Maynooth Community Council Notes

The May meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 14th May in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Maynooth Fairtrade Town Launch

Peter Connell said Maynooth has now reached the criteria needed and has now gained Fairtrade Status. He said that a group of people came together about three years ago and that this was the results of all their hard work. He said the meeting was well attended: he also noted that a big group of school children were present. Also in attendance were Catherine Murphy TD and Emmet Stagg TD. Peter then explained that 12 outlets in Maynooth now sell Fairtrade produce. He also staited that the Celtic Tiger hasn't taken people over and people want to buy these goods.

Rosemary Zenner gave a short talk on one area she visited in Bangladesh. She said that Bangladesh is more or less the same size as Ireland but with a huge population difference. Bangladesh has 140 million people while Ireland has only 4 million in comparison. The children from Gaelscoil gave a lovely performance depicting people working in Fairtrade industries. Peter Gaynor, Director of Fairtrade Ireland, also gave a short talk and congratulated Maynooth and all involved.

Peter Connell thanked all concerned with this project: the supermarkets for stocking the goods: places like the Glenroyal Hotel and NUI Maynooth: The Community Council for endorsing the project and the office for using the goods.

It was then brought to everyone's attention that Peter Connell was resigning from the Community Council. This news was received with some shock and Peter explained that he has now moved to Celbridge and that he will commence to annoy them over there. Many tributes were paid to Peter for his many years of service to Maynooth and the Community Council. He has served as Vice- Chairperson and was involved with the Newsletter for many years. A vote of thanks was extended to him by Secretary Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin.

Tidy Towns

Paul Croghan said they are now out every Wednesday night and that they will be looking at new projects for the town. The flower baskets will be done as soon as possible after the elections with the hope that all posters and ties will be removed as soon as possible. There was a good attendance at their AGM gaining them a lot of new members. The response from children is very good he said and it shows in schools getting their green flags. He also hoped business people will make an effort and keep their buildings in

good shape as this also contributes to the points. He also asked that people bring in their bins after collection.

Matt Callaghan had a few hard words to say He said that he never saw the town as dirty as it was in the early part of April.

They will be hoping to do a lot better in the I-BAL competition this year coming 52 out of 53 towns entered last year. He stressed that this is a community effort as well as Tidy Towns.

An Nuada Player

Terry Nealon regretted the fact that Maynooth does not have a theatre; they find it very difficult to do anything, and that The Arts is very much alive in Maynooth. They put on at least two productions every year and hope that the planed development of the Geraldine Hall will soon come together; also they have produced a CD, A Maynooth Miscellany of local music and poetry to highlight the fact.

Local Matters

Historical Group

Hilda Dunne talked about the Moyglare Gardens and the Mill Wheel and that they have a planed project to make people more aware of these local historical places and structures. Hilda also said that they had wanted to use the Castle grounds on occasions and had been refused by the O.P.W.

It seems impossible to gain access to the Castle grounds: efforts were made to have the grounds open for Community week said Paul Croghan but this had also proved difficult. It was suggested that we should write to the Castle Committee.

Low Flying Aircraft

This problem was raised again, while it was thought that there was a great improvement in this problem. However some areas Re – The Moyglare areas were now experiencing low and frequent aircraft traffic said Paul Croghan. A guide was issued before regarding this; if the number can be read from the ground then the plane is low.

Community Games

Matt Callaghan said that Community Games were taking part this year in Chess, Art, Athletics, and Swimming. Matt hoped that County and National medals would be won.

Public Meeting on Vandalism

This was a very well presented meeting with very good attendance.

The question was raised Re. CCTV full coverage in the town by Tom Mc Mullin.

Brid Feely said that the Business Association are working on this.

Phone Mast at GAA

It was noted that Kildare County Council has refused planning permission for the retention of the mast at the GAA.

It was suggested that GAA might consider dropping the problem with the mast: also the fact that it's in the development plan that no mast should be within close proximity of schools and built- up areas. This would be seen as the right thing to do for the people of Mavnooth.

The fact was also raised that phone masts have been around for some years now and that there were no known health issues but it was also pointed out that this is not proven. It was suggested that O2 should be written to re- stating that we, the people of Maynooth, are disappointed at the response to the local community.

Maynooth Community Council Elections

It is hoped that there will be a good response to the elections. Nominations will have closed by the 17th May and elections will be deemed necessary if nominations outnumber places available. The first meeting of the new Council will take place on the 18th June with the election of the new executive; it will also be an AGM.

Next Community Council meeting will take place on the 18th June in the Glenroyal Hotel at 8.30.p.m.

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Notes Know your rights

Question

I have checked the Register of Electors and I am not on it. Can I still register to vote in the next general election?

Answer

In order to vote in an election, you must be registered. A draft Electoral Register was compiled by each local authority and published on the 1st of November 2006. Corrections or additions could then be submitted

before the 9th of December and these were included in the Register that came into force on the 15 February 2007. To be included in the Register you must be at least 18 years of age on that day. Also, you must have been ordinarily resident in the State on the 1st of September 2006.

If you are not on the published Register, you can still apply for inclusion in a supplement to the Register. Application forms for this are available from Garda stations, public libraries and local authority offices. You can view the Register at these locations and online at the website www.checktheregister.ie.

If you are already on the Register of Electors but have moved to another area, you can apply for inclusion in the supplement at your new address. Your name will be deleted from the original Register.

In order to be included in the supplement used at the next general election, your application must be received by your local authority at least 15 working days before polling day. You must be at least 18 years of age on polling day and you must be ordinarily resident at the address at which you wish to be registered.

To vote in a general election in Ireland you must be a citizen of Ireland or the UK. Citizens of other countries who are registered and vote in European and/or local elections.

Question

Who is entitled to claim a Bereavement Grant in the event of death?

Answer

The Bereavement Grant is a payment to assist with funeral or other expenses following a death. The grant of \in 850 is usually paid to the person responsible for these expenses.

Eligibility usually depends on the number of PRSI (Pay-Related Social Insurance) contributions that have been made over a certain period of time. You may also be eligible based on entitlement to certain social welfare payments.

The PRSI requirement can be met by the PRSI payment of either the deceased person or their spouse or partner. In the case of the death of a child under 18 years of age (or under 22 if in full-time education), the PRSI contributions of their parent or guardian are taken into account.

The grant is also payable on the death of:

- A Contributory pensioner, their spouse or partner, or someone for whom they received a qualified child allowance or qualified adult allowance.
- An orphan for whom a Guardian's Payment (Contributory) was being paid, or their guardian.
- The widow or widower of a deceased insured person.

From May 2007, the grant is payable on the death of a person aged between 16 and 22 who was receiving Disability Allowance.

To apply for the Bereavement Grant, contact your local Social Welfare Office or telephone Lo-call 1890-500-00.

Other grants available following a death include the Widowed Parent Grant, for widows or widowers with dependent children, and the Special Funeral Grant which may be claimed under the Occupational Injuries Benefit Scheme where death results from a work-related accident or disease.

Question

What rights do older people or people with disabilities have when they are dealing with their energy supplier?

Answer

Electricity and gas suppliers must follow the customer protection guidelines which have been produced by the Commission for Energy Regulation.

These include the following protections and entitlements

- Older people cannot be disconnected by their energy supplier during the winter months, between November the 1st and March the 31st.
- People with a visual impairment must be provided with an alternative means of communication such as Braille bills, talking bills or phone bills.
- People who are hard of hearing must be provided with a minicom, text messaging or video service to receive their bills.
- People relying on life support equipment in their homes cannot be disconnected under any circumstances.
- A register of vulnerable customers must be maintained by all electricity and gas suppliers.
- A second person may be nominated to receive energy bills on behalf of a vulnerable person.
- Energy suppliers must facilitate payment options for residential customers experiencing genuine financial hardship and, where appropriate, engage with a financial/money advisor appointed by the customer.

Companies are required to have a fair and reasonable complaints procedure in place for customers who are not satisfied with the service they receive.

Question

What is the European Health Insurance Card?

Answer

If you are visiting certain European countries and you become ill or get injured, the European Health Insurance Card allows you to access public healthcare services. It replaces the E111 which had previously been required.

If you are going on a short stay to an EU country, an EEA country (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway) or to Switzerland, it is advisable to have the card to cover you and your family for public healthcare. Cards issued from March 2007 are valid for four years and each person travelling will need a card. It is not required for a temporary visit to the UK if you can prove that you are ordinarily resident in Ireland.

You can apply for the card online at www.ehic.ie if you already have a medical card, GP visit card or a Drugs Payment scheme card. Otherwise you can

download an application form from this web site or get it from your Local Health Office. You will need to provide your name, address, date of birth and Personal Public Service Number (PPS No.).

You should apply for a card at least ten working days before travelling. If there is not enough time to get the card, contact your Local Health Office to get a Temporary Replacement Certificate instead for each person travelling.

If you have a card that has expired, you can apply online to renew your card. You will require your existing card number. If you have changed your address or your name, you will need to contact your Local Health Office. If you have concerns about getting a renewed card in time, you can get a Temporary Replacement Certificate.

You may also wish to consider taking out private travel insurance for some expenses that are not covered by the European Health Insurance Card. These may include the costs of repatriation home or the expenses of relatives who travel to you if you fall ill abroad.

Useful Tips

Useful Beauty Tips

Natural wart remover:

Banana peel contains a substance that is highly effective at destroying warts. Place a small amount of peel against the wart and hold it in place with adhesive tape. Change the peel daily as needed and continue for 2 weeks or until the wart is gone.

Zap blemishes:

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Sign of the times at Maynooth Students' software entry in global contest has creative merit and commercial potential

hree NUI Maynooth students Dan Kelly (graduate) and Undergrads Eric McClean and Cathal Coffey won first prize in the Irish leg of the Imagine Cup (www.imaginecup.com). The competition was sponsored by Microsoft.

The competition has a different theme each year and has being in existence since 2003. The main aim of the competition was to design a software project that fits the theme and also has great creative merit and commercial potential.

It's the first time an Irish team will take part in the final in Seoul, South Korea. They will compete against 50 international teams for a prize of \$25,000 US Dollars with a chance to gain professional entrepreneurial skills and commercialise their product.

The Maynooth team's entry uses motion capture technology to teach sign language. A learner signer can watch a sign being demonstrated and then put on a colour-coded glove to practise before a webcam. A computer reads the learner's hand signs and gives the learner feedback.

Also to be congratulated was the third placed team, Team Sleepy Oranges, which developed a Chinese language learning package. The team members were Fergal Walsh (Celbridge), Cathal Browne (Roscommon), Lei Pan (Kildare), Shekman Tang (Blanchardstown).

A Special Birthday Wish





The Late Josie Murphy 1910 - 2007

osie Murphy, who passed away peacefully in his 97th year, will be sadly missed by his family and his large circle of friends in Maynooth, where he was a well known and popular member of our community. Born at number 8 Dillon's Row in 1910, Josie spent most of his long life living in the town. His knowledge and memories of the area were second to none; he could recall many an interesting story of Maynooth in the early 20th century.

He remembered working in Carton Estate as a schoolboy during his holidays for wages of 1s 3d per day with a staff of over one hundred men and women from the area working there. Another source of income was to open the gates of the avenue on Sunday mornings to allow horse drawn carriages through as the residents of Carton House attended church in Parsons Street.



He remembered the War of Independence and the Black and Tans being stationed at Lyreen House and their playing soccer in the harbour field. Also at that time the burning of the town hall in the square by a local unit of the I.R.A. to stop the Tans from taking it over. The iron seats at the top of the main street (Carton Avenue) were previously placed around the town hall where Maynooth people would sit on Sundays in their best dress, long skirts (ladies), bowler hats (gents) discussing the topics of the day.

He remembered the Eucharist Congress in 1932 and the hundreds of people walking through the village the previous evening on their way to the Phoenix Park. The shops were sold out of almost every item of grocery on that evening. One of the highlights of his lifetime in Maynooth was the visit of Pope John Paul 2nd to the college in 1979, arriving by helicopter to greet priests and students and the people of Maynooth, who for the previous six weeks each evening were out in force cleaning, weeding, painting and planting flowers to prepare for the visit.

He remembered Eamon DeValera visiting the town as president of Ireland and the big black car used to transport him; Also Princess Grace of Monaco who stayed in Carton House in the 1960's.

He worked in Boland's Mill in Grand Canal Street, Dublin where he cycled to work each day and home each evening, when, following his dinner, he would again set off on his bicycle to Clane or Kilcock or some other destination around the county to play a football match.

His love of the "Crom Abus", his local GAA club, never waned over the years and he could proudly show a photo of his father in the Maynooth team of the 1890's. He captained Maynooth to their only success in the Leinster Leader Cup senior football competition in 1935. He played football and hurling for the club and for many a year was seen following and supporting the team along with great gaels like the Late Jimmy Tracy, Jimmy (curley) McLoughlin, Phil Burke and Jim Nolan (who have also gone to their eternal reward) among others at pitches around the country.

He moved to number 13 Leinster Cottages in 1950 where he spent many years with his six children and wife Kathleen R.I.P. Sadly his wife Kathleen passed away in 1996. After paying 2s 6d per week up until the mid sixties, he along with other residents purchased their houses from Lord Brockett, Master of Carton House.

His last few years were happily spent in the care of the Maynooth Community Unit for older people where he boasted of having the best room in the house. He could see from his window St Patrick's College, the Castle, the harbour field and the canal and could hear the Angelus bells ringing out each day, which assured him he was still in his beloved town of Maynooth.



Recipes - Barbecue Time

Sirloin Kebabs

Ingredients

1/4 cup soy sauce

3 tablespoons light brown

sugar

3 tablespoons distilled white vinegar

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

4 fluid ounces 7 up

2 pounds sirloin steak, cut into 1 1/2 inch cubes

2 green peppers, cut into 2 inch pieces

Skewers

1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, stems removed Cherry tomatoes

A fresh pineapple, peeled, cored and cubed.

Method

In a medium bowl, mix soy sauce, light brown sugar, distilled white vinegar, garlic powder, seasoned salt, garlic pepper seasoning, and 7 up. Reserve about 1/2 cup of this marinade for basting. Place steak in a large

resealable plastic bag. Cover with the remaining marinade, and seal. Refrigerate for 8 hours, or overnight.

Bring a saucepan of water to a boil. Add green peppers, and cook for 1 minute, just to blanch, drain, and set aside.

Preheat grill for high heat. Thread steak, green peppers, mushrooms, tomatoes, and pineapple onto skewers in an alternating fashion. Discard marinade and the bag. Lightly oil the grill grate. Cook kebabs on the prepared grill for 10 minutes. Baste frequently with reserved marinade during the last 5 minutes of cooking.

Marinades

Pineapple Marinade

Ingredients

1 cup crushed pineapple 1/3 cup soy sauce 1/3 cup honey 1/4 cup cider vinegar 2 cloves garlic, minced

1 teaspoon ginger powder

Preparation

Mix all ingredients together and use immediately or store in airtight containers for up to 7 days.

Orange and Onion Marinade

1/3 cup orange marmalade

3 green onions, finely chopped

1/4 cup white wine

1 teaspoon olive oil

1 teaspoon cider vinegar

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1/2 Teaspoon soya sauce.

Preparation

Place all ingredients in a medium saucepan. Allow to simmer on low heat until marmalade has thinned and all ingredients are combined. Allow to cool completely before using as a marinade.

Lemon and Rosemary Marinade

Ingredients

3 large lemons

1/2 cup of fresh rosemary (3 tablespoon dried)

1/4 cup of olive or salad oil

6 Cloves of garlic crushed.

Preparation.

Cut Lemon in half and squeeze out the juice into a bowl or a re-sealable plastic bag. Throw in the lemon halves and everything else. Mix together well. Great for chicken. Marinade for at least 4 hours.

> A very quick marinade can be made up with Olive oil, vinegar, and mustard. Just leave meat marinating for an hour and your will be ready to cook.



Top Garden Projects for June

as the weather kept you from getting some of your spring gardening projects completed? Early June is not too late to get your summer gardening underway. Adding colour, pruning, controlling slugs, dividing perennials, planting vegetables and eliminating weeds head the list of things to do in June.

COLOUR SPOTS - are an ideal way to create instant colour in the garden. In recent years growers have introduced blooming size annual plants that they call

'Colour Spots'. These plants are generally grown in individual pots, in sizes of 4 inches or more and the plants are nicely branched and already in bloom. So when you select and plant them they provide instant colour. If you are like me, and haven't had a chance to get summer annuals planted due to the bad weather on weekends during



PRUNING - June is the month often set aside for shaping evergreens. In fact, this is the month the commercial tree growers shape their Christmas trees. So it is a good month for shearing, pinching or pruning

Junipers, Cypress or Conifers. Also, this is the time to pinch back annuals, Fuchsias, Geraniums and any other plants that might be getting too leggy or misshapen.

SLUGS - the cool, wet spring has drawn the slugs out in full force, so it is important to take time to eliminate

them. Do not use slug pellets – these are harmful to birds. Try filling a container with beer and the slugs will die happy when they dive in!

PERENNIALS - this is an ideal time to select and plant the spring, summer and autumn flowering varieties of perennials. It's also the time to divide the spring flowering perennials like, Primroses, Arabis, Aubrietia, Doronicum daisies, etc. In addition, June, July, August and September are the months for starting any of the perennials from seed. Sow the seeds directly into the garden.

VEGETABLE GARDENING - It is now late enough in the season to start any of the warm weather

vegetables, including Corn, Beans, Peppers, Egg Plant, Tomatoes, etc. If you haven't had a chance to sow some of these crops yet, it is not too late to get them started now. Be sure to get these crops started as soon as possible.

WEEDING - the cool, wet weather in May has also encouraged the germination of weed seeds, so they are a real problem in many gardens. It is critical that these weeds be pulled, cultivated or eliminated in some form before they have a chance to flower and go

> to seed again. Otherwise, you will be fighting newly germinated weed seed for the next several years.

> **FERTILIZING** - some of the plants that have suffered freeze damage this past winter will probably benefit from a light feeding at this time. In fact, one of the best times to fertilize plants like Rhododendrons, Camellias and Azaleas is immediately after they have finished

flowering. Use a 'Rhododendron' or 'Evergreen' type fertilizer to feed evergreens and a 'Rose' or 'Vegetable Garden' type food to feed Roses, perennials, vegetables and deciduous trees and shrubs.


LAWN CARE - late spring and early summer is the time to fertilize the lawn again. This is also an excellent time to eliminate lawn weeds. It's not too late to reseed or over-seed the lawn with new lawn seed. If temperatures range much above 65 degrees,

> it will be too late to apply moss killers. Thatching should also wait until fall. However, there is still plenty of time to perforate (aerate) the lawn, if it is needed.

ROSES - they have suffered enough damage from the severe winter. So be on the lookout for mildew, aphid, black-spot or other insect or disease problems and if they appear take steps to control them right

away. Roses will need to be fertilized monthly this summer.

- Plant your hanging baskets and window boxes with trailing petunias, trailing geraniums, white bacopa, red verbenas, trailing fuchsias and mixed lobelia.

- Plant up spare containers with 6 strawberry plants to give you tasty fresh strawberries all summer. Look for the excellent variety called F1 Karen and plant her now.
- Plant some summer colour throughout the garden in shrub & rose borders with mixed verbenas, petunias, crystal palace lobelia and dwarf dahlias.
- Interested in growing some home grown fruit? Then plant a couple of dwarf coronet apple trees in large containers or amongst existing trees and shrubs. Coronet apple trees are reliable croppers with excellent eating varieties like James Grieve, Katy, Beauty of Bath, Elisions Orange and Discovery. Bred for taste and compact shape coronets are a winner.
- Feed, weed and moss kill your lawn, which kills unwanted broadleaved weeds and moss, greens your lawn without forcing growth.
- Sow new lawns now with green velvet dwarf lawn seed. Green velvet creates a rich green sward which is easy to maintain and requires less mowing.
- Treat your roses with a dressing of rose fertilizer once a month, and prevent pests and diseases by spraying with rose clear every two weeks.
- Protect all your young bedding and vegetable plants with a dressing of slug pellets or slug liquid. Remember slugs and snails relish all soft new growth and can devour your plants over night.

Update on threat to Main Street Trees

You will recall from our last Labour News that Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley lodged an appeal with An Bord Pleanala in relation to the threat of removal of the 8 Trees on Main Street, Maynooth, from Hands old House (Beside Maynooth Jewellers) to the square which was a direct consequence of a condition imposed by Kildare Co. Council in their grant of planning permission for the re-development of the Tesco site.

Maynooth Labour News

Tesco have now responded to Deputy Stagg's Appeal and have indicated that it is not their intention to seek the removal of any of the trees and that the drawings submitted in relation to the widening of the junction of Main Street and Straffan Road were provided at the request of the Roads Design Section of the Council. The Drawing they submitted where no trees would be affected was their preferred option and that they would support amendments to Condition 33 which would include a statement requiring that no trees are to be removed.

Deputy Stagg has now indicated to An Bord Pleanala that he welcomes the submission from Tesco`s. He also advised An Bord Pleanala that if Tesco were to get agreement on the Drawing, which does not involve the removal of any of the trees from Main Street, from Kildare Co. Council that he would withdraw his appeal once the other appellants agreed to withdraw theirs also.

Deputy Stagg remains critical of Kildare Co. Council for allowing this doubt over the Main Street Trees to have developed.

Affordable Houses in Maynooth

There are currently 766 households who have expressed an interest in purchasing an affordable dwelling in County Kildare.

183 have a first preference for Celbridge, 116 for Leixlip and 63 for Maynooth. The number for Maynooth is low probably because there were very few affordable houses available. Cllr. John McGinley has been advised by the Council that 46 affordable dwellings will be coming available over the next year at Moyglare Hall. John advises anyone who is interested to apply immediately as some of these will be coming available shortly.

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following progress report, on issues that he has been pursuing, at the Leixlip Area Committee meeting on 20th April:

Northern Relief Road from Moyglare to Blacklion:

"I have requested the meetings administrator to suggest that perhaps it might be convenient to attend the next meeting of the Dunsaughlin Area Committee which is scheduled to take place on Monday, 14th May next."

Public lighting on the MeadowBrook Link Road:

"The matter continues to be pursued by the Road Construction team. They have been assured that this matter will be definitely rectified within the next fortnight or so."

Footpath and public lighting from the Nursing Home to Moyglare Hall:

"As previously outlined, this work will be carried out as part of the "Deficiency in Infrastructure Scheme." It is proposed that works will commence in early May, 2007."

Palisade fencing at Bond Bridge

"I have asked the Road Construction team to arrange to circulate design details, hopefully, in the course of the meeting."

Footpath between Tesco and Blacklion Estate:

"This work will be carried out, as requested."

Audible crossing signals at junction of Kilcock road/Moyglare Road/Mill Street, Maynooth.

"The Council is currently carrying out an audit of all such crossings in the county. The Senior Executive Engineer, Traffic Section, has been requested to examine this particular junction in the coming days."

Beaufield Estate, Maynooth:"

It is not proposed to cul-de-sac Beaufield Estate for reasons already outlined. Again it is a public road and, in such a capacity, it is important in terms of the current infrastructural network. In particular, it provides important access to housing estates, shops etc. Indeed, in recent times, substantial public funds were expended in relation to traffic calming and other maintenance works."

Needless to say Cllr. John McGinley rejected this report and asked for a positive outcome at the next meeting.

Residents will note that the wooden bollards, which were funded by Cllr. John McGinley from his Discretionary Grants, are being installed at the Beaufield Shopping Centre at present ($10^{\rm th}$ May). Hopefully, they will prevent lorries and cars from parking on the green areas and of course there is a practically empty car park at The Newtown Inn.

Bollards at Old Greenfield, Maynooth

"I have also reported on this matter previously. The matter has been examined by the Road Design team, as requested. It is not proposed to remove the bollards. As already outlined, the road in question is too narrow to accommodate two-way traffic. The members will be aware of the considerable development along this route in recent times. There are, therefore, implications in terms of road safety generally and pedestrian safety in particular due to the narrowness of the road in question. In addition, the recent opening of the Meadowbrook Link Road has greatly eased traffic flow in the general area."

Cllr. John McGinley again rejected this report and asked for a positive outcome at the next meeting.

Blue Hoarding at Geohegan's Lane:

"Following an application for a Section 254 licence renewal for the hoarding at 8 Main Street, Maynooth, the applicant has been requested to submit further information within 2 weeks. Essentially, the applicant has also been advised that this hoarding must be removed within 1 month and he must also make the site safe."

Re-building of walls at Pound Park/The Band Hall and at the Small Pound:

At the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting of the Council on 20th April Council Officials agreed to Cllr. John McGinley's motion that Development Levies be used to re-build these dangerous walls.

Motions for the next Leixlip Area Committee Meeting:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motions for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

- "That a pedestrian crossing be provided from O'Neill Park to the TESCO side of the Dublin Road, Maynooth in order to facilitate residents who live on the northern side of this road O'Neill Park, Leinster Cottages, Dunboyne Road etc.)."
- 2. "That grass cutting by the Council be extended to include the grass on the public areas on both sides of the old Meadowbrook Road i.e. Meadowbrook and Beaufield sides"

- 3. "That the unnecessary pedestrian walkway between Kingsbry and Greenfield Close, Maynooth, be examined to see how best it can be closed off"
- 4. "When is the "Band Stand" in Pound Park,
 Maynooth, going to be moved to NUI
 Maynooth?"

Public lighting Improvements Sought for Kingsbry Estate, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to carry out the following public lighting improvements in Kingsbry:

- 1. A new pole with double light fitting at the footpath on the green area behind house no.'s 236 & 237.
- New extended lamp heads on poles no.'s 47 & 48
- Replacement of broken head on pole outside house no. 225 (previously reported to ESB). This pole also needs to be moved about 1m from the driveway as trucks are regularly hitting it.
- 4. New pole and light required at the side of house no. 206

Bollards at the bottom of Kingsbry:

Cllr. John McGinley has asked that some of his Discretionary grants be used for the Erection of wooden bollards at the bottom of Kingsbry, between it and Meadowbrook, in order to prevent cars and trucks from driving onto the green (there were concrete bollards here before but they were broken down). John has also allocated funds for the reconstruction of the footpath outside house no. 116 Kingsbry.
