



Dear Editor.

Maynooth currently is suffering from chronic traffic congestion and a lack of amenity space. I would like to propose the following which will address both those concerns and also improve our general well being and environment. Develop the northern bank of the Royal Canal as a foot/cycle path. The advantages of such a development would be to:

- 1. Provide a safe alternative means of transport in Maynooth.
- 2. Reduce the no. of cars and bicycles on the roads as more people are encouraged to use the foot/cycle path.
- 3. Provide a welcome amenity area in the village and surrounding area.
- 4. Encourage people to exercise more where it is safe and pleasant to do so.

If such a cycle path were to be extended to include Kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip it would be of immense benefit to the three villages as well as the new industries along the route. January Community Council Meeting

The third meeting of the Council since the election will take place on Monday 20th January, 1997. Members should note that under the Constitution of the Council any member that misses three consecutive meetings is considered to have resigned their seat and the Council will accept nominations for replacement members from the electoral area concerned. It is important that groups and residents' associations ensure that their representatives attend the Community Council bimonthly meetings.

Maynooth Directory 1997

Just a short reminder that the final closing date for accepting advertisements for the 1997 Maynooth Directory is the end of January. The Directory when completed, will be delivered free to every house in the town. For residents it is an invaluable source of useful local information and for the advertisers it is an opportunity to make their business known to everyone in the town.

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MAYNOOTH PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

Heritage Town Project

We have written to a number of local groups whose input we feel is essential to the success of this project. This is the first step towards the completion of a plan which will be pursued with these interested groups.

The following is a general summary of some of the criteria by which Bord Failte assessed the applications of towns who achieved heritage status under their last programme.

- · A number of conserved buildings would be open to visitors.
- An integrated signage system within and approaching the
- · Good range of quality accommodation, restaurants and
- A visitors centre introducing the towns heritage theme, with evening entertainment linked to the towns historic and heritage theme.
- An integrated traffic management plan incorporating parking.

Following designation as a Heritage Town a limited company was formed usually including representatives from groups such as the following:

- The Local Authority
- The Regional Tourism Board
- The Chamber of Commerce
- The Tidy Towns Committee
- Local Historical Society

So far we have approached a number of local groups, but this number can be increased in consultation with the existing members. Statutory Bodies and Regional Groups will be approached when we feel that we have proposals to put to them.

Kildare County Council produce Strategic Plan

Following the request from the Minister for the Environment Mr. Brendan Howlin, Kildare County Council has completed a Strategic Plan for the development of the entire County. The Plan takes into account a number of other Regional Reports including the Dublin Transport Initiative (DTI) Report, the Dublin Regional Report (Dublin Strategic Development Report) and the Mid-East Regional Report (Regional Development Report for Counties Meath, Wicklow and Kildare). It is clear from the proposals in the plan that the development of the County will continue to be impacted by it's proximity to the Dublin Region. However the planners believe that Kildare should be developed in a balanced manner. It is clear that further large levels of rezoning for Residential use in the north-eastern part of the County would be contrary to these aims.

Towns like Maynooth and Celbridge together with Leixlip and Kilcock have considerable landbanks still unbuilt from the 1985 Plan. Therefore it may well be the case that the creation of a larger landbank would not serve any useful

purpose. The decisions will be taken at the end of the day by the elected members of Kildare County Council.

Aspirations for 1997

If we were to be granted three wishes for the new year they would have to be (1) that we finally see the implementation of Traffic by-laws in Maynooth and (2) that we see the work commence on the renewal of the main street area which includes the paving of the footpaths and (3) the restoration of Maynooth Castle. In 1996 we saw the completion of the Straffan Road works including the new Town Square. Another important development was the opening of the Glenroyal Leisure Centre. These are things that will make us all proud to say we live in Maynooth.


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
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MAYNOOTH TIDY TOWNS

C.I.C. NOTES

Know Your Rights

Ouestion:

What are the new rules on working and getting Unemployment Assistance?

Answer:

From the end of November (as announced in the Budget) there will be a new way of assessing income from insurable employment and receipt of Unemployment Assistance, which allows you to keep more Unemployment Assistance.

- (1) You will only get Unemployment Assistance if you are available for employment on 3 days in any 6 consecutive days (as at present).
- (2) If you are single on Long-Term Unemployment Assistance of £64.50 and get e.g. 2 days work at £30 a day

a)£10 per day will be disregarded £60 - £20 = £40

b)60% of the remainder (£40) = £24 is then deducted from your weekly rate £64.50 leaving £40.50 which is your Unemployment Assistance for the week.

Your total income will be as follows:

Income from employment

£60

+ Unemployment Assistance <u>£40.50</u>

£100.50

(3) If you are married with 2 children on Long-term Unemployment Assistance £129.40 and you get work for 2 days at £30 a day the means assessed against your UA is 60% of £60 or £36 (no £10 disregard)

£129.40 minus £36 = £93.40

So your total income would be £93.40 + £60 = £153.40



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BOND BRIDGE ACTION GROUP

Campaigning To Put Lives First

As we approach the New Year, it would be nice to be able to report that we are closer to our goal of getting the new bridge built. Unfortunately this is the County of Kildare, where the value of a human life seems to be of little importance to the people who make this sort of decision. It would however be fair to say that we got close. The Celbridge Area Committee managed to get Kildare County Council to give an up to date estimate of the cost of the new bridge. £750,000 to carry out the necessary re-alignment plus £150,000 extra to comply with new specifications from C.I.E. for all new bridges over the railway line (An extra burden of which C.I.E. will pay nothing.) Armed with this information the Area Committee sat down to resolve the problem. The facts read as follows.

1. LEVIES IMPOSED TO DATE	£353,000.
2. LEVIES SPENT TO DATE	£120,000
3. BALANCE AVAILABLE	£233,000
4. FUNDING REQUIRED	£517,000

There are almost 30 acres of land, in the area, awaiting development under the 1985 Development Plan. The Area Committee agree to increase the Special Development Levies for Bond Bridge to £22,000 per acre. £22,000 x 30 =£660,000, enough to do the job and an extra few bob for the lads to have a couple of lunches while they are planning and designing our lovely new bridge. Alas this is County Kildare, five days after the local County Councillors agree the new levies, the County Council officals give a revised estimate of the cost, £1,500,000. Yes, an increase of £600,000 in a few days. A trip overseas to see how they build bridges in distant exotic lands perhaps? No, not this time. The extra cost is to build the link road between Meadowbrook Estate to the Straffan Road. As chairperson of this group I have seen and heard some strange things in local government but if they get away with this one we may all stop wasting our time voting (if ever we do get the chance again) to elect local councillors. The ball is now back in the hands of the residents of the Newtown area. The committee of the Bond Bridge Action Group have tried every avenue to make the County Council see reason. Never did we expect them to spend general taxpayer's money on this project. Through special levies, they were given means to provide the infrastructure, to enable residents of this area to go about their daily lives in safety. There must be many County Councils throughout Ireland that would jump at such a chance, not in Kildare. This Committee will continue to put the case to the powers that be. We still have a few irons in the fire and the support from our local County Councillors and T.D.'s is still strong

in most cases. Ultimately it's pressure from individual residents and residents' associations that will see the job done. Early in the new year, we would hope to arrange another Public Meeting to consider what further action we can take to have this matter resolved before someone is killed. In the meantime we would wish one and all a Happy and Safe New Year and please, driving or walking, TAKE EXTRA CARE CROSSING BOND BRIDGE.



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
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CELBRIDGE CAMERA CLUB Snaps up the Celtic Trophy in Banbridge Co. Down

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GARDA NEWS

Crime Prevention — General Guidelines Security.

A. When Shopping

- 1. If possible, avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- 2. Park your car in a recognised car park or other secure place.
- 3. When travelling in your car, do not leave bags lying on the seat.
- 4. Be careful regarding your cheque books, cheque cards and pin numbers etc.
- 5. When paying for goods, try not to expose large amounts of cash in your possession.
- 6. Do not carry wallets, purses, etc. in easily accessible pockets and be aware of pick-pockets in crowded shopping areas.
- 7. When in restaurants, be careful with regard to your bags and purchases.
- 8. Prior to leaving your vehicle, ensure you have locked all the doors and windows are rolled up tight. Make sure the steering lock, if fitted, is engaged and if you have an alarm, ensure you have it on.
- 9. Never leave any possessions/purchases on view inside the car. If you have to leave them, discreetly lock them in the boot.
- 10. Do not hide spare keys within the vehicle.
- 11. Be vigilant when returning to your car with your purchases.

B. Security of your Homes

- 12. Be security conscious with regard to your home, in particular, when you will be absent, try and make it appear as if your home is occupied and have someone look after it. Contact the local Gardai and let them know when your home will be vacant and be vigilant with regard to your neighbour's security, also the elderly and those living alone.
- 13. Check out callers to your home fully and ask for identification. Do not admit strangers to your home.
- 14. Be alert and report any suspicious activity, persons or vehicles to your local Gardai immediately.

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
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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

When Minister Howlin suspended the ability of Kildare County to pass further town Development Plans on September 23rd, it signalled a rejection to the piecemeal town-by-town approach being operated by Kildare County Council. In his letter the Minister ordered that instead of this approach the Council provides, as a matter of urgency, a Strategic County Development Plan which would govern the decisions to be made at local level and ensure that the commitment of land resources and infrastructure at local level was only that which was necessary to fulfill a demonstrable need at the regional scale. A 'top down' approach which first established the overall growth in population which was likely to occur in the county, and a hierarchical allocation of lands to meet this, and only this, need was envisaged.

This Strategic County Plan was forwarded to councillors on 20th November last and may well by now have been approved by the Minister, thus setting the stalled development planning process in action again throughout County Kildare.

The Fastest Growing County

The Plan itself reveals that Co. Kildare is now the fastest growing county in Ireland, with the highest rates of inmigration and a rate of natural increase in population twice the national average. It states that 15,000 journeys are made from Kildare into Dublin each day, 75% of them by car, and most of them from the north Kildare towns of Maynooth, Celbridge and Leixlip. It highlights the contrast between an overdeveloped and congested northern part of the county, and an underdeveloped southern part where population is still in decline. It emphasises the unsustainable nature of many urban and rural developments due to limitations of water supplies and waste treatment systems, pressure on roads, and urban encroachment on rural and amenity areas. The Plan also highlighted the risk of Maynooth, Celbridge and Leixlip joining to form a huge conurbation in the absence of strict development controls. These are all issues which have occupied Maynooth Planning Alliance over the past year, and it is extremely satisfying to see their explicit recognition in this Plan.

To address these issues, the County Council planners propose a significant geographical shift for future development. Instead of allowing market forces i.e. the building industry to continue to target North Kildare alone for further urban development, it is proposed to redirect such pressures southwards to the central part of the county towards the Naas-Newbridge/Kilcullen triangle. Such a strategy, if successfull, would ease the pressures on Maynooth in particular and would be welcomed by the Maynooth Planning Alliance. A pause in the breakneck growth of Maynooth would enable schools, roads, amenities etc to catch up with the excessive growth in population

foisted on the town in recent years by the over generous provision of building land in the last town Development Plan. In addition, the spreading of development would enable those parts of the south of the county which presently need urban development to benefit.

Next Five Years

The population projections for Celbridge Rural District, which encompasses Maynooth and most of the North Kildare towns imply a total need for residential land for just over 4,000 people more during the next five years. This would be equivalent to rezoning approximately 125 acres in *total* between Leixlip, Maynooth and Celbridge. Accordingly, as the Plan itself emphasises, any substantial zoning of lands in Maynooth and Celbridge would be actions which would run against the objectives adopted by the councillors themselves.

Maynooth Planning Alliance is happy to report this shift in policy and now calls on the elected representatives of this community to act to implement these objectives in a real and transparent manner. Stances taken last summer are no longer appropriate to these changed circumstances. Development-led planning is out and planning-led development is in for Kildare. A radical new direction is apparent in Kildare planning strategy and Maynooth Planning Alliance calls for an imaginative and radical response from its local representatives.

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POTATO-CELERIAC PANCAKES WITH CREAM AND CELERY

(A pancake made of grated potatoes)

Preparation: 15 minutes Cooking time: 30 minutes

Serves 4

2 large potatoes 1 small celeriac (about 3¹/₂ oz/100g) Salt 2oz/60g butter 1 tbsp peanut oil

1 medium onion, preferably white The pale heart of a head of celery a few celery leaves

2 tbsp creme fraîche or whipped double cream A pinch of freshly grated nutmeg

Peel the potatoes and celeriac and wipe clean. Grate finely. Mix & season with salt. With your hands divide the vegetables into 8 balls, and flatten each into a pancake about 5/8 in / 11/2 cm thick. Heat the butter and oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the pancakes and cook until lightly browned on one side, turn over. Press with spatula to hold

Peel the onion and cut into thin slices. Salt lightly and place in a strainer to let the salt draw out the onion's flavour.


together. Cook for 15 to 20 minutes,

turning occasionally.

Thinly slice and set aside the stalks from the celery leaves.

When the pancakes are cooked arrange them around the edge of an oven proof platter. Spread some creme fraîche or whipped cream on each pancake, sprinkle with nutmeg and top with thinly-sliced onion. Put the platter under the grill or in a very hot oven for a couple of minutes. Before serving, put the sliced celery heart and leaves in the centre of the platter.

Serve immediately.



SHALLOTS IN RED WINE

Use an intense wine such as a Cotes du-Rhone for the sauce, and serve with roast tenderloin of beef or grilled steak.


Preparation time: 15 minutes Cooking time: 20 - 30 minutes

Serves 4

14oz/420g medium shallots, all the same size
3oz/90g butter,
1 tsp sugar
5fl oz/150ml chicken stock
Salt & freshly ground black pepper
A sprig of thyme
8fl oz/250ml red wine

Peel and trim shallots. Heat half the butter in a heavy saucepan and add shallots. Cook until lightly golden, then add the chicken stock, sugar, a pinch of salt, and the sprig of thyme. Over high heat, reduce cooking liquid completely, then add wine and boil down until only 1 or 2 tbsp of sauce remain. The shallots should be very tender. Remove the pan from the heat and add the rest of the butter, stir to melt into the sauce and coat the shallots. Check seasoning and serve.





BAY-SCENTED ROASTED POTATOES

Preparation time: 15 minutes Cooking time: 40 - 50 minutes.

400F/220C/Gas 6 Serves 4


8 medium, red skinned potatoes salt 12 large fresh bay leaves 6fl oz/175ml chicken stock 4fl oz/125ml olive oil

Peel wash & dry potatoes. Cut slits into each potato every $\frac{3}{8}$ in/1cm; cut nearly all the way through, but be careful to keep potatoes in one piece. Cut the bay leaves into $\frac{1}{2}$ in/ $\frac{1}{4}$ cm strips. Oil a baking dish; put potatoes into pan and slip a piece of bay leaf into each slit. Sprinkle with salt (very little if your chicken stock is salted). Bring stock to the boil and pour it over the potatoes; drizzle with the olive oil.

Bake, uncovered, for about 40 minutes. The potatoes should be very tender and nicely browned; no cooking liquid should remain.

Serve in the baking dish.

Gardening Hints

HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE ESTABLISHED GARDEN PLANTS IN MID TO LATE WINTER

Lawns Turf new lawns. Treat established lawns with mosskiller. Trees and Shrubs If the soil is not frozen, plant deciduous species. Prune deciduous summer-flowering shrubs such as clematis, buddleia, potentilla and hardy fuchsia. Prune winter-flowering shrubs once blooms are over; mulch and apply a general fertilizer. Cut suckers growing from the bases of trees.

Roses Continue planting roses in suitable weather. Prune in mild or sheltered gardens.

Perennials Lift and divide lupins, Michaelmas daisies, delphiniums, and any other hardy border plants that have been left for three years. Apply general fertilizer to other hardy perennials. Firm plants lifted by frost. Fork over soil between the plants. Examine stored chrysanthemum stools for signs of rotting and withering. Ventilate on dry days.

Annuals In suitable weather dig and manure sites for sowing. Lightly fork over ground dug in autumn and work in a general fertilizer if it wasn't manured. Sow half hardy annuals in a cold frame or greenhouse late in the winter.

Biennials Dress with a general fertiliser. Lightly fork soil around them. Firm any plants that have been lifted by frost.

Bulbs Deter birds from eating crocus buds by stretching dark cotton, supported on sticks across the area occupied by the bulbs. Spray stored dahlia tubers showing signs of mould. Pot lily bulbs for early display indoors or under glass.

Fruit Plant fruit trees and bushes in mild spells. Feed all fruit trees with fertilizer. Every third year, paint tar oil wash on apple and pear trees.

Prune raspberries, gooseberries and red and white currants. Prepare beds for rhubarb crowns and plant.

Vegetables Place cloches in position to warm soil for seeds sown in early spring. Outdoors, plant shallots. Transplant autumn sown onions. Feed winter brassicas with general fertilizer.

Herbs Plant or divide chives, thyme, sage, and mint. Cut back frost damaged sage.



Sow lettuce and other salad vegetables. Begin sowing in the propagator of summer-autumn flowering pot plants and plants requiring long growing periods, such as F1 hybrid geraniums. Some bulbs already in the plunge may be ready to bring in. Propagate chrysanthemums and carnations from cuttings. Sow freesias, seven seeds to each 130mm(5in) pot. Rhubarb can be brought in for forcing under staging. Pot-on actively growing pot plants such as primulas, calceolarias and cinnerarias. Be cautious with watering and ventilate freely if there is a mild spell. Keep the greenhouse glass clean.

WHEN TO PRUNE

Major pruning is done during the dormant period, from late autumn to early spring. Despite the increasing availibility of container grown roses, which can be planted at any time of the year, the main planting season is still from autumn to spring. This is also the time when bare-rooted roses are put in. All newly planted stock should be pruned in late winter or early spring. Normally it doesn't matter what time established roses are pruned during the dormant season.

Very harsh winter weather may damage those that have been pruned in the autumn, so they may need additional trimming in the spring. It's advantageous to trim and tie in long stems before they are lashed about by winds. In mild areas where new growth starts early, prune sooner rather than later.



Three Basic Steps:


There are three pruning steps that apply to all roses, whether established or newly planted. Treat them as routine whenever you are planting or pruning. Many roses will need very little further attention.

- 1) Remove all dead, damaged or diseased stems. Cut back to just above a bud on healthy wood or take out the stem completely, cutting back to a junction with a healthy stem or even the rootstock itself.
- 2) Remove weak or thin stems. These are unlikely to produce flowers, yet they will take strength that the plant could put into other, better growth. Cut back to join with a healthy strong-growing stem or to the rootstock.
- 3) Take out the least vigorous of stems that cross or rub. Either cut the overcrowding stem right out or prune back to a growth bud below where the two stems cross. With ramblers and climbers, cut out some overcrowding stems but remember that training and tying will be needed to avoid rubbing.




After the mass a reception followed in the Parish Hall. A group of women got together and set up a committee to supply tea, coffee, sandwiches and cakes.

M.A.B.S. IN MAYNOOTH!

North Kildare Money Advice and Budgeting Service opens at Derroon House.

The Glenroyal Hotel in Maynooth recently became the venue for an Information Evening hosted by the Money Advice and Budgeting Service, which has made its service available for the North Kildare Region at Derroon House, Dublin Road, Maynooth.

The service helps families and individuals with debt problems. If a person is in difficulties with rent, mortgages, E.S.B., banks, etc., then the service can help them.

In attendance at the evening were Shane O'Neill and Jim Walsh from the Department of Social Welfare, Veronica Tobin of the South Kildare M.A.B.S. in Newbridge, Margaret Quinn, Money Advice Officer for North Kildare and her staff Kelly Meaghan and Fiona O'Brien.

Mr. Walsh who opened the proceedings by welcoming everybody there, explained that M.A.B.S. had organised the evening so that co-ordinators could meet with local groups to explain to them what the service is about and also to get the support and assistance of other community groups.

According to Shane O'Neill, who recently co-ordinated the Dublin South M.A.B.S., the service originated from a 'changing focus' within the Department for Social Welfare. As a result of a report by the Combat Poverty Agency and a changing role within the Department, five M.A.B.S. projects were set up in 1992 to assist people in debt and to prevent indebtedness

The service is funded by the Department of Social Welfare and since 1995 as a result of a request by the Minister for Social Welfare, Proinsias de Rossa, the service is independent of the Department and rooted within the local community where it is available.

Structure of the M.A.B.S.

Margaret Quinn the new M.A.O. in describing and explaining the structure of the service, re-iterated this point that the service is independent of the Department. If organising groups within a locality find that they are interested in supporting a M.A.B.S., they must form a committee and submit a proposal to the Department of Social Welfare. A Management Committee is formed to run the service, selecting suitable persons to administrate, locate offices and staff, monitor the service and submit reports. The committee also looks after training and policy issues. When a proposal is accepted by the Department of Social Welfare, interim funding is granted for one year. After that year, if the service proves to be managed well, the Department will enter into a three year funding contract.

Free, Independent and Confidential Service

The service is free, independent and confidential. Trained advisers will listen to problems without judging and help a person to make their own decisions by giving the information and advice needed to bring the situation under control. It is not important why or how a person got into difficulties - what is important is to deal with the situation as it is now.

Many clients are referred to the M.A.B.S. by a Community Welfare Officer. An interview with the M.A.O. takes place, going through all the elements of the financial difficulties to assess the situation. The aim of the service is to enable the person to pay off debts at a rate that they decide whilst ensuring that all their essential requirements (food, housing, fuel, etc.) are protected. This is done through Budgeting.

If wished the service will negotiate on a persons behalf with creditors, to help renegotiate repayments at a rate that can be afforded. When large problems occur, a C.W.O. is called upon for extra support to help tackle the issue. Basically all channels of support are investigated to help the individual.

Special Accounts Scheme

A key feature of the service is a Special Accounts Scheme provided in partnership with local Credit Unions. A person availing of the service can open one of these accounts even if they don't have a history with the Credit Union. A specified repayment amount is put into the Special Account every week. At the end of the month this is taken out and given to the creditors.

Loan Guaranteed Fund

Another feature of the service is the Loan Guaranteed Fund. This is a designated sum of money, provided by the Department of Social Welfare to guarantee loans (in cooperation with the Credit Union) to people who wouldn't have regular savings, but who are trying hard to overcome their debts.

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

There are now forty such projects established and running successfully throughout the country. They have assisted over 10.000 families with multiple debt problems. Many have been able to overcome their debts over a period of time.



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
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SCOIL UI RIADA

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

Broken Arrow (15's)

John Travolta and Christian Slater star as Vic Deakins and Riley Hale, two military pilots who must test the new top secret B-3 stealth bomber with two nuclear warheads on board.

What starts off as a routine mission soon becomes anything but, when Travolta steals the plane's cargo and holds the government to ransom. Needless to say Slater gets the job of retrieving the bombs and bringing Travolta to justice.

This is a fine adventure movie with good performances from both Travolta and Slater as the two protagonists, and excellent special effects and tight direction from John Woo ensures that it bowls along at a cracking pace.

Verdict: Definitely one to see!

Kingpin (15's)

Woody Harrelson plays Roy Munson, a born loser whose only claim to fame is that he's Iowa's champion bowler. His arch rival is 'Big ERN' Mc Cracken played by Bill Murray who sets him up with a bowling hustle in which Harrelson literally loses his hand. Seventeen years later he meets a bowling genius played by Randy Quaid, and sees his chance for revenge and to make a bit of money as well.

This is a great comedy from the directors of Dumb and Dumber, brothers Peter and Bobby Farrelly. But whereas that film relied heavily on the over-the-top performance of Jim Carrey, this film is far more restrained and a lot funnier because of it. Even though it could sometimes be accused of bad taste, it is nonetheless an absolutely hilarious movie!!

Verdict: A Riot!!!!!

Copycat (18's)

Stars Sigourney Weaver and Harry Connick Jnr. as a criminal psychologist and a serial killer respectively. While still recovering from having been viciously attacked by Connick who has been caught and imprisoned, she finds she is being stalked by yet another nut case who's copying his hero's (Connick's) style. He commits a series of murders while he makes his way towards killing Weaver.

If this film sounds a bit like Silence of the Lambs it's because it is a shameless rip-off of that far superior movie. It's very stylish but it lacks the original's atmosphere of menace and gets quite convoluted in parts.

Verdict: For fans of the genre only.

FINE GAEL NOTES

Bond Bridge

Minister Bernard Durkan has called on Kildare Co. Council to place Bond Bridge, Maynooth on top of its priority list for funding in the current estimates. He said "the re-alignment of Bond Bridge needs to take place as a matter of strict urgency". Minister Durkan is working alongside Cllr. Senan Griffin in ensuring that this issue is progressed as a matter of strict urgency. Minister Durkan is also concerned that the traffic management measures undertaken in the town are not having their intended effect. He said that the back up of traffic is contributing even further to the problems in Parson Street and at Bond Bridge, Minister Durkan said that the combination of the dangerous bridge and the traffic jams particularly in the mornings are creating a potentially hazardous situation. He stressed that it is high time that the Council took a serious look at Maynooth saying that the current situation cannot be

Meadowbrook

allowed to continue.

Minister Bernard Durkan has been contacted by residents in Meadowbrook who are anxious that a number of areas in the estate have not yet been properly finished. Minister Durkan said that the developer has an obligation to properly landscape areas which have not been built on and to ensure that roads and foothpaths are completed and maintained to an acceptable standard. Minister Durkan has contacted the developers and the planning department

of Kildare Co. Council who he said are responsible for ensuring that all the conditions imposed on foot of a planning permission are properly complied with. Minister Durkan said he would keep the residents up to date with progress reports.

Maynooth Train Service

A number of residents of Maynooth have contacted Bernard Durkan regarding the train service to and from Maynooth. They are particularly concerned about the morning services which have been delayed recently and which have not arrived at all on some occasions. Minister Durkan has contacted Iarnrod Eireann with a view to improving the services.

Main Street

Minister Durkan has contacted the Co. Engineer and asked him to carry out repairs to the footpaths in the Main Street. Minister Durkan said that the footpaths which were widened as part of the traffic management measures for the town have extremely poor surfaces. The footpaths have now become flooded after rain and they are quite unlevel and dangerous to walk on. Minister Durkan said that the matter needs to be addressed before somebody falls or gets injured.

Feeder Road For Motorway

Minister Bernard Durkan has asked the Co. Engineer to consider placing the proposed feeder road parallel to the motorway and not through Meadowbrook as suggested by Kildare Co. Council. This would eliminate the danger to children and residents of the Meadowbrook area. It would also direct traffic away from the centre of town and the larger residential areas.

VISIT OF JUSTICE MINISTER NORA OWEN

The Minister for Justice.

Nora Owen, T.D., visited Maynooth last month as part of a visit organised by Minister of State Bernard Durkan T.D. The visit was part of a Fine Gael constituency visit which gave Minister Owen the opportunity to address a public meeting in the Glenroyal Hotel to promote the Bail Referendum. Almost 200 people turned out to greet the Minister who had come directly from RTE where she had appeared on Questions and Answers. Minister Owen stressed that people should take the opportunity afforded to them by the Bail Referendum to ensure that Judges could refuse bail in the case of criminals who were likely to commit

serious crime while out on bail...

She went on to say that a NO vote would only satisfy criminals. Minister Durkan stressed that the rights of the victims of serious crime were more important than the rights of criminals and that the Bail Referendum was one way of ensuring that this was indeed the case. He said that the Crime Package being implemented by the Government in tandem with the Bail Referendum was having a very positive effect and that the Bail Referendum was an integral part of Minister Owen's measures to fight crime.

Minister Owen went on to list the measures she had taken since coming into office in order to combat crime including:

- Extra Gardai
- Extra Prison Places including Castlerea, Limerick Prison, The Curragh and the Womens Prison in Mountjoy.
- Extra Judges
- Extra Court sittings,
- New youth diversion projects and strengthening of the Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme.

Bond Bridge Update

The proposal by Cllr. John McGinley, to increase the Special Development Levies in respect of New Housing Developments in the Newtown area to finance the realignment of Bond Bridge, has been accepted by the County Manager.

A total of 28.9 acres of zoned land remains undeveloped in the Newtown area. Planning Permission issued in respect of 20.685 acres on November 26th. A Special Development Levy of £22,000 per acre was included as a condition of the permission. The Developers have the right to appeal this condition to An Bord Pleanala. If this occurs Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D., and Cllr. John McGinley will continue their campaign at that level. Should the condition stand it will raise £455,070 towards the realignment of the bridge. An application in respect of the remaining 8.25 acres is currently before Kildare County Council. Should the same condition be imposed a further £181.566 will be raised towards the realignment of the bridge. A previous permission on this site imposed a contribution of only £82,000 towards improvements in public lighting on Rathcoffey Road and improvements to Bond Bridge.

Taken with the amount now on hand and due to the Council, which amounts to £233,000, the total sum available for the cost of the realignment of the bridge could amount to £869,636. This depends fully on the acceptance of the condition imposed of £22,000 per acre.

The cost of realignment is now estimated at £900,000. Because no traffic could use the bridge during realignment the Council attempted to increase the cost by £600,000 to build the link from Meadowbrook out to the Straffan Road. This was to facilitate traffic during construction. This new added cost was firmly rejected by Cllr. John McGinley who stated that the alternative traffic routes during construction can be agreed to by the Area Committee. The most likely route is via Bryanstown/Ladychapel/Taghadoe.

As the project is now self-financing Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D., along with Cllr. John McGinley will restart their campaign to convince the Council to raise the loan required to build the New Bridge now.

Finally we would like to congratulate the Bond Bridge Action Group on their work in securing this positive movement at Council level.

Celbridge Road, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised that the resurfacing from the Straffan Road to the Motorway Bridge will take place before Christmas.

County Development Plan

Minister Brendan Howlin instructed Kildare County Council to produce a County Development Plan, incorporating a

County strategy, before the Council could proceed any further with the individual Town Plans.

The proposed Draft County Development Plan was produced by the officials of Kildare County Council on 20/11/96. While in many ways it is defective its statement on Maynooth and Celbridge is very welcome, i.e. "It is the policy of the Council to promote the southward move of development within the County to re-direct pressures from the north-east. The substantial zoning of lands in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement of the aim of this policy".

The Councillors will meet on the 9th December to discuss the Draft and it is likely to take three to four meetings before agreement is reached unless the larger parties vote it through without proper debate.

Footpath at Leinster Street

At the request of Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D., Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to include costs for a footpath on The Roost side of Leinster Street in the 1997 Discretionary Grants.

New Public Lights for Maynooth

At its meeting on the 29th November the Celbridge area Committee agreed on new lights for the following areas. 2 at Old Greenfield, Back Lane.

1 at Moyglare Road between the Post Primary School and the S.M.A. Hostel.

3 at Leinster Street.

1 at Phil Burke's, Pound Lane.

Floodlight at New Car Park

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to repair the floodlight that has never worked.

DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

Traffic Problems

Councillor Catherine Murphy has called on Kildare County Council to prepare measures to tackle the severe problems being experienced by traffic trying to get onto the Main Street from Parson's Street, especially during rush hour. At the moment, traffic can be backed up from this junction to beyond Bond Bridge. While a long-term solution requires a direct link between the Newtown area and the Straffan Road, this is still a long way off, and short-term measures are needed to deal with the current situation. Such measures must take into account the large volumes of pedestrian traffic at this junction, and the need for appropriate safety measures to cater for this traffic.

Catherine Murphy has also requested the County Council to construct additional traffic islands to allow pedestrians to cross the Straffan Road at appropriate points. At the moment, pedestrians have no protection when trying to cross this road to get to the Glenroval Centre, Parklands or Railpark/Rockfield. Additional traffic calming measures are needed on this road to encourage vehicles to stay within the 30 mph speed limit.

Additional Street Lighting For Maynooth

The Celbridge Area committee of Kildare County Council has recently allocated a total of £2,400 to improve street lighting in Old Greenfield, Back Lane, Leinster Street and Moyglare Road.

High Court Challenge to Rezoning

The Clane Committee Against Excessive Rezoning has been granted leave to seek a judicial review in the High Court of the rezonings recently agreed for that area by Kildare County Council. We congratulate them and wish them well in their action. However, the fact is that this group has been forced to seek to have the plan overturned on legal technicalities. It would have been much preferable if the elected councillors had taken cognisance of the very deep level of local community dissatisfaction with the rezonings and had refused to sanction them in the first place. If the Clane action succeeds, previous rezonings in Kill and Leixlip could also be rendered invalid.

Commission on the Family

We welcome publication of the interim report of the Commission on the Family, of which Councillor Catherine Murphy is a member. The Commission considered no less than 525 submissions in arriving at its report, which represents an excellent exercise in public consultation. Set up by the Minister for Social Welfare, Proinsias De Rossa, the Commission seeks to strengthen the institution of the family (in its broadest meaning) in a modern context. Among the key recommendations of the interim report are the need to make adequate provision for Education for Life (e.g. parenting, interpersonal relationships) among the population and the need for a National Mediation Service to cater for situations where relationships between partners break down. In Ireland at the moment, the legal approach to such situations tends to be adversarial and very stressful. Research shows clearly that children emerge much better from such situations where a less conflictual mediation service is provided.





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

EDITORIAL

Maynooth's traffic problems continue to be a popular topic of conversation for the town's residents. Anyone attempting to travel through the town at school opening and closing times will attest to the fact that the opening of the bypass has alleviated the problem but, at certain times of the day, chaos still reigns.

Without the bypass it seems likely that the town would be in a state of permanent gridlock for 12 hours a day. As it is, the sheer volume of traffic means that the short trip from Parsons St to Greenfield Shopping Centre can take up to 15 minutes.

To some extent this chaos is unavoidable given the layout of the town with the majority of the population living to the south of Main St. and the schools and the Roman Catholic church to the North. However, careless and inconsiderate parking plays its part in the traffic chaos. The local Gardai have recently drawn up a draft set of traffic by-laws which were outlined at the January meeting of the Community Council and will be considered this month by our local county councillors.

If adopted the by-laws will curtail parking on Main St particularly on the right hand side as one faces the College, on both sides of the road leading from the College on to Main St and at some other points where the flow of traffic is regularly disrupted by parked cars. The parking of cars, minibuses and vans on the footpaths will obviously be illegal.

Excellent off-street parking is available beside the Glenroyal Centre and behind the Roost, and those car parks are seldom more than half full. No doubt some will complain - the effort of walking fifty metres from car to shop to collect the morning paper can be beyond the physical capacity of some residents!

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

Heritage Project

Kildare County Council are expected to adopt traffic Byelaws in February, which will hopefully bring to an end the existing traffic chaos in the town.

Development Plan

As a result of the completion of the Strategic County
Development Plan for Co. Kildare, an opportunity exists for
a rethink by Councillors on where the growth should occur
in Kildare over the next five years. Development has mostly
occured in the North East Kildare towns in the last decade.
Many areas in South Kildare have lost out, leading now to a
two speed county. On the other hand towns like Maynooth
are finding the levels of growth experienced in the last five
years difficult to absorb with further pressure expected in the
next few years because of the full impact of the population
increase catered for under the 1985 Plan.

In these circumstances it seems likely that the Plan for Maynooth will have to change significantly in order to be compatible with the overall planning of Co. Kildare and indeed the Mid Eastern Region which includes Counties Meath and Wicklow.

Know Your Rights

Source: New One Parent Family Payment

A new One Parent Family Payment came into effect on the 2nd January 1997. This is a means tested payment similar to the Lone Parent's Allowance. This payment will replace the current Deserted Wife's Benefit / Assistance, Lone Parent's Allowance and Prisoner's Wife's Allowance for all new claims.

- * Existing DWB claims will remain in payment for as long as the claim remains unbroken and the conditions are satisfied. The Non Contributory Widow's Pension will continue to exist for widows without child dependants and the existing means test for NCWP will remain unchanged.
- * The rate of payment will be the same as the Lone Parent's allowance.

Means Test:

- * The means test for the OPFP is more favourable than the means test for Deserted Wife's Allowance, Lone Parent's Allowance and Prisoner's Wife Allowance. the first £6.000 a year (115.38 a week) of gross earnings from employment or self-employment will be disregarded, plus half the earnings over this figure. Childminding costs or travel expenses will not be allowable.
- * This new payment will not be payable where income exceeds £12,000 (£230.76 a week). This is a reduction on the income 'cut off' of £14,000 which applied to Deserted Wife's Benefit. However there will be provisions to ensure that there is not a sudden 'cut off' if income goes over £12.000.
- * Maintenance payments will be assessed as means, however maintenance which is used for the purpose of paying rent or mortgage, up to a limit of £75 a week, or £3,900 a year will be disregarded when assessing means.
- * Women aged between 38 and 40 in January 1997 when the new One Parent Family Payment comes into effect who no longer have a dependent child will requalify for DWB at age 40.
- * Women who are aged over 40 without child dependants and who might up to now have qualified for Deserted Wife's Benefit / Allowance or Prisoner's Wife's Allowance will in future have no specific payment. They may qualify for Unemployment Assistance or Supplementary Welfare Allowance.

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MAYNOOTH RESIDENTS AGAINST LOCAL CHARGES

MRALC was formed in 1987 by local householders in reaction to the imposition of Local Charges and the threat by Kildare County Council to disconnect water supply and stop refuse collections from residents who refused to pay.

Our opposition to these Charges included the fact that we had already paid for these services through PAYE deductions and our contention that the family home was not a proper source for the raising of tax revenues.

We conducted a vigorous campaign which included lobbying local T.D.s and County Councillors, organising a protest march and demonstration of 300 people from Quinnsworth Shopping Centre to the Council's offices in Maynooth (the previous march had been in 1916 by the Volunteers who joined in the Easter Rising), assisting householders whose water had been disconnected and collecting funds for legal challenges.

More recently MRALC members, and our colleagues in similar groups throughout the county, established the Co Kildare branch of ACRA to allow us to join in a nation-wide campaign against Local Charges and on other Residents' Associations' issues.

Therefore, we are pleased to acknowledge the scrapping from 1st January 1997 of the hated Water Charges and hail their abolition as a vindication of our decade-long campaign. In doing so we declare that this has been brought about by the combined efforts of campaigners right around the country and more recently, and crucially, by the Dublin Federation against the charges.

That said, we are concerned to note that the end of Water Charges has not been brought about by comprehensive tax reform and that Refuse Charges are to remain. For the very same reasons they too must go and in the current economic climate of the "Celtic Tiger", tax reform must be enacted. Could there be a better time than now? We believe that this should be a major issue in the forthcoming General Election and urge householders to judge politicians accordingly.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Maynooth for the support over the years and the Plumber's Union for their practical assistance.

Finally, we wish to salute our daytime support group, mainly women, who bravely challenged the Council's disconnection crews outside many homes. They were in the front-line of the battle.

MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

The Draft County Development Plan is still under consideration by Kildare County Council, and will, sometime during the Spring, go on public display. Of most concern to Maynooth is the radical proposal contained in it that future residential growth be partially redirected away from north Kildare to central and southern parts of the county. The key section reads as follows:

"It is the policy of the Council to promote the southward move of development within the county to re-direct pressures from the north-east, and to encourage the spread of development through the towns of the centre to the west and south of the county.... The substantial zoning of land in Maynooth, and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement and aims of this policy. "

If this plan is adopted by councillors, the question then arises - what do they propose by way of residential rezoning for the Maynooth Development Plan? Here the waters get very muddy because our local political parties seem to be unusually quiet concerning the on-the-ground actions they propose for Maynooth to meet the objectives of the County Plan. The independent consultants who were involved in the production of the County Plan foresaw a need to accommodate between 2,500 and 4,000 extra residents in Celbridge Rural District, encompassing Leixlip, Celbridge, Maynooth, Kilcock, Straffan, Balraheen, Cloncurry, Donadea, and Donaghcomper. So what is proposed at present by local councillors for Maynooth?

Fianna Fail and Fine Gael have made no public changes in their position from that of supporting the Amended Draft Development Plan of 1996. This proposes the rezoning of lands in Maynooth alone to facilitate an increase in population from 9,062 to 21,189 people - more than doubling the size of Maynooth and providing for a population increase similar to what is expected for Counties Kildare, Meath and Wicklow combined by 2011!

Labour currently propose rezoning 100 acres, adequate to house between 2,500 and 4,000 people i.e the entire Celbridge Rural District increase.

Democratic Left have not given a public commitment to any specific acreage proposals for Maynooth.


It seems to Maynooth Planning Alliance that there is a considerable inconsistency between what can be agreed at county level and what is proposed at Maynooth level. Councillors cannot have it both ways and Maynooth Planning Alliance will highlight these inconsistencies with increasing regularity as election time approaches.

PRESENTATION TO FORMER COACH






SUMMER SCHOOL


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
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LARAGHBRYAN CEMETERY DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

A committee has been set up to deal with the long standing number of problems in relation to Laraghbryan Cemetery. Serious work will have to be undertaken if the cemetery is to be brought up to an acceptable standard in which our loved ones can be interred. Members of the association have visited a number of cemeteries recently and we take no pride in reporting that Laraghbryan must rank among the worst kept of those visited. One is loathe to apportion blame for the general untidiness of the cemetery but we as a community must look at ourselves and ask with some degree of honesty "what are we doing about it?" Very little has been done in the past and it is now time that steps are taken to eradicate the problems which exist within the cemetery and its surrounds. The badly overgrown parts of the cemetery only serve as an open invitation to dump any type of unwanted rubbish without the fear of early detection. Wheelie bins have been provided over the past few months for the collection of broken wreaths, dead flowers etc. and are being removed on a regular basis by the refuse collectors. The dumping of bottles, beer cans along by the walls and in the undergrowth is a mean despicable act of wanton disregard. The added hazard of rat infestation can be attributed to the dumping of household waste which often provides ample feed for long periods.

To eliminate the problems which currently exist, a long and painstaking programme of work will have to be undertaken. In order that such work can be carried out we have applied for a FAS work scheme to be provided for the cemetery. If granted it will take several weeks before such a scheme would be placed on site. In the meantime work days will be arranged for volunteers to attend the cemetery on designated dates. Notices will be placed advising people of such workdays. As with all schemes, funds are urgently needed and various fund raising events are being organised to meet this need. An account has been opened at AIB Maynooth, Account No. 15443186, in the name of Laraghbryan Cemetery Development Association to which donations can be made. In order to keep expense to a minimum the Association will gratefully accept the offer of machinery, handtools, flowers, labour, (skilled or otherwise), or any other form of assistance. Just contact any member of the Association if you can be of assistance. Public meetings will be arranged at suitable intervals to inform the public of progress, events to come etc. The lead is now being set and we hope that the following will be large and enthusiastic.


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MAYNOOTH I.C.A. **NOTES**





Local Hero

The number of people who reach their 90th year are still relatively few. One such nonagenarian is Maynooth resident Dinny Breen, and the remarkableness of his age is matched only by the clarity of his memory. There have been many colourful events throughout Dinny's long life; and most of those have taken place in or around a football pitch.

Dinny, who was a member of the Garda Siochana, and his wife Mary Brigid Boyhan, moved to Maynooth in 1939 where Dinny kept up his habit of joining the local football team. (He had already played for the Dublin side Parnells, for Ardagh in Longford and for Newbridge Sarsfields).

When his playing days were over he went on to become the Chairman of Maynooth GAA, and though long since retired from that demanding position, he continues to take an active interest in the affairs of the Club.

Dinny's two greatest achievements though, came before he moved to Maynooth and concerned his beloved County Westmeath. As a fit and strong 23 year old, Dinny played in mid-field for his home team Rochfortbridge Warriors, and was further selected to represent his county at junior level. 1929 proved a fruitful year for Westmeath football, as the junior team went from strength to strength and landed the All-Ireland title; the final taking place in February 1930 - almost 11 months after the first round victory over neighbours and rivals Meath. In that time Longford, Laois, Roscommon, Limerick and finalists London Irish were also seen off by the gallant Westmeath men, inspired as ever by the dynamic midfielder Dinny Breen.

This victory with his county was matched six years later when Dinny was chosen to represent Leinster in the Railway Cup. Over the years this Inter-Provincial competition has faded in significance, but in the 1930's it represented a great honour for the chosen players and huge crowds always flocked to the games. Dinny was a proud member of the 1935 Leinster winning side, and was (probably) the first Westmeath footballer to win a Railway Cup medal.

Dinny was afforded a great honour in 1996, when the Westmeath All-Ireland Minor Champions paid him a visit at his Maynooth home. It was a sure sign of the high esteem in which the former footballer is held. An esteem no doubt, that is well deserved.

(Just as we were going to press, we were saddened to hear of the death of Dinny's daughter, Emily (Mo) Hughes. The Maynooth Newsletter would like to extend our sympathy to Mo's husband, son, daughter, sisters, brother, father, relatives and friends. May she rest in peace).

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

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
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THE STRANGER AND THE POOKA by Patrick Devaney, Mentor Press.

Some years ago I had the joy of reading Patrick Devaney's "Rua the Red Grouse" to our two children, both of them avid readers, not yet having been subject to T.V. and video saturation. I distinctly recall the angst with which they received each new instalment of the disasters which befell Rua's family.

Parents need not worry on that score in regard to 'The Stranger and the Pooka'. Indeed from the beginning, the "good guys" win. I can imagine the chuckles that will greet the account of the "comeuppance" delivered to the youthful "vandal" in chapter one. This theme is evident to the end and the 'baddies', 'Johno' the young vandal and 'Big Jim' the adult vandal are on their way to the boat in the last chapter. Shades of Co. Leitrim district court sentencing, or is it Roscommon?

A feature of the novel which strikes the reader is the language problem. The difficulty experienced in Brian Friel's "Translations" comes to mind. Mr Devaney has sought to grapple with the absence of language with which to communicate with the Pooka. He coins a "new" vocabulary so the reader quickly comes to accept 'white nest-place', 'Francach', 'season of dead plants', 'crutins' etc. It is a solution to the problem, perhaps the only one possible, and I'm sure, quite acceptable to the young reader.

The provision of a map is an added boon, -memories of the 'The Lord of the Rings'. Some young readers will trace the exhilarating "deerback" escape to Lackendarragh wood via the south of Slieve Brack and find that Mr Devaney is very attentive to detail, that time, place and distance match.

The conservation message, the element of the supernatural and 'big' business interests etc. are woven into a story that will captivate readers from the senior classes in Primary School to the junior classes in Post Primary.

I cannot recommend a more pleasant or profitable activity than that of the parent reading a good story to their young children at the age when they still have wonder. This is such a story.

AGRICULTURAL LAND VALUES IN 1996

LAND PRICES HIT £3,900 PER ACRE.

Coonan Auctioneers and Estate Agents, Maynooth, Co. Kildare specialists in the sale of agricultural land and stud farms report a busy year in 1996, especially in the first six to eight months, with a little bit of uncertainty creeping into the market in the latter part of the year.

As can be seen from the table below, the average land price per acre was £3,900, an increase of £1,400 per acre (i.e. 57%) since 1994.

The statistics this year are based on 29 land sales combining in total 1800 acres which the agents were involved in. The farms reached a total of £7,000,000.

These sales took place in the counties Kildare, Meath, Dublin, Westmeath, Offaly, Laois, Kilkenny and Longford, with the majority being in the first two counties.

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Dividing the sales into different categories, a total of 20 farms under 100 acres were sold by this agency, totalling £2,000,000, giving an average price per acre of £4,850. The remaining 9 farms were over 100 acres and sold for a combined total of £5,000,000, giving an average price of £3,997 per acre.

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
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CROM ABU



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MORNING IN COURT

I wondered where he was, what he was up to, and had the word gone out that there was a reporter from the Newsletter in town?

A young woman - two children by the hand - came towards me. "Excuse me ma'am" I said "I'd be mighty obliged if you'd point me in the direction of Judge Brophy's courthouse." She looked at me long and hard before answering, then she said, "Yeah, its over the bridge and to your right." I smiled and said "Why thank you ma'am", to which she replied "This is North Kildare y'know, not North Dakota, maybe you should drop the accent." With this she hurried off, leaving me to ponder her remarks and the deflating effect they had on me.

Court was due to start at 10.30a.m.; the place was packed and the only seat I could find was the hotseat - a heater fixed to the wall at the back of the room. The Judge entered and everybody stood. He sat down, followed by those lucky enough to be able to do so. There must have been at least 30 people lining the walls, standing in the doorway and filling the foyer. (Readers who have been to the court will know I use the word 'Foyer' with extreme license).

And so down to business. The reason I had chosen this particular Tuesday to attend the Court was to hear the case of the Students Union Club License Renewal. Next up were the speeding offenders, and a sorry bunch they were, each apologising to the court and offering a variety of excuses. The lesson I learned from this experience was that if you don't have a genuine excuse then you shouldn't attempt to offer one. It sounds very lame in court when a person is accused of travelling 98 miles per hour and they say, 'but Judge, I was overtaking', or 'sorry Judge, but I was late for work." Judge Brophy has a policy which seems reasonable to me, first time offenders get away with a fine. subsequent offenders or anyone travelling over 100 mph receive an endorsement and a three month ban. As he put it himself in that succinct style of his - "over the ton, you're off the road.'


For those not directly addressing the bench, Judge Brophy likes to indulge in banter, to the entertainment of everyone else and at the expense of the other person involved, usually the hapless solicitors and barristers who have been instructed to plead for leniency. (Of course they're only hapless till they pick up their cheques and expenses).

Once such Judge v solicitor argument centered on whether the defendant could offer a charitable donation by way of recompense. Judge Brophy indicated that he was having none of it, then followed with the more promising 'what have you in mind? The solicitor gamely offered £300, the Judge's scoff must have been audible at 30 paces, certainly it was enough to force the solicitors hand, "£400!" he called. "No" replied the Judge. His understated tone combined with the raising of the 5 fingers of his hand, called the solicitors bluff, "£500" he meekly offered. "Done" said the judge, "to Our Lady's Hospital".

After all the traffic offences, the court turned its attention to crimes of a more serious nature. One in particular involved the allegation by an Agriculture Department Inspector that his life, and that of his family, was threatened by a local farmer. More on that in next months Newsletter.

A dogmatic theologian by training Dr Farrell has worked with the Irish-Inter-Church Department of Theological Questions and has lectured extensively in the field of moral theology.

On receiving news of his appointment Dr Farrell confessed to being somewhat daunted by the task in hand but affirmed his commitment to providing leadership to the National Seminary at a crucial time in its history. He also expressed the view that in the light of new legislation for the universities there would be a great opportunity for the Pontifical University and the National University of Ireland, Maynooth to evolve a strong, lasting and distinctive relationship.

The school decided to mark this important milestone in its development in a practical way by making a donation of children's Irish books to the Maynooth and Kilcock Libraries. A similar donation will take place next month in Kilcock Library.

Speaking at the ceremony in the Library where the books were gratefully received by County Librarian, Breda Gleeson, and Maynooth Librarian, Fiona White, Scoil Ui Riada's Principal Seamus O Muirithe said "The school decided to present the books to the library to commemorate our tenth anniversary. Scoil Ui Riada wants to repay the parents and the wider community of Maynooth for the tremendous moral and financial support given to the school since it was established." Seamus O' Muirithe added that he hoped the donation would contribute to the promotion of the Irish language in the community which is an important part of the ethos of the school. "Particular emphasis has been given to the selection of pre-school books designed to stimulate pre-reading skills. The pages of these books have illustrations which abound with things and happenings and are virtually guaranteed to draw forth comment and talk from young children. It is hoped that these books may help to instill an appreciation for the Irish language in a new generation of children in Maynooth and Kilcock," he concluded.

Breda Gleeson, while acknowledging the contribution that Scoil Ui Riada had made to the Irish Cultural Landscape spoke as Gaeilge, saying "I would like, on behalf of the Library Services, to extend our thanks and congratulations to Scoil Ui Riada. Thank you for your book donation and congratulations for reaching your tenth birthday. I am very pleased to receive these books and I am happy that they will be available to the people of the community and that they will encourage and foster an interest in learning and reading as Gaeilge."

Departing from her prepared speech, she said it was a delight to listen to the ease and fluency with which the Scoil Ui Riada children present in the library spoke as Gaeilge. This made her realise how, in her own case, not speaking the language regularly lead to a lack of confidence when called to do so, despite the fact that she loved and spoke it well at school and college. In a gesture which both surprised and delighted the audience the County Librarian said she would now make a contribution equal to the amount donated to both libraries by Scoil Ui Riada. She also intends to increase the stock of Irish books in the library over a phased basis. She added that she would like to think of the library becoming a venue for informal meetings of friends who shared the same enthusiasm for speaking the cupla focal..

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The library donation was organised by parent's representative Miriam Ahern. *Mile buíochas* are due to John Byrne of Maynooth Bookstore who supplied and sourced the books, to Diarmuid O Cathasaigh, from Bord na Gaeilge who supplied catalogues and advised on the selection of books and also to Fiona White for organising the venue.

"The books donated suit children of all ages from pre-school to 6th class," said Miriam. She added that "books are one of the great pleasures of life, and are vital in providing children with the words to express emotions, ideas and thoughts. Moreover they help to explain the world around us. Books provide the impetus for imaginative play, they introduce new ideas and most importantly they are fun. The vast majority of these books have been selected by the school children themselves."

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UNDERAGE VANDALISM IN COLLEGE GREEN

It seems that wherever one turns these days, vandalism and intimidation is rife. In this issue of the **Newsletter** we will deal with one section of Maynooth where these problems are an everyday occurrence. The focus of our interest this month is the College Green estate.

Residents are it seems being subjected to this sort of harassment almost daily and while the offenders are not from this estate they are known both to the Gardai and to the locals being intimidated.

Youngsters between the ages of 9 - 14 years old are frequenting the College Green area. It seems that the people most affected are elderly, people living alone and single mothers, these people being more vulnerable.

The youngsters make a habit of running through peoples gardens, damaging lawns, fences, shrubs and flowers in the process. Apparently the fences act as an obstacle course for these children and little can be done to prevent repetition of this act, as it is virtually impossible to catch a child who is running from you at any time, let alone if you are at any sort of disadvantage such as being elderly or a mother with small children who can't just leave them at the drop of a hat to chase hoodlums. By the time you leave your house they are well gone, often shouting abuse from a safe distance.

Side fences seem to be most at risk of damage from this "game". One man was forced to erect iron posts in a new fence, instead of the usual wooden posts, to try to reinforce his fence after it had already been knocked and destroyed.

It seems a bit much that anyone should have to rebuild their own property for the sake of so called "fun" for these youngsters.

As can be expected if ever one is lucky enough to catch one of the offenders, the response is always denial. As these boys are usually in groups it would usually come down to a case of "your word against mine". Some residents feel that they are on their own in such situations and that there is little they can do to help themselves.

One course of action is to phone the Gardai as they assure us they always react to every complaint. They also said that they are aware of the happenings in this estate, but unless a complaint is made they can do very little.

Perhaps the answer is to start to complain.

It has gotten to the stage that one man was considering putting barbed wire on his side fence to avert these youngsters, but unfair as it may seem he could not do so because even though it might put an end to this particular problem for him, It could cause another in so much that if the children did injure themselves he would be liable, regardless of the fact that they were trespassing.

Another favourite pastime of these youngsters is to torment locals by ringing door bells continuously. Ignoring them and hoping they'll go away is one solution but how effective is that, no resident should have to endure this unjust invasion of their property, their privacy and their time. Older people in the neighbourhood are afraid to react as they feel that once the youngsters grow up they might become a target of a different sort for them.

Another type of incident which has occurred in recent times is the intimidation and even assault on people as they pass through the walkthrough between Beaufield and College Green.

The following is the story of a young woman who on passing through a group of 4 -5 boys of the age group of 13 - 14 years, who were sitting on the walls on both sides of the walk through, was kicked and intimidated. For no apparent reason the young lady was kicked as she passed through and one of the boys demanded to

know who had given her permission to cross through that path. She felt terrified and said she wondered why she had been singled out as she had done nothing to these boys before.

She also feels that she

would no longer feel safe to go out once it is dark. As bad as being intimidated while being outside of her home must have been, it did not end there. The boys followed her to her house and spent some time throwing pebbles at her house and ringing her bell continuously. It is one resident's opinion that planning authorities are to blame as they have not allowed sufficient recreational facilities in this area, but can such behaviour really be put in a nutshell that easily.

The question must be asked who is to blame and who will take responsibility and put an end to this ridiculous carrying on. We would like to point out that on talking to the Gardai, their opinion was that "these estates are no worse than any other," but surely that's no excuse for allowing it to continue.

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MAYNOOTH IN FEBRUARY 1987

The following are excerpts from the Maynooth Newsletter of 10 years ago

What happened to the class of 1980?

Frances Daly and Sheila Larkin were participants in the AnCo Return to Work course which was held in Maynooth from September to December 1986. Part of the course consisted of a research project, and the question that Frances and Sheila set out to answer was what happened to the members of the Leaving Certificate class who left the Post-Primary School in 1980.

With the help of Tom Ashe, Principal, and the parents of the 1980 class, it was possible to follow the progress of the 44 pupils who left in 1980. Frances and Sheila have made available to the *Newsletter* a summary of their findings, which make very interesting reading.

The most encouraging finding is that only three are unemployed, of whom two are married and working in the home, and one is unemployed through illness. Three are still studying. However, of some concern is the number abroad, thirteen, which indicates that almost one third of the group have had to emigrate. Certainly, a statistic which brings home the seriousness of the situation which faces school leavers.

Over one fifth (9) of the group had obtained degrees by 1986. A relatively small percentage (29%) had married, despite the fact that most of the group would be aged 23 years and over at the time of the survey. The group had found a wide variety of occupations - there are secretaries, electricians, technicians, chefs, librarians, ESB officials. Other occupations are teacher, nurse, barman, garda, and a number of others.

It is satisfying to see how successful the class of 1980 have been in gaining employment. However, there should be no complacency where one in three of our students have left the country. It is sad to see the revival of the old tradition of emigration.

Maynooth By-Pass

There has been much talk of late about a relief road that has been proposed along with the planned By-Pass. The relief road is to be built whenever the lands east of Railpark, which are all zoned for building, are developed. The Community Council are urging the County Council to build the relief road in conjunction with the by-pass in order to take the pressure of through traffic off the main street and Straffan Road.

Harbour Field

Proinnsias Breathnach (Chairman) and John McGinley (Secretary) had a very positive meeting before Christmas with the Trustees of the Harbour Field, from which agreement in principle was reached regarding the Council's proposals for landscaping and developing the field. A meeting was also arranged with AnCo, who are also prepared in principle to support the proposal, while Kildare County Council has sanctioned an Amenity Grant towards the cost of the project. The Community Council is hoping to work in co-operation with the Royal Canal Amenity Group in order to pursue a co-ordinated approach to the overall development of the Canal Harbour area. The Council is currently having the project costed for submission for AnCo approval.

Riot at Connolly Station

People power produced a train at Connolly Station on Tuesday, 13th of January, after a terse announcement revealed that the Maynooth train was cancelled. Enraged commuters who had waited for almost an hour for the 4.15 pm train in arctic conditions refused to take news of the cancellation lying down.

As several hundred angry travellers converged on the station master, a spokesperson addressed the mob: "We want answers - firstly, why was the cancellation not announced earlier, and most important, what alternative arrangements are being made to bring us home". Furious commuters

threatened to hijack a train, if something was not done.

In face of the force of numbers, CIE climbed down, and in minutes, a train was produced. A less arrogant and unfeeling announcement came over the loudspeaker to the effect that CIE regretted the delay which was due to

The cheering commuters swarmed onto the liberated train in the swirling snow, and were reminiscent of earlier revolutions in Siberian conditions. Perhaps the day of liberation for the commuter is near. Commuters of the world unite, we have nothing to lose but late and non - existent trains.

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PROFILE OF PAUL CROGHAN. PRO, MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Ouestion: When did you come to live in Maynooth?

I came to live in Maynooth eight years ago.

Ouestion: Why did you choose to live in Maynooth?

I spent twelve years living in flats in Ballsbridge and Donnybrook in Dublin. I have many fond memories of those years, where I met many of my friends. I was born in Roscommon, a town with a good community spirit. Maynooth was still a quiet village on the road to the west which I felt would be a nice place to live.

Ouestion: When did you get involved with Maynooth Community Council?

Like most others my first interest in local matters began when I joined Moyglare Residents Association. They nominated me to attend the Planning & Development Committee meetings and later to attend the Community Council meetings.

Ouestion: What in your opinion is the role of Maynooth Community Council?

The Community Council serves many useful purposes and its survival has shown that it is more important than any one of us who serve on it. Over the years it has adapted to meet the ever changing needs of the community. Its great strength is in the fact that its membership comes from Residents Associations, Voluntary Community Interest Groups and Clubs. I see the Community Council as the focal point where matters of local interest are debated by representatives of the community. The Council can then act on behalf of the community, either in dealing with Statutory bodies or in any other matter that needs attention.

Ouestion: What do you think has been the main benefit to the people of the town?

In my view its biggest single achievement is in the Council's promotion of Community Employment Projects which give valuable re-training opportunities to local people who want to get into the workforce. Because of the wide range of personal training and transferable skills offered and particularly because of the dedication of the staff they have been successful.

Question: How do you see your role as PRO?

When I became PRO I decided that my main objective in the position would be to look at ways of promoting the Community Council as the most important forum for discussion in Maynooth. I will be encouraging any groups not represented to attend. I am also looking at ways where the council can help to further develop community spirit in the town, particularly in promoting events that help people in the town to get to know each other.

Ouestion: Are you a member of a political party and do you have any political ambitions beyond the Community

My earliest memories of meeting a politician was in 1972 when my mother sent me to ask the local Dail deputy to use his influence to get Roscommon County Council to repair the road outside our house where it regularly flooded. The man in question was Mrw Brian Lenihan, Minister for Foreign Affairs at the time. He told me that I was the youngest ever constituent to lobby him on an issue and that it was important that politicians always listen to the needs of the people even the young. My admiration for his pragmatic approach to issues remains my abiding memory of him, particularly his ability to admit to changing his mind when he judged the public mood on the issue. I am not currently a member of any political party. The responsibility and pressures on Politicians to make the best decisions for the community are immense and it is a lifestyle that takes up a considerable amount of time. I do not know if I would have the commitment.

Question: What would be your wish for Maynooth in the future?

Maynooth is both one of the most historically important and yet is also currently one of the fastest growing towns in the country. I believe that it is important to protect our vast heritage as well as ensuring the sensitive development of the town to cater for the needs of the entire population.

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

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

DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

AUBERGINES WITH WALNUTS AND GARLIC Makdoos

The aubergines will have been prepared for at least one month.

This recipe is made with small, round aubergines, no more than 10cm/4in long.

750g/1 lb 10oz small aubergines
1tbsp coarse sea salt
90g/3oz walnuts
8 cloves garlic
1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
or 1 fresh green chilli pepper, topped and seeded
1 tsp fine sea salt
extra virgin olive oil

Cover aubergines in salted water and boil for 5 minutes. Drain and cool. Put the peeled garlic cloves in a blender with 1 tsp salt and process until nearly smooth. Add the walnuts and cayenne pepper (or fresh chilli pepper) and blend until the walnuts are ground medium-fine. The fillings should have a fine crunch. Take one aubergine and slit down the middle, lengthways, cutting halfway into the flesh (make sure you do not cut through the other side). Prise the flesh open to create a pocket for the filling and press a teaspoon of walnut and garlic mixture into the aubergines. Smooth the filling with your finger or a spoon to level it with the aubergine skin, put on a plate and finish the rest of the aubergines in the same way. Pack the aubergines in layers with the filled side up, in a sterilised glass jar, fitting them quite snugly together but without crushing them. Cover with extra virgin olive oil, close the jar and store in a cool dark place. Eat after one month or more.

TART LEMON TART

Serves 8

8in/20cm sweet pastry flan case, baked blind For the filling:

2 lemons quartered 1/2pt/300ml dry white wine 8oz/225g sugar 3 eggs

Pre-heat the oven to 350F/180C/gas4. Poach the lemon quarters in the white wine with the sugar for 15 minutes. Remove the pips and put the lemons in the food processor along with the syrupy wine mixture. Turn on to whiz at top speed, and add the eggs one at a time to blend thoroughly. Pour the lemon custard through a coarse sieve into the pastry case and bake for about 30 minutes.

CHICKEN WITH BURGHUL

1 medium free-range chicken 1 medium onion, peeled 1tbsp coarse sea salt 200g burghul 1/2tsp ground cinnamon 1/8tsp finely ground black pepper 450g plain yoghurt (optional)

1.5 litres of water 3 cinnamon sticks 25g unsalted butter 600ml chicken stock 1/2 tsp ground allspice

Rinse the chicken under cold water and put it in a saucepan. Add the water, place over a high heat and bring to the boil. When the water is about to boil, skim the surface clean, then add the onion, cinnamon sticks and salt. Reduce heat to medium, cover pan and boil gently for 1 hour. Half an hour before the chicken is ready, remove 600ml of the chicken stock for cooking the burghul (the chicken will go on cooking with the stock left in the pan). Or you can roast the chicken basting it with pomegranate syrup. Melt the butter in a saucepan over a medium heat, add the burghul and stir until it is well coated with butter. Pour in the chicken stock, season with cinnamon, allspice, and pepper and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 25 minutes or more until the burghul is cooked exactly to your liking and the stock is absorbed. Take the burghul off the heat, wrap the lid with a clean kitchen towel, put it back over the pan and leave to sit while you prepare the chicken. Transfer the chicken on to a chopping board and cut into slices or pieces as you prefer. Spoon the burghul into a shallow serving bowl. Arrange the chicken pieces on top of it and serve immediately and preferably with a bowl of yoghurt.

SHORTBREAD


Enough for 24 fingers



8oz plain flour, sieved 4oz fine semolina 4ozs castor sugar 8oz soft butter

Pre-heat the oven to 300F/150C/Gas 2. Mix all the ingredients in a food processor. Spread the mix into an 8in by 10in tray and bake for about 1 hour. When cooked, leave to cool and sprinkle with vanilla sugar. Cut into fingers while warm. Alternatively, make 12 tartlets: fill with paper cases and baking beans; chill for 30 minutes then bake blind.





GARDENING HINTS

GENERAL TASKS

Prune overgrown hedges as early as possible and lower than the height you actually want, as young shoots will grow quickly from the top. It is advisable to shape the hedge narrower at the top and wider at the base.

It is important that all weeding of borders is completed. Cut back dead stems, rake fallen leaves off plants.

LAWNS

If you are making a new lawn the ground must be prepared now, so as to allow the soil to settle.

First cutting of the year can be done now, if growth has started and provided of course that the grass is dry. Set the mower blades higher for the first 2 cuttings of the season. Rake out the dead grass in the lawn in spring to allow light, air and water through to the roots.

BULBS

Lilies will be coming into the garden centres now. Avoid bulbs that have been shrivelled and stick with fat juicy ones. They prefer moisture-retentive, well-drained soil that's rich in organic matter, so dig in plenty of compost or manure. Improve the drainage of heavy soils by adding coarse grit, and put each individual bulb on a small mound of grit in the planting hole. Plant so that the bulbs are covered with about 4"-8" of soil, preferably in groups of three to five. The one exception is the madonna lily (*Lilium candidum*) which is planted with its top just below the surface. If the soil is not in good condition, pot the bulbs to plant out later. Overcrowded clumps of bulbs should be dug up carefully with a fork, separated into smaller clumps and replanted immediately at the same depth at which they were growing previously.

SHRUBS

Pot-grown shrubs benefit from top dressing with fresh potting compost. Remove the top few centimetres of old soil, taking care not to damage the roots, and replace it with compost to which you have added a slow-release fertilizer. Thin out overgrown evergreens by removing entire branches either where they join the main stem, or at ground level. Only hardier evergreens like Laurel (*Prunus laurocerasus*) should be pruned now. Those varieties that are susceptible to frost damage such as Mexican orange blossom (*Choisya ternata*) are best pruned in Summer.

VEGETABLES

Early potatoes are best sprouted in advance of planting next month. They'll grow away quickly and give a bigger yield. Buy seed potatoes and set them out in boxes, trays or old egg boxes, with the end containing the most 'eyes' uppermost. Stand them in a light, airy, frost-free place. Feed overwinter vegetables, including asparagus beds, applying a balanced general fertilizer. Prepare seedbeds by covering the ground with clear polythene. Apply a general fertilizer two weeks before sowing.

POT PLANTS

Dahlias and chrysanthemums stored over winter should now be brought into growth so that cuttings can be taken from the new shoots. Put the potted tubers in full light, water well and spray with water regularly. Newly bought dahila tubers can be treated in the same way. Dahlias provide spectacular colour from mid-summer until the first frost, and they're also good for cut flowers. There are many different forms to suit all tastes-vivid and tall cactus varieties, pompons and decoratives for borders and cutting, dwarf anemone-flowered forms with unusual double centres, and simple, single-flowered mignon dahlias. The dwarf forms are particularly good for tubs. Take cutting by removing shoots when they're 3"-4" long. Use a sharp knife to cut just below a leaf joint and then cut off the lower leaves. Dip the entire cutting into liquid fungicide (wear gloves for this or have a good scrub afterwards), dip the base into hormone rooting powder, and put it into a pot of compost made with equal parts of coir compost and horticultural vermiculite. Place the pots in a propagator or in a polythene bag, ideally with a little bottom heat to maintain a temperature of 10-13°C.

TAKING ROOT CUTTINGS

- 1 Dig up a plant and shake or wash the soil from the roots. Cut off an entire root near the crown of the plant.
- 2 Cut the root into sections about 2" long, making a slanting cut at the lower end so you know which way up to put them.
- 3 Dust the pieces with fungicide powder and push them, sloping-end down, into pots of compost.

TIPS

- Continue planting trees and shrubs if weather permits.
- Prick out vegetables sown last month.
- Bring in any remaining bulbs being forced in pots.
- Complete the pruning of apple and pear trees this month.
- Cut back dead stems of herbaceous perennials to ground level.
- Start sowing half-hardy annuals.
- Check that all tools and machinery are in good working order.
- Firm in recently planted shrubs and trees loosened by weather
- Put out regular supplies of food and water for the birds.
- Stock up pots, compost, labels, twine and other sundries.

The next meeting on strategy for development in the county will be held on 3/2/97. Cllr. John McGinley has tabled a number of questions and motions on the plan. They include: 1. How much water can be

- extracted from the Liffey and the Barrow?
- 2. How much development would this allow in houses and industry?
- 3. What are the limits of the present water treatment plants? i.e. how much we can get now and what this represents in houses and factories.
- 4. Questions 1, 2 and 3 also apply to sewerage.
- 5. What is the amount of land now zoned (1985 and 1996) for housing and industry and can our water and sewerage systems cope with this or is there spare capacity. The spare capacity or lack of it will determine the volume of rezoning. We can then decide in what general area that zoning should go - South, Middle,

North East or North West. Cllr. McGinley has submitted 13 motions. They include:

1. Carton Demesne

To preserve this amenity it is important that lands on either side of the avenue be retained in its present agriculture use and not be used for other development. 2. Bonding

Planning permission will not be granted to builders who have left estates unfinished.

Parking Bye-Laws

Your local councillors were presented with a draft of the Bye-Laws at a meeting on the 10th of January, even though they were dated the 12/11/96. Cllr. McGinley has sent a copy of the report to the Community Council for their consideration. However as there are 44 areas with yellow lines it is very difficult to make sense of it without the lines being shown on a map. Cllr McGinley has asked the council to provide such a map in order for the local community to have a real imput.

Fás Workers for Cemetries.

The Council say that they have serious problems in getting any applicants for Fás schemes in Maynooth/ Celbridge/Leixlip area. The Council have agreed to readvertise.

Bond Bridge Update.

The planning permission granted in respect of the 20.685 acres of land in Newtown has been appealed to An Bord Pleanala. This means that the special development levy of

£22,000 per acre, which is to fund the realignment of Bond Bridge, will now be considered by Bord Pleanala. If those who have appealed can be satisfied following consultations, and the appeals are withdrawn, then the special levy will stand and Bond Bridge will be well on the way to

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

DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

Water Charges turned off.

Councillor Catherine Murphy has welcomed the Government's decision to abolish water charges. Democratic Left has always opposed these highly unpopular charges as a form of double taxation. When the present government was formed in 1994, a first breakthrough was achieved when arbitrary cutoffs were halted and tax relief on charges were introduced. Now we have achieved a total end to water charges. This is a complete vindication of the stand taken by large numbers of North Kildare residents against these charges from the day they were first introduced.

Bond Bridge Action Group

The Bond Bridge Action Committee met Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council at its January meeting. Some confusion has arisen over the cost of having the bridge rebuilt because of the inclusion by Kildare County officials of the Straffan Road link road from Meadowbrook in the overall project.

Catherine Murphy has requested Kildare County Council to produce a written breakdown of the project costings which will indicate separately the cost of rebuilding Bond Bridge. Catherine Murphy has also asked the Council to state clearly the level of development levies which are being attached to new planning permissions in the Newtown area and if these levies will be used exclusively for rebuilding Bond Bridge. Finally, Catherine Murphy has asked the Council to state how long it will take to get the bridge rebuilt through the use of development levies.

Drinking Water Quality

The high levels of chlorine which are making the public water supply in the North Kildare area unpalatable are directly due to high pollution levels in the River Liffey. High dosages of chlorine are being applied at the Water Treatment Plant at Leixlip in order to neutralise pollution and render the water safe to drink. The main problem is high concentrations of ammonia due to meat processing, farming activities and untreated sewage entering the Liffey upstream. Catherine Murphy has called for a thorough review of water quality in the River Liffey and an action plan to tackle the pollution problem at source.

Telephones in Beaufield

Catherine Murphy has contacted Telecom Eireann about the unsatisfactory situation regarding public telephone boxes in the Beaufield area. Currently there are only two boxes, located at Beaufield Shopping Centre. Long queues are a nightly feature at these boxes. Catherine Murphy has requested Telecom to undertake an overall review of public telephone provision in the area in view of new housing developments and associated population growth.

Public Lighting In Silken Vale

Catherine Murphy has asked Kildare County Council for information concerning the public lights on the main avenue in Silken Vale which have yet to be switched on. At the moment the avenue is very dark at night and this is a cause of concern to local residents. Catherine Murphy has also asked for information concerning a likely date for completion of roads in the estate.

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FINE GAEL NOTES

Joan Slade River:

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare Co. Council to contact the authorities at Maynooth College to clarify the correct ownership of the Slade river. The river urgently requires cleaning of trees and debris to eliminate the possibility of any future flooding at Parson St.

Traffic Island - Straffan Road:

The following motion has been placed on the agenda for the next meeting (7/2/97) of the Celbridge Area Committee by Senan Griffin "That the traffic island at the Greenfield Shopping Centre on the Straffan Road be painted and that a centre island light be provided so that it is made safe for all road users". This island is extremely dangerous and motorists have found it almost impossible to see it during recent weather conditions.

Maynooth - Draft Parking Bye - Laws:

The area committee will consider the Maynooth draft parking bye-laws on 7/2/97. Any person wishing to make suggestions re. same should contact Cllr. Senan Griffin at 6285177.

Bond Bridge

The five area councillors met the Bond Bridge Action Group at the area meeting on the 10/1/97.

The action group outlined their worries to the councillors about the delay in having the bridge re-aligned.

It was agreed by the five councillors that everything possible will be done to expedite work on this the most dangerous bridge in Co. Kildare.

Cllr. Senan Griffin further suggested that C.I.E. be contacted for funds to re-align the bridge because of their requirement that the bridge be raised to accommodate the electrification of the line at a future date. It should be noted that C.I.E. will obtain 'Euro Funding' for this line and Cllr. Griffin sees no reason why some of that funding cannot be used for Bond Bridge. The meeting agreed to this approach.



At the annual Christmas party for the under age players in the Club, the under 13 hurlers and footballers received their North Kildare League medals.



Dermot Canning receives his hurling medal from Enda McManus





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
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MAYNOOTH TOWN A.F.C.

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
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

EDITORIAL

Pub Licencing Laws

A recent 5 pence increase in the price of the pint in Dublin, which was subsequently reversed, led to a public debate about our pub licencing laws. Public houses remain one of the few sectors of the retail trade which is subject to strict regulation. For instance, a new licence may not be issued unless an existing licence lapses.

The result is that Maynooth had four pubs thirty years ago when the population was less than 2,000 and still has four pubs today when the population is approaching 10,000. It is not clear that such a strict prohibition on the issuing of new licences is in the public interest.

The four existing pubs in Maynooth are perfectly reasonable places to go for a drink. But one or two new pubs in the town would certainly introduce some competition and might even encourage our publicans to invest in refurbishing their premises.


The Maynooth Development Plan

An audit of land available for residential development undertaken by Kildare County Council in January '97 confirmed 106 acres in Maynooth. Taken together with Celbridge it reveals that a landbank of 386 acres is available for residential development in this area. This could cater for a maximum increase in population of 16,212 people. In the lower Liffey Valley region which is served by the Leixlip treatment works, enough land is zoned residential to cater for a maximum population increase of 26,376 people. This is before Kildare County Councillors rezone any further lands in the Kilcock, Celbridge or Maynooth area.

Heritage Project

In February we met representatives of the interested groups, together with Mr Ray O'Connor from the Mid-East Regional Tourism Organisation. A frank discussion on the merits of Maynooth as a tourist location as well as our ideas on the benefits of achieving Heritage town status were discussed.

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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

In the High Court on Monday 10th February the actions of Kildare County Councillors, in passing the Clane Development Plan last July, were judged to be illegal.

This judgement has widespread implications for the planning process throughout Kildare, not least for Maynooth, and marks an important milestone in opposition to excessive residential rezoning being co-ordinated by the *North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning*.

Clane has many similarities to Maynooth. As a relatively small village it has seen its population mushroom in the last 5 years by 67%. The plan now deemed illegal would have provided enough residential rezoning to further treble its population to a size larger than the current size of Maynooth. 97% of Clane's population were opposed to the proposed Plan and now have at least a breathing space in which it is hoped their public representatives can rethink the logic of the original proposals.

Maynooth however is still facing proposals which could more than double its population from 9,000 at present to 21,000 over the next five years. But are such huge residential rezonings in any way justified by a scarcity of

building land in Maynooth? The recently revealed results of the residential land audit undertaken by Kildare County Council suggests not. 106 acres are presently available for building on in Maynooth, enough for a further 3,000 people without any more rezoning occuring. Such a discovery vindicates the stance taken by Maynooth Planning Alliance in opposing any significant residential rezonings in the forthcoming Maynooth Plan. According to the County Council figures there is also adequate land presently zoned residential throughout the county to provide for approximately 23,000 houses, enough to house the projected growth in the population until at least the year 2040.

Are we really going to spend taxpayers money on a massive scale for unnecessary servicing of lands which may not be required for decades? The results of the land audit are an astonishing revelation of how much excessive rezoning has already occured throughout County Kildare. However, it also provides an opportunity for all political parties to review their public position and re-evaluate what, if any, extra residential rezoning is needed in Maynooth over the next five years. Maynooth Planning Alliance will welcome unreservedly any change of heart which results and its citizens will long remember any changes of heart which do not.

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
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MAYNOOTH I.C.A. NOTES

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



OLD GREENFIELD RESIDENT'S ASSOCIATION NOTES

AGN

A well attended and enthusiastic A.G.M. of the above association was held in the Boy's National School on Monday, 3rd of February. In attendance were councillor John Mc Ginley and a great number of residents ready to voice their concerns about a variety of issues.

Correspondence

Outgoing chairman, Manus Mc Carron, read the correspondence which included the council newsletter for Council Estates. He drew attention to the fact that the council grant for maintenance of open spaces would be paid this year in the Spring rather than the Autumn. This was worth £500 last year. Home composting bins are also available from the council free for council tenants and at a cost of £10 to others. While winning second prize in Maynooth Tidy Estates Competition this year, I'm afraid we didn't pick up a prize in the Kildare Council Estates Competition. The judges, while complimenting our flower beds, referred to our damaged trees and mentioned weeds and litter. To help us overcome these problems they have passed our application for a grant for the installation of litter bins. As you read this we hope to have the litter bins erected.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurer Kevin McGovern reported on a very good financial '96 for the Association. He thanked everyone who supported us financially especially those who had bought lotto numbers, paid membership fees and the many businesses who had sponsored our many activities. £4,102 was paid for Lotto numbers in '96. That is a lot of support for the Residents Association taking away prize money (£2,080) and collectors fees (£321) we are left with a profit of £1,701. Other sources of income were the grant -£500 membership fees-£390 Activities -Disco's, Bar B Q etc.-£560. Total Income was £3,156. If our income was high so was our expenditure and rightly so, at £3,116. This included -insurance-£210, Trees, Shrubs, Strimmer etc. £567- Grass cutting -£545, skips and sprayers-£328 Litter collection -£120 etc. Despite all this we had a healthy balance on 3^{rd} of February 1997 of £557.

The chairman congratulated the treasurer on his diligent and surefooted handling of the accounts. He also thanked the Lotto sellers, Thomas and Karina Mc Govern, for their hard work and all the residents who supported the Lotto and received Thomas and Karina with courtesy and kindness. With continued support of all concerned we can certainly achieve the many goals the residents have set themselves.

The chairman paid tribute to outgoing secretary Anne Birchall.

He expressed the sadness and regret of everyone present that she was unable to continue due to personal reasons. Anne had worked tirelessly on behalf of the Residents of Old Greenfield. It could be said, and rightly so, that there would be no residents Association except for Anne Birchall. She was one of the founding members of Greenfield Action Group and was in at the ground floor of Residents Association. When Anne paid a visit or got on the phone, it is no exaggeration to say that the officials in Kildare County Council quaked. However, she was on first name terms with them all as they and the committee admired her organisational skills. The incoming secretary has big footsteps to follow. Everyone wishes her well and hope that in the future she will step back into the breach, she will be most welcome.

Topics Discussed at AGM and Neighbourhood Watch Meeting

- 1. Dogs: Gardaí are observing the situation of loose dogs roaming around the estate. The Gardaí are in close contact with the dog warden. It is now illegal to let dogs roam. Owners are now responsible for their pets and must clean open spaces, footpaths and roads if fouled by their animals. They may be prosecuted by the Gardaí or individuals or Residents Associations can take civil suits against the pet owners.
- 2. The River: Failure of Larch Homes to erect a fence and restore hedging has resulted in the County Council taking legal action against the builders. The Association are watching the outcome with interest.
- 3. Cars crossing on footpath beside river: Gardaí have been informed of the small number of environmentally unfriendly motorists who indulge in the sport of driving across your neighbours green spaces, these motorists could be playing another game of guessing the amount of money they have to cough up to keep Judge Brophy's worthy charities going. Don't say you haven't been warned.
- 4. Illegal dumping is also a problem in Old Greenfield. Once again those involved have been observed.
- 5. Reseeding of Green in Phase 2: Representation is being made to council on this matter.

6. Noisy Neighbours: Be they students or otherwise, they no longer need to be tolerated. There is now an Environmental Protection Act in place which puts an end to this yobboish behaviour. £5 secures court proceedings and puts an end to the problem. The Residents Association will support anyone with this problem financially and legally, just come to the next meeting. Yes, Residents Associations are useful things.

Work Planned or In Progress

Nameplates have to be passed by a full meeting of Kildare County Council. Then it will be full steam ahead. Goal Posts will be repaired while litter bins are being erected. It is hoped to spray weeds in the middle of March. Subscriptions were set at £5 and hope to be collected in March. Young men are required to use mowers this season. Contact any committee member. Ladders, brushes, shovels etc. to be purchased. The chairman asked the residents to support Martin Caine in his great work with the NoName club and NoName Social Club. He deserves support in his efforts to give young people between 12-18 a social outlet. More litter wardens also required. Apply to committee.

Residents vs. Developers

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
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
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
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E COLI AWARENESS

E Coli is a bug that we are hearing more and more about everyday. We are all very familiar at this stage with the name and we are all aware that this "bug" is one we want to avoid being infected by, but how many of us really have an understanding of what an E Coli is and how it can affect us?

Where did the name come from?

E.Coli is the abbreviated name of the bacterium in the Family Enterobacteriaceae named Escherichia (Genus) Coli (Species).

What is an E Coli?

E Coli is the most abundant bacteria that exists. It lives in both our, and many other animals intestines.

We need a certain amount of E Coli to be present in our intestinal system for good health. It is a source of Vitamin K and B complex vitamins. From the day we are born, we are never without bacteria, most of which are helpful but some of which can be lethal.

It is a certain "strain" or type of E Coli bacteria called E Coli 0157:H7 which is very harmful to us.

E Coli 0157:H7 is a member of the EHEC Enterohaemorrhagic E Coli group.

Enterohaemorrhagic means intestinally-related. This organism causes haemorrhaging and therefore loss of blood.

It is very easy to pick up this bacteria as it is everywhere in the environment. Everything you eat, drink or have touched that has been a part of an animal or near an animal can infect you. This is a reason for washing hands!

How does an E Coli affect us?

E Coli strain, 0157:H7 contains a gene that can cause a toxin to be produced, called Shiga-like toxin (SLT), or sometimes called Vero toxin.

The toxin is a protein which causes severe damage to the intestinal epithelial cells (the cells that line the wall of the intestine).

The damage is so severe that if we acquire this bacterial strain, not only do we lose water and salts, blood vessels are damaged, and bleeding occurs - lots of bleeding - haemorrhaging.

This condition can be particularly dangerous to small children and it can even be lethal.

Children are far too small to tolerate much blood and fluid loss

This is why small children should not be allowed to become dehydrated, even in mild cases of diarrhoea. In some cases another syndrome is involved which is called haemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS), which is characterized by kidney failure and loss of red blood cells. Approximately 5% to 10% of children progress to this stage of disease - which is very dangerous for them.

In severe cases, the disease can cause permanent kidney disease. It is also very dangerous for the old or infirm. There can be a combination of HUS and some other things which involve the blood system, which can be lethal to the elderly in 50% of cases.

Where is E Coli in our hamburgers?

Unless there is a cut in the meat, the meat below the surface is normally sterile. Outside surfaces of all meat will have bacteria present, so if the meat is infected with E Coli strain, 0157:H7, it will be on the surface of the meat and not down inside the fibres of the meat.

However, as soon as the meat is cut with a knife or punctured with a fork, it will carry the bacteria down into the cut.

When meat is ground for hamburgers, the bacteria cells get distributed throughout all of the meat. This is why meat should be well cooked.

Vegetables can also be infected if handled by a contaminated person. Water can also be contaminated as can non-pasteurised apple juice.

When should I get worried?

It can take hours or days for symptoms to appear but if there is any blood in the stool or if fever, vomiting, etc. are present, take heed and inform a doctor.

How can I reduce the risk from E Coli?

- (1) Always clean any surface that has come in contact with raw meat, before any other item is placed on that surface.
- (2) Always thoroughly wash your hands after handling raw meat, and before you handle any other utensils or other food items.
- (3) Never use the same plate, tray or utensils for the cooked meat that you use for the raw meat unless you thoroughly wash the plate, tray or utensils in between.
- (4) Always cook meat, especially ground meat, until the juices run absolutely clear, pink is not good enough.
- (5) In day-care centres, schools, etc., any small children with diarrhoea should be carefully handled, and kept separate from all well children. All nappies, and any soiled clothing should be kept separate from all well children. The day-care worker, teacher, and health-care personnel should practice strict hygiene at all times, regardless of the health of the children.

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
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JUST WHAT IS THE INTERNET?

Well, it's this....

The Internet grew out of a need for Universities in the USA to collaborate on some US Department of Defence research projects. The list of Universities involved grew and both commercial and non-profit organisations became involved. Today it is a complex network of millions of computers of all sizes and types spanning the Globe.

To most people the Internet provides a number of basic services with which they interact. These are:

*World Wide Web. This is the graphical end of the Internet that is most people's first view of the Internet. The World Wide Web can present information in pictures, text, sound and video. The World Wide Web has built in search facilities to help you find that elusive bit of information.

*Usenet News. (News groups) - News groups are a huge list of informal discussion groups on almost every topic under the sun. These range from adoption, origami, architecture, computers to basketball, aliens, startrek, football and survivalism.

*E-mail - This is the facility to send messages to other people with e-mail addresses. You do need to know the e-mail address of the intended recipient of the message. Messages can be as long as required.

*File transfer protocol (FTP) - There is a wealth of free software available on the Internet as well as documents, and other material. FTP is the means to copy these to your own PC.

*Internet Relay Chat (IRC) - This allows two people to have a "conversation" using the keyboard via the Internet.

WHAT YOU NEED?

So what do you need to connect and use the Internet? The first and most basic requirement is that you own your own computer of some sort. Aside from this you need the following:

- *A telephone line
- *A computer modem
- *An "account" with one of the Internet service providers
- *Internet Software a World Wide Web Browser, E-mail software, News group software, File transfer software (optional). Typicially, the Internet software is provided by the Internet service provider or your modem supplier for a nominal fee.

The most important points to bear in mind are:

- Make sure that the service provider has local number access in your area. The access number is the telephone number you dial to connect to the Internet.
- Buy the fastest modem you can afford. The faster the modem, the less time you need to spend connected. The fastest modem on the market today is rated at 33600BPS.

AVAILABLE ON THE INTERNET

There is information on almost any subject you care to mention on the Internet. Some examples are:

- Newgrange in County Meath, with pictures and explanations and details on the significance of the construction.
- The History and origin of the Cork Examiner.
- Very detailed information and pictures from all the UK premier league football clubs with special pages for fan clubs etc.

- Help and support from all the major computer software manufacturers.
- There is a 30 page area dedicated to Dublin's Temple Bar area.
 All major new films have Internet sites details information and photographs from the film in question.

COSTS

One of the two most common questions asked about the Internet relate to its cost. (The other question is discussed in the next section..). There is considerable confusion about costs and how they are incurred.

The first cost involved is purchasing a modem and subscribing to one of the Internet service providers. Typically these costs including VAT are: Modem £150, Internet Software £30, Annual Subscription £121.

None of the major Internet service providers in Ireland charge connect time so the only on-going costs are the annual subscription and the telephone call costs. Connecting to the Internet is the same as making a telephone call.

PORNOGRAPHY...

The other common concern expressed about the Internet is the availability of pornography. Yes, pornography is available just as it's available in book form and on video. For parents this means that similar levels of control need to be imposed as for videos or magazines. Software is available on the Internet to block access to Internet sites containing pornography.

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LAUNCH OF TREO 2000

Launch of TREO by Michael D. Higgins, Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht.

The report of the Commission to examine the role of voluntary Irish language organisations was launched on 28th January 1997 by the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht in his Department. The members of the Commission were: Fionbarr Bradley, Caoilfhionn Nic Pháidin, Margaret Mac Curtain, Eoghan Ó Cadháin and Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin (Chairperson). Loretta Ni Mhaoldhomhnaigh from the Department acted as Secretary. Over a 12 month period, they examined the role, structures, efficiency of 15 Irish language voluntary organisations such as Conradh na Gaeilge, Gaelscoileanna, Glor na nGael etc. and made recommendations for the future. The statutory Bord na Gaeilge was included at a later date at their request.

The large gathering heard the Minister thank the members of the Commission and the Chairperson in particular for their voluntary, unpaid work. He welcomed their recommendations as radical and revolutionary. He said that he was giving the organisations three months to consider the findings and respond to the report. He would then make the necessary decisions. The Chairperson also thanked the members, highlighting the service given to them by the Secretary, Loretta Ní Mhaoldhomhnaigh. She stressed that this was the beginning of a process which would bring the Irish language into the third millenium and that the Government and the State should build on the goodwill and interest of the public in bilingualism in particular.

The report of 120 pages was published in Irish and English so that it would reach a wider audience. It discusses the various aspects in which the voluntary sector is involved such as family, education, enterprise, community and culture and selections from submissions received from the public are scattered throughout the document. The report was widely praised and

its recommendations welcomed as radical and visionary by most organisations with the exception of Bord na Gaeilge who have publicly criticised the findings. The newspapers however, have praised their courage and boldness. Dúradh in eagarfhocal Foinse ar an 2 Feabhra:



The major recommendations of the Commission were:


- 1. An Chomhairle Ghaeilge be established which would be responsible for all aspects of the language.
- **2.** An Chomhairle Ghaeilge should develop a planned language strategy and examine the need for a Language Equality Bill.
- **3.** All voluntary language organisations should be funded by projects with careful costings and ongoing monitoring.
- 4. Fás and EU funding projects should be used widely.
- 5. Fás should lay more emphasis on Irish language courses to provide work opportunities for people to work in this area.
- 6. A national network of quality Irish language classes should be provided with recognised certification. The bilingual report TREO 2000 is available from Government Publications for £7.00.

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

A.I.B. EXTENSION

To Be Or Not To Be - AIB Extension

Messrs Coonan Auctioneers Maynooth report an excellent demand for all types of residential properties in year just completed and are very positive about the prospects for the coming season.


The market in general increased by 15-20% during the course of the year for all types of houses and Maynooth itself was particularly buoyant.

Independence Day (12's)

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
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

Marital Status: still not divorced.

Ambitions: not to suffer fools gladly, to say no more often, to be a famous writer.

Pet Hates: people who say 'someone should do something...', badly conducted meetings, pettiness, those who say 'the Community Council never does anything'.

What other job would you like to do?

Actor, writer, gardener, politician, journalist, lawyer, psychologist.

Elected to the Council in 1987. Served as Chairperson, Vice-chairperson and Secretary, involved in the Festival, St. Patrick's Day Parade, Planning and Development, the CIC and Communications committees. Having decided to stay, I wanted to improve the town for my children in particular. Initially, I wanted the 66 bus extended to Celbridge (done), a proper train service (done), see the By-Pass and roads completed (done), resolve the ludicrous position of the Geraldine Hall and the Harbour Field (outstanding) and have a Community Centre for teenagers (outstanding).

Are you a member of a political party and do you have any political ambitions beyond the Community Council? Member of the Labour Party. Unlike some other former chairpersons I have no interest in Kildare County Council. Politics can be an awful, though fascinating life, devoid of privacy. Many members of the Council are political, they tend to be the workers in any community. If you want something done, ask a busy person.

What do you get out of being on the Community Council and particularly the Executive?

What incentive is there for others to join?

Making a difference to the town, being involved at every level, knowing everything that happens, knowing everyone. It is a learning experience in friendship, loyalty, trust, finance, co-operation, managerial skills, being the employer of 3 supervisors and approx. 45 workers. I have made wonderful friends. The negative side includes: being accused of being paid for the work, suspicions of ulterior motives, being attacked while socialising. Very little incentive to join the Executive except hard work and no recognition.

Outline the amount and work involved in the Executive.

I spend about half a day a week on Council work, visiting the Office about three days a week, ringing every day. Constantly writing letters and filing application forms. Committee involvement, organisational skills, dealing with all statutory bodies, Kildare County Council, Fás, being an employer, finance, Fás training courses, meeting the NSSB, committees and others i.e. Soccer club., GAA, MDA, College, politicians, Intel, HP, planning, dealing with staff problems. Learning not to waste time and get to the point. I could have meetings three nights a week, sometimes at weekends.

What sacrifices have you had to make for the Executive?

Writing, weekend breaks, being home at night, privacy at home and outside, academic research, personal relationships, the stage.

Are you happy with the work of the Council and what are your expectations for the future?

I am frustrated with the slow process of red tape, lack of development on the Geraldine Hall and the Harbour Field still in foreign ownership, worried about the growth of single issue lobby groups. I want Maynooth Town Council status within 3 years, Carton Demesne intact in public ownership, a Community Centre, a Festival within 10 years that people will talk about, ground floor accommodation, for all projects.

Is Maynooth a good place to live?


For me, yes. For my children, not particularly. There are no facilities for them. I am close to my job, my neighbours are wonderful, the people are lovely, I know everyone and every service is personal. But I miss Galway, the sea, the Gaeltacht, Gaeilge, the theatre and cinema on my doorstep, the buzz of festivals all year round. Maynooth is the University and the University is Maynooth - they are inextricably linked. The students are the economic life blood of this town. It could be Cambridge. We have the natural amenities.

What would you say to the apathetic/pessimistic people?

If you don't get involved stop whinging. Stop saying 'someone should do something about....' - do it. The community must provide its own Community Centre - no one else is going to do it for us. Look at what would not exist without the Community Council - St. Patrick's Day Parade, the Festival, the Newsletter, Information Directory, Community Games, Summer Project - never mind the multiplicity of services provided by the Council Fás projects and the 45 - 50 jobs provided allied with training and employment prospects. Réad local newspapers and the Newsletter to see what happens.

LARINE PLAYERS

The Larine Players, Maynooth's new drama group, got off to an excellent start on the 6th and 7th of February '87 in the Geraldine Hall. The chosen play was Womberang, a one-act 'adult comedy', by Sue Townsend, author of the Adrian Mole books. Set in a gynaecologist's waiting-room, the play brings together an assortment of women waiting submissively for their turn with the male specialist. Submissively, that is until the arrival of Rita. Rita, fresh out of a psychiatric hospital on her way to the gynaecologist (there's a come down for you!) believes in speaking out and stirring things up, and soon wins her sister patients over to her side, much to the disarray of the hospitals administration. The play is effectively a series of jokes around this situation, making no great dramatic point but providing a rich opportunity for pointed comedy.

In this production of what is basically an English play, a number of Irish and Local references were inserted ("I saw the Minister of Health Barry Desmond at the Health Centre". "Did he say anything?" "No, he just made

a speech"). This was the right decision, but could have been done more thoroughly. The comments on a "free" National Health Service were obviously out of place, and the discussion of Mrs. Thatcher might just as easily havecentred on an Irish political figure - Gemma Hussey perhaps?

But this is carping. The play worked well, especially when the pace was right and the lines came in pat. Director Clair O'Connor deserves congratulations for initiating the idea. getting the cast together, and extracting some fine performances. Carol Barton was excellent as the terrible Rita; in effect the play revolves around this character, and she carried it with brio. As her sidekick Dolly, Fiona McKibben gave a nicely judged performance, dark with hidden potential. Ann Fitzgerald, the reception clerk, had the task of providing the indication of impending disruption as she was the first to confront Rita and be defeated; this set things up well for Riana Walsh's appearance later as the harassed hospital assistant administrator, desperately trying to persuade herself that she is in control. Helen Doyle gave a well-controlled

> performance as Mrs. Lovett, while Mary Burke let herself go delightfully as Mrs Connelly, stepping out of her corsets to win our sympathy for a woman who learns to say "To hell with my cancer". Jim Cunningham and Martina Tyrrell showed an eloquent pair of feet as the lost God and discovered sex in the changing-room and Des Tierney as the gynaecologist made a striking entrance at the end. The prompts by Patti Lavin and Jeannette McLoughlin were a model of their kind - not needed too often, but clear and definite when required.

All in all, an auspicious start,

SAFETY IN THE HOME

Far too many accidents occur in our homes today, most of which could be avoided. There are a few areas where accidents occur most frequently and these are the kitchen, living-room and hallway.

Kitchen:

A lot of accidents occur in the kitchen, mainly scalding from hot water, burns from hot objects and poisoning from medicines and cleaning agents.

Prevention:

- 1. Put saucepans well back on the cooker.
- 2. Buy a cordless kettle and use the minimum amount of

from the kettle to the base and store well back on the counter.

- 3. Use safety catches on cupboards.
- 4. Don't leave pointed objects lying around.
- 5. If you get rid of an old fridge or the likes make sure you take the door off before discarding it so that a child doesn't climb inside and smother.
- 6. Have a fire blanket or extinguisher in clear view in the kitchen.

Hall and Stairs:

How many children have been hurt from falling down a stairs or by falling through glass?

Prevention:

- 1. Never have glass panelling on internal doors of the house, (particularly in areas where children run, play and slam doors.)
- 2. If you have glass panelling at the bottom of the stairway make sure it is safety glass.
- 3. Check your stairs for horizontal bars that a child could climb through. Bars should be vertical and the width between them should be no more than 10cm (4in). - If a child falls through the bannister he is likely to suffer a skull fracture or worse.
- 4. For crawling infants put gates at the top and bottom of the
- 5. Badly fitting carpet or carpet with holes on which children could trip should be got rid of or made safe.
- 6. Toys should not be left lying on steps or stairs or in the hallway as people might slip.
- 7. Make sure you have a smoke alarm in the hall and landing

Living-Room and Playroom:

No one wants their child injured at play!

Prevention:

- 1. Keep sharp objects out of reach of children.
- 2. Small pieces of lego etc. should be stored safely.
- 3. Electrical sockets should be out of sight of children.
- 4. Avoid trailing flexes and extension cords where children could trip.
- 5. Keep matches away from children.
- 6. Use safe guards with sides and tops.

Bathroom:

Bathtime should be fun, here's how you can help, avoid

scaldings.

Prevention:

- 1. Make sure you have a thermostat fitted, set to a maximum of 54°C (130°F).
- 2. Never leave young children alone in the bath as a child can drown in just a few inches of water.

Bedrooms:

You should be relaxing, not worrying in this room, here's how to help yourself relax!.

Prevention:

- 1. No child under the age of 6 should be left to sleep in an upper bunk bed.
- 2. Make sure bunk beds have 2 safety rails, one at each side of the bed unless the bed is at the wall.
- 3. No bunk bed should have a gap in the base or bed-head of more than 7.5cm(3in).
- 4. Any ladder or foothold should be firmly secured.
- 5. There should be a 75cm (2ft 6in) of space between the upper and lower bunk.
- 6. There should be a minimum clearance of 10cm (4in) between the upper surface of the mattress and the top of the guard rails.
- 7. Don't have a ledge big enough to sit on in an upstairs window.
- 8. Never leave furniture near a window.
- 9. Windows within childrens reach should be fitted with an automatic device to prevent them opening it more than 10cm (4in). These devices should be designed so they can easily be undone by an adult if there is a fire.

Toys are to play with, not to kill you, be careful.

Prevention:

- 1. Most fatalities are caused by choking.
- 2. Most common injuries are cuts or bruises.
- 3. Always check toys for safety label.
- 4. Throw away broken toys.
- 5. Keep toys belonging to older children away from younger
- 6. Explain to children how to use their toys safely and correctly.

St. Patrick's Weekend



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BARRACKSTOWN/KILCLOON DUMP

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
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HEALTH ALERT:

Be aware something might be wrong! Is your child sick?

Infants:

- Inability to suck for two or more feedings, or a poor suck which tires right away.
- Weak, mousy cry rather than the usual strong, lusty one.
- Irritability not seeming comfortable no matter what you do, and crying inconsolably.
- Acting as though movement is painful.
- Crying without tears, not urinating for more than 6 to 8 hours, sunken eyes.
- Any fever over 38C (100.4F) in a baby under 2 months.

All Ages:

- Cool, clammy skin with paleness, grey or dusky blue colour (when you press on the skin with a finger, it takes more than a second or so for colour to return.)
- Limpness, lack of strength or decreased movement to the limbs or head.
- A vacant expression in eyes that are usually alert and lively.
- Poor co-ordination, staggering, confusion.
- Rapid, shallow breathing. Do not confuse this with the rapid breathing that accompanies a high fever; if your child appears otherwise well, bring the temperature down before worrying about this.
- Noisy breathing with grunting, crowing or other abnormal sounds.
- Sinking in of the area above or below the rib cage or the spaces between the ribs with each breath.
- A moan, groan, grunt or 'uh' sound with each breath.
- A stiff neck accompanied by fever, irritability or any of the other signs of illness.
- Sunken eyeballs, dry mouth, loss of skin elasticity.
- Lack of eye contact. This is the most telling sign for doctors; even children who feel terrible with minor illness can still look people in the eye and object to their presence. A child with a serious illness often stares into space, seemingly oblivious of surroundings.

COT DEATH OR SUDDEN INFANT DEATH SYNDROME

This mainly affects babies under six months of age - only one out of seven cot deaths occurs in babies older than six months . Remember that cot death is rare, but it is useful for all parents to know how to reduce the risks.

- · Place your baby on his or her side to sleep.
- Make sure your baby cannot become completely covered by bedclothes: place him or her near the foot of the bed and

pull the bedclothes up to the shoulders but no further.

- Stop smoking during pregnancy it increases your child's chance of dying as a cot death.
- · Avoid exposing your baby to tobacco smoke.
- Do not let your baby get too hot or too cold.
- keep the room temperature at around 18C(65F).
- never let your baby sleep with a hot water bottle or electric blanket, or next to a radiator, heater or fire, or in direct warm sunshine.
- babies who are ill may need fewer clothes, not more.
- babies can get too cold outdoors or in draughts, especially in their first four weeks.
- if you wrap your baby up warmly to go outside, remember to remove hats and extra clothing inside buildings and warm trains, buses and cars.

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Are you too young to have your cholesterol level tested? No.

If there is a history of heart conditions in your family you should be having regular tests done from the age of 20, as you may be more susceptible to heart conditions yourself. The reason it is necessary to be tested while you are young is because heart disease develops over a life time, so why wait until middle age to be tested, as high cholesterol levels are better treated as soon as possible.

Cholesterol levels in young adulthood accurately predict one's risk of heart disease 30 to 35 years later. A cholesterol test only takes 5 minutes and could possibly help to save your life. "Heart Beat", a private Dublin based company is helping to raise awareness by offering cholesterol, anaemia and diabetes testing, as well as blood pressure testing, for a "fee". They travel from town to town staying for about 6 days at a time. They don't advertise their arrival, they simply allow word of mouth to advertise for them. They offer mainly a screening service where one gets which ever test is applicable to them followed by a verbal explanation of their results given by a cholesterol technician. The technician also gives information on diets and saturated fats but does not actually offer diet plans. Generally if you have a high cholesterol level you will be advised to see your GP and if your cholesterol level is low you will be given the all clear. It is important to know your cholesterol level to know your risk of having a heart attack. It seems that every year an increasing number of people are tested, so hopefully we will have fewer heart attacks to deal with in the future.

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LEMON FOAM

Serves 4.
2 large lemons
450ml/³/₄pint of milk
15g/¹/₂ oz gelatine
3 eggs, separated
75g/3oz golden caster sugar
85ml/3fl oz single cream
fine lemon shreds, to decorate.

- 1. Using a potato peeler, peel the rind off the lemons, leaving behind the pith. Squeeze the juice. Place peel in a heavy based pan with the milk and infuse over a low heat for 30 minutes.
- 2. Soak the gelatine in three tablespoons of water and leave to swell. Place the egg yolks in a large bowl with the sugar and the cream. Whisk in the hot milk, strain through a sieve and return to the pan. Cook over a low heat, stirring continuously, until the mixture thickens just enough to coat the back of a spoon. Add the lemon juice.
- 3. Melt the gelatine and stir into the custard. When it begins to set slightly, whisk the egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold in. Spoon into four large wine glasses and chill until set. Decorate with lemon shreds.

GARLICKY MUSHROOMS WITH GOATS CHEESE.

Serves 2.

4 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
2 garlic gloves, crushed
4 large flat mushrooms, wiped and stalks trimmed.
4 slices goat's cheese
6 tbsp chopped fresh parsley and thyme seasoning.

- 1. Heat the oil in a large sauté pan over a medium heat, add the garlic and fry it for 2 minutes. Add the mushrooms and cook for 4-5 minutes, turning them once or twice and basting with the juices.
- 2. Place a slice of cheese on each mushroom, scatter over the herbs and seasoning and fry for about 2 minutes. Serve with pasta.

CHILLI LAMB WITH POTATOES AND TOMATOES.



Serves 2

225g / 8oz potatoes, cut into chunks

1 tbsp chilli oil

1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

2 leg of lamb chops
1 green pepper, sliced


225g / 8oz red and yellow cherry tomatoes

50g / 2oz sun-dried tomatoes in oil, drained and finely chopped

2 tbsp pesto

seasoning

- 1. Boil the potato chunks in salted water for 5 minutes. Meanwhile, heat the oils in a sauté pan and brown the lamb chops over a medium to high heat on both sides.
- 2. Drain the potatoes and add to the pan with the pepper, fresh and dried tomatoes, pesto and seasoning. Reduce the heat a little and cook for 5-8 minutes until the potatoes have softened and the chops are cooked through.

GARDENING HINTS-

MARCH - IN LIKE A LION - OUT LIKE A LAMB

hilst March heralds the arrival of the gardener's spring it can often be a month of high winds, frost and heavy rain so these factors must be taken into account when planning your gardening. The good news is that the evenings are getting longer and the hour moves on in March giving even more time to work in the evening — should you feel so inclined!

Lawn

So, where do you start? The weeds must be tackled before their roots grow strong so either dig them out by hand, or as a very last resort, use a selective lawn weed-killer. Take great care to follow the manufacturer's instructions and be absolutely sure that none of it gets on your borders or you'll kill your plants. Next to the lawn itself — don't forget to get your lawn-mower and garden shears serviced and sharpened. There is nothing worse than trying to use blunt instruments — they not only ruin your grass and edges but fray your nerves as well. And gardening is supposed to be relaxing! You should mow an established lawn during mild weather. Set the mower blades higher than usual for the first cut, gradually lowering them over the next two or three cuttings. Before the first cut of the year use a stiff broom to scatter worm casts, and repeat whenever necessary before mowing. Feed the lawn with a granular or liquid fertiliser, again taking care to follow the manufacturer's instructions.

SHRUBS

Roses can now be pruned, including rambler rose that were not pruned after flowering last Summer. Rose pruning is necessary to develop a vigorous healthy, well-balanced plant with plenty of flowers. Removing excessive growth lets plenty of light and air around the plant, which helps prevent disease and encourages healthy growth.

Late summer-flowering shrubs should also be pruned towards the end of the month, including butterfly bush (Buddleia davidii) blue spirea (Caryopteris) Ceratostigma and flowering nutmeg (Leycesteria). Cut the plants back hard, leaving around 5 cm (2 in) of last year's growth.

Shrubs with coloured stems like dogwood (Cornus), Rubus and shrub varieties of willow (Salix) should be hard pruned towards the end of the month. Do this by cutting all the shoots back to within 15-30 cm (6-12 in) of the ground or to the trunk if there is one. On heavy or poor soils where the plant is growing less strongly, prune only every other year to avoid weakening the plant. This hard pruning encourages plenty of new, straight, bright coloured stems.

Winter-flowering heathers should be lightly trimmed with shears once flowering has finished to encourage neat and bushy growth.

The Garden Indoors

Amaryllis (Hippeastrum) bulbs should be watered regularly as required and fed weekly with a liquid feed. Continue watering and feeding after flowering has finished so that the bulb builds up its reserves for next year.


Don't forget to plant Polyanthus that have finished flowering indoors in a sheltered spot in your garden. They will benefit from division and replanting every three or four years, especially where they've formed large clumps, or when the centre of the plant is becoming bare.

Division can be done at any time during the winter, though autumn and early spring are best. In most areas of the country this month is the time to

Hardy annuals can be sown now in rows or irregularly shaped patches outside. There are many varieties that can provide a wealth of cheap and cheerful colour throughout the summer, including Godetia, nightscented stock, (Matthiola bicornis), love-in-a mist, (Nigella), Iceland Poppy (Papaver nudicaule) and snapdragon (Antirrhinum). 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Maynooth Development Plan

NOTES

It now appears likely that all 430 acres which have been sought for rezoning in the Maynooth area will be forced through by the Fianna Fail/Fine Gael coalition which has already been responsible for vast rezoning elsewhere in Kildare, contrary to the wishes of local communites. This follows adoption of a development "strategy" by Kildare County Council which amounts, in effect, to no strategy at all. Essentially, the rezoning majority on the Council have chosen to ignore the request made by the Minister for the Environment that an overall strategy for the county be adopted. They have also virtually ignored the strategy options put forward by the Council's own consultant. It remains to be seen whether the Minister will be prepared to accept the fudge concocted by the Council's rezoning majority. In the meantime, consideration of the Maynooth Plan now reverts to the Celbridge Area Committee. However, past experience suggests that, no matter what rezoning restrictions are proposed by this Committee, these will be overridden by the full Council whose majority seems hellbent on a planning free-for-all. This means that an additional 11,000 people could be accommodated in Maynooth during the plan period, to add to the 10,000 already here.

Catherine Murphy is, of course, completely opposed to these tactics, and will continue to work with local groups and individuals to prevent the transformation of Maynooth into a soulless and underserviced concrete jungle.

Secondary Level School Crisis

There is a growing second-level school crisis in North Kildare due to the lack of proper accommodation, a survey conducted by Democratic Left members has shown. Of the eleven schools in the area, ten are either completely or

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partially housed in temporary prefab buildings. Of a total school population of 7.400, about 1.800 are in this type of accommodation, many in overcrowded conditions. Four schools have no P.E. facilities, one has no canteen and one has no library. Four schools can offer only limited Transition Year facilities and three are unable to offer the Leaving Cert Vocational Programme, due to space

Inadequate science facilities are also a major problem, and are compromising the ability of local schools to support the demand for technical skills being generated in the region by firms such as Intel and Hewlett Packard. The massive rezoning threatened throughout North Kildare will make the schools accommodation crisis even worse.

Councillor Catherine Murphy has made a submission to the Minister for Education based on the survey and has asked for urgent measures to tackle the growing crisis situation facing the county's secondary schools.

Public Payphones

Following representations by Councillor Catherine Murphy. Telecom Eireann are to embark on major improvements in the provision of public payphones in Maynooth.

An additional double kiosk is to be installed at the junction of Meadowbrook Road and Beaufield Estate, where there has been a particular problem with long queues. Double kiosks will also replace the existing single kiosks in Carton Court and in Old Greenfield.

Telecom is also to meet with Catherine Murphy to discuss possible locations for additional kiosks on Maynooth Main Street. Anyone with views on this should contact Catherine Murphy at 6244903 or 088 - 696450

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

FINE GAEL NOTES

On Thursday February 6th 1997, Bernard Durkan, Minister of State at the Dept. of Social Welfare, visited Maynooth to officially open the Maynooth Money Advice and Budgeting Service, (or MABS). Situated on the Dublin road adjacent to O' Neills Autoshop, MABS provides a service that is **Confidential, Independent** and **Free.** Funded by the Department of Social Welfare, MABS is designed to assist people of Limited Income who are over indebted, be it with household bills or Money Lenders.

Minister Durkan said that the MABS service, which is now available at over 40 centres throughout the country, provides the cheapest form of credit available. He added that "MABS enables people to ease themselves out of a cycle of debt and the consequent pressures that it brings, and over time to reach a point where they feel they have more personal control over their own situation". Staffed on a full-time basis by money advisor Margaret Quinn, MABS provides several services. As well as advice and support to individuals or families who have financial difficulties, MABS also helps by setting up special accounts with the Credit Union. It deals with creditors on behalf of the individual and it provides valuable assistance in working out a Budget which is tailored for the individual or family.

Minister Durkan highlighted these several advantages and emphasised that when the family tradition of borrowing from the Money Lender is broken, the burden of debt is lifted. The individual's dignity, self confidence and independence is thus restored. Maynooth MABS is fully operational and for future information about the service feel free to contact the staff at (01) 6291660.

The budget which occured on January the 22nd 1997 has created many improvements within the area of social welfare. Minister of State Bernard Durkan welcomed these changes and improvements and for your information provides a selected summary below.

The general increases in this Budget are as follows:-

- £3 increase in all personal rates.
- £1.50 increase in all Adult Dependant Allowances
- Child Benefit is up by £1 on the lower rate and £5 on the higher rate.

As of September 1997, the new Child Benefit rates will be £30 each for the first 2 children, and £39 for the third and subsequent children per month.

For Carers, there will be an additional payment of 50% for those carers who are providing care to more than one person. For Pensioners and Old Age Pensions there will be an introduction of Pro-Rata Pensions for People with the yearly average of between 10 and 20 PRSI contributions. For Dependant spouses, they are to retain their entitlement to Treatment (Dental and Optical) Benefits when they qualify for the old age pension in their own right. All pensioners over the age of 75 are to qualify for free electricity allowance and free telephone rental allowance regardless of their households circumstances. In the area of Unemployment Benefit, PRSI contributions paid after 6 months are to reckon for re-qualification purposes. This change will benefit casual workers. There will be an increase of places in the Back to Work Allowance by 5,000 places, an increase from 17,000 to 22,000 with 1,000 places reserved for ^{a pilot} scheme for people with disabilities. Finally there is to be a special fund of £300,000 set up for projects to assist unemployed people to return to work. 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

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
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MAYNOOTH TOWN A.F.C

EDITORIAL

One of the most heartening aspects of Maynooth's St. Patrick's Day Parade is that it emphasises the large number of voluntary groups working away in the community. As we watch sports clubs, bands and youth clubs march up Main Street the Parade gives the people of the town an opportunity to celebrate the sense of community which exists in Maynooth.

As Maynooth continues to grow at a rapid pace (doubling in size in the last 10 years) this sense of community will be more difficult to retain. The Community Council, and the various projects running under its control - including the Newsletter - play an important role in promoting and highlighting cross community activity.

The FAS funded Community Employment Projects represent Government support for community activities in Maynooth but as the town grows it is becoming increasingly apparent that the community needs more resources to make Maynooth a decent place to live. All of which points up the totally inadequate level of funding available to local authorities. A classic example is that Kildare Co. Council has no parks department.

Such a situation would be considered totally unacceptable in a comparable area in France or Holland where local authorities play a key role in promoting the quality of life in local communities. And Maynooth still awaits Town Commission status despite repeated promises from governments going back almost ten years.

But to end on a positive note, congratulations to all the groups who participated in our St. Patrick's Day Parade and may they continue to make their valuable contribution to the life of the town.

MAYNOOTH PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

The Maynooth Development Plan

Kildare County Councillors have agreed a development strategy for the county. The revised wording will be available in the next two months. The revised strategy will be forwarded to the Minister for the Environment and put on display during the summer. The Councillors will then complete the development plans for the individual towns. The development strategy put forward to the Councillors by their independent consultants, Blackwell & Associates, included a direct reference to Maynooth and Celbridge. In broad terms it stated that if Kildare County Councillors want to ensure the development of the county as a whole, they should restrict the amount of land rezoned in Maynooth and Celbridge, as this would be contrary to achieving this goal. The majority of Kildare County Councillors did not accept the need to include this reference in the strategy document and agreed an amendment. The majority of Councillors on the Celbridge Area Committee who will in the first instance decide on both the Maynooth and Celbridge development plans have given commitments to the people of Celbridge that no further rezoning will take place there.

Maynooth Traffic Bye-laws

The details of the bye-laws have been agreed by the members of the Celbridge Area Councillors and the Gardai and we will all soon have to get used to the fact that we can no longer ignore those yellow lines.

Provision has been made to allow for half hour deliveries to business premises in the main street area. If the introduction of these new bye-laws do not solve the traffic delays in the town, surely "Operation Free-Flow Maynooth" cannot be far away.

Community Council Notes

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Ouestion:

I am a lone parent living in a private rented flat. I am working. I am on the housing list with my Local Authority but have very low points. Can I get assistance with purchasing a house of my own?

Answer:

You should contact the Housing Department of your Local Authority and arrange to visit the Loans Section. There is a wide range of leaflets published by the Department of the Environment on housing which will be available to you there. In particular you should enquire into Local Authority loans - and the Shared Ownership Mortgage. The Shared Ownership Mortgage is aimed at people on low incomes who could not afford to buy a house with an ordinary mortgage. As you are on the housing list you would be eligible for this. Once you have been approved in principal for shared ownership by the Local Authority you may select a new or existing house which the Local Authority purchases. You then arrange with the Local Authority to purchase a minimum of 40% share in the property (or more if you can afford it) and rent the remaining 60% share from the Local Authority. You must be able to meet the repayments on the mortgage over 25 years and pay rent to the Local Authority for the remaining share. Transactions under the Shared Ownership Scheme are exempt from stamp duty. You should discuss with your Local Authority your particular financial situation, the costs to you of the Shared Ownership Scheme and how you might avail of it.



PLANNING ALLIANCE

On February 17th, Kildare County Councillors finally concluded their debate on the new County Development Plan. After the necessary wording changes have been completed, this will go on public display. To guide their deliberations. councillors had before them a Draft Plan prepared by their own Planning Department. This incorporated the results of an independent consultant's report on strategic approaches towards accommodating the anticipated growth in population of the county of 13-20,000 people over the next ten years. This was an excellent and comprehensive document which urged relieving some of the growth pressures on the north eastern towns of Maynooth, Celbridge and Leixlip by redirecting growth to those parts of the county where development is more urgently needed. This Report embodied the characteristics requested by the Minister for the Environment when he froze the passage of further plans by the councillors last autumn.

Unfortunately, councillors opted to reject the key elements of the Draft Plan which advocated specific restrictions on further residential rezonings in Maynooth and Celbridge. Section 2.5 contained the following:

Neutered

"The substantial rezoning of lands in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement of the aims of this policy."

In removing this clause, the strategic aspect of the plan was effectively neutered. Councillors have now opted to develop the north east, south, west and north west of the county as well as the centre! In such circumstances developers are able to target those areas which they want, not what may be best for the area concerned. Property developers will undoubtedly be pleased if this plan results in further excessive residential rezonings in the

north-eastern towns of Maynooth, Kilcock, Clane, Leixlip and Celbridge. By no stretch of the imagination can councillors therefore be seen to be following the kind of strategic approach requested by the Minister and it remains to be seen how he will react when the Proposed County Development Plan is presented to him. Essentially, Maynooth may be back where it started last spring - at the mercy of councillors who want to almost treble its population over the next five years.

Further Developments

The Population of County Kildare is 134,000. Lands already zoned residential will provide for a further 80-90,000 people, enough for the projected increase in population of the county for the next half century. One

cannot help wondering why our local politicians want to provide for excessive amounts of further residential developments. As the election approaches you might wish to ask them some basic questions. Why for example do they want to provide lands to facilitate the doubling of Maynooth's present population? Why do they want to double the number of cars in Maynooth? Why do they want to double the number of school children in schools already at bursting point? Why do they want to double the amount of vehicular pollutants in the air throughout Maynooth? Why do they want to rezone large areas of passive amenity and open space around the town? Why do they want to rezone the environs of the historic Carton Avenue? Why do they want to plan for an extra 12,000 people in Maynooth alone when the anticipated increase in population for the entire county is projected to be 11,400 over the next five years? Are your local politicians carrying out your agenda? Maynooth Planning Alliance think not.

Canvassers

These are the questions which you must ask of the canvassers calling to your door over the next few months. Of course local TDs will say they have no control over their party's councillors. If you believe this, are such TDs really the sort of people you should cast your vote for? Elsewhere in this Newsletter you will no doubt see the usual promises of a footpath here, a street light there. But these are mere sops. What is really happening is a concerted attempt to change irrevocably the face of Maynooth, and also North Kildare by some of your local politicians. Do not be fooled by their blandishments.

Maynooth Planning Alliance has continued its attempts to highlight the problems alluded to above by participating in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning. As part of this larger grouping considerable success has been achieved over the past few months.

The Clane Development Plan has been declared illegal in the High court. The Kill Plan is currently also undergoing judicial review on the same grounds. The Leixlip Plan is subject to appeal to An Bord Pleanála on the grounds that it too was passed illegally by Kildare County Councillors. The Blessington Plan has been sent to the High Court also following advice given to our colleagues there.


A flood of contacts from elsewhere in the country shows that the problems of North Kildare are not unique. Last month they were presented by the Alliance to the National Economic and Social Council in a special briefing at Dublin Castle. But ultimately it is your unshaking support which is essential and which has provided the impetus for those working to secure a better Maynooth. People power is on the move throughout Ireland and Maynooth Planning Alliance will continue its efforts to articulate the wishes of the overwhelming majority of residents of Maynooth wherever the opportunity arises.

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CELBRIDGE CAMERA CLUB

Mark Wins Gold in Europe

Goirle: Holland: Date: 15 February, 1997 Mark Sedgwick, Chairman of Celbridge Camera Club, winner of a number of gold, silver and bronze medals at national level and holder of AIPF and AFIAP distinctions became the FIRST Irish photographer ever to win an FIAP Gold Medal. FIAP The Federation Internationale d'Art Photographique is the world amateur photography representative body which promotes the art of photography.

The Irish Photographic Federation (IPF) were requested through FIAP to provide a photographer of high international calibre to compete in an EU sponsored Photographic Competition/Exhibition organised by Foto Amateur Klub Lumen in a town called Goirle in Holland. One photographer only represented each of the 16 European Union Countries. The IPF selected Mark to represent Ireland on the basis of the standard of his work and that of Celbridge Camera Club over the past year. The format for the European Union Photographic Exhibition required competitors to submit 6 images in either colour print or monochrome. Gold, silver and bronze medals being awarded for the best individual image of the competition. Renowned international judges voted one of Mark's images to be the best individual image of the Salon. They also voted Mark's Panel of 6 images to be the panel winner.

Mark beat a field of highly accomplished international photographers with his image titled "Blue Boy". Visitors to Celbridge Camera Club's Annual Exhibition will have seen this image and the same image has won gold for Mark in the IPF National League Club Finals held last May.

Sean Casey FIPF, AFIAP - President of the Irish Photographic Federation - informed Mark of the news over the weekend, and said that Mark and Celbridge Camera Club has put Ireland on the international photographic map for years to come. It is a superb achievement for Ireland & Celbridge.

Mark will travel to Holland in April to attend the prizegiving ceremony and to collect his Gold Medal.

National Print and Slide Individual Finals

At national level the Irish Photographic Federation Print and Slide Finals were held in Dublin at the end of January. Over 250 photographers from all over the country participated and Celbridge again took medals. Many of the winning prints and those selected in the top 10 in the country will go on to represent Ireland in international competitions over the coming year.

Final Touches



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INTEL MMX PENTIUMS

Just after Christmas this year Intel introduced a new version of its Pentium range of CPUs (Central processing unit) chips called MMX.

To understand what MMX means we need to delve a little into what a CPU is. Basically a CPU is like a computer programme permanently written into the silicon of which it's made. It comprises mostly of millions of instructions which other parts of a computer and software programmes can call on to get things done. A Pentium also has a small amount of memory (16kb) which is used as a temporary storage area while other things are happening.

With the MMX version of the Pentium Intel have enhancements

- Firstly there are 57 new instructions, which are designed to speed up operations involving video, sound and graphics.
- · Secondly the temporary storage memory (cache) has been doubled to 32KB.
- The third enhancement involves a process called "branch prediction". In simple terms this allows the chip to "guess" more efficiently about what it will have to do next.

That's what they have done! So what does it all mean to you?

To gauge the impact we need to look at 2 situations.

- The first situation involves using existing software that you might already own. The additional memory and enhanced branch production technology is immediately going to make the operation of the chip about 10% - 15% faster than an equivalent standard Pentium.
- The real difference will come with software which is specially written to take advantage of the MMX additions. There are a number of software packages already available and more promised in the near future. Differences in speed with these software packages could be up to 40% over standard Pentiums.

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Some of the software titles already available are:

- The ultimate human body V2.0
- · Space station simulator
- POD
- · Timetables of technology
- Photo Delux
- Visual Home

Can I upgrade?

If you own a Pentium 75, 90, or 100 then you can add a Pentium MMX overdrive. If your PC is faster (and more recent), then you can probably change the CPU for a P166

In the long-term we can expect Intel to stop producing non-MMX Pentiums but I would expect standard Pentiums to be available until at least the end of this year.

All MMX Pentiums are extremely scarce at this moment and vou should expect some delay when ordering. As yet, the MMX overdrive chips are not available in this country.

A final note on P200 MMX chips. These chips have some very special requirements. They require a special motherboard and additional cooling fans. It is extremely unlikely that any Pentium systems currently on the market can be upgraded to a 200 MMX without significant changes to the PC.



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REVIEW CULLED FROM THE NEWSLETTER OF APRIL 1987

Discussions on Straffan Road Plans

The following is an edited version of a report of the meeting between Proinnsias Breathnach, Chairman, Maynooth Community Council and Gerry O'Brien, Kildare Council Engineer, held on Monday 23 February.

Improvements await by-pass sanction

Mr. O'Brien stated that the Straffan Road Improvement Plan would not receive a high priority among the County Council engineering staff until the Minister for the Environment sanctioned the building of the Maynooth By-Pass later this year.

At that stage consultant engineers will be engaged to draw up the detailed plan for the Straffan Road, which will show a high level of detail, on large scale maps, showing exactly (in feet) how much land will be taken up by road-widening, and where.

Most traffic generated in Maynooth

A traffic survey was carried out in Maynooth in August 1986 (at the height of the harvest season). This showed that, at the corner of the Square, between Larine House and the Manor Court apartments, a total of 8,650 vehicles per day passed through in either direction. At Ryan and Tyrrell's garage, the flow was 6,000 vehicles, while on the Celbridge Road (just beyond the junction with the Straffan Road), the flow was 2,000 vehicles. This means that a daily flow of 650 vehicles was generated by Rail Park and Old Greenfield (the difference between the flow at the Square and that at the latter two points).

Further out, at Noone's garage (beyond Carton Court), the recorded flow was 1,900 vehicles per day. This means that Greenfield Estate (including the Greenfield Shopping Centre,) Carton Court and Kingsbry generated a traffic flow of 4,100 vehicles(the difference between Ryan and Tyrrell's and Noone's garages). In other words, the housing estates along the Straffan Road generate over half the traffic flow on the Straffan Road as measured at the Square, and two thirds of the flow as measured at Ryan & Tyrrell's

Only 340 vehicles per day go between the Straffan Road and the Dunboyne Road (170 in each direction). Of this, 23% consists of heavy traffic (i.e. 40 vehicles in either direction).

It is estimated that there will be a flow of 2,500 vehicles per day getting on and off the by-pass at the Straffan Road interchange. Of this it is projected that 1,600 (two thirds) will be generated by the housing estates on the Straffan Road alone. In other words, the interchange will mainly serve these estates, and will be of great convenience to them, according to Mr. O'Brien.

Local Relief Roads

As regards traffic coming from the Newtown area, Mr. O'Brien confirmed the intention of closing off the end of Greenfield Lane to prevent this route being used. The bypass is expected to be opened before 1992. By then, land beyond Kingsbry is expected to be developed, and the relief road linking Newtown and the Straffan Road to be completed. He did not envisage the other relief road, linking the interchange with Blacklion, being developed for some considerable time. On the basis of his opinion that traffic from the Dunboyne direction is not a problem now, nor is it likely to be, he did not see the latter relief road as a priority.

The part of the Harbour Field to be taken for road widening is overgrown and unused at the moment, stated Mr. O'Brien. However, it was pointed out to him that the Community Council has plans for developing and landscaping the field. The handball alley would be moved back, and would be left in a better condition than it is now, according to Mr. O'Brien.

It was difficult to know what would be done with the bridge, thought Mr. O'Brien, but he said that everything would be done to preserve its present character. There is a particular problem due to the fact that the access road to the station is located in the middle of the bridge. Proinnsias Breathnach suggested that pedestrian lights should be installed at this point. This would slow down traffic on the main road, would give station traffic a chance to get out, would give Rail Park residents a chance to cross the road, and would give pedestrians coming from Old Greenfield area a chance to cross the road also.

Mr. O'Brien said that he would consider the idea of using a "Yield" sign to allow traffic to filter left from the Celbridge Road to the Straffan Road.

In conclusion Mr. O'Brien insisted that no proposals would be steam-rolled through without prior local consultation.

GARDA TALK

Road Awareness:

- (1) It has come to the notice of the Gardai at Maynooth that a number of drivers are engaging in inconsiderate road behaviour about the town. Many pedestrians are as concerned as we are for their own safety, and especially the safety of our next generation, i.e. young children. As you are all well aware there are numerous lanes and sideroads off Maynooth Main Street and many drivers avail of these. The problems arise when some drivers are exiting
- these side-lanes. One must remember that before reaching the roadway, one has to drive across a rather wide footpath, and should stop to check for pedestrians before doing same. Also the Gardai would like to again appeal to motorists to avail of the off street parking provided and abide by the yellow lines as this will greatly lubricate traffic movement.
- (2) Another issue the Gardai at Maynooth would like to draw to the attention of parents and indeed users, is the popularity of roller-blades. Some youths, and especially those using the blades

are totally oblivious to danger, while using same. There have been many reports of youths holding on to taxis, mini-buses and lorries, to obtain a pull along. This practice is extremely dangerous and can lead to the most serious of injuries. Also groups of youths roller-blading together on footpaths can be quite an ordeal for elderly pedestrians as they whizz by. We would kindly ask parents to urge their children to exercise the greatest of care when roller-blading, and if possible to exercise same practice away from traffic and pedestrian and under supervision.

HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

- (1) Ease a sticking drawer by rubbing it with candle wax.

- (6) When washing a dyed fabric use a mild detergent. Strong detergents tend to dull colour.



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
"P.A.W.S." FOR THOUGHT.

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FOR APPOINTMENT

MEETING HELD TO INFORM PEOPLE ABOUT POTENTIAL LANDFILL SITE **CLOSE TO MAYNOOTH**

The possibility of an application to Meath County Council for permission to develop a recycling facility and landfill site close to Maynooth was outlined at a public meeting held at the Glenroval Hotel.

The meeting was told that the 250 acre site which is north of Maynooth and close to the Moyglare area, could include 100 acres for recycling of waste and 30 acres could be used for landfill.

The North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group who are opposed to such a development were formed following a public meeting held in February and have three sub-committees dealing with technical issues, publicity and

In any proposal of this nature the issues that concern people include the following:

- Proximity of the water table.
- Fear of leachate reaching the water table.
- Presence of a large number of vermin.
- Increase in the number of sea birds.
- Fire hazard due to spontaneous combustion.
- Spillage of rubbish on approach roads.
- Noise pollution.
- Air pollution and smell.
- Increased traffic.
- Impact on value of property in the area.
- Visual amenity.

In the case of any such development close to Maynooth additional concerns expressed include:

- Danger to stud farms and the bloodstock industry.
- Possibility of a significant increase in heavy traffic approaching from the M4 Motorway and travelling through the town and the Moyglare area.
- Impact on the tourism potential of the historically important university town.

The issue of waste disposal is a very contentious one particularly in counties close to the Dublin region. In Kildare the landfill site proposal for Kill is still being challenged in the courts seven years later. The Kill site which is owned by the combined Dublin councils is 120 acres. The anticipated traffic flow to it is a lorry every three minutes.

An application for a recycling and landfill development is in the first instance made to the local County Council.

- The proposal is considered by the county Manager.

- Depending on the decision taken an appeal can be made to An Bord Pleanala.
- Any further action can be taken in the Irish Courts.
- The development would require a licence for the Environmental Protection Agency, which can be appealed.

Politicians for both Meath and Kildare who spoke at the meeting in the Glenroyal Hotel pointed out that neither Councillors or T.D.s have any power in deciding this matter. The only power Councillors have is to instruct the county manager under a section 3, which advises him that he should not give permission.

Comments from the public included concern regarding the monitoring of this type of development, particularly in the longterm. Politicians came in for some criticism as the lack of a national waste disposal policy means that the issue of waste disposal will continue to be a contentious one.

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

Tyler plays an adolescent New Yorker on the verge of womanhood during a 'vacation' in Italy (where else?). However she just doesn't manage to convince as a young girl who's about to experience love for the first time and the rest of the cast look as though they'd rather be somewhere else while she's doing it.

All of these characters are extremely shallow and what should have been a reasonable story has been sacrificed at the temple of lush aimless mushy tripe.

Verdict: For 'serious film' buffs and insomniacs only.

The Hunchback of Notre Dame (U)

This one will appeal to children of all ages between five and eighty five. It is Disney at his absolute best, certainly since The Little Mermaid. The classic story of Quasimodo and Esmerelda, written by Victor Hugo, is one of **unrequited** love and this animated version has all the usual brilliant Disney touches while still sticking reasonably well to the original tale. The soundtrack is as ever superb and the animation and photography is simply terrific. Need I say more?

Verdict: Brilliant!

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PROFILE OF DOMINIC NYLAND

Dominic Nyland - Treasurer of Maynooth Community Council

Question: What is your star sign? My star sign is Leo.

Question: What other interest or involvements have you apart from the Community Council?

In my spare time, which at the moment is very limited, I enjoy playing golf and badminton and am a member of Edenderry Golf Club, Maynooth Golf Society and Maynooth Badminton Club. I also happen to be involved on the committees of the last two, as well as being on the committee of Laraghbryan Cemetery Development Association. I also enjoy pub quizzes and the cinema.

Question: How long have you lived in Maynooth?

I have lived in Maynooth since 1970, when the family moved from Dungarvan Co. Waterford.

Question: When did you get involved with the Maynooth Community Council?

On St.Patrick's Day 1987, I was approached by the then Chairperson Proinnsias Breathnach to see if I was interested in joining the Council. I thought no more about it until one night in April 1987, he called to the house. It took some persuasion on his part to convince me and I have been there since.

Question: How do you see your role as Treasurer? What does your position entail?

As Treasurer of the Community Council, I see my role as being responsible for the proper handling of the finances but not for the actual raising of funds. Once a year to prepare a statement for audit and ensuring that these are available for the Annual General Meeting.

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My position entails overseeing the number of Bank accounts that the Council has and making sure that they work to our best advantage. I also have to make sure that there are of course, proper bills and receipts left verifying all of our transactions. Also, I have to report at our meetings of our financial situation and keep the members informed of any changes good or bad that may be happening financially.

As regards fundraising, I do not see my role as Treasurer as being responsible for fund raising. I see my role as identifying the need for funds thus giving the committee maximum notice of any necessity for extra funds. I would be responsible for all the monies collected to see that they are properly lodged and spent only as authorised.

Question: Are you a member of a political party and do you have any political ambitions beyond the Community Council?

The answer to this is very simple, no.

I am not a member of any political party contrary to what some people may believe and I do not harbour any ambitions beyond those of the Community Council.

Question: What in your opinion is the role of the Maynooth Community Council?

I see the role of the Community Council as being the official voice of the Maynooth area, with its aims being:

- (1) promote the well being of the community
- (2) to secure facilities which are considered lacking
- (3) to provide or help to provide employment
- (4) to assist local associations in dealing with the statutory bodies.

Question: Do you find your involvement in the Community Council rewarding and if so in what way?

Yes, I do find it rewarding. I joined in 1987 and since then I have met some very interesting people and have become friends with some of them. I have seen changes in Maynooth since 1987 that the Community Council have been instrumental in achieving, and that in itself makes it somewhat rewarding. I enjoy the sense of being aware of what is going on and the different attitudes that people and groups have towards certain topics and ideas.

Question: What are your hopes for Maynooth in the future?

I would love to see the Harbour field developed as an amenity area for the people of Maynooth, also to see once and for all the Geraldine Hall ownership problem resolved. I am delighted to see work on Laraghbryan Cemetery having started and would urge the people of Maynooth that now that a new committee has been set up, to help them in any way possible to maintain and make Laraghbryan Cemetery a place that we can be proud of.

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
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TO PARK OR NOT TO PARK? THE BYE-LAWS IN MAYNOOTH.

The issue of Maynooth's Traffic Bye-Laws is proving as confusing as driving on Main Street at rush hour; few people seem to be indicating where they're going, and nothing is moving quickly enough. The intention of the law is simple enough; i.e. to free up Main Street and the surrounding areas to provide Maynooth with its own Operation Freeflow and one would imagine that motorists would largely be in favour of this. But then, who are the motorists who have been double parking, parking on the few double yellow lines we have, and parking two abreast or on the pavements, thereby making life extremely difficult for the elderly or those with prams or buggies? Are we to believe that once the byelaws have been passed, that these people will begin behaving responsibly and parking only where they are allowed to, or will it be necessary for the Gardaí to patrol the streets issuing parking tickets?

A "discretionary" approach by the Gardaí is one favoured by Declan Foley, outgoing President of Maynooth Chamber of Commerce. Speaking to the Newsletter at his office, Mr. Foley described the present state of the Main Street as "ridiculous", with badly parked cars "hindering normal trading facilities to the public". It appears then that every one is agreed that something has to be done, the problem lies in deciding exactly what laws are brought in, and how enforceable they will be. The Chamber of Commerce has mentioned a policy of short term parking (up to half an hour) but schemes like this would presumably have to be





accompanied by either parking meters or a system of disc parking.

There is also the problem of vans and trucks needing to load and unload, an occupation traditionally done on the pavement, on side roads and double parked on Main Street. The provision of loading bays would be the ideal answer here, but where the space for these bays is to be found is another matter, a solution for which is unlikely to be easily found.

The shops and businesses in Main Street have an obvious need for these deliveries, and the Newsagent in particular relies upon people being able to drop in just for one or two items, a shopping trip is easily dispensed with if it involves having to park 500 metres away.

Whoever enacts the finalised bye-laws has to take all these things into consideration, to make life in Maynooth no less profitable for the businesses here, but a little less stressful for the rest of us.


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

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

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DRINK AND BE MERRY

From a nation that has always been proud to exclaim "A pint of plain is your only man!", it may come as a bit of a surprise to learn that the most popular evening class in Dublin at the moment is....wine tasting. True, it's still alcohol, but the words thick, black and creamy just don't suffice when it comes to describing your favourite Beaujolais or Cabernet Sauvignon.

Wine has always been expensive in Ireland, criminally expensive most would say, and so perhaps it is a sign of our growing economic prosperity that more and more people are uncorking les bouiteilles du vin rather than cracking open cans of beer or stout. Also, we are growing culturally less insular, the exotic now arouses more curiosity than suspicion, and asking for something Bulgarian or Chilean in your local shop is not now so likely to be reported to the parish priest, or the Gardaí.

Our pronunciation of foreign names is also improving, a Cabernet is no longer to be confused with a piece of furniture containing 'shelves, cupboards or drawers for storage or display' (Collins Concise Dictionary), and our sadly mono-lingual tongues can now wrap themselves around names slightly more European than 'Blue Nun' or our old friend from the Rhineland - 'Black Tower'.

Maynooth of course, has always been famed for its cosmopolitan demeanour; cultured, yet witty conversation drifting out from the hostelries on our leafy-lined Boulevard du Main Street. So it comes as no surprise that our pleasant town recently played host to its first Wine Appreciation Course, run by Berna Hatton of the Mill Wine Cellar.

There are few businesses in Maynooth so suitably housed as this off-licence, with the (wait for it) charming old-worldliness of the exterior brickwork, and the simple elegance of the bright wooden floor. (I'm practising for my wine tasting writing you see, where adjectives are everything). But seriously, The Mill Wine Cellar is all that an off-licence should be; it presents itself as a purveyor of all the alcohols that the world has to offer, rather than the old style 'offy' where people would be ashamed to be seen lest they were thought an alcoholic.

Wine-Tasting

The Wine Tasting Course consisted of 5 classes, and was held on Monday nights. Unfortunately, editorial duties at the Newsletter kept this writer from attending, but Berna assures me that the course was an outstanding success.

Fifteen people attended the classes held in The Orange Tree Restaurant, some with a little experience with wine, others who were just (can you guess?) thirsty for knowledge. The first class was largely an introduction to wine and wine making from the grape to the bottle, including some tasting and a guide on how to taste a wine. (Tasting is a more complex procedure than merely lowering copious amounts of liquid down your throat, and the lesson seems to be: the more you concentrate in tasting (and smelling), the more pleasure will be had from the wine. The evening roundedoff

with some of the Orange Tree's finest finger food, with our soon-to-be-connoisseurs seated at their own section of the restaurant, a most pleasant location for such enjoyable pursuits.

An average of 3 or 4 glasses were drunk each night, with the participants tasting between 6 and 12 different wines. One class concentrated solely on New Zealand, a country constantly gaining in popularity as a producer of fine wines, another looked at the problem of finding enjoyable wines for £5 a bottle. (That would have been the class for me). The final class was given by a man soon to be conferred with the elusive title - Master of Wine, and dealt, not surprisingly, with 'the classics' - French wine.

If your taste buds are drooling at the thought of it all, the bad news is that Berna thinks there won't be another course until next September. But for the slightly less committed, she hopes to begin one-evening-talks either this month or next. The queue starts right behind me.


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BEEF WITH PEPPERS & MUSHROOMS

Serves 4 Preparation time: 8 mins Cooking time: 15 mins

1 tbsp vegetable oil 1¹/₂ lb/675g braising steak, trimmed and cut into strips 1 small red pepper 1 small green pepper 1 small yellow pepper 4 shallots, peeled and quartered

1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed

1 celery stick, washed and sliced 2tbsp creamed horseradish sauce

2tbsp light soy sauce 2tbsp Worcestershire sauce

4 open-cap mushrooms, peeled and quartered

1. Heat the vegetable oil in a large pan and fry the beef strips for 5 mins, stirring, until browned and sealed.

2. Meanwhile, using a sharp knife, halve and deseed the red, green and yellow peppers. Cut each pepper into thin strips and add to the pan, along with the shallots, crushed garlic and celery slices.

3. Add the horseradish sauce, soy sauce and Worcestershire sauce to the pan, and stir until well blended. Cook, uncovered, for 5 mins.

4. Add the mushroom quarters to the pan and stir well. Cook over a medium heat for a further 5 mins, or until meat is tender. Serve.

ONE DISH SUPPER MINCED BEEF WITH BACON AND POTATO TOPPING

Serves: 4

Preparation time: 20 mins Cooking time: 30 mins

1lb/450g minced beef 1 onion, chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 1 carrot, diced 1/2 pt/300 ml beef stock 1 tbsp./15ml tomato purée salt and pepper 4oz/125g sweetcorn few drops of Tabasco sauce 1¹/₂2lb/700g potatoes, grated 12 rashers streaky bacon deep ovenproof dish

In a nonstick pan, brown the mince all over in its own juice. Once brown, add the onion, garlic and carrot and fry until the vegetables are tender. Stir in the beef stock and tomato purée and season well. Add the sweetcorn and Tabasco, bring to the boil and simmer for 15-20 mins. Grate the potatoes either by hand or in a food processor. Pour the cooked mince into the dish, place the potatoes over the top and place the bacon rashers evenly over the potato. Place under a pre-heated low temperature grill and cook for about 10-15 mins until the bacon is brown. Serve hot with seasonal vegetables.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE

Makes 10 Slices

50g/2oz cocoa powder 175g/6oz unsalted butter 275g/10oz caster sugar 3 eggs, size 3, beaten 250g/9oz plain flour 11/stsp bicarbonate of soda ¹/₂tsp baking powder ICING 75g/3oz unsalted butter 4 tbsp milk 350g/12oz icing sugar 2tbsp cocoa powder FILLING 75g/3oz unsalted butter 175g/6oz icing sugar, sifted.

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4. Grease 2 (20cm/8in) round sponge tins (at least 4cm/1/2 in. deep) and base-line with greaseproof paper. Blend the cocoa with 240ml/8fl oz boiling water. Soften butter and place in a bowl with sugar and 4 tbsp of cocoa mixture; beat until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs and remaining cocoa mixture. Sift the flour, bicarbonate of soda and baking powder and gently fold in. Divide the mixture between the cake tins. Bake for 25 mins until risen and firm to the touch. Leave in the tins for 5 mins then turn out on to a wire rack to cool completely. Meanwhile, for the icing, place butter and milk in a small pan and heat gently until melted. Sift in icing sugar and cocoa and beat until smooth. Reserve 4 tbsp of the icing and chill the rest until thickened, stirring occasionally.

For the filling, beat the butter and icing sugar until smooth then beat in the reserved chocolate icing. Chill until firm. To assemble the cake, remove lining paper and sandwich the sponges with the chocolate buttercream filling and spread the icing over the top and sides with a palette knife.

Hobbies and Interests GARDENING FINTS

The sun is shining; the birds are singing; the evenings are getting longer and there's loads to do in the garden.

General Tasks

- · Containers and pots for use next month should be cleaned and hanging baskets scrubbed out. Clean terracotta and glazed pots (to avoid any risk of disease on pots spreading to new, young plants) using water and a stiff brush.
- · Dead shrubs, killed by hard frosts should be dug up and replaced - but make sure they're really dead first! Using your thumbnail or a knife, scrape away a tiny patch of bark near the base: if it's green underneath, the plant is still alive and there's a good chance that it will regrow in the near future.
- · Seeds should be stored carefully after opening (if kept in good condition, they will last for years). Seeds can be stored in sealed containers in the refrigerator (but not the freezer).
- Slugs and snails are pests at this time of the year, so continue to protect plants. If you can, use an environmentally-and-bird-friently slug-killer, or use egg shells or beer — the snails love a drop! Another way to catch them is to leave a few planks on the ground which encourages them to gather underneath. The next morning the planks can be turned over and the birds can feast for breakfast!
- •Lime-hating shrubs like rhododendrons and skimmias that are growing on neutral or limey soils commonly suffer from magnesium deficiency, which shows as yellow patches between green veins on the leaves. Water with a soluble fertilizer or make a more permanent change to the soil's acidity level by adding sulphur chips.
- Silver-leaved shrubs like the curry plant (Helichrysum serotinum), lavender and cotton lavender (Santolina) should be pruned now. Cut straggly plants back to around 15 cm (6 in), otherwise just trim the bush lightly. Cutting plants hard back into old wood can be risky, so do it only if you've alreade rooted some cuttings last summer as insurance.

ORNAMENTAL GARDEN

Annuals and Biennials

Hardy annuals can still be sown outside. Plant out those you've raised under cover in a coldframe. Try to choose a few varieties that attract bees and butterflies, like alyssum, anchusa, candytuft, cornflower, godetia, larkspur and scabious. Bees are enormously useful in the garden, and butterflies are just as pretty as the flowers.

Bulbs and Tubers

Dead-head larger bulbs like daffodils as soon as they finish flowering, so that they can put all their energy into building up their reserves for next year. Resist the temptation to get rid of the untidy foliage as it too is very important for next year's growth! Leave flower heads on small bulbs like snowdrops and scillas so that they can self-seed. During dry weather, water bulbs that have already flowered and feed with a tomato or rose fertilizer.

Tender bulbs, including gladioli, can now be planted out. They like a sunny sheltered site and well-drained soil. On heavy ground dig in coarse grit and put the bulbs on a layer of sand or grit so that they don't sit in water and rot. Gladioli can be grown in rows for cutting, in tubs, or planted in small groups in the border 10 cm (4 in) apart and deep. Other tender bulbs worth growing include the 'Peacock Ochid' (Acidanthera Murielae) which bears fragrant, white, purple-centred flowers in late summer, and Nerine Bowdenii which produces stems of large pink flowers from mid to late autumn.

LAWN

Renovate an existing lawn at any time until autumn, though spring is best. To repair crumbled lawn edges, cut a square of turf to include the damaged part and turn it round 180 degrees so that the hole is in the body of the lawn. Top it with soil and sow with grass seed. Clumps of coarse grass stand out like a sore thumb in an otherwise fine lawn. The best way to remove them is to simply criss-cross the clumps with an old kitchen knife and pull the grass out. Regular mowing is the best way to discourage coarse grasses. Moss can be killed with chemicals, but this really treats only the symptom rather than the cause, which is poor drainage. Improve drainage by aerating and by raking out the layer of dead grass or 'thatch' that builds up at ground level and hinders drainage. Continue weeding lawns and feed if you didn't last month. Trim the edges with a half-moon edging tool or a sharp spade to leave a clean edge for easy clipping with shears or a strimmer in future.

MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES FOR APRIL 1997

Maynooth Development Plan.

Following Minister Howlin's intervention Kildare County Council engaged consultants, at considerable cost to the tax payer, to draw up a strategy plan for the County.

The consultants proposals were discussed by the Councillors over a number of meetings until the final meeting on 17th February where it was due for approval. However, at this meeting Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, supported by the P.D. Councillors, voted to reject the consultants reports and to continue with their massive rezonings. They also voted to remove the following sentence "The substantial zoning of lands in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement of the aims of this (the consultants) policy. "Instead they inserted the following, "carefully chosen zoning of lands in the remaining Towns of the North-East will be addressed in these Towns having regards to this strategy."

Two weeks beforehand they voted in favour of rezoning for housing and industry either side of Carton Avenue. Is this supposed to be 'carefully chosen zoning of lands?'. This reckless behaviour will result in the ruination of our most treasured walkway and will not be tolerated by Minister Emmet Stagg and your Labour Councillors. You can be assured that we will do everything possible to stop them, however, we will need your continued support.

Dillon's Row Footpath and Public Lighting

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to have the footpath completed from the end of Dillon's Row out to the new houses and to install public lighting as a matter of urgency. This roadway is a disgrace and it is very difficult for our senior citizens in Nagle Court to get into Main Street in safety.

Non National Roads Funding

The following has been agreed for Maynooth for 1997.

- 1. Dublin Road, Maynooth £80,000 for drainage, resurfacing and footpaths from Main Street to beyond the Cattle Mart.
- 2. Convent Lane/Dunboyne Road, Maynooth £20,000 for resurfacing of road.
- 3. Maynooth Barberstown £120,000 for improvements.
- 4. Crinstown £12,000 for surface reconstruction.
- 5. Maynooth Leixlip £18,000 surface dressing along Carton Wall.

Cllr. John McGinley and the other Councillors have asked that a traffic count be carried out on the Maynooth/Barberstown road immediately. It was also agreed that an emergency motion be submitted to the full Council asking that this road be given top priority in the County. It is estimated that £3m will be needed to do a proper job. Minister Emmet Stagg has called on Kildare County Council to prevent large commercial vehicles from using this route until the road is upgraded.

Newtown Exit From Horse Shoe.

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the County Engineer to improve the sight line at this exit and to erect a " Concealed Exit " sign.

Completion of Estates.

There are presently 61 housing estates that are not completed in the County. Kildare County Council have three staff in the Development Control Section supervising this work. In most cases developers are no longer on site. As a result of a motion put forward by Labour Councillors, John McGinley and Colm Purcell, the Council will be submitting proposals to the Department of the Environment which will enable the Council to increase the staff numbers to a level whereby the Council's responsibility can be properly discharged and effective pressure can be applied on absentee developers.

Maynooth Town Improvement Works

The County Secretary has confirmed that Cllr. John McGinley's motion to underground the overhead cables along the Main Street will be acted on. The work which includes new footpaths, new public lighting and new road surface will be carried out this year.

Silken Vale

Minister Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley met with Silken Vale Residents Association to discuss outstanding matters in their Estate. Minister Stagg and Cllr. Mc.Ginley will meet with the developer to discuss these outstanding matters.

Leinster Cottages

The County Engineer has confirmed to Cllr. John McGinley that the road at house nos. 10 - 18 will be resurfaced this year.

Back Lane, Greenfields

The County Engineer has confirmed that drainage and resurfacing will take place this year.

Maynooth Allied Irish Bank

Minister Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Chief Executive of Allied Irish Banks that they will be commencing building work in the latter half of 1997 on their old premises at Main Street and that as part of this process the streetscape will be restored. We are very pleased with this outcome which will remove the eyesore of existing single storey premises.

Proposed Dump of Moyglare

Minister Stagg has pledged the full support of the Labour Party in opposing the proposed environmental Protection Group which will campaign against the proposed super dump at Moyglare.

Minister Stagg has pledged the full support of the Labour Party in opposing the proposed environmental catastrophe which would have a disastrous effect on Maynooth and North Kildare.

Carton Court

At the request of the residents Association in Carton Court, Minister Emmet Stagg contacted the E.S.B concerning public lights which were out of order in the Estate.

Minister Stagg has also asked Kildare County Council to include Carton Court in their 1997 Public Lighting Replacement Programme. He has requested that the old mercury lights be replaced with sodium vapour lights and that arms be added to public lighting standards to give a better spread of light and to prevent shading of the lights by trees.

Footpath - Kilcock Road

In response to concerns of locals, Minister Emmet Stagg has requested Kildare County Council to carry out drainage and resurfacing on the footpath along Kilcock Road.

Maynooth Gaelscoil

Minister Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by the Department of Education to grant recognition to Scoil Uí Fhiaich.

The recognition will apply from the 7th of April and will enable the payment of Capitation Grants, funding towards the cost of rent for the existing premises and payment of the teachers salary.

Minister Stagg pledged his support for Scoil Uí Fhiaich and Scoil Uí Riada in Kilcock and he hopes that both schools will now work together in fostering the promotion of the Irish Language in North Kildare.

Despite the enforced absence of Martin Storey the victorious captain of All Ireland Champions Wexford due to the inclement weather conditions, Wednesday 19/ 2/97 was a very important night for the hurlers and camogie players. 1996 proved to be quite a successful year for the under age teams and their endeavours were honoured with presentation of medals to the U/14 hurlers U/15 hurlers and the minor camogie team in the GAA clubhouse. The U/14 hurlers represented Kildare in the final of the National Feile competitions last June in Waterford and did their county and club proud by reaching the semi-final stage in their group. NATIONAL TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION '97

PILOT PROJECT LAUNCHED IN MAYNOOTH

A new approach to the National Tidy Towns Competition has been adopted by the Department for the Environment this year. Back in February, members of the Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee met with the Department of the Environment and the National sponsors of the competition to discuss the benefits of holding a special tidy towns awareness night on a pilot basis in Co. Kildare in 1997.

Speaking at this event held in the Glenroyal Hotel on April 15th, Mr Finian Matthews, Principal Officer, Urban and Rural Renewal Section, which includes responsibility for the Tidy Towns Competition, outlined his vision for the future of the competition.

Since the responsibility for running the Tidy Towns competition was transferred from Bord Failte to the Department for the Environment, they had been looking at a number of ideas to re-launch the competition Mr Mathews said. In the last few years new criteria for judging the entrants were introduced. These included marks for efforts to preserve the natural environment such as traditional hedgerows and flowers. His department encouraged forward planning by the local tidy town committees and to this end these groups need to submit a five year plan as part of their tidy towns entry.

Mr Matthews said that he hopes that meetings like the one happening in Maynooth would widen the appeal to the entire community of getting involved in improving our environment and increasing the support to the local tidy town committees. He said that he would be asking the committee in Maynooth to come back to the department with their views on the success of the night.

On behalf of Super Valu, the national sponsors of the competition, Mr Brian Murphy owner of Super Valu, Maynooth, reminded the large attendance at the meeting that the Tidy Towns Competition was forty years old this year. Super Valu have been national sponsors since 1992 and "we have been very pleased to be associated with the competition" Mr Murphy said.

In Maynooth, Mr Murphy promised that his team would offer practical help to the local tidy towns committee in their efforts to improve the appearance of the town. "For too long we have let a small number of people carry the burden," he said. Mr Robert O'Reilly chairman of Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, said that Maynooth did very badly in Category E, which is for towns with a population of between 5001 - 10.000 inhabitants.

He believed that the adjudicators remarks were fair last year and that the report was a valuable guideline to the committee on where the town needs to make a greater effort.

Mr O'Reilly paid tribute to the efforts of the Community
Employment Project workers under supervisor, Mr Martin
Sherry as well as to the Sunday morning street cleaning
volunteers, many of whom were at the meeting. Mr O'Reilly
praised the involvement of previous tidy town committees in
Maynooth, remarking that some who are now deceased
would not have foreseen an event such as this meeting. He
also commended the commitment of a number of PostPrimary School students.

Reviewing the 1996 result, Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee Secretary Ms. Patricia Condron pointed out that the biggest single reason for the low marks was as a result of the severe litter problem that exists in the town. The efforts of the residential areas gained us valuable points she said. The meeting agreed that the problem was that the amount of litter in the town was too much to ask one street cleaner to remove. Exchanges between local Councillors Mr Senan Griffin and Mr John McGinley and members of the audience regarding the availability of the street cleaning truck and the condition of the footpaths in the town, resulted in some lively discussion on the issues. Mr John Gillick, a resident of Rockfield, Maynooth's tidiest estate winner in 1996, and a member of the Sunday morning clean up volunteering crew, suggested to the Councillors that it would not cost much to give us the truck at least once a month. "Lets spend some of the money we are all getting from this boom," he said.

Ms Maria Benndorf, Grounds Manager at St. Patrick's College, representing the President of the College, Rev. Dermot Farrell, made a presentation to the meeting about the value of window boxes and hanging baskets to the appearance of the town. Ms Benndorf also suggested to Mr Brian Murphy from Super Valu that she favoured the use of paper bags in preference to plastic bags as the former are biodegradable. She also questioned whether it is always necessary to give the customer a bag with their purchases. Speaking on behalf of Maynooth Chamber of Commerce, their newly elected President, Mrs Mary Houlihan promised the full support of the chamber to the tidy towns committee in their efforts. She looked forward to the implementation of

the new litter laws which she felt would make a difference in combatting Maynooth's chronic litter problem. Suggestions from the audience included one from Mrs Kelly, who pointed out that there are no litter bins between the Centra Foodstore and Carton Avenue.

Mr Richard Farrell, PRO Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, thanked everyone for their attendance and praised the guests for their contributions to the meeting. He said that the tidy towns committee welcome suggestions from the people in the town. He took the opportunity to canvas for more volunteers for the Sunday morning cleanup, suggesting that if there is sufficient interest, they would consider a similar effort on Saturday mornings. Mr Farrell complemented the displays from Maynooth's Royal Canal Amenity Group, and Maynooth Castle Restoration Committee, saying that both groups are playing an important role in the enhancement of these important features of the town. Mr Farrell extended his appreciation to the Management and Staff of the Glenroyal Hotel, who sponsored the event.



ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP MAYNOOTH BRANCH Cómhairle Aisinteachta An Chanáil Rioga Cumann Maigh Nuadh

The Royal Canal Group Maynooth, a voluntary organisation, are involved in restoration and development of the Royal Canal in Maynooth.

There are 19 people working on the project utilising a FAS employment and training scheme, 4 in Kilcock, 2 in Leixlip, 3 office staff in Maynooth , and others on site in Maynooth. Over the May Bank Holiday members and supporters of the Royal Canal Amenity Group (RCAG) will join in 14 separate sponsored walks connecting the Liffey to the Shannon. The walks will highlight the value of the Royal Canal.

The Royal Canal Amenity Group walk from Maynooth to Kilcock departs Dukes Harbour (Maynooth Harbour) at 3 p.m. on Sunday the 4th of May, a distance of 3.7 miles, passing by Bond Bridge near where the Joan Slade river is culverted under the canal and where there are the remains of an old wharf which serviced St. Patrick's College.

Then to Jackson's Bridge and the 14th lock. This bridge is unique in being the only one on the 90 mile system with a separate arch for the towpath. Nearby the Lyreen river is culverted under the canal on its journey to Maynooth. Then on to Baileys' Bridge, which is an accommodation bridge, Chambers Bridge and lock 15 at the Maws near the North Kildare Club.

Finally — Kilcock Harbour, opened in 1796.

The canal towpath is mostly grassy, and can be narrow in places, and may not always be suitable for young children or buggies.

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

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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

The Water Quality Management Plan for the River Liffey notes that: "In the main channel from Osberstown to Straffan weed growth is now quite marked, phosphorus levels are high and have doubled since the 1983-85 period and, furthermore, recent Dissolved Oxygen and Biochemical Oxygen Demand records indicate some cause for concern". These problems have arisen over the past decade as the rapid growth of towns such as Naas and Newbridge have added sewage and other effluents to the system more quickly than they can be treated or assimilated. Between 12 and 51 hours later this water arrives in Leixlip Reservoir, where after chlorination and other treatment, it is delivered to your taps in Maynooth. Such is the level of treatment necessary before you drink it that its palatability leaves a lot to be desired for anyone used to drinking fresh, unrecycled water.

Water Quality

During low flows on the river, the amount of dilution of effluent which occurs is much reduced. Maintaining a minimum level of water quality for drinking, fish life etc. therefore requires that sewage loadings not exceed a maximum level. At Leixlip, the sewage treatment works are currently being expanded to enable them to cater for a population equivalent of 90,000 people. This encompasses the population from the area around Maynooth, Celbridge, Kilcock and Leixlip. These four towns currently have a combined population of 40,000. Demand for waste water treatment from Intel when Fab 10 and Fab 14 are both on stream will be equivalent to a further 30,000 people, making a total of approximately 70,000 people equivalents making use of waste water facilities. This does not include several thousand college students and workers (such as in Intel and Hewlett Packard) not counted as resident in the area by the Census. It does not take a mathematical genius to add up the sums and deduce that the extra population of approximately 50,000 people (12,000 in Maynooth alone) proposed by some of our local politicians is not reconcilable with the proper management of water quality on the River Liffey and does not augur well for your own drinking water quality and quantity in the years ahead.

Water Tankers

After one of the driest winters in decades and a long drought in spring, the inability of Kildare Council to supply water to residents will become more and more apparent as the summer proceeds. Already water tankers have been used in Monasterevin and notices have appeared in the national press calling for you to conserve supplies. But while you are being called upon to exercise restraint, some of your councillors seem unaware of the meaning of the word. With enough land already rezoned in Kildare, and as yet unused, to cater for the actual increase in the population of Ireland over the past five years, some of your councillors want further rezonings to balloon the population of Maynooth from 9,000 to 21,000 for example. This means further huge abstractions of water from the river will be necessary, beyond that which can be achieved without severely damaging the ecology of the river. To satisfy their rezoning appetites therefore you will probably be asked to fund huge

schemes to bring water from distant places such as the Shannon over the next decade. Such sources will themselves need expensive treatment to make them drinkable.

Planners Ignored

Maynooth Planning Alliance says a more rational approach to national settlement planning is needed, one which recognises that the resources of this country should be developed in the interests of all the people and not ravaged to meet the needs of sectoral interest. If people come before politics, surely Maynooth people should have their wishes for the future of their town respected by those they elected. Time and time again Maynooth Planning Alliance have asked local politicians why the wishes of the people and those of the professional planners are being ignored. We have not as yet got a satisfactory answer. But you the voters now have an opportunity to give your verdict on the matter. Ask those candidates who don't want to talk about rezoning what target population they envisage for Maynooth and what record their councillors have in rezoning. Ask those who gave you the last Kildare Development Plan why they provided enough land to house the eventual increase in Ireland's population as a whole, and whether they still advocate more in the next. As a resident of Maynooth, think of the future you want for your town and its surroundings. Don't vote for the rezoners!

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PITCH AND PUTT

As proud winners of the Best Club trophy on St Patrick's Day, we fully concur with the views expressed in the April edition of the Newsletter. That is, that the parade is a demonstration by local clubs and other groups of a will to engender a sense of community in a rapidly growing town. We are proud to have developed a local amenity which provides a focal point for sport and social interaction. The University and local schools use our course, perhaps with the hope of discovering an "Irish Tiger Woods". We organise competitions which provides an opportunity for people who may not know other players and we encourage groups through special offers. Many use the course for regular meetings with friends and family. Pitch and Putt is an accessible sport offering a fun way to exercise. It is a perfect learning ground for beginners and is well recognised as the best way to sharpen the experienced golfer's "short game". St Patrick's Day marked the beginning of a new season at our 18 hole course in the centre of Maynooth. We are proud of our local club and our contribution to the local sense of community and we look forward to welcoming many of you in the 1997 season.





Bond Bridge Paranoia

Did you ever get the feeling that you were being set up as a "Scape Goat" or as a "Red-Herring"!

I write as a member of a "Woodlands Residents Association Sub Committee" which was set up to organise a Planning Appeal in relation to a proposed Housing development adjacent to Woodlands.

The basis of our objections were as follows:

- (i) Privacy; a number of the proposed two-storey houses would have overlooked the bedroom windows of Woodland's bungalows etc..The proposed house lay-out would have placed a number of the houses very close to the Woodlands boundary etc.
- (ii) The boundary fence of closeboarded construction along the Woodlands boundary we felt was not either durable or secure.
- (iii) The mix of housing proposed (mainly two-storey) is at odds with the current bungalow type construction in this area.
- (iv) Visual Amenity from the towpath of the Royal Canal and the view of the mature woodlands and fine buildings of Maynooth College would be destroyed.
- (v) Pumping Station: We were unhappy with the potential public health problem arising if this system were to fail.
- (vi) Safety/Traffic Hazard: We outlined our concerns relating to "Bond Bridge", "Parson Street" and "Main Street" regarding the increased traffic along with the inevitable increased dangers and congestion which will be brought about by this development. Also the

proposed entrance is to be sited near a blind bend on the Rathcoffey Road.

We carried out our business in an open manner keeping other parties informed who we thought might have an interest in this issue. I do believe that our objections were completely valid, even the Developer conceded that both our requirements and our behaviour were reasonable at all times. This may beg the question as to why the County Council Planning Department, who were informed of our objections before making their decision to grant permission could not have included further conditions to address our "reasonable concerns". Certainly some of our concerns were relating to Woodlands directly, but others concerning the wider environment of Maynooth are equally important to us. But why the "Paranoia" expressed in the opening sentence, well there were noises being made and coming from unexpected quarters, some discreet some not so, but persistent pressure being applied.

There were suggestions that what we were doing was in some way wrong. That in particular we would put in serious jeopardy the "Whole Bond Bridge Realignment Project". That was "Heavy Stuff" to lay on us. As parents we are very aware that the first fatality or serious injury on Bond Bridge could potentially be one of our own children. I can assure you that as a group we are completely sincere in our stance on "Bond Bridge". Even if our "Objections" were invalid, quirky or odd-bod

I still believe we should have been allowed to exercise our democratic right in making this appeal, without being subjected to undue pressure. We were only one objector out of five others who I don't believe were lobbied as much as ourselves.

I have spent some time trying to figure out why people that have the same interests at heart as our group, were opposed to what we were doing and so

far I have been unable to come up with a conclusive answer. Maybe they saw us as a group of interfering amateurs that were about to screw-up what they had achieved to date? Maybe they were afraid that we would steal their thunder in achieving something they have been unable to do so far? This is where the Paranoia creeps in because if one fears failure in a situation such as this, it may seem convenient to be able to introduce a Red Herring or to have a sacrificial Scape Goat waiting in the wings, I just don't know the answer.

Briefly what has been achieved to date is as follows:

The number of houses have been reduced from 154 to 124.

The Developer has entered into a written agreement with us in which he has agreed on the basis of our Appeal being withdrawn to:

Change the house layout to afford a greater level of privacy to the homes in Woodlands.

Increase the ratio of bungalows in the development which we hope will reduce the visual impact caused by the development.

Construct a wall along the boundary with Woodlands and to reinforce the hedgerow by planting Whitethorn and Holly.

Pay a levy of £22,000 per acre imposed by the original Grant of Permission (£22,000 x 20.6 acres = £453,200 total).

We have gained assurances from the County Council that the Special Levies collected in relation to this development will be spent on the Bond Bridge Realignment Scheme. The original Grant of Permission did not state that the £22,000 levy was for the Bond Bridge Project. This would seem to have been a departure from the norm. Usually the Bond Bridge Project would be cited as the reason for imposing the levy.

We viewed detailed drawings indicating the work to be carried out to the entrance of the site which is hoped will improve visibility and road safety.

We also were shown an engineers report on the subject of the Pumping Station which went some way towards allaying our fears about its reliability.

My purpose in writing this is not to upset or fall-out with anyone or any group of people just for the hell of it. My purpose is certainly to defend our position, but more than that I would hope our success would encourage others in their efforts to improve Maynooth's Environment. Also if those in positions of influence would be less dismissive of ordinary peoples input in relation to issues I would be pleased.

Bond Bridge should have been sorted out 20 years ago when Cluain Aoibhinn was being built. Surely this crazy policy of housing before infrastructure in Co. Kildare must be abandoned. Further Re-Zoning in this area should be curtailed until Bond Bridge is realigned.

This of course is the "Irish Year of the Promises" and it has

been reported in the past that some strange promises have been made on similar occasions in the past, and sometimes even kept. Surely we must expect even at this late stage the Bond Bridge Project will be kicked into action.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Woodlanders, Sub-Committee, Main Committee and the Residents for their number of ongoing involvement in this issue. Also I extend thanks to a number of individuals who gave us very constructive advice throughout the process. To finish on a somewhat lighter note I'm sure you know what is said of Paranoia? "Just because you're Paranoid doesn't mean they're not out to get you anyway"

Trees damaged in Moyglare Village

Residents in Moyglare Village are annoyed because of the increasing number of trees being damaged. Parents are asked to remind their children to have regard for the trees which

indeed are far too scarce in this residential area.

One of the major reasons for damage to the trees is the fact that teenagers who do not live in the estate are congregating on the open spaces in Moyglare Village to play football. These people have little regard for the cost to the residents association to replace these trees.

There is clearly a need to provide proper playing areas for teenagers, a need that will not be satisfied by only allocating extra playing areas to the clubs or schools.

Good Luck to our student residents

Now that the cherry blossoms are beginning to disappear, our student residents will be occupied with their forthcoming exams. With some rare exceptions our student population have been good neighbours. We wish them the best of luck in their exams and trust that the post exam celebrations will not damage our opinions of them.

Grass Cutting has been arranged in Moyglare Village

We have made arrangements to have the open spaces maintained for the growing season again this year. Needless to say this work affects the overall appearance of this area. This work will initially be funded by the residents in Moyglare Village. It is therefore important that we receive full support in the payment of levies from the residents there.

Completion of Moyglare Village - affecting value of houses

Residents in Moyglare Village have been told by auctioneering firms selling their houses, that they must expect less than the values being achieved elsewhere in Maynooth.

The poor quality of the boundary with the Moyglare Road and the lack of an attractive entrance, are costing residents at least £5,000 in reduced sale price compared with the newer estates in the town.

It is in everybody's interest to work to ensure that these issues are resolved without further delay, no matter what action needs to be taken.

As reported previously, the committee met with North City Builders Ltd. in March and were advised that various outstanding items would be attended to in the near future. The main estate road surface will be completed at a later date. This is dependent on the kerb and verge being completed along the southern boundary. All open areas will be attended to and tidied and planted as necessary. The construction of the southern boundary wall will commence when details of the proposed housing development in the rear gardens of Old Greenfield are known. The committee is scheduled to have a further meeting with North City Builders in May to review progress.

The committee has had discussions with the Maynooth Planning Alliance and are supporting their efforts in working towards an acceptable level of future development in the area.

The estate clean up is scheduled for later this month and notices wil lbe provided to each household. We would request that everybody make an effort to clear away litter

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The County Council require that a walkway be provided between the rear of the estate and the estates behind. The majority of residents have indicated that they are opposed to this. We will shortly be organising a petition against this for submission to the County Council.

With the longer evenings more people, especially children, are out and about on the estate. We would request that people driving in the estate reduce their speed and be more conscious of pedestrians.

With holiday time approaching please remember your Neighbourhood Watch. Even if only going away for a weekend have a neighbour keep an eye on your house. As the quantity of trees broken on the estate is highly unacceptable we would request that anybody who sees people breaking trees report them to the Gardai and committee.



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PEOPLES ANIMAL WELFARE SOCIETY

Hi there eveybody. Just a little update from the PAWS rescue centre in Downtown Sallins...

Since last month's article appeared, homes have been found for some of our canine pals that were highlighted in the last issue...

Rambo - The Rottweiller/Alsatian found a super home with Libby Sheey in Celbridge, he now has lots of lovely green grass to play on.

Cougar the Lurcher was placed with the Mulroy family in Clonee and the Storm Puppies were adopted by families as far apart as Clougherhead and Wexford.

We have been very busy of late and some of our more recent cases were very tough ones:

Gippy; A little Yorkie + was thrown over the fence of Navan Puppy Rescue and as they were really pressed for space at the centre, they passed him on to us at PAWS.

Our Vet tells us that Gippy has an untreated dislocated hip from an old injury and he is being operated on as I write. This operation is going to cost us at least £100 and we will have to obtain a foster home for him for 8 to 10 weeks to convalesce.

Another recent call out we got was to the aid of a bitch in heat in Newbridge...She had been on the run from Wednesday to Monday being chased by a pack of Male Dogs and she was close to collapse....

The residents of the area were very distressed about the situation and they had tried in vain to catch her before they called us for assistance...

With the help of a grasper, tins of dog food and brute force we were able to resolve the situation within 15 minutes. The grasper was borrowed from the local Vets and we really need one if any of your readers know where we could get/buy one.

Not one of these dogs had a collar or ID and one large black male was particularly vicious. This scenario is a typical result of uncaring owners not getting their female dogs spayed and it always results in unwanted puppies....

Which brings me to our next story.

The Shadow Puppies: These three beautiful, twelve week old, unwanted labrador puppies were skin and bone and had been locked in a shed since birth with no human contact. When anyone enters their kennel they scatter and cower in the shadows. We will be keeping them until they are resocialised.

The problem of Feral Cats in Kildare is still growing and we were recently contacted by a pensioner in Naas who had 8 wild cats that she was feeding and she had to buy 23 tins of cat food every week. She asked us to help her to re-home them. We explained that Feral Cats cannot be homed unless they are caught as six week old kittens but we have spayed and neutered them except for two feeding mothers and we will assist her with food when we can but as you can imagine this has put a dint in our already overstretched finances...

Well as you can see we have Happy Days and Sad Days but never a dull moment and if any of you would like to come and talk to me I will be doing a collection at Quinnsworth, Maynooth on 2nd and 3rd of May or phone us on 01 6243724 or 045 894041.

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
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


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TUG-O-WAR REPORT A National sport for natural folk

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





The Glenroyal bar was packed to the gills and one spectator aptly described the scene as being like Bees at a hive of honey, as everyone was enjoying the show so much.



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
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
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RYE MAYNOOTH CUB SCOUTS, 8TH KILDARE, VALLEY REGION

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
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VIDEO REVIEW

The Nutty Professor (15's)

Here we go again; yet another remake! The original of the same name was made in 1963 and, for those of you who didn't know, starred Jerry Lewis in the role of Sherman Klump, the professor of the title. This time Eddie Murphy gets to re-invent the role of professor, although exhume it would be a more appropriate description. First time round this was merely a vehicle for Lewis' overrated comedy talent, and the reprise doesn't fare much better. Briefly the plot centres on the portly prof's attempts to win the heart of a beautiful fellow teacher who he reckons won't be exactly enamoured with his rather elephantine waistline. He stumbles on a diet potion formula that turns him into the slim, svelte and witty Buddy Love, and in this guise he sets out to woo the object of his heart's desires. For a film that's supposedly a comedy the laughs are extremely thin on the ground, unless you find breaking wind funny. Americans obviously do, because the film was a huge success at the box office in the States. Just goes to show you....! Verdict: Strictly for Eddie Murphy Fans.

A Time to Kill (15's)

Written by best-selling author John Grisham, this is a story of racial tension and the fight for justice in America's deep South. When his daughter is brutally assaulted, Carl Lee (Samuel L. Jackson) takes the law into his own hands and kills her attacker in what is an act of revenge and retribution. Against all the odds and growing hostility from both the Klu Klux Klan and the Civil Rights Movement, lawyer Jack Brigance (Kevin Spacey) sets out

to save Carl from death row. This is a very good courtroom drama with fine performances from both Spacey and Jackson. Grisham's book was an extremely ponderous affair - good beginning, good ending but very repetitive in the middle - but thankfully the screenplay succeeds in trimming it down to a more acceptable level, although at almost two and a half hours it's still slightly overlong.

Still, all in all it's a very good film and well worth your time. Verdict: Slick and efficient.

Jack (PG)

Jack is no ordinary child. A rare medical condition has caused him to age at four times the normal rate. He's a child in a man's body and in school he is looked upon as a freak by his classmates. Naturally he wins out in the end to become the most popular boy in school. Why, oh why, oh why, does Robin Williams, who is extremely talented, insist on being associated with rubbish like this? He's made some near-classic films, such as 'Dead Poet's Society', 'Good Morning Vietnam' and 'The Birdcage', and anyone who has seen his stand-up comedy will know that he's a great entertainer. Then he gets involved in real turkeys like 'Nine Months' or 'Hook' and now this garbage. Not even the presence of Bill Cosby, who is himself a fine comedian, nor direction by Francis Ford Coppola could save this dead horse from the knackers vard! It worked for Tom Hanks in 'Big' because it was a reasonably funny film, but here it just annoys. At the end you're left wondering if Robin Williams has a career death-

Verdict: Trash! (how could you, Robin!).

The inaugural meeting of the Council was held on Monday 13th April. Co-Options:-Joan Howard Williams to represent AREA A and Mary Murtagh was elected to represent AREA D. Margaret Staunton was nominated for Beaufield Estate. Representatives from the Students Union may now be coopted.

Chairman's Address

The outgoing Chairman, Proinnsias Breathnach said that the new Council should not be tied by the Constitution and could change it as they wished. Meetings were held once a month with the executive deciding the Agenda. He discussed the sub-committee and their function and all members of the last council were asked to stand for one sub-committee which were reviewed each year. The committee usually meet monthly.

Sports Complex

It was agreed that the Sports Complex should be a priority for the new Council, although finance was a major problem.

Tidy Town

A secret ballot was agreed; Chairperson, Fionan Hardiman declined nomination. Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin was elected Chairperson 16/15 against Tom Purcell. Tom Purcell was re-elected (vicechairperson) unopposed. Secretary Mary Murtagh was elected unopposed. Minutes Secretary Joan Howard-Williams was elected unopposed. Treasurers Dominic Nyland and Pat Moynan were elected unopposed. P.R.O. Mary Grenell was elected unopposed. The new chairperson took over the chair.

Petrol Price Survey

The ever increasing number of cars on the roads suggests that selling petrol should be a very lucrative business.

Maynooth is now served by two very modern service stations which cater for lots of the consumers needs apart from petrol. However, when it comes to buying petrol it is not always clear that the consumer is price conscious.

Most of us will buy £10 or £20 worth without paying all that much attention as to whether we are paying a competitive price The Newsletter carried out a small survey on April 21st on petrol prices in the Maynooth area and on the road towards Dublin. What emerges is that there is quite a range in prices for unleaded petrol (8% difference between cheapest and dearest) while the price of super leaded petrol is similar across all stations in the survey. Given that more and more motorists are using unleaded this discrepancy is obviously worthy of public attention. The following table outlines the range of prices at the stations surveyed:

The conclusion is that petrol in Maynooth is comparatively expensive. A gallon of unleaded petrol in Maynooth is 21 pence dearer than Statoil in Lucan or ESSO in Palmerstown. The second table illustrates that these differences can all add up when you buy a full tank - a difference of £2.30 between the cheapest and dearest for 50 litres of unleaded petrol.

Do you suffer from migraine?

Migraine is a common ailment characterized by a severe recurring headache. The headache usually affects one side of the head only, but it can affect both sides. The pain varies greatly in severity and migraine has been described as one of the worst forms of headache in the world.

How common is migraine?

One in ten people suffer from migraine and it is three times more likely to affect women than men.

What are the symptoms?

Some people lose their appetite for food and also feel nauseous or sick. The occasional sufferer can experience trouble seeing or speaking and may feel giddy before an attack.

(What types of Migraine are there?) Their are three types of migraine: Classical, Common and Cluster.

Classical Migraine: A warning of an impending attack would be difficulty with sight, blurred vision or partial loss of sight. Sometimes a temporary inability to speak and a disturbance of touch and feeling will be experienced. These symptoms are caused by narrowing of blood vessels supplying a particular part of the brain. The headache will usually begin soon after the symptoms have appeared. Nausea and vomiting can accompany a bad attack and the sufferer may need to lie down. Diarrhoea is another side affect of this type of migraine.

Common Migraine

This type of migraine is more common, hence the name. There are no warning symptoms experienced with this form of migraine. The headache can be every bit as severe as with Classical migraine and nausea and vomiting are also likely side affects.

Cluster Migraine

This is the most unusual form of migraine it occurs in bouts that can last for two weeks to three months with headache free intervals between bouts lasting from a few months to three or four years. Only 4% of sufferers will

get this type of migraine and men are four times as likely as women to suffer form this. There will be pain behind the eye and a reddening and wateriness to the eye, also a blockage of the nostril on the affected side of the head.

What is the most likely time for a Migraine to occur?

Migraines usually occur between 5 and 10 a.m.

What Triggers a Migraine?

The main causes are: Changes in Daily routine. Sleep (too much or too little). Excitement. Noise. Light.

Certain Foods.

Stress.

Effort and Exercise.

The Weather. Smells. Hormonal Factors.

How can you help yourself?

1. Keep a Record

This will help you see if any particular activity is bringing on an attack. In the diary you should record the day, the time of the headache and also what you have been doing or eating in the last 24

Don't go Hungry

Migraine can be brought on by missing meals or eating things that

don't suit vou. Don't miss breakfast or food in the morning.

3. Watch What you Eat.

If you think a certain food or drink may bring on an attack, keep a note of when you eat it and see if the headaches come afterwards. then try to avoid that particular food for about four weeks. If your attacks stop completely or are much better, then you know to eliminate that food from your diet, if there is little or no difference, reintroduce that food to your diet and try eliminating another.

4. Avoid extremes of Temperature Extremes of heat or cold can bring on an attack, so avoid this situation occuring.

5. Pain-Killers.

Aspirin and paracetamol can be obtained without a prescription and are effective against migraine.

6. Sleep

Sleep is a necessary part of the recovery process in migraine and people who lie down in a warm comfortable environment do better than those who try to stay up and work.

The above information was taken from Migraine and Headaches, by Dr. Marcia Wilkinson.

HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

- lighting a piece of paper at the base of the chimney and see if it flares up satisfactorily.
- 2. If any paint stripper gets on your skin, wash it off at once with water (neutralise caustic soda with vinegar first).
- Awkward items can be held together with sticky tape or plasticine while setting.
- Never brush a fur to clean it just shake it out briskly after use.

- Check the draught in a chimney by 5. If you have a dry iron, damp down fabrics with a small spray of the type used for indoor plants.
 - 6. In an emergency remove fluff hairs, etc from clothing by dabbing with the sticky side of adhesive
 - 7. When buying a pillow, compress it firmly between both hands. A good one will return to its original shape.

FINE GAEL

Meadowbrook

Minister of State Bernard Durkan has written to Kildare Co. Council and the relevant developers and asked that landscaping and road surfacing be properly finished to the satisfaction of the residents of the estate. Minister Durkan pointed out that there is also an onus on Kildare County Council to ensure that all conditions imposed on the developers on foot of their planning permission be fully complied with. Minister Durkan also contacted Cllr. Senan Griffin who is actively pursuing the matter with the County Engineer. Minister Durkan stressed that the road at the entrance to Meadowbrook from Bond Bridge is in urgent need of resurfacing. He said the work is long overdue and he was confident that the efforts of himself and Cllr. Senan Griffin would pay dividends. Minister Durkan said that he had had numerous representations from residents in Meadowbrook and that he consequently stressed the urgency of the matter to the County Engineer.

Silken Vale

Minister Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have been in contact with the Developers of Silken Vale and Kildare County Council in response to representations from Silken Vale Residents Association, who are anxious that all remaining work in the estate be carried out as a matter of urgency. Minister Durkan said that he was happy to note that most of the outstanding issues have been resolved. However, he said that he would continue to monitor the situation to ensure that it is fully resolved. In particular he has requested that the trees be planted in the estate to enhance the visual amenities of the area.

Parking Bye-Laws

Minister Bernard Durkan is happy to note that the Parking Bye-Laws for

Maynooth are to go on display in the town. Minister Durkan said that it is vital that residents in the area and traders in the town have an input into any future traffic management proposals. Minister Durkan has on numerous occasions expressed his dissatisfaction with the current traffic management plan for the Main Street and welcomes the opportunity for the people of the town to have an input into its progress. He said it is totally unacceptable that traffic congestion in the Main Street appears to be worse at crucial stages of the day than it was previous to the implementation of traffic lights. He said that this problem needs to be addressed urgently and he has contacted the County Engineer outlining these concerns.

Improvements to Traffic Island

Minister Bernard Durkan is glad to note that measures to improve the traffic island opposite the Greenfield Shopping Centre on the Celbridge Road are to be undertaken. At present the traffic island is not clearly visible, particularly at night time. This is to be improved by the introduction of lighting. The island will also be highlighted with luminous paint to make it safer for pedestrians and motorists.

Motor Tax Office

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested that the Motor Tax Office in Naas be allocated additional staff to deal with the continual delays in the office. Minister Durkan has also stressed that the office should be updated, modernised and computerised in an effort to eliminate undue delays. Minister Durkan has had numerous representations from people in the Maynooth area on this matter and is actively pursuing the problem with Kildare County Council.

Additional Staff for Maynooth Garda Station

Minister Bernard Durkan has contacted the Minister for Justice, Ms. Nora Owen, T.D., and requested that a second Sergeant be appointed in Maynooth to deal with the rising population and the increasing demands on the current staff. Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested a second female Garda to liaise with the significant student population in Maynooth.

Footpaths in the Main Street

Minister Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have renewed their representations to Kildare County Council regarding the unacceptable condition of the footpaths in the Main Street. Minister Durkan stressed that the footpaths are actually quite dangerous, particularly at night time, and he has urged the county Engineer to resolve the matter promptly.

One Parent Families

Bernard Durkan, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Social Welfare this week launched an information booklet for one parent families. This booklet is designed to ensure that all one parent families are aware of and in receipt of their full entitlements and benefits. Minister Durkan said that it is extremely important that the public are kept upto-date on changes in Social Welfare rates and improvements. This booklet will do exactly that and is available directly from the Department of Social Welfare and at its numerous local offices throughout the country.

£3,000 Allocation For Footpath

Cllr. Senan Griffin is glad to note the allocation of £3,000 to install a footpath at Celbridge Road Maynooth. Minister Bernard Durkan said the footpath should go a considerable way towards alleviating difficulties for pedestrians on this road.

DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

Cable TV

Councillor Catherine Murphy has called on the Minister for Energy, Transport and Communications to exert tighter supervision on the service provided by Cable TV company Cable Management Ireland (CMI). This follows repeated complaints she has received about the quality of the service provided by the company, which has over 13,000 subscribers in County Kildare.

A public meeting convened by Catherine Murphy in Celbridge heard complaints about variability in reception quality, constantly poor reception on certain channels, and problems with receiving stereo transmissions. Those who have protested by refusing to pay their subscriptions have simply been cut off. The department of Communications has responded to complaints about the service by simply relaying excuses provided by CMI. There was a feeling that CMI, which takes in almost £1.5 million yearly in subscriptions from Kildare subscribers, is not investing sufficiently in upgrading its transmission system.

Catherine Murphy believes that, in the absence of competition in the provision of cable TV services, the Department of Communications should take a more proactive role in monitoring the performance of cable companies which operate under licence from the Department. This should also include regular inspections of the quality of service provided, and periodic surveys of subscribers' satisfaction levels.

In the meantime, Catherine Murphy believes that joint action is needed by dissatisfied CMI subscribers. Individuals and groups who have carried out local surveys should send their results to Councillor Murphy who will collate them and forward them to the Minister for action. Groups contemplating local surveys should also contact Catherine Murphy with a view to establishing a common approach.

Windfall tax on Rezoners?

Councillor Catherine Murphy is demanding the immediate introduction of a substantial windfall tax on capital gains made by landowners who have their land rezoned for housing. This will be a major plank in her platform for the forthcoming general election in the new Kildare North constituency. Rezoning can instantly increase the value of land by ten times. Landowners selling rezoned land can make millions of pounds in unearned income overnight. At the same time, those buying houses on the rezoned land may have to wait years and years for proper educational, recreational and transportation facilities for themselves and their children due to shortages of public funds.

Catherine Murphy believes that there has been far too much rezoning of land in Kildare. A recent audit carried out by the County Council at her request showed that there is already enough undeveloped land zoned for housing to cater for an

additional 70,000 people. This is enough to cater for 50 years' population growth, according to the Council's planners. Yet the Fianna Fail/Fine Gael/Progressive Democrats rezoning majority on the Council are hell-bent on massive further rezoning. This amounts to unsustainable development on a grand scale and is indefensible.

A major windfall tax would take the heat out of the rezoning debate by greatly reducing the massive profits which can currently be realised by rezoning. And, where rezoning does take place, it will provide adequate funds to provide the services and infrastructure made necessary by housing developments.

Flooding

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the County Engineer to eliminate the flooding caused by blocked shores at Doctors Lane, Laurence Avenue and Maynooth Park.

Footpaths Straffan Road

Cllr, John McGinley has asked the County Engineer to carry out the minor work necessary to make the footpaths accessible to electric wheelchair users.

Harbour Field Area

The Council have been requested by Cllr. John McGinley to finish off the landscaping between the old Straffan Road and the Harbour Field wall in the interest of safety.

Arrow at Old Greenfield

Minister Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have again asked the County Engineer to paint an arrow on the road indicating the Straffan Road entrance to Old Greenfield.

Schools Moyglare Road

Arising from discussions with Maynooth Post Primary Teachers, Minister Stagg has requested Cllr. John McGinley to submit the following motion for consideration at the next Celbridge Area Committee meeting of the Council. "That flashing lights be erected either side of the schools on Moyglare road, Maynooth, in the interest of safety".

Better Public Lighting in Kildare

Cllr. John McGinley has resubmitted his motion on public lighting for the next meeting of the Council.

"That we proceed to replace the 4000 mercury vapour public lights in the county (including Leixlip and Newbridge) with modern sodium vapour units, that we upgrade and provide infill where necessary and that we place an order to have this work completed as soon as possible."

Bus Shelter - Straffan Road - 67A turning point



them grow. As well as all the flowers, the subtle hints of fresh young foliage make up a maryellous tapestry of colour. Flowering trees are making a wonderful display of

blossom. There are many flowering cherries (Prunus) including the Lombardy cherry popular for small spaces as it forms a narrow upright column of branches clothed with double, pale pink flowers.

Ornamental thorn trees can be even more showy than flowering cherries. 'Paul's Scarlet' bears double scarlet flowers, 'Crimson Cloud' has single dark red ones with a pretty white eye, and 'Rosea Flore Pleno' has double pink blossoms. There are some attractive, more subtle varieties too, like C.I. 'Plena' which has double, white flowers. C. prunifolia looks handsome from spring to autumn, with white flowers, long-lasting red fruits and gleaming oval leaves that colour beautifully in autumn. And don't shun white-flowered common hawthorn (C. monogyna) which makes an excellent prickly hedge that's a wonderful wildlife habitat. Grow a wild rose through it and you have the best of all rural worlds.

The golden rain tree (Laburnum) positively drips with long clusters of bright yellow flowers. Do bear in mind, though, that all parts of this tree are poisonous, particularly the seeds, so it's wise not to plant laburnums if there are young children around. Never plant one near a pond as the seeds will poison the water.

Several choice, less usual trees are also flowering now. The Judas tree (Cercis siliquastrum) bears many dangling clusters of rosy-pink flowers just before the attractive rounded leaves appear. It's said to be the tree from which Judas hanged himself, hence its name. Another excellent small tree is the rose acacia (Robinia hispida) which also bears deep rose-pink flowers and has pretty, fern-like leaves. Both these trees like a sheltered sunny site. The snowball tree (Styrax japonica) has wide-spreading branches and its exquisite, small, white flowers hang from underneath. Also known as the snowbell or snowdrop tree, Halesia carolina bears similar beautiful white flowers. Both the snowbell trees need a moist, lime-free soil. Paulownia tomentosa gives a glorious display of deep mauve, foxglove-like flowers in May, provided the weather has been kind, and its large velvety leaves look exceptionally handsome. Alternatively, if you want some dramatic foliage without the flowers, prune it to the ground in spring and then remove all but one of the new

Shrubs in flower include many white ones this month. One of the loveliest is Exochorda x macrantha 'The Bride', with arching branches smothered in clusters of large, pure white flowers. The poetically named bridal wreath or foam of May (Spiraea 'Arguta') also bears masses of white flowers. For a combination of attractive flowers and all-year foliage, there's little to beat Mexican orange blossom (Choisya ternata) which bears fragrant white flowers in bursts through late spring and summer. and its attractive evergreen foliage looks good all year. 'Aztec Pearl' is a compact variety. C.t. 'Sundance' has pale gold leaves, though the flowers aren't produced nearly so freely.

Nearly everyone falls in love with the beautiful waxypetalled bloom of magnolias, though remember that as most varieties develop into large shrubs, they'll need plenty of room. M.x soulangeana bears huge tulip-shaped blooms. Most varieties have white flowers, but those of 'Lennei' are flushed with red and 'Rustica Rubra' has rich purple-red flowers. There are many other beautiful and less common magnolias, like M. sieboldii, which should be planted with a view to the longer term as they can take a few years to flower. Some species need to be grown on an acid soil so check them out first.

Spring just wouldn't be the same without the scent of lilacs. The vast majority are varieties of Syringa vulgaris which grow into large shrubs. There are lots of colours from which to choose including 'Madame Lemoine' (white), 'Firmament' (sky-blue), 'Katherine Havemeyer' (deep lavender-purple), 'Edward J. Gardner' (pale pink), 'Sensation' (purple-red edged with white) and 'Primrose' (pale yellow). For a small space, choose the more compact variety S. meyeri 'Palibin' with pale pink


Daphnes are just about the only plants that can beat lilacs for spring fragrance. These choice plants are a bit pricey, but their perfume is second to none. Daphne burkwoodii bears pink flowers, and the variety 'Astrid' has pretty green and white variegated leaves. There are also dwarf varieties for rockeries like D. collina and D. x napolitana. Rhododendron varieties are at their peak now. About the best types for containers are the Rhododendron yakushimanum hybrids. This relatively new group includes many plants with delicate and unusually coloured flowers like 'Doc' which has rose-pink blooms with deeper pink edges, fading to white as they age; those of 'Percy Wiseman' are cream flushed with pink; 'Hoppy' is pale mauve fading to white; 'Silver Sixpence' has creamywhite flowers splashed with pale yellow. Although they grow only to around 1 m (3ft), their leaves are much larger and more attractive than those of other dwarfs.


Bare soil is best hoed regularly to keep down weeds as they germinate. It's far easier to get them at this stage rather than when they've become established or, even worse, seeded everywhere so you have hundreds more next year. Use a small onion hoe to weed more closely around plants.



DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

CHICKEN AND SWEETCORN SOUP

Serves 4

2.5cm (2") piece fresh root ginger, peeled 100g (4oz) cooked, skinned and boned chicken breast, shredded 10ml (2tsp) sherry 1 egg white 15ml (1tbsp) cornflour 600ml (1pt) chicken stock 100g (4oz) sweetcorn kernels salt and freshly ground black pepper 1 spring onion, finely chopped

- Finely grate the ginger, discarding any tough fibres. Mix with the chicken and sherry, then set aside.
- Lightly beat the egg white, then set aside. In a large bowl, blend the cornflour to a smooth paste with about 30ml (2tbsp) cold water.
- Bring the chicken stock to a rolling boil in a large saucepan, then remove from the heat and pour over the cornflour mixture. Stir well until blended, then return to the saucepan with the chicken mixture and the sweetcorn. Season to taste.
- Heat gently, stirring until the mixture boils and thickens.
- Add the egg white, stirring so that it separates into small pieces. Ladle the soup into bowls and garnish with the chopped spring onion.
- Serve this soup with rice crackers as a starter or a light snack.

Cooking:10 mins

TUNA AND SWEETCORN POTATO NUGGETS

Serves 4

2 x 65g packs instant mashed potato 275ml/(½ pint) boiling water Salt and freshly ground black pepper 150g/5oz breadcrumbs 115g/4oz sweetcorn, canned or frozen 225g/7oz tuna in brine, drained 5ml/1 teaspoon dried mixed herbs 2 eggs, size 3 Unlimited shredded lettuce

- Stir the instant mashed potato into the boiling water and mix until smooth. Add the seasonings.
- Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/ gas mark 6. Scatter breadcrumbs over a foil-covered tray and brown in oven for 5 minutes.

- Add the sweetcorn, flaked tuna and herbs to the potato and mix well. Divide the mixture into 24 balls and place on a foil covered baking tray. Flatten the balls slightly with the palm of your hand, then chill while you prepare the coating.
- Lightly beat the eggs and pour into a shallow dish.

 Pour the grilled breadcrumbs into another shallow dish.
- Place the nuggets in the egg, then roll in the breadcrumbs to coat evenly. Place the nuggets on a foilcovered baking tray and cook for 10 to 12 minutes. Serve the nuggets with unlimited shredded lettuce.

MICROWAVE RECIPE FOR CREME CARAMEL WITH APPLE MARMALADE

Serves 4

For the Creme Caramel:

3oz/75g caster sugar 2 tsp cornflour 1 tsp vanilla essence 1pt/600ml milk 4 eggs, size 3, beaten



For the Apple Marmalade:

2 oranges, rind and juice 5oz/150g caster sugar 2 apples, peeled, cored and finely chopped

- To make the caramel, put 3 tbsp sugar and 5 tbsp water into a 2pt/1.2L microproof dish. Cook on High (100%) for 4-5 min until sugar has dissolved and mixture turns golden. Using oven gloves, tip dish slightly to coat base evenly with caramel. Leave to set.
- Mix remaining sugar with cornflour and vanilla essence in a microproof jug. Gradually stir in milk and cook on High (100%) for 4 min. Whisk in eggs. Strain mixture over caramel and cover with clingwrap. Cook on Low (10%) for 10 min, then cook on High (100%) for a further 3 min. Allow to cool, then chill for 2 hours or overnight.
- To make the marmalade, put orange rind and juice and sugar into a microproof bowl. Cook on High (100%) for 5 min, stirring halfway through cooking. Add apples and cook on High (100%) for a further 15 min until marmalade is thick and syrupy.
- Turn out creme caramel on to a serving dish and serve with hot or cold apple marmalade.



Editorial

You've seen the posters. You've read the leaflets. You may even have entertained the candidates on your doorstep. Now it's time to make up your mind. National media coverage of the election has been dominated by issues such as taxation, unemployment and zero tolerance of crime. But, as the saying goes, 'all politics is local' and when many Maynooth voters approach the polling booth on June 6th they will cast their vote on how our local politicians have shaped up on local issues and how they have served their local community. This time round Maynooth finds itself in the new constituency of Kildare North. The four main towns in the constituency - Naas, Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth - are among the fastest growing urban centres in Ireland. It is a constituency with a young and, possibly, volatile electorate. Perhaps 30% of those entitled to vote in Maynooth in this election did not vote here in 1992, the time of the last general election. How they will plump this time around is anybody's guess.

Apart from the actual result, it will be interesting to see the turnout of voters in the Maynooth area. For a number of reasons it is usually relatively low - due in part to the presence of College students on the register and the high proportion of rented accommodation. One fears that this time around it may be lower still as there is a detectable and growing cynicism about politics, especially among young people. But politics does matter. The politicians we elect on June 6th will, in part, determine what kind of a town Maynooth is in 2002 when they next come asking for our vote. So, if your concern is unemployment in Maynooth or rezoning or lack of playing pitches or poor public transport you'll have your chance on June 6th. So vote.

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COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Community Council passes vote of sympathy

Maynooth Community Council observed a minute's silence as a mark of respect to Mr. Tom McMyler and Mrs Bridget Saults who died recently. Both had a distinctive record of service to the community. The Council also expressed their sympathy to Ms. Breda Gormally, supervisor in the Citizens Information Centre, on the death of her mother.

Support for "North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group"

The possibility of an application to Meath County Council for permission to locate a landfill dump site close to Maynooth was discussed at our last meeting. The Community Councillors were unanimous in their support for the current campaign by the "North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group" who were formed following local public concern on the issue.

The future of the Geraldine Hall

Following the recent fire that damaged the extension to the Geraldine Hall, Maynooth Community Council advised Solicitors for the owners. The Geraldine Hall has been used by the people of the town for community purposes for generations. The Community Council supported a proposal that ownership of the building be transferred to Kildare County Council who could repair it and then lease it to the Community Groups in the town.

Facelift for Maynooth this Summer

Almost £500,000 is available to be spent on enhancing the Main Street area of the town this summer. The money will be spent on putting the public lighting cables underground, paving the footpaths and new street lighting.

A further £80,000 will be spent between the Main Street and the Mart on the Leixlip Road. Councillor John Mc Ginley informed the Community Council of this good news.

Town Commission Status

Kildare County Councillors all support Maynooth's case for it's own local authority, Councillor John McGinley told members of the Community Council at their May meeting.

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MAYNOOTH PLANNING **ALLIANCE**

By now you are probably totally fed up with politics. The slogans, the posters, the promises, the petty squabbles, the spin doctors, the image consultants, the opinion polls - they all leave you a bit weary at this stage and looking forward to the next few weeks of pleasant relief. Maybe you made your mind up some time ago about who had earned your vote, or maybe you still are waiting for the candidates to declare which way they stand on a particular issue. Either way the decision you make will have important implications not just for the future of the country, but more particularly for the future of Maynooth.

The campaign inevitably focused on the issues which our local politicians think it should focus on, and you now probably feel more competent on issues of taxes, crime, the environment etc. than you have for some time. But what about the issues some of the candidates would rather avoid, the issues which affect all our futures namely the future of Maynooth itself? Maynooth Planning Alliance would like you to give some thought as to what you might have been told, or not told, on some of these.

Did the candidates tell you?

This part of North Kildare has a population of 55,000 people. Without rezoning any further lands, their actions in framing the last Development Plan means that unused

lands capable of accommodating another 33,000 people between Kilcock, Clane, Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge currently exists. There is not (contrary to the much hyped assertion) any shortage of building land!

Did the candidates tell you?

They want even more than a 66% increase in population to occur for the next five year period in North Kildare and support huge further rezonings in Maynooth, Kilcock and Clane? In each case, this is against the wishes of a majority of the local population they are supposed to represent.

Did the candidates tell you?

They want to more than double the size of Maynooth in the next five years, from a present population of 9,000 to 22,000? This means putting more than 5,000 extra cars in the town, further congesting the Main Street and motorway access, putting more pressures on the schools, water supplies, trains, etc. It means producing a bloated Maynooth, transformed beyond recognition, with the loss of rural walks and the building over of the environs of items of our heritage.

Did the candidates tell you?

That Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and the Progressive Democrats neutered a Strategic Plan, paid for by you the taxpayer, which would have made reasonable provision for Co. Kildare to handle its projected population increase until the year 2011, and then sent an innocuous version of it to the Minister for the Environment in a bid to resume

town by town rezoning. Did they tell you that their parties specifically removed a key phrase which called for restraint on further rezoning in Maynooth?

Did the candidates tell you?

The population increase in Ireland from 1991 - 1996 was 95,000 people, vet Kildare alone made provision in its last Development Plan to zone for in excess of this amount. A little off in their estimates last time around, and not apparently learning by the mistake!

Did the candidates tell you?

That young married couples could only be enabled to afford a house if huge new areas were rezoned. This is a myth. Have you seen any evidence of 'starter housing' in recent Maynooth developments, or of any builders rushing to build such housing on our unused 106 acres?

Maybe these concerns were addressed to your satisfaction on your doorstep, and indeed some of the candidates share the concerns expressed above. Maybe after the election the issues will seem less pressing to some parties. Maynooth Planning Alliance, in cooperation with the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning, will however, continue to monitor developments closely. But we would urge you to think carefully when casting your vote on Thursday 6th June and would recommend you not cast it for parties who support excessive rezoning for Maynooth. This after all is the issue for Maynooth and for your future in it!

Election Concerns

Since the founding of Parklands Residents Association the issue of Planning has dominated many a meeting.

Parklands Residents Association was a founder member of the Maynooth Planning Alliance which in turn became a founding member of the North Kildare Alliance for better planning. The reasons for this level of involvement in planning issues can be readily experienced by any Maynooth resident. Maynooth's growth 41% in the last five years sees increased traffic, basic services such as street cleaning and dog warden unable to cope with the rapidly urbanized town, before long we will see the schools groan under the sudden pressure of increased numbers. Air quality, water quality leave a lot to be desired at present, yet without any regard for existing problems the proposal still stands to rezone a further 325 acres in Maynooth. These groups were formed to alert Maynooth and North Kildare, find out now, because, after the election it will be too late.

Policy to Practice

The Maynooth Development Plan outlines as policy the prioritization of Pedestrian safety within Residential areas, yet the amended Draft Plan would convert the residential area of Parklands from a cul de sac to a through road, similar situations exist in other residential areas of Maynooth.



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

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
MAYNOOTH'S NEWEST CRECHE / PLAYSCHOOL

Saturday the 3rd May marked the opening of Maynooth's newest Creche/Playschool, the Cluain Aoibhinn Childcare Centre.

It will open from 7.30 a.m. - 6.00 p.m. from Mon - Fri all year round, with the exception of bank holidays. Easter Monday, Good Friday and as yet Christmas days are still undecided. It will cater for babies as young as 3 months old and the upper age limit is 12 years of age. After school care is also available. The premises are complete with a baby room which has a fully equipped changing room with a sink, it also has a toddler room, a play-school room, a 3-4 year old room and an after schools room. For special treats and for educational purposes there is a T.V. room which also doubles as a rest room for the children.

The after school children have their homework supervised and also receive a hot meal.

The Creche/Playschool complies to all the standards set out by the Department of Health Child Policy Unit regulations. The owner Marian Hannafin has qualifications in Social


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
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MAYNOOTH NEEDS A YOUTH CLUB.

This project began as a simple classroom exchange between Ranganna iii agus iv under the supervision of teacher Colm O hAnluain and CMI and CM II under the supervision of Elizabeth Meher of ecole Saint Jules, Rue de Sacre Coeur, Hazbrouck, France. The objective of this project was to broaden the children's experience through an exchange of meteorological information. 

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

This election gives us a unique chance to return a Government which will work decisively for a just and lasting peace. Let's use our votes to give peace a chance!

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

VIDEO REVIEW

Michael Collins (P.G.)

This is the most successful film of all time at the Irish Box office, and deservedly so. It is also one of the most talkedabout films ever to hit the Irish cinema. It was also odds-on that Neil Jordan's film of the life story of one of Ireland's most famous sons would cause a lot of controversy; after all how do you tell the story of a legend like Collins in two hours? The film contains some historical inaccuracies, and liberties have been taken with some of the locations (you don't look straight at the facade of the G.P.O. from North Earl Street) but this is not a documentary nor is it a travelogue. 'Michael Collins" is a well crafted, brilliantly acted, beautifully photographed piece of epic cinema. Liam Neeson in the title role is, quite simply, superb. Indeed, like Richard Harris in 'The Field", it is undoubtedly his finest performance to date. It is impossible to imagine anyone else playing the part, and that is the mark of real talent. Neither is this a rebel film. It's big budget, brazenly entertaining and simplified account of one of Ireland's famous and fascinating freedom fighters, and should be viewed accordingly.

Verdict: Stunning and Superb.

Striptease (18's)

This is a nonentity of a film. It's billed as a comic tale, which it's not. Nor is it the titillating piece of soft porn that some people would probably hope it is. In fact it is a nothing film, a piece of throw-away garbage. Briefly the story centres around ex-FBI clerk Erin Grant (Demi Moore), who takes a second job as a stripper at The Eager Beaver in order to pay for the custody case of her seven-year-old daughter. In this very big budget (she was reportedly paid \$12.5m for the part), very small audience turkey, Moore's decline at the box office has reached new depths. Never a great actress, she's no great shakes as a stripper either, in fact she looks far better, as do most women, with their clothes on rather than

Like Demi Moore herself, the script lacks any real flesh, and the film is always floundering in search of a direction. Speaking of which, the director, whose name thankfully escapes me as I write, should find another line of work.

All in all a film that's ultimately insulting to women and insulting to everybodies intelligence. It should have been called "demi get's her kit off for the lads!!"

Verdict: Abysmal! (Put your clothes on, Demi, you'll frighten the horses!).

Brassed Off (15)

This tale of a grim North of England coalmining town set in the early nineteen eighties is an entertaining and rewarding film. It centres around a colliery brass band in the mining town of Grimley, and the band's leader, played by Peye Postlethwaite. The band members are just about to call it a day, when a new trumpeter arrives in the form of Tara Fitzgerald who whips up their enthusiasm oncemore. Ewan Mcgregor is her childhood sweetheart but his performance pales into insignificance in comparison to Stephen

Tompkinson, terrific as the debt-ridden and increasingly desperate Phil. Direction in workmanlike, photography is superb and all of the cast turn in creditable performances. A very worthwhile and capable offering.

Verdict: Excellent.

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





HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

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DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

MAYNOOTH DEVELOPMENT PLAN UPDATE

Progress on the Maynooth Development Plan has been held up while Kildare County Council, at the request of the Minister for the Environment, prepared an overall planning strategy for the county to guide the new plan. While the Council has now adopted such a strategy, it is entirely unsatisfactory in that it leaves the way open for further widespread rezoning in the county. This, despite the fact that an audit compiled of already-zoned land at Councillor Catherine Murphy's request shows that there is already enough land zoned for housing to accommodate 70,000 people — over half the existing county population. The Minister had already stated clearly that he will not provide funding for infrastructure to support excessive rezoning.

It is likely that the draft Maynooth Development Plan will eventually be produced by the end of 1997. This Plan will be critical for Maynooth's future as a viable and sustainable community. Democratic Left and Catherine Murphy are totally opposed to the massive rezoning of further land for housing in Maynooth which is being sought by the County Council's "rezoning majority".

DUMP PLAN OPPOSED

At a recent meeting of the Maynooth Branch of Democratic Left, total opposition was expressed to the proposal to develop a superdump on the County Meath side of the Moyglare Road. In supporting the local branch's stance, Councillor Catherine Murphy has called on the Minister for the Environment to formulate an overall waste disposal policy for the Greater Dublin Region. The Moyglare Road proposal follows on the heels of the controversial Kill dump project, which is currently the subject of legal proceedings. Catherine Murphy has sought the support of Democratic Left colleague, Councillor Christy Gorman of Meath County Council, in opposing the Moyglare dump.

MAIN STREET IMPROVEMENT WORK IMMINENT

When the Maynooth by-pass was built, the National Roads Authority set aside a sum of £200,000 to be spent on improving the old main road through Maynooth, stretching from Blacklion to the entrance to the new Maynooth College campus on the Kilcock Road. Now the Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) has allocated a further £200,000 for this work, with the proviso that Kildare County Council should contribute £22,000 of its own funds to the scheme.

Councillor Catherine Murphy, who is Vice-Chair of the DTO's Consultative Council, has welcomed this extra funding. It will allow a much more comprehensive improvement scheme to be put in place, with the DTO money being particularly earmarked for pedestrian and cycle way facilities. The project will shortly be put out to tender, and it is anticipated that work will begin on the scheme in the late summer or early autumn.

MONEY ADVICE SERVICE OPENS IN MAYNOOTH

Councillor Catherine Murphy has welcomed the opening of a Maynooth office of the Money Advice and Budgeting Service (MABS). The office, which is located in Derroon House, Dublin Road (Tel: 629 1660) provides free and confidential advice to individuals and families on how to handle debt problems. The aim of the service is to enable people to pay off debts in a planned way whilst ensuring that all their essential requirements (food, housing, fuel, etc.) are met. A preferred way of doing this is through weekly deposits in a special account in the local Credit Union.

MABS is funded by the Department of Social Welfare. However, following a decision by Social Welfare Minister Proinsias De Rossa TD, the service is independent of the Department and rooted in the local community. An important function of the local MABS office will be a Community Education Programme which will seek to instill principles of money management among targetted groups in the community, especially young people.

Regional Planning Concept - End to Maverick Rezoning

Minister of State Emmet Stagg has warmly welcomed the decision by Minister for Environment, Brendan Howlin to put in place a process of regional planning for land use in the Greater Dublin Area including County Kildare.

This will require Local Authorities to have regard to the regional plan for land use when drawing up their own County Development Plans and will be backed by enforcing legislation.

Minister Stagg has urged Minister Howlin not to agree to the requested extension of time sought by Kildare County Council to complete their development plan until the regional plan is in place. Minister Howlin is actively considering this proposal.

Refusing Kildare County Council's application for extension of time will not in any way restrict development in County Kildare where there are already nearly 3,000 acres of land available for development. Recent statements that scarcity of development land in Kildare was forcing up house prices are therefore not accurate. As far as industrial development is concerned any suitable project wishing to establish in Kildare will be welcomed and can be accommodated by 'material contravention' of the plan as was the case with Intel, Hewlett Packard and others.

The decision on land use policy at regional level will put an end to the ad hoc system of planning that had become the norm and led to excessive zonings.

Completion of Estates.

A Bill that will enable Kildare County Council to refuse planning permission to any developer who has not fully completed any previous developments was introduced by Labour Deputy Sean Ryan prior to the dissolution of the Dail.

The Bill which has Government support was warmly welcomed by Emmet Stagg. Unfinished housing estates are the greatest single source of complaint from Residents Associations. Builders/Developers have left a myriad of estates uncompleted where houses are all sold. They have moved onto other sites with no real sanction against them.

The new law, if enacted in the 28th Dail, will prevent the abuse of house buyers and will ensure that they are provided with the facilities and services they paid for.

Rockfield Estate.

Following a meeting with the Residents Association Emmet Stagg has requested the Council to take action against the

developer of Rockfield with a view to securing the following work in the Estate.

- 1. Planting of 120 trees throughout the estate.
- 2. Provision of proper boundary wall at entrance to estate.
- Reinstatement of defective kerbing at Rockfield Green
- 4. Reinstatement of footpaths following Telecom and C.M.I. work

In addition Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council.

"That the developer of Rockfield Estate, Maynooth, be instructed to remove the barbed wire fence he has erected at the side of the green area in Rockfield Park and to erect a wall in compliance with planning permission and conditions 92/919."

Commenting on this matter Minister Stagg stated that the erection of barbed wire along a green area was highly irresponsible and extremely dangerous and cannot be tolerated.

More Money for Main Street Improvements.

A further grant of £222,222 has been allocated for work on improving Maynooth Main Street, footpaths, undergrounding overhead wires and new public lighting.

This means that the following money is available for work to be carried out this year.

£200,000 from National Roads Authority.

£222,222 from D.T.O. Traffic Management Grant and Kildare County Council.

£50,000 E.S.B. contribution to undergrounding E.S.B. wires.

In addition £80,000 has been allocated for improvements from Main Street to the Cattle Mart.

These works will enhance our Main Street and will make it pedestrian friendly.


Kingsbry Estate.

Footpath and Lights - Dunboyne Road.

Development levies of £16,250 were imposed on North City Builders (£12,250) and High Degree Construction (£4,000) for the provision of public lighting and new footpaths from the new houses at Lyreen Park to tie in with existing footpath at Dunboyne Road.

Unfortunately North City Builders have paid nothing so far and Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to take immediate court action to secure the funding. The Council have agreed to take this action if the funding is not paid forthwith.

As a result of the totally unsatisfactory situation Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to the Council.

"That instead of imposing levies for footpaths, drainage and lighting on main roads that developers be asked to carry out this work in lieu of levies and that the work be carried out before the building of houses commences."

Building Regulations for New Houses and Extensions.

Following consultations with Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D., Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to Kildare County Council.

"That Kildare County Council actively enforce the Building Regulations throughout the County and that the following measures be introduced in that regard.

- 1. That a special levy be placed on all new houses that are for sale to fund the position of an Enforcement Officer and that Officer's support staff.
- 2. That the performance bond cover the Building Regulations.
- That a Certificate of Compliance with the Building Regulations on the actual completed building be a requirement."

The Building Regulations have been in force since 1992 yet Kildare County Council have not been enforcing them.

In Dublin without a Certificate of Compliance with the Building Regulations it is not possible to sell your house. The purchase of a house is the biggest outlay any of us will ever make. It would be comforting to know that the house we purchase is in accordance with the Building Regulations. That has not been the case up to now in Kildare and this motion if passed will change that.

Bye Laws on Display.

Cllr. John McGinley proposed at the last Celbridge Area meeting of the Council that the Draft Parking Bye Laws for

Maynooth should go on public display for receipt of submissions. This was agreed to.

Large Commercial Vehicles Banned From Parking in Estates.

Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin, to ban the parking of large commercial vehicles in residential areas.

The Minister signed the Road Traffic (Traffic and Parking) 1997 Regulations on May 1st. The regulations will come into force on October 1st and the maximum penalties for an offence are as follows:

First Offence - £150

Second Offence - £350

Third or Subsequent Offence - £350 and imprisonment up to maximum of 3 months.

Kildare County Council will set the maximum size of commercial vehicle which can park in a residential estate. The days of juggernauts, large trucks and coaches parking in residential areas are now at an end.

Our Annual Walk in aid of Maynooth Senior Citizens Committee was held on Sunday May 18th at 3.00 p.m.

The route for the walk was along Carton Avenue and into Carton Estate. Maynooth Labour Branch would like to thank Michael Barry and Lee Mallaghan for opening Carton on the day to the participants. The proceeds of the walk will be handed over to the Senior Citizens Committee by Minister Emmet Stagg during Maynooth Festival Week and we expect the final proceeds to be in excess of £1,700 this year. This will be a record amount for the walk and we thank all those who sponsored our walkers.

- a) The construction of an embankment, drainage, kerbing nd safety barrier. This embankment will be required for the uture bridge widening.
- b) The erection of additional road markings and signs on he approach to the bridge.

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(c) The estimated cost of construction is £16,500 (include. V.A.T.)

Funding for this project is not included in the present year's estimates.

School Warning Lights

Kildare County Council having agreed with a motion submitted by Cllr. Senan Griffin to erect flashing warning lights at the National School and the Post Primary School on the Moyglare Road at a cost of £3,400. The County Engineer in agreeing with the proposal suggested that a survey be carried out to see if it is feasible to have such lighting at the location of schools around the County. Cllr. Griffin first proposed that such a survey be carried out during the debate on the estimates and now proposes that the same facility be provided for the girls school.

Minister B. Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have requested that proper footpaths and lighting be provided at the Old Folks housing scheme on the Dunboyne Road. The money required to carry this work should be made available from development levies and be completed during the summer months.

Leinster Park - Mews

Minister Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin welcome the confirmation from K.C.C. that the required drainage and resurfacing will be carried out as soon as possible at the entrance to Leinster Park and Leinster Mews.

GARDENING HINTS

une is a great time of the year for the garden with masses of young foliage and flowers giving us colour and perfume. There should not be any need to buy vegetables or fruit. There's no comparison between freshly dug new potatoes and sun-warmed strawberries as opposed to those bought in the supermarkets.

General Tasks

Cut flowers from the garden are often infested with small black pollen beetles, which tend to invade garden plants once oilseed rape has been harvested. The beetles are harmless but they're a nuisance inside the house in large numbers. Clear them off cut flowers by leaving the bunches in a dark garage or shed for a couple of hours - the beetles will fly to the window in search of light.

Late frosts can check and even kill newly planted half-hardy annuals and tender vegetable plants. Protect plants overnight using polythene, fleece or fine windbreak netting.

Plants, once established, should be fed twice weekly. Use a high-potash liquid feed like tomato fertilizer.

Dead-head plants at least once a week to encourage plenty of flowers.

Checklist

- Plant out vegetables raised under cover like courgettes and sweetcorn.
- Tie in sweet peas and other annual climbers regularly.
- If you run short of salad vegetables, sprout some seeds on the windowsill to fill the gap.
- Snap off tomatoe side shoots as they appear.
- Continue to remove suckers from roses, lilac and other plants before they get too large.
- Apply an extra coat of shading paint to the greenhouse if necessary.
- Finish planting aquatics for a good display this year.
- Early in the month move dwarf peach trees in pots outside— the danger of infection by peach leaf curl has passed.
- Water and ventilate the greenhouse regularly.
- Pinch out the tips of chrysanthemums planted last month.
- Stake gladioli.

Planting up a hanging basket

- 1 Line a mesh basket with a coir, wool or plastic liner, and put a circle of plastic in the bottom to help keep the moisture in.
- Sit the basket on a large pot to keep it stable. Fill it with compost and, starting in the centre, fill round with lower growing plants, including trailing plants at the edges.
- Hang the basket on a stout bracket which is securely fixed to the wall. Push trailing plants through the coir, so the whole basket will be a glove of colour. Water it thoroughly.

Make Your Own Pot Pourri

Pot-Pourri is easy to make and a wonderful way of bringing the garden's perfume into the house. The fragrance is delicate and unlike cans of Air Freshener does not have any chemicals. The types of flowers and leaves is endless

Flowers such as roses, lavender, violets, jasmine, honeysuckle and wallflowers.

Plants with aromatic foliage include lemon verbena, lemon balm, eau-de-cologne mint. For extra colour add a few flowers of marigolds, pot marigolds, cornflowers or sweet peas.


Pick the flowers early in the day when the weather's dry. Spread the flowers and foliage outside to dry on wire mesh.

When the material is dry and crisp to the touch, mix it together in a large bowl with some chopped citrus peel and about half a cup of powdered orris root to 'fix' the fragrance. Store in an airtight container for a month or so, then put it in decorative bowls or jars around the house.



COULIBIAC TOPPINGS FOR BURGERS FRIED SANDWICH FILLINGS BRANDY SNAPS

COULIBIAC

Pinch of saffron

20z/50g long-grained rice

1oz/25g butter
4 spring onions, sliced
12oz/350g spinach leaves
1lb/450g puff pastry
1lb 450g skinless piece salmon fillet
4 medium eggs, hard boiled and sliced
Salt and freshly ground black pepper.



For the glaze:

1 medium egg, beaten

Method

- 1. Cook the rice and saffron in a pan of lightly salted boiling water for 10 mins. Meanwhile, heat butter in a pan and cook the onion until softened. Add the spinach and stir until just beginning to wilt. Remove from the heat.
- 2. Preheat oven to Gas 7, 4250 f, 220 0C. Roll out pastry to a 9in-23cm square, cut in half. Spread rice over one half to within 1in-2.5cm of the edge. Season. Arrange salmon fillet on top followed by the sliced egg, spinach, and seasoning.
- 3. Using a lattice pastry cutter, run the wheel over the remaining pastry. Brush the rim with egg glaze and place over the spinach layer. Seal the edges. Glaze the pastry and bake for 30 mins. Serve with soured cream.

4 FRIED SANDWICH FILLINGS

Serve hot fried sandwiches as a snack or first course. Each recipe makes two sandwiches.

Garlic Tomato

Beat 2 tbsp chopped sun—dried tomatoes with 1oz-25g butter. Spread on 4 slices white bread. Top with garlic mayonnaise. Halve 4oz-100g cherry tomatoes, arrange on 2 slices bread. Top with remaining bread. Remove crusts, cut into fingers or triangles. Shallow-fry until golden on both sides.

Tuna and Tapenade

Butter 4 slices of bread, spread with tapenade. Beat 100g cream cheese with 2oz /50g tuna. Pile onto 2 slices. Continue as before.

Chicken and Tarragon

Butter 4 slices of white bread, spread with 4tbsp soured cream. Top 2 slices white bread with 6oz/175g shredded, cooked chicken and 1 tbsp freshly chopped tarragon. Continue as before.

Cheese and Ham

Butter 4 slices white bread. Add slices of Parma ham to each slice. Sprinkle 20z/50g grated Gruyere over two slices, top with remaining bread, seal well and continue as before.

TOPPINGS FOR BURGERS



Bacon and Cheddar Melt Dry-fry 8oz/225g diced bacon until crisp. Take off heat, stir in 6oz/175g cubed Cheddar and 2 skinned, diced

tomatoes

Blue Cheese

Mix together 4oz/100g Danish blue cheese, 4 tbsp soured cream, 1 tbsp snipped chives and freshly ground black pepper.



Chilli


Soften 1 finely chopped onion in 1 tbsp sunflower oil, add 1 tbsp mild chilli powder and cook for 1 min. Stir in a 400g can ratatouille and bring to the boil. Simmer for 5 mins. Add a rinsed and drained 200g can kidney beans and heat for a further 5 mins.

Barbecued Mushrooms

Melt 10z/25g butter and fry 60z/175g sliced mushrooms and 2 chopped cloves of garlic, until softened. Stir in 6 tbsp barbecue sauce, simmer for 2 mins.



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


Marathon

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

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
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


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SOCCER CLUB

Multinationals on our Doorstep

Recent reports in the national press suggest that Hewlett Packard are planning a major expansion of their plant near Leixlip with up to 4,000 jobs being eventually provided at the site. Combined with Intel, this means that Maynooth will have one of the largest industrial complexes in these islands. right on its doorstep. The development of these two facilities by two of the world's most powerful multinational companies has involved an investment of billions of pounds - with a little help from you, the Irish tax payer. The advantages are obvious - jobs, investment in the roads infrastructure, the increased spending of all the new workers in the Leixlip - Maynooth area. Perhaps at this stage it is fair to point out that Leixlip has been rather better at developing links with its multinational neighbours than Maynooth has been. In fact Leixlip has suceeded in claiming Intel and Hewlett Packard as its own. Despite the fact that we are no more than 4 miles from the plants, Maynooth, as a town, does not seem to have forged many formal links with the companies which might be to the benefit of the local community. Leixlip, for example, appears to enjoy generous levels of sponsorship from Intel and Hewlett Packard for a whole range of projects. These comments are made not in a spirit of envy but rather to point out that Maynooth needs to be more successful in selling itself to our powerful neighbours down the road.

The posters are down (mostly). The new constituency of Kildare North has elected its three T.Ds - Charlie McCreevy, Bernard Durkan and Emmet Stagg. CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question:

I am 75 years old, living with my son and his family. I don't get any of the free schemes except free travel. I understand that changes were to be introduced in the free schemes, can you tell me if this has happened?

Answer:

From the 1st June a number of changes come into effect in the free schemes. These are listed below. Provided you meet the other requirements (e.g. receipt of relevant social welfare pension) you will qualify for the Free Electricity and Telephone Rental Allowance.

Free Electricity Allowance and Free Telephone Rental Allowance are extended to pensioners over age 75 regardless of who lives with them so long as they meet the other conditions for the free schemes, (i.e. they are getting a relevant social welfare pension or their weekly income does not exceed the maximum rate of Contributory Old Age

Pension plus £30). This means that the usual restrictions that apply to free schemes regarding who you live with are to be lifted for pensioners over 75 who qualify for free schemes. Usually you have to be living alone or with a dependant or other "exempted persons". The ESB and Telephone must be in your name.

Free Telephone Rental is currently available to people who have dependent children under 18 years. The age limit for dependent children for Free Telephone Rental Allowance is extended from age 18 to 22nd birthday for those in full-time education and resident with the recipient.

The definition of who may reside with a recipient of Free Telephone Rental Allowance is amended. If you have an invalid living with you this will not debar you from getting the allowance.

Free Telephone Rental Allowance is extended to pensioners where constant care and attention is being provided by another person resident with the pensioner (or to another member of the household). This includes recipients of Carer's Allowance. The Free Travel Companion Pass is extended to all registered blind pensioners.

QUESTION FOR THE COUNTY COUNCIL

What has the County Council got against the Dunboyne Road?

Last October work began putting in a new kerb where the road had been widened on the bend at what was the Presentation Convent. Work was left unfinished until about a month ago. The kerb was put in place and loads of topsoil tipped up all along in line with the pathway. This is now a mass of clumps of grass, docks and thistles. 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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

Now that the General Election has taken place, Maynooth Planning Alliance offers its congratulations to the three sitting T.D.'s who were re-elected. As promised, together with their colleagues in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning, the issues of excessive residential rezoning were highlighted by Maynooth Planning Alliance during the campaign. Unlike the political parties, this was done with no sources of finance, and thanks are due to the many volunteers who assisted. Such was the success of this that every candidate felt obliged to address the issues of excessive rezoning, some by making it a main plank of their manifesto at local level, others by issuing a battery of circulars at short notice to address specific aspects of the debate. Many supportive comments were made for the work of the Planning Alliance, some from unexpected quarters late in the campaign.

In the end of the day no changes in representation occurred, though it is worth pointing out that in Maynooth 41% of voters cast their votes for candidates opposed to the proposed Maynooth Development Plan. In the constituency as a whole, 45% of voters supported candidates who had gone on record as supporting the objectives of the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning.

Though the election is now history, the issues of proper planning for Maynooth are not, and will become increasingly important over the next few months. It is likely that the next chapter of the saga will be dependent on the actions of the newly appointed Minister for the Environment. Before Kildare Co. Councillors will be able to return to the various town Development Plans, the permission of the Minister to grant an extension of time for the County Development Plan, now seven years late will be necessary. It is the view of Maynooth Planning Alliance that this should not be given in the absence of a realistic strategic approach to planning for settlement expansion throughout Kildare as a whole. The particular plight of Maynooth, where some councillors are proposing a doubling of its population in the next plan, has already been brought to the attention of Mr. Bertie Ahern in a recent meeting with him. The need for an integrated regional planning approach for both North Kildare and Ireland as a whole was emphasised. All of Maynooth will be watching how responsible the new government will act in this vital matter.

MAYNOOTH INFORMATION AGE TOWN - MIAT

Maynooth Community Council convened a committee to compile a submission for Telecom Eireann's Information Age Town competition. The theme of the submission is Building Community using technology as the catalyst. Emphasis was placed upon the unique aspects of Maynooth as a historic, university town where the relationship between

the town and university is one of interdependence, a town which has a remarkable history community activity. Communication in printed and broadcast word has developed strongly today with Kairos, publishing houses, a commercial printer, a Cyber Cafe and a language laboratory assessing the latest satellite broadcasts from around the world.

The demographic profile of the town shows a very high proportion of people employed in professional and technical occupations. With many College employees resident in the area and the factories of Intel and Hewlett Packard the community is particularly geared to exploit the potential of the information age. The Community Council plays a special integrating role in the life of this fast-growing community. Since its establishment in 1984 a number of its personnel have built up considerable project management experience in an enterprise which has an annual budget approaching £400,000.

The commercial profile of the town has been influenced by the College, proximity to Dublin, its agricultural hinterland and the zoning policies of the local authority. There are 172 business units spread across the retail, leisure, service, business and financial sectors.

Education is catered for at all levels in the town with 6,600 students in full time education between pre-schools, a Gael-Scoil, two primary schools, a post-primary and a university. Information Technology facilities at Maynooth College are among the most advanced of any in the country, including personal computers, advanced information systems in the library and the development of video-linked computer degrees. IT is already embedded in Maynooth's culture at every level with the university as its flagship.

Maynooth was recommended because of its position as a microcosm of modern Ireland with a young, vibrant, educated population at ease with change. It also has an impressive record of community activity despite rapid development and a broad social mix, a thriving commercial entity, the necessary levels of academic, technical and training resources. The town has a high recognition factor and a notable mix of old and new, academic research skills and experience to monitor the project and its community impact.

CÚ GLAS

Cú Glas is an historical re-enactment and living history group. We take our name from the old Irish Law Texts, which refer to Cú Glas, as the grey dogs (or wolves). These were the outsiders, outlaws, brigands who banded together; possibly the most famous, the Fiana lead by Finn Mac Cumhaill to name but one.

We are based in the Finglas, Ballymun area of Northwest Dublin. Cú Glas officially formed in 1996 with a core of several experienced re-enactors and a number of enthusiastic new-comers! We have been expanding steadily and the group is currently in excess of 25 active members.

We have appeared at a number of Clan home comings, the O'Tooles at Baltinglass; where we were presented with the Leinster Banner, and the Kavanagh home coming at Ferns.

We have also been involved in the Battle of Athy, 1996 and 1997, the Battle of Ballymoon, the Battle of Annagasson and the Battle of Ardee, all in 1996. We also travelled to the Battle of Tewksbury, England last year. Another major event was the Donegal Arts Festival.

We are often asked to march in various parades, most recently the St. Patrick's Day parade in Dublin, and more locally for the Seamus Ennis Festival in Finglas.

A number of our group have appeared in films, Braveheart being the most famous; on stage at The Point, in Sleeping Beauty, (sort of), and in several television productions by Seven Arts, Irish Myths and Legends and The History of the Curragh.

Later this year we will be taking part in The Warrior Games on the Curragh, The Battle of Tintagel, England, The Limerick 800 in early July, the Battle of Drogheda in August and Maynooth Summer Festival Sat 12th July.

Cú Glas believes in making ourselves available to the public, to this end we will give short talks on aspects of Irish life to schools and other interested groups, accompanied with living examples! We are very conscious of the need to present ourselves in a professional manner. To this end we make most of our clothing, following, to the best of our ability, the dress of the people of Ireland from the 7th to the late 17th century. Similarly our weapons are as authentic and accurate to the respective period as possible.

We are in Maynooth on the 12th of July to provide entertainment and enjoyment for the public, while maintaining a high standard of safety for both the public and ourselves. We are available for questions and photographs, except when we take to the battlefield.

Cú Glas is a member of The Society of Irish Re-enactors, a nationwide organization bringing together the various Clans of Ireland.

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BALLERINA IN MAYNOOTH

Anne Maher first started ballet at 5 years of age. She trained with Myrtle Lambkin in Sutton and later with the Irish Ballet Company in Cork. 

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

Those with numerous moles should not sunbathe.

To Protect Your Childs Skin

Children are very much at risk of sunburn.

Supervision by an adult to limit sun exposure is essential.

Parents or those responsible must:

- Keep babies under six months old completely out of direct sunlight.
- Avoid mid-day sun if possible
- Keep children clothed with hats and close woven t-shirts while outdoors.
- Use a total sunblock (SPF 15+) on a child's sun exposed skin.

So for an easy way to gain knowledge with a minimum of effort, opt for the Net.

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





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

Judge Brophy said it was great to see the Gardaí and Vintners of Maynooth working hand in hand.


The I.D. cards carry a photo, name and address and date of birth of the holder and they also have a security colour-coded motif on the back to prevent unauthorised copies being produced.

Fr. Cogan wants to involve his new parishioners in the Church as much as he has done in Maynooth as he believes "The people make a Parish" and "the Church is the people of God" and as such they have to be as much a part of the Church as he is.

Fr. Cogan will be sadly missed from the Parish when he leaves his residence by the Harbour on 1st July, but there is a slight comfort in the fact that he will return throughout the following year for a few weddings which he has already promised to perform.

On a final note Fr. Cogan would like to give his sincere thanks for the wonderful party held for him in the Glenroyal. He said he was overjoyed by the amount of friends (not just parishioners) that came to bid him farewell and he was also delighted with the lovely presents he received.

So farewell Fr. Cogan and may you be as happy in your new Parish as you were here!

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#### VIDEO REVIEW

### The Last of the High Kings (15's)

This is a likeable comic story of a teenage lad's (Frankie, played by Jared Leto, star of TV's My So Called Life) coming of age during a long, hot summer in Howth. He's hoping for a school holiday of chasing women and generally whooping it up with his friends, before the Leaving Cert results come out in a couple of months time. Then there's his eccentric family. His father (played by Gabriel Byrne) is a second rate actor who's seldom at home. His mother (Catherine O'Hara) is a complete Protestant bashing bigot. There's also his two best friends who are total morons, not to mention the two 'birds' he fancies (played extremely well by Emily Mortimer and Lorraine Pilkington). Into this motley group comes a family friend from America (Christinna Ricci of Addams Family fame) who falls head over heels in love with our hero (however, love is the last thing on his mind). Add to this some superb cameos from Colm Meaney, who plays a lecherous Fianna Fail TD, and Stephen Rea as a know-it-all taxi driver, together with a brilliant soundtrack featuring a host of seventies rock legends, and all the ingredients are there for a film which is at the same time very funny and very poignant. Verdict: Definitely one to see.

Some Mother's Son (15's)

Set at the time of the H-Block hunger strikes of 1981, this is the story of an innocent mother's torment after her son is arrested for terrorist activity. Helen Mirren, who for once remains fully dressed throughout the entire proceedings, plays the solidly anti-violence Kathleen Quigley, the mother of the title. Reluctantly she becomes involved in the protest over poor prison conditions for IRA prisoners, egged on by the vociferously anti-British mother of another imprisoned activist.

This is a very well made, if harrowing, story of how people are forced by circumstance to become involved in the 'troubles', and as we all know, there are areas of Belfast and Derry where even against their will, they're compelled to pick a certain side.

The film is very well directed and captures brilliantly the mood and atmosphere of the plot, and with a fine performance from Ms Mirren, this movie is well worth seeing.

Verdict: Excellent.

#### The Glimmer Man (18's)

Let's face it; you either like Steven Segal or you don't. In this movie he tries his best to mimic the very stylish thriller 'Seven' and fails miserably.

Segal plays Jack Cole in this lame, laborious effort. He's a martial arts expert (what else!!) who tracks down a serial killer called The Family Man, who gets his kicks by crucifying Catholic families. When Cole's ex-wife becomes the killer's latest victim, and he becomes the number one suspect, he sets out to clear his name and in the process uncovers plot after plot involving the CIA, the Mafia, and seemingly everybody else. The 18's cert more than likely refers to your I.Q. because this film is just a lot of nonsense.

Segal plays his usual role, supposedly the thinking man's Bruce Lee, and the direction is all over the place. This is definitely one to miss.

Verdict: For amoebas only!

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

## GARDENING HINTS



#### Fruit

Strawberries should have all their old leaves cut off after harvesting has finished. Rake off and compost the old leaves and straw, and pull up any weeds. Summer-fruiting raspberries should be pruned after harvest: cut all the old fruited canes down to the ground. Repair or tighten the training wires if necessary, then tie the new canes in about 10cm (4 inches) apart. Cut out weak spindly canes and bodily pull up any which have grown between the rows. This deters them from regrowing.

### Vegetables

Autumn and winter salad vegetables can be sown now. Claytonia or winter purslane does best on a sandy soil, cornsalad, or lamb's lettuce and rocket are happy in most situations, and land cress likes a rich, fairly moist soil. Some oriental vegetables are also useful in salads. Sow seed thinly in rows 23cm(9 in) apart. With the exception of land cress, all these plants can either be grown as a cut-and-come-again crop where the seedlings are left to grow densely, or thinned to around 1 cm (4 inches) apart and the plants harvested individually. Salad onions can be sown thinly to over-winter for harvesting in early spring. A final sowing of beetroot can be made in mild areas. Sow lettuce in rows, or in trays if the weather is hot. Prick out seedlings sown in trays last month and plant them out when two adult leaves are well developed.

Diseases that can attack vegetables in summer include blight which attacks potatoes and tomatoes. Yellowishbrown patches appear on the leaves and these eventually turn black and die. White fungal strands grow on the leaf undersides. Cut back and burn the top growth on potatoes and destroy entire tomato plants. Unaffected plants should be sprayed with copper fungicide and again two weeks later, which may prevent the disease spreading. Potatoes should be dug up and used as soon as possible, though affected tubers may be discoloured with brown marks.

Clubroot is a serious disease that attacks members of the cabbage family. There's no cure and it'll remain in the soil more or less forever. The leaves of affected plants become discoloured and wilt, and the roots are distorted and swollen. The effects of the disease can be mitigated by improving drainage and liming a piece of ground especially for brassicas to around pH level 7.0. One solution is to start plants off in 10 cm(4 in) pots and put them out once a good rootball has formed. They'll still get affected but the healthy start will ensure a harvestable crop.

Downy mildew and grey mould (Botrytis) can often be prevented by

spacing plants well apart so that there's plenty of air movement. Virus diseases cause stunted growth and mottled foliage. There's no cure, so remove and burn affected leaves.

Vegetables to sow now also include beetroot, florence, fennel, Swiss chard, radicchio (leaf chicory) and turnips.

Water vegetables during dry weather, particularly newly transplanted ones and plants that produce pods or fruits like courgettes, runner beans and peas. If sowing seed, take out the drill, mix in a little coir compost which helps retain moisture, and water the drill well before sowing.

Greenhouse vegetables like aubergines, peppers and tomatoes should be fed weekly with liquid tomato fertilizer and watered whenever necessary, usually daily. Continue to snap off tomato side shoots and wind plants round their supporting strings. Stake and tie other plants. Ventilate the greenhouse all day, and during the night too if the weather's hot. Damp down paths frequently.

**Drought-tolerant plants** often prove their worth this month, when long spells of dry weather can really hit the garden hard. While many other plants look limp and exhausted, these relish every bit of baking sun and produce a wonderfully colourful show of flowers and foliage. The key to success is a sunny site and good drainage all year, as they detest having to sit in water, especially in winter.


Plants with grey foliage are generally drought-tolerant, like lad's love (Artemisia) with silver filigree leaves. Cotton lavender (Santolina) also has attractive, finely cut foliage and bears yellow 'buttons' of flowers. Convolvulus cneorum has delicate white blooms, Dorycnium hirsutum bears clusters of white flowers followed by red berries. Russian sage (Perovskia) has tall stems of branched blue flowers. All sages like dry soils, as does rue (Ruta graveolens) with its intensely blue leaves. If you have a sensitive skin, though, this one's best avoided since it can cause rashes. Anthemis tinctoria makes a lovely contrast with masses of lemon-yellow daisy flowers over a long period. Plants with felted wooly leaves like lamb's ears (Stachys lanata), Ballota pseudodictamnus and Salvia argentea are also very resistant to drought.





### Deliciously Simple

#### **Glazed Meat Loaf**

Menu

#### Serves 6 - 8 cold

450g/1lb lean minced beef

100g/4oz sausage meat

100g/4oz very finely chopped red pepper

100g/4oz very finely grated carrot

100g/4oz shredded, fat reduced cheese

100g/4oz finely chopped onion

l large garlic clove, finely chopped

100g/4oz brown breadcrumbs

2 tbsp. soy sauce

1 tbsp. chilli or tomato sauce ·

1 large egg or two small ones

1 tsp. mixed herbs

A little salt and pepper

#### Glaze

1 tbsp. brown sugar

1 tbsp. flour

1/2 tsp. mustard powder

Mix glaze ingredients together and sprinkle evenly in the base of a 20 cm x 10 cm x 6.5cm/8"x 4 "x  $2^{1}/_{2}$ " loaf tin.

#### Method

Thoroughly combine meats with remaining ingredients (preferably chopped in a food processor) adding egg and seasonings. Pack into prepared tin, smoothing down. Bake in a pre-heated oven 350°F/180°C/Gas Mark 4 for  $1^{1}/_{4}$  -  $1^{1}/_{2}$  hours.

If serving hot, allow to stand in tin for 10 minutes to absorb juices. Invert onto a shallow serving dish and spread any glaze remaining in tin evenly over top of meat loaf. Ideal for summer entertaining.

#### Mixed Vegetable Stir-Fry With Cashews

#### Serves 4

Cashews not only add crunch and body to this dish but are very nutritious and high in protein! Best made in a wok because there's more room for tossing, otherwise a large frying pan will do.

2.5 cm/1" piece of fresh ginger

1 large onion

1 red pepper

1 yellow pepper

100g/4oz carrots

100g/4oz mushrooms

100g/4oz mangetout

100g/4oz broccoli

4 spring onions

2 tbsp. pure vegetable oil

4 tbsp. cashew nuts

100g/4oz beansprouts

3 tbsp. Hoi-sin sauce (or any other stir-fry sauce)

#### Method

Grate the fresh ginger. Cut the onion and peppers in 2.5cm/1" chunks and the peeled carrots into thin sticks. Small mushrooms can be left whole, otherwise slice, top and tail the mangetout, break the broccoli into smallish florets and slice the spring onions.

Heat the oil in a wok or large pan and cook the cashews until brown. Remove the nuts and transfer to a plate.

Add the ginger to the hot oil, stir-fry for 20 seconds and add the onions, peppers and carrots. Fry and toss for 2-3 minutes and add the mushrooms, mangetout and broccoli. Stir-fry for 2-3 minutes more and then add the spring onions and beansprouts. Return the cashews and stir in the Hoi-sin sauce. Cook for a further 2-3 minutes and serve with plain rice.

#### Summer Fruit Flan

#### For 8 Servings:

3 eggs

75g(3oz) caster sugar 50g(2oz) plain flour

40g(11/, oz) butter, melted

25g (1oz) ground almonds

3 tbsp almond liqueur, optional

12 strawberries, halved

75g (3oz) blueberries

100g(4oz) seedless green grapes, halved 200g (7oz) can mandarin oranges

3 tbsp apricot jam

#### Preparation

Preheat oven. Grease a 23 cm (9in) round cake tin and line the base.

Put eggs and sugar in a bowl over a pan of hot water and whisk until creamy. Remove from heat and beat until

Using a metal spoon, gently fold the flour into the egg mixture. Fold in the melted butter and ground almonds. Pour into the prepared tin and bake for 30-35 mins until risen and beginning to shrink from the sides of the tin.


Turn out and leave to cool. Sprinkle with almond liqueur, if using.

Arrange fruit on top of the sponge, placing the strawberries and the blueberries in the centre and the grapes and mandarins around the edge.

Put the jam and 2 tbsp cold water in a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring, until it boils. Simmer for 1 min. Sieve and brush over fruit. Allow jam to cool and set before serving.

### KILDARE WIN BY SHOWING TRUE GRIT

#### Kildare 1-11 Laois 1-7

At last, Kildare supporters get the performance they deserve. It is still a long way to Croke Park on the last Sunday in September, but on Sunday, June 8th this Kildare team showed that they have the bottle necessary to take a team through a tough summer campaign. Whether, collectively, they have the talent to take Leinster and All-Ireland titles remains to be seen, but at least the foundation has been laid. No amount of skill can substitute for passion, determination and guts. That's where winning teams start from and, for the first time in a number of years, Kildare managed to display all three against Laois.

The game did not start auspiciously for Kildare. The Laois midfield angled a number of balls into the full forward line seeking to free Leo Turley from the shackles of the newly restored Davy Dalton. Turley was all action and Dalton seemed to be struggling. Then, after nine minutes the whole character of the match changed. Kildare supporters shook their heads in disbelief as first Johnny McDonald and then Martin Lynch were sent to the line. Two men down with an hour left to play. The Kildare full forward line was reduced to Padraig Gravin playing his first championship match. The effect of all of this seemed to be to give Kildare a slap in the face while on the other hand Laois proceeded to stumble around the pitch in a haze of complacency.

Led by the inspirational Glen Ryan, Kildare played clever possession football, transferring the ball quickly from player to player, creating space on the wings and sweeping up to support their diminished attack. All the players seemed focused. Each knew exactly what to do and, amazingly, Laois stood back and let them do it. For a while such was the state of disorganisation in the Laois camp that they kept

back their three full backs to mark Gravin. Not even Ronaldo gets that sort of respect from opposing defenders!

Five minutes before half time Laois scored a fairly slack goal but, typical of their spirit, Kildare immediately struck back with two pointed frees to go into the second half leading by a single point. We expected Laois to come storming back but, instead Kildare proved the fitter and more determined team in the second half and ran out comfortable winners.

It is quite difficult to assess this performance in the cold light of day. Beyond their tremendous spirit, Kildare played a brand of football which they have been threatening for several years. Their passing game, developed under Mick O'Dwyer's last reign equipped them to deal with the setback of having only four forwards for most of the game. The manner of the victory will act as a huge confidence to a team which has repeatedly disappointed at the highest level. On the other side of the coin, the forwards, albeit that there were only four of them, failed to score from play and altogether only 0-2 of 1-11 came from play. The referee certainly seemed to bend over backwards to balance things up after the two sendings off - Kildare were awarded 49 frees to Laois's 17. In addition, Laois were totally inept when it came to exploiting their numerical advantage and seemed to lose all concentration when it came to countering Kildare's game plan.

And so, it's Kildare and Meath in Croke Park on July 6th. Kildare can win. But they must take every single chance conceded by a tight marking Meath defence. A short passing game will not be enough to bypass the like of Darren Fay and Mark O'Reilly. If they can work those scores then June 8th proved that they have what it takes when it comes to fitness and determination.

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


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### TUG-OF-WAR REPORT



#### COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

#### New Community Council members

The Council has approved the co-option of Mr. Dermot O'Hurley and Mr. Gerald MacCann from Moyglare and Mr. Adrian O'Donovan from Beaufield.

#### "Civic Amenity Centre" will not be in Maynooth

Kildare County Councillors on the Celbridge Area Committee have voted to reject the proposal by Council Officials to locate the Civic Amenity Centre in Maynooth. The proposal, which will not now go ahead, was to be located at the Council's own

land on the Leixlip Road. The Community Council were informed that although the Celbridge Area Councillors are in favour of a waste recycling facility, they felt that this site is unsuitable for that purpose.

#### Neon Sign not suitable for Main Street

Following the outrage expressed by residents of the town in phone calls to the Community Council office, a letter was written to Kildare County Council objecting to the new sign over a fast food outlet in the Main Street.

### Community Council seek political support to achieve Town Commission

Maynooth Community Council unanimously endorsed a proposal to seek the support of the elected Dail representatives for the Kildare North Constituency to pursue our case to achieve Town Commission status.

### PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

#### Grants available for traditional Shop fronts.

The Planning and Development Committee is to seek the details of drawings and the funding available to businesses that wish to meet the standards set by Kildare County Council in order to obtain this grant. The matter arose during a discussion regarding the preparation of our application for heritage town status.

#### Community/Sports Centre for Maynooth discussed

The Government's strategy group report on providing for all levels of sport both for leisure and competitive was discussed. An audit of all community sports facilities will be carried out by the strategy group. Some funding will be made available for the development of community and leisure time facilities where they are required. This committee, in partnership with other groups would like to complete a proposal to ensure that Maynooth is recognised as a place of need in this regard. We all know that Maynooth has not been flooded with National Lottery Funding for a town of our size.

Agreement to be sought on the upkeep of Carton Avenue.

There were calls for Kildare County Council to relinquish it's responsibility to maintain Carton Avenue. The Council do not keep the grass cut there, following the removal of permission for the Maynooth Tidy Towns Fás Scheme to maintain it. Support for this proposal will be sought from Maynooth Community Council.

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#### Traffic Bye-laws could still be a year away.

Traffic chaos is set to continue in Maynooth's Main Street area for possibly another year before parking restrictions become a reality. We have been informed that prior to the recent announcement from the Dept. of the Environment, no formal appeal structure was in place. Therefore, the new bye-laws will go on display on October 1st next, for the public response. If there are any objections, it could mean that it will be this time next year, before this insane situation is corrected.

#### Maynooth Castle restoration to start this Autumn.

The revised plans for restoring the Castle, which resulted following examination of the site, have been submitted to Kildare County Council. The Castle Committee hope that work could begin later this year.

County Development Plan sent to Minister Dempsey.

Kildare County Councillors have sent the complete county Development Plan to the Department of the Environment. This overall development strategy should go on public display for three months, if the Minister approves the document. The exact procedure is still unclear regarding the status of the Maynooth Development Plan. The majority of the Councillors on the Celbridge Area Committee, have reduced the number of acres they consider necessary for this five year plan, particularly as Maynooth grew at such a rapid pace in the last five years.

What is a Citizens Information Centre?

#### Answer:

Previously known as Community Information Centres, since their establishment in 1974, this is a public service just like a Citizens Advice Bureau. The national network of Centres are there for the benefit of the community and backed by the National Social Service Board (NSSB). The Citizens Information centres have access to up-to-date information on all matters of public concern, i.e. Health, Social Welfare, Taxation, Housing, Consumer Affairs and other matters including information on local organisations and services. The service is delivered by local people who receive training and back-up from the NSSB.

There is no charge for the service and it is not necessary to make an appointment. It is confidential. The Citizens Information Centre philosophy is that you have the Right to Know. It will help you to find out.



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#### MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

The new Minister for the Environment, Mr. Noel Dempsey, has now called for Kildare Co. Council's Draft Development Plan and is currently considering how to deal with the controversial proposals for rezoning for the North Kildare towns. His decision will have major implications not just for the future of Maynooth, but for several of the North Kildare towns. Sadly a golden opportunity to safeguard the character of Maynooth may be missed, because this County Development Plan could have been a good one if the original recommendations of the professional planners who drew it up had been followed by county councillors. But they chose instead to delete the key proposals in it, actions which facilitate substantial rezoning in Maynooth by them. In its earlier draft the County Development Plan recommended a shift in new residential growth areas away from towns such as Maynooth and Celbridge towards the centre and southern parts of the county. The key section reads as

"It is the policy of the Council to promote the southward move of development within the county to re-direct pressures from the north-east and to encourage the spread of development through the towns of the centre to the west and south of the county.... The substantial zoning of land in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement and aims of this policy."

However, such specific proposals were greeted with horror by some county councillors, and all references to discouraging substantial rezoning of land in Maynooth were deleted. Some councillors from Maynooth supported the gutting of the plan in this way and effectively what has gone to the Minister is a rezoners' charter devoid of any semblance of the strategic approach called for by the previous Minister last September. Through its associates in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning, Maynooth Planning Alliance has emphasised to the Minister the folly of entrusting Kildare County Councillors to plan the future development of the county on the basis of this half baked plan.

Maynooth is growing rapidly, by some 40% over the past five years. Councillors, in the last outing of the Draft Maynooth Development Plan proposed accelerating this to facilitate a doubling of the population of the town over the next five years. Last year, there were 106 acres of unused residential development land available for housing in the town, enough for a 40% increase in population over the period 1996-2001. The rate at which this is being developed is obviously important in planning for services such as schools, health services, gas, water, electricity etc, in particular, to try and anticipate what the present and future demand for school places is likely to be. Maynooth Planning Alliance have been conducting a large scale survey of households in the town over the past few months. If you have participated in this we thank you for your help in filling the form which was distributed through the various Residents' Associations. Analysis of the results will commence shortly and we will keep you informed of the results.

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

Volunteers will continue to collect this amount until all funds have been received. Failure by residents in

Moyglare Village to pay this amount will mean that the fee will need to be increased and a second collection will take place.

## Your Pet could be your neighbours threat

For many children having their own pet, particularly a dog or cat can give them a great sense of fullfilment. However, some residents in Moyglare Village need to give greater consideration to their neighbours because their pets cause a nuisance to them.

Residents should not allow dogs to roam and in fact should keep them on a lead when taking them for walks.

Remember, some small children living in this area fear dogs and it is unfair to them. Furthermore if other residents wanted pets in their gardens they would surely get one of their own, health considerations aside.

# Parking and traffic calming measures sought for Moyglare Village

Because of the poor quality of public transport to Maynooth many residents in Moyglare Village like elsewhere in the town need to own and use two private cars. This volume of traffic has raised calls for ramps to be installed in Moyglare Village to slow down traffic. Some houses have more than two cars and are causing considerable congestion, particularly along the main road in the estate. In the interest of safety, residents should park as many of their cars as possible in their own driveways.

# Upkeep of the grass verges on the Moyglare Road

The height of the grass in the verge along the right hand side of the road is disgraceful. Kildare County Council do not maintain this wilderness and as a consequence litter collects there as well as in the ditch outside the schools. Residents are encouraged to contact the local Kildare County Council office to complain about the condition of the verge.

#### Cluain Aoibhinn Residents Association

The CARA Annual General Meeting was held on June 25th in the Gaelscoil, Beaufield. There was a moderate turnout, and several decisions were arrived at unanimously:

- An annual fee of £20 per household is to be paid. This money will be used for the maintenance of Cluain Aoibhinn, thus improving the appearance and increasing the value of our homes. Some landlords have made donations to the fund, and residents are asked to pay the £20 to Rose Hayes at no. 69.
- Residents expressed concern at the news that Thorntons are planning a giant dump in the Maynooth area. It was pointed out that some Residents Associations in Maynooth have discontinued the use of Thorntons waste disposal service as a direct consequence of these plans, and CARA will be reviewing the matter soon with those residents who use Thorntons, before the renewal date (Jan 98).
- A meeting to discuss the matter of Estate security will be held late in the Summer. The local Gardai will be present to advise the residents. Proposals to install a

video surveillance system will be fully debated at this meeting. The issues of cost and privacy will be discussed, so we would welcome a good turnout to hear everybody's opinion. The meeting will be held in the last week in August - the exact date, time and venue to be advised.

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# Deliciously Simple

#### **GOLDEN STUFFED POTATOES**

Serves 2



2 large baking potatoes 2 anchovy fillets, finely chopped 1 tablespoon natural yogurt 1 finely chopped scallion (Spring Onion)

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tablespoon lemon juice 1 tablespoon of chopped fresh parsley or chives.


Scrub potatoes and bake in a hot oven until tender with crisp skins. Mash anchovies and combine with yogurt and scallion. Cut the tops from the hot, cooked potatoes and scoop out flesh, leaving a 1/4 " thick shell.

Mash and combine with the anchovy mixture. Add lemon juice to taste and season. Fill mixture back into potato shells and place under a hot grill until golden brown.

Sprinkle with herbs before serving. You can use diced ham, pepper etc. if you do not want to use the anchovies.

#### BRUSCHETTA WITH TOMATO, CHEESE AND ONION

Thick slices vienna roll or french stick. Cloves of garlic Butter Sliced tomatoes



Toast bread slices until golden. Cut cloves of garlic in half and rub over the surface of the bread while it is still hot. Spread lightly with butter. Add cheese, tomatoe and onion, grill on a low heat until melted and golden brown.

Serve immediately.

#### SMOKED SALMON PEARLS

Makes 16 nibbles

2 slices of bread, made into breadcrumbs 1 tub of Golden Vale Salmon Leap Spread 90g/3oz peanuts lemon quarters brown bread

Make the breadcrumbs in a food processor. Crush peanuts (not too finely) in a food processor. Blend the Salmon Leap with the crumbs and form small pearls from the mixture. Roll the pearls in the peanuts and chill for 30 minutes.

Serve as a starter, or snack, with brown bread and lemon quarters.

#### **BANANA BREAD**


300g/10oz bananas, peeled weight 180g/6oz of granulated sugar 2 standard eggs 90g/3oz butter 240g/8oz plain flour 1/, level teaspoon salt level teaspoons baking powder

Cream butter and sugar in mixing bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, and beat in well. Mash bananas and beat into mixture. Sieve flour, salt and baking powder and stir one tablespoon of this mixture into the nuts. Add rest to the mixture, then add the nuts and stir well.

Bake in greased loaf tin 230mm x 130mm x 65mm (9"x5"x21/2") at 180° C/350° F/Gas 4 for about 1-11/.

#### MUSHROOM SOUP

Serves 2



Wipe mushrooms and chop finely. Sauté onions in butter or oil until onion is transparent. Stir in mushrooms, potato, stock and thyme. Simmer for 30 minutes. Taste and season. Serve with a swirl of cream or yogurt.

#### CITRUS SURPRISE

Makes 2 glasses


300ml/1/2 pint of cold milk 1<sup>1</sup>/, tablespoons of vanilla ice cream tablespoon of lemon juice Juice of one medium orange 30g/1oz of caster sugar Orange or lemon slices to garnish

Put milk, ice cream, lemon juice. orange juice and caster sugar into a blender or liquidiser. Liquidise or blend for 1-2 minutes or until all the ingredients are thoroughly integrated. Pour into tall glasses and decorate with the citrus slices. Serve immediately.

#### **STRAWBERRY BLONDE**

Makes 2 Glasses 300ml/1/, pint cold milk 1 small tin of strawberries 2 tablespoons vanilla ice cream 1<sup>1</sup>/, tablespoons of lightly whipped

Whisk together or liquidise the milk, ice-cream and drained strawberries. Pour into tall glasses and top with some of the lightly whipped cream. Serve immediately.





#### VIDEO REVIEW

#### SLEEPERS (18'S)

This is a true story about four young boys from Hell's Kitchen in New York. When they are responsible for a tragic accident while stealing hot dogs, they wind up in the Wilkinson Home for Boys. Once inside, they become victims of a cruel regime led by a sadistic prison guard. suffering both physical and sexual abuse.

Years later two of the boys, now grown men, accidentally meet the guard, who had caused them so much pain, and shoot him dead. The resulting court case provides the way for the four lads to get their revenge on three other guards who had made their lives a living hell.

Directed by Barry Levinson and starring Brad Pitt, Robert De Niro, Dustin Hoffman, Jason Patric and Kevin Bacon, this is an extremely thought provoking and dramatic film that's constantly watchable and very stylishly made. Acting is excellent, direction is first rate and should hold your attention from start to finish.

Verdict: Surprisingly good.

#### Evita (18's)

Evita has all the ingredients of an epic film; what we used to call a 'A Big Picture'. Madonna is in it. Antonio Banderas is in it. Alan Parker directs it and the music, if you didn't already know, is by Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice. It's beautifully photographed and the sets are absolutely stunning, faithful to the period of the story. Madonna gives her best (of a bad lot) performance to date as Eva Peron, the woman whose spirit captivated the Argentinian nation, and Antonio Banderas actually looks as if he can act a bit, although this is probably due mostly to Parker's direction. However, as most people will admit, looks aren't everything. Compared to the great classical musicals of Rogers and Hammerstein, on a scale of one to ten this one scores about five. Maybe this musical was never intended to make the transition from stage to screen, because something is definitely missing. Still, well worth seeing if only out of curiosity as to how Madonna handles the role. Verdict: Fans of the would-be Blond Bombshell will love it!

#### Fled (18's)

This is a standard escape action film, as two prisoners on a chain gang make their escape while on work detail in Georgia. They flag down a car driven by a pretty girl who helps them get rid of their handcuffs and prison garb, and from then on it's a case of staying one jump ahead of the law, the Mafia and uncle Tom Cobbley and all! You don't have to be a member of the brains trust to guess the rest, it's all been done before, sometimes better sometimes worse. Nonetheless there are good performances from Laurence Fishburne and Stephen Baldwin as our two escapees, and it's a well photographed and tautly directed piece.

There's absolutely nothing original about this movie, but if it's a rainy day it will definitely pass a good hour-and-half or

#### HOW MAYNOOTH VOTED

The report on how Maynooth voted in the 1992 General Election, carried in the January 1993 issue of the Maynooth Newsletter, highlighted a big shift to Labour at the expense of both Fine Gael and Fianna Fail. In the recent general Election, there was an even bigger drop in the Labour vote compared with 1992, from 36% to 25%. However, this was not simply a case of these voters shifting back to previous allegiances as the increase in the Fine Gael and Fianna Fail votes were relatively marginal, from 27% to 28% and 25% to 29% respectively. In fact, the main beneficiary of the drop in the Labour vote was Catherine Murphy of Democratic Left, whose share of the vote rose from just 3% to 11%. The PD and Green Party votes remained much the same, at 4% each.

However, it would be wrong to interpret these figures as meaning that those who voted Labour in 1992 transferred in large numbers to Democratic Left in 1997. What is more likely to have happened is that many of the new voters who have settled in Maynooth in the interim voted for Catherine Murphy, with few of them voting for Labour. This is suggested by the fact that in Box No. 10, embracing Parklands, Catherine Murphy outpolled all other candidates with 95 votes. Whereas rezoning was not a major issue in the election in the Kildare North constituency generally, it presumably was important for Parklands residents.

Old Greenfield (Box 4) remained a true bastion of Labour support, yielding 151 votes (almost half of the total) for Emmet Stagg. Here, Bernard Durkan also polled strongly (85 votes compared with just 67 for the two Fianna Fail candidates combined, and very few for anyone else). However, in both absolute and relative terms, Bernard Durkan's top performance came from Box 7 (mainly Leinster Park and Mariaville), where he obtained 95 votes one third of the total.

For Fianna Fail, the overall vote was fairly evenly split between Paul Kelly (15.6%) and Charlie McCreevy (13.5%). Perhaps if Fianna Fail voters had obeyed party instructions and opted for Kelly in Maynooth, he could have been in the shake-up for the last seat. In four of the 12 Maynooth boxes, McCreevy actually outpolled Kelly. Overall, Fianna Fail did particularly well in Box 9 (mainly Moyglare and Newtown), where they obtained 36% from a low poll. They also did well in Boxes 1 (Beaufield) and 8 (Maynooth Park/Meadowbrook).

Apart from Parklands, Democratic Left also had above-average performances in Boxes 2 (Carton Court/Cluain Aoibhinn), 9 (Moyglare/Newtown) and 11 (Railpark/Rocklands). The latter provide further evidence that rezoning was an important ingredient in support for Catherine Murphy, although the existence of a nest of DL supporters in Railpark has previously been noted in the Maynooth Newsletter's election reports! Both the Green

Party and the PDs got above-average support from the Parklands box; combined with the DL vote, this suggests a strong tendency among residents of this estate to go against the conventional grain in Irish politics. However, one would not wish to exaggerate this: between them, Labour, Fianna Fail and Fine Gael still got two thirds of the vote in this box (compared with over 80% in Maynooth all told). Incidentally, the Parklands box had by far the highest turnout in Maynooth, suggesting a high level of involvement on the part of one of Maynooth's newest housing areas. Easily the lowest turnout came, predictably enough, given the time of year, from Box 3, which embraces Maynooth College.

The above information comes from the tally figures which, as ever, were produced on a cooperative basis by all the political parties under the expert organisation of Charlie McCreevy and his expert associate Kathleen O'Neill, well-known to many Maynooth people. It is not possible to compare with any great accuracy how different parts of Maynooth voted as between 1992 and 1997, as the number of polling boxes increased from nine to 12 and the local areas were redistributed accordingly.



### **Kildare Come of Age in Epic Matches**

In forty years time those of us lucky enough to be still around will be reminiscing about the summer of '97 when Kildare and Meath met in three (?) epic matches in Croke Park. So far we have seen two great games of football and the match on July 20th was one of the most enthroning sporting events this writer has had the privilege of attending. Over the two games we have have had almost three hours of non stop action, drama and nail biting tension. That these sporting feasts have been served up by amateur players does great credit to Gaelic Games and makes a telling contrast with the much hyped F.A. Premiership where pampered players expect to earn thirty or forty thousand pounds a week.

Whatever the final outcome, and who but a fool would predict the result of the second replay, Kildare have laid to rest some of the ghosts that have haunted the county teams for the last twenty years or more. This Kildare team is a very good football team. Level of skill running from goalkeeper through to corner forward. At times it has displayed tremendous team-work, first in evidence against Laois, but much more impressively when the chips were down against Meath. And finally, there is an iron confidence which no Kildare side in the last three decades has managed to preserve when the stakes have been highest.

Having said all that it is also true to say, in the words of Eamonn Dunphy, this is a good team, not a great team. At least not yet. On the field, man for man, they are more than a match for any 15 Meath have so far fielded. Davy Dalton, Glen Ryan, Niall Buckley, Eddie McCormack and Declan Kerrigan have performed at a level matched by few of the Meath players. There are no longer any obvious weaknesses among the first 15. And yet despite the majority of possession, better team-work and substantial leads in both matches, they have failed to put Meath away.

In the first match Kildare led Meath 1-5 to 0-5 at half time. Kildare were playing very well and Meath very badly. A great Kildare team would have led by seven or eight points at that stage and would have been good enough to see off a stuttering Meath come-back.

In the replay Kildare gained almost total dominance during periods in the second half. Willie McCreery won a fantastic amount of possession in midfield but, with ample opportunities, the forwards kicked 11 wides and left the door ajar for a Meath come-back. Again, Kildare led 3-16 to 2-13 in extra time although Meath's eventual come-back inspired by Jody Devine would have defied the most resilient of teams.

What all of this tends to suggest is that while Kildare cannot yet be described as a great team, Meath are certainly no world beaters. What Meath have going for them is that they seem impossible to beat. In their last five big matches at Croke Park - Mayo twice, Dublin, Kildare twice - they have,

on balance, been outplayed in most of them. But what may give Kildare hope is that Meath lack some of the inspirational forward play that won them some big matches in the years 1987 - 91. They do not have a finisher of the calibre of Bernard Flynn, for example There is a high and the full forward line in this team is much more work manlike than the famous O'Rourke - Stafford-Flynn combination. Starved of possession the current Meath forwards do not inspire the same confidence that they can steal games that might otherwise be lost. "Divine" inspiration got Meath a draw on July 20th but it must be doubtful if Meath can continue to defy the odds.

Kildare will win on August 3rd if they maintain the level of team-work and absolute commitment displayed in the two matches so far. But they must also take their chances and kick far less than the 19 wides kicked in the first replay. Meath can only win if Kildare disimprove or Meath find something extra, over and above what has been evident in their performances to date. Whichever team wins, the games we have witnessed this summer will live long in the memory. It has been a privilege, and for Kildare, glory may lie ahead.

#### 150 YEARS OLD MAYNOOTH RAILWAY STATION 1847-1997

The Freemans Journal on 26th June 1847 carried the following advertisement.

MIDLAND GREAT WESTERN
RAILWAY OF IRELAND
This line will be OPENED on
MONDAY 28th June, from the
TERMINUS, BROADSTONE,
UPPER DOMINIC STREET,
DUBLIN to ENFIELD, in connection
with the Royal Canal to Mullingar and
Longford.

Down trains from Dublin to Enfield 6a.m., 7a.m., 12 noon, 5p.m.
Up trains from Enfield to Dublin 8.30a.m., 10a.m., 3p.m., 7p.m.
The 6a.m. down and the 8.30a.m. up train will not run on Sundays.
Return Tickets will be issued on Sundays.

#### PASSAGE BOAT ARRANGEMENTS

Fly Boats proceed to Mullingar on arrival of 7a.m. and 12 noon train at Enfield

Night Boats proceed to Mullingar and Longford on arrival of 5p.m. train at Enfield.

Fly Boats leave Mullingar at 6.15 a.m., 3.15 p.m. and arrive at Enfield for 10 a.m and 7 p.m. trains.

Trains to Dublin.

Night Boats leave Longford at 7 p.m. arrives at Enfield for 8.30 a.m. Train to Dublin.

Coaches and other conveyances for Galway, Athlone, Sligo, Edenderry, Trim, Athboy, Kells & County, will run in connection with the Trains. Time and Fare Tables can be had at all the Stations.

Parcels can be booked at Mr. Haughton's 25 St. Andrew Street, and Mr. Lacy's, 8 Ushers Quay. By Order HENRY BEAUSIRE, Secretary 23 College Green, Dublin 23rd June, 1847.

There were 4 passenger classes until 1865 and 3 classes until 1914. The fares were 1st. 2/6,

2nd 2/-, 3rd.1/3, 4th. 10d. A horse's fare was 5/-. The time taken to travel from Dublin to Maynooth was much the same as it is now.

This advertisement had been eagerly awaited. Before that, the Royal Canal was the only way to convey a large number of passengers through Maynooth. The Royal Canal Company began its passenger service on 2nd December 1796 between Dublin and Kilcock. The only stop on the journey was at Leixlip. In 1799, the boat began to call at Maynooth. In 1999, the bicentenary should form part of Maynooth Festival.

The Midland Great Western Co. bought the Royal Canal in 1845 for a third of its original cost. The plan was for a main line from Dublin to Mullingar with later extensions to Athlone and Galway. This provided for a main track right across the heart of Ireland from east to west. The first 35 miles of the route to Mullingar follows very closely that of the Royal Canal. By following the course of the Canal, it got the land cheaply and construction was easy. No major earthworks were required and many stretches of the line were level. The contract to build the railway as far as Enfield was awarded to Messrs Jeffs. It cost £70,000 for the 26 miles of track. The first sod was cut on 8th June 1846 and the first 26 miles as far as Enfield completed in the remarkably short time of 10 months. The opening of this section of the line took place on 28th June 1847. The stations on the line were Blanchardstown, Clonsilla, Lucan, Leixlip, Maynooth, Kilcock and Enfield. In Dublin, the Midland terminus at Broadstone was built in 1850. The principal sheds, workshops and the headquarters of the line were there. Practically every engine had its own name. The names were carried on brass plates. One train bore the Maynooth name plate.

#### Freemans Journal 29th June 1847

Yesterday, the above line of railway was opened for public traffic as far as Enfield. The first engine that started was the Dunsandle, and altogether, four trains left the terminus at

Broadstone during the day. The carriages, particularly the first and second class, are got up in a very superior style. In some of the first class carriages, there are beds fitted up, something after the fashion of berths in steam packets, and there are other carriages for the exclusive use of ladies when they travel alone, and do not wish to enter mixed trains. The usual formalities were observed on the occasion of opening the line and the trains went alright under the superintendence of Mr. Deurance the head inspector of the locomotive department. Although the machinery was necessarily "stiff", it being the first time the engines were used, every thing passed off with the utmost success and to the satisfaction of all parties concerned.

In Dublin, in order to gain access to the docks, the Liffey branch line was constructed and opened in 1864. This followed the course of the Royal Canal around the Northern edge of the city. All the Dublin freight traffic of the Midlands was then handled at North Wall goods depot. The cattle traffic continued to use the special depot at Broadstone. In 1937, passenger services were brought as far as Amiens Street and Westland Row, now known as Connolly and Pearse, Extensions westwards were as follows - Galway (1851); Longford (1855); Sligo (1862); Westport (1866); Ballina (1873); Kilalla (1893-1934); Achill (1895-1937); Clifden (1895-1935).

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#### HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

- 1. Wrap frozen food in layers of insulating material, such as newspaper while the fridge is defrosting.
- 2. As Vitamin C dissolves in water cook vegetables and fruit in the least amount of water and for the shortest time necessary.
- Deep coloured paper napkins can 'bleed' on to pale cloths if they get wet, so take care not to use a bright red paper napkin to wipe up a spill on a white cloth.
- 4. You can ensure there will be no re-occurrence of wet rot by treating all wood, new and existing, with a preservative.
- 5. Never pour water over a chip pan which has caught alight or carry the pan outside. Turn off the cooker. Soak a towel/teatowel in water and place it over the chip
- Wash new dark coloured towels separately for at least 6 washes as the colour is apt to run into other washing.



# **Party Political Notes**

#### MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES

#### **Tony Smith Memorial Walk**

The proceeds of our Annual walk in aid of Maynooth Senior Citizens were handed over to the Senior Citizens Committee at a function in Caulfields which was held on July 17th.

A record sum of £1,851.50 was raised this year and a cheque for that amount was presented by Cllr. John McGinley to the Chairperson of the Senior Citizens Committee Josie Moore.

We would like to thank the people of Maynooth for their continued support.

#### **Bond Bridge**

The County Manager and County Engineer attended the area committee meeting on 11th June to try to finalise this long outstanding problem. Unfortunately, it was not possible to resolve the problem at this meeting and a special meeting will be held on 31st July in an attempt to reach consensus.

#### **New Public Lights for Pound Park**

Following consultation with local residents, Cllr. John McGinely has agreed the location of the three new public lights with the E.S.B. The additional lighting follows from a request by Emmet Stagg T.D. and will enhance the area and make it safer.

#### Carton Avenue

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the full council:

"That this Council leases Carton Avenue, Maynooth, to the Maynooth Community Council in order to ensure that the grass is cut and the Avenue is maintained".

The Motion, if agreed, will overcome the difficulties that the Tidy Towns Committee has encountered in maintaining the Avenue.

#### Meadowbrook - Enforcement Notice

Emmet Stagg T.D. has been advised by Kildare Co. Council that an Enforcement notice is to issue to the developer of Meadowbrook. The notice is the first step in forcing the developer to complete the estate to the standards as laid down in the Planning Permission.

#### Straffan Road

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the next Celbridge Area Committee meeting:

"That this Council arranges for the clean-up of the disgraceful mess resulting from the landscaping carried out as part of the upgrading of Straffan Road, Maynooth".

The weeds and thistles are now higher than the shrubs. There isn't much point in the Council spending large amounts of tax payers money on landscaping and shrub and tree planting if they don't maintain them afterwards. When Cllr. John McGinley made this comment at the last area meeting in relation to the new linear park in Leixlip the County Manager gave an assurance that the park would be maintained. The same policy should also apply to the Straffan Road and other areas throughout the County that have been landscaped by the Council.

#### 'Aerial' Litter

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the area Committee:

"That this Council enforces the litter laws against those who put "Houses for Sale" or other illegal signs on utility poles in Maynooth and other towns".

These signs are litter and they are cheapening our area. The amount of them erected on poles on the Straffan Road would have the opposite effect to that intended - it would not encourage people to live here.

#### **Doctors Lane**

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to the area Committee

"That Doctors Lane be closed off at the Dublin Road end this year, as agreed in the Maynooth Town Improvement Plan".

Doctors Lane is presently being used as a rat run to avoid the traffic lights on Main Street. It is now extremely dangerous for pedestrians. With pedestrians exiting from the new car park and the Library onto Doctors Lane, it is only a matter of time before a serious accident occurs.

#### **Maynooth Boys National School**

Following representations to the Minister for Education, Emmet Stagg T.D. has been advised that the Department have now approved a grant towards the cost of improvement works at Maynooth Boys National School. The works include the re-surfacing of the play area in the school.

#### Maynooth/Barberstown Road


The County Engineer and County Manager have been requested by Cllr. John McGinley to give the Maynooth/Barberstown Road number 1 priority for non-national road grants.

Realignment of the road is needed in a number of critical areas and the amount of traffic now using it warrants significant expenditure. Improving the road would also help alleviate the problems in Celbridge Main Street as Clane traffic would use the Barberstown Road to the motorway instead.

#### Footpath O'Neill Park

Following further representations from residents, Emmet Stagg T.D. has asked the Co. Engineer to repair the footpath outside no's 545 and 546 O'Neill Park.

# Gardening Hints



#### Herbs for the patio

Most herbs are naturally compact, scented and drought-tolerant and they do well in the warmth and shelter of a patio. Being near the house makes them convenient for picking. Very compact herbs, such as parsley, thyme, coloured-leaved sages and the various basils, are particularly suitable for hanging baskets, while mints, scented-leaved pelargoniums (some of which are good for cooking), chives, French tarragon and nasturtium or calendula marigold (both of which have edible petals) will grow in containers.

Trimmed bay trees or a large group of small-leaved sweet basil make good specimen plants in large pots to stand on either side of a door. You can grow herbs in raised beds and the very drought-tolerant varieties, such as creeping thymes, will grow in gaps made where paving slabs have been removed. They do not mind being trodden on occasionally and when they are bruised, they release wonderful herbal scents. Naturally you cannot use chemicals to keep the patio weeded once the cracks are planted with herbs; hand weeding with an old dinner fork or a daisy grubber is the safest answer.

#### Thyme, sage and verbena

Variegated and coloured-leaved herbs make attractive additions to baskets and wall planters. They often perform better than more conventional basket plants in hot, dry summers, thriving in the well-drained conditions and not minding the occasional missed watering. They also smell good, so hang them where people can gently rub the foliage and release the aromatic oils. In general, variegated herbs are not as strongly flavoured as plainleaved species, but their foliage is useful for garnishing dishes and drinks. If you are growing herbs in a basket for the kitchen, you could plant a combination of good culinary types along with more decorative varieties and add a few edible flowers, such as nasturtium, Calendula (pot marigold) and viola for extra colour. Herbs add significantly to the range of foliage plants that you can use in baskets. For baskets in full sun, try sages, such as the all-purple Salvia officinalis 'Purpurascens', the pretty pink, white and purple variegated S.o. 'Tricolour' or the yellow-variegated S. o. 'Icterina'. Creeping thymes are useful all year round for covering the sides of basketsplant bushier more upright types in the top. There are many golden and variegated varieties to choose from and you will find them in both the herb and alpine sections of garden centres. For baskets in shade, try using one of the variegated mints, golden marjoram or the feathery leaved golden feverfew.

1. Terracotta wall pots in sunny positions lose moisture rapidly, so always line them with plastic before planting. Cut a hole in it for drainage.

- 2. To ensure that the hole at the bottom does not clog up with potting mixture, add a layer of gravel or stone chippings before filling the planter with soil.
- 3. For a seasonal mixture of herbs and bedding plants, use a peat based multi-purpose potting mix. For longer-term herb plantings, choose a soil-based mix.
- 4. Plant the gold-variegated lemon thyme in the centre of the wall pot to soften the edge. Add a variegated sage behind and slightly to one side. The sage will need pinching out to keep it bushy and in scale with the container.
- 5. Plant a white-flowered trailing or upright verbena in the centre and another variegated sage to match the one on the opposite side. Deep cerise-pink, scarlet, purple or golden-yellow flowers would work equally well.
- 6. Fill the gaps at each end with more verbenas. Most trailing types will need cutting back now and then to keep them under control. This may not be necessary with the blue-purple cascade variety, which has more delicate foliage and flower.
- 7. Hang the arrangement on a wall that is in sun for at least half the day. Feed and water regularly. Keep a watch for powdery mildew on the verbenas and spray them with a systemic fungicide at the first sign.

#### A Spring Basket



At the end of summer, dismantle the basket, removing the salvias and verbenas. You could leave the thyme in position and fill the space behind with crocus bulbs, such as Crocus chrysanthus 'Cream Beauty' or 'Zwanenburg Bronze', or gentian blue Scilla sibirica. Pack the bulbs in tightly for a good display in early spring, or remove all the plants and replace them with blue or purple winterflowering pansies.



#### Checklist:




- Stop feeding roses, and shrubs in containers, as it'll encourage soft growth that will be prone to frost damage.
- · Complete summer-pruning of wisterias.
- Propagate rhododendrons by layering.
- Finish trimming conifer and evergreen shrub hedges.
- Start preparing ground for seeding new lawns next month
- Pot hyacinths for Christmas flowering indoors.
- Prune summer-fruiting raspberries, taking out fruited canes and tying in new ones 10cm (4in) apart.
- Prop up heavily laden branches of fruit trees.
- Prune side shoots on gooseberry cordons to within 1 in of the old wood.
- · Cut and dry herbs for winter.
- · Earth up or wrap blanching varieties of celery.
- Lift, dry and store onions and garlic.

#### Dirty Old Town

Work on the refurbishment of Main St. is due to start this Autumn and no doubt when the project is finished the appearance of Maynooth will be much improved. At the moment though the town is not looking its best. Apart from the usual litter problems the state of the Straffan Road from the interchange all the way down to the Square is a disgrace. In some places the grass and weeds are four feet high. Grass verges in other parts of the town also remain uncut - notably at the end of the Dunboyne Road. While Maynooth Tidy Townshave a role to play in the maintenance of the town environment this can be no substitute for a committment by Kildare Co. Council. The refurbishment of Main St. will be a once off project - funded largely by the National Roads Authority and the EU - but what is needed on an ongoing basis is for the Co. Council to commit staff to Maynooth. We are, after all, a town of over 10,000 people and are entitled to a much better service from our local authority.

# **Letter To The Editor**

### LETTER TO EDITOR

#### Re: Bond Bridge, Maynooth

I write to express my serious concern at the amount of inaccurate information supplied by Council Officials to both the Celbridge Area Committee and the full Council during 1996 in relation to Bond Bridge.

The Area Committee was advised that the cost of the new bridge would be £750,000. I subsequently put a motion to the full Council Meeting on 27th May 1996 outlining the levies paid, the cost of the new bridge and the shortfall at £517.124.

All Council Officials present accepted the £750,000 cost. I asked that the Council seeks approval from the Department of the Environment to take out the loan necessary to build the new bridge forthwith and that this loan would be repaid from Special Development Levies on the 50 acres still to be developed.

The Council Road Section replied to me on 8th November 1996 as follows:

"The Council sought a special grant of £500,000 earlier this year for the reconstruction of Bond Bridge. It was intended to supplement this grant with development levies of £350,000 (this was already collected and £120,000 was spent on buttressing the bridge).

The Department replied to the effect that in light of the priorities relating to the E.U. co-financed Schemes there was no prospect of funds from that area in 1997 for Bond Bridge. The Department added that it was open to the Council to raise a loan for the project."

At a Celbridge Area Meeting on the same day as the date on the above letter (8 Nov 1996), we were advised by the Project Engineer, that the cost of the bridge had now risen to £900,000. The extra £150,000 being due to CIE's bridge height requirements.

Five days (13th Nov 1996) later in a report to the Estimates Committee Meeting of the Council, the County Manager gave the cost of the bridge at £1.5 million. When I sought clarification on this extraordinary jump in the cost in just FIVE DAYS, the County Manager advised that the extra £600,000 was for the new Meadowbrook Link to the Straffan Road and for work on the Rathcoffey Road. The Acting County Engineer stated that the Meadowbrook Link was vital in order to provide a detour during construction of the new bridge.

At the Estimates Meeting on 18th November 1996 I had detailed discussions with the then County Manager and the Acting County Engineer in order to resolve the problem.

The following was agreed by the County Manager:

- 1. That Special Levies would be set at £22,000 per acre on the 29.7 acres zoned residential and undeveloped. This would raise £660,000 and with the £233,000 already in hand the cost of the bridge would be at the Council's disposal.
- That the bridge would be a stand alone project i.e. the Meadowbrook Link and Newtown Road improvements would not be part of it.
- That detouring during construction would be agreed by the Area Committee.

There was a lull for some months until Planning Procedures were finalised.

When we enquired about progress at the Area Meeting on 16 May 1997 we were advised that the project was going to cost £1,381,000:

The bridge £850,000 Rathcoffey Road £231,000 Meadowbrook Link £300,000

We stated that the bridge was to take precedence and that the Engineers be asked to start work on a design and programme of work straight away.

Then came the bombshell at our meeting on 11th July 1997, when you advised us that the costs were now as follows:

The bridge £1.5 million Rathcoffey Road £385,000 Meadowbrook Link £400,000

**Note:** CIE's requirements for the bridge were now costing nothing extra.

These costs were repeated to us at our subsequent meeting on 31st July 1997, at which you stated that you will be giving us a written report for our meeting on 5th September 1997.

To say that I am astonished at such unprofessionalism is putting it mildly and I am now asking for a written explanation for this litany of errors. In addition, I believe you should give an apology to the people of Maynooth for the mishandling of this project by Council officials.

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# **Community Council Notes**

#### PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

#### **Town Improvement Works**

An advertisement in the National Newspapers recently sought tenders for the contract to commence work on the Maynooth Town Improvement Plan. It now seems that despite the long delay that this work to enhance the main street area will soon get underway. So what does this work include?

- · Paving the footpaths in the main street area and the repair or replacement of footpaths from the shopping centre on the Leixlip road to the University on the Kilcock road.
- · Overhead utility cables will be put underground in the Main Street.
- New street lighting will be installed.
- Main Street will be resurfaced.

The money for this work will predominately come from the By-passed towns funding administered by the National Roads Authority, who give this to the local authority to renew the town centre following the opening of a by-pass, which in Maynooth's case occurred in 1994.

Some minor adjustments will be made to the access available to traffic as part of the plan, which it is hoped will make traffic movement safer in the town centre.

#### Meetings sought with Kildare County Architect

As part of our efforts to advance our case to achieve Heritage Town status for Maynooth, we have sought a meeting with the Kildare County Council Architect. While the amended Draft Development Plan 1996 outlines support for the development of heritage tourism in the town, we feel that it would be helpful for us to outline our opinions, while at the same time seeking the views of Kildare County Council on the matter.

#### Straffan Road.... Accidents will happen

In these notes several months ago concern was expressed about the behaviour of traffic on the Straffan Road and regrettably it seems that the potential for accidents has probably increased. Of particular concern is the turn right lane into Maynooth Railway Station. For reasons best answered by themselves some motorists simply stop in the traffic coming from both directions to drop passengers. The traffic behind think that traffic turning into the station are simply overtaking when in fact they are going into the railway station car-park. You get the picture!!! Perhaps it is time to consider traffic calming measures on the Straffan Road to reduce traffic speeds to the permitted 30 mph.

Anybody travelling throughout Ireland will notice the traffic calming measures being implemented in almost every little village you pass through. Yet in a town like Maynooth where a large number of people use their cars to travel to work causing particular danger at peak commuting times, that we do not have similar traffic controls in place

Full traffic lights at the entrance to Maynooth Railway Station could serve a number of purposes making it safer for

traffic to enter/exit the car-park as well as to allow pedestrians cross the Straffan Road with more safety.

#### CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

#### Question:

My husband has had a stroke and cannot manage to get

Can I get assistance to put in a toilet downstairs?

#### Answer:

You should contact your County Council, or borough Corporation for information on Disabled Person's Grants. Disabled Person's Grants are payable where alterations need to be made to a house to make it suitable for a physically disabled or mentally handicapped or mentally ill person. Alterations could include making the dwelling wheelchair accessible, moving light switches, door handles, installing a ground floor bathroom and toilet. The cost of the alterations must exceed £200.

Grants can be made for either local authority or privately owned homes which are at least one year old. In the case of local authority housing, the entire cost will be covered. For private homes, up to two thirds of the cost may be granted, subject to a maximum of £8,000. As with other Department grants, work must be carried out by a registered contractor.

In planning extensions or adaptations to their homes people with disabilities should ensure that they apply for a grant in good time - the grant will not be made if work has begun before formal approval of the application has been received.

Local authorities do have discretion in regard to these schemes.

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


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#### SCOIL UI RIADA NEWS

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

We thank him for being here We wish him well in Rome There will always be a welcome here Whenever he is home.





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#### MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

Gro Harlem Brundtland, a former Prime Minister of Norway, is best remembered for her work as Chairperson of the World Commission on Environment and Development established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1984. This Commission was responsible for initiating studies which culminated ten years ago in the publication of Our Common Future, a report which was to set the bench-mark for all future discussions of sustainable development. The kernel of the Brundtland Report was its definition of sustainable development as:

#### 'Development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs'

Such a principle has now become a standard guiding light for enlightened planning throughout the developed world and is also a centre-piece of Irish government policy as espoused in a recent statement by the Minister for the Environment.

#### 'Economic growth and social development cannot be to the detriment of environmental quality and must respect the limits set by nature'

As the economic growth of the Celtic Tiger accelerates, it is important to remember that there are limits imposed by natural systems on the usage of them which we can make without resources

being exhausted and damaged beyond repair. There is a limit to the number of sheep you can put on a hillside in Connemara, or the amount of pollutants you can ask the atmosphere to disperse safely. Equally, there is a limit to the development potential of north east Kildare. In our case that limit is provided by the assimilative capacity of the River Liffey.

To best manage these sometimes conflicting roles, the Water Quality Management Plan agreed to by the various local authorities which adjoin it, sets limits on the treated sewerage quantities which can be discharged from the Leixlip Waste Water Treatment Works. To maintain the river at a quality suitable for supporting coarse fish (not trout or salmon it should be noted), the quality of the river at low flow is required to be above a certain standard (<5 mg/1 Biochemical Oxygen Demand at the 95 percentile flow limit). This means that the assimilative capacity of the River Liffey at Leixlip is, and will remain, capable of handling the waste equivalent of 90,000 people.

Leixlip Waste Water Treatment Works receive Celbridge, Leixlip and Kilcock. Straffan is also due to be connected in the next few years. The present population of this area is in excess of 37,000 people. Recent approval of a large housing scheme in Leixlip and other increases in population over the past year probably raise this figure to 40,000. But people alone do not account for all of the demand for waste water treatment. Industrial demands can be substantial. Intel, for example has a demand equivalent to a small city of 30,000 population. Hewlett Packard and other industries in the north Kildare area also have waste water treatment demands, though much less significant than Intel which uses large quantities of water in its manufacturing processes.

#### **Total Demand**

At the end of 1996 Kildare County Council estimated that the total demand on the river at Leixlip was equivalent to 66,000 people. With more recent developments taken into account, this means that about 20,000 population equivalent capacity remains. Such a figure does not take into account the labour forces at Intel and Hewlett Packard, and also 5,000 students who may not normally reside in the catchment but who also require to be counted for waste water treatment calculations. But even ignoring these, 20,000 units are what is available to meet future residential expansion

throughout north east Kildare, and also what is available to meet any new industrial employment sources which locate here. How should we divide up this 20,000 units?

Firstly, it must be remembered that the excesses of the 1985 Development Plan for Kildare have saddled the county with huge areas of lands already rezoned for housing, much of which is awaiting development at present. In the area served by Leixlip Sewage Works, 628 acres already zoned for housing awaited development at the end of last year. This land will most likely be developed rapidly to house an additional 20,000 people. But many areas, such as in the new estates of Maynooth, consist of families at the pre-children stage and can be expected to increase in population dramatically over the next few years. Thus if we do nothing in terms of additional rezoning in north Kildare, we will exceed the capacity of the Liffey during the next decade as natural growth in the existing population proceeds.

Secondly, it must be emphasised that some of our local councillors want to rezone an additional 1,145 acres in this region, the largest chunk of it being in Maynooth. This would provide for a further 36,000 people on top of the 20,000 extra described above. In excess of 126,000 people

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would now be seeking to use a river with a maximum capacity of 90,000. The implications are obvious, not least for the fish and the residents of Dublin City and Dublin Bay! This is not what Gro Harlem Brundtland, or Maynooth Planning Alliance, or any reasonably minded individual, would describe as 'sustainable development'.

#### **Development Led Growth**

But there is an even more insidious aspect to the development led growth which some of our local councillors insist on inflicting on Maynooth. By using the capacity of the river to meet a burgeoning demand for domestic waste water treatment, they are ruling out the possibility of using any significant part of this resource for industrial employment. Another Intel could not even today locate in north Kildare because of the short sightedness of zoning policies. So where will the Children of this huge new future population work? Certainly not in employment sources which have significant water requirements.

In the feeding frenzy to rezone land, the lesson is clear - short term greed will not result in sustainable development either in Maynooth or in North Kildare. How sad, and strange, it is that those who can shape the future of Maynooth seem willing to push us along a road to unsustainable development which does not meet the needs of either the present or future generation of Maynooth residents.

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#### BOND BRIDGE ACTION GROUP

The Committee of the Bond Bridge Action Group wishes to express it's grave concern at the recent development in the campaign to have Bond Bridge, Maynooth re-aligned. The amount of inaccurate information that has been supplied to the residents of the Newtown area and the whole issue of the handling of these special development levies in the last number of years must now be subject to a public inquiry. The details of information supplied to our group is as

May 1996...... cost of re-alignment of Bridge £750,000 Levies Paid or due to 2/2/96 £353.776 Monies spent as of 2/2/97 £120,000 Monies available to fund project £233,776

8th November 1996...... cost of project £900,000 Increase due to C.I.E. height requirements

13th November 1996...... cost of project £1,500,000 Increase due to cost of Meadowbrook Link Road

This attempt by County Officals to include the Meadowbrook Link Road with this project was firmly rejected by the Celbridge area committee and the following was agreed with the County Officals at the estimates meeting on 18th November 1996:

- That special levies would be set at £22,000 per acre on the 29.7 zoned residential and undeveloped. This would raise £660,000 and with the £233,000 already in hand the cost of the project would be at the Council's disposal.
- The Bridge would be a stand alone project i.e. the Meadowbrook Link and Newtown Road improvements would not be part of it.
- That detouring during construction would be agreed by the Celbridge Area Committee.

At the Area Meeting on 16th May 1997 the Area Committee were advised the cost of the project was now £1,381,000 Cost of Bridge.....£850,000 Rathcoffey Road.....£231,000

Meadowbrook Link...... £300,000 (Half the original

At the area meeting on the 11th July 1997 there was a further revision of costs:

Cost of Bridge ......£1,500,000 (C.I.E. requirements now cost nothing extra)

Rathcoffey Road .....£385,000 Meadowbrook Link £400,000

Having received this information from the Area Committee prior to the granting of planning permission on the two developments currently under way in this area this committee publicly stated that they would not appeal the decision to grant this permission.

This decision may have influenced others to follow the same line. We must therefore assume that the actions of Kildare County Council Officals may have had a direct bearing on

the outcome of the appeal decision of an Bord Pleanala.

The image that this fiasco portrays to members of the public can only have a negative effect on all our local and national representatives. The Committee of the Bond Bridge Action Group will be asking all our local elected representatives to approach the relevant department and request they seek a full and detailed explanation for the way in which this matter has been handled. This is no longer just a matter of the handling of the Bond Bridge project but the credibility of our system of local government.

A public meeting will be organised in the coming weeks for this committee to seek guidance from the residents of the Newtown area as to what course of action should be taken to resolve this situation.



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### TOM ASHE RETIRES

After twenty six years of service to Maynooth Post-Primary School Mr. Thomas Ashe has announced his resignation from his position as principal of the school. He has taken us all by surprise. His extraordinary achievement in turning around the fortunes of this technical school to one of the best educational establishments in the country has been remarked upon continually during my seventeen years in Maynooth. However, I first got to know Tom Ashe through my work with the Community Council when we collaborated on a common project shortly after I became Chairperson in 1987. The Community Council has met in the school for most of its life also. On behalf of the Council I would like to thank him for this facility. During this initial period, his ability to work, his directness and getting to the point became increasingly clear to me. I was very impressed by his total dedication to his school, students, staff and parents, a quality which became more obvious to me as my children later attended the school. His energy knew no

bounds and his interest never waned. During the last six years the addition of further rooms and a huge hall to the school are a measure of his outstanding devotion.

On a personal, selfish level, I am sad to see Tom leaving before my second daughter completes her studies. I admired and concurred with his educational philosophy and his emphasis on the total development of the student. The introduction of the Transition Year was a welcome expansion within the school. His devotion to students was often well beyond the call of duty. The small number of rules, the openness of the staff with the students and the maturity with which problems were dealt with were, I believe, due to his influence. He knew his 650 students well, something which never ceased to surprise me. The measure of his achievement culminated in the Irish Times education correspondent recognising Maynooth Post-Primary School as one of the best schools in Ireland. I was delighted, proud and lucky to have my family educated there. I hope that in the future his philosophy will continue to bear fruit. The school is a monument to his love of education, students, staff and parents. I wish him a wonderful retirement. I shall miss him tremendously. I do not think I will be alone. I hope his successor will have the maturity to continue with his legacy.

Thanks for everything Tom, on behalf of the Community Council, the town, my children and myself.



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### SAD END TO KILDARE'S CAMPAIGN

Kildare's dramatic run in the Leinster championship came to an end on August 4th when Meath finally ground out a victory in the second replay. Some would say that after four high profile matches in this years championship Kildare have nothing to show for their efforts. It is true to say that this team haven't won any titles. But all four performances have won Kildare new respect. The old suspicions that Kildare teams lack the necessary heart to compete at the highest level have been firmly dispelled. A foundation has been laid for the future and no team in Leinster will fancy drawing Kildare in next years Leinster championship.

### Bitter Pill

Defeat on August 4th was a bitter pill to swallow. But it was a defeat which had more to do with an improvement in Meath's performance than any collapse on Kildare's part. In the first two matches Kildare won the lions share of possession around the centre of the field. Some of this was due to excellent fielding by Buckley and McCreery but more important was Kildare's ability to snaffle up the breaking ball, with Kerrigan, McCormack and the half backs being particularly effective. The Meath forwards were forced to live on scraps and only a last minute goal by Giles and unbelievable point scoring by Devine kept Meath in the contest. Sean Boylan learned from the first two matches and the deployment of Colm Coyle as a third midfielder on August 4th was the key to a changed pattern in the third game. This time Meath were fastest out of the traps and asserted a firm hold on midfield in the first quarter of the game. By the 23rd minute Kildare trailed 0-1 to 0-7 and the nightmare scenario of a heavy defeat loomed. Inspired by Buckley and Rainbow, Kildare fought back to 0-5 to 0-7 though Meath increased their lead to four points at half time, 0-5 to 0-9.

### **Missed Penalty**

Eddie McCormack's missed penalty just after half time proved costly as Murphy's goal for Meath meant that Kildare trailed by six points with just 17 minutes left. As in the first half Kildare fought back with spirit and a series of magnificent long range frees by Niall Buckley and a scrambled goal by Eddie McCormack brought them to within a point of Meath. But there the comeback ended and the total relief on the faces of the Meath players was matched only by the absolute dejection of the Kildare players when the final whistle sounded.

### The Future?

Where to, from here for this Kildare team? This team is tantalisingly close to being good enough to win a Leinster title. As a squad they have shown the necessary application and self-belief to compete at the highest level. Critically. though, one of the old problems still remains - a lack of

enough scoring forwards. Padraig Graven has proved a find as a dependable place kicker and Niall Buckley's accuracy from long range frees and 45s is as good as any player in the country. Eddie McCormack was excellent in the second match against Meath but lacks consistency. Declan Kerrigan had a good championship overall and proved himself more than a match for Enda McManus but is not a consistent point scorer. Brian Murphy caused all sorts of problems for the Meath full back line and scored a brilliant goal in the second match. He may develop into the type of forward Kildare needs. Finally, the great enigma, Martin Lynch. Lynch is a talented footballer and did enough to keep Darren Fay busy. But his scoring return was poor. Too often possession was wasted with aimless kicking or running into dead ends. Overall the forward unit compared unfavourably with Meath's and certainly seems to be in the halfpenny place compared to the amazing display put on by the Offaly forwards in the Leinster Final. Two new scoring forwards, capable of kicking points consistently from play would be the final piece in the jigsaw of this Kildare team. Offaly's performance in the Leinster final proved the old Dublin-Meath domination in Leinster can be broken. Roy Malone ripped the Meath defence apart with the sort of display that has Kildare fans wishing that there was a transfer market in Gaelic football. Put Malone in the Kildare forward line and .....

### The Ref

Finally, a word about Mr. Pat O'Toole, the referee who was supposedly in charge of the Kildare v Meath series of games. It is not often that a referee can simultaneously alienate both set of supporters. When it happens it indicates poor refereeing. O'Toole lost the respect of the players in the first match and, if anything, his performances disimproved as the series went on. Over 160,000 fans witnessed the three Kildare - Meath games, the players gave their all. The very least the fans and players deserved was a decent referee. On that score Mr. Pat O'Toole doesn't qualify.

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### OFF TO SCHOOL WE GO.

At the beginning of the Summer holidays we thought that the month of September would never come. Let us be honest about it - September did seem a long way off. Now the children are going back. At this time of the year both parents and pupils are looking forward to school. There are two groups for whom this is an especially important time. Is your first child starting Primary or Post Primary? - whichever it is it is a new experience for the family.

The four or five year old is quite likely to have attended play school. There they were in the bigger, older and more responsible group. Now they are surrounded by so many strange faces - many of them much taller than them. Just think of Gulliver on his travels. No wonder a first child may be a bit 'clingy'. The later members of the family are used to their sisters and brothers going off to school and returning home in the afternoon. What can parents do to assure their child? KEEP YOUR PROMISES. If you are to collect your child at the school gate make sure you leave yourself enough time. The uniform is very important. A ribbon will help to keep the hair neat and tidy. Has your child a name tag? Did you label his clothes, his bag and its contents, his lunch box and drinks container? Does he know his phone number, his surname and address? Can he tie his shoe laces - button his coat - put on his gloves - open his drink and lunch box - go to the toilet unaided? All these things will help to make the transistion from home to school easier. When you get to the school show your child where to hang his coat, show him to his seat and GO.

Is there anything you feel your child's teacher should know? Has there been any change in home circumstances during the holidays? Who lives with the child? A note to the teacher will be much appreciated.

The older child will already be familiar with the school routine. You may or may not agree with the teacher but it is better not to criticise the teacher in front of your child. A quiet word with the teacher will iron out any difficulties. Too little homework - too much homework - talk it over with the teacher. Set a time for homework. Make the study area comfortable with good lighting, a table or desk and no television. Keep the television for the leisure area. Read your children's books so you can discuss them. Breakfast is most important. Lunch needs to be well balanced so that the child's energy is sustained for the afternoon.

The other big change comes for the first year pupil in Secondary school. By this time the student should be responsible for his own clothes, bedroom and study habits. Talk, talk and more talk with your child should be your aim. Keep communication channels open.

It's only eight weeks to the Hallowe'en break!!!

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

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
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
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### **VIDEO REVIEW**

### Ransom (15's)

Mel Gibson stars as a business tycoon whose son, played by Nick Nolte's actual son Brawley, is kidnapped in this gripping thriller. What should have been a simple case of the baddies finally getting what they deserve, is actually raised far beyond this by a very clever, almost (but not quite) Hitchcock-ian script and brilliant direction by Ron Howard (Ritchie Cuningham to you). Gibson and screen wife (played by Rene Russo) have their high-flying yuppie lifestyle shattered when the boy is grabbed and they receive a ransom demand for two million dollars. But without giving too much away, things are not as they seem. For a start Mel's got a skeleton in the cupboard in the form of an ex-associate rotting in prison, the leader of the kidnappers is a police detective, and what starts off as ransom becomes bounty money!

There are enough twists and turns and red herrings to keep even the most ardent whodunit fans glued to the edge of their seat throughout. This is a good, old-fashioned and very well executed piece of cinema that's worth two hours of anybody's time.

Verdict: Not to be missed!

### The Ghost and the Darkness (15's)

This movie is based on a true story and stars Val Kilmer and Michael Douglas. Kilmer is an engineer who is posted to Africa to supervise the construction of a railway bridge. One of the native workers is attacked and killed by a pair of rampaging man-eating lions, and the rest of the workforce threaten to do a runner if something is not done about it. Enter Douglas (in the nick of time) as a big game hunter, hired by the railroad boss to eliminate the felonious felines. After several failed individual attempts, the engineer and the hunter join forces to track them down and I have no intention of telling you what the outcome is!

The Ghost and the Darkness is a bit of a letdown as films go. As a factual account of a serious incident, even given the content, it's only mildly interesting. As a Boys Own ripping yarn, a la Raiders of the Lost Ark, it fails miserably, and both Kilmer and Douglas never succeed in bringing real depth to their respective characters.

Incidentally, Michael Douglas gets to use the best (or worst) cliché of 1997 when Kilmer decides to use himself as bait to lure the lions into the open. "Do you think it will work" he asks Douglas. "I know it will" he replies "because I think they're after you!"

Hollywood moguls will have to realise that the mundane doesn't get any better just because you throw big names at it.

Verdict: Disappointing.

### 101 Dalmatians (G)

A remake by the Disney studio of their own animated classic, the kids will have you tormented to rent this video time and time again! This is a terrific movie, even more so if you happen to be the one person on the planet that hasn't seen the original.

Glenn Close is brilliant as Cruella De Ville and hams it up beautifully, while Hugh Laurie and Mark Williams are superb as the bungling dog-nappers who slapstick their way through the entire hilarious film. The original script was adapted by John Hughes of Home Alone fame, and comparisons with Laurie and Williams and Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern are definitely not coincidental! What more can I say? Everybody between the ages of three and ninety-three should thoroughly enjoy this excellent hour and three-quarter's entertainment.

Verdict: Highly enjoyable.

There is enough pressure on school leavers without the added pressure of facing fellow schoolmates who might have done better than they did.


Granted for the students who have done very well it is great for them to be able to laud for a while in their capabilities but for the weaker student it just makes the day more difficult than it really needs to be.

# Gardening Hints



### **Growing Bulbs in Pots**

Spring bulbs can be incredibly cheering, especially when they're flowering indoors in the middle of winter.

It is important to buy specially prepared bulbs, these are heat-treated so that they'll flower before spring. For Christmas flowering they should be planted by mid-September.

Hyacinths, narcissi, crocuses, early tulips and dwarf irises will flower well indoors.

### Planting the Bulbs

Using a pot with drainage holes, plant the bulbs in potting compost or bulb fibre. Be careful not to overwater as the bulbs could rot.

Put a layer of compost in the pot and set the bulbs out on it so that they're not quite touching. Fill with compost and firm it gently.

Leave the tip of larger bulbs like hyacinths exposed while smaller ones should be just covered. Water the pots and put into a cool dark place. To encourage the roots to form cover the pots with black polythene.

Check that the compost is moist, and water sparingly if necessary. Move into the light once the shoots are 2.5-5cm (1-2in) high.

### GENERAL TASKS FOR AUTUMN

### **Autumn Planting**

Autumn is the best time to plant hardy garden plants. Do not plant evergreens that suffer from frost damage, as these are best planted in the Spring. Hardy evergreens like rhododendrons can be planted in Autumn also. Autumn conditions are the best to get plants quickly established as the soil is warm and rarely dry for long periods.

Prepare the ground well by digging at least two spades deep. Pull up all weeds and add plenty of garden compost or well-rotted manure. Water the plant well before planting. Dig a hole and add fertiliser.

Place the plant in the hole with rootball at soil level. Fill with soil and water well. Stake trees and tie them with a tree tie. Surround plants in exposed sites with a polythene

windbreak or fine netting during the Autumn and Winter.

Wait until October or November to buy roses, hedging plants, fruit trees or bushes.



### FRUIT



Apples and Pears should be harvested when the fruit separates easily from the branch. To store apples, select undamaged fruits and put about 1 kg (2lb) at a time into sealed polythene bags, pierced with a couple of pin-holes. Store pears in open wooden trays or on shelves. Keep both fruits in a very cool but just frost-free place. Check the fruits regularly and throw out any with signs of rot.

If you've got masses of fruit, even windfalls, it's worth storing in boxes to put out for the birds in winter. Blackbirds, thrushes, redwings and field-fares will really appreciate such a feast when the weather's cold.

Grease bands fixed round the trunks of apple trees will trap the wingless female winter moths as they climb up the trunk to lay their eggs. The caterpillars would otherwise feed on the opening buds and young leaves.







**Strawberries** should be planted by the end of September so that they can establish well for cropping next year. Prepare the ground thoroughly by digging in well-rotted compost or manure, and rake in some organic fertilizer. Space the plants  $45 \times 60 \text{ cm} (1^{1}/_{2} \times 2\text{ft})$  apart, with the crown of the plant exactly at soil level. Water well after planting

### **VEGETABLES**

Asparagus foliage should be cut down to within 2.5 cm (1 in) of the ground once it has turned yellow, and the plants should then be mulched with well-rotted manure. Prepare a site for asparagus crowns to be planted next spring by digging in manure.

Marrows, pumpkins and squashes can be picked and put in the sun to ripen for a few days. Then hang them in net bags in a dry frost-free place, and they'll keep for two or three months.

Country Chicken Stew

- 1.4kg/3lbs chicken portions 45g/6tbsps flour 45g/1¹/₂oz butter or margarine 225g/8oz belly pork, rinded and cut into 5mm 1/, inch dice 3 medium onions, finely chopped
- 1.7ltrs/3 pints water 3 x 400g/14oz cans tomatoes 3 tbsps tomato purée 120g/4oz fresh or frozen broad beans 120g/4oz.sweetcorn
- 2 large red peppers, cut into small dice
- 3 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into 1.25cm ¹/₂ inch
- 1-2 tsps cayenne pepper or Tabasco to taste 2 tsps Worcestershire sauce 280ml ¹/₂ pint red wine Salt and pepper
- 1. Shake the pieces of chicken in flour in a plastic bag to coat. In a large frying pan, melt the butter until foaming. Place in the chicken, without crowding
- the pieces, and brown over a moderately high heat for about 10-12 minutes. Remove the chicken and set it
- 2. In the same pan, fry the belly pork until the fat is rendered and the dice are crisp.
- 3. Add the onions and cook over moderate heat for about 10 minutes, or until softened but not browned.
- 4. Pour the water into a large stock pot or saucepan and spoon in the onions. pork and any meat juices from the pan. Add the chicken, tomatoes and tomato purée. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for about 1-11/2 hours.
- 5. Add the broad beans, sweetcorn. peppers and potatoes. Add cavenne pepper or Tabasco to taste. Add the Worcestershire sauce and red wine. Season to taste.

- 6. Cook for a further 30 minutes or until the chicken is tender. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- 7. The stew should be rather thick, so if there is too much liquid, remove the chicken and vegetables and boil down the liquid to reduce it. If there is not enough liquid add more water or chicken


With a large, sharp stainless steel knife, cut the top, the stem, the skin, the core and the eyes from the pineapple. Slice the fruit crossways to make thin half-rings.

For the topping, melt the butter in a one-piece, straight-sided cake tin, 9in/ 23cm in diameter and 13/4 in/4.5cm deep -preferably a non-stick one over a low

> flame. Swish the butter around to coat the sides if the tin is not non-stick. Add the sugar, brandy and the lemon juice. Stir gently as the mixture boils and foams. After a few minutes it will start to colour. Continue stirring until it is a pale, even toffee-brown. Take the tin off the heat. Arrange the pineapple slices in the sauce, overlapping, to cover the whole bottom of the tin. Whizz all the cake ingredients in the food processor until smooth and creamy, or beat them energetically by hand. Pour the mixture over the pineapple and smooth over the surface with a spatula. Bake at 375°F/190°C/Gas 5

for 45 minutes, lowering the heat to 350°F/180°C/ Gas 4 after half an hour if the mixture is already well risen and deep brown. When it is cooked, the cake will have contracted slightly from the sides of the tin, and a skewer pushed in at an angle across the cake will come out clean.

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

MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Bond Bridge, Maynooth

When the County Manager advised the Celbridge Area Committee at our meeting on 11th July that the cost of the new Bond Bridge would be £1.5M, it would be putting it mildly to say that we were astonished. All along we had been told that the cost would be £750,000 to £900,000. Indeed no later than the 16th May we were told that it would cost £850,000. Based on the £900,000 costing the previous County Manager agreed with Cllr. John McGinley on the 18th November '96 that Special Development Levies of £22,000 per acre would be set on the 29.7 acres zoned housing and undeveloped in the area in order to pay for the bridge (£233,000 was already in hand).

Now new management in Kildare has overturned all the hard work that was put into getting agreement on the £22,000/acre levy and residents who did not object to the extra houses in the area because they thought that they were getting a new bridge, are now left with the worst of both worlds - more houses and the same old bridge.

The Manager confirmed his costings to us at a Special Area Meeting on 31st July. He also stated that we had three options:

- 1. Do nothing until we have the £1.5M costing in hand in around seven years time.
- 2. Go to the full Council to get their permission to raise a loan for the shortfall of £700,000. (Estimated completion time for the new bridge is two and a half years.)
- 3. Build a pedestrian bridge now at a cost of £250,000 and put traffic lights on the Bridge at a cost of £50,000. (Estimated completion time is one year.)

In addition he stated that consultants would shortly be carrying out an origin/destination survey of traffic on the bridge to establish where they were coming from/going to. (It is becoming apparent to me that the Council officials now see the Meadowbrook link to the Straffan Road as becoming more important than the new bridge.)

Cllr. John McGinley proposed:

"That we seek permission from the full Council to raise a loan for the shortfall of £700,000 in order to start work on the new bridge now."

The other Area Councillors agreed to this motion despite the opposition of the Manager and it will go before the full Council at the end of September.

The next Area Meeting is due on 5th September and the Manager has promised a written report on the history of the project for the meeting. Cllr. John McGinley's report on the "history" of the project has been sent to the County Manager in a letter dated 6th August 1997 which can be read elsewhere in the **Newsletter**.

Main Street Improvements

Work on undergrounding overhead wires, paving footpaths with concrete flags, carpeting Main Street and installing new Public Lighting is due to begin in mid October. Tenders

were invited for the work on August 6th and the successful contractor will be appointed in September. The work is due for completion by Christmas. Cllr. John McGinley will be liaising with Council Officials to ensure disruption to the community is kept to the minimum.

"Landscaping" Straffan Road

Council officials have advised Cllr. John McGinley that they are arranging to have this disgraceful mess sorted out as a matter of urgency.

"Houses for Sale" Signs

The Council have replied as follows to Cllr. John McGinley's Motion:

"I confirm that the offending auctioneers in the north of the County have been written to by the Council and advised that under the terms of the Litter Pollution Act, 1997, the erection of the auctioneering signs is prohibited".

As the auctioneers have to-date ignored the Councils letter, Cllr. John McGinley has now asked the Council to take legal action in this matter.

New Pedestrian Crossing for Straffan Road

The Co. Engineer has advised Cllr. John McGinley that the provision of an additional pedestrian crossing is warranted on the Straffan Road. The crossing will be located somewhere between the Old Greenfield exit and the Glenroyal exit. The most advantageous location would probably be north of the Old Greenfield and Silken Vale exists and near the train station exit.

E.S.B. Substation in Doctor's Lane Car Park

This building is an eyesore and is attracting the attention of modern 'artists'. Cllr. John McGinley has asked the E.S.B. to pebble dash the building in order to eliminate the problem and improve the appearance.

Silken Vale


Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

That whatever steps necessary be taken to remove the following conditions of Planning for Silken Vale, Maynooth:


- 1. Construction of footbridge from estate to Royal Canal.

Emmet Stagg T.D. has previously advised the Residents Association that the builder should apply for retention planning permission excluding the footbridge and walkway. This should only be done once all other works have been completed satisfactorily in the estate.






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MAYNOOTH LADIES G.A.A.

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Letters To The Editor

RE: BOND BRIDGE

Bond Bridge and Parsons St. are recognized as hazardous to motorists and pedestrians. The addition of an extra 200 houses along the Rathcoffey Rd. will result in an increase in the motorized and pedestrian traffic using the bridge and road. This will significantly increase the hazards for pedestrians and cyclists.

The present access to the motorway for traffic coming from Rathcoffey and the Newtown area is via Bond Bridge. Parsons St. and Main Street. Every effort needs to be made to identify an alternative route to the motorway which will route this traffic away from the Main Street.

To address these issues I would like to suggest the following:

- 1. Restrict the area from the entrance to Meadowbrook to the entrance to the College at Parsons St. to one way into the village from Newtown/Rathcoffey. Traffic from the village would be routed via Old Greenfield and Meadowbrook.
- 2. A footpath/cyclepath for pedestrians could then be constructed on the bridge at Parsons St.
- 3. An alternative road, routing traffic out of the village should be constructed parallel with the motorway along the sterile corridor linking the Rathcoffey Road with the Straffan Road.

This would have the advantage of:

- Allowing pedestrians and cyclists use Bond Bridge safely
- Low cost (Parts 1 & 2)
- Routing traffic out of the village onto the motorway
- Saving Bond Bridge which is over 200 years old.

REST IN PEACE Provided you're not in the way!

Q. When is your last resting-place not your final resting-

A. Why, when it gets in the way of so-called progress, of

The Celtic tiger is on the march; onwards and upwards, and why should the graveyard of a few dead nuns be allowed to halt his charge? This seems to be the cry from those people to whom profit is everything and respect is nothing. After all, you can't lodge respect for the deceased in the bank and watch the interest accumulate.

For almost a hundred and seventy five years the nuns of the Presentation Order have lived, worked, taught, cared for the community and even provided employment, here in Maynooth. Now, in an almost sacrilegiously callous move, the tiny cemetery that was to have been the last resting-place for the fifty or so deceased members of that Order is to become a building site. Oh yes, their remains will be removed and re-located elsewhere with all due reverence!

But how do you un-consecrate or de-consecrate consecrated ground? Will the new site have fifty separate graves and headstones? Or will we have a mass grave into which the remains (or as much of the remains that can be found) will be placed, with a single marker inscribed with the usual platitudes, to keep relatives and friends happy! It is a ridiculous notion to think that a cemetery that pre-dates the Famine can be moved and re-sited with any degree of success or reverence.

The Provincial of the Order stated that the move had the support of all but one or two of the relatives of the deceased nuns. This statement has since proved inaccurate. It has also been stated that the new grave site in Laraghbryan would allow the graves to be better maintained and provide better protection against vandalism. This statement is highly questionable, as anyone who has ever seen the handiwork of some of our young citizens will know. A high stone wall surrounds the present cemetery with a strong iron gate for access. Local FAS workers have volunteered to undertake the upkeep of the present site, so improved maintenance is not relevant. In fact there is no argument in favour of the proposed move other than a developer wants to use the plot for building purposes. I wonder how many people will buy their house or apartment knowing that it's built over a graveyard, or will a potential developer keep that information to himself until the deal is finalised. Guess!! I maintain that prospective purchasers should be told..... Maynooth in recent times has become very aware of its heritage and history. We have St. Patrick's College, Geraldine Castle, Carton Demesne etc. and lately we have had erected a monument to the members of this community who took part in the Easter Rising. However, I maintain that the seemingly insignificant little

convent cemetery is just as important to the heritage of Maynooth as any of these. I would strongly urge everyone who believes there are some things greater than pure profit, to be seen to oppose this ghastly plan.

Maynooth-Self determination and devolved power in 1998

A letter from Mr. Noel Dempsey, The Minister for Environment, has confirmed that he is to publish the Government's proposals for local government reform early next year. The long awaited reforms will be particularly awaited in towns like Maynooth. The Community Council has consistently lobbied for Town Commission status over the last ten years without success.

However, Mr. Dempsey has indicated that his proposals for the reform of local government will include the creation of Town Councils, for towns with a population in excess on 7,500 inhabitants. All members of Dail Eireann representing Kildare North have pledged their support to Maynooth in the ongoing quest to achieve devolved local power.

Kildare County Council confirm neon sign is illegal

Kildare County Council has written to Maynooth Community Council confirming that they have asked the owner of a fast food outlet to remove an illegal neon sign at his premises in Main Street. Maynooth Community Council office has received a large number of calls from the people of the town objecting to the sign.

Our September meeting unanimously passed a proposal that the Community Council write to the businessman outlining the views expressed to the council and asking him to remove the illegal sign.

Community Council Secretary, Ms. Muireann Ní Bhrolchain led the many tributes paid to Mr. Tom Ashe who retired as Principal of Maynooth Post-Primary School on the 1st of September last.

Mr. Tom McMullon, Community Council Chairman, paid tribute to the late Mr. P.J. Bennett for his work in the community. Mr. Bennett died at the end of August.

Community Council Resignations

Ms. Eileen Dunne from Kingsbry has resigned following her involvement over many years as both a councillor and as a worker. The council was informed that Ms. Dunne is leaving Maynooth to move to Kilkenny. Due to pressure of work Ms. Mary Carter has also resigned as a member for Parklands.

Community Council Vice-Chairperson steps down

Community Council members were surprised when the secretary informed the September meeting that Ms. Liz Stoll was stepping down as vice-chairperson in advance of the

AGM. Ms. Stoll is the chairperson of Parklands Residents Association and secretary of Maynooth Planning Alliance, she became Vice-chairperson in April 1996 and will continue as a member of the Community Council. Chairman Tom McMullon thanked her for her work during two terms as Vice-Chair and looked forward to her continuing contribution as a council member.

Bond Bridge dominates Community Council Meeting

A broad discussion took place at the September meeting regarding the ongoing campaign to have Bond Bridge realigned. Bond Bridge Action Group Chairman and Meadowbrook Resident, Mr. John Doogan outlined the saga of the ongoing revision of the costs involved in completing this work.

Community Council object to ESAT Mast in the centre of the town

Maynooth Community Council has formally objected to the building of a thirty metre mast at Maynooth Garda Station. The Council were advised that the objection must be based on purely planning grounds. The September meeting felt that the erection of this mast would be inconsistent with ministerial guidelines issued last year and is inappropriate for the town centre.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

Traffic By-Laws should go on display

October 1st 1997, has finally arrived when we were promised that the traffic by-laws were expected to go on public display. Traffic, just like the weather is the subject that dominates conversations between the people in the town. It is important that the by-laws take account of the needs of the vast majority of the people who live in the town. It is useless if the needs of a small number of interests render these new traffic restrictions useless. Improved traffic flows will have to be the result of the by-laws and if that is not the case we should not bother going through the process to implement them.

Improved Train service back on the agenda

The need to double the track between Clonsilla and Maynooth is apparent to everybody and many people believe that plans are in place to complete this work. You will be aware that through this column we have kept you informed of the progress on this matter. The last official position is that the doubling of the track was part of an overall project costing £38m which included other work to improve the service. This proposal was put to the E.U. Commission last year. A group representing commuters from all the towns on the Western Suburban Line met with Mrs. Mary O'Rourke, Minister For Public Enterprise in September to review progress.

The Maynooth Survey 1996, showed that over 14% of commuters travelling to Dublin daily use either a bus or train service, leaving over 85% to use private cars.

Carton Avenue and Harbour Area- Public Parks or Private Party Areas

The lack of public amenity areas in Maynooth is a subject on which much agreement exists and indeed some of the most natural amenity areas around the town continue to come under development pressures. What is the point of enhancing natural amenity areas when the existing public amenity areas are frequently used as private party areas by groups of people consuming lagers and beers and making it uncomfortable for other people to use for a pleasant walk. It is untrue to say that drinking in public is the preserve of students or teenagers, evidence of recent visits to Carton Avenue shows that people drinking there should be doing so at home or in one of the pubs.

Proposal to erect ESAT Mast at Maynooth Garda Station

An application to erect a 30 Metre ESAT mobile phone mast at Maynooth Garda Station was lodged with Kildare County Council on the 21st August last. The proposal is in line with similar applications throughout the Country, following an agreement between the Gardai Authorities and ESAT Digifone. The location of the Garda Station in the centre of the town means that health considerations aside, this mast

would be very obtrusive. The following are the main reasons for objections to the mast:

- The serious impact on the amenity value of Maynooth's Geraldine Castle soon to be restored.
- Contrary to the 1985 Maynooth Development Plan.
- Conflicts with the 1996 Ministerial Guidelines on the location of masts, which recommends that masts should not be erected close to residential areas or schools.
- The erection of the mast would be inappropriate to the town centre.

Similar applications have been made for both Celbridge and Kilcock Garda Stations.

TIDY TOWNS

The following is this years report on Maynooth's entry in the Tidy Towns Competiton,

Overall Development Approach

Thank you for your completed questionnaire and map. The FAS/Community Employment submission was very interesting. The surveys are to be commended and points such as the rapid growth of Maynooth must be taken into consideration in all future plans and requirements for the town. It was good to note that those who were asked to participate in the survey were interested to do so and that quite a number of positive points about Maynooth were forthcoming. The information in this submission will contribute significantly to your 3-5 year plan which is now required for the competition. Much work has been completed and well done with it. It is important that all newcomers to Maynooth are aware of your objectives and plans and contribute in their own way to the well being of the town.

The Built Environment

The Pitch and Putt course was well presented. The Motor Factors, Regan's, Maynooth Curtains and Paddy Power's were all well presented on the main street as were Hula Bou and the Pepper Mill Delicatessen. The stone wall outside the Cemetery on the N4 looked well - the adjudicators look forward to it becoming home to some vegetation. Maynooth Credit Union looked very well and Centra Supermarket was being newly painted. A few hanging baskets would look well on the few shops at Just Gifts and the Bookshop. Some bright red hanging geraniums would set off well against the brown/grey stone of the Glenroyal Hotel. The trees behind the Glenroyal are under stress - many are poorly and need replacing. The railings and wall of the school on the Moyglare road required repainting and weeds needed to be removed from the playground yard. The Parish Hall had weeds at the base of the fence. Moyglare Nursing Home was well looked after as was the GAA ground. Caris Communications and Divine Missionaries had some nice landscaping. The front of the College was well maintained as usual - well done. There was also some nice planting opposite. St Mary's Church of Ireland has been tidied up. The pump on this road could do with a coat of paint. The Garda Station looks extremely well as usual and the Fire Station and Health Centre were fine though again some weeds lurked in corners. Greenfield Shopping Centre could be brightened up. The train station was reasonable and there was some nice planting. The bridge needed to be repainted. Quinnsworth really needs to make an effort with some planting/baskets.

Landscaping

Many of the areas around Maynooth look well, especially some of the housing estates and the College. Individual landscaping is good in many cases; however a more coordinated approach is required. Maintenance of trees is important. Side shoots should be removed and make sure

they are not being strangled by tags which are too tight. Grassy areas where the bus turns off the Straffan road badly needed attention as they were very long and unkempt. The grassy area at the Celbridge road and down the Celbridge road was very unkempt.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities

The canal is a superb amenity area. The canal amenity is well done - new placards and boards required to inform what is in the canal. The water looked reasonably clear and small fish could be viewed quite easily. Swans and moorhens were vying for crusts of bread! There is still scope for more tree planting. Small plants will inhabit the new walls and will give a more natural look. Carton estate is also a haven for wildlife, as are the grounds of Maynooth University. A number of habitats could be created around the town. It is an ideal project for all levels of students and having a large number of third level students in the town should allow for initiative in developing these areas.

Litter Control

There was a scattering of litter on the Moyglare road and at the entrance to the College Campus. Many of the estates were free of litter - some though also had a scattering of litter. There was no evidence of litter bins in the car park area.

Tidiness

The centre of the town was quite tidy. Many of the estates were also tidy. Due to the grassy areas and weeds in gutters and the uncut grass in many of the grassy areas, the appearance on the approach roads was untidy.

Residential Areas

The Convent apartments were nicely maintained. St. Paul's looks well. In Moyglare village, there were weeds in guttering and at base of trees. A lot of landscaping was being carried out in Moyglare Abbey. Woodlands, Cluain Aoibhainn and Newtown Court were among those that were well presented though there were still some houses in Newtown that needed some attention. Fencing around Newtown Shopping Centre needed to be mended. Parson Lodge and Parson Court were well presented. There are many green areas in the housing estates; these should be considered as areas for use for children's facilities as well as landscaping. Rockfield estate was well maintained though some dead trees required replacing. The estates along the Celbridge road were generally well kept. Trees need to be looked after. The stream area in the estate at the end of Old Greenfield is a missed opportunity. This could be very pleasant with some cleaning up and some planting. The houses along Old Greenfield were generally well presented though the road needs resurfacing. Castlebridge was well landscaped though tree maintenance is required here. Interesting to note that there are no litterbins. The green amenity areas are vast and a grove of trees or area of managed wildflowers would look very well. Birdboxes are another suggestion.

Community Council Notes

Roads, Streets and Back Areas

The approach road from Dunboyne needed some cutting back. The N4 to Kilcock required cutting back also. The Moyglare road also had quite a number of weeds in the gutters. Congratulations to Moyglare Stud for their litter bins and well cut back areas. There are a lot of weedy areas on the Clane road and also on the Celbridge and Straffan roads. This created an untidy appearance. The back street areas were reasonably well kept, but some weeds needed to be removed. There is some nice landscaping and planting at the canal on the Dublin road, but there was some litter on the Dublin approach road. I couldn't locate the sign for Maynooth despite travelling up this road several times.

General Impression

Well done on the work carried out in the past year especially down at the harbour area. Many of the shop premises should be proud of their presentation as should many of the estates. The approach roads require attention and unfortunately

because of the large number of weeds in the gutters and at the base of walls and the scattering of litter, there was an untidy air to the town.

Nun's Resting Place

The deceased and remaining nuns in Maynooth are remembered and held in high esteem by past pupils and residents.

To allay Sister Francis Crowes concern re: the Convent Cemetery in Maynooth, the Tidy Towns Committee are prepared to undertake, if permitted, the ongoing maintenance of this Cemetery as part of Maynooth's Heritage.

We will include it in our future work schedules. Our Secretary is sending a letter to Sister Crowe confirming our offer and decision.

Community Council Notes

CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

Question:

My husband is unemployed and is receiving £133.90 Unemployment Assistance for our family of two children. I have MS which entails additional costs. Would I be entitled to any payment in my own right or how can we improve our financial position?

Answer:

If your condition is such that you require full-time care and attention (for at least 12 months) then you may be better off as a family if you were in receipt of Disability Allowance (medical certification is required to be eligible). If you qualify, your husband could then apply for the Carer's Allowance.

If you qualified for Disability Allowance you would get maximum £80.70 (£67.50 personal and £13.20 half-rate. children). If your husband qualified for the Carer's Allowance he would get £83.70 (£70.50 personal and £13.20 half-rate, children) giving a total of £164.40, making the family better off by £30.50.

However if you are getting assistance under the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme towards Rent or Mortgage your Rent Allowance would be reduced leaving you still better off, but only by £3. (Differential Rent from a Local Authority would also be affected). But if you qualified for Disability Allowance you would be entitled to a Free Travel Pass and a Companion Pass which would allow someone to travel free with you. You may also qualify for the Free Electricity Allowance, TV Licence, Telephone Rental, if your husband is getting the Carers Allowance and your children are under 18 or if in full-time education, under

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

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
We often receive enquires concerning the names of the Canal bridges around Maynooth. Starting near Intel the bridges are Deey -Pike - Mullen (now New Mullen) - Bond & Jackson. They were named after early directors of the Royal Canal Company, which started life in 1789 with subscribed capital of £134,000 and with parliamentary grant aid of £66.000. The flotation was a 'sell-out' and the subscribers were going to make a 'packet. '. By 1794, The Royal Canal Company was bankrupt, and one of the reasons was the decision to go against engineering advise and route it through Maynooth. It had become a vanity race from early on.

Our fact finding mission to view the Ballinamore-Ballyconnell Canal has filled us with a range of ideas. In the Canal-Boating world in western Europe a new canal (such as the restored Royal Canal) is a huge attraction. On the evidence from Leitrim the canal enthusiasts will definitely travel and use it. Maynooth has great potential as a starting point or a regular stopover.

Napper Tandy was an original shareholder in the Royal Canal Company. He later became a prominent United Irishman in the lead up to the 1798 Rebellion, and is mentioned by name in a Patriotic 19th Century ballad. Name That Tune! He is also mentioned in a Dublin Folk-Song with an international flavour. Name that tune!

Ballinamore is a model for canalside development in


The dance floor overflowed in many directions with all ages, ranging from a young 80 year old who 'be-bopped' most of the night to exhausted sixteen year-olds.

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BOND BRIDGE ACTION GROUP

Report on Public Meeting I.C.A. Hall - 18th September 1997

In attendance were Bernard Durkan T.D., Michael Fitzpatrick (P.A. to Charlie McCreevy), Councillors Senan Griffin, John McGinley and Catherine Murphy.

Apologies were received from Emmet Stagg T.D., Councillors Gerry Brady and Colm Purcell.

A packed I.C.A. hall heard the Chairperson open the meeting with a brief history of the campaign to date. A high level of frustration was expressed by both the B.B.A.G. Committee and the County Councillors at the lack of detailed information available regarding the amount of levies collected in the past and how some of this money has been spent.

Each of the Councillors were given time to express their views on the progress to date. They all had serious concerns at the way in which they have been mislead by Council Officials. An amount of debate took place and it was accepted that the members of the Celbridge Area Committee had acted in good faith when giving details of the amount of funding required to have the project completed. That the cost of the new bridge had now doubled was due to inaccurate information given by Council Officials and this misinformation had a direct bearing on the amount of objections and appeals against planning permissions granted in the area. The meeting then considered three options that the County Manager had presented to the Celbridge Area Committee at their meeting on 31st July 1997.

 Do nothing until full funding was available through development levies. This would take approximately seven years.

This option was rejected as the cost of the new bridge would probably increase quicker than the amount of incoming levies and the time scale was extreme.

 Install a footbridge and traffic lights on the bridge at a cost of £300,000. The footbridge would be part of the final new construction when the project is finally finished.

Some residents ask that this option be carefully considered as there may be some merit in it considering the Councils apparent lack of determination to replace the complete bridge. There were also strong concerns raised against accepting this option. The concern for personal safety along with the appearance of such a structure was raised by several residents. The frustration caused by delays at the traffic lights may lead to drivers ignoring them and speeding to beat them. People, especially children, may continue to use the road rather than climb the footbridge. The use of such an amount of money from the fund would cause the final solution to be delayed even further.

 Go to the full Council for permission to raise a loan from the amount required to complete the project. This would take approximately two and a half years.

Councillors Griffin and Murphy cautioned the meeting that this option would require the support of the majority of Councillors at full Council level and there could be problems getting that support. Following some debate this option was unanimously approved by the meeting. A motion will be placed, by the Celbridge Area Committee, before the next full Council meeting to raise a loan to complete the project. This loan will be repaid by future development levies raised in the area.

Bernard Durkan suggested that a meeting be arranged between the County Manager, local T.D.s, the Celbridge Area Committee and a delegation from the Bond Bridge Action Group. This meeting could have detailed discussion to move the project forward and impress upon County Officials the need for urgent action to resolve the issue. Michael Fitzpatrick undertook to arrange this

meeting as soon as possible after Minister McCreevy returned from Government business in Hong Kong.

The residents also approved an escalation of the campaign. This would include a demonstration from the motorway bridge on the Straffan Road to Bond Bridge. The protest was organised for Saturday 27th September at 2.00 p.m.

MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

Kildare Development Plan is Rejected as Defective for a Second Time

Last Year's Rejection

On Monday 23rd September 1996 the then Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin, made his historic intervention in the planning process in County Kildare. After repeatedly warning that maverick rezoning was undermining public confidence in the entire planning process, he acted on that day to freeze the passage of further development plans for the time being in County Kildare. "I had hoped", he commented, "that Councillors in Kildare would heed these warnings, but they have not, and I regret that I have now been forced to take this unusual step". Such action was a timely response to excessive rezoning proposals by councillors, which in the case of Maynooth, proposed enough new residential lands to facilitate an increase in population from about 9,000 people to over 21,000 by the year 2,001.

This Year's Rejection

A year has gone by; the Minister has changed, and after gutting a sensible Strategic Plan prepared professionally for them, Kildare County Councillors sent the remnants off to the Custom House in the hopes of being allowed to resume rezoning. Maynooth Planning Alliance and their colleagues in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning during the past year have, however, continued to highlight the folly of going back to the bad old days and have adopted a variety of strategies to inform people and politicians alike of the consequences of large scale rezoning in places such as Maynooth. Senior politicians in all of the parties, including the Taoiseach, have been made aware of the concerns of the people of Maynooth, and of North Kildare in general, that a national settlement strategy must be implemented as a matter of urgency if both developed and underdeveloped parts of Ireland are not to become further polarised in the years ahead. September 12th 1997 will be remembered as a significant day when the concerns of the community were explicitly recognised by the Minister.

The 'Dear John' Letter

On Friday September 12th Minister Dempsey directed a senior official to write to the County Secretary refusing permission for an extension of time to complete the County Development Plan pending a radical revamp of their proposals.

The draft submitted, it was contended, "does not appear to provide a definitive strategy for the implementation of these policies". While one section states that there is a need "for the development of a hierarchical settlement plan for the county as a whole", the Minister notes that "the plan does

not go on to develop that hierarchical settlement pattern, notwithstanding the availability of population projections in respect of the appropriate electoral areas". The Minister commented that "the reference to "carefully chosen zoning of lands in the remaining towns of the north-east' appears open to different interpretations, especially as no criteria for such zoning is specified in the plan".

In summary this was deemed by the Department of the Environment to be an incompetent plan. This being the second time in a year this has happened, it is an indictment of the inabilities of some Kildare County Councillors to listen to the wishes of their communities, or to the sensible voices of their own professional planners. Once again as we go around the block for the third time on this one, *Maynooth Planning Alliance* requests local representatives to plan for a future Maynooth which grows naturally and at a pace which enables its amenities, character and quality of life to be preserved.

Maynooth Planning Alliance congratulates Minister Dempsey for his good judgement in rejecting this plan. His actions mean that the Kildare Development Plan, which should be reviewed every five years, is now over 12 years old and that every national political party has now rejected our councillors' attempts to carry on as before. A culture change is obviously required.

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

Moyglare Village Clean-up

The annual clean-up in Moyglare Village has not yet taken place this year. The Committee has decided that a skip will be provided for this purpose only if at least ten people approach us confirming that they will make themselves available to complete this work. Despite the good work by Mr. Paddy Flynn in keeping the grass cut, weeds along the roadside throughout the estate was mentioned in this year's Tidy Towns report.

Moyglare Village residents to receive invoices

Less than 50% of residents in Moyglare Village have paid their share of the cost of upkeep in the estate. The Committee has agreed that in fairness to those who have paid, an invoice will be sent to residents who have not yet paid the £20 fee.

Moyglare Village boundary with the Moyglare Road

Kildare County Council has replied to our request to finalise the boundary between Moyglare Village and the Moyglare Road with the following reply: "the Developer has put down a beech hedge as the Planners requested and they will be monitoring its success. No wall was sought under planning conditions in 1985. The existing hedge was to be retained. Hence, the planners opted for a replacement hedge." A few simple questions need to be asked:

- 1. Who is protecting the interest of residents, one would have thought it was the planners?
- 2. As the Developer illegally removed the original boundary surely a hedge of similar mature standard would be the least he would have been required to provide, instead of beech twigs?
- 3. The Developer failed to meet the conditions of his planning permission between 1985 and 1996. Surely this failure should mean that the standards which are required in 1996 to complete a development are the ones that should now apply?

At the front of Moyglare Village, the developer provided two Public Open Space areas which are used by the children from both Moyglare Village and the Moyglare Road area. The failure by Kildare County Council to ensure that the safety of over two hundred children in this area will come back to haunt them when an innocent child is killed or seriously injured. The very least that can be expected is that this association will object to all further development in this area because of the increased danger of the extra traffic to the lives of our children.

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


Mr. Ashe thanked Fr. Boylan for his willingness to undertake and complete any projects entrusted to him as School Chaplain, and said he would be greatly missed.

TWO LOVERS OF PEACE

Two women who captured the hearts of the world died a few weeks ago. Although there were few similarities between their lifestyles there were many similarities between their funerals. Mother Teresa - the Nobel Peace Prize winner - survived by her niece Agi Bojaxhiu and her son Massimilian (who live in Palermo in Italy) who were at Calcutta for the funeral. They are her nearest living relatives.

Princess Diana's sister Lady Sarah McCorquodale in her reading at Diana's funeral summed up the Christian attitude to death with:

If I should die and leave you here awhile, Be not like others, sore undone, who keep Long vigils by the silent dust, and weep. For my sake - turn again to life and smile, Nerving thy hand and trembling heart to do Something to comfort other hearts than thine. Complete those dear unfinished tasks of mine And I, perchance, may therein comfort you.

This reading applies equally well to the Missionaries of Charity founded by Mother Teresa.

The choir of Westminster Abbey conducted by Martin Neary sang:

Make me a channel of your peace:
Where there is hatred let me bring your love,
Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord
And where there is doubt, true faith in you.
O Master grant that I may never seek
So much to be consoled as to console;
To be understood as to understand,
To be loved as to love with all my soul.

This was very much the theme of Mother Teresa's life. She was often compared to St. Francis of Assisi. What a strong mind in a frail body!

Princess Diana's other sister Lady Jane Fellowes summed up with

Time is too slow for those who wait,
Too swift for those who fear,
Too long for those who grieve,
Too short for those who rejoice,
But for those who love time is eternity.

One of the Missionaries of Charity, when asked on radio, if she thought that the numbers of helpers, including some from this country, would lessen now that Mother Teresa was gone replied - perhaps those who came because of Mother Teresa might go but those who had come to help Jesus would remain.

The State funeral given to her in India concluded with wreaths of flowers from 50 different nations and groups throughout the world laid on the altar. What a fitting tribute to someone who had started out in life with 'Flowerbud' as her middle name at her baptism. The Altar cloth bore the words Works of love are works of peace. What a life and how fitting that during her lying in state her order had what Mother called the anniversary of Inspiration Day - the 10th day of September 1946 when she first felt called to do something specific for the poor all around her in Calcutta. Could she have in her wildest dreams thought that by so doing she would be given a state funeral attended by Queen Fabiola of Belgium, Queen Noor of Jordan and Queen Sophia of Spain, the Duchess of Kent and the First ladies of America, France, Canada and leaders of so many other nations. Life is stranger than fiction.







MAYNOOTH TASK FORCE DRAWS UP STRATEGY

In May last a Task Force was formed to draw up a submission to Telecom Eireann's Information Age Town Competition. The winning town, recently announced as Ennis, will benefit to the tune of £15 million in investment in information technology. The Maynooth submission, although put together in a short period of time and dependent solely on voluntary effort on the part of the Task Force members, has been favourably reviewed by all who have read it. In drawing up the submission the Task Force evaluated the strengths and weaknesses of Maynooth as a town and as a community. The submission naturally focused the very real assets which we possess - the strong education sector including the university, the college and the post primary school, Maynooth's status as an historic town, our young population and Maynooth's location at the western end of a hi-tech corridor. Despite these advantages Maynooth is faced with a whole range of challenges for the future and the Task Force has undertaken to continue its work and draw up an Action Strategy which might provide a useful framework for the town's future development.

In August the Task Force presented the outline of its proposed programme of work to the Community Council and since then it has been engaged in a series of meetings in an attempt to tease out the issues which any future strategy should address. Amongst the areas being addressed are:

- the defintion of a character or brand for Maynooth that can be used to drive the strategy and link the elements of the plan
- development of an employment strategy which seeks to attract new, and optimise existing, employment opportunities
- establish how the relationship between town and university can be structured for the greatest mutual benefit
- the need to establish a set of guiding principles for the future development of Maynooth so that the quality of life in the town is secured and improved
- consider how the tourism potential of the town can be optimised with minimum disruption to daily life
- identification of the sports, leisure and amentiy facilities of the town and how they can be developed for the benefit of the community
- in terms of administration to identify the appropriate structure to develop and manage the action strategy

Groups and individuals are invited to make written submissions to the Task Force which should be addressed to Dr. John Cullen, Main Street.

MOTHER TERESA AT MAYNOOTH

Cardinal Cathal Daly awaited the arrival of Mother Teresa at St. Patrick's College. She was coming to the college to give the annual Trocaire lecture. The crowds poured in - clergy, students, laity and school children in their uniforms. Before long the church was filled to capacity. They were all eager to catch a glimpse of Mother Teresa and to listen to her words of wisdom. She had arrived in Dublin to visit the convent of her order the Missionaries of Charity off the South Circular Road in Dublin. She attended Mass at

Donore Ave. Church. She called on the President Mrs. Robinson at the Aras.

Meanwhile the crowd gathered at the college. The college choir sang. People prayed and meditated long before her arrival. It was an evening of prayer and music. When Mother Teresa arrived the interior of the church was filled with light as people held long lighted candles. Mother Teresa moved to the altar. So small and frail yet with a wonderful voice. In her talk she spoke about the need for prayer saying that prayer was the way to have love and peace in the community. She was hopeful about an increase in vocations to the priesthood. She told her listeners that sin is what she feared most. Prayers were said in 9 languages including Croatian, French, German, Hindi, Irish, Italian and Russian. It was a meeting which will long remain in the minds of those lucky enough to be present.

During her stay in Dublin she was made a Freeman of the city - the 61st. person to be so honoured. Thousands attended the ceremony which was held in the open air outside the Mansion House in Dawson St. The first days of June 1993 will be remembered in the history of Maynooth. What changes in 4 years, Cardinal Daly in retirement and Mrs. Robinson gone to Geneva as Commissioner for Human Rights.

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

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THE MATURE STUDENT

Most weekends in Maynooth, places like The Roost, Caulfields, The L.A. and Bradys are packed with local people enjoying a few pints and the craic. As Maynooth is a University town, the locals mix extensively with students.

One is led to wonder if, and how often, the notion has crossed the minds of some of the more mature local people to become students themselves. Perhaps they have thought of the idea but quickly dismissed it as not being something for them. Even worse, they may have thought that they would not have the brains to study for three or four years full time and anyway they never got their leaving. Even peer pressure might come into the reckoning - my mates would break their hearts laughing at the idea of me going to college. Another obstacle might be ones domestic situation.

Let me assure you the notion is not that "airy-fairy". Today there are many, many mature students attending third level education who have achieved excellent academic results and can look forward to a more fulfilling life. In itself, the mere fact of acquiring a Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree or any other degree gives you real confidence in yourself.

If you have got over the major hurdle and you have decided to embark on a degree course you certainly will need to give the maximum time to your studies. If there are children or other dependents relying on you on a regular basis, it will be necessary to make alternative arrangements.

During the academic year there will be pressure on you to get projects prepared for dead lines plus at the end of each year there will be the usual examinations which will require every minute of the day. If you have been working all your life or unemployed and start college, for the first few months there will be a sense of unreality about your life. You will have to get into the swing of organising your week around the various lectures and tutorials you must attend and if you are in the 50's bracket, you will have to adjust to having very young people around you all the time. This should not pose any great problem as you are all commencing studies together and in this particular field you have a common goal, sharing notes and opinions on the particular subjects you have embarked upon. The subjects you choose are of vital importance. Most mature students follow an Arts Degree course. This can be a course in English, Irish, Geography, History, Anthropology, Sociology, Economics, etc. The college will help and guide you as to the best courses suited to you. In Maynooth, you will be expected to take on three disciplines i.e. Economics, History and Sociology the first year, then dropping one of these disciplines and continue with the remainder for two years, when hopefully you will attain your BA Degree and go on further if you so desire.

Perhaps at this point I should throw in to this discussion a short list of do's and dont's.

The Do's

Try to attend all lectures and tutorials.

Try and get your essays in on time - leaving them to the last minute is not a good idea, especially around exam times when you want to leave yourself free for study.

Make full use of the library - the staff are very helpful.

You will be given a list of books that you are expected to read on your chosen discipline; it is a good idea to buy one or two of these books as when exam time comes around all the important books will have been grabbed up from the library just when you will need them most.

Plan some form of strategy as to how to approach your exams by putting time aside for each exam.

Get copies of previous years exams to get an idea of what is required.

Get your hands on other peoples essays and see how they have approached essay writing.

Try and become computer literate - it certainly helps at the later stages.

On a personal note - Because you are sitting for long periods of time studying it is wise to ensure you exercise regularly. In other words break away from studying or reading in the library and take a walk. Instead of using the car, walk or cycle to the college if you live reasonably close.

If you have any problems or something that is worrying you, college life or a domestic problem, the College Chaplain is very approachable.

The Don'ts

By all means get involved in the general activities of College life but don't get so involved that it interferes with your academic ambitions.

If you can manage at all, don't take on any form of employment whilst attending College - it will eat into your time for study.

Don't neglect your health by burning the candle at both ends. Enjoy your time at the college but moderation is important.

Whilst doing a full time degree course you still have to live. If you are presently on the dole, you may qualify for Third Level Allowance (TLA). This basically is dole money each week whilst attending full time education. You can get details from your local Unemployment Office. You may also qualify for a full students grant or part thereof. For this grant contact your County CB Health Board in the form of subsidy towards your accommodation. At the beginning of this discussion I talked about enjoying a

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

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
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

VIDEO REVIEW

Mars Attacks! (12'S)

This is the latest in a recent spate of 'alien' movies from a Hollywood that seems to be attempting to cash in on the success of the television series 'The X Files'.

It's directed by Tim Burton (who appears to live on another planet anyway) and stars a whole host of screen luminaries; Jack Nicholson, Pierce Brosnan, Danny De Vito, Rod Steiger, Glenn Close, Michael J. Fox, to name but a half dozen. There's even a cameo appearance by that famous Welsh Bard, Tom Jones! The story is a tried and tested 'space invaders' affair. An armada of Martian space ships hovering above Earth - will the little green meanies attack or won't they? Pierce Brosnan is the scientist who devises a way of successfully communicating with the little visitors, although the machine can only translate the phrase "We come in peace"!

The film is billed as a black comedy, which, assuming your IQ/vocabulary reaches the dizzy heights beyond "UGH", is

highly suspect. Nor is it in the same league as that fabulous 'B' movie blockbuster 'Independence Day', (which it copiously draws upon) either in content or special effects. Its one saving grace is the performance of Jack Nicholson as the U.S. President, which he hams up beautifully as only he can.

All in all a very disappointing film that could have been so much better, given the cast and the obviously huge budget.

Verdict: Only very mildly entertaining.

Shine (12's)

Is the harrowing true story of David Helfgott, the gifted Australian concert pianist who, because of pressure from his father to attain perfection, lapsed into a nervous breakdown that lasted nearly twenty years. From his beginnings as a child prodigy, we are given an insight into the mind of this tortured young man whose life and talent are taken over completely by his demanding and loveless father. In an effort to win his approval he attempts to conquer one of the most difficult piano pieces ever written and in a superb sequence the young musician physically breaks on stage under the sheer emotional weight of the piece. Geoffrey Rush, who is a noted Australian theatre actor, plays Helfgott in one of the best performances likely to be seen this year. Armin Mueller-Stahl is brilliant as his psychotic domineering father, who makes Leopold Mozart seem like your favourite uncle.

This is a film that is at the same time harrowing, awesome and beautiful and a tribute to the ability of the human spirit to survive. Well worth a look.

Verdict: Quite simply brilliant and unmissable!

The Crucible (12's)

Based on the McCarthy witch-hunt in Hollywood in the 50's, which saw almost the entire movie industry put on trial for so-called 'Communist activities', this is Arthur Miller's adaptation of his own play for the big screen and in its new setting to celluloid it loses none of its original power.

The story is set in Salem, Massachusetts, in 1662, and stars Winona Ryder as Abigail, the minister's niece who indulged in a little black magic in the woods at night. These goings-on inevitably lead to accusations of witchcraft and to avoid being barbecued, she claims that the family's servant put a spell on her and her partners in slime. When local farmer John proctor (superbly played by Daniel Day Lewis) hears of the witch trials, his attempts to discredit Abigail leads to his own wife being accused.

This film fared pretty badly at the box-office, which is surprising because the cast (which also includes Paul Schofield, Peter Vaughan and Joan Allen), the direction and chiefly Miller's script, are terrific.

Performances from Lewis and Winona Ryder are first rate and the movie is just about as true to the period as you're likely to get. If you're fed up with the latest movie craze for digitized special effects and techno rubbish, this thoughtful, intelligent and moving film may be just for you.

Verdict: Terrific!

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MICHAEL CUSACK FOUNDER OF THE G.A.A.

Maynooth G.A.A. followers had many visits to Croke Park during the year - perhaps you were in the Cusack stand. The stand is called after Michael Cusack who just over 150 years ago - on 20th September 1847 was born in the parish of Carron in the Burren area of Co. Clare. He trained as a teacher at Malborough St. Training College and taught at Lough Cutra N.S. He had his eyes set on bigger and better things. By the age of 24 he was the English and Maths teacher at St. Colman's College in Newry. From there he went to Kilkenny College, to Clongowes and to Blackrock College. Blackrock College then, as now, was a well known rugby college.

Cusack was a great believer in physical exercise for young people. In Dublin, at that time, weight and jumping events were largely ignored in favour of races. When he arrived at Blackrock he set about introducing athletics to the students. At the college sports in 1875 he organised a hop step and jump competition.

He himself was a noted athlete and in 1875 he won the 16 lb. and the 42 lb. shot events at a meeting organised by the Dublin Amateur Athletic Club. He organised a National Athletic meeting in Dublin at Easter 1880. In 1881 and 1882 he was the Irish champion weight thrower. In 1882 he founded the Dublin athletic club - open to all men. Cusack wanted everyone to play organised games. Dublin Hurling club was formed in 1882 and a year later the Metropolitan hurling club.

Cusack set up the Civil Service Academy - a school designed to help people enter the Civil Service. Soon he had his academy students out on the playing field - usually the Phoenix park. On December 8th 1883 the first properly organised hurling match in Dublin was played. Metropolitan beat Cusack's Academy. On Easter Sunday 1884 Metropolitan team took the train to Ballinasloe for a game on the fair green there against Kilimor. When he saw the standard of play he knew a code of rules for hurling was needed.

On 1st November 1884 at 3p.m. at Hayes Hotel, Thurles the first meeting took place of what became know as the Gaelic Athletic Association for the preservation and cultivation of national pastimes. Early in 1885 Archbishop Croke of Cashel gave the G.A.A. his unqualified approval.

In Dublin, in February 1886, Cusack refereed a hurling match between south Galway and north Tipperary. The first Dublin Club to be affiliated was Metropolitan. First country club to be affiliated was Clara in Co. Offaly. First hurling match under G.A.A. rules was at Tynagh with 6000 spectators. First football game under G.A.A. rules was at Callan Co. Kilkenny. Cusack died in 1906.

In 1913 the former city and suburban race-course was purchased by the G.A.A. to become Croke Park. In August

1938 the Cusack Stand was opened by Padraic MacNamee of Belfast the first Ulster President of the Association. The 150 anniversary of his birth was celebrated by his home county winning the McCarthy cup. A fitting tribute to a great man.

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SCOIL UÍ RIADA NEWS

On Wednesday 17th September Mr. Aidan Herron kindly accepted an invitation from the Board of Management of Scoil Uí Riada to talk to the parents of the school about the Department of Education's new Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE) programme. Mr. Herron was a former member of the Expert Advisory Group on RSE to the Minister for Education and has now returned to his primary school teaching duties. He addressed the meeting in a private capacity as a parent and teacher himself.

Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE) seeks to provide children with opportunities to acquire knowledge and understanding of relationships and human sexuality, through processes which will enable them to form values and establish behaviours within a moral, spiritual and social framework. In his presentation Mr. Herron stated that an effective RSE programme is much more than just the provision of information, it should be delivered in such a way as to allow each child to assimilate that information and learn how to apply it to their own particular lives. The programme seeks to promote the development of skills and abilities which will enable children to better understand themselves, to communicate with others, to deal with conflicts, thereby empowering them to make the right decisions. An important focus of the programme will be the promotion of self-confidence and the fostering of selfesteem, important tools in enabling children to cope with changes in their lives as they grow.

The RSE programme syllabus is a spiral one extending from infants to sixth class. Expanding in scope each year and developing key topics further in ways which are appropriate to the age and stage of development of the pupils. The content for the RSE programme is presented in "strands" entitled Myself and Myself and others.

Mr. Herron highlighted that the first task in the development of an RSE programme in the school is to develop a school policy. This policy should reflect the core values and ethos of the school and should not confound the philosophy of the home. It is a written statement of the aims of the programme, its organisation within the school and how it will meet the needs of pupils, parents and teachers.

At the meeting a representative committee was established to facilitate consultation among the partners (parents, teachers, Board of Management) for the development of the RSE policy. Each of the partners will have distinctive contributions to make to the drawing up and the implementation of the RSE policy. The partners on the policy committee are represented by teachers (2), parents (2) and members of the Board of Management (2). The committee has been given the brief to:

- (a) draw up a draft policy statement.
- (b) to present this draft statement to the partners at a future meeting as part of the consultative process.
- (c) to review the feedback and to present the revised policy statement to the Board of Management for approval.

When agreed by the Board of Management the statement of policy will be made available within the school community.

HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

- To destroy all plant and mould growth, make up a strong bleach solution and pour over the growth, then wash off with water. Protect skin from bleach by wearing gloves.
- Clean windows by rubbing over with crumpled balls of newspapers.
- 3. Never plug a bleeding wound with cotton wool as this will disturb the blood clot when the plug is removed.
- 4. Never use steel wool pads or abrasives to clean stains in a stainless steel sink. Neat washing-up liquid on a damp cloth should do the trick.
- When cleaning your carpet, avoid uneven use of shampoo solution on the carpet as this can cause patchy colours and over-wetting can cause shrinkage.



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FANTASTIC RESULTS FOR MAYNOOTH POST PRIMARY STUDENTS.

The school had truly outstanding Leaving Cert. results this year. Pride of place must go to Barry McKeon and Hugh Denman who both achieved 6 A¹ grades at Higher Level - a maximum 600 points. Only 55 other students achieved this out of the nation-wide 62,500 students who sat the exam. Aengus Martin also got 6 A grades (580) points and 11 students got 500 points or Higher.

As well as our two top students achieving the maximum points with 6 A¹'s - twenty five students got 6 Honours or more and more than 50 got 4 honours or better. It is very gratifying also to note that of the 114 students who sat for the exam 109 would be deemed to have an overall pass.

These results are tremendous bearing in mind none of these are repeat students and the school has an open enrolment policy for all in the catchment area. It is also worth noting that all of these students participated in all of the normal social/cultural activities associated with the school such as football, debating, musicals etc. Great credit must go to the parents, students and teachers and proves it is possible to enjoy yourself in school and still keep focussed on your exams.

MAYNOOTH 1798 COMMEMORATION INITIATIVE

A good turn out was present at the Public Lecture in the Glenroyal Hotel on Tuesday 23rd September entitled "Understanding the 1798 Rebellion in County Kildare and Maynooth". The lecture was delivered by Liam Chambers, a doctoral student of history in Maynooth College and the author of a book entitled Politics and Rebellion in County Kildare 1790 - 1803, to be published by Four Courts Press in early 1998.

Liam's lecture revealed that Kildare has not received due recognition for the extent and relative success of the Rebellion throughout the county. From 1796 the United Irishmen politicised and organised a secret revolutionary army of 16,000; the leadership and rank and file included Catholics & Protestants of all classes; the leadership employed a strategy which succeeded in liberating much of the county, including Maynooth; hundreds of rebels were killed at the battle of Ovidstown and in a massacre at Gibbet Rath on the Curragh; due to the failure of Dublin to rise, the Kildare army based itself at Timahoe in the Bog of Allen, engaged in fugitive warfare and ensured that Kildare held out even longer than Wexford.

But it was the details on Maynooth which were most revealing. It was regarded as a "seditious" town by a Lt. Kane of Laraghbrien, houses were burned and some people were "punished" by Government troops in an effort to disarm the population and a Scottish regiment was billeted upon the locality.

Five hundred rebels from the camp at Timahoe entered the town on 10th June and 11 local yeomen were captured. Some seminarians, accused of United sympathies, were expelled from the College but Fr. Andrew Ennis, the then P.P. of Maynooth, was reported to have been supportive of the rebels.

United Colonels George Luby and Hugh Ware, and a Owen Lyons were leaders from the Maynooth area.

After the lecture a lively questions and answers session took place and a group of volunteers came forward to consider

appropriate ways to mark next year's bi-centenary at local level. Ideas included; commissioning a pamphlet on the Rebellion in Maynooth; hosting a 1798 music and poetry event with the Band, erecting a memorial; a "Lord Edward Fitzgerald" open day in Carton, etc.

The evening concluded with the Chair, Mary Cullen, inviting Allison Maxwell and Stuart Lane to read some poetry.

The below is Stuart's poem about a Richard Turner who was killed at the battle of Ovidstown, whose body was recovered by his mother and is buried in Ladychapel graveyard.

RICHARD TURNER

I meditate by your grave Two hundred years after Your death in a muddy Ditch at Ovidstown Bayoneted in the Belly By a frightened youth In a red coat

Did you sit with your
Fellows round the campfire
At Timahoe, laughing
And talking of daring
Deeds to come? Maybe

New Republic where all
Men would be free and equal
Or perhaps you joined
The United Men just
For adventure

third draft. They have hailed it as a 'stunning debut novel'.


It has been accepted by the Scolastic Lists in England who have ordered a 2000 copy advance.

Pedestrians are again allowed 10 seconds to cross the road. Traffic is allowed to move for 1 minute 10 seconds.

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

DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

TEA BRACK

12oz plain flour
1 tsp. baking powder
12oz raisins
1/4 tsp. mixed spice
8oz brown sugar
1 egg
1oz chopped almonds
1oz mixed peel
1/2 pt. cold tea

To Bake:

7" square tin lined and greased.

Method:

Steep raisins, sugar, almonds, cherries and peel in cold tea overnight. Sieve together flour, baking powder, salt, and spice. Add a little of the flour mixture to the fruit and mix thoroughly. Add the beaten egg, fold in the remainder of the flour. Turn the mixture into the prepared tin. Bake $1\frac{1}{2}$ 2 hours. 370° F Gas mark 5. Allow to cool before removing from the tin.

SMOKED SAUSAGE CASSOULET

Total time: 30 minutes Calories per serving: 774

Serves 4

2 tbsp olive oil 12 small onions

1 garlic clove, crushed

350g/12oz smoked sausage, such as chorizo,

cut in chunks

400g/14oz can butter beans, drained.

400g/14oz can flageolet beans, drained.

400g/14oz can chopped tomatoes with herbs 1 tbsp tomato purée

1 tbsp Dijon mustard

seasoning

2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley, to garnish.

Heat the oil in a large pan and fry the onions and garlic for 5 minutes until soft. Add the smoked sausage pieces, butter beans, flageolet beans, chopped tomatoes, tomato purée, Dijon mustard and seasoning to the pan and mix together well.

Bring the mixture to the boil, then reduce the heat, cover and cook for about 20 minutes until heated through.

Sprinkle with parsley and serve immediately, with new potatoes if you wish.

GOOD OLD-FASHIONED SPOTTED DICK

Serves 6

110g (4oz) self-raising flour

110g (4oz) white breadcrumbs

A pinch of salt

110g (4oz) shredded beef or vegetable suet

85g (3oz) golden caster sugar

85g (3oz) currants

85g (3oz) raisins

The grated rind of 1 orange 85ml (3fl.oz) milk

Mix the flour, breadcrumbs, salt and suet together in a bowl. Stir in the sugar, dried fruit and orange rind. Using a round-bladed knife, add the milk and mix together to form a light, elastic dough. Knead lightly until just smooth. Shape into a neat roll about 15cm (6in) long.

Make a 5 cm (2in) pleat across a clean tea towel or large piece of muslin, or pleat together sheets of greased greaseproof paper and foil. Wrap the dough loosely to allow for expansion, pleating the open edges tightly together. Tie the ends with string and make a string handle.

Place the roll in a large pan of boiling water, cover and boil for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Remove from the pan and place on a wire rack over a plate, to drain. Snip the string and roll the pudding on to a warmed serving plate. Serve sliced with egg custard.

SMOKED MACKEREL GRILLS







4 smoked mackerel fillets, fresh or frozen, defrosted

3oz/75g cream cheese spread 1 egg, size 3, beaten

20z/50g medium oatmeal

2oz/50g white breadcrumbs

A few lettuce leaves and 1 tomato, quartered to garnish.

Peel away the skin from the back of the fish and using a sharp knife, slice mackerel in half horizontally.

Lift off the top half and spread the cream cheese over the flesh. Replace the top of the fish. Mix the egg with a little water. Pat the fish dry with kitchen paper to remove excess oil. Mix the oatmeal and breadcrumbs together. Brush the fish with the egg and coat thoroughly in oat mixture.

Cook on barbecue or under a preheated grill for 5 minutes or until crisp and golden. Sprinkle with any remaining crumbs when turned over. Serve the fish on a bed of lettuce, with wedges of tomato.

Tips: If you wish, use packet savoury breadcrumbs to coat the fish. The finished result will be different in colour and flavour but still tasty.

Also, try a cream cheese spread flavoured with chives or with ham instead of the plain one.

Microwave: Preheat a browning dish for 5 minutes, add a little oil and cook on medium (450 watts) for 3 minutes, turning once. Remove from the pan and drain on kitchen paper, serve as above recipe.

Gardening Hints

OCTOBER GARDENING HINTS

HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

Cut back the dead foliage of all perennials, any time from now until spring. If you can put up with your borders looking a bit scruffy, delay tidying up until early spring. The dead foliage provides winter shelter for ladybirds and other beneficial insects like ground beetles, a bit of food for birds and, when it's covered with hoar frost it looks wonderful.

Clean up pampas grass (Cortaderia), cutting off or pulling out dead leaves. But don't ever do it without wearing strong gloves as the leaves have sharp edges. One popular method is to burn off the dead foliage, but this isn't a good idea. Not only can it damage the plant, but you'll also kill lots of useful hibernating insects.

Perennials can be lifted and divided when they've formed large clumps, usually after three or four years. Lateflowering varieties like Michaelmas daisy (*Aster*) and red hot poker (*Kniphofia*) are best left until spring.

LAWN

An established lawn should be mown less frequently as growth slows down; mowing can usually stop around the end of the month.

Rake out the 'thatch' (a layer of dead grass) if you wish, and aerate the lawn if drainage is poor. Top-dressing can improve all types of lawn by revitalizing the upper layer of soil and increasing the rooting area. First rake out the thatch and mow the grass. Mix up a compost of three parts of sieved garden soil, two parts of sharp sand and one part of sieved compost (coconut-fibre if you wish). Spread a 1-2-cm (1/2-1-in) layer over the lawn and work it in well with the back of a rake, but take care not to smother the grass completely. It'll look messy for a couple of weeks but the grass soon grows through. If the lawn is rather sparse or worn, mix a bit of grass seed in with the compost.

SHRUBS



Hardwood cuttings can be taken from deciduous shrubs any time over winter. Now is the best time, however, when the plants have just lost their leaves and the soil still has some warmth to help speed rooting. Take cuttings around 20-25 cm (8-10 in) long from straight healthy shoots, making a straight cut on the base.

GREENHOUSE

Watering and ventilation need care now that temperatures are falling. Grey mould or *Botrytis* can be a menace in winter, particularly where there's a combination of a damp, humid atmosphere and low temperatures.

Good greenhouse hygiene and ventilation can prevent it becoming a severe problem.

Pick off dead or faded leaves, and space plants out to allow good air movement around the foliage. If any signs of grey mould do appear, remove all the affected parts of the plant and put them in the dustbin-not on the compost heap or you'll be spreading the spores. Spray remaining plants with copper fungicide, which will help prevent the spread of disease.

Before watering, stand the full watering can in the greenhouse for a few hours so the water can warm up. Do the same with compost before sowing seeds or potting up young plants. Plant growth will slow down a lot, so take care to water sparingly. Remove, dry and store capillary matting if you didn't do it last month, as it holds lots of moisture and will make the atmosphere too humid. Ventilate the greenhouse as much as you can during the day while still maintaining temperatures, and close up at night. If you're heating with paraffin or gas, there needs to be a tiny bit of ventilation at all times. Clean out the greenhouse and insulate ready for winter if you didn't do it last month. Check that all glass is secure and replace any cracked or damaged panes. Give wooden framed structures a coat of preservative if necessary.



Checklist



- •Harvest apples and pears; store undamaged fruits.
- •Plant spring bulbs. Tulips can now be planted.
- •Fix grease bands to apple trees if you have not already done so.
- •Lift, divide and replant old clumps of rhubarb.
- •Propagate fruit bushes like black currants by hardwood cuttings.
- •Prepare a site for asparagus to be planted next spring by digging in plenty of manure.
- •Sow broad beans outdoors in mild areas or on light soils.
- •Bend cauliflower leaves over the curds to protect them from frost.
- •Sow winter lettuce under cloches, in coldframe or greenhouse.
- •Sow hardy annuals for spring pot plants.
- •Plant lily bulbs in pots in the cold greenhouse.
- •Buy material like bubble polythene to have ready for protecting shrubs and containers from severe frosts.
- •Finish planting evergreens by the end of the month.
- •Move frost-tender shrubs in containers into the greenhouse.



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Development Plan Rejected Again

Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John McGinley are delighted that the new Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey T.D., has carried on the good work of the previous Minister Brendan Howlin by rejecting the Draft Kildare County Development Plan.

In rejecting the plan the Minister has drawn particular reference to 'carefully chosen zoning of lands in the remaining towns of the north-east'. Minister Dempsey agrees with the statements made by Cllr. John McGinley when the plan was being discussed in Naas in February of this year, that 'carefully chosen' is not defined in the plan and therefore makes no sense. Indeed Fianna Fail and Fine Gael Councillors saw the rezoning of either side of Carton Avenue as being 'carefully chosen' !

To put matters bluntly, the draft plan submitted by the F.F. F.G. coalition on Kildare Co. Council was a con job, which intended to allow Development to continue unabated in Maynooth. They have been found out and now must start again.

Emmet Stagg in welcoming the move has called on Bernard Durkan T.D. and Charlie McCreevey T.D. to finally get off the fence and drag their Councillors into line with the wishes of the residents of Maynooth and North Kildare.

Bond Bridge

In the last issue of the **Newsletter** we outlined our astonishment at how Kildare Co. Council got their figures so wrong on the costings for Bond Bridge. The Co. Manager had promised to supply a comprehensive report to the Celbridge Area Committee at its meeting on September 5th.

At the meeting on September 5th the Co. Manager did not even attend. The assistant Co. Manager presented a one and half page paper which was a rehash of previous reports. It did not indicate in any way how the Council got their figures wrong. Cllr. John McGinley expressed his extreme anger at the non attendance of the Co. Manager and the ridiculous report presented.

Because of the treatment of Councillors by the officials, we now must press ahead at the full Council meeting on September 29th to secure the loan of £700,000 to meet the shortfall on the project. This will have to be an all party push with full backing of the Celbridge Area Committee. It's time the officials were given a message from North Kildare. The Bond Bridge project must go ahead NOW.

95 Foot Mast For Town Centre

Esat Digifone have sought Planning Permission for a 95 foot mast at the Garda Station in Maynooth. Such a proposal is totally off the wall and must be resisted at all costs.

Cllr. John McGinley has objected to Planning Permission being granted on the following grounds;

- 1. The structure is inappropriate for a town centre location.
- 2. It would have a serious negative impact on the amenity value of the Geraldine Castle (£1 Million is going to be spent on the Castle over the next year and a half).
- 3. It is contrary to the 1985 County Development Plan.
- 4. It conflicts with Ministerial Guidelines that such masts should never be sited in residential areas.

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

LABOUR PARTY NOTES Cont.

The local labour Branch are confident that the application will be rejected at County Council level but the difficulty will arise with an appeal to An Bord Pleanala. They are granting these masts on appeal to date regardless of the location.

Dunboyne Road

Cllr. John McGinley has written to the Co. Engineer expressing his extreme dismay that public lights and a footpath are still not in place from Lyreen Park and Nagle Court towards Maynooth village. It is now over a year since former President Mary Robinson opened the senior citizens houses in Nagle Court. Yet they are now facing a second winter without footpaths or lighting.

Development levies have being provided to pay for this work and one developer has proposed carrying out the work in lieu of the levies. The developer proposed this last May and still no action from the Council. Hopefully the Co. Engineers intervention will resolve this ridiculous situation.

Speed Limit Extension - Newtown

Emmet Stagg T.D. has been advised by the Co. Secretary that his request for an extension of the 30 m.p.h. speed limit on the Rathcoffey Road has been agreed to. The speed limit will be moved from its existing position at Cluain Aoibhinn to beyond Ashleigh and will be incorporated in the 1997 Speed Limit Bye Laws.

Silken Vale

The following motion was agreed by the Celbridge Area Committee at its meeting on 5th September.

'That favourable consideration will be given to an application from North City Builders for Retention Planning Permission of the estate, excluding the footbridge and walkway, when they have completed all other works in Silken Vale and paid a sum of money, in lieu of the bridge, to Kildare Co. Council to go towards other works in the area e.g. replace the wooden bridge over the Canal'.

Thornton's 'Heineken Step' And Commerical Building Refused Planning Permission

Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John McGinley objected to the planning applications in support of the North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group.

We are very pleased that both applications were refused planning permission.

The Heineken Step was refused permission by Meath Co. Council on 20th August. The reasons for refusal included the following:

- 1. In the opinion of the Council the Heineken step was inaccurately described and was in fact not a Heineken step. Therefore the mound to be retained would constitute disorderly and haphazard development which would be inconsistent with the use of the site for residential, agricultural and equestrian purposes.
- 2. The development for which retention was being sought comprises a waste disposal site which is unauthorised and is therefore contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.

The Commercial Building was refused planning permission by Meath Co. Council on September 10th. The reasons for refusal included the following:

- The proposed development is contrary to Meath Co. Councillors policy of channelling commercial development to existing serviced centres and restricting development in rural areas to agriculture and other rural activities.
- 2. The development would constitute disorderly and haphazard development in this rural area.
- 3. Traffic hazards would be increased.

Brookfield Avenue

Following representations from Brookfield Residents
Association Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John McGinley
contacted the Development control officer in Kildare Co.
Council concerning the unsightly area opposite the 34 homes
in Brookfield Avenue.

The Council have replied stating that the Developer will be contacted with a view to clearing up the area and properly seeding the open space associated with Brookfield Avenue.

However Enforcement proceedings will in all likelihood be issued in this matter by the Council.


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MAYNOOTH TOWN A.F.C.

Our recent game against St. James United had a late kick-off due to being unable to gain access to our pitch. On arriving for the 11.00 a.m. morning kick-off the road leading to the pitch was found to be blocked by travellers caravans and motor vehicles. The caravans and vehicles were placed access the roadway ensuring that access was impossible. On first refusing to clear the roadway Gardai were called to the scene and after some heated debate the road was eventually cleared for all vehicular traffic to pass by. This road is protected at either end by a heavy duty steel barrier erected by the Co. Council some months ago. These barriers have been securely locked since erection and this was the first break-in. The filth and damage that generally lies in the wake of those incursions would have to be seen to be believed. There is no regard for property, public health, the environment and above all the welfare of the players and public who attend the pitch on match days or on days when just out for a walk.

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
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

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

NEW START FOR UNIVERSITY

For over two hundred years St. Patrick's College and the town of Maynooth have co-existed, side by side. For much of that two hundred years, while the College was exclusively a seminary, the level of contact between the two was minimal. Since the nineteen sixties when the first lay students were admitted, the College's impact on the town has grown. Now almost 4,500 students converge on Maynooth each October, up to half of them taking up residence in the town. Add in several hundred teaching and support staff and the effect on the town's economy is obvious. So, changes in what we think of as "the College" are important for the town.

The last few weeks have seen the launch of NUI, Maynooth and many readers will have attended the Open Day on October 11th to celebrate the beginning of a new era. The town now has its own independent university which in status stands alongside UCD, UCC and the other colleges which form the National University of Ireland. For a town of its size, Maynooth is probably unique in western Europe in having a fully fledged university in its midst.

Such a situation poses both problems and opportunities. During term time perhaps a quarter of the town's population is made up of university students while the town's social and recreational amenities remain under-developed. A number of the towns estates are becoming increasingly dominated by rented housing accommodating students. In some cases this has proved to be a problem for long term residents.

But the opportunities for Maynooth as a university town undoubtedly outweigh the problems. The local economy already benefits enormously from the presence of the university and further expansion, both in staff and student numbers, is planned. New computer courses in the university are set to produce highly skilled graduates who can benefit from local employment opportunities.

All of this poses a challenge to both town and university. How, as a community, can we make the most of the fact that we have a growing and vibrant university in our midst? Editorial

At certain times during the day Maynooth is the victim of traffic gridlock. At around 9 o'clock in the morning any motorist leaving the Newtown area and attempting to make their way down Parsons St. onto Main St. and then up the Straffan Rd. towards the motorway can count on the journey taking anything up to 20 minutes. On their way they will invariably pass a long tailback of traffic from the Square back up the Straffan Rd. sometimes extending back to the intersection with the Celbridge Rd. Travelling around the town at lunch time and as the schools close at 4.00pm is equally frustrating. Without the by-pass Maynooth would surely be at a permanent standstill at this stage. For the many commuters driving into the city each day the volume of traffic is also becoming a major headache. On some mornings traffic jams can extend all the way from Woodies in Lucan right through to Ballyfermot and journeys to the city centre from Maynooth at peak commuting times take anything up to 75 minutes. It is interesting to note that developers in Maynooth are selling houses promising easy access to the city with journey times of 30 minutes - they don't mention that this can only be done at 3.00 a.m. in the morning!

With Maynooth destined to grow further perhaps as we sit in traffic jams around the town it might be worth considering how much more housing/people/traffic we want in Maynooth.

Kildare County Council - A Tribute

When I hear people whining, moaning and generally criticising Kildare County Council, it makes me see red. You know the usual, "they don't do this, they should do that, they won't do the other, I never get a reply, haven't heard from them in months, blah, blah, blah" and on it goes. People just don't realise the huge amount of administrative, not to say financial, planning that goes into 'getting things

Take the cutting back (or not, in this case) of hedges and trees (Rathcoffey Road springs to mind). A simple operation, you might think. But you'd be wrong. It's not just a matter of sending somebody out with a clippers. The decision has to be made to send someone out, after the work has been prioritised, then it's a case of who to send, when to send him, how to approach the job etc., etc., and all this planning takes time.

Then there's the recently upgraded Straffan Road. Nobody can deny that it was badly needed to cope with the huge increase in traffic from the new motorway. Nobody can deny the difference it's made to the traffic problem in Maynooth. Yes, I know the only thing it's done is to take a larger volume of traffic, at a faster rate, to the same teejunction in the centre of town. I know it possibly could have been planned slightly better, maybe utilising some of the space at the Square. But K.C.C.'s engineering, road design or architectural departments can't be expected to think of everything. Remember when it used to take as long as two to three minutes to turn from the Main Street onto the Straffan Road? We certainly don't want to return to those

Some people seem to think that all you have to do is click your fingers and, hey presto! a bridge appears. If only it were that simple! The Bond Bridge fiasco is a typical example of the impatience of people, once they get an idea into their heads that a project is urgent.

Action groups and committees are formed in an effort to pressurise the Council into doing something about it. That's all very well, but you must realise that a project of this size takes years of planning, feasibility studies, designing, engineering and draughting before it can get off the ground. Then there are the various meetings, environmental, costing and so on. Okay, so the cost seems to fluctuate on a weekly basis, but hey, what's a few quid here or there between friends. And all right, so the County Manager couldn't be bothered attending the meeting to explain the discrepancies. Come on, he's a busy man (he was probably attending an important conference on 'road traffic management in the Gobi desert' or some such). Anyway, the present structure has served the community of Maynooth quite well, thank you very much, for years and years. It's only relatively recently (ten or fitteen years) that the replacement of the bridge has become urgent, and as we all know, Rome wasn't built in a day.

So does Kildare County Council deserve all the criticism levelled at them? Definitely, and more! When you consider that we pay their wages, because a County Council has no money of its own, and when you consider the quality of the so-called 'professionals' that we get for our money, it's a self-answering question. Most of their engineering, architectural, town planning or estimating staff, not to mention managers, assistant managers, development officers etc. would find it extremely difficult to survive in the commercial sector. They suffer from the 'reverse Midas syndrome' - almost everything they touch turns to junk! It would seem that St. Mary's has become the County retirement home for the intellectually challenged, where they live out the remainder of their lives in blissful ignorance of the real world.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question:

I worked for years until I got married and had children. I paid full stamps (P.R.S.I.). Will I qualify for a pension when I am 66?

Up until now, in order to qualify for a Contributory Old Age Pension you must meet certain conditions:

- You must have started paying insurance (stamps) before reaching age 56.
- You must have at least 156 weeks full rate PRSI (insurance stamps) paid since first starting work.
- Have an average of 20 weeks full-rate PRSI paid or credited per year over your working life.

In your circumstances you may not have an average of 20 over your working life but from 21st November Social Welfare are introducing a new Pro-Rata Old Age (Contributory) Pension. The conditions for this are:

- That you entered insurance before reaching age 56 (as **(1)**
- That you have at least 260 weeks full-rate PRSI paid
- That you have an average of at least 10 weeks fullrate PRSI paid or credited over the period from 1953. or the date you started paying PRSI, if later) up to the end of the last full tax year before reaching age 66

This means that people can qualify for a reduced pension if they have less stamps or credits over their working life This is likely to benefit many people who were "out of the system" for long periods of time.

Social Welfare have a leaflet "Pension Check" SW 19A which is available from your local office.



Census Results Suggest Maynooth is likely to have a Baby Boom

New data from the 1996 Census is now available which contains a breakdown of population for each District Electoral Division by age group. This enables comparisons to be made between Maynooth and some of the other rapidly growing towns in Kildare, and particularly provides a pointer as to what schools and other facilities for young people will be required in the years ahead.

The table below contains comparative percentages for age groups for the towns of Naas, Leixlip, Newbridge, Celbridge and Maynooth, the five largest towns in Kildare.

| Town | 0-14 years | 15-24 years | 25-44 years | 45-64 years | 65+years |

| Newbridge | 29.4% | 19.8% | 30.5% | 17.2% | 3.1% |
| Leixlip | 26.8% | 18.4% | 30.3% | 17.8% | 6.7% |
| Celbridge | 33.6% | 13.1% | 38.2% | 11.6% | 3.5% |
| Maynooth | 20.4% | 28.5% | 35.2% | 11.4% | 4.5% |

It is apparent that Maynooth presently has far fewer children in the under 14 category than is the norm for the other towns. To take the most dramatic case, one in three people in Celbridge is under the age of 14, while only one in five in Maynooth falls into this category. At the same time, Maynooth is close to the average of the other towns for that proportion of its population in the 25-44 year age group - the age group in which most increases in family size occurs. In other words in Maynooth we have the young married couples, but the children they would normally be expected to produce haven't arrived yet! Less of a proportion of Maynooth's population is in the 45-64 age group - the age group indicative of families who have completed child rearing.

Child Numbers Set to Increase Dramatically

Even making some allowance for the effects of some enumeration of students in the Census data, the message is fairly obvious. Maynooth is set to experience a rapid growth in population as young married couples in its vast new estates start to have children. This is not a surprising finding. Anyone familiar with the housing situation in Maynooth will already have deduced that many of the new three and four bedroom houses are not always going to contain two people - or at least were not bought with that purpose in mind! If the proportion of children in Maynooth today was to be the same as the average for the other Kildare towns we would have somewhere between 500 and 800 additional children, equivalent to another secondary school. Should the future pan out along the lines experienced by other neighbouring towns such as Celbridge, the consequences would be serious. A much larger complement of children for Maynooth would have major implications for schools as well as for leisure and sports facilities. The implications would also be felt around Maynooth as the catchment areas for schools would undoubtedly change dramatically. Many such problems are currently being experienced in neighbouring towns with much lower rates of growth than Maynooth.

Time for a Rethink by Councillors

Do we have the foresight necessary to start planning for this future now while there is still time? The answer is not encouraging. In the Amended Maynooth Development Plan our councillors proposed, against the advice of professional planners, to facilitate a further huge influx of population to double the 1996 population of this town. This would seem to Maynooth Planning Alliance to be the worst possible course of action.

Maynooth Planning Alliance calls on our elected officials to recognise that the last thing Maynooth needs at present is further huge in-migration. It calls on them to await the preparation of strategic planning guidelines for the entire Greater Dublin Area before progressing any further with the Maynooth Development Plan. Only by this approach can young families look forward to a future for their children in Maynooth with confidence.






CLUAIN AOIBHINN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION


C.A.R.A. has now registered with the Garda Síochana as part of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. A well attended meeting was held in the

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HALLOWE'EN IS A MAGICAL TIME FOR CHILDREN

Halloween marks the end of Autumn. The Summer is over but we still have days of warm sunshine. It's the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness and the most colourful of all the seasons. The orchard apples and pears are ready for picking. Ripe juicy blackberries glisten in the hedgerows. It is very pleasant to walk along the College grounds and hear the rustle and flutter of the falling leaves spreading their glorious hues of golden browns, yellows and reds. Some of the birds have left us already and the swallows are preparing for their long journey to the warm south. In the morning white mists rise from the fields and canal and in the evening the sky is a mass of colour with the sun setting down over the Kilcock Road.

Hallowe'en is a magical time for children. They dress up and go from door to door singing, dancing and playing. They hold out their bags for offerings of fruit, nuts and barm brack. For us as children in the country we got our hazel nuts, damsons and sloes inthe woods. While cycling home we would hear the rustle of the birds and the scurrying of the rabbits in the undergrowth. We would frighten each other saying, "IT'S A GHOST".

My mother had a great sense of Hallowe'en. We sat around the big kitchen table waiting for the big dish of colcannon. For those of you who have never tasted colcannon, it is an experience not to be missed. Curly kale, potatoes and onion are boiled and then mashed. The best bit is the big knob of homemade butter dropped into a well in the middle of your plate of colcannon. Home made butter was made by churning the cream in a big wooden churn. We all took our turns at turning the handle of the churn. Mother made the colcannon extra special by hiding gifts in our plates - a coin wrapped in muslin, a small stick or a rag. These treasures each had its own meaning. The person who got the money would never know a poor day - if you got the rag the opposite would be the case. The colcannon was followed by thick slices of home made barm brack with lots of butter. We all watched to see who would get the ring - then as now whoever got it would be the next to marry.

We didn't have electricity in those days of pre-television Wicklow. Father picked the largest turnip from the pit in the back field. He scrubbed it and carved out a nose, a fearsome mouth and two eyes. In the middle of the head went a hole for the placement of a candle.

Hallowe'en took on a special meaning for us in later years as Nuala was born on All Saints' Day. The following day is All Souls Day. It was traditional for us to attend mass and pray for the Holy Souls. Graves of loved ones are visited at this time of year. Can you remember visiting the church on the way home from school, saying a quick prayer, gaining a plenary indulgence for each visit, nearly knocking down

each other in the rush to get in and out as fast as possible and have the most visits.

Unfortunately the parents of today cannot allow their children experience the same sense of fun which we enjoyed at this time of year. However we can do what we can not to let the old traditions die.

THE DANGERS OF BANGERS AND BONFIRES!

If you are allowing a bonfire:-

- Make sure it is sited on a hard surface away from houses, garages and overhead cables.
- Don't use petrol or paraffin to light the fire.
- Adult supervision is essential.
- Fireworks are illegal and dangerous. Last year 36 children in the Dublin area had to be treated in hospital with injuries from fireworks.
- If the bonfire gets out of hand make sure everyone leaves the area immediately and call the fire brigade.

If bonfires are being allowed they should be supervised by adults who should make sure that:

- * That bonfire is located away from buildings, trees and overhead cables.
- Petrol or paraffin is not used to start the fire.
- * Rubbish which might contain bottles or aerosols is not thrown on to the fire.
- * The children do not play with burning fragments or stand too close to the fire.
- * The fire is kept under control.

Also parents should supervise 'trick or treating' by children at Halloween. Older people, especially those living alone, can find repeated knocks on their door after dark, bonfires and bangers disturbing and frightening.

Firework Top nine Safety Code for Adults

Young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance and follow the safety rules for using sparklers. Only adults should deal with firework displays and the lighting of fireworks. They should also take care of the bonfire.

Here are the top nine safety tips for adults:

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks except when ready to set one off.
- 5. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw away.

- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Pets:

Animals do not like bonfires or fireworks. The flames and noise upsets them. They should always be kept safely indoors. Make sure that they can't get out through open windows and doors. It is best to keep the curtains closed too and it may be necessary to keep them indoors for several nights around October 31st.

Sparklers

These are often viewed as being harmless but they do burn at fierce temperatures. Sparklers should not be given to anyone under the age of five. To a young child, the heat from a sparkler is equivalent to the heat from a welding torch.

So - Safety rules for Sparklers:-

- Never give to young children under the age of five;
- Always wear gloves with sparklers, preferably leather ones;
- * Hold it at arms length while an adult lights it for you;
- Never wave it about near someone else as you could burn them;
- * Never hold a baby in your arms when you are holding a sparkler;
- * When the sparkler has finished, put it into a bucket of cold water straight away and leave it there.

Halloween night in recent years has become a problem for fire brigades and a particularly upsetting time for children and the elderly - all stemming from bonfires. Parents should know where their children are on Halloween night so that they cannot hurt themselves or cause annoyance to others.

Bonfires badly sited, inadequately controlled and fuelled by unsuitable materials cause approximately £50,000 of damage each year to public property not to mention the fear and anxiety to elderly people living nearby.

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MAYNOOTH SCHOOL RECEIVES EUROPEAN RECOGNITION

Maynooth Post Primary School has been recognised by the European Community as a school of excellence.

Maynooth is among 100 schools chosen from 17 European Countries to be given this recognition.

There are 4 more just such schools in Ireland: they are Killinarden Community School (Tallaght), Colaiste Mhuire (Ennis), Kilkenny College and St. Pauls College (Raheny).

The school will be involved in a European Project on self evaluation for the next 5-10 years.

The schools will be expected to evaluate where it is going as a teaching institution in this time period.

Maynooth Post Primary will have to meet with the other 4 Irish schools involved to decide on what mechanisms will need to be put in place for the project to be successful.

The schools will have to decide how to approach issues such as academic achievements, support for people with learning disabilities, social development, the schools link to home and the community among other issues.

Europe will then assess the schools development in these areas.

This project will be jointly funded by the EU and the Department of Education, though as yet, the exact allocation of funds has not been decided.

The Department of Education see this school self evaluation as being a school development planning project.

Maynooth Post Primary's acting principal Sean Ashe hopes that the school's achievement will place it in a better position with the Department of Education to obtain further physical and staffing facilities.

The school has more applications than there are placements in the school so hopefully this project will provide the school with a means of growing bigger if it isn't possible to grow better.

#### WORLD YOUTH DAY

In mid November a group of young people from Maynooth will meet in Dublin with people from all over Ireland. They will have many memories to share of an unforgettable week

On 17 August 1997 three teenage boys and three teenage girls left Maynooth to catch the ferry to Holyhead. They were joining about 400 other Irish on their way to World Youth Day in Paris. Bishop Brady the auxiliary for Dublin accompanied them. By one o'clock they were on one of the eight coaches taking them south to Dover where they got the ferry to Calais and then on to Paris. As they approached Paris they were given colour coded badges with name and country which they were to wear for the whole trip. Food vouchers were given to keep them sustained. Their French hosts awaited their arrival. They stayed with French families - the Larchers, Guittons and others. They were welcomed to the parish of Jean Baptist de la Salle.

Three hundred thousand other young people from all over the world were making their way to Paris. What a gathering at Port de Versailles. The heat was 30 but plenty of water was available. Nigerians, Australians, Italians, Americans. Irish and every nation under heaven were represented. English and school French were very useful. The badges showed where each person came from and were an instant ice-breaker.

The highlight of the visit was the Pope's visit to the assembled teenagers at Long Champ racecourse. The teenagers slept in their sleeping bags at the racecourse. They were each given a candle to light during the vigil. Andrea remembers the little dots of light everywhere. The Pope stayed with them until 10.30p.m. He baptised ten people. On the following morning he was back again at 9a.m. for Mass. The blessing by the Pope and the shouts of joy from the assembly are fond memories.

The Irish group were made to feel very welcome. Everywhere people noticed their badges. "Irish - we love Ireland" was heard so many times. 17 year old Truriane Guitton and all the others will long remember their Irish guests. When the delegates come together in Dublin this month they will relive moments that they were very privileged to share. Thanks to Nicola Conlon of Moyglare and University College Galway, Andrea Ennis, Fiona Hoare of Dowdstown, Padraig and Michael Madden of Straffan Way and Declan O'Rourke of Kingsbry for reminding us of an unique event.

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

#### National University of Ireland

At long last Maynooth receives the recognition it deserves. The Universities Act 1997 earlier this year made Maynooth a constituent University of the National University of Ireland. It now has equal status with Cork, Dublin and Galway as a constituent university of the Federal National University of Ireland structure.





The Taoiseach Mr. B. Ahern T.D., on Monday 13th October, laid the foundation stone of a new science building of National University of Ireland, Maynooth. It is being built at a cost of £9.6 million funded by a partnership of European Research Development Fund, the National Exchequer and University monies. Its purpose built laboratories and teaching spaces is on a par with the best on offer in European universities and will support 700 undergraduates and more than 50 postgraduates and postdoctoral researchers.

This has been brought about by the hard work of everybody involved in the College, especially the President, Staff and Students.

Three of the departments moving into the new building are Space Technology, headed by Professor Susan McKenna - Lawlor. Her research team and campus company, Space Research Ireland Ltd., produce hardware and software for space missions flown by the four major space agencies. Also Professor M. Quinn (Chemistry) and Professor J. Slevin (Experimental Physics) their research activities extend to Universities and Research Institutes in the USA, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy and the UK.

Part of the Taoiseach's address stated, "I would like to congratulate the President, Staff and Students of this fine institution without whose drive, dedication and commitment

the project would not have come to fruition. Developments here in Maynooth over the past few years have contributed greatly to the economic, social and cultural advancement of the whole country."

# MAYNOOTH POST - PRIMARY, TRANSITION YEAR HIKE.



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
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#### **FAMILY DAY NUI**

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#### THE VARIATION IN PRICE BETWEEN FRESH & FROZEN VEGETABLES!

On comparing the price of fresh vegetables to frozen vegetables it was immediately clear that fresh vegetables are far cheaper than their frozen counterparts. In most cases the frozen variety are twice as dear as the fresh.

Fresh is cheaper and better for you and costs much less so why do so many of us opt for the more expensive and not so healthy alternative of frozen foods?

Well the answer is simple, its just that frozen is by far more convenient. You also save on actual cooking time even though you lose on money. Obviously for a vast number of people time is more precious than the pound but for those who believe in being economical read on.

Below is a comparison between the prices of fresh vegetables and frozen vegetables per kilogram.

#### What the People Say!

Of course by now we are all aware of the 5p rise in the price of alcohol. This means nothing to a lot of people but to others it is definitely worth a thought. We decided to ask opinions on this matter from both the public and the publicans of Maynooth.

Paddy, the Manager of the Roost said that in his opinion if you can already afford to drink at previous prices a 5p rise won't make much of a difference.

Des Hegarty, the manager of the Leinster Arms said "that if the brewery keep putting up the price of the pint they are cutting off their nose to spite their face because at the end of the day this increase is not down to the publican but to the brewery". He explained that publicans have been forced into rising the price of the pint as a result of the brewery upping the price of their kegs by £4.40. A keg of beer will contain 88 pints so the price of each pint must go up by 5p to reimburse the publican as he still has to pay his tax to the Government among the other bills he must pay.

Noel Brady, owner of Brady's said "The distillers have been allowed this increase and VAT so the publican has to raise his price to keep his profit margin in line".



#### Romeo and Juliet (12's)

Every so often, a film comes along that just seems to sneak up on you quietly, and then leaves you totally gob-smacked. This is such a film. Everybody is acquainted with the story of the young starcrossed lovers from rival families, so I won't bore you with going over the plot. Suffice to say that Leonardo De Caprio as Romeo, and Claire Danes as Juliet, are absolutely perfectly cast. The original text has been strictly adhered to, so nothing of the power of the plot is lost. Direction and photography is first rate and would be very difficult to improve upon. This is Shakespeare's finest tragedy, and very few who see it could fail to be moved by it. This movie is definitely destined to be a true classic of the cinema. What more can I say?

#### The English Patient (15's)

This is the opposite end of the cinematic scale - a big, lavish movie full of ...nothing. It's a beautifully shot, beautifully directed epic, which is guaranteed to bore the pants off you! Ralph Fiennes puts in a sterling performance as the badly burned stranger being cared for by nurse Juliette Binoche in North Africa, during the Second World War.

Of course they fall in love, but things aren't all they seem to be. Or are they? Is good old Ralph a spy or isn't he? Will the pair live happily ever after or not? When he recovers. will they part, never to see each other again? Do you really give a toss?

This is a film that would have been far better as a play on BBC 2. At least then, you could have switched channels and watched something more enjoyable like Prisoner-Cell Block H.

This movie is over two and a half hours long, and will keep you hanging on to the edge of your seat, in case you fall off in your sleep. It's a tribute to the power of publicity how it managed to walk off with so many Oscars.

Verdict:

Bo-ring!!

#### **Space Truckers** (12's)

It's the year 2094, and Dennis Hopper is the cynical old freight pilot transporting an unknown cargo bound for Earth. His space team is Debi Mazar, the girl of his dreams, and Stephen Dorff, his reckless young sidekick. When they

This film is total ham and cheese, and doesn't pretend to be anything else. It's just great craic! The cast, including cameo performances from Charles Dance and George Wendt, are deliciously over the top. The movie was filmed mostly in Ardmore Studios in Bray, and failed to make any kind of impact at the box-office. Which is a pity because, taken at face value, it's a very good film - full of good, clean. nonsensical fun. And it doesn't take itself in the least bit seriously.

If you've been wiped out by Romeo and Juliet, and your (English) Patient's wearing a bit thin, this is just the bit of escapism for you!



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

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
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# Gardening Hints



Some Gardeners say that this is the end of the season, but really it should be looked upon as the beginning. There's no doubt that work done now will lay the foundations for a great garden next season.

Get the digging done, have a really good clean-up, order your seeds, finish new plantings where you can and, above all, go round the borders and correct your mistakes. We all make them and now's the time to put them right.

There's still all the summer's warmth in the soil, so plants that you move will get away quickly. So start with the big plants and take as much soil with them as you can. When they're replanted, pay special attention to the staking. Then mulch round the plant and water well - and that means for the whole of next season too.

#### **General Tasks**

**Bird boxes** should be cleaned of old nesting material which can harbour parasites. Wash them out with boiling water and repair them if necessary. Do this job well before late winter, when some birds will already be prospecting for nest sites.

Borders can be weeded and tidied at any time through the winter, so long as the soil is dry enough not to stick to your boots. Cut back the dead stems of perennials, chop them up and add them to the compost heap. Rake fallen leaves off plants, and either collect them to make leafmould or leave them on bare ground to rot down. Dig up and compost annual weeds, but burn or throw away the roots of perennial ones.

Protect delicate plants that can suffer in frosty weather, like cistus, fuchsias and penstemons, by tucking bracken or straw around their bases. Don't use peat or compost as these materials hold water and rot the plant.

Hedgehogs and toads often crawl into heaps of garden rubbish, particularly leaves, to hibernate for the winter, so check bonfires before setting fire to them. Hedgehogs tend to hibernate in compost heaps, so take a little care as you fork out the compost or turn it. When you're building a new heap, make a deluxe hedgehog home at the bottom: use an old washing-up bowl turned upside-down with a hole cut in the side and, leading from this, a piece of old drainpipe as an entrance tunnel.

#### **BULBS**

Nerines and other slightly tender, bulbous plants like *Agapanthus* that remain in the ground all winter benefit from a thick mulch of straw or bark in colder areas.

Most spring-flowering bulbs should have been planted by now, though tulips can go in up to the end of the month. Late planting also has the advantage of generally avoiding the disease tulip fire.



#### HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS AND ALPINES

Alpines with woolly or fleshy leaves dislike winter wet. Cover them with a small cloche or a pane of glass to keep off the worst of the rain. Lewisias really benefit from protection as they detest water lying in their rosettes of leaves - planting them at an angle also helps to prevent waterlogging. Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) also benefits from protection.

#### **SHRUBS**

Hardwood cuttings taken last year should be carefully lifted and moved to a nursery bed or potted up. Grow them on for a further year before, planting them out into well-prepared soil.

Protect shrubs from winter damage. Stake or tie in evergreen shrubs if necessary to prevent them from wind-rocking. Check the ties on all plants are secure and in no danger of rubbing. Mulch rhododendrons with chipped bark or compost to protect their shallow roots from frost damage.

#### CHECKLIST

- . Continue taking hardwood cuttings of shrubs and fruit bushes.
- Inspect potted bulbs regularly and water sparingly if necessary.
- . Feed flowering pot plants weekly with a liquid fertilizer.
- . Plant spring bedding and winter pansies by the end of the month.
- . Lift and store dahlia tubers as soon as possible.
- Twist off dead indoor cyclamen leaves and flowers where they join the corm: remaining pieces of stem can cause it to rot.
- . Pinch out the tips of autumn-sown sweet peas when they're about 10 cm (4 in) high.
- . Check that tree ties are securely fitted and in no danger of rubbing.
- Put guards round young trees if there's any danger of rabbit or deer damage.
- . Give wild-flower meadows a final cut so that the spring flowers can be seen at their best.
- . Drain hosepipes, roll them up and store under cover.
- . Lag outdoor pipes and taps to prevent them freezing, drain them if possible.
- Order seed catalogues.
- Clean pots and seedtrays with hot water and disinfectant, ready for next spring.
- . Plant garlic by the end of the month.
- . Force seakale either indoors or outdoors.
- Lift and force without chicory
- . Check stored fruit and vegetables; throw out any showing signs of rot.
- . Net brussels and cabbage to protect them from birds.
- . Prune bush apple and pear trees, and black currents.
- Stop feeding fish as they'll live off their reserves for the winter months.

#### Tomato and Pumpkin Soup



- 1. Preheat the oven to 190° C/375°F/Gas 5. Bring a large pan of water to the boil and add the rice, salt, whole cardamom pods cloves and cinnamon stick. Boil for 2 minutes then drain, leaving the whole spices in the rice.
- 2. Heat the oil in a pan and fry the onions for 8 minutes, until browned and softened. Add the chicken, followed by all the ground spices, the garlic, ginger and lemon juice. Stir-fry for 5
- 3. Transfer the chicken mixture to an ovenproof casserole and lay the tomatoes on top. Sprinkle on the fresh coriander, spoon over the yogurt and top with the drained rice.
- 4. Drizzle the saffron milk over the rice and pour over about 150ml/1/4 pint 2/2 cup of water.
- 5. Cover tightly and bake in the oven for 1 hour. Transfer to a warmed serving platter and remove the whole spices from the rice. Garnish with toasted almonds and fresh coriander sprigs and serve with natural yogurt.





- 4. Pour in the cream and simmer for 5-8 minutes longer. Serve the rice sprinkled with the pistachios in individual warmed bowls.





#### **FINE GAEL NOTES**

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested KCC to use the mechanical sweeper to carry out regular sweeping of the approach roads to Maynooth, as well as the Main Street. This should be done at least once every three weeks.

Over the past number of months, Cllr. Senan Griffin has pursued KCC into allocating private sites for those people earning up to £14,000 per annum. The County Council has now agreed to allocate eight sites in Leixlip with the prospect of more coming on line in the future. It is the intention of Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin to work towards making similar sites available here in Maynooth, and in other towns throughout the county so that those in the £14,000 or less income bracket have an opportunity to build and own their own home.

The local branch of Fine Gael wish to express their deep appreciation to all those who contributed to their recent collection. Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to remove the mound of topsoil / subsoil which is placed along the roadside at the Boy's National School on the Kilcock Rd., and to replace it with a proper tarmac finish, so that adequate and safer car parking can be made available to those parents who have to drop off their school children at this juncture. Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin have also requested that KCC provide the flashing warning lights as previously agreed, so that the Moyglare Rd. is made safer for all school - going children.

#### **Bond Bridge:**

The problems of Bond Bridge are well documented. Both Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin are actively pursuing Kildare County Coucil to ensure that the funding required from the Dept. of the Environment is made available regardless, be it in the form of a loan to the Council or a direct subvention. This bridge is a life or death issue, and simply cannot be neglected any further.

#### **Town Improvement:**

It should be noted that the Town Improvement Scheme to the Main Street is due to commence during November. The undergrounding of services and improved foothpaths will be most welcome, however it will undoubtedly cause major disruption to traffic along the Main Street.

#### **Barrockstown Waste Facility:**

It is the policy of Maynooth Branch Fine Gael to oppose this proposal on a number of grounds. Both Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin have lodged objections to Meath County Council and are delighted to learn that planning permission has been refused. It is vital that all residents of the area lodge an objection to any further proposals for this site.

#### Mast at the Garda Station:

The Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council agreed unanimously to recommend rejection of the proposal to erect a 100ft mast at the Garda Barracks in Maynooth. The main worry about this proposal is that An Bord Pleanala has been granting planning permission for such masts on a large scale throughout the country, and as a result of this, the Committee has asked the County Manager to take up the issue with the Minister for the Environment.

#### Silken Vale:

Cllr. Senan Griffin's following motion re Silken Vale was adopted by the Area Committee of Kildare County Council: "That Kildare County Council agreed to give favourable consideration to an application from the developer for the retention of Silken Vale estate as presently set out. This to exclude the provision of the proposed footbridge across the railway line and the proposed pedestrian access onto Greenfield Lane, subject to completing the estate and providing funds equal to the current cost of the footbridge, and that these funds would be available towards repairs to the existing footbridge across the canal."

#### **County Development Plan**

Kildare County Council has failed to gain an extension of time for the 1984 County Development Plan. The Minister for the Environment has rejected the current strategy and has requested that it be amended.

It is with concern that Cllr. Senan Griffin, the local Fine Gael Councillor read in the Labour Party Notes that he himself was involved in a "Con Job" in adopting the current strategy. In a statement to the local Fine Gael Branch, Cllr. Griffin outlined the exact position of his role. He also stated that he has always been upfront in all his actions about the Development Plan, which is in total contrast with those of the Labour Party. Cllr. Griffin also stated that Labour Party Councillors proposed a total of 225 acres of land for rezoning in Maynooth - this is a reality, despite the fact that the Labour Party stated during the last General Election that they, and they alone, were the sole voice against what they claim as excessive rezoning.

#### **Re Carton Avenue:**

The people of Maynooth should look at the development at Pebble Hill and Lyreen Park at the edge of Carton Avenue. Both of these developments were proposed by the Labour Party, as was the development of Carton Demense. It seems as though zoning, when proposed by the Labour Party, is deemed permissable, but if any other person, or group of persons proposed any other zoning, they are then castigated by them as being "excessive rezoners" and called "Con - Men".

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
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

#### THE LABOUR PARTY NOTES

#### **DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

A special meeting of Kildare Co. Council is being held on the 23rd October to discuss what to do as a result of successive Ministers rejecting the proposals of the majority of Councillors on Kildare Co. Council.

Labour Councillors will propose that we start from scratch and that any rezoning is in line with good planning and reflects the view of the public.

#### **BOND BRIDGE**

The proposal that Kildare Co. Council takes out a loan to complete the new bridge is on the agenda for the Councils monthly meeting on the 20th October. It was included on the agenda for Septembers meeting but was not reached. There are two main reasons why Councillors from outside the area should have no problem supporting the motion:

- 1. It does not take away money from elsewhere in the County.
- The County Manager has stated that the loan should be paid back from Special Development Levies over four years.

#### THORNTON PLANNING APPLICATION

An application for planning permission for a waste recycling facility at Barrockstown, has been lodged with Meath Co. Council by Mr. P. Thornton.

Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John Mc Ginley have lodged objections to the application on the following grounds.

- It is inappropriate to locate such a facility in a rural area. There are adequate lands zoned for industrial use in Co. Meath which would be more appropriate for such a facility.
- 2. The facility will cause a noise nuisance which will seriously injure the amenities of the residents of the area.
- 3. There is a serious danger that leakage from the process will pollute the ground water in the area.
- 4. The extra traffic generated by such a development would cause a traffic hazard.

Essentially locating such a facility in this agricultural area would be madness.

#### LITTER LOUTS

North Kildare Auctioneers persist in putting up illegal 'houses for sale' signs despite being told not to do so by the Council. At the Celbridge Area Committee meeting on

October 9th, Cllr. John McGinley recommended that Kildare Co. Council follow the example of Dublin Local Authorities by taking down signs and charging the offending Auctioneers for holding them. The County Secretary promised positive action on this problem.

#### STRAFFAN ROAD LANDSCAPING

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has sought a full report and action plan on the extraordinary waste of tax payers money. He advised the County Secretary that of 63 staked trees planted on Straffan Way, 32 are dead. The success rate has been no better in all the other areas along the road with more weeds than trees or shrubs.

#### PUBLIC CAR PARK

Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested the Co. Engineer to put bollards in place at the exit onto Doctors Lane near the E.S.B. sub station. a number of cars have used this pedestrian way to exit and enter the Car Park thus causing a danger to pedestrians.

#### NEW PEDESTRIAN LIGHTS - STRAFFAN ROAD

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has requested the engineers to position the new pedestrian lights close to the exit from the railway station on the Old Greenfield side. The engineers had proposed to locate the lights at the Glenroyal Entrance. A definite location will be agreed at the next meeting of the Area Committee on the 31st October.

#### CLOSING OFF DOCTORS LANE

The County Secretary stated at the last meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee that he saw no reason why procedures should not be put in place for the closure of Doctors Lane to vehicular traffic at the Dublin Road end. A decision will be made at the next Area Committee meeting when the relevant engineer will present a report.

#### MAYNOOTH PARKING BYE LAWS

Cllr. John McGinley told the County Secretary at the last area meeting to put these Bye Laws on public display in the library immediately.

#### POUND LANE/DOUBLE LANE

Arising from complaints from residents of the area Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested the Gardai to pay particular attention to cars illegally entering the Lyreen Area from Convent Lane and Mill Street.

#### NO LAND FOR PUBLIC HOUSING

There is no land in Maynooth for public housing and in order to rectify this matter Cllr. John Mc Ginley has tabled the following motion for consideration by the Area Committee.

'That land be purchased in Maynooth for housing as a matter of urgency'



'That the necessary steps be taken by this Council to enforce the law preventing the parking of commercial vehicles in housing estates'

#### MAYNOOTH SIGN ON LEIXLIP ROAD

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has asked the County Engineer to put this sign back in place. It was removed by the Council two years ago.

#### PARSON STREET

Telecom Eireann's contractors Rilmount have made a complete mess of Parson Street as a result of cable laying.

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has asked the County Engineer to ensure that proper reinstatement is carried out. He has also asked him to complete the traffic calming measures that were agreed for Parson Street over a year ago.

#### FAGAN'S LANE PUBLIC LIGHT

Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested Kildare Co. Council to provide additional public lights on Fagans Lane. At present there are no lights between Main Street and the Band Hall.

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

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

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## **Community Council Notes**

#### TOWN IMPROVEMENT WORKS

Community Council members at our November meeting were given details of the work being undertaken to improve the centre of Maynooth. The work which will cost £765,000 in total is being funded from the by-passed towns scheme.

Putting the utility services underground will cost £300,000 and the balance of the money will be spent on work which will include the paving of the footpaths and new street furniture.

#### COMMUNITY COUNCIL TO REVIEW HOW IT DOES IT'S BUSINESS.

In a discussion at the November meeting the Community Council considered how to encourage more of the members to play an active part in the organisation. Members were invited to join the sub-committees, most of which are very active in the community.

Some helpful suggestions were made regarding the bimonthly meetings which will be given further consideration. The possibility of reverting to monthly meetings was also raised together with the idea that the alternate meetings could include a discussion focusing on a particular issue.

Chairman, Mr. Tom McMullon invited members to bring issues that they would like to discuss at the Community Council meetings to the attention of the executive and these items would be included on the agenda for subsequent meetings.

#### TRIBUTES PAID TO FORMER MAYNOOTH GARDAI.

Sergeant Kearney informed the November meeting that Gardai, Martin Caine and Denis Bourke have both recently departed Maynooth Garda Station. Garda Bourke goes to Gorey, Co. Wexford as Sergeant and Garda Caine to Naas as Juvenile Liason Officer for North Kildare.

Mr. Tom McMullon leading the tributes said that both men will be missed in the town and this was echoed by many tributes from members of the Community Council. Garda Caine was complemented on his work with the youth in the area paricularly with the No Name Club.

#### COMMUNITY COUNCIL CO-OPTIONS.

Mrs. Anne Birchall was co-opted to the Council as a member for Old Greenfield.

Dear Editor.

I could hardly contain my anger when I read the following in the November edition of the Newsletter under the Maynooth Planning alliance notes.

"In the Amended Maynooth Development Plan our Councillors proposed, against the advice of professional planners, to facilitate a further huge influx of population to double the 1996 population of this town".

The Planning Alliance are fully aware of my position which was very public and predated the alliance itself. I had issued leaflets and called public meetings on the issue. It is not the first time I have taken issue with comments by the Alliance who have no trouble seeking assistance from me which has always been forthcoming but never acknowledged in a public fashion.

I have taken the position I did on planning not just in Maynooth but County wide. I did so because I believe there must be order to development and it must be more than just houses but the facilities that are necessary must be simultaneously provided. I was particularly pleased with Minister Noel Dempsey's letter in that regard, and should this new County Strategy which is actively under discussion (but not once referred to by the Planning Alliance) be adopted we will be in a strong position to argue for resources from the Dept of the Environment.

I am not sure why they are reluctant to acknowledge my own position but the least I would expect is that they don't misrepresent it which they did by using the global term our Councillors.

#### **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

#### Question:

I am on the Third Level Allowance from Social Welfare in my 2nd year in college. My girlfriend is working and we are considering moving in to a flat together. Will this affect my allowance?

#### Answer:

No. You met the conditions for the Third Level Allowance when you commenced the particular course of study. Your position will not be assessed until you finish your course and return to sign at the exchange. If your girlfriend was in receipt of a Social Welfare means tested payment then that would be adjusted (probably downwards because the Department will not regard your claims individually if you are cohabiting but will treat one of you as the "spouse" of the other for means test purposes) to take account of your living together.

The above poem narrates of a cold night in Bethlehem, when the Saviour of the world was born to a fair maiden. The hosts of Angels welcomed the King of the Elements, the child Jesus, single son of God, and issue an invitation to come and live with us until the end of time.

The translation may not be a totally accurate one as it is difficult to translate all the nuances of the original version. It is an old verse written at a different time in our countries past. But I believe that the central message of Christmas is captured in the poem. It is a message of welcome, of children and of hope which transcends time. We welcome most of all our new group of children. It will be the great pleasure of the scoil to equip them with the tools to open the windows of wonder of their language and culture. Our objective is to instil a lifelong love for their language and for learning. The ethos and mission statement of the Gaelscoil, as compiled by the parents is one of respect. The Gaelscoil respects all traditions and individuals.

We welcome our new set of Parents. They have been tutored by last years Parents in the ways of the Scoil. They have played an active role in the Gaelscoil events and we hope they will feel at ease and at home in the scoil.

We again welcome our Priomhoide, Máirin Ní Cheilleachair. Máirin has worked above and beyond the call of duty for the children and we are most grateful. We secured a very kind and able teacher with Laura Ní Dhuibh and we appreciate her genuine affection for the children.

The year 1997 saw the financial burden of supporting the school lifted from the shoulders of Cairde Committee. While it would be impossible to thank everybody for the years hard work in raising funds for the Gaelscoil, the Cathaoirleach of the committee, Eileen Fitzpatrick deserves great praise and credit.

As we look to 1998 we can only hope that it will be as successful and as pleasant an experience for all concerned in our Gaelscoil Uí Fhiaich.

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
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#### MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

The efforts of Maynooth Planning Alliance over the past year have been primarily focused on ensuring that Maynooth bears an equitable share of the future population growth of north Kildare, one that permits the town to grow at a pace which preserves its character and heritage and enables its diverse community to identify with, and be proud of, a town they can call home. To do this, a period of stability is required to enable new communities to knit together and not think of Maynooth as merely a commuter base. It was the alarming proposals contained in the amended Draft Development Plan to facilitate an increase in population from 9,000 to 21,000 over the next five years which galvanised people into forming the Maynooth Planning Alliance and initiated a coordinated campaign to highlight how damaging such proposals would be both for present and future inhabitants of Maynooth.

But while Maynooth was seeking to persuade its councillors of the folly of their rezoning plans, similar experiences were reported from neighbouring towns. In all, a provision for up to 50,000 extra people was being proposed for the north eastern towns of the county, equivalent to a city the size of Galway. Against the wishes of the professional planners, excessive rezoning of huge areas of agricultural land were being proposed with an enormous spectrum of potential impacts ranging from traffic paralysis to overloading of wastes on the River Liffey, to acute shortages of schools and other amenities. This realisation prompted the foundation of the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning. Maynooth Planning Alliance has been central in the activities of this body in bringing the issues to the highest possible political levels. Not unconnected to these activities it is worth noting that the passage of town development plans by Kildare County Council was suspended by Minister for the Environment Brendan Howlin in September 1996, and a further attempt to provide a strategic development plan by the Council was deemed defective by his successor Noel Dempsey in September of this year. A change in approach by councillors was obviously required.

It is with considerable pleasure therefore that now, at the end of 1997, a major measure of success can be reported in this area. Following a series of special meetings, Kildare County Councillors unanimously decided to adopt the strategic plan prepared for them by consultants which proposes an easing of pressures on towns like Maynooth and a diversion of growth towards the centre of the county. Councillors in voting to accept the strategy are now engaged in the detailed allocations of population required to implement it. The total additional population for the towns of this area is projected as 4,193 by 2001. Such a target increase will however require a revision of the Maynooth Development Plan to a much more modest level. The following table indicates that the already existing and unused residentially zoned lands can comfortably accommodate the target population. Undoubtedly it will take at least two Development Plan periods to undo the damage of the 1985 excessive rezonings.

If the strategy adopted is adhered to, a sensible resolution to the planning problems of north east Kildare will result. But any attempts to fudge the figures will be strongly resisted by Maynooth Planning Alliance. The Minister is unlikely to look kindly on any attempts to present the strategy as accepted and then carry on as before. Maynooth Planning Alliance will be monitoring the following key areas:

The Plan is designed to encompass the period 1996-2001. Any growth occurring during the period before the acceptance of the Plan must be incorporated into the figures. Land availability in October 1997 cannot be used as the criteria for establishing population growth from the census in 1996. No redrawing of the goalposts to start in October 1997 is acceptable.

The overzoning factor whereby councillors allow an 'error margin' in land allocation cannot be used to substantially increase the provision in individual towns. Error margins of 10-20% can be considered legitimate to provide for uncertainty in achieving the final figures but 100% and upwards is not.

Finally it must be emphasised that only a small proportion of future growth in the population of the town's concerned will require any additional lands. In Maynooth, for example, many four and five bedroom houses are occupied by a newly married couple. Their future children will be accommodated in the present housing stock and will not require lands to be rezoned to accommodate them in the next two or three five year plans.

It is clear that much has been achieved in 1997. To their credit, councillors appear to have taken the first step to placing the future growth of Maynooth on a sustainable footing and Maynooth Planning Alliance welcomes the progress recently made. They must not now shrink from the decisions which are required to implement this sensible strategy.



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

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

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### WORLD YOUTH DAY REUNION

Prepare to go to Rome in the year 2000 for the great Jubilee when the next World Youth Day will be held:- that is what the young people who met up again in November, to renew friendships made at last Summer's Youth Day in Paris, were told. In the meantime there will be gatherings of Youth at Lough Derg, Glendalough and Iona.

Many traditions have grown up around St. Patrick's name. Among them is the penitential pilgrimage to Lough Derg in Co. Donegal.

This year is the 1400 anniversary of the death of St. Columba or Colmcille. He founded monasteries at Swords, Durrow and Kells. Doire Choilmcille still bears his name. In 563 Colmcille went to Iona island off the Scottish coast. There he began a monastery. That is where the famous Book of Kells was written. The book is to be seen in Trinity College Library.

St. Kevin founded the monastery in Glendalough. After Kevin's death in the sixth century the monastery became a centre of pilgrimage. The monastery is one of the principal ecclesiastical sites in the country. The earliest settlement seems to have been at the remoter end of the valley. The remains of a small church stands on a narrow ledge at the foot of a cliff by the shore of a small lake. Glendalough, with its monastic ruins, its high cross and round tower will once again become a centre of pilgrimage as we approach the year 2000.

Rome in the year 2000 will certainly be a memory to be passed down the generations. The Archbishop of Dublin attended the reunion in Clonliffe College of a large number of the Paris group. Many memories were relived. Thanks to Fiona Hoare and Andre Ennis for bringing us up to date.

This poem of an earlier period is still relevant today:-

My tidings for you: the stag bells, Winter snows, Summer is gone Wind high and cold, low the sun, Short his course, sea running high. Deep-red the bracken, its shape all gone The wild goose has raised his wonted cry. Cold has caught the wings of birds; Season of ice - these are my tidings.

### MAYNOOTH TASK FORCE REPORT

Over the past month the Maynooth Task Force group have had a number of meetings outlining their work to date and suggesting a broad strategy for the future development of the town. So far the group has had a very positive response from Kildare Co. Council, St. Patrick's College, NUI Maynooth and a number of other bodies which we hope will become partners in the strategy. Last month the Task Force presented an outline of its proposals to a special meeting of the Community Council where there was also a positive reaction and the group received some valuable feedback. From our discussions with a number of these groups it is becoming apparent that the next couple of years will be crucial in shaping the future of the town. Kildare Co. Council is already committed to investing very significant funds to the Town Improvements Scheme and appears to appreciate the unique character of Maynooth as both a university and historic town. It is important that the town itself is positioned to exploit this fact. Similarly, as the new University finds its feet and reaches out into the community it is important that working relationships should be established between the two. Below is an outline of the draft proposals which have been presented to a number of meetings in the last month. Any groups or individuals are more than welcome to respond to the strategy. Responses should be addressed to Dr. John Cullen, Main St.

#### Character

- Use the old village to establish the character.
   Extend the main street development to include
   Carton Avenue and the lanes to define the village and link the elements.
- \* Preserve the historic or landlord town image of Maynooth by regulating for shop fronts, signage and the nature of commercial development.

  Encourage the retention of traditional shop fronts, stripped stone exteriors and the use of 'old' street furniture...
- \* Ensure a main street residential element is maintained and consider limited development in the immediate side streets to give the town width.
- \* Use the streets development to link with, and emphasise the importance of the college and canal.
- \* Ensure that the village remains a living and working space within the character framework.

### **Employment**

\* Develop a science / business park to provide a range of employment opportunities. Target medium sized companies with minimum impact on the town's facilities. Negotiate with the IDA to prebuild standard units with a residential character in keeping with the area.

- Reserve and subsidise a portion of the park to facilitate the growth of the existing and future campus or university industry. Use as breeder units for a set number of years and provide a Mentor service from a combination of Community and University resources.
- Given the current National skills shortage, use the projected graduate profile over the next number of years to attract relevant industry. Use the University research facilities as a further incentive, this could be operated to the mutual benefit of the Commercial and University interests.
- \* Work with Tourism interests to develop employment opportunities. In addition to seasonal employment this will also create off-season work in terms of research, maintenance etc.
- \* Work with the existing retail and service sectors to ensure that, within the context of the strategy, their potential is optimised.

### University

- \* Establish formal liaison structures with both the University and St. Patrick's College in recognition of their role and relevance in the town in both economic and character terms.
- \* Establish how the range of services offered in the town can better reflect its status as a university town
- \* Provide for the ongoing representation of the University and College in the implementation of the strategy.
- \* Explore areas of common interest in order to establish the greatest mutual benefit. This will include

#### **Employment**

Attracting and facilitating industry and providing employment opportunities for graduates and the wider community.

#### **Town Character**

Establish how the character of the town can more directly incorporate and reflect the College and University Campus

### **Promotion of Town**

Agree how a combined approach can be used to promote the town in the most efficient way. Consider how the economic potential of tourism can be maximised through co-operation.

#### **Facilities and Amenities**

Minimise waste by establishing how the facilities, skills and equipment separately available can be used jointly.

\* Develop a three way approach to student issues involving the community, university and the students union and encourage the opening up of university cultural and other activities to participation by local residents.

### Infrastructure

\* In order to establish and maintain the proper balance in the town, set a number of guiding principles to monitor growth and development. These should include

### Regional Equity

Ensure that Maynooth experiences its fair share of growth in the Eastern region. Identify an optimal growth scenario for Maynooth based on projected and potential increases in population.

#### Protection of Town's Character

Ensure that the future development of Maynooth is consistent with the character of the town, that its tourism potential is not hindered and that the position of the village as its heart is not undermined.

### Resource / Amenity Balance

Ensure that the population / resource balance is defined and maintained. This should be done on a pre-need basis in order to secure the quality of life for the community.

- \* In keeping with the town's character, and to develop the personality and atmosphere of the village, control through traffic and ensure parking restrictions are observed.
- \* Establish groundrules for future commercial development in both the village and the wider town. Ensure that the development reinforces and promotes the character.
- \* Take a view on natural boundaries so that the optimum or preferred size and shape of the town is determined and controlled.

### Tourism / Heritage

\* Secure heritage status to underpin funding and promotional benefit. The heritage company could also be used as a central control in terms of tourism

#### generally.

- \* Develop a brand image based on the town's character. This should be structured to illustrate the 'Landlord Town' origin and the depth of history and tradition in the combination of college, castle, canal and the town itself.
- \* Develop the reputation and identity of the town by establishing theme events or festivals which evoke the past. Involve local theatre groups and the commercial sector and link in with the development of the castle.
- \* Set standards for cleanliness and tidiness. This a requirement for heritage status and is essential to any tourism drive.
- \* Establish a tourism office in the town.

### Sports / Leisure / Amenity

- \* Carry out a feasibility study on the provision of a multi-purpose sports and leisure facility. This should cater for both majority and minority sports and should incorporate a three screen cinema complex. One of the cinema sections should be capable use as a theatre to encourage local dramatic activity.
- \* Identify and develop areas of passive amenity. These should be structured so that they are attractive to both the community and visitors.
- Exploit the potential of the canal in terms of its recreational and sporting usage.
- \* Develop restaurant and other leisure and entertainment facilities to reinforce the status of the village as a focal point for both residents and tourists
- \* Identify and provide leisure and amenity requirements for the young and the elderly.
- Complete contact with the remaining bodies and interests in the town to ensure all points of view are incorporated.

### Administration

- \* Agree the broad thrust of the strategy with the participating partners to establish the scale of the project.
- \* Agree the most effective method of informing the Community and securing their support.
- \* Phase and cost the strategy and identify primary funding sources and conditions.
- \* Create a management company to implement, manage and fund the project.







### PRINTERS MADE EASY

Probably the second item most people buy after a computer is a printer of some sort. Over the last two years the printer market has expanded, increasing the complexity of the choices facing the prospective buyer. Traditionally, the choice was strictly between cheap dot-matrix printers and expensive laser printers. Generally the home user and small business bought dot matrix printers and larger businesses bought laser printers.

In recent times, the arrival of inkjet, micro-dry process, thermal wax, dye sublimation and colour laser has complicated the choice. In this article we try to clear up what the choices are and how to choose a suitable printer.

#### **Dot Matrix Printers**

These printers are also known as impact printers and work by having small pins hit an inked ribbon onto the sheet of paper being printed. They are extremely noisy, very cheap to run and the printed output is of very low quality. The big advantage with impact printers is their ability to print duplicates on carbonised paper.

### **Inkjet Printers**

Inkiet printers, also known as bubble jet printers, are relatively new on the market and offer low cost near laser quality printing in both black and colour. They are most suited to low volume printing and occasional colour. The major drawback is that replacement ink cartridges are expensive.

### **Laser Printers**

Laser printers have been around for some time. The principle of operation of laser printers is similar to photocopiers. Laser printers produce excellent quality output at a reasonable cost per page. In the last year or so, the cost of laser printers has fallen dramatically. A key issue with laser printers is the amount of memory. Unlike other printers, the laser has to build a complete picture of the page to be printed in memory before output. At least 2MB is recommended for printing from windows applications.

### Micro-Dry Printers

A company called Alps has recently introduced micro-dry printers to the market. They are similar in operation and cost to inkjet printers except that the "ink" is actually a wax-like substance that is rolled onto the paper. These printers are primarily designed for high quality graphics printing. They are capable of producing a high quality waterproof image that will not smudge.

### **Running Costs**

It is extremely hard to predict exact running costs for any type of printer. The costs below are based on manufacturers rated specifications.

### GOING AWAY FOR THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Some years, we hear of people who come back from their Christmas and New Year holidays to find a stream of cold water meeting them as soon as they turn the key in the hall door. Not a welcome sight - indeed the stuff of which nightmares are made. A little thought would have avoided

What we need to do is to prevent the water pipes bursting when the pipes freeze. In the event of a burst we need to minimise the amount of water that can flow in the house. If you are going away on holiday even for just one night it is best to leave the heating on even if at a slightly lower temperature than usual. The heat could be set around 15 degrees between the hours of 5 a.m. and 7 a.m. and again in the evening for another 2 hour period. Check your oil level to make sure there is enough oil for the holiday season. You should also open the loft trapdoor so warm air from the rest of the house circulates in the attic to prevent the pipes from

Check that the mains stopcock works. It can usually be found in the press under the sink. Turn off the water where it enters the house. If you turn off the water be sure to turn it back on again before you light a back boiler fire. It might be as well to leave a note on the hall table to remind you to do so. If you have a patio porch get a friend to collect the post for you. Make sure the windows are locked and don't forget the back door, the garage door and the gate. It might be a good idea to invest in one of those timers that can turn the light and the radio on and off at random. If you have an alarm remember it only works when it is switched on.

So here again is your checklist:

- 1. HEAT
- LIGHT
- WATER
- ALARM/LOCK UP

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### **FAITH FRIENDS IN MAYNOOTH**

For many years now, the Faith Friend programme has been a feature of Confirmation preparation in many parishes in Ireland. This year, the Parish of Maynooth and Ladychapel is offering the programme to the boys and girls who will be confirmed next March.

The programme is parish based. Very simply, it is a programme where adult members of the parish community share faith, in small groups, with Confirmation candidates. The role of the Faith Friend is not to teach the children about faith, but rather to give witness to their faith, to share with the children how their faith effects their own daily living. So, over a series of meetings, the Faith Friend shares with six or seven Confirmation children on topics like: "When did I feel close to God?" "How do I pray", "Belonging to the Church" etc.

The purpose of the Faith Friends Programme is to provide a Community dimension to the preparation the children are already receiving at home (from their parents) and in the school (from the teachers). In so doing, it offers the children a concrete experience of the interested and welcoming Community that they are being initiated into - the Parish Community of Maynooth.

Indeed we can trace the roots of Faith Friends back to the Celtic Church. In early times, Christian communities appointed "ordinary" people of faith to help those preparing for Baptism, and those returning to the Church through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. These Christians were called "Anamchara" or soul-friend. They shared their faith and gave example through prayer and Christian living to the candidates for the Sacraments.

Twenty-two people from Maynooth Parish are at present undergoing training as Faith Friends. In February they will meet with the candidates. The parish is proud to have such people who are willing to commit their time and energy to help our young people in their Confirmation preparation.

The Faith Friends will be commissioned at a Sunday Mass during Advent, and an Information Night for the parents of the Confirmation boys and girls will be held after Christmas.

The goose was nearing the end of the fattening season. The hams of our own pig were being smoked in the chimney corner.

With the light of flashlamps we would cycle through the countryside to visit old friends. They really would be expecting us and they enjoyed our music, song and dance. Such hospitality and welcome we received. We would return home with bags bulging with apples, pears and a currant cake. By the light of the silvery moon we would see the smoke rising from our chimney, and get the smell of the peat and coal fires.


Our neighbour Artie, who was a regular visitor to our home, would meet us at the door. In a few minutes, to the sound of my father playing a jig or a hornpipe, Artie would step it out on the kitchen floor and soon a hooley would be in full swing. We loved visiting our neighbour Teresa. She lived in an old thatched, ivy clad cottage. Her only company was her dog Rags. She would dance and sing with us. She played the harmonium in nearby Kilbride church. We sang in the choir to her playing. At home she would turn up the gramophone and dance a jig on her stone flagged floor. She'd have a table laden with all kinds of everything in the parlour.

Such are my memories of my childhood Christmas.

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### **VIDEO REVIEW**

The People v's Larry Flint (18's)

Woody Harrelson puts in a very good performance as Larry Flynt, a pornography publisher, in this biographical film. It charts his life story, from his humble beginnings making and selling moonshine as a young boy, to running a chain of nightclubs when he's only twenty-five or so. When the clubs', dare I say it, Newsletter, becomes popular, he sees an opening in the smut market and 'Hustler' is born. He's finally hauled before the American Supreme Court for publishing obscene literature and for his alleged involvement in organised crime. So begins a long legal battle, with Harrelson taking the high moral ground of the right of the individual to free speech. In the middle of all this, an assassination attempt is made on his life, which leaves him semi-paralysed, and he's converted to Christianity. This is a hugely entertaining movie that's sure to be a big hit Courtney Love gives a good performance as Flynt's not-sorespectable girlfriend (you wouldn't be too anxious to bring her home to meet your mother) and direction by Milos Forman is, as ever, first rate.

Verdict: Highly engrossing and very enjoyable

### <u>Donnie Brasco</u> (18's)

Johnny Depp is Donnie Brasco, an FBI agent who goes under cover to infiltrate the mob. His target is Al Pacino, a sleazy, ageing mobster who the cops want off the street. He takes Depp under his wing and treats him like the son he never had, and the film is basically about the bond that develops between the two protagonists, and the ultimate choice that Depp must make between his duty and his friendship with Pacino.

This is not a 'nice' film. It's not a big, bold, beautiful movie like 'The Godfather'. It is a film that shows the seamy side of second rate Mafia hoods in the New York of the seventies, with all their small-time wheeling and dealing on the far side of the law

The performances from Pacino and Depp are excellent, particularly in the case of Al Pacino who, as usual, is absolutely brilliant.

Verdict: Not nice but very good

### Liar Liar (12's)

This is a story about a lawyer who can't tell a lie in court (an extinct breed).

Jim Carrey plays Fletcher Reede, an ambitious lawyer with his sights set on a partnership in his company. He's divorced, and when he fails to turn up for his son's birthday party, the lad is naturally miffed. When he's blowing out the candles and making a wish, he wishes his father is unable to lie for twenty-four hours. Meanwhile, dad is in the middle of a very important case, in which the whole basis of the defence is that Carrey must lie through his teeth! As he bungles his way through witness after witness, he can see his prospects of a partnership sinking slowly in the west. There seems to be several different schools of thought on the talent (or lack of it) of Jim Carrey. However even those who can't stand him will enjoy this movie. It's a genuinely funny

film, full of 'sit-coms' and little twists and turns. If you want a good laugh, you could do a lot worse.

Verdict:

A clever comedy

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
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We will not panic, never known,

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
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### ST. MARY'S CHURCH OF IRELAND NOTES

#### A THOUGHT FOR CHRISTMAS


### Papa Panov

### LABOUR PARTY NOTES

### Lighting Up Kildare

The County Manager has proposed, in the Book of Estimates for 1998, that all mercury public lights (the white lights) in the county should be replaced by sodium lights (orange). This arises as a result of Cllr. John McGinley's motion to the Council about a year ago. It is to the credit of all the other Councillors that they are supporting this very positive proposal. The effect of it will be that about 4,100 lights will be replaced and about 550 will get higher output bulbs or will be additional, that is, infill. The cost of the project is close to £1m. And with the work starting in January, it is hoped to have completed within the year.

### Development Plan

Councillors agreed a strategy for the County on 28th October. That strategy caters for a shift of some of the population increase from the north east of the County to the centre. The growth to be catered for the five years from 1996 - 2001 is 12,000, and of that 4,000 would be accommodated in the Celbridge Rural District (Celbridge, Maynooth, Leixlip, Kilcock, Straffan).

This strategy will require major changes to the Development Plans for Maynooth, Kilcock and Celbridge, that is, less land will need to be rezoned. In the case of Maynooth, the Manager has suggested a population of 10,000 by 2001. In the 1996 census our population was 8528. Instead of the present proposals to rezone 270 acres to residential, the Senior Planner has recommended 50 to 80 acres.

The Planning Department is, at present, carrying out a survey of all residential zoned lands which are undeveloped to establish exact figures. This will take until December. The Councillors will have to agree on the amount of land to be rezoned, if any, in each town and then the Area committees will decide on the location of the rezonings.

### Maynooth Main Street

As you read this work should have started on the footpaths on Main Street. Excavation will begin first to allow the overhead wires to be undergrounded. Paving slabs will then be put on the paths. There will be new public lighting standards, street furniture, cycle lane and decorative bollards to prevent parking on the footpaths. In addition traffic lights will be installed at the west end of the town in order to alleviate the chronic congestion there and make it easier for traffic from Newtown to get onto Main Street. The pedestrian lights at the Leinster Arms will be removed as there will be a pedestrian phase on the new lights. The cost of the project is £765,000, and it will take about five months to complete. This very welcome town improvement works arises as a result of Cllr. John McGinley's motion which was agreed by the Celbridge Area Committee some three years ago. Because of the high cost of the project it has taken longer than expected to get it off the ground. It is important to remember that this is only the first phase of the project. Cllr. McGinley has asked that funding be sought for Convent Lane / Carton Avenue / Doctor's Lane entrance phase as a matter of urgency. It is hoped that this will follow on in the

second half of next year. In addition, Cllr. McGinley has also asked that funding be sought for all the lanes off Main Street.

### **Amenity Grants**

Kildare County Council now has £200,000 set aside to facilitate amenity developments. Cllr. McGinley is of the view that a significant grant could be made available from this fund for development of the Harbour Field. This would be particularly true if the G.A.A., soccer and Athletic clubs can come up with a joint proposal.

### The Proposed ESAT Mast

Deputy Emmet Stagg has called on the Minister for Public Enterprise to introduce regulations which will compel telecommunications companies such as ESAT and Eircell to share their facilities and property in relation to masts and other telecommunication infrastructure.

Deputy Stagg stated that the present situation where two separate telecommunications infrastructures are being developed is unacceptable in view of the adverse environmental impact of such masts. The numerous planning applications for masts at Garda Stations in North Kildare could be avoided if regulations under E.U. Directive 97/33/EC are implemented.

The Directive provides for co-location or facility sharing.


#### Rogue Builders on the Run

A Bill which will enable the County Council to refuse planning permission to any developer or builder who has not fully completed any previous development has been introduced by the Labour Party Senators in Seanad Eireann. The Bill was not opposed by the Government and it will be taken in Private Members time on November 19th. Deputy Emmet Stagg has warmly welcomed the Bill, stating that unfinished housing estates are the single greatest source of complaint from Residents' Associations. Over ninety estates in Co. Kildare have been left unfinished. Builders / Developers have up to now been able to move onto new sites with no real sanctions against them. Deputy Stagg said he strongly supports the Bill and hopes that the Government will support it as it proceeds through the Oireachtas.

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

# Deliciously Simple

### ORANGE AND GRAPEFRUIT COCKTAIL

3 oranges

2 grapefruit

Peel the oranges and grapefruit. Remove all the pith with a very sharp knife. Remove the flesh from each segment. Arrange in a decorative long stemmed glass and decorate with lemon geranium leaves.



1x418g (14.75 oz) can pink or red Alaska salmon 2 aubergines, sliced 1 tbsp salt 1 large onion, peeled and chopped 3 tbsp olive oil 1 tsp hot chilli sauce 1 x 396g (14oz) can of tomatoes, crushed 10 basil leaves 75g (3oz)Mozzarella cheese, grated 75g (3oz)Cheddar cheese,grated

### Method:

4 tbsp fromage frais

Put the aubergines into a bowl and sprinkle with salt. Mix well, then stand for 1 hour. Drain the aubergines well and rinse very thoroughly. Pat dry and use to line a shallow serving dish, laying them over the base in a double thickness


Drain the can of salmon. Flake the fish and spread the flakes over the aubergines.

Fry the onion in the oil until soft. Stir in the chilli sauce, tomatoes and basil leaves. Simmer until the sauce is thick. Spread this carefully over the salmon flakes. Mix together the remaining ingredients and carefully spread over and into the tomato sauce. Bake in a pre-heated oven, 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4 for 45 minutes, or until the aubergines are soft and the cheese is golden brown Allow to stand for 10 minutes before serving with crusty bread and salad. Serves 6

### ORANGE AND ALMOND **CHRISTMAS PUDDING**

75g/3oz shredded suet (beef or vegetarian) 50g/2oz self-raising flour 75g/3oz fresh white breadcrumbs 50g/2oz ground almonds 1tsp ground mixed spice 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

225g/8oz dark muscovado sugar



#### Method:

Place the suet, flour, breadcrumbs, ground almonds, spices and sugar in a bowl and


mix well. Stir in the dried fruit, peel, nuts, apple and orange rind. In a separate bowl, beat together the eggs, stout and orange liqueur or brandy. Stir into the dry ingredients, mix well and cover. Leave in fridge or a cool place overnight.


Lightly grease a 1.1 litre/2pt pudding basin and line the base with baking parchment. Spoon fruit mixture into the basin and level the surface. Cover with greased, pleated greaseproof paper or baking parchment and secure with string. Cover tightly with pleated foil.

Steam in a steaming attachment over a pan of gently simmering water for 7-8 hours. To test whether pudding is cooked, insert skewer into the centre-if it somes out clean, the pudding is ready. To store, cool completely; re-cover with clean grease proof paper, secured with a string, and foil. Leave in a cool, dark, dry place.

To reheat, steam for 21/2, hours or microwave for 5-6 minutes on High (100%). Leave pudding to stand for 5 minutes before serving.



# This Christmas Don't Forget the Wildlife (Garden style!)

hilst there may not appear to be much happening in the garden, life still goes on. It is well not to forget wildlife as well. Feeding birds has benefits both ways. It can mean the difference between life and death in cold weather, and in return they'll eat many garden pests. They're also fascinating to watch and their daily antics will soon have you hooked.

There is much talk nowadays about the decreasing numbers of garden birds and this can be attributed to many factors, natural predators, pesticides and lack of food. Do remember that if you do feed the birds they'll come to depend on the food you put out and could starve to death without it, so you must continue to feed them daily until spring. Peanuts are a sure-fire favourite, but don't buy damp or mouldy ones as they could contain a poisonous fungus called aflatoxin. Fruit, seeds and meat scraps are all welcome. Make kitchen scraps into bird cake by mixing them with melted lard. Harmful foods to avoid at all costs are salty or spicy foods, and dessicated coconut which swells up in the birds' stomach. Too much dry bread has the same effect, so soak it in water first. A regular supply of water is also vital during freezing weather for drinking and bathing. A shallow dish or even an upturned dustbin is ideal.

#### Prevention is Better than Cure!

Frost and wind can lift and loosen new plants which allows ice to form around the stem. Check them every couple of weeks and refirm them if necessary. Ensure that tree ties are secure and that they're not rubbing the trunk. If you need emergency ties, old nylon tights are an excellant temporary measure as they're strong, flexible and won't rub

Try and protect frost-vulnerable plants such as Forest Flame - try covering them with bubble-wrap or an old light blanket if a heavy frost is forecast. Another alternative is to plant such shrubs in a planter and bring them inside when frost

Stored bulbs, fruit, vegetables and tubers should all be checked every few weeks.

Throw out any showing signs of rot, which can quickly spread. Make sure that the compost around dahlias and other tubers isn't allowed to dry out completely.

### The Garden Indoors

Christmas is a very popular time for giving and receiving house plants. Unfortunately it is also a time when house plants tend to be forgotten about or left in unsuitable temperatures and conditions. There are a few golden rules that are well worth remembering:

- Follow the instructions that came with the plant with regard to temperature, light, watering etc.
- Do not place plants in draughts, or near radiators or in direct sunlight.
- If a plant is on a windowsill, remove it from the sill when you draw the curtains otherwise the cold conditions behind the curtains will damage it.
- In some cases, it is advised to water sparingly or use tepid water - watch out for this.



Making a Christmas Wreath



Christmas can be an expensive time, but you can save money, and have an original decoration into the bargain by using material from you garden to make a handsome wreath for your front door.

#### You'll need:

A frame of strong wire to make a circle 30-38 cm (12-15in) across. Special frames can be bought from florists, or make your own with galvanised wire or even a coathanger. Moss to clothe the frame. Green garden twine. Thin garden wire or florist's wire. The plant material can be varied according to what's available. Use evergreen foliage like Levland cypress, holly (both green and variegated), bunches of berries or hips for colour, and fir cones or beech mast for decoration.

First make the wire into a hoop. Tie the end of the twine on to the wire and cover the frame with damp moss, securing it by wrapping the string round and round the moss. Cut a piece of thin wire, tie a few sprigs of green foliage together with it and secure them to the frame by threading the wire through the moss. Continue to tie on bunches of foliage until the whole frame is covered. Then add the decorative material like bunches of berries, variegated foliage and fir cones, securing them in the same way. The fruit or berries could come from crab apples, cotoneasters, shrub roses or gladwyn iris. Spray the clusters of fruits with hair lacquer or clear varnish so that they'll be less likely to drop. A wide bow of red ribbon can be added to the bottom of the wreath as a final decorative and seasonal touch. Happy Christmas!!



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
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
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### **TUG-O-REPORT**
