EDITORIAL

It is almost ten years since the original plans to develop Carton were the subject of debate in Maynooth. That original project fell through but the Starwood Group, a multinational resort company, has taken up the reins and is about to start work on the two golf courses and 5 star hotel. The planning permission also allows for the building of 150 luxury houses on the estate. Back in 1990, those in Maynooth who favoured the Gleneagles Group plans to build a luxury hotel, golf courses and country lodges in Carton argued that the valuable jobs that the development would bring to the area, together with public access to Carton were good reasons for supporting the plan. Circumstances have changed guite a bit since the early 1990's. Unemployment around Maynooth is no longer the problem it was back in 1990. Indeed Intel and Hewlett-Packard have problems trying to recruit staff. It may be that many of the staff who will end up working in Carton will not come from the Maynooth area, or even from Ireland. The issue of access for the local community to this luxury facility on its doorstep remains. In discussions eight or nine years ago between the Community Council and those involved in the Carton development it was agreed, at least verbally, that local residents would have free access to the estate and that some concessions might be negotiated regarding golf club and other types of membership. Press reports in the last couple of weeks suggest that development work at Carton is immanent. It is time that the Community Council re-opened discussions with Carton's developers and clarifies Maynooth's relationship with the newly developed Carton.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

I have a Medical Card. Does this mean that I am entitled to free dental services?

Answer

t4Recent changes in the Medical Card Scheme have extended dental treatment to all Medical Card holders aged 16 and over from the 1st January, 2000. Previously Medical Card holders aged 35-64 were only entitled to restricted emergency cover.

From 1st January, 2000 all Medical Card holders over the age of 16 including 35-64 years olds can access the full range of dental services, ie routine treatment, emergency treatment and dentures. People eligible for treatment may go to a private dentist who has a contract with the Health Board. A list of participating dentists may be obtained from the local Health Board.

TCurrently national school pupils are entitled to free dental services up to their fourteenth birthday. It is planned to extend the school dental scheme up to 16 year olds later this year.

Parents of Pupils who attend Scoil Dara Kilcock



Kildare Win Leinster Title After Three Replays

No. This is not a prediction as to how Kildare will fare in this years Leinster Championship. It's the story of the 1903 Championship which Kildare eventually won in June 1905. And where is this kind of information available? Well, like everything else, you can now read about it on the Internet.

For many years the GAA was regarded as being a somewhat backward organisation. It is hard to believe that 30 years ago 'the ban' was in force which meant that any GAA member playing, or even attending, a 'foreign game' could be expelled from the association. Since then things have changed dramatically and the GAA is now a far-sighted organisation as evidenced by their ambitious plans to redevelop Croke Park into the biggest and most modern sports stadium in the country. In keeping with the times the GAA has also embraced the Internet and their website at www.gaa.ie is full of the latest news and comprehensive information. All the latest team news is updated on a daily basis and the site also has a full listing of upcoming football and hurling fixtures. There is also an excellent tour of the GAA museum at Croke Park and an update on how the redevelopment of Croke Park is going on.

Of more local interest, the GAA website has links to club results and fixtures and links to GAA county sites. Among the best county sites are those for Meath at meath.gaa.ie and for Kerry at kerry gaa ie. At this stage it doesn't appear that the Kildare Co. Board have organised a site although some clubs - including Sarsfields at www.iol.ie/~nubridge/sarsfiel.htm

and Naas at members.tripod.co.uk/Naas_GAA/ are on the Web.

A very comprehensive database of GAA information is available at

www.gaalore.com

with player profiles of most current inter-county football and hurling players. Did you know that Declan Kerrigan made his championship debut for Kildare on May 24th 1987 against Wexford and that he has scored 4-20 in 28 championship appearances?

But back to the 1903 Leinster Championship where the details are available at www.gaalore.com. For a start Kildare appear to have played their first game in the 1903 championship on September 18th 1904 when they beat Dublin by 3-11 to 1-3. Five weeks later Kildare beat Laois in the semi-final on the scoreline Kildare 4-5 Laois 0-1. Then, on December 11th at Wexford, Kildare and Kilkenny drew in the Leinster Final on the scoreline Kildare 1-2 to Kilkenny's 0-5. The first replay took place, again at Wexford, on February 26th, 1905 when Kildare won by 1-6 to 1-5. Kilkenny challenged the result and claimed that the referee had disallowed a point they had scored. The authorities ruled that a further replay should take place - there's no suggestion that video evidence was used ! - and this game was played at Wexford on April 18th, 1905 when the teams drew again. 0-5 each. Finally, Kildare became Leinster champions for 1903 on June 4th, 1905 when they beat Kilkenny 0-9 to 0-1 at Croke Park. The campaign had taken 10 months and the championship finished two years behind schedule!

Community Council Elections

Elections for the Community Council take place at the end of March 2000. There are 73 seats to be filled with a nominee from the Student's Union. Co-options may take place after the first meeting.


All nominations should include the signature of the nominee signifying her/his acceptance of the nomination. All nominations to arrive at the Community Council Office by Monday, 27th March at 5.00 p.m. Any resident over 18 is eligible for election and to vote.

Voting

If elections are required, voting papers will be distributed to all eligible households between Wednesday 29th and Friday 30th March. Votes will be collected the following week, if they are not collected they may be brought to the Community Council office. All votes must be returned by Friday 7th April, They will be counted on Saturday 8th April.

Counting will be done by neutral volunteers under the supervision of outside scrutineers. For single area election areas, the single transferable vote method of counting will be used (as in by-elections to Dáil Éireann). For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are seats available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected, as appropriate.

The first meeting of the new Council will take place on Monday 17th April. This will be an AGM including the election of new officers for the Council. Notices will be sent to all councillors.





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

I also take this opportunity to thank management, staff and customers of the "Roost" who raised £1,250 on our behalf. Your generosity is much appreciated.





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
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JOSEPH AND THE AMAZING **TECHNICOLOUR DREAMCOAT**

We would like to thank everyone who supported our show and we look forward to next years production.












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ST. PATRICKS DAY.

Wearing the green shamrock, rosettes, badges, drowning the shamrock, parades, the image of celebrating the National feastday.

The day Patrick turned the sod, i.e. the first day of spring.

Gardeners traditionally planted their first early potatoes, weather permitting, it was not unusual to have snowfalls on the feast day, indeed our parade was cancelled once in the late 70s because of snow.

Traditionally the band paraded after 11.30am mass and afterwards people went to Croke Park to watch the Railway Cup football and hurling finals, or to Baldoyle races for the opening of the flat season. Others regularly visited the Hills of Tara and Slane and for some unknown reason Allen?

In the war years there were military parades composed of the Band, L.D.F and L.S.F and a detachment from the army.

On the cessation of hostilities, the parade resorted to the band again.

The instigation of Dublin's Industrial Parade drew many spectators from Maynooth, until some enterprising locals inaugurated our own parade, which in a few years grew into the largest outside of Dublin, and is still growing attracting entries from the hinterland and further afield. Indeed our parade was the vanguard for which other local towns and villages followed in latter years.

One event of our celebration sadly missed, the annual Ceili and Old Time dances, on St. Patricks night, which ceased when the Nolan family sold their hall in the mid 1950s.



A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS

William Farrelly, a young Maynooth man, at the tender age of eighteen, has already achieved what most young boys/girls can only dream of.

To date William has received four caps representing his country playing soccer at various levels. A son to Liam and Christina, he was born on the 24th October 1981 and is living at 856 Greenfield along with his sister Tanya and brother Paul.

As in many cases, William's first introduction to the game was participating in the general melee of pursuing a very elusive round plastic object up and down his estate. His father "smoker" one of the best centre forwards Maynooth has ever produced, recognised, from an early stage, William's flair and enthusiasm for the sport and became very involved and supportive of him.

William joined Rangers F.C. in the E.B.S. South Dublin schoolboy's league under seven section. Here he remained for seven seasons, playing centre forward for the team enjoying moderate success, as when Rangers won the under tens League and cup.

William then signed up with Belvedere F.C. again assuming the centre forward role in the team. This move proved to be a great success. In his first year with Belvedere, he had a trial with Crew Alexandria when he was just fifteen years of age.

A further testament to his ability and talent was proven when Belvedere was beaten in the all Ireland under seventeen cup final but, nontheless, William was chosen as "MAN OF THE MATCH". It is a rare ocassion for a player of a defeated team to receive this honour.

His other achievements during this period were playing for Dublin and Leinster schoolboys in inter provincial competitions.

During this period also, William's prowess in front of goal did not go unnoticed and he was offered further trials with English clubs under age teams. Recounting his experience and impressions of these trials William recalls how, when trying out in England, with Crew Alexandria for one week, he felt homesick, missing his family and friends.

While on trial with Sunderland, he toured with them in France at under sixteen level and played in three games. He was brought on in the first two and scored the winning goals and was chosen to start for the third game. Again playing under seventeen he played for Wimbledon against Everton.

William also had trials with Millwall during this period but he was disapointed with his time there as he felt their programme for trials was inadaguate.

However, his trial with Coventry proved more rewarding and during the summer of "99 he played for the club in an under nineteens tournament.

In February of "99, while studying after school in Maynooth Post Primary, William's father arrived to tell him that he had been chosen for the Irish schools under eighteen squad, and would have to leave immediately. After frantic preparations they met up with the rest of the squad in Dublin Airport, and from there he departed to take part in the first fixture of the Celtic cup, a tournament comprised of teams from England.

Northern Ireland, Wales and of course Ireland,

The first match was against the "Old enemy" England, at Portman road (Ipswich Town), and William can still recall the emotion he felt coming out of the tunnel onto the pitch in front of a crowd of over three thousand spectators and how proud he felt when he stood to attention with the rest of the Irish squad for the playing of our national anthem. It was in this match that William obtained his first cap, brought on with ten minutes to go, assisting Ireland in its two nil victory.

The next game saw Ireland travelling north to Dungannon where William secured his second cap by coming on in the last twenty minutes and scoring the winner, leaving the final score, Northern Ireland one, Ireland two.

Playing at home against Wales, at Waterford R.S.C. grounds, William was selected to play from the start. Earning his third cap, he found the back of the net once again, with Ireland victorious, by four goals to nil and winning the Celtic cup in the process.

In January of this year, he was selected by Brian Kerr to play against a Northern Ireland under eighteen selection in a friendly in Newry. Introduced to the game in the second half. William gained his fourth cap.

On reading the above account of William's sporting achievements one could be forgiven for thinking that there was not enought spare time left for anything else. Not so!

William has been playing Gaelic football with Maynooth since he was nine years of age. Here again he has showed his commitment and involvement to his sport. As recently as last year, William was playing at wing forward position when Maynooth beat St. Kevins in the Kildare Intermediate Championship final in Newbridge. In being both

a committed Gaelic and soccer player, William is following in a family tradition.

At the moment, William's is serving his apprenticeship as a brick layer under the guidance of "BERSO'S" skilful and experienced eyes, and though quite coy about his future plans, he did confess his ambition to play with one of the Dublin teams in the national league and who knows thereafter.

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
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
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TRACING YOUR ANCESTORS

As we know St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in many areas around the world and it may be the event that gets people to consider gathering information about their Irish ancestors. There are also a growing number of people in Ireland who are putting together their family trees.

Most visitors to this country don't leave enought time to trace their ancestors. Having spent a very short time on a work exchange programme in the Geneaology Office in Kildare Street, I found that visitors usually left their ancestor tracing until the last two days of their holiday.

In order to gain any headway in the search for ones ancestors it is necessary to try and have certain basic information - names, place of birth (townland, parish or county), idea of dates and religion. The Geneaology Office as part of the National Library offer a searching service for a fee. They can be contacted on the Internet at www.heanet.ie/ natlib/family research, html. For Americans it is especially easy for them to get a lot of information before they come to Ireland through Family Search: Internet Genealogy Service. This is a resource compiled by the Church of the Latter Day Saints in Utah for tracing ones ancestors. Their website is http://www.familysearch.org/.

For those who have more time on their hands and who may not have connection to the web, tracing your Irish Ancestors by John Grenham (Gill and Macmillan, 1992) is an excellent quide for the visitor and Irish person alike. It gives information on and where major sources are available e.g. civil records, wills, emigration records, registry of deeds, newspapers and directories. It also has sections on occupations, a county source list and research services to mention some

We have all heard at some stage of the relative who emigrated to America and who lost contact with the family. not an uncommon situation. The website Ancestry, com (which charges a small quarterly or annual fee) provides access to a large number of American searchable databases such as social security death index, vital, church, military, census records, court, land and probate records, immigration and naturalisation records, directories, shipping lists, periodicals and newspapers. It also provides a notice board facility where one can post messages and receive answers about relative(s). A newsletter will be sent via your e-mail on a regular basis, but it is the databases that are the strength of this website. Well worth using even for a guarter session. 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

FINE GAEL NOTES

Meadowbrook Link

The Leixlip Area Committee, at its recent meeting on February 4th last, viewed the proposed alignment of the new Meadowbrook Road link.

The road will be 7.3 meters wide with a cycle lane and footpath. Residents of Kingsbry, whose property bounds the proposed road link will be pleased that the Council has agreed to include a two metre high wall along the line of the road as a security measure. A map outlining the proposed alignment will be on public display during the coming week, said Cllr. Griffin.

Cllr. Senan Griffin welcomed the Council's decision to accept his proposal for the erection of a proposed wall, which he said, was a matter of grave concern for the residents adjacent to the proposed Meadowbrook link: Kingsbry, Meadowbrook and the estates of Rathcoffey Road. Work is expected to commence about September 2000.

Doctor's Lane

Cllr. Senan Griffin, said that the closure of Doctor's Lane was discussed at the recent Leixlip Area Meeting, where a further report highlighted the difficulties in placing traffic calming measures along the Lane.

The engineer in charge made suggestions for the continuation of the Main Street footpath along the Dublin Road, so as to prevent traffic entering the Lane from the Dublin Road end, but he accepted that this solution could have complications for three or four houses on the Dunboyne Road. A detailed plan for the area is to be prepared and Cllr. Senan Griffin insisted that this plan should include in its design, proposals for the elimination of surface water in this area.

Provision of Wall at Moyglare Village

The provision of a front boundary wall at Moyglare Village was discussed at length at the recent Leixlip Area Committee, when Councillors were informed that the cost would be in the region of £35,000.

The cost factor came as a surprise to the Area Councillors and it was agreed that all applications for grants will be discussed at the Discretionary Grant meeting in early March.

Traffic Calming Measures

The County Manager has agreed, said Cllr. Senan Griffin, to provide adequate funds to pay for the construction of a pilot traffic calming measure scheme at River Forest, Leixlip.

Kildare County Council engineers have prepared a design which, if successful, will be used throughout the County. Monies to provide such measures will be made available in the Estimates and it is hoped to construct as many traffic calming schemes as possible.

Toll Bridge - Liffey Bridge, Leixlip

The Department of the Environment, following a motion from Cllr. Senan Griffin, has agreed to provide a sum of £20,000 to carry out a survey on the condition of the toll bridge at Leixlip.

Flooding in Dun Carrig, Leixlip

Kildare County Council engineers, in response to a motion from Cllr. Senan Griffin, have provided a costing of £100,000 to correct the problem of flooding at Dun Carrig Estate, Leixlip.

Cllr. Griffin, in refusing to accept the costing, stated that he

could visualise how the Council could be held responsible if the flooding continues to occur at a number of houses in the estate.

Flooding is caused during periods of heavy rainfall, cascading from the Captain's Hill, down the retaining wall into the rear of a number of houses in Dun Carrig.

Cllr. Senan Griffin has expressed the view that the situation is totally unacceptable to the residents concerned and should be corrected by laying a surface water pipe along Captain's Hill.

Main Street, Maynooth and Main Street, Leixlip

The County Secretary, Mr. Tommy Skehan, has informed Cllr. Senan Griffin that a snag list has been prepared for the Main Streets of Maynooth and Leixlip and that this list has been handed to the contractors. The quality of some of the finished work leaves a lot to be desired said Cllr. Griffin and requested that urgent correction is required before further deterioration takes place.

Street names from the Map of Historical Towns 1750 should be used when street nameplates are being erected in the towns, said Cllr. Senan Griffin.

Sports and Recreational Facilities for 2000

Capital Expenditure has been increased by 475% from £8.5m in 1997 to £49m in the Estimates for 2000. Deputy Bernard Durkan was told in a recent reply from the Minister for Tourism, Sport and Recreation in response to his continued representations for additional facilities at both local and national level.

- The breakdown is as follows:
- Sports Capital Programme from the National Lottery 15.2m
- Swimming Pools £15m
- 50 metre Swimming Pool almost £6m.
- Croke Park ; final £6m of £20m support.

Applications are open to local community based projects, national and regional projects. Latest date for receipt of applications is 5.00 p.m on February 11th 2000.

Location of sporting facilities at national and regional level, is done on a consultative basis with national organisations and with the Irish Sports Council.

Ireland's Water Quality

Water. Water everywhere and still the Minister of the Environment does not believe that the EU is taking Ireland to court on the poor quality of its water.

Deputy Bernard Durkan has made numerous representations to the Minister for the Environment regarding this issue but the Minister's only defence is to refer to the report on Water Quality in Ireland 1995-1997 for further information.

The report clearly identifies localised problems due, for example, to bacteriological contamination and elevated nitrate values. Local Authorities, Deputy Durkan was told have overall responsibility for their own areas and the E.P.A. is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of information databases.

Housing Needs

46,000 houses, both public and private were completed in 1999. The National Development Plan provides the

framework to facilitate the provision of 500,000 houses over the next ten years. £7bn investment for social and affordable housing will ensure that the social housing needs of over 90,000 households will be met with Government assistance over the period of the Plan (10 years?).

Deputy Bernard Durkan in commenting on the Minister's reply said that if this plan is as effective over the next ten years as in the past year, it will take twenty years to stabilise the shortage of houses and another twenty to meet the housing needs - this is totally unacceptable to the many people on housing lists throughout the country and who are now urgently in need of a home, he said.

Did you know ...

That according to the 1991 Census, there were 81,424 private rented dwellings in 1991 compared with 90,315 ten years earlier. These represent 8% and 10% respectively of the total number of households.

The 1997 Labour Force Survey indicated that there were 131,600 private rented dwellings representing 11% of the total. Corresponding information has been collected in the Quarterly National Household Survey in quarter three of 1998 and 1999, which the CSO hopes to be in a position to publish shortly.

"I am totally astounded by this reply", said Deputy Durkan. "It is clear to me that apart from the Minister and his Department not being able to resolve the housing crisis, they don't seem to think it worthwhile to offer a comprehensive and informative reply to serious questions" he said.

Widespread Flooding

The Planning and Development Bill 1999, will allow local authorities to make it an objective of development plans to regulate, restrict and control development in areas at risk of flooding (whether inland or coastal), the Minister recently informed Deputy Bernard Durkan following his continued representations regarding areas of the country constantly under flooding during 1999.

Maynooth Castle

Commencement on the site at Maynooth Castle is scheduled to begin in February 2000 with a view to completion by year end, Deputy Bernard Durkan has recently been informed by the Minister.

The first stage is a stand-alone scheme, which involved the development of the ground floor vaulted areas for exhibition purposes together with access to the first floor and provision of small-scale guide and visitor facilities.

Estimates cost of Phase I has risen to $\pounds1.3m$ based on tenders received. $\pounds110,000$ was spend at end of 1999 and the total expenditure in the current year is expected to reach $\pounds1.1$ million.

Deputy Bernard Durkan in welcoming the commencement of works at the Castle, said it was imperative that both phases be completed and urged the Minister to ensure that the necessary funding would be made available.

Donadea Castle

Donadea Castle is not in State ownership and Duchas, the Heritage Service has no plans for its restoration.

The Castle is a recorded National Monument and therefore is afforded legal protection under the National Monument

(amendment) Act, 1994. Under Section 12(3) of this Act, the owner or occupier must give two months written notice of any proposals to carry out works at the site.

Deputy Durkan in commenting on the Minister's reply said he was disappointed that such an amenity could not be developed and the Castle restored to its former glory. It would benefit the local area and surrounding environs and would attract many tourists to that area of Kildare.

Council Secures An Additional £360,000 for Maynooth Main Street Improvement Works

Council officials advised Councillors at Leixlip Area Meeting on 4th February that the Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) had agreed to give a further £360,000 for Maynooth Main Street Improvement works. When this is added to the Special Development Levies on Kavanaghs Mills (£225,000) and the Maynooth Shopping Centre (£68,000) there should be enough money to complete the improvement works on Mill Street/Kilcock Road and Carton Avenue entrance/Dublin Road.

A plan will now be drawn up for this work for the approval of the Area Committee. In line with Cllr. John McGinley's motion, signage for all streets and back lanes will be part of this plan and it is hoped to have proposals for the next area meeting.

Parson Street

Cllr. John McGinley asked the engineers at the Area Meeting to implement the agreed traffic calming measures for Parson Street without any further delay. This was agreed and as the County Manager was present it should happen. Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration of the Area Meeting:

"that the damaged wall in Parson Street be rebuilt without any further delay"

Iarnrod Eireann Planning Application in Silken Vale:

Cllr. John McGinley has objected to this Planning Application for "Access Maintenance gate" by larnrod Eireann, from Silken Vale (adjacent to No.27). There is no need for such a gate and larnrod Eireann should be told to use their own property to gain access.

Cllr. McGinley has asked that this Planning Application be included on the Agenda for the Area Meeting on 3rd March.

Meadowbrook Link With Straffan Road on Public Display:

Plans for the Meadowbrook Link with the Straffan road went on Public Display in Maynooth Library on 11 February. They will be on display until 10 March and the public have until 24 March to make submissions to the County Secretary. Clir. John McGinley has already asked that his proposals for piping the stream at Meadowbrook, joining up the back garden walls and creating two new green areas be included and this has been agreed by the Design Engineer. Cllr. McGinley has also asked that the green area triangle, between the new road and Kingsbry (at the Straffan Road) be hard core and dome shaped. instead of landscaping. The plan includes for a 2m wall to be built adjacent to the Kingsbry hedge. Cllr. McGinley would appreciate if residents sent him copies of any submissions that they are making to the council and if they want any clarifications please ring him at 6285293H or 7026536W.

Bond Bridge Plans Goes on Public Display

The Plans for Bond Bridge went on Public Display in

Maynooth Library on 9 February. They will be on display until 8 March and the public have until 22 March to make submissions to the County Secretary. The objections already made by Cllr. McGinley will be taken into account i.e. vehicular access to the station, stone finish on walls, pedestrian entrance to the College.

Parking of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) in Housing Estates

As a follow on from Deputy Emmet Stagg's successful initiative in Celbridge Cllr. John McGinley has written to all Residents Associations in Maynooth asking them if they have a problem with HGV's parking in their Estates. The Council are now preparing a scheme to ban the parking of HGV's in a number of housing estates in Celbridge as a result of Deputy Stagg motion. When Residents Associations identify a problem with HGV's Cllr. McGinley will ask the Leixlip Area Committee to adopt a similar policy for Maynooth.

Rockfield/Parklands/Railpark Green Triangle

Following requests from Residents Cllr. McGinley has asked the Leixlip area Committee of the Council to agree to fund the installation of additional Public Lighting in this location. The improved lighting is required in the interests of public safety and to help discourage young people congregating in the area. Cllr. McGinley has asked for three double lights to be installed.

Area at Bottom of Kingsbry Adjoining Meadowbrook

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council agreed to remove the slabs from this area, to lay a 2m wide path and to landscape either side. The work has not been carried out so far because the Councillor cannot get a contractor to do it. The Celtic Tiger has them all too busy for such a small job. Cllr. McGinley has asked the Council to combine this job with other small jobs to make it more attractive for contractors. If their are any contractors willing to do such work please contact the Area Engineer, Elish Murray, at the council Office in Maynooth.

Traffic Route Public Lighting on Rathcoffey road:

Despite the fact that the E.S.B. submitted an estimate for this work ten weeks ago the Council have still not issued the E.S.B. with an order to do the work. These lights have been paid for by the residents of Parsons Hall and Castledawson through development levies on their houses.

The lives of people are being put at risk through the inaction of the Council. All it takes is a letter to the E.S.B. instructing them to proceed with the work. Cllr. McGinley has demanded that the Council do so immediately.

Doctors Lane

The Road Design Engineer advised the Area Committee there were two options to make Doctors Lane safer:

A. The construction of the works agreed in the Maynooth town Improvement Plan in 1996 with the omission of the bollards at the end of the lane. Emergency vehicles could

gain access by mounting the foothpath and other vehicles would be deterred from using the lane. The estimated cost is £25,000 to £30,000

B. The provision of ramps on the lane at a cost of £15,000.

Seeing that the money is now in place to complete town Improvement Works it is likely that Option A will be the one agreed.

£776,000 for Barberstown to Maynooth Road

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the recent announcement by the Department of the Environment of a further allocation of £776,000 for improvement works on the Barberstown to Maynooth Road.

A sum of £200,000 was provided in 1999 for works at Dowdstown and Windgates and the funding of £776,000 will allow for 1.4km of improvement works in 2000. The work to be undertaken this year will be the section from Windgates to Barberstown Cross.

Obelisk left high and dry

The Minister for Arts has advised Deputy Stagg that restoration works to the Obelisk will not start in 2000 and that the Department are concentrating on the restoration of Castletown House.

Deputy Stagg has indicated that this is not acceptable given the 8% increase in the Minister's Capital Budget in 2000. He further indicated that the restoration of the Obelisk should be treated as a stand alone project and not linked to Castletown House Restoration Works. Deputy Stagg will pursue the matter further with Minister de Valera.

One Stop Shop on Hold

In 1998 Minister Dempsey approved funding of £200,000 for the provision of a Council One Stop Shop in Maynooth. Since then nothing has happened.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised this matter with the Minister and he has advised that the Council are at present in negotiations in relation to the purchase of a site in Naas for a new Headquarters for the Council. The provision of one stop shop will be looked at following the completion of this process.

Deputy Stagg has indicated that the provision of the one stop shop in Maynooth will make the Council more accessible for residents of the area and that he would raise the issue with the Co. Manager.

Maynooth Castle Restoration

Deputy Enmet Stagg has been advised by the Minister for Arts that a contractor has been appointed for Phase 1 of the restoration works to Maynooth Castle and that work will commence in February.

Over £1 Million will be spent on the works which include the development of the ground floor vaulted areas for exhibition purposes together with access to the 1st Floor. Small scale guide and visitor facilities will also be provided.

Deputy Stagg will press the Minister to provide funding in 2001 for Phase 2 of the restoration works which include the provision of an auditorium and roof on the Castle Keep.

£20 Refuse Waiver Application Fee abolished

The attempt by the Kildare Co. Council Manager to impose a £20 Refuse Waiver application fee has been rescinded by Kildare Co. Council.

Deputy Emmet Stagg forced the abolition of the fee at the Council meeting held on Monday 14th February.

Pensioners and people on Social Welfare should now apply for their waiver.

Permanent Recognition granted for Maynooth Gaelscoil

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Minister for Education that he has granted permanent recognition to Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich, Maynooth.

The recognition is effective from 1st September 1999 and will have an immediate benefit of increasing the grant aid for rent to the Gaelscoil from 75% to 95%. The school at present pay £300 towards the rent of their premises and this will now reduce to £60 per month.

The principal benefit of the move from Temporary Recognition to Permanent Recognition is that the Department will now grant aid the site purchase and building of a new school for Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich.

Deputy Stagg congratulates the staff and parents of the Gaelscoil on the successful conclusion of this campaign and assured them of his support and that of Cllr. John McGinley's in their campaign to find a suitable site for a new school.

We have been joined in the last few years by Lucan, Ennis, Sligo, Galway and Castleknock. With the emergence of a pluralist and multicultural Ireland, Educate Together is set to expand as an integrated model of educational provision. This expansion will be greatly helped by the recent government decision to enhance financial support for the establishment of Educate Together schools. Finally, providing social opportunities for parents is an important part of the NKNSP philosophy. The school communications group held a number of well-attended social nights during the term.
