Editorial

MAYNOOTH NEWSLETTER EDITORIAL April 2008

First, I would like to take the opportunity to say that the Community Council Annual General Meeting will take place this month (April). Apart from giving the annual reports from the Chairperson, Secretary and the Treasurer, this gives the members a chance to elect a new executive committee. Attendance is confined to members of the Council and it is not open to the public.

The past year has seen a repeat of many issues within the community and town of Maynooth and these are similar to those that beset the commuter belt around Dublin everywhere. The commuting problem, traffic and parking were among the most discussed topics in recent months along with antisocial behaviour and youths drinking in public areas throughout the town.

The Community Council has been dealing with a discussion document on pay parking in the town in line with what operates in Leixlip and Celbridge.

There is an increasing problem with train commuters parking all day throughout the town due to the lack of park and ride facilities in Maynooth. Parking is also taking place in the housing estates adjacent to the railway station. People want to use public transport when it is available, attractive and reliable - this is clear from the number of people who use the buses and trains. But a balance is required between the needs of the commuter and those people who live and work in Maynooth in the area of parking and the rights of house owners in the town must be respected. This is a particular problem in the back lanes where people park so close to the front doors of the houses that the residents can hardly enter their houses never mind find a parking place for their cars. There is an urgent need for a proper park and ride facility near the railway station itself.

The Parade went very well as usual and there will be a full report inside. It is great to see in this day of high technology, computers, mp3s and video games of all kinds that families still support their own parade in their own town. Long may it last and perhaps the attendance for the events of the Festival will improve this year. This will be launched this year on the 25th June – so mark that weekend in your calendar, diary or mobile phone.

Pay & Public Parking Issues

This issue has taken up a lot of discussion time at this meeting, and subsequent meetings, as it is considered one of the most important issues that face Maynooth and needs to be dealt with now. Cllr John McGinley submitted a report that was only for our information. It noted that Leinster Street is a highly pedestrianised street, and there are no footpaths. There is €670.00 available for "Pay Parking". There is some reason to believe that Kildare Co. Co. may do away with some of the parking along here, with all the foot traffic and the dreadful state of the road, there is an urgent need for a foot path here. He also said that this would come under "The Harbour Action Plan", but that this could take up to two years or so, and this work is required to be done now.

Another area that could loose spaces is along the Dublin Road, and this could be in the region of 85 – 90 spaces. Another 50 spaces could be made available if Water Ways Ireland would make parking spaces here at the Harbour. Also suggested was, that if Tesco would lease spaces it could alleviate pressure for the short term.

It is proposed that a new Pedestrian Crossing is to be put in place at Tesco's. The area on front of the Carton Avenue Gates was in a bad state, and with the removal of the parking there, this area could be paved and landscaped. Kelly's Lane can take parking on both sides he said, and noting that Manor Cabs would have their own parking space, but people parking at resident's gates are causing huge problems for them. "Pay Parking" should be introduced here, and residents should have their own spaces.

There are 315 parking spaces in the town; there are 50 in the Mall and 30 in the Leinster Arms. Kildare Co. Co. and CIE are in talks with the government on underground car — parking , and these are at an advanced stage. 310 spaces would be adequate here, but if we have major retail in Maynooth this would not be enough. It was noted the private site behind Caulfield's could provide underground car parking, with one under and over ground. A new bridge is to go over the canal, this is in conjunction with the Harbour Action Area Plan. Paul Croghan suggested that we should be aware of people's needs also. Paul also wondered could the Co. Co. yard be

made available for parking, but it was pointed out that this area is still in use. So, it's now up to all of us to get thinking and get your ideas to our four Counsellors, and to the Community Council, and this will go on display when all submissions are in and we submit our plan. This is only at draft stage at present.

Sub - Committees

Tidy Towns

Paul Croghan said they have started back doing their regular work now, and plan a "Big" clean – up. There main working period will start in April for the year.

Festival

Andrew McMullon said the Launch will be on the 25^{th} June, with The Garda Band and St. Mary's Brass Reed Band performing in the square, and if it rains this will take place in the Church. While it is still at planning level, the Historic Group will be putting on a night of great variety in the castle. An Nuadha Players are also putting on entertainment for the Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights. With quizzes for adults and children, fun day in the square with music etc., and the 7-a-side Soccer as usual.

Planning & Development Committee

John O' Connor gave an outline on what they would be looking at. Applications Re: Moygaddy - Parking in the town, Tesco effect on town traffic, possible meeting with Planners, Heritage Office – What is its role on planning?, Planning guide lines, Green areas - looking at possibility of having these fenced or railed off, suggested that entire Harbour area be fenced off. All these things and more up for discussion.

St. Patrick's Day Parade

We will be looking forward to a great display from The Vintage Car Club and also The Morris Minor Club; these will lead off the Parade. Our own St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band, The Howth Pipe Band and The Fintan Lawlor Pipe Bank will provide lots of music, as well as a great show from all the clubs and floats. John McGinley thanked all the business's for their wonderful support and sponsorship and Mr. Paul Hand for his hard work on this.

Local Matters

Traffic Calming on Moyglare Road

John O' Connor - Resident of Moyglare Abbey brought to the Council's attention the very serious situation on the Moyglare Road. He said that if traffic calming is not introduced, there is every possibility of a very serious accident. He said the reason for this is, the extra traffic and HGVs using the road. He said the dangerous driving and speeding, and no law enforcements are also to blame. John said that the residents feel the only way to ensure safety was for calming measures to be introduced on the Moyglare Road in particular, where the direction of Moyglare cross roads enters the urban speed limit of 50 KMPH, on the northern side of Moyglare Estate. He also stated that monies should be available from levies collected on developments, such as Moyglare Hall for this purpose. Paul Croghan also agreed with this, as the residents of Moyglare Village experience the same difficulties.

Children's Play Ground

John O' Connor said he visited the Play Ground on a Sunday afternoon, and he found it to be in a very bad state. The entire area surrounding the play ground is a mass of filth and broken bottles. The seating in the area was completely misjudged, and would need to be supervised at all times. He felt that on this visit, he was leading the children into a den of iniquity, rather than a safe place to play. There is graffiti of a pornographic nature on the furniture, and there was a sense of menace about a group of boys playing football in the play ground. John said it was the worst experience of a playground he has seen to date, and asked the Community Council to address the matter, and the people responsible for the upkeep of the playground.

This was met with some shock as the play ground was not always seen in such a state. It was hoped that this was a one off thing. It was agreed to have it looked into. John McGinley said he was involved in getting a Fit Zone installed in the Harbour area, and Kildare Co. Co. has agreed a cost of €50.000 for the project, and the area now has been deemed not suitable for the project, and also the cost has now risen to €100.000.00

Just to remind all that our next meeting will be our AGM, whereby the election of the executive will take place.

The meeting will take place in the Glenroyal Hotel at 8.30 p. m. on MONDAY 14th April.



Question What tax relief is available for medical expenses and how can I claim it?

Answer

If you pay medical expenses that are not covered by the State or some other source such as private health insurance, you may be entitled to tax relief. This relief now applies to expenses that you pay for yourself or on behalf of others (for expenses before the start of 2007, the relief only applies in respect of relatives).

The amount of tax relief you get is either 20% or 41% of your expenses, whichever is the highest rate of tax you pay. Relief can now be claimed on the full amount. For expenses incurred before the 2007 tax year, the first \leq 125 was not eligible (or \leq 250 when claiming for more than one person).

You can claim relief on fees charged by doctors and consultants and many of the items or treatments prescribed by them. This includes drugs, diagnostic procedures, physiotherapy, chiropody, podiatry, hearing aids, orthoptic treatment, orthopaedic beds or chairs, and wheelchairs.

Other eligible expenses include: an educational psychologist or speech and language therapist for a qualifying child; routine maternity care; maintenance or treatment in a hospital or nursing home; kidney patients expenses; in-vitro fertilisation; gluten-free food for coelicas.

Routine dental and ophthalmic care is not eligible but some dental treatments are: crowns; root canals; gold posts or inlays; periodontal treatment; wisdom teeth extraction in hospital; bridgework; dental implants; tip replacing.

You can claim tax at the end of the tax year by completing the form MED 1 which is available from your regional Revenue office or can be download from www.revenue.ie. If you are claiming relief on dental expenses, you will need to keep the form MED 2 as evidence of the expenses incurred. The MED 2 form is completed by your dentist.

Since the start of this year, it is now also possible online for tax relief on your medical expenses.

Question

I have a medical card for myself and my family. Is the card valid for a certain period? Do I have to do anything to renew it?

Answer

A medical card is usually issued for a period of one year and then reviewed, although it may be issued for a longer period depending on your circumstances.

You must still meet the eligibility requirements during this period so if, for example, your income or family circumstances change, you may no longer be eligible.

The Health Service Executive (HSE) will usually ask you to confirm your circumstances each year by sending you a review form that you must fill in and return to your Local Health Office. It is important to return this form otherwise your card may not be reissued. The same process applies to the GP Visit Card.

If you have dependent children who are covered on your medical card, they should apply to get their own card when they reach 16 years of age. If you don't automatically receive a form to do this, you can obtain one from your Local Health Office. To ensure that there isn't a gap in coverage, it is important to allow sufficient time so that the application can be processed before their 16th birthday.

Question

Am I entitled to time off work for Easter?

Answer

Easter Monday is a public holiday, so you are entitled to paid leave on that day unless your employer nominates one of the following alternatives an extra day's pay, an extra day or annual leave, or paid off within a month.

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and businesses close, you have no entitlement to time off work on that day.

There are nine public holiday's in Ireland each year:
New years Day (1 January)
St PatricK's Day (17 March)
Easter Monday
First Monday in May, June and August
Last Monday in October
Christmas Day (25 December)
St Stephen's Day (26 December)

Easter Monday is the only Holliday with a date that varies significantly from year to year. It falls between 23 March and 26 April each year. In 2008 it falls on 24 March.

Public Holiday entitlements apply to staff even if they are not usually scheduled to work on the day of the

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public holiday. In this case the entitlement for part—time staff is pro-rata (one—fifth of weekly pay or hours). Part-time staff must have worked more than 40 hours in the five weeks before a holiday to be eligible for public holiday entitlements.

Information about public holiday entitlements is available from the National helpline on 1890 80 80 90.

Question

I recently applied for a loan but the application was refused. Is there a credit History record that banks use in deciding whether or not to approve a loan? Can I check my credit history to make sure that it is accurate?

Answer

The Irish Credit Bureau (ICB) is the main consumer credit reference agency in Ireland and most lenders in Ireland subscribe to it. They submit information to the ICB about their borrowers and apply to it for details of the credit—worthiness of individuals who may have loans with credit lenders. This information may influence a lender when deciding whether to give a loan. A borrower's credit record holds details of repayments made on loans, missed payments or failure to clear off a loan. Records remain on the ICB database for five years after a loan is closed.

You are entitled to get a full copy of the information held about you by contacting the ICB at (01) 260 0388. The completed form should be sent with payment of €6 to the Irish Credit Bureau. ICB House Newstead, Clonskeagh Road. Dublin 14. Alternatively, you can apply online at www.icb.ie.

If you find a mistake in your credit record, ask your lender to write to the ICB with details and ask them to send you a copy of the letter. The ICB cannot change your record unless a lender request it to do so. If you have problems getting your lender to do this you can make a complaint to the Data Protection Commissioner, Lo-call 1890 252 231.

Ginny Arnell and recorded some songs for Under the guidance of Phil Decca. Spector, Gene recorded a song that was to be his break-through hit. Town Without Pity, a song from the film of the same title, was a smash hit record in 1962, and the record-buying public began to take notice.

Burt Bacharach and Hal David were churning out songs in the early 60s and Gene turned many of them into hits (The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance, Only Love Can Break A Heart – his biggest hit ever, and Twenty Four Hours From Tulsa).

And he wasn't just singing. Some of the songs he wrote or co- wrote were just as popular as those he sang—the Crystals with He's A Rebel, Ricky Nelson with Hello Mary Lou, Bobby Vee with Rubber Ball, Roy Orbison with To Days Teardrops, and the list goes on. As the 60s wore on, Gene continued to be successful, recording hits for: Mecca, like, It Hurts To As big a star as he had became in the United States, Gene Pitney was an even bigger star in the United Kingdom. His publicist, Andrew Loog Oldham, acted in the same role for the Rolling Stones and Gene did some things with them. A song written by Mick

Jagger and Keith Richards, That Girl Belongs To Yesterday, was recorded by Gene and went to number seven

country music, and also made some recordings in Italian. Pitney continued inducted into the rock touring and performing throughout his life. On April 4, 2006, during a tour of the UK he performed at St. David's Hall in South Wales and received a standing ovation following the show. His final song that night

was Town Without Pity. The following morning he was discovered dead in bed at the Hilton Hotel in Cardiff, Wales. He died from natural causes.

Gene always had a strong voice and was well liked in the music business. He was inducted into the rock and roll hall of fame in 2002.

Recipes



Ingredients

- 4 large potatoes, cooked and mashed
- ◆ 1 kilo fish of choice i.e. smoked fish, cod,
- coley, haddock, also prawns, mussels and other shellfish
- 110g butter
- ♦ 110g flour
- ♦ 1/2 litre milk
- ♦ 1 leek or 6 spring onions, roughly chopped
- Salt and pepper

Method

- Heat a little oil or butter in a pan and gently fry leek or spring onions until cooked
- Cut the fish into large cubes, and poach in the milk over a medium heat for 5 minutes
- Remove fish from the milk and place in an oven proof pie dish. Sprinkle with the cooked leek or spring onion
- Use the milk to create a white sauce Melt the butter over a low heat, and stir in flour gradually. Slowly whisk in the warm milk, and allow to cook over a low heat for a couple of minutes until it has thickened to desired consistency
- Pour the sauce over the fish until it is covered.
 Spread the mashed potatoes over the filling, and score the surface with a fork, which helps to give a crispy topping
- ◆ Place in the oven and cook for 30 45 mins until golden brown.

Samb Pie with herbs

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp sunflower oil
- ♦ 200g smoked streaky bacon , preferably in one piece, skinned and cut into pieces
- 900g lamb neck fillets, cut into large chunks
- ♦ 350g baby onions , peeled
- 5 carrot , cut into large chunks
- ♦ 350g small button mushrooms
- ♦ 3 tbsp plain flour
- 3 bay leaves

- small bunch thyme
- ♦ 350ml red wine
- ♦ 350g lamb or beef stock
- large splash Worcestershire sauce

For Topping

- 350g self-raising flour
- 4 tbsp chopped mixed herbs , including thyme, rosemary and parsley
- 200g chilled butter, grated
- juice 1 lemon
- ♦ 5 bay leaves
- beaten egg , to glaze

Method

- Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4.
- In a flameproof casserole, heat the oil, then sizzle the bacon for 5 mins until crisp. Turn up the heat, then cook the lamb for 10 mins until brown.
- In a flameproof casserole, heat the oil, then sizzle the bacon for 5 mins until crisp. Turn up the heat, then cook the lamb for 10 mins until brown.
- Remove meats with a slotted spoon, turn the heat up to maximum, then add the onions, carrots and mushrooms. Cook for about 5 mins until starting to colour, then stir in the flour. Return the meat to the pan with the herbs, and pour over the wine, stock and Worcestershire sauce.
- Season, then cover and braise in the oven, undisturbed, for about 1 hr 20 mins.

After about 1 hour make the topping. Tip the flour and herbs into a large bowl, then season with salt and pepper. Add the butter and mix using a fork. Make a well, then add the lemon juice and 3 tbsp water. Gently bring together to make a soft dough. Roll out on a lightly floured surface to about 5mm thick, then cut into rounds using a 7.5cm pastry cutter.

Re-roll the trimmings, then cut out more rounds until the dough is used up. After 1 hr 20 mins, take the casserole from the oven, remove the lid, then arrange the circles of dough, overlapping, around the edge of the dish, sticking bay leaves between them. Brush with egg and bake for 45 mins until golden.

Herb Vinegar

- 25g Fresh Herbs, plus extra sprigs for bottling.
- ♦ 600ml red or white vinegar
- Put the fresh herbs and vinegar in a pan and bring to boil Pour into a bowl, cover and leave overnight.
- Strain through a muslin-lined sieve and bottle with herb sprigs. Store for one week before using.

Spiced Vinegar (Perfect for Pickling)

- 500ml malt vinegar1 tsp mace, 1 tbsp allspice berries, 1 tbsp cloves, 18cm cinnamon stick, 6 peppercorns, 4 dried red chillies, 1 small bay leaf
- Put all the ingredients in a pan and bring to the boil. Remove from the heat, cover and leave to infuse for about 2 hours.
- Strain the vinegar through a muslin-lined sieve to remove the herbs and spices.
- Pour the vinegar into sterilised bottles or jars and seal tightly. The vinegar can be used straight away or stored until required.

Truit vinegar

- ◆ 1lb Raspberries and blackberries, plus extra for bottling, 600ml wine vinegar.
- Break up fruit with back of spoon and add vinegar. Cover and leave to stand for 3 days, stirring now and then.
- Strain through a muslin-lined sieve and bottle with extra fruit. Store for two weeks before using.

April in the Garden

The garden really comes alive in April and the number of tasks to be carried out is considerable. Making the best use of the lengthening days is a bonus and, providing the weather stays fair, it can be a brilliant gardening month.

Do watch out for sudden air frosts, keep an eye on your local weather report and place any plants that you may be worried about in your conservatory or shed. Alternatively, you can wrap your plants up with some fleece or even bubble wrap to safeguard them.

Now is a good time to plant evergreen shrubs, bamboos and conifers. Water them in well, then mulch the root area with bark or compost. Protect them from drying winds with screens of polythene or sacking supported by bamboo canes. They also benefit from syringing with water in dry weather.

Clematis and other pot-grown climbers can also be planted out now. These also need lots of water and protection from slugs and snails, alternative methods of pest control are available from your local garden centre from garden chemicals to the more organic . . . you choose!

Climbers make vigorous growth and will almost certainly flower well in the same year and are perfect for framing a doorway or porch to give your garden a more interesting and enticing entrance.

10 Minute Tasks . . .

- Try planting hardy cyclamen under trees which can add interest during the autumn and winter months.

 Cyclamen hederifolium produce their flowers in autumn, followed by very attractive leaves. Prepare the site well by incorporating lots of well–rotted organic matter and keep them well watered until they are established.
- Plant up climbing plants such as Jasmine and Honeysuckles. These climbing plants look stunning in deep blue or contemporary steel containers especially when placed around your patio or balcony areas. What's more they will not only climb over unsightly fences or trellis but will even disguise your dustbin area and the give of a wonderful fragrance!

Benefits for You... ... How can plants help?

There are lots of ways in which plants and greenery can help improve and enhance your lifestyle, not only do they make you feel relaxed after a busy day but can also help to **reduce noise and air pollutants**.

Research has shown that having regular exposure to plants and green spaces can radically reduce your stress levels and put you in a better mood! After a long day at the office or a hectic day with the kids it's great to be able relax and enjoy our own green space.

Coconut Oil's Effect On Dogs

ests on coconut oil's effect on dogs in clinical trials are not readily available, but anecdotal evidence is impressive. Internet forums describe how overweight dogs become lean and energetic soon after they begin eating coconut oil, or their shabby-looking coats become sleek and glossy, and dogs with arthritis or ligament problems grow stronger and more lively. Even some serious diseases have responded. In one case, a Doberman Pinscher with severe Wobblers made a dramatic recovery in less than a week while taking coconut oil. Other reports involve itchy skin, cuts, wounds, and ear problems. Dogs with flea allergies, contact dermatitis, or other allergic reactions typically stop scratching soon after coconut oil is added to their food, and dogs treated topically for bites, stings, ear mites, ear infections, cuts, or wounds recover quickly. One dog was stung by a bee, causing her mouth to swell. An hour after her owner applied coconut oil to the sting and gave her a tablespoon to swallow, the swelling disappeared and the dog was herself again.

There is the story of two collies who suffered from bad breath, poor skin condition with some mange, and their coats were not good. Their owner heard about the health benefits of virgin coconut oil for humans and had bought some from the local Health Food Store. More by chance than intent, he gave some to his dogs. They lapped it up so he began to give them a couple of spoonfuls with each meal. The result has been remarkable: the bad breath has gone, their mange has disappeared and their coats are glossy.

Behaviour Problems in Dogs

Destructive behaviour

Destructive behaviour is one of the most common complaints from dog owners, and hence necessitates the most in-depth discussion. A dog quickly ceases to be 'man's best friend' when he/she scratches up a prized rug, chews up a favourite jumper, or eats an expensive pair of shoes. Destructive behaviour is due to many causes, including separation anxiety. Many owners are gone from the house for many hours during the day, and the result is that the dog has more opportunity to develop destructive behaviour The problem with this is that owners come home and see the chewed object and will punish the dog at that time. The dog will not associate the act of destruction to the punishment because they will not understand exactly why you are upset. They will act 'guilty' because they know you are upset, but they will not associate your anger with their act of destroying the object. Therefore, do not punish a dog for its behaviour unless you catch him in the act.

Another reason for destructive behaviour is lack of environmental stimulation. Boredom may be a cause, or at least a contributing factor, especially in young or large animals that do not receive adequate exercise. Animals need environmental stimulation. Obtaining a second pet or providing interesting and interactive toys for the dog may help. For example, a hollow toy filled with solid treats or peanut butter encourages the dog to interact with the ball to get at the treats.

To treat destructive problems, one must determine the exact cause of the behaviour and remedy the cause accordingly. For example, a young dog that is chewing furniture but not doorways is most likely in need of more environmental stimulation. Increasing exercise, providing another animal companion, putting the radio on, decreasing anxiety, or giving a chew toy only when the owners are away.



 - © The "Toot and Calm Horrl" (after Tutankhamun) which calms rather than aggravates other drivers, so reducing road rage.
 - © SHEF ("Satellite Hypersensitive Electromagnetic foodration") Technology which sees the cars GPS synchronise with home appliances to perfectly cook a meal for the instant you return home.
- German Pound BBC Radio 2004 reported that Germany had pulled out of the Euro and wanted to join the British pound, prompting outraged listeners to ring in complaining it would be an assault on British Sovereignty
- **Dead fairy hoax:** In 2007, an illusion designer for magicians posted on his website some images illustrating the corpse of an unknown eight-inch creation, which was claimed to be the mummified remains of a fairy. He later sold the fairy on eBay for £280.
- **Water on Mars:** In 2005 a news story was posted on the official NASDA website purporting to have pictures of water on Mars. The picture actually was just a picture of a glass of water on a Mars Candy Bar.

Re-cycling Centre at the Public Car Park

"How many fines and prosecutions have there been as a result of dumping at the Bottle Bank in the Council car park, Maynooth?"

The Square, Maynooth

The Council has agreed to repair the seats in the Square and at the Ulster Bank as a result of Cllr. John McGinley's motion.

They have also agreed to carry out maintenance work on the wooden beams and to take measures to encourage the creepers onto the pergola.

Health & Safety on the Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth

Council Officials will present a report to the next Area Meeting on 28th March in response to Cllr. McGinley's motion.

Provision of Teenage Activity Area at the Harbour Field, Maynooth

The Council intend advertising the Part 8 Planning Permission for the Teenage Activity Area in the Harbour Field in Mid March.

Provision of a Fit Zone in the Harbour Field, Maynooth

At the Area Meeting in January Cllr. McGinley was advised by Council Officials that the Fit Zone for adults would be located adjacent to the Teenage Activity Area and that the only outstanding issue was where to get the €50-60,000 required to install the equipment. When Cllr. McGinley identified a source of funding at the February Area Meeting he was presented with a long report which stated that the Harbour Field was unsuitable as "a more secluded location would be more appropriate." John stated that this was blatant nonsense as they are located on Street Corners in China, where President McAleese first saw them and she then arranged to have them introduced to Ireland through the Mid-east Regional Authority.

The Council report also stated that the installation cost would now be €100,000, double that of the previous month. The only place in Ireland where they are installed is Dunshaughlin Park and the cost was €50,000. President McAleese officially opened this Fit Zone last September. Cllr. McGinley made the point that our President would not be too pleased at the obstructionist tactics of Kildare Council Officials in

relation to installing the units, which were bought for the county, in the Harbour Field.

Junction of Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Link Road

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion asking for a roundabout at this dangerous junction:

"The Traffic Management Section is examining the options to control traffic using the junction of the Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Road in Maynooth. The primary objective is to improve the safety of pedestrians and cyclists and taking into account proposed developments. Proposals will be distributed to the Area Committee when available."

Resurfacing of Back Lane, Maynooth, from 1 to 28 Leinster Cottages

In the reply to his motion Cllr. McGinley was advised that "there was no funding to surface this Lane in this years budget." When John made the point that pay parking could not proceed on the Lane without it being resurfaced the Council Official agreed that it could be done as part of the Pay Parking Scheme.

Drop in Serious Crime Detection Rate further evidence of Garda undermanning

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been advised by the Central Statistics Office of the Provisional Figures for the Detection Rate of Serious Crime in the Carlow/ Kildare Division which worryingly show a decline in crimes detected.

Of the Total of 6,029 Serious Crimes in the Carlow/ Kildare Division in 2007 only 1,841 were detected, a mere 30.5%. This compares to a detection rate in 2006 of 34.4%.

Whilst the detection rates for Thefts and Robberies were 32%, Deputy Stagg stated that the detection rate for Burglaries was only 14.5%. In other words 86 out of every 100 burglaries, including House Burglaries resulted in no prosecution.

These figures stated Deputy Stagg provide further evidence that the Gardai in the Carlow/Kildare Division are under-resourced and he has reiterated his call for further gardai to be assigned to the division given Kildare`s proximity to Dublin Criminal Gangs.

Discussions ongoing in relation to proposals to increase capacity on Maynooth suburban line through removal of level crossing

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Transport in relation to Iarnrod Eireann`s Review of its Resignalling Project for the City Centre and broader plans for the upgrade of Infrastructure on

the Maynooth Suburban Line including the removal of level crossings.

The Minister has advised Deputy Stagg that Iarnrod Eireann are currently in discussions with the Local Authorities concerned regarding the removal of Level Crossings on the Maynooth Line. Crossings along the line are at Blakestown, Clonsilla, Porterstown, Coolmine, Ashtown and Reilly`s and the most critical crossings are from Clonsilla to the City Centre.

In relation to the City Centre Resignalling Project Deputy Stagg was advised that this scheme is now included in Iarnrod Eireann's Capital Investment Programme and is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2011, disappointingly 2 years behind the Transport 21 Timeframe of 2009 for this scheme.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that increasing capacity on the Maynooth Line was critical in providing improvements in Public Transport and if in addition to the electrification of the line, resignalling of the City Centre and the Maynooth Line, that agreement could be reached on the removal of level crossings we would have a greatly improved service for the Public.

Gormley refuses to say Yes or No on establishment of New Town Councils for Maynooth & Celbridge by 2009

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to question the Minister for Environment in relation to the Establishment of New Town Councils in Maynooth and Celbridge.

Deputy Stagg has been critical of the decision by the Minister to embark on a further Consultative Process on Local Government Reform describing it as a delaying tactic given the fact that Legislation exists under the 2001 Local Government Act allowing for the Establishment of New Town Council's in Towns with a population in excess of 7,500 people.

Deputy Stagg recently questioned the Minister in relation to the completion of the Green Paper on Local Government Reform, when he anticipated the follow up White Paper would be published and whether or not New Town Council's would be established in time for the Local Elections due in June 2009.

The Minister responding to Deputy Stagg stated that the Green Paper on Local Government Reform would be published shortly and The White Paper would be published later in 2008. Issues to be considered include the provision of directly elected Mayors and the establishment of New Town Councils in Towns that have shown significant growth in recent years. However the Minister refused to state categorically whether these New Town Councils would be in place in time for the 2009 Local Elections. If there was any hope that they would be then the Minister would have said so.

Reacting to the Ministers response Deputy Stagg stated that it is clear that the Minister has no intention of providing New Town Councils in 2009. This means that Maynooth with a Population of 11,476 people and Celbridge with a population of 19,024 people will continue to be governed by Councillors in some instances 40 miles away. This was clearly Anti-Democratic and a denial of the rights of the public in both towns to determine how their towns were developed into the future.

Garda Division Boundary Board will examine adequacy of 24 hour Garda Station Cover

Following on from the referral by the Garda Commissioner Fachtna Murphy, of Deputy Emmet Stagg`s correspondence making the case for a 24 Hour Garda Station for North Kildare covering the Towns of Celbridge, Leixlip, Maynooth and Kilcock, to the Programme Board overseeing the Divisional Boundary Changes, the Assistant Commissioner in charge of implementing the changes has responded to Deputy Stagg.

The Assistant Commissioner has advised Deputy Stagg that in developing the new boundary changes, The Programme Board established to manage the changes will be examining and looking at ways of improving the service, and included in this will be the examination of the opening hours of garda stations to ensure appropriate 24 by 7 opening hour facilities in each garda division.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the response from the Assistant Commissioner and reiterated his firm belief that if the North Kildare Towns, with a combined population of 50,033 people, are to be properly policed then a 24 Hour Garda Station will have to be opened in one of the Towns. It is inconceivable that Naas Divisional Headquarters would give 24 hour cover to North Kildare.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that New Division is likely to be created by this Summer and all going well the case made by Deputy Stagg for the 24 Hour Station will arrive at a successful conclusion.

Minister not bothered at low take up of places in Gaelcholaiste from North Kildare

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for

Education in relation to the fact that only 31% of pupils who attended Gaelscoils, in the catchment area for Colaiste Cois Life in Lucan, went on to study Secondary Education through Irish, whether or not a study had been carried out into the low take up, and whether the fact that there was no Gaelcholaiste in North Kildare was a contributory factor for pupils from Maynooth, Kilcock and Leixlip Gaelscoils not going on for further education in Irish.

The Minister responded to Deputy Stagg stating that her Department has not carried out an examination to establish why pupils from the designated feeder gaelscoils do not continue their second level education through the medium of Irish.

Commenting on her response Deputy Stagg stated that the Minister simply doesn't care less about the low take up and isn't even bothered about carrying out a study to examine the issue. After refusing to fund a Gaelcholaiste in North Kildare this shows the lack of concern by the Minister for the Pupils in North Kildare who wish to study in Irish.

It is obvious to a blind person that one of the reasons for the low take up from North Kildare is the distance and time required in travelling to and from Lucan. This places further stress on Secondary Pupils and can only be resolved by the provision of a Gaelcholaiste in North Kildare.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the False Hope raised by F.F. during last May's General Election in relation to the provision of a Gaelcholaiste in North Kildare would not deter him in continuing his campaign for the Provision of An All Irish Secondary School in North Kildare and he indicated that he would seek further statistics to back up his claims on the low take up figures.

Study on provision of interchange/underpass at Palmerstown junction on the N4 to be completed in 2008

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been in further contact with South Dublin Co. Council in relation to the provision of an Interchange or Underpass to allow for free flow of traffic at Palmerstown Village on the N4.

With the completion of the N4 upgrade works by March 2009 which will provide an Interchange on the Lucan Bypass at the Lucan/Newcastle Junction Deputy Stagg pointed out that the removal of the Traffic Lights at Palmerstown would allow traffic to flow freely and would be particularly beneficial for outward bound traffic. In effect Kildare motorists would have no further hold ups on the outward

journey once on the Chapelizod Bypass. At present peak time waiting time at this junction can be anything up to an hour.

South Dublin Co. Council have now advised Deputy Stagg that they currently have a contract in place with a Consultant Engineer to prepare a traffic model for the entire County Network and that consideration is being given to extending the consultants brief to assess the Palmerstown Junction and to make a recommendation on the most suitable junction type required. They further indicated that the Study will be carried out in 2008.

Welcoming this news Deputy Stagg stated that removing the traffic lights at Palmerstown Village would be an additional improvement for hard pressed motorists travelling into and from Dublin on a daily basis. If there is not enough room for an Interchange at this location then an Underpass should be seriously examined.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg indicated that he would continue to monitor progress on this issue.

Noise Map of M4 shows those living in proximity subjected to permanent office environment type noise

Deputy Emmet Stagg has been in contact with the Environmental Protection Agency in relation to the Strategic Noise Mapping of the M4 particularly near to the Towns of Celbridge, Kilcock, Leixlip and Maynooth.

The Environmental Protection Agency have forwarded to Deputy Stagg the Noise Map submitted by the N.R.A., which whilst not in great detail shows a number of residential areas subjected to in effect a permanent office environment noise in their homes as a result of traffic using the M4.

Amazingly, stated Deputy Stagg, when the then Minister for Environment published the Environmental Noise Regulations in 2006, he failed to include any maximum permitted Noise Levels near roads, rail lines or airports. Instead the E.P.A. are now commissioning a consultant to review control measures on noise levels in other countries with a view to preparing a guidance document for local authorities to enable them to prepare Actions Plans to deal with Noise Pollution by July 18th 2008.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that in his opinion there was a clear case for noise alleviation measures to be sought from the N.R.A. in July be they, Noise Barriers or new surfaces on the M4 itself.

Stagg raises lack of accountability in Dáil for Quango's

During Taoiseach's Questions in the Dail on Tuesday February 26th Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the fact that Elected Members were prevented by Legislation from asking Ministers about the expenditure of public funds provided by the Taxpayer for the operation of State Agencies and State Bodies such as the HSE and N.R.A..

Deputy Stagg called on the Minister of State responsible, Tom Kitt T.D. to indicate Government willingness to amend the legislation allowing for full Public Accountability of Taxpayers Money. He stated that we have over 1,000 Quango's operating in the State, financed by the Tax Payers, and the Elected Members are unable to question Ministers in relation to these Quango's under their effective control but at a remove from them.

The most prominent of these Quango's are the HSE and the N.R.A. It can take 3 months to get a response about an urgent issue from the HSE and if a member questions the Minister for Transport about a Major Roads Project or a Toll Scheme the Minister refuses to answer the question because he has no responsibility in the matter which he states is a matter for the N.R.A. Ireland is probably the only State in the World where you cannot question the Minister responsible for funding the building of a motorway project or certain aspects of the proposal or why certain projects are not funded over others. This goes to the very heart of a democracy – the right of Public Representatives to ask guestions in Parliament and to get answers from Ministers on behalf of the Public who send us to this Sovereign Parliament.

In response to Deputy Stagg, Minister of State Kitt stated that the Government shared Opposition concerns about getting information from Quangos and agencies. He indicated that he had not put a package of suggested changes before Government but hoped to do so by Autumn.

Responding Deputy Stagg stated that unless the Government can give us an answer on restoring power to the House from the Quangos we have created we will not have achieved anything. Democracy suffers where there is no Accountability.

Handy Hints for Spring Cleaning

Basic All Purpose Cleaner Formula

This makes about 2 cups of formula, and it works really well cleaning dirt and grime.

- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda or washing soda
- 2 teaspoons borax
- 1/2 teaspoon liquid soap or detergent
- 2 cups hot water

Combine all the ingredients and the water into a spray bottle. Shake well. The washing soda or baking soda makes this formula a great grease cutter.

- 1 qt rubbing alcohol
- 1 cup lemon ammonia
- 1 tsp dishwashing liquid
- 21 oz 409

Combine the ingredients into a empty one gallon container such as a milk carton. Shake the contents, and then top off the gallon container with water to make 1 full gallon of cleaning solution. note: never add bleach to ammonia, a harmful and toxic gas will result. Pour the cleaner into a spray bottle then you are all set.

Bathroom Odours: Place an opened box of baking soda OR an open container of activated charcoal behind the toilet to absorb bathroom odours.

Blood Stains: Soak the stain in hydrogen peroxide, wash (don't dry), and repeat if necessary. This tip works especially well for caret and clothes.

Carpet Stains: Baby wipes are miracle-workers on carpet stains, from motor oil to blood, they remove almost anything!

Candle Holders: To prevent the wax from melting and sticking to the inside of a votive candle holder, pour a bit of water in the holder, then place the candle on top. If you're reading this tip too late, and there's already wax stuck inside your candle holder, pop it in the freezer for an hour. The wax will chip right off.

Good news for Kildare Commuters

At the launch of the Transport 21 Second Annual Progress Report in respect of 2007, The Minister for Transport, Noel Dempsey TD was delighted to report that a major highlight of the year was that spending on public transport, at €640m, increased by 82% over 2006.

According to the Annual Report, expenditure on national roads was €2.2 billion and on public transport was €640.4m. The estimated expenditure on public transport for 2008 is €986m, representing a further year on year increase of 54%. This demonstrates in a tangible way the overall commitment in Transport 21 to delivering real public transport solutions throughout Ireland.

In welcoming this report, Deputy Michael Ftizpatrick noted that "Transport 21 is delivering tangible benefits - increased public transport facilities, more services, shorter travel times and greater connectivity between the regions".

The Minister reported that at €34bn, this is the largest coordinated transport infrastructure project in Irish history. It encompasses trains, trams, buses and roads, and it is delivering new projects from 2006 to 2015, in every part of the country."

Deputy Fitzpatrick noted that among the projects delivered under Transport 21 at the end of 2007

• The commencement of the upgrading of the Kildare Rail line, to permit a major increase in route services.

Progress will continue this year with Transport 21's 2008 expenditure provision at almost €3bn.

Focus on public transport delivery will continue as a priority, with a total spend of almost €1bn.

- The deployment of the new intercity railcars will continue across the rail network. This new fleet will be maintained at a new traincare depot in Portlaoise which will open during the year
- Work will get underway on the Dublin city centre resignalling project which will increase capacity on the city centre and the Maynooth line.
- Work will continue on the Kildare line upgrade.
- Phases 1 and 3 of the M50 upgrade will continue and barrier-free tolling will be introduced on the West-Link Bridge.

Introduction of New commuter services Dublin to M aynooth

Below is a copy of a letter received by me from a constituent. This is good news for commuters from Maynooth.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude for representations made on my behalf to Iarnród Eireann regarding the changes to the timetable that came into effect in January 2007. The timetable changes (which involved the replacement of the 0800 Dublin to Sligo service by two services, one departing Dublin at 0705, the other at 0905) left commuters to Maynooth without an adequate service and extremely limited possibilities to arrive in Maynooth before 9 o'clock. Following representations made by many of you on my behalf and on behalf of commuters travelling daily to Maynooth, Iarnród Eireann introduced a new Dublin to Maynooth non-stop service departing Dublin Connolly at 0808 and an earlier service departing Connolly at 0730 stopping at all stations to Maynooth. I wish to express my sincere thanks for taking the time to help in this matter. Your assistance in reaching a satisfactory resolution is greatly appreciated.

'Park and Ride Solutions are working well at Louisa Bridge, Leixlip, Hazelhatch, Celbridge and Sallins; and we must provide more Park and Ride facilities in the County.' concluded Deputy Brady who has raised this issue with Kildare Co Co as well.

OK Transport make presentation to Joint Oireachtas Committee on Transport

OK Community Transport outlined its strategy to the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Transport last Wednesday at the Committee's schedule meeting. The meeting was facilitated by North Kildare TD, Aine Brady.

'OK Community Transport is one of 34 projects funded by the Department of Transport through Pobal under the Rural Transport Programme of the National Development Programme. OK Community Transport was established in 2002 and has seen its passenger numbers increase from 15,916 to 35,990 by the end of 2007; the number of wheelchair users from 44 to 1,206 and the number of free travel pass holders from 8,143 to 24,542.' stated Alan Kerry, OK Transport.

'The Company is always looking at avenues to widen its passenger profile and with this in mind, we have prepared our strategy for 2008/2010 which will be going for board approval this month.' stated Alan Kerry.

Deputy Aine Brady stated, 'I was happy to facilitate this meeting between OK Transport and our Transport Oireachtas Committee. I am very anxious that we find mechanisms to reduce our car dependency and encourage more public transport. OK Transport late last year commenced a service to the Kildare rail station from Rathdangan. I am anxious that we roll this out to other rail stations.' stated Deputy Brady.

'My colleagues on the committee were very impressed with the presentation, as outlined by Alan Kerry, Pat Leogue and Frank Nolan. I look forward to working with OK Transport to improve the services for Kildare.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Brady welcomes new plan for residential development

Aine Brady T.D. has welcomed the issuing by the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, John Gormley T.D. of new policy guidance to planning authorities in relation to the taking in charge of residential estates. Deputy Brady had raised the issue with the previous Minister for the Environment, Dick Riche TD.

The guidance is being issued as a companion to the expanded and updated Residential Density Guidelines - Sustainable Residential Development in Urban Areas - which issued as a consultation draft on 10 February. 'Under this policy, developers will be required, through the development management process, to complete residential developments to a standard that is in compliance with the planning permission granted. In addition, the issue of taking in charge will now be addressed at the pre-planning stage with the approved design facilitating the taking in charge of core facilities.' Stated Deputy Brady.

"This fund will fulfil a commitment to mainstreaming supported flexible learning within and between the Universities in order to increase the numbers of people in the workforce engaged in education and development." "The continued investment in NUI Maynooth is vital, as it plays a vital role education and economy of the region," concluded Deputy Brady.

Over 8,000 Kildare/West Wicklow people now visit the GP free of charge - Brady

More people in Kildare are now visiting their GP free of charge thanks to an easing of the means test for medical cards and GP visit cards according to local Fianna Fail T.D. Áine Brady.

'In November 2004 the Government began to increase funding for medical cards and easing the means test for medical cards and the new GP Visit Card."

'In Kildare and West Wicklow, in the year from 1 January 2006 to 1 December 2007, 5,684 new people qualified to see their GP for free thanks to the easing of the means test. In addition to this 2,332 people qualified for a GP visit card that allows them to attend their GP for free."

'This increase of just over 8,000 people seeing their GP for free comes at a time when incomes have risen and unemployment has dropped."

"The move from an 'all or nothing' approach to the issuing of medical cards has provided a big boost for Kildare families. I know the financial pressures, especially on families with young children or older people who might have to visit their GP more frequently than others. Many more of these people now get to visit their GP for free."

"People should apply for the GP visit card as the basic means test for it is 50% higher than that of the Medical Card. As it is based on income after tax, rent and mortgage repayments, childcare and travel expenses, it includes more people than ever."

"Eligibility can be checked on the HSE website (<u>www.hse.ie</u>) where an easy to use calculator can make an assessment in a matter of seconds before making a formal application," concluded Deputy Brady.

€1.8m allocated to Kildare Rural Water programme

Deputy Aine Brady has been informed by the Minister of State at the Department of the Environment, Tony Killeen TD, that €1.89m will be allocated to Kildare Co Co under the Department's Rural Water Programme 2008.

'€256k is being allocated to take over of Group Water Schemes, €750k is allocated for New Group Water Schemes and €800k is allocated for small Public Water & Sewerage Schemes in the County.'

'I welcome this investment to Kildare, as we must continue to upgrade our group water schemes and continue to invest in our water infrastructure to maintain compliance with the Drinking Water Regulations.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Kilcock Bus Service set for significant Improvement says Brady

Deputy Aine Brady, Convenor of the Joint Oireachtas Transport Committee, has been informed by Bus Éireann that it has plans to significantly improve its Bus Service in Kilcock under its Transport 21 proposals.

'I had found that Kilcock in the past was not been serviced adequately either by Bus Éireann or Dublin Bus. I raised this issue with Bus Eireann last year and I am delighted that the company now has plans to significantly improve the service, from 10 Departures last year, to 32 Departures under Transport 21. This is the largest increase in services - 357% increase - in the Eastern Region Expansion Plan.' stated Deputy Brady who met with Bus Éireann last week.

'Bus Éireann has received over a 100 new buses in the recent past. They are making improvements to ensure that they reduce emissions by using bio-fuel compatible cleaner engines and ensuring that all their Transport 21 vehicles are fully accessible. The company is also delivering it plans in a partnership approach with Local Authorities, Quality Bus Network Office, Private Contractors and Local Communities, thus ensuring that services that are required are put in place.'

'I will continue to press for further improvements. I strongly believe that there is also public support for an orbital service, linking Clane, Kilcock and Naas and I will continue to press to have this service introduced as soon as possible.' stated Deputy Brady.

'We have made progress on the provision of Bus Lanes for the Buses that use the M4/N4. Once the works on the M50 are completed, travel time for Buses will improve. From my experience, once we have a reliable and efficient public transport network, people will use it.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Kildare commuters urged to take part in National Consultation on Transport and Travel - Brady
