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Maynooth Community Council Notes

The February meeting of Maynooth Community Council took place on the 11th of February in the Glenroyal Hotel.

Pay Parking In Maynooth:

Lyreen Residence Association is looking for support regarding pay-parking being introduced in the town. They have a lot of concerns and would want to meet with KCC before any decisions are made. They were assured that Maynooth Community Council would give any support necessary and it was felt that there would be no decisions made soon. Deirdre Cullen stressed that they would love to see residence parking only introduced as this would help keep people living in the town, she said that they are very concerned about this and that something will have to be done about it. It was noted that €5 would allow a resident to park all year.

Cllr. John McGinley pointed out that both Kildare County Council and CIE are involved in talks regarding parking in the Harbour Field. It was suggested by Margaret Clinch that the supermarkets could become pay-parking areas. This would involve a lot of co-operation with the appropriate authorities. There is just no place to park and this would alleviate the problem for a while.

Dublin Bus is to introduce a new service to Moyglare Hall and Meadowbrook. This would be a huge relief for people said John McGinley. It was also felt that there is a need for park and ride facilities and that maybe it's now time for multi-story car parking. It was pointed out that the underground car park in Clane works well. Margaret Clinch noted out that Celbridge and Newbridge have benefited greatly from permanent parking. It was pointed out that there is no parking outside residences doors in Newbridge. Places like Silken Vale would benefit from double yellow lines.

Theatre and Community Centre for Maynooth:

Terry Nealon said that the An Nuada players had put on eight Pantomimes and are a very successful group. He said that they had a wonderful after pantomime party which was attended by both adults and children. Terry thanked Martina O'Reilly for her great work with the children, but he was fearful that there is nothing in the town for kids and teenagers have no place to go. He said that he was in touch with the organisation Kelt that supports groups like this. He said that they love what they were doing, but could not help. Terry felt that things are really bad for young people and that there was an urgent need for a theatre in Maynooth. Maynooth

Community Council fully supports a Theatre and Community centre for Maynooth. The Geraldine Hall site was proposed for this project. Proposals were agreed and sent to Kildare County Council. While it was noted NUIM had plans for a regional theatre. It was felt and hoped that this would not affect plans for a local theatre. It was indeed hoped that with all developments planned for the Harbour Field area that Maynooth would prove successful in gaining a theatre and community centre.

Tidy Towns:

Paul Croghan said that they are at the planning stages now and have started to clean up and plant the approach roads into the town. Pound Park is in need of a clean up, cars are being driven into the park and this is tearing the place up. A group from Maynooth Tidy Towns and other Tidy Towns went on a fact finding trip to Aughrim in Co. Wicklow to see how things are done there. The trip was well worth while. Tidy Towns will celebrate their 50th year this year. They will be looking for more help this year. It is understandable that people find it hard to get out, what with weather etc, but just a little more support would make all the difference. Matt Callaghan suggested that we need a Special Olympics feel to this to get people out.

Festival:

The Festival will take place in June this year on the 25th with a performance by the St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band, and the Garda Band. Plans are still in the making.

St. Patrick's Day Parade:

John McGinley said plans are going well. He said local business is very good with sponsorship and thanked Paul Hand for all his work on this. He said that they would be looking for help on the morning of the Parade and asked for people to come forward.

The St. Patrick's Day Parade will take place on Monday 17th march. Starting at the Greenfield Shopping Centre at 11.00 p.m.

The next Community Council meeting will take place on 11th March.

THE EASTER BUNNY







The Easter Bunny has its origin in pre-Christian fertility lore. The Hare & the Rabbit were the most fertile animals known and they served as symbols of the new life during the Spring Season.

The bunny as an Easter symbol seems to have it's origins in Germany, where it was first mentioned in German writings in the 1500s. The first edible Easter bunnies were made in Germany during the early 1800s. They were made of pastry and sugar.

Fairtrade in Maynooth

This year Maynooth celebrates its first anniversary as a Fairtrade Town. Maynooth gained its Fairtrade status last spring following a campaign promoting the use of fair trade products in its shops, schools, offices and organisations. Maynooth is Co. Kildare's first Fairtrade town and one of twenty five in Ireland. NUI Maynooth is also Ireland's first Fairtrade university.

Fairtrade Fortnight this year runs from Monday, February 25th to Sunday, March 9th and the Maynooth Fairtrade Steering Committee is encouraging the people of the town to choose Fairtrade products when doing their shopping. Many of the town's shops now stock these products, ranging from tea and coffee to bananas and chocolate.

The FAIRTRADE Mark is the independent guarantee that products carrying the Mark have been produced according to internationally agreed Fairtrade standards. In Ireland the FAIRTRADE Mark is supported by all the main overseas development agencies and by the Irish Congress of Trade Unions.

Fairtrade has improved the lives of millions of people - farmers, workers and their families - in developing countries. Governments, corporations, and consumers have roles to play. The major corporations involved in the coffee, cocoa and tea trades cannot continue to pay extremely low prices, if they are to make their Corporate Social Responsibility more than just a boardroom buzz-word. Consumers can demonstrate their solidarity with marginalised farmers, by insisting on purchasing FAIRTRADE Marked products.



IDOL OF THE 1960s



Billy Fury was a member of the Larry Parnes stable of singers in the late 1950s/early 1960s. He was born at 8.45am on April 17, 1940, in Smithdown Hospital, Liverpool, now Sefton General Hospital, weighing 6lbs 15oz.

In May, 1958, he cut six tracks on a 78rpm acetate at Percy F. Phillips' recording studio in Liverpool. He also sent a tape of songs to impresario Larry Parnes, together with a photograph of him at the Star Studio, Bold Street

Billy's first recording, "Maybe Tomorrow" (one of those he offered to Marty Wilde) went into the Top 20.

Billy's good looks made him a natural for television. His first appearance was in a drama, Ted Willis's "Strictly For The Sparrows", in which he sang one song. He made his debut in Jack Good's "Oh Boy!" in February, 1959, then he and Marty Wilde became two of the favourite performers on Jack Good's "Boy Meets Girls", which ran from September 1959 to March 1960.

He became unable to undertake much promotional work after signing with EMI's Parlophone label in 1967, playing cabaret when his health allowed.

Billy found peace whenever possible at his home in Ockley, Surrey, to which he moved after fans plagued him at his homes in London. At Ockley, he had a a mock-Tudor mansion with ten acres, where he could assemble a considerable menagerie and play host to the greats of the show business world.

He re-recorded his old hits for K-Tel in 1978 as part of an arrangement with his creditors, after being declared bankrupt, owing the Inland Revenue £16,780. Billy always blamed Larry Parnes for the problem, as in the early days, Parnes paid Billy a wage but did not take care of the tax. He was discharged from bankruptcy a year later.

On 7th March, 1982, he collapsed at his farm, suffering partial paralysis and temporary blindness. He was driven to hospital in London, and he made a good recovery.

A live TV show and a national promotional tour followed, but at 2.10pm on 28th January, 1983, he was pronounced dead on arrival at St Mary's Hospital, London, after being found unconscious in his flat in Cavendish Avenue, St John's Wood. He apparently died in the ambulance.

The heart weakness that had dogged him throughout his life finally claimed him.

Many years after his death, the original guitar was discovered, broken in his attic, it has been repaired, but it has never been retuned to his family for preservation to prevent it being stressed.

Question:

I am starting a new job shortly and, due to a disability, I need to buy a car to get to work. Is there a grant available to help with the expense?

Answer:

The motorised Transport Grant is a means—tested Health Service Executive (HSE) payment for people with disabilities who need to have a car or other vehicle adapted in order to enable them to drive and, as a result, earn a living.

A grant of up to 75% of the cost may be paid, up to a maximum of \in 5,020.50.

You can apply to the Disability Service Manager in your Local Health Office. To be eligible to receive this grant, you must:

- Be over 17 years and under 66 years of age.
- Have a disability that impedes your use of public transport.
- Hold a driving licence.
- Be physically and mentally capable of driving.
- Require a car or other vehicle in order to obtain or retain employment or, because you live in a very isolated location.

It may be possible to get a grant if you are currently unemployed but, could take up work if you had a car. Self—employed people may also be able to get a grant.

Normally, the grant is payable where you drive yourself. It may be possible to get approval to have a grant paid where you own the car, and arrange for its adaptation, but another person drives it because, you are not physically or medically able to drive.

If you receive a Motorised Transport Grant while getting the Mobility Allowance, you will become ineligible to receive the Mobility Allowance for a period of three years. You will become eligible again after this period.

If you are paid a grant towards buying a car, it will normally be three years before you can get a grant towards replacing it. You may also be eligible for tax relief from The Revenue Commissioners under the Disabled Drivers and Disabled Passengers Scheme.

Question:

What can I do if I need representation in a Civil Law Court Case, but I can't afford to hire a solicitor or barrister?.

Answer:

You may be able to get civil legal aid, if you meet certain requirements. This type of aid gives legal representation in non—criminal cases. Examples include: - Separation, divorce, maintenance or child custody proceedings, or disputes about contracts or hire—purchase agreements.

For you to qualify, The Legal Aid Board must be satisfied that your case is legitimate and advisable. You must also pass a means test, having disposable income of less than €18,000, and disposable capital of less than €320,000 (this does not include your home). In calculating disposable income, deductions are allowed for expenses such as childcare, dependants, accommodation and other items.

Unlike legal aid in criminal cases, civil legal aid is not free of charge. If you qualify, you will have to make some contribution towards the cost. Except in cases of extreme hardship, there is a minimum fee of €50. the minimum applies if your disposable income is less than €11,500 or if your only income is a social welfare payment.

If your disposable income is over €11,500, your contribution will be calculated as €50 plus one quarter of the difference between €11,500 and your disposable income. You may also have to pay a contribution based on a means test of your disposable capital. The actual cost of providing your legal services is also taken into account. Your local law centre can tell you the contribution that applies in your case. Local law centres are listed under Legal Aid Board in the phone book.

If you simply want to seek legal advice at this stage, rather than a solicitor or barrister to represent you in court, the same means test applies, but the required contribution will be between €10 and €150

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Maynooth Citizens Information Centre—Know Your Rights

If your application for legal aid or legal advice is refused, you may appeal the decision.

There are a number of areas that are not covered by civil legal aid, including defamation claims, land disputes, conveyancing, and matters covered by Small Claims procedure.

Question:

I am having difficulty meeting some of my bills after Christmas. Where can I get help? Answer:

The Money Advice and Budgeting Service (MABS) provide support to people who need help and advice in coping with debt problems. It provides confidential advice free of charge.

MABS money advisors can help you to assess your financial situation, and make a budget plan for the future and deal with your creditors.

You can access the service in a number of ways. There are 65 MABS offices around the country which provide a face-to-face service. You can find their addresses and contact details on the website or by phoning the helpline.

The MABS national helpline number is Lo-call: 1890-283-438 or (1890 BUDGET) and operates Monday to Friday from 9.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m.

March in the Garden



It's March. Depending on where you live, the weather can be a lovely, early spring opportunity to get out in the garden and get to work. One thing is sure, it's no time to dawdle because there's plenty to do this month.

Caution is the keyword this month. It may look warm and inviting, but unless you live in the lower latitudes, you could be courting disaster if you try to plant before your last frost date. Suit the work to the weather.

If you haven't been monitoring it, turn your compost pile now. Dampen it and begin turning it regularly to get it to heat up so you can enjoy the production of good compost faster. If you haven't started a compost pile, start one this month.

Deal with pests now. A lime sulphur spray is organic and protects against scales, mites, and borers on fruit trees, roses, and shrubs as well as black spot and powdery mildew. It's a dormant spray, so apply before the middle of the month when many plants begin to bud out. (Protect your house; it can spot brick, stucco, and leave spots on paint.) After they begin to bud, a Bordeaux mixture of copper dust can be used. Always use any compound—organic or otherwise—cautiously according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Get those weeds while they are little. Use a flame gun to spot kill weeds while they are small or pull by hand. Vinegar or boiling water will also works to kill weeds and won't leave problems behind. Avoid using salt, because it will ruin the soil.

If you haven't already planned your season's plantings, do it now. Take advantage of companion planting that can strengthen and reinforce plant vigour while repelling pests. For example, nasturtiums and marigolds repel white flies and aphids.

March is the best time to make corrections and improvements to lawns including reseeding. Adding a layer of compost mixed with wood ash can reinvigorate poor soil and cut down on moss. Build a cold frame to acclimatise seedlings and tender plants to ready them for transplant in April and May. Finish other structural projects like trellises before planting.


Plant early spring vegetables and flowers. These include spinach, lettuces, peas, and leeks as well as sweet peas.

Depending on your region, early spring is also a good time to divide and transplant if the soil isn't too wet. Re-spacing existing favourites can give them extra wiggle room to get bigger and healthier.


Mulch early bulbs especially if you live in less temperate areas where freezing temperatures hang on.

Dahlia tubers stored last fall can be started late in the month. Lay on a bed of sand and begin watering. (Avoid over watering and too much warmth.)

Prune roses just before they start to bud out.



If you've not pondered the idea, you might consider getting some chickens. March is the ideal month to brood a few chicks (check local planning for numbers allowed in your area) to raise hens for egg laying, bug catching, and weeding. (You'll need to keep them out of your tender plants though.)



HEAVEN'S GOT ANOTHER STAR



Joe Dolan was born in Mullingar, County Westmeath. The youngest of eight, his Father died when he was 8 and his Mother when he was 15. Joe was left at home with brother Ben, as the rest of the family had either emigrated or settled down. On Ben's advice, Joe started work as an apprentice newspaper compositor with the local newspaper, the Westmeath Examiner.

The Dolan household was always noted for music, Joe was to be seen in those early days playing the washboard accompanying his sisters' singing in the house. Indeed, it was no surprise that Joe and Ben decided to put a band together and play the local dancehall circuit.

Joe finished his apprenticeship with the Westmeath Examiner and decided to embark on a fulltime career in the music business. If the Band didn't work out he'd always have his skill to fall back on. The Drifters Showband was formed and Joe was the Guitarist and Lead Singer.

It was 1964, Joe cut his first record an old Del Shannon song called "The Answer To Everything", which answered his prayers by shooting straight to the No.4 spot in the Irish Charts. He was on a roll, hit followed hit, "I Love You More And More Everyday", "My Own Peculiar Way", "Aching Breaking Heart", "Pretty Brown Eyes", "Tar And Cement", "The House With The Whitewashed Gable", "Love Of The Common People", and "The Westmeath Bachelor". The rest, as they say, is history.

Joe was taken ill at his home in Foxrock, Christmas Night and died just after 3pm St. Stephen's Day from a suspected brain haemorrhage.

Joe passed away peacefully surrounded by his family and friends.

He was buried after funeral mass in Walshestown Cemetary, just outside his hometown of Mullingar.

Rats make good homemakers who are always willing



The 25th Anniversary Of An infamous Act The Kidnapping of Shergar

n the evening of Feb 12th 1982, a number of vehicles, driven by armed masked men entered the gates of Ballymany Stud near Newbridge Co. Kildare. The stud farm, owned by the Aga Khan, housed the dual Derby winner, the brilliant Shergar, who was in the infancy of his stud career. The gates were unguarded as this was a different Ireland than we have today. The vehicles drove through the darkness up a long winding drive to a small cluster of barns and cottages at the centre of the stud. At least two armed men knocked on the door of the house belonging to Jim Fitzgerald, the head groom at Ballymany. Bernard, Jim's son, opened the door to be greeted by masked men armed with automatic pistols. Having pushed

their way into the living room they immediately intimidated the other six members of the family. Jim, hearing the commotion came running from another part of the house and was also taken captive. The father and son were taken to the stallion barn and forced at gunpoint to identify Shergar. The horse was loaded into a horsebox and Jim was taken as a hostage to be released four hours later somewhere along the Naas dual carriageway. The horse was never seen alive again.

Jim Fitzgerald advised the Gardai that the kidnappers had requested a two million pound ransom for the safe return of the horse. This ransom demand was repeated two days later by a phone call to Ghislain Drion, who looked after the Aga Khan's interests in Ireland. His owner had syndicated Shergar

for ten million pounds and thirty-four individuals took up the shares offered. The names of the shareholders represented "a who's who" of racing. Captain Tim Rogers and John Magnier from Ireland, Lord Derby and Lord Howard de Walden from the UK and Paul Mellon and John Gaines from the United States. With so many people involved there was always going to be difficulties in getting agreement as to how the matter should be handled. There was no clear idea who was involved. There was little evidence available as to who carried out the abduction of the horse. It was reported at the time

that initial Garda and Special Branch investigations indicated that it was not an IRA operation. It was also reported that His Highness, the Aga Khan, as spiritual leader of his people, had powerful enemies who would have had motive to commit the crime. One who stood up and identified himself was Wayne Murty, an American who had purchased the Boussac Estate including fifty-six horses from Marcel Boussac. Later, a French court declared elements of the sale invalid and the Aga Khan ended up with the horses. Wayne Murty was livid and freely admitted, at the time, he was prepared to get justice from His Highness. He denied involvement in the kidnap and no evidence was ever produced linking him with those who kidnapped Shergar.

The sheer number of shareholders involved put a block on attaining agreement on how the matter of ransom money was to be dealt with. Lord Derby in particular was not in favour of making such a

payment. It was reported at the time that Superintendent Jimmy Murphy, the Senior Garda in charge of the operation, did not get the full disclosure of information or full co-operation from a number of parties involved. Despite the thousands of words written and claims of some journalists to have contact with people on the "inside" of the abduction, the trail went cold. The expert opinion now is that the horse was probably slain within days of his kidnap. Expert opinion also states some elements of an IRA gang helped a group of criminals to carry out this crime. Someone knows where he lies. It is hoped that a day will come when his remains will be finally laid to rest in the green pastures of Kildare, marked by a granite headstone where all good racing men can meet and reflect on the

proceeded to Ireland ten days later to do my final studies at his home at the Aga Khan's Ballymany Stud. He was such a pleasant horse that when the stud manager, Monsieur Drion had brought him out of his stall, he allowed my wife Martha to come up and stroke his head and muzzle. He loved the attention. When we arrived earlier that day at the farm and looked in on Shergar, Monsieur Drion's two young sons were in the stall with him. I have never seen a young stallion just out of training so gentle and friendly. He would be one of the most memorable commissions that I ever undertook".

Maynooth Tidy Towns

It's March already and Maynooth Tidy Towns is gearing up with activities as the grass and weeds are growing and litter has gathered in the usual black spots because nobody has removed it over the winter months. Here are some of the things that we are getting up this month.

St. Patrick's Day Parade

We have taken part in the parade for many years and it is a good opportunity to highlight our voluntary work and indeed environmental issues in general. We have been a regular prize-winner for our float and in 2008 our message is "Make Maynooth Great in 2008". This year is the fiftieth anniversary of the "National Tidy Towns Competition" and the St. Patrick's Day Parade will be the first occasion that we will be celebrating Maynooth's participation in the competition, honouring the local people who have kept the Tidy Towns ideal alive in a place which has changed very significantly in the period.

National Tree Week 3-7th March

Much recognition has been given to Maynooth over the years for the wonderful wide Main Street with the mature trees. Unfortunately, more recently new trees planted by residents and others in Maynooth have been vandalised. Despite this trees must be planted and "National Tree Week" is a time to consider the possibility of planting new trees in your area. If you do so make sure to check that they are appropriate for where you are planting and of course try to protect them from both human and weather damage. Maynooth Tidy Towns will be planting trees in the town and we will give more details next month.

Cleaning up is ongoing

Maynooth Tidy Towns' members spend a significant amount of time removing litter from areas not serviced by Kildare County Council and in other areas where there is a litter collection service but only on certain days of the week. Last year (and more than likely this year) at the peak summer period when the judging for the national competition was happening we collected litter on two evening a week and on a Sunday morning. Whilst our main priority is enhancement projects they would count for little if we did not involve ourselves in maintenance as well. Whilst we know that many people work away quietly in their own areas and this is appreciated, we have arranged two clean up days in March and you would be most welcome to join us for whatever time that you can give, details as follows:

Saturday March 8th - Meet at Supervalu Car Park at 9am

Friday March 21st (Good Friday) - Meet at St. Mary's Boys School at 9am

April is "National Spring Clean" month which is run by "An Taisce" on behalf of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government. Maynooth Tidy Towns would encourage residents associations, schools and other groups to organise special cleanups in your area during April. You can contact on "An Taisce" who will provide bags and other equipment to help you with this work.

Maynooth doing well but could do better

See below a table showing the summary results on how Maynooth scored in the National Tidy Towns Competition 2007. In many of the categories we are only achieving half or less of the available marks. For example Maynooth only scored thirty out of fifty points available for Litter Control or seven out of twenty for waste minimisation. There are two ways in which you can help:

- 1. If you are running projects that would benefit Maynooth in the competition please let us know and we will include it in our presentation to the judges. One example might be a waste minimisation scheme that your business or group has put in place.
- 2. Another way that you could help would be if you could assist us to develop projects around judging categories and we could work on them together. An example might be the devising of wildlife and natural amenities project on your property or in your residential area.

St. Patrick's Day & Easter Recipes

S aint Patrick's Porter Cake

Ingredients

- 450g / 1lb Cream Plain Flour
- Pinch of Salt
- 1 level teaspoon Baking Powder
- 1 level teaspoon Mixed Spice
- 225g / 8oz Sugar
- 225g / 8oz Butter
- 375g Packet of Sultanas
- 100g Carton Candied Peel
- 300ml / 1/4 pint Guinness (Porter)
- 2 Eggs (beaten)

Method

- 1. Preheat oven 180°C/350°F/Gas 4.
- 2. Line a 20cm/8" round cake tin with greaseproof paper.
- 3. Sieve the flour, salt, baking powder and mixed spice into a bowl and add the sugar.
- 4. Rub in the butter and add the fruit and mix.
- Add the porter to the beaten eggs and add to fruit mixture.
- 6. Mix well.
- 7. Transfer to the prepared tin and bake for approximately 2 hours.
- 8. Place on a low shelf position in the oven.
- If browning too quickly cover with greaseproof paper.

aster Egg Cakes

Ingredients

- 1 packet Quick Cake Mix Plain or Chocolate
- Up to 225g of leftover Easter Egg (broken into pieces)
- Any Smarties or Buttons or chopped Mars Bars!

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Put paper cases in the bun tins.
- Prepare mixture as per instructions. Finally, stir in the broken Easter egg and sweets. If liked some sweets may be placed on top of buns before baking!

airy-Free Chocolate Cake

Ingredients

- 200g/7oz Cream Plain Flour
- 175g/6oz Sugar
- 2 tablespoons Cocoa
- 1 teaspoon Bread Soda
- 5 tablespoons Sunflower Oil
- 1 teaspoon White or Cider Vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Vanilla Essence
- 225ml/8 fluid oz Water

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Lightly grease a 19cm/8" round cake tin and line the base with greaseproof paper.
- 2. Put the flour and sugar into a mixing bowl, sieve in the cocoa and bread soda and mix well.
- 3. In a small bowl, beat the oil, vinegar, vanilla essence and water.
- 4. Add the liquid to the dry ingredients and mix until well blended. Immediately transfer to the prepared tin.
- 5. Bake for about 40 minutes until 'firm' to the touch and well risen.
- 6. Allow to cool in the tin for about 15 minutes, then transfer to a wire tray.
- 7. Serve warm with cream or ice cream.

pen Fruit & Apple Pie

Ingredients

- 275g / 10oz Cream Plain Flour
- 150g / 5oz Margarine
- 5-6 tablespoons cold water

Filling

- 4 Eating Apples and Mixed Berries
- 50g/2oz Brown Sugar
- 2 teaspoons Ground Cinnamon
- Grated Rind and Juice of 1 Lemon
- 25g / 1oz Butter
- 3 tablespoons Honey

Method

1. Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6 and lightly grease a 23cm/9" pie dish.

- 2. Sieve the flour into a bowl, add the margarine and rub in until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs.
- 3. Stir in just enough cold water to bring to a dough. Form into a ball, wrap in Clingfilm and leave in the fridge for approx 20 minutes.
- 4. Peel core and slice the apples. Combine the sugar and cinnamon in a bowl, add the apples, mixed berries, lemon rind and juice and stir.
- 5. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to a circle about 30cm /12" in diameter. Transfer to the prepared dish, leaving the dough hanging over the edge. Fill with the apple mixture.
- 6. Fold in the edges and crimp loosely for a decorative effect. Dot the apples with diced butter.
- 7. Bake in the centre of the oven until the pastry is golden and apples are tender, approx 45 minutes.
- 8. Melt the honey in a saucepan and brush over the apples to glaze. Delicious served warm with vanilla ice cream or custard.

Quick Baked Cheesecake

Ingredients

- 75g/3oz Cream Flour
- 125g/4oz Brown Sugar
- Pinch of Cinnamon
- 4 Eggs
- 75g/4oz Ground Almonds
- 225ml/8 fl oz Soured Cream
- 225g/8 oz Cream Cheese
- 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier & Rind of 1 Orange

Method

- 1. Liberally grease a 23cm/9" spring-form cake tin and sprinkle the base with the sugar mixed with cinnamon and half the orange rind.
- 2. Put eggs, ground almonds, flour, soured cream, cream cheese, 2 tablespoons of Grand Marnier and the remaining orange rind into a food processor and count to 20 while blending!
- 3. Pour into the tin and bake in a pre-heated oven at 180°C/350°F/Gas 4 for 40 minutes approximately until set. As this is quite a runny mixture, it is best to place the cake tin on a baking tray in the oven.
- 4. When baked, carefully remove from tin. Serve warm or cold.

At first, its easy to overlook the CD or DVD burner in your computer. Modern DVD writers can be used to create a wide range of disc types. You can, for instance, create DVD video disc of your own home movies or convert old video tape recordings to DVDs. And don't forget that all DVD burners can record to blank CDs too, making them perfect for putting together music compilations or for converting your record and tape collection to audio CD or MP3 format.

On top of that CDs and DVDs can be used to store virtually any kind of data you want to put on to them - whether you're backing up important documents, photos and other files or you just want to transport data from one PC to another.

CRACKING THE CODE

To start creating CD and DVD discs, you'll need to purchase some blank discs. Annoyingly, though, CDs and DVDs come in a bewildering number of formats, and both blank media and disc drives are often labelled with unhelpful jargon. We'll explain the various types available, and the advantages of each.

There are two types of recordable CD, each capable of holding around 700MB of data. This equates to around 400 high-resolution photos or 140 songs

stored in the compressed MPs format. On a CD-R disc the R stands for "recordable". CD-R discs are sold blank and you can record to them once. A CD-RW disc, where RW stands for "rewritable", can be written to (recorded to) over and over again. DVD discs can hold far more than CDs but they come in many more formats. Like CDs recordable and rewritable, DVDs are labelled with the letters R, for recordable, and RW, for rewritable. They all hold around 4.7 GB of files – that's enough for around 2,000 photos.

PLUS POINTS

The key difference with DVDs is denoted by a plus (+) or minus (-) symbol. These show which of the two types of recordable DVDs, invented by two different companies, a disc or writer is compatible with. So, a DVD format's name is split into three parts. Taking "DVD+RW" as an example, the DVD indicates that it is a DVD, the "+"means it is in the plus format and the "RW" shows

that it is a **rewritable** disc.

Pick DVD discs that use the same format as the writer in your made over the past three or four + and -DVD discs, but check the symbol on the front of the CD drive.

create DVD video disc of computer. The majority of computers your own home movies or convert old video tape years have writers that support both recordings to DVDs.

Recently, DVD disc types have been made more confusing by the arrival of **double-layer** discs. These discs can store up to 8.5 GB of files. Double-layer versions of DVD+R and DVD-R discs are available. Double-layer discs are indicated by the letters "DL ", so a DVD+R DL disc is a double-layer,+ format, writable DVD. Double-Layer discs are ideal for storing extremely large files, such as video footage, but to use them you'll need a compatible DVD writer.

If your DVD writer does not support double-layer discs and you really need to store large amounts of data, the simplest option is to add a new, external double-layer drive External drives that connect to a USB port cost as little as €35.



Face



Maynooth Labour News

Provision of a Teenage Play Facility at the Harbour Field, Maynooth

When Cllr. John McGinley secured funding for the existing Children's Playground in the Harbour Field three years ago he was given a commitment by Council officials that the development of a Teenage Play Facility would follow. In mid 2007 the Council undertook consultation with the Chairperson of Maynooth Playground Action Group, Deirdre Bristow, and her Committee. Deirdre and her Committee undertook consultation with teenagers in the local schools to ascertain the play elements that should be included in the provision of such a facility. The elements requested as a result of this consultation were youth shelters, mini all weather facility for basketball & football, monkey bars, lookout posts and climbing rock. These elements have now been included in plans that will go on public display shortly as part of the Planning process. It is hoped to begin construction on the €140,000 project in the summer.

Cllr. John McGinley would like to warmly thank Deirdre and her Committee for all of the work they put in to make the project a success.

Provision of a Fit Zone in the Harbour Field, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following response to his motion to provide such a facility in the Harbour Field:

"It is proposed that the exercise area for the Harbour Field can be located adjacent to the site for the teen play area. The design for the area will be based on the layout used in Dunshaughlin Park, which involves the provision of three semi circular areas with three pieces of equipment per area. The semi circular areas will be surfaced with safety rubber surfacing and an access path to the areas will also be provided. The cost of the Dunshaughlin Fit Zone was $\[\in \]$ 50,000 and it is estimated that the cost of providing the facility in the Harbour Field will be $\[\in \]$ 50-60.000."

Council Officials advised Cllr. John McGinley that a source of funding needed to be identified and as a result John has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That the proposed Fit Zone exercise area in the Harbour Field, Maynooth be funded from the €377,000 allocated to Community & Enterprise under the Supplementary Budget adopted at the Monthly Meeting on 28 January 2008. The €50,000 to €60,000 estimated cost can be used as matching funding as the Mid East Regional Authority have paid for the exercise equipment."

Safety Measures at Boys National School

At the request of the Parent Teacher Association Cllr. John McGinley has allocated money from his Discretionary Grants in order to install black decorative bollards on the footpath adjacent to the Moyglare Road. (In order to prevent cars from parking on the footpath). John has been advised that the Council will do their best to install them on 14/15 February when the school is closed.

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Cllr. John McGinley has also submitted the following motions for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That traffic signals or preferably a roundabout be put in place at the junction of the Straffan Road and the new Meadowbrook Link Road in the interest of public safety."

"What steps are being taken to replace the 9 trees that were vandalised on the Meadowbrook Link Road, Maynooth?"

"That the Back Lane, Maynooth, be resurfaced from 1 Leinster Cottages to 28 Leinster Cottages, as it is in a very dangerous condition as a result of numerous diggings for construction work."

MINISTER ASSURES STAGG THAT NEW PRIMARY SCHOOL IN MAYNOOTH WILL NOT AFFECT PROPOSED EXTENSION TO MAYNOOTH BOYS N.S.

On foot of the news of the New Primary School for Maynooth, Deputy Emmet Stagg sought assurances from the Minister for Education that the New School would not affect the agreement to provide an Extension to St. Mary`s Boy`s National School in Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg stated that Maynooth Boy's N.S. had 440 pupils at present with 17 classrooms and that an extension comprising 8 additional classrooms had been agreed between the school and the Department to relieve overcrowding.

The Minister has advised Deputy Stagg that 'The proposal to open a further primary school in Maynooth will not affect the planned expansion of this existing school (Maynooth B.N.S.) to a 24 classroom school'.

Welcoming this assurance from the Minister Deputy Stagg stated that the parents of pupils attending Maynooth B.N.S. will be relieved at the Ministers commitment.

Whilst Capital Funding was not provided by the Minister for the Extension in her initial announcement of the School Building Programme on Friday 1st February Deputy Stagg stated that a further tranche of projects will be given the go-ahead after Easter and he vowed to keep the pressure on the Minister to sanction capital for the extension to St. Mary`s Boy`s National School.

TWO ADDITIONAL EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGISTS TO BE ASSIGNED TO KILDARE PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to question the Minister for Education in relation to the provision of additional Educational Psychologists to National Schools in Co. Kildare.

At present stated Deputy Stagg only 50% of National School`s in the County have a direct service with the remainder of schools being covered under the Scheme for Commissioning Private Assessments.

The Minister for Education has now advised Deputy Stagg that two Educational Psychologists appointed in December have now been assigned to the Kildare Service and following the requisite induction and work shadowing process they will be assigned to schools within Kildare shortly.

Deputy Stagg has welcomed the provision of additional Educational Psychologists to Kildare Primary Schools and has indicated that he will continue his campaign until all Primary Schools in Co. Kildare had a direct service because the service provided by the Psychologists was critical in improving and helping children with learning difficulties.

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NEW MAYNOOTH AMBULANCE BASE EXPECTED TO BE IN OPERATION IN APRIL 2008

Deputy Emmet Stagg contacted the HSE in relation to the delay in relocating the Maynooth Ambulance Base to the Unit specifically purchased for its use in the Maynooth Business Campus.

The HSE have advised Deputy Stagg that a Revised Fire Certificate is expected from Kildare Co. Council within the next fortnight. The HSE further advised Deputy Stagg that the plan for the interior adaptations to the Unit have been agreed and costed and all being well with the Fire Certificate work on the adaptation of the Unit will commence later this month with an expected completion date in March/April.

The new Site, stated Deputy Stagg, is excellent given its location near the M4, the direct access it affords to all parts of Maynooth and its proximity to Celbridge, Leixlip, Clane, Straffan and Kilcock which are served from Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg concluded by stating that the area would shortly have the most Modern Standard for an Ambulance Station with better facilities for Paramedics working with the Ambulance Service.

WATER LEVY ON PRIMARY PUPILS IS NOTHING BUT A STEALTH TAX – STAGG

Reacting to the decision by The Government to impose water Levies on Primary School Pupils between 2007 and 2009 with full commercial cost being applied in 2010, Deputy Emmet Stagg has stated that The Government has a Statutory Responsibility to provide a Primary Education for all the Children of the Nation and attendance is compulsory.

They also, stated Deputy Stagg, have a bounden duty to provide funding for the costs involved in running Primary Schools and this should be provided from general taxation funds available abundantly to the Government. This must cover not only the teacher's salaries but the cost of heating, maintenance, insurance, electricity and cleaning and most essentially a supply of clean water for use by the children and staff.

Before the Election last May, Fianna Fail promised to double the capitation grants available for the above costs to School Management Boards – instead they increased the grants for inflation purposes only and now they want to worsen the position by clawing back €3-50 per pupil in 2008 in the form of a stealth tax (New Water Charges).

'I call on F.F. to now live up to their undertaking and make the money available. The days of depending on Charity and cakesale's to fund essential services such as Education should be long past. Parents pay their taxes and are entitled to have services provided'.

STAGG SLAMS SCANDALOUS WAITING TIMES FOR ASSESSMENT FOR OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Deputy Emmet Stagg has slammed the Government over recently disclosed fugure's which show that 496 people are awaiting assessment by an Occupational Therapist in Kildare while at the same time there are 8 vacant posts for Occupational Therapists left unfilled in the County.

Deputy Stagg stated that these are truly shocking figures that reveal the full impact of last years HSE embargo on the recruitment or replacement of staff and point to the urgent need for the early filling of all outstanding posts.

Occupational therapists play a vital role in assessing the needs of people with mobility problems. There are a whole range of services that will only be provided after an assessment by an OT has been done. Typically people needing assessment might be stroke victims, people with disabilities or elderly people recovering from the effects of a fall or those seeking approval for a Disabled Persons Grant.

The situation in regard to assessment by an OT has now reached such a stage that, in some cases, people are having to wait for over a year before being assessed and our Government – distracted by their appearances at Tribunals – don`t seem to give a damn.

I understand that there was a national recruitment campaign for occupational therapists in the early part of last year. More than 180 applicants were interviewed and a panel of 150 was established. Most of these posts were never filled and were put on hold because of the recruitment embargo. The result of this is that there are now 183 vacant OT posts nationally, with shortages in every HSE area.

This has been the reality of the HSE recruitment embargo. While Minister Harney and Prof. Drumm denied that the embargo caused any suffering for patients, the reality on the ground is very different.

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The reality is needless pain and suffering for elderly people and others with mobility problems – suffering that is still continuing.

REPLACEMENT AUDIOLOGIST TO BE HIRED SHORTLY TO ASSIST IN REDUCING WAITING TIMES FOR HEARING TESTS FOR CHILDREN

Deputy Emmet Stagg has continued to pressurise the HSE in relation to the unacceptable Waiting Times for Hearing Tests for Children in Co. Kildare.

The Waiting Time for a Test in Newbridge and Tallaght Health Centres is at present 3 to 6 months for initial testing and it can take 3 further months for the actual fitting of a hearing aid. Compared with the situation in June 2006 when additional clinics were scheduled and waiting times had been reduced to 3 to 4 weeks, Deputy Stagg described the present position as a disgrace given the damage caused to children in their development by hearing difficulties.

The HSE have now advised Deputy Stagg that they intend to advertise for a Replacement Audiologist in the coming weeks and that when this person is recruited the option of additional clinics will be reviewed to help reduce waiting times.

Whilst welcoming this move Deputy Stagg stated that last October the HSE indicated that they would be advertising for an Audiologist as soon as possible. Why it has taken 3 months to advertise for the post is to say the least puzzling but was probably as a result of HSE cutbacks forced on them by the Government.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg vowed to continue to raise the issue of waiting times for children with the HSE until improvements were made.

ADDITIONAL SPEECH AND LANGUAGE THERAPISTS TO BE MADE PERMANENT

Following on from the successful campaign to hire 3 additional Speech and Language Therapists for the Kildare Area on Temporary contracts Deputy Emmet Stagg raised the issue of making the posts permanent with the Minister for Health.

The HSE have responded to Deputy Stagg indicating that due to operational issues and in terms of priority being given to the speech and language service a decision was taken to fill the posts on an interim basis by way of temporary contracts. The HSE further advised Deputy Stagg that it is their intention to fill

these posts on a permanent basis at the earliest opportunity and subject to a derogation under the current employment controls process.

Welcoming the commitment to make the posts permanent Deputy Stagg stated that Government neglect of the Speech and Language Therapy Service in Kildare through the imposition of staff ceilings had led to a waiting list of 20 months for children to even get an assessment.

Deputy Stagg indicated that he would continue to monitor progress on making the posts permanent and he also intended to seek additional speech and language therapists for Kildare which were promised last October.

GARDA COMMISSIONER REFERS STAGG`S CALL FOR 24 HOUR GARDA STATION FOR NORTH KILDARE TO BOARD OVERSEEING CHANGES IN DIVISIONAL BOUNDARIES

The Garda Commissioner Fachtna Murphy has responded to Deputy Emmet Stagg`s correspondence making the case for the provision of a 24 Hour Garda Station for North Kildare covering the Towns of Celbridge, Leixlip, Maynooth and Kilcock, who have a combined population of 50,033 people.

The Garda Commissioner advised Deputy Stagg that the issues raised will be brought to the attention of the Programme Board that he has established to oversee the boundary revisions outlined in the Garda Siochana Policing Plan 2008.

Welcoming the move Deputy Stagg stated that the Board who will oversee the creation of the New Garda Division for the County of Kildare will now look at the operation and effectiveness of the Force in the Revised Division. They will want to ensure that the North Kildare area has adequate 24 hour cover given the huge geographical area which Naas Divisional Headquarters has to cope with. Naas is also at a distance from the North Kildare Area and Deputy Stagg is convinced that a 24 Hour Station is required to cover Celbridge, Leixlip, Maynooth and Kilcock Towns.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that New Division is likely to be created by this Summer and all going well the case made by Deputy Stagg for the 24 Hour Station will arrive at a successful conclusion.

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STAGG CALLS FOR ADDITIONAL GARDA RESOURCES TO TACKLE SERIOUS CRIME INCREASE IN KILDARE – UP 12% ON 2006

Deputy Emmet Stagg has called for the provision of additional Garda Resources for Kildare following the release of the Provisional Headline Crime Statistics for the Carlow/Kildare Division for 2007 which show an increase in Serious Crime of 12% in 2007 compared to 2006.

This increase of 12% stated Deputy Stagg compares very unfavourably with a 2% increase Nationally in the same period. Also worryingly the 2007 figure is up 94% on the number of serious crime incidents recorded in 2000.

Some of the key areas where increases and deceases occurred in the Carlow/Kildare Division are as follows:

- Aggravated Burglary up 78%
- Theft from Private Motor Vehicles up 11%
- Burglaries up 8%
- Theft from shops up 7%
- Arson up 75%
- Assault causing harm down 12%
- Robbery of Establishments down 18%.

There was 1 murder in 2006 and 3 in 2007

Deputy Stagg stated that the Gardai in the Carlow/ Kildare Division are doing their best but they are seriously undermanned with the worst ratio of Gardai to people in the State at 1 garda for every 558 people. This compares with the Clare Division which has 1 Garda for every 311 people and the Donegal Division with 1 Garda for every 312 people.

If we are to tackle this serious increase in Crime which is against the National Trend then more Gardai must be assigned to our area.

Deputy Stagg concluded that the creation of the New Kildare Garda Division by Summer 2008 and the provision of a 24 hour Garda Station in North Kildare gives us the opportunity to resolve our manpower and infrastructural deficiencies and he insisted that his campaign for the 24 hour station in North Kildare would continue.

INITIAL 2008 SCHOOL BUILDING PROGRAMME BRINGS LITTLE JOY

The announcement by the Minister for Education of the First Phase of her 2008 School Building Programme brings little joy to the Pupils, Teachers and Parents of Primary Schools throughout North Kildare, stated Deputy Emmet Stagg.

The only announcement's in relation to North Kildare stated Deputy Stagg comprises the provision of as expected a Temporary Educate Together School at Railpark, Maynooth comprising an 8 Classroom prefabricated building and the relocation of St. Patrick's National School in Celbridge from the Old St. Wolstan's Secondary School to a 16 classroom prefabricated building at Celbridge G.A.A. Grounds on the Hatch Road. There is also provision for a New 8 Classroom School in Naas and the location of same has as yet to be decided I am informed by the Department of Education.

There is nothing stated Deputy Stagg confirming Capital Allocations in relation to the following projects:

- The New School for Kill
- The New School for Ardclough
- The Permanent Building for Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich in Maynooth
- The Required Extension to Scoil Choca Naofa in Kilcock
- The Required Extension to St. Mary`s Boy`s National School in Maynooth.

The Required Extension to Scoil Phadraig in Clane.

Deputy Stagg stated that the Minister indicated today that she expects to make a further announcement after Easter in relation to other Building Projects and he vowed to continue to apply pressure on the Minister to ensure that the above projects were included for Capital Funding in 2008.

New energy-saving tax incentive for Business

January 31, 2008

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick together with Energy Minister Eamon Ryan welcomed the introduction in the Finance Bill published today of a new scheme aimed at supporting investment in new energy-saving equipment by companies.

Section 42 of the Finance Bill introduces a new section into the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997. Capital allowances of 100% of the cost will be available to those companies investing in high energy-efficient equipment.

Expenditure on high energy-efficient equipment above a minimum figure in the three categories listed below will qualify for 100% accelerated capital allowances in the year of purchase.

Equipment covered by this incentive:	Min. expenditure amount		
Building Energy Management Systems	€5,000		
Lighting	€3,000		
Motors and Drives	€1,000		

This new tax incentive will encourage business to invest in energy-saving equipment. The scheme allows businesses to write off the whole cost of designated equipment against taxable profits in the year of purchase.

Investing in energy-saving equipment will reduce annual running costs through increased efficiency and lower energy bills every year for the lifetime of the equipment. It is also a straightforward way for business to improve its cash flow through accelerated tax relief.

In welcoming this new incentive, Deputy Fitzpatrick said, "Irish businesses face serious competitiveness challenges in the marketplace. Reducing energy costs is a key factor in improving Ireland's competitiveness."

Also speaking as a new member of the Committee on Environment, Heritage and Local Government, I have become acutely aware that saving energy is also one of the quickest and cheapest ways to reduce carbon emissions. Currently, we use far more energy than is required. This scheme will assist the business community in becoming more energy conscious and in reducing their overall environmental impact.

Now, businesses wishing to improve their cash flow, save in long-term energy costs and reduce their carbon emissions can do so in one fell swoop by availing of this new incentive.

It's good news for the environment, for competitiveness and for the bottom line."

Please note:

The list of equipment will be established, and may be amended, by order of the Minister for Communications, Energy and Natural Resources. Sustainable Energy Ireland will be responsible for maintaining the list.

The scheme will be confined to new energy-efficient equipment purchased by companies and will not apply to equipment that is leased, let or hired.

In order to facilitate the transfer of the SHAE scheme from the HSE to

The Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, the

Department introduced, in November 2007, a new scheme of Housing Aid for

Older People with the aim of providing targeted support to improve the housing conditions of older people.

A transfer date of the end March 2008 was set, but has been postponed and the SHAE Scheme will continue to operate, and be administered by the HSE, until such time as all outstanding issues are resolved.

According to Deputy Fitzpatrick. "It is essential that the needs of our older community are not compromised in any way as a result of the transfer".

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

Quality Bus Corridors should be available for Special School Transport says Brady

Deputy Aine Brady has suggested that the Quality Bus Corridors should be available to Hackneys/Cabs, that are employed by Bus Eireann, to transport Special Needs Children to Special Schools.

'I have come across an example where 4-5 children with special needs are being transported by Hackneys/Cabs to Special Schools and they are not allowed use the Bus Lanes. In effect children are spending hours in traffic every week and I believe that we should allow the use of the Bus Lanes for this specific form of transport.'

'Quality Bus Corridors are a key piece of Infrastructure to improve the efficiency of Public Transport and I do not want to negatively effect the capacity of these Bus Lanes. However, given the small number of vehicles involved, allowing Hackneys, CABs, employed by Bus Eireann use the Bus Lanes would not in view, and from the information that I have received, negatively effect the performance of the lanes.'

"Given the children's special needs, the long time that they are spending in traffic and the fact that Hackneys/ Cabs are the most cost effective way of bringing the children to school, we should give this group Bus Lane Priority.' concluded Deputy Brady who has also requested that the Minister for Transport to investigate such a proposal.

Speed Tables suggested on the Rathcoffey Road

Deputy Aine Brady has suggested that Kildare Co. Co. consider the installation of Speed Tables or Ramps close to the entrance of Castle Dawson and Parsons Hall given the speed of vehicles on this road.

'Over the last number of years, I have highlighted the speed on the Rathcoffey road and the need for measures to improve safety. New Speed Limits were introduced. There has been increased Garda Presence and I understand from the Gardai that further speed checks will be carried out in the coming weeks.' stated Deputy Brady.

'I have now asked Kildare Co. Co. to consider the installation of Speed Tables or a Ramp on this road to put a physical reminder to drivers to reduce speed.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Lands at Castletown, Celbridge, acquired by state says Brady

Deputy Aine Brady has been informed by Noel Ahern, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Finance with special responsibility for the Office of Public Works (OPW) that the OPW has now acquired, from Coillte, lands at Castleton, County Kildare. Deputy Brady was informed of the decision following regular contact with both the Minister and the OPW regarding Castletown Estate.

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"I welcome this announcement that the OPW have acquired the 100 acres of Woodland from Coillte. Since the re-opening of Castletown House to the public last July (2007) a large number of events have taken place and we have witnessed over twenty five thousand visitors enjoying the new and improved facilities.' stated Deputy Brady who praised all those involved in the restoration works.

'Following on the success of the restoration works to the main house and immediate surrounds, we can now begin implementing our stated aim of restoring the landscaped demesne of parkland, woodland and riverscapes for the benefit of the people of Celbridge and of North Kildare. Castletown House is now a Tourist Attraction for the area and is an amenity that will benefit all North Kildare residents - especially in Celbridge.' concluded Deputy Brady who worked, with others, to ensure that Castleton Estate was brought back to public ownership.

New Maynooth Rail Services went Live says Brady. Deputy Aine Brady has reminded Rail Commuters on the Maynooth Line that new services officially went live on Monday 21st of January, who has campaigned, with others, for better rail services in recent years.

'New services on the ever-growing Maynooth line include a 06.38hrs Maynooth-Connolly; 08.10hrs Maynooth-Connolly (non-stop to Drumcondra), and extra evening services at 16.20hrs (from Connolly) and 19.29hrs (from Pearse).'

'Additional Sunday evening services will also operate.' stated Deputy Brady.

'Furthermore, Iarnód Éireann will also operate an additional 07.30hrs service from Connolly Station, serving all stations to Maynooth, and an 08.08hrs non-stop service from Connolly to Maynooth..' who raised the issue with Iarnrod Eireann following a request from staff and Students at NUI Maynooth that required to be in Maynooth for work at 9.00am.

'Some Trains on the Maynooth Rail Line will also be extended to 8 carriages following the transfer of carriages currently being used on the Sligo Line to improve capacity on the line.'

'As a user of Public Transport myself, I am firmly of the belief that once we have a reliable and frequent service, we will continue to attract more rail users. We have seen improvements in recent years and I am committed to working with all the stakeholders to see further improvements.' concluded Deputy Brady who has held meetings with OK Transport in an effort to get a Commuter Feeder Bus to Maynooth to alleviate the Car parking issue at Maynooth.

Mothering Sunday



othering Sunday, often called "Mothers' Day" in Ireland falls on the fourth Sunday of Lent (exactly three weeks before Easter Sunday). It is believed to have originated from the 16th century Christian practice of visiting one's mother church annually, which meant that most mothers would be reunited with their children on this day. Most historians believe that young apprentices and young women in servitude were released by their masters that weekend in order to visit their families. [1] As a result of seculariza-

tion, it is now principally used to celebrate and give thanks for mothers, although it is still recognized in the historical sense by some churches, with attention paid to Mary the mother of Jesus as well as the traditional concept 'Mother Church'

Men who adored their mothers

James Wilson Savile was born on Hallowe'en, 1926, the youngest of seven children born to Vincent Joseph Marie Savile and his wife, Agnes Monica Kelly, who were married in 1911 at St Cuthbert's Chapel, Lanchester, County Durham. Agnes was to play an important part her son's life; he called her "The Duchess" and continued to live with her up to and, somewhat bizarrely, five days after her death. Even today, her bedroom and wardrobe remain just as they were when she died, and her clothes are dry-cleaned each year.



JAMES McNEILL WHISTLER was an American artist, wit and society figure, who lived for most of his life in London and Paris. He trained as an artist in Paris in the studio of Charles Gleyre but his early work was inspired by the paintings of the Realist painter Gustave Courbet and by the work of older masters such as Velázquez, Rembrandt, and Thomas Gainsborough. Later he absorbed the influences of Japanese and classical art to create works that were decorative and virtually subjectless. He was one of the central figures in the Aesthetic Movement. He was a man who liked to live his life in the public eye and was very concerned about his personal appearance and the critical reception of his his paintings.

His most famous painting is that of his mother.

In 1934 the U.S. Post office issued a stamp engraved with a stylized image of "*Whistler's Mother*," accompanied by the slogan "In Memory and In Honour of the Mothers of America."
