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
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

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Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council has re-applied for Town Commission Status.

The Festival Committee of the Community Council is reforming. Some meetings have already been held. Suggestions on the form and content of the Festival are as follows:-

1. The Festival should have a theme such as the Heritage of Maynooth, including the Castle, College, Canal and Carton estate or some other theme, any suggestions?

2. More community involvement should be encouraged perhaps by having a Maynooth Person of The Year to be proposed by groups or societies or individuals. Community involvement could also be encouraged by including the schools, i.e. essay competition on History or Heritage of Maynooth.

3. The Festival should perhaps be shorter - five days rather than the ten days at present.

4. All events during Festival week are to be organized by a previously elected or volunteer group of two or three. Thus responsibility will not fall on the same shoulders all the time.

5. Different venues will be necessary for various events, such as Bachelor of The Year and perhaps the Talent Contest, as the venues at present are slightly small.

6. It has been proposed that a Rock Concert for the young people be held in the Harbour Field.

Background

The Community Council was set up in 1981 to bring together associations, societies and the people of Maynooth. It is a totally voluntary body consisting of a council and an elected executive of five people. The broad aims of the Council as set out in its Founding Constitution are to promote through a common effort, the well being of the inhabitants of the Maynooth area, without distinction as to the age, sex, race, colour, religion or political opinion.

The Community Council, through co-operation with F.A.S. has set up S.E.S. schemes over the last nine years. Two supervisors, Norah McDermott and Eileen Dunne, are employed directly in the Council office. Under its umbrella two other sub-committees of the Community Council employ two supervisors and workers. The Community Council schemes running at the moment deal with general office work, computer training and the setting out and writing of the Newsletter. Directory and a history of Maynooth. There are at present thirty workers on the Schemes.

The Comunity Council is extremely grateful to F.A.S. for their continuing support in financing and granting these schemes. F.A.S.'s generous support has made it possible to provide training for over two hundred workers in the past nine years. Maynooth Community Council schemes also have a very good record in placing their workers in employment.



Cross-Country





The Drama Society will produce Brian Friel's play "Faith Healer" in the College Aula Maxima on Monday 6th December and Tuesday 7th December at 8p.m. sharp. Members of the public are most welcome to attend.

'Faith Healer' by Brian Friel is the story of Frank Hardy, his wife/mistress Grace, and his manager Teddy, and 'ramshackle caravan' touring the remote villages of Scotland and Wales offering to the ill, the prospect of a miracle cure. The story is told in four monologues, the first and last by Frank, the second and third spoken by Grace and Teddy in turn.

From the opening incantation to the final home-coming of Frank Hardy, Faith Healer, we are to be enchanted by language, by the art of story telling. The play suggests a subtle metaphor of the artist, who is possessed of a gift over which he has no control. In this drama however, Brian Friel succeeds in creating a work which unsettles sensibility and understanding while engaging the imagination.

Defeated by the Deadline!

Publication deadlines do not allow me, as promised last month, to report in this edition on our annual AGM. As well as that, in the course of preparing for that meeting, I realised that it would be a good idea to give credit publicly to some of the people whose work makes possible the existence and operation of our branch.

In October, our call for volunteer tellers gave some idea of how those members contribute, each week, to the service we make available to the community. Each of the 24 tellers who served over the last year gave several hours of their time each month so that the business of accepting lodgements and repayments could be done. The Directors, on behalf of all the members, - and especially of those who use this service - would like to take this opportunity to say a public "Thank you" to each of them.

Then there are the **Directors and Supervisors**, most of whose work goes on when the ordinary members are not using the office. Without the commitment and dedication of these officers, it would not be possible to have a Credit Union branch in Maynooth. They work for hours each week, behind the scenes, and it is important that their contribution does not go unrecognised all the time.

Michael Mooney, Chairman, and Ann (Lima) Higgins, Vice-Chairperson and Credit Committee, will continue to serve on next year's Board of Directors. Catherine Mulready and John Reid, who have both served as Treasurer at different times in the past year, will stand for re-election at our AGM. So too will Ken Loane, Secretary and Pat Harney, Membership and Insurance officer. These members, if re-elected, along with Michael and Ann, will create continuity between last and next year's Board of Directors.

Then there are some Board members who have decided that they will stand down: Caroline Dunne, Computers Officer, with responsibility for rostering and training tellers (and sometimes Directors); Catherine Rosney, Credit Committee; and Mary McInerney, Delinquency Officer; and Lily Cannon and Jim McMahon, ordinary Members of the Board. This mix and balance is what keeps the branch from getting into a rut and stagnating.

I am sure that they enjoy - at least some of the time - working with their peers. 
I.C.A. NOTES



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
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MAYNOOTH PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Christmas




Works Update

Work is continuing at a steady pace despite some inclement weather in the recent past. The new wall which is being built will extend from the "Fairy Tree", adjacent to the entrance gates, along the boundary on the fire station side of the harbour joining up with the existing wall near the wooden footbridge. This is just one of a number of projects, designed to enhance the continued

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harbour and its environs, which the committee have in hand. Please feel free to visit the harbour and see the on-going improvements for yourself but do tread carefully as tools and machinery are in everyday use.

Sailing

Sailing enthusiasts are reminded that sailing on the canal is subject to the usual permit which one acquires from the Office of Public Works (Inland Waterways Division) for a nominal fee. Since the Royal Canal is not fully operational (some areas are still under repair), harbours are maintained in the closed mode. Those, however, who apply for and obtain permits will also receive details of how to gain access and where lock gate keys can be acquired. It should also be pointed out that under recent legislation all craft on both external and internal waterways must pass present standards of seaworthiness, so have your craft checked before sailing. Meanwhile, one can enjoy the amenity between Blanchardstown and Mullingar for the present but this will extend to the Liffey basin in the near future.

DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

Hearty Turkey Vegetable Soup (Serves 6-8)

75 g (3 oz) red lentils, soaked overnight 450 g (1 lb) potatoes, peeled and chopped 450 g-675 g (1 lb - $1^{1}/2$ lb) chopped mixed root vegetables, (carrot, turnip or swede, parsnip) 1 large onion, peeled and chopped 3 sticks celery, chopped Salt and pepper 5 ml (1 tsp) dried mixed herbs 1.5 ltr $(2^{1}/2)$ pints turkey or chicken stock

1. Drain lentils and place in large saucepan with potatoes, mixed vegetables, onion and celery, seasoning and herbs.

2. Add stock, bring to boil, cover and cook for about 3/4 - 1 hour or until lentils are soft. Liquidise until thick.

3. Adjust seasoning if necessary, add some chopped leftover turkey meat if preferred, and serve with crusty bread.

Chestnut and Sausage Stuffing

450 g (1 lb) sausagemeat 450 g (1 lb) chestnuts 25 g (1 oz) butter (melted) 1 cup fine breadcrumbs Salt and pepper

1. Make slit in each chestnut, cover with boiling water and cook till tender.

2. Remove skins and chop finely, or pass through coarse sieve. 3. Mix with sausagemeat, add melted butter, breadcrumbs and seasoning.

4. Use to stuff turkey or chicken.

Chocolate Chip Cookies Cost: £1. Makes 12. Preparation: 15 min Cooking: 20 min Freeze: up to 6 months.

4 oz (100 g) butter 1 (size 3) egg, lightly beaten 5 oz (125 g) self-raising flour, sieved 4 oz (100 g) plain chocolate

1. Set oven 400°F, 200°C (Mark 6). Lightly grease two baking sheets.

2. Beat butter and sugar together until soft. Beat in the egg with 1 tbsp (14 ml) of the flour.

3. Gradually stir in rest of flour until you have a fairly stiff mixture.

4. With a sharp knife, cut chocolate into pieces about the size of a pea.

Stir chocolate into mixture making sure it is evenly distributed. 5. Take spoonfuls of the mixture about the size of a walnut and place well apart on baking sheets, to allow for spreading. Press tops down lightly with the back of a fork. continued

6. Bake for 20 minutes until firm and golden brown. Remove from baking sheets with a palette knife and cool on a wire rack. 7. Store in an airtight container when cold.

Cook's Tip:

Try adding 1 tbsp (15 ml) cocoa to the mixture (in place of tbsp (15 ml) of the flour) for double choc cookies. Alternatively, use milk or white chocolate or both.

Whiskey Sauce

1/2 oz. flour 1/2 oz. margarine 1/2 pint milk 2 teaspoons sugar A tablespoon whiskey

Melt the margarine, add the flour and cook, stirring well until the mixture is dry and sandy. Do not brown. Remove from heat and gradually stir in the milk. Add the sugar. Return to heat. Bring to boil stirring all the time and boil for 5 minutes. Flavour with whiskey.



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GARDA TALK

Snippet of Advice - Larceny of Quantity of Oil We are in the heart of Winter, that time of year when heat in the home is so central to our comfort. Incidents of quantities of oil being taken from oil tanks at the rear or side of houses in estates have been reported to us recently. Home heating oil is expensive enough not to be leaving it to the criminal opportunist to deprive you of it and your home of such an essential comfort. Please ensure that there is a secure lock on your tank.

Garda Check-points/Prevention of Drunk Driving

"Tis the season to be Jolly" - very appropriate for Christmas season, but not to be falling in/out of cars with drink consumed. Again we advise our community of the dangers of driving vehicles after drinking. Just stop and think for a moment serious accident - loss of licence for 12 months; a heavy fine and/or imprisonment. These are the realities which you should consider before going out for a night intending to drive home with a few jars in you. The Gardai will be operating checkpoints, and the drink-driving laws will be rigidly enforced. Don't push drink on drivers; the "one for the road" era is long gone.

Approach to Christmas

Everybody should take extra care of their property over the next few weeks, particularly those of us who intend travelling to Dublin for the shopping. Park your car in a supervised car park (its worth the few bob), mind your cash/cheque book. Don't show large sums of money - remember somebody else is also watching. Business people should also note that this is also a busy time for our criminal fraternity - they also will be stocking up for Santa. Be vigilant.

Traffic/Parking

I'm sure that everybody living in Maynooth and our friends who pass through must have noticed how heavy traffic is becoming. Until our by-pass is completed we will have to do our best. I must say that the Co. Council are keeping the situation under constant review, and anything that can be done will be done. It is the indiscriminate parking that causes the Main St. to be blocked, so please park your vehicle properly.





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




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GARDENING HINTS

Flower Garden

In the month of December the gardener is allowed a wellearned rest except for some small jobs. In the first fortnight or so, for instance, planting of shrubs, trees, fruit and roses can be continued or finished as the weather allows. Pruning and spraying of fruit can continue; digging and manuring of borders and vegetable plots can finish. If you have the time and energy this is a good time, while the bones of the garden show, to re-design unsatisfactory parts of it and carry out new constructions.

The true Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) has a never-failing appeal and is one of the flowers usually available in the garden for picking for Christmas celebrations (although sometimes it does not bloom until after Christmas). Winter jasmine, mahonia, Erica cinerea and its varieties, primroses and violets in sheltered places, sedums, and pansies will also be in bloom. Plants in pots, both flowering and foliage can go into the home for the time being for extra decoration, and all sorts of berrying shrubs will add to their colour. The evergreens will retain their leaves. especially the conifers, if left to soak overnight in the bath.

Vegetable Garden

Manure, dig and trench ground in dry weather. Early sown peas and beans showing should have the soil lightly drawn up on each side of the rows for protection. Force rhubarb and seakale.

Pot Plants

Often, sadly, one of December's disasters is the death of expensive pot plants, acquired as Christmas presents. Such plants include the azaleas, poinsettias, cyclamen and the Christmas cactus, at the height of their flowering season, covered in bloom and apparently in the best of health. They are in fact extremely fit, but the change from nursery greenhouse conditions to those of the home, particularly at Christmas time, is often too much for them. In no time, buds and flowers have dropped, leaves withered and fallen, and a few stark bare stems are all that is left of a once beautiful plant.

Smoky, dry atmosphere often predominate in the home, the temperature may well be up too high near radiators, electric or coal fires. Conversely, window-sills behind drawn curtains where pot plants are often put, can be death traps of freezing air, as the outside temperature drops swiftly to or below freezing, as it can easily do at this time.

In all the excitement nothing is more likely to be overlooked than watering and an azalea in full bloom will want a big drink at least every day; cyclamen also flag extremely quickly with their leaves turning yellow. Plants may also suffer from being given liquids other than water at this time of the year! Draughts are a further menace as doors constantly open with the arrival and departure of guests and family; one way or another, all pot plants have a hard time of it.

Try to remember at any rate, to review the water needs every day; bring the plants in from the window-sills when the curtains are drawn. Spray them lavishly every day with clear water, or pack really damp peat around the container and keep it damp. Keep them somewhere out of the line of draughts and away from the fierce heat.

Then leave the garden alone, but make sure wild birds are well fed particularly in frosty weather. Enjoy Christmas, hibernate a little as all sensible animals do in the short dark days and come back to it with a refreshed mind in the New Year when the days begin to lengthen.

GIFTS GALORE AT YOUR LOCAL STORE

Looking for presents under £5 may seem a daunting task but Maynooth has more to offer than many realise.

Our window shopping spree began on Main Street where we found ideas plentiful. Katie's Flowers, offer dried flower arrangements and flowering plants for £5 and over as do The Flower Pot, in the Square along with fresh posie arrangements. Soft toys are a great part of Christmas and these can be bought at reasonable prices at many outlets throughout Maynooth. These include on Main Street Barry's Newsagents, Nuzstop and Donovans in Maynooth Shopping Centre and Greenfield Shopping Centre. These stores also provide a good selection of toys for under £5, e.g. Donovans sell a great set of dinosaurs for just £2.99, Nuzstop sell a lace & frame tapestry maker for £3.99 and Barry's sell a Rainbow Repeater Safe Ball Shooter at £2.99. For those with a sweet tooth, all of the above provide a selection of chocolates along with Bartons and Kiernans on the Main Street, who also sell kiddies toys under £5, well worth checking out folks.

Stocking fillers can be a tiresome task but look no further than your local retailers. The Bookshop for example sells a great range of items besides books. They have jigsaws, packs of educational cards (e.g. cards displaying dinosaurs giving information on each type), music tapes, colouring posters and the old reliable book tokens. Keely's Corner offer a selection of Russ Character mugs for £4.99 and cuddly dinos for £3.99.

For the more practically minded one might venture into Ua Buachalla's on Main Street to purchase a bicycle light for £3.95, a torch for £2.15 or a set of glasses for £1.95. On the same street and still for the practically minded there is Maynooth Cycle Centre where a complete rain suit, jacket pull-ups, hood and bag costs only £5. Incidentally this shop also sells toys for under £5, e.g. Play & Learn Funhouse for £2.20 or a Princess Mermaid for £3.95.

Buying for teenagers can be quite daunting. We tend to slip money into a card rather than buy something which could be totally unsuitable.

Why not play safe this year and buy a Parker pen-set for £5.25 or a diary under £5 at Maynooth Office Supplies on the Dublin Road. For sporty teenagers one might find something suitable in Caddyshack on Main Street. There are a selection of items for under £5 like a set of golf balls from £2.50, mugs £4.99, continued

gloves from £5, socks from £3.50 or hats from £3.00. Maynooth Jewellers could also provide something for teenagers with silver earrings from £1.99 and digital watches under £5.

Presents for the men in the family might be purchased at C.P.L. Motor Factors where you can get a Two Tray Tool Box for £4.95 or a Wheel Glove for £4.50, or you could pop into Caddyshack and get one of our previously listed gifts. An ideal present for the women in the family would be a gift voucher for Cameo Beauty Clinic situated on Main Street or for Vanity Fayre in the Town Centre Mall where you could get a voucher for an eye lash tint, a cleanse and make-up or a manicure for £5 or under.

For a variety of gifts for family and friends there is a shop aptly named in the Main Street. This is Just Gifts which offer a great selection such as silver flowered jewellery from £3.75, children's rings from £2.50, material covered spectacle case £4.50, guest towels £4.25, wine bags £2.00 and even purses from £3.75. The list is endless and the variety is great. So if it's a gift you're after, this is the shop for you. The garden centre in the Square offers a nice selection of pottery and flowering plants.

Value isn't confined to the main stretch of the town. Outlying shops such as Greenfield Supermarket and Newtown Stores also offer great value in the build-up to Christmas. In Greenfield Supermarket doll's dresses at £3.95, musical clock £1.99, large torch £4.95, vases in boxes £4.95, twelve piece tea-set £4.95, kitchen clocks £3.99 and assorted ornaments under £5 are among the plentiful bargains to be had in this big shop. Newtown Stores situated in Beaufield has a good selection of children's toys including children's umbrellas, bag and purse set £4.69, xylophone £2.39, jumbo jet £3.99, set of three trolls £4.99. 



The National Development Plan Cultural Tourism and Maynooth

One feature of the Government's National Development Plan is the importance it places on the promotion of Cultural Tourism. Arts and Cultural industries show one of the fastest growth rates in European industry, particularly in Germany and Britain. In the U.K. the Arts and Culture section including Cultural Tourism employs over 550,000 people with an annual turnover of well in excess of £10 billion.

In Ireland Cultural Tourism is a growing market. Over 40% of overseas tourists are influenced in their choice of destinations by the cultural/heritage attractions of the Republic. This added to the need of the tourist industry to diversify and offer attractions beyond scenic beauty and the natural friendliness of the people explains the governments new emphasis on Cultural Tourism.

This growth contains significant implications for Maynooth. The unique combination of factors which has resulted in the presence of Carton, the Geraldine Castle, Maynooth College and the Grand Canal within this area suggests the logic of a major government investment in the heritage of Maynooth leading to the town and its environs becoming a centre of cultural tourism.

This potential has already been identified by the local community. The Community Council, together with its Planning and Development sub-committee, are in the process of putting forward proposals to Kildare County Council which, if implemented, would significantly improve the physical environment of the town.

Such investment is needed. Despite the appearance of affluence a serious unemployment crisis and its attendant social problems exists in the town. Both the Minister for Arts Culture and the Gaeltacht and the Minister for Tourism should seriously examine the economic potential of the following proposals, suggested by John Drennan, Maynooth Graduate.

I Carton should be developed into a national heritage centre and the demense into a national park. The latter should not preclude the use of the demesne for activites such as Golf, Angling, Adventure Sports and Equestrian.

II The Castle should be rebuilt and roofed. This should be done in a manner which does not take away from the integrity of the existing remains. It should become a heritage centre based around the theme of Gaelic/Norman/Anglo/Irish Ireland.

III Redevelopment of the surrounding environment, particularly the canal and streetscape of Maynooth so as to harmonize with developments in Carton and the Castle. The ultimate aim would be the restoration of Maynooth to its former status as a model town. Such a major development can be justified on the following grounds.

I Carton Estate is a unique heritage feature. It represents of the few 18th century ascendancy estates where both demesne and estate have survived intact.

II Similarly, Maynooth Castle has played a seminal role in Irish History, housing the greatest of the old Anglo-Irish nobility and 7 Lord Deputies. It was also the centre of a major rebellion against English rule.

III The canal also deserves upgrading. Minister Higgins has committed £39 million to the enhancement of our National Parks and Waterways in the National Development Plan. It should be indicated to the Minister that canals and waterways exist East as well as west of the Shannon. continued


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
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IV Redevelopment of Maynooth as a heritage centre could be closely linked to the government's commitment to create a conference centre. This will cost £50 million, generate 30,000 visitors, £29 million per annum and 1,500 jobs. It would be asking too much of the imaginative capacity of the present government to perceive the suitability of Carton as a venue for such a development but Carton could serve the cultural interests of conference attenders.

V The physical location of Maynooth also suggests the viability of heritage centres in both the Castle and Carton and the presence of a leisure park in the latter. As well as serving international tourists they would service the leisure/cultural needs and interests of the Dublin region in a manner similiar to Blessington.

VI Business in Maynooth is highly seasonal and over-dependent on the student trade. The growth of a tourist infrastructure would end this dependency.

VII The previous National Plan spent over £140 million in the promotion of Golf, Adventure, Equestrian, Culture/Heritage, Language, Angling and activity based holidays. The present Plan also cites the fostering of such holidays as being most important to the further growth of the tourist industry. Carton/ Maynooth possesses the unique potential to cater for *all* these interests, whilst the presence of the College offers a unique opportunity for the creation of an International Language Centre.

VIII Within the broader economic context the development of Maynooth as a centre for Cultural Tourism possesses other benefits. Arts and Culture plays a major role in persuading (and just as significantly retaining) high-tech white collar industries such as the Intel plant at Collinstown, originally proposed for Carton. The development of Maynooth as a heritage area possesses major advantages over the Gleneagles plan. Jobs created by Cultural Tourism are more highly skilled and not as dependent on seasonality as other tourist posts. The concept of a heritage centre preserves the required balance between conservation and commercial development. It should be noted that not only do centres/museums possess a strong multiplier effect on the local economy in the creation of jobs/wealth and ancillary spending but that unlike other industries most of these benefits are retained in the local economy.

The future of Maynooth lies in its cultural heritage. The development of Carton and the Castle as heritage centres will ensure that these places created by the labour of the people will return into their possession and that of the nation. These assets have been disgracefully neglected. The historically low level of Structural/Lottery funds received by Maynooth has contributed to this. It is up to Ministers McCreevy and Stagg to ensure this pattern will not be repeated.

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


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FIVE CO. KILDARE FARM SALES PRODUCE 1.000.000 -AT OVER £2,000 PER ACRE AVERAGE

Willie Coonan of Coonan's Estate Agents, Maynooth and Athy, Co. Kildare specialists in the sale of agricultural properties and stud farms has noted a sustained trend in land prices in Co. Kildare over the last few months.

The total acreage involved in these sales was 488 acres and the total purchase prices amounted to £1,000,000 giving an average of £2.015 per acre. One farm of 68 acres in Maynooth was with drawn at £135,000 and sold subsequently at a higher figure: and 18 acres at Clonaugh, sold for £47,500.



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
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TRAVELLING HER WAY IN A NEW BOOK

Maynooth author and radio presenter Mary O'Donnell, has a new poetry book out at the moment.

The book entitled "Spiderwoman's Third Avenue Rhapsody" is a collection of Mary's poetry over the past three years. This, her second poetry collection, 'journeys through the landscapes of the physical world and the mysterious terrain of the mind', (Publisher's note).

One section of the book focuses around Maynooth and its sense of place developed through local odyssey. The title of one of the poems in this section '53.23° North' happens to be the geographical location of Maynooth and is about Mary's life here.

The title poem is a response to, and celebration of Manhattan. When Mary wrote the poem, her intention was that the words be put to music, the type of music she had in mind was that of Gershwin. This is evident from the layout of the poem. Her style for this poem is so aptly summed up in the publisher's note which says - 'the sureness of her insight never falters: the stunning title poem skilfully mingles narrative gift with poetic revelation'.

Her creative style of writing encaptures images which you can almost see before your eyes. This became most evident to me in her poem 'Maynooth College Chapel Altar, viewed from the Gallery', which was inspired by Mary's attendance at Brahm's Requium. If any of you have been in the College Chapel and pictured its beauty you'd understand what I mean when saying that Mary's use of words encaptures that very same atmosphere.

This is Mary's fourth publication in four years. Her first in 1990, another poetry collection entitled 'Reading the Sunflowers in September', was nominated for an Irish Times/Aer Lingus Literary Award in 1991. As well as her poetry collections she is also author of the best-selling novel, "The Light-Makers' and a much-praised collection of short stories, 'Strong Pagans'.

We often hear the saying "support your local business'. My feelings, from reading the book, is that this should extend to supporting local authors too. The book is published by Salmon Publishing, an imprint of Poolbeg Publications, and is available in all good bookshops at £5.99. Definitely something for the Christmas Stocking!

VIDEO REVIEW



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

Maynooth booked their second round place with this good win over St. Anthony's. Gary McMahon opened the scoring for continued





MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES

Ramps at Pound Lane

The Road Design Section of Kildare County Council have now provided standards relating to the location, lighting and signage for the proposed ramps to the Area Engineer. The Area Engineer will now consult residents on Pound Lane concerning the location of the ramps. Following this consultation construction work will proceed. Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley will continue to press to have this process dealt with urgently.

Resurfacing of Back Lane Leinster Cottages

Minister Stagg has made representations to Kildare County Council requesting that the resurfacing of Back Lane be included in the works to be undertaken in the Road Block Grants 1994.

He has also requested that "No Entry" be painted on the lane surface at the junction of Convent Lane/Dunboyne Road and Back Lane.

Working Group on Charges

Cllr. John McGinley heads up a top-level working group drawn from Labour's National Executive to find alternative means of financing Local Authorities which will result in the abolition of Service Charges.

His preliminary report will go to the Party's Executive shortly and Labour will then press to have the abolition of the Charges brought in as a matter of priority.

Extension to Post Primary School

Pressure is still being applied by Minister Stagg to have the extension to Maynooth Post Primary included in the Department of Education's estimates for 1994. We will keep you advised of progress in this matter.

Straffan Road Sinking

Arising from complaints concerning the spot between Carton Court and Noone's, where the roadway is sinking, Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have taken up this matter with Kildare County Council. The annoying lip on the roadway at Moneycooley has also been raised with the Council.

Maintenance of Council Houses

Cllr. McGinley and Minister Stagg have welcomed as an initial step the doubling of funds available for the maintenance of Council houses in the County Manager's Estimates for 1994. Labour Councillors will seek to have this figure increased further during the debate on the Estimates.

Funds Available for the Upkeep of Open Spaces

The decision by the new County Manager to include a provision of £20,000 towards residents groups in the county involved in the upkeep of open spaces is to be welcomed. For far too long residents' groups have been carrying out the Council's work without any assistance from Kildare County Council. The Branch welcomes this as a first step towards rectifying this problem.

Flag Day and Race Nite

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


