

EDITORIAL

Multinationals on our Doorstep

Recent reports in the national press suggest that Hewlett Packard are planning a major expansion of their plant near Leixlip with up to 4,000 jobs being eventually provided at the site. Combined with Intel, this means that Maynooth will have one of the largest industrial complexes in these islands. right on its doorstep. The development of these two facilities by two of the world's most powerful multinational companies has involved an investment of billions of pounds - with a little help from you, the Irish tax payer. The advantages are obvious - jobs, investment in the roads infrastructure, the increased spending of all the new workers in the Leixlip - Maynooth area. Perhaps at this stage it is fair to point out that Leixlip has been rather better at developing links with its multinational neighbours than Maynooth has been. In fact Leixlip has suceeded in claiming Intel and Hewlett Packard as its own. Despite the fact that we are no more than 4 miles from the plants, Maynooth, as a town, does not seem to have forged many formal links with the companies which might be to the benefit of the local community. Leixlip, for example, appears to enjoy generous levels of sponsorship from Intel and Hewlett Packard for a whole range of projects. These comments are made not in a spirit of envy but rather to point out that Maynooth needs to be more successful in selling itself to our powerful neighbours down the road.

Congratulations

The posters are down (mostly). The new constituency of Kildare North has elected its three T.Ds - Charlie McCreevy, Bernard Durkan and Emmet Stagg. The *Newsletter* offers all three its cogratulations and anticipates that, in their own individual ways, they will work to address the particular issues affecting our corner of the county. Many of these issues are related to the fact that we live in the fastest growing part of the country, with a young population demanding good schools, decent jobs, more sporting and cultural facilities and a decent environment in which to live. All three have a long record of public service and we offer them the best of luck delivering on these important issues.

CITIZENS INFORMATION CENTRE

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Ouestion:

I am 75 years old, living with my son and his family. I don't get any of the free schemes except free travel. I understand that changes were to be introduced in the free schemes, can you tell me if this has happened?

Answer:

From the 1st June a number of changes come into effect in the free schemes. These are listed below. Provided you meet the other requirements (e.g. receipt of relevant social welfare pension) you will qualify for the Free Electricity and Telephone Rental Allowance.

Free Electricity Allowance and Free Telephone Rental Allowance are extended to pensioners over age 75 regardless of who lives with them so long as they meet the other conditions for the free schemes, (i.e. they are getting a relevant social welfare pension or their weekly income does not exceed the maximum rate of Contributory Old Age

Pension plus £30). This means that the usual restrictions that apply to free schemes regarding who you live with are to be lifted for pensioners over 75 who qualify for free schemes. Usually you have to be living alone or with a dependant or other "exempted persons". The ESB and Telephone must be in your name.

Free Telephone Rental is currently available to people who have dependent children under 18 years. The age limit for dependent children for Free Telephone Rental Allowance is extended from age 18 to 22nd birthday for those in full-time education and resident with the recipient.

The definition of who may reside with a recipient of Free Telephone Rental Allowance is amended. If you have an invalid living with you this will not debar you from getting the allowance.

Free Telephone Rental Allowance is extended to pensioners where constant care and attention is being provided by another person resident with the pensioner (or to another member of the household). This includes recipients of Carer's Allowance. The Free Travel Companion Pass is extended to all registered blind pensioners.


It is not a sight to be proud of so near the Main St. and with judging for the Tidy Towns now in progress we are not going to gain any points!!!

MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY FESTIVAL





The Big Issues

MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

Now that the General Election has taken place, Maynooth Planning Alliance offers its congratulations to the three sitting T.D.'s who were re-elected. As promised, together with their colleagues in the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning, the issues of excessive residential rezoning were highlighted by Maynooth Planning Alliance during the campaign. Unlike the political parties, this was done with no sources of finance, and thanks are due to the many volunteers who assisted. Such was the success of this that every candidate felt obliged to address the issues of excessive rezoning, some by making it a main plank of their manifesto at local level, others by issuing a battery of circulars at short notice to address specific aspects of the debate. Many supportive comments were made for the work of the Planning Alliance, some from unexpected quarters late in the campaign.

In the end of the day no changes in representation occurred, though it is worth pointing out that in Maynooth 41% of voters cast their votes for candidates opposed to the proposed Maynooth Development Plan. In the constituency as a whole, 45% of voters supported candidates who had gone on record as supporting the objectives of the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning.

Though the election is now history, the issues of proper planning for Maynooth are not, and will become increasingly important over the next few months. It is likely that the next chapter of the saga will be dependent on the actions of the newly appointed Minister for the Environment. Before Kildare Co. Councillors will be able to return to the various town Development Plans, the permission of the Minister to grant an extension of time for the County Development Plan, now seven years late will be necessary. It is the view of Maynooth Planning Alliance that this should not be given in the absence of a realistic strategic approach to planning for settlement expansion throughout Kildare as a whole. The particular plight of Maynooth, where some councillors are proposing a doubling of its population in the next plan, has already been brought to the attention of Mr. Bertie Ahern in a recent meeting with him. The need for an integrated regional planning approach for both North Kildare and Ireland as a whole was emphasised. All of Maynooth will be watching how responsible the new government will act in this vital matter.

MAYNOOTH INFORMATION AGE TOWN -MIAT

Maynooth Community Council convened a committee to compile a submission for Telecom Eireann's Information Age Town competition. The theme of the submission is Building Community using technology as the catalyst. Emphasis was placed upon the unique aspects of Maynooth as a historic, university town where the relationship between

the town and university is one of interdependence, a town which has a remarkable history community activity. Communication in printed and broadcast word has developed strongly today with Kairos, publishing houses, a commercial printer, a Cyber Cafe and a language laboratory assessing the latest satellite broadcasts from around the world.

The demographic profile of the town shows a very high proportion of people employed in professional and technical occupations. With many College employees resident in the area and the factories of Intel and Hewlett Packard the community is particularly geared to exploit the potential of the information age. The Community Council plays a special integrating role in the life of this fast-growing community. Since its establishment in 1984 a number of its personnel have built up considerable project management experience in an enterprise which has an annual budget approaching £400,000.

The commercial profile of the town has been influenced by the College, proximity to Dublin, its agricultural hinterland and the zoning policies of the local authority. There are 172 business units spread across the retail, leisure, service, business and financial sectors.

Education is catered for at all levels in the town with 6,600 students in full time education between pre-schools, a Gael-Scoil, two primary schools, a post-primary and a university. Information Technology facilities at Maynooth College are among the most advanced of any in the country, including personal computers, advanced information systems in the library and the development of video-linked computer degrees. IT is already embedded in Maynooth's culture at every level with the university as its flagship.

Maynooth was recommended because of its position as a microcosm of modern Ireland with a young, vibrant, educated population at ease with change. It also has an impressive record of community activity despite rapid development and a broad social mix, a thriving commercial entity, the necessary levels of academic, technical and training resources. The town has a high recognition factor and a notable mix of old and new, academic research skills and experience to monitor the project and its community impact.



a scholarship to study at L'Acadamie de Danse Classique in Monte Carlo under the internationally renowned Russian teacher Marika Besobrasova.





What are UVB Rays?

UVB are the burning rays. UVB rays enter into the skin to reach the epidermis. The skin tries to protect the living cells of the epidermis by producing a pigment, called melanin (which results in tanning) and by getting thicker. Over exposure to UVB rays results in burning and affects skin cells which can lead to cancer in the most extreme cases.

What are UVA Rays? UVA rays are ageing rays. UVA rays penetrate deeper into the skin ageing and increasing the cancercausing potential of UVA rays.

Tan Slowly-Follow These Tips.

Whether you are at home or abroad the suns rays can burn severely. Apart from the immediate discomfort and soreness this causes it is now known that too much can have long term health risks as it can cause skin cancer. Although most skin cancers are completely curable some can be fatal. - Avoid

Sunbathing between 11a.m. - 2p.m; Drinking alcohol in the sun.

- Always

Start sunbathing with a total sun-block (factor 15-20). Re-apply cream after swimming or sweating. Use simple non-perfumed creams as after-sun moisturer.

- Beware of

Cooling sea breezes which mask burning rays.

- Remember

Loose woven clothes, beach umbrellas and cloudy weather do not protect against the sun. - Wear Synthetic close woven clothes and wide brimmed hats

Strong sunlight can cause

Painful sunburn: Freckling, thickening, wrinkling and premature ageing of the skin: Skin cancer: Change of simple moles and coloured birth marks into malignant melanomas.

Those with numerous moles should not sunbathe.

To Protect Your Childs Skin Children are very much at risk of sunburn.

Supervision by an adult to limit sun exposure is essential.

Parents or those responsible must: • Keep babies under six months old completely out of direct sunlight.

• Avoid mid-day sun if possible

· Keep children clothed with hats and close woven t-shirts while outdoors.

• Use a total sunblock (SPF 15⁺) on a child's sun exposed skin.










1,000TH I.D. CARD FOR MAYNOOTH







MAYNOOTH SAYS FAREWELL TO FR. DENIS COGAN

Fr. Cogan has been a curate in Maynooth for the last 14 rears. He has now become the new Parish Priest of Porterstown / Clonsilla since the 14th of June. He is addened that he had to leave the town he has come to know ind love but he willingly meets the challenge of a new Parish and new Parishioners. Fr. Cogan will be the only Priest for this parish of 1800 houses. Fr. Cogan came to Maynooth after spending 14 years in the Arch Bishops House as Finance Secretary and five years in Haddington Road.

In his time spent in Maynooth Fr. Cogan has performed 130 weddings (approx) and 600-700 baptisms.

He said it was "very rewarding to see these same people that he baptised coming for their confirmation, and the people he saw confirmed coming back to be married."

On being asked if he recalls there being any highlights over the last few years as Curate he replied with "his entire time spent here was a joy". He loved the mixture of people the town had to offer, the towns people, stud farm people and farmers and students alike.

Fr. Cogan wants to involve his new parishioners in the Church as much as he has done in Maynooth as he believes "The people make a Parish" and "the Church is the people of God" and as such they have to be as much a part of the Church as he is.

Fr. Cogan will be sadly missed from the Parish when he leaves his residence by the Harbour on 1st July, but there is a slight comfort in the fact that he will return throughout the following year for a few weddings which he has already promised to perform.

On a final note Fr. Cogan would like to give his sincere thanks for the wonderful party held for him in the Glenroval. He said he was overjoyed by the amount of friends (not just parishioners) that came to bid him farewell and he was also delighted with the lovely presents he received.

So farewell Fr. Cogan and may you be as happy in your new Parish as you were here!





VIDEO REVIEW

The Last of the High Kings (15's)

This is a likeable comic story of a teenage lad's (Frankie, played by Jared Leto, star of TV's My So Called Life) coming of age during a long, hot summer in Howth. He's hoping for a school holiday of chasing women and generally whooping it up with his friends, before the Leaving Cert results come out in a couple of months time. Then there's his eccentric family. His father (played by Gabriel Byrne) is a second rate actor who's seldom at home. His mother (Catherine O'Hara) is a complete Protestant bashing bigot. There's also his two best friends who are total morons, not to mention the two 'birds' he fancies (played extremely well by Emily Mortimer and Lorraine Pilkington). Into this motley group comes a family friend from America (Christinna Ricci of Addams Family fame) who falls head over heels in love with our hero (however, love is the last thing on his mind). Add to this some superb cameos from Colm Meaney, who plays a lecherous Fianna Fail TD, and Stephen Rea as a know-it-all taxi driver, together with a brilliant soundtrack featuring a host of seventies rock legends, and all the ingredients are there for a film which is at the same time very funny and very poignant.

Verdict: Definitely one to see.

Some Mother's Son (15's)

Set at the time of the H-Block hunger strikes of 1981, this is the story of an innocent mother's torment after her son is arrested for terrorist activity. Helen Mirren, who for once remains fully dressed throughout the entire proceedings, plays the solidly anti-violence Kathleen Quigley, the mother of the title. Reluctantly she becomes involved in the protest over poor prison conditions for IRA prisoners, egged on by the vociferously anti-British mother of another imprisoned activist.

This is a very well made, if harrowing, story of how people are forced by circumstance to become involved in the 'troubles', and as we all know, there are areas of Belfast and Derry where even against their will, they're compelled to pick a certain side.

The film is very well directed and captures brilliantly the mood and atmosphere of the plot, and with a fine performance from Ms Mirren, this movie is well worth seeing.

Verdict: Excellent,

The Glimmer Man (18's)


Let's face it; you either like Steven Segal or you don't. In this movie he tries his best to mimic the very stylish thriller 'Seven' and fails miserably.

Segal plays Jack Cole in this lame, laborious effort. He's a martial arts expert (what else!!) who tracks down a serial killer called The Family Man, who gets his kicks by crucifying Catholic families. When Cole's ex-wife becomes the killer's latest victim, and he becomes the number one suspect, he sets out to clear his name and in the process uncovers plot after plot involving the CIA, the Mafia, and seemingly everybody else. The 18's cert more than likely refers to your I.Q. because this film is just a lot of nonsense.

Segal plays his usual role, supposedly the thinking man's Bruce Lee, and the direction is all over the place. This is definitely one to miss. Verdict: For amoebas only!

As a result of the botched job carried out on resurfacing theses estates Cllr. John McGinley

proposed that the following motion should go to the full Council.

"That this Council seek adequate funding from the Department of the Environment for bitumen overlay for estates over twenty years old as surface dressing is deemed unsuitable for residential areas."

Moyglare Village.

Emmet Stagg, T.D., and Cllr. John McGinley are pursuing completion of this estate with Kildare County Council following representations from the Residents Association.

Schools Moyglare Road.

Following Cllr. John McGinley's motion the Council agreed at the Celbridge Area Meeting on the 16th May to fund the installation of flashing lights either side of the schools in the interest of safety.

Old Greenfield, Pedestrian Lights.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to Kildare County Council.

"That a pedestrian crossing be provided on the Straffan Road, Maynooth, at the Old Greenfield entrance."

Laraghbryan Cemetery.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to Kildare County Council.

"That a Caretaker be employed to look after Laraghbryan Cemetery, Maynooth".


Elections 1997.

GARDENING HINTS



Fruit

Strawberries should have all their old leaves cut off after harvesting has finished. Rake off and compost the old leaves and straw, and pull up any weeds. Summer-fruiting raspberries should be pruned after harvest: cut all the old fruited canes down to the ground. Repair or tighten the training wires if necessary, then tie the new canes in about 10cm (4 inches) apart. Cut out weak spindly canes and bodily pull up any which have grown between the rows. This deters them



Vegetables



Autumn and winter salad vegetables can be sown now. Claytonia or winter purslane does best on a sandy soil, cornsalad, or lamb's lettuce and rocket are happy in most situations, and land cress likes a rich, fairly moist soil. Some oriental vegetables are also useful in salads. Sow seed thinly in rows 23cm(9 in) apart. With the exception of land cress, all these plants can either be grown as a cut-and-come-again crop where the seedlings are left to grow densely, or thinned to around 1 cm (4 inches) apart and the plants harvested individually. Salad onions can be sown thinly to over-winter for harvesting in early spring. A final sowing of beetroot can be made in mild areas. Sow lettuce in rows, or in trays if the weather is hot. Prick out seedlings sown in trays last month and plant them out when two adult leaves are well developed.

Diseases that can attack vegetables in summer include blight which attacks potatoes and tomatoes. Yellowishbrown patches appear on the leaves and these eventually turn black and die. White fungal strands grow on the leaf undersides. Cut back and burn the top growth on potatoes and destroy entire tomato plants. Unaffected plants should be sprayed with copper fungicide and again two weeks later, which may prevent the disease spreading. Potatoes should be dug up and used as soon as possible, though affected tubers may be discoloured with brown marks.

Clubroot is a serious disease that attacks members of the cabbage family. There's no cure and it'll remain in the soil more or less forever. The leaves of affected plants become discoloured and wilt, and the roots are distorted and swollen. The effects of the disease can be mitigated by improving drainage and liming a piece of ground especially for brassicas to around pH level 7.0. One solution is to start plants off in 10 cm(4 in) pots and put them out once a good rootball has formed. They'll still get affected but the healthy start will ensure a harvestable crop.

Downy mildew and grey mould (Botrytis) can often be prevented by

spacing plants well apart so that there's plenty of air movement. Virus diseases cause stunted growth and mottled foliage. There's no cure, so remove and burn affected leaves. Vegetables to sow now also include beetroot, florence, fennel, Swiss chard, radicchio (leaf chicory) and turnips.


Water vegetables during dry weather, particularly newly transplanted ones and plants that produce pods or fruits like courgettes, runner beans and peas. If sowing seed, take out the drill, mix in a little coir compost which helps retain moisture, and water the drill well before sowing.

Greenhouse vegetables like aubergines, peppers and tomatoes should be fed weekly with liquid tomato fertilizer and watered whenever necessary, usually daily, Continue to snap off tomato side shoots and wind plants round their supporting strings. Stake and tie other plants. Ventilate the greenhouse all day, and during the night too if the weather's hot. Damp down paths frequently.

Drought-tolerant plants often prove their worth this month, when long spells of dry weather can really hit the

garden hard. While many other plants look limp and exhausted, these relish every bit of baking sun and produce a wonderfully colourful show of flowers and foliage. The key to success is a sunny site and good drainage all year, as they detest having to sit in water, especially in winter.

Plants with grey foliage are generally drought-tolerant, like lad's love (Artemisia) with silver filigree leaves. Cotton lavender (Santolina) also has attractive, finely cut foliage and bears yellow 'buttons' of flowers. Convolvulus cneorum has delicate white blooms, Dorycnium hirsutum bears clusters of white flowers followed by red berries. Russian sage (Perovskia) has tall stems of branched blue flowers. All sages like dry soils, as does rue (Ruta graveolens) with its intensely blue leaves. If you have a sensitive skin, though, this one's best avoided since it can cause rashes. Anthemis tinctoria makes a lovely contrast with masses of lemon-yellow daisy flowers over a long period. Plants with felted wooly leaves like lamb's ears (Stachys lanata), Ballota pseudodictamnus and Salvia argentea are also very resistant to drought.

Glazed Meat Loaf

Serves 6 - 8 cold 450g/11b lean minced beef 100g/4oz sausage meat 100g/4oz very finely chopped red pepper 100g/4oz very finely grated carrot 100g/4oz shredded, fat reduced cheese 100g/4oz finely chopped onion Menu l large garlic clove, finely chopped 100g/4oz brown breadcrumbs 2 tbsp. soy sauce 1 tbsp. chilli or tomato sauce · 1 large egg or two small ones 1 tsp. mixed herbs

A little salt and pepper

Glaze 1 tbsp. brown sugar 1 tbsp. flour

1/2 tsp. mustard powder

Mix glaze ingredients together and sprinkle evenly in the base of a 20 cm x 10 cm x 6.5 cm/8"x 4 "x $2^{1}/_{2}$ " loaf tin.

Method

Thoroughly combine meats with remaining ingredients (preferably chopped in a food processor) adding egg and seasonings. Pack into prepared tin, smoothing down. Bake in a pre-heated oven 350°F/180°C/Gas Mark 4 for $1^{1}/_{4}$ - $1^{1}/_{2}$ hours.

If serving hot, allow to stand in tin for 10 minutes to absorb juices. Invert onto a shallow serving dish and spread any glaze remaining in tin evenly over top of meat loaf. Ideal for summer entertaining.

Mixed Vegetable Stir-Fry With Cashews

Serves 4

Cashews not only add crunch and body to this dish but are very nutritious and high in protein! Best made in a wok because there's more room for tossing, otherwise a large frying pan will do.

2.5 cm/1" piece of fresh ginger

1 large onion 1 red pepper 1 yellow pepper 100g/4oz carrots 100g/4oz mushrooms 100g/4oz mangetout 100g/4oz broccoli 4 spring onions 2 tbsp. pure vegetable oil 4 tbsp. cashew nuts 100g/4oz beansprouts 3 tbsp. Hoi-sin sauce (or any other stir-fry sauce)



Method

Grate the fresh ginger. Cut the onion and peppers in 2.5cm/1" chunks and the peeled carrots into thin sticks. Small mushrooms can be left whole, otherwise slice, top and tail the mangetout, break the broccoli into smallish florets and slice the spring onions.

Heat the oil in a wok or large pan and cook the cashews until brown. Remove the nuts and transfer to a plate.

Add the ginger to the hot oil, stir-fry for 20 seconds and add the onions, peppers and carrots. Fry and toss for 2-3 minutes and add the mushrooms, mangetout and broccoli. Stir-fry for 2-3 minutes more and then add the spring onions and beansprouts. Return the cashews and stir in the Hoi-sin sauce. Cook for a further 2-3 minutes and serve with plain rice.

Summer Fruit Flan

For 8 Servings:

3 eggs 75g(3oz) caster sugar 50g(2oz) plain flour $40g(1^{1}/.oz)$ butter, melted 25g (1oz) ground almonds 3 tbsp almond liqueur, optional 12 strawberries, halved 75g (3oz) blueberries 100g(4oz) seedless green grapes, halved 200g (7oz) can mandarin oranges 3 tbsp apricot jam

Preparation

Preheat oven. Grease a 23 cm (9in) round cake tin and line the base.


Put eggs and sugar in a bowl over a pan of hot water and whisk until creamy. Remove from heat and beat until cool.

Using a metal spoon, gently fold the flour into the egg mixture. Fold in the melted butter and ground almonds. Pour into the prepared tin and bake for 30-35 mins until risen and beginning to shrink from the sides of the tin.

Turn out and leave to cool. Sprinkle with almond liqueur, if using.

Arrange fruit on top of the sponge, placing the strawberries and the blueberries in the centre and the grapes and mandarins around the edge.

Put the jam and 2 tbsp cold water in a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring, until it boils. Simmer for 1 min. Sieve and brush over fruit. Allow jam to cool and set before serving.

KILDARE WIN BY SHOWING TRUE GRIT

Kildare 1-11 Laois 1-7

At last, Kildare supporters get the performance they deserve. It is still a long way to Croke Park on the last Sunday in September, but on Sunday, June 8th this Kildare team showed that they have the bottle necessary to take a team through a tough summer campaign. Whether, collectively, they have the talent to take Leinster and All-Ireland titles remains to be seen, but at least the foundation has been laid. No amount of skill can substitute for passion, determination and guts. That's where winning teams start from and, for the first time in a number of years, Kildare managed to display all three against Laois.

The game did not start auspiciously for Kildare. The Laois midfield angled a number of balls into the full forward line seeking to free Leo Turley from the shackles of the newly restored Davy Dalton. Turley was all action and Dalton seemed to be struggling. Then, after nine minutes the whole character of the match changed. Kildare supporters shook their heads in disbelief as first Johnny McDonald and then Martin Lynch were sent to the line. Two men down with an hour left to play. The Kildare full forward line was reduced to Padraig Gravin playing his first championship match. The effect of all of this seemed to be to give Kildare a slap in the face while on the other hand Laois proceeded to stumble around the pitch in a haze of complacency.

Led by the inspirational Glen Ryan, Kildare played clever possession football, transferring the ball quickly from player to player, creating space on the wings and sweeping up to support their diminished attack. All the players seemed focused. Each knew exactly what to do and, amazingly, Laois stood back and let them do it. For a while such was the state of disorganisation in the Laois camp that they kept

back their three full backs to mark Gravin. Not even Ronaldo gets that sort of respect from opposing defenders!

Five minutes before half time Laois scored a fairly slack goal but, typical of their spirit, Kildare immediately struck back with two pointed frees to go into the second half leading by a single point. We expected Laois to come storming back but, instead Kildare proved the fitter and more determined team in the second half and ran out comfortable winners.

It is quite difficult to assess this performance in the cold light of day. Beyond their tremendous spirit, Kildare played a brand of football which they have been threatening for several years. Their passing game, developed under Mick O'Dwyer's last reign equipped them to deal with the setback of having only four forwards for most of the game. The manner of the victory will act as a huge confidence to a team which has repeatedly disappointed at the highest level. On the other side of the coin, the forwards, albeit that there were only four of them, failed to score from play and altogether only 0-2 of 1-11 came from play. The referee certainly seemed to bend over backwards to balance things up after the two sendings off - Kildare were awarded 49 frees to Laois's 17. In addition, Laois were totally inept when it came to exploiting their numerical advantage and seemed to lose all concentration when it came to countering Kildare's game plan.

And so, it's Kildare and Meath in Croke Park on July 6th. Kildare can win. But they must take every single chance conceded by a tight marking Meath defence. A short passing game will not be enough to bypass the like of Darren Fay and Mark O'Reilly. If they can work those scores then June 8th proved that they have what it takes when it comes to fitness and determination.
