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

Paddy MacNamara

Councillor Paddy MacNamara is running as a Labour candidate in the forthcoming Kildare North by-election. Father-of-two Paddy, who topped the poll in the Naas electoral area in the Local Elections, first cut his political teeth the Mary Robinson Presidential campaign after joining the Labour Party in studying After for a degree mechanical engineering in Trinity College Dublin, Paddy completed a Masters in the University of Limerick.

Originally from Cashel, County Tipperary, Paddy has lived in Naas since 1991. Being parents to four-year-old Michael and two-year-old Katie, Paddy and his wife Elaine, are only too aware of the problems associated with juggling and combining family and home life with busy work schedules. Paddy is a lecturer in Bolton Street College in Dublin, while Elaine, herself a native of Carbury, works with Hewlett Packard.

Like thousands of others, Paddy makes the daily commute for work from Kildare to Dublin where he lectures in Mechanical Engineering. It is this experience of commuting which prompted Paddy to become involved in the Naas and Sallins Rail Users Group (NASRUG). Now a PRO for the group, Paddy has campaigned for major improvements to the route, including the provision of extra trains, improvements to security and quality of service. Paddy is an active member of many other local groups including in the Sallins Council, Community the Naas Housing Cooperative where he holds the position of secretary and he chairs the Naas Area Committee in Kildare County Council.

As a councillor, Paddy has highlighted the gaps in infrastructure in Kildare associated with the rapid development of the commuter belt. Paddy has also been a vocal opponent to the underfunding of such important schemes

as the Disabled Persons Grant Scheme, the shortage of school places and facilities, the closure of health services, traffic chaos in the county and unaffordable housing.

The Labour Party is confident that poll-topper Paddy will take a second seat in the by-election. Paddy has the proven ability and is the clear choice.



Useful Tips

Table Manners

- If you can't get at your food with a knife or fork with out making a mess when eating spare ribs, corn on the cob or shellfish, for example use your fingers. Otherwise, when in doubt, follow your host's example or consider the formality of the situation.
- If you've bitten into something that can't be swallowed such as meat gristle, a pip or a fishbone remove it from your mouth the way it came in (generally with your fork) and put it on the side of the plate.
- If you find hair in your soup at a dinner party, or an insect in your salad, either remove the interloper and eat your food, or leave it untouched - but refrain from commenting on it.
- If you find an unacceptable object in food you order in a restaurant, send it back immediately.

Windscreen wipers

Are your wipers not working properly? Before buying new ones, clean both the glass and blades thoroughly. If you've had your car cleaned at the car wash, you may hve to use a mild household abrasive cleaner to remove any silicone wax. If that still doesn't do the trick, try the following:

- Water beads are the result of grease or silicone build-up. Clean the windscreen with the solvent used for removing grease or silicone from bodywork.
- If the wipers are smearing only one direction or if they chatter, the blades may be frozen. Warm them between your hands or use a hair dryer; if that doesn't help, dip them in warm water.
- Chattering may also be caused by a bent wiper arm. In this case, stop the wipers in midstroke to see if they are parallel to the windscreen. If an arm is bent, straighten it with tow pairs of pliers until it remains parallel to the glass when released. If the tip of the arm is bent, remove the blade before you straighten the arm. The problem may also be corroded joints. Free them up with penetrating solvent.
- Streaking may occur when the nozzle of the windscreen washer is blocked; insert a pin to clear it. Or the washer fluid may not be spraying in the wiper's path; adjust the position of the nozzle with a pin a and keep checking until the spray pattern is on target. Some nozzles aren't adjustable; don't force them.
- Before driving in the rain, rub your wiper blades with bicarbonate of soda you'll see better.
- If the blade on the driver's side isn't working, swap it with the other one on the passenger's side. This is a temporary measure only. Get the faulty blade fixed as soon as you can.

Nail biting

- When you're tempted to nibble at your nails or cuticles, keep your hands busy - and not in your mouth. Doodle on paper, knead a pencil river or finger some worry beads.
- Give yourself a weekly manicure; the neat appearance may deter you from biting your nails.
- Promise yourself a treat if you can grow one nail without biting it.
- Paint an anti-biting preparation onto your nails.
 These are available from chemists, and their bitter taste reminds you to stop nibbling.
- If your small child also bites his nails. Try giving him a small manicure set - it might encourage him to stop. Make sure you trim his fingernails after each bath-time, and reward the days when he doesn't bite them with a gold star or small treat.

Indigestion

- To relieve an attack of indigestion, drink a cupful of peppermint tea. Steep 1/2 oz of fresh peppermint leaves in 1 pint of boiled water for 20 minutes.
- Instead of a commercial antacid, try 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda in a glass of water (not recommended for those who must restrict their intake of sodium)
- Caution: a heart attack may be mistaken for indigestion. If you are in doubt, seek medical help.
- Prevention
- Stop smoking and don't chew gum. Cut our aspirin, alcohol, caffeine and carbonated drinks.
 Decline foods that don't agree with you.
- Make time for stress-free meals. Try eating four or five small meals a day slowly instead of wolfing down two or three large ones.
- Relax, sitting up, for 15 to 30 minutes after every meal.
- Sleep with the head of y our bed slightly elevated or with a pillow

Head lice

If your or the school nurse finds lice in your child's hair, eradicate them with an over-the-counter preparation bought from the chemist.

Comb your child's hair every night, strand by strand, with a fine-toothed comb until you are sure there are no more lice and you have combed our all their eggs. To prevent a recurrence, tell the child not to share combs, hats or ear-phones with her friends at school.

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Gardening tips for February

Spring Bulbs

Chionodoxa forbesii, Ipheion uniflorum (all), Narcissus 'Dove Wings', Narcissus 'Irene Copeland', Narcissus 'Jack Snipe', Narcissus 'Jetfire', Narcissus 'Minnow', Narcissus 'Mount Hood', Scilla siberica 'Spring Beauty', Tulipa linifolia Batalinii Group, Tulipa praestans 'Fusilier'

SPRING

Spring, the season when even those who are not into gardening on a permanent basis, enjoy the bulb's warm glow and ability to take the darkness and bareness of Winter out of the natural environment. For over two months you can have daffodils flowering in the garden. In the first weeks of the season, bulbs such as *Naricissus* 'February Gold' are ideal to reawaken your garden after the winter months.

How to grow the bulbs

Chionodoxa: (Glory of the snow)

This genus from West Turkey, Crete, and Cyprus is related to *Scilla*. These small bulbous plants are easy to grow in sun or partial shade. They soon seed profusely, flowering quickly from seed. *C. luciliae* (RHS Award of Garden Merit) has up to 12 small, starry, blue flowers per stem. A pink-flowered form is also available. The plant needs a mixture of shade sun and moist soil. The bulbs are full hardy and grow best at around -20°C/-5°F.

Ipheion

A small genus of bulbs from the eastern side of South America. They are related to onions and give off a familiar smell when the leaves are crushed, but the flowers, produced in spring, are often honey-scented.

I. uniflorum 'Wisley Blue' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is nearly fully hardy and well worth trying in colder gardens. Ipheion is small with light-blue, starshaped flowers and dense, grass-like leaves. It multiplies quickly and is useful when planted between shrubs or at the edge of a rock garden.

Narcissus (Daffodils)

The range of daffodils on offer is vast. The shape and colour of each cultivar is clear from the illustrations in catalouges and garden centres. Equally important, however, is the height some large-flowered daffodils need plenty of space and require careful placing. The varieties listed here are mostly medium in stature, and easily cultivated. Buy daffodils as soon as they go on sale, because the roots will begin to grow in late summer.

'Irene Copeland' has a double flower with white outer petals and a bright yellow double trumpet. It grows to medium height and flowers in mid-spring.

'Jack Snipe' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a small plant with white outer petals and a lemon-yellow trumpet. It flowers well and bulks up very quickly.

'Jetfire' is also small and has a good contrast between its yellow outer petals and bright orange trumpet. At first the trumpet is quite pale in colour but soon darkens with time.

'Minnow' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a small, multi-headed, scented narcissus with pale yellow trumpets surrounded by cream outer petals. This daffodil is best grown in a large container or a raised bed.

'Mount Hood' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a medium-height daffodil with a cream trumpet and whiter outer petals. It has a mid-spring flower of good substance.

Others

Scilla siberica 'Spring Beauty', syn, 'Atrocoerulea', is a little taller than *S. bifolia* and has deep blue, more pendent flowers in early spring. It looks very effective when planted around deciduous shrubs or in conjuction with white or red flowers. The bulb is best grown when it has a balance of sun and moist soil, and should be grown full hardy at -20°C/-5°F.

Bowl-shaped flowers

Tulipa linifolia Betalinii Group (RHS Award of Garden Merit). These are small to medium, early-flowering tulips that come in red, yellow, apricot, and bronze. They are very easy to grow if planted in a well-drained spot in a cold garden.

Tulipa praestans 'Fusilier' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a barely medium-height tulip that is particularly easily grown and very reliable. It has several vibrant, red flowers, on each stem.

However, he forfeits his parole by committing a minor crime, and for this crime Valjean is haunted by the Police Inspector, Javert. Valjean eventually reforms and becomes, under the name of M. Madeleine, a successful businessman, benefactor and Mayor of a northern town. To save an innocent man Valjean gives himself up and is imprisoned in Toulon. He escapes and adopts Cosette, an illegitimate child of a poor woman, Fantine. Cosette grows up and falls in love with Marius, who is wounded during a revolutionary fight. Valjean rescues Marius by means of a flight through the sewers of Paris. Cosette and Marius marry and Valjean reveals his past. The story by Victor Hugo was made into a musical by Claud-Michael Schonberg and the librettist Alain Boubil opening in Paris 1980.

A Century of Irish Sporting Heroes

Jackie Kyle (1926-)

For the title of world's best fly half in the post war era, Jackie Kyle has few rivals in world rugby. One of the few who could have matched his ability was the Welshman, Cliff Morgan. But to Irish rugby fans privileged to have seeing him play he was the greatest. Kyle's great attribute was not only was he a classic attacking back that could make match winning breaks with magical side steps and swerves his anticipation on defence was also uncanny. To the frustration of his opponents he was always there to block up holes in his teams defence that were caused by breakaways or a kicks ahead.

To his credit he is remembered as a great crowd-pleaser when much of his International career was spent in sides either not dedicated to open play (Ireland) or forced on defence (Lions in New Zealand). In his prime just after World War Two when Ireland were dominating the International Championship with a superb pack, his function was somewhat negative for such a talented back. His tactical kicking in support of his pack was brilliant but limited his opportunities to show what a wonderful talented fly half he was. However he was a key player in the most successful Irish team since the inception of the International Series at the end of the eighteen hundreds. The Irish team completed the "Grand Slam" in 1948 and repeated their Triple Crown success in 1949. He was selected for the British and Irish Lions tour in New Zealand in 1950. Although playing behind a beaten pack his class was evident. New Zealand rugby fans were impressed and put him on a par with Bert Cooke, which was praise indeed as that player was considered their greatest ever inside back.

When Jackie Kyle played against the 1951-1952 Springboks, Irish supporters said he was off form because of his preoccupation with his medical studies. Danie Cravan who managed the touring side said " my reply is that if Kyle is better than that he must be the best fly half who ever played rugby anywhere in the world"

Born in Belfast, Kyle played for Belfast Royal Academy and then for Queen's University. He showed no great talent at fullback and centre and it was not until the regular fly half of the Queens senior side dropped out through injury that he leaped to prominence. Tried out in that position, he at once made it his own. He went straight into the Ulster Provincial Side and when the International matches resumed in 1946 he was selected to play for Ireland. Except for injury he was never out of the Ireland team for the following eleven seasons. An indication of less demanding times was that he 46 caps represented a world record at that time.

B G Thomas described him as one of the nicest fellows he has ever met in rugby football. Schoolboys loved him. He was inevitably last to the dressing rooms after an international match, refusing to leave until all autographs asked for had been signed. His unselfishness is best illustrated by an incident involving a small £250 legacy. On receiving the maturing amount he promptly donated the sum to a children's charity

After his rugby career was over he virtually disappeared to (at that time) an out-of-the-way spot in Africa to work as a medical missionary.

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
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
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Editorial



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

Paddy MacNamara

Councillor Paddy MacNamara is running as a Labour candidate in the forthcoming Kildare North by-election. Father-of-two Paddy, who topped the poll in the Naas electoral area in the Local Elections, first cut his political teeth during the Mary Robinson Presidential campaign after joining the Labour Party in 1989. As a councillor, Paddy has highlighted the gaps in infrastructure in Kildare associated with the rapid development of the commuter belt. Paddy has also been a vocal opponent to the underfunding of such important schemes as the Disabled Persons Grant Scheme, the shortage of school places and facilities, the closure of health services, traffic chaos in the county and unaffordable housing.

The Labour Party is confident that poll-topper Paddy will take a second seat in the by-election. Paddy has the proven ability and is the clear choice.

Prawn and Fruit Cocktail

2 large red apples

2 large ripe pears

1 lemon

2 large sticks of celery

1lb of cooked prawns

2 bunches of watercress

1 pot of Greek yoghurt enough for 5 tablespoons

1small far of mayonnaise

For the dressing

5 tablespoons of Greek yoghurt

2 tablespoons of mayonnaise

3 tablespoons of ketchup

2 teaspoons Of Worcestershire sauce

4-5 drops of Tabasco sauce

Core and dice apples and pears, put into a bowl and sprinkle with lemon juice.

Trim celery and cut into slices and put into bowl, add prawns and toss altogether.

Wash and dry watercress, chill until required. Mix together yoghurt, mayonnaise, ketchup,

Worcestershire and Tabasco, season and chill. Just before serving divide the watercress between 6 dishes, spoon over the fruit and prawn, then drizzle over the dressing.

If you are using frozen prawns remember that they close about half their weight when defrosted so you'll need to buy about 2lbs.

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Useful Tips

Table Manners

- If you can't get at your food with a knife or fork with out making a mess - when eating spare ribs, corn on the cob or shellfish, for example - use your fingers. Otherwise, when in doubt, follow your host's example or consider the formality of the situation.
- If you've bitten into something that can't be swallowed such as meat gristle, a pip or a fishbone remove it from your mouth the way it came in (generally with your fork) and put it on the side of the plate.
- If you find hair in your soup at a dinner party, or an insect in your salad, either remove the interloper and eat your food, or leave it untouched - but refrain from commenting on it.
- If you find an unacceptable object in food you order in a restaurant, send it back immediately.

Windscreen wipers

Are your wipers not working properly? Before buying new ones, clean both the glass and blades thoroughly. If you've had your car cleaned at the car wash, you may have to use a mild household abrasive cleaner to remove any silicone wax. If that still doesn't do the trick, try the following:

- Water beads are the result of grease or silicone build-up. Clean the windscreen with the solvent used for removing grease or silicone from bodywork.
- If the wipers are smearing only one direction or if they chatter, the blades may be frozen. Warm them between your hands or use a hair dryer; if that doesn't help, dip them in warm water.
- Chattering may also be caused by a bent wiper arm. In this case, stop the wipers in midstroke to see if they are parallel to the windscreen. If an arm is bent, straighten it with two pairs of pliers until it remains parallel to the glass when released. If the tip of the arm is bent, remove the blade before you straighten the arm. The problem may also be corroded joints. Free them up with penetrating solvent.
- Streaking may occur when the nozzle of the windscreen washer is blocked; insert a pin to clear it. Or the washer fluid may not be spraying in the wiper's path; adjust the position of the nozzle with a pin and keep checking until the spray pattern is on target. Some nozzles aren't adjustable; don't force them.
- Before driving in the rain, rub your wiper blades with bicarbonate of soda you'll see better.
- If the blade on the driver's side isn't working, swap it with the other one on the passenger's side. This is a temporary measure only. Get the faulty blade fixed as soon as you can.
- If you need to change your blades, check your car manual for details of the right size to use.

Nail biting

- When you're tempted to nibble at your nails or cuticles, keep your hands busy - and not in your mouth. Doodle on paper, knead a pencil river or finger some worry beads.
- Give yourself a weekly manicure; the neat appearance may deter you from biting your nails.
- Promise yourself a treat if you can grow one nail without biting it.
- Paint an anti-biting preparation onto your nails.
 These are available from chemists, and their bitter taste reminds you to stop nibbling.
- If your small child also bites his nails. Try giving him a small manicure set - it might encourage him to stop. Make sure you trim his fingernails after each bath-time, and reward the days when he doesn't bite them with a gold star or small treat.

Indigestion

- To relieve an attack of indigestion, drink a cupful of peppermint tea. Steep 1/2 oz of fresh peppermint leaves in 1 pint of boiled water for 20 minutes.
- Instead of a commercial antacid, try 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda in a glass of water (not recommended for those who must restrict their intake of sodium)
- Caution: a heart attack may be mistaken for indigestion. If you are in doubt, seek medical help.
- Prevention
- Stop smoking and don't chew gum. Cut our aspirin, alcohol, caffeine and carbonated drinks. Decline foods that don't agree with you.
- Make time for stress-free meals. Try eating four or five small meals a day slowly instead of wolfing down two or three large ones.
- Relax, sitting up, for 15 to 30 minutes after every meal.
- Sleep with the head of y our bed slightly elevated or with a pillow

Head lice

If you or the school nurse finds lice in your child's hair, eradicate them with an over-the-counter preparation bought from the chemist.

Comb your child's hair every night, strand by strand, with a fine-toothed comb until you are sure there are no more lice and you have combed our all their eggs. To prevent a recurrence, tell the child not to share combs, hats or ear-phones with her friends at school.

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Gardening Tips for February

Spring Bulbs

Chionodoxa forbesii, Ipheion uniflorum (all), Narcissus 'Dove Wings', Narcissus 'Irene Copeland', Narcissus 'Jack Snipe', Narcissus 'Jetfire', Narcissus 'Minnow', Narcissus 'Mount Hood', Scilla siberica 'Spring Beauty', Tulipa linifolia Batalinii Group, Tulipa praestans 'Fusilier'

SPRING

Spring, the season when even those who are not into gardening on a permanent basis, enjoy the bulb's warm glow and ability to take the darkness and bareness of Winter out of the natural environment. For over two months you can have daffodils flowering in the garden. In the first weeks of the season, bulbs such as *Naricissus* 'February Gold' are ideal to reawaken your garden after the winter months.

How to grow the bulbs

Chionodoxa: (Glory of the snow)

This genus from West Turkey, Crete, and Cyprus is related to *Scilla*. These small bulbous plants are easy to grow in sun or partial shade. They soon seed profusely, flowering quickly from seed. *C. luciliae* (RHS Award of Garden Merit) has up to 12 small, starry, blue flowers per stem. A pink-flowered form is also available. The plant needs a mixture of shade sun and moist soil. The bulbs are full hardy and grow best at around -20°C/-5°F.

Ipheion

A small genus of bulbs from the eastern side of South America. They are related to onions and give off a familiar smell when the leaves are crushed, but the flowers, produced in spring, are often honey-scented.

I. uniflorum 'Wisley Blue' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is nearly fully hardy and well worth trying in colder gardens. Ipheion is small with light-blue, starshaped flowers and dense, grass-like leaves. It multiplies quickly and is useful when planted between shrubs or at the edge of a rock garden.

Narcissus (Daffodils)

The range of daffodils on offer is vast. The shape and colour of each cultivar is clear from the illustrations in catalouges and garden centres. Equally important, however, is the height some large-flowered daffodils need plenty of space and require careful placing. The varieties listed here are mostly medium in stature, and easily cultivated. Buy daffodils as soon as they go on sale, because the roots will begin to grow in late summer.

'Irene Copeland' has a double flower with white outer petals and a bright yellow double trumpet. It grows to medium height and flowers in mid-spring.

'Jack Snipe' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a small plant with white outer petals and a lemon-yellow trumpet. It flowers well and bulks up very quickly.

'Jetfire' is also small and has a good contrast between its yellow outer petals and bright orange trumpet. At first the trumpet is quite pale in colour but soon darkens with time.

'Minnow' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a small, multi-headed, scented narcissus with pale yellow trumpets surrounded by cream outer petals. This daffodil is best grown in a large container or a raised bed.

'Mount Hood' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a medium-height daffodil with a cream trumpet and whiter outer petals. It has a mid-spring flower of good substance.

Others

Scilla siberica 'Spring Beauty', syn, 'Atrocoerulea', is a little taller than *S. bifolia* and has deep blue, more pendent flowers in early spring. It looks very effective when planted around deciduous shrubs or in conjuction with white or red flowers. The bulb is best grown when it has a balance of sun and moist soil, and should be grown full hardy at -20°C/-5°F.

Bowl-shaped flowers

Tulipa linifolia Betalinii Group (RHS Award of Garden Merit). These are small to medium, early-flowering tulips that come in red, yellow, apricot, and bronze. They are very easy to grow if planted in a well-drained spot in a cold garden.

Tulipa praestans 'Fusilier' (RHS Award of Garden Merit) is a barely medium-height tulip that is particularly easily grown and very reliable. It has several vibrant, red flowers, on each stem.


Post-Primary School Maynooth Musical Production Parish Hall February 2 - 6th 2005

Question

Can you please give details on the new rates for hospital charges that were announced recently?

Answer

From 1st January 2005 the charge for attending Accident and Emergency increases from €45 to €55. If you are a medical card holder or have a letter of referral from your doctor you do not have to pay this charge.

The charge for in-patient services in a public ward has also increased from \in 45 to \in 55 a day (subject to a maximum of \in 550, i.e. 10 days, in any 12 month period). If you stay in two or more hospitals i the course of the year and your stay exceeds 10 days in hospital you should bring this to the attention of the last hospital you attend.

Everyone is entitled to public in-patient services regardless of their income but subject to the statutory charge mentioned above. There are a number of groups who do not have to pay the statutory charge such as medical card holders, women receiving maternity services, children up to the age of 6 weeks and children suffering from prescribed long-term illnesses. In cases of undue hardship a Health Board may provide the service free of charge.

The charges for private and semi-private accommodation in public hospitals have also increased by 25%. There is one exception: Health Board District Hospitals charges are the same as in 2004. The daily rates for 2005 are:

Hospital Category	Private	Semi-private	Day-care
Health Board Regional Hospitals Voluntary and Joint Board Teaching Hospitals	€501	€393	€361
Health Board County Hospitals Voluntary Non-Teaching Hospitals	€418	€336	€299
Health Board District Hospitals	€179	€153	€133

These charges are additional to the public hospital statutory in-patient charge given above.

I am getting an Old Age Pension. I also have a free television licence. I heard on the radio that I would have a free 'lifetime' television licence but I just got a renewal form in the post. How do I get a free 'lifetime' TV licence?

Answer


Since August 1st, if you qualify for the Household Benefits Package from the Department of Social and Family Affairs (DSFA) you will be notified that it has been awarded. This notice incorporates your free television licence. This will serve as a 'lifetime' licence for as long as you stay entitled to the Benefits Package scheme.

If you are getting the Household Benefits Package since before August 2004 a 'lifetime' licence will be issued to you once your current licence falls due for renewal.

Some people have received renewal notices for their TV licence from An Post. In this case:

- Telephone the DSFA Household Benefits Section at LoCall 1890-500-000 or (01) 7043000
- Give them your pension/payment claim number and your TV Licence Number
- Ignore renewal notices or final demands from An Post

If a TV licence inspector should call to your house before your 'lifetime' licence arrives, refer them to the Department of Social and Family Affairs, Pension Office in Sligo.

The current situation is due to the changeover from annual licences, issued by An Post, to 'lifetime' licences issued by the DSFA. It should not recur after this year.

Ouestion

I understand that the income thresholds for the Family Income Supplement have been increased in the Budget. Can you please give the details.

Answer

Family Income Supplement (FIS) is a weekly payment for families at work on low pay, including lone parent families. To be eligible:


- You must be working 19 or more hours per week (39 hours a fortnight) and the work must be expected to last for at least 3 months. (Back to Work Allowance, Job Initiative, Social Economy Programme and Parttime Job incentive are eligible for FIS, (Community Employment is not). Where your spouse/partner is also working, your working hours can be combined in order to satisfy this condition.
- You must have one or more children (under age 18, or aged 18-22 in full-time education) living with you and you must be supporting them.
- Your average weekly family income must be below the appropriate income limit for your family size. Assessable income is net family income. It includes most social welfare payments, but not Child Benefit.

As of January 2005 the weekly income limit is increased by €39. The new weekly limits are as follows:



FIS is calculated as 60% of the difference between your average weekly family income and the income limit for your family size. The minimum payment is still €20. It is paid for 52 weeks while while you remain employed for at least 19 hours per week (38 hours per fortnight). At the end of the 52 weeks you should re-apply if you think you are still eligible. Claim forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office.

Question

I am job-sharing in a company for the last year. My job-share colleague told me that there may be problems with my social insurance record because of the tax year. What does this mean?

Answer

The tax year, and therefore the PRSI contribution week, starts on the 1st January every year. As a result, the 'PRSI contribution week' can differ from the 'working week'. Because you are in a job-sharing arrangement you need to be fully aware of the implications particularly in the area of social welfare entitlements.

In 2004 the 1st January fell on a Thursday. Because the contribution week started in the middle of the week, if you worked every second week you still managed to pay a PRSI contribution in each contribution week. If you worked Monday to Friday for two weeks in a row you paid three PRSI contributions. So even though you had the one week off you still had paid work in each contribution week. Therefore you had the full 52 PRSI contributions paid for the year.

In 2005 the 1st January falls on a Saturday which means each PRSI contribution week is seven days from Saturday to the following Friday.

The 1st of January falling on a Saturday is particularly relevant if you are job-sharing with a week off as part of your work pattern because you will miss out paying a PRSI contribution towards the social insurance scheme for the week you are not working.

For example, if you work one week on and one week off, where previously you had 52 contributions paid in a year you will now have only 26 contributions for 2005. If you work for three weeks with one week off you will have 39 contributions for 2005.

This could effect your entitlement to an Old Age (Contributory) Pension later. The amount of Old Age (Contributory) Pension you will receive when you reach 66 is based on the average number of yearly PRSI contributions you have paid since starting work. It is therefore important that you have as many PRSI contributions as possible.

If your job-sharing arrangement requires that you work part of every week between the days Saturday to Friday you will still receive your full 52 PRSI contributions in 2005. If your job-share work pattern

involves you having one week off you could talk to your employer about changing your work pattern to a 'split week'. This involves you working at least one day of each contribution week so that you can have the full 52 PRSI contributions for 2005.

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A Century of Irish Sporting Heroes

Jackie Kyle (1926-)

For the title of world's best fly half in the post war era, Jackie Kyle has few rivals in world rugby. One of the few who could have matched his ability was the Welshman, Cliff Morgan. But to Irish rugby fans privileged to have seeing him play he was the greatest. Kyle's great attribute was not only was he a classic attacking back that could make match winning breaks with magical side steps and swerves his anticipation on defence was also uncanny. To the frustration of his opponents he was always there to block up holes in his teams defence that were caused by breakaways or a kicks ahead.

To his credit he is remembered as a great crowd-pleaser when much of his International career was spent in sides either not dedicated to open play (Ireland) or forced on defence (Lions in New Zealand). In his prime just after World War Two when Ireland were dominating the International Championship with a superb pack, his function was somewhat negative for such a talented back. His tactical kicking in support of his pack was brilliant but limited his opportunities to show what a wonderful talented fly half he was. However he was a key player in the most successful Irish team since the inception of the International Series at the end of the eighteen hundreds. The Irish team completed the "Grand Slam" in 1948 and repeated their Triple Crown success in 1949. He was selected for the British and Irish Lions tour in New Zealand in 1950. Although playing behind a beaten pack his class was evident. New Zealand rugby fans were impressed and put him on a par with Bert Cooke, which was praise indeed as that player was considered their greatest ever inside back.

When Jackie Kyle played against the 1951-1952 Springboks, Irish supporters said he was off form because of his preoccupation with his medical studies. Danie Cravan who managed the touring side said " my reply is that if Kyle is better than that he must be the best fly half who ever played rugby anywhere in the world"

Born in Belfast, Kyle played for Belfast Royal Academy and then for Queen's University. He showed no great talent at fullback and centre and it was not until the regular fly half of the Queens senior side dropped out through injury that he leaped to prominence. Tried out in that position, he at once made it his own. He went straight into the Ulster Provincial Side and when the International matches resumed in 1946 he was selected to play for Ireland. Except for injury he was never out of the Ireland team for the following eleven seasons. An indication of less demanding times was that he 46 caps represented a world record at that time.

B G Thomas described him as one of the nicest fellows he has ever met in rugby football. Schoolboys loved him. He was inevitably last to the dressing rooms after an international match, refusing to leave until all autographs asked for had been signed. His unselfishness is best illustrated by an incident involving a small £250 legacy. On receiving the maturing amount he promptly donated the sum to a children's charity

After his rugby career was over he virtually disappeared to (at that time) an out-of-the-way spot in Africa to work as a medical missionary.

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

Maynooth Labour News

Kildare County Council Budget 2005 Agreed

Following prolonged discussions the Council's Budget for 2005 was agreed at a meeting on 4 January. Cllr. John McGinley and his Labour Party colleagues determined that the most crucial issues were:

- Waivers on Bin Charges for Old Age Pensioners and those on Welfare Payments.
- Increased allocation for those in need of Disabled Persons Grants
- Funding provision for the operation and maintenance of the new children's playgrounds being constructed this year.

Bin Charges

The County Manager proposed the following charges for domestic refuse collection:

- (a) 240 litre bin
 - (i) Standing charge €185

(ii) Bin tag fee (From 1/3/05) €7 each time the bin is emptied

- (b) 140 litre bin
 - (i) Standing charge €140
 - (ii) Bin tag (From 1/3/05) €5 each time the bin is emptied

Cllr. McGinley and the other Labour Councillors made it very clear that without a waiver system being put in place for old age pensioners and those on social welfare payments they would not be supporting the Budget. Both the Fianna Fail and Fine Gael parties made it clear that waivers on bin charges was not an issue with them; while the sole Green Party member, Cllr. J.J. Power stated that he was totally opposed to waivers for old age pensioners and for anyone else for that matter.

Cllr. McGinley negotiated on behalf of the Labour Party and the Independent Councillors with the Head of Finance and the outcome was as follows:

- The standing charge would be waived for old age pensioners and those on social welfare payments.
- 14 free bin tags would be provide to these waivers applicants.

This means that that if those on waivers make full use of the recycling bin they should only need to put the refuse bin out for collection every two weeks and with 14 free tags they will only have to pay for the collection 8 times. Under the circumstances, with Fianna Fail against giving any waivers and Fine Gael reluctantly agreeing to them, it was a good outcome.

Cllr. McGinley and his Labour Party colleagues are calling on the Government to introduce a National Waiver Scheme for bin charges for those on old age pensions, those on social welfare payments and those on low incomes in order to reduce the financial hardship the new bin charges are causing.

This grant is available to modify/extend a dwelling to facilitate a person with a disability. The maximum grant available is €20,320 or 90% of the approved cost, whichever is the lesser. Two thirds of each grant is recouped from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government. The local authority is required to pay the remainder.

It is the Labour Party's view this grant should be funded totally by Central Government as it is self financing in that it enables people to remain at home rather than occupy a valuable hospital bed. In most cases families provide a downstairs bedroom en suite so that the disabled person can live in dignity and with their family.

Because Kildare County Council gets less funding than most counties from Central Government in order to run the county it has been unable to meet the increased demand for DPG's. There is now a backlog of applicants in the county requiring funding of €5.1m.

In his draft budget the manager proposed an allocation of €500,000, which would give €1.5m when central government funding of €1m is added. Cllr. McGinley and most other Councillors stated that this was insufficient and that it had to be increased in order to go some way to clearing the backlog. The Head Of Finance stated that the only way to increase the allocation for the DPG's was to increase the general business rates. Cllr. John McGinley proposed that the business rates be increased by a further 1% and this was seconded by Cllr. Paddy MacNamara. The Head of Finance stated that if this proposal was agreed it would bring the total funding for DBG's to €2,250,000. However, when it came to voting on Cllr. McGinley's motion Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and the Independent Councillors, including Cllr. Catherine Murphy, voted against, with the Labour Councillors and Cllr. Tony McEvoy the only ones voting for. Regrettably, most Councillors were not prepared to back up their words with action and as a result the disabled have to suffer on.

Funding for Operation & Maintenance of Children's Playgrounds

As a result of Cllr. John McGinley's successful motion the County Manager proposed that €1m be allocated for the provision of children's playgrounds in the major towns in the county. Cllr. McGinley welcomed this but stated that he was concerned that there was no allocation for the operation and maintenance of the playgrounds. Without such an allocation Cllr.

McGinley felt that there would be pressure on location communities to do this work themselves. Cllr. McGinley proposed that the €29,000 which was set aside for regional tourism be re-allocated for the operation and maintenance of playgrounds instead. The motion was passed despite the fact that all of the Fianna Fail Councillors voted against it.

Maynooth Library to open on Saturdays

At the Budget meeting Cllr. John McGinley stated that while the Library provided a great service to the community it was a pity that it was not open on Saturdays so that children could go there with their parents.

The County Librarian stated that she would be in a position to open the libraries in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge all day Saturday following the opening of the new library in Leixlip at the end of January.

Deputy Emmet Stagg welcomes final approval of extension to Maynooth Post Primary School.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the announcement of the sanctioning of the required extension to Maynooth Post Primary School.

The extension which was first sought in 1999 and for which planning permission was granted in December 2001 will now proceed to construction in 2005.

The extension will mean that the school will now be able to cater for a long term enrolment of 850 pupils and will ease the present overcrowding in classrooms and reduce dependency on temporary accommodation. The extension comprises 6 General Room, Classrooms, Demonstration Computer Business Machines Room, Special Tuition Room, 2 Lecture Rooms, Administration Rooms and a Physical Hall. Education

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that whilst it was great news for the pupils, teachers and parents of pupils of the School it was incredible that it took 6 years to get the project to this stage.

Bus Shelters for O'Neill Park and opposite the Glenroyal

Cllr. John McGinley has been trying for some time to get Dublin Bus to erect bus shelters at the bus stops at O'Neill Park and opposite The Glenroyal. Planning permission has now been granted for shelters at both locations and Cllr. McGinley has asked Dublin Bus to get the them erected without any further delay. Incredibly, it took over a year to get planning permission for a such simple structures.

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Party Political

Broken Public Lights at The Harbour on the way to the Train Station

Following representations from Cllr.John McGinley the public lights that were broken by vandals have been repaired by the ESB. Regrettably, one of the lights was again smashed a few days afterwards. The local Garda Sergeant is in agreement with Cllr. McGinley that this area is in serious need of proper lighting as it is the busiest pedestrian area in Maynooth. Unfortunately there is disagreement between the County Council and Waterways Ireland as to who is responsible for the provision and mainteanace of the lighting. In order to try and resolve the impasse Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip area Committee of the Council:

"That the following policy be adopted for the existing and proposed new public lights at The Harbour, Maynooth:

- That Kildare County Council accepts responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the existing and the proposed new lights for the area.
- That Waterways Ireland proposal for the 11 new lights from Straffan Road to the Harbour be accepted i.e. Waterways would contribute €8,000 and Kildare County Council would contribute €3,000 (see their letter to Cllr. McGinley dated 7 December 2004)
- That Waterways suggestion that the opportunity also be taken to upgrade the existing lights from Leinster Street to the pedestrian bridge over the canal also be accepted."

Lack of Pedestrian walkway at the back of the Health Board Houses

Since Newtown Grove was closed off to facilitate the building of new houses at Meadowbrook Lawns residents of Old Greenfield, Meadowbrook, Brookfield and College Green have to use the potholed road at the bottom of Old Greenfield and the mud path at the back of the Health Board houses to make their way to the Rail Station or Main Street. As hundreds of pedestrians have to use this "walkway" every day Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That a temporary footpath be constructed at the back of the Health Board houses at Newtown, Maynooth and that the potholes on the road outside Michael O'Riordan's house be repaired in order to facilitate the hundreds of pedestrians who have to use it daily as a result of the closure of the roadway at Newtown Grove. Furthermore, that levies from the new houses at Meadowbrook Lawns be used for this

purpose."

Bond Bridge looks set to start in May

A Titanic Struggle Spearheaded by Cllr. John Mc Ginley looks set to finally close in May 2005 when construction work on Bond Bridge will commence.

The Realignment of Bond Bridge is the first project to be funded under the new Council Development Contributions Scheme.

Since October last John has been pursuing C.I.E. in relation to procedural issues associated with the construction work and C.I.E. have confirmed to John that the consents required have been furnished to Kildare Co. Council. The Co. Manager also advised John at the Budget Meeting of the Council on December 17th last that all procedural issues had now been cleared and that construction was to commence in May 2005 when the Meadowbrook Link will have been completed.

This is great news for the people of the Newtown Area and Maynooth in general and both Paddy Mac Namara and Emmet Stagg are proud to be associated with John's success on this campaign.

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
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

Independent Councillors seek N7 Express Bus Route Pilot

Kildare Independent Councillors, Catherine Murphy. a candidate in the upcoming by-election and Mary Glennon, welcome the recently announced initiative to open up the hard shoulders on motorways and dual carriageways to speed bus times into the city centre. They are calling on the Minister, Mr. Ivor Callelly and the National Roads Authority to make the beleaguered N7 Naas to Dublin route the pilot for this study.

"There couldn't be a better time for this scheme to be introduced since the upgrading work is just commencing. There is absolutely no doubt in our minds that this move is essential on the Naas Dublin route to cut down dramatically on car use and to make the daily commute more bearable. "At the moment it is taking up to two hours each morning for the bus to get to Dublin , a journey of a mere 20 miles that less than ten years ago took 35 minutes.

Prior to the upgrade the busses were using the hard shoulder and the Gardai seemed to be sympathetic to the plight of the bus drivers trying to meet schedules as in the main they turned a blind eye to it. However it was not ideal as the surface was far from perfect and its narrowness meant that part of it was not suitable, so the buses were forced to move in and out of traffic if they were to meet their schedules. "But now because of the upgrading, the hard shoulder is not available and the hundreds of bus commuters are arriving late on a daily basis for work and study in the capital."

The Department of Transport has not yet announced to the NRA the actual detail of which roads are to be included in the pilot scheme. "We are listening daily to heartfelt cries for help from commuters who say that the N7 from Naas to Dublin is more like a car park than a dual carriageway. We think this is the opportune moment for the NRA to take the initiative and ask that this route be used as the pilot scheme. The work currently underway on the Naas Road allows for the hard shoulder width of three metres, which is the preferred width for bus usage. We are told by the firm who are commissioned to carry out pilot studies that this is ample space to allow for a bus lane. "If it is put on the long finger it will be both costly and a huge nuisance to commuters."

Catherine Murphy in her role of Chairperson of the Strategic Policy Committee on Transportation in the last Kildare Co. Council was a fierce advocate of the improvement of public transport. In line with this Councillor Murphy in Kildare Co. Council and Councillor Glennon at Naas Town Council level have both been active in promoting the idea of Park and Ride sites being identified as part of an overall package of measures to encourage people to switch from private car use to public transport. Quality queuing arrangements must also be provided along the route and this could be in place when the third lane opens. County Kildare and Naas Development Plans are nearing completion so this is an opportune time to identify suitable park and ride locations.

Political Game Playing Disenfranchises Electorate

The constituencies of Kildare North and Meath have been deprived of full representation in the Dáil since the departure of Charlie McCreevy, Fianna Fail, and John Bruton, Fine Gael, last November.

According to Kildare County Councillor, Catherine Murphy, "this delay of almost three months in calling the by-elections to fill these vacancies seems to have more to do with party political games than upholding the democratic right of the public to be fully represented."

Party Political

The Constitution sets down the ratio of TDs to the population, but there are no fixed rules on the timing of by-elections. Indeed by-elections have been delayed for up to 18 months, solely for party political reasons.

Despite substantial resources at the disposal of the two largest parties, Fianna Fail and Fine Gael have not selected candidates for Kildare North. Neither party seems to be in a rush to have the Dáil pass the writ to hold the by-election.

Cllr Murphy sees this delay as a cynical, essentially anti-democratic exercise. It is designed to strengthen the position of the main parties prior to the next general election which will see additional TDs in both constituencies. Kildare North will expand from three seats to four, while Meath will split from one five seater to two three seater constituencies. The general election is due in 2007; therefore, even with the current number of TDs, the population in both constituencies is under represented. Delaying the by-elections only adds to that disadvantage.

In a democracy, the public decides who should fill the vacant seats. Yet, the main political parties act as if they in some way 'own' these seats. Cllr Murphy concludes that it is time to end game playing which denies the electorate their right to representation; the by-elections must take place without further delay,.

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
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
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Editorial

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

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

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

arlic Mushrooms

Ingredients:

32 medium size mushrooms 3 cloves of garlic Crisp iceberg lettuce 8 ozs of butter 8 stale slices of bread 2 whole eggs 1/3 pint milk 2 tomatoes Flour

Method:

Clean and dry mushrooms. Make crumbs out of stale bread. Whisk eggs until frothy, add milk and whisk again. Set out your flour, egg, crumbs into separate dishes. Add mushrooms to the flour and lightly dust, then add to the egg mixture and finally to the crumbs and coat mushrooms.

Wash and dry lettuce and chop tomatoes and mix with the lettuce. This is only a garnish. You can add whatever you want. Heat a deep fat fryer, add mushrooms and cook until golden brown. Drain on kitchen paper and arrange on the plate. Chop garlic and add to butter and melt over a low heat. Add butter mix over the mushrooms and serve immediately.

8 - 10 Slices White Bread (crusts removed) Butter 450ml / 3/4 pint Milk 2 Eggs 50g / 2oz Caster Sugar 50g / 2oz Sultanas Ground Nutmeg

Ingredients Tip

If your children don't like sultanas try using jam sandwiches. Cut them into triangles. Layer the dish with the sandwiches and then pour on the milk mixture!

Method:

- Butter the bread and cut into fingers or triangles.
- Grease a shallow ovenproof dish. Arrange a layer of the bread, buttered side down.
- Sprinkle some of the sultanas on the bread and dust with a little ground nutmeg.
- Arrange another layer of bread with sultanas and nutmeg.
- Beat the eggs, milk and sugar together and pour carefully over the layers of bread
- Allow to stand for about 10 to 15 minutes, and then transfer to a pre-heated oven 180°C / 350° F Gas 4 for about 30 minutes.
- Serve while hot with cream or custard.

Suggested alternatives to sultanas and nutmeg:

Fresh cherries, sliced peaches, sliced apricots, raspberries or blackberries.

usilli with Tuna and Tomatoes

This colourful and easy recipe with its tangy sauce of tuna, herbs and tomatoes, combines many of the Mediterranean's most popular flavours.

Ingredients

(Serves 4)

400g / 14oz fusilli salt and black pepper basil leaves, to garnish

For the Sauce

4 shallots
1 tbsp olive oil
400g / 14oz can tomatoes
4 sun-dried tomatoes
2 x 200g / 7oz cans tuna
1 tbsp chopped fresh
marjoram or oregano
75g/3oz stoned black olive,
optional

Ingredients Tip

Jars or packets of sun-dried tomatoes are available from delicatessens and larger supermarkets. They have quite a salty flavour so don't add extra salt to the sauce without tasting first.

Method

- Peel and finely slice the shallots. Heat the oil in a frying pan, add the shallots and fry gently for about 5 minutes until softened. Stir in the canned tomatoes and simmer for 10 minutes, or until the sauce reduces and thickens slightly.
- While the tomato sauce is simmering, cook the fusilli in a large pan of boiling, salted water until al dente (follow packet instructions)
- Cut the sun-dried tomatoes into thin strips. Drain the tuna and flake into chunks. stir the tuna and the sun-dried tomatoes into the tomato sauce and simmer for a further 5 minutes.
- Add the marjoram or oregano and olives, if using, to the tuna and tomato sauce. Season to taste with salt and black pepper.
- Drain the pasta and serve with the sauce spooned over. Scatter the dish with a few basil leaves.

Preparation: 15 min Cooking: 20 min

Fish sauces for pasta are popular in southern Italy, particularly Sicily where fresh tuna is a familiar sight in the markets. Bluefin tuna is the most expensive and most sought-after variety, and many of the best cuts will be bought by Japanese sushi merchants.

Gardening Tips for April

April is renowned for its variable weather and temperatures. As the days lengthen the sun's light and hear rays grow stronger, the plant world surges into the most active phase of its annual cycle. As a result plants are at their most vulnerable, since night temperatures, after days of clear blue skies and uplifting sun, can plummet below freezing point in damaging radiation frosts.

April often earns its reputation for showery, changeable weather, although statistically it averages out as a dry month. In many parts of Ireland it is the driest month of the year, and gardeners need to check that young plants do not dry out.

Differences in latitude in temperate regions are now of less acute importance in determining when best to do things. The month is a busy one of seed sowing, planting, and growth regulation, and in the colder localities of the north and on high ground.



Work for the Month

- Any plant that grows where the gardener does not want it is a weed, but in practice in term defines non-ornamental varieties that are so vigorous that, left unchecked, would smother cultivated plants. Keep down weeds among crops and plants Give seeds a good start by assiduously. thorough preparation of the seed beds. The application of a pre-emergent weed-killer destroys germinating weed seedlings then loses toxicity before slower-germinating seedlings break through. Timing is critical, so follow the maker's in instructions precisely.
- Master the use of the hoe for weeding. Use a sharp Dutch hoe, with a shallow push-pull action to decapitate annual weeds and topgrowth. Mix weed remains with the soil. Hand weed and for out perennial weeds or chop them out with a draw hoe.
- Use weed-killers carefully among plants carefully among plants, wedding the weed foliage and stems only, by means of a sprinkler bar or hooded sprayer held directly over the weeds. A paraquat-diaguat herbicide is most

effective against annual weeds and the green top-growth of most other weeds; dalapon can be used for couch and other grasses and 2, 4-d, mecoprop, or ioxynil for various broad-leaved weeds. Choose a dry, calm day when rain or frost is mot imminent for using weed-killer solutions. Spot-treatment is essential in situations such as lawns and rockeries where the weed-killer must not fall on surrounding plant life. Weed-killer in gel form can easily be confined to weeds and should be applied with a brush.



The Fruit Garden

Prevent or reduce fungus infections such as early mildew, scab, canker and blossom wilt on apple and pear trees by spraying at the green bud stage with a systemic fungicide on a calm day when foliage and shoots can be covered easily and completely.

At the same time apply a systemic insecticide to control such pests as apple sawfly, moth caterpillars, aphids, capsid bug, apple blossom weevil, leaf weevils. Suckers and scale insects.

Repeat the spraying when blossom buds show white on pears, pink on apples, in late April or early May. Spray gooseberry bushes when the flowers are about to open with a systemic insecticide or dinocap formulation, to control American mildew.

Examine strawberries for the presence of aphids or red spiders mites (under cloches) in warm dry late – April weather, and treat with a malathion insecticide if necessary.

Answer

The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act, 1996, sets limits on the maximum number of hours for young workers. Under the act a "child "means a person under the age of 16 and a "young person " means a 16 or 17 year old.

A child aged 14 may not work during the school term. He/she may do light work during school holidays for up code retail financial institutions have committed to 7 hours a day and 35 hours a week.

The code of practice is available on request in banks and building societies or can be accessed on the IBF website at www.ibf.ie.

You may, however incur some costs in transferring your account such as the double stamp duty charge which may arise from the switching of financial cards such as credit cards and ATM cards. The Finance Bill 2005 provides for an exemption from this double charge where you switch cards in the same year of charge. The Bill propose that the change in relation to credit cards and charge cards will take effect from 2 April 2005, while the change in relation to ATM cards,Laser cards and combined cards will take effect from 1 January 2006.

If you are considering switching your account, the Financial Regulation has published a Personal Current Account Cost Survey which may help you to establish if you can get a better deal from another financial service provided. It is available from the Financial Regulator, Consumer Information Department, P.O.Box 9138, College Green, Dublin 2 and its website at www.ifsra.ie.

Ouestion

I understand that new applicants for Rent Supplement no longer have to be renting for six months to be eligible. Is this true?

Answer

You are correct. The requirement that an applicant must have been renting for a period of six months in the preceding twelve months has been discontinued.

Rent Supplement is paid to people living in private rented accommodation who cannot provide for the cost of the accommodation from their own resources. It is paid if they are eligible and do not have alternative accommodation available to them. The supplement is available under the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme through the Community Welfare Officers at local health centres.

Since the 1st February, 2005, to be eligible for the supplement new applicants must be already renting and must have been able to afford the rent from within their own resources when they started renting originally. They must also have had a reasonable expectation that they would continue to be able to afford the rent into the future. When applying they must have experienced a substantial change in their circumstances, such as illness or loss of employment, as a result of which they can no longer continue to pay the rent.

This requirement does not apply to certain people, such as those aged 65 or over, those in receipt of certain disability payments or those regarded by a housing authority as being homeless.

What are the tax-free thresholds for gifts and inheritances under Capital Acquisitions Tax For 2005?

Answer

Capital Acquisition Tax (CAT) may have to be paid when an individual is left a gift or inheritance by another person. The tax is calculated on the open market value of the property making up the gift or inheritance, less certain deductions and reliefs. There are special rules for valuing farms and family businesses.

There are certain thresholds above which CAT applies. The appropriate threshold depends on the relationship between the donor and the beneficiary. The thresholds are increased every year in line with inflation. The thresholds given apply from January 2005.

Spouses

No tax is payable on inheritance from a spouse regardless of the amount involved.

Class A— Children

A threshold of €46,673 applies to gifts/inheritances made by a person to his/her child or to grandchildren under the age of 18 whose parent is dead. Children include adopted and step-children and long-tem foster children.

Class B—Other relatives

A threshold of €46,673 applies to gifts/inheritances from certain relatives including uncles, aunts, brothers, sisters, nephews, nieces, grandchildren and grandparents.

Class C—Distant relative and non-relatives

A threshold of €23,336 applies to a successor who does not come under groups A or B.

If the gift or inheritance is received on or after 5 December 2001, then all inheritances and gifts received within the threshold category since 5 December 1991 are added together. CAT is charged at 20% on the amount above the threshold.

For gifts and inheritances of the family home taken on or after 1st December 1999 CAT may not apply depending on the circumstances.







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

Useful Tips

Bleach spots

- If the garment is dark, disguise the spot by rubbing it with a fabric marker or paint that matches the fabric's marker or paint that matches the fabric's colour. Cover coloured areas with a piece of cotton sheet and iron at a hot setting.
- Treat non-colourfast fabrics with a pre-wash dye remover. For white or pastel-coloured fabrics, treatments for colour-run accidents can effectively bleach the whole garment a uniform pale colour.
- Sew an appliqué over the spot.
- Dye the garment a darker colour or tie-dye it.

Bruises

A small bruise requires no special treatment, but if bruising is extensive, remember,

RICE: Rest, Ice Compression and Elevation.

- R Rest the injured part.
- I Place ice or a cold compress over the bruise to help control bleeding and swelling and relieve pain.
- C Press your hand firmly over the injured area.
- E Elevate the bruised area to a level just above the heart.

Chapped lips

The skin on your lips is much more sensitive than the rest of your face, because it is actually just a membrane and is not naturally lubricated, unlike the rest of your skin. This means that it is prone to dryness, chapping and flaking in extremes of temperature, cold air, sun or wind.

Prevention

- Lipsticks usually smooth and lubricate as well as provide colour, while lip balms give colourless, quick relief from chapping. Many lipsticks and balms now contain ultraviolet light filters to protect against sunlight.
- Always cream your lips when you apply moisturiser to your face, morning and evening. At night, take off make-up with a moisturising and emollient cream or lotion and not soap. Which tends to be drying. At night, apply a lip ointment or petroleum jelly.
- Even though licking your lips seems to provide relief, resist the temptation; when the moisture evaporates, your lips are likely to chap even more.
- Treat your lips gently don't rub them, and try not to pick the peeling skin.

Fire Safety

Fit smoke alarms on each floor of your home and in rooms where a fire is likely to start, such as the sitting room or bedroom. Don't fit one in a kitchen as steam or cooking fumes may set it off.

Be prepared for the event of a fire and plan your escape route. Draw a plan of your home (including stairs, windows, and doors) and plot two escape routes from each room. Study the plan with household members; assign someone to help children or the less agile.

Display the fire emergency number near telephones.

Make sure everyone who may need to use a window for escape is able to reach and unlock it, and reach the ground easily. Check the safety of a porch or garage roof that may provide an escape.

Hold regular fire drills and designate a place to meet outside for a head count.

Every month check that your fire blanket or extinguisher is in place and has not been used or damaged. Get your non-aerosol extinguishers serviced once a year by specialists and replace aerosol extinguishers as suggested by the manufacture.

Always switch off electric blankets before getting into beds.

Fluff

Since clothes fluff easily catches onto other clothes, remove it before you put a garment in the cupboard. If you don't have a clothes brush, use a strip of masking of sticky tape wrapped around your hand, adhesive side out, or a damp sponge.

You'll find that fluff is much easier to remove with a damp clothes brush than with a dry one.

To remove fluff from velvet, a sponge powder puff works well; on wool use a dry synthetic sponge.

Chrome

Clean chrome with any of the following, soda or mineral water, window cleaner, bicarbonate of soda, vinegar (cider or white) or lemon peel. Or use a solution of 1 part clear ammonia to 16 parts water.

To remove insects from your car's bumper, rub with a soap-impregnated scouring pad moistened with cola. To remove rust spots, rub with crumpled aluminium foil.

A Century of Irish Sporting Heroes Diana Conolly—Carew and "Barrymore"

In the nineteen fifties and sixties Irish international sporting heroes were thin on the ground. In 1956 Ronnie Delaney had won Ireland's first Gold Medal since 1932 at the Melbourne Olympics Games. In 1957 the Irish International soccer team had been denied a place in the 1958 World Cup Finals held in Sweden by a last second English goal at Dalymount Park. The following year, Hard Ridden trained by Michael Rogers on the Curragh was the first Irish trained winner of the Epsom Derby since "Orby" in 1907. What made these international successes noteworthy was that they were achieved in spite of rather than with the help of the Irish Government, Civil Service or sporting authorities. In hindsight we can only imagine the inertia of our ruling mandarins with no ability or initiative that left the country virtually at a standstill for over fifty years after Independence. Good planning and application was sparse on the ground as the majority of the Irish people stayed in the same economic condition from the day they were born to the day they died, mainly grinding poverty. In all those years we can also lament the lack of support given to the Army show jumping team by the Department of Defence. Ireland renown for its horses and horsemen needed two Swiss Army officers to prod the Irish Government into forming an Irish military show jumping team in 1926. A prestigious and frontline sport that puts the country's horse industry on the international stage still has the Army Equitation School fighting for funds nearly eighty years after its inception. It is incredible that in the early 1970s the Irish Army's annual budget for buying horses was £10,000. This amount would not have bought one leg of any decent show jumper at the time. There were many great Irish show jumping heroes of the twentieth century. The great Army riders of the early years in Dan Corry, Ged O'Dwyer and Cyril Harty and their successors in Billy Ringrose, Ned Campion and Con Power. The Country was also privileged to have great Civilian show jumping heroes in Iris Kellett, Tommy Wade, Seamus Hayes and Eddie Macken.

With the interest of our readers in mind we focus on a local hero formerly associated with Castletown House, Celbridge who came to the fore in the mid fifties Many of us growing up at the time will remember Diana Conolly-Carew and the indomitable grey "Barrymore". There is always genuine affection for grey horses by the public no matter what discipline of equine sport the animal is involved in. Perhaps this is part of the reason why both the Rider and the Horse are remembered more than others. Diana's ancestors were involved in the sport having bought the Champion Hunter at the first RDS show held on the lawns of Leinster House in 1868. Diana began her career as a member of the pony club. She was very successful being a prolific winner of pony and junior jumping competitions, winning International events in Belfast, Edinburgh and Dublin. Riding "Tubbnergat" she was unfortunate to loose the European Junior Championship at the White City London in 1957 due to a technicality. Sometimes progressing from junior to senior grade can be difficult in any branch of sport but in Diana's case her purchase of "Barrymore" eased the transition. Standing at only 15.3 hands, he may have been somewhat small in size but turned out to be a right pocket battleship. Purchased by Diana for £240 he was brought steadily through the show jumping grades before being selected for the Irish Aga Khan team in 1963. Diana joined three other show jumping legends on the Irish team in Tommy Wade (Dundrum), Seamus Hayes (Goodbye) and Billy Ringrose (Loch an Easpaig). The quality of the opposition was first class with traditional Nation Cup Competitors, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and Britain sending their strongest teams. The RDS arena was packed to witness one of the sixties great sporting moments. Diana did her Country proud. "Barrymore" picked up four faults in the first round, having one fence down, but jumped a brilliant clear in the second. Tommy Wade and "Dundrum" brought the house down with their two clear rounds and Ireland won the Aga Khan Cup for the first time in fourteen years. In hindsight this was a great achievement. For decades Ireland had been selling its best jumpers and brood mares to emerging show jumping countries like Holland, France and Switzerland. In general individual owners can not be blamed. The economic reality was that people in the sport had to sell in order to survive. However some people in Government should have realised the benefit of our Defence Force having the best horses available and should have acted accordingly. Joining a mixed Army /Civilian team for an Autumn tour of North America, Diana Conolly-Carew added to her growing International reputation by finishing fourth in the New York Grand Prix. In 1964 she toured Spain and Portugal with Frank Kerins, Heather Moore and Patricia McKee. The team was quite successful, winning six events and finishing in the money on fifty-two occasions. Barrymore continued to hold his form. Diana was again a member of the Irish team that contested the Aga Khan trophy in 1965 and 1966. The Irish team of 1965, Billy Ringrose, Seamus Hayes, Ada Matheson and Diana finished second to an invincible British team The following year brought another great success for the rider. Diana won the Dublin International Grand Prix at the RDS Horse Show. Selected for the Mexico Olympics in 1968 she and her team mates, Ned Campion and Ada Matheson were dogged by misfortune and injuries. Not carrying any "clout" in international circles they ended up on the wrong end of rules and regulations governing the event. In subsequent decades Irish sport has developed to such an extent that in many areas we do merit respect in International competition and the

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

shameful behaviour of the Games officials in Mexico is now rarely experienced.

So as the sixties drew to a close so to did the careers of Diana and her contemporaries. The new kids on the block included the brilliant Eddie Macken, Paul Daragh and Con Power. Diana still had important contributions to make to Irish Show jumping. She acted as Chef d'Equip to the Irish Team that won its first ever European show jumping medals in 1969, Paul Darragh taking the individual junior silver at Dinard.





Maynooth Fairtrade Campaign Continues to Gain Momentum

As efforts to achieve Fairtrade Town status for Maynooth continue, the national Fairtrade fortnight in early March was marked by a number of successful events in Maynooth and also by new Fairtrade retail outlets appearing in response to the growing demand for products.

Maynooth Fairtrade Steering Committee marked the national fortnight by organising a display of the recent highly successful schools' posters on Fairtrade in the local Library. The enthusiastic support of students members of the committee was also apparent in a very successful public meeting addressed by Colin Roach, Campaigns Officer with Oxfam and Ian McDonald from Comhladh, the Irish Association of Development Workers. Both speakers outlined the pressing need for Fairtrade and the tangible differences it can make to individual producers in the Third World. A video following the changing fortunes of a family engaged in coffee farming in Central America brought home to everyone precisely how our purchases here in Maynooth can make a difference to the plight of hard pressed farmers throughout the Third World. A range of products was also made available at a stall in the Students' Union throughout the fortnight and officers of the Students Union also spoke to the post primary school pupils about the Fairtrade movement.

New retail outlets in the town are becoming available for those wishing to purchase Fairtrade produce. In addition to Tesco and Supervalu who have for long stocked a good range of produce, the Glenroyal Hotel now serves Fairtrade coffee, as does Maynooth Community Church in Main Street. Perhaps the main accolade this month however should go to Castle Stores for their delicious hot (Fairtrade) chocolate! In the recent cold snap this was an excellent way of warming up!

The Fairtrade mark is the only independent guarantee of a better deal for Third World producers and is strongly supported by all the main Third World charities in Ireland, as well as by the Irish Congress of Trade Unions. There is surely no more appropriate town in Ireland to become a Fairtrade town than Maynooth, and Maynooth Fairtrade Steering Committee urges shoppers to make a conscious choice to support those local retailers stocking Fairtrade produce such as biscuits, bananas, chocolate, coffee and tea. Together we can help not just our own town of Maynooth, but also small farmers we may never meet but who will forever appreciate a levelling of their playing field as they seek to attain living standards we take for granted.

Children's Playgrounds Ready in June

Cllr. John McGinley's motion "That General Development Levies be revised in order to cater for the provision of children's and teenager's playgrounds in towns where there is a demand for such facilities" is now being implemented countywide.

The Director of Corporate & Cultural Affairs, Peter Minnock, stated at the Council meeting on 28 February that the playgrounds for Maynooth, Celbridge and Lexlip would be in place by June of this year. Planning permission (Part 8) was sought in early March and tenders were also invited then for the construction of the three playgrounds.

The Maynooth children's playground and teenager's recreation area will be located at the Harbour Field and it will have three sections to cater for 0 to 6, 6 to 12 and 12 to 18 year olds.

Great credit is due to Deirdre Bristow, Chairperson, Maynooth Playground Action Group and her committee for bringing the project to this advanced stage.

An Bord Pleanala Grants Planning Permission for 241 Dwellings at Rear of Castledawson & Parsons Hall

Regretfully, An Bord Pleanala have granted planning permission for 241 dwellings on the lands to the rear of Castledawson and Parsons Hall estates.

The only positive aspect of the Appeals lodged by the Residents' Association and by Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley is that An Bord Pleanala have included the following condition in the granting of planning permission:

"No house shall be occupied on the site until the Planning Authority have confirmed in writing that works on the realignment and improvements of Bond Bridge have been fully completed and commissioned." This means that whilst construction can commence no houses can be occupied until the full completion of the Bond Bridge project in May 2007.

Major Town Centre/ County Development

The County Manager has selected Maynooth as the location for the Major Town Centre for North East Kildare. Councillors were given a presentation by two sets of Consultants, outlining the reasons for selecting Maynooth, at a Council Meeting on 4 March. Cllr. John McGinley was not impressed with their presentation especially their reply to his question on whether or not the necessary ring road infrastructure would be put in place first. They stated that more residential rezoning would have to take place to fund the construction of the ring roads.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the full Council:

"That Maynooth be removed as the Major Town Centre and that Collinstown be designated as the Major Town Centre instead."

Safety Measures at Kingsbry Estate

Following representations by Cllr. John McGinley the Council have agreed to erect barriers at the Kingsbry side of the walkway to Meadowbrook in order to slow down the motorbikes that use it.

Improvements Sought for O'Neill Park, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip area Committee of the Council:

"That the following improvement works be carried out

in O'Neill Park, Maynooth:

- 1. Resurface the road at the entrance to the estate as the concrete is badly cracked.
- 2. Remove the stump of the broken bollard at the entrance to the estate.
- 3. Put a cul de sac sign at the entrance.
- 4. Refurbish the copings as they are in bad need of same.
- 5. Carry out proper resurfacing of the Square as there is flooding at both the left and right side at present.
- 6. Top the three beech trees on the grass verge within the estate.

The "Bandstand" to be moved to Harbour Field

Following strong pressure by Cllr. John McGinley the Director of Planning agreed at a meeting with John on 25 February to remove the "Bandstand" from Pound Park and in a letter dated 28 February he stated:

"Further to my report which was considered at the last meeting of the Area Committee, I wish to confirm that, it is proposed to relocate the bandstand to a suitable area at the Harbour Field when the Area Plan for this location is finalised."

Improvements Sought for Pound Park (The Green)

Following a meeting with members of the Lyreen Residents'Association Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the following work be carried out at the Council owned Pound Park, Maynooth:

- 1. That the first nine trees be removed at the Band Hall side.
- 2. That the first seven trees at the bottom right hand corner be removed.
- 3. That the wall at the Band hall side be completely re-built for the full length of the Park and that development levies from the adjoining new apartments be used for this purpose."

Inadequate Public Lighting in Carton Court

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"Given the inadequate Public Lighting throughout Carton Court Estate, Maynooth, that the ESB be requested to survey same with a view to providing additional public lights."

Improvements Sought for Vehicles Exiting from Parklands/Castlebridge

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the Council to provide a left turning lane and a yellow box for right turning traffic at the exit from Parklands/ Castlebridge. John got the following reply:

I wish to inform you that the Area Engineer Eilis Murray has confirmed that the matter of a left turning lane and a yellow box will be passed on to our contractors with a view to examining the possibility of installing same."

Mud on Footpaths and Roadway from Building Sites

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to get the developers of Straffan Wood to wash away the mud on the footpath and roadway from their development on Straffan Road, Maynooth to the M4 and to get them to use a wheel wash as per the planning permission granted.

He has also asked for the same action to be taken with the developer on the Celbridge Road

Transfer of Amenity Lands to Maynooth GAA & the Schools

The transfer of these lands to the GAA and the Schools was part of the Maynooth Development Plan, which was agreed on 29 April 2002. Incredibly, it is three years later and the lands have still not been transferred even though the residential development has started.

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following "Progress Report" for the Area Meeting on 18 March:

"Under Section 47 of the Planning and Development Act 2000 Roger Satchwell agreed to transfer approx 8.78 h.a. of amenity land at Maynooth to the Council. This was confirmed by way of formal Section 47 agreement. At present the Council awaits submission of Transfer Deed from Mr Satchwells Solicitor. This transaction has been on going for a number of years and we cannot say, at this point, when the matter will be concluded.

Needless to say Cllr. McGinley finds this report completely unsatisfactory and he has again asked that the landowner or his representatives be called to a meeting to resolve the impasse.

Temporary Footpath at the Back of the Health Board houses in Newtown

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply from the Council to his demands that a footpath be installed here as a matter of urgency:

"This temporary footpath is in use as a result of Bond Bridge contract. Accordingly, members requested that gravel chips be spread on the path.

Action Taken: Work on the Bond Bridge scheme is due to commence in May 2005. I have requested the Road Construction Department to prioritise this request when works commence."

Castletown House Opens on Easter Sunday

A well-known historical estate and a former residence of William Connolly, Castletown House in Celbridge opened its doors after the continuing restoration on Easter Sunday, March 27th.

Classical Proportions and Exquisite Style

Designed by an Italian architect Alessandro Galilei, Castletown House dates back to 1722, when the construction began for the Speaker of the Irish House of Commons, William Connolly. Built in the classical style of the 16th century, the house boasts of the exquisite Palladian style and is said to have influenced the design of the White House in Washington.

After the death of the Speaker Connolly in 1729, the interior of the Castletown House remained unfinished. New heirs, Tom Connolly and Lady Louisa Lennox, finished the decoration work thirty years later. This influenced the interior of the house, which goes back to neoclassical style of the 1770s.

Lady Louisa was supervising most of the decoration work herself, and thanks to her efforts, we can admire the ambiance of the Dining Room, the Long Gallery and the only surviving Print Room in Ireland (dating back to 1765), as well as many other relics of the Georgian Era.

The members of the Connolly family were residing in the Castletown estate until 1965, when the house and the adjacent land were sold.

Obelisk

The Obelisk, built on the far end of the former estate is devoted to Speaker Connolly and can be seen from the rooms of the Castletown House. This Folly was constructed during the Small Famine in 1740 as part of the relief programme for the local inhabitants.

Restoration

The initial restoration of the Castletown House started in 1967, when Hon. Desmond Guinness purchased the house and made it the headquarters for the Irish Georgian

Society. It was then followed by the Castletown Foundation works. Since 1994 the estate has been in the state care and Duchas/OPW, the heritage services, have been undertaking an extensive renovation programme at Castletown House in recent years, which was re-opened to the public in April 1999.

The opening on Easter Sunday launches a new season for the guests and tourists who are welcome to visit this largest and finest Palladian style house in Ireland. Castletown House will be open all summer until late October.

The menu features such starters as Marinated Crispy Duck, mixed vegetable compote with roasted pine nut or Crabmeat and Shrimp with lemon, diced beetroot and a cumin crème fraiche. However I chose the Puff pastry mille feuille with wild mushrooms and smoked bacon which was both ample and delicious. My wife chose the unusual, Roast haunch of rabbit with a cognac and raisin stuffing, creamed spinach, mango and coriander salsa which oozed flavour.

There is a choice of eight Main Courses with a varied selection including Pan Fried fillets of sea bass with a sweet pea puree and whipped potato or the hearty and extremely tasty sounding Medallions of beef fillet, spring onion mash, spaghetti of vegetables, béarnaise sauce and roast shallots. My choice on

the night was Herb Crusted fillet of Pork with an onion and sage potato cake, red wine jus. Herself had the Roast breast of Chicken stuffed with cream cheese and smoked salmon with a red ball pepper coulis on basil mash. All of the mains are individually garnished and indeed both starter and main course portions are generous.

All the desserts are homemade on the premises and include some stunners. I went for a tart of rhubarb and rosemary served with vanilla ice cream which was outstanding while my wife had the Warm Chocolate sponge with chocolate sauce and pistachio ice cream. She had to fight me off from her ice cream!

Restaurant Nua also has a novel idea when it comes to presenting their wine list. Firstly many of the wines on the list have been reviewed favourably. The wine list is laid out and explained according to the style of the wine making choosing a wine so much easier and the list more customer friendly.

They also brand their own mineral water which is a nice touch and encourage customers to take the bottle away with them for reuse.

Restaurant Nua also provide extensive bar food in the Newtown Inn lunch and evenings seven days a week.

Summing up the whole experience was a very enjoyable one and far less expensive than the norm for this standard of food and service. Our Bill including cappuccinos and water came to \in 74.10.

Restaurant Nua deserves the support of the people of Kildare and beyond. I wish them luck and I will definitely be back. Reservations can be made at 01 6291904

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
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
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Editorial

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MAYNOOTH COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

The April meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 11th April in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Chairperson Brid Feely called for one minute silence to commemorate the memory of Pope John Paul II and also in memory of Stephen Hyland. Michael Dempsey and Padraig Thorton.

New Chairperson Brid Feely thanked all for appointing her. She said she will work hard for the next year or so.

She said her objectives were:

- Community Centre for Maynooth
- Town Council status
- To get new residents and other groups to attend meetings.

She also commented that it was Brid Feely and not the Fianna Fail Party that was chair of the Maynooth Community Council. She said to make it clear Maynooth Community Council is a non political organization.

Nissan Irish Open

Andrew McMullon said that they are having ongoing meetings. He also noted that business people in the town are cleaning up outside their shops. Many pubs will be putting on entertainment. It is envisaged that the town will take on a festival appearance.

New Town Centre. Framework Plan

It was noted that nothing at present is final. Plans go on display soon. Senan Griffin stated that Kildare County Council Managers report was rejected. He said he could foresee difficulties with the plan

A number of points were raised:

Traffic - It can take up to 30 minutes to get from the motorway to the town.

People awareness - How best to get people to know what is going on.

Integrated Framework Plan for land and Transportation - This document was considered to have no resemblance to Maynooth or to sorting out the traffic problem.

Brid Feely suggested a Public Meeting, also that Kildare Councillors should attend. It was agreed that a Public Meeting should go ahead.

Maynooth Community Centre

A long discussion took place. There were a lot of points raised here.

Tony Bean—"Maynooth Community Centre Partnership", stated that a lot of meetings had taken place. He also noted that Maynooth Community Church got involved in 2004. While it was agreed that some people might be wary of church control, it was also noted that it was a good plan. Tony also said that MCCP have done a lot of work . He said that their plan and ideas were incorporated in the Community Church plans.

Sean Cushen raised the question that there should be money available from levies and from building developers to build a Community Centre.

Peter Connell suggested that meetings should take place and report to June meeting of Maynooth Community Council.

It was decided to have a meeting with all interested groups, while we have the Maynooth Community Church option. It was also felt that we could have more than one option through development funding.

Senan Griffin also noted that the transfer of these "Doyles" lands to Kildare County Council has still to be done.

Terry Nealon—Maynooth Drama Group raised his concerns regarding a theatre. He said the Harbour Field has been sited as a possible location for a theatre, but now there seems to be plans that a regional theatre could be put here. This would cater for the greater southern Dublin are as well as north Kildare.

In the submission by Maynooth Community Council for the Harbour Field area a theatre was also suggested.

Tidy Towns

Paul Croghan said their plan this year is to get to the 12 point mark. He said they have already started the clean-up. They are planning a clean-up on the Straffan Road and would be grateful for support.

Flower baskets will be ready to go out 1st May.

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



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Recipes

Starters

Parsnip & Carrot Soup

Serves 4 People

Ingredients
250g/8 oz parsnips, chopped
250g/8 oz carrots, chopped
1 onion chopped
600ml / 1 pint Chicken stock
Salt & pepper
Natural yogurt, to garnish

- 1. Place the parsnips, and the onion in a large saucepan with the stock and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 20 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender.
- 2. Remove from the heat and allow to cool slightly, then purée in a food processor or blender until smooth, or press through a fine sieve.
- 3. Return the soup to the cleaned pan and reheat, serve hot in individual warmed soup bowls, garnished with yogurt.

Main Course

Stir— Fried Beef with Peppers

Serves 6 Ingredients

1 Tablespoon olive oil

1 Onion, thinly sliced

1 Large garlic clove, cut into thin strips 500q /1b fillet steak, cut into thin strips

1 red pepper, cored, deseeded and cut into matchstick strips

1 green pepper, cored, deseeded and cut into matchstick strips

1 tablespoons soy sauce

2 tablespoon of dry sherry

1 tablespoon chopped rosemary

Salt & pepper

- 1. Heat the olive oil in a wok or deep frying pan and stir— fry the onion and garlic for 2 minutes.
- 2. Add the strips of beef and stir- fry

- Add the soy sauce, sherry, salt and pepper to taste and the rosemary, and stir—fry for a further 1– 2 minutes, serve piping hot.
- 5 Serve with brown rice or egg noodles for a satisfying meal

Desert

Melon Ice Cream

Serves 4

1 Large melon (Ogen or Charentias) 300 ml/1/2 pint natural yogurt

- Halve the melon and scoop out all the seeds, scoop the melon flesh into a food processor or blender and work until smooth.
- 2. Mix the melon purée with the yogurt.
- 3. Transfer the melon and yogurt mixture into a shallow freezer container, and freeze until firm.
- 4. Serve the melon ice cream in scoops.
- 5. To achieve the 2 different colours, use 2 different types of melon:
 Charentais melon for peachy—
 orange ice cream and ogen for green.

Post Primary School Maynooth / Temple Street Children's Hospital

Local School turns trash into cash

Individuals and companies in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge were urged to save office materials that normally end up in the bin - toner, printer cartridges and old mobile phones- helped to raise money for Temple Street Children's Hospital

The 2nd year students of Maynooth Post Primary teamed up with leading recycling company Eurosource in an innovative fundraising scheme. Every time someone donated a cartridge or old mobile phone, the hospital will receive a cash donation.

Maynooth Post Primary students said" throwing away an old mobile phone or printer cartridge is not very environmentally friendly. Some mobile phone batteries contain cadmium and other dangerous and toxic substances. Once dumped in landfill sites, the phone casings corrode and the cadmium can leak into the soil

Very few printer cartridges are recycled. The rest are buried in landfill sites. They have helped our fundraising efforts. It takes more than 1.5 pints of oil to make a new toner cartridge and in the last decade it is estimated that millions of Euro worth of printer cartridges were dumped"

Readers were asked to collect unwanted mobile phones, chargers and phone batteries, plus used inkjet and toner cartridges from friends, relatives and neighbours and from the workplace.

Gardening tips for May

May, like April has long sunny days that boosts plants into more active growth and warms the garden soil. But there is always the danger at night, however, of the frosts of spring to which the Irish climate is liable, and which can devastate tender leaves and flowers. Nevertheless , daily temperatures should be mounting above 16°c.



The Flower Garden

Make additional outdoor sowings of hardy annuals where needed as soon as possible. Use a seed-dressing to improve germination. Thin seedlings sown in April as soon as they are large enough to handle. Move hardy and half-hardy annual seedlings sown in the greenhouse to cold frames to harden off. Close the frames at night, but increase ventilation by day in step with the temperature, watering early in the day. Transplant to flowering positions in 2-3 weeks' time. Plant out hardened-off half-hardy annuals after rain, if possible, or in water in, from mid-May, but have cloches or some form of cover available if night frosts are expected. Delay planting out until late May or



early June in cold, exposed or northern gardens.

- Snip off faded flower heads from earlyflowering bulbs and daffodils unless the seeds are needed. Leave the seed capsules on crocus and snowdrops which want to increase naturally.
- If spent early-flowering tulips must be lifted because their bed is needed, take them up carefully with roots and soil intact. Place in a prepared trench on spare ground, cover with soil and leave until the leaves wither, before sorting for storage.
- Replant indoor bulbs that have finished flowering outside in a shelter corner. Keep them intact and let them finish growing before sorting for size and storing for outdoor planting in the autumn. They will need two two to three years of growing to make top-size flowering bulbs again. Small offset bulbs and corms need to be grown on separately in fairly rich soil.

A Century of Irish Sporting Heroes

Johnny Carey (1919-1995) Captain: Rep. of Ireland and Manchester United

Dublin born Johnny Carey must rank as one of the best bargains in the history of association football transfers. Manchester United bought him for £250 from St James' Gate FC in November 1936 and in the following seventeen years he was to win almost every honour available to him in the game. His signing was purely by accident as Manchester United chief scout, Louis Rocca had been chasing Bohemians star Benny Gaughan but lost out to Glasgow Celtic. On a recommendation made by Billy Behan, Rocca then watched Carey playing with the "Gate", the rest is football history. Carey's firstteam debut for United came on September 23, 1937. Tom Jackson wrote the following in the local Manchester newspaper of the teenage inside forward "those who saw the game were unanimous in their view that he has the makings of a valuable player; his footwork at times would have done credit to an experienced man"

In his first season he helped Manchester United to make an immediate return to Division One of the Football League and won international caps for the Rep. of Ireland against Czechoslovakia, Norway and Poland. He went on to play for Ireland on thirty seven occasions, but the highlight of his International career came in May 1947 when he was chosen to play at righthalf and captain the rest of Europe against Great Britain in Hampden park Glasgow. A year later Carey took Manchester United to the Cup Final. They went in at half- time a goal down to Blackpool but a chat from the skipper in the Wembley dressing room steadied the side and they ran out winners 4-2. A league championship medal was longer in coming. For four consecutive seasons from 1948 to 1951, Manchester United finished second in Division One of the Football League. Johnny Carey missed only twenty matches in those four frustrating seasons. Reward finally came in 1952 when they took the championship by four points from Tottenham Hotspur. In the meantime Johnny Carey received another honour - in 1949 he was voted footballer of the year and impressed everybody with his address of thanks.

After the war Johnny Carey moved from inside forward to wing- half and then full- back where he consistently played a thinking, constructive game, his undoubted skills augmented by an excellent physique. How well Johnny would have fitted into the modern game where forwards come back and backs push up when possible. He was among the best all rounder football has ever known. Sir Matt Busby in his first season as manager of Manchester United appointed him as team captain. In style, technique and authority he was comparable to Sir Alf Ramsey who in the same period exercised a similar

influence in the Tottenham side. Sir Alf was later to manage the England team to win the World Cup in 1966.



Though a Dubliner and like many thousands like him, Johnny joined the British Army during World War Two. His duties took him to Italy where he found time to play with great success for certain professional clubs. He was known affectionately as "Cario" by the local fans. His versatility and his skills impressed the Italians, as were the fans at Stamford Bridge when, in a crucial game against Chelsea, he took over in goal from the injured Jack Crompton. United held on to win. Johnny Carey made 344 first team appearances for Manchester United (304 League) and would have made many more had the war years not intervened. He retired in 1953 and went into football management. After taking Blackburn Rovers to promotion to Division One of the Football League he went on to manage Everton for three years. He then joined Leyton Orient and was successful in winning promotion to the top division for the first time in the club's history. He subsequently managed Nottingham Forest for five seasons and then returned to Blackburn where he finished his managerial career. Johnny Carey was one of Ireland's best ever football players. He was highly respected at home and abroad and in the manner he played and thought about the game he was probably years ahead of his time.

Lest we forget

Our debt to Germany and France: The driving force for CAP

To those of us born long enough ago to remember tenements in Kevin Street and industrial concerns employing more than a thousand people numbered in single figures, the last thirty five years has seen a total transformation in the Country's fortunes. Dublin City shopping started in George's Street, took in Grafton Street and ended generally in Clerys and Arnotts in the City centre. Money was scarce and people did not buy on credit. The clothes people bought were considered essential and were generally saved for before purchase. Genuine poverty was widespread and many people did not get the medical attention they deserved because they could not afford the doctor's fee. It was a time that many Irish people did not expect that their fortunes would change in their lifetime. Hope was thin on the ground and many thousands of people left for England, the States and Australia. As we all learned in school at that time Ireland was mainly an agricultural economy and there lay our main problem. We exported the bulk of our agricultural products to Great Britain. It is important at this juncture to remember the reality of our economic relationship with that country between 1800 and 1921 when we were part of the United Kingdom and also the relationship between the Republic of Ireland and Great Britain between 1921 and 1973. While we were supposed to be an integral part of the United Kingdom, Ireland was the poorest country in Europe and Dublin was the slum capital of the British Empire. The taxes and duties raised in Ireland by the British government were repatriated to London and only a proportion was sent back for the running of the Island. It was during that period of our history that our population was cut in half by the famine. From 1921 onwards the position did not change. Britain operated a cheap food policy and each year the Irish Minister for Agriculture had to go to London to be told what our export guotas for agricultural produce was going to be. The prices paid to Irish producers were also fixed at those talks. This price was below the Irish cost of production and represented just over break even for the advanced agricultural economies of Europe and the British Commonwealth. The Irish people were then expected to pay more for their food than their counterparts in Britain in order to subsidise the small farmers on the land. The effect of the British cheap food policy was to leave no funds available for investment in Irish farming and the industry remained stagnant for many decades. It is a historical fact that the price of agricultural land remained relatively unchanged for over four decades from 1916. The lack of money in agriculture seeped its way through the whole Irish economy. There were no funds available to invest in added value projects. Our former colonial oppressor was no help. Instead of helping to develop the economy of the fledgling free state, their political and economic policies were used mercilessly to hinder our development. Political decisions taken during the "Economic War" brought Ireland to its knees while the conduct of British Multinational flour Companies in monopoly trading positions were also questionable. The conduct of the British was in complete contrast to the behaviour of France towards its former colonies in North Africa. Once the French left countries like Tunisia and Morocco they maintained good relations by investing and developing the economies of the new North African countries. To this day they continue to protect the interest of their former colonies within the European Union. Our policy of neutrality during World War Two was never accepted by our neighbour or by the United States. The fact that the Irish Government would never have been able to win acceptance from the Irish people for a change in that policy cut no ice with the allies. As soon as the war was over our "friends" the British and the Americans moved to exclude us from the developing international community. Ireland was excluded from the Marshall Plan which was a development fund set up by the United States to help rebuild the European economy. How we could have done with those funds and the technical expertise that backed up the aid programme. The international isolation of Ireland orchestrated by these countries was merciless in its execution. We were excluded from the United Nations and were not allowed join until the mid fifties. What is extremely puzzling was the ineffectiveness of the Irish lobby in London and Washington. There were many millions of Irish Americans living in the States and their failure to change American policy at that time does them no credit. Their performance in helping their homeland comes a poor second best to the American Jewish community in helping their homeland, Israel.

In all of this there was a development that was to have a profound effect on the lives and fortunes of the Irish people. On May 9th 1950 French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman issued the following historic declaration. "It is no longer the moment for vain words, but for a bold act - a constructive act". France and Germany had torn each other asunder on three separate occasions in a seventy five-year period between 1870 and 1945. Millions of their young men lay buried in the muddy battlefield of Belgium and Holland. In making this statement Schuman was indicating that there had to be a new way forward. Konrad Adenauer, Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany was a willing listener. The new beginning started with a coal and steel free trade agreement and within a short space of time Holland Belgium and Luxembourg embraced the concept with the Italians joining later. The most

exhilarating feature of the new concept was that it was to have no limits. Even at an early stage the participants were discussing a European Court of Justice, a European Commission and even a Federal Europe, their overriding aim was to eliminate conflict and hand a better future to the young people of Europe. Even at this stage our neighbour was making mischief. The French, although anxious to include the British, were convinced that the Government of the United Kingdom was not interested in participating in this new venture. A fundamental policy for the developing Union of States was the Common Agricultural Policy. A major industry in both Germany and France, agriculture was a major priority with both governments. They had a policy of making sure that the farmer got an economic price for his products and made enough money to keep himself and his family on the land. If that meant substantial subsidies from the European Union Finances, so be it. None of this was good news for the United Kingdom, learning nothing from their negative military involvement in Continental Europe down the centuries they continued to work against the coming together of European Nation States. Charles de Gaulle delayed Irelands entry to the Common Market, as it was conditional on the United Kingdom also gaining admission. This great Frenchman recognised the British potential to destroy this great adventure and continually vetoed the United Kingdom's application for entry for over a decade. It was only after he left office that France relented and Ireland was accepted for membership in 1973. For the next twenty-five years Ireland gained a new life. Successive Irish political leaders had warm and good relations with their counterparts in Germany and France. Ireland was perceived as pro European and grants from the European social fund necessary to develop our roads and rail services were giving generously. The changes brought about by the introduction of the Common Agricultural Policy into Ireland were fundamental. There was now a lot more money in circulation. We saw the development of the Irish multi national food industry. More people were getting jobs in their own areas as the country entered a new era in prosperity. Our entry to the Common Market was the best thing that ever happened to the Irish nation. Our economic misery when tied to our neighbouring island is now a thing of the past. It would be well for those elements within the current Government, who wax lyrical about the advantages of the "free market" as played out in Britain and the States, to remember where we came from, and who our real friends were when we needed to be taken out of our economic bog. There is no doubt that America and Britain have made important contributions to the development of Irish investments made by American The information technology firms have been substantial and have resulted in thousands of jobs. The success of many Irish people in the United Kingdom shows that provided you were good enough there were no barriers put in your way. We should be appreciative of that and thankful that both countries provided so many jobs for our emigrants. Our culture for better or for worst is now firmly entrenched in the Atlantic axis of Britain and the States. In the final analysis however it was Germany and France and the other members of the European Union who changed Ireland for the better. It was the economic policies of the Union especially in relation to the Common Agricultural Policy that made such a dramatic impact on the people of Ireland. For that we should be forever thankful.

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Farewell, the People's Pope

Pope John Paul II, who died after a long-term illness on April 2, was an exemplary priest, a progressive Catholic and an extraordinary person. Ever since his coming to Papacy in 1978, he became known as the People's Pope.

Together with people all around the world, we are lamenting his death and in memory of the People's Pope, we would like to go back in time to autumn 1979, when the Pontiff came over to Ireland. It was an unforgettable time and it is particularly memorable to us due to his visit to Maynooth on October 1, 1979.

During his 26-year pontificate John Paul II constantly travelled and visited over 100 countries. He was bringing over the message of peace and reconciliation, and acted as an ambassador, reuniting churches and peoples all over the world.


His visit to Ireland was a short 3-day stay, but will be remembered by two and a half million people who attended the Masses in Dublin, Killineer (Co. Louth), Galway, Knock (Co. Mayo), Maynooth and Limerick. The Mass in Dublin's Phoenix Park alone gathered over 1.25 million people, and it was assisted by nine cardinals and a hundred bishops.

The message the Pontiff was bringing was the one of peace, and in the Ireland of 1979 this message was truly welcome and taken to the heart. The visit of John Paul II happened shortly after killings in the Donegal Bay, and the Pope addressed this in his appeal against violence:

"On my knees I beg you to turn away from the paths of violence and to return to the ways of peace <...> Further violence in Ireland will only drag down to ruin the land you claim to love and the values you claim to cherish. <...> To Catholics, to Protestants, my message is peace and love."

The controversial situation and security reasons prevented the Pope from visiting Northern Ireland, and this called off the Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Armagh. This again was reflected in the Pontiff's appeal to the young people at a youth Mass in Galway:

"Do not listen to voices which speak the language of hatred, revenge, retaliation <...> The true courage lies in working for peace."



Founation Stone blessed by the Pope

During his visit to St. Patrick's College in Maynooth, John Paul II addressed the seminarians, religious brothers and sisters, and thousands of priests who gathered there. The Pope spoke about the mission of the priest and recalled the life of Saint Patrick:

"The destiny of an entire people, — your people — was radically affected for time and eternity because of the fidelity with which St. Patrick embraced and proclaimed the word of God, and by reason of the fidelity with which St. Patrick pursued his call to the end." He concluded: "To all of you I say: this is a wonderful time in the history of the Church. This is wonderful time to be a priest, to be a religious, to be a missionary for Christ."

The Pontiff's visit to Maynooth was also marked by the blessing of the foundation stone for the new library. This stone of the blue limestone was donated to the college by the community of the Cistercian monastery of Mount Melleray in Co. Waterford.

The John Paul II Library, which today proudly bears the name of the late Pontiff, became an important place for seminarians of the college and lay students who pursue their education at the university of Maynooth. Speaking of the future of St. Patrick's College, the Pope addressed it as "a school of priestly holiness, an academy of the theological learning, a university of Catholic inspiration".

The Pope's visit to Maynooth was long-awaited and was attended by over 70,000 people who came over for a vigil night and the Mass. Although it did not last long, the visit of the Pope John Paul II is remembered today, over 25 years later.


Mass services all over the country were served to commemorate Pope John Paul II. Millions of people from all over the world came to Rome to say farewell to the People's Pope. The Church officially mourned the death of John Paul II for nine days and his burial took place on April 8.

People from the local community who have attended the Mass in 1979 shared their memories of the Pontiff's visit:

Marie Kelly, local resident:

They had opened the college grounds on that day. It was a misty morning and his arrival was delayed. The Pope was brought over by the helicopter and was driven to the Chapel.

Firstly, he went over to speak to all the students and professors and after that went over to the red podium installed at the back of St. Mary's. The Pope was not talking for a long time and his stay in Maynooth was not long either. But everybody was afraid he wasn't going to visit us, and when he arrived it was truly great!

Monsignor Alexander Stenson:

In fact, I was in both, Dublin and Maynooth during the Pope's visit. In the Phoenix Park, I was responsible for the Holy Communion on that extraordinary day. The Pope's visit gathered over a million people.

I have a very special memory of our Maynooth visit. At that time I was a staff member of the Clonliffe College. We travelled down to Maynooth on the morning of October 1, 1979. I was in the Chapel with the students. James Galway with the New Irish Chamber Orchestra was playing that morning. The night before there was a vigil prayer from 11 pm until 7am in the morning. Students and priests were up all night praying.

As I recall, there was a delay in the visit and everybody was afraid the Pope wouldn't arrive. Nevertheless, when he entered the church doors and the students gave him a huge reception. They welcomed him so enthusiastically, and I thought they would never stop. Then the Pope gave them what I would call 'a powerful look' and finally managed to get them quiet.

I believe we were truly graced to have such a great Pope, in his person we had a living embodiment of Christ, the priest, the teacher and the shepherd.

May be it will be interesting to know about the return visit, which happened in 1980. As you know, the Pope had such a great welcome in Ireland, so the young Irish people were welcomed to come over to Rome, and thousands of them went. Late Archbishop Ryan and Bishop Forristel accompanied these young adults during the visit. Many priests went as well and were all given groups of 30-40 people to look after. I myself lived in the Vatican for 3 years, and like many of us was a guide to all the young people. Within a week, we visited Rome, concelebrated mass with the Pope John Paul II and were at the Barbecue in the Papal Palace.

Useful Tips

Grease spots

- If you're in a hurry to remove a grease stain, apply shampoo to the stained fabric, then rinse and blow-dry.
- Absorb the grease from a fresh stain with corn flour or talcum powder. Leave on the spot for up to 12 hours, brush off, then wash the fabric.
- To remove grease stains from washable fabrics, wash in a detergent solution as hot as the fabric will bear. Use a commercial stain remover on carpets or on stubborn stains.
- Get rid of grease stains on white shoes with nail polish remover. (Be careful not to remove the shoe's finish.) for other colours, use a commercial shoe stain remover.
- Wash car oil from hands with laundry detergent and water. Swarfega Hand Cleanser works too, and can be rubbed into heavy grease marks on fabrics before washing. Rub away grease and tar on hands with cooking oil.
- To remove greasy heel marks from vinyl or linoleum floors, try silver polish or furniture wax.

Ring stuck on your finger

- Don't try more than a couple of times to pull the ring off your finger. If you inflame the knuckle it will swell and make the ring more difficult to remove. Simply moistening your finger in your mouth should do the trick.
- Drip some olive oil around the ring, massage some petroleum jelly into your skin, or rub soap around the ring and wet it slightly. Then try to ease it off.
- If your finger or knuckle has swollen, soak it in iced water to reduce the swelling, or put an ice pack around it.

Mice

- Block up your mouse holes! Gaps around pipes, broken air-bricks and ill-fitting doors will all let mice through.
- Kill them with kindness, with a bait of mouse killer. Some brands send them to sleep before they die.
- If mice persist, call your local Environmental Health Officer or a pest control company.
- If you use standard snap traps, don't fall for the old cartoon cliché of baiting them with cheese. Use small pieces of peanut butter, nut chocolate or cooked bacon instead; mice seem particularly fond of them.

Dog chasing

- Cyclists and joggers can take a few precautions to protect themselves against being chased by dogs.
- Carry a folding umbrella to shoot open in the animal's face.
- If you can't outdistance a pursuing dog on your bike, dismount and use the bike as a shield. If necessary, try squirting the dog in the eyes with your water bottle.
- Keep dog treats, such as biscuits, in your pocket. Throw one in the direction of an approaching dog - as far as you can.
- Carry a personal 'dog alarm'. This is a pocketsized alarm which emits a high-pitched noise that arrests the dog's behaviour. It is an aerosol and is sold with refills.
- Speak to the dog in a commanding but calm tone.
- Draw the owner's attention to the fact that his dog is a nuisance and it is his responsibility to put the dog on a lead or train it not to chase people.

Puffiness

- If your hands are puffy, hold them over your head for a couple of minutes; repeat at least three or four times a day. Lift swollen feet and keep them raised for a minimum of 15 minutes.
- If too much sun causes your lips to swell, use a sunblock (spf 15) specifically designed for lips.

Around the eyes

- Since many moisturisers plump up the skin, apply them sparingly around your eyes or try using a special eye cream.
- The cause of your puffiness may be water retention; cut down on salt and eat more bananas and grapefruit, which are natural diuretics. Raise the head of your bed or sleep on two pillows to keep your head elevated.
- Apply soothing compresses of cold milk, cucumber slices, borage tea, or a mild astringent over your eyes for 15 minutes at the end of each day.
- Throw away your frosted eyeshadow it accentuates puffiness.

The letter from Eoin beautifully captures the joy and the happiness brought to children with life threatening illness by the activities of the Foundation.

Make-A-Wish Foundation

It all began in 1980 when a seven-year old boy suffering from leukaemia wanted to be a policeman. His local police force granted his wish by giving him his own badge, custom made uniform and helmet. "My trip to meet Tom Morello (Guitarist of Rage Against the Machine and Audioslave)"



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
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Question

Can you please give the new rates of payment for Child Benefit?

Answer

Child Benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. You must satisfy a habitual residency condition or be entitled to it under EU law. Generally, if you have been resident in Ireland, Northern Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man for the two years immediately prior to applying you are considered habitually resident.

To qualify a child must be dependent on you and must also be:

- Under age 16 or
- Aged 16,17 or 18 and attending full-time education or a FÁS Youthreach course or have a physical or mental disability.

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living separately it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, the it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2005 the Child Benefit rates are as follows:

Child Benefit claimants paid by electronic methods receive the increased rate in full from April 2005. those on book payments receive the increased rate through a special payment in May, backdated to April. Application for Child Benefit is made on Form CB1 for children under 16 years of age and on Form CB2 for a child aged16 or over. Question

I heard there are changes to the means test for Carer's Allowance. What are they?

Answer

Carer's Allowance is a means tested payment from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for carers of certain people in need of full-time care and attention. The person must have so severe a disability as to require continuous supervision and frequent assistance throughout the day in connection with their normal personal needs and to require the care for at least 12 months. A carer normally resides with the person being cared for, but a non-resident carer may qualify for the allowance. The carer must also satisfy a habitual residency condition.

There are a couple of changes to the means test for the payment the most significant of which is the change to the assessment of capital/savings. From the 7th April 2005 capital/savings are assessed as follows:

Capital	Weekly Means Assessed
First €20,000	Nil
Next €10,000	€1.00 per €1,000
Next €10,000	€2.00 per €1,000
Balance	€4.00 per €1,000

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(This formula for assessing capital/savings will be extended to all other social welfare payments apart from Supplementary Welfare Allowance from June 2005.)

Under these new rules a single person with no other income can have savings of just under €28,000 and still get a full Carer's Allowance. This is doubled in the case of couples. The maximum rate of payment for 2005 is €153.60 if caring for one person and €230.40 if caring for more than one, plus extra amounts for child dependents.

The other change relates to income from work. A carer receiving Carer's Allowance can work for up to 10 hours per week, providing they get approval from the Department. From April 2005, the weekly income disregard increases from €250 to €270 for a single person and from €500 to €540 for a couple.

In June 2005 recipients of Carer's Allowance will receive a Respite Care Grant of €1,000 for each person being cared for.

Question

My son occasionally misses school. Am I obliged to inform his school about his absence? How may days can he be absent in a year?

Answer

Yes, you must inform the school. The Education (Welfare) Act 2000, which set up the Nation Education Welfare Board (NEWB), places certain legal obligations on both schools and parents in relation to school attendance. The Act also raised the minimum school leaving age to 16 or on the completion of 3 years of post-primary education, whichever is later.

Under the Act, where your child is absent from school on a school day you must notify the principal of the school of the reason for the absence. It is best to do this in writing. Schools are required to keep a daily record of attendance for each student attending the school, including the reasons for non-attendance.

If a student is missing for more than 20 days in a school year the school principal must inform the NEWB. if your child is sick or is absent for other

good reasons, the NEWB will take no action. However, if there is concern about your child's attendance at school or about the reasons given, you may be visited by an Educational Welfare Officer who will discuss your child's education with you. The role of the NEWB is to ensure your child receives his entitlement to an education.

Question

We have to buy certain specialised equipment such as aids for eating for my son who has a disability. Can I get any financial assistance towards buying them?

Answer

You should be able to get a refund of the VAT you have to pay for the specialised equipment.

Under the Value Added Tax (Refund of Tax) (No. 15) Order, 1981 a refund of VAT is available on certain aids and appliances bought for use by a person with a disability. The aid or appliance must be for the exclusive use of the person concerned. Where the refund of VAT is claimed by another person with a disability and is in his/her sole possession.

The relief applies to the purchase of goods, which are aids and appliances designed to assist a person with a disability to become more independent in daily living and work. Examples of eligible goods range from eating and drinking aids designed solely for the disabled to large items such as specialised hoists and lifters. You can also claim a VAT refund on a computer required so that a person can pursue a course of education or carry out duties at work.

You will have to submit the original invoices for all goods in the claim and medical evidence of a disability may be requested.

Maynooth Tidy Towns enter National competition 2005

The application to participate in the National Tidy Towns Competition 2005 has been received from the Department for Environment, Heritage and Local Government and the closing date for entries is May 11th. The application is used by the committee to sell the best side of Maynooth and to identify and propose solutions to solve environmental and heritage issues in the town. The Tidy Towns judges will visit Maynooth on one occasion between the 1st June and July 31st and appraise the town under the various categories in the competition and award us a score. The committee is aiming for a score of 232 points this year an increase of 14 over our 2004 score. It is down to what the judges find when they come to town, so your support particularly for those eight weeks would be very much appreciated. The whole town benefits when the score is good.

Tidy Towns Clean up in 2005

Maynooth Tidy Towns' committee programme for 2005 includes a number of Clean Ups around the town. After the IBAL rating achieved in 2004 the committee felt that the best way to tackle the litter problem is to start with a once off clean up of the entire town. Clean ups continued in April with a major clean up on the Straffan Road behind the wall. This area is a bit of a dumping ground and we are looking at putting forward plans to Kildare County Council to deal with this unused area. The committee and friends sorted all the waste that was gathered up and recycled all the bottles and cans in the recycling centre in the town car park. We will be contacting the residents associations in each area in the anticipation that we will be able to get some help.

Hanging Baskets in 2005

The committee is making plans to provide the attractive floral displays that have been in place for the Summer months in past two years. However, the cost of undertaking this project has escalated substantially over last year's amount. In addition, the committee had hoped to put them in place earlier than previous years because of the Nissan Irish Open taking place in mid – May at Carton. However, we need the financial support from the businesses in the town to undertake this plan and we will be contacting our generous supporters again this year. The committee has also applied to Kildare County Council for a grant towards this project and we are awaiting a response.

Residents Association work is welcomed by Maynooth Tidy Towns

Maynooth's score in the National Tidy Towns Competition has remained reasonably constant in terms of the points awarded for the condition of residential areas. This is due to the ongoing quality standard of maintenance supported by residents. We know that the funds for this work are coming directly from residents and congratulations to everyone for their support. Leinster Print Studio exhibition in Riverbank Arts Centre, Newbridge, County Kildare

Thursday, 6th April—Saturday, 7th May

Leinster Printmaking Studio, with the patronage of His Excellency, the Indian Ambassador, Mr Kumar, has organised a travelling fine-art contemporary art exhibition on the theme of cross cultural connections between Ireland and India. This exhibition begins its tour in Riverbank Arts Centre, Newbridge, where it is on display from Thursday 7th April to Saturday, 7th May.

The show, titled *Where Siva meets Medb*, celebrates two of the great legendary figures in the respective mythologies of the two people. The manner in which the individual artists have responded to the challenge of the Indo-Celtic *Where Siva meets Medb* theme, are as various as art itself, veering from the art-historical to feminist, to the environmental.

This is a pioneering venture for an Irish print studio in looking beyond the conventional preoccupations of Irish art, towards a multicultural world.

The Leinster Print Studio

The Leinster Print Studio, founded in 1998, follows in a type of succession in the proliferation of Irish printmaking studios, as artists who have learned their craft in one major studio, leave to establish a new studio somewhere else in the country. In this manner, Margaret Becker, as one of the founders of the Leinster studio herself, began printmaking at the Graphic Studio in 1972 and worked there for many years. Each studio as it becomes more professional, develops certain areas of interest, either in traditional print practices or in new media. Both approaches can be seen in this exhibition, where the more familiar media of intaglio and relief prints are shown side by side with carborundum and digital media, newcomers to the field of printmaking.

Collinstown Major Town Centre in Amended County Development Plan

Despite massive opposition from the County Manager and his Consultants, Cllr. John McGinley's and Cllr. Paul Kelly's motion, "that Collinstown be the major Town Centre instead of Maynooth", was passed overwhelmingly by the full council.

The Amended Draft County Development Plan has gone on public display until April 29 so that the public will have a further opportunity to make their views known.

The Council must approve the new Plan before May 22.

Meadowbrook Link Road

As residents will be aware the scheduled opening date from the new link road was the end of March. Cllr. John McGinley expressed his disappointment at the Leixlip Area Meeting on April 15 that the deadline had not been met and he demanded that the Council do everything possible to have it opened before the end of April. The link road is being constructed by Albany Homes in lieu of development levies on their Straffan Woods houses and Cllr. McGinley was advised that there was no contract in place. The Council are relying on the condition in the planning permission that states "The road and all associated works are to be completed and opened to the public before any of the proposed development units are occupied." At Cllr. McGinley's insistence the Council Officials have agreed that in future there will be a written contract for such works i.e. work in lieu of levies. The "Taking in Charge" process of the link road was advertised in the local papers on April 14.

Dumping at the Maynooth Recycling Centre

Cllr. McGinley proposed at the Area Meeting of the Council on April 15 that the recycling centre in the Council car park in Maynooth be closed down unless a proper management structure is put in place immediately. That means that CCTV cameras must be erected and the Council must follow up and fine the people who are doing the dumping. Cllr. McGinley has asked the Council to approach Tesco with a view to getting a state of the art recycling centre at their complex on the Dublin Road.

The Avenue entrance/Dublin Road/Doctors Lane

Cllr. John McGinley has been campaigning for some time to have the work at the Avenue entrance completed and to have the hard shoulder and footpath reinstated from Hands Corner to Leinster Park entrance. John got the following progress report at the Area Meeting on April 15:

- " This matter was addressed by the undersigned at a meeting of the Area Committee some time ago. In brief terms, there were three drawings circulated."
 - (a) Charter House Scheme Proposed bus lay-by and traffic calming
 - (b) Proposed one-way system for Doctor's Lane
 - (c) Dublin Road proposed pavement and parking scheme.

A total of €90,000 was available from development levies as reported previously. It had been hoped that the Charter House scheme would be grant aided by the Dublin

Transportation Office and that the levy funds could, therefore, be used to carry out of development. further phase Regrettably, as previously pointed out, D.T.O. funding was withdrawn and the levy was spent in its entirety on the Charter House Scheme. The total cost of the scheme was estimated at €105,000, the balance of €15,000 being defrayed from revenue sources. Copies of the relevant drawings have been forwarded to the Meetings Administrator. These two further schemes remain prioritised but are contingent on funding being identified".

Cllr. McGinley stated that there is no shortage of funding for such work in Maynooth and that he did not want the issue of funding being used as an excuse. He pointed out that there are levies available from developments in the area to cover such works i.e. Tesco, Glenmoy Developments on the Dunboyne Road (€756,000) and the Apartment Development at Charter House.

Drawings were produced for the introduction of a one way system at Doctors Lane, inwards from Dublin Road to Geoghegans Lane and two way from there to Straffan Road. Cllr. McGinley asked if the proposal was consistent with the Integrated Framework Plan for Land Use and Transportation (IFPLUT) for Maynooth. The Officials agreed that this was an important issue and they will check the INPLUT proposals for this location.

Cllr. McGinley would appreciate if members of the public made their views known to him.

Transfer of Amenity Lands to the GAA & the Schools At the time of writing it would appear as if the long awaited transfer of lands on the Moyglare Road from the landowner to the Council has now taken place. Hopefully, there won't be much delay in drawing up leases so that the GAA and the Schools can use the land.

There will be a report for the next Area Meeting on the progress being made on the transfer of lands between Carton Avenue and the Boreen to the Council for the new public park.

Harbour & Carton Action Area Plans

A meeting has been scheduled for the May 4 in order to agree on the outstanding issues arising from the submissions from the public. Cllr. John McGinley has stated that there should be no

approval of the Action Area Plan until the land at Carton Avenue is transferred to the Council.

There will be a meeting at the end of May to consider the submissions on the Harbour Action Plan.

Improvements Works at O'Neill Park, Maynooth

As a result of Cllr. John McGinley's motion the Council have agreed to carry out the following works at O'Neill Park:

- 1. Put a cul de sac sign at the entrance.
- 2. Remove the stump of the broken bollard at the entrance to the estate.
- 3. Top the three beech trees on the grass verge within the estate.

The Council will investigate the following additional works asked for by Cllr. McGinley:

- 1. Resurface the road at the entrance to the estate.
- 2. Refurbish the copings
- 3. Resurface the Square

Moyglare Abbey "Taking in Charge"

It was agreed at the Area Meeting on April 15 that Moyglare Abbey estate would be taken in charge. The decision will go for full Council approval on April 25.

Dumping of Rubbish at Kingsbry behind the bus stop Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to remove the rubbish dumped here and to fine those responsible.

As requested by the Residents' Association John has asked the Council to remove the shrubs from this location and also to remove damaged trees and any others that are deemed necessary. The shrubs have completely overgrown and are out onto the road in front of the houses. Their removal should deter people from dumping rubbish here.

Dumping Rubbish at the Obelisk

Following a request from Cllr. John McGinley the Council have agreed to remove the rubbish dumped at the Obelisk at Barrogstown. John has also asked that the OPW be asked by the Council to ensure that the area is kept litter free in future.

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New Book By Maynooth Authors

Hanging Crimes: When Ireland used the Gallows

The idea for this book came about when a small number of post-graduates who had just completed their MA in local history, got together to decide what the "next project" was going to be. It soon emerged that we all had come across murder cases or cases involving other capital crime while doing previous research. Through contacts in the 'local history network' at NUI Maynooth, other contributors were included which resulted in ten stories in *Hanging Crimes*.

come from Kildare, Stories Kilkenny, Cavan, Roscommon, Tyrone, Dublin, Wicklow and Sligo ranging from 1799 to 1893. The narratives deal with those crimes which have an 'agrarian' context and those so called 'ordinary' crimes. Each story has been researched using a variety of primary sources. The narratives give a valuable insight into the lives and communities of ordinary people and the landlord class. Raymond Gillespie, NUI Maynooth, provides a valuable introduction that set the stories in context. The 'agrarian' tales of Sean Bagnall, Joe Clarke, Frank Sweeney, Margaret Urwin and Patrick Vesey share striking common characteristics. Poverty and destitution form a backdrop in which a downtrodden tenant community strove to survive under the harsh treatment and scrutiny of an overbearing landlord or land agent, be it man or woman. An incident or event finally pushed tensions to their limit that acted as a catalyst which resulted in violence and prosecution. With the exception of Margaret Urwin's story, 'approves' were instrumental in the undoing of the assailants.

In the 'ordinary' murder cases and rape cases personal motivation was the underlying impetus, although economic circumstances played its part. Theft, dispute over land, relationship difficulties, and insanity in the stories of Catherine Mullan, Susan Durack, Austin Stewart, Seán Ó Sullivan and Edward Wylie-Warren proved to be motives that had catastrophic consequences for the individuals, families and communities involved.

All of the stories give some insight into the legal procedures in dealing with such crimes during the nineteenth-century. Comparisons in the extremes of treatment and outcome are best showed in two stories. The evidence against the accused in Austin Stewart's story, Thomas Lidwell, of Osberstown House, a well-connected man of property was accused of the rape of Sarah Sutton, wife of his

friend. After long consideration the jury found Lidwell guilty but recommended mercy. He was sentenced to hang, which was later commuted to transportation for life. There is no record that he ever served his sentence. Certain lines of questioning were not pursued at the trial that leave the reader with a doubt about the crime and the parties involved

About the crime and the parties involved. Evidence from other studies suggest that for the higher classes it was not the guilty verdict that was shameful but the actual serving of a sentence with common criminals which was frowned upon. Family honour and the protection of property were the overriding concerns.



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
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
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Editorial

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
Nissan Irish Open

Question

What is the cost of a passport and how do you apply?

Answer

The cost of a passport depends on the type of passport and the rates are as follows:

 Standard ten-year passport for people aged 18-64

€75

 Standard ten-year passport for people aged 65 and over

€25

 Large ten-year passport for very frequent travellers

€100

- Three-year passport for children under age 3 €15
- 5 year passport for children aged 3 17 €25

There are additional fees for urgent and for out-ofhours emergency applications.

The application form (APS 1) for people living within the State is available from your local Garda station and from post offices. With your application and fee you must provide:

- Two recently taken passport photographs - the back of each photograph and the witness section of the form must be signed by a Garda Síochána.
- Proof of citizenship—if it is a renewal application your most recent passport is sufficient.

If you were born in Ireland and it is your first application or you are under 18 years of age the long form of your Irish Birth Certificate is required as proof of citizenship. Children born in Ireland since the start of this year and people born outside Ireland will require additional or alternative forms of proof. Information on what is required depending on your circumstances is supplied with the application form.

You can apply in person to the passport office for a passport or by post. You can also apply via the "Passport Express" service, available through the post office, which guarantees receipt of a passport within ten working days where applications are completed correctly with proper documentation. The

additional fee for this service is \in 7 per application or \in 10 for up to four applications sent together for a family.

Question

Is it true that the minimum wage has increased?

Answer

Yes, it is true. From the 1st May 2005 the national minimum wage is €7.65 an hour.

The National Minimum Wage Act 2000 was introduced in April 2000 setting the minimum hourly rate of pay. Since February 2004 the rate has been €7.00 per hour and now it has increased to €7.65. The rate applies to virtually all employees over age 18. Close relatives of the employer and statutory apprentices, such as apprentice carpenters and electrician, are excluded.

Employees under age 18 are entitled to 70% of the national minimum wage (NMW) which amounts to €5.36 per hour. If they continue to work in the same employment once they reach 18 they must be paid €6.12 per hour (80% of NMW) for the first year and €6.89 per hour (90% of NMW) for the second year.

Those over the age of 18 who are starting employment for the first time are entitled to 80% or €6.12 per hour for the first year, and 90% or €6.89 per hour for the second year.

In both cases, they are entitled to the full rate after two years. Employees undergoing training or a prescribed course of study are entitled to a percentage of the national minimum wage for hours worked.

If you have a dispute with your employer about the national minimum wage you can try to resolve the matter with your employer directly and if it is still unresolved you can refer your dispute to a Rights Commissioner of the Labour Relations Commission.

Question

I am working but I find it difficult to get to work due to my disability. Is there a grant available to help me buy a car?

Answer

There is Motorised Transport Grant available from the

Health Service Executive (HSE) towards the conversion or purchase of an adapted car.

To be eligible for the grant you must be between the ages of 17 and 66, have a disability such that it impedes you using public transport and you need to make adaptations to a motor vehicle in order to be able to drive it. The motor vehicle must be essential in order for you to make a living. You must be physically and mentally capable of driving and you must hold a full driving licence. You must also satisfy a means test.

In certain circumstances someone else may be approved to drive for the person with a disability where he/she is not physically or mentally capable of driving. Sometimes the grant may be made to a self-employed person or to a person who has not already taken up employment but would be able to do so if transport difficulties were overcome. On occasion a grant may be made to someone living in a very isolated area even though they may not be in employment.

You apply to your Local Health Office in the HSE for the grant. The maximum amount of the grant is €4690.

If you avail of the grant you will not be eligible for Mobility Allowance from the HSE for three years from the date of the grant.

Question

What is the European Health Insurance Card.

Answer

The European Health Insurance Card allows you to access public healthcare for treatment when visiting certain European countries should you become ill or get injured. It replaced the E111 and other E forms which had previously been required.

If you are going on a short stay to an EU country (excluding the UK), and EEA country (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway) or to Switzerland it is advisable to have a card to cover you and your family for public healthcare. The card is valid for up to two years and each person travelling will need a card.

You can apply for the card online at www.ehic.ie if you already have a Medical Card or a Drugs Payment Scheme Card. You can also download application forms from the website or get them from you local Health

Service Executive office or health centre. You will have to provide your name, address, date of birth and Personal Public Service (PPS) Number.

You should apply for the Card at least ten working days before travelling. If there is not enough time to get a card you can get a Temporary Replacement Certificate from the Health Service Executive instead for each person travelling, which will cover you.

Apart from people going on holidays, other people who should apply for the card are:

- Those going on business trips
- Those going to look for work
- Those posted to work in one of the countries mentioned, temporarily, but still paying tax in Ireland.
- Those going to do a course of study.
- Those going temporarily for any other purpose where healthcare itself is not the purpose

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The Kidnapping of Shergar

On the evening of Feb 12th 1982 a number of vehicles, driven by armed masked men entered the gates of Ballymany Stud near Newbridge Co. Kildare. The stud farm owned by the Aga Khan housed the dual Derby winner, the brilliant Shergar who was in the infancy of his stud career. The gates were unguarded as this was a different Ireland than we have to day. The vehicles drove through the darkness up a long winding drive to a small cluster of barns and cottages at the centre of the stud. At least two armed men knocked on the door of the house belonging to Jim Fitzgerald, the head groom at Ballymany. Bernard, Jim's son, opened the door to be greeted by masked men armed with automatic pistols. Having pushed their way into the living room they immediately intimidated the other six members of the family. Jim, hearing the commotion came running from another part of the house and was also taken captive. The father and son were then taken to the stallion barn and forced at gunpoint to identify Shergar. The horse was loaded into a horsebox and Jim was taken as a hostage to be released four hours later somewhere along the Naas dual carriageway. The horse was never seen alive again. Jim Fitzgerald advised the Gardai that the kidnappers has requested a two million pound ransom for the safe return of the horse. This ransom demand was repeated two days later by a phone call to Ghislain Drion, who looked after the Aga khan's interests in Ireland. His owner had syndicated Shergar for ten million pounds and thirty-four individuals took up the shares offered. The names of the shareholders represented "a who's who" of racing. Captain Tim Rogers and John Magnier from Ireland, Lord Derby and Lord Howard de Walden from the UK and Paul Mellon and John Gaines from the United States. With so many people involved there was always going to be difficulties in getting agreement as to how the matter should be handled. First there was no clear idea as to who was involved. There was little evidence available as to who carried out the abduction of the horse. It was reported at the time that initial Garda and Special Branch investigations indicated that it was not an IRA operation. It was also reported that His Highness, the Aga Khan, as spiritual leader of his people, had powerful enemies who would have had the motive to commit the crime. Another foe who stood up and identified himself, was Wayne Murty an American who had purchased the Boussac Estate including fifty-six horses from Marcel Boussac. Later a French court declared elements of the sale invalid and the Aga Khan ended up with the horses. Wayne Murty was livid and freely admitted, at the time, he was prered to get justice from His Highness. He denied involvement in the kidnap and no evidence was ever produced linking him with those who kidnapped Shergar. Secondly, the sheer number of shareholders involved put a block on attaining agreement on how the matter of ransom money was to be dealt with. Lord Derby in particular was not in favour of making such a payment. Thirdly, it was reported at the time that Superintendent Jimmy Murphy, the senior Garda in charge of the operation did not get the full disclosure of information or full co-operation from a number of the parties involved. Despite the thousands of words written and the claims of some journalists to have contact with people on the "inside" of the abduction, the trail went cold. The expert opinion now is that the horse was probably slain within days of his kidnap. Expert opinion also states some elements of an IRA gang helped a group of criminals to carry out this crime. Some one knows where he lies. It is hoped that a day will come when his remains will be finally laid to rest in the green pastures of Kildare, marked by a granite headstone where all good racing men can meet and reflect on the life of a great racehorse.

He loved the attention. When we arrived earlier that day at the farm and looked in on Shergar, Monsieur Drion's two young sons were in the stall with him, petting and grooming him. I have never seen a young stallion just out of training so gentle and friendly. He would be one of the most memorable commissions that I ever undertook".



Maynooth Tidy Towns

Maynooth will be in full bloom again this Summer



Thanks to the continuous financial generosity of the business community in the town Maynooth Tidy Towns has been able to plant and maintain the hanging baskets and floral displays in the town again this year. The Committee wrote to one hundred and ninety five businesses in the town and to date over one hundred and eighty have responded positively. This year for the first time we managed to secure a grant from Kildare County Council for this project. The flowers will be watered at least twice a week depending on the weather. As usual we are indebted to the Larine Court Garden Centre, in particular to Paul and Tina. More on this subject next month.

New Litter Awareness signage

In previous months we advised that we intended to raise awareness of litter in the town. To this end we put together a project which involved the purchase of six litter bins and signage at a total cost of €5,700 which was part funded by Kildare County Council. The new signage is intended to encourage people to use the litter bins rather than just dropping litter on the street. The new bins and signage will be erected on our behalf by Kildare County Council within the next few weeks.



IBAL Score improved – but is still bad

After last year's disastrous result when Maynooth was designated as a "Litter Blackspot" and Ireland's third dirtiest town, the committee awaited with some trepidation the result of the first IBAL Litter League judging for 2005. Last Year the league consisted of thirty towns and in 2005 that has increased to fifty seven towns. The IBAL league is not a competition for Tidy Towns Committees; it is a competition for local authorities, so we do not receive the reports.

The good news is that Maynooth has improved to a designation of "Seriously Littered" and came in thirty seventh out of the fifty seven towns in this year's league. The judge's comments included that St. Patrick's College/NUI, Maynooth was "litter free" which is a designation that was also awarded to them last year. The Railway Station was described as being an area that appears to be neglected. The Main Street was "badly littered" at the time of judging and in the Pound Park, a number of youths were committing acts of vandalism when the judges were doing the survey.

Back in January as part of our annual plan Maynooth Tidy Towns set as a priority the achievement of a major improvement in our IBAL score which means the elimination of litter blackspots. We have arranged in excess of twenty clean ups around the town in some areas such as behind the wall on the Straffan Road which had not been done for many years. Some areas have been cleaned several times. We even spent a total of forty hours cleaning up the Railway Station Car Park and the Canal Bank as seen in the photographs in last month's Maynooth Newsletter. In addition the substantial efforts of Kildare County Council staff in keeping the town centre litter free means that a lot of resources go into this work. The one area that is not being tackled is enforcement by the ongoing absence of a litter warden.

Cameras on the Recycling Centre in the Council Car park

Maynooth Tidy Towns is aware that the erection of cameras is imminent at this site in an effort to end dumping. Technicians were on site last week and the cameras are currently in safe storage in the town awaiting the erection of a pole. The power source has been secured so it will hopefully be action and take before too long.

Maynooth Tidy Towns had called for the removal of the recycling centre unless action was taken to prevent it contributing to the litter problem in the town.

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



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Useful Tips

Wine Stains

- If you spill wine on your clothing or a tablecloth, blot it up immediately with an absorbent cloth, and then sponge it with carbonated or warm water. If the fabric is washable, stretch the stained area over a small saucepan (hold it in place with a rubber band), and pour hot water through it. Wash normally, as soon as possible.
- On non-washable fabrics, sponge the stain with a cloth wrung out in warm detergent solution, followed by clean water. Dry-clean as soon as possible.
- If red wine is spilled on your carpet, sponge it with carbonated water. Blot well, then dab with a cloth wrung out in warm detergent solution, followed by clean water. If a stain remains, a 50-50 solution of glycerine and water can be left on the stain for up to an hour, then rinse it off and blot well.

Vases

- If there's a whitish film on the inside of your vase, fill it with vinegar or a weak solution of chlorine bleach and water.
- To remove water rings, rub them with salt. If the vase is narrow and you can't reach them, fill it with a strong salt water solution and shake until clean.
- Coat inside of a leaky vase with hot wax and leave it to harden. Or, if the vase is opaque, put a glass inside it to hold the water.
- Many household items make pretty vases.
 Teapots, carafes, copper kettles and pitchers are
 especially attractive. Put single stems in a
 wineglass or goblet. Let wild flowers or daisies
 spill out of a basket (first put them in a small
 waterproof container that won't show). For
 dinner parties, put a tiny bunch of violets or lilies
 of the valley in a small bottle at each place
 setting.
- If you vase has a wide mouth and the flowers need support for a neat arrangement, crisscross the opening with transparent tape it will hold your arrangement in place.

Shoe polish

- At a pinch, you can shine your leather shoes with floor wax or spray-on window cleaner.
- If you have run out of polish for dark brown and black shoes and boots use spray-on furniture polish.
- Rub real patent leather with milk this really brings up the shine. Use spray-on glass cleaner for plastic patent. A thin film of petroleum jelly works well too.
- For a high shine, squeeze a few drops of lighter fluid into your solid boot was - it will spread more easily and penetrate better. Or rub lemon juice into the leather after it's polished, then buff

- If you don't have a soft cloth to buff shoes with, use cotton wool or kitchen paper.
- To clean suede shoes, scrape off mud and remove excess dust with a vacuum cleaner attachment. Use a special suede cleaner or shampoo and follow the manufacturer's instructions. If the pile on suede shoes has flattened, hold the shoes near the steam from a kettle, and then brush the skin gently to raise the pile. Leave to dry.
- You can dye light suede shoes bright colours and black dyes that are specially formulated for suede. Light leather shoes can also be dyed, but dye colours are limited to black, brown and navy. If you want to change dark coloured leather to light colours, use shoe paints. These can also be used for plastic and fabric shoes, and come in a wide range of colours, but are not suitable for suede.
- Use a cotton bud to get polish in that space between the uppers and the soles.
- Cover spots on black suede by sponging a little black coffee on them; on white suede, use chalk.
- Take spots off the white rubber on trainers with steel wool dipped in detergent.
- If your polish gets hard, heat it in the oven or add a few drops of turpentine or white spirit to soften it.
- To keep your hands clean while polishing shoes, wear old gloves or cut the pockets out of old trousers and use them as mittens.

Exams

- Look after your physical needs. Get a good night's sleep, avoiding the temptation to cram last-minute revision far into the night. Eat a carbohydrate-rich breakfast, or lunch if the exam is in the afternoon. Take some boiled sweets to suck on when your energy flags.
- Read all instructions twice before you begin.
 When reading the questions, underline key words such as 'not' and 'except'.
- Budget your time. Divide the total number of questions by the allotted number of minutes to determine how long to spend on each question.
 If you you're taking too long on one, leave it and go on to the next.
- If you can make and 'educated guess' between two or three choices on a multiple-choice question, do so; the odds favour you - even if the exam has a penalty for incorrect answers. But if you haven't a clue, don't guess wildly between five or six choices.
- Begin with the easiest essay questions. If you don't have time to complete an essay, try writing an outline adding the explanation 'Ran out of time'.



Gardening tips for June

The garden comes into its own in June, and apart from watching everything grow and blossom, keeping the weeds at bay and watering if necessary are the most time-consuming occupations this month.

Watering. Water if possible *before* the plants show signs of flagging or wilting, and aim to soak the soil rather than merely wet the surface. Again, if possible, let the water fall like rain through the air, gathering oxygen and a little warmth; the finer the spray, the better the effect. Water in the cooler morning and evening hours of the day to make every drop count. If the use of a hose, sprikler and overhead irrigation is banned and the watering can must be used, add a little soluble fertiliser to make the water go further in meeting the needs. Ordinary domestic waste water from the bathroom or kitchen can usually be used let it stand for 34 hours to settle and use the clearer top water.



The Flower garden. Keep an eye on annuals and water in the early morning or evening in dry weather. Hardy annuals coming into flower this month should includew anchusa, bartonia, candytuft` (Iberis), Californian poppy (eschscholzia), gypsophila, larkspur (Delphinium ajacis), toadfax (Linaria), poppy, nightscrented stock (Matthiola bicornis), morning glory (Convolvulus major syn. I pomaea purpurea), love-ina-mist (Nigella damascena), and Virginian stock (Malcolmia maritima). Among half-hardy annuals quick off the mark are agreratum, African marigold, French marigold, lobelia, mesembryanthemum, nasturtium, nicotiana, petunia and verbena; and biennials such as Canterbury bells, stocks and sweet william. To keep them flowering from June to September, dead-head frequently.

The Vegetable Garden.


Sowing. Continue to sow the following: French beans and runner beans can be sown this month and up until early July in the south. Savoy cabbage ('January King', 'January Queen'); and cabbage ('Winter Monarch') for next spring's crop. Carrots 'Chantenay Early Red Core' and 'Early Nantes' for autumn crops. Successional sowing of lettuce ('All the Year Round', 'Arctic King', 'Avondefiance', 'Winter Density', 'Little Gem'), salad onion ('White Lisbon') and turnip ('Snowball').

Endive ('Green Batavian') for unusual winter salads. Parsley thinly on humus-rich soil after rain. Dress the seeds with bone flour and allow at least 4 weeks for germination.

The Fruit Garden. Net strawberries and bush fruits not grown in a fruit cage for protection against birds.

This goosebeerry fruits when they reach marble size. Use them for coking and let the rest grow on to dessert size.

Thin fruits on pear trees about mid-June to 2 or 3 fruits per cluster, to a sinlge fruit on young trees or trees with only moderate foliage. The more leaves, the bigger the crop that can be carried

Breakfast Booster

Serves 1

50g Odlums Porridge Oakflakes 125g yoghurt 75g fresh fruit Honey to drizzle

- 1 In a tall glass, layer oats, yoghurt and fresh fruit and repeat with a second layer.
- 2 Drizzle honey over the top and serve.

Lunch or Dinner

Potato and Vegetable Bake

Serves 4-6

225g carrots
1 large onion
30g butter
Salt and black pepper
1kg potatoes
125g grated cheddar cheese
250ml fresh cream

- 1. Peel and slice the carrots thinly, chop the onion and put both in a pan with the butter, salt and pepper. Add a little water and cook gently for 15 minutes.
- 2. Preheat your oven to 180°C/gas mark 4. Butter a flameproof dish. Peel and slice the potatoes thinly and arrange in layers with the carrot mixture.
- 3. Season well between each layer dotting with butter and sprinkling with cheese. End with a layer of potatoes, butter and cheese.
- 4 Pour cream over the top and bake for 1 hour until brown.

Serve with any meat or fish main meal.

Dessert

Apple and Rhubarb Crumble

Serves 4

4 Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and quartered
1tsp ground cinnamon
60gms brown sugar
125ml water
1 bunch of rhubarb, trimmed and rinced well
40g of sugar
½tsp ground ginger
100g self-raising flour
60g unsalted butter, softened

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220°C/gas mark 6. Cut apple quarters into 3 pieces. Spread in a greased baking dish and sprinkle with cinnamon and half the brown sugar. Pour over 125ml water and bake for 10 mins. Cut the rhubarb into 5cm lengths, add to the baking dish and sprinkle with the remaining brown sugar. Bake for 7/8 mins until rhubarb is soft but still holds its shape
- 2. Combine raw sugar, ginger and flour in a bowl. Rub in the butter until mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs.
- 3. Butter a large ovenproof dish and place on a baking tray. Put the apple and rhubarb mixture into the dish and drizzle with any pan juices. Sprinkle crumble mixture evenly over the top and bake for 25/30 mins until lightly golden. Allow to stand for 5 minutes.

Serve with cream.

particularly successful indoors, developing a shrewd tactical finish. It was this tactical acumen that was going to be deployed with such devastating effect in Melbourne. On his return to Ireland the following summer recorded a new national record for the half mile (1.50.00) and the mile (4.05.8). But he really broke into the front rank a year later at Compton, California when he became, with a time of 3 minutes 59 seconds, the seventh man in history to beat 4 minutes for the mile. The following evening he recorded 1 minute 49.5 second for the half mile. Returning to Dublin, he lost his form due to an injury he picked up at a meet in Paris. In the summer of '56 Ronnie returned early to Villanova to prepare for the Melbourne Olympics to be held in December of that year. Jumbo" prepared him with a 10-12 week programme of training over the terrain of golf courses, intermixed with speed endurance work on the running track. This programme, together with intensive gym work provided a solid basis for Delany's quest for the gold medal. However in the beat tradition of "Irish officials and green blazers" they nearly messed up again. Ronnie Delany was selected for the Irish team by a majority of one vote. He was notified at the very last moment and joined the remainder of the team as they prepared in Berkley California.



In the Olympics 1500 metres qualifying

heat he qualified quietly in third place. For the final he joined more than a dozen runners of whom Hewson(GB), Richtzenhain (Germany), Tabori (Hungary), Jungwirth (Czechhoslovakia), and Nielsen (Denmark) were strong finishers. In the race itself Ronnie trailed behind in tenth and eleventh place as Murray Halberg and Mery Lincoln set a scorching pace. At 800 metres he was 1.2 seconds down on Lincoln and at the end of the third lap before the bell he was still 0.7 of a second behind. Then his finishing speed was revealed as one runner after another was cut back and overhauled. He met the tape in 3 minutes 41.2 seconds. He was so relaxed he had time to smile. Richtzenhain was second and John Landy third. He did run faster races like a 3 minute 58.8 second mile in finishing runner up to Derek Ibotson.(GB). Ronnie Delany also took centre stage as Dublin witnessed one of the great mile races of the century at Santry(Morton) Stadium in August 1958. Billy Morton of whom words can not do justice for his contribution to Irish athletics organised the mile race of the century. Herb Elliott broke the world record by three seconds. Merv Lincoln in finishing second also broke the world record, Ronnie Delany ran a personal best in finishing third (3 minute 57.5 seconds) and the fourth and fifth broke 4 minutes. Ronnie Delany was perhaps one of the classiest athletes Ireland ever produced. He subsequently went on to win 34 consecutive indoor mile races in the United States and broke the world record time for the event. The manner of his victory in the 1956 Olympic 1500 metres was stunning and it is unlikely in view of the North African dominance of this event that we will ever see another Irishman repeat his feat.

Bond Bridge

At the Council meeting on 25 April the County Manager sought approval for increased funding for the Bond Bridge project, up from €5.6m to €6.788m. Cllr. John McGinley proposed that the increased funding be approved and this was agreed unanimously.

In his report the Director of Services that:

"I am pleased to inform members that all outstanding matters have been resolved and the Council are now in a position to sign the construction contracts as well as the agreements with Iarnrod Eireann and Waterways Ireland in order that works can commence. It is also pleasing to note that the Meadowbrook Link project, which is a prerequisite to this scheme, is very close to completion. As previously pointed out, it will be necessary to commence the scheme in May/June 2005 in order to finalise all preparatory work on site in order to make full use of the canal closure period which extends from November to February. Indeed, this timing requirement renders matters more complex."

Amended Draft County Development Plan

Councillors will be considering submissions received in respect of the Amended Draft County Development Plan at a meeting of the full Council on 16 May. The decisions on the submissions will be made by the County Manager if Councillors don't reach agreement by 22 May.

The most crucial submission, as far as the residents of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge are concerned, is that of Tom Phillips and Associates on behalf of The Trustees of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. They make the case for 392 acres of College

land on the Kilcock Road, Maynooth to be designated as the Major Town Centre for North East Kildare, instead of the lands at Collinstown. In the vote on the Amended Draft County Development plan it was agreed by 17 for, none against and 3 abstentions that the lands at Colllinstown were the best for the Major Town Centre. It would seem highly unlikely that Councillors will reverse that decision at their meeting on 16 May.

Children's Playgrounds Funding Approved

The Development Contributions Scheme agreed last year set a levy of €3,500 per new residential unit and €5 per square metre new commercial units for County Council capital spending on Recreation, Amenity & Community facilities. Cllr. John McGinley was successful in his proposal that these contributions should be ring fenced for use in the areas in which they were raised.

Cllr. McGinley proposed at the Council meeting on 25 April that the first use of these ring fenced funds should be for the proposed Children's Playgrounds in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge. John's motion was agreed and Planning Permission under the Part 8 process was also agreed. The Manager also agreed to Cllr. McGinley's proposal that the debris at the entrance to the Harbour Field be cleared up and that a secure gate be installed.

Public Lighting at The Harbour Area, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has been trying for the past six months to get Waterways Ireland, Iarnrod Eireann and Kildare County Council to install proper public lighting in this highly pedestrianised are of Maynooth. In reply to his motion at the Area Meeting of the Council on 21 January Cllr. McGinley was given an undertaken by the Meetings Administrator that he would organise an on site meeting of the three parties in order to

get agreement on this public safety issue. Cllr. McGinley stressed that the funding required was miniscule and that if it involved hundreds of thousands of euro it would probably be easier to get a decision. When Cllr. McGinley asked for a progress report at the following Area Meeting he was told by the Meetings Administrator that no meeting had taken place. To say that Cllr. McGinley was annoyed would be putting it mildly and he demanded that the Council Officials get their house in order before the next Area Meeting. In order to focus their attention Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Area Committee:

" That the following policy be adopted for the existing and proposed new public lights at The Harbour, Maynooth:

- That Kildare County Council accepts responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the existing and the proposed new lights for the area
- That Waterways Ireland proposal for the 11 new lights from Straffan Road to The Harbour be accepted i.e. Waterways would contribute 8,000 euro and KCC would contribute 3,000. (See their letter dated 7 December 2004)
- That Waterways suggestion that the opportunity also be taken to upgrade the existing lights from Leinster Street to the pedestrian bridge over the canal also be accepted.
- That funding from this year's Pubic Lighting allocation be used for this purpose"

Traffic Management in Maynooth

Council Officials have stated that the Integrated Framework Plan for Land Use and Transportation (IFPLUT) is intended to resolve Maynooth's Traffic Management problems. However, if the final report is anything like the consultants Interim Report we should not hold our breath. With this in mind Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That a co-ordinated traffic management plan be implemented for Maynooth, without any further delay, taking into account the Dulcedo Developments Proposed Traffic Management Layout dated 20/7/02, the Proposed One Way rch 2004 and the Integrated Framework Plan for Land Use and Transportation (IFPLUT), yet to be finalised."

Action Area Plans for The Harbour and Carton

A meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee was held on May 4 with a view to progressing these two Action Area Plans. It was agreed that no advancement of the Carton Action Area Plan would be made until the landowner transfers the land for the public park and the Community Centre to the County Council. Cllr. McGinley stated that he was still opposed to the high densities proposed and to the height of the proposed dwellings.

The planners stated that it would be the end of May before further progress could be made on the Harbour Area Action Area Plan as they are awaiting a new design for the proposed tunnel to the underground car park.

Tree Pruning

In addition to the tree pruning that he requested at Pound Park, Kingsbry Estate and Maynooth Park, Cllr. John McGinley has, at the requests of the Residents' Associations, also sought tree pruning at Beaufield Estate, Carton Court Estate, Railpark Estate/Straffan Road junction and at Newtown culde-sac (Houses 509 to 512).

Sign at Mizzoni Pizza Ltd.

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to get the owners of the new "Mizzoni Pizzas" (opposite the Bank of Ireland) to remove the massive ugly sign that they have erected. Such signs belong to a bygone age and should have no place in modern Ireland.

No Public Recycling Centre at ALDI

The planning permission granted for the ALDI store on Kilcock Road, Maynooth, had a condition that a public recycling centre be put in place. As the store has been opened for months and the recycling centre is still not in place Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to take action.

Deputy Stagg & Cllr. McGinley Object to Restaurant at 1 Pound Lane

Deputy Stagg & Cllr. McGinley have objected to the planning application of Farrell O'Boy at 1 Pound Lane, Maynooth, for a change of use from Residential to Restaurant and construction of a two storey extension. Some of their reasons for objecting are as follows:

The proposal is for a large restaurant, which includes a wine bar. It is intended to locate the restaurant in one of the last untouched residential enclaves off Main Street, Maynooth; namely Pound Lane. The area in question is residential, with 8 terraced

- houses and no commercial premises.
- The proposed Restaurant and Wine Bar will cause serious reduction in residential amenity for the residents of this area.
- It will have a negative effect on the quality of life of the residents of the area.
- It will cause noise and odour nuisances.
- It will increase traffic in the area. Patrons will park nearby causing further nuisance to residents in the area as no parking is possible on the site.
- The is contrary to para 4.1.12 of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 which states "The Council will seek to ensure that new development does not cause an unacceptable increase in noise and pollution levels affecting surrounding properties."

Extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent to proceed to Advanced Architectural Planning

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Education on April 20th that the required extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent will proceed through advance a r c h i t e c t u r a l p l a n n i n g .

The required extension comprises additional classrooms, resource rooms and a new General P u r p o s e s R o o m .

Architectural Planning for this extension commenced in 2001 and the announcement by the Minister means that the advanced architectural planning can n o w b e c o m p l e t e d .

Deputy Stagg stressed that it was important that once the planning for the project was completed that capital funding was sanctioned and he will continue to monitor progress on the project.

Maynooth Post-Primary Extension

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to pursue the provision of the required extension to Maynooth Post Primary Schoo.I

The Minister for Education advised Deputy Stagg in the Dail on April 12th that Co. Kildare V.E.C. were responsible for progress with the project following the Capital Funding approved on January 10th under the 2005 School Building Programme.

Deputy Stagg was in contact with Co. Kildare V.E.C. who indicated that advertisements will be placed in

newspapers in May seeking expressions of interest from contractors who want to tender for the project.

The extension will mean that the school will now be able to cater for a long term enrolment of 850 pupils and will ease the present overcrowding in classrooms and reduce dependency on temporary accommodation. The extension comprises of 6 General Classrooms, Demonstration Room, Computer Business Machines Room, Special Tuition Room, 2 Lecture Rooms, Administration Rooms and a Physical Education Hall.

Deputy Stagg will continue to monitor progress on the Extension

Electrification of Maynooth Railway Line

Deputy Emmet Stagg supports Iarnrod Eireann's proposal to electrify the Maynooth suburban rail line and has passed this issue along with the building of a new train station at Spencer Dock, which is critical to increasing the frequency of services on the Maynooth Line, with the Minister of Transport.

At present the Minister is assessing Iarnrod Eireann's proposals and Deputy Stagg will continue to apply pressure on the Minister and the Government to accept the plan put forward to Iarnrod Eireann.

Council decision to allow 4 & 3 storey development on former pitch and putt course a disgrace

Deputy Emmet Stagg has blasted Kildare County Council for granting planning permission for 80 dwellings on the former Pitch and Putt Course on Dunboyne Road, Maynooth. The proposal includes three 4 storey blocks of apartments and two 3 storey terraced blocks of houses.

Deputy Stagg had objected to the proposal along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley last July in support of the Residents of Leinster Cottages and Dunboyne road.

Criticising the decision by the Council, Deputy Stagg stated that the proposal was unsuitable for the following reasons:

- The proposed 4 storey blocks of apartments were monotonous and ugly, and were more suitable for the inner city of Dublin rather than Maynooth Village. The 3 storey terraced houses wee similarly unacceptable in design.
- The 4 storey blocks and 3 storey terraced houses will overlook the rear gardens of dwellings in Leinster Cottages and Dunboyne Road and will block a view of the Lyreen River

for the residents of Leinster Cottages which has existed for 200 years.

• The excessive heights proposed will impact on views from Pound Park.

The area borders the Architectural Conservation Area of Maynooth Town, as such the Historic Core of the Town. The proposal ignores the unique character of development in the area and as such damages its Architectural heritage.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Leinster Cottages area of the Town was a s old and unique as the Main Street area and he described as inexcusable the Council's decision to grant planning permission for this development.

Deputy Stagg will discuss the decision with local resident and vowed that ht would fight the decision in An Bord Pleanala.

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
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
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Editorial

Opening Doors to Learning By Serj Merzliakov

Maynooth Adult Day-time Education (MADE) is celebrating the 20th anniversary this year. Started in early 1985, MADE helped many people to go back to learning and even to grow through it.

Today I am meeting with Lise O'Farrell, the Chairperson of the Maynooth Adult Education Committee.

Lise, could you please tell how it all began?

Lise: It all started 20 years ago, when a group of people were doing a part-time course in Maynooth college and decided to establish a day-time education centre to help others to return to education. Their efforts grew with time and finally they managed to start MADE with the help of Kildare VEC. Today it is run by a committee of volunteers from the local community.

Originally, the Maynooth Education Centre ran over 10 classes a week — classes in French, Spanish, Maths, History, various art classes, Creative Writing and others. Sharing large facilities allowed us to vary courses as well as being open to the needs of people. This, in particular, resulted in opening a course in computer literacy, which we managed to run using computers in the local school.

What is the idea behind Maynooth Daytime Education Centre as opposed to evening classes?

Lise: Originally, the aim of MADE was to get people to learn something, to make new friends and better

themselves in some way. One of the classes was called "Get out of the house!" and gave a chance to many women to go back to education. I would like to mention that in some cases MADE helped them progress in their learning — some of them went to third level institutions and graduated with college degrees.


I know that recently you had to change your location, could you tell us about it?

Lise: The prefab next to the Post-Primary school, which we used to occupy, was a good facility and thanks to grants, we managed to maintain it. We would like to thank Intel, Kelt and Kildare VEC for helping us to do it. However, the situation changed and we had to relocate. For over a year we did not run courses, and finally restarted in September 2004. We are located in the building behind 'Three Pin Electrical' and run classes on the second floor of ACOL House.

What courses do you run now and who will be your students today?

Lise: At present, we run two classes – English for Non-Nationals (Mondays) and Yoga Classes (Wednesdays). We welcome students from any background and of any lifestyle, as it helps to have a diversity of people. We have students of all ages - our senior student is 80 years old and enjoying the yoga classes – we are glad to have such a mix! In the future, we are planning to open more classes, and hope to grow.

As you have touched upon it, what will be your aspirations?

Yoga Classes in ACOL House

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
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
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

Question

I understand the Respite Care Grant is being extended to all full-time carers. Can you please give the details?

Answer

The Respite Care Grant is paid once a year to certain carers of people in need of full-time care and attention. In previous years it has been paid by the Department of Social and Family affairs to those getting Carer's Allowance, Caret's Benefit, Constant Attendance Allowance or Prescribed Relative's Allowance. It has also been paid by the former Health Boards to those getting Domiciliary Care Allowance.

From June 2005 the grant of €1,000 will be paid to those getting one of the payments mentioned above as well as certain other carers providing full-time care. To qualify, if you are not receiving one of the payments, you must be:

- Aged 16 or over and ordinarily resident in the State
- Caring for the person on a full-time basis
- Caring for the person for at least six months this period must include the first Thursday in June e.g. 2nd June 2005
- Living with the person being cared for or, if not, be contactable quickly by a direct system of communication e.g. telephone or alarm

You do not qualify if you are working more than 10 hours per week outside the home, if you are getting an unemployment payment or if you are signing on for unemployment credits. You also do not qualify if you are living in a hospital, convalescent home or similar institution.

If you are caring for more than one person a grant is paid for each of them.

The person being cared for must have so sever a disability as to require full-time care and attention and must not be receiving it from someone else. He/she must not normally live in a hospital, convalescent home or similar institution. Attendance at a non-residential training course or day care centre is allowed.

If you are receiving one of the above carer's payments you will be sent the grant automatically. If you are not, you should apply on Form TDG1 which is available from your Social Welfare Officer or

Citizens Information Centre. If you are caring for more than two people you will also require Form RCG1 (a).

Further information on this and other carer's entitlements is available in the new edition of Comhairle's publication *Entitlements for People with Disabilities* which is available from the Citizens Information Centre.

Question

I will be claiming a full Contributory Old Age Pension from the Department of Social and Family Affairs shortly. My wife has no income in her own right but has capital of 60,000. Will I be able to claim for her on my pension?

Answer

Although the Contributory Old Age Pension is not means-tested pension, you will only receive a payment for your wife, called a Qualified Adult payment, if her weekly means are assessed as do not exceeding €220.00 per week. How much you receive will depend on how much her weekly means are assessed by the Department to be. Means include income and any capital or savings.

The formula used for the assessment of capital/savings for all means-tested social welfare payments, including Qualified Adult payments, changed from June 2005. under the new formula, capital/savings are assessed as follows:

First €20,000 is disregarded

Next \in 10,000 assessed at 1 weekly means for each \in 1,000

Next €10,000 assessed at 2 weekly means for each €1,000

Balance assessed at 4 weekly means for each €1,000

Note: this formula does not apply to Supplementary Welfare Allowance.

Under this formula your wife, who has capital of €60,000 and no other income, will be assessed as having a weekly means of €110/00. under the previous formula she would have been assessed as having €124.43 weekly means.

To receive a full Qualified Adult payment the maximum capital your wife can have is just under €55,000. as your wife has capital of €60,000, you should get a reduced Qualified Adult payment of €97.90 if your spouse has not yet reached her 66th birthday or €113.70 if she is 66 or over. Prior to the change you would have received €87.10 or €101.30 respectively. Anyone already receiving a social

welfare payment on the basis of the assessment of capital should qualify for an increased payment following this change in the formula for assessing capital/savings.

Question

I have an elderly aunt who lives alone. Am I entitled to any tax relief if I employ a carer for her?

Answer

You may be entitled to claim a tax allowance if you employ a carer to care for a family member who is totally incapacitated. You will no be eligible for the tax relief if the carer is employed as a housekeeper only.

The Tax Allowance for Employing a Carer is claimed at your highest rate of tax (i.e. 42 % or 20 %) and you can claim for the cost of employing the carer less any amount recovered from a Health Board/Health Service Executive, etc. Where two or more persons employ the carer the allowance may be shared between them.

Since January 2004, the maximum amount that can be claimed is the lower of either .

The actual cost incurred or

- €2,500 for each month the person was totally
- incapacitated i.e €30,000 for the year.

Previously the person had to be totally incapacitated for the whole year to be eligible for the tax relief. This is no longer the case.

The carer may be employed on an individual basis or through an agency. Any member of the wider family who engages the carer may claim the tax allowance against their own income. The wider family includes a blood relative, a relative by marriage or a legal guardian.

To claim the allowance you should complete Form HK 1, available from your local tax office. If you are a PAYE taxpayer, your Certificate of Tax Credits will be increased to include the relief due. If you pay tax under self-assessment, the Form HK1 should be attached to the tax return and relief will be given in your Notice of Assessment.

As it is necessary for you to employ a person to qualify for the allowance you will have to register as am employer, and deduct PAYE/PRSI. In certain circumstances, where the care is provided by an agency and the agency pays the carer directly, the agency will normally be responsible for deducting PAYE and PRSI. You will still be eligible for the allowance and should submit your claim on Form HK1 as usual.

Question

I am leaving school and starting my first job next month. What should I do so that I do not have to pay too much tax?

Answer

To ensure your tax is dealt with properly and that your employer deducts the correct amount of tax there two things you must do.

- You should give your employer your Personal Public Service Number (PPS No.). This number is your unique person identification number for the public services in Ireland. Your employer should then let your tax office know that you have started work and that they are your employer. If you do not know your PPS No. or you wish to apply for one contact your local Social Welfare Office.
- You should apply on a Form 12A for a 'Certificate of Tax Credits and Standard Rate Cut-Off Point' to your district tax office. If your employer does not have a Form 12A, you can get one from any tax office or by telephoning LoCall 1890 306 706.

To ensure that your employer and the tax office have time to have everything sorted out before your first pay-day, it is advisable to do all this as soon as you accept an offer of a job (even for part-time or holiday employment). The tax office will the forward you a detailed statement of your tax credits.

Your own personal circumstances dictate the amount of tax credits you are entitled to and therefore how much tax you must pay. All workers have tax credits - for example, a single person has a Personal Credit of €1,580 and an Employee Credit (previously PAYE Credit) of €1,270 in the tax year 2005. if you are single your tax is calculated on your gross pay at 20% of your earnings below €29,4000 and at 42% of the balance. This gives you your gross tax liability. Your tax credits are then subtracted from this figure and the remainder is the amount of tax you will pay. The tax you pay is spread over the tax year so that you receive approximately the same wages each week.

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Useful Tips

Tents

- Before taking a new tent on a camping trip, practise putting it up and taking it down. You may arrive at your campsite at night and you will need to know how to assemble it.
- out. Mend them with a patch of ready-proofed nylon, sewn on with polyester thread. Cut the patch about 2in/50mm bigger than the hole and stitch it to the inside of the tent. Do not pin the patch to the tent first, because this will puncture the fabric more than you need to. On the outside, cut the corners of the excess material diagonally, no more than 1in/25mm, turn the fabric under to make a hem and stitch it all round. Treat the stitches with wax and seal the edges of the patch with seam sealant.
- When you go camping, carry nylon repair tape, seam sealant and patches of ready-proofed material with you for temporary repairs. Beeswax or a stick of llip salve will seal small leaky areas where the hole is not visible. Patch any holes from the inside, except near or over seams - these should be patched from the outside.
- If your tent has a multi-section frame or poles, devise a system of marking the ends that fit together with coloured adhesive pvc tape. Either use the same colours on matching sections, or wrap the same number of tape strips around the ends that go together.
- Every 3 years or so, reproof your tent with a waterproofing product. Spread out the tent, outside up. Dip a brush into water and then into the reproof and brush on the solution. Allow it to dry and them finally work wax sealant into the outside seams.
- Avoid mildew or mould by folding up your tent only when it is completely dry. If this is not possible, make sure you put up the tent within the next 2 days and let it dry out.

Improvising a tent You can improvise a fairweather tent with a 10 x 10ft/3 x 3m waterproof groundsheet, a 10ft/3m rope, and a couple of poles, waterproof capes and shoes laces. Remember that this tent will be fragile and unable to withstand high winds or heavy rain.

- Drive a pole (a straight, sturdy 5-6ft/1.5 1.8m stick will do) into the ground so that it stands erect. Centre the groundsheet over the pole and lash a shoelace around the top.
- Weigh down one edge of the groundsheet with rocks. Place the other pole under the opposite edge of the groundsheet to form a door; lash it with the other shoelace.
- Guy the top of the front pole to the ground with rope. (If you don't have a peg to secure the guy rope, tie the end to a stick and bury

it.)

- Secure the sides of the groundsheet with more rocks.
- Drape both capes over the door, hanging them by their hoods from the pole.

Sea sickness

There's no cure for sea sickness once it strikes, but there are measures you can take to prevent it from happening or to relieve it.

- Take travel sickness pills half an hour before you start your journey. Check with your doctor or chemist that any medication you are already taking is compatible.
- Don't drink alcohol and don't travel on an empty stomach. Eat bland, easily digestible food.
- Try to keep yourself occupied by talking, playing games or listening to music.
- Get up on deck if possible. Fresh cool air and wind help to reduce nausea.
- Try eating crystallised ginger it settles the stomach.
- You can buy wrist bands with a little knob that presses on a point on the inside of the wrist just above the hand. These are said to be based on Chinese methods of treating illness by using pressure points. They are available from chemists.

Nicotine stains

- Are your fingers stained with nicotine from cigarettes? Rub lemon juice onto them, or gently scrub the skin with a pumice stone. Then smooth on some hand cream.
- Has the nicotine from heavy smokers marked your walls and ceiling? Scrub the surfaces lightly with a soft brush and diluted washingup liquid. Do the ceiling before washing the walls. If it is not possible to shift the discoloration, you may have to cover the surfaces with aluminium sealer and then paint the room again.

Mattresses

- To keep a mattress from sliding around on its foundation, put a nonslip rubber mat between the two.
- To even out the wear, turn a new mattress over and reverse it end to end every 3 weeks for 3 months - and every couple of months thereafter.
- Don't use the handles on the mattress to lift it.
 They're not designed to take the full weight but only to move the mattress around while it's on its base.
- Air a mattress in the sun occasionally to keep it fresh and clean smelling.

Gardening tips for July

If the warm summer days are not too dry, even masochistic gardeners should be able to enjoy the fruits of their labours and relax.

Compost: A compost heap started now and carefully managed will be ready for use when digging in the early winter. This means gathering and economically and efficiently rotting down the organic and plant waste of garden and home into humus-forming manure. Raw materials are organic animal and plant residues, soft plant stems, leaves, lawn mowings, soft prunings, spent flowers, discarded leaves and stems of crops, hay, straw, shredded newspaper, kitchen waste, crushed eggshells, wool, even sawdust - but now flowering or seeding weeds, tough perennial weed roots, diseased plants, woody plants or prunings, man-made fibbers, plastic or metal.

Build the heap square in shape. A 1.5m (5ft) cube is a good size to aim for in most gardens. Make a container of wire netting attached to corner posts, or use one of the ready-made compost bins. It is important to admit enough air all around the heap. Water each layer and treat with an activator to speed up the process of decompo -

sition. Use a proprietary substance according to the manufacturer's instructions or sulphate of ammonia at 15g (½0z) per layer. Put a layer of weed-free soil on top.

The Flower garden:

Lift tulip bulbs as their foliage fades. Dry them off in an airy shady place, and sort through them for replanting in October-November. Discard and burn any burn any bulbs showing sings of tulip fire- rotten tissue and black fungus-bearing spores. Dust healthy bulbs with thiram before stroring.

Lift and divide old clumps of bearded irises as soon as flowering is over, replanting the younger rhizomes and roots immediately in moist, organically enriched soil. In dry weather, however, leave the plants alone until autumn.

The Vegetable garden:

Life garlic and shallot bulbs as the tops turn yellow. Choose a fine day; dry out in the sun, and store in a cool shed.

Plant out seedlings of 'Late Purple' sprouting broccoli, savoy cabbages and cauliflowers.





Recipes

Sweet potato fritters

Serves 4 - 6

450g sweet potatoes and boiled
2 large eggs, beaten
3tbs chopped fresh coriander
or parsley
1tsp lemon juice
1/2tbsp ground cumin
1 -2 tbsp plain flour
salt and black pepper
vegetable oil for deep frying
sweet chilli dipping sauce

Method

Drain the sweet potatoes. Mash them, and stir in the eggs, coriander, lemon juice and cumin. Add 1 tbsp flour and season. Heat oil in a deep fryer or a wok over a moderate heat until it reaches 186°C.Drop in a few spoonfuls of the mixture and fry until golden. If the fritters start to break apart as they cook, stir another tablespoonful of flour into the batter and fry in spoonfuls, Drain well on crumpled kitchen paper and serve hot with a sweet chilli dipping sauce.

Pork fillet with mojo sauce

Serves 6
125ml olive oil
up to 8 cloves of garlic, crushed
125ml freshly squeezed orange juice
125ml fresh pineapple juice
1/2tsp chopped fresh oregano leaves
salt and black pepper
1kg pork fillet
fresh coriander or parsley to garnish
Method

Make the Mojo sauce first. Heat the oil in a saucepan. Add the garlic and stir until it turns a light golden colour. Add the orange and pineapple juices and the cumin. Bring to boiling point, then take off the heat and add the oregano . Season to taste. Put half the sauce in a shallow dish and add the pork fillet. Cover and set aside for 2hours, or leave overnight in fridge.

Preheat your oven to 200°C/gas mark 6.Transfer the pork and the sauce to an ovenproof dish. Roast for 40 minutes, or until cooked through. Cut the pork into thin slices and drizzle with the reserved sauce. Garnish with fresh coriander or sprigs of parsley.

Roasted Vegetables

Serves 6
12rbsp olive oil
2 medium - seize aubergines, cubed,
salted and rinsed
2 red peppers, seeded and cut in strips
1punnet baby corn
sprigs of oregano
pinch of ground cumin

1tsp ground coriander
2 cloves of garlic, crushed
salt and black pepper
sweet potato fritters or pork fillet
Method

Preheat your oven to 200°C/gas mark 6. Heat 3tbsp of the oil in a roasting tin in the oven. Take it out of the oven and add the aubergine cubes. Toss well . Return the tin to the oven and roast for 15 minutes. Take the tin from the oven again and add the peppers,baby corn,oregano,cumin., coriander and garlic. Toss well to coat in the oil. Roast for a further 25 - 30 minutes until all the vegetables are tender. Season to taste and serve hot.

Passionfruit creme brulee

Serves 6
500ml cream
vanilla pod, split
5 eggs yolks
4tblp sugar
2tsp cornflour
caster sugar
Method

Preheat the oven to 150°C/gas mark 2. Place the cream and split vanilla pod with seeds into a small saucepan. Bring to the boil,remove from heat ans allow to infuse for 20minutes.

Beat the egg yolks and sugar together for

3 - 4 minutes until pale and thick. Beat in the cornflour, then stir this mixture into the cream Pour into a small bowl, place over a saucepan of simmering water and stir slowly and continously until the custard thickens. Keep custard well under simmering point. Remove from the heat and stir for 1-2 minutes to cool. Strain and stir through the passionfruit pulp.

Pour into 6 small ramekins and stand them in a shallow baking pan filled with water 1/3 of the way up the sides of the ramekins.

Lift carefully into the sides of the ramekins . Lift carefully into the oven and cook for 30 - 40 minute until set and a thick skin forms on top. Do not allow to colour.

Refrigerate overnight or for at least 4 hours. Sprinkle surface of custards lightly and evenly with caster sugar. Caramelise with a domestic blowtorch or under a hot grill. Allow sugar to melt and from a toffee glaze.

Serve once the Carmel is set.



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



Murphy keen to see Town Council status conferred on Maynooth and Celbridge.

Deputy Catherine Murphy has sought a commitment from the Government on when the establishment of Town councils in Celbridge and Maynooth is likely to be facilitated.

In response to a question by the newly elected North Kildare TD, the Minister for Environment, Heritage and Local Government stated that he "will be pursuing consultations with local government interests" with a view to setting up a local government commission which will, in turn, oversee the Town Council creation process.

In a separate statement Deputy Murphy, while expressing some disappointment at the Minister's failure to provide a specific timeframe for the Town council creation process.

In a separate statement Deputy Murphy, while expressing some disappointment at the Minister's failure to provide a specific timeframe for the Town Council application process, found Deputy Roche's response "encouraging".

Murphy went on to say "the Minister has clearly demonstrated a personal commitment to and belief in the expansion of the Town Council network and the local government system in general, which is a very positive place from which to start the ball rolling".

A veteran of the local government system, Deputy Murphy was one of the original members of Leixlip Town Commission in 1988 where she remained a member until required to resign due to her election to Dáil 'Eireann in March of this year.

In a determined response to the Minister's invitation to speak about the issue "outisde the House", Muprhy candidly remarked that she has "every intention of accepting the invitation sooner rather that later".

Minister's commitment to investigate illegal air traffic movements at Weston

Commenting on the Minister for Defence, Mr. Willie O' Dea's commitment to further investigate alleged illegal aircraft activity at Weston Aerodrome, backweston, Co. Kildare. Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) welcomed the Minister's response and agreed to provide documentation and video evidence to assist in his enquiries.

Speaking in the Dáil yesterday, Deputy Murphy (Ind) asked the Minister for Defence, what contact his Department has had with the Irish Aviation Authority, South Dublin and Kildare County Council's, and what sanctions are available in the event that unaurhorised use of the facility is proven to be taking place.

In his response, the Minister expressed surprise and concern on learning that unauthorised use of the stopway/clearway for runway purposes was taking place.

Mr O' Dea, TD went on to inform the House that although his department had been aware of a dispute regarding unauthorised developments at the facility (the resolution of which falls within the remit of the local planning authorities concerned) he had not been aware that illegal air traffic activity had been taking place.

He went on to request that Deputy Murphy forward any documentation in her pocessession that could shed light on the situation, and demonstrate that illegal aircraft movements were taking place. The newly elected North Kildare TD agreed to cooperate fully with the Department of Defence in this regard.

Weston Aerodrome is currently llicensed to operate a class 1 runway, the length of which may not exceed 799 metres. However, due to the recent addition of a paved stopway/clearway to the existing runway, the new length is 1410 metres.

Any use of this portion of the paved surface for landing and takeoff purposes, according to correspondence received by Kildare County Council in April 2005, is "contrary to the planning permission granted" and "would constiture unauthorised use of the facilities"

In further correspondence to Kildare County Council it was stated that "the GOC Air Corps, in his role as Director of Military Aviation, would have a major light

problem in relation to the larger aircraft which "facilitted by use of the stopway/clearway for runway purposed, a co-ordinated effort involving improved communication between each authority concerned is required to ensure that Weston operates with the terms of it's license.

Unconvinced of Government's commitment to tackle obesity problem.

Minister John O' Donoghue has confirmed in the Dáil that grant aid has been approved for only 1 swimming-pool project this year, and that, general applications for swimming-pool funding have not been accepted by his department since 31st July 2000.

In a reaction to this statement, Deputy Catherine Murphy has expressed dissatisfaction at the level at the level of service provision of developing areas like her North Kildare constituency, asserting that "social and leisure facilities must be planned for and provided in line with with population growth, not just a reaction to it".

While the Minister informed the Dáil that "55 projects have or are being dealth with" only 15 have been completed, with another 10 at construction stage. This "is simply unacceptable" said Murphy, who went on to express concern that "it takes 18 months to build a swimming facility but only 15 projects have been completed in the last 5 years"

In light of the high cost of using private swimming facilities (The National Aquatic Centre costs €12 for adults and €10 for children under 12, students and pensioners) and the low number of public swimming pools, concern has also been expressed regarding the governments commitment to counteracting rising levels of obesity in Ireland.

"On one hand, they repeatedly broadcast concern at rising obesity levels, and on the other drag their feet in providing facilities that will encourage increased activity levels among people of all ages, abilities and social backgrounds" said Murphy in a statement commenting on Mr. O' Donoghue's answers to two parliamentary questions she had tabled earlier.

The re-opening of the swimming pool programme is, according to Minister O' Donoghue, likely to be considered following an Expenditure Review, the conclusion of which is expected to occur at the end of the year.

"Any review of the programme must also consider the estimated €500 million spent, by Health Authorities, an obesity related illness annually. We have to think ahead, increased activity will help prevent such illnesses and wind up saving money for the exchequer as opposed to creating additional costs", concluded Murphy.

Move to 'Pay by Weight' Bin Tax saves Government Millions in Tax Refunds.

The government is set to save millions in Tax Refunds as a consequence of the move to pay a by weight system according to Deputy Catherine Murphy.

The Kildare TD cited the example of her own constituency where the Local Authority charge's in 2004 for a standard bin were €380 and the entire amount attracted tax relief at the standard rate.

Due, however, to the move towards a pay by lift system, as introduced earlier in 2005, the amount considered for tax relief is now capped at €195 despite a sizeable increase in the cost for a similar level of service to last year.

In response to a parliamentary question tabled by Deputy Murphy, the Minister for Finance, Mr. Brian Cowan informed her that the estimated cost of refuse charge tax relief in 2002, to the exchequer, was €5 million (2002 figures being the most recent relevant information available).

The pay by weight system is set to reduce considerably the amount refunded to individual taxpayers according to the Deputy.

Deputy Murphy, in a statement, has called on the Government to invest without delay the savings made from tax relief reductions in development and management of recycling facilities. Last year, for example, Kildare developed a recycling facility in Athy, which lay idle for much of the year because the Council did not have the resources to staff the facility.

If taxpayers are not to be short-changed by the reduction in tax relief available to them the revenue retained by the government must be re-invented in the development of locally based recycling opportunities.

Special Needs Assistants in Employment Limbo

Special Needs Assistants (SNA's) have expressed uncertainty at whether their jobs will continue to exist after June 2005.

At a SIPTU organised public meeting held in Naas and attended by approximately 500 people, SNA's, teachers and the parents of children with special needs highlighted the problems such uncertainty causes. Particular concern was raised about the non-specific, temporary nature of the SNA's contracts and of the Department of Education's failure to inform them of whether or not their jobs will continue to exist into the next school year.

Many of these SNA's, who have invested their own resources in further developing skills, accused the State of minimising their role by failing to give certainty of tenure. Another sentiment that was strongly expressed was that although the work carried out by those Education workers is vital to the development of children with special needs, the government has placed little value on the work performed.

Deputy Catherine Murphy, having attended the meeting, accepted that the number of SNA's has grown considerably over recent years. However, stated that the inclusion of children with special needs in main-stream education cannot be "done on the cheap", instead insisting that a long-term investment would pay off for all.

The North Kildare TD Called on the Minister for Education to put in place a structure that gives some certainty to SNA's. "It is simply unacceptable that people who have built up valuable experience in the classroom and who have invested their own funds in training should face such an uncertain future", said Murphy, "SNA's are clearly here to stay, structuring their employment is a must.

Minister for Finance and FF MEP publicly disagree over reallocation of C.A.B profits.

Mr Eoin Ryan TD and MEP (FF) yesterday called

Minister Cowen, in response to a parliamentary question tabled by Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) earlier this month, candidly stated "if it were agreed that projects in communities affected by drug abuse should be funded by ring fenced revenues, it would set a precedent that would make it very difficult to refuse other representations that might be made in the future to earmark revenues."

Murphy (Ind) has strongly backed Deputy Ryan's (FF) call for reinvestment of the proceeds of yesterday's auction involving, notorious criminal, Martin Cahill's former residence into community programmes, stating that she wants to see similar profits devoted to drug prevention and rehabilitation programmes throughout the country's worst affected areas.

"It is imperative that we begin to shape behaviour instead of just reacting to it. If we reinvest the monies collected by the C.A.B. in facilities that, in turn, will help to reduce the instance of drug related crimes, surely the savings to the state and society will far outweigh any initial monetary investment." stated Murphy (Ind) today.

While admitting that she was "encouraged" by Deputy Ryan's statement, Deputy Murphy affirmed that, even in the absence of such sentiments, she is fully committed "to the ring fencing of C.A.B. receipts for community focused projects" citing a holistic approach to crime prevention "as a necessity, should the government truly wish to see a long-term reduction in crime figures".

Contracts for Bond Bridge Due for Signing on Friday June 17.

Unfortunately, the signing of the contracts was called off at the last minute as one of the signatories stated that he was unable to attend. Hopefully, any problems can be resolved speedily.

Kildare, Meath and Wicklow to make Joint Case for More Funding from Government.

Kildare County Council is one of the poorest funded local authorities in the country. The County Manager and his Director of Finance have been making the case to Government for increased funding for many years now without any degree of success despite the fact that the Minister for Finance, Charlie McCreevy, was from the County. The adjoining counties of Meath and Wicklow are also coming under severe resource pressure in keeping up with the level of services required by an expanding population.

At the June meeting of the Mid-East Regional Authority (MERA represents Kildare, Meath and Wicklow) a proposition was made by the three County Managers that a joint submission be made to Government for increased funding to meet the needs of the counties over the coming years. Consultants will be engaged to prepare the case and to support and strengthen the submission it will be necessary to undertake a well-defined analysis of the issues involved. The study will encompass the unique geographical, social, service and quality of life issues that prevail in the Mid-east Region and will be the first of its kind to specifically examine Local Authority needs on a Regional basis.

Cllr. John McGinley, who is a member of MERA, in seconding the proposal, asked that the submission

be presented to the three County Councils before it is submitted to Government in September.

Contract Signed for €355,000 Children's Playground

The contract for the state of the art Children's Playground at The Harbour Field, Maynooth was signed in mid-June following a presentation on the design to the Maynooth Playground Action Group. Cllr. John McGinley also attended the presentation by the designer/contractor and Kildare County Council staff. The playground will initially have two modules i.e. one for 0 to 6 year olds and one for 7 to 13 year olds. The contractor stated that it was his intention to make the Maynooth Playground the benchmark for the country and that it would be similar to the playground provided by Mo Mowlan in the grounds of Stormont Castle in Belfast.

Everything going according to plan the playground should be opened for use in September.

The intention is to add the third module for 14 to 17 year olds next year when Council staff will have a better idea on what is required. Cllr. John McGinley advised Council staff that in his view it should incorporate skateboard areas in addition to "hang out" areas. John would welcome the views of teenagers and parents on what should be included in the third phase.

Harbour Action Area Plan

Getting agreement on the new road and underground section is still causing a delay in finalising the Harbour Action Area Plan. A meeting has been scheduled between the Planners, Roads Design and the Developers for June 22 and if agreement is reached it is hoped that the Leixlip

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Area Committee would meet before the end of June to finalise the Plan.

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that Maynooth Scouts be provided with a site for their new den/hall. Following discussions with representatives of the scouts, John has advised the Council Planners that the area behind where the Canal Amenity Group containers are at present would be the most suitable location.

Meadowbrook Link Road

Despite the fact that ClIr. John McGinley alerted the Council, last September, of the need for safety measures on the Beaufield Road, when the Meadowbrook Link Road opens, the Council have still not carried out a safety audit. It borders on the ridiculous that the Council should wait until the Link Road is nearly completed before carrying out the safety audit on the Beaufield Road.

An Independent Consultant carried out a safety audit in May on the new road and the Council will be obliged to implement the findings before opening the Link Road to traffic. Of course if they had carried out the safety audit on the Beaufield Road when Cllr. McGinley asked them to do so last September the Link Road would now be opened to traffic, thereby making life much easier for motorists and pedestrians at the Roost junction.

Problems for Drivers with a Disability at Public Car Park behind Caulfields

Cars are illegally parking on the platform beside the two Spaces for drivers with a disability in the car park behind Caulfields and this is stopping wheelchair users from using the dish to the platform.

In order to stop this anti-social activity Cllr. John McGinley asked for two bollards to be installed either side of the dish to the platform. This will prevent cars from parking on it while still allowing wheelchair users access to and from the car park. The Council's Area Engineer has agreed to John's request and the bollards will be installed ASAP.

Pedestrian Crossing on Celbridge Road, Maynooth

Despite the fact that approval was given last year for this much needed pedestrian crossing from Rockfield to Laurence Avenue the Council are still dragging their heels. Cllr. John McGinley has been raising the issue at all monthly Area Meetings of the Council and at the May meeting he was told that

"have prioritised this work as part of the 2005 traffic schemes."

In order to get the lights in place before the Gael Scoil re-opens for the new school year in September Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the June meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee.

"That confirmation be given to the Area Committee that the much needed pedestrian lights for the Gael Scoil on the Celbridge Road, Maynooth will be installed and operating before the new school year begins in September 2005."

The reply given at the meeting was positive.

Northern Relief Road from Moyglare Road to Meath/Dunboyne Road

Residents will be aware that work is progressing steadily on the MYCETE houses at Moyglare Hall. In order to establish what progress has been made on providing the much needed Northern Relief Road Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following question for answering at the June Leixlip Area Committee Meeting:

"What progress has been made on the Northern Relief Road from Moyglare Road to the Moygaddy Road in Meath e.g. particularly on the CPO of the land in Meath?"

The reply was that significant progress has been made but that CPO of the land won't come into question until the final design is agreed.

Back Lane to Houses in Old Greenfield

The proper drainage and re-surfacing of the Back Lane was part of the contract for the two new Council houses at Old Greenfield. The houses are completed and Cllr. John McGinley was advised by the Council's Director of Services that the work on the road would be completed in April. As this has not happened John has submitted the following question for answering at the June Leixlip Area Meeting:

"When is the Back Lane, that services the two new houses in Old Greenfield, being resurfaced?"

The reply given at the meeting was that the work will be carried out at the end of June.

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Recycling Centre in the Public Car Park at Super Valu

In a reply to a motion from Cllr. John McGinley the Council stated on 30 March 2004 that they would be purchasing CCTV equipment for this re-cycling centre in the very near future. It is now 15 months later and there is still no sign of the cameras. Shamefully uncaring people continue to dump their rubbish at will. It is Cllr. John McGinley's view that the only way to stop this crime against the community is through hefty fines. John has submitted the following question for answering at the Area Committee meeting on June 17 and if the answer is not to his satisfaction he will again be asking that the recycling centre be moved to the Council depot at the Harbour.

"When are the CCTV cameras being installed at the Recycling Centre in Maynooth and what additional steps are being taken to stop the indiscriminate dumping that is taking place there continuously at present?"

The reply given at the meeting was that the CCTV cameras would be in place in a matter of weeks.

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley Appeal Lyreen Partnership Decision to An Bord Pleanala

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have appealed the appalling decision of Kildare County Council to grant planning permission for 4 storey apartment blocks on the former pitch and putt course at Dunboyne Road, Maynooth. It is their view that the proposal will cause irreparable damage to Maynooth village's unique architectural heritage and that the scale and shoddy design of the buildings is simply unacceptable.

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
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
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Editorial

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Features The fall-out from the Brussels Summit.

In a previous issue of the Maynooth Newsletter (April 2005) we put forward the case that Irelands future was irrevocably tied to the Europe Union. We stressed the importance of the Common Agricultural Policy to the Irish economy. We believed that the European social model with modifications was the best suited for the advancement of the Irish people. We also suggested that the British had domestic and international priorities that would clash with the further development of the European Union. We questioned their commitment and goodwill towards the further integration of the Union. Following the Brussels summit it gives us no pleasure to say that our misgivings were not misplaced. It is important for us at this juncture to understand what the British are trying to do, so that our Government can join with others to protect the strong agricultural base and workers rights which are a feature of most European countries.

After the failure of the Brussels summit, the British gave a number of reasons why they would not agree to the 2007 budget. Bertie Ahern, in a formal statement to the Dail, described the British position in relation to the Community Budget as being "dishonest". The definition of the word "dishonest" covers a number of more stronger terms. "not honest or fair" deceiving or fraudulent" diplomatic language could not be more clear. The Taoiseach was effectively saying that the British were not telling the truth or playing fair with their fellow European partners. We now believe that we can identify three main areas where the British will mount diplomatic attacks in the coming months to protect their own interests.

- Common Agricultural Policy
- New European Constitution
- Deregulated Labour Market

If the UK were to be successful in achieving any of the above objectives it would be a serious matter for Ireland. It is likely that the British Government would pay little attention to submissions made by the Irish Government in respect of the importance of CAP to the Irish Economy. Our relations with France and Germany, not as warm as in previous years, would prove vital in protecting this economic and social policy for our small farmers.

Britain never liked the Common Agricultural Policy. For centuries it enjoyed cheap food from its colonies, as a result many of its own small farmers were forced off the land. Land reforms granted to Irish tenant farmers at the end of the eighteen hundreds were never extended to England. As a result farm units in England tend to be far bigger, running in many cases, into thousands of acres. These large size units could supply

cheap food at prices Irish or French small farmers could not match. Forced to pay an economic price to keep European farmers on the land when entering the common market 1973 they have continually railed against the cost of CAP. France, Germany and Ireland for example share the same interest on this issue. Both countries have many small farmers. Not only the countryside but also many hundreds of small villages and towns in these countries depend on the small farmer staying on the land. In France many villages are inhabited by the older generation that have lost their young to the cities because the land could not give them a living.

These hamlets and villages close down for the winter and are only brought to life in the spring and summer when the young return for holidays and tourists boost activity in the valleys. The French Government supported by its people cannot allow the countryside to die and will defend the community farm budget. It is recognised that personal relationships between Irish and Continental leaders have not been as warm as in the Jack Lynch or Albert Reynolds era. Continental leaders believe that Ireland is becoming socially and economically more tied to the UK than to its European partners. This perception is due, in part, to the continuing attempts by the British and Irish Governments to settle the Northern issue The fact that Mr Ahern and Blair are seen so often at post Anglo-Irish meetings press conferences probably sends the wrong messages to other European leaders. It might be prudent for the boys in Iveagh House to re-establish our credibility in Paris and Berlin.

Europe is up against an experienced negotiator in Mr. Blair who is adept at getting what he wants and what he wants here is to effectively open up the European food market to all comers. The effect of this policy would be to lay waste millions of acres of productive farmland in Europe. It would also drive millions of rural Europeans into the already overcrowded cities. This is not what the European Community is about. In so far as it is possible the Union has always had the best interests of its people at the centre of its policies.

It is ironic that Mr. Blair who lectures Europe on the need for change, recently advised his own people that state pensions may in the future be paid only to those reaching seventy years of age rather than the current sixty five. His Government also suggested that "Congestion charges" might now be added to rail and underground fares at peak travelling times. In other words people who have discarded their cars in favour of public transport are now going to take an additional "hit" for the privilege of going to work. Is this a suitable "vision" for the future development of Europe?





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Features The fall-out from the Brussels Summit. (contd)

There is no doubt that British policy has unsettled Europe. If we had a sustained period of instability over the annual budget its possible that young Irish mortgage payers could end up paying higher interest rates. If the Euro was put under pressure because of a failure to negotiate the 2007 budget and European leaders failed to agree a new structure for the Commission, the European Central Bank might be forced to intervene and raise interest rates to protect the currency. Mr Blair protected by a strong currency in Sterling might not be worried about the fall out from such an eventuality. It is now clear that by attacking CAP, undermining confidence in European institutions and doing little to protect workers right the British are pursuing a very selfish agenda.

Many years ago General Charles de Gaulle repeatedly blocked the entry of Britain into the Common Market. Time and again during the sixties and early seventies he vetoed the application by the United Kingdom. He believed that they were not "truly" European, did not share European values and had no interest in developing institutions for closer integration among the nations. He also believed that once in, the British would turn out to be constant source of trouble. His misgivings have proved correct. It was at the insistence of Britain that the European Union opened discussions with Turkey for entry to the European Economic Community. This was a mischievous move, as Turkey has nothing in common with Europe, as we know it.

The rapid expansion of the European Union towards the East has left most Western Europeans behind. This was one of the reasons why the French and Dutch voted against the new European Constitution. Mr Blair has been running like a Group One racehorse, winning all before him. It is time that our fellow Europeans pulled one out of the stable to steady him.

Footnote


The absence of conflict in Western Europe for the past sixty years has been the major blessing for those nations who constitute the European Union. The fact that international disputes between European Nations have been settled in the conference rooms of Brussels and Strasbourg has been another step in our civilisation. The events of July 7th in London show just how far the rest of the world has to go. Our sincere sympathies go to the citizens of London who experienced the terror perpetrated in their midst. London is a city where many Irish people have found employment and a metropolis, which is always a pleasure to visit.



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

It was an ordinary busy Thursday morning in London as people were hurrying doing their errands, going to work, meeting their friends, and getting ready for the weekend. This Thursday, however, would become a symbol of sorrow, a day of unendurable pain as the world has rediscovered a new notion for terrorism. These ordinary people, like you and me were yet to face the loss of someone they loved, held dear, knew and saw every day.

07/07

July 7th will become in our hearts and minds the term synonymous with terrorism, similar to what 9/11 means for people in the US today. We have yet a chance to realise how serious the threat is and what are the true goals of those who stand behind the attacks on New York, Madrid and London.

Hope


But there still is hope.

Question

I believe I can get help with the cost of my child's clothes for school. Can you please give details?

Answer

You are probably referring to the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance which is a special payment for parents to assist with the costs of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. You may also claim for a child aged 18 - 22 in full-time education for whom a payment is included in your social welfare payment.

Families claiming a social welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a Health Service Executive payment are eligible for this scheme if their income is below certain thresholds as follows:

	Lone Parent	Couple
1 Child	€250.90	€368.10
2 Children	€272.50	€387.40
3 Children	€294.10	€406.70
4 Children	€315.70	€426.00
Each additional child	€21.60	€19.30

Those taking part in a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or getting a Back to Education Allowance are also eligible. The allowance is also available to people on employment schemes such as Community Employment, Back To Work Allowance, and Revenue Job Assist who retain their secondary benefits, (i.e. gross weekly household income is less than €317.43). If they do not meet this condition they can apply under the normal income limits.

The allowance is \in 80.00 for each child aged 2 - 11 and \in 150.00 for each child aged 12 - 22.

The Scheme runs from 1st June to 30th September and is administered by the Health Service Executive as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Families should apply to the Community Welfare Officer at their local Health Centre.

Question

My 16-year-old son has been offered a job for the summer holidays in a local hotel. How late can he be expected to work?

Answer

The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act 1996 sets out the employment rights of young people in relation to maximum working hours, rest intervals and late night work. In addition there are regulations concerning the employment of 16 and 17-year-olds in licensed premises such as restaurants and bars.

Under the Act, 14 and 15-year-olds can work up to 35 hours a week during school holidays. The work should be light work which is not harmful to their health and safety, and they are entitled to a 21-day break from work during the summer. They can only work between the hours of 8.00am in the morning and 8.00pm at night and cannot work more than 7 hours a day. They are entitled to 2 days off a week, which should be consecutive if it is practicable.

Young people aged 16 and 17, such as your son, can work up to 40 hours per week and are also entitled to 2 days off a week, which should be consecutive if it is practicable. They can work for a maximum of 8 hours a day and, in general, they can only work between the hours of 6.00am in the morning and 10.00pm at night.

Regulations have been made permitting 16 and 17-year-olds to work at "general duties" in licensed premises up to 11.00pm at night where they do not have to attend school the next day. In this case they should not start work the following day until 7.00am at the earliest. General duties does not include supplying alcohol to customers from behind a bar counter or supplying it for consumption off the premises.

Question

Is it true that you can now claim from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for dental treatment carried out in another EU country?

Answer

Yes, it is now possible to claim for dental treatment obtained in other EU countries under the Department's Treatment Benefit Scheme, providing you qualify for the scheme.

Maynooth Citizens Information Notes. (contd.)

To qualify for the scheme you must satisfy certain Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution conditions which vary depending on your age. You are also eligible if you are the dependent spouse of an insured person or a dependent widow or widower whose spouse was qualified at time of death. If you satisfy the PRSI conditions when you reach age 60 you will remain qualified for life.

Under the scheme you can qualify for Dental, Optical and Aural Benefits whereby the Department pays some of the costs of various treatments, such as dental filling and extractions, eye examinations, glasses, contact lenses and hearing aids. You can now claim these benefits if you treatment, spectacles, etc., were obtained in another EU country.

Before going abroad you should contact the Department's Treatment Benefit Section. Tel: LoCall 1890 400 400 (ext 4480) for an application form and details of how much the Department pays for various treatments. When abroad you pay the full amount for the treatment, but you should ask the dentist, optician or audiologist to complete the application form. To claim benefit when you return to Ireland, send the application form to the Treatment Benefit Section, Department of Social and Family Affairs, St. Oliver Plunkett Road, Letterkenny, Co. Donegal.

Question

Could you please tell me who is eligible for the Back to Education Allowance?

Answer

The Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) is paid by the Department of Social, and Family Affairs (DSFA) to unemployed people, lone parents and people with disabilities who wish to do approved second or third level course of education. To be eligible for the allowance you must be:

Aged 21 or over (24 or over for a postgraduate course) and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving a social welfare payment such as Unemployment Assistant/Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment.

Aged 18 or over and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving a disability payment such as Disability Allowance or Invalidity Pension.

In receipt of Disability Benefit for at least 3 years. Aged 18 to 20, out of formal education for 2 years, and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving One-Parent Family Payment or Unemployed Assistant/Benefit.

*It is 12 months for a third level course from September 2005.

Periods spent on employment schemes, training courses and in prison may count towards the qualifying period. If you are eligible, your spouse/partner may qualify providing you are getting a Qualified Adult Allowance for them with your payment.

Courses you can attend include full-time second level courses certified by the Department of Education and Science, or approved by the Further Education and Training Awards Council (FETAC) or the Business and Technology Education (BTEC), such as the Leaving Certificate or a Post Leaving Certificate course. Also eligible are full-time third level courses approved by the Department for its maintenance grant schemes or which have Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) recognition.

When you have been accepted for a course you should apply to DSFA for the allowance on Form BTE 1., you will be paid the allowance instead of your social welfare payment at a rate equivalent to the maximum of your current social welfare payment. If you were previously getting an unemployment payment, the BTEA will not be paid during the summer period between academic years. Those who had been receiving other payments will continue to receive the BTEA during the summer. You are entitled to a Cost of Education Allowance (€400.00 in September 2005) at the start of each academic year.

Question

I am going back to college in the Autumn and I want to know if I will be able to get a grant?

Answer

The Higher Education Grants Scheme provides means-tested grants to eligible students on approved courses. Application forms are available from your local authority which administers the grant. For the academic year 2005/2006 the application must be with the local authority by 31 August 2005.

The scheme is also available to full-time students who are attending medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine and teacher training courses in publicly funded third-level institutions in other EU Member States.

The limits can be increased by a further 4,295 where there are 2 children attending full-time third-level education, and a further 4,295 for each additional child.

The Adjacent Rate is paid if you normally reside 15 miles or less from your college. Mature students will receive the Non-Adjacent Rate in all cases.

The Special Rates of maintenance grants for 2005/2006 are 5,355 for the Non-Adjacent Rate and 2,145 for the Adjacent Rate, equivalent to a top-up of 2,335 and 935 to the standard rates respectively. The income limit for these grants is 15,626. you must be receiving an eligible social welfare or other payment.

Question

I heard that a "GP Visit Card" had been introduced. Can you please give the details?

Answer

The new GP Visit Card allows you to attend your family doctor only free of charge. For all other health services you are treated the same as a non-Medical Card holder and will have to pay the appropriate charges.

To qualify for the GP Visit Card you have to pass a means test. The means test is similar to the means test for the Medical Card, however, the income guidelines are about 25% higher.

There are also allowances for certain expenses incurred in respect of childcare costs, rent/mortgage payments and travel to work.

Where the income of yourself and your spouse exceeds the income guidelines, a card may still be granted to cover your whole family or an individual member on the grounds of financial hardship, if you have exceptional medical expenses.

You apply on the same form you apply for a Medical Card. The application form is available from your Local Health Office or Health Centre. It can also be downloaded from the Health Service Executive's website at www.hse.ie

Question

Can I make a complaint about a solicitor in connection with family law case?

Answer

Yes you can. Until recently you could not due to the "in camera rule" in family law cases. However, this rule has now been relaxed with the coming into force of certain parts of the Civil Liability and Courts Act 2004.

If you have a complaint with a solicitor you should first write to the solicitor expressing your dissatisfaction and what you want him/her to do. You should send a copy of the letter to the senior partner of the firm if there is one.

If your are not satisfied with the response from your letter to the solicitor you may be able to make a complaint to the Law Society which investigates complaints of misconduct, inadequate professional services and excessive fees made about solicitors by members of the public and other solicitors. If cannot deal with complaints that relate to services provided more than five years previous. In general, only a client can make a complaint about his or her own solicitor but there are exceptions and the Society will tell you whether you can make a complaint.

If the Society can deal with your complaint, write to the Complaints Section and give as much detail as possible about your complaint. Include the name and address of the solicitor and enclose copies of any relevant documents. Do not send original documents.

The Society will send a copy of your letter to the solicitor. If you just want guidance at this stage indicate this on your letter and the solicitor will not be contacted.


If, however, you feel that you are entitled to compensation as a result of your solicitor's negligence, you should consult an independent solicitor as the Law Society cannot order the payment of damages. A list of solicitors who are prepared to take proceedings against other solicitors is available from the Complaints Section but you must request in writing.

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

Question

Can I claim tax relief for third-level tuition fees?

Answer

Yes you can, providing the courses are eligible. Tax relief for third-level tuition fees is available for the following courses:

- Approved undergraduate courses (full-time & part-time) in both private and publicly funded third-level colleges in the State
- Approved undergraduate and postgraduate course (full time & part-time) in publicly funded and duly accredited private third-level colleges in any EU member state.
- Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time & part-time) operated by colleges in any EU member state providing distance education in the State.
- Postgraduate courses in certain private and publicly funded third-level colleges in non-EU counties.

Undergraduate courses must be of at least 2 years duration. Postgraduate courses must be for at least 1 academic year, but not more than 4 years, and must lead to a postgraduate award based on a thesis or an examination.

Tax relief is also available for approved information technology and foreign language courses in the State resulting in a certificate of competence (not just a certificate of attendance) and of less than 2 years duration.

Tax relief is at the standard rate of income tax (20%). The maximum relief allowable for the academic year 2005/2006 has increased from €3,175 to €5,000. for the information technology and foreign language courses the relief applies to fees ranging from €315 to €1,270 maximum. The tuition fees must be paid by you on your own behalf or on behalf of your spouse, your child or someone for whom you are the legal guardian. Application forms (IT 31) are available from the Revenue Commissioners website at www.revenue.ie or

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Gardening Tips for August

Although August is traditionally a holiday month, it is seldom like the summer. August has more rain than June, July and September, its hot sunny spells put to an end by drenching, chilling rains. It is a month of change both for plants and gardeners.

The Flower Garden:

Cut off spent flower-heads of dahlias regularly to induce further bloom. Give a liquid feed every 10 days or so. Cut out the spent flowered stems of border plants such as delphiniums and of gladioli they form seeds. Dis-bud chrysanthemums to give larger blooms, rubbing off the smaller side buds around the one chosen to flower. For effective sprays of bloom, on the other hand, remove the central terminal bud. Give a liquid feed to late-flowering border plants such as Michaelmas daises, golden rod, heleniums, border chrysanthemums. Keep a watch for mildew in fine weather, when nights are cool and dew, and apply benomyl, dinocap or sulphur fungicide to control it.

Prepare sites for new shrubs and trees to be planted in the autumn. If they are thick with grass and weeds, dress with a glyphosate herbicide early in the month and cultivate in 5 weeks' time safely free of weeds.

Finalize your plants for autumn bulb planting, and order bulbs as soon as available. Narcissi should be planted in October, crocuses in September, but tulips can be left until November. Finish planting of autumn-flowering bulbs and corns as soon as possible.

The Fruit Garden:

Strawberries:



Clean up the strawberry bed after harvest. Remove all weeds, excess runners, old, yellow and discoloured leaves, and lightly fork over the soil between the rows. Move the rooted runners intended for the new strawberry bed as soon as it is obvious they are growing strongly. Lift with soil, and space about 38cm (15in) apart in rows 75cm (2ft 6in) apart, watering in on well-prepared ground. Give dilute liquid feed to late-fruiting strawberries of the alpine types: 'Alexandria', 'Baron Solemacher', 'Frasie des Bois' or 'Red Alpine' and keep watered in dry weather.

- Cut away the fruited canes of raspberries at ground level and burn them so that they cannot harbour pests such as the larvae of the raspberry beetle or moth, or fungus infection. Remove weeds by hand: use a weedkiller may destroy new canes. Pull up sucker canes growing away from the stools or retained plants.
- Prune the fruited canes of loganberries at soil level as soon as the crop has been harvested.
- Pick early varieties of apple, such as culinary variety 'Emmeth Early' and the dessert varieties 'Beauty Bath', 'Laxton's Advance' and 'Laxton's Epicure'. Harvest with care as they bruise easily. Apples are ready to gather when they part easily from the spur on being gently lifted in hand; no force should be necessary.
- Pick outdoor nectarines and peaches if ready. Cradle the fruit in the palm of the hand, and if the pulp around the stalk-end feels soft, and the fruit parts easily when gently moved to and fro, pick it. Then cut away the shoots that bore them.



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

Recipes for August

Starter:

Chilled fresh fruit Soup

2 dessert apples, quartered and cored 6 bananas, roughly chopped 500 g/1 lb fresh strawberries 375 g/1 12 oz pears, peeled, quartered and cored 1 litre/1¾ p pints fresh orange juice

2 tablespoons lemon juice 300 ml½ pint fresh grapefruit juice 5-6 tablespoons clear honey

To Garnish: mint sprigs 6 strawberries black pepper (optional)

- **1** Place all the fruit in a food processor or blender with 300 ml $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of the orange juice and blend until very smooth. Add the lemon juice and grapefruit juice and the honey. Blend again until the mixture is smooth, in batches if necessary
- **2.** Pour the soup into a large bowl, stir in the remaining orange juice and cover the bowl loosely. Chill in the refrigerator for 3-4 hours.
- **3.** Pour the chilled soup into 6 chilled bowls and garnish each portion with a sprig of fresh mint and a strawberry. Mill over some black pepper, if liked.

Main course:

Duck Salad with mango

3 boneless duck breasts, about 175g/6oz each

- 1 bunch of spring onions, cut into 2.5 cm/1 inch lengths
- 1 celery stick, chopped
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind

500 g/1 lb brown rice, cooked

3 medium ripe mangoes, peeled and sliced salt and pepper.

Sauce:

1 egg white

1 whole egg

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon mango chutney

½ tablespoon light vinegar, preferably a fruit vinegar,

250 ml8 fl oz very low-fat natural yoghurt

1. Arrange the duck breasts, skin-side up, on a rack and roast in a preheated oven for 10 minutes on each side.

- **2.** Leave to cool. then remove the skin and cube the meat
- **3.** Meanwhile, make the sauce. Place the egg white, whole egg, mustard, mango chutney, soy sauce and vinegar in a food processor or blender and blend well, then add the yoghurt, a tablespoon at a time.
- **4.** Combine the duck meat with the onions, celery, orange rind, cooked rice and seasoning in a large bowl.
- **5.** Arrange the mango slices on top of the salad and serve, accompanied by the sauce.

Try to use Barbary duck breasts as they are less fatty than other duck breasts. The skin is thin and does not have a layer of fat underneath.

Dessert

Summer Pudding

250 g/8 oz red and white currants

125 g/4 oz blackcurrants

125 g/4 oz raspberries

125 g/4 oz strawberries

125 g/4 oz loganberries

125 g/4 oz cherries, blueberries or cultivated blackberries.

1 tablespoon clear honey margarine, for greasing.

8 x 1 cm/1/2 inch thick slices brown

bread, crusts removed

- 1 Place all the fruit in a large saucepan (it must be aluminium or cast iron) with the honey and cook very gently for 2-3 minutes, just long enough to soften the fruit and allow the juices to run a little.
- 2 Line a lightly greased 1.2 litre/ 2 pint pudding basin with three quarters of the bread, trimming the slices to fit, making certain that all the surfaces are completely covered and the base has an extra thick layer.
- **3** Spoon in all the fruit, reserving 2 tablespoons of the juice in case the bread is not coloured by the fruit when thepudding is turned out.

Lay a plate or saucepan lid that will fit inside the rim of the bowl on top and place a 1 kg/2 lb weighton top of the plate or lid. Chill for 10-12 hours.

4 Turn out and cut into wedges to serve.



Patrick Devaney

Announcing a new title from popular author Patrick Devaney. The writer's second collection of more than one hundred poems deals with many contemporary issues, including man's impact on nature, teenage rebellion, social change, our Anglo-Irish heritage, the Northern Ireland conflict, the Iraq War, and religious belief in a scientific age.

Poet, novelist, short story writer, critic and broadcaster Mary O'Donnell said about Devaney's first collection:

"The poems inhabit the narrow divide that separates pain and joy, hurt and healing, reminding the reader that nature and its landscapes—fierce, cruel, but beautiful—inform every moment of human activity".

Written over a period of five decades, the poems in **Swan Pendant** reflect many of Devaney's experiences, from his youth in County Roscommon, through his years in New York, to his return to Ireland to teach and raise a family. As might be expected, the poems in such a broad collection vary in style and form: short lyrics jostling long, reflective pieces; modern verse contrasting with more traditional poems that employ rhyme and fixed metre, though all are aimed at the ordinary reader rather than an intellectual elite.

Patrick Devaney grew up on a farm in County Roscommon and was educated in Summerhill College, Sligo. Useful Tips

Garden Hose

• You can temporarily plug a pinhole leak in a rubber hose by jamming a round wooden toothpick into the hole. Snap the toothpick off flush with the hose's outer skin then wrap the hose with insulating tape up to 2in/50mm on either side of the leak, stretch the rape tight over the hole but looser towards the ends, so that it can flex as the hose bends. As the wool absorbs water, it will swell to seal the hole. Never store a garden hose by hanging it over a nail or peg. The hose will sag and kink, and repeated kinking will crack the rubber, vinyl or plastic skin. Instead, mount an old wheel rim on the garage or tool-shed wall and wrap the hose around it when not in use.

Garden tools

- An electric drill will keep your garden tools polished and sharp. Use a wire brush attachment to scour rust from neglected tools; a coarse disc can put an edge back on a nicked axe or mower blade much faster that a file and whetstone. Do it quickly, so that the highspeed sanding doesn't heat the steel and ruin its temper.
- After polishing and sharpening your tools, keep blades and teeth bright with a coat of oil dirty oil from your car or power mower is as effective as any and costs nothing.
- For jobs too big for a trowel but too small for a spade or shovel, use a hoe.
- Use a wide putty knife for scraping earth from shovels and trowels. Use it also for delicate weeding between closely planted vegetables and for cultivating the soil in the crevices of a rock garden.

Ice cream cones

Before you scoop ice cream into a cone, drop a jelly baby in the bottom; it helps to prevent drips from coming through.

With a bit of ingenuity, you can serve up an ice cream treat without relying on readymade cones. Here are some ideas:

Make an ice cream sandwich by putting scoop between two large biscuits or splitting a trifle sponge in half and filling it.

Hollow out a fairy cake to make a little edible bowl.

Slice the tops off oranges, scoop out the flesh, then fill with ice cream. (Puree the flesh to make orange juice.)

Make brandy snap cups by moulding just baked brandy snaps over an orange or up-turned glass, instead of rolling them around a wooden spoon

Outdoor cooking

- You can turn an old metal wheelbarrow into a mobile barbecue. Punch 1/2in/13mm holes in the bottom and side of the wheelbarrow, line it with a layer of stones and cover with charcoal. An old oven shelf can also double up as a grill (don't use refrigerator shelves; they might contain cadmium, which is poisonous).
- Season a new small iron hibachi (a portable, charcoal-burning grill) to prevent rust. First, check that there are no wooden parts. Then rub all surfaces with vegetable oil and put the hibachi on a baking sheet in a 120 degrees C/250 degrees F oven. Leave it to bake for half an hour, then turn off the heat and let the oven cool down. Remove the hibachi and wipe off any excess fat.
- If you want to know whether the coals are hot enough to barbecue meat, the fire is ready when the coals turn white.
- To prevent flare-ups when you barbecue, make a drip pan to catch any dripping fat from aluminium foil. Place this on top of the coals under the meat.
- Another way to prevent flare-ups is to spread the outer leaves from a head of lettuce on the hot coals before you barbecue fatty meat. The lettuce will blacken but won't ignite.
- Keep a water spray handy the sort used to spray indoor plants - and use it to douse flames.
- Don't forget that you can barbecue vegetables as well as meat. Wrap onions, corn on the cob, or sliced or whole potatoes (all dotted with butter or margarine or brushed with barbecue sauce) in heavy-duty foil. Grill onions and corn over medium coals for 30 minutes, turning once. Put chunks of courgette or aubergine on skewers, brush with oil, and frill for 10 minutes over medium coals, turning often.
- Flies hate basil, so keep a pot of the herb close to the dining table: just crush a few leaves to release the oils. And you'll also have fresh basil leaves to chop into your salad.

2012 Olympics looming and no hope for Irish swimmers

With London winning the backing of The International Olympic Committee to become the host city of the 2012 Olympic Games yesterday, many people may be wondering if Ireland will be in for a shot at the medals this time around. One person, who believes the Irish Government has shot the Irish Olympic Team in the proverbial foot, however is Catherine Murphy TD (Ind).

"Affordability and availability of sporting facilities are essential components in nurturing the sporting talent of tomorrow", said Murphy today when seeking increased funding to be channelled into the local authority swimming pool programme.

At a cost of €10 per child / student / OAP, and €12 per adult, the National Aquatic Centre is priced far above other public swimming facilities in the region. And, when compared with the costs incurred by users of Australia's Sydney International Aquatic, \$6.20 AUD per adult, and, on average, \$5 AUD per child / student / OAP, one of the reasons behind Australia's impeccable swimming successes becomes apparent. They simply let people swim!

However, price is not the only barrier to the budding Olympians of tomorrow according to Murphy.

"The sheer lack of public swimming facilities no doubt plays a huge part in preventing talented people from realising their potential, however it also has implications for ordinary people who just want to stay healthy and enjoy a leisurely swim. This government, and its predecessors, has been so intent on creating a strong economy it has forgotten that a strong economy is merely one of the building blocks upon which a healthy, happy and strong society is built."

The Minister for Arts, Sports and Tourism in May of this year revealed in a parliamentary reply to Deputy Murphy that the estimated budgetary allocation for the National public swimming pool programme for 2005 is just €32, a startling €30 million less than the construction cost of the National Aquatic Centre. Furthermore, applications for grant-aid to facilitate the construction of new swimming pools have not been accepted since July 2000 and it is uncertain when the applications procedure will re-open.

"I'm calling on the government to step up onto the diving board and take the plunge on providing these essential facilities, and who knows we may well become the producers of the next generation of Ian Thorps!" concluded Murphy.

Air Navigation and Transport (Indemnities) Bill 2005 (Seanad): Second Stage

Most people considering this Bill will think of major airlines and airports such as Dublin, Cork or Shannon. Those airports must be up to date in the type of security provided there to minimise risk. I know advances have been made in the type of machinery used and monitoring, and that will be important. I note the Bill extends to facilities that do not have the capacity to do that, such as smaller aerodromes. Three or four of those listed are in remote locations but one is not. Weston Aerodrome is situated between Lucan and Leixlip and has a sizeable number of movements, up to the levels of Dublin Airport, so it is not an inconsiderable aerodrome.

I have serious concerns about the way Weston Aerodrome operates, the profile of the owner and its non-compliance with just about every rule and regulation in the book. It is located in an area where 80,000 people live. Major international companies sought — it was granted — to divert the way planes flew after the attack on 11 September 2001, and I understand why. Weston Aerodrome is beside the State laboratories where certain materials are kept — I will say no more.

This aerodrome is part of a marketing exercise by a large number of people for the Ryder Cup, which is a major event, so it is not an inconsiderable location. It is licensed for a runway of less than 800 metres on code one. I supplied video evidence to the Irish Aviation Authority showing that it uses an area beyond that designed as a stopway-clearway. It has laid tarmacadam on a total of 14,000 metres and uses or has used areas for which it does not have a licence. It does not have planning permission for buildings on the site. The proprietor has built a hotel and conference centre and ripped up archaeological sites to put in a golf course. He has absolutely no regard for the planning laws. It is advertised as Dublin's second airport with 24-hour cargo accommodation even though only daylight flying is allowed. I am drawing a picture of who we might indemnify. Over the years I have been in and out of, and on the phone to, the Irish Aviation Authority offices. The planning process is completely subverted in Kildare and south Dublin. Warning notices have been issued to the aerodrome with regard to the height of planes.

Three Government Departments, Transport, the Environment, Heritage and Local Government and Defence, have a regulatory role in this. The Department of Defence has a problem with what Weston Aerodrome does, and is on record as such. It would be unconscionable for this type of facility to be indemnified when it is clearly non-compliant. I hope the provision in section 5 is used to crack down on

this as I have no confidence in the Irish Aviation Authority to do so. If the practice at Weston Aerodrome is replicated in any other airport or aerodrome I would have serious concerns about the level of control we can have potentially on this type of facility. Either a blind eye is being turned or there is no intention to make it comply with the licence it has been given. I cannot see the point of having a licence if months go by before the authorities get back to someone who makes a serious complaint that includes giving video evidence to the Irish Aviation Authority, which was gathered by members of the public who sat in a ditch in the freezing weather. It is the role of the Irish Aviation Authority to gather such evidence.

I understand why we need to indemnify. I hope that in a year's time we can charge for that indemnity, as the Bill proposes, but the Minister must take serious note of the rules of compliance and ensure they are fully met. If the laws are broken, the taxpayer should not be asked to indemnify that type of behaviour in a further example of the State not intervening. The State must intervene and use every power available to stop this type of behaviour. It would be one thing if this aerodrome was used for the purpose for which it is licensed, but it is used for much more than is covered by the licence.

Weston must not be insured by Government, demands Murphy

Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) has called the government's proposals to provide indemnity for aircraft, airports and aerodromes in the event of terrorist attacks "unconscionable" in the case of Weston Aerodrome.

Referring to persistent breaches of both the terms of its operating licence and planning regulations Murphy went on to assert, "if the laws are broken, the taxpayer should not be asked to indemnify that type of behaviour in a further example of the State not intervening".

The North Kildare TD expressed that she has "serious concerns about the way Weston Aerodrome operates, the profile of the owner and its non-compliance with just about every rule and regulation in the book".

In a further statement Murphy maintained, "if a facility can't operate according to its licence and is expanded illegally, it would be downright foolish to presume that these are the only areas where the management fall short on compliance. We need to make sure that the facilities we undertake to insure using taxpayers money are taking all precautions necessary to guarantee security."

The proposed Air Navigation and Transport (Indemnities) Bill 2005, if enacted, will provide for the

transfer of aircraft, airport and aerodrome insurance cover relating to terrorist attacks, from private insurers to the government. Its drafting having been initiated upon insurance companies' expressions of concern at the prospect of "potentially ruinous claims in the event of a terrorist attack involving the detonation of what is referred to as a dirty bomb, or an electromagnetic pulse."

Although critical of insuring non-compliant facilities, Murphy did however acknowledge the need for government backed indemnity policies in the event of terrorist attacks. Stating that Weston "is used for much more than is covered by the licence" Murphy adamantly demanded however that "the State must intervene and use every power available to stop this type of behaviour" before insurance cover is extended.

TOLLS TANTAMOUNT TO URBAN TAX, SAYS MURPHY

Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) has struck out at the National Toll Roads Company regarding a report they commissioned, stating that it is nothing more than an exercise in stating the obvious.

"The conclusion of National Toll Roads' consultants that capacity, design and high traffic volumes are the true causes of the traffic chaos experienced twice daily by M50 commuters are in part accurate. However anyone using the M50 or watching the mayhem from a safe distance could conclude the same. The real issue is that the Toll Plaza is imposing heavy charges on commuters who have no choice but to use the road."

The government's national tolling policy, according to Murphy, favours the location of Toll Plazas at location that catch daily commuters and not national traffic. She further illustrated her point by highlighting that, on completion of its upgrade, the N4 from Dublin to Galway will incorporate two toll plaza facilities.

One will be at Enfield, an area flanked by commuter towns, and one on the outskirts of Galway city. However, the largest and most sparsely populated portion of this national route, i.e. That area between Enfield and Galway, will go untolled.

"It's quite obvious that these Toll Plaza's are placed to

draw revenue from the thousands of commuters forced to live in satellite towns as result of high housing prices. This is a highly inequitable system that effectively punishes people who can't afford to live close to where they work", stated Murphy.

The January 2005 increase in Toll prices would seem to support Murphy's assertion as the cost to car drivers was increased from €1.50 to €1.80, or a staggering 20% while the cost to Vans and Buses at €3.10 was increased by only 3%

"My understanding of the purpose of road tolls is that they are intended to deter only truly works if you offer an alternative, which the government has failed to do where public transport is concerned." - Murphy

She concluded that she sees the current system of road tolling as "an urban tax" which, in a nutshell, can be described as "all stick and no carrot."

Maynooth Labour News

Bond Bridge

The Council have re-tendered for this project and tenders are due in by mid-August. Cllr. John McGinley has been advised by Council officials that works will commence in early/mid-September.

Meadowbrook Link Road

Cllr. John McGinley has allocated €25,000 from his Discretionary Grants for traffic calming ramps on Beaufield Road in order to enable the Meadowbrook Link Road to open. The ramps and the other safety measures identified in the safety audit will be carried out in mid-July. Such works will include five flat top ramps, fencing, line markings, signs and tree pruning. John requested that one of the ramps at the shops should have a pedestrian crossing and the Council have agreed to this.

When these works are completed in mid-August the Meadowbrook Link Road will be opened to the public.

Footpaths at Dublin Road/Doctors Lane, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion at the Area Meeting of the council on 15 July:

"As part of planning file ref. 02/2060 a levy of €25,000 has been imposed as a contribution towards town improvements. Briefly by way of background, the members will be aware that it was proposed to create a one-way system for Doctor's Lane. As per drawings previously circulated, it is also envisaged that resurfacing work would take place and that footpaths would be strengthened. In addition it is proposed to provide additional parking and cycle lanes from the Doctor's Lane j u n c t i o n t o T e s c o .

As previously advised these works have been prioritised; Phase 1 (in the form of the Charter House scheme) having been carried out. However, a source of funding has not yet been identified for Phases 2 (Doctor's Lane) and 3 (Doctor's Lane to Tesco). Realistically, it is unlikely to be possible to carry out the Doctor's Lane scheme on a phased basis and, certainly, €25,000 will only cover a small element of the cost. I will endeavour to ascertain whether there are other special levies available. In addition, as requested, current proposals will be further reviewed in light of the IFPLUTS published. study, when As requested, I have checked the following planning files:

03/2084 (Glenmoy Developments)

Levies imposed in relation to this file relate to the new Development Contribution Scheme. No roads levies have been paid to date although the commencement notice has issued. In any event as it falls within the ambit of the new Development Contribution Scheme, the roads levies are dealt with on a county wide basis and, accordingly, will be contingent on an annual prioritisation programme to be agreed with the elected members.

02/2060 (Regan and Moloney)

As previously reported, a special levy of €25,000 was imposed in this instance as a contribution towards the town improvement scheme. These monies have not been paid to date. As it comes within the ambit of the former scheme, it will be possible to allocate this to a fund relating to local capital type improvements."

Needless to say Cllr. John McGinley expressed his total dissatisfaction with the report and he demanded that this essential work be carried without any further delay.

Unauthorised Development by Mycete at Moyglare Road, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley and his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg have contacted the Unauthorised Development Section of Kildare County Council in relation to the unauthorised opening of a vehicular entrance on the Maynooth side of the Eircom building on Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

The Planning Permission granted by the Council and An Bord Pleanala specifically prohibits the Developer from creating vehicular access, either temporary or permanent, to the Moyglare Road from the site, which will eventually have 526 houses.

John and Emmet have demanded that the Developer be instructed to close off this access immediately.

Traffic Management in Maynooth

In response to Cllr. John McGinley's motion a presentation was made to the Area Councillors on the proposed new traffic management plan for Maynooth. The new arrangements will be put in place prior to the opening of the Kavanagh Mill development in October. New traffic signals will be erected at the Kilcock Road/ Moyglare Road/Mill Street junction; at the Parson Street/Main Street/Mill Street junction; and at the entrance to the Glenroyal Complex/Public car park. A pedestrian crossing is also proposed at Mill Street, directly opposite the entrance to the new development. Cllr. John McGinley questioned the need for the pedestrian crossing at Mill Street and he also asked if it would be possible to have a roundabout at the church instead of the lights. John also asked that the pedestrian lights at the Bank of Ireland be removed when the signals are installed at the Roost and that the installation of the lights at the Glenroyal Complex be deferred until the new road at the bottom of the Harbour Field is in place.

John also asked that the bus pull-in bays be redesigned so that buses can pull in properly and not hold up traffic. He also demanded strict enforcement of the law on bus only parking as it is completely ignored at present.

Design for Northern Relief Road

Residents will be aware of Cllr. John McGinley's ongoing campaign to have the Northern Relief Road (Moyglare to Moygaddy) completed by Kildare County Council. Residents will also recall that the Council ignored their own Development Plan in giving planning permission to Mycete for 526 houses without the completion of the northern Relief Road and An Bord Pleanala did likewise.

John has demanded that this essential relief road gets top priority for funding under the Council's

Development Contributions Scheme. Prioritising of projects will come before the Council for approval in September and since the Roads Department of the Council were against the granting of permission for the houses unless the relief road was completed Cllr. McGinley would expect that they would recommend that this road would be given a very high priority. John has been given the good news that a preliminary design for the new road will be finalised within the next two months.

Installation of CCTV Cameras

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked that CCTV cameras be installed at the Recycling Centre at the public car park as a matter of urgency. John has also asked the Council to get the OPW to install CCTV cameras at the Obelisk (Connolly's Folly) as the dumping at this historical structure is disgraceful. The only way to stop this crime against the community is through hefty fines.

Yellow Box Needed at Newtown, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to paint a yellow box junction at the exit from houses no. 509 to 513 cul de sac at Newtown, Maynooth. Residents are finding it very difficult to exit in safety onto the road at present.

More Poles on Main Street, Maynooth

Following requests from members of the public, Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council not to erect any more of the 2m high poles, with the miniature litter sign at the top. The poles serve no useful purpose as people don't need to be told in miniature what a litter bin is for and worse still they have been erected just 1m from existing poles. Cllr. McGinley stated that if any such signs need to be erected they should state what the fine is for littering and they should be put on existing poles.

Re-instatement of Footpaths Following Installation of Water Meters

At the request of Cllr. John McGinley the council will be properly re-instating the footpaths in Main Street and elsewhere following the installation of the water meters. The Council advised John that the existing tarmacadam re-instatement was always intended to be a temporary measure.

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
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
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Editorial

Just a short editorial this month to compensate for my rather long one of last month.

Briefly, I will touch on a number of issues that will be on the agenda in the next while.

- 1. The next meeting of the Community Council takes place early September and now is a good time to ask and encourage more representation from the Residents Associations to our monthly meetings. Regularly we find that about 15-18 members attend every month but that means there are many areas not directly represented each month. In the next short while, I will be contacting all the Residents Associations with a view to attending their meetings in order to ask for such increased representation. Better representation, better attendance means different ideas and perspectives on all the issues affecting Maynooth and our future.
- 2. Another issue to be addressed very shortly is the erection of Christmas lights. This year we need the help of some of the business people located on the Main St to facilitate the erection of new boxes at various junctions on the Main St, so we can conform to new electrical safety standards. I am currently meeting with some of those business people and hope to be successful. Otherwise it will be impossible to repeat the success of last year.
- 3. At time of writing a number of traffic lights are being erected in connection with the new Mill Shopping Development. We await with some trepidation the effect these will have on our traffic flows. I said last year and I stick with the basic principle that traffic lights stop traffic and do not facilitate traffic flow. Surely it is breathtakingly obvious that Roundabouts facilitate traffic flow shortly we will see the evidence accumulate.
- 4. Lastly the issue of the Community Centre must take centre stage again. Of particular worry is the length of time been taken to ensure the complete handover of amenity lands as per agreements made between Kildare County Council and landowners. The site for the Community Centre is included in the Carton Avenue Action Area Plan and the people of Maynooth are entitled to ask why this is taking so long to complete.

Question

I am applying for a Fuel Allowance under the National Fuel Allowance under the National Fuel Scheme. If I am eligible for it how much will I receive?

Answer

The National Fuel Scheme, operated by the Department of Social and Family Affairs, is intended to help people who are dependent on long term social welfare or Health Service Executive payments as their sole income and who are unable to meet their heating needs.

Under the scheme people who qualify for the Fuel Allowance receive an extra €9.00 per week. If you qualify for the basic Fuel Allowance you may also qualify for an extra €3.90 per week for smokeless fuel, if you live in an area where there is a ban on smoky coal.

The €3.90 may also be payable to those receiving Disability Benefit or Unemployment Benefit/Assistance for at least 13 weeks and to those receiving Family Income Supplement, who do not qualify for the basic allowance. From October 2005 those getting Occupational Injury Benefit for at least 13 weeks may also qualify for the smokeless fuel allowance.

In order to qualify for the Fuel Allowance you must satisfy a means test. You and the members of your household cannot have more than €51.00 per week in combined income above the appropriate maximum Irish contributory pension/benefit rate or savings/capital of €46,000.00 or more above it. For example, someone without any savings receiving a Widow's or Widower's Contributory Pension of €154.30 per week should qualify if his/her weekly income does not exceed €154.30 plus €51.00 i.e. €205.30.

However, if you are already on a means tested payment you will not be subject to another means test for the Fuel Allowance. Where two or more people living in the same household would qualify for the allowance, only one allowance will be paid.

The allowance is paid for 29 weeks from the first week in October to late April. If you think you are eligible you should apply immediately as the allowance will not be backdated if you apply after the start of the heating season. Applications forms (NFSI) are available from any Post Office or your local Social Welfare Office.

Question

I believe that people aged 65 or over can now get their passports for free. Is that true?

Answer

Yes it is. From August 2005 people aged 65 or over no longer have to pay for their passports. However, they have to apply like everybody else and have to pay for An Post's 'Passport Express' service should they use it.

The cost of a passport for different age groups is as follows:

Standard ten-year passport for people aged 65 and over

Free

Standard ten-year passport for people aged 18
 - 64

€75.00

Large ten-year passport for very frequent travellers

€100.00

Five-year passport for children 3 - 17

€25.0-0

• Three-year passport for children under 3 €15.00

There are additional fees for urgent and for out-ofhours emergency applications.

The application for (APS 1) for people living within the State is available from your local Garda Station and from post offices. With your application you must provide:

- Two recently taken passport ... the back of each photograph and the witness section of the form must be signed by a Garda Siochána.
- Proof of citizenship if it is a renewal application your most recent passport is sufficient.

If you are born in Ireland and it is your first application or you are under 18 years of age the long form of your Irish Birth Certificate is required as proof of citizenship. Children born in Ireland since the start of this year and people born outside Ireland will require additional or alternative forms or proof. Information on what is required depending on your circumstances is supplied with the application form. You can apply in person to the passport office for a passport or by post. You can also apply via the , 'Passport Express' service, available through the post office, which guarantees receipt of a passport with ten

working days where applications are completed correctly with proper documentation. The additional fee for this service is €7.00 per application or €10.00 for up to four applications sent together for a family.

Question

I bought a camera when I was in France recently. When I got back to Ireland I discovered it was faulty. I have written to the shop where I purchased it and received a reply denying any liability. anything else I can do besides taking legal action?

Answer

Yes there is. You should contact the European Consumer Centre Dublin (ECC). The ECC will tell you what you are entitled to and it will try to resolve your complaint through direct contact with the shop.

If your complaint is still unresolved the ECC will refer your complaint to an Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) body in another member state. Alternative dispute resolution is a cheap and easy way to resolve consumer complaints without going to court. The ECC will deal with any complaint arising out of a consumer purchase in any of the 25 EU countries as well as Norway and Iceland.

Problems with deliveries, faulty products or products that do not fit their description will all be dealt with by the ECC. The ECC will inform you of the length of time that a case will take and the cost of taking any alternative dispute resolution procedure and whether the decision of the ADR body is binding or not. They will also keep you informed of how your case is progressing if you agree to go ahead with your complaint.

Contact the ECC with proof of purchase of the item that you bought and any copies of correspondence that you have had with the shop. The ECC will advise you of the best course of action.

Question

A friend of mine moved to Ireland about three years ago. How long must he be living here before he can apply for Irish citizenship?

Becoming an Irish citizen based on your residence in Ireland is known as naturalisation. The conditions are

- You must be at least 18 years of age (or married if younger than 18)
- You must be of good character
- You must have been continuously resident in the State for a year immediately before the date of application and, in the 8 years previous to that, have been in residence for a total of 4 years
- You must intend to continue to reside in the State after naturalisation
- You must intend to continue to reside in the State after naturalisation
- You must make a declaration of fidelity to the nation and loyalty to the State.

If you are married to an Irish citizen and living on the island of Ireland you may meet special conditions for naturalisation, based on your marriage. In addition to certain other conditions you must be married for at least 3 years to your Irish spouse. Also, you must have been continuously resident on the island of Ireland for a year immediately before the date of application and, in the 4 years previous to that, have been in residence for a total of 2 years.

Those married before 30 November 2002 may be entitled to become an Irish citizen by making a declaration of post-nuptial citizenship. However, the latest date for making a post-nuptial declaration of marriage is 29 November 2005.

When calculating periods of residence certain periods may be excluded, such as those where your presence was not properly documented, where the permission to remain was for study purposes or while having a claim for asylum examined.

Application forms, along with information notes n what supporting documentation is required, are available from the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform, 13/14 Burgh Quay, Dublin 2

If your application for naturalisation is approved you may have to pay a fee. For a refugee, a stateless person or a programme refugee there is no fee. The spouse or widow/widower of an Irish citizen will have to pay €126.97. For most others the fee is €634.87.

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

Common things with uncommon uses

Tea

Facial:

Keep used herbal tea bags to make fragrant steam treatments for your face. Empty the contents of the bag into a saucepan of boiling water, put a towel over your head and lean over the saucepan for 5 - 10 mins.

Hair brightener:

For golden highlights in red or brown hair, rinse your hair with orange pekoe tea after a shampoo.

Plant tonic:

Help ferns and other house-plants to thrive by watering them once a week with a weak solution of tepid tea.

Pet soother:

If your dog has wet, red skin eruptions, soothe the sore spots by putting cold, damp tea bags on them; consult the vet as soon as possible

Lacquer shine:

Wash black lacquer pieces with strong tea and then wipe them dry with a soft cloth to bring out their deep shine.

Dust damper:

Keep dust down when you clean out a fireplace by sprinkling most tea leaves over the ashes first.

Dental aid:

A cool moist tea bag pressed against a bleeding gum with your finger will help to stop the blood after an extraction.

Eye relaxer:

Save the moist tea bag after making a cup of tea and place it in the refrigerator. Then, when you have a spare moment, squeeze out the excess liquid and lay the bag over hot, itchy or tired eyes for 15 minutes or so.

Timers

Prod:

Set the timer to remind you to make a telephone call, or to call again if the line is engaged.

Organiser:

When working in blocks of time, set a timer to prompt you to move on to the next task at the right moment. Memory jogger:

Use a timer to remember to turn off the garden sprinkler, or to set the video to record a television programme.

Mediator:

When youngsters can't resolve whose turn it is to play with a toy, give each one 15 minutes with the desired object. When the buzzer sounds, their turn is ended.

Eggshells

Mini funnel:

Poke a hole in half an egg-shell, then pour the liquid through it into a container.

Brown eggs:

Poke a small hole in both ends of an egg (the hole at one end should be slightly larger than the other). Then with your lips at the smaller hole, gently but firmly blow out the contents. Leave the shell to dry, and then paint and decorate with scraps of material or sequins. To use as a Christmas tree decoration, attach a ribbon or string to one end.

Planter:

Fill half an eggshell with soil, moisten it with water and then plant a seed. Support the shell in an egg box.

Fertiliser:

Sprinkle crushed eggshells around garden plants to discourage slugs. Toss any extra eggshells into the compost heap for the same reason.

Pot scrubber:

When cleaning pots and pans while camping, a handful of broken eggshells is a good substitute for steel wool.

Mosaic:

Paint the inside and outside of eggshells a variety of colours, and the crush them in a paper bag. Draw a picture on cloth or paper and spread slightly diluted white glue over it; sprinkle appropriately coloured shells over the glue. Protect your picture with several coats of acrylic sealer.

Garden aid:

Sprinkle freshly planted seeds with crushed eggshells to mark the rows; they may also help to keep the birds away.

Hair Dryers

Wax remover:

If candle wax drips onto a table, allow it to harden and then scrape off as much as possible with a spoon or blunt knife blade. Soften the remainder with warm air from a hair dryer, and then lift it off with a paper towel or blotting paper.

Invisible ink revealer:

After writing a message on a piece of paper with lemon or onion juice, make it invisible by drying it with the hair dryer on Low. Make the writing visible again with a dryer set on High.

Traveller's aid:

Hang just-washed garments on a towel rack or shower curtain rod and blow-dry.

Bandage remover:


Ease an adhesive bandage off a would by blowing warm air onto the plaster.

Trainer dryer:


If the toes of your trainers never seem to dry, aim the nozzle of a dryer set on Low into each shoe for about 5 minutes.

Duster:

Blow dust off a high shelf or out from underneath an electrical appliance - such as a stereo or computer - with a dryer.



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All Come Here That Have Tried Elsewhere

Cllr.John McGinley: Mayor of Kildare and Chairman of Kildare Co. Co. (Interview)

Cllr.John McGinley was elected Mayor of Kildare and Chairman of Kildare County Council on July 12th 2005. The ceremony took place at the council chambers in Naas County Kildare. For those present the ceremony was unpretentious, simple and impressive. For many of us who had no previous experience of being in the council chambers or hearing the contributions made by councillors, it was impressive to see how business was conducted in a dignified and professional manner.

There is a feeling, which is widespread that community progress is stifled by bureaucracy and that councillors are frustrated by the management system within the County. To a limited extent that continues to be true but it is also a fact that great progress is being made in Kildare due to the continuous professional work being done by our councillors. We at the Newsletter got a good insight into their work when the newly elected Mayor kindly agreed to our request for an interview. We were welcomed into John's home in Maynooth and over the following hour or so we were given a good insight into the life of a public representative. We were led through the procedures that have to be gone through, without excitement or hysterics to procure those projects, which are necessary for the improvement of the town of Maynooth and its Community.

The one feature that shone through our discussions was the optimism that John has for the future of our town and the conviction that representations made regarding the future developments in our area will fit in with the overall framework that befits the only university town in Ireland. The following were some of the matters discussed, which impact on the daily life of the town and its citizens.



Rail and bus service.

There has been great progress in this area. For those who travelled on the first commuter rail service nearly twenty years ago the current service is in the luxury class. However with the number of new housing developments in the area it is now clear that additional resources are required. John is pressing for a more frequent timetable and some Maynooth/ Leixlip direct to Connolly runs. He is also lobbying for a later slot than 10.30 PM for the last train to Maynooth from Pearse. The area could do with more buses especially new routes. He is not in favour of private operators being given existing routes serviced by Dublin Bus but would not object to them tendering with Dublin Bus for new routes. He was happy to advise that the proposed car park at Louisa Bridge is now on track and work will begin in the near future. In all of these matters John and his colleagues are continuously in touch with CIE and it is from these contacts that progress will continue to be made.



New playgrounds

Work has already commenced on the new children's playgrounds in the Harbour Field. John has being campaigning for this project for quite some time. The design is the most up to date available and the contractor has experience of building similar facilities in the North and the UK. Kildare County Council have made the funds available to build a playground for 0-6 year olds and a facility for 6-12 year olds. Funds have also been made available for a playground for 12-18 years of age but more consultation is necessary with community groups before this project is started. It is envisaged that there will be a skateboard area within the older play area.

Cllr. John McGinley Interview (contd.)

New Community Centre and Theatre

This project is very important for the development of the community. There is as yet no community agreement as to the best way forward. However, the availability of development funds for the town of Maynooth means that there are now no financial barriers to the development of community facilities. John envisages that the Community Council Offices could be centralised in a new community centre at the Geraldine Hall. He would like the Geraldine Hall to be restored and extended to also house a new community theatre for use by community groups. He would also like to see a new scouts den developed on the site in the vicinity of the new children and teens' playgrounds at The Harbour Field.

Traffic

One of the most significant achievements from John's point of view was the re-routing of heavy goods vehicles (HGV's) out of Maynooth. With the ring roads in place it is no longer necessary for such vehicles to go through the centre of the town. This is a great step forward and Maynooth is one of the first towns in Ireland to successfully re route HGV away from its town centre.


These are only some of the areas that John and his colleagues on the County Council are continuously working to improve the quality of service to the public. Another area that John is involved in is seeking increased contribution from Central Government for Kildare County Council. Conscious of the rapid growth in population in Kildare, Meath and Wicklow, the Government per capita grant is falling behind the rest of the country for these counties. The three counties have commissioned a consultant

to prepare a report on funding and are confident that they can put forward a balanced case for increased contributions from central Government. Maynooth is developing at a rapid rate. With the increased land being made available for development, the builders have had to supply a corresponding area for parkland and community development e.g. playing fields. There is now a strong possibility of a regional theatre being built in Maynooth on land adjacent to the Tesco site.

On the issue of educational facilities in the town John and his labour colleagues will continue to press for funding for new schools and building extensions as the town population increases. It is of interest to note, that John backed by the Maynooth Branch of the Labour Party put a motion to Labour Party National Executive Committee in 1994 calling for the abolition of Third Level fees and the introduction of free University education for all. This motion was adopted and subsequently implemented by then Labour Minister for Education, Niamh Bhreathnach.

With the interview at a close John generously gave his time to show the writer the site of the new playground development in the Harbour Field. He also pointed out suitable locations within the field for further community development. It is true that in recent times elected representatives have not got a good press. But it is also true, that, with the exception of a few bad apples the vast majority of our councillors are out there working very hard for their communities. Without them the country would be poorer for their absence.

Maynooth Senior Citizens Committee 1965 - 2005 Celebrating 40 years of Caring

The sixties were a turbulent time and 1965 was as eventful as any part of that decade. In politics, Sean Lemass headed north to meet Terence O'Neill, while in Rhodesia (South Africa) Ian Smith headed south with the white vote.

Dublin was at a stand-still with buses, bakers, newspapers and telephones on strike. In fact all that moved were protesters and army lorries.

In show business, the Beatles met the Queen to receive and M.B.E. Butch Moore walked the streets in the rain in Europe, while Julie Andrews kept the hills alive with The Sound of Music.

This was also the year that Princess Margaret caused a stir in Abbeyleix. The travellers caused a stir in Carlow and Princess Grace caused a stir everywhere else. In sport, Galway beat Kerry in the all Ireland football final and Tipperary beat Wexford in the hurling.

In religious circles Bishop Conway got a new hat and the Mass got a new look.

All these news worthy events received great attention from the media, (when not on strike). However, there was another event taking place that did not command such a high profile but impacted on society with great effort.

The International Red Cross designated 1965 as the "Year of Old People", while the term 'old people' is not politically correct by today's standards, it opened the door to a better society where discrimination ceased to be acceptable. On May 24th, inspired by the world stage, Maynooth branch of the Red Cross, held a public meeting which was attended by interested groups and individuals. Dr. Brendan O' Donnell, County Medical Officer, explained the context in which the Red Cross had instigated the move. He went on to say that the relative number of older people in Ireland was on the increase. In 1900 the proportion of people over 65 was 3%, by 1965 it had grown to 11% and it was estimated that it would reach 15% by the year 2000. How far seeing this man was.

A committee was formed on that occasion. The Maynooth Senior Citizens Committee, as we know it today was born and the rest, they say, is history. We have seen a lot of changes through the years and have achieved much, not least the fact that our committee, have stood the test of time. While many of the events, which I highlighted at the outset of this article, have faded with time, the Senior Citizens Committee is as vibrant as ever.

So with that in mind we felt we had something to celebrate and this we did in style on Sunday June 19th.We started our day with a special healing Mass in our Parish church, concelebrated by Msg. Ales, Frs. Paul, Liam and Pat Joe.

This was the first event we held in our own church and I thank Frs. Alex and Paul for all their help in making it happen. It was lovely to have Fr. Liam back with us as he served on our committee in the early seventies.

Before foreign climes beckoned and Fr. Pat Joe who gave us a lot of his time down through the years. The occasion was attended by all our Senior Citizens, committee members past and present, benefactors and friends. It was also a privilege to have with us on the day, Mary Cullen, Marie Kelly and Carmel Reilly, who were influential in the formation of the first committee and responsible for it's continuance over many years. There were, of course, a few of the present committee around then, but we were only apprentices.

What are we:

Meetings take place on the first Tuesday of each Month at 8pm in the Health Centre in Leinster Street. Aim and objectives:

- To assist older people to retain independence and autonomy over their own lives.

How is this managed:

We do this by providing opportunity, through a social club environment, to meet their friends, to access information on rights, entitlements, health issues, diet and safety and security.

We provide opportunity for pleasure and healthy exercise, social outings, theatre, dancing, holidays and religious activities.

We provide a voice, particularly for the most vulnerable, by representation through the political system or through submissions to the National Senior Citizens Parliament to which we are affiliated.

How many are catered for?:

About 200 older people benefit directly from our work, in one way or another, plus the added benefit to family/carers in terms of support and respite. We try to meet and cater for all needs, be it through the social club for the more active, or services to the immobile or house-bound or those in Nursing Homes.

Services:

Safety and Security:

We provide personal monitored alarms, safety chains, door and window locks, smoke alarms, spark guards and lanterns (to discourage the use of candles during a power failure) and undertake small repairs. This part of our work inspires confidence and peace of mind.

Fuel Provision:

Fuel is provided during the winter months. This comes in many forms e.g.: solid fuel, bottled gas or an allowance towards electricity payments. Heat is an essential component in the life of older people as hypothermia is a real danger.

Visits:

There is a committee member to cater for, and keep in contact with, each area. No amount of alarms and locks can replace personal contact.

Transport:

While we encourage all our people to walk when they can, without transport many of our people would be isolated.



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

Mobile Day Hospital:

Getting this service in 1993, over other towns, was another cog in our wheel of progress. This a purpose built coach, fully equipped and provided by the Health Service Executive, with the hospitality provided by our committee. This is an important service, as without it our older people would spend a lot of time travelling to and waiting around hospitals. Alas this service hangs in the balance at the moment due to adjustments on the part of the Health Service Executive.

Fund raising:

Our main fundraising event is our Annual Sale of Work, which takes place in November. Our annual collection takes place in March and the Labour Party organizes an annual sponsored walk which is a legacy left to our senior citizens by Tony Smith. Other monies come out our way through donations, local raffles and some state grants.

In 2004 from an income of €28,453, we spent €28,016.

Hopes and Expectations:

The Years Ahead:

As our work is an ongoing process we do not see it in terms of giant leaps but small steps of steady progress. We would hope that one of those steps would be the acquisition of a suitable premises for our activities.

On the wider issue of equal opportunity, we would like to see policies more user friendly, (e.g. a bus pass is superfluous where there is no bus. A taxi voucher perhaps?). Or an acceptable income that eliminates the need for concessions. Where attitudes towards older people in society would change to give us the foresight to see a human resource and not a social problem. We would like full participation of older people in a society that respects all it's citizens and maybe, just maybe, ageism along with all other discriminatory ways would become distant memory.

A lot of progress has been made over the past forty years. People are living longer, are more active, healthier, more involved and more independent. This progress is mainly due to the many organizations lie ourselves who highlight the discrepancies in our system. The voluntary sector is an integral part of any community as it is difficult for the state to sustain all the necessary services. However the statuary sector needs to recognize the pivotal role, played by

When all our citizens have choices instead of concessions. When we are heard without being patronized. When we can speak for ourselves, whatever our age, and not have to apologize. In a just and fair society, we are all equal.







Low-Fat Recipes for September

Starter

Vegetable and Pasta Soup

Serves 4

Preparation time: 15 mins Cooking time: 25 mins

250g/8oz carrots, diced 250g/8oz courgettes, sliced 2 large celery sticks, chopped 1 large onion, finely chopped 125g/4oz cabbage, shredded 600ml/1pt chicken stock 300ml/½ pint tomato juice 1 garlic clove, crushed 125g/4oz small dried pasta shapes Salt and pepper

- 1. Place all the vegetables in a saucepan with the stock, tomato juice and garlic. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat, and skim off any scum that rises to the surface.
- 2. Add the pasta and season with salt and pepper. Cover the pan and simmer for 15—20 minutes or until all the vegetables and the pasta are tender.
- 3. Serve the soup piping hot in warmed individual soup bowls

Main Course

Pork Fillet with Grapefruit Sauce

Serves 6

Preparation time: 15 mins plus marinating

Cooking time: about 10 mins

250g/8oz pork fillet, cut into 5mm/¼in thick medallions

3 spring onions, finely chopped

Finely grated rind and juice of ½ grapefruit

1 teaspoon soft light brown sugar

2 tablespoons chopped parsley

1 tablespoon olive oil

150ml/¼pt unsweetened apple (see below)

150ml/1/4pt chicken stock

2 grapefruit, peel and divided into segments, pith and membrane removed

Salt and pepper

To make the apple purée, put 500g/1lb peeled, cored and sliced cooking apples into a saucepan with 2 tablespoons of water. Cover and cook until they form a purée. Beat or liquidize until smooth.

- Place the pork medallions in a shallow dish with the spring onions, grapefruit rind and juice, brown sugar, salt and pepper to taste, and the parsley. Turn to coat well. Cover and chill 3 -4 hours.
- 2. Drain the pork medallions, reserving the marinade. Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry the medallions briskly until sealed on all sides.
- 3. Mix the apple purée with stock and reserved marinade and pour over the pork. Cover and simmer for about 7 minutes until the pork is tender. Stir in the grapefruit segments and heat through.

Desserts

French Apple Flan

Serves 10

Preparation time:15 minutes plus chilling

Cooking time:35 - 40 minutes

1kg/2lb cooking apples peeled, cored, thinly sliced and puréed

2 red-skinned dessert apples, thinly sliced

50q/2oz caster sugar

4 tablespoons apricot jam

2 tablespoons lemon juice

Páte sucrée:

150g/5oz plain flour

50g/2oz caster sugar

1 egg and 1 egg white, beaten together

Few drops vanilla essence

- To make the páte sucrée, sift the flour on to a cool work surface. Make a well in the centre and add the butter, sugar, egg and egg white and vanilla essence. Using the fingertips of one hand, work these ingredients together, then draw in the flour. Knead lightly until smooth, then cover and chill for 1 hour.
- 2. Roll out the pastry very thinly on a floured work surface and use to line a 25cm/10in fluted flan ring. Fill the case generously with apple purée, then arrange an overlapping layer of sliced apples on top. Sprinkle with the sugar. Bake in a preheated oven, 190°C (375°F). Gas Mark 5, for 35 40 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, heat the jam with the lemon juice, then strain and brush over the apples. Serve hot or cold.

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
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Century of Irish Sporting Heroes

Some of the most remarkable world records have been set in the men's long jump. Jesse Owens with a leap of 26 feet, 8.5 inches in 1935 made a mark that was unbeaten for 25 years. Few who witnessed the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City will forget the unbelievable jump of Bob Beamon who created a new World record of 29 feet 2.5 inches, which still stands to day.

What is generally not known is that one of the greatest exponents of the long jump and the triple jump was Irishman Peter O'Connor. In 1901 Peter set a New World record for the long jump that was to remain unbeaten for nearly twenty years. At Ballsbridge Dublin on August 5th, he cleared 24 feet 11.75 inches. It was the fifth time that he had improved the then official world best, and when the IAAF was established, this was accepted as their inaugural world mark. What makes his feat more praiseworthy was that his successes were achieved despite primitive training conditions and lack of financial and logistical support. His world record was to remain on the book for over twenty years before the American Ned Gourdin beat it.

Peter O'Connor was born in Cumberland England on October 24th 1872. His father Edward, was a skilled artisan. He was one of a select number of shipwrights selected to build a ship at a new shipyard in Millom, Cumberland. He moved his young family and his wife then pregnant with Peter from their home in Wicklow to Cumberland. On completion of the contract the family returned to Wicklow town.

Highly intelligent and progressive, Peter attended school until he reached fourteen years of age. His family was not in a position to fund secondary education and he eventually gained employment as a solicitor's clerk. His experiences in national school gave him an enduring dislike of British and Unionist rule in Ireland. An educational system that rooted out a native language and replaced it with a limited vocabulary of English left the Catholic youth of Ireland severely handicapped in gaining professional employment. Driven by the loss of a second level education in his youth, he subsequently qualified as a solicitor. He established a successful law firm in Waterford City and was appointed Vice President of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland in 1933. His political dislike of British rule in Ireland led to to many clashes with the Irish athletic ruling body, dominated by unionist officials. It also led to one of the great Olympic "incidents" of modern times. In 1906 representing the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in the Athens interim Games he climbed the flagpole to prevent the Union flag being

raised at his silver medal winning ceremony. He replaced it with a green flag with the words "Erin go Bragh". Peter although wearing an Irish blazer with shamrock crest was not accredited to Ireland. Since the Country was technically part of the UK, the Greek organising committee would not recognise Peter's right to compete for his homeland. There is no doubt that British and American officials behaved shamefully at those games to rob Peter of the long jump gold medal. In an extraordinary situation, Halpin, the American team leader was left in sole control of both take off and landing area of the jumping pit after a British official absented himself from the competition. There is no doubt that this was done, as a direct response to Peter's desire to compete for Ireland. Halpin called Peter's winning jump a foul and handed the title to a fellow American. Justice was done however when Peter won the gold medal for the hop, step and jump (triple jump) beating fellow Irishman Con Leahy with a winning jump of 46 feet 2 and one eight inches. To add to his satisfaction he beat the American Myer Prinstein who was handed the gold in the long jump three days before.

In the history of athletics, Peter O'Connor was nicknamed " the Irish antelope" He inherited a natural suppleness and spring, and although he was over twenty before taking a serious interest in athletics he would by all accounts try to improve his triple and long jumping for fun. Peter O'Connor wrote of his training "I never had a coach or anyone to

instruct me, but I conceived an idea of my own, that to cover a big distance you must, in addition to speed, rise high in the air". It was his concentration on the essentials of the event, which helped him to the world record. Peter did not compete in the British championships until 1900 when he was twenty-eight years old. He finished second to the great American Alvin kraenzlein. A week later kraenzlein won the Olympic title in Paris. At the end of August that year Peter jumped 24 feet, 7.75 inches to set a New World best. The following year 1901, was Peter's great season. At the end of May he jumped 24 feet 9 inches and in the first week of July won the first of six consecutive British AAA Championships. A week later he reached 24 feet 11.25 inches and added another quarter inch on July 28. All these were New World marks. Then in August he set the new official world mark, recognised by the IAAF, of 24 feet 11.75 inches.

Following his retirement from competition Peter was drawn into juristriction problems, which bedevilled Irish athletics following partition. These problems ran right through the twentieth century and were only satisfactorily settled in the eighties. Although a supporter of the GAA, the forerunner to the NACA he was against the ban on foreign games believing it was counterproductive. An avid supporter of athletics he travelled to a number of Olympics including those held in Los Angeles in 1932. Peter died at the family home on November 9th 1957.

Bond Bridge Update

Council Officials have advised Cllr. John McGinley that tenders for the project were opened on August 12th and the Council expect to be signing the contract in the first or second week of September. The contractor will be on site as soon as the contract is signed.

Public Lights in The Square being Repaired

The public lights in The Square, Maynooth have regrettably not been working for some time now and vandals have taken the opportunity to smash the lights with a sledgehammer.

Cllr. John McGinley is pleased to report that agreement has finally been reached between the interested parties and the ESB were on site in mid - August carrying out works that will enable the public lights to be put in working order again.

Construction of Maynooth Playground Started on August 8th

Construction of the €355,000 Children's Playground at The Harbour Field, Maynooth is now well underway and will be completed this September. As requested by Cllr. John McGinley a new secure gate has been

fitted beside the ICA Hall entrance and the unsightly mound of clay can be removed as a result.

The funding for this state of the art playground will come from the Council's Development Contributions Scheme. Cllr. McGinley was successful in ring fencing these levies for Recreational, Amenity and Community use in the area in which they were levied.

When John began his campaign for playgrounds some five years ago there wasn't a single playground in the county. Now in addition to Maynooth the Council have signed contracts for playgrounds in Leixlip, Celbridge and Kildare town.

Great credit is due to Maynooth Playground Action for bringing the project to a finality. Without pressure from them there would be no playground.

Safety in the Skies over Maynooth

A number of Maynooth residents have expressed their concern to Cllr. John McGinley about the noise, low height and massive increase in the number of aircraft flying directly over Maynooth. Accordingly, John has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That Kildare County Council demand of the owners of Weston Aerodrome and the Irish Aviation Authority that they implement noise abatement and safety procedures at Weston aerodrome in line with those in place at most airports large and small worldwide. The appropriate procedures with regards to Maynooth are that aircraft exiting Weston aerodrome to the west should track south of the M4 Motorway, and that aircraft approaching Weston from the west should track north of Maynooth. Furthermore, all aircraft operating out of Weston aerodrome should be instructed to fly no lower than the regulation 1,500 ft. (QNH altimeter setting), which equates with approximately 1,750 ft. above sea level at Maynooth. Adherence to these procedures will

considerably enhance the safety of the residents of Maynooth. We further demand that the Irish Aviation Authority and Weston aerodrome put monitoring procedures in place to ensure that these noise abatement and safety procedures are fully complied with. Moreover, as there is no systematic procedures in place to monitor the activities of aircraft out of Weston aerodrome in the skies over Maynooth , we demand that a monitoring regime is put in place to ensure that all aviation regulations and local noise abatement and safety procedures are fully complied with"

Meadowbrook Link Road

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following "Progress Report" on the Meadowbrook Link Road at the Leixlip Area Meeting on July 15:

"This scheme is now complete. However, some issues (mainly relating to lining and signing) as identified in the road safety audit will have to be implemented before the road is open to the public. The necessary statutory procedures relating to its taking in charge have been approved by the full Council.

In addition, in relation to Beaufield, works will commence in the coming days in relation to the traffic calming scheme as recently circulated to the area members. Such works will involve ramps, fencing, line markings, signs and tree pruning. Amendments to the scheme (in the form of an additional pedestrian crossing) have been incorporated into a revised scheme, as requested. I will be in a position shortly to announce the opening date for the Meadowbrook Link road."

As no traffic calming has yet been put in place on Beaufield Road Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the Council to carry out this essential work with some urgency.

In addition John has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

That traffic lights be installed at the junction of the Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road in order to facilitate ease of exit from the new Link Road and that measures be taken to prevent the parking of caravans on the greens adjoining the new Link Road."

Footpath Repairs at Entrance to Old Greenfield

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council have repaired the dangerous section of footpath on the right hand side on the way into Old Greenfield.

TESCO HGV's still going Through Main Street, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley sent the following E mail to Michael Sullivan, Manager TESCO Ireland on 27 July:

"It is extraordinary that TESCO HGV drivers continue to break the "No HGV's Through Maynooth" law. As you know I drew your attention to this some time ago and you told me that you would advise all of your drivers to use the M4 INTEL Link. I would ask that you do so again and also tell them that by going through Maynooth they are not only breaking the law, they are also adding 16km to their journey. The INTEL Link from the motorway is the direct route to TESCO Maynooth."

Mr. Sullivan responded immediately, even though he was on holidays, and apologised profusely. He stated that all drivers would again be instructed to use the direct route to TESCO, Maynooth and that members of the public should note the registration numbers of any vehicles that break the law by going through Main Street, Maynooth

O2 Planning Application Declared Invalid for a Second Time

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by Kildare County Council that the planning application by O2 for retention of the unauthorised communications mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth, has been declared invalid for a second time.

The Planning Application was declared invalid on August 5th because the site notice and the newspaper notice did not match and because no site notice was in place following an inspection by the Council.

Deputy stated that it was incredible that O2 were unable to lodge a planning application properly and in his opinion they were playing with the Council. Last December the Council issued a warning letter to O2 calling on them to remove the unauthorised mast. Nine months later and the unauthorised mast is still in place.

Deputy Stagg stated that it was time that the Council got tough with O2 and he indicated that he was now calling on the Council to take Court Proceedings against O2 to remove the unauthorised mast.

Gardening Tips for September

September weather, no less than that of any other month in Ireland, can be changeable, but on the whole it is drier than August, and mild spells permit a good harvest. Latitude, proximity to the sea, and altitude combine, however, to affect the duration of sunlight received each day, and must increasingly be taking into account in timing gardening operations. The further north, the further inland and the higher a garden, the earlier autumn and winter are likely to visit it, and pre-winter tasks, usually need to be advanced by 1 to 3 weeks.

The Flower Garden:

- Dead-head border flowers as they fade, and cut back stems while green to make compost.
 Divide spring and early summer-flowering border plants if overcrowded. Discard the older central parts and replant the younger ones.
- Start bulb and corm planting this month, particularly the smaller bulbs of chionodoxa, fritillaria, iries, muscari, Narcissus species, ornitholgalum puschkinia and scilla. the earlier they are expected to flower, the earlier they should be put to bed. Plant the corms of crocus and the tubers and rhizomes of Anemone species, eranthis, erythronium and ranunculus as soon as possible, especially in the north. They dry out quickly when left in the air. Hyacinths, large daffodil and narcissus bulbs and tulips can wait until October - November, if necessary, but lose nothing by being planted earlier. Place at a depth equal to twice their own width in the soil. Set on a layer of same in clav soils.
- Plant the flowering onions (Allium species) this month and next, in sunny positions and humusenriched soil. Give the large bulbs of crown imperials (frilillaria imperialis) a sunny south aspect, in a deeply worked and rich soil. Set them on their sides, to prevent moisture collecting in the dimple, 15cm (6in.) deep.
- Plant out hervaceous perennials, and pinks raised from cuttings earlier this year, where they are to flower. Begin with planting out biennials to their final flowering positions in the latter of the month. Make sowings of hardy annuals such as calendula, cornflower, eschscholzia, gypsophilia, larkspur, mallow, scabious, love-in-a-mist, Shirley poppy and pansies on open sites to provide early colourful spring bloom next year.

The Vegetable Garden:

Continue to lift potatoes this month and next when the haulms start to yellow, as there will be no further growth in the tubers.

Lift mature root crops towards the end of the month. Remove tops close to the crowns, and store beetroot and carrots layered in sand in boxes and bins, placed in a cool cellar shed. Safeguard from mice and rats by enclosing in fine-mesh netting, or put down a suitable bait. Carrots can also be stored in an outdoor clamp. Parsnips, salsify and scorzonera can be left in the ground until needed.

Earth up celery and leeks being grown in trenches. Stake plants of Brussels sprouts and sprouting broccoli exposed to wind.

Harvest all the tomatoes from outdoor plants at the first hint of frost, or when night temperatures drop below 10°C (50°F). Simply place green fruits in paper bags in a warm room to ripen: since warmth, not light, ripens them, it is a waste of time putting them in rows on the window-sills

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
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
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Editorial

The September meeting of Maynooth Community took place in the Glenroyal Hotel on the 12th of September.

Flag Day Collection

Treasurer Willie Saults thanked all involved with the collection, he also noted that the festival was very successful which raised much needed funds.

Community Centre / Geraldine Hall

Chairperson Brid Feely noted that these issues have been on board for sometime, and its time now to move them forward. It is vital that we now put forward what we want in the Geraldine Hall. Terry Nealon proposed that the Geraldine Hall is an ideal situation for an Arts Centre incorporating a theatre and other outlets. It was agreed to wait for one more month and meet with Kildare County Council on this project.

Community Centre

A long discussion took place on this. There are two options to look at here.

No. 1 proposal - Funding from Development levies

No 2 proposal - The Maynooth Community Church plan.

The meeting, fully explored all options, also the Community Church plan was seen as a good option.

Chairperson Brid Feely said we now need to focus our energies to get a Community Centre for Maynooth, it was agreed to adapt John McGinley 's proposal and to go to the area committee in October.

Person of the year Award

This project is now going ahead, it is proposed to have nomination papers in the Newsletter with a two/three month run up and have it ready for St Patrick's Day.

Dulcedo Development



Useful Tips

Halloween and fancy dress

- Use household items and cast-off clothing to create Halloween or fancy-dress costumes that don't cost money.
- Transform old colanders, bowls and plastic containers into helmets and other hats. Cut a deflated football in half and spray-paint it silver for a robot's, spaceman's, Valkyrie's or knight's helmet. Turn thick work gloves into gauntlets by spraying them silver.
- Use shredded cellophane from gift baskets as a wig.
- A balaclava makes a good start for a lot of costumes; attach animals ears, wool or jewellery.
- Make white clown makeup by mixing 2 tablespoons of cornflour with 1 tablespoon of solid margarine or butter. Add some colour, if you like, with a few drops of food colouring.
- For facial decoration, cut stars, flowers or hearts from brightly coloured tissue paper. To make the glue, cook one large potato, with its skin, until it's soft; let it cool. Rub the cut-outs on the potato and then stick them on dry, clean skin.
- If you need extra padding for a costume, wear large tights and stuff them with cushions or rags.
- Try this for a fun outfit turn yourself into a slice of pizza. Start with a piece of carpet foam underlay; cut it into a triangular shape as tall as you are. Spray it orange onto the 'crust' at the base of the triangle (allow for plenty of ' crust' because you';; have to fold some of it over your shoulders). Then spray the rest of the triangle tomato-sauce red (or red and yellow if you like your pizza with cheese). Cut mushroom slices, green pepper strips and onion rings from plastic foam meat trays and paint them the appropriate colours. pepperoni sausage, cut circles from a brown paper bag and paint them reddish-brown they curl up just like the real thing. Glue the pieces on the pizza slice or, better still, attach them with Velcro glued to the slice and to the backs of the various pieces. Fold over the crust, cut a hole for your head, and staple the crust together at your shoulders

Kettle scale

- Mix up a solution of one part malt vinegar to one part water and pour enough into your kettle to just cover the element. Bring to the boil and leave overnight. Then rinse out.
- Or, boil water in the kettle and then add 13 teaspoons/75g citric acid granules. Leave for 20 minutes, then rinse.
- Or, use a chemical descaler. Read the manufacturer's instructions first.

Houseguests

- When inviting guests to your home, let them know what time you expect them to arrive and to leave. Mention in your invitation any activities, such as tennis or swimming, that call for special clothes.
- If someone has a reputation for staying longer than scheduled, arrange an activity for the day after the agreed departure time and inform the guest of your plans.
- Check to see if your guests have food and drink preferences or allergies.

The role of the guest

- Bring a small gift wine, flowers or a homemade cake. Or bring toys to leave behind for your hosts' children.
- Adjust to the schedule of the house. If you're an early riser, try to remain in your room until your hosts are up and about. If you must have a cup of coffee, move quietly around the kitchen.
- of asking if and how you can help, simply observe. Work out what needs to be done and do it. A good guest pitches in by helping to clean up after meals, emptying the kitchen bin and occasionally buying the groceries.
- Offer to bring or buy one night's dinner. If you plan to visit for three nights or longer (usually not a good idea), take your hosts out or cook for them, but give them enough warning so that they won't already have made plans for that meal.
- Keep the guest room neat and clean even when the door is closed. On the last day of your stay, remove and fold your soiled linen and remake the bed with just the blanket so that the guest room looks presentable after you leave.
- Ask permission before using the telephone and offer to re-imburse your host.`
- Don't overstay your welcome

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes

Question

I am giving up work to look after my mother who lives nearby. I was told I should register for the Homemaker's Scheme. What is it?

Answer

The Homemaker's Scheme is a scheme run by the Department of Social and Family Affairs that makes it easier for you as a homemaker to qualify for the Old Age Contributory Pension when you reach age 66. a homemaker is defined as a person who gives up work to take care of a child under 12 years of age or an incapacitated child/adult aged 12 or over who requires full-time care and attention.

To qualify for the Old Age Contributory Pension you must have a certain yearly average number of PRSI contributions paid or credited from the time you entered social insurance up to pension age. Under the Homemaker's Scheme the years spent as a homemaker are ignored in calculating your yearly average number of contributions. Up to a maximum of 20 homemaker's years can be disregarded.

To be eligible for the Homemaker's Scheme, you must be under 66 years of age and permanently resident in the State. You must have been in insurable employment/self-employment (i.e. you must have entered insurance on or after the age of 16 and before the age of 56) and you must not engage in full-time employment - you are permitted to work and earn less than €38 gross per week.

You must be living with and caring for the child/incapacitated person a full-time basis. Since March 2005 you may be eligible if you are not living with the person you are caring for, provided that a direct system of communication exists between your residence and that of the care recipient. This may be a telephone or alarm system. You must be providing full-time care and attention and the care recipient must not already be receiving full-time care and attention within their own residence from another person.

You should register for the scheme before the end of the contribution year following the year in which you first become a homemaker. You are awarded a homemaking year for each full contribution year you are caring. You are awarded homemaker's credits up to the end of the contribution year in which you become a homemaker. Similar credits are awarded in the year you stop being a homemaker. These credits are only of use in qualifying for Old Age Contributory Pension. If you are getting Carer's Allowance, Carer's Benefit or Child Benefit (and providing the child with full-time care) there is no need to register as you will be automatically recorded a homemaker.

Question

I bought a jacket that was reduced in a sale. I discovered a problem with the lining and I am wondering if I have any rights since the jacket was reduced in a sale?

Answer

You have the same consumer rights when you buy goods in a sale as you would normally have i.e they must be of merchantable quality, fit for their purpose and as described. Even if a retailer displays a notice refusing to exchange or refund you still have rights under consumer law. Your rights are governed by the Sale of Goods and Supply of Services Act 1980.

You should return the jacket as soon as possible to the retailer as it is the retailer and not the manufacturer who is responsible for putting things right. Leave the jacket lining as it is because tampering or attempting to repair it may affect your claim. Make sure you have your receipt or some other proof of purchase.

In some cases, a shop may offer a credit note. You do not have to accept a credit note. Indeed, taking this option means that you cannot later demand a refund.

In general consumers have a wide range of rights in relation to goods and services purchased, but the extent of the rights can vary depending on the sales contract.

However you have no grounds for redress if you were told about the defect before you bought the item, for example, if the goods were marked 'shopsoiled', or you examined the item before you bought it and should have seen the defect.

Question

My husband and I are considering renting out a room in our house. Will the income from the rent be taxable?

Answer

Under the Rent a Room Relief Scheme, where you rent out a room (or rooms) in your principal private residence and the gross rent received does not exceed €7,620 for the tax year this income will be exempt from income tax. The gross rent includes sums your tenant pays for food, laundry or similar goods and services.

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes (Contd)

Where more than one individual is entitled to the rent, the exemption limit is divided between the individuals concerned.

If your room rental comes within the scheme it does not affect your entitlement to mortgage interest relief or to capital gains tax exemption on selling your home.

The rental income is not liable for PRSI of the 2% Health Levy but it must be included on your annual income tax returns.

Question

I believe that if someone dies his/her family can continue or receive his/her social welfare payment for a number of weeks afterwards. Is this true?

Answer

Payment of a social welfare payment following a death is only made to the spouse/partner or parent of the deceased and only under certain conditions.

If your spouse/partner dies while getting a social welfare payment, the same rate of payment

continues for six weeks after the death provided your late spouse/partner was getting a qualified adult increase for you or you are getting a social welfare payment in your own right.

If your spouse/partner dies and you were getting a qualified adult increase with your payment for him/her, you continue to receive the increase for six weeks after the death

Carer's Allowance and Carer's Benefit continue to be paid for six weeks following the death of the person being cared for.

To apply for the six-week payment, as soon as possible following the death you should write to the section of the Department of Social and Family Affairs that issues the social welfare payment. You should enclose the death certificate (if available) to a death notice from a newspaper and, if applicable, the payment book.

Starter:

Stuffed Mushrooms

Serves 4

8 large brown open cap mushrooms 100g butter 125g couscous 125gml boiling water 1 onion, sliced 2 cloves of garlic, crushed 1 red or yellow pepper, seeded and diced 1 bunch spinach,cleaned and shredded 200g feat cheese, crumbled



- **1.** Preheat your oven to 200°C/gas mark 6. Remove and chop the mushroom stalks and set aside. Add a little butter to the centre of each mushroom and bake for 20 minutes.
- **2.** Meanwhile add the boiling water to the couscous and cover. Set aside to steam.
- 3. Heat the remaining butter in a saucepan, add the garlic, pepper, spinach leaves and chopped mushrooms stalks. Cook until the spinach wilts.
- **4.** Stir in the couscous and crumbled feta cheese. Spoon into the mushrooms caps and bake for 10 minutes. Serve hot.

Main Course:

Fruity spiced chicken

Serves 4

280ml chicken stock
150ml unsweetened orange juice
50g each dried apricots, stoned prunes,
dried apple rings, and sultanas
2tsp freshly grated root ginger
2tsp paprika
1/2tsp ground cinnamon

- **1.** Put the stock and orange juice in a heavy based saucepan or a flame-proof casserole together with the dried apricots, prunes, apple rings and sultanas, ginger, paprika, allspice and cinnamon. bring to boiling point.
- **2.** Add the chicken, reduce the heat, cover and simmer for 40 minutes until the chicken is tender and the fruit is soft.
- **3.** Season and serve with couscous or brown rice and a selection of vegetables.


Chocolate and pear tart

Serves 8-10


200gDigestive biscuits, crushed 4tsp cashew nuts, chopped 125g butter, melted Filling 300ml milk 25g cocoa powder 80g brown sugar 40g cornflour extra cold milk 50ml chocolate liqueur 2tsp gelatine 1× 410g can pear halves 100g chocolate, finely chopped. To serve whipped cream



- **1.** Butter a 25cm pie dish. Mix the biscuits, nuts and butter together and press into the bottom and up the sides of the pie dish. Chill in the fridge.
- **2.** Heat the milk, cocoa powder and brown sugar together in a saucepan until the sugar dissolves. Then remove from the heat.
- **3.** Mix the chocolate liqueur and gelatine and stir into the hot mixture, pour into the pie crust and leave to cool. Drain the pears and pour the syrup into a small saucepan, boil rapidly until reduced by ½ Remove from the heat and add the chocolate pieces, stir until melted and return to the heat if necessary.
- **4.** Arrange the pears cut-sides down on the cooled filling in the pie crust and pour over the cooled sauce. Chill. The sauce will run down the sides of the slices when you cut the tart. Serve with whipped cream



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Gardening Tips for October

The pace of change is, as ever, dictated by the weather, both general and local. Autumn comes earlier further north and on higher ground. The daily rises and falls in temperature are at lower levels and sharper. October is seldom without its warm spells and the weather may turn markedly mild in the later part of the month or early November. Take advantage of such spells: finish the harvest, lift frost-tender plants and give them winter protection, and get under way plans for soil cultivation and new plantings.

The Flower Garden

Take up gladioli corms from mid-month without waiting for the frost to kill the top growth. With stems attached, the plants can hang in an airy place until the corms are completely dry. Retain the large top new corms, and the younger corms for increasing the stock for next year; discard the old shrunken ones. Dust with flowers of sulphur and store layered in sand or perlite, in boxes, in a cool, for the winter and planted in reserve beds in spring to grow on to flowering size.

Lift dahlia roots intact with tubers as soon as the top growth is blackened by a night frost. Cut the stems to within 5cm (2in) of their base, remove surplus soil, leave to dry upside down under cover, and when dry, store in boxes or crates. Label them and dust with fungicidal powder before storing in a dark cool place, cellar or spare room, where there is an even temperature of about 7°C (45°F).

Take up the stools or roots of border chrysanthemums when flowering is over. Cut the stems to about 5 - 7.5cm (2 - 3in.), and place in a deep box or cold frame just as they are, with added soil to cover, where the temperature will not fall below 16°C (35°F).

Lift clumps of lily-of-the-valley now 3 to 4 years old. Divide and replant the strong crowns just clear of one another, and with points just at soil level. The new planting stations should be deeply dug and enriched with well-rotted manure or compost, and a little bone meal, in partial shade.

Remove annual bedding plants as soon as flowering is over, and while they are still green, and make compost with them. Fork a dressing of well-rotted manure, compost or spent mushroom compost, with bone meal into the flower bed, and plant up with bulbs and polyanthus, pansies or wallflowers for spring.

Lift to divide long-established peonies early in the month; discard the older parts of the roots taking care not to damage the remainder and replant the other pieces, comprising good crown buds with roots, in well-dug soil enriched with humus-forming organic matter, and basic slag. Do not expect the new plants

The Vegetable Garden

Finish carefully lifting potatoes, beetroot and carrots, for winter storing of undamaged specimens. Celeriac has the advantage that it can remain in the ground until December.

Cut down the tall stems of Jerusalem artichokes as soon as they flag and yellow. Leave the tubers undisturbed, however, and harvest as required. A good covering of leaves will make this possible in frosty weather.

Cut away all remaining fern or top growth of asparagus. Weed the bed and dress with 5 - 7.5cm (2 - 3in.) of farmyard manure or good compost, with a layer of soil sprinkled on top, for winter.

Cut down the stems of globe artichokes to ground level; cover the plants with a thick layer of peat, sawdust, leaves or bracken.

Give a final earthing-up to maincrop winter celery, carefully packing the soil up to the tips of the plants. This is essential to prevent bacteria entering which may cause celery heart to rot.

Lawns

Aerate lawns that have had hard wear by spiking, slitting or hollow-time forking, to relieve compaction and facilitate penetration of autumnal top dressing and feeds


Apply a 5 per cent solution of tar-oil to areas becoming coated with growths of moss and lichen. There will be a browning of the grasses in a few days, but they soon recover. Aerate the turf and give it a liquid feed. Get rid of excessive worm-casts by scattering them with the back of a spring-toothed rake as a top-dressing.

Top-dress according to the soil characteristics. On clay and heavy soils, apply a mixture of equal parts by volume of coarse sand and sifted organic material such as lawn peat, or compost. For strongly acid soils, include ground limestone. On light, sandy soils, use equal parts by volume loam or topsoil and organic On chalk soils, use a fine lawn grade of sphagnum moss peat. On soils subject to water logging, use coarse grit or sand, and mix with 20 percent crushed charcoal. Apply to 3mm 1/8in.) thick, and brush or 'switch' in. Feed the grass with top-Choose a fertiliser relatively high in dressina. phosphates, low in nitrogen, and balanced in potash at this season: a proprietary blended autumn lawn fertiliser, or a mixture of equal parts by weight bone meal and powdered seaweed manure at 60g/m² (2ox per sa.yd).

Cut new lawns sown in August-September when the grass reaches 5cm (2in.) high, and reduce by half; repeat in a few weeks' time.

Weed chamomile lawns by hand or spot treatment, as selective lawn weed killers would check, if not kill, the chamomile.





winners. He was the youngest winner of the title for over fifty years. His first classic winner was Polygamy, Epsom Oaks, June 1974. The lionhearted, Grundy was his first Epsom Derby winner in 1975. He was champion jockey for the next three years(75-77) and rode his first Prix de L'Arc winner in 1980 (Detroit).

All through his career Pat was always level headed and in control. Unlike some of the young Premiership footballers he was never in the headlines for the wrong reason and seems to handle success in a mature manner. This was due to the grounding he received at Frenchie Nicholson's yard where boys were not only taught how to ride but also how to conduct themselves in public. They were also taught how to keep a level head and do the right thing for their owners and trainers. Nothing ever remains the same and Peter Walwyn's fortunes were due to take a fall. A virus ridden stable in 1978 and 1979 almost put him out of business. Pat Eddery remained loyal but when Vincent O'Brien offered Pat a retainer in 1980 with a provision for stallion shares he could not turn the offer down.

His time with Vincent o' Brien saw him associated with some great horses. Golden Fleece, Epsom Derby (1982) and El Grand Senor winner of the Irish Derby and English Two Thousand Guineas (1984). The day that Christy Roche on Secreto snatched the Epsom Derby from Pat on El Grand Senor remains the low point in Pat's racing life. Pat Eddery also rode Sadler's Wells to win the Eclipse Stakes at Sandown. Saddlers wells went on to become one of the great thoroughbred stallions of the twentieth century. Pat returned to England in 1986 to take a retainer from Prince khalid Abdullah and continued to ride at the highest level, winning the Arc with great horses like Dancing Brave (1986) and Trempolino (1987). He also won his third Epsom Derby with Quest for Fame. Many consider Piggott to be the best jockey of our time but the statistics show that Irishman, Pat Eddery outscored the master in many areas.

In all theatres of sporting life the one accolade our sporting heroes' desire is to be associated with greatness. In the thoroughbred horse racing world the Epsom Derby winner of 1965, Sea Bird, ridden by Pat Glennon, is fondly remembered as the best Derby winner of the twentieth century. It can be argued however that in June 1982 Pat Eddery sat on one equally as good. The brilliant if ultimately tragic Golden Fleece trained by Vincent O'Brien and ridden by Pat won the Epsom Derby in a canter. The breathtaking manner in which he came from last to first in the final stages of the race left an impression that will never be forgotten by those who were there to witness it. Shortly afterwards this great son of Nijinsky was struck down by a coughing virus and never raced again. He tragically died of cancer eighteen months after being retired to stud.

Pat Eddery retired from race riding at the end of 2003 flat racing season. He is due to set up as a public trainer for the 2006 season.

A Century of Irish Sporting Heroes. Pat Eddery (1952-)

Dick Hern watched from the grandstand. Totally impassive the ex British army major watched as one of racing's greatest drama unfolded. The year was 1975 and a young Irishman was about to put his imprint on one of the greatest horse races ever run.

The Derby winner Grundy ridden by Pat Eddery, faced his main rival Bustino trained by Hern in the King George and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes at

Bustino a four Ascot. year old and winner of the Coronation Cup at was set to Epsom concede fourteen pounds to his year younger rival. The major's plan carried out with military precision run to two pacemakers in the mile and a half race to ensure a furious pace. This tactic was to play to Bustino's strengths. Hern's horse was an out and out stayer with great pace and the

game plan was to sap the finishing speed of Grundy. It nearly worked. First Highest and then Kinglet set a furious pace from the front. Into the straight Kinglet was done and Joe Mercer on Bustino took it up. He went four lengths clear and young Eddery began to close. Mercer knew Bustino was giving everything and refrained from using his whip. Pat was shoving and pushing and in the last furlong threw everything at Grundy who in the final 100 yards got up to win by half a length. Both horses had beaten the course record by two and one half seconds. The crowd was at once ecstatic and then silent as they watched Grundy come to a standstill just beyond the winning post. He stood, head down and motionless. His heaving flanks covered in sweat. He could not have given more and history records he never did. Grundy never won again and both he and Bustino, who damaged a tendon in the final agonising strides of that epic race, were retired to stud at the end of that season.

There is a tendency to remember the gallantry of Bustino and Joe Mercer to the detriment of Pat Eddery and Grundy. However in that race Pat showed, even at such a young age, that he had all the attributes to be a great jockey. In the following three decades he was to prove one of the greatest jockeys in racing history.

Born March 18th 1952 near the Curragh, Pat was one of 13 children in the family of Jimmy and Josephine Eddery. In 1957, Jimmy Eddery, first jockey to

Seamus McGrath came close to winning the Epsom Oaks on Silken Glider, beaten a short head by the indomitable Lester Piggott on Corrozza. A man with a short fuse Jimmy headed the Irish jockey table on one occasion and for many years was in the first half dozen in the jockey championship. Retired, as a race rider at thirty-eight years of age Jimmy then became assistant trainer to Seamus McGrath. From the age of eight, Pat's father put his young son up on many of the McGrath horses in morning exercise no matter their reputation.

In March 1966 Pat signed his apprentice forms for Seamus McGrath. For whatever reason his career did not progress with that stable. Deeply unhappy at the lack of riding opportunities he finally convinced his mother of his need to go to England. Seamus McGrath understanding and helpful in the matter gave Pat's mother a list of trainers who would be willing to take on her young son. The list included Doug Smith and Sir Gordon Richards. But the list also included the name of a man who was to teach Pat everything about race riding and make him into the champion elect. When Frenchie Nicholson agreed to take on young Eddery it was the luckiest day of Pat's life.




Pat's Power Packed Finish

The life of an apprentice jockey can be told at another time. Suffice to say that Pat was on the verge of going home on a number of occasions during his first long winter in England. He persevered and rode his first winner on April 24th 1969 at Epsom, a difficult course to ride. In 1971 he won the apprentice championship with 71 winners. In many ways his early career mirrored that of Lester Piggott. Always anxious to win he probably annoyed many of the senior jockeys. Not old enough or experienced enough he incurred a number of suspensions due to reckless riding. His emerging talent did not go unnoticed. In 1972, Peter Walwyn who ran one of the biggest stables in England retained him as stable jockey. This trainer/jockey relationship was to last for eight years and reap rich reward for both Pat and Peter. In 1974 Pat Eddery became champion jockey for the first time with 148

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

Overall Developmental Approach:

The presentation of materials with the entry form gave a very good account of the activities of the tidy towns committee and proved that their efforts are bearing good fruit. A 17-member committee is a very healthy number and the support from the business, commercial, residents and public authorities makes progress possible. Local competitions and community approaches to projects are all very positive actions particularly in the areas of litter control, appearances of premises and residential areas.

The Built Development:

There are some landmark buildings such as - Maynooth College, Maynooth Castle and Carton House, which give Maynooth great character. The new Market Square looks well and appears easy to maintain. One premises with damaged roof hopefully will be resolved soon. The many business premises along the streets look very well. They are well painted and well presented and give a lovely effect. The pavements -

being especially wide give great comfort to the pedestrians - except for the bicycle lanes through the paths. The street furniture - lamp standards, seating, litterbins are well co-ordinated and the choice of the particular shade of blue is good. The very large development at Manor Mills is having a disruptive influence on the town at the present but that is only temporary - this will represent a sizable part of the built environment of the future. The school looks well as does the Garda Station and churches.

Landscaping:

The enormous number of mature trees right within the village is of immense benefit to the town. The tree planting of previous generations in both Carton House and Maynooth College and their surrounds provides this. It is importrant that a similar legacy is left for future generations by tree planting now. progress has been made with newer tree plantings and the main street and the University Campus are well planted with more recent plantings. There are many attractive landscape features. the grounds of several premises also look very well - for instance the Charter House and the Heath Board. The containers plantings through the streets look especially well and these give a great lift to the streetscape in combination with the street side trees. The hanging baskets along the terraced cottages opposite Charter House make a The College and Carton house delightful picture. landscapes are key features of the town in themselves. The Tesco area on entering the village is well landscaped with trees and shrubs, together with the roundabout and stonewall - all of these will make good impact when they mature. The landscaped areas around the Maynooth signs on entering the town are attractive. The Pound Park besides being littered, is not fulfilling its full potential, similarly the small Little Pound by the bridge seems a little neglected. The area by the river opposite the Castle is very attractive. Further up along that river opposite Parson Lodge there is potential for improvement to the riverside.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities:

The canal side areas offer great potential for wild life observation and the canal walks make very pleasant strolling ground - both for observation and for exercise. The wildlife area at Carton also offers interesting opportunities. The involvement of the two schools to encourage birds by providing food is a very good idea.

Litter Control:

Litter control is well managed generally, although some litter was noted along streets and on the narrow path walkway by the Harbour field towards the canal bridge.

Serious litter was noted by the small park - Pound Park under the shelter behind the Maynooth band premises. The great efforts being made in and around the town by the school children and community is a very positive. By finding out exactly the sources of litter, action can be taken to prevent litter in the first instance.

Tidiness:

The work of removing graffiti is excellent and so many towns and villages could follow this example. the litter collection by the committee on the Motorway is excellent and a difficult but rewarding job. The weed management on paving is also very good. The streets have a very tidy look. The building developments always cause a problem for tidiness but this is temporary and will be resolved.

Residential Areas:

The best estates competition is a very positive action and promotes good standards both in the estates in general and in individual gardens within estates. Open spaces at estates and entrances to estates are very important in a town as they influence the appearance of the entire area. Good progress has been made in this regard. Tree planting should always be a priority where open spaces can accommodate these. A constant vigilance is needed to keep weeds and litter at bay no matter how elaborate a scheme of landscaping may be. The entrance to the Moglare Abbey, Village and Meadows are attractive.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas:

Approach roads are well cared for. The approach from the motorway is well planted with trees and gives a good impression.

The Kilcock road benefits from the College grounds. The Leixlip road is in good condition and the plantings at the roundabout and associated areas offer good potential when they mature. The road surface at the corner near the Manor Mills development is very poor with holes and patches. The many back lanes are well cared for and it is great to see places such as Cross Lane, Coates, Kelly's and Fagan's lanes forming part of the town. Traffic is a difficulty and some way of providing some pedestrian areas only would be very welcome.

General Impression:

Maynooth is a very attractive town and the work and planning by the committee shows great commitment

to further progress. Traffic and new developments are two major challenges to be faced. Retention of the character of Maynooth is all important.

Second round Adjudication:

Maynooth has now entered the upper reaches of the competition, and therefore is accorded a second adjudication. Congratulations to the committee, and to the residents and business people of the town. The lively and inviting town centre is visually marred by over-indulgent use of mass-produced commercial signs; it is perfectly possible to be lively and inviting without resorting to garishness. Research has shown that shops with well-designed fascias do not, as a rule, do less business.

The second adjudicator had not been in Maynooth for several years and was impressed by a number of thoughtful improvements. It was good to see new buildings at the town end of the Straffan road taking their stylistic cue from nearby original street houses. The lanes between the main street and the river are now quite attractive - quite the reverse from what was the case within living memory; the terraces of cottages with their floral decorations looked very charming indeed. Suburban developments are generally spruce, with a considerable amount of successful tree planting and several attractively landscaped spaces. The railway and canal area is so much more accessible and better maintained than heretofore. Your submission demonstrates how planning initiatives are very seriously considered.

The vast development in progress at Manor Mills once a dishevelled corner - does not seem to respect the surrounding townscape in scale and materials, but we may be surprised when we see the completed scheme. What it does already mirror to a certain extent is the 'new' or north campus of the university across the road. The latter is now much more attractive than it used to be, largely because the trees have grown up and create a natural background to the somewhat disparate buildings. Landscaping and gardens on both campuses are exemplary; especially admired was the walled herbaceous garden at the innermost part of the original college. Every good wish for your initiatives: it would be splendid to find a town that was conducive to university life and also an all-Ireland competition winner.

Government Sanctioned Estate Management Companies The New Absentee Landlords, Says TD

demanding Local Authorities are that many homeowners pay private estate management companies to maintain public spaces because of planning conditions imposed prior to sale being Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) has discovered that several local authorities have required developers to use estate management companies to maintain public spaces in new developments, thereby inflicting an annual burden of several hundred euro buyers. "These companies have all the trademarks of absentee landlords. Homeowners pay annual rents to them amounting to hundreds per household for supposed maintenance but are often given no breakdown of where the money is going and rarely if ever actually meet representatives from these companies. What ever happened to owning a property you have paid hundred's of thousands of euro for?" demanded Murphy.

"We need regulation on this immediately", stated the Kildare North TD. "The Department of the Environment appear to have let this situation drift by leaving the consumer at a competitive disadvantage, and handing the developers yet another 'get out of jail free' card to add to the collection." She further highlighted the need for this regulation by giving details of differing policies adopted by four planning authorities.

The experience seems to be patchy depending where the home is purchased; South Dublin County Council have a standard requirement for management companies in new developments, which means the Council will not have to take the estate in charge and the individual householders will indefinitely bear the cost of maintaining roads, sanitary services, open spaces, public lighting etc; In Wicklow management companies "can" be required for developments involving apartments, but they are "normally" required in the case of house-only developments; the experience in Louth is that requirement of these companies is the norm until the estate is taken in charge; and in her own county of Kildare management companies are part of the planning conditions where apartments comprise a portion or all of the development. However, from reviewing certain files applications for house-only planning developments are now also being met with this condition.

"When people purchase their home in a housing estate they believe they are purchasing the roads, the public lighting the green spaces etc. However with local authorities requiring that estate management

companies take charge of these areas the financial obligation shifts from the developer to the householders", fumed Murphy. Worse still, as the developer retains ownership of the housing estate, including green spaces they are entitled to seek permission to further develop these areas. There have in fact been instances in Kildare where Kildare County Council has refused to grant such permission only to have their decision overturned on appeal to An Bord Pleanála.

"I demand that something be done to protect homeowners and prospective buyers who don't get a choice in what company is employed, how much money should be paid per annum, what the money is spent on or even whether a company is required at all" concluded Murphy.

Work on the New Bond Bridge to Begin on 19th September

Maynooth residents will be aware that the Council had to re-tender the contract for the Bond Bridge project as the previous contractor pulled out before signing last June. Deputy Emmet Stagg and Mayor of Kildare, Cllr. John McGinley, have welcomed confirmation from George Willoughby, Senior Executive Engineer, Kildare County Council, that the new Bond Bridge Contractors will commence work on site on September 19th and that the formal signing of the contracts will occur on Friday September 23rd in the County Council Offices.

The new contractors for the €7 Million Bond Bridge Realignment are Jons Civil Engineers, Duleek, who are specialists in bridge building. The early replacement of a contractor by Kildare County Council is much appreciated by Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley.

Cllr. John McGinley allocated funding from his Discretionary Grants for traffic calming on Beaufield Road to enable the Meadowbrook Link Road to open to traffic. Re-surfacing of the Beaufield Road, trimming of trees, installation of additional public lights, installation of traffic ramps and other safety measures will be completed on 23rd September according to Mr. Willoughby. He advised John that the Link Road will then be opened thus allowing traffic from the Newtown area to avoid Main Street.

Emmet and John would like to thank the people of the area for their continued support for their campaign over the years and for your patience whilst they overcame every hurdle that came their way.

Safety Measures Sought at St. Mary's Boys National School, Maynooth

The Boys School Parents Teachers Association (PTA) has asked Cllr. John McGinley for assistance in getting

Kildare County Council to implement safety measures outside the school grounds. The PTA identified the problems as: parking on double yellow lines, parking in bus bay areas and mounting/parking on footpaths, causing a visual hazard to cars trying to exit onto Moyglare Road. In response Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That safety measures be put in place at St Mary's Boys National School, Maynooth to include:

- the re-demarcation of the bus bay area and double yellow lines which are practically invisible
- the installation of permanent signage showing bus bay operation times, similar to that installed outside the girls national school
- the installation of black decorative poles on the pathways adjacent to the Moyglare road, similar to those on the pathways on Main Street, Maynooth. This would be a continuation of the aesthetic appeal of the Maynooth town centre."

Getting Improved Public Lighting for the Harbour Area, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley is very concerned at the lack of progress in getting proper public lighting in the highly pedestrianised Harbour Area of Maynooth. John has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That this Council arranges a meeting without any further delay between Waterways Ireland, Kildare County Council, ESB and Royal Canal Amenity Group in order to confirm the scope of works to be undertaken by the various parties on the installation and maintenance of public lighting at The Harbour,



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

Maynooth (The scope of works was agreed at a previous meeting in June 2002, but nothing happened as nobody took ownership of this project which is in the interest of public safety)."

Traffic Management in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley's suggestion that a roundabout be put at the Kilcock Road/Moyglare Road junction instead of traffic signals was rejected by Council Officials on safety grounds i.e. two schools and a university in the vicinity.

Cllr. McGinley is still concerned at the design of the traffic signals at this junction and he has asked that an independent safety audit be carried in the interests of public safety. At present if four cars are stopped at the lights going up Moyglare Road, traffic cannot avail of the filter light for the Kilcock Road. This will lead to traffic chaos when the New Mill complex opens in October.

John has also asked that the proposed pedestrian lights at Mill Street and at the Glenroyal Complex be deferred until the need for them was established. He has also asked that the pedestrian lights at the Bank of Ireland be removed when the new lights at the Roost come into operation.

Community Facilities in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has sought the agreement of the Leixlip Area Committee to meet a deputation from Maynooth Community Council at the Area Meeting on October 21.

This follows the Community Council's decision at its meeting to seek the re-construction of the Geraldine Hall for use by the Community Council and as an Arts Centre for the people of Maynooth and surrounding area.

The Community Council will also be seeking County Council advise on how to proceed with a Community Centre at the lands opposite the old cattle mart (adjacent to Carton Avenue) that are about to be transferred to Kildare County Council.

Action Area Plans at The Harbour and at Carton Avenue

The Leixlip Area Committee of the Council will be meeting during week beginning September 19 in order to agree on these two Action Area Plans. It is intented that the two plans will go before the full Council in October for approval.

Yellow Box at Cul de Sac exit from No's 509 to 513 Newtown

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply from the

Council to his request for a yellow box at this junction:

"This exit is between 300 to 400 m from the traffic lights at Bond Bridge. The traffic never builds up to block this exit and so a yellow box is not appropriate here. A yellow box is only placed to allow traffic to exit when a queue of traffic occurs."

Meadowbrook Stream

Following representation from Cllr. John McGinley the Council has eliminated the source of the smell from the Meadowbrook Stream. John has also asked the Council to remove the shopping trolley and the other large items that have been dumped in the stream by idiots.

Cars Parking on Footpath at Closed Irish Permanent Building

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to erect a bollard on the footpath at the junction of the Irish Permanent/Fagans Lane in order to prevent cars from parking on the footpath.

Tony Smith Memorial Walk 2005 raises €5616

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


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
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
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Editorial

Two important meetings took place this month that could impinge on Maynooth. The first was the delegation from Maynooth Community Council that met with the Leixlip area councillors in Naas on Friday the 21st October. The second was another delegation from the Council that met with the Minister for the Environment on Tuesday 4th October. At the first of these meeting M. Ní Bhrolcháin (MCC), Tony Bean (Maynooth Community Centre Partnership), Terry Nealon (Arts Forum), Bríd Feely (MCC), Peter Connell (Maynooth Action Strategy) met with Collrs John McGinley, Senan Griffin, Gerry McDonagh and Peter Minnock (Corporate Affairs).

The purpose of this initial meeting was to progress the community developments in the town, firstly the case for developing the Geraldine Hall for an Arts Centre with the Community Council as the anchor tenant and secondly the case for the development of a community centre on the Dublin Road. This was a very fruitful meeting and the different funding opportunities and possibilities were explored. It was seen that this was the first of a number of such meetings.

The second meeting with the Minister for the Environment Dick Roche took place as a result of the Community Council's continued efforts to achieve Town Council/Commission Status for the town, Brid Feely led a delegation including Tony Bean and Paul Croghan. As the Castle was also being discussed the President of NUI Maynooth also attended this meeting. According to the legislation any town over 7,500 is entitled to this status but the section of the Act necessary has not yet been signed. The Council submitted its original application in 1990 that appeared in the paper Irish Oifigiúil as required by law. The criteria has now changed and 2,000 signatures are required as well as €1,000 lodged for the consultation process. But the County Council cannot process applications without the establishment of a Local Government Commission and this has not been put in place by the Minister. The Community Council has been writing to each successive Minister for the Environment for the past 4 years but the response has been similar on all occasions - that the relevant section of the Act has not been enacted. Despite the Minister's assurances that he was examining the situation there seems little reason to hope that any progress will be made in the near future.

In further developments in the town, Manor Mills has opened and Dunnes Stores has arrived in Maynooth. It will take time to assess the impact of this upon the traffic flows. Secondly there was a public meeting on Sept 29th about Bond Bridge. It will be closing to all traffic in early November and it is hoped that the project will now be completed in approximately 40 weeks. Also see inside for a report on the Tidy Towns awards.

Town Council Status

Brid Feeley said we should not adopt a defeatist attitude to this, and we will push forward with it.

Pay Parking in Maynooth

Robert Wilson put forward the motion, he said pay parking should be introduced on Main Street and in the public car park. Robert said all spaces are taken by people using trains for all day parking, people can't find spaces to shop or go to lunch. Ed Tobin pointed out if charges were large enough it would be a deterrent to people. It was also noted that more policing should be done also that any money should go back into the community. It was also noted that Estates are used for car parking. John McGinley said another public car park is needed. There should be proper parking locations at the Harbour in new development plan, a new package is needed, also a huge need for long term parking. It was also suggested we need planned parking talks with KCC and Iarnrod Eireann, while upgrading Train Services no parking is provided. Also noted Harbour Field Action Area Plan and Carton Plan up for approval in two weeks. It was agreed to put this motion forward.



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The "Rubbish" Debate:

There are probably many reasons why Ireland proves attractive to tourists. Perhaps it's our friendly attitude and the good nightlife in the Capital? Or, it may be the beautiful landscapes and sparkling mountain streams and rivers that dot the countryside. It is the latter, which is in danger from our indiscriminate use of landfill dumps to dispose of our rubbish. Up to recent times litter was more of an irritant than a major problem. But that has all changed. The country because of its economic success is producing mountains of rubbish, which continues to be dumped into landfill sites. The unpleasant toxic and hospital waste is also finding its way into these dumps. The continued expansion of county council dumps is bad enough because of increasing concerns regarding the potential threat to the environment. To be specific there are concerns that waste materials could seep into the sources of our water supply. Climatic changes means we are getting more frequent and more prolonged spells of rain. There is a danger of waste materials being washed into our water supply system. What makes the situation far more serious is the discovery nearly every other week of new illegal dumps. Each week provincial newspapers are reporting new discoveries of illegal waste dumps situated on private lands. In many cases the real owners are not readily identifiable and the authorities are finding it difficult to initiate legal proceedings against the perpetrators. Waste is no longer a joke. People whose opinions should be respected are now saying that our water supply is now in danger of contamination from the seepage of toxic waste from these dumps. It is also clear that County Councils are not being adequately funded to police threat. Repeated assurances that new landfill sites are safe do little to reassure the general public. Off course there are solutions but some of the more appropriate ones are continually being blocked by those with "not on my backdoor" mentality. Typical example would be resident groups in Dublin Bay objecting to the building of an incinerator at Ringsend to burn their rubbish. They have no problem however consigning their waste to the green fields of Kildare and Meath. However, there are issues to be addressed before we get to

Finance

At the moment domestic rubbish disposal is financed by bin charges levied by the county councils. This in effect means that the levy only applies to each household. Since there could be a number of people in the house only one, the householder is being levied with the charge. Since every individual living in the country creates waste, it is logical that everyone in the country should be paying to dispose of it. Since rubbish from Dublin city is now being dumped in Kildare and Meath maybe there is now a case for the

grips with a serious environmental problem.

Incinerator –V- landfill

Government to take overall responsibility for waste disposal. It is clear that this problem is crossing county borders. New ways should be looked at to finance a National Waste Disposal Agency, which would have responsibility for collecting and disposing of all waste. They would also have responsibility for recycling schemes and the building of new facilities for disposing of the nation's growing mountain of rubbish. Governments never lack ideas when initiating new forms of revenue. An increase of 1% in the top rate of vat would generate an additional 568 million. An increase of 1cent on the top rate of income tax would generate an additional 168 million into the Government coffers (figures supplied by the ESRI). These are just two of a number of areas that could be looked at to finance a new policy on waste disposal.

Rubbish Disposal / Incinerators.

There is indeed no ideal way to deal with rubbish disposal. Each and every method has its drawbacks. To those who say that we should start with recycling at domestic level would do well to note that recycling centres in Kildare are closing with monotonous frequency due to misuse of the facilities. Individuals are leaving domestic waste at the centres instead of paying bin charges. As much as we may desire it, the problem of refuge can not really be left to the individuals' sense of fair play. Of course that would be the ideal solution but the real world does not operate like that. The matter has now taken on a new sense of urgency. The issue of waste disposal and the protection of the environment should now become a priority of the current Government. It should receive the same attention as health, education and security. There has to be a centralised policy and administration. Every individual no matter where he lives should have their waste collected. Domestic appliances and furniture should be collected and disposed of by the collective responsibility of the industry concerned. There should be a centralised authority whose function would be to finance the disposal of waste, countrywide. This authority should have total responsibility for waste disposal and should have a clear transparent budget for its operations. We are running out of options for waste disposal. The practise of super rich countries like Austria and Switzerland exporting some of their waste material to impoverished eastern European countries is reprehensible, at the end of the day you really have only one realistic alternative

Incinerators have their objectors. Many believe what falls out of the sky will harm them or their children. Well what is the general experience? If the European experience is ok then we should go ahead and develop a strategic incinerator building programme. A number of following locations could be selected on a pilot run basis while landfill sites are

being closed down. Dublin Port, Cork harbour and west of limerick on the Shannon estuary. Emission controls should be strict and professionally monitored. Of course this is not a perfect solution. There are bound to be some disadvantages with such a building program but what other options do we have. The prospects of our water supplies being contaminated increase by the day. We do not have any idea of the long-term effect of stuffing mountains of rubbish into our soil. It is accepted that we do not know too much about the potential effects of incineration either but on the basis of common sense only it would appear better to burn our rubbish rather than bury it. The state of play at the moment is that the incinerators industries claim that the emissions are not dangerous and that so long as the plants are built and maintained to the highest standards that no danger should accrue to the population. At the very least the options should be debated on a priority basis.

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

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Useful Tips

Children' quarrels

- Try to ignore small squabbles. Only intervene if it becomes physical.
- Ask each child (if old enough) to give his or her version of the story. Try not to tell off just one participant - it takes two to fight. Ask them how they would stop their children quarrelling when they're parents themselves. And stick these suggestions on the fridge door or notice board for future use.
- Remove objects that could cause squabbles among younger children. If you know your child and a friend always fight over the same toy, remove it before the child visits.
- Make a game out of sharing for little ones.
 Hand them a toy and them gently take it back.
 Repeat until the child is happy to hand it over to you.
- If fighting breaks out in the car, pull over to a safe spot. Tell them you won't drive on until they promise to be quiet, as you can't concentrate on the road.
- If your children are constantly fighting, ask yourself why. Are you favouring one unconsciously? Are they happy at school? Are they hungry?
- Write out a list of house rules (such as, no playing with the ball near the window; Sally isn't allowed to touch William's modelling clay).
- If you're desperate, separate fighting children for half an hour. They'll soon want to play together.
- Tell them about your own childhood squabbles with your brothers or sisters. It doesn't make you so perfect.

Colour run in washing

Have your whites turned a pale shade of grey, blue or pink? You have probably sorted your clothes wrongly and included coloured objects in the wash.

- Wash the clothes again in the hottest water that is safe for the fabric.
- If this doesn't work, soak whites in a proprietary colour-run remover, following the manufacturer's instructions. A colour-run remover, which can be used on coloured items in the washing machine, is also available.
- You may be able to remove accidental dyes from whites and other colours by gently bleaching them with 20 volume strength hydrogen peroxide. Mix 1 part to 6 parts water and soak for 30 minutes.
- Never mix whites with coloured items.

Black tie

An invitation saying 'black tie' used to mean formal evening dress, where rules were rigidly observed: men wore black dinner jackets and trousers, white dress shirts and black hand-tied bow ties; women wore long or short dresses in rich fabrics or the classic 'little black dress'.

Today's interpretation of 'black tie' formality is more relaxed, and personal style is acceptable; for men, colourful bow ties in rich fabrics, but still hand-tied, are perfectly correct - with or without a matching cummerbund - and women can wear trousers.

The conventional dinner jacket can quite easily be exchanged for a brocade or velvet one. For formal summer occasions, light-coloured linen suits as well as a white dinner jacket and black evening trousers are all acceptable dress.

Hiring an evening outfit makes financial sense especially if yours is a once-in-a-lifetime function, if your weight fluctuates or if you want to wear the most fashionable styles. Women's dress hire agencies hire out complete designer outfits for a fraction of the real cost. However, for men who have many 'black tie' engagements, buying a classic dinner jacket and trousers is a practical idea.

Hire shops sell off evening wear, and it is also worth hunting at charity shops and jumble sales; many outfits have hardly been worn and go for bargain prices. Look out for broken zips, damaged linings, and heavy perspiration stains (which are largely successfully cleaned); moth holes and cigarette burns are also very expensive to repair.

For a good fit it is worth enquiring at your dry cleaners about alterations: sleeves can be shortened and hems expertly let down and taken up. Large sizes can be altered to several sizes smaller, but a small size can rarely be altered to a larger one.

Bedtime stories

- Make them a habit, even if you're tired. If pressed for time, read a chapter aloud while the children are having their evening meal.
- Choose a book you both like, to hold your interest and the child's. Read it imaginatively with different voices and expressions.
- Make up your own story. Insert your child's name into the text - it makes the story come alive.
- When reading to older children, let them watch your finger touch each word you read. It helps them with their own reading. Ask them to read the occasional word too.
- If you're going out and the baby sitter will be reading the story, prepare a simple tale (with pictures cut out from glossy magazines) to show what Mummy and Daddy are doing, such as having dinner, or watching a film.

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
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R ecipes

Starter:

Orange Consommé

Serves 6

475g/15 oz can of beef consummé juice of 3 oranges 2 cloves cayenne pepper (optional) 1 orange, thinly sliced, to garnish

- 1. Pour the consommé into a pan. Add the orange juice to the pan with the cloves and cayenne to taste. Bring the mixture to the boil, then remove the cloves, using a slotted spoon. Tip the contents of the pan into a bowl and set aside until cool.
- 2. When the orange consommé is cool, cover the surface closely and chill for 3-4 hours in the refrigeratorl. Alternatively, freeze the mixture for about 30 minutes, until the surface is covered with a thin layer of ice.
- 3. Serve the orange consommé in chilled bowls, garnishing each serving with an orange slice, if liked.

Main course:

Neck of lamb with peas

Serves 6
800g neck of lamb
2 large onions, chopped
3cloves garlic, crushed
2tbsp fresh parsley, chopped
2tbsp fresh coriander, chopped
1tsp each ground ginger, cumin, cinnamon and turmeric
100ml olive oil
salt and black pepper
water
1 lemon, quartered
400g fresh or frozen peas
10g of butter

- 1. Preheat oven 180°C/gas mark 4. Place the lamb in an ovenproof casserole dish. Combine the onions, garlic, parsley, coriander, spices and olive oil and mix well. Season to taste. Leave to marinate for 2 hrs or overnight if possible.
- 2. Add just enough water to cover the meat and simmer for 2 hrs untill the lamb is tender. Add the lemon quarters and cook for another 30mins. Cook the peas separately untill just tender, drain and toss in the butter and keep warm.
- 3. Remove the meat from the sauce and set aside.

Bring the sauce to the boil until reduced and thickened. Strain it and pour over the meat. Serve topped with peas and a slice of lemon.

Dessert

Fruit pavlova

Serves 6-8

4 egg whites pinch of salt 250g caster sugar 1tsp vinegar 1tsp vanilla essence 2tsp cornlflour To serve whipped cream ripe seasonal fruit

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180°C/gas mark 4. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Draw a 20cm circle in the middle of the piece of baking paper.
- 2. Place the egg whites and salt in a clean dry bowl. Beat with an electric beater until soft peaks form.
- 3. Gradually add the sugar, beating well after each addition until the sugar is dissolved and the peaks are stiff and glossy. Fold through the vinegar, vanilla essence and cornflour. Heap the mixture onto the circle on the baking paper. Shape into a circle with a spatula. Leave the centre slightly hollowed.
- 4. Reduce your oven to 120°C/gas mark 1/3 and bake for 60mins or untill pale and crisp. Turn off the oven and cool in the oven with the door ajar. Serve topped with whipped cream and fruit.





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
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Gardening Tips for November

This is the time to start soil cultivations, to replenish and increase the organic content of the soil with the humus-forming materials on which fertility is founded. November also marks the opening of the planting season, particularly for deciduous shrubs and trees and herbaceous perennials.

The Flower Garden.

Finish cutting down the last of the border Michaelmas daisies, golden rods etc. and use their stems and similar toughish growths of border plants chopped up at the base of a new compost heap.

Plant tulips early this month, 7.5 - 10cm (3 - 4in.) deep, in groups 10 - 15cm (4 - 6in.) apart, unless being used for formal bedding. Rub off the outer skins or tunics to check for greenish or greyish mould. Cut this out if present, and dust the bulb with a thiram fungicide before planting; reject badly affected bulbs. Mix a dressing of a calcified seaweed soil conditioner with clay soil before planting, or add coarse sand to the planting hole.

Autumn-clean the herbaceous border. After cutting down the plant stems and removing stakes, fork in a slow-acting fertiliser between the plants: use a dressing of bone meal and hoof and horn meal in equal parts by weight, with half a part of sulphate of potash, at 125g/m² (4oz per sq. yd.) and top with an inch or so of sawdust, peat or forestry bark.

Gather tough woody waste materials, rose prunings, rose suckers, old raspberry, bramble and loganberry canes, fungi-infected dead wood, and diseased remains of plants for the bonfire, and light in a spell of calm, still weather. Keep the ash dry for use as a potash fertiliser in winter or spring; remember it also contains calcium (lime), which is good for most plants but not the lime-intolerant.

Cover Christmas roses (Helleborus niger), showing buds at the end of the month, with cloches so that the flowers can open pristine, unmarked by soil splashes.

The Ornamental Garden.

Hedges

Do not plant evergreen and coniferous hedges once the temperature falls to 1.6-5°C (35-40°F) at night. Postpone until March - April, other wise the plants lose moisture more quickly than they can replace it, and fail to grow in spring.

Plant deciduous hedges at any time from now to the end of March, when the weather is mild and the soil open and easily worked; waterlogged soil conditions rather than frost endanger them. Plant beech, Fagus sylvatica, for an economical hedge and windbreak, brown with retained leaves in winter, on light and well-drained soils, or hornbeam (Carpinus betulus) for a stiffer, even hardier, hedge of similar character, on heavy soils and low-lying sites. Plant quickthorn (Crataegus monogyna) in doubled staggered rows for a rapid-growing hedge which calls for a low outlay to start with but much maintenance later on.

Lawns

Lay new lawns from turf between now and March, given suitable weather, good soil conditions and a prepared site with good drainage. With the advent of pre-determined grass mixtures sown on fabric 'carpets' there is no real reason to rely on natural sod turf, with its weed problems and limited range of grasses, and heavy transport costs.

• Drain lawns subject to waterlogging and flooding in winter. Small areas can be improved by making 10-15cm (4-6in.) round holes to a depth of 75-90cm (2ft 6in. - 3ft), 2m (6ft 6in.) apart, with a post-hole auger. Fill them in with broken stone, rubble clinker and ash to within 15—23cm (6 - 9in) of the surface, topping with an inch of leaves or fibrous peat and then replacing the topsoil and turf. Each hole acts as a drainage sump.

The Rock Garden

Paint out the top growth of any persistent weed with a solution of a paraquat/diquat contact weedkiller on a dry day while weather remains mild (or weed by hand). This kills annual weeds and severely checks perennial ones, allowing alpine plants to flourish unhindered in the spring.

- Now is the time to plant and make a new rock garden. Try for an open situation, avoiding exposure to draughts, or frosts on low-lying sites. Where possible, plan with the main face facing south with an east-west orientation in the north and Scotland; but with a more north to south line with western-facing main face in the warmer south, so that plants are not too exposed to scorching sun. Incorporate good drainage materials at the base.
- To make a scree in which to grow many of the fascinating dwarf and high altitude alpines: put a layer of stones at the base, cover with leaves or coarse fibrous foliage and stems (such as bracken), and then at least 15cm (6in.) of stone chippings, admixed with a good sprinkling of loam and leaf mould. Sink occasional rocks in the scree alongside which plants can nestle.

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Official Opening of Playground in November

Residents will be aware the finest playground in the country is nearing completion at The Harbour Field, Maynooth. It has two distinct sections for age groups up to 6 years old and from 6 to 14 years old. It is not designed for the use of older teenagers and adults. The children of Maynooth have had to put up with having no playground for far too long and it would be a sad reflection on us if the playground were to be used for purposes other than children's playtime.

When it officially opens in early November hundreds of children will be able to enjoy the fantastic facilities and I have no doubt that it will be greatly appreciated by their parents. The community needs to act as guardian of the playground it is up to us as a community to report any nightime anti-social behaviour to the local Gardai.







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Great Movies

A Personal choice

Memory plays tricks. No matter what discipline of the performing arts or sporting events we witness, our emotional or critical reaction to the performance tends to be enhanced by the passage of time. To make a comparison, many will say that to read a book and then see a movie adaptation is in many cases a disappointment. This is understandable because the picture we have created is always going to be different from the director's. One of the assignments for film critics, from time to time, is to list the best movies of all time. The list gains credence when one or more of the critics agree on a significant number of candidates. This does not mean that we have to agree with them. I sometimes feel that too much weight is given to the opinions of theatre and cinema critics. That a critical newspaper review on opening night can halt a show on Broadway is a bit much and over the top. That a film can be withdrawn after a number of bad reviews, not giving the cinema going public time to make up their minds is also out of order. The advent of digital DVD gives us an opportunity to revisit films we may have seen thirty to forty years ago which left an impression on us and would be included in our all time list of great films. With that in mind over the last few months I purchased four DVS's of movies made nearly four decades ago, which I would have rated very highly when I first viewed them. Do I see them in a different light now or does my original opinion still hold.

The Last Picture Show (1971)

Director - Peter Bogdanovich

Starring:

Cybill Shepard, Jeff Bridges, Timothy Bottoms, Ben Johnson, Cloris Lechman, Ellen Burstyn, Clu Gulager and Randy Quaid.

This was cinematography at its very best. Shot superbly in black and white. It tells the story of a small town in Texas dying on its feet. The haunting background country music of Hank Williams captured the mood of America in the fifties. This picture was also the launching pad for the movie career of Jeff Bridges and Cybil Shepard. The main characters were drawn superbly by Bogdanovich and the writer fails to understand some film critics who thought the characters were not well acted. To me this was the strength of the film, each of the characters superbly carried the weight of life's disappointments, failed ambition and living without hope in an economic environment that was growing progressively worst. The closing down of the town cinema, hence "The Last Picture Show" appears to be the final nail in the coffin but Bogdanovich's characters show a remarkable will to survive. Being Irish helps to understand and appreciate the movie. Around the same time John Healy, political journalist supreme, penned a great book about Charlestown, County Mayo titled "No One Shouted Stop". John's book, a master piece, painted a devastating picture of an Irish town loosing its young, closing down farms and boarding up homes that would never be lived in again. This film stands the test of time. I enjoyed viewing it again and time has not diminished my regard for the production

Judgement at Nuremburg (1961)

Director – Stanly Kramer

Starring

Spencer Tracy, Marlene Dietrich, Burt Lancaster, Richard Widmark, Maximilian Schell, Judy Garland, Montgomary Cliff, William Shatner, Edward Binns, Werner Klemper

Based on the Nuremberg war crime trials of 1948. The film deals with members of the German Judiciary who faced charges for crimes against humanity. The film was interspersed with documentary footage showing allied soldiers discovering concentration camps as World War Two drew to its conclusion. Day by day the gates of hell were opened and survivors of the holocaust were released to a lifetime of Spencer Tracy gave a magnificent nightmares. performance as the Chief Judge presiding at the trial and Marlene Dietrich showed her class as the wife of an executed German general. However in my view Maxmillian Schell "played a blinder" as defence council. Unmoved by the sins of the German Nation the arrogance of Schell shows through as he seeks to diminish the responsibility of those who should have known better. Judy Garland was also impressive in a dramatic witness scene. The film was shot in black and white, which was probably the most appropriate medium for the movie. The film never took off in Germany and was withdrawn a number of weeks after its release. All through the movie the Presiding Judge (Tracy) can not come to terms with the fact that educated and learned men entrusted to protect the rights of the individual and uphold the rule of law could have capitulated so easily to the dictate of the Nazi Party. The advent of the European Union means that there is now an effective "brake" against the emergence of evil. Countries like Croatia and Serbia who want to join the family of European Nations now know that they have to hand up their war criminals to the International Court of Justice. They also know that behaviour outside the rule of law will consign them to the margins of European development. We have come a long way.

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Great Movies

A Personal choice

The Battle of Algiers (1965) (La Battaglia di Algeri)

Director - Gillo Pontecorvo

Starring:

Brahim Haggiag, Jean Martin, Yacef Saadi, Tommaso Neri

This film was based on the French -Algerian conflict between 1954 and 1962. Shot in documentary style with a mainly amateur cast. There were many similarities between the Moslem ghetto in the Kasbah area of the city of Algiers and the northern Catholics enclaves in Belfast and Derry before the Troubles. Lack of employment, under investment in facilities and continued harassment by the occupying forces left the local population embittered. The film deals with the efforts of the FLN to liberate the city from the French and the reaction of the authorities to the insurrection. Using terrorist tactics members the FLN shot policemen on patrol placed bombs in French owned cafes and generally spread fear throughout the city of Algiers. Resident French loyalists struck back with indiscriminate bombing of Moslem neighbourhoods. The arrival of French paratroops changes everything. To the background of Ennnio Morrocones unforgettable music score, Philippe Mathieu (the paratroops commander) throws the rulebook out the window. A former member of the French Resistance, a Legion of Honour from the Indo China War, Mathieu takes the gloves off to crush the rising. The Kasbah is surrounded and sealed off. All young men are deemed suspects and are rounded up. Many are tortured with electric shock treatment, beatings and suspension of their bodies from racks. Mathieu makes no apology, having the backing of the political establishment in France. He eventually breaks down the FLN cells and wins the Battle for Algiers. History records however that the French could not control the countryside and Charles de Gaulle took the decision to leave. This film was banned in France for years showing that Ireland was not the only country where people were not allowed to make up their own minds about matters that concerned them. The one powerful message from this movie is that the practice of torture is unacceptable no matter what the circumstances are. There is no doubt that movie production has moved on since this film was made, and in to-days context it does look dated. However the crushing of the uprising was an extremely saddening experience showing the final moments of voung Algerian men and women who were willing to give their lives for the freedom of their homeland

2001: A Space Odyssey (1968)

Director - Stanley Kubrick

starring:

Gary Lockwood, Keir Dullea, William Sylvester, Leonard Rossiter, Robert Beatty, Daniel Richter and Douglas Rain (voice of HAL)

The word odyssey means " a long eventful journey. The choice of film title was apt. This was the mother of all movies. Kubrick took his ideas about life and death, the dawn of creation, the vastness of space and the never ending journey to find the outer parameters of our universe, tucked them into a hand grenade and blew them all over the screen. This was a colossal film and drew a variety of reactions from the critics. To a man/woman they sought the theme or message from the movie when in fact there was, really none. To those who support the eventual triumph of science over faith, he gave them the spaceship and the computer (HAL) who would supersede the authority of the crew on its journey to the outer reaches of our Galaxy. The spectacular progress of science and man emphasised in the movie would eventually lead to the reason for our existence. To those who believe in the Creator, he gave them the first view of the Universe with all its Planets and Stars in a production that was to win a special effects Academy Award. Although it was only 1969, we saw the vision. The Universe, which stretched to infinity, the turmoil as humanity entered the black hole and the calm before death and rebirth. When I viewed this film over three decades ago in the Plaza Cinema in Dublin, the audience clapped at the end, something I had never experienced before in a cinema (except for the arrival of the US cavalry) and never did again.





Party Political Catherine Murphy (IND) Press Statements

Murphy demands less red-tape and report writing and more red ribbon cutting

Deputy Catherine Murphy (Ind) has criticized the delay between completion of the Development Plan for the N4/M4 Area and it's implementation and has demanded that Minister for Education, Ms Mary Hanafin TD, begin tackling the current and predicted school place crisis head on. "The time for report writing has ended and the need for delivery is well overdue. This report was intended to set out a new transparent and strategic approach to school development but Minister Hanafin doesn't seem to share this vision. Instead she seems hell-bent on taking the recommendations of this study, which has taken the best part of two years, and feeding them into the current system. It's not exactly what I'd call reform", fumed Murphy.

Her comments came in response to revelations by Minister for Education, Mary Hanafin TD, that although "the N4/M4 Development Plan will form a vital framework in which future decisions about school planning in this area will be made. Progress on individual recommendations will be considered in the context of the School Building and Modernization Programme from 2006 onwards". This statement is starkly contrasted by that issued by Noel Dempsey TD, the former Minister for Education, in January 2004 when the project was launched, "This plan will be a public document and will be the touchstone against which all capital funding decisions for the area will be made".

In light of Minister Hanafin's announcement last month that a three-year Public-Private Partnership scheme would be initiated in which 27 new schools would be built Murphy highlighted that recommendations from the N4/M4 Area Development Plan didn't appear to feature. "I would have thought the first thing to do with the information from the N4/M4 Area Development Plan is apply to it but the costly PPP announced by the Minister has entirely bypassed this report".

At a time when Government Departments have been increased scrutiny regarding mismanagement of funds in hiring outside consultants and commissioning overpriced and or ineffective projects Murphy highlighted that the public does not want to see anymore money go to waste. hugely concerned that the Minister is not committed to seeing this project through to fruition and I'm equally concerned that it won't be expanded to areas like the N7/M7 catchment which are in serious need of school development. This government and this Minister need to cut out the red tape, start implementing the reports they've completed and maybe then we'll see more ribbon cutting on new

schools in the areas that need them most"


Estate Management Rip-Off not legalised for and leaving homebuyers high and dry.

Although the Department of the Environment states, "such conditions are not mandatory", Local Authorities are demanding homeowners pay private Estate Management Companies to maintain public spaces and services according to Deputy Catherine Murphy (IND). Such companies are not statutorily regulated and Planning Authorities according to Taoiseach Bertie Anern who made a statement to the Dáil this morning should regulate this matter locally.

Deputy Murphy, in support of statements made by Deputy Joe Higgins during Leaders Question Time, has however criticised the Taoiseach's stance on the matter stating that leaving regulation in the hands of individual Local Authorities "is a cop-out. We must have central legislation so that all homebuyers around the country are afforded the same level of protection."

Murphy went on to highlight that she possesses planning documents that contradict the assertion by the Department of the Environment that the establishment of Estate Management Companies is not a mandatory condition of planning permission. "Kildare County Council has required the developers of at least two separate housing estates to establish or employ and Estate Management Company." she went on to state that Kildare County Council have also required that all property buyers in these developments become members of these companies and therefore bear the cost of maintenance. "This situation is untenable and grossly exploits new home buyers who are simply trying to get along in life".

"There must be Legislative provision on this issue. Consumer protection is seriously lacking for homebuyers in this situation. I hasten to say that you get a better warranty when you buy a toaster than when you spend €100,000's on a house in one of these estates" fumed Murphy. She concludes by saying that, as homebuyers are often not told of the estate maintenance obligation until signing their contract of sale. Notably, at this point a substantial and refundable deposit is on the line which that diminishes the buyers options with regard to backing out of the sale or demanding more competitive practices in the appointment of a management "local Authorities, developers and the Government in its failure to instigate legislation have created a situation wher homebuyers unprotected and dis empowered at a time when they are amking the most significant financial commitment of their lives. This is wrong and it has to change".

Bond Bridge Project to be Completed in 40 weeks Instead of Two Years:

The original plan for the Bond Bridge Project was for a contract lasting two years with the existing bridge remaining open for traffic and pedestrians for the duration (except for about two weeks). However, the Contractor, Jons Civil Engineers, has submitted proposals to the Council for the closure of the bridge and the completion of the project in 40 weeks. The main reason for this fast tracking of the contract is the poor condition of the canal bridge. The Contractor and the Council's Project Engineer made a presentation at a well attended public meeting on September 29. On a show of hands there was unanimous support for the Contractors' proposal.

The bridge closure has to go through a public consultation process and a notice will be posted in local papers in mid-October. It is hoped that the bridge will be closed towards the end of November. The pedestrian walk at the back of the Health Board houses has already been closed off (this was always in the plan) and when the bridge is closed pedestrians will have to use Old Greenfield Lane to get to the Railway Station, Schools or the University. According to the Project Engineer this will add 150m to the journey.

Residents will be aware that major progress has already been made on culverting of the Meadowbrook Stream.

Still no Progress on Setting up New Town Councils-Maynooth, Celbridge and Clane Hopes Dashed:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the inaction by the Minister for Environment, Heritage and Local Government for his failure to bring forward regulations under the Local Government Act 2001 to allow for the establishment of new Town Councils.

Deputy Stagg questioned the Minister in the Dail on September 28 in relation to the introduction of regulations to allow the establishment of new Town Councils. The Minister advised Deputy Stagg that he was considering the steps necessary to commence the relevant provisions of the 2001 Act, including the establishment of the Local Government Commission, and that he would continue to pursue consultations with Local Government interests.

Deputy Stagg dismissed the Minister's response as anti-democratic. Whilst the Minister may only be in Government for just over a year the Act was passed by his Government in 2001. Under the Act it is envisaged that Towns with a population of 7,500 in the preceding Census can make a proposal to establish a Town Council. A pre-requisite for this though is the establishment of the Local Government Commission which the Minister refuses to set up.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he would continue to raise this issue with the Minister until Local Democracy was established for Towns such as Maynooth and Celbridge who would qualify under the last Census and Clane which will probably qualify under the 2006 Census.

Stagg Welcomes Court Injunction Move Over Illegal 02 Mast in Maynooth

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to pursue Kildare Co. Council in relation to the unauthorised 02 Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth, and he is pleased that the Council have now decided to take Injunction Proceedings against 02 in the Circuit Court.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Injunction Proceedings are being taken under Section 160 of the Planning and Development Act 2000 and will seek the removal of the existing unauthorised mast. Deputy Stagg further stated that it was 02's supposed inability to lodge an application for Planning Permission to retain the Mast which lead to the Council deciding to take this strong legal measure.

Outlining the sequence of events, Deputy Stagg stated as follows:

- A warning letter issued to 02 in relation to the unauthorised mast on 9th December, 2004.
- 02 applied for retention of the mast on 25th January, 2005.
- The application was declared invalid by the Council on March 21st, 2005.
- 02 reapplied for retention on 14th June, 2005.
- The second application was declared invalid on 5th August, 2005.
- In early August, Deputy Stagg requested the Council to initiate legal action pointing out that 02 knew the planning laws and were messing around with the Council.
- On 26th September, 2005, the Council advised that the file was now being referred for legal proceedings under Section 160 of the Planning and Development Act, 2000.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he expected the Council's solicitors to act quickly on this matter given the decisive decision to take legal action.

Tenders Under Examination for Maynooth Post Primary Extension

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to question the Minister for Education in relation to the required extension to Maynooth Post Primary School.

The Minister for Education advised Deputy Stagg in the Dáil on September 28th that tenders have been received for the project and that they are currently being assessed by the Design Team appointed by County KiIdare V.E.C. when the assessment is completed a Tender Report will issue to the Department Of Education.

Welcoming this progress Deputy Stagg stated that the campaign to increase the permanent building capacity at Maynooth Post Primary to 850 pupils was nearing conclusion. The extension comprises of 6 General Classrooms, Demonstration Room, Computer Business Machines Room, Special Tuition Room, 2 Lecture Rooms, Administration Rooms and a Physical Education Hall.

Deputy Stagg further stated that the construction period for the extension is likely to be 15 months and he vowed to continue to monitor progress on the project which incredibly has planning permission since December 2001.

Stagg Angry at Waiting Times for Eye Tests for Children in North Kildare

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his anger at the

7 month delay in Maynooth Health Centre in arranging Eye Tests for Children.

Deputy Stagg had questioned the Tanaiste and Minister for Health in relation to the issue but as she refuses to answer parliamentary questions anymore she referred the question to the Health Services Executive as if she as Minister for Health had no function in the matter.

The H.S.E. advised Deputy Stagg that the waiting time for Eye Tests for Children was as follows in Health Centres in Co. Kildare.

NAAS
NEWBRIDGE
MAYNOOTH
ATHY
4 MONTHS
3 MONTHS
3 MONTHS

The figures speak for themselves stated Deputy Stagg. Children in the North of the County are on average left waiting twice as long as anywhere else in Kildare. This is simply unacceptable and children with eye sight problems are suffering negatively from the delay in their treatment. In addition it places enormous pressure on Parents and forces them to go into the Private Sector seeking an eye test for their Children.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to raise the matter further with the Tanaiste and H.S.E. as additional resources will have to be provided in Maynooth Health Centre to reduce the Waiting Times substantially. In this rich Country we live in there should be no waiting lists anyway.

Cllr. John McGinley's Submits Motions & Questions to the Leixlip Area Committee:

Councillors can submit a maximum of three motions and three questions for inclusion on the Agenda for each monthly meeting of Area Committees of the Council.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following for the Area Meeting on October 21:

1. Meadowbrook Road:

"When will traffic calming and other safety measures be put in place on the Meadowbrook Road to counteract the risk of accidents to pedestrians from the construction trucks on the Bond Bridge project."

2. Moyglare Road:

"What plans are there for the complete re-surfacing of the Moyglare Road, Maynooth, in order to remove its hazardous state as a result of the damage done by the pipe laying contractor."



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

3. Meadowbrook Stream:

"That a major clean up of the Meadowbrook Stream be carried out before the winter in order to reduce the risk of flooding. The fitting of grids at the culvert at Meadowbrook Court creates a greater urgency for the clean up."

4. Rathcoffey Road:

"Bearing in mind the massive cost of providing a footpath across the Rathcoffey Road M4 bridge that cycle lanes be painted on the bridge and on the road leading to the bridge in order to slow down traffic and bring some element of safety to the large numbers of children who use it to get to the soccer pitches."

5. Northern Relief Road:

"Have the preliminary designs for the Maynooth Northern Relief Road been prepared and has the road route been included in the Draft Meath County Development Plan."

6. Meadowbrook Link Road:

"That traffic lights be installed at the junction of the Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road in order to facilitate ease of exit from the new Link Road and that measures be taken to prevent the parking of caravans on the greens adjoining the new Link Road."

Safety Over the Skies in Maynooth:

Mr. Jim Mansfield and Mr. Paul Mullins from Weston Aerodrome attended a Special Meeting of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council on October 7 to consider Cllr. John McGinley's following motion:

"That Kildare County Council demand of the owners of Weston Aerodrome and the Irish Aviation Authority that they implement noise abatement and safety procedures at Weston aerodrome in line with those in place at most airports large and small worldwide. The appropriate procedures with regard to Maynooth are that aircraft exiting Weston aerodrome to the west should track south of the M4 Motorway, and that aircraft approaching Weston from the west should track north of Maynooth. Furthermore, all aircraft operating out of Weston aerodrome should be instructed to fly no lower than the regulation 1,500 ft. altimeter setting), which equates with approximately 1,750 ft. above sea level at Maynooth. Adherence to these procedures considerably enhance the safety of the residents Maynooth. We further demand that the Irish Aviation Authority and Weston Aerodrome put monitoring procedures in place to ensure that these noise abatement and safety procedures are fully complied with. Moreover, as there are no systematic procedures in place to monitor the activities of aircraft out of Weston Aerodrome in the skies over Maynooth , we demand that a monitoring regime is put in place to ensure that all aviation regulations and local noise abatement and safety procedures are fully complied with"

The good news is that the representatives from Weston agreed to Cllr. McGinley's proposals and they have instructed pilots to fly south of the M4 going west and north of Maynooth flying east. The agreement of the Irish Aviation Authority (IAA) to this arrangement is still awaited and unfortunately they did not attend the meeting so it was not possible to get their view on this or on monitoring arrangements. It is hoped that the IAA will be in a position to attend an Area Meeting soon in order to clear up the outstanding issues.

Safety Measures at St. Mary's Boys' National School

The safety measures proposed by Cllr. McGinley at the Boys National School, Maynooth, were agreed at the Area Meeting on September 16. The signage showing the bus bay operating times has been erected and the double yellow lines and the bus bay markings will be carried out on October 10/11.

John has also demanded the installation of black decorative bollards at the footpath, similar to Main Street. The Council officials argument that there is no funding for them is ludicrous considering that millions have been collected in Development Levies from all the new developments in Maynooth.

Damaged Fence at Beaufield/Rathcoffey Road

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to replace the 20m of missing fence and to repair the damaged parts at the front of Beaufield housing estate.

Dumping at the bottom of Greenfield Lane

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley the Council removed the dumped material from the bottom of Greenfield Lane on October 3. John has also asked for the removal of the trees and shrubs from this location and that proper landscaping be carried out so that it can be maintained by the very willing residents.

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


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
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Editorial

The editorial board would like to wish the readers of the Newsletter a Happy Christmas and a peaceful, fruitful New Year. We would also like to congratulate the Traders Association on the erection of the Christmas lights in the town again this year.

However, possibly the greatest talking points in the town at present are the problems of traffic and parking. The opening of Manor Mill and the change in the timing of the multitude of traffic lights that have proliferated in the town has led to traffic chaos. This was not helped by the fact that the building of a pavement close to the exit/entrance to the Motorway reduced the traffic flow in that area to one lane.

The Community Council has written to Kildare County Council to ask them to re-set the traffic lights. They are now in the control of a private company and the number of traffic lights in the area were imposed as part of the planning permission by An Bord Pleanála. The timing for the right hand turn from the Straffan Road has been reduced by half causing a traffic jam in both lanes. The closure of Bond Bridge and the Rathcoffey Road means that little or no traffic is using that area, however, the timing of the lights has not been emended accordingly.

This traffic chaos and congestion would be avoided if proper planning were observed in Maynooth. But as is the problem countrywide, the planning process works backwards – build the houses and the shopping developments first, allow traffic to grow to unmanageable proportions before providing the proper infrastructure. The Meadowbrook Link and the construction of the new Bond Bridge are welcome developments but look at the time frame involved. The crazy traffic problems in a relatively small town will be further exacerbated by the Mycete development on the Moyglare Road, again given permission by An Bord Pleanála. Maynooth will not only become impassable, it will become Kildare's answer to the M50 where nothing can move. The huge development proposed by Tesco at the Dublin end of the town is set to entice thousands more shoppers and vehicles into our little town.

The corresponding, related problem is that of parking, or indeed the lack of it. In comparison with our near neighbour and growing dormitory county, Meath, Maynooth is relatively lucky to have a semi-decent public transport service but the lack of adequate parking facilities at the train station is resulting in frustrated rail passengers resorting to using adjacent housing estates for all day parking. The public car parks in the town are also used for the same purpose so that we, the residents who live and work in Maynooth, have nowhere to park during the day. This cannot be good for business in the town and negates all the supposed benefits of the bypass.

But enough whinging. Again let me wish our readers a Happy Christmas wherever they are shopping. "Tis the season of goodwill" after all. A last word, let us try to remember those who have been left behind and forgotten by the so-called Celtic Tiger and support the causes of such groups as the St Vincent de Paul, Focus and others during this spending season.

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Maynooth Community Council Notes

Community Centre

A meeting has taken place with Kildare County Council and Maynooth Community Council stated Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin, Brid Feely, Peter Connell, Tony Nealon attended. Peter Minnock, Kildare County Council attended, also three area Councillors. It was felt that this was a very important meeting for Maynooth.

While it has become clearer what Kildare County Council has in mind, we the people of Maynooth must decide what we want and have a plan now.

Local Matters

The question of HGV going through the town was raised again, while it was felt that there was a improvement, there was still some HGV's coming into the town. John McGinley advised people to take the number and pass it onto the Garda. It might be helpful if signs were put on the Kilcock and Moyglare roads saying no HGV's.

Traffic Lights

The question of the very serious state of traffic in Maynooth was raised. It was noted if going right, from Straffan Road at the Square the timing is halfed also there is a longer free flow if going left as a result. It was noted that Traffic Consultants have a certain interest in the timing of the lights, also that these Consultants won't meet with Kildare County Council. Brid Feely noted that business people are worried about this.

Paul Croughan said things are getting worse, he queried who is running the town.

When a traffic survey was done a couple of years ago it was done in July, when traffic is not as heavy as in September or October.

Moyglare Road

Paul Croughan bought up the dreadful state of Moyglare Road, he said it's a disgrace that the road has been let get so bad. John McGinley advised that work would begin in a two weeks, manholes and shower drains have to be raised before resurfacing can start. John asked for complete re-surfacing to be done.

Harbour Action Area Plan

The Action Area Plan will be up for discussion in November. Senan Griffin said that this is a crucial plan for Maynooth. He also noted the planned upgrading of the Canal making it a very important community amenity, also important to cut out antisocial behaviour here.

Paul Croughan said the Tidy Towns is not about maintenance still a lot of work going on. He said their committee are looking at what went wrong and also hoping to work closer with Maynooth Community Council and Kildare County Council.

Christmas Lights

Brid Feely said that new wiring going up also looking for support from the community as well as business people.

Tesco Presentation Carton Park

Mr. Michael Sullivan, Development Manager, Ms. Una Cross, Mr. Owen Reynolds and Ms. Mary Corrigan attended the meeting.

Mr. Sullivan said they purchased the mart site some years ago and it has taken two years for it to come this far, he also said that the Mill Street and then the Collinstown then came along. He said Maynooth has been identified as a retail centre for North Kildare and with 40,000 identified vehicles passing Maynooth everyday it is planned to bring some of these people to shop in Maynooth. He said 17,000 of the population live within ten mins of Maynooth, 180,000 within 20 mins and ¼ million within 30 mins. He showed how the population has expanded with 20% of the population over 45 years and 80% under 45 years.

He said the new Tesco which will be 80,000 sq.ft., and will be built on the mart site. This will be built on stilts and will have car parking underneath it, also to be included is a Medical Centre, which he felt would be of great benefit to the town.

Mr. Sullivan said that a créche is also to be built, and a drive-through restaurant. There are to be 16 new retail shops to be built and these will be built on the old Tesco site when the existing store is demolished, these will house names like Next and Debenhams.

Maynooth Community Council Notes (contd)

There are to be covered walkways to be introduced.

The extra traffic that would be coming to Maynooth was raised; Mr. Sullivan said that the fashion retailers would possibly have only on delivery a week, others possibly only every two weeks.

The question of a cinema was raised by Hugh Gallagher, however, Mr. Sullivan said that a cinema was not a viable project for them. He said that some people in Naas were trying to get a cinema going but were finding it very hard, but he said if someone comes up with a plan that they will look at it.

Mr. Sullivan then went onto say that the existing nine units would be upgraded to blend them in with the new plan, he said the new car parking plan will face these units. Senan Griffin felt that these shops offer a personal service to the people of Maynooth and he said he would be concerned and would want them protected. Mr. Sullivan said that the shops are indeed part of a very viable part of the development, he said the whole centre will have to do well, also with more people coming into the centre, these shops will benefit.

Mr. Sullivan said they have significantly contributed to a relief road, re— the BLacklion Road, also that a significant amount of space will be given to the community in the centre.

Mr. Sullivan then stated that 1,300 people would be employed in the new store. The fact that people living in Leinster Park do have worries about the new development was raised by Tom McMullon. Mr. Sullivan said that they are working with landscape architects at the moment and will be planting mature trees to help with the landscape here. Senan Griffin said building still too close to the wall here. Mr. Sullivan said there was still room for planting trees.

It was noted that the stone wall will continue along the front the of new development. Car parking will be free. New building to be built first and then the others will follow.

Mr. Sullivan said they are the retailer developing this project, so they want everything to be right.

This concluded the presentation

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

Useful Tips

Finger Paints

A coulorful diversion to keep your childeren occupied.

To make enough for three colours
6oz/175g plain flour
8fl oz/225 ml water
3 tablespoons glycerine
Assorted food coulorings

Mix the flour and water in a medium-size bowl. Divide the mixture equally among threee small bowls. Add 1 tablespoon glycerine to each batch, stirring constantly, to which you have added the food colouring of your choice.

Facial scrub

Avoid messing up your floors by applying this over the sink.

To make enough for one treatment
6 tablespoons cornmeal
2 tablespoons honey
I tablespoon ground almonds
or walnuts

Combine the ingrediants in a small bowl, adding a little water if the mixture is too dry to apply easily. To use, pack the scrub onto your face and leave for about 5 minutes. Remove with warm water and a flanel.

Bath Oil

A soothing skin softener.

To make enough for one bath
8fl oz/225ml honey
16fl oz/450ml milk
16 tablespoons sea salt or cooking salt
4 tablespoons bircarbonate of soda
4fl oz/115ml baby oil

In a large bowl, combine the honey, milk, sea salt and bicarbonate of soda. Stir well. Pour the mixture into a bathful of warm water and the add the baby oil. Mix well with the water. Make fresh for each time of use.

Lost pets

- Have your name, address and phone number engraved on a tag and make sure your pet wears it on its collar at all times.
- Keep a clear colour photo of your pet and a list of its distinguishing marks

- If your pet is missing, search the neighbourhood and call the local police stations, animal shelters and vet surgeries.
- If you find a pet with a collar but address contact the police.
- The latest in pet identification is a microchip implant under the skin of the pet which contains a number unique to your animal.

Bicycle safety

- Wear light-coloured clothing, preferably with a reflective belt, arm bands or jacket and invest in a safety helmet.
- Paint you bike with luminous paint, and make sure it carries effective lights and reflectors.
- Watch put for pedestrians who step onto the road unexpectantly.
- Be sure to indicate clearly when you are turning left or right.
- Concentrate on the road ahead and try to avoid bumps or potholes which make you lose control.
- Don't ride on the pavement!
- Don't overtake vehicles in the face of oncoming traffic or ride on the nearside of a vehicle.


Piggy banks

Question

What are the revised Medical Card Income guidelines?

Answer

Both the Medical Card income guidelines and the income guidelines for the new GP Visit Card have been increased by 20%. The GP Visit Card entitles you to attend your family doctor free of charge but you have to pay for any drugs etc., you need. You apply for either card on the same application form, which is available from your local health centre or Local Health Office.

There are additional allowances for rent/mortgage, for child care costs and travel costs to work (actual cost of public transport or mileage at €0.50 per mile).

Everyone aged 70 and over normally resident in Ireland is entitled to a Medical Card, however, it covers the cardholder only.



Question

Do I have to pay any charges for a public bed in a private nursing home if I have a Medical Card?

Answer

Yes you do, whether you have a Medical Card or not.

Under the Health (Charges for In-Patient Services) Regulations 2005 (S.I. No. 276 of 2005) people in receipt of in-patient services in a public nursing home are liable for charges even if you have a Medical Card. If the Health Service Executive (HSE) is providing you with in-patient care in a contracted-out bed in a private nursing home you are liable for the same charges.

The weekly charges, which have been effective since the 14th July 2005 are as follows:

Class 1 - where nursing care is provided on a 24-hour basis:

Total weekly income less €35, subject to €120 maximum per week.

Class 2 - where nursing care is not provided on a 24-hour basis:

Total weekly income less €55 or 60% of the weekly income (whichever is the smaller amount), subject to €90 maximum per week.

The following groups are exempt from these charges:

- People under 18 years of age
- Women receiving maternity services
- People detained involuntarily under the Mental Health Acts
- People in hospitals for the care and treatment of patients with acute ailments including psychiatric ailments
- People who, in the opinion of the HSE, have contracted Hepatitis C directly or indirectly from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D or the receipt within the State of another blood product or a blood transfusion

The HSE may reduce or waive the charge where it would cause undue financial hardship.

Further information is available from your Local Health Office in the HSE and from the Citizens Information Centre.

Question

I understand that EU/EEA nationals working in Ireland may be eligible for the One-parent Family Payment without having to satisfy the habitual residence condition. Why is this?

Answer

In May 2004 the requirement to be habitually resident in Ireland was introduced as a qualifying condition for certain social assistance payments paid by the Department of Social and Family Affairs, including One-Parent Family Payment. In general, to qualify for a payment under this condition, you must have been resident in Ireland or in Northern Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man for the two years immediately prior to applying for a payment.

Since May 2005 One-Parent Family Payment has been reclassified as a Family Benefit. Child Benefit is already classified as a Family Benefit.

As a result of this change the habitual residence condition is not applied to claims for One-Parent Family Payment made by EU/EEA nationals, or by Swiss nationals, who are employed or self-employed in Ireland and who are subject to the Irish PRSI (social insurance) system. They can also receive the payment if they become unemployed and are receiving Unemployment Benefit.

Question

Are there charges if you request information from an organisation under Freedom of Information?

Answer

There may be charges in certain circumstances.

Under the Freedom of Information Acts 1997 - 2003 (FOI) you have the right to access information held by public bodies, and in particular, the right to access information held by a public body about you and to have that information corrected if it is incomplete, incorrect or misleading. It also give you the right to be given reasons for decisions made by public bodies which affect you.

Examples of bodies that come under FOI are government departments, most state and semi-state bodies, local authorities and third level educational institutions.

There is no charge for the following types of request:

- A request for records containing only personal information
- A request to have incorrect personal information changed
- Requests where you are looking for reasons for decisions taken by public bodies that affect you personally

An application fee of €15 must accompany requests for non-personal information..

A reduced fee of €10 will apply if you are a Medical Card holder. This fee is in addition to the fees which may be charged for search, retrieval and photocopying.

A charge also applies in most cases where you seek an internal review or make an external appeal to the Information Commissioner concerning access to non-personal information. A fee of €75 applies to internal reviews and a fee of €150 to external appeals. The reduced fee for Medical Card holders is €25 and €50 respectively.


To make an FOI request submit the request in writing along with the appropriate fee, if applicable, to the public body, specifying that the request is being made under the FOI Acts.



One Year After Tsunami – Trócaire Relief Programme

Tsunami of December 26 was one of the worst disasters recorded in history. Within hours massive killer waves caused by an earthquake turned coastline towns and villages of 18 countries into wreckage.

Within days of the new year, the world saw the horrifying consequences of the tragedy - rising death tolls, whole villages wiped out, over 180,000 dead and hundreds of thousands in refugee camps.

And people all over the world responded to the tsunami disaster with sympathy and generosity. Governments, UN agencies and numerous international organisations started to work together on relief and aid incentives.

Our response

Trócaire, one of the oldest Irish charities, began its Tsunami Relief Appeal in the early days of 2005. The Irish peolple showed enormous dedication to raising funds and with a number of fundraising events organised by individuals, clubs and organisations, donations exceeded €27.5 million. Churches and parishes throughout the country raised over € 19 million.

Real help

Today we are talking with **Vicky Tindal**, Emergency Programme Officer of **Trócaire**.

Could you tell us about your role in Trócaire?

Vicky: I cover the programmes in the countries affected by Tsunami. Trócaire works through partners and I manage the relationships between Trócaire and our partners.

Which countries will you be working with?

Vicky: The countries worst affected – Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India and Thailand. I work with a number of local partners and organisations in those four countries.

What activities are you involved in?

Vicky: It's a whole range of activities. Firstly, it's rehousing and reconstruction for all those people who have lost their houses. This is closely linked to rebuilding the communities as well. A lot of programmes will be around what we call psycho-social care – dealing with the whole trauma of having gone through something so frightening. These could be what we call normalising activities, trying to get people of different age groups, women and men to do normal things again – music, sports, such things. Other programmes will involve things like income generation.

What will that be?

Vicky: We will be helping people to start small businesses again. People who have lost their tools, lost their trade will start to be independent again.

How are the programmes planned and implemented?

Vicky: With Trócaire we have an advantage that we work together with partners – local organisations, we would have had relationship with before. We are a development organisation and also respond to emergencies. We wouldn't be starting from scratch, we would have been funding programmes in Sri Lanka up in the north during the war, relief and rehabilitation programmes and national peace programmes. We continue to support those programmes but at the same time try to integrate the new ones – and in the case of tsunami, such a major disaster, we send a number of key technical staff who work with our partners.

Would you tell us how will they be helping there?

Vicky: They are specialists, who will be doing counselling and advising. Such as financial advisor, shelter advisor, livelyhood advisor, and advisor on monitoring and evaluation. They are working to build the capacity of our partners.

The most important thing is that we take a long term approach, so we are looking at the next three to five years.

Will you be able to share with our readers some vivid memory while working on this programme?

Vicky: I went out to Sri Lanka as a part of Trócaire team a few days after the tsunami. I travelled to one of our partners to the north of Sri Lanka, and what really struck me that a few days after the major emergency was the amazing feeling of hope. People in camps, having lost everything had still not lost their dignity. I just found that really striking. We all forget about things like that.

What inspired you to work for Trócaire?

Vicky: I've always admired them. I first came across Trócaire, when I was working in Central America just after a hurricane, and was really amazed by their work as I very much belive in working in partnerships.

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R ecipes

Mince Pies

Ingredients Makes 36

170g/6oz/1 ½ cups chopped almonds
140g/4oz/ 2/3 cup dried apricots chopped
170g/6oz/1 ¼ cups raisins
140g/5oz/ 2/3 cup currants
140g/5oz glacé cheries chopped
140g/5oz/¾ cup cut mixed peel, chopped
115g/4oz/¾ cup finely chopped beef suet
grated rind and juice of 2 lemons
grated rind and juice of 1 orange
200g/7oz/scant 1 cup soft darkbrown sugar
4 cooking apples6. Transfer the rounds to the bun
tray. Fill half with mince meat. Top with a teaspoonful
of the cream cheese mixture.

7. Roll out the remaining pastry and stamp out 36 x 5cm/2in rounds. Brush the edges of the pies with milk, then set the rounds on top. Cut a small steam vent in the top of each pie. Brush lightly with milk. Bake until golden, 15-20 minutes before unmoulding.

Spiced Christmas tree

Ingredients Makes 25

85g/3oz butter, softened plus a little for greasing 100g/4oz caster sugar 1 egg, beatená 1 tsp vanilla extract 2tsp mixed spice 2 tbsp golden syrup 250g/9oz plain flour ½ tsp baking powder icing sugar to decorate

- 1. Beat together the butter and sugar until they turn pale yellow, about 3-5 mins, with an elctric mixer. Add the egg slowly, beating it in as you go. Then stir in the vanilla, spice, goldensyrup, flour and baking powder. Shape into a flat disc, wrap in cling film and chill in the fridge for 1 hour.
- 2. Heat oven to 180C/fan 160/gas 4. Grease a couple of flat baking sheets. Roll out half the biscuit mixture on a floured board so it is 4mm/¼ in thick and cut out 12 Christmas trees using a Christmas tree cookie cutter. Repeat with the remaining dough. Place on a baking sheet and bake for 10 mins until just golden brown. To decorate dust with icing sugar. 10ml/1tsp ground cinnamon

5ml/1 tsp grated nutmeg 2.5ml/½ tsp ground cloves 250ml/8fl oz/ 1 cup brandy 225g/8oz/ 1 cup cream cheese 30ml/2 tbsp caster sugar icings sugar, for dusting

For the pastry

420g/15oz/3¾ cups plain flour 140g/5oz/1¼ cups icing sugar 350g/12oz/1½ cups of cold butter grated rind and juice of 1 orange milk, for glazing

- 1. Peel, core and chop the apples and mix with the nuts, dried and preserved fruit, suet citrus rind and juice, brown sugar and spices. Stir in the brandy. Cover and leave in a cool place for 2 days.
- 2. For the pastry, sift the flour and icing sugar into a bowl. Cut in the butter until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs.
- 3. Add the orange grind. Stir in just enough orange juice to bind. Gather into a ball, wrap in baking parchment, and refrigerate for 20 minutes.
- 4. Preheat a 425°F/220°C/Gas 7 oven. Grease 2-3 bun trays. Beat together the cream cheese and sugar.
- 5. Roll out the pastry to a thickness of $5 \text{mm}/\frac{1}{4}$ in. With a fluted pastry cutter, stamp out $36 \times 8 \text{cm}/3 \text{in}$ rounds.



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Common phrases and their meanings

Nautical Terms

To be **Taken Aback** suggets someone has been taken by surprise and stopped in their tracks. 'Aback' is the nautical term for sudden wind change, in which the sails flatten against the mast.

To **Have someone Over a Barrel** means that somebody is at the mercy of third parties and unable to have any influence over the circumstances surrounding them.

The **Bitter End** means this is the absolute end. This phrase has its origins at sea and is nothing to do with taste. On the sailing ships of past centuries, the anchor was fixed to the deck by solid bollards made of iorn and wood known as 'bitts'. Coloured rags were tied to the rope near the deck end and once they were revealed crewmates knew the anchor could not be let out much further. The rope between the anchor and rags was was known as the bitt end or the bitter end.

When you have **Had Your Chips** your look has run out. This related to a gambler who has lost all his chips.

To be **At A Loose End** describes a time when we would be sitting around with nothing to do. We go back to the old tall ships to define this phrase. Any ship using sails would have thousands of ropes making up the rigging. Each of these lengths would need to be bound tight at both ends to prevent them from unravelling. To give the sailors something to do the captain would order them to check the riggging for loose ends. Therefore, idle men would find usually themselves 'at a loose end'.

When somebody **Passes with Flying Colours** they have acheived something with distinction. The old English Navy's term for flags were 'colours'. Successful fleets hoisted the balttle flags high on the mast.

You Scratch My Back And I'll Scratch Yours relates to two people doing each other a favour. This term relates to lenient punishment by the English Navy to crew a member by mearly 'scratching' his back.

To **Flog A Dead Horse** is to waste time and energy on a situation that will clearly have a negative outcome. Far out to sea, the Horse Latitudes can be found 30 degrees either side of the Equator, where the subsiding dry air and high pressure results in weak winds. According to naval legend, the area was so called because the tall sail ships, relying on strong winds, always slowed considerably or even

stalled. Often it took months to pass through the Horse Latitudes, by which time sailors had worked off what known as the 'Dead Horse'.

First rate means something is the best available or near perfect. From the time Henry VIII began organising the English Navy in the 16th century, war ships were rated on a scale of one to six. Grade one meant 'first rate' or the best.

To feel **Groggy** means to feel unwell, often as the result of drinking too much. In 1740 Admiral Vernon, the commander in chief of the West Indies, replaced the neat rum which was then issued to all sailors twice daily, with a watered-down version. This became known as 'Grog' and drunk sailors were considered 'groggy'.

Raining Cats And Dogs is a phrase meaning it is raining too hard to go out in. Ancient mariners believed that when it rained it was the cats who caused it and when the gales appeared they were brought by the dogs.

Son Of A Gun inplies humerous shock and disbelief. This term refers to a child born on board sailing ships behind the mid-ship gun.

To be **Under the weather** means to be ill or unable to function and is another phrase with its origins at sea. In days gone by when a sailor was ill he would be sent below decks where he could recover. Under the decks and 'under the weather' his condition could begin to improve.

A **Square Meal** is used to describe a good, solid dinner. It is a nautical phrase dating back centuries. Ols battleships had poor living conditions and the sailor's diet would rarely be better than bread and water but the last meal of each day would at least include meat and was served on a square tray.

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Gardening Tips for December

The Flower Garden

Protect plants likely to flower this month or next: hellebores and *Iris unguicularis* usually bloom during the month (although the majority of the hellebores don't open until the new year) and need protection from slugs: provide cover unless, in the case of the iris, it is grown in a sunny, warm south-facing wall border. Occasionally there is a surprise precocious flowering of primroses, epimediums, fiolas, pansies, and other early spring-blooming species in brief mild warm spells.

Prevent mice and voles from digging up crocus corms by pegging fine mesh plastic netting over them, and put down a repellent, especially at the entrance of small holes.

If there is a spell of good planting weather, take the opportunity to make a special planting of border plants that appeal to you, suited to your soil and situation. Distinctive plants include the *Hosta* species and varieties, for varied foliage and cover in shade; red hot pokers, Kniphofia species, for a summer spectacle; Astilbe varieties for moist or boggy ground; a range of Campanula species on chalk; a cluster of day lilies, Hermerocallis, for summer in almost any of sword-leaved New Zealand soil; Phormiumtenas, with colourful foliage for mild gardens; and the true Geranium in its several species and varieties, for dryish shade.

The Fruit Garden

Fruit trees and soft fruit. Complete winter pruning and application of a tar-oil wash to apples, pears, stone fruits and soft fruits before the end of the month. Any further delay must result in damage to buds.

- Keep the area under the branches of fruit trees clear of grass and weeds which compete with the trees' roots for moisture and nourishment. Clearing the ground will also improve soil aeration and penetration by rain, and facilitate manuring and feeding.
- Winter-feed trees and bushes with slow-acting fertilisers and manures. Provide phosphorus in the form of bone meal to all fruits, every second or third year. Provide nitrogen in hoof and horn meal (and organic manure or compost) annually, especially to black currants, culinary apples and pears. Provide a yearly feed of potash in sulphate of potash or powdered seaweed, especially to red and white currants, gooseberries, and dessert apples. Top fertiliser dressings with one of humus-forming organic material.

- Stop rabbits and hares from eating the bark of young trees, either by smearing the stems with fruit-tree banding grease as high as the animals can reach, or by fitting plastic guards round the stems. Damaged trees will recover provided the bark has not been removed all the way round the stems; but wounds should be pared clean of ragged bark, and dress with a fungicidal tree dressing.
- Check over apples and pears in store, and remove promptly any that are going bad. A strong fruit odour is caused by ethylene gas from fruits ripening too quickly. It means that the store needs ventilating.
- Cut out and burn shoots carrying bands or rings of globular eggs, deposited by the lackey moth, which hatch into leaf-devouring caterpillars in spring.
- Outdoor vines should be planted before Christmas. They need a sunny wall, or an open sunny situation in a favourable climate where they may be grown in rows, trained on wires. The fruit needs a warm autumn to ripen, even though it is hardy.

The Ornamental Garden

Paths

Mark out and construct paths when weather permits. To be sure of dry footing in wet situations place a line of drain-pipes underneath, in a foundation layer of broken stone, bricks or rubble.

Lawns

Check for the presence of leather-jackets, the greyish brown larvae of the crane-fly (daddy-long-legs) when tufts of dying grass come away easily in the hand, and starlings are busy pecking and feeding. The grubs are found just under the turf. Treat them with a dressing of a carbaryl (sevin) or derris insecticidal dust bulked with sand, in a mild spell.

Finish re-turfing on light soils by the end of the month to ensure a smooth look for the summer.

Do not work on the lawn in frost or snow; do not even walk on it, as fine grasses may be bruised and damaged.

Roses

Carry on planting new roses in mild weather, into prepared soil.

Shrubs

Top-dress lime-tolerant rhododendrons and ericas with oak leaf-mould if available; or with decaying woodland floor leaves and even rotten fragmented branches and wood, which is what they like naturally, or moist dark moss peat.

HOMOEOPATHY EXPLAINED.

What is Homoeopathy?

Homoeopathy is a form of Natural Medicine using Homoeopathy Medicines or Remedies. Homoeopathic remedies are made from natural substances, they are safe and non toxic due to high dilution and therefore don't cause harmful side affects. It is a system of medicine based on ancient principles and developed 200 years ago by a German doctor called Samuel Hahnemann. It is enjoying renewed popularity as people appreciate its safety and the fact that the medicines are non-toxic. One in four European citizens used homoeopathy according to a recent survey.

How does it work?

Homoeopathy uses natural substances to stimulate the persons own healing response. Homoeopathy stimulates the body to heal itself by treating "Like with Like". This means that any substance that can make you ill can also be used to make you well. another way, any substance that is capable of producing symptoms of illness in a healthy person, is also capable of treating similar symptoms in a person who is sick. For example, an individual peeling onions may experience profuse watering, burning and redness of the eyes. Sneezing and a runny nose can also be part of the picture. This group of symptoms is very similar to those of the common cold. Homoeopathy, a specially prepared extract of onion is used to treat the above symptoms in someone who is actually suffering cold symptoms. Hence the basic law of Homoeopathy, "let like be cured with like." the stimulus with homoeopathy strengthens the immune system and means an improved level of health with homoeopathic treatment.

What can it be used for?

Homoeopathy can be used to treat all the family, to treat both first aid situations and chronic illness as well as emotional states. It can be used safely for vulnerable groups such as babies and children-during pregnancy and childbirth and for elderly people. For recurring or chronic conditions treatment is best undertaken with the guidance of a qualified professional homoeopath.

How is it different?

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
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
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LEMONGRASS AND LIME VODKATINI'S

Serves 2

These are great to get the palate kick-started for a spicy meal ahead—actually, they are good anytime!

25g (1 oz) caster sugar 1 stalk lemongrass, chopped (first remove the tough top part of the stalk and outer leaves) 2 tsp ginger, grated 8 mint leaves, chopped 50 ml (2 fl oz) boiling water 8 cubes of ice 100 ml (3½ fl oz) vodka Juice of 1 lime



Put the sugar, lemongrass, ginger and mint into a bowl and pour in the boiling water(must be boiling) Stir to combine and let infuse for 10 minutes or until cool. Strain, then add the vodka, shake with ice (or stir in a jug with ice,) remove the ice then serve in a frozen glass with a mint leaf floating on top.

NOTE If you don't have lemongrass, use finly grated rind of the lime instead.

NOTE For a non-boozy version, use some sparkling water instead of the vodka.

NOTE These are good served with crushed ice too.

MULLED CIDER

Serves 3-4

500 ml (18 fl oz) medium-dry cider of good-quality Apple juice
100 ml (3½ fl oz) water
50g (1¾ oz) Demerara sugar
6 cm (2 in) piece of cinnamon stick, broken in half
2 strips of orange rind, removed with a peeler

2 whole cloves

Place everything in a saucepan and heat up, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Serve.

Great at Christmas as a change to hot port and mulled wine; it's just as good if made with nonalcoholic, good-quality apple juice too.




RASPBERRY LEMONADE

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

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
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Maynooth Beaver Scouts enjoy Science evening.

Bond Bridge

Kildare County inserted notices in newspapers advising the public that Bond Bridge would be closed to traffic from 7 November 2005 to 7 June 2006 in order to facilitate the completion of the works within 40 weeks instead of the original plan of two years to completion. As a result Bond Bridge closed on November 7 and it was due for demolition on November 15.

Maynooth Labour News

Cllr. John McGinley has got agreement from the Council on the removal of trees, the provision of a 1.8m footpath and the construction of a wall and railing (similar to that at Meadowbrook Road) at the bottom of Old Greenfield in order to provide an environmentally friendly walkway for pedestrians.

The Council have also agreed to Cllr. McGinley's proposals for traffic calming and other safety measures on Meadowbrook Road. John was advised that the design drawings should be available for the next Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on November 18.

In reply to Cllr. John McGinleys motion for a clean up of the Meadowbrook Stream before the winter sets in, he was advised that the Council's Waterworks Section were at present estimating the costs of the proposal. John stated that the clean up can be paid from contingencies built into the Bond Bridge Project.

Stagg Blasts Proposal for 4 & 3 Storey Apartment Blocks at Old Greenfield

Deputy Emmet Stagg has blasted the application for Planning Permission for the provision of 4 and 3 Storey Apartment Blocks at Old Greenfield, Maynooth.

Along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley Deputy Stagg has lodged an objection to the proposal calling it incomprehensible and out of character with the existing built environment in the area which is made up of bungalows and single storey semi-detached houses.

Outlining his objections to the development, Deputy Stagg stated:

The density at 43.7 units to the acre is excessive when compared with existing residential density in the area which is about 3 units to the acre.

The site is less than 0.5 of a hectare which precludes it from serious consideration for higher residential density.

The proposal has no regard for the residential amenity of neighbours which is a requirement under the Maynooth Development Plan 2002.

The Zoning of the area was set at a Higher Density to make it easier for families to get planning permission to build homes for members of their families.

The proposal is out of character with the existing pattern and scale of development in the area which is single storey.

The proposal does not integrate with existing development in the area.

The 4 & 3 Storey Blocks will cause overlooking of existing properties, particularly of rear gardens causing a loss of privacy.

The 4 & 3 Storey Blocks will cause a loss of light to surrounding houses.

The monstrous structures will dominate the skyline as viewed from the houses and gardens along Old Greenfield Lane.

The excessive development will significantly increase traffic volumes on the proposed road to the rear of the houses along Old Greenfield Lane thus increasing the traffic hazards where the road will join with the Straffan Road

The 4 & 3 Storey Blocks will destroy the entrance to Maynooth along the Straffan Road by placing ugly 4 & 3 Storey Apartment Blocks at a prominent Visual Point along the Straffan Road.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that the proposed development had no regard for the existing residents of the area and was simply out of character and unacceptable and he called on Kildare Co. Council to comprehensively reject Planning Permission.

Stagg Lodges Objection to 02 Mast Retention at Maynooth G.A.A. Club

Deputy Emmet Stagg has lodged an objection with Kildare Co. Council along with his colleague, Cllr. John McGinley, to the application by 02 Communications for the retention of their unauthorised Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg stated that this was 02's second attempt at applying for retention, the previous application having being declared invalid twice. The Council are now taking Injunction Proceedings against 02 under Section 160 of the Planning and Development Act 2000 seeking the removal of the Mast and Deputy Stagg has been advised by the Council that the Legal Proceedings will continue even though this new application has been lodged.

Deputy Stagg has described the proposed retention of the Mast as totally unacceptable in an area which is heavily populated and which has over 1,200 pupils located in 2 schools within 200 yards of the site. Outlining his objections to the Mast Deputy Stagg stated:

- The proposal does not comply with the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 which states that Telecommunications Masts will not be permitted in the vicinity of schools or residential areas.
- The site is zoned Open Space and Amenity under the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 and Council Policy is to protect such areas from encroachment by other uses.
- The existing Mast has been unauthorised for 3 years and the applicants have failed to examine other sites in the area or to look at sharing an existing mast.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he looked forward to the commencement of Injunction proceedings against 02 and the rejection of the application for retention by Kildare Co. Council.

O2 Mast Retention Application in Maynooth Declared Invalid Again

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his utter amazement and anger that the new planning application by O2 to retain their unauthorised Telecommunications Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth, has been returned as invalid by Kildare Co. Council on October 18th. The new application has been rejected as invalid for the following reasons:

- The Newspaper Notice and Site Notice do not match.
- All required Drawings of Plan Elevations were not submitted.
- The overall Height of the Mast, which stands at 15 Metres, was not shown properly on a number of drawings.

Deputy Stagg stated that the previous retention application by O2 was returned as invalid twice by Kildare Co. Council. This new application has been returned as invalid within 8 days. I stated previously that O2 were playing with the Council as they are well capable of lodging a valid application for planning permission, if they so wish.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he had again contacted the Council insisting that they pursue vigorously the Injunction proceedings against O2 under Section 160 of the Planning and Development Act 2000, to have the unauthorised mast removed.

Maynooth Presentation Convent Extension Still on Hold.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to question the Minister for Education in relation to the required extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent National School.

Last April the school was allowed to proceed through Architectural Planning and in her most recent response the Minister advised Deputy Stagg that her Department Officials had recently written to the school requesting further information from the Consultant Quantity Surveyor on their Stage 3 Submission (Developed Plans/Costs) and that a response is awaited.

Deputy Stagg expressed his disappointment at the response. On 16th June last the Minister advised that the Stage 3 Submission had been received and would be examined by the Department's staff in due course. Given that further information was requested only recently it must have taken Departmental Staff more than 3 months to bother examining the Stage 3 Submission. This is a clear example of obvious delaying tactics given the urgent need for the extension.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he would continue to press the Minister in relation to progressing the required extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent.

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Labour News (contd)

Minister Washes Hands on 24 Hour Garda Station for North Kildare – Now Says it is Up to The Commissioner

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued his campaign for the provision of a 24 hour Garda Station (District Headquarters) to serve the towns of Celbridge, Maynooth and Leixlip, which had a combined population of 40,324 people according to the 2002 census.

Deputy Stagg questioned the Minister as to why there was no intention of closing any of the existing 109 Garda District Headquarters in the State, and yet he refused to even consider the provision of a 24 hour station in North Kildare because it would remove gardai from outdoor duties.

The Minister in his response to Deputy Stagg stated that under the Garda Siochana Act 2005 the Commissioner of the Garda Siochana has enhanced responsibilities in preparing proposals for organisational reform. The Minister further stated that it would be premature to anticipate what proposals, if any, might be developed by the Commissioner.

Deputy Stagg expressed his continuing anger at the refusal to provide a proper policing service in North Kildare. He stated that he would now contact the Commissioner of the Garda Siochana with a view to making the case to him of the need to set up a 24 hour Garda Station in North Kildare.

Over 400 Children Awaiting Orthodontic Treatment in Kildare – 242 are Over 2 Years Awaiting Treatment

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Tanaiste and Minister for Health in the Dail in relation to the number of children awaiting Orthodontic Treatment in Co. Kildare. The Tanaiste as is her custom now referred the question to the Health Services Executive for answer as if she had no responsibility for the delivery of services to children.

The Health Services Executive advised Deputy Stagg that there were 430 patients awaiting Orthodontic treatment in Kildare, an increase of 33 since Deputy Stagg last raised this issue in July. The most worrying aspect of the response was that 242 children are waiting more than 2 years for treatment. In addition 346 children have not even got onto the waiting list because they have not been assessed yet despite their referral by the primary dental care service.

The Health Services Executive further advised Deputy Stagg that a number of recently qualified Orthodontists would be working on a part time basis with the H.S.E. in October.

Deputy Stagg described the waiting time for children as scandalous given the distress caused to children awaiting orthodontic treatment. This Government wasted €150 Million on a computer system that can`t add yet we are only hiring additional orthodontists on a part time basis.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that the Tanaiste was responsible for the inadequate service and its time she devoted more resources to this area. We have the money but the Government have no willingness to tackle this issue.

Labour Publishes Ambitious Childcare Programme With Early Years Subsidy for All Parents

The Labour Party have published an ambitious policy on Childcare which would give every parent what it calls an Early Years Subsidy of €50 per week, extend parental leave and have it paid, offer a free preschool place for all 3 year olds and put in place a system of family friendly work options and career leave for parents in the workforce.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has described it as a policy which puts children and their needs at the heart of the childcare debate and for the first time, offers all parents real choice.

"Our proposal gives equal recognition to the contribution of all parents — whether full time in the home, part time in the workforce, or full time in the workforce, with a subsidy which goes to all, and acknowledges the high cost of childcare, no matter how the child is cared for or by whom", he said.

"We now have an opportunity to put in place something that is currently missing in Ireland - a comprehensive system of early childhood care and education, which puts the needs of children first. We can now afford a major investment in early childhood care and education, and there is no doubt that it will pay off for everyone".

"And our proposals respond to a key concern for so many parents – having the time to be at home with their children. A package of family friendly work options, including paid parental leave, career leave and flexible working, will support parents

in being parents, especially during the critical early years in a child's life", he said.

"We are also supporting the many thousands of childminders who are doing such a valuable job caring for children but who are not being acknowledged for it. We are proposing a tax exemption on the first €8,000 of earnings for childminders, many of whom at the moment do not have the benefit of social protection.

"Our proposal to have a free pre-school place for all children meets a need long recognised — to have a system of pre-school education in place for all, not just those who can afford it. And the benefits are well documented", he said.

Deputy Stagg said the package includes measures to encourage a range of after-school childcare options, which again come from the standpoint of what's best for children.

"Labour's comprehensive package will result in more childcare places being available because of increased investment, and will put quality at the heart of early childhood care and education". Deputy Stagg said investment in childcare, especially for families living in poverty, is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty and has been shown to make a significant impact on the ongoing problem of early school leaving.

"And for

many lone parents, affordable childcare is what makes the

difference between being at work and not being at work".

"Finally, what this policy is fundamentally about is giving every parent –

no matter what their circumstances – a real choice about how they care for their children. We want parents themselves to make their own choices. Our job is to give them the help and support they need to do that".

Stagg Welcomes Confirmation of C.P.O. and E.I.S. for Upgrade of N4 Between Leixlip and the M50

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by An Bord Pleanala dated 28th October to confirm with some modifications the Compulsory Purchase Order and Environmental Impact Statement for the upgrade of the N4 between Leixlip and the M50.

Deputy Stagg stated that the C.P.O. and E.I.S. for the scheme had been published by South Dublin Co Council on March 22nd and an Oral Hearing was held in relation to the scheme on July 5th.

The improvements planned include the following stated Deputy Stagg:

- · Widening the existing carriageway to 3 lanes in each direction.
- Provision of a new interchange at the Lucan/ Newcastle Road Junction on the Lucan By-Pass.
- · Closure of existing Median Crossings along the full length.

Deputy Stagg stated that South Dublin Co. Council will now prepare the Detailed Design of the Scheme and he called on the National Roads Authority to provide funding for the works early in 2006.

This work stated Deputy Stagg should have been completed in 2004 but was delayed following cutbacks introduced after the 2002 General Election. The work will provide relief for motorists through the provision of the additional lane in both directions and the removal of the traffic lights on the Lucan By-Pass.

Public Lighting at The Harbour, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion on the provision of proper public lighting at The Harbour, Maynooth:

"The Meeting Administrator may wish to refer to recent reports in this instance. The Senior Executive Officer has been in touch with Waterways Ireland with a view to ascertaining whether its requirements relating to the type of lighting column might be relaxed in view of the substantial costs involved. A reply is currently awaited.

In brief terms, as previously outlined, Kildare County Council is simply not in funds to fund the cost of this scheme which, in turn, relates to land which is not in its ownership. However, in view of the issues involved, and as the matter has become quite protracted, it is willing to make a reasonable contribution. The members will recall that Iarnród Éireann is not prepared to contribute.

I have requested the Senior Executive Officer, Roads Administration to continue to pursue this issue as a matter of priority and a further report will issue in due course. The assistance of the members will also be appreciated in this matter."

The County Manager also told Cllr. John McGinley that he was taking a personal interest in this long running issue and that he would be consulting Waterways Ireland, Iarnrod Eireann, OPW and ESB as requested by John in order to reach a satisfactory conclusion. Cllr. McGinley has pointed out that this is a highly pedestrianised area and that the provision of proper lighting is a public safety issue and that its provision would also protect the Council's significant investment in the Children's Playground.

Provision of a Bus Shelter at the Stop Opposite The Glenroyal Complex

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update on the provision of the much needed bus shelter at the stop opposite The Glenroyal:

"The Area Engineer has received correspondence from Clear Channel, the company responsible for erecting these bus shelters. A copy is available in the area office. There is a new bus shelter design available which may well suit this location. A consignment is being delivered in the coming weeks and the Area Engineer hopes to have an up-date for the next meeting of the Area Committee."

Footpaths at Dublin Road/Doctors Lane, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update on his motion at the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on October 21:

"A detailed report on this matter was issued for the May meeting of the Committee. Again, by way of background the members will be aware that it was proposed to create a oneway system for Doctors Lane. As per drawings previously circulated, it was also envisaged that resurfacing work would take place and the footpaths would be strengthened. It was also proposed to provide additional parking as well as cycle lanes from the Doctors Lane junction to Tesco.

Again, as previously advised these works have been prioritised; Phase 1 (in the form of the Charter House scheme) having been carried out. However, a source of funding has not yet been identified for Phases 2 (Doctors Lane) and Phase 3 (Doctors Lane to Tesco).

It may be that some funding can be identified from the development contribution (old) scheme. Indeed an amount of €25,000 (Planning Ref: 02/2060) has been so identified. However, this would only cover a small element of the cost.

I do, however, recall that this matter has been raised on a number of occasions at the Area Committee. Accordingly, I have requested that provisional costings be prepared regarding Phases 2 and 3. I have also requested the Roads Administration section to re-check if there are any further development levies (old scheme) which could be applied to such works which, indeed, are considered to be desirable. A further report, together with drawings, with be circulated for the November meeting."

Cllr. John McGinley again pointed that over €1m in development levies have been collected in the area in the recent past and that they should be used to provide a footpath and cycle path from Doctors Lane to TESCO.

Northern Relief Road from Moyglare Road to Moygaddy in Meath

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the October Leixlip Area Meeting to his motion on the provision of the Northern Relief Road:

"A preliminary design has been prepared for the Maynooth northern relief road and a copy is available for inspection in the Road Design office. Relevant officials in Meath Co. Council have been appraised regarding the issue as part of an ongoing series of liaison meetings which take place regarding infrastructural issues common to both authorities.

However, a formal submission has not as yet been made as there are some planning matters to be resolved in the first instance. These aspects are currently being addressed by the Council's Planning department."

Re-Surfacing of the Moyglare Road

In reply to his motion Cllr. John McGinley was advised that:

"A contractor will be carrying out this resurfacing work in the near future. This matter is in hand."

Cllr. John McGinley stated that nothing short of complete re-surfacing of the road would be acceptable because of the damage done during the pipe laying.

Provision of Traffic lights at the junction of Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion:

"This matter has been examined by the Road Design team. Indeed, as part of the Meadowbrook Link project, ducting has been provided for the provision of traffic lights in the future. However, it is not proposed that such will be provided in the short term. In this regard, a comprehensive approach to traffic management on the Straffan Road will be pursued in the context of the future opening of the proposed Straffan Road/Celbridge Road link at the Lidl development. This will probably entail the provision of traffic signals at both locations in the future. It should, however, be emphasised that traffic arrangements in the context of the reconstruction of Bond Bridge will continue to be monitored. In this regard, it is proposed that signage will be erected at Ladychapel directing H.V.G's away from the Meadowbrook Link to Taghadoe Cross."

Clir. John McGinley welcomed the proposal for the additional signage directing HGV's away from the Meadowbrook Link Road and Beaufield. However, he stated that with the closure of Bond Bridge it is essential that traffic signals are put in place at the Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road junction in order to regulate traffic at morning peak times. The pity is that a roundabout, as proposed by John and his fellow Councillors, was not put at this location in the first place.

Provision of Footpath on Rathcoffey Road, Across the M4 bridge:

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion on this much needed footpath to cater for

the footballers going to the new soccer pitches:

"Please also refer to previous reports in this matter. The issue has again been examined by the Road Design team on a preliminary basis. It is considered very unlikely that the provision of cycle lanes is feasible at this location. In the first instance, the width of the bridge is probably too narrow. In addition, and as previously outlined, this area extends well into a rural location and it would not normally be the practice to extend footpaths/cycle lane infrastructure into such outlying locations for a number of reasons as previously cited.

"The Road Design team are, however, agreeable to look at the issue in more detail and a further report will, hopefully be available for the December meeting."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the reply was totally unacceptable and he asked that every effort possible be made, in the interest of public safety, to have positive proposals for the December meeting.

Maynooth Traffic Plan

Council Officials reported as follows to complaints from Councillors on the operation of the new Maynooth traffic Plan:

"This matter is being closely monitored by the Road Design team. Initial observations would suggest that the system is generally working well. However, it must be emphasised that there are still works to be completed, mainly relating to pedestrian facilities etc. There should be no difficulty regarding the attendance of the Traffic Consultants (Faber Maunsell) at a future meeting to deal with detailed queries. However, it is suggested that this might best be left to the December meeting in order to facilitate completion of all works and to allow further monitoring to take place.

As previously outlined, the related issue of parking management also requires urgent attention and the Road Design team will commence this task hopefully in early 2006."

Cllr. John McGinley stated that it is incorrect to suggest that the system is generally working well. He pointed out that that may be the case at the Mill end but it is certainly not the case at the Dublin Road end where traffic is backed up to Blacklion in the evenings. Also, traffic coming down Straffan Road and turning right for Dublin Road are being given very little green light time and this problem is exacerbated

by the failure of bus drivers to pull into the bus bay and so allow a continuous traffic flow. John has again asked that the pedestrian phase on the traffic signals at the Bank of Ireland be removed as they are a hazard and are no longer required anyway since the pedestrians signals came into operation at The Roost.

Cllr. McGinley's Motions and Questions for the Leixlip Area Meeting

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motions for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

Motion on Parking Management Policy for Maynooth

"That the following parking management policy be adopted for Maynooth:

- 1. That Pay & Display with Permit Parking be introduced
- 2. That the profits accruing be ringfenced for use in Maynooth
- 3. That enforcement of the Parking By Laws be vigorously policed by Council Traffic Wardens
- 4. That increased public parking capacity be provided as a matter of urgency
- 5. That the Minister for Transport and Iarnrod Eireann be asked to provide proper Park & Ride facilities for those commuters who use Maynooth Train Station."

Motion on Pound Park (The Green), Maynooth

"That the following works be carried out in Pound Park (The Green), Maynooth, without any further delay:

- 1. That the Bandstand be removed and installed at NUI Maynooth as previously agreed.
- 2. That full re-instatement and landscaping be carried out.
- 3. That the mound of earth which is being used at present as a location for anti-social behaviour be levelled immediately.
- 4. That the wall at the Band Hall be reconstructed and that the palisade fencing

be replaced with a stone wall."

Question on the Re-cycling Centre at the Public Car Park, Maynooth:

When are the long awaited CCTV cameras being installed at the re-cycling centre at the public car park in Maynooth?

Question on Traffic Calming at Laurence Avenue, Maynooth

When is the traffic calming being installed at Laurence Avenue, Maynooth? (I allocated funding from my Discretionary Grants for this)

Stagg Welcomes 10 Year Transportation Plan But is Critical of Delivery Times and Exclusion of LUAS Extension to North Kildare:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the announcement of Transport 21 but has criticised the delivery dates for Public Transport Improvements for Kildare and the exclusion of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge from the new LUAS line from Lucan to the City Centre.

Deputy Stagg stated that the following Projects would benefit Public Transport Commuters in the North Kildare area.

- Rail Re-signalling in the City Centre between Connolly and Pearse Street Stations which will increase the number of trains per direction from 12 to 16 per hour. This will allow for additional services on the Maynooth Line and is due for completion in 2009.
- The opening of a new Train Station at Spencer Dock by 2009 will also provide opportunities to increase frequencies on the Maynooth line.
- The Kildare Route Project which involves quadrupling the line between Hazelhatch and Inchicore, and which is presently the subject of a Railway Order application, will be completed by 2010.
- A DART service will be provided on the Maynooth and Hazelhatch lines by 2015, and this will improve services further.
- The Interconnector, linking the Kildare Suburban line from Hazelhatch and Sallins, to

the City Centre is also due for completion in 2015

 Additional Buses will also be provided which will improve the frequency of services.

Whilst welcoming the plan, Deputy Stagg stated it would be over 4 years before there would be a major increase in services on the Maynooth Line and 5 years before services on the Hazelhatch and Sallins line could expect major increases. The Electrification of both these lines and the provision of a DART service have been put to the back of the queue until 2015. Similarily the Interconnector has a completion date of 2015.

What worries me stated Deputy Stagg is that the former Minister for Transport, Seamus Brennan T.D. indicated to me two years ago that the Re-signalling in the City Centre would be completed by 2007 and according to this new 10 year plan it will now be 2009 before this work is completed. This does not engender any great confidence in this Government to deliver on this Plan in Time and on budget. In addition the quadrupling of the Line between Hazelhatch and Inchicore was included in the National Development Plan 2000 to 2006. Yet we are now told that it will be 2010 before this project will be completed.

The Plan also has glaring omissions, one of which is doubling the line to Kilcock which is not even mentioned and the other is the exclusion of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge from the proposed new LUAS line from Lucan to the City Centre. Surely the provision of a LUAS line to the North Kildare Towns should have been considered seriously and it is disappointing that it was not.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that this Plan at least provides in a structured way the delivery of Public Transport Improvements but it will have to be monitored closely to ensure that it is delivered on time. In addition he stated that he would raise the doubling of the track to Kilcock and the extension of the new LUAS line to Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge with the Minister for Transport.

Labour Motion on Management Companies for New Housing Estates:

Cllr. John McGinley and his fellow Labour Party Councillors had the following motion on the Agenda for the October meeting of the Council: "That Kildare County Council cease the practice of imposing planning conditions that require the creation of management companies for new housing estates, that the formation of Residents' Associations be actively encouraged and assisted and that where management companies exist that the residents be advised and assisted on how they can be wound up."

It was agreed to refer the motion to the Council's Planning Strategic Policy Group and that the group would come back to the January Council meeting with a recommendation for progressing the motion.

Cllr. John McGinley was advised by Council Officials during discussions on the County Development Plan that management companies would only be a requirement for apartments and would not apply to houses. However, this information was incorrect as management companies are now a condition in the grant of planning permission for many new housing estates, a practice that the Minister Dick Roche stated on RTE 5/7 Live was illegal. On hearing this Cllr. John McGinley asked the County Secretary for an urgent explanation.

Work to Commence on Maynooth Post Primary Extension at Last - Stagg

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed confirmation from the Minister for Education that work on the required extension to Maynooth Post Primary School will commence by the middle of November.

Deputy Stagg stated that the cost of the contract is in excess of €3 Million and that the period of the contract is 15 months. The contractors are at present moving on site with construction ready to begin.

The Extension stated Deputy Stagg will increase the permanent building capacity at Maynooth Post Primary School to 850 pupils and the extension comprises 6 General Classrooms, Demonstration Room, Computer Business Machines Room, Special Tuition Room, 2 Lecture Rooms, Administration Rooms and a Physical Education Hall.

With construction now commencing Deputy stagg stated that the long campaign for the extension which began in 1999 has finally come to a successful conclusion and he complimented the C.E.O. of Co. Kildare V.E.C. Sean Ashe on the successful conclusion

Catherine Murphy T.D. Press Statement

PROPERTY MANAGEMENT CLAUSES UNLAWFUL AND UNENFORCEABLE SAYS TD

Deputy Catherine Murphy has today stated her belief that certain conditions in the contracts of sale of homebuyers in house-only developments who have been forced to subscribe to Property Management Companies are not legally enforceable. In stating her belief in this regard Murphy referred to the legal principle that where a contract or conditions of a contract are not in compliance with an existing law they are void and or unenforceable.

"You can't contract outside the law, that's a simple fact of our legal system. So now that the Minister for the Environment and the Taoiseach have informed us that Local Authorities were not acting as they should have when they imposed planning conditions making the existence of these companies mandatory for certain developments it's clear that these conditions were not lawful. The courts need to recognise this and equity demands that they rule these conditions to be unenforceable", stated Murphy.

Minister for the Environment, Mr Dick Roche TD, informed Deputy Murphy on 25th October 2005 in the Dáil that the *Planning & Development Act 2000* is not intended to be used by Local Authorities to "side-step their responsibilities or try to pass them on to residents" where estate management companies are concerned. He went on that day to highlight that "the intention [of this act] is to protect homeowners and to expedite the process of taking estates in charge. It is not meant as a means for local authorities to side-step their responsibilities or try to pass them on to residents."

Murphy concluded in saying "I of course understand that retrospective legislation is not lawful and cannot be enacted but it is important that the Government introduce legislation ensure that the rights of property owners are safeguarded in the future. Equally however it's vital that the rights of the people who have been caught out by this unlawful practice are also vindicated."

Stop Considering and Start Delivering on Town Councils, Demands Frustrated TD

Deputy Catherine Murphy has reiterated her extreme dissatisfaction at inaction on the part of Minister for the Environment Mr Dick Roche TD regarding the establishment of Town Council's. Although having net with what he termed "a number of vibrant community groups, including both Celbridge and Maynooth Community Council's"the Minister has not yet

commenced the relevant provisions of the Local Government Act 2001 to enable eligible towns apply for Town Council Status.

"It's outrageous that almost 10 years on from the Report of the Reorganisation Commission that called for improved accessibility, interaction and linkages for all towns with their Local Authority the Minister is still only 'considering' steps necessary to make Town Council applications possible. 10 years is more than enough time, we need Part 17 of the Local Government Act 2001 to commence immediately"stated Murphy.

According to Part 17 of the Local government Act 2001 once a town has a population 7,500 or over (at the time of the last census) it is eligible to propose the establishment of a Town Council to their County Council, after which a detailed process is engaged to decide on whether the proposal will be accepted. Although these provisions form part of an Act which has been on the Statute Book since 2001 the Minister for the Environment has, as yet, failed to commence them making them ineffectual.

"Everything about this is anti-democratic. The Local Government Act 2001 was passed by both houses of the Oireachtas, it was signed into law by the President of the country, yet the Minister for the Environment is founding up the show while he considers whether or not he wants to commence certain parts?. This is wrong and it's the people of towns like Celbridge and Maynooth that are suffering as a result" fumed Murphy.

She concluded in highlighting the positive influence that Leixlip Town Council has had on the development of the town"as a founding member of Leixlip Town Council I know first hand just what positive focus it has given Leixlip. As towns grow in size more effort needs to be made that the sense of community remains, Town Council's have a vital part to play in doing this and I'm determined that towns like Maynooth and Celbridge be given the chances that Leixlip have had over the years

Gardai Intended To Tackle Drugs Problem Allocated to Traffic Duties, According to TD

Deputy Catherine Murphy has criticised the governments approach to the setting up of the now one-year old Garda Traffic Corps. Although fully supportive of the establishment of the Corps due to what she has termed the "ongoing and consistently tragic" instances of road traffic accidents on Irish Roads, Murphy has criticised Minister Michael Mc Dowell's inclusion of the Corps , within the overall

planned increase of 2000 Gardai in the coming years.

"The government has promised us an additional 2000 Gardai to be targeted specifically at, and I quote from the programme for government, 'areas experiencing a significant drugs problem and a large number of public order offences'. This must be fulfilled over and above the staff allocation of the Traffic Corps, recent gangland killings are just a sample illustration of why" When the formation of the Traffic Corps was announced by Minister Mc Dowell on 23rd November 2004, he informed the public that there would be "dedicated Traffic Corps with its own staff and ringfenced budget". However Murphy has stated that as the planned increase in Traffic Corps numbers from the current level of 574 to the end target of 1,200 Gardai will be staffed directly from the 2000 additional Gardai to be recruited over the coming years, we will see an additional 800 Gardai on the beat throughout the country, a country that is seeing a rapid increase in population.

"I strongly welcome the formation of the Traffic Corps and I also welcomed the announcement of 2000 additional Gardai in the Programme for Government of 2002 but the Government should be honest and start separating the figures out. We are to have a 1,200 strong Garda Traffic Corps and an additional 800 Gardai for other other areas of policing. Lets not kid ourselves here"

TD Urges Vigilance in Monitoring Christmas Taxi-Fare Hike

What is hoped to be the final Christmas taxi-fare ripoff is well under way as passengers are set to pay anywhere between €40 and €70 for the eleven mile journey from Dublin City Centre and Leixlip, according to Deputy Catherine Murphy. The North Kildare TD highlighted that this journey should, on the meter, cost approximately €30 however a small minority of unscrupulous taxi-drivers are embellishing the fare to the disadvantage of passengers.

"As Dublin taxi-drivers are not required to take fares outside their meter area and when they do are entitled to negotiate a fare with the passenger, a minority of drivers are exploiting the situation. Although the vast majority of drivers are not engaging in this practice it's important that the public takes note of those trying to rip them off and report them to the taxi regulator. This is a huge problem late at night when the demand for taxi services far exceeds the supply" stated Murphy.

However the Taxi Regulator who was appointed in September 2004 is currently engaged in a public consultation process regarding proposals for improvements to taximeter areas and fares. While

strongly welcoming the action on the part of the Regulator in what she hopes will be a 'much needed and long awaited" improvement in the taxi- services for North Kildare, she has urged caution to all of those who will be using taxi-services over the Christmas period.

"People taking taxi's from Dublin into the North Kildare Area need to be careful that the taxi drivers they approach will agree a fare with them before they enter the vehicle. And, more importantly where passengers encounter drivers who will only carry them for exorbitant fares they should take the number of the taxi and contact the Regulator to make sure that these drivers aren't allowed to continue ripping passengers off and giving all taxi-drivers a bad name" concluded Murphy.

T.D. Welcomes New Train Timetable

I spoke to some Irish Rail Officials who deal with the timetable on the Maynooth line and there is some good news.

The new Irish Rail timetable for Maynooth line is due to come into effect on 11th December which is a Sunday however from the Monday commuters will notice some welcome changes.

There will be some small changes to some of the existing times but the introduction of 3 new trains morning and 2 new trains at evening peak are the big news. The expectation was that there would be one additional 8 car train morning and evening what they have done is to add a train at 7.22 a.m. and 8.40 a.m. these will be 4 car trains (they will terminate at Connolly rather than crossing to Pearse Station). The new evening trains will be at 17.28 and 18.04. Some significant long gaps will have been closed in the timetable by these changes.

I had had a PQ replied by Martin Cullen in relation to the extra slots (from 12 to 16 per hour) across Butt Bridge to Tara however that does not seem to add anything to the Maynooth line.

The next serious opportunity to add to the service will be in about 18 months following upgrades to signalling etc. but we will have to wait until Spencer Dock is delivered to get to the 10 minute peak time service that is expected in 2008.

They also hope to do a lot more in the off peak in the next revision of the timetable December 06. There is one new off peak train being introduced into the new timetable.

Given the level of overcrowding being experienced this is welcome however it makes the service more attractive and I think it is predictable that it will increase the numbers, people are voting with their feet so the more that can be delivered the more successful the line will get.
