St. Patrick's Day Parade - A Huge Success





The Newsletter congratulates the people of Kilcock on their magnificent campaign against the proposed incinerator for their area. Good sense prevailed when An Bord Pleanala upheld Kildare Co. Council's decision to refuse planning permission for the development. But, as was pointed out at the last meeting of Maynooth Community Council, we cannot afford to be complacent following this decision. On planning grounds the siting of a hazardous waste incinerator in Kilcock made no sense. But the door was left slightly ajar when the Co. Council passed a material contravention of its own development plan to zone the land from agricultural to light industry without, apparently, having concrete plans for the rezoned land. Later, the Council had the good sense to reject the incinerator plans but it could be argued that the whole episode could have been avoided in the first place.

On the wider issue of waste disposal, the government, local authorities and us, as citizens, are going to have to reverse recent trends which has seen the amount of household waste increase by 23% in the three years 1995-98. Nonagricultural waste was a staggering 15.4 million tonnes in 1998. The Minister for the Environment called a recent Environmental Protection Agency report a 'wake up call' when it outlined the scale of the problem and showed that we are still dumping 90% of our waste in landfill sites. The demand for landfill and even incineration will increase unless recycling is actively promoted by our local authorities and becomes part of how we, as householders, deal with domestic waste. The statistics are depressing, 95% of metal, 85% of paper and 70% of glass end up in landfill sites. The amount of paper recycled has actually fallen in recent years. Locally Kildare Co. Council, in co-operation with Rehab, provides a collection point for glass, cans and textiles in the Maynooth Shopping Centre car park. While this is laudable it is not enough. All householders availing of the Council's refuse collection service should be actively encouraged to sort their domestic refuse so that recycling becomes an integral part of waste management. Instead we are provided with a large wheelie bin which is almost an incentive to maximize dumping. The real answer to 'No Incinerator' or 'No Landfill' is to recycle. It is up to us to do it. And up to the Co. Council to provide the facilities to make it happen.

Editorial

This month a new Community Council will be elected and the Council enters its fifteenth year of existence since it was reconstituted in 1986. Like all similar organisations it has gone through a life cycle - high levels of activity at the beginning, various crises - financial and otherwise - and then settling down to play an important, if unobtrusive, role in the life of the town. Back in 1986 Maynooth was a very different place. For a start it was about half the size it is now. The country was in recession and unemployment was very high. Over the years the Council has run a series of Social Employment and Community Employment Schemes and has played no small part, in co-operation with FAS, in training hundreds of local people for the jobs market. At one point there were over 50 people employed by the Council in various schemes. We now live in very different circumstances. The Maynooth area is experiencing labour shortages, the Community

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Council is sponsoring just one Community Employment Scheme and is finding it difficult to fill the available places on the scheme. All this has important implications both for the Council and for the range of services it provides for the community. The production of the Newsletter, administrative and secretarial backup for the range of activities of the Council and the provision of commercial bureau services for the public can not be sustained by eight or ten part time staff where once there were over thirty. Redefining its aims and objectives and refocusing its resources will be an important task for the incoming Council.

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Community Council Notes

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Muireann Ní Bhroilcháin on behalf of the Community Council offered condolences to Padraic O'Murchú and his family on the very sad and tragic death of his wife.

Business Park

Ray Grahen presented a very fine brochure and outlined plans for the proposed new Business Park at Monevcoolev. Maynooth, Tom McMullan, Chairman said that he felt there was 99% support for the project. It was also raised that the two families that live close to the proposed Business Park had genuine fears about flooding.

Senan Griffin stated that the Bennett Family had experienced serious flooding when the motor-way was built.

Ray Grahen said he has talked to the residents and felt he had reassured them that this would not be a problem. John McGinley raised concern about the flow of the water. It was stated that it is intended to have several ponds on the complex and this will make a huge difference to controlling the flow of water.

Paul Croghan stated he was worried about the flow of traffic out of the Park. It was stated that with the introduction of a roundabout, it would make a huge difference to traffic coming into the town and out as well. Also there are to be filter-lights and this should help the flow of traffic.\

It was generally felt that this was a very fine project and to be welcomed.

St. Patrick's Day Parade

John McGinley thanked all involved with the organising of the Parade. He thanked Freda Kelleher, the office staff who are under-staffed at the moment and Committee members.

It was stated that they failed to get a Northern band but hoped for better luck next year.

Summer Project

Claire O'Rourke stated that the Summer Project would go ahead this year. It would run for two weeks again.

Kilcock Incinerator

Tom McMullon congratulated the people of Kilcock on their great victory on having An Bord Pleanála refuse planning permission for the incinerator. Senan Griffin paid tribute to Kildare County Council for rejecting the plan in the first place. He also voiced a note of warning; he felt that the use of the word premature in An Bord Pleanála's reasons for rejecting the incinerator could mean that a new application could succeed.

He also felt that if proper access roads had been in place the plan might have been in trouble.

John McGinley sounded a note of warning about planning permission being given to such projects as the one in Kilcock without knowing what is the final plan. it was also felt that we should look at our own recycling needs.

Paul Croghan felt that a town the size of Maynooth should have a waste recycling plan.

Office

The office is nearly finished and looks well. It was felt that a proper reception area should be available. Muireann Ní Bhroilcháin thanked all who helped with moving furniture to the new office and who helped in any way.

Newsletter

Peter Connell stated that better co-operation between the Editorial Board and the Treasurer should be put in place. It was also felt that a three year funding plan should also be set-up.

Bond Bridge

The plan is on display now. Paul Croghan asked was it not possible to retain the facade of the old bridge 'Canal'. A submission to be sent to Kildare County Council.

New Drama Group

Paul Croghan congratulated the new Drama Group 'An Nuadha Players" in Maynooth.

Community Council Elections

Elections for the Community Council take place at the end of March 2000. There are 73 seats to be filled with a nominee from the Student's Union. Co-options may take place after the first meeting.

Nominations

The Nomination Form is included in this issue of the Newsletter.

Extra forms may be obtained from the Community Council Office, Dunboyne Road.

All nominations should include the signature of the nominee signifying her/his acceptance of the nomination. All nominations to arrive at the Community Council Office by Monday, 27th March at 5.00 p.m. Any resident over 18 is eligible for election and to vote.

Voting

If elections are required, voting papers will be distributed to all eligible households between Wednesday 29th and Friday 30th March. Votes will be collected the following week, if they are not collected they may be brought to the Community Council office. All votes must be returned by Friday 7th April, They will be counted on Saturday 8th April.

Counting will be done by neutral volunteers under the supervision of outside scrutineers. For single area election areas, the single transferable vote method of counting will be used (as in by-elections to Dáil Éireann). For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are seats available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected, as appropriate.

The first meeting of the new Council will take place on Monday 17th April. This will be an AGM including the election of new officers for the Council. Notices will be sent to all councillors.

MAYNOOTH ATHLETIC CLUB

David Cambell's 3rd place in the 800 metres Senior Indoor National Championship was a great performance, as the two athletes who defeated him went on to win European Medals two weeks later.

Mark Carroll and James Nolan started February by finishing first and second in the Wannamaker Mile in Madision square Garden. They finished February with Carroll as European champion over 3,000 Metres and Nolan Taking silver in the 1.500.

They were the First Irish athletes to win European indoor medals since Earnon Coughlan in 1979 and Marcus OSullivan in 1985.

On February 13th Nolan took the National 800 metres title with Carroll second and David just over a second back in 3rd place. The previous day in Nenagh, Maynooth's David Cambell won his heat to claim one of the five places on the starting line.

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The other two finalists were U.C.D.'s Michael Wilcox and Paul Campbell from D.C.U., who had won the Scottish Championships and the Welsh Games in the previous few weeks.

David's indoor experience may be confident to Nenagh but he impressed earlier this year when he won the Irish Junior championship, the Leinster under 18 title and the AAI Senior Open Games 800 metres in January.

However Sunday was a major step up in class and a very physical first 400 metres saw David struggle to hold the lead and inside lane. At half way James Nolan unleashed a kick that was to prove the winner.

Mark Carroll came from the back of the field for 2nd place and David battled on gamely to get 3rd place.

National coach Dr. Orywall was very happy that David finished within 2.5 seconds of two of Europe's top runners and has hopes that he will improve enough to run in the world Junior championships in Chile this year.

As his more famous rivals headed on towards historic medal wins David has a busy few months ahead studying for his Leaving Cert. However during his school holidays at Easter, he heads to Poland for two weeks training. Ironically James Nolan is travelling on the same trip.

The end of February also saw David Jolley's hard training pay off when he finished 4th in the Indoor vets Championships in Nenagh over 1,500 and 3,000 metres.

Training has resumed at the GAA field on Wednesday nights at 7pm and all are welcome.

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PRICE WATCH

Petrol prices have gone up by 20% in the last year reflecting a huge increase in the price of crude oil. It is now quite difficult to find a service station in the Dublin region where it is possible to buy unleaded petrol for less than £3 per gallon. Of course prices are no longer displayed per gallon and, anyway, most people, when they pull into a service station, buy £10 or £20 worth. This means that customers are not very sensitive to price differences betweeen one service station and the next. Competition between stations is supposed to keep prices keen but this only works if the consumer is price conscious.

Below is a list showing prices of unleaded petrol at selected stations as of March 21st. This shows a 7.5% price difference between the dearest station (Maxol Maynooth) and the cheapest (Statoil on the quays in Dublin). This represents a difference of 23p per gallon or £2.55 for a full tank. Of course some stations are self-service and others have manned pumps. In fairness to Maxol in Maynooth they provide such a service but customers should know that they may be paying extra for it. ESSO in Maynooth has been one of the cheapest stations over the past few months but increased prices just before March 21st when we carried out our survey.

Crude oil prices have fallen a little in the last three weeks and are predicted to fall further in the coming months. We hope this will be reflected at the petrol pumps. The Newsletter will continue to keep a close eye on prices.

MAYNOOTH PLANNING ALLIANCE

In a break with tradition, Kildare County Council have appointed a firm of consultants, Brady, Shipman Martin, to prepare the forthcoming Maynooth Town Plan. Local planning officials, more familiar with the local scene, would normally have this responsibility and their exclusion from the process this time around is a source of regret. The consultants have requested submissions from the public before April 3rd, What are the parameters within which the Plan should be prepared?

The first consideration is that a population target of 12,300 has been agreed for the year 2006, when the next plan must commence. This would be a Maynooth 44% bigger than today, with approximately 66% more cars on our roads. However, our local councillors have agreed to allocate a total of 150 new acres at a density of 24 people per acre in this Plan. Together with unused lands from the past plan this could enable a population of 14,192 in Maynooth within the next five years, a 66% increase and approximately double the number of local cars on our roads. It was against even more horrendous proposals that Maynooth Planning Alliance was established in 1996 to oppose. While the acreage then was almost double that being proposed today, it is important to take stock of what past planning decisions have left us with as we embark on the next five year exercise.

A lot has changed in Maynooth over the past five or six years. The construction of Pebble Hill, Parson's Hall, Castle Dawson, Lyreen Park, Moyglare Abbey, Glenroyal Apartments, Mill Street Apartments and other new residential areas have increased the town's population and traffic to a level probably in excess of 10,000 today. However the main feature of life in Maynooth today is undoubtedly the traffic problem.

A survey of traffic on the Straffan Road in 1996 counted 3865 vehicles over a six hour period. A recent prediction for three years hence predicts a similar amount during the peak one hour period. This is indeed a horrendous increase and represents one car a second on the Straffan Road. As anyone who tries driving in this kind of traffic knows, long queues at junctions, side streets, and exits from e.g. the Railway Station are the inevitable result and gridlock quickly follows. Some areas are likely to suffer greatly in the next few years. Major residential development at the Mill Street/ Movglare Road junction combined with the trebling of population envisaged for Kilcock over the next five years will reduce the Kilcock Road/Main Street to a standstill for much longer periods and bottle up residents of the Moyglare area in a similar fashion to that which has afflicted the Parson Street/ Main Street junction in recent times. Some alleviation of the Parson Street problem will however take place with the completion of the Meadowbrook link road, and some easing of the Dublin Road traffic will hopefully follow the completion of the Intel-Hewlett Packard interchange. But no new Kilcock interchange is envisaged before 2005 so the west and north of the town face a bleak traffic future.

Maynooth Planning Alliance believes the proposals currently being touted are in breach of the Strategic Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area which will become mandatory when the current Planning Bill becomes law in early summer. These guidelines were prepared by no other than Brady Shipman Martin and recommended restrictions on the growth of Maynooth which were not incorporated in the County

Development Plan by Kildare County Council. The reasons why you as a resident will be asked to endure a serious reduction in the quality of your life are political and economic. You know the issues at this stage and you know who will benefit and who will lose out. Equally you know which of our local councillors are seeking to increase the burden on you and which would be willing to reduce it. If not you should find out urgently!

Maynooth Planning Alliance advocates the following for the forthcoming Maynooth Development Plan:

*That the County Plan should be revisited to bring the Maynooth land allocations into compliance with the Strategic Planning Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Region.

* That phasing of new residential land should be geared towards minimising additional traffic on the Mill Street -Straffan Road route with a substantive component of any new residential land only released for residential development at the end of the Plan.

* That development-led road plans are not acceptable since the cost of the road (if ever completed) is greatly exceeded by the new traffic generated. Development-led planning of this kind is what has left us in the present position.

* That no 'donations' of land be given to private individuals/ private clubs as the price of rezoning

*That the plan incorporate a clause limiting the release of zoned lands until the end of its validity should the 2001 Census and the population planned for the already committed lands at that time exceed the population target for 2006.

A particular challenge for parents wishing to send their children to the NKNSP is how to get to the school if they do not live in Celbridge, especially with all the local traffic congestion. To address this dilemma, the school secured a free Department of Education bus service for children from Leixlip and Maynooth, THIS bus service leaves Greenfield shopping centre at 8.10am and returns at 2.45pm (the schOol is open from 9am to 2.20pm). Up to eight Maynoth children use the bus on a regular basis and, despite the early start, a happy crew they are too.

FINE GAEL NOTES

Traffic Calming Measures

Cllr. Senan Griffin has submitted a motion to Kildare County Council to have traffic calming measures put in place on the Moyglare Road beside the two schools in order that traffic can be forced to slow down to accomodate the school children. The same traffic problem arises at Medowbrook Avenue / Meadowbrook Crescent, and Senan Griffin has demanded that raised ramps (brick) be put in place during the construction of the new Meadowbrook link to the Straffan Road.

Lights

The Leixlip Area Committee at it's March meeting decided to allocate lighting at

Three double headed lights at Rockfield / Parklands / Rail Park, (it is hoped that the erection of these lights will eliminate the antisocial behaviour in the area).

A new light opposite No 33 Carton Court, (this light (b) was agreed previously but the ESB missed out having it erected).

The Area Committee further agreed to a proposal by (c) Senan Griffin that the Celbridge Road be lit from development levy funds ... it required six/eight lights.

Respite Care Unit

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to expedite the granting of full permission to Eastern Health Board for a fifty bed respite care unit at the Harbour. Maynooth. The E.H.B. last June promised prompt action on this proposal and to date planning permisson has not been availed of, thereby preventing commencement of work on the project. This new unit will now come under the South Western Area Board. Deputy Bernard Durkan will continue to pressurise the Department of Health to provide adequate finance for this worthwhile project.

Discretionary Grant

Clr. Senan Griffin will be seeking finance from the discretionary fund to upgrade the footpaths at Rail Park Estate, Mill Street (beside the church), Leinster Street, improvement of the road surface at Buckley's Lane / Fagan's Lane. (I will also be seeking funding for projects in Leixlip.)

Bus Bay / Terminus

At a meeting with representatives of Dublin Bus recently the



Area Committee outlined their concerns about the green areas opposite the Glenroval at the 66 Terminus.

Dublin Bus representative pointed out that the Bus bays in the Main Street were too small and that the terminus was not suitable for buses to pass each other comfortably. The Council engineer has agreed to inspect the terminus area to see if it can be improved.

Rejection of Incinerator Plan

Fine Gael branches throughout North Kildare welcome the rejection by An Bord Pleanala of the proposal by Thermal Waste Management to build an incinerator in Kilcock. It is particularly gratifying to note that the Board's rejection was purely on planning considerations as this was the basis for Deputy Bernard Durkan's and Councillor Senan Griffin's opposition to the proposal from the outset. It is to their credit that they persisted with this approach despite the pressure to adopt the more emotive and newsworthy issues which they correctly judged to be irrelevant at this juncture. Their approach was clearly vindicated by the fact that the Bord Pleanala enquiry focused on fourteen of the fifteen planning considerations raised in their personal objections to the proposal.

Both Deputy Durkan and Councillor Griffin are particularly pleased that the negative impact of the incinerator on the leisure and amenity value of the Royal Canal, which was highlighted in their objections, was accepted by the Bord which states

"The development by reason of its scale, height, and location in the vicinity of the Royal Canal, a recognised long distance walking route and an area of high amenity as set out in the County Development Plan, would seriously injure the visual and recreational amenities of the canal side environment which it is the policy of the Council to protect and develop."

The members wish to thank both their public representatives for the time and effort they devoted to defeating this proposal. They would particularly like to refer to Bernard Durkan's performance at the public enquiry in the Glenroyal Hotel which was acknowledged, by those who witnessed it, as a tour de force.

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Party Political

FIANNA FAIL CUMANN MAYNOOTH

A very successful fundraising breakfast was held by THE recently reformed Fianna Fail Cumann in Maynooth last Monday, 6th March in the GlenroYal Hotel. The event was attended by over seventy people representing various elements of the local community. Also in attendance was the Minister for Finance, Charlie McCreevy who, addressing the GROUP, praised the attendees for their impact on the economy and for contributing to the increased development and employment in the area. The Minister stated that County Kildare is now the envy of many counties throughout Ireland. given its current rate of improvement and wealth of opportunity. He noted that in 1987 1 million people were employed in Ireland and within the next two years this figure will have increased to 1.7 million. Maynooth has certainly played it's part in creating this success.

The Minister also praised the reactivated Fianna Fail Cumann in Maynooth on the success of this fundraiser, acknowledging that it was the first of its kind that he had seen which had been organised at cumann level. He complimented the newly elected committee on their hard work.

Clir.Paul Kelly, also addressed the breakfast, spoke on some of the latest improvements which are on their way to Maynooth. He announced that the long-awaited Bond Bridge project would be commencing in the coming months at a cost of £1.5 million. Councillor Kelly also raised the issue of the doubling of the rail line between Maynooth and Clonsilla, which is currently taking place. From January 2001, Maynooth is envisaged to have a twenty minute service to Dublin. Finally, Cllr. Kelly mentioned that the Meadowbrook link road now looks likely to go ahead in the near future.

The Maynooth Cumann welcomed any new members interested in joining the cumann and announced that the next meeting of the cumann will take place on April 10th at 8.30pm in the Glenroyal Hotel, Straffan Road.

FLIGHT FROM THE LAND

A traditional way of life has been deteriorating since the famine, with the odd fluctuation through the years. I lived with the horse era and the slow transition during the war until the 1950's to the tractor era. Those days when large estate were decimated by the land commission. When These 23-35 acre farms supported the farmer and in some enterprising small holdings., two or more sons or daughters working full time depending on the intensity of their particular operation. The ever expanding scheme of rural electrification was a boom milking machines, water pumps and in the home washing machines etc. which in turn relieved the woman of the house of inhibiting chores and reduced her working day from 16-12 hour day. The number of hired land operatives dwindled from average of 5 or on moderate farm to 2 and nowadays nil. This trend started with the farm operatives strike of 1946-47 and continued with modern mechanisation. Those finepre E.E.C. days the average mixed farms consisted of hay, grain, potatoes, sweeds, crops, with a couple of milk cows, pigs and the free range hens, ducks and geese forging around the farm yard.

These days the foundation of Macra in 1944 and the N.F.A. a decade later, there was an air of hope and expectancy reaching a high with our entry to the E.E.C. which led to mountains of over produced food.

Now in the first quarter of the new century we are advised that in this decade the number of full time farms will fall form 200,000 to 20,000 with 60,000 part time and 20,000 traditional.

Agricultural food, state that full time farmers will consist of approximately 70,000 gallons of milk quota or equivalent, to be viable 400 acres of tillage annually, 175 cattle or 1,160 ewes over 2 years transferring to 13000 commercial dairy farms, 7000 others encomasosing beef, sheep, tillage, pigs or poultry.

Part timers will concentrate on beef production, finally this 20,000 will not be all family farms but will consist of about 5,000 corporate and syndicate farms employing a manager. some hired operatives and contractors. "A return to our old estates proper".

Rural life will never be the same during my lifetime indeed the flight from the land, is no longer a poetic meandering, but a tragic loss to our way of life. Bob O'Reilly

LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Incinerator Rejected

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have welcomed the decision by An Bord Pleanala to refuse planning permission for the proposed toxic waste incinerator at Boycetown, Kilcock.

The community of Kilcock are to be congratulated on their success in the rejection of the proposal. Their concerns and the concerns of the people of North Kildare were vindicated in An Bord Pleanala's firm rejection of the proposal.

Public Lighting - Rathcoffey Road

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by Kildare Co. Council that an order has been placed with the E.S.B. to provide traffic route public lighting along Rathcoffey Road. The cost of the lighting is £26,500 and the E.S.B. have advised that the lighting will be provided within two weeks. This welcome news will make the Rathcoffey Road safer for residents of Parsons Hall and CastleDawson.

Deputy Stagg is now pressing the Council to provide a footpath along the front boundary of the estates to be financed from development levies.

Traffic Calming - Meadowbrook

Arising from the realignment of Bond Bridge and the provision of the Meadowbrook link to the Straffan Road, Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley are seeking the provision of traffic calming and safety measures along Meadowbrook Road.

Speed cushions are required at a number of points along the road and a pedestrian crossing is required near the Beaufield shops. Boundary walls are also required at the green areas of the road.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley will press the Council to include these measures as part of the Meadowbrook link project.

Redesign of 67A Bus Turning Point on the Straffan Road.

As a result of pressure from Cllr. John McGinley, Bus Eireann and Dublin Bus representatives attended Fridays Area Meeting. Cllr. McGinley asked them what they proposed for the 67A turning point as it is an eyesore at present. After much discussion it was agreed that the island needs to be reduced in size to allow two buses to pass in safety and that sufficient space should also be made at the road part of the island for pedestrians. Cllr. McGinley made the point that it might be better to hard core the remaining part of the island in a dome shape with decorative bricks. Council engineers will now draft a redesign for the approval of the Area Councillors and Dublin Bus.

Buses not pulling into Bus Bays on Main Street, Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley also asked the Dublin Bus reps to instruct their drivers to pull properly into the bus bays on Main Street, Maynooth. They are stopping on the roadway at present and this is leading to a build up of traffic in all directions. The Dublin Bus reps agreed to instruct their drivers accordingly.

Maynooth Town Improvement Works

Councillors were advised that the costings for completing Maynooths Improvement Works was as follows: £187,000

- Kilcock Road
- Mill Street
- Carton Gates/Doctors Lane £47,000 £228.000
- Leixlip Road

That gives a total costing of £537,000 and with £653,000 available from Development Levies and DTOP Grants it is Cllr. McGinleys view that all of the work can now be completed. This is very good news for Maynooth. It will be Cllr. McGinleys priority to get funding to bring the Back Lanes up to the Main Street standard.

£75.000

New Public Lighting Agreed

Cllr. McGinleys motion to have three double headed public lights installed in the green triangular area between Rockfield, Parklands and Railpark Estates was agreed at Fridays Area Meeting of the Council. The ESB will now be asked to install them at a cost of £2,500. 'Cllr. McGinleys motion to have a light installed outside house number 33 Carton Court was also agreed. It was also agreed to install three lights in the area of the horseshoe, top green, Leixlip Park and five lights on Distillery Lane, Leixlip.

Silken Vale, Cul-de-Sac of Houses 23-27

Cllr. John McGinley proposed at the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on Friday 3rd March that larnrod Eireann's Planning Application (Ref: 202/2000) for an 'access Maintenance Gate' adjacent to 27 Silken Vale be refused. He argued that:

· It would interfere with the residents private as the proposed access is via the boundary wall between the residents cul-desac and the railway station.

- It would constitute a security risk for residents.
- It would devalue properties in the area.

• There is no need for such an access as larnrod Eireann already have access from the station.

The other Councillors agreed to his proposal and the County Manager will have to take this unanimous recommendation of the Councillors into account when he is making his decision on the application.

The County Secretary has further advised Cllr. McGinley that it is the opinion of the Council that Planning Permission is not required for the development of the Generator Room and the Signal Box, which is being built inside the wall.

Maynooth's One Stop Shop

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the Leixlip Area Committee be fully involved in establishing the Council's ONE STOP SHOP for Maynooth i.e. site selection and the services provided."

Since Minister Dempsey approved funding of £200,000 for the project in 1998 nothing has happened.
