Old Maynooth Street Names to be Revived

Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum are preparing a submission to Kildare County Council which will see new street signage erected and some historic street names being revived. The group is proposing that the new street signs will incorporate old names that were in use in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and also a new town crest. Old names such as Lime Kiln Row (now called Cross Lane), Charter School Lane (now called Convent Lane) and Canal Place (now called Leinster Street) have been identified from old maps of the town and it is being suggested that these names be included in the new street signage. In the second half of the eighteenth century the centre of the town was rebuilt by the Duke of Leinster and later in the nineteenth century many new street names came into being such as Doctor's Lane. The full details of their proposal is outlined in this issue of the Newsletter and the group is keen to receive feedback from local residents. Suggestions should be addressed to The Secretary, Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum, c/o The Library, Main Street.

£100 Prize offered for Crest Design

EDITORAL

The new Community Council met for the first time in April. Reports elsewhere in the Newsletter outline the wide range of activities that the outgoing Council has been involved in over the previous year. In addition, the Council, in sponsoring a Community Employment Scheme, provides valuable training and work experience for fifteen local people hoping to reenter the workforce. On the debit side, however interest in the Community Council is at a fairly low level in the town with dozens of seats unfilled on the Council and whole areas of the town unrepresented. A number of the newer estates, whose residents might have most to gain from becoming involved in Community Council activies, have no members on the Counci while there is a marked absence of representatives from the older parts of Maynooth. The whole town centre area, for example, has no members on the Council. Some of this may be down to a growing apathy which seems to be a problem for all voluntary groups. And some of it may be down to a failure on the Council's part to adequately promote its own profile in the town. Perhaps improved communication between the Council and Maynooth's numerous Residents Associations would heip to stimulate a wider level of participation in the Council's affairs.

Over the years Maynooth Community Council has been involved in some very useful campaigns on issues of importance to the local community. Back in the 1980's the ROAR (Repair Our Awful Roads) campaign, the campaign for a new town square and, more recently, the campain for a new Bond Bridge have all had important support for the Council. Perhaps the time has come for the new Community Council to take on a more campaigning role. There is certainly no shortage of issues-traffic, parking, litter, facilities for our children and teenagers, better public transport, vandalism, promotion of the arts, recycling, town commission status.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

The Annual General Meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 17th April in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Chairman's Report

Tom McMullan thanked all who helped and supported him during his term as Chairman.

He paid special thanks to the Executive, Muireann, Dominic Nyland, Paul Croughan. He also thanked Norah McDermott and Freda Kellegher for all their help during his term. He outlined some events that took place during the last few years. He said he was disappointed that the Harbour Field and Geraldine Hall was not resolved. He said the ongoing commitment from the Sub-Committees was to be commended.

He thanked the Editorial Board and office staff for their work on the Newsletter. He congratulated the Task Force for their far-seeing plans for Maynooth. He also noted that Fás had plans to make big changes to the schemes in Maynooth and wished them well.

Tom ended by saying that he would not be contesting the Chair.

Secretary's Report

Murieann Ní Bhrolocháin thanked the Executive and Councillors for all their support during the year. She noted and thanked all the Sub-Committees for their on-going hard work. She said the St. Patrick's Day Parade had again been a great success. She thanked Paul Croughan for his work with the office and also with organising the office move. She also noted her disappointment that the Harbour Field had not advanced further. She also noted that the Harbour Field is the responsibility of the Trustees not the Community Council.

She said that there are forty-seven vacancies on the Council not filled. She had hoped that Residence Associations and other groups would have people co-opted.

The new seating on the Main Street was commented on. She paid tribute to Dominic Nyland who was stepping down as treasurer after thirteen years.

Treasurer's Report

Dominic Nyland proceeded with his report. He said that funds were at an all time low. Having to meet a short-fall for the rent of the office premises had taken a heavy toll on funds. He thanked all who had helped him through-out his time as treasurer. He said as he had already stated he would not be contesting the Treasurer's job, but would stay on as Councillor.

Street Names

Padraig O'Murchú stated that Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum are proposing to rename Maynooth streets with both new and old names.

Town Centre

He also stated that there is £8,500 available for street signage in Maynooth. it was stated that local residents are to be informed.

There is more information in the Newsletter with a list of street names. Senan Griffin asked could a new logo be designed for Maynooth. It would incorporate College, town, etc. A request to be made to the public for ideas for the new logo. It was proposed and agreed that £100 be made available for a prize for best design.

Harbour Field

John McGinley stated that Kildare Co-Council would take over the Harbour /Field and develop it, if trustees agreed. It was stated that it was now some time since there was a meeting. Peter Connell stated that Maynooth Action Strategy should get involved. It was seriously felt that the whole thing is taking too long and as there is funding available and it could be lost.

Summer Project - Community Games

Claire O'Rourke stated that the summer Project is going well and their fund raising is going well. It will run for two weeks again this year.

Marie Gleeson said Community Games is also going well. There is a report in the Newsletter.

Tidy Towns Report

Richard Farrell stated that Maynooth scored badly in Tidy Towns competition mainly due to litter.

The Sunday morning clean-up is on-going and the group could do with more people to help. it was stated that if each estate was told where it fell down improvements could be made.

Dorothy Dornan and Richard Farrell represent the community Council on Maynooth Action Strategy and will present a report at the next meeting.

Kavanagh's Mill

A letter was received from Mr. Michael McNulty regarding the planned complex at the Mill. The Community Council as a body are asked for their ideas about the project.

Damage to Net in Harbour Field

John Doogan stated that nets were damagedat their pitch and made useless. He said that it was adults that caused the damage.

Office

Paul Croughan said that four new workers had started in the office and there were now thirteen. It was stated that a Limited Company should be set up as soon as possible.


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WOMEN'S FORUM IN MAYNOOTH.

It has provided opportunities for women and bishops, and women and priests, to meet and discuss issues of mutual concern in the church and society. Many parishes have a forum. Each priest elects two representatives to represent the parish at Deanery level. And then, each Deanery elects one representative to represent the Deanery at the top Plenary level. It is at this level that the Archbishop, other Bishops and representatives of the Council of priest meet regularly the women discuss pertinent issues. (This also happens at Deanery level, on a yearly basis).

Here in the parish of Maynooth we have a Women's Forum. The A.G.M. was held on the 29th February, and the parish's representatives for the coming year are Noelle Topley and Lourdes Hendrick.

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
Brilliant is the only way to describe the presentation of the Girl's School of the Briar Rose, also known as The Sleeping Beauty.

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
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
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MAYNOOTH LABOUR NEWS

At the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on 24th March Councillors had £17,500 each to allocate for works in the Area. In Cllr. McGinleys view this is totally inadequate and if it is spread out over a number of projects it results in nothing meaningful being done. Cllr. McGinley allocated all of his funding to build a boundary wall between Moyglare Village and the Moyglare Road. This wall has been sought by residents for a long time and is an essential safety requirement.

Unfortunately, none of the other area Councillors allocated any of their £17,500 for the wall, even though they had agreed unanimously to do so at the January meeting. As it will cost at least £25,000 to build the wall there will be a shortfall. Cllr. McGinley is in discussions with the Residents Committee with a view to getting the shortfall from the Developer.

More obstacles were thrown in the way of progress at the Councils Area Meeting on 10th April when a planning official stated that planning permission would be required for the wall. Cllr. McGinley is arranging a meeting of the Senior Planner and the Residents Association Executive with a view to resolving all problems.

Traffic Calming:

When the Councils Estimates for the year were being decided last November Cllr. McGinley proposed that £200,000 be allocated for traffic calming measures county wide. This gave the Leixlip Area Committee a total of £57,000 for traffic calming.

Each Councillor therefore had £14,250 to allocate for traffic calming measures in the Area. In line with Residents Associations, Cllr. McGinley allocated his funding as follows: Parklands; Laurence Avenue and Old Greenfield. Unfortunately, Councillors were advised at the Area Meeting on 10th April that Laurence Avenue and Old Greenfield do not meet with the requirements of Government Guidelines for the installation of traffic calming. The Council engineer also stated that traffic calming for Parklands would cost the full allocation of a councillor i.e £14,250. Councillors agreed to address the matter further at the next meeting on 28th April

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have asked for Traffic Calming on Meadowbrook Road as part of the Meadowbrook Link Project and this will be considered along with the other submissions on the Project at the next Area Meeting of the

Street and Back Lane signs for Maynooth:

as a result of this extraordinary new information.

Cllr. McGinleys motion "That funding be made available for bilingual signs indicating the names of streets and back lanes in Maynooth in line with the wishes of Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum" was agreed at the January meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council. As a result, it was agreed to allocate £8,500 for the new signs at the Area meeting on 24th March.

Children's Playground:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration of Kildare County Council:

"That this Council works with local communities in order to provide childrens' playgounds in towns where there is a demand for such facilities."

Allocation of Discretionary Grants/Moyglare Village Wall: County Kildare has the unique distinction of being the only county in Ireland without a public childrens playground. It is outrageous that parents in Maynooth have to go as far as Lucan for such a facility. There was a playground at the Harbour Field up until the early '80's but this disintegrated through lack of maintenance and insurance difficulties. The insurance difficulties now seem to be overcome, at least in all other counties, and the Government is awash with money so construction and maintenance should not be a problem. The Harbour Field land is also community property and would be an ideal location for a modern childrens playground.

Banning Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV's) from Housing Estates:

Cllr. John McGinley wrote to all Maynooth Residents Associations asking them if they had a problem with HGV's and if residents wanted them banned from their estates. As a result of the responses Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for consideration by the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council:

"That heavy goods vehicles in excess of three tonnes unladen weight be banned from parking in public areas of the following housing estates in Maynooth: Moyglare Village. Meadowbrook, Meadowbrook Crescent, Greenfield Estate

Beaufield have since said that they wish to be included and if there are any other estates with this problem please contact Cllr. McGinley at 6285293 and you will be included in the scheme.

Pound Park:

In order to stop cars from driving into this park via the footpath between 18 Leinster Cottages and the adjacent house, Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to install three bollards to stop this from happening. The central bollard should be lockable in order to allow a grass cutting vehicle to enter.

Cllr. McGinley has also asked the Council to provide fencing between the Park and the river in the interests of safety.

Provision of a Public Parks Department in the County:

Residents can be assured that Cllr. McGinley has not given up on his campaign to have a Parks Department set up in the county. During the estimates debate at the end of last year Cllr. McGinley proposed that funds be allocated for this purpose. A Parks Department could maintain, among others, Pound Park, Carton Avenue, The Harbour Field and a Children's Playground. Unfortunately, his proposal was defeated by a majority of Councillors.

The good news now is that the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council have submitted the following motion for the consideration of the full Council.

"That the Council provides £250,000 in next year's estimates for the maintenance of public open spaces"

Hopefully the motion will be passed as its merits should now be obvious to most Councillors.

Maynooth Development Plan:

The County Manager has engaged consultants to assist with the preparation of the Maynooth Plan and others. The Area Committee will meet them on 28th April to discuss the plan. The County Manager has stated that he wants the plan agreed by the Area committee in time to go for approval to

the full Council at the end of May. This tight timeframe is unlikely to be met and it is more likely that the plan will go before the full Council at the end of June. It will then go on Public Display for three months in order to get comments from the people of Maynooth.

C I E Maintenance Access Gate at Silken Vale:

Unfortunately, Kildare County Council have granted Planning Permission for the gate. However, there is some comfort in that the permission is only for three years and it shall only be used to give access to the signalling relay station no more than five times a year.

Extension to Maynooth Post Primary School.

At present Maynooth Post Primary School has a capacity for 630 pupils whilst there are 712 pupils presently attending the school. Co Kildare V.E.C. requested last August approval for an extension to the school to cater for 900 pupils.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the delay in issuing approval with the Minister for Education recently. The Minister advised that his departments planning unit were still reviewing the future requirements of Maynooth Post Primary School.

Deputy Emmet Stagg is dissatisfied with this response. The school is at present overcrowded which is placing pressures on both staff and pupils alike. The Department seem to want to review this matter to death and he has indicated that he will continue to press the Minister on this matter.

Long Term Care Unit for Maynooth Granted Planning Permission.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Kildare Co Council on 10th April to grant planning permission to the Health Board to build a 50 bed long term term residential care unit for the elderly near the existing Health Centre in the Harbour.

The provision of these facilities will mean than elderly people in Maynooth who require long term care will no longer have to be hospitalised in St Vincents, Athy, or Peamount. This will mean that elderly people will be able to remain in their own community and it will lessen the hardship for relatives travelling long distances to visit people in Athy.

Deputy Stagg stated that he would press Health Board to commence construction as soon as the date for any appeals has elapsed.

Control of Refuse Bins for Restaurants / Take Away's.

Arising from concerns expressed by residents of the Lyreen District concerning the leaving out of refuse bins by Restaurants and Take Aways on the back lanes days in advance of the refuse collection day, Deputy Stagg has tabled the following motion for consideration by Kildare Co

That this council now introduce Bye - Laws under section 35 of the Waste Management Act 1996, to prevent takeaways, restaurants from leaving their refuse bins on public roads public foothpaths days in advance of the collection day.

Rail Safety on Maynooth Suburban Line.

The recent Rail Safety Work Review indicates that a number of 'Unreasonable Risks' identified in October 1998 on the Maynooth Suburban Line have still not been resolved by larnrod Eireann. The risks identified included the crossover

at Clonsilla which whilst work is in progress on installing a new crossover still represented a risk of derailment. This matter should have been corrected by March 1999.

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the report with Minister Mary O'Rourke in the Dail. The Minister indicated that she had made it clear to larnrod Eireann that she found it unacceptable that the original risks identified had not been fully resolved. She further advised that larnrod Eireann would now be drawing up an action plan setting specific target dates for resolving the risks.

Deputy Stagg has indicated that he will continue to apply pressure on Minister O'Rourke to ensure the safety of the travelling public.

RECYCLING FOR YEAR 2000

1,000 Plastic bags in 1999? Will it be 2000 in 2000? Count your bags this week.

1,000 is a very low average, most households will take many, many more. We may object to incinerators, landfills etc, but we must reduce the rubbish that needs disposal!

The government has done little or nothing to help us reduce or manage our waste, however we must begin to take responsibility for our own rubbish. This begins at home. These are some hints, all of which are carried out in our household. As a result, the bin only goes out once a month although we pay the full amount. That is a story for another day.

Divide the rubbish.

We have two small bins in the press under the sink, one for compost materials, the disposable refuse goes in the second one. Keep bottles and clothes for banks.

Shopping creates waste. Think before you shop.

- 1. Take long life shopping bags from the supermarkets that offer them.
- 2. Buy your own bags, take one during the day, take five or six bags for weekend shop. Refuse to take plastic bags.
- 3. Refuse plastic bags in clothing, hardware shops, many people have cars, simply carry your purchases to the car or bring your own bag.
- 4. Plan the shopping, buy unpacked food peppers, apples, oranges etc.
- 5. Do not buy meat in pre packed, plastic containers.
- 6. Buy glass containers instead of plastic.
- 7. Recycle the glass.
- 8. Reduce the amount of tins they cannot be recycled at present.
- 9. Reduce the amount of cleaners materials.

Reuse / Recycle

- 1. Use unavoidable packaging as waste containers (plastic bread bags, cornflakes, washing tablets, toilet paper packs etc) and put straight in the bin. Tie the bags and containers. Cardboard containers biodegrade.
- 2. Fill tins with rubbish, crush refuse as much as possible, this takes up less room.
- 3. Use all paper twice shopping lists etc.
- 4. Re use envelopes, Christmas cards, wrapping paper, if only within family.
- 5. Reuse clothes as cleaning cloths.

Compost.

Any small garden can have a compost heap, get a compost bin from KCC for £20.00. from the garden centre, use an old container, leave it in the corner of the garden and it will eventually produce brown, crumbly compost. This saves money on fertilizer.

What goes in.

- 1. Most perishable household rubbish can be composted and re used in the garden.
- 2. Food, peels, skins.
- 3. Tissues, kitchen paper, paper, cardboard.
- 4. Newspapers.
- 5. Garden rubbish (except for weeds and diseased plants).
- 6. Cigarette butts.
- 7. Fire ashes.

Feed the birds.

They will eat the following: Mouldy bread and crumbs Currants etc.

Old cereals (weetabix etc)
Old cake, biscuits, stuffing

Feed the animals

Use your cat / dog to recycle food.

Reuse water.

- 1. Tea / coffee on houseplants.
- 2. Washing up water on roses for greenfly / generally on the garden.
- 3. Get a rain barrel / container.

Clothes

- 1. In good condition give to charities like Vincent de Paul.
- 2. If not give to the Third World bins.
- 3. Scrap clothing reuse as cleaning clothes.


Patronise shops with paper bags - they biodegrade Old containers - plant new geraniums / bizzy lizzies etc.

Try burying a plastic bag in the garden - dig it up a year later. It is still perfect.

Old carpet - kills grass for new flowerbeds, keeps weeds down in spring in flowerbeds.

Do not pack rubbish in larger bags for the bin - more unnecessary plastic.

Refuse to take junk mail.


OLIVER

TRIP TO LEGAMADDY


On the 31st of March, Maynooth B.N.S. visited their paired school in Legmaddy, in Northern Ireland.

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WHAT'S IN A NAME

Are you living in Maynooth? Would you know where to find Back Lane or Double Lane or Cross Lane? What about Mill Street or Leinster Street. If you know all these answers, then how about Stable Lane or Chapel Lane or Lime Kiln Row? Where would you find Bridge Street or Canal Place? The former 5 names are all taken form the most recent O.S. map of Maynooth while the latter 5 names are former names for the aforementioned places. Placenames change with time and sometimes old names may be of greater historical significance than the current names. Maynooth Local History and Civic Forum along with Maynooth Action Strategy are presently working with Kildare County Council to erect street signage in Maynooth. We hope the result will help local people as well as visitors answer the questions posed above, and perhaps provoke an interest in the origin and layout of the streetscape in Maynooth. We are also looking for any information that you may have on the street names or alternative names to the ones we are proposing. Please send any information to the address indicated below by mid May and we will publish the definitive list in the next edition of the Newsletter.

The present layout of the centre of Maynooth owes much to the Fitzgeralds, who were earls of Kildare and dukes of Leinster. The Fitzgeralds resided in the Great Castle off Main Street and later Carton Demesne.

The centre of Maynooth is characterized by a wide tree lined straight Main Street. This forms the central axis for the different lanes that run parallel to the Main Street and lead off it at right angles. This layout was first conceived by James Fitzgerald, 20th earl of Kildare in the mid 18th century. Together with Peter Bere, estate manager at Carton, they sought to develop Maynooth as a model village in a rectilinear pattern that was the height of fashion at the time. Building along the Main Street, which at that time was called Leinster Street, began in the mid 1750's. By 1757 a row which still stands, of seven two-story, slate roofed houses fronting Main Street with walled gardens and stables to the rear has been erected on the North side of the Street adjacent to Carton Avenue. This was shortly followed by the building of 28 slate-roofed labourers' cottages that were laid out in 2 blocks to the North of the two storey houses. These cottages called Leinster cottages after the earl was promoted to Duke of Leinster still stand to-day. By 1773, the year of the Duke's death much of the village to the East of the Square had been developed. A new inn (site of Leinster Arms) was added in 1777. To the West lay the castle as well as two distilleries and several cabins in what was referred to as 'part of the old town'. Traffic from Dublin to the west passed along the Main Street, across a small bridge (still extant) over a tributary stream, the Joan Slade, and through the old castle gate before crossing the Lyreen and reaching the road to Kilcock.

This was all to change in the 1790's when a new bridge, Williams Bridge, was built to the east of the castle. This allowed long distance traffic to be diverted away from the castle and be turned out of the village over the new bridge and past the mill. A new north south axis was thus created and became known as Canal Place (now Leinster Street) to the south of Main Street and Bridge Street (now Mill Street) to the north. Stoyte House, further to the west was also built around this time. This subsequently became the nucleus for the Catholic seminary, St Patrick's College established in 1795. This development had the effect of closing and enhancing the vista at the western end of Main Street.

The 19th century saw continued growth in the power of the Catholic Church. The Presentation sisters established a convent and school for girls at the East End of the village on the site of the charter school. The building of a new parish church on the West Side allowed for the establishment of a boys' school in the old chapel (now Band Hall) in Chapel Lane (now Pound Street).

In the mid 19th century when the poor law and tenement valuations were being compiled, many of the lanes were given names associated with developers or prominent citizens occupying the sites. Thus on the north side Miss Kelly's lane (now Kelly's lane) was associated with Miss Martha Kelly site owner and Coate's lane with John Coates stonecutter. Coffey's lane on the south side was associated with Andrew Coffey site owner. The lanes parallel with the Main Street had also seen development and now assumed their present names of Back Lane and Pound Lane on the north side and Doctors Lane after Dr Edward O'Kelly on the south side.

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
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HANDBALL




