

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

NATIONAL TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION '97

PILOT PROJECT LAUNCHED IN MAYNOOTH

A new approach to the National Tidy Towns Competition has been adopted by the Department for the Environment this year. Back in February, members of the Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee met with the Department of the Environment and the National sponsors of the competition to discuss the benefits of holding a special tidy towns awareness night on a pilot basis in Co. Kildare in 1997.

Speaking at this event held in the Glenroyal Hotel on April 15th, Mr Finian Matthews, Principal Officer, Urban and Rural Renewal Section, which includes responsibility for the Tidy Towns Competition, outlined his vision for the future of the competition.

Since the responsibility for running the Tidy Towns competition was transferred from Bord Failte to the Department for the Environment, they had been looking at a number of ideas to re-launch the competition Mr Mathews said. In the last few years new criteria for judging the entrants were introduced. These included marks for efforts to preserve the natural environment such as traditional hedgerows and flowers. His department encouraged forward planning by the local tidy town committees and to this end these groups need to submit a five year plan as part of their tidy towns entry.

Mr Matthews said that he hopes that meetings like the one happening in Maynooth would widen the appeal to the entire community of getting involved in improving our environment and increasing the support to the local tidy town committees. He said that he would be asking the committee in Maynooth to come back to the department with their views on the success of the night.

On behalf of Super Valu, the national sponsors of the competition. Mr Brian Murphy owner of Super Valu. Maynooth, reminded the large attendance at the meeting that the Tidy Towns Competition was forty years old this year. Super Valu have been national sponsors since 1992 and "we have been very pleased to be associated with the competition" Mr Murphy said.

In Maynooth, Mr Murphy promised that his team would offer practical help to the local tidy towns committee in their efforts to improve the appearance of the town. "For too long we have let a small number of people carry the burden," he said. Mr Robert O'Reilly chairman of Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, said that Maynooth did very badly in Category E, which is for towns with a population of between 5001 - 10,000 inhabitants.


He believed that the adjudicators remarks were fair last year and that the report was a valuable guideline to the committee on where the town needs to make a greater effort.



Senan Griffin, Ita McTernan, Josie Wicks, Marie Nolan at Tidy Town Meeting in Glenroyal Hotel Mr O'Reilly paid tribute to the efforts of the Community Employment Project workers under supervisor, Mr Martin Sherry as well as to the Sunday morning street cleaning volunteers, many of whom were at the meeting. Mr O'Reilly praised the involvement of previous tidy town committees in Maynooth, remarking that some who are now deceased would not have foreseen an event such as this meeting. He also commended the commitment of a number of Post-Primary School students.

Reviewing the 1996 result, Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee Secretary Ms. Patricia Condron pointed out that the biggest single reason for the low marks was as a result of the severe litter problem that exists in the town. The efforts of the residential areas gained us valuable points she said. The meeting agreed that the problem was that the amount of litter in the town was too much to ask one street cleaner to remove. Exchanges between local Councillors Mr Senan Griffin and Mr John McGinley and members of the audience regarding the availability of the street cleaning truck and the condition of the footpaths in the town, resulted in some lively discussion on the issues. Mr John Gillick, a resident of Rockfield, Maynooth's tidiest estate winner in 1996, and a member of the Sunday morning clean up volunteering crew, suggested to the Councillors that it would not cost much to give us the truck at least once a month. "Lets spend some of the money we are all getting from this boom," he said.

Ms Maria Benndorf, Grounds Manager at St. Patrick's College, representing the President of the College, Rev. Dermot Farrell, made a presentation to the meeting about the value of window boxes and hanging baskets to the appearance of the town. Ms Benndorf also suggested to Mr Brian Murphy from Super Valu that she favoured the use of paper bags in preference to plastic bags as the former are biodegradable. She also questioned whether it is always necessary to give the customer a bag with their purchases. Speaking on behalf of Maynooth Chamber of Commerce, their newly elected President, Mrs Mary Houlihan promised the full support of the chamber to the tidy towns committee in their efforts. She looked forward to the implementation of /continued

the new litter laws which she felt would make a difference in combatting Maynooth's chronic litter problem. Suggestions from the audience included one from Mrs Kelly, who pointed out that there are no litter bins between the Centra Foodstore and Carton Avenue.

Mr Richard Farrell, PRO Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, thanked everyone for their attendance and praised the guests for their contributions to the meeting. He said that the tidy towns committee welcome suggestions from the people in

the town. He took the opportunity to canvas for more volunteers for the Sunday morning cleanup, suggesting that if there is sufficient interest, they would consider a similar effort on Saturday mornings. Mr Farrell complemented the displays from Maynooth's Royal Canal Amenity Group, and Maynooth Castle Restoration Committee, saying that both groups are playing an important role in the enhancement of these important features of the town. Mr Farrell extended his appreciation to the Management and Staff of the Glenroyal Hotel, who sponsored the event.

ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP MAYNOOTH BRANCH Cómhairle Aisinteachta An Chanáil Rioga **Cumann Maigh Nuadh**

The Royal Canal Group Maynooth, a voluntary organisation, are involved in restoration and development of the Royal Canal in Maynooth.

There are 19 people working on the project utilising a FAS employment and training scheme, 4 in Kilcock, 2 in Leixlip, 3 office staff in Maynooth, and others on site in Maynooth. Over the May Bank Holiday members and supporters of the Royal Canal Amenity Group (RCAG) will join in 14 separate sponsored walks connecting the Liffey to the Shannon. The walks will highlight the value of the Royal Canal.

The Royal Canal Amenity Group walk from Maynooth to Kilcock departs Dukes Harbour (Maynooth Harbour) at 3 p.m. on Sunday the 4th of May, a distance of 3.7 miles, passing by Bond Bridge near where the Joan Slade river is culverted under the canal and where there are the remains of an old wharf which serviced St. Patrick's College. Then to Jackson's Bridge and the 14th lock. This bridge is unique in being the only one on the 90 mile system with a separate arch for the towpath. Nearby the Lyreen river is culverted under the canal on its journey to Maynooth. Then on to Baileys' Bridge, which is an accommodation bridge, Chambers Bridge and lock 15 at the Maws near the North Kildare Club.

Finally --- Kilcock Harbour, opened in 1796. The canal towpath is mostly grassy, and can be narrow in places, and may not always be suitable for young children or buggies.



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


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MAYNOOTH KILCOCK NO NAME CLUB



The Water Quality Management Plan for the River Liffey notes that: "In the main channel from Osberstown to Straffan weed growth is now quite marked, phosphorus levels are high and have doubled since the 1983-85 period and, furthermore, recent Dissolved Oxygen and Biochemical Oxygen Demand records indicate some cause for concern". These problems have arisen over the past decade as the rapid growth of towns such as Naas and Newbridge have added sewage and other effluents to the system more quickly than they can be treated or assimilated. Between 12 and 51 hours later this water arrives in Leixlip Reservoir, where after chlorination and other treatment, it is delivered to your taps in Maynooth. Such is the level of treatment necessary before you drink it that its palatability leaves a lot to be desired for anyone used to drinking fresh, unrecycled water.

Water Ouality

During low flows on the river, the amount of dilution of effluent which occurs is much reduced. Maintaining a minimum level of water quality for drinking, fish life etc. therefore requires that sewage loadings not exceed a maximum level. At Leixlip, the sewage treatment works are currently being expanded to enable them to cater for a population equivalent of 90,000 people. This encompasses the population from the area around Maynooth, Celbridge, Kilcock and Leixlip. These four towns currently have a combined population of 40,000. Demand for waste water treatment from Intel when Fab 10 and Fab 14 are both on stream will be equivalent to a further 30,000 people, making a total of approximately 70,000 people equivalents making use of waste water facilities. This does not include several thousand college students and workers (such as in Intel and Hewlett Packard) not counted as resident in the area by the Census. It does not take a mathematical genius to add up the sums and deduce that the extra population of approximately 50,000 people (12,000 in Maynooth alone) proposed by some of our local politicians is not reconcilable with the proper management of water quality on the River Liffev and does not augur well for your own drinking water quality and quantity in the years ahead.

Water Tankers

After one of the driest winters in decades and a long drought in spring, the inability of Kildare Council to supply water to residents will become more and more apparent as the summer proceeds. Already water tankers have been used in Monasterevin and notices have appeared in the national press calling for you to conserve supplies. But while you are being called upon to exercise restraint, some of your councillors seem unaware of the meaning of the word. With enough land already rezoned in Kildare, and as yet unused, to cater for the actual increase in the population of Ireland over the past five years, some of your councillors want further rezonings to balloon the population of Maynooth from 9,000 to 21,000 for example. This means further huge abstractions of water from the river will be necessary, beyond that which can be achieved without severely damaging the ecology of the river. To satisfy their rezoning appetites therefore you will probably be asked to fund huge

schemes to bring water from distant places such as the Shannon over the next decade. Such sources will themselves need expensive treatment to make them drinkable.


Planners Ignored

Maynooth Planning Alliance says a more rational approach to national settlement planning is needed, one which recognises that the resources of this country should be developed in the interests of all the people and not ravaged to meet the needs of sectoral interest. If people come before politics, surely Maynooth people should have their wishes for the future of their town respected by those they elected. Time and time again Maynooth Planning Alliance have asked local politicians why the wishes of the people and those of the professional planners are being ignored. We have not as yet got a satisfactory answer. But you the voters now have an opportunity to give your verdict on the matter. Ask those candidates who don't want to talk about rezoning what target population they envisage for Maynooth and what record their councillors have in rezoning. Ask those who gave you the last Kildare Development Plan why they provided enough land to house the eventual increase in Ireland's population as a whole, and whether they still advocate more in the next. As a resident of Maynooth, think of the future you want for your town and its surroundings. Don't vote for the rezoners!



#### **Bond Bridge Paranoia**

Did you ever get the feeling that you were being set up as a "Scape Goat" or as a "Red-Herring"! I write as a member of a "Woodlands Residents Association Sub Committee" which was set up to organise a Planning Appeal in relation to a proposed Housing development adjacent to Woodlands.

The basis of our objections were as follows:

- Privacy; a number of the (i) proposed two-storey houses would have overlooked the bedroom windows of Woodland's bungalows etc.. The proposed house lay-out would have placed a number of the houses very close to the Woodlands boundary etc.
- (ii) The boundary fence of closeboarded construction along the Woodlands boundary we felt was not either durable or secure.
- (iii) The mix of housing proposed (mainly two-storey) is at odds with the current bungalow type construction in this area.
- Visual Amenity from the tow-(iv) path of the Royal Canal and the view of the mature woodlands and fine buildings of Maynooth College would be destroyed.
- Pumping Station: We were (v) unhappy with the potential public health problem arising if this system were to fail.
- Safety/Traffic Hazard: We (vi) outlined our concerns relating to "Bond Bridge", "Parson Street" and "Main Street" regarding the increased traffic along with the inevitable increased dangers and congestion which will be brought about by this development. Also the

proposed entrance is to be sited near a blind bend on the Rathcoffey Road.

We carried out our business in an open manner keeping other parties informed who we thought might have an interest in this issue. I do believe that our objections were completely valid, even the Developer conceded that both our requirements and our behaviour were reasonable at all times. This may beg the question as to why the County Council Planning Department, who were informed of our objections before making their decision to grant permission could not have included further conditions to address our "reasonable concerns". Certainly some of our concerns were relating to Woodlands directly, but others concerning the wider environment of Maynooth are equally important to us. But why the "Paranoia" expressed in the opening sentence, well there were noises being made and coming from unexpected quarters, some discreet some not so, but persistent pressure being applied.

There were suggestions that what we were doing was in some way wrong. That in particular we would put in serious jeopardy the "Whole Bond Bridge Realignment Project". That was "Heavy Stuff" to lay on us. As parents we are very aware that the first fatality or serious injury on Bond Bridge could potentially be one of our own children. I can assure you that as a group we are completely sincere in our stance on "Bond Bridge". Even if our "Objections" were invalid, quirky or odd-bod

I still believe we should have been allowed to exercise our democratic right in making this appeal, without being subjected to undue pressure. We were only one objector out of five others who I don't believe were lobbied as much as ourselves.

I have spent some time trying to figure out why people that have the same interests at heart as our group, were opposed to what we were doing and so

far I have been unable to come up with a conclusive answer. Maybe they saw us as a group of interfering amateurs that were about to screw-up what they had achieved to date? Maybe they were afraid that we would steal their thunder in achieving something they have been unable to do so far? This is where the Paranoia creeps in because if one fears failure in a situation such as this, it may seem convenient to be able to introduce a Red Herring or to have a sacrificial Scape Goat waiting in the wings, I just don't know the answer.

Briefly what has been achieved to date is as follows:

The number of houses have been reduced from 154 to 124.

The Developer has entered into a written agreement with us in which he has agreed on the basis of our Appeal being withdrawn to:

Change the house layout to afford a greater level of privacy to the homes in Woodlands.

Increase the ratio of bungalows in the development which we hope will reduce the visual impact caused by the development.

Construct a wall along the boundary with Woodlands and to reinforce the hedgerow by planting Whitethorn and Holly.

Pay a levy of £22,000 per acre imposed by the original Grant of Permission  $(\pounds 22,000 \times 20.6 \text{ acres} = \pounds 453,200$ total).

We have gained assurances from the County Council that the Special Levies collected in relation to this development will be spent on the Bond Bridge Realignment Scheme. The original Grant of Permission did not state that the £22,000 levy was for the Bond Bridge Project. This would seem to have been a departure from the norm. Usually the Bond Bridge Project would be cited as the reason for imposing the levy. /continued

We viewed detailed drawings indicating the work to be carried out to the entrance of the site which is hoped will improve visibility and road safety.

We also were shown an engineers report on the subject of the Pumping Station which went some way towards allaying our fears about its reliability.

My purpose in writing this is not to upset or fall-out with anyone or any group of people just for the hell of it. My purpose is certainly to defend our position, but more than that I would hope our success would encourage others in their efforts to improve Maynooth's Environment. Also if those in positions of influence would be less dismissive of ordinary peoples input in relation to issues I would be pleased.

Bond Bridge should have been sorted out 20 years ago when Cluain Aoibhinn was being built. Surely this crazy policy of housing before infrastructure in Co. Kildare must be abandoned. Further Re-Zoning in this area should be curtailed until Bond Bridge is realigned.

This of course is the "Irish Year of the Promises" and it has been reported in the past that some strange promises have been made on similar occasions in the past, and sometimes even kept. Surely we must expect even at this late stage the Bond Bridge Project will be kicked into action. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Woodlanders, Sub-Committee, Main Committee and the Residents for their number of ongoing involvement in this issue. Also I extend thanks to a number of individuals who gave us very constructive advice throughout the process. To finish on a somewhat lighter note I'm sure you know what is said of Paranoia? "Just because you're Paranoid doesn't mean they're not out to get you anyway"

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#### PEOPLES ANIMAL WELFARE SOCIETY

Hi there eveybody. Just a little update from the PAWS rescue centre in Downtown Sallins...

Since last month's article appeared, homes have been found for some of our canine pals that were highlighted in the last issue...

Rambo - The Rottweiller/Alsatian found a super home with Libby Sheev in Celbridge, he now has lots of lovely green grass to play on.

Cougar the Lurcher was placed with the Mulroy family in Clonee and the Storm Puppies were adopted by families as far apart as Clougherhead and Wexford.

We have been very busy of late and some of our more recent cases were very tough ones:

Gippy; A little Yorkie + was thrown over the fence of Navan Puppy Rescue and as they were really pressed for space at the centre, they passed him on to us at PAWS.

Our Vet tells us that Gippy has an untreated dislocated hip from an old injury and he is being operated on as I write. This operation is going to cost us at least £100 and we will have to obtain a foster home for him for 8 to 10 weeks to convalesce.

Another recent call out we got was to the aid of a bitch in heat in Newbridge...She had been on the run from Wednesday to Monday being chased by a pack of Male Dogs and she was close to collapse....

The residents of the area were very distressed about the situation and they had tried in vain to catch her before they called us for assistance...

With the help of a grasper, tins of dog food and brute force we were able to resolve the situation within 15 minutes. The grasper was borrowed from the local Vets and we really need one if any of your readers know where we could get/ buy one.

Not one of these dogs had a collar or ID and one large black male was particularly vicious. This scenario is a typical result of uncaring owners not getting their female dogs spayed and it always results in unwanted puppies ....

Which brings me to our next story.

The Shadow Puppies: These three beautiful, twelve week old, unwanted labrador puppies were skin and bone and had been locked in a shed since birth with no human contact. When anyone enters their kennel they scatter and cower in the shadows. We will be keeping them until they are resocialised.

The problem of Feral Cats in Kildare is still growing and we were recently contacted by a pensioner in Naas who had 8 wild cats that she was feeding and she had to buy 23 tins of cat food every week. She asked us to help her to re-home them. We explained that Feral Cats cannot be homed unless they are caught as six week old kittens but we have spayed and neutered them except for two feeding mothers and we will assist her with food when we can but as you can imagine this has put a dint in our already overstretched finances...

Well as you can see we have Happy Days and Sad Days but never a dull moment and if any of you would like to come and talk to me I will be doing a collection at Quinnsworth, Maynooth on 2nd and 3rd of May or phone us on 01 6243724 or 045 894041.

The final of the Glenroyal Talent Show held on the 10th April was a great success with over forty acts involved. The talent came from as far away as Galway.



The Glenroyal bar was packed to the gills and one spectator aptly described the scene as being like Bees at a hive of honey, as everyone was enjoying the show so much.



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
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#### **VIDEO REVIEW**

#### The Nutty Professor (15's)

Here we go again; yet another remake! The original of the same name was made in 1963 and, for those of you who didn't know, starred Jerry Lewis in the role of Sherman Klump, the professor of the title. This time Eddie Murphy gets to re-invent the role of professor, although exhume it would be a more appropriate description. First time round this was merely a vehicle for Lewis' overrated comedy talent, and the reprise doesn't fare much better. Briefly the plot centres on the portly prof's attempts to win the heart of a beautiful fellow teacher who he reckons won't be exactly enamoured with his rather elephantine waistline. He stumbles on a diet potion formula that turns him into the slim, svelte and witty Buddy Love, and in this guise he sets out to woo the object of his heart's desires. For a film that's supposedly a comedy the laughs are extremely thin on the ground, unless you find breaking wind funny. Americans obviously do, because the film was a huge success at the box office in the States. Just goes to show you.....!Verdict: Strictly for Eddie Murphy Fans.

#### A Time to Kill (15's)

Written by best-selling author John Grisham, this is a story of racial tension and the fight for justice in America's deep South. When his daughter is brutally assaulted, Carl Lee (Samuel L. Jackson) takes the law into his own hands and kills her attacker in what is an act of revenge and retribution. Against all the odds and growing hostility from both the Klu Klux Klan and the Civil Rights Movement, lawyer Jack Brigance (Kevin Spacey) sets out to save Carl from death row. This is a very good courtroom drama with fine performances from both Spacey and Jackson. Grisham's book was an extremely ponderous affair - good beginning, good ending but very repetitive in the middle - but thankfully the screenplay succeeds in trimming it down to a more acceptable level, although at almost two and a half hours it's still slightly overlong. Still, all in all it's a very good film and well worth your time

Verdict: Slick and efficient.

Jack is no ordinary child. A rare medical condition has caused him to age at four times the normal rate. He's a child in a man's body and in school he is looked upon as a freak by his classmates. Naturally he wins out in the end to become the most popular boy in school. Why, oh why, oh why, does Robin Williams, who is extremely talented, insist on being associated with rubbish like this? He's made some near-classic films, such as 'Dead Poet's Society', 'Good Morning Vietnam' and ' The Birdcage', and anyone who has seen his stand-up comedy will know that he's a great entertainer. Then he gets involved in real turkeys like 'Nine Months' or 'Hook' and now this garbage. 
#### ST. MARY'S BOYS NATIONAL SCHOOL PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

#### **Election of Officers**

A secret ballot was agreed; Chairperson, Fionan Hardiman declined nomination. Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin was elected Chairperson 16/15 against Tom Purcell. Tom Purcell was re-elected (vicechairperson) unopposed. Secretary Mary Murtagh was elected unopposed. Minutes Secretary Joan Howard-Williams was elected unopposed. Treasurers Dominic Nyland and Pat Moynan were elected unopposed. P.R.O. Mary Grenell was elected unopposed. The new chairperson took over the chair.

#### "Licence Warning from 1987" How much is that doggie in the window?

Well whatever price he/she is, you better add another £5 onto the cost. The new dog licence law went into action on 1st April.

The licence costs £5 for one dog. Remember, if you have two dogs, 2 licences must be produced. If you have more than 25 dogs a communal licence can be purchased for £100. The licences can be bought in our local post-office.

#### **Petrol Price Survey**

#### The ever increasing number of cars on the roads suggests that selling petrol should be a very lucrative business.

Maynooth is now served by two very modern service stations which cater for lots of the consumers needs apart from petrol. However, when it comes to buying petrol it is not always clear that the consumer is price conscious.

Most of us will buy £10 or £20 worth without paying all that much attention as to whether we are paying a competitive price The Newsletter carried out a small survey on April 21st on petrol prices in the Maynooth area and on the road towards Dublin. What emerges is that there is quite a range in prices for unleaded petrol (8% difference between cheapest and dearest) while the price of super leaded petrol is similar across all stations in the survey. Given that more and more motorists are using unleaded this discrepancy is obviously worthy of public attention. The following table outlines the range of prices at the stations surveyed:

The conclusion is that petrol in Maynooth is comparatively expensive. A gallon of unleaded petrol in Maxol in Maynooth is 21 pence dearer than Statoil in Lucan or ESSO in Palmerstown. The second table illustrates that these differences can all add up when you buy a full tank - a difference of £2.30 between the cheapest and dearest for 50 litres of unleaded petrol.

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## Features

## Do you suffer from migraine?

Migraine is a common ailment characterized by a severe recurring headache. The headache usually affects one side of the head only, but it can affect both sides. The pain varies greatly in severity and migraine has been described as one of the worst forms of headache in the world.

#### How common is migraine?

One in ten people suffer from migraine and it is three times more likely to affect women than men.

#### What are the symptoms?

Some people lose their appetite for food and also feel nauseous or sick. The occasional sufferer can experience trouble seeing or speaking and may feel giddy before an attack.

(What types of Migraine are there?) Their are three types of migraine: Classical, Common and Cluster.

Classical Migraine: A warning of an impending attack would be difficulty with sight, blurred vision or partial loss of sight. Sometimes a temporary inability to speak and a disturbance of touch and feeling will be experienced. These symptoms are caused by narrowing of blood vessels supplying a particular part of the brain. The headache will usually begin soon after the symptoms have appeared. Nausea and vomiting can accompany a bad attack and the sufferer may need to lie down. Diarrhoea is another side affect of this type of migraine.

#### **Common Migraine**

This type of migraine is more common, hence the name. There are no warning symptoms experienced with this form of migraine. The headache can be every bit as severe as with Classical migraine and nausea and vomiting are also likely side affects.

#### **Cluster Migraine**

This is the most unusual form of migraine it occurs in bouts that can last for two weeks to three months with headache free intervals between bouts lasting from a few months to three or four years. Only 4% of sufferers will

get this type of migraine and men are four times as likely as women to suffer form this. There will be pain behind the eye and a reddening and wateriness to the eye, also a blockage of the nostril on the affected side of the head.

What is the most likely time for a Migraine to occur? Migraines usually occur between 5 and 10 a.m.

#### What Triggers a Migraine?

The main causes are: Changes in Daily routine. Sleep (too much or too little). Excitement. Noise. Light. Certain Foods. Stress. Effort and Exercise. The Weather. Smells. Hormonal Factors.

#### How can you help yourself?

- 1. Keep a Record This will help you see if any attack. In the diary you should record the day, the time of the hrs..
- 2. Don't go Hungry Migraine can be brought on by

- Check the draught in a chimney by 5. If you have a dry iron, damp down lighting a piece of paper at the base of the chimney and see if it flares up satisfactorily.
- 2. If any paint stripper gets on your skin, wash it off at once with water (neutralise caustic soda with vinegar first).
- 3. Awkward items can be held together with sticky tape or plasticine while setting.

Never brush a fur to clean it - just shake it out briskly after use.

missing meals or eating things that

don't suit vou. Don't miss breakfast or food in the morning.

- 3. Watch What you Eat. If you think a certain food or drink may bring on an attack, keep a note of when you eat it and see if the headaches come afterwards. then try to avoid that particular food for about four weeks. If your attacks stop completely or are much better, then you know to eliminate that food from your diet, if there is little or no difference, reintroduce that food to your diet and try eliminating another.
- 4. Avoid extremes of Temperature Extremes of heat or cold can bring on an attack, so avoid this situation occuring.

#### 5. Pain-Killers.

Aspirin and paracetamol can be obtained without a prescription and are effective against migraine.

#### 6. Sleep

Sleep is a necessary part of the recovery process in migraine and people who lie down in a warm comfortable environment do better than those who try to stay up and work.

# **Party Political Notes**

#### FINE GAEL

#### Meadowbrook

Minister of State Bernard Durkan has written to Kildare Co. Council and the relevant developers and asked that landscaping and road surfacing be properly finished to the satisfaction of the residents of the estate. Minister Durkan pointed out that there is also an onus on Kildare County Council to ensure that all conditions imposed on the developers on foot of their planning permission be fully complied with. Minister Durkan also contacted Cllr. Senan Griffin who is actively pursuing the matter with the County Engineer. Minister Durkan stressed that the road at the entrance to Meadowbrook from Bond Bridge is in urgent need of resurfacing. He said the work is long overdue and he was confident that the efforts of himself and Cllr. Senan Griffin would pay dividends. Minister Durkan said that he had had numerous representations from residents in Meadowbrook and that he consequently stressed the urgency of the matter to the County Engineer.

#### Silken Vale

Minister Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have been in contact with the Developers of Silken Vale and Kildare County Council in response to representations from Silken Vale Residents Association, who are anxious that all remaining work in the estate be carried out as a matter of urgency. Minister Durkan said that he was happy to note that most of the outstanding issues have been resolved. However, he said that he would continue to monitor the situation to ensure that it is fully resolved. In particular he has requested that the trees be planted in the estate to enhance the visual amenities of the area.

#### **Parking Bye-Laws**

Minister Bernard Durkan is happy to note that the Parking Bye-Laws for

Maynooth are to go on display in the town. Minister Durkan said that it is vital that residents in the area and traders in the town have an input into any future traffic management proposals. Minister Durkan has on numerous occasions expressed his dissatisfaction with the current traffic management plan for the Main Street and welcomes the opportunity for the people of the town to have an input into its progress. He said it is totally unacceptable that traffic congestion in the Main Street appears to be worse at crucial stages of the day than it was previous to the implementation of traffic lights. He said that this problem needs to be addressed urgently and he has contacted the County Engineer outlining these concerns.

#### Improvements to Traffic Island

Minister Bernard Durkan is glad to note that measures to improve the traffic island opposite the Greenfield Shopping Centre on the Celbridge Road are to be undertaken. At present the traffic island is not clearly visible, particularly at night time. This is to be improved by the introduction of lighting. The island will also be highlighted with luminous paint to make it safer for pedestrians and motorists.

#### **Motor Tax Office**

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested that the Motor Tax Office in Naas be allocated additional staff to deal with the continual delays in the office. Minister Durkan has also stressed that the office should be updated, modernised and computerised in an effort to eliminate undue delays. Minister Durkan has had numerous representations from people in the Maynooth area on this matter and is actively pursuing the problem with Kildare County Council.

#### Additional Staff for Maynooth Garda Station

Minister Bernard Durkan has contacted the Minister for Justice, Ms. Nora

Owen, T.D., and requested that a second Sergeant be appointed in Maynooth to deal with the rising population and the increasing demands on the current staff. Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested a second female Garda to liaise with the significant student population in Maynooth.

#### Footpaths in the Main Street

Minister Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have renewed their representations to Kildare County Council regarding the unacceptable condition of the footpaths in the Main Street. Minister Durkan stressed that the footpaths are actually quite dangerous, particularly at night time, and he has urged the county Engineer to resolve the matter promptly.

#### **One Parent Families**

Bernard Durkan, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Social Welfare this week launched an information booklet for one parent families. This booklet is designed to ensure that all one parent families are aware of and in receipt of their full entitlements and benefits. Minister Durkan said that it is extremely important that the public are kept upto-date on changes in Social Welfare rates and improvements. #### DEMOCRATIC LEFT NOTES

#### Cable TV

Councillor Catherine Murphy has called on the Minister for Energy, Transport and Communications to exert tighter supervision on the service provided by Cable TV company Cable Management Ireland (CMI). This follows repeated complaints she has received about the quality of the service provided by the company, which has over 13,000 subscribers in County Kildare.

A public meeting convened by Catherine Murphy in Celbridge heard complaints about variability in reception quality, constantly poor reception on certain channels, and problems with receiving stereo transmissions. Those who have protested by refusing to pay their subscriptions have simply been cut off. The department of Communications has responded to complaints about the service by simply relaying excuses provided by CMI. There was a feeling that CMI, which takes in almost £1.5 million yearly in subscriptions from Kildare subscribers, is not investing sufficiently in upgrading its transmission system.

Catherine Murphy believes that, in the absence of competition in the provision of cable TV services, the Department of Communications should take a more proactive role in monitoring the performance of cable companies which operate under licence from the Department. This should also include regular inspections of the quality of service provided, and periodic surveys of subscribers' satisfaction levels.

In the meantime, Catherine Murphy believes that joint action is needed by dissatisfied CMI subscribers. Individuals and groups who have carried out local surveys should send their results to Councillor Murphy who will collate them and forward them to the Minister for action. Groups contemplating local surveys should also contact Catherine Murphy with a view to establishing a common approach.

#### Windfall tax on Rezoners?

Councillor Catherine Murphy is demanding the immediate introduction of a substantial windfall tax on capital gains made by landowners who have their land rezoned for housing. This will be a major plank in her platform for the forthcoming general election in the new Kildare North constituency. Rezoning can instantly increase the value of land by ten times. Landowners selling rezoned land can make millions of pounds in unearned income overnight. At the same time, those buying houses on the rezoned land may have to wait years and years for proper educational, recreational and transportation facilities for themselves and their children due to shortages of public funds.

Catherine Murphy believes that there has been far too much rezoning of land in Kildare. A recent audit carried out by the County Council at her request showed that there is already enough undeveloped land zoned for housing to cater for an

additional 70,000 people. This is enough to cater for 50 years' population growth, according to the Council's planners. Yet the Fianna Fail/Fine Gael/Progressive Democrats rezoning majority on the Council are hell-bent on massive further rezoning. This amounts to unsustainable development on a grand scale and is indefensible.

A major windfall tax would take the heat out of the rezoning debate by greatly reducing the massive profits which can currently be realised by rezoning. And, where rezoning does take place, it will provide adequate funds to provide the services and infrastructure made necessary by housing developments.

#### **Footpaths Straffan Road**

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the County Engineer to carry out the minor work necessary to make the footpaths accessible to electric wheelchair users.

#### Harbour Field Area

The Council have been requested by Cllr. John McGinley to finish off the landscaping between the old Straffan Road and the Harbour Field wall in the interest of safety.

#### Arrow at Old Greenfield

Minister Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have again asked the County Engineer to paint an arrow on the road indicating the Straffan Road entrance to Old Greenfield.

#### **Schools Moyglare Road**

Arising from discussions with Maynooth Post Primary Teachers, Minister Stagg has requested Cllr. John McGinley to submit the following motion for consideration at the next Celbridge Area Committee meeting of the Council. "That flashing lights be erected either side of the schools on Moyglare road, Maynooth, in the interest of safety".

#### **Better Public Lighting in Kildare**

Cllr. John McGinley has resubmitted his motion on public lighting for the next meeting of the Council.

"That we proceed to replace the 4000 mercury vapour public lights in the county (including Leixlip and Newbridge) with modern sodium vapour units, that we upgrade and provide infill where necessary and that we place an order to have this work completed as soon as possible." /continued

#### Bus Shelter - Straffan Road - 67A turning point



#### Public Light No. 22 - Greenfield Close



Gardening Hints -- 7 Looking Good



ay brings an exuberance of flower. Many trees and shrubs are almost bowed down under the weight of their blossoms, and herbaceous perennials are shooting out of the ground so quickly that you can almost watch them grow. As well as all the flowers, the subtle hints of fresh young foliage make up a maryellous tapestry of colour.

Flowering trees are making a wonderful display of blossom. There are many flowering cherries (Prunus) including the Lombardy cherry popular for small spaces as it forms a narrow upright column of branches clothed with double, pale pink flowers.

Ornamental thorn trees can be even more showy than flowering cherries. 'Paul's Scarlet' bears double scarlet flowers, 'Crimson Cloud' has single dark red ones with a pretty white eye, and 'Rosea Flore Pleno' has double pink blossoms. There are some attractive, more subtle varieties too, like C.I. 'Plena' which has double, white flowers. C. prunifolia looks handsome from spring to autumn, with white flowers, long-lasting red fruits and gleaming oval leaves that colour beautifully in autumn. And don't shun white-flowered common hawthorn (C. monogyna) which makes an excellent prickly hedge that's a wonderful wildlife habitat. Grow a wild rose through it and you have the best of all rural worlds.

The golden rain tree (Laburnum) positively drips with long clusters of bright yellow flowers. Do bear in mind, though, that all parts of this tree are poisonous, particularly the seeds, so it's wise not to plant laburnums if there are young children around. Never plant one near a pond as the seeds will poison the water.

Several choice, less usual trees are also flowering now. The Judas tree (Cercis siliquastrum) bears many dangling clusters of rosy-pink flowers just before the attractive rounded leaves appear. It's said to be the tree from which Judas hanged himself, hence its name. Another excellent small tree is the rose acacia (Robinia hispida) which also bears deep rose-pink flowers and has pretty, fern-like leaves. Both these trees like a sheltered sunny site. The snowball tree (Styrax japonica) has wide-spreading branches and its exquisite, small, white flowers hang from underneath. Also known as the snowbell or snowdrop tree, Halesia carolina bears similar beautiful white flowers. Both the snowbell trees need a moist, lime-free soil. Paulownia tomentosa gives a glorious display of deep mauve, foxglove-like flowers in May, provided the weather has been kind, and its large velvety leaves look exceptionally handsome. Alternatively, if you want some dramatic foliage without the flowers, prune it to the ground in spring and then remove all but one of the new shoots.


Shrubs in flower include many white ones this month. One of the loveliest is Exochorda x macrantha 'The Bride', with arching branches smothered in clusters of large, pure white flowers. The poetically named bridal wreath or foam of May (Spiraea 'Arguta') also bears masses of white flowers. For a combination of attractive flowers and all-year foliage, there's little to beat Mexican orange blossom (Choisya ternata) which bears fragrant white flowers in bursts through late spring and summer. and its attractive evergreen foliage looks good all year. 'Aztec Pearl' is a compact variety. C.t. 'Sundance' has pale gold leaves, though the flowers aren't produced nearly so freely.

Nearly everyone falls in love with the beautiful waxypetalled bloom of magnolias, though remember that as most varieties develop into large shrubs, they'll need plenty of room. M.x soulangeana bears huge tulip-shaped blooms. Most varieties have white flowers, but those of 'Lennei' are flushed with red and 'Rustica Rubra' has rich purple-red flowers. There are many other beautiful and less common magnolias, like M. sieboldii, which should be planted with a view to the longer term as they can take a few years to flower. Some species need to be grown on an acid soil so check them out first.

Spring just wouldn't be the same without the scent of lilacs. The vast majority are varieties of Syringa vulgaris which grow into large shrubs. There are lots of colours from which to choose including 'Madame Lemoine' (white), 'Firmament' (sky-blue), 'Katherine Havemeyer' (deep lavender-purple), 'Edward J. Gardner' (pale pink), 'Sensation' (purple-red edged with white) and 'Primrose' (pale yellow). For a small space, choose the more compact variety S. meyeri 'Palibin' with pale pink flowers.

Daphnes are just about the only plants that can beat lilacs for spring fragrance. These choice plants are a bit pricey, but their perfume is second to none. Daphne burkwoodii bears pink flowers, and the variety 'Astrid' has pretty green and white variegated leaves. There are also dwarf varieties for rockeries like D. collina and D. x napolitana. Rhododendron varieties are at their peak now. About the best types for containers are the Rhododendron yakushimanum hybrids. This relatively new group includes many plants with delicate and unusually coloured flowers like 'Doc' which has rose-pink blooms with deeper pink edges, fading to white as they age; those of 'Percy Wiseman' are cream flushed with pink; 'Hoppy' is pale mauve fading to white; 'Silver Sixpence' has creamywhite flowers splashed with pale yellow. Although they grow only to around 1 m (3ft), their leaves are much larger and more attractive than those of other dwarfs.

Bare soil is best hoed regularly to keep down weeds as they germinate. It's far easier to get them at this stage rather than when they've become established or, even worse, seeded everywhere so you have hundreds more next year. Use a small onion hoe to weed more closely around plants.

# DELICIOUSLY SIMPLE

#### CHICKEN AND SWEETCORN SOUP

#### Serves 4

2.5cm (2") piece fresh root ginger, peeled 100g (4oz) cooked. skinned and boned chicken breast.shredded 10ml (2tsp) sherry 1 egg white 15ml (1tbsp) cornflour 600ml (1pt) chicken stock 100g (4oz) sweetcorn kernels salt and freshly ground black pepper 1 spring onion, finely chopped

• Finely grate the ginger, discarding any tough fibres. Mix with the chicken and sherry, then set aside.

• Lightly beat the egg white, then set aside. In a large bowl, blend the cornflour to a smooth paste with about 30ml (2tbsp) cold water.

• Bring the chicken stock to a rolling boil in a large saucepan, then remove from the heat and pour over the cornflour mixture. Stir well until blended, then return to the saucepan with the chicken mixture and the sweetcorn. Season to taste.

• Heat gently, stirring until the mixture boils and thickens.

 Add the egg white, stirring so that it separates into small pieces. Ladle the soup into bowls and garnish with the chopped spring onion.

• Serve this soup with rice crackers as a starter or a light snack.

Cooking:10 mins

#### **TUNA AND SWEETCORN POTATO NUGGETS**

Serves 4

**Preparation:15mins** 

2 x 65g packs instant mashed potato 275ml/(<sup>1</sup>/, pint) boiling water Salt and freshly ground black pepper 150g/5oz breadcrumbs 115g/4oz sweetcorn, canned or frozen 225g/7oz tuna in brine, drained 5ml/1 teaspoon dried mixed herbs 2 eggs, size 3 Unlimited shredded lettuce

• Stir the instant mashed potato into the boiling water and mix until smooth. Add the seasonings. • Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/ gas mark 6. Scatter breadcrumbs over a foil-covered tray and brown in oven for 5 minutes.

· Add the sweetcorn, flaked tuna and herbs to the potato and mix well. Divide the mixture into 24 balls and place on a foil covered baking tray. Flatten the balls slightly with the palm of your hand, then chill while you prepare the coating.

• Lightly beat the eggs and pour into a shallow dish. Pour the grilled breadcrumbs into another shallow dish. • Place the nuggets in the egg, then roll in the breadcrumbs to coat evenly. Place the nuggets on a foilcovered baking tray and cook for 10 to 12 minutes. Serve the nuggets with unlimited shredded lettuce.

#### **MICROWAVE RECIPE FOR CREME CARAMEL WITH APPLE** MARMALADE

For the Creme Caramel: 3oz/75g caster sugar 2 tsp cornflour 1 tsp vanilla essence 1pt/600ml milk 4 eggs, size 3, beaten



Serves 4

#### For the Apple Marmalade:

2 oranges, rind and juice 5oz/150g caster sugar

2 apples, peeled, cored and finely chopped

• To make the caramel, put 3 tbsp sugar and 5 tbsp water into a 2pt/1.2L microproof dish. Cook on High (100%) for 4-5 min until sugar has dissolved and mixture turns golden. Using oven gloves, tip dish slightly to coat base evenly with caramel. Leave to set.

• Mix remaining sugar with cornflour and vanilla essence in a microproof jug. Gradually stir in milk and cook on High (100%) for 4 min. Whisk in eggs. Strain mixture over caramel and cover with clingwrap. Cook on Low (10%) for 10 min, then cook on High (100%) for a further 3 min. Allow to cool, then chill for 2 hours or overnight. • To make the marmalade, put orange rind and juice and sugar into a microproof bowl. Cook on High (100%) for 5 min, stirring halfway through cooking. Add apples and cook on High (100%) for a further 15 min until marmalade is thick and syrupy.

• Turn out créme caramel on to a serving dish and serve with hot or cold apple marmalade.



#### Mitten Cup 1st Round Rockmount 1 Maynooth Town 0




