MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Festival

It was felt that a Festival Committee should be set up as soon as possible, to start work on next year's festival. Any person interested should leave their name in the office. It was also felt that any person with ideas and not a

Community Councillor would also be very welcome to join the committee.

Heineken showed a big interest in the festival this year, and would be delighted to sponsor the Festival again next year. Chairperson John Doogan again thanked the committee and office staff for getting this year's festival organized. He also thanked Heineken, though late in the day when approached, they showed great interest in the Festival.

Maynooth Development Plan

The meeting felt that the Development Plan for Maynooth was so important that the October meeting will be entirely devoted to discussing the Plan.

Senan Griffin stated that he was annoyed by the time of the Maynooth Alliance letter in the September Newsletter. He stated that Councillors were only doing the best they could for Maynooth and this Plan was right for Maynooth. Peter Connell pointed out that the Maynooth Alliance wanted questions answered as to how decisions were made to rezone land.

However the meeting felt that articles in the Newsletter re: Maynooth Alliance letter September issue should be under signed and people should be aware of who writes the letters. It was also pointed out that names are with the editor.

Objection to Intel expansion

It was noted that a letter from John Colgan Leixlip Town Commissioner, objecting to Intel expansion was received. The meeting understood the worry that people had about discharges from such big Factories. It was generally felt that such companies put a lot of money into keeping the atmosphere clean. The objection will be discussed at the next meeting.

Office

The office now has 14 staff. The office will be up-dated and is to set up new equipment. The new Web-site for Maynooth will be in the Community Council Office. The Newsletter was the main business of the office and it was hoped that more Newsletters would be sold. The shops in the town were thanked for selling the Newsletter. The scheme will be up for rewenal in November. Training in the office is ongoing and it was hoped that all office staff would take advantage of all training available.

College

John Hogan, Student Representative stated that the present library size was not suitable for the number of student's now attending the College. He said with new departments in the College, the facilities in the Library were inadequate. The meeting gave their support.

Local History Group

Padraig O Murchu stated that street names both English and Irish are ready.

However all awaited the new logo design for Maynooth. the competition closed at the end of July, and the new logo for Maynooth should soon be known. There was very good interest in the competition with a lot of submissions entered.

Rockfield Residents Association

Mary Fitzgerald thanked the Community Council for taking on board problems that the estate had, by writing to unions groups Kildare County Council, the Garda etc. on behalf of Rockfield Residents Association

Cluain Aoibhinn residents Association

Tom McMullon stated that the Residents of the Estate were annoved at the cutting down of trees in the estate. Tom stated that the trees were fine and that they had a tree surgeon look at them. He also stated that other trees that were broken were replaced with unsuitavle trees for estates. It was stated that the company that cut the trees were a reputable company that did that work. How ever it was hoped that the situation would work itself out.

Representation on Community Council

Again we would appeal to all residents Associations and all sporting bodies in the town to have a representative on the council. You will then have a stronger voice. Next meeting 9th October

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Many thanks for your detailed application form, concise map and information on Pound Park and the Carton walk. The map is excellent and helped considerably with the judging. The judges look forward to the implementation of the plan. The day of judging saw a great number of young people (presumably from the University) in the town. Cycle paths are to be commended and there was not a great deal of traffic which made judging that bit easier. The shop fronts have a good impact in the town and the residential estates are well laid out and are well landscaped. There seems to be good co-operation within the community - well done.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The historic aspect of Maynooth is a wonderful unique feature. The University status of the town puts it in an enviable position of attracting a young and vibrant population as well as the commuters and locals that have their roots in the town. The old churches and other historic buildings have a tremendous effect on the overall appearance of the town. A number of facades looked well in the main street and these included Katies Flowers, Mill Wine Shop, Hula-Bou, the Pottery Barn, the Post Office. Coonans and the Peppermill. The Parish Hall and St. Mary's were fine though there were weedy gutters in the carpark. Kairos Communications had some fine climbing roses on their walls. The Maynooth GAA Club was fine though the wall and gate painting will be required for next year. Laraghbryan Cemetery looked well cared for and again had some nice climbers on the wall which made good impact. Maynooth College is a very fine building. New buildings and entrances also looked well. Grassy areas still need cutting back. The Garda Station looked very well and it was noted that work was being undertaken on the Railway Station.

LANDSCAPING

The landscaping in and around Maynooth was excellent. The green area opposite the entrance to the college was well cared for. Planting at the turnaround on the Straffan road looked well: however, it would be better to have more permanent planting, as it will last throughout the year. In the centre of the town, the amenity area/monument was clean and tidy. There were three cottages in Old Greenfields that had made tremendous effort with their landscaped residences well done. The Pound Lane Park will enhance this part of the town considerably. At present all that could be seen was long grass and some scattered litter. Litterbins will be required in the area. Please ensure they are covered so that they are not effected by wind or birds.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

The canal amenity area is a wonderful amenity for the town. It can be accessed in two main places. The access off Parsons Lane looked well and there were several people walking the canal on the evening of adjudication. The main access to the harbour was fine though there was a scattering of litter. The adjudicator could not understand the barrier for parking or the notices not allowing anyone to park there despite there being a large carpark. Perhaps, this is only temporary. It was noted that the adjacent field was being cleared. Swans, ducks and yellow water lilies looked well in the canal here though there did seem to be an oily scum on part of the water surface. The stream area in Old Greenfield had been cut back and this is another area that could be considered as a wildlife site if planted and managed correctly. The plan for Carton Avenue incorporates a number of areas suitable for wildlife. Do ensure that you have the full co-operation from all involved before this development proceeds.

LITTER CONTROL

The litter control in the town was good. There was guite an amount of litter close to the harbour area. Litterbins were full on the main street and a programme of ensuring that they are emptied more frequently should be adopted. Litter was also spotted on Parsons Lane at the bridge and

close to the proposed development at Pound Street. The residential estates were well presented both with regards to litter control and the presentation of litter bins - Well done.

TIDINESS

The judges were most impressed with the care taken in the cutting of the vast amount of open spaces and grass particularly in the residential estates. The Movglare approach is very tidy and because of this, the odd weed in the gutter stood out. Other approach roads were generally untidy and marks can be gained by addressing this section. The centre of the village was tidy and clean though weedy gutters were a problem in places such as on the Leixlip approach.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS


The estates were generally well presented. Movglare Manor was well presented as was Movglare Meadows, Parsons Lodge and Park looked well and there was nice planting in Cluain Acibhainn and Woodlands. Castlebridge was fine though some beds were weedy. Greenfield estate was good though there were weedy bases to trees and no Litterbins evident. Old Greenfield presented some lovely cottages and there was great effort evident in some of the houses deep in the estate. Pebble Mill also looked well.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The approach from Moyglare was very pleasant as far out as Moyglare Stud with its distinctive litterbins. The Galway approach looked well though there was erratic verge cutting and additional cutting was required in places. Signage here was very dirty and required a cleanup. The new signs on the Parsons approach looked well though this approach was weedy in places and grass required cutting back. The Dublin approach was not good. Long grass both outside the Mart and Tescos gave an untidy impression. Tescos is being refurbished it was noted and perhaps this will contribute to the better appearance of this approach. The Dunboyne approach also needed attention with better verge cutting and tidying of the margins.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

Maynooth did look well on the evening of adjudication. Great effort had been made in the residential areas and landscaping. Prioritise the areas that will gain you additional marks in the future such as approach roads, and the continued awareness of litter prevention. Incorporate these into your development plan and you can look forward to progress over the coming years.







Maynooth to get new Street Signage

Maynooth is shortly to have new street signage erected in the town. The move follows a request from Maynooth History Group and Maynooth Action Strategy to the Local Area Council, Kildare County Council. Street names will be in English with Irish name translations. Some of the signs will have the former English street names included.

The need for street signage in Maynooth was highlighted earlier in the year with the publication by the Local History Group of the booklet "Exploring Maynooth, five self-guide historical walks." The booklet makes reference to street names, which may be known to local residents but in the absence of any street signage would not be known to visitors. It is hoped that the erection of street signage will further enhance Maynooth's tourist potential.

The Street Signage will incorporate the new town crest, which was approved by the Community Council on Monday night following a competition.



Exiting Glenroyal Centre to be made easier:

Cllr. John McGinley's motion "That the exit from the Glenroyal Centre to the Straffan Road be widened to give right and left turning exiting lanes" was agreed at the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting of the Council on 1 September. It was also agreed that there was no need for traffic lights here because of the pending closure of Doctors Lane and the installation of traffic lights at Parklands/Railway Station junctions.

Clir. McGinley has also asked that cycle lane and pedestrian lane crossings be clearly marked on the road across the exit so that motorists will have no doubt that pedestrians and cyclists have right of way.

Grants for Maynooth Soccer Club

Cllr. John McGinley proposed that £15,000 for recreational development be given to the Maynooth Soccer Club at the September Area Meeting of the Council. This will now go before the Full Council Meeting on 25th September for approval.

Improvement Works on Kildare Bridge, Maynooth Dunboyne Road:

Approval was given at the September Area Meeting to put the \pounds 1,178,000 improvement work proposals on public display. The proposals include the widening of the bridge and the construction of a roundabout at the junction with the Blacklion Road. In Cllr. McGinley's view these safety improvements are very badly needed and are long overdue.

Major Improvements for Maynooth Litter Management:

Cllr. John McGinleys motion "That litter bins be installed at all bus stops on the Straffan Road and Leixlip Road, Maynooth, as agreed last October and that these and all other bins be emptied on a daily basis. Furthermore, that new bins be installed between the railway and Manor Court and at the Harbour and that the necessary manpower be made available to the Area Engineer to have them emptied on a daily basis. "was agreed unanimously at the September Area Meeting. Cllr.McGinley asked that the passing of the motion be brought to the County Managers attention in order to ensure its implementation.

Inputs to Drawing up the Estimates for Year 2001

The County Finance Officer attended the September Area Meeting to get individual Councillors inputs to the Estimates. Cllr. McGinley asked that financial provision be made for the following:

1. The separation of the litter management function from the roads engineering function. The present arrangement does not work as the road engineering comes first with litter

management seen as an add on. This results in the streets not being swept or litter bins not being emptied if one person goes on holiday or is sick. This crazy situation must not be allowed to continue and bins must be emptied each day of the week. 2. The creation of a Parks Department to maintain public open

spaces, litter management and maintaining trees in town and in housing estates.

3. Significant financial contribution to grass cutting in estates by Residents'Associations.

Banning of Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV's) from Estates Agreed:

Clir. John McGinleys motion that HGV's be banned from Moyglare Village, Meadowbrook, Meadowbrook Crescent, Greenfield Estate, Parklands and Beaufield was unanimously agreed at the September Area Meeting. The signs will be erected towards the end of this year when resources become

available.

£25,000 for Laraghbryan Cemetry Maintenace Committee:

In supporting Cllr. Griffins motion for every assistance possible, Cllr. McGinley proposed at the September Area Meeting the allocation of £15,000 in 2001 and £10,000 in 2002 to assist the Laraghbryan Cemetery Committee. This recommendation will now go before the Estimates Meetings for approval.

Kingsbry Pedestrian Lights

Cllr. McGinleys motion" that a grid be installed around the lights at the pedestrian crossing" in order to stop them from being vandalised, was agreed at the September Area Meeting. This should cost significally less than the £6,000 estimated by Council Officals.

New Traffic Lights/Pedestrian Crossings at the Roost, Main Street, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinleys motion"That the traffic lights and pedestrian crossings agreed in the Maynooth Main Street Improvement Works for the bottom of the town be installed without any further delay" was agreed unanimously at the September Area Meeting.

Geraldine Hall and Harbour Field:

The delay in handing over these properties to the Council so they can be developed for Recreational, Social and Amenity use is very disappointing. Even though the Council agreed to the conditions laid down by the existing trustees last November the trustees have not yet released their hold on the Harbour Field. The County Secretary has agreed to write to the Trustees yet again in the interests of the community.

Blocking of Lanes by Uncaring Motorists:

Refuse has not been collected twice in the recent past from residents on Double Lane/Leinster Cottages because of illegal parking by motorists. Such disregard of the law has to be stamped out as it could easily have been the emergency services who would have been stopped from gaining access. Cllr McGinley has asked the Gardai to enforce the law and in order to assist them Cllr.McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council: "That double yellow lines be painted on one side of the Lanes

Environmental Improvement Works-Greenfields

Given the decision by Minister of State Molloy to refuse funding to Kildare County Council for the Environmental Improvement Works at Greenfields, Maynooth, Deputy Emmet Stagg has tabled a Motion at Kildare County Council seeking provision in the 2001 Estimates for this work to be funded from internal Council receipts. Four other areas in the County are also affected by this decision and Deputy Stagg is also seeking funding for these.


Footpath and Road improvements-Parson's Hall/ Castledawson

Among the issues touched on at the Meeting were the following:-

a) Bond Bridge, Rathcoffey road, the Meadowbrook link road and Joan said river work is due to begin on the above before December. Disruption should be kept to a minimum during works being carried out as it involves a new bridge being built alongside the existing bridge initially and therefore access will remain.

b) It is proposed that just under 145 acres of land will be zoned for residential use, ensuring demand for housing will be somewhat reached and also encompassing 20 per cent low income housing will be provided everywhere.

c) Approximately 60 acres of land will be set aside for Park/Public amenity spaces. Cllr Paul Kelly pointed out that this is the first time that land will be set aside for managed Parks in Maynooth which will come under the auspices of a Parks Committee to be set up by Kildare County Council. All houses around these parks will face onto the park areas for safety and security reasons.

d) Carton Avenue to be upgraded - in tandem with Maynooth Action Strategy. A 10 page plan was drawn up and presented to Minister McCreevy on June 15th when he visited Carton Avenue. This is an issue where the Cumann feels it can ensure that all efforts will be made to progress this venture. Minister Mc-Creevy was particularly impressed with the

Plan presented and felt its adoption would be a notable" community gain" The Cumann are now working actively with the Minister and Cllr Kelly and it is likely to be an important part of our prospective submissions to the Council re the Development Plan.

f) Approximately 20 acres of playing pitches are to be set aside for youth sport.

g) Maynooth Town Centre - The views and fabric of the Main Street and town centre are to be preserved. There will be a fixed height limitation around the town centre to be applied to apartments etc.

Again the above represents a very brief overview of the Development Plan. The Cumann recommends that all residents in Maynooth should visit the Library and examine the Plan and make representations they feel might be appropriate, beneficial or necessary to Kildare County Council directly or more particularly to Councillor Paul Kelly who will "air" those issues and contributions on behalf of the residents of Maynooth, Paul can be contacted at 6243624. Again any Cumann member can be approached to bring those views or ideas to the attention of Paul who will have a direct impact on the final draft to be adopted.

Budget Submission

The Cumann are currently investigating issues for submission to the Minister for possible inclusion in the Budget due in December. 

TEA BRACK FOR HALLOWEEN

You will need:

- 1 lb mixed dried fruit
- 1/2 pint cold tea
- 6 oz brown sugar
- 1 lb flour
- 1 egg
- 1/4 teaspoons, baking powder

Method: 1. Put the fruit to steep in the cold tea with the brown sugar. leave for a few hours.

2. Add the flour, beaten egg, mixed spice and baking powder. Mix well togerher.

3. Put into a greased lined 8 inch tin, place a piece of tinfoil on top.

Bake in a moderate oven for about 2 hours.

Baked Marrow


Serves 4 You will need: 1 med sized marrow 8 oz butter 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley 2oz breadcrumbs Sea salt and freshly ground black peper 1 egg, free range if possible Some grated cheese 2 oz button mushroons 2 oz tomatoes Cooking time 1 hour Oven temp, 180 (350f) gas mark 4

Method:

1. Peel the marrow, cut it in half lengthways and scoop out the seeds. Peel the onion and chop it finely. Chopped the mushrooms and tomatoes. Melt the butter and fry the onion for 5 mins until soft, but not brown, then add the minced meat and seal over a high heat for a few minutes.

2. Remove the pan from the heat, blend in the chopped parsley and Breadcrumb's also the tomatoes and mushrooms season the stuffing with the salt and pepper. Beat the egg lightly and use it to bind the stuffing

3. Spoon the stuffing into the two marrow halfs and put them together. Tie in place with two or three pieces of fine string, and wrap the stuffed marrow in buttered foil. Place in a roosting tin and bake in the oven. If you like you can sprinkle the grated cheese over the marrow and return to the oven for a few minutes. Cut the stuffed marrow into thick slices and serve with roast potatoes. If you don't want to use meat you can stuff the marrow with vegetables and cheese and serve with rice.




