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NEW START FOR UNIVERSITY

For over two hundred years St. Patrick's College and the town of Maynooth have co-existed, side by side. For much of that two hundred years, while the College was exclusively a seminary, the level of contact between the two was minimal. Since the nineteen sixties when the first lay students were admitted, the College's impact on the town has grown. Now almost 4,500 students converge on Maynooth each October, up to half of them taking up residence in the town. Add in several hundred teaching and support staff and the effect on the town's economy is obvious. So, changes in what we think of as "the College" are important for the town.

The last few weeks have seen the launch of NUI, Maynooth and many readers will have attended the Open Day on October 11th to celebrate the beginning of a new era. The town now has its own independent university which in status stands alongside UCD, UCC and the other colleges which form the National University of Ireland. For a town of its size, Maynooth is probably unique in western Europe in having a fully fledged university in its midst.

Such a situation poses both problems and opportunities. During term time perhaps a quarter of the town's population is made up of university students while the town's social and recreational amenities remain under-developed. A number of the towns estates are becoming increasingly dominated by rented housing accommodating students. In some cases this has proved to be a problem for long term residents.

But the opportunities for Maynooth as a university town undoubtedly outweigh the problems. The local economy already benefits enormously from the presence of the university and further expansion, both in staff and student numbers, is planned. New computer courses in the university are set to produce highly skilled graduates who can benefit from local employment opportunities.

All of this poses a challenge to both town and university. How, as a community, can we make the most of the fact that we have a growing and vibrant university in our midst? Editorial

At certain times during the day Maynooth is the victim of traffic gridlock. At around 9 o'clock in the morning any motorist leaving the Newtown area and attempting to make their way down Parsons St. onto Main St. and then up the Straffan Rd. towards the motorway can count on the journey taking anything up to 20 minutes. On their way they will invariably pass a long tailback of traffic from the Square back up the Straffan Rd. sometimes extending back to the intersection with the Celbridge Rd. Travelling around the town at lunch time and as the schools close at 4.00pm is equally frustrating. Without the by-pass Maynooth would surely be at a permanent standstill at this stage. For the many commuters driving into the city each day the volume of traffic is also becoming a major headache. On some mornings traffic jams can extend all the way from Woodies in Lucan right through to Ballyfermot and journeys to the city centre from Maynooth at peak commuting times take anything up to 75 minutes. It is interesting to note that developers in Maynooth are selling houses promising easy access to the city with journey times of 30 minutes - they don't mention that this can only be done at 3.00 a.m. in the morning!

With Maynooth destined to grow further perhaps as we sit in traffic jams around the town it might be worth considering how much more housing/people/traffic we want in Maynooth.

Kildare County Council - A Tribute

When I hear people whining, moaning and generally criticising Kildare County Council, it makes me see red. You know the usual, "they don't do this, they should do that, they won't do the other, I never get a reply, haven't heard from them in months, blah, blah, blah" and on it goes. People just don't realise the huge amount of administrative, not to say financial, planning that goes into 'getting things

Take the cutting back (or not, in this case) of hedges and trees (Rathcoffey Road springs to mind). A simple operation, you might think. But you'd be wrong. It's not just a matter of sending somebody out with a clippers. The decision has to be made to send someone out, after the work has been prioritised, then it's a case of who to send, when to send him, how to approach the job etc., etc., and all this planning takes time.

Then there's the recently upgraded Straffan Road. Nobody can deny that it was badly needed to cope with the huge increase in traffic from the new motorway. Nobody can deny the difference it's made to the traffic problem in Maynooth. Yes, I know the only thing it's done is to take a larger volume of traffic, at a faster rate, to the same teejunction in the centre of town. I know it possibly could have been planned slightly better, maybe utilising some of the space at the Square. But K.C.C.'s engineering, road design or architectural departments can't be expected to think of everything. Remember when it used to take as long as two to three minutes to turn from the Main Street onto the Straffan Road? We certainly don't want to return to those

Some people seem to think that all you have to do is click your fingers and, hey presto! a bridge appears. If only it were that simple! The Bond Bridge fiasco is a typical example of the impatience of people, once they get an idea into their heads that a project is urgent.

Action groups and committees are formed in an effort to pressurise the Council into doing something about it. That's all very well, but you must realise that a project of this size takes years of planning, feasibility studies, designing, engineering and draughting before it can get off the ground. Then there are the various meetings, environmental, costing and so on. Okay, so the cost seems to fluctuate on a weekly basis, but hey, what's a few quid here or there between friends. And all right, so the County Manager couldn't be bothered attending the meeting to explain the discrepancies. Come on, he's a busy man (he was probably attending an important conference on 'road traffic management in the Gobi desert' or some such). Anyway, the present structure has served the community of Maynooth quite well, thank you very much, for years and years. It's only relatively recently (ten or fitteen years) that the replacement of the bridge has become urgent, and as we all know, Rome wasn't built in a day.

So does Kildare County Council deserve all the criticism levelled at them? Definitely, and more! When you consider that we pay their wages, because a County Council has no money of its own, and when you consider the quality of the so-called 'professionals' that we get for our money, it's a self-answering question. Most of their engineering, architectural, town planning or estimating staff, not to mention managers, assistant managers, development officers etc. would find it extremely difficult to survive in the commercial sector. They suffer from the 'reverse Midas syndrome' - almost everything they touch turns to junk! It would seem that St. Mary's has become the County retirement home for the intellectually challenged, where they live out the remainder of their lives in blissful ignorance of the real world.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question:

I worked for years until I got married and had children. I paid full stamps (P.R.S.I.). Will I qualify for a pension when I am 66?

Up until now, in order to qualify for a Contributory Old Age Pension you must meet certain conditions:

- You must have started paying insurance (stamps) before reaching age 56.
- You must have at least 156 weeks full rate PRSI (insurance stamps) paid since first starting work.
- Have an average of 20 weeks full-rate PRSI paid or credited per year over your working life.

In your circumstances you may not have an average of 20 over your working life but from 21st November Social Welfare are introducing a new Pro-Rata Old Age (Contributory) Pension. The conditions for this are:

- That you entered insurance before reaching age 56 (as **(1)**
- That you have at least 260 weeks full-rate PRSI paid
- That you have an average of at least 10 weeks fullrate PRSI paid or credited over the period from 1953. or the date you started paying PRSI, if later) up to the end of the last full tax year before reaching age 66

This means that people can qualify for a reduced pension if they have less stamps or credits over their working life This is likely to benefit many people who were "out of the system" for long periods of time.

Social Welfare have a leaflet "Pension Check" SW 19A which is available from your local office.

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




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

fund-raising successes. At our recently held AGM, the balance sheet showed an income of £12,154.21 (of which £2,398.41 was brought forward) and an expenditure of £11,695.60, which leaves a balance of £458.61 available for the incoming committee.

The committee is pleased to record the fact that a total of £8,746.00 has been handed over to the school. The allocation of funds is as follows:-

- Last year's Transition Year received £500 towards a First Aid course.
- Year has received £600 towards a course "Preparing for the Future".
- The Science Dept. received £546 towards the purchase of protective clothing and equipment.


NATIONAL FINALS WEEKENDS


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GAELSCOIL UÍ FHIAICH

The night of "ceol agus craic" was organised by the Board of Management as a tribute to the enormous contribution Tomás had made to the life of the school. After 5 years in Scoil Uí Riada Tomás has departed to take up a new teaching post in his native county Clare.

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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

Census Results Suggest Maynooth is likely to have a Baby Boom

New data from the 1996 Census is now available which contains a breakdown of population for each District Electoral Division by age group. This enables comparisons to be made between Maynooth and some of the other rapidly growing towns in Kildare, and particularly provides a pointer as to what schools and other facilities for young people will be required in the years ahead.

The table below contains comparative percentages for age groups for the towns of Naas, Leixlip, Newbridge, Celbridge and Maynooth, the five largest towns in Kildare.

It is apparent that Maynooth presently has far fewer children in the under 14 category than is the norm for the other towns. To take the most dramatic case, one in three people in Celbridge is under the age of 14, while only one in five in Maynooth falls into this category. At the same time, Maynooth is close to the average of the other towns for that proportion of its population in the 25-44 year age group - the age group in which most increases in family size occurs. In other words in Maynooth we have the young married couples, but the children they would normally be expected to produce haven't arrived yet! Less of a proportion of Maynooth's population is in the 45-64 age group - the age group indicative of families who have completed child rearing.

Child Numbers Set to Increase Dramatically

Even making some allowance for the effects of some enumeration of students in the Census data, the message is fairly obvious. Maynooth is set to experience a rapid growth in population as young married couples in its vast new estates start to have children. This is not a surprising finding. Anyone familiar with the housing situation in Maynooth will already have deduced that many of the new three and four bedroom houses are not always going to contain two people - or at least were not bought with that purpose in mind! If the proportion of children in Maynooth today was to be the same as the average for the other Kildare towns we would have somewhere between 500 and 800 additional children, equivalent to another secondary school. Should the future pan out along the lines experienced by other neighbouring towns such as Celbridge, the consequences would be serious. A much larger complement of children for Maynooth would have major implications for schools as well as for leisure and sports facilities. The implications would also be felt around Maynooth as the catchment areas for schools would undoubtedly change dramatically. Many such problems are currently being experienced in neighbouring towns with much lower rates of growth than Maynooth.

Time for a Rethink by Councillors

Do we have the foresight necessary to start planning for this future now while there is still time? The answer is not encouraging. In the Amended Maynooth Development Plan our councillors proposed, against the advice of professional planners, to facilitate a further huge influx of population to double the 1996 population of this town. This would seem to Maynooth Planning Alliance to be the worst possible course of action.

Maynooth Planning Alliance calls on our elected officials to recognise that the last thing Maynooth needs at present is further huge in-migration. It calls on them to await the preparation of strategic planning guidelines for the entire Greater Dublin Area before progressing any further with the Maynooth Development Plan. Only by this approach can young families look forward to a future for their children in Maynooth with confidence.

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
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MAYNOOTH SENIOR CITIZENS COMMITTEE



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


CLUAIN AOIBHINN RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION


C.A.R.A. has now registered with the Garda Síochana as part of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. A well attended meeting was held in the

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HALLOWE'EN IS A MAGICAL TIME FOR CHILDREN

Halloween marks the end of Autumn. The Summer is over but we still have days of warm sunshine. It's the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness and the most colourful of all the seasons. The orchard apples and pears are ready for picking. Ripe juicy blackberries glisten in the hedgerows. It is very pleasant to walk along the College grounds and hear the rustle and flutter of the falling leaves spreading their glorious hues of golden browns, yellows and reds. Some of the birds have left us already and the swallows are preparing for their long journey to the warm south. In the morning white mists rise from the fields and canal and in the evening the sky is a mass of colour with the sun setting down over the Kilcock Road.

Hallowe'en is a magical time for children. They dress up and go from door to door singing, dancing and playing. They hold out their bags for offerings of fruit, nuts and barm brack. For us as children in the country we got our hazel nuts, damsons and sloes inthe woods. While cycling home we would hear the rustle of the birds and the scurrying of the rabbits in the undergrowth. We would frighten each other saying, "IT'S A GHOST".

My mother had a great sense of Hallowe'en. We sat around the big kitchen table waiting for the big dish of colcannon. For those of you who have never tasted colcannon, it is an experience not to be missed. Curly kale, potatoes and onion are boiled and then mashed. The best bit is the big knob of homemade butter dropped into a well in the middle of your plate of colcannon. Home made butter was made by churning the cream in a big wooden churn. We all took our turns at turning the handle of the churn. Mother made the colcannon extra special by hiding gifts in our plates - a coin wrapped in muslin, a small stick or a rag. These treasures each had its own meaning. The person who got the money would never know a poor day - if you got the rag the opposite would be the case. The colcannon was followed by thick slices of home made barm brack with lots of butter. We all watched to see who would get the ring - then as now whoever got it would be the next to marry.

We didn't have electricity in those days of pre-television Wicklow. Father picked the largest turnip from the pit in the back field. He scrubbed it and carved out a nose, a fearsome mouth and two eyes. In the middle of the head went a hole for the placement of a candle.

Hallowe'en took on a special meaning for us in later years as Nuala was born on All Saints' Day. The following day is All Souls Day. It was traditional for us to attend mass and pray for the Holy Souls. Graves of loved ones are visited at this time of year. Can you remember visiting the church on the way home from school, saying a quick prayer, gaining a plenary indulgence for each visit, nearly knocking down

each other in the rush to get in and out as fast as possible and have the most visits.

Unfortunately the parents of today cannot allow their children experience the same sense of fun which we enjoyed at this time of year. However we can do what we can not to let the old traditions die.

Features

THE DANGERS OF BANGERS AND BONFIRES!

If you are allowing a bonfire:-

- Make sure it is sited on a hard surface away from houses, garages and overhead cables.
- Don't use petrol or paraffin to light the fire.
- Adult supervision is essential.
- Fireworks are illegal and dangerous. Last year 36 children in the Dublin area had to be treated in hospital with injuries from fireworks.
- If the bonfire gets out of hand make sure everyone leaves the area immediately and call the fire brigade.

If bonfires are being allowed they should be supervised by adults who should make sure that:

- * That bonfire is located away from buildings, trees and overhead cables.
- Petrol or paraffin is not used to start the fire.
- * Rubbish which might contain bottles or aerosols is not thrown on to the fire.
- * The children do not play with burning fragments or stand too close to the fire.
- * The fire is kept under control.

Also parents should supervise 'trick or treating' by children at Halloween. Older people, especially those living alone, can find repeated knocks on their door after dark, bonfires and bangers disturbing and frightening.

Firework Top nine Safety Code for Adults

Young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance and follow the safety rules for using sparklers. Only adults should deal with firework displays and the lighting of fireworks. They should also take care of the bonfire.

Here are the top nine safety tips for adults:

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks except when ready to set one off.
- Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw away.

- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Pets

Animals do not like bonfires or fireworks. The flames and noise upsets them. They should always be kept safely indoors. Make sure that they can't get out through open windows and doors. It is best to keep the curtains closed too and it may be necessary to keep them indoors for several nights around October 31st.

Sparklers

These are often viewed as being harmless but they do burn at fierce temperatures. Sparklers should not be given to anyone under the age of five. To a young child, the heat from a sparkler is equivalent to the heat from a welding torch.

So - Safety rules for Sparklers:-

- Never give to young children under the age of five;
- Always wear gloves with sparklers, preferably leather ones;
- * Hold it at arms length while an adult lights it for you;
- Never wave it about near someone else as you could burn them;
- Never hold a baby in your arms when you are holding a sparkler;
- * When the sparkler has finished, put it into a bucket of cold water straight away and leave it there.

Halloween night in recent years has become a problem for fire brigades and a particularly upsetting time for children and the elderly - all stemming from bonfires. Parents should know where their children are on Halloween night so that they cannot hurt themselves or cause annoyance to others.

Bonfires badly sited, inadequately controlled and fuelled by unsuitable materials cause approximately £50,000 of damage each year to public property not to mention the fear and anxiety to elderly people living nearby.

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MAYNOOTH SCHOOL RECEIVES EUROPEAN RECOGNITION

Maynooth Post Primary School has been recognised by the European Community as a school of excellence.

Maynooth is among 100 schools chosen from 17 European Countries to be given this recognition.

There are 4 more just such schools in Ireland: they are Killinarden Community School (Tallaght), Colaiste Mhuire (Ennis), Kilkenny College and St. Pauls College (Raheny).

The school will be involved in a European Project on self evaluation for the next 5-10 years.

The schools will be expected to evaluate where it is going as a teaching institution in this time period.

Maynooth Post Primary will have to meet with the other 4 Irish schools involved to decide on what mechanisms will need to be put in place for the project to be successful.

The schools will have to decide how to approach issues such as academic achievements, support for people with learning disabilities, social development, the schools link to home and the community among other issues.

Europe will then assess the schools development in these areas.

This project will be jointly funded by the EU and the Department of Education, though as yet, the exact allocation of funds has not been decided.

The Department of Education see this school self evaluation as being a school development planning project.

Maynooth Post Primary's acting principal Sean Ashe hopes that the school's achievement will place it in a better position with the Department of Education to obtain further physical and staffing facilities.

The school has more applications than there are placements in the school so hopefully this project will provide the school with a means of growing bigger if it isn't possible to grow better.

### WORLD YOUTH DAY

In mid November a group of young people from Maynooth will meet in Dublin with people from all over Ireland. They will have many memories to share of an unforgettable week

On 17 August 1997 three teenage boys and three teenage girls left Maynooth to catch the ferry to Holyhead. They were joining about 400 other Irish on their way to World Youth Day in Paris. Bishop Brady the auxiliary for Dublin accompanied them. By one o'clock they were on one of the eight coaches taking them south to Dover where they got the ferry to Calais and then on to Paris. As they approached Paris they were given colour coded badges with name and country which they were to wear for the whole trip. Food vouchers were given to keep them sustained. Their French hosts awaited their arrival. They stayed with French families - the Larchers, Guittons and others. They were welcomed to the parish of Jean Baptist de la Salle.

Three hundred thousand other young people from all over the world were making their way to Paris. What a gathering at Port de Versailles. The heat was 30 but plenty of water was available. Nigerians, Australians, Italians, Americans. Irish and every nation under heaven were represented. English and school French were very useful. The badges showed where each person came from and were an instant ice-breaker.

The highlight of the visit was the Pope's visit to the assembled teenagers at Long Champ racecourse. The teenagers slept in their sleeping bags at the racecourse. They were each given a candle to light during the vigil. Andrea remembers the little dots of light everywhere. The Pope stayed with them until 10.30p.m. He baptised ten people. On the following morning he was back again at 9a.m. for Mass. The blessing by the Pope and the shouts of joy from the assembly are fond memories.

The Irish group were made to feel very welcome. Everywhere people noticed their badges. "Irish - we love Ireland" was heard so many times. 17 year old Truriane Guitton and all the others will long remember their Irish guests. When the delegates come together in Dublin this month they will relive moments that they were very privileged to share. Thanks to Nicola Conlon of Moyglare and University College Galway, Andrea Ennis, Fiona Hoare of Dowdstown, Padraig and Michael Madden of Straffan Way and Declan O'Rourke of Kingsbry for reminding us of an unique event.

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

At long last Maynooth receives the recognition it deserves. The Universities Act 1997 earlier this year made Maynooth a constituent University of the National University of Ireland. It now has equal status with Cork, Dublin and Galway as a constituent university of the Federal National University of Ireland structure.





The Taoiseach Mr. B. Ahern T.D., on Monday 13th October, laid the foundation stone of a new science building of National University of Ireland, Maynooth. It is being built at a cost of £9.6 million funded by a partnership of European Research Development Fund, the National Exchequer and University monies. Its purpose built laboratories and teaching spaces is on a par with the best on offer in European universities and will support 700 undergraduates and more than 50 postgraduates and postdoctoral researchers.

This has been brought about by the hard work of everybody involved in the College, especially the President, Staff and Students.

Three of the departments moving into the new building are Space Technology, headed by Professor Susan McKenna - Lawlor. Her research team and campus company, Space Research Ireland Ltd., produce hardware and software for space missions flown by the four major space agencies. Also Professor M. Quinn (Chemistry) and Professor J. Slevin (Experimental Physics) their research activities extend to Universities and Research Institutes in the USA, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy and the UK.

Part of the Taoiseach's address stated, "I would like to congratulate the President, Staff and Students of this fine institution without whose drive, dedication and commitment

the project would not have come to fruition. Developments here in Maynooth over the past few years have contributed greatly to the economic, social and cultural advancement of the whole country."



# MAYNOOTH POST - PRIMARY, TRANSITION YEAR HIKE.



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
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### **FAMILY DAY NUI**

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### THE VARIATION IN PRICE BETWEEN FRESH & FROZEN VEGETABLES!

On comparing the price of fresh vegetables to frozen vegetables it was immediately clear that fresh vegetables are far cheaper than their frozen counterparts. In most cases the frozen variety are twice as dear as the fresh.

Fresh is cheaper and better for you and costs much less so why do so many of us opt for the more expensive and not so healthy alternative of frozen foods?

Well the answer is simple, its just that frozen is by far more convenient. You also save on actual cooking time even though you lose on money. Obviously for a vast number of people time is more precious than the pound but for those who believe in being economical read on.

Below is a comparison between the prices of fresh vegetables and frozen vegetables per kilogram.

### What the People Say!

Of course by now we are all aware of the 5p rise in the price of alcohol. This means nothing to a lot of people but to others it is definitely worth a thought. We decided to ask opinions on this matter from both the public and the publicans of Maynooth.

Paddy, the Manager of the Roost said that in his opinion if you can already afford to drink at previous prices a 5p rise won't make much of a difference.

Des Hegarty, the manager of the Leinster Arms said "that if the brewery keep putting up the price of the pint they are cutting off their nose to spite their face because at the end of the day this increase is not down to the publican but to the brewery". He explained that publicans have been forced into rising the price of the pint as a result of the brewery upping the price of their kegs by £4.40. A keg of beer will contain 88 pints so the price of each pint must go up by 5p to reimburse the publican as he still has to pay his tax to the Government among the other bills he must pay.

Noel Brady, owner of Brady's said "The distillers have been allowed this increase and VAT so the publican has to raise his price to keep his profit margin in line".



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### Video Review

### Romeo and Juliet (12's)

Every so often, a film comes along that just seems to sneak up on you quietly, and then leaves you totally gob-smacked. This is such a film. I mean, after all, Shakespeare in modern day California can't possibly work, it's sacrilege! The Bard would turn over in his grave! However, if you think that you'd be completely wrong. Yes, it's lavish, the way only celluloid can be. Yes, it's risque but Shakespeare's writing was always full of nuances and innuendo.

Everybody is acquainted with the story of the young starcrossed lovers from rival families, so I won't bore you with going over the plot. Suffice to say that Leonardo De Caprio as Romeo, and Claire Danes as Juliet, are absolutely perfectly cast. The original text has been strictly adhered to, so nothing of the power of the plot is lost. Direction and photography is first rate and would be very difficult to improve upon. This is Shakespeare's finest tragedy, and very few who see it could fail to be moved by it. This movie is definitely destined to be a true classic of the cinema. What more can I say?

#### The English Patient (15's)

This is the opposite end of the cinematic scale - a big, lavish movie full of ...nothing. It's a beautifully shot, beautifully directed epic, which is guaranteed to bore the pants off you! Ralph Fiennes puts in a sterling performance as the badly burned stranger being cared for by nurse Juliette Binoche in North Africa, during the Second World War.

Of course they fall in love, but things aren't all they seem to be. Or are they? Is good old Ralph a spy or isn't he? Will the pair live happily ever after or not? When he recovers. will they part, never to see each other again? Do you really give a toss?

This is a film that would have been far better as a play on BBC 2. At least then, you could have switched channels and watched something more enjoyable like Prisoner-Cell Block H.

This movie is over two and a half hours long, and will keep you hanging on to the edge of your seat, in case you fall off in your sleep. It's a tribute to the power of publicity how it managed to walk off with so many Oscars.

#### **Space Truckers** (12's)

It's the year 2094, and Dennis Hopper is the cynical old freight pilot transporting an unknown cargo bound for Earth. His space team is Debi Mazar, the girl of his dreams, and Stephen Dorff, his reckless young sidekick. When they

discover that the cargo is actually an army of killer robots. hell-bent on taking over the world, the fun and excitement

This film is total ham and cheese, and doesn't pretend to be anything else. It's just great craic! The cast, including cameo performances from Charles Dance and George Wendt, are deliciously over the top. The movie was filmed mostly in Ardmore Studios in Bray, and failed to make any kind of impact at the box-office. Which is a pity because, taken at face value, it's a very good film - full of good, clean. nonsensical fun. And it doesn't take itself in the least bit seriously.

If you've been wiped out by Romeo and Juliet, and your (English) Patient's wearing a bit thin, this is just the bit of escapism for you!



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

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
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# Gardening Hints



Some Gardeners say that this is the end of the season, but really it should be looked upon as the beginning. There's no doubt that work done now will lay the foundations for a great garden next season.

Get the digging done, have a really good clean-up, order your seeds, finish new plantings where you can and, above all, go round the borders and correct your mistakes. We all make them and now's the time to put them right.

There's still all the summer's warmth in the soil, so plants that you move will get away quickly. So start with the big plants and take as much soil with them as you can. When they're replanted, pay special attention to the staking. Then mulch round the plant and water well - and that means for the whole of next season too.

#### **General Tasks**

**Bird boxes** should be cleaned of old nesting material which can harbour parasites. Wash them out with boiling water and repair them if necessary. Do this job well before late winter, when some birds will already be prospecting for nest sites.

Borders can be weeded and tidied at any time through the winter, so long as the soil is dry enough not to stick to your boots. Cut back the dead stems of perennials, chop them up and add them to the compost heap. Rake fallen leaves off plants, and either collect them to make leafmould or leave them on bare ground to rot down. Dig up and compost annual weeds, but burn or throw away the roots of perennial ones.

Protect delicate plants that can suffer in frosty weather, like cistus, fuchsias and penstemons, by tucking bracken or straw around their bases. Don't use peat or compost as these materials hold water and rot the plant.

Hedgehogs and toads often crawl into heaps of garden rubbish, particularly leaves, to hibernate for the winter, so check bonfires before setting fire to them. Hedgehogs tend to hibernate in compost heaps, so take a little care as you fork out the compost or turn it. When you're building a new heap, make a deluxe hedgehog home at the bottom: use an old washing-up bowl turned upside-down with a hole cut in the side and, leading from this, a piece of old drainpipe as an entrance tunnel.

#### **BULBS**

Nerines and other slightly tender, bulbous plants like *Agapanthus* that remain in the ground all winter benefit from a thick mulch of straw or bark in colder areas.

Most spring-flowering bulbs should have been planted by now, though tulips can go in up to the end of the month. Late planting also has the advantage of generally avoiding the disease tulip fire.



### HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS AND ALPINES

Alpines with woolly or fleshy leaves dislike winter wet. Cover them with a small cloche or a pane of glass to keep off the worst of the rain. Lewisias really benefit from protection as they detest water lying in their rosettes of leaves - planting them at an angle also helps to prevent waterlogging. Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) also benefits from protection.

#### **SHRUBS**

Hardwood cuttings taken last year should be carefully lifted and moved to a nursery bed or potted up. Grow them on for a further year before, planting them out into well-prepared soil.

Protect shrubs from winter damage. Stake or tie in evergreen shrubs if necessary to prevent them from wind-rocking. Check the ties on all plants are secure and in no danger of rubbing. Mulch rhododendrons with chipped bark or compost to protect their shallow roots from frost damage.

### CHECKLIST

- . Continue taking hardwood cuttings of shrubs and fruit bushes.
- Inspect potted bulbs regularly and water sparingly if necessary.
- . Feed flowering pot plants weekly with a liquid fertilizer.
- Plant spring bedding and winter pansies by the end of the month.
- . Lift and store dahlia tubers as soon as possible.
- Twist off dead indoor cyclamen leaves and flowers where they join the corm: remaining pieces of stem can cause it to rot.
- . Pinch out the tips of autumn-sown sweet peas when they're about 10 cm (4 in) high.
- . Check that tree ties are securely fitted and in no danger of rubbing.
- Put guards round young trees if there's any danger of rabbit or deer damage.
- . Give wild-flower meadows a final cut so that the spring flowers can be seen at their best.
- . Drain hosepipes, roll them up and store under cover.
- . Lag outdoor pipes and taps to prevent them freezing, drain them if possible.
- Order seed catalogues.
- Clean pots and seedtrays with hot water and disinfectant, ready for next spring.
- . Plant garlic by the end of the month.
- . Force seakale either indoors or outdoors.
- Lift and force without chicory
- . Check stored fruit and vegetables; throw out any showing signs of rot.
- . Net brussels and cabbage to protect them from birds.
- . Prune bush apple and pear trees, and black currents.
- Stop feeding fish as they'll live off their reserves for the winter months.

4 tomatoes, sliced

30ml/2tbsp chopped fresh coriander

150ml/<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pint/<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup natural yogurt

4-5 saffron strands soaked in

10ml 2tsp hot milk45ml/3tbsp toasted flaked almonds

### Tomato and Pumpkin Soup

#### Serves 4 - 6

1 lb (500g) pumpkin, peeled and diced

8oz (250g) tomatoes,

skinned and roughly chopped

2 leeks, trimmed and sliced

 $1^{1}/_{2}$  pints (900ml)

chicken or vegetable stock

4 tablespoons tomato pureé

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley

Salt and ground black pepper

Grilled bacon bits, to garnish, optional

Put all the ingredients, except for the bacon bits, in a large pan. Bring to the boil, then half-cover and simmer for 30 minutes until the vegetables are soft.



- 1. Preheat the oven to 190° C/375°F/Gas 5. Bring a large pan of water to the boil and add the rice, salt, whole cardamom pods cloves and cinnamon stick. Boil for 2 minutes then drain, leaving the whole spices in the rice.
- 2. Heat the oil in a pan and fry the onions for 8 minutes, until browned and softened. Add the chicken, followed by all the ground spices, the garlic, ginger and lemon juice. Stir-fry for 5
- 3. Transfer the chicken mixture to an ovenproof casserole and lay the tomatoes on top. Sprinkle on the fresh coriander, spoon over the yogurt and top with the drained rice.
- 4. Drizzle the saffron milk over the rice and pour over about 150ml/1/4 pint 2/2 cup of water.
- 5. Cover tightly and bake in the oven for 1 hour. Transfer to a warmed serving platter and remove the whole spices from the rice. Garnish with toasted almonds and fresh coriander sprigs and serve with natural yogurt.


#### Serves 4

- 4. Pour in the cream and simmer for 5-8 minutes longer. Serve the rice sprinkled with the pistachios in individual warmed bowls.





### **FINE GAEL NOTES**

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested KCC to use the mechanical sweeper to carry out regular sweeping of the approach roads to Maynooth, as well as the Main Street. This should be done at least once every three weeks.

Over the past number of months, Cllr. Senan Griffin has pursued KCC into allocating private sites for those people earning up to £14,000 per annum. The County Council has now agreed to allocate eight sites in Leixlip with the prospect of more coming on line in the future. It is the intention of Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin to work towards making similar sites available here in Maynooth, and in other towns throughout the county so that those in the £14,000 or less income bracket have an opportunity to build and own their own home.

The local branch of Fine Gael wish to express their deep appreciation to all those who contributed to their recent collection. Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to remove the mound of topsoil / subsoil which is placed along the roadside at the Boy's National School on the Kilcock Rd., and to replace it with a proper tarmac finish, so that adequate and safer car parking can be made available to those parents who have to drop off their school children at this juncture. Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin have also requested that KCC provide the flashing warning lights as previously agreed, so that the Moyglare Rd. is made safer for all school - going children.

### **Bond Bridge:**

The problems of Bond Bridge are well documented. Both Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin are actively pursuing Kildare County Coucil to ensure that the funding required from the Dept. of the Environment is made available regardless, be it in the form of a loan to the Council or a direct subvention. This bridge is a life or death issue, and simply cannot be neglected any further.

### **Town Improvement:**

It should be noted that the Town Improvement Scheme to the Main Street is due to commence during November. The undergrounding of services and improved foothpaths will be most welcome, however it will undoubtedly cause major disruption to traffic along the Main Street.

### **Barrockstown Waste Facility:**

It is the policy of Maynooth Branch Fine Gael to oppose this proposal on a number of grounds. Both Deputy Bernard Durkan, T.D. and Cllr. Senan Griffin have lodged objections to Meath County Council and are delighted to learn that planning permission has been refused. It is vital that all residents of the area lodge an objection to any further proposals for this site.

### Mast at the Garda Station:

The Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare County Council agreed unanimously to recommend rejection of the proposal to erect a 100ft mast at the Garda Barracks in Maynooth, The main worry about this proposal is that An Bord Pleanala has been granting planning permission for such masts on a large scale throughout the country, and as a result of this, the Committee has asked the County Manager to take up the issue with the Minister for the Environment.

### Silken Vale:

Cllr. Senan Griffin's following motion re Silken Vale was adopted by the Area Committee of Kildare County Council: "That Kildare County Council agreed to give favourable consideration to an application from the developer for the retention of Silken Vale estate as presently set out. This to exclude the provision of the proposed footbridge across the railway line and the proposed pedestrian access onto Greenfield Lane, subject to completing the estate and providing funds equal to the current cost of the footbridge, and that these funds would be available towards repairs to the existing footbridge across the canal."

### **County Development Plan**

Kildare County Council has failed to gain an extension of time for the 1984 County Development Plan. The Minister for the Environment has rejected the current strategy and has requested that it be amended.

It is with concern that Cllr. Senan Griffin, the local Fine Gael Councillor read in the Labour Party Notes that he himself was involved in a "Con Job" in adopting the current strategy. In a statement to the local Fine Gael Branch, Cllr. Griffin outlined the exact position of his role. He also stated that he has always been upfront in all his actions about the Development Plan, which is in total contrast with those of the Labour Party. Cllr. Griffin also stated that Labour Party Councillors proposed a total of 225 acres of land for rezoning in Maynooth - this is a reality, despite the fact that the Labour Party stated during the last General Election that they, and they alone, were the sole voice against what they claim as excessive rezoning.

### **Re Carton Avenue:**

The people of Maynooth should look at the development at Pebble Hill and Lyreen Park at the edge of Carton Avenue. Both of these developments were proposed by the Labour Party, as was the development of Carton Demense. It seems as though zoning, when proposed by the Labour Party, is deemed permissable, but if any other person, or group of persons proposed any other zoning, they are then castigated by them as being "excessive rezoners" and called "Con - Men".


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

### THE LABOUR PARTY NOTES

#### **DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

A special meeting of Kildare Co. Council is being held on the 23rd October to discuss what to do as a result of successive Ministers rejecting the proposals of the majority of Councillors on Kildare Co. Council.

Labour Councillors will propose that we start from scratch and that any rezoning is in line with good planning and reflects the view of the public.

### **BOND BRIDGE**

The proposal that Kildare Co. Council takes out a loan to complete the new bridge is on the agenda for the Councils monthly meeting on the 20th October. It was included on the agenda for Septembers meeting but was not reached. There are two main reasons why Councillors from outside the area should have no problem supporting the motion:

- 1. It does not take away money from elsewhere in the County.
- The County Manager has stated that the loan should be paid back from Special Development Levies over four years.

### THORNTON PLANNING APPLICATION

An application for planning permission for a waste recycling facility at Barrockstown, has been lodged with Meath Co. Council by Mr. P. Thornton.

Emmet Stagg T.D. and Cllr. John Mc Ginley have lodged objections to the application on the following grounds.

- It is inappropriate to locate such a facility in a rural area. There are adequate lands zoned for industrial use in Co. Meath which would be more appropriate for such a facility.
- 2. The facility will cause a noise nuisance which will seriously injure the amenities of the residents of the area.
- 3. There is a serious danger that leakage from the process will pollute the ground water in the area.
- 4. The extra traffic generated by such a development would cause a traffic hazard.

Essentially locating such a facility in this agricultural area would be madness.

### LITTER LOUTS

North Kildare Auctioneers persist in putting up illegal 'houses for sale' signs despite being told not to do so by the Council. At the Celbridge Area Committee meeting on

October 9th, Cllr. John McGinley recommended that Kildare Co. Council follow the example of Dublin Local Authorities by taking down signs and charging the offending Auctioneers for holding them. The County Secretary promised positive action on this problem.

### STRAFFAN ROAD LANDSCAPING

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has sought a full report and action plan on the extraordinary waste of tax payers money. He advised the County Secretary that of 63 staked trees planted on Straffan Way, 32 are dead. The success rate has been no better in all the other areas along the road with more weeds than trees or shrubs.

#### PUBLIC CAR PARK

Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested the Co. Engineer to put bollards in place at the exit onto Doctors Lane near the E.S.B. sub station. a number of cars have used this pedestrian way to exit and enter the Car Park thus causing a danger to pedestrians.

### NEW PEDESTRIAN LIGHTS - STRAFFAN ROAD

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has requested the engineers to position the new pedestrian lights close to the exit from the railway station on the Old Greenfield side. The engineers had proposed to locate the lights at the Glenroyal Entrance. A definite location will be agreed at the next meeting of the Area Committee on the 31st October.

### CLOSING OFF DOCTORS LANE

The County Secretary stated at the last meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee that he saw no reason why procedures should not be put in place for the closure of Doctors Lane to vehicular traffic at the Dublin Road end. A decision will be made at the next Area Committee meeting when the relevant engineer will present a report.

### MAYNOOTH PARKING BYE LAWS

Cllr. John McGinley told the County Secretary at the last area meeting to put these Bye Laws on public display in the library immediately.

### POUND LANE/DOUBLE LANE

Arising from complaints from residents of the area Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested the Gardai to pay particular attention to cars illegally entering the Lyreen Area from Convent Lane and Mill Street.

### NO LAND FOR PUBLIC HOUSING

There is no land in Maynooth for public housing and in order to rectify this matter Cllr. John Mc Ginley has tabled the following motion for consideration by the Area Committee.

'That land be purchased in Maynooth for housing as a matter of urgency'



### PARSON STREET

Telecom Eireann's contractors Rilmount have made a complete mess of Parson Street as a result of cable laying.

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has asked the County Engineer to ensure that proper reinstatement is carried out. He has also asked him to complete the traffic calming measures that were agreed for Parson Street over a year ago.

### FAGAN'S LANE PUBLIC LIGHT

Emmet Stagg T.D. has requested Kildare Co. Council to provide additional public lights on Fagans Lane. At present there are no lights between Main Street and the Band Hall.



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


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### MAYNOOTH TOWN A.F.C.
