

Effort:

The town of Maynooth has made a number of improvements in presenting the town this year - well done.

There are good individual efforts being made, but Maynooth has a long way to go.

Main Street was fairly well presented, particular attention needs to be paid to areas off the Main Street.

Maynooth Committee comments:

The good solid work of the S.E.S. workers was seen by the judges.

Tidiness:

Max. 1991 1992 1993 40 10 10 13

On adjudication day Maynooth was looking well, more litterfree than last year. The town still needs more litter bins, pockets of litter were evident around the town. The area around the University and Castle was very tidy this year. Parson Street was also mentioned as being very tidy.

Maynooth Committee comments:

At last people are using the litter bins but we need more and this will be a priority for the coming year.

Presentation of Buildings:

Max. 1991 1992 1993 40 30 31 31

There are many fine examples of traditional shop fronts in Maynooth which are a credit to the Business Community. They include Katies Flowers, Frank Regans, Hula Bou, Denis Enright, O'Neills, Leinster Arms, Mullins and Henry Opticians, The University Campus, Vincent de Paul and St. Catherine's Hostels. The Church and its grounds were also well presented.

Maynooth Committee comments:

This category has been very good for the last few years and perhaps there may be another mark or two to collect. There are some buildings or their environs that need to be improved. We will be making strong representations to these business owners.

Presentation of Natural Amenities:

Maynooth has a number of fine amenity areas including The Canal area, Carton Amenity Walk, Maynooth Castle, University and Pitch and Putt area.

Areas that could be improved are Carton Amenity Walk, Playground area, Canal area, and area around Public Toilets.

This section is going to be very difficult to improve on until the Toilet block is gone and the Playground is sorted out. We would like to thank our Canal Group for all the hard work in improving this important amenity in Maynooth.

Appearance of Approach Roads:

The approach road from Leixlip - the grass verges on either side needed cutting, the approach from Kilcock was neat with trees planted, grass cut etc. Adjudicator suggests flower beds. Flower beds could also be planted on the approach road from Dunboyne to tidy up this area.

Maynooth Committee comments:

This is an area we will be concentrating on with the cooperation of Kildare County Council.

Presentation of Residential Areas:

Max. 1991 1992 1993 30 18 19 20

The majority of the residential areas are well presented. One individual effort noted this year was the house and gardens opposite Maynooth Castle. Good mentions for Newtown Court, Cluain Aoibhinn, the Park opposite Beaufield, Beaufield itself, Manor Court, Rail Park, Greenfield Estate, Kingsbry and Carton Court.

Maynooth Comittee comments:

An excellent performance keeping up the tremendous work being undertaken by the residents and residents' groups in their areas. Well done also to the Murphy family for the hard work over keeping their garden and surrounds so neat and tidy opposite Maynooth Castle.

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

Researching New Services



IRISH WILDBIRD CONSERVANCY

Liffey Valley Branch

The IWC has a nationwide series of branches to cater for its approx 4,500 members, of which about 140 live in the Liffev Valley area. This branch covers parts of Dublin West and Kildare.

Every year the Liffey Valley Branch holds about 18-20 events which are open to the general public, with non IWC members being particularly welcome. With the exception of coach trips all the events are free. Activities are usually organised for September to November and from January to June, with a break in December and in July and August.

We usually organise an evening activity on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. These consist of a slide show and talk on birds or other natural history/conservation subjects or during the brighter evenings a short walk to see a local bird habitat. On the Saturday following the evening meeting we normally organise a day outing where we go further afield. We also organise about 2 coach trips per year. In the past we have had very successful coach trips to among other places the Shannon Callows for corncakes, Lough Neagh for waterfowl, and the Wexford Slobs for geese.

We also take an interst in local conservation issues, carry out surveys on bird populations for national and international organisations, and act as temporary wardens at breeding sites for endangered species. All our activities are carried out on an continued

entirely voluntary basis. Our general aim is to make people aware of our bird and other wildlife and the absolute neccessity of taking action to protect their natural habitat.

Our activities are advertised in the IWC Newsletter which is distributed free to members, in the local press and radio and also through posters in libraries, shops etc.

MAYNOOTH PAST PUPIL WINS SPORTS SCHOLARSHIP TO U.C.D.

John O'Reilly has gained the distinction of winning a sports scholarship to U.C.D. A native of Dunboyne, he first entered Maynooth Post Primary School in September, 1988 where he has been a student for the past five years. In June of this year he sat the Leaving Certificate Examination where he obtained six honours.

Running was always important to John and he specialised in distances of 400, 800, and 1,500 metres. In 1990 he won the Irish Schools Championships for a distance of 800 metres. He again won the same competition in both 1991 and 1992. Unfortunately, an injury prevented him from competing in the 1993 Championships. Had he won again in 1993, he would have established an unbroken record.

John will now study for an arts degree but his scholarship will cover tuition fees, accommodation, books and travelling expenses to races. His scholarship obliges him to train every day and be available to run for U.C.D. in any competition in which he is entered.

John is the youngest member of his family. He has two brothers and three sisters. Both of his brothers have won scholarships to the U.S.A. His eldest brother competed in the 1988 Olympic Games.

John's advice to up and coming runners is as follows. Concentrate on doing your best. Do not take it too seriously when you are very young. Just run for fun. Wait until you are in your teens before you take it seriously. We in Maynooth Post Primary School wish him the very best of luck in his future career.

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
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extension, the better are our chances of implementing this transition year.

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


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
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BIN SPY REPORT

FROM MAYNOOTH TO MANHATTAN

'Home was the Hero' was the atmosphere in Brady's The Clock House, Maynooth on Saturday 25th September as young Jimmy McMahon rubbed shoulders with friends and locals having a well earned pint of beer. Jimmy, son of Paddy and Norah McMahon of Mulhussey Maynooth had just returned from a gruelling professional boxing campaign in New York, which saw him clock up thirteen successive wins on the trot.

The previous Friday night, over a hundred local supporters had travelled to the Basketball Arena in Tallaght to welcome Jimmy home and see him beat professional English boxer Dave Lovell with competence and style. It was a fight which McMahon won with commanding and aggressive punching, constantly pinning his opponent on the ropes. The only time his defensive shield was breached was in the fourth round of the six-round contest, when in a moment of over confidence and brashness he took a heavy blow from Lovell. However, the strong and dogged McMahon fought back all the harder and won the fight outright on points.

Come On Jimmy!

The Maynooth contingent, which filled a full section of the arena were ecstatic and thrilled, having constantly roared 'Come on Jimmy". It was with pride and satisfaction that they all headed back to Maynooth especially those in the back of Micky's bus. For most of the fans it was the first fight they had ever attended. Yet as Martin Tarpey said, "We were all experts".

Many of Brady's clientele know Jimmy very well, for it was Noel Brady who gave him his first job. Locals such as Nicholas Donovan and P.J. Bennett have followed his career very closely. P.J. recalls going to fights with him and how the young teenager looked so light and small that you would hardly think that he would be able to lift a pint on to the counter.

How this six foot, twenty four year old champion fighter rose Ben Hur-like from among the small farmers of the Kildare/ Meath border is a phenomenal success. It is the stuff dreams are made of. Indeed, Jimmy's interest in boxing began when as a young boy he watched fights on television, involving the likes of Mohammed Ali and George Foreman. From the age of six he was a wild, tough lad, well able to fight his own battles.

His career began when aged 11 years, Willie Quinn, who worked with his father Paddy at the time, brought him to Kilcock Boxing Club for training. It was the 'one to one' combat of the game which attracted Jimmy to boxing. In underage boxing with Kilcock and Enfield clubs, he won the Kildare Championship and four league titles. This was to signal the potential of the youngster who went on to win the Leinster Youth Championship in 1985 and 1986. At this time he was not taking boxing too seriously as he worked away in Brady's. He decided to hit the States and New York where his brother Michael worked as a foreman in construction. There, he saw a lot of fighting and people and trainers were telling him that he could do something with his talent. He met up with Jim

McDonagh formerly of Enfield Boxing Club and Gleeson's Gym became, and still is, the centre of this young man's life. Another man who was quick to recognise Jimmy's ability was Terry Atlas, trainer and manager, who also discovered boxer Mike Tyson. Before his death he passed Jimmy's management on to Joe Baffi, of the Baffi Brothers Training Camp, saying, "Mind this lad, he is going to be good".

Golden Gloves

Jimmy's career as an amateur fighter really took off and he went on to win the Empire State Games in the welterweight division, (which is under 11 stone). Jimmy usually fights at about 10 and a half stone weight. He was twice a finalist in the Golden Gloves Boxing Competition. He only just lost out in a suspect split decision, against the run of the fight, to the amazement of his followers and many commentators. His disappointment led him to consider other options and he decided to go professional, thus ending five years of American amateur boxing, from 1986 to 1991.

Around this time he was being offered money to fight and he competed against some Irish team members, beating Patrick Keogh, Irish Champion in junior middle weight.

As a professional the man from Mulhussey took on Manhattan with a dream start winning thirteen fights on the trot with six knockouts and no losses.

Jimmy continues to train in Gleesons Gym, New York, where he spars with top class boxers and some World champions. He gave me an insight into the boxing life where you literally just "sleep, eat and train". You have to sacrifice a lot and winning is everything. According to Jimmy boxing is 80% mental. You have to be so mentally prepared that pain doesn't bother you. Boxing is a tough game and pain makes you fight right back.

His next target is the European Welterweight Title if the right offer comes along. If not - it's no big deal. If he wins the American Boxing Association belt he will also be eligible for a shot at the World Title. That's all further down the road as Jimmy sees himself spending another four to five years in the game.

Speaking of the Tallaght Match he said "The support was unbelievable, it felt good to come back and get a win under my belt". Jimmy is back in the States after a two week break and we wish him every success with his future plans. One thing for sure, this pleasant and down to earth young man has lost none of the values of friendliness and helpfulness of his upbringing and is doing his family, Kilcloon and his hometown proud.

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DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE A Centuries Old Recipe For Christmas Plum Pudding

8 ozs.breadcrumbs

6 eggs

8 ozs. brown sugar 8 ozs. raisins 1 large grated cooking apple 1 level teaspoon mixed spice

8 ozs. sultanas 8 ozs. currants 2 tablespoons treacle 1/2 teaspoon each of grated 8

ozs. chopped suet 4 ozs. flour

cinnamon and nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon each of ground

4 ozs. glace cherries cloves and ginger

6 ozs. finely chopped mixed peel 3 ozs. roughly chopped almonds 1/4 teaspoon salt

Sift the flour with the salt and spices; add to the breadcrumbs and mix in the sugar. Sift well, add the suet, then the cleaned prepared fruit, almonds and grated apple. Warm the treacle slightly and add to the well-beaten eggs. Stir into the dry mixture. Mix well, cover and stand for 24 hours.

Beat well, add in stout. Mixture should be soft enough to drop off the spoon but not soft enough to glide off. If a little extra liquid is needed to get this consistency, add a little water carefully.

Divide equally between three 3-pint bowls. Cover with greaseproof paper, then with a scalded and floured cloth. Tie down securely. Bring ends of pudding cloth back over the bowl and tie to form a secure handle for lifting up puddings when cooked.

Steam for seven hours. Lift up and allow to drain before storing. Allow another two full hours' steaming before serving. Have hot water come up only three-quarters the way to the top of pudding basin. Keep an even steady heat all through cooking. Each pudding is sufficient for 5 to 6 average servings, so, if you want only one such pudding, use one-third of all the above measurements of ingredients.

By the way, beef suet is easier to chop if a little sugar or flour is added to it.

Boiled Crubeens (Pig's Feet)

(Crubeens is the Irish name for pig's trotters.

6 pig's trotters (from the hind leg)

12 peppercorns

1 onion stuck with 6 cloves

Salt

1 carrot

1 bunch parsley

1 bay leaf

1 sprig thyme

Throw everything into a pot and cover with water. Bring slowly to a boil and simmer for 3 hours. Eat hot or cold. 2 servings.

Crubeens should always be eaten with your fingers. They lose half their magic if you attack them with a refined knife and fork.

Typical Irish Broth

908g/2 lb boiling beef or a fowl 2 medium onions 3400ml/6 pints water 2 medium carrots 113g./4 oz.. pearl barley 57g/2 oz. oatmeal few stalks celery pepper and salt

Put meat or fowl in cold water with pepper, salt and barley. Bring to the boil and simmer. Prepare the vegetables and add to the meat together with the oatmeal. Simmer for about $2^{1/2}$ hours.

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
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FIELD DAY

Some women may be hesitant to report acts of physical or sexual violence but the Gardai wish to assure everyone that there are ample services in place to assist them and process effectively all complaints. Reporting a matter to the Gardai does not necessarily lead to a court case as many citizens simply approach the Gardai for advice on the options open to them and the availability of relevant agencies. Outlined hereunder is a synopsis of the appropriate information identified with this subject.

Who can be Raped and who Commits Rape?

Anybody can be raped at anytime, anywhere. Women who are raped often know the person who raped them. He can be their husband, boyfriend, partner, neighbour or a complete stranger.

If You Are Raped:

If you are raped remember at all times that you are not to blame. The rapist is the person, who commits the crime, NOT YOU.

Help Is Available 24 Hours a Day:

If you are raped or subjected to an indecent assault help is immediately available to you from the Gardai and other agencies such as the Rape Crisis Centre 24 hours a day.

How The Gardai Can Support You:

At any time, day or night, trained Gardai can arrange for you to receive medical care and advice. Advice is widely available to you on the many different counselling and support services. If you are the unfortunate victim of one of those crimes, the priority is to look after you and trained members of the force are in place at every stage of the investigation.

What Is Domestic Violence?

If anybody in the home causes or even threatens or attempts to cause harm to you - it is a crime. This type of crime not only includes physical harm but also includes mental cruelty and sexual abuse.

Who Can Be Affected by Domestic Violence?

Domestic violence against women is a far more common social problem than many people might think. It's a crime which can affect children as well. A child who witnesses violence between parents may learn to accept it as a way of life and at a later stage may become involved in similar behaviour himself.

Who Commits Domestic violence?

As a general rule it is a husband or partner who commits this shattering crime against women. To the public he may appear to be a warm, loving person and a most law abiding citizen. Often such an individual will absolutely refuse to accept that he is the person responsible for this destructive, turbulent behaviour. In instances such persons believe that their abusive conduct in the home is justified.

If You Are Subjected To Domestic violence:

It's imperative that you know that no one - nobody at all - has the right to assault you. You can stop it immediately by getting the assistance of the Gardai and other agencies such as Women's Aid.

Again Help Is Available 24 Hours A Day:

If you suffer from domestic violence professional Gardai will give immediate advice and guidance. At your request a female Garda can be made available to support you throughout such a traumatic experience. Similar to rape, the Gardai can put you in contact with other organisations, who can give you counselling, advice or refuge.

The Gardai Can Support You In The Following Way:

The Gardai will advise you on the Agencies who can support and counsel you in seeking Protection/Barring Orders from the District Court. If you are not married and are the subject of violence you can still apply for a Court Order to prevent further abuse.

Save All Evidence You Can:

Women who are subjected to family violence often feel isolated, vulnerable and afraid. Where possible, you should save all evidence of attack, which may in course assist the Gardai in effecting arrest and prosecution.

Garda Procedures:

If the victim does choose to make a formal complaint the investigating Gardai will take a written statement outlining details of the ill-treatment etc. and identifying the culprit. A Garda file is then submitted for instructions whether to prosecute or not. Assuming prosecutions ensue the matter is dealt with expeditiously in the District Court. More serious cases are dealt with in the higher Circuit Court.

Protection/Barring Orders:

Victims may apply for Protection Orders to the local District Court Clerk and this process eventually progresses to a Barring Order, which effectively prohibits the spouse entering the family home. Those later orders only apply to married couples. Common Law relationships are not afforded protection under the Protection of Spouses and Children Act and must therefore resort to civil remedy.

Features

The Gardai wish to stress that any victim who requires advice on family law matters will be afforded same in the strictest confidence.

Halloween:

We ask all parents to ensure that they know the whereabouts of their children (small and not so small) on Hallowe'en night. Unfortunately many people suffer at the hands of pranksters and some of the supposed to be jokes have unfortunate consequences. Fireworks and bangers are illegal and dangerous. We encourage parents to organise events and ensure that they are properly supervised and thus play your part in minimising annoyance. The Gardai expect that all nocturnal activities (including bonfires) terminate at a reasonable hour, but certainly not later than 10pm.. We appeal for your support and cooperation. Thank you

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GARDENING HINTS

Flower Garden

This is the best time to plant roses, trees, herbaceous plants and shrubs. Continue to plant bulbs in beds and borders. Take up dahlias when cut down by frost. Plant crowns of lily-of the valley. Divide herbaceous plants and rearrange borders.

Patio containers and tubs should finally be cleared of the summer leftovers. If you're looking for something to put in your containers a popular plant for this winter is the ornamental cabbage and when planted in the centre of a tub or container and surrounded by winter pansies, can look very interesting and colourful.

In order to protect herbaceous plants from frost, cover them with a blanket of straw, bracken or peat. Put a sheet of glass, supported on two bricks, over alpines that suffer from winter damp. Apple and pear trees should be pruned once they have lost their leaves.

Remove as much debris from the garden as possible - leaves and anything that could harbour garden pests during cold weather.

Lawn Order - Mowers away

The lawn should have received its final cut for the winter and mowers put away for winter storage. Find a dry place and put the machine on a raised board to keep it off the ground. Before putting the machine away for storage, petrol and oil should be drained and the sparking plug should be removed and cleaned and fine oil sprayed in the cavity before replacing. With regard to hand mowers, these should be thoroughly cleaned and metal surfaces should be wiped over with a well soaked oily rag. Check all nuts and bolts; replace worn ones and tighten those that are loose. If your mower needs a professional service, now is the time to organise it - don't leave it until spring.

Vegetable Garden

Plant rhubarb. Lift parsnips after frost. Draw out a rough plan of present crops and arrange next season's in rotation. Cover rhubarb and seakale with strawy manure. Plant fruit trees.

Wildlife in the Garden

To encourage birds such as blackbirds into your garden, leave windfalls on the ground for the birds to feed on. Set up bird feeding tables and hang peanuts in containers for blue tits and sparrows. If you want to continue feeding bluetits etc. until their young arrive, peanuts can be bought in large quantities in most garden centres and these work out much cheaper than buying in small quantities in say, supermarkets. Remember to hang containers and to place feeding tables away from bushes and trees to prevent the local cat population using your garden as the local take-away.

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Features

NEW SCIENCE BLOCK LAUNCH

The opening of the new Science Block in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, on September 28th last proved to be one of enormous celebration and of great historic value. Due recognition was given to the important milestone by An Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds, presiding at the official opening ceremony. "Eighteen months ago I was here to lay the foundation stone for this great facility, and now it gives me tremendous pleasure to be here to preside at its opening." The College has won great international admiration for the important work it has done in the scientific field for a number of years.

The new £7.3m. Callan Science Building, financed with E.C. structural funds, was blessed by Cardinal Cahal B. Daly immediately after the opening. The building is named after Rev. Professor Nicholas Callan, who invented the induction coil at Maynooth in the early 19th century and patented the Maynooth battery.

The foundations for the building were laid on 24th June, 1992. It is the first purpose-built science building to open in the college's 200th anniversary year. It will accommodate 730 students, 280 in computer science and 450 in biology, at all levels, ranging from first year undergraduates to doctoral level. The building will have an educational infrastructure which will have the facilities to produce young graduates so well trained as to become critical elements in Ireland's industrial development. It will also provide key facilities for advanced research programmes in its designated laboratories whilst facilitating the ongoing work of Dr. Tom Cotter and Professor Martin Downes in their development of a suicide gene designed to destroy themselves and also cause cancer cells to die.

The two principal guests at the opening, An Taoiseach, Albert Reynolds, and Cardinal Cahal B. Daly were welcomed by Monsignor Miceal Ledwith, President of Maynooth College. Msgr. Ledwith spoke of the extensive development of the north campus, including a library, student apartments and restaurant and sports complex (incorporating the Student Union offices) completed in the last decade together with phase one of the Science Faculty and the construction of a new Students' Centre, which is currently under way.

With the College being one of the highest employers in Co. Kildare, this new development will be a great asset to the community.

REKINDLING THE PAST THROUGH A NAME

Keely's Corner is not just the name of a shop, it also carries rich historical significance for the people of Maynooth. The Keely name has been present for many generations in the town and the shop is located on the centre from where the Keely heritage developed. The Keely blood has been in the house since the 1850s when Thomas Keely and his wife Kate took ownership. The premises then fell into the hands of Laurence Keely their son who married Bridget Keely (nee Brazil). The daughters of the aforementioned Kathleen Landy (nee Keely), who now lives in Listowel and Margaret Bean (nee Keely), still resident in Maynooth, lived in the house as children. The house today is dwelt in by Breda Landy, Kathleen Landy's daughter. So the descendancy still lives on.

If you ask an old established local where Keely's Lane is they will point to the lane beside Keely's shop even though its real name is Coates Lane thus showing the significance of the Keely name through Maynooth's history. The corner was a

popular meeting place for the old men of Maynooth who either sat on the granite stone outside (which still exists today) or on the windowsill itself to catch up on the auld gossip ensuring they didn't miss a thing.

The shop was called "Presents 'n Mind" but this new name "Keely's Corner" in the words of the owner, Seán Horgan (who is engaged to Breda Landy) "incorporates the atmosphere of the corner back to older days".

ROCK FEATURE - 'SCHIZOPHRENICS'

Young rock bands are springing up all over the place in Maynooth. One of the reasons for this is that so many young people learn to play a musical instrument (the main ones being guitar or piano) and end up grouping together to "gig".

One such group of young people formed a band called the "Schizophrenics".

The members are William Gannon ("Ganno") on drums from 20 Leinster Cottages, Vinny Nevin (base and vocals) from Barroughstown, Cian O'Melia (guitar) from Cluain Aoibhinn, and last but not least Kevin Farrell (guitar) from Celbridge Road. The group has been together for three months now. Their main influences would be "Metallica", "Slayer", "Sperm Birds", "Therapy" and "Fugazi", of whom they would play a lot of covers. Audience participation was also part of the act and the children really enjoyed this. The show was a great success and was enjoyed by all.

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
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
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


The Final

This was probably the best display of the season by our U/10 side who are in their debut league season. Goals by David Harper, Simon Fagan and Thomas McGovern made up this


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very impressive scoreline in which Barry Coughlan and Ciaran McCullough were in commanding form.

Playing Fields for Maynooth

In the April issue of this Newsletter we reported that Kildare Co. Council had adopted a motion, proposed by Bernard Durkan T.D. "that provision be made for more open spaces in future developments in the county". This motion was for inclusion in the revision of the Draft Development Plan.

It is, in the opinion of the Maynooth Branch of Fine Gael, scandalous that in a town with 1,500 Primary and Post-Primary pupils, no provision has been made for playing fields or sports facilities. As each open space in and around the town is developed, we are in danger of becoming a concrete jungle. We therefore call on Kildare Co. Council to acquire 50 acres of land, within easy reach of the town centre, for sports and recreation. This should be done before any further development is approved and should be included in the Draft Development Plan.

Extra Space for Post Primary


A new school year is underway and still nothing concrete has been heard from the Minister of Education on the provision of the much needed additional classrooms for the Post Primary School. For well over a year now, Bernard Durkan T.D. has been raising the matter with successive Ministers for Education without success. It is over six months since the present Minister visited the school to see the position for herself.

Though the Department of Education has indicated verbally that an extension will be approved nothing has been committed to writing on the type of extension being approved or a proposed commencement date. Besides the obvious problems MAXOL

faced by pupils and staff, due to the lack of space, failure to provide the much needed extension before the start of the 1994 school year will mean that the school will not be able to provide a transition year for those students who wish to avail of it.

We therefore call on the Minister to confirm the extension and give a definite date for building to begin.

Maynooth Post Primary School

Minister of State at the Department of the Environment, Emmet Stagg T.D. has welcomed the sanctioning by the Minister for Education of the funding for repairs to the roof of Maynooth Post Primary School. The amount approved for the repairs required is £50,000 and the school has now been given the go ahead to have work carried out.

Traffic Flow Main Street

Councillor John McGinley has tabled the following motion for the next Celbridge Area Committee meeting.

"That the following steps be taken in order to improve traffic flow in the Main Street, Maynooth:-

- (a) Put box junction and double yellow lines at the Roost and Dunboyne Road junctions.
- (b) Put double yellow lines from Fusciardis to Hula Bou.
- (c) Put double yellow lines at Brady's Pub."

Greenfield Bollards

Contrary to the front page headlines in the Leinster Leader the procedure to have the bollards put in place has not met with any obstacles. As agreed with all the Councillors the Area Committee will decide on the bollards at its meeting on 29th Oct. and this decision will then go to the full Council in November, for approval.

Maynooth Development Plan

Work on the Leixlip Plan finished on 8th. Oct. after ten three hour meetings. Consideration of the Maynooth Plan will begin early November and hopefully should be completed before Christmas. The plan is then displayed for 3 months for public comment.

Mullen Bridge to Greenfield Road

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that the following work be carried out.

The gap in the wall to be repaired as a matter of urgency. Road repairs to be carried out at the entrance to Castlebridge Estate

Re-surfacing to be carried out on the road at the entrance to Greenfields.

Straffan Road Realignment

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised that the realignment of the Straffan Road should commence in January 1994.

The "thing" will finally be knocked down and this would be an ideal opportunity for the people of Maynooth to have a victory party.

Dunboyne Road

Minister Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have made further representations to Kildare County Council requesting urgent repairs and re-surfacing on the Dunboyne Road at Mariaville.

Material Dumped at Laraghbryan Cemetery

Following complaints of material being dumped at the inside of the wall at Laraghbryan Cemetry, Minister Stagg contacted Kildare County Council.

The Council have confirmed that the local area engineer will have the material removed as a matter of urgency.
