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
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
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Editorial

1. The Maynooth Community Council represented by the Chairperson, Brid Feely, Secretary Muireann Ni Bhrolchain, PRO Marie Gleeson and members Peter Connell and Terry Nealon met in Kildare County Council offices last week with the County Councillors for our area and Council officials to discuss the proposed Community Centre.

Harbour Field



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

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Gardening





Indoor Gardening Makes a rewarding Hobby!





ouseplants, also called indoor plants, brighten up your home or office.

The benefits of indoor gardening are numerous. Indoor plants take in carbon dioxide (which you inhale) and in turn release oxygen for you. Indoor plants also brighten the room, providing a cheerful sight for those grey and often dreary winter days.



Caring for houseplants makes for a great hobby during the long winter months, and even through the year. Many gardeners refuse to twiddle their green thumbs as the long winter months keep them indoors. Rather, they actively extend their gardening pleasure throughout the winter by tending to a wide array of indoor plants. Another big benefit of indoor gardening is there is nothing more relaxing than gardening, so if the Christmas rush is getting you down, take some time for yourself and give your plants some t.l.c.



Christmas is the time for giving and receiving flowering potted plants. A bright, colourful azalea, Christmas begonia, chrysanthemum or a gaily decorated poinsettia, Kalanchoe, or Christmas cactus added to the other decorations in the home give the holiday season a festive air.



If care is taken of these plants, they can be enjoyed not only during the holidays but will remain attractive far into January and even February if properly cared for. Care of Christmas plants is easy. Faithful attention will add days and even weeks of life to any of these popular Christmas plants.



Temperature is Important

Temperature has an important influence on the length of time a flowering house plant will remain attractive. The poinsettia is especially sensitive to chilling, and a prolonged chill will cause it to lose its leaves. The plant should be placed in the coolest part of the room, but not in a cold draft. This means away from radiators and other sources of heat. A temperature of 65 degrees at night is satisfactory but 60 degrees is still better for most of the flowering potted plants. In fact, cyclamen like a 50 degree night temperature.



Watch the Watering!

The method of watering also can determine the life of a plant. Many people drown their plants by watering at regular intervals, not considering whether the plant needs. The roots of plants need air as well as water, and excessive amounts of water do not allow a place for air in the soil. Over watering literally smothers the plant roots. Proper watering calls for a little thoughtfulness and often the exercise of restraint. Water should be applied in sufficient quantities to thoroughly soak the soil in the pot and no more watering should take place until the soil approaches dryness again. Plants should be checked for dryness daily but not watered if the soil is still moist. Do not immerse the pot in water—water from the top.

Lots of Light

Remember that most holiday plants have been out of a greenhouse only a short period. The difference between a greenhouse environment and a typical indoor room is usually considerable. In the home as much light as possible should be provided. A dark bedroom, hall, entrance foyer, or living room does not have optimum growing conditions. Place your plants where they receive the morning sun. Poor light will cause leaf drop. And remember, if you place a plant on a windowsill, remove it before you pull the curtains or it will surely die of the cold!

Although the humidity in a house is not easily altered, plants will do best in an area of the house where the humidity is the greatest. This is usually in the cooking area. It often helps if plants are set on pebble-filled saucers with water maintained at a level just below the base of the pot so that it does not touch the water.

By giving your Christmas pot plants the best environmental conditions of proper temperature, adequate water, and good light, they will furnish an attractive display for a longer time.



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

Question

I understand that the names of some social welfare payments have been changed. Can you please give the details?

Answer

You are correct. A number of payments from the Department of Social and Family Affairs have been renamed. A new pension scheme has also been introduced.

The new names are as follows:

A new payment called the State Pension (Non-Contributory) has been introduced. It replaces the Old Age (Non-Contributory) Pension.

In addition to the changes to payment names, changes have also been introduced for people getting certain payments from the Department when they reach age 66.

People getting Invalidity Pension or State Pension (Transition) will automatically transfer to State Pension (Contributory). Those getting Blind Pension, Widow's and Widower's Non-Contributory) Pension, One-Parent Family Payment, Deserted Wife's Allowance and Prisoner's Wife Allowance will **not** continue to receive their payment when they reach 66 years of age. They will have to apply for the State Pension (Non-Contributory) and should do so 3 months before they each age 66.

Question

If a couple who were engaged to be married end the engagement, what happens to any wedding gifts they may have received?

Answer


The Family Law Act 1981 covers what should happen to wedding gifts if an engagement ends. It allows for legal action where there is a dispute over property or finances between a couple or involving a third party following a broken engagement.

When two people who are engaged give gifts (including an engagement ring) to reach other, there is a presumption that they are given on the condition that the gifts will be returned (if the donor requests) should the engagement end. If one of the engaged couple dies, however, it is presumed that the gifts the deceased gave were given without any conditions, so the surviving fiancé(e) can keep the gifts.

Where someone gives an engaged couple or one of the couple a wedding gift, there is a presumption (unless there is evidence to the contrary), that it is given to both of them as joint owners. It is also presumed that the gift will be returned (if the donor requests) should the engagement end and the marriage does not take place for any reason. This includes the death of one of the engaged couple.

Where an engagement has ended and one of the couple has incurred substantial expenses in preparation for the marriage (and hasn't benefited from the expenses), that person may apply to the courts for compensation. These expenses might include, for example, expenses incurred in booking the wedding reception or honeymoon. A third party (such as a family member or friend), who similarly incurs substantial expenditure in preparation for the marriage on behalf of one of the couple, and has not benefited, may also apply to the courts for compensation.

Under Section 44 of the Family Law (Divorce) Act 1996, dispute about property between a couple whose engagement has ended are treated in the same way as disputes between a married couple who are separating or divorcing. This only applies to property in which either or both of them had a beneficial interest while they were engaged. It does not apply to property acquired after the engagement ended.

Answer

A new Electoral Register is compiled each year by each local authority and it is published on 1 November. You Information about those resident in Ireland who are not your name included. You can inspect the draft Register in Garda stations, public libraries, post offices and local forwarded to the President's residence at: authority offices.

If you miss the deadline for inclusion in the Register you can apply for inclusion in the Supplement to the Register at any time. To be able to vote, however, you must apply at least 15 working days before polling day. You must also be at lest 18 years of age on polling day.

Application forms to register are available from Garda stations, public libraries, post offices and local authority Further information is available from the Citizens offices.

Question

Is there a special payment that someone gets when they reach 100 years of age?

Answer

Yes there is. It is called the Centenarian's Bounty.

The Centenarian's Bounty is a national award made by the Irish President which is paid to all those resident in Ireland on their 100th birthday. It is usually presented on behalf of the President by a local member of the clergy or a friend of the person. The person receives €2,540 and a letter of congratulations signed by the President.

Since March 2006, the Centenarian's Bounty is extended to centenarians who were born in the Irish State and are Irish citizens, but who left Ireland to take up permanent residence abroad.

I am not included in the Register of Electors and Information about those who are about to reach the age of 100 years and who are getting a pension from the Department of Social and Family affairs is forwarded automatically to the office of the President in advance of their birthday. The office of the President then makes the award to the person.


Since 2000, the President has also marked the birthday of each person resident in Ireland over the age of 100 On his or her 101st and every subsequent birthday, he/she receives a special commemorative coin in a presentation box, along with a congratulatory letter signed by the President. Useful Hints

Christmas Food Safety

ver 100,000 people in Ireland could suffer from acute gastroenteritis during the Christmas holidays according to the website Safefood.com, While food poisoning is only one of the possible causes of this condition, almost a quarter of respondents in a recent survey suspected that their illness was due to consuming contaminated food or water.

Food poisoning is a particular problem at Christmas for a variety of reasons:-

- The fridge is usually overloaded
- Food is often left out on tables for long periods
- Catering for large numbers is a challenge in a domestic kitchen
- In the rush people can forget the food safety practices they would normally adhere to; such as washing their hands between preparing raw and cooked food
- Leftovers are left out at room temperature for more than two hours.

However the most common danger is from undercooked turkey. As a poultry, uncooked turkey can contain the *campylobacacter* bacterium so it's vitally important that you *cook your* turkey thoroughly to avoid giving anyone food poisoning.

Cooking Turkey

Everybody has a different method of cooking the turkey. Some people slow cook them in the simmer section of the Aga over 24 hours, some people part cook them so there's only an hour or so left on Christmas day, others cook them on Christmas eve and reheat on Christmas day.

Start the cooking process by heating the turkey to an initial high temperature (72 degrees C) in order to kill the bacteria after which normal slow cooking or part-cooking can occur.

Temperature

Raw meat may contain bacteria, which can give you food poisoning. Adequate cooking can kill these bacteria. Temperature and time settings for cooking your turkey are dependent on your over.

The following are approximate cooking times for turkeys in an oven, which is at 180° C/35° /gas mark 4

Time

The time for cooking a turkey is dependent on its size and whether it is stuffed or unstuffed.

Stuffing the turkey?

The safest way to cook stuffing is outside the bird. If you prefer to cook it inside the bird the best way to do it is as follows:

- Prepare stuffing just before cooking
- Stuff the neck region of the bird
- Allow an extra 20 mins for cooking when the bird is stuffed

When the bird is fully cooked the juices should run clear, not pink. A helpful tip is to make sure the bird is cooked thoroughly, just pierce the thickest part of the drumstick and check the juices are clear in colour.

TURKEY PIE



Ingredients

- 1 lb/500g cooked turkey cut into chunks
- 80z/225g puff pastry
- 1 tin chicken soup
- 1 tin mushroom soup or natural yogurt
- Cup frozen peas
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 onions
- Salt and pepper
- Milk or beaten egg to glaze the pastry

Method

Mix the turkey, soup, natural yogurt, peas, lemon juice, onions, salt and pepper and turn into a casserole dish

Roll out the pastry to about half an inch thickness and cover the casserole

Glaze the pastry with milk or beaten egg Bake in the oven at 200° / 400° /gas mark 6 for 25 minutes

Ham Patties

Mix ground ham with an egg, breadcrumbs, a pinch of sage and pepper. Shape into patties and fry in butter. Serve hot in burger buns.

Christmas colcannon

Chop ham into small pieces and mix into creamed potatoes, cauliflower and leaks. Serve piping hot as a main dish with a little mustard.

Leftover tips

Turkey that is left over should be taken off the bone, cut into small pieces and placed in a shallow dish. Once refrigerated the food should be eaten within 3 days.





kissel (or kisses) is a fruit dessert with a souplike consistency. The word means sour, so tart berries such as cranberries or raspberries are best, but other fruits such as red or white currants, plums or rhubarb can also be used. This dish is delicious when served with pancakes or waffles and is sometimes used in savoury sauces in the same way you would use redcurrant jelly.

Preparation time: 15 minutes + Two hours refrigeration **Total cooking time:** 15 minutes

Serves 4

2 lemons 375 g/12 oz sugar 600 g (1¼ lb) cranberries (fresh or frozen) 2 teaspoons cornflour 1 teaspoons orange juice

Yogurt cream

250 ml/8fl oz cream 125 ml/4 fl oz natural yogurt 115 g/4 oz soft brown sugar


- 1. Remove the peel from the lemons in large strips with a vegetable peeler, avoid the white pith. Place the peel, sugar, cinnamon sticks and 375 ml/12 fl oz water into a saucepan and stir over low heat until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 5 minutes.
- 2. Rinse the cranberries (not necessary if frozen) and remove any stems. Add the cranberries to the hot syrup, return to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes, or until the skins have split. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool.
- 3. When cool, remove and discard the peel and cinnamon sticks. Remove about ½ cup of the berries and reserve. Blend or process the remaining mixture until smooth, return to the saucepan and add the reserved whole berries. Blend the cornflour and orange juice over medium heat for 5 minutes, or until the mixture boils and thickens. Serve cold or warm with yoghurt cream.
- 4. For the yogurt cream, beat the cream in a bowl until soft peaks form, then fold the yoghurt through. Transfer to a small bowl and sprinkle with the sugar. Refrigerate, covered, for 2 hours.



The Magic & Mystery of Christmas Plants

More than any of the evergreens, the mistletoe has inspired fascination throughout history, held in esteem for

its medicinal and magical properties. Many traditions and customs have arisen from the beliefs in the power of mistletoe,, but the kissing origins remain obscure. Druids used the plant as an aphrodisiac and in Scandinavian tales it symbolises peace and love. Until the arrival of Christmas trees, the kissing bough held centre stage at Christmas when a berry was placed with each kiss until none were left.

The tradition of holly decoration lies with the early pagans of Europe, who brought holly inside in the ovide fairies with a warm place to sleep.

winter to provide fairies with a warm place to sleep. The Romans sent holly branches with presents during the December festival of Saturnalia, believing the prickly leaves drove evil spirits away.

Ivy has been a popular decoration over the centuries and was once thought to possess powers of protection again house goblins that were at their most malicious in winter. The custom of decorating homes with ivy and evergreens dates back to pre-Christian times when they were associated with the power of eternity and represented life continuing through the winter.

Both in the time of the tree wise men and today, frankincense and myrrh are commonly used to create incense. You mix frankincense with things like spices, seeds and roots to create different aromas

Frankincense has long been valued for the sweet-smelling fumes it produces when burnt. Ancient Egyptians used the resin in religious rites, in anointing the mummified bodies of their kings, and to treat wounds and sores. Incense containing frankincense was found in Tutankhamen 's tomb. In the Christian faith, frankincense was one of the three gifts given to the infant Jesus by the Wise Men. It is still used in religious ceremonies by the Parsses, cultural descendants of the Wise Men.

Both in the time of the three wise men and today, frankincense and myrrh are commonly used to create incense. You mix frankincense with things like spices, seeds and roots to create different aromas. Traditionally you burn the powered incense in a censer or on a small stand.

Frankincense is the resin produced by various trees in the genus Boswellia. The trees grow in the dry areas of north-eastern Africa and southern Arabia. The resin is harvested by nomadic tribes, who visit the trees periodically. They make small cuts in the bark and return to collect the 'tears' of solidified whitish resin a few weeks later. Trees can yield several kilogrammes of resin each year.

resin. It oozes from damaged bark of certain trees in the genus *Commiphora*. The resin gums up the mouthparts of attacking inserts such as termites and its antibiotic properties protect the trees again infection through wounds in their bark. Ancient Egyptians used the resin to preserve mummies—its antibiotic quantities reduced decay, it helped to prevent the tissues falling apart, and it smelt sweet. Myrrh has been used from remote ages as an ingredient in incense, perfumes, etc., in the holy oil of the Jews and *Kyphi* of the Egyptians for embalming and fumigations.





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

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

of bus, train, or driving. I prefer the 40-minute commuter train service from Maynooth to Dublin. You can even buy a really good cup of coffee and your morning newspaper in the station. Maynooth is the terminus for most of the trains, so you have a better chance of getting a good seat. And there's even a table for your coffee. Oh, and a toilet and designated wheelchair spaces in some carriages too. Completely different to the sardine-like experience of the DART.

There is a good bus service too (the 66 and 67), which will bring you to Leixlip, Celbridge and Lucan on the way into the city. There's something quite nice about coasting along in the bus lane, past the bumper-to-bumper traffic. On the other hand, if you really must drive, at least you know the option of public transport is there, and who knows, with the growth in e-commerce and tele-commuting, you may be able to persuade your boss to let you work from home, because Maynooth is fully broadband compatible.

From ABC to PhD - Education in Maynooth

They say Maynooth is the only place in Ireland where you can start your education in a crèche singing ABC, and then grow up to receive a PhD, without ever leaving the town.

There are plenty of childminders, crèches, playschools and montessories for pre-schoolers in Maynooth; word of mouth is always the best recommendation, so ask other parents for their advice. There are three primary schools — one for boys, one for girls and a mixed Gaelscoil. Chatting, Relaxing and Making Friends

Economists say that you can tell a town is on an upward curve when you see loads of coffee shops appearing; they call it the 'cappuccino effect', and you can see it in operation in Maynooth. In recent years, nearly every pub in Maynooth has been refurbished, new chefs have been hired and there are dozens of places to eat out.

From takeaway to gourmet, you'll find something to suit your palate in Maynooth.

OK, so what's the catch?

Yeah, right, you say, it sounds lovely, but there must be a catch somewhere! Sadly, like everywhere in Ireland, the main problem everyone talks about in Maynooth is the traffic. So far, all parking in Maynooth is free, but there's very little of it, and most of it is taken up by commuters who, quite sensibly, park-nride. This really only leaves the supermarket car parks, which have strict time limits.

The road infrastructure in Maynooth seems to have been designed so that when it gets busy, everyone gets stuck behind vehicles trying to make a right-hand turn. The traffic lights at the Bank of Ireland and The Roost pub seem to be the worst. The Glenroyal junction has no lights so is the worst one for pedestrians, with poor visibility for traffic. It's a very wide junction, and perhaps a 'pedestrian refuge' would help — that's one of those raised areas with safety railings so pedestrians can cross half-way and then wait until it's safe to cross the other half.

With the explosion of housing development and new businesses in Maynooth in the last eighteen months, and it will be interesting to see if the infrastructure and services can keep up. Most of the schools in Maynooth are busy with extensions, and even the NUI has expanded. Luckily, so far Maynooth has not had to issue a warning to parents about a lack of school places, which is a real problem in Newbridge and Kill.

Maynooth - for a great quality of life

All the ads say 'Go West!' So if you're travelling from Dublin up the M4, keep an eye out for the Maynooth turnoff and see how you too can enjoy a great quality of life in the countryside of North Kildare.

Tips for Buying a Printer By Jane MacNulty

Before you Choose a Printer

Deciding what kind of printer you want to purchase—inkjet, laser, or multifunction—can be frustrating and confusing. Here are some basic questions you may be asking:

What kind of printer should I buy?

If you just need to print out documents such as letters, copies or Web pages from the Internet or simple spreadsheets, a low-end **inkjet printer** is fine. If you need to do presentations or high quality photographs you want a **photo printer**. If you print over 100 pages on a daily basis and don't need colour, you may want to look at **laser printers**. And, of course, if you need a combination of scanner, printer, copier, and fax, a **multifunction printer** is best.

What are All-in-One Printers?

An all-in-one printer (also know as a multifunction printer) combines the features of more than one device in one package. At its simplest, an all-in-one offers a printer (either an inkjet or laser printer) together with a scanner so that it can act as a printer, a scanner, and a copier. Many all-in-one devices also have the capability of sending and receiving faxes, which make them very useful for home offices and small business.

What costs come with all-in-ones?

An all-in-one uses the same supplies as ordinary printers: toner if it is a laser printer, ink if it is an inject printer. The only additional cost can be if there is a problem with the device: if, for example, the scanner needs to be repaired, you will also be deprived of your printer.

What are the advances of all-in-ones?

- Convenient
- Saves space

Disadvantages

 Repairs means you are deprived of both printer and scanner.

Why are printers so cheap these days?

A lot of the money that vendors make from printers are from selling ink and toner cartridges—which are called in the trade as "consumables". Because printer users must continually purchase more cartridges when the old ones run out, they can pay more than the original cost of the printer within a year or so.

Quick Tip: Watching Your Ink Disappear

Keep track of how often you have to replace the ink cartridge in your printer, and how much it costs. At the end of the year, add it all up. If the cost of buying ink at the end of one year is more than you paid for the printer in the first place, then you may want to think about replacing the printer!

When you're doing your pre-purchase research, pay attention to **ink consumption**. Some printer manufacturers will publish the approximate number of pages that an ink cartridge is expect to handle (under ideal conditions).

If you plant to do a lot of text printing, and little colour printing, make sure you have a separate black ink cartridge—black ink is usually considerably less expensive than colour.

Most printers have a **draft**, or **ink-saving**, mode, which produces text that is not appropriate for formal letters, but may be fine for everyday use. If you print a lot, this could extend your ink cartridge considerably. Look for draft mode in your printer (normally founder under Preferences in the Printer Dialogue Box) or check your manual.

Printer Paper

While you may be very careful while selecting correct inkjet or laser cartridges for your printer, you should not forget the printer paper. Inkjet and laser printers can print on a variety of surfaces, including labels, photo paper, business cards, stickers, and t-shirt transfers. However, most of your printing probably involves standard white papers. However, when it comes to this medium, you may have more options than you realise. One of the advantages of laser printers is their ability to print on almost any paper with quality. But if you own an inkjet printer, you should choose your paper carefully. Although standard printer paper will do the job well, your results will probably be better if you use paper specifically made for inkjet printers.

Tip: When buying paper to print photos be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding printer settings.

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This is one of the simplest and most delicious ways of cooking mushrooms. Serve this dish as the Swiss do with gherkins.

Serves 4

900g/2 lbs Small or new salad potatoes 50g/2 oz Butter 350g/12 oz Wild and cultivated mushrooms, thinly sliced 170g/6 oz Beaufort or Fontana cheese thinly sliced 50g/2 oz Walnuts toasted Salt & Ground Black Pepper Fresh parsley roughly chopped to garnish 12 gherkins, sliced, to serve

Bring a large pan of lightly salted water to the boil over a medium heat and cook the potatoes for 20 minutes until tender.

Drain well and return them to the pan, add a knob of butter and cover to keep warm.

Heat the remaining butter in a heavy based frying pan that can be safely used under the grill.

Add the sliced mushrooms and fry over a light heat, stirring occasionally until the juices begin to run, then increase the heat and fry until most of the juices have been absorbed again. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Meanwhile preheat the grill. Arrange the slices of cheese on top of the mushrooms. Place the pan under the grill and cook until the cheese is bubbly and brown.

Scatter the gratin with the toasted walnuts, garnish with parsley, and serve at once with the buttered potatoes and sliced gherkins.

Chestnut, Stilton and Ale Pie

This hearty winter dish has a rich stout gravy and a herb pastry top.

Serves 4

30 ml/ 2 tbsp Sunflower oil 2 Large onions chopped 500g/ 1 1/4 lbs Button mushrooms, halved 5ml/1 tsp Yeast extract 5ml/1 tsp Soft dark brown sugar 350g/12 ozs Drained canned chestnuts, halved 30ml/1 tbsp Cornflour, mixed to a paste with 30 ml/2 tbsp cold water

150g/5 ozs Stilton cheese, cubed, beaten egg, to glaze

Salt & Ground black pepper

For the Pastry

115g/4 ozs Wholemeal flour, a pinch of salt 50g/2 ozs Butter 15ml/1 tbsp chopped fresh thyme

Make the pastry, put the flour and salt in a bowl. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles fine bread crumbs. Add the thyme and enough water to form a soft dough. Knead it lightly, wrap and chill for 30 minutes.

Make the filling, heat the oil in a pan and fry the onions until softened. Add the mushrooms and cook for 3 minutes. Stir in the carrots, parsnip and herbs. Cover and cook for 3 minutes.

Pour in the stout and stock the stir in the yeast extract and sugar.

Simmer, cover, for 5 minutes. Add the chestnuts and season to taste. Stir in the cornflour paste until the sauce thickens. Stir in the cheese and heat until melted, stirring.

Pre heat the oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas 7. Spoon the chestnut mixture into a 1.5 litre/ 2 1/2 pint pie dish. Roll out the pastry to make a lid. Dampen the edge of the dish and cover with the pastry. Seal, trim and crimp the edges. Cut a small slit in the top and use any surplus pastry to make pastry leaves. Brush with egg and bake for 30 minutes.

Santa Claus: The Epsom Derby - 1964

Epsom Derby of 1964 will be //he remembered for a number of reasons. The uniquely named winner that brought a warm glow outside the seasonal context and the conflict of opinion that erupted after his win. It is not the intention to make a judgement on the merits or otherwise of the conflicting positions taken by the horse's connections, the jockey and expert opinion after the running of the 184th Epsom Derby. It can be argued that that the rating of 133 plus, given to

Santa Claus by Timeform at the end of the 1964 racing season did not do the horse justice. (Sea Bird, the 1965 winner was rated 145) It is true that Timeform could only go on what the horse actually achieved but there arguments to be made that had events taken a different course, Santa Claus may have ended up with a higher rating, thus bringing him up to the standard of Nijinsky, outstanding winner of the 1970 Derby.

they reached the bottom of the Oueens Stand steps, to replace Scobie, as jockey, for future races. It had all started so well In August 1963 Santa Claus made a pleasing introduction to his racing career as a two-year -old in

a decision was made by the Rogers family, before

the Anglesey Stakes at the Curragh. Although unplaced he ran with sufficient promise as did Scissors owned by Ann Biddle. Scissors was subsequently

> disqualified after winning the Gold Timeform Cup Doncaster in highly controversial circumstances. The trainer of Santa Claus, Michael Rogers, never in a hurry to rush his charges, waited until September for the National Stakes at the Curragh for the colts next run. Race favourite, Mesopotamia, started at 5-4 on. Owned by the McCalmont family, the filly had destroyed a top class field in the Chesham Stakes at Royal Ascot. The filly had also

Scobie Breasley entered the winner's enclosure at Epsom Downs on June 6th 1964 wearing a broad smile. Santa Claus had just won the Derby and Scobie

had ridden his first winner of the Blue Riband after a lifetime in racing. The smile was quickly wiped off his face. The reception he received from the winning connections of the horse was decidedly muted. Scobie recalls in his autobiography that the Rogers Family were not happy with the ride he had given the horse. Sir Peter O'Sullevan, the racing voice of the BBC and a race reader of great experienc went

further. In his autobiography "Calling The Horses" he recollects that Mick and Tim Rogers were seething with indignation" following the running of the race. Mick Rogers was highly respected as a trainer of two Epsom Derby winners and a number of top class horses including Royal Sword and Candy Cane, from his small stable on the Curragh. His brother, Captain Tim Rogers was the founder of the modern Irish Blood-Horse and a colossus in the Thoroughbred Industry. Both were highly respected for their sound judgement. History is not written in stone. There will always be differences of opinion as to what actually happened in a particular situation. What is clear is that won the Railway Stakes at the Curragh. Santa Claus with Willie Burke in the saddle, tracked the leading pair of Mesopotamia and Victoria Quay to the furlong pole and then showed a devastating turn of foot to

sweep by the leaders to win by eight lengths. It was a staggering performance by the Colt and he was immediately installed as winter favourite for the Derby. Willie Burke was not a pretentious man, more often than not he chose to be identified as a stable lad rather than a stable jockey as he enjoyed few rides from outside the stable of Mick Rogers.

It was apparent from his win in the National Stakes that Santa Claus had shown a nice blend of speed and stamina. He was bred by the 1945 St. Leger winner, Chamossaire, with the dam, Aunt Clara who came from the same family as Sun Chariot, who won three Classic Races in 1942. Chamossaire also bred two Irish Derby winners in Chamier and Your Highness.

Santa Claus was jointly owned by Mrs.Darby Rogers and Mr John Ismay and had been purchased by the BBA Ireland for 1200 Guineas at the Newmarket September Sales.

Santa Claus wintered well but he did not appear in public until the Irish 2000 Guineas in May of 1964. His presence proved an enormous attraction and the enclosures at the Curragh were packed. He did not let his fans down. Again, showing a blinding turn of speed in the final furlong, he powered away, with Willie Burke in the saddle, to beat the English trained Young Christopher by three lengths. Santa Claus was now a serious racehorse and his next assignment

was the Epsom Derby. This was going to be his most difficult task yet. First, the Colt had never raced outside the Curragh. This course is probably one of the best and most fairest test for a race horse in these Islands and also a course that suited Santa Claus's physical confirmation. Second, the going at the Curragh is never firmer than good and the track has a policy of watering to

take the sting out of the ground. Epsom on the other hand tends to be good to firm in the first weeks of June and the gradients and turns on the one mile four furlongs course makes it exceedingly difficult to The decision to book Scobie Breasley was a good one. A champion jockey in his native Australia, he was a worthy foe to Lester Piggott in their many Jockey Championship battles during the sixties. Unlike Lester, he sat quiet in the saddle, used the whip sparingly and always done just enough to win a race. A trainer entrusting his horse to Scobie always got his horse back with the minimum of use made of him and plenty to work on for his next race. Scobie in accepting the mount on Santa Claus knew exactly

what was required to get the best out of the Colt and also what was required to get him home in front with minimum wear on those suspect joints. This was never going to be a Curragh repeat but the "iceman" as Scobie was known, was confident that he would deliver the Blue Riband to Mick Rogers.

Although Derby Day (Wednesday June 3rd 1964) was warm and bright, the going was unusually soft, thus providing an optimistic omen for Santa Claus,

who started at 15-8 favourite. Second favourite was Howard de Walden's, Oncidium, winner of the Lingfield Derby Trial. There was also plenty of money for English the 2000 Guineas winner, Baldric II. The seventeen runners went off to a first-time start. Oncidium gave his backers cause for concern as he fought his head disputed the lead with Balustrade and Hotroy. Baldric and Indiana tracked the leaders with Scobie and Santa Claus last

time to balance himself. He let the race develop on the far rails. Oncidium had shot his bolt leaving Baldric, the 2000 Guineas winner to strike for home. He was quickly overtaken, however, by Indiana, ridden by Jimmy Lindley

The Colt by Sayajirao was being called the winner with two furlongs to go. The "iceman" had it measured , however, and Santa Claus having made steady progress up the centre of the course delivered a challenge in the last seventy yards to win by a length.

Paddy Prendergast, one of Ireland's great trainers, described Scobie's challenge as one of the best rides ever given to a horse in the Epsom Derby. His opinion must be respected. So also must be the opinion of Sir Peter O'Sullevan who, admittedly a fan of the great Australian, described it as a "master class."

However, the connections of Santa Claus did not agree. Scobie was fired, not given a present (which was traditional) and never rode the horse again. Can there have ever been such conflict of expert opinion?

Willie Burke was reunited with his beloved Santa Claus for his next run. Willie appearing on the race course for only the sixth time that season took the mount for the 1964 running of the Irish Sweeps Derby at the Curragh. The enclosures were packed and Willie did not let the fans down. He gave Santa Clause a professional and confident ride, waiting until the final furlong before sweeping away the opposition to win by four lenghs. Lionhearted finished second with Sunseeker third. The reaction of the Irish racing public to Santa Claus was estatic and equaled the adulation shown to the new hero of the national hunt, Arkle.

Santa Claus was then entered for the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth stakes at Ascot. The connections decided to stay with Willie as the jockey. This was a mistake. It was one of the smallest King George field in history and tactics were going to play a big part. Facing Willie were the best two jockeys in the world. Lester Piggott (Royal Avenue) , the Australian, Bill Pryers (Nasram II) and the field was completed by M. Depalmas (Prima Donna II) It could only be described as "throwing Christians to the lions" To make matters worst Scobie Breasley was bitter about being jocked off. He freely admits taking a phone call from Bill Pryers, a good friend, and advising him as to how best to beat Santa Claus Scobie may have felt no sense of loyalty to the Rogers family. It is hard to understand, however, why he planned the downfall of a wonderful horse that had given him his first win in the Epsom Derby when he was fifty years old and a grandfather. Scobie told Bill Pryers that the firm going would be

Santa Claus's undoing. With suspect joints Scobie knew that the horse would not let his legs down on the rough, rock hard ground. He told Pryers to set a fast pace from the front and not give Burke a chance to balance his mount. That's the way the race developed. Nasram II led from start to finish, Willie

did not know who to follow and Santa Claus was never balanced during the race. He finished a poor second at odds of 13 to 2 on. Let there be no criticism of Willie Burke. He made the horse, working on the home gallops he built his mount's confidence and produced him, well schooled, to win three Classic races. He should never have been asked to take on that most difficult task at Ascot.

Santa Claus appeared for the last time on the race course at Longchamp for the 1964 running of the Arc. Ridden by Jimmy Lindley he finished second to Prince

Royal II. In his autobiography a clearly embittered Scobie stated that Santa Claus would never have been

Scobie Breasley,

beaten had he retained the ride. On his racing record as a jockey, he clearly has the right to say that. On the other hand the Rogers dispensed with his services after Epsom. The matter will continue to be discussed wherever racing men meet.

Santa Claus retired to stud and in a brief career sired Santa Tina to win the Irish Oaks, Reindeer (Irish St. Leger) and Bonne Noel to win the Ebor. He died in 1970. There can be no better epitaph for this wonderful horse than that provided by Guy Williams in his History of the Irish Derby when he wrote in conclusion "The Curragh comet, a brief but brilliant blaze, was gone but not forgotten.

Local Authorities Beir	g Priced Out Of Housing	Market Due to Failure	of Government Policy
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Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind), in a Dáil statement last night, slated the current Government's Social and Affordable Housing policy warning that prices are being paid in both "human terms" and economic terms.

Kildare "has seen a couple of dozen units, at the very most, covering both affordable and social housing."

Local Authorities are themselves priced out of the housing market. In many cases they simply can't afford to buy the full 20% they are entitled to in each development as, although a below market value price is negotiated with developers rising costs such as increased land purchase prices are driving even non-market prices upwards. Social and Affordable Housing Schemes introduced to assist people who themselves are unable to buy privately, cannot operate to their full capacity because of rising house prices. The irony here is clear.

"I can see nothing but apartments being offered on social and affordable housing."

As two bedroom housing units, and specifically apartments, are less costly than larger units we are seeing a disproportionate number coming on stream. For many families two bedroom units and apartments are only temporary measures and so there are thousands of families whose needs cannot be met by Part V in its current form.


The system is failing the most vulnerable

Last year a 22 page assessment form was sent to all Social Housing Applicants which, if not completed and returned, would cause them to be removed from the waiting list. "In Kildare, 1,500 families or individuals are on the waiting list. That understates the case, as every week I come across people who have been scratched off the list because they did not complete the assessment last year. A 22-page assessment is pretty daunting for some individuals, and it is part of the reason people have gone off the list." The most vulnerable people are those who

will loose out in a system like this, and changes must be made.

€10 Million underspend in Disabled Persons Grants must be addressed

Figures from the Department of the Environment provided to Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) show that almost €10 million of the €74.5 million allocated to the Disabled Persons & Essential Repairs Grants went These Grant Schemes aim at unspent in 2005. prolonging the length of time that disabled or older persons can live in their owns homes by either fully or partially funding home modifications, such as the installation of ramps, chair lifts, and modified bathroom facilities. However Murphy contends that the way the system is run results in Local Authorities being unable to spend the full amount budgeted by the Department of the Environment, leaving many applicants either denied funding or awaiting allocations for long periods of time. "At a time when there is such huge pressure on healthcare facilities we need to be facilitating independent living for disabled and older people for as long as possible" stated Murphy.

How the Schemes Work

"The Disabled Persons and Essential Repairs Grants are part-funded by Local Authorities and part-funded by the Department of the Environment. The amount of applications which can be met is ultimately down to how much money Local Authorities have available to spend because they are only entitled to draw down the monies if they can provide a third of the total required. For example, if the Department of the Environment allocate €3 million to a Local Authority for the Scheme however the Local Authority has only €500,000 in its budget for the Scheme it can only draw down a maximum of €1 million from the Department leaving €2 million unspent. This is obviously a flawed system in that applicants whose Local Authorities have very little funding available are unable to avail of the Grants whereas people with the same level of need living in a different Local Authority Area encounter no such problem."

Murphy went on to highlight that even in instances whereby Local Authorities sought more funding than was originally allocated to them there is an indication that the monies made available to them by the Department of the Environment is not sufficient to meet the need that exists. She has therefore called for the funding of these schemes to be met entirely by the Department of the Environment to ensure that where an applicant lives does not have a bearing on their ability to avail of the scheme. "This scheme must be changed so that applications are assessed on a

needs basis not a geographic basis."

"Dangerous Parking" - New Commuter Phenomenon Needs Urgent Action.

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) has today urged Kildare County Council to take urgent action towards tackling the widespread problem of "dangerous parking" in areas surrounding train stations. Her calls for action came in reaction to continuous complaints to her offices of commuters effectively abandoning their cars in housing estates adjacent to train stations due to the significant under provision of parking facilities within the stations. This emerging driver's behaviour was also confirmed by a Garda Official who stated in relation to one housing estate in particular, "the local Gardai have been called and have issued tickets for dangerous parking, obstruction, parking on the footpath and green areas, which is provided for in the General Bye-Laws under the Road Traffic Act 1961 as amended."

Murphy has highlighted that there must be a two pronged approach to this problem which is causing significant disruption to residents and commuters alike whose ideal solution would be the provision of adequate parking and feeder bus facilities to and from each Train Station.

"People are parking in this way because they have no choice. They simply don't have anywhere else to put their cars if they want to use the train, which is a ridiculous situation when you consider that we're trying to encourage the use of public transport. Equally though, residents are being obstructed in getting in and out of their homes, and there's a public safety issue with regard to access routes for emergency vehicles and site lines. We need an immediate solution to this which will satisfy both train users and residents living adjacent to train stations."

Murphy concluded in highlighting that the insertion of double yellow lines at certain points within the affected estates may act as a deterrent for those attempting to park within them, however the most important solution was to increase train station parking facilities, and more importantly provide feeder services which would eliminate the need for this type of private car use.

Nursing Homes Becoming Hospital Overflow rather than Retirement Homes

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) yesterday made the following statement in the Dáil concerning the

worrying trend of Nursing Homes becoming more like overflow wards for acute hospitals than retirement communities wherein the elderly can live in a secure environment that also offers the quality of life and social facilities they need to live out their days in a dignified and fulfilling manner.

"Last Friday, I attended the opening of a well designed modern nursing home in my constituency. It is one of a number of new facilities that have been developed recently and more are planned. This is evidence of the growing need to make provision for our elderly. It is a major step for frail people or elderly couples to leave their homes, move away from the neighbourhoods with which they are familiar and move into nursing homes. However, I fear many of them are moving into an environment that more closely resembles a hospital than a nursing or retirement home. I have noticed a fundamental change in nursing homes due to the shortage of hospital beds. The ratio of high dependency patients is growing continually. I do not refer to people with conditions such as dementia, but to people who are attached to drips and who undergo ongoing acute treatment of the kind one would expect to see in a hospital. Higher proportions of people with acute illnesses affect the social environment and create a higher risk of infection.

"Terms such as step-down facilities have negative consequences. While medical consequences must be anticipated and responded to, social consequences are as important if elderly people are to enter retirement homes to live out their lives. This implies good levels of activity and social interaction, which become difficult with disproportionate numbers of people who are very ill."

"A patient safety authority in my opinion is needed. I have heard words such as "robust" used in respect of the so-called new arrangements. Unless new arrangements are backed by defined standards, the availability of adequate resources and accountability when failures occur, cases such as Leas Cross will continue to arise. There must be a separate agency to police standards."

Rapid Population Increase to be factor in deploying Gardai and New Civilian Staff

Minister for Justice, Mr. Michael McDowell today in the Dáil informed Catherine Murphy, TD that the Garda Commissioner will be considering her constituency of North Kildare for the deployment of additional resources due to the significant increase in population experienced in recent years. Minister McDowell stated "The Commissioner is obliged when deploying gardaí across the country to make the maximum use of those members. Population growth in the Deputy's constituency has been considerable in recent times and therefore the Commissioner is paying particular attention to such areas. It is in such areas that the proportion of gardaí to residents has declined most." Murphy later welcomed the fact that the Minister officially acknowledged the significant problems being caused in her constituency due to the under resourcing of the Gardaí and indicated that she will continue to pursue the deployment of additional Garda resources to Kildare.

The Minister's response directly precedes the release of two reports commissioned by the Garda Inspectorate, headed up by former Boston Police Chief Kathleen O'Toole and policing expert Senator Maurice Hayes, in which the increased civilianisation of certain functions within the force is recommended. "It's vitally important that the Gardaí we have are deployed and employed in the most effective manner possible, I've always said that the civilianisation of certain roles within the force would help to return many of our Gardaí to non-desk based duties and increase the effectiveness of the force in general, and so I'd be encouraging the Minister to take this stance on the development of the force so that communities in rapidly growing areas like North Kildare get the level of service they need." - Murphy

Murphy Slams Failure of Minister to Compile List of Rogue Developers

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) has today harshly criticized the stance of Minister for the Environment, Mr Dick Roche TD, on how rogue developers are to be prevented from developing in the future. She has continually called for the creation of a central database of developers who fail to comply with planning regulations or fail to complete developments to the standard agreed, however was extremely critical of Minister for the Environment's response to her latest call for this facility, which read:

"Each planning authority has primary

responsibility for dealing with applications for permission and planning enforcement within its own area. The section [9 of the Planning & Development (Strategic Infrastructure) Act, 2006] therefore does not enable a planning authority to rely on information supplied by others, or from a centrally maintained list, when deciding whether to grant or refuse permission in any particular case." (Question 26, 8th November 2006, Ref 36442/06)

"This", Murphy highlighted "shows that while the new Act gives Local Authorities the power to refuse planning permissions on the grounds of past developments, it does not extend beyond individual council area's, therefore it doesn't give them the tools or the information to carry out this function. Yet another instance of legislation not being backed up by practical resource allocation."

The North Kildare TD concluded in stating that as a result of a failure to establish a centrally maintained database of rogue developers, each Local Authority is left to operate on its own in such matters in total ignorance of a developer's history in another administrative area. "Developers will literally be able to jump from one Local Authority area to another leaving behind them a trail of noncompliant developments, which is utterly ridiculous. It's very easy to set up a database that Local Authorities could check for development history so I simply cannot accept the Minister's stance on this."

Minister Pledges to take action on Aerodrome Security "within the week"

Minister Michael McDowell has, in the Dáil, pledged to "within the week" commence an audit on the action taken to bring about a more co-operative approach to policing and customs checking at small airfields around the country, like Weston Aerodrome in Lucan, Co Dublin. His statement came in response to calls from Independent Deputies Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind), and Tony Gregory, TD (Ind) for a more proactive approach to the monitoring of small airfields in light of the massive drugs haul earlier in the year of €10m in heroin destined for Weston at a Belgium airfield. Murphy highlighted the fact that Weston advertises its lack of security on its website stating that it indicates that incoming passengers go from "touchdown to taxi in 5 minutes".

Minister McDowell stated:

"Deputy Catherine Murphy is absolutely right about aerodromes. Responsibility to regulate aerodromes


falls between different Departments. They are licensed by the Minister for Transport, Deputy Cullen's Department and the provision of customs and excise is the responsibility of the Minister for Finance, Deputy Cowen's Department, while my Department is responsible for the policing aspect. The fact that three major Departments are involved in that particular activity does not mean that there is not a very strong case for clear co-ordination of activity. I do not dispute Deputy Murphy's assertion. If private aerodromes are not being adequately policed - I use the term to mean inspections, customs arrangements and the monitoring of who is using what aircraft and for what purpose - that must be addressed, but I do not wish to close them down because they are a very useful facility. They are part of the world we live in but they cannot be an open porthole for people to access Ireland without any adequate safeguards ... I will take up the points made by the Deputies on that matter. Within the week, I will commence a process within my Department to audit the actions being taken ... As Deputy Catherine Murphy said, the public are entitled to reassurance. What appears to be lax procedure must be examined carefully." (www.oir.ie - Dáil Debates, 16th November 2006, Europol (Amendment) Bill, 2006)

Murphy later referred to the commitments made by the Minister as "very positive", and "hopefully an indication that the security issues surrounding Weston will be improved." She concluded in cautioning that she would await the outcome of the Minister's investigations and an announcement of the action he will take to tackle the security shortfall at small airfields before easing the pressure she has been putting on Government Departments since her election on this issue.



Bond Bridge

Cllr. John McGinley was advised by the Project Engineer on 13^{th} November that the scheduled date for the opening of Bond Bridge is the 15^{th} December. Final surfacing of the bridge was due to take place during week ending the 19^{th} November.

Cllr. McGinley has asked that the Meadowbrook Lawns cul de sac be surfaced at the same time in the interest of efficiency.

Silken Vale/The Arches----Bond Bridge

At the request of Cllr. John McGinley representatives from Kildare County Council met with representatives from the Residents' Association to agree on the tree planting between Silken Vale/The Arches and Bond Bridge. As a result of John's motion it has been agreed that an access gate is not required from Bond Bridge to the estate.

Removal of "The Bandstand" from Pound Park

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following progress report on his endeavours to have the "bandstand" removed from Pound Park.

"The University Authorities are prepared to carry out the foundation and ground works at the campus if the Council are prepared to cover the cost of the relocation of the structure.

The price of relocation is estimated to be \leq 25,000 - \leq 30,000. The Planning Authority are arranging to have this figure factored into the budget for 2007."

Cllr. McGinley welcomed this good news and asked that full re-instatement of the Park be carried out when it is removed.

Wall at Pound Park:

Cllr. McGinley was also given the following good news on the re-construction of the wall next to the Band Hall at Pound Park:

"It is estimated the cost of carrying out these works is €2,500 approx. The Planning Authority are arranging to have this figure factored into the budget for 2007"

John has asked for details of the work to be carried out.

New Public Lighting for The Harbour, Maynooth

Members of the public will be aware of Cllr. John McGinley's ongoing campaign for proper public lighting to be installed from Straffan Road to The Harbour Area and from The Harbour to the Pedestrian Bridge. John was given the following progress report at the October Area Meeting:

"The Council is committed to the installation of these lights at an early date. A meeting has been arranged with Waterways Ireland to agree the type of lamp-standard. It is hoped that works can commence within approximately four weeks."

Ring Road from Blacklion to the Celbridge Road, Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley was given the following "progress report" on the provision of this essential ring road for Maynooth:

"This is also an objective of the current Development Plan. It is, however, likely to be expensive particularly in view of the fact that it traverses both the canal and the railway. The members will recall that an allocation for constructing the Maynooth ring roads was included in the 2006-2008 capital programme. Certainly, the possibility of advancing this route to preliminary design stage could be considered. It is, however, considered expedient to await the publication of the IFPLUTS study before making this decision. The members will be kept informed of progress."

Cllr. John McGinley stated that the reply was nonsense as this ring road is an objective of the 2002 Maynooth Development Plan and that the IFPLUTS study should have no bearing on it. Anyway the IFPLUTS study is three years overdue. He proposed that the ring road be advanced to preliminary design stage and this was agreed.

Provision of a Footpath and Public Lighting from the Nursing Home to Moyglare Hall;

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion on the above:

"This matter has been examined on a preliminary basis by the Area Engineer. The cost involved will be in the region of €85,000 and there is no budget currently available. The matter should, however, be forwarded to the Planning Section (02/2491) in order that the planning conditions of the Moyglare Hall development can be examined."

Needless to say Cllr. McGinley rejected the reply and he stated that there was funding for this work as Development Levies of €2,670,575 were a condition of planning for the provision of services that facilitate the development. John also stated that it would expedite matters if the developer of Moyglare Hall was asked to provide the footpath and public lighting infrastructure.

CCTV Camera at the Recycling Centre at the Car Park in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised that the camera is now in operation and checked on a regular basis. John has asked for a regular update on the fines issued.

Bollards opposite Boy's School, Moyglare

As requested by the Parents Association of the Boy's School Cllr. John McGinley has asked for decorative bollards to be erected on the footpath in the interests of public safety. He was advised "that this will be considered as part of the 2007 budgetary provision."

Cllr. John McGinley has made the following submission for Kildare County Council's 2007 Budget:

- 1. The Council must stay in the waste collection business and maintain the existing waiver system for those on Welfare.
- 2. Maynooth is the only Town in Ireland with a University. There are 6,500 students attending NUIM. Such a population of young people warrants seven day street cleaning. Indeed there should be seven day street cleaning in all of our major towns.
- 3. As I have stated at Budget meetings for the past 10 years Litter Management should not be under the control of the Local Roads Engineer. It needs to be given a separate management structure in order to be given the attention in deserves.
- 4. There should be an allocation for the resurfacing of the roads in housing estates greater than 20 years old.
- 5. There should also be greater funding for the maintenance of footpaths in housing estates greater than 20 years old
- 6. Funding must be allocated for the provision of 30kmph speed limits at all schools in the county
- 7. There needs to be significantly increased funding for traffic calming throughout the county.
- 8. There should be an allocation for the landscaping and maintenance of the public areas in Council housing estates in order to assist the residents and in order to protect the value of our investment.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the November Meeting of the Council:

" That this Council calls on the Government to introduce a national waiver scheme for domestic waste charges for those on social welfare and a subsidy for low income households, with grants given

to local authorities for it's operation, in line with the recommendations of the Combat Poverty Agency and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul."

STAGG LODGES OBJECTION TO 4 & 3 STOREY PROPOSALS FOR FORMER PITCH AND PUTT COURSE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged an objection to the proposal by Garland homes to develop 98 dwellings in three 4 storey blocks of apartments and three 3 storey blocks of duplex units on the former Pitch and Putt Course on the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg stated that this is the third such application on this site, the 2 previous applications having been turned down by An Bord Pleanala for different reasons, and he stated that the present proposal remained unacceptable;

Outlining his reasons for objecting to the proposal Deputy Stagg stated the following:

The proposal ignores the unique nature and character of development in this Historic Town Area of Maynooth. If the present proposal was allowed to proceed it would irreparably damage Maynooth Village's unique architectural heritage.

2 of the 3 Storey Duplex Units will block a view of the Lyreen River from Leinster Cottages, a view which has been in existence for 200 years.

The 3 Storey Duplex Units and 4 Storey Apartment blocks will over look rear gardens in Leinster Cottages and the Dunboyne Road.

The proposed 4 Storey Apartment Blocks are monotonous and are Cityscape in Design and Style and are most unsuitable for the Centre of Historic Maynooth Village.

The Density of the proposal at 20 units to the acre is excessive when compared with other developments in the area which consist of densities of 6 units to the acre and single dwellings on their own individual sites.

The excessive height of the proposals will impact on the views from Pound Park.

The proposed 3 Storey Duplex Unit fronting the Dunboyne Road is out of character with existing development along the Dunboyne Road and would be an unacceptable low quality development at the entrance to Maynooth.

The overprovision of 2 bedroomed units in the proposal (90 out of 98 units) does not comply with the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 which requires a variation in house types in new developments.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the Council should reject this unacceptable development in the interests of the existing residents of the area and in the interest of preserving the unique character of the area.

STAGG'S CAMPAIGN FORCES ADDITIONAL OPTICAL CLINIC'S IN MAYNOOTH AND NAAS HEALTH CENTRES

The Campaign by Deputy Emmet Stagg to force the Health Services Executive to eliminate the inordinate Waiting Times for Eye Tests for Children at Maynooth and Naas Health Centres has borne fruit with the decision by the HSE to commence additional Optical Clinics for children at both Health Centres from November.

In the past 10 months Deputy Stagg has publicly highlighted the fact that there was a 12 month waiting list at Naas Health Centre and an 11 month waiting list at Maynooth Health Centre for children requiring Eye Tests whilst the waiting time at Newbridge was only 3 months. The HSE advised Deputy Stagg on October 19th that extra child optical clinics will commence in November with a view to addressing and eliminating the waiting lists at both Health Centres.

Commenting on the position Deputy Stagg stated that in this rich country of ours we should never have a situation whereby children are left waiting for tests and treatment. Obviously the Minister for Health and the Government took their eye off the ball on this one and he stated that he was pleased that action was now underway to eliminate the waiting times.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would monitor the impact the additional optical clinics were having to ensure that they had they desired effect on waiting times.

130 ELDERLY PEOPLE ON WAITING LIST FOR ADMISSION TO PUBLIC NURSING HOME BEDS IN KILDARE

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Tanaiste and Minister for Health in relation to the number of elderly people in Co. Kildare who were awaiting admission to a long term care bed in State nursing homes in the County.

The Health Services Executive responded to Deputy Stagg and indicated that there were 130 elderly people

awaiting such places in the County. The total number of beds in State Nursing Homes in the Kildare Area including Peamount and Baltinglass stands at 349, which are all full. Therefore, Deputy Stagg, stated that there remains an under-provision of 37%, which is likely to worsen as we head into the Winter months.

Deputy Stagg stated that this under-provision causes real hardship for elderly people and their families in a number of ways:

- Elderly people, living alone at home, who are incapable of independent living within the community are struggling to keep going with the support of relatives, friends and neighbours.
- In cases where there are two elderly people at home, one of whom requires long term care, the other elderly person has to struggle to act as a nurse and a carer.
- In many instances adult children are expected to take in their parents, give up their jobs and provide 24 hour care, without any backup, training or compensation.
- Finally, many elderly people are in acute beds in hospital awaiting a placement. Deputy Stagg stated that this treatment of our elderly people, in their twilight years and having paid their taxes all their lives, shows how uncaring this Government is. It's a shocking indictment of this Government and with all the money they have they refuse to build additional Units such as the one in Maynooth, to ease the suffering of elderly people. The Maynooth Unit was built at a cost of €5.4 Million and it costs €2.2 Million a year to run. If similar units were built in Celbridge, Leixlip and Naas at a cost of only €16 Million there would be adequate beds in the system to deal with the numbers requiring long term care. However Deputy Stagg stated that the Government won't fund any additional State Nursing homes pending the carrying out of an assessment of the long term care needs of elderly people. A cop out which leaves our elderly people at the mercy of Private Profit Making Nursing homes.

A National Economic and Social Forum report released in 2005 found that Government Spending on care for the elderly is running at only half the E.U. average and to bring Ireland up to the O.E.C.D. average would entail additional expenditure of €500 Million per year on care services for elderly people.

What are the Government doing instead, stated Deputy Stagg, they are putting on a legislative basis, a provision whereby elderly people with homes in excess of €300,000 in value will have to sell their homes to fund long term care. This Bill presently before the Oireachtas will be opposed by Deputy Stagg and his Labour colleagues.

OUTLANDISH PROPOSAL FOR STRAFFAN ROAD REQUIRES HEIGHT REDUCTIONS AND DESIGN CHANGES

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have lodged an objection to the proposal for 122 dwelling units in 1 substantial 4 Storey Block of Apartments and six 3 Storey Blocks of Townhouses and Duplex Units on lands at the Gateway Entrance to Maynooth along the Straffan Road, bordering Straffan Wood Estate and opposite the Esso Station and Lidl.

Deputy Stagg described the 4 Storey Apartment Block, which fronts the Meadowbrook Link and the Straffan Road in an L shape as one of the worst designs he has seen resembling something from Eastern Europe, which would be a stark soul-less building with a flat roof. In his objection he pointed out that it was critical that an appropriately designed building should be built at the entrance to Maynooth, a Town rich in Architectural Heritage. The present proposal does not comply with Housing and Residential Objectives as outlined in the Maynooth Development Plan 2002.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley also made the following points in relation to the overall proposal:

- Taking the proposal as a whole, the 7 Blocks will be a mass of concrete buildings which will be visually obtrusive to people living in the area or walking or driving in the area.
- The bulk of development along the Straffan Road at present is set back from the road giving a soft entrance to the town. The 4 Storey Apartment Block will introduce an inappropriate streetscape along the Straffan Road.
- A number of the 3 storey Townhouses/duplex units back onto 2 storey houses in Straffan Wood and this will cause overlooking and a loss of privacy The density of the proposal at 23 units to the acre is excessive when compared with existing developments in the area.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the project is so bad it is incumbent on the Council to reject it outright or to issue a strong request for further information directing the applicant to modify his proposal seriously in relation to the Design and the Building Heights and in particular to put a roof on the building to the front in any revised proposal.

STAGG LODGES FURTHER OBJECTION TO RESTAURANT/WINE BAR IN RESIDENTIAL AREA

Deputy Emmet Stagg has lodged an objection, along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley, to a further

proposal for a Restaurant and Wine Bar at 1 Pound Lane, Maynooth.

The proposal stated Deputy Stagg is similar to a previous application lodged in April, 2005 which was subsequently deemed withdrawn by Kildare Co. Council because of a failure to respond to a request for further information on the proposal.

This new application stated Deputy Stagg does nothing to address the concerns of residents living in this residential area of old Maynooth and he indicated the following objections to the proposal:

- The proposal would have an adverse effect on residential amenity by introducing a commercial enterprise to one of the last residential enclaves off Main Street, Maynooth.
- The proposal would cause an odour and noise nuisance for residents of the area.
- The proposal would lead to disturbance in the area particularly at night.
- The proposal would increase traffic and parking problems in the area.
- The proposal would have a negative effect on the quality of life of the existing residents of Pound Lane.

Deputy Stagg also pointed out to the Council that a similar proposal for a restaurant on Main Street, Maynooth, was turned down in April 2005 by An Bord Pleanala, because of the negative impact it would have on nearby residents, and he indicated that this proposal should be viewed similarly.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that it was regrettable that developers were trying to encroach on residential areas of Maynooth Village Centre and he looked forward to Kildare Co. Council refusing planning permission for the proposal.

TONY SMITH MEMORIAL WALK 2006 RAISES €7,610

The Tony Smith Memorial Walk 2006 was held on Sunday 15^{th} October and raised a Record sum of \in 7,610.

The **December** meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on 11th of December in the Glenroyal Hotel.

There were two co-options to the Council Tommy Geoghegan and Eithne Bean representing Lyreen Residents Association.

Lights at Bank of Ireland

The pedestrian section of these lights were to be turned off, this was to see what difference if any this would have on traffic flow. However this has not happened yet.

Bond Bridge is expected to open on 15th of December 06, however this also has not happened yet.

Geraldine Hall----New Community Centre

A presentation was made to the area councillors in the Kildare County Council offices in November. A detailed plan was presented to the councillors by Peter Connell and Terry Nealon both expressing the urgency and need for such a complex in Maynooth. The delegation included Brid Feeley, Chairperson, Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin, Secretary, Marie Gleeson Pro. The plan will include a Theatre with all facilities, meeting rooms and Community Centre. The next step now will be to produce a feasibility study, this will show how the project will be run and managed. This is a wonderful project for Maynooth, and we fully expect this project to go ahead.

Harbour Field

The Action Area Plan for the Harbour Field has being fully discussed and it is now time for a plan to be put in place. What is proposed for this area is playing fields for Soccer and Gaelic which would also include an all-weather play area. Harbour Field-Maynooth Action Area Plan

At this stage Maynooth Community Council are putting together their plans for the Harbour Field. As this is a project for the whole community, people are invited to submit other proposals. Tom McMullon commented that people in the community should have an input into this including the GAA and Soccer etc. Letters including plans are to be sent to all Residents Associations welcoming comments. It is worth noting that with all the development planed for this area, development levies will fund this. There is also to be under ground car parking which won't be covered by levies. The plan will also include playing pitches for GAA and Soccer etc. indoor sport all weather facility. The new Scouts Hall will be located here also. There now seems to be shift towards including a Skate Board Park, while it has been pointed out a lot of thought will need to go into this because of its permanent structure, it was also pointed out by Cyril McAree that children should be involved in this as they are the ones that will be using it. Cllr Senan Griffin said things should be moved on quickly, he noted parking will be under ground, he also pointed out that Iarnrod Eirean will have to provide something here for their customers. Sean Cushen said the possibility of a running track should be looked at and it was pointed out that the frame work for a track is all ready there. The fact that the new Post Primary School will soon be finished and will include a full gym, basketball and many other facilities its important that we don't duplicate. Cllr John McGinley said re-His Draft Proposals would also include a landscape plan that will contain detail planning to include,

Pedestrian and cycle access, new street furniture and new planting.

Landscaping of land between the field and the Straffan Road.

This is a wonderful project for Maynooth and with the Maynooth Harbour Action Plan it gives you the people of Maynooth the chance to have your say.

Saint Patrick's Day Parade

John McGinley said getting bands is proving difficult; it costs in the region of one thousand euro to sponsor a band. He paid tribute to our own local Brass and Reed band that plays every year. Looking for suggestions and hoping for the same success again this year.

Tidy Towns

Paul Croghan said they are setting out their plan for 07 also looking for more helpers to come on board, he

noted that they don't have anything like the members that Celbridge and Leixlip have but have a strong group of people that work very well. Sean said this year they are having an "Open Day" to meet people and to show what their plans are for this year. Sean also said that the baskets will be getting a tidy-up by the end of the month.

Local Matters

Safety Issues

Tom McMullon raised the point re no lighting in the Harbour Area. John McGinley said that €35,000 is available for this.

Des Matthews also noted the bridge over the canal is highly dangerous with wooden steps broken, Des also drew attention to the fact that five lights over the railway bridge are not working. He said lights here are often broken. Des also raised his worrying concerns regarding the height and width of the new walls on Bond Bridge; he said they are very high and dangerous for kids. He also raised the point of our 15 month wait rather then the original 7 month plan for completion of Bond Bridge.

Moyglare Abbey Residence Association

John O'Connor said that speeding is taking place on the Moyglare Road and asked that we write to KCC re—Traffic calming here. John also said that speeding is taking place on the back lanes of the town, he suggested ramps be put in here.

Carton Court Residence Association

Frank O'Shea said that a sub-station near the entrance to the estate is causing problems by blocking views here. They have wrote to both the E.S. B. and K.C.C. each blaming the other and that it would cost the residents 100,000 euro to pay for it. Frank still wants to know who is responsible. It was felt that K.C.C. own the lights and the E.S. B. maintenance. It was also said that several lights are out in the estate. This will be included in a letter to K. C. C.

Cluain Aoibhann Residents Association

Tom McMullon said that there is a very dangerous tree at the entrance to the estate, he said they wrote to K. C. C. with no response, to be included with points on safety to K. C. C.

Know your rights

Question

I heard that people on disability payments can now work for more than 3 years on a Community Employment Scheme. Is this true?.

Answer

Yes it is.

The Community Employment (CE) Programme operated by FÁS provides part-time work (39 hours a fortnight) for eligible unemployed people and other disadvantaged groups. In general to qualify you must be receiving an eligible payment from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for a certain period of time. There are two options under the Programme the Part-time Integration Option and the Part-time Job Option.

The Part-Time Integration Option is for those aged 25 or over and the employment lasts for one year. The age limit for those receiving Disability Allowance, Blind Pension, Invalidity Pension and Illness Benefit (previously called Disability Benefit) is 18 years or over.

The second option is the Part-time Job Option which is for those aged 35 and over. Under the Part-time Job Option participants can work for up to 3 years. Those aged 55 or over can work for up to 6 years.

Since September 2006 participants on the Part-Time Job Option who are aged 35 to 54 and are receiving one of the disability payments mentioned above can work for up to 4 years. Those on a disability payment aged 55 or over can work for up to 7 years.

Participants on a CE scheme are paid by the scheme sponsor. Those on a disability payment can continue to receive their disability payment as well as their CE payment but their disability payment may be reduced.

Question

How do I make a complaint about a programme I saw on television?

Answer

Anybody can make a complaint about a programme or advertisement, broadcast on television or radio broadcasting service licensed within the Republic of Ireland, to the Broadcasting Complaints Commission (BCC). The BCC deals with complaints about material which has been broadcast in relation to:

- Impartiality in news and current affairs
- Taste and decency
- Law and order
- Privacy or an individual
- Advertising, teleshopping, sponsor ship and commercial promotion codes
- Slander
- Published material in relation to RTE

Complaints must be in writing, preferably on a complaint form which is available from the B.C.C. and is also available on their website at www.bcc.ie. You can e-mail your complaint or send it to

Broadcasting Complaints Commission, 2-5 Warrington Place, Dublin 2.

Tel: (01) 676 1097, Fax: (01) 676 0948,

E-mail: complaints@bcc.ie

Your complaint must be made within 30 days of the broadcast and must include the following:

- The date, time and channel of the broadcast
- The news item, programme or advertisement
- A short detailed summary of what has caused offence, stating under which sub-heading (as listed above) of Section 24(2) of the Broadcasting Act 2001 the complaint is being made.

All decisions of the B.C.C. are made publicly available, including the name of the complainant. A copy of the decision of the BCC will be sent to you before it is published. Generally, if the complaint is upheld the broadcaster will be required to broadcast the decision. The BCC has no powers to award costs or expenses.

Question

Is it true that you can claim from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for dental treatment carried out in another EU country?

Answer

Yes, it is possible to claim for certain dental treatment obtained in other EU countries under the Department's Treatment Benefit Scheme, providing you qualify for the scheme.

To qualify for the scheme you must satisfy certain Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution conditions which vary depending on your age. You are also eligible if you are the dependent spouse of an insured person or a dependent widow or widower whose spouse was qualified at time of death. If you satisfy the PRSI conditions when you reach age 60 you will remain qualified for life.

Under the scheme you can qualify for Dental, Optical and Aural Benefits whereby the Department pays some of the costs of various treatments, such as dental fillings and extractions, eye examinations, spectacles, contact lenses and hearing aids.

You can now claim these benefits if your treatment, spectacles, etc. was obtained in another EU country. The Department pays an amount equivalent to the rate paid for similar treatment carried out in Ireland or the amount actually paid—whichever is lower.

Before going abroad you should contact the Department's Treatment Benefit Section, Tel: LoCall 1890 400 400 (ext 4480) for an application form and details of how much the Department pays for the various treatments. When abroad you pay the full amount for the treatment, but you should ask the dentist, optician or audiologist to complete the application form. To claim the benefit when you return to Ireland, send the application from to the:

Question

I am job-sharing in a local company and work alternate weeks. My job-share colleague told me that there may be problems with our social insurance records because of the tax year. What does this mean?

Answer

The tax year and therefore the Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution week start on the 1st of January every year. As a result, the "PRSI contribution week" can differ from the "working week". Because you are in a job-sharing arrangement you need to be fully aware of the implications particularly in the area of social welfare entitlements.

If the 1st of January fell on a Thursday for example and you worked every second week you would still manage

to pay a PRSI contribution in each contribution week because the contribution week started in the middle of the week. Therefore you would have the full 52 PRSI contributions paid for the year.

In 2007 the 1st of January falls on a Monday which means each PRSI contribution week runs from Monday to the following Sunday.

The 1st of January falling on a Monday is particularly relevant if you are job-sharing with a week off as part of your work pattern because you will miss out paying a PRSI contribution for the week you are not working. If you work one week on and one week off you will pay only 26 contributions for 2007.


This could affect your entitlement to a State Pension (Contributory) when you retire. The amount of State Pension (Contributory) you will receive when you reach age 66 is based on the average number of yearly PRSI contributions you have paid since starting work. It is therefore important that you have as many PRSI contributions as possible.

If your job-sharing arrangement requires that you work part of every week between the days Monday to Sunday, you will have your full 52 PRSI contributions for 2007.



espite its reputation as a rainy month, February usually has more dry days than wet. From regions of high barometric pressure over Scandinavia blow north and east winds that are dry and chilling, though they also bring gripping frosts and snow. It is not until the end of February that there may be the occasional clear and sunny day, to be paid for in night frosts.

From February to early May, take into account the effects of latitude, site and soil condition, available light and especially air and ground temperature on outdoor operations.

- Finish any deep digging or trenching of vacant soil as soon as weather permits. Break up topsoil well with a fork, and leave it rough for frost and thaw to break up the clods.
- Use moist and very well-rooted materials for organic manuring, whether farmyard manures, compost, peat, leaf-mould, forestry bark or weathered sawdust, so that they can be well worked into the soil. Unrotted manure slows down fertility by needing the attentions of bacteria which normally release nitrogen into the soil for plants
- Condition heavy soils and clay with a calcified seaweed soil conditioner roughly raked in a few days before cultivating.

THE FLOWER GARDEN

Delay sowings and lifting of plants for division to the end of the month or leave until March until the light strengthens and temperatures begin to rise. Take into account the reaction of native plants to climatic conditions; the soil temperature and how quickly it begins to rise, which will depend on the aspect and texture, height above sea level, and exposure to the sun's warmth.

- Take advantage of sunny mild days to lift and move deciduous shrubs, if necessary, herbaceous plants and ferns to new quarters in the garden; left with plenty of soil clinging to the roots and do not allow them to dry out before replanting.
- Plant lily of the valley (Convallaria majalis) crowns or pips with tips just below the soil surface. Choose a site in partial shade with well-drained soil enriched with leaf-mould or well-rotted organic matter. They take a year to become established. The variety 'Fortin's Giant' gives larger, longer-stalked flowers a fortnight later than the type; 'Rosea' has rose-pink-tined, strongly scented flowers and is less vigorous.
- Take advantage of the first dry days to weed, refirm the roots, and rake in a light dressing of a nitrogenous fertiliser such as dried blood or hoof and horn meal to bedded-out stocks and wallflowers.
- As soon as the flowers drop, lift clumps of snowdrops that have become overcrowded, divide and replant immediately, without exposing the roots to dehydration by air. Space large bulbs 10 cm (4in) apart. If replanted with care, the plants make vigorous leaf growth and are one of the few bulbous plants successfully propagated in this way.
- Check primroses, polyanthus, and autumn-planted pansies and violas for slug damage in mild weather. Slug pellets are effective but harmful to wildlife and pets.
- Give a top-dressing of fine bone meal and well-rotted manure or compost to crown imperials (*Fritillaria imperialis*) early this month. A well-drained site is essential, and it is advisable to plant the bulbs on their sides to prevent water collecting in the depression on the top. The lemon-yellow variety 'Lutea' is outstanding and looks magnificent in full spring sunshine.
- Lift and divide hardy herbaceous border plants while still dormant, removing the roots of invading weeds such as couch grass, horsetails and bindweed before replanting.

Roman Feast of Lupercalia—This ancient pagan fertility celebration, which honoured Juno, queen of goddesses and goddess of woman and marriage, was held on February 14, the day before the feast woman would write love letters, also known as billets and leave them in a large urn. The men of Rome removed them from the urn and ardently pursued the woman who wrote the message they had chosen.

The Birds and the Bees?- In the Middle Ages, people began to send love letters on Valentine's Day as they believed that birds began to mate on February 14th.

Valentine Traditions

A variety of interesting Valentine's Day traditions developed over time. For example, hundreds of years ago in England, children dressed up as adults on Valentine's Day and went singing holiday verses from door to door.

The gift of flowers on Valentine's Day probably dates to the early 1700s when Charles 11 of Sweden brought the Persian poetical art called "the language of flowers" to Europe.

The **rose,** representing love, is probably the only flower with a meaning that is universally understood. The red rose remains the most popular flower bought by men for their sweethearts.

Maynooth Newsletter Reaches Russia A Russian Christmas

n December 28th 2006 I departed from Dublin to Amsterdam and then flew to Moscow. I then travelled by train for eleven hours South to a place called Lipetsk, which is the home of my wife Olga. Her brother Dmitry is a Neuro Surgeon and Olga is a pharmacist who graduated from the University of Kursk. Christmas Day is on the 7th January in Russia. I spent twelve days in Russia. Unusually for Russia it was the mildest winter for fifty years. While it should have been -25° to -30° and lots of snow, the temperature only dropped to -6° and very little snow. I returned home to Ireland on 10th January with happy memories of my first Russian Christmas. I was very lucky to celebrate two Christmas's this year. This had been my fourth trip to Russia.

Traditionally Christmas and New Year are family holidays in Russia. In the last minutes of the Old Year all family members sit down at the table and wait until the sound of curanty (main clock) on Spasskaya Tower of Kremlin will start to beat twelve times. Russians believe that when curanty rings all their wishes will come true. New Year in Russia is not possible without champagne, mandarin (oranges) from Abhmasia and Russian "Salad Olivier". The name of Christmas Eve (January 6th) in Orthadox tradition is Sochelnik, because people usually eat a special kind of porridge with honey called Sochivo. On Christmas Day people usually eat a pork dish and possibly goose and duck. This meal can only be eaten when every family member is seated at the table. Then to finish off it must include Soviet Champagne with pineapple pieces in it, sandwiches with salmon (red) and sturgeon (black) caviar and finally the famous Russian cake Napoleone.

There are so many stories to tell about Russian culture etc. perhaps I will tell some another time. Soon I will start planning my fifth trip to Russia and visit to St. Petersburg.

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

Smoked Salmon Pancakes with Pesto

Makes 12-16

Ingredients

120ml Milk
115g Self-raising flour
1 Egg beaten
30ml Pesto Sauce
Vegetable oil for frying
200ml Crème Fraiche
75g Smoked salmon
15g Pine nuts toasted
Salt & ground black pepper
12/16 Fresh basil sprigs to garnish



Method

Pour half of the milk into mixing bowl. Add the flour, egg, pesto sauce, salt and ground pepper and mix thoroughly to make a smooth batter. Gradually add the remainder of the milk and stir until evenly blended. Heat the vegetable oil in a large frying pan.

Spoon the pancake mixture into the heated oil in small heaps. Allow about 30 seconds for the pancake to rise, then turn them over and cook briefly on the other side. Remove from the pan and keep warm. Continue cooking the pancakes in batches until all the batter has been used up.

Arrange the pancakes on a serving plate and top each one with a spoonful of crème fraiche. Cut the salmon into 1 centimetre strips and place on top of each pancake. Sprinkle each pancake with pine nuts and garnish with a sprig of fresh basil.

Chocolate Meringues with Chocolate Cream

Makes 12-16 Meringues

Ingredients

Meringues

3 Egg whites 150g Castor sugar 1 tsp Cocoa, sieved 50 g Good dark chocolate, grated or chopped finely

Chocolate cream

100g Chocolate 50ml Cream

Method

Preheat oven to $140^{\circ}\text{C}/275^{\circ}\text{F/Gas}$ 1. Line two baking trays with greaseproof paper. In a perfectly dry, clean bowl whisk the egg whites until almost stiff. Gradually add the sugar, whisking all the time. Stop whisking when it's very thick and will hold stiff peaks.

In a separate bowl , stir together the cocoa and chocolate and gently fold into the meringue. Spoon tablespoons of the mixture onto the prepared trays and quickly put them into the oven before it loses any volume. Cook for 40 minutes or until they lift easily off the paper.



To make the chocolate cream, gently melt the chocolate with the cream, stir to mix, pout into a bowl and let it cool; it will thicken as it cools. This can be done in advance, but don't put the chocolate cream into the fridge. As it wont be easy to spread on the meringues if you do.

When the meringues and chocolate cream are cool, sandwich the meringues with a tablespoonful of the chocolate cream. These sit perfectly like this for a couple of hours. If you like, serve with some softly whipped cream.

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

Bond Bridge and Associated Works

Unfortunately, the contractor Stanley Macadam, was unable to lay the final surface on Bond Bridge in December because of weather conditions, according to Kildare County Council. At the time of going to press the surfacing is nearing completion and hopefully there won't be any more "banana skins" to prevent the bridge from opening to vehicular traffic in mid-January.

Cllr. John McGinley has again asked the Council to speed up the provision of the safety measures for the Meadowbrook Road. These safety measures were agreed in November '05 and it is extremely disappointing that they are still not in place.

John has also asked the Council to consult with the Maynooth Gardai to ensure that car parking at the entrance to Parson Street is stopped prior to the opening of the bridge as otherwise there will be total chaos. In addition John has asked that the footpath from Parson Lodge to number 18 Parson Street, on the river side, be resurfaced as it is in a very bad state as a result of the Bond Bridge works.

Cllr. McGinley has also asked the Council what provision is being made for pedestrians to cross the road in safety at the T Junction of Bond Bridge/Rathcoffey Road.

Following representations by Cllr. McGinley agreement has been reached for the surfacing of Medowbrook Lawns as soon as the surfacing of the bridge is completed.

Parking on Parklands/Castlebridge by Train Commuters

At the December Leixlip Area Committee meeting of the Council Cllr. John McGinley again asked that double yellow lines be painted on both sides for the full length of the Parklands/Castlebridge road and at the entrance to the Square in order to remove the hazard presented by parked commuter cars. It was agreed that the Council would write to the Gardai seeking their approval.

Provision of a Footpath and Public Lighting to Moyglare Hall, Maynooth

On the proposal of Cllr. John McGinley the Leixlip Area Committee submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Full Council:

"That funding from the €1,877,605 roads element of the Development Contributions on Moyglare Hall housing development, Maynooth, be used for the provision of a footpath and public lighting from the Nursing Home to the development entrance on Moyglare Road (90m Approx) in the interest of public safety."

Laraghbryan Cemetery

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to provide a footpath from The Leinster Clinic to Laraghbryan Cemetry and that a public light be also provided at the entrance gate in the interest of public safety.

Provision of Social and Affordable Housing in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion asking for a report on the number, location and time when ready, of social and affordable houses in Maynooth:

"Planning Ref 02/2491

Kildare County Council has reached an agreement to purchase 70 units (42 affordable and 28 social) in this development at Moyglare Hall, Maynooth under Part V. These units are not yet completed but the Housing Department will keep the Area Committee informed on progress made in this regard.

Planning Ref 03/1192

Kildare County Council has purchased 8 units (5 affordable and 3 social) in this development in Straffan Wood, Maynooth under Part V. These units are currently in the Council's ownership and are in the process of being sold/allocated."

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised by the Council that Maynooth is the first preference of 65 affordable applicants and 176 social applicants.

Northern Relief Road from Moyglare Road to Blacklion

Following on from Cllr. McGinley's motion a meeting has been arranged for this month between the Leixlip Area Councillors, Dunboyne Area Councillors and Council Officials in order to make progress on the provision of this essential relief road.

New Public Lighting for The Harbour, Maynooth

As a result of Cllr. McGinley's ongoing campaign the County Manager has allocated €35,000 for new public lighting from Straffan Road to the Harbour and from the Harbour to the footpath bridge to the railway station.

Mud Bath at Beaufield Shopping Centre

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to install bollards at the footpaths "green verges" at Beaufield Shopping Centre in order to prevent cars form parking on them.

Stagg critical of council condition in relation to Tesco's and remaining danger to main street trees

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the decision by Kildare Co. Council to grant planning permission for the new Tesco's Supermarket in Maynooth, by including a condition in relation to Traffic Management which retains a danger to the Trees along Main Street.

Deputy Stagg stated that Condition 33 of the Grant of Planning Permission reads as follows: 'Prior to commencement applicant to submit details of proposals for an Urban Traffic Control (UTC)SCOOT system for all traffic signal installations in Maynooth for the approval of the Planning Authority (As per applicants proposals received on 1/11/06). This system shall include the widening and upgrading of the Main Street/Straffan Road junction and the provision of CCTV monitoring facilities at 5 locations to be agreed with the planning authority and shall be implemented prior to the opening of the development.'

Deputy Stagg stated that the proposals submitted on 1/11/06 by the applicants suggested 2 options in relation to the upgrading of the junction. One of these widened the Main Street without removing any trees but left very little protection for the trees near the Square as they would literally be on the edge of the road whilst the other option would remove all of the trees on South Main Street from Bradys to Hands old house (8 trees), and would cut a roadway through Court House Square. Why the Council left the latter option in is incredible and against the wishes of local Councillors and the General Public in Maynooth. The proposal would be an act of State Vandalism against the Community of Maynooth declared Deputy Stagg.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Trees on Main Street, Maynooth, were visually the most striking aspect of the Town and to even contemplate their removal was sacrilege.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would appeal the Councils decision to An Bord Pleanala specifically in relation to this condition with a view to eliminating any possibility of the removal of any trees along the Main Street, by amending the Condition to the use of the SCOOT system only.

Labour propose 500 additional buses for Dublin bus and €1 fare

Deputy Emmet Stagg has declared that the Labour Party Policy launched today 'Getting Dublin Moving' was a realistic solution to the gridlock Kildare Commuters faced getting into Dublin every day and that the provision of an additional 500 buses in the Dublin Bus Fleet and a €1 fare per trip would make a real contribution to expanding Public Transport in the short term.

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Deputy Stagg stated that the Government is announcing Metros and new LUAS lines every week, but all these like many of the other aspects of Transport 21 take time. The Government have failed to implement a short term strategy to improve public transport.

The bus is the Workhorse of the Public Transport system carrying 115,000 commuters at peak time each morning. Average Peak Time bus speeds have dropped to 8 mph whilst on some of our Quality Bus Corridors peak time speed can be as low as 6 mph. This situation cannot be allowed to continue based on the right wing policies of F.F. and the P.D.'s who oppose Public Transport.

Deputy Stagg stated that the main points in Labour's Proposals were as follows:

- * Labour will increase the Dublin Bus fleet by 50% (500 buses) significantly increasing frequency and reducing waiting times.
- * Labour will complete the Quality Bus Corridors and greatly reduce journey times. At present the Lucan QBC has a bus lane covering only 65% of the corridor.
- * Labour will introduce a €1 per trip fare for adults and a 50c per trip fare for children for bus services within 25 miles of the City Centre.
- Labour will fast-track Park and Ride facilities on the outskirts of Dublin with express bus services.
- * Labour will ensure that the integrity of the Dublin Bus Network will be kept intact, expand and enhance services, and deploy private operators in a more co-ordinated manner.

Deputy Stagg stated that since 2001 the Government have only provided an additional 20 buses to Dublin Bus. Labour in Government will provide 500 additional buses bringing the Dublin Bus Fleet to 1,582 buses.

O2 mast retention declared invalid again – Stagg presses council to seek enforcement of court order to remove mast

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by Kildare Co. Council that they have yet again declared as Invalid, O2 Communications Application for Retention of planning permission for the Unauthorised Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

This stated Deputy Stagg is the 4th time a Planning Application by O2 in relation to this Unauthorised Mast has been declared invalid in the past 2 years and is in blatant disregard of undertakings given in Naas Circuit Court on October 17th last.

Deputy Stagg stated that in Court O2 Communications consented to the Orders sought by the Council for removal of the Mast but a Stay on this Order was put in place for a month to enable O2 to submit a valid application to the Council for retention of Planning Permission. The application was duly submitted within 1 month but has now been declared invalid.

'Therefore' stated Deputy Stagg 'O2 are in breach of the conditions put on the Stay of the Order in that they failed to submit a valid planning application within 1 month and I have today spoken to the Senior Executive Planning Officer in the Council and I have called on him to instruct the Council's Solicitors to seek Enforcement now of the Court Order requiring the removal of the Mast within 4 weeks. Given the History of this case I expect nothing less from the Council'.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that this long saga of an Unauthorised Mast must be put to bed now once and for all.

Not a single additional hour provided for home help service in 2006 in county Kildare – Government disgrace

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted angrily to the news that from an additional allocation of 1.75 Million Hours, nationwide, for Home Help Services in 2006, not a single additional hour has been allocated to the HSE in Kildare/West Wicklow.

Deputy Stagg stated that having raised the 27% drop in hours available in Kildare between 2003 and 2005, and the 33% increase in the number of people availing of the service between 2003 and 2005, directly with the Minister of State Tim O`Malley in the Dail last year and who indicated that the Tanaiste was concerned at the reduction in services in Kildare, I am astonished to find that not one single additional hour has been allocated to Kildare in 2006.

It beggars belief stated Deputy Stagg that this Government seems intent on leaving Elderly people at home without proper care to assist them with daily duties; such as a bit of washing, cleaning or preparing a breakfast. There is also the added value of just having somebody to talk to for part of the day.

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Deputy Stagg stated the facts are clear:

- The number of Home Help Hours has dropped by 27% since 2003.
- The number of people availing of the service has increased by 33% since 2003.

The average number of hours per week which a person receives for home help has fallen from 7 hours per week in 2003 to 4 hours per week in 2005, a 43% reduction in service.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that he intended to raise the systematic dismantling of an effective service with the Minister for Health further in the Dail as this disgrace cannot be allowed to continue.

4 out of every 5 people in Kildare have neither a medical card or doctors visit card

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted with concern to the information supplied by the Minister for Health that 4 out of every 5 people in Co. Kildare have neither a Medical Card or a Doctors Visit Card.

Deputy Stagg stated that 40,046 people are covered under the Medical Cards Scheme in Co. Kildare while a paltry 580 people have benefited since the introduction of the Doctors Visit Card late in 2005. The Doctors Visit Card was suppose to cover 200,000 people in the State for Doctors Fees Only and was introduced following the Governments failure to award 200,000 additional Medical Cards to hard working families on low to modest incomes. These families many of whom have high mortgages are unable to cope with sudden illnesses to themselves or their children because of the prohibitive cost of doctors fees, prescription fees and hospital fees. Having been denied the additional medical cards to give them some comfort if members of their families became ill the Government is now unable to even deliver on the 'Yellow Pack' Doctors Only cards.

Deputy Stagg stated that the mismanagement of this Government in the delivery of what is an extremely limited medical cover scheme shows how inept they are. They have yet again failed to deliver in an area which is of critical importance to parents and their children and we shouldn't be surprised by this as they really don't care.

Pressure from Stagg forces recruitment of additional speech and language therapists

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been highlighting the scandalous Waiting Times for assessment of children

for Speech and Language Therapy in recent months where children have to wait 20 months for an assessment.

Following the imposition of Staff Ceilings in 2003, Deputy Stagg stated that all vacant posts were frozen and no recruitment was allowed. This left the service in Kildare with just 6 therapists whilst 5 vacant posts were left unfilled.

Deputy Stagg has now been advised by the Principal Speech and Language Therapist for Kildare that sanction has now been received for the recruitment of 2 additional Therapists, which will have a positive impact on the waiting times and overall provision of service.

Welcoming this positive move forward Deputy Stagg stated that the campaign does not end here. For the Service to function properly a further 6 therapists would be required and he indicated that he would continue to pressurise the Minister for Health on this issue as the effect of the understaffing was causing suffering to children and forcing many parents into the Private Sector to arrange assessments at €250 a go.

Commissioner finally concedes that 24 hour Garda station will be required in North Kildare at future point

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to pressurise the Garda Commissioner in relation to the provision of a 24 hour Garda Station to serve the North Kildare Towns of Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth which have a combined population of 45,324 people.

In the most recent response to Deputy Stagg from the Chief Superintendent Personal Assistant to the Commissioner, Gardai have finally conceded that 'In time and in conjunction with the increasing population in North Kildare, local Garda Management assess that one of the Garda Stations referred to will be required to open on a 24 hour basis'. This response stated Deputy Stagg, whilst not setting a timeframe for the delivery of a 24 Hour Station in North Kildare is the first time Local Garda Management have conceded that a 24 hour station will be required in North Kildare.

Now that this principal is firmly established Deputy Stagg stated that he would now increase pressure on the Commissioner to put in place a timeframe for the provision of a 24 hour station in the North Kildare area which will bring additional policing resources to the towns of Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth and would send a clear message to local criminals and criminals from Dublin that North Kildare is not going to remain an easy picking area for them.

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Cullen uses Dail procedure to block Stagg`s questioning of Taoiseach's claims in relation to Westlink toll bridge

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted angrily to the blocking of a Dail Question to the Minister for Transport in relation to claims made by the Taoiseach in the Dail on Wednesday November 15th, 2006, that the lifting of the barriers at the Westlink Toll Bridge on the M50 would be a disaster based on Engineers advice.

In raising the issue with the Minister for Transport Deputy Stagg had sought information in relation to whether the Minister had received similar reports from Engineers and if the Minister was prepared to Test the Claims by lifting the Barriers to see what would happen.

On December 14th the Ceann Comhairle wrote to Deputy Stagg disallowing his Parliamentary Question on the basis that Minister Cullen had no official responsibility to Dail Eireann for the matter which falls within the remit of the National Roads Authority and Dublin City Council.

What a load of rubbish is Deputy Staggs reaction to the disallowance of his question. If the Minister for Transport is not responsible for ending the gridlock on the M50 caused by the Toll Bridge, then what is he doing in Government.

With the opening of the Port Tunnel on December 20th an additional 1,500 H.G.V.`s have now been diverted daily onto the M50, which is equivalent to 4,500 additional cars. In addition works on upgrading the N4 to 3 lanes between Leixlip and the M50 roundabout at Palmerstown will begin in April, 2007, and with the ongoing M50 upgrade, traffic gridlock can only get worse.

Having previously called for Shadow Tolling on the M50, which would only cost the State some €50 m9illion per year, Deputy Stagg stated that he now intended to raise the issue further with the Taoiseach and get answers from him as Minister Cullen wants to hide behind the Ceann Comhairle.

Things to Do in the Garden in March

- 1. Prepare Soil for sowing by digging, forking and raking.
- 2. Get the soil weed-free and add organic compost.
- 3. Manure areas where you plan to plant fruit, shrubs or vegetables.
- 4. Plant seeds and space them well apart. Cover with soil and water lightly.
- Plant out sturdy hollyhocks and Sweet Williams. 5.

- 6. Plant broad beans, peas and onions.
- 7. Prune newly planted red currant and gooseberry bushes.
- Before planting hedges soak the roots of the 8. plants overnight.
- 9. Sow new lawns as soon as the weather permits.
- 10. Cut all dead, diseased weak and tin shoots from rose bushes.

Clematis should be pruned if necessary to restrict their spread. Prune summer and autumn-flowering kinds before the month is over. Cut back last year's flowered shoots to within a few buds of their base. Please leave spring and earlysummer-flowering kinds alone.

Large bulbs are the best, for instance a large crocus corn will give more blooms than a small one. The larger a lily bulb the more flowers you should get from the stem. The exception to this rule is the daffodil bulb grown in Cornwall or the Isles of Scilly are usually much smaller than those grown in Holland. On the other hand large corns are often old ones that are past their best.

A corn is astorage organ like a bulb. A corn is a swollen stem that grows at or just below the soil surface. It usually lasts for one season.

A bulb is a modified bud consisting of a flat base from which rise layers of fleshy or scaly food-storing leaves that enclose a bud.

Question

I have two children with disabilities. I don't qualify for Carer's Allowance but I have heard that there is a tax credit I may be entitled to. How can I claim it?

Answer

As a parent or guardian of a child with a permanent disability you may be able to claim the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit.

From January 2007, the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit is -3,000 per year. You can claim a tax credit for each permanently disabled child, so in your case you could claim a credit of $\in 6,000$.

To qualify for the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit, the child that you are claiming for

- Must be under 18 years of age and permanently incapacitated, either physically or mentally, from maintaining herself or
- Can be over 18 if the disability arose before reaching the age of 21 or while still in full-time education or training.

To claim the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit you must write to your regional Revenue office with the names and dated of birth your children, including details of their disabilities. A medical certificate may be required in some circumstances where it is not obvious that the incapacity meets the requirements.

The tax credit can be divided between parents or guardians if both are contributing towards the maintenance of the child. In such cases the tax credit is divided between them in proportion to the amount paid by each towards the maintenance of the child.

Question

I notice that there has been a campaign in recent months to update the register of electors. Is it possible for prisoners to register to vote in the next election?

Answer

The law has recently been changed so that prisoners who are eligible to vote in elections and referendums

can do so by using a postal vote. To be eligible to register to vote you must be over 18 years of age and have been resident in Ireland on 1 September 2006.

If you are in prison, you can register for a postal vote in the area that you would otherwise be living in.

If you are already registered to vote in that area and wish to be able to vote from prison then you should fill out a form called form RFG.

If you are not already on the register then you should complete Form RFA4 as well.

These application forms are available in all prisons. Completed forms can be sent to the City or County Council for the area you are registering in, to be returned by 14 February 2007.

Question

What is the minimum wage that employees are entitled to?

Answer

From 1 January 2007, there has been an increase in the minimum wage. If you are an experienced adult worker, you are entitled to a minimum wage of €8.30 an hour.

Employees under the age of 18 must be paid at least €5.81 an hour.

After reaching the age of 18, you must be paid at least €6.64 an hour during the first year of employment and €7.47 and hour during the second year. You are then entitled to the minimum wage for an experienced adult worker.

There is a lower minimum wage for employees who are in certain training or study courseS that will improve their work performance. They are entitled to a percentage of the national minimum wage depending on how much of the training they have completed.

The minimum wage does not apply if you are employed by a close relative or if you are working in a statutory apprenticeship, for example as an apprentice plumber or electrician.

If your employer provides your food (board or accommodation (lodgings), then the following amounts are taken into account as contributing towards the minimum payment:

€54.13 a week for full board and lodgings, or €7.73 a

€32.14 a week for full board only, or €4.60 a day €21.85 a week for lodgings only, or €3.14 a day

The rates for the minimum wage will increase again from 1 July 2007. The minimum hourly rate for an experienced adult worker will then be -8.65.

Question

What are my entitlements to maternity leave from work?

Answer

If you are pregnant while in employment, you are entitled to take a standard period of maternity leave and may take additional unpaid leave. This applies to all female employees (including casual workers), regardless of how long they have been working for the organisation or the number of hours workers per week.

The length of maternity leave entitlements will increase from 1 March 2007. If you start your standard maternity leave before that date, you are entitled to 22 weeks. If you start it on or after that date you are entitled to 26 weeks.

In addition to this standard period of maternity leave, you can avail of a further period of unpaid leave. If it starts before 1 March 2007, you are entitled to 12 weeks unpaid leave. If it starts on or after that date, you are entitled to 16 weeks.

At least two weeks of your maternity leave must be taken before the end of the week in which the birth is expected and at least four weeks after. You can decide how you wish to take the remaining weeks.

It is important to give your employer at least four weeks written notice before you take maternity leave, take additional maternity leave, or return to work.

You are also entitled to paid time off work where it is

necessary to attend related medical appointments before the birth and for up to 14 weeks afterwards. Your employer is entitled to two weeks notice of appointments and may request documentation confirming the medical appointment and pregnancy. You can take paid time off to attend one set of antenatal classes, with exception of the last three classes which usually take place during maternity leave.

Full maternity leave entitlements apply in the case of a stillbirth or miscarriage after the 24th week of pregnancy.

Your employer is not obliged to pay you during maternity leave. Your contract however, may include a provision that you be paid. You may qualify for Maternity Benefit from the Department of Social and Family Affairs if you have enough PRSI contributions. You should apply for Maternity Benefit six weeks before you intend to go on maternity leave.

Useful Tips

General Spot Cleaning Tips

Do

Use a clean white, absorbent terry-towel. Blot or tap the stop.

Pre-test the carpet in an inconspicuous area. Clean the stain from the edge to the centre. Apply cleaner to the towel.

Clean with modest amounts of cleaning solution.
Adhere to product safety and follow instructions.
Remove the stain as soon as it is noticed.
Remove the dirty excess before cleaning.
Use cleaning compounds at luke warm temperature.

Don't

Use a dirty or coloured rag.
Rub, brush or scrape the spot using force.
Pre-test the carpet in the middle of the room.
Clean the stain from side to side.
Apply cleaners directly to the stain.
Saturate the spot with cleaners.
Ignore the stain or leave it until later.
Wet clean before removing the dry excess.
Apply heat to the stain.

Remove Burnt Food From a Stainless Steel Pot

Remove as much of the burnt on food as possible, using a strong spoon. Add water, a cup of white vinegar, and two drops of dish soap. Let the pot stand for 24 hours.

Put the pot on low heat, and stir/scrape regularly. When you feel that you have loosened the bulk of the burnt food, dump the residue or strain the liquid so you can throw any solid waste into the bin.

If there is still a lot of burnt food repeat the above steps. Attack with a stainless steel scouring pad and hot water or for even more stubborn areas apply oven cleaner, and allow it to sit for several hours before scrubbing.

This should remove all the burnt on food.



Red Wine from Cotton Sweater

Put efferdent for dentures in cold water. Soak the sweater. Then wash in cold water as usual.

Window Cleaners

Window cleaners generally fall into two categories: Ammonia or alcohol based. Both do a good job at cutting grime and grease while minimizing streaks.

Ammonia bases products are a better choice for heavier jobs although they can be expensive and have a stronger odour.

Liquid glass cleaners are less expensive than the aerosols. Also, concentrates which need to be mixed with water, can provide even greater savings.

A home made cleaner can be made by mixing a $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of vinegar or sudsy ammonia with $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon of water.

Mother's Day Recipes

Royal Ham and Eggs

Ingredients

- * 1 ½ a cup of French bread cubes
- * ½ lb. Cooked ham, Cubed
- * 1 8 oz. packet of frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained.
- * 12 cherry tomatoes, sliced in half
- * 8 oz. cheddar cheese, grated
- * 8 eggs
- * 1 tsp. dried mustard
- * ¼ tsp. pepper
- * 1 cup milk

Directions

Pre-heat the oven to 350°F. Butter a 13 x 9 x 2 inch baking dish and line the bottom with the bread cubes.

Cover with a layer of ham cubes, a layer of chopped spinach, a layer of cheery tomatoes, and finally, shredded cheese. In a separate mixing bowl, whisk the eggs, dried mustard, pepper and milk together.


Pour this mixture over the casserole.

Bake for 20 minutes, then heat for 2 minutes until the cheese turns golden brown.

The vegetables that are listed above can be substituted with ½ cup of sliced mushrooms, chopped broccoli shredded courgette, or cubed boiled potatoes.

Instead of ham, you can use strips of dry cured ham, cooked sausage slices, or bacon pieces—or you could skip the meat entirely.





Pineapple Boats

Ingredients

- * 1 pineapple, cut in half lengthwise
- * Juice from half a lemon
- * 1 ½ cups seedless grapes
- 2 kiwis, peeled and sliced
- * 2 cans mandarin oranges, drained
- * 12 strawberries, hulled and sliced
- 1 sliced banana (optional)
- * ½ cup chopped walnuts (optional)

Directions

Remove the tough core of the pineapple halves with a spoon or knife. Carve out the remaining fruit, cut it into bite-sized chunks. And place them in a large bowl.

Squeeze lemon over the shells and chunks to prevent browning.

To the bowl, add the grapes, kiwi, oranges, strawberries and optional ingredients. Toss well, then spoon the fruit salad into pineapple shells.

Chill and cover until serving time.

This will serve 4 to 6 people.

The year of Sir Ivor: The 1968 Epsom Derby

"Cut loose by the young Scot at

andy Barclay sat on a bench in the jockey changing room at Epsom Downs, dejected, still unable to comprehend how racing greatest prize had been snatched from his grasp. The date, May 29th 1968 and Sandy, first jockey to Sir Noel Murless, the most eminent trainer in England, had just ridden Connaught into second place in the Epsom Derby. He sat with his head in his hands, inconsolable and on the verge of tears. A champion apprentice in his teens, and now at 19 year of age, holding down the most prestigious job in English racing in his first year as a senior jockey. A consoling tap on the shoulder from Lester Piggott meant nothing and perhaps Barclay might have deemed it the final twist of the knife from the champion jockey. Lester, the arch assassin, less than 30 minutes earlier had pegged back Sandy within 100 yards of the winning post. Riding Sir Ivor, Piggott had stormed home in the final furlong of the Classic to defeat Connaught and his young jockey, thus providing Vincent O' Brien with his second Epsom Derby win and Ireland with their 5th success in the race since its inception in 1780. In one of the most sensational Derby of all time, Sir Ivor had shown a brilliant burst of speed in the last furlong to overhaul

Connaught. Sir Noel Murless's colt had looked the likely winner entering the final stages of the race. Cut loose by the young Scot at Tattenham Corner, the magnificent 16.3 hands colt raced down the finishing straight, five lengths clear, killing off the field by his relentless galloping action. Entering the final furlong he was not stopping as Lester balanced Sir Ivor for his run. The response was

electric. The drama was captured by the cine cameras that recorded the motion picture " The Year of Sir Ivor" The producers had set out to follow the fortunes of the Vincent O'Brien trained classic contender from the start of the 1968 racing season. The cameras were situated at ground level to give a new perspective to the speed of the thoroughbreds in classic races. It was appropriate that they were present to record the final furlong kick of Sir Ivor. Sir Peter O'Sullevan, never a man to loose his equilibrium as a broadcaster, was put to test to describe the sheer brilliance of the Sir Gaylord's colt last furlong sprint "The year of Sir Ivor" featured most of the classic races of 1968 together with the Washington International at Laurel Park. Reviewed even now it is clear that it was a golden year for the colts and fillies both at home and abroad.

It is not certain that Derby Day 1968 contributed to

the decline of young Sandy Barclay's racing career which subsequently nose dived in 1970 It could be argued that the emotional shock of loosing the Derby at such a young age and in the manner he did, probably played some part in his demise from the racing scene. Perhaps Sandy was just too young to be riding as first jockey to the number one stable in England at the time. Sandy was not the only jockey to suffer a shock in "The Year of Sir Ivor" but Irish Jockey, Liam Ward, responded splendidly after being defeated on the Colt in the Irish Sweeps Derby at the Curragh. Lester Piggott, jocked off Sir Ivor because Liam rode all the O'Brien trained horses in Ireland, exposed Sir Ivor's lack of stamina, in a true run mile and a half race, by riding Ribero, a son of Ribot, to a sensational victory. Liam immediately picked up the pieces and rode the last three winners on the card. All three rides were in the "masterclass" bracket, a tribute indeed, to his professionalism.

Sir Ivor was bred at Mill Ridge farm outside Lexington, Kentucky by Alice Headley Bell (Chandler) He came from the second full crop of Sir Gaylord, who was a good fast two-year-old that won six races from five to

six furlongs. Sir Gaylord was unbeaten in four races at three and favourite for the Kentucky Derby before a bowed tendon ruled him out days before the race. Sir Gaylord also sired Habitat that magnificent miler who was one of the great stallions at the Airlie Group of studs owned by Captain Tim Rogers, His son, Sir Ivor, was out

of Attica, a mare with decent form whose own dam was a three quarter sister to Menow, a racehorse and sire of some consequence in the United States. He was entered for the Keenland July sales in 1966 and fetched \$42,000, a significant price for those times. Purchased by Mr"Bull" Hancock for American owner and US Ambassador to Ireland, Mr. Raymond Guest, an astute owner who was also a lucky one. Mr. Guest had the honour of leading in Larkspur, the winner of the 1962 Epsom derby. He was the owner of L'escargot, winner of two consecutive Cheltenham Gold Cups in 1970 and 1971 L'escargot also won the

Sir Ivor was sent to Ballydoyle to be trained by Doctor Vincent O' Brien. An imposing looking colt he made his debut in the Tyros Stakes at the Curragh on Irish

Aintree Grand National in 1975.

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Sweeps Derby day. Starting favourite at 3/1 and ridden by Liam Ward, he finished 6th to Mistigo trained by Stephen Quirke and ridden by Buster Parnell. Vincent O'Brien was disappointed, but Liam

was impressed and adamant that the horses who finished in front would not do so again. It was at this point that Raymond Guest and a friend, a Mr. Hewitt, placed a £500 each way bet with William Hill for Sir Ivor to win the following year's Epsom Derby, at odds of 100/1. Hill's liability stood at £62,500, a massive amount in those days. This price was to prove a gift a month later, after

Sir Ivor won the Probationers Stakes at the Curragh, turning the tables on Mistigo, winning by a neck, in receipt of a 5lb maiden allowance. Having his first run, the Mick Rogers trained Candy Cane finished third Despite the winning distance and weight allowance in his favour it was an easy and impressive victory. Liam Ward, stable jockey to Vincent O'Brien in Ireland, and the complete horseman, was never

hard on two year olds and always just done enough to win. However not everyone was impressed and with Mick Rogers great record in training Derby winners, Candy Cane, started favourite for the National Stakes, run at the Curragh weight since his Newmarket win. " in September 1967. However, Sir

Ivor was improving at an impressive rate and easily won the clash of the big two by three lengths. The Paddy Prendergast trained Society finished third. Sir Ivor then went to France to contest the Grand Criterium, run over a mile at Longchamp. The ground was very soft and deemed unsuitable for the American bred colt. The going did not seem to bother Sir Ivor as he won in a canter from Pola Bella with Timmy My Boy third. He was the first foreign trained winner of the race and consolidated his position as winter favourite for the English 2000 guineas.

Vincent O'Brien sent eight of his best horses including Sir Ivor to winter in Pisa, Italy. It was a new departure for the stable in the hope that the more benevolent climate would benefit the fitness preparation of the horses for the following season. It

> nearly ended in disaster when Sir Ivor, spooked and got loose near a public highway but quick thinking work rider, Johnny Brabston saved the day. It was also at this time that the reputable bookmaker William Hill started to whinge. Face to face with the possibility that he was facing a record payout to Raymond Guest and his friend, he tried very hard indeed to get the pair to dilute his obligation, should Sir Ivor win the following year's Epsom Derby. With the last throw of the dice he threatened to leak the details of the bet to the racing press in the

hope it would embarrass the Ambassador. Americans are tough however and it was no deal. The details were subsequently leaked which many would have considered unethical and unprofessional.

Sir Ivor's first race as a three-year-old was the Ascot 2000 Guineas Trial. Again the ground was desperate

and Sir Ivor was not near as impressive as he had been in the Grand Criterium. Lester Piggott was unperturbed, having discarded the opportunity to ride the English champion two-year-old, Petingo, trained by his father- in -law Sam Armstrong. Petingo, winner of the

Middle Park and Gimcrack Stakes in his first season carried his form into the Classic year by winning the Craven Stakes at Newmarket.

The English 2000 Guineas of 1968 was a high class race with a number of very good colts competing. So Blessed, later to become a top class sprinter made the early running with Petingo settled in behind. Lester had Sir Ivor at the back perhaps conscious that the ealy pace was too fast. With three furlongs to go Lester made effortless headway and was in a perfect

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position to challenge Petingo who had taken the lead from So Blessed at the furlong pole. Sir Ivor cruised by Petingo to take the Classic by a length and a half. Jimmy Reppin, later to prove himself an outstanding miler finished two and a half lengths back in third. Sir Ivor was now odds on for the Epsom Derby and Mr William Hill must have been "sick as a parrott" as he contemplated a gigantic payout on the race.

On Derby Day, Sir Ivor looked a picture. His appearance delighted his supporters as he had clearly gained condition and put on weight since his Newmarket win. He started at 5 to 4 on, with the next two in the betting being Remand at 4/1, winner of the Chester Vase, and Connaught at 100/9. Sandy Barclay aware that Sir Ivor might have stamina limitations decided to stretch the Champion by pushing Connaught clear at the five furlong marker. At one stage, he was five lengths clear and not stopping, when Piggott unleashed Sir Ivor with an electrifying run at the furlong pole. The winning distance of one and a half lengths was staggering in the circumstances. That final furlong provided one of the most thrilling and spectacular Derby episodes within living memory and will be never be forgotten by those who had the good luck to be there to see it. Sir Ivor had now won six races in a row, he was to loose the next four.

The Irish Sweeps Derby run on June 28th 1968 was his next target. In his monumental work "The History of the Epsom Derby" Roger Mortimer makes an assertion that is clearly wrong and for whatever reason, false. Lester Pigott was not claimed to ride Ribero by Johnson Houghton as written in his book The fact of the matter is that Liam Ward took the mount on Sir Ivor being first jockey to Vincent O'Brien in Ireland.

The race was to prove a bad experience for Liam. Lester Piggott, already a racing ledgend, knew that his mount, Ribero, a son of the great Ribot, would stay every yard of the 12 furlongs at the Curragh. Lester was also aware that his Epsom hero, Sir Ivor , might not. Amongst the front runners from the start and forcing a good gallop, Ribero hit the front 6 furlongs from home. Although Sir Ivor joined him at the two furlong pole he emptied like a leaking tank and had to settle for second place. The capacity crowd at the Curragh was stunned by the defeat of the 1/3 favourite. Liam Ward, although shaken by the defeat of the Derby favourite, showed what a great professional jockey he was. He promptly recovered his composure and splendidly drove home the next three winners on the Curragh card, two in driving finishes.

Protecting your Computer

ell, you've bought that fantastic new computer and you can't wait to surf the net, send emails to all your friends etc. Wait a moment! Before you do anything ask yourself is your computer protected against viruses? If a virus gets on your computer it can delete or even destroy files and software, and even deliver itself to your friends or work colleagues.

What is a Computer Virus?

Just like a medical virus, a computer virus can come in all shapes and sizes and can cause all kinds of different symptoms on your PC.

In general terms, a virus is a tiny little computer program that has the built-in ability to copy itself from one location to another. It does this by attaching itself to e-mail messages or hiding in the code of some programmes. As well as making copies of themselves to send to your friends, many viruses will delete files on your computer, or even interfere with your software.

That is why they aren't very popular amongst computer users!

Spreading disease

Viruses are transported via e-mail, so before you open all your new messages remember to check who the e-mail is from, and whether it has any file attached to it.

Although they travel via e-mail, viruses cannot be transported within plain text emails - messages that do not have files attached to them.

It is the attached file or document on an email message that will carry the virus.

An attached file, or 'attachment', usually shows up as a paper clip, or a small picture of a piece of paper or file *icon*, that sits on the side or bottom of an e-mail message.

An attachment can be a picture, Word document or even a movie clip.

If you don't recognise the e-mail address of the person who sent you the message, then you should be very wary of what the message contains. if the message doesn't look important then we recommend you delete it without opening it.

A virus in your address book

The people who make the viruses often use different tricks to try and make you open the infected e-mail attachment.

- you to open it using phrases such as 'Important' and 'Read now', or it will pretend to be a joke image or document.
- If you recognise a friend or colleague's e-mail address in the message, but don't know what the attachment is, then give them a telephone call, or send a fresh e-mail message to ask if they've recently sent you anything.
- Some viruses spread by sending themselves to all the addresses of your friends and

colleagues that are in your e-mail address book.

- The virus could have sent you an e-mail message from your friend's e-mail address
- If you open that attachment you could be spreading the virus onto your computer, and to all your friends or workmates.

- unusual error messages popping up on screen





Murphy gives full backing to into Class size debate & demands Government Action

Catherine Murphy, TD speaking in the aftermath of what she termed a "hugely successful" meeting called by the INTO last night, has given her "full backing" to their campaign to have primary school class sizes in Kildare reduced to the levels promised by the Government in their last programme for government. "The INTO have rightfully labeled North Kildare as a class size blackspot, its a position that, unfortunately, I'd have to agree with. The population of Kildare has grown consistently over the past 20 to 30 years but services like school places have been very slow to come on stream, and children are suffering as a result. The Department of Education has a huge responsibility to address this issue; in failing to do so they are creating huge educational disadvantage."

The North Kildare, TD highlighted both at the meeting and subsequently that having submitted several parliamentary questions to the Minister for Education on the topic in recent months she has been frustrated by the lack of information or commitment in the responses. "The Minister has failed to deliver manageable class-sizes to Kildare and when questioned about this, resorts to quoting national averages and stating that 'major improvements have been made in staffing at primary in recent years'. It's not good enough that children in Kildare are cramped into classes of up to 34 children just because the Government has failed to plan for the increased demand for places."

Murphy concluded in highlighting that the advertising campaign for Census 2006 was that everyone should participate in order that services could be planned for, but that there has been no evidence that any previous Census was used for this kind of forward planning; an assertion that is supported by the very existence of the current school place, and class size crisis.

"The CSO prepares very detailed demographic information, including projections of where population increases

and declines are likely to occur and what age groups they will affect, but the Government has consistently failed to use this information to plan for future need. If a private company made promises like those made advertising the Census and failed to stand by them they'd be sued for false advertising, so why should the Government be let away with it? They need to start looking at the population predictions from the most recent Census, 2002 and 2006, and not only address the school place and class size crisis we face now, but the one we're creating for

Is 650sq ft enough space for a family of 4 to live in for 20 years?

Apartments as small as 650 sq feet and containing little if any storage space or access to outdoor living space are being offered to single people, couples and families alike under the Affordable and Social Housing Schemes. Catherine Murphy, TD has termed such accommodation as "substandard", especially in the case of the Affordable Housing Scheme considering that participants are subject to a 20 year Clawback intended to deter them from entering into the scheme for speculative reasons. She has called on Government to first reduce the 20 year Clawback to 10 years for those buying such small units, so that expanding families can upgrade to larger accommodation without being penalised. New minimum standards recently announced by the Minister will take years to kick in so measures must be taken to deal with the substandard housing stock already built in the planning stages.

"The Affordable Housing Scheme is a good way for people, especially first time buyers, to buy their own home, but it's hardly fair to expect people to buy into 650 sq feet and commit to it for 20 years. There's just no room for family expansion in such small apartments; there isn't even room to store a bike or Christmas tree."

Murphy however went on to highlight that Local Authorities are being put in an awkward position because of the persistence of many developers in building such small units. "We're seeing a disproportionate number of 2 bedroom apartments being acquired by some Local Authorities on a take it or leave it basis. Although some Local Authorities are entitled to buy up to 20% of all new housing developments for use under these schemes, continuous property price rises over recent years, along with inflation, are making larger homes unaffordable. The result is that Affordable Home Buyers don't have a great deal of choice when it comes to the units being offered."

The Solution

"To be honest this problem needs a two pronged approach. Firstly the Minister for the Environment should reduce the Clawback applied to apartment purchases under the Affordable Housing Scheme to 10 years instead of twenty, with the amount of the Clawback reducing from 5 years on. This way, families could get started in apartments with the knowledge that after 10 years they can upgrade if they need to. But second, and most importantly, we need to stop the practice whereby developers are allowed to build such impractical accommodations. Apartments must have adequate living, storage, and outdoor space, it's as simple as that, but many developers will only provide these things if they are made to. Unfortunately it's easy to predict that we're trading one set of problems for yet another, its essential that there is intervention before it becomes a crisis."

Clawback

A Clawback is a way for Local Authorities to claim back the amount by which they discounted a property sold under the Affordable Housing Scheme if it's sold on within 20 years and it's applied as a deterrent to people using the scheme purely for speculative purposes. If a property, for example, is bought from a Local Authority for $\leq 200,000$ but has a market value of $\leq 350,000$ the Clawback is calculated as follows: 350,000-200,000 = 150,000 (discount amount), $(150,000 / 350,000) \times 100 = 43\%$ (percentage by which the property was discounted). If the property is sold within 10 years of purchase the full 43% of the market value on sale is payable to the Local Authority, however, between years 10 and 20 of the scheme, the Clawback then reduces by 10% annually. In this case it reduces by 4.3% each year.

Bond Bridge Opened on 29th January 2007

The long wait is over. It is a fine bridge and the unseen flood alleviation measures are very welcome. Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley would like to thank the residents of the Newtown area for their support throughout the long campaign and for their patience over the last 15 months when the bridge was closed.

Stagg appeals Tesco development over threat to Main Street Trees

Deputy Emmet Stagg has along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged an Appeal with An Bord Pleanala in relation to the Grant of Planning Permission for the redevelopment of The Tesco Supermarket on the Dublin Road, Maynooth.

Specifically the Appeal, stated Deputy Stagg, has been lodged with one objective in mind and that is to remove the threat posed to the Trees on Main Street, Maynooth, caused by the imposition of Condition 33 in the grant of Planning Permission.

Condition 33 explained Deputy Stagg provides for the provision of an Urban Traffic Control SCOOT system and worryingly also includes provisions for the widening of the Straffan Road/Main Street Junction. Two proposals are on the Table in relation to the widening of the junction – one which would not involve the removal of any trees but would place them on the edge of the road near the Square whilst the second proposal would involve the removal of all the Trees from the Square to Hands old House on Main Street (Beside Maynooth Jewellers). In all a total of 8 Trees would be removed and in addition a curved roadway would be driven through the heavily pedestrianised Square.

The proposal to remove 8 Trees from one Section of the Main Street has been described by Deputy Stagg as an act of State Vandalism against the Community of Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg made the following points in the Appeal:

- The Proposed removal of the Trees would destroy forever the unique visual appearance of the Historic Tree Lined Main Street.
- The Proposed removal of the Trees breaches 13 Sections of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002, the purpose of which is the conservation and enhancement of the Towns natural and built environment, which describes the Axis from St. Patrick's College to Carton Estate as one of the finest examples of 18th Century urban and landscape design, and which states that it is the Council`s Objective to protect and enhance the special character of Maynooth Town Centre.
- Other breaches of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 include the fact that the Trees are specifically listed for Protection and that their removal would have a serious effect on the Protected View from Carton Avenue Gates to the Main Street.

- In addition the Plan requires the Traditional Main Street Building Line to be maintained (a laudable objective) and Deputy Stagg pointed out that this applies equally to the traditional line of Trees.
- Finally the Plan requires the retention of traditional shop fronts on Main Street, and imposes restrictions on advertising structures on the Main Street to protect the essential character of the Town (again very laudable), but Deputy Stagg has pointed out that the Trees are as essential to the character of the Town and require equal protection.
- The Removal of the Trees breaches the Heritage and Architectural Conservation Areas sections of the Kildare Co. Development Plan 2005-2011.
- Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley were adamant that under no circumstances should the Trees be removed. They did point out however that a Ring Road from the Dublin Road to the Celbridge Road was included in the Kildare Co. Council Capital Programme for completion by 2009 at a cost of €10,500,000, that this road would link up with link road between the Celbridge Road and the Straffan Road, which in turn links up with the Meadowbrook Link, meaning this outer route would serve 3,000 houses and that this would be the route taken by most shoppers to the new Tesco Development rather than the Main Street. Therefore there was no need to widen the Main Street for traffic.

It was also pointed out that Doctors Lane would become a one way system shortly for traffic going East to West, thus removing traffic from the Main Street.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that Condition 33 of the permission granted to Tesco's ignores the unique beauty of the Trees and their importance in the creation of a beautiful environment in the Heart of Maynooth. He put forward 2 suggested rewordings of Condition 33 with a view to removing the threat now facing the people of Maynooth.

Inclusion of target of 500 houses for Maynooth in Meath County Development Plan review illogical

Deputy Emmet Stagg has described the inclusion of a Target of 500 houses in the Meath County Development Plan 2007-2013 for the Maynooth Environs as illogical and a threat to a co-ordinated planned future development of the Town.

Deputy Stagg stated that it would appear that on foot of a submission from the promoters of Moygaddy Park the Meath County Development Plan has been amended to include a target of 500 houses in the

Maynooth Environs part of Co. Meath. The Moygaddy Park proposal includes the development of a business, science and technology park, 450 executive style homes, a retirement village, hotel and equestrian centre.

Whilst some of these proposals can be dealt with on their merits under existing provisions Deputy Stagg stated that the proposed housing will open up a serious issue in relation to how Maynooth Town grows into the future. If we were to agree to this proposal we would have a satellite village with housing out on a limb, divorced from the Town itself. It would lead to calls for the agricultural lands between the Town and the Satellite Village to be zoned for housing. It would simply be madness.

The intention of Meath Co. Council is that the next Maynooth Development Plan would be jointly prepared between Meath and Kildare Co. Council's. Unlike Kilcock, where the centre of the Town is within yards of Meath, there is no reason for such a joint plan for Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg stated that the proposals are now on Public Display and that it was his intention along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley to make a submission in relation to the proposals pointing out that they were unnecessary and inappropriate to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.

In addition, at the Leixlip Area Committee meeting of the Council on 16th February the Councillors supported Cllr. John McGinley's motion objecting to the inclusion of these 500 houses in the Draft Meath County Development Plan.

Pedestrian Phase of lights at Bank of Ireland, Maynooth

On the proposal of Cllr. John McGinley it was agreed last September that the pedestrian lights at the Bank of Ireland would be removed in the interest of public safety. When John asked why this had not happened he was given the following incredible reply by the Council's Director of Services:

"Traffic management issues as well as health and safety arrangements are an executive function. In this instance, any consideration on the part of the Senior Engineer to temporarily remove the pedestrian phase was firmly contingent on the following aspects:-".

- A positive recommendation on the part of the Regional Road Safety Engineer.
- Discussions with the Gardaí.

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The Regional Road Safety Engineer is opposed to the temporary removal of the pedestrian phase. A meeting took place with the Gardaí on the 13 Feb. in relation to the same matter. They are also adamant that it should not be removed for the same reasons.

The matter has since been examined in some detail by the Council's new Senior Executive Engineer (Traffic Management). He has suggested a different approach which would involve the relocation of the pedestrian crossing closer to the Straffan Road junction. This, in turn, would convey a number of benefits, including:-

- ♦ The opportunity to better synchronise all signals at the junction.
- Less queuing of vehicular traffic as a result of the pedestrian crossing being located closer to the other signals.

I have requested the Council's traffic management consultants, Faber Maunsell to prepare a preliminary design and costing and will make this available to the Committee when available. In addition, it is also worth noting that the proposal will not involve the removal of any trees but will entail some civil works in terms of alterations to kerbs etc."

Needless to say Cllr. McGinley and the other three Councillors rejected the reply and they seriously questioned the statement that "traffic management issues are an executive function."

Provision of Defibrillators in Maynooth

At the request of a concerned Maynooth resident Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion to the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That Kildare County Council carry out a survey to see whether or not Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's) are available to the public at the following locations in Maynooth:

- Ambulance Service
- Manor Mills
- TESCO's Shopping Centre
- Maynooth Train Station
- NUI Maynooth
- Soccer Pitches, Rathcoffey Road

- GAA Pitches, Moyglare Road
- The 3 Primary Schools & 1 Secondary School

Furthermore, and in the light of the findings of the survey, that the Council becomes proactive in implementing a pilot AED programme for Maynooth. Bearing in mind that sudden cardiac arrest is survivable, with recent studies showing that when AED's are used within the first 3 minutes that there is a 74% survival rate, that the Council would give serious consideration to extending the AED programme to other towns in the County."

It was agreed that the Council would ask the HSE to carry out the survey and that the Council would be the driving force behind this very important safety issue

Doctors Lane to Become One Way

Cllr. John McGinley has been advised that a contractor will be appointed shortly for this work and for footpath improvements on Dublin Road and Hands Corner.

John has asked that ramps be installed on Doctors Lane in the interest of public safety.

HSE confirm purchase of new Maynooth Ambulance Site subject to planning permission

The HSE have now formally confirmed to Deputy Emmet Stagg that they have reached agreement to purchase a Unit at the Maynooth Business Campus for the New Maynooth Ambulance Base, and that the purchase is subject to planning permission.

As indicated by Deputy Stagg last week the purchase is conditional on planning permission been granted for the change of use of one of the Units at Maynooth Business Campus from light industry/enterprise to use as an Ambulance Centre. The planning application for this change of use was lodged with Kildare Co. Council on 22nd January and a decision is due on 18th March and Deputy Stagg indicated that he foresaw no reason in the world why planning permission would not be granted for the change of use.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that the expected finalisation of the Deal in March was important in that it would provide the most modern standard of an Ambulance Station in North Kildare and in the provision of a satisfactory location beside the M4 and accessible to all parts of North Kildare.

Court Order served on O2 seeking removal of Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. grounds

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by Kildare Co. Council that the Court Order seeking Enforcement of the Removal of the Unauthorised Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth, was served on O2 January 29th by the Council`s Solicitors.

What this means stated Deputy Stagg is that O2 have 4 weeks to comply with the Court Order requiring them to remove the Mast.

The Court Order was put in place at Naas Circuit Court on October 17th last and O2 Communications consented to the Order sought by the Council for removal of the Mast but a Stay on the Order was put in place for a month to enable O2 to submit a valid application to the Council for retention of planning permission. That application was submitted to the Council within a month but was declared invalid on January 4th, 2007.

Welcoming the Serving of the Court Order Deputy Stagg stated that the original Warning Letter in relation to the Unauthorised Mast issued to O2 in December, 2004, and following the submission of 4 planning applications, all of which were deemed invalid, we now have a Court Order requiring O2 to remove the Mast within 4 weeks.

On 5th February 02 submitted their 5th retention Planning Application but, Deputy Stagg is calling on the Council's Solicitors to enforce the order by going back to Court if necessary.

Further progress on extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent as invitations sought to be included on approved tender list

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed further progress on the required extensions to Maynooth Presentation Convent Girls N.S. following the invitation to Contractors to go on a short list to Tender for the Construction Project.

Whilst not at the stage of inviting Tenders at least this is some further progress stated Deputy Stagg.

The required Extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent is amazingly in Architectural Planning since November 2001 and was delayed by Government Cut-Backs following the 2002 General Election. The extension consists of refurbishment works, the construction of 3 additional classrooms and 4 resource rooms and a replacement General Purposes Hall. The Planning Application for the Project was lodged with

Kildare Co. Council on 7th June last and is currently on a further Information Request.

Given the clear necessity for this extension Deputy Stagg indicated that he would continue to apply pressure on the Minister for Education until Tenders were invited and contractors were on site.

€7 million allocation will kickstart upgrade of N4 between Leixlip and the M50—work to commence in the summer

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by South Dublin Co. Council that the recent allocation of €7 Million by the N.R.A. will allow for works to commence on the Upgrade of the N4 between Leixlip and the M50 in the Summer of 2007.

The improvements planned under this scheme include the following:

- Widening the Existing Carriageway to 3 lanes in each direction. .
- Provision of a new Interchange at the Lucan/ Newcastle Road Junction on the Lucan Bypass.
 Closure of remaining Median Crossings along the full length.

Deputy Stagg stated that the overall cost of the work is likely to be in the region of €35 to €40 Million Euro and that a contract should be in place for the Design and Build Project towards the end of February. The Timescale for completion of the project will be 18 months to 2 years.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that whilst the project will bring relief for hard pressed commuters from North Kildare who have no option but to travel by car daily to work in Dublin, it is the Governments fault that this project was not completed in 2004 as originally envisaged under the 2000-2006 National Development Plan, because it was the Government who imposed massive cut-backs on infrastructural projects following the 2002 General Election.

Eircom were taken to task over delays in phone connections—privatisation chickens coming home to roost

Deputy Emmet Stagg has described the present position in relation to the provision of Land Lines to people wishing to acquire a phone service as akin to the late 1970's when former Taoiseach and then Minister for Posts and Telegraphs Albert Reynolds, promised everybody phones out of hand, but there was no delivery.

We are now in the 21st Century stated Deputy Stagg, and following the asset striping of Eircom when it was Privatised by this malfunctioning Government of FF/PD`s, it is remarkable that people can be waiting up to a year to secure a phone service. We are suppose to be the Celtic Tiger but the Government handed over our Telecommunications Infrastructure to Venture Capitalists who`s only role in life is Profit. Customers, the Public don't matter.

In New Housing Estates, be it Griffinrath in Maynooth, Easton Gardens in Leixlip, The Beeches in Straffan or RyeBridge in Kilcock, residents have been left waiting and waiting for a phone service stated Deputy Stagg. These are not areas up the top of a Mountain and yet it can take a year for the service to be provided. In rural areas where young families are building their own homes the situation is worse.

Eircom stated Deputy Stagg are regulated by Comreg whose regulatory role was set out by the Government. The Government akin to their own ineptitude deemed that Eircom upon receipt of a reasonable request had to provide 60% of all connections within 4 weeks, 80% within 8 weeks, 90% within 13 weeks, 95% within 26 weeks and 100% within 52 weeks. In other words they have a huge get out clause, courtesy of the Government.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Communications Regulation (Amendment Bill) 2007 was published on 31st January, and it now provides us with a vehicle to alter the generous time limits given to Eircom to supply a phone connection. Having spoken with Labour`s Communications Spokesperson Tommy Broughan, it has now been agreed that Labour will table an amendment to the Bill to slash the time for Eircom to provide a phone connection to 100% within 3 months. This in itself is being generous but is allowing scope for wayleave issues which sometimes cause problems.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that it was time we got tough with Eircom and if they can't do the job we should renationalise them and ensure that along with our Electricity Supply System, that the State would control such a vital tool for the Economy and the daily lives of hard working families.

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Maynooth Community Council Notes

The March meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on 12th of March in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Harbour Field and Geraldine Hall Projects

The plan for the Harbour Field was up for discussion; John McGinley presented a plan which had the interest of the whole community at heart. He said Maynooth should get special treatment being a university town the only one of it's kind in the country. He said that Kildare County Council should hire people to push this project forward and that this should be a top notch 5 star development. It was noted that with the Action Area Plan we have the right to say what we want to be put in place here.

The development here will include a running track, pitches for both GAA and Soccer clubs.

A Scouts Hall that will be owned by the Scouts.

Enclosed all weather mini sports facility

Removal of old Straffan Road [if possible] and extend the old road out to the new road, create a playground area for 11-17 year olds here to include hang -out area. This area also to have roller skating / skateboarding and a graffiti wall.

These proposals take into account the survey carried out by the Chairperson of the Maynooth Playground Action Group among the 5th and 6th classes in the three National Schools.

It was also noted that the views of the Post Primary School should also be taken into account. They completed a project a few years ago called Our View Anybody <u>Listening</u>, researching the views and needs of young people in Co. Kildare.

This area when fully developed will form the heart of the town. However, Joe Penny, Parsons Lodge raised their concerns regarding possible access through Parsons Lodge, John McGinley said that the only access would be through Parsons Street; Joe said that they are in favour of development here but fearful that Parsons Lodge could become a possible access route for the Harbour Field.

Paul Croghan said he fully supported the plan, but was aware of some areas around the town that could be developed like Manor Mills and we should have an input into what goes on in Maynooth from now on.

Tom McMullon also commented on this, he said plans that were accepted for Manor Mills were some what different than what was first envisaged. With having an Action Area Plan in place here we have a say in what goes into the Harbour Field and we should push for this now and get it started. It was proposed that we adapt the plan. It was dully carried.

Festival

Andrew McMullon said he was delighted that new members have come on board and have started making plans for the Summer Festival.

Saint Patrick's Day Parade

John McGinley said plans are going very well and with the sponsorship from Tesco, Thornton's, and Manor Mills, for bands is very welcome. A full report is in the Newsletter.

Fair Trade

We are close to gaining Fair Trade status for Maynooth. Peter Connell said, they have also sponsored projects in the schools to promote Fair Trade. Some Fair Trade produce include bananas, coffee, tea, and biscuits.

Tidy Towns

Sean Cushan said they have done a clean-up on Main Street. He said the street was in a dreadful state with weeds. He also commented that it's a bad reflection on business that will not remove the weeds and help to improve the image of Maynooth. They are now looking for volunteers to help the Tidy Towns committee, an hour a week would make a big difference.

Local Matters

A point was raised by Cyril McAree regarding the selling of fish on main street. He said these people are running a business and have no over-heads as well as talking up parking places, also the Health screening van takes up parking spaces and can be parked for over a week.

Band Stand

The Band Stand is to be removed to NUIM at a cost of €30.000, also the old stone wall at the band hall is in a very bad condition and very dangerous.

Parking issues

New Rail Station has opened in the Docklands, but this is of little use to Maynooth people. There are no plans to address these problems, and it will have a bad impact on the town with no parking available. A proper parking structure will have to be put in place. It was noted that there is no parking allowed at Clonsilla station. Maynooth is not a parking site for Irish Rail and they will have to realise this. It was felt that this is maybe a good time to invite Irish Rail people to meet us. It is hoped that with the plan for the Habour Field, under-ground car parking and related works here it will bring all the concerned bodies together.

Question

I am planning a holiday abroad with my daughter during her Easter Holidays from school. Will she be able to travel with me if she is included on my passport or will she need to have her own separate passport?

Answer

Since 1 October 2004, all children regardless of age, must obtain an individual Irish Passport in their own name.

But if you have a passport that was issued before 1 October 2004, it remains valid if your child is included on it and it does not need to be replaced.

Children who are included on a parent's passport that was issued before 1 October 2004 may continue to travel with that parent to most countries up to their 16th birthday, as long as the passport is still valid.

There are, however, some exceptions. These include the Czech Republic, which requires persons aged 15 years and over to carry their own passport and Estonia which requires all persons aged 7 years and over to carry their own passport. Children travelling to the United States should have an individual passport which is Machine—readable.

There are other exceptions so if you are in any doubt, check with the embassy or consulate of the country concerned before you travel. You should also check with your airline to see if it has any additional requirements.

Passport application forms are available from Garda stations, post offices, libraries and Citizens information centres.

Children under 3 years of age can be issued with a passport that is valid for three years and costs €15.

Children aged 3 years to 17 years of age can obtain a passport that is valid for five years and costs €25.

Question

If I take I Maternity leave from work, am I entitled to get paid while I am on leave?

Answer

There is no legal obligation to pay you while you are on Maternity leave. Some employers pay for some or all of the maternity leave and the arrangements may be included in your contract of employment.

The Department of Social and Family Affairs provides a payment for employed or self– employed women who are on maternity leave. To qualify for Maternity Benefit you must meet certain requirements for Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) Contributions.

If you are an employee you must have one of the following to qualify for Maternity Benefit in 2007.

- At least 39 weeks PRSI paid in the 12 months before your maternity leave or
- At least 39 weeks PRSI paid since first starting work and at least 39 weeks PRSI paid or credited in 2005 or 2006 or
- At least 25 weeks PRSI paid in 2005 and at least 26 weeks PRSI paid in 2004

If you are self-employed , you must have 52 weeks of self-employed PRSI contributions in one of the years 2004 2005 or 2006. If you were in employment before you became self-employed , those PRSI contributions may be taken into account.

The weekly rate of Maternity Benefit that you will receive in 2007 is 80% of your average weekly income in 2006 subject to a minimum of \in 207.80 and a maximum of \in 280. You do not have to pay income tax on Maternity Benefit.

You should apply for Maternity Benefit at least six weeks before you intend to start leave or 12 weeks before if you are self-employed.

From 1 March 2007, you are entitled to 26 weeks of standard maternity leave from work. You can also take additional unpaid maternity leave for a further period of 16 weeks. These periods are reduced by four weeks for standard or additional leave that starts before 1st March 2007.

Question

I received a Free Travel Pass when I reached the age of 66 but I haven't used it in the last few years. I intend to start using it again but I understand that there have been changes to the conditions that apply to its use. Can you clarify what these changes are?

Answer

Everyone 66 or over and living permanently in Ireland can avail of the Free Travel Scheme. This means that you can use public transport free of charge . Some private transport operations also take part in the scheme.

Up until last year there were restrictions on using your free travel pass at peak times. Since 25 September 2006 these restrictions no longer apply so you can use your travel pass at any time .

Another charge to the Free Travel Scheme applies to cross border travel. Up until now you could use your free travel pass to travel across the border to or from a destination in Northern Ireland. But from 2 April 2007, you can also avail of free travel for journeys that start and end across Northern Ireland.

If you have a free travel pass, your spouse or partner may be entitled to free travel in Ireland when they accompany you. In addition if you are unable to travel alone for medial reasons, you may get a companion Free Travel Pass which allows any person over 16 years to accompany you free of charge.

To avail of free travel within Northern Ireland you will need to apply for a SmartPass . You can obtain the application form (from FTN1) from your local social welfare office or Citizens Information Centre or by phoning Lo –call 1890 202325. It may take up to six weeks to process the application

Question

I live in rented accommodation. Can I claim any tax relief on the rent that I pay?

Answer

You can claim tax relief on rent paid for private rental accommodation if it is your residence. The tax relief does not apply to rent that is paid to a local authority

or state agency , or it is paid under a leave agreement that is for 50 years or longer.

There is a maximum limit to the amount of rent that is taken into account each year, depending on your age and marital status. For 2007, the limits are:

Age	Single	Married
Under 55 years	€1,800	€3,600
Over 55 years	€3,600	€7,200

Your tax relief is 20% of your annual rent, up to the maximum rent limit shown above.

So if you are under 55 years of age , the relief reduces by up to 4 360 if you are single (that is, \in 1,800 x 20%) or \in 720 if you are married.

If you are over 55 years, your tax is reduced by up to €720 if you are single or €1,440 if you are married.

You can claim the tax relief by completing the form Rent 1 which is available from your local tax office or can be downloaded from the Revenue website at www.revenue.ie.



nlike most of the other holidays, the history of April Fool's Day, sometimes called All Fool's Day, is not totally clear. Useful Tips

Stains on Clothes.

Blood on Clothes: Pour hydrogen peroxide on blood and rinse with cold water.

Chewing gum: Use egg whites to remove gum on clothing. Brush egg white over gum with a toothbrush. Leave for 15 minutes and then launder on the item normally.

Lipstick: Use petroleum jelly for removing lipstick stains.

Mildew stains: Shake or brush the item to remove loose growth. Pre-soak in cold water. Wash in hot water with heavy duty detergent. For whites, add 1/2 cup bleach. If coloured, use colour safe bleach. If staining remains on white items, repeat washing before drying. Dry thoroughly, heat and sun tend to kill mildew

Perspiration stains: Soak the stained shirt in equal parts ammonia and water and add a few tablespoons of liquid soap overnight. Then wash as usual.

Soiled shirt collars: Take a small paintbrush and brush hair shampoo into soiled shirt collars before laundering. Shampoo is made to dissolve body oils.

Spaghetti stains: Wet the fabric and then sprinkle with powdered dish detergent. Scrub gently with a toothbrush. Rinse the item and launder normally.

Red wine on your white tablecloth: Pour salt on stain immediately after wine is spilt. When washed the stain will disappear .



Freshen up your laundry.

Fading: Turn dark clothes inside out and wash in the coolest water possible, dry on lowest heat. For all black clothes and linens, throw in a box of black dye every 8—10 washes or so to keep black clothes black.

Laundry basket freshener: Place a fabric softener sheet in the bottom of your laundry basket (remember to change it weekly). You can also simply sprinkle some baking soda in the bottom of your basket and that will help absorb the odours as well.


Mothball alternative: A better idea than using mothballs is to take your leftover soap slivers and put them in a vented plastic bag. You place the bag with seasonal clothes before packing them away. Not only will the scent prevent them from moth harm but also they will smell great when you pull them out. This method is especially good for jumpers, which can be difficult to remove the odour of mothballs from. Using soap you simply have a clean smell rather the smell of an attic.



Sour smelling towels: For coloured towels pout a cup of white vinegar into the washer with the towels and detergent. Never overload the washer with too many towels, as they will not have room to agitate and clean thoroughly. Never let a washed, wet load of laundry of any kind sit in the washed for long, dry as soon as possible. For a towel you are currently using, hang it in a fashion that will allow it to dry completely between uses, if thrown on the floor in a ball or folded over a towel bar, it can quickly mildew and the smell is hard to get rid of.

Yellowed/grayed whites: Use a white wash dye for bleachable and non bleachable clothing that has yellowed or grayed. You can also hang yellowed clothes out to dry whenever possible to reduce the yellowed.

Computer Viruses -don't let them Win!



A few very simple steps will help you to keep virus at bay. However should a virus damage your computer, having a backup of your data will save your sanity.

Anti-virus action

The best way to avoid getting zapped by a virus is to invest in some anti-virus software.

Just like your own personal bodyguard, the anti-virus software checks what you do on the internet and scans for viruses.

If it spots a virus hidden in an e-mail message or web page, then this clever software disables the virus and prevents it from damaging your computer.

Most anti-virus software will automatically make a regular check for computer viruses when you collect your e-mail messages or view certain web pages.

You can also set up your software so that a virus check is carried out whenever you specify.

E-mail scanning

Check the list of the programs supported by your antivirus software as it's important that it works with the e-mail program you use.

That way it can scan your e-mails before you send them and check ones you receive.

Webmail is email you can assess through a web page rather than using an email programme. This means you can view, send and organise your emails on any computer with an internet connection. (Hotmail is a well known example of a webmail service.), If you do use webmail make sure that you still keep your antivirus software up-to-date even if your webmail provides basic protection.

Where to get software

You can download anti-virus software like AVG free but make sure you always download the free version for personal use. Go to www.free.grisoft.com to download the software for AVG.

If you'd rather fork out for a more deluxe anti-virus software package, then there are others such as Norton Anti-virus, McAfee VirusScan or Virex.

Check out the alternatives using the software reviews on the Internet .

Or just go into your local computer store and ask their advice on the best virus checking software package within your price range.

Update your definitions

Anti-virus technology isn't foolproof, because new viruses are created all the time.

This means you have to regularly update your virus checker so you can stop new viruses getting onto your computer.

Each virus has a recognisable code or 'definition' that your anti-virus software can spot and disable. When a new virus comes out, the anti-virus software companies provide a new definition for that virus so that your computer can be protected.

created all the time. You can update your definitions so you are protected against new viruses by

linking to your anti-virus software's website. It only takes a couple of minutes to download the new virus definitions, and when you finish you'll be fully protected. Look for a button in your program with the word 'Update' on it!

Most virus checkers will prompt you when your virus definitions need updating, but to be sure, we recommend you should do it

Backing up your data

The **USB flash drive** is probably the easiest way to back up your data. A small, portable flash memory card that plugs into a computer's USB port and functions as a portable hard drive. USB flash drives are touted as being easy-to-use as they are small enough to be carried in a pocket and can plug into any computer with a USB drive. USB flash drives have less storage capacity than an external hard drive, but they are smaller and more durable because

they do not contain any internal moving parts.
USB flash drives also are called *thumb drives, jump drives, pen drives, key drives, tokens,* or simply *USB drives or keys.*

They continue to get cheaper and you can purchase a 2GB USB key for about €50. You can of course, also back up your data onto a CD. When it works right, a CD-R drive provides a great way to back up data and burn audio CDs. When it acts up, it can seem like an

expensive device for converting blank CDs into cheap DCs (drink coasters).

Overall Tips & Warnings

- •Create a new folder in your flash drive and give it a name, such as "Stored Files" or "Backups." This will prevent the files from being edited without notice.
- •When in use, the flash drive shows a red/blue light. Before unplugging, make sure the light is off. Good luck—and happy, safe computing.



Recipes

French Onion Soup

Ingredients

Serves 4

- 2 oz Butter
- 2 medium onions, slices
- 2 tsp plain flour
- 4 cups vegetable stock
- 4 tbsp dry white wine
- 4 slices white bread
- 1 1/4 cups grated gruyere cheese
- Salt & ground black pepper



Melt the butter in a large, heavy-based saucepan. Add the sliced onions and cook over a moderately low heat, stirring occasionally, for about 12 minutes, or until lightly browned. Stir in the flour and continue to cook, stirring constantly, until the flour turns a sandy colour.

Pour in the stock and wine , then bring to the boil stirring constantly. Season to taste with salt and pepper, cover and simmer for 15 minutes.

Spread out the slices of bread in a grill pan and toast them lightly. Divide the grated cheese among them. Return to the grill and heat until the cheese is bubbling. Place the cheese toasts in four warmed heatproof bowls.

Scoop out the onions and divide equally among the heated bowls. Pour over the soup and serve immediately.

Honey—Lemon Rack of Lamb

Ingredients

- 2 Racks of lamb, 7—8 ribs on each.
- 2 large cloves garlic, peeled and cut in thin slivers. 1/2 cup honey.
- 1/3 cup brown sugar.
- 6 tablespoons lemon juice.
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder.
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest.
- 1 tablespoon fresh chopped mint or 1 teaspoon dried mint.

Method

Cut small slits all over the lamb and insert garlic slivers. Place the racks, bone side down, in a shallow roasting pan. Roast for 30 minutes.

Combine honey, brown sugar, lemon juice, and garlic powder in a small saucepan. Keep stirring over medium-low heat until sugar is dissolved, remove from heat. Stir in Lemon peel, and mint.

Spoon the honey mixture over the lamb. Continue roasting, basting occasionally, for about 30 to 45 minutes.

Serves 4

Chocolate Easter Eggs

Ingredients

- 1 cup soft butter
- 2 tsp salt
- 4 tsp vanilla
- 1 can condensed milk
- 10 cups icing sugar
- 1 tsp. yellow food colouring
- 1 lb. chocolate

Method

Beat butter, salt and vanilla until fluffy. Add milk, beat in sugar. Blend until stiff. Dust with brown sugar. Knead until smooth.

Set aside more then 2/3 of mixture. To the remaining mixture add yellow food colouring. Blend in well. Divide yellow and white into 16 or 24 pieces. Shape yellow into ball, mould white around yellow to form an egg shape. Dry at room temperature on paper towels for 24 hours.

Melt chocolate in double boiler or in microwave until smooth. Dip eggs in chocolate. Once dipped cool at room temperature. Refrigerate after cool.

When sliced these eggs will have a white cream filling with a yellow filling that appears to be the yolk. They look nice sitting in an Easter basket.



Gardening



Monthly Gardening Tips...

...April

he garden really comes alive in April and the number of tasks to be carried out is considerable. Making the best use of the lengthening days is a bonus and, providing the weather stays fair, it can be a brilliant gardening month.

Do watch out for sudden air frosts, keep an eye on your local weather report and place any plants that you may be worried about in your conservatory or shed. Alternatively, you can wrap your plants up with some fleece or even bubble wrap to save guard them.

Now is a good time to plant evergreen shrubs, bamboos and conifers. Water them in well, then mulch the root area with bark or compost. Protect them from drying winds with screens of polythene or sacking supported by bamboo canes. They also benefit from syringing with water in dry weather.

Clematis and other pot-grown climbers can also be planted out now. These also need lots of water and protection from slugs and snails, alternative methods of pest control are available from your local garden centre from garden chemicals to the more organic . . . you choose!

Climbers make vigorous growth and will almost certainly flower well in the same year and are perfect for framing a doorway or porch to give your garden a more interesting and enticing entrance.

... Summer Plants to Buy Now

Use your imagination to create a colourful summer display of plants featured below which will last until autumn and are now available at your local garden centres or nurseries.

Wherever you decide to plant them whether it's in pots or containers, borders or balconies this selection of plants will add colour to your garden space as well as make you feel fantastic along the way!

Add a little passion into your life with *Passiflora Caerulea 'Blue'*, this climber produces gorgeous exotic blue/ purple flowers from summer to autumn. The fruits of this plant can be eaten fresh or used in drinks and the flowers can be used to make a tea which is said to relieve stress and anxiety!

Limnanthes Douglasii - commonly known as the poached egg plant for obvious reasons it produces a carpet of buttercup-like white and yellow flowers in summer and autumn. It is self-seeding so can become a permanent fixture to brighten up the garden year after year, and is great for attracting hoverflies which can help combat and control aphids, the main enemy of gardeners!

Viola is one of the most popular bedding plants because it is available in a variety of colours like yellow, purple, pink, red and deep purple, which looks like black, and they are ideal for containers and summer bedding. **Hybrid Tea Roses** - produced for their long stems and large double blooms in late winter to early spring, sometimes with fragrance, they will bloom all summer and make perfect cuttings for indoor displays.

Patio and Miniature Roses - as their name suggests these plants are wonderful for patios, pots and edging and grow to an approximate height of 6 - 24 inches dependent on the variety.

Ground Cover Roses - best for filling areas or gaps in your rockeries or borders.

Now that you have some inspirational summer ideas put this into practice and make that visit to your local garden centre or nursery who have a wealth of information to share with you.



The year of Sir Ivor: The 1968 Epsom Derby (Continued from the March 07 Issue)

but his owner decided against a mid summer break. Although American bred, the colt had shown a preference for yielding to soft ground, conditions he was unlikely to get in the height of a British Summer. Reverting to a shorter trip in the Eclipse Stakes at Sandown Park,(10 furlongs), a week later, Sir Ivor came up against two cracking four-year-olds in Royal Palace and Taj Dewan. Royal Palace, trained by Sir Noel Murless, had won the 1967 Epsom Derby and was a dual classic winner. Taj Dewan from France was also a dual classic winner who won the French Derby the year previously. The firm ground did not suit Sir Ivor who was delivered with a late challenge by Lester,

but was beaten a short head and 3/4 length into third place by Royal Palace who just got home from Taj Dewan. It was an outstanding performance by Royal Palace who broke down in the finishing straight, but his courage kept him going to the line. It was probably not a wise thing to do, running Sir

Vincent visiting Sir Ivor at Claiborne, near Paris, Kentucky in 1981—and exchanging reminiscences.

Ivor just one week after his exertions in the Irish Sweeps Derby. He lost nothing in defeat, running on ground that patently did not suit him, having his fifth race of the season and running up against two top class four-year-olds. He showed not only was he a class act but an extremely tough one as well. He returned to Ballydoyle with sore knees jarred by the firm ground and was rested for an autumn campaign.

His prime objective was the Arc and he had a prep run in the Prix Henri Delamarre, run over 11 furlongs a week before the big race. He finished second, conceding 9lb. to the winner, Prince Sao. Since he badly needed the outing his defeat was not taken too seriously. In the Arc he ran an excellent race to finish second to Vaguely Noble. The victor had made the highest price ever (136,000 guineas) when he was purchased as a two-year-old at Newmarket Sales the previous December.

It would have been reasonable to expect that after his run in the Arc he would have been retired to stud or put away for the following season. Lester Piggott favours Sir Ivor as the best horse he ever rode. It is not hard to understand when you consider that this tough and brilliant Colt was to run twice more and win both times.

A few weeks after the Arc, Sir Ivor won the Champion Stakes run over a mile and a quarter at Newmarket. Starting at 11-8 on he won very easily from Locris and Candy Cane with the high class Taj Dewan a dissapointing fifth.

Sir Ivor's final race was the Washington International at Laural Park USA. This he won in spectactular fashion comming fast and late along

the inside rail to peg back Czar Alexander by three-parts of a lenght. The American racing press, ignorant of European riding styles, were not ecstatic with the performance of the jockey. The normally imperturbable Piggott waited until the following year to give his answer. In a press conference given after he had ridden Karabas to win the 1969 running of the Washington International Lester was asked, in the press tent, when he thought he had the race won? The atmosphere was caustic but Piggott's answer was delivered with deadpan nonchalance "about two weeks ago" The press departed with their tails between their legs.



In the world of horseracing some stars blaze for decades like Lester Piggott and Pat Eddery, others like Sandy Barclay explode in blinding light and fade almost as fast. Appointed as second jockey to Sir Noel Murless in 1967 the young 18 year Scot was riding for the most powerful stable in England. Harry Whiteman who held Barclays' indentures as an apprentice described the young man as the best he had seen in his lifetime, "an absolute genius". When George Moore, decided to leave Murless after just one season as first jockey and return to Australia, the trainer handed the job to then 19 year old Sandy. Moore's home in London had been ransacked in a sinister burglary and taken together with threats to his life, hurried his departure.

Although Sir Ivor had been impressive in winning the 2000 Guineas, Caergwrle had been equally impressive for Sandy in taking the 1000 Guineas. The young jockey also rode the good four- yearolds Royal Palace and Hopeful Venture, the three- year- olds Connaught and Caergwrle and the two- year- old Welsh Pageant to Group victories. He finished second to Lester Piggott in the Jockeys Championship with 116 winners. Maybe it was too much success all too soon. It was also possible that as he was still growing, his balance and style was eroded by the change in his physique. What ever it was, by 1970 Noel Murless had lost his patience. In his autobiography "the Guvenor" he said" Sandy Barclay just did not appear to have the mentality to make the grade. Perhaps I was a bit hard

on him but he was always turning up late for work and sometimes not comming at all. Then he rode a very bad race on Parmelia, I got bloody annoyed and sacked him" Maybe the trainer should have tried a little harder to rescue a great talent. Sandy's career was now in freefall He continued to ride for a number of years after he left Murless but it was all for nought. International breeding underwent a fundamental change. Sir Ivor could have been home in Kentucky in a couple of hours from Laurel but Raymond Guest had made a commitment to Ireland, his colt would stand at Ballygoran Stud Maynooth, available to European breeders for two seasons at a fee of £4000. The fee was considered high at the time, but the chance for breeders to avail of the services of a sire of his quality made it value for money. He bred the Epsom Derby

runner up, Cavo Doro, a colt bred and ridden by Lester Piggott. He also bred Sir Tristram who, when exported to the southern hemisphere became a stallion of immense significance. His influence on the breed, in that area, rivalled that of Northern Dancer in the United States and Europe. There where no Group One winners for Sir ivor among the 54 foals conceived in this country during his time at Ballygoran. In his first crop conceived at Claiborne Kentucky, however, he bred Arc winner, the filly, Ivanjica. Sir Ivor bred another good daughter in Optimistic Gal, who was of exceptional merit. Bates Hotel was another of his progeny who raced with great distinction. Otherwise he relied on his European runners to earn him renown at stud. This was done primarily through his daughters. One that deserves mention is Lady Capulet trained by Doctor Vincent O'Brien. This beautifully bred filly out of Caps and Bells by Tom Fool won the

the stylist jockey, Tommy Murphy riding.

Because of his failure, with one exception, to become a sire of sires his stallion fee fell from a high of \$75,000 to \$10,000 by

1974 Irish 1000 Guineas, first time out, with

1990.

The Year of Sir Ivor was to prove a landmark in the history of European horse breeding. In the following decades the demand for the progeny of North American sires became a deluge. The emphasis on speed rather than stamina, some would argue, has had a detrimental effect on thoroughbred horse racing. The consistent failure of many runners in the Epsom Derby to see out the mile and a half trip can be attributed to the predominance of entries bred by north American sires. You cannot buck the market however, and commercial breeders are only meeting the demands

of the buyer. The French racing authorities have bowed to the inevirtable by reducing their Derby distance to a mile and one quarter. The emergence of Germany as a force in international breeding is to be welcomed. Two star sires in Monsun and Acatenango may well be the forerunner of new bloodlines which may well reverse the trend of inbreeding within the Northern Dancer line.

1968 however, was the year of Sir Ivor. a winner of eight races and placed in four more. A tough and brilliant colt who deserved the acolade placed on him by Lester Piggott as the best horse he ever rode.

A letter to the Editor

Dear Sir,

This is my first time to put pen to paper to any newspaper, but I can hold my tongue/pen no longer. How much more incompetence are we to witness from this Government?

Following the news that a child had been solicited and abused by men in high office in our country. I am appalled at the reaction of the legislators. Having watched Prime Time last night (1-03-07) and listened with disbelief, to the contribution from the Fianna Fail chairman of the Oireachtas Committee on Child Protection. If his name eludes me, it is because his message and his body language was so dismissive of the gravity of this blunder by our Government of which he is a member. I heard his message as "soliciting children is only a minor offence while actual abuse is of course a crime". I was speechless!! Grooming of children is an integral part of the sex offenders offending cycle. Once someone is at the stage of actively grooming a child they are one step away from offending, therefore the act of grooming is one that must be regarded as a criminal offence. In this day and age how many more children are going to be offended against before the government ensures that there is adequate protection in the law to prevent sex offences against children occurring. It is difficult enough for the Gardai to catch people in the act of grooming and therefore they need to have an effective legislator framework to ensure that they can prevent abuse occurring and prevent children victimised and preyed upon in this way.

If anything this case has highlighted the ignorance and arrogance of this government and Minister McDowell in particular. The reactive approach of this government has created a very dangerous situation for the children of this state. I have no confidence in this government and believe that the consequences of their lack of action and poor legislation will be felt for some time to come and I can only pray that the children will not suffer because of their incompetence.

I have just now heard our Minister for Justice being interviewed on Morning Ireland, waffling on about the inadvisability of rushing through emergency legislation, it must be thought through etc. This situation would not have risen had his Department followed on the legislation rushed through last Summer. Again he sounded dismissive of concerns for the safety of children, in his response to the interviewer saying "the District Court can deal with most of these offences". Isn't it bad enough that once sex offenders are convicted they can sit in prison without having to undergo treatment and with no risk of assessment taking place before they are released back into the community? They serve every day of their sentence and are released back into the community on limited supervision and are free to start again. If a perpetrator is high profile, he will have more difficulty in going back to his community of origin but will still be a risk to the community. Yes, the reconviction rate is low, but the rate of treatment is non–existent. There are no incentives for sex offenders to undergo treatment and this needs to be addressed. Prevention must be the key to all legislation in this area and the shotgun approach has now been shown to create more chaos and to offer even less protection than the previous out-dated legislation did.

All of this in the day a high profile convicted sex abuser is released, having completed his sentence, but having chosen to avail of the opportunity in prison to develop guitar and artistic skills, rather that part-take in appropriate counselling, which may have instilled some insight into his deviant behaviour.



Independents declare class sizes key election issue.

A group of Independent TDs will today make a statement demanding that Minister for Education, Minister Mary Hanafin TD commit immediately to reducing class size averages, initially this year by at least 1 point from its current level of 24.2 children to each teacher and again by 1 point each year for the next 5 years as a minimum.

The Independent Dáil Deputies have called a press conference in support of the INTO's recently launched campaign to highlight the huge failure of Government to reduce primary school class sizes to manageable levels, stating:

At a time when education and training are of key importance for ensuring the growth of the Irish economy, we cannot afford to leave our children in educational disadvantage any longer. Measures must be put in place to ensure that all children, no matter where from or what their needs are, have equal access to education and equal opportunities for the future. In failing to significantly reduce class sizes, this Government has failed the children of Ireland and must immediately provide increased staffing levels to ensure that Irish children have the very best start in life."

Catherine Murphy TD (Ind) launches general election 2007 campaign on 2 year anniversary of election to Dáil

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) has officially announced her intention to run in the upcoming General Election 2007 and chose the 2 year anniversary of her election to the Dáil to do it. Issues

"While this General Election will differ from the byelection in many ways, the vast majority of the issues are the same. For the past two years I have concentrated on issues such as transport, childcare, education, disability services, healthcare, M50 tolls, the planning and building of communities, and housing; and will continue to do so into the future if re-elected. My agenda is simple; we need to build a successful society rather than just an economy, and in order to accomplish this we must plan effectively for the future. It's not good enough that we have a school place crisis on our hands, that lack of choice or adequate services in public transport is continuing to force people into their cars, and that large-scale housing development is happening without any regard to whether the services exist to meet the needs of our rapidly expanding communities. The short-term attitude to these problems has to change, and I'll keep pressuring, lobbying and liaising with whatever Government is in power until we see real results on these issues."

Work done in the Dail

"As well as addressing an ever increasing amount of issues raised by individual constituents, constituent groups, and lobbying groups I've managed to raise some significant national issues in the context of the Kildare experience. One example of this is that I exposed the issue of Management Companies in housing estates. I first raised this appalling practice with the Minister for the Environment in the Dáil on 29th September 2005, and have continued to highlight it, along with the need for regulation of such companies for apartment owners, and also the problems faced by people in unfinished estates county and country wide. These issues are now Nationally recognised across party divides and I'm committed to seeing them through until home purchasers and owners have the protections they deserve."

My ability to make a difference

I've already demonstrated that an Independent TD really can make a difference in the Dáil with the unfinished estates and management company issues, and I feel it's important to highlight this to voters. In fact, as a member of the Independent Technical Group in the Dáil along with others such as Tony Gregory, Finian McGrath, Dr. Gerry Cowley and Seamus Healy, I have all the benefits of belonging to a party without the drawbacks. I take my orders directly from the people of Kildare and can focus all my energy on ensuring that the interests of the county are always

represented in a national context, as opposed to taking a back seat to a party agenda.

Understaffing leaves KCC planning department high & dry

Catherine Murphy TD, (Ind) has again harshly criticized the failure of the Department of the Environment to provide Kildare County Council with adequate staffing and resources having recently learned that staff shortages are so bad in the planning Department that staff members have been requested for weeks at a time from the Unauthorised Development operation to Planning Applications.

"How are County Council officials expected to do their jobs if they're constantly being bounced around between the various different departments. The fact that this is happening shows just how overstretched resources are in Kildare and the Minister for the Environment simply must do something about it."

Murphy, who has recently learned that the management of Kildare County Council have moved staff from the Unauthorised Development section to the Planning Applications section due to the volume of time-dependent work in the latter, has stated huge concern that the need to redistribute staff numbers in such a way is leading unauthorized development files being neglected for long periods of time. On discovering this practice the North Kildare TD tabled parliamentary questions to the Minister for the Environment and will be pursuing the matter in the Dáil.

"It's just not good enough that staff ceilings and restrictive budgets are causing such problems to Kildare County Council. These staff shortage issues need to be addressed urgently and the only person who can facilitate that is the Minister himself, he allocates the budget, he decides on the staff ceilings, and he must step up to fix this urgent problem.

Public Meeting on Management Companies

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) and Joe Higgins, TD (SP) have called a public meeting in the Moran's Red Cow Inn on the Naas Road, at 11am this Saturday 24th March 2007, to raise the issue of Management Companies and Unfinished Housing estates. Deputies Murphy and Higgins will speak with residents groups and concerned parties at the public meeting on progress made to date on these issues, the way things stand at the moment and what needs to be done to ensure full resolution.

"It's essential that the pressure is kept on Local Authorities, the Government and developers alike to ensure that we see an end to the double taxation that is, charging management fees to house owners; the unregulated operation of management companies in apartment / duplex developments; and the failure of developers to finish estates to standard and of Local Authorities to take them in charge in a timely fashion. People power is of huge importance on an issue such as this and public meetings are a vital way of mobilising that power." — Murphy

Murphy went on to highlight that while the National Consumer Agency has committed to rattling cages, they must tackle the consumer issue of under funding Local Authorities. "The people of Kildare, as the customers of Kildare County Council, paid out €35 million in motor tax last year but received only €27 million of that back from the Department of the Environment to fund essential services like estate maintenance and planning enforcement. From a consumer perspective, we're paying more money out to get a lesser service than our counterparts around the country and that's something the National Consumer Agency should look at in their efforts to rattle cages."

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

Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan

Cllr. John McGinley's motion "*That a Project Team be appointed to progress the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan*" was agreed unanimously at the Area Committee meeting of the Council on 16th March. In proposing the motion John stated:

"Maynooth being the only University town in Ireland should be special.

We should be looking at Oxford and Cambridge to see how University towns can grow properly.

The Harbour Site is at the heart of the town and needs to be developed to 5 Star standards.

If individual developers go their own way there will be a fragmented approach and that is what will happen unless the Council appoint a Project Management Team to drive the project. The Team to include: Director Leader, Finance, Planner and Architect should be contracted out.

I believe that is the best way forward. Get the developers to act in consort and come up with a Joint Venture proposal covering the Residential Area, the new Streets, the Civic Building, the Community Proposals for the Geraldine Hall/Harbour Field and Underground Parking at the Harbour Field. Then bring the JV proposal back to full Council for approval."

Repairs to Public Lights on Meadowbrook Link Road

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion asking for the repair of the seven lights that are not working:

"There was accidental damage to E.S.B. cabling recently in the context of providing bollards as part of the Meadowbrook Link Scheme. In this regard, Albany Homes have given undertakings to the Council that the matter will be sorted out directly with the E.S.B. The Council's Road Construction Department are being kept appraised and will maintain a watching brief. The Senior Executive Engineer is, however, assured that the matter is in hand and should be rectified very shortly."

Planting of the Area Between Silken Vale and Bond Bridge

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion calling for the planting of shrubs in the area now:

"Subject to a more detailed assessment, the planting of shrubs etc. in this area would cost in the region of €35,000. It is, of course, accepted that this would greatly enhance the amenity of the area and, indeed, would ensure a further level of betterment as a result of the Bond Bridge project. Accordingly, subject to managerial approval, I have requested the Road Construction team to proceed with this work, chargeable to the Bond Bridge project. The possibility of fast-tracking this planting is currently being examined by the Council's consultants. Again, the Area Committee will be kept fully informed."

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Footpath & Public Lighting on Moyglare Road from the Nursing Home to Moyglare Hall

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his query on when the work would begin:

"I refer to my previous reports in this matter. I have requested all Area Engineers to furnish a list of final recommendations relating to the "Deficiency in Infrastructure" scheme prior to the 31.3.2007. Certainly, this project will be actively considered in this context. Should it be successful, it is anticipated that work would probably commence around the 1st May, 2007."

Palisade Fencing at Bond Bridge

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion calling for the removal of the palisade fencing and replacing it with a wooden gate:

"It is proposed that the existing palisade fencing and gate be improved to include timber panelling. This will, in turn, greatly improve amenity aspects. The Council's consultants are currently dealing with associated design issues."

John asked for details of the timber panelling and if it would completely cover the palisade fencing.

Pedestrian Phase of Lights at Bank of Ireland, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the Area Meeting on 16th March:

"Written reports have been requested from the Regional Road Safety Adviser as well as the Gardaí. These will be forwarded to the members when available. In the interim, I have requested the Council's consultants to proceed with the preliminary design relating to a revised traffic management lay-out at this junction, bearing in mind the wishes of the Committee that no trees should be removed. This will be circulated to the members in due course and I will arrange for the consultants as well as members of the Road Design team to be in attendance in order to go through the issues in more detail."

Northern Relief Road:

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the March Area Meeting:

"The meetings administrator will arrange this meeting for a time suitable to both Area Committees as well as respective Director of Services. Hopefully, it will be possible to have provisional dates in advance of the forthcoming meeting of Leixlip Area Committee."

One Way System for Doctor's Lane

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the March Area meeting:

"The amendments as suggested by the members at the recent meeting have been incorporated into the design drawings. The Area Engineer will now proceed to price the work with a view to having a contractor on site at an early stage."

John asked that Geoghegan's Lane be made either two way or one way from Main Street towards Doctor's Lane. The latter was agreed subject to the approval of the Area Engineer.

Maynooth to Docklands Rail Service will have to wait— capacity increase later in 2007 only major improvement in Maynooth Suburban Line

Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the broken promises in relation to the provision of rail services from Maynooth to The new Docklands Station, and the provision of train services from Maynooth every 15 minutes at Peak Hours, with the Minister for Transport in the Dail by way of Parliamentary Question.

In his response to Deputy Stagg the Minister stated that the fastest growth area on the Maynooth Suburban Line was from Clonsilla inwards and that the new service to the Docklands will be provided to cater for this increased demand which in turn will reduce pressure on the existing heavily loaded trains. In addition the Minister advised that later in 2007 capacity will be increased on existing Maynooth Suburban Services through the reassignment of diesel railcars currently being used on the Sligo service following the entry into service of the first of the 150 new Intercity railcars.

Commenting on the response Deputy Stagg stated that the Minister refused to acknowledge that the promises were broken because of limited fleet availability, which are his direct responsibility given the fact that he holds the purse-strings as far as Iarnrod Eireann are concerned. Whilst welcoming the

doubling of trains from 4 railcars to 8 railcars later in 2007, as a result of the transfer of Intercity Railcars, the fact of the matter is that poor planning by the Minister and insufficient funding has resulted in No Train Services from Maynooth to Docklands, a shortage of 3 trains each morning from Maynooth during peak hours, and it will be late 2007 before increased capacity is provided.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he did not blame Iarnrod Eireann for the delays in the improvement of services. Their funding comes from the Government and they simply have not provided enough to deliver the service improvements promised when Transport 21 was launched in November 2005.

Stagg remains opposed to provision of Satelite village on Meath side of Maynooth

Deputy Emmet Stagg along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged a submission with Meath Co. Council opposing the inclusion of a Target of 500 houses for Maynooth Environs in the Meath County Development Plan 2007-2013.

In a report to Meath Co. Councillors on March 2nd the Meath Co. Manager responded to Deputy Stagg`s submission along with others from Maynooth Community Council and Kildare Co. Council.

In his report the Co. Manager reserved Meath Co. Council's right to approach the Department of Environment in relation to the Preparation of a Joint Local Area Plan. However the Co. Manager stated that he was acutely aware of the differences in the juxtaposition of the environs of Maynooth relative to its Town Centre as compared to the proximity of the environs of Kilcock relative to its Town Centre. Finally the Co. Manager indicated that the Council had made provision in the overall Settlement Strategy to reserve 500 houses for Maynooth Environs in the event of the Joint Local Area Plan identifying a need for same.

Commenting on the Co. Managers Report, which was passed by Meath Co. Councillors on March 2nd, Deputy Stagg stated that Meath Co. Council had accepted that the Meath environs of Maynooth were somewhat removed from Maynooth Town Centre and he was pleased that the Co. Manager qualified the provision of 500 houses in their settlement strategy as being in the event of the identification of a need. However, regretfully, that Target remains in the County Plan passed on March 2nd.

The difficulty stated Deputy Stagg is that there is

nothing to prevent Meath Co. Council from zoning land on the Meath side if Kildare Co. Council does not entertain them in relation to the preparation of a Joint Local Area Plan. Kildare Co. Council can however refuse to provide services for any development on the Meath side, such as sewerage and water services.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that if a Joint Local Area is to be considered at some future date then there will have to be prior agreement reached on the types of development which might be considered acceptable on the Meath side. This would certainly not include the provision of housing which would distort the co-ordinated development of Maynooth Town but could include a Hotel, Tourist Facilities, Retirement Village and some employment generating businesses. It remained however Labour's Objective to convince Meath Co. Council of the non-necessity for development on the Meath side of the Border.

Children wait 4 Months for Hearing Test

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the Waiting Times for Hearing Tests for Children in Co. Kildare.

The Health Services Executive responded on behalf of Minister Harney to Deputy Stagg and indicated that there was a 4 month waiting time at both the Newbridge and Tallaght Health Centres. The Newbridge Health Centre is the only location for hearing tests in Kildare whilst Tallaght serves Celbridge and Leixlip.

Deputy Stagg reacted angrily to the disclosure of the excessive waiting times. He stated that we were now back to the position we were in, in November 2005 when the waiting time was 4 months. Last June the waiting list had been reduced to 3 to 4 weeks when additional clinics were scheduled. From the response by the HSE it is obvious that additional clinics will have to be arranged again to reduce the Waiting Time to 3 to 4 weeks.

Deputy Stagg stated that the delay in carrying out the hearing tests seriously affected the development of children and imposing such waiting times put parents under severe pressure to privately fund tests which is inexcusable given the wealth of our Nation at present.

In conclusion Deputy Stag stated that he would contact the Minister and the HSE in connection with

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the scheduling of additional clinics to reduce the present unacceptable waiting times.

2006 Serious Crime Statistics show 12% increase in Kildare up 74% on 2000 figures

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the Minister for Justice for his appalling record in preventing and tackling crime with confirmation that the Provisional Headline Crime Statistics for the Carlow/Kildare Area show a 12% increase in serious crime in 2006.

Nationally stated Deputy Stagg Serious Crime is up 1.4% but in the Carlow/Kildare Division it has risen by 12% with 5,425 Serious Crimes recorded in 2006. Since 2000 Serious Crime has risen by a startling 74%.

Some of the key areas where increases occurred in the Carlow/Kildare Division are as follows:

- Assaults up 26%
- Sexual Offences up 81%
- Arson up 20%
- Thefts up 19%

The Blame for this spiralling increase in Serious Crime in Kildare, stated Deputy Stagg, can be laid fairly and squarely on the shoulders of the Minister for Justice who presides over the worst manned Garda Division in the State – The Carlow/Kildare Division. We have 1 garda for every 558 people whilst the Clare Division has 1 garda for every 311 people and Donegal 1 for every 312 people.

If we are to tackle crime head on and remove Dublin Gangs from cherry picking in Kildare then we are going to have to increase Garda Manpower stated Deputy Stagg. We need to let the perpetrators of crime know that we are serious about protecting the rights of ordinary hard working families. Unfortunately the present Minister is not up to the job. Lets hope by the Summer he won't be in charge anymore.

New bus services for North Kildare a step nearer

Dublin Bus have previously advised Deputy Emmet Stagg that the provision of additional Bus Services to the North Kildare Towns of Celbridge, Kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip would be dealt with once arrangements for a new service from Adamstown were agreed.

Dublin Bus applied for a licence for the Adamstown Route but this ran into difficulties under Section 25 of the Road Transport Act 1958 as they would have being competing with an existing operator.

Deputy Stagg has now been advised by Dublin Bus that they are submitting a revised licence application to serve Adamstown.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the revised licence application and stated that he would pursue its sanctioning with the Minister for Transport. If the application is granted then Dublin Bus will be in a position to reorganise their fleet allocation with a consequent knock on effect of additional services to North Kildare.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that in 2000 Dublin Bus had sought Government Finance to provide an additional 15 Buses to service North Kildare and he expected the provision of same once the Adamstown Route issue is resolved, given the fact that Dublin Bus now have 100 additional buses.

Government abandon Maynooth Castle— No Screening from Manor Mills— No Phase 2 Restoration

In 2001 stated Deputy Stagg the Government shelved plans for the Phase 2 Restoration of the Castle. This would have involved the provision of a roof on the Keep of the Castle and the provision of an Auditorium. The Auditorium would have been used for Concerts, Films and Theatre in what would have been no doubt a fantastic setting. The Government remain steadfast in their opposition to this project.

Following on from the opening of the Manor Mills Shopping Centre Deputy Stagg made a relatively simple request that additional Trees would be provided along the Northern Boundary to secure the setting of the Castle and lessen the impact which the Modern Buildings have on it, in other words to screen the Castle from the development. But no because of the underlying rich archaeological deposits in the area and the detrimental effect tree planting would have on them, it is not possible to provide the screening.

Deputy Stagg suggested that an Archaeological Dig should be organised, similar to the one undertaken when the stepped entrance to the visitors Centre was constructed, and that if anything interesting was found it could be displayed in the Castle Visitors Centre. The Minister has recently advised Deputy Stagg that there are no plans for any additional archaeological excavations at the Castle.

So the bottom line is that this Government is not interested in developing the true potential of the Castle for the people of Maynooth and visitors to the area. Deputy Stagg vowed to give the Castle the necessary attention it deserves when this wasteful and arrogant Government are booted out by voters in the Summer.

O2 issue counter claims in relation to unauthorised Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. grounds

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his disappointment at the news that Solicitors acting for O2 Communications have indicated to the Council Solicitors that they did not receive the official notification from Kildare Co. Council dated 4th January, 2007, stating that their 4th Retention Planning Application, for the Unauthorised Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, had been declared invalid.

This in turn stated Deputy Stagg means that they believe that they are not in breach of the Court Order served on them for Enforcement by Council Solicitors on January 29th. Legal Advice to the Council now is not to go back to Court to enforce the order as past cases indicate that the Judge will enquire if a planning application is currently before the Council, and if the answer is yes, as in this case, the Judge will say it is premature to decide on the matter whilst a planning application is as yet to be determined. O2 lodged their 5th retention planning application on 5th February last.

An angry and frustrated Deputy Stagg has now along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged an objection to the 5th Retention Planning Application calling on the Council to comprehensively refuse planning permission.

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

For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected , as appropriate.

The first meeting of the New Council will take place on **Monday 18th of June 2007.** This will be an AGM including the election of new officers for the Council. Notices will be sent to all councillors.





Know your rights

Question

I often receive unsolicited post that is addressed to me but that advertises services or products in which I have no interest. Is there anything I can do to avoid receiving this junk mail?

Answer

The Data Protection Act 1988 contains a provision to ensure that people who do not wish to receive direct marketing literature have their privacy respected.

Under section 2(7) of the Data Protection Act, you have the right to have your details removed from a direct marketing database. You should write to the organisation keeping the database and ask for this to be done. The organisation must comply with your request and write back to you within 40 days confirming that your request has been complied with. If you continue to receive marketing material after you have objected, you can make a complaint to the Data Protection Commissioner, Canal House, Station Road, Portarlington, Co Laois. Lo – Call 1890 252 231

If an organisation has not obtained your details directly from you, you are entitled to know what the source was so that you can contact them.

The Irish Direct Marketing Association (IDMA), the representative body for direct marketers in Ireland , operatives a Mailing Preference Service. You can contact the IDMA to ask for your details to be removed from the marketing database of the main direct marketers in Ireland. The IDMA has also instituted a Code of practice setting out the data protection rules that IDMA members must adhere to.

Your details on the electoral register cannot be used for direct marketing unless you choose to make them available for this purpose. You can choose whether or not to do this when you register to vote. An edited version of the electoral register is published listing only those who opt to make their details available in this way. You can check to see if you are on the edited register at your local library or local authority office. Or online at www. checktheregister.ie

Question

I would like to try to reduce my fuel bills by switching my home heating to renewable energy sources. Are there any grants available to encourage homeowner's to reduce carbon dioxide emissions in this way?

Answer

The Greener Homes Scheme provides assistance to homeowners who intend to purchase a new renewable energy heating system for either new or existing homes.

The grants are available for a number of different technologies. Solar panels can be used for home heating or hot water. Heat pumps can transfer heat that is available in the ground air or water around your house. Stoves or boilers that burn wood chips or pellets are also eligible under the scheme.

It may be possible to obtain a second grant where a combination of two technologies makes sense in terms of reduced carbon dioxide emissions, capital costs, value and improved operation.

In order to qualify for the scheme you must obtain approval before starting work or purchasing equipment. The grant will be for a fixed amount towards the cost of purchase of the chosen system and subsequent installation. The amount of the grant will vary depending on the technology used. A list of registered products and installers is available to choose from.

Question

Am I entitled to time off work for Easter?

Answer

Easter Monday is a public holiday so you are entitled to paid leave on that day unless your employer nominates one of the following alternatives an additional day's pay, an additional day of leave; or a paid day off within a month or on the nearest church holiday.

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and business close. You have no automatic entitlement to time of on that day. There are 9 public holidays in Ireland each year: New year's Day (1 January)

Easter Monday
First Monday in May. June and August
Last Monday in October
Christmas Day (25 December)

Easter Monday is the only public holiday with a date that varies significantly from year to year. It falls between 23 March and 26 April each year. In 2007 it falls on 9 April.

Public holiday entitlements apply to staff even if they are not usually scheduled to work on the day of the public holiday. One exception to public holiday entitlement is where part-time staff have worked less than 40 hours in the five weeks before a holiday.

An explanatory booklet on holidays and public holidays is available from the Department of Enterprises. Trade and Employment (lo-call 1890 201 615).

Complaints in relation to holiday entitlements may be referred to the Rights Commissioner at the Labour Relations Commission. Tom Johnson House. Haddington Road, Dublin 4, Lo-call 1890 220 27.

Question

Can you please give me new rates of payment for Child Benefit ?

Answer

Child Benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. It you are from a country in the European Economic Area (EEA) you may be entitled to Child Benefit even if your child is not living in Ireland. If you are not a EEA national then you must satisfy a habitual residency conditions to qualify for the benefits.

To qualify, a child must be dependent on you and must also be;

• Under age 16 or

Aged 16,17, or 18 and attending full-time education or a FAS Yuthreach course or have a physical disability

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living apart, it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2007, the child Benefits are as follows:

The rate of Child Benefit for twins is 1. 5 times the normal monthly rate for each child. For three or more children of multiple birth, the benefit paid is double the normal monthly rate for each child.

Application for Child Benefit is made on form CB1 for children under 16 years of age or from CB2 for a child aged 16 or over. Claim forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office. Post Office or form the Child Benefit Section , Social Welfare Services Office. St Oliver Plunkett Road, Letterkenny , Co Donegal. Lo- call1890 400 400.

Maynooth Tidy Towns win in St. Patrick's Day Parade

For the third year running Maynooth Tidy Towns won one of the best float prizes in the Maynooth St. Patrick's Day Parade. We were awarded the "Best Environmental Float" this year. The committee decided to reduce our combined carbon footprint this year and arrange a float fronted by a wheelbarrow and wheelie bins rather than our usual van. Our main message was to highlight the threat to the two hundred and fifty year old trees in Maynooth's main street following approval by Kildare County Council for a large new commercial development in the town which proposes that the trees be removed to create an extra traffic lane.

Maynooth Primary Schools have all achieved Green Flags

Congratulations to Presentation Girls and Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich who have achieved their first Green Schools Flags within the past year. The Boys National School has recently achieved their second Green Schools Flag which brings them half way to achieving the total number of four flags available. Maynooth is awarded extra points in the National Tidy Towns Competition when our schools achieve Green Flags and we are

delighted with the commitment shown by the teachers and pupils alike and we will keep you posted on further progress.

Maynooth Tidy Towns – Work Plan for 2007 in full swing

Tidy Towns is more about enhancement rather than litter picking and for 2007 two of our major landscaping projects are planned for O'Neill Park and the river in Parsons Street. O'Neill Park/ Tesco complex is a prominent site in the town and we have started the work on enhancing that area. The river in Parsons Street was cleaned out a number of years ago, but has fallen into a neglected state again. In addition to these new projects we will be keeping our existing sites around the town. More details on these later.

Sunday Morning/mid week cleaning has recommenced

On the Sunday after Easter we started back on our Sunday Morning clean ups around the town centre. This is essentially a weekly litter picking in the town centre and includes areas such as the Straffan Road and the Moyglare Road. On Wednesday evenings we meet at 7.30pm at Supervalu and we take on a piece of work such as area cleanups or small enhancement projects. The committee would welcome your help on either Sundays or Wednesdays. On Sundays we have a rota system where people only come out on one Sunday in three. The more people that we have the easier it is for all. See separate notice.

Hanging Baskets should "be in bloom by June"

For the last number of years Maynooth Tidy Towns with the support of the business community and others have put in place the hanging baskets in the town centre and maintained them. Plans are being put in place again this year all being well. This is a major annual project for us with substantial costs involved. Last year we did not ask the local businesses for financial support but we are reviewing the situation at present to see how we can fund this project in 2007. We are grateful for financial support for all our projects but with this one we put all the funds raised back into the town so if anybody would like to sponsor this project we would be delighted to hear from you.

organisation. Maynooth has taken part in the league for the past three years and out of the fifty three towns judged by An Taisce in November 2006, Maynooth came in at number fifty two just ahead of Dublin City. Many people criticise the league which measures the environmental work of local authorities stating that it is too strict. What happens is that they measure litter at ten locations in the town centre and then rate each area. We outline below the detail of the Maynooth judging in November and at the end we show the table of towns judged in the league. Maynooth Tidy Towns fear that the bad reputation that a town gets in this league will damage business especially tourism in Maynooth. However, it is time to stop blaming the messenger and for Kildare County Council to suitably resource the town of our size with more staff to maintain it and to extend the areas cleaned. The existing staff is excellent but more people are needed to tackle the task.

Maynooth IBAL Results, Nov. 2006:

There has been a general deterioration in Maynooth. It has scored very poorly coming very much at the bottom of the anti-litter league. It was the only town / city with no excellent sites. There were three areas with a serious litter problem. What is particularly disappointing is that a couple of these sites had scored reasonably well during previous litter surveys e.g. Public Park and Railway Station — Outside. The Main Street was the third site with a serious litter problem — the overall appearance was dirty and much of the litter appears to be the result of drinking at the weekend. Maynooth North Campus and Maynooth College (Old) had scatterings of litter which took away from otherwise well maintained environments.

Kilcock Approach Road (R148): Moderately Littered.

Some light scatterings of food related litter prevented this busy stretch of road from getting a better litter classification. A more thorough approach to cleaning could make all the difference here.

St. Mary's Boys National School – Outside and Inside: Moderately Littered.

The overall impression here is of an area which is well kept and carefully maintained. With just a little extra effort by those using the area this could be a perfect site. The installation of litter awareness notices may help, particularly as the main litter was fast-food wrappings.

Maynooth North Campus — Inside: Moderately Littered.

The high standards attained during previous litter surveys have dropped slightly with scatterings of a wide variety of litter on the extensive grounds. This is disappointing as the area is well served by litter bins and capable of doing so much better.

Maynooth College - Old: Moderately Littered.

As with the above site the area is well served by litter bins (and some recycling bins). Just some small traces of fast-food wrappers, plastic bottles and cigarette butts took away from an otherwise very good site.

Main Street: Serious Litter Problem.

The overall appearance of this street was dirty. Not only were there heavy levels of litter but the bins and seating areas were in very poor condition. The footpath was neglected around the base of the trees and chewing gum / cigarettes were both very obvious along the path. It would seem that much of the litter is the result of drinking at the weekend – according to a porter at Maynooth College it is always the same after the weekend.

Public Park in Maynooth – Pound Park: Serious Litter Problem.

The picture here is again somewhat depressing. A big effort was evident during previous litter survey earlier in the year but the situation has deteriorated again. Clearly a more sustained and thorough effort is required on an on-going basis.

Maynooth Railway Station — Outside: Serious Litter Problem.

This was a very disappointing site. There was litter strewn along the roadside and the wall from the town and at the station entrance. The overall appearance was very poor and this is a shame as it has previously scored quite well during previous litter surveys.

Maynooth Railway Station – Inside: Moderately Littered.

Overall, the inside of the station has seen big improvements over the years. The area is well served by litter bins / cigarette butt disposal units. Just some light scatterings of fast food wrappers, plastic bags and plastic bottles took away from an otherwise well maintained environment.

Moyglare Road: Moderately Littered.

On the whole this is generally quite a good stretch of road, but there is a small, but persistent, presence of litter. There were three litter bins along the area surveyed and they were in need of some attention.

Frost protection


May Day Origins

alled Beltane by the Celts, Walpurgis by the Tuetons, and Floralia by the Romans, May festivals were a time of "wearing of the green." Throughout the Northern Hemisphere, the month of May is a time to celebrate renewal of life. May is named for Maia, grandmother, the Goddess of death and fertility. Maia scorns marriage, so it is a good idea to put weddings off until June. Although less stern goddesses now oversee May Festivities, wreaths and baskets of Hawthorn are still used in some May festivals in Maia's honour.

The May-pole is the most familiar feature of May festivities, but it has three distinct interpretations. In some cultures, the May-pole represented the world centre, or alternately, the hub of the Wheel of heaven. In ancient times, the intricate dance of weaving cords around the pole was a magical attempt to direct Nature, which had become topsy-turvy over the course of time, back in order. Today the dance is performed by any who wish to participate in weaving the magic.


In other cultures, the May-pole was the Tree of Life, or a symbol of it. And this tree - to borrow a phrase from Billy Holiday—bore strange fruit. This is where the Saviour was sacrificed in order to cleanse the earth. Holy Communion, eating his flesh and drinking his blood was possibly restricted to the priest class, but symbolic May Wine was liberally imbibed by the whole community. Hundreds of years later, the Christian lunar festival of Easter would replace the ancient solar festival as the time of renewal and rebirth.

The third meaning of the May-pole most clearly remains today. It is the phallus, the male principle of fertilization. Female principles are represented by baskets and wreaths used in the dances around the pole. In the past times, the hand-fasting movements of the dances would give the young license to 'go into



the green 'together. In some regions, a merlin, or renegade friar, would preside over the mock marriages. Even today, unwed couples consummate the mock marriages performed around the May-pole. Merry-begats, as they were called in England, were usually not acknowledge by their fathers. These babies were said to have been fathered by god.

Celebrated for thousands of years ago throughout diverse cultures, Mayday could be the most ancient religious in the Northern Hemisphere. Ritual human sacrifice to a death/fertility goddess was certainly practiced until the 1st Century BCE. As nature became less fearsome, and more cultivated, the nature goddess became less powerful and bloodthirsty. Today, we still celebrate the remnants of an ancient religion, Nature turning on the Wheel of Heaven.

Features



BLOG or **WEB LOG**

A blog (short for "web log") is a type of web page that serves as a publicly accessible personal journal (or log) for an individual. Typically updated daily, blogs often reflect the personality of the author. As there is no editing of blogs, anything goes, so beware!

BROWSE

To follow links in a page, to shop around in a page, exploring what's there, a bit like window shopping. The opposite of browsing a page is **searching** it. When you search a page, you find a search box, enter terms, and find all occurrences of the terms throughout the site. When you browse, you have to guess which words on the page pertain to your interests. Searching is usually more efficient, but sometimes you find things by browsing that you might not find because you might not think of the "right" term to search by.

BROWSERS

Browsers are software programs that enable you to view



WWW .documents. Microsoft Internet Explorer (called simply IE), Mozilla, Firefox,, and Opera are examples of browsers that enable you to view text and images and many other WWW features. They are software that must be installed on your computer. However Explorer comes already installed on all computers running Windows.

CACHE

In browsers, "cache" is used to identify a space where web pages you have visited are stored in your computer. A copy of documents you retrieve is stored in cache. When you use **GO**, **BACK**, or any other means to revisit a document, the browser first checks

to see if it is in cache and will retrieve it from there, because it is much faster than retrieving it from the server.

COOKIE

A message from a WEB
SERVER computer, sent to
and stored by your browser
on your computer. When
your computer consults the original server
computer, the cookie is sent back to the
server, allowing it to respond to you according to the cookie's contents. The main use for
cookies is to provide customised Web Pages
according to a profile of your interests

DOWNLOAD

The transfer of a file or information from one place to another. This generally means transferring information from the Internet to your own computer. However it is also used to describe transferring, (downloading) images from your camera to your computer or from your computer to your MP3 player.

LINK

thought of as the technology that connects two Web pages or Web sites. They are most commonly seen on your browser as underlined words, and when you move your mouse over the link it, (the mouse) changes into a hand.

Links are also referred to as hyperlinks, hypertext, and hot links.

LISTSERVERS

A discussion group method that permits you to subscribe, and receive and participate in discussions via e-mail. Blogs and RSS Feeds provide some of the ways LISTSERVERS communicate

their content.

NEWSGROUP

A discussion group operated through the Internet. Not to be confused with

LISTSERVERS which operate through e-mail.

PDF or .PDF or PDF file

Abbreviation for Portable Document Format, a File Format developed by Adobe Systems, that is used to let you view almost any kind of document with the formatting intact, so you see it exactly as it was created even, if you don't have the software that created it.

PODCAST

i**POD** broad **CAST**) An audio broadcast that has been converted to an MP3 file or other audio file format for playback in a digital music player or computer. The "pod" in podcast was coined from "iPod," the predominant portable, digital music player, and although podcasts are mostly verbal, they may contain music.

Podcasting Anything and Everything

Podcasting is not just for on-going broadcasts, rather the term is used for recording anything and everything to be played back in a digital player. (MP3) "Sound seeing" is the audio recording of a person's experiences when travelling.

RSS

RSS is a family of Web_Feed, (see below) formats used to publish frequently updated digital content, such as blogs, news feeds or podcasts..

SERVER, WEB SERVER

A computer connected to the Internet, so that it can provide documents via the World Wide Web. Also called HOST Computer. Web servers are the closest equivalent to what in the print world is called the "publisher" of a print document. An important difference is that most print publishers carefully edit the content, and quality of their publications, in an effort to market them and future publications. This convention is not required in the Web World, where anyone

can be a publisher; careful evaluation of Web pages is therefore mandatory. Also called a "Host."

WEBSITE

An information resource on the World Wide Web. Websites may provide information on any topic.

WEB FEED

A **Web Feed** is a data format used for serving users frequently updated content. Content distributors *syndicate* a Web Feed, thereby allowing users to *subscribe* to it. Making a collection of Web Feeds accessible in one spot is known as *Aggregation*.

Web feeds are operated by many news Web Sites, Weblogs, Schools, and Podcasters.

Gluten Free



Sundried Tomato Bread

Ingredients

200g Gluten free white flour

1 tsp Salt

3 tsp Gluten Free baking powder

284ml Buttermilk

3 eggs

1 tsp Tomato puree

2 tsp Olive oil

50g Sundried tomatoes in oil

25g Parmesan Cheese



Heat the oven to 160c/gas 4. Mix the flour, salt and baking powder in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, whisk together the buttermilk, eggs, tomato puree, and oil. Fold the wet ingredients into the dry, then add the sundried tomatoes and half the parmesan.

Grease a 900g loaf tin and pour in the mixture. Sprinkle the remaining parmesan on top and bake for 50-minutes or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Turn out onto a wire rack to cool.

Beef Rounders

Ingredients

2 tbsp Olive Oil

1 Large Onion,

1 Medium Carrot,

2 Celery sticks,

500g Beef mince

A few sprigs of fresh thyme

400g Can of Tomatoes with juice

150ml Beef Stock

1 tbsp Woresterchire sauce Handful of chopped parsley

For the Topping

225g Gluten free flour
1/2 tsp Gluten free baking powder
50g Butter
50g Red cheese
1tsp fresh thyme leaves
1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
150ml low fat natural yogurt.

Method

Put the onions in a frying pan and cook until soft. Add chopped carrot and celery, and cook until lightly browned. Mix in the mince, breaking it up with a spoon. Cook, stirring often, until the meat is browned. Add the thyme, tomatoes, stock, Worcestershire sauce and parsley, and season to taste. Cover tightly and simmer for 15 minutes. Preheat the oven to 200c/gas 6.

Sift the flour and baking powder and rub in the butter. Add the cheese and herbs, then the yogurt, and mix to a soft dough. Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead lightly. Roll to about 1cm thick and cut out 9 rounds.

Tip the mince mixture into an ovenproof dish. Casually arrange the dough circles on top of the mince and brush with egg or milk. Bake for about 20-25 minutes until the topping is risen and golden brown and the filling is bubbling.

Remember to check all labels on packets and tins and look for the gluten free symbol.



Thanks to our Sponsors David Mahony and to all who attended and supported this outing.



15 New Buses for Lucan and North Kildare still parked in the Garage

The 15 buses of the 100 buses purchased by Dublin Bus earmarked for the Lucan Road Corridor which includes, Leixlip, Celbridge, Maynooth & Kilcock were delivered to Dublin Bus last December, however they remain parked in the Garage rather than in use on the routes in question.

They were identified as needed in the Dublin Bus Network Review and were to be used in the most rapidly developing area's. Dublin Bus have confirmed to me today that they have applied for a license for Adamstown but have not even commenced consideration for North Kildare and will not do so until Summer at the earliest. The review will look at the area in its totality and consider for example ways of creating connections between Celbridge and Leixlip where none exists at present, it will consider locations such as Moyglare Road for a new service and increasing service on Easton Road where there is just one peak time bus service morning and evening.

A private operator (Morton's) was granted a license last October to operate a new service (every 20 mins) out of Celbridge, the service is now up and running, until the service is really established the Department of Transport wont allow Dublin Bus introduce any changes that might impact in any way with the private operator. The license was granted under the 1932 act and is very restrictive. The Department of Transport micro manage in that they are the ones that give the green light for any timetable changes even small ones.

The Lucan Road Corridor is the flashpoint in that the same impediments are not present in other parts of the network or where they are to a much lesser extent. Dublin Bus will be looking at the totality of the service in North Kildare during the Summer and for example there is no bus service between Celbridge and Leixlip but there is a lot of people employed in Intel & HP who live in Celbridge. Dublin Bus have been in consultation with Maynooth College and have jointly identified a turning facility which will be used when the 15 buses come into use, realistically this will be in the Autumn at the earliest.

"What is occurring is similar to what happened in the UK which has led to the Bus Wars in particular locations such as Manchester. What seems to have been forgotten in all of this is the commuter this is competition gone mad".

Murphy & McGrath criticise stated Government position on Voter Equality

Independent TDs Catherine Murphy (Kildare North and Finian McGrath (Dublin North Central) have today harshly criticized the failure by Government to comment on the issue of voter equality highlighted by the two last weeks in their initiation of High Court Proceedings contesting the constitutionality of Dáil Constituencies established through the Electoral (Amendment) Act, 2005. McGrath and Murphy today issued a letter to the Minister for the Environment and the Attorney General, joint respondents to the High Court action lodged by solicitor Eddie McGarr on Thursday the 5th of April 2007, criticizing strongly the inaccuracy of the only comment made by either respondent which stated that a constituency redraw could only be initiated by the final censes figures which would not be released until next week.

"The final censes figures were published on the 29th of March 2007 but comments by a spokesperson of the Department of the Environment to RTE on Monday the 9th of April that these figures are not due for release until the end of April suggests that the Government is unaware of this. They're stalling and trying to sweep this issue under the carpet to usurp the power of the citizens of this country to elect a Government in an open and proportionate manner. It's a disgrace and we've written to them to convey our dismay at their cavalier attitude to the fundamental rights of citizens of this country."

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Murphy Cities "Great Concern" over affordable housing system

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) yesterday in the Dáil cited her "great concern" at the fact that only 25% of apartment dwellers surveyed in recent Dublin City Council Quality of Life Survey are happy to live in apartments in the future, while at the same time Kildare County Council continues, almost exclusively, to acquire 2 bedroom apartments for allocation under its Social and Affordable Schemes. In a later statement Murphy highlighted the problems faced by the lack of variation in housing size or type being made available by Kildare county council:

"While a two bed apartment is suitable for some social or affordable housing applicants it doesn't suit everyone, for example growing families and, particularly in the case of affordable homes that cannot be sold within 20 years of the purchase without incurring a financial claw back. In only offering homes of this size we're creating a whole new set of problems for the future. It's vital that the affordable housing scheme is changed so that those needing to trade up are allowed to do so without being subject to the claw back and it's also vital that the Government ensures that the Councils can afford to purchase, and in turn offer, homes of various different shapes and sizes to accommodate all applicants."

Murphy made the following statement in the Dáil on the 28th of March 2007

"The majority of social and affordable housing units acquired by Kildare County Council have been small, two-bedroom apartments. The result of a Dublin City Council quality of life survey indicate that only 25% of apartment dwellers in Dublin still expect to be living in a flat in the future, a cause of great concern. I call on the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government to ensure the way in which Part V social and affordable housing is delivered is changed to track the number of units delivered but also the variety of housing types and sizes made available to applicants."

Double Yellow Lines at Parklands/Castlebridge

Residents will be aware that Cllr. John McGinley allocated €9,000 from his Discretionary Grants for the painting of double yellow lines on both sides of this road in the interest of public safety. The Area Engineer stated at a public meeting that she expected to get the work done in February, weather permitting. When Cllr. John McGinley enquired as to why this did not happen he was advised by the engineer that "a drawing was required in order for the painting to proceed" and that the Roads Design Section of the Council had been asked to do the drawing.

Cllr. McGinley has pointed out that it is ridiculous that a drawing has to be provided for such basic work as painting yellow lines. The Area Engineer has advised John that there should not be much of a delay.

Removal of Bollards at the Bottom of Old Greenfield

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee on 20th April:

"That the bollards at the bottom of Old Greenfield, Maynooth be removed for the following reasons:

- 1. They were put there as a temporary measure, to stop the rat run to the Straffan Road, until the Meadowbrook Link Road was opened.
- 2. There will be reduced traffic on the Straffan Road to Main Street as residents of Old Greenfield will be able to go via Bond Bridge and go to the M4 via the Meadowbrook Link Road.
- 3. It will help eliminate the anti-social activity at the bollards.
- 4. The residents of Old Greenfield want them removed as they then will:
- 5. Have two access roads to the Straffan Road. They will be able to go to the town via Bond Bridge without having to wait to get onto the Straffan Road."

New Public Lighting at The Harbour & CCTV at The Playground

Following a campaign by Cllr. John McGinley ducting is at present being laid for new public lighting at The Harbour, Maynooth and for CCTV Cameras for the Children's Playground. The Council have provided €35,000 for this work, and Waterways Ireland are playing a very active role, and The Royal Canal Amenity Group are doing the Civil Works.

The new lighting will make this highly pedestrian area much safer and along with the CCTV cameras, anti social activity in the area should come to an end.

Less than 1% of pupils in Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth National Schools in classes of less than 20 Stagg tells Dáil

Labour Deputy Emmet Stagg speaking in the Dáil on a Labour Private Members Motion on Wednesday 21st March outlined some startling figures in relation to Class Sizes in our National Schools and roundly condemned the Government for their failure to reduce class sizes for under 9`s to 20.

In his speech Deputy Stagg stated that we were now a rich country and could afford to provide the very best opportunities for our children and young people. The future well-being and prosperity of our nation was dictated by its investment in the education and cultural development of its youth.

Fianna Fail in Government had failed to live up to their promises on the reduction in class sizes for 10 years and why, declared Deputy Stagg, should the public believe them now.

Outlining some startling figures which were provided by the I.N.T.O. Deputy Stagg told the Dáil that:

- Some pupils are 6 before a place is provided for them in National Schools in Kildare North.
- In Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth, with 4,949 Pupils in our National Schools at present, only 35 pupils are in classes of less than 20. That's 0.7%. Yes less than 1%.
- In Kildare North there are 1,972 children in classes of 20 to 24 pupils, 6,408 in classes of 25 to 29 pupils and 3,854 children in classes of 30 or more pupils.
- The average class size in Kildare North at 27.1 pupils to each class is the highest in the country.

Deputy Stagg stated that the parents of these children as taxpayers, had given the Minister money to do her duty but that she had failed miserably to do so.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg commended Labour Deputy O`Sullivan's motion to the House and thanked the I.N.T.O. for its vigorous campaign and assistance in providing statistics.

Deputy O'Sullivan, for tabling the motion enabling us to have this debate.

We are lucky to live in a rich country which has the resources to provide world-class services for its people but this did not become a rich country by chance. In the relatively short period from 1994 to 1997 Deputy Quinn, as Minister for Finance, laid the foundations for and developed the successful economy that gives the State riches beyond its dreams. As a result, we can afford to provide the very best opportunities for our children and young people. The future well-being and prosperity of a nation are dictated by its investment in the education and cultural development of its youth. The foundation of that investment in our future is the funding and resourcing of primary education for our children. The State recognises this fact, as is evident in free universal access to primary education for all children.

That was the case until this crowd of wasters got their hands on the resources provided by the taxpayer. The Progressive Democrats should not be blamed for this because Fianna Fáil pledged to reduce class sizes to 20 pupils for children under nine years of age. This pledge was made in 1997 and 2002 but on neither occasion was the promise kept. Not only did Fianna Fáil break its pledge to the children of this country but the Minister for Education and Science, Deputy Hanafin, also arrogantly announced shortly after her appointment that she had no intention of fulfilling her party's undertaking on class size reduction. Fianna Fáil now has the cheek and breathtaking arrogance to repeat this pledge again. Does it think people are total fools? Does the Minister believe they will swallow the lies for the third time running? I assure her they will not be fooled again. God help the poor, innocent Fianna Fáil candidates in north Kildare.

I want to inform the Minister of the effect of her broken promises and failure to keep her repeated pledges on the children of north Kildare who attend school in the largest classes in Ireland, far exceeding any elsewhere in Europe. Some reach six years of age by the time they get a place in such classes. In Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth combined there are only 35 children in classes of less than 20 pupils. This gives the lie to the Taoiseach's suggestion this morning that many children are in such classes. In those three towns there is a total of 4,900 pupils, of whom less than 1% are in classes of less than 20. In north Kildare there are 1,972 children in classes of 20 to 24 pupils, 6,408 in classes of 25 to 29 pupils and 3,854 in classes of 30 pupils and higher. The average class size in north Kildare is 27.1. Ten years after the first Fianna Fáil commitment this is a shocking indictment of its failure.

Despite their best efforts, teachers cannot teach classes of 30 to 35 children. Our children suffer as a result. The effect of this on children, their life prospects and right to develop to their full potential is far reaching and most harmful to them. Such class sizes damage the foundation of education progress and makes it more difficult for children to develop to the second and third stages. The parents of these children, as taxpayers, have given the Minister money to do her duty but she has failed miserably to do so.

I commend Deputy O'Sullivan's motion to the House and thank the INTO for its vigorous campaign and assistance in providing statistics for my contribution.

Bus network review in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge commences

Following enquiries from Deputy Emmet Stagg concerning the extension of Bus Services to the Newtown and Moyglare Areas of Maynooth Dublin Bus have advised that they have commenced a Network Review of all bus services in the Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge Areas.

Deputy Stagg had pointed out to Dublin Bus that with the opening of the Meadowbrook Link and the completion of the New Bond Bridge that Dublin Bus should examine the possibility of extending bus services to the 1,000 homes in the Newtown Area. He also indicated that there were 500 houses on the Moyglare Road and a further 400 under construction and that a service was required in that part of Maynooth which was isolated from the remainder of the town. The extension of Additional Bus Services to the Easton Area of Leixlip is also required.

Dublin Bus indicated to Deputy Stagg that initial studies will be completed in the coming months and that a draft plan would be submitted to the Department of Transport by the latter quarter of 2007 with implementation of changes to commence in January 2008.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the commencement of the Review and that in tandem with the additional 15 buses which North Kildare expects to receive to increase capacity in the area we will also now have in place a local network to service the extended population areas of the Towns in North Kildare.

Stagg welcomes refusal of permission for Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. grounds

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Kildare Co. Council to refuse planning permission to O2 Communications for the retention of their unauthorised mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

Having been served with an Enforcement Order in December, 2004, and having submitted 4 Invalid Planning Applications, at their 5th Attempt O2 put in a valid application which has now been refused planning permission by Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg.

The Council refused planning permission for the following reasons:

- Having regard to the provisions of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 which states that Telecommunications Masts will not be permitted in the vicinity of schools or residential areas, the proposed development would contravene this policy and would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.
- Having Regard to the location of the proposed development, close to existing buildings, residences and on lands zoned Open Space and Amenity in the Maynooth Development Plan 2002, it is considered that the proposal is contrary to the spirit, intentions and provisions of the 1996 Telecommunications Guidelines, the Kildare Co. Development Plan and the Maynooth Development Plan 2002. The proposed development would set an undesirable precedent for further similar development in the area and would be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.

Deputy Stagg stated that he was pleased that at last the Council were in a position to decide on this issue under the Planning Laws. O2 will certainly appeal this decision to An Bord Pleanala and Deputy Stagg vowed to continue the battle there against this unacceptable development.

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Useful Tips

Homemade Cleaning Products.

Furniture Polish

Mix in a sprayer bottle

1 Cup of Olive Oil 1/2 Cup of Lemon Juice

Shake well and apply a small amount to a flannel cleaning cloth. Spread evenly over furniture and use a fresh cloth to dry and polish.

Glass Cleaner.

Mix in a sprayer bottle

- 1 Cup Rubbing alcohol
- 1 Cup water
- 1 Tablespoon white vinegar

Homemade Toilet Cleaner

1/4 Cup Baking soda 1/4 Cup liquid detergent

1/4 Cup warm water

Mix together the baking soda, liquid detergent, and water in a bowl. Use a toilet brush to apply the cleaner inside the bowl. You can let the solution soak inside the bowl for as long as you like, or you can immediately swish it around with the brush before flushing. If badly soiled leave soaking overnight.

Vinegar Cleaning Tips.

- Paint brushes can be cleaned by simmering in vinegar and washed with hot soapy water.
- 2. Brighten you wash by adding 1/2 cup of vinegar to the rinse cycle.
- 3. To clean your microwave, boil 1/4 cup of vinegar and 1 cup water. Rub around all areas and leave for an hour before wiping clean.
- 4. You can make your own furniture cleaner by mixing 1 part vinegar to 3 parts lemon iuice.
- 5. Clean dentures by soaking them overnight in white vinegar.

Furniture Protection Tips.

Protect furnishings from the sun and strong natural light as this will cause fibre degeneration and colour fade. Occasionally, dyes can fade from impurities within the atmosphere such as cigarette smoke, cooking fumes etc.

Rearrange the furniture and turn cushions occasionally to ensure even wear of the cushions, and fabrics.

Take care when wearing clothing that could cause dye transfer, such as jeans etc. Dye transfers on to light coloured furniture and can be difficult to remove.

Place your furniture a minimum of two feet away from a radiator or other heat source.

Avoid using or placing sharp objects on leather goods. Leather is very durable, but not accident or damage proof.

Oldest tip for the month of May

Never cast a clout till May is out Clean leather with good quality upholstery leather cleaner, preferably once a month if the furniture is used Dáily, but at least four times a year. Sponge gently until all the grime and stains are lifted, and wipe over the surface with clean, dry white towelling to absorb the soiling.

Quick Laundry Tips

Wash your delicate clothes in a pillow case instead of buying a special lingerie bag. Place the clothes in the pillowcase (an old, thin one works best), and tie a knot in the end. Run your washing machine on the delicate or the shortest wash cycle.

A piece of stale bread will remove fresh spots on leather and suede gloves. Just rub the spots with the bread.

Make sure you have not wet or damp articles in the laundry basket. The items next to the wet article will get mildew. I this happens rub the article with white vinegar and lemon juice. Saturate the stains. Sprinkle salt on the area and scrub in (use lots of salt). Place article in sun to dry. This may need a few treatments, but it eventually works. The mildew will eventually come out.



PUBLIC SAFETY ASSOCIATION Meeting at the GLENROYAL HOTEL

April 23RD 2007

I was pleased to attend the Public meeting organised by Mr. Vic Murphy, of the newly formed Public Safety Association at the Glenroyal Hotel Monday 23rd April. This association as I understand it has been set up by citizens concerned for the safety of the people of Maynooth and I also understand that one of its members children has been the victim of a vicious unprovoked assault which resulted in serious injury to the child and the hospitalisation of the secondary school going student.

Maynooth is a progressive Town with a lot going for it. Its an attractive historical Town with many varied attractive Historical Buildings and Land Marks, such as Carton House, Carton estate itself, Carton Avenue, The Geraldine Castle, the tree lined Main St., and St. Patricks College. The University has some 6,000 students plus 1,000 staff. The population of Maynooth is approx. 13,000. Both Maynooth Town and the University are expanding and undergoing further development. These expansions bring many welcome benefits and rewards in the form of better social activities, services and increased business activity.

Unfortunately, along with this welcome increase in business and services, modern day anti-social behaviour has rapidly increased. Also damage to property, damage to business premises, shop fronts, drink and drug parties in amenity areas of the Town, which defaces and destroy those amenity areas and adversely affect residential areas and the residents peace of mind. Damage to Children's Play Ground and the play areas. Threatening of commuters using the Harbour area on their way from the Train Station. People who live close or adjacent to trouble spots are fearful to leave their homes after dark or are fearful on their way home after dark. People are being threatened, assaulted and some viciously attacked. A number of violent robberies have taken place during this period.

THIS BEHAVIOUR IS ABSOLUTELY UNACCEPTABLE. THIS BEHAVIOUR MUST STOP AND IT WILL STOP. The peace and stability of the Community is paramount. The protection of the people and their environment comes 1^{st} . No bunch of hoodlums are going to wreck the lives of the people of Maynooth or take over sections of this town and create 'no go' areas.

The Gardai in Maynooth are doing their best. Besides the large number of young adults from Maynooth and the University, a large number of young people are drawn into the Town, and the Gardai's handling of increased numbers of revellers, on certain nights of the week is to be commended. A lot of this anti-social behaviour and vicious attacks happen largely in the amenity areas, which are pedestrianised and inaccessible by the Gardai patrol car. Besides that, in order to apprehend offenders you need to get victims to make statements against attackers. Victims of assault are mostly under threat of reprisals if they report the incident, or give evidence against their attacker. In this regard there is only so much the Gardai can do, and effectively the Gardai's hands are tied without victim statements.

A new initiative was needed. Last year, members of the Business Association and a Member of the University staff began talking and looking at the escalation of robberies, violence and anti-social behaviour and damage to shop fronts, and flags during RYDER CUP week. Out of their discussions was born the idea of Community CCTV. It is this type of positive thinking and action that is required to help Gardai function in their duties, and this sort of initiative will bring the Community and Gardai closer and should result with positive benefits in return. The Gardai need this integration and co-operation with the CCTV Steering Committee and the Executives of the Public Safety Association, and the Community at large to tackle, and stamp out all forms of anti-social behaviour. MAKE NO MISTAKE, if the Steering Committee and The Public Safety Association liase closely with the Gardai, THIS INITIATIVE WILL WORK.

Members of the Business Association began pursuing the Community CCTV idea in November 2006. The Minister for Justice has set up funding to the tune of 70% grant aid to finance the set up and implementation of Community CCTV schemes through POBAL. There are 2 stages of application, and the Maynooth Business Association have successfully had their 1st stage application in before the deadline date of end February 2006. If their stage one application is successful, things will start to happen guickly and the Business Association will hold Public meetings at which a large amount of information will be available to the Community. This will be well publicised and you will learn a lot more in due course, if and when, the application is approved. You can be assured this will be done properly. The Business Association are a professional lot.

I would like to congratulate the Maynooth Business Association Executive and in particular Ms. Brid Feely, who came to me before Christmas seeking my assistance with the application. There are 3 mandatory conditions, and Brid Feely stated that my help and input was vital, and the application would not make the deadline date without my help and influence. I was only too delighted to assist, and I discussed the initiative and got written approval from the Chief Superintendent. I set up a meeting with Mr Des Page and members of the Maynooth Business Association Executive at which I also attended. Together we went through the procedures carefully and methodically, and at this stage, I would like to sincerely thank the Chief Superintendent and Mr Des Page for their positivity and support. At that meeting, and subsequently, I spoke with Mr Des Page about improved lighting for the Harbour Area, and mentioned to him the importance that any lighting which would be introduced would be compatible with the function of CCTV cameras. I also asked Mr Page to talk with Waterways Ireland on the possibility of laying extra cable, along with the lighting cable to facilitate the implementation of additional cameras, which may be introduced. The Children's Playground is another area that has been adversely affected by anti-social behaviour, and we already have in our application plans for a 360 degree vision camera in this area. I am wondering if enough thought went into deciding the suitability of the location of the playground for a number of reasons, but I won't go into that tonight. I will also be in touch with Waterways Ireland during the coming week, as I am concerned about adequate lighting for the Canal Walkway. That is the walkway between the Harbour Field and Bond Bridge. That walkway absolutely needs good lighting, not only to address anti-social behaviour, but also from a public safety point of view. The residents of Parson Lodge, the Apartments at Bond Bridge and residents of Parson Street are also directly affected by anti-social behaviour on the canal walkway I am referring to. These residents can rest assured, I will pursue this matter until I get a satisfactory result and peace is restored to their area.

I am delighted to be involved in this positive approach in dealing with anti-social behaviour and its fantastic to be helping people to help themselves deal with a dangerous and serious public nuisance that is anti-social behaviour. I am now working with and for the Business Association for their Stage 2 Application and we are well into the second stage of the application. I would like to thank the Business Association executive for their time and diligence. Its not easy to set time aside for this time consuming initiative when you are trying to run a business as well.

I have had discussions with Brid Feely about future expansion of the Community CCTV network of

cameras. In the event additional cameras are required for additional areas and I am glad to be in a position to help, and be involved in their next stage of application, as well as possible expansion of the scheme. I will work with the Superintendent, the Local Authority and the Steering Committee and we will gauge how effective the scheme is working?

The perpetrators of violence and anti-social behaviour pick their areas and targets carefully. I AM COMMITTING MY HELP AND SUPPORT to the Business Association and the Gardai are also committed to following up and tackling areas or new areas that might evolve as anti-social behaviour 'black spots' in the future.

I want to recognise Brid Feely and her colleagues in the Business Association executive for their concerted action in putting forward CCTV as part of the solution to anti-social behaviour. We need more people to stand out in our Communities and make such positive social contributions to our society.

To all the other towns in North Kildare with anti-social behaviour problems, I say, I am here to help. I will be only too delighted to help just as I did the Maynooth Business Association. I would be only too happy to assist Naas, Leixlip, Celbridge and others in any help they may require in the event they consider Community CCTV to be the answer in dealing with the sort of anti-social behaviour that Maynooth is experiencing.

Hopefully Maynooth will be successful in its application and it will be interesting to follow developments in the future. I particularly look forward to communicating with the Superintendent after the CCTV system has been put in place and monitoring its effectiveness. I have no doubt in the potential of Community CCTV to be a very effective tool in helping the Gardai deal with violence, assault, robberies and anti-social behaviour.

The May meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 14th May in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Maynooth Fairtrade Town Launch

Peter Connell said Maynooth has now reached the criteria needed and has now gained Fairtrade Status. He said that a group of people came together about three years ago and that this was the results of all their hard work. He said the meeting was well attended: he also noted that a big group of school children were present. Also in attendance were Catherine Murphy TD and Emmet Stagg TD. Peter then explained that 12 outlets in Maynooth now sell Fairtrade produce. He also staited that the Celtic Tiger hasn't taken people over and people want to buy these goods.

Rosemary Zenner gave a short talk on one area she visited in Bangladesh. She said that Bangladesh is more or less the same size as Ireland but with a huge population difference. Bangladesh has 140 million people while Ireland has only 4 million in comparison. The children from Gaelscoil gave a lovely performance depicting people working in Fairtrade industries. Peter Gaynor, Director of Fairtrade Ireland, also gave a short talk and congratulated Maynooth and all involved.

Peter Connell thanked all concerned with this project: the supermarkets for stocking the goods: places like the Glenroyal Hotel and NUI Maynooth: The Community Council for endorsing the project and the office for using the goods.

It was then brought to everyone's attention that Peter Connell was resigning from the Community Council. This news was received with some shock and Peter explained that he has now moved to Celbridge and that he will commence to annoy them over there. Many tributes were paid to Peter for his many years of service to Maynooth and the Community Council. He has served as Vice- Chairperson and was involved with the Newsletter for many years. A vote of thanks was extended to him by Secretary Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin.

Tidy Towns

Paul Croghan said they are now out every Wednesday night and that they will be looking at new projects for the town. The flower baskets will be done as soon as possible after the elections with the hope that all posters and ties will be removed as soon as possible. There was a good attendance at their AGM gaining them a lot of new members. The response from children is very good he said and it shows in schools getting their green flags. Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes Know your rights

Question

I have checked the Register of Electors and I am not on it. Can I still register to vote in the next general election?

Answer

In order to vote in an election, you must be registered. A draft Electoral Register was compiled by each local authority and published on the 1st of November 2006. Corrections or additions could then be submitted

before the 9th of December and these were included in the Register that came into force on the 15 February 2007. To be included in the Register you must be at least 18 years of age on that day. Also, you must have been ordinarily resident in the State on the 1st of September 2006.

If you are not on the published Register, you can still apply for inclusion in a supplement to the Register. Application forms for this are available from Garda stations, public libraries and local authority offices. You can view the Register at these locations and online at the website www.checktheregister.ie.

If you are already on the Register of Electors but have moved to another area, you can apply for inclusion in the supplement at your new address. Your name will be deleted from the original Register.

In order to be included in the supplement used at the next general election, your application must be received by your local authority at least 15 working days before polling day. You must be at least 18 years of age on polling day and you must be ordinarily resident at the address at which you wish to be registered.

To vote in a general election in Ireland you must be a citizen of Ireland or the UK. Citizens of other countries who are registered and vote in European and/or local elections.

Question

Who is entitled to claim a Bereavement Grant in the event of death?

Answer

The Bereavement Grant is a payment to assist with funeral or other expenses following a death. The grant of \in 850 is usually paid to the person responsible for these expenses.

Eligibility usually depends on the number of PRSI (Pay-Related Social Insurance) contributions that have been made over a certain period of time. You may also be eligible based on entitlement to certain social welfare payments.

The PRSI requirement can be met by the PRSI payment of either the deceased person or their spouse or partner. In the case of the death of a child under 18 years of age (or under 22 if in full-time education), the PRSI contributions of their parent or guardian are taken into account.

The grant is also payable on the death of:

- A Contributory pensioner, their spouse or partner, or someone for whom they received a qualified child allowance or qualified adult allowance.
- An orphan for whom a Guardian's Payment (Contributory) was being paid, or their guardian.
- The widow or widower of a deceased insured person.

From May 2007, the grant is payable on the death of a person aged between 16 and 22 who was receiving Disability Allowance.

To apply for the Bereavement Grant, contact your local Social Welfare Office or telephone Lo-call 1890-500-00.

Other grants available following a death include the Widowed Parent Grant, for widows or widowers with dependent children, and the Special Funeral Grant which may be claimed under the Occupational Injuries Benefit Scheme where death results from a work-related accident or disease.

Question

What rights do older people or people with disabilities have when they are dealing with their energy supplier?

Answer

Electricity and gas suppliers must follow the customer protection guidelines which have been produced by the Commission for Energy Regulation.

These include the following protections and entitlements

- Older people cannot be disconnected by their energy supplier during the winter months, between November the 1st and March the 31st.
- People with a visual impairment must be provided with an alternative means of communication such as Braille bills, talking bills or phone bills.
- People who are hard of hearing must be provided with a minicom, text messaging or video service to receive their bills.
- People relying on life support equipment in their homes cannot be disconnected under any circumstances.
- A register of vulnerable customers must be maintained by all electricity and gas suppliers.
- A second person may be nominated to receive energy bills on behalf of a vulnerable person.
- Energy suppliers must facilitate payment options for residential customers experiencing genuine financial hardship and, where appropriate, engage with a financial/money advisor appointed by the customer.

Companies are required to have a fair and reasonable complaints procedure in place for customers who are not satisfied with the service they receive.

Question

What is the European Health Insurance Card?

Answer

If you are visiting certain European countries and you become ill or get injured, the European Health Insurance Card allows you to access public healthcare services. It replaces the E111 which had previously been required.

If you are going on a short stay to an EU country, an EEA country (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway) or to Switzerland, it is advisable to have the card to cover you and your family for public healthcare. Cards issued from March 2007 are valid for four years and each person travelling will need a card. It is not required for a temporary visit to the UK if you can prove that you are ordinarily resident in Ireland.

You can apply for the card online at www.ehic.ie if you already have a medical card, GP visit card or a Drugs Payment scheme card. Otherwise you can

download an application form from this web site or get it from your Local Health Office. You will need to provide your name, address, date of birth and Personal Public Service Number (PPS No.).

You should apply for a card at least ten working days before travelling. If there is not enough time to get the card, contact your Local Health Office to get a Temporary Replacement Certificate instead for each person travelling.

If you have a card that has expired, you can apply online to renew your card. You will require your existing card number. If you have changed your address or your name, you will need to contact your Local Health Office. If you have concerns about getting a renewed card in time, you can get a Temporary Replacement Certificate.

You may also wish to consider taking out private travel insurance for some expenses that are not covered by the European Health Insurance Card. These may include the costs of repatriation home or the expenses of relatives who travel to you if you fall ill abroad.

Useful Tips

Useful Beauty Tips

Natural wart remover:

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Sign of the times at Maynooth Students' software entry in global contest has creative merit and commercial potential

hree NUI Maynooth students Dan Kelly (graduate) and Undergrads Eric McClean and Cathal Coffey won first prize in the Irish leg of the Imagine Cup (www.imaginecup.com). The competition was sponsored by Microsoft.

The competition has a different theme each year and has being in existence since 2003. The main aim of the competition was to design a software project that fits the theme and also has great creative merit and commercial potential.

It's the first time an Irish team will take part in the final in Seoul, South Korea. They will compete against 50 international teams for a prize of \$25,000 US Dollars with a chance to gain professional entrepreneurial skills and commercialise their product.

The Maynooth team's entry uses motion capture technology to teach sign language. A learner signer can watch a sign being demonstrated and then put on a colour-coded glove to practise before a webcam. A computer reads the learner's hand signs and gives the learner feedback.

Also to be congratulated was the third placed team, Team Sleepy Oranges, which developed a Chinese language learning package. The team members were Fergal Walsh (Celbridge), Cathal Browne (Roscommon), Lei Pan (Kildare), Shekman Tang (Blanchardstown).





The Late Josie Murphy 1910 - 2007

osie Murphy, who passed away peacefully in his 97th year, will be sadly missed by his family and his large circle of friends in Maynooth, where he was a well known and popular member of our community. Born at number 8 Dillon's Row in 1910, Josie spent most of his long life living in the town. His knowledge and memories of the area were second to none; he could recall many an interesting story of Maynooth in the early 20th century.

He remembered working in Carton Estate as a schoolboy during his holidays for wages of 1s 3d per day with a staff of over one hundred men and women from the area working there. Another source of income was to open the gates of the avenue on Sunday mornings to allow horse drawn carriages through as the residents of Carton House attended church in Parsons Street.



He remembered the War of Independence and the Black and Tans being stationed at Lyreen House and their playing soccer in the harbour field. Also at that time the burning of the town hall in the square by a local unit of the I.R.A. to stop the Tans from taking it over. The iron seats at the top of the main street (Carton Avenue) were previously placed around the town hall where Maynooth people would sit on Sundays in their best dress, long skirts (ladies), bowler hats (gents) discussing the topics of the day.

He remembered the Eucharist Congress in 1932 and the hundreds of people walking through the village the previous evening on their way to the Phoenix Park. The shops were sold out of almost every item of grocery on that evening. One of the highlights of his lifetime in Maynooth was the visit of Pope John Paul 2nd to the college in 1979, arriving by helicopter to greet priests and students and the people of Maynooth, who for the previous six weeks each evening were out in force cleaning, weeding, painting and planting flowers to prepare for the visit.

He remembered Eamon DeValera visiting the town as president of Ireland and the big black car used to transport him; Also Princess Grace of Monaco who stayed in Carton House in the 1960's.

He worked in Boland's Mill in Grand Canal Street, Dublin where he cycled to work each day and home each evening, when, following his dinner, he would again set off on his bicycle to Clane or Kilcock or some other destination around the county to play a football match.

His love of the "Crom Abus", his local GAA club, never waned over the years and he could proudly show a photo of his father in the Maynooth team of the 1890's. He captained Maynooth to their only success in the Leinster Leader Cup senior football competition in 1935. He played football and hurling for the club and for many a year was seen following and supporting the team along with great gaels like the Late Jimmy Tracy, Jimmy (curley) McLoughlin, Phil Burke and Jim Nolan (who have also gone to their eternal reward) among others at pitches around the country.

He moved to number 13 Leinster Cottages in 1950 where he spent many years with his six children and wife Kathleen R.I.P. Sadly his wife Kathleen passed away in 1996. After paying 2s 6d per week up until the mid sixties, he along with other residents purchased their houses from Lord Brockett, Master of Carton House.

His last few years were happily spent in the care of the Maynooth Community Unit for older people where he boasted of having the best room in the house. He could see from his window St Patrick's College, the Castle, the harbour field and the canal and could hear the Angelus bells ringing out each day, which assured him he was still in his beloved town of Maynooth.



Recipes - Barbecue Time

Sirloin Kebabs

Ingredients

1/4 cup soy sauce

3 tablespoons light brown sugar

3 tablespoons distilled white vinegar

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

4 fluid ounces 7 up

2 pounds sirloin steak, cut into 1 1/2 inch cubes

2 green peppers, cut into 2 inch pieces

Skewers

1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, stems removed Cherry tomatoes

A fresh pineapple, peeled, cored and cubed.

Method

In a medium bowl, mix soy sauce, light brown sugar, distilled white vinegar, garlic powder, seasoned salt, garlic pepper seasoning, and 7 up. Reserve about 1/2 cup of this marinade for basting. Place steak in a large

resealable plastic bag. Cover with the remaining marinade, and seal. Refrigerate for 8 hours, or overnight.

Bring a saucepan of water to a boil. Add green peppers, and cook for 1 minute, just to blanch, drain, and set aside.

Preheat grill for high heat. Thread steak, green peppers, mushrooms, tomatoes, and pineapple onto skewers in an alternating fashion. Discard marinade and the bag. Lightly oil the grill grate. Cook kebabs on the prepared grill for 10 minutes. Baste frequently with reserved marinade during the last 5 minutes of cooking.

Marinades

Pineapple Marinade

Ingredients

1 cup crushed pineapple 1/3 cup soy sauce 1/3 cup honey 1/4 cup cider vinegar 2 cloves garlic, minced

1 teaspoon ginger powder

Preparation

Mix all ingredients together and use immediately or store in airtight containers for up to 7 days.

Orange and Onion Marinade

1/3 cup orange marmalade

3 green onions, finely chopped

1/4 cup white wine

1 teaspoon olive oil

1 teaspoon cider vinegar

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1/2 Teaspoon soya sauce.

Preparation

Place all ingredients in a medium saucepan. Allow to simmer on low heat until marmalade has thinned and all ingredients are combined. Allow to cool completely before using as a marinade.

Lemon and Rosemary Marinade

Ingredients

3 large lemons

1/2 cup of fresh rosemary (3 tablespoon dried)

1/4 cup of olive or salad oil

6 Cloves of garlic crushed.

Preparation.

Cut Lemon in half and squeeze out the juice into a bowl or a re-sealable plastic bag. Throw in the lemon halves and everything else. Mix together well. Great for chicken. Marinade for at least 4 hours.

> A very quick marinade can be made up with Olive oil, vinegar, and mustard. Just leave meat marinating for an hour and your will be ready to cook.



Top Garden Projects for June

as the weather kept you from getting some of your spring gardening projects completed? Early June is not too late to get your summer gardening underway. Adding colour, pruning, controlling slugs, dividing perennials, planting vegetables and eliminating weeds head the list of things to do in June.

COLOUR SPOTS - are an ideal way to create instant colour in the garden. In recent years growers have introduced blooming size annual plants that they call

'Colour Spots'. These plants are generally grown in individual pots, in sizes of 4 inches or more and the plants are nicely branched and already in bloom. So when you select and plant them they provide instant colour. If you are like me, and haven't had a chance to get summer annuals planted due to the bad weather on weekends during



PRUNING - June is the month often set aside for shaping evergreens. In fact, this is the month the commercial tree growers shape their Christmas trees. So it is a good month for shearing, pinching or pruning

Junipers, Cypress or Conifers. Also, this is the time to pinch back annuals, Fuchsias, Geraniums and any other plants that might be getting too leggy or misshapen.

SLUGS - the cool, wet spring has drawn the slugs out in full force, so it is important to take time to eliminate

them. Do not use slug pellets – these are harmful to birds. Try filling a container with beer and the slugs will die happy when they dive in!

PERENNIALS - this is an ideal time to select and plant the spring, summer and autumn flowering varieties of perennials. It's also the time to divide the spring flowering perennials like, Primroses, Arabis, Aubrietia, Doronicum daisies, etc. In addition, June, July, August and September are the months for starting any of the perennials from seed. Sow the seeds directly into the garden.

VEGETABLE GARDENING - It is now late enough in the season to start any of the warm weather

vegetables, including Corn, Beans, Peppers, Egg Plant, Tomatoes, etc. If you haven't had a chance to sow some of these crops yet, it is not too late to get them started now. Be sure to get these crops started as soon as possible.

WEEDING - the cool, wet weather in May has also encouraged the germination of weed seeds, so they are a real problem in many gardens. It is critical that these weeds be pulled, cultivated or eliminated in some form before they have a chance to flower and go

> to seed again. Otherwise, you will be fighting newly germinated weed seed for the next several years.

> **FERTILIZING** - some of the plants that have suffered freeze damage this past winter will probably benefit from a light feeding at this time. In fact, one of the best times to fertilize plants like Rhododendrons, Camellias and Azaleas is immediately after they have finished

flowering. Use a 'Rhododendron' or 'Evergreen' type fertilizer to feed evergreens and a 'Rose' or 'Vegetable Garden' type food to feed Roses, perennials, vegetables and deciduous trees and shrubs.


LAWN CARE - late spring and early summer is the time to fertilize the lawn again. This is also an excellent time to eliminate lawn weeds. It's not too late to reseed or over-seed the lawn with new lawn seed. If temperatures range much above 65 degrees,

> it will be too late to apply moss killers. Thatching should also wait until fall. However, there is still plenty of time to perforate (aerate) the lawn, if it is needed.

ROSES - they have suffered enough damage from the severe winter. So be on the lookout for mildew, aphid, black-spot or other insect or disease problems and if they appear take steps to control them right

away. Roses will need to be fertilized monthly this summer.

- Plant your hanging baskets and window boxes with trailing petunias, trailing geraniums, white bacopa, red verbenas, trailing fuchsias and mixed lobelia.

- Plant up spare containers with 6 strawberry plants to give you tasty fresh strawberries all summer. Look for the excellent variety called F1 Karen and plant her now.
- Plant some summer colour throughout the garden in shrub & rose borders with mixed verbenas, petunias, crystal palace lobelia and dwarf dahlias.
- Interested in growing some home grown fruit? Then plant a couple of dwarf coronet apple trees in large containers or amongst existing trees and shrubs. Coronet apple trees are reliable croppers with excellent eating varieties like James Grieve, Katy, Beauty of Bath, Elisions Orange and Discovery. Bred for taste and compact shape coronets are a winner.
- Feed, weed and moss kill your lawn, which kills unwanted broadleaved weeds and moss, greens your lawn without forcing growth.
- Sow new lawns now with green velvet dwarf lawn seed. Green velvet creates a rich green sward which is easy to maintain and requires less mowing.
- Treat your roses with a dressing of rose fertilizer once a month, and prevent pests and diseases by spraying with rose clear every two weeks.
- Protect all your young bedding and vegetable plants with a dressing of slug pellets or slug liquid. Remember slugs and snails relish all soft new growth and can devour your plants over night.

Update on threat to Main Street Trees

You will recall from our last Labour News that Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged an appeal with An Bord Pleanala in relation to the threat of removal of the 8 Trees on Main Street, Maynooth, from Hands old House (Beside Maynooth Jewellers) to the square which was a direct consequence of a condition imposed by Kildare Co. Council in their grant of planning permission for the re-development of the Tesco site.

Maynooth Labour News

Tesco have now responded to Deputy Stagg's Appeal and have indicated that it is not their intention to seek the removal of any of the trees and that the drawings submitted in relation to the widening of the junction of Main Street and Straffan Road were provided at the request of the Roads Design Section of the Council. The Drawing they submitted where no trees would be affected was their preferred option and that they would support amendments to Condition 33 which would include a statement requiring that no trees are to be removed.

Deputy Stagg has now indicated to An Bord Pleanala that he welcomes the submission from Tesco`s. He also advised An Bord Pleanala that if Tesco were to get agreement on the Drawing, which does not involve the removal of any of the trees from Main Street, from Kildare Co. Council that he would withdraw his appeal once the other appellants agreed to withdraw theirs also.

Deputy Stagg remains critical of Kildare Co. Council for allowing this doubt over the Main Street Trees to have developed.

Affordable Houses in Maynooth

There are currently 766 households who have expressed an interest in purchasing an affordable dwelling in County Kildare.

183 have a first preference for Celbridge, 116 for Leixlip and 63 for Maynooth. The number for Maynooth is low probably because there were very few affordable houses available. Cllr. John McGinley has been advised by the Council that 46 affordable dwellings will be coming available over the next year at Moyglare Hall. John advises anyone who is interested to apply immediately as some of these will be coming available shortly.

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following progress report, on issues that he has been pursuing, at the Leixlip Area Committee meeting on 20th April:

Northern Relief Road from Moyglare to Blacklion:

"I have requested the meetings administrator to suggest that perhaps it might be convenient to attend the next meeting of the Dunsaughlin Area Committee which is scheduled to take place on Monday, 14th May next."

Public lighting on the MeadowBrook Link Road:

"The matter continues to be pursued by the Road Construction team. They have been assured that this matter will be definitely rectified within the next fortnight or so."

Footpath and public lighting from the Nursing Home to Moyglare Hall:

"As previously outlined, this work will be carried out as part of the "Deficiency in Infrastructure Scheme." It is proposed that works will commence in early May, 2007."

Palisade fencing at Bond Bridge

"I have asked the Road Construction team to arrange to circulate design details, hopefully, in the course of the meeting."

Footpath between Tesco and Blacklion Estate:

"This work will be carried out, as requested."

Audible crossing signals at junction of Kilcock road/Moyglare Road/Mill Street, Maynooth.

"The Council is currently carrying out an audit of all such crossings in the county. The Senior Executive Engineer, Traffic Section, has been requested to examine this particular junction in the coming days."

Beaufield Estate, Maynooth:"

It is not proposed to cul-de-sac Beaufield Estate for reasons already outlined. Again it is a public road and, in such a capacity, it is important in terms of the current infrastructural network. In particular, it provides important access to housing estates, shops etc. Indeed, in recent times, substantial public funds were expended in relation to traffic calming and other maintenance works."

Needless to say Cllr. John McGinley rejected this report and asked for a positive outcome at the next meeting.

Residents will note that the wooden bollards, which were funded by Cllr. John McGinley from his Discretionary Grants, are being installed at the Beaufield Shopping Centre at present ($10^{\rm th}$ May). Hopefully, they will prevent lorries and cars from parking on the green areas and of course there is a practically empty car park at The Newtown Inn.

Bollards at Old Greenfield, Maynooth

"I have also reported on this matter previously. The matter has been examined by the Road Design team, as requested. It is not proposed to remove the bollards. As already outlined, the road in question is too narrow to accommodate two-way traffic. The members will be aware of the considerable development along this route in recent times. There are, therefore, implications in terms of road safety generally and pedestrian safety in particular due to the narrowness of the road in question. In addition, the recent opening of the Meadowbrook Link Road has greatly eased traffic flow in the general area."

Cllr. John McGinley again rejected this report and asked for a positive outcome at the next meeting.

Blue Hoarding at Geohegan's Lane:

"Following an application for a Section 254 licence renewal for the hoarding at 8 Main Street, Maynooth, the applicant has been requested to submit further information within 2 weeks. Essentially, the applicant has also been advised that this hoarding must be removed within 1 month and he must also make the site safe."

Re-building of walls at Pound Park/The Band Hall and at the Small Pound:

At the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting of the Council on 20th April Council Officials agreed to Cllr. John McGinley's motion that Development Levies be used to re-build these dangerous walls.

Motions for the next Leixlip Area Committee Meeting:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motions for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

- "That a pedestrian crossing be provided from O'Neill Park to the TESCO side of the Dublin Road, Maynooth in order to facilitate residents who live on the northern side of this road O'Neill Park, Leinster Cottages, Dunboyne Road etc.)."
- 2. "That grass cutting by the Council be extended to include the grass on the public areas on both sides of the old Meadowbrook Road i.e. Meadowbrook and Beaufield sides"

- 3. "That the unnecessary pedestrian walkway between Kingsbry and Greenfield Close, Maynooth, be examined to see how best it can be closed off"
- 4. "When is the "Band Stand" in Pound Park,

Public lighting Improvements Sought for Kingsbry Estate, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to carry out the following public lighting improvements in Kingsbry:

- 1. A new pole with double light fitting at the footpath on the green area behind house no.'s 236 & 237.
- New extended lamp heads on poles no.'s 47 & 48
- Replacement of broken head on pole outside house no. 225 (previously reported to ESB). This pole also needs to be moved about 1m from the driveway as trucks are regularly hitting it.
- 4. New pole and light required at the side of house no. 206

Bollards at the bottom of Kingsbry:

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that some of his Discretionary grants be used for the Erection of wooden bollards at the bottom of Kingsbry, between it and Meadowbrook, in order to prevent cars and trucks from driving onto the green (there were concrete bollards here before but they were broken down). John has also allocated funds for the reconstruction of the footpath outside house no. 116 Kingsbry.

Points Raised

Paul Croghan said the situation regarding Town Council Status will have to be addressed: this has been on the agenda for several years and we should again write to the relevant Minister.

The IBAL results don't do Maynooth any favours

with a placing of 46 out of 50 towns entered. Kildare County Council will have to be asked to do something to improve things. Also raised was the increase in planes flying over Moyglare Village. The Arts is very much alive in Maynooth he said, and so it's a pity that there are no proper facilities for the Arts. Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes (Know your rights)

Question

This summer I am travelling to a country where there is no Irish Embassy. Is there another source of assistance for Irish nationals in the event of an emergency?

Answer

If you are in a country where there is no embassy or consulate, you can contact the embassy of any other European Union (EU) country for assistance.

According to article 20 of the Treaty Establishing the European Community, you are ,in that case, "entitled to protection by the diplomatic or consular authorities of any Member State, on the same conditions as the nationals of that State".

This means that the embassy will treat you the same as it would treat one of its own citizens. The embassy will also act as the channel of communication with the Irish authorities where this is required.

The embassy will help with the relief and repatriation of EU citizens who are in distress. It will offer assistance in situations such as accident, illness or death, and it will assist victims of violent crime. It will also help in cases of arrest or detention.

You will need to produce your passport as proof of your nationality. If your passport has been stolen, other proof of nationality may be acceptable.

The following countries are members of the European Union: Austria ,Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, United Kingdom.

Question

I understand that if I am providing full-time care to someone with a disability I can get a Respite Care Grant. How do I get it?

Answer

The Respite Care Grant is paid once a year to certain carers of people in need of full-time care and attention . It is paid automatically in early June by the Department of Social and Family Affairs to those who are getting Carer's Allowance or prescribed

Relative's Allowance . It is paid automatically by health Service Executive to those who are getting Domiciliary Care Allowance.

Other carers providing full-time care have to apply. If , however, you received the grant last year , you do not need to apply again as the Department writes to you to verify the details. To qualify you must be :

- Aged 16 or over and ordinarily resident in the State
- Caring for the person on a full-time basis
- Caring for the person for at least six months this period must include the first Thursday in June
- Living with the person being cared for or, if not be contactable quickly by a direct system of communication, for example, by telephone or alarm

You do not qualify if you are working, studying or training more than 15 hours per week outside the home. If you are getting an unemployment payment or if you are signing on for unemployment credits. You also do not qualify if you are living in a hospital. Convalescent home or similar institution.

The person being cared for must have not so severe a disability as to require full-time care and attention and must not be receiving it from someone else. He / she must not normally live in a hospital, convalescent home or similar institution but may attend a non-residential training course or day care centre.

For 2007, the Respite Care Grant is € 1,500 for each person being cared for.

The application from (RCG1) is available from your Social Welfare Office or Citizens Information Centre. If you are caring for more than two people you will also require a Form RCG1(a) for each additional person.

Question

What tax reliefs can I claim to reduce the amount of income tax that I pay?

Answer

There is a range of tax reliefs available, depending on (Continued on page 9)

your personal circumstances. To reduce your tax, it is important that you are aware of and claim the reliefs to which you are entitled especially as your circumstances change.

There are two main types of income tax relief: tax allowance and tax credits. Tax allowances are deduced from your income to reduce the amount that is taken into account for tax. Your gross tax is calculated as a percentage of this amount.

Tax credits work differently. They are deducted from the amount of your gross tax (above) to reduce the final amount of tax that you have to pay.

Generally, all individuals are entitled to personal credits that can be claimed depending on marital status (including widowed and lone parent) and depending on age (in the case of over 65s).

Employment-related reliefs include a tax credit for Pay As You Earn (PAYE) workers and for trade union subscriptions.

For health, tax relief is available for medical expenses and for some dental expenses. Tax relief on private health insurance is already taken into account in the premium you pay. Relief Is also available on nursing home fees or for employment a carer, or if one spouse provides care at home, and you can claim extra credits if you are maintaining a child or relative who is incapacitated.

In education, relief is available on tuition fees for approved third-level courses.

For housing tax relief is available on rent and on service charges paid. Relief on mortgage interest is already taken into account in your mortgage payments. If you rent out a room in your home you can claim relief on the income from it.

You can claim tax credits by contacting your regional Revenue Office. Most income tax reliefs can also be claimed on-line. See the Revenue Website at www.revene.ie. for details.

Question

I believe you can get assistance towards the cost of having a telephone. Can you please give details?

Answer

Assistance may be available under the Household Benefits Package that is administered by the Department of Social and Family Affairs. There are three allowances available under the Household Benefits Package: Free Television Licence, Electricity/Gas Allowance and Telephone Allowance. The Telephone Allowance scheme provides a payment of € 24.70 per month towards phone costs. This can be used for your landline phone or , from 9th May 2007, for a mobile phone.

If you use the Telephone Allowance for your landline phone, it is paid as a credit on your phone bill.

If you use the Telephone Allowance for your mobile phone. It is paid to you on the first Tuesday of every month. You can choose to have your allowance paid into a post office or a financial institution such as a bank.

The Allowance does not cover the initial installation charge for the telephone or the cost of purchasing a mobile phone. Only one person in the household can qualify for the allowance.

Those aged 70 or over are eligible for the Household Benefits Package no matter what their means are or who lives with them. Also eligible are those:

- Aged between 66 and 69 and living alone or only with certain expected persons and getting a qualifying payment such as a State Pension, Widow(er) 's Pension, Invalidity Pension, Blind Pension or one Parent Family Payment.
- Aged between 66 and 69 and who satisfy a means test and are living alone or only with expected persons
- Aged under 66 and getting a qualifying payment such as an Invalidity Pension, Blind Pension or Disability Allowance, and living with certain excepted persons.
- Of any age and getting a Carer's Allowance.
- Widowed and aged between 60 and 65, if the late spouse was receiving the allowance prior to his or her death and the couple were living together.

Useful Tips

Useful Water Safety Tips

Onds & Lakes,

Don't let your child swim without adult supervision - lakes or ponds may be shallow near the bank and then increase in depth sharply as the child moves further out into the water. Ponds and lakes may hide jagged rocks, broken glass, or general rubbish. Make sure your child wears foot protection, like aqua socks or water shoes, even while in the water. Watch out for weeds and grass that could entangle your child's leg or arm.

Most boating accidents, particularly among teenagers, are related to alcohol. When you and your family are boating, assign a designated driver who won't drink. Be sure your teen knows about the dangers of alcohol, on and off the water.

\sum wimming in the sea.

- Don't allow your child to swim in large waves or undertows, and tell him or her never to stand with his or her back to the water because a sudden wave can easily knock your child over.
- Teach your child that if he or she is caught in a rip current or undertow, he or she should swim parallel to the shore or should tread water and call for a lifeguard's help.
- The stings of jellyfish can be painful, so tell your child to avoid them in the water and to tell an adult right away if he or she is stung.

Snfants & Water.

Drowning, although the biggest worry, isn't the only concern when babies are exposed to water. Infants are particularly susceptible to diseases that can be transmitted in water. After introducing an infant to a pool, dry the child's ears carefully with a towel or cotton ball to help prevent an ear infection that occurs as the result of trapped water in the ear canal. After a dip, it's a good idea to wash your baby with a mild soap and shampoo his or her hair to remove pool chemicals.

Water temperatures below 85 degrees Fahrenheit , (29 degrees Celsius) can cause babies to lose heat quickly,

putting them at risk of hypothermia (when body temperature falls below normal). Shivering infants or those whose lips are turning blue should be removed from the water immediately, dried, and kept in a towel.

noating Safety

Whether you're the captain of a schooner or a passenger on a skiboat, following safety guidelines ensures your safety and that of other seafarers.

Be weather wise: Sudden wind shifts, lightning flashes and choppy water all can mean a storm is brewing. Bring a portable radio to check weather reports.

Bring extra gear you may need: A flashlight, extra batteries, matches, a map of where you are, flares, sun tan lotion, first aid kit, extra sunglasses. Put those that need to be protected in a watertight pouch or a container that floats.

Tell someone where you're going, who is with you, and how long you'll be away. Then check your boat, equipment, boat balance, engine, and fuel supply before leaving.



Wear an approved life jacket.

Have an extra person aboard to watch and assist the skier.

Be sure the boat and ski equipment are in good shape.

Watch the water ahead of you at all times.

Run parallel to shore and come in slowly when landing.

Use proper hand signals to signal boat operator.

Do not ski at night or in restricted areas.

Learn to swim. . It's never too late.

Pobal Phádraig

Who are we: We are a branch of Conradh na Gaeilge. We are governed by the constitution of An Conradh to promote the Irish language and culture in our community.

Events: We come together on the first Tuesday of the month at eight o' clock in Brady's Clock House in The Square, Maynooth. Our next meeting is scheduled for Tues. 3rd July and subsequently on the 4th September.

History: There was a branch of Conradh in St. Patrick's College in 1893 at the start of the revival period. This branch published the famous 'Simple Lessons in Irish' the first common Irish text book, which was written by Fr. Eoghan Ó Ghramhnaigh, Professor of Irish in St. Pat's. The inscription over his tomb at the back of the college reads, 'd'Ord Eoghan Ó Ghramhnaigh d'muscail misneach is meamna na nGael', an oration to E.Ó G. who inspired courage and higher thinking amongst the Irish people. His tomb and passage home from Phoenix, Arizona where he died from Tuberculoses at the age of 33 was paid for by his friends in Conradh na Gaeilge. Upon formation Kildare County Council adopted meamna agus misneach as their mission statement for the governance of Kildare. In the modern period a branch attempted to found a Gaelscoil for the town in the 1980's. This branch under the then Cathaoirleach Seán Ó Siocháin A.S. was refused permission by the Dept. of Education on the grounds that the school was too close to the existing Gaelscoil in Leixlip. These pioneers acceded and instead established the Gaelsoili in Kilcock. The current branch work in partnership with other community groups including the G.A.A., I.C.A., and Glór na nGael for the good of the town. It was from the Crom Abú branch as we were then known that the founding committee of Gaelscoil Uí Fhiaich was formed.

Education: We are in favour of a Community School management structure for the new Irish medium post-primary school for Maynooth. We believe this model to be the most effective in terms of local community involvement and service. In partnership with The Department of Education and Science, local educational interests and community stakeholders we are working to achieve this resource for the long term good of the Maynooth community.

Adult Education: We deplore the fact that a comprehensive adult education programme in the form of night classes, for the working community has never been offered by the traditional education providers in this town. We hope to rectify this situation with the establishment of The Maynooth Community School (Pobalscoil Phádraig). Pobal Phádraig will provide some tuition, at least in conversational Irish in various centres for the coming autumn nights.

Community Festival: Our committee were directed by the membership to liaise with the Maynooth Festival Committee of Maynooth Community Council. We are happy to report that we have secured the inclusion of 'Seo Beo Ráth Cairn' and some other events of a Gaeilge nature in this year's festival.

Shocking results for Kildare in the IBAL anti litter league

IBAL slams 'car littering' as a growing blot on Ireland's landscape

The first round result of the 2007 anti litter league survey by IBAL revealed that Kildare faired very badly on the litter front. Newbridge was one of only two areas classed as a "Litter Blackspot". Maynooth was classed as a "Seriously Littered" area in 46th position, a very poor rating out of 50 areas surveyed. Naas was in 39th position and was classed as a "Littered" area. Leixlip was a "Littered" area in 37th position and Athy ranked as 31st was a "Moderately Littered" area. In stark contrast to Kildare the survey revealed that overall litter levels nationwide had improved by 2% compared to this time last year.

Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) has called for the introduction of penalty points for incidences of 'car littering' in Ireland as they are defacing otherwise clean towns and cities. The latest IBAL litter survey shows a large number of areas let down by the state of their approach roads, ringroads and roundabouts where litter is caused by passing cars and trucks. IBAL has called on the Government to consider extending penalty points to this offence.

The survey of 50 towns and cities around Ireland, carried out by An Taisce, showed Newbridge and Navan as the only towns in the country to be brandished as 'litter blackspots', the latter for the third

survey in succession. Carlow, placed top in the league, was one of 18 areas deemed as "Litter Free".

For towns like Killarney, Athlone, Cork City, Limerick City and Nenagh, it was litter on approach roads that brought down their overall rankings in this round of the anti-litter league. "In many cases, the town councils and city councils are doing their bit in keeping the streets free of litter," remarked Dr Tom Cavanagh of IBAL. "However, they are being frustrated in their efforts for a clean environment by litter on approach roads. These are the responsibility of the county councils."

"The impression of a town is coloured hugely by what one encounters on approaching it. For this reason we need to find ways of targeting those who dump or litter from their vehicles. Issuing one penalty point per litter offence is one suggestion. Another is to build lay-bys on our motorways equipped with suitable litter bins to facilitate truck drivers who often have their meals on the go, resulting in an accumulation of litter. These facilities are seriously lacking."

The IBAL survey revealed litter levels have improved by 2% over the same time last year, which was itself, a spectacular improvement on the previous period. The average cleanliness rating is now 75 points, within sight of the 80-point mark, which is deemed 'clean to European norms.' "There is no doubt that our cleanliness levels are continuing to rise," continued Dr Cavanagh. "To sustain this progress, County Councils, whose remit it is to keep the areas outside the towns clean, will have to take litter seriously, not least on approach roads. IBAL will be monitoring these roads more and more in future surveys."

IBAL has warned that the peak summer season is a critical time for areas to show their best side to visitors. Fáilte Ireland reports that the majority of tourists to the green island find it less clean than they expected. Fáilte Ireland's Tourism Matters publication suggests that over a quarter of tourists to Ireland surveyed had experienced littering or dumping in the countryside. German holidaymakers are least likely to agree that Irish streets are cleaner than streets in their own country "This is simply not a basis to build future tourism on" added Mr Cavanagh

Dublin City has been omitted from the Litter League in 2007, but will be compared against other cities in a European League to be published later this year.

So how did the judges see Maynooth?

AN TAISCE REPORT: Maynooth: 46th out of 50 towns / cities surveyed.

There was just one very good site in Maynooth (St. Mary's School - Inside) - the top ranking towns had eight. Over a number of years there has been little change in the poor litter situation at Maynooth – this time around was no different. Maynooth, along with almost all of the rest of the Kildare towns has consistently come very much towards the bottom of Many of the moderately littered sites the league. could easily be improved with a little extra care and attention e.g. Moyglare Approach Road, Moyglare Abbey and St. Mary's School – Outside. Maynooth Railway Station, Main Street, Public Park at back of Main Street and Maynooth College – Outside Moyglare Entrance all had a serious litter problem. Not only were they heavily littered but there was a general lack of maintenance.

In the next survey 40% of marks will be awarded for Approach Roads — this includes ring roads, slip roads and roundabouts.

Dublin Approach Road: Moderately Littered. (Between Carton House and Tesco). The verges on both sides of the road were somewhat neglected. A more thorough approach to maintenance would make all the difference here.

Moyglare Approach Road: Moderately Littered. (Secondary road leading from Dunshaugh). The low levels of litter along this approach into Maynooth could easily be addressed with a more thorough approach to cleaning.

Moyglare Abbey: Moderately Littered. With just a little extra effort this residential area could easily get a higher litter classification. Some light scatterings of food related litter took away from an otherwise very good site.

Maynooth College – Outside Moyglare Entrance: Serious Litter Problem. This was a very poor site – if not addressed the litter situation can only deteriorate even further. There was a wide variety of litter present and there were no litter bins in the area surveyed.

Maynooth College – from Moyglare Entrance – Inside: Moderately Littered. As with the previous site there were no litter bins in the area surveyed. Scatterings of food related litter were very obvious and the grass / weeds were becoming overgrown.

St. Mary's School – Outside: Moderately Littered. (Moyglare Road). The flower beds added some bright colour to this site – it was generally quite good but let down by food related litter.

St Mary's School – Inside: Clean to European Norms. This was the best site within Maynooth and the high standards attained during previous litter surveys have been sustained again this time around. Not only was it clear of litter but it was also very well maintained.

Maynooth Railway Station: Serious Litter Problem. This was a disappointing site, creating a poor first impression of the town for those arriving by train. There appear to be insufficient bins for the high numbers of passengers using the station.

Public Park at back of Main Street: Serious Litter Problem. This could be a lovely amenity. There was a wide variety of litter present and it is a pity that there has been little improvement. A dirty bin and poorly maintained grass contributed to the overall appearance.

Main Street: Serious Litter Problem. Dirty and broken bins, accumulations of litter at the base of some trees and a filthy P&T box all contributed to the poor appearance of this street. A more thorough approach to cleaning and maintenance is required to address this situation — otherwise it can only deteriorate.

Marianville: Moderately Littered. Not much effort is required to bring this residential area up to a higher litter classification. The new development hasn't impacted on the litter situation.



Green Flag Day in Presentation Girls' School

Guesday the 13th of June was a special day for all involved with the Girls School in Maynooth as the Green Flag was presented to the school with a ceremony involving the schools children.

The Green Schools is a worldwide environmental education programme which is sponsored by Intel and highlights the brilliant work schools are doing for the environment. The teachers and pupils all wore green clothing to add to the occasion and some of the children wore cardboard hats and skirts made from refuse bags to highlight their recycling message.

The school has worked very hard for the award and after two years its achievement was recognised and the school accepted their Green Flag last February at the headquarters of An Taisce.

//he Internet is vast, so looking for information can be like trying to find a needle in a haystack. Incorrect use means you could end up with page after page of irrelevant results - a factor that could reduce the appeal of the Internet. This would be a terrible shame as it is an invaluable resource. Search tools, when used correctly can help you find absolutely anything. Armed with the above information, you can improve your searching technique to pinpoint the information you want.

Getting the right result depends on many factors; not least the way in which you're using the search tool, and whether the tools in question are right for the job.

There are quite a few search engines but the most popular today is Google—www.google.ie. Google allows you to specify if you want to search the web or just search sites from Ireland.

Using filters

If you enter a particular phrase, such as "to be or not to be", thousands of irrelevant pages are likely to appear. More relevant pages can be obtained by enclosing the phrase in quotation marks. Entering "to be or not to be" (including the quotes) looks for that exact phrase. Try this technique when looking for song lyrics, people or products.

More powerful searches can be carried out using **operators**; keyboard symbols that add specific conditions to your query such as the **plus (+)** and **minus (-)** symbols are the simplest. If you enter the phrase "to be or not to be" but are looking only for results that also mention Shakespeare, you could try typing "to be or not to be" +Shakespeare.

This works in reverse too. Entering "fruit-bananas" (without quotes) will only return results for fruit, which are not bananas. Many search tools also use an uppercase OR as an option, so you could enter "nuts OR bananas- fruit -food -tree" to get pages that

have nothing to do with food but contain the words nuts or bananas.

The tilde operator (the symbol ~ which is usually accessed by pressing the Shift key and #) can be used to broaden searches. Entering "~ auto insurance" into a search engine will find results for websites that contain the word auto and any of its synonyms such as car, truck etc. This feature could prove handy if you're trying to find insurance for more than one type of vehicle. Many search engines have a set of advanced operators that help you narrow your searches even further. You can force many search tools to look only through specific websites. In Google, this is done by using the operator "site". Entering "sport" site:www.ireland.com will search the Ireland.com website for pages that mention the phrase "sport".

"**Date**:" is another powerful operator, and gives results for pages that were updated during a specific time frame. Tap in "big brother" date: 2 and you'll only get results for the Big Brother TV shows that are relevant to the last two months. This is especially handy if you only want up to date information.

The "related:" operator lets you find out when websites have something in common. Type in "related:www.tesco.ie" (don't use the quotes) and you'll see a list of websites for manufacturers that offer similar products and services.

The final operator we'll talk about in this section is "safesearch". If you're searching the web with a group of people that may include a child, you won't want to see unexpected and potentially offensive content. Typing in "safesearch:sex education" helps reduce the likelihood of finding adult-themed websites that could cause embarrassment.

Next month we will look at the other uses for Google—its not just a search engine!

Gardening Tips for July



Here are a few July gardening tasks and projects that you can do to help keep your garden looking it's best for the rest of this season.

Watering the garden

The primary rule of summer watering is to water autumn. thoroughly and deeply each time and to allow the soil one or two dry out between waterings. Deep watering will allow buds as the plant's roots to grow deeper, where they are less likely to dry out, as well as the added benefit of anchoring the plant into the ground better. Light, surface watering actually wastes water, because the water never actually reaches the root zone of the plant, and the moisture rapidly evaporates from the top inch of soil.

The best way to tell if your plants are receiving enough water is to take a trowel or shovel and dig down a few inches. The soil should be moist at least 3 or 4 inches deep to ensure that the water is reaching the root zone of the plants. Of course, if you planted drought resistant plants in your garden, you

won't have to water as often, but the principal of deep watering still applies.

As the weather dries out, your container plants may need daily watering, especially if the pots are exposed to the drying sunlight. Push your finger into the soil in your container plantings at least once a day *(more often on hot, dry days)* to feel for moisture and be certain that plants are getting enough water. Apply water until it runs out the drainage holes.

Try to do your watering during the morning hours so that the leaves can dry off a bit before the hot sun hits them. Evening watering is sometimes acceptable if the temperatures are warm enough to insure that foliage dries before the temperature drops at night. (Wet foliage makes plants more susceptible to fungus and disease.

Perennials, annuals and bulbs.

Continue to dead head (remove dead flowers) your annuals to encourage continued blooming. If your annuals have died off, pull them out and add them to the compost pile. Replant that spot with hardy annuals or perennials, such as alyssum, calendula, candytuft, dianthus, baby's breath, nasturtium, pansy, petunia, phlox, snapdragons.

Get a second bloom from faded annuals by cutting them back by one half their height, then fertilize them with a liquid 5-10-10 fertilizer.

Roses will need to be fertilized each month through the summer. In colder areas, allow shrub roses to ripen by discontinuing feeding them at the end of the month.

Fertilize container gardens regularly with a liquid all purpose plant food.

Chrysanthemums should be lightly fertilized every two weeks. Discontinue pinching your mums in mid month so they will be able to develop flower buds for the autumn. To promote 'trophy size' flowers, allow only one or two main shoots to develop. Remove all side buds as they begin to develop.

To produce the largest Dahlia flowers (especially 'Dinner plate' Dahlias), the main stems should be kept

free of side shoots, allowing only the main terminal bud to develop. Be sure to provide adequate support to prevent wind damage.

Bearded Iris may be divided and replanted when they have finished blooming. Discard all shrivelled and diseased parts

Sweet peas may tend to fizzle out with hot summer weather, but with heavy mulching to keep the roots cool and moist you can

Fasten a section of the stem containing one or more "eyes" down onto cultivated soil with a horseshoe shaped piece of wire and cover it with additional soil. By summer's end, the stem should be rooted sufficiently to sever it from the parent plant and replant into another area of the garden..

Sow seeds of Hollyhocks, English daisies, Foxgloves, Violas, Canterbury bells, and Sweet William into the garden now for next year's bloom.

Geranium cuttings may be made in late July to start plants for indoor bloom during the winter months, and for setting into the garden next spring. You may need to provide supplemental lighting with fluorescent grow lights for really good winter blooms indoors.

Shrubs and trees

Summer blooming shrubs should be pruned for shape after they have finished flowering. Remove any dead or diseased branches.


Fertilize flowering shrubs like Rhododendrons, Camellias and Azaleas immediately after they have finished flowering with a 'Rhododendron' or 'Evergreen' type fertilizer.

Dead head the developing seed pods from your Rhododendrons and Azaleas to improve next years bloom. Be careful not to damage next years buds which may be hidden just below the pod.

Fruits and veggies

Begin enjoying the harvest of your home-grown fruits, vegetables and herbs!

Fertilize June bearing strawberries after the harvest, and ever-bearing varieties half way through the season.



Continue to protect your fruit from the birds with netting.

Lawn

Contrary to popular belief, a brown lawn isn't necessarily a dead lawn. Grasses go dormant in times of drought, but will quickly return to life with rain. If a lush green lawn is important to you, and you don't mind mowing, water it regularly, and deeply. If a water shortage is expected, or you hate tending to grass, you may choose to just let your lawn go dormant, and water it as seldom as once a month. Raise the cutting height of the mower. Taller grass cools the roots and helps to keep the moisture in the soil longer.

Avoid using fertilizers in hot, dry weather.

House Plants

House plants can be moved outside to a shady, protected spot.

Continue to watch for insect or disease damage and take the necessary steps to control the problem. Warmer and drier weather means it will be necessary to water and mist your house plants more often. Feed your house plants with half the recommended strength of a good soluble house plant fertilizer while they are actively growing.

July Herb Garden Things to do:

Keep sowing seed outside - to maintain supplies.

Mulch moisture-loving herbs.

Thin seedlings that have been sown direct in the garden.

Dead-head where flowers have faded, unless seed is to be collected.

Harvest lemon balm, summer savoury, hyssop, tarragon, thyme, lavender, marjoram and most other herbs this month.

Hoe and remove weeds regularly as competition will be great this month.

Take softwood cuttings.

Cut flowers such as lavender and cornflower for drying.

Begin gathering seeds of caraway and angelica Cut back lavenders after flowering to keep a good shape

Water regularly any plants that may be showing stress Keep gathering petals of damask rose for drying

Flavour from the garden this month

July will offer flavour from just about all the herbs. New shoots, leaves and flowers are perfect for the kitchen.

Odds and ends

Be alert to slug and snail damage. These creatures will be hiding during the heat of the day, but will come out of hiding in the cool morning and evening hours or after rain. Seek and destroy ALL slugs and their eggs!



Keep the weeds pulled, before they have a chance to flower and go to seed again. Otherwise, you will be fighting newly germinated weed seed for the next several years.

Change the water in your bird bath regularly, and keep it filled.

Continue to watch for insect or disease damage throughout the garden, and take the necessary steps to control the problem.

Summer Recipes — Smoothies & Cool Drinks

Raspberry Lollipops

This recipe, which combines the delicate sweetness of raspberries with the creaminess of vanilla yogurt, is great for getting the best return on your basket of fruit. The ice pops take several hours to freeze, so prepare them in the morning if you're planning on an afternoon treat.

1 pint raspberries
1/2 cup sugar
1 1/4 cups water
1/2 cup cream (heavy or light)
1 tbsp. lemon juice
1 cup vanilla yogurt
8 5-oz. waxy paper cups
8 Ice pop sticks

Mix all the ingredients together, place in the cups and wedge the stick in the middle. Freeze for several hours.

Smoothies.

A smoothie is a delicious and healthy drink made up of fruit that's been blended with fruit juice, milk or yogurt. So not only do smoothies taste great – they're really good for you too. Packed with all the vitamins and nutrients you get from fresh fruit, they make the perfect drink, day or night. What's more, all you need to make them is some basic kitchen equipment and a little imagination.

Pineapple



Take half a fresh pineapple (or 1 small one), or 1 large tin of pineapple in juice. Add 1 ripe banana and some coconut milk or ¼ teaspoon of coconut extract. Mix all together and blend until super sumo smooth. Garnish with pineapple wedge.

Strawberry



Get some strawberries, one ripe banana, and blend into a paste. Add the juice of one orange and some ice. Pour into glasses and serve with a straw and bits of strawberry to decorate if you're feeling fancy.

Banana

Take one large banana, one handful of strawberries or raspberries - they can be fresh, frozen or tinned. Add a large glass of apple juice.

Classic Banana



Take two large bananas, one stoned and peeled ripe peach, the seeds and pulp of a passion fruit and a teaspoon of honey. Mix them all together in the blender and serve with ice.`

Try freezing the banana beforehand for an extra creamy experience.

Blueberry



Take 2 handfuls of blueberries, fresh, frozen, or tinned. Add 2 handfuls of blackcurrants, 5-6 ice cubes, and 1 tsp. of honey. Blend all together until smooth and serve immediately.

Grapefruit



Put a quarter of a large pineapple, or a small tin of pineapple chunks in a blender, add the juice of a pink grapefruit and blend. Take one passion fruit, scoop out the seeds and pour into a glass.

Classic Lemonade

- 6 lemons
- 6 cups cold water
- 1 Cup of sugar

Juice your lemons and you should get about 1 cup of juice. In a large jug, mix juice, water and sugar. Stir lemonade well and serve with ice.

Lime Cooler

.

3/4 cup fresh lime juice 2/3 cup honey 1 quart water Lime wedges

In a large jug, stir together the lime juice, honey and water. Pour into tall, ice-filled glasses and garnish with lime wedges. Serves 5.



Cllr. John McGinley has allocated his €40,000 Discretionary Grant for 2007 as follows:

Blue Wooden Hoarding at Geoghegan's Lane/Doctors'Lane

Cllr. John McGinley and others have been asking for some time that this unsightly hoarding be removed from the public roadway. As a result the following licence for the hoarding was granted to the developer on the 25th May:

Schedule 1

- 1. Within two weeks from the date of this licence the existing hoarding shall be removed and a new hoarding shall be erected along the boundary line of the applicants property. The new hoarding shall be appropriately decorated and maintained at all times by the applicant. In addition the undertakings given by the applicant in the FI submission of 30th April 2007 shall be complied with in full.
- 2. Within three weeks from the date of this licence the applicant shall submit a colour photographic survey of the newly erected hoarding demonstrated in compliance with condition No 1 of this licence. In addition a copy of the receipt of the bond required from condition 13 of this licence shall be submitted to the Planning Authority.
- 3. The hoarding/scaffolding shall be removed in total, not later than <u>ten months</u> from the date of the licence, unless an extension of the licence is granted by the Council.
- 4. The hoarding/scaffolding or other obstructions on the ground shall be removed immediately on expiry of the licence.

- 5. Safe passage to be provided for pedestrian traffic and wheelchair traffic.
- The hoarding/scaffolding shall be erected and maintained in accordance with current standards/regulations. It shall comprise of roof and external handrail.
- 7. The applicant shall be responsible for all safety in the vicinity of the hoarding/scaffolding. Kildare County Council will not be responsible for this hoarding/scaffolding or any accidents arising from the erection of the hoarding/scaffolding. A copy of the applicant's insurance cover shall be submitted to the Planning Authority.
- 8. All supports shall be clad to prevent accidents to pedestrians.
- 9. Proper signage and lighting shall be erected to alert pedestrian/vehicular traffic to obstruction on the pavement/road.
- 10. Where applicable the public footpath shall be restored by the licensee and all damage made good to the satisfaction of Kildare County Council.
- 11. Footpath / road shall be kept clear of any debris.
- 12. The licensee must take all necessary precautions to prevent injury to members of the public or damage to property both public and private arising out of the execution of the works and the erection of the hoarding/scaffolding.
- 13. A cash bond of €10,000 shall be lodged, which is refundable if this area is restored to Kildare County Council's satisfaction.
- 14. The licence shall be reviewed on a three monthly basis with local Gardai.
- 15. The footpath shall be restored in full if damaged.
- 16. Within one week from the date of this licence the applicant shall pay to Kildare County Council the sum of €5,500 for licence fees outstanding.

Allocation of €250,000 to Alleviate Infrastructural Deficit

As a result of a proposal from Cllr. John McGinley €250,000 has been allocated to each Electoral Area, from Development Contributions, in order to alleviate infrastructural deficits. The funding has been allocated as follows in the Leixlip Electoral Area:

- 1. €120,000 to lay a new footpath and install public lighting on the Moyglare Road from the Nursing Home to Moyglare Hall.
- 2. €40,000 to provide a new footpath from TESCO to the Blacklion Road
- 3. €30,000 to upgrade the footpath from the Maynooth Photo Shop to Leinster Park. €60,000 to provide a footpath in Leixlip from Louisa Bridge along Accommodation Road.

Walkway Between Kingsbry and Greenfield Close:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion to have this walkway closed off:

"This matter has been examined by the area engineer as requested. In such instances, there should be full consensus regarding any proposed closure of a public right of way. In this particular case, the walkway in question is clearly of a public utility and is widely used by residents from these estates. There may also be practical difficulties in that there are quite a number of residential properties which abut this right of way. This would likely lead to further difficulties and increased costs relating to the scale of legal fees as well as civil and associated accommodation works. In any event, however, it is not recommended that this right of way be closed because of its public utility nature. The matter should also be referred to the housing department for comment. If there are issues relating to anti-social behaviour, such should be referred to the Gardaí in this first instance."

Pedestrian Crossing from O'Neill Park to TESCO

Cllr. John McGinley got the following response to his motion asking for the provision of a pedestrian crossing at this location:

"The road design team will undertake a survey of the location with a view to establishing the need, or otherwise, for either an un-signalised crossing (with a central median) or alternatively a signalised version. Given current constraints on staffing resources, it is,

As a result of Cllr. John McGinley's motion Council Officials have promised that there will be a report presented to the July Area Meeting on the proposed landscaping at the bottom of Old Greenfield.

Bollards at the Bottom of Old Greenfield

As it would now appear that a large number of residents want the bollards to remain in place, and given this level of support for retaining the bollards, Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council not to proceed with the Public Display for their removal.

Improved Signage for Meadowbrook Link Road

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to provide proper signage for the Meadowbrook Link Road at the ESSO station and at Woodlands. The signs would indicate "Town Centre/Rathcoffey" at ESSO and "M4 straight ahead" at Woodlands.

Traffic in the evening is backed up on the Straffan Road to the ESSO station, yet at the same time there is practically no traffic on Parson Street as motorists have yet to get used to this alternative route to Main Street.

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

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

Editorial

Maynooth Newsletter Editorial 2007

The festival is drawing to a close as this is written and a slight improvement in the weather at the weekend helped to make it a successful event: Congratulations to all involved.

The weather has been a constant topic of conversation over the supposed "summer" months and as we watch the huge floods in England the term "global warming" has been replaced by the much more appropriate "climate change". Maynooth has experienced such atrocious flooding in the recent past and it is a truism that if planners and developers are allowed to build on flood plains and to cover large areas in concrete, flooding will continue and indeed increase. Water must go somewhere and without suitable land to absorb the lashing rain, it will inevitably accumulate somewhere. If the new housing estate happens to be in the way then it may fall victim to this natural phenomenon. Can Ireland cope if we suffer such a disaster?

The early Irish believed that the king was the centre of the cosmos, the axis of their existence; their well being and the health of the land depended on their prince's truth. This was a basic tenet of their belief. If the weather was bad or the crops failed, resulting in famine and death, it was blamed on the king – it proved that he was no longer truthful or honest. But seriously, Maynooth is facing one of the most important decisions to be made for the next number of years - the composition of the latest Development Plan. It is essential that the public get involved in this decision making process – and it will be discussed at the next Community Council meeting. There are vacancies for a number of housing estates and we would urge people to get involved. It gives you an opportunity to contribute to this debate and to be part of the planning of the future of our town for the next number of years. The Community Council has also been involved in shaping the Action Area Plans for the town. It is crucial that Maynooth maintains its village atmosphere and that it is not allowed to grow in the unsustainable way that can be seen in similar villages all over Ireland particularly for the past ten years. So join the Community Council and have your say.

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Maynooth Community Council Notes

The July meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 9th of July in the Glenroyal Hotel

New member Deirdre Cullen was co-opted to the Council.

Town Council Status

The long running saga of Town Council Status for Maynooth was raised again: we are now 15 years looking for this. We will have to keep working on it. Agreed that we write to the Minister also, Deirdre Cullen and Margaret Clinch will work on this and help to move it forward.

Pay Parking Proposal

Kildare County Council are proposing to put forward a package at the next meeting of K.C.C. There is a similar package working in Celbridge. The 4 area Councillors will decide if this proposal is adapted; if it is approved then the Proposal will go on display in September.

John McGinley showed examples of parking rates in Celbridge. One hour limit St. Patrick's Park €3. Other areas 1 hour limit up to €1. and a 2 hour limit up to €1 per 2 hours. Long Stay Parking area - €3—4 hour parking within certain time period. €5—All Day Parking and €50 –Monthly Parking Ticket.

Hugh Gallagher wondered who would be responsible for insurance while cars are parked and also that residence won't have to pay. A local bus service would be of great benefit here and better bicycle and moped parking should be looked at.

It was noted that a private bus operator has applied for a licence. Paul Croghan said that all parking places are gone by 7 am and also to be careful where parking is introduced as it could mean the end of any free places.

Margaret Clinch said that the White Water centre has created a lot of parking facilities in Newbridge and also reasonable priced parking was extended in Newbridge to accommodate parking.

There is not enough parking in Maynooth and there should be provision for customers parking. The town is suffering because of the lack of parking spaces said Paul Croghan and if places like Aldi etc could give a reasonable rate for parking this would bring cars out to these places and not in estates.

John McGinley said that people can't shop in Maynooth for the simple reason that they can't get into the town. The underground car parking planed for the Harbour Field is held up because funding for this is held up by Central Government. The worrying fact that a planning application has being lodged for the Harbour Field and Parsons Street area was raised by John McGinley and that nothing is happening with the Action Area Plans for the Geraldine Hall and Harbour Field. It was felt that this will have to be looked at.

It was proposed that Maynooth Community Council would object to the new development at the Harbour Field and Parsons Street area until such times that all this area is developed as one project. A letter is to be sent to the Co Manager asking that a Project Manager be appointed for the Harbour Area Action Plan.

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes Know your rights

Question

I am earning the minimum wage in my job. I have heard that the minimum wage has changed but my employer says that my wages will not increase because the change was already made to my wages in January. Is this correct?

Answer

The minimum wage did increase on 1 January 2007 but there is another increase that applies from 1 July.

In January, the minimum wage for an experienced adult worker increased from €7.65 to €8.30 an hour.

From 1 July 2007 this rate increases again to €8.65 per hour.

The new minimum rate for employees under the age of 18 is ≤ 6.06 an hour.

After reaching the age of 18, you must be paid at least €6.92 an hour during the first year of employment and €7.79 an hour during the second year. You are then entitled to the minimum wage for an experienced adult worker.

There is a lower minimum age for employees who are in certain training or study courses that will improve their work performance. They are entitled to a percentage of the national minimum wage depending on how much of the training they have completed.

The minimum wage does not apply if you are employed by a close relative or if you are working in a statuary apprenticeship, for example as an apprentice plumber or electrician.

If your employer provides your food (board) or accommodation (lodgings), then this is taken into account as contributing towards the minimum payment. The amounts that are taken into account are the same as before 1 July:

- €54.13 a week for full board and lodgings, or €7.73 a day
- €32.14 a week for full board only, or €4.60 a day
- €21.85 a week for lodgings only, or €3.14 a day.

Question

Will I lose my entitlement to Rent Supplement if I start working in a full-time job?

Answer

Rent Supplement is paid to people living in private residential accommodation who cannot provide for the cost of their accommodation from their own resources.

If you are on Rent Supplement and are in need of long-term housing you can apply to your local authority for the Rental Accommodation Scheme. Under this scheme the local authority arranges accommodation directly with a landlord.

Until recently a person in full-time employment (30 hours or more per week) was not eligible for Rent Supplement. From 5 June 2007, this rule has changed for those who are accepted as being in need of accommodation under the Rental Accommodation Scheme. If you are in this category and you were not in full-time employment for the previous 12 months, you may now start full-time work and continue to receive Rent Supplement if you meet the other eligibility criteria for payment. This also applies if you were receiving Back to Work Allowance or taking part in a Community Employment Scheme for 12 months before starting other full-time work.

If you are not eligible for the Rental Accommodation Scheme you will not be able to continue receiving Rent Supplement if you start full-time work. For this reason you should check first with your local authority to ensure that you are eligible for the Rental Accommodation Scheme.

Rent Supplement is a means-tested payment so an increase in your income may effect your eligibility.

From 5 June 2007, changes have been made to the way in which means are assessed for Rent Supplement. Depending on your circumstances, this

may improve your eligibility for Rent Supplement or it could result in an increase in your Rent Supplement payment. The changes will not result in a reduction of your payment if you were in receipt of Rent Supplement when they were introduced.

Question

I have recently received interest on my savings account. MY bank has deducted tax on it but I think I am exempt from tax on deposit interest. Who is exempt from this tax and how can I avoid having it deducted?

Answer

If you deposit a sum of money with a financial institution, any interest you earn is usually liable to a tax called Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT) at 20%. This tax is deducted by the financial Institution before the interest is paid to you.

You are exempt from this tax if your income is below a certain level and either you or your spouse is 65 years of age or over or permanently incapacitated so that you are unable to maintain yourself.

To be exempt, your annual income must not exceed the following amounts. If you are 65 years of age or over, the limit is $\\ilde{}$ 19,000 for an individual or $\\ilde{}$ 38,000 for a married couple. If you are under 65 years and permanently incapacitated, the limit is $\\ilde{}$ 5,210 for an individual or $\\ilde{}$ 10,420 for a married couple. If you have dependent children, these exemption limits are increased by $\\ilde{}$ 575 for each of the first two children and by $\\ilde{}$ 830 for each subsequent child.

Until recently, DIRT was deducted from all relevant interest payments and people who were exempt were required to apply for a refund. This was changed in the Finance Act 2007 so that those who are exempt can now apply to receive interest payments without having DIRT deducted.

To apply, complete appropriate Form and **return it**. **to your Bank/Building Society/Credit Union/ Post Office savings bank manager** who will arrange for future interest to be credited to your account without deduction of DIRT.

If your circumstances change and you no longer qualify to have your interest paid without deduction of DIRT, **you are obliged to notify the local manager** of your Bank/Building Society/Credit Union/Post office savings bank. If either you or your spouse is 65 years or over, you will need to complete form DE1. If you or your spouse is permanently

incapacitated, then complete form DE2. If you are exempt and would like to claim a refund for DIRT that has already been deducted, you can do this by completing Form 54D. You can obtain these application forms from Revenue by phoning Lo-call 1890 30 67 06.

Question

Are there any grants available to help me insulate my home and reduce my fuel bills?

Answer

If you find it difficult to keep your home warm and comfortable or to pay your fuel and electricity bills, you could benefit from the assistance available through the Warmer Homes Scheme which is partfunded by Sustainable Energy Ireland (SEI), Ireland's National Energy Authority. The scheme provides a draught-proofing and home insulation service and it is available in 16 locations around the country.

The help available includes improving the insulation of your attic to reduce the loss of heat through the roof. It also assists with draught-proofing of windows or doors to retain heat.

If your walls have a continuous cavity running within them, it may be possible to fill this with insulation. Cavity wall insulation may be available under the Warmer Homes Scheme but only in certain regions.

Assistance is also available for the fitting of lowenergy light bulbs. Energy saving tips and advice are given to householders receiving work through the scheme.

Eligibility criteria for the Warmer Homes Scheme are determined locally and can vary according to where you live. In some parts of the country a small fee is charged for the work undertaken through the scheme. To find out if the service is available in your area contact:

Fire Safety Tips

Safety Plan.

Make sure all family members know what to do in the event of a fire. Draw a floor plan with at least two ways of escaping every room. Make a drawing for each floor. Dimensions do not need to be correct. Make sure the plan shows important details: stairs, hallways and windows that can be used as fire escape routes.

Test windows and doors—do they open easy enough? Are they wide enough. Or tall enough?

Choose a safe meeting place outside the house.

Practice alerting other members. It is a good idea to keep a bell and flashlight in each bedroom.

Always sleep with the bedroom doors closed. This will keep deadly heat and smoke out of bedrooms, giving you additional time to escape.

Find a way for everyone to sound a family alarm. Yelling, pounding on walls, a whistle etc. are good examples. In a fire time is critical, don't waste time getting dressed, don't search for valuables, just get out. Roll out of bed, stay low. Practice evacuating the building blindfolded. In a real fire situation, the amount of smoke generated by a fire most likely will make it difficult to see.

Install smoke detectors.

Check smoke detectors once a month and change the batteries at least twice a year. Smoke detectors sense abnormal amounts of smoke or invisible combustion gases in the air. They can detect both smouldering and burning fires. At least one smoke detector should be installed on every level of a structure. Purchase smoke detectors labelled with safety standard marks and check each for a warranty which should cover a number of years.

Post emergency numbers near telephones.

Be aware that if a fire threatens your home, you should not place the call to emergency services from inside the home. It is better to get out and place the call to fire authorities from a safe location outside the home.

After a fire emergency.

Give first aid where appropriate. Seriously injured victims should be transported to professional medical

help immediately. Stay out of the damaged building. Return only when fire authorities say it is safe.

Make sure you have a safe fire escape method for all situations.

You may have installed a very expensive home security system. But if you cannot escape the burning structure you have a false level of confidence.

Smokers Need To Be Extra Careful.

Never smoke in bed or when you are sleepy. Carelessly discarded cigarettes are a leading cause of fire deaths in the Ireland.

Be Careful Cooking.

Keep cooking areas clear of combustibles and wear short or tight-fitting sleeves when you cook. Keep the handles of your pots turned inward so they do not over-hang the stove. If grease catches fire, carefully slide a lid over the pan and smother the flames, then turn off the stove.

Matches and Lighters are Dangerous.

In the hands of a child, matches and lighters can be deadly! Store them where kids can't reach them, preferably in a locked area. Teach children that matches and lighters are "tools" and should only be used by adults.

Use Electricity Safely.

If an appliance smokes or has an unusual smell, unplug it immediately and have it repaired. Replace frayed or cracked electrical cords and don't overload extension cords. They should not be run under rugs.

Shock.

You should always keep water and electrical appliances well apart. If you do not follow this rule there is a danger of getting an electric shock. This is particularly true in bathrooms. That is why only shaving sockets are allowed in bathrooms.

Remember.


Never dry or air clothes close to any fire. They could touch the heating elements or fall into flames.

Children's Recipes

Mice in Jackets

Ingredients

4 potatoes 1 tbsp oil 30g/1oz butter 6 tbsp milk grated cheese salt and freshly gratery tomatoes



grated cheese salt and freshly ground black pepper cherry tomatoes chives raisins radishes spring onions

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C/400F/Gas 6.
- 2. Wash the potatoes and pat them dry. Prick the skins with a fork and put the potatoes on a baking tray. Brush them all over with oil.
- 3. Bake the potatoes until they are soft. Medium-sized potatoes take about an hour.
- 4. Cool enough to handle? Then cut off the tops and carefully scoop out the soft potato centres. You can throw away the lids (or eat them).
- 5. Mash the soft centres with the butter, milk and cheese. Add a pinch of salt and pepper, then pop the mixture back into the potato jackets.
- 6. Sprinkle with cheese and cook your potatoes under the grill for a few minutes until they are golden.
- 7. Make a nose and whiskers with half a cherry tomato held in place with a cocktail stick and chives tucked behind.
- 8. Finish decorating with raisin eyes, radish ears and spring onion tails.

ල ් ingerbread Men

- 250g/8oz Plain flour
- 75g/3oz Butter (at room temperature)
- 75g/3oz Brown Sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda
- 2 oz/50g Golden Syrup
- 1 Egg Yolk
- 1/2 teaspoon Ground Cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon Ground ginger

Method:

Cream butter & sugar until fluffy.

Add bicarbonate of soda, egg yolk, and golden syrup, and stir.

Sift the flour and spices into the bowl and mix with a wooden spoon until well combined.

Shape into a ball and knead lightly until smooth. Wrap and chill for 30 minutes before using.

Roll out the dough thinly and use a gingerbread cutter to cut into shapes.

Place on lightly greased baking sheets. Leave a space between each one.

Bake at 180°C/350°F/Gas 4 for 10-12 minutes until slightly risen and golden in colour. Transfer to a wire tray to cool.

Mini Pizzas

Ingredients:

- 225g/8oz Self Raising Flour
- 50g/2oz Margarine
- 150ml/1/4pt Milk

Topping

Chopped tomatoes, onion, peppers, & ham. Sliced mushrooms, grated cheese, stoned olives, mixed dried herbs & Tomato Puree.

Method:

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6. Lightly grease two flat baking trays. Sieve the flour into a mixing bowl.

Rub in the margarine until mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs.

Add the milk and mix to a soft dough.

Roll out dough on a lightly floured board and divide into 4 equal pieces.

Press each piece of dough into a thin 15cms/6" round and transfer to the prepared trays.

Mix the tinned tomatoes and the puree together in a small bowl and spoon over each pizza round, spreading it out evenly to the edges.

Layer with topping (or one of your choice) and sprinkle with herbs.

Bake for 15/20 minutes until edges are golden brown.

Oats Eyes (Quick & easy to make Snack)

Bananas, crackers, peanut butter, raisins.

- 1. Slice the bananas at an angle so that they are long and oval.
- 2. Spread your crackers with peanut butter and place the banana slices on top.
- 3. Put a dab of peanut better on the raisins and place in the centre of each banana.



Clubs, Organisations And Societies

Maynooth Town F.C. Season Review 2006/07

Off-field Activities:

Pitches

With the increased numbers of players and teams comes the increased pressure to cater for these numbers. This is most acutely felt when it comes to the allocation of pitches. Whilst unlike most other clubs, we are very fortunate to have our own private ground at Rathcoffey Road and the ongoing use of Dublin Road and Harbour Field, there have been occasions this year where games have had to be cancelled or rescheduled due to insufficient space to accommodate all the assigned matches. And this situation is likely to become even more acute as the town and the club grows even more, requiring us now to be actively considering the acquisition of further land to meet the club's future needs. Some alleviation was obtained when a second small pitch was created in Dublin Road to take some of the pressure off Rathcoffey and training was switched to the Harbour Field.

Weather

A further complicating factor this year was the unprecedented inclement weather experienced from November to February resulting in excess of 8 lost weekends of football and severe backlogs of fixtures at season end.

Training and other facilities

While the priority is to provide playing facilities, i.e. pitches, space for training and proper facilities are an essential prerequisite for any club nowadays. While we can only dream of having our own for now, we are fortunate to be in a position to be able to rent these facilities locally, although this is causing a severe financial drain on the club with families ultimately having to pay towards it. In the long term we should be aiming to install our own all-weather training pitch with floodlights, which could also serve as an income generator for the club.

Clubhouse Development

Significant progress has been achieved in the past 12 months to enable us to confidently predict tonight that next year's agm will be held in our own premises for the first time in our history.

While fundraising was the primary objective for the year to enable the project to proceed, those involved in the development group were also active behind the scenes in lining up developers and architects as well as exploring all other avenues of potential funding. We had high hopes that we would be successful in securing additional Sports Capital "Lotto" funding given that it was an election year, and we were very disappointed to learn that our application was declined and no further funding would be made available to us.

An Information night for parents and other interested parties was held here in February and was well attended. One positive result of that event was the volunteering of many people to assist in whatever way they could with our efforts.

Lohan & Donnelly, a firm of consulting engineers were appointed to conduct the tendering process for the clubhouse and to oversee the construction phase of the project. Tenders were issued to 7 builders and a winning bid was selected in early June. A letter of intent has been issued and the builder hopes to break ground within the next 4 weeks.

The biggest challenge facing us now is the financing burden the club now faces. While the overall cost is greater than we expected, we will have a fully finished clubhouse in the end. Nevertheless the club will have to meet repayments of approximately $\leq 2,500$ per month for the next 15 years.

Fundraising

Car Draw

On the fundraising front the club had and availed of the opportunity to participate in a Monster Car draw being run by Rathcairn Parish Development, and we were able to sell almost 400 tickets raising close to €20,000 in the process. While the main draw encountered problems last December and had to be postponed, it has now resumed and all Maynooth ticket holders are being included in an extra 3 main prize draws to make up for this inconvenience. To date over 60 Maynooth ticket holders have won prizes, and with 5 main draws left, we hope to have many more yet and maybe even a big winner!

Maynooth Town Football Club (cont'd)

Bag-Packing

The Club was given the opportunity to fundraise by means of Bag packing in Boots Liffey Valley on Saturdays in the run up to Christmas. This was to be among the easiest and most lucrative means of fundraising ever undertaken by the club and helped us raise almost €8,000 over 6 weeks.

Pitch-side advertising

Pitch-side advertising has to date generated in excess of €20,000 in income, all from local businesses, but even greater potential exists from this source, particularly if we can find a way to interest national businesses with large advertising budgets.

Premiership trip

The club arrange a Club Trip to watch Everton play Arsenal in the premiership on March 18th last, courtesy of Barton's Transport and Celtic Horizon Tours, and both companies subsequently donated all the proceeds to the clubhouse development fund, amounting to €4,000. The trip itself was a great success, exceptional value, and all 100 members who went on it, young and old, thoroughly enjoyed the day.

Club weekly "Lotto"

The weekly Lotto Draw is still the main regular source of income for the club and with the introduction of the Auto-Lotto it is hoped to improve this vital source of weekly income.

Finance Committee:

Dinner Dance

As mentioned already the information night resulted in a number of parents coming forward willing to get involved in the club and offering their help. One group formed a fundraising committee and their first event was the recently held dinner dance which was a hugely successful night, raising over €7,000 by means of the auction & raffle.

Auto lotto drive

The Fundraising committee have also taken it upon themselves to drive the "auto lotto" among the teams with all members being encouraged to sign up. Using this method you too can be included in the chance to win the jackpot every week for just €8 per month and support the club at the same time.

Calendar:

The same group also plan to produce a Club Calendar later in the year which it is hoped will be on sale in the run up to Christmas and will make an ideal present for Grannies and Aunties everywhere!!!! Again much appreciation is due to all those involved in this group.

Other events:

Apart from fundraising the club members were also involved in a range of other off the field activities: Over 100 players and their parents again took part in this year's Maynooth St Patrick's Day Parade Colm Cahill, a club member currently serving with Goal in Sudan presented a number of old MTFC playing kits to village teams he works with.

Girl's Teams



Garden Projects For August

ell the hydrangeas have never looked as well! They obviously love loads of water! But what can one say about the weather and its affect on us gardeners that is printable in a family magazine? Perhaps not having to water the various hanging baskets, flower pots etc. is a bonus. Also looking at a nice green lawn instead of a brownish one from too much sun as in previous summers, is also a bonus. However when one cannot get out to cut this luscious green grass, and it is beginning to resemble a field, the purchase of one or two sheep has to be considered! What other benefits are there? The smell of neighbours' barbeques or mad that you weren't invited—well that is no longer a problem in the constant downpours! If you are an optimistic type you will be able to get garden furniture etc. at knock down

prices so its not all doom and gloom and we will hopefully have some good weather to look forward to. In the meantime work on the garden has to go on otherwise things will get completely out of hand so the following tips will be useful, hopefully.

Bulbs in August:

Divide older bearded Iris rhizomes. Cut out the woody parts and plant the rest.

Plant fall crocuses now and crown imperials from now until October.

Add several inches of mulch to Asiatic Lilies. This will keep the roots cool, protect them from heat and deter weed growth.

Watch your gladiolus carefully those with heavy blooms may require staking.

Dig up your ranunculus and anemone to store for the winter if you haven't already done so. In warmer zones they can be left in the ground. Just apply a light mulch in fall.

In late August you can dig up overcrowded lily-of-the-valley bulbs that grew poorly. Gently separate each plant and replant individually.

Flowers:

Lay the finished flower stalks of Foxglove on the ground where you want new plants to grow or

sprinkle the seeds from the dried pods.

Continue to keep the soil around your Shasta daisies and ferns moist but not wet. Ferns may become dormant if they get too dry.

Continue to water container plants daily, as needed. Make sure you have provided adequate drainage. Feed every two weeks.

Continue to weed flower beds. Remove faded blooms.

Keep a close eye on your Nasturtium for aphids.

Pick Sweet Peas regularly to encourage more blooms.

Sow Alpine, Oriental and Iceland Poppies outdoors in a seedbed. Add compost or

manure to Oriental Poppies.

Pick fresh flowers for indoors. This will also encourage more blooms on most perennials.

Remember to keep your strawflowers well watered. Try not to get the flowers wet when watering.

Vegetables:

Gather herbs for drying as they mature. Pinch the stems of basil regularily to prevent flowering. Harvest once a week.

Harvest sweet corn by pulling and twisting downwards.

Bend over the tops of your cooking onions to prepare for lifting them.

Harvest peas and broad beans before pods get tough.

Lift maincrop potatoes after the stems have died.

Harvest artichokes while the scales are still tight.

Harvest cucumbers as they mature.

General Yard and Garden Care:

Don't forget to moisten your compost regularly to prevent flies from breeding in it.

Hose between rows and plants regularly.

Water plants in the early morning to prevent mildew.

Water according to the weather. Pay close attention to raised beds and container plants.

Continue to watch for and get rid of weeds before they go to seed.

Lawns:

Now is the time to feed lawns with a slow-acting fertilizer.

Cut your lawn and trim the edge regularly.



Watch out for yellow patches, leaf curl or poor growth. Increase watering if you notice any of these signs.

Fruit & Berries:

Remove suckers and old canes from blackberries and raspberries as they appear. Harvest the berries when they fall off easily.


Continue to keep the grass short around your fruit trees. Grass deprives the trees of nitrogen.

Remove all but two runners on strawberry plants.

Water blueberries, gooseberries and currants often during hot weather.

Throw away any fruits you find that have been affected by scab (fungus).

Flight of the Earls 1607 400th Anniversary

Bridget FitzGerald, an Earl's wife who was left behind at the Flight of the Earls in 1607

he most important historical commemoration this year is the four-hundred anniversary of the Flight of the Earls which occurred on 14 September 1607. There is an important county Kildare involvement in this event and the connection was centred in this very building, Maynooth Castle.

Ask anyone that has passed through the Irish educational system to name the two principal individuals involved in the Flight of the Earls and you would be informed O'Neill and O'Donnell. What occurred was a number of Irish Chieftains fled the country taking their families with them. Rory O'Donnell



brought his 11 month old son and heir but he didn't get time to bring his pregnant wife Bridget. Bridget was a FitzGerald the daughter of the Earl of Kildare and at the time of the Flight she was here in this very Castle.

Bridget FitzGerald was born in 1589 in Maynooth. Her father was Henry FitzGerald the 12th Earl of Kildare. She was the granddaughter of Gerald the Wizard Earl who was the brother of the famous Silken Thomas. Bridget was actually named after St Bridget the patron saint of Kildare. In 1597 when she was 8 years old her father was killed fighting on the side of Queen Elizabeth in the Nine Years War. Four years later in 1601 when Bridget was 12 years old her Mother remarried and she was left in the care of her Grandmother Mapel Brown the Dowager Kildare. In 1605 Bridget then aged 16 married Rory O'Donnell. He was the Earl of Tyrconnell, head of the O'Donnells and brother of the famous Red Hugh O'Donnell.

In the Flight of the Earls episode there was a plot and there is evidence that some of the plotting occurred here in Maynooth. Rory O'Donnell on a visit to Maynooth Castle had discussions with Richard Nugent his wife's cousin and informed him of plans to capture Dublin Castle and kill the Lord Deputy. He also informed Nugent that Hugh O'Neill, Maguire and some of the Old English Lords of the Pale were involved in the conspiracy. Details of the plot were subsequently leaked to the Lord Deputy. The Lord Deputy who had been endeavouring for some time to obtain evidence in order to imprison O'Donnell, now planned to have O'Donnell arrested as he passed through Dublin on his way to visit his wife at Maynooth. Plans were also afoot to arrest O'Neill. But the Earls were tipped off that Government were planning to arrest them and on 14 September 1607 the Flight of the Earls took place. Rory O'Donnell brought his 11 month son Hugh but was unable to bring Bridget his wife.

Two days after the flight on 16 September Fr. Eoghan Groome McGrath who was in the service of O'Donnell visited Bridget in Maynooth Castle. They had a secret meeting in a garden at Maynooth Castle known as the 'Moyglare Garden'. According to tradition, this garden was on the opposite side of the Lyreen River to here, where the 'Mill Centre' is today. Fr. McGrath passed on to Bridget a message and money from her husband. The money consisted of 81 pieces of gold. Bridget and her Grandmother then travelled to Howth and stayed with Christopher St Laurence. He was actually the man who had tipped off the authorities about the plot. It appears now he attempted to play both sides and assist Bridget on leaving the country in order to join her husband on the continent. However the attempts were unsuccessful. The Lord Deputy, Chichester, then investigated her role and demanded an explanation. At this point, Bridget wrote a letter to the Lord Deputy indicating that she was unaware of any plotting. Chichester in order to prevent her from leaving the country for the continent sent her to London where she met the King. An eye witness at Court gave the following account: 'she kissed his majesty's hand and a sweeter face you never saw. Indeed the king wondered, her husband, left so fair a face behind'. Bridget's second child a girl was born in October 1607 and she named her after the King's mother Mary Stuart.

Ten months after the flight in July 1608, Rory O'Donnell died from a fever in Rome. Bridget was then a widow, aged only 19 years. Their son Hugh was cared for by his aunt Nuala O'Donnell at Louvain. Later attempts aimed at getting Hugh restored to his Earldom were unsuccessful. Hugh subsequently became an officer in the army of the Spanish Netherlands and died fighting with his regiment in Spain in 1642.

As for Bridget the King granted her an annual income of £300 and this eventually enabled her to find a suit-

able husband. In 1617 at the age of 28 she married 25 year-old Nicholas Barnwall of Turvey near Donabate. She had nine children by her second husband that is a total of eleven children. The couple were not without difficulties in the subsequent years. They had to flee to Wales for two years after the 1641 Rebellion. Cromwell imprisoned Nicholas in 1654 and confiscated his lands. The lands, however, were restored in 1660. Nicholas died in 1663 and was buried in the Church in Lusk. Bridget FitzGerald died in 1682 in her 93rd year and was buried beside her second husband.

So in six weeks time on the anniversary of the Flight of the Earls let us not forget that there was a very important connection with Maynooth.

Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan

This plan was adopted by Kildare County Council in February 2006. As very little progress was made, and there was a danger that individual landowners would apply for planning permission, Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Full Council:

"That a Project Team be appointed to progress the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan Cllr. John McGinley made the following points in support of his motion:

"The area in question is at the heart of Maynooth, bordered by Maynooth College, The Geraldine Castle, The Royal Canal and the amenity of the Harbour Field.

There are some 14 acres designated for residential development, 5 acres for amenity/community use and 1.5 acres for a Better Government Civic Building on the Council owned land.

Maynooth being the only University town in Ireland should be special.

We should be looking at Oxford and Cambridge to see how University towns can grow properly. As the Harbour Site is at the heart of the town it needs to be developed to 5 Star standards.

If individual developers go their own way there will be a fragmented approach and that is what will happen unless the Council appoint a Project Management Team to drive the project. The Team would include Director Leader, Finance, Planner and Architect and they should be contracted in as happens elsewhere for such major projects.

I believe that is the best and only way forward. Get the developers to act in consort and come up with a Joint Venture proposal covering the Residential Area, the new Streets, the Civic Building, the Geraldine Hall, the Harbour Field and Underground parking. All underground parking is specified for the residential and civic building areas and we have also specified such parking underneath the Harbour Field primarily for the train commuters.

The Project Management Team would then bring the Joint Venture proposals back to full Council for approval."

The Council unanimously agreed to Cllr. McGinley's motion at it's meeting on 26th March. Unfortunately, Council officials have still not acted on the motion and Cllr. John McGinley's worstfears have come to pass as a Planning Application has been submitted for a section of the area. Planning Application 07/1428 calls for:

- (a) demolition of houses numbered 12,13 & 14,erection of 2 storey extensions to side of houses numbered 11 & 15 Parson St.
- (b) erection of 3 no.blocks of varying height up to 5 storeys consisting of 7 no.retail units, 1 no.creche and 3 no. restaurants

The closing date for Objections is 26th July and Cllr. John McGinley and his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg will make their views known on the inappropriate building heights proposed and any other negative aspects of the proposal as it affects the Built Environment of the Historic Core of Maynooth.

Additional Litter Bins Needed in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That funding be provided for the installation and emptying of additional litterbins in Maynooth."

John had earlier asked the Area Engineer to provide the bins and he got the following reply:

"The Area Engineer has confirmed that there is no funding currently available for the installation, maintenance or emptying of additional bins."

Parsons Hall being Taken in Charge

The Council agreed at it's meeting on June 25th to put on Public Display their intention to take Parsons Hall in charge. Also, as Moyglare Meadows is at an advanced stage in the Taking in Charge process it is anticipated that it will be ready to go on public display in the next few weeks.

Allocation of Discretionary Grants

Cllr. John McGinley has allocated a further €7,000 for a traffic calming ramp at 4/6 The Paddocks, Moyglare Abbey and has asked the Council to use the remainder of his Discretionary Grants for footpath repairs in Oaklawn West, Leixlip.

F.F. Promises on Gaelcholaiste for North Kildare broken in 6 weeks - A record—Stagg

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised F.F. for building up the hopes of both parents and pupils of Gaelscoils in Kilcock, Maynooth and Leixlip that an All Irish Second Level School was still on the Agenda for North Kildare during the General Election Campaign.

Deputy Stagg questioned the Minister for Education on this matter in the Dáil on 26th June and the Minister responded as follows – "County Kildare VEC recently applied for the establishment of a separate all-Irish post primary school in Maynooth. The Department has given careful consideration to the application and has decided that the application should not be granted. In arriving at this conclusion, account was taken of the fact that Colaiste Cois Life in Lucan was established to serve the needs of the West Dublin and North Kildare area".

On May 14th last, prior to the General Election, F.F. then candidate Aine Brady stated she contacted the Minister immediately following the rejection of the proposal and that she was delighted that the Minister had now heeded her call and agreed to review the case for a Gaelcholaiste for the north of Kildare.

The Review stated Deputy Stagg was nothing short of a Political Ploy by FF to keep the issue alive and then give the bad news to Parents and Pupils after the Election. This is the type of shenanigans which gives Politics a bad name but is to be expected from FF.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to keep the issue on the Agenda for the next 5 years and eventually embarrass FF into action in supporting the Irish Language in North Kildare.

Stagg welcomes rejection of restaurant/wine bar in residential area

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Kildare Co. Council to refuse planning permission for a Restaurant and Wine Bar at 1 Pound Lane, Maynooth.

Last November Deputy Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley objected to the proposal given the adverse effect it would have had on residential amenity in this old residential area of Maynooth.

The Council in refusing Planning Permission stated 'The proposed site is located within the Historic Core of the Town in a defined Architectural Conservation Area. Objective 3.11.2 of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 states that it is the policy of the Council to protect and enhance the character of the area. Having regard to this objective, it is deemed that the proposed development if permitted, would adversely affect the architectural conservation area by reason of its inappropriate design and scale, would set an undesirable precedent and would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.'

Deputy Stagg indicated that the refusal could have been stronger given the affect the proposal would have had on the amenities of residents in the area but should an appeal be lodged he will, along with Cllr. John McGinley, reiterate their serious concerns about the proposal.

Dublin Bus agree to additional bus stops at Griffin Rath

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have welcomed the agreement by Dublin Bus to provide additional inbound and outbound bus stops near Griffin Rath Estate on the Celbridge Road in Maynooth.

The issue was raised with Deputy Stagg during the recent General Election and Dublin Bus recently advised Deputy Stagg that they had obtained statutory orders for the additional bus stops and once a hard stand is constructed for the Dublin Bound side the orders will be processed. Dublin Bus are at present in discussions with Kildare Co. Council in this matter.

Deputy Stagg stated that the provision of the additional Bus Stops will encourage residents to avail

of Public Transport and save them a considerable walk to Railpark to avail of the service as they have to do at present in this great Summer weather we are having.

THREAT TO MAYNOOTH MAIN STREET TREES LIFTED

On foot of assurances from Kildare Co. Council Director of Services Joe Boland that Traffic Related works associated with the Redevelopment of the Tesco Supermarket on the Dublin Road, Maynooth, will not involve interference with or the removal of any of the Trees on Main Street, Maynooth, Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have withdrawn their appeal to An Bord Pleanala in relation to the Planning Permission Granted for the redevelopment of Tesco`s.

All parties who appealed the decision have withdrawn their appeals and Deputy Emmet Stagg is delighted with the result which he has described as a Great Day for the people of Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley had appealed the decision last January because a condition imposed by the Council left open the option of removing the 8 trees from the Square to Hand's old House to create an additional traffic lane on Main Street. Deputy Stagg had described the proposal at the time as an act of State Vandalism against the Community of Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg indicated that there appeared to be certain people within the Council who had an Agenda against the Trees and the assurances now received from the Director of Services has put them in their place.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that this was one of his and Cllr. McGinley`s most successful outcomes in terms of Planning with the unique beauty of the Trees and their environment in the Heart of Maynooth now secured for future generations.



Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes Know your rights

Question

I am starting college in the autumn. How can I get a student grant and how much is it?

Answer

The Higher Education Grants Scheme provides means-tested grants to eligible students on approved courses. Application forms are available from your local authority which administers the grant. For the academic year 2007/2008 the application should be with the local authority by 31 August 2007.

The scheme is also available to full time students who are attending full-time undergraduate courses of at least two years' duration in publicly funded third-level institutions in other EU members states, with certain exceptions.

The family limits (for the period 1 Jan—31 December 2006 are as follows:

The limits can be increased by a further \in 4,685 where there are two children attending full-time third-level education, and a further \in 4,685 for each additional child.

The maintenance grant rates are as follows:

The adjacent rates is paid if you normally reside 24 km or less from your college. Mature students will receive the non-adjacent rate in all cases.

There are special rates of maintenance grants for disadvantaged students: \in 6,690 for the non-adjacent rate and \in 2,680 for the adjacent rate. The income limit for these grants is \in 18,055. You must be receiving an eligible social welfare or other payment.

Question

Is there any support available to help with the cost of uniforms for students going back to school in September?

Answer

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance is a payment for parents or guardians to assist with the cost of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. You may also claim for a child aged 18-22 in full-time education for whom a payment is included in your social welfare payment.

Those taking part in a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or getting a Back to Education Allowance are eligible. The allowance is also available to people on employment schemes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance, and Revenue Job Assist who retain their secondary benefits, (that is, gross weekly household income is less than €317.43). If they do not they do not meet this condition they can apply under the normal income limits given above.

The allowance paid is €180 for each child aged 2-11 years and €285 for each child aged 12-22 years before 1 October.

The scheme is administered by the Health Service Executive as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Families should apply to the Community Welfare Officer at their local Health Centre before the end of September.

Question

I have been receiving Illness Benefit but I am now considering returning to work. Will I be able to return to Illness Benefit if I start work but find that I am not able to continue?

Answer

Illness Benefit (formerly called Disability Benefit) is a payment for people who are unable to work because they are ill. In general, you need to have paid a certain number of Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contributions in order to qualify.

Until recently, people receiving Illness Benefit who returned to work and became ill again could find that they then qualified only for a reduced rate of payment.

This was changed in the Social Welfare Act 2007 which provides that, where you have been getting Illness Benefit for at least two years, then return to work for less than 26 weeks and become ill again, you will not get a lower rate of benefit than you were previously receiving.

If you were receiving Illness Benefit for at least five years, but you return to work and discover within 13 weeks that you are not fit to work, you may return to Illness Benefit without having to satisfy any further conditions.

To qualify for Illness Benefit, you must have at least 52 PRSI contributions paid since starting work. In addition, you also need to meet one of the following requirements:

- Have at least 39 weeks PRSI contributions paid or credited in the tax year before last (which is 2005 for claims this year). At least 13 of these must be paid contributions but there are rules which may allow other years to be taken into account to meet this requirement.
- Have 26 contributions paid in the tax year before last as well as 26 paid in the year before that. The application form for Illness Benefit is available from your GP.

Question

I have just returned from my holidays but my luggage has either been delayed or lost by the airline. Am I entitled to any compensation?

Answer

You can make a claim for compensation for luggage that is either delayed, lost or damaged by an airline.

It is important to report the loss, damage or delay at the airport and complete a Property Irregularity Report (PIR). This will include information regarding the details of your flight, your baggage, your name address, etc. You will be given a copy of the PIR and the airline will retain the other copy.

You will also need to write a letter of complaint to the airline within specific time limits. For damaged bags and items that are missing from baggage, the time limit is seven days. For delayed baggage, the time limit is 21 days from the time that a bag has been delivered.

Luggage is considered lost if it has not arrived within 21 days or if the airline admits the loss.

For checked luggage, claims are limited to a maximum of 1,000 SDRs (approximately €1,100). The value of an SDR is based on a number of international currencies and is available at www.imf.org.

If baggage is lost or delayed during a holiday, remember to keep receipts for any items you have to purchase as a result.

If you have holiday insurance, you should check to see if it covers lost, damaged or delayed baggage and advise your insurance company of the loss or damage as soon as you can.

Maynooth Town F.C. Season Review 2006/07 (cont'd from last month)

Off-field Activities:

Pitches

With the increased numbers of players and teams comes the increased pressure to cater for these numbers. This is most acutely felt when it comes to the allocation of pitches. Whilst unlike most other clubs, we are very fortunate to have our own private ground at Rathcoffey Road and the ongoing use of Dublin Road and Harbour Field, there have been occasions this year where games have had to be cancelled or rescheduled due to insufficient space to accommodate all the assigned matches. And this situation is likely to become even more acute as the town and the club grows even more, requiring us now to be actively considering the acquisition of further land to meet the club's future needs. Some alleviation was obtained when a second small pitch was created in Dublin Road to take some of the pressure off Rathcoffey and training was switched to the Harbour Field.

Weather

A further complicating factor this year was the unprecedented inclement weather experienced from November to February resulting in excess of 8 lost weekends of football and severe backlogs of fixtures at season end.

Training and other facilities

While the priority is to provide playing facilities, i.e. pitches, space for training and proper facilities are an essential prerequisite for any club nowadays. While we can only dream of having our own for now, we are fortunate to be in a position to be able to rent these facilities locally, although this is causing a severe financial drain on the club with families ultimately having to pay towards it. In the long term we should be aiming to install our own all-weather training pitch with floodlights, which could also serve as an income generator for the club.

Clubhouse Development

Significant progress has been achieved in the past 12 months to enable us to confidently predict tonight that next year's agm will be held in our own premises for the first time in our history.

While fundraising was the primary objective for the year to enable the project to proceed, those involved in the development group were also active behind the scenes in lining up developers and architects as well as exploring all other avenues of potential funding. We had high hopes that we would be successful in securing additional Sports Capital "Lotto" funding given that it was an election year, and we were very disappointed to learn that our application was declined and no further funding would be made available to us.

An Information night for parents and other interested parties was held here in February and was well attended. One positive result of that event was the volunteering of many people to assist in whatever way they could with our efforts.

Lohan & Donnelly, a firm of consulting engineers were appointed to conduct the tendering process for the clubhouse and to oversee the construction phase of the project. Tenders were issued to 7 builders and a winning bid was selected in early June. A letter of intent has been issued and the builder hopes to break ground within the next 4 weeks.

The biggest challenge facing us now is the financing burden the club now faces. While the overall cost is greater than we expected, we will have a fully finished clubhouse in the end. Nevertheless the club will have to meet repayments of approximately $\leq 2,500$ per month for the next 15 years.

On the fundraising front the club had and availed of the opportunity to participate in a Monster Car draw being run by Rathcairn Parish Development, and we were able to sell almost 400 tickets raising close to €20,000 in the process. While the main draw encountered problems last December and had to be postponed, it has now resumed and all Maynooth ticket holders are being included in an extra 3 main prize draws to make up for this inconvenience. To date over 60 Maynooth ticket holders have won prizes, and with 5 main draws left, we hope to have many more yet and maybe even a big winner!

Bag-Packing

The Club was given the opportunity to fundraise by means of Bag packing in Boots Liffey Valley on Saturdays in the run up to Christmas. This was to be among the easiest and most lucrative means of fundraising ever undertaken by the club and helped us raise almost €8,000 over 6 weeks.

Pitch-side advertising

Pitch-side advertising has to date generated in excess of €20,000 in income, all from local businesses, but even greater potential exists from this source, particularly if we can find a way to interest national businesses with large advertising budgets.

Premiership trip

The Club arranged a Club Trip to watch Everton play Arsenal in the premiership on March 18th last, courtesy of Barton's Transport and Celtic Horizon Tours, and both companies subsequently donated all the proceeds to the clubhouse development fund, amounting to €4,000. The trip itself was a great success, exceptional value, and all 100 members who went on it, young and old, thoroughly enjoyed the day.

Club weekly "Lotto"

The weekly Lotto Draw is still the main regular source of income for the club and with the introduction of the Auto-Lotto it is hoped to improve this vital source of weekly income.

Finance Committee:

Dinner Dance

As mentioned already the information night resulted in a number of parents coming forward willing to get involved in the club and offering their help. One group formed a fundraising committee and their first event was the recently held dinner dance which was a hugely successful night, raising over €7,000 by means of the auction & raffle.

Auto lotto drive

The Fundraising committee have also taken it upon themselves to drive the "auto lotto" among the teams with all members being encouraged to sign up. Using this method you too can be included in the chance to win the jackpot every week for just €8 per month and support the club at the same time.

Calendar:

The same group also plan to produce a Club Calendar later in the year which it is hoped will be on sale in the run up to Christmas and will make an ideal present for Grannies and Aunties everywhere!!!! Again much appreciation is due to all those involved in this group.

Other events:

Apart from fundraising the club members were also involved in a range of other off the field activities:

In first place, Gerry & Mary McTernan along with young Robert Moore took first place with 65 net points.



Weights and Measures

For a recipe to work well, it's important to measure the ingredients accurately. Here are a few tips to help you.

- When you measure a liquid, look at the mark measuring cup at eye level, not from the above.
- If you're using a spoon to measure, make sure that the ingredients are level with the edge of the spoon and not heaped up.
- If you are measuring something like herbs, a liquid or salt in a spoon don't hold the spoon over the mixture you are cooking, just in case some spills out of the spoon and into the mixture.
- If you don't have a tablespoon you can use a teaspoon instead . Three teaspoons is the same as one table-spoon.

Measuring liquids and solids.

These conversions are equivalent measurements which, are easy to use when you are cooking. They are not exact conversions.

All about September



S

eptember is the ninth month of the year in the Gregorian Calendar and one of four Gregorian months with 30 days.

Recipes

Pan Cooked Chicken Dishes

ooking on the hob is one of the easiest ways to make a delicious chicken meal — and it is more versatile than you think. Explore the many different ways you can take a pan, a chicken and a few extra ingredients and turn them into a real feast.

hai Red Chicken Curry

Ingredients

400ml canned coconut milk

3 tablespoons red Thai curry paste

4 chicken breasts

4 tablespoons fish sauce or soy sauce

2 tablespoons caster sugar

225g canned bamboo shoots in brine

1 medium-sized aubergine

Juice of 1 lime

Fresh basil leaves

1 tablespoon of grated fresh coconut



Method

Pour 200ml of the canned coconut milk into a large saucepan. Stir in the red Thai curry paste and bring the mixture to the boil. Boil rapidly for 4 minutes or until the sauce is reduced by half.

Using a sharp knife, cut the chicken breasts into 2.5cm pieces. Add to the coconut sauce in the pan and bring back to the boil. Reduce the heat to low and simmer the chicken for 5 minutes, stirring now and again.

Stir in the fish sauce or soy sauce and the sugar and bring back to the boil. Drain the bamboo shoots and cut into matchsticks. Cut the aubergine into small chunks. Add to the pan with the bamboo shoots. Bring up to the boil again, lower the heat and simmer for about 5 minutes.

Stir in the remaining canned coconut milk, lime juice and 2 tablespoons shredded basil leaves. Spoon the curry into a serving dish and serve sprinkled with more basil leaves and the grated fresh coconut.

weet and Sour Chicken Stir-Fry

Ingredients

4 chicken breasts, skinned and boned

2 garlic cloves

1cm fresh ginger

1 bunch spring onions

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

225g canned water chestnuts

2 carrots

3 tablespoons soy sauce

1 tablespoons sherry

2 tablespoons tomato purée

2 tablespoons rice wine vinegar

Pinch of sugar

Method

Using a sharp knife, cut the chicken breasts into thick strips, 4cm long.

Finely chop or crush the garlic cloves. Peel the ginger and cut into pieces the size of matchsticks. Trim the spring onions and thickly slice on the diagonal.

Heat the oil in a wok over high heat until almost smoking. Add the ginger and garlic and stir-fry for 1 minute. Add the chicken and stir-fry for a further 5 minutes, until browned. Add the spring onions and stir-fry for 1 minute.

Drain the water chestnuts and cut in half. Peel and cut carrots into matchsticks. Add to the wok with the spring onions and stir-fry for 1 minute.

Mix the rest of the ingredients together. Add to wok and stir-fry for 30 seconds. Garnish with shredded spring onions if liked.

Ingredients

1.5kg chickenSalt100g plain flour150g dried breadcrumbs2 eggs3 tablespoons milkVegetable oil for deep fat frying



Method

Cut the chicken into 12 pieces and then rub all over with salt. Put the flour and the breadcrumbs into two separate shallow bowls. Break the eggs into another shallow bowl and beat with the milk.

Dip the chicken pieces in the flour and shake off any excess. Next dip in the egg, then roll in the bread-crumbs, patting on the crumbs to make a firm coating.

Heat the oil for deep-fat frying to 190°C. Deep-fry the chicken in 3 batches, for about 15 minutes each batch, turning once. The breast portions will need slightly less time — about 12 minutes. As they are fried, put the cooked chicken pieces on a plate lined with kitchen paper towels and keep warm in a low oven.

Cut the lemon into wedges. Tear the parsley into small sprigs. Garnish the chicken with the lemon wedges and parsley. Alternatively, you can deep-fry the parsley sprigs for a few seconds in the hot oil to make it nice and crisp.

oroccan Chicken with Honey

Ingredients

- 1.5kg chicken
- 2 oranges
- 1 lemon
- 3 tablespoons runny honey
- 1 onion
- 1 garlic clove
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 300mls hot chicken stock
- 1/2 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon saffron powder
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- Salt and black pepper

Method

Cut the chicken into 8 pieces and put into a large shallow bowl. Squeeze the juice of one of the oranges and the lemon into a small bowl and stir in the honey.

Pour the fruit juice and honey over the chicken pieces and toss to coat all over. Cover the bowl and leave at room temperature for 1 hour, turning the pieces now and again.

Peel and finely chop the onion and garlic. Remove the chicken from the marinade and reserve. Heat the oil in a large pan, add the onion and garlic and fry for 10 minutes over low heat. Add the chicken and fry for 10 minutes over moderately high heat.

Add the chicken stock and 2 tablespoons of the reserved marinade. Add the turmeric, saffron, ginger, salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat to the low, cover and simmer for 45 minutes.

Peel and segment the other orange, leaving behind all the white pith and membranes. Transfer the chicken to a serving bowl and garnish with the orange.



Health & Fitness Tips

Healthy Habits

- ◆ Just like brushing your teeth, healthy habits should be cultivated on a daily basis. The following is a guide to daily tasks: Activity should be a daily occurrence. Walk, run or jump for a minimum total of 20 minutes a day.
- Protect your skin. Sun block should be applied on face, neck, arms and hands even in the dead of winter. It protects against climatic toxins too. Moisturize skin daily.
- ◆ Eat fruits, vegetables, grains, low-fat dairy products and small amounts of protein. Avoid sweets and other processed foods.

- ◆ Exercise your brain. Read, study, solve problems, and learn new skills. As does the body, the brain atrophies with lack of use.
- ◆ Hug somebody.

Water is Essential

Water is essential to life. If we go without food we can survive for long periods but if we deprive ourselves of water we will surely die in a matter of days.

The simple facts are that we need water to:

- carry waste products out of the body
- to keep the skin structure supple
- to carry nutrients to the various organs
- to regulate temperature controls

When we perspire we lose fluid (water) through the skin via the pores. If we lose too much we suffer.

Most people walk around in a dehydrated condition. They complain of having headaches, being tired, not able to concentrate.

In extreme circumstances, lack of sufficient water can cause heat exhaustion.

When we need water, perhaps during a hot day or after exercise, our body triggers our mind into wanting to drink, to slake our thirst. During an absorbing activity where our concentration is focused on performing well, the demands of the body for fluids can easily be ignored or not recognized.

It is important that you drink water before exercise, preferably about 2 hours before starting and at least half to one pint depending upon the level of exertion you expect to make.

Daily Exercise

Getting just a half hour of physical activity into each day offers substantial benefits to your health.

Walk 10 Minutes a Day.

Increase Your Fitness Level. Old thinking was to work out in a sweat-filled gym for hours a day. No pain, no gain. New studies show that even short bouts of activity can increase your fitness level, especially if you're new at working out.

Park and Walk.

Whenever you have an errand, park your car as far away as you can handle and walk to the store. At the shopping centre, park at the farthest end and walk the length of the shopping centre. Use every opportunity to walk. At the end of the day, it all adds up to better fitness.

Tummy Crunch in Bed.

Before you even get out of bed in the morning, do 10 stomach crunches while lying flat on your mattress. Increase daily by one until you get up to 100. Think you'll never get there? Try it. You may eventually have to set your clock to wake up 15 minutes earlier, a small price to pay for a flatter stomach.

Tips of the week

Take your E supplements even if you think you don't need them. They have proved to be very beneficial for your overall health. Recent research has shown that it can help to prevent cancer and surprisingly arthritis

full sun in a well-drained soil and divide every few years to improve flowering. Other plants which are also good at this time of year include ornamental grasses, heleniums, perennial asters and Michaelmas daisies.

Plan for spring

I know it can be depressing to think about spring when we are still awaiting our summer but hopefully our gardens next year will benefit from all the moisture they are receiving at present! So lets get going:

Plant up patio pots or borders with erysimum, more commonly known as wallflowers, for a cheery spring show. Although they can be grown on their own, try planting tall-growing tulip bulbs in a contrasting colour first and planting the wallflowers over the top. The tulips will then grow up through them to provide an extra layer of height and colour.

Deadheading

Deadhead roses as the blooms fade, cutting off the flowers just above the uppermost leaf on the stem. Trim back lavender bushes after flowering to remove the old blooms and shoot tips, taking care not to cut back too heavily into any old wood. Removing faded flowers from perennials and annual plants will also ensure a continued display of blooms.

Attend to bedding

Give bedding displays, hanging baskets and pots a little attention to ensure their display lasts well into autumn. Pick over plants twice a week to remove any faded blooms, keep watering daily and control pests when you find them. Any tender plants you want to save for next year can also be potted this month, so they are established and ready to bring under cover when the weather turns cooler.

Support perennials

Put plant supports around tall, late-flowering perennials to prevent them from being damaged by autumn winds.

Look out for greenfly on winter-flowering pansies and other plants. Treat with a suitable insecticide.

Deadhead roses

Give roses a final deadheading when the blooms have faded and shorten tall stems slightly to reduce wind rock. However, leave those that have developed hips for some extra autumn colour.

Hardwood stem cuttings

Take stem cuttings of roses in early September by pushing cut stems straight into the soil in a nursery area of the garden, where they can be left to root and develop for about a year. Most types of rose can be propagated from cuttings, especially the rambling types. Just take a length of stem, removing the soft tip above a leaf joint, and cut below a joint at the base, removing all but the top three leaves. Then push the 30cm (12in) cutting into the soil to about half its length.

Lilies

Buy lily bulbs as soon as you find them for sale and plant them straight away. Propagate Asiatic lilies, such as *Lilium* 'Angela North', *L.* 'Ariadne' and L. 'Enchantment' by picking the small bulbils from their leaf joints and growing them on. Plant them in trays of compost and leave them to develop into new plants.

Gladioli

Enjoy gladioli spikes in the garden or cut them for displays in the house. Spray plants with a suitable insecticide if thrips start to be a nuisance. When flowering is over, the corms can be lifted, cleaned, labelled and stored carefully for planting out again next spring.

Dahlias

Give large dahlias an extra feed during August to promote strong, healthy growth. Regularly tie them to their supports to prevent the stems from breaking in the wind, deadhead garden displays and cut blooms to enjoy in the house.

Cuttings

Finish taking cuttings of fuchsia, heliotrope, verbena, coleus, argyranthemum and other tender plants, which can be over-wintered on frost-free windowsills.

Bulbs

Look out for indoor bulbs such as lachenalia and veltheimia, for autumn planting and daffodils that are prepared for early flowering at Christmas, such as Narcissus 'Fortune', N. 'Cragford', *N*.'Golden Harvest'. Start watering dormant cyclamen pot plants which have been left to die down for a rest. Freesia corms can also be planted in pots now for early, fragrant blooms next spring.

ou can use the **Google Toolbar** from any page on the web using Internet Explorer. To download the toolbar simply type **www.toolbar.google.com** into the Internet Explorer address bar and follow the download instructions for the toolbar.

So what's so special about this toolbar? Well here's the **dedicated Google search window, the highly effective pop-up blocker, the form autofiller, the translation utility, the spelling checker, and the map tool that automatically links addresses in Web pages to maps. Then there's the full integration with the Google suite: Google Earth, Google News, Froogle, Google Maps, Blogger**, and others. Every single one of the integrated tools, including the toolbar itself, is fully customizable.

Enhanced Search Box

This I find brilliant—As you type a search query into the new Toolbar's search box, you'll see a list of useful suggestions based on popular Google searches, spelling corrections and your own Toolbar search history and bookmarks. You can also click the "G" icon in the search box to search different Google sites, the current site, or sites for which you've installed custom search buttons.

Autofill



One of the most useful features of the Google Toolbar I find is the AutoFill feature: Tired of typing in your address and credit card information every time you shop online? **AutoFill** makes shopping a breeze by

enabling you to fill out web forms with a single click. Just enter

your info once in the Toolbar's Options dialog box and you're ready for an online shopping spree. (Note: your credit card info stays password-protected.)

AutoFill stores personal data where only you can access it - your own computer. And your credit card number is encrypted and protected by a password you set. None of this information is ever sent to Google. In the Toolbar, the **AutoFill** button is enabled when you visit a page with fields that **AutoFill** can fill. Otherwise, the button in the Toolbar appears gray.

To complete forms on sites that you trust, just click the enabled **AutoFill** button. If you haven't entered any **AutoFill** information that applies to the current page, **AutoFill** displays the **AutoFill** tab page in the Toolbar Options window. Once you've entered your information on that page, clicking the **AutoFill** button will automatically complete a form.

If you want to see your data before it's filled into the form, hold down Shift as you click the **AutoFill** button. That way you'll see the information you're providing and protect yourself from pages that might try to capture information in hidden or hard-to-see fields.

If you don't want **AutoFill** to automatically highlight fillable fields, go to the **More options tab** and clear the checkbox "Automatically highlight fields that AutoFill can fill."

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


A Visitor From Maynooth Ontario in Canada

Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan

The Planning Application by P. & G. Dormer of 54 Marrowbone Lane, Dublin 2 for

- (a) demolition of houses numbered 12,13 & 14,erection of 2 storey extensions to side of houses numbered 11 & 15 Parson St,
- (b) erection of 3 no. blocks of varying height up to 5 storeys consisting of 7 no.retail units,1 no.creche and 3 no. restaurants

was declared invalid by the Council on 12th July as it did not include elevation drawings. Unfortunately, the applicant re-submitted the Planning Application on 19th July (File No. 07/1711) and the closing date for objections is 23rd August. In Cllr. McGinley's view this should also have been declared invalid as it is identical to the other application.

The Council has belatedly acted on Cllr. McGinley's proposal "*That a Project Team be appointed to progress the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan*." Senior Council Management will be meeting the different landowners/ developers, who have an interest in the area, on 16/17 August in an effort to get them to agree to implement the proposals in the Action Plan as one large project. Hopefully the applicant will voluntarily withdraw the Planning Application as a result.

If it is not withdrawn Cllr. John McGinley and his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg will make their views known on the inappropriate building heights proposed and any other negative aspects of the proposal as it affects the Built Environment of the Historic Core of Maynooth.

Additional Litter Bins Needed in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following extraordinary reply to his motion on the provision of additional litter bins for Maynooth:

"In order to empty any additional bins, a new collection lorry with a driver and general operative would be required. This would cost in the region of \leq 150,000 per annum and no additional funding of this nature is available. Existing arrangements are very much at capacity."

Needless to say Cllr. McGinley rejected this response. He stated that with the opening of the Meadowbrook Link Road the Council now had a circular route for bin collection i.e. Council Yard--Parson Street--Bond Bridge--Meadowbrook Ling Road--Straffan Road--Main Street--Council Yard, so it should take less time and be less costly to empty the bins. The Director of Services gave an undertaking to examine the existing service with a view to improving it.

Proposed Ring Road from the Old Dublin Road at Blacklion to the Celbridge Road:

The following update was given to Councillors at the July Area Meeting of the Council:

"This is an objective of the Local Area Plan and has been included in the 2007-2009 capital programme although funding has not as yet been specifically identified. In addition, a number of pre-planning meetings have taken place with the developers (MERR DEVELOPMENTS LTD.) and a planning application has been lodged (Ref: 07/1419) seeking approval for the construction of this road. The area committee will be kept informed regarding developments."

Improvement Works on Doctors Lane, Maynooth

Residents will be aware that Doctors Lane will be closed for August to enable the much needed safety measures to be implemented. As a result Doctors Lane will be made one way from east to west and traffic calming ramps and footpaths will also be installed.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the Green Time for traffic turning right from the Straffan Road onto Main Street be increased to take account of Doctors Lane being made One Way."

Location of new Fire Station for Maynooth

Councillors were given the following update on the transfer of the Fire Station from its present unsatisfactory location at The Harbour:

"The Chief Fire Officer is still in negotiation with a landowner regarding a site for the new Maynooth Station. Considerable progress has been made in this regard. The Area Committee will be kept informed."

Pay Parking in Maynooth

Councillors were given the following update by the Director of Services at the July Area Meeting of the Council:

"I am to confirm that the Road Design team will be actively examining the parking arrangements in Maynooth over the summer period and, hopefully, a preliminary report can be available for either the September or October meeting. The staff concerned would be more than pleased to meet with the members on site and perhaps the Cathaoirleach might liaise with me in this regard. As in the case of other

towns, the Council will at least meet (or indeed exceed) the standards laid down in the guidelines which currently required a ratio of one disabled space per twenty five spaces."

Beaufield Estate Signage:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his request for improved signage at either end of Beaufield housing estate:

"This matter has been examined in detail by the Senior Executive Engineer (Traffic Section) and it is proposed to erect the signs, as suggested"

The aim of the new signage would be to encourage the Rathcoffey Road motorists to use Bond Bridge to get to and from the M4. Unfortunately motorists have become used to driving through the Beaufield estate whereas going by Bond Bridge is safer and faster.

Repairs Needed to Railpark Road from the bottom of Parklands to the end

As a result of the heavy rain over the past two months this road is now in a terrible state. Cllr. John McGinley has asked for remedial work to be carried out as a matter of urgency.

Stagg lodges observations against appeal on Restaurant/Wine bar at 1 Pound Lane, Maynooth

Deputy Emmet Stagg has lodged Observations with An Bord Pleanala, along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley, against the Appeal lodged by developers proposing to provide a Restaurant/Wine Bar at 1 Pound Lane, Maynooth.

Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg refused planning permission for the proposal on 3rd July last on the basis that the proposed development would adversely affect the architectural conservation area of Maynooth by reason of inappropriate design and scale.

At the time Deputy Stagg had stated that the rejection by the Council could have been stronger and in his observations with Cllr. John McGinley he has reiterated the following points:

- The proposal would have an adverse effect on residential amenity by introducing a commercial enterprise to one of the last residential enclaves off Main Street, Maynooth.
- The proposal would cause an odour and noise

nuisance for residents of the area.

- The proposal would lead to disturbance in the area particularly at night.
- The proposal would increase traffic and parking problems in the area.
- The proposal would have a negative effect on the quality of life of the existing residents of Pound Lane.

Deputy Stagg also pointed out to An Bord Pleanala that a similar proposal for a restaurant on Main Street, Maynooth, was turned down in April 2005 by An Bord Pleanala, because of the negative impact it would have on nearby residents, and he indicated that this proposal should be viewed similarly. In their observations, Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley questioned aspects of the appeal such as the claim that it was not possible to rent the premises on a long term basis, the contention that the Pound beside the site was a jungle and the fact that if the house needs repairs then that is up to the owner and nobody else.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley expressed the hope that An Bord Pleanala would comprehensively reject planning permission and protect this old residential enclave of Maynooth.

Progress on relocation of Maynooth Ambulance Base to Maynooth Business Campus

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by the HSE that the Contract for the purchase of a Unit at the Maynooth Business Campus for a New Ambulance Base has been signed.

Deputy Stagg stated that work will now proceed on fitting out the New Unit and the HSE are confident that the New Ambulance Base will be in use within the next 4 months.

Deputy Stagg stated the new site is excellent given its location near to the M4, the direct access it affords to all parts of Maynooth and its nearness to Celbridge and Straffan which are served from Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that the area would now have the most Modern Standard of an Ambulance Station with better facilities for Paramedics working with the Ambulance Service.

Stagg's campaign for additional speech and language Therapists succeeds

Following the highlighting by Deputy Emmet Stagg of the Scandalous Waiting Times for assessment of Children for Speech and Language Therapy, where children are being left waiting on average 20 months for an assessment, the HSE have now advised Deputy Stagg that 3 Additional Speech and Language Therapists have been recruited to the service in Kildare and will commence work in September.

A previous recruitment drive failed to secure additional therapists and Deputy Stagg has warmly welcomed the success now achieved which will increase the number of therapists in the service in Kildare by 43%.

Government policy stated Deputy Stagg was responsible for the creation of the 20 month waiting list when staff ceilings were imposed in 2003 which meant that all vacant posts were frozen and no recruitment was allowed. The pressure from parents and others has now embarrassed the Government into a U turn and Deputy Stagg stated that he was particularly pleased with the outcome to the campaign.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the appointment of the additional Speech and Language Therapists would have a positive impact on reducing waiting times for this vital service for children.

The September meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place in the Glenroyal Hotel on the 10^{th} of September.

There was one new co- option to the Council, Helena Kirkpatrick representing the U3A Group in Maynooth. Helena gave a brief outline of what the group does. They were set up in 2006 and meet every Friday and its going very well. It mainly consists of retired people and they have 39 members now. They have a €20 member's fee and also had received a grant from the Kildare Sports Partnership. Interests pursued include Walking, Book Club, Dancing, Theatre etc. The club is open to all and more men would be welcome.

Festival

Willie Saults thanked all involved with the Festival, also those that gave their time collecting on our Flag Days; he also thanked the office staff. The money that is raised at these events provides much needed funds to help support the FAS project [Supervisor and 15 workers] St Patrick's Day Parade, Festival, Maynooth Newsletter. Sub- Committees include Maynooth Arts Forum, Tidy Towns and Secretarial Services.

Town Council Status for Maynooth

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes Know your rights

Question

I have heard that there are some changes to the Carer's Allowance. What are they?

Answer

Carer's Allowance is a means—tested Social Welfare payment for carers of people in need of full-time care and attention. The person being cared for must have so severe a disability as to require continuous supervision and frequent assistance throughout the day in connection with their normal personal needs and must require this care for at least 12 months. A carer normally lives with the person being cared for but this is not essential to qualify for the allowance.

Up to now, if you had an entitlement to a Carer's Allowance and to another social welfare payment, you could only get one or the other. From September 2007, this will changes so that you may be able to get a social welfare payment and also get a half-rate Carer's Allowance, subject to a means-test. If your spouse is receiving a social welfare payment and you are entitled to Carer's Allowance, you may claim a Qualified Adult Increase on the Social Welfare payment and also get the half-rate Carer's Allowance payment.

The maximum weekly rates of the Carer's Allowance were increased from January 2007 as follows:

	Caring for one	Caring for two or more	Child dependant
Aged under 66	€200.00	€300.00	€22.00
Aged 66 or over	€218.00	€327.00	€22.00

Am extra allowance of €10 per week is payable to carers aged 80 or over.

A carer receiving Carer's Allowance can work up to 15 hours per week, providing they get approval from the department. The weekly income disregarded in the means test for the allowance is €320 for a single person and €640 for a couple.

Question

What compensation am I entitled to if I am denied boarding a flight?

Answer

Intending passengers can sometimes be denied boarding on a flight even though they have valid tickets , have met the requirements to confirm the flight , and have arrived at check—in on time. This can happen when airlines sell more tickets for a scheduled flight than there are seats available, because they expect that some passengers will not show up.

In this situation you are entitled to compensation under European law. The airline must give you:

- a choice of either a refund of your ticket ,(with a free flight back to your initial point of departure when relevant or
- alternative transport to your final destination

And

 depending on the length of the delay) refreshments , meals, hotel accommodation, transport between the airport and hotel, two free telephone calls, telex/fax-messages, or e-mails.

And compensation totalling

- ◆ €400 for longer flights within the EU and other flights between 1.500 and 3,500 km, if arrival at your destination is delayed by over three hours
- ◆ €600 for flights over 3,500 km outside the EU, if delayed by over four hours

The compensation may be reduced by 50% if the alternative transport offered allows you to arrive at your destination within the above limits.

If you have not confirmed your reservation or arrived at check—in time as required by the airline, it could refuse to allow you to board the aircraft without compensating you, on the basis that you have not honoured your part of the contract with the airline. For this reason it is important to check the terms and conditions when purchasing a flight. The airline is not obliged to compensate you if you are travelling free of charge, or on a special fare not available to the public.

If you have a complaint about denied boarding and compensation for overbooked flights, first contact your airline. If you believe your passenger rights under EU

Question

Can you tell me what free treatment I am entitled to under the Dental Benefit scheme?

Answer

Under the Dental Benefit Scheme, operated by the Department of Social and Family Affairs basic preventative dental treatment including examination, scaling and polishing is free.

Dental Benefit is available to those who are insured and satisfy certain Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution conditions. You are also eligible if you are the dependent spouse of an insured person, or a dependent widow(er) whose spouse was qualified at time of death .If you satisfy the PRSI conditions when you reach age 60 you will remain qualified for life. Child dependents are not covered.

Under the scheme you are entitled to a complete oral examination , the cleaning and polishing of your teeth and the treatment of some gum conditions for free. In general you are only entitled to free examination once every twelve months.

For other dental treatments there are two sets of charges – one for those whose annual income is under €60,000 and the other whose income is higher. For those whose income is above €60,000 the Department pays a contribution and the patient pays the balance, (apart from the free treatment mentioned previously).

Those whose income is below €60,000 per annum have to pay one of the following, depending on the treatment: a set charge; the balance after the Department's contribution, or the dentist's fee less 15% and less the Department's contribution. For instance, if you have a tooth extracted under local anaesthetic, you have to pay €13.65. A simple amalgam filling is charged at the dentist's normal private fee less 15%, and also less the Department contribution of €31.10. Dentists are obliged to display their charges for fillings.

You can get Dental Benefit for dental treatment in another EU member state. Contact the Department before you travel for an application form and details of how much the Department will pay.

Tax relief can be claimed on unreimbursed non-routine dental treatments.

Question

My landlord has told me I must leave my rented accommodation. Under what circumstances is he entitled to do this?

Answer

A Landlord can ask you to leave accommodation without giving a reason during the first six months of a tenancy, though they must give 28 days notice. If your tenancy has lasted for between six months and four years, your landlord can only end it in certain circumstances. These include if the tenant doesn't meet the obligations of the immediate family member or if the landlord intends to set, refurbish, or change the business use of the property for example, by turning it into offices.

You are entitled to a period of notice depending on how long you have had the tenancy. If the length is six to twelve months you are entitled to five weeks notice. For tenancy of one to two years, the entitlement is six weeks; for two to three years, it is eight weeks; three to four years; twelve weeks; and for a tenancy of more than four years you are entitled to sixteen weeks notice.

The exception are where tenants do not keep their obligations (in which case it is 28 days) or where there is serious anti-social behaviour (7 days).

The landlord must give you assigned written notice of termination including the date of termination and, for tenancies over six months, the reason.

The Private Residential Tenancies Board (PRTB) operates a national tenancy registration system. It is a requirement on all landlords to register details of their tenancies with the PRTB within one month of their commencement.

If landlord evicts you for a specific reason such as an intention to sell a property and subsequently does not carry out the intention , you can report him/her to the PRTB. Canal house, Canal road, Dublin 6. Telephone (01)888 2960 website www.prtb.ie

Autumn Recipes

5

teamed Pudding.

Ingredients

- 50g Butter
- 350g Plain Flour
- 3 tsp Baking Powder
- 140g Shredded Suet
- 85g Castor Sugar
- 115g Currants
- Finely grated zest of 2 lemons
- 75ml Milk
- 25ml Cream

Method

- 1. Soften half the butter and use to grease a 1.4 litre pudding basin.
- 2. Combine the flour, baking powder, suet, sugar and currants in a large bowl, mixing well.
- 3. Melt the remaining butter and stir into the flour mixture.
- 4. Stir in the lemon juice and zest.
- 5. Combine the milk and cream in a small jug. Slowly stir enough into the mixture to bring it to a dropping consistency.
- 6. Pour the mixture into the pudding basin. Cover with a double layer of greaseproof paper (make a pleat in the middle to allow for expansion), tied in place with string.
- 7. Place the basin in a steamer basket set over boiling water. Cover and steam for about 1 1 1/2 hours until cooked. Check the water level now and again to make sure it doesn't burn dry.
- 8. Serve with custard.

read and Butter Pudding

Ingredients

- 8 −10 Slices White Bread (crusts removed)
- Butter
- 450ml / 3/4 pint Milk
- 2 Eggs
- 50g / 2oz Caster Sugar
- 50g / 2oz Sultanas
- Ground Nutmeg

Method

- 1. Butter each slice of bread and cut into fingers or triangles.
- 2. Grease or butter a shallow ovenproof dish. Arrange a layer of the bread, buttered side down on the base of the dish.
- 3. Sprinkle some of the sultanas on the bread and dust with a little ground nutmeg.
- 4. Cover with another layer of bread, sultanas and nutmeq.
- 5. Finish with a layer of bread, buttered side up.
- 6. Beat eggs, milk and sugar together and gently pour over the bread layers.
- 7. Allow to stand for about 10 to 15 minutes, then transfer to a pre-heated oven 180°C/ 350°F/ Gas 4 for about 30 minutes until risen and "set".
- 8. Serve immediately with cream or custard.





Ingredients

- 675g / 1 1/2 lbs Autumn Fruits (cooking apples, blackberries, blueberries etc.)
- 175g / 6oz Self Raising Flour
- Pinch of Cinnamon
- 125g / 4oz Margarine (at room temperature)
- 125g / 4oz Light Brown Sugar
- 2 Eggs
- 4 tablespoons Cold Water
- Sugar to sweeten fruit

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas 5. Lightly grease an ovenproof pie dish.
- 2. Peel, core and slice apples. Mix the fruit used and place in the prepared pie dish; sweeten with sugar.
- 3. Put the remaining ingredients into a large mixing bowl and using the "all in one" method, beat all ingredients together until smooth.

Spread over the fruit and bake until nicely risen and golden brown, about 40 minutes. Serve hot with custard, cream or ice cream.



Gardening Tips for October

TIP OF THE

MONTH

Lift frost tender

plants now



Autumn is the mellow season, all the hectic flowering and reproductive activity of the summer is over.

Seed-heads and berries look their best; and the changing colour of leaves signals the beginning of the end of the growing season. For the gardener, this is the time to start putting the garden to bed.

Planting Spring Bulbs

Pick a pot that is the right size and will complement your chosen bulbs.

- If you are using a clay pot with a large drainage hole in the base, cover it with a piece of broken pot.
- Mix up your compost. Use generalpurpose compost and improve drainage by adding a good handful of horticultural grit.
- Fill the container with compost and plant bulbs, making a hole three times the size of the bulb.
- Although different varieties can be planted together, bulbs have more impact when the same variety is planted either singly or packed closely together for a bumper show.
- Water well and cover with a piece of chicken wire to prevent squirrels, mice and voles from digging them out.

7 egetables.

Vegetables-you can plant over wintering onions during September and October. Plant in well drained soil which has had an application of organic fertiliser prior to planting. Take advantage of dry spells with good ground conditions for planting. Check every few days until growth commences and re-plant any sets that are disturbed by birds etc. Avoid planting where onions grew in the previous season to prevent carry-over of disease from one season to another.

Spring cabbage can be planted out into its final quarters in late September and October. Protect against rabbits and pigeons.


Lettuce for early spring maturity may be sown in October and November under protection. Use a variety such as "Arctic King" for best results.



Bedding to provide Spring colour can be planted now. Brighten up your beds and borders with the fiery colours of Wallflowers and with that powerful, heady fragrance that is a true nostalgic reminder that Summer can't be far away! Always ensure soil is well limed for Wallflowers as they are members of the cabbage family.

Plant up containers with winter interest foliage plants. The following plants will give interest all winter: Heucheras with their bronze, copper and silver foliage Iviy's, Variegated Thymes, Sedums, Ornamental Cabbage and Kales. Don't forget also the invaluable winter flowering Heathers which are ideal in containers, long flowering resilient to the vagaries of the weather, great foliage interest. You can buy superb Irish grown Heathers this Autumn in anything up to a 3 litre pot and these really are stunning and will give instant and continuing colour. Look out for stunning varieties

such as Estrella, Kramers Red, White Perfection, Mary Helen and Eva Gold. You cant miss them in the garden centres this Autumn in their colourful burgundy coloured hexagonal pots. These are not to be missed this Autumn.



- October is a great time to lime, seed and fertilize your lawn. You can seed a new lawn in early October or reseed an established lawn this month to make it thicker and healthier.
- If you need to, you can lime, fertilize and seed your lawn all in the same day. Otherwise, seed and fertilize the same day and then lime later in the fall
- If needed, Autumn is a great time to aerate the lawn. If you decide to do this it should be done prior to seeding.
- If you do plan to aerate, thoroughly soak the soil a day or two before you start your project or perform your project a day or two after a good rain.
- Now is also a good time to control weeds growing in the lawn, however you cannot weed kill and seed the same day. If you choose to kill weeds in the lawn first, you must wait three weeks to seed your lawn. Or, if you seed first, you will need to wait until the new seed has germinated and been mowed at least twice before applying a weed killer.

Reply to John McGinley's Press Release re Parking in Maynooth

Cllr John McGinley in his most recent and predictably hysterical Press Release in relation to my comments on the parking situation in Maynooth and the Harbour Field and Pound Park, has rather dishonestly and deliberately chosen to create a political football out of the real and urgent issue of extremely poor parking facilities in Maynooth, in order to deflect attention from the obvious lack of parking provision in the town and indeed the obvious lack of proper planning in this regard for which he must bear his share of responsibility in his role as County Councillor for a long number of years actually living in Maynooth.

Cllr McGinley typically engages in a rant using emotive words such as "outrage," an attack on the people of Maynooth", and "over his dead body". This pattern repeats the terms used most frequently by John McGinley to describe various issues such as planning applications in the area under terms such as "frightening", "horrific", "alarming" and "terrifying".

It would serve the people of Maynooth far better and our town would prosper and progress in a more cohesive fashion if Mr. McGinley would turn his attention to the core issues and tell us firstly that he acknowledges the abject failure to provide proper parking in Maynooth and therefore the failure of proper planning, and secondly what he proposes to do to rectify the situation.

I note that Cllr McGinley is not "outraged" by the lack of town centre car parking.

In his Press Release, Cllr McGinley refers to the comments made by me and misquotes that I " wanted to turn the Harbour Field and Pound Park into car parks". If one actually reads the original article in the Liffey Champion that is not what I said. I suggested that the possibility of using these areas should be considered, in other words it was something to be discussed and considered with proper consultation with the people of Maynooth and this was specifically in the context of a Public Meeting which the Business Association are planning. It is obvious that Cllr McGinley has chosen deliberately to ignore this, as it could not have escaped the attention of anyone reading the article.

Cllr McGinley decided to compound his attempt at ignoring the real issue of parking by resorting to the old tactic of raising the cloud of "Fianna Fail involvement". This is purely a smokescreen. Indeed he reached apocalyptic proportions imagining nightmare scenarios with houses and apartments being built on the Harbour Field, rezoning of Public Parks etc etc No doubt he can also imagine a Skyscraper in the middle of the Field!!!!

It is patently obvious as the nose on your face, that the article in which I was quoted was an interview between a professional journalist and members of the Maynooth Business community, specifically relating to the urgent need to address the pathetic lack of parking provision in the town and the detrimental impact to Maynooth of same. Therefore I was speaking as a member of the Business community, not as a member of Fianna Fail. That is quite clear.

Cllr McGinley has deliberately decided in tactical fashion to ignore the real and urgent damage being done to the economic well being of the town and the hardship being administered to its citizens by repeated failure to plan or provide adequately.

As a business woman in the town and a resident since 1966, I would ask John McGinley what are his ideas and locations for the proper and adequate provision of car parking in Maynooth, both in the immediate future and in the longer term which should be encompassed into the new Development Plan for Maynooth which will be drafted shortly? I would urge Mr. McGinley to address this issue specifically rather than indulge in political fob-offs, scape-goating and smear attempts.

Overall Development Approach:

Maynooth is welcome to the 2007 National Tidy Towns Competition; thank you for your submission with its many additional enclosures, which were helpful during the adjudication process. In the opinion of this adjudicator, landscaping is your greatest strength in the competition and the many stands of mature and specimen trees were very much admired. Your heritage buildings are of great value also and of course your location on the Royal Canal ensures fine recreational amenity potential for the community. We note your partnership approach with statutory bodies and other agencies together with schools and business interests, well done. We wish you every success in the implementation of your plan.

The Built Environment:

Heritage buildings, schools and churches were beautifully presented during adjudication and have a well-cared for appearance. St. Mary's Boys National School was particularly admired in respect of its landscaping, both the Garda station and the Fire Station are neatly presented, and business premises enjoy a good level of maintenance particularly in the centre; the AIB premises on the main street, which has retained some of its traditional features, looks really well. The Leinster Arms premises is a fine old stone building and could be considered for an award, however its signage and the positioning of posters in its windows and doors detracts from an otherwise fine presentation. The Tattoo premises uses solid shutters which are unattractive

and have a detrimental effect on the streetscape; encourage businesses to feature the open lattice type shutter together with internal lighting outside business hours to enhance the streetscape, it's also good for business as it encourages window shopping. Your tree lined main street has a most gracious appearance.

Landscaping:

The landscaped verges on the Kilcock approach road looked wonderful and was rivalled only by the entrance to the university with its beautiful landscaping also. Stands of mature trees are a characteristic feature of Maynooth it seems and are complemented by mature shrubberies which were in full bloom at the time of adjudication, those that come to mind immediately include at the Aldi and Lidl premises. Of course the roundabout at Tesco was admired also and the roadside perimeter of Tesco cannot be forgotten either. The stretch of hedgerow along the Moyglare Road to St John of God's Services no doubt provide wildlife habitats to many species. The hard landscaped civic space at the junction with the Straffan Road has excellent visual amenity value and has been considered for a landscape award.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities:

Both the Royal Canal and the River Slade offer wonderful recreational amenity opportunities to the community in addition to being important for wildlife habitats. Well done on the creation of a wild flower and nature reserve at Joan Slade River with the installation of bird boxes along college walls. We look forward to the proposed report from the ecologist to identify areas that threaten wildlife. The small and large Pound Parks offer amenity potential also together with the woodlands of St. Patrick's College and the area that makes up the Carton Demesne. We wish you every success in projects planned under this heading.

Litter Control:

Maynooth appeared to be litter free at the time of adjudication, which is no small achievement given your large population and number of visitors, well done. We note from your application your twice weekly litter collections. The students of primary and post-primary schools are to be congratulated for their involvement in the litter-free aspect of Maynooth and congratulations to those schools that have achieved Green Flag status, congratulations also on the appointment of a Tidy Towns liaison officer. We wish you every success in acquiring additional recycling facilities and some new litter bins.

Waste Minimisation:

Projects undertaken for this year have been noted and no doubt all of these will bring about a reduction in the volume of waste produced by the community; of particular note is your proactive approach with business interests in the town, well done. Congratulations to the schoolchildren and residents associations for their segregation of waste as part of your cleanup campaign during National Spring Clean. Recycling centres were neatly presented.

Tidiness:

Well done on your weed management plan, it is good to note that you use environmentally friendly weed killer; sporadic outbursts of weeds were noted along kerbs at intervals. Your awareness of superfluous signage and unused poles is noted. Your work on removing graffiti is a most valuable initiative and we appreciate the difficulties involved. Well done on the reduction in problems caused by through traffic with the reopening of Bond Bridge and the introduction of the new one-way system. A number of buildings appear to be vacant of which you are no doubt aware. Do try to keep outsized advertisement hoardings out of your lovely town.

Residential Areas:

Roadside boundary walls and stretches of hedgerow at the Moyglare Road were admired together with the nicely painted terrace of houses on entering from the Parson Road. A charming row of single-storey dwellings along Carton Avenue looked splendid with their colourful hanging baskets. Well done on your liaison with residents associations on a number of issues and the assistance given; no doubt your Best Estate Competition plays an important role in a good presentation under this heading.

Cllr. John McGinley Will Not Allow Fianna Fail to Turn the Amenities of The Harbour Field and Pound Park, Maynooth in to Car Parks

The recent statement from Fianna Fail's Maynooth representative, Brid Feely (Liffey Champion dated $1^{\rm st}$ September) that she wanted to turn The Harbour Field and Pound Park into car parks has been described by Cllr. John McGinley as an outrage and an attack on the people of Maynooth.

Cllr. McGinley stated that converting these two public parks into car parks would happen over his dead body. Their arrogance knows no bounds. Fianna Fail are not just happy with re-zoning every agricultural green space, they now want to rezone our public parks.

Cllr. McGinley stated that the Harbour Field was transferred by Mr. David Nall Cain, a Director of Carton Properties Limited, to Kildare County Council on the basis that it would be preserved for recreation and amenity use. It is incredible that Fianna Fail would even suggest ignoring a legally binding document. No doubt if they had their way they would also build houses and apartments on The Harbour Field.

The Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan was agreed by the people of Maynooth in a public consultation process and approved by Kildare County Council in February 2006. Following on this, Maynooth Community Council agreed in March 2007 on landscaping of The Harbour Field to include a playing pitch, running track, scouts hall, all weather mini sports facilities and a teenagers' recreation area.

Fianna Fail now want to abandon all of these much needed community facilities and concrete over The Harbour Field. They also want to turn the small Pound Park beside Leinster Cottages into another car park. A very angry Cllr. McGinley stated he would resist these outrageous proposals for as long as he is alive.

Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan

The second Planning Application by P. & G. Dormer, 07/1711, was declared invalid on 15 August 2007. Unfortunately, he resubmitted it on 23 August. The File Number is 07/2044 and the closing date for objections is 27 September.

In line with Cllr. John McGinley's proposal Council Officials have met all of the interested parties, with a view to agreeing to having the Harbour Action Area Plan implemented as one project and by one major developer. John believes that it is essential that this sensitive area is developed to 5 * standards, and this will not happen if individual developers go their own way. The Council have only have one shot at it, and if they get it wrong the people of Maynooth will have to live with it for the next 100 years. Hopefully the landowners and developers will recognise this and agree with the Council's proposals.



Maynooth Development Plan:

The Development Plan was fully discussed at the meeting. It is now time that the people of Maynooth know exactly what they want in place from the Maynooth Development Plan. Question

Can I claim tax relief for third-level tuition fees?

Answer

Yes, you can claim relief for eligible courses. Tax relief for third-level tuition fees is available for approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time and part-time) that are:

- In private or publicly funded third-level colleges in Ireland
- In publicly funded or duly accredited third-level colleges in any other EU country
- Operated by colleges that are in any EU member state and providing distance education in Ireland

Tax relief is also available for postgraduate courses in certain publicly funded or duly accredited third-level colleges in non-EU countries.

Most undergraduate students in publicly funded third-level courses in Ireland do not have to pay fees. For students who do pay fees, undergraduate courses must be of at least two years duration to qualify for tax relief. Postgraduate courses must be for at least one academic year, but not more than four years, and must lead to a postgraduate award based on a thesis or an examination.

Tax relief is also available for approved information technology and foreign language courses in the State resulting in a certificate of competence (not just a certificate of attendance) and of less than two years duration.

Tax relief is at the standard rate of income tax (20%). The maximum relief allowable for the academic year 2007/2008 is €5,000. For the information technology and foreign language courses, the relief applies to fees that are more than €315, and is granted up to a maximum of €1,270 per course.

The tuition fees must be paid by you on your own behalf or on behalf of your spouse, your child or someone for whom you are legal guardian. Application forms (IT 31) are available from the Revenue Commissioners website at www.revenue.ie or telephone Lo-call 1890 306 706.

Question

In what circumstances can the family of a recently deceased person continue to receive his/her social welfare payment?

Answer

Payment of a social welfare payment following a death may be made to the spouse/partner or the parent of the deceased under certain conditions.

If your spouse or partner dies while getting a social welfare payment, the same rate of payment continues for six weeks after the death, provided that he or she had been getting a qualified adult increase for you or you are getting a social welfare payment in your own right.

If your spouse or partner dies and you were getting a qualified adult increase for him/her with your payment, you continue to receive the increase for six weeks after the death.

If a child dies the person getting a qualified child increase with his/her payment can continue to receive the increase for six weeks. In case of the One-Parent Family Payment, the full payment can be received for six weeks after the death. Child Benefit payments cease after the month of the death.

Carer's Allowance and Carer's Benefit continue to be paid for six weeks following the death of the person being cared for.

To apply for the six-week payment, as soon as possible after the death write to the section of the Department of Social and Family Affairs that issues the social welfare payment. You should enclose the death certificate (if available) or a death notice from a newspaper and, if applicable, the payment book.

The payment may be made without formal application where the deceased was getting a State Pension (Transition or Contributory) or was an adult or child dependant of a person getting this pension.

What are my rights and obligations if I rent out a room in my house?

Answer

If you rent a room or rooms in your home to private tenants, you may avail of the Rent a Room Scheme for tax relief. This means that you can earn up to €7,620 in rent without paying income tax on the amount. If you are receiving Mortgage Interest Relief, it will not be affected by this income. Availing of the scheme will not affect any entitlement you may have to exemption from Capital Gains Tax if you sell your home.

The legislation covering tenancy agreements does not include renting out a room in your home. This means that you do not have to register as a landlord with the Private Residential Tenancies Board and the regulations on minimum physical standards don't apply. Tenants living in your home are renting under a licensee agreement rather than a tenancy agreement, and are only entitled to 'reasonable notice' if you choose to end the agreement. They can however refer disputes about notice and deposits to the Small Claims Court.

It is advisable to agree a set of ground rules in advance, and for both parties to keep a signed copy. These could include:

- The period of the tenancy
- The minimum periods of notice if either party chooses to terminate the agreement
- The amount of rent and when it can be reviewed
- How the rent will be paid and how often
- Agreement on visitors and friends staying over

To claim tax relief under the Rent a Room Scheme, complete a tax return form (Form 12) at the end of the tax year indicating that you have received income under the scheme. Tenants living in your home can claim a tax credit on rent paid by completing the from, Rent1. These forms are available from the Revenue Commissioners website ate www.revenue.ie or by calling Lo-call 1890 306 706.

Question

I have recently changed job and my new employer has asked for my P45. What can I do If I haven't received one from my previous employer?

Answer

An employer is required by law to give you a P45 at the time the employment ends. A P45 is a statement of your pay and tax deducted.

It is important to give a P45 to your new employer because otherwise you will have to pay tax at a higher rate known as emergency tax. Even if you are not starting a new job it is important document because you will need it to claim tax refund or claim social welfare benefits.

If you have asked your previous employer for a P45 but have not received it, you should contact your local tax office. Revenue will then get in touch with the employer and obtain your P45 for you. Revenue will send you a new tax credit certificate so that you do not have to pay emergency tax.

The employer you are working for at the end of the tax year must give you a P60. This is a statement of your pay and tax and social insurance payments deducted during the year. If you do not receive a P60 or a P45 it is possible that you have not been registered for PRSI (Pay Related Social Insurance) by your employer or that you are registered but your employer has not paid the correct PRSI contributions which are due. If your employer will not give you a P60 at the end of the year you should contact your local tax office.

November in the Garden

Vegetables and Fruits

- Sort apples in storage and remove spoiled fruit.
 Remove fallen fruit from around trees to reduce insects and disease next year.
- Protect trunks of fruit trees from rabbit damage with tree wraps.
- Take a soil test and make needed adjustments this fall.
- Till garden soil and add organic matter.

Flowers

- Clean up the rose bed to help reduce disease next season.
- Cut back tall rose canes to 24 inches to prevent winter breakage.
- Remove frost-killed annuals.
- Till annual flower beds and add organic matter to improve soil.
- Continue to plant spring flowering bulbs.
- Depending on preference, leave or cut back perennial stalks to 4 to 6 inches.
- Apply a winter mulch to perennials and roses after several hard freezes.



Lawns

- Rake fallen leaves from the lawn to prevent winter suffocation.
- Fertilize cool season lawns, bluegrass and tall fescue with a quick release high nitrogen fertilizer to promote root development and early spring green up.
- If needed, water turf so its starts winter with ample moisture.
- Continue to mow into the fall at 2 to 3 inches.

Trees and Shrubs

- Plant new trees and shrubs.
- Water newly planted trees and shrubs.

- Rake leaves and place in compost pile.
- Check mulch layers and replenish.
- Prune dead or hazardous limbs.
- Don't prune spring flowering trees and shrubs until after bloom.



Miscellaneous

- Clean and oil garden tools, sprayers, and other equipment.
- Drain garden hoses and sprinklers and store indoors for increased life.
- If you decide to leave them outside, unscrew them from the faucets.
- If fuel is to remain in power equipment, add fuel stabilizer. Otherwise, drain gas from power equipment for winter storage. Make any needed repairs.
- Protect ornamental and fruit trees and young plants from rabbit damage by wrapping or enclosing in wire screen.
- Start a compost pile with fall leaves.
- Turn compost pile to hasten breakdown.
- Start planning for next year
- Make sure your friends and family know you really would prefer a good gardening book, or a hand tool, to another pair of socks this Christmas!

November Recipes

Ingredients

- 350g/12oz Cream Flour
- 225g/8oz Margarine
- 25g/1oz Ground Almonds
- 1/2 teaspoon Baking Powder
- 675g/11/2lb Sultanas
- 225g/8oz Caster Sugar
- 5 Eggs (beaten)
- Juice and Rind of 1 Orange
- 125g/4oz Halved Cherries
- 125g/4oz Mixed Peel

Method

- 1. Cream margarine and sugar together. Gradually add the eggs, beating well after each
 - addition.
- 2. Fold in the ground almonds, orange rind and juice.
- 3. Sieve in the flour and baking powder. Fold into the mixture.
- 4. Stir in the prepared fruit. Place the mixture in a lined 9" round cake tin.
- Bake in a preheated oven at 300°F, 150°C, Gas 2 for 3 hours approx. Check at intervals after 2 hours.
- 6. Cool in tin.

S_{cones}

Ingredients

- 225g/8oz Self Raising Flour
- Pinch of Salt
- 25g/1oz Caster Sugar (optional)
- 25g/1oz Margarine
- 150ml/1/4 pint Milk

Method

- 1. Sieve flour, salt and sugar, if used, into a bowl.
- 2. Rub in the margarine, using the tips of the fingers.
- 3. Add the milk and mix to make a soft dough.
- 4. Turn onto a lightly floured board and knead, if necessary, to remove any cracks.

- 5. Roll out lightly to 2 1/2 cm/1" in thickness and cut into scones with a 5cm/2" cutter dipped in flour.
- 6. Place the scones on a floured pre-heated baking sheet.
- Bake in the pre-heated oven at 220°C/425°F/Gas
 for 10 12 minutes until well risen and nicely browned.
- 8. Cool on a wire tray.

You can use this recipe to make the following:

Fruit Scones

Mix in 50g/2oz sultanas or raisins to the dry ingredients before adding the milk.

Savoury Scones

Mix in 50g/2oz grated cheddar cheese to the dry ingredients before adding the milk.

High Fibre Scones

Omit the sugar and replace 25g/1oz of Self Raising Flour with 25g/1oz Wheat Bran. Mix the bran to the dry ingredients before adding the milk; you may also have to add a little extra milk to get a nice soft dough.

Ingredients

- 3 large Egg Whites
- 1 tablespoon Cornflour

To decorate

300ml/1/2 pint Cream

Method

Put all the ingredients into a bowl and beat until thick. Shape meringue into a ring on baking parchment. Bake in preheated oven at 120°C/250°F/Gas Mark 1/2 for 1 hour. Reduce heat to 110°C/225°F/Gas Mark 1/4 for a further 30 minutes.

Allow to cool. Place on serving dish and fill with whipped cream and fruit of your choice.





Sock Puppets.



Looking for something to do with those mysterious

Craft Materials:

Adult-size socks Felt Styrofoam balls Yarn

3/8-inch dowels Pipe Cleaners Paper or plastic cups Craft Glue

Googly eyes Cotton balls or batting

Time needed: Under 1 Hour

single socks? Turn them into animal puppets (they're easier to make than they look).

RABBIT: Push the dowel into the ball at a slight angle. Next, cut two ears out of white felt and two inner ears out of pink felt. Bend a pipe cleaner in half, sandwich it between the felt pieces, and glue them together with the pipe cleaner ends protruding an inch. Then pull a white sock over the ball and glue on googly eyes and a pink pom-pom nose with cotton balls on each side. Cut slits in the sock on the "head" and push the ears into the ball. Finally, stuff the "neck" with batting, poke a hole in the cup and slide it, upside down, onto the dowel.

DRAGON: Start by pulling a green sock over the ball and stick, leaving 4 inches at the toe. Then cut flames out of felt, sandwich a popsicle stick between them and glue them together with the stick jutting out an inch. Next, poke a hole in the sock tip and push the stick into the ball. Cut two jagged spines out of green felt, glue the straight edges down the puppet's back, then glue the spines together. Glue on eyes, a coneshaped felt horn and two felt nostrils. Finally, stuff the neck with batting and slip the cup on the stick.



CRAFT MATERIALS:

3/4-inch round wooden beads (with a 5mm centre

Smaller wooden beads

Felt scraps

Pipe Cleaners

Embroidry Thread Markers

Time needed: Under 1 Hour

HAIRSTYLING: Cut the embroidery floss into 20 pieces that measure twice the desired length. Fold a 6-inch pipe cleaner in half over the midpoint of the collective strands. Feed both ends of the pipe cleaner through the centre of the large bead. Slide the bead up the pipe cleaner until the fold is hidden in the bead centre. Then separate each strand of embroidery floss to fashion a thick shock of hair. For curls, dampen the strands with a few drops of water, wind them around a pencil and let them dry.

BODY BUILDING: For arms, place a 5-inch length of pipe cleaner crosswise just below the bead head. Twist each end once around the doll's trunk (the portion of the first pipe cleaner protruding from the bead). Next, bend up the trunk about 3/4 inch from the bottom to form a hook. To form legs, fold a 5-inch pipe cleaner in half and hang it on the hook. Secure the legs by twisting the 3/4-inch trunk ends around them.

PANTS: Begin by folding a 6- by 1 1/2-inch piece of felt in half, so that the shorter edges meet. Starting from the fold, make a 2-inch cut up the middle, stopping 1 inch from the open end. Make a 1/4-inch waist hole 1/2 inch from one top edge. For foot openings, make a small slit through the felt fold at the bottom of each pant leg. Slip both legs through the waist opening from the front. Then, push the pipe cleaner tips through the foot openings and match up the short felt edges behind the doll.

SKIRT AND SHIRT: Cut a 4-inch hourglass shape out of felt. Make a waist hole in the centre to slide the doll's feet through. For a shirt, use a 2-inch felt square. Cut two small armholes 1/2 inch apart and 1/4 inch from the upper edge. Wrap the shirt around the doll's chest and over the top of its pants or skirt. Wind a 3-inch pipe cleaner belt around the doll's waist to secure the clothes. To keep the pants side seams closed, twist a 2-inch piece of pipe cleaner around each one.

For hands and feet, slip a smaller bead onto the end of each limb. Bend the pipe cleaner tips to keep the beads in place.

Maynooth Tidy Towns Presentation

Maynooth Tidy Towns Best Estates and Shop Fronts Competitions 2007.

Summary of the Judges Recommendations

We have a new judge for 2007 and we appreciate the excellent work that she has done in terms of the judging of the Best Estates and Shop Fronts competitions. Whilst not from Maynooth the judge works in the town and indeed, is a former resident, which meant that she had a good knowledge of the areas.

Best Estates

The judge was asked to visit each area twice, once in July and the second in early August. However, because of the bad weather experienced this summer the judge actually surveyed each area on three occasions, an additional one being done in late August when the weather improved, as she felt that people may not have had a chance to get to do any work in July because of the weather conditions that prevailed.

The maximum marks available were 510 and the highest score secured was 459 by the large best estate. As many of the residential areas were close in score, the judge awarded a higher score where good quality work was evident. One such case was the runner up best large estate, where the quality of finish on edging was evident.

The judge recommends that estates be encouraged to devise unique features for their areas that can be easily maintained. A good example is the features at the entrance to Moyglare Village and Cluain Aoibhinn. Another recommendation is that some estates that are so closely linked geographically should work together to maximise the entire areas. Two cases mentioned are Cluain Aoibhinn / College Green and Beaufield / Meadowbrook. In both cases the judge found herself moving between the areas and having to check where she was at any time. In the case of one large estate, the judge recommends that the Tidy Towns encourage the residents and perhaps, the local authority, to work together to devise a major new plan to enhance the area which has very attractive rolling landscape levels but unfortunately, is clearly neglected and hence, has become an unattractive area with badly maintained features and much litter.

Best Shop Fronts

The judge found that it was not difficult to select a winner here as with few exceptions there was little evidence that the traders were making a unique effort for the Tidy Towns. The judge recommends that this competition be reviewed and that it could take the following format in future.

- All Premises in the Main Street area should be encouraged to support the Tidy Towns campaign. This should include a window display supporting the campaign for the eight weeks of the judging period. Perhaps Tidy Towns could do an annual sticker that could be displayed in the window of premises stating that this business is a Tidy Towns supporter. The judge appreciates that some businesses are more capable of providing financial support than others but the connection between the business sector and Tidy Towns needs to be more obvious.
- There are now a number of shopping centres such as Tesco, Manor Mills, Newtown, Greenfields as well as Aldi and Lidl. While some are well presented it might be a good idea to have a competition between Shopping Complexes in order to raise all standards and have a bigger participation than simply limiting it to the Main street/Side streets.

Maynooth Labour News

Proposals for Parson Street/The Harbour Area, would be an unmitigated disaster for Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley and his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg have lodged an objection to the proposal to build 5 storey blocks with flat roofs behind 11 to 15 Parson Street, Maynooth.

The site stated Cllr. McGinley is at the heart of Old Maynooth Village in an area which abounds with protected structures e.g. The Geraldine Castle, St. Mary's Church, Maynooth College, The Rectory. The proposal does not have any regard to the sensitivities of the Historic Core of the Town.

Cllr. McGinley and Deputy Stagg make the following points:

- The Council has already agreed to Cllr. McGinley's proposal to have the Harbour Action Area Plan implemented as one project and by one major developer. This is essential to ensure that this sensitive area is developed to 5 star standards. The application should therefore be deemed to be premature.
- The Modern Blocks proposed would be fine up in the NUIM lands where that is the trend but great care must be taken by the Council not **to repeat** the disaster that is the Apartment Complex at the Manor Mills Development. This proposal has the capacity to do so.
- ♦ This proposal at 5 storeys will obliterate the fantastic views towards Maynooth College from the Straffan Road Bridge.
- This proposal which includes 26 one bedroom units, 65 two bedroomed units and 7 three bedroomed units is a recipe for disaster in relation to the creation of a Community in this area and we are effectively looking at student/rental accommodation. This is not the vibrant new area which we want to create.

In conclusion Cllr. McGinley stated that the proposal is premature and in serious conflict with both the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 and the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan. It seeks excessive development to the exclusion of a co-ordinated development of the whole Action Area Plan. It takes no account of the fact that the site borders the Architectural Conservation Area of the Town or that it is in close proximity to Protected Structures of Great Historical Significance. We have one opportunity to develop this site to the standards acceptable in a Historic University Town and if we get it wrong, as An Bord Pleanala did with the Manor Mills Development, we will regret it, as will future residents of Maynooth for many years to come.

Flat roofed 2 & 3 storey apartment block would be an eyesore.

Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley have lodged an objection with Kildare Co. Council to the proposal to build a flat roofed 2 & 3 Storey Apartment Block on the corner site of the junction of Old Greenfield`s Lane and the Straffan Road in Maynooth.

The site stated Deputy Stagg is at a very prominent location on the Straffan Road and it is incredible that the ap-

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plicants would propose such an ugly building which will be visually obtrusive. The Straffan Road Entrance to Maynooth is at present a pleasant entrance to the Town with Housing Estates set back from the Road and good boundary treatment.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have other concerns in relation to this proposal as follows:

- The proposal which works out at 33 units to the acre is excessive for what is an Infill Development in this old part of Maynooth where houses were first built over 100 years ago.
- The proposal is out of character with the established built environment of the area which comprises cottages and dormer bungalows, many on their own individual sites.
- The Building heights proposed will cause overlooking, loss of light and a consequent loss of privacy to residents bordering the site.
- The proposal does not integrate with existing development in the area.

The excessive proposal will cause a serious traffic hazard given the nearness of the entrance to the site to the junction of Old Greenfield Lane and the Straffan Road.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that it was important that the Council made a statement in relation to this proposal by rejecting it comprehensively and thereby maintaining the present soft appearance of the entrance to Maynooth along the Straffan Road.

Proposed Introduction of Pay Parking in Maynooth

As previously advised the Council will be presenting a Draft Report on the introduction of Pay (Regulated) Parking in Maynooth to the Leixlip Area Committee on 19th October.

The present Council Policy on parking in Maynooth was adopted at the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting on 18th November 2005. The Minutes are as follows:

"LX12/1105 Car Parking at Maynooth.

The committee considered the following motion in the name of Councillor McGinley:

That the following parking management policy be adopted for Maynooth:

 A) pay and display with permit parking be introduced

- B) the profits accruing be ringfenced for use in Maynooth
- C) enforcement of the parking by-laws be vigorously policed by council traffic wardens
- D) increased public parking capacity be provided as a matter of urgency
- E) the Minister for Transport and Iarnród Éireann be asked to provide proper park and ride facilities for those commuters who use Maynooth train station.

The administrator reported that car parking should be advanced and that several benefits would accrue from its introduction. He added that it was intended to commence a review of parking in Maynooth, early in the coming year.

Resolved, that the report be noted: "Members supported the concept of underground parking near the railway station and felt that this should be provided by the Department of Transport. Write to the Minister and Iarnród Éireann".

Subsequently, the Council adopted the statutory Maynooth Harbour Action Area in February 2006 which includes an underground car park at The Harbour Field.

Disappointingly, the Government has failed, to date, to provide funding to C.I.E. for the underground car park at The Harbour Field. Such Park and Ride facilities at commuter train stations are in everyone's interest as they remove cars from the roads into Dublin and make life that much easier for commuters. It is very difficult therefore to understand why the Government refuses to fund them.

Until this essential park & ride facility is provided the residents of Silken Vale and the Back Lanes off Main Street will continue to suffer with commuters blocking driveways/gates and parking dangerously on an ongoing basis. Maynooth is different to Celbridge and Leixlip in that it is the only town with a central train station, which means that town centre parking is being taken up by commuters instead of shoppers. Regulated parking will ease the problem for town centre shoppers but it will create serious problems for commuters unless the Government provide the funding to C.I.E. immediately for the park & ride underneath the Harbour Field.

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Maynooth, with a population of 11,476, has 315 public parking spaces in the town centre, whereas Celbridge, with a population of 19,476, has only128 public parking spaces. Unlike Celbridge, Maynooth also has town centre parking for shoppers at The Mill Centre, TESCO, Supervalue/Glenroyal Centre and The Town Central Mall.

As can be seen from the motion above Cllr. McGinley has also sought a trebling in size of the public car park at the back of Caulfields. Unless this is done to a high quality design it would not be acceptable to Cllr. McGinley and the general public. John believes that the best way to achieve this objective would be through a partnership approach between the Council and the owner of the adjoining land at The Paddock. Such a project has already turned out to be very successful in Naas, on the Sallins Road/Dublin Road.

Provision of Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's)

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Full Meeting of the Council:

"That Kildare County Council follow Donegal County Council's example by carrying out an audit to establish the number of Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's) that are available to the public in the county.

Furthermore, and in the light of the findings of the survey, that the Council becomes proactive in implementing a pilot AED programme for Maynooth to encourage the provision of AED's at the following:

- Ambulance Service
- Fire Service
- Manor Mills Shopping Centre
- TESCO's Shopping Centre
- Glenroyal Centre
- Maynooth Train Station
- NUI Maynooth
- St. Mary's Church
- Soccer Pitches, Rathcoffey Road
- GAA Pitches, Moyglare Road
- The 3 Primary Schools & 1 Secondary School

Bearing in mind that sudden cardiac arrest is survivable, with recent studies showing that when AED's are used within the first 3 minutes that there is a 74% survival rate, that the Council would give serious consideration to extending the AED programme to other

towns in the County."

Cllr. McGinley submitted a similar motion to the Leixlip Area Committee last February where Council Officials suggested that it be referred to the Health and Safety Executive (HSE). Cllr. McGinley has been in ongoing correspondence with the HSE since then. They are carrying out an analysis nationally on the provision of AED's. Their last reply on 13 August stated:

" The Spatial Analysis is on-going. It is a study that will require detailed analysis on a region by region basis. For this reason the study will be on-going over the coming year. The role of the HSE will be directed by the Sudden Cardiac Death Implementation Group and ultimately the Spatial Analysis Study will form priority areas."

It is Cllr. McGinley's view that we cannot await the outcome of a National Spatial Analysis. Action is needed now and John has submitted the above motion to try and get the appropriate action.

Reduce Threat of Global Warming and Save Money at the Same Time

Global warming due to the increased emission of Carbon Dioxide (CO_2) has been a concern of most of us for some time. A simple way to begin to reduce carbon emissions is to have Solar Panels installed on the south facing roofs of all new houses at construction stage. This would be fairly inexpensive and the pay back time for the householder would be only a few years, whereas the pay back for humanity would be everlasting. Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That this Council takes whatever steps that are necessary to ensure that all new houses constructed in the county includes solar panels in their design in order to reduce carbon emissions and to reduce energy costs for the homeowner."

New Minister Further Delays Implementation of Town Council Status for Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has expressed his anger at the further delay imposed by the Minister for Environment in allowing for the establishment of New Town Councils in towns with a population in excess of 7,500 people as allowed for under the Local Government Act 2001, with the Minister now embarking on a Consultative Process on Local Government Reform.

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In response to a Parliamentary Question from John's colleague, Deputy Emmet Stagg, the Minister stated that a Green Paper on Local Government Reform would be published before the end of 2007 and a White Paper would follow in 2008. The Minister concluded by stating that those parts of the Local Government Act 2001 which have not yet commenced will be considered as part of the reform process.

Cllr. McGinley stated that there was no reason in the world why the Minister could not proceed under the existing Act and allow New Town Council's to be set up and described the Ministers Consultative process as a smokescreen to prevent the setting up of new Town Council's.

Cllr. John McGinley has made a submission in support of Town Council status for Maynooth.

In his submission Cllr. McGinley pointed out that Maynooth had a population of 11,746 according to the 2006 census.

The people of Maynooth have been looking for Town Council status for the town for the last 18 years.

Maynooth is unique in Ireland in that it is the only town in Ireland with a University. Indeed it has two, NUIM and St. Patrick's College.

Maynooth is also unique in that boundaries for the Town Council were agreed with the County Manager and were sent to the then Minister Mr. P Flynn and published in *Iris Oifigiuil* on May 1st. 1990. Negotiations on the boundaries were carried out by Maynooth Community Council with the County Manager over a prolonged period and Cllr. McGinley had the honour of being Secretary of the Community Council during that period.

For historical reasons much smaller towns than Maynooth have their own Town Councils. These include Kells in Co. Meath, Population 2,139, Bantry in Co. Cork 3,300, Kilkee in Co. Clare 1,328 and Mhuinebeag in Co. Carlow 2,545

Traffic Signals at The Straffan Road/Main Street Junction, Maynooth

At the Leixlip area Committe meeting on 21st September Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion:

"That the Green Time for traffic turning right from the Straffan Road onto Main Street be increased to take account of Doctors Lane being made One Way."

"The timings of both the traffic signals at Straffan Road junction and the Garda station/Leinster Street are co-ordinated and an increase in the maximum green time on one approach will result in problems occurring at the adjacent junction.

Currently, the signals are vehicle actuated which means that if the volume of traffic approaching the junction warrants the maximum green time, then it will extend to its maximum timing.

The Senior Executive Engineer (Traffic Section) is currently working to progress the introduction of a fully adaptive signalling network in Maynooth. This extension to the scoot system will result in closer coordination and will negate the need to tinker with timings as these would be set automatically by time of day and volume of traffic at all junctions in the town centre.

The junction will be monitored in the meantime to ensure that the changes to Doctor's Lane do not result in a significant adverse impact on the safety of road users."

In relation to the third paragraph of the reply Cllr. John McGinley made the point that because the traffic turning right at the Square junction at peak times is backed up to the Glenroyal junction it is not possible for any traffic to be at the lights turning left at The Square i.e. they are stuck at the Glenroyal junction. This means that the signals cannot be actuated by the vehicles.

John also asked that the new left turning lane from Main Street to The Straffan Road (at Brady's Pub) as called for in the grant of Planning Permission for the new TESCO, without any trees being removed, be constructed before TESCO begin work on the new stores.

Footpath Between TESCO and Blacklion Road

Cllr. McGinley has been advised that this work will be carried out before the end of October.

Walls at Pound Park/The Green and The Small Pound

Cllr. McGinley has been advised that costings for this work are being sought and will be presented to the November meeting of the Leixlip area Committee.

"Tone Zone" Fitness Opportunities for Citizens of All Ages

During a State visit to China, President Mary McCleese noticed grown-ups of all ages, exercising in parks,

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using what looked like playground equipment. She was fascinated by the positive impact this outdoor exercising had on people's daily life.

When she returned home, President McAleese discussed what she had seen with Mary Nall, Third Age Centre, Summerhill, Co. Meath. As a result, with support from the Mid-East regional Authority, Irelands first "Tone Zone" in Dunshaughlin Park was Officially opened by President McAleese on 28th September and Cllr. John McGinley was present as a member of the Mid-East Regional Authority. The next "Tone Zones" will be developed in Counties Kildare and Wicklow and as a result Cllr. McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the surplus specialist outdoor gym equipment from the Tone Zone, Dunshaughlin Park, be installed at the Harbour Field, Maynooth, adjacent to the Children's Playground."

The "Tone Fitness Corner" concept is aimed at providing opportunities for citizens of all ages, to exercise and improve their overall fitness. Robust, attractively painted exercise machines are designed to be used outdoors in all weathers. Simple to maintain, the equipment can be located in playgrounds, public parks, outside residential developments, in nursing homes - even on street corners. The idea is that people passing can spend a few minutes limbering up as they go about their business. More organised groups, including older peoples groups, can use the machines to carry out more intensive exercise programmes.

Cllr. McGinley believes that The Harbour Field, next to the Children's Playground would be an ideal location for County Kildare's First Tone Zone. In addition the ICA Hall, where the Senior Citizens sometimes meet, is very close by.

The Tattoo Premises on Main Street

Cllr. John McGinley sent the following letter to the Council on 27th September:

"This premises has solid shutters on the exterior of the Shop front. This is contrary to The Maynooth Development Plan 2002. Section 4.3.5. states:

"The use of external roller shutters and the permanent removal of shop fronts leaving the shop open to the pavement, are unacceptable. Security shutters should be mounted behind the window glazing, be of the open grille type and colour to blend with the overall shop front."

The National Tidy Towns Inspector stated in this years report:

"The Tattoo premises uses solid shutters which are unattractive and have a detrimental effect on the streetscape."

Accordingly, I would appreciate if you asked the shop owner to comply with the Maynooth Development Plan."

October has proved to be a busy month for the town of Maynooth but also for the Community Council and briefly I would like to give a quick run down on what has been happening at Community Council level.

- The Community Council responded to an invitation from the Minister John Gormley to make a submission on Local government and from our point of view, in particular our desire to be appointed Town Council status. The Minister will be publishing a Green Paper on the issue before the end of December and thereafter a White Paper which we hope will result in the reform of local government leading to Town Council status for Maynooth.
- 2. In October, the Department of Transport responded to a letter from the Community Council in which we asked for a meeting to discuss the sad absence of parking facilities in Maynooth. A 3 man delegation met with officials from the Department of Transport and the meeting was very useful from the point of view of clarifying the existing position with regard to funding and identifying present and future needs for parking in Maynooth. Basically, the Dept. of Transport has not renewed proposals in front of them yet, seeking funding of any description for the provision of an underground car park at the Harbour Field. Obviously, funding can only be considered when such a proposal has been received by the Dept. Neither Kildare County Council Iarnrod Eireann have forwarded such a request or proposal to date.
- 3. On November 12th the Community Council held a special meeting at which all our public representatives were invited to discuss topics of concern and interest to the residents of Maynooth. The meeting was a great success in terms of strengthening the relationship which should exist between the Community Council and all our public representatives irrespective of any political persuasions. It is proposed to hold similar meetings regularly each year so that aims and plans can be formulated and progress measured in an ongoing way to focus on and to ensure the best achievements for Maynooth. The meeting was positive, interesting and very informative and the community councillors went away feeling energised and with a sense of direction.

I would like to wish all our readers a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

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Maynooth Community Council Notes

he November meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on 12th November in the Glenroyal Hotel.

This was a very special meeting of Maynooth Community Council as our four local TDs Bernard Durkan, Aine Brady, Emmet Stagg, and Michael Fitzpatrick were in attendance, as where our local Councillors, John McGinley, Paul Kelly. Chairperson Brid Feely welcomed all to the meeting. She said she was sure that there would be no branding of political parties and that all here would work for the future and good of Maynooth. We are here to get things done. She also commented that she hoped that such meetings would continue throughout the year and that all present would attend.

Topics:

- Social amenities Community Centre and Geraldine Hall.
- Town Council Status.
- Services Library services, Litter services.
- Garda enforcement and presence Enforcement of byelaws with regard to
 drinking in public places, more visible
 presence of Garda, Community policing
 initiative in Athy.
- Co-ordination services for new Developments - provision and proper planning for schools, roads, crèches.
- Communications Lack of information from the Council with regard to Maynooth.

Social amenities – Community Centre and Geraldine Hall.

Terry Nealon (Maynooth Arts Forum) said that they had sent two submissions to Kildare County Council and had received no reply. He said that they put on four productions each year. There is nothing in Maynooth for the Arts at present, he felt that every thing was pub based. He asked the panel for their view and likely developments in this area. Cllr John McGinley said that the 2002 Development was now up for renewal and that Maynooth Community Council was very involved also that he gave information at these meetings. This is part of the Harbour Field Action Plan. He said there is no project management team in place and that consultants have to be brought in. It's very important that all development in the Harbour Field area goes ahead as one major development and not in a piecemeal way.

Cllr Paul Kelly said that a lot of work was going on here also he had met with new County Manager to see where all this is heading, he also said that Maynooth is relying heavily on schools as venues etc. and that this is not right. He felt that things will start happening, and one area on the market will have a big influence on the plan. He said that the four Councillors will be pushing this.

TD Emmet Stagg commented that TDs have no say in the matter but that funding is available and we should be able to get assistance. He said that Maynooth Community Council wanted this passed last March and its going to happen soon.

TD Bernard Durkan said the new County Manager will have Maynooth well in his favour, and that funding is available. He said that Maynooth Community Council is the driving force on this.

It was noted that Developers are driving all this as well, so it is being pushed very hard.

Paul Croghan said that An Board Planála could have a say on this and that we should be careful. He also said that Maynooth failed to get funding on services to the Community project.

Maynooth Community Council would propose to be the Anchor tenant and funding will be most important. Deputy Emmet Stagg said that we should look at all funding that is available.

Cllr Paul Kelly commented that the new County Manager has a Pro-active approach to funding renewal and would be looking favourably on the North/East area of Kildare. He said that we are all at the mercy of An Board Planála and its important that all are in agreement on this.

Deputy Aine Brady said there is a drastic lack of facilities in the area and that she would fully support the project. However she was not sure that the Geraldine Hall could support a full Drama and Arts Project.

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick said this was his first time at a Maynooth Community Council meeting and he congratulated the Council on the work that they are doing and its all to Maynooth's gain. He promised that he will do whatever he can to help this project.

Town Council Status

Paul Croghan said that he felt that Maynooth was being disadvantaged by not having Town Council status, and he asked who on the panel supported this. Deputy Aine Brady said that she felt that Minister John Gormley would be issuing a green paper on this and had noted our submission on this also.

Deputy Emmet Stagg said that the Ministers response, was "that its on review", the same as it was ten years ago,

The Council has written to Minister John Gormley on this. Cllr Paul Kelly said that the new Minister on the development he is fully in support of Town council status for Maynooth.

Cllr John McGinley said that the green boundary areas have being agreed and that this is very significant, but

however felt that it was unlikely that any new Town Councils would be formed.

Chairperson Brid Feely said that this was a hugely important issue for Maynooth and we will continue to pursue the prospect of Town Council Status for Maynooth.

Services and Litter

Library opening times was one of the issues raised.

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick said that Breda Green County Librarian has made huge improvements to Maynooth Library.

He also said that there are plans for an over all plan for the services in Kildare.

Sean Cushan said they had a number of issues to raise. Seven Day Cleaning, more bins and Litter Wardens to get more powers.

Peter reported that on Sunday mornings the town is a disgrace. It was noted that Peter Keegan has know retired.

Tom McMullon said that there is no litter warden service in Maynooth, there are too many takeaways in the town and this adds to the litter problem. The takeaway in Greenfield was praised.

Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin commented that its not so much the takeaways that cause the problem it's the dirty people that don't bring home their rubbish.

There should be a separate Litter Management Plan said Cllr John McGinley. Also Cllr Paul Kelly said we should have a seven day cleaning service and to invite the Litter Warden to a meeting of the Council in Maynooth. John O'Connor noted that the town comes alive from Thursday, that's when we need the service.

Garda Enforcement

Pat O'Brien spoke on this issue. He said he has lived in Maynooth for a long time and over the past five years there has being a major deterioration in Maynooth - law and order has broken down. There has being a huge increase in population and with this we need an increase in the number of Gardaí. asked the Deputies to bring this issue to the Minister for Justice. We need Gardaí on foot patrol and there is an urgent need for patrol cars. There is now a growing rise of disorderly behaviour. We also need more access to the Garda station. The Business Association are very pro-active RE-CCTV and are very involved on this. The Business Association would welcome Community Council support on this said Brid

Deputy Stagg said that Maynooth is in a very critical situation at the minute, with only 13 Gardaí and taking into account sick leave etc. there could only be 3 Gardaí on patrol. It was felt that the public order acts were not being used by the Garda.

Aine Brady said that she and the other TDs would be

looking for an increase in resources in Kildare. Garda presence on the street is very important. To this end we will take action together to bring this to the notice of the Minister.

Deputy Durkan felt that the makers of crime are not punished and let off with warnings, these people are giving the wrong signals to others that no action is taken and that they are getting away with it. The issue needs to be

addressed he said.

Co-ordinated services for New Developments – schools, roads etc.

Colm O'Cearuil spoke on the issue of a Gael Scoil for North Kildare and made the point that Maynooth would be an excellent choice. He said it is time for action and he was looking for support from our representatives.

Deputy Brady gave her full support. There has been a population explosion and she cited the BNS need for an extension now, which was not expected for some time yet. She said that there is a demand for a second school in North Kildare. She said the fight is very much on for this facility in North Kildare.

Deputy Stagg said we should be able to work out the number of class rooms needed at any given time even if the government can't. However it seems that the Minister has other ideas on this and has made it clear that its not on. Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick said that this could be achieved with Kildare County Council, and Kildare VEC, working with the Department of Education we will get a Gael Scoil for North Kildare, and he said that there will be a lobby group forming shortly.

Communication - lack of information from Council regarding issues pertaining to the area.

Brid Feely said that we need more information on issues and perhaps we will get feedback tonight.

We need leadership from our TDs. John O'Connor asked was it possible to get information on Maynooth issues, and who are the people that make decisions on this. It was also noted that all Leixlip Area and Kildare County Council meetings are open to the public. It was suggested that the Maynooth Newsletter is a good forum and if more political parties used this and put their notes in the Newsletter each month it would be of great benefit to the public. Brid Feely suggested that we should have a better relationship with our public representatives and more meetings are needed, maybe twice a year. Brid thanked all for coming and felt that it was all very worthwhile.

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know your rights

Question:

My spouse recently turned 70 years of age and is now entitled to a medical card without a means test. Does this change my eligibility to a medical card, even though I am under 70 years of age?

Answer

Everyone in Ireland who is over 70 years of age and normally resident in Ireland is entitled to a medical card, regardless of income. This medical card covers the applicant only and does not cover dependants.

If you are under 70 years, you will still have to pass a means test to get a medical card. But in the case of a married couple where one spouse is aged over 70 years and the other spouse is aged under 70 years, the income limit is significantly increased.

The weekly assessed income limit for a married couple under 66 years of age is €266.50. This increases to €298 if one spouse is aged 66 to 69, but when one spouse is over 70, the weekly limit increases to €596.50. The limit increases again if one spouse is over 80, in which case it is €627.

These limits apply to gross income less tax and PRSI, and you can also make deductions from your total income for reasonable expenses on rent/mortgage payments, travel to work and childcare.

If you do not qualify for a medical card you may still be eligible for a GP Visit Card which allows you to visit your doctor for free. Eligibility is assessed in a similar way to the medical card but the income limits are higher.

For a GP Visit Card, the weekly income limit for a married couple is \in 400 or \in 477 if one spouse is aged 66 to 69 years. If one spouse is over the age of 70, the income limit is \in 895. if one spouse is over the age of 80, the limit is \in 940.50.

If you think you may qualify under these increased limits, you can apply for both the medical card and GP Visit Card using a single application form . You can get the form from your local health office, or you can download an application form from the Health Service Executive website, www.hse.ie.

Ouestion

What financial assistance is available to older people to improve the living conditions in their homes?

Answer

Two new schemes have been introduced to assist older people with necessary improvements to their homes.

The Housing Aid for Older People Scheme replaces two former schemes (Special Housing Aid for the Elderly and the Essential Repairs Grant). It funds work such as structural repairs or improvements, rewiring, repairing of windows and doors, cleaning, painting and the provision of water, sanitary services and heating.

The maximum grant available is €10,500, which may cover 100% of the cost of works. Prioritisation of eligibility is on the basis of financial need with 100% of the approved cost of working available to those with annual household incomes of less than €30,000, tapering to 30% for those with annual household income of €54,001 to €65,000.

The Mobility Aids Grant Scheme is a new scheme which will provide grants for basic works designed to address mobility problems in the home. The grant could for example , be used for the purchase and installation of handrails, stair-lifts or access ramps. It is primarily, but not exclusively, intended for older people.

The grant is available to people whose maximum household income is less than \in 30,000. The maximum grant available is \in 6.000 and may cover 100% of the cost of the works.

The Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability is a revised scheme that assists with the provision or adaptation of accommodation to meet the needs of the people with a disability.

The maximum amount of this grant is €30,000. If your household income is under €30,000, the grant may cover up to 95% of the cost of the works, tapering to 30% for household incomes of between €54,001 and €65,000. The Housing Adaptation Grant for new houses for people with disabilities has a maximum limit of €14,500.

Question

How can I obtain a parking card so that I can use parking spaces that are reserved for people with disabilities?

Answer

Disabled Person's Parking Cards are available to people living in Ireland with certain disabilities and those who are registered blind, whether they are drivers or passengers. The parking card can be used by disability person in any vehicle in which he or she is travelling. This means that a disabled person who is being driven at different times by different people can bring the Parking Card and display it in the appropriate vehicle.

The Parking Card allows the person to park in designated areas also allows parking at parking meters and in disc parking areas free of charge. The card is also known as a European Parking Card and can be used by disabled people within the 27 member states of the EU and is also recognised in the US and Canada. This means that when you travel abroad, you can bring your Parking Card with you.

You will automatically qualify for a Parking Card if you hold Primary Medical Certificate (which exempts you from payment of VAT, motor tax and Vehicle Registration Tax). Although you qualify automatically, you must still make an application to obtain the card.

If you do not have a Primary Medical Certificate, you will need to have an application form completed by your doctor, to confirm that you meet the medical criteria and have the form stamped by the Gardai.

Question

I am planning to get married but don't intend to have the wedding ceremony at a church or registry office. Is it possible to get married elsewhere?

Answer

Up to now wedding ceremonies in Ireland could only take place in churches or registry offices but from November 2007 they can be held at other venues.

If you plan to have a wedding at an alternative venue in Ireland, it will need to be inspected and approved by the Health Services Executive beforehand to ensure that it meets requirements.

You will also need to ensure that a Registrar is available to solemnise the wedding. Anyone solemnising a civil or religious marriage must be on the Register of Solemnisers of Marriage which is maintained by the General Government Office.

Contact the General Register Office for more information or for details of your local Registrar: General Register Office, Government Offices, Convent Road, Roscommon, Lo-call 1890 252 076.

The General Register Office has no function in advising on, or the registration of marriages of Irish citizens that take place abroad. Marriages that take place outside the state are not normally registered in Ireland. In that case the legal validity of your marriage will depend on the laws of the country in which you marry.

If you need to get married abroad and you are not sure of the legal requirements for marriage in the country you will be marrying, contact the relevant embassy or the religious authorities in that country in advance to find out what is required.

As parents, we are delighted to see our sons progress so well on this relatively new team. We also get a lot of enjoyment from attending the matches.'

At the presentation, two of the players from the team – Adrian Dornan and Johnny Curran – displayed their league winner's trophy and medals to Mr Gallagher of the Newtown Inn (see picture right). Mr Gallagher told the players that the Newtown Inn would be happy to continue to support the team next year.

Christmas Crafts & Decorations

Shooting Star Christmas Tree Ornament

A simple-to-make Shooting Star Christmas Tree Ornament.

Materials: A small piece of thick paper, felt, or other flexible, easy-to-cut material - one or two colours, * Scissors, *, Pencil, * Reinforcements (optional), * Glitter (optional), * Markers (optional), * Glue



Step One

Cut a circle from the paper, felt or other material. A good circle template is a coffee mug.



Step Two

Starting at the edge, cut a spiral going to the centre of the circle. Decorate with glitter or markers.

Step Three



Cut a small star, about 1 or 2 inches wide. Make a tiny hole in the star. The ornament will hang from this hole, so you might want to use reinforcements (these are doughnut-shaped pieces of plastic used to reinforce the holes in notebook paper and are available at stationery stores). Decorate the star with glitter or markers




Step Four

Glue the star to the centre of the shooting star.

Brown Paper Christmas Stocking

Make a great Christmas stocking from a brown paper grocery bag. You can hang it from your mantle and stuff it with Christmas goodies.


Materials: Thick brown paper (like grocery bag paper) or brown felt, * Pencil, * Scissors, * Glue, * A holepunch, * Yarn* Markers or crayons



Step One

Draw a large stocking on thick brown paper (or brown felt).

Cut out two copies of this stocking.



Step Two

Glue the two stockings together around the edges (make sure you don't put any glue along the top opening).



Step Three

Punch holes around the edges of the stocking.

Weave yarn in and out of the holes. Leave a loop of yarn at one end, and tie it in a knot.



Step Four


Decorate your stocking with crayons, markers, stickers, construction paper cut-outs, or glitter.

Christmas Crafts & Decorations (continued)

Santa Hat or Decoration

This cute Santa Hat (or decoration) is easily made from construction paper and cotton

A large piece of red construction paper (one large, one regular size) [If you only have regular-size paper, you can use these hats as great decorations, but they will be too small to wear. You can also use a brown paper bag to make the hat, colouring it with tempera paint.] * Small scraps of black, yellow, and pink paper, * A pencil, * Scissors, * Hole punch, * Red crayon or marker, * Stapler, * Glue, * Cotton balls.



Step One

Draw and cut out a half circle from a large piece of construction paper.



Step Two

Twirl the half circle into a coneshaped hat. Staple along the seams.



Step Three

Cut a small circle of pink paper for Santa's face. Glue it to the cone. Cut a strip of black paper and glue it to the cone as Santa's belt. Cut a small yellow rectangle for a belt buckle. Glue it to the belt.



Glue a cotton ball at the top of the cone (the top of Santa's hat). Glue some cotton balls around the cone just above Santa's face (this is the bottom of his hat). Glue cotton balls around the face for Santa's beard.


Step Four

Step Five

Cut out 2 tiny black paper circles using a hole punch (these will be his eyes). Glue the eyes to Santa. Draw a mouth. Now you can wear your Santa hat for Christmas!



Make a cute snowman decoration using two paper plates. This makes a nice decoration to put on a door or hang in a window





Step One

On one of the paper plates, cut off the outer rim, making a smaller plate.



Step Two

Punch a hole near the rim on both plates.



Step Three

Tie the two plates together, using the yarn (or ribbon).

Step Four

On black construction paper, draw and then cut out a top hat and two boots. On coloured construction paper (or gift wrap paper), draw and then cut out two mittens.

Step Five

Either glue on googly eyes or draw eyes. Draw a mouth. For the nose, cut a short length from an orange pipe cleaner. Stick the pipe cleaner through the plate to secure it (if the plate is too tough, make a tiny hole with the tip of the scissors). For the buttons, you can cut out shapes from construction paper, use round stickers, glue on real buttons, or simply draw them. You now have a cute snowman decoration!

December in the Garden



The month of December has most people scurrying about with a long list of 'to-dos'. However probably the last thing on anyone's mind at this time of year is working in the garden. Fortunately, the list of gardening 'to-dos' for this month is more like a list of 'do's/don'ts'.

If you have been keeping up with your gardening tasks for the last few months, you should be able to take it pretty easy this month (at least in the garden). There are a few things to keep

eye on, and a few optional things you will probably be tending to your house

into the house, water it thoroughly. Living Christmas trees should not be kept in the house for any longer than 10 days.

Perennials, annuals, and bulbs

- If you potted up some bulbs, such as hyacinths, daffodils or tulips last September for winter forcing, keep an eye on them. Make sure they remain moist, and in the dark until they have established their root systems. It is possible that they have already filled their containers with roots and that the new top growth has begun. If this is so, bring them into the house and set them in a cool room, in indirect light. After a week or so, move them into bright light, and watch them go to town!
- Check on any corms and tubers which you dug up, and stored this fall. Remove and discard any which show signs of disease or rot.

Shrubs and trees

- Winter rains tend to make you forget about watering your garden. However, plants and shrubs which are
 growing beneath large evergreens or under the eaves of the house, may be bone dry by this time. Lack of
 water in the cold winter months can be fatal to many of these plants. A quick check will let you know if you
 need to do a little winter watering.
- If there is a sudden drop in the temperature, provide extra protection for your more tender flowering plants like Rhododendrons, Camellias, Azaleas and Daphne. You can provide temporary, emergency
- protection by driving in three of four stakes around the plant, and then simply covering the plant with some type of cloth, like burlap, a sheet or an old blanket. Don't let this material come into direct contact with the leaves of the plant. Remove the cover completely, as soon as the weather moderates.
- December is a good month to take cuttings of rhododendrons, azaleas, and other evergreen shrubs. The cutting should be taken from new tip growth, and kept in bright light, at about 70 degrees f.

House Plants

- Glossy leaved house plants such as Philodendrons, Rubber plants, and Palms should be sponged off periodically, to allow them to breathe.
- Plants which have fuzzy, textured, or other non-glossy type leaves should be set in the sink and sprayed gently with room temperature water, until the dust is cleaned away. Be sure that the foliage is allowed to dry completely.
- Provide your house plants with extra humidity by grouping plants together, or by setting the pots on leak proof trays filled with moistened pebbles.
- If you successfully kept last years plants alive, and have been keeping it in 14 hours of darkness since September, your Poinsettias and Christmas cactus should be ready bring back into the living room by December first. With the proper care, these Christmas plants will remain beautiful for many weeks.
- They prefer to be kept on the cool side, 65-70 degrees during the day and 55-60 at night.
- Keep them in bright, natural light whenever possible.
- Keep them away from heat sources.
- Keep them out of drafts.
- Be sure to water them when they become dry.

Simple Christmas Recipes

Easy Mince Pies

Ingredients

350g/12oz Cream Plain Flour 225g/8oz Butter (at room temperature) 125g/4oz Golden Caster Sugar 1 jar Mincemeat 1 small Egg (beaten) - for brushing Icing Sugar for dusting

Method

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°C/Gas 6. Lightly grease two bun trays.

Place flour into a large mixing bowl. Rub in the butter, then mix in the sugar. Bring the mixture together to form a ball! Do not add any liquid, keep bringing the dough together and it will form a ball.

Press small sized pieces of pastry into each section of two patty tins. Put a teaspoon of the mincemeat into the centre.

Take slightly smaller pieces of pastry than before and pat them out between your hands to make round lids, big enough to cover the pies. Top pies with the lids, pressing the edges together to seal. Brush with the beaten egg.

Bake for about 20 minutes until golden. Leave to cool in tin for 5 minutes, then remove to a wire tray. To serve, dust with icing sugar.

Simple Christmas Cake

Ingredients

225g/8oz Cream Plain Flour (sieved)

175g/6oz Margarine

225g/8oz Dark Brown Sugar

375g Sultanas

375g Fruit Mix

100g Cherries

Rind and Juice of one Orange

3 Large Eggs

100g Chopped Mixed Nuts

100g Ground Almonds

1 teaspoon Mixed Spice

2 baby bottles of Brandy

Method

Put margarine, sugar, fruit, rind, juice and one baby bottle of the brandy into a large saucepan.

Slowly bring to the boil, stirring occasionally, until the margarine has melted.

Turn off heat and leave to cool for approx. 30 minutes. Meanwhile pre-heat oven to 140°C/275°F/Gas 1 and line an 8″/20cm round deep cake tin with greaseproof paper.

Stir the eggs, nuts and ground almonds into the fruit mixture and mix well.

Finally, stir in the sieved flour and mixed spice.

Spoon the mixture into the tin and smooth it out evenly - the back of a metal spoon dipped in water is handy for this!

Bake for 2 1/2 - 3 hours approx. After 2 hours, cover with paper if cake is browning too quickly. To check the cake is done, insert a skewer into the centre - if it comes out clean, the cake is cooked.

Make holes in top of warm cake and pour over remaining brandy.

Leave cake in tin to cool completely.

When cold, wrap in greaseproof paper and then tinfoil. Store in a cool dry place.

Quick Christmas Pudding

Ingredients

50g / 2oz Self Raising Flour 125g / 4oz Brown Sugar 125g / 4oz Margarine 2 Eggs 1 teaspoon Cinnamon 1 packet (375g) Fruit Mix 1 tub (100g) Cherries 125g / 4oz Breadcrumbs 300ml / 1/2 pint Stout

Method

Beat margarine and sugar together, add the eggs and mix well.

Stir in the flour and cinnamon, next add the fruit and cherries. Mix well.

Finally, add the breadcrumbs and stout, stir well.

Cover and allow to stand overnight.

Next day, transfer to a greased 1 litre / 2 pint pudding bowl.

Steam for about 6 hours.

To steam pudding in oven

Preheat oven to 150°C / 300°F / Gas 2.

Put two long strips of tin foil crosswise on work top. Place roasting tin on foil.

Sit pudding bowl into the tin and fill with boiling water to within 1" of the top of tin. Quickly bring the foil around to form a parcel, which should be airtight to prevent any of the steam escaping.

Steam for 6 hours.

Shop Online Safely

How to pick trustworthy online retailers and avoid scams

illions of people buy online every day without any problems. With a bit of commonsense and knowledge, you can avoid problems with ecommerce. Many tips on buying on the internet are the same as for buying from a shop, such as:

- Shop around. That great deal might well be on offer somewhere else and cheaper.

 Use shops and services you know about or ones that have been personally recommended to you.
- Take into account the shipping, postage and packing costs. Weigh them up against the parking and travelling costs you would have to pay if you went to the your favourite store. All reputable websites will give details of their postage charges.
- Also be aware that VAT is charged on certain items such as CDs. Books are VAT free.

Risks

- Buying goods that aren't delivered.
- Goods which don't match the description.
- Delays and hassles with online purchases.
- Poor after-sales service.
- Misuse of your credit or debit card details.

Deal with reputable sellers

Pick good sellers, especially when buying from private individuals.

How to pick good sellers

In auctions or other situations where you are buying from a private seller:

- Look for a seller with a good reputation from other buyers.
- Check out the description of the item for sale is it clear, detailed, honest? For example, does it mention minor flaws as well as features? Does it look unique or copied straight from someone else's catalogue?
- Ask the seller questions and see how promptly they answer.
- See if the seller is selling other items and what they are. This might indicate if the seller is consistent in their descriptions and in how they describe themselves. In particular, look for a seller who will take payment using a secure payment method which offers recourse should something go wrong.
- Will the seller accept a variety of payment methods? This is better than someone who will only accept cash or instant cash wire transfer.
- Prefer sellers with clear returns policies and shipping charges.
- Look for other signs of trust such as regular or power sellers, who may have a reputation that they are keen to protect. Also look for sellers who have taken steps to prove their identity to the auction site or who offer a recognised dispute mediation process.

- Be more cautious with sellers who have recently changed their identity.
- It's your money. If you get a bad vibe from a seller, just walk away.
- With some overseas sellers, you may not get the same consumers' rights that you have in the EU and there may be duty and VAT payable on imports.
- Look for evidence of a physical address and telephone contact details.
- Don't judge a person or company solely by their web site.
- Be especially cautious when buying from overseas companies.
- Check sellers' privacy policy and returns policy.

Use an appropriate, safe means of online payment to get some protection against non-delivery.

Use a secure website

- Make sure you use a secure web site to enter credit card information. Look for a **padlock** symbol beside web address which itself should begin with 'https://' If you get a warning about a certificate be very cautious indeed. However, the padlock is not an absolute guarantee of safety and it says nothing about the business's ethics.
- Click on the padlock to check that the seller is who
 they say they are and that their certificate is current and registered to the right address.
 Don't be fooled by a padlock that appears on the
 web page itself. It's easy for conmen to copy the
 image of a padlock. You need to look for one that
 is in the window frame of the browser usually
 (Internet Explorer) itself.

Beware scams

- If a deal looks too good to be true, it probably is.
 Cross-check information on the internet and see if anyone else has had problems.
- Beware of work from home scams which promise easy profits but never pay.
- Buy from reputable companies.
 Be extremely wary of anything that is offered in an unsolicited or spam email.

Protect Your Password. Make it difficult to guess.

 If using a public computer (such as in a library or Internet cafe always log out when you've finished.

- Keep your passwords to yourself. Anyone who knows your password can access your account. Do not write down your passwords.
- When creating a password, use at least eight characters—a combination of letters and numbers is best. Do not use dictionary words, your name, your partner's name, your e-mail address or other personal information that can be easily obtained. You should change your password frequently. Avoid using the same password for accounts on different websites.

Check your seller's feedback

 Always check a seller's feedback history prior to ordering an item from them. Feedback is the most important indicator of a seller's overall quality. Look for clues within a seller's feedback that indicate the following: Ability to fulfill and dispatch orders in a timely fashion; willingness to resolve transaction disputes; an indication that the quality of the products dispatched matches the description supplied by the seller.



Three New Schemes being introduced by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, on November 1, 2007

- 1. Housing Adaptation Grant Scheme for People with a Disability
- 2. Mobility Aids Grant Scheme
- 3. Housing Aid for Older People

These (3) three schemes will replace the current schemes – The Disabled Persons Grant and the Essential Repairs Grant for the Elderly, which are administered largely by the local authorities. They assist in the upgrading of certain categories of private housing with particular emphasis on those in most need such as older people and people with a disability.

*The Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability – is available to assist in the carrying out of works that are reasonably necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability who is a member of the household.

*The Mobility Aids Grant Scheme – is available to fast track grant aid to cover a basic suite of works to address mobility problems, primarily, but not exclusively, associated with ageing, in order that recipients are not subject to delays in accessing works.

Cllr John McGinley's Motions for Consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting of the Council on 23 November:

Extending the Ban on HGV's to the Moyglare Road:

"That the successful scheme banning HGV's from Main Street, Maynooth be extended to cover the Moyglare Road in order to reduce the risk of accidents to the residents of the 620 houses on the road and the 1,500 pupils of the Secondary and Primary Schools on the Moyglare Road."

Cycle Lanes between Maynooth & Leixlip and Between Maynooth & Celbridge:

"That cycle lanes be put in place between Maynooth and Leixlip and between Maynooth and Celbridge in order to create a "Sli na Slainte" for cyclists, family spins, safe commuter routes, links for third level students etc."

CCTV System at the Harbour Field:

"When is the CCTV System being installed at the Children's Playground at The Harbour Field, Maynooth?

The cabling for the CCTV system was installed when Cllr. McGinley succeeded in getting funding for the new public lights at The Harbour earlier this year. It is very disappointing therefore that there appears to have been no progress in installing the CCTV System. The CCTV System would be a deterrent to the illegal drinking and thuggery that is presently taking place.

Safety at Junction of Straffan Road/ Meadowbrook Link Road, Maynooth

Following requests from members of the public, Cllr. John McGinley has sent the following letter to Kildare County Council:

"At peak traffic times it is very difficult for traffic to get onto the Straffan Road from the Meadowbrook Link road. For traffic turning right it is particularly hazardous and it is even more frightening when there is traffic trying to turn right from the Straffan Road to the Meadowbrook Link Road.

I understand that wiring for traffic signals were included in the design of the new road.

However, in my view the best solution is to provide a roundabout. There is ample space as there is a Bus Turing point at this location.

If action is not taken now there will be a serious accident sooner rather than later."

Lights not Working Between Bond Bridge and the Train Station Car Park

Following requests from members of the public Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to get Iarnrod Eireann to repair the three lights that are not working and to re-erect the 6th pole in that was knocked down some time ago.

As a result of so many lights being out of order in such a short space pedestrians are rightly concerned for their safety.

Bond Bridge Project--Areas Still Needing Attention:

Cllr. John McGinley has sent the following letter to the Project Manager, George Willoughby, on 17 October:

"I appreciate that great work was carried out on this project. The following are two of the areas still needing attention:

1. The two palisade gates still have not got the timber paneling that you agreed to last March.

The "green area" at Meadowbrook Lawns opposite the Site Works Compound has been left in an appalling state following the works. Prior to the Bond Bridge works the residents were able to cut the grass here. However, it cannot be cut now and is a complete eyesore and detracts from the lovely works leading to the bridge. Also, the narrow strip at the footpath in this area was never properly landscaped following the Bond Bridge works.

I would appreciate if you arranged for this work to be carried out ASAP".

PS "I assume that landscaping of the Site Works Compound will be carried out shortly as well."

Proposed Introduction of Pay Parking in Maynooth

The Council agreed to Cllr. John McGinley's proposal that the Draft Proposals be deferred from publication until the concerns of the Lyreen Residents' Association are taken on board.

John has also asked that a safe traffic management system for Back Lane/Pound Lane and the Lanes leading to Main Street i.e. Double Lane, Coates Lane, Fagan's Lane and Kelly's Lane be agreed with the Lyreen Residents and that it be included in the costs of the proposed Pay Parking Scheme.

Cllr. McGinley was given the following reply to his motion at the Leixlip Area Meeting on 25 October:

"Details of the draft parking by-laws are being prepared in parallel with the development of a Traffic Management Plan by WSP consultants. Local Gardaí have been consulted regarding the draft proposals and a meeting is also planned with the Lyreen residents group as part of the preliminary consultation process.

"To assist in preparing draft proposals for public consultation of both projects, a special meeting with the Area Committee would be considered beneficial before the next scheduled area meeting."

WORK TO COMMENCE ON EXTENSION TO MAYNOOTH PRESENTATION CONVENT

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Education in the Dail in relation to progress on the required Extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent. The Minister, in response to Deputy Stagg, stated that the Board of Management of Maynooth Presentation Convent were advised to accept a tender for the

works and that it was expected that building works would commence shortly.

The Extension to Maynooth Presentation Convent consists of refurbishment works, the construction of 3 additional classrooms, 4 Resource Rooms and a replacement General Purposes Hall.

Welcoming this progress Deputy Stagg congratulated the Board of Management in finally getting the Department to sanction the building work having been delayed by bureaucracy since November 2001.

STAGG CONCERNED AT TEMPORARY CONTRACTS FOR ADDITIONAL SPEECH AND LANGUAGE THERAPISTS

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the appointment of the 3 additional Speech & Language Therapists to the Kildare/West Wicklow Service as indicated to him by the HSE last August.

The HSE, responding on behalf of Minister Harney, advised Deputy Stagg that the additional therapists were now in place on temporary contracts and also indicated that a further additional post was to be filled shortly. Whilst welcoming the appointment of a further speech and language therapist Deputy Stagg expressed alarm at the indication that the 3 additional therapists now in place are on Temporary Contracts. This he stated was no use whatsoever.

Government neglect of Speech & Language Therapy, through the imposition of staff ceilings, led to a waiting list of 20 months for children to even get an assessment and to appoint temporary therapists was simply unacceptable given the serious deficiency in the existing service. It smacks of further cut —backs by this uncaring Government

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to raise this matter further with the Minister for Health as the positions must be full time if we are to provide our children with the best chance of overcoming difficulties which they encounter with speech and language.

STAGG WELCOMES PROPOSALS TO INCREASE CAPACITY ON MAYNOOTH SUBURBAN RAIL LINE

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Transport in relation to the City Centre Resignalling Project and other measures to increase capacity on

the Maynooth Suburban Line including additional carriages at peak periods.

The Minister advised Deputy Stagg that the remaining peak period services operating with 4 carriages will be extended to 8 carriages during 2008 following the reallocation of commuter railcars currently in use on the Sligo line when new intercity railcars are introduced over the coming months on the Sligo line.

In relation to the City Centre Resignalling, the Minister advised Deputy Stagg that Iarnrod Eireann are currently reviewing its plans for resignalling as part of its broader plans for the upgrade of the railway infrastructure in the Dublin area. Specifically in addition to electrification of the Maynooth line, Iarnrod Eireann intend to resignal the line and where possible, eliminate level crossings. Crossings along the line are at Blakestown, Clonsilla, Porterstown, Coolmine, Ashtown and Reillys and the most critical crossings are from Clonsilla to the City Centre. These works which are expected to be completed by 2011 would substantially increase capacity on the Maynooth Suburban Line.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the proposals to further increase capacity on the Maynooth Suburban Rail Line and awaits final confirmation on the phasing of the works.

WAITING TIME FOR EYE TESTS FOR CHILDREN ON WAY BACK UP AGAIN

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the waiting time for children for Eye Tests in Maynooth and Naas Health Centres and to his annoyance that the waiting times have increased dramatically since last April.

The HSE responded to Deputy Stagg on behalf of Minister Harney, and advised that the waiting time for new referrals was 15 months for Maynooth and 12 months for Naas. This compares with waiting times of 8 months in Maynooth last April and 7 months in Naas last April.

Reacting to the response, Deputy Stagg stated that it was scandalous that this Government could not provide proper services for our children given the amount of money available to the State. When waiting times were this bad in 2006 and were highlighted by Deputy Stagg, additional child optical clinics were put in place to reduce waiting times. It is obvious from the new figures that the HSE have ceased theses additional optical clinics.

In conclusion, Deputy Stagg stated that he would

raise the matter with the Minister and the HSE again by calling on them to reinstate the additional optical clinics at both Health Centres in the interests of providing the best service for our children.

STAGG CONTINUES CAMPAIGN FOR ADDITIONAL PUBLIC NURSING HOMES — STRONG POSSIBILITY OF SAME

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to question the Minister for Health in relation to the provision of additional Public Nursing Homes in Co. Kildare similar to the very successful facility located at The Harbour in Maynooth.

The HSE. responding to Deputy Stagg on behalf of the Minister, advised that there were 1,317 Extended Care Beds in Co. Kildare, with 1,055 of these in private nursing homes and 262 in public facilities in St. Vincent's in Athy, the Maynooth Community Unit and at the Drogheda Memorial Hospital in the Curragh. The HSE further added that in view of the increasing number of older persons, that additional long stay beds would be required in Kildare and that the location and capacity of the facilities that could provide these beds is currently under discussion and that it is anticipated that these additional places will be provided from the public and private sectors.

Welcoming the recognition that additional Public Nursing Homes were required in Kildare, Deputy Stagg stated that he was pleased that the HSE recognised their role and that older people were not going to be simply left in the hands of the for-profit Private Sector. It was important that a Strong Public Nursing Home System was built to provide an alternative to the Private Nursing Homes and give them competition and drive their unaffordable prices down. That would be the ideal but Deputy Stagg indicated that such a major programme is unrealistic under Harney in Health. The critical thing is to get as many additional Public Nursing Homes as we can and Deputy Stagg has vowed to continue to campaign on this issue.

UPGRADE OF N4 BETWEEN LEIXLIP AND THE M50 EXPECTED TO BE COMPLETED IN MARCH 2009

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been in contact with South Dublin Co. Council in relation to the timetable for the completion of the Upgrade of the N4 between Leixlip and the M50.

South Dublin Co. Council have advised Deputy Stagg that the Contract for the work was awarded to Jons Civil Engineering Company, who commenced work on the 3rd September last and that the duration of the

contract is 18 months, giving a completion target date of March 2009.

Welcoming the commencement of the work Deputy Stagg stated that it was critical that the work was well managed to ensure that existing traffic moved during the course of the work. Past experience on the N7 upgrade and works to the M50 Roundabout at Palmerstown have shown that it is possible to keep traffic moving relatively well whilst construction work is been undertaken.

Deputy Stagg stated that the N4 upgrade will bring relief to motorists from North Kildare through the Widening of the Existing Carriageway to 3 lanes in each direction and the provision of an Interchange at the Lucan/Newcastle Junction on the Lucan Bypass. The work is costing €40 Million and Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that originally the work was to be completed by 2004 but Government Cut-Backs imposed in 2002 saw it fall back to its present completion date of 2009.

STAGG PRESSES GORMLEY ON ADDITIONAL STAFFING FOR KILDARE CO. COUNCIL

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Environment in relation to his efforts to have the Public Service Embargo lifted for local authorities such as Kildare Co. Council where there has been a large rise in the population covered by Local Authorities and given the demand for Public Services placed on Co. Council's in growing areas.

The Minister advised Deputy Stagg that he was reviewing the overall employment levels in the local Government sector having regard to the need to deliver front line services and achieve value for money within the parameters of Government policy on public service employment. The Minister further advised Deputy Stagg that as part of the review, his Department is consulting the Department of Finance in relation to the current ceiling on local authority staff numbers, including increased servicing requirements in areas which have high population growth.

Commenting on the Minister's response, Deputy Stagg indicated that it smacked of similar responses from the former Environment Minister Dick Roche T.D., and he stated that it would be better for the Minister to meet the Minister for Finance face to face to argue the case rather than leaving it to Officials.

Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg is operating

at a significant disadvantage when compared with other Co. Council's as follows:

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the population of Kildare had risen by 38% since 1996 and the Public Service Embargo which has been in place since 2002 must be lifted now.

STAGG LODGES APPEAL AGAINST 4 & 3 STOREY APARTMENT DEVELOPMENT AT OLD GREENFIELDS.

Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley have lodged an Appeal with An Bord Pleanala in relation to the decision by Kildare Co. Council to grant planning permission for the development of 13 of the rear gardens of Old Greenfields Cottages, Maynooth, comprising 4 & 3 Storey Apartment Blocks.

Whilst accepting that some improvements had been made to the proposal during the planning process, Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley indicated that the proposal as amended still impacted negatively on the amenity of residents in Old Greenfields and The Crescent.

In their appeal Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley made the following points:

- They reiterated their concerns that the 4 Storey Apartment Blocks, because of their sheer scale, would be visually obtrusive for residents of bungalows in Old Greenfield's and The Crescent. The inclusion of balconies in the gable ends of the blocks facing directly into Old Greenfield's would cause overlooking and a loss of privacy.
- They pointed out that the 4 Storey Blocks would be visually obtrusive from the Straffan Road at a prominent point at the entrance to the Town.
- They indicated that a 2 Storey Block on the Western portion of the site, which includes balconies, would cause a loss of amenity for residents of bungalows directly adjoining this part of the site.
- A 2 Storey Block with developed roof space which looks directly into the rear gardens of existing houses

in Old Greenfields and The Crescent would also cause a loss of amenity through overlooking and a reduction in privacy.

They indicated that the proposal as presented was totally out of character with the existing built environment in the area which comprises of bungalows and semi-detached bungalows.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that it is regrettable that developers continue to seek to over develop sites in Maynooth and other areas of North Kildare to the detriment of existing long established residents and he expressed the hope that An Bord Pleanala would overturn Kildare Co. Council's decision in the interests of the residents of the area.

STAGG ACCUSES GOVERNMENT OF ABANDONING CARE OF THE ELDERLY

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of elderly people in Co. Kildare awaiting admission to a Public Nursing Home in Co. Kildare and the numbers awaiting sanctioning of Home Care Packages.

The HSE advised Deputy Stagg that there were 114 elderly people awaiting admission to Long Term Beds in Public Nursing Homes in the County whilst a further 130 were on waiting lists for Home Care Packages which are a means of allowing them to live at home and receive care following discharge from Hospital.

Describing the figures as shocking Deputy Stagg stated that the Government was failing to provide adequate services for 244 elderly people in Co. Kildare and if this was the case across the Country there would be 5,500 elderly people in similar circumstances.

It all boils down to funding and priorities stated Deputy Stagg and when it comes to funding Minister's Salary rises, there is no problem but when it comes to looking after the very people who worked to build up our Economy to what it is today the Government simply could`nt care less.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg indicated that he would continue to press the Minister and the HSE on these issues until proper services were put in place for the most valued members of our Community.



Now, unfortunately due to progressive dementia, she was becoming more isolated and preferred to remain in her room. Her speech had deteriorated over the years and at this time she had not spoken for over a year.

I explained to Sheila about the mass and she agreed to come to the day room. She had chosen a rich red velveteen leisure suit to wear: she liked the soft feel of it and with her long white hair put up in a chignon she looked really elegant.

I wheeled her up just as Fr. Tom arrived and was greeting everyone. Before starting to robe for Mass, he put a tape into the recorder and soon the room was filled with the strains of Silent Night. My attention was drawn to the window and I saw snow falling, turning the green into a winter wonderland. Sheila's silence seemed to be reflected in the quiet beauty outside.

Mass was about to begin when suddenly the sound of "Adeste Fidelis" enveloped us all. It felt as if our hearts were lifted up. I heard a voice apart from the tape and on turning around I saw Sheila, sitting upright in her chair, an expression of pure radiance had transformed her face. Both arms were outstretched as if conducting and she sang each wonderful note perfectly. This was such a joyous experience; nobody had heard her sing before and she had not uttered a word for so long. Sheila continued to sing during the Mass (appropriately). Sadly, I never heard her sing again, silence returned and remained. Sheila died in her sleep three weeks later. Her last Christmas gift to us all is a beautiful memory which touched our hearts.
