Public Safety Association meeting against Anti-Social Behaviour

On Monday night 23rd April a public meeting was held in the Glenroyal Hotel called by concerned parents and residents in Maynooth, who are increasingly alarmed at the level and incidents of assaults, crime and anti social-behaviour in the town.

The excellent attendance of almost a 180 people confirmed the level of interest among the residents of the issues. In attendance on the night were representatives from the Students Union, The Maynooth Business Association, Gardai and Senior Citizens. The organizers of the event are to be thanked for their innovation in holding such a meeting which gave all the residents and bodies concerned, the opportunity to discuss, learn, and even come up with some ideas on how to deter, decrease, and deal with perpetrators of such acts.

Some of the decisions reached include a commitment by the gardai to show an increased Gardai prescence . A commitment by students union in NUI to play a larger role in keeping the town clean, during and after rag week, and a commitment by the Business Association to engage in public consultation during there 2^{nd} stage application for the implementation of community based CCTV.

The partnership entered into during this meeting with all the bodies concerned must be maintained in order to defeat the small minority, who if left unchecked ,can wreck such havoc and tragedy on individual families and residents.

The interaction of the initiate between the Business Association and the Public Safety Association is a testament to the positive contribution of individuals to the community.

As it became apparent at the last meeting of Maynooth Community Council, with only 10 people in attendance, a quorum could not be reached, it was realized that Maynooth Community Council was now in a bad way.

In May the Local elections of Maynooth Community Council will take place, with the AGM taking place at the first meeting in June. It is also apparent that these elections should have taken place last year, also the fact that Maynooth Community Council is a Ltd Company a number of directors should be in place and this will be rectified at the AGM. We urge you to put yourself forward for election. Maynooth has grown considerably over the past few years and with this push now on to make new residents aware of the Community Council and the work that we do, and our total commitment to the Community of Maynooth I am sure that we will encourage a lot of new interest in the Council.

We are aware that new estates have emerged over the past couple of years. We have Straffan Wood, Griffith Rath, and Moyglare Hall, with these estates alone the growth of Maynooth has expanded considerably, so it's vital that all residents in Maynooth should have a say in what goes on in their town.

Maynooth Community Council over the past years had been strong and forceful in pursuing issues that effect the town, one of the main issues being to gain Town Council Status for Maynooth, Arts Centre/ Community Centre and with development of the Harbour Field, which would include the provision of underground car parking for 600 cars. Also the possibility of a Running Track and Skate Board Park.

A more current issue being followed at the moment, is to keep a watchful eye on the development on the Main Street which could mean the widening of the Main Street, the removal of several of the Lime Trees that line the street?

Local Matter/ Safety issues etc. raised by Residents Association are supported and when necessary representations are sent to the appropriate bodies.

Bond Bridge. This was fully supported by the Residents and The Community Council over very many years; we now have a wonderful new bridge over the canal and railway, which one-day might form a part of the new ring road for Maynooth.

It is very important that all areas are represented on

the Council. Remember your Council is only as strong as it members. We again urge you to put yourself forward for election.

The Community Council Main Aims

What are we trying to achieve

Maynooth Community Council responded to the high levels of unemployment in the Community, giving people valuable training to assist them in seeking employment. Maynooth Community Council has sponsored FAS funded projects since 1985. In 2000 we established a Limited Company to run the project, and the directors are members of the Community Council

Support from FAS

The Newsletter project is very dependent on funding from FAS in addition to the costs of wages to us they pay for training and small weekly material grants. The cost of running the office well exceeds this funding, and the Community Council must fund the balance. This is mainly done by the office services: Saint Patrick's Day Parade the Festival. Flag Day and grants.

How it works

Vacancies are advertised as they arise and the project is currently approved for 15 plus a supervisor. The project is a rate for the job scheme, where participants are recruited for a maximum of three years, provided the relevant eligibility criteria are reached.

Our main aims in the project is to try and give people a varied work experience in a busy office together, in order to equip people to get jobs at the end of the project.

I hope this information is useful to you, and gives you a better understanding of what Maynooth Community Council is about.

Election Schedule

Nominations

The Nomination Form is included in this issue of the Newsletter. Extra forms may by obtained from the Community Council Office, Unit 5, Newtown Shopping Centre, Beaufield, Maynooth . All nominations should include the signature of the nominee signifying her/his acceptance of the nomination. All nominations to arrive at the Community Council Office by **Thursday 17th of May 2007 by 5.00 p.m.** Any Resident over 18 is eligible to the election and to vote.

Voting

If elections are required, voting papers will be distributed to all households between **Tuesday 22nd and Thursday 24th of May 2007.** Votes will be collected the following week, if they are not collected they may be brought to the Community Council office. All votes must be returned by **Thursday 31st May 2007.** They will be counted on **Saturday 2nd of June 2007.**

Counting will be done by neutral volunteers under the supervision of outside scrutineers. For single area electoral areas, the single transferable vote method of counting will be used (as in by-election to the Dáil Eireann). For multiple-seat areas, each voter will have as many votes as there are available, with the candidates obtaining the most votes being elected , as appropriate.

The first meeting of the New Council will take place on **Monday 18th of June 2007.** This will be an AGM including the election of new officers for the Council. Notices will be sent to all councillors.

There will be an informal meeting beforehand- councillors will be notified in advance.

Little Way Cancer Support Centre Clane

Why a Cancer Support Centre?

The Little Way Cancer Support Centre was set up in October 2003 to provide support for cancer patients, their families and friends. The diagnosis of cancer can mark the beginning of a long and frightening journey, not just for the person who has received the diagnosis, but also for their families and friends.

While medical concerns are addressed through the range of treatments available within the Health Services, many people feel that their emotional needs and those of their family and friends are not met.

This can leave people feeling anxious, isolated and helpless.

The Little Way Cancer Support Centre aims to meet this need by providing emotional support and practical help to people who have or have had cancer, their families and their friends.

What happens in the Centre?

- The centre operates on a drop-in basis.
- Those visiting the centre are met by trained volunteers who offer supportive listening and provide practical information.
- An extensive supply of relevant reading material is available.
- Opportunity is provided for visitors to meet others who have undergone treatment for cancer.
- Support groups are held for people sharing similar experiences.
- One-to-one counselling is available on an appointment basis.
- Complimentary therapies, relaxation and meditation are available.
- All services, classes, etc. are provided free of charge to people with cancer.

The centre aims to respond to the needs of its visitors. With this in mind, visitors are always invited to offer any suggestions regarding any additional services which they would like to see at the centre.

Who can use the service?

The service is available to people of all ages who have been affected by cancer. The centre can be accessed without a formal referral, just by phoning or dropping in.

Is there a cost?

Know your rights

Question

I often receive unsolicited post that is addressed to me but that advertises services or products in which I have no interest. Is there anything I can do to avoid receiving this junk mail?

Answer

The Data Protection Act 1988 contains a provision to ensure that people who do not wish to receive direct marketing literature have their privacy respected.

Under section 2(7) of the Data Protection Act, you have the right to have your details removed from a direct marketing database. You should write to the organisation keeping the database and ask for this to be done. The organisation must comply with your request and write back to you within 40 days confirming that your request has been complied with. If you continue to receive marketing material after you have objected, you can make a complaint to the Data Protection Commissioner, Canal House , Station Road, Portarlington, Co Laois. Lo – Call 1890 252 231

If an organisation has not obtained your details directly from you, you are entitled to know what the source was so that you can contact them.

The Irish Direct Marketing Association (IDMA), the representative body for direct marketers in Ireland , operatives a Mailing Preference Service. You can contact the IDMA to ask for your details to be removed from the marketing database of the main direct marketers in Ireland. The IDMA has also instituted a Code of practice setting out the data protection rules that IDMA members must adhere to.

Your details on the electoral register cannot be used for direct marketing unless you choose to make them available for this purpose. You can choose whether or not to do this when you register to vote. An edited version of the electoral register is published listing only those who opt to make their details available in this way. You can check to see if you are on the edited register at your local library or local authority office. Or online at www. checktheregister.ie

Question

I would like to try to reduce my fuel bills by switching my home heating to renewable energy sources. Are there any grants available to encourage homeowner's to reduce carbon dioxide emissions in this way?

Answer

The Greener Homes Scheme provides assistance to homeowners who intend to purchase a new renewable energy heating system for either new or existing homes.

The grants are available for a number of different technologies. Solar panels can be used for home heating or hot water. Heat pumps can transfer heat that is available in the ground air or water around your house. Stoves or boilers that burn wood chips or pellets are also eligible under the scheme.

It may be possible to obtain a second grant where a combination of two technologies makes sense in terms of reduced carbon dioxide emissions, capital costs, value and improved operation.

In order to qualify for the scheme you must obtain approval before starting work or purchasing equipment. The grant will be for a fixed amount towards the cost of purchase of the chosen system and subsequent installation. The amount of the grant will vary depending on the technology used. A list of registered products and installers is available to choose from.

Question

Am I entitled to time off work for Easter?

Answer

Easter Monday is a public holiday so you are entitled to paid leave on that day unless your employer nominates one of the following alternatives an additional day's pay, an additional day of leave; or a paid day off within a month or on the nearest church holiday.

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and business close. You have no automatic entitlement to time of on that day. There are 9 public holidays in Ireland each year: New year's Day (1 January)

(Continued from page 15) St Patrick's Day (17 March) Easter Monday First Monday in May. June and August Last Monday in October Christmas Day (25 December) St. Stephen's Day (26 December)

Easter Monday is the only public holiday with a date that varies significantly from year to year. It falls between 23 March and 26 April each year. In 2007 it falls on 9 April.

Public holiday entitlements apply to staff even if they are not usually scheduled to work on the day of the public holiday. One exception to public holiday entitlement is where part-time staff have worked less than 40 hours in the five weeks before a holiday.

An explanatory booklet on holidays and public holidays is available from the Department of Enterprises. Trade and Employment (lo-call 1890 201 615).

Question

Can you please give me new rates of payment for Child Benefit ?

Answer

Child Benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. It you are from a country in the European Economic Area (EEA) you may be entitled to Child Benefit even if your child is not living in Ireland. If you are not a EEA national then you must satisfy a habitual residency conditions to qualify for the benefits.

To qualify, a child must be dependent on you and must also be;

• Under age 16 or

Aged 16,17, or 18 and attending full-time education or a FAS Yuthreach course or have a physical disability

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living apart, it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2007, the child Benefits are as follows:

Number of children Monthly Rate 1 Child €160 2 Children €320 3 Children €515 4 Children €710 5 Children €905 6 Children €1,100

7 Children €1,295

The rate of Child Benefit for twins is 1. 5 times the normal monthly rate for each child. For three or more children of multiple birth, the benefit paid is double the normal monthly rate for each child.

Application for Child Benefit is made on form CB1 for children under 16 years of age or from CB2 for a child aged 16 or over. Claim forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office. Post Office or form the Child Benefit Section , Social Welfare Services Office. St Oliver Plunkett Road, Letterkenny , Co Donegal. Lo- call1890 400 400.

Maynooth Tidy Towns win in St. Patrick's Day Parade

For the third year running Maynooth Tidy Towns won one of the best float prizes in the Maynooth St. Patrick's Day Parade. We were awarded the "Best Environmental Float" this year. The committee decided to reduce our combined carbon footprint this year and arrange a float fronted by a wheelbarrow and wheelie bins rather than our usual van. Our main message was to highlight the threat to the two hundred and fifty year old trees in Maynooth's main street following approval by Kildare County Council for a large new commercial development in the town which proposes that the trees be removed to create an extra traffic lane.

Maynooth Primary Schools have all achieved Green Flags

Congratulations to Presentation Girls and Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich who have achieved their first Green Schools Flags within the past year. The Boys National School has recently achieved their second Green Schools Flag which brings them half way to achieving the total number of four flags available. Maynooth is awarded extra points in the National Tidy Towns Competition when our schools achieve Green Flags and we are delighted with the commitment shown by the teachers and pupils alike and we will keep you posted on further progress.

Maynooth Tidy Towns – Work Plan for 2007 in full swing

Tidy Towns is more about enhancement rather than litter picking and for 2007 two of our major landscaping projects are planned for O'Neill Park and the river in Parsons Street. O'Neill Park/ Tesco complex is a prominent site in the town and we have started the work on enhancing that area. The river in Parsons Street was cleaned out a number of years ago, but has fallen into a neglected state again. In addition to these new projects we will be keeping our existing sites around the town. More details on these later.

Sunday Morning/mid week cleaning has recommenced

On the Sunday after Easter we started back on our Sunday Morning clean ups around the town centre. This is essentially a weekly litter picking in the town centre and includes areas such as the Straffan Road and the Moyglare Road. On Wednesday evenings we meet at 7.30pm at Supervalu and we take on a piece of work such as area cleanups or small enhancement projects. The committee would welcome your help on either Sundays or Wednesdays. On Sundays we have a rota system where people only come out on one Sunday in three. The more people that we have the easier it is for all. See separate notice.

Hanging Baskets should "be in bloom by June"

For the last number of years Maynooth Tidy Towns with the support of the business community and others have put in place the hanging baskets in the town centre and maintained them. Plans are being put in place again this year all being well. This is a major annual project for us with substantial costs involved. Last year we did not ask the local businesses for financial support but we are reviewing the situation at present to see how we can fund this project in 2007. We are grateful for financial support for all our projects but with this one we put all the funds raised back into the town so if anybody would like to sponsor this project we would be delighted to hear from you.

organisation. Maynooth has taken part in the league for the past three years and out of the fifty three towns judged by An Taisce in November 2006, Maynooth came in at number fifty two just ahead of Dublin City. Many people criticise the league which measures the environmental work of local authorities stating that it is too strict. What happens is that they measure litter at ten locations in the town centre and then rate each area. We outline below the detail of the Maynooth judging in November and at the end we show the table of towns judged in the league. Maynooth Tidy Towns fear that the bad reputation that a town gets in this league will damage business especially tourism in Maynooth. However, it is time to stop blaming the messenger and for Kildare County Council to suitably resource the town of our size with more staff to maintain it and to extend the areas cleaned. The existing staff is excellent but more people are needed to tackle the task.

Maynooth IBAL Results, Nov. 2006:

There has been a general deterioration in Maynooth. It has scored very poorly coming very much at the bottom of the anti-litter league. It was the only town / city with no excellent sites. There were three areas with a serious litter problem. What is particularly disappointing is that a couple of these sites had scored reasonably well during previous litter surveys e.g. Public Park and Railway Station – Outside. The Main Street was the third site with a serious litter problem – the overall appearance was dirty and much of the litter appears to be the result of drinking at the weekend. Maynooth North Campus and Maynooth College (Old) had scatterings of litter which took away from otherwise well maintained environments.

Kilcock Approach Road (R148): Moderately Littered.

Some light scatterings of food related litter prevented this busy stretch of road from getting a better litter classification. A more thorough approach to cleaning could make all the difference here.

St. Mary's Boys National School – Outside and Inside: Moderately Littered.

The overall impression here is of an area which is well kept and carefully maintained. With just a little extra effort by those using the area this could be a perfect site. The installation of litter awareness notices may help, particularly as the main litter was fast-food wrappings.

Maynooth North Campus – Inside: Moderately Littered.

The high standards attained during previous litter surveys have dropped slightly with scatterings of a wide variety of litter on the extensive grounds. This is disappointing as the area is well served by litter bins and capable of doing so much better.

Maynooth College – Old: Moderately Littered.

As with the above site the area is well served by litter bins (and some recycling bins). Just some small traces of fast-food wrappers, plastic bottles and cigarette butts took away from an otherwise very good site.

Main Street: Serious Litter Problem.

The overall appearance of this street was dirty. Not only were there heavy levels of litter but the bins and seating areas were in very poor condition. The footpath was neglected around the base of the trees and chewing gum / cigarettes were both very obvious along the path. It would seem that much of the litter is the result of drinking at the weekend – according to a porter at Maynooth College it is always the same after the weekend.

Public Park in Maynooth – Pound Park: Serious Litter Problem.

The picture here is again somewhat depressing. A big effort was evident during previous litter survey earlier in the year but the situation has deteriorated again. Clearly a more sustained and thorough effort is required on an on-going basis.

Maynooth Railway Station – Outside: Serious Litter Problem.

This was a very disappointing site. There was litter strewn along the roadside and the wall from the town and at the station entrance. The overall appearance was very poor and this is a shame as it has previously scored quite well during previous litter surveys.

Maynooth Railway Station – Inside: Moderately Littered.

Overall, the inside of the station has seen big improvements over the years. The area is well served by litter bins / cigarette butt disposal units. Just some light scatterings of fast food wrappers, plastic bags and plastic bottles took away from an otherwise well maintained environment.

Moyglare Road: Moderately Littered.

On the whole this is generally quite a good stretch of road, but there is a small, but persistent, presence of litter. There were three litter bins along the area surveyed and they were in need of some attention.

Weeding

Hoe borders once a week to prevent weed seedlings establishing. Use our guide to help you recognise the most common annual weeds.

Plants for pots

Buy young plants for pots and containers as well for bedding displays. Most need to be potted up into 7.5cm (3in) pots and grown on in warm, bright conditions ready for planting out at the end of May. Be sure to acclimatise plants to cooler outdoor

conditions before planting out.

Frost protection

Don't be lulled into a false sense of security by warmer days. While the weather continues to be unpredictable, it pays to take precautions. Keep a sheet of fleece handy, ready to use on cold nights if a ground frost is forecast. Throw it over emerging potato foliage, or fruit trees and bushes in flower. Sacking or sheets of bubble polythene can be spread over cold frames and newspaper spread over young plants on greenhouse staging at night will add a little protection. Learn how to protect your plants with our guide to coping with cold weather.

Slugs and snails

Control slugs and snails by trapping them under

tiles or grapefruit skins. Collect the slugs and dispose of them. Only use pellets sparingly. Alternatively discover which plants are less susceptible to slugs and snails.

May Day Orígíns




alled Beltane by the Celts, Walpurgis by the Tuetons, and Floralia by the Romans, May festivals were a time of " wearing of the green." Throughout the Northern Hemisphere, the month of May is a time to celebrate renewal of life. May is named for Maia, grandmother, the Goddess of death and fertility. Maia scorns marriage, so it is a good idea to put weddings off until June. Although less stern goddesses now oversee May Festivities , wreaths and baskets of Hawthorn are still used in some May festivals in Maia 's honour.

The May-pole is the most familiar feature of May festivities, but it has three distinct interpretations. In some cultures, the May-pole represented the world centre, or alternately, the hub of the Wheel of heaven. In ancient times, the intricate dance of weaving cords around the pole was a magical attempt to direct Nature, which had become topsy-turvy over the course of time, back in order. Today the dance is performed by any who wish to participate in weaving the magic.

In other cultures, the May-pole was the Tree of Life, or a symbol of it. And this tree - to borrow a phrase from Billy Holiday—bore strange fruit. This is where the Saviour was sacrificed in order to cleanse the earth. Holy Communion, eating his flesh and drinking his blood was possibly restricted to the priest class, but symbolic May Wine was liberally imbibed by the whole community. Hundreds of years later, the Christian lunar festival of Easter would replace the ancient solar festival as the time of renewal and rebirth.

The third meaning of the May-pole most clearly remains today. It is the phallus, the male principle of fertilization. Female principles are represented by baskets and wreaths used in the dances around the pole. In the past times, the hand-fasting movements of the dances would give the young license to ' go into the green ' together. In some regions, a merlin, or renegade friar, would preside over the mock marriages. Even today, unwed couples consummate the mock marriages performed around the May-pole. Merry-begats, as they were called in England, were usually not acknowledge by their fathers. These babies were said to have been fathered by god.

Celebrated for thousands of years ago throughout diverse cultures, Mayday could be the most ancient religious in the Northern Hemisphere. Ritual human sacrifice to a death/fertility goddess was certainly practiced until the 1st Century BCE. As nature became less fearsome, and more cultivated, the nature goddess became less powerful and bloodthirsty. Today, we still celebrate the remnants of an ancient religion, Nature turning on the Wheel of Heaven.

# Features



### BLOG or WEB LOG

A blog (short for "web log") is a type of web page that serves as a publicly accessible personal journal (or log) for an individual. Typically updated daily, blogs often reflect the personality of the author. As there is no editing of blogs, anything goes, so beware!

### BROWSE

To follow links in a page, to shop around in a page, exploring what's there, a bit like window shopping. The opposite of browsing a page is **searching** it. When you search a page, you find a search box, enter terms, and find all occurrences of the terms throughout the site. When you browse, you have to guess which words on the page pertain to your interests. Searching is usually more efficient, but sometimes you find things by browsing that you might not find because you might not think of the "right" term to search by.

### BROWSERS

Browsers are software programs that enable you to view



WWW .documents. Microsoft Internet Explorer (called simply IE), Mozilla, Firefox,, and Opera are examples of browsers that enable you to view text and images and many other WWW features. They are software that must be installed on your computer. However Explorer comes already installed on all computers running Windows.

### CACHE

In browsers, "cache" is used to identify a space where web pages you have visited are stored in your computer. A copy of documents you retrieve is stored in cache. When you use **GO, BACK**, or any other means to revisit a document, the browser first checks

to see if it is in cache and will retrieve it from there, because it is much faster than retrieving it from the server.

### COOKIE

A message from a WEB SERVER computer, sent to and stored by your browser



your computer consults the original server computer, the cookie is sent back to the server, allowing it to respond to you according to the cookie's contents. The main use for cookies is to provide customised Web Pages according to a profile of your interests

### DOWNLOAD

The transfer of a file or information from one place to another. This generally means transferring information from the Internet to your own computer. However it is also used to describe transferring, (downloading) images from your camera to your computer or from your computer to your MP3 player.

### LINK

Text or impage that a in order to nect to an-Links are

thought of as the technology that connects two Web pages or Web sites. They are most commonly seen on your browser as underlined words, and when you move your mouse over the link it, (the mouse) changes into a hand.

### LISTSERVERS

A discussion group method that permits you to subscribe, and receive and participate in discussions via e-mail. Blogs and RSS Feeds provide some of the ways

LISTSERVERS communicate their content.

### NEWSGROUP

**ROUP** A discussion group operated



through the Internet. Not to be confused with LISTSERVERS which operate through e-mail.

### PDF or .PDF or PDF file

Abbreviation for Portable Document Format, a File Format developed by Adobe Systems, that is used to let you view almost any kind of document with the formatting intact, so you see it exactly as it was created even, if you don't have the software that created it. Magic! Viewing a PDF file requires Acrobat

### PODCAST

iPOD broad CAST) An audio broadcast that has been converted to an MP3 file or other audio file format for playback in a digital music player or computer. The "pod" in podcast was coined from "iPod," the predominant portable, digital music player, and although podcasts are mostly verbal, they may contain music. Podcasting Anything and Everything



Podcasting is not just for on-going broadcasts, rather the term is used for recording anything and everything to be played back in a digital player. (MP3) "Sound seeing" is the audio recording of a person's experiences when travelling.

### RSS

**RSS** is a family of Web_Feed, (see below) formats used to publish frequently updated digital content, such as blogs, news feeds or podcasts..

### SERVER, WEB SERVER



A computer connected to the Internet, so that it can provide documents via the World Wide Web. Also called HOST Computer. Web servers are the closest equivalent to what in the print world is called the "publisher" of a print document. An important difference is that most print publishers carefully edit the content, and quality of their publications, in an effort to market them and future publications. This convention is not required in the Web World, where anyone

can be a publisher; careful evaluation of Web pages is therefore mandatory. Also called a "Host." **WEBSITE** 

An information resource on the World Wide Web. Websites may provide information on any topic. **WEB FEED** 

A **Web Feed** is a data format used for serving users frequently updated content. Content distributors *syndicate* a Web Feed, thereby allowing users to *subscribe* to it. Making a collection of Web Feeds accessible in one spot is known as *Aggregation*.

Web feeds are operated by many news Web Sites, Weblogs, Schools, and Podcasters.

### Sundried Tomato Bread

### Ingredients

200g Gluten free white flour 1 tsp Salt 3 tsp Gluten Free baking powder 284ml Buttermilk 3 eggs 1 tsp Tomato puree 2 tsp Olive oil 50g Sundried tomatoes in oil 25g Parmesan Cheese

### Method

Heat the oven to 160c/gas 4. Mix the flour, salt and baking powder in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, whisk together the buttermilk, eggs, tomato puree, and oil. Fold the wet ingredients into the dry, then add the sundried tomatoes and half the parmesan.

Grease a 900g loaf tin and pour in the mixture. Sprinkle the remaining parmesan on top and bake for 50-minutes or until a

skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Turn out onto a wire rack to cool.

### Beef Rounders

### Ingredients

2 tbsp Olive Oil
1 Large Onion,
1 Medium Carrot,
2 Celery sticks,
500g Beef mince
A few sprigs of fresh thyme
400g Can of Tomatoes with juice
150ml Beef Stock
1 tbsp Woresterchire sauce
Handful of chopped parsley

### For the Topping

225g Gluten free flour1/2 tsp Gluten free baking powder50g Butter50g Red cheese1tsp fresh thyme leaves1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley150ml low fat natural yogurt.



### Method

Put the onions in a frying pan and cook until soft. Add chopped carrot and celery, and cook until lightly browned. Mix in the mince, breaking it up with a spoon. Cook, stirring often, until the meat is browned. Add the thyme, tomatoes, stock, Worcestershire sauce and parsley, and season to taste. Cover tightly and simmer for 15 minutes. Preheat the oven to 200c/gas 6.

Sift the flour and baking powder and rub in the butter. Add the cheese and herbs, then the yogurt, and mix to a soft dough. Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead lightly. Roll to about 1cm thick and cut out 9 rounds.

Tip the mince mixture into an ovenproof dish. Casually arrange the dough circles on top of the mince and brush with egg or milk. Bake for about 20-25 minutes until the topping is risen and golden brown and the

filling is bubbling.

Remember to check all labels on packets and tins and look for the gluten free symbol.

### Ingredients

6 Egg Whites1 Cup castor sugar600ml (1 pint) cream1 teaspoon instant coffee2 teaspoons coffee liqueur or glufree chocolate

Beat the egg whites until stiff. While still beating, gradually add the castor sugar.

In a second bowl, beat the cream until it thickens, but is still a little soft. Add instant coffee and coffee liqueur and gently fold into beaten egg whites.

Freeze: It does not have to be beaten again.



### 15 New Buses for Lucan and North Kildare still parked in the Garage

The 15 buses of the 100 buses purchased by Dublin Bus earmarked for the Lucan Road Corridor which includes, Leixlip, Celbridge, Maynooth & Kilcock were delivered to Dublin Bus last December, however they remain parked in the Garage rather than in use on the routes in question.

They were identified as needed in the Dublin Bus Network Review and were to be used in the most rapidly developing area's. Dublin Bus have confirmed to me today that they have applied for a license for Adamstown but have not even commenced consideration for North Kildare and will not do so until Summer at the earliest. The review will look at the area in its totality and consider for example ways of creating connections between Celbridge and Leixlip where none exists at present, it will consider locations such as Moyglare Road for a new service and increasing service on Easton Road where there is just one peak time bus service morning and evening.

A private operator (Morton's) was granted a license last October to operate a new service (every 20 mins) out of Celbridge, the service is now up and running, until the service is really established the Department of Transport wont allow Dublin Bus introduce any changes that might impact in any way with the private operator. The license was granted under the 1932 act and is very restrictive. The Department of Transport micro manage in that they are the ones that give the green light for any timetable changes even small ones.

The Lucan Road Corridor is the flashpoint in that the same impediments are not present in other parts of the network or where they are to a much lesser extent. Dublin Bus will be looking at the totality of the service in North Kildare during the Summer and for example there is no bus service between Celbridge and Leixlip but there is a lot of people employed in Intel & HP who live in Celbridge. Dublin Bus have been in consultation with Maynooth College and have jointly identified a turning facility which will be used when the 15 buses come into use, realistically this will be in the Autumn at the earliest.

"What is occurring is similar to what happened in the UK which has led to the Bus Wars in particular locations such as Manchester. What seems to have been forgotten in all of this is the commuter this is competition gone mad".

### Murphy & McGrath criticise stated Government position on Voter Equality

Independent TDs Catherine Murphy (Kildare North and Finian McGrath (Dublin North Central) have today harshly criticized the failure by Government to comment on the issue of voter equality highlighted by the two last weeks in their initiation of High Court Proceedings contesting the constitutionality of Dáil Constituencies established through the Electoral (Amendment) Act, 2005. McGrath and Murphy today issued a letter to the Minister for the Environment and the Attorney General, joint respondents to the High Court action lodged by solicitor Eddie McGarr on Thursday the 5th of April 2007, criticizing strongly the inaccuracy of the only comment made by either respondent which stated that a constituency redraw could only be initiated by the final censes figures which would not be released until next week.

"The final censes figures were published on the 29th of March 2007 but comments by a spokesperson of the Department of the Environment to RTE on Monday the 9th of April that these figures are not due for release until the end of April suggests that the Government is unaware of this. They're stalling and trying to sweep this issue under the carpet to usurp the power of the citizens of this country to elect a Government in an open and proportionate manner. It's a disgrace and we've written to them to convey our dismay at their cavalier attitude to the fundamental rights of citizens of this country."

# Murphy Cities "Great Concern" over affordable housing system

Catherine Murphy, TD (Ind) yesterday in the Dáil cited her "great concern" at the fact that only 25% of apartment dwellers surveyed in recent Dublin City Council Quality of Life Survey are happy to live in apartments in the future, while at the same time Kildare County Council continues, almost exclusively, to acquire 2 bedroom apartments for allocation under its Social and Affordable Schemes. In a later statement Murphy highlighted the problems faced by the lack of variation in housing size or type being made available by Kildare county council:

"While a two bed apartment is suitable for some social or affordable housing applicants it doesn't suit everyone, for example growing families and, particularly in the case of affordable homes that cannot be sold within 20 years of the purchase without incurring a financial claw back. In only offering homes of this size we're creating a whole new set of problems for the future. It's vital that the affordable housing scheme is changed so that those needing to trade up are allowed to do so without being subject to the claw back and it's also vital that the Government ensures that the Councils can afford to purchase, and in turn offer, homes of various different shapes and sizes to accommodate all applicants."

# Murphy made the following statement in the Dáil on the 28th of March 2007

"The majority of social and affordable housing units acquired by Kildare County Council have been small, two-bedroom apartments. The result of a Dublin City Council quality of life survey indicate that only 25% of apartment dwellers in Dublin still expect to be living in a flat in the future, a cause of great concern. I call on the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government to ensure the way in which Part V social and affordable housing is delivered is changed to track the number of units delivered but also the variety of housing types and sizes made available to applicants."

- 1. They were put there as a temporary measure, to stop the rat run to the Straffan Road, until the Meadowbrook Link Road was opened.

The new lighting will make this highly pedestrian area much safer and along with the CCTV cameras, anti social activity in the area should come to an end.

Labour Deputy Emmet Stagg speaking in the Dáil on a Labour Private Members Motion on Wednesday 21st March outlined some startling figures in relation to Class Sizes in our National Schools and roundly condemned the Government for their failure to reduce class sizes for under 9`s to 20.

In his speech Deputy Stagg stated that we were now a rich country and could afford to provide the very best opportunities for our children and young people. The future well-being and prosperity of our nation was dictated by its investment in the education and cultural development of its youth.

Fianna Fail in Government had failed to live up to their promises on the reduction in class sizes for 10 years and why, declared Deputy Stagg, should the public believe them now.

Outlining some startling figures which were provided by the I.N.T.O. Deputy Stagg told the Dáil that:

- Some pupils are 6 before a place is provided for them in National Schools in Kildare North.
- In Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth, with 4,949 Pupils in our National Schools at present, only 35 pupils are in classes of less than 20. That's 0.7%. Yes less than 1%.
- In Kildare North there are 1,972 children in classes of 20 to 24 pupils, 6,408 in classes of 25 to 29 pupils and 3,854 children in classes of 30 or more pupils.
- The average class size in Kildare North at 27.1 pupils to each class is the highest in the country.

Deputy Stagg stated that the parents of these children as taxpayers, had given the Minister money to do her duty but that she had failed miserably to do so.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg commended Labour Deputy O`Sullivan's motion to the House and thanked the I.N.T.O. for its vigorous campaign and assistance in providing statistics.

**Mr. Stagg:** I would like to share time with Deputies Moynihan-Cronin, Gilmore and O'Shea. I thank the Labour Party education spokesperson,

Deputy O'Sullivan, for tabling the motion enabling us to have this debate.

We are lucky to live in a rich country which has the resources to provide world-class services for its people but this did not become a rich country by chance. In the relatively short period from 1994 to 1997 Deputy Quinn, as Minister for Finance, laid the foundations for and developed the successful economy that gives the State riches beyond its dreams. As a result, we can afford to provide the very best opportunities for our children and young people. The future well-being and prosperity of a nation are dictated by its investment in the education and cultural development of its youth. The foundation of that investment in our future is the funding and resourcing of primary education for our children. The State recognises this fact, as is evident in free universal access to primary education for all children.

That was the case until this crowd of wasters got their hands on the resources provided by the taxpayer. The Progressive Democrats should not be blamed for this because Fianna Fáil pledged to reduce class sizes to 20 pupils for children under nine years of age. This pledge was made in 1997 and 2002 but on neither occasion was the promise kept. Not only did Fianna Fáil break its pledge to the children of this country but the Minister for Education and Science, Deputy Hanafin, also arrogantly announced shortly after her appointment that she had no intention of fulfilling her party's undertaking on class size reduction. Fianna Fáil now has the cheek and breathtaking arrogance to repeat this pledge again. Does it think people are total fools? Does the Minister believe they will swallow the lies for the third time running? I assure her they will not be fooled again. God help the poor, innocent Fianna Fáil candidates in north Kildare.

I want to inform the Minister of the effect of her broken promises and failure to keep her repeated pledges on the children of north Kildare who attend school in the largest classes in Ireland, far exceeding any elsewhere in Europe. Some reach six years of age by the time they get a place in such classes. In Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth combined there are only 35 children in classes of less than 20 pupils. This gives the lie to the Taoiseach's suggestion this morning that many children are in such classes. In those three towns there is a total of 4,900 pupils, of whom less than 1% are in classes of less than 20. In north Kildare there are 1,972 children in classes of 20 to 24 pupils, 6,408 in classes of 25 to 29 pupils and 3,854 in classes of 30 pupils and higher. The average class size in north Kildare is 27.1. Ten years after the first Fianna Fáil commitment this is a shocking indictment of its failure.

Despite their best efforts, teachers cannot teach classes of 30 to 35 children. Our children suffer as a result. The effect of this on children, their life prospects and right to develop to their full potential is far reaching and most harmful to them. Such class sizes damage the foundation of education progress and makes it more difficult for children to develop to the second and third stages. The parents of these children, as taxpayers, have given the Minister money to do her duty but she has failed miserably to do so.

I commend Deputy O'Sullivan's motion to the House and thank the INTO for its vigorous campaign and assistance in providing statistics for my contribution.

# Bus network review in Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge commences

Following enquiries from Deputy Emmet Stagg concerning the extension of Bus Services to the Newtown and Moyglare Areas of Maynooth Dublin Bus have advised that they have commenced a Network Review of all bus services in the Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge Areas.

Deputy Stagg had pointed out to Dublin Bus that with the opening of the Meadowbrook Link and the completion of the New Bond Bridge that Dublin Bus should examine the possibility of extending bus services to the 1,000 homes in the Newtown Area. He also indicated that there were 500 houses on the Moyglare Road and a further 400 under construction and that a service was required in that part of Maynooth which was isolated from the remainder of the town. The extension of Additional Bus Services to the Easton Area of Leixlip is also required.

Dublin Bus indicated to Deputy Stagg that initial studies will be completed in the coming months and that a draft plan would be submitted to the Department of Transport by the latter quarter of 2007 with implementation of changes to commence in January 2008.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the commencement of the Review and that in tandem with the additional 15 buses which North Kildare expects to receive to increase capacity in the area we will also now have in place a local network to service the extended population areas of the Towns in North Kildare.

# Stagg welcomes refusal of permission for Mast at Maynooth G.A.A. grounds

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the decision by Kildare Co. Council to refuse planning permission to O2 Communications for the retention of their unauthorised mast at Maynooth G.A.A. Grounds on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

Having been served with an Enforcement Order in December, 2004, and having submitted 4 Invalid Planning Applications, at their 5th Attempt O2 put in a valid application which has now been refused planning permission by Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg.

The Council refused planning permission for the following reasons:

- Having regard to the provisions of the Maynooth Development Plan 2002 which states that Telecommunications Masts will not be permitted in the vicinity of schools or residential areas, the proposed development would contravene this policy and would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.
- Having Regard to the location of the proposed development, close to existing buildings, residences and on lands zoned Open Space and Amenity in the Maynooth Development Plan 2002, it is considered that the proposal is contrary to the spirit, intentions and provisions of the 1996 Telecommunications Guidelines, the Kildare Co. Development Plan and the Maynooth Development Plan 2002. The proposed development would set an undesirable precedent for further similar development in the area and would be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.

Deputy Stagg stated that he was pleased that at last the Council were in a position to decide on this issue under the Planning Laws. O2 will certainly appeal this decision to An Bord Pleanala and Deputy Stagg vowed to continue the battle there against this unacceptable development.

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# **Useful Tips**

### Homemade Cleaning Products.

### **Furniture Polish**

Mix in a sprayer bottle

1 Cup of Olive Oil 1/2 Cup of Lemon Juice

Shake well and apply a small amount to a flannel cleaning cloth. Spread evenly over furniture and use a fresh cloth to dry and polish.

### **Glass Cleaner.**

Mix in a sprayer bottle

1 Cup Rubbing alcohol

- 1 Cup water
- 1 Tablespoon white vinegar

### **Homemade Toilet Cleaner**

1/4 Cup Baking soda 1/4 Cup liquid detergent 1/4 Cup warm water

Mix together the baking soda, liquid detergent, and water in a bowl. Use a toilet brush to apply the cleaner inside the bowl. You can let the solution soak inside the bowl for as long as you like, or you can immediately swish it around with the brush before flushing. If badly soiled leave soaking overnight.

### Vinegar Cleaning Tips.

- 1. Paint brushes can be cleaned by simmering in vinegar and washed with hot soapy water.
- 2. Brighten you wash by adding 1/2 cup of vinegar to the rinse cycle.
- 3. To clean your microwave, boil 1/4 cup of vinegar and 1 cup water. Rub around all areas and leave for an hour before wiping clean.
- 4. You can make your own furniture cleaner by mixing 1 part vinegar to 3 parts lemon juice.
- 5. Clean dentures by soaking them overnight in white vinegar.

### **Furniture Protection Tips.**

Protect furnishings from the sun and strong natural light as this will cause fibre degeneration and colour fade. Occasionally, dyes can fade from impurities within the atmosphere such as cigarette smoke, cooking fumes etc.

Rearrange the furniture and turn cushions occasionally to ensure even wear of the cushions, and fabrics.

Take care when wearing clothing that could cause dye transfer, such as jeans etc. Dye transfers on to light coloured furniture and can be difficult to remove.

Place your furniture a minimum of two feet away from a radiator or other heat source.

Avoid using or placing sharp objects on leather goods. Leather is very durable, but not accident or damage proof.

Oldest tip for the month of May

Never cast a clout till May is out Clean leather with good quality upholstery leather cleaner, preferably once a month if the furniture is used Dáily, but at least four times a year. Sponge gently until all the grime and stains are lifted, and wipe over the surface with clean, dry white towelling to absorb the soiling.

### **Quick Laundry Tips**



Wash your delicate clothes in a pillow case instead of buying a special

lingerie bag. Place the clothes in the pillowcase (an old, thin one works best), and tie a knot in the end. Run your washing machine on the delicate or the shortest wash cycle.

A piece of stale bread will remove fresh spots on leather and suede gloves. Just rub the spots with the bread.

Make sure you have not wet or damp articles in the laundry basket. The items next to the wet article will get mildew. I this happens rub the article with white vinegar and lemon juice. Saturate the stains. Sprinkle salt on the area and scrub in (use lots of salt). Place article in sun to dry. This may need a few treatments, but it eventually works. The mildew will eventually come out.



### PUBLIC SAFETY ASSOCIATION Meeting at the GLENROYAL HOTEL April 23RD 2007

I was pleased to attend the Public meeting organised by Mr. Vic Murphy, of the newly formed Public Safety Association at the Glenroyal Hotel Monday 23rd April. This association as I understand it has been set up by citizens concerned for the safety of the people of Maynooth and I also understand that one of its members children has been the victim of a vicious unprovoked assault which resulted in serious injury to the child and the hospitalisation of the secondary school going student.

Maynooth is a progressive Town with a lot going for it. Its an attractive historical Town with many varied attractive Historical Buildings and Land Marks, such as Carton House, Carton estate itself, Carton Avenue, The Geraldine Castle, the tree lined Main St., and St. Patricks College. The University has some 6,000 students plus 1,000 staff. The population of Maynooth is approx. 13,000. Both Maynooth Town and the University are expanding and undergoing further development. These expansions bring many welcome benefits and rewards in the form of better social activities, services and increased business activity.

Unfortunately, along with this welcome increase in business and services, modern day anti-social behaviour has rapidly increased. Also damage to property, damage to business premises, shop fronts, drink and drug parties in amenity areas of the Town, which defaces and destroy those amenity areas and adversely affect residential areas and the residents peace of mind. Damage to Children's Play Ground and the play areas. Threatening of commuters using the Harbour area on their way from the Train Station. People who live close or adjacent to trouble spots are fearful to leave their homes after dark or are fearful on their way home after dark. People are being threatened, assaulted and some viciously attacked. A number of violent robberies have taken place during this period.

THIS BEHAVIOUR IS ABSOLUTELY UNACCEPTABLE. THIS BEHAVIOUR MUST STOP AND IT WILL STOP. The peace and stability of the Community is paramount. The protection of the people and their environment comes 1st. No bunch of hoodlums are going to wreck the lives of the people of Maynooth or take over sections of this town and create `no go' areas.

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The Gardai in Maynooth are doing their best. Besides the large number of young adults from Maynooth and the University, a large number of young people are drawn into the Town, and the Gardai's handling of increased numbers of revellers, on certain nights of the week is to be commended. A lot of this anti-social behaviour and vicious attacks happen largely in the amenity areas, which are pedestrianised and inaccessible by the Gardai patrol car. Besides that, in order to apprehend offenders you need to get victims to make statements against attackers. Victims of assault are mostly under threat of reprisals if they report the incident, or give evidence against their attacker. In this regard there is only so much the Gardai can do, and effectively the Gardai's hands are tied without victim statements.

A new initiative was needed. Last year, members of the Business Association and a Member of the University staff began talking and looking at the escalation of robberies, violence and anti-social behaviour and damage to shop fronts, and flags during RYDER CUP week. Out of their discussions was born the idea of Community CCTV. It is this type of positive thinking and action that is required to help Gardai function in their duties, and this sort of initiative will bring the Community and Gardai closer and should result with positive benefits in return. The Gardai need this integration and co-operation with the CCTV Steering Committee and the Executives of the Public Safety Association, and the Community at large to tackle, and stamp out all forms of anti-social behaviour. MAKE NO MISTAKE, if the Steering Committee and The Public Safety Association liase closely with the Gardai, THIS INITIATIVE WILL WORK.

Members of the Business Association began pursuing the Community CCTV idea in November 2006. The Minister for Justice has set up funding to the tune of 70% grant aid to finance the set up and implementation of Community CCTV schemes through POBAL. There are 2 stages of application, and the Maynooth Business Association have successfully had their 1st stage application in before the deadline date of end February 2006. If their stage one application is successful, things will start to happen guickly and the Business Association will hold Public meetings at which a large amount of information will be available to the Community. This will be well publicised and you will learn a lot more in due course, if and when, the application is approved. You can be assured this will be done properly. The Business Association are a professional lot.

I would like to congratulate the Maynooth Business Association Executive and in particular Ms. Brid Feely, who came to me before Christmas seeking my assistance with the application. There are 3 mandatory conditions, and Brid Feely stated that my help and input was vital, and the application would not make the deadline date without my help and influence. I was only too delighted to assist, and I discussed the initiative and got written approval from the Chief Superintendent. I set up a meeting with Mr Des Page and members of the Maynooth Business Association Executive at which I also attended. Together we went through the procedures carefully and methodically, and at this stage, I would like to sincerely thank the Chief Superintendent and Mr Des Page for their positivity and support. At that meeting, and subsequently, I spoke with Mr Des Page about improved lighting for the Harbour Area, and mentioned to him the importance that any lighting which would be introduced would be compatible with the function of CCTV cameras. I also asked Mr Page to talk with Waterways Ireland on the possibility of laying extra cable, along with the lighting cable to facilitate the implementation of additional cameras, which may be introduced. The Children's Playground is another area that has been adversely affected by anti-social behaviour, and we already have in our application plans for a 360 degree vision camera in this area. I am wondering if enough thought went into deciding the suitability of the location of the playground for a number of reasons, but I won't go into that tonight. I will also be in touch with Waterways Ireland during the coming week, as I am concerned about adequate lighting for the Canal Walkway. That is the walkway between the Harbour Field and Bond Bridge. That walkway absolutely needs good lighting, not only to address anti-social behaviour, but also from a public safety point of view. The residents of Parson Lodge, the Apartments at Bond Bridge and residents of Parson Street are also directly affected by anti-social behaviour on the canal walkway I am referring to. These residents can rest assured, I will pursue this matter until I get a satisfactory result and peace is restored to their area.

I am delighted to be involved in this positive approach in dealing with anti-social behaviour and its fantastic to be helping people to help themselves deal with a dangerous and serious public nuisance that is antisocial behaviour. I am now working with and for the Business Association for their Stage 2 Application and we are well into the second stage of the application. I would like to thank the Business Association executive for their time and diligence. Its not easy to set time aside for this time consuming initiative when you are trying to run a business as well.

I have had discussions with Brid Feely about future expansion of the Community CCTV network of

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cameras. In the event additional cameras are required for additional areas and I am glad to be in a position to help, and be involved in their next stage of application, as well as possible expansion of the scheme. I will work with the Superintendent, the Local Authority and the Steering Committee and we will gauge how effective the scheme is working?

The perpetrators of violence and anti-social behaviour pick their areas and targets carefully. I AM COMMITTING MY HELP AND SUPPORT to the Business Association and the Gardai are also committed to following up and tackling areas or new areas that might evolve as anti-social behaviour 'black spots' in the future.

I want to recognise Brid Feely and her colleagues in the Business Association executive for their concerted action in putting forward CCTV as part of the solution to anti-social behaviour. We need more people to stand out in our Communities and make such positive social contributions to our society.

To all the other towns in North Kildare with anti-social behaviour problems, I say, I am here to help. I will be only too delighted to help just as I did the Maynooth Business Association. I would be only too happy to assist Naas, Leixlip, Celbridge and others in any help they may require in the event they consider Community CCTV to be the answer in dealing with the sort of anti-social behaviour that Maynooth is experiencing.

Hopefully Maynooth will be successful in its application and it will be interesting to follow developments in the future. I particularly look forward to communicating with the Superintendent after the CCTV system has been put in place and monitoring its effectiveness. I have no doubt in the potential of Community CCTV to be a very effective tool in helping the Gardai deal with violence, assault, robberies and anti-social behaviour.

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
