, and the Principal of Maynooth Post Primary School with a view to progressing the project. A reply has yet to be received at the time of writing. Meanwhile, Councillor Murphy has written to the Department of Education seeking to establish where the Maynooth school is placed on the department's priority list.

Arising from this issue, Councillor Murphy has put down a proposal for the next meeting of Kildare County Council seeking a general report from the Department of Education on all schools in the county (both primary and post-primary) which have submitted funding proposals to the department. This report should include when these proposals were originally submitted, where each school is currently placed on the department's priority list, and the expected completion date of each proposal.

Schools in areas of rapid population growth are very badly catered for in this country. There seems to be no overall plan to provide priority funding in these cases, and it is commonly perceived that schools can jump to the top of the list if they are strategically located from the political point of view, or if they create enough noise. It may be that the people of Maynooth have been too polite in their approach to this pressing and urgent problem, and that the time is approaching for more radical action.

#### Local Government Reform

Councillor Catherine Murphy has proposed to Kildare County Council that the council support the extension of the lower tier of local government within the county. It is ridiculous that towns the size of Maynooth and Celbridge should have no local authorities of their own. If Maynooth had its own urban council, it would have more control over its own development, and a much stronger voice in its dealing with the County Council and government departments.

The now traditional New Year's Day game went ahead as usual this year (not withstanding the effects of the night before) with

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

#### Editorial

#### MULLAGHMORE MAYNOOTH CASTLE AND ALL THAT...

At the time of writing the national newspapers are full of the Mullaghmore controversy. The Co. Clare community has been split with a majority appearing to favour the building of an interpretative centre at Mullaghmore mountain but a vociferous minority arguing that such a development would ruin the unique character of the area.

#### Flashpoint

The Mullaghmore debate is merely the most public flashpoint in what is a widespread battle between the Office of Public Works and the supporters of interpretative centres on the one hand and a collection of local community and protest groups on the other who claim that the planned centres are intrusive. Protesters in the Slane area in Co. Meath, for example, have also taken up arms against the OPW's plans to build a centre close to the megalithic sites in the Boyne Valley. The recent High Court ruling which states that the OPW should be subject to the same planning process as any private individual has cast the whole debate in a new light. Work on interpretative centres all over the country has been called to a halt. The protesters are claiming a victory for local democracy. The supporters of the centres are crying foul and pointing to the hundreds of redundancies that are threatened.

#### **Ambitious Plans**


What, you might well ask, has all of this to do with the haven of peace and tranquility we call Maynooth? Well, according to all reports the Maynooth Castle Committee are formulating ambitious plans to develop the Castle. No specific plans appear to have seen the light of day but with the promise of EC funding, it is anticipated that big changes are in the pipeline for one of Maynooth's most famous landmarks. A one day conference on the castle took place in the College back in January where a representative of the OPW discussed the future of the castle with interested groups and individuals. A common thread running through the various schemes being discussed is the fact that the castle is likely to be transformed from its present semi-ruined state into a roofed building capable of being used for a range of activities. The precise extent to which the castle is still likely to look like 'the castle' is still unclear at this stage.

#### **Public Apathy**

A notable feature of the conference held in Maynooth College was the absence of people from Maynooth. Subsequent press reports of the conference suggested that consultation with the local community was high on the agenda of those interested in developing the castle. Well, it takes two sides to consult and it is now incumbent on the Castle Committee and the people of Maynooth to let their plans and views be known. Perhaps the Castle Committee might consider holding a public meeting under the auspices of the Community Council. And perhaps you, the public of Maynooth might consider turning up. After all, it's your castle!

#### Dear Editor,

"We, the undersigned, as students of Maynooth College, declare to continue to give our full co-operation with both local citizens and the Gardai in abiding by the law and to respect the community as a whole. We are disappointed by the fact that we should lose out because of the actions of certain groups which in no way represent the student body."

The students of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, have, in the past few months, received a lot of bad publicity in relation to late-night disturbances which involved drunken disorderliness, vandalism, etc. Due to the bad name that the students have got, our students union bar is now in danger of being shut down, as it was after the various S.U. functions that the majority of disturbances have occurred. The S.U. bar is really the only place where students, and students only, can meet and socialise. It is also a great entertainment provider and of course the bar is a valuable source of income for those students employed there. As well as the bar being in jeopardy, the troubles which occurred have led to, more importantly, discrimination against the students. As harsh a term as it is, there have been dozens of cases of discrimination against students, arising out of the bad feeling between local citizens and the students because of the disturbances. There is also the matter that it is not only students who cause trouble. There have also been cases where local youths have caused trouble knowing the blame would be put on the students.

The purpose of this petition is to let the authorities and the residents of the town of Maynooth, know that it is clearly a minority who are trouble-makers and we are frustrated that we are all tarred with the same brush and all suffer the consequences.

In total, 1,659 students signed the petition, more than did vote in the U.S.I. referendum, such was the support behind it and the strong feeling about the issue. On the first day of the campaign, Wednesday, 4 February, it worked out at an impressive 137 names per minute. There would undoubtedly have been more names signed had the campaign continued but there is a sense of urgency about the whole matter, as we feel that it must be brought to the attention of everyone.

It is a petition of goodwill and co-operation and we hope it will be taken seriously and above all, we hope that the situation will improve for everyone's benefit.

I am in no way connected with the Students' Union executive committee or general assembly and there is no financial or political gain involved in this for me. I took it upon myself to draw up the petition because it is an important issue which I feel strongly about and which I feel people must be made aware of.

Where are their voices on such issues, oh please forgive my ignorance, they are too busy


#### MAYNOOTH TIDY TOWNS COMMITTEE


We thank those businesses who have supported us in our special collection.

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# MOTHER'S DAY

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#### CITIZEN'S INFORMATION CENTRE

#### Information For Regular Part-Time Workers

Question: How much PRSI will I pay?

Answer: If you earn less than £60 per week you are exempt from your contribution. Your employer still has to pay the employer's portion. If you earn over £60 per week you pay 7.75% of your earnings each week. People with medical cards pay 5.5% since they are exempt from the Health and Training Levies.

Question: Would I get the full rate of social welfare if I was claiming as a Regular Part-Time Worker?

Answer: From January 1993 the Amount of Unemployment Benefit and Disability Benefit you get will be income related. This currently applies to Maternity Benefit. It is not clear yet what will happen to long term payments.

Question: If I just became insured at Class A for the first time this year, how soon would I be covered for Unemployment Benefit, Disability Benefit and Dental Treatment?

Answer: If you first started paying the full rate (Class A) PRSI in this year you could qualify for UB or DB once you have 39 "paid" PRSI contributions. This is because as a first time Class A contributor you would get 2 years back-dated PRSI "credits". If you are over 25 years, you would need 5 years paid contributions to get Dental, Optical or Aural Benefit. If you had Class A contributions in the past you will have got these "preentry credits" already and it could take up to 2 years or so before you become eligible. You should check out your individual case.

Question: Are there any Part-time Workers who don't come under the Act?

Answer: Civil and public servants who pay social insurance in their main jobs at classes B,C,D or H and who have part-time jobs will still pay Class J even if they earn over £25 per week. But people such as Home Helps, Meter Readers and others whose work used to be classified as "subsidiary" come under the new regulations.

Question: Where can I get further information on the Regular Part-Time Workers regulations if I need it?

Question: Where can I get further information on social welfare entitlements?

Answer: At you local social welfare office or from the Information Service, Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1. Tel. 01-748444 and at your local Citizens Information Centre. The Department of Social Welfare leaflet SW57 is a useful PRSI guide for part-time workers.

Question: Can I do anything if my employer won't insure me under the new Act?

Answer: You should get in touch with the PRSI Section at the Department of Social Welfare, Gandon House, Dublin 1. Tel. 01-786444.

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
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#### MAYNOOTH POST PRIMARY SCHOOL

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
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
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#### **CHURCH OF IRELAND NOTES**

#### **Pilgrimage To The Holy Land**

A party of thirty seven pilgrims, including our Bishop, gathered at Dublin Airport en route to the Holy Land for the experience of a life time. It more than lived up to our expectations, to be able to walk in the footsteps of our Lord and see the places so familiar to Him was a privilege never to be forgotten. We visited Bethlehem and stood in the shepherd's fields and in the church of the Nativity in Manger Square and also visited Nazareth where we held a Communion Service and had lunch in the Rectory. We went on a tour of Jerusalem with its markets and bazaars, walked the Stations of the Cross and saw where Pontius Pilate passed sentence on Jesus and visited the temple area and the beautiful El Aksa Mosque and the Dome of the Rock, with their beautiful Persian carpets. We went to the Wailing Wall, which was divided into male and female sections and placed our written petitions in the cracks. We also visited Emmaus and the Ein Karen where Mary visited Elizabeth and where John the Baptist was born, saw the tomb of Lazarus and sang hymns in the room of the Last Supper. We visited Herod's fortress in Masada by cable car which gave us a magnificent view of the wilderness and the Dead Sea, which we visited next and relaxed and floated in! We went on to Tiberias, visiting Jericho on the way and sampling the fruit at a desert oasis. At Cana some of the pilgrims renewed their marriage vows. We crossed the Sea of Galilee by boat and visited the Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus preached the Sermon on the Mount and celebrated the Sacrament of the Holy Communion in these beautiful surroundings.

Another day we drove up to the Golan Heights and visited a Druze village, our driver being a Druze took us to meet his wife and children. Also from these we could see the Syrian outpost and not far away the Lebanon, but we didn't come across any trouble. 
Also thank you to Bernard Durkan who at short notice stood in for Patsy Lawlor and opened the event. It raised £1,512, thank you all.





#### I.S.P.C.C. CYCLING FOR CHARITY

Out comes the Deep Heat, Mars Bars, glucose sweets and muscled legs as the weekend begins. The voices are trained to shout, a chorus of bucket shakers, microphones, pennies and pounds all add to the pandemonium. A free weekend in Galway - who can refuse? For the fitness freaks it's a challenge. for the un-fit a dream come true.

Arrival in Eyre Square Galway, a garda escort laps of honour makes the Tour De France's look farcial. Celebrations begin and the money jingles in the buckets as the collectors cheer the cyclists and appeal for even more money. "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy" - there are no dull people accepted in Galway that weekend.

The charity cycle organized by the Young Christian Students (YCS) is the largest fundraising event in the College. Amounts of up to £6,000 have been raised on previous years for various charities. This year a target of £10,000 has been set which, it is hoped, will help Childline to continue in its work for the coming years.

The event takes place on the weekend 12-14 March. Leaving at first light on Friday the cycle will travel via Maynooth Mullingar, Tullamore, Athlone, Athenry, Tuam, Gort, Ballinasloe and Galway, and will return on Sunday after a marathon 250 miles.

This year there will be 10 cyclists both male and female and up to 50 collectors, drivers, maintenance crew etc participating in this great event. If you happen to be 'bumped' into by those enthusiastic people collecting for this great event, please be generous. Childline needs your help, to help those little ones. A publicity day was held in Maynooth College on the 16th February to get this years event off the ground.

Students of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth are, for the sixth year in succession, cycling the 250 mile route from Dublin to Galway and back in aid of the I.S.P.C.C.'s Childline.

Childline received 35,241 calls last year alone. Already this year over a thousand calls have been received every week. The calls come from every part of the country.

This service will cost the I.S.P.C.C. in excess of £150,000 to run this year. The telephone bill alone will be of the order of £60,000! Despite the huge expense this essential service will receive no government funding.

The Maynooth Cycle has raised amounts of up to £6,000 in previous years for various charities. This year a target of £10,000 has been set which, it is hoped, will help Childline to continue in it's work for the coming year.

Over 60 students are involved in all and they will be cycling or collecting in towns throughout the Midlands, Dublin and Galway.

Mr. Bernard Durkan took time out of their busy schedules to say hello. We had The Director of National Monuments, Mr. Noel Lynch and senior architect, Mr. Paul McMahon representing the Office of Public Works. There was a very good attendance from County Kildare reflecting the importance of Maynooth Castle at a regional level. Several members of the Kildare Historical Monuments committee attended. These included Col. Con Costello, Mr. N. Meagher, Ms. Lena Boylan, Mr. K. O'Brien. Mr. Sean Byrne, Kildare County Council and Secretary of Kildare Tourism also attended.


The Seminar subtitled "A Plan for the Future" was held to discuss the future of Maynooth Castle. The line up of speakers covered a broad ranging number of subjects.

Msgr. M. Ledwith, President of Maynooth College and Chairperson of the Castle Committee, welcomed everybody. The Seminar provided a welcome opportunity for all interested groups to discuss their views. The morning session began with Ms. Mary Cullen, Department of Modern History, Maynooth College who gave the historic background of the Geraldines and their importance in Irish History.

Mr. Willie Cumming, architect with the Historical Properties Department, National Monuments, gave a very interesting illustrated talk on the medieval castle in Ireland. The senior archaeologist with the Office of Public Works, Mr. Con Manning, also had very interesting slides on archaeological excavations carried out on other sites in Ireland. Following a break for refreshments Mr. David Newman Johnston, Heritage International Ireland, gave a illustrated lecture on the restoration of historical buildings. This was followed by a stimulating question and answer session. Following lunch Ms. Joan Howard-Williams took the delegates on a guided tour of the castle. The first speaker in the afternoon Mr. Mat Mc Nulty, Bord Failte, stressed the importance of Maynooth Castle from a tourist point of view. He suggested that the Committee might consider using Maynooth Castle as a venue for medieval banquets. There followed a lively question and answer session. An alternative way of restoring a castle was described for us by Mr. Pearson. Six years ago Peter Pearson became aware that Drimnagh Castle was in danger of being demolished. Today he has a restored castle open to the public and being used every day for educational purposes. He told of the varying processes he went through in order to get to the stage he is at now.

The panel under the chairmanship of Msgr. Ledwith, comprised of Prof. V. Comerford, Mr. W. Cumming, Mr. Peter Pearson, Ms. Mary Cullen, Mr. D. Newman Johnston and Mr. Fergus Hogan. Mr. Fergus Hogan is an architect with the School of Architecture, Bolton Street College with a specialisation in town planning. There followed a very lively and interesting discussion with many questions being asked. Unfortunately time was all too short and many questions were left unasked!!!

In closing the seminar Msgr. Ledwith thanked everyone for their attendance and interest. He said how necessary and useful the Seminar had been to the Committee in preparing a successful continued





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
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

That's all until next month, so go dtí sin, lá fhéile Phádraigh agaibh agus tog go bog é.



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#### **DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE**

#### TOMATO AND LENTIL SOUP

1 tbsp (15 ml) oil 1 large onion, finely chopped  $2 \times 14$  oz. (400 g) cans tomatoes 4 oz (100 g) red split lentils, rinsed 3/4 pt (400 ml) vegetable stock Salt and black pepper A few fresh basil leaves or 1 tsp (5 ml) dried basil To parnish: 2 tbsp (30 ml) double cream or thick, Greek-style yogurt Basil leaves (optional)

1. Heat oil in a large pan and fry onion over a low heat until softened.

2. Add tomatoes and break them up with a wooden spoon. 3. Add lentils and stir in stock. Season to taste, bring to the boil, cover and simmer gently for 30 minutes or until lentils are soft.

4. Remove from heat, tear basil leaves into small pieces and add. Add dried basil, if using.

5. Liquidise soup until smooth. Return to pan and reheat. 6. Serve garnished with a swirl of cream or thick yogurt and fresh basil leaves, if available,

7. Accompany with wholemeal French bread.

#### CHICKEN HOT POT

4 chicken quarters 2lb (900 g) potatoes Salt and black pepper 2 sprigs of fresh thyme 2 sprigs of fresh rosemary 2 bay leaves 1 large onion, finely chopped 7 oz (200 g) carrots, sliced 7 oz (200 g) smoked streaky bacon. derinded and chopped 1/2 pt (300 ml) stout 2 tbsp (30 ml) melted butter

1. Set oven 325°F, 170°C (Mark 3).

2. Skin the chicken quarters, if preferred. Peel and cut the potatoes into 1/4 in (0.5 cm) slices.

3. Arrange a layer of potatoes in the bottom of a wide casserole. Season well, then add the herbs.

4. Top with the chicken guarters and scatter over the diced bacon, onion and carrots.

5. Season and arrange remaining potatoes on top, overlapping slightly.

6. Pour over stout, brush potatoes with melted butter and cover with a lid.

7. Bake for about 2 hours, uncovering for the last 30 minutes to allow the potatoes to brown.

8. Serve hot with seasonal vegetables.

Don't forget to remove the bay leaves before serving.

#### POTATO, BACON AND ONION CASSEROLE 5-6 large potatoes, half-cooked 2-3 onions 1/2-1 lb. (225-450g) bacon or ham slices 1 oz. (25g) margarine 1 oz. (25g) flour pt (1/2 L) milk A little mustard, if you like it

1. Soak very salty bacon for a few hours before commencing to cook.

2. Remove the fat from the bacon. Rinse and slice it thinly. 3. Put it in cold water, bring to the boil and simmer for five minutes. Remove from the heat, and pour away the water. 4. Melt the margarine, mix in the flour slowly and stir over a low heat from 2-3 minutes. Do notbrown.

5. Remove from the heat, and stir in the milk, a little at a time, beating well to remove lumps. Continue beating until the mixture becomes smooth. Then pour in the rest of the milk.

6. Stir this sauce until it boils, and then leave it on a very low heat.

7. Add the mustard.

Some grated cheese

8. Chop the onions, and add them to the sauce. Leave them to simmer.

9. Peel and slice the potatoes.

10. In a greased casserole, put a layer of potato slices, then a layer of sliced bacon, then some of the cooked onion and a little pepper. Repeat this, finishing with the potatoes on top. 11. Pour on the sauce, and shake it down.

12. Sprinkle the grated cheese on top.

13. Bake at  $205^{\circ}$ C (400°F or gas mark 5-6) for about 1 hour, until nicely browned. Serve with turnip, cabbage or sprouts.

Note: Do not add salt to this dish unless the bacon is very mild.



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

#### **GARDA TALK**

Advice to Applicants for passports;

It's that time of year again when you are leafing through the holiday brochures and planning the annual vacation, which is well deserved.

Updating or acquiring a new passport may be necessary. If so attend to the matter early. Here is some timely advice to facilitate the smooth processing of your application.

1. Your passport will be your badge of identity, especially when travelling abroad.

2. In making your application your identity must be officially established and certified by a Garda.

3. You must sign the application in the presence of a Garda, who will certify the form and the accompanying photographs. 4. If you are not known to the certifying Garda, your co-

operation will be required in establishing your identity when presenting your application form.

5. It will avoid delay and needless enquiry if you present your Application Form at the Garda Station where you are known or where your identity can be readily confirmed.

6. For this latter reason you can present your application form at a Garda Station serving the area where you reside or where you formerly worked or indeed any Garda Station.

7. If you must attend at a Garda Station where you are not known, you must be identified by a reputable person. 8. Your Irish passport is a very special document, entitling you

to international travel. Please guard it with care.

#### DRUGS

A lot of concerned Parents often ask questions: How do we know if our children are abusing drugs? What are the signs etc? To answer all these questions the Gardaí are organising an informative talk with members of the drug squad within the next few months.

Principals of Primary and Post Primary schools will circulate to parents the dates and times of venues.





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#### **GARDENING HINTS**

If you are planting a hedge you need not be stuck with the usual privet or laurel as there are a lot more varieties to choose from. Fuchsia magellanica and other hardy varieties are a good choice for a small garden. Fuchsia magellanica blooms all Summer, it grows to about 5ft in three years. The dead stems should be cut out in spring. A thorny barberry like berberis x stenophylla is a good deterrent against dogs, and birds will enjoy nesting in its branches. It has dark evergreen leaves with clusters of yellow flowers from April. In five years it should grow to about five feet. It should be pruned after flowering. Escallonias are a good choice if you are by the sea, but are equally as good inland. From early to late Summer you can expect masses of small pink flowers. Escallonias also reaches five foot in five years and should be pruned after flowering. Variegated 'Golden King' is cheerful all year with bright red berries if you don't clip too hard. It should be pruned in late summer. It takes seven years to reach 5ft. If you would like an informal hedge that needs little or no pruning rosa rugosa 'scabrosa' is a good choice. It has rose-magenta flowers and red hips, with deciduous leaves. It takes about three to four years to reach 5ft. Pyracantha or firethorn has evergreen leaves, thorns, white blossom flowering in June and yellow berries autumn. Pyracantha rogersiana 'Flava' has yellow fruits.

If you are buying your plants from a garden centre "bare root" plants are generally a cheaper buy than container grown plants. Small plants are cheaper and usually grow faster than larger plants. As soon as the plants arrive, get them planted. Clear the soil from weeds and a taut line can be used to mark the position of the hedge. Or for the less fussy people dig a hole for each plant, deep enough and wide enough to take the roots when they are spread out. Work a bit of compost, well-rotted manure or peat into the soil working it all around the roots of the plants, firming it down well.

Thorny hedges will be dog-proof once they are established, but if you want to protect them from the start invest in some posts and wire netting. A mulch may be handy to keep the soil moist during any dry spells but also be on the look out with the hosepipe. Hedges should be pruned after planting. Vigorous varieties such as hawthorn, tamarisk, snowberry, blackthorn and privet should be cut down to 6in. This will help to form a dense hedge clothed with stems to ground level. May and August are the best times for routine clipping.

I hope this will be of help to you if you're deciding what type of hedge to plant. That's all this month folks from,

#### **MEETING OF STUDENTS AND RESIDENTS**

Following media reports of student vandalism in Parson Street the Students Union decided to call a meeting of Residents Associations and Students. This meeting took place in the Arts Block on Monday 18th. January. Over 100 people attended; unfortunately only five Residents Associations turned up. The meeting was chaired by Norah McDermott and it lasted 11/2hours. A very positive approach was adopted by both Residents' Associations, students and Community Council Representatives. The vandalism complained of, ranged from noise vandalism (late parties, shouting at night) to damage to property (trees, park seats, refuse bins). The unwillingness of students to vacate the centre of the road in Leinster Street to allow the Fire Brigade, Ambulance and cars to use it was also mentioned. Students, while recognising that some of their members got out of hand at times, stated that they contributed a lot to the area - shops, pubs, landladies, landlords and employment creation in the college itself. Residents stated that the problems mainly arise from first years having little appreciation for the town of Maynooth and from having too much freedom.

The following solutions were proposed: 1) Full time, 24 hour, Garda Station is required in Maynooth. 2) Students should be invited to nominate representatives to Residents Association Committees. 3) The College Authorities should explain to 1st years, on day one, that they are now living in a small settled Community and that they are expected to behave the way they would do at home. 4) Parson Street Residents are setting up a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

It was agreed that the Students Union would call a monthly meeting, where Residents Association Representatives would attend and that jointly they could work out solutions to problems.

#### Leixlip House Hotel

Leixlip House Hotel is a beautiful old world country style house on the Captain's Hill in Leixlip. It was built circa 1772 by Captain William Brady on what was then called Priest's Lane. Captain Michael Carvill bought the house in 1966 and was responsible for the erection of the ornamental gates and railings which were brought from the Frenchpark Estate in Frenchpark, County Roscommon. In July 1985 the house was destroyed by fire but it has been restored to its former glory. It is tastefully decorated in a style complimenting the house. The hotel has a relaxed elegance with a reasonably priced restaurant, bar and lounge. There is also a large conference room and boardroom which can be hired on request. Leixlip House Hotel is an ideal location for Weddings, Anniversaries, 21st. Birthdays, Confirmations and Communions.

In answer to a lot of enquiries about the presence of so many E.S.B. vans at the top of the town, the E.S.B. office regrets any inconvenience to the people of Maynooth but they believe that any temporary disturbance is more than outweighed by the long-term benefits of improved supply - especially to the residents of the Dunboyne Road and surrounding areas. Because the quality of the present supply is below standard the E.S.B. will not only improve it but also leave enough spare capacity to fill the future needs of the town. Their spokesman



said that they would site the new sub-station as inconspicuously as possible - following the E.S.B.'s policy of care for the environment - and all cable work would go underground so that it will not interfere with any future plans for the resurfacing of the pavements in Maynooth. They are still awaiting word on the possible re-siting of the present sub-station in the square.

"The Shop" will provide training to the level of City & Guilds Retail Certificate 6760 and will draw trainees from Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge, Kilcock, Dunboyne and other surrounding areas.

While Rehab provide Retail Training in other parts of Ireland, the Maynooth shop is the first in the country to have a High Street setting.

#### AN ALTERNATIVE VIEW

I heard a story once about an experiment, carried out at an American University with a group of kittens who, from the day they were born were placed in a white room with black horizontal stripes on the wall. For six months they grew up in an environment of horizontal black and white stripes, at the end of which they were taken out and let loose in a room full of ordinary household furniture.

Once out, they jumped around and played with balls of wool. toy mice and other objects as any young cat would do but then walked straight into the leg of the table. The same happened to the leg of the chair or any other vertical object placed in their paths.

This may seem like a strange experiment but the point is the kittens had grown up and developed in a horizontal world, not only were they not used to seeing upright objects but as far as their brains were concerned things like lamposts just did not exist

Whatever your views on using little kittens for such purposes, there is perhaps something of value for us all in this story. Just because we are not aware of something doesn't necessarily mean it isn't there.

The basic principle underlying "Alternative" medicine or a holistic approach to health is that there is a life force or energy in all living things and that the better this energy flows, the healthier that life will be. As human beings, our life energy flows on a physical, mental and spiritual level. Conventional medicine has made great strides in the past few hundred years in coming to terms with the physical aspects of our bodies but most of what happens to us on a mental or spiritual level just can't be seen under a microscope.

Medical drugs have their place but it is becoming increasingly apparent that if we are to survive the onslaught of modern ailments such as cancer, heart disease, depression and even AIDS a pill for every problem just will not suffice.

A more holistic approach involving meditation, diet and other complementary therapies is required.

To my mind the word "Genius" does not mean someone who is very smart and always gets the right answer. It comes from the same root as the word "Genesis" - to be born or to create. Like the kittens in the story because of our development we have only a limited vision of what is happening to ourselves and the world about us but each of us has the capacity to be a Genius - to let new ideas be born and thereby give us the answers we are looking for. To do this we must be prepared to look again, to look within and in silence.

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


Suddenly there was nothing, no running, no pushing, everything went quiet. Everyone stopped and looked up. There was a humming sound coming from the sky.



#### **Pensions Register**


Austin Currie T.D. sent the following question to the Minister for Social Welfare:

To ask the Minister for Social Welfare if his attention has been drawn to the fact that a number of people who formerly worked in the United Kingdom are entitled to pensions from pension schemes of which they are unaware because of a change of address or memory lapse or liquidation or take-over or some such factors, and that a register of Occupational and Personal Pension Schemes has been established in the United Kingdom which will assist such people to establish whether they have a pension entitlement; and if he will take steps to publicise this fact.

#### REPLY

Minister for Social Welfare (Dr. Woods): I am aware that a register of Occupational and Personal Pension Schemes has been established in the United Kingdom which will assist people to establish whether they have a pension entitlement. The Pensions Board, which was set up under the Pensions Act, 1990 will, through its registration system, be assisting members of Occupational Pension Schemes in Ireland who have changed jobs in the course of their career, to trace the schemes in which their benefits are preserved. This facility, which is continued

similar to that which operates in the UK, will be brought into operation this year. As there are Irish people living here who may be entitled to Occupational Pensions from the UK, I have requested the Board, when introducing their own facility, to publicise as extensively as possible the existence of the UK register. At the request of the Parents of Maynooth Post Primary School, Minister of State Emmet Stagg arranged for a Deputation of Parents and Teachers to meet Education Minister Niamh Breathnach on Thursday 11th February in Maynooth, to discus the extension to the School. The Minister has now agreed to increase the funding initially by £15,000 (i.e. from £45,000 to  $\pounds$ 60,000) and to review the matter further to see if additional funding can be provided. Deputy Emmet Stagg who was also at the meeting will continue to press the Minister on this matter. JOHN MC GINLEY

Local Branch Chairperson John Mc Ginley's co-option to Kildare County Council should be agreed at the next County Council Meeting on February 22nd. The Branch are confident that the long standing practice adopted at K.C.C. will be followed and that John will be unanimously co-opted. We will advise you further on this in next months issue.

#### SENATOR JACK WALL

Branch members are delighted with the news that Jack Wall received a nomination from the Taoiseach to the Senate. We are confident that Jack will use his skills and knowledge to make a major contribution to eliminating the many problems facing our Country. We wish Jack well.

#### THE AVENUE

Last years sewerage works and the present installation of a transformer and associated cables has led to the Avenue becoming an eyesore. Residents of Maynooth who for many years have used the Avenue as a pleasant walk are at present unable to use it. Emmet Stagg and John Mc Ginley have now taken up this matter with Kildare County Council, requesting that the Council immediately contact both the E.S.B. and the Sewerage Contractor to restore the Avenue. We will advise you further on this.

A request has also been placed with the Council to provide lighting similar to that in the Phoenix Park along the Avenue. STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

Vandalism by students continues unabated. £400 worth of damage was caused to a car in Parson Street recently. The culprits are known to the car owner so presumably the Gardai can take action. But what of all the other incidents where it was not possible to get the names of the students involved? Residents of Parson Street and the Lyreen Area continue to be victimised. A meeting of students and residents took place recently, which was organised by the Students Union. Two members of the College Authorities were present, apparently to listen as they contributed nothing to the discussion. It is

about time that the College Authorities took their responsibilities seriously and did something about this escalating problem in our community. In addition, the Students Union, whose primary concern at present seems to be the provision of better bar facilities, needs to recognise that a serious problem exists and to start listening to residents complaints.

The current situation again highlights the need for a fully manned 24 hour Garda Station in Maynooth and John Mc Ginley has asked Minister of State Emmet Stagg to contact the Minister for Justice on this matter.

#### NO ENTRY SIGNS MILL STREET JUNCTION WITH POUND LANE

We are pleased to note that the Council have finally replaced the No Entry Signs at this junction. We will continue to press the Council to have NO ENTRY painted across the road at this junction and at the Convent Lane entrance.

#### **RAMPS ALONG DOUBLE LANE/POUND LANE**

Deputy Emmet Stagg's request to have detailed costings provided for the provision of ramps along Double Land/Pound Lane have as yet been unanswered by the Council. He has now requested the County Engineer to provide same without any further delay. He is also having the matter checked out with the Department of the Environment as the original quotation from the Council of £30,000 for 3 ramps seems ludicrous.

OUTSTANDING WORKS IN MOYGLARE VILLAGE Following correspondence from Residents in Moyglare Village Deputy Emmet Stagg contacted the Council with a view to having the last 6 public lights in the Estate and outstanding matters dealt with by the Developer. The Council have advised that following an inspection of the Estate in late November Crewhill Properties were requested to carry out the outstanding works and the E.S.B. were informed to proceed with the Public Lights.

#### **MOYGLARE ROAD**

Minister of State Deputy Emmet Stagg has requested the County Engineer to indicate what improvements will be carried out along Moyglare Road this year. Further resurfacing, footpaths and additional Public Lighting are still required. The Council have Collected Development Levies for same and should organise for these improvements to be carried out as a matter of priority.

#### INTERLOCKING BRICKS FOR MAIN STREET FOOTPATHS

The Council yet again have failed to meet a request from Deputy Emmet Stagg and John Mc Ginley who had requested costings on the provision of interlocking Bricks on the Main Street Footpaths. A further request has now been issued. PUBLIC LIGHT PARSON STREET

Following representations from Deputy Emmet Stagg Kildare County Council have requested the E.S.B. to repair the public light outside number 9 Parson Street.

#### BOREEN

At the request of Maynooth Town Soccer Club Deputy Emmet Stagg, has requested that loose gravel be provided to the club to improve the surface along the Boreen. Deputy Stagg has also requested that resurfacing of the Boreen from the Dublin Road entrance to beyond the entrance to the Soccer Field be included in the works to be carried out under the 1993 Road Block Grants. **CRASH BARRIER DUBLIN ROAD** 



Thomas Bean from Maynooth Pitch & Putt sporting the winning trophy at the Patrick's Day Parade.








#### HARBOUR FIELD/GERALDINE HALL

#### **BAND BULLETIN**




#### MAYNOOTH POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### SCOUT NEWS




#### **CONFIRMATIONS IN MAYNOOTH**

At 11.00 a.m. on Thursday 18th February the very special ceremony of Confirmation took place in St. Mary's Church, Maynooth. His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, Desmond Connell confirmed the children of the parish in a church made even more welcoming with ribbons and flowers. He was assisted by the priests of the parish, Fr. Supple, Fr. Cogan and Fr. Boylan and the children's choir added greatly to the atmosphere with their rendition of the opening hymn "O Holy Spirit". The children for confirmation had been very well prepared by their teachers and families for the sacrament and looked very smart and attractive in their new outfits. The Sacrament of Confirmation

Brendan Grace in doing one of his "Bottler" sketches describes the visit of the Bishop for the Sacrament of Confirmation. He had been warned to behave himself in the Church and to make sure that he answered his question from the Bishop correctly. So his response to the bishop's question, "Who killed Jesus Christ?" was "It wasn't me".

There used to be great mystery and fear surrounding the visit of the Bishop to "confer" the Sacrament of Confirmation. Today however as with all the sacraments we see confirmation as a celebration of the faith of the local community. The roots of the sacrament go back to the early Church where adults were initiated into the Christian Community with Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation which took place at the Easter Vigil. The "Neophytes" or newly-baptised Christians then took a special place in the assembly during the Easter season as witnesses to the wider community of their commitment to Christ and his Church. As the faith spread throughout the Western world more and more adults were baptised and as time went by they brought their children to be baptised, so by the middle ages infant baptism was the norm and adult baptism was becoming more rare.

Because the Sacrament of Confirmation was originally part of the whole initiation ceremony, theologians have debated what Confirmation gives that Baptism does not. If Baptism is receiving the Holy Spirit, is Confirmation not doubling the whole process? In the Acts of the Apostles there is a reference to Christians in Samaria having been baptised still waiting to receive the Holy Spirit, (8: 16-17). So since the earliest times Confirmation has been seen as the gift of the Spirit to give us talents so that we can be fruitful members of the Community. Today we understand Confirmation as a strengthening of the gifts received in Baptism and when it takes place between the ages of 10 and 13, as in this country, it is an opportunity for the young person to make the act of individual commitment that was made for him or her at Baptism. It is also a time for parents or guardians to commit themselves once more, as they did at their child's baptism, to nurture and encourage the faith of their child. For us, the wider community, the celebration of the sacrament in our parish challenges us to look at our own commitment and hopefully encourages us to help our young Church to grow and bear fruit in our town.



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SPICY POTATO PATTIES - KIDS COOKERY Makes 8 Preparation: 30 minutes Cooking : 20 minutes 1 (lb) potatoes, boiled in their skins until very tender. 2 egg yolks. Salt and black pepper. 2.5ml (1/2 tsp) tumeric. 1 onion, finely chopped. 2 cloves of garlic, finely chopped. 1.25ml (1/4tsp) chilli powder. Oil for frying. 100g (4oz) frozen peas. Peel the potatoes and mash with the egg yolk, salt, pepper and tumeric until smooth. Then fry the onion, garlic and chilli in a little oil. When soft add peas and cook for 5-6 minutes. Add this mixture to the potatoes. With floured hands, shape into cakes about  $1 \text{ cm}(1/2^{"})$  thick. Heat the oil in a large frying pan and carefully add patties. Fry for 3 minutes on each side. **CARROT CAKE** 10 oz.self raising flour 6oz. brown sugar 2oz. chopped walnuts 1 teaspoon mixed spice 3 eggs 6oz. grated carrots 6oz. vegetable oil 2 mashed bananas Combine all above ingredients in bowl. Mix with wooden spoon until all ingredients are wet - do not overmix. Grease square cake tin, pour in ingredients. Bake in moderate oven at 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4 for 1 hour. When cooled, cover with frosting. Frosting 4oz. Philadelphia Cream Cheese 4oz. icing sugar 2oz.soft margarine or butter drop of vanilla essence Blend with electric mixer for 1 minute Cover cold cake with frosting

DHAL (INDIAN LENTIL CURRY)

Serves 4 2 medium sized onions 2 cloves of garlic 11/2 cups of red lentils 1 tbls. of curry powder (vary to taste) 2 tbls. of chutney 4 cups of water (or stock if available) 2 tbls. of creamed coconut (optional)

Saute chopped onions and crushed garlic until clear. Add other ingredients and bring to the boil. Simmer on low heat for about an hour or until Dhal is like a very thick soup. Add extra liquid if required. Continued



INDIAN RICE Serves 2

2 teaspoons cumin seeds (crushed) 2 cardamoms (crushed) 1" stick of cinnamon (whole) 6oz. rice 14 fluid oz. boiling water 1 dessertspoon oil

Heat the oil in a saucepan. Add crushed spices and cinnamon stick and stir for 1 minute. Add rice to crushed spices and stir for 1 minute. Add water and simmer for twenty minutes or until rice is dry and fluffy. Discard cinnamon stick and serve.



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

#### Underage Drinking

The provisions of the Intoxicating Licquor Act, 1988, specifically apply to underage drinking. Hereunder are a few important sections: 1. Sale, delivery or consumption of Intoxicating Liquor to any person under 18 years on a Licensed Premises is prohibited. (Publicans should take particular note). 2. Any person (older person) is prohibited from purchasing Intoxicating Liquor for consumption by a person under 18 years. 3. Any person under 18 years is prohibited from purchasing Intoxicating Liquor for consumption in a place other than a private residence. (This is aimed at curbing the practise of groups of young people assembling in fields and other public places and conducting open air parties). Without being patronising we would ask parents to talk to their children on this important subject, from a legal, medical and most of all a common sense point of view. There is no substitute for parental vigilance. Responsible attitudes to alcohol need to be fostered to avoid abuses of it. Irresponsibility creates serious sociological problems in the form of crime, vandalism and other patterns of deviant misbehaviour.

#### Introduction of Identity Cards

In co-operation with the Local Publicans it is intended to introduce an Identity Card Scheme in the Maynooth Area in the near future. Full details will be published in the May edition of the Newsletter.

#### **GARDENING HINTS**

April is here again and a bit of work in your garden now will pay off later on in the year, when you can sit back in the summer sunshine and enjoy the fruits of your labour. Below are a few hints to get you started in your garden.

· Support newly-planted garden-centre trees with short oblique stakes; fasten stake to trunk with an adjustable tie.

· Prune back to healthy wood shoots infected with coral spot fungus: burn prunings.

• Shear over heathers which have finished flowering.

· Sow seeds of Cytisus scoparius and genista in shallow drills in a nursery bed in fertilized soil.

• Plant evergreens, such as escallonia, laurel, holly, olearia. rhododendrons and • conifers.

• Refurbish poor lawns by applying a combined fertiliser, weed and moss killer.

• Mow twice weekly with blades set to leave utility swards 1 1/ 4 in. and luxury lawns 3/4 in. high.

• Spot-treat isolated lawn weeds with a trigger spray or dab on applicator.

• Cut edges regularly so that trimmings can be left to wither away.

• Renew electric mower cables if abraided or cut; install a residual current circuit breaker.

#### K.C.I. COMMUNITY RADIO

The Communication students of Kairos Communications Institute went on air at 5p.m. on Monday 15th March. Operating on 102.5FM the students offered 4 hours of alternative radio nightly until Sunday March 22nd. The transmitter located in the S.V.D. Hostel reached homes within a radius of 10 kilometres of the Moyglare Road. Outside of Maynooth the signal was clearly audible in Leixlip, Kilcock and Celbridge.

To provide a total of 28 hours of broadcasting the sixteen students were divided into teams to cover news, two magazine programmes and technical backup. In our five o'clock magazine programme Hit The Road, we aimed to both entertain and inform with a lively mix of music and features. A word of thanks to the Cameo Diathermy and Beauty Clinic, who sponsored our competition and to all who entered, both winners and losers. A documentary followed after the main news and some of the diverse subjects covered included Laughter, Dr. John Charles McQuaid, and the subject of Rape. 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#### MAYNOOTH MUSIC SOCIETY PRESENTS **ST JOHN'S PASSION**

The Music Society in St Patrick's College presented the Passion according to St John by J.S.Bach to a large audience which filled the magnificent chapel in the College, at its annual concert on 14th March.

According to the very helpful programme notes provided by Professor Gerard Gillen, this work was composed by Bach for the Good Friday liturgy of 1724 to be performed in St. Thomas' Church, Leipzig. The narrative of the Passion is from the 18th and 19th chapters of St John's Gospel, with passages from St Matthew, interspersed with reflective arias and chorales which would have been known to and probably sung by Bach's Leipzig congregation. The libretto appears to have been constructed by Bach himself. According to Professor Gillen, Bach's treatment of the material is masterly. He notes that some commentators argue that the St John Passion lacks the refinement of the more grandiosely conceived St Matthew Passion of 1727; however, the intensity of musical colouring in the recitative settings of Peter's lament and the scourging of Christ are far more vivid in the St. John Setting, and the arias and the opening and closing choruses of the work reveal Bach the supreme master in full maturity.

This was a very fine performance, splendidly directed by Professor Gillen with full orchestral accompaniment provided by the Dublin Baroque players. The main solo part in this performance is taken by the Evangelist, performed beautifully by tenor, Emmanuel Lawlor. He is a graduate of the college who is now a prolific performer and broadcaster, having worked throughout the musical spectrum with colleagues ranging from Harry Christophers to U2. By comparison with other works, the other soloists Deirdre Cooling-Nolan (Contralto), the basses, Aran Maree and Paul Brady, Maire O'Brien (Soprano) and tenor, Frank Dunne, had relatively little to do. Paul Brady, now a student in the college acquitted himself well, and looks to have a bright future. The choir, comprising students, members of staff, and residents of Maynooth, delivered some beautiful chorales, singing the words of the Jews, the Roman Soldiers, and the High Priests. A larger representation of male voices would have been welcome at times. From the list of choir members, it would appear that of the 142 members, there are only nine tenors, and eighteen basses. Are there any men out there who would be willing to lend their vocal chords to this magnificent choir?

The last performance of this work by the College Music Society was in 1984, conducted by the Reverend Noel Watson. The soloists in that performance were Ian Partridge, William Young, Irene Sandford, Aine Nic Gabhann, and Eric Hinds, and to show that inflation hasn't been too bad, the tickets for that performance cost £5, whereas it cost a reasonable £8 to listen to the most recent performance of this great work.


#### **POSITIVE DISCRIMINATION FOR WOMEN**

Don't get annoyed lads but FAS is actively seeking female apprentices to train in what were once seen as male-only preserves. They keep open more than 60 apprenticeships for women in such areas as plumbing, mechanics, panel-beating, carpentry and welding, but only 45 places were taken up this year. As their spokesperson Mary Beggan said - "Women seeking these apprenticeships are pushing an open door".

In the ultimate "Macho" area of panel-beating Pauline Hawkins of Ballyfermot was top appprentice of the year on a diploma course, whilst our own ex-Teamworker Jackie Tallon from Leixlip is presently studying Carpentry at the FAS Ballyfermot Training Centre. Jackie (19) had made a hobby of woodwork and now reckons she is as good on the job as any man and she stresses that skill rather than physical strength is the necessary criterion. These apprenticeships are of four-years' duration and FAS will contribute towards the cost of sponsorship by companies. We all wish Jackie and her fellow apprentices the best of luck in their chosen careers.

#### Re: RED BLACK WHITE (RBW)

As some of you will know, our son, Richard, has a facial birthmark and, having been advised that no satisfactory treatment was available in this country, we contacted Red Black White (RBW), a charitable association in the U.K. who arranged for him to have treatment, free of charge, in the Bromsgrove Hospital in Birmingham. We ran a benefit night, last August, to raise funds and, thanks to your help, and a donation of £100.00 from Crown/Berger Paints Ltd., we raised £1085.00 from which we were able to meet the cost of the initial return plane fares to Birmingham for Richard and myself and to make a donation of £500.00 to RBW.

The nature of the treatment, by the way, is to vaporize the underlying, rampant blood vessels by selectively bombarding them with a series of pulses of high-temperature, "Red Seeking" laser light. The resultant bruising fades, over a period of about eight to ten weeks, to reveal the degree to which the birthmark has diminished. By February, 1993, following two sessions of treatment, the intensity of Richard's birthmark had reduced to about 40% of its original shade. (It is more difficult to calculate the degree to which his confidence has improved but I think 1000% would be about right).

Statistics indicate that the number of birthmarked people in the Irish Republic is 35,000 while the number of people with facial birthmarks is 11,600. There are no statistics, however, to show the degree of hurt and anguish suffered by these unfortunate children who, daily, are exposed to discrimination, harassment, taunts and bullying, implicit as well as explicit, in schools and playgrounds. Moreover, there are no statistics indicating the cost, both to the exchequer and to the community, of the underachievement which is a characteristic of this condition. It has been suggested that the cost, to the exchequer, of each underachieving child, could be equal to the price of one laser machine.

Since I last wrote to you, I have been instrumental in setting up a committee to promote the interests of Birth Marked children. Our perception, based on experience, is that treatment in Ireland, when available, is not successful. We have set up, through RBW, an on-going arrangement whereby 20 Irish children are receiving free laser treatment in the Broomsgrove clinic.

It remains to be seen whether or not this clinic can offer superior treatment to that available in St. James's Hospital. Dublin. On RTE recently, on the Check-Up programme, we saw a film of Birth Marked children being given laser treatment in St. James's, followed by an interview with the consultant plastic surgeon, Mr. Matt McHugh. What we were not shown was any evidence of people having been cleared of their birth marks. Prior to this, on the 1st. of December 1992, I wrote (and faxed!) a letter to the Chief Executive of St. James's looking for information in respect of the laser treatment for birth marks in St. James's and asking, specifically, "what is the success rate?". To date, no reply has been forthcoming. On the basis of all of the above, it would seem reasonable to assume that no Irish patients are being cleared of birth marks at St. James's.

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We have now asked RBW to supply "before and after" photographs of some of their cleared patients and await these with interest. In the meantime, we have videotaped our group of children before their latest treatment and anticipate that, when the first of our children have been cleared of their birth marks. we will be able to demonstrate that our children are being cleared in Bromsgrove whilst, unfortunately, no similar evidence is emerging from St. James's. If St. James are not clearing birth marks then, either their machine is inadequate or else the department is incapable of utilising the machine properly. If the machine is inadequate, we will demand that it be replaced and will fund-raise towards the cost. If this demand is not met, there may be a case for demanding that our travel expenses be met by the Department of Health on the grounds that we are forced to travel to another E.C. country for treatment which is not available in our own country. If, on the other hand, the department is at fault, we must expose the situation and demand our rights. Therefore, no matter which way it pans out, ultimately, all birth marked children will benefit - our 20 are just the first lot.

Obviously, we can not justify fund-raising for a new machine before we know with absolute certainty that the machine we want is definitely better than the machine we have (in St. James's). Our fund-raising, therefore, must, in the meantime, be channelled towards helping RBW (who are the only people who appear to be actually clearing birth marks) and towards funding travel expenses for the on-going treatment of our children until they are cleared. If we can produce good results, we will be in a position to demonstrate the superiority of the machine in use at the Bromsgrove and to demand a similar machine for Ireland,

We can't keep going over to Birmingham with our hands hanging and expect RBW to keep giving from their own (fundraised) resources - not that they are reluctant to, but their funds are limited. Moreover, we can not expect Aer Lingus to continue to subsidise our air fares - especially as they are currently having their own difficulties. To date, this group have had two visits to the Bromsgrove clinic. We were able to arrange the first flights, free of charge, through Aer Lingus Commuter, but consider this: The return air fare to Birmingham is, normally, about 250.00 per person. We have a group of 20 children and about 5 adults. That's 25 people at 250.00 per head = 6,250 per trip. TRAVEL TO DATE, THEREFORE. WOULD NORMALLY HAVE COST 12,500. Treatment normally costs 2.00 per pulse. Our group of 20 children have had, on average, about 1,500 (pulses) each = 3,000 (pounds) each, or. 30,000 (pounds) per visit. TREATMENT TO DATE, THEREFORE, WOULD NORMALLY HAVE COST 60,000. Add TRAVEL @ 12,500 AND THE TOTAL WOULD BE 72,500. We have asked the parents of our group of children to try to raise 1,000 pounds per child treated, before our next trip, for travel and accommodation, the balance going to RBW. TAKING INTO ACCOUNT TREATMENT AND TRAVEL COSTS TO DATE - PLUS THE COST OF OUR NEXT VISIT, we feel it is a reasonable target. We owe it to RBW and to our children to raise as much as possible so that, next time (end of May, we think), we will be able to travel and to put something back into the RBW fund, to help them to keep up the good work. To this end, two of the group of parents (of Birth Marked children) have joined with me to arrange a benefit night (Dance and Cabaret), to be held in the Green Isle Hotel at 8 p.m. on

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


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

Hopes are high for this new Branch and the Committee is determined to ensure that it is relevant to the members and has ambitions that it should become the most dynamic Branch in **SIPTU**. This should be greatly assisted by the fact that Mike Jennings, of **SIPTU** Lucan Office is the Branch Secretary. Mike has served as Branch Official to the members in Maynooth College for a number of years while they were in the Kildare/ Leixlip Branch of **SIPTU**. Mike's selection as Branch Secretary for the A.C.T. Branch was unanimously welcomed by its members.

### The Unemployment Crisis -Where Stands Maynooth ?

The numbers of people out of work recently passed the 300,000 mark and for a few days the media was full of experts telling us all how terrible it was. Since then other issues have grabbed the news headlines - government scandals, the war in Bosnia, Albert in California. But for the 300,000 the crisis remains and there is no solution in sight.

So, where stands the Maynooth area in the midst of this crisis? An analysis of the returns for those on the Live Register since 1989 shows that unemployment in our area has increased by 48% since January 1989. This compares to an increase of 23% for the State as a whole. The stark message is that unemployment in the Maynooth area has been increasing at twice as fast as elsewhere in the country.



In the Maynooth area the numbers unemployed have increased from just over two thousand in 1989 to almost three thousand today. But one of the most dramatic aspects of the unemployment crisis in Maynooth is the 75% increase since 1989 in the number of women who are unemployed. Young women under the age of 25 have been most badly hit with a 119% increase in the numbers unemployed. Much of this increase reflects the fact that the safety valve of emigration has been closed off as Britain and the US have been hit by recession. We all know people who came home from Britain for Christmas and decided to stay at home because there was no point in going back. For many the best chance of a job is in London or Birmingham when the British economy begins to recover.

In our area we now have just under 3,000 people unemployed - that's the equivalent of three Digitals. We have a serious economic and social crisis on our doorstep and many feel it is not getting adequate attention from those who claim to be our leaders.



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#### A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO PATSY BYRNE

Patsy Byrne, who died so unexpectedly on Tuesday 16th February, first came to Maynooth over twenty-three years ago from Dublin after a stint in the R.A.F. He married a local girl Mona Dempsey and settled down happily to rear his family-Paul, Tony, Martin, Danny and Patricia and to pass on his love of sport to them. This love encompassed all sports- racing, football, soccer, snooker and no matter what game his children were involved in Patsy did his level best to be there with them. By the same token he took his family to as many matches- both home and away- as was humanly possible. Although a keen, all-round sportsman, the love of his life was soccer and the team he admired most was Liverpool, and clear in the minds of his friends is the first trip he took with the Under-16 soccer team to see Liverpool triumph over Spurs to win the League Cup at Liverpool in 1981-82. Ever since that match he went on every trip to visit many different clubs, and no matter what the result was or what kind the game played - good or bad, Patsy enjoyed the craic and made sure that everyone did as well. No child ever went short of a few bob on any trip whilst Patsy was around and he made sure that the teams got as many autographs and souvenirs as could be obtained from the players they went to see. But not only will Patsy be long remembered in Maynooth for his organisation of trips across Channel but most especially for his active involvement in the training of young players. The Under-14 Maynooth soccer team was his pride and joy, having brought them along for the previous two to three years to the top position they hold in the League today. Not alone did he give them formal training but he gave them his own love of good sportsmanship and pride in their game. Their tribute to Patsy is the spirit in which they play, and is reflected in the play of all the teams which he trained over the years, especially the 7 Aside Teams in the Summer Festival and at the other end of the age spectrum. Patsy himself got great enjoyment out of playing with the Maynooth Veterans team in his favourite defensive position.

Going to the Races was another feature of Patsy's busy life and typically where he went, the family went also. Fairyhouse was the preferred course but he could see no reason to neglect Punchestown and Leopardstown if there was a good meeting on. He played cards and snooker with the same enthusiasm and verve and was once heard to remark - after a particularly strenuous game of snooker in the Y.M.C.A. in England - " I took on the best in England - and won!" This innocent delight in his achievement was typical of him. Never, over all the years, was Patsy heard to raise his voice in anger where sport was concerned, he had the happy knack of being able to talk to anyone and could bring them to see his own point of view. He met the greats in soccer - Paul Mc Grath, Brian Kidd, Ray Kennedy and saw their teams in action. He was on first name terms with Jim Mc Gregor- Physio of Man. United who personally showed the Maynooth group all over Old Trafford. Two weeks after the Hillsborough disaster Patsy and the team were in England and they all signed the Book of Condolence. The mark of the high esteem in which Patsy was held was demonstrated by the presence at his funeral of Shay Weafer-Secretary of the Dublin branch of the Manchester United supporters club. He will be sorely missed by all the youth of Maynooth and by all with whom he came into contact. Perhaps one consolation to his family and wide circle of friends is the


knowledge that he was greatly loved by all the community and that as long as soccer is played in this town his name will always be remembered.

The Maynooth Town A.F.C. would now like to pay their tribute to a very special man:-



This team is now top of their League division and into the quarter final of the Cup and to prove victorious in either of these competions would be a fitting tribute in his memory.

He will be sadly missed by all at the Club and indeed by the whole community but our loss and sadness is minimal when compared to that of his wife Mona and family.

To his wife Mona, sons Paul, Tony, Martin, Danny and daughter Patricia we extend our deepest sympathy and also to his relatives.



#### A COMEDY OF ERRORS

Shakespeare as I'm sure Shakespeare could never have imagined or foreseen. A Comedy of Errors opened in March in the Abbey Theatre to applause and success.

Within the first half hour however, I was silently arguing with myself "What on earth was this play all about?, and "Why did I come?". Unfortunately, as I had never read or knew anything about the play, I was in the beginning somewhat at a loss as to the story. Initially I was convinced that I had come to see a "modern" play because the set was gaudy, psychedelic and "modern" looking. This confusion was increased when the first words were spoken, in "Shakespeare." This all helped to add intrigue and mystery to the plot, which is basically about two sets of twins, who get separated when babies, wherein one from each set end up together, and their lives go on oblivious to the other set until they meet their respective twins twenty years later. As the play progressed, and after my initial confusion, followed by a realisation that this was a Shakespeare play with Shakespearian characters, the play became very enjoyable and I began to enjoy the characters and script enormously.

This is a play with a difference, it starts off slowly but ends up at breakneck speed. The plot is clever and keeps your attention and the laughs coming, particularly in the send ups of country and western songs. As they (the sets of twins) meet their identicals in clever and well-timed situations, it is at this point the play is quite brilliantly performed (One set of twins were particularly noticeable in their energy and acrobatics onstage throughout the play). As I mentioned before there are a number of songs in the play. These songs burst forth in C & W style, much to the audience's amusement. This may seem inappropriate however the songs work well into the mood and structure of the play. Though some of Shakespeare's subtleties were I'm sure lost to myself and some of the audience, unfamiliar with the play, it didn't matter as the cast were great and obviously enjoyed themselves as they got to sing, clown around and generally act up to the hilt. So if you would love to see a play with a difference, out of the norm, then this is the play for you, and it is definitely Shakespeare as you have never seen it.

#### **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

#### **Question:**

I am married with 5 children and have just got a full-time job. My gross will be £235 p.w. Would I be entitled to Family Income Supplement (FIS)?

#### Answer:

Yes, as your income is below the FIS income limit for your size family you would be entitled to £3 per week (£15 from July '93) calculated as follows:

#### From July '93

Income limit for 5 child family	£240 per week	£260 per week
Your income	£235	£235
difference	£5	£25
60% of difference	£3	£15
With the small and a family	1 C 1.11	<b>^ ·</b>

Whilst the application form asks for details of your income over the previous 6 weeks you should apply as soon as you have worked for 1 week. If you do this, your claim will be dated from the following Thursday. It will be 6 weeks before you will get your payment as the Dept. will want to see the level of your wages over the 6 weeks but you will be paid the arrears back to the start date of your claim.

If, on the other hand, you wait for 6 weeks so that you can state the amount you have earned on the application form you will only be paid from the Thursday after your claim is received. So, you could lose out on 6 weeks payment if your job didn't last the year.

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# **Political Party Notes**

#### FINE GAEL NOTES

If we had a trade descriptions act in this country and if it were applied to political parties then the Labour Party would be in serious breach of it. Before the election last November Mr. Spring and his colleagues promoted themselves as the party of change. The electorate was assured that a vote for Labour was a vote for change. However, having voted for Labour in greater numbers than ever before what have they got? Albert Reynolds is still Taoiseach and not a rotation or oscillaton in sight. Brian Cowan, Marie Geoghegan-Quinn, David Andrews, Michael Woods, Joe Walshe, Michael Smith and Charlie McCreevy, he of the "dirty dozen", remain ensconced around the cabinet table. Not much change there. Labour have maintained that they are in favour of a more efficient and effective Dail yet they and their senior partners in Fianna Fail have combined to vote for adjournment after adjournment with the result that in the four months since the election the Dail has sat on only 21 days. They even took St. Patricks week off so that Ministers could fly hither and thither to attend parades and junkets across the world. To facilitate this international holiday they voted down a Fine Gael proposal that Dail committees continue to function that week. Labour have promoted themselves as the watchdogs of morals and ethics in public life, they even appointed a Minister of State, Eithne Fitzgerald, to look after this for them, yet on appointment to cabinet positions her colleagues have appointed a plethora of relatives and friends as drivers, secretaries and advisers. In addition to this there is the establishment of a Dept. of the Tanaiste at a cost of £800,000. This Depts principal if not sole function is to protect the Labour Party's interests by ensuring that Fianna fail abide by the terms of the programme for government. It will be helped in this task by the 15 Programme Manager or Umpires recruited at a cost of £607,500. So much for good value from government. On top of all this there is the about face on the "creation of a comprehensive free health system" featured in their election literature. Minister Howlins increase of up to 400% in outpatient charges and 331/3 % in in-patient charges is hardly compatible with that aspiration. And finally there is the Budget and its 1% income levy affecting incomes below the average industrial wage. So much for reduced taxation and the protection of the worker and less well off. If there has been any change since the election it is more apparent in Labour Party policy than in the government.

#### Maynooth Post Primary School.

Following a number of parliamentary questions from Bernard Durkan to the Minister for Education regarding Maynooth Post Primary the Minister has increased the Dept of Educations' offer of funding from Mr. Brennans' £45,000 to £60,000. This is totally inadequate in view of the projected cost of providing the facilities required viz. £175,000 - roughly equivalent to the cost of providing for 4 advisers or programme managers. Enrollment at the school will reach 690 in September. It was originally designed for 500. It is imperative therefore that the necessary funds be provided and that work commence on the new classrooms immediately.

#### **Open Spaces.**

Kildare Co, Council has adopted a motion proposed by Bernard Durkan for inclusion in the Draft Development Plan. The motion calls for the provision of more open spaces in future developments in the County.

#### **OGRA FIANNA FAIL KILDARE COISTE OIGE COMHAIRLE** DAILCEANTAIR

The Annual Ogra Fianna Fáil National Youth Conference took place at the Talbot Hotel in Wexford from Friday 26 - Sunday 28 February. Among the large attendance were counted Ministers, Junior Ministers and other public representatives including Kildare's Charlie Mc Creevy and Seán Power. The theme for this year's conference was 'Leading Change'.

The assembled delegates were addressed by Bertie Ahern T.D. on the subject of Budget '93, by Máire Geoghegan-Quinn T.D. on the Decriminalisation of Homosexuality, and by Tom Kitt T.D. on Overseas Development Aid. Morgan Rue of the Technical Support Group of British Nuclear Fuels presented a document titled "Sellafield - Is it safe?" Among other documents presented were those on Homelessness and the Irish Language.

On the evening of the Saturday during his first address to an Ogra Youth Conference An Taoiseach Albert Reynolds spoke of the importance of Ogra in politics now and over the coming years. The conference officially closed at 1.30 p.m. on the Sunday afternoon with an address by Hugh Byrne, T.D. for Wexford.


#### LABOUR PARTY NOTES

#### The Avenue:

Following representations by Cllr. John McGinley, the E.S.B. are presently landscaping the Avenue in the area damaged by their recent transformer and cable installation. **Improved Train Service:** 

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised that C.I.E. have new rolling stock ordered from Japan for the Maynooth line. These trains are due for delivery in 1994 and in appearance will look like the DART but the engines will be diesel. The service will be promoted by C.I.E. as DART and with the installation of a second line the frequency will be improved to one every 10 minutes at peak and one every half hour during the day. The Square/Link Road to Motorway:

A public enquiry on the design proposals for the above will be held on 20th April, 1993. If the plan is approved by the Minister, work will commence in October of this year. There will be only one exit/entrance to Main Street. This will have 3 lanes - 2 onto Main Street and 1 off Main Street. The road at Brady's Pub will be closed off and interlocking paving will be installed. The toilet building will be replaced with a fountain and pergola. There will be 4 central lamp standards with trees either side. The space between Brady's and the fountain will include seating with central art feature. The entrance to the new car park, in Coonans Field behind Lyreen House, will be from the Straffan Road. If you want further information on the proposals please contact Cllr. John McGinley.



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#### Blacklion Road:

At a recent Council meeting Cllr. John McGinley was assured by the County Engineer that the Blacklion Road at Carton Wall is high on the Council's priority list and that it will be fully upgraded in time for the opening of the motorway in 1994. **Council Housing:** 

The Council propose to build 6 new Council houses this year in Maynooth out of the County's allocation of 122 which has been advised to them by Minister of State Emmet Stagg. The houses will be built in Greenfields and this will finish the development there.

#### Water Pressure:

Arising from complaints from resident, Deputy Emmet Stagg has contacted the Council concerning the low water pressure in the Greenfield Lane area.

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# Muintir Má Nuad

Sister Aquinas, Principal of Presentation Convent School. Sr. Aquinas, a familiar figure to the townspeople of Maynooth since her arrival as a teacher in the convent in 1971, the year the new school opened, was born in Dublin. She received her education, appropriately enough, at the hands of the Presentation sisters in Dublin, before entering the Novitiate in Blackrock. From there she attended Carysfort College to complete her teachers training and on her successful completion of the course was sent to the Presentation Convent in Maynooth. Her first impression of Maynooth was of a quiet country village with very friendly people whilst the convent contained a busy community of fourteen sisters including the then principal of the school Sister Bernard. Sr. Aquinas has witnessed the reversal of both populations, Maynooth now being a thriving commuter town and the community of sisters becoming depleted over the 21 years of her residency here. Primary education in her opinion, has broadened over the last few years with its consequent greater demands placed on both children and teachers, but the importance of the role of religion in education has remained constant. In her own words "children have to find God, wherever he is for them," and she stresses the importance of the role of parents in a childs education "A child will follow what she is taught at home and the school can only do a certain amount because parents are the first educators." To this end a close co-operation between teachers and parents is fostered by the school and Sr. Aquinas comments that "Every school needs a good Parents' Association who will raise funds and we are fortunate to have such a one." The facilities offered by the school demonstrate this co-operation with its full curriculum, modern equipment, new tennis court, computers and the availability of the professional P.E. teacher who comes in every week to ensure the children's physical fitness. The school's excellent staff were much praised by their principal especially in the extra work they put in coming up to the big occasions in a child's life eg. Confirmation, First Communion. In these recessionary times Sr. Aquinas asks the parents of First Communicants not to over burden themselves in relation to cost but to concentrate instead on the spiritual meaning of the sacrament for their child. In her spare time Sr. Aquinas loves to indulge her passion for music - as is well known in the town - and craftwork. Walking is her favourite excercise and she hopes to continue exploring the countryside around Maynooth for many years to come. For those worried about the future involvement of the Presentation sisters in the girls primary school, with the convent building now sold, Sr. Aquinas is happy to confirm that they are building a new house in the field next to the school and they look forward to many more years contributing to the education of the youth of Maynooth.

#### Dear Editor,

#### Maynooth Castle Restoration.

I would like to respond, on behalf of the Castle Restoration Committee, to your recent editorials which have suggeted a lack of openness (sic) in the development of the Project. The present situation regarding the Castle is that ownership has been vested in the Office of Public Works and the OPW intends

to undertake a Restoration Project when resources are available. It is possible that a 'start' could be made in 1994. The nature of the Project will have a large bearing on the extent

of the resources sought; therefore the preparation of the brief is critical to the programme. The OPW have asked the Restoration Committee to give as much input as possible to the brief.

In the Maynooth area, every organisation and committee which has an interest in the Project, is represented on the Restoration Committee. Through these representatives the Committee is endeavouring to get a broad range of proposals assembled. This is not a speedy process and neither is it an easy matter for local committees to prepare detailed suggestions on matters of historical context, structural changes and tourism impact.

It is important that strong local pressures are maintained at all stages of the Project, initially to maximise the funding of resources, eventually to influence every aspect of design and operation of the finished scheme.

The Maynooth Castle Restoration Committee has mounted exhibitions, held public meetings, arranged a seminar and presented a public profile at local events for three years; we would prefer to maintain our consensus role for the present and hopefully all our publicity will be good publicity for the foreseeable future.



number of factors. These included various commercial, recreational and county development plans and the rapid increase in new buildings both domestic and commercial. It had become a source of concern to many involved in community activities that there appeared to be no co-ordination or liaison between the various bodies concerned. It was also obvious that the town has good potential for future tourist and commercial enterprise but it appeared that no effort was being made to develop this. At the same time the town's streetscape and general environment were deteriorating and piecemeal repairs and ad hoc development did not add to this.

It was against this background that the Planning and Development Committee was established by Maynooth Community Council. Its principal aim was to try to involve everyone in the planning process so that the community would have a large say in the future development of the town and that future planning would involve a co-ordinated approach with respect to commercial, amenity and infrastructural developments. To this end all organisations were invited to be represented on the committee. There was an excellent response and a working group selected to plan the work of the committee. Long, medium and short term plans were suggested and in the following months work on all three began and continues to be in progress.

The long term plan involves drawing up a detailed co-ordinated plan for the streetscape, and zoning of Maynooth, and the provision of Amenity and Green Areas. This will be presented to the people of Maynooth for their comments and then to

Kildare County Council for their consideration. Tony Bean and myself have begun this process. In the short term it was decided that a general tidying up of the environment was essential and to this end the present SES scheme was started. The work they have done is a testament to the effectiveness of a Committee such as ours. I cannot praise the workers highly enough and wish to pay a special tribute to Ann Cotter, their supervisor whose energy, vision and capacity to get things done have ensured that areas such as "The Pound," for long town eyesores, are now well on the way to becoming pleasant amenity areas of which we can be proud. Maynooth is fortunate in that we have been bequeathed a large recreational area - The Harbour Field and a building with good community potential - The Geraldine Hall.

For a number of practical reasons neither of these community assets have been used to their full potential in the last few years. It has been a major aim of this Committee to rectify this situation. With the full co-operation of the trustees and former managers arrangements are now being made to allow the M.C.C., on behalf of the Community to take over the management of both. It has been no mean achievement of this Committee that the conditions necessary to allow this to happen have now been set in train. We knew that this would not be an easy task and that it would take time. This is why it is part of our medium to long term plan. It is essential that the proper management and administrative arrangements be made for the Harbour Field and Geraldine Hall before the community commits itself to the major expenditure which will be required if the Hall is to become a proper amenity centre and the Harbour Field developed as a full sporting venue to be used by all the community.

It may appear to those "sitting on the sidelines" that our Committee has got little work done. Much of the work, however, is the kind of work that can't be seen. The endless phone calls, meetings and letters that go to ensure that contacts are made so that progress can take place. This first year of our Committee has been spent in laying the ground work for future progress. Misunderstandings have been cleared up, co-operation established between various bodies so that our town can be developed to our mutual satisfaction. Change and continuity are the essential ingredients of a healthy community. Those on either side of these opposing forces will, of necessity, come into conflict from time to time. It is, I believe, an essential function of this committee to ensure that such differences of opinion are aired and settled to everyone's satisfaction. Such a process may be time consuming and frustrating to those of us who like to see things "happen yesterday" but it is a process which will ensure, in the long run, that ongoing development takes place which will be beneficial to everyone in the community.

I mentioned the day to day behind the scene's work which often goes unnoticed. In this regard I would like to pay a special tribute to Fionan Hardiman, our treasurer. He was instrumental in setting up the SES scheme, and in ensuring its ongoing smooth financial running. It is a responsible and tedious task but Fionan performs it with dedication and efficiency. I feel honoured to have been chairperson of this committee and wish the incoming chairperson and the committee every success in continuing the work which has been begun. The next meeting of the Committee will take place on Thurs 6th May 8.00 p.m. in the Community Council Offices. Anyone who wants to do so is more than welcome to come along.

Our investigations seem to have shown that the high winter temperatures, combined with the low water levels caused by water extraction may be responsible for the large number of surviving kelts and their problem getting through the dam. This environmental success story can mainly be attributed to the sincere co-operation and commitment of all the bodies and individuals involved, a list far too long to include here, it will suffice to say that with dedicated individuals like these looking after our rivers the future of salmon fishing on the Liffey looks in the pink.

#### **ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP NOTES**

#### Steam train.

We start this month with a reminder that the steam train will. by popular demand, be running on the 23rd of May next. Tickets which will be on sale shortly, will be available at last years low prices : Adults £3.50, children £1.50, and a special student prices of £2.50. Intending passengers are advised to purchase their tickets in good time as advance orders are quite heavy.

#### Bereavement.

The Chairman and committee would like to express sincere sympathy to the family, relatives and friends of the late Edward (Ted) Galway who died recently while on holiday in Africa. Ted was very active in both the parent body and the Dublin Branch and will be sadly missed by all.

#### A brief history.

With the advent of the by-pass, Maynooth has witnessed a massive increase in population and building is still in progress in many parts of the town. In order to appraise our new residents of what this group is about, we include a brief history of the Royal Canal and an outline of the restoration work to date.

Construction of the Royal Canal began in 1790 and the major work was completed in 1817. It is understood that the decision to build a second canal resulted from a dispute among the directors of the Grand Canal. It is reputed that a director walked out of a meeting promising to build a rival canal. It is uncertain which director was involved but the main body of opinion suggests that it was John Binns after whom Binns Bridge is called. It is worth noting at this stage that all the bridges over the canal are called after directors, for example Pike's Bridge at Carton after William Pike. The original Royal Canal company went bust and this is not surprising when one looks at the reason why. The original route of the canal would have been roughly via Dunboyne and straight to Mullingar. However the Duke of Leinster who was a shareholder in the original company used his influence to have the canal diverted past his residence at Carton near Maynooth. This necessitated the construction of a huge aqueduct over the Ryewater River at Leixlip. The completion of this aqueduct cost at the time £28,230-18-5d which in present day terms would amount to about £3.1 million. This aqueduct carries the canal almost 100ft above the Ryewater River and has to be seen to be appreciated.

Passenger travel on the canal commenced in 1796 but only from Dublin to Kilcock. Commercial boats commenced in about 1800. In 1844 the Midland Great Western Railway purchased the Canal in its entirety and this was the beginning of the down turn in the Canal. A railway was built adjacent to the canal and although the canal was to lose business to the railway it continued to trade successfully for many years. Business began to dwindle in the 1900s with the advent of faster steam engines and the canal was finally closed to traffic in 1962 though very little traffic had been on it for some years before this.

In 1974 Dr. Ian Bath set up the Royal Canal Amenity group to spearhead the restoration of the canal. The local branch was set up in 1984 and work commenced. To date the harbour at Maynooth has been restored and rebuilt as have all the walls in the vicinity of the harbour. The island has been raised and the canal has been dredged by the Office of Public Works. The harbour at Pike's Bridge has also been refurbished and landscaped. All lock gates in the locality have been replaced. Seating has been provided in the vicinity of Maynooth Harbour which also boasts a fine slipway.

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#### STUDENT NEWS

#### New S.U. Officers Elected

The student body recently elected the two sabbatical officers who will serve The Students Union for 1993 - 94. Competition waskeen for both positions of President and Vice President, the verdict in doubt to the last minute. Four substantial candidates for President contributed to ensuring a tight count and indeed it was only after a marathon recount that the result became clear. The new President is Joe Donnelly, a first year student who surprised some pundits by topping the poll. He defeated Brian Gillen of 3rd Arts, who perhaps peaked too soon - having embarked on his campaign way before anyone else. Another 3rd year Mags Murphy, was beaten into third place but might have taken the position had she earned the extra handful to pass Gillen and earn a windfall of transfers due to being the only woman candidate. Outgoing sabbatical, Brian Haniffy, had a poor outing and was eliminated after the second count. Joe Donnelly will be remembered by Newsletter readers for being the man behind the collection of a petition expressing the students willingness to co-operate with locals and the Gárdai in ending vandalism. He was well placed to appeal to his own classmates in the massive 1st, year constituency and also got over 50% of the votes from the Clerics Ref. It was a help also to be backed by the outgoing President, Geraldine Delanev and SU heavyweights such as Mick Smith and John Flood. The winner of the Vice-Presidential race was Dennis Clohessy who did so in convincing style. His reputation as a hard working Chairman of the Co-operation North Society was an advantage. His wide appeal was illustrated by over 50% support from the Clerics Ref, despite his pro-choice and pro-USI stance. Although Seamie Martin, Maria Lynch and Judy McBreen polled creditably, Dennis was too far ahead to be caught by transfers. Joe Donnelly is a native of Newbridge, Co. Kildare and Dennis Clohessy, a 2nd Arts student, hails from Blessington, Co. Wicklow. They are sure to have the best wishes of the student body as they prepare for an arduous year.

#### Bar Controversy Continues

A matter of much controversy among the student body has been the status of the SU bar. It was made an issue during the recent USI referendum, when some spokespersons claimed an anonymous investor would provide a new student Social Centre if students voted "No". Students did vote "No", but considerable publicity, speculation and confrontation among various students has left the student body wondering as to what the future holds. Whilst everyone is agreed that a new bar is badly needed, it is not known whether it will come about - if at all - in the near future. Meanwhile the SU has voluntarily shut the bar, following the acceptance of the fact that problems in the town late at night are associated with the usage of the SU building - especially on nights of bar extensions. It is possible also that the standard of management of the events associated with the SU building may have been a problem. The bar extension scheduled for Tuesday April 6th was cancelled and switched to Ballymore Eustace. The SU kept the ticket costs at £3.50 but spent in the region of £2,000 to subsidise transport. by buses. As one might imagine, this turn of events have merely served to incite further intensive debate regarding the fundamental SU service.

#### Successful Women's Week

A very successful women's week was staged in the College during March, at the instigation of the SU's Women's Rights Committee. A substantial amount of money was collected for The Rape Crisis Centre, including the proceeds of several events in the SU building. The week got off to a rousing start on Monday March 22nd with a Mr. Maynooth competition. This was a beauty competition which basically turned the tables on men, the contestants strutting their stuff in self depreciating style. More serious events included informative debates of issues affecting women and altogether no one among the general student body was left unaware. The week was adjudged a success, surpassing all previous attempts at staging such an activity. The committee deserve a commendation for ensuring that the SU's constitutional objective in promoting awareness of Women's Rights was well carried out this year.

#### Massive Student Contribution To Childline


Máire Geoghegan Quinn, The Minister for Justice, recently visited the College to join with President Ledwith in congratulating and paying tribute to the organisers of the recent Childline cycle to Galway. Maynooth students were not found wanting as regards efforts to collect and contribute to the fundraising for such a needy and worthy cause. The forum, chaired by Diarmuid ó Dálaigh featured contributions from Cynthia Ní Mhurchú, Eamon ó Cuiv T.D. and Fiachra ó Céilleachair. Other events and fundraising activies helped to make it the best 'Seachtain na Gaeilge' in many years.

#### S.U. Opposes Social Welfare Bill

Although some leading S.U. Assembly members initially supported the idea, Maynooth S.U. has now joined the nationwide campaign against the introduction of workfare for students. Section 14 of the current Social Welfare Bill advocates the abolition of most Social Welfare Allowances for full-time students. Should these measures go ahead, they will cause considerable difficulties for most students who will stay in Ireland this summer who will experience difficulties finding suitable employment. It is of course proposed that students do as yet unspecified community work, such as childminding, caring for the handicapped and so on. The S.U. opposes this, principally because it recognises that most students would simply be unqualified to do this service. This issue is sure to become more of a concern as time goes on. The Maynooth Peace Group has been to the forefront in the College response to the recent revulsion showed at the I.R.A. bombings in Warrington. A Book of Condolences uniting students, staff, clergy, administration, visitors and builders was collected by the group in the week after the death of three year old Jonathan Ball. A minutes silence was observed in the canteen and all over the College on Friday March 26th. A banner from Maynooth Peace Group was displayed prominently at the massive rally in Dublin on the following Sunday. The chairperson of the Peace train organisation, Mr. Chris Hudson, visited the College to accept the book at a special presentation. He was invited to Warrington, along with the books his organisation collected around the country. At a moving reception in Stoyte House, Mr. Hudson was presented with the book by Prof. Cosgrove on behalf of the College. Also present were Seán Power T.D., Sen. John Dardis, Cllr. John McGinley, Cllr. Catherine Murphy and Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin of Maynooth Community Council. Afterwards Chris was invited to speak to a packed Callan Hall audience prior to the S.U. elections debate. He warned students not to be ambiguous or ambivalent about Northern Ireland. He urged them to ensure that the I.R.A. would not be allowed to claim they were over 30% dive of Irish people, no more than the U.F.F. could to be backed by the outgoipeople of Ulster. #### **BARNEY O'BRIEN**


Bernard (Barney) O'Brien - Barney before emigrating to England 35 years ago was a leading cyclist in Ireland winning many awards including Amateur Massed Start All Ireland championship 1955, the 3 day 300 miles tour of Connaught; four tours of Leinster wins: 100 mile town tour of Wicklow; 100 mile time trial championship; two 100 mile grand prix of Kildare and in 1957 in Ras Tailteann while holding race leaders vellow jersey crashed on 4th day and had to retire. Barney was race captain of North Kildare Cycling Club which was formed in 1953. Before then he cycled with a Dublin Club. His death on April 3rd at his residence in England after a short illness came as a great shock to his many friends in Maynooth and elsewhere. #### CHILDLINE

#### £10,066.17 For Childline

This is our second year to have Childline as our chosen charity. Looking at Irish society today we identified one outstanding problem within the context of young people and that was "Child Abuse". 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

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

#### SIMPLY DELICIOUS

#### Herb Scones

Serves 4-6 8 oz (225 g) self raising flour 1 level tsp (5 ml) baking powder 1/2 tsp (2.5 ml) salt 2oz margarine 2 tbsps (30 ml) finely chopped marjoram leaves or 1 tbsp (15 ml) dried marjoram

#### 4 fl oz (120 ml) milk

Heat the oven to  $230^{\circ}$  C,  $450^{\circ}$  F Gas Mark 8. Sift the flour, baking powder and salt. Mix in the marjoram leaves thoroughly. Rub in the margarine until the mixture looks like fine bread crumbs. Stir in enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto a floured board, then roll lightly to 3/4 in (2cm) thick. Cut into rounds with a 2in (5 cm) cutter. Bake at the top of the oven for 8-10 minutes, or until golden brown and well risen. Serve with cheese, or use in place of dumplings with a casserole.

#### Lemon Caraway Cake

6 oz (175 g) butter 4 oz (100g) caster sugar 3 (size 3) eggs 8 oz (225 g) self raising flour, sieved 5 tbsp (75 ml) lemon curd 1 tbsp (15 ml) caraway seeds Set oven to 350° F, 180° C (Mark 4). Grease and line an 8 in (20.5 cm) round cake tin. Cream the butter and sugar and beat in the eggs one at a time with a little of the flour. Stir in the rest of the flour, lemon curd and caraway seeds until well mixed. Spoon into tin and smooth top. Bake for one hour or until a skewer comes out clean. Cool in tin before turning out.

#### GARDA TALK

#### **Issue of Identity Cards:**

Proprietors of the four Licensed Premises in Maynooth and the Gardai met at Maynooth Garda Station on Tuesday, 13th, April with an agenda to set up an Identity Card scheme for the Maynooth area. Caulfields were represented by John Carey; Noel Brady was the representative for Brady's; Martin Brady was the emissary for the Leinster Arms and John O'Rourke represented The Roost. Sergeant Canny and Garda Martin Caine were the Garda delegation. A very useful productive dialogue on the problems of Underage Drinking ensued and views and issues identifiable to both parties were teased out and exchanged. As a consequence of this get together it has been decided to launch an Identity Card scheme for the Maynooth area. The cost of setting up this initiative is being borne by the owners of the four above mentioned Licensed Premises and for this excellent response they are to be commended.

The aim of the scheme is to help curb the problem of underage drinking. The following guidelines will apply in respect of the issuing of the Identity Cards to young persons.

Cards will be issued only to persons of or over 18 years of age; the cards will be issued at the Garda Station subject to the following conditions: 1. Applicant to produce Birth Certificate; 2. Applicant to produce Passport Size Photograph, which will be then attached to the Card. 3. Apart from Birth Certificate, applicant must produce some form of definite identification i.e., Passport, Driving Licence etc.

It is intended that the new Identity Card will contain the following particulars: Name, Address, Date of Birth, Membership No., Applicant's Photograph, Applicant's Signature, Date of Issue, Garda Station Stamp.

It is accepted that irresponsibility in relation to the consumption of alcohol creates serious sociological problems in the form of crime, vandalism and other patterns of deviant misbehaviour especially among our young. This venture is a sincere and genuine attempt by the people at the coal face of the problem, the Publicans and the Gardaí, to eradicate any abuses in a spirit of co-operation. We now appeal for the support of the Community especially parents. There will be an official launching date of the scheme during the first two weeks of May. Full details will be advertised locally, through church announcements, schools, brochures in public houses and other prominent places frequented by the public.

Any queries or clarification in respect of the new Identity Cards may be discussed by our friendly members at Maynooth Garda Station. When we report to next month's edition the scheme will be up and running and we hope it will be a big success. **Drugs Problem:** 

This is another modern day irritant afflicting many of our youth. With a view to educating adults on how to identify and diagnose possible symptoms experts from Central Drugs Squad Unit, Harcourt Square will attend at meetings in Maynooth on the following dates:

#### **GARDENING HINTS**

During this month the gardener can expect all kinds of weather. Here are a few hints but beware of late frosts when pruning shrubs etc.

Lawns: Mow at least once a week. Apply weed-killer if necessary. Feed poorly growing grass towards the end of the month with sulphate of ammonia at 1/2 ounce per square yard, water copiously afterwards. Spike badly drained areas. Shrubs: Pruncearly flowering shrubs such as Kerria Japonica. Watch shrubs for signs of water shortage.

Roses: Spray roses against pests and diseases and apply a general rose fertilizer. Water newly planted roses.

Perennials: Support tall perennials. Hoe between plants to control weeds. Pinch out growing tips of Michaelmas Daisies, Golden Rod, Heleniums and other vigorous plants to form bushy, self-supporting plants. Water newly-planted beds.

Chrysanthemums: Plant outdoor-flowering plants early in the month. Stop the plants about the middle of the month by pinching out the tips of the main stem to encourage bushy growth.

Dahlias: Plant out young dahlias from cuttings after danger of frost is over.

Annuals: Sow hardy annuals outside towards the end of the month. Sow half-hardy annuals under glass.

Polyanthus: Should be propagated by division.

Bulbs: Plant Gladioli in the second half of the month. Divide Snow Drops.

Vegetables: Begin sowing tender vegetables indoors at the start of the month. Sow winter cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli. Salad crops may be grown outside. Thin and weed crops sown earlier. Turnips, carrots and onions are some of the vegetables that need protection against pests.

Fruit: Continue regular spraying of apple trees against disease. Spray strawberries against grey mould disease. Gooseberries and peaches should be protected against pests.

Green House: Plant tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers and melons. Pinch out grape side-shoots one leaf past the flowers. Ventilate and shade the house on warm days.

House Plants: Continue watering and feeding. Take house plant cuttings, divide plants and root runners.

Drying & freezing Herbs: The best time to harvest your herbs is on a sunny day early in summer just before they have started to flower. Choose a dry spell and the middle of the morning, when any dew on the leaves will have evaporated, and the sun has not drawn out the oils. Gather them, tie in bunches and hang them up somewhere warm, shady and airy. When they are

thoroughly dry and brittle, strip them from the stems, and store them in containers away from light.

Softer leaved herbs will freeze very well eg. tarragon, dill and chives. Herbal flowers, or chopped leaves can be frozen in ice cubes.


The facility is based around a Garden Centre, Ceramic Workshop and Art and Crafts. While emphasis is placed on meaningful work activities, including basic training in horticulture, ceramic techniques and catering, there are equal opportunities for recreation and creativity as well as life skills and personal development. It is our intention to provide facilities that are interesting, stimulating and gently challenging to all those who attend the service.


#### Garden World Garden Centre.

The Garden Centre is an integral part of the Resource Centre and opened to the public on March 15th. The construction of bcds and paths and general landscaping was carried out entirely by the people who attend the centre under the supervision of our horticulturist. The beds are designed to be accessible to wheelchair users, elderly and those of us who prefer not to stoop or stretch! The Garden Centre has a wide range of trees, alpines and herbaceous perennials, all at keen prices. Bedding plants will be arriving shortly. Browsers are welcomed! Other Garden World Garden Centres are located at Lusk and Ballyboden.

In the Ceramic Workshop, processes used are coil and slab building, modelling and slip casting as well as hand throwing on the potter's wheel. Decorative techniques employed are hand carving and the use of coloured glazes and slips. The main emphasis in this area is on creativity and enjoyment rather than mass production but surplus stock will be available for sale in the garden shop.

The old stables have been transformed to provide a very pleasant dining room and kitchen. A healthy, hearty lunch is prepared each day in a group setting as well as tea and coffee breaks. At present this service is limited to those who attend the Centre. All facilities are managed by E.V.E. Holdings Limited (Eastern Health Board Vocational Enterprises).

#### MAYNOOTH PEACE GROUP





#### CITIZEN'S INFORMATION CENTRE

#### DRUG COST SUBSIDISATION SCHEME ELIGIBILITY

O.Who can use this scheme?

A.Persons who:

- do not have a current medical card or long-term illness book; - are certified as having a long-term medical condition with a regular and on-going requirement for prescribed drugs and medicines in excess of an amount per month currently £32. Q.Do specified illnesses/conditions only qualify for inclusion in the Scheme?

A.No. The basic requirement is that a person is certified as having a long-term medical condition with a requirement for prescribed drugs and medicines in excess of £32.

Q.What is meant by long-term?

A.In normal circumstances 12 months.

#### BENEFITS

O.What are the benefits of the scheme?

A.Persons who qualify will not have to pay more than £32 per month to their pharmacist for all of their prescribed drugs and medicines.

Q.Who decides whether a person qualifies for the new Scheme? A. The local health board decides on the basis of the information contained in the completed application form.

#### **IDENTITY CARD**

Q.Does the health board provide a special card or book to persons availing of the new Scheme?

A.Yes. The health board will provide each person with an authorisation card which they will present at the pharmacy when collecting their drugs and medicines.

#### **OBTAINING DRUGS AND MEDICINES**

Q.Does a person have to use the same pharmacy every month? A.No. However, it is a requirement of the Scheme that all supplies in respect of any one month must be obtained from the same pharmacy. In any case where medicines are obtained from a second pharmacy in a calender month payment of up to  $\pounds$  32 will be required. This second payment can then be claimed from the health board under the Drugs Refund Scheme.

#### **OTHER FAMILY MEMBERS**

Q.What if more members of the family has a long-term medical condition?

A.Each person certified as being eligible under the Scheme will receive a personal authorisation card.

Q.Will each eligible family member have to pay £32.

A.No. Only one payment of £32 will be required provided that the eligible family members use the same pharmacy within any one month.

Q.What about medicines prescribed for other family members not having long-term medical conditions?

A. They will pay the full cost of their medicines at the time of purchase but may claim a refund from the health board, as at present, under the Refund of Drugs Scheme. In assessing the amount of the refund the health board will have regard to the payment of £32 made in respect of the Drug Cost Subsidisation Scheme.

#### EQUALITY ARREARS

Amount being paid by the Dept. of Social Welfare. The regulation under which these arrears are being paid out is Statutory Instrument SI 152 of 1992. Under the regulations the first phase only provided for payment of:-

•The difference between the lower personal rate paid to a married woman and that paid to a man.

•The extra 3 months duration of Unemployment Benefit.

•Under phase 2 some married women will be entitled to arrears of Unemployment Assistance and a Household Supplement due to be paid in 1993/94.

What should enquirers do?

•Women affected by this should write into the Social Welfare Services Office, Equal Treatment Arrears Section, P.O. Box No. 3497, Dublin 8, stating name, address, RSI No. and amount of arrears actually received.

•They should acknowledge the amount they have received.

•Ask for confirmation of how this amount was calculated.

•Request payment of such further entitlement still due to them (.e.g. alleviating payment paid to married men).

•Ask for acknowledgment of this request.

Maynooth C.I.C. have printed a standard letter for anyone wishing to claim further arrears. Please call in for one, free of charge.

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# **Political Party Notes**

#### DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES



Maynooth By-Pass : Knock-On Effects

When completed in 1995, the Maynooth by-Pass road will have a major beneficial impact on Maynooth, where traffic conditions have been intolerable for some time. At the same time, the building of the by-pass will generate very significant new traffic flows locally, mainly because of the location of the interchange on the Straffan Road.

The main consequence will be the attraction onto the Straffan Road of local commuter traffic which currently travels to Dublin via Leixlip. To cater for this extra traffic, work on upgrading the Straffan Road, including road widening, bicycle lanes, new traffic lights and a new bridge over the canal, is due to begin shortly. A local committee drawn from residents associations along the route will be monitoring this work, and Councillor Catherine Murphy will be promoting this committee's wishes at County Council level.

From Barberstown to the Interchange

A significant amount of new traffic will also be attracted to the interchange from the southern (Barberstown) side. This will include commuter traffic from around Clane, plus also traffic from further west, in the Edenderry direction. The Straffan Road is simply not up to taking this extra traffic, being too narrow and with a series of bad bends between Barberstown and Taghadoe Cross.

Following enquiries by Catherine Murphy, the County Engineer has revealed that proposals for upgrading this stretch of the Straffan Road have been given a high priority in the recent submission to the Department of the Environment on road improvements in the county. In fact, a £3 million plan to improve the road has been listed second among Category A (top priority) projects in the submission. However, no funding has actually been allocated for the work, which reveals a lack of integrated planning in relation to the knock-on local effects of the by-pass. Catherine Murphy will continue to press for this work to be done. In the meantime, hopefully we will not have to wait for a serious accident before the work is sanctioned. Celbridge Commuter Traffic

Another likely spin-off of the location of the interchange on the Straffan Road will be the generation of a lot of commuter traffic from Celbridge seeking access to the by-pass. Most residential development in Celbridge has taken place in the vicinity of the Maynooth Road. At present, commuter traffic from this area has to put up with long delays in the morning due to congestion on Celbridge Main Street. A proposal to construct a direct link from the Celbridge-Maynooth road to the by-pass has been turned down by the Minister for the Environment.

The fact that the Straffan Road interchange is only just over a mile away from where Celbridge was seeking its own link will inevitably mean that a lot of Celbridge traffic will opt for this interchange, rather than put up with long daily delays on Celbridge Main Street. This traffic will travel along the Ballygoran Road, emerging at the Straffan Road beside the interchange. This road, of course, is not up to the task of catering for heavy traffic flows. Yet there are no specific plans to upgrade it.


When Councillor Catherine Murphy made enquiries about this, amazingly she was offered the opinion by a County Council Engineer that drivers from Celbridge would not use this route, but would come into Maynooth instead, and then drive out the Straffan Road to the interchange! Bearing in mind that the Maynooth-Celbridge road is being realigned so that traffic will have to go to Ballygoran anyway, and will then have to cross over the by-pass to get to Maynooth, this idea is clearly absurd.

The County Council does have plans to relieve congestion on Celbridge Main Street by building a new bridge across the Liffey at the Castletown end of the Main Street. However, this is years away, and even when built, many commuters from Celbridge will still find it preferable to travel via the Straffan Road interchange. It is imperative, therefore, that the Ballygoran Road be upgraded immediately, and Catherine Murphy is pursuing this as a matter of urgency.

#### MAYNOOTH DEMOCRATIC LEFT **STUDENT NOTES**

Democratic Left celebrated one year in existence in Irish politics on February 22nd last. Since the Party was launched, a vibrant branch has been active in Maynooth College. Their high profile, proud record of work and the respect afforded to them is testimony to the efforts of its membership. With the academic year drawing to a close, all that remains is the holding of an A.G.M. before exams demand undivided attention.

The academic year began with the branch mounting a very successful stand at the College Fairs Day. The branch produced and distributed a very effective leaflet on the abortion question among the student body in November. Members were involved in The Youth Peace train from Belfast to Derry on October 30th, so setting the scene for the group to contribute as a substantial component of the Maynooth Peace Group. Party members and supporters were also involved in individual capacities in other organisations and societies in the college. Cllr. Catherine Murphy launched her ultimately unsuccessful election campaign in the college during November. Branch members gained the invaluable experience of canvassing for the party in that same election, Cllr. 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
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

for 3 years with A.J. Hogan, a bookmaker for whom he has nothing but praise, describing him as "A most kind and generous man" - a label not usually ascribed to those working in that profession! On moving to Dublin he shared digs with twelve other students - a slight culture shock from living at home with his parents, two brothers and two sisters. When asked why he went to U.C.D. and not Cork, the simple answer was that at that time there was a direct rail link between Listowel and Dublin, and therefore was a natural choice. After graduating Mr. Ashe taught in Tallaght for 5 years, a much smaller town in those days with only one secondary school, From there he was appointed principal of Maynooth Post-Primary school, the position he holds to-day. His first impression of the town was the beauty of the tree-lined Main Street and the great support and help he received from the townspeople. At that time there were only 120 pupils in the school, but with the expansion of Maynooth this number has greatly increased. It is a major disappointment to Mr. Ashe that this growth was not properly anticipated by the Dept. of Education when they sanctioned the extension to the school in 1982 to cater for the needs of 500 students. The present roll-call stands at 600 and another extension is urgently needed if the students are to compete on equal footing in the new Europe where future employment prospects lie. Mr. Ashe firmly believes in giving his students a strong work ethic with which they can tackle their studies and bring to them the hard work and commitment necessary for success. With the instillment of this work ethic he believes that grinds outside of school are unnecessary and in an informal survey discovered that the best results were obtained by students who, in conjunction with their teachers and their parents, brought this commitment to their work. Whilst stating that the points system is fair and free from outside influence, he, at the same time, contends that it has taken a lot of the fun out of learning but as the system is in place it will just have to be worked with. The Green Paper, he sees, as being high in aspirations but possibly without the resources to back it.

Mr. Ashe views the siting of the Post-Primary school in the town as vital to the town's development and the manner and style of running the school as an influence on the town itself. with students aspiring to 3rd-level education and various branches of employment. Maynooth has benefited in the past and will benefit in the future from the well-balanced and solid citizens emerging from its school and the contributions they will make to their society. As the school has an open entry policy students come from a full cross-section of society and each child is treated individually and if necessary, positive discrimination is practised in order to bring the child up to the desired level. Mr. Ashe would like to pay tribute to the very

valuable contribution made to the school by the parents association which was put in place right from the foundation of the school. He would also like to acknowledge the help and cooperation given to the school by the College authorities with the shared use of facilities e.g., the swimming pool and looks forward to even closer co-operation in the future. With Monsgr. Ledwith he shares the view of Maynooth as a unique university town - akin to Heidelberg - and hopes that it will be treated as thus by the relevant authorities in charge of its development. Although being an exiled Kerryman Mr. Ashe will still support the kingdom in matters of sport with Kildare and Dublin following close behind. The Dublin connection is of course provided by his wife and with four children all reared and educated in Maynooth - Tómas, Fergus, Catherine and Cormac, he would fail to support Kildare at his peril. Indeed he sees his future as being permanently sited in Maynooth and looks forward to the future development in tandem with the school and town.



Marie and Noel McGovern in the Trophy Room at Celtic Park. The trophy in the centre is a replica of the European Cup won by Celtic in 1967.




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#### KILCLONE LADIES FOOTBALL TO DATE

#### **Dear Editor**

I wish to refer to the coverage of the Maynooth Peace Group in last months Newsletter. Against the background of the deaths of the two children in the I.R.A. bombing at Warrington and the rising death toll of Northern nationalists at the hands of loyalist paramilitaries it is most laudable that such groups should emerge. However, I am concerned that the recent peace movement seems to be too narrowly focused on I.R.A. violence. I believe that if a movement is to suceed it should avoid selective condemnations and must not ignore the political conditions which sustain the I.R.A. A movement which does not deal with the violence of the British forces will be seen as showing no concern for those communities who give strongest support to the I.R.A. campaign, and will fail.

This selectivity was sadly evident at the Dublin rally on March 28th (where the Maynooth group's banner was prominently displayed) when, according to press reports, sections of the crowd booed members of the Caraher family whose son Fergal was murdered by the British army. Also it is alleged that mothers of children killed by the R.U.C. using plastic bullets were spat upon, with no reprimand from the organisers.

But looking to the future I believe in the need for a movement for political change to mobilise popular support both North and South. Such a movement could demand an end to all violence from wherever it emanates, negotiations between all parties concerned and possible U.N. intervention in the constitutional talks.

#### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES**

The Community Council would appeal to all Residents' Associations to appoint their representatives to the Community Council. Each Association is entitled to one representative per fifty houses in their estate. If the representatives are appointed their names should be forwarded to their Community Council offices before the next meeting on Tuesday 8th, June for cooption.

#### **PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT NOTES**

Royal Canal amenity group submitted its proposals to the planning and development group in keeping with the proposals going forward for the town.

Their submission is listed underneath and any suggestions that the public would like to contribute we would be very grateful for. It should be noted that its recommendations are approved by the O.P.W.

The Planning & Development are meeting Monsignor Ledwith this month to discuss the future development of the town to try and co-ordinate the steps to be taken and also where the pressure should be applied to obtain rapid progress.

The Castle Committee is progressing in their plans and have estimated that 10 - 20,000 visitors will come to Maynooth when the Castle is listed as a tourist attraction.

The Draft Development Plan, which has to be submitted to the Community Council for final discussion and then forwarded to Kildare County Council for inclusion in County Plan is included in these notes.

Any other people in the town who wish to make submission should forward their submissions to Mr. Michael Kenny, Planning Officer for consideration.

#### PROPOSED PLANS FOR MAYNOOTH HARBOUR:

We hope to start a FAS scheme in June/July. Our plan of work is as follows. 1. Remove the clay bank on the east side of the harbour, from the entrance to the first seat. Level grass/pave the area and build steps down to the harbour field. 2. Build a stone wall from the first seat to the ball alley. 3. Build stone wall from entrance on west side to footbridge.

It is planned at a later date to surface the area from the entrance to the slipway.

When the walls are being built, water pipes and pipes for power cables will be laid down.

The footbridge needs to be renewed and sited approx. 20m. west of its present site, (this would allow for a single span over the canal). The bridge is owned by Iarnrod Eireann and we have been unable to make any headway with them on it.

The O.P.W. maintain the pathways twice a year.

The E.S.B. pole at the entrance to the harbour is to be moved. All work on the canal and in the harbour area must be approved by the O.P.W. The Committee wish to thank Larry Swan from Top of the Crop for his very kind donation of plants.

#### DRAFT DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR MAYNOOTH

#### **Roads and Paths**

- (1) Replace existing footpath surfaces with a brick paving type finish.
- (2) Enforce a policy in line with legal requirements of no parking on the paths.
- (3) Remove the existing problem of all day parking on the Main Street.
- (4) Extend footpaths to all outlying estates e.g. Newtown, Moyglare.
- (5) Resurface all back lanes and side streets including Harbour etc.
- (6) Co-ordinate any ducting, cabling etc. prior to resurfacing of paths or roads.
- (7) Have all approach roads to the town cleaned and hedging trimmed on an on-going basis.
- (8) Divert all heavy traffic from the town, especially Convent Road, Parsons Street.
- (9) Up-grade Blacklion Road to part facilitate (8) above.
- (10) Improve public lighting fittings and quantity throughout the town and access routes. e.g. Phoenix Park type.
- (11) Street/Road names to be erected.
- (12) Rebuilding of footpath over the canal at a new agreed site.

#### Amenities

- (1) Retain and upkeep the Joan Slade River at Parsons Street.
- (2) Combine the development of the Harbour facilities with the proposed development of the Harbour field.
- (3) Maintain/open the Canal Walks.
- (4) Survey the lime trees in town and replant if necessary.
- (5) Protect 'as is' the Axis of town from College Gate, Main Street to Avenue.
- (6) Complete the development of "the Green".
- (7) Preserve the Watering Area along Mullen Bridge with the development of the new road to the interchange.
- (8) Develop the potential of the canal as a stopover for boats Replace existing footbridge.
- (9) Discourage/disallow shopfronts that conflict with character of the town.
- (10) Preserve the area at "the Pound" in Mill Street.
- (11) Discourage signage that is environmentally unsuitable.
- (12) Approach A.I.B. to complete infill on Main Street.
- (13) Replace existing street furniture with coordinated traditional style materials.
- (14) Continue to press for removal of O/H E.S.B., B.T. and T.V. cables.
- (15) Retain stepped path at L.A.
- (16) Prioritise green areas/amenity areas within the planning system to prevent all amenity facilities being built upon.
- (17) Remove remaining playground equipment and clean up this area.
- (18) Restore the Avenue to a safe, usable amenity.
- (19) Have the P.O. return to the Main Street.
- (20) Adapt a policy whereby a clean, tidy town will instill pride and in itself contribute to a better place to live in and look at.

# Community Council Notes

#### **Obsolete** Areas/Renewal

- (1) Cause all derelict buildings and lands within the town boundary to be kept in a safe, maintained condition.
- (2) Have the heavy traffic i.e. large trucks, buses, diverted from the areas of Leinster Cottages/Parsons Street and have these areas noted as of special interest.
- (3) With the agreement of the I.C.A. committee/organisation look into the possibility of having their meeting hall replaced or relocated. Community Facilities
- (1) Proceed with plans to develop the facility of the Harbour field.
- (2) Develop the Geraldine Hall as a venue available to the community for function and meetings.
- (3) Provision of a public toilet within the proposed new car park on the site of 'Coonan's field".Housing
- (1) Provide proper permanent roads and paths to new developments as they are built, this should cover the services such as phones, T.V., lighting.
- (2) Provide greenspaces throughout the schemes and avoid large central spaces within the development.
- (3) Housing developers to be **encouraged** to give names to their developments relevant to the historical character of the town.
- (4) Encourage landlords to upkeep rented accommodation. Business
- (1) Impress upon the large businesses the need to keep their premises in good order and to assist either directly or indirectly in maintaining the surrounding lands of their premises.
- (2) Make the business community aware of the fact that posters, signs etc. on the trees/poles are unsightly and not allowed.
- (3) Investigate where possible the development of architectural potential of our shopping areas.
- Encourage the removal of all plastic/neon signs to be replaced with more environmentally sympathetic types e.g. handpainted, wooden.
   College
- There should be a working liaison between the College authorities and the Community Council to use their combined resources/expertise to develop facilities beneficial to both groups.

## Historical

- (1) Provide encouragement for the restoration of the Castle as a centre of historical interest and perhaps with tourism potential.
- (2) Ensure the historical character of the Main Street as it presently stands with the needs of the people placed ahead of the motorist.
- Provide at some location an outline of Maynooth's history on a map/plaque.
   General
- (1) Pursue the proposal to have the town's boundary extended to that proposed by the Town Commission.
- (2) Have an active policy of monitoring the situation with regard to the erosion of the green area within the town.

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- (3) Pursue a definite outline of those areas surrounding the town which must be designated Green Belt and be above all later changes to developments which has happened previously. These Green Belts should separate us physically from the neighbouring satelites.
- (4) Within the Green Belt areas above extending east from the town provision must be made for the continuation/ expansion of the existing playing fields and the development of extra amenity facilities.
- (5) Attention should be given to the layout of the town to prevent its development in an unbalanced way i.e. all the building on the one side and green space on the other.

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




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
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#### SCOUT NEWS BY "INDY"



#### GRANGEWILLIAM CEMETERY RESTORATION COMMITTEE

The A.G.M. of the above Committee was held on Monday, 19th April 1993. We were very disappointed at the poor response regarding attendance and the lack of interest generally in this restoration project. It was agreed at the meeting that the existing committee members will hold the same positions for the coming year., The following is the report of our Secretary Peter Nevin:-

#### Secretary's Report Year to April '93

During the year significant progress was made at restoring the graveyard. Much of the heavy growth was cleared leaving most of the area accessable. This was due to application of weed killer, and a strong physical effort on behalf of members in terms of strimming, mowing and using such devices as chain saw, hooks, clippers, etc.

Funds collected during the year exceeded £IR500, however this was not adequate to meet commitments under an approved Fás scheme, granted in January 1992. Since then, however, a heavy duty strimmer was purchased and used towards maintenance of the site.

Cemetery Sunday took place on a fine evening in June of last year and was a success in terms of the number of people who turned up and an important focus point to have the graveyard in peak condition for public

viewing. Since then the site has been kept in order, however, greater effort is needed at this time of year to keep growth under control. Accordingly volunteers are needed to perform regular work and to this end the strimmer is available from the secretary's house at any time. Weed killer was purchased recently and it is hoped to apply it shortly. We need to agree an understanding shortly on the future role of the committee not only in terms on the work to be done but rejuvenating interest in the project. Again Cemetery Sunday should be an opportunity to do this.

This report explains what has taken place in the last year. Credit for a lot of hard work is due to a minority who gave their time and labour to restore the cemetery to its present improved state, but there is still a lot to be done and then there is maintenance on an ongoing basis.

We trust that some people will come forward and offer their help to assist us in attaining the success of this project as initially planned when this committee was formed. Cemetery Sunday will be held on 27th June at 3 o'clock, Mass will be celebrated by Rev. Fr. Supple P.P. #### **ALINE - ABOUT IRELAND**


She was sly. And clever. Skilfully, she spread her charms and attractions under my innocent eyes. She was not too obvious doing it so that, too young, I could not realize what was happening to me. But unknown to me my memory registered, printed, filed, buried at the bottom of a drawer these images and impressions that were being offered shamelessly.

And all of a sudden the drawer was open and everything broke out free down to my heart: faces, words, whispers, cries, sighs. The moments, too short. The winded life, so quiet however. Then only, when my heart adopted it all - because everything is too beautiful in her for anything to be thrown away - did I know that it was too late. The rest of my life I could not live without her.

I was hallucinated, hypnotized, addicted. Worse still, incurable.

She was made of details that looked insignificant to the inexperienced eyes I had at the time. Low clouds, changing shape and colour every minute, too diversified to be sad or heavy. An eternal and eternally grey rain, too melodious however to be monotonous. A sun ray suddenly breaking through the thickness and illuminating a piece of black land, a field too green to be real, one of these thousands of tiny parcels surrounded by one of these thousands of endless low walls, with stones darkened by the rain and laid there, one on top of the other, about which one wonders how they are still standing without cement, in the same symetrical position they were put in so many years ago. A celtic cross discovered in a curve of the road, engraved the ancient way like a book, worn witness of a glorious past. Rachitic trees torn by the winds, huge cliffs cut by the sea, protecting the country from the repeated assaults of the big blue.

Low country houses with a thatch roof and stone walls whitened with lime. With windows so narrow that it is always dark inside. Scattered in the middle of hills and lakes, at the end of a muddy road worn by the inclemency of the weather.

Village houses all gathered around one same street and motley with all the colours that nature would not offer to the land, except in the wild flowers that grow on the side of the road at springtime. Like a slight to the grey sky and the black land, to remind them that men are here and they are trying to be masters. Turf fire, with such a particular smell it cannot be forgotten. And the most popular place of the country, the most important of a community life: the pubs. With all their diversified frontages, though all copied from the same model. All their different names, most of the time however being only the names of the owners. Their low ceiling rooms, separated in small and intimate compartments where the echoes of laughters and songs always ring out.

These places that have seen the beginning of everything, joy, sorrow, meetings and woe, peace but most of all war. These places too important socially not to be part of the history and the patrimony.

And above all, these clear nonchalant eyes, proud, frank, courageous and touchy, but so hospitable and immodest, with a heart open to anybody who bothers to try to understand it and love it.

All these images, all these faces she offered to me like she offers them to any stranger who steps for the first time on her wild and untamed ground. And my memory pictured them like it pictures any new smile presented to it.

It was only later - but not too late - that my heart fell in love with this land, her people, her culture, and her history.

This country, with her rocks jutting out in the West, her sheep and ponies only half tamed. This soil too wild to be viable.

The few beaches of the South, but with sea water still too cold to the touch.

This beer so heavy and so black, like a mirror of the earth it comes from.

The lakes of the Centre, sprinkled in the middle of the hills, at the bottom of which a more important river springs out suddenly.

These eyes, so blue like a challenge for the sky.

The gentle slopes of the East where the sea is less violent, and the Black Pool the men from the North gazed at and where they founded the capital.

These songs, so sad, a wound that will never heal completely. And up the North the war, because the people are too proud and still hope to see their country reunified one day and free, at last.....

#### **COBWEB 8 LAUNCHED**

The eight edition of Cobweb, the literary magazine, was launched by Michael D. Higgins, Minister for Arts, Culture, and the Gaeltacht, at a reception in the Buswells Hotel in Dublin on 30th March. Judging by the number of familiar Maynooth faces present, it might have been more convenient to have held the reception in the Leinster Arms. This slim volume, edited by Isabel Cartwright, John Cullen, Peter Hussey and John Phillips covers a broad spectrum of poems, short stories, work in progress, political polemics, oratory and other experimental work. As might be expected, the quality of contributions varies, with some contributors providing accomplished and assured pieces, while others might possibly benefit from more time in the womb of their creative writing class.

The themes considered in the various works include children, childhood memories, the weather, what is poetry, nostalgia, knickers, nature, despair, the humanistic vision, the past, food, death, family life - yes all the familiar themes recur, despite the somewhat self conscious attempt by the editors to distance themselves from the rituals of the Irish literary milieu. The styles include the obscure introspection, and textual trickery of Richard Hayes's essay on What is Poetry; the simple Kavanaghesque poems by Oliver Marshall; the highflown oratory and idealism of Michael D. Higgins in his essay on Asserting the Humanistic Vision.

The editors are to be congratulated for providing a vehicle for developing writers to expose their progeny to the reading public. Often it is only when such work appears in cold print in the public domain, that its true worth can be established. Let us hope that the editors emerge from their self imposed adolescence, and indeed allow themselves to come of age.

#### DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

Mozzarella and Tomato Salad Serves 4 275g (10oz) mozzarella cheese 3 beefsteak tomatoes 8-10 small fresh basil leaves 30ml (2 tbsp) freshly chopped basil 60ml (4 tbsp) olive oil 22.5ml (11/2 tbsp) white wine vinegar freshly ground black pepper coarsly ground sea salt breadsticks, to serve Thinly slice the mozzarella cheese and beefsteak tomatoes. Then randomly arrange the mozzarella and tomato slices or a large serving plate and sprinkle with the fresh basil leaves

Then randomly arrange the mozzarella and tomato slices on a large serving plate and sprinkle with the fresh basil leaves. Put the chopped basil, oil, white wine vinegar and freshly ground black pepper into a screwtop jar and shake vigorously to mix. Pour the salad dressing over the sliced tomatoes and mozzarella and sprinkle with sea salt - allow to stand at room temperature for at least 15 mins before serving.

#### **Red Wine and Mustard Dressing**

30ml (2 tbsp) Red Wine Vinegar
60ml (4 tbsp) Walnut Oil
30ml (2 tbsp) mustard, preferably wholegrain
5ml (1 tsp) clear honey
salt and freshly ground black pepper, to season

#### White Wine and Walnut Dressing

30ml (2 tbsp) White Wine Vinegar 60ml (4 tbsp) Walnut Oil 2.5ml (1/2 tsp) soft light brown sugar 5ml (1 tsp) mustard salt and freshly ground black pepper

#### **Tarragon and Lemon Dressing**

30ml (2 tbsp) Tarragon Wine Vinegar 60ml (4 tbsp grapeseed oil 15ml (1 tbsp) lemon juice 1.25ml (1/4 tsp) castor sugar salt and freshly ground black pepper

#### FOCUS ON MAYNOOTH COLLEGE

#### European Universities come to Maynooth.

Maynooth College played host to 145 European University Presidents on the 5th to the 8th of May this year. Overall, Presidents and representatives from other international educational organisations, from over 33 countries attended the Conference of University heads in Europe (CRE); the theme of the Conference was 'Human Resources in the Universities of a Changing Europe'. The distinguished delegates discussed a host of topics related to the challenges facing universities including increasing access for new student populations, the need for greater efficiency and responsiveness to economic needs.

The delegates were accommodated in the Kidare Hotel and Country Club, Finnstown House, Moyglare Manor, and Barberstown Castle. The guests were entertained to a magnificent eight course banquet in the Pugin Dining hall in the College (a tour de force by catering manager, Dave Carbery and his assistants); this was followed by a recital from the Maynooth Chamber Choir. They also attended a formal dinner in Dublin Castle, which was hosted by An Taoiseach, Albert Reynolds. They also visited local heritage sites, including Carton House.

As there are over 500 universities in Europe who are members of this organisation, it is unlikely that the Conference will take place in the College again this side of the twenty first century. It was a magnificent opportunity to put Maynooth on the academic tourist, and perhaps non-academic tourist map. Let's hope the multinational visitors were unable to see the litter and decrepit pavements in the Main Street through the rose tinted glass of the buses which ferried them from venue to venue. Maynooth College Bicentenary

The Menu card for the European Presidents' banquet in the College provides a fine souvenir of the occasion. There is an interesting print of the College in 1800 on the front which clearly shows a house nestling in the grounds of the Castle, looking very much at home. The notes prepared by the President of the College, Monsignor Miceál Ledwith to accompany the Menu serve to remind us that Maynooth is rapidly approaching a very important date. Msgr Ledwith points out that Maynooth is an ancient place, whose name comes from a clearing in the woods where a second century chieftain lived. He is principally remembered now for the silver arm with which he replaced the one he had lost in battle. However, Maynooth attained prominence as the centre of political power in Ireland when the Fitzgerald family, the Earls of Kildare, became Viceroys of the English King. The first College of Maynooth was established by Garret Og Fitzgerald, Ninth Earl of Kildare, in 1518; this College did not survivie the turbulent circumstances of mid-sixteenth century Ireland.

The present College was founded in 1795 (that is 198 years ago), by the irish parliament, five years before the Act of Union with Britain. Its real founder was often said to have been Edmund Burke, renowned parliamentarian, and staunch friend of the College's first President, Dr. Thomas Hussey. The College was founded without a site, but over the course of the Summer months following its establishment, William Robert Fitzgerald, Duke of Leinster, extended an invitation to the Trustees to locate the College at Maynooth. So, in September

1795, the second College of Maynooth opened its doors under the same patronage, and on the same site as it earlier counterpart. The College was one of the few really native institutions to have emerged in the history of modern Ireland, and few Irish institutions can rival the influence it has abroad, particularly throughout the English speaking world.

Monsignor Ledwith comments that estimates of the significance of Maynooth College varied widely at the very beginning; when signing the Act establishing the College, King George III is reputed to have said : 'This causes me more pain than the loss of the American Colonies' However, the first Trustees of the College preferred to see it as the heir of the medieval Irish Monastic schools. Maynooth College will celebrate its bicentenary in less than two years' time. Plans are already afoot to celebrate this event in style.

#### **Oldest Practising Chemist in Ireland**

No, the oldest practising chemist in Maynooth is not Mr. James McCormack (who recently experienced a most flattering facelift) but Rev. Michael Casey, O.P. who is also, at 90 years of age, the oldest practising chemist in Ireland. Dr. Casey has been in the Chemistry department in the College for many years, and still works in the laboratory, advising students, and staff. He is still carrying out research in collaboration with Professor A. Zschunke of the Humboldt University of Berlin, on the synthesis of manganese complexes for use as contrasting agents in the magnetic resonance imaging of animal cells. He was honoured recently by the Institution of Engineers in Ireland who conferred on him the Honorary Fellowship of the Institution.


A native of Waterford, Dr. Casey came second in chemistry in Ireland, while a student at Waterpark CBS. His first academic paper was published in 1926, and his most recent paper on the synthesis and structural characterisation of a novel Ferrocene, was published in 1991 - a publishing career lasting 65 years. Since 1974, Dr. Casey has been the Curator of the College Museum, which houses many items associated with Nicholas Callan, who invented the electromagnetic induction coil in Maynooth in 1836. There are also religious and historical artifacts of specific relevance to the College. A video tape of Dr. Casey's reminiscences of his long and fruitful life is available from Dr. Malachy McCann, from the Chemistry Department who lives in Kingsbry.

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#### GARDA TALK

#### Beware Of Burglars During The Holiday Season

Hereunder are some snippets of advice which should assist *IN PREVENTING BURGLARY* 

Firstly, you should know that burglary can be prevented. Too often people feel that if the burglar wants to break in, he can do so without difficulty. To some extent this is true, and that is to the extent to which some people take no security precautions whatsover. Even more to the point is the fact that in thousands of burglaries the thief gains access by unlocked windows or doors.

Never present thieves with this 'open invitation' to steal. Burglars are opportunists, don't ever give them an opportunity. Locking Doors

\* Use only solid external doors. 'Hollow' doors offer no protection.

\* Make sure door frames are in good condition and won't easily give way under pressure.

\* Use only good quality locks. Mortice ones are recommended. Mortice bolts can also be fitted at the top and bottom of the door to give additional security.

#### Locking Windows

\* Fit window locks to all accessible windows. Remember the burglar will be able to enter windows which may look too high, or small for him.

\* Don't leave windows open for ventilation when you are not at home.

\* Prevent easy observation of your house interior by fitting 'venetian' style blinds, or nylon curtains which are normally always across. This way you do not advertise your absence. \*\*\*When you have locks fitted - USE THEM \*\*\*\*

#### Something Worth Stealing

Everyone has something worth stealing. Most burglaries involve theft of property under  $\pm 200$ ! They will take anything from a transistor radio to the entire house contents.

In addition to financial loss is the mental upset of knowing that someone has invaded your home, and may have ransacked your personal belongings.

#### **Protecting Property**

Make your property unattractive to the thief by marking it. Use your initials and date of birth. This makes it harder for him to get rid off property, and easier for us to connect it with its proper owners when it is recovered, or found in suspicious circumstances.

Information on property marking is available from your local Garda Station.

#### The Best Means of Crime Prevention

This is a good neighbour - someone who will look after your house when you are away, and will report suspicious callers before waiting to discover later that they were in fact burglars. Neighbour Watch is aimed at bringing good neighbours together in this way. They realise that, where possible, the Gardai should be alerted before a crime occurs. No one is better able to spot something unusual, or out of place in a neighbourhood, than one of its own alert residents.

If you do see suspicious activity - ring the Gardai NOW!

#### What The Burglar Looks For - Points To Remember

- · Windows open lock all windows whenever you leave home.
- "Hidden" keys if you have a spare key leave it with a friend.
- Papers in the letter box cancel newspapers, have a neighbour collect any post or "flyers".
- A build up of milk on the door step cancel milk.
- Ladders or tools that will help him to get in lock them up!
- Unguarded property leave it in the garage or otherwise indoors.
- Easy access to the rear of the premises fit a side gate with lock.
- Lights on in the daytime or none on at night use of a simple timing device can solve this problem. Burglar Alarms.

As more houses and business premises in the Maynooth Area are being fitted with Burglar alarms we advise people to ensure that those appliances are not a source of annoyance to your neighbourhood especially during the holiday period.

There is no doubt the value of a good Alarm System but we must point out the disturbance and annoyance caused by defective appliances that are not properly installed. Note that after installation your alarm system needs regular service.

Burglar Alarms are instantaneous warnings of some interruption or intrusion and should be tended to as soon as possible after activation. Gardai often arrive at the scene of a ringing alarm only to find that there is no keyholder available or contactable and the deafening noise continues for a long period, often all night.

We therefore request people with Alarms fitted to urgently notify:

(1) The Alarm Company.

(2) The Gardai.

of the Name, Address and the Telephone Number of the Keyholder, who may be contacted in cases where the Alarm is activated or other emergency.

#### Identification Cards:

This scheme was launched on the 6th May. Necessary equipment is now in place at Maynooth Garda Station for the issue of the Identification Cards.

Applicants for cards must be:

- 1. 18 years or over.
- 2. Bring with them passport size photograph.
- 3. Birth Certificate.

4. Some form of identification i.e. (Driving Licence etc.)

This scheme is a voluntary initiative - merely a means of identifying individuals ages to Barmen/Publicans where such doubt may arise.

The co-operation of parents and everyone would be appreciated to ensure the success of the venture.



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#### **GARDENING HINTS**

After all your hard work during the Spring, June is the month where you can almost but not quite sit down and enjoy the fruits of your labour. There are still a few odd jobs to be done but nothing too strenuous as I hope the weather will have warmed up for a long hot summer!

Here are a few hints that might be of use to you:

•Water shrubs during any dry spells. Look out for green fly on young plants. Continue to prune flowering shrubs as they finish flowering.

•Continue to spray against diseases and pests on roses. Remove suckers from the rootstock.

•Finish planting flower beds. Plant up containers. Sow perennial flower seed indoors or outdoors. Sweet William and Wall Flowers can be sown in the open.

•Plant out tender vegetables. Sow swede turnips. Stake peas and beans. Plant tomatoes, onions, cucumbers and brussels sprouts. Watch for pests. Water in drought and keep weeds under control.

•In your greenhouse continue regular watering and feeding. Watch carefully for pests especially greenfly and red spider mites.

•Leaf cuttings can be taken from Begonia Rex and African Violet.

# MAYNOOTH MISCARRIAGE OF JUSTICE GROUP

### The next Birmingham Six???

The case of the Beechmount Five.

While the Birmingham Six, Guildford Four, Winchester Three and Judith Ward are finally free, five young people from Belfast are currently in danger of becoming the next victims of a miscarriage of British Justice - this time in the North of Ireland. On 1st May 1991 the I.R.A. launched a rocket attack on a R.U.C. landrover which resulted in the killing of a Sergeant Gillespie. Between 2nd May and 2nd June 1991, six teenagers from the Beechmount area of Belfast were arrested under The Prevention of Terrorism Act (P.T.A.), held for periods of three to seven days in Castlereagh Interrogation Centre and claim to have been subjected to physical beatings and threats. As a result of this ill-treatment five of the six signed confessions to acting as lookouts for the attackers. The sixth youth, Damien Austin did not sign and is not being charged. He was rearrested in August 1991 and subjected to further ill-treatment resulting in Amnesty International issuing their first ever Urgent Action Order for the North of Ireland.

### Charged

The five who where charged were Liam Coogan (19), Mark Prior (19), Jim McCabe (19), Kevin Mulholland (18) and Laurence Hillick (17). They claim that their ill-treatment included verbal abuse, physical beating, with-holding of medication for asthma and diabetes, denial of sleep, headbutting and worse! They say the threats included possible execution by Loyalist Paramilitaries of their parents and other family members.

The five are still held on remand awaiting trial in Crumlin Road Prison purely on the basis of the signed statements. No other evidence has been brought forward against them. Campaign

In reaction to their continuing imprisonment a campaign for their release led principally by their families is attracting significant support. Amnesty International highlighted their case in its 1992 international report and their local M.P. Dr. Joe Hendron has stated they were ill-treated and that the charges are ridiculous. We in the Maynooth Miscarriage of Justice Group are concerned (1) about the allegations of ill-treatment leading to signed confessions being the sole basis of charges against these young people, (2) the long period of detention (nearly two years) without being brought to trial, (3) the lack of proper protection for those detained under the P.T.A. i.e. no access to a lawyer. This case needs to be properly investigated and resolved quickly to insure that a Birmingham Six type injustice is not repeated. ### THE STEAM MUSEUM STRAFFAN, COUNTY KILDARE, NEAR DUBLIN, IRELAND

The Steam age marked the progress of the sidecar to the steam engine. The first generation of man had arrived when a machine ran faster than a horse; where the waterwheel was supplanted by steam-powered rotary motion. Apart from being the great communicator through railways and shipping, the steam engine became the prime mover for manufacturing industry, and in Ireland many great commercial enterprises expanded including Arthur Guinness, Harland & Woolf, Smithwick and Jameson, together with considerable numbers of smaller concerns involved in corn and saw-milling, dairies, and the weaving and flax industries.

Thomas Newcomen (1663 - 1729) invented the steam pump and saved much misfortune and terrible toil in mine workings; James Watt (1736 - 1819) who developed rotary motion in the steam engine enabled many to improve their living standards by his new technology. Richard Trevithick (1771 - 1833), a world traveller whose genius realised the advantage of high pressure steam, made the first self-propelled road vehicle which began the evolution to all modern transport.

Charles Parsons of Birr (1854 - 1931) invented the steam turbine which today is still used for electricity generation and ship propulsion.

It was a great age, and early engineers were the spacemen of their day. For the first time in Ireland this museum shows some of these historic engines, with which this remarkable breakthrough for mankind was achieved. The Power Hall displays live steam stationary engines made or working in Ireland during the nineteenth century.

The Richard Guinness Hall houses his magnificent collection of many prototypes of early railway engines. This included Richard Trevithick's famous Third Model of the first fourwheeled self-propelled vehicle in existence. The museum building has been removed from Inchicore, the home of Irish rail-ways, and was restructured from the old church of St. Jude, where many steam engineers worshipped. It provides an incomparable gothic setting for these fantastic artifacts. A tea



house is provided and souvenir items, catalogue and post cards may be purchased in the reception area.

The Mall will be given a new roof and floor and new entrance lobbies and the centre will be re-decorated. The plans include the upgrading of the car-park and the existing lights. The Mall canopies will be replaced and overall a smarter, more modern appearance is aimed at. In keeping with its modern outlook is the fact that the baby changing facilities will be sited in such a way that both male and female customers can avail of them.

#### KIDS KOTTAGE DAY NURSERIES

Kids Kottage, which has just been awarded 2nd place in Leinster by Liga's Creche of the Year, when special emphasis was made of its homely cottage atmosphere, is owned and run by Ger Scanlon who has been working in the childcare area for the last twelve years. She trained in Cathal Brogha St. the only recognised course in Ireland in childcare and is also qualified as a Montesssori teacher. Before setting up her own nursery she worked with children requiring special needs, travelling children and also set up a work-place creche in what is now D.C.U. She worked with parents groups for a year and did three years as a youth worker.

Ger. set up her nursey in 1989 in Old Greenfield after purchasing one of the cottages - No. 287 with its large garden she saw the need for a quality day care centre where children could be cared for safely and happily whilst their parents were at work, and converted the premises with this in mind. At the start there were three children enrolled in the nursery but this number rapidly increased until the number now stands at forty eight, with six staff now employed to care for them. A special baby room was opened in April 1990 followed in 1991 by a toddler room and a garage conversion, even the garden shed has been converted into a sand, water and paint area which allows the children to express themselves through play without worring about the mess! Currently there are three playrooms and a nursery to cater for all the needs of the children and a separate bedroom for afternoon naps. The children are supervised at all times by the fully qualified staff, a Doctor is always on call and fresh food is served daily by the full time cook. The homely atmosphere of the nursery is carefully fostered by all the staff as they believe that children can only develop fully in a caring friendly and stimulating atmosphere. Whilst Ger stresses that no nursery can take the place of parents, what they can do is provide the environment where children can be given the necessary interaction to stimulate growth through play language and music by staff who can give their whole time and attention to the children. Constant reviews take place to ensure that each child is happy and there are monthly staff meetings to assess their care and development. The staff receive on going training and are encouraged to attend courses to constantly update their skills.

Ger sees Kids Kottage as having achieved its maximum number of children and would not see any further numerical expansion but would like to develop services for children with difficulties and perhaps set up parent and toddler groups. The day care of the children is still the nursery's primary concern but it has expanded into other areas - Montessori and after school care which combined with its baby toddler and playgroup care keeps all the staff fully occupied and promotes the ethos of which Ger is so proud - a happy safe place for children to play and mess around and just be children who are looked after by people who have the time to really listen to them.



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### THE SWAN

The Mute Swan (Cygnus olor) is one of eight species of swan that inhabits every continent except Africa and Antarctica. Legend has it that Richard the Lionheart brought the first mute swans from Cyprus after the third Crusade. The mute swan is extremely domesticated and will frequently take handouts of bread as can be seen in Maynooth harbour, it's the swan's version of junk food and they should be offered grass or other greens rather than bread.

### Mating

These are large birds - almost four feet tall with their long necks extended. They begin mating at three and can live to be forty. They are as strong and white at thirty as at five. Swans are romantic lovers and mate for life. An elaborate courtship which includes the cob (male) chasing the pen (female) about the water, the pen sinks with her neck stretched straight out. As they mate she exhales a sighing call. They rise and face each other, touch breasts and cheeks, then emit a final snort.

### **Building Their Nests**

Soon after the two are at work building their nest which rises two or three feet, a collection of sticks, weeds and other water plants, then pen deposits about half a dozen eggs and both parents settle down for about five weeks of incubation. The cob has many predators to contend with, including foxes, large gulls and rats. Although swans are usually mild-mannered, a cob guarding his nest is a formidable foe. The force of his powerful wing can kill a small animal. If the cob is on the nest when the eggs begin to hatch, he beats a retreat and lets the pen take over the duties of helping the cygnets emerge, softly pushing them with her bill, picking off bits of shell and tossing them out of the nest. The new-born swans are tiny blobs of gray fluff and are quickly able to totter about. Within a few days they are waddling to the water's edge, where they begin paddling. Before long the entire family are in the water sailing in single file, the cob bringing up the rear, still on the look out for predators. Anybody who has fed the swans in Maynooth will notice that the mute swan is far from mute, they chuckle, mutter and snort. They also hiss and growl and give aloud cries when alarmed. Learning To Fly

The most spectacular sight is when the cygnets are learning to fly, after a few months when they are nearly fully grown and their wings have developed. Watching their parents booming take-offs, their eight-foot wing-spans beating heavily, the cygnets imitate them nose diving and cart wheeling back into the water, gradually they learn to climb and fly further. The ancients linked these beautiful creatures with Aphrodite, goddess of love and Apollo, God of Poetry, According to myth, when Zeus had designs on Leda, he chose the guise of a swan as the most likely to win her favour. The swan has been celebrated by many artists and composers, one of the world's best loved ballets is of course "Swan Lake". Perhaps the most enduring myth is the "Swan Song", the melodious, haunting cry of a dying swan.

As Socrates prepared to drink his fatal hemlock, he told his followers, "I do not believe these birds sing in sorrow. I think because they are prophets, they know the good things in the other world, I depart life no more dispirited than they do". Next time you feed the swans in Maynooth you might remember Socrates.

### **RECOLLECTIONS OF MAYNOOTH** SENIOR CITIZENS

1993 is the European Year of older people and solidarity between generations. To celebrate this event, a collection of writings by Maynooth's senior citizens has been published. Entitled 'Recollections: Memories by Maynooth Senior Citizens" and available in local shops at the reasonable price of £1.50 this is a fascinating glimpse of the treasure lying within our older residents, in the form of memories, history, and reminiscences. The writings in this volume include essays, poems and Limericks. They cover major events such as the Mission (the effect of which is surely a mystery to the younger generation), the Emergency (also known as the Second World War), as well as accounts of growing up in a world without machines, thoughts on the pursuit of happiness, and reflections on growing old - it's better to wear away than to waste away. The Parish Mission obviously left its mark on many - two weeks of intensive Mass going, listening to terrifying sermons on the dangers of company keeping and sin and hell; buying medals, scapulars and holy pictures from stalls outside the church. As Kitty Shanley says, the week over, all felt very lonesome.

#### Pace of Development

the pace of development, which means that we now take so much for granted - like having running water, electricity in the house, washing machines. Peg Geraghty tells us that electricity came to Maynooth in 1929; and in 1959, they got running water, and in 1960 they got sewage pipes in their gardens. But there is some nostalgia for those quiet days - read Mary Waldron's account of washday, and the time for children to learn from Mother as she scrubs the family wash (Dad of course sits in the corner telling the news of the town). Brigid Saults talks about the days when the young people would gather on Bond Bridge to listen to the music of Mary Fay's melodeon, when sets and reels were danced on the old bridge. (Try that now, young people, and you'll be arrested, or mown down by traffic!). Eileen Fingleton in her beautifully written account of a machine free world in the Golden Vale concludes that if we had fewer machines, more would be employed and there would be less boredom - but wryly notes that progress is something we cannot and must not impede.

### Flood of Memories

The Emergency unleashes a flood of memories, mostly relating to the privations of rationing - although there is some disagreement among our writers as to whether it was two ounces, one ounce or half an ounce of tea per person per week (sorry, the editor is unable to supply the equivalent in tea bags). Some writers note the scarcity of young men, which left fewer men in the cinemas and dance halls, so no doubt men were rationed too. Ms Kathleen Canavan gives an entertaining account of the difficulties of being a catering manageress in a world where inspectors swooped threatening dire retribution on those who served a slice of bread with a bowl of soup. Nellie Rossiter spent her time as a nurse in the Curragh, where she nursed the victims of the Glen of Imaal explosion as well as the German and British prisoners of war. However, the food was more plentiful, as the army had to be fed.

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There are fascinating glimpses of Maynooth life - read Gerry Coyne's account of a working life which started at the age of twelve, carrying water from the pump in the Square to his neighbours.

Carton is mentioned by some - Gerry Coyne mentions how he used to cut thistles there in his school holiday, and got 12/6 a week. Brigid Saults tells us about the last Duke of Leinster, an interesting old reprobate who gambled away his heritage; and whose sister, Lady Nesta presented the Brass and Reed Band with the crest of the Leinster coat of arms in 1932. Alas the Duke's triumphal visit to Maynooth with his third wife was never repeated - who knows, if he had been a prudent investor, we might still have their Graces at both ends of the town, and these fears of acres of concrete covering Carton might have no basis.

### Macho Men

The College gets few mentions. Gerry Coyne tells of going to the College Gate at 6 in the morning, and carrying bags for students, for which he got 1/6 or 2/-, Margaret (Peg) Geraghty provides an intriguing picture of the Kilcock road, with washing spread far and wide on the bushes; these were the washings of the 600 college students, which provided a small income for the women of Maynooth, and for the school boys, who earned six pence a day to mind the clothes after school. This is an interesting account of how the macho men of Maynooth in the early 1900s did not "allow" their wives to work out, but who were happy to accept them earning a few bob in their spare time, washing clothes, repairing sacks from the mill and soutanes from the College.


This is a wonderful collection; every house should have at least one. It will form a valuable resource for the future. What a pity there is no biographical detail about the writers, not all of whom are originally from Maynooth as it would have been helpful in some cases to know where exactly the particular accounts are based. The photographs used to illustrate the volume would also have benefitted from more illuminating captions; neverthe less they add considerably to the charm of this book.

The work provided by Sponsors will last up to 10 weeks anytime between 1 July 1993 and 30 September 1993. Students will receive payments for this part-time work while contributing to the community.

### Who can participate in the scheme?

Full-time third level Students who formerly would have been eligible for means-tested Unemployment Assistance of  $\pounds 15$  a week or more may apply to participate in the Scheme.

NOTE: Mature Students and those engaged in VTOS or Third Level Allowance Schemes are NOT eligible to participate but may be entitled to claim Unemployment Assistance instead. How will the scheme operate?

1. Both Students and Sponsors must receive prior written approval to participate in the Scheme from the Department.

2. Students will be required to satisfy a means test and must disclose full details of income. Failure to do so will result in automatic disqualification from participation in the Scheme.

3. Eligible students will be issued with a Students "Job Certificate" along with a list of the participating Sponsors in their region who can provide part-time work under the Scheme. Responsibility for contacting Sponsors and seeking work rests with the Student.

4. Working arrangements are a matter to be agreed between the Student and the Sponsor. Students will be authorised to work for up to 160 hours over a period of 10 weeks. Students will be paid by the Sponsor and payment will be at the rate of £2.50 per hour subject to a maximum of £400 over the period.

5. On commencing, Students must give the Job Certificate to their Sponsor, who will retain it for the purposes of recovering payment from the Department.

6. On completion of participation in the Scheme, Students will be required to countersign the Job Certificate.

7. A Student who is unable to obtain the maximum number of hours (160) with any one Sponsor may apply for a further Job Certificate for the remaining hours. A statement from the first Sponsor, showing the number of hours worked and the amount paid, must be submitted with the new application.

### Students Whose Parents Are In Receipt Of Social Welfare Payments

Students living at home who cannot get work under the **Summer Jobs Scheme** and whose family is solely dependent on a Social Welfare payment(s) can avail of special arrangements which allow payment for up to 8 weeks from Monday 19th July 1993.

### **MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES**

### Extension To Maynooth Post Primary School

Following further meetings between Minister Emmet Stagg and the Minister for Education Niamh Bhreathnach, we are pleased to announce that approval has now been obtained for the much needed extension. It will be a permanent structure and the additional 550 square metres of space will mean that the school will now be big enough to accommodate 700 pupils. The Branch congratulates Tom Ashe and all the Parents involved in the campaign to have a permanent extension.

### Greenfield Lane/Meadowbrook

Clir. John McGinley tabled the following motion at the Celbridge Area Committee meeting of Kildare County Council on 22nd April and it was passed unanimously.

'That this Council reaffirms its decision of last year to bollard off Greenfield Lane, Maynooth and thereby cutting off access to the Byrne and Riordan Houses from the road, but giving these houses a new link road to the Meadowbrook Road, and that these bollards be removed when the Meadowbrook Road is linked with the Straffan Road via Dunnes field and furthermorethat no other link road be granted between Meadowbrook and Greenfields'.

John McGinley and Emmet Stagg fully support the residents in their efforts to have Greenfield Lane closed to through traffic immediately as the end houses on the Lane (Byrnes and Riordans) will have access via the existing road to Newtown. Disconnection Of Water Supply

The recent scandalous behaviour by Kildare County Council of disconnecting householders water supplies for non payment of charges has caused great concern recently. Labour Councillors McGinley, Purcell and Keane have tabled a motion for the next meeting of Kildare County Council calling for the ceasing of disconnections forthwith.

### Water Pressure - Greenfield Lane

Arising from complaints from Residents of Greenfield Lane concerning Low Water Pressure in the area Deputy Emmet Stagg made representations to the County Engineer. He has been advised that a burst watermain was repaired in February and that this probably caused the low water pressure. However the Council will continue to monitor the situation.

### Maynooth Employment Exchange

Minister Emmet Stagg has been in contact with the Minister for Social Welfare arising from complaints that people signing on had to queue outside the Employment Exchange in bad weather. With the facilities at the Exchange people should not have to queue outside while awaiting payment.

### The Avenue

At the request of Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley the Councils Architects Section have been requested to prepare a scheme for the upgrading of Carton Avenue as an amenity walk for the benefit of the people of Maynooth.

### Policing Arrangements for Maynooth

In response to representations by Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley requesting a fully manned 24 hour Garda Station for Maynooth the Minister of Justice has advised as follows. The Garda authorities, who are responsible for the detailed policing arrangements for individual areas, inform me that Maynooth station is currently open from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. from Monday to Saturday and from 12 noon to 2 p.m. on Sundays.

The Garda authorities report that to increase the opening hours of the station would mean withdrawing Gardai from operational duties in order to man the station. As they feel that this would be counter-productive, they do not propose to extend the opening hours of Maynooth station. It is important to note, of course, that the fact that the station is closed does not mean that there are no Gardai on duty in the town. The area is patrolled on a regular basis by foot and mobile patrols throughout the day and night.

The current manpower at Maynooth station is I Sergeant and 6 Gardai. In addition, the Divisional Officer has recently set up a Uniform Crime Unit to operate throughout the North Eastern part of the Division, which includes Maynooth, in order to counteract criminal activity in that area.

The local Gardai report that they have regular discussions with the Executive of the Students Club at Maynooth with a view to ensuring the orderly behaviour of its patrons. They also provide additional patrols when late-night functions are being held in the town and as people are leaving licensed premises at closing time. In addition, the residents in the Parson's Street area, in conjunction with the local Gardai, have established a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

The Garda authorities also report that the provisional crime figures for 1992 for the Maynooth Sub-District show a decrease of over 12% on the previous year. The Garda authorities are satisfied that the present policing arrangements make for a better utilisation of manpower as more members perform outdoor foot and mobile patrols but they are keeping the situation there under continuing review.

### Road Block Grants 1993

Road and footpath improvements in the Maynooth area to be carried out from the Road Block Grants for 1993 are as follows. 1. Moyglare Road - A sum of £28,500 has been provided to carry out additional Drainage, Road Widening, additional gulleys, and to provide a Tarmacadam Carpet and further extension of footpaths. Public lighting will be provided from Development Levies. This will complete the road up to the entrance to Movglare Village.

2. Parson Street and Cluain Aoibhinn - Parson Street will be resurfaced. Additional resurfacing from Newtown to the entrance to Cluain Aoibhinn will be carried out. Amount Provided £17,300.

3. Pound Lane/Back Lane - A sum of £10,000 has been set aside for the provision of ramps along Pound Lane/Back Lane.

4. Back Lane Serving Phase 2 & 3 Greenfields - A sum of £1,000 has been allocated to provide Public Lighting.


5. Footpaths - A sum of £7,000 has been provided for repairs

to footpaths at Mill Street, Parson Street and Dublin Road. 6. Boreen - £2,000 has been provided to surface dress The Boreen.

Cllr. John McGinley and Minister Emmet Stagg will press to have the required works carried out at the earliest opportunity. National Conference

Pearse O'Connell - Principal of the Boys' National School, Maynooth.



ers training he came to join the staff in Maynooth in 1961. Ten years later he was appointed principal of the B.N.S. which post he has held for the last twenty-two years. No wonder his hair has turned white! The Village of Maynooth as it was in 1961. was quiet and friendly and the parents were very welcoming and co-operative. ### School Expansion


### Old Peoples' Committee Cabaret - Caulfields - Tuesday 15th June




### GARDA TALK

### Vandalism

What is it? The term vandalism is open to many interpretations; however it is generally identified as wanton destruction and damage carried out for trivial motives or because of irresponsible behaviour, carelessness and disregard for the common good. Its degree of seriousness ranges from minor damage, i.e. shrubs and small trees to the more serious element, breaking car windows, aerials, or indeed windows of shops, business premises and private houses. How much does it cost: Quite simply a lot of scarce money that could be better utilised; it affects our environment and also the quality of our lives; this begs the question, Who pays the bill: We all pay through higher charges, premium payments etc. The classic case is the damaged Telephone Kiosk - An emergency has arisen and the phone is out of order because of an act of vandalism and so the services we need most cannot be contacted; on top of this inconvenience the Telephone Company must repair the Kiosk and this cost eventually has to be passed onto us. This money spent on unnecessary repairs should in fact be available to improve the relevant Service. Why do people commit Vandalism: Culpabilities can be apportioned to a variety of sources - the individual, parents/guardians or indeed the way society is structured and the resulting sets of values that we hold. Now that the long summer holidays are with us, we advise parents that they have a responsibility to ensure that their children are accountable for their activities at all times; responsible parental supervision is the foremost deterrent to most wrongdoing: Parents, always know, (1) Where your children are; (2) Who they are with; (3) What time they are due home. The Public can help by reporting all sightings of vandalism to the Gardai with any useful information that might assist in the identification of the culprits; be assured that any such information will be treated in the strictest confidence; this is your community with all it ancillary facilities - Be aware and take pride in Maynooth.



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
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### I.C.A. NOTES

There are a number of broken headstones lying idle that need urgent attention, please do something about them. If you are interested in helping in any way, you can contact the undersigned through the Community Council Office.

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






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### MAYNOOTH SWIMMING CLUB

### Know Your Rights

Question: I have been receiving Disability Benefit for 5 years. In addition I have a pension from my job. Three years ago I was offered Invalidity Pension but declined it because it was taxable. Now that Disability Benefit has been taxed my job pension has been reduced by almost £20 p.w. So I would be better off on Invalidity Pension. Can I change onto this? Answer:

Yes, you should ask to be transferred onto Invalidity Pension which is paid at a higher rate than Disability Benefit and there are also the additional benefits of Free Travel and Free Electricity, Free B/W T.V. Licence and Free Telephone Rental, if you meet the other conditions. These may help in some way to offset the tax you now have to pay. It would be in your own interest to let the tax office know that you have been granted the Invalidity Pension so that your tax free allowances can be reduced accordingly. The Department of Social Welfare notify the tax office when you have been on Disability Benefit for 12 months but they don't inform them that you have transferred onto Invalidity Pension


### Stamina

In general the weather was extremely favourable. Considering it was one of the wettest Mays in the history of Records the West Coast of Ireland was lucky. Whilst we on the East Coast



### **DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE**

### Sultana Slab

Serves :-6 - 8 Preparation: - 25 minutes. Cook:- 11/, hours

11b/450g Sultanas 3 Eggs 12oz/350g Caster Sugar 2tsp/10ml Almond Essence 80z/225g Butter 12oz/350g Plain Flour 2tsp/10ml Baking Powder 8 x12in/21 x 31 cm Roasting Tin

• Preheat oven to Mark3/325°F/160°C. Grease the roasting tin. • Place the sultanas in a saucepan and cover with water, bring to the boil and cook for 15 mins. Meanwhile mix the eggs, sugar and almond essence in a large mixing bowl.

• Drain the sultanas and put them back into the saucepan with the butter. Stir occasionally over a low heat until the butter has melted. Remove from the heat and add to the egg mixture.

· Finally add the flour and baking powder and mix together thoroughly. Pour the mixture into the tin and bake for 11/4 hours until golden brown.

• Leave in the tin for 5 mins. before cooling on a wire rack.

• When cool, cut the cake into slabs.

This cake freezes really well. Keep some out to eat immediately after baking and freeze the rest. Each piece will take about an hour to defrost thoroughly at room temperature.

### **GARDENING HINTS**

Well July is here again and hopefully the bees are buzzing and the children are playing in their paddling pools (As I am writing this in the May rain!) There is not too much to do this month just a little bit to get you out in the sun to top up your tan.

• Mow the lawn regularly unless the weather is dry then you should raise the blades on your lawn mower. Scarify patches of creeping weeds and surface running grasses before mowing. Feed lightly in early July. Apply weed killers and irrrigate as necessary.

• Clip hedges. Continue pruning shrubs. Begin taking cuttings. • Spray for greenfly on roses if they appear. Apply more fertilizer to encourage more flowering. Remove suckers.

• Hoe flower beds as soon as weeds appear. Water young plants as soon as a dry spell occurs. Check gladioli and dahlia are well staked. Clematis montana are liable to branch congestion, so prune to ease over crowding.

• Plant out winter cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli. Make late sowings of lettuce, beetroot and peas. Sow spring cabbage late in the month. Small onions can be dried during this month. Raspberries and redcurrants require summer pruning.

• Thin out apples and pears if neccessary. One fruit per 15 cm of branch is enough. Water newly planted trees.


 Paint shading material onto the glass if you have a greenhouse. Sow primula and cineraria seed. Coleus are ready for cuttings. · Continue regular watering and feeding of house plants. Watch closely for pests, especially red spider mites and greenfly.

### TOMATOES

Outdoor tomatoes can be planted in early June. Before planting 3-4 oz per sq yard of tomato fertilizer should be added to the soil. Plant 18 in apart and water well. After planting loosely tie the stems with soft garden string to supports at 12 in intervals. Remove any side- shoots (except on bush varieties). Stop each long-stemmed plant 2 leaves beyond the 4th truss as the fruits begin to develop. Continue to remove any sideshoots induced to grow as a result of stopping. Spray against potato blight. Water and liquid feed regularly. During mid-September cut the strings and lay the plants on a bed of straw. Cover with cloches and continue to water without wetting the fruit.

Apply sun protection 25 and head out into your garden for a spot of light work,





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### MOTHER TERESA OF CALCUTTA VISITS MAYNOOTH

### GLORIA IN EXCELSIS DEO.

The above Latin jubilation is the only way to describe how the people of Maynooth felt after they had been honoured by the visit of a legend, some say a saint, in her own time on Tuesday 1st of June last. It is poignant to note that on this occasion her visit took place on the day following the feast of the Visitation of Mary the Mother of God.

Whilst Mother Teresa's visit to Maynooth had been planned for months her recent fall had put the whole visit in doubt. Though frail looking she may be, a little thing like three broken ribs was not going to deter such a determined person as Mother Teresa of Calcutta.

To the casual visitor passing through Maynooth that day nothing unusual appeared to be occurring. There was the usual traffic jams, people were doing their shopping and everything was normal but behind the scenes the Gardai were very busy as were the staff in St. Patrick's College preparing for their distinguished visitor.

Each year the students at Maynooth College organise the Trocaire Annual Talk, inviting a dignitary to speak on a Third World issue. This year the students invited Mother Teresa to give the talk. Despite her recent illness, already mentioned. Mother Teresa agreed to continue with her visit to Ireland and particularly to be present in Maynooth on Tuesday 1st June. The format was somewhat different than in previous years as the event was planned to be an evening of prayer with Mother Teresa, during which she addressed the congregation. The students put great effort into planning the event and it proved to be a beautiful liturgical occasion.

Mother Teresa and her entourage were escorted by Gardai outriders arriving at the side entrance of the Chapel at approximately 6 p.m. She was received enthusiastically by Cardinal Daly and a number of bishops and clergy from all over Ireland. Upon entering the building Mother Teresa kindly consented to allow the Press to take photographs after which she met Trocaire members at the side of the Chapel.

Upon entering the altar she was greeted by tumultuous applause from an overcrowded College Chapel for the congregation which had participated in the liturgical music and meditations from 5 p.m. were now joined by Mother Teresa in reflection, blessing and lighting of the Commemorative Candle and Intercessions read in several different languages from Croatian, Italian, Kiswahili to Russian. The congregation with their candles held aloft, created the atmosphere of a Pilgrimage gathering in Lourdes. The local Gardai who were guarding Mother Teresa became involved in the ceremony. They began assisting with the lighting of the candles.

Her address to the congregation on the need for prayer was quietly spoken. Prayer, she said was the way to love and peace in the family and community. Her short speech to the congregation was followed by questions from two Maynooth College students. One of the two questioners asked whether she was concerned about the fall in numbers of vocations. She replied that she has spent much time thinking about this issue. "I have thought very much about that but I believe it is going to increase again", and she asked the congregation to pray for families and individuals who do decide to take up vocations.

Asked what she feared most, she answered simply but quite firmly "sin".


When the evening of prayer had ended Mother Teresa made her way out of the College Chapel. By the time she had got to the side door a large number of the original 1,000 plus congregation had made their way around to the side of the chapel hoping to get a final glimpse. Some began to run down towards the main gate thinking the cavalcade would shortly arrive. However, Mother Teresa had a few further engagements prior to leaving the college.

Her first call after the Evening of Prayer was to the students at Maynooth College. There she spoke on Third World issues. Later Mother Teresa met a group from Armagh led by Canon McDonald and Cardinal Daly.


Mother Teresa left Maynooth at approximately 9 p.m. For those of us who were fortunate to have either met her face to face or even just got a glimpse, the occasion was one of deep spiritual and joyful emotion. ### A SPECIAL SERVICE FOR ANDES VICTIM

A special service for Graham Hall Whittaker, the son of a Maynooth lecturer who was killed when he fell from a mountain face in the Andes, was held in St. Mary's Parish Church, Maynooth last month.

The 24 year old man was one of two climbers who died when they lost their footing and fell while climbing a difficult peak in the mountain range, 600 miles south of Lima, the Peruvian capital. His companion was Stephen Kelsey, from South Africa. Although he fell to his death on Friday 14 May, his shocked parents were starved of information about their son's fatal accident. Up to a week later, Peruvian authorities were still trying to recover the bodies.

His father, Peter, is a lecturer in the Biology Department at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. Speaking to the Leinster Leader - he confirmed that his son's body had been found over the weekend, and they are expecting an inquest. His remains were cremated before they were flown back to Ireland for the service on Monday.

Graham was one of a 4-strong team, which included 2 English women. The experienced climbers had set to climb separate faces of the mountain range. The bodies of the two men were discovered when the women returned to the rendezvous point. His family are originally from England, and Graham is the eldest of four children. A biochemical engineer who graduated from University College of London, Graham had been living in London for the past 7 years.

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

### FINE GAEL NOTES

### **Flood Chaos**

The widespread and severe flooding in the Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge and Straffan areas which resulted from the heavy rains of June 10th and 11th highlighted the absence of any major disaster plan for Kildare. Bernard Durkan T.D. was first made aware of the flooding, while conducting clinics in Monasterevin, on the evening of Friday the 11th June. Despite constant efforts by him to contact senior Council officials he was, with the exception of the Chief Fire Officer, unable to do so. Having worked his way accross the county he reached Leixlip at 1 a.m. on Saturday morning to find the houses of Mill Lane on the verge of being flooded. He personally had to obtain sand bags for the householders in that area so that they could protect their houses.

The only emergency service to perform its task in a proper and professional way in all this chaos was the fire brigade but in the absence of any back-up from other elements of the council they were not equal to the task. While the natural reaction is to blame the Co. Council for not having a plan to deal with emergencies the fault in fact lies with the Dept. of the Environment and the Minister Mr. Michael Smith. It is he who should name the person to take charge in the event of an emergency and specify what the chain of command should be. His continued failure to perform his duty in this respect means that we in Co. Kildare are faced with further disruption in the event of any future crisis such as heavy snow next winter. We call on Mr. Stagg, Minister of State at the Dept. of the Environment to bring this problem to the attention of his senior colleague.


### **Promises**, **Promises**

In November of last year Mr. Spring, front bench spokesman and Labour Party candidate addressed a mass meeting of Aer Lingus workers and promised them that Labour in Government would preserve jobs and provide all the money necessary to make the company viable.

In January and February of this year when Digital were withdrawing from Galway and making 1100 workers redundant Labour Ministers maintained that this was one of the difficulties of dealing with multinationals where decisions were being made by executives and shareholders outside our jurisdiction and control, and with no commitment to the workers, the country, or the economy. Some Labour Ministers suggested that nationalisation of industries might be necessary to protect employment. Now that Mr. Cahill has delivered his reform package to the government with its 1530 redundancies it is time for the Labour Party to deliver on their promises and high blown rhetoric and not judge the issue.

### **Council Houses**

The Governments intention to start building 3,000 Council houses this year might seem like good news for those on the Housing List. However this is not so. There are at present about 1,500 families on the Kildare Housing List. It is intended to start building 88 houses in this county in 1993. At this rate it will take almost 20 years to clear the present list. It is conceivable that many could be grandparents before they are housed.

### LABOUR PARTY NOTES

### Tony Smith Memorial Walk

The proceeds of the Tony Smith Memorial Walk 1993, which amounted to  $\pounds 1,278$ , were handed over to the Maynooth Old Folks Committee, by Minister of State Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John McGinley at a function for the Old Folks in Caulfields on June 15th. Again we thank the people of Maynooth for their continued generous support of our Walk.

### Laurence Avenue

Following representations by Cllr. John McGinley, Kildare Co. Council have set in motion the necessary procedures to close off the exit to the Celbridge Road from Laurences Avenue. A petition carried out by Labour members last year had shown widespread support for this move. With the opening of the by-pass traffic on this road will substantially increase as Celbridge motorists will use this route to gain access to the bypass. The closing off of this exit will prevent Laurences Avenue from being used as a 'rat run' by motorists wishing to avoid the traffic lights which will be put in place at the Straffan Road/Celbridge Road junction.

### Hotel in Beaufield

Planning permission has been lodged for a 14 bedroomed Hotel adjacent to the shops in Beaufield. The Local Branch sees this as an attempt to get around the fact that developers have been unable to get a drinks licence for the pub. Planning permission was secured for the latter some years ago. Cllr. John McGinley has supported and will continue to support the Residents objection to this planning application. There is a great need for a hotel in Maynooth but not in the middle of a housing estate.

### Upgrading and Enhancement of Main Street

At the request of local branch members Cllr. John McGinley has tabled the following motion for consideration at the next Celbridge Area Committee of the Council. 'That the following works be carried out in association with the revamping of the Courthouse, Market Square, Maynooth:-

1. Underground E.S.B., Telecom and T.V. overhead network in the Town.

2. Replace public lighting standards and lamps with units appropriate to the town e.g. Phoenix Park type.

3. Survey the lime trees in the town and replace where necessary.

4. Replace existing footpath surfaces with interlocking brick paving type.

We will keep you advised of progress in this matter.

### Kingsbry

In response to representations from residents of Kingsbry, Minister of State Emmet Stagg T.D. requested Kildare Co. Council to serve an enforcement notice on the Developers of Kingsbry in an effort to have works completed in the estate. We are pleased to advise that the enforcement notice has now been served on the Developers.

### **Maynooth Employment Exchange**

Minister of State, Emmet Stagg T.D., has been advised by the Minister for Social Welfare that the reason that queuing occurred outside Maynooth Employment Exchange was that claimants do not always adhere to their signing times, and that this caused unnecessary queues at certain times.

Some 3,000 people are registered as unemployed at Maynooth Exchange and of these 1,200 attend each week to sign on and receive payment. The remainder are paid in their local post office. Each claimant has a specified time to sign on to ensure that there is no major amount of time spent queuing. The Branch will continue to monitor the position.

### Joan Slade River

Arising from the flooding of houses in Parson Street on June 12th, Cllr. John McGinley has asked Kildare Co. Council to repair the wall that runs along the Joan Slade river. Residents advised that the water came through the wall and that if it was in a proper state their homes would not have been flooded. Minister of State Emmet Stagg T.D. has visited the residents affected and will support Cllr. John McGinley's efforts in this matter.

We are also requesting the Council to have the Joan Slade river cleared out.

### Meadowbrook/Brookleigh

One wonders why Developers call estates Meadowbrook and Brookleigh when the brook which flows through these estates is littered with builders rubble. Cllr. McGinley and Minister Stagg have made urgent representations to Kildare Co. Council to have the developers contacted concerning the clearing out of the brook.

### Labour advice Service

Minister of State Emmet Stagg T.D. continues to be available to the people of Maynooth every Saturday at 4.00p.m. in Caulfields (Private Meeting Room).



### **Phil Brady - Publican**



Phil Brady has seen Maynooth grow from a population of 1,500 in 1923, when he first arrived here, to approximately 6.000 today. Phil, one of a family of nine, was born in Co. Cavan January 1907. He left Laragh, Co. Cavan at the tender age of 16 years to serve his time in a bar on Main St., Maynooth. The owner of the bar at the time was Mrs. Pitts, a widow, and at the time John Neary was the manager. Phil

earned 5/= (5 shillings - old money) per week for the first year of his apprentice. In the second year he earned 10/= per week and in the third year 1 pound per week. In less than a decade he had not only acquired all the knowledge needed for his business, he became the owner and has run Bradys Pub ever since. In 1938 he married Breeda from Waterford and since then Breeda and Phil and eventually their children have successfully run the business.

Phil has kept in contact with the home house all his life. His Grandfather lived to 101 years of age and his Grandmother to 100 years of age, sister Katie 94 and Matty 92. Maynooth has become his adopted town. He has been involved in all its activities, the Mart, G.A.A. etc. down the decades. He is President of the local GAA Club and still enjoys watching a good match. Another interest Phil has is the dogs. He has had many winners and recently sold a dog for over £5,000. Phil has fond memories of the various characters of the town. People like Spot Bourke, Syke Doolin, Kidger Reilly and Jack Underwood. Some of our older readers will remember these great characters. Indeed Phil has rubbed shoulders with even Lords and Generals, including Lord Brockett of Carton House and Lord Carew of Castletown House. During the War many high ranking officers graced his parlour. Count John McCormack's son, Cyril and friend Matt McQuade, nephew of the late Archbishop McQuade stayed in his home. Father O'Sullivan, a convert and a relation of the Duchess of Westminster was a regular visitor. He is now blessed, having been beatified. Except for a touch of arthritis, Phil enjoys good health. He gets out and about, meeting the people, which he enjoys doing and visiting his family which are scattered all over. When asked what he thought about life in general today, he felt that the people are losing the art of conversation. We watch far too much television and there is too much violence and sex on the television and he considers it bound to be bad for the young people growing up today. "Today", he continued "one hardly knows your next door neighbour and in general there is not the same sociability that existed when I was younger. # Editorial

### EUROPE JOINS MAYNOOTH

Maynooth residents experienced a cosmopolitan invasion on the Main Street last month, as the steam rollers and tarmac layers moved in. What a welcome sight it is to see the street being upgraded, but reports have reached the **Newsletter** that the contractor responsible appeared to be from northern Ireland, and the workers involved appeared to have been of foreign extraction. We know the Council has to accept the lowest tenders, but this is a curious turnaround, when the dole queue in Maynooth has rocketed, while we search beyond our own shores for workers. Of course, we Irish cannot complain as we have traditionally sought freedom to work in other countries and part of the price of Europe opening its borders to us, is that we have to open our borders too. Still, who would have thought when saying yes to Maastricht that Europe would come to us in this way.

### **TELEPHONE CHARGES**

The recent 'rebalancing' act carried out by Telecom in changing call charges is another example of the hidden impact of post-Maastricht Europe. To ensure that Telecom rates are competitive on an international basis, international calls and indeed long distance calls have come down in price. This is of course a very welcome development for those companies which have been crippled with phone charges way above those of their European competitors. But what about the poor domestic user, who is now being charged an exorbitant rate for local calls. Eleven pence for three minutes may not sound much, but has anyone tried to get through to a government department, and transact business in three minutes? Most times, you're left holding while 'he' deals with another call, searches for the lost file, or has forgotten about you altogether. As for the lifeline for the old, the sick, the lonely, those in distress forget about it. Telecom appears to suggest that you can keep these problems until the evening or weekend. Life isn't always like that, Telecom. Think again about the consumer.

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# Letters to the Editor

### Dear Editor

I wish to respond to the inaccurate report in Fine Gael's notes in the June issue of the Newsletter 'Council Houses'.

The number of houses to be commenced in 1993 is 3,700, not 3,000 as indicated in the Fine Gael notes. This is made up of a carryover from 1992 of 200 and the provision for 1993 of 3.500 house starts.

The number of families on the Kildare Housing List, including Athy U.D.C. and Naas U.D.C., is 983 and not 1,500 as indicated in the Fine Gael notes. This 983 is the most up to-date figure being the result of the Housing Assessment carried out on 31st March, 1993,

The Fine Gael notes state that 88 houses will be commenced by Kildare Co. Council in 1993 and that at this rate it would take 20 years to clear the waiting list. Either through ignorance or for political advantage Fine Gael have totally ignored the various measures in the Plan for Social Housing which will see 306 families rehoused in Kildare within the next 12 months out of the 983 presently on the waiting list. I have detailed below how this figure will be achieved;

- 1. 35 Houses now under construction from previous Housing allocations will be completed soon.
- Under the 1993 Housing allocation, 88 house starts 2 have been approved to Kildare Co. Council and 16 each to Athy U.D.C. and Naas U.D.C.
- 3 Under the works in lieu of rehousing scheme 11 families living in houses requiring major repairs will have work carried out to their homes thus removing them from the Housing List.
- 4 40 casual vacancies arise on average in any given year in Kildare. These houses will be retenanted by families on the Housing List.
- 5 Under the voluntary Housing Rental Subsidy Scheme. approval for the building of 20 houses in Kildare Town has been issued and 35 in Naas. Voluntary Groups have also been set up in Newbridge and Monasterevin, and further groups have been established in Kildare Town and Naas. A voluntary Group will be formed in Kilcock in the near future. 70 families in total should be taken off the waiting list under this scheme over the next year and this scheme is 100% funded by my Department through K.C.C.
- 6. On average Kildare Co. Council finalises 60 shared ownership loan applications per year. Half of these would be persons on the Housing List.

Taking all of the measures outlined above into account demonstrates my view that by the end of the lifetime of this Government the Housing Crisis will be at an end and families will not have to wait in excess of a year for Local Authority Housing.






The organisers wish to acknowledge the services of P.J. Conroy of Tallaght who officiated as referee for the final and Ken O'Brien for his photographic expertise.




L to R Martin Foy, Tom Nolan and son John Nolan taken down on the pitch and putt course

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

### CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

### Question

We work a 40 hour week, how many days holidays are we entitled to? Is the 39 hour week compulsory now and who is eligible for same?

### Answer

Under the Holidays (Employees) Act, 1973, you are entitled to 1.25 days annual leave for each calendar month in which you have worked 120 hours (110 hours if under 18 years). If you have worked for 120 hours in each of the 12 months of the leave year, you would be entitled to 3 weeks holidays. Alternatively if you have worked for 1,400 hours (1,300 hours if under 18 years) in the leave year you would be due 3 weeks holidays. This is your legal minimum entitlement and it hasn't changed since 1973.

Employees in certain sectors may be entitled to more than 3 weeks leave. If your employment is covered by any of the Employment Regulatory Orders you may be entitled to additional leave, e.g. Hairdressers employed in Dublin and Cork are entitled to 20 days leave (4 weeks). Construction workers are also entitled to four weeks.

Part-time workers who regularly work for the same employer for at least eight hours per week are entitled to six hours paid leave for every one hundred hours worked after they have been working for that employer for thirteen weeks.

The number of hours per week you work is negotiable and it isn't covered by legislation. So, the 39 hour week is not mandatory.

If you are not getting your holiday entitlements or if you want to know if there are any Registered Joint Labour Court Agreements for your particular emloyment you should contact - The Dept. of Labour, Adelaide Road, Dublin 2. Tel: (01) 6765861. There are about 17 of these Agreements registered with the Labour Court. 
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### I.C.A. NOTES






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### **TUG-O-WAR REPORT**




Tug-O-War Competitors "The Middle Shop" back row L to R Peter Dalton, Sean Hyland, Patrick Reid and Leo Hynes.

Our committee has met a number of times since our A.G.M. We also held a Special General Meeting to discuss the question of grass cutting and equipment. First of all may we thank those who attended the special meeting. Those present heard a report on the state of the equipment owned by the association. (1) Straffan Road Development - impact on Laurence Avenue.
 (2) Grass Cutting - Laurence Avenue.

(3) A.O.B.

The importance of each house being represented was stressed in the circular.

There was unanimous support for the grass cutting project.

The impact of the Straffan Road Development on Laurence Avenue was examined and discussed. The areas examined were, closure, making it a cul de sac, ramps, signage, new development in the area, house to house petitions.

At the end of the discussion the following was agreed, that Kildare County Council would be contacted to examine traffic management in and out of Laurence Avenue and all other relevant issues. When all the information is collated the committee will then put this information to the residents of Laurence Avenue at a special meeting. (Our initial file started in 1988 on this subject)

### Straffan Road Development

The latest information to hand on the above developement, is that Straffan Way will lose one row of trees and relevant green area, that a 5ft cut stone wall will be erected lowering towards shopping centre. The estate name stone will be incorporated into the wall at this end. Inside the wall there will be shrubbery provided. A protective fence will be erected to protect the remaining trees and green area.

# Features

### GARDENING HINTS

Hello again, if you feel your gardens need a bit of flower power just copy the following hints and suggestions.

### Raspberries

It is best to grow raspberries in a row with the canes trained against wires. In the summer, when canes are making fresh growth, sink an 8ft high wooden post at each end of the row or at 8-10 ft intervals. Stretch two galvanised wires between the posts 3 feet and  $5^{1}/_{2}$  feet above the ground; or stretch two parallel wires 12 inches apart from cross-pieces fixed at right angles to the posts about 4 feet above the ground

### Blackberries

Blackberries grow vigorously so three plants are usually ample in the average sized garden. They need sun or partial shade and a well drained, moist fertile soil. Stretch 10-12 gauge wire between posts to a height of about 6 feet and place wires 12 inches apart and fasten to vine eyes.

### Vegetables

Sow the seeds of spring cabbages, brussels sprouts and lettuces for early winter use.

### Heathers/Shrubs

Take semi-hard cuttings of all heathers and flowering shrubs.

### Perennials

Make sure that perennials never dry out, particularly autumnflowering kinds such as michaelmas daisies, golden rod and helenium. Deadhead all faded flowers not needed for seed. Plan arrangements of flowers for autumn plantings.

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
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### GARDA TALK

### Protection and Security of the Elderly

Recent years have seen a serious decline in respect for the aged and they have become increasingly the target for attack. With advancing years, slowing physical reflexes and their natural trusting nature they are very vulnerable to exploitation by conmen and criminal opportunists. The right to live, go shopping, visiting or about a person's daily business without interruptions are rights and privileges to which all our citizens are entitled, especially the elderly. The Gardai in Maynooth wish to assure our Senior Citizens that Maynooth is a safe place to live and we assure them of our full support and attention. Hereunder are some security suggestions which if applied sensibly and practically will assist in keeping your homes and areas safer and more peaceful to reside in:

- 1. Front and rear doors should be fitted with good quality 5 lever mortice locks; safety catches should be fitted to all windows.
- 2. Never leave doors unlocked; rear doors and windows should always be closed when speaking to strangers at the front door.
- Fit a strong door chain to both the front and rear door.
   A chain will allow you open the door a few inches before admitting a caller.
- 4. Door viewers are very useful for seeing callers before the door is open.
- 5. Be careful with your door keys; never hide them outside the house in what might appear a safe place.
- 6. Keys should always be turned in locks even when in the house; if you lose a key the lock should be changed immediately.
- 7. Never give any personal information about yourself or your neighbour to any strangers who may call or telephone enquiring.
- 8. You should make special observations of strangers who call to your house and arouse your suspicion; note a full description of them; the Registration Number and make of their car. Pass this information to your Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator or the Gardai.
- 9. Persons claiming to be Inspectors or any kind of Officials should be asked to produce identification and be fully satisfied before you admit them to your home; if in doubt refuse entry and contact the Gardai.
- 10. If a forced entry is in progress take immediate steps to summon help; use telephone if available and if necessary shout/scream to alert passers by.

- 11. If you do not have a telephone you should make arrangement for a system of signals to a neighbour indicating when you need assistance.
- 12. Good lighting inside and outside your home greatly assists in stopping intrusion to your home; time switches can be used to provide cut-off with great effect.
- 13. Keep the minimum amount of money and valuables in your home; never leave such items exposed to public view; surplus cash/valuables can be deposited for safe keeping in banks or other financial institutions.
- 14. It is advisable to keep a list of serial numbers/markings of all valuables in your home.
- 15. Keep important telephone numbers in a conspicuous location near your telephone i.e.: doctor, priest, good neighbour and the priority Garda phone numbers as follows: Maynooth Station 6286234; Naas this phone number gives direct contact to the Maynooth Patrol Car 045 (97333); and of course in an emergency dial 999 and ask for the Gardai. A telephone extension to your bedroom will assist without fuss in raising an alarm; keep the phone number of a reliable neighbour whom you can contact at short notice.

### Advice to applicants for Passports

- 1. Your passport will be your badge of identity, especially when travelling abroad.
- 2. In making application for a passport, your identity must be officially established and certified by a Garda.
- 3. You must sign the application form in the presence of the Garda who will certify the form and accompany-ing photographs.
- 4. If you are not known to the certifying Garda, your cooperation will be required in establishing your identity when presenting your application form.
- 5. It will avoid delay and needless inquiry if you present your application form at a Garda Station where you are known, or where your identity can be readily confirmed.
- 6. For this reason, you may present the application form at a Garda Station serving the area where you work, where you reside, or where you have formerly worked or resided, or indeed at any Garda Station.
- 7. If you must present your application form at a Station where you are not known but are known at some other Station you should say so when presenting the form.
- 8. In any case your identity may be established to the satisfaction of the certifying Garda by some reputable person known to the Garda, who can confirm your identity. continued

### DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

### **Crumble Topped Mushrooms**

A Tasty idea for non-meat eaters Serves 4

1. Simmer three sliced parsnips, 1 chopped onion, 1 sliced pepper with 7 fl oz (200 ml) cider and 1/4 pt (150 ml) stock for 8 minutes.

2. Add 11b (450 g) sliced mushrooms and 2 tsp (10ml) mustard. Blend 2 tbsp (30ml) cornflour with water and stir in. Bring to the boil, stirring.

3. Spoon into an oven proof dish. Set oven 375 degrees F, 190 degrees C (mark 5)

4. Topping : rub 1 oz (25g) margarine into 1 1/2 oz (40g) plain flour, stir in 2 ozs (50g) chopped mixed nuts. Sprinkle over vegetables and bake for 25 minutes.

### Melon and Ginger Sorbet

A refreshing pale green sorbet of Galia melon studded with stem ginger. Serves 4

4 oz 100g sugar 1/2 pt (300ml) water, 2 Galia melons 1 tbsp preserved stemmed ginger drained and chopped, juice of half a lime, one egg white.

Dissolve sugar in water over low heat. Bring to the boil and bubble for 5 minutes. Meanwhile, halve and scoop out seeds from melons. Remove flesh and puree. Measure out 3/4 of a pint (425ml) puree. Mix with sugar syrup, chopped ginger and lime juice.

Place in a freezer container and freeze until semi firm. Remove from freezer. Whisk egg white until stiff and fold in carefully. Return to freezer until solid.





### **MARATHON WATCH**

### Time for a Run

If you are fed up with life or the same old scene, don't change the cat, the wife, the husband, the lover or that rug - just do the Marathon. Yes, its time to be thinking of the Dublin City Marathon. Get on the road, shake off the blues. We at "Marathon Watch" c/o Newsletter Community Council Offices will keep an eye on your progress and hopefully be there when you hit the Wall. If you are overweight and have been inactive for a long time the Marathon is not for you as there is insufficient time left to get into condition. However, if you have kept reasonably fit and have been exercising on and off then you have a chance. Basically you have three months to train and have up to six hours (from 10a.m. until 4p.m.) on Monday 25th October to help complete your achievement.

### Starting Off

Starting off, it is no harm to get medical advice and have a check up. Then you must get a good pair of runners with thick soles which can cost from £30 to £50. Then start running daily for about twenty minutes. Increase this steadily until you are able to run for about one hour daily by the end of August. You can take rest days. This is called "Time" running. You would need to be able to do at least five mile runs by the end of August or early September. Don't worry about distance yet take it in stages. You can train on grass as well as the road, Road running can be hard on your limbs and joints, so if you feel an injury coming on, slow down and stop. Rest until you are recovered sufficiently.

### Injuries

You can develop tendonitis on shin bones and cartilage trouble. So take it easy at the start. Don't train if you feel very stiff from the previous run. Plenty of bread and potatoes will keep the carbohydrate levels right.

### Sponsorship

Plenty of organisations are looking for people to run for sponsorship. Maynooth Athletic Club are trying to raise much needed funds to help children and youth to keep active and represent Maynooth far and wide.

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### **MAYNOOTH - DUBLIN TRAIN SERVICE -**SURVEY TUESDAY 13TH JULY 1993

Many people living in Maynooth commute by train daily to work in Dublin. This random survey highlights some of the comments of the commuters.

### **INTERVIEWEES COMMENTS**

- 1. Pretty comfortable. It is never late.
- 2. Bad. The 5.15 pm train is always late in the evenings. The real problem is on the way back in the evenings. Especially the Sligo train leaving Connolly St. at 6.30 pm. It is usually late leaving, Reason - no engine ready, Should tell people why the delay.
- Service is excellent. Quiet happy with it. 3.
- 4. It can be dreadful. Time keeping. On the way back in the evenings. No explanation. They just leave you sitting there.
- 5. Good generally but when you reach Dublin there is supposed to be a bus waiting for you at 8.35 but when you arrive it has gone. Sometimes the train is late or the bus goes as the train pulls in and the next bus is 9.10 am. They should be every 10 minutes. Sometimes a big delay - 20 minutes to half an hour.
- 6. I am a regular commuter. I finish work in Maynooth at 5 pm so the 5pm train is difficult to catch unless I leave work early and sometimes it is not possible.. My husband works in town and finishes work at 5.45pm and finds it impossible to catch the 60 clock train. We live in Clonsilla and the 6.30 from town does not stop in Clonsilla.
- 7. Not particularly happy with the service. When it is running on time it is grand. The frequency is bad, particularly the evening train. Six o'clock is often very late and therefore it is very late by the time you get home. Very few people can get the 5.15 train from Connolly St. Station. Maybe something in between say 5.30. Not sufficient carriages - especially in the evenings and if you are not there 5 to 10 minutes before it leaves you won't get a seat.
- 8. I think it really has improved over the last few months. It has not been late for a long time whereas last year it was late every second day.
- 9. No train or bus service for people working on a Sunday until, I think, 10 o'clock. There is no way of getting into town.
- 10. Not enough trains. In the evening times they are not frequent enough. The mornings not too bad but there could be an extra one. The bridge crossing the canal to the station this morning was all water logged. Having to walk along the edge to avoid the pools of water. Its a disgrace. The train is packed before it gets to Castleknock. People standing - a need for more carriages.
- 11. Good most of the time but at the evening time it can be very bad some evenings getting back.
- 12. Service is open to improvement. Every half hour in the morning and evening time.
- 13. Security at Maynooth Station. Left my car here, it had 870 Punts damage whilst parked at Maynooth Station. Some one tried to take it away but couldn't as the steering lock was on it. It is interesting there is no security.

14. After work trains do not run often enough. If you want to go home in the middle of the day there isn't a train between 2pm and 4.05 which is very bad.

The above survey took place on Tuesday morning 13th July 1993. The Station Master, Brendan Mulligan had been approached the day previous and was very happy with the Newsletter taking on this survey. He would be very interested in its findings.

A large number of people were interviewed. The Newsletter would like to thank the Station Master, Brendan and his staff for their cooperation but a special word of thanks to all who gave their time to be interviewed. Some were well qualified to give their views as they have been commuting for years on this service.

### MAYNOOTH MISCARRIAGE OF JUSTICE GROUP

We in the above group are delighted to see that the case of the Beechmount Five has been resolved and that all five are now finally free, in particular we are delighted to note that charges relating to the murder of an R.U.C. sergeant in an I.R.A. rocket attack in May 1991 were withdrawn by the prosecution. The five had alleged that as a result of ill treatment they had signed confessions to such charges. One of the five, Mark Prior (21) was acquitted of all charges against him, as the crown counsel claimed that he suffered from a mental handicap and considered it was no longer proper to rely on his statements. The other four Liam Coogan (20), James McCabe (21), Kevin Mulholland (19), Laurence Hillick (19) all pleaded guilty to a lesser count of communicating information useful to terrorists and were sentenced to four years imprisonment. As they had been on remand for two years and were eligible for 50% remission they walked free into the waiting arms of their families who had campaigned for their release.


The five were all sure that only the publicity and campaigning in Ireland and the U.S. had prevented an even greater miscarriage of justice.

Jim McCabe said the campaign got us the deal. We would have been convicted of murder like other innocent men and sentenced to life without anybody noticing.

The five thanked the hundreds of people in the South who had written to them and taken up their case including the Tánaiste, Dick Spring, David Andrews T.D., Declan Bree T.D., and Dr. Mosujce Bhamjee T.D.

We in the group would also like to condemn the imposition of an exclusion order against Mr. John Matthews of Derry under the Prevention of Terrorism Act barring him from Britain. He had been released from custody and all charges were withdrawn against him relating to an I.R.A. bomb attack in the city of London. He had been informed by the magistrate that he was completely innocent and the Conservative M.P., Mr Peter Bottomley said, "John Matthews is as innocent of I.R.A. offences as I am". He said Mr. Matthews deserved an apology not an exclusion order. He was born in Liverpool and he cannot come back to the place of his birth and employment.

Fire was responsible for closing Kehoe's Restaurant but it was water - too much of it - that almost closed up Tony and Thomas Bean's Pitch & Putt course.



# **KILDARE DESPAIR**

### DUBLIN 0 - 11 KILDARE 0 - 7

Up to last Sunday Kildare's patient supporters lived in hope. That hope was sustained by two and a half years of solid if occasionally erratic progess. Three solid league campaigns and a brave performance against Dublin in last year's Leinster Final were the foundations on which great achievements might be built. Last Sunday the character of the team was put to the test and found sadly wanting. The hunger and spirit that drives winning teams to success just wasn't there. The dream is over. Our hope is no more.

1993 has been Mick O'Dwyer's third All-Ireland campaign as manager of Kildare. Each year has been better than that which went before. Only a lack of accuracy in front of goal and a lack of physical presence when the going got tough denied Kildare a Leinster title last year. All agreed, however, that these deficiencies could be remedied as the team matured.

### Lack of Hype

This year the omens were good. The team showed character in coming from nine points behind to beat Wicklow. That missing ingredient - a never say die spirit - appeared to have been found. The team appeared to have improved, particularly in the forward line - compared to last year. And, perhaps most important of all, there was a distinct lack of hype as Leinster Final day approached. All the pressure was on Dublin - a depleted Dublin missing the surging runs of Mick Deegan and the leadership in the forward line of Tommy Carr. We approached Croke Park last Sunday confident, if not of victory, then at least of getting our money's worth. And that is exactly what Kildare supporters didn't get.

### What Went Wrong?

By now many of you will have read reports and analysis of last Sunday's match in the national and local papers. And all sorts of reasons have been put forward for the manner of the defeat. The comments of some of the supporters after the match are scarcely printable. More in sorrow than in anger some swore that they wouldn't be caught dead at a Kildare match again. How could this team, in which so much hope has been invested, collapse so shamefully ?

Part of the answer lies in the nature of the match as it unfolded on Sunday afternoon. This was a war of attrition. And in the first half Kildare traded blow for blow. All the evidence suggested that the lessons of last years final had been learned and that the players would not be found wanting when it came to physically confronting the opposition. It would be a dour struggle in the mould of Dublin -Meath matches and the team that took its chances would win the prize.

### Tactics

Kildare's tactics reflected this approach. Right throughout the first half Martin Lynch - potentially Kildare's most potent attacking force - played sweeper in front of the full back line. Perhaps this could be justified as Dublin had the advantage of a blustery wind in the first half but Lynch continued to lie deep through the second half with the result that Dublin swept forward virtually unchallenged from midfield in the crucial ten minutes after half time.

Donegal defeated Dublin in last years All-Ireland Final by playing their natural open, attacking game. To win last Sunday Kildare needed to do the same. Whether they were ever capable of such a performance we will never know but we can say with some certainty that they were never equipped to win a war in the manner of Meath's victories over Dublin in the last seven years.

Loss of concentration For thirty five minutes on Sunday the dream was kept alive. But in the crucial ten minutes after half time the team died on its feet. The battle that had raged in the first half had taken its



toll. Kildare players completely lost their concentration and failed to mark up around the middle of the field. That mental toughness which sustains teams in adversity, which holds the team together when the opposition are on top simply wasn't there. Teamwork fell apart and Kildare were back to the bad old days before O'Dwyer when the Lily Whites were an easy touch. Dublin players like Jack Sheedy and Charlie Redmond smelt blood and tore holes in a bedraggled Kildare defence. Some battled on heroically and certainly Davy Dalton is one Kildare player who can look back on the game with pride. Kildare's fight back in the last fifteen

minutes gave a glimmer of hope but in all honesty Dublin were coasting even with fourteen men. An incident towards the end reflected the balance of power as Dublin's John Barr crashed through an exhausted defender's tackle and kicked a great long range point.

After three years tough training I'm sure Kildare's players were even more hungry for victory than their supporters. Maybe on Sunday that hunger to win was shot through with fear of losing. And when the prospect of defeat loomed early in the second half they simply froze. It is hard to conceive of this team coming back from the dead. Too much hope has been invested in the belief that this was the team to restore Kildare to its place among the elite of Gaelic Football. And now the sense of disappointment is too acute.

The bubble has burst. The dream is over. Kildare's supporters deserve a lot better.

### Progress On Closing Off Greenfield Lane

At a meeting of Kildare County Council held on 28th June, it was agreed unanimously to put procedures in place to have Greenfield Lane closed off to through traffic by bollards. The legal procedures are now being followed and they involve in the first instance the advertising of the decision to close off the Lane. A month will be allowed for objections. A further month is then given to the Gardai to allow them to make a report. At the end of these two months, Kildare Co. Councillors will make a final decision. Cllr. John McGinley and Minister Emmet Stagg are pleased that this matter is progressing satisfactorily.

### Moyglare Road

Minister Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Co. Engineer that the Speed Limit on the Moyglare Road has been moved out to beyond Glenashling Nursing Home. He has been further advised that additional resurfacing will be undertaken on the Moyglare Road this year. Minister Stagg and Cllr. Mc Ginley have asked that this proceed as a matter of urgency.

### Town Commission Status For Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has at the request of the Local Branch contacted the Minister for Health, Brendan Howlin T.D. and Minister of State, Eithne Fitzgerald T.D., outlining the need for Town Commission Status for Maynooth. Both are members of the Government sub-committee which is considering the question of sub-county structures and extending the range of towns under Town Commission/Urban District Council status. We will keep you advised of progress on this matter.

### **O'Neill Park**

Following requests from residents of O'Neill Park, Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have contacted Kildare Co. Council and demanded that the resurfacing of the square in O'Neill Park, be included in the Discretionary Road Grants for 1994.

### Parson St.

We are pleased to note that Parson St. has been resurfaced by the Council as promised under the 1993 Discretionary Road Block Grants. We note however that some road edges were not resurfaced and we have asked the local area engineer to attend to these to prevent water logging.

### **Tenant Purchase Scheme**

Minister of State, Emmet Stagg T.D., introduced a new Tenant Purchase Scheme for the sale of Local Authority Dwellings on July 6th. Tenants of Local Authority Houses who have held a Tenancy for at least one year may now apply to purchase the dwelling in which they live. Any Tenant requiring information on the new purchase scheme should contact Minister Stagg or Cllr. McGinley.

### **Council Housing**

Approval has been issued from the Department of the Environment to Kildare Co. Council to seek tenders for the building of 6 Council Houses at Greenfields.





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

### CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

### Question:

I would like to attend my GP during my pregnancy. Can you tell me what maternity services I will be entitled to and will I be eligible for a Maternity Grant? I don't have a Medical Card.

### Answer:

Since June 1991, all women are entitled to Maternity and Infant Care Services free of charge. An expectant mother can choose to be treated by any doctor who has an arrangement with the Health Board to provide these services. Most family doctors undertake this type of work.

Under this scheme you will be covered for 6 visits before the birth and one visit after the birth for yourself, and one visit for the baby during the first 6 weeks of life. Most Health Boards allow for additional visits where the GP considers them necessary.

The GP is entitled to charge non Medical Card holders for visits which are not related to the pregnancy.

It is necessary to apply to be accepted into this scheme before the visits start. The special application form MCA should be available from the GP or Health Board. When the approval comes from the Health Board the visits can start. Ideally these should commence around the 16th week of pregnancy.

The Maternity Grant of £8 which is payable by the Health Board is only paid to Medical Card holders.

In-patient and Out-patient services in a public hospital in respect of motherhood are completely free and you don't have to pay the daily charges.

From the 1st July the Dept. of Social Welfare will pay a grant of £200 on the birth of twins. They pay a grant of £300 or £400 respectively on the birth of triplets or quads. These grants are paid automatically when the claim form for Child Benefit is sent in.





### Visit to Kildare County Council Offices

A delegation went to Kildare Co. Council offices on Tuesday 10th August. We had an informative visit. While there, we viewed the plans for:

- Lark Homes development of town houses at the end 1. of Greenfield, i.e. opening up of the Cul de Sac in front of the four bungalows.
- 2. The plans for the development of six Council Houses in Old Greenfield (Phase 3) were viewed on Tuesday 17th in Maynooth Library.

Out of our visit to K.C.C. an emergency meeting of residents was called for Tuesday 10th (8.30 pm) in the Boys National School. A large group of residents attended this meeting. All T.D.s and Councillors were invited. Bernard Durkan T.D. attended. David Moynihan attended in place of Mr. Emmet Stagg, Minister of State and Mr. John McGinley. Also in attendance was Emer Vize from the Leinster Leader. Manus Mc Carron, with the aid of a blackboard, drew out and explained the development which is planned for the end of Greenfield (Phase 3) i.e. the Lark Homes development of town houses. This meeting was heated and voices were raised.

As we can only judge for ourselves due to our visit to K.C.C. there seems to be "a hidden agenda" for the development of Greenfield by K.C.C. We want a quiet residential area, which will be safe for our young and old to play in and live in safely. The Council's plan for Old Greenfield is to widen our lane, remove hedging and create a through-road or FASTTRACK. We were accused at this meeting of being "Scaremongers". This attitude was not supported by the residents.

It was decided to appeal to An Bord Pleanala the permission for the development granted. It was also decided to keep a close eve on council plans for Greenfield. We also expressed our severe disappointment to our public representatives for Lack of Action. Out of our decision to appeal, a fundraiser was held in the GAA club. A big thanks to all who helped sell tickets, those who supported us, and our local businesses for once again digging deep. A big thanks to Kevin Boyd and Tempo. They provided us with a night to remember. We wish to thank Damien Nangle for services provided at unknown speed and efficiency. More news on our appeal as it comes in.

### Update on bollards.

Well by now three weeks will have passed since Kildare County Council advertised the proposed closing of Greenfield Lane by bollards. We now must wait a further three weeks for a decision. We all live in hope.




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## KILCLONE LADIES GFC

## WHAT GREATER GIFT CAN YOU **GIVE YOUR CHILD?**

There are green papers, white papers, curricula old and new.....and there are children, thousands of children, who at the age of five walk into a school room to begin the process which is supposed to turn out "our greatest resource". However, many of these unfortunately are inarticulate, lacking self-discipline, self-confidence and self-expression. What a shame!

Young children are usually bright as buttons with extraordinary open minds, so much so, that sometimes it seems that it is the educational system itself that closes their minds and slows them down! Children have an extraordinary ability to absorb both experience and knowledge, so if they leave school more than 10 years later without the ability to communicate effectively or integrate into society then their education is lacking in some area.

The majority of parents want their children to "do well" at school/college, making sure they study the right subjects. In an increasing number of cases they provide funds for extra grinds, but how many parents actually stop to ask themselves - How articulate is my child? How confident are they? Can they express themselves effectively? No matter how knowledgeable your child is, if they cannot communicate, this knowledge it is of little benefit to themselves or others.

It is ironic that as jobs become fewer, interviewing for those jobs which do exist has become a growth industry. Research studies, psychological training and a battery of advice manuals exist to train and prepare the interviewer. So the job seeker faces the double odds of a tougher selection procedure for limited work available. So the more effective the communication can be done the more satisfactory the experience will be and this is where - drama technique comes in - it is taught so that the children's desire to communicate will not be frustrated by their lack of the best means with which to do so. Drama allows children to develop their individuality and personality, their intellect, imagination, creative skills and especially the mechanics of speech so that they can communicate more effectively. The ability to speak well is a major factor in achieving success - it helps overcome shyness, put thoughts together in an orderly manner, express with conviction and authority, poise and confidence.

Drama is a most enjoyable experience and an enjoyable environment provides the best platform for learning. Drama provides a wide range of other benefits; it acts as an outlet for self-expression, artistic awareness, social awareness, mental awareness, fluency of speech, self-knowledge, self-respect and gives children the opportunity to learn to co-operate with others and the ability to organise. It improves physical coordination and fitness. It provides social and moral training, helps young people mature emotionally- preparing them for adult life. What greater gift can a parent give their child?

For further information on what drama can do for your child contact Edna Horton, a Speech and Drama teacher who has held drama workshops and has prepared children for speech and drama examinations and Feiseanna. She has also produced a number of plays, including "The Importance of Being Ernest" which was staged last Christmas in the Salesian College, Celbridge and which had a cast drawn from students in both St. Wolstan's and the Salesian School.

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
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## **PRESENT THEIR 6TH PANTOMINE** "SLEEPING BEAUTY"

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
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

"Very happy with results. It was what I was hoping for". When asked what she attributed to her success, she replied "consistency, I studied hard since Christmas".


Paul Brady of Maynooth: "I was delighted. It was what I had hoped for".

## DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

STICKY CHOCOLATE CARROT SLICES Serves14

#### For the Cake

4 eggs, size 3 80z/225g light muscovado sugar 1 tbsp golden syrup grated rind 1 orange 8oz/225g ground almonds 80z/225g carrots, finely grated 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon 3 tbsp self-raising flour 4 tsp cocoa powder 2 tsp baking powder

#### For the Topping 60z/175g plain chocolate

60z/175g reduced-calorie cream cheese marzipan carrots, to decorate -

- 1. Preheat oven to Mark 5/375°F/190°C. Grease and line an 8in/20cm square shallow cake tin.
- 2. Put all cake ingredients into a bowl and beat well until evenly combined. Spoon into tin, level and bake for one hour or until a skewer comes out clean. Cover with greaseproof paper if cake overbrowns. Cool in tin for 10 minutes, turn out and cool on a wire rack.
- 3. Melt chocolate in a bowl set over a pan of hot water. Cool slightly, then beat in cream cheese. Smooth over cake. Cut cake into 14 bars and decorate each with a marzipan carrot.

CHOCOLATE AND PEAR STRUDEL Serves 6

4oz/125g milk chocolate, grated 1 tbsp drinking chocolate 4oz/125g pecan nuts, chopped and toasted 1/4 tsp ground cloves 12oz/350g filo pastry 4oz/125g butter, melted 3 pears, peeled, cored and sliced 2oz/50g raisins 3tbsp clear honey

- Preheat oven to Mark 5/3750 F/1900 C. Stir 1. chocolate, drinking chocolate, nuts and cloves together. Unroll pastry, lay 2 sheets slightly overlapping side by side on a sheet of baking parchment to form a 10 x 12in (25cm x 30cm) approx. rectangle.
- 2. Brush with butter and lay another 2 sheets of pastry on top. Brush with butter and sprinkle with a third of the chocolate and nut mixture. Repeat twice, using a double thickness of pastry between chocolate layers.
- 3. Lay pear slices along one long edge, scatter raisins over and drizzle with honey. Roll up to form a

12in/30cm log, pulling paper up to help rolling. Transfer to baking sheet and trim excess paper. Bake for 25min or until golden. Lift on to plate and slide paper out. Serve with single cream.

Variation CHOCOLATE BANANA STRUDEL Replace pears with 3 sliced bananas.

## Features

#### Car Crime

Protecting your car is habit forming, here are ten habits that Gardai recommend.

Get Into The Habit.

- 1. Lock luggage and valuables in the boot out of sight.
- 2. Etch windows with your registration number.
- 3. If fitted, turn on your alarm every time you park, if not get one fitted.
- 4. Put your aerial down and purchase security coded radio equipment where possible.
- 5. Take the keys with you and lock doors every time you leave the car.
- 6. Look out for strangers near your car, their interest may be more than casual. Call Gardai if they look suspicious.
- 7. Lockable wheel nuts are sensible.
- 8. Steering immobilisers are a good idea.
- 9. Fit a lockable fuel cap.
- 10. Never leave car documents in the car, this may assist thieves selling your car.

#### Do you feel safe and secure

When you go out at night, or to work during the day, how confident do you feel, especially if you live in a district where housebreakings are known to occur? Peace of mind can be obtained quite easily if certain fundamental precautions are taken to protect your home. Remember that everything that causes delay or danger will divert an opportunist thief - Think how would you get in if you had to force entry?

The first thing to do is survey the surrounding ground. Anything that could be used as tool or access aid should be cleared away and locked up - especially ladders. Also avoid large bushes and shrubbery right in front of windows and doors. They will effectively screen a housebreaker from discovery while he works are forcing entry. Good locks are essential on windows. Few crooks will risk climbing through broken glass but will frequently smash a hole in order to reach in and release the window catch. All types of window will have an appropriate type of lock but do remember to use them. Your front and back doors should also receive attention. They should be stout, solid-core affairs ideally fitted with a good five lever mortice lock. Additional protection can be obtained by fitting hinge bolts, metal plates to enhance the strength of the lock and door frame, spy holes to check up on callers (in conjunction with an exterior light), drop bolts and door chains.



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## **GARDENING HINTS**

Autumn is here again, but don't despair, this month can still provide spells of warm, dry weather, if we're lucky! Here are some tasks which should be carried out this month.

Lawns, Hedges, Trees and Shrubs: Sow new lawns. Mow existing lawns at medium height and re-seed worn areas. Towards the end of the month, evergreen hedging shrubs can be planted, while any new growth should be clipped early in the season. Also in this month you should plant or transplant evergreen shrubs and take semi-hard cuttings of evergreen conifers, holly and cherry laurel.

**Bulbs:** Now is the time to plant daffodil and narcissi bulbs, group them between shrubs or herbaceous plants in rock gardens or in lawns. Some of the hardy bulbs which should do well this month include *Amaryllis belladonna Colchiccum autumnale* (autumn crocus) and *Crinum x powellii*, colours in these varieties range from pink, lilac, purple, white and rose-pink.

Carnations and Pinks: Young border plants should now be planted and the growing tips pinched out.

Irises: Remove any dead leaves from the plants and burn any which exhibit signs of disease. Plant in a sunny well drained site.

Roses: Deadhead the roses as necessary and tie in new shoots on climbers and look out for any diseases

## Vegetables

**Cauliflower:** Thorough soil preparation is one of the secrets of successful cauliflower growing. Dig the soil in autumn or early winter and incorporate as much organic matter as you can. Let the ground settle before planting time, and when planted, water them well as this allows the heads to develop properly.

**Cabbage:** Spring cabbages are planted in the autumn to provide tender "spring greens" in early spring and mature heads later in the season. Just before planting rake in soil trouble preventatives. There is no need to apply a general fertilizer for Spring Cabbage as it needs to be grown slowly in a sheltered spot.

## **NEW JUNIOR & SENIOR CERTIFICATE**

#### JUNIOR CERTIFICATE

The Junior Certificate has been around for two years. This means that thousands of adolescent boys and girls have studied for it for the past four years and sat the actual exam in June 1992 and 1993.

#### **Questions Parents Are Asking**

Thousands of parents are asking questions regarding this 'new' exam, e.g. Is it just another name for the old Inter. Cert.? Have we to buy more books? Is it a better system? And will our children learn more/better?

#### A More Approachable System

The Junior Certificate is very new in relation to the Inter Certificate which it replaces and like most new and growing entities, it suffers growing pains. However, as far as 'education' is concerned it has a lot going for it. The books, e.g. History-focus on the past 1, 2, and 3 and English in Units, seem to be much more interesting, approachable and relevant. A good example of this is in the history books mentioned above; quotations from reports and documents together with magazine and newspaper articles are provided, which serve to place historical events in context and provide a sense of social history rather than just a chronology of dates; also the questions asked are designed to encourage empathy and set thought processes in motion which help the young adult think for her/ himself and evaluate courses, events and consequences which can then be applied to to-day's complex world.

### Senior Certificate

A difficulty with the senior Certificate which will be under scrutiny in June 1994 when the first Senior Certificate students sit their Leaving Certificates, is that while the Inter. curriculum changed to the more open, flexible 'student centered' Senior Certificate, the old Leaving Certificate remains the same. It would seem obvious that three years spent preparing for the Junior exam is not necessarily the best preperation for the more traditional senior exam.

#### **Expense for Parents**

A growing pain associated with the Junior Certificate, which is frustrating and expensive for parents is the battery of new books coming onto book shop shelves every year. One can understand and appreciate the quest for the perfect text book, but in the process many books are being consigned to extinction as changes in actual texts or revised editions, (even in the few years since introduction of the curriculum) puts huge limitations on the amount of second-hand books which can be recvcled.

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
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## LOTTO - SCRATCH CARD - PAYOUT

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
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## MAYNOOTH SUMMER PROJECT



#### Cancerous







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## THEATRE REVIEW

#### Once a Catholic

#### (Andrew's Lane Theatre)

For those of you who are very serious when it comes to religion (particularly those of the Catholic persuasion), a warning; this is not the play for you. Set in 1950s/60s London, this play takes a wholly irreverent look at the Catholic church, as seen through the eyes of schoolgirls from St Fatimas, a Catholic convent school. The nuns of the school do their best to teach the girls to be good Catholics by instructing them in the ways of the church and by inviting the local priest into the school to give them further guidance on how to live life, particularly where boys are concerned. Comical situations develop as the nuns try to explain such matters as sexual reproduction to the girls, using by way of example the rabbit's sexual reproduction system, deftly bypassing the question of conception. The innocence of the time is highlighted when one naive girl asks many testing questions of the nuns. She almost has them distracted and completely convinced that she is really a smart little so and so. Outside of school the Catholic church's moral principles inveigle their way into the minds of the girls so much so that they have grave concerns about their souls when they engage in kissing.

There are many scene changes which can be somewhat off putting however the cast is good, and the accents are very realistic, which quite makes up for these disturbances. This a very funny play and one which will bring back many memories for those who attended a convent school or any other religious educational establishment. The humour is based very much on the contrast between the strict moral code of the religious and the naivety of the youth of the time.

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
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## **BACK TO SCHOOL**

"Paddy", shouts his wife Mary from the kitchen, "will you come in and see how well Johnny looks in his new school uniform". Though irritated that he will miss some of the action on his TAIWAN TV. Paddy who is unemployed, enters the kitchen and observes his wife beaming with pride at their son.

#### Money for Uniform

The above scene will be similar in many houses in Maynooth. Somehow the parents will scrape the money together to ensure their offsprings will be turned out as good as the next and get as good an education as in any other country in the world.

#### Far East - Cheap Labour

Across the other side of the world, the Far East to be exact, the scene is much different. A little girl called Tinga Ling, aged 12 and her younger sister work from early morning to late at night in a sweat shop making shirts. Most of these sweat shops are financed by respectable western institutions and multinationals that once operated here in Ireland until tax concessions etc. expired, as happened to the company Paddy worked for as an electronics engineer.

#### Peer Pressure

For Mary and Paddy it is now a struggle to tog out Johnny for school. Basically it is peer pressure. Johnny must not look different. Outwardly the family must carry on as if Paddy was still working. Like many in Maynooth they will purchase the uniform in either Dawsons Men's Wear in Main Street, Head to Toe in Quinnsworth Shopping Centre or Moulin Rouge, Convent Road, Maynooth.

Mary could beam with greater pride at her son if he were wearing an all Irish made uniform and her husband was working and she did not have to buy cheap products at the expense of Tinga Ling and her sister whose working life will be exhausted by the time they reach 28 years of age, just about when Johnny will start his working life after his 3rd level education.



## Taking in Charge of Kingsbry

Following representations from Minister Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley, Kildare Co. Council have agreed to call in the Developers' Bond for Kingsbry. The Bond is for £20,000 and the estimated cost of outstanding works in the estate stand at £19,000. The Council will carry out the work themselves which includes surfacing of two cul-de-sacs, public lighting and landscaping. This work should be completed by Christmas and Kingsbry will then be taken in charge by Kildare Co. Council.

## Blocked shores - Phase 3 Greenfields

Minister Stagg has contacted Kildare Co. Council concerning the problem of blocked shores in Phase 3 Greenfields. He has asked that the shores be cleaned out and that the resulting waste be removed rather than simply dumped near the shores.

He advised that it was further agreed to resurface the laneway from Connolly's to Byrnes from Development Levies.





## DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

#### Student Grants

Councillor Catherine Murphy has condemned the failure of the Department of Education to increase maintenance payments to students in receipt of higher education grants in the coming year. In view of the low income levels which are required to qualify for these grants. This niggardly decision means that even fewer people from underprivileged backgrounds will be able to avail of further education. It also makes a mockery of the following passage from the Fianna Fail/Labour Programme for a Partnership Government.

"We regard education as the key to our future prosperity and to equality and equal opportunities for all citizens. The promotion of social justice and equity will include combining improvement of the Higher Education Grants Scheme to ensure that no student is deprived of access to third-level education because of his or her financial circumstances". By not even allowing for inflation, the government has now actually worsened the grants scheme. Yet another of the empty promises which devalue politics in the eyes of the Irish people.

Catherine Murphy has also condemned the late notification of this year's student grant conditions to the local authorities which administer the scheme. This was due to a drawn-out squabble between the Departments of Education and Finance over funding for the scheme. As a result, County Councils were only able to distribute application forms to students in mid-August, with a deadline for return at the end of the month. This is very unfair to many students who are away at this time, many of them working to get money to defray the cost of further studies.

County Councils frequently get blamed unfairly for the late processing of grant applications when the real fault lies with central government. The situation is made much worse by the fact that all County Councils are themselves understaffed due to underfunding; this means that the processing of applications is further delayed.

#### **Annual Collection**

The annual Democratic Left door-to-door collection will take place in Maynooth during September. Because of our commitment to social justice and the elimination of privilege, we are not bankrolled by the "Golden Circle" as the main political parties are (as was shown clearly during the course of the Beef Tribunal). We therefore are heavily reliant on the annual collection to fund our activities, and appeal to readers to support our collectors when they call to your door.


## Senior Football League

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


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

## Garden Oasis

Many residents of Maynooth may not be aware of the new oasis of tranquillity which has been developed off the Square, behind Lyreen House. The Eastern Health Board has established a hostel here for ex-psychiatric patients who have been discharged into the community under the care of the Board. A garden centre has been set up where all are welcome to come and look around and enjoy the beautiful plants, and admire the fishpond. The sale of plants, and of the pottery made by the residents go towards the upkeep of the hostel. This is a most welcome development. For too long, psychiatric patients have been locked up behind high walls, divorced from the community. Of course, various governments in other countries have made cynical use of the desire to return these people to the community, using it as an excuse to save money by shutting large and expensive institutions and virtually abandoning former patients to survive whatever way they can in a nonexistent "community". However, at its best, community care can be the most humane way of meeting the needs of patients for support, while allowing them to maintain their independence and dignity. As long as the motive for promoting community care is firmly rooted in a sense of what is best for the individual concerned, and is not another way of shifting responsibility and saving money, we feel that the work of the Eastern Health Board should be warmly commended.

## Tidier and tidier

The Newsletter congratulates the Tidy Towns Committee on achieving an increase of six marks in the recent Tidy Towns Competition. Granted, we have a long way to go, and we have an uphill battle all the way, with some of the world's greatest consumers of chips, burgers, ice pops, cans of minerals, and assorted other objects, living or passing through our town. These appear to think that Maynooth is just one large open-air tip heap. Specific tribute must be paid to the SES workers, who have contributed to cleaning up the town, and also have created some delightful new "pocket parks". ## COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

At the September meeting of the Community Council, we had the pleasure of Mary Cullen addressing the meeting. Mary spoke to the meeting on the Geraldine Hall, Harbour Field and Castle. It was stated at the meeting that the Community Council co-ordinate the use of the Harbour field and that anyone wishing to use it must do so through the Community Council office - 6285922. It was also stated that whoever uses the field must have their own insurance as the Community Council only holds insurance for its own uses. Mary told the meeting that she is still corresponding with the Hon. David Nall-Cain regarding new trustees for the Hall and Harbour Field. The G.A.A. and Community Council have already nominated their two trustees.

Mary also spoke about the Castle and that it is now in the ownership of O.P.W. A Community Council sub-Committee was set up to draw up plans for the future use of the Castle in the town, these plans must be part of the town tourist plan. The use of the Harbour Field at the moment is as follows:

Mon - Wed - Thurs - Fri - 3.30 p.m. - 5 p.m. - School Boys. Saturday mornings - Soccer Club U10 Boys Saturday Afternoons - G.A.A. Tues. & Thurs. 6 - 7.30 p.m. - Girls Soccer.

The Chairman thanked Mary for her contribution to the meeting. The members present were happy with the input as they now know where they stand regarding the Geraldine Hall, the Harbour Field and plans for Maynooth Castle.

## PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT MEETING 9th SEPTEMBER 1993

The Royal Canal Amenity Group has co-opted Gerry McGlinchey to represent their efforts in the town.

The Development Association are trying to co-ordinate with Kildare County Council, Monsignor Ledwith and the business people of the town to push for the implementation of the town plan, the paving and paths, lighting etc.

Our meeting with Monsignor Ledwith was very positive and a further meeting was arranged with the Monsignor and the Acting Manager of Kildare County Council. This was cancelled at the last minute due to the Acting Manager being unavailable. However, a further meeting is being planned as Monsignor Ledwith would like to see the plan implemented before September 1994 the beginning of the College celebrations.

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
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## **Community Council Notes**

## Tidy Towns "Encouraged"

Mr Richard Farrell, speaking on behalf of Maynooth Tidy Towns, said that the committee was "very encouraged" after having scored an increase in marks for the second year running. "Up to two years ago we were on a slide. We are delighted with the turn-round and this is due to the S.E.S. scheme which is doing the bulk of the work," he said.

He added that there is a great deal of sympathy for the aims of the association among the members of the public and this is reflected very well when they are fund-raising but the response had been poor when help with work parties or clean-ups was sought, "Announcements were made from the altar and in the Newsletter about work we needed help with but the interest shown wasn't good." There are some very hard-working committee members but there is a limit to the amount they can do on their own without a good deal of help. In the absence of public help the only thing that was going to make a real impression was an S.E.S. scheme, and the committee is very happy with the difference it is making.

The main problem that the town has to deal with is litter: enough people are still not sufficiently aware of the need to be tidy and a strong message has still to be put across. Richard says that residents' associations are "doing a power of work" and this is of great benefit to the appearance of the town. Vandalism is not a serious problem: some years ago trees were replaced twice so they decided it was not worth while replacing them a third time. However, flower tubs which have been put out on the pavements are largely untouched. Help being received from the County Council is not great but is improving. He believes that having the Area Engineer's office in the town is beneficial: it means that Council workers don't have far to go to do necessary work.

Overall, the feeling among the committee is one of satisfaction with receiving six extra marks. "Of course we would have liked to have got more but we think that the increase reflects fairly the extra effort that has been put in. The score of 122 out of a possible 25O also shows how much work we still have to do." Mr. Farrell would be delighted to increase public interest in the work the Tidy Towns are doing and if anyone wishes to be involved they can contact him at 11 Greenfield Drive or through Maynooth Community Council.

#### The Curragh Races





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
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## MAYNOOTH ATHLETIC CLUB

### Maynooth Athletes in top form at All Ireland Championships

Maynooth athletes scooped a total of 17 medals - 5 Gold 6 Silver and 6 Bronze - at the All Ireland Track and Field Championships at The Mardyke.

### U/10

Patrick O'Rourke scored a great sprint double in the Boys U/ 1060m and 80m and almost got a third gold as a member of the U/11 relay team which were just pipped on the line for the title and had to be content with silver. Patrick later completed his collection with a bronze in the long jump.

### U/11

In the Boys U/11 David Campbell displayed all his talents to win a total of 5 medals - gold in the long jump, silver in hurdles and with the relay team and bronze in the 600m and high jump. David gave a superb display of long jumping with every jump being close to his winning one and was only fractionally beaten in the hurdles as in the relay. Patrick King was also in form scoring a great victory in the 60m but having to settle for the second in the 80m after a blistering run in which he was inside the old record. Patrick was also a member of the relay squad. The fourth member of the relay team was Richard Leavey who also competed in the 60m just missing a place in the final.

#### Other Gold

Our other gold medallist was Karl Ennis in the Boys U/13 walk. Karl is in exceptional form at the moment and had a comprehensive victory. Also in U/13 Mary O'Sullivan picked up her first All Ireland medal with a great third place finish in the 100m and she is probably the most improved athlete in the club over the past few months. The hard luck story of the championships concerned Declan O'Rourke in the boys U/13 when he picked up an injury in his heat of the 100m but nevertheless battled his way through the final to take third place. He felt recovered enough later in the day to take his place on the County Relay team and was again unfortunate when leading comfortably with the line in sight the injury recurred and again he had to battle to get bronze. He was then unable to take part in the second day's events where he would have been hot favourite for both hurdles and 300m being Leinster champion at both. Apart from the medallists there were also other outstanding performances where medals were just missed. Sarah Commane finished 4th in 100m and 5th in 300m Girls U/ 14 and Conor Diggins had similar placings in 600m and 300m in Boys U/12 and 7th in hurdles. Philip Campbell finished 7th in Boys U/9 ball throw and Michael Gleeson 10th in U/11. The Boys U/12 relay team (Diggins, Ennis D Campbell King) finished 5th.

## MAYNOOTH MOTHERS ALONE DEVELOPMENT GROUP

## **COMHAIRLE AISINTEACHTA** AN CHANAIL RIOGA **ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP NOTES**

### SES Scheme

The scheme commenced on the 9th August with Kevin Breslin as foreman. Sixteen are currently employed. With the help of good weather the banks have been cleared, rubbish removed and seats repaired. The canal banks now really look like a linear park. A walk to Jackson's Bridge at the 14th lock is well worth the effort. From Bond Bridge you will see the engineering features where the canal was built over the Joan Slade and the Lyreen rivers, and the walled up service entrance to the College where provisions were unloaded at a small quay. The view from Jackson's Bridge is superb, while it has the unique feature of a separate arch for the horses which pulled the canal boats in its early days. It is the only such arch in the 90 mile stretch. Make this pilgrimage before the winter sets in.

### The Discovery

The SES scheme discovered a very old wall at the harbour and close to the Health Board offices. All the accumulated earth has now been removed and the wall stands exposed in its former glory. The wall had been totally covered and while the earth was being removed numerous artefacts and interesting items came to light. An elderly Maynooth resident remembered the wall before it disappeared 'to progress', and it evoked quite a number of memories for him.

### The Canal Level

Do you know what a SYPHON FEEDER is? To borrow that phrase 'It's a queer name but great stuff.' You may probably have noticed the low water level in the canal. The cause is a serious breach of the canal bank near Longwood coupled with a leaking land sluice at the 13th. lock between Maynooth and Leixlip. Both are under repair but resulted in a great loss of water. Thanks to a constant supply from a natural source, and known as a Syphon Feeder, between Jackson's Bridge and Kilcock, the level in the Maynooth area would have dropped a lot more. Fishing has not been affected, and there are many confirmed reports of great catches.



### **Miss Royal Canal 1993**

Who will succeed our current Miss Royal Canal, Emily Jennings? Well, the race has started and the selection will be made at Setanta Hotel. 
All in all it looks to be a good year, unfortunately incidents will happen, if they do they should be reported to the Students' Union and in association with the Community Council we can try our best to deal with them.

If there is anyone involved in any of the clubs around the town they should contact the Students' Union and we can organise their involvement in the field day on the 6th November.



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
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## TUG-0-WAR

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

## DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

#### **Rhubarb** Dumpling

For Crust

7 ozs. self-raising flour, 2 tablespoons breadcrumbs, a pinch of salt, 1 flat teaspoon baking powder, cold water to mix.

Prepare your rhubarb by cutting it into cubes. Put flour, baking powder and salt together into a bowl and add the crumbs. Mix in cold water with a fork, enough to make a dough you can handle - it should not be too sticky. Turn out on to a floured board, and with floured hands, pat out into an oblong. Cut off a small piece for the base and one for the top. Pat or roll the rest out into a long strip or two shorter ones to fit around the insides of your bowl. Grease it first.

Pat out one of the smaller pieces for a round for the bottom. Fill the alternate layers of cut-up rhubarb and sugar (or sweetener, needing less). Pour in cold water to come halfway up the filling. Have the top layer of sugar (or sweetener), pat out the remaining bit of dough for the top and gently turn the sides over to meet it. Press well together and cook in the usual way.

## **Gaelic Beef**

One lb. lean stewing beef in approximately 1" cubes, 1 oz. butter

1 oz. flour, half pint beer,  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint whipped cream, 1 pint brown stock (made by mixing a brown stock cube with a pint of water), 4 ozs. sliced onion,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz castor sugar, salt and pepper.

Pass the meat through the flour, which has been seasoned with salt and pepper. Quickly colour the meat all over in the hot butter until slightly brown, and place in a casserole dish. Fry the onions until lightly brown and add to the meat. Mix the beer, stock and castor sugar together and bring to the boil, stirring all the time. Pour over meat and onions and cover with a tight-fitting lid. Cook in a fairly moderate oven, 350°F., Gas Mark 4, 180°C., for approximately  $2^{1}/2$ . 3 hours. Just before serving, whip the cream until it stands in very soft peaks, but not stiff and float it on top of the beef. Serves four.

As you can see, the cream is an extra - to be omitted if you wish. But the rest is mouth-watering with creamed potatoes, grilled tomatoes and buttered peas!

## Liver and Bacon Hot Pot

227g/1/2 lb. liver, 2 onions, 1 tsp flour, water or stock, 2-3 slices streaky bacon, 680g/1<sup>1</sup>/2 potatoes, <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp pepper, <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp salt

Wash, dry and cut up liver and roll in seasoned flour. Dice bacon. Peel and slice onions and potatoes. Put a layer of potatoes in a greased casserole. Then cover with some chopped onion and bacon and liver. Season to taste. Repeat layers of potatoe, onion, meat and finish off with potatoes. Add stock to come half way up casserole. Cover and cook  $2-2^{1}/2$  hours at 190<sup>O</sup>C/360<sup>O</sup>F (gas 4).


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## **FILM REVIEWS**

## The Snapper (Savoy)

Set in Dublin, this is the story of Sharon, her family and friends and the events and disruptions which take place when she becomes pregnant. As Sharon is determined to keep the identity of the father a secret, people are left wondering who he might be. So when an unlikely person turns out to be the possible father there are ructions amongst Sharon's family and friends. But as Sharon isn't telling, everyone is left to wonder who really is the father?

## Much Ado About Nothing (Savov)

This is a romantic Shakepearean comedy, in which confirmed bachelor Benedick, played by Kenneth Brannagh is unknowingly tricked into falling in love with Beatrice, a feisty and witty woman, believing that she is madly in love with him. Meanwhile, Beatrice (Emma Thompson) who is also strongly anti-marriage, is also fooled into falling for him, thinking that he is totally besotted by her. A second plot within the film involves the Romeo and Juliet type misadventures of a young couple who are planning to marry, but who find their plans go very much awry.

## In The Line Of Fire (Savoy)

Clint Eastwood stars as an ageing secret service agent, who asks to be assigned to protective duty of the US President during a presidential election campaign, after he learns of an assassination threat to the President's life. However, when the would-be assassin begins to play a cat and mouse game with him, he finds himself lagging one step behind. So his objective becomes to get to the assassin before the assassin gets to the President.

## GARDA TALK

#### Special Effort for Children

The Gardai have responsibility for protecting all citizens, but we make a special effort to ensure that children should be particularly safe and free from all types of criminal abuse. In achieving this goal it is vital that adults appreciate this concern and that children themselves understand that the Gardai are there to help them.

Parents and guardians should keep the following set of guidelines in mind for the protection of children:

- 1. Keep informed of their whereabouts/company and expected time of return home.
- 2. Remember that children are always safer playing in groups than alone.
- 3 Make sure that they do not play in secluded or concealed places.
- 4 Ensure that they do not involve unknown adults in their games or activities.

While the dangers of strangers are often discussed, many abusers of children are actually known to their victims. So before entrusting children into the care of adults, satisfy yourself that they are trustworthy and reliable. In this respect the following advice should prove helpful: 1.

Use recommended babysitters.

- 2. Be alert to danger signs, for example, if your child exhibits strange or reluctant behaviour in the presence of a particular adult.
- 3. Warn children against talking to adults they do not know.

Threats or bribes are frequently used to silence a child, but if you have any doubts, always listen to the child. Intuition should tell you if something is troubling them. Be receptive to any discussion and never doubt any disclosures; abuse is very difficult to reveal for fear of disbelief or rejection. If your child does disclose abuse, the Gardai recommend that parents/ guardians try to remain calm as over-reaction may reinforce the child's bad feelings of guilt. Seek help from any of the following:

- 1. Local Social Worker, who has access to the service of a psychologist.
- 2. Your family doctor.
- 3. The Rape Crisis Centre where excellent counselling for children is provided.
- 4. For legal advice call to your local Garda station; specially trained members, male and female, will be assigned to such sensitive cases and you can be assured of a sympathetic hearing; calling to the Gardai and . seeking advice will not in itself lead to a subsequent court case; the Gardai will appraise you of all the relevant agencies and confidentiality will be assured.

Cead Mile Failte to Denis and we all wish him many happy years of contentment and fulfilment with the community in Maynooth. So that identifies the "New Guard in town" for you.

## **GARDENING HINTS**

The growing season from March to September will always be the busiest time for the flower gardener, but October to February should not be an inactive or uninteresting period of the year. It is during these five months, when the weather is occasionally kind, that the autumn clearing up, the winter digging, any alterations to the lay-out of the garden, rose planting etc. are best carried out. These shorter day activities maintain the flower garden in good condition and incidentally, also keep the gardener fit!

If your lawn suffers from moss, it should be raked and spread evenly with lawn sand. If no rain occurs this should be watered in within 48 hours.

Now is the time to plan your garden so that you can sit back and admire it next spring! Clear beds, manure and fork over for reception of wallflowers, polyanthus, forget-me-nots, arabis and aubretia to associate with tulips and daffodils in spring.

## Pruning Conifers

If you are surrounded by a hedging of conifers, the favourite being the Leyland Cypress, now is your last chance to prune them in order to keep their height under control. Remember that these trees grow 4 ft per year and can withstand hard pruning as I can testify having at last pruned my own trees which I had unfortunately let grow to a height of 10 feet or more. Not only did they block out the neighbours, but they also blocked out the light, the sun (the wha'?) and the street lights. Remember when pruning conifers that the top should be tapered, that is the top of the trees must be narrower than the base. A wedge shape is the best way to describe it. Light can get at the lower branches if this shape is created. This will encourage the branches lower down to grow and prevent the base of the tree becoming bare.

#### Winter Colour in the Garden

All should not be gloom and doom in the garden in autumn and winter and there's nothing like a bit of colour in the garden to brighten the days and lift the spirits. This is generally no problem during the spring and summer but many gardens face a pretty colourless winter. This need not be so as there are many evergreen shrubs available such as the Spotted Laurel (Acuba japonica) and Elaeagnus. The Spotted Laurel has yellow splashes on green shiny leaves. Plants are male or female - red berries appear on female bushes if a male (plant) is nearby. These shrubs are beloved by flower arrangers. Another favourite with flower arrangers is the Elaeagnus pungens 'Malculata' which will brighten up any garden with its evergreen leaves splashed with bright yellow. Both these shrubs can be planted in any reasonable garden soil and need little pruning.

## **Christmas Hyacinths**

Indoor Hyacinths are great to have around Christmas when they can be used either for yourself or as ideal Christmas gifts. If you want these to flower in time for Christmas, they should

now be planted in suitable conditions indoor i.e. the pot should be placed in a cool dark ventilated place (temp. 40<sup>0</sup>-50<sup>0</sup>F.) until growth commences. When sprout is approximately 3" high the pot should be brought into a warm room and kept in subdued light. When the flower begins to show colour, place in a cooler spot for long-lasting beautiful blooms.

#### Vegetable Garden

The last of the potatoes having been lifted and beet, carrots. etc. safely stored, the ground should be well dug, trenched and manured. Cut down globe artichokes and withering asparagus. Endive may be lifted and planted in a cold frame.

Cauliflower seeds can now be sown (for wintering in frames), lettuce (under cloches), sweet peas (in pots in cold frames).

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
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#### HOUSE PRICES - VARIATION

#### Residents' Associations are Vital

When it comes to achieving the top price for your house one factor seems to have a huge bearing: how active your residents' association is. This has come across very clearly when we recently surveyed the difference in prices of similar-sized houses from one estate to another in Maynooth. If you have a healthy residents' association it is strongly reflected in the tidy appearance of the housing estate - and that's what makes a big difference.

#### **Keeping Interest Alive**

The time when associations are at their strongest is when housing estates are new, and when the builder is still present in the area. For a start, the couples are younger, their investment is enormous and they are very keen to get value for their money. If the builder is still erecting houses in their area this increases the urgency to have all matters attended to before he leaves because everyone is aware how difficult it is to get builders to come back. As the estate becomes more established and the residents grow older the enthusiasm for residents' associations slackens and this can have a very detrimental effect if you are thinking of moving.

#### Low Prices

Other matters having a bad effect on prices is an over-abundance of noisy student houses or people seeking a quick sale letting their houses go at a lower price. If too much of the latter occurs in one area then that estate will become known as lowerpriced.

#### Healthy Residents' Association

The clean appearance of an individual house and the extras that may be going with it are always important factors in determining the final price, but spending a lot of money on a house in an untidy housing estate could prove to be in vain. You have to make sure that everything is looking good outside your front garden as well. So speak to your neighbours about it - having a strong, healthy residents' association which would include students is of vital importance.

#### MARATHON WATCH

On a nice fine morning running is such a pleasure, lost in your own thoughts, battling against the terrain. Around Maynooth you have the high church spire as a reassuring focal point to guide you back in. After a run you can feel uplifted due to an increase of endomorphins in your system resulting in a sense of elation.


One man who knows the highs of Marathon running is Tom McDonnell, Proprietor of The Sports Locker at Maynooth Shopping Centre. Tom in his hey day was running up to 120 miles per week for ten years. The highlight of his career was winning the N.A.C.A.I. National Marathon Championships in 1977, '78 and '79. His best time was 2 hrs. 23 mins. A member of Dunboyne AC, where he has been involved in coaching over the years, he is now retired from running due to injury.

Tom was a National Development Officer with the N.A.C.A.I. and was involved in the setting up of the local Athletic Club. He stated that people involved in endurance training would need to supplement their diet with appropriate vitamins. "Needless to say a person will not get the best out of themselves if they are not minding their health". He stated that cigarettes are out and that no alcohol should be consumed three to four days prior to competing. Tom was involved in coaching athlete Gerry Ryan for many years, who went on to compete in the 1500 metres in the 1988 Olympic Games.

He is currently advising and available to help other athletes running in the Dublin City Marathon. Tom is also involved in coaching and advising local man Bobby King, now living in Kilcock, who this year won two European Championship silver medals for walking in the Veteran's Category. He is also currently Senior All-Ireland Champion in the same event.

According to Tom, in athletics you build from year to year and the training you put in one year bears fruit the following season. An example of this was Mary Peters, who in the Heptathlon event, is the only Irish woman to have won an Olympic Gold Medal. Mary was aged 32 years and was competing in her fourth Olympics. Tom feels it is a shame that so many youngsters give up athletics before they reach their full potential, which is particularly evident in Maynooth. He commended the organisers of Maynooth Athletic Club for their success at national level and for their commitment to young people and recommended that more youngsters and helpers should join up this Autumn.

These days road runners are buying reflective gear for evening training and should exercise great care on the roads. A meeting of all local Dublin City Marathon runners will be held in Caulfields Meeting Room on Wednesday, 13th October.

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#### MAYNOOTH CANCER BREAKTHROUGH

It's always wonderful to hear of a breakthrough in the fight against cancer. The news is even sweeter when the breakthrough has taken place locally. Such was the case last month when it was reported that a team based in St. Patrick's College and headed by Dr. Tom Cotter developed a system for manipulating "suicide" genes in cancer cells.

The value of the team's work has received significant international recognition and has been granted more than £330,000 by the EC to continue their research in the biology department of the college. It was explained that "suicide" genes destroy themselves and cause cancer cells to die and this could considerably slow down the spread of cancer.

Dr. Cotter's wife Catherine is also part of the six-person team and they live in Celbridge with their two children, Sean and Laoise. The work on the project has been taking place for about the last four years and the team is delighted both with the award and the recognition their work has received. Their research has been reported on widely, having featured in "Time" Magazine among other publications.

More will have been revealed by the time you get your "Newsletter" as it is expected that when the Taoiseach opens the Callan Science Block in the college further details of the work would be given.

#### More Focus On Maynooth

St. Patrick's College was again the focus of national attention last month when the Minister for Tourism, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, addressed a seminar on tourism there. He expressed his belief that the season could be extended by two months, one month on either end, thereby raising £2 billion over the next six years. He said that this is our best growth industry, having grown by £500 million in the last four years to bring in £1.23 billion and created 25,000 additional jobs. Maynooth lecturer, Proinsias Breatnach voiced concern that the Irish economy was becoming too dependent on tourism for employment which he said is more inclined to create seasonal or part-time work rather than full-time work.

#### **NEW PRESIDENT OF STUDENTS' UNION**

#### Them and Us

Mr. Joe Donnelly, the new Students' Union President in Maynooth, is not at all satisfied with one aspect of life as far as students are concerned: he believes they are not well enough integrated into the community in which they live. If they were better involved with the people of the town it would be to everybody's benefit. Without better involvement an unfortunate situation of "them and us" arises, and that is no use to anyone.

#### **Need for Integration**

The majority of students are living away from home and that is enough for many of them to feel very disorientated. If they are cast into a separate camp by the local community then that feeling of disorientation is greatly increased and usually causes problems for both sides. They will have an affinity in their common feeling of rejection and may tend therefore to confine

themselves to only looking after their own needs. This causes deprivation to both sides of any town where there is a large body of students. In Maynooth, where students make up 40% of the total population, it is hugely wasteful and should be avoided at all costs. Where a gap in communication exists antagonisms can come about and this can lead to both sides taking selfish stances: they can actually sometimes be decidedly unhelpful towards one another.

#### **Getting Together**

The attitude of Mr. Donnelly is that something must be done to improve the situation and a few weeks back he revealed some of his plans. On a date still to be fixed in the first week in November he hopes to organise a Students' Union Field Day and he sees this as an opening effort to bring students and the local community closer together. Among the list of events to be included on the day is a canoe race on the canal (with the cooperation of RCAG), juggling, drama, etc.

#### Students/Residents' Association

He would like to see a situation evolving in the future where students would involve themselves with residents' associations. This would help the residents and students to reach a better level of understanding than exists at present. Some residents have very understandable cause for complaint if they have a number of noisy students' houses in their vicinity and the students may be very aware of the resentment they are thus creating.

#### **Economic Benefits**



#### **PRESENTATION NUNS - ON THE MOVE**

#### **Original Move**

At the instigation of a French priest by the name of Fr. Anglade a number of Presentation nuns moved from Terenure to Maynooth in 1823 with a brief to educate the poorer children of Maynooth.

#### **Moving Again**

Exactly 170 years later the Sisters are on the move again but thankfully not from Maynooth.

All five Sisters, Sr. Aquinas, Sr. Alphonsus, Sr. Paschal, Sr. Cecelia Anne, and Sr. Lelia moved out of the convent in August to take up temporary residence in St. Anne's Hostel and hopefully will move to their new permanent two house home in Castlebridge in time for Christmas dinner in December of this year.

#### Home

The convent for many Sisters has been home. Sr. Alphonsus, who has resided 54 years in the convent is heartbroken upon leaving. She remembers when there was as many as thirty Sisters living in the convent.

Sr. Aquinas, who has spent 22 years there, felt it was no longer practical to keep such a large house. The upkeep and general maintenance could not be justified for only five Sisters. They had hoped to build a smaller dwelling on their grounds. Unfortunately Kildare County Council in their wisdom put up so many obstacles to the idea that after nine months of negotiating they have given up and opted to move to Castlebridge.

#### Sisters' Contribution to Kildare



With only one laundrette, like Telecom Eireann they have a monopoly and like all monopolies the customer always loses out.

When leaving a bag of washing in Ranelagh and after the bag had been weighed I would always know exactly how much I would have to pay on my return (usually it was £4.50). Not so in Maynooth. On three occasions I have left my washing in and on my return, instead of expecting to pay around £5 I find myself having to fork out between £7 and £8. When asked why I was being charged extra the answer was because of the different colours. I never had such a problem in Ranelagh. Everything was thrown in together - socks, shirts, towels - the lot.

Recently students who also use this service extensively have told me they have had similar experiences.



### **ACCOMMODATION - RENT**

By the time this issue will be in circulation the students will be about to embark on another year of study in St. Patrick's. Many will find themselves paying at least an extra 20% in rent. It has all to do with supply and demand. Too few houses/accommodation; 4000 students.

Students, in order to minimise this high rent hike, will be prepared to almost live in dormitory conditions. Landlords/landladies are asking as much as £200 to £250 p.w. per house. The more students that can be crammed into each house the better off financially will each student be - but this will be at the expense of comfort which is conducive to studying.

Further, because of these large numbers descending upon Maynooth many others seeking accommodation are faced with very high rents.

Another cause for higher rent charges in the area is the number of Social Welfare recipients. Speculators/landlords/landladies aware that a large proportion of rent is paid by the state up the price for a double room at say £40 p.w. The Social Welfare may pay up to £30 depending upon individual circumstances. Some of the smaller rooms one couldn't swing a cat. Charges of as much as £35 p.w. are not uncommon. The whole system is being milked by the speculator.

For an individual living in Maynooth in full employment being charged such exorbitant prices is nothing short of scandalous.

#### BACK TO SCHOOL

September that dreaded month. The one month in the year that spells trouble in every way. You have gone and treated yourself and your family to a well deserved holiday during the summer knowing quite well that September is only around the corner. In September there are school uniforms to be bought, there are school books to be bought and God knows what other hidden extras to be catered for. You wonder where the money is going to come from, and this year, even Telecom do not help by sticking their mean hands deeper into your empty pockets.

However, putting the financial aspect aside, if that's possible, an even greater human trauma unfolds in September. At the entrance to the school, parents and their little offspring must say goodbye. Although it is only for a few hours and they are in the best possible hands, for some little ones it is like the end of the world. Indeed for the Mammies it is also heart rendering - the "baby" is no longer a baby their little darlings are growing up and soon will be less dependent.

The trauma for the children on their first day at school has been greatly reduced by introducing them to the school scene with their parents. for one day in June prior to September. Indeed I was informed by Mrs Brennan at Moyglare Primary that many were looking forward to their first day, and were quite excited with the prospect of starting school. However, a little incident occurred about a week later when I arrived to take a group photograph. A young mother had just left her son into the classroom and as we walked away towards the main door she commented how her son loved being at school. She no sooner had uttered the words when around the corner came her son crying his eyes out and begging to go home with Mammy......

St. Michans 4 - Maynooth Town 3



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
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## tide the effort was too much and we conceded goals at vital stages of the game to suffer an easy defeat.






#### ACTIVE AGE GROUP

#### **Researching New Services**



#### Liffev Valley Branch

The IWC has a nationwide series of branches to cater for its approx 4,500 members, of which about 140 live in the Liffev Valley area. This branch covers parts of Dublin West and Kildare.

Every year the Liffey Valley Branch holds about 18-20 events which are open to the general public, with non IWC members being particularly welcome. With the exception of coach trips all the events are free. Activities are usually organised for September to November and from January to June, with a break in December and in July and August.






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#### MAYNOOTH PUPILS VISIT GAIETY THEATRE

#### Maynooth Post Primary Tour to Italy



#### FROM MAYNOOTH TO MANHATTAN

'Home was the Hero' was the atmosphere in Brady's The Clock House, Maynooth on Saturday 25th September as young Jimmy McMahon rubbed shoulders with friends and locals having a well earned pint of beer. Jimmy, son of Paddy and Norah McMahon of Mulhussey Maynooth had just returned from a gruelling professional boxing campaign in New York, which saw him clock up thirteen successive wins on the trot.

The previous Friday night, over a hundred local supporters had travelled to the Basketball Arena in Tallaght to welcome Jimmy home and see him beat professional English boxer Dave Lovell with competence and style. It was a fight which McMahon won with commanding and aggressive punching, constantly pinning his opponent on the ropes. The only time his defensive shield was breached was in the fourth round of the six- round contest, when in a moment of over confidence and brashness he took a heavy blow from Lovell. However, the strong and dogged McMahon fought back all the harder and won the fight outright on points.

#### Come On Jimmy!

The Maynooth contingent, which filled a full section of the arena were ecstatic and thrilled, having constantly roared 'Come on Jimmy''. It was with pride and satisfaction that they all headed back to Maynooth especially those in the back of Micky's bus. For most of the fans it was the first fight they had ever attended. Yet as Martin Tarpey said, "We were all experts".

Many of Brady's clientele know Jimmy very well, for it was Noel Brady who gave him his first job. Locals such as Nicholas Donovan and P.J. Bennett have followed his career very closely. P.J. recalls going to fights with him and how the young teenager looked so light and small that you would hardly think that he would be able to lift a pint on to the counter.

How this six foot, twenty four year old champion fighter rose Ben Hur-like from among the small farmers of the Kildare/ Meath border is a phenomenal success. It is the stuff dreams are made of. Indeed, Jimmy's interest in boxing began when as a young boy he watched fights on television, involving the likes of Mohammed Ali and George Foreman. From the age of six he was a wild, tough lad, well able to fight his own battles.

His career began when aged 11 years, Willie Quinn, who worked with his father Paddy at the time, brought him to Kilcock Boxing Club for training. It was the 'one to one' combat of the game which attracted Jimmy to boxing. In underage boxing with Kilcock and Enfield clubs, he won the Kildare Championship and four league titles. This was to signal the potential of the youngster who went on to win the Leinster Youth Championship in 1985 and 1986. At this time he was not taking boxing too seriously as he worked away in Brady's. He decided to hit the States and New York where his brother Michael worked as a foreman in construction. There, he saw a lot of fighting and people and trainers were telling him that he could do something with his talent. He met up with Jim

McDonagh formerly of Enfield Boxing Club and Gleeson's Gym became, and still is, the centre of this young man's life. Another man who was quick to recognise Jimmy's ability was Terry Atlas, trainer and manager, who also discovered boxer Mike Tyson. Before his death he passed Jimmy's management on to Joe Baffi, of the Baffi Brothers Training Camp, saying, "Mind this lad, he is going to be good".

#### **Golden Gloves**

Jimmy's career as an amateur fighter really took off and he went on to win the Empire State Games in the welterweight division, (which is under 11 stone). Jimmy usually fights at about 10 and a half stone weight. He was twice a finalist in the Golden Gloves Boxing Competition. He only just lost out in a suspect split decision, against the run of the fight, to the amazement of his followers and many commentators. His disappointment led him to consider other options and he decided to go professional, thus ending five years of American amateur boxing, from 1986 to 1991.

Around this time he was being offered money to fight and he competed against some Irish team members, beating Patrick Keogh, Irish Champion in junior middle weight.

As a professional the man from Mulhussey took on Manhattan with a dream start winning thirteen fights on the trot with six knockouts and no losses.

Jimmy continues to train in Gleesons Gym, New York, where he spars with top class boxers and some World champions. He gave me an insight into the boxing life where you literally just "sleep, eat and train". You have to sacrifice a lot and winning is everything. According to Jimmy boxing is 80% mental. You have to be so mentally prepared that pain doesn't bother you. Boxing is a tough game and pain makes you fight right back.

His next target is the European Welterweight Title if the right offer comes along. If not - it's no big deal. If he wins the American Boxing Association belt he will also be eligible for a shot at the World Title. That's all further down the road as Jimmy sees himself spending another four to five years in the game.

Speaking of the Tallaght Match he said "The support was unbelievable, it felt good to come back and get a win under my belt". Jimmy is back in the States after a two week break and we wish him every success with his future plans. One thing for sure, this pleasant and down to earth young man has lost none of the values of friendliness and helpfulness of his upbringing and is doing his family, Kilcloon and his hometown proud.

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#### DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE A Centuries Old Recipe For Christmas Plum Pudding

8 ozs.breadcrumbs	6 eggs	
8 ozs. brown sugar	1 large grated cooking apple	
8 ozs. raisins	1 level teaspoon mixed spice	
8 ozs. sultanas	2 tablespoons treacle	
8 ozs. currants	1/2 teaspoon each of grated 8	
ozs. chopped suet	çinnamon and nutmeg	
4 ozs. flour	<sup>1/</sup> 4 teaspoon each of ground	
4 ozs. glace cherries cloves and ginger		
6 ozs. finely chopped mixed	1 peel $\frac{1}{2}$ pint stout	
3 ozs. roughly chopped alm	onds <sup>1</sup> /4 teaspoon salt	

Sift the flour with the salt and spices; add to the breadcrumbs and mix in the sugar. Sift well, add the suet, then the cleaned prepared fruit, almonds and grated apple. Warm the treacle slightly and add to the well-beaten eggs. Stir into the dry mixture. Mix well, cover and stand for 24 hours.

Beat well, add in stout. Mixture should be soft enough to drop off the spoon but not soft enough to glide off. If a little extra liquid is needed to get this consistency, add a little water carefully.

Divide equally between three 3-pint bowls. Cover with greaseproof paper, then with a scalded and floured cloth. Tie down securely. Bring ends of pudding cloth back over the bowl and tie to form a secure handle for lifting up puddings when cooked.

Steam for seven hours. Lift up and allow to drain before storing. Allow another two full hours' steaming before serving. Have hot water come up only three-quarters the way to the top of pudding basin. Keep an even steady heat all through cooking. Each pudding is sufficient for 5 to 6 average servings, so, if you want only one such pudding, use one-third of all the above measurements of ingredients.

By the way, beef suet is easier to chop if a little sugar or flour is added to it.

**Boiled Crubeens (Pig's Feet)** (Crubeens is the Irish name for pig's trotters.

6 pig's trotters (from the hind leg) 12 peppercorns 1 onion stuck with 6 cloves Salt 1 carrot 1 bunch parsley 1 bay leaf 1 sprig thyme

Throw everything into a pot and cover with water. Bring slowly to a boil and simmer for 3 hours. Eat hot or cold. 2 servings.

Crubeens should always be eaten with your fingers. They lose half their magic if you attack them with a refined knife and fork.

#### **Typical Irish Broth**

908g/2 lb boiling beef or a fowl 2 medium onions 3400ml/6 pints water 2 medium carrots 113g./4 oz., pearl barley 57g/2 oz. oatmeal few stalks celery pepper and salt

Put meat or fowl in cold water with pepper, salt and barley. Bring to the boil and simmer. Prepare the vegetables and add to the meat together with the oatmeal. Simmer for about  $2^{1/2}$  hours.

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
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#### **FIELD DAY**

#### GARDA TALK

#### **Combatting Violence Against Women:**

In an ever changing society, crimes against women and children are on the increase. Some women may be hesitant to report acts of physical or sexual violence but the Gardai wish to assure everyone that there are ample services in place to assist them and process effectively all complaints. Reporting a matter to the Gardai does not necessarily lead to a court case as many citizens simply approach the Gardai for advice on the options open to them and the availability of relevant agencies. Outlined hereunder is a synopsis of the appropriate information identified with this subject.

#### Who can be Raped and who Commits Rape?

Anybody can be raped at anytime, anywhere. Women who are raped often know the person who raped them. He can be their husband, boyfriend, partner, neighbour or a complete stranger.

#### If You Are Raped:

If you are raped remember at all times that you are not to blame. The rapist is the person, who commits the crime, NOT YOU.

#### Help Is Available 24 Hours a Day:

If you are raped or subjected to an indecent assault help is immediately available to you from the Gardai and other agencies such as the Rape Crisis Centre 24 hours a day.

#### How The Gardai Can Support You:

At any time, day or night, trained Gardai can arrange for you to receive medical care and advice. Advice is widely available to you on the many different counselling and support services. If you are the unfortunate victim of one of those crimes, the priority is to look after you and trained members of the force are in place at every stage of the investigation.

#### What Is Domestic Violence?

If anybody in the home causes or even threatens or attempts to cause harm to you - it is a crime. This type of crime not only includes physical harm but also includes mental cruelty and sexual abuse.

#### Who Can Be Affected by Domestic Violence?

Domestic violence against women is a far more common social problem than many people might think. It's a crime which can affect children as well. A child who witnesses violence between parents may learn to accept it as a way of life and at a later stage may become involved in similar behaviour himself.

#### Who Commits Domestic violence?

As a general rule it is a husband or partner who commits this shattering crime against women. To the public he may appear to be a warm, loving person and a most law abiding citizen. Often such an individual will absolutely refuse to accept that he is the person responsible for this destructive, turbulent behaviour. In instances such persons believe that their abusive conduct in the home is justified.

#### If You Are Subjected To Domestic violence:

It's imperative that you know that no one - nobody at all - has the right to assault you. You can stop it immediately by getting the assistance of the Gardai and other agencies such as Women's Aid.

#### Again Help Is Available 24 Hours A Day:

If you suffer from domestic violence professional Gardai will give immediate advice and guidance. At your request a female Garda can be made available to support you throughout such a traumatic experience. Similar to rape, the Gardai can put you in contact with other organisations, who can give you counselling, advice or refuge.

The Gardai Can Support You In The Following Way:

The Gardai will advise you on the Agencies who can support and counsel you in seeking Protection/Barring Orders from the District Court. If you are not married and are the subject of violence you can still apply for a Court Order to prevent further abuse.

#### Save All Evidence You Can:

Women who are subjected to family violence often feel isolated, vulnerable and afraid. Where possible, you should save all evidence of attack, which may in course assist the Gardai in effecting arrest and prosecution.

#### Garda Procedures:

If the victim does choose to make a formal complaint the investigating Gardai will take a written statement outlining details of the ill-treatment etc. and identifying the culprit. A Garda file is then submitted for instructions whether to prosecute or not. Assuming prosecutions ensue the matter is dealt with expeditiously in the District Court. More serious cases are dealt with in the higher Circuit Court.

#### **Protection/Barring Orders:**

Victims may apply for Protection Orders to the local District Court Clerk and this process eventually progresses to a Barring Order, which effectively prohibits the spouse entering the family home. Those later orders only apply to married couples. Common Law relationships are not afforded protection under the Protection of Spouses and Children Act and must therefore resort to civil remedy.

## Features

The Gardai wish to stress that any victim who requires advice on family law matters will be afforded same in the strictest confidence.

#### Halloween:

We ask all parents to ensure that they know the whereabouts of their children (small and not so small) on Hallowe'en night. Unfortunately many people suffer at the hands of pranksters and some of the supposed to be jokes have unfortunate consequences. Fireworks and bangers are illegal and dangerous. We encourage parents to organise events and ensure that they are properly supervised and thus play your part in minimising annoyance. The Gardai expect that all nocturnal activities (including bonfires) terminate at a reasonable hour, but certainly not later than 10pm.. We appeal for your support and cooperation.

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#### GARDENING HINTS

#### Flower Garden

This is the best time to plant roses, trees, herbaceous plants and shrubs. Continue to plant bulbs in beds and borders. Take up dahlias when cut down by frost. Plant crowns of lily-of the valley. Divide herbaceous plants and rearrange borders.

Patio containers and tubs should finally be cleared of the summer leftovers. If you're looking for something to put in your containers a popular plant for this winter is the ornamental cabbage and when planted in the centre of a tub or container and surrounded by winter pansies, can look very interesting and colourful.

In order to protect herbaceous plants from frost, cover them with a blanket of straw, bracken or peat. Put a sheet of glass, supported on two bricks, over alpines that suffer from winter damp. Apple and pear trees should be pruned once they have lost their leaves.

Remove as much debris from the garden as possible - leaves and anything that could harbour garden pests during cold weather.

#### Lawn Order - Mowers away

The lawn should have received its final cut for the winter and mowers put away for winter storage. Find a dry place and put the machine on a raised board to keep it off the ground. Before putting the machine away for storage, petrol and oil should be drained and the sparking plug should be removed and cleaned and fine oil sprayed in the cavity before replacing. With regard to hand mowers, these should be thoroughly cleaned and metal surfaces should be wiped over with a well soaked oily rag. Check all nuts and bolts; replace worn ones and tighten those that are loose. If your mower needs a professional service, now is the time to organise it - don't leave it until spring.

#### Vegetable Garden

Plant rhubarb. Lift parsnips after frost. Draw out a rough plan of present crops and arrange next season's in rotation. Cover rhubarb and seakale with strawy manure. Plant fruit trees.

#### Wildlife in the Garden

To encourage birds such as blackbirds into your garden, leave windfalls on the ground for the birds to feed on. Set up bird feeding tables and hang peanuts in containers for blue tits and sparrows. If you want to continue feeding bluetits etc. until their young arrive, peanuts can be bought in large quantities in most garden centres and these work out much cheaper than buying in small quantities in say, supermarkets. Remember to hang containers and to place feeding tables away from bushes and trees to prevent the local cat population using your garden as the local take-away.

#### JOE DOLAN AT THE SETANTA 9TH OCTOBER 1993

This show should be called **THE JOE DOLAN EXPERIENCE.** J. D. and his eight piece backing band hadn't got beyond the opening three words of 'Good Lookin' Woman' (When God Created....), when the fans were on their feet and that's where they stayed, with 'More And More And More' throughout the show eventually ascending chairs, tables and the stage. ## Features

#### **NEW SCIENCE BLOCK LAUNCH**

The opening of the new Science Block in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, on September 28th last proved to be one of enormous celebration and of great historic value. Due recognition was given to the important milestone by An Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds, presiding at the official opening ceremony. "Eighteen months ago I was here to lay the foundation stone for this great facility, and now it gives me tremendous pleasure to be here to preside at its opening." The College has won great international admiration for the important work it has done in the scientific field for a number of years.

The new £7.3m. Callan Science Building, financed with E.C. structural funds, was blessed by Cardinal Cahal B. Daly immediately after the opening. The building is named after Rev. Professor Nicholas Callan, who invented the induction coil at Maynooth in the early 19th century and patented the Maynooth battery.

The foundations for the building were laid on 24th June, 1992. It is the first purpose-built science building to open in the college's 200th anniversary year. It will accommodate 730 students, 280 in computer science and 450 in biology, at all levels, ranging from first year undergraduates to doctoral level. The building will have an educational infrastructure which will have the facilities to produce young graduates so well trained as to become critical elements in Ireland's industrial development. It will also provide key facilities for advanced research programmes in its designated laboratories whilst facilitating the ongoing work of Dr. Tom Cotter and Professor Martin Downes in their development of a suicide gene designed to destroy themselves and also cause cancer cells to die.

The two principal guests at the opening, An Taoiseach, Albert Reynolds, and Cardinal Cahal B. Daly were welcomed by Monsignor Miceál Ledwith, President of Maynooth College. Msgr. Ledwith spoke of the extensive development of the north campus, including a library, student apartments and restaurant and sports complex (incorporating the Student Union offices) completed in the last decade together with phase one of the Science Faculty and the construction of a new Students' Centre, which is currently under way.

With the College being one of the highest employers in Co. Kildare, this new development will be a great asset to the community.

#### **REKINDLING THE PAST THROUGH A NAME**

Keely's Corner is not just the name of a shop, it also carries rich historical significance for the people of Maynooth. The Keely name has been present for many generations in the town and the shop is located on the centre from where the Keely heritage developed. The Keely blood has been in the house since the 1850s when Thomas Keely and his wife Kate took ownership. The premises then fell into the hands of Laurence Keely their son who married Bridget Keely (nee Brazil). The daughters of the aforementioned Kathleen Landy (nee Keely), who now lives in Listowel and Margaret Bean (nee Keely), still resident in Maynooth, lived in the house as children. The house today is dwelt in by Breda Landy, Kathleen Landy's daughter. So the descendancy still lives on.

If you ask an old established local where Keely's Lane is they will point to the lane beside Keely's shop even though its real name is Coates Lane thus showing the significance of the Keely name through Maynooth's history. The corner was a

popular meeting place for the old men of Maynooth who either sat on the granite stone outside (which still exists today) or on the windowsill itself to catch up on the auld gossip ensuring they didn't miss a thing.

The shop was called "Presents 'n Mind" but this new name "Keely's Corner" in the words of the owner, Seán Horgan (who is engaged to Breda Landy) "incorporates the atmosphere of the corner back to older days".

#### **ROCK FEATURE - 'SCHIZOPHRENICS'**

Young rock bands are springing up all over the place in Maynooth. One of the reasons for this is that so many young people learn to play a musical instrument (the main ones being guitar or piano) and end up grouping together to "gig".

One such group of young people formed a band called the "Schizophrenics".

The members are William Gannon ("Ganno") on drums from 20 Leinster Cottages, Vinny Nevin (base and vocals) from Barroughstown, Cian O'Melia (guitar) from Cluain Aoibhinn. and last but not least Kevin Farrell (guitar) from Celbridge Road The group has been together for three months now. Their main influences would be "Metallica", "Slayer", "Sperm Birds", "Therapy" and "Fugazi", of whom they would play a lot of covers. There are a few budding writers in the group and up to now they have written two songs. Their first song "Simon" was composed by Cian and the second is called "Prime Evil" with lyrics by Kevin. The latter is about being possessed and its effects (heavy stuff!!!).

#### **TRAVELLING THEATRE GROUP**


Presentation Convent was the venue for the show, attended by all students, split into two groups, one for juniors and one for seniors. We looked into the second show, the children were all

Maynooth 6-9 Carbury 2-3



This was probably the best display of the season by our U/10side who are in their debut league season. Goals by David Harper, Simon Fagan and Thomas McGovern made up this

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

#### FINE GAEL NOTES

#### **Playing Fields for Maynooth**

In the April issue of this Newsletter we reported that Kildare Co. Council had adopted a motion, proposed by Bernard Durkan T.D. "that provision be made for more open spaces in future developments in the county". This motion was for inclusion in the revision of the Draft Development Plan.

It is, in the opinion of the Maynooth Branch of Fine Gael, scandalous that in a town with 1,500 Primary and Post-Primary pupils, no provision has been made for playing fields or sports facilities. As each open space in and around the town is developed, we are in danger of becoming a concrete jungle. We therefore call on Kildare Co. Council to acquire 50 acres of land, within easy reach of the town centre, for sports and recreation. This should be done before any further development is approved and should be included in the Draft Development Plan.

#### Extra Space for Post Primary

A new school year is underway and still nothing concrete has been heard from the Minister of Education on the provision of the much needed additional classrooms for the Post Primary School. For well over a year now, Bernard Durkan T.D. has been raising the matter with successive Ministers for Education without success. It is over six months since the present Minister visited the school to see the position for herself.

Though the Department of Education has indicated verbally that an extension will be approved nothing has been committed to writing on the type of extension being approved or a proposed commencement date. Besides the obvious problems



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

faced by pupils and staff, due to the lack of space, failure to provide the much needed extension before the start of the 1994 school year will mean that the school will not be able to provide a transition year for those students who wish to avail of it.

We therefore call on the Minister to confirm the extension and give a definite date for building to begin.

# MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES

## **Maynooth Post Primary School**

Minister of State at the Department of the Environment, Emmet Stagg T.D. has welcomed the sanctioning by the Minister for Education of the funding for repairs to the roof of Maynooth Post Primary School. The amount approved for the repairs required is £50,000 and the school has now been given the go ahead to have work carried out.

#### **Traffic Flow Main Street**

Councillor John McGinley has tabled the following motion for the next Celbridge Area Committee meeting.

"That the following steps be taken in order to improve traffic flow in the Main Street, Maynooth:-

(a) Put box junction and double yellow lines at the Roost and Dunboyne Road junctions.

(b) Put double yellow lines from Fusciardis to Hula Bou.

(c) Put double yellow lines at Brady's Pub."

#### Greenfield Bollards

Contrary to the front page headlines in the Leinster Leader the procedure to have the bollards put in place has not met with any obstacles. As agreed with all the Councillors the Area Committee will decide on the bollards at its meeting on 29th Oct. and this decision will then go to the full Council in November, for approval.

#### Maynooth Development Plan

Work on the Leixlip Plan finished on 8th. Oct. after ten three hour meetings. Consideration of the Maynooth Plan will begin early November and hopefully should be completed before Christmas. The plan is then displayed for 3 months for public comment.

#### Mullen Bridge to Greenfield Road

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that the following work be carried out.

Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have made further representations to Kildare County Council requesting urgent repairs and re-surfacing on the Dunboyne Road at Mariaville.

## Material Dumped at Laraghbryan Cemetery

Following complaints of material being dumped at the inside of the wall at Laraghbryan Cemetry, Minister Stagg contacted Kildare County Council.

The Council have confirmed that the local area engineer will have the material removed as a matter of urgency.

### **Ramps at Pound Lane**

To date Kildare County Council have not agreed on the location of the three ramps along Pound Lane.

Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have been in contact with the Council and have requested that the Council agree the location of the ramps with Lyreen Residents Association prior to them being put in place.

### Cablelink Wires On Trees In Main Street

Arising from complaints from residents Minister Stagg has been in contact with Kildare County Council concerning the removal of Cablelink wires from the trees on Main Street. The Council have advised that they will contact Cablelink to ensure that the cables are removed urgently.

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
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

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# **Community Council Notes**

Maynooth Community Council has re-applied for Town Commission Status.

The Festival Committee of the Community Council is reforming. Some meetings have already been held. Suggestions on the form and content of the Festival are as follows:-

1. The Festival should have a theme such as the Heritage of Maynooth, including the Castle, College, Canal and Carton estate or some other theme, any suggestions?

2. More community involvement should be encouraged perhaps by having a Maynooth Person of The Year to be proposed by groups or societies or individuals. Community involvement could also be encouraged by including the schools, i.e. essay competition on History or Heritage of Maynooth.

3. The Festival should perhaps be shorter - five days rather than the ten days at present.

4. All events during Festival week are to be organized by a previously elected or volunteer group of two or three. Thus responsibility will not fall on the same shoulders all the time.

5. Different venues will be necessary for various events, such as Bachelor of The Year and perhaps the Talent Contest, as the venues at present are slightly small.

6. It has been proposed that a Rock Concert for the young people be held in the Harbour Field.

## Background

The Community Council was set up in 1981 to bring together associations, societies and the people of Maynooth. It is a totally voluntary body consisting of a council and an elected executive of five people. The broad aims of the Council as set out in its Founding Constitution are to promote through a common effort, the well being of the inhabitants of the Maynooth area, without distinction as to the age, sex, race, colour, religion or political opinion.

The Community Council, through co-operation with F.A.S. has set up S.E.S. schemes over the last nine years. Two supervisors, Norah McDermott and Eileen Dunne, are employed directly in the Council office. Under its umbrella two other sub-committees of the Community Council employ two supervisors and workers. The Community Council schemes running at the moment deal with general office work, computer training and the setting out and writing of the Newsletter. Directory and a history of Maynooth. There are at present thirty workers on the Schemes.

The Comunity Council is extremely grateful to F.A.S. for their continuing support in financing and granting these schemes. F.A.S.'s generous support has made it possible to provide training for over two hundred workers in the past nine years. Maynooth Community Council schemes also have a very good record in placing their workers in employment.


# I.C.A. NOTES



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

## Christmas




#### Works Update

Sailing enthusiasts are reminded that sailing on the canal is subject to the usual permit which one acquires from the Office of Public Works (Inland Waterways Division) for a nominal fee. Since the Royal Canal is not fully operational (some areas are still under repair), harbours are maintained in the closed mode. Those, however, who apply for and obtain permits will also receive details of how to gain access and where lock gate keys can be acquired. It should also be pointed out that under recent legislation all craft on both external and internal waterways must pass present standards of seaworthiness, so have your craft checked before sailing. Meanwhile, one can enjoy the amenity between Blanchardstown and Mullingar for the present but this will extend to the Liffey basin in the near future.



"Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner, Blitzen and Rudolph, we're going for a run".







# **DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE**

## Hearty Turkey Vegetable Soup (Serves 6-8)

75 g (3 oz) red lentils, soaked overnight 450 g (1 lb) potatoes, peeled and chopped 450 g-675 g (1 lb -  $1^{1}/2$  lb) chopped mixed root vegetables, (carrot, turnip or swede, parsnip) 1 large onion, peeled and chopped 3 sticks celery, chopped Salt and pepper 5 ml (1 tsp) dried mixed herbs 1.5 ltr  $(2^{1}/2)$  pints turkey or chicken stock

1. Drain lentils and place in large saucepan with potatoes, mixed vegetables, onion and celery, seasoning and herbs.

2. Add stock, bring to boil, cover and cook for about 3/4 - 1 hour or until lentils are soft. Liquidise until thick.

3. Adjust seasoning if necessary, add some chopped leftover turkey meat if preferred, and serve with crusty bread.

## **Chestnut and Sausage Stuffing**

450 g (1 lb) sausagemeat 450 g (1 lb) chestnuts 25 g (1 oz) butter (melted) 1 cup fine breadcrumbs Salt and pepper

1. Make slit in each chestnut, cover with boiling water and cook till tender.

2. Remove skins and chop finely, or pass through coarse sieve. 3. Mix with sausagemeat, add melted butter, breadcrumbs and seasoning.

4. Use to stuff turkey or chicken.

## **Chocolate Chip Cookies** Cost: £1. Makes 12. Preparation: 15 min Cooking: 20 min Freeze: up to 6 months.

4 oz (100 g) butter 1 (size 3) egg, lightly beaten 5 oz (125 g) self-raising flour, sieved 4 oz (100 g) plain chocolate

1. Set oven 400°F, 200°C (Mark 6). Lightly grease two baking sheets.

2. Beat butter and sugar together until soft. Beat in the egg with 1 tbsp (14 ml) of the flour.

3. Gradually stir in rest of flour until you have a fairly stiff mixture.

4. With a sharp knife, cut chocolate into pieces about the size of a pea.

Stir chocolate into mixture making sure it is evenly distributed. 5. Take spoonfuls of the mixture about the size of a walnut and place well apart on baking sheets, to allow for spreading. Press tops down lightly with the back of a fork. continued

6. Bake for 20 minutes until firm and golden brown. Remove from baking sheets with a palette knife and cool on a wire rack. 7. Store in an airtight container when cold.

## Cook's Tip:

Try adding 1 tbsp (15 ml) cocoa to the mixture (in place of tbsp (15 ml) of the flour) for double choc cookies. Alternatively, use milk or white chocolate or both.

## Whiskey Sauce

1/2 oz. flour 1/2 oz. margarine 1/2 pint milk 2 teaspoons sugar A tablespoon whiskey

Melt the margarine, add the flour and cook, stirring well until the mixture is dry and sandy. Do not brown. Remove from heat and gradually stir in the milk. Add the sugar. Return to heat. Bring to boil stirring all the time and boil for 5 minutes. Flavour with whiskey.

# **GARDA TALK**

**Snippet of Advice - Larceny of Quantity of Oil** We are in the heart of Winter, that time of year when heat in the home is so central to our comfort. Incidents of quantities of oil being taken from oil tanks at the rear or side of houses in estates have been reported to us recently. Home heating oil is expensive enough not to be leaving it to the criminal opportunist to deprive you of it and your home of such an essential comfort. Please ensure that there is a secure lock on your tank.

## Garda Check-points/Prevention of Drunk Driving

"Tis the season to be Jolly" - very appropriate for Christmas season, but not to be falling in/out of cars with drink consumed. Again we advise our community of the dangers of driving vehicles after drinking. Just stop and think for a moment serious accident - loss of licence for 12 months; a heavy fine and/or imprisonment. These are the realities which you should consider before going out for a night intending to drive home with a few jars in you. The Gardai will be operating checkpoints, and the drink-driving laws will be rigidly enforced. Don't push drink on drivers; the "one for the road" era is long gone.

# Approach to Christmas

Everybody should take extra care of their property over the next few weeks, particularly those of us who intend travelling to Dublin for the shopping. Park your car in a supervised car park (its worth the few bob), mind your cash/cheque book. Don't show large sums of money - remember somebody else is also watching. Business people should also note that this is also a busy time for our criminal fraternity - they also will be stocking up for Santa. Be vigilant.

# Traffic/Parking







# **GARDENING HINTS**

## Flower Garden

In the month of December the gardener is allowed a wellearned rest except for some small jobs. In the first fortnight or so, for instance, planting of shrubs, trees, fruit and roses can be continued or finished as the weather allows. Pruning and spraying of fruit can continue; digging and manuring of borders and vegetable plots can finish. If you have the time and energy this is a good time, while the bones of the garden show, to re-design unsatisfactory parts of it and carry out new constructions.

The true Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) has a never-failing appeal and is one of the flowers usually available in the garden for picking for Christmas celebrations (although sometimes it does not bloom until after Christmas). Winter jasmine, mahonia, Erica cinerea and its varieties, primroses and violets in sheltered places, sedums, and pansies will also be in bloom. Plants in pots, both flowering and foliage can go into the home for the time being for extra decoration, and all sorts of berrying shrubs will add to their colour. The evergreens will retain their leaves. especially the conifers, if left to soak overnight in the bath.

#### Vegetable Garden

Manure, dig and trench ground in dry weather. Early sown peas and beans showing should have the soil lightly drawn up on each side of the rows for protection. Force rhubarb and seakale.

#### Pot Plants

Often, sadly, one of December's disasters is the death of expensive pot plants, acquired as Christmas presents. Such plants include the azaleas, poinsettias, cyclamen and the Christmas cactus, at the height of their flowering season, covered in bloom and apparently in the best of health. They are in fact extremely fit, but the change from nursery greenhouse conditions to those of the home, particularly at Christmas time, is often too much for them. In no time, buds and flowers have dropped, leaves withered and fallen, and a few stark bare stems are all that is left of a once beautiful plant.

Smoky, dry atmosphere often predominate in the home, the temperature may well be up too high near radiators, electric or coal fires. Conversely, window-sills behind drawn curtains where pot plants are often put, can be death traps of freezing air, as the outside temperature drops swiftly to or below freezing, as it can easily do at this time.

In all the excitement nothing is more likely to be overlooked than watering and an azalea in full bloom will want a big drink at least every day; cyclamen also flag extremely quickly with their leaves turning yellow. Plants may also suffer from being given liquids other than water at this time of the year! Draughts are a further menace as doors constantly open with the arrival and departure of guests and family; one way or another, all pot plants have a hard time of it.

Try to remember at any rate, to review the water needs every day; bring the plants in from the window-sills when the curtains are drawn. Spray them lavishly every day with clear water, or pack really damp peat around the container and keep it damp. Keep them somewhere out of the line of draughts and away from the fierce heat.

Then leave the garden alone, but make sure wild birds are well fed particularly in frosty weather. Enjoy Christmas, hibernate a little as all sensible animals do in the short dark days and come back to it with a refreshed mind in the New Year when the days begin to lengthen.

# GIFTS GALORE AT YOUR LOCAL STORE

Ah! yes, it's that time of the year again, a time of hustle and bustle, unlike any other time of the year. People crowd the buses all week every week in the run up to Christmas, searching for bargains all over the city. Well this year, maybe we should stop and take note, look around locally to see what can be bought for Christmas presents. Our recent survey proved quite an eye-opener. Looking for presents under £5 may seem a daunting task but Maynooth has more to offer than many realise.

Our window shopping spree began on Main Street where we found ideas plentiful. Katie's Flowers, offer dried flower arrangements and flowering plants for £5 and over as do The Flower Pot, in the Square along with fresh posie arrangements. Soft toys are a great part of Christmas and these can be bought at reasonable prices at many outlets throughout Maynooth. These include on Main Street Barry's Newsagents, Nuzstop and Donovans in Maynooth Shopping Centre and Greenfield Shopping Centre. These stores also provide a good selection of toys for under £5, e.g. Donovans sell a great set of dinosaurs for just £2.99, Nuzstop sell a lace & frame tapestry maker for £3.99 and Barry's sell a Rainbow Repeater Safe Ball Shooter at £2.99. For those with a sweet tooth, all of the above provide a selection of chocolates along with Bartons and Kiernans on the Main Street, who also sell kiddies toys under £5, well worth checking out folks.

Stocking fillers can be a tiresome task but look no further than your local retailers. The Bookshop for example sells a great range of items besides books. They have jigsaws, packs of educational cards (e.g. cards displaying dinosaurs giving information on each type), music tapes, colouring posters and the old reliable book tokens. Keely's Corner offer a selection of Russ Character mugs for £4.99 and cuddly dinos for £3.99.

For the more practically minded one might venture into Ua Buachalla's on Main Street to purchase a bicycle light for £3.95, a torch for £2.15 or a set of glasses for £1.95. On the same street and still for the practically minded there is Maynooth Cycle Centre where a complete rain suit, jacket pull-ups, hood and bag costs only £5. Incidentally this shop also sells toys for under £5, e.g. Play & Learn Funhouse for £2.20 or a Princess Mermaid for £3.95.

Buying for teenagers can be quite daunting. We tend to slip money into a card rather than buy something which could be totally unsuitable.

Why not play safe this year and buy a Parker pen-set for £5.25 or a diary under £5 at Maynooth Office Supplies on the Dublin Road. For sporty teenagers one might find something suitable in Caddyshack on Main Street. There are a selection of items for under £5 like a set of golf balls from £2.50, mugs £4.99, continued

gloves from £5, socks from £3.50 or hats from £3.00. Maynooth Jewellers could also provide something for teenagers with silver earrings from £1.99 and digital watches under £5.

Presents for the men in the family might be purchased at C.P.L. Motor Factors where you can get a Two Tray Tool Box for £4.95 or a Wheel Glove for £4.50, or you could pop into Caddyshack and get one of our previously listed gifts. An ideal present for the women in the family would be a gift voucher for Cameo Beauty Clinic situated on Main Street or for Vanity Fayre in the Town Centre Mall where you could get a voucher for an eye lash tint, a cleanse and make-up or a manicure for £5 or under.

For a variety of gifts for family and friends there is a shop aptly named in the Main Street. This is Just Gifts which offer a great selection such as silver flowered jewellery from £3.75, children's rings from £2.50, material covered spectacle case £4.50, guest towels £4.25, wine bags £2.00 and even purses from £3.75. 





# **The National Development Plan Cultural Tourism and Maynooth**

One feature of the Government's National Development Plan is the importance it places on the promotion of Cultural Tourism. Arts and Cultural industries show one of the fastest growth rates in European industry, particularly in Germany and Britain. In the U.K. the Arts and Culture section including Cultural Tourism employs over 550,000 people with an annual turnover of well in excess of £10 billion.

In Ireland Cultural Tourism is a growing market. Over 40% of overseas tourists are influenced in their choice of destinations by the cultural/heritage attractions of the Republic. This added to the need of the tourist industry to diversify and offer attractions beyond scenic beauty and the natural friendliness of the people explains the governments new emphasis on Cultural Tourism.

This growth contains significant implications for Maynooth. The unique combination of factors which has resulted in the presence of Carton, the Geraldine Castle, Maynooth College and the Grand Canal within this area suggests the logic of a major government investment in the heritage of Maynooth leading to the town and its environs becoming a centre of cultural tourism.

This potential has already been identified by the local community. The Community Council, together with its Planning and Development sub-committee, are in the process of putting forward proposals to Kildare County Council which, if implemented, would significantly improve the physical environment of the town.

Such investment is needed. Despite the appearance of affluence a serious unemployment crisis and its attendant social problems exists in the town. Both the Minister for Arts Culture and the Gaeltacht and the Minister for Tourism should seriously examine the economic potential of the following proposals, suggested by John Drennan, Maynooth Graduate.

I Carton should be developed into a national heritage centre and the demense into a national park. The latter should not preclude the use of the demesne for activites such as Golf, Angling, Adventure Sports and Equestrian.

II The Castle should be rebuilt and roofed. This should be done in a manner which does not take away from the integrity of the existing remains. It should become a heritage centre based around the theme of Gaelic/Norman/Anglo/Irish Ireland.

III Redevelopment of the surrounding environment, particularly the canal and streetscape of Maynooth so as to harmonize with developments in Carton and the Castle. The ultimate aim would be the restoration of Maynooth to its former status as a model town. Such a major development can be justified on the following grounds.

I Carton Estate is a unique heritage feature. It represents of the few 18th century ascendancy estates where both demesne and estate have survived intact.

II Similarly, Maynooth Castle has played a seminal role in Irish History, housing the greatest of the old Anglo-Irish nobility and 7 Lord Deputies. It was also the centre of a major rebellion against English rule.

III The canal also deserves upgrading. Minister Higgins has committed £39 million to the enhancement of our National Parks and Waterways in the National Development Plan. It should be indicated to the Minister that canals and waterways exist East as well as west of the Shannon. continued





IV Redevelopment of Maynooth as a heritage centre could be closely linked to the government's commitment to create a conference centre. This will cost £50 million, generate 30,000 visitors, £29 million per annum and 1,500 jobs. It would be asking too much of the imaginative capacity of the present government to perceive the suitability of Carton as a venue for such a development but Carton could serve the cultural interests of conference attenders.

V The physical location of Maynooth also suggests the viability of heritage centres in both the Castle and Carton and the presence of a leisure park in the latter. As well as serving international tourists they would service the leisure/cultural needs and interests of the Dublin region in a manner similiar to Blessington.

VI Business in Maynooth is highly seasonal and over-dependent on the student trade. The growth of a tourist infrastructure would end this dependency.

VII The previous National Plan spent over £140 million in the promotion of Golf, Adventure, Equestrian, Culture/Heritage, Language, Angling and activity based holidays. The present Plan also cites the fostering of such holidays as being most important to the further growth of the tourist industry. Carton/ Maynooth possesses the unique potential to cater for *all* these interests, whilst the presence of the College offers a unique opportunity for the creation of an International Language Centre.

VIII Within the broader economic context the development of Maynooth as a centre for Cultural Tourism possesses other benefits. Arts and Culture plays a major role in persuading (and just as significantly retaining) high-tech white collar industries such as the Intel plant at Collinstown, originally proposed for Carton. The development of Maynooth as a heritage area possesses major advantages over the Gleneagles plan. Jobs created by Cultural Tourism are more highly skilled and not as dependent on seasonality as other tourist posts. The concept of a heritage centre preserves the required balance between conservation and commercial development. It should be noted that not only do centres/museums possess a strong multiplier effect on the local economy in the creation of jobs/wealth and ancillary spending but that unlike other industries most of these benefits are retained in the local economy.

The future of Maynooth lies in its cultural heritage. The development of Carton and the Castle as heritage centres will ensure that these places created by the labour of the people will return into their possession and that of the nation. These assets have been disgracefully neglected. The historically low level of Structural/Lottery funds received by Maynooth has contributed to this. It is up to Ministers McCreevy and Stagg to ensure this pattern will not be repeated.

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


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# FIVE CO. KILDARE FARM SALES PRODUCE 1.000.000 -AT OVER £2,000 PER ACRE AVERAGE

Willie Coonan of Coonan's Estate Agents, Maynooth and Athy, Co. Kildare specialists in the sale of agricultural properties and stud farms has noted a sustained trend in land prices in Co. Kildare over the last few months.





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
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# TRAVELLING HER WAY IN A NEW BOOK

Maynooth author and radio presenter Mary O'Donnell, has a new poetry book out at the moment.

The book entitled "Spiderwoman's Third Avenue Rhapsody" is a collection of Mary's poetry over the past three years. This, her second poetry collection, 'journeys through the landscapes of the physical world and the mysterious terrain of the mind', (Publisher's note).

One section of the book focuses around Maynooth and its sense of place developed through local odyssey. The title of one of the poems in this section '53.23° North' happens to be the geographical location of Maynooth and is about Mary's life here.

The title poem is a response to, and celebration of Manhattan. When Mary wrote the poem, her intention was that the words be put to music, the type of music she had in mind was that of Gershwin. This is evident from the layout of the poem. Her style for this poem is so aptly summed up in the publisher's note which says - 'the sureness of her insight never falters: the stunning title poem skilfully mingles narrative gift with poetic revelation'.

Her creative style of writing encaptures images which you can almost see before your eyes. This became most evident to me in her poem 'Maynooth College Chapel Altar, viewed from the Gallery', which was inspired by Mary's attendance at Brahm's Requium. If any of you have been in the College Chapel and pictured its beauty you'd understand what I mean when saying that Mary's use of words encaptures that very same atmosphere.

This is Mary's fourth publication in four years. Her first in 1990, another poetry collection entitled 'Reading the Sunflowers in September', was nominated for an Irish Times/Aer Lingus Literary Award in 1991. As well as her poetry collections she is also author of the best-selling novel, "The Light-Makers' and a much-praised collection of short stories, 'Strong Pagans'.

We often hear the saying "support your local business'. My feelings, from reading the book, is that this should extend to supporting local authors too. The book is published by Salmon Publishing, an imprint of Poolbeg Publications, and is available in all good bookshops at £5.99. Definitely something for the Christmas Stocking!

# **VIDEO REVIEW**



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

Maynooth booked their second round place with this good win over St. Anthony's. Gary McMahon opened the scoring for continued





# MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES

## **Ramps at Pound Lane**

The Road Design Section of Kildare County Council have now provided standards relating to the location, lighting and signage for the proposed ramps to the Area Engineer. The Area Engineer will now consult residents on Pound Lane concerning the location of the ramps. Following this consultation construction work will proceed. Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley will continue to press to have this process dealt with urgently.

# **Resurfacing of Back Lane Leinster Cottages**

Minister Stagg has made representations to Kildare County Council requesting that the resurfacing of Back Lane be included in the works to be undertaken in the Road Block Grants 1994.

He has also requested that "No Entry" be painted on the lane surface at the junction of Convent Lane/Dunboyne Road and Back Lane.

## Working Group on Charges

Cllr. John McGinley heads up a top-level working group drawn from Labour's National Executive to find alternative means of financing Local Authorities which will result in the abolition of Service Charges.

His preliminary report will go to the Party's Executive shortly and Labour will then press to have the abolition of the Charges brought in as a matter of priority.

## **Extension to Post Primary School**

Pressure is still being applied by Minister Stagg to have the extension to Maynooth Post Primary included in the Department of Education's estimates for 1994. We will keep you advised of progress in this matter.

# Straffan Road Sinking

Arising from complaints concerning the spot between Carton Court and Noone's, where the roadway is sinking, Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have taken up this matter with Kildare County Council. The annoying lip on the roadway at Moneycooley has also been raised with the Council.

## **Maintenance of Council Houses**

Cllr. McGinley and Minister Stagg have welcomed as an initial step the doubling of funds available for the maintenance of Council houses in the County Manager's Estimates for 1994. Labour Councillors will seek to have this figure increased further during the debate on the Estimates.

## Funds Available for the Upkeep of Open Spaces

The decision by the new County Manager to include a provision of £20,000 towards residents groups in the county involved in the upkeep of open spaces is to be welcomed. For far too long residents' groups have been carrying out the Council's work without any assistance from Kildare County Council. The Branch welcomes this as a first step towards rectifying this problem.

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


