

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

ommunity Council support Moyglare Residents for wall he failure of Kildare County Council to keep Residents ssociations informed of discussions between the Council nd Developers regarding the completion of estates was riticised by Paul Croghan at the December meeting of the community Council. His remarks follow the experience of the Noyglare Residents association in pursuing a wall as the oundary between Moyglare Village and the Moyglare Road. le warned other Residents Association that they will have similar difficulties. Maynooth Community Council is to write o Kildare County Council in support of the position adopted by the Moyglare Residents Association.

Maynooth Action Strategy - praised for lighting College for Millennium

Maynooth Community Council Chairman, Tom McMullion complimented Maynooth Action Strategy for the excellent ceremony and the lighting of the College Spire that took place on the 10th of December last. The lighting of the spire was the major Millennium project for the Town.

Maynooth Tidy Towns - urged to give estate reports to **Residents Associations**

Don O'Mahony the representative from Carton Court, supporting a proposal from Tom McMullon, urged the Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee to consider giving residents associations a written report on how their estates scored in the annual Best Estate competitions, sponsored by Coonans. Mr. O'Mahony felt that this information would help estates to identify areas that needed attention and would improve their chances in the competition next year.

Incineration out, but still no seven day cleaning service -**Community Council told**

Cllr. John McGinley advised Maynooth Community Council that the Kildare County Council Waste Management Plan no longer includes a reference to Incineration as a policy option. He also informed the Community Council that the County Council has refused to provide a seven day a week street cleaning service in Maynooth.

In thanking Ms. Kelleher for her efforts over the years, Council members also acknowledged the help of Ms. Margaret Lennon who has managed the day to day operation of the community council office since Ms. Kelleher's departure.

Concern expressed over condition of Presbytery

Community Councillors raised their concern regarding the worsening condition of the presbytery in Leinster Street. The building was lasr occupied by the late Fr.Cogan before his transfer to Porterstown. The house and grounds have not ben maintained and it was the view of community councillors, that as a community we should not allow this property to fall into ruins.

Carton Court Residents seek Community Council support on Fires

Maynooth Community Council members were informed about the impact on residents of fires being light in a commercial premises close to Carton Court. the opinion of councillors was that these fires were likely to be illegal and are certainly causing a nuisance to residents. A letter supporting the residents position is to be sent to Kildare County Council and copied to the offending party.

Tesco criticised for lack of choice in Maynooth shop

A number of Councillors were critical of Tesco Maynooth for their failure to offer a choice of goods and keeping their shelves adequately stocked. There were a number of incidences cited by councillors about their failure to get what they wanted in the shop in recent times.

New Chess Club in Maynooth

Community Council members for Moyglare, Gerald MacCann informed councillors that he formed the Maynooth Chess Club and affiliated with the national body. 

lo, but 1992 registered cars will have to be tested in 2001.

he National Car Test (NCT) will begin on 4th January 2000. his test is required under an EU Directive 1996/96EC. esting will be phased in for all 'liable' cars between 2000 ind 2002. 'Liable' cars are all cars **except** those classified as intage cars for motor tax purposes and cars permanently based on islands not connected to the mainland by road or oll on-roll off ferry.

t will be an offence to use a car liable for testing in a public place, without an NCT certificate. The penalty for an offence may be up to £350. Motor Tax Offices will not tax a liable car (including a second hand import) unless it has passed its NCT.

All cars that were first registered before the 1st January, 1992 are due for testing in 2000; cars first registered from 1992-1996 will be due for testing under the National Car Test in 2001; all four year old 'liable' cars will be due for test in 2002. In the relevant year car testing will be due on the anniversary of the first registration date and subsequent tests will be due every two years.

Under the National Car Test the items to be tested include suspension equipment, steering, lighting and signalling, vehicle identification (e.g. proper registration plates), wheels and tyres, transmission, bodywork, chassis and chassis components, braking, exhaust emissions. There are fortythree dedicated NCT Centres. If you want more information you should contact Customer Enquiries, National Car Testing Services (NCTS), Lakedrive 3026, Citywest Business Campus, Naas Road, Dublin 24. Tel: 1890 200 670.

The fee for an NCT will be £35 with a retest costing £19.80 (both inclusive of VAT). If a retest only covers minor items such as replacement of brake light bulbs or windscreen wipers, the retest may be free of charge.

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

Our next Guild Meeting will be on Thursday 13th January. We hope you all have a very Happy Christmas, Peace and Prosperity in the New Millennium.

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
HOSPICE SAYS THANK YOU

charity also, by being sponsored for a weight loss programme. Well done Toni, keep up the good work. The results of Decembers Flower Competition "Pantomime" are as follows:





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
Editorial

EDITORIAL

The turn of the year is usually a time for reflection. A time to look back over the past year and a time to consider plans for the future. This year, as we pass from one century and one millennium into another, perhaps it is appropriate that as a community we take stock by celebrating our past and marking out our future.

Recent excavations in Maynooth Castle suggest that the place we call Maynooth has been inhabited for thousands of years. Perhaps thirty generations of Maynooth people have lived here since the 12th or 13th century when the village had its humble origins. Its history from then until the 19th century is dominated by powerful families, principally the Fitzgeralds, while little is known of the ordinary lives of the local people who worked as labourers, servants, blacksmiths and cattle drovers. Some of the articles in this issue for the Newsletter attempt to throw some light on that 'hidden Maynooth' by recalling the lives of some of the local people who worked in St. Patrick's College in the early years and by recounting some of the folklore associated with the village. As we move into the 21st century the links with our own community become more tangible. An article listing out all the family names, street by street, in Maynooth in 1911 will no doubt stir some memories for our older residents. The photograph on the front cover, taken in the early years of the last century, portrays a quieter, more peaceful Maynooth than what we have become used to in more recent years. Maynooth

G.A.A. and St. Mary's Band are enduring 'institutions' in the town and a number of articles reflect the active part they have played in the life of our community.

In the last thirty years Maynooth has undergone more dramatic changes than in the previous seven hundred years from a quiet village to a bustling university / commuter town. But the faster we grow the more important it is that we recognise and value our community's past. A community with roots and an appreciation of its heritage is much more likely to be a success. The recent enhancement of Main Street and the future development of the Castle certainly promote the physical heritage. And the recently formed local history group is also to be complimented on the various projects on which they have been engaged. On the other hand local voluntary groups in the town complain of growing apathy and falling participation. Looking to the future, without the active involvement of both long established 'locals' and newer residents in the community life of our town those bonds of neighbourhood and place which has sustained Maynooth through the centuries will fade. One hopes that in this new century the people of Maynooth can enjoy some of the qualities that characterised Maynooth in the past - good neighbours, friendship, a sense of belonging - combined with a material prosperity which many who lived here before us could only dream of.

MILLENNIUM 2000 - THE YEAR OF GREAT JUBILEE

I would like to thank the Maynooth Newsletter for their kindness in inviting me to share some thoughts at the beginning of the Third Millennium, 2000 AD - the Year of Great Jubilee.

In May 1998 there was a G8 meeting in Birmingham, England, where the leaders of the eight richest nations discussed world finances. Outside and around the building, 100,000 Christians joined hands and asked these leaders to cancel or at least seriously reduce the international debts of poorer countries. To give an example: Ethopia spends 50% of its national ncome repaying its international debt. In that country 64% of the people are illiterate, 54% are without any health care, 75% without access to safe water and 600,000 babies die within their first year. And all this is still happenings in 1999! These people were making the point that the issue was not simply economical but had serious ethical implications. Indeed the Pope's recent meeting with Bono again focused on this very appeal.

What many may not realise is that such an appeal is deeply rooted in the very idea of Jubilee which had its roots in Judaism. For the Jews, the number seven was particularly significant to them. In their Creation stories, had not God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh - the Sabbath? (cf. Gn. 2:3) Every seventh year was a sabbatical year when "the land would be rested" (Lv. 25:4). Even more significantly, every seven weeks of years (i.e. 7x7 or 49 years) was followed by a 50th or Jubilee Year, when they were instructed to "let the land lie fallow, that is, you shall practice Sabbath: you shall forgive debts, letting forgiveness in; you shall free captives and proclaim liberty; you shall find out what belongs to another and give it back; you shall hold a great feast; learning to sing the canticle "Jubilate" (cf. Lev 25:8-19)". This thinking reflected their deep conviction that the land is God's and therefore given for the benefit of the whole community, for the good of all. Moreover, their Jubilee Year was a time for "tikkun olam", for making a fresh start for restoring and repairing the world. Debts were cancelled, slaves set free and those driven off the land by poverty had a chance to return home. It was a Year of Grace - a Year of God's Favour. It was ushered in by the blowing of a ram's horn - a Jobel - the origin of our word Jubilee.

For Christians celebrating this Jubilee Year, we recall that approximately 2000 years ago, God in Jesus Christ newly entered our world. When he first began to preach at the synagogue in Nazareth, his message was replete with Jubilee themes: "He has sent me to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's Year of Favour" (Lk. 4:18). It was a message that met with opposition. Indeed it was so powerful that his hearers wished to kill him that very day! (cf. Lk: 4:29)

It is again JUBILEE time, a time for celebration, and for reflection on our past, present and future. Pope John Paul II sees the Jubilee Year 2000 as a 'SPRINGTIME' for great social change. He identified many 'seeds of hope' in the scientific, technological and medical progress being made, means whereby our world can be repaired and restored. He recognises that ecologically and environmentally there is a far greater awareness today of Creation as God's 'gift' - a gift which we must protect and nurture rather than destroy. Similarly, with the commitment and struggle for justice and peace, for reconciliation among communities, so particularly noticeable in our own land in recent years and months, he acknowledged the impulse of the Holy Spirit. And on a wider scale, the movement towards Christian Unity and towards genuine dialogue with all religions and none, give him and indeed all of us further grounds for hope and optimism. All these seeds augur well for the new Millennium and help reassure us that the Holy Spirit is powerfully active in our world.

Individually, for each one of us it is also a time for celebration and for reflection on our past, present and future. As with any Golden (50th) Anniversary, it is an occasion when past events are recalled, friends again gather, old ties restored and hopefully, old wounds healed. May it be for each one of us such a time of healing, of restoration and of repair.

My prayer for you at this time is that wonderful ancient Jewish blessing: "May the Lord bless you and keep you; may He let his face shine upon you; and may He fill you with his peace".

When the farmer saw his sheep come together on the commons and look for shelter under the trees, the dew stay on the ground or a heavy coat of frost he knew that it was time for him to make sure that his shelter was secure and that he had plenty of turf in against the miserable weather that was coming. The moon and sun governed their days and seasons. If St. Swithin's Day was wet it would be wet for forty days afterwards. "The north wind doth blow and we shall have

free as long as these debts remain. Sadly those who took out these loans were often military dictators who spent the money on arms to suppress their own people. Even after the dictators are gone, their people are still oppressed by this legacy of debt. That is why all the main Christian churches have called for this calendar change to be marked as a year of Jubilee. This idea from the Old Testament calls for a time when the slate is wiped clean and debts struck off in order to give people a fresh start. The Churches have called on western governments and financial institutions to meet this challenge in a creative manner.

A newspaper article earlier in the year on the topic of Millennium babies asked an important question. Its headline read "what will their future be?" In reality it said that the real millennium baby will probably be born in a part of the world where there is no clock to record the time of its birth and it may not even live long enough to be given a name. This fact is a challenge to all people of differing religions and none to make the world a more equal place for all its citizens.

May I take this opportunity to wish all the readers of the "Maynooth Newsletter" a happy and hope filled New Year.



ST. MARY'S BOYS SCHOOL MAYNOOTH

How things have changed over the years.

in the 1960s, Maynooth was a Secondary School. Mr. Frank Walsh initiated the Secondary cycle in the early sixties due to ack of secondary schools in the area. It was one of the first schools in Ireland to prepare pupils for Leaving Certificate. This came to fruition in 1965 when the first class sat their Leaving Certificate.

Mr. Walsh was ably assisted by Pearse O'Connell, Des Kearns and Pat O'Connor who joined the staff in 1966 Mr. Joe McBride joined in 1967.

Mr. Walsh taught five secondary classes with the assistance of primary teachers who helped out in Latin, Science and History. There were four main classrooms in the old wing of the present school.

The modern Physical Education hall was divided into classrooms as was the present staff room.

Free education was introduced by the Minister for Education, Donough O'Malley in 1969.

Maynooth was one of the first towns to have a secondary school. The new school was opened in 1971 with Mr. T. Ashe at the helm. Mr. Walsh retired, Mr. P. O'Connell became Principal of the primary school, now reverting to

normal primary school. Mr. Pat O'Connor became the Vice Principal.

In the early seventies infants and first class enrolled in the Boys' School. Numbers increased dramatically as new development and urbanisation took place.


The new wing was built in 1975. Mr. O'Connell became an administrative principal in 1976. The same year history was made as Ms. M. Morressy joined the staff as the first female Teacher. She later returned to her native Tipperary and Ms. Keenan and Ms. Leahy both took up their appointments in January 1977. Mr. O'Connell remained until his retirement in 1996. Mr. Peter Mullan is now Principal of the sixteen teacher school.

The priests of that time were Fr.O'Riordan, Fr. Duffy, Fr. O'Higgins, Fr. Walsh, Fr. Supple and Fr. Cogan, all now deceased.

From the mid sixties Mr.O'Brien, Mr. Meehan, Mr. Collins and Mr. McGrath joined as full-time secondary staff - as the school expanded.

By 1970 there were five teachers in the secondary section.

MAYNOOTH FOLKLORE

In the late 1930s the Irish Folklore Commission undertook a huge project which involved recording local customs, history, cures and ghost stories from children in schools right across the country. The Presentation Convent in Maynooth participated in the project and the notebook used to record the folklore of Maynooth can be viewed in the Folklore Department in UCD. The children were supervised by Sister M. Borgia. In many cases the names of the adults from whom the stories originated are recorded. Below are some extracts from this notebook.

The Fairies

In Tagado, about two miles from here, and near the Maynooth - Naas road, stands an ancient building like a tower. This old ruin is supposed to have been built by the fairies. During the time of its erection a turf man who happened to be passing one night saluted the fairies, saying, "God bless the work". The fairies answered him, uttering blasphemy and so the building was never completed.

At a certain time of the year music of the fairies can be heard near Crewhill, this is also supposed to be a lucky omen. Crewhill, a favourite haunt of fairies, is situated on the Moyglare Road about three quarters of a mile from the town of Maynooth. The narrator of this, herself heard the fairy music on one occasion.



On New Years Day a yew tree was planted in the Church grounds.






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MAYNOOTH LOCAL HISTORY

laynooth or Magh Nuadh, the plain of Nuadha is named fter Nuadha of the silver arm, one of the Kings of the hythical Tuatha de Danann who led his people into Ireland, ut was later disgualified from kingship because of the blemish' of his silver arm. In ancient times it was situated on ne of the great roads to Tara, the Slighe Mor. Irchaeological evidence tells us that humankind has been asssing through this landscape for thousands of years. But hey not only passed through, they also settled. Recent xcavations which have taken place at the present Geraldine astle site have unearthed evidence of a neo-lithic 3000 - 1500 BC] house with postholes.

When Christianity came to Ireland, because of the rural hature of Irish society, a monastic way of life developed and hurch sites still remain at Laraghbryan, Donaghmore and Taghadoe. Laithreach Mor - where it is believed St. Patrick visited on his travels throughout the country and Taghadoe -Teach Tua or the house of the O'Tooles. Over the vears the monasteries became centres of wealth and power and were taken over by the privilaged classes, with offices often being passed on from father to son. However at the beginning of the second millennium the movement for reform and reorganisation came from within the Irish church.

Before the necessary reforms could take place two events came together which in turn affected not only Ireland and the Irish church but also Maynooth. The Anglo-Norman Prince, Henry II came to the throne of England and an English Pope. Adrian IV was appointed in Rome. It is said that the Pope was genuinely concerned with the condition of the Irish church and subsequently papal overlordship of Ireland was proclaimed and Henry II was authorised to enter Ireland.

Maurice Fitzgerald, who later became Lord of Maynooth arrived in Ireland in 1170 to assist King Henry in gaining a foothold in the country. And as history shows, they succeeded. The Fitzgeralds, also known as the Geraldines, originally came from Florence in Italy. There is on record a letter dated 27th May 1507, written by Gerald, eighth Earl of Kildare, to the Gherardini of Florence, acknowledging them as relations.

But of course, the invaders did not come to an empty land. The present Co. Kildare is said to have been formed out of three native territories and a portion of a fourth, with each of the areas belonging to a particular sept. Each sept would have contained a number of families and their retainers, all of whom would have had blood relationships with the head family from which the chief was chosen. During this period Maynooth was part of the Ui Faelain kingdom, belonging to the descendants of Faelain - the O'Tooles and the O'Byrnes.

It is difficult to know how people lived at the time, but according to one record, of the territory belonging to a sept, 'part was used as common tillage, meadow, forest, or grazing land, part was occupied by raths and dwellings, part was reserved for the use of the chief, and part was held temporally by the heads of families'.

With the coming of the Normans, two cultures, two ideologies and two ways of life clashed. Whereas the native Irish measured wealth in terms of cattle, the Normans measured wealth in terms of land and they were land hungry. Secondly,

while the native Irish elected their leaders from the sept, the Normans believed in the primacy of primogeniture inheritence moving from father to eldest son. By 1210 Kildare had became one of the seven counties of Leinster created by King John of England.

From the middle ages to modern times, the political and religious history of Maynooth have been bound up with the Fitzgeralds family and the foundation in 1795 of the Roval College, present day NUI Maynooth, and both have been well documented. While political upheavals took place on a regular basis throughout the centuries, with the Fitzgeralds gradually supplanting the O'Byrne's and the O'Tooles, it was not until the Protestant Reformation took place in the early 16th century that religious upheaval took place.

The Fitzgerald family survived because they were on the whole, politically astute, and throughout the years realised, like O'Byrnes and the O'Tooles, that during times of upheaval, survival depended of the ability to adapt to changing circumstances and this they did. Secondly, the Fitzgeralds were also lucky in that in each generation they succeeded in producing a male heir.

In the long run, the Protestant Reformation was also responsible for the foundation of Maynooth College. During the penal times when parents were forbidden by law to provide a Catholic education for their children, those who could afford to do so sent them abroad. By the late 18th century however, when revolutionary Europe was questioning the divine right of kings to rule, the government of the day thought it more shrewd to educate young priests in Ireland where they were less likely to be influenced by new ideologies.

Almost a thousand years have passed since the Fitzgeralds first set foot in Ireland. To-day, Maynooth has become a busy thriving university town. On reflection at the start of the third millennium, a connection can still be found between the mythical world of Nuadha and his silver arm, the Tuatha de Danann, Gerald, the eleventh earl of Kildare and NUIM. Firstly, the Irish name 'Magh Nuadh' with its relevance to Nuadha and his silver arm has survived throughout the millennia. Also, according to tradition, the Tuatha de Dannan, who are said to have beauty and agelessness and to be proficient in every art, now reside as fairies in the various raths and mounds which surround our countryside. Secondly, according to another legend, Gerald Fitzgerald, who became known as the 'Fairy Earl' or the 'Wizard Earl', because of his interest in astronomy, medicine, alchemy and philosophy, now sleeps in the rath of Mullaghmast. It is said that he emerges every seven years riding a horse shod with silver shoes. Finally, NUIM, with its many faculties, is at present through its Science Department making a significant contribution to the exploration of outer space. The journey continues.

THE YEARS IN MAYNOOTH 1930 - 1960

In the Thirties the village and residents had some similarities with the town of 1999.

Tower, I.O.C. and G.S.R. buses served the village. Boys and girls travelled to secondary schools and men and women travelled to their employment in Dublin. Then as now the G.S.W. Railway served Maynooth en-route to and from Galway, Westport and Sligo. The Dublin terminus was Broadstone at the top of Dominic Street, a five minute walk to O'Connell Street.

Horse drawn canal barges regularly traversed the Royal Canal. Hour old morning and evening newspapers were carried on the G.S.R. buses, which in their latest news panel, usually carried the result of the 4.30 race at some track or other to be read at 5.45 on arrival at Geraghtys or Caulfield shops fresh off the Longford bus. A far cry of the evening paper of today, arriving shortly after three o'clock. Morning papers would carry a report of a boxing match in New York at 3.00 a.m. complete with radio pictures.

Education in the Convent and Boys School was top class. Alas for the scholars, particularly the girls, as the many sisters and small classes of ten or twelve pupils, meant personal and uncomfortable attention to everyone.

Despite the U.S. and British depression, there was little unemployment but wages were low. Chief employers were the College, Carton Farms, Convent Laundry, Kavanaghs Mills, Dawsons shops and many flourishing trades people.

Entertainment consisted of ceilis, dances and films in Nolans Hall, occasionally supplemented by a film show for charity in the Convent, which also operated a lending library every Sunday morning. Variety concerts organised by the band usually held on Easter and Whit Sunday nights Carricford and Daniells Travelling shows, indeed Stephen Brennan and Robert Carricford went to school in the town. Radio reception for 2RN Athlone and 2LO London plus short wave stations.

Electricity from the E.S.B. arrived in the early thirties, taking over from D.C. supplies to some houses and public lights from the College, Dawsons and Tom Carrs. Water supplies were from hand pumps on wells in The Square, Dublin, Straffan, Movulare and Newtown Roads and other locations in the village. Some houses in the Main Street had wells and pumps in their back gardens. Many a tanner was earned by school boys pumping water into overhead tanks each day after school. Mail was delivered every morning by four postmen on their bicycles around the village and outlying areas. Mail was collected at the Moyglare cross-roads box every evening at 4.30 p.m. Fresh milk was delivered daily by three local dairies. Many residents had their own cows in the many paddocks either side of the Dublin Road.

Recreation and sports consisted of the G.A.A. long established, rugby, cricket and tennis in the North Kildare Club. Fishing on the Rye Water and Canal. Tennis was later available in Leinster Street, now the Health Centre. Snooker, billiards and table tennis later in the thirties at the C.Y.M.S. club now the Geraldine Hall. Boxing in the Old School in the late 40's. Music at the Bank Hall now the I.C.A. Swimming at the Canal sand banks, Black Lane and College, Jackson and Bond Bridges. Popular walks, Celbridge, Straffan, Rathcoffey, and Kilcock Roads. The four mile circuit Moyglare Road, Moygaddy, Dunboyne Road ever popular but more dangerous today. Carton Avenue, Lovers Lane, now known as the Mont Lane and atrocious to walk. Circuit was

very popular in Spring and Summer evenings. Pre war Carton Demesne was open to the public on Sundays. Greyhound racing and coursing had many followers. Breeders, trainers and competitors apart from the local farmers, most of the greyhound fans dwelt in the eastern end of the village. The Square then as now had its traffic jams. Easter Monday punters from the south enroute to Fairyhouse, Cunningham Cup Day at Puncherstown, days at Naas and the Currach with punters from the North. In the late thirties, early forties D.U.T.C. Dublin United Transport Company superceded the I.O.C. and with war clouds gathering over Europe, many accepted routines changed. In September 1939 the greatest of all Carnivals was held in

the Convent Grounds, now the site of the Girls School. The theme song of that carnival was, Vera Lynns rendering of "Its a lovely day tomorrow". The last night of the event a Gala

)ance was held, where many of our youth said goodbye and ome were never to return, as they left for England to work ind later serve in the allied forces.

the Army occupied Carton House and consequently the tates closed on the public access for the last time, never again to open on a full-time basis. Everyday life continued on lower key. Coal became scarce, so a Parish Council was set up and plots or the bog were cut for turf. Allotments were nade available to landless and Gorderlery residents at Kilcock Road, present day car park and Pebble Hill. Entertainment such as dances, ceili, concerts, film shows every Saturday and travelling shows in Nolan Hall. Band. L.D.F. and L.S.F. marches on St. Patrick's Day, plus the regular Band Parades.

Children, boys and girls alike took to the whipping top craze each spring, many becoming experts of endurance i.e. keeping the top going non stop, another pastime was wheeling hoops.

Arising from the latter, an enterprising young schoolboy obtained many used car and bus tyres and formed a make believe bus service, each tyre correctly branded with its number and destination. Every afternoon boys could be seen rolling these tyres to various points around the village, the most popular route was Aston Quay - Maynooth i.e. a stream at Manor Court to Castle View opposite the Garda Barracks. The most unpopular one was Cork route, i.e. Twomeys gate on the Crinstown Road.

All this activity amongst the coming and going of turf trucks ferrying turf to the Phoenix Park and the Tuesday cattle drives to the Market for the North Circular Road with never an accident.

For the curious yes the boys were paid a 1d a week on condition that they attend a film show at the cost of 1d every Friday night at entrepreneur home. Needless to say the film show came first. The entrepreneur, a very successful business man retired in England.

However all was not sunny as the war wore on, brown envelopes bearing the crown, revealed we regret to inform you - missing or killed in action to some homes including this scribe however many thankfully were premature with happy endings, others were not so lucky.

The hostilities ended, but the village never returned to pre war status. Right enough the men gathered at their usual corners. There were five along the Main Street, and others at a one time shop on whose big step they listened intently to the residents revelations of down country places he had visited during his travels that day.

Seven-a-side football competitions were a regular summer game. Daniels film shows ceased, and later the Convent Laundry was converted each weekend and continued until the advent of T.V.

As the Forties passed into the Fifties people became more insular. A lot of the innocence of the Thirties was gone forever. But some of the good things carried on via the wit of certain brothers. One who on boarding the double decker at the old Kiernans shop, particularly on a wet dreary Mondav morning, hat on the side of his head. Woodbine smoking on his lips, would greet everybody with, "good morning master", and proceed to tell funny yarns and stories which would raise a laugh out of everyone and have the bus in uproar before reaching Leixlip.

The highlights of the twenty-five years 1930 - 1955 must be: The Eucharistic Congress 1932 Donal U Bucalla - Governor General Mains water supply - 1947 British Prime Minister - Clem Atbe journey through Maynooth to the West. Hundreds lined the street - 1949. Michael Nolan winning the Irish Billiards Championship -1953.

Characters, a very witty painter, who with a comic story and wit, brightened the gloomiest of mornings on the first bus out of time. A retired butcher, who could turn a story of a five minute walk from the College to the Main Street into an hour long saga, not missing a single action or confrontation on that stroll. Unlike the seanachi his tale was factual. Another gentleman would outshine Jimmy Magee with his revelations and expertise on every sport, world wide. Ever rich in talent in business, entertainment, trades and sport. Many local people reached the pinnacle of success world wide, Britain, Australia, U.S.A. and South Africa. Indeed five participated in the Boer War and returned and lived into the late 50's. Others had success on the stage and music.

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ARCHBISHOP DANIEL MANNIX

A short biography of Archbishop Daniel Mannix President of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth 1903-1912

Daniel Mannix was born on the 4th March 1864 in Charleville, Do, Cork. He studied at St. Patrick's College Mavnooth where he was ordained priest in 1890. He taught Philosophy here in 1891 and Theology in 1894. From 1903-1912 he served as president of the College. He was consecrated itular archbishop of Pharsalus in 1912, arrived in Melbourne n the following year as coadjutor archbishop and became Archbishop of Melbourne in 1917.

He was the first bishop to be consecrated in the College Chapel. The ceremony was conducted by Cardinal Logue.

He was vice-president of St.Patrick's College for only one month when there was the Royal visit of Edward II and Queen Alexandra on 24 July 1903. He was the organiser of he event and saw the visit as a substantial benefit to the College. Similarly in 1911 the visit by George V and Queen Mary drew major attention to the College. Eight hundred guests were invited to join the welcoming party. The Royal party was shown the chapel where the organist played 'God save the King'. From there they went to the Library and signed the visitors' book. The Artane Band played just before the party left.

While Mannix was President he tended to adhere to the policies of the Catholic hierarchy in Ireland and tended to support the government of the day. His importance in Irish politics was greater after he left Ireland.

Mannix was one of Australia's leading political figures. From Australia he supported the 1916 rebellion. His campaign on behalf of Irish Independence caused the British Government


to prevent him from coming to Ireland. He finally visited Ireland in 1925 and publicly supported Earnon de Valera's republicanism which was a major cause of its success.

Through his educational policy he contributed to the integration of Irish Catholics in Australian society. He built schools, parishes, hospitals, convents and seminaries. He was leader of the anti-conscription movement of World War One and encouraged Catholics to support the trade union movement and the Labour Party as a means of applying Catholic social principles. After World War II Mannix sought to stop Communist infiltration of the Australian trade unions. He played a controversial part in the dissensions within the Australian Labour Party. Many Catholics left this party to form the Democratic Labour Party, a strong anti communist body and one of the many Catholic 'political' groups to emerge in the Australian political scene and one which Mannix supported.

Archbishop Mannix died on 6 November 1963 at almost 100 vears of age. About 200,000 people paid their respects. He had opened 150 new schools in his Archdiocese. 24 hospitals and charitable institutions and 87 new parishes. He left little worldly wealth. His assets amounted to £155- two gold watches and a mantel clock which he left to the Archbishop of Melbourne. By the end of his life Mannix had achieved his goal - discrimination against Australian Catholics was a thing of the past.

SERVANTS, LABOURERS AND TRADESMEN OF ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE MAYNOOTH, 1911

This piece is the edited result of a more detailed project that was completed in 1996. It is particularly appropriate for the millennium issue of the Newsletter because it looks back to the beginning of the 20th century Maynooth and because it highlights links between the St. Patrick's College and the wider community of Maynooth.

St. Patrick's College was established by an Act of the Irish Parliament in 1795 through representations of the Irish Hierarchy. In 1869 it was established as a Pontifical University and it has been recognised as a College of the National University of Ireland since 1910. Now it comprises three institutions, the National University of Ireland, Maynooth, the pontifical University and the Seminary of St. Patrick's College.

In addition to Stovte House, built at the end of the eighteenth century, new buildings were added over the years - St. Joseph's Square was completed on three sides by 1839. Logic House and Rhetoric House were built in the 1830s. A grant was received to permit the building of St. Mary's Square in 1845. The College Chapel and Spire were completed by 1902. The living quarters comprised seminarians' rooms, servants' rooms, kitchens, pantries, senior and junior refectories. In 1911 there were 551 seminarians present. Seven Sisters of Charity looked after the infirmary, kitchens and pantries.

The census return shows that there were game fields, ball alleys, and a swimming pool, fourteen stables, coach-house, harness room, calf-house, twelve cow-houses, eleven piggeries, boiling house, two barns, one turf house, one potato house, two workshops, three sheds, two stores and one laundry.

There were sixty-eight servants in St. Patrick's College at this time, sixty-five of whom 'lived in'. There were twenty-seven labourers and eleven tradesmen employed by the College and all except one came from Maynooth itself or within a half mile of it. Three female labourers worked in the vegetable garden on a seasonal basis. A female servant was also employed to clean the new College Chapel.

All 'live-in' college servants were male, single and Roman Catholic. Two higher servants, the cook and butler, lived in Leinster Street and Main Street respectively. The birthplace

of the college servants shows that they came mainly from Meath, Kildare and the City of Dublin. This is also the pattern for those servants who had left the College in that year. The policy of recruiting non-local labour was in keeping with the pattern of servant recruitment in general - for example 39% of country houses had no local labour and a further 35% only had one local person. Recruitment was by word of mouth mainly, but references would have been required. The majority of the servants in Maynooth College were under thirty years of age. There was a high turnover of servant staff in the College - seventeen had left the College between May and September 1911 (these were replaced along with twelve extra). The frequency of changing their job was a commonplace occurrence for servants in Ireland.

The Census Report for 1911 show a population for the town of 886 (435 males and 451 females). This was a decrease on the 1901 figure of 948. There was a reduction in the number of houses from 227 to 207. Horner (1995) states that 'the early twentieth century stimuli that sustained the town over much of the previous century were weakened'. College building work was completed. Carton Estate owned by the Duke of Leinster was in decline. Dawson's shop was expanded and became a general store but most of its staff three assistants, two apprentices, two domestic servants did not come from Co. Kildare. The manager Thomas McGloin came from Co. Donegal. Other employment would have come from Maynooth Manor Mills, Laundry (established in 1887) and local farmers (Horner, 1995).

The occupations of servants within the College, classed in terms of 'professor's servant', '1st delfman', 5th kitchen boy' and 'corridor servant' reinforced boundaries and a hierarchical structure. The rates of pay for servants were comparable to the national average. A general servant was paid £9 - £20 per year, this range is reflected in the wage range for servants within the college, the lowest pay being £2.10.0 per quarter up to £5.4.0 per quarter. The average wage for a 'superior' cook was £30 - £40 per year between 1910-20. The College cook (non live-in) was paid £50 in 1911. The characteristics of servant employment in the college reflected those of general servants in country houses in rates of pay, frequency of change of employment, occupational hierarchy and recruitment practices.

SERVANTS, LABOURERS AND TRADESMEN OF ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE MAYNOOTH, 1911

Dutdoor work was done by twenty-eight labourers and eleven radesmen. Almost all labourers employed by the College did Igricultural work. Some worked in the garden. The Irish arm labourer might expect to earn 10s 9d weekly which was nuch less than in England and 'absurdly less than his elatives employed in foreign cities' (Fitzpatrick, 1980). _abourers in Maynooth College were paid 6/- to 30/- per week. The majority were paid 2/- per day for 6/7 days.

Four labourers had no children in 1911, eight had or were part of families where members were working and could supplement family income. Eight labourers had young amilies (averaging three children), the remainder did not appear on census entries, but oral sources confirmed that hey lived in the locality. Three female labourers were paid 1/- per day for a six day working week. The female servant for the New College Chapel was paid £3.5.0 per quarter. Most labourers lived in second class housing and none lived on the Main Street

Eleven tradesmen were employed, ten of whom lived in the iown. The other, an electrical engineer came from Warwickshire in England and was resident in the College. Four tradesmen lived on the Main Street. The remainder came from Backlane, Dublin Road, Parson's Street and Moyglare.

With labourers there was confusion when defining occupations. There were 'conceptual and linguistic problems associated with separating agricultural classes in Ireland' and that one of the major problems was the 'widespread habit of returning themselves or their dependants as 'labourers' or 'servant'. An example of this is seen when John Kenny 'painter' (in College tradesmen book) is described as a 'general labourer' in the census returns. Also some tradesmen were paid at the labourer rate.

There was no evidence of turnover of staff amongst labourers and tradesmen, mainly because work was close at hand and hours were set, and the College provided the security of longterm structured employment at a time when there was a lack of employment diversity in the town.



To give is such a selfless act Not counting cost, takes "moral fibre" But the enrichment of a generous heart Will out-live that "Celtic Tiger"



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CHRISTMAS - TIMES PAST MAYNOOTH IN THE WAR YEARS

On reflection pre war Christmas heralded the end of a era, which was followed by a gloomy five wartime years, followed by the first changes which ushered in the hope and expectations in the post War years.

Indeed Maynooth like many other rural villages would never return to those heady years.

Some of our young and not so young men and women left the village and environs, in the hope that they would make a vital contribution, towards making the world a better place and to rid Europe of Nazi tyranny, some never returned.

My recollections of those Christmass were, of the days preceding, of the numerous pony and traps, cars and other vehicles lining the Main and Leinster Streets. Hoards on the street and in local taverns, the customers in Dawsons. The final purchases for which to celebrate the feast day.

Dawsons, was a grocery and hardware store with a garage and showrooms and were agents for motor cars, tractors etc. Hence the influx of customers not only local but from the surrounding counties. Other shops catering for all needs were Weafers, O'Neills and Haughton Butcher Shops, J.C.'s Barber Shop, a popular venue for the men.

Two shops stand out in my memory. Caulfields, owned one adjoining the Post Office, recently demolished by A.I.B. The other 'Joes' now the Irish Permanent.

The decoration and toy displays vied with larger stores in the city. In those days there was an ample supply of Japanese clockwork metal toys, cars, trucks and war vehicles, for boys. Girls had a choice of many dolls made from different materials. Golliwogs and teddy bears were in great demand. A great demand for 'Kris Kringle'. Bicycles were available from Buckleys or Dawsons.

I can still visualise the display windows of these shops, cotton buds stuck to the inside of the glass simulating snow. Frost and snow were not uncommon at Christmas time those days. Traditional fare was available in M.P. O'Briens, Dawsons, Kiernans, Buckleys and Connollys.

Christmas trees were not as popular then. Holly was the favourite and abundant in the hedgerows, now defunct just outside the village. The annual ritual of the 'divvy' from the Mortality Society swelled many a purse in those days.

Christmas Eve, businesses closed for two days, people were attracted to the village. St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band played carols in The Square, as residents walked to Midnight Mass in the Parish Church and others going to St. Mary's, Parson Street.

Christmas Day, the only movement to be observed was people going to or coming from Church services, except the annual parade of the Band after 11.30 Mass to Carton Avenue. St. Stephen's Day and the arrival of the 'Wren Boys' in multi coloured costumes, awakened the village. The day was normally quiet, culminating with the annual dance in Nolans Hall now Noones Mall, dancing 9.00 p.m. - 3.00 a.m.

Despite the limited conditions, the shops continued the traditions and decorative windows, snow and frost added to the atmosphere. The former imports of foreign toys were replaced by Irish made dolls for girls and a spate of wooden trucks for boys. Turf lorries were the most popular being made of timber were much larger and could carry five sod.

propulsion via a long cord fastened to the front swivelling axle and towed by a very happy boy.

The Band continued with the normal Christmas performance. Midnight Mass was discontinued.

The arrival of the new Principal of the Boys School heralded the birth of St. Mary's Parish Choir, a four part choir of boys, girls, men and women. Carol singing on the streets added much to alleviate the mid winter war time gloom.

The war over. Christmas in Maynooth moved up a gear. The advent of rural electrification, to the hinterland. The boys and girls home from the hostilities, normality returned. The shop windows carried on the traditional decorations. Sales of Christmas trees increased each year. Santa Claus brought larger and more varied gifts to the children. The most popular gift to the women were nylon stockings.

The choir continued with carol singing extending to performances in local villages and Navan, Naas, Drogheda and Edenderry, culminating in being invited by Radio Eireann to broadcast five times from 1946 to 1949 - guite a feat.

Our emigrants now domiciled abroad always came back for Christmas. On one occasion a Galway man whose family lived in Maynooth gave an hour long rendering on the number 66 bus from Dublin of "If I was in Cladda I walk on the pier". Many passengers wished he had walked off the pier, he had been imbibing in O'Meara's awaiting the bus.

The season extended to the New Year. On New Years Eve the band played in The Square, the choir sang carols and there would be a New Years Dance in Nolans Hall.

Snow was regular at Christmas in the 40's, on one occasion the canal froze solid, some skated on the ice and a dare-devil drove his Fiat 500 from the towns bridge to the harbour on the ice, "Hit the Ice" was the top film of that Yule tide.

MAYNOOTH IN THE EARLY TO MID NINETEEN THIRTIES

There are readers, I am sure, who will well remember the following accounts of happenings in this community in the early to mid nineteen thirties. There are no doubt stories behind all of these events which should be told, because I believe, this knowledge would enable younger generations to form a greater understanding (along with some pride), in how our town has developed up to now.

The events and information given below have been gleaned from the minutes of St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band Committee Meetings covering the period October 1933 to November 1936.

It is the onus of all organisations to fund raise in order to continue in existence and provide their services to the community and it is in this regard that we can begin to form a picture of the social side of how Maynooth people enjoyed their leisure time the nineteen thirties.

Dances in Leinster Hall were very popular which, at times, incorporated "Old Time Waltz" competitions. The entrance fee for the dance on St.Stephens Night in 1933 was one and threepence including tax with dancing from 10pm to 3am.

Other forms of entertainment in the hall included the staging of concerts, plays, pantomines and sketches. The "Eleguent Dempsey" was performed on the first Sunday of December 1022


Card playing was another popular feature of the times and numerous card drives were organised during the Winter months. A drive, held in the Band Hall on 1st December 1935, had 77 players in attendance at a cost of one shilling per card.

The band provided much entertainment for the people of the town through their many recitals in the square and their performances at processions. One such event was when the Band led the first Papal Nuncio to visit Maynooth College in 1933.

Among other occasions were the Bands attendance at the official openings of Maynooth Lawn Tennis seasons and the opening of the C.Y.M.S. New Hall on the last Sunday of February 1936. The Band also provided their services at various sporting occasions of the time. I wonder if anyone can remember them marching to the tunes of "The Foggy Due" and "Teddy O'Neill" in Croke Park on 19th July 1936?

How many Maynooth people would have travelled up the avenue to see the band performing at the annual Carton Fete organised by Lady Nesta Fitzgerald? After a performance on 11th June 1936 the committee received the following correspondence:






Carton Maynooth June 12th

SOME RECIPES FROM THE OLDEN DAYS

When we are tired of all the turkey and plum pudding we could try some of the recipes that were used by our grandparents and by their grandparents. How about some boxty, cally or flummery. They are all low in fat and in calories. Potato cakes and brothan are the ideal food for the cold winter evenings after a hard day at the Christmas and New Year sales.

Recipe for Flummery: Oatmeal Water

Mix oatmeal and water in a large bowl. Leave for twelve hours. Pour off the liquid. Cover with plenty of fresh water. Leave for twelve hours. Pour off the liquid. Cook until it boils and thickens. Pour into dishes. Leave to cool. When cold put on plates. Traditionally flummery was served with honey, sugar or jam as a dessert or supper dish. It was sometimes accompanied by a glass of cider or beer.

Recipe for Brothan:

•
500 grams winter vegetables
100 grams oatmeal
Litre water or milk and water
500 grams bacon (optional)
Knob of butter
Pinch of seasoning
Simmer for one hour.

Traditionally brothan was eaten with a dish of potatoes when milk was scarce. The bacon was eaten at another dinner time. Nettles were used if vegetables were scarce.

Recipe for Apple Jelly:	1.5Kg. Cooking app	les (crab
	apples or windfalls)	
	Sugar 1.5L.Water	12 Cloves.

Wash and chop the apples. Low simmer until soft. Strain off liquid. Add 750 grms. sugar to each litre of liquid. Boil mixture until sugar dissolves and liquid gels when a spoonful is tested on a cold saucer. Allow the jelly to cool. Pot in clean dry jam jars and seal while still warm.

Farm House Scones:	500 grams flour baking powder 1 egg, pinch salt, sugar
	250 grams butter
	Milk preferably fresh home made
	butter milk.

Cooking time: 15-20 minutes in a pre heated hot oven. Sieve the flour, baking powder and salt. Rub in the butter. Beat the egg and milk together. Add the sugar, then the egg and milk to form a loose dough. Knead lightly. Flatten out to about half an inch thick. Cut in circles. Bake at the top of the oven.

They are delicious with home made butter and apple jelly for afternoon tea.



Peel, boil and mash potatoes. Chop scallions. Cook them lightly in the milk. Then mix with mashed potatoes. Serve hot with a knob of butter in the middle of each plateful. Traditionally the potatoes were cooked in a big pot over the open fire in the kitchen. Each house had a twenty inch long plank of wood called the "pounder". The potatoes were mashed with the pounder. It was a childs treat to be allowed to scrape the pounder and eat the scrapings.



MAYNOOTH G.A.A. CLUB

Founded 1876. One of the oldest clubs in the country. The club helped to found the Association in the country and have been there ever since. They captured the senior title in 1913. Since then they have made a lot of attempts to stop in senior ranks but without success. They have won the Intermediate final on five occasions. They have also shone at hurling and won their first titles at the turn of the century. Their black jerseys with white sash commemorate a great Gael.! Thomas Cullen, killed while playing for them in 1889. In 1966 they officially opened their new club grounds and their new social centre in early 1995.

Most prominent players who have served our club and country well include: Josie Murphy, Peter Delaney, Jim Nolan, Tom Nolan, Tim Twomey, Dan Buckley, Eddie Dunne, Fred Leavy, Brendan Edwards, Liam Farrelly, Joe Nevin, Eddie Kavanagh.

In 1990 a committee was set up to promote hurling in their club. This has shown to this day as they are fielding teams in all grades, and in 1992 they won an under-sixteen hurling league and in 1993 won a minor 'B' hurling championship, so the future looks good for the hurlers.

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MAYNOOTH'S GREAT VICTORY REPORT OF LEINSTER CUP FINAL 1936 SATURDAY 4TH DECEMBER 1937 SCENES OF ENTHUSIASM

"Maynooth is the last team in the world that I expected to be handing the 'Leader' Cup to." So declared Mr. T. Lawlor, Chairman of the Co. Kildare Board of the G.A.A., in Naas on Sunday after Maynooth had annexed the 'Leinster Leader' Cup of 1936 by defeating Ellistown by five points to four in the final played at the Father Brennan Memorial Park. And no wonder he made that remark, for there is a touch of romanticism attached to Maynooth's meteoric rise to fame. When the draw was being made last year for the 'Leinster Leader' Cup it was discovered that another team was necessary to complete the panel. Maynooth, who had won the junior championship that year, immediately volunteered to fill the vacancy as a kind of stop-gap. So others thought "God help Maynooth if they meet Raheens (senior champions) in the first round," remarked the Chairman at the draw. The draw was made and sure enough Maynooth was drawn against Raheens. The latter, of course were very confident of victory and agreed to play Maynooth on their own grounds. Then came the sensation. After a gruelling game Raheens had to admit defeat from the junior champions. And to prove that the win was no fluke Maynooth then went on to beat Leixlip, Newbridge and other fancied teams and defeated Ellistown on Sunday. Thus ended one of the most glorious chapters in the history of Maynooth.

Mr. Lawlor, in representing the team recalled the old days when he played against the Crom Abú and added that the team he saw playing that day was as good as any that he ever played against (cheers). He congratulated them heartily on their great victory.

The game is described in another column but suffice it to say that the Maynooth defence were the heroes of the day. They played like trojans and specially in the last quarter when Ellistown pressed desperately for the equalising point, and all but got it. Both forward lines were erratic and Maynooth especially missed enough chances to have won the game three or four times over. Ellistown also could have won the game and missed opportunities as a couple of goals went abegging. Seamus Burke, however, with his staunch henchman, held the fort with wonderful determination, and he was ably supported by Joe Murphy, Joe Moore, P. Cahill, P. Reilly, Nolan, Dunne, McGovern, Delaney and all the others, everyone of whom gave of their best. Scenes of great jubilation were witnessed at the close of the game, and 'Josie' Murphy, the hero of the day, was carried shoulder high from the field. Thus for the first time the name of Maynooth is inscribed on the "Leinster Leader" Cup.

MAYNOOTH SWIMMING CLUB

When Maynooth Swimming Club was founded in the early 70's, it started swimming in St. Raphaels, Celbridge. The first session was 1 hour from 4-5 on Friday's. The transport was P. Delaney coach. The club stayed there for 4/5 years, with different ages being catered for, and with an increased number of children, there were now 3 sessions. Then adult sessions started at night, and length's classes were started in Naas, and St. Vincent's on the Navan Road. Then in 1979, the club moved to Coolmine and stayed there till 1982. When the Instructor moved to Palmerstown the club followed him and we have been there ever since. Members of the club swam in competition in Athy and every year came home with medals. There were now 260 members. In 1982 there was a sponsored swim held for handicapped children and over £1,000 was made. In 1974 transport was changed to Bartons and the club is still with them today.

Every Saturday the club now has two sessions, involving 120 children and 4 instructors. The pupils are brought through all stages of the swimming programme from the beginning to advanced level. Each pupil is put through a basic course in water safety and receives a certificate and badge appropriate to their level.

The club has produced swimmers who go on to life saving classes or to swimming clubs and long may the swimming club continue.













INOU PRESS RELEASE

Government has ignored unemployed people, women and low-income earners-

Budget 2000 will increase the gap between rich and poor Mike Allen, General Secretary, of the Irish National Organisation of the Unemployed, (INOU) said that Charlie McCreevy's budget has further widened the gap between the rich and the poor.

"Ireland is a deeply unequal society. This Budget was the Fianna Fáil/PD coalition's opportunity to redress the growing gap between rich and poor, and secure the future of all the citizens of Ireland. Instead of listening to what the vast majority of the public were saying, the Government have created a budget that will cause, not resolve, poverty.

Charlie McCreevy should have offered low paid workers a real change in their take home pay, given unemployed people a decent weekly payment, targeted training at those outside the labour market and offered incentives to women to return to work. Instead he has ignored low paid workers and the unemployed in order to give top earners a tax cut, and made a mockery of public demands for a proper childcare strategy.

Top income earners will receive at least £40 a week from today's budget, middle money earners will receive £20 a week but people relying on social welfare will get only £4 a week and low income earners will get less than £5 a week.

All Social Partners wanted people on the minimum wage taken out of the tax net. The Government has never had a better opportunity to increase the incentive to take up low paid employment. They didn't take it, they chose instead to penalise unemployed people by offering a derisory increase in social welfare payments.

The Government has also failed to deliver on childcare. "Child poverty remains a persistent problem in Ireland. The Minister had a golden opportunity to make a meaningful contribution to solving this problem. Instead he gave a £2 per week increase in Child Benefit.

The Government has made it harder for women who work in the home, and harder for women who work outside the home. The tax individualisation programme penalises single earner parents, as they are the only taxpayers not to benefit from the widening of the standard rate band.

By ignoring demands from the INOU, childcare providers, and parents for a Parents Childcare Payment the Government have failed women in the home, and those struggling to meet childcare costs."

This budget should have consolidated a secure groundwork for a new national agreement. Instead it has proved to the Community and Voluntary Sector that the Government has yet to commit to tackling poverty in Ireland.

"This budget has not created the equal society the Minister promised it would. We must now look to the Partnership

process to vet again explain to Government that tackling poverty is both economically viable and vital for our future growth. The INOU will redouble its efforts to negotiate a new national agreement of genuine social inclusion."


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


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LANGUAGE CENTRE NUI MAYNOOTH

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
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BLOOD TRANSFUSION BOARD

MAYNOOTH LABOUR NOTES

Rathcoffey/Newtown Road:

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council have got a costing from the ESB for £26,500 for Traffic Route Standard Public Lighting from the Castle to the speed limit sign over the motorway bridge. Work is scheduled to begin after Christmas. In addition the Council have agreed to treat the laving of a footpath to facilitate the residents of Parson Hall and Castle Dawson as a priority and the Council will employ a contractor to be paid from Development Levies. The Council further advised Cllr.McGinley that the Rathcoffey Road realignment was part of their proposals for the area and that the forthcoming Maynooth Development Plan would reflect that.

New Litter Bins for Bus Stops:

Council officials agreed with Cllr. John McGinley's motion to install additional litter bins in Maynooth. As a first step bins will be installed at the Bus Stops on the Straffan Road and the Leixlip Road. Cllr. McGinley will continue to pursue the provision of litter bins on all the other arterial routes.

Exit from Laurence Avenue to the Celbridge Road:

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to improve safety at this junction by providing a stop sign and painting a white stop sign on the road. He has also asked for signs to be erected either side of the junction, on the Celbridge Road warning motorists of the junction.

Kildare Bridge, Dunboyne Road:

The Council have advised Cllr. McGinley that they propose improving safety in this area by widening the bridge and providing a roundabout at the junction of the Blacklion/ Dunboyne Road. It is intended to do this EU Funded work next year.

Exit from Car Park to Doctors Lane:

Following representations from Cllr.John McGinley the Council have installed a bollard in the middle of the exit to prevent uncaring motorists from using it.

M4 Motorway Exit to Maynooth:

The Planning Permission sought for a Business Campus in the land beside the motorway at Moneycooley proposes that the existing exit from the motorway be removed and replaced with a 33m roundabout in the field opposite Barretts. The County Engineer has advised Cllr. McGinley that if the Council agree to this proposal it will permanently solve the traffic chaos which motorists now have to tolerate coming off the motorway.

Parklands Through Road:

Following further representations from Cllr. McGinley the Council have erected 'Children' signs at both ends of the road. The Council will shortly be carrying out speed surveys to see whether or not there is a need for traffic calming. In Cllr. McGinlevs view there is a need for traffic calming because of the straight through road rather than the curved road as in Rockfield.

Maynooth Street Names:

Following representations from the Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum. Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council;

That funding be made available for bilingual signs indicating the names of streets and back lanes in Maynooth in line with the wishes of Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum.'

Kingsbry Estate:

The Development Control Section of the Council have advised Cllr. McGinley that they will hire a contractor to remove the slabs at the pedestrian walkway with Meadowbrook as soon as possible. They will also lay a 2m wide path here and landscape either side in line with the Residents Associations wishes during the planting season next March.

Meadowbrook:

Following requests from the Residents Association Cllr. McGinley has asked the Council to do the following: Speed limit signage for Meadowbrook Road.

- · 'Children' signs for Meadowbrook Crescent,
- Developer to do proper landscaping.
- · Dead trees to be replaced.

Geraldine Hall/Harbour Field:

The Council have conveyed to the Maynooth Development Association their agreement to its proposal regarding acquisition of the property.

Convent Lane/Dunbovne:

Following the excellent work carried out by the Council at the Grls School and at Carton Avenue entrance Cllr. John McGinley asked the officials at the Area Meeting on 8th December to continue the good work by eliminating the wilderness at the side of the footpath out to Dillons Row. A cycle path would be ideal to replace the weeds or alternatively the road could be realigned. He further stated that resurfacing is very badly needed out to Lyreen Park. The officials accepted that something needed to be done here sooner rather than later.

Bad County Council Estimates (Budget) for Year 2000 The Estimates result in Domestic Service Charges increasing

by £30 to £115 per year. There was very little positive apart from Cllr. McGinley's proposal that £200,000 be allocated solely for traffic calming measures. This was agreed.

Despite the best efforts of Cllr.John McGinley and Deputy Emmet Stagg the Council agreed its Estimates for 2000 on 3rd December. The Labour Councillors were the only ones to vote against.

Cllr. McGinley proposed the following:


•A seven day per week street cleaning service for all major towns.


•Door step collection of separated waste e.g. glass. paper, organic.


•Establishing a Parks Department in the Council so as to maintain our parks and green areas, to prune trees and to provide and maintain Childrens Playgrounds. The County Manager stated that none of these could be provided as we did not have the money to do so. It is quite extraordinary that a country with a surplus of £6.500M cannot provide enough funds to Kildare Co. Co. to clean the streets at weekends, to cut the grass in Pound Park or Carton Avenue, or to provide playgrounds for our children. Such services are the norm elsewhere in the EU and indeed elsewhere in Ireland. Cllr. McGinley and his Labour Party colleagues will continue the fight to ensure that Maynooth and the rest of Kildare get services appropriate to the 21st century.



COMMUNITY COUNCIL ON THE MOVE



Editorial

This, and indeed the last two months we have been, as some of you are already aware, under an extreme amount of pressure, due to several factors. The Millenium has brought the Winds of Change to our Community Council, with the moving on to bigger and better things, of our excellent Supervisors Norah and Freda, and the starting of a new Supervisor who may already be known to some of you - Sarah O'Connor. Sarah has joined the Community Council at a time of depleted Staff, and added to the pressures of learning new systems and up-dating the old, we are finding it guite difficult to recruit new participants. Plus we produced this month's Newsletter under the added duress of moving office premises. This is not an excuse for shoddy work, as the Newsletter is and always has been recognised as an outstanding product for and by the Community. We simply wish to apologise in advance for any possible errors or ommissions in our features or advertisments in the February Issue. The intense pressure of producing a quality product by so few, when in times past there were so many to do the same amount of work, has proven a task of no small measure. I hope that our customers in the business community, and of course our dear readers, without whom the Newsletter would not be possible, will be understanding in these times of change. We are looking forward to doing increased business with you from our new premises (in the old Cardinal Press offices on the Dunboyne Road) in the very near future.

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Editorial

At the time of going to press the An Bord Pleanala hearing into the proposed Kilcock incinerator is taking place in the Glenroyal Hotel.

The hearings have attracted huge public interest with standing room only on most of the days this week. Obviously local opinion is unanimously opposed to the development. Having heard both sides of the argument for the past few days it is almost inconceivable that Bord Pleanala could allow the incinerator to be built. Thermal Waste Management's fire protection plans are inadequate, Kildare County Council's emergency services could not deal with a disaster associated with the transportation of hazardous wastes to Kilcock, the water supply around Kilcock is inadequate to supply the plant, the transport network in the area could not safely handle the volumes of waste being transported to the plant, TWA's environmental impact statement is deficient, the plant would pose a threat to the valuable stud farm industry in North Kildare. All this is in addition to the question of health risks associated with emissions from the plant.

Last month An Bord Pleanala refused permission for a huge retail park on a green field site north of Naas although the development had been given the go ahead by Kildare County Council. One of the main reasons given for refusing permission was that the location of the retail park would not be consistent with sustainable development.

A huge toxic waste incinerator in Kilcock, imposed against the wishes of Kildare County Council and virtually every citizen in the area could hardly be called 'sustainable development'.

It was also hoped that the general public would attend on all days.

They gave a brief report on funding needed to support this campaign. It is hoped that a decision will be made by March 9th.

Moneycoole Business Park

It was noted that Ray Grehan will attend the next Community Council Meeting. He will outline the project. While it was stated that the Business Park would be very good for Maynooth. There was still some worried.

Re: Term 'Cider Party'

The Cider Industry Council have written to Maynooth Community Council objecting to the term 'Cider Party' being used to describe the goings on in Laraghbryan Cemetery. Rachel Sherry of the Cider Industry said that 'Cider Party' gave the impression that only cider is available. It was agreed that this was generally not the case.

Sporting and Social Events

Both the Summer Project and Community Games find themselves hard-up for new members. It was felt that if new people don't get involved with both of these groups they will disappear. Between both of these events each year about five hundred children take part. An appeal was generally made for more people to get involved with sporting activities in the town.

Moyglare Wall

ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP (RCAG)

The Royal Canal Amenity Group (RCAG) is busy planning for the year 2000 following confirmation that the scheme has been renewed.

In a recent article in the Liffey Champion newspaper, our Chairman, Matthew Kennedy, gave a few words: "In recent years FAS has been cuting back on their shcemes in the Dublin and North Kildare areas, so it was great news to get before Christmas."

The improvement plans for the Canal this year include provision of four to six fishing stands for the disabled, installing new bollards, known as 'Timberheads' for mooring in Maynooth, Kilcock and Confey.

During the course of the up-coming year the fifteen approved participants will be encouraged to participate in a variety of courses, ranging from computer courses, accountancy to horticulture.

Ultimately, our concept is to make Maynooth the main staging area going into the North Shannon and Royal Canal System.



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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE TOWORDS A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE FOR MAYNOOTH IN THE NEW MILLENNIUM

The concept of sustainable development can be understood as a process of development which is sustainable economically, socially, and environmentally, though it is normally the latter that usually attracts most attention. But sustainable development is ultimately about striking a balance between all three aspects; it is about "development which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs". terminology coined by Brundtland in 1987. In Ireland, two essential considerations apply when sustainable development concepts are discussed. Firstly, it is emphasised that development must not harm the natural environment. This is important because so much of the national economy is dependent on a 'clean, green' image. A large part of Irish gross national product depends on this image being maintained. Secondly, it is clear that the link between economic growth and increased stress on the environment must be de-coupled if sustainable development is to become a reality. This is not a pipedream but a necessity for all of us to realise, not least in the area of waste management. This has become guite a live issue over the last few months as the controversy over Kilcock incinerator has raged. Growth without environmental degradation is not possible but ultimately essential in the new millennium. Today, February 2000, Ireland has income levels equal to the EU average and at least in eastern parts no longer qualifies for 'Objective 1'status as one of the EU's lagging regions. These parts also fail to meet the criteria for 'cohesion funds' from the EU Regional Fund. The Structural Funds which have transformed the economic landscape of Ireland will certainly not be flowing as freely in the years ahead. Growth in this part of Ireland will however undoubtedly continue to be rapid, though hopefully not on the scale which has seen Maynooth add 800 houses to its stock in the past four years and which has placed strains on many areas of community and social infrastructure.

To plan in this context of rapid growth involves a drastic change in thinking very different from the past where development at any cost was sometimes a more common sentiment. Planning for the Celtic Tiger in the new millenium must, however, be guided by sustainable development considerations. These must be incorporated into planning procedures also. In devising the Maynooth Development Plan, now expected in late spring one hopes the following principles are being followed.

The Plan should focus on the needs of the future Maynooth resident as well as the present. We should not sacrifice precious amenities like open spaces, or resources such as water supply, for short term needs. Some things are limited, like the ability of the Liffey to assimilate waste, or the ability of the Main Street to handle traffic. There is no point in adding forever to their burden. Instead we have to learn to match projected growth with the capacity to absorb growth in a much more realistic manner that was evident in the earlier drafts of the Maynooth Development Plan which found such widespread rejection. Traffic is perhaps the major legacy of past mistakes. A recent survey found that approximately 700 cars travel in each direction on the Straffan Road near the motorway interchange between 5.30 and 6.30pm. With a car every 3 seconds passing, it is small wonder that the exit from the railway station or Glen Royal complex is blocked. The way the motorway traffic was routed through the town was a major error of the last decade. Who pushed for the spinal road directly into Maynooth instead of a junction at Blacklion,

east of the town, which would have relieved horrendous traffic flows in the Main Street? Maynooth Planning Alliance knows the answer to this questio. Do you? Have we learned from past mistakes? Regrettably the answer is no. It now appears the new Bond Bridge is being constructed without an entrance to the railway station. If this happens, 1000 cars will now be trying to exit onto the Straffan Road at the rush hours. trying to find that three second gap! The result can be easily imagined. It now also appears that the mistakes made on the Mill Street-Parson Street junction will be repeated on the Movglare Road. In this area of south west Maynooth massive residential development feeding onto the Main Street was sanctioned by our Councillors despite the absence of any route to the motorway other than through the Main Street/Straffan Road. Incredibly they now seem set to propose a similar exercise on north Maynooth on the Moyglare Road-even more vulnerable to congestion because of the schools and university traffic flows. At the end of the next decade for some Maynooth residents we may be 'only an hour fromi Leixlip' if what seems to be our Development Plan is carried out.

2. Integrated and broad ranging objectives should be pursed by a partnership approach-not catering for narrow sectors at the expense of the entire community. Maynooth today is an increasingly sophisticated community. It will easily recognise any attempts to camouflage unnecessary residential rezonings and those responsible will not be forgiven easily. Last year demonstrated this at the local elections-this year it is not impossible national elections will provide a further test for our politicians. Whether it be a Science Park or Public Park, a Sports Centre or Social Centre objectives will only be attained if a community consensus is behind them.

Improved physical, recreational and social facilities in 3 Maynooth should not be achieved at the cost of quality of life for its inhabitants. Educational facilities and passive amenity pursuits such as walking for pleasure are vital components of any town. But they must not be provided for by a short sighted rezoning exercise which leaves everyone back where they started. In the medium term, the age structure of Maynooth will tilt away from the teens and twenties towards a predominantly older population. The recreational needs of these must be provided for also. Alternatives to 'development-led' planning in this area must be devised and incorporated into the forthcoming plan.

4. The plan should be people oriented, one which builds on existing strengths, and which enables people to be comfortable with their town. A pause in the headlong rush for growth of recent years is the best way of achieving this. Fortunately the delay in the appearance of the plan provides a small breathing space before the next wave of growth accelerates. This should be used by our elected representatives to seek implementation of their goals other than by further residential rezoning.

Understanding the concept of sustainable development is one thing. Putting it into practice is another. Maynooth has so many natural advantages that, given the chance, it could be the model to which others strive. Let us hope that population target for Maynooth and other towns for the period up to 2006, as agreed by our councillors, signals a commitment not to squander this opportunity.



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

Question:

What are the new Medical Card income guide-lines for 2000?

Answer:

The Medical Card income guide-lines are updated in January each year. The new income guide-lines are as follows and are effective from 1st January 2000:

Question:

I heard that a new bereavement grant to be paid to widows and widowers with children was announced in the Budget. Could you give me some information about this?

Answer:

A new grant of £1,000.00, to be paid to widows or widowers with dependant children was announced in Budget 2000.

At the moment a Bereavement Grant of £500.00 is paid to all insured people including civil and public servants. This grant will continue to be paid. However, a widow/widower, with dependant children may also be eligible for an additional grant of £1,000.00.

The full details of the qualifying conditions for this new grant will be known when the Social Welfare Bill is published in February 2000. It was announced by the Minister for Social, Community and Family Affairs on 2nd December 1999 that the grant of £1,000.00 will be paid to widows/widowers who have lost a spouse after 1st December 1999. The grant will only apply to widows/widowers with dependant children who qualify for a Widower's Contributory Pension or a One-Parent Family Payment or a Bereavement Grant payable on the death of their spouse.

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




SENIOR CITIZENS COMMITTEE



A qualitative market research project on National Tidy Towns has been conducted and here are the main findings.


- The competition has a decidedly rural image and people in larger cities feel that it is not relevant to their lives.
- Larger areas lack the natural borders to make people feel a sense of ownership and this is complicated by through roads which are impossible to control.
- Many believe that it is to do with litter control and the promotion of tourism - an area where it has made a major contribution with an emphasis on 'beautifying' towns.
- limited awareness of how the competition actually operates.
- Stronger enforcement of litter legislation required; There's a view also that the competition favours smaller towns with 'picture post-card' scenery.

Also the Sam Maguire Cup made a welcome visit to school. Perhaps future players will have started in Stepping Stones.



A LENTEN LETTER

No! this is not the regulations to be read from the pulpit by order of his Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, but a reflection of Lent in the last century. If we were remiss about the season, we were awakened at mass on the Sunday preceding Ash Wednesday. The priest unfurling this enormous sheet of paper, carefully folding it to manageable size and proceeding to read the Lenten regulations for the diocese.

I was bemused then and am still, why the first regulation was. "No catholic could study in T.C.D., without the explicit permission of his grace the Archbishop". Why at Lent? Was it alright at other times? Lent meant something very special those days.

Fasting: One full meal and two colations each day, Sunday and St. Patricks Day excepted. Abstinence: Meat or meat products forbidden on Wednesday, Friday and on the eve of Holidays. We all knew that because the "Far East calender had a fish imprinted on the date. Wearing of sack cloth and ashes long since discontinued from the turn of the previous century.

From Ash Wednesday all Statues and Icons shrouded in purple until holy Saturday. All cinemas had to close at 23.30, except on the feast of St. Patricks when Ceilis could continue until 3 a.m. except when it fell on a Saturday. Holy Hour on the first Sunday of the month, rosary and benediction the other three or four. Stations of the crosss, every Wednesday and Friday at 8 p.m.

Voluntary abstinence from alcoholic drink and smoking was encouraged with the promise of 100 years indulgence from purgatory for a departed relative or friend, or could be reserved for oneself for future use.

Being young I often wondered what became of these indulgences, if those you nominated were snugly upon high playing harps, or you wound up roasting chestnuts or stoking furnaces in the nether regions.

Some well intentioned 'hard chaws' exercised licence of their own making. The Lenten regs not applying to Sundays and Feast Days, had a few smokes and a tipple to alleviate the ennui.

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day invariably fell around St. Valentine's Day, heralding the season of whipping tops for the children.

Holy Week was quite another occasion of Lent, following the blessing of the palms, we the altar servers, were summoned each evening to attend the church, for rehearsals of the ceremonies on the following days.

These sessions normally had an interlude whilst the priests heard confessions.

To keep out of mischief, we busied ourselves with competitions. One was to see who could cast the smallest stone into either of the two now no linger existing sheep dipping ponds beyond and below the front of the church.

It was the era of Jim Bradock, Max Baer and Joe Louis, and all the servers were boxing fans, friendly bouts were arranged; accidents did happen, and many of us served on the altar on Monday, Thursday and Good Friday sporting shiners' much to the amusement of our late Parish Priest, also a boxing fan.

MAYNOOTH ACTION STRATEGY

As traffic congestion in and around Maynooth grows more serious by the month, Maynooth Action Strategy is very disappointed to learn that the current proposals relating to the realignment of Bond Bridge have no provision for motor access to the Railway Station from the Rathcoffey Road. MAS originally proposed and lobbied for the extension of the Railway Station car park and larnrod Eireann is to be congratulated on the fine job that has been done in developing the new car park on the Rathcoffey Road side of the station. Failure to provide adequate access to this car park as part of the Bond Bridge development would be a retrograde step.

The plans for the new Bond Bridge prepared by HGL O'Connor, consultant engineers, were recently presented to Kildare Co. Council. While all our local councillors favour the provision of motor access from Bond Bridge to the Railway Station, as things stand this will not be part of the design when the project goes to tender in May of this year. Originally technical reasons were given as to why a slipway from the bridge to the station carpark could not be constructed. It now emerges that it simply a question of finance with a figure of £95,000 being quoted as the cost. This seems a very small sum given the overall cost of the project and the tremendous benefits that would flow from providing this additional point of access to the Railway Station. The engineers have also guoted issues of safety, stating that poor sight lines at the proposed junction at Bond Bridge would create a traffic hazard. Maynooth Action Strategy believes that there are technical solutions to that problem and that, in any case, the existing exit onto the Straffan Road is far from ideal.

Currently there is serious traffic congestion at the Railway Station in the evening as dozens of cars attempt to exit the station onto the Straffan Road. It can regularly take 15 minutes to negotiate the traffic jam leaving the station when passengers disembark from the 17:15 and 17:52 trains from Connolly Station. This situation will obviously disimprove when larnrod Eireann's plans to extend rail services to Maynooth are put into place in 2001 and the service is more heavily used. Providing access to the station from the Rathcoffey Road could relieve much of this congestion. In addition, hundreds of residents in the Newtown area would benefit from much more convenient access to the station rather than adding to traffic congestion in the village and on the Straffan Road.

With the support of our partners Maynooth Community Council, Maynooth Chamber of Commerce, NUI, Maynooth and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth Action Strategy intend to lobby Kildare Co. Council on this issue.

HOLIDAYS ON THE WEB

Our local travel agents will always be with us and they will undoubtedly continue to provide an important service for many people when they come to arrange their annual holiday. Increasingly, however, it is becoming possible to research and book your holiday using the Internet. From personal experience holidays in Portugal and Holland have been successfully organised using the Web. In both cases it was possible to contact hotels directly by email and to view pictures of the hotels facilities. Until recently many people were cautious about using their credit cards to pay for services on the Web. But most of the security issues have now been sorted out and it is probably safer revealing your credit card number to a reputable site on the Web than it is to hand over your card to a waiter in a restaurant where you haven't dined before.

Three Irish sites have recently become available:

www.direct-holidays.ie www.falconholidays.ie www.iwtholidays.ie.

Direct Holidays is a Scottish based tour operator, which sells package holidays direct to the public, rather than through the conventional route of travel agents. They were formed in November 1991 and following a successful launch of the business from Glasgow and Prestwick airports (Summer 1992 and 1993) the company expanded its departure airports to Edinburgh (Summer 1995), Liverpool (Summer 1995), Manchester (Summer 1996), Newcastle (1998), Belfast, Leeds Bradford, Humberside and Teesside (Summer 1999) and Dublin (Summer 2000). The company claims that "when you book with Direct Holidays you cut out the travel agent. More importantly you cut out all their commission. This means you save money on the cost of your holiday". The Web site is well organised and allows you search for, book and pay for a flight to a range of holiday destinations including Faro, Malaga, Tenerife, Ibiza, Malta and Gran Canaria. It also provides very comprehensive information on accommodation, prices and holiday health.

Both the Falcon Tours and JWT sites are attempts by well-established travel companies to tap into business on the Web. JWT have published their 4 holiday brochures on their Web site - 2twentys, Selection, Florida/Mexico Sun and Winter Sun. Again it is possible to search for and book a holiday having worked through the brochures online. The Falcon site has a very similar approach and their 5 brochures - Summer Sun 2000, Villa Sun 2000, Cruises Sun 2000, Ski 1999/2000 and Winter Sun - are searchable in the same way as the JWT brochures.

The other way in which the Web can be used to plan your holiday is by using it to research your destination. Let's say you are lucky enough to be heading off to the Bahamas next week. You know it's nice and sunny with blue seas and beautiful beaches but you would like to find out a little bit more about the country. By typing in 'Bahamas' into any of the search engines on the Web you will get back dozens of links to sites about the Bahamas. One of the best is www.bahamas.com, which features maps of the islands leading to a complete guide of the whole region. Fancy going to Crooked Island? This is what it has to say:

"Crooked Island (together with Long Cay) forms the northwest part of the atoll system. The deliciously sweet scent of native herbs and flowers inspired Columbus to call it "one of the fragrant islands." He christened the island "Isabella" after his queen, and it was called "Samoete" by the Arawaks, but, somehow, the more functionally descriptive Crooked Island is the name it is known by today.

Quiet and remote, the island's natural attributes are many. An abundance of bird life thrives on the cliffs and reefs around the islands, and magnificent limestone caves hide secrets from the past. Coral gardens, shelves and reefs are a treat for divers, and the deep creeks, tidal flats, and pools filled with game fish make it a sportsman's delight. Spectacular, untouched, white sand beaches stretch for miles".



LEIXLIP NO MORE

As you may be aware, the ESB area office in Leixlip has been closed for some years, in keeping with the rationalisation policy of the "New ESB".

In early January 00 the last electrical crews were transferred to Finglas depot.

The original office opened over 60 years ago, beside the present day "Rockafellas". The late James Smyth was appointed the first Area Electrician. He and his staff set up a great raport with the consumers, knowing all of them personally from their initial connection to the network. Rural electrification was still 8 years in the offing. The original area radiated through Lucan to Palmerstown, Clondalkin, Tallaght, Brittas, Manor Kilbride to Kill, Donadea, Kilcock, Enfield, Dunshaughlin, Rathoath, Curragh, The Boleys, Dunboyne, Mulhuddart, Clonsilla, with Maynooth, Celbridge, Straffan and Rathcoffey in the centre. Quite an area in War-time and rationing; Jim reigned supreme until his death.

Three of his longest serving staff were Benny Greene, RIP, Martin Keegan, RIP, the former Lord Mayor of Lucan, and our own Gabriel Flood, ONeill Park.

The area grew from hundreds to many thousands in the 60s and 70s. Consequently the area reduced gradually. Losing Palmerstown, Kilcock, Dunshaughlin, Clondalkin and Tallaght and finally Lucan in the late 70s. In the late 80s with the demise of Kilcock it regained Batterstown and Dunshaughlin.

On January the 6th many of the former and present staff met at a farewell party in the Springfield Hotel, to say goodbye to an institution of our time.


SHCOOL CONCERT:


FIRST COMMUNION:

MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Bond Bridge Design Going on Public Display for Comments:

At the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council on 7 January the Draft Design for PART X Planning Permission was presented to the Councillors by the Consultants and Council Engineers. The design is as expected, apart from three areas which Cllr. John Mc Ginley asked to be changed. 1. There should be a vehicular entrance to the train station so that cars would not have to use Parson St. and Main St. to gain access to the Straffan Road entrance. The Consultants said that they could not recommend this for cost and safety reasons. They stated that it would cost an extra £95,000 and that the new junction at the bridge would create a traffic

hazard because of poor sight lines. 2. The 1.2m walls should be stone finished and not plaster finish as proposed.

3. There should be a pedestrian entrance to the College opposite Parson Court to reduce the pedestrian traffic in Parson Street.

The basic design of the new bridge is as follows:

- * The roadway will be 21ft wide with a 6ft footpath and a 5ft path on both sides.
- * There will be a 17ft clearance over the railway to allow for future electrification. This means that the bridge will be 2ft higher than the existing bridge.

* The Meadowbrook stream and the Joan Slade river will be culverted from Meadowbrook Lawns to Parson Lodge (This would facilitate the pedestrian entrance to the College at Parson court).

* Newtown Grove will become a cul de sac at the Newtown Road end.

The bridge will be kept open most of the time during construction. However, it will have to close for a day or two, on two or three occasions. The County Engineer told the meeting that he expected the Meadowbrook Link to the Straffan Road to be completed by then and that it could be used as the diversion. The bridge will be open to pedestrians at all times during construction.

The Programme of Work is as follows:

- * The Council to apply for PART X Planning Permission
- before the end of January.
- * Go to tender in May.

* Contractor begins work in July.

* Construction period will be 18 to 24 months.

New Traffic Lights for Straffan road:

As a result of a motion from Cllr. John Mc Ginley the Council have agreed to install traffic lights at the Railway Station/ Parklands/Castlebridge exits. These lights will also facilitate traffic exiting from Old greenfield and Silken Vale. Motorists are finding it increasingly difficult to exit from these locations because of the volume and speed of traffic on the Straffan Road. The new lights will mean improvements for everyone-motorists and pedestrians.

New Taffic Lights for Parson Street/Main Street Junction: Council Officials advised Cllr.John Mc Ginley at the Area Meeting on the 7January that funding is now in place for these traffic and pedestrian lights that were an integral part of the Main Street Improvement Works. This will make life much easier for those exiting from Parson Street and will also allow pedestrians to cross the road safely at this very busy junction. The pedestrian lights at the Bank of Ireland will be removed when the new lights are in place. These lights are a hazard for pedestrians at present because traffic keeps coming from

the Straffan Road though the pedestrian lights are green. Moyglare Village Boundary Wall Gets Funding: Cllr. John Mc Ginley motion 'That funding be allocated from the next Discretionary Block grant to build a boundary wall betwen Moyglare Village and Moyglare Road' was agreed at the Area Meeting of 7 January. This means that money will be allocated from the Discretionary Grants next March/April for this purpose and the wall will be built. It will be a great relief for the residents to know that their children can play in safety on the green.

Problems With Bus Eireann & Dublin Bus:,

It was agreed at the Area Meeting on 7January to invite Dublin Bus and Bus Eireann to our next meeting so that we can iron out two major problems:

1. Bus drivers cause serious traffic build ups on Main Street because they don't pull into the bus bays for passengers.

2. The two bus turning bays on the Straffan Road are an evesore as a result of buses driving up on the 'green' areas. It is hoped to agree on a new design for the turning points.

Doctors Lane:

The Councils Senior Executive Engineer is to come up with traffic calming proposals for Doctors Lane for the next Meeting. It is inevitable that a serious accident will take place involving pedestrians if nothing is done.

Inclusion of Maynoth in Dublin Taximeter Area:

Councellors asked at the last Area Meeting that Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge, Kilcock and Straffan be included in the Dublin Taximeter Area. This would mean that taxis could not refuse to take individuals from Dublin to these Kildare towns as in the case at present. They would also be forbidden to charge other that the meter charge. Some Maynooth residints were charged £45 for a taxi from Dublin to Maynooth recently.

Restoration Work on Obelisk:

Deputy emmet Stagg has requested the Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands, to provide funding for essential restoration works at the Obelisk.

Deputy Stagg stated that Capital funding for such works had increased by 8% in 2000 and that it was now time to proceed with the work.

Temporary Footpath Parsons Hall to Castledawson

Arising from requests from residents in Parsons Hall, I Deputy Stagg contacted the developers of Castledawson cconcerning the provision of a temporary footpath on the reserved section of green area fronting Castledawson at the Parsons Hall end. The developers duly obliged and Dupty Stagg thanked them for their assistance.

Work on the provision of a proper footpath fronting the Castledawson boundary wall which is costed at £20,000 is due to start shortly.

Gaelscoil ui Fhiach

The Minister for education is still being pressed by Deputy Emmet Stagg to sanction permanent recognition for Maynooth Gael Scoil. The application was made in April, 1999 and the delay in sanctioning same is unacceptable. **Traffic Route Lighting - Celbridge**

Cllr. John McGinley has requested Kildare Co. Council to provide Traffic Route Lighting on Celbridge Road, Maynooth, from the junction with the Straffan Road to the end of Laurences Avenue.

FINE GALE NOTES

Proposals for Bond Bridge Construction at Maynooth Cllr. Senan Griffin welcomed, with some reservations, the new proposals as outlined by H.G.L. O'Connor at the Leixlip Area Meeting on Friday last 7th January, regarding the realignment of the Bond Bridge in Maynooth.

The proposals allow for the construction of a 6.5 metre wide road, with a 1.9 metre wide and a 1.5 metre cycle path at both sides of the proposed new road layout.

The construction will involve piping a section of the Joan Slade river bounding the College wall along Parson Street. The new bridge will be about 600 mm higher than the existing roadway levels so that a clearance of 5.13 metres can be accommodated for the rail line. The proposed road will be bound by a wall of approximately 12.3 meters high, which Cllr. Griffin has insisted should be of finished stonework.

The major drawback in the proposed new roadway said Cllr Griffin, is that it fails to provide for motor access to the car park at the Railway station from the Rathcoffey Road.

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested the engineer in charge to ensure that access to the car park at the Railway Station is provided, in order to alleviate traffic congestion on the Main Street by forcing motorists to drive through Parson Street. Main Street and up the Straffan Road to gain access to the station. Traffic congestion can be easily avoided by providing this simple access point, said Cllr. Griffin,

The time limit for this project is that it is likely to go to tender in May 2000 and construction should start in July 2000 which will take approximately 18 to 24 months to complete.

Cllr. Griffin hopes to circulate a map outlining the consultants proposals to all households in the Rathcoffey Road area.

Celbridge Interchange Gets Go Ahead

The County Engineer advised the Leixlip Area Committee at their meeting on January 7th that the order to proceed with the purchase of the necessary land to accommodate the interchange, has been granted by the Minister for the Environment.

The provision of this link to Intel / Hewlett Packard and Celbridge is vital for the proper management of traffic in the area and will result in a reduction of traffic hold-ups in Leixlip and Celbridge. The Minister's order also allows for the removal of the existing bridge at Leixlip Gate leading to the right of way at Castletown in Celbridge.

Cllr. Senan Griffin, in welcoming the advancement of the project, stated that the link to Celbridge is long overdue and that the residents of Main Street, Castletown, Oaklawn and Green Lane Estates in Leixlip, will be overjoyed by the elimination of the huge volume of traffic through their estates. The sooner this project is completed, the better for all concerned said Cllr. Griffin.

Private Sites:

Cllr. Senan Griffin's motion to Kildare County Council to provide forty private sites in Leixlip, has been accepted in principle by the Leixlip Area Committee at its recent meeting. As a result of the motion, the Committee is to request the full Council to formulate a transparent policy on the housing needs of the people of Kildare.

The need for local authority housing plus affordable housing

has long been advocated by Cllr. Senan Griffin, which was also announced in the Bacon Report, together with the need for private sites throughout the whole of the county.

Completion Works at Maln Street, Leixlip and Main Street, Maynooth:

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to draw up a snag list for the completion of the Main Streets in Maynooth and Leixlip.

In drawing up the list, Cllr. Senan Griffin has also requested that the nameplates for the various streets be put in place similar to the style provided in Kilcock.

However, Cllr, Senan Griffin has expressed his concern at the poor quality of some of the completed works in both Maynooth and Leixlip and has suggested that the contractor be recalled to complete outstanding works.

Kilcock Incinerator:

Deputy Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have lodged an objection to the proposed incinerator at Boycetown Kilcock with An Bord Pleanala. Bord Pleanala have accepted that the grounds for the appeal will be confined to planning matters only as set out by Deputy Durkan and Cllr. Griffin.

In objecting to the proposed incinerator Deputy Durkan and Cllr. Griffin highlighted the lack of road infrastructure. shortage of water and sewerage facilities plus the protection of the Royal Canal. Issues such as air pollution and emissions will have to be dealt with by the E.P.A.

The Fine Gael position in North Kildare has always been to oppose this application by T.W.M.I. at Boycetown Kilcock. It is of the utmost importance that Bord Pleanala reject this application and uphold the decision of Kildare County Council.

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

Without the hard work and dedication of Mary this whole project would never have been possible. Her energy and efficiency in dealing with the Business was limitless and always good humoured. I want to publicly thank her for that commitment to Maynooth Pitch & Putt.

In a last round up of other people who were involved over the years I want to thank Tom and Patricia for their constant support and advice, the Post Primary School and the Primary School classes and teachers who played on the course, the Community Games organisers and players, also Colm, Donal and Graham. Paddy Brennan for years of grass cutting and Winnie Brennan for allowing us take Holidays, Aisling, Brian and Conor for all the odd jobs. Bridie for vigilance and anybody else who doesn't fit in to any of the above categories.

In conclusion it has been a wonderful experience enjoyed by us all and I hope in some way we made a contribution to our community in Maynooth.

EDITORIAL

It is almost ten years since the original plans to develop Carton were the subject of debate in Maynooth. That original project fell through but the Starwood Group, a multinational resort company, has taken up the reins and is about to start work on the two golf courses and 5 star hotel. The planning permission also allows for the building of 150 luxury houses on the estate. Back in 1990, those in Maynooth who favoured the Gleneagles Group plans to build a luxury hotel, golf courses and country lodges in Carton argued that the valuable jobs that the development would bring to the area, together with public access to Carton were good reasons for supporting the plan. Circumstances have changed guite a bit since the early 1990's. Unemployment around Maynooth is no longer the problem it was back in 1990. Indeed Intel and Hewlett-Packard have problems trying to recruit staff. It may be that many of the staff who will end up working in Carton will not come from the Maynooth area, or even from Ireland. The issue of access for the local community to this luxury facility on its doorstep remains. In discussions eight or nine years ago between the Community Council and those involved in the Carton development it was agreed, at least verbally, that local residents would have free access to the estate and that some concessions might be negotiated regarding golf club and other types of membership. Press reports in the last couple of weeks suggest that development work at Carton is immanent. It is time that the Community Council re-opened discussions with Carton's developers and clarifies Maynooth's relationship with the newly developed Carton.

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

I have a Medical Card. Does this mean that I am entitled to free dental services?

Answer

t4Recent changes in the Medical Card Scheme have extended dental treatment to all Medical Card holders aged 16 and over from the 1st January, 2000. Previously Medical Card holders aged 35-64 were only entitled to restricted emergency cover.

From 1st January, 2000 all Medical Card holders over the age of 16 including 35-64 years olds can access the full range of dental services, ie routine treatment, emergency treatment and dentures. People eligible for treatment may go to a private dentist who has a contract with the Health Board. A list of participating dentists may be obtained from the local Health Board.

TCurrently national school pupils are entitled to free dental services up to their fourteenth birthday. It is planned to extend the school dental scheme up to 16 year olds later this year.



Kildare Win Leinster Title After Three Replays

No. This is not a prediction as to how Kildare will fare in this years Leinster Championship. It's the story of the 1903 Championship which Kildare eventually won in June 1905. And where is this kind of information available? Well, like everything else, you can now read about it on the Internet.

For many years the GAA was regarded as being a somewhat backward organisation. It is hard to believe that 30 years ago 'the ban' was in force which meant that any GAA member playing, or even attending, a 'foreign game' could be expelled from the association. Since then things have changed dramatically and the GAA is now a far-sighted organisation as evidenced by their ambitious plans to redevelop Croke Park into the biggest and most modern sports stadium in the country. In keeping with the times the GAA has also embraced the Internet and their website at www.gaa.ie is full of the latest news and comprehensive information. All the latest team news is updated on a daily basis and the site also has a full listing of upcoming football and hurling fixtures. There is also an excellent tour of the GAA museum at Croke Park and an update on how the redevelopment of Croke Park is going on.

Of more local interest, the GAA website has links to club results and fixtures and links to GAA county sites. Among the best county sites are those for Meath at meath.gaa.ie and for Kerry at kerry gaa ie. At this stage it doesn't appear that the Kildare Co. Board have organised a site although some clubs - including Sarsfields at www.iol.ie/~nubridge/sarsfiel.htm

and Naas at members.tripod.co.uk/Naas_GAA/ are on the Web.

A very comprehensive database of GAA information is available at

www.gaalore.com

with player profiles of most current inter-county football and hurling players. Did you know that Declan Kerrigan made his championship debut for Kildare on May 24th 1987 against Wexford and that he has scored 4-20 in 28 championship appearances?

But back to the 1903 Leinster Championship where the details are available at www.gaalore.com. For a start Kildare appear to have played their first game in the 1903 championship on September 18th 1904 when they beat Dublin by 3-11 to 1-3. Five weeks later Kildare beat Laois in the semi-final on the scoreline Kildare 4-5 Laois 0-1. Then, on December 11th at Wexford, Kildare and Kilkenny drew in the Leinster Final on the scoreline Kildare 1-2 to Kilkenny's 0-5. The first replay took place, again at Wexford, on February 26th, 1905 when Kildare won by 1-6 to 1-5. Kilkenny challenged the result and claimed that the referee had disallowed a point they had scored. The authorities ruled that a further replay should take place - there's no suggestion that video evidence was used ! - and this game was played at Wexford on April 18th, 1905 when the teams drew again. 0-5 each. Finally, Kildare became Leinster champions for 1903 on June 4th, 1905 when they beat Kilkenny 0-9 to 0-1 at Croke Park. The campaign had taken 10 months and the championship finished two years behind schedule!



Voting

If elections are required, voting papers will be distributed to all eligible households between Wednesday 29th and Friday 30th March. Votes will be collected the following week, if they are not collected they may be brought to the Community Council office. All votes must be returned by Friday 7th April, They will be counted on Saturday 8th April.

Counting will be done by neutral volunteers under the supervision of outside scrutineers. For single area election areas, the single transferable vote method of counting will be used (as in by-elections to Dáil Éireann). For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are seats available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected, as appropriate.

The first meeting of the new Council will take place on Monday 17th April. This will be an AGM including the election of new officers for the Council. Notices will be sent to all councillors.





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

I also take this opportunity to thank management, staff and customers of the "Roost" who raised £1,250 on our behalf. Your generosity is much appreciated.





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
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JOSEPH AND THE AMAZING **TECHNICOLOUR DREAMCOAT**

We would like to thank everyone who supported our show and we look forward to next years production.







Wearing the green shamrock, rosettes, badges, drowning the shamrock, parades, the image of celebrating the National feastday.

The day Patrick turned the sod, i.e. the first day of spring.

Gardeners traditionally planted their first early potatoes, weather permitting, it was not unusual to have snowfalls on the feast day, indeed our parade was cancelled once in the late 70s because of snow.

Traditionally the band paraded after 11.30am mass and afterwards people went to Croke Park to watch the Railway Cup football and hurling finals, or to Baldoyle races for the opening of the flat season. Others regularly visited the Hills of Tara and Slane and for some unknown reason Allen?

In the war years there were military parades composed of the Band, L.D.F and L.S.F and a detachment from the army.

On the cessation of hostilities, the parade resorted to the band again.

The instigation of Dublin's Industrial Parade drew many spectators from Maynooth, until some enterprising locals inaugurated our own parade, which in a few years grew into the largest outside of Dublin, and is still growing attracting entries from the hinterland and further afield. Indeed our parade was the vanguard for which other local towns and villages followed in latter years.

One event of our celebration sadly missed, the annual Ceili and Old Time dances, on St. Patricks night, which ceased when the Nolan family sold their hall in the mid 1950s.



A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS

William Farrelly, a young Maynooth man, at the tender age of eighteen, has already achieved what most young boys/girls can only dream of.

To date William has received four caps representing his country playing soccer at various levels. A son to Liam and Christina, he was born on the 24th October 1981 and is living at 856 Greenfield along with his sister Tanya and brother Paul.

As in many cases, William's first introduction to the game was participating in the general melee of pursuing a very elusive round plastic object up and down his estate. His father "smoker" one of the best centre forwards Maynooth has ever produced, recognised, from an early stage, William's flair and enthusiasm for the sport and became very involved and supportive of him.

William joined Rangers F.C. in the E.B.S. South Dublin schoolboy's league under seven section. Here he remained for seven seasons, playing centre forward for the team enjoying moderate success, as when Rangers won the under tens League and cup.

William then signed up with Belvedere F.C. again assuming the centre forward role in the team. This move proved to be a great success. In his first year with Belvedere, he had a trial with Crew Alexandria when he was just fifteen years of age.

A further testament to his ability and talent was proven when Belvedere was beaten in the all Ireland under seventeen cup final but, nontheless, William was chosen as "MAN OF THE MATCH". It is a rare ocassion for a player of a defeated team to receive this honour.

His other achievements during this period were playing for Dublin and Leinster schoolboys in inter provincial competitions.

During this period also, William's prowess in front of goal did not go unnoticed and he was offered further trials with English clubs under age teams. Recounting his experience and impressions of these trials William recalls how, when trying out in England, with Crew Alexandria for one week, he felt homesick, missing his family and friends.

While on trial with Sunderland, he toured with them in France at under sixteen level and played in three games. He was brought on in the first two and scored the winning goals and was chosen to start for the third game. Again playing under seventeen he played for Wimbledon against Everton.

William also had trials with Millwall during this period but he was disapointed with his time there as he felt their programme for trials was inadaguate.

However, his trial with Coventry proved more rewarding and during the summer of "99 he played for the club in an under nineteens tournament.

In February of "99, while studying after school in Maynooth Post Primary, William's father arrived to tell him that he had been chosen for the Irish schools under eighteen squad, and would have to leave immediately. After frantic preparations they met up with the rest of the squad in Dublin Airport, and from there he departed to take part in the first fixture of the Celtic cup, a tournament comprised of teams from England.

Northern Ireland, Wales and of course Ireland,

The first match was against the "Old enemy" England, at Portman road (Ipswich Town), and William can still recall the emotion he felt coming out of the tunnel onto the pitch in front of a crowd of over three thousand spectators and how proud he felt when he stood to attention with the rest of the Irish squad for the playing of our national anthem. It was in this match that William obtained his first cap, brought on with ten minutes to go, assisting Ireland in its two nil victory.

The next game saw Ireland travelling north to Dungannon where William secured his second cap by coming on in the last twenty minutes and scoring the winner, leaving the final score, Northern Ireland one, Ireland two.

Playing at home against Wales, at Waterford R.S.C. grounds, William was selected to play from the start. Earning his third cap, he found the back of the net once again, with Ireland victorious, by four goals to nil and winning the Celtic cup in the process.

In January of this year, he was selected by Brian Kerr to play against a Northern Ireland under eighteen selection in a friendly in Newry. Introduced to the game in the second half. William gained his fourth cap.

On reading the above account of William's sporting achievements one could be forgiven for thinking that there was not enought spare time left for anything else. Not so!

William has been playing Gaelic football with Maynooth since he was nine years of age. Here again he has showed his commitment and involvement to his sport. As recently as last year, William was playing at wing forward position when Maynooth beat St. Kevins in the Kildare Intermediate Championship final in Newbridge. In being both

a committed Gaelic and soccer player, William is following in a family tradition.

At the moment, William's is serving his apprenticeship as a brick layer under the guidance of "BERSO'S" skilful and experienced eyes, and though quite coy about his future plans, he did confess his ambition to play with one of the Dublin teams in the national league and who knows thereafter.

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
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
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TRACING YOUR ANCESTORS

As we know St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in many areas around the world and it may be the event that gets people to consider gathering information about their Irish ancestors. There are also a growing number of people in Ireland who are putting together their family trees.

Most visitors to this country don't leave enought time to trace their ancestors. Having spent a very short time on a work exchange programme in the Geneaology Office in Kildare Street, I found that visitors usually left their ancestor tracing until the last two days of their holiday.

In order to gain any headway in the search for ones ancestors it is necessary to try and have certain basic information - names, place of birth (townland, parish or county), idea of dates and religion. The Geneaology Office as part of the National Library offer a searching service for a fee. They can be contacted on the Internet at www.heanet.ie/ natlib/family research, html. For Americans it is especially easy for them to get a lot of information before they come to Ireland through Family Search: Internet Genealogy Service. This is a resource compiled by the Church of the Latter Day Saints in Utah for tracing ones ancestors. Their website is http://www.familysearch.org/.

For those who have more time on their hands and who may not have connection to the web, tracing your Irish Ancestors by John Grenham (Gill and Macmillan, 1992) is an excellent quide for the visitor and Irish person alike. It gives information on and where major sources are available e.g. civil records, wills, emigration records, registry of deeds, newspapers and directories. It also has sections on occupations, a county source list and research services to mention some

We have all heard at some stage of the relative who emigrated to America and who lost contact with the family. not an uncommon situation. The website Ancestry, com (which charges a small quarterly or annual fee) provides access to a large number of American searchable databases such as social security death index, vital, church, military, census records, court, land and probate records, immigration and naturalisation records, directories, shipping lists, periodicals and newspapers. It also provides a notice board facility where one can post messages and receive answers about relative(s). A newsletter will be sent via your e-mail on a regular basis, but it is the databases that are the strength of this website. Well worth using even for a guarter session. 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

FINE GAEL NOTES

Meadowbrook Link

The Leixlip Area Committee, at its recent meeting on February 4th last, viewed the proposed alignment of the new Meadowbrook Road link.

The road will be 7.3 meters wide with a cycle lane and footpath. Residents of Kingsbry, whose property bounds the proposed road link will be pleased that the Council has agreed to include a two metre high wall along the line of the road as a security measure. A map outlining the proposed alignment will be on public display during the coming week, said Cllr. Griffin.

Cllr. Senan Griffin welcomed the Council's decision to accept his proposal for the erection of a proposed wall, which he said, was a matter of grave concern for the residents adjacent to the proposed Meadowbrook link: Kingsbry, Meadowbrook and the estates of Rathcoffey Road. Work is expected to commence about September 2000.

Doctor's Lane

Cllr. Senan Griffin, said that the closure of Doctor's Lane was discussed at the recent Leixlip Area Meeting, where a further report highlighted the difficulties in placing traffic calming measures along the Lane.

The engineer in charge made suggestions for the continuation of the Main Street footpath along the Dublin Road, so as to prevent traffic entering the Lane from the Dublin Road end, but he accepted that this solution could have complications for three or four houses on the Dunboyne Road. A detailed plan for the area is to be prepared and Cllr. Senan Griffin insisted that this plan should include in its design, proposals for the elimination of surface water in this area.

Provision of Wall at Moyglare Village

The provision of a front boundary wall at Moyglare Village was discussed at length at the recent Leixlip Area Committee, when Councillors were informed that the cost would be in the region of £35,000.

The cost factor came as a surprise to the Area Councillors and it was agreed that all applications for grants will be discussed at the Discretionary Grant meeting in early March.

Traffic Calming Measures

The County Manager has agreed, said Cllr. Senan Griffin, to provide adequate funds to pay for the construction of a pilot traffic calming measure scheme at River Forest, Leixlip.

Kildare County Council engineers have prepared a design which, if successful, will be used throughout the County. Monies to provide such measures will be made available in the Estimates and it is hoped to construct as many traffic calming schemes as possible.

Toll Bridge - Liffey Bridge, Leixlip

The Department of the Environment, following a motion from Cllr. Senan Griffin, has agreed to provide a sum of £20,000 to carry out a survey on the condition of the toll bridge at Leixlip.

Flooding in Dun Carrig, Leixlip

Kildare County Council engineers, in response to a motion from Cllr. Senan Griffin, have provided a costing of £100,000 to correct the problem of flooding at Dun Carrig Estate, Leixlip.

Cllr. Griffin, in refusing to accept the costing, stated that he

could visualise how the Council could be held responsible if the flooding continues to occur at a number of houses in the estate.

Flooding is caused during periods of heavy rainfall, cascading from the Captain's Hill, down the retaining wall into the rear of a number of houses in Dun Carrig.

Cllr. Senan Griffin has expressed the view that the situation is totally unacceptable to the residents concerned and should be corrected by laying a surface water pipe along Captain's Hill.

Main Street, Maynooth and Main Street, Leixlip

The County Secretary, Mr. Tommy Skehan, has informed Cllr. Senan Griffin that a snag list has been prepared for the Main Streets of Maynooth and Leixlip and that this list has been handed to the contractors. The quality of some of the finished work leaves a lot to be desired said Cllr. Griffin and requested that urgent correction is required before further deterioration takes place.

Street names from the Map of Historical Towns 1750 should be used when street nameplates are being erected in the towns, said Cllr. Senan Griffin.

Sports and Recreational Facilities for 2000

Capital Expenditure has been increased by 475% from £8.5m in 1997 to £49m in the Estimates for 2000. Deputy Bernard Durkan was told in a recent reply from the Minister for Tourism, Sport and Recreation in response to his continued representations for additional facilities at both local and national level.

- The breakdown is as follows:
- Sports Capital Programme from the National Lottery 15.2m
- Swimming Pools £15m
- 50 metre Swimming Pool almost £6m.
- Croke Park ; final £6m of £20m support.

Applications are open to local community based projects, national and regional projects. Latest date for receipt of applications is 5.00 p.m on February 11th 2000.

Location of sporting facilities at national and regional level, is done on a consultative basis with national organisations and with the Irish Sports Council.

Ireland's Water Quality

Water. Water everywhere and still the Minister of the Environment does not believe that the EU is taking Ireland to court on the poor quality of its water.

Deputy Bernard Durkan has made numerous representations to the Minister for the Environment regarding this issue but the Minister's only defence is to refer to the report on Water Quality in Ireland 1995-1997 for further information.

The report clearly identifies localised problems due, for example, to bacteriological contamination and elevated nitrate values. Local Authorities, Deputy Durkan was told have overall responsibility for their own areas and the E.P.A. is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of information databases.

Housing Needs

46,000 houses, both public and private were completed in 1999. The National Development Plan provides the

framework to facilitate the provision of 500,000 houses over the next ten years. £7bn investment for social and affordable housing will ensure that the social housing needs of over 90,000 households will be met with Government assistance over the period of the Plan (10 years?).

Deputy Bernard Durkan in commenting on the Minister's reply said that if this plan is as effective over the next ten years as in the past year, it will take twenty years to stabilise the shortage of houses and another twenty to meet the housing needs - this is totally unacceptable to the many people on housing lists throughout the country and who are now urgently in need of a home, he said.

Did you know ...

That according to the 1991 Census, there were 81,424 private rented dwellings in 1991 compared with 90,315 ten years earlier. These represent 8% and 10% respectively of the total number of households.

The 1997 Labour Force Survey indicated that there were 131,600 private rented dwellings representing 11% of the total. Corresponding information has been collected in the Quarterly National Household Survey in quarter three of 1998 and 1999, which the CSO hopes to be in a position to publish shortly.

"I am totally astounded by this reply", said Deputy Durkan. "It is clear to me that apart from the Minister and his Department not being able to resolve the housing crisis, they don't seem to think it worthwhile to offer a comprehensive and informative reply to serious questions" he said.

Widespread Flooding

The Planning and Development Bill 1999, will allow local authorities to make it an objective of development plans to regulate, restrict and control development in areas at risk of flooding (whether inland or coastal), the Minister recently informed Deputy Bernard Durkan following his continued representations regarding areas of the country constantly under flooding during 1999.

Maynooth Castle

Commencement on the site at Maynooth Castle is scheduled to begin in February 2000 with a view to completion by year end, Deputy Bernard Durkan has recently been informed by the Minister.

The first stage is a stand-alone scheme, which involved the development of the ground floor vaulted areas for exhibition purposes together with access to the first floor and provision of small-scale guide and visitor facilities.

Estimates cost of Phase I has risen to $\pounds1.3m$ based on tenders received. $\pounds110,000$ was spend at end of 1999 and the total expenditure in the current year is expected to reach $\pounds1.1$ million.

Deputy Bernard Durkan in welcoming the commencement of works at the Castle, said it was imperative that both phases be completed and urged the Minister to ensure that the necessary funding would be made available.

Donadea Castle

Donadea Castle is not in State ownership and Duchas, the Heritage Service has no plans for its restoration.

The Castle is a recorded National Monument and therefore is afforded legal protection under the National Monument

(amendment) Act, 1994. Under Section 12(3) of this Act, the owner or occupier must give two months written notice of any proposals to carry out works at the site.

Deputy Durkan in commenting on the Minister's reply said he was disappointed that such an amenity could not be developed and the Castle restored to its former glory. It would benefit the local area and surrounding environs and would attract many tourists to that area of Kildare.

Council Secures An Additional £360,000 for Maynooth Main Street Improvement Works

Council officials advised Councillors at Leixlip Area Meeting on 4th February that the Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) had agreed to give a further £360,000 for Maynooth Main Street Improvement works. When this is added to the Special Development Levies on Kavanaghs Mills (£225,000) and the Maynooth Shopping Centre (£68,000) there should be enough money to complete the improvement works on Mill Street/Kilcock Road and Carton Avenue entrance/Dublin Road.

A plan will now be drawn up for this work for the approval of the Area Committee. In line with Cllr. John McGinley's motion, signage for all streets and back lanes will be part of this plan and it is hoped to have proposals for the next area meeting.

Parson Street

Cllr. John McGinley asked the engineers at the Area Meeting to implement the agreed traffic calming measures for Parson Street without any further delay. This was agreed and as the County Manager was present it should happen. Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration of the Area Meeting:

"that the damaged wall in Parson Street be rebuilt without any further delay"

Iarnrod Eireann Planning Application in Silken Vale:

Cllr. John McGinley has objected to this Planning Application for "Access Maintenance gate" by larnrod Eireann, from Silken Vale (adjacent to No.27). There is no need for such a gate and larnrod Eireann should be told to use their own property to gain access.

Cllr. McGinley has asked that this Planning Application be included on the Agenda for the Area Meeting on 3rd March.

Meadowbrook Link With Straffan Road on Public Display:

Plans for the Meadowbrook Link with the Straffan road went on Public Display in Maynooth Library on 11 February. They will be on display until 10 March and the public have until 24 March to make submissions to the County Secretary. Clir. John McGinley has already asked that his proposals for piping the stream at Meadowbrook, joining up the back garden walls and creating two new green areas be included and this has been agreed by the Design Engineer. Cllr. McGinley has also asked that the green area triangle, between the new road and Kingsbry (at the Straffan Road) be hard core and dome shaped. instead of landscaping. The plan includes for a 2m wall to be built adjacent to the Kingsbry hedge. Cllr. McGinley would appreciate if residents sent him copies of any submissions that they are making to the council and if they want any clarifications please ring him at 6285293H or 7026536W.

Bond Bridge Plans Goes on Public Display

The Plans for Bond Bridge went on Public Display in

Maynooth Library on 9 February. They will be on display until 8 March and the public have until 22 March to make submissions to the County Secretary. The objections already made by Cllr. McGinley will be taken into account i.e. vehicular access to the station, stone finish on walls, pedestrian entrance to the College.

Parking of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) in Housing Estates

As a follow on from Deputy Emmet Stagg's successful initiative in Celbridge Cllr. John McGinley has written to all Residents Associations in Maynooth asking them if they have a problem with HGV's parking in their Estates. The Council are now preparing a scheme to ban the parking of HGV's in a number of housing estates in Celbridge as a result of Deputy Stagg motion. When Residents Associations identify a problem with HGV's Cllr. McGinley will ask the Leixlip Area Committee to adopt a similar policy for Maynooth.

Rockfield/Parklands/Railpark Green Triangle

Following requests from Residents Cllr. McGinley has asked the Leixlip area Committee of the Council to agree to fund the installation of additional Public Lighting in this location. The improved lighting is required in the interests of public safety and to help discourage young people congregating in the area. Cllr. McGinley has asked for three double lights to be installed.

Area at Bottom of Kingsbry Adjoining Meadowbrook

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council agreed to remove the slabs from this area, to lay a 2m wide path and to landscape either side. The work has not been carried out so far because the Councillor cannot get a contractor to do it. The Celtic Tiger has them all too busy for such a small job. Cllr. McGinley has asked the Council to combine this job with other small jobs to make it more attractive for contractors. If their are any contractors willing to do such work please contact the Area Engineer, Elish Murray, at the council Office in Maynooth.

Traffic Route Public Lighting on Rathcoffey road:

Despite the fact that the E.S.B. submitted an estimate for this work ten weeks ago the Council have still not issued the E.S.B. with an order to do the work. These lights have been paid for by the residents of Parsons Hall and Castledawson through development levies on their houses.

The lives of people are being put at risk through the inaction of the Council. All it takes is a letter to the E.S.B. instructing them to proceed with the work. Cllr. McGinley has demanded that the Council do so immediately.

Doctors Lane

The Road Design Engineer advised the Area Committee there were two options to make Doctors Lane safer:

A. The construction of the works agreed in the Maynooth town Improvement Plan in 1996 with the omission of the bollards at the end of the lane. Emergency vehicles could

gain access by mounting the foothpath and other vehicles would be deterred from using the lane. The estimated cost is £25,000 to £30,000

B. The provision of ramps on the lane at a cost of £15,000.

Seeing that the money is now in place to complete town Improvement Works it is likely that Option A will be the one agreed.

£776,000 for Barberstown to Maynooth Road

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the recent announcement by the Department of the Environment of a further allocation of £776,000 for improvement works on the Barberstown to Maynooth Road.

A sum of £200,000 was provided in 1999 for works at Dowdstown and Windgates and the funding of £776,000 will allow for 1.4km of improvement works in 2000. The work to be undertaken this year will be the section from Windgates to Barberstown Cross.

Obelisk left high and dry

The Minister for Arts has advised Deputy Stagg that restoration works to the Obelisk will not start in 2000 and that the Department are concentrating on the restoration of Castletown House.

Deputy Stagg has indicated that this is not acceptable given the 8% increase in the Minister's Capital Budget in 2000. He further indicated that the restoration of the Obelisk should be treated as a stand alone project and not linked to Castletown House Restoration Works. Deputy Stagg will pursue the matter further with Minister de Valera.

One Stop Shop on Hold

In 1998 Minister Dempsey approved funding of £200,000 for the provision of a Council One Stop Shop in Maynooth. Since then nothing has happened.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised this matter with the Minister and he has advised that the Council are at present in negotiations in relation to the purchase of a site in Naas for a new Headquarters for the Council. The provision of one stop shop will be looked at following the completion of this process.

Deputy Stagg has indicated that the provision of the one stop shop in Maynooth will make the Council more accessible for residents of the area and that he would raise the issue with the Co. Manager.

Maynooth Castle Restoration

Deputy Enmet Stagg has been advised by the Minister for Arts that a contractor has been appointed for Phase 1 of the restoration works to Maynooth Castle and that work will commence in February.

Over £1 Million will be spent on the works which include the development of the ground floor vaulted areas for exhibition purposes together with access to the 1st Floor. Small scale guide and visitor facilities will also be provided.

Deputy Stagg will press the Minister to provide funding in 2001 for Phase 2 of the restoration works which include the provision of an auditorium and roof on the Castle Keep.

£20 Refuse Waiver Application Fee abolished

The attempt by the Kildare Co. Council Manager to impose a £20 Refuse Waiver application fee has been rescinded by Kildare Co. Council.

Deputy Emmet Stagg forced the abolition of the fee at the Council meeting held on Monday 14th February.

Pensioners and people on Social Welfare should now apply for their waiver.

Permanent Recognition granted for Maynooth Gaelscoil

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Minister for Education that he has granted permanent recognition to Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich, Maynooth.

The recognition is effective from 1st September 1999 and will have an immediate benefit of increasing the grant aid for rent to the Gaelscoil from 75% to 95%. The school at present pay £300 towards the rent of their premises and this will now reduce to £60 per month.

The principal benefit of the move from Temporary Recognition to Permanent Recognition is that the Department will now grant aid the site purchase and building of a new school for Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich.

Deputy Stagg congratulates the staff and parents of the Gaelscoil on the successful conclusion of this campaign and assured them of his support and that of Cllr. John McGinley's in their campaign to find a suitable site for a new school.

With the emergence of a pluralist and multicultural Ireland, Educate Together is set to expand as an integrated model of educational provision. This expansion will be greatly helped by the recent government decision to enhance financial support for the establishment of Educate Together schools. New school update

As well as setting out the ethos for the school and formulating policy on other strategic issues, the executive committee nominates members onto the school board of management, which is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the school along

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
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

St. Patrick's Day Parade - A Huge Success





The Newsletter congratulates the people of Kilcock on their magnificent campaign against the proposed incinerator for their area. Good sense prevailed when An Bord Pleanala upheld Kildare Co. Council's decision to refuse planning permission for the development. But, as was pointed out at the last meeting of Maynooth Community Council, we cannot afford to be complacent following this decision. On planning grounds the siting of a hazardous waste incinerator in Kilcock made no sense. But the door was left slightly ajar when the Co. Council passed a material contravention of its own development plan to zone the land from agricultural to light industry without, apparently, having concrete plans for the rezoned land. Later, the Council had the good sense to reject the incinerator plans but it could be argued that the whole episode could have been avoided in the first place.

On the wider issue of waste disposal, the government, local authorities and us, as citizens, are going to have to reverse recent trends which has seen the amount of household waste increase by 23% in the three years 1995-98. Nonagricultural waste was a staggering 15.4 million tonnes in 1998. The Minister for the Environment called a recent Environmental Protection Agency report a 'wake up call' when it outlined the scale of the problem and showed that we are still dumping 90% of our waste in landfill sites. The demand for landfill and even incineration will increase unless recycling is actively promoted by our local authorities and becomes part of how we, as householders, deal with domestic waste. The statistics are depressing, 95% of metal, 85% of paper and 70% of glass end up in landfill sites. The amount of paper recycled has actually fallen in recent years. Locally Kildare Co. Council, in co-operation with Rehab, provides a collection point for glass, cans and textiles in the Maynooth Shopping Centre car park. While this is laudable it is not enough. All householders availing of the Council's refuse collection service should be actively encouraged to sort their domestic refuse so that recycling becomes an integral part of waste management. Instead we are provided with a large wheelie bin which is almost an incentive to maximize dumping. The real answer to 'No Incinerator' or 'No Landfill' is to recycle. It is up to us to do it. And up to the Co. Council to provide the facilities to make it happen.



This month a new Community Council will be elected and the Council enters its fifteenth year of existence since it was reconstituted in 1986. Like all similar organisations it has gone through a life cycle - high levels of activity at the beginning, various crises - financial and otherwise - and then settling down to play an important, if unobtrusive, role in the life of the town. Back in 1986 Maynooth was a very different place. For a start it was about half the size it is now. The country was in recession and unemployment was very high. Over the years the Council has run a series of Social Employment and Community Employment Schemes and has played no small part, in co-operation with FAS, in training hundreds of local people for the jobs market. At one point there were over 50 people employed by the Council in various schemes. We now live in very different circumstances. The Maynooth area is experiencing labour shortages, the Community

Council is sponsoring just one Community Employment Scheme and is finding it difficult to fill the available places on the scheme. All this has important implications both for the Council and for the range of services it provides for the community. The production of the Newsletter, administrative and secretarial backup for the range of activities of the Council and the provision of commercial bureau services for the public can not be sustained by eight or ten part time staff where once there were over thirty. Redefining its aims and objectives and refocusing its resources will be an important task for the incoming Council.

Muireann Ní Bhroilcháin on behalf of the Community Council offered condolences to Padraic O'Murchú and his family on the very sad and tragic death of his wife.

Business Park

Ray Grahen presented a very fine brochure and outlined plans for the proposed new Business Park at Monevcoolev. Maynooth, Tom McMullan, Chairman said that he felt there was 99% support for the project. It was also raised that the two families that live close to the proposed Business Park had genuine fears about flooding.

Senan Griffin stated that the Bennett Family had experienced serious flooding when the motor-way was built.

Ray Grahen said he has talked to the residents and felt he had reassured them that this would not be a problem. John McGinley raised concern about the flow of the water. It was stated that it is intended to have several ponds on the complex and this will make a huge difference to controlling the flow of water.

Paul Croghan stated he was worried about the flow of traffic out of the Park. It was stated that with the introduction of a roundabout, it would make a huge difference to traffic coming into the town and out as well. Also there are to be filter-lights and this should help the flow of traffic.\

It was generally felt that this was a very fine project and to be welcomed.

St. Patrick's Day Parade

John McGinley thanked all involved with the organising of the Parade. He thanked Freda Kelleher, the office staff who are under-staffed at the moment and Committee members.

It was stated that they failed to get a Northern band but hoped for better luck next year.

Summer Project

Claire O'Rourke stated that the Summer Project would go ahead this year. It would run for two weeks again.

Kilcock Incinerator

Tom McMullon congratulated the people of Kilcock on their great victory on having An Bord Pleanála refuse planning permission for the incinerator. Senan Griffin paid tribute to Kildare County Council for rejecting the plan in the first place. He also voiced a note of warning; he felt that the use of the word premature in An Bord Pleanála's reasons for rejecting the incinerator could mean that a new application could succeed.

He also felt that if proper access roads had been in place the plan might have been in trouble.

John McGinley sounded a note of warning about planning permission being given to such projects as the one in Kilcock without knowing what is the final plan. it was also felt that we should look at our own recycling needs.

Paul Croghan felt that a town the size of Maynooth should have a waste recycling plan.

Office

The office is nearly finished and looks well. It was felt that a proper reception area should be available. Muireann Ní Bhroilcháin thanked all who helped with moving furniture to the new office and who helped in any way.

Newsletter

Peter Connell stated that better co-operation between the Editorial Board and the Treasurer should be put in place. It was also felt that a three year funding plan should also be set-up.

Bond Bridge

The plan is on display now. Paul Croghan asked was it not possible to retain the facade of the old bridge 'Canal'. A submission to be sent to Kildare County Council.

New Drama Group

Paul Croghan congratulated the new Drama Group 'An Nuadha Players" in Maynooth.

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
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WOODLANDS RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION




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I.C.A. NOTES

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
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MAYNOOTH FLOWER AND GARDEN CLUB

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
MAYNOOTH ATHLETIC CLUB

David Cambell's 3rd place in the 800 metres Senior Indoor National Championship was a great performance, as the two athletes who defeated him went on to win European Medals two weeks later.

Mark Carroll and James Nolan started February by finishing first and second in the Wannamaker Mile in Madision square Garden. They finished February with Carroll as European champion over 3,000 Metres and Nolan Taking silver in the 1.500.

They were the First Irish athletes to win European indoor medals since Earnon Coughlan in 1979 and Marcus OSullivan in 1985.

On February 13th Nolan took the National 800 metres title with Carroll second and David just over a second back in 3rd place. The previous day in Nenagh, Maynooth's David Cambell won his heat to claim one of the five places on the starting line.

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The other two finalists were U.C.D.'s Michael Wilcox and Paul Campbell from D.C.U., who had won the Scottish Championships and the Welsh Games in the previous few weeks.

David's indoor experience may be confident to Nenagh but he impressed earlier this year when he won the Irish Junior championship, the Leinster under 18 title and the AAI Senior Open Games 800 metres in January.

However Sunday was a major step up in class and a very physical first 400 metres saw David struggle to hold the lead and inside lane. At half way James Nolan unleashed a kick that was to prove the winner.

Mark Carroll came from the back of the field for 2nd place and David battled on gamely to get 3rd place.

National coach Dr. Orywall was very happy that David finished within 2.5 seconds of two of Europe's top runners and has hopes that he will improve enough to run in the world Junior championships in Chile this year.

As his more famous rivals headed on towards historic medal wins David has a busy few months ahead studying for his Leaving Cert. However during his school holidays at Easter, he heads to Poland for two weeks training. Ironically James Nolan is travelling on the same trip.

The end of February also saw David Jolley's hard training pay off when he finished 4th in the Indoor vets Championships in Nenagh over 1,500 and 3,000 metres.

Training has resumed at the GAA field on Wednesday nights at 7pm and all are welcome.

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PRICE WATCH

Petrol prices have gone up by 20% in the last year reflecting a huge increase in the price of crude oil. It is now quite difficult to find a service station in the Dublin region where it is possible to buy unleaded petrol for less than £3 per gallon. Of course prices are no longer displayed per gallon and, anyway, most people, when they pull into a service station, buy £10 or £20 worth. This means that customers are not very sensitive to price differences betweeen one service station and the next. Competition between stations is supposed to keep prices keen but this only works if the consumer is price conscious.

Below is a list showing prices of unleaded petrol at selected stations as of March 21st. This shows a 7.5% price difference between the dearest station (Maxol Maynooth) and the cheapest (Statoil on the quays in Dublin). This represents a difference of 23p per gallon or £2.55 for a full tank. Of course some stations are self-service and others have manned pumps. In fairness to Maxol in Maynooth they provide such a service but customers should know that they may be paying extra for it. ESSO in Maynooth has been one of the cheapest stations over the past few months but increased prices just before March 21st when we carried out our survey.

Crude oil prices have fallen a little in the last three weeks and are predicted to fall further in the coming months. We hope this will be reflected at the petrol pumps. The Newsletter will continue to keep a close eye on prices.

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

MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

In a break with tradition, Kildare County Council have appointed a firm of consultants, Brady, Shipman Martin, to prepare the forthcoming Maynooth Town Plan. Local planning officials, more familiar with the local scene, would normally have this responsibility and their exclusion from the process this time around is a source of regret. The consultants have requested submissions from the public before April 3rd, What are the parameters within which the Plan should be prepared?

The first consideration is that a population target of 12,300 has been agreed for the year 2006, when the next plan must commence. This would be a Maynooth 44% bigger than today, with approximately 66% more cars on our roads. However, our local councillors have agreed to allocate a total of 150 new acres at a density of 24 people per acre in this Plan. Together with unused lands from the past plan this could enable a population of 14,192 in Maynooth within the next five years, a 66% increase and approximately double the number of local cars on our roads. It was against even more horrendous proposals that Maynooth Planning Alliance was established in 1996 to oppose. While the acreage then was almost double that being proposed today, it is important to take stock of what past planning decisions have left us with as we embark on the next five year exercise.

A lot has changed in Maynooth over the past five or six years. The construction of Pebble Hill, Parson's Hall, Castle Dawson, Lyreen Park, Moyglare Abbey, Glenroyal Apartments, Mill Street Apartments and other new residential areas have increased the town's population and traffic to a level probably in excess of 10,000 today. However the main feature of life in Maynooth today is undoubtedly the traffic problem.

A survey of traffic on the Straffan Road in 1996 counted 3865 vehicles over a six hour period. A recent prediction for three years hence predicts a similar amount during the peak one hour period. This is indeed a horrendous increase and represents one car a second on the Straffan Road. As anyone who tries driving in this kind of traffic knows, long queues at junctions, side streets, and exits from e.g. the Railway Station are the inevitable result and gridlock quickly follows. Some areas are likely to suffer greatly in the next few years. Major residential development at the Mill Street/ Movglare Road junction combined with the trebling of population envisaged for Kilcock over the next five years will reduce the Kilcock Road/Main Street to a standstill for much longer periods and bottle up residents of the Moyglare area in a similar fashion to that which has afflicted the Parson Street/ Main Street junction in recent times. Some alleviation of the Parson Street problem will however take place with the completion of the Meadowbrook link road, and some easing of the Dublin Road traffic will hopefully follow the completion of the Intel-Hewlett Packard interchange. But no new Kilcock interchange is envisaged before 2005 so the west and north of the town face a bleak traffic future.

Maynooth Planning Alliance believes the proposals currently being touted are in breach of the Strategic Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area which will become mandatory when the current Planning Bill becomes law in early summer. These guidelines were prepared by no other than Brady Shipman Martin and recommended restrictions on the growth of Maynooth which were not incorporated in the County

Development Plan by Kildare County Council. The reasons why you as a resident will be asked to endure a serious reduction in the quality of your life are political and economic. You know the issues at this stage and you know who will benefit and who will lose out. Equally you know which of our local councillors are seeking to increase the burden on you and which would be willing to reduce it. If not you should find out urgently!

Maynooth Planning Alliance advocates the following for the forthcoming Maynooth Development Plan:

*That the County Plan should be revisited to bring the Maynooth land allocations into compliance with the Strategic Planning Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Region.

* That phasing of new residential land should be geared towards minimising additional traffic on the Mill Street -Straffan Road route with a substantive component of any new residential land only released for residential development at the end of the Plan.

* That development-led road plans are not acceptable since the cost of the road (if ever completed) is greatly exceeded by the new traffic generated. Development-led planning of this kind is what has left us in the present position.

* That no 'donations' of land be given to private individuals/ private clubs as the price of rezoning

*That the plan incorporate a clause limiting the release of zoned lands until the end of its validity should the 2001 Census and the population planned for the already committed lands at that time exceed the population target for 2006.





Traffic Calming Measures

Cllr. Senan Griffin has submitted a motion to Kildare County Council to have traffic calming measures put in place on the Moyglare Road beside the two schools in order that traffic can be forced to slow down to accomodate the school children. The same traffic problem arises at Medowbrook Avenue / Meadowbrook Crescent, and Senan Griffin has demanded that raised ramps (brick) be put in place during the construction of the new Meadowbrook link to the Straffan Road.

Lights

The Leixlip Area Committee at it's March meeting decided to allocate lighting at

Three double headed lights at Rockfield / Parklands / Rail Park, (it is hoped that the erection of these lights will eliminate the antisocial behaviour in the area).

A new light opposite No 33 Carton Court, (this light (b) was agreed previously but the ESB missed out having it erected).

The Area Committee further agreed to a proposal by (c) Senan Griffin that the Celbridge Road be lit from development levy funds ... it required six/eight lights.

Respite Care Unit


Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to expedite the granting of full permission to Eastern Health Board for a fifty bed respite care unit at the Harbour. Maynooth. The E.H.B. last June promised prompt action on this proposal and to date planning permisson has not been availed of, thereby preventing commencement of work on the project. This new unit will now come under the South Western Area Board. Deputy Bernard Durkan will continue to pressurise the Department of Health to provide adequate finance for this worthwhile project.

Discretionary Grant

Clr. Senan Griffin will be seeking finance from the discretionary fund to upgrade the footpaths at Rail Park Estate, Mill Street (beside the church), Leinster Street, improvement of the road surface at Buckley's Lane / Fagan's Lane. (I will also be seeking funding for projects in Leixlip.)

Bus Bay / Terminus

At a meeting with representatives of Dublin Bus recently the



Area Committee outlined their concerns about the green areas opposite the Glenroval at the 66 Terminus.

Dublin Bus representative pointed out that the Bus bays in the Main Street were too small and that the terminus was not suitable for buses to pass each other comfortably. The Council engineer has agreed to inspect the terminus area to see if it can be improved.

Rejection of Incinerator Plan

Fine Gael branches throughout North Kildare welcome the rejection by An Bord Pleanala of the proposal by Thermal Waste Management to build an incinerator in Kilcock. It is particularly gratifying to note that the Board's rejection was purely on planning considerations as this was the basis for Deputy Bernard Durkan's and Councillor Senan Griffin's opposition to the proposal from the outset. It is to their credit that they persisted with this approach despite the pressure to adopt the more emotive and newsworthy issues which they correctly judged to be irrelevant at this juncture. Their approach was clearly vindicated by the fact that the Bord Pleanala enquiry focused on fourteen of the fifteen planning considerations raised in their personal objections to the proposal.

Both Deputy Durkan and Councillor Griffin are particularly pleased that the negative impact of the incinerator on the leisure and amenity value of the Royal Canal, which was highlighted in their objections, was accepted by the Bord which states

"The development by reason of its scale, height, and location in the vicinity of the Royal Canal, a recognised long distance walking route and an area of high amenity as set out in the County Development Plan, would seriously injure the visual and recreational amenities of the canal side environment which it is the policy of the Council to protect and develop."

The members wish to thank both their public representatives for the time and effort they devoted to defeating this proposal. They would particularly like to refer to Bernard Durkan's performance at the public enquiry in the Glenroyal Hotel which was acknowledged, by those who witnessed it, as a tour de force.

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Party Political

FIANNA FAIL CUMANN MAYNOOTH

A very successful fundraising breakfast was held by THE recently reformed Fianna Fail Cumann in Maynooth last Monday, 6th March in the GlenroYal Hotel. The event was attended by over seventy people representing various elements of the local community. Also in attendance was the Minister for Finance, Charlie McCreevy who, addressing the GROUP, praised the attendees for their impact on the economy and for contributing to the increased development and employment in the area. The Minister stated that County Kildare is now the envy of many counties throughout Ireland. given its current rate of improvement and wealth of opportunity. He noted that in 1987 1 million people were employed in Ireland and within the next two years this figure will have increased to 1.7 million. Maynooth has certainly played it's part in creating this success.

The Minister also praised the reactivated Fianna Fail Cumann in Maynooth on the success of this fundraiser, acknowledging that it was the first of its kind that he had seen which had been organised at cumann level. He complimented the newly elected committee on their hard work.

Clir.Paul Kelly, also addressed the breakfast, spoke on some of the latest improvements which are on their way to Maynooth. He announced that the long-awaited Bond Bridge project would be commencing in the coming months at a cost of £1.5 million. Councillor Kelly also raised the issue of the doubling of the rail line between Maynooth and Clonsilla, which is currently taking place. From January 2001, Maynooth is envisaged to have a twenty minute service to Dublin. Finally, Cllr. Kelly mentioned that the Meadowbrook link road now looks likely to go ahead in the near future.

The Maynooth Cumann welcomed any new members interested in joining the cumann and announced that the next meeting of the cumann will take place on April 10th at 8.30pm in the Glenroyal Hotel, Straffan Road.

FLIGHT FROM THE LAND

A traditional way of life has been deteriorating since the famine, with the odd fluctuation through the years. I lived with the horse era and the slow transition during the war until the 1950's to the tractor era. Those days when large estate were decimated by the land commission. When These 23-35 acre farms supported the farmer and in some enterprising small holdings., two or more sons or daughters working full time depending on the intensity of their particular operation. The ever expanding scheme of rural electrification was a boom milking machines, water pumps and in the home washing machines etc. which in turn relieved the woman of the house of inhibiting chores and reduced her working day from 16-12 hour day. The number of hired land operatives dwindled from average of 5 or on moderate farm to 2 and nowadays nil. This trend started with the farm operatives strike of 1946-47 and continued with modern mechanisation. Those finepre E.E.C. days the average mixed farms consisted of hay, grain, potatoes, sweeds, crops, with a couple of milk cows, pigs and the free range hens, ducks and geese forging around the farm yard.

These days the foundation of Macra in 1944 and the N.F.A. a decade later, there was an air of hope and expectancy reaching a high with our entry to the E.E.C. which led to mountains of over produced food.

Now in the first quarter of the new century we are advised that in this decade the number of full time farms will fall form 200,000 to 20,000 with 60,000 part time and 20,000 traditional.

Agricultural food, state that full time farmers will consist of approximately 70,000 gallons of milk quota or equivalent, to be viable 400 acres of tillage annually, 175 cattle or 1,160 ewes over 2 years transferring to 13000 commercial dairy farms, 7000 others encomasosing beef, sheep, tillage, pigs or poultry.

Part timers will concentrate on beef production, finally this 20,000 will not be all family farms but will consist of about 5,000 corporate and syndicate farms employing a manager. some hired operatives and contractors. "A return to our old estates proper".



LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Incinerator Rejected

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have welcomed the decision by An Bord Pleanala to refuse planning permission for the proposed toxic waste incinerator at Boycetown, Kilcock.

The community of Kilcock are to be congratulated on their success in the rejection of the proposal. Their concerns and the concerns of the people of North Kildare were vindicated in An Bord Pleanala's firm rejection of the proposal.

Public Lighting - Rathcoffey Road

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by Kildare Co. Council that an order has been placed with the E.S.B. to provide traffic route public lighting along Rathcoffey Road. The cost of the lighting is £26,500 and the E.S.B. have advised that the lighting will be provided within two weeks. This welcome news will make the Rathcoffey Road safer for residents of Parsons Hall and CastleDawson.

Deputy Stagg is now pressing the Council to provide a footpath along the front boundary of the estates to be financed from development levies.

Traffic Calming - Meadowbrook

Arising from the realignment of Bond Bridge and the provision of the Meadowbrook link to the Straffan Road, Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley are seeking the provision of traffic calming and safety measures along Meadowbrook Road.

Speed cushions are required at a number of points along the road and a pedestrian crossing is required near the Beaufield shops. Boundary walls are also required at the green areas of the road.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley will press the Council to include these measures as part of the Meadowbrook link project.

Redesign of 67A Bus Turning Point on the Straffan Road.

As a result of pressure from Cllr. John McGinley, Bus Eireann and Dublin Bus representatives attended Fridays Area Meeting. Cllr. McGinley asked them what they proposed for the 67A turning point as it is an eyesore at present. After much discussion it was agreed that the island needs to be reduced in size to allow two buses to pass in safety and that sufficient space should also be made at the road part of the island for pedestrians. Cllr. McGinley made the point that it might be better to hard core the remaining part of the island in a dome shape with decorative bricks. Council engineers will now draft a redesign for the approval of the Area Councillors and Dublin Bus.

Buses not pulling into Bus Bays on Main Street, Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley also asked the Dublin Bus reps to instruct their drivers to pull properly into the bus bays on Main Street, Maynooth. They are stopping on the roadway at present and this is leading to a build up of traffic in all directions. The Dublin Bus reps agreed to instruct their drivers accordingly.

Maynooth Town Improvement Works

Councillors were advised that the costings for completing Maynooths Improvement Works was as follows: £187,000

- Kilcock Road
- Mill Street
- Carton Gates/Doctors Lane £47,000 £228.000
- Leixlip Road

That gives a total costing of £537,000 and with £653,000 available from Development Levies and DTOP Grants it is Cllr. McGinleys view that all of the work can now be completed. This is very good news for Maynooth. It will be Cllr. McGinleys priority to get funding to bring the Back Lanes up to the Main Street standard.

£75.000

New Public Lighting Agreed

Cllr. McGinleys motion to have three double headed public lights installed in the green triangular area between Rockfield, Parklands and Railpark Estates was agreed at Fridays Area Meeting of the Council. The ESB will now be asked to install them at a cost of £2,500. 'Cllr. McGinleys motion to have a light installed outside house number 33 Carton Court was also agreed. It was also agreed to install three lights in the area of the horseshoe, top green, Leixlip Park and five lights on Distillery Lane, Leixlip.

Silken Vale, Cul-de-Sac of Houses 23-27

Cllr. John McGinley proposed at the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on Friday 3rd March that larnrod Eireann's Planning Application (Ref: 202/2000) for an 'access Maintenance Gate' adjacent to 27 Silken Vale be refused. He argued that:

· It would interfere with the residents private as the proposed access is via the boundary wall between the residents cul-desac and the railway station.

- It would constitute a security risk for residents.
- It would devalue properties in the area.

• There is no need for such an access as larnrod Eireann already have access from the station.

The other Councillors agreed to his proposal and the County Manager will have to take this unanimous recommendation of the Councillors into account when he is making his decision on the application.

The County Secretary has further advised Cllr. McGinley that it is the opinion of the Council that Planning Permission is not required for the development of the Generator Room and the Signal Box, which is being built inside the wall.


Maynooth's One Stop Shop

Maynooth gets a face lift

Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum are preparing a submission to Kildare County Council which will see new street signage erected and some historic street names being revived. The group is proposing that the new street signs will incorporate old names that were in use in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and also a new town crest. Old names such as Lime Kiln Row (now called Cross Lane), Charter School Lane (now called Convent Lane) and Canal Place (now called Leinster Street) have been identified from old maps of the town and it is being suggested that these names be included in the new street signage. In the second half of the eighteenth century the centre of the town was rebuilt by the Duke of Leinster and later in the nineteenth century many new street names came into being such as Doctor's Lane. The full details of their proposal is outlined in this issue of the Newsletter and the group is keen to receive feedback from local residents. Suggestions should be addressed to The Secretary, Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum, c/o The Library, Main Street.



EDITORAL

The new Communiity Council met for the first time in April. Reports elsewhere in the Newsletter outline the wide range of activities that the outgoing Council has been involved in over the previous year. In addition, the Council, in sponsoring a Community Employment Scheme, provides valuable training and work experience for fifteen local people hoping to reenter the workforce. On the debit side, however interest in the Community Council is at a fairly low level in the town with dozens of seats unfilled on the Council and whole areas of the town unrepresented. A number of the newer estates, whose residents might have most to gain from becoming involved in Community Council activies, have no members on the Councl while there is a marked absence of representatives from the older parts of Maynooth. The whole town centre area, for example, has no members on the Council. Some of this may be down to a growing apathy which seems to be a problem for all voluntary groups. And some of it may be down to a failure on the Council's part to adequately promote its own profile in the town. Perhaps improved communication between the Council and Maynooth's numerous Residents Associations would heip to stimulate a wider level of participation in the Council's affairs.

Over the years Maynooth Community Council has been involved in some very useful campaigns on issues of importance to the local community. Back in the 1980's the ROAR (Repair Our Awful Roads) campaign, the campaign for a new town square and, more recently, the campain for a new Bond Bridge have all had important support for the Council. Perhaps the time has come for the new Community Council to take on a more campaigning role. There is certainly no shortage of issues-traffic, parking, litter, facilities for our children and teenagers, better public transport, vandalism, promotion of the arts, recycling, town commission status.

He outlined some events that took place during the last few years. He said he was disappointed that the Harbour Field and Geraldine Hall was not resolved. He said the ongoing commitment from the Sub-Committees was to be commended.

He thanked the Editorial Board and office staff for their work on the Newsletter. He congratulated the Task Force for their far-seeing plans for Maynooth. He also noted that Fás had plans to make big changes to the schemes in Maynooth and wished them well.

Tom ended by saying that he would not be contesting the Chair.

Secretary's Report

Murieann Ní Bhrolocháin thanked the Executive and Councillors for all their support during the year. She noted and thanked all the Sub-Committees for their on-going hard work. She said the St. Patrick's Day Parade had again been a great success. She thanked Paul Croughan for his work with the office and also with organising the office move. She also noted her disappointment that the Harbour Field had not advanced further. She also noted that the Harbour Field is the responsibility of the Trustees not the Community Council.

She said that there are forty-seven vacancies on the Council not filled. She had hoped that Residence Associations and other groups would have people co-opted.

The new seating on the Main Street was commented on. She paid tribute to Dominic Nyland who was stepping down as treasurer after thirteen years.

Treasurer's Report

Dominic Nyland proceeded with his report. He said that funds were at an all time low. Having to meet a short-fall for the rent of the office premises had taken a heavy toll on funds. He thanked all who had helped him through-out his time as treasurer. He said as he had already stated he would not be contesting the Treasurer's job, but would stay on as Councillor.

Street Names

Padraig O'Murchú stated that Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum are proposing to rename Maynooth streets with both new and old names.

Town Centre

He also stated that there is £8,500 available for street signage in Maynooth. it was stated that local residents are to be informed.

There is more information in the Newsletter with a list of street names. Senan Griffin asked could a new logo be designed for Maynooth. It would incorporate College, town, etc. A request to be made to the public for ideas for the new logo. It was proposed and agreed that £100 be made available for a prize for best design.

Harbour Field

John McGinley stated that Kildare Co-Council would take over the Harbour /Field and develop it, if trustees agreed. It was stated that it was now some time since there was a meeting. Peter Connell stated that Maynooth Action Strategy should get involved. It was seriously felt that the whole thing is taking too long and as there is funding available and it could be lost.

Summer Project - Community Games

Claire O'Rourke stated that the summer Project is going well and their fund raising is going well. It will run for two weeks again this year.

Marie Gleeson said Community Games is also going well. There is a report in the Newsletter.

Tidy Towns Report

Richard Farrell stated that Maynooth scored badly in Tidy Towns competition mainly due to litter.

The Sunday morning clean-up is on-going and the group could do with more people to help, it was stated that if each estate was told where it fell down improvements could be made.

Dorothy Dornan and Richard Farrell represent the community Council on Maynooth Action Strategy and will present a report at the next meeting.

Kavanagh's Mill

A letter was received from Mr. Michael McNulty regarding the planned complex at the Mill. The Community Council as a body are asked for their ideas about the project.

John Doogan stated that nets were damagedat their pitch and made useless. He said that it was adults that caused the damage.





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WOMEN'S FORUM IN MAYNOOTH.

It is over three years since Archbishop Connell set up the Women's Forum. It has provided opportunities for women and bishops, and women and priests, to meet and discuss issues of mutual concern in the church and society. Many parishes have a forum. Each priest elects two representatives to represent the parish at Deanery level. And then, each Deanery elects one representative to represent the Deanery at the top Plenary level. It is at this level that the Archbishop, other Bishops and representatives of the Council of priest meet regularly the women discuss pertinent issues. (This also happens at Deanery level, on a yearly basis).

Here in the parish of Maynooth we have a Women's Forum. The A.G.M. was held on the 29th February, and the parish's representatives for the coming year are Noelle Topley and Lourdes Hendrick.

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BRIAR ROSE


Brilliant is the only way to describe the presentation of the Girl's School of the Briar Rose, also known as The Sleeping Beauty.

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
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

Allocation of Discretionary Grants/Movglare Village Wall: County Kildare has the unique distinction of being the only At the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on 24th March Councillors had £17,500 each to allocate for works in the Area. In Clir. McGinleys view this is totally inadequate and if it is spread out over a number of projects it results in nothing meaningful being done. Cllr. McGinley allocated all of his funding to build a boundary wall between Moyglare Village and the Moyglare Road. This wall has been sought by residents for a long time and is an essential safety requirement.

Unfortunately, none of the other area Councillors allocated any of their £17,500 for the wall, even though they had agreed unanimously to do so at the January meeting. As it will cost at least £25,000 to build the wall there will be a shortfall. Cllr. McGinley is in discussions with the Residents Committee with a view to getting the shortfall from the Developer.

More obstacles were thrown in the way of progress at the Councils Area Meeting on 10th April when a planning official stated that planning permission would be required for the wall. Cllr. McGinley is arranging a meeting of the Senior Planner and the Residents Association Executive with a view to resolving all problems.

Traffic Calming:

When the Councils Estimates for the year were being decided last November Cllr. McGinley proposed that £200,000 be allocated for traffic calming measures county wide. This gave the Leixlip Area Committee a total of £57,000 for traffic calming.

Each Councillor therefore had £14.250 to allocate for traffic calming measures in the Area. In line with Residents Associations, Cllr. McGinley allocated his funding as follows: Parklands: Laurence Avenue and Old Greenfield. Unfortunately, Councillors were advised at the Area Meeting on 10th April that Laurence Avenue and Old Greenfield do not meet with the requirements of Government Guidelines for the installation of traffic calming. The Council engineer also stated that traffic calming for Parklands would cost the full allocation of a councillor i.e £14,250. Councillors agreed to address the matter further at the next meeting on 28th April as a result of this extraordinary new information.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have asked for Traffic Calming on Meadowbrook Road as part of the Meadowbrook Link Project and this will be considered along with the other submissions on the Project at the next Area Meeting of the Council.

Street and Back Lane signs for Maynooth:

Cllr. McGinleys motion "That funding be made available for bilingual signs indicating the names of streets and back lanes in Maynooth in line with the wishes of Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum" was agreed at the January meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council. As a result, it was agreed to allocate £8,500 for the new signs at the Area meeting on 24th March.

Children's Playground:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration of Kildare County Council:

"That this Council works with local communities in order to provide childrens' playgounds in towns where there is a demand for such facilities."

county in Ireland without a public childrens playground. It is outrageous that parents in Maynooth have to go as far as Lucan for such a facility. There was a playground at the Harbour Field up until the early '80's but this disintegrated through lack of maintenance and insurance difficulties. The insurance difficulties now seem to be overcome, at least in all other counties, and the Government is awash with money so construction and maintenance should not be a problem. The Harbour Field land is also community property and would be an ideal location for a modern childrens playground.

Banning Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV's) from Housing Estates:

Cllr. John McGinley wrote to all Maynooth Residents Associations asking them if they had a problem with HGV's and if residents wanted them banned from their estates. As a result of the responses Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council:

"That heavy goods vehicles in excess of three tonnes unladen weight be banned from parking in public areas of the following housing estates in Maynooth: Moyglare Village, Meadowbrook, Meadowbrook Crescent, Greenfield Estate and Parklands."

Beaufield have since said that they wish to be included and if there are any other estates with this problem please contact Cllr. McGinley at 6285293 and you will be included in the scheme.

Pound Park:

In order to stop cars from driving into this park via the footpath between 18 Leinster Cottages and the adjacent house, Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to install three bollards to stop this from happening. The central bollard should be lockable in order to allow a grass cutting vehicle to enter.

Cllr. McGinley has also asked the Council to provide fencing between the Park and the river in the interests of safety.

Provision of a Public Parks Department in the County: Residents can be assured that Cllr. McGinley has not given up on his campaign to have a Parks Department set up in the county. During the estimates debate at the end of last year Cllr. McGinley proposed that funds be allocated for this purpose. A Parks Department could maintain, among others, Pound Park, Carton Avenue, The Harbour Field and a Children's Playground. Unfortunately, his proposal was defeated by a majority of Councillors. The good news now is that the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council have submitted the following motion for the consideration of the full Council.

"That the Council provides £250,000 in next year's estimates for the maintenance of public open spaces"

Hopefully the motion will be passed as its merits should now be obvious to most Councillors.

The County Manager has engaged consultants to assist with the preparation of the Maynooth Plan and others. The Area Committee will meet them on 28th April to discuss the plan. The County Manager has stated that he wants the plan agreed by the Area committee in time to go for approval to

the full Council at the end of May. This tight timeframe is unlikely to be met and it is more likely that the plan will go before the full Council at the end of June. It will then go on Public Display for three months in order to get comments from the people of Maynooth.

C I E Maintenance Access Gate at Silken Vale:

Unfortunately, Kildare County Council have granted Planning Permission for the gate. However, there is some comfort in that the permission is only for three years and it shall only be used to give access to the signalling relay station no more than five times a year.

Extension to Maynooth Post Primary School.

At present Maynooth Post Primary School has a capacity for 630 pupils whilst there are 712 pupils presently attending the school. Co Kildare V.E.C. requested last August approval for an extension to the school to cater for 900 pupils.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the delay in issuing approval with the Minister for Education recently. The Minister advised that his departments planning unit were still reviewing the future requirements of Maynooth Post Primary School.

Deputy Emmet Stagg is dissatisfied with this response. The school is at present overcrowded which is placing pressures on both staff and pupils alike. The Department seem to want to review this matter to death and he has indicated that he will continue to press the Minister on this matter.

Long Term Care Unit for Maynooth Granted Planning Permission.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Kildare Co Council on 10th April to grant planning permission to the Health Board to build a 50 bed long term term residential care unit for the elderly near the existing Health Centre in the Harbour.

The provision of these facilities will mean than elderly people in Maynooth who require long term care will no longer have to be hospitalised in St Vincents, Athy, or Peamount. This will mean that elderly people will be able to remain in their own community and it will lessen the hardship for relatives travelling long distances to visit people in Athy.

Deputy Stagg stated that he would press Health Board to commence construction as soon as the date for any appeals has elapsed.

Control of Refuse Bins for Restaurants / Take Away's. Arising from concerns expressed by residents of the Lyreen District concerning the leaving out of refuse bins by Restaurants and Take Aways on the back lanes days in advance of the refuse collection day, Deputy Stagg has tabled the following motion for consideration by Kildare Co Council:

That this council now introduce Bye - Laws under section 35 of the Waste Management Act 1996, to prevent takeaways, restaurants from leaving their refuse bins on public roads public foothpaths days in advance of the collection day.

Rail Safety on Maynooth Suburban Line.

The recent Rail Safety Work Review indicates that a number of 'Unreasonable Risks' identified in October 1998 on the Maynooth Suburban Line have still not been resolved by larnrod Eireann. The risks identified included the crossover

at Clonsilla which whilst work is in progress on installing a new crossover still represented a risk of derailment. This matter should have been corrected by March 1999.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the report with Minister Mary O'Rourke in the Dail. The Minister indicated that she had made it clear to larnrod Eireann that she found it unacceptable that the original risks identified had not been fully resolved. She further advised that larnrod Eireann would now be drawing up an action plan setting specific target dates for resolving the risks.


Deputy Stagg has indicated that he will continue to apply pressure on Minister O'Rourke to ensure the safety of the travelling public.



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RECYCLING FOR YEAR 2000

1,000 Plastic bags in 1999? Will it be 2000 in 2000?

Count your bags this week.

1,000 is a very low average, most households will take many. many more. We may object to incinerators, landfills etc, but we must reduce the rubbish that needs disposal! The government has done little or nothing to help us reduce or manage our waste, however we must begin to take responsibility for our own rubbish. This begins at home. These are some hints, all of which are carried out in our household. As a result, the bin only goes out once a month although we pay the full amount. That is a story for another day.

Divide the rubbish.

We have two small bins in the press under the sink, one for compost materials, the disposable refuse goes in the second one. Keep bottles and clothes for banks.

Shopping creates waste. Think before you shop.

1. Take long life shopping bags from the supermarkets that offer them.

2. Buy your own bags, take one during the day, take five or six bags for weekend shop. Refuse to take plastic bags. 3. Refuse plastic bags in clothing, hardware shops, many

people have cars , simply carry your purchases to the car or bring your own bag.

4. Plan the shopping, buy unpacked food - peppers, apples, oranges etc.

5. Do not buy meat in pre - packed, plastic containers.

6. Buy glass containers instead of plastic.

7. Recycle the glass.

8. Reduce the amount of tins - they cannot be recycled at present.

9. Reduce the amount of cleaners materials.

Reuse / Recycle

1. Use unavoidable packaging as waste containers (plastic bread bags, cornflakes, washing tablets, toilet paper packs etc) and put straight in the bin. Tie the bags and containers. Cardboard containers biodegrade.

2. Fill tins with rubbish, crush refuse as much as possible, this takes up less room.

3. Use all paper twice - shopping lists etc.

4. Re - use envelopes, Christmas cards, wrapping paper, if only within family.

5. Reuse clothes as cleaning cloths.

Compost.

Any small garden can have a compost heap, get a compost bin from KCC for £20.00. from the garden centre, use an old container, leave it in the corner of the garden and it will eventually produce brown, crumbly compost. This saves money on fertilizer.

What goes in.

1. Most perishable household rubbish can be composted and re - used in the garden.

- 2. Food, peels, skins.
- 3. Tissues, kitchen paper, paper, cardboard.
- 4. Newspapers.
- 5. Garden rubbish (except for weeds and diseased plants).
- 6. Cigarette butts. 7. Fire ashes.

Feed the birds.

They will eat the following: Mouldy bread and crumbs Currants etc. Old cereals (weetabix etc) Old cake, biscuits, stuffing

Feed the animals

Use your cat / dog to recycle food,

Reuse water.

1. Tea / coffee on houseplants. 2. Washing up water on roses for greenfly / generally on the aarden. 3. Get a rain barrel / container.

Clothes.

1. In good condition - give to charities like Vincent de Paul. 2. If not - give to the Third World bins. 3. Scrap clothing - reuse as cleaning clothes.

Patronise shops with paper bags - they biodegrade Old containers - plant new geraniums / bizzy lizzies etc.

Try burying a plastic bag in the garden - dig it up a year later. It is still perfect.

Old carpet - kills grass for new flowerbeds, keeps weeds down in spring in flowerbeds.

Do not pack rubbish in larger bags for the bin - more unnecessary plastic.

Refuse to take junk mail.

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

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
OLIVER

TRIP TO LEGAMADDY


On the 31st of March, Maynooth B.N.S. visited their paired school in Legmaddy, in Northern Ireland,

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
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WHAT'S IN A NAME

Are you living in Maynooth? Would you know where to find Back Lane or Double Lane or Cross Lane? What about Mill Street or Leinster Street. If you know all these answers, then how about Stable Lane or Chapel Lane or Lime Kiln Row? Where would you find Bridge Street or Canal Place? The former 5 names are all taken form the most recent O.S. map of Maynooth while the latter 5 names are former names for the aforementioned places. Placenames change with time and sometimes old names may be of greater historical significance than the current names. Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum along with Maynooth Action Strategy are presently working with Kildare County Council to erect street signage in Maynooth. We hope the result will help local people as well as visitors answer the questions posed above, and perhaps provoke an interest in the origin and layout of the streetscape in Maynooth. We are also looking for any information that you may have on the street names or alternative names to the ones we are proposing. Please send any information to the address indicated below by mid May and we will publish the definitive list in the next edition of the Newsletter.

The present layout of the centre of Maynooth owes much to the Fitzgeralds, who were earls of Kildare and dukes of Leinster. The Fitzgeralds resided in the Great Castle off Main Street and later Carton Demesne.


The centre of Maynooth is characterized by a wide tree lined straight Main Street. This forms the central axis for the different lanes that run parallel to the Main Street and lead off it at right angles. This layout was first conceived by James Fitzgerald, 20th earl of Kildare in the mid 18th century. Together with Peter Bere, estate manager at Carton, they sought to develop Maynooth as a model village in a rectilinear pattern that was the height of fashion at the time. Building along the Main Street, which at that time was called Leinster Street, began in the mid 1750's. By 1757 a row which still stands, of seven two-story, slate roofed houses fronting Main Street with walled gardens and stables to the rear has been erected on the North side of the Street adjacent to Carton Avenue. This was shortly followed by the building of 28 slate-roofed labourers' cottages that were laid out in 2 blocks to the North of the two storey houses. These cottages called Leinster cottages after the earl was promoted to Duke of Leinster still stand to-day. By 1773, the year of the Duke's death much of the village to the East of the Square had been developed. A new inn (site of Leinster Arms) was added in 1777. To the West lay the castle as well as two distilleries and several cabins in what was referred to as 'part of the old town'. Traffic from Dublin to the west passed along the Main Street, across a small bridge (still extant) over a tributary stream, the Joan Slade, and through the old castle gate before crossing the Lyreen and reaching the road to Kilcock.

This was all to change in the 1790's when a new bridge, Williams Bridge, was built to the east of the castle. This allowed long distance traffic to be diverted away from the castle and be turned out of the village over the new bridge and past the mill. A new north south axis was thus created and became known as Canal Place (now Leinster Street) to the south of Main Street and Bridge Street (now Mill Street) to the north. Stoyte House, further to the west was also built around this time. This subsequently became the nucleus for the Catholic seminary, St Patrick's College established in 1795. This development had the effect of closing and enhancing the vista at the western end of Main Street.

The 19th century saw continued growth in the power of the Catholic Church. The Presentation sisters established a convent and school for girls at the East End of the village on the site of the charter school. The building of a new parish church on the West Side allowed for the establishment of a boys' school in the old chapel (now Band Hall) in Chapel Lane (now Pound Street).

In the mid 19th century when the poor law and tenement valuations were being compiled, many of the lanes were given names associated with developers or prominent citizens occupying the sites. Thus on the north side Miss Kelly's lane (now Kelly's lane) was associated with Miss Martha Kelly site owner and Coate's lane with John Coates stonecutter. Coffey's lane on the south side was associated with Andrew Coffey site owner. The lanes parallel with the Main Street had also seen development and now assumed their present names of Back Lane and Pound Lane on the north side and Doctors Lane after Dr Edward O'Kelly on the south side.


Senior Camogie League - 3rd April 2000 Cappagh 2-2: Maynooth 0-1



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
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
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HANDBALL

It could be a risky choice as historically it has been shown that when unemployment rises those with fewest skills and and qualifications are hit hardest.

On the positive side, fewer applicants for college places should mean that the dreaded points race might be a little bit less competitive this year than previous years. Our own Post- primary school has an excellent record in serving all its students of all aptitudes - whether those chasing elusive College places or those for whom a pass is a great achievement. We wish them all the best of luck in the next few weeks.

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MAYNOOTH TIDY TOWNS - LAUNCH OF GREEN TOWN 2000 PLANS

Green Town 2000 is a special millenium competition for Tidy Towns groups to submit special projects for this year. Maynooth Tidy Towns has undertaken a project for the competition which has been running since 1st April and it was officially launched this week together with the group's plans for the National tidy Towns 2000 competition.

In devising our project for Green Town 2000 we looked at the issues where we have scored badly in the annual national tidy towns competition and decided that we should focus on them in our project. The issue that needs most attention is litter and this will form a major part of our plan, Tidy Towns Secretary, Paul Croghan told the meeting in the Glenroval Hotel.

We have designated the period 22nd May - 3rd June 2000 as Mid summer Litter free Maynooth and we appreciate the help of local organisations and residents associations in every undertaking this once off clean up of the town. We have written to several sporting, student and business organisations as well as to residents associations and community groups seeking their help in this task. The projects in our plan will involve the community at all levels and the support of the schools has been most appreciated. The individual projects are:

- Young Litter Busters Campaign 2000 litter pickers provided to schools to maintain the school environs.
- Students Town 2000 Students assisting in litter cleanups.
- Litter Free Residential Area 2000 A special category in our best estates competitions 2000
- Spring Clean 2000 mid summer litter free Maynooth

In addition, this year the area was faced with a planning application, proposing a Toxic Waste Incinerator for Kilcock. which is only five miles west of Maynooth. We decided to include in our project a plan to provide information to the residents and the schools about recycling and to introduce appropriate initiatives on waste reduction and recycling in the town.

Maynooth Recycling and Waste reduction town 2000

This project will involve the supply of recognised advice on best practices in recycling and waste reduction. It will also include information on recycling locations around the Maynooth area. This project is being undertaken with the support of Kildare County Council and will involve the distribution of an information pack to each house in the town area as well as local schools. The Green town 2000 project is expected to be completed by 31/10/2000.

Plans for the National Tidy towns competition 2000 include the temporary re-instatement of the two bus turning points on the Straffan Road. A local businessman will maintain one and in the other we plan to sow flowers. We will also be developing more wild flower areas, particularly along the approach roads to the town in order to reinforce the semirural nature of the town. We are continuing, subject to voluntary effort, to maintain Carton Avenue and the Pound Park.

We are grateful to the Sunday Morning Cleanup crew who are continuing to do a town centre cleanup each Sunday. 



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

Clir. McGinley's Children's Playgrounds Motion Agreed:

Clir. John McGinley's motion:

"That this council works with local communities in order to provide children's playgrounds in towns where there is a demand for such facilities was unanimously agreed at Kildare County Council's meeting on 17 April. The Councils Recreation and Amenity Manager, Ray Bonar, will prepare a report, for presentation to the Council in three months time, on how Cllr. McGinley's motion will be implemented. Maynooth can be considered fortunate in that land is already available at the Harbour Field which is admirably suitable for a modern children's playground. Hopefully, the good progress made on the transfer of ownership of the field and the Geraldine Hall, to Kildare County Council, will be concluded soon.

Kildare County Council Agree to Maintain Open Spaces:

A milestone was reached at Kildare County Council's meeting on 17 April when the councillors approved the inclusion of £250,000 in next years Estimates (budget) for the maintenance of public open spaces throughout the county. This is something which Cllr. McGinley has been pursuing relentlessly and will be particularly good news for the north of the county. It means that Pound Park, Carton Avenue and the Harbour Field will be maintained by the Council from next January. Council Engineers have advised Cllr. McGinley that the funding is sufficient to cover the county if contractors are used rather than the Council going through the expense of setting up it's own Parks Department.

The Meadowbrook Link Road to the Straffan Road: Consideration of the 13 submissions received by the Council as a result of the public display of the proposals will be considered by the Area Committee on 2 June. Cllr. McGinley has also submitted the following motions for consideration

1. "In view of the fact that the Meadowbrook Stream is being culverted fromMeadowbrook Court to Meadowbrook Avenue under the Link Road proposalsand that the Meadowbrook Stream and the

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Joan Slade River are being culverted from Meadowbrook Lawns to Parson Lodge under the New Bond Bridge proposals, that the opportunity should now be taken to culvert the Meadowbrook Stream for it's full length, in the interests of safety." "that the Maynooth Development Plan should include the following as an objective of the council: that a read be included from the Streffer Beed (ESSO

road be included from the Straffan Road (ESSO Station) to the town side of the motorway bridge on the Rathcoffey Road to take the heavy Rathcoffey traffic.

Cllr. McGinley has also asked for the following:

- A) Traffic calming measures should be put in place on the existing Meadowbrook Road and that this should incorporate a pedestrian crossing in the vicinity of the Beaufield Road junction.
- B) Children at play signs should be erected at regular intervals on the Meadowbrook Road and a cul de sac sign should be erected at the Meadowbrook Court end.
- C) As agreed at the Area Meeting on 16 October 1998, the Beaufield road must be closed off at the Rathcoffey Road end when the Link Road is completed.
- D) As agreed at the Area Meeting on 16 October 1998, the Beaufield Road must be closed off at the Rathcoffey Road end when the Link Road is completed.

Bond Bridge:

- The 8 submissions received as a result of the public display will also be considered by the Area Committee on 2 June. Three of the Submission asked that the eastern facade of the existing bridge be retained. Unfortunately, this is
- unacceptable to larnrod Eireann on the ground of rail safety and they have further indicated that it would not be approved by the Railways Safety Inspector, who is independent, having regard to current design guidelines.
- In view of these objections Cllr. McGinley has asked that the eastern facade of the canal section of the bridge be retained as was the case with Mullen Bridge on the Straffan Road.





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MAYNOOTH GOING ONLINE

Maynooth is currently finalising preparations for the launch of its comprehensive web site. The project, which has a joint community and tourism focus, is being organised by Maynooth Action Strategy and has been underway since November of last year.

Tom Moor, a member of the MAS Taskforce, believes the site will become an integral part of the town's community infrastructure. "Our focus was to create channels of communication for the clubs and organisations in the town. Each club will have their own page which they can maintain with simple tools. This will allow them publish fixtures and results, notices and so on. There will also be a notice board which individual members of the community can use in a similar way."

The site will feature a free directory of the local businesses and services. Local information such as bus and train timetables, church services, critical phone numbers, and details on organisations such as the Community Council and the Chamber of Commerce will be incorporated also. Links will be provided to the National University of Ireland, Maynooth and the Saint Patrick's College sites.

The site will also have a strong tourism focus. "The content will cover items of interest in the town and the region, accommodation, eating out and leisure activities." Moore explained. "We have researched the town's monuments and places of interest and built Maynooth's story around them. We believe this can be a critical factor in the promotion of the town as a quality tourist attraction."

MAS has applied to Kidare County Council for Maynooth. ie as a domain name. Control of place names in this context has only recently passed to the Councils and it is expected that the procedures will be established and approval given soon.

Funding for the project came from Eircom's Information Age Town project. Two local business are providing the technical expertise. Innovate, the Maynooth based Web company, are providing the site development expertise and Liz Stoll is providing the graphic design.

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

AIR QUALITY LEIXLIP

The Leixlip Area Committee at its recent meeting, under the chairmanship of ClIr Senan Griffin, expressed the concerns of a large number of people regarding the quality of air in Leixlip to Mr David Molloy of the South Western Area Health Board (EHB) who attended the meeting at the Area Committee's request. Mr. David Molloy addressing the meeting, informed Councillors that he accepted that during the period April 98 to March 99, the quality of air was of concern to the residents of Leixlip - at this time he said the level of sulphur dioxide (S02) per cubic metre was almost three times what it was in previous readings. Mr. Molloy was not sure if faulty equipment was to blame, but stated that he was concerned about the current readings.

Cllr. Senan Griffin requested that the Health Board eliminate the technical problems and that an accurate reading be made available to the Committee as a matter of urgency.

Mr. Molloy, who gave a very competent account of the workings of the survey, informed the Committee that a report will issue to them in the next two weeks, with the updated survey. The new survey will be as a result of the putting in place of new equipment at Newton House and various other locations around Leixlip. Cllr. Senan Griffin requested that an interim report be circulated to the Area Councillors in order that the next step be put in place. It is important, he said that the Health Board are working in conjunction with EPA to resolve this problem, which is arising from either the equipment or the readings.

Mr. Molloy stated that the S02 levels have no relation with the cancer deaths in Leixlip.

Control of Alcohol Consumption in Maynooth's Public Areas

Bye-laws designed to control the consumption of alcohol in public places will come into place on July 1st, 2000. Following numerous representations by Cllr. Senan Griffin, Kildare County Council have agreed, following some minor changes, that the bye-laws will come into place on this date. Fines of up to $\pounds 50$ will result for persons disobeying the bye-laws, he said.

This issue of consumption of alcohol by young people has been of grave concern to a number of residents associations, and it is hoped when the by-laws are in place, it should resolve some of the problems experiences by many residents associations in the Maynooth area.

Parking in Leixlip

Cllr. Senan Griffin was informed at the recent meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee that the parking bye-laws will come into place on June 6th, 2000 for the residents on Leixlip.

Meadowbrook Link

Aproposal by Council officials to place a Part X (planning notice) on public notice was deferred, in order to facilitate a deputation from Meadowbrook residents who are objecting to the proposed link. The Meadowbrook residents will put their case to the Area Committee in June.

Prior to the appointment of consultants HGL O'Connor, Cllr. Senan Griffin stated that the best option was to run the link parallel to the motorway. The consultants offered four options and selected the now proposed link through Dunn's land. Cllr. Griffin accepts these proposals as outlined by the consultants. However, some residents in Meadowbrook are concerned by these proposals, and a deputation of concerned residents will meet with the Area Committee at their next meeting.

This action, said Cllr. Griffin means that the Part X for Bond Bridge has also been delayed and he has expressed his serious concern on this issue. Some Councillors, he said have not accepted that a change in the Meadowbrook Link will result in a serious delay in the re-alignment of Bond Bridge.

The Area Committee have accepted that the Bond Bridge proposal will now have to be put on hold until the Meadowbrook Link is reviewed by the Area Committee.

Traffic Calming Measures

Cllr. Griffin has been informed that the Area Engineer in charge of the design of traffic calming measures, is very concerened about the budget allocated to put in place adequate traffic calming measures.

This has resulted in a total review of the number of measures to be put in place. Cllr. Senan Griffin outlined to the engineer the need to have adequate safety measures on Moyglare Road, where 1,150 students attend the two schools.



Fiddlers Green who can be seen locally are back on the road again, but this is a one off solo project for Danny.





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

Maynooth started well and were three points up after ten minutes, Rathangan replied with a point form Eric Dockery



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

MAYNOOTH LABOUR NEWS (Cont.)

Provision of Litter Bin at Entrance to Pound Park

Arising from representations by residents of the Lyreen District Deputy Stagg requested the Council to provide a Decorative Litter Bin near the entrance to the Pound Park. The area in behind the wall near the Bandhall had become badly littered recently until the clean up and the provision of the Bin at this location will assist in keeping the area tidy. The Council have advised Deputy Stagg that the Bin will be provided shortly.

Planning Application for Pub at Newtown Shopping Centre.

Lark Developments have applied for Planning Permission for a Pub at Newtown Shopping Centre facing onto the Meadowbrook Road.

In order to agree a common strategy in relation to the application Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley's met with representatives of residents Associations from Beaufield, Brookfield, Meadowbrook and Meadowbrook Crescent on May 15th.

At the meeting there was unanimous opposition to the proposed Public House and each of the Residents Associations will be lodging formal objections with the Council.

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley will also be lodging and objection based on the following points:

* There is no requirement in the area for such a development. The proposal is not suitable for a residential area and is more suitable for a commercial area such as the Town Centre.

* The proposal would increase traffic in the area.

* The holding of functions in the Pub would cause a noise nuisance for residents in the areas.

Adequate Car Parking spaces will not be available which will lead to parking along the Beaufield and Meadowbrook Roads.

Rail safety on Maynooth Suburban Line

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Minister for Public Enterprise that all unreasonable safety risks identified by the I.R.M.S. Report on Rail Safety on the Maynooth Suburban Line have now been dealt with by larnrod Eireann. The risks now resolved include the crossover at Clonsilla and the footbridge at Maynooth Rail Station.

With the ongoing work on doubling the line Deputy Stagg stated that commuters would soon have the service they deserve and rightly demand.

Foothpath - Parsons Hall and Castledawson along Newtown Road

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have continued to pursue the provision of a footpath along the front boundary of Parsons Hall and Castledawson along Newtown Road.

The Council have advised Deputy Stagg that they have now marked out the route of the footpath and will be in a position to appoint a contractor to carry out the work in the near future.

Control of consumption and possession of alcohol in public places in Maynooth will be in place by July 1st.

The by-laws will make it illegal to consume or posses alcohol in cemeteries, green areas, along footpaths or public roads throughout the town.

At the instigation of Deputy Emmet Stagg Residents Associations will not be prevented from having organised events in green areas in their estates. Instead they will be able to apply to the Council to hold a specific event in their estate.

The by-laws are largely designed to deal with youths drinking openly in public areas of Maynooth.

Temporary classrooms for Gaelscoil Uí Fhiaich

Gaelscoil Uí Fhiaich have to leave their present accommodation in Leinster Street by September and the School has applied for temporary classrooms on the Celbridge Road beyond Lawrence's Avenue.

Given the urgency of the situation Cllr. John McGinley and Deputy Emmet Stagg have requested the Council to fast track the planning application.

Tony Smith Memorial Walk

The Tony Smith Memorial Walk was held on Sunday 28th May at 3.00 p.m.

Maynooth Development Plan:

Councillors will be considering the 21 submissions received at the Area Meeting on 22 May. The intention of the County Manager is to have the plan agreed at the Area Meeting in order to go to the full Council on 26 June for draft approval. It will then for on public display for three months. Green Triangle at Rockfield/Parklands/Rail Park:

Clir. McGinley got the ESB to install additional public lighting in an attempt to deter the drinking and hooliganism at this location. He also got the following reply from Sgt. Mick Desmond on the problem:

"I have placed extra patrols in the area. This caused us concern last year and we were able to bring it under control. It is my attention to ensure that no Public Order Offences go unchecked in these areas or any other part of the Maynooth Sub-District.

My Neighbourhood Watch Liaison Gardai will be in contact with the relevant co-ordinators with regard to their complaints."

The ESB have assured Cllr. John McGinley that they will carry proper reinstatement of the green and footpath following the installation of the three new double public lights. Wheelchair Access to Shops from Greenfield Drive and Maynooth:

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the local Council Engineer to make these footpaths wheelchair friendly. She had agreed to go over a year ago.

New Public Lighting on the Rathcoffey Road:

The ESB are installing new lights from Main Street up to the motorway bridge on the Rathcoffey Road as a result of Deputy Stagg's and Cllr. John McGinley's pressure on Kildare County Council. Cllr. McGinley's has asked the ESB to move the pole out of the small garden at the entrance to Cluain Acibhinn following representations from the Resident's Association.

Traffic Calming in Parklands:

Cllr. John McGinley allocated all of his Discretionary Grant Funding (£14,250) for traffic calming on Parklands through road. The engineers are proposing chicanes at

approximately 150m intervals to reduce traffic speeds. The detailed design will be put on public display so that members of the public can make their views known.

Moyglare Village Boundary Wall:

Cllr, McGinley and officers from the Moyglare Village Resident's Association met the senior Planner of Kildare County Council on 8 May with a view to progressing the building of the wall. The following was agreed:

1. Planning permission is not required.

2. The line of the wall was agreed

3. the Senior Planner will meet the Area Engineer on site to ensure that traffic safety issues are met.

In addition the Council has agreed to pursue the developer for the shortfall in funding and to have the estate taken in charge.

C.I.E. Maintenance Access Gate at Silken Vale

Following on from the decision by Kildare Co. Council to give permission for the access Maintenance Gate the Residents Association in Silken Vale have lodged a Third Party Appeal to An Board Pleanala.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has also made a submission to An Bord Pleanala as an observer in support of the residents. In his appeal Deputy Stagg points out that the use of the cul de sac for access is not required as the laneway north of Silken Vale is available for access. He further points out that the access gate is through a private residential area, which is not suitable for lorries or heavy goods vehicles. There will be a danger posed to young children and there is no guarantee that the gate will be locked at all times which would mean than young children could stay out onto the rail line. the proposal will devalue property and could effectively create a pedestrian access to the Rail Station. Further larnrod Eireann's contention that the gate would not be used not more than five times per year was a ploy to get planning permission and that this condition would be breached by larnrod Eireann.

The appeal is likely to be decided upon by September.

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OORIN'S RECIPES

Gratin Of Vegetables:

115g long grain rice,

- 3 courgettes,
- pepper (red or any you like).
- onion.
- 6 ripe tomatoes,
- 2 tablespoons olive oil,
- 3 sprigs fresh thyme,
- 2 sprigs fresh rosemary,
- 3 bay leaves,
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano,

150ml veg stock,

85g vegetrarian cheddar cheese, (grated).

Preheat oven to 200c / 400f / Gas6.T

Method:

- 1. Put rice into a small pan and cover with cold water, bring to the boil and cook for 3 mins, drain well and put into a deep dish.
- 2. Slice the courgettes, not too thin.
- 3. Chop the pepper, onions and allso the tomatoes.
- 4. Put the prepared vegetables in a large container. Add the oil and stir until all the vegetables are coated. Add fresh herbs also the bay leaves and oregano. Stir and add over the rice, add the stock, Cover with foil and bake for 40mins.

Remove the foil.

Sprinkle the cheese and put back into the oven for 10-15 mins more, until cheese is melted and all the liquid is absorbed.

You can put it under a hot grill if you like to brown it. Serve while it is hot.

It will serve 6 people. If you can not get fresh herbs dried herbs will do instead.

FRUIT JUICES:

These are so lovely and refreshing any time of the year, Allways get whatever fruits are in season, Try squeezed juices like: Oranges, grapefruit, lemon and tangerine, Or juices you can extract in an electric juicer like:

Apple, blackcurrant, grapes, peach, strawberrys. What ever you choose, and you can add mashed bananas to any if you like.

CARROT SALAD:

This salad is lovely and delicius. For 4 people you need: 8 carrots, grated. fresh parsley. 7 scallions, chopped. mix together in a salad bowl. You can add any salad dressing you would like or you can make your own.

This is just one: 2tbs mild or grainy mustard. 2tbs fresh lemon juice. 2tbs wine vinegar. sea salt and freshly grounded pepper as you like. 5tbs olive oil or any good quality oil will do. allso if you like you can add some crushed garlic to tast.

METHOD:

- 1. Mix mustard with the lemon juice and vinegar.
- 2. Add the salt and pepper.
- 3. Add the olive oil gradually, that will make the dressing thicken.
- 4. Stir in the garlic,
- 5. Leave the mixture in a bowl for 30 mins before you use it, that will allow the flavours to delevlope.

BRAISED TOPSIDE: BEEF.

It is a suitable joint for braising and pot roasting. It will take no more than 20mins to prepare and cooks in 1 ³/₄ hours.

You will need:

About 2lbs rolled topside of beef.

If you like 1 garlic clove, (crushed).

- 2 teaspoons fresh thyme or dried thyme if you can't get fresh.
- 6 celery sticks trimmed and cut into pices.
- 10 shallots, chopped.
- 3 ozs or 100 gr button mushrooms.
- tsp tomato puree. 1
- ¹/₄ pint red wine or beef stock.
- tbs cornflour. 1

4 tomatoes, finely chopped.

sea salt and freshly grounded pepper as you like. allso fresh sprig of thyme to garnish.

METHOD:

- 1. Rub the beef with garlic and thyme.
- 2. Put the beef into a rosting tin.
- 3. Cook at 200c (425f) mark 7 for 10 mins until well sealed.
- 4. Put the beef into a flameproof casserole dish.
- 5. Add the celery, shallots, mushrooms, tomato puree, red wine, also ¹/₄ pint water.
- 6. Cover and cook 170c (325f) mark 3, for $1/\frac{1}{2}$ hours till the beef is cooked.
- Take the beef out and keep warm. 7.
- Mix some of the juices with the cornflour, mix to make a smooth paste. 8.
- 9. Add again to the casserole with the tomatoes and cook: not too hot, for a few mins until it thickens.
- 10. Add whatever herbs you like, fresh ones if possible.

11. Slice the beef and put on a warm serving plate, add the gravy and the vegetables Over the beef, garnish and serve.




EDITORAL

Credit Union Expansion

News that Maynooth Credit Union has purchased Donovan's on Main St. for a sum in excess of £700,000 is an indication of inflated property prices in the town but, more importantly, reflects the tremendous success of the Credit Union. With over 4,500 members in Maynooth the Credit Union can Claim to be one of the largest organisations in the town. Its philosophy of encouraging saving and providing loans for people who might not be in a position to obtain credit from financial institutions has been an important part of community development across Ireland in the past forty years. Savings deposited locally are available for lending locally so, apart from earning interest, savers are contributing in a tangible way to their community. There will always be a role for banks but in an era when financial institutions are returning hugh profits it is encouraging to see that a non-profit making organisation such as the Credit Union, much of it based on voluntary effort, can prosper. With numbers growing rapidly in the past few years the premises in Leinster St. are no longer adequate. All associated with Maynooth Credit Union are to be congratulated on their bold move in the property market and the Newsletter wishes the Credit Union well at its new location.

What Price a Playground?

A recent survey by Sugraidh, a voluntary child pressure group, found that there are more than twice as many golf courses as playgrounds in the country. Nearly half of all local authorities make no provision for playgrounds and, unfortunately, Kildare Co. Council is included in that list. The average public playground is believed to cost about £80,000 and it seems many local authorties are relucant to provide them due to the 'compensation culture'. This, However, seems more like an excuse than a reason. Dublin Corporation has 30 playgrounds and Cork has 19 - all of which are being refurbished with state-of-the-art multi-play units and special safety sponge surfaces. How about it Kildare Co. Council?

Co-Options to Community Council

Following a meeting between the executives. Maynooth Community Council and local members of Fianna Fail Cuman at which Clir. Paul Kelly attended. The meeting itself was very far-reaching. They said they were there to listen to all groups in the Maynooth area and that the meeting with Maynooth Community Council was only one such meeting. The matter of attending Community Council meetings was raised. Chairman John Doogan said this in itself was not a bad idea. But however, as Maynooth Community Council is a non political body and our constitution states that all Community Councillors have to be resident in Maynooth, which meant that Cllr. Kelly could not attend meetings. However, it was also noted that any Local Fianna Fail representative and other Politicians could attend Community Council meeting if co-opted to represent their Resident Association.

Senan Griffin stated that this is the case with both himself and John McGinleyy as both are Cllrs. but only attend meetings representing their areas.

PUB APPLICATION FOR BEAUFIELD

It was noted that an application has being made for a Public House Licence in Beaufield estate.

John Doogan stated that the estate already has a lot of students residents and the noice levels that a Pub would bring to the estate was unacceptable. Sean Griffin said that the people in the area would have to make an objection. There was also a restriction that no new pub could be opened inside one mile another Maynooth Community Council gave their support to the Beaufield Residents.

NEW LOGO FOR MAYNOOTH

It was agreed to extend the closing date for the closing date for the competition to design a new logo for Maynooth. The new date is 31st July. It was felt that this should be a challenge for an artistic person also there is a £100 prize. It was felt that the logo should incorporate Maynooth College, NUI, the Town Castle etc. Padraig O Murchu proposed that the judging panel have a representation from Maynooth Action Stragety, Maynooth History Forum Community Council and the Chamber of Commerce.

UNDERAGE DRINKING.

It was noted that by-laws regarding street drinking will come into effect on 1st July. It was hoped that the new laws would help clean up the problem of young people drinking around the town. The meeting felt that the problem of young people drinking has now reached a very serious level.



MAHER SCHOOL OF IRISH DANCING



Maynooth, Ontario - Population 300

Maynooth isn't unique. There is another Maynooth. it is a small town of 300 people located about 200 north east of Toronto in the Canadian state of Ontario. Originally called Doyle's Corner after one of the earliest settlers in the area, in the 1870's the people of the town held a plebiscite to choose a new name - and Maynooth is what they choose. In the early years of the 20th century the railway reached Maynooth and helped to promote the timber industry in the area. Nowadays, tourism plays an important part in the local economy and Maynooth is a centre for treking and skiing.

The property market in Maynooth, Ontario is not quite as buoyant as here in the Celtic Tiger. For just under £50,000 you can buy an 8 year old 3 bedroomed house located 3 miles outside the town. £140,000 is the asking price for a two storied, 3000 sq ft. house (about 3 times the size of your average semi here) in Maynooth with 4 bedrooms standing on one acre.

The Arlington Hotel is the place to stay in Maynooth and is used by walkers, bikers and skiers exploring the nearby wilderness. And rates are inexpensive - just £19 for a double room.

The links between our Maynooth and Maynooth in Ontario seem fairly tenuous. But there is one interesting story that links the two. The bell in the church in Maynooth, Ontario has crossed the Atlantic three times. First, it was shipped from Britain but on arriving in Canada it was assumed that a mistake had been made and the bell was shipped to Ireland. Arriving in Ireland its true destination was worked out and it was sent back to Canada for a second time!.



DAVID WINS SILVER MEDAL AT SPECIAL OLYMPICS

Eighteen year old David Brophy from Kilcloon was in the news recently when he returned from the European Special Olympics sporting a silver medal. David, who is a keen horseman, won his award in the equestrian section of the competition, which was held in Groningen in the Netherlands.


Competition was intense, with a total of thirteen countries participating in the equestrian events. The Irish team did particularly well in the competition with a total of two gold, two silver and two bronze medals awarded to Irish riders. David took part in the dressage and in the trail-riding event, in which he won his medal.

David Brophy is a final year pupil at St. Raphael's Special School in Celbridge which includes riding in the school programme. Teams of volunteers from the Riding for the Disabled Association (Ireland) work with many of the school pupils each week, teaching them the fundamentals of riding and pony management. David is particularly talented and thus won his place on the Irish Olympic team.

Special Olympics is an international programme of yearround sports training and competition for children and adults with a learning disability. The range of sports is very wide including gymnastics, swimming, athletics, team games and equestrian events. There are also winter sports such as skiing and skating.

Special Olympics believes that its programme of sports training and competition helps people with learning disability become physically fit and grow mentally, socially and spiritually. Families become stronger and communities learn to respect and accept people with disabilities in an atmosphere of equality and understanding.

Over 90 countries participate in Special Olympics and there are more than 15,000 meetings and tournaments throughout the world each year at local, regional and national levels. The International Special Olympic Games is held every two vears, alternating between summer and winter sports. The competition lasts for nine days. The next International Special Olympics for summer sports will take place in Ireland in 2003. This will be the first time the event will have take place outside of the United States.



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

Estate Agents -Travelling at the Speed of Light

We've all seen the estate agents advertisements for new houses in Maynooth proclaiming that it is just a short thirty minute trip into Dublin. What they omit to state is that a helicopter is required to do the journey day when fifty to seventy minutes is a more realistic journey time. As the prices of housing in the Dublin area soars beyond the means of anyone earning an average salary people are being encouraged to purchase 'down the country' with the prospect of cheaper houses and trouble free commuting into the city. In a recent advertisement for new houses in Kinnegad the town is described as 'on the capital's doorstep', just 'a pleasant 45 minutes drive from Dublin'. At 4am in the morning it might be possible to drive from Kinnegad to Dublin in 45 minutes without breaking the speed limit. For commuters, a much more realistic travel time would be 90 minutes - but, of course, information like that doesn't sell houses

Frank Young (Herman's Hermits) rocks Fuerteventura.

Deciding to go Fuerteventura for a two week holiday was a big change for us, we had been visiting Playa del Ingles in Gran Canaria for ten years. But the decision was unexpectedly rewarding in so many ways. Life crawls along, no one hurries, cars speed at 30 m.p.h. only. Maybe the internet exists in the small capital, Rosario, but this resort saw no need for such urgency. What a relief, Practically uninhabited, 40,000 people to 80,000 goats, the residents and tourists in our resort were the most friendly people have ever come across. Spanish, German, Dutch, Swedish, Turkish, Canarian, Irish and English in particular greeting us like friends. Within four days cars were saluting us in the street, well Frank Young's jeep to be exact. Frank was a member of Herman's Hermits until 1982 and now owns a large pub, The cavern, in the Harbour at Caleta de Fuste de Castillo beside which our complex, the Barcelo Club was situated. We struck up a friendship with him, his wife Jane and their new barman Alan who had only been there six weeks.

After a number of days I asked Jane if it would be possible to do an interview with Frank for our local Newsletter, failing that a photograph would suffice. No problem - we arranged a quiet time in the *Cavern* where the tasteful maritime decor is accompanied by memorabilia of Elvis, the Beatles and, of course Hermin's Hermits.

Sitting at the corner of the bar, before he began singing for the night, he told me the most unexpectedly extraordinary story. In 1982 he decided to leave the band, having played in every state of America except Alaska and every province in Canada. Suffering severe burn out he went on 'a seven year chill out' - to Yugoslavia. They were the most wonderful seven years, he and his girlfriend mixing with all nationalities. Returning from England in 1989 the difference was palpable even the waiters in restaurants were carrying guns; on the advice of the locals he eventually left the country that he had come to think of as home. His girlfriend could not leave with him.

Even after eleven years Frank was close to tears as he described the infamous blowing up of the bridge at Mostar

that the world witnessed on television. Four or five times a day he crossed it, now his city was divided in two. He has a friend in Manchester managing a club and he first went there and then moved to the Algarve in Portugal, managing and

singing in bars for three years. During this time he had intermittent contact with his girlfriend but eventually all contact died away. He could not reach the country by telephone.

After the Algarve, Tenerife came next and he travelled to Fuerteventura in the winter of 93 -4 and worked all the bars on the island, as he said himself there were few enough of them in the beginning. The *Cavern* is his fourth bar on the island and he and Jane have been there for two years with the feline resident K C who sits on his own stool behind the bar and keeps Alan company.

Frank does not know if his girlfriend in Yugoslavia is dead or alive but he is still trying to find her.

This was far from the interview I had expected, at the beginning I emphasised that I did not expect any personal details but he insisted that he tell the story and that I could publish any part of it as I wished.

We spent a lot of time with Frank and Jane who comes from Liverpool and copies of the *News/tetter* will be crossing the Atlantic to the *Cavern*. Our return date to the island has been arranged, my high stool is booked.

Paws animal rescue has been in existence since February 1997. During this time they have helped over 3,000 animals including dogs, cats, rabbits, swans, doves and even a cockatiel. They provide an invaluable service to man,s "Best Friend". Paws have a strict policy of re-homing stray animals. These animals can greatly enhance the quality of life for a lonely person. To have a dog as a companion can be a valuable source of security for our elderly and disabled population. In view of the recent attacks on the elderly, especially in country areas, these animal can hugely comfort and reassure those of us who live alone and in fear.

"There is no faith that has never been broken except that of a faithful dog"

Another positive aspect of Paws is the motivation it provides for many young people who spend their Summer holidays volunteering in the shelter. These helpers often have many emotional problems of their own. They find great comfort and solace while tending these vulnerable animals.

Kildare Co. Council Warden Service have a policy of giving just 5 days respite for dogs before putting them down. Imagine your pet lost and lonely with a 5 day death sentence. How much poorer our lives would be without our canine friends. Paws is now in grave danger of having to close. Although the home has always historically housed dogs, KCC now say they must have planning permission to remain open.

A spokesperson for Paws issued the following statement:

"We desperately need three or four acres of land in North Kildare (60% of our animals are rehomed to Dublin), to build a national animal shelter with proper facilities for the animals including a cattery, a veterinary unit where we can help people on welfare or assistance to have their animals neutered for a minimum fee and an education unit where teachers can bring classes of childeren to visit the centre to teach them how to care for their pets,

We had been negotiating with the Kildare County Council about leasing a piece of land from them, on which we would erect a custom built animal rescue shelter, Yesterday we received a letter from the planning section of the same Council telling us we do not have planning permission for ou shelter. (the sheds which house the dogs were built in 1680 to house the hounds from the hunt), Meanwhile we have over sixty dogs being cared for in our home. We have had over twenty calls this morning from people who want to "get rid" of dogs and puppies. The heartbreak is never ending, "

KCC has also reneged on their promise to lease another site for this great work to continue. Public officialdom takes no account of the love of the public for our vulnerable animals.

Cul-de-Sac signs will be erected at the Meadowbrook Court end of the estate.

Cllr Mc Ginley is firmly of the view that the safety measures which he has succeeded in achieving have gone a long way towards meeting the concerns of residents in the area.

Other measures which have now been incorporated in the plans include the provision of a 2-4 metre wall along the boundary between Kingsbry and the Link Road and at Cllr. Mc Ginley's request the green triangle near the Straffan Road exit will be landscaped with maintenance free shrubs and mature trees. The Council have also agreed to plant shrubs along the back garden walls of residents in Meadowbrook Court and Avenue which at present back onto the route of the Link Road.

At the meeting residents from Meadowbrook Residents Association made a submission calling for the Link to run parallel with the Motorway in front of Brookfield and to link up with the Rathcoffey Road rather than the route now adopted. The main concern of the residents was safety and this has been largely addressed. However Cllr. John Mc Ginley would like residents in the area to know that there were other considerations which rendered this proposal impractica.I They were as follow:

The Cost of the alternative proposal was put at £2.54 Million. It would not be possible to run the Road parallel to the Motorway all the way up to the Straffan Road. Instead the road would have to go through the middle of Dunnes Lands and exit onto the Straffan Road at the existing point propose. This would not be agreed to by Mr. Dunne for obvious reasons and we would be back to square one with a C. P. O. process with a resultan further delay of 2 years.

The Bond Bridge project would be deferred for a considerable time. The New Bridge links directly into the Meadowbrook Distributor Road. If the chosen route was changed then the New Bridge would have to be redesigned to get it to face the Rathcoffey Road. This would mean a curved bridge again and a further delay to 2 to 3 years.

All in all the counter proposal would have set us back several years with major hurdles to overcome and the serious likelihood of a C. P. O. failure given that the chosen route is planned since the mid eighties.

The final matter which Cllr. Mc Ginley now wants to see resolved is the culverting fully of the Meadowbrook Stream within residential areas. Under the Meadowbrook Link and the Bond Bridge project certain sections will be piped. For the safety of children in the area Cllr. Mc Ginley and Deputy Stagg have now tabled the following motion for consideration by the Co. Council.

' That Kildare County Council take out a loan to enable the culverting of the Meadowbrook Stream within the development boundary of Maynooth, to be repaid from future development levies in the area.

In conclusion Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the provision of the Meadowbrook Link was good news for the residents of the area and Maynooth in general.

BOND BRIDGE PART X APPROVED

Cllr. John Mc Ginley's campaign for the new Bond Bridge is now nearly complete with the decision by the Leixlip Area Committee to approve the Design for the new bridge following the public display period.

The decision will now go before the full Council for final approval and the Council will then be in a position to invite tenders for the project. A contractor should be appointed in July / August and should be on site by September.


Cllr. Mc Ginley made a number of proposals in relation to the Draft Design which have now been accepted in the Final Design now approved. These include the finishing of all walls bounding the New Bridge in stone and the eastern face of the existing bridge will be retained if possible.

Cllr. Mc Ginley also requested the Council to provide a vehicular entrance to the Train Station off the New Bridge. This was agreed to unanimously by the Councillors but the engineers are recommending against this on safety grounds. In conclusion Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the Bond Bridge project will clear its final hurdle a the next full County Council meeting and he again thanked the members of the Bond Bridge Action Group for their assistance in the campaign since February 1996 following their formation at a meeting

called by then Minister of State Emmet Stagg.

TRAFFIC CALMING FOR PARKLANDS MAIN ROAD.

At the Leixlip Area Committee meeting held on June 2nd Cllr. John Mc Ginley allocated his Traffic Calming funding to the provision of safety measures along the long straight Parklands Main Road, in Maynooth.

£15,000 has been provided by Cllr. Mc Ginley and the statutory requirements for a Part X will be completed by September and work will be carried out in October. The work will involve the narrowing of the road at a number of points.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that he was pleased to be in a position to assist the residents in Parklands to make the area safer for pedestrians and in particular children.

Mc GINLEY SEEKS WIDENING OF EXIT FROM GLENROYAL

Cllr. John Mc Ginley's motion that the exit from the Glenroyal Shopping Centre and Hotel Complex onto the Straffan Road, Maynooth, be widened was discussed at the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting held on June 2nd.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the exit at present was too narrow allowing just one line of traffic to get onto the Straffan Road. Vehicles turning right towards the Square invariably caused major delays for traffic wishing to turn left up the Straffan Road. The design as it stands was poor and this caused regular back ups of traffic trying to exit the centre.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that there was adequate room to widen the exit and this matter will now be investigated by the Roads Design Section of the Council. Cllr. Mc Ginley was also informed during the discussion that the Glenroyal Hotel had sought the provision of traffic lights at the exit point.


CUMANN WEBSITE

CUPPING is a technique often used for muscular -skeletal problems and chest congestion.

ELECTRO-ACUPUNCTURE involves attaching voltmeters to the inserted needles.

FUERTEVENTRA (Continued from July issue)

The fortnight we spent in Fuerteventura was peppered with Futbol. Las Palmas had made it into the Spanish lst division and they celebrated for a week. The match between Valencia and Real madrid closed most of the bars and pubs early. The excitement was palable, not that it really mattered as they said themselves 'Espana gana!' Spain wins - no matter what! The colour and animation added to the holiday. Frank Young is not the only famous musician to sing in the Cavern. John Jameson, ex-Nazerath also sings there and in other pubs throughout the resort. The variety of music is quite astounding, from traditional Irish through present day hits to Spanish/Cuban. This is matched by the variety of restaurants on the main street of the tiny resort. There are the usual burger/fast food outlets but they are tasteful, clean and unbelievably tidy. In fact, this is the tidiest place I have ever seen. There was not a cigarette butt on the street at any time. Little ashtrays are attached to the bins so that one could put out the cigarrette and deposit it in the bin. The beaches are equally pristine. There is very little need for any cleaning; we saw the large horseshoe-shaped beach at Caeleta de Fuste spotless after a full day of tourists. (A pity the same cannot be said of the streets of Maynooth and other Irish towns, not to mention our beaches!) We took a great fancy to one restaurant in particular, perhaps because its name, decor and general appearance was traditional Spanish. The Patio de Andalus stands half-way up the main thoroughfare from the beach area. It is bright, busy with a friendly atmosphere and wonderful staff who recognized us upon our second visit. Our somewhat faltering Spanish, as always, earned us brownie points and we were soon on first name terms with all the staff. But one waiter stood out from all the others. Charismatic was the only word that came to mind. Javier was a revelation as were most of the people we spoke to on the island. He was home on holidays from Australia where he lived and worked. Each night he took us through the menu, recommending the fresh fish of the day, most of which we would never see on this side of the Atlantic. Dorada, Falua as well as the more familiar salmon, mussels and fresh tuna. We were firm friends by the time the two weeks were over. He recommended a karaoke bar to us, not where we would normally go but this was mainly in Spanish and the decor of the bar was astounding. Visit Discoteta La Polca Jardin at the top of the street on the left hand side and listen to some wonderful local singers. Others restaurants we liked included the El Castillo situated above the Cavern in the harbour and beautiful Bara De Pescador (The Fisherman's Boat) at the bottom of the main street. On entering it appeared it was to be extremely expensive but no, the prices were the same as elsewhere but decor and service was second to none.

Our favourite pub was the Havana, chosen first because of my obsession with Cuba. It was the bar most frequented by locals and my Spanish was more than useful again. The staff included German, Turkish, Swedish and Dutch nationals, the usual eclectic group of workers we learned to expect in the resort. We were drinking mates within days. The pub is on the right hand side as you walk from the beach, slightly off the main street and beside it was Cuba Libre which hosts Cuban music and dancing during the busier months. Our first visit sums up the atmosphere. Looking in the door, attracted by the music, we were immediately accosted by an Englishman, asking 'Are you English?' "No, we responded, 'we're Irish'. 'That will do fine!' he says,' come in quick, we are having a Spanish versus English Karaoke!' Sure enough, the bar had divided down the middle with a large Spanish family taking on all English-speaking-comers at Karoke! A song was sung in Spanish, then English and so on. An Irishman, who had lived there some 8 years, took up the cudgal on behalf of the Englishspeakers. Eventually we were the only non-Spanish people in the place. The owner, a young, cheerful Cuban, decided to turn off the Karoke. Instead he sat at the piano and sang Cuban and Spanish songs until the early hours! I was taught Salsa, Son and general Spanish dancing! What a night!

There are many, many more pubs and bars, particularly up the hill, as the resort stretches up the mountain. I must admit that to our shame we never got to visit Molly Malone's, the Irish pub but we got wonderful reports of it from others. We also discovered the late bar where all the locals drink until the wee hours but I'm keeping this to myself! There are discos where one can drink until 5 or 6a.m. but they are underground and cannot really be heard on the streets. We did pay one visit, it was spotless, bright, cheerful and nearly empty! We sat at the bar and got to know one more local barman.

It occurs to me that I have concentrated mainly on the nightlife. The island has hundreds of miles of beaches. On many of them you can be completely alone. For those interested in the nudist way of life there are dozens of areas where you can strip off without fear of discovery. The sun was directly above us at that time of the year, even though the temperatures were mild, usually 22-25, one could burn easily. There is no humidity and the constant breeze keeps one cool. The seawater is clear, deep blue. The name of the island is a distortion of the Spanish Fuerte (strong) and viente (wind) and it can live up to its name. Bring a warm cardigan/ jacket for the odd evening when the wind can blow you away. It is a bit like walking the promenade in Galway on a winter's day. But this is a kind, warm wind; usually welcomed by the tourists.

This island is a water-lovers paradise. Every possible water sport is available. It has become the most popular area for windsurfing in which I have no personal interest but for those who are - this is the place to be. You can take Catamaran from Puerto Castillo harbour to see turtles, dolphins, whales and sometimes sharks.

We opted for the 3 Islands tour in a glass bottom boat that took us to Papagayo Beach in Lanzarote although we did not land on the island. It continues to Lobos Island (the island wolves) where we spend some hours before returning home via Carralejo, the resort to the North of the Island. The entire island of Lobos is a designated National Park and there is a team of committed young people working there. There are hardly any inhabitants and with the exception of one restaurant and a tiny, tiny fishing village there are no building bar the ubiquitous. I swam in one of the secluded covers completely alone. Now I know where I'll go when I finally stop the world, I want to get off! I had forgotten how much I like the sea, sailing and boats. We spent the forthnight dreaming of a 40-foot yacht! When we win the lottery! This was the most magical of days: as one Irishwoman commented as we were queuing up to leave: "I can't find my ticket. Great! As long as the pub has enough drink, tell them to pick me up tomorrow!' Everyone laughed, she had uttered our sentiments exactly. No one wanted to leave the deserted island. Later we found out that you can arrange to stay for a few days, bring all your own supplies and fish or laze about as long as you leave no rubbish. "Take nothing but photographs and leave nothing but footprints' is the motto on all signs and T-shirts. Heaven on earth. (Price 540pts = £27.00 and worth every penny.)

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

That's why I gave my Son his success cards today, before the results. I'm proud of him. He did his best and his best is always good enough. Cecilia Murray.



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


Maynooth Tidy Towns Meet Minister McCreevy

The Draft Plan, prepared by planning Consultants Brady Shipman Martin contains many progressive elements missing from the abortive attempt equally lauded by some local representatives four short years ago. In particular, some recognition of the abject futility of funding desirable objectives such as ring roads through huge housing devlopment seems at last to have been taken, at least partially, on board. But how much can we take on trust, and how much is merely 'spin designed to secure our passive acceptance of deals with individual landowners and acquiescence in another wave of explosive development.?

With a population at the last census of 8,528 our local councillors unanimously agreed over two years ago that a total increase in population of 4,000 for all of the towns of north Kildare combined what was desirable for the period 1996-2001. For Maynooth they agreed a rezoning of 55 acres was needed to achieve this. This would have been very much in line with the objectives of the Strategic Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area produced by the consultants Brady Shipman and Martin which recommended 'limited further development 'for Maynooth. A target of 10,500 was agreed for 2003 and 11,500 for 2006. Now we are told in the current plan that the present population is already at the projected 2003 level and that we need to rezone 150 acres for a population increase of 4,000 for Maynooth alone over the 1996-2006 period.(An increase of 6,000 is much more likely).

A number of Questions need to be asked regarding the Draft Plan and Maynnoth Planning Alliance calls on our councillors to provide specific answers:

1. What guarantee have we that the proposed ring roads will materialise before the new traffic generated by a further 1,500 cars on Maynooth roads as a result of the residential rezonings? What plans are there to phase developments, especially those feeding on to the Main Street, such that the roads are built before the houses?

2. Are the councillors aware that one of the main reasons for an Bord Pleanalas refusal of planning permission.

suitable road access? This being so, are they aware that the consequence of a Moyglare bypass opens up the appalling vista

space in Maynooth. At present one senior citizen spends 20 hours a week mowing Kildare Co. Council grass voluntarily and a small group of volunteers do trojan work in keeping the weeds at bay and picking up mountains of litter at weekends. We have heard promises of cleaning services, open space maintenance and other council services before. Most of them have failed to materialise. Tell us what resources are definitely committed by the Co. Council in 2001 to maintain the new open spaces proposed; Or is this a case again of aspirational planning?

If the post primary school is today over crowded and operating at 113% of its capacity how many additional school pupils are anticipated from the projected 2,000 population influx being provided for over the next 5 years and from the current natural growth in school - going population in the town? If Maynooth school pupils are not presently able to be accommodated in the post primary school why are you proposing two thousand more residents?

The Plan is compilation of many small arrangements. It is curious for example that in 67 acres of public park playing pitches could not have been accommodated rather than as part of rezoning arrangements elsewhere. It is curious how moving the Council Yard and Fire Station out of the heart of the town may correspond to major housing development feeding traffic onto Maynooth's main pedestrian road: Leinster Street. It is curious also how the plan makes little mention of the densities of specific housing developments proposed or fails to take into consideraton the population commitment from 200 apartments on Mill Street, 100 on the Parson Streat, 140 house in Carton Demense and a host of other developments either in the pipeline or projected. But perhaps the "spin" needed is quite difficult for these aspects.

Josie Moore and Kevin McGovern entertainmed us with lively music on the first part of the night and Noel Brady finished off the night.







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
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Sean Scanlon Profile





MAYNOOTH FIANNA FAIL CUMANN NOTES CONTD.

CLLR. PAUL KELLY NOTES;

Kildare County Council has provided a budget for the first time to install traffic calming measures in Housing Estates this year. Cllr. Paul Kelly has recently called on the Minister for the Environment Noel Dempsey T.D. to urgently review the criteria for installing traffic calming measures in housing estates. This is a direct response to the issue being raised in a number of residential estates which Paul has visited in the Maynooth/Leixlip area during recent walkabouts. Staff shortages in the Council means that effectively proposals made by Paul for implementation of traffic calming measures in some Estates in the area, cannot be carried out. However, the biggest problem which exists in enforcing such proposals are the criteria laid down by the Department and which exists at the moment.

For example, there is a requirement that a straight stretch of road not less than 1/2 kilometre should exist, which effectively rules out many Estates having chicanes or speed cushions introduced. With an increasing level of car ownerership among citizens and the resulting traffic congestion which many have to endure particularly going to or returning from work at peak periods or attending to school duties, the temptation exists for many to increase speed once off the busy raods on entering their residential areas and estates. Paul feels that traffic calming measures are an effective way to help prevent the tragedy of killing or injuring a child, and therefore he raised the issue at the Council Meeting on Monday 26th June. His proposal that the Minister should review the regulations was unanimously agreed by his councillor colleagues.



MAYNOOTH LABOUR NEWS Draft Maynooth Development Plan Agreed.

The Draft Maynooth Plan 2000 was agreed at the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council on 13th July. It wil go before the full Council on 24 July, and for approval for public display for a further month.

Clir John McGinley believes that the plan will be broadly acceptable to the people of Maynooth and that it includes most of his objectives for the town i.e.

* Non - development - led ring roads to take the traffic out of Main Street i.e. Kilcock Road to Moyglare Road; Moyglare Road to Dunboyne Road; Blacklion Road to Celbridge Road and Celbridge Road to Straffan Road (a new roundabout here to take the road away from Carton Court.

* A major reduction in the amount of new residential zoned land .; down from 280 acres in the 1996 Draft Plan to 150 acres this time (Clir, McGinley wanted this to be 120 acres but was outvoted at the full Council).

* Two new public parks; a 60 acre one at Carton Avenue and a 7 acre one at Greenfield Drive / Carton Court. These will be developed and maintained by the Council.

* Playing pitches for the schools, the soccer club and the GAA club.

*A 4 acre site for the Gael Scoil.

*Culverting the Meadowbrook Stream.

*Feasibility study on vehicular access to the Railway Station from Bond Bridge.

* A seven day street cleaning service.

*A childrens playground.

*No further permissions will be granted for hot food take-aways as it is considered that Maynooth has an adequate supply of such outlets.

*Door to door collection of separated waste for recycling.

*A civic amenity sitte on Dublin Road to cater for Maynooth and Leixlip.

*Moving the Council Yard, Offices and Fire Station to Dublin Road.

*The development of a One-to-Stop-Shop civic centre.

*An Action Plan for the Harbour Area and Carton Avenue Area. *Cycle paths on Rathcoffey Rd, Moyglare Rd, Mill St, and all distributor Roads. Investigate the feasibility of developing long distance cycle routes along the canal banks linking Maynooth to Kilcock and Leixlip. Also the feasibility of providing foothpaths along the Lyreen river from the Pound to the development boundary.

Secure ownership of the Harbour Field and Geraldine Hall and to develop the property as a recreational facility for the people of Maynooth. This is to be carried out in consultation with representatives of the community.

*There will be a Special Development Levy on all Planning Permissions granted in Maynooth to assist the Council in implementing the policies and objectives of the Development Plan.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the Plan and stated that there are major benefits to the Town in terms of Amenity facilities provided and the provision of non development - led ring roads to take traffic out of the Main Street. The Plan if passed subsequently will dramatically change the Town for the better and put in place long neglected facilities for the people of the Town.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Plan maps out future development of Maynooth and as such he wanted to hear the reaction of the people of Maynooth following their study of the Plan.

Bond Bridge / Meadowbrook Link Road Approved

Approval was given for both of these developments at the full Council Meeting on 26th June. Deputy Stagg's and Cllr. McGinley's motion that the meadowbrook Stream be culverted was also agreed. Also, cosultants will be appointed to investigate the feasibility of vehicular access to the Railway Station from Bond Bridge.

Kinbsbry Pedestrians Lights Vandalism.

As the lights are becoming continuously vandalised Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Area Committee: "That heavy duty traffic lights be installed at the pedestrian crossing at the entrance to Kingsbry Estate, Maynooth, in order to stop them from being vandalised."

Safety at Kingsbry /Celbridge Road Junction

In order to improve the safety at this juction Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Area Committee:

"That a white line and Yield be painted on the road for traffic entering Laurence Avenue, Maynooth, from the Celbridge Road". 67a bus turning point on Straffan Rd.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have asked the Council to ensure that the re-design of this turning point incorporates a bus shelter in view of its exposed location.

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

Seven Day Street Cleaning Service

In order to ensure that this is implemented Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Full Council:

"That provision be made in the Estimates for 2001 for a seven day street cleaning service in the following towns: Newbridge, Kildare. Celbridge, Leixlip, Maynooth.

Carton Avenue

Maynooth Action Strategy (MAS) have produced detailed proposals for the Lime Walk Avenue at Carton and for the Avenue entrance at the top of the town. As Kildare County Council also have plans for the Avenue entrance, Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion to the Area Committee to ensure that resources are used efficiently and that the work is co-ordinated:

"That the Councils Plan (O'Neills) for Carton Avenue Lime Walk entrance be amended to incorporate the Maynooth Action Strategy Plans and that the work should be carried out at the same time as their proposed work on the Avenue itself."

Greenfield Estate / Shopping Centre Junction with Straffan Road.

As a result of representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council have agreed to the installation of a yellow box on the north bound lane to help traffic exiting the estate. They have also advised Cllr. McGinley that repairs will be carried out on the pedestrian refuge to increase its visibility to traffic.

Glenroyal Planning Application for Traffic Lights at Junction with Straffan Road.

Cllr John McGinley has objected to the traffic lights aspect of this planning application for the following reasons:

1. It has already been agreed at the Area Meeting on 7th January 2000 that traffic lights would be installed at the Parklands Junction / Railway Station Junction with the Straffan Road. This break in flow will allow traffic out from the Glenroyal.

2. It has also been agreed that Doctors Lane would be closed at the Dublin Road end. So there won't be the continuous flow of traffic that there is at present from the Main Street direction. In view of these developments and with the introduction of two exiting lanes from the Glenroyal Complex there is no requirement for the traffic signals at this junction. Indeed their introduction would cause traffic to build up unnecessarily on the Straffan Road and at the Main Street junction.

Cllr. McGinley is totally in favour of the second exiting lane as he

Traffic Lights / Pedestrian Crossings at the bottom of the town.

These lights and pedestrian crossings were agreed as part of the town improvement works and their installation is very badly needed. In order to speed up matters Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion to the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council.

" That the traffic lights and pedestrian crossings agreed in the Maynooth Main Street Improvement Works for the bottom of the town be installed without any further delay". **MAYNOOTH POST PRIMARY EXTENSION**

Deputy Emmet Stagg again raised the issue of the required extension to Maynooth Post Primary School with the Minister for Education in the Dail on June 29th.

The Minister advised that the proposed extension is still being examined in the Departments Planning Unit.

This is simply unacceptable given the fact that the extension was sought in August 1999 and that prior to the holidays the school had an enrollment of 712 pupils in buildings which can cater for 630 pupils.

Deputy Stagg will continue to press the Minister to sanction the extension and put an end to the overcrowding which was placing a strain on pupils and staff in the school.

FURTHER WORKS BARBERSTOWN TO MAYNOOTH

Deputy Emmet Stagg is pleased that the Council have approved a tender in excesss of £6000,000 for further upgrading works to the Barberstown to Maynooth Road.

The work will involve just under 1KM of carriageway from Windgates to near the turnoff for Newtownmacabe and will include straightening the road, widening, and the provision of hard shoulders. Work should commence in late August.

Deputy Stagg is also seeking the provision of Route Traffic Lighting along the road and the implimentation of a 40MPH speed limit in the vacinity of the houses near the Newtownmacabe junction as well as the setting back of the bank on the left hand side as you head towards Barberstown Cross from the end of the works to provide some safe space for pedestrians.

PUB AT NEWTOWN SHOPPING CENTRE

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley lodged an objection on June 29th to the planning application by Lark Developments for the provisions of a Public House at Newtown Shopping Centre.

The main points covered in the objection were (A) The fact that there is no demand in the area for such a facility. (B) Disturbance to Residents in the area particularily in view of the new extended closing times. (C) The provision of such facilities would be more appropriate to the commercial Town Centre. (D) Increased Traffic which would be generated by the proposal. (E) Lack of adequate parking on site which would lead to parking along Beaufield and Meadowbrook Roads. (F) Traffic hazards created by the increased traffic and illegal parking. (G) The further disturbance to residents by the holding of functions in the proposed public house.

All meetings are held at 8 pm on the third Tuesday of each month in Loftus Hall, Maynooth College, (except where otherwise stated)



Rosemary and Elsa studying their fine exhibit called "Contrasting Forms" at the "Floral Workshop" at the Royal Hospital. Donnybrook.

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
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

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MAYNOOTH FIANNA FAIL CUMANN NOTES:

Back off the Summer holidays for me and many more, though for some lucky others, they are still ahead of them. At such a time of year it is a little more difficult for everyone to keep pace with one another as developments continue to emerge within such a rapidly expanding and busy locality.

Maynooth Development Plan

While on holidays the Maynooth Development Plan was published and on initial examination contains many very positive and indeed exciting plans for Maynooth village and its environs. Most importantly much of its substance will be of enormous benefit to the youth of today and future years which basically is what good planning is all about. I propose to discuss in detail the Maynooth Development Plan in the next issue of the Newsletter after careful consideration by all our members of the content. Copies of the Plan will be available shortly in the Library for examination by all interested members of the Community, although I understand there is a slight delay printing at the moment. Alternatively anyone interested is very welcome to contact any of our Cumann members or Clir Paul Kelly at 01-6243624 and we can organise a copy of the Plan to be made available. Also of course we can help with any queries or comments and observances that community members might have.

Brian Lenihan T.D. Address

As mentioned previously we hosted a Meeting in the Glenroval Hotel recently at which the quest speaker was Brian Lenihan T.D. for Dublin West, Brian is currently Chairman of the Oireachtas Commitee on the Constitution. Brian gave an excellent and far-reaching address in which he spoke at length on many and varing topics and it should be said with great passion and vigour.

He spoke firstly of the rapid pace of developmet in the Maynooth area over the past 10-15 years. He noted how important local political representation was in such an area where those involved through politics in the planning for future generations interacted with and reflected the local knowledge and ethos of the Community. He applauded the Maynooth Cumann members and Cllr Paul Kelly along with our local T.D. Charlie McCreevy for the vital and important role they have played and continue to play in this development. He emphasised that great political parties are built from the bottom up, with good foundations, i.e. in the local community areas not from the top down, and this traditionally had been Fianna Fail's great strength and one to which we in Maynooth should continue to adhere to. He went on to speak about the importance of having our house in order in respect of how we run our Party affairs e.g. the transparancy evident in our recent Convention held in Naas at which Charlie McCreevy and Clir Paul Kelly were unanimously selected to be Fianna Fails candidates in the next General Election. In his own area, the Fianna Fail organisation have appointed

Constituency Trustees to administer party funds and expenditure, and financial donations are not accepted at all.

Therefore Fianna Fail candidates will be going to the Electorate at the next Election on a clear basis, with no baggage whatever.

Brian spoke of the fact that Fianna Fail had a lot to offer the people of the Country as they have contributed so enormously over the generations since the foundation of the State. He said the members and supporters of Fianna Fail have every reason to be enthusiastic and positive in looking

towards the future. We should not be distracted by negative features but be determined to continue to play our part in the future development of our Communities and Country. He had no doubt that Albert Reynolds and Bertie Aherne should get great credit for the situation as it now stands in Northern Ireland. Writers such as Conor Cruise O'Brien and Fintan O'Toole had written disparagingly of their past attempts to progress the Northern Ireland issue. He remembered that it was written at one stage that the ballroom "Borderlines" was the sum total of what Albert Revnolds knew about Northern Ireland. Of course, events have long since proved that to be an insulting nonsense. Many had maintained negatively that the IRA would never decommission but Albert had been prepared to take a calculated risk and proceed bravely and sigle mindedly along the path that has since led to a complete turnaround in that part of Ireland and indeed saved many hundreds if not thousands of lives. Bertie Aherne had the negotiation skills which equipped him so well to take up from Albert Reynolds. However the problem isn't completely solved yet e.g. trouble in Drumcree, etc. and those skills and determination to succeed which are a component of Fianna Fail's ethos were essential to the maintenance of our sucessful progress down the road to a complete resolvement of the problem.

Fianna Fail would be an essential player in the dynamic process taking place in the current climate in which prosperity for all Ireland would be a result of the Northern political problem being resolved. As we move towards a more integrated Europe our own culture, language sport etc distinctive to Ireland has never been so strong. The recent euphoria and close community spirit generated by the great success of the Kildare Senior football team has surely proven this point.

Fianna Fail has also always had a strong social philosophy, i.e. that Governments are here to manage a Nation not just an economy. Equal opportunities for all citizens, the politics of decrepit old politicians looking to give handouts were insulting to a young population that wants to be self-reliant, to reach their full potential and be independent citizens. Following Brian's speech, a long and varied discussion took place with questions raised from the floor on a number of topics, including local government funding, Community Employment to support the Voluntary sector, Tidy Towns. Housing, Refugees and Asylum seekers, etc.

Cllr Paul Kellv addressed the Meeting paying particular attention to those local issues raised like housing in the

Mavnooth/Leixlip areas, the train service to Maynooth and Leixlip, the Draft Development Plan for Maynooth along with many others. con'td

Party Political

Local Notes - Clir Paul Kelly and Charlie McCreevy T.D.

1. Rathcoffey Road/Castledawson Estate

Minister McCreevy has made representations to Kildare County Council concerning the condition of the road particularly at the approach and entrance to Castledawson Estate. A reply is pending soon from T. Skehan, County Secretary.

2. Silken Vale

Gearoid Lohan, Chairman Maynooth F.F. Cumann has written to Minister McCreevy outlining objections by the residents is in Silken Vale to the granting of permission to larnod Eireann for a maintenance access gate. The objections are on the basis of the aesthetic damage to the Estate, the safety hazard posed to children in particular and noise levels raised. Alternatives have been proposed by the residents in their appeal to An Bord Pleanala. We are awaiting a reply to Minister McCreevy's representations.

3. Maynooth Arts Forum

The Cumann organised a meeting between the Maynooth Arts forum and Minister of State Eamon O Cuiv to discuss their proposals to publish the "Book of Maynooth". The meeting took place in Dail Eireann, the Cumann represented by John Dolan and Cyril McAree. The Cuman will continue working to try and obtain funding for this project.

4. Phase 3 of Naas Hospital

Charlie McCreevy has written to the Cumann detailing that planning for the £25 million Phase 3 for Naas Hospital is to start immediately. This will ensure that the people of Kildare will have a 1st class hospital covering a wide range of services at a modern standard.

Building starting ASAP is expected to be completed in mid-2003. The new Phase includes Mortuary/Post Mortem facility, Out-patient Department, Pathology Dept, Physical Medicine Dept etc.

5. Sports Capital Programme 2000

Minister for Tourism, Sport and Recreation Dr. James McDaid has informed Charlie McCreevy that £1,995,000.00 has been allocated to County Kildare organisations. Almost 1650 applications were received for the Programme. Grants under this scheme can be used for construction, upgrading and refurbishment of amenities including the development of Gaelic, Soccer and Rugby grounds, sports halls, community centres etc. Some examples of the breakdown of this money of interest to many follows:-

£20,000.00 to the 9th Kildare Catholic Scouts of Ireland £30,000.00 to Celbridge Lawn Tennis Club £100,000.00 to Clane G.A.A. Club £45,000.00 to Leixlip United A.F.C. £100,000.00 to Naas Rugby Club £125,000.00 to St. Marys G.A.A. Club, Leixlip £200,000.00 to Kildare County Council

6. Office of Public Works

Charlie McCreevy T.D. has received a list of projects being carried out by the Office of Public Works in County Kildare from Minister of State, Martin Cullen T.D.

a) Curragh Prison - a new unit for 50 prisoners in individual cells along with a therapy unit for the treatment of sex offenders. This project is valued at £4,000,000.00 currently at design stage and set to go on site in mid-2001

b) Castletown House, Celbridge - work is currently under construction on the collonades and stairway, with a budget set aside of £1,800,000,00.

c) Asylum Seekers - a site has been developed at the former Military Barracks, Kildare Town for mobile homes for asylum seekers.

d) Hazelhatch, Celbridge - Flood relief works are scheduled to commence in September 2000 at a cost of approximately £250,000.

e) Asbestos removal- OPW are currently carrying out a programme of Asbestos removal, from all public buildings, including Schools, Garda Stations, Courthouses etc. in Kildare after surveying all relevant buildings. Where found, asbestos will be removed by 2002. To date 20 schools in Kildare have been surveyed.

7. Dr. Martin Manseragh Meeting in Glenroval Hotel 25th Sept. 2000

As mentioned previously Dr. Manseragh, Special Advisor to the Taoiseach on Northern Ireland will be the quest speaker at a Meeting at the above venue at 8.30p.m. on 25th Sept., organised by the Fianna Fail Cumann in Maynooth. All interested in attending are very welcome to hear Dr. Manseragh appraise and describe the Northern Ireland Peace Process, in which he has played a critical and largely unrecognised role. A small reception will follow the Meeting.

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FINE GAEL NOTES

CASTLEDAWSON:

Following a request from the residents of Castledawson Cllr. Senan Griffin has demanded that the development control officer of KCC., inspect the site so as to ensure that the development is in compliance with the planning permission as granted by the council. The developer has been informed of areas which can be improved.

POUND LANE/FAGANS LANE/DOUBLE LANE:

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested KCC, to avail of unused development levies to resurface Pound Lane/Fagans Lane/ Double Lane. These lanes are in urgent need of a new surface as a result of the high volume of traffic using the lanes during business hours.

BLACKLION HALTING SITE:

KCC. Have signed a contract valued at £1.6 million pounds to construct eight houses and three caravan bays at Blacklion, Maynooth. The cost is totally borne by the Dept. of Environment. The council are to be complemented for preceeding with this housing scheme.

MAYNOOTH DEVELOPMENT PLAN:

By the time these notes are printed the Draft development plan for Maynooth will be on display at the Library and in the county council offices in Naas. The plan like all plans has got some good points and some which are in need of improvement. The public have three months to consider the contents of the plan during which time they will be able to make submissions to alter the draft. It is important to note that those making a submission to the plan can also seek to have an oral hearing on their submission. However it is important that housing should be made

available for those younger people now seeking to live in the Maynooth area. During the past few years a number of young people from the Maynooth area have had to move to other counties to get housing, this according to Clir. Senan Griffin is unacceptable and unfair to those wishing to live close to home.

Cllr. Senan Griffin is particularly pleased with the proposals to provide amenity land for the schools. GAA/soccer clubs. The proposed action plan for the lands at Carton Ave., will need further research in order that a well balanced passive amenity park plus other amenities are made available to the people of Maynooth. The proposals for a number of ring roads in order to reduce the volume of traffic on the main street is a step in the right direction and Senan Griffin has welcomed the conversion of those who for political reasons opposed ring roads as a solution to traffic problems in Maynooth.

LARAGHBRYAN CHURCH:

The Laraghbryan cemetery committee have expressed a wish to restore the old church at Laraghbryan. Following representations by Cllr. Senan Griffin, KCC, have announced that they will be allocating £6000 to the committee in order to continue their good work and that further finance will be made available in the year 2001. This is a worthwhile project deserving of community support and the Laraghbryan committee are to be complimented for their efforts in making the cemetery looking one of the best in the county.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT STRAFFAN ROAD:

Following requests from the residents at Manor Court for a pedestrian crossing at the Glenroval shopping centre Senan Griffin has asked KCC, to examine the placing of such a crossing point in conjuction with the proposed junction alteration currently before the council planners. The residents of Manor Court are finding it very difficult to cross the Straffan road to the Glenroyal centre, their nearest shopping place.

MAIN STREET:

Following discussions with Maynooth Credit Union, Cllr Senan Griffin placed a motion before KCC, seeking the support of the council to put in place six litter bins on the main street of Maynooth. The council having accepted the motion will when the bins are ready erect same on the main street.

The condition of the main street is now a cause for serious concern and Senan Griffin has requested that the snag list be completed and that repairs be carried out to areas where faults are now occuring to the finished works. Cllr Senan Griffin in demanding action has stated that the streetscape will deteriorate beyond repair unless remedial action is taken by KCC.

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MAYNOOTH LABOUR NEWS:

Call for additional Litter Bins:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That litter bins be installed at all bus stops on the Straffan Road and Leixlip Road, Maynooth, as agreed last October and that these and all other bins be emptied on a daily basis. Furthermore, that new bins be installed between the Railway and Manor Court and at the Harbour, and that the necessary manpower be made available to the Area Engineer to have them emptied on a daily basis."

Illegal Parking in Pound Lane:

As a result of illegal parking in Pound Lane and the adjoining back lanes the Council were unable to collect the wheelie bins on 9 August. This action by uncaring motorists would also have prevented the emergency services from gaining access. Cllr.McGinlev contacted Sot. Mick Desmond and he said that he would take the necessary action to put a stop to this illegal activity.

Carton Demesne:

Locals will be aware that development of the golf courses in Carton has begun. Readers of the Liffey Champion of 22nd July will also have noted that Conor Mallaghan (the Mallaghan family have owned the estate since 1977) stated that "we are hoping to put on offer other leisure facilities for local people such as walking, riding and cycling," Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Community Council to seek an early meeting with Conor Mallaghan so that agreement can be reached on his offer in the interests of the community.

Banning of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV's) from Housing Estates:

The only estates that asked Cllr.McGinley to have HGV's banned are:

Moyglare Village, Meadowbrook, Meadowbrook Crescent, Greenfield Estate, Parklands and Beaufield.

Pedestrian Crossing Lights at entrance to Kingsbry:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply, from the Council, to his motion for heavy duty lights:

"These pedestrian lights are vandalised on a regular basis. New heads for these lights which are vandalproof would cost £6,000 approximately. However, the controllers (which were vandalised recently) could still be vandalised and this problem is really a matter for the Gardai." While it is accepted that this is a Garda matter, it is not possible for them to be there all the time. It is obviously the same mindless thugs who keep breaking the lights and if anyone knows their identity they should inform the Gardai. Cllr. McGinley will ask the Council to proceed with the Vandalproof lights.

Geraldine Hall and Harbour Field Maynooth:

The Maynooth Community is fortunate to have "amenities" such as these on its doorstep. Unfortunately, full use cannot be made of them until their ownership is transferred to the County Council. The existing trustees have agreed to relinguish their interest in the property provided that there is a legal agreement that the Harbour Field could only be used for Recreational, Social and Amenity Purposes. The Leixlip Area Committee of the Council fully agreed with this at its meeting on 5th November 1999.

However, it appears as if no progress has been made since then.

Cllr.John McGinley has written to the County Manager asking for an explanation for the delay. It seems extraordinary that it should take so long as the Council and the owner have the same solicitor.

There is no shortage of money to develop both the field and the Geraldine Hall. The latter is a protected building, but it is becoming a ruin through lack of care.

The Celtic Tiger won't last forever and it would be a shame if Maynooth could not benefit from the community gain that other towns are getting throughout the country.



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

And painkillers do nothing for the emotional upset connected with P.M.S. Essential oils can provide the perfect answer, offering relief from pain and enhancing our mood.

True melissa and rose otto are top of the list for women's problems. These are quite expensive but you may find the relief is worth the cost. Clary sage and roman chamomile are also strongly recommended. A mix of two or three of these four can give excellent results. Lavender, geranium and bergamot, are also very suitable; lavender, in particular, helps harmonise and regulate menstruation. Remember, never use essential oils undiluted. Be sure to buy a quality brand of oil. Cheap oils are not pure essential oils and can be harmful. Your health shop will advise you.

It is estimated that 40% of women suffer from P.M.S. and each one's symptoms are unique to themselves. For this reason, it is encouraging to know you can mix a blend of oils to suit your own particular set of symptoms. Be aware, however, that you may need to experiment before you find the blend most suited to you and everyone has their preferences regarding the combination of fragrances. Here are a couple of suggestions to try for some specific symptoms:-

Weeping/Depressed: P.M.S.: 9 drops Rose, 12 drops Clarysage, 9 drops Bergamot,, blended in 30mls Carrier Oil. Spasmodic Pain: 5 drops Lavender, 10 drops Peppermint, 10 drops Nutmeg, 5 drops Cypress, blended in 30 mls Carrier Oil.

To reduce pain and regularise your periods, essential oils should be applied in a carrier oil every morning and evening on the abdomen and lower back starting at least seven days before your period is expected. Six to eight drops of a blend of your chosen essential oils in your bath is also soothing and helpful. You should notice a difference by the second or third month. 

Support your local petrol station

In the past two years the newsletter has carried out two surveys on petrol prices in Maynooth and surrounding areas. These have tended to show that petrol prices in Maynooth particularly at the ESSO station-are reasonably competitive compared to prices in Lucan, Palmerstown and elsewhere in West Co.Dublin. The issue of petrol prices has hit the headlines in the past few months with prices increasing by up to 50% in the past year. Consumers are being urged to shop around and rather than just asking for the usual £10 or £20 worth to make note of the price per litre. The good news for Maynooth residents is that prices at both the Maxol and ESSO stations in the town are amongst the lowest in the country. Unleaded petrol is 70.9p per litre in both stations as of August 21st which is, as far as we know, the cheapest petrol in Co.Kildare. In fact travelling through Clane, Naas and Newbridge it is noteworthy just how expensive petrol is elsewhere in the county, up to 79.9p in some stations. That

adds up up to £4.50 per litre on a fill for an average family car.

It is also noticeable that competition between stations does seem to work in keeping prices down but this depends on vigilant consumers.

So well done to ESSO and Maxol stations in Maynooth. Keep it up-and your prices down.

Hand in hand they make their way home. As their small son takes his first steps alone. Cecilia Murray.

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
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
GRAN CANARIA 2000

I had not intended to write an article about Gran Canaria, probably the most famous of the Canary Islands. We have been visiting there now for about 10 years (we've lost count)! After Fuerteventura I was unsure about Playa del Ingles, Gran Canaria in August - the height of summer but we had a wonderful time. The numbers appear to have delined somewhat over the recent years and it was not as manic as we had expected.

Temperatures did reach 40 plus however and drained most of us. We had two teenage girls with us who greatly enjoyed the night life in particular. That was their third visit and they had made friends among the ex-patriate community there, mainly the singers, presenters and the so-called PRs, the young people who work for the thousands of pubs and restaurants around the resort.

As usual we centered our visit around the Irish Centre, very predictable! By the way, half of Maynooth seems to have decided to go on holiday for the same period and we met a lot of acquaintances there.

Playa del Ingles itself is famous for the late-night activities, the discos bars and pubs do not close until six or seven in the morning. I must admit that I have actually never set foot in one of these discos. Many of them around the Irish centre are underground and one of the reasons for visiting the Canaries, for me personally at least, is the possibility of spending 24 hours a day in the open air. The nights were a pleasant 23 plus degrees, but it was quite muggy and humid for most of the fornight.

One of our main reasons for visiting this resort so often is that we have made friends over there. The Irish Jockey pub has been the centre of our night life for 10 years, the Spanish owners know and welcome us each year. The barmen have been there for some years also and the two girls in particular were chuffed when everyone recognized them after more than a year! Thanks to Lupe, Ali, Mohammad and Absolarn who no longer works there but has moved across the hallway to another pub.

John Fahy from Co Galway was in Gran Canaria, playing and singing in the Jockey when we arrived ten years ago. It took some time to establish that John and I had known each other in a previous existence in the Taibhdhearc theatre in Galway. He had been the sound engineer when the company was making a recording of a summer show that we performed each year. Most of the music was recorded live but as a sean nos singer I had to be recorded separately and that was our first meeting.

John is now accompanied by Gerry from Cork and Ollie White from Waterford and together the lads provide great entertainment. They treated the two girls so well, slagged us each night as we came into the pub and the hugs and kisses on the last night ensured that they were promising to return as soon as they finish the Leaving Certificate. We still miss Brian who returned home two years ago to play with Louise Morrissey's band, particularly as Brian is from Galway.

John also plays with a band in the incredible Sioux City. This is a cowboy show performed in a huge arena some miles from the resort situated in a film set Western village which was used for Clint Eastwood movies some decades ago!

The setting could quite easily be the American Wild West! Well worth seeing late at night when the navy sky is dotted with millions of stars, visible in the pitch darkness of the island once you leave the resort.

Again, hiring a car in Gran Canaria broadens the view of the restricted resort environment. This is generally regarded as the world's most perfect climate. The island is circular with the road winding along the cliff face, terrifying the first time but eventually you get used to being driven between the sheer drop to the sea on one side and the cliff face on the other. Long tunnels have been built through the solid mountains - extraordinary feats of engineering! The beach of Playa del Ingles is beautiful stretching into the Sahara-dunes of Maspalomas but is worth visiting the neighbouring beaches of San Augustin, Melanores, Amadores which is the new man-made cove. Drive through Puerto Rico where the apartments range from seaside to the cliffs hundreds of feet above the ocean on the way to my absolutely favourite spot in Gran Canaria - the outstanding Puerto de Morgan populated by the yachts of the rich and famous along with the local fishing boats and those that may be hired out. The port is now surrounded by restaurants and a few shops that have apartments for rent above them. Visit

any of these restaurants and taste the fish fresh from that day's catch. Taste papas con mojo anywhere, Canarian sauce with tiny, salty potatoes - delicious!

Drive round about the island to the local towns and villages of Agaete, Aguimes, visit the wind blown town of Arinaga where the modern windmills spin constantly and where I buy wholesale shoes from a factory that still makes a size 35 for small Spanish feet.

However, the most startling journey by car or bus is that through the centre of the island as far as the bananas plantations in the north. The temperature, climate and vegetation changes dramatically, plummetting to 13 degrees at the centre where the island terrain is at its highest.

Tenerife is visible from Gran Canaria's highest point. One of the beautiful local villages that you will pass through is called Santa Brigida - how far has our St Brigid travelled. The Canarians are extremely religious and saint's names abound throughout the island.

The capital Las Palmas is also situated to the north-east of the island with a long beautiful beach alongside. The temperature here is usually much milder than Playa del Ingles and smog or cold is common. Do not expect a tourist town, this is the capital of Canarias, an extraordinarily busy city and port with huge cargo ships sailing to and fro all the time. They can be seen passing on the horizon from the beaches to the south. Do not expect them to speak English either because generally they are not bothered and will only speak Spanish. But for the dedicated traveller Las Palmas has much to offer, in particular the older section of the city which dates back to Christopher Colombus who stayed here for a period and his house still stands and is open to visitors.

But the most imposing, perhaps even chilling spectacle we witnessed was the Guanche (native Gran Canarians

massacred by the invaders) museum where one room contained 1,000 skulls each in a separate chamber.

These are accompanied by dozens of mummies recovered during building and road-building projects. The islands have recently become aware of their pre-Spanish heritage and are beginning to distinguish themselves from mainland Spain. During the building of one road they discovered the remains of a Guanche village and contrary to our experience at Woodguay they built around it. There is a great revival of interest in Guanche language, music and heritage in Gran Canaria. There are reproductions of their goddess figures to be bought as souvenirs and large statues are now appearing in the towns and villages. The most common is the goddess of Tara. As a teacher of early Irish society, the tingle that went down my spine at seeing such a name in Gran Canaria was indescribable. Memories of Bob Quinn's theories of Celtic-Berber-North African relations came flooding back and wouldn't I love to say that we are really Canarian and that would be the excuse for endless research visits to the sun. I have never quite had the nerve to put this to my employers!

But my real reason for writing about this particular visit was the sudden realisation that we had become really close friends with some of the locals. After three days we went to visit the bar of a local whom we met on our first holiday. Unused to the local wine we ended up on our first night, under the weather, only speaking English and probably pretty annoying at a small bar which is still there, The Lady Pink outside Greenfield apartments and across the road from the Irish centre. The barman looked after us and we returned the following day to apologise. He reassured us that we had done no wrong. Over the years he became the manager of the pub and one year as we prepared to leave at 11.30 p.m. we paid him a visit to have a last drink. The bar, which is all open-air of course, was full, no free table or chairs. He came out with two chair and a table while all the other customers looked on, wondering who we were. As time went on he got his own bar and we continued to visit. This year his latest bar had disappeared and we asked the doorman where he had moved to now. Our friend had had a heart attack while driving his car. He was dead. Our tears told us what friends we had made there. It put a damper on the holiday for all four of us. We could not even commiserate with his family as they live on one of the smaller islands. I do not mention his name out of respect for him and this Newsletter will be going to the Jockey. But I dedicate this article to his memory. We miss him and will never forget him, he helped to make Playa del Ingles another home for us. Amigo, esta a ti, muchas gracias y a dios.

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
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Draft town plan agreed by Councillors

It is over four years since the process of putting together a development plan for Maynooth was initiated. The end now seems in sight as the Co. Council adopted a draft plan on July 24th last which now goes on public display for a three month period. Back in 1996 an earlier draft plan was produced which included very significant new zoning for residential land together with a ring road and zoned amenity land. Subsequently, Kildare Co Council adopted a County Development Plan which took a strategic approach to population growth across the country and placed limits on the expansion of the north Kildare towns.

In the early part of this year the Co. Council engaged consultants Conway, Shipman & Martin to draw up a draft plan for the town. This plan was considered by four local councillors in the Maynooth - Leixlip area who incorporated their own amendments before the plan came before the full Co. Council on the July 24th. Now it's the public's turn to make their views known as the plan goes on display until October.

In summary, the draft plan has four main elements:

*150 acres to be zoned residential across a number of location

*Land zoned for light industry and office use, princpally on the Dublin Road

*provision for amenity land including a public car park off the Dublin Road and playing pitches for the schools and the

GAA and the soccer clubs

*two ring roads, one running from Blacklion to the Straffan Road, the other from the Moyglare Road to Blacklion

The document runs to some forty pages and includes a wide range of proposals which have the potential to reshape our town over the next five or six years. As a town, Maynooth has seen dramatic changes over the past twenty years its-population has trebled, the university has expanded dramatically, the town has been bypassed and the Main Steet redeveloped and there are a whole range of new servics including two hotels. The stated aim of the new draft plan is to insure that ' the town grows in a balanced fashion. Growth in population must be accompanied by growth in the social, cultural and economic infrastructure of the town'. Whether the details of the plan meet that goal is a very important question for Maynooth and can be considered by the pubic over the next three months. Our local councillors suggest we go and see the plan and make our views known. It's hard to think of a more important civic duty.







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MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

By now the proposed Maynooth Development Plan for the period to the beginning of 2006 should be on display in the Public Library. It represents the view of our 4 local councillors on how Maynooth should change over the next five years.

Theoretically it should reflect a planning philosophy designed to preserve and enhance the quality of life for you the resident and voter. In practice it is the outcome of a lobby process by landowners who wish to achieve a fifty-fold increase in the value of their land by land rezoning or organisations seeking to be given a donation of land as a result of the process. Like any product being marketed, those seeking to sell the plan (or in the case, gain your acquiescence to it) will stress the positive aspects and minimise the negative ones.

We know only too well who the winners in the proposed plan will be. But are there any positive aspects for the ordinary resident? And who are the losers? Are they likely to include you?


On the positive side, the intention to provide non development-led ring roads is to be welcomed. This is especially the case on the east side of the town, although the precise route requires some rethinking. Having such roads running close to existing residential areas such as Carton Court, or through new residential areas seems to be poor planning. Just who will use the northern leg is less clear. Certainly it is unlikely traffic from Kilcock will travel to the Dunboyne Road and back to get to the motorway. This is fairly crucial since Kilcock traffic is set to quadruple over the period of the Maynooth plan. With a large proportion of Maynooth's population increase earmarked for the Moyglare Road, and major residential and retail development imminent at the Moglare Road/Mill Street junction, this is a matter of some concern to residents, if apparently not to our councillors.

On the negative side, councillors propose rezoning 150 acres new residential land. Taken with the existing unused landbank, this provides for a population increase of nearly 5,700. Other pending high density developments in the town make this figure likely to rise over 6,000. The population in the town at the last count was 8,528. So an increase in population of around 70% is possible under the plan. This very definitely would affect your quality of life, 6,000 extra people means around 2,000 extra cars on the streets of Maynooth. Stretched end to end that's a line which would extend from the square to Leixlip. It means an extra 1,000 school places, a downstream demand for second level schools and youth facilities, and greatly increased pressure on recreational, health and community services. The plan proposes no new parking areas in the centre of town. It makes no concrete commitment to new youth facilities, other than pitches, and makes no commitments to the provision of any social infrastructure before the population explosion ensues.

Maynooth Planning Alliance considers this plan excessively expansionary, and in breach of the Strategic Planning Guidelines which advocated "limited further development" for Maynooth. Although it is dressed up in pious aspirations, there needs to be a concrete demonstration on the part of our 4 local councillors that the positive aspects of it will be delivered on before the residential influx materialises. Pending such commitments the jury is still out.

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



So, in order to discourage older people from using this form of lighting, we are supplying an easy to use Lantern to every Senior Citizen who wishes to have one. Most of our people will have received theirs by now, but if there is anyone who did not and wishes to have one they may contact me at 6285206 or any committee member. We recommend that you keep your lantern by your bed should you need it durings the night. Replacement batteries can be purchased from Joe Buckley our supplier.(Ua Buachalla) I take this

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

DORIN'S SIMPLY DELICIOUS RECIPE

MOUSSAKA: Greek dish made with lamb. Serves 4

You will need: 3 tablespoons of good oil 1 small onion, finely chopped 1 lb cooked lamb, diced or minced 2 1/2 oz can tomato puree Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper 8 oz raw potatoes, sliced 1 large aubergine, sliced 1 clove garlic, crushed 8 oz tomatoes, peeled and sliced 1/2 pint cheese sauce 2 oz grated cheese 1 egg volk, free range if possible Fresh parsley to garnish

Oven: 180c 350f Gas mark 4

Method:

1. Heat a third of the oil in a frying pan. Add the onion and allow to colour, then add the meat and shake over a brisk heat for a few minutes.

Remove from the heat, add the tomato puree and season well. Put in an oven proof dish and keep warm. Heat the remaining oil in a frying pan, put in the potatoes and fry gently, until brown. Take the potatoes out of the pan and arrange on top of the meat.

2. Add the aubergine to the frying pan and cook for 5-7 minutes. Then add the garlic, if used, also add the sliced tomato. Continue cooking for 5 more minutes and then pour over the potatoes. Meanwhile prepare the cheese sauce, stir in the egg yoke, pour over the dish. Sprinkle the top with the grated cheese and bake in a moderate oven for 15-20 minutes until well browned. Decorate with fresh parsley.

CHICKEN WITH TOMATOES: Serves 4

You will need: 4 chicken breasts Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper 3 tablespoon of oil 4 large tomatoes 1 clove of garlic 1/2 teaspoon each of thyme and basil 1/4 pint of white wine Some grated cheese 1 teaspoon of chopped fresh parsley

Oven setting- 180c 350f Gas mark 4

Method:

1. Season the chicken breasts well. Heat the oil and fry the chicken for 20 minutes, turning often. Transfer to an oven proof dish. Cover and continue to cook in the oven for 10 minutes.

2. Make the sauce, skin the tomatoes and chop them finely. Peel and crush the garlic. Fry in the remaining fat, adding the thyme, basil and wine. Bring to the boil. Cook gently until soft.

3. Put the chicken on a serving dish. Add the grated cheese. Pour the sauce over the dish, and sprinkle with the fresh parsley. Serve with a salad.

FILLET STEAK ROYALE: Serves 4.

You will need: 4 fillet steaks, about 6oz each

4 tbsp olive oil 1 onion, finely chopped 6 oz button mushrooms, sliced 7 fl oz white wine 5 fl oz double cream 2 tsp whole grain mustard 2 tbsp chopped fresh tarragon 1 clove garlic, crushed sea salt and freshly ground black pepper tarragon sprigs, to garnish (optional)

Method:

1. Flatten the steaks with your fist or with a meat mallet.

2. Heat 2 tbsp oil in a frying pan and fry the steaks, turning regularly according to taste.

3. Meanwhile, heat the oil in another frying pan and saute onion for 3 minutes. Add the mushrooms and cook for a further 3 minutes. Add the wine and simmer for 5 minutes. 4. Stir in the cream, mustard, tarragon, garlic and seasoning and heat gently to warm through.

5. Serve the steaks on a bed of mushroom sauce, garnish with the tarragon sprigs, if like

CHELSEA BUNS.

You will need: 6 oz plain flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 egg beaten 1/2 oz butter, melted.

For the yeast liquid, you will need 2 level teaspoons dried yeast 1/4 pint warm milk 1/2 teaspoon sugar 2 oz plain flour.

For the filling, you will need: 1/2 oz butter, melted 2 oz soft brown sugar 3oz currants If you like you can add 1 oz of mixed peel, chopped Honey for glazing.

Oven time -30-35 minutes Oven setting -190c 375f Gas mark 5

Method:

1. Blend yeast with the warm milk, sugar and 2oz of flour. Leave until it becomes frothy about 20-30 minutes. Mix the remaining flour and salt together. Add to the yeast mixture with the beaten egg and melted butter, mix well . Knead the dough on a light floured table for about 10 minutes. 2. Put to rise in a large bowl and cover with a clean cloth. until double in size. Knead well again on a lightly floured table and roll into a rectangle about 12 inches. Brush with the remaining butter and sprinkle on sugar and fruit.

3. Roll up as for a swiss roll and seal edge. Cut into 9-10 slices. Place in a greased 7 inch square cake tin, cut side down. Leave to rise for a few minutes.

4. Bake in a moderately hot oven for 30-35 minutes. Place on a wire tray and glaze hot buns with a wet brush dipped in honey. 'Enjoy'.

CREAMY SALMON PASTA. Serves 4.

You will need : 10oz Salmon (fresh) 1/2 pt fish stock or water 2 tsp sunflower oil, or any other 1 onion, peeled and finely chopped 1 or 2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed if liked 3 oz mushrooms, sliced 4 tomatoes, skinned and finely chopped 4 tbsp double cream 12 oz tagliatelli, pasta 2 tbsp olive oil 2 tbsp fresh basil leaves

Method:

1. Poach the salmon fillets in the stock or water for 5-10 minutes, until tender. Remove fish and break into large chunks.

2. Heat the oil in the pan and fry the onion and garlic over a gentle heat, until soft but not brown. Add the mushrooms to the pan and cook for a few minutes to soften, stir in the chopped tomatoes and season with the salt and pepper. Add the salmon chunks, then gently stir in the cream and heat through without boiling.

3. Cook the tagliatelli in salted boiling water, until just tender. Drain and toss in the olive oil. Gently stir in the salmon mixture, then arrange on the plates and garnish with fresh basil leaves

PORK IN MUSHROOM SAUCE. Serves 4.

You will need:

- 4 pieces of pork fillet
- 1 oz flour
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 oz butter

- 4 oz button mushroom, thinly sliced
- 14 oz of carrots in a jar

1/4 pint double cream

1 tablespoon chopped chives, fresh

Cooking time 15 minutes

Method:

1. Beat out pork fillets until thin and coat in flour, season with the salt and pepper.

Fry in the butter for about 5 minutes on each side or until cooked. Place on a serving dish and keep warm.

2. Add the mushrooms to the butter in the pan and fry for 3-4 minutes, or until cooked. Stir in any remaining flour and cook for a minute, drain the carrots.

3. Remove from the heat and stir in the cream and a third of the carrots. Reheat very gently until piping hot, but do not allow to boil. Season to taste and pour over the pork. garnish with piles of the remaining heated carrots. Sprinkle with chives.



Kildare v Dublin, August 12th, 4.15pm



Galway, on the other hand, have lost Ja Fallon who did most to put Kildare to the sword in the '98 final. Beyond that, both Kerry and Armagh have obvious weaknesses. It's the most open championship in years. The Sam Maguire surely has Kildare's name on it this year.

But the dream was dashed on the gloomy, wet afternoon of August 27th. Kildare strove manfully but ran out of inspiration and steam in the last few minutes of a tight match. It's not much consolation now to think of what might have been but this was a match Kildare could have won. After Taigh Fennin's goal in the 13th minute Kildare dominated the play but didn't score for another 16 minutes when Padraig Brennan pointed a free. Again, in the second half, after Brian Murphy's goal it was another 18 minutes before Kildare scored again. Maybe the wet day and a hard campaign didn't help. But all the disappointment in not winning has to be set alongside ten weeks of summer when Glen Ryan and his men gave Kildare people everywhere something to celebrate.

Festival

It was felt that a Festival Committee should be set up as soon as possible, to start work on next year's festival. Any person interested should leave their name in the office. It was also felt that any person with ideas and not a

Community Councillor would also be very welcome to join the committee.

Heineken showed a big interest in the festival this year, and would be delighted to sponsor the Festival again next year. Chairperson John Doogan again thanked the committee and office staff for getting this year's festival organized. He also thanked Heineken, though late in the day when approached, they showed great interest in the Festival.

Maynooth Development Plan

The meeting felt that the Development Plan for Maynooth was so important that the October meeting will be entirely devoted to discussing the Plan.

Senan Griffin stated that he was annoyed by the time of the Maynooth Alliance letter in the September Newsletter. He stated that Councillors were only doing the best they could for Maynooth and this Plan was right for Maynooth. Peter Connell pointed out that the Maynooth Alliance wanted questions answered as to how decisions were made to rezone land.

However the meeting felt that articles in the Newsletter re: Maynooth Alliance letter September issue should be under signed and people should be aware of who writes the letters. It was also pointed out that names are with the editor.

Objection to Intel expansion

Cluain Aoibhinn residents Association

Tom McMullon stated that the Residents of the Estate were annoved at the cutting down of trees in the estate. Tom stated that the trees were fine and that they had a tree surgeon look at them. He also stated that other trees that were broken were replaced with unsuitavle trees for estates. It was stated that the company that cut the trees were a reputable company that did that work. How ever it was hoped that the situation would work itself out.

Representation on Community Council

Tidy Towns 2000

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Many thanks for your detailed application form, concise map and information on Pound Park and the Carton walk. The map is excellent and helped considerably with the judging. The judges look forward to the implementation of the plan. The day of judging saw a great number of young people (presumably from the University) in the town. Cycle paths are to be commended and there was not a great deal of traffic which made judging that bit easier. The shop fronts have a good impact in the town and the residential estates are well laid out and are well landscaped. There seems to be good co-operation within the community - well done.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The historic aspect of Maynooth is a wonderful unique feature. The University status of the town puts it in an enviable position of attracting a young and vibrant population as well as the commuters and locals that have their roots in the town. The old churches and other historic buildings have a tremendous effect on the overall appearance of the town. A number of facades looked well in the main street and these included Katies Flowers, Mill Wine Shop, Hula-Bou, the Pottery Barn, the Post Office. Coonans and the Peppermill. The Parish Hall and St. Mary's were fine though there were weedy gutters in the carpark. Kairos Communications had some fine climbing roses on their walls. The Maynooth GAA Club was fine though the wall and gate painting will be required for next year. Laraghbryan Cemetery looked well cared for and again had some nice climbers on the wall which made good impact. Maynooth College is a very fine building. New buildings and entrances also looked well. Grassy areas still need cutting back. The Garda Station looked very well and it was noted that work was being undertaken on the Railway Station.

LANDSCAPING

The landscaping in and around Maynooth was excellent. The green area opposite the entrance to the college was well cared for. Planting at the turnaround on the Straffan road looked well: however, it would be better to have more permanent planting, as it will last throughout the year. In the centre of the town, the amenity area/monument was clean and tidy. There were three cottages in Old Greenfields that had made tremendous effort with their landscaped residences well done. The Pound Lane Park will enhance this part of the town considerably. At present all that could be seen was long grass and some scattered litter. Litterbins will be required in the area. Please ensure they are covered so that they are not effected by wind or birds.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

The canal amenity area is a wonderful amenity for the town. It can be accessed in two main places. The access off Parsons Lane looked well and there were several people walking the canal on the evening of adjudication. The main access to the harbour was fine though there was a scattering of litter. The adjudicator could not understand the barrier for parking or the notices not allowing anyone to park there despite there being a large carpark. Perhaps, this is only temporary. It was noted that the adjacent field was being cleared. Swans, ducks and yellow water lilies looked well in the canal here though there did seem to be an oily scum on part of the water surface. The stream area in Old Greenfield had been cut back and this is another area that could be considered as a wildlife site if planted and managed correctly. The plan for Carton Avenue incorporates a number of areas suitable for wildlife. Do ensure that you have the full co-operation from all involved before this development proceeds.

LITTER CONTROL

The litter control in the town was good. There was guite an amount of litter close to the harbour area. Litterbins were full on the main street and a programme of ensuring that they are emptied more frequently should be adopted. Litter was also spotted on Parsons Lane at the bridge and

close to the proposed development at Pound Street. The residential estates were well presented both with regards to litter control and the presentation of litter bins - Well done.

TIDINESS

The judges were most impressed with the care taken in the cutting of the vast amount of open spaces and grass particularly in the residential estates. The Movglare approach is very tidy and because of this, the odd weed in the gutter stood out. Other approach roads were generally untidy and marks can be gained by addressing this section. The centre of the village was tidy and clean though weedy gutters were a problem in places such as on the Leixlip approach.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

The estates were generally well presented. Movglare Manor was well presented as was Movglare Meadows, Parsons Lodge and Park looked well and there was nice planting in Cluain Acibhainn and Woodlands. Castlebridge was fine though some beds were weedy. Greenfield estate was good though there were weedy bases to trees and no Litterbins evident. Old Greenfield presented some lovely cottages and there was great effort evident in some of the houses deep in the estate. Pebble Mill also looked well.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The approach from Moyglare was very pleasant as far out as Moyglare Stud with its distinctive litterbins. The Galway approach looked well though there was erratic verge cutting and additional cutting was required in places. Signage here was very dirty and required a cleanup. The new signs on the Parsons approach looked well though this approach was weedy in places and grass required cutting back. The Dublin approach was not good. Long grass both outside the Mart and Tescos gave an untidy impression. Tescos is being refurbished it was noted and perhaps this will contribute to the better appearance of this approach. The Dunboyne approach also needed attention with better verge cutting and tidying of the margins.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

Maynooth did look well on the evening of adjudication. Great effort had been made in the residential areas and landscaping. Prioritise the areas that will gain you additional marks in the future such as approach roads, and the continued awareness of litter prevention. Incorporate these into your development plan and you can look forward to progress over the coming years.







Maynooth to get new Street Signage

Maynooth is shortly to have new street signage erected in the town. The move follows a request from Maynooth History Group and Maynooth Action Strategy to the Local Area Council, Kildare County Council. Street names will be in English with Irish name translations. Some of the signs will have the former English street names included.

The need for street signage in Maynooth was highlighted earlier in the year with the publication by the Local History Group of the booklet "Exploring Maynooth, five self-guide historical walks." The booklet makes reference to street names, which may be known to local residents but in the absence of any street signage would not be known to visitors. It is hoped that the erection of street signage will further enhance Maynooth's tourist potential.

The Street Signage will incorporate the new town crest, which was approved by the Community Council on Monday night following a competition.



Maynooth Labour News

Exiting Glenroyal Centre to be made easier:

Cllr. John McGinley's motion "That the exit from the Glenroyal Centre to the Straffan Road be widened to give right and left turning exiting lanes" was agreed at the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting of the Council on 1 September. It was also agreed that there was no need for traffic lights here because of the pending closure of Doctors Lane and the installation of traffic lights at Parklands/Railway Station junctions.

Clir. McGinley has also asked that cycle lane and pedestrian lane crossings be clearly marked on the road across the exit so that motorists will have no doubt that pedestrians and cyclists have right of way.

Grants for Maynooth Soccer Club

Cllr. John McGinley proposed that £15,000 for recreational development be given to the Maynooth Soccer Club at the September Area Meeting of the Council. This will now go before the Full Council Meeting on 25th September for approval.

Improvement Works on Kildare Bridge, Maynooth Dunboyne Road:

Approval was given at the September Area Meeting to put the \pounds 1,178,000 improvement work proposals on public display. The proposals include the widening of the bridge and the construction of a roundabout at the junction with the Blacklion Road. In Cllr. McGinley's view these safety improvements are very badly needed and are long overdue.

Major Improvements for Maynooth Litter Management:

Cllr. John McGinleys motion "That litter bins be installed at all bus stops on the Straffan Road and Leixlip Road, Maynooth, as agreed last October and that these and all other bins be emptied on a daily basis. Furthermore, that new bins be installed between the railway and Manor Court and at the Harbour and that the necessary manpower be made available to the Area Engineer to have them emptied on a daily basis. "was agreed unanimously at the September Area Meeting. Cllr.McGinley asked that the passing of the motion be brought to the County Managers attention in order to ensure its implementation.

Inputs to Drawing up the Estimates for Year 2001

The County Finance Officer attended the September Area Meeting to get individual Councillors inputs to the Estimates. Cllr. McGinley asked that financial provision be made for the following:

1. The separation of the litter management function from the roads engineering function. The present arrangement does not work as the road engineering comes first with litter

management seen as an add on. This results in the streets not being swept or litter bins not being emptied if one person goes on holiday or is sick. This crazy situation must not be allowed to continue and bins must be emptied each day of the week. 2. The creation of a Parks Department to maintain public open

spaces, litter management and maintaining trees in town and in housing estates.

3. Significant financial contribution to grass cutting in estates by Residents'Associations.

Banning of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV's) from Estates Agreed:

Clir. John McGinleys motion that HGV's be banned from Moyglare Village, Meadowbrook, Meadowbrook Crescent, Greenfield Estate, Parklands and Beaufield was unanimously agreed at the September Area Meeting. The signs will be erected towards the end of this year when resources become

available.

£25,000 for Laraghbryan Cemetry Maintenace Committee:

In supporting Cllr. Griffins motion for every assistance possible, Cllr. McGinley proposed at the September Area Meeting the allocation of £15,000 in 2001 and £10,000 in 2002 to assist the Laraghbryan Cemetery Committee. This recommendation will now go before the Estimates Meetings for approval.

Kingsbry Pedestrian Lights

Cllr. McGinleys motion" that a grid be installed around the lights at the pedestrian crossing" in order to stop them from being vandalised, was agreed at the September Area Meeting. This should cost significally less than the £6,000 estimated by Council Officals.

New Traffic Lights/Pedestrian Crossings at the Roost, Main Street, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinleys motion"That the traffic lights and pedestrian crossings agreed in the Maynooth Main Street Improvement Works for the bottom of the town be installed without any further delay" was agreed unanimously at the September Area Meeting.

Geraldine Hall and Harbour Field:

The delay in handing over these properties to the Council so they can be developed for Recreational, Social and Amenity use is very disappointing. Even though the Council agreed to the conditions laid down by the existing trustees last November the trustees have not yet released their hold on the Harbour Field. The County Secretary has agreed to write to the Trustees yet again in the interests of the community.

Blocking of Lanes by Uncaring Motorists:

Refuse has not been collected twice in the recent past from residents on Double Lane/Leinster Cottages because of illegal parking by motorists. Such disregard of the law has to be stamped out as it could easily have been the emergency services who would have been stopped from gaining access. Cllr McGinley has asked the Gardai to enforce the law and in order to assist them Cllr.McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council: "That double yellow lines be painted on one side of the Lanes

Environmental Improvement Works-Greenfields

Given the decision by Minister of State Molloy to refuse funding to Kildare County Council for the Environmental Improvement Works at Greenfields, Maynooth, Deputy Emmet Stagg has tabled a Motion at Kildare County Council seeking provision in the 2001 Estimates for this work to be funded from internal Council receipts. Four other areas in the County are also affected by this decision and Deputy Stagg is also seeking funding for these.



Cllr Paul Kelly pointed out that this is the first time that land will be set aside for managed Parks in Maynooth which will come under the auspices of a Parks Committee to be set up by Kildare County Council. All houses around these parks will face onto the park areas for safety and security reasons.

d) Carton Avenue to be upgraded - in tandem with Maynooth Action Strategy. A 10 page plan was drawn up and presented to Minister McCreevy on June 15th when he visited Carton Avenue. This is an issue where the Cumann feels it can ensure that all efforts will be made to progress this venture. Minister Mc-Creevy was particularly impressed with the

Plan presented and felt its adoption would be a notable" community gain" The Cumann are now working actively with the Minister and Cllr Kelly and it is likely to be an important part of our prospective submissions to the Council re the Development Plan.

f) Approximately 20 acres of playing pitches are to be set aside for youth sport.

g) Maynooth Town Centre - The views and fabric of the Main Street and town centre are to be preserved. There will be a fixed height limitation around the town centre to be applied to apartments etc.

Again the above represents a very brief overview of the Development Plan. The Cumann recommends that all residents in Maynooth should visit the Library and examine the Plan and make representations they feel might be appropriate, beneficial or necessary to Kildare County Council directly or more particularly to Councillor Paul Kelly who will "air" those issues and contributions on behalf of the residents of Maynooth, Paul can be contacted at 6243624. Again any Cumann member can be approached to bring those views or ideas to the attention of Paul who will have a direct impact on the final draft to be adopted.

Budget Submission

The Cumann are currently investigating issues for submission to the Minister for possible inclusion in the Budget due in December. Minister McCreevy will be visiting us in Maynooth on 7th October and we plan to submit our ideas to him then. Perhaps again if anyone feels they have a good idea that should be included for consideration we would invite them to contact any cumann members at the numbers listed at the end of this article.

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

The new station in Kilcock was opened in 1998 and at present all Stations between Maynooth and the City Centre are being rebuilt to include: new PA system, Mobility Impaired access, new lighting, passenger help points, CCTV and real time train information. Park and ride facilities at Coolmine and Maynooth Stations have been extended to accommodate additional cars.

Train Services

TEA BRACK FOR HALLOWEEN

- You will need:
- 1 lb mixed dried fruit
- 1/2 pint cold tea
- 6 oz brown sugar 1 lb flour
- 1 egg
- 1/4 teaspoons, baking powder

Method: 1. Put the fruit to steep in the cold tea with the brown sugar. leave for a few hours.

2. Add the flour, beaten egg, mixed spice and baking powder. Mix well togerher.

3. Put into a greased lined 8 inch tin, place a piece of tinfoil on top.

Bake in a moderate oven for about 2 hours.

Baked Marrow


Serves 4 You will need: 1 med sized marrow 8 oz butter 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley 2oz breadcrumbs Sea salt and freshly ground black peper 1 egg, free range if possible Some grated cheese 2 oz button mushroons 2 oz tomatoes Cooking time 1 hour Oven temp, 180 (350f) gas mark 4

Method:

1. Peel the marrow, cut it in half lengthways and scoop out the seeds. Peel the onion and chop it finely. Chopped the mushrooms and tomatoes. Melt the butter and fry the onion for 5 mins until soft, but not brown, then add the minced meat and seal over a high heat for a few minutes.

2. Remove the pan from the heat, blend in the chopped parsley and Breadcrumb's also the tomatoes and mushrooms season the stuffing with the salt and pepper. Beat the egg lightly and use it to bind the stuffing

3. Spoon the stuffing into the two marrow halfs and put them together. Tie in place with two or three pieces of fine string, and wrap the stuffed marrow in buttered foil. Place in a roosting tin and bake in the oven. If you like you can sprinkle the grated cheese over the marrow and return to the oven for a few minutes. Cut the stuffed marrow into thick slices and serve with roast potatoes. If you don't want to use meat you can stuff the marrow with vegetables and cheese and serve with rice.



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

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

The Plan

The Draft Development Plan for Maynooth is now back with Kildare Co. Council. The closing date for submissions on the draft plan was November 30th last and it is believed a number of local groups have proposed amendments to the plan. The County Manager and other Co. Council officials hosted a public meeting in the Glenroval Hotel on November 20th which was designed to explain the plan to the public and provide an opportunity for local people to air their views. Our four local councillors also attended. The council officials will have left the meeting in no doubt as to the strong views held by the people of Maynooth regarding the draft plan and the Co. Council's past record in developing the town. Traffic, parking, flooding, litter and lack of facilities were just some of the issues which speakers identified as being inadequately addressed by the Council in the past. The draft plan to cover the year 2001-2006, aspires to provide new ring roads, additional parking, seven day street cleaning and new recreational and cultural facilities. And that is to be welcomed. But judging by the tone of the Glenroval meeting, unless those aspirations are turned into reality the Co. Manager and his officials might be well advised to wear armour plating when they come to Maynooth in five years time to sell the next plan!

Deaths in Maynooth

The Newsletter would like to extend its sympathy to the relatives and friends of Phil Brady, Allen Gaffney and Dr. John Cullen who all died recently. Phil Brady and John Cullen were long standing residents of Main St. and, in their different ways, had contributed much to the local community over the years. Allen's death at just 23 was particularly tragic. The huge attendance at his funeral reflected his popularity and the impact his sudden death had on the town.

Co - options

Six new people were co - opted to the Community Council, representing Rockfield, Parklands, Parson Lodge, Senjor Citizens Group and Maynooth Flower Club.

Development Plan

At a previous meeeting the Development Plan was fully outlined by Senan Griffin and John M cGinley - a total of 150 acres to be rezoned for housing including 14 acres on the Dunboyne Rd, 0'Neill Park 1.8 acres, Castledawson - Rathcoffey Rd -32acres; Moyglare Rd - 48 acres. Also in the plan is a 60 acre park at Carton Avenue, and a 7 acres park at Carton Court and Greenfield Drive. Ring roads are to be introduced to improve traffic circulation in the town including Old Dublin road to Celbridge Road and on to the Straffan Road and a major link from Laraghbryan to the Moyglare Road. This link is planned to be completed over several years. The plan also provides 10 acres for the GAA, and the schools 10 acres, Soccer Club - 10 acres, also land for the Gael Scoil on the Celbridge Road. Senan Griffin felt it was a pity that the Planning Alliance didn't send a Representive to the meeting so some of their concerns could be addressed . The Action Area Plan is to include the development of the Harbour Field but as this situation is not finalised nothing can be done yet.

Meadowbrook Link

It was felt that it was important that this Link Road goes ahead It was hoped that it would be developed to a high standard to take all the extra traffic that would come from all the housing that is planned.

Floods in Maynooth

Afrer the disastrous flooding in Maynooth it was felt that Kildare Community Council will have to make sure that all drains are kept clean. John Doogan said, he wants to know what K.C.C. is going to do so we will not have th same problems again on the motorway. It was stated that there is a pipe from the motorway going into the Meadowbrook stream. With all the new development planned where will all the surface water go? A letter was received from Johm Mc Ginley stating that he has put a motion for Kildare County Council regarding the flooding in Maynooth.

Parsons Lodge-Submission to County Council

A letter was received from Parson Lodge Residents Association objecting to the development of a four storey block of apartments to be built at Parson Lodge. It was agreed to support them with their submission to Kildare County Council.


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
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WASTE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Community Council have set up a waste management committee which hopes to work in conjunction with other groups in the area to raise awareness in the community as to the importance of reducing our refuse and trying, as far as possible, to reuse and recvcle.

The Newsletter hopes to publish a short series on the various elements of waste management and to give tips on what is possible without too much trouble.

Composting

This is a good time of the year to begin composting although you can begin at any time. As summer bedding plants die off and the leaves need to be cleaned up they can be composted instead of disposing of them in the garbage collection. Any small garden can have a compost heap or bin. A compost bin is available from Kildare County Council for £20, they can be bought from the garden centres or you use an old container or simply leave it in the corner of the garden. Within a year it will produce brown, sweet, crumbly compost. This saves money on fertilizer and it can be spread in the late spring and early summer when your new bedding plants are put down.

What can you put in?

Most perishable household rubbish can be composted and re-used in the garden such as vegetable peels, skins and food Kitchen paper, paper, cardboard, newspapers in small amounts (the cardboard will compost better if they are torn up before being put into the compost)

Most garden rubbish can be added particularly grass cuttings, leaves, flowers, vegetables

Cigarettes butts

Ashes from the fire

Non-woody prunings.

What to avoid in the compost heap Glass Metals Plastic (bags etc.) Diseased plants, weeds, rose cuttings or plants with thorns or nettles Meat Used paper tissues

You can use the compost on flowerbeds, as a mulch, in pots or making up potting mixture for plants.

Reuse / Recycle for Christmas

Bring your own shopping bags with you - refuse to take the plastic bags offered Try to avoid packaged goods as much as possible

Keep wrapping paper and re-use. Open presents carefully so that the paper is not torn and fold it away for next year Keep and re-use envelopes - if only among family members

Even Christmas cards can be re-used (but you could be accused of being an out and out Scrooge!) Again family members might not mind

Paul Croghan, Secretary of Maynooth Tidy Towns reviews the tidy towns activities this year and looks at the groups plan for 2001

2000 Busiest year ever for Tidy Towns

The first year of the new millennium has been one of the busiest years in recent times for Maynooth Tidy Towns. The small voluntary committee undertook a large numbrer of projects this year including the special National Millennium Committee "Green Town 2000" Competion. As usual we participated in the St. Patrick's Day Parade. Our Best Estates and Shop front competitions were also a big success this year.

What we achieved in 2000

Since the termination of our Community Employment project in June 1998, all work relating to tidy towns is completed on a voluntary basis. The purpose of tidy towns is not to undertake the daily maintenance of the town, but to promote and undertake projects that wil enhance the town. The main work here relates to the flowerbeds and landscaping around the town. We increased our marks by six in the National Tidy Towns Competion 2000, continuing our upward movement in marks from 159 in 1996 to 184 this year. Our aim for 2001 is to break the 200-mark barrier. For comparison the results achieved by Celbridge this year was 204 marks and Leixlip 192 marks.

Community efforts were vital is 2000

This year we decided to write to about thirty local groups and organisations to seek their help with the work needed in the town to maintain our marks in the competion and improve our environment. Some of the people we need to thank are most residents associations for the work in their estates. Carton Court, Kingsbry, Greenfield and Parklands Residents Associations for thier heil help with the weeding on the Straffan Road. Also the Maynooth Fianna Fail cumann for the work on the two bus turning points on the Straffan Road and the Labour Party branch for their help on the Straffan Road. The Gaffney Family for their help with the maintenance of verges on Convent Lane. The Post -Primary School and Kairos Communications and the Residents of Movglare Meadows, for their work on the Moyglare Road,

Again this year, The Maynooth Flower and Garden Club worked with us on the shrub beds at the Church and the flowerpots at the Maynooth Library and in Carton Avenue. In particular our gratitude is due to Mrs Baxter and Mrs Desmond. We would also like to acknowledge Eddie Treacy for his help here. "Intel Involved", the voluntary community programme operated by Intel helped us again this year with the shrub beds at the Church and with tree planting near the Straffan Lodge Hotel on the Barberstown Road. To the many others who helped us, please accept our greatest appreciation for your efforts.

Tommie Holmes- Maynooth Tidy Towns: Person of Year

Full credit also to Mr. Dara Wyer, Local Agenda 21 Officer with Kildare County Council for his support and assistance with funding for parts of this project.

Sunday Morning voluntary Clean up suspended

Maynooth Tidy Towns has arranged a voluntary Sunday Morning Clean up for the past five years. A group of eight people many who were not otherwise associated with Tidy Towns undertook a clean up of the town centre, mainly in the Main Street and Back anes. We know that this was greatly appreciated by the Traders in the town, because no street cleaning took place between Friday and Mondays, However, with the increasing effort required and the fact that no new volunteers came forward, the eight people nvolved Richard Farrell (Greenfield), Des Matthews (Woodlands), Liam Hayes (Rockfield), Pat Dunne (Rockfield), Eddie McCarthy Woodlands), John Gillick (Rockfield) John Sweeney (Moyglare Road) and sometimes Paul Croghan (Moyglare Village) deserved a break, so the clean up has been suspended. Some Residents of Parson Lodge still undertake a regular clean up in Parson street and the Harbour areas.

Fidy Towns Plans for 2001

There are a number of target issues for 2001, which will be tackled early in the year. These include lobbying for a seven-day street cleaning service. More bins, in areas where none currently exist and an extension of the bin emptying service. We are grateful to Maynooth Credit Union for their offer to pay for more bins in the Main Street area. We will be looking to Kildare County Council to do more work with the approach roads to the town as well as the back lanes as these areas are bringing down the marks in the idy towns competition. We will also be looking to Kildare County Council for a commitment to paying for some of the grass cutting costs in some open spaces, as we are unable to continue all of this work ourselves. The two most important areas are the two bus turning points on the Straffan Road which need to be redesigned as buses are driving over them despite the fact that we replanted them with community support this year.

Robert O'Reilly, key to Tidy Towns effort

Without the efforts of our Chairman, Mr. Robert O' Reilly there would be no possibility of progress for Maynooth in Tidy Towns. Robert, who is retired, spends much of his time cutting Carton Avenue and the other green areas around the town during the summer. He takes particular pride in Carton Avenue and spends over five hours a week in keeping it as an attractive passive amenity area for the people of Maynooth. We in Tidy Towns, as well as the people of Maynooth owe him a personal debt of gratitude for his efforts.





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


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Residents'Associations

Residents Associations and The Maynooth Development Plan.

The above Plan (in draft form) has been published and has attracted serious attention from all Residents' Associations, and other organisations in Maynooth. The plan has been on view in Maynooth Library for the statutory period of 3 months. Residents from all organisations and individuals have a right to make submissions, to Kildare County Council to either object to or agree with aspects of the plan.

In the meantime many meetings have taken place, allowing residents an opportunity to voice their opinions. The first meeting was held in late October by Parklands Residents' Association in Straffan Lodge Hotel. It was attended by approximately 150 people, including residents from other areas. Mr. Emmet Stagg T.D. & Mr John McGinley Co. Councillor, Mr. Senan Griffin Co. Councillor were present. The issue of Parklands Road not being described as a culde-sac in the Draft Plan was debated. It is at present a cul-de sac, but fears were expressed that the danger of this Road becoming "a feeder" access to and from the Straffan Road to the proposed ring road were expressed; the problems this would create were the main subjects of discussion.

- 1. The imminent danger to children and pedestrians.
- 2. The noise and pollution levels.
- 3. The ensuing traffic problems

My Family Tree By Laura O'Brien

My mother was born in Anne's Hospital, Tralee, My father was born in Holles Street Hospital Dublin My mother lived in a two - storey house on a farm in Kilfalney in Kerry and my father lived in a two storey house in a cul-de -sac in 28 college Drive. Terenure. Dublin. Both my uncle live in each house. My mothers parents are both from Kerry they lived in Kilfalney and when my Granddad Florence died my Granny moved to Castleisland. My fathers parents are both from Wexford and before they had before they had Kids they moved to Dublin. My Granddad Patrick and my Granny Anastasia died when my dad was 17, Anastasia died of heart attack and Patrick died of cancer. My dads family was then raised by my great aunt Maura. My granny in Kerry got married on the 25th of April 1952, she was born on the 4th of July 1923. She lived in Dramulton in Currow as a child. As children my parents played rounders, blind-man buff, marbles, shopkeeper, skipping, hopscotch, cubby houses, football and they used to tie tin-cans to string and pull them around the yard. During the summer they saved-hay, stacked it, went to the bog to collect turf,

went to market with the donkey and cart and my dad went to Wexford to help his uncle on the farm. my Granny learned to sing" Down by the Sally garden" and "Kerry Cow" and "I know what Mary wants" She remembers a lot about the food being rationed 1oz of tea, sugar, butter for each house hold. Today she said there is more money, more social life and more fobs. My great granddad called my granny Nellie Ban which means white Eileen. When my granny went to dances the priest used to chase them out of the hall. In those times they had no shoes and if they did they kept them for mass and school. They walked 3 miles barefoot and their big toes wire always cut and sore. My mother's school had 2 classrooms, outside toilets and an open fire where the pupils brought in turf. The school is still standing in perfect condition in Currow in Faranfore.

FLOODING IN MAYNOOTH

The whole country is under siege by an intense rainstorm. Country wide reports of the storm have news broadcasts chock-a-block as I write. People have been missing work all over town. Closer to home: Monday 6th November will go down in history as one of the wettest November days in living memory around these parts. As if things weren't bad enought traffic-wise, we have the motorway outside Maynooth simply impassable and people in Beaufield. Brookfield and parts of Meadowbrook, completely drowned. People have had to leave their houses, and sandbags are in evidence all along the front driveways in a pathetic looking effort to prevent the problem getting worse. A local take-away was flooded last night, homes and possessions destroyed. In Leixlip people were forced to leave their homes at the bottom the the Captain's Hill. The village is now even worse that usual, And buses are finding it difficult to make it through. Celbridge seems OK, but Ardclough was totally impassable and leaving Celbridge over the bridge, dodgy enough on any other day, is now hampered even more by the Liffey bursting through to the Ardclough road. The roads between Maynooth, Celbridge and Straffan are impassable. The County Council were turning people away from all routes to Straffan this morning. Up in Brookfield, the field has become a lake, and local children are all at home today because the schools are closed. The people who live nearest the motorway are trapped inside their homes and under obligation to one or two neighbours who are lucky enough to own jeeps. Gone are the days when we laughed at proud owners of such four-by-four all terrain mobiles! today is most definitely the Day of the Jeep. For those of us poor enough to have to walk or take buses, wellies are the order of the day, galoshes, raincoats - whatever you can find. Put it on, and keep warm! For a county renowned for it's rainy weather - it has to be said, we don't know how to cope very well in bad weather. Pubs the length & breath of the country will no doubt be full.



The Kavanagh's Story

The Kavanagh Family came to Maynooth in 1831 when they bought the Mill from the Duke of Leinster. They originally came from Wicklow but had their milling business in Smithfield in Dublin. They lived in the Mill House when Edward Kavanagh died in 1890 leaving a young family and a young widow. His wife Margaret ran the business until Joseph was old enough to take over. The Mill prospered under Joseph until his death in 1967. Tom Senior took over then and with the help of a Manager, Paddy Feelay, ran a very tight ship until Tom senior's retirement and Paddy's death about 5 years age.

Did the Mill go into decline after that? Seemingly not, as between the three remaining Kavanaghs they had directorships in many companies. Edward had directorships in 25 companies, Thomas had directorship in 15 and Willie had directorship in 14. Thery are mostly involved in grain, farming, pig production and investment companies.

Why are there up to forty workers angry? They are angry that they were told they would get a decent redundancy package. At a union - management meeting they were promised 6 weeks per year severance pay. Six of the 'last in workers' received this payment of up to £12000.

The longer serving workers were kept on even though there was no production. Some of these men were there for up to 35yrs most had more than 20 yrs service. So instead of receiving what they were promised they will now recieve approximately 8 per cent of it. Between the payment of the lesser time workers and the proposed payment of the longservers and provisional liquadator was sent in. This left the workers with little hope.

In the Independent of the 7/11/00 it was reported that the four directors Ted, William Thomas and Edward recieve a salary increase of 22% in the thirteen months to September 30th 2000 to bring their salaries to £380,813 when they showed a pre tax loss of £6.1 million.

The Independent of Saturday 11th November reported that Edward Kavanagh had withdrawn plans to put a scheme of arrangement to creditors. This means that the Revenue and Banks take their share leaving the government to pay the workers their pittance.

A rich businessman was quoted recently saying a business must pay its dues to the community in which it thrives. As one Sunday Newspaper puts it "questions answered and answers guestioned".

Why is the government, who seen to be so fond of tribunals not look into it?







Dr. John Cullen

One of Maynooth's most distinguished residents, Dr. John Cullen, died on November 19th last. John was born in 1929 and lived at 90 Haddington Road with his parents. He started school at the Holy Faith Convent, Haddington Road, and progressed to St. Michael's CBS, Dun Laoighaire and subsequently to UCD in 1946 where he commenced study of medicine. During these studies, Jchn was awarded 2 gold medals (one for oratory and one for the best student paper). He graduated as a medical doctor on July 17th 1952. After intership at the Mater Hospital, and later at Grangegorman Mental Hospital, at the end of 1953 he went to Cambridge as Registrar in Psychiatry at Addenbrookes and Fulbourn Hospital. John married Mary Vale in Cambridge on February 17th 1954. Also in 1954, he was awarded a UK Medical Research Council scholarship to Cambridge University for post-graduate studies and reserach. He became a member of Clare College, Cambridge. In subsequent years he was first appointed to Medical Council staff at the University and then as a don at Cambridge. He was awarded MA (Cantab.) "by right of office" and later the Master of Science (Cantab.) degree.

John and Mary had five children - Deirdre, Kevin and Mark all born in Cambridge and Finar and Paul, born in Dublin. They returned to Dublin in 1960 when John commenced work at St. Brendan's Hospital, where he was appointed consultant

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

psychiatrist and developed some of the earliest psychiatric out-patient clinics in the country. in 1968 he was appointed Clinical Director for developing reserach. He was also awarded membership of the Royal College of Psychiatrists in London and became an examiner for the College for many vears. Additionally, he was appointed senior lecturer in the Medical School of UCD and taught there until 1992. He was instrumental in setting up a research unit at St. Brendan's and the Clinical Psycholgy services of the Eastern Health Board. He carried out research for the Department of Health, the EHB and other studies, which included examination and testing of all prisioners who were toutured in Northern Ireland during internment in the 1970's. He also set up a custombuilt research unit at St. James' Hospital where research was conducted foe the European Community, the World Health Organisation and NASA in the USA.

In 1980 he was awarded an honorary Foundation Licentiate by the Faculty of Occupational Medicine at the Royal COllege of Physicians in Dublin in recognition of his services to the development of occupational health studies in Ireland. He has published a number of books and scientific studies. In 1997 John was instrumental in setting up the Maynooth Action Strategy Group, a partnership organisation promoting the town.



Clubs, Organisations and Societies

Background

The Aisling Drug Awareness Group is a voluntary, self help organisation, founded in 1990 and now a National Charity, Our headquarters is in Navan, Co. Meath. It was set up as a response to the ever increasing problems associated with drug/alcohol use among teenagers, and has gone from strength to strength.

Aims and Objectives

We promote an environment antipathetic to drugs by heightening public awareness through public talks, national and international conferences, seminars, etc.

We facilitate our Drug Prevention Programme 2. informing and empowering communities.

We oppose the legalisation of all drugs and support 3 the Law Enforcement Agencies.

We develop cluster groups throughout the North East 4. and Nationally and are affiliated to International communities such as;

- European Cities Against Drugs
- **Drug Prevention Alliance**
- Drugwatch International
- Europe Sans Drogues
- National Families in Action.

The Aisling Group is also linked to Statutory and non Statutory Bodies throughout Ireland.

We provide a non residential, Drug Free Recovery Programme, for young people, 17 yrs upwards. It will assist them in becoming active, working members of their community, living to their full potential, drug free. It includes counselling services and family participation.

There is also a support/self help group on a weekly 6. basis, for those who have someone experimenting or addicted to drugs/alcohol.

7. We hope to research the cause and effects of drug/ alcohol use and the links with poverty. We hope also, to research into proven methods and new methods to help combat the communities problems and monitor the effectivness of these situations in our programme.

Problem

Drugs know no class, creed or barrier. They have destroyed the lives of millions of young people, decimated families and cost society dearly in crime, violence and filling prisons. They are a very real part of today's society and are in a young person's environment, should he/she decide to experiment.

Ireland is purported to have the youngest drug using population in Europe and the most common drugs of choice are alcohol and cannabis, both of which are very underrated.

The key factor in combating the drug problem is an informed and active parent. Every child has a right to a drug free life and the only ones that have the time, influence and the inclination to do it are the parents- they encourage, discipline and supervise their children with love and pass on their own values and self esteem and not that of the street. Prevention

centered on Parents is vital, we are who we are today because ordinary people loved and cared about us!

All people need to work together or our communities will be as we have never known them before.

Recommendations

Community based, pro active action is what is advocated by the Government Strategic Task Force (Fianna Fail National Policy, '97)

The Aisling Group are doing this by training and empowering parents/ others to work on a self help basis, providing the basis for community response. Parents/others will be given the core information and skills needed to

- get children through adolescence relatively drug free. recognise early drug related behaviour - and take appropriate action.
- address the more serious behavioral and addiction behaviour.
- become motivated into seeking the appropriate treatment.

Parents/others will be trained to run their own programmes in their own neighbourhoods. For the families with both the beginnings of a behavioral problem and the more seriously addicted youngsters - a parent support group will be formed these will be problem solving groups with a firm theoretical and practical basis. Referrals will be advised to appropriate treatments.

The History of the Royal Canal

Peter Clarke, author of the Royal Canal - The Complete Story and a leading member of the Royal Canal Amenity Group presented an informative and entertaining public lecture and slide show, to approximately 25 people in the Library on 9 November last. The canal was constructed between 1790 and 1817; is approx. 90 miles in length from Dublin to the river Shannon at Cloondara, Co. Longford; its main source of water is Lough Owel, near Mullingar, is 44' wide at the top and 22' at the bottom, lined with special thick clay and is 6' deep at the centre; and has 47 locks and service locks. Despite gross engineering and financial mismanagement, Parliamentary inquiries, shareholders' interference and bankruptcy, its eventual completion was the culmination of a huge project much bigger than the present day M50.

"Long'John Binns, a silk merchant of 59 Dorset Street, was the main driving force behind the Royal Canal Company. Digging commenced in 1970 at Cross Guns Bridge, Phibsboro (alongside today's Des Kelly Carpets) and proceed eastwards towards the Liffey and westwards to Ashtown. 2,000 Irish and English navvies were paid 10d per day, to manually work in primitive conditions and live in mud huts. They soon struck for higher pay and the rate was increased to 18d per day. Two major difficulties between Dublin and Kilcock were the limestone quarry at Carpenterstown, near Clonsilla and the routing of the canal via Maynooth, alongside the entrance to the Duke of Leinster's Demesne (he was a major shareholder) at Carton. . The quarry, which should have been avoided, resulted in delays and huge costs for blasting and the Maynooth route required the building of the Rye aqueduct to carry the canal one hundred feet above the Rye Water at Leixlip.

Passenger and goods service between Dublin and Kilcock began in 1796 with two boats. The Camden and The Phelan, Fares (at 1s-1d first class or 6d second class for Dublin to Leixlip) were cheaper than by coach, canal travel was more comfortable and passengers were able to dine on board. The major attraction was Leixlip, where the scenery at the Salmon Leap and the discovery of a spa by workmen digging the canal in 1791 ensured a steady tourist trade.

With the extension of the canal to the west traffic increased but by the 1820s road improvements and more efficient road carriers drew passengers from the canals. To compete 'Fly boats' were introduced in 1833. These boats were 70' long by 5'6" wide, were made of lightweight iron, carried 110 passengers at a speed of 10 miles per hour and were towed by two horses who galloped each stage of eight miles. The journey time from Dublin to Mullingar was cut from twelve to eight hours. Night boats were exclusively used by the 'lower classes' at 1d per mile.

In 1845 the canal was bought by the Midland Great Western Railway Company who planned to close it and construct a railway on its bed. Luckily, they were precluded from this by an Act of 1818 which required them to maintain it as a separate transport system. The last of the freight boat operated until 1951 and when it was closed by C.I.E. in 1961 its future seemed bleak. Proposals were made to fill it in to build a motorway but in 1974 the voluntary Royal Canal Amenity Group set about its restoration. Thanks to their commitment to and love of the Royal Canal, it has been saved for future generations as a wonderful amenity and wildlife haven.

Noel Spain, national chair of the RCAG, who accompanied Peter, paid public tribute to Matt Kennedy and Declan O'Connor and all associated with the Maynooth branch of RCAG which has achieved so much with reconstructing the walls, harbour, etc. and he stated that he looks forward to the day when boats and barges will use Maynooth for modern canal services.

MY FAMILY TREE

Dia duit,

My name is Fiona Rogers and I did a project on my family tree. It was very interesting and exciting. For instance I did not know that the Rogers family motto was "always ready" and that in 1273 there was a Florence Tiernan, Bishop of Kilfenora. In my project I did an interview with my granny and that was very educational. I found out that she had a pet lamb. Her favourite subject was maths and she got married in 1952 to Patrick Tiernan. I also did an interview with Eilish Landers my Aunt. She adopted a chinese baby. My mums great grand parents names were Malachy Greally and Margaret Nangle that I found out too.

My name is Anna McNevin

Christina McGarrell (commonly confused withMcArdle) was born on December 13th 1918, the second youngest child. Maureen, her eldest sister died of cancer when she was in her twenties. Then Came Bridie, James, Granny and Peig.

Christina was born at home, close to the shore of Lough Ree, Glassan, Athlone. Granny's father was a very fine boat builder who spent a lot of time away, travelling the length and breadth of the Shannon from Carrick on Shannon, Lanesboro, right down to Limerick, was involved in racing and fishing on the midland lakes.

At a time when few could read, great grandad McGarrell had a great love of books and especially poetry. Granny told about when her father would return home after his many adventures on the Shannon himself and his friend would tell stories long into the night by the open fire. Granny who slept in the "settle bed" in the kitchen would fall asleep while listening to these.

Granny's mother was a great woman to make dinners, her door was always open to the poorer families that lived close by. They were never short of fowl, fish, potatoes and buttermilk.

Granny told of how, as children after the long winter they would look forward to their first "dip" in the Shannon waters from Easter onwards.

The highlight of Granny's life was school and she loved and respected her teacher Ms. Duffy and after finishing 7th class in Ballinacliffey N.S. granny reluctantly left school. She went nursing in Athlone Hospital and had many stories to tell of the patients she meet there.

The Islanders.

When granny was growing up on the shores of Lough Ree there were several little islands on the lake that were inhabited. She often helped her brother James (who was a fisherman) to transport cattle for the islanders. She told of being given the job of sitting at the back of the rowing boat and holding the reins high to keep the cows head above the water as it swam along after the boat. Granny Chris was never fond of water, due , no doubt to her many hair raining experiences when mid journey the lake winds would suddenly whip up waves as tall as mountains from previously calm waters.

Granny's father, John McGarrell spent many a night on these islands, He would always be sent for, to make a coffin for the island wakes, most of the time he did it in return for a few drinks as the islanders were mostly very poor. The Connell family were the last inhabitants of Lough Ree. Granny tells of them rowing over to first Mass on Sundays. One very bad winter they had to break the ice the whole way over in front of the boat and when they came out of Mass the lake had frozen over again and they had to repeat the process and all on an empty stomach.

I chose to do this extract from my family tree project because granny died on 15th Aug 1999 and I found this part of her story interesting.

Prune and Apple Stuffing You will need:

You will need:

8oz cooking apples 2 oz prunes 4 oz bread crumbs Grated rind and juice of 1 lemon 1 oz melted butter Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper 1 egg, free range if possible

Soak prunes over night in cold water. Drain, stone and chop finely. Chop and peel the apples finely. Mix together all the ingredients, binding them together with a beaten egg. Use to stuff pork, chicken or turkey.

Meringue Topped Winter Cherries Serves 6.

You will need;

- 400g can of black or red cherry pie filling.
- 2 egg whites, size 2, free range if possible
- 4 oz of caster sugar
- 1 teaspoon white wine vinegar

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 200c/400f/gas mark 6
- 2. Divide the pie filling between six small oven-proof dishes, about 3" in diameter.
- 3. Wipe a mixing bowl to remove any grease, then place the egg whites into the bowl and allow to stand at room temperature for a few minutes.
- 4. To achieve maximum volume, whisk the whites with a hand mixer set on speed 1 for one minute, then increase the setting to 2 and whisk for a further minute. Finish on speed 3 until the whites form soft peaks.
- 5. Once the whites have formed soft peaks, whisk the sugar and the wine vinegar into the whites.
- 6. Spoon the meringue into a piping bag and pipe the soft peaks onto the fruit filling. Bake for 10-12 minutes until golden brown and crisp to the touch. Serve immediately.

Toasted Turkey Sandwiches

Cooking time: 3 Mins

You will need:

- 4 slices wholemeal bread or any of your choice.
- 1 tbsp whole grain mustard.
- 4 slices cooked turkey breast, each about 1 oz.
- Fresh ground pepper to taste.
- 4 rings of canned pineapple each weighing
- about 2 ozs.
- 2 oz cheddar cheese, grated.
- Watercress sprigs to garnish.

Method:

 Spread the slices of bread with half the mustard and put I slice of the turkey on each. Spread the turkey with the remaining mustard and season to taste. Place the pineapple on top of each sandwich and sprinkle with the grated cheese.
 Cook under a hot grill for about 3 minutes or until the cheese melted and bubbling. Serve the sandwiches and garnish with the watercress sprigs.

Turkey Fillets with Mushrooms (serves 4).

Cooking time: 40 min

You will need: 4 turkey fillets, about 5 oz each 2 tbsp olive oil 1 onion. skinned and finely chopped 6oz mushrooms, chopped 1 garlic clove, skinned and crushed 1 tsp finely grated lemon rind 2 tsp chopped fresh thyme or 1 tsp dried Sea salt and freshly gound black pepper to taste 1/2 pint hot chicken stock 2 tbsp lemon juice 1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley Lemon slices and fresh parsley sprigs to garnish

Method:

- Cut each turkey fillet in half crossways and place 1 each half between sheets of greaseproof paper. Beat well until the fillet measures about two inches.
- Heat 2 tsp olive oil in a non stick frying pan and cook 2. the onion and mushrooms for 5-10 min over a gently heat until excess moisture has evaporated. Remove from heat and add the garlic, lemon rind, thyme, and seasoning, mix well.
- 3 Divide the mushroom mixture into 8 and spread over the fillets. Roll up and secure at both ends with string
- 4 Heat the remaining olive oil in the non stick frying pan just large enough to hold 8 rolls. Cook the rolls 4 at a time for about 5 mins each batch, turning until pale golden on all sided.
- 5. Return all the rolls to the pan with the stock and lemon juice. Cover and simmer gently for 20 mins.
- 6. Transfer the rolls to a serving plate, remove the strings and keep warm. Boil the pan juices until reduced, then stir in the parsley and pour over the turkey rolls, serve garnished.

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



'For example, traffic in the Meadowbrook area fell by 100% during the floods', he added, 'and we think that if people travel by boat it would help ease traffic congestion in the town. What with global warming and everything, Maynooth is going to be under water anyway so we may as well make the most of it'. Local taxis firms are planning to provide a gondola service around the town and Maynooth is to be marketed as 'the Venice of the north (Kildare)'.

February

The new Roost opens its doors to the public. As the largest pub in Co. Kildare, 17,000 people cram into its 34 different bars on opening night, breaking the previous record for a crowd in the Roost by 17. Customers are issued with a map as they enter but 436 are still reported missing after the first night's drinking. The Maynooth Students Union President welcomes the opening and says students have been saving up their money for the last year and not a drop of alcohol had passed their lips for months as they waited for the re-opening of the Roost.

March

The St. Patrick's Day Parade committee comes up trumps in 2001 when they succeed in getting a star musical lineup for the parade. Fat Boy Slim, the Three Tenors and the Kilfenora Ceile Band agree to act as supporting acts for Danny McCarthy in a musical extravaganza to be performed from the back of a truck in the Main Street.

April

In a revolutionary move announced on April 1st, the price of drink in Maynooth is to be cut by 50%. In a statement local publicans indicate that they have been making too much money for the last few years 'The price of drink is just too high and we feel it's time we gave something back to the punters', says a spokesman for the Licensed Vintners Association. '£1.50 is a fair price for a pint and anything higher than that is a rip-off. Anyway, what we need is far more competition in the pub trade'. The statement also commits the publicans to improving toilet facilities in the town's pubs. Day long celebrations in the own are cut short when publicans issue a further, two word statement - 'April Fool'.

May

The new train service from Maynooth to Dublin is opened. High speed trains are to run from Maynooth to Connolly Station every ten minutes when there is not a strike. Brendan Ogle is due to perform the opening ceremony but backs out at the last minute when he claims the use of a scissors to cut the ribbon at the opening would be unsafe what with the sharp blade on the scissors and everything. The schedule is disrupted when a leaf is spotted on the track near Clonsilla. 'We are just not equipped to deal with a leaf on the track at this time of year', says a C.I.E. engineer. 'We plan to import a specially built leaf clearing machine from Japan in 2006', he added, 'but in the meantime trains may be delayed'.

June

The World Championship Slow Bicycle Race is held in the Harbour Field, 'We fell this is a very appropriate venue for the championship because time seems to stand still here', the championship organiser states. 'At other venues there's a buzz of activity, things are happening and that tends to distract the riders and they fall off their bicycles. In the Harbour Field every thing happens very slowly and that helps the riders'. Following the championship an archaeological dig carried out in the field uncovers several skeletons which are said to date from the 13th century. 'Given the position of the bodies we think they may have been attending a meeting, possibly they were planning the future of the area, but we'll never know', commented one of the archaeologists on the dig.

July

Global warming comes to Maynooth. As temperatures reach 40 degrees centigrade, Maynooth suffers desert-like conditions. Well known TV ster and chairperson of Maynooth Community Council, John Doogan, calls for immediate action from Kildare Co. Council. 'What we need in Maynooth is water and lots of it', he states. The Meadowbrook area is particularly badly hit with sand storms trapping people in their houses. Local residents shovel the sand into bags as they will need them to stave off the floods next winter.


August

The first hangings are carried out in the Square for speeding on the motorway. At Kilcock Court Judge Brophy orders eight people to be hung for breaking the 70mph limit. 'I've been lenient for far too long', says the judge,' hanging is too good for them'. Amnesty International pleads for clemency on behalf of the accused and two people have their sentences commuted to a life sentence of watching Oireachtas Report. They opt to be hung.

September

Carton is reopened. Maynooth is to be turned into a theme park where residents at the newly opened hotel and leisure centre can be amused and entertained. With accommodation prices ranging from £20,000 per night the hotel attracts only the cremede-le-creme including Liam Lawlor, Ray Burke, ex-President Marcos (deceased), Des Traynor, Emperor Bokassa (former owner of the Congo) and Bill Gates. The Emperor is appointed official hangman in Maynooth.

House prices drop, inflation falls, traffic congestion eases off, people are under less pressure at work, 'This is an absolute disaster', says local businessman, 'Maynooth is like a guiet, peaceful village. We'll be all ruined'. In a break with tradition. Christmas doesn't start until mid-December and shops close at six 'o clock. It is the end of just another year in Maynooth.

David paints as a hobby. He was a student at the National College of Art in the 1940s. He is a household name in Ireland.

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
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
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WASTE NOT, WANT NOT!

In nature all species produce waste, virtually all of which is recycled, not by that species it self, but by other forms of life. But we as a species have begun to create waste that far outstrips the capacity of the natural environment to absorb or reuse it anywhere near the rate at which its produced.

Hence we have to recycle, but it's not as easy as it may seem. Many have found that products manufactured and packaged for the market place often have features that reduce or even prevent the possibility of recycling. Some newspaper supplements and many magazines have glossy surfaces that cannot be recycled. Many plastic containers have built-in components that make recycling prohibitively expensive and complicated. Most packaging is designed for its usefulness in marketing the product with no thought to the space that it consumes in landfills or the toxic chemicals it releases into the air when burned.

A lot of manufactures are locked into a pattern of purchasing virgin raw materials and are not equipped either by habit or machinery to use recyclable raw materials even though they might well be cheaper.

Even the daily paper isn't as easily recyclable as one would hope, as many large paper consumers and manufactures throughout the world have investments in forests and are hence loath to use recycled paper. Instead they make additional profit by cutting the trees in which they have invested in and in a lot of cases, receive large tax subsides.

Before you even think about it, burning doesn't work either. Dioxin generation can occur during the burning of waste. There's a lot of evidence out there suggesting that the global dioxin burden is due primarily to plastics such as polyvinyl chloride (PVC), chlorinated solvents, chlorinated pesticides, chlorine-based bleaching agents, etc.

For this reason, the elimination of dioxins at the source is best achieved by substituting chlorine-free alternatives. Indeed, many economically competitive cleaner products and processes already exist.

And what about handing our waste over to the professionals. well bear in mind that Britains Environment Agency (EA) complied a league table (known as the Hall of Shame) of businesses that were found guilty of offences against the environment in 1998. Among the top offenders (2nd, 3rd and 5th place) cited in the agency's league table were waste management operators. The Environment Agency's director of operations expressed concern that three of the worst offenders were waste management companies.

Businesses in waste management sector should be well aware of pollution issues, after all, they are meant to be there to clean up the environment.

So, we all have to find ways to deal with our waste. Just think of the 3Rs;

Reduce Reuse Recycle Reduce; try not to buy products that have loads of extra packaging, use your own bags and not the shops. Reuse; if you must get a plastic bag - reuse it. Put those wine bottles etc to use as candle holders. Recycle; if all else fails, don't just dump it, send it for recycling. At almost any supermarket can be found bottle banks, just get into the habit of bring back the empties when shopping for the refills - saves you petrol as well.

At the end of the day, the marketing people will tell you that, the amount of packaging and the type of material used are what you want. Why don't we tell them what we really want is an environment that all our children can enjoy and that manufacters should start to take an active role in allowing that to happen.

THE STAR OF BETHLEHEM

As any child will tell you at this time of year, the wise men were lead to the birth of baby Jesus by a star and if you don't believe them there's always Matthew;

"Behold there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem, saying where is he that is born king of the Jews. For we have seen his star in the east and are come to worship him". (Matthew 2:1-2)

The star of Bethlehem as "his star" has come to be known has for years brought forth debate and discussion as to its origin. Astronomers and historians alike, continue to look for evidence, both for and against the presence of the star or phenomenon at the right spot and time.

Meteors or "shooting stars" are one event that for a long time were regarded as the answer, but it commonly accepted that the wise men had some knowledge of astronomy and would not have regarded a meteor as having any great significance on its own.

During the reign of the Chinese Emperor Ai - Ti, a chronicler named Pan Ku recorded, around the time in question; the appearance of a "Hui hsing" that lasted for 70 days which is usually taken to mean a comet or even a nova. But it is the nova theory that has the greatest possibility as further evidence from another Chinese source shows. The Chinese Ho Peng Yoke catalogue records the appearance of an object in the Aquila constellation that may have been a supernova.

With the use of star maps and powerful computers, astronomers have extrapolated the nova remnants back to around the time of the first Christmas and have shown that it may well be the most likely candidate for the star of Bethlehem.

Bear in mind that we don't have an exact date for the birth and even with the best resources available, there's still some factor of error, hence astronomers and scientists alike will only give the "possibility" and "the weight of evidence shows" etc in their answers.

In any case, there doesn't seem to be one perfect candidate for the star and it may well come down to personnel preference. Was it a comet, a meteor, a nova or even an angel, what ever the answer is, knowing it will never make this time of year any less special for all.

Merry Christmas

NOW FOR THE SCIENCE BIT!

I'm sure the last piece has raised some questions as to just what stars, comets and the like are, well this is where the science comes in. We'll being with the stars themselves.

They are a spherical mass of gases held together by gravity, born inside huge clouds of gases and dust. The process begins when a region of a cloud increases in density. The gases are pulled towards the star's centre where they become densely packed causing them to heat up. This can be triggered by a shock wave passing through the cloud due to a supennova, more about that latter. Under gravity, hydrogen gases the core, are hot enough to undergo nuclear reactions that releases energy. The energy counterbalances the effect of gravity allowing the star to be stable.

Each star has a life cycle of several stages during which its size and temperature change dramatically. The more massive a star the more quickly it burns up its gases in the nuclear reactions and one of the most massive types of stars known as a supergiant ends its life in a huge explosion called a supernova. Basically the gases are used up, the nuclear reaction ceases and gravity causes the star to implode in on itself generating the massive explosion that is so energetic that it can appear as a new very bright star from Earth.


so with the death of one star, we have the birth of many more.

Comets though, are relatively small objects that follow a long, eccentric orbit around the Sun and consist of dust and ice. Most orbit far beyond the planets at distances of up to 9,000 billion miles or 15,000 billion km, but should it come close to the Sun, it partially vaporises, producing a bright head of dust and gas and one or more tails. The best known is Halley's comet, which comes around every 76 years.

A meteor or shooting star, is the streak of light produced when a meteoroid or lump of rock, burns up in the atmosphere. On a clear, moonless night, about 10 meteors an hour can normally be seen, with the number peaking at around 4 a.m. in the morning; no one said astronomy was easy. They are best seen as a meteor shower, which occurs when the earth passes through a trail of dust left by a comet. There are around 20 meteor showers each year, one due around the 7th to the 16th of Dec. in the Geminids constellation and another around the 1st to the 6th of Jan. in the Quadrantids constellation.

The area of astronomer is vast and there is just not enough room here to delve into it in any great detail. There are various books available of both general interest and more in depth knowledge in most bookshops and libraries. A good starting point would be to join a club or society, the best known being Astronomy Ireland. If you just want to look at the stars, start off with a good pair of binoculars, excellent for looking at the moon. If money is available then the next step is a telescope, but beware, there are a lot of telescopes out there that are just not suitable. A good benchmark is a 3" lens for a refractive telescope and a 6" mirror for a Newtonian telescope.

Remember a telescope is not only just for Christmas, but for life and don't forget the warm woollies.



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Party Political

FIANNA FAIL CUMANN NOTES

Once again this has been a very busy month in Maynooth Fianna Fail. In this edition of the Newsletter we will kick off with a report on the Public Meeting organised by the Cumann in Maynooth and addressed by Dr. Martin Manseragh, Special Adviser to the Taoiseach on Northern Ireland.

PEACE PROCESS - DR MARTIN MANSERAGH

The Meeting was well attended and the audience listened attentively to the speech given by Dr. Manseragh on "the History of the Peace Process". As his reputation preceeded him, the speech was a very orderly and detailed journey down the road to peace from where Dr. Manseragh himself dated its inception i.e. the aftermath of the Enniskillen bombing, to the present date. Many other historians dated the start of the Peace Process from the mid 1970's when the English first started a dialogue with the IRA secrtly, others marked the Anglo Irish Agreement as the starting point. In the early 1980's John Hume and Charles Haughey started work on a frame work for both communities to work together in co-operation. In 1988 Dr. Manseragh himself and Dermot Ahern T.D. met with Gerry Adams with the aim of drawing up a concensus among Nationalists in which the best progress could be made.

This ultimately led down the path to a Draft which was handed over to John Major in June 1993, culminating in the Joint Declaration between the Irish and British Governments in December 1993 - led by Albert Reynolds, John Hume, Gerry Adams and John Major. Consequently Section 31 of the Constitution was lifted, the republiian movement was given access to the media, a 48 hour Visa was granted by the United States to Gerry Adams etc. While in Dr. Manseragh first opinion. Charles Haughey's main contribution was to help create a constitutional Republican position, therby doing much to contain and even diminish more militant republicanism from gaining groun Albert Reynold's role in the period leading up to and after the Joint Declaration was nothing short of magnificent. During a vital and sensitive period, no effort was spared or proved too much for Reynolds. He took every opportunity given to go on T.V., radio, print interviews etc in order to explain, clarify, reassure and push the content of the Declaration.

This was followed by the ceasefire, border roads being reopened, security on streets being reduced, and examination of how foreign investment could be generated leading to a more prosperous economy in which all communities could benefit. Dr. Manseragh applauded Albert Reynolds very recent settlement which he won against the Sunday Times for an article which they printed after the fall of the Reynolds government.

Dr. Manseragh followed up with a systematic account of the sequential events that followed, the difficulties experienced in 1995 with the 'slow bicycling' policy pursued by Patrick Mayhew over decommissioning, the breakdown of the IRA ceasefire, the British and Irish General Elections in May and June 1997, respectively, leading eventually to the Good Friday agreement of 1998. Dr. Manseragh praised the part played by Bertie Ahern, particularly his ability to relate to people without being confrontational.

He has built up very good personal relationships with David Trimble, among others, being the first first Fianna FAil leader to go into Unionist Party offices and also the first Fianna Fail leader to visit Republican West Belfast since DeValera.

In conclusion, Dr. Manseragh focused on the dynamism of the process presently highlighting the work being done by the North/south bodies in particular.

At the end of the Question and Answer session which folliowed, Dr. Manseragh was presented by the Maynooth Cumann with a symbolic present of Waterford Cryrstall Goblets, issued for the Millenium to toast Peace.

BUDGET SUBMISSION TO CHARLIE McCREEVY by **MAYNOOTH CUMANN**

The Maynooth Cumann presented its budget submission to the Minister last weekend. The Cumann wrote to all its members in Maynooth inviting them to submit ideas for inclusion in the submission. The Cumann officer board then met on a number of occasions to discuss and agree on the issues to be included in the submission. The general theme of the submission was summarised by

officer board member Noel Brilly as "giving something back to the people without having an adverse effect on inflation". The Cumann have put forward proposals in relation to the following topics.

1)Pensioners - proposals related to concesions regarding car tax, vouchers towards the cost of the National Car Test and increased fuel allowance.

2) Fixed income recipents.

3) Carers - people looking after family members. unable to fend for themselves at home, should perhaps be able to receive significant allowances.

4) Students - parents of students paying rent for accommodation should be able to receive a significant relief on their tax allowances. Also maintenance grants for students should be increased as no increase has been received for a number of years.

5) Home working incentives to be introduced and strengthened.

6) Green issues - tax incentives should be introduced for recycling processes.

8) Childcare - Benefits for working parents to be introduced to hepl towards the cost of childcare, which in turn will help release more people into the workforce.

After some time discussing the various proposals with the Cumann Committee Charlie McCreevy praised the Cumann for its initiative and he said he would consider them during the preparation of the budget.

MINISTER MCCREEVY MEETS WITH SENIOR IARNROD EIREANN PERSONNEL IN MAYNOOTH NEW STATION

Following meeting held in the Glenroyal Hotel and on site, Minister McCreevy and Cumann members accompanied the Minister to the new Rail Station currently being completed in Maynooth.

There the Minister met with senior representatives of larnrod Eireann including Acting Station Master in Maynooth Mr. Stephen Mangan, Christy Stapleton, Operations Manager with Jarnrod Eireann and Mr. Barry Kenny, Public Relations officer with larnrod Eireann and resident of Maynooth himself. The Minister announced that the upgrade and increased facilities and frequencies of services would be a welcome addition to the residents and commuters of Maynooth, both present and future, an area which has expanded so rapidly and consistently over the last 10 years in particular. Cont'

The Minister toured the new Station building itself which will be opened at the end of October or begining of November and on which £20 million has been made available for its construction. A further £20 million will have been spent on providing 20 new longer diesel cars with greater capacity. The new Station will have new PA systems, mobility impaired access, new lighting, passenger help points, closed circuit television and real train time information.

The new facilities and new tracking and signalling put in place will enable a much improved frequency of services with trains departing every 30 minutes during off-peak periods and every 20 minutes during peak-time. There will also be a service available during the small hours of the morning/night which again will be a welcome safety addition to the residents of Maynooth who travel to and from the City Centre on a regular basis. While the new Station and its facilities will be open by the end of October, the increased frequency of trains will be starting in January.

LOCAL NOTES - CHARLIE McCREEVY T.D. AND CLLR. PAUL KELLY

A) MR. DERMOT AHERN T.D. MINISTER FOR SOCIAL, COMMUNITY AND FAMILY AFFAIRS has written to Minister McCreevy detailing Grants which have been approved under the 2000 Scheme for local based Community and Family Support Groups to bodies in the area. Bodies concerned include among many others, Newbridge Access Group, Nass Adult Centre for Education, Network - Kildare, Maynooth Adult Daytime education and Leixlip Womens studies.

B) MR. DAN WALLACE T.D. MINISTER OF STATE AT THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT has written to Minister Mc Creevy giving details of Grants being made to 122 projects under the 2000 Environmental Partnership Fund. The increased number of applications to this fund shows that awareness has been heightened of the importance of environmental protection schemes. Among the local groups to be successful in their applications were:-

-KIWI, Kilcock - based on local partnership effort concept and will make a significant difference in delivery on the core objectives of the Departments National waste Initiative. - Leixlip Integrated Waste Initiative - formed to reduce the amount of waste leaving Leixlip.

C) Charlie McCreevy has welcomed the announcement by BOBBY MOLLOY T.D. MINISTER FOR HOUSING AND URBAN RENEWAL of the approval for 43 3-bedroomed houses, 11 2-bedroomed houses and communal facilities under the Departments Rental Subsidy Scheme at Caragh road, Nass. The estimated cost will be £5.4 million and allocation will be made to households on the Local Authority housing waiting list. Minister McCrevy declared that the Government is currently working very hard to increase the supply of serviced land to ensure more of these types of developments will be made available.

SILKEN VALE

Minister McCreevy and Cumann members had a walkabout in Silken Vale on Saturday 7th October, and met with representatives of the Residents Association concerning their objections to larnrod Eireanns aplication for access maintenance gate in Silken Vale. Minister McCreevy has been engaged in on-going representsations to Kildare County Council and an Bord Pleanala on behalf of the residents. Decision due date from An Bord Pleanala is 7th December. contd

Action Required to Prevent a Recurrance of the Flooding:

As a result of Cllr. John McGinley's proposal it was agreed at the Special Council Meeting on 20 November, that time would be set aside at the Monthly Meeting of the Council on 27 November to consider the Council's report on the flooding. Cllr. McGinley also asked that a member of the National Roads Authority (NRA) be in attendance.

Cllr, McGinley has also put forward the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the following action be taken in order to prevent a recurrance of the flooding in Meadowbrook, Brookfield, Newtown and Parson Street:

1. That an alternative, to the Meadowbrook Stream, be found for taking the Motorway surface water drainage e.g. Lagoons.

2. That the grills on the pipes at the bridges on the Meadowbrook Stream be removed immediately as they contributed to the flooding.

3. That the culverted of the Meadowbrook Stream, which has already been agreed by the Council, be speeded up.

4. That the boundary wall between the Joan Slade River and Parson Street be rebuilt completely as the flooding in Parson Street was caused by the holes in the existing wall.

5. That enough sand bags be retained in the Council Yard in Maynooth for any future such emergencies. Proposals for Work to be Funded from Development Levies:

The Council are at presents compiling a list of work to be carried out using Development Levies already collected. Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following list for inclusion:

- * Finish the Maynooth Town Improvement Works as outlined in the O'Neill 1996 Plan.
- * Finish the Road Restoration Programme for Leixlip as outlined in the O'Neill 1995 Plan.
- Realign the Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth and include footpaths and cycle paths. The footpath should • extend beyond the motorway bridge to accommodate the new soccer pitches.
- Finish resurfacing of roads in Carton Court and Cluain Aoibhinn •
- Resurface all of the Back Lanes in Maynooth.
- Provide traffic route public lighting and a footpath on the Celbridge Road, Maynooth, from the Straffan • Road to the new Gael Scoil.
- Realign Convent Lane/Dunboyne Road, Maynooth and remove the 'green' strip. •
- Rebuild completely the Parson Street boundary wall with the Joan Slade River. ٠
- Culvert the Meadowbrook Stream. •
- Repair the footpaths in Carton Court and College Green, Maynooth.
- Repair the roads and footpaths in Avondale Estate, Leixlip.
- Prune trees, and remove where necessary, in all housing estates in Maynooth and Leixlip. All removed trees to be replaced with appropriate mature trees.

Bond Bridge Construction Held up by Duchas:

Duchas are still holding up progress on the new Bond Bridge construction. At Duchas request the Council employed a Conservation Architect to evaluate the feasibility of Duchas proposals which effectively called for the building of the new bridge, where the new bridge is located, without demolishing the old bridge. Anyone with common sense would realise that this is impossible, but no so Duchas. The Conservation Architect's report to the Council is due before the end of November and it is likely that the Council will accept the recommendations. It is then up to Duchas and Minister Sîle de Valera to make a fast decision. Emmet Stagg T.D.has already made the Minister aware of how essential it is to have the new bridge constructed without any further delay. Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to continue with the design work so that the tendering stage can proceed with the minimum delay. Resurfacing of Back Lanes in Maynooth:

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that the Back Lanes off Maynooths Main Street be properly surfaced, using development levies collected in the area, without any further delay. The resurfacing of the lanes has prevented double yellow lines from being painted on one side of them as agreed in the Parking Bye Laws. Hopefully when this work is completed there will no longer be any problems for the Wheelie Bin truck gaining entry.

Carton Avenue and Top of Main Street, Maynooth

Council officials advised Cllr. McGinley at the Area Meeting on 10 April last that they had £198,000 in funds to extend the Main Street Improvement Works to take in the entrance to Carton Avenue and the top of Main Street area. Since then the Maynooth Action Strategy (MAS) group have produced there own proposals for the Avenue and the entrance to it. They have also secured a further £100,000 funding from the Minister for Finance. Cllr. McGinley submitted a motion asking that the scope of work be agreed and coordinated without any further delay. He also demanded that a Council Official take over responsibility for the project with a view to seeking tenders for the work early in the new year. It would be a disgrace if this funding was lost to Maynooth through the inaction of Council Staff. Carton Court:

Following representations from the Residents' Association Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

" That the resurfacing of the roadways, begun in Carton Court, Maynooth, last year, be completed without any further delay and that the Area Engineer carry out a survey on the condition of the footpaths and that a remedial works plan be drawn up."

In addition Cllr. McGinley has allocated £8,000 of his Discretionary Funding to carry out repairs to the worst sections of the footpaths before the years end.

Cllr. McGinley has also asked EIRCOM to remove the Phone Box as requested by the Residents' Association.

Wall at the Bottom of Greenfield Drive:

Cllr. John McGinley has allocated £2,250 of his Discretionary Funding for the rebuilding of the wall. Rockfield:

Following representations from the Residents' Association Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to introduce safety measures at the junction of the footpath from Rockfield Lodge and Rockfield Avenue. Pedestrian Footbridge-Maynooth Rail Station

Arising from representations from commuters, Deputy Emmet Stagg contacted larnrod Eireann concerning the dangerous footbridge linking the platforms at Maynooth Rail Station. A number of the steps were broken. Iarnrod Eireann have responded indicating that the Bridge will be examined and repaired. Increased Frequency on Maynooth Suburban Line

Following the doubling of the rail line from Maynooth to Clonsilla, Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised that increased services will be available in early 2001. There will be additional services at peak and off peak times and also a Sunday service will be in operation. Extension of Quality Bus Corridor

In response to enquiries from Dublin Bus commuters Deputy Emmet Stagg has requested the extension of the Lucan Quality Bus Corridor to cover both the Lucan and Chapelizod By-passes. Moyglare Village Boundary Agreed

Cllr. John McGinley and Deputy Emmet Stagg are pleased that agreement has now been reached with Moyglare Village Residents' Association on the provision of a boundary on the front green of their estate. A double Stud Farm type fence with a hedge and some trees in the middle will be provided at a cost of £7,000 and this is being funded in full from Cllr. John McGinley's Discretionary Grant. The provision of the boundary will provide a safe environment for children playing in the front green and will eliminate the risk of children running out onto the Moyglare Road. John and Emmet would, in particular, like to thank Moyglare Village Residents' Association Chairperson, Gerry MacCann, who was instrumental in achieving the result.
