
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

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EDITORIAL

One of the most heartening aspects of Maynooth's St. Patrick's Day Parade is that it emphasises the large number of voluntary groups working away in the community. As we watch sports clubs, bands and youth clubs march up Main Street the Parade gives the people of the town an opportunity to celebrate the sense of community which exists in Maynooth.

As Maynooth continues to grow at a rapid pace (doubling in size in the last 10 years) this sense of community will be more difficult to retain. The Community Council, and the various projects running under its control - including the Newsletter - play an important role in promoting and highlighting cross community activity.

The FAS funded Community Employment Projects represent Government support for community activities in Maynooth but as the town grows it is becoming increasingly apparent that the community needs more resources to make Maynooth a decent place to live. All of which points up the totally inadequate level of funding available to local authorities. A classic example is that Kildare Co. Council has no parks department.

Such a situation would be considered totally unacceptable in a comparable area in France or Holland where local authorities play a key role in promoting the quality of life in local communities. And Maynooth still awaits Town Commission status despite repeated promises from governments going back almost ten years.

But to end on a positive note, congratulations to all the groups who participated in our St. Patrick's Day Parade and may they continue to make their valuable contribution to the life of the town.

North Kildare Community Councils to consider impact of Development Plans

The meeting agreed that the secretary would respond to the proposal which was received from Clane Community Council.

Kildare County Council to keep Maynooth clean

Kildare County Council will work with the community to keep Maynooth clean particularly for the big occasions. This was confirmed in a letter following a request from the community council for additional street cleaning services for the town. However, the possibility of the appointment of additional full-time services were ruled out because of the shortage of funds.

MAYNOOTH PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

The Maynooth Development Plan

Kildare County Councillors have agreed a development strategy for the county. The revised wording will be available in the next two months. The revised strategy will be forwarded to the Minister for the Environment and put on display during the summer. The Councillors will then complete the development plans for the individual towns. The development strategy put forward to the Councillors by their independent consultants, Blackwell & Associates, included a direct reference to Maynooth and Celbridge. In broad terms it stated that if Kildare County Councillors want to ensure the development of the county as a whole, they should restrict the amount of land rezoned in Maynooth and Celbridge, as this would be contrary to achieving this goal. The majority of Kildare County Councillors did not accept the need to include this reference in the strategy document and agreed an amendment. The majority of Councillors on the Celbridge Area Committee who will in the first instance decide on both the Maynooth and Celbridge development plans have given commitments to the people of Celbridge that no further rezoning will take place there.

Maynooth Traffic Bye-laws

The details of the bye-laws have been agreed by the members of the Celbridge Area Councillors and the Gardai and we will all soon have to get used to the fact that we can no longer ignore those yellow lines.

Provision has been made to allow for half hour deliveries to business premises in the main street area. If the introduction of these new bye-laws do not solve the traffic delays in the town, surely "Operation Free-Flow Maynooth" cannot be far away.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Ouestion:

I am a lone parent living in a private rented flat. I am working. I am on the housing list with my Local Authority but have very low points. Can I get assistance with purchasing a house of my own?

Answer:

You should contact the Housing Department of your Local Authority and arrange to visit the Loans Section. There is a wide range of leaflets published by the Department of the Environment on housing which will be available to you there. In particular you should enquire into Local Authority loans - and the Shared Ownership Mortgage. The Shared Ownership Mortgage is aimed at people on low incomes who could not afford to buy a house with an ordinary mortgage. As you are on the housing list you would be eligible for this. Once you have been approved in principal for shared ownership by the Local Authority you may select a new or existing house which the Local Authority purchases. You then arrange with the Local Authority to purchase a minimum of 40% share in the property (or more if you can afford it) and rent the remaining 60% share from the Local Authority. You must be able to meet the repayments on the mortgage over 25 years and pay rent to the Local Authority for the remaining share. Transactions under the Shared Ownership Scheme are exempt from stamp duty. You should discuss with your Local Authority your particular financial situation, the costs to you of the Shared Ownership Scheme and how you might avail of it.






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MAYNOOTH SENIOR CITIZENS COMMITTEE





MAYNOOTH

PLANNING ALLIANCE

On February 17th, Kildare County Councillors finally concluded their debate on the new County Development Plan. After the necessary wording changes have been completed, this will go on public display. To guide their deliberations. councillors had before them a Draft Plan prepared by their own Planning Department. This incorporated the results of an independent consultant's report on strategic approaches towards accommodating the anticipated growth in population of the county of 13-20,000 people over the next ten years. This was an excellent and comprehensive document which urged relieving some of the growth pressures on the north eastern towns of Maynooth, Celbridge and Leixlip by redirecting growth to those parts of the county where development is more urgently needed. This Report embodied the characteristics requested by the Minister for the Environment when he froze the passage of further plans by the councillors last autumn.

Unfortunately, councillors opted to reject the key elements of the Draft Plan which advocated specific restrictions on further residential rezonings in Maynooth and Celbridge. Section 2.5 contained the following:

Neutered

"The substantial rezoning of lands in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement of the aims of this policy."

In removing this clause, the strategic aspect of the plan was effectively neutered. Councillors have now opted to develop the north east, south, west and north west of the county as well as the centre! In such circumstances developers are able to target those areas which they want, not what may be best for the area concerned. Property developers will undoubtedly be pleased if this plan results in further excessive residential rezonings in the

north-eastern towns of Maynooth, Kilcock, Clane, Leixlip and Celbridge. By no stretch of the imagination can councillors therefore be seen to be following the kind of strategic approach requested by the Minister and it remains to be seen how he will react when the Proposed County Development Plan is presented to him. Essentially, Maynooth may be back where it started last spring - at the mercy of councillors who want to almost treble its population over the next five years.

Further Developments

The Population of County Kildare is 134.000. Lands already zoned residential will provide for a further 80-90,000 people, enough for the projected increase in population of the county for the next half century. One

cannot help wondering why our local politicians want to provide for excessive amounts of further residential developments. As the election approaches you might wish to ask them some basic questions. Why for example do they want to provide lands to facilitate the doubling of Maynooth's present population? Why do they want to double the number of cars in Maynooth? Why do they want to double the number of school children in schools already at bursting point? Why do they want to double the amount of vehicular pollutants in the air throughout Maynooth? Why do they want to rezone large areas of passive amenity and open space around the town? Why do they want to rezone the environs of the historic Carton Avenue? Why do they want to plan for an extra 12,000 people in Maynooth alone when the anticipated increase in population for the entire county is projected to be 11,400 over the next five years? Are your local politicians carrying out your agenda? Maynooth Planning Alliance think not.

Canvassers


These are the questions which you must ask of the canvassers calling to your door over the next few months. Of course local TDs will say they have no control over their party's councillors. If you believe this, are such TDs really the sort of people you should cast your vote for? Elsewhere in this Newsletter you will no doubt see the usual promises of a footpath here, a street light there. But these are mere sops. What is really happening is a concerted attempt to change irrevocably the face of Maynooth, and also North Kildare by some of your local politicians. Do not be fooled by their blandishments.

Maynooth Planning Alliance has continued its attempts to highlight the problems alluded to above by participating in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning. As part of this larger grouping considerable success has been achieved over the past few months.

The Clane Development Plan has been declared illegal in the High court. The Kill Plan is currently also undergoing judicial review on the same grounds. The Leixlip Plan is subject to appeal to An Bord Pleanála on the grounds that it too was passed illegally by Kildare County Councillors. The Blessington Plan has been sent to the High Court also following advice given to our colleagues there.

A flood of contacts from elsewhere in the country shows that the problems of North Kildare are not unique. Last month they were presented by the Alliance to the National Economic and Social Council in a special briefing at Dublin Castle. But ultimately it is your unshaking support which is essential and which has provided the impetus for those working to secure a better Maynooth. People power is on the move throughout Ireland and Maynooth Planning Alliance will continue its efforts to articulate the wishes of the overwhelming majority of residents of Maynooth wherever the opportunity arises.

Mark Wins Gold in Europe Goirle: Holland: Date: 15 February, 1997 Mark Sedgwick, Chairman of Celbridge Camera Club, winner of a number of gold, silver and bronze medals at national level and holder of AIPF and AFIAP distinctions became the FIRST Irish photographer ever to win an FIAP Gold Medal. FIAP The Federation Internationale d'Art Photographique is the world amateur photography representative body which promotes the art of photography.

The Irish Photographic Federation (IPF) were requested through FIAP to provide a photographer of high international calibre to compete in an EU sponsored Photographic Competition/Exhibition organised by Foto Amateur Klub Lumen in a town called Goirle in Holland. One photographer only represented each of the 16 European Union Countries. The IPF selected Mark to represent Ireland on the basis of the standard of his work and that of Celbridge Camera Club over the past year. The format for the European Union Photographic Exhibition required competitors to submit 6 images in either colour print or monochrome. Gold, silver and bronze medals being awarded for the best individual image of the competition. Renowned international judges voted one of Mark's images to be the best individual image of the Salon. They also voted Mark's Panel of 6 images to be the panel winner.

Mark beat a field of highly accomplished international photographers with his image titled "Blue Boy". Visitors to Celbridge Camera Club's Annual Exhibition will have seen this image and the same image has won gold for Mark in the IPF National League Club Finals held last May.

Sean Casey FIPF, AFIAP - President of the Irish Photographic Federation - informed Mark of the news over the weekend, and said that Mark and Celbridge Camera Club has put Ireland on the international photographic map for years to come. It is a superb achievement for Ireland & Celbridge.

Mark will travel to Holland in April to attend the prizegiving ceremony and to collect his Gold Medal.

National Print and Slide Individual Finals

At national level the Irish Photographic Federation Print and Slide Finals were held in Dublin at the end of January. Over 250 photographers from all over the country participated and Celbridge again took medals. Many of the winning prints and those selected in the top 10 in the country will go on to represent Ireland in international competitions over the coming year.



INTEL MMX PENTIUMS

Just after Christmas this year Intel introduced a new version of its Pentium range of CPUs (Central processing unit) chips called MMX.

To understand what MMX means we need to delve a little into what a CPU is. Basically a CPU is like a computer programme permanently written into the silicon of which it's made. It comprises mostly of millions of instructions which other parts of a computer and software programmes can call on to get things done. A Pentium also has a small amount of memory (16kb) which is used as a temporary storage area while other things are happening.

With the MMX version of the Pentium Intel have enhancements.

Firstly there are 57 new instructions, which are designed to speed up operations involving video, sound and graphics.
Secondly the temporary storage memory (cache) has been

doubled to 32KB.

• The third enhancement involves a process called "branch prediction". In simple terms this allows the chip to "guess" more efficiently about what it will have to do next.

That's what they have done! So what does it all mean to you?

To gauge the impact we need to look at 2 situations.

• The first situation involves using existing software that you might already own. The additional memory and enhanced branch production technology is immediately going to make the operation of the chip about 10% - 15% faster than an equivalent standard Pentium.

• The real difference will come with software which is specially written to take advantage of the MMX additions. There are a number of software packages already available and more promised in the near future. Differences in speed with these software packages could be up to 40% over standard Pentiums.

Can I upgrade?

If you own a Pentium 75, 90, or 100 then you can add a Pentium MMX overdrive. If your PC is faster (and more recent), then you can probably change the CPU for a P166 MMX.

In the long-term we can expect Intel to stop producing non-MMX Pentiums but I would expect standard Pentiums to be available until at least the end of this year.

All MMX Pentiums are extremely scarce at this moment and you should expect some delay when ordering. As yet, the MMX overdrive chips are not available in this country.

A final note on P200 MMX chips. These chips have some very special requirements. They require a special motherboard and additional cooling fans. It is extremely unlikely that any Pentium systems currently on the market can be upgraded to a 200 MMX without significant changes to the PC.


Solving a Holiday Problem:

REVIEW CULLED FROM THE NEWSLETTER OF APRIL 1987

Discussions on Straffan Road Plans

The following is an edited version of a report of the meeting between Proinnsias Breathnach, Chairman, Maynooth Community Council and Gerry O'Brien, Kildare Council Engineer, held on Monday 23 February.

Improvements await by-pass sanction

Mr. O'Brien stated that the Straffan Road Improvement Plan would not receive a high priority among the County Council engineering staff until the Minister for the Environment sanctioned the building of the Maynooth By-Pass later this year.

At that stage consultant engineers will be engaged to draw up the detailed plan for the Straffan Road, which will show a high level of detail, on large scale maps, showing exactly (in feet) how much land will be taken up by road-widening, and where.

Most traffic generated in Maynooth

A traffic survey was carried out in Maynooth in August 1986 (at the height of the harvest season). This showed that, at the corner of the Square, between Larine House and the Manor Court apartments, a total of 8,650 vehicles per day passed through in either direction. At Ryan and Tyrrell's garage, the flow was 6,000 vehicles, while on the Celbridge Road (just beyond the junction with the Straffan Road), the flow was 2,000 vehicles. This means that a daily flow of 650 vehicles was generated by Rail Park and Old Greenfield (the difference between the flow at the Square and that at the latter two points).

Further out, at Noone's garage (beyond Carton Court), the recorded flow was 1,900 vehicles per day. This means that Greenfield Estate (including the Greenfield Shopping Centre,) Carton Court and Kingsbry generated a traffic flow of 4,100 vehicles(the difference between Ryan and Tyrrell's and Noone's garages). In other words, the housing estates along the Straffan Road generate over half the traffic flow on the Straffan Road as measured at the Square, and two thirds of the flow as measured at Ryan & Tyrrell's

Only 340 vehicles per day go between the Straffan Road and the Dunboyne Road (170 in each direction). Of this, 23% consists of heavy traffic (i.e. 40 vehicles in either direction).

It is estimated that there will be a flow of 2,500 vehicles per day getting on and off the by-pass at the Straffan Road interchange. Of this it is projected that 1,600 (two thirds) will be generated by the housing estates on the Straffan Road alone. In other words, the interchange will mainly serve these estates, and will be of great convenience to them, according to Mr. O'Brien.

Local Relief Roads

As regards traffic coming from the Newtown area, Mr. O'Brien confirmed the intention of closing off the end of Greenfield Lane to prevent this route being used. The bypass is expected to be opened before 1992. By then, land beyond Kingsbry is expected to be developed, and the relief road linking Newtown and the Straffan Road to be completed. He did not envisage the other relief road, linking the interchange with Blacklion, being developed for some considerable time. On the basis of his opinion that traffic from the Dunboyne direction is not a problem now, nor is it likely to be, he did not see the latter relief road as a priority.


The part of the Harbour Field to be taken for road widening is overgrown and unused at the moment, stated Mr. O'Brien However, it was pointed out to him that the Community Council has plans for developing and landscaping the field. The handball alley would be moved back, and would be left in a better condition than it is now, according to Mr. O'Brien.


It was difficult to know what would be done with the bridge. thought Mr. O'Brien, but he said that everything would be done to preserve its present character. There is a particular problem due to the fact that the access road to the station is located in the middle of the bridge. Proinnsias Breathnach suggested that pedestrian lights should be installed at this point. This would slow down traffic on the main road, would give station traffic a chance to get out, would give Rail Park residents a chance to cross the road, and would give pedestrians coming from Old Greenfield area a chance to cross the road also.

Mr. O'Brien said that he would consider the idea of using a "Yield" sign to allow traffic to filter left from the Celbridge Road to the Straffan Road.


In conclusion Mr. O'Brien insisted that no proposals would be steam-rolled through without prior local consultation.

GARDA TALK

Road Awareness:

(1) It has come to the notice of the Gardai at Maynooth that a number of drivers are engaging in inconsiderate road behaviour about the town. Many pedestrians are as concerned as we are for their own safety, and especially the safety of our next generation. i.e. young children. As you are all well aware there are numerous lanes and sideroads off Maynooth Main Street and many drivers avail of these. The problems arise when some drivers are exiting

these side-lanes. One must remember that before reaching the roadway, one has to drive across a rather wide footpath, and should stop to check for pedestrians before doing same. Also the Gardai would like to again appeal to motorists to avail of the off street parking provided and abide by the yellow lines as this will greatly lubricate traffic movement.

(2) Another issue the Gardai at Maynooth would like to draw to the attention of parents and indeed users, is the popularity of rollerblades. Some youths, and especially those using the blades

are totally oblivious to danger, while using same. There have been many reports of youths holding on to taxis, mini-buses and lorries, to obtain a pull along. This practice is extremely dangerous and can lead to the most serious of injuries. Also groups of youths roller-blading together on footpaths can be quite an ordeal for elderly pedestrians as they whizz by. We would kindly ask parents to urge their children to exercise the greatest of care when roller-blading, and if possible to exercise same practice away from traffic and pedestrian and under supervision.

HELPFUL HINTS AROUND THE HOUSE

(1) Ease a sticking drawer by rubbing it with candle wax.

(2) If you polish and oil the underside of table tops now and then it will prevent warping.

(3) Clean stained decanters with a mixture of 1 tablespoon common salt to 150 ml (¹/, pint) vinegar. Leave to stand for some time before rinsing.

(4) A quick way of neutralising an unpleasant smell is to strike a match and immediately blow it out.

(5) Never write your name and address on a key tag or key holder.

(6) When washing a dyed fabric use a mild detergent. Strong detergents tend to dull colour.



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
"P.A.W.S." FOR THOUGHT.

P.A.W.S., Peoples Animal Welfare Society is a new registered charity set up to help prevent abuse and cruelty to animals.

The society was founded by Deirdre and Gina Hetherington. Gina who used to work with the Kildare Animal Foundation on fundraising is no newcomer to this scene. Her experience in fundraising is of great use to the society. Due to the fact that P.A.W.S. is a voluntary association, fundraising activities are very important. The society aims to set up a shelter and a cattery but needs funds to do so. A Midsummer's draw is being held to help raise the necessary funds. First place will be a top of the range camcorder and second place will be a pamper day in the luxurious health farm in Powerscourt Springs in Wicklow and the third place will be a substantial hamper.

P.A.W.S aim is to rescue, re-home, re-socialise and where necessary provide veterinary care for these animals. Initially the aim was to help raise funds for these animals but as they encountered needy animals the need arose for the members to care for the animals themselves.

The members of P.A.W.S pay for veterinary care and food for the animals out of their own pocket. P.A.W.S is at present looking for a sponsor for collection buckets, on which the sponsors name will be printed in recognition of their help. The organisation deals mainly with cats and dogs but it has been known to come to the aid of the odd donkey as it works in conjunction with the donkey sanctuary. Every animal that P.A.W.S. deals with is spayed/neutered and vaccinated before being sent to their new home. Every new home found for these animals is carefully checked to ensure it will suit the animal's particular needs. MEETING HELD TO INFORM PEOPLE ABOUT POTENTIAL LANDFILL SITE CLOSE TO MAYNOOTH

The possibility of an application to Meath County Council for permission to develop a recycling facility and landfill site close to Maynooth was outlined at a public meeting held at the Glenroval Hotel.

The meeting was told that the 250 acre site which is north of Maynooth and close to the Moyglare area, could include 100 acres for recycling of waste and 30 acres could be used for landfill.

The North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group who are opposed to such a development were formed following a public meeting held in February and have three sub-committees dealing with technical issues, publicity and finance.

In any proposal of this nature the issues that concern people include the following:

- Proximity of the water table.
- Fear of leachate reaching the water table.
- Presence of a large number of vermin.
- Increase in the number of sea birds.
- Fire hazard due to spontaneous combustion.
- Spillage of rubbish on approach roads.
- Noise pollution.
- Air pollution and smell.
- Increased traffic.
- Impact on value of property in the area.
- Visual amenity.

In the case of any such development close to Maynooth additional concerns expressed include:

- Danger to stud farms and the bloodstock industry.
- Possibility of a significant increase in heavy traffic approaching from the M4 Motorway and travelling through the town and the Moyglare area.
- Impact on the tourism potential of the historically important university town.

The issue of waste disposal is a very contentious one particularly in counties close to the Dublin region. In Kildare the landfill site proposal for Kill is still being challenged in the courts seven years later. The Kill site which is owned by the combined Dublin councils is 120 acres. The anticipated traffic flow to it is a lorry every three minutes.

An application for a recycling and landfill development is in the first instance made to the local County Council.

- The proposal is considered by the county Manager.


- Depending on the decision taken an appeal can be made to An Bord Pleanala.
- Any further action can be taken in the Irish Courts.
- The development would require a licence for the Environmental Protection Agency, which can be appealed.

Politicians for both Meath and Kildare who spoke at the meeting in the Glenroyal Hotel pointed out that neither Councillors or T.D.s have any power in deciding this matter. The only power Councillors have is to instruct the county manager under a section 3, which advises him that he should not give permission.

Comments from the public included concern regarding the monitoring of this type of development, particularly in the longterm. Politicians came in for some criticism as the lack of a national waste disposal policy means that the issue of waste disposal will continue to be a contentious one.

MAYNOOTH APRIL 1897

One hundred years ago in April 1897 The Irish National Teachers Organisation held its Annual Congress in Galway. It issued a journal to its members telling them about the sights to be seen on their journey to the West. This is what it said about Maynooth.

Emma (P.G.)

Jane Austen's immortal story brought to life on the big screen starring Gwyneth Paltrow in the title role. For those of you who don't know the work of Ms. Austen, she was the female equivalent of Charles Dickens, but without the satirical sidewipes at nineteenth century English society. The story revolves around Emma's misguided attempts at matchmaking, while being blind to her own desires (too busy minding everyone else's business). La Paltrow is excellent as the heroine and is supported by a very good cast; Ewan McGregor, Alan Cummings, Toni Collette and Juliet Stephenson. The direction by Doug McGrath is efficient and the entire production is faithful to the book. The trouble is it's all been done before, sometimes better sometimes worse.

Verdict: If you like that sort of thing.

Stealing Beauty (18's)

Director Bernardo Bertolucci should have called this one Sleeping Beauty. The stars of this misguided offering are Jeremy Irons (yawn), someone named Liv Tyler and the usually excellent Donal McCann. Tyler plays an adolescent New Yorker on the verge of womanhood during a 'vacation' in Italy (where else?). However she just doesn't manage to convince as a young girl who's about to experience love for the first time and the rest of the cast look as though they'd rather be somewhere else while she's doing it.

All of these characters are extremely shallow and what should have been a reasonable story has been sacrificed at the temple of lush aimless mushy tripe. Verdict: For 'serious film' buffs and insomniacs only.


The Hunchback of Notre Dame (U)

This one will appeal to children of all ages between five and eighty five. It is Disney at his absolute best, certainly since The Little Mermaid. The classic story of Quasimodo and Esmerelda, written by Victor Hugo, is one of **unrequited** love and this animated version has all the usual brilliant Disney touches while still sticking reasonably well to the original tale. The soundtrack is as ever superb and the animation and photography is simply terrific. Need I say more?

Verdict: Brilliant!

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PROFILE OF DOMINIC NYLAND

Dominic Nyland - Treasurer of Maynooth Community Council

Question: What is your star sign? My star sign is Leo.

Question: What other interest or involvements have you apart from the Community Council?

In my spare time, which at the moment is very limited. I enjoy playing golf and badminton and am a member of Edenderry Golf Club, Maynooth Golf Society and Maynooth Badminton Club. I also happen to be involved on the committees of the last two, as well as being on the committee of Laraghbryan Cemetery Development Association. I also enjoy pub quizzes and the cinema.

Question: How long have you lived in Maynooth?

I have lived in Maynooth since 1970, when the family moved from Dungarvan Co.Waterford.

Question: When did you get involved with the Maynooth Community Council?

On St.Patrick's Day 1987, I was approached by the then Chairperson Proinnsias Breathnach to see if I was interested in joining the Council. I thought no more about it until one night in April 1987, he called to the house. It took some persuasion on his part to convince me and I have been there since.

Question: How do you see your role as Treasurer? What does your position entail?

As Treasurer of the Community Council, I see my role as being responsible for the proper handling of the finances but not for the actual raising of funds. Once a year to prepare a statement for audit and ensuring that these are available for the Annual General Meeting.

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My position entails overseeing the number of Bank accounts that the Council has and making sure that they work to our best advantage. I also have to make sure that there are of course, proper bills and receipts left verifying all of our transactions. Also, I have to report at our meetings of our financial situation and keep the members informed of any changes good or bad that may be happening financially.

As regards fundraising, I do not see my role as Treasurer as being responsible for fund raising. I see my role as identifying the need for funds thus giving the committee maximum notice of any necessity for extra funds. I would be responsible for all the monies collected to see that they are properly lodged and spent only as authorised.

Question: Are you a member of a political party and do you have any political ambitions beyond the Community Council?

The answer to this is very simple, no.

I am not a member of any political party contrary to what some people may believe and I do not harbour any ambitions beyond those of the Community Council.

Question: What in your opinion is the role of the Maynooth Community Council?

I see the role of the Community Council as being the official voice of the Maynooth area, with its aims being:-

(1) promote the well being of the community

(2) to secure facilities which are considered lacking

(3) to provide or help to provide employment

(4) to assist local associations in dealing with the statutory bodies.

Question: Do you find your involvement in the Community Council rewarding and if so in what way?

Yes, I do find it rewarding. I joined in 1987 and since then I have met some very interesting people and have become friends with some of them. I have seen changes in Maynooth since 1987 that the Community Council have been instrumental in achieving, and that in itself makes it somewhat rewarding. I enjoy the sense of being aware of what is going on and the different attitudes that people and groups have towards certain topics and ideas.

Question: What are your hopes for Maynooth in the future?

I would love to see the Harbour field developed as an amenity area for the people of Maynooth, also to see once and for all the Geraldine Hall ownership problem resolved. I am delighted to see work on Laraghbryan Cemetery having started and would urge the people of Maynooth that now that a new committee has been set up, to help them in any way possible to maintain and make Laraghbryan Cemetery a place that we can be proud of.

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
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TO PARK OR NOT TO PARK? THE BYE-LAWS IN MAYNOOTH.

The issue of Maynooth's Traffic Bye-Laws is proving as confusing as driving on Main Street at rush hour; few people seem to be indicating where they're going, and nothing is moving quickly enough. The intention of the law is simple enough; i.e. to free up Main Street and the surrounding areas to provide Maynooth with its own Operation Freeflow and one would imagine that motorists would largely be in favour of this. But then, who are the motorists who have been double parking, parking on the few double yellow lines we have, and parking two abreast or on the pavements, thereby making life extremely difficult for the elderly or those with prams or buggies? Are we to believe that once the byelaws have been passed, that these people will begin behaving responsibly and parking only where they are allowed to, or will it be necessary for the Gardaí to patrol the streets issuing parking tickets?

A " discretionary" approach by the Gardaí is one favoured by Declan Foley, outgoing President of Maynooth Chamber of Commerce. Speaking to the Newsletter at his office, Mr. Foley described the present state of the Main Street as "ridiculous", with badly parked cars "hindering normal trading facilities to the public ". It appears then that every one is agreed that something has to be done, the problem lies in deciding exactly what laws are brought in, and how enforceable they will be. The Chamber of Commerce has mentioned a policy of short term parking (up to half an hour) but schemes like this would presumably have to be





accompanied by either parking meters or a system of disc parking.

There is also the problem of vans and trucks needing to load and unload, an occupation traditionally done on the pavement, on side roads and double parked on Main Street. The provision of loading bays would be the ideal answer here, but where the space for these bays is to be found is another matter, a solution for which is unlikely to be easily found.

The shops and businesses in Main Street have an obvious need for these deliveries, and the Newsagent in particular relies upon people being able to drop in just for one or two items, a shopping trip is easily dispensed with if it involves having to park 500 metres away.


Whoever enacts the finalised bye-laws has to take all these things into consideration, to make life in Maynooth no less profitable for the businesses here, but a little less stressful for the rest of us.



It is totally understandable when you consider all the distractions that are in our lives everyday. Children, Work, Television etc. Is there any wonder how communication breaks down. A Counsellor will help the couple to re-establish communication and once there is communication most problems can be resolved.

Parent / Child / Teen Relationships.

As with Marital Relationships, problems with children and / or teenagers result usually from lack of communication and / or lack of parental control. Counselling can help you to reestablish possibly for the first time a close and loving relationship with your child.

Stress / Depression / Bereavement and how to handle fear are emotional states that we have all experienced from time to time. Depending on how we are emotionally at that time, these experiences can last a short period of time or seem to go on forever. Counselling can help you handle or cope with the stresses of everyday life.

So there are valid reasons for visiting a Counsellor. The most obvious one is you are worth it.



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
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

DRINK AND BE MERRY

From a nation that has always been proud to exclaim "A pint of plain is your only man!", it may come as a bit of a surprise to learn that the most popular evening class in Dublin at the moment is....wine tasting. True, it's still alcohol, but the words thick, black and creamy just don't suffice when it comes to describing your favourite Beaujolais or Cabernet Sauvignon.

Wine has always been expensive in Ireland, criminally expensive most would say, and so perhaps it is a sign of our growing economic prosperity that more and more people are uncorking les bouite*illes du vin* rather than cracking open cans of beer or stout. Also, we are growing culturally less insular, the exotic now arouses more curiosity than suspicion, and asking for something Bulgarian or Chilean in your local shop is not now so likely to be reported to the parish priest, or the Gardaí.

Our pronunciation of foreign names is also improving, a Cabernet is no longer to be confused with a piece of furniture containing 'shelves, cupboards or drawers for storage or display' (Collins Concise Dictionary), and our sadly mono-lingual tongues can now wrap themselves around names slightly more European than 'Blue Nun' or our old friend from the Rhineland - 'Black Tower'.

Maynooth of course, has always been famed for its cosmopolitan demeanour; cultured, yet witty conversation drifting out from the hostelries on our leafy-lined Boulevard du Main Street. So it comes as no surprise that our pleasant town recently played host to its first Wine Appreciation Course, run by Berna Hatton of the Mill Wine Cellar.

There are few businesses in Maynooth so suitably housed as this off-licence, with the (wait for it) charming oldworldliness of the exterior brickwork, and the simple elegance of the bright wooden floor. (I'm practising for my wine tasting writing you see, where adjectives are everything). But seriously, The Mill Wine Cellar is all that an off-licence should be; it presents itself as a purveyor of all the alcohols that the world has to offer, rather than the old style 'offy' where people would be ashamed to be seen lest they were thought an alcoholic.

Wine-Tasting

The Wine Tasting Course consisted of 5 classes, and was held on Monday nights. Unfortunately, editorial duties at the Newsletter kept this writer from attending, but Berna assures me that the course was an outstanding success.

Fifteen people attended the classes held in The Orange Tree Restaurant, some with a little experience with wine, others who were just (can you guess?) thirsty for knowledge. The first class was largely an introduction to wine and wine making from the grape to the bottle, including some tasting and a guide on how to taste a wine. (Tasting is a more complex procedure than merely lowering copious amounts of liquid down your throat, and the lesson seems to be: the more you concentrate in tasting (and smelling), the more pleasure will be had from the wine. The evening roundedoff with some of the Orange Tree's finest finger food, with our soon-to-be-connoisseurs seated at their own section of the restaurant, a most pleasant location for such enjoyable pursuits.

An average of 3 or 4 glasses were drunk each night, with the participants tasting between 6 and 12 different wines. One class concentrated solely on New Zealand, a country constantly gaining in popularity as a producer of fine wines, another looked at the problem of finding enjoyable wines for £5 a bottle. (That would have been the class for me). The final class was given by a man soon to be conferred with the elusive title - Master of Wine, and dealt, not surprisingly, with 'the classics' - French wine.

If your taste buds are drooling at the thought of it all, the bad news is that Berna thinks there won't be another course until next September. But for the slightly less committed, she hopes to begin one-evening-talks either this month or next. The queue starts right behind me.

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<u>Hobbies and Interests</u> DELICIOUSLY

BEEF WITH PEPPERS & MUSHROOMS

Serves 4 Preparation time: 8 mins Cooking time: 15 mins

1 tbsp vegetable oil
1¹/₂ lb/675g braising steak, trimmed and cut into strips
1 small red pepper
1 small green pepper
1 small yellow pepper
4 shallots, peeled and quartered
1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed
1 celery stick, washed and sliced
2tbsp creamed horseradish sauce
2tbsp light soy sauce
2tbsp Worcestershire sauce
4 open-cap mushrooms, peeled and quartered

 Heat the vegetable oil in a large pan and fry the beef strips for 5 mins, stirring, until browned and sealed.
 Meanwhile, using a sharp knife, halve and deseed the red, green and yellow peppers. Cut each pepper into thin strips and add to the pan, along with the shallots, crushed garlic and celery slices.

 Add the horseradish sauce, soy sauce and Worcestershire sauce to the pan, and stir until well blended. Cook, uncovered, for 5 mins.
 Add the mushroom quarters to the pan and stir well. Cook over a medium heat for a further 5 mins, or until meat is tender. Serve.

ONE DISH SUPPER MINCED BEEF WITH BACON AND POTATO TOPPING

Serves: 4 Preparation time: 20 mins Cooking time: 30 mins

1lb/450g minced beef 1 onion, chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 1 carrot, diced ¹/₂ pt/300 ml beef stock 1 tbsp./15ml tomato purée salt and pepper 4oz/125g sweetcorn few drops of Tabasco sauce 1¹/₂ 2lb/700g potatoes, grated 12 rashers streaky bacon deep ovenproof dish

SIMPLE

In a nonstick pan, brown the mince all over in its own juice. Once brown, add the onion, garlic and carrot and fry until the vegetables are tender. Stir in the beef stock and tomato purée and season well. Add the sweetcorn and Tabasco, bring to the boil and simmer for 15-20 mins. Grate the potatoes either by hand or in a food processor. Pour the cooked mince into the dish, place the potatoes over the top and place the bacon rashers evenly over the potato. Place under a pre-heated low temperature grill and cook for about 10-15 mins until the bacon is brown. Serve hot with seasonal vegetables.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE Makes 10 Slices

50g/2oz cocoa powder 175g/6oz unsalted butter 275g/10oz caster sugar 3 eggs, size 3, beaten 250g/9oz plain flour 1¹/₂tsp bicarbonate of soda ¹/₂tsp baking powder ICING 75g/3oz unsalted butter 4 tbsp milk 350g/12oz icing sugar 2tbsp cocoa powder FILLING 75g/3oz unsalted butter 175g/3oz unsalted butter 175g/6oz icing sugar, sifted.

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4. Grease 2 (20cm/8in) round sponge tins (at least 4cm/1/2 in. deep) and base-line with greaseproof paper. Blend the cocoa with 240ml/8fl oz boiling water. Soften butter and place in a bowl with sugar and 4 tbsp of cocoa mixture; beat until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs and remaining cocoa mixture. Sift the flour, bicarbonate of soda and baking powder and gently fold in. Divide the mixture between the cake tins. Bake for 25 mins until risen and firm to the touch. Leave in the tins for 5 mins then turn out on to a wire rack to cool completely. Meanwhile, for the icing, place butter and milk in a small pan and heat gently until melted. Sift in icing sugar and cocoa and beat until smooth. Reserve 4 tbsp of the icing and chill the rest until thickened, stirring occasionally.

For the filling, beat the butter and icing sugar until smooth then beat in the reserved chocolate icing. Chill until firm. To assemble the cake, remove lining paper and sandwich the sponges with the chocolate buttercream filling and spread the icing over the top and sides with a palette knife.

Hobbies and Interests GARDENING HINTS

The sun is shining; the birds are singing; the evenings are getting longer and there's loads to do in the garden.

General Tasks

• Containers and pots for use next month should be cleaned and hanging baskets scrubbed out. Clean terracotta and glazed pots (to avoid any risk of disease on pots spreading to new, young plants) using water and a stiff brush.

• Dead shrubs, killed by hard frosts should be dug up and replaced - but make sure they're really dead first! Using your thumbnail or a knife, scrape away a tiny patch of bark near the base: if it's green underneath, the plant is still alive and there's a good chance that it will regrow in the near future.

• Seeds should be stored carefully after opening (if kept in good condition, they will last for years). Seeds can be stored in sealed containers in the refrigerator (but not the freezer).

• Slugs and snails are pests at this time of the year, so continue to protect plants. If you can, use an environmentally-and-bird-friently slug-killer, or use egg shells or beer — the snails love a drop! Another way to catch them is to leave a few planks on the ground which encourages them to gather underneath. The next morning the planks can be turned over and the birds can feast for breakfast!

• Lime-hating shrubs like rhododendrons and skimmias that are growing on neutral or limey soils commonly suffer from magnesium deficiency, which shows as yellow patches between green veins on the leaves. Water with a soluble fertilizer or make a more permanent change to the soil's acidity level by adding sulphur chips.

• Silver-leaved shrubs like the curry plant (Helichrysum serotinum), lavender and cotton lavender (Santolina) should be pruned now. Cut straggly plants back to around 15 cm (6 in), otherwise just trim the bush lightly. Cutting plants hard back into old wood can be risky, so do it only if you've alreade rooted some cuttings last summer as insurance.

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ORNAMENTAL GARDEN

Annuals and Biennials

Hardy annuals can still be sown outside. Plant out those you've raised under cover in a coldframe. Try to choose a few varieties that attract bees and butterflies, like alyssum, anchusa, candytuft, cornflower, godetia, larkspur and scabious. Bees are enormously useful in the garden, and butterflies are just as pretty as the flowers.

Bulbs and Tubers

Dead-head larger bulbs like daffodils as soon as they finish flowering, so that they can put all their energy into building up their reserves for next year. Resist the temptation to get rid of the untidy foliage as it too is very important for next year's growth! Leave flower heads on small bulbs like snowdrops and scillas so that they can self-seed. During dry weather, water bulbs that have already flowered and feed with a tomato or rose fertilizer.

Tender bulbs, including gladioli, can now be planted out. They like a sunny sheltered site and well-drained soil. On heavy ground dig in coarse grit and put the bulbs on a layer of sand or grit so that they don't sit in water and rot. Gladioli can be grown in rows for cutting, in tubs, or planted in small groups in the border 10 cm (4 in) apart and deep. Other tender bulbs worth growing include the 'Peacock Ochid' (Acidanthera Murielae) which bears fragrant, white, purple-centred flowers in late summer, and Nerine Bowdenii which produces stems of large pink flowers from mid to late autumn.

LAWN

Renovate an existing lawn at any time until autumn, though spring is best. To repair crumbled lawn edges, cut a square of turf to include the damaged part and turn it round 180 degrees so that the hole is in the body of the lawn. Top it with soil and sow with grass seed. Clumps of coarse grass stand out like a sore thumb in an otherwise fine lawn. The best way to remove them is to simply criss-cross the clumps with an old kitchen knife and pull the grass out. Regular mowing is the best way to discourage coarse grasses. Moss can be killed with chemicals, but this really treats only the symptom rather than the cause, which is poor drainage. Improve drainage by aerating and by raking out the layer of dead grass or 'thatch' that builds up at ground level and hinders drainage. Continue weeding lawns and feed if you didn't last month. Trim the edges with a half-moon edging tool or a sharp spade to leave a clean edge for easy clipping with shears or a strimmer in future.

MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES FOR APRIL 1997

Maynooth Development Plan.

Following Minister Howlin's intervention Kildare County Council engaged consultants, at considerable cost to the tax payer, to draw up a strategy plan for the County.

The consultants proposals were discussed by the Councillors over a number of meetings until the final meeting on 17th February where it was due for approval. However, at this meeting Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, supported by the P.D. Councillors, voted to reject the consultants reports and to continue with their massive rezonings. They also voted to remove the following sentence "The substantial zoning of lands in Maynooth and the additional zoning of lands in Celbridge would be contrary to the advancement of the aims of this (the consultants) policy. "Instead they inserted the following, "carefully chosen zoning of lands in the remaining Towns of the North-East will be addressed in these Towns having regards to this strategy. "

Two weeks beforehand they voted in favour of rezoning for housing and industry either side of Carton Avenue. Is this supposed to be ' carefully chosen zoning of lands?'. This reckless behaviour will result in the ruination of our most treasured walkway and will not be tolerated by Minister Emmet Stagg and your Labour Councillors. You can be assured that we will do everything possible to stop them, however, we will need your continued support.

Dillon's Row Footpath and Public Lighting

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to have the footpath completed from the end of Dillon's Row out to the new houses and to install public lighting as a matter of urgency. This roadway is a disgrace and it is very difficult for our senior citizens in Nagle Court to get into Main Street in safety.

Non National Roads Funding

The following has been agreed for Maynooth for 1997.

1. Dublin Road, Maynooth - £80,000 for drainage, resurfacing and footpaths from Main Street to beyond the Cattle Mart.

2. Convent Lane/Dunboyne Road, Maynooth - £20,000 for resurfacing of road.

3. Maynooth - Barberstown - £120,000 for improvements.

4. Crinstown - £12,000 for surface reconstruction.

5. Maynooth - Leixlip - £18,000 surface dressing along Carton Wall. ξ

Cllr. John McGinley and the other Councillors have asked that a traffic count be carried out on the Maynooth/ Barberstown road immediately. It was also agreed that an emergency motion be submitted to the full Council asking that this road be given top priority in the County. It is estimated that £3m will be needed to do a proper job. Minister Emmet Stagg has called on Kildare County Council to prevent large commercial vehicles from using this route until the road is upgraded.

Newtown Exit From Horse Shoe.

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the County Engineer to improve the sight line at this exit and to erect a " Concealed Exit " sign.

Completion of Estates.

There are presently 61 housing estates that are not completed in the County. Kildare County Council have three staff in the Development Control Section supervising this work. In most cases developers are no longer on site. As a result of a motion put forward by Labour Councillors, John McGinley and Colm Purcell, the Council will be submitting proposals to the Department of the Environment which will enable the Council to increase the staff numbers to a level whereby the Council's responsibility can be properly discharged and effective pressure can be applied on absentee developers.

Maynooth Town Improvement Works

The County Secretary has confirmed that Cllr. John McGinley's motion to underground the overhead cables along the Main Street will be acted on. The work which includes new footpaths, new public lighting and new road surface will be carried out this year.

Silken Vale

Minister Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley met with Silken Vale Residents Association to discuss outstanding matters in their Estate. Minister Stagg and Cllr. Mc.Ginley will meet with the developer to discuss these outstanding matters.

Leinster Cottages

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The County Engineer has confirmed to Cllr. John McGinley that the road at house nos. 10 - 18 will be resurfaced this year.

Back Lane, Greenfields

The County Engineer has confirmed that drainage and resurfacing will take place this year.

Party Political

Maynooth Allied Irish Bank

Minister Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Chief Executive of Allied Irish Banks that they will be commencing building work in the latter half of 1997 on their old premises at Main Street and that as part of this process the streetscape will be restored. We are very pleased with this outcome which will remove the eyesore of existing single storey premises.

Proposed Dump of Moyglare



Minister Stagg has pledged the full support of the Labour Party in opposing the proposed environmental Protection Group which will campaign against the proposed super dump at Moyglare.

Minister Stagg has pledged the full support of the Labour Party in opposing the proposed environmental catastrophe which would have a disastrous effect on Maynooth and North Kildare.

Carton Court

At the request of the residents Association in Carton Court, Minister Emmet Stagg contacted the E.S.B concerning public lights which were out of order in the Estate.

Minister Stagg has also asked Kildare County Council to include Carton Court in their 1997 Public Lighting Replacement Programme. He has requested that the old mercury lights be replaced with sodium vapour lights and that arms be added to public lighting standards to give a better spread of light and to prevent shading of the lights by trees.

Footpath - Kilcock Road

In response to concerns of locals, Minister Emmet Stagg has requested Kildare County Council to carry out drainage and resurfacing on the footpath along Kilcock Road.

Maynooth Gaelscoil

Minister Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by the Department of Education to grant recognition to Scoil Uí Fhiaich.

The recognition will apply from the 7th of April and will enable the payment of Capitation Grants, funding towards the cost of rent for the existing premises and payment of the teachers salary.

Minister Stagg pledged his support for Scoil Uí Fhiaich and Scoil Uí Riada in Kilcock and he hopes that both schools will now work together in fostering the promotion of the Irish Language in North Kildare.

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
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Sport
