




Rich Heritage Portrayed in Walks Guide

EXPLORING

Maynooth's rich heritage is portrayed in 'Exploring Maynooth', a guide to five historical walks around the town, recently published by Maynooth Local History & Civic Forum and Maynooth Action Strategy. Visitors to the town will find it an invaluable guide to all the most interesting historic features in the area and the booklet should prove useful in promoting local tourism. But many residents may also be surprised by the wealth of the history that surrounds us. At a time when Maynooth is changing more rapidly than at any time in its long history, 'Exploring Maynooth' takes stock of our heritage and invites us to put on our walking shoes and explore it. From the early Christian site at Laraghbryan to the monument in the Square commemorating Maynooth's involvement in the 1916 Rising, evidence of the town's history is around every corner. And the very local history of schools, churches and playing fields is also very much part of this exploration of Maynooth. The booklet describes five walks in the vicinity, taking in the town itself, the College, the Royal Canal, Moyglare and Carton Avenue. Each walk has an accompanying map which indicates features of interest on the route. For anyone interested the historic location of 'Lover's Lane' is marked on one of the maps!

Maynooth Local History & Civic Forum and Maynooth Action Strategy are to be commended on bringing out this publication which will undoubtedly stimulate a wider interest in our history and perhaps, greater care in preserving our heritage.

EDITORIAL

Credit Union Expansion

News that Maynooth Credit Union has purchased Donovan's on Main St. for a sum in excess of £700,000 is an indication of inflated property prices in the town but, more importantly, reflects the tremendous success of the Credit Union. With over 4,500 members in Maynooth the Credit Union can Claim to be one of the largest organisations in the town. Its philosophy of encouraging saving and providing loans for people who might not be in a position to obtain credit from financial institutions has been an important part of community development across Ireland in the past forty years. Savings deposited locally are available for lending locally so, apart from earning interest, savers are contributing in a tangible way to their community. There will always be a role for banks but in an era when financial institutions are returning high profits it is encouraging to see that a non-profit making organisation such as the Credit Union, much of it based on voluntary effort, can prosper. With numbers growing rapidly in the past few years the premises in Leinster St. are no longer adequate. All associated with Maynooth Credit Union are to be congratulated on their bold move in the property market and the Newsletter wishes the Credit Union well at its new location.

What Price a Playground?

A recent survey by Sugraidh, a voluntary child pressure group, found that there are more than twice as many golf courses as playgrounds in the country. Nearly half of all local authorities make no provision for playgrounds and, unfortunately, Kildare Co. Council is included in that list. The average public playground is believed to cost about £80,000 and it seems many local authorities are reluctant to provide them due to the 'compensation culture'. This, However, seems more like an excuse than a reason. Dublin Corporation has 30 playgrounds and Cork has 19 - all of which are being refurbished with state-of-the-art multi-play units and special safety sponge surfaces. How about it Kildare Co. Council?

The June Meeting took place on the 12th June in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Co-Options to Community Council

Following a meeting between the executives, Maynooth Community Council and local members of Fianna Fail Cuman at which Cllr. Paul Kelly attended. The meeting itself was very far-reaching. They said they were there to listen to all groups in the Maynooth area and that the meeting with Maynooth Community Council was only one such meeting. The matter of attending Community Council meetings was raised. Chairman John Doogan said this in itself was not a bad idea. But however, as Maynooth Community Council is a non political body and our constitution states that all Community Councillors have to be resident in Maynooth, which meant that Cllr. Kelly could not attend meetings. However, it was also noted that any Local Fianna Fail representative and other Politicians could attend Community Council meeting if co-opted to represent their Resident Association.

Senan Griffin stated that this is the case with both himself and John McGinleay as both are Cllrs. but only attend meetings representing their areas.

PUB APPLICATION FOR BEAUFIELD

It was noted that an application has being made for a Public House Licence in Beaufield estate.

John Doogan stated that the estate already has a lot of students residents and the noise levels that a Pub would bring to the estate was unacceptable. Sean Griffin said that the people in the area would have to make an objection. There was also a restriction that no new pub could be opened inside one mile another Maynooth Community Council gave their support to the Beaufield Residents.

NEW LOGO FOR MAYNOOTH

It was agreed to extend the closing date for the closing date for the competition to design a new logo for Maynooth. The new date is 31st July. It was felt that this should be a challenge for an artistic person also there is a £100 prize. It was felt that the logo should incorporate Maynooth College, NUI, the Town Castle etc. Pdraig O Murchu proposed that the judging panel have a representation from Maynooth Action Strategy, Maynooth History Forum Community Council and the Chamber of Commerce.

UNDERAGED DRINKING.

It was noted that by-laws regarding street drinking will come into effect on 1st July. It was hoped that the new laws would help clean up the problem of young people drinking around the town. The meeting felt that the problem of young people drinking has now reached a very serious level.

Muireann Ni Bhrolchain said that the problem of spiking drinks was very serious and dangerous. It was stated that people seen buying drinks for young people should be stopped. It was also felt that parents should get organised and police their own area. When we say underage drinkers

we are talking about 12 year olds. their effort. With the introduction of traffic calming measures, the building of a new stoned wall, signs etc. with all the safety measures being put in place he hoped residents would be reassured. It was also noted that the Pat Reen that has developed on the Lady Chapel Road would cease when the Line Road opened.

FESTIVAL

The festival will take place from 12th - 16th July. The Maynooth Community Festival Committee have put together a great fun programme for all. Heineken are the sponsors of this year's festival. The millenium tea party will be a real treat for the kids, with the clowns face painting and the fancy dress parade. The Battle Re-enactment is not to be missed. About one hundred people take part in this event. Do not forget to vote for your favourite barman. Kids don't forget to enter the children art competition Soccer Teams get your entries in. TIDY TOWNS

Also in May, our Vice Chairman Cyril McAree met with representatives of Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee. As a result the Cumann members are currently discussing and agreeing on measures which we can undertake to make our contribution to this extremely worth while and deserving cause. As a start, the Cumann members are meeting on Friday evening 16th June to tidy and clean-up the area to the left inside the entrance to Carton Avenue at the top of the town. This area has become very wild and overgrown and dirty thereby ruining a potentially very attractive amenity and visual asset to the town, which if kept clean, litter and weed-free, would be the envy of most towns in Ireland. Other projects will also be undertaken in the very near future with regard to the Tidy Towns project and we hope to be able to detail these in the next issue of the Newsletter.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Finally in early June, the Chairman and Treasurer along with Cllr. Paul Kelly met with the Maynooth Community Council and received a warm, hospitable and informative welcome from the new Chairman and Committee members. Catherine Murphy would be invited to attend the Meetings of the Maynooth Community Council.

MAHER SCHOOL OF IRISH DANCING



Maynooth, Ontario - Population 300

Maynooth isn't unique. There is another Maynooth. It is a small town of 300 people located about 200 north east of Toronto in the Canadian state of Ontario. Originally called Doyle's Corner after one of the earliest settlers in the area, in the 1870's the people of the town held a plebiscite to choose a new name - and Maynooth is what they choose. In the early years of the 20th century the railway reached Maynooth and helped to promote the timber industry in the area. Nowadays, tourism plays an important part in the local economy and Maynooth is a centre for trekking and skiing.

The property market in Maynooth, Ontario is not quite as buoyant as here in the Celtic Tiger. For just under £50,000 you can buy an 8 year old 3 bedroomed house located 3 miles outside the town. £140,000 is the asking price for a two storied, 3000 sq ft. house (about 3 times the size of your average semi here) in Maynooth with 4 bedrooms standing on one acre.

The Arlington Hotel is the place to stay in Maynooth and is used by walkers, bikers and skiers exploring the nearby wilderness. And rates are inexpensive - just £19 for a double room.

The links between our Maynooth and Maynooth in Ontario seem fairly tenuous. But there is one interesting story that links the two. The bell in the church in Maynooth, Ontario has crossed the Atlantic three times. First, it was shipped from Britain but on arriving in Canada it was assumed that a mistake had been made and the bell was shipped to Ireland. Arriving in Ireland its true destination was worked out and it was sent back to Canada for a second time!

DAVID WINS SILVER MEDAL AT SPECIAL OLYMPICS

Eighteen year old David Brophy from Kilcloon was in the news recently when he returned from the European Special Olympics sporting a silver medal. David, who is a keen horseman, won his award in the equestrian section of the competition, which was held in Groningen in the Netherlands.

Competition was intense, with a total of thirteen countries participating in the equestrian events. The Irish team did particularly well in the competition with a total of two gold, two silver and two bronze medals awarded to Irish riders. David took part in the dressage and in the trail-riding event, in which he won his medal.

David Brophy is a final year pupil at St. Raphael's Special School in Celbridge which includes riding in the school programme. Teams of volunteers from the Riding for the Disabled Association (Ireland) work with many of the school pupils each week, teaching them the fundamentals of riding and pony management. David is particularly talented and thus won his place on the Irish Olympic team.

Special Olympics is an international programme of year-round sports training and competition for children and adults with a learning disability. The range of sports is very wide including gymnastics, swimming, athletics, team games and equestrian events. There are also winter sports such as skiing and skating.

Special Olympics believes that its programme of sports training and competition helps people with learning disability become physically fit and grow mentally, socially and spiritually. Families become stronger and communities learn to respect and accept people with disabilities in an atmosphere of equality and understanding.

Over 90 countries participate in Special Olympics and there are more than 15,000 meetings and tournaments throughout the world each year at local, regional and national levels. The International Special Olympic Games is held every two years, alternating between summer and winter sports. The competition lasts for nine days. The next International Special Olympics for summer sports will take place in Ireland in 2003. This will be the first time the event will have take place outside of the United States.

Estate Agents - Travelling at the Speed of Light

We've all seen the estate agents advertisements for new houses in Maynooth proclaiming that it is just a short thirty minute trip into Dublin. What they omit to state is that a helicopter is required to do the journey day when fifty to seventy minutes is a more realistic journey time. As the prices of housing in the Dublin area soars beyond the means of anyone earning an average salary people are being encouraged to purchase 'down the country' with the prospect of cheaper houses and trouble free commuting into the city. In a recent advertisement for new houses in Kinnegad the town is described as 'on the capital's doorstep', just 'a pleasant 45 minutes drive from Dublin'. At 4am in the morning it might be possible to drive from Kinnegad to Dublin in 45 minutes without breaking the speed limit. For commuters, a much more realistic travel time would be 90 minutes - but, of course, information like that doesn't sell houses.

Frank Young (Herman's Hermits) rocks Fuerteventura.

Deciding to go Fuerteventura for a two week holiday was a big change for us, we had been visiting Playa del Ingles in Gran Canaria for ten years. But the decision was unexpectedly rewarding in so many ways. Life crawls along, no one hurries, cars speed at 30 m.p.h. only. Maybe the internet exists in the small capital, Rosario, but this resort saw no need for such urgency. What a relief. Practically uninhabited, 40,000 people to 80,000 goats, the residents and tourists in our resort were the most friendly people I have ever come across. Spanish, German, Dutch, Swedish, Turkish, Canarian, Irish and English in particular greeting us like friends. Within four days cars were saluting us in the street, well Frank Young's jeep to be exact. Frank was a member of Herman's Hermits until 1982 and now owns a large pub, *The cavern*, in the Harbour at Caleta de Fuste de Castillo beside which our complex, the Barcelo Club was situated. We struck up a friendship with him, his wife Jane and their new barman Alan who had only been there six weeks.

After a number of days I asked Jane if it would be possible to do an interview with Frank for our local Newsletter, failing that a photograph would suffice. No problem - we arranged a quiet time in the *Cavern* where the tasteful maritime decor is accompanied by memorabilia of Elvis, the Beatles and, of course Hermin's Hermits.

Sitting at the corner of the bar, before he began singing for the night, he told me the most unexpectedly extraordinary story. In 1982 he decided to leave the band, having played in every state of America except Alaska and every province in Canada. Suffering severe burn out he went on 'a seven year chill out' - to Yugoslavia. They were the most wonderful seven years, he and his girlfriend mixing with all nationalities. Returning from England in 1989 the difference was palpable - even the waiters in restaurants were carrying guns; on the advice of the locals he eventually left the country that he had come to think of as home. His girlfriend could not leave with him.

Even after eleven years Frank was close to tears as he described the infamous blowing up of the bridge at Mostar

that the world witnessed on television. Four or five times a day he crossed it, now his city was divided in two. He has a friend in Manchester managing a club and he first went there and then moved to the Algarve in Portugal, managing and singing in bars for three years. During this time he had intermittent contact with his girlfriend but eventually all contact died away. He could not reach the country by telephone.

After the Algarve, Tenerife came next and he travelled to Fuerteventura in the winter of 93-4 and worked all the bars on the island, as he said himself there were few enough of them in the beginning. The *Cavern* is his fourth bar on the island and he and Jane have been there for two years with the feline resident K C who sits on his own stool behind the bar and keeps Alan company. Frank does not know if his girlfriend in Yugoslavia is dead or alive but he is still trying to find her.

This was far from the interview I had expected, at the beginning I emphasised that I did not expect any personal details but he insisted that he tell the story and that I could publish any part of it as I wished. We spent a lot of time with Frank and Jane who comes from Liverpool and copies of the *Newsletter* will be crossing the Atlantic to the *Cavern*. Our return date to the island has been arranged, my high stool is booked.

GOING ON HOLIDAYS

With the holiday season now approaching we would like to offer some words of advice on home security to persons going on holiday.

A large percentage of burglaries occur in unoccupied houses and burglars are adept at recognising signs that a house is vacant.

- (1) Cancel milk/paper deliveries.
- (2) Inform local Gardai of period house will be vacant, also give them contact number of key holder.
- (3) Leave key with neighbour/relative and have them check the house from day to day.
- (4) Cancel mail or have someone collect it. Don't let mail deliveries build up in the mail box.
- (5) Time switches are available at a small cost that turn on and off lights automatically at the appropriate times. They can also be used to control radios and T.V.'s to simulate sound in the house.
- (6) Make sure all door/windows and garages are securely locked. Don't leave ladders unsecured. You are only assisting the burglar.
- (7) A burglar alarm is essential and the best deterrent to the burglar.



DORIN'S RECIPES

COLESLAW:

Coleslaw is so easy to make: Try this apple coleslaw.

You will need:
1lb white cabbage
1 medium onion
2 apples, peeled and cored
6oz carrots, peeled
5fl ozs mayonnaise
Sea salt and freshly ground pepper as you like.

It will serve 4. Method:

1. Remove the outer leaves from the cabbage, cut into pieces.
2. Feed the cabbage and onion through the slicing blade of a food processor, or chop finely with a sharp knife.
3. Grate the apples and carrots.
4. Add all the ingredients in a large bowl.
5. Add the mayonnaise, salt and pepper.
6. You can also add walnuts and grated cheese, mix together.

FENNEL SOUP:

You will need:
2fl oz olive oil or any good oil
1 medium onion, chopped
8oz fennel, peeled, cored and thinly sliced
1 potato, sliced
24fl oz veg. stock
Sea salt and freshly ground pepper
Lemon juice to taste

Method:

1. Heat oil in a large saucepan and add the onions then cook for 5 min, until soften.
2. Add the fennel and potatoes and cook for 5 more minutes until the fennel softens.
3. Pour in the vegetable stock and bring to the boil.
4. Turn down the heat, cover and simmer for about 45 minutes, mix in a blender. Serve at once, with fresh bread rolls or wholemeal bread.

COD WITH ORANGE SALAD:

You will need:
4 cod cutlets, sea salt and freshly ground pepper.
1oz butter
1oz breadcrumbs
1oz grated cheese
3 small oranges
1 tablespoon olive oil or any good oil
1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
1 bunch watercress

Cooking time 10 minutes. Method:

1. Wipe the fish and season well
2. Put half of the butter on the fish and grill for 5 minutes
3. Mix breadcrumbs and cheese together
4. Turn cutlets and cover with the cheese mixture, cover with remaining butter and grill for 5 minutes
5. Meanwhile peel the oranges, removing all the pips, cut into thin slices and mix with oil and lemon juice
6. Arrange cutlets on a plate
7. Drain oranges and arrange around the fish
8. Garnish with water cress

PEPPERED STEAKS IN BEER AND GARLIC

Served with jacket potatoes and a crisp salad.

You will need:
4 beef sirloin steaks
2 garlic cloves, crushed
4fl ozs brown ale or stout
2tbsp dark sugar
2tbsp worcestershire sauce
1tbsp corn oil
1tbsp crushed black peppercorns. Serves 4:

Method:

1. Place the steaks in a dish and add the garlic, ale or stout, sugar, worcestershire sauce and oil, then leave to marinate in the fridge for 2-3 hours or overnight.
2. Remove the steaks from the dish and reserve the marinade. Sprinkle the peppercorns over the steaks and press them into the surface.
3. Cook the steaks on a hot barbecue, basting them occasionally with the reserved marinade during cooking
4. Turn the steaks once during cooking, and cook them for about 3-6 minutes on each side, depending on how rare you like them.

SUMMER STEW WITH VEGETABLES:

You can add whatever vegetables you like here is just one idea.

For 4 you will need.
1 large onion, sliced
1 large clove garlic, sliced
2tbs olive oil or any good oil
1 baby turnip, cubed
6oz carrots, sliced
6oz cauliflower florets
about 6oz new potatoes, washed and diced
6oz courgettes, sliced
1 pint of vegetable stock
2 heaped tbs. cornflour, mixed with 3tbs. of water
14oz can chopped tomatoes with juice
3-4tbs. chopped fresh parsley or any herb you like, spices if you like
sea salt and freshly ground pepper
3tbs. vegetable oil.

Method:

1. In a large pan soften the onion and garlic in the oil, covered, over a low heat.
2. Then add the prepared veg. and brown for 5/6 mins, stirring and turning
3. Add the stock stirring and bring to the boil
4. Then stir in the cornflour and water mixture
5. Add the tomatoes with their juice and stir well
6. Add the herbs, plus any spices that you choose
7. Season to taste
8. Turn the heat right down and cover the pot tightly
9. Simmer gently for 25 mins. stirring now and then
10. Meanwhile heat the vegetable oil in a shallow pan cook gently for 10 mins. check the seasoning, serve while hot





PAWS

"He Prayth best who loved best all creature great and small"

Paws animal rescue has been in existence since February 1997. During this time they have helped over 3,000 animals including dogs, cats, rabbits, swans, doves and even a cockatiel. They provide an invaluable service to man,s "Best Friend". Paws have a strict policy of re-homing stray animals. These animals can greatly enhance the quality of life for a lonely person. To have a dog as a companion can be a valuable source of security for our elderly and disabled population. In view of the recent attacks on the elderly, especially in country areas, these animal can hugely comfort and reassure those of us who live alone and in fear.

"There is no faith that has never been broken except that of a faithful dog"

Another positive aspect of Paws is the motivation it provides for many young people who spend their Summer holidays volunteering in the shelter. These helpers often have many emotional problems of their own. They find great comfort and solace while tending these vulnerable animals.

Kildare Co. Council Warden Service have a policy of giving just 5 days respite for dogs before putting them down. Imagine your pet lost and lonely with a 5 day death sentence. How much poorer our lives would be without our canine friends. Paws is now in grave danger of having to close. Although the home has always historically housed dogs, KCC now say they must have planning permission to remain open.

A spokesperson for Paws issued the following statement:

"We desperately need three or four acres of land in North Kildare (60% of our animals are rehomed to Dublin), to build a national animal shelter with proper facilities for the animals including a cattery, a veterinary unit where we can help people on welfare or assistance to have their animals neutered for a minimum fee and an education unit where teachers can bring classes of children to visit the centre to teach them how to care for their pets,

We had been negotiating with the Kildare County Council about leasing a piece of land from them, on which we would erect a custom built animal rescue shelter, Yesterday we received a letter from the planning section of the same Council telling us we do not have planning permission for our shelter. (the sheds which house the dogs were built in 1680 to house the hounds from the hunt), Meanwhile we have over sixty dogs being cared for in our home. We have had over twenty calls this morning from people who want to "get rid" of dogs and puppies. The heartbreak is never ending, "

KCC has also reneged on their promise to lease another site for this great work to continue. Public officialdom takes no account of the love of the public for our vulnerable animals.

MAYNOOTH LABOUR PARTY NOTES

£1.3 MILLION MEADOWBROOK LINK ROAD GETS GO - AHEAD

Cllr. John Mc Ginley has expressed his satisfaction that Leixlip Area Committee agreed on June 2nd to give the go-ahead for the provision of the Meadowbrook link Road.

The full cost of the Link Roads put at £1.3 Million of which £720,000 is comprised of the land purchase cost with the remaining relating to actual construction of the Link Road provision of Boundary walls, traffic calming measures and culverting certain sections of Meadowbrook Stream. Finance for the project is made up of Development Levies (future and current) and a grant of £160,000 from the Department of the Environment.

Included in the proposals are a number of Traffic Calming measures which Cllr John Mc Ginley sought on behalf of Residents in Meadowbrook, Brookfield and Beaufield. These are as follows.

The large open green areas bordering the Meadowbrook Road will be made safe for children by the provision of a 1 metre wall with railings on top.

Pedestrian openings from Meadowbrook Estate onto the Meadowbrook Road will be made safer by the provision of railings and anti-speed bumps. This will also allow for safe crossing of the Road and one of these anti-speed bumps will be near the junction of Beaufield Road and Meadowbrook Road.

Children at Play signs will be provided along th Meadowbrook Road.

A wall will be built to close off Meadowbrook Court and Meadowbrook Avenue from any access on to the Link Road itself. This wall will link up with the existing back garden walls and with the culverting of the Stream at these points will create two new safe green areas for children to play.

The Beaufield Road will be closed off at the Rathcoffey Road side once the Link Road is completed.

Cul-de-Sac signs will be erected at the Meadowbrook Court end of the estate.

Cllr Mc Ginley is firmly of the view that the safety measures which he has succeeded in achieving have gone a long way towards meeting the concerns of residents in the area.

Other measures which have now been incorporated in the plans include the provision of a 2-4 metre wall along the boundary between Kingsbry and the Link Road and at Cllr. Mc Ginley's request the green triangle near the Straffan Road exit will be landscaped with maintenance free shrubs and mature trees. The Council have also agreed to plant shrubs along the back garden walls of residents in Meadowbrook Court and Avenue which at present back onto the route of the Link Road.

At the meeting residents from Meadowbrook Residents Association made a submission calling for the Link to run parallel with the Motorway in front of Brookfield and to link up with the Rathcoffey Road rather than the route now adopted. The main concern of the residents was safety and this has been largely addressed. However Cllr. John Mc Ginley would like residents in the area to know that there were other considerations which rendered this proposal impractical. They were as follow:

The Cost of the alternative proposal was put at £2.54 Million. It would not be possible to run the Road parallel to the Motorway all the way up to the Straffan Road. Instead the road would have to go through the middle of Dunnes Lands and exit onto the Straffan Road at the existing point propose.

This would not be agreed to by Mr. Dunne for obvious reasons and we would be back to square one with a C. P. O. process with a resultant further delay of 2 years.

The Bond Bridge project would be deferred for a considerable time. The New Bridge links directly into the Meadowbrook Distributor Road. If the chosen route was changed then the New Bridge would have to be redesigned to get it to face the Rathcoffey Road. This would mean a curved bridge again and a further delay to 2 to 3 years.

All in all the counter proposal would have set us back several years with major hurdles to overcome and the serious likelihood of a C. P. O. failure given that the chosen route is planned since the mid eighties.

The final matter which Cllr. Mc Ginley now wants to see resolved is the culverting fully of the Meadowbrook Stream within residential areas. Under the Meadowbrook Link and the Bond Bridge project certain sections will be piped. For the safety of children in the area Cllr. Mc Ginley and Deputy Stagg have now tabled the following motion for consideration by the Co. Council.

'That Kildare County Council take out a loan to enable the culverting of the Meadowbrook Stream within the development boundary of Maynooth, to be repaid from future development levies in the area.

In conclusion Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the provision of the Meadowbrook Link was good news for the residents of the area and Maynooth in general.

BOND BRIDGE PART X APPROVED

Cllr. John Mc Ginley's campaign for the new Bond Bridge is now nearly complete with the decision by the Leixlip Area Committee to approve the Design for the new bridge following the public display period.

The decision will now go before the full Council for final approval and the Council will then be in a position to invite tenders for the project. A contractor should be appointed in July / August and should be on site by September.

Cllr. Mc Ginley made a number of proposals in relation to the Draft Design which have now been accepted in the Final Design now approved. These include the finishing of all walls bounding the New Bridge in stone and the eastern face of the existing bridge will be retained if possible.

Cllr. Mc Ginley also requested the Council to provide a vehicular entrance to the Train Station off the New Bridge. This was agreed to unanimously by the Councillors but the engineers are recommending against this on safety grounds. In conclusion Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the Bond Bridge project will clear its final hurdle at the next full County Council meeting and he again thanked the members of the Bond Bridge Action Group for their assistance in the campaign since February 1996 following their formation at a meeting called by then Minister of State Emmet Stagg.

TRAFFIC CALMING FOR PARKLANDS MAIN ROAD.

At the Leixlip Area Committee meeting held on June 2nd Cllr. John Mc Ginley allocated his Traffic Calming funding to the provision of safety measures along the long straight Parklands Main Road, in Maynooth.

£15,000 has been provided by Cllr. Mc Ginley and the statutory requirements for a Part X will be completed by September and work will be carried out in October. The work will involve the narrowing of the road at a number of points.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that he was pleased to be in a position to assist the residents in Parklands to make the area safer for pedestrians and in particular children.

Mc GINLEY SEEKS WIDENING OF EXIT FROM GLENROYAL

Cllr. John Mc Ginley's motion that the exit from the Glenroyal Shopping Centre and Hotel Complex onto the Straffan Road, Maynooth, be widened was discussed at the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting held on June 2nd.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that the exit at present was too narrow allowing just one line of traffic to get onto the Straffan Road. Vehicles turning right towards the Square invariably caused major delays for traffic wishing to turn left up the Straffan Road. The design as it stands was poor and this caused regular back ups of traffic trying to exit the centre.

Cllr. Mc Ginley stated that there was adequate room to widen the exit and this matter will now be investigated by the Roads Design Section of the Council. Cllr. Mc Ginley was also informed during the discussion that the Glenroyal Hotel had sought the provision of traffic lights at the exit point.


CUMANN WEBSITE

PARKLANDS

Following the launch of the Website and the above Meetings, the Minister and Paul Kelly met with members of the local community during visits to the local hostelry Bradys and the Elite Bakery where they received a warm welcome. We then proceeded to Parklands estate where the Minister and Paul along with Cumann members visited each and every home, the primary purpose being to maintain good lines of communication between the residents and their local and national Fianna Fail representatives. As a result Paul and Charlie are corresponding with the residents who raised particular issues.

LYREEN PARK/PEBBLE HILL

Later in April, the Cumann members also had a walkabout in both Lyreen Park and Pebble Hill Estates. Again Paul Kelly has since written to the residents of both areas advising them of his response to their queries raised on this occasion. 




