



#### **EDITORIAL**

This issue of the Newsletter has extensive coverage of the Maynooth Summer Festival which, once again, was an outstanding success. Congratulations are due to the Festival Committee chaired by Norah McDermott, to all the workers in the Community Council offices and especially to the various groups, bands, dancers, singers, footballers and musicians who entertained us during the week. Despite some initial misgivings about the new Square, the general consensus seems to be that it was an excellent venue for the various events that were held there during the Festival. One of the most positive aspects of the Festival was the extent to which new residents in Maynooth participated. We have over 3,000 new residents in the last five years and Maynooth is set to continue growing for the foreseeable future. Events like the Festival have an important role to play in developing some sense of community in the midst of such rapid growth. Sprawling dormitory towns lacking this sense of community are not pleasant places to live. Maynooth has now reached a critical size where effort must be put in to ensure that people who live in Maynooth feel they belong. Some of this has to do with getting decent arts, recreational and sports facilities for the town which are long overdue. The rest has to do with the type of hard work put into the organising the Summer Festival.

#### Jobs for the Boys (and Girls)

A certain section of the population dread August every year. Because August is when the Leaving Cert results are published and 17 and 18 year olds all over the country have their fate decided. Prospects for the school leavers in north Kildare should be much brighter than in many other parts of the country, given the huge growth in jobs in both Intel and Hewlett-Packard. The media tend to focus on the points race

and the competition for College places. But not everybody wants to go to College. Some won't have the aptitude for academic study and some will just want to start earning some money. The creation of so many jobs for both graduates and school leavers right on our doorstep should prove a tremendous boon to Maynooth in the coming years and many young people who might previously have moved out of the area or emigrated have an opportunity to live in the communities where they grew up.

# **Community Council Notes**

### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL ELECTIONS**

#### **Community Council Elections**

Elections for the new Community Council will be held at the end of August 1996. There are 63 places to be filled and two further places for the nominees of Maynooth College Executive Council and Maynooth College Student's Union. Co-options may also take place after the first meeting of the Council.

#### Arrangements for the Election

Again there are quite a lot of changes to the division of the Community Council catchment area into electoral areas compared with the last election.

The number of Council places per electoral area is based on a rough ratio of 100 voters (from the Electoral Register) per Council member.

#### **Electoral Areas**

The Electoral Areas are as follows:

- 1. Town Centre (5 places) comprises the area bounded by Bond Bridge, Mullen Bridge, Blacklion, Kildare Bridge (Dunboyne Road) and the Parish Church.
- 2. Railpark/Straffan Road (1 place) includes the Crescent.
- 3. Railpark Estate (2 places).
- 4. Greenfield Estate (5 places) includes Laurence Avenue, Maynooth Park, Greenfield Drive and Straffan Way.
- 5. Carton Court (2 places).
- 6. Kingsbry (5 places).
- 7. Greenfield Lane/ Greenfield Phase 1 (1 place).
- 8. Greenfield Phase 2 (1 place).
- 9. Greenfield Phase 3/private sites (1 place).
- 10. Beaufield (3 places).
- 11. Meadowbrook (4 places).
- 12. Cluain Aoibhinn (2 places).
- 13. College Green (2 places).
- 14. Moyglare Road/Moyglare Meadows/Moyglare Village (4 places).
- 15. Newtown/Woodlands/Ashley Court (2 places).
- 16. Newtown Court (2 places).
- 17. Parson Street/Parson Lodge/Court (1 place).
- 18. Silken Vale (2 places).
- 19. Castlebridge (1 place).
- 20. Parklands (5 places).
- 21. Rockfield (5 places).
- 22. Outlying Area A (see map) (1 place) includes the townlands of Carton Demesne, Old Carton, Catherinestown, Kellystown, Blakestown.
- 23. Outlying Area B (2 places) includes the townlands of Windgates (east side of Straffan Road), Toolestown, Corbally, Griffinrath, Moneycooley, Ballygoran, Barrogstown/West/East, Killmacreddock, Donaghmore.
- 24. Outlying Area C (3 places) includes the townlands of Rowanstown, Dowdstown, Taghadoe, Toolestown (west side of Straffan Road), Windgates (do), Newstownmacabe, Rooks, Smithstown, Johninstown, Graiguesallagh, Cowanstown, Kealstown, Graiguelin, Derrinstown, Donaghstown.

25. Outlying Area D (1 place) includes townlands of Timard, Laraghbryan East/West, The Maws, Ballycurraghan, Treadstown, Cormickstown, Crinstown and Laragh Demesne.

#### **Election Schedule**

#### **Nominations**


A Nomination Form is included in this issue of the **Newsletter**. Additional forms may be obtained from the Community Council Office.

All nomination forms should include the signature of the nominee signifying her/his acceptance of the nomination. All nominations to be submitted to the Community Council Office by Monday 26th August 1996. Any resident over 18 is eligible for the election and for voting.

#### Voting

If an election is to be held, voting papers will be distributed to all eligible households between Wednesday 28th and Friday 30th August. Votes will be collected the following week. Where votes have not been collected, they may be brought to the Community Council Office. All votes must be returned by Friday 6th September.

Counting of votes will take place on Saturday 7th September. Counting will be done by neutral volunteers under the supervision of outside scrutineers. For single seat electoral areas, the single transferable vote method of counting (as in by-elections to Dáil Éireann) will be used. For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are seats available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected, as appropriate. This system is both easy to operate, and fairer to first-to-the-post methods used in British elections. The first meeting of the new Council will take place on Monday 16th September in the Post Primary School at 8.00p.m.

# **FESTIVAL REPORT**

This years 10th Annual Community Festival **Sponsored by Guinness** took place during a week of beautiful weather and proved to be a very successful Festival. It is the fifth Festival sponsored by Guinness and we thank them for their continued support, also thanks to all the local clubs, pubs, organisations and hotel for all their help in organising events for young and old

The Festival was launched in the Glenroyal Hotel on Wednesday 3rd July to a full house and was sponsored by **Guinness** and a great night was had by all.

We had a great bonus this year for the Maynooth Guinness Festival and that was our new square. There was an abundance of talent there for eight nights and the second bonus was the weather.

The Festival started on Sunday 14th with the Tug-O-War Competition for children — teenagers and adults. This proved to be a very popular event especially with the children and teenagers. ### PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

#### New Bus Timetable

The revised timetable for the 66/66X Bus service to Maynooth, recently introduced, is very welcome. However the revision to the timetable only recognises one problem that existed with the service to Maynooth which was the fact that passengers who were primarily travelling to and from Dublin had to stop at every stop between these places to serve passengers who could use other bus services. There was a particular problem with passengers travelling to Maynooth being left in Dublin because people from much nearer the city took up the capacity of the 66 bus.

The extension of the cityspeed service to an hourly service is welcome. This still allows people from Maynooth the option to get a bus serving the complete route.

However, the question must be asked why passengers are being asked to pay £2 for this hourly express service which clearly only recognises their travelling patterns when the normal fare is only £1.65. Dublin Bus are taking a similar approach to the Nitelink service last Christmas where the fare to Maynooth is £4 and only £2.50 anywhere else.

The biggest failure with the revised timetable is the fact that we did not see any increase in the peak commuter service. This is despite the fact that in the recent survey carried out by Dr. Shelagh Waddington, Dept. of Geography, St. Patrick's College, and her students, it was shown that only over 6% of the people of Maynooth used the bus service. It is clear that we need to entice more people to separate themselves from their car seats, but the bus service will not tempt them unless the peak time services are improved. This has to change with over 40% of the residents of Maynooth travelling daily in the direction of the city. Morning peak traffic is currently backed up to Lucan and with the likely development of the areas on this route it is possible that traffic will be backed up to Maynooth in the next years. Therefore Dublin Bus should start now to recognise this market. We have already seen the population of Maynooth increase from 6,000 to over 9,000 in the last five years mainly with young couples, many owning two cars, both going into the morning traffic.

#### **Royal Canal Carpark**

As we noted before, this area was closed to traffic when the new town carpark was opened earlier in the summer. However many people are wondering why the carpark stays closed when it is beside one of the most important amenity areas in Maynooth namely the Royal Canal and the Harbour field. We know the carpark was only a short term facility offered to Iarnród Éireann when their carpark was closed, but to the many people who come down to use this amenity area they do not understand why they cannot park there. Maybe our friends on the Royal Canal Committee might consider opening this carpark at weekends so that those who want to stretch their legs and feed the ducks could have somewhere to park.

#### The Buggy brigade and that missing bridge

Still in the area of the canal it was recently mentioned to me that the old footbridge removed from Mullen Bridge and used as a level bridge over the canal to the Railway Station for the last two years is being sadly missed by the people pushing buggies in that area.

The question has been asked why this bridge could not have been left there until the new bridge is in place there. While the timber structure is alright for adults it is intimidating for small children who feel they are going to fall into the canal. Imagine the poor parent carrying the buggy and the child if not children up and down those steps. We know there is a longer route alternative but when you are rushing for the train it does not seem like an option.

#### Maynooth Development Plan... Update

It now looks as if the proposals to rezone over 300 acres mainly for residential use will now be decided in September. The two groups highlighting the issues are continuing to inform the people of Maynooth of their concerns. It is important to remember that the proposals put forward by the Councillors will have a major impact on Maynooth as we know it. It is up to you to let them know your views so that they can take these into account in making their final decisions on the future of your town.

The decisions are taken by the 25 members of Kildare County Council many of which may not know the town as well as you do. Your best approach as the period for submissions is now closed is to confirm your views again to the local Councillors asking them to convince their colleagues particularly those in their own Political Parties to support your view. The people of Clane found recently that their views were not considered by Kildare County Councillors when they voted to treble the size of that village in the next five years. Let's hope that the same situation will not happen to Maynooth which can grow to over 12,000 people without a single extra acre being zoned.

#### **Maynooth Community Festival**

As a member of the festival committee it is pleasing to note that we had another successful festival blessed again with good weather. A particularly important feature of this year's festival was the use of the splendid new Town Square for evening concerts and dances in the heart of the town. Credit should also be given to all the people who turned out to the many and interesting events held.

It is also very pleasing that many of Maynooth's newer residents took part in some of the events and also supported the others. In fact the festival has proved a good way for all the residents of the town to meet each other and develop community spirit. Put it in your diary for next year you will be very welcome. Finally, full marks to Norah and Freda and the team.

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# CITIZENS' INFORMATION CENTRE NOTES

#### **Know Your Rights**

#### **Question:**

Can you give me details of what grants are available to students wanting to study abroad?

#### Answer:

Means tested maintenance grants will be extended for the first time in the 1996/97 academic year to students following a full-time undergraduate course of at least two years duration in an EU member state. The course must be in a university or third level institution which is funded from public funds. Maintenance grants have been available for a number of years for students attending colleges in Northern Ireland.

The following courses are excluded: Courses in Medicine, Veterinary Medicine, and Teacher Training including those leading to the award of a Bachelor of Education (these courses are subject to a quota on places in Irish colleges); courses in Colleges of Further and Higher Education, courses in private commercial colleges. Also excluded are courses provided in Britain which are offered in private commercial third level colleges in Ireland and which are validated by that British college.

Further details regarding the extension of the grants system to students studying abroad is contained in the Higher Education Grants scheme 1996 which is available from local authorities. Maintenance grants will be increased by 5% in 1996/97 and the maximum maintenance grant payable will be £1,600. Income eligibility limits will increase by 2.4%.

Tax relief is allowed for the 1996/97 academic year on fees paid for approved private colleges here. These courses do not attract grants. This provision was made in last years Finance Act. Also tax relief was extended in this years Finance Act to students pursuing approved part-time undergraduate courses from Autumn 1996. Students on part-time courses are not eligible for Higher Education Grants.

The tax relief will apply to approved courses of a minimum duration of two years in publicly funded third level institutions and in private colleges which satisfy codes of standards to be drawn up by the Minister for Education (details not yet available). The relief will be confined to students who are paying their own fees and who have not already obtained a third level qualification.



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

That's about all the news for August — don't forget to support our Flag Weekend.

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


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
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# MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

The Maynooth Planning Alliance was formed as an umbrella organisation representing the various Resident's Associations in Maynooth to express their opposition to the excessive residential rezoning proposed by local councillors for the town. As is now widely known, the County Council planners' first draft of the Development Plan suggested that only a modest amount of rezoning was sufficient to cater for the projected growth in Maynooth's population until the year 2006. The five local councillors however proposed additional lands to provide for in excess of a doubling population - an increase from 9,000 to 22,000 people.

The Maynooth Planning Alliance has now held several meetings with representatives from the various residents' associations and has conducted a campaign through the media highlighting the folly of the proposals. It has also convened a public meeting, attended by over 250 people, to ascertain the concerns of Maynooth residents regarding the proposals. Following on from this, the Planning Alliance was instrumental in the submission of over 2,000 objections to the Amended Development Plan to the County Council. These concerns have centred on the following themes.

#### Loss of Character and Conversion to Dublin Suburbia

Maynooth is an historically important town with origins going back to the 12th Century. As a seat of the Earls of Kildare, an estate village of the Dukes of Leinster, the site of the National Seminary, and as a rapidly growing university town, the town has for almost a thousand years occupied a special position in Irish history. The

orderly planning of Maynooth is thus an issue of considerable national and even international significance. More so than most other towns of County Kildare,

inappropriate planning has the potential to seriously impact on the heritage and character of Maynooth at a time when such assets are seen as increasingly important attractions for employment and tourism development on a national scale. By consigning Maynooth to the role of dormitory suburb for Dublin the submerging of the intrinsic character of the town and of its historic assets is inevitable.

# Excessive Population Growth Facilitated by the Rezoning Proposals

Maynooth is not alone in being threatened with huge population increases. Since there appears to be no overall planning strategy in the north Kildare region, regional limitations to growth imposed by considerations such as water supply and sewage capacity appear to have been disregarded and excessive population growth is planned for several neighbouring towns.

Maynooth cannot hope to increase its population from 6,000 to 22,000 in 5-10 years without serious consequences for infrastructure, education and services provision. In addition, none of the figures above include the 4,000 students present in the town for most

of the year.

#### Loss of Future Jobs Potential

Building houses on the scale envisaged means that scarce water supplies and water treatment facilities are used up on residential populations. This precludes the use of such resources for certain employmentgiving industries. If the various Plans listed above are approved, a high tech firm doing similar work to Intel could not locate in north Kildare. This is just the type of industry for which access to a university town is considered highly desirable and yet we are ruling out such employment possibilities for the young people the Plan is supposed to be for.

#### Air Pollution

There has been growing attention in recent years on the role of increased nitrogen dioxide levels on respiratory disease, particularly asthma which is quite widespread in Maynooth. Up to 4,000 extra cars in Maynooth are a consequence of the proposed Plan. Already there is some evidence that health limits for nitrogen dioxide are exceeded at times. Should we treble the emissions of car exhausts without a lot more research and measurement? At present no measurements of air pollution are currently being made by Kildare County Council in the town and no mention of air pollution is made in the Plan.

#### Ring Roads Financed by New Housing Constitute Bad Planning Practice



recently been undertaken. Its principal concerns regarding road development in the Development Plan centre on the proposed ring road. The Alliance objects to the proposal to build this road in the suggested location because:

- It is no longer needed for regional traffic: the completion of the M50 will ensure that most traffic from the north heading westward will join the M4 at the M50/M4 junction.
- Through traffic from other areas heading for the M4 can turn left at Blacklion and join the M4 at the proposed Intel/Hewlett-Packard interchange.
- There is a link road between the Dublin Road and Celbridge Road at Grangewillian which Maynooth residents are already using to bypass the Main Street congestion. The distance from Blacklion to the Celbridge road using this route is 1.9kms, as opposed to 1.33km using the proposed ring road. The difference is not sufficient to justify building 1,200 houses to finance another road running through existing residential areas.
- The road will not assist in relieving congestion on the northern or western sides of the town where large new housing developments are also proposed.
- The phrase 'when finances become available' suggests that the road is unlikely to be built within the near future, if at all. The experience of similar development levy-led projects such as the long promised improvements at Bond Bridge confirms that this is a flawed approach to planning.

#### Education

There is clearly an emergent problem in educational provision in the town which will become acute if the projected rezoning materialise. All schools in the area (i.e. Celbridge, Kilcock, Leixlip, etc.) are experiencing the same difficulties of coping with increasing numbers. To cater for an additional town population of 12,127 would require a substantial investment in at least three ordinary primary schools and one major secondary school. Such a provision is extremely unlikely to be provided for in the next five years and the arrival of 12,000 extra people poses enormous educational problems.

#### Amenity

A survey carried out in spring 1996 by the Department of Geography, St. Patrick's College, Maynooth of inhabitant's preferences in terms of amenities shows the following priorities:

Desired Amenity	% of respondent
Swimming Pool	38.7%
Gym/Sports Centre	25.3%
Cinema	10.4%
Night Club/Disco	8.9%
Playing Pitches	3.9%
Facilities for Children	3.6%
Facilities for Youth	3.5%
Currently Satisfied	0.7%
Other ideas	5.0%

Only 3.9% of respondents suggested playing pitches as a priority amenity. Yet the provision of playing fields is being advanced as justification for large scale urbanisation of

adjacent areas. What playing fields are proposed are in unsuitable remote locations in the extreme north or south ends of the town. According to this survey the active amenity provision in the proposed plan would meet the requirements of only a very small number of people and clearly is unacceptable in terms of the loss of passive amenity which the residential rezoning is associated with. There exists a perceived need in Maynooth for indoor amenities, including community facilities for small groups to allow for a range of cultural activities. The plan as proposed makes no provision for these needs.

# Maynooth and the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning

Maynooth Planning Alliance has been an active supporter of the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning. Together with that body the problems of the region have been widely publicised. It is therefore to be greatly regretted that the Kildare County Council recently voted to accept the Development Plan for Clane which allowed for a near trebling of its population. This was in spite of 97% of the population of Clane opposing such proposals and in the face of opposition from Kildare County Council planners. The Maynooth and Kilcock Plans will be presented for ratification to the County Council most likely in September. The Planning Alliance will appraise you of how your locally-elected councillors voted on this most important issue.

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


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# OLD GREENFIELD RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION



#### **ICMA**

Every summer St. Patrick's College plays host to the ICMA (Irish Church Music Association) Summer School. The Catholic Summer School beckons participants from all over Ireland and further afield. It consists of tutorials for choirs and organists, morning and evening prayer services and a Mass celebrated every day. The event is organised by a 10 member elective council, one of whom is Ciaran Tackney, a native of Cootehill in Cavan and a graduate of Maynooth, who informed me that there were over 280 participants in 1996 alone.

#### **Camp Ireland**

Organised each year all across Ireland are summer camps for foreign students. They are intended to be 'learning holidays' and provide an excellent opportunity for young people of various nationalities to mix and make friends. Some lifetime friendships (and even romances!) are formed this way.


One such organisation is Camp Ireland, started by Andrew's Travel Consultancy (A.T.C.) in 1965, and enjoyed by hundreds every year. Camp Ireland has centres all over Ireland and has been held in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth for the past five years. The groups come individually, and stay for up to six weeks, but many only stay a fortnight. This year the students are mainly Italian. The Camp organises half and full day outings, with English classes in the mornings and sports and other activities in the afternoons. The students stay locally, and integrate with local youngsters through the No Name Clubs, whose members join their European friends every day for sports and fun.

Camp Ireland has a high success rate nationally, and brings a summer boost to the town of Maynooth in particular when our own students have deserted us for those sunnier climates. **New Degree** 

The Department of Theology are proud to announce the inception of a new Degree course for the coming college year. It is similar in content to the Baccalaureate in Theology and Arts, however it specialises in Theology. It is aimed at mainly lay students who would wish to gain a better understanding of the Christian Faith. It is covered by the Higher Education Grants Scheme and also by the Free Fees Scheme run by the Dept. of Education. The course lasts for three years and students are chosen for Honours or General Degrees on the basis of their first year exam results. Successful Honours students are expected to take a course in the biblical languages. The main topics to be studied are Moral and Dogmatic Theology and the Scriptures.

# GYMNASTICS IN MAYNOOTH!

On Tuesday 16th in the warm summer sun, a small group arrived from Cork to the Glenroyal Hotel. They were here to put on a gymnastics display, and what a display! Three supple little girls, Thérèse Tobin, Philomena McCullagh and Joanne Rice, under the careful observation of their trainer, Leonard Bhattachayia, stretched and strained and showed a force and determination not often witnessed in performers of any age.

Leonard Bhattachayia has been involved in the world of gymnastics for almost a decade. He is originally from South Cork, and has studied under German, British and Zimbabwean coaches, to qualify as an Olympic Artistic Gymnastics Coach. What brings him to Maynooth? Des Hogan, the Kildare Coach, is nearing his retirement, and being personally acquainted with the skills of Mr. Bhattachayia, has offered him the post.

In the last four years, Leonard has had the highest success rate in Ireland with his students. He has taught two competitive classes in Cork, and since starting in a new club last September, already two students have qualified for the National Finals in Mosney. Every one of his previous finalists have enjoyed National Championship Status, winning 90% gold Medals. Many of Leonard's students have also made it to international level, competing against Scotland and Wales, and travelling to Lilleshall, Birmingham, and also to Portugal, Spain and even further afield. From a local point of view, Leonard is already well known through the annual Cork/Kildare competition, and has even been interviewed on Cork Multichannel T.V.

The perfect age to start gymnastics, according to Mr. Bhattachayia, is four or five. The younger the better, he says. The children who start at this age have a better chance of learning, and of course, their bodies are much more flexible then. All Leonard's classes start out as recreational. The

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
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
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emphasis is on fun. However, if a particular child shows potential, Leonard will contact the parents about training for competition. The competitive training is similar to the recreational, stressing the importance of stamina, flexibility, balance, body awareness, co-ordination and strength. However, it is naturally more intensive. The importance of parental support cannot be stressed enough, and indeed, we met one mother who travels to every event with her daughter.

Financial expenditure can be a burden, admittedly, but Leonard plans to combat this by involving parents in the fund-raising side of things. The classes will probably be after school hours, but nothing is final as of yet. Leonard hopes to have a meeting for all parents involved about a month after classes begin, and at regular intervals yearly thereafter.

Leonard enjoys his work thoroughly, and wishes to integrate all children of the community. He has worked regularly with mentally handicapped children, and hopes to continue to do so, preferring to mix his classes. There will be another display, hopefully towards the end of August or the beginning of September, so be sure not to miss it! Here's hoping Leonard Bhattachayia can put Kildare on the Gymanstics map of Ireland, and indeed, the world, as he has done for Cork.

#### Emma



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

# **Gardening Hints**

#### **AUGUST IN THE GARDEN**

This month's weather is usually similar to July's. Signs of Autumn may not be apparent, however, plants and trees have lost their youth and many have become overgrown and tired.

Lawns: mow regularly, water sensibly during dry spells. Apply a good lawn fertilizer and weedkiller.

Roses: once flowered, prune ramblers. Watch for and pull out suckers. Continue to spray against mildew.

**Perennials:** never let perennials dry out, particulary autumn-flowering species. Dead-head all faded flowers not needed for their seeds.

Annuals: water and dead-head regulary. Water well if ground is dry.

Biennials: dead-head plants that have finished flowering.

Bulbs: plant bulbs for early spring flowering. Dead-head

and tie in dahlias. Rub out young buds on side shoots.



Fruit: peach trees need to be pruned after fruiting and replacement shoots tied in. Plant new strawberry plants, and layer runners on established plants. Cut back raspberry canes after fruiting to just above soil level. Support new canes and sprinkle fertilizer on surrounding soil. Prune blackcurrant bushes.

Vegetables: when vegetable crops have been harvested the ground should be prepared for more cultivation. Lettuces, radishes, spinach and turnips can still be sown. Onions and carrots for winter harvesting can be sown under cloches. Sow spring cabbages and winter greens early in the month. Fertilize brussel sprouts using a general fertiliser. Spray and feed runner beans. Start lifting maincrop potatoes. This is the time to fumigate greenhouses to eradicate pests and diseases.

#### **ENJOYING HERBS IN THE HOME**

#### Herbs in Medicine

The use of plants to cure disease is as old as the human race. Man has been dependant on the plant world for existence in a nutritional sense throughout much of his history; it was inevitable, therefore, that a knowledge of herbal medicine would evolve. At first, it must have been trial and error - for many plants are poisonous.

Although herbal remedies have become less valued since then, due mainly to the advent of the synthetic drug industry, the last five to ten years have shown an increasing interest in herbalism.

#### **Medicinal Preparations**

Infusions, decoctions and teas are principally for internal use; compresses, poultices and oils for external use - these are however interchangeable. It is the essential oil that is important so every drop must be extracted. Home-made remedies do not, of course, contain any preservatives so they should be used up as quickly as possible, as they will not last.

Infusions: These are the simplest and can be made with dried or fresh herbs.

25g fresh herbs to 600ml boiling water

15g dried herbs to 600ml boiling water

Cover tightly, and allow to infuse for 10-15 minutes before straining.

Use hot or cold, and within a couple of hours.

Sweeten with honey if preferred.



Decoctions: Using the same ratio of herbs to water, soak the herb or pounded stem, root or seeds in cold water for at least 10 minutes before bringing to the boil in an enamel (not metal) saucepan. Cover and simmer for about 5 minutes, then leave to steep for at least another 10 minutes. Cool, strain and use.

Compresses: These are used externally, hot or cold depending on the effect required. Soak pieces of lint in a very strong herbal decoction and hold over the affected area (or bandage in place). When a cold compress warms through contact with the skin, replace with another cold one. When a hot compress becomes cold, repeat the process.

Poultices: Applied externally, usually hot. It is applied either directly to the affected area or encased in muslin or cheesecloth and soaked before application.

Ointments: A base of Petroleum jelly. Combine 125g of jelly with 25g of the crushed herb, and simmer together for 15-20 minutes.

#### Spicy Vegeburgers

#### Makes 8

100g/4oz wholewheat breadcrumbs 50g/2oz walnuts, very finely chopped

3 tbsp chopped fresh parsley

2 tbsp sunflower oil

1 onion, grated

3 carrots, grated

2 garlic cloves, chopped

2.5cm/lin. piece fresh root ginger, finely chopped

11/2 tbsp mild curry paste

400g/14oz can cannellini or haricot beans, drained

1 red pepper, seeded and finely chopped

1 courgette, finely chopped

2 tbsp fresh lemon juice

2 eggs, beaten

seasoning

hot naan bread and fresh tomato chutney, to serve.

- Combine the breadcrumbs, walnuts and parsley; set aside. Heat the oil, add the onion, carrots, garlic and ginger and fry gently, stirring, for about 5 minutes until the vegetables are softened. Stir in the curry paste and cook for 1 minute; remove from heat.
- Mash or blend the beans to a rough purée. Stir into the vegetable mixture with the pepper, courgette and lemon juice. Stir in six tablespoons of crumbs and season well; reserve the remainder. Stir thoroughly, then cool. Chill for 30 minutes.
- Divide the mixture into eight portions, then shape each one into a patty. Coat in beaten egg, then in crumbs, pressing on firmly; repeat and chill until needed.
- Cook on a moderate barbecue for 4-5 minutes on each side until nicely browned. Serve with naan bread and fresh tomato chutney.

#### Fresh Tomato Chutney

#### Serves 8

1 small red onion, finely chopped

4 plum tomatoes, halved, seeded and diced

1tbsp red wine vinegar

1 tbsp sunflower oil

· 1/2 tsp chilli powder seasoning

Combine all the ingredients in a bowl, then leave to allow the flavours to infuse for up to an hour. Serve with Spicy vegeburgers.

### Seared Salmon with Almond and Summer Herb Stuffing

#### Serves 6

1.25kg/21/2lb salmon, filleted 2tbsp fresh lemon juice or lime juice grated rind of 1 lime or 1/2 lemon small bunch of fresh mint small bunch of fresh basil 15g/1/2oz fresh parsley 50g/2oz ground almonds 75g/3oz butter, softened oil, for brushing seasoning barbecued new potatoes with mixed leaf and herb salad, to serve

Sprinkle the flesh side of each salmon fillet with half of the lemon or lime juice and seasoning, then set aside.

- Make the stuffing: chop the herbs, then add remaining lemon or lime juice and rind, almonds, butter and seasoning;
- Spread the stuffing over the flesh of one fillet and cover with the other fillet. Tie them together at 2.5cm/lin intervals, then brush the skin lightly with oil.
- 4. Cook on a moderate barbecue for 15-20 minutes, turning once until the salmon is tender. Slice the salmon into steaks and serve with potatoes and salad.

#### Soft Berry Fruits in Passion Fruit Fromage Frais

#### Serves 6

450g/1lb low fat fromage frais 3 tbsp thick Greek yogurt 40g/11/2oz icing sugar, sifted 6 passion fruit, halved 4 small bananas 450g/1lb selection of small berry fruits 2 tsp clear honey



- Put the fromage frais, yogurt and icing sugar into a bowl and mix together. Scoop the seeds from the passion fruit and fold into the fromage frais mixture.
- Peel the bananas, cut into cubes and stir into the bowl. Reserve some of the soft fruit and mix in the remainder.
- Spoon the mixture into glass serving bowls. Decorate with the reserved fruit and strawberry leaves, if you like. Drizzle over the honey and serve.

### SINN FÉIN NOTES

#### Resist carnival of hate

Sinn Féin members, along with other citizens outraged by the events of the second week of July, i.e. the State and Loyalist violence directed at the nationalists of the Six counties in response to peaceful protest, have initiated a "Nationalist Solidarity Campaign".

The purpose of this campaign group is twofold. Firstly, to stand alongside the beleagured Nationalists of the North. particularly those in the Lower Ormeau Road, the Garvaghy Road and the Bogside and show them that there are people in the South who care. Secondly, to secure popular support for the demand that all marches with the consent of the people of the area they go through, are re-routed.

#### Local activities

On the 18th of July we held a white-line picket on the Main Street of Naas and by the time you read this we will have organised several more around the north of the county as well as a petition and the production and distribution of a leaflet on the Orange Order. We also attended the Irish National Congress Rally at St. Stephen's Green on the 17th of July.

#### The re-routing of Orange marches

Why object to this "cultural expression"? Nobody opposes the Orange Order's right to march — it's just very few Nationalists want the Orange Order marching through their locality. The reasons for this are legion.

- i) The Orange Order is a sectarian, anti-Catholic organisation. This is reflected in its constitution by General Law No. 4, which states: "Any member dishonouring the institution by marrying a Roman Catholic shall be expelled and it shall be deemed an offence for any member to facilitate Sunday sports, amusements or dances organised by Roman Catholics".
- ii) The Orange Order is Fascist in its objectives in that it seeks to smother class divisions and social diversity within Ireland's Protestant community by creating an "us and them" situation. This together with denying Nationalists their rights is how it shores up Unionist domination. Promoting sectarianism, it stands in the way of any attempt to heal division.
- iii) Orange marches through Nationalist areas often result in those areas becoming the subject of attack. Indeed, it was the Apprentice Boys' "parade" in Nationalist Derry which provided the spark which lit the bonfire in August 1969 when an RUC/Loyalist mob attacked the Bogside. This march was abandoned for 24 years but in 1995 was started again with resulting RUC assaults on peaceful protesters. This "parade" occurs this year on the 10th of August.

iv) These marches frequently include the singing of songs with lyrics such as:

> "Slaughter, slaughter, holy water: Slaughter the Papists one by one. We will tear them asunder And make them lie under The Protestant boys who follow the drum."

Also,

"Poor Croppies, ye knew that your sentence was

When you heard the dread sound of the Protestant

In memory of William we hoisted his flag And soon the bright orange put down the green rag."

Another Loyalist favourite goes like this:

"If guns were made for shooting And skulls were made to crack Then you'll never see a better Taig Than with a bullet in his back."

"Papist", "Croppie" and "Taig" are all derogatory terms for Catholics.

The above songs have been well documented by writers on the Northern conflict.

- v) The communities through which these marches are being forced have suffered much from Loyalist violence. Many of the Nationalist housing estates along the Garvaghy Road for instance were built to house families burnt out during the 1974 Loyalist rebellion against the Sunningdale agreement. The Lower Ormeau Road has lost 31 people at the hands of Loyalist death squads. The Orange response to this was to chant "Five-Nil" outside a bookies' where five innocent people were shot. Another of their taunts was "Teabag Theresa", a reference to a woman from the area shot 19 times in the head.
- vi) The Orange Order not only inflames sectarian hatred among Protestants, it achieves the same among Catholics when it tramps down a Catholic street. Young Catholics are seeing Protestants in a purely negative light despite the enormous contribution Ireland's Protestant community have made to the Irish nation. It is tragic that a Church's name has been hijacked by such bigots who only speak for a minority of Irish Protestants. The Orange Order has seventy to eighty thousand members.
- vii) During the fifty years of Stormont's existence (1922 to 1972) the Orange Order effectively held state power in Northern Ireland.



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
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
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### **Party Political**

All Ministers and almost all Unionist M.P.s were members. In the words of Sir Basil Brooke, first Prime Minister in Stormont:

"I am an Orangeman first and a Member of Parliament second.

All I can boast is we have a Protestant parliament for a Protestant people."

This was the worst period of institutionalised sectarianism in the Six County statelet. Nationalists were deprived of jobs, houses, equal political representation and the right to express their culture.

Still today Unionism, whose largest party is inextricably linked to the Orange Order, is backed by the Armed Might of the British Government. In many ways Orange marches are a means of saying we still rule the roost. They go through Nationalist areas because in words of one Garvaghy Road resident:

"You don't plant a burning cross in your own front garden."

Would you want one of these marches to go through your area?

### **FINE GAEL NOTES**

#### **Allocation of Grants**

Mr. Bernard Durkan T.D. Minister for State at the Department of Social Welfare announced the allocation of grants to the following local groups from his Department:

- 1. Maynooth Adult Daytime Education
- 2. Leixlip Women's Studies
- 3. Irish Association for Spina Bifida
- 4. Celbridge Women's Group
- 5. Leixlip Resource Centre for the Unemployed
- 6. Kilcock & District Community Council

#### Drugs

The government approval in July 1995 for a multi-faceted drugs package aimed at tackling drug trafficking and abuse which is at the root of much of the crime in our society. Much of this package has been implemented including:

- (a) A Garda National Drugs Unit under the control of a Deputy Commissioner.
- (b) The Criminal Justice (Drug Trafficking) Bill allowing for questioning of drug traffickers for up to seven days and restricting the right to silence in drug trafficking cases.
  (c) Drug Trafficking Bill in the Dáil to amend the 1935 Public Dance Halls Act vis-a-vis entry in plain clothes by a member of the Garda to venues where a Public Dance Hall Licence is in force to investigate suspected drug trafficking offences.

#### **Drugs in Prisons**

Minister Nora Owen has taken steps to tackle the drugs problem in our prisons including:

- (1) A secure drugs free unit in the Training Unit in the Mountjoy Prison Complex.
- (2) On 3rd July 1996 a New Drug Treatment Centre in Mountjoy Prison opened.
- (3) In Mountjoy, cameras installed in the visitor area and facilities put in place to search prisoners coming from visits. Mr. John Bruton, Taoiseach recently made the following points in reference to drugs:

"It is important to note that as far as drugs are concerned those who begin to use these lethal products should realise that, not only are they endangering their own lives, but the money they pay to pushers is liable to end up being used to finance the activities of organised mobsters and contract killers. Without the income supplied by drug users, drug barons would be put out of business".

#### Back to School Allowances

Back to School Clothing & Footwear Allowance available from the Department of Social Welfare.

Dep. Bernard Durkan has announced that people willing to avail of the Back to School Clothing & Footwear Allowance may apply between now and September 30th 1996. Dep. Durkan states that:

"this year as the allowance will be paid on an age related basis, together with it being increased by £3 per child, several thousand families throughout the country will benefit. The payment will be £43 for each child aged between 2 and 11 and £58 for each child between 12 and 22. The higher rate will be paid for children who are under 12 years of age attending secondary school".

The allowance is available to families getting either a Department of Social Welfare or a Health Board payment.

People wishing to avail of these grants should contact Minister Durkan at (01) 8748 444 at the Department of Social Welfare.


#### **Maynooth Town Improvement Works**

#### **Bond Bridge**

The full Council deferred consideration of Cllr. John McGinley's motion (the Council taking out a loan to build the bridge and repay from special development levies) until the Estimates meetings in November which decides on the Councils Budget for 1997.

However Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for decision by the Celbridge Area Committee at its Meeting on the 29th July:

'that special development levies be increased to £4,000 per house on all future planning permissions granted for housing west of Bond Bridge, Maynooth in order to secure the financing of the new bridge.'

#### Old Greenfield

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for discussion at the Celbridge Area meeting on the 29th July. "That priority be given to the drainage and re-surfacing of the Back Lane, Old Greenfields, Maynooth". In addition, Cllr. McGinley has asked that three public lights be erected in the Back Lane.

#### "Maynooth" Sign on Leixlip Road

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the County Engineer to put this sign back in place. It was knocked down over two years ago.

#### Moneycooley Road/Straffan Road Junction

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the County Engineer to move the R406 Road sign from the present location as it is blocking the vision of traffic coming from the Moneycooley Road.

#### **Blacklion Halting Site**

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the County Secretary to provide new and larger caravans where these are required.

#### Kingsbry

Now that the required road resurfacing and provision of Public Lights in Kingsbry have been resolved, Cllr. John McGinley has tabled a motion requesting that Kingsbry be taken in charge by Kildare County Council.

#### Maynooth Main Street and Footpaths

The improvement plans for the Main Street and footpaths were approved at the Celbridge Area meeting on the 11th July.

The following was agreed on the outstanding issues.

- 1. Closure of Doctors Lane: Access to the Lane will be from the Square and Geoghegan's Lane. Such closure will be subject to the provision of adequate access for delivery vehicles using Doctors Lane.
- 2. Parson St/College Road Re-alignment: This proposal has been withdrawn.
- 3. Main St/Mill St. Junction: Proposals provide improved facilities for pedestrians at this junction. The Council Engineer ruled out a mini Roundabout in this location, as it would be a danger to pedestrians and cyclists. Main Street/Mill Street traffic will still have priority.
- 4. Bus Stop at T.S.B.: Subject to agreement with Dublin Bus, this bus stop will be relocated further east of the present location in order to improve traffic flow.
- 5. Wall mounted street names will be included as part of the scheme. The Council hope to have the work on Main Street and footpaths completed before Christmas 1996.

#### Celbridge Road, Maynooth.

Kildare County Council have now sought tenders for the drainage and resurfacing of this road from the Straffan Road Junction to the Obelisk Lane. The upgrading of this road was agreed by the County Engineer following representations from Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D. and Cllr. John McGinley.


#### Maynooth out of luck in Blitz Mini-Féile U/14 Hurling Blitz



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

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
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#### Maynooth Town 2 San Francisco Ladies

To her husband Tony, daughters Antoinette, Martina and Jaqui we extend our sincere sympathy.

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


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# GUINNESS 7-A-SIDE SOCCER
