



Editorial

You've seen the posters. You've read the leaflets. You may even have entertained the candidates on your doorstep. Now it's time to make up your mind. National media coverage of the election has been dominated by issues such as taxation, unemployment and zero tolerance of crime. But, as the saying goes, 'all politics is local' and when many Maynooth voters approach the polling booth on June 6th they will cast their vote on how our local politicians have shaped up on local issues and how they have served their local community. This time round Maynooth finds itself in the new constituency of Kildare North. The four main towns in the constituency - Naas, Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth - are among the fastest growing urban centres in Ireland. It is a constituency with a young and, possibly, volatile electorate. Perhaps 30% of those entitled to vote in Maynooth in this election did not vote here in 1992, the time of the last general election. How they will plump this time around is anybody's guess.

Apart from the actual result, it will be interesting to see the turnout of voters in the Maynooth area. For a number of reasons it is usually relatively low - due in part to the presence of College students on the register and the high proportion of rented accommodation. One fears that this time around it may be lower still as there is a detectable and growing cynicism about politics, especially among young people. But politics does matter. The politicians we elect on June 6th will, in part, determine what kind of a town Maynooth is in 2002 when they next come asking for our vote. So, if your concern is unemployment in Maynooth or rezoning or lack of playing pitches or poor public transport you'll have your chance on June 6th. So vote.

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COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Community Council passes vote of sympathy

Maynooth Community Council observed a minute's silence as a mark of respect to Mr. Tom McMyler and Mrs Bridget Saults who died recently. Both had a distinctive record of service to the community. The Council also expressed their sympathy to Ms. Breda Gormally, supervisor in the Citizens Information Centre, on the death of her mother.

Support for "North Kildare/South Meath Environmental **Protection Group**"

The possibility of an application to Meath County Council for permission to locate a landfill dump site close to Maynooth was discussed at our last meeting. The Community Councillors were unanimous in their support for the current campaign by the "North Kildare/South Meath Environmental Protection Group" who were formed following local public concern on the issue.

The future of the Geraldine Hall

Following the recent fire that damaged the extension to the Geraldine Hall, Maynooth Community Council advised Solicitors for the owners. The Geraldine Hall has been used by the people of the town for community purposes for generations. The Community Council supported a proposal that ownership of the building be transferred to Kildare County Council who could repair it and then lease it to the Community Groups in the town.

Facelift for Maynooth this Summer

Almost £500,000 is available to be spent on enhancing the Main Street area of the town this summer. The money will be spent on putting the public lighting cables underground, paving the footpaths and new street lighting. A further £80,000 will be spent between the Main Street and the Mart on the Leixlip Road. Councillor John Mc Ginley informed the Community Council of this good news.

Town Commission Status

Kildare County Councillors all support Maynooth's case for it's own local authority, Councillor John McGinley told members of the Community Council at their May meeting.

Community Festival '97

The Maynooth Festival will take place from Friday 11th July to Sunday 20th July. Opening with the "Mr. Wonderful" competition on the 11th of July in the Glenroyal. An action packed 10 days are guaranteed for the people of Maynooth. We will have live entertainment in the Square each evening with Maynooth Brass & Reed Band, Folk Dancing, Accordion Band, Traditional Music Group and Street Theatre. There will be Poetry Reading in the Library, Senior Citizens Cabaret, Table Quiz, Festival Bingo, Karaoke, Set Dancing, Baby Competition, Children's Teddy Bears Picnic, Treasure Hunt and live music nightly in the pubs. Dublin Waytes will perform in St. Mary's church of Ireland on Friday 11th July at 8p.m.


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BAND BULLETIN

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
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MAYNOOTH FLOWER AND GARDEN CLUB.





MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

By now you are probably totally fed up with politics. The slogans, the posters, the promises, the petty squabbles, the spin doctors, the image consultants, the opinion polls - they all leave you a bit weary at this stage and looking forward to the next few weeks of pleasant relief. Maybe you made your mind up some time ago about who had earned your vote, or maybe you still are waiting for the candidates to declare which way they stand on a particular issue. Either way the decision you make will have important implications not just for the future of the country, but more particularly for the future of Maynooth.

The campaign inevitably focused on the issues which our local politicians think it should focus on, and you now probably feel more competent on issues of taxes, crime, the environment etc. than you have for some time. But what about the issues some of the candidates would rather avoid, the issues which affect all our futures namely the future of Maynooth itself? Maynooth Planning Alliance would like you to give some thought as to what you might have been told, or not told, on some of these.

Did the candidates tell you?

This part of North Kildare has a

Development Plan means that unused

lands capable of accommodating another 33,000 people between Kilcock, Clane, Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge currently exists. There is not (contrary to the much hyped assertion) any shortage of building land!

Did the candidates tell you?

They want even more than a 66% increase in population to occur for the next five year period in North Kildare and support huge further rezonings in Maynooth, Kilcock and Clane? In each case, this is against the wishes of a majority of the local population they are supposed to represent.

Did the candidates tell you?

They want to more than double the size of Maynooth in the next five years, from a present population of 9,000 to 22,000? This means putting more than 5,000 extra cars in the town, further congesting the Main Street and motorway access, putting more pressures on the schools, water supplies, trains, etc. It means producing a bloated Maynooth, transformed beyond recognition, with the loss of rural walks and the building over of the environs of items of our heritage.

Did the candidates tell you?

That Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and the Progressive Democrats neutered a Strategic Plan, paid for by you the taxpayer, which would have made reasonable provision for Co. Kildare to handle its projected population increase until the year 2011, and then sent an innocuous version of it to the Minister for the Environment in a bid to resume

town by town rezoning. Did they tell you that their parties specifically removed a key phrase which called for restraint on further rezoning in Maynooth?

Did the candidates tell you?

The population increase in Ireland from 1991 - 1996 was 95,000 people, vet Kildare alone made provision in its last Development Plan to zone for in excess of this amount. A little off in their estimates last time around, and not apparently learning by the mistake!

Did the candidates tell you? That young married couples could only be enabled to afford a house if huge new areas were rezoned. This is a myth. Have you seen any evidence of 'starter housing' in recent Maynooth developments, or of any builders rushing to build such housing on our unused 106 acres?

Maybe these concerns were addressed to your satisfaction on your doorstep, and indeed some of the candidates share the concerns expressed above. Maybe after the election the issues will seem less pressing to some parties. Maynooth Planning Alliance, in cooperation with the North Kildare Alliance for Better Planning, will however, continue to monitor developments closely. But we would urge you to think carefully when casting your vote on Thursday 6th June and would recommend you not cast it for parties who support excessive rezoning for Maynooth. This after all is the issue for Maynooth and for your future in it!

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

Election Concerns

Since the founding of Parklands Residents Association the issue of Planning has dominated many a meeting.

Parklands Residents Association was a founder member of the Maynooth Planning Alliance which in turn became a founding member of the North Kildare Alliance for better planning. The reasons for this level of involvement in planning issues can be readily experienced by any Maynooth resident. Maynooth's growth 41% in the last five years sees increased traffic, basic services such as street cleaning and dog warden unable to cope with the rapidly urbanized town, before long we will see the schools groan under the sudden pressure of increased numbers. Air quality, water quality leave a lot to be desired at present, yet without any regard for existing problems the proposal still stands to rezone a further 325 acres in Maynooth. These groups were formed to alert Maynooth and North Kildare, find out now, because, after the election it will be too late.

Policy to Practice

The Maynooth Development Plan outlines as policy the prioritization of Pedestrian safety within Residential areas. yet the amended Draft Plan would convert the residential area of Parklands from a cul de sac to a through road, similar situations exist in other residential areas of Maynooth.

If this is the situation when a policy actually exists we shudder to think of the consequences should the Development of Maynooth forge ahead without any stated policy on how to provide for the existing and future residents of Maynooth.

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



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
MAYNOOTH'S NEWEST CRECHE / PLAYSCHOOL

Saturday the 3rd May marked the opening of Maynooth's newest Creche/Playschool, the Cluain Aoibhinn Childcare Centre.


It will open from 7.30 a.m. - 6.00 p.m. from Mon - Fri all year round, with the exception of bank holidays. Easter Monday, Good Friday and as yet Christmas days are still undecided. It will cater for babies as young as 3 months old and the upper age limit is 12 years of age. After school care is also available. The premises are complete with a baby room which has a fully equipped changing room with a sink, it also has a toddler room, a play-school room, a 3-4 year old room and an after schools room. For special treats and for educational purposes there is a T.V. room which also doubles as a rest room for the children.

The after school children have their homework supervised and also receive a hot meal.

The Creche/Playschool complies to all the standards set out by the Department of Health Child Policy Unit regulations. The owner Marian Hannafin has qualifications in Social


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MAYNOOTH NEEDS A YOUTH CLUB.



This election gives us a unique chance to return a Government which will work decisively for a just and lasting peace. Let's use our votes to give peace a chance!

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

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
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VIDEO REVIEW

Michael Collins (P.G.)

This is the most successful film of all time at the Irish Box office, and deservedly so. It is also one of the most talkedabout films ever to hit the Irish cinema. It was also odds-on that Neil Jordan's film of the life story of one of Ireland's most famous sons would cause a lot of controversy; after all how do you tell the story of a legend like Collins in two hours? The film contains some historical inaccuracies, and liberties have been taken with some of the locations (you don't look straight at the facade of the G.P.O. from North Earl Street) but this is not a documentary nor is it a travelogue. 'Michael Collins' is a well crafted, brilliantly acted, beautifully photographed piece of epic cinema. Liam Neeson in the title role is, quite simply, superb. Indeed, like Richard Harris in 'The Field", it is undoubtedly his finest performance to date. It is impossible to imagine anyone else playing the part, and that is the mark of real talent. Neither is this a rebel film. It's big budget, brazenly entertaining and simplified account of one of Ireland's famous and fascinating freedom fighters, and should be viewed accordingly.

Verdict: Stunning and Superb.

Striptease (18's)

This is a nonentity of a film. It's billed as a comic tale, which it's not. Nor is it the titillating piece of soft porn that some people would probably hope it is. In fact it is a nothing film, a piece of throw-away garbage. Briefly the story centres around ex-FBI clerk Erin Grant (Demi Moore), who takes a second job as a stripper at The Eager Beaver in order to pay for the custody case of her seven-year-old daughter. In this very big budget (she was reportedly paid \$12.5m for the part), very small audience turkey, Moore's decline at the box office has reached new depths. Never a great actress, she's no great shakes as a stripper either, in fact she looks far better, as do most women, with their clothes on rather than off.

Like Demi Moore herself, the script lacks any real flesh, and the film is always floundering in search of a direction. Speaking of which, the director, whose name thankfully escapes me as I write, should find another line of work.

All in all a film that's ultimately insulting to women and insulting to everybodies intelligence. It should have been called "demi get's her kit off for the lads!!" Verdict: Abysmal! (Put your clothes on, Demi, you'll frighten the horses!).

Brassed Off (15)

This tale of a grim North of England coalmining town set in the early nineteen eighties is an entertaining and rewarding film. It centres around a colliery brass band in the mining town of Grimley, and the band's leader, played by Peye Postlethwaite. The band members are just about to call it a day, when a new trumpeter arrives in the form of Tara Fitzgerald who whips up their enthusiasm oncemore. Ewan Mcgregor is her childhood sweetheart but his performance pales into insignificance in comparison to Stephen

Tompkinson, terrific as the debt-ridden and increasingly desperate Phil. Direction in workmanlike, photography is superb and all of the cast turn in creditable performances. A very worthwhile and capable offering. Verdict: Excellent.

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
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

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DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

MAYNOOTH DEVELOPMENT PLAN UPDATE

Progress on the Maynooth Development Plan has been held up while Kildare County Council, at the request of the Minister for the Environment, prepared an overall planning strategy for the county to guide the new plan. While the Council has now adopted such a strategy, it is entirely unsatisfactory in that it leaves the way open for further widespread rezoning in the county. This, despite the fact that an audit compiled of already-zoned land at Councillor Catherine Murphy's request shows that there is already enough land zoned for housing to accommodate 70,000 people — over half the existing county population. The Minister had already stated clearly that he will not provide funding for infrastructure to support excessive rezoning.

It is likely that the draft Maynooth Development Plan will eventually be produced by the end of 1997. This Plan will be critical for Maynooth's future as a viable and sustainable community. Democratic Left and Catherine Murphy are totally opposed to the massive rezoning of further land for housing in Maynooth which is being sought by the County Council's "rezoning majority".

DUMP PLAN OPPOSED

At a recent meeting of the Maynooth Branch of Democratic Left, total opposition was expressed to the proposal to develop a superdump on the County Meath side of the Moyglare Road. In supporting the local branch's stance, Councillor Catherine Murphy has called on the Minister for the Environment to formulate an overall waste disposal policy for the Greater Dublin Region. The Moyglare Road proposal follows on the heels of the controversial Kill dump project, which is currently the subject of legal proceedings. Catherine Murphy has sought the support of Democratic Left colleague, Councillor Christy Gorman of Meath County Council, in opposing the Moyglare dump.

MAIN STREET IMPROVEMENT WORK IMMINENT

When the Maynooth by-pass was built, the National Roads Authority set aside a sum of £200,000 to be spent on improving the old main road through Maynooth, stretching from Blacklion to the entrance to the new Maynooth College campus on the Kilcock Road. Now the Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) has allocated a further £200,000 for this work, with the proviso that Kildare County Council should contribute £22,000 of its own funds to the scheme.

Councillor Catherine Murphy, who is Vice-Chair of the DTO's Consultative Council, has welcomed this extra funding. It will allow a much more comprehensive improvement scheme to be put in place, with the DTO money being particularly earmarked for pedestrian and cycle way facilities. The project will shortly be put out to tender, and it is anticipated that work will begin on the scheme in the late summer or early autumn.

MONEY ADVICE SERVICE OPENS IN MAYNOOTH

Councillor Catherine Murphy has welcomed the opening of a Maynooth office of the Money Advice and Budgeting Service (MABS). The office, which is located in Derroon House, Dublin Road (Tel: 629 1660) provides free and confidential advice to individuals and families on how to handle debt problems. The aim of the service is to enable people to pay off debts in a planned way whilst ensuring that all their essential requirements (food, housing, fuel, etc.) are met. A preferred way of doing this is through weekly deposits in a special account in the local Credit Union.

MABS is funded by the Department of Social Welfare. However, following a decision by Social Welfare Minister Proinsias De Rossa TD, the service is independent of the Department and rooted in the local community. An important function of the local MABS office will be a Community Education Programme which will seek to instill principles of money management among targetted groups in the community, especially young people.

Regional Planning Concept - End to Maverick Rezoning

Minister of State Emmet Stagg has warmly welcomed the decision by Minister for Environment, Brendan Howlin to put in place a process of regional planning for land use in the Greater Dublin Area including County Kildare.

This will require Local Authorities to have regard to the regional plan for land use when drawing up their own County Development Plans and will be backed by enforcing legislation.

Minister Stagg has urged Minister Howlin not to agree to the requested extension of time sought by Kildare County Council to complete their development plan until the regional plan is in place. Minister Howlin is actively considering this proposal.

Refusing Kildare County Council's application for extension of time will not in any way restrict development in County Kildare where there are already nearly 3,000 acres of land available for development. Recent statements that scarcity of development land in Kildare was forcing up house prices are therefore not accurate. As far as industrial development is concerned any suitable project wishing to establish in Kildare will be welcomed and can be accommodated by 'material contravention' of the plan as was the case with Intel, Hewlett Packard and others.

The decision on land use policy at regional level will put an end to the ad hoc system of planning that had become the norm and led to excessive zonings.

Completion of Estates.

A Bill that will enable Kildare County Council to refuse planning permission to any developer who has not fully completed any previous developments was introduced by Labour Deputy Sean Ryan prior to the dissolution of the Dail.

The Bill which has Government support was warmly welcomed by Emmet Stagg. Unfinished housing estates are the greatest single source of complaint from Residents Associations. Builders/Developers have left a myriad of estates uncompleted where houses are all sold. They have moved onto other sites with no real sanction against them.

The new law, if enacted in the 28th Dail, will prevent the abuse of house buyers and will ensure that they are provided with the facilities and services they paid for.

Rockfield Estate.

Following a meeting with the Residents Association Emmet Stagg has requested the Council to take action against the

developer of Rockfield with a view to securing the following work in the Estate.

- Planting of 120 trees throughout the estate. 1.
- 2. Provision of proper boundary wall at entrance to estate.
- 3 Reinstatement of defective kerbing at Rockfield Green.
- 4. Reinstatement of footpaths following Telecom and C.M.I. work.

In addition Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council.

"That the developer of Rockfield Estate, Maynooth, be instructed to remove the barbed wire fence he has erected at the side of the green area in Rockfield Park and to erect a wall in compliance with planning permission and conditions 92/919."

Commenting on this matter Minister Stagg stated that the erection of barbed wire along a green area was highly irresponsible and extremely dangerous and cannot be tolerated.

More Money for Main Street Improvements.

A further grant of £222,222 has been allocated for work on improving Maynooth Main Street, footpaths, undergrounding overhead wires and new public lighting.

This means that the following money is available for work to be carried out this year.

£200,000 from National Roads Authority.

£222,222 from D.T.O. Traffic Management Grant and Kildare County Council.

£50,000 E.S.B. contribution to undergrounding E.S.B. wires.

In addition £80,000 has been allocated for improvements from Main Street to the Cattle Mart.

These works will enhance our Main Street and will make it pedestrian friendly.


Kingsbry Estate.

Development levies of £16,250 were imposed on North City Builders (£12,250) and High Degree Construction (£4,000) for the provision of public lighting and new footpaths from the new houses at Lyreen Park to tie in with existing footpath at Dunboyne Road.

Unfortunately North City Builders have paid nothing so far and Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to take immediate court action to secure the funding. The Council have agreed to take this action if the funding is not paid forthwith.

As a result of the totally unsatisfactory situation Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to the Council.

"That instead of imposing levies for footpaths, drainage and lighting on main roads that developers be asked to carry out this work in lieu of levies and that the work be carried out before the building of houses commences."

Building Regulations for New Houses and Extensions.

Following consultations with Minister Emmet Stagg, T.D., Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to Kildare County Council.

"That Kildare County Council actively enforce the Building Regulations throughout the County and that the following measures be introduced in that regard.

- That a special levy be placed on all new houses that 1. are for sale to fund the position of an Enforcement Officer and that Officer's support staff.
- 2. That the performance bond cover the Building Regulations.
- :3. That a Certificate of Compliance with the Building Regulations on the actual completed building be a requirement."

The Building Regulations have been in force since 1992 yet Kildare County Council have not been enforcing them.

In Dublin without a Certificate of Compliance with the Building Regulations it is not possible to sell your house. The purchase of a house is the biggest outlay any of us will ever make. It would be comforting to know that the house we purchase is in accordance with the Building Regulations. That has not been the case up to now in Kildare and this motion if passed will change that.

Bye Laws on Display.

Cllr. John McGinley proposed at the last Celbridge Area meeting of the Council that the Draft Parking Bye Laws for Maynooth should go on public display for receipt of submissions. This was agreed to.

Large Commercial Vehicles Banned From Parking in Estates.

Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin, to ban the parking of large commercial vehicles in residential areas.

The Minister signed the Road Traffic (Traffic and Parking) 1997 Regulations on May 1st. The regulations will come into force on October 1st and the maximum penalties for an offence are as follows:

First Offence - £150

Second Offence - £350

Third or Subsequent Offence - £350 and imprisonment up to maximum of 3 months.

Kildare County Council will set the maximum size of commercial vehicle which can park in a residential estate. The days of juggernauts, large trucks and coaches parking in residential areas are now at an end.

here have been recent concerns expressed regarding sight istance exiting from the Old Dunboyne Road at Maynooth nto the recently approved R157 at Kildare Bridge. There re preliminary plans to widen the bridge which will solve he problem but until funding is made available, I propose hat interim funding is sought to carry out the following vorks:

a) The construction of an embankment, drainage, kerbing nd safety barrier. This embankment will be required for the uture bridge widening.

b) The erection of additional road markings and signs on he approach to the bridge.

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(c) The estimated cost of construction is $\pounds 16,500$ (include, V.A.T.) Funding for this project is not included in the present year's estimates.

School Warning Lights

Kildare County Council having agreed with a motion submitted by Cllr. Senan Griffin to erect flashing warning lights at the National School and the Post Primary School on the Moyglare Road at a cost of £3,400. The County Engineer in agreeing with the proposal suggested that a survey be carried out to see if it is feasible to have such lighting at the location of schools around the County. Cllr. Griffin first proposed that such a survey be carried out during the debate on the estimates and now proposes that the same facility be provided for the girls school.

Public Lights

Celbridge Area Committee agreed that following acceptance of the quotations that public lighting at the following locations: Old Greenfield, Back Lane 3 lights. Moyglare Road, Pound Lane opposite Phil Burke's house, Leinster St., (Harbour) These lights are as a result of continued representations by Minister Durkan and Senan Griffin.

Dunboyne Road

Minister B. Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have requested that proper footpaths and lighting be provided at the Old Folks housing scheme on the Dunboyne Road. The money required to carry this work should be made available from development levies and be completed during the summer months.



GARDENING HINTS

une is a great time of the year for the garden with masses of young foliage and flowers giving us colour and perfume. There should not be any need to buy vegetables or fruit. There's no comparison between freshly dug new potatoes and sun-warmed strawberries as opposed to those bought in the supermarkets.

General Tasks

Planting up a hanging basket

Cut flowers from the garden are often infested with small black pollen beetles, which tend to invade garden plants once oilseed rape has been harvested. The beetles are harmless but they're a nuisance inside the house in large numbers. Clear them off cut flowers by leaving the bunches in a dark garage or shed for a couple of hours - the beetles will fly to the window in search of light.

Late frosts can check and even kill newly planted halfhardy annuals and tender vegetable plants. Protect plants overnight using polythene, fleece or fine windbreak netting.

Plants, once established, should be fed twice weekly. Use a high-potash liquid feed like tomato fertilizer.

Dead-head plants at least once a week to encourage plenty of flowers.

Checklist

- Plant out vegetables raised under cover like courgettes and sweetcorn.
- Tie in sweet peas and other annual climbers regularly.
- If you run short of salad vegetables, sprout some seeds on the windowsill to fill the gap.
- Snap off tomatoe side shoots as they appear.
- Continue to remove suckers from roses, lilac and other plants before they get too large.
- Apply an extra coat of shading paint to the greenhouse if necessary.
- Finish planting aquatics for a good display this year.
- Early in the month move dwarf peach trees in pots outside- the danger of infection by peach leaf curl has passed.
- Water and ventilate the greenhouse regularly.
- Pinch out the tips of chrysanthemums planted last month
- Stake gladioli.

- 1 Line a mesh basket with a coir, wool or plastic liner, and put a circle of plastic in the bottom to help keep the moisture in.
- 2. Sit the basket on a large pot to keep it stable. Fill it with compost and, starting in the centre, fill round with lower growing plants, including trailing plants at the edges.
- 3. Hang the basket on a stout bracket which is securely fixed to the wall. Push trailing plants through the coir, so the whole basket will be a glove of colour. Water it thoroughly,


Make Your Own Pot Pourri

Pot-Pourri is easy to make and a wonderful way of bringing the garden's perfume into the house. The fragrance is delicate and unlike cans of Air Freshener does not have any chemicals. The types of flowers and leaves is endless Flowers such as roses, lavender, violets, jasmine, honeysuckle and wallflowers. Plants with aromatic foliage include lemon

verbena, lemon balm, eau-de-cologne mint. For extra colour add a few flowers of marigolds, pot marigolds, cornflowers or sweet peas.

Pick the flowers early in the day when the weather's dry. Spread the flowers and foliage outside to dry on wire mesh.

When the material is dry and crisp to the touch, mix it together in a large bowl with some chopped citrus peel and about half a cup of powdered orris root to 'fix' the fragrance. Store in an airtight container for a month or so, then put it in decorative bowls or jars around the house.

2oz/50g long-grained rice Pinch of saffron 1oz/25g butter 4 spring onions, sliced 12oz/350g spinach leaves



11b/450g puff pastry 11b 450g skinless piece salmon fillet 4 medium eggs, hard boiled and sliced Salt and freshly ground black pepper.

For the glaze:

1 medium egg, beaten Method

Cook the rice and saffron in a pan of lightly salted 1. boiling water for 10 mins. Meanwhile, heat butter in a pan and cook the onion until softened. Add the spinach and stir until just beginning to wilt. Remove from the heat.

2. Preheat oven to Gas 7, 4250 f, 220 0C. Roll out pastry to a 9in-23cm square, cut in half. Spread rice over one half to within 1in-2.5cm of the edge. Season. Arrange salmon fillet on top followed by the sliced egg, spinach, and seasoning.

Using a lattice pastry cutter, run the wheel over the 3. remaining pastry. Brush the rim with egg glaze and place over the spinach layer. Seal the edges. Glaze the pastry and bake for 30 mins. Serve with soured cream.

4 FRIED SANDWICH FILLINGS

Serve hot fried sandwiches as a snack or first course. Each recipe makes two sandwiches.

Garlic Tomato

Beat 2 tbsp chopped sun-dried tomatoes with 10z-25g butter. Spread on 4 slices white bread. Top with garlic mayonnaise. Halve 4oz-100g cherry tomatoes, arrange on 2 slices bread. Top with remaining bread. Remove crusts, cut into fingers or triangles. Shallow-fry until golden on both sides.

Tuna and Tapenade

Butter 4 slices of bread, spread with tapenade. Beat 100g cream cheese with 2oz /50g tuna. Pile onto 2 slices. Continue as before.

Chicken and Tarragon

Butter 4 slices of white bread, spread with 4tbsp soured cream. Top 2 slices white bread with 6oz/175g shredded, cooked chicken and 1 tbsp freshly chopped tarragon. Continue as before.

Cheese and Ham

Butter 4 slices white bread. Add slices of Parma ham to each slice. Sprinkle 20z/50g grated Gruyere over two slices, top with remaining bread, seal well and continue as before.

TOPPINGS FOR BURGERS



Bacon and Cheddar Melt

Dry-fry 80z/225g diced bacon until crisp. Take off heat, stir in 60z/175g cubed Cheddar and 2 skinned, diced tomatoes.

Blue Cheese

Mix together 40z/100g Danish blue cheese, 4 tbsp soured cream, 1 tbsp snipped chives and freshly ground black pepper.



Chilli

Soften 1 finely chopped onion in 1 tbsp sunflower oil, add 1 tbsp mild chilli powder and cook for 1 min. Stir in a 400g can ratatouille and bring to the boil. Simmer for 5 mins. Add a rinsed and drained 200g can kidney beans and heat for a further 5 mins.

Barbecued Mushrooms

Melt 10z/25g butter and fry 60z/175g sliced mushrooms and 2 chopped cloves of garlic, until softened. Stir in 6 tbsp barbecue sauce, simmer for 2 mins.


BRANDY SNAPS WITH MARASCHINO CHERRY CREAM

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


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

Seán Molloy, Mick Galvin, Owen and Hugh Nevin made history when they became the first players to play in a






