COMMUNITY COUNCIL ON THE MOVE

After almost 15 years in Main Street, the Community Council offices are moving to the Dunboyne Road. Following the loss of one of our Community Employment Schemes last year and a drastic cut in the number of our staff, it became obvious that we needed smaller premises. The former Cardinal Press offices on the Dunboyne Road became available recently and the move is to take place in early February.

Over the years the Main Street offices have been a hive of activity and a focal point for community affairs in the town. Literally hundreds of people have worked on schemes run from the office, all gaining valuable experience, and many going on to secure well paid jobs. The monthly production of the Newsletter, the organisation of the Summer Festival and St. Patrick's Day parade, the production of local business directories and local histories, together with administrative support for the Community Council and a commercial typing service are just some of the activities that have been run from our old Main Street offices over the years.

The move to the Dunboyne Road will mark a big break with the past. We will miss our neighbours - The Community Information Centre and Royal Canal Amenity Group - and we have also had a good relationship with our landlord, Trevor Reilly, over the years. Our new offices has the advantage of being on the ground floor, which will certainly provide easier access for the public. And on that note, callers, especially newer residents in Maynooth, are more than welcome to give us a call.

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Editorial

A Note from the Staff and Supervisor of the Newsletter.

This, and indeed the last two months we have been, as some of you are already aware, under an extreme amount of pressure, due to several factors. 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Editorial

At the time of going to press the An Bord Pleanala hearing into the proposed Kilcock incinerator is taking place in the Glenroyal Hotel.

The hearings have attracted huge public interest with standing room only on most of the days this week. Obviously local opinion is unanimously opposed to the development. Having heard both sides of the argument for the past few days it is almost inconceivable that Bord Pleanala could allow the incinerator to be built. Thermal Waste Management's fire protection plans are inadequate, Kildare County Council's emergency services could not deal with a disaster associated with the transportation of hazardous wastes to Kilcock, the water supply around Kilcock is inadequate to supply the plant, the transport network in the area could not safely handle the volumes of waste being transported to the plant, TWA's environmental impact statement is deficient, the plant would pose a threat to the valuable stud farm industry in North Kildare. All this is in addition to the question of health risks associated with emissions from the plant.

Last month An Bord Pleanala refused permission for a huge retail park on a green field site north of Naas although the development had been given the go ahead by Kildare County Council. One of the main reasons given for refusing permission was that the location of the retail park would not be consistent with sustainable development.

A huge toxic waste incinerator in Kilcock, imposed against the wishes of Kildare County Council and virtually every citizen in the area could hardly be called 'sustainable development'.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Office Repor

Maynooth Community Council is moving to a new office. Múireann Ní Bhrolcháin said they expect to move over the next week. The new office will be in the Cardinal Press old premises. It was requested that Community Councillors make themselves available to help with the move. Sarah O'Connor, the new Supervisor, was introduced to Councillors at the last meeting. Sarah is settling in well. There are still places for workers in the office. People over thirty-five and who have been unemployed for over three years can apply for these places.

St. Patrick's Day Parade

John McGinley informed the meeting that the first meeting will take place in Caulfields Meeting Room on the 20th January. He asked if the office could take on the administration work for the Parade. It was agreed that it would. It is hoped that a Northern Ireland representative would take part in the Parade this year.

Tidy Towns

It was stated that a new Fás Scheme would be up and running soon. Tom McMullan felt that the report on each estate should be published and each estate would know what could be done to improve the look of their estate.

It was also stated that bus turning points needed attention.

North Kildare / South Meath Alliance Against Incinerator

Representation was made to Maynooth Community Council regarding the Oral hearings before An Bora Pleanála. The hearings are taking place in the Glenroyal Hotel from the 24th of January and may continue for between five and ten days. It was agreed that two Community Councillors would attend. It was also hoped that the general public would attend on all days.

They gave a brief report on funding needed to support this campaign. It is hoped that a decision will be made by March 9th.

Moneycoole Business Park

It was noted that Ray Grehan will attend the next Community Council Meeting. He will outline the project. While it was stated that the Business Park would be very good for Maynooth. There was still some worried.

Re: Term 'Cider Party'

The Cider Industry Council have written to Maynooth Community Council objecting to the term 'Cider Party' being used to describe the goings on in Laraghbryan Cemetery. Rachel Sherry of the Cider Industry said that 'Cider Party' gave the impression that only cider is available. It was agreed that this was generally not the case.

Sporting and Social Events

Both the Summer Project and Community Games find themselves hard-up for new members. It was felt that if new people don't get involved with both of these groups they will disappear. Between both of these events each year about five hundred children take part. An appeal was generally made for more people to get involved with sporting activities in the town.

Moyglare Wall

Paul Croughan thanked Leixlip Area Committee for the funding for the Moyglare Wall.

Christmas Lights

It was generally felt that the Christmas lights were very impressive in the town and expressed thanks to the business

people of the town. A few members felt that the lights in the trees also looked well.

Festival

It is hoped to get a group of young people involved with the festival this year to bring in new ideas.

Tribute to Johnny Thompson

John Doogan paid tribute to Johnny Thompson saying he was a very active member of the Soccer Club all his life. He was a dedicated mentor to the under age and very involved with the Ladies Soccer. Johnny will be truly missed.

Harbour Field - Re: Grass Cutting

John Doogan thanked the Community Council for the cheque for £500. However he wanted to make it clear that this was not a donation to the Soccer Club. It was a contribution to the grass cutting of the Harbour Field from the Community Council for all the youth of the town.

Bond Bridge

Senan Griffin stated that the design is ready and should be on display in the Library by the end of the month. He expressed concern about proper access to the Station Road from Bond Bridge and to the parking area.

Heavy Traffic Parking Problem

It was stated that there is a lot of heavy vehicals parking in estates and while there is by-laws prohibiting this, why is it not being enforced?

Elections

There will be election of Community Councillors in March or April 2000. Would all Resident Associations, Sporting and Social Clubs and all members of the community take note.

ROYAL CANAL AMENITY GROUP (RCAG)

The Royal Canal Amenity Group (RCAG) is busy planning for the year 2000 following confirmation that the scheme has been renewed.

In a recent article in the Liffey Champion newspaper, our Chairman, Matthew Kennedy, gave a few words: "In recent years FAS has been cuting back on their shcemes in the Dublin and North Kildare areas, so it was great news to get before Christmas."

The improvement plans for the Canal this year include provision of four to six fishing stands for the disabled, installing new bollards, known as 'Timberheads' for mooring in Maynooth, Kilcock and Confey.

During the course of the up-coming year the fifteen approved participants will be encouraged to participate in a variety of courses, ranging from computer courses, accountancy to horticulture.

Ultimately, our concept is to make Maynooth the main staging area going into the North Shannon and Royal Canal System.

TOWORDS A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE FOR MAYNOOTH IN THE NEW MILLENNIUM

The concept of sustainable development can be understood as a process of development which is sustainable economically, socially, and environmentally, though it is normally the latter that usually attracts most attention. But sustainable development is ultimately about striking a balance between all three aspects; it is about "development which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs". terminology coined by Brundtland in 1987. In Ireland, two essential considerations apply when sustainable development concepts are discussed. Firstly, it is emphasised that development must not harm the natural environment. This is important because so much of the national economy is dependent on a 'clean, green' image. A large part of Irish gross national product depends on this image being maintained. Secondly, it is clear that the link between economic growth and increased stress on the environment must be de-coupled if sustainable development is to become a reality. This is not a pipedream but a necessity for all of us to realise, not least in the area of waste management. This has become guite a live issue over the last few months as the controversy over Kilcock incinerator has raged. Growth without environmental degradation is not possible but ultimately essential in the new millennium. Today, February 2000, Ireland has income levels equal to the EU average and at least in eastern parts no longer qualifies for 'Objective 1'status as one of the EU's lagging regions. These parts also fail to meet the criteria for 'cohesion funds' from the EU Regional Fund. The Structural Funds which have transformed the economic landscape of Ireland will certainly not be flowing as freely in the years ahead. Growth in this part of Ireland will however undoubtedly continue to be rapid, though hopefully not on the scale which has seen Maynooth add 800 houses to its stock in the past four years and which has placed strains on many areas of community and social infrastructure.

To plan in this context of rapid growth involves a drastic change in thinking very different from the past where development at any cost was sometimes a more common sentiment. Planning for the Celtic Tiger in the new millenium must, however, be guided by sustainable development considerations. These must be incorporated into planning procedures also. In devising the Maynooth Development Plan, now expected in late spring one hopes the following principles are being followed.

The Plan should focus on the needs of the future Maynooth resident as well as the present. We should not sacrifice precious amenities like open spaces, or resources such as water supply, for short term needs. Some things are limited, like the ability of the Liffey to assimilate waste, or the ability of the Main Street to handle traffic. There is no point in adding forever to their burden. Instead we have to learn to match projected growth with the capacity to absorb growth in a much more realistic manner that was evident in the earlier drafts of the Maynooth Development Plan which found such widespread rejection. Traffic is perhaps the major legacy of past mistakes. A recent survey found that approximately 700 cars travel in each direction on the Straffan Road near the motorway interchange between 5.30 and 6.30pm. With a car every 3 seconds passing, it is small wonder that the exit from the railway station or Glen Royal complex is blocked. The way the motorway traffic was routed through the town was a major error of the last decade. Who pushed for the spinal road directly into Maynooth instead of a junction at Blacklion,

east of the town, which would have relieved horrendous traffic flows in the Main Street? Maynooth Planning Alliance knows the answer to this questio. Do you? Have we learned from past mistakes? Regrettably the answer is no. It now appears the new Bond Bridge is being constructed without an entrance to the railway station. If this happens, 1000 cars will now be trying to exit onto the Straffan Road at the rush hours, trying to find that three second gap! The result can be easily imagined. It now also appears that the mistakes made on the Mill Street-Parson Street junction will be repeated on the Movglare Road. In this area of south west Maynooth massive residential development feeding onto the Main Street was sanctioned by our Councillors despite the absence of any route to the motorway other than through the Main Street/Straffan Road. Incredibly they now seem set to propose a similar exercise on north Maynooth on the Moyglare Road-even more vulnerable to congestion because of the schools and university traffic flows. At the end of the next decade for some Maynooth residents we may be 'only an hour fromi Leixlip' if what seems to be our Development Plan is carried out.

- 2. Integrated and broad ranging objectives should be pursed by a partnership approach-not catering for narrow sectors at the expense of the entire community. Maynooth today is an increasingly sophisticated community. It will easily recognise any attempts to camouflage unnecessary residential rezonings and those responsible will not be forgiven easily. Last year demonstrated this at the local elections-this year it is not impossible national elections will provide a further test for our politicians. Whether it be a Science Park or Public Park, a Sports Centre or Social Centre objectives will only be attained if a community consensus is behind them.
- 3. Improved physical, recreational and social facilities in Maynooth should not be achieved at the cost of quality of life for its inhabitants. Educational facilities and passive amenity pursuits such as walking for pleasure are vital components of any town. But they must not be provided for by a short sighted rezoning exercise which leaves everyone back where they started. In the medium term, the age structure of Maynooth will tilt away from the teens and twenties towards a predominantly older population. The recreational needs of these must be provided for also. Alternatives to 'development-led' planning in this area must be devised and incorporated into the forthcoming plan.
- 4. The plan should be people oriented, one which builds on existing strengths, and which enables people to be comfortable with their town. A pause in the headlong rush for growth of recent years is the best way of achieving this. Fortunately the delay in the appearance of the plan provides a small breathing space before the next wave of growth accelerates. This should be used by our elected representatives to seek implementation of their goals other than by further residential rezoning.

Understanding the concept of sustainable development is one thing. Putting it into practice is another. Maynooth has so many natural advantages that, given the chance, it could be the model to which others strive. Let us hope that population target for Maynooth and other towns for the period up to 2006, as agreed by our councillors, signals a commitment not to squander this opportunity.





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
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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question:

What are the new Medical Card income guide-lines for 2000?

Answer

The Medical Card income guide-lines are updated in January each year. The new income guide-lines are as follows and are effective from 1st January 2000:

Question

I heard that a new bereavement grant to be paid to widows and widowers with children was announced in the Budget. Could you give me some information about this?

Answer:

A new grant of £1,000.00, to be paid to widows or widowers with dependant children was announced in Budget 2000.

At the moment a Bereavement Grant of £500.00 is paid to **all insured people** including civil and public servants. This grant will continue to be paid. However, a widow/widower, with dependant children may also be eligible for an additional grant of £1,000.00.

The full details of the qualifying conditions for this new grant will be known when the Social Welfare Bill is published in February 2000. It was announced by the Minister for Social, Community and Family Affairs on 2nd December 1999 that the grant of £1,000.00 will be paid to widows/widowers who have lost a spouse after 1st December 1999. The grant will only apply to widows/widowers with dependant children who qualify for a Widower's Contributory Pension or a One-Parent Family Payment or a Bereavement Grant payable on the death of their spouse.

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



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
SENIOR CITIZENS COMMITTEE

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


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

MAYNOOTH TIDY TOWNS

The Tidy Towns Millennium Competition is being improved and greater resources are being made available. We in Maynooth Tidy Towns will be at a meeting with groups who are interested in Maynooth and it's environs in late February to see how we can improve our town and position ourselves to continue our improving ratings in the Tidy Towns Competition.

A qualitative market research project on National Tidy Towns has been conducted and here are the main findings.

- The competition has a decidedly rural image and people in larger cities feel that it is not relevant to their
- Larger areas lack the natural borders to make people feel a sense of ownership and this is complicated by through roads which are impossible to control.
- Many believe that it is to do with litter control and the promotion of tourism - an area where it has made a major contribution with an emphasis on 'beautifying'
- limited awareness of how the competition actually operates.
- Stronger enforcement of litter legislation required;
- There's a view also that the competition favours smaller towns with 'picture post-card' scenery.

A LENTEN LETTER

No! this is not the regulations to be read from the pulpit by order of his Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, but a reflection of Lent in the last century. If we were remiss about the season, we were awakened at mass on the Sunday preceding Ash Wednesday. The priest unfurling this enormous sheet of paper, carefully folding it to manageable size and proceeding to read the Lenten regulations for the diocese.

I was bemused then and am still, why the first regulation was. "No catholic could study in T.C.D., without the explicit permission of his grace the Archbishop". Why at Lent? Was it alright at other times? Lent meant something very special those days.

Fasting: One full meal and two colations each day, Sunday and St. Patricks Day excepted. Abstinence: Meat or meat products forbidden on Wednesday, Friday and on the eve of Holidays. We all knew that because the "Far East calender had a fish imprinted on the date. Wearing of sack cloth and ashes long since discontinued from the turn of the previous century.

From Ash Wednesday all Statues and Icons shrouded in purple until holy Saturday. All cinemas had to close at 23.30, except on the feast of St. Patricks when Ceilis could continue until 3 a.m. except when it fell on a Saturday. Holy Hour on the first Sunday of the month, rosary and benediction the other three or four. Stations of the crosss, every Wednesday and Friday at 8 p.m.

Voluntary abstinence from alcoholic drink and smoking was encouraged with the promise of 100 years indulgence from purgatory for a departed relative or friend, or could be reserved for oneself for future use.

Being young I often wondered what became of these indulgences, if those you nominated were snugly upon high playing harps, or you wound up roasting chestnuts or stoking furnaces in the nether regions.

Some well intentioned 'hard chaws' exercised licence of their own making. The Lenten regs not applying to Sundays and Feast Days, had a few smokes and a tipple to alleviate the engli

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day invariably fell around St. Valentine's Day, heralding the season of whipping tops for the children.

Holy Week was quite another occasion of Lent, following the blessing of the palms, we the altar servers, were summoned each evening to attend the church, for rehearsals of the ceremonies on the following days.

These sessions normally had an interlude whilst the priests heard confessions.

To keep out of mischief, we busied ourselves with competitions. One was to see who could cast the smallest stone into either of the two now no linger existing sheep dipping ponds beyond and below the front of the church.

It was the era of Jim Bradock, Max Baer and Joe Louis, and all the servers were boxing fans, friendly bouts were arranged; accidents did happen, and many of us served on the altar on Monday, Thursday and Good Friday sporting shiners' much to the amusement of our late Parish Priest, also a boxing fan.

MAYNOOTH ACTION STRATEGY

As traffic congestion in and around Maynooth grows more serious by the month, Maynooth Action Strategy is very disappointed to learn that the current proposals relating to the realignment of Bond Bridge have no provision for motor access to the Railway Station from the Rathcoffey Road. MAS originally proposed and lobbied for the extension of the Railway Station car park and larnrod Eireann is to be congratulated on the fine job that has been done in developing the new car park on the Rathcoffey Road side of the station. Failure to provide adequate access to this car park as part of the Bond Bridge development would be a retrograde step.

The plans for the new Bond Bridge prepared by HGL O'Connor, consultant engineers, were recently presented to Kildare Co. Council. While all our local councillors favour the provision of motor access from Bond Bridge to the Railway Station, as things stand this will not be part of the design when the project goes to tender in May of this year. Originally technical reasons were given as to why a slipway from the bridge to the station carpark could not be constructed. It now emerges that it simply a question of finance with a figure of £95,000 being quoted as the cost. This seems a very small sum given the overall cost of the project and the tremendous benefits that would flow from providing this additional point of access to the Railway Station. The engineers have also quoted issues of safety, stating that poor sight lines at the proposed junction at Bond Bridge would create a traffic hazard. Maynooth Action Strategy believes that there are technical solutions to that problem and that, in any case, the existing exit onto the Straffan Road is far from ideal.

Currently there is serious traffic congestion at the Railway Station in the evening as dozens of cars attempt to exit the station onto the Straffan Road. It can regularly take 15 minutes to negotiate the traffic jam leaving the station when passengers disembark from the 17:15 and 17:52 trains from Connolly Station. This situation will obviously disimprove when larnrod Eireann's plans to extend rail services to Maynooth are put into place in 2001 and the service is more heavily used. Providing access to the station from the Rathcoffey Road could relieve much of this congestion. In addition, hundreds of residents in the Newtown area would benefit from much more convenient access to the station rather than adding to traffic congestion in the village and on the Straffan Road.

With the support of our partners Maynooth Community Council, Maynooth Chamber of Commerce, NUI, Maynooth and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth Action Strategy intend to lobby Kildare Co. Council on this issue.

HOLIDAYS ON THE WEB

Our local travel agents will always be with us and they will undoubtedly continue to provide an important service for many people when they come to arrange their annual holiday. Increasingly, however, it is becoming possible to research and book your holiday using the Internet. From personal experience holidays in Portugal and Holland have been successfully organised using the Web. In both cases it was possible to contact hotels directly by email and to view pictures of the hotels facilities. Until recently many people were cautious about using their credit cards to pay for services on the Web. But most of the security issues have now been sorted out and it is probably safer revealing your credit card number to a reputable site on the Web than it is to hand over your card to a waiter in a restaurant where you haven't dined before.

Three Irish sites have recently become available:

www.direct-holidays.ie www.falconholidays.ie www.iwtholidays.ie.

Direct Holidays is a Scottish based tour operator, which sells package holidays direct to the public, rather than through the conventional route of travel agents. They were formed in November 1991 and following a successful launch of the business from Glasgow and Prestwick airports (Summer 1992 and 1993) the company expanded its departure airports to Edinburgh (Summer 1995), Liverpool (Summer 1995), Manchester (Summer 1996), Newcastle (1998), Belfast, Leeds Bradford, Humberside and Teesside (Summer 1999) and Dublin (Summer 2000). The company claims that "when you book with Direct Holidays you cut out the travel agent. More importantly you cut out all their commission. This means you save money on the cost of your holiday". The Web site is well organised and allows you search for, book and pay for a flight to a range of holiday destinations including Faro, Malaga, Tenerife, Ibiza, Malta and Gran Canaria. It also provides very comprehensive information on accommodation, prices and holiday health.

Both the Falcon Tours and JWT sites are attempts by well-established travel companies to tap into business on the Web. JWT have published their 4 holiday brochures on their Web site - 2twentys, Selection, Florida/Mexico Sun and Winter Sun. Again it is possible to search for and book a holiday having worked through the brochures online. The Falcon site has a very similar approach and their 5 brochures - Summer Sun 2000, Villa Sun 2000, Cruises Sun 2000, Ski 1999/2000 and Winter Sun - are searchable in the same way as the JWT brochures.

The other way in which the Web can be used to plan your holiday is by using it to research your destination. Let's say you are lucky enough to be heading off to the Bahamas next week. You know it's nice and sunny with blue seas and beautiful beaches but you would like to find out a little bit more about the country. By typing in 'Bahamas' into any of the search engines on the Web you will get back dozens of links to sites about the Bahamas. One of the best is www.bahamas.com, which features maps of the islands leading to a complete guide of the whole region. Fancy going to Crooked Island? This is what it has to say:

"Crooked Island (together with Long Cay) forms the northwest part of the atoll system. The deliciously sweet scent of native herbs and flowers inspired Columbus to call it "one of the fragrant islands." He christened the island "Isabella" after his queen, and it was called "Samoete" by the Arawaks, but, somehow, the more functionally descriptive Crooked Island is the name it is known by today.

Quiet and remote, the island's natural attributes are many. An abundance of bird life thrives on the cliffs and reefs around the islands, and magnificent limestone caves hide secrets from the past. Coral gardens, shelves and reefs are a treat for divers, and the deep creeks, tidal flats, and pools filled with game fish make it a sportsman's delight. Spectacular, untouched, white sand beaches stretch for miles".



LEIXLIP NO MORE

As you may be aware, the ESB area office in Leixlip has been closed for some years, in keeping with the rationalisation policy of the "New ESB".

In early January 00 the last electrical crews were transferred to Finglas depot.

The original office opened over 60 years ago, beside the present day "Rockafellas". The late James Smyth was appointed the first Area Electrician. He and his staff set up a great raport with the consumers, knowing all of them personally from their initial connection to the network. Rural electrification was still 8 years in the offing. The original area radiated through Lucan to Palmerstown, Clondalkin, Tallaght, Brittas, Manor Kilbride to Kill, Donadea, Kilcock, Enfield, Dunshaughlin, Rathoath, Curragh, The Boleys, Dunboyne, Mulhuddart, Clonsilla, with Maynooth, Celbridge, Straffan and Rathcoffey in the centre. Quite an area in War-time and rationing; Jim reigned supreme until his death.

Three of his longest serving staff were Benny Greene, RIP, Martin Keegan, RIP, the former Lord Mayor of Lucan, and our own Gabriel Flood, ONeill Park.

The area grew from hundreds to many thousands in the 60s and 70s. Consequently the area reduced gradually. Losing Palmerstown, Kilcock, Dunshaughlin, Clondalkin and Tallaght and finally Lucan in the late 70s. In the late 80s with the demise of Kilcock it regained Batterstown and Dunshaughlin.

On January the 6th many of the former and present staff met at a farewell party in the Springfield Hotel, to say goodbye to an institution of our time.



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MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES

Bond Bridge Design Going on Public Display for Comments:

At the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council on 7 January the Draft Design for PART X Planning Permission was presented to the Councillors by the Consultants and Council Engineers. The design is as expected, apart from three areas which Cllr. John Mc Ginley asked to be changed.

- 1. There should be a vehicular entrance to the train station so that cars would not have to use Parson St. and Main St. to gain access to the Straffan Road entrance. The Consultants said that they could not recommend this for cost and safety reasons. They stated that it would cost an extra £95,000 and that the new junction at the bridge would create a traffic hazard because of poor sight lines.
- 2. The 1.2m walls should be stone finished and not plaster finish as proposed.
- 3. There should be a pedestrian entrance to the College opposite Parson Court to reduce the pedestrian traffic in Parson Street

The basic design of the new bridge is as follows:

- * The roadway will be 21ft wide with a 6ft footpath and a 5ft path on both sides.
- * There will be a 17ft clearance over the railway to allow for future electrification. This means that the bridge will be 2ft higher than the existing bridge.
- * The Meadowbrook stream and the Joan Slade river will be culverted from Meadowbrook Lawns to Parson Lodge (This would facilitate the pedestrian entrance to the College at Parson court).
- * Newtown Grove will become a cul de sac at the Newtown Road end.

The bridge will be kept open most of the time during construction. However, it will have to close for a day or two, on two or three occasions. The County Engineer told the meeting that he expected the Meadowbrook Link to the Straffan Road to be completed by then and that it could be used as the diversion. The bridge will be open to pedestrians at all times during construction.

The Programme of Work is as follows:

- * The Council to apply for PART X Planning Permission before the end of January.
- * Go to tender in May.
- * Contractor begins work in July.
- * Construction period will be 18 to 24 months.

New Traffic Lights for Straffan road:

As a result of a motion from Cllr. John Mc Ginley the Council have agreed to install traffic lights at the Railway Station/ Parklands/Castlebridge exits. These lights will also facilitate traffic exiting from Old greenfield and Silken Vale. Motorists are finding it increasingly difficult to exit from these locations because of the volume and speed of traffic on the Straffan Road. The new lights will mean improvements for everyone—motorists and pedestrians.

New Taffic Lights for Parson Street/Main Street Junction:

Council Officials advised Cllr. John Mc Ginley at the Area Meeting on the 7January that funding is now in place for these traffic and pedestrian lights that were an integral part of the Main Street Improvement Works. This will make life much easier for those exiting from Parson Street and will also allow pedestrians to cross the road safely at this very busy junction. The pedestrian lights at the Bank of Ireland will be removed when the new lights are in place. These lights are a hazard for pedestrians at present because traffic keeps coming from

the Straffan Road though the pedestrian lights are green.

Moyglare Village Boundary Wall Gets Funding:

Cllr. John Mc Ginley motion 'That funding be allocated from the next Discretionary Block grant to build a boundary wall betwen Moyglare Village and Moyglare Road' was agreed at the Area Meeting of 7 January. This means that money will be allocated from the Discretionary Grants next March/April for this purpose and the wall will be built. It will be a great relief for the residents to know that their children can play in safety on the green.

Problems With Bus Eireann & Dublin Bus:

It was agreed at the Area Meeting on 7January to invite Dublin Bus and Bus Eireann to our next meeting so that we can iron out two major problems:

- 1. Bus drivers cause serious traffic build ups on Main Street because they don't pull into the bus bays for passengers.
- 2. The two bus turning bays on the Straffan Road are an eyesore as a result of buses driving up on the 'green' areas. It is hoped to agree on a new design for the turning points

Doctors Lane:

The Councils Senior Executive Engineer is to come up with traffic calming proposals for Doctors Lane for the next Meeting. It is inevitable that a serious accident will take place involving pedestrians if nothing is done.

Inclusion of Maynoth in Dublin Taximeter Area:

Councellors asked at the last Area Meeting that Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge, Kilcock and Straffan be included in the Dublin Taximeter Area. This would mean that taxis could not refuse to take individuals from Dublin to these Kildare towns as in the case at present. They would also be forbidden to charge other that the meter charge. Some Maynooth residints were charged £45 for a taxi from Dublin to Maynooth

Restoration Work on Obelisk:

Deputy emmet Stagg has requested the Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands, to provide funding for essential restoration works at the Obelisk.

Deputy Stagg stated that Capital funding for such works had increased by 8% in 2000 and that it was now time to proceed with the work.

Temporary Footpath Parsons Hall to Castledawson

Arising from requests from residents in Parsons Hall,I Deputy Stagg contacted the developers of Castledawson concerning the provision of a temporary footpath on the reserved section of green area fronting Castledawson at the Parsons Hall end. The developers duly obliged and Dupty Stagg thanked them for their assistance.

Work on the provision of a proper footpath fronting the Castledawson boundary wall which is costed at £20,000 is due to start shortly.

Gaelscoil ui Fhiach

The Minister for education is still being pressed by Deputy Emmet Stagg to sanction permanent recognition for Maynooth Gael Scoil. The application was made in April, 1999 and the delay in sanctioning same is unacceptable.

Traffic Route Lighting - Celbridge

Cllr. John McGinley has requested Kildare Co. Council to provide Traffic Route Lighting on Celbridge Road, Maynooth, from the junction with the Straffan Road to the end of Laurences Avenue.

FINE GALE NOTES

Proposals for Bond Bridge Construction at Maynooth

Cllr. Senan Griffin welcomed, with some reservations, the new proposals as outlined by H.G.L. O'Connor at the Leixlip Area Meeting on Friday last 7th January, regarding the realignment of the Bond Bridge in Maynooth.

The proposals allow for the construction of a 6.5 metre wide road, with a 1.9 metre wide and a 1.5 metre cycle path at both sides of the proposed new road layout.

The construction will involve piping a section of the Joan Slade river bounding the College wall along Parson Street. The new bridge will be about 600 mm higher than the existing roadway levels so that a clearance of 5.13 metres can be accommodated for the rail line. The proposed road will be bound by a wall of approximately 12.3 meters high, which Cllr. Griffin has insisted should be of finished stonework.

The major drawback in the proposed new roadway said Cllr Griffin, is that it fails to provide for motor access to the car park at the Railway station from the Rathcoffey Road.

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested the engineer in charge to ensure that access to the car park at the Railway Station is provided, in order to alleviate traffic congestion on the Main Street by forcing motorists to drive through Parson Street, Main Street and up the Straffan Road to gain access to the station. Traffic congestion can be easily avoided by providing this simple access point, said Cllr. Griffin.

The time limit for this project is that it is likely to go to tender in May 2000 and construction should start in July 2000 which will take approximately 18 to 24 months to complete.

Cllr. Griffin hopes to circulate a map outlining the consultants proposals to all households in the Rathcoffey Road area.

Celbridge Interchange Gets Go Ahead

The County Engineer advised the Leixlip Area Committee at their meeting on January 7th that the order to proceed with the purchase of the necessary land to accommodate the interchange, has been granted by the Minister for the Environment.

The provision of this link to Intel / Hewlett Packard and Celbridge is vital for the proper management of traffic in the area and will result in a reduction of traffic hold-ups in Leixlip and Celbridge. The Minister's order also allows for the removal of the existing bridge at Leixlip Gate leading to the right of way at Castletown in Celbridge.

Cllr. Senan Griffin, in welcoming the advancement of the project, stated that the link to Celbridge is long overdue and that the residents of Main Street, Castletown, Oaklawn and Green Lane Estates in Leixlip, will be overjoyed by the elimination of the huge volume of traffic through their estates. The sooner this project is completed, the better for all concerned said Cllr. Griffin.

Private Sites

Cllr. Senan Griffin's motion to Kildare County Council to provide forty private sites in Leixlip, has been accepted in principle by the Leixlip Area Committee at its recent meeting. As a result of the motion, the Committee is to request the full Council to formulate a transparent policy on the housing needs of the people of Kildare.

The need for local authority housing plus affordable housing

has long been advocated by Cllr. Senan Griffin, which was also announced in the Bacon Report, together with the need for private sites throughout the whole of the county.

Completion Works at Main Street, Leixlip and Main Street, Maynooth:

Cllr. Senan Griffin has requested Kildare County Council to draw up a snag list for the completion of the Main Streets in Maynooth and Leixlip.

In drawing up the list, Cllr. Senan Griffin has also requested that the nameplates for the various streets be put in place similar to the style provided in Kilcock.

However, Cllr. Senan Griffin has expressed his concern at the poor quality of some of the completed works in both Maynooth and Leixlip and has suggested that the contractor be recalled to complete outstanding works.

Kilcock Incinerator:

Deputy Bernard Durkan and Cllr. Senan Griffin have lodged an objection to the proposed incinerator at Boycetown Kilcock with An Bord Pleanala. Bord Pleanala have accepted that the grounds for the appeal will be confined to planning matters only as set out by Deputy Durkan and Cllr. Griffin.

In objecting to the proposed incinerator Deputy Durkan and Cllr. Griffin highlighted the lack of road infrastructure, shortage of water and sewerage facilities plus the protection of the Royal Canal. Issues such as air pollution and emissions will have to be dealt with by the E.P.A.

The Fine Gael position in North Kildare has always been to oppose this application by T.W.M.I. at Boycetown Kilcock. It is of the utmost importance that Bord Pleanala reject this application and uphold the decision of Kildare County

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
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MAYNOOTH PITCH AND PUTT

Aisling, Brian and Conor for all the odd jobs, Bridie for vigilance and anybody else who doesn't fit in to any of the above categories.

In conclusion it has been a wonderful experience enjoyed by us all and I hope in some way we made a contribution to our community in Maynooth.

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

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
