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Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council Notes 12th January 2009

The first meeting of the Community Council in 2009 was a busy affair with a full agenda forwarded by a Presentation by Mr. Conor Mallaghan, Carton House, Maynooth.

Mr. Mallaghan's Presentation began by recounting a history of the Mallaghan family involvement with Carton House since 1977. He stated that Government were reticent to take over large country houses as there was a large cost involved in their maintenance. He stated that under the Mallaghan stewardship they addressed this economic challenge and are planning for an evolving demesne.

The current hotel and golf courses have all been developed in an environmentally responsible fashion. There are currently 290 people employed in Carton with the majority of employees living in Maynooth. Mr. Mallaghan reiterated that Carton is very aware of its role in the community and that there is public access to the walks within the demesne.

The current project and its manager Mr. Stepen Kilroy were then introduced to the Council. S.M.A.R.T. park is an anagram for South Meath Area Research Technology. While there are 1,100 acres in Carton the 60 acres earmarked for the Park lie in an environmentally insensitive' area within the County Meath boundary.

Mr. Mallaghan stated that the development of a SMART park is within the guidelines of The National Spatial Strategy, which promotes the clustering of resources in a specific area. Reference was made to the Knowledge Valley concept with a high value added component being Research and Development with the National University of Ireland Maynooth, Intel and The Department of Enterprise. He explained that 5 acres were being assigned to the R. & D. Dept. of N.U.I.M.. The plan involved an Innovation Centre, Research Centre, Sports Centre, Café, Academic Village and 80 residential units.

A question and answer session followed which raised the issue of infrastructural benefit to Maynooth from building levies. The meeting was informed that the two bad bends on the Maynooth to Dunboyne road would be rectified. The issue regarding the historical integrity of Carton as a resource to the people of Maynooth was seen as a vital component of any new plan. It was stated that Carton is internationally known as the Versailles of Ireland. Mr. Mallaghan confirmed his family's commitment in their stewardship of the Demense and that they saw themselves as part of Maynooth and wished to remain as active participants of the Maynooth Community. He reiterated the open gate policy of Carton, where Maynooth residents were welcome to enjoy the grounds and walks. The issue of ground services from the Park being treated by Kildare County Council was also raised. It was confirmed by the reps. that these would indeed fall under the remit of Kildare. A number of other issues were also raised but appeared to be capable of being resolved through further dialogue and communication.

Mr. Mallaghan and Mr. Kilroy were thanked for their presentation and praised for the upkeep of Carton Avenue. The Council will consider the project and welcome comments from Maynooth residents through The Newsletter or your estate or organisation's representative on Maynooth Community Council.

The meeting got under way and after the housekeeping was completed we addressed specific items on the agenda.

Saint Patrick's Day Parade.

Councillor John McGinley informed the meeting of the preparations underway for the St. Patrick's Day Parade. He gave guidance on the criteria for floats. They must be decorated and add to the spirit of the parade. Mr. Tom Mc Mullen made an appeal to the local schools to become involved. He said that it's a fun day and that a little bit of organisation by the Teachers and Parents would see great benefits deriving to their children who love to participate and represent their school publicly. The Presentation Girl's Primary School, St. Mary's Boy's National School, Gaelscoil Uí Fhiaich and Maynooth Post Primary have all participated in the past and are encouraged to make a special effort this year. A representation from the new Kildare Educate Together School would also be welcome. We especially look to M.P.P. Transition year for an imaginative float representing their year's work, from this year's musical to experiences gained by foreign travel, this would be an advertisement and endorsement of the hard work put into the transition year by the student's school staff and parents.

Planning and Development.

Ms. Deirdre Cullen gave an update on the progress of the Maynooth Development Plan. The Plan has been submitted to Kildare County Council. The Planning and Development Committee have also presented their submission to relevant stakeholders in the town. All four area Councillors in the electoral area are aware of the needs of the town as outlined in The Maynooth Area Development Plan. The committee convened a meeting with Monsignor Hugh Connolly, President of St. Patrick's College and areas of mutual interest were addressed. The Committee are to meet with representatives of The National University of Ireland Maynooth to present our Plan and to address areas of mutual interest.

The issue of parking in Maynooth remains a problem. Car parking proposals at Leinster Street are a cause of concern as access to emergency vehicles could be hindered, this proposal should not be seen as an alternative to proper parking in the town. Cllr. Mc Ginley informed the meeting that The Dublin Transport Authority is making a presentation at the Local Area Committee on the 16th of January 2009 entitled' transport interchange'.

Tidy Towns

Mr. Paul Croghan reported that Maynooth ranked well in this years I.B.A.L. results. The town held its ranking and that the overall result was well up on last years. A call was made to Maynooth residents to become involved in the work of Tidy Towns. This hard working group enhance the quality of life for everybody in Maynooth. In recent years Kildare County Council have significantly curtailed this level of service to Maynooth. The tidy towns have taken up the slack in this area and the wonderful state of the town is a testimony to their commitment and pride in Maynooth. We should look into Kildare adopting the new litter by- laws as proposed in Dublin making the business responsible for litter that comes from their premises.

Ms. Bríd Freely and the Maynooth Business Chamber were congratulated for the Christmas lights; they added greatly to the Christmas festive period and brightened up the town and its residents.

Newsletter

Thanks were expressed to Intel who are now involved in the publication of the Newsletter. We ask people to submit articles, features, news, deaths, births, marriages and social occasions. The Newsletter is also a great source of social history. It is a record of changing life on Maynooth and dates back to 1972. Resident association are to be encouraged to submit regular items for inclusion.

Maynooth Festival

The festival committee are to convene prior to the next executive meeting of the Maynooth Community Council.

This long running saga will become an election issue in the coming local elections in June. Despite Maynooth fulfilling all the criteria for the above status, Minister Gormley refuses to sign the relevant documentation giving statutory status to Maynooth. Gardening

Gardening in February

Flower garden

Deadheading

Winter and spring bedding plants tend to flower in phases depending on temperature. Play your part by keeping pansies, primulas and other plants regularly deadheaded. Pick off faded blooms to keep plants looking tidy and prevent them setting seed, which can reduce flowering performance.

Moving plants

This is also a good time to move shrubs or flowers to a new position if they have outgrown their site.

Dividing perennials

In mild areas, clumps of perennials can be divided and healthy young outer portions replanted into freshly prepared soil.

Prune dogwood

Now you've enjoyed the dramatic colours of your winter dogwoods, they can be cut back hard down to ground level. This will encourage them to produce brightly coloured new shoots that will provide interest next winter.

Early anemones

Early flowering bulbs come into their own this month. These include Dutch iris and alliums planted last autumn, but now is the time to plant up pots of anemones such as *Anemone coronaria* De Caen Group, or their double-flowered counterparts in the Saint Bridgid Group. There are several named forms including the scarlet-blue *A. coronaria* 'Mister Fokker'. Before planting, the dry tubers are best soaked for 24 hours to absorb water, during which time they will double in size. Plant in pots for an early display, or plant outside later in March or early April. **Lilies**

Continue planting lily bulbs up in pots.

Aim to plant about five bulbs of the same variety in a 25cm (10in) container. Terracotta pots are ideal, as their weight provides extra stability for the tall flower spikes that eventually develop.

Greenhouse Tender plants

Tender plants, such as pelargoniums and fuchsias, must be kept at a temperature above about 4C (40F). Check over plants once a week and remove any dead flowers or leaves that you find, to reduce the risk of fungal diseases. If any shoots have started to rot, trim them back to healthy growth. Keep their compost almost dry and make sure that there is good air circulation around the plants - a fan heater is an easy way of doing this.

Sow bedding plants

Create a heated area of the greenhouse by using bubble polythene to partition off a small area of the greenhouse. This can then be used for raising plants. Make the first sowings in a heated propagator of summer bedding plants that need a long growing season. These include geraniums, petunias, busy lizzies and nicotianas. Most require a germination temperature of 21C (70 F).

Hippeastrums (Amaryllis)

Hippeastrums, also known as amaryllis, are wonderful flowering houseplants for this time of year. To get the most out of yours, water plants as required, usually once or twice a week, by standing them in a saucer of water. The plants will take up as much water as they require. After about half an hour, tip away any remaining water so the roots are not left standing in water. Feed plants weekly with houseplant liquid feed. Keep them indoors on a bright window-sill in a warm spot.

Begonias

Clean off any remaining dead foliage from tuberous

begonia tubers. Then remove them from their pots and knock off the old compost. Repot the tubers into pots of fresh compost, water them in and keep at a temperature of around 16C (60F). It's also a good time of year to plant new tubers of begonias and gloxinia.

General Care Clean pots and trays

Piles of pots and stacks of dirty seed trays need to be washed out and stored away ready for use this spring. Add in some general household disinfectant, then rinse in clean water. Using hot water makes the job more bearable on a

cold day. Traditional pot cleaning brushes are available, but any brush will do to thoroughly remove dirt and old compost that could harbour pests or diseases.

Ice and snow

Knock snow from trees and shrubs to prevent its weight breaking branches. Keep using floating pond heaters to prevent ice forming over the entire surface of ponds.

Tree ties

Check tree ties to ensure they aren't cutting into the bark. Replace any that are worn or damaged. It is particularly important to check your tree stakes and ties for damage after heavy wind and storms.

Welcoming the award, **Prof John Hughes, President of NUI Maynooth**, said "This is a great accolade for the university. The award recognises the priority we place on ensuring the best student experience – from the strength of the academic team that interface with the students, the innovative degree programme they can choose from, the vibrant social scene and of course the employability of the students that graduate from NUI Maynooth."

Over the last 12 months the University has also won significant research awards, launched five new degrees including Law & Arts, Business & Law, and Science Education and has formally launched two new research institutes An Foras Feasa and The Irish Social Sciences Platform (ISSP). The University was appointed global education partner by Intel, and has established a joint research and education centre with Peking University.

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Valentine Recipes

Prawn Paté Ingredients

- * 1/2 cup butter
- * 1 cup peeled prawns
- * 1 clove garlic, peeled and chopped
- * 4 tablespoons double cream
- * salt
- * cayenne pepper
- * 1/2 teaspoon crushed coriander seeds
- * 1/2 tablespoon very finely chopped parsley
- * a few whole prawns to garnish
- * parsley to garnish
- * lemon wedges to garnish

Method

- Gently fry the coriander seeds and the garlic in the butter.
- Add the prawns and stir well.
- Remove from heat.
- Allow to cool a little and then blend to a smooth paté in an electric blender.
- Add the cream and parsley and blend again for a few seconds.
- Season to taste.
- Transfer to individual dishes and chill well before serving.
- Garnish with whole prawns, parsley and lemon wedges.

Nuck Breast Treat

Ingredients

- * 2 boned duck breasts
- * 1 tablespoon olive oil
- * 2 tablespoons chopped apricots tinned in juice
- * 2 tablespoons juice from apricots
- * 1 tablespoon good brandy
- * 1 teaspoon cornflour
- vegetable stock
- salt and pepper
- * 2 tablespoons butter

Method

- Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry the duck breast skin side down.
- Turn over.
- Turn down the heat and cook gently until the breasts are tender.
- Season with salt and pepper.
- Remove the breasts from the pan and keep warm.
- Remove as much fat as possible from the pan but leave the duck juices behind.
- Put the pan on a gentle heat and add about 1 cup of the stock.
 - Stir to incorporate all the duck juices into the stock and then add the butter, apricots, juice and brandy.
- Mix the cornflour to a smooth paste with a little cold water and add to the pan, stirring all the time.
 - Serve this sauce with the duck.

J alentine's Chocolate Sponge

Ingredients

- * 150g /5oz Self Raising Flour
- * 25g/1oz Cocoa (sieved)
- * 125g /4 oz Margarine (at room temperature)
- * 125g /4 oz Caster Sugar
 - 3 Eggs

Topping

*

170ml carton of Cream 2 x 100g bars of good quality Plain Chocolate Decoration Red Roses

Method

- Preheat oven to 170°/325°F/Gas 3. Base line 2 x 18cm/7" sandwich tins.
- Put flour, cocoa, margarine, sugar and eggs into a mixing bowl and beat until smooth.
- Transfer to prepared tins and bake for approx. 25 minutes.
- Cool cakes in tins for about 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire tray to cool completely.
- Meanwhile, place chocolate and cream in a bowl over a pan of simmering water and allow chocolate to melt, stirring occasionally. When melted, remove from the heat and stir well. Allow to cool and begin to "set". Sandwich the cakes with about a third of the topping and pour remainder over the assembled cake. Decorate top with red roses.



Maynooth GAA get down to business for 2009

aynooth GAA club got down to business for the New Year when they held their first executive meeting of the club on Monday night (10 January).

The club appointed a new chairman at their AGM in late December and Colm Nolan takes over from Matt Doran, who has agreed to stay on as vice-chairman.

With plenty of changes on the manager front too, Maynooth is a hive of activity early in the year.

Already Declan Cryan, former Straffan manager, has been appointed as senior football manager and training will begin in two weeks time as the club looks to regain senior status having been relegated to intermediate last year. Mick Ward was praised by club hurling chairman and current county vice-chairman, Aidan Sinnott, for his dedication and commitment to hurling in the club for the last number of years, the last three of which were as manager of the senior hurling team.

Ladies football and camogie teams are also due to resume training shortly although our Leinster championship winning ladies team are entitled to a few more weeks break after a superb 2008 that saw them claim county and provincial titles before losing out narrowly in the All-Ireland semi-final.

The club is planning to host a number of juvenile discos during the year with the first one of the year pencilled in for the 27th February.

Famous People Born in the Month Of February

James Augustine Aloysius Joyce (2 February 1882 – 13 January 1941) was an Irish expatriate author of the 20th century. He is best known for his landmark novel Ulysses (1922) and its controversial successor Finnegans Wake (1939), as well as the short story collection Dubliners (1914) and the semi-autobiographical novel A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man (1916).



Although he spent most of his adult life outside Ireland, Joyce's psychological and fictional universe is firmly rooted in his native Dublin, the city which provides the settings and much of the subject matter for all his fiction. In particular, his tempestuous early relationship with

the Irish Roman Catholic Church is reflected through a similar inner conflict in his recurrent alter ego Stephen Dedalus. As the result of his minute attentiveness to a personal locale and his self-imposed exile and influence throughout Europe, notably in Paris, Joyce became paradoxically one of the most cosmopolitan yet one of the most regionally-focused of all the English language writers of his time.



Charles Augustus Lindbergh (February 4, 1902 – August 26, 1974) nicknamed "Lucky Lindy" and "The Lone Eagle") was an American aviator, author, inventor and explorer. By the late 1930s, he had become a prominent non-interventionist, opposed to United States involvement in World War II.

On May 20–21, 1927, Lindbergh emerged instantaneously from virtual obscurity to world fame as the result of his Orteig Prize-winning solo non-stop flight from New York (Roosevelt Field) to Paris (Le Bourget Field) in the single-seat, single-engine monoplane Spirit of St. Louis. Lindbergh, an Army reserve officer, was also awarded the nation's highest military decoration, the Medal of Honour, for his historic exploits.

In the late 1920s and early 1930s, Lindbergh used his fame to relentlessly help promote the rapid development of U.S. commercial aviation. In the later 1930s and up until the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbour, Lindbergh was an outspoken advocate of keeping the U.S. out of the world conflict (as was his Congressman father during World War I) and became a leader of the anti-war America First movement. Nonetheless, he supported the war effort after Pearl Harbour and flew many combat missions in the Pacific as a civilian consultant, even though President Roosevelt had refused to reinstate his Army Air Force commission as a colonel that he had resigned earlier in 1941. In his later years, Lindbergh became a prolific prize-winning author, international explorer, inventor, and active environmentalist.

Bob Marley (February 6, 1945 – May 11, 1981) was a member of the Rastafari movement, whose culture was a key element in the development of reggae. Bob Marley became a leading proponent of the Rastafari, taking their music out of the socially deprived areas of Jamaica and onto the international music scene. Bob Marley was baptized by the Archbishop of the Ethiopian Orthodox Christian Church in Kingston, Jamaica on November 4, 1980]. Marley was also a vegetarian. Judy Mowatt, a former member of the Wailers, has claimed that Marley converted to Christianity on his deathbed.



While flying home from Germany to Jamaica for his final days, Marley became ill, and landed in Miami for immediate medical attention. He died at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital in Miami, Florida on the morning of May 11, 1981 at the age of 36. The spread of melanoma to his lungs and brain caused his death. His final words to his son Ziggy were "Money can't buy life." [Marley received a state funeral in Jamaica on May 21, 1981 which combined elements of Ethiopian Orthodoxy and Rastafari tradition. He was buried in a chapel near his birthplace with his Gibson Les Paul and a Bible. A month before his death, he was awarded the Jamaican Order of Merit. Marley was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1994. Time magazine chose Bob Marley & The Wailers' Exodus as the greatest album of the 20th century. In 2001, Marley was posthumously awarded the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award, and a feature-length documentary about his life, . In 2006, the State of New York renamed a portion of Church Avenue from Remsen Avenue to East 98th Street in the East Flatbush section of Brooklyn "Bob Marley Boulevard".



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

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

Question

I have recently changed job and my new employer has asked for my P45. What can I do if I haven't received one from my previous employer?

Answer

An employer is required by law to give you a P45 at the time the employment ends. It provides evidence that the employment has ended and includes a statement of pay and the tax deducted.

It is important to give a P45 to your new employer because otherwise you may have to pay tax at a higher rate known as emergency tax. Even if you are not starting a new job it is an important document because you will need it to claim a tax refund or to claim social welfare benefits.

If you have asked your previous employer for a P45 but have not received it, you should contact your local tax office. Revenue may then get in touch with the employer and obtain your P45 for you. Revenue will send you a new tax credit certificate so that you do not have to pay emergency tax.

If you are leaving a job in 2009 you must also be given an Income Levy Certificate for your records along with your P45. This details the amount of Income Levy deducted from your wages in that job.

The employer you are working for at the end of the tax year must give you a P60. This is a statement of your pay and the tax and social insurance payments deducted during the year.

If you do not receive a P60 or a P45, it is possible that you have not been registered for PRSI (Pay Related Social Insurance) by your employer or that you are registered but your employer has not paid the correct contributions. If your employer will not give you a P60 at the end of the year you should contact your local tax office.

Question

What tax relief is available for medical expenses and how can I claim it?

Answer

If you pay medical expenses that are not covered by the State or some other source such as private health insurance, you may be entitled to tax relief. This relief applies to expenses that you pay for yourself or on behalf of others.

For expenses up to the end of 2008, the amount of tax relief you get is either 20% or 41% of your expenses, whichever is the highest rate of tax you pay. This still applies for nursing home fees but for all other medical expenses from 1 January 2009, relief is given at the rate of 20%. Relief can be claimed on the full amount but for tax years before 2007 the first \in 125 was not eligible (or \in 250 when claiming for more than one person).

You can claim tax relief on fees charged by doctors and consultants and many of the items or treatments prescribed by them. This includes drugs, diagnostic procedures, physiotherapy, chiropody, podiatry, hearing aids, orthoptic treatment, orthopaedic beds or chairs, and wheelchairs.

Other eligible expenses include: an educational psychologist or speech and language therapist for a qualifying child; routine maternity care;

maintenance or treatment in a hospital or nursing home; kidney patients' expenses; in-vitro fertilisation; gluten-free food for (Continued on page 20)

coeliacs.

Routine dental and opthalmic care is not eligible but some dental treatments are: crowns; root canals; gold posts or inlays; periodontal or orthodontic treatment; wisdom teeth extraction in hospital; bridgework; dental implants; tip replacing.

You can claim tax relief at the end of the tax year by completing the form MED 1 which is available from your regional Revenue office or can be downloaded from www.revenue.ie. If you are claiming relief on dental expenses, you will need to keep the form MED 2 as evidence of the expenses incurred. The MED 2 form is completed by your dentist. You can get these forms from Revenue by phoning Lo-call 1890 30 67 06.

It is also possible to apply online for tax relief on your medical expenses. See www.revenue.ie for details.

Question

What are the new rules for Child Benefit this year?

Answer

Child Benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you.

To qualify, a child must be dependent on you and must be:

Under age 16 or

Aged 16, 17 or 18 and attending full-time education or a FAS Youthreach course or have a physical or mental disability.

Changes introduced in the Budget affect Child Benefit for 18-year-olds which will be paid at half the normal rate in 2009 and will no longer be paid from 2010. For these years a compensatory payment of €15 per week will be paid to certain families with children aged 18 in full-time education or with a disability. You will get this payment if your child aged 18 is getting Disability Allowance or if you are getting Family Income Supplement or getting a social welfare payment that includes an increase for the 18-year-old.

Child Benefit is generally paid to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living apart, it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives most of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. The Child Benefit rates for 2009 are the same as for 2008: for one child, €166; for two children, €332; for each additional child (third, fourth, and so on) an extra €203 is paid.

The rate of Child Benefit for twins is 1.5 times the normal monthly rate for each child. Where three or more children of a multiple birth qualify, the benefit paid is double the normal monthly rate for each child. (EEA) or are a Swiss national working in Ireland, you may be entitled to Child Benefit even if your child is not living in Ireland. If you are not a EEA national then you must satisfy a habitual residency condition to qualify for the benefit.

Claim forms to apply for Child Benefit are available from your local Social Welfare Office, Post Office or from the Child Benefit Section, Social Welfare Services Office, St Oliver Plunkett Road, Letterkenny, Co. Donegal, Lo-call: 1890 400 400.

Question

The last time I had dental treatment I was able to claim the cost from the Department of Social and Family Affairs on the basis of my PRSI contributions. Next year I plan to travel to a dentist in Hungary. Can this be covered under the same scheme?

Answer

Yes, it is possible to claim for certain dental treatment obtained in other EU countries under the Department's Treatment Benefit Scheme.

Under this scheme you can qualify for Dental, Optical and Aural Benefits whereby the Department pays some of the costs of various treatments, such as dental fillings and extractions, eye examinations, spectacles, contact lenses and hearing aids.

You can now claim these benefits if your treatment, spectacles, etc., were obtained in another EU country. The Department pays an amount equivalent to the rate paid for similar treatment carried out in Ireland or the amount actually paid – whichever is lower.

Before going abroad you should contact the Department's Treatment Benefit Section, Lo-call: 1890 400 400 (ext 4480) to get an application form and details of how much the Department pays for the various treatments. When abroad you pay the full amount for the treatment, but you should ask the dentist, optician or audiologist to complete the application form. To claim the benefit when you return to Ireland, send the application form to the Treatment Benefit Section, Department of Social and Family Affairs, St Oliver Plunkett Road, Letterkenny, Co. Donegal.

To qualify for the scheme you must satisfy certain Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution conditions which vary depending on your age. You are also eligible if you are the dependent spouse of an insured person or a dependent widow or widower whose spouse was qualified at time of death. If you satisfy the PRSI conditions when you reach age 60 you will remain gualified for life.

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Pet Corner

Animals who Mate for Life

Turtle Doves

Jurtle Doves have become emblems of devoted love because they form strong pair bonds. The turtle dove is a dainty dove, smaller and darker than the collared dove and slightly larger than a blackbird. It's upperparts are distinctively mottled with chestnut and black and it's black tail has a bright white edge. The gentle purr of the turtle dove is an evocative sound of summer, but has become increasingly rare following substantial population declines.

The Grey Wolf



The gray wolf mates for life. Pups are born in the spring. Through the summer while the pups grow in ability, the adults hunt singly. Each autumn, the pups join the hunting pack and both parents teach them to hunt and kill prey. A family group of about five members (the parents and various offspring) stay together and form a hunting pack.

The wolf is the largest member of the canine family. Grey wolves range in colour from grizzled grey or black to all white. As the ancestor of the domestic dog, the grey wolf resembles German shepherds or malamutes.

The Barn Owl

The Barn Owl is unmistakable, with a large round head and heart shaped face. White in appearance, giving it a ghostly look when seen flying over graveyards at night. Up close it has golden buff plumage on top of its head and back. Found mainly on farmland it prefers rough grassland, with hedges and river nearby. They nest in hollow trees, old barns, ruins or out-buildings. They will use nest boxes if placed in modern barns. Owls have superb eyesight and can see in almost total darkness, and they also have excellent hearing which helps them locate prey. Barn owls will mate for life. Normal broods have 3 to 6 young. In England there have been reports of up to 18 in one brood. 2-3 broods per year are normal but if food supply is low, the owls may go without a brood during that time.





Swans

Once they mate swans remain together for life. Both partners share in building their nest, defending and incubating their eggs and caring for their young. "Divorce" does sometimes occur, particularly following nesting failure.

The Northern Hemisphere species of swan have pure white plumage but the Southern Hemisphere species are mixed black and white. The Australian Black Swan (Cygnus atratus) is completely black except for the white flight feathers on its wings. The babies of black swans are light grey in colour, and the South American Black-necked Swan has a black neck.

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Launch of Major Local Reports at John Paul 2 Library, NUI Maynooth

Pat Leogue, from the OAK (Offaly & Kildare) local development partnership will present the final programme review reports of the OAK 'Services for the Unemployed Measure' and the 'Family, Youth and Community Measure' to Professor Jim Walsh, the Vice president of NUI, Maynooth, at the opening of the NUI Maynooth Library Social Sciences Festival on Tuesday 27th January at 2.30. Those working in the OAK area have learned that these reports are particularly important in emphasising best practice in addressing unemployment and disadvantage

NUI Maynooth has worked with the Community and statutory leaders in the North West Kildare and Offaly areas over the life-time of the Partnership.

Professor Tom Collins and Professor Anne Ryan of NUI Maynooth lead a team of researchers to identify needs in the area in 1994. They worked with members of the North West Kildare Development group and later with Pat Faye (RIP) and Pat Leogue in the early stages of the OAK Partnership.

The review reports, prepared by Michael Kenny of the Department of Adult & Community Education and Clare Duffy, Research & Evaluation Officer, OAK

Partnership, seek to identify the best practice programmes that have impacted on the needs of the most disadvantaged and the lessons learned that

are being passed on the new County-wide Local Development Companies in Offaly & Kildare.

NUI Maynooth Library hosts Social Sciences Festival

The NUI Maynooth Library Social Sciences Festival took place from 27th to 30th January. Central to the festival was an exhibition of the publishing output of the Faculty of Social Sciences.

During the festival there was a unique opportunity to view Maynooth's earliest printed book describing Ireland. Striking horses, turf fires and a warring witty and handsome people describe Ireland in the 1478 translation of *De situ orbis*, A survey of the inhabited world, by Dionysius Periegetes recently acquired by NUI Maynooth's library. At 530 years old, it is NUI Maynooth's earliest printed book describing Ireland.

The festival was opened by the President, Professor John G. Hughes followed by an address by Dr. Robert Galavan, Dean of Faculty of Social Sciences. Both speakers highlighted the strength and depth of the Faculty's research output over recent years. A number of books were launched during the Festival including *Adult Learning in Groups* by Brid Connolly and *Communication and Knowledge Sharing at Work* by Dr. John Cullen. The OAK (Offaly & Kildare) local development partnership presented the final programme review reports of the OAK 'Services for the Unemployed Measure' and the 'Family, Youth and Community Measure' to Professor Jim Walsh, the Vice president of NUI, Maynooth. A series of seminars took place in the Library, during the week. These addressed issues relating to research and getting published within the Social Sciences.

The Festival also marked the launch of ePrints3, NUI Maynooth's innovative institutional repository, which showcases their publications internationally and the Irish Qualitative Data Archive. Speakers throughout the week included Professor Jim Walsh, Professor Tom Collins and Professor Rob Kitchin. Attended by university staff and external guests this year's Festival was a showcase for the pioneering work of the Faculty of Social Sciences, which contributes greatly to NUI Maynooth and local and national planning.

Maynooth holding status in IBAL Results for 2008

Regular readers of these notes will know that we have commented on how Maynooth performs in the IBAL League. This is a league of over fifty towns where litter amounts are recorded and compared. Judging takes place in ten locations in the town three times a year and the results are published. It is pleasing to know that Maynooth's performance has stabilised with the designation of "clean to European Norms" which is the highest level that can be achieved. In previous years we have had mixed experiences going from the 12th best town to the 2nd worst in a short period. IBAL compares the performance of local authorities rather than Tidy Towns groups but no doubt that everyone that picks up litter or decides not to drop it in the first place contributed to achieving this result for the town.

Maynooth Tidy Towns begin 2009 campaign

There was a time when a month was really a month but like everyone else we feel that time is moving faster now. Maynooth Tidy Towns has already began our work for 2009 and will be active at weekends until the Summer months (up to May) and will then be working during the week in the evenings (usually two evenings a week). Early in the year we will be involved in tidying up after the winter months but keep an eye out for the spring bulbs that we have planted around the town.

Maynooth Tidy Towns welcomes support from Employee Volunteer Programmes

Many employers have programmes in place where they support their employees to participate in voluntary activities in their local communities. In Maynooth we have benefited from one such programme for several years run by Intel Ireland where through their "Intel Involved" programme employees support community groups in their work. In 2008 to celebrate the Intel Corporation's 40th Anniversary, employees in Ireland participated in 40,000 hours of voluntary activity and Maynooth Tidy Towns is grateful for the support that we received. For 2009 we have already been offered support from a similar programme being started by the Carton House Hotel. We look forward to working with them. 






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Poetry Corner



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Super Difficult

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Occasionally, an image immediately brings to mind the truism: 'a picture is worth a thousand words'. We are indeed indebted to artist David McDermott for the above cartoon, which he posted with the following message:

I am an artist and illustrator; I drew this illustration to express my feelings about the Lisbon Treaty. It seems to me that there will inevitably be a second referendum forced on the Irish people.

How right he! There is growing resentment among Irish people, not just towards our overlords in Brussels, but also towards the craven way Taoiseach Cowen's government, opposition spokespersons and media commentators have agreed to comply with the diktat for Lisbon, mark II. This was dressed up with the pretence that EU leaders had reluctantly agreed at their December summit to concede to Irish demands for declarations on neutrality, taxation, abortion and education and the family before Irish voters would be asked to vote again. The *People's Movement* has said all along that such declarations cannot be legally binding and in no way address the central trust of the Treaty-cum-Constitution of Lisbon, which is designed to make us all citizens for the first time of a EU that would have the form of a supranational Federal State run under Franco-German hegemony. Furthermore, the concession of



a permanent Commissioner for Ireland is no big deal as Lisbon only allows for Ireland to "suggest" an appointment to the incoming Commission President. It is the Big States who would effectively determine who the President would be and he will have the right to veto any Irish suggested appointment (Art. 17.7 TEU).

Scare mongering, the Recession and Lisbon II

On 14 January, Dick Roche is quoted in the *Irish Times as saying:* the economic recession, repairing the banking system or dealing with the crisis... can only be dealt with by a European Union which is strong, united and effective' and ' this is not a time to be gambling with the nation's future'. No doubt we will be bombarded with such scare tactics over the next nine months. But is this actually true?

Firstly, why should we believe Roche and co., who have sleepwalked the country into the present calamity, that this is so? And, likewise, why should we believe the same message from those in opposition whose only response to the crisis is to cut jobs, wages, salaries and public services? Does anyone believe that if we voted Yes last June that Dell would not have announced 1,900 redundancies in January? Could it be, in fact, that the EU itself is a big part of the problem and its banking market policies, in particular, have contributed to Irish and European woes? Derek Scally's article (*Irish Times,* 2 December), details how the German state owned bank, Landesbanken, had to have billions funnelled into it because of overexposure to subprime markets. The bank used to enjoy state guarantees and top credit ratings. Hence it could lend money more cheaply than its private competitors. However, in 2005 the EU ruled that state guarantees were distorting the market and, stripped of this advantage, Landesbanken plunged deep into the dodgy world of subprime and off-balance-sheet instruments.

Likewise, in Ireland, we let our banks run riot and blindly followed the EU's liberal, low regulation, multi nationalled financial and economic policies. Yes, we have benefited with thousands of high tech, high skilled jobs and used to good effect flexibility around our corporation tax rates (now at risk under Lisbon). But as a fully exposed economy we have all our eggs in one basket. We have sold off our state owned telecom, agri-business, natural resources, etc. to speculators and transnational corporations and even now Minister Dempsey is considering whether to hand over the national airline to create a Ryanair monopoly. However, as Dell has so painfully reminded us, these companies have little loyalty and move on when it suits to cheaper locations. It's time for the government and social partners to look at our business model with a view to introducing greater public control.

Ireland is an integral part of the EU and we must retain our right to determine what direction the EU should take. Under Lisbon it will be centralised further to the advantage of the Big States and the multinational corporations. By Ireland saying NO, again, to Lisbon we will give the EU a chance to democratically determine a future in the interests of its diverse peoples. Saying NO equals YES to a chance for a better Europe for all.

Draft Maynooth Local Area Plan

The Draft Maynooth Local Area Plan, **as proposed by the County Manager**, is scheduled to go on public display in Mid February.

The pre-draft submissions received by the Council looked for rezoning of 1,594 acres of land. As residents of Maynooth will be aware Cllr. John McGinley made a pre-draft submission in which he made the case for no land to be re-zoned for residential in the Draft Plan as there was more than adequate land already zoned for housing in Maynooth.

It is likely that the County Manager will agree with Cllr. McGinley's position when he produces the Draft plan in February. When the Draft Plan is published the public will have 6 weeks to make submissions. The Planners have a further 6 weeks to write the Managers Report on those submissions and all 25 Councillors have a further 6 weeks to consider the Managers Report. In reality it is the 4 Area Councillors who will make the changes (if any) and it now becomes the Councillors Plan rather than the Managers.

As the process can take 35 weeks from the time the Draft Plan is published to approval it will be the newly elected Councillors, after the Local Elections on 4 June, who will be making the decision on the future of our Town.

Traffic Management in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley had the following 3 motions on the Agenda for the Leixlip Area Meeting of the Council on 19 December:

1. "That a left turning lane be constructed at the junction of the Celbridge Road/Straffan Road, Maynooth so that traffic can make use of the existing left green filter light."

The Council Official's response was:

"There are no resources or funding available in 2009 to examine this issue in detail, however the Transport Department will examine the site in question and report back to the Committee when a site inspection has taken place."

Cllr. McGinley stated that it was extraordinary that the Council could spend hundreds of thousands on traffic lights that don't work yet the engineers were unwilling to spend a very small amount on something that would make traffic flow.

2. "That digital timers be installed at all pedestrian crossings in Maynooth in the interest of public safety as the continuous changes caused by the new Traffic Management System is confusing children."

The Council Official's response was:

"Digital timers are not considered an appropriate feature for signalised crossings and for safety reasons, as these timings are fixed. On investigating Cllr. McGinley's query, no evidence of continuous changes to timings for pedestrian crossings in the town was found. The traffic Management Section will continue to monitor the situation."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the reply was utter nonsense as Dublin, London and New York had no safety problems with digital timers at pedestrian crossings.

3. That Council the outlines what steps are being taken to provide long-term parking for commuters, business people and workers in Maynooth so that a successful Pay Parking Scheme can be introduced."

The Council Official's response was:

"The Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) project regarding the Public Transport Interchange for Maynooth contains proposals for a multi-storey car park adjacent to the railway station. A presentation by the consultants for the project is being arranged for the benefit of the Committee."

Cllr. McGinley stated that when he was first made aware of the DTO Project last May he asked that the DTO be invitation to make a presentation to the Area Committee immediately to ensure that their proposals were not "off the wall". He asked that they be invited to the next area Meeting on 16 January.

Proposed Pay Parking in Maynooth:

At the November Area Meeting Cllr. McGinley was given the following update on the proposed Pay Parking Scheme for Maynooth:

"The pay-parking scheme for Maynooth has not progressed due to the lack of availability of long-term parking in the town. In order for pay parking to be successful it would require long-term parking for commuters, business people and workers in the town. However, if the members wish the Transport Department can prepare a draft and bring it to the Area Committee for consideration." At the December Area Meeting John was advised of the following changed position of the Council Officials:

"In January 2009 it is proposed to draft pay parking bye-laws for the towns of Maynooth, Leixlip, Clane and Kilcock. However, it should be noted that there is a shortage of a long-term parking site in Maynooth, for which there is a necessity. The lack of a longterm car park in Maynooth may have implications in enforcing pay parking."

Cllr. McGinley responded that he had no difficulty agreeing on a Draft Pay Parking Scheme as long as it was not implemented until there was adequate long term parking for commuters, business people and workers in Maynooth.

Traffic Management to be the ONLY Item on the Agenda for the Area Meeting in January:

As a result of all of the foregoing traffic management issues and in view of the serious problems with the traffic lights at the Glenroyal it was agreed by the 4 Area Councillors that we should devote our full meeting on 16 January to Traffic Management issues only. The DTO would also make a presentation on car parking proposals and Cllr. McGinley asked that the Council's Director of Transport also be present.

Taking in Charge of Silken Vale/The Arches Estate:

At the December Leixlip Area Committee meeting the Council's Willie Hannigan advised Cllr. John McGinley that the developer had given him the "As Constructed Drawings" and the results of the CCTV Survey on the drains and sewage pipes. The handover of these is always the biggest stumbling block in taking estates in charge.

Willie Hannigan is meeting the developer on site again in mid January with a view to eliminating any remaining points from the snag list. All going well, especially the technical issue of the footbridge, it looks as if a mechanism will be found to start the process of taking the estate in charge in February.

Proposed Extension of the 66 and 67 Bus Routes:

Gareth Quinn from Dublin Bus attends the November Area Meeting to answer questions on the proposed extensions of the two routes.

He stated that the company are fully committed to both extensions and that they have a licence for the extension of the 67 to Moyglare Hall and that there

will be no problem in getting a licence for the extension of the 66 to Newtown. The new Company Plan will include the two extensions and it will be up for approval by the Board and the Minister in January.

Mr. Quinn stated that it essential that they get safe turning points and it was agreed that he would liaise with the Roads Department of the Council to select and get agreement of them.

Provision of a Pedestrian Crossing on the Rathcoffey Road:

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion for a pedestrian crossing on the Rathcoffey Road from the Castledawson side to the Cluain Aoibhinn side so as to compensate for the absence of a footpath from there to Bond Bridge:

"There is no funding or resources available in 2009 budget to install any signalised facilities, unless they are funded through external capital schemes."

Cllr. McGinley responded by stating that he wanted funding to be used from the Deficit in Infrastructure Fund for this safety measure.

Very Serious Littering at Parklands/Rockfield/ Railpark Green Triangle:

Very serious littering is taking place at this green triangle between the three estates. The walls are also covered in Graffiti.

Cllr John McGinley has asked the Maynooth Area Office of the Council to arrange for a clean up of the litter and removal of the graffiti. Indeed the Council has acted with great speed and cleaned up the area on 7 January.

John has suggested that shrubs be planted beside the wall so as to act as a deterrent to those who feel it necessary to deface the wall.

McGinley warmly welcomes rejection of 5 storey apartment blocks at Parson Street/ Harbour area:

Cllr. John McGinley has warmly welcomed An Bord Pleanala's decision to refuse planning permission for 98 housing units and 10 retail units in 5-storey blocks with flat roofs behind 11 to 15 Parson Street, Maynooth.

Cllr. John McGinley, his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg and local residents had lodged observations with the Bord against P. & G. Dormer's appeal of the Council's Refusal.

The Bord stated that the proposed development

would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area. The following is an edited version of their 4 reasons for refusal:

- 1. It is considered that, by reason of the excessive number of residential units, the proposed development would conflict with the guidelines as set out in the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan 2006 and would materially contravene the Maynooth Development Plan 2002.
- 2. Having regard to the scale, height and design of the proposed development and its location within a designated Architectural Conservation Area in close proximity to the Royal Canal Conservation Area, which itself is a designated Natural Heritage Area, and the number of protected structures in the vicinity, the proposed development would be out of character with the surrounding area, would be visually obtrusive and would seriously injure the amenities of the Royal Canal.
- **3.** It is considered that the proposed development would constitute over development of the site and would seriously injure the residential amenities of future occupants.
- 4. It is considered that the proposed development would be overbearing and would seriously injure the residential amenities of the existing and proposed properties, by way of overlooking and overshadowing.

In conclusion Cllr. McGinley stated the developer and the adjoining landowners should sit down with Council Officials in order to progress his proposal to have the Harbour Action Area Plan implemented as one project and by one major developer. This approach is essential to ensure that this highly sensitive area at the Historic Core of the Town is developed to 5 star standards.

SCANDALOUS WAITING TIME FOR HEARING TESTS FOR CHILDREN:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted angrily to a response he has received from the HSE in relation to the waiting time for Hearing Tests for Children in Newbridge Health Centre.

Depending on the age of the Child the waiting time for a hearing test for children under 4 in Newbridge Health Centre (which serves Maynooth children) is 9 months and 7 months for those over 4. The Waiting Times, stated Deputy Stagg, are scandalous when compared with a wait of 3 to 4 weeks in June 2006 for a hearing test. The delay will cause damage to children in the early developmental years and is an attempt by the Right Wing Minister

for Health to effectively privatise the service by forcing parents to seek Private appointments because of the delays in the Public Service. It is quite unacceptable for Harney to use children in her ideological quest to ruin Public Health Services in this State.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would again request the HSE to run additional clinics to deal with the backlog in both Health Centres.

STAGG CRITICAL OF HSE DELAY IN ISSUING MEDICAL CARDS:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the 8 to 10 week delay in issuing Medical Cards to New Applicants from Celbridge Health Centre and has called on the HSE to allocate additional staff to ensure the public's entitlement to Free Health Services is not eroded by administrative bottlenecks.

With those signing on the Live Register in the North Kildare Labour Exchange at Maynooth having doubled in the past year to 3,256 people, it is obvious to a blind man stated Deputy Stagg that there would be a knock on demand for Medical Cards. Despite this no additional staff have been assigned to meet the demand in Celbridge Health Centre. What this means in reality is that people entitled to Medical Cards and who suffer delays in getting their entitlement will not go to their Doctor because of the costs involved. This means that their medical condition may worsen. This is unacceptable and is further evidence of government penny pinching on the most vulnerable by delaying their Free Medical Care.

Deputy Stagg stated that he had contacted the Manager of the HSE in Kildare in relation to this unacceptable delay and has called on him to allocate additional staff to meet demand at Celbridge Health Centre.

STAGG DISAPPOINTED AT DECISION ON FORMER PITCH AND PUTT COURSE:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his disappointment at the decision by An Bord Pleanala to grant Planning Permission for three 4 Storey Blocks of Apartments on the former Pitch and Putt Course on Dunboyne Road, Maynooth.

For the past 6 years Deputy Stagg, his colleague Cllr. John McGinley and local residents have been battling various proposals for the development of the site.

Whilst the bulk of the development will be hidden because of the sharp drop in the site level from the Dunboyne Road the proposal stated Deputy Stagg particularly affects the residents of Houses 11 to 18 Leinster Cottages whose present view of the Lyreen River will be blocked when the apartment blocks are built.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg thanked residents for their support over the years but criticised An Bord Pleanala for making the wrong call on this particular planning proposal.

STAGG CASTIGATES GOVERNMENT INACTION AS LIVE REGISTER DOUBLES AT MAYNOOTH EXCHANGE IN 12 MONTHS:

Deputy Emmet Stagg has castigated the Government over their inaction in stemming the continuing rise in those signing on the Live Register as the figures for Kildare show a rise of 87% in the past year (up from 5,731 in November 2007 to 10,718 in November 2008) with that increase at 100% for those signing on at the Maynooth Exchange (up from 1,631 in November 2007 to 3,256 in November 2008).

The Economic Turmoil is hitting local businesses and smallto-medium companies particularly hard and yet stated Deputy Stagg the Government seems happy to let this vital sector struggle on, without any support or without any indication that they will take action to ease some of the pressures.

The survival of hundreds of local businesses and local jobs are under further threat because they cannot get access to credit despite the fact that they are profitable. The Government has ignored calls made by the Labour Party to establish a Small Business Operational Fund to ensure credit streams are available. Such a fund could draw on the €15 Billion Small Business Operational Fund established in September by the European Investment Bank, which Irish Banks have so far refused to access.

Deputy Stagg stated that this Government simply do not have an Economic Strategy and are like a rabbit caught in the headlights of a car, simply hanging on and hoping that the rise in job losses will cease of its own right without any direct Government Intervention.

The Labour Party has proposed a series of measures to combat the unemployment problem that have been totally ignored by the government. These include a major school building programme to take 40,000 children out of pre-fabs and put them into proper classrooms and a national insulation scheme to make our housing stock more energy efficient, thus reducing carbon emissions and reducing household energy bills. Both of these programmes would have the potential to take back into employment many of the workers who have lost their jobs as a result of the downturn in the construction sector.

Deputy Emmet Stagg welcomed the announcement by Sentenial Limited of 70 further high level jobs at their premises in Maynooth Business Campus today. This demonstrated the possibilities and potential to create new jobs and improve our balance of payments with the export of the high-tech products from this company. It is hoped, he said, that the Tánaiste will learn from her visit to that plant as to the correct way forward.

Fitzpatrick welcomes improvements to Kildare policing

"The Minister for Justice has informed me that the new Garda Division of Kildare will go live on the 1st of January 2009."

"The new Garda station opened in Leixlip opened on the 10th of October and Garda authorities have informed the Minister that the situation regarding personnel at the station will be kept under review and when additional personnel next become available the needs to Leixlip Garda Station will be fully considered."

"I am sure that the new Leixlip Station will prove to be of great advantage to the increasing population of the area," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

MINISTERS SMITH AND SARGENT ANNOUNCE €16.7 MILLION GRANT-AID FOR THE HORTICULTURE, LIVESTOCK MARTS AND SMALL MEAT SECTORS

The Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, Brendan Smith TD and the Minister for Food and Horticulture, Trevor Sargent TD, today announced details of grant-aid of €16.7 million under the Department's Marketing and Processing Scheme.

Welcoming this announcement, Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick congratulated the Kildare based companies who are today among the beneficiaries; Brady Family Food in Timahoe and Boylan Fruits in Johnstownbridge.

Deputy Fitzpatrick added, "This funding is "critically important and a very significant boost for these sectors which will improve the competitiveness and added-value of agricultural products. He also added, through my role on the Enterprise Trade & Employment Committee, I am acutely aware that the emphasis for 2009 should be on small and medium sized businesses creating and keeping jobs locally, "this investment will create significant employment during the construction stage of the new facilities and will also create additional job opportunities in the agri-food sector which is so important in generating revenue from export earnings."



€4 million Government scheme to assist redundant apprentices – Brady

The Government has established a €4 million scheme to assist Apprentices who are out of work, according to local Fianna Fail TD Aine Brady, who had raised the issue with the Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise Trade and Employment in recent months.

"FÁS, this month, is to implement an Employer Based Redundant Apprentice Rotation scheme and will be operated by FAS until the end of 2009." said Deputy Brady.

"The purpose of the scheme is to give redundant Apprentices the opportunity to complete the on-the-job phase of their apprenticeship in order to gain the required experience to progress to the next off-the-job phase or to complete their apprenticeship."

"It stands to benefit up to 500 apprenticeships in carpentry and joinery, electrical, plastering, plumbing and bricklaying." Stated Deputy Brady who also urged apprentices to keep FÁS Services to Business informed of all details relating to their apprenticeship.

"The scheme will support redundant apprentices on-the-job training related to Phase 3, Phase 5, and Phase 7. They will also be scheduled to do off-the-job Phase 2, Phase 4 and Phase 6 in accordance with scheduling criteria."

"FAS will work with employers to place the redundant apprentices to replace any existing apprentices that have been released to attend scheduled off-the-job phase of their apprenticeship. The employer will provide workplace training and assessment for full or part of the relevant phase of the apprenticeship."

"Employers taking part in the scheme will be required to pay the agreed industry rates for the specific apprenticeship trade and FAS will make a contribution of €340 per week towards employment costs incurred based on a 39 hour working week."

"As I know from my clinics, many young people have been badly affected by the recent downturn in construction. The Government must continue to give every assistance possible to facilitate the completing of their training. Further Information

Apprenticeship is a demand-driven, workplace and classroom, educational and training programme for employed people aimed at developing the skills of the apprentice to meet the needs of industry and the labour market.

The apprenticeship system is a modular standards-based system generally comprising of 7 alternating phases of on-the-job and off-the-job training and development. These alternating phases of training consist of 3 off-the-job (Phases 2, 4 & 6) and 4 on-the-job phases (Phases 1, 3, 5 & 7). The duration of the 3 off-the-job training phases does not normally exceed 40 weeks.

three north Kildare schools according to local Fianna Fail TD Áine Brady.

Welcoming the funding, Deputy Brady said that the Government is committed to making information technology a central part of the learning process from the early stages of education.

"Scoil Naomh Padraig in Celbridge will receive €30,500 for outfitting 16 classrooms; Maynooth Educate Together will get €13,500 for 8 classrooms and Gaelscoil Nas na Riogh in Nás will get €41,000 for 10 classrooms. On this basis, Maynooth Girls School will be entitled to funding once the extension works are completed. I have written to the Minister and highlighted that such funding will be required for the Girls School."

"This is the first time there has been funding per classroom at primary level and I'm delighted that such significant funding has been allocated to these schools."

"The Government is very conscious of the need to invest in education in technology from at early stage. These schools are among 72 other national schools around the country in which major construction work was completed in 2008, and which are now to receive this considerable ICT investment."

"The National Centre for Technology in Education will advise the school of the range of equipment available and of appropriate equipment specification which may include a fixed digital projector, an internetenabled laptop computer and a visualiser along with classroom computers."

'The longer term goal of the Government to increase the take-up of science, engineering and technology courses in third-level institutions to help build up what the government is calling a 'knowledge' economy, which will help the country remain strong in the globalised economy." "IT skills are required in many jobs now and this advancement in equipment provision will benefit children regardless of what industry they eventually work in," concluded Deputy Brady.

Funding boost of €1.1 million for Kildare food producers – Brady

Three food producers in Kildare will benefit from the Capital Investment Scheme for food marketing and processing from the Department of Agriculture according to local Fianna Fail TD Áine Brady, TD. "In the meat sector, Brady Family Food in Timahoe, Naas will receive €567,689 and McConnon's Meats in Rathangan will get €487,570. In the horticulture sector, Boylan Fruits Ltd in Johnstownbridge will receive €71,426." 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
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

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

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How to Arrange Flowers Like a Professional

10 TIPS ON ARRANGING YOUR FLOWERS BEAUTIFULLY

1. Clean your flowers thoroughly after you buy them.

Make sure that every stem that's going to be submerged in water has no leaves in the water. This will make your water cleaner and your flowers a little more presentable.

2. Cut your flower ends and change your container water every day.

It's tedious, but it will really help make your flowers last longer and look healthier.

3. Buy flowers that are either all the same type or colour.

Your arrangement will come off looking organized and neat.



4. If you're unable to change your water every day, use an opaque vase.

That way you will not have to see the murky water that inevitably arrives by day three.

5. Pin-prick the throat of your tulips if you don't want them to grow anymore.

Tulips are the one type of flower that will keep growing even after they've been cut. This really won't affect your arrangement on the first or maybe even the second day, but by day three your tulips might be a mess. Simply prick the throat of your tulip with a safety pin and it should cut back the growth in the days to come.

6. Buy a pair of pruners!

These can be bought quite cheap, shop around, these can be bought quite cheap in order to suit everybody's pocket. Do you really want to ruin any more of your good kitchen scissors?

7. Don't be intimidated—use your wide-mouthed bowls and containers.

At first glance they look like they might take up €500 worth of flowers, but really all you need is a little tape. Floral bowl tape is great, but you can also use good old Scotch tape. Just create a grid across the top of the container, then tape all around the rim of the bowl so that your loose ends will not come undone. The flowers will fit perfectly into the openings of the grid. Presto, your grandmother's old fruit compote has never looked so cute!

8. Order fresh-cut flowers from a florist instead of buying them at the grocery store.

Gardening

Gardening in March

Finally, it's March. The weather can be a lovely, in early spring with opportunities to get out in the garden and get to work. One thing is sure: it's no time to dawdle because there's plenty to do this month.

Caution is the keyword this month. It may look warm and inviting, but unless you are lucky to live in the lower latitudes, you could be courting disaster if you try to plant before your last frost date. Suit the work to the weather.

If you haven't been monitoring it, **turn your compost pile now**. Dampen it and begin turning it regularly to get it to heat up so you can enjoy the production of good compost faster. If you haven't started a compost pile, start one this month.

Deal with pests now. A lime sulphur spray is organic and protects against scales, mites, and borers on fruit trees, roses, and shrubs as well as black spot and powdery mildew. It's a dormant spray, so apply before the middle of the month when many plants begin to bud out. **Prune roses** just before they start to bud out.

Always use any compound—organic or otherwise—cautiously according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Get those weeds while they are little. Use a flame gun to spot kill weeds while they are small or pull by hand. **Vinegar or boiling water** also work to kill weeds and don't leave problems behind. Avoid using salt, because it will ruin the soil.

If you haven't already planned your season's plantings, do it now. Take advantage of companion planting that can strengthen and reinforce plant vigour while repelling pests. For example, nasturtiums and marigolds repel white flies and aphids.

March is the best time to make corrections and improvements to lawn including reseeding. Adding a layer of compost mixed with wood ash can reinvigorate poor soil and cut down on moss.

Build a cold frame to acclimate seedlings and tender plants to ready them for transplant in April and May.

Finish other structural projects like trellises before planting.

Plant early spring vegetables and flowers. These include spinach, lettuces, peas, and leeks as well as sweet peas.

Early spring is also a good time to divide **and** transplant if the soil isn't too wet. Re-spacing existing favourites can give them extra wiggle room to get bigger and healthier.

Mulch early bulbs especially if you live in less temperate areas where freezing temperatures hang on. Dahlia tubers stored last fall can be started late in the month. Lay on a bed of sand and begin watering. (Avoid overwatering and too much warmth.)

Fertilize shrubs and trees if this wasn't done in February. Use an acid type rhododendron fertilizer to feed evergreens, conifers, broad leaf evergreens, rhododendrons, azaleas and camellias. Use an all-purpose fertilizer to feed roses and other deciduous trees and shrubs. If you use granular type fertilizers, be sure to water it in thoroughly.

Dig out clumps of violets to bring indoors.

Keep them cool.

If you've not pondered the idea, you might consider getting some **chickens.** March is the ideal month to brood a few chicks, to raise hens for egg laying, bug catching, and weeding.

Attend to your indoor plants too. They've just come through a long winter and need a bit of fertilizer. Re-pot those that are root bound. Avoid overwatering as weakened plants are more readily subject to disease and root rot.

From sheep steeple chasing to daredevil jet ski rides across the Irish Sea, Matt Browne's fundraising exploits are legendary around Ireland. After losing a leg through illness , his passion for helping others remains undimmed.

As a child Matt vividly remembers trying to push his father's wheelchair to watch a football match in an effort to cheer up his housebound father; a neighbour stopped the then ten-year-old Matt and asked;

"How is he?" nodding to his father. "You can ask him yourself!" came the sharp reply.

Aware of the lack of facilities for disabled people, Matt never imagined that one day he might also be in a wheelchair himself. The injustice of his father's treatment stayed with him and he knew there was more to be done.

Devising a ten year plan for the development of key disability facilities Matt organised a 'bus reverse', coffee mornings, and American Tea Parties and in 1990 he and his team raised \in 50,000 through the **People in Need** and established The Wheelchair Centre in North Kildare.

An entertainer for over 30 years. Matt admits he smoked drank and partied. In 1990 Matt was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes: unfortunately in 2000 Matt needed his leg removed as a result of the diabetes. After six months Matt was fitted with a prosthetic leg. With only one leg and now in a wheelchair Matt had also to cope with withdrawals from cigarettes, alcohol, sleeping tablets and morphine. After unbearable night sweats, nausea, and sleepless nights, doctors told Matt he had become a morphine addict, his doses had to be reduced slowly over six months. Adjusting to life in a wheelchair Matt recalls "that first night I came home I must have fallen 15 times". Matt needed to get back working, he jokes "A three-legged-man wasn't in big demand". Friend Vincent Kelly of National Learning Network told Matt to "work to his strengths" and as it happened they were looking for a fundraiser in Kildare. He's never looked back since describing his work as "nine to five its not about me, I'll never make money out of this but the pleasure I've got out of this job over the years, money could never pay for that".

Every year Matt brings people with disabilities on fundraising trips around the World. A recent challenge was: Sheep Steeple-chasing' which raised funds to send four-year-old Conor Leigh to America for special medical treatment. Conor was born with only one ear, his treatment was due to cost thousands. Matt got behind the cause and organised the first Sheep Steeple chasing which raised over €30,000 on the day.

Matt believes that things have improved since he was a ten year-old-boy trying to make life better for his house-bound father, who remains the inspiration for his work. "Id like to give what he didn't have".

Matt is also Co-ordinator of the Kildare People of the Year Awards.

We wish Matt continued success and good health with his brilliant work.

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
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St. Patrick's Day Recipes



Ingredients

2 3/4 cups all-purpose flour 3/4 tsp. baking soda 1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup butter at room temperature 1 cup sugar 1 large egg 1 tbsp. vanilla extract Green food colouring

Method

Measure the flour, baking soda and salt into a medium-sized bowl. Stir well and set aside.

In a large bowl, cream the butter and sugar with an electric mixer for about 1 minute. Add the egg and vanilla extract and mix until well combined. Gradually add the flour mixture to the butter and sugar, mixing well after each addition. The dough should be stiff.

Add several drops of green food colouring. Knead the dough until the colour is evenly distributed. Gather the dough into two balls, flatten into disks beginning at the edge of the dough and working toward the centre. Cover with plastic and chill for at least 2 hours or overnight.

After the dough has chilled, place one half on a large piece of plastic wrap, cover with another piece of plastic wrap and then roll until it is 1/4-inch thick. Lift off the top sheet of plastic wrap and cut out shamrocks, beginning at the edge of the dough and working toward the centre.

Place each shamrock on an ungreased baking sheet. Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Bake for 8 minutes or until the edges begin to lightly brown. Remove to a rack to cool. For particularly festive shamrocks, decorate them with green candies or frosting. Makes about 34.

Samb Casserole Recipe Ingredients:

1 1/2 pounds lean lamb, cubed 1/4 cup flour 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/4 cup butter 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/2 green bell pepper, chopped 1/2 cup chopped celery 1 tablespoon chopped parsley 1 teaspoon ground sweet paprika pinch rosemary 3/4 cup hot water 1 1/2 cups frozen peas, thawed 1 pound cooked potatoes, cut in 1-inch pieces

Method:

Combine flour, salt, and pepper; dredge lamb pieces in mixture. Heat butter in a large heavy skillet; brown lamb cubes on all sides the transfer to a 2-quart casserole. To the skillet add onion, bell pepper, and chopped celery; cook for 5 minutes. Stir in parsley. Add mixture to lamb in casserole. Sprinkle lamb mixture with paprika and rosemary. Add hot water. Cover and bake at 350° for 1 1/2 hours. Add peas and potatoes. Continue to bake, uncovered, for 30 to 45 minutes longer, until lamb is tender. Serves 6.



225g/8oz Self Raising Flour Pinch of Salt 25g/1oz Caster Sugar (optional) 25g/1oz Margarine 150ml/1/4 pint Milk

Method

Sieve flour, salt and sugar, if used, into a bowl. Rub in the margarine, using the tips of the fingers. Add the milk and mix to make a soft dough. Turn onto a lightly floured board and knead, if necessary, to remove any cracks.

Roll out lightly to 2 1/2 cm/1" in thickness and cut into scones with a 5cm/2" cutter dipped in flour. Place the scones on a floured pre-heated baking sheet.

Bake in the pre-heated oven at 220° C/ 425° F/Gas 7 for 10 - 12 minutes until well risen and nicely browned.

Cool on a wire tray.

Gaelic Coffee **Ingredients:**

3 dessertspoons whisky 1 level dessertspoon light brown sugar Fresh, strong coffee Double cream

Method:

Heat a stemmed glass with hot water and dry quickly. Add the whisky and stir in the sugar. Pour in the coffee, leaving an inch below the rim. Keep stirring until the sugar has dissolved and pour in the cream over the back of a teaspoon so that it floats on the surface to the depth of about half an inch.

MOTHER'S DAY

"Mothers Day" will be celebrated in Ireland on 12th March Mother's Day History

Contrary to popular belief, Mother's Day was not conceived and fine-tuned in the boardroom of Hallmark. The earliest tributes to mothers date back to the annual spring festival the Greeks dedicated to Rhea, the mother of many deities, and to the offerings ancient Romans made to their Great Mother of Gods, Cybele. Christians celebrated this festival on the fourth Sunday in Lent in honour of Mary, mother of Christ. In England this holiday was expanded to include all mothers and was called Mothering Sunday.

In the United States, Mother's Day started nearly 150 years ago, when Anna Jarvis, an Appalachian homemaker, organized a day to raise awareness of poor health conditions in her community, a cause she believed would be best advocated by mothers. She called it "Mother's Work Day."



Happy Mother's Day

Fifteen years later, Julia Ward Howe, a Boston poet, pacifist, suffragist, and author of the lyrics to the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," organized a day encouraging mothers to rally for peace, since she believed they bore the loss of human life more harshly than anyone else.

In 1905 when Anna Jarvis died, her daughter, also named Anna, began a campaign to memorialize the life work of her mother. Legend has it that young Anna remembered a Sunday school lesson that her mother gave in which she said, "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mother's day. There are many days for men, but none for mothers."

Anna began to lobby prominent businessmen like John Wannamaker, and politicians including Presidents Taft and Roosevelt to support her campaign to create a special day to honour mothers. At one of the first services organized to celebrate Anna's mother in 1908, at her church in West Virginia, Anna handed out her mother's favourite flower, the white carnation. Five years later, the House of Representatives adopted a resolution calling for officials of the federal government to wear white carnations on Mother's Day. In 1914 Anna's hard work paid off when Woodrow Wilson signed a bill recognizing Mother's Day as a national holiday.

At first, people observed Mother's Day by attending church, writing letters to their mothers, and eventually, by sending cards, presents, and flowers. With the increasing gift-giving activity associated with Mother's Day, Anna Jarvis became enraged. She believed that the day's sentiment was being sacrificed at the expense of greed and profit. In 1923 she filed a lawsuit to stop a Mother's Day festival, and was even arrested for disturbing the peace at a convention selling carnations for a war mother's group. Before her death in 1948, Jarvis is said to have confessed that she regretted ever starting the mother's day tradition.


The slogan at the recent Aontas workshop for Lifelong Learning was: **`Don't Stop Me Now'.**

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

Question

I live in a rented apartment. Can I claim any tax relief on the rent that I pay?

Answer

You can claim tax relief on rent paid for private rented accommodation if it is your main residence. The tax relief does not apply to rent that is paid to a local authority or State agency, or if it is paid under a lease agreement that is for 50 years or longer.

There is a maximum limit to the amount of rent that is taken into account each year, depending on your age and marital status. For 2009, the limits are the same as for 2008:

Age	Single	Married
Under 55 years	€2,000	€4,000
Over 55 years	€4,000	€8,000

Your tax relief is 20% of your annual rent, up to the maximum rent limit shown above.

So if you are under 55 years of age, the relief reduces your tax by up to \in 400 (that is, \in 2,000 x 20%) if you are single, or \in 800 if you are married.

If you are over 55 years, your tax is reduced by up to €800 if you are single or €1,600 if you are married.

You can claim the tax relief by completing the form Rent1 which is available from your Tax Office or can be downloaded from the Revenue website at www.revenue.ie. Revenue also has a 24-hour phone line for requesting forms and leaflets at Lo-call 1890 306 706 or (01) 674 4050.

Question

I have recently received interest on my savings deposit account but the bank deducted tax on the interest at 23%. Is this correct?

Answer

If you deposit a sum of money with a financial institution, any interest you earn is usually liable to a tax called Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT). For payments made on or after 1 January 2009 the rate of DIRT has increased from 20% to 23%. The financial institution deducts this tax before the interest is paid to you.

You are exempt from DIRT if your income is below a certain level and either you or your spouse is: 65 years of age or over or Permanently incapacitated so that you are unable to maintain yourself.

If you or your spouse is 65 years of age or over you are exempt from DIRT if your income is \in 20,000 or less (for an individual) or \in 40,000 or less (for a married couple).

If you have dependent children, these exemption limits are increased by \in 575 for each of the first two children and by \in 830 for each subsequent child.

If you are under 65 years and permanently incapacitated, you may be exempt from DIRT if your tax credits (including your spouse's) for the year exceed the tax that would be chargeable on your (and your spouse's) income for the year. For example, if your only income is Disability Allowance, you may be exempt from DIRT.

If you are exempt, you can apply to receive interest payments without having DIRT deducted by the financial institution. To apply, you must complete the appropriate application form and return it to Revenue. If either you or your spouse is aged 65 years or over, you should complete form DE1. If you or your spouse is permanently incapacitated, then complete form DE2.

If you are exempt and would like to claim a refund for DIRT that has already been deducted, you can do this by completing Form 54D.

You can get these forms from your Tax Office, from www.revenue.ie or by phoning Lo-call 1890 306 706.

Question

Does the new Income Levy apply to the income I receive from my occupational pension?

Answer

Occupational pensions are subject to the new Income Levy in the same way as other income but State pensions are not.

In general, if you are aged over 65 you are exempt from the Income Levy if you have gross annual income of \notin 20,000 or less (\notin 40,000 or less for a married couple). For people aged under 65, the income limit is \notin 18,304.

These limits apply to income from occupational pensions and other sources. If your income is over these limits, you pay the levy on the full amount at 1% up to \in 100,100. A 2% rate applies to income above that up to \in 250,120. The highest rate of 3% applies to income over \in 250,120.

However the levy does not apply to Contributory or Non-Contributory State Pensions so if, for example, you are receiving a State pension of $\in 11,976$ and your only other income is an occupational pension of $\in 20,000$, then this income of $\in 31,976$ will not be subject to the levy.

If you hold a full medical card you are exempt from the levy but holders of the GP Visit card are not.

Question

I applied for Family Income Supplement last year but didn't qualify. Have the income limits increased for 2009?

Answer

Family Income Supplement (FIS) is a weekly payment for families at work on low pay, including single-parent families. To be eligible:

- You must be working 19 or more hours per week (or 38 hours a fortnight) and the work must be expected to last for at least 3 months. Back to Work Allowance, Job Initiative, Community Services Programme (formerly Social Economy Programme) and Part-time Job Incentive are eligible for FIS. Other FÁS schemes, including Community Employment, are not. Where your spouse/partner is also working, your working hours can be combined to satisfy this condition.
- You must have one or more children (under age 18, or aged 18 to 22 in full-time education) living with you and you must be supporting them.
- Your average weekly family income must be below the income limit for your family size. Assessable income is gross income less tax, PRSI, the Health Contribution, the new Income Levy and superannuation. It includes most social welfare payments, but not Child Benefit, Early Childcare Supplement or Carer's Allowance.

For 2009 the weekly income limits have increased as follows:

If you have	Your family income is less than
One child	€500
Two children	€590
Three children	€685
Four children	€800
Five children	€920
Six children	€1,030
Seven children	€1,160
Eight children or more	€1,250

FIS is calculated as 60% of the difference between your average weekly family income and the income limit for your family size. The minimum payment is \in 20. It is paid for 52 weeks while you continue to meet the qualifying conditions. At the end of this period you should re-apply if you think you are still eligible. Claim forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office or Lo-call 1890 20 23 25.

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The Cheltenham Festival 2009

Tuesday 10th to Friday 13th March 2009

This year Cheltenham will be its fifth year as a four-day festival in the elegant spa town, which plays host to visitors from all over the World. The festival is without doubt one of the great sporting occasions of the season.

For many, this is the most exciting race of the year and Master Minded produced one of the greatest performances of the modern era in 2008. In 2009, Wednesday will have seven races for the first time since The Festival became a four day meeting.

On Thursday, the long distance hurdlers contest The Ladbrokes World Hurdle. Only the brave and the strong prevail in this three mile contest. Inglis Drever made history by winning the race for the third time in 2008 and is being aimed at the race for one last time in 2009. The Ryanair Chase is another Grade 1 highlight on Thursday. Thursday will once again be Ladies Day.

Then comes Friday and the highlight of the entire Jump season: the Totesport Cheltenham Gold Cup. This is the race that every owner trainer and jockey dreams of winning and it takes a very special horse to win more than once.

Denman led home Kauto Star and Neptune Collognes in a Paul Nicholls-trained 1-2-3 in 2008 and will be looking to add his name in 2009 to those of legends Golden Miller, Arkle and Best Mate as multiple winners of Jumping's Blue Riband event.

Inexpensive tips for keeping Pets



Don't buy expensive chew treats for your dog – instead, buy long-lasting rubber toys like the Kong. When stuffed with food and deep-frozen, these give your dog hours of contented chewing time, and they can be used again and again, lasting for several years.

Learn to **groom your own pet**. A one-off investment in electric fur clippers will equip you to cut your own pet's hair for many years.

Choose your pet's food carefully. Cheap pet food can be poor quality, and is not always good value. Pets need to eat more food to get an equivalent amount of nutritive value. Instead, choose a **high-quality**, **so-called "premium"**

brand that your pet likes, and don't change brands too frequently. Pet shops and vet clinics stock a range of diets that are suitable.

Don't let your pet get fat. Many people waste money by **feeding their pet too much**, and obese pets end up with illnesses (such as diabetes and arthritis) that are expensive to treat.

Don't buy expensive toys for your cat – make your own instead. Try stuffing an old sock and attaching it to a piece of string. Fill a container with a few dried pasta shapes, rice or dried peas, roll it across the floor and it's rattling and clattering should have your cat chasing it to investigate.

There are always **odd socks** and the missing one never turns up no matter how much you think it will. The simplest way is to just roll one or more odd socks into a ball and throw it for your kitty. It will not bounce like a ball but will slide along a smooth floor, and your cat will delight in **chasing**, **bating and catching the sock prey!**

Maynooth Library celebrates 25 years

M aynooth Community Library held a special event in December 2008 to celebrate 25 years of service to the local community at its present site. The library on Main Street first opened its doors in February 1983. At the time it made history in public library provision, as its sister branch library in Celbridge was opened on the same day. This was the first occasion on which two new, custom-built library branches were simultaneously opened by the same local

authority.

In the quarter-century since then, much has changed in Maynooth Library. In its early days, library users were served by two desks; adults used the desk at the Main Street entrance, while children used a separate desk just inside the rear entrance. Staff from that time recall using a combination of hand signals and the internal telephone system to communicate between the desks. Over the years several internal modifications took place; the two desks are long gone, replaced by a signal service area in the centre of the library. Probably the most significant and visible change has been the ongoing growth of technology; the card catalogues and cardboard readers tickets of 1983 have given way to computer-based systems, and users can now avail of public access PCs for Internet, e-mail and private study.

The Library has always striven to be an integral part of its community. Over the

years it has played host to countless events, meetings and exhibitions, and has taken part in several local initiatives, including the Maynooth Play and Learn Project involving children from the Blacklion halting site, and the Book of

Maynooth, a unique project to celebrate the new millennium. The book devised as a result of this project is now permanently on display at the library.

While there have been many changes, one thing which remains the same is the commitment of staff over the years to providing the best possible service to everyone in its community. To celebrate its first 25 years, the library hosted a Christmas recital by the Kildare Local Authorities Choir. This was attended by Mayor of County Kildare and Maynooth resident Councillor Senan Griffin, current and past members of the library staff, and many friends and supporters of the library. Together they enjoyed the music, toasted the success of the library's first 25 years, and looked forward to the next 25.

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Have we found Maynooth's oldest bicycle still in use?

 \mathbf{Y} ou often hear it said that they do not make things now like they used to. Well when we went in search of Maynooth's oldest bicycle we think that the statement is true. While we have not definitively identified Maynooth oldest bicycle still in use, we certainly found a contender. We met up with Robert O'Reilly from the Moyglare Road to see his 1959 Triumph Tenerife which is still in very good condition. Robert purchased the bicycle from Ua Buachalla's in Maynooth and he thinks that he paid £25 for it.

The bicycle has all original parts except for the back carrier despite the fact that it has been used continuously for fifty four years. It has also been abroad spending some time in France and was used for many long distance cycles. Robert was a keen cyclist as it was his mode of transport before the car. However in more recent years he is only able to cycle around the Moyglare area using the footpaths as a cycle lane.

Robert points out that it is not safe to cycle on the Moyglare road because of the volume and speed of the traffic. This road is the only road in Maynooth that does not have a cycle lane to ensure the safety of cyclists he points out. With over 1,000 houses in this area (up to 20% of the population of Maynooth) as well as two of the local schools it is amazing that cycle lanes are not in place he says.

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NEW CYCLING GROUP AIMS TO PROMOTE MAYNOOTH AS A" Model Cycle Town"

Not since the promotion given to cycling over thirty years ago by the Parish Priest, Father Fergus O'Higgins with his cycles for charity has there been a serious effort to promote the use of the bike in Maynooth. This is about to change because a new group *Maynooth Cycling Campaign* has been formed within NUI, Maynooth.

However the group which has about 35 members and hold their meetings (generally one Wednesday a month) in the south campus of St Patrick's will organise evening meetings to suit people from outside the University and are not available during the day if there is interest from the wider community. Formed in June 2008 the group has set an ambitious list of actions to further the needs of cyclist in Maynooth. These include;

Group to act as the representative body for cyclists in Maynooth Highlight cycling issues emphasizing the positive, not be anti-car and propose concrete effective solutions to issues and problems.

Lobby for a cross-University campus cycle corridor, with or without the pedestrian corridor proposal.



Promote carrying of bicycles on public transport - Bike and Ride, especially with Irish Rail. Link up with `Rail Users Ireland'.

Involve themselves in development issues relevant to cycling.

Improve the quality of cycling facilities: cycle lanes, shelters, shower facilities, security, and safety.

Contribute to rational informed debate by gathering research on cycling issues.

Form mutually beneficial links with other cycling organisations such as Dublin Cycling Campaign, Galway Cycling Campaign etc.

Investigate the idea of promoting Maynooth as a "model cycle town". Liaise with Kildare County Council, Waterways Ireland, and Irish Rail etc. regarding cycle access routes to Maynooth.

Form links with all local politicians and canvass them on cycling issues.

Raise the positive profile of cycling by organising cycling events e.g. Cycle to Work



John Murray, Davíd Walsh, Peter Denman, Tom Fahy, Paul Davís, Víncent Murphy, Jonívar Skulleríd.

Day, Cycle Promotion Schemes, information on notice boards highlighting advantages of cycling etc.

Carry out survey of staff/students of NUI Maynooth and St. Patrick's to ascertain transport modes, attitudes to cycling (especially personal reason for/against).

Spokesman for *Maynooth Cycling Campaign* John Murray is keen to broaden the group and invites input from the community as the group is keen to represent the entire cycling community in Maynooth. NUI Maynooth has commissioned a Mobility Management Study, and the group is currently preparing a submission for this (including off-campus cycle and pedestrian mobility and the group would welcome your views. The first major event that the group hopes to promote is a "Cycle to Work Day" in Maynooth for late March so watch out for the details and why not take to your own bike on the day.

St.Patrick's Day Parade

We will have a float as usual in the Maynooth parade this year with a thoughtful message for you if you are viewing the parade floats.

Maynooth is in danger of taking the record for the largest number of bollards

It is particularly noticeable that inconsiderate parking is leading to damage to the few green spaces that we have left in the town centre. A number of years ago we had to install bollards down outside the Castle. Kildare County Council has put in place bollards at other locations in an effort to prevent encroachment by inconsiderate drivers who abandon there cars anywhere regardless of the surface. It has been necessary to erect new bollards in Leinster Street in order to eliminate inconsiderate and unsafe parking (see picture).





Other locations need to be protected as when cars damage the verge it is not possible to cut it when the grass begins to grow. One such location is opposite the schools on the Moyglare Road (see picture). It is particularly disappointing to see the damage to the island outside the boys primary school caused by a small number of inconsiderate people. If we are not careful we will have so many bollards to protect vulnerable areas that we will take the record for the largest number of bollards in one town.

Make a daily cycle part of your routine - it's good for you

At 84 years of age Gerard Howard Williams must qualify as one of the oldest cyclists in Maynooth. Still cycling about six miles a day, Gerard has reaped the rewards for his passion for the two wheel mode of transport. He has made a rapid recovery from a recent surgical procedure and the doctors acknowledged that Gerard's general good health was in no small way accounted for by his daily cycle.

One of Gerard's first memories of cycling was a cycle around the Isle of Man TT course in 1935. His father also a keen cyclist, brought as many of his nine children as could cycle a bike on this trip. Gerard and his bike(well one of his many over the years) are not easily separated. He regularly brings his bike to the UK when visiting family and even much further afield as was the case with a sun holiday to celebrate a special wedding anniversary.


His son Paul (also a keen cyclist) believes that the key to getting the benefit from cycling is that you include it in your normal daily routine rather than having to make a conscious decision to go for a cycle. Gerard makes a daily trip from their home on the Leixlip Road to Maynooth for shopping using Carton Demesne and Carton Avenue as his route unless he is in a hurry and then he uses the main road. He refuses to travel by car unless it is necessary.

Gerard's message is that cycling is good for you. If he is feeling under the weather a cycle can usually bring back a good feeling. He pointed out that Maynooth has much improved cycling routes in recent years even though there is still much that can be done to assist the cyclist. He is also conscious that a cyclist must be seen to be safe with the level of traffic on the roads and he insists on wearing all the safety gear that a cyclist needs. All of Gerard's children are keen cyclists also and Gerard hopes that he can encourage others to take to their bikes.

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
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Beauty Tips For Teens



Teens Skin Care Tips : Due to overactive hormonal glands around puberty the skin becomes oily. The centre of the face from forehead to the chin area tends to be extra oily. Since the body is generally covered, once a day cleaning is enough, but the same is not the case with face, neck, and arms due to over exposure to sun, dust, and other pollution. **Teens do not neglect your skin** even if it is normal.

Foundation For Teens: Foundation is not necessary for teens. If teens prefer then choose a foundation to match your skin tone. Using the right foundation makes your skin look flawless and smooth. Choose the **shade closest to your skin tone** by testing it on your jaw line. The correct shade will look natural when compared with your neck. Lightly moisturize face and neck, using an anti-shine product on your T-zone if it is oily then apply small dots of foundation.

Health and Beauty - For Teens : A sensible diet includes **fruits, greens, and vegetables**, milk product, whole grain cereals, and bread and lean meats. Have wholesome meals to attain your project of being beautiful. Keep nutrition in your mind and eat in right quantities. Leave the dinner table when you can still eat another morsel of food. Teens digestive system will function better. Drink plenty of water, at least 8-10 glasses a day, to eliminate toxins from the body and retain the moisture level in the skin to keep wrinkles away at a later age.

Moderate Exercise For Teens : A regular 30-40 minutes of moderate exercise is enough to keep the body beautiful, supple and active. **Jogging is a natural exercise**, good for teen and all. 

Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) Presentation to Leixlip Area Meeting:

The DTO and their Consultants made a presentation on their proposed plans for the Train Station/Harbour Area to the Leixlip Area Committee on 16 January. The Area Committee became aware of the existence of such a Plan last May and they have been awaiting the DTO presentation since then. They stated that they expect their Plan to be approved over the next couple of months. The main proposals are:

Maynooth Labour News

An underground bus station and car park for 400 underground the Harbour Field. Residential and Commercial development on top of the re-instated Harbour Field A re-vamping of the train station.

Cllr. John McGinley made the following points to them:

- An underground car park was part of the Maynooth Harbour Action Area Plan which was approved by the Area Committee 3 years ago. John wanted to know when we were going to see action as he pointed out that the DTO prepared a Park & Ride strategy in March 2005 and now we are presented with another strategy (both at great cost). The Area Committee had included a new road from Straffan road to Parson Street so that all of the car park traffic would not emerge at the Roost Junction as proposed by the DTO.
- Under no circumstances would John or the people of Maynooth agree to the demolition of the 4 playgrounds, and do away with the playing pitch and the proposed Scouts Hall in order to build more houses and commercial premises on the Harbour Field.
- The DTO seemed to be ignoring the proposed big Park & Ride at Collinstown (opposite INTEL). John made the point that this is the Area Committees preferred site for a Regional Park & Ride and that bringing more cars into a Park & Ride in Maynooth made no sense. The Park & Ride in Maynooth should be for local people only.

In Cllr. McGinley's view the DTO proposals for the underground car park are three years too late and in the present economic climate it is unlikely that the Government will give funding to the DTO for their implementation. In the meantime it is therefore essential that sufficient long term car park capacity is secured to cater for commuters, workers and business people in the town.

Cllr. John McGinley has asked for the following changes to be made to the proposed Draft Pay Parking Scheme for Maynooth:

- 1. Make most of the Lyreen Area "Residents Only Parking"
- 2. Put "No Entry" signs at the entrance to Back Lane and leave it "Two Way".
- 3. All footpaths need to be upgraded in the Lyreen Area, roads re-surfaced and speed cushions put in place in consultation with the Residents' Association
- 4. Make Buckley's Lane "Two Way" with passing bay provision
- 5. Leave Cross Lane as it is at present with the "No Entry " sign
- 6. Remove the 4 parking spaces at the start of Pound Street and leave the yellow lines

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7. Remove the parking bay at the Band Hall and put a yellow box junction to take in the entrance to Pound Park (The Green)

8. Remove the double yellow lines from Dillon's Row and put parking bays there

9. Extend the parking bays on Convent Lane to house number 10

10. Remove the 8 parking bays at the top of Carton Avenue and complete with the cobble lock proposals in Dwg. No. E3065 dated July 2004 as already agreed by the Area Committee.

The footpath on the residential side of Parson Street should be upgraded and parking bays put in place up to house number 18

And of course the scheme cannot be implemented until suitable long term parking has been provided. In order to speed up the process the Council should in the short term provide such parking facilities through a lease arrangement with TESCO, Waterways Ireland (at The Harbour) etc.

Cllr. John McGinley has Submitted the Following Motions to the Leixlip Area Committee:

Bonfire Debris at the bottom of Old Greenfield:

"That the debris left behind after the bonfire at Old Greenfield, Maynooth, be removed without any further delay."

Safe Route to Playing Pitches on the Rathcoffey Road

"What progress has been made on providing a safe route for children walking to the Rathcoffey Road football pitches in Maynooth"?

Roundabout Needed at Junction of Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road:

"That a roundabout be installed at the junction of the Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road or if that is not possible that the lights at Lidl be moved to this location in the interest of safe traffic movement."

LOSS OF 5 OUT OF THE 7 OUTDOOR COUNCIL STAFF SERVICING THE TOWNS OF MAYNOOTH, LEIXLIP AND CELBRIDGE IS A MAJOR BLOW

Cllr. John McGinley has stated that the redundancy of 5 out of the 7 Kildare County Staff servicing the 3 towns of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge is devastating for the individuals and their families and he offers his support and sympathy to them.

Such a large number, of an already low workforce, being laid off will inevitably result in a reduction of services to the public unless there is a dedicated gang taken from elsewhere in the county to replace them.

In Cllr. McGinley's view the use of "Mobile Teams" as suggested by some senior Managers in the Council will not work. John has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the next Leixlip Area Committee Meeting on 20 February:

"That appropriate steps are taken to ensure that there will be no reduction in the Street Cleaning and Litter Management Service to the public in the major towns of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge as a result of reducing the outdoor staff numbers from 7 to 2."

Cllr. McGinley allocates Funding for Pedestrian Lights on the Rathcoffey Road:

"I'm very pleased at the Council's promptness in carrying out the work on the new Pedestrian Crossing at Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth. I funded this much needed safety measure from my Discretionary Grants. The cost of the project is €39, 725.

Many residents of Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth, contacted me about the safety of their children getting to Bond Bridge because of the lack of a footpath from the end of Castledawson.

The Council advised me that the cost of installing a footpath would be astronomical because of the land take required. I asked them to install a pedestrian crossing from the Castledawson side to the Cluain Aoibhinn side and their response was that they had no money for such work.

I therefore decided to use all of my Discretionary Grants so that the Pedestrian Crossing could be put in place.

The new lights will also act as a much needed traffic calming measure as traffic will automatically slow down as a result of their installation."

GO-AHEAD AT LAST FOR GAELSCOIL UI FHIAICH

Deputy Emmet Stagg and Cllr. John McGinley have welcomed the announcement that the permanent school building for Gaelscoil Ui Fhiaich on the Celbridge Road, Maynooth, has finally been sanctioned with approval to go to tender and construction in 2009.

The site for the school, where the existing prefabricated buildings are located, was transferred into the ownership of the School's Board Of Management in December 2004, and despite Government stalling, at last the school will now have permanent buildings.

The project will involve the building of a new 16 classroom school and tenders should be invited shortly for the building contract.

GOVERNMENT REFUSE TO BUDGE ON MAYNOOTH B.N.S. DESPITE PRIORITY RATING

Deputy Emmet Stagg again questioned the Minister for Education in relation to the appointment of a Design Team for the required extension to Maynooth Boys National School on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

The Minister in his response to Deputy Stagg peddled the usual FF mantra that the project would be considered in the context of the Department's Multi Annual School Building and Modernisation Programme.

Expressing his anger at the Minister's refusal to sanction the appointment of a Design Team Deputy Stagg outlined the following facts:

• The Department of Education themselves approached the school in Summer 2007 asking them to increase the number of classrooms from 17 to 24. The School agreed and yet nothing has happened to progress the project.

• The Project has the highest priority band rating in the Department assigned to major capital projects. The Minister obviously does not understand the meaning of the word priority.

There are 475 pupils attending the school at present in overcrowded classrooms placing additional pressure on teaching staff at the school. The Minister obviously does not care.

Deputy Stagg stated that it is disheartening for the pupils, teaching staff and parents to meet with such a dismissive attitude from this FF Minister, a member of a Government who has walked us into a recession and which has no policy now except to cut public services with no thought of stimulating the economy and stemming the tide of job losses by investing heavily in Educational Infrastructure such as the Maynooth School Project.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would continue to highlight this issue with the Minister to

force a change of mindset.

SHOCKING 17% INCREASE IN THOSE SIGNING ON IN MAYNOOTH EXCHANGE IN 1 MONTH

Deputy Emmet Stagg has described the latest Live Register Figures for those signing on at the Maynooth Labour Exchange, which saw the numbers signing on increasing from 3,589 people at the end of December 2008 to 4,188 people at the end of January, 2009, as truly shocking and an indictment of the Governments failure to address the loss of Jobs in the Economy whilst concentrating solely on bringing the Public Finances into line.

The Government stated Deputy Stagg is fixated solely with bringing public expenditure under control and is failing to address the need to generate employment, to get the economy moving, to get people spending and to get revenues buoyant again. For every job lost in the Irish Economy the cost to the Exchequer in terms of Social Welfare Assistance and tax revenues forgone is in the order of €20,000. Those who have lost their jobs are people who were working and want to work now and who are facing a financial crisis for their families and the culture shock that being unemployed and all that it means brings with it.

The key to getting out of the economic crisis requires a change in the mindset of the Government to use resources to get people back working. Even if we give €7 Billion to the disgraced bankers who along with the inept Government we have had for the past 12 years have brought the Country to the crisis we now face, there are still sufficient reserves in the National Pension Reserve Fund of €11 Billion which can be used to generate jobs in the Economy. The jobs can be Labour intensive and we have already suggested that they can be in the areas of School Building, urban regeneration and home insulation. A further use of the reserves would be in the area of Home Improvements for the Disabled and Elderly. In Kildare alone there is a backlog of such work valued at €8 Million. An intensive scheme to fund these works in 1 year nationally would probably cost €500 Million. Apart from creating jobs we would be creating a better environment for these disabled people and elderly people and giving them some comfort in their homes.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the Government must finally acknowledge that they cannot simply sit back and allow jobs to be lost in massive numbers. By creating jobs we will grow the economy, restore public finances and put consumer (Continued on page 54)

STAGG DENOUNCES ATTACK ON PUBLIC SERVICE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has denounced the concerted attack on the Public Service orchestrated by many of those same people who have brought the Economy to its knees and which culminated with a new Tax on Public Servants with the introduction this week of the Pension Levy.

The pension tax stated Deputy Stagg is unfair and unjust and seeks to place the burden of the correction of Public Finances on one section of the Community, a section which had no hand act or part in the creation of the crisis in public finances.

Public servants accept that everybody in the country will have to play their part in pulling together to bring our economy back to where it was a short time ago. What they will not accept, and what the Labour Party has opposed is the scapegoating of public servants, many on very modest incomes. The government picked an easy target to raise €1.4 Billion rather than looking at existing taxes and bringing forward a mini budget to target those gained the most from the boom years - the bankers, developers and property speculators. Why are tax exiles allowed to retain Irish passports, why are landlords allowed interest relief on rental properties, why do we allow tax relief on pension contributions in any year up to €150,000, why are we giving tax breaks to for profit private hospitals, why is a single person taxed at 41% on an income of €36,400 and somebody earning €100,000 is also taxed at the same rate, why are the Chief Executives of the A.I.B. and B.O.I allowed to earn €3 million a year and be taxed at the 41% rate.

Without our public service the county would stop functioning stated Deputy Stagg and it's time we valued our public servants and resisted the right wing attacks on them from quarters closely associated with the government.

STAGG WELCOMES ALOCATION OF 6 ADDITIONAL GARDAI TO LEIXLIP DISTRICT BUT MUCH MORE NEEDS TO BE DONE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the allocation of an additional 6 Gardai to the new Leixlip District Garda Headquarters in the past fortnight but has stated that considerable additional resources are required in the Garda Stations in North Kildare if crime is to be tackled meaningfully. There have been a spate of robberies including a tiger kidnapping in the North Kildare Towns of Celbridge, Kilcock, Leixlip and Maynooth recently and our gardai despite the recent allocation of 6 additional Gardai are operating under severe pressure stated Deputy Stagg.

Following on from the setting up of the New Leixlip District Headquarters in Leixlip there should have been a large allocation of additional Gardai into the area but this has yet to materialise commented Deputy Stagg. Present Garda Strength in the local stations are Leixlip 33, Celbridge 21, Maynooth 16 and Kilcock 8.

Despite the fact that assistance will still be provided if required by Dublin Metropolitan Area West in the towns of Celbridge, Kilcock, Leixlip and Maynooth, and the fact that the Naas District Headquarters will assist if required in the Carbury Area the fact is that there are only 78 Gardai in the North Kildare Towns serving a population of 50,033 people (2006 Census). This means that there is one garda for every 641 people in the 4 North Kildare Towns and probably means the area is the most undermanned area in the State. An additional 57 Gardai would need to be appointed to the 4 towns if we were to reach the national average of Gardai to population which is 1 garda for every 368 people.

Now that we have our own North Kildare 24 hour Garda Station in Leixlip we need to ensure that our local gardai are not continually undermanned and Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to raise the issue of Garda Numbers with the Commissioner Fachtna Murphy.

306 ELDERLY PEOPLE AWAITING LONG TERM CARE OR HOME CARE PACKAGES IN CO. KILDARE

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of elderly people awaiting admission to a public nursing home in Co. Kildare and the number of people on the waiting list for home care packages.

The HSE have advised Deputy Stagg that there are 155 people on the waiting list for long stay beds in Co. Kildare, 24 of whom are in acute hospitals and76 who are living in the Community. The remaining 55 are in private nursing homes with inadequate levels of subvention. In relation to the home care packages there are 151 people on the waiting list.

Deputy Stagg has described the figures as shocking (Continued on page 56)

which painted a clear picture of the Governments scant regard for our Senior Citizens who require help because they are unable to live independently in the community or need some assistance in the home to continue living in the Community. The fact that 76 people deemed to require Nursing Home Care are still living in the Community placing huge strains on family members is nothing short of scandalous.

Our Senior Citizens deserve to be treated with compassion when they find themselves unable to cope at home and Deputy Stagg has vowed to pressurise the HSE and the Government until proper services are put in place for our most valued members of the Community.

STAGG SLAMS 13% REDUCTION IN REGIONAL AND LOCAL ROAD GRANTS FOR KILDARE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has slammed the decision by the Minister for Transport to slash the Regional and Local Roads Grant Allocation to Kildare Co. Council by 13%, down from an allocation of \in 28,178,630 in 2008 to \in 24,578,264 in 2009.

Nationally the Total Grants allocated to all Local Authorities fell by 2% and yet Kildare and a number of other Counties saw inordinate reductions in their Grant Allocations, whilst some actually received higher allocations.

These grants stated Deputy Stagg enable the restoration, maintenance and improvement works to many of our local roads in the County and fund major works such as the Clane/Kilcock Improvement Scheme, the Enfield to Edenderry Improvement Scheme and the Naas Ring Roads.

I note that the local FF T.D Aine Brady has welcomed the allocation but maybe she can explain to the Public in Co. Kildare as to why our grants are down 13% stated Deputy Stagg. Whilst some have actually increased – we do have 4 FF T.D.'s in Co. Kildare, one of whom is a Minister of State – have they no influence at all with their own Government.

Home owners should check out Insulation Programme

'It is expected that the scheme will open for homeowner applications next month. Applications will be made through Sustainable Energy Ireland (SEI), online at www.sei.ie/hes or by post on forms which will be available on *(Continued on page 60)*

'The scheme is aimed at older houses that would not typically have the energy efficiency features of recently built homes. The scheme is open to all houses built prior to 2006. Houses built from 2006 onwards should be built to the Building Regulations 2002 standard, which specifies high quality insulation and heating controls.'

'Roof Insulation grants of €250, Cavity Wall Insulation grants of €400, Internal Wall Insulation Grant of €2,500 and External Wall Insulation of €4,000 are some of the examples that will be available from the scheme.'

'The Warmer Home Scheme, which is part of the Low Income Housing Programme, is administered by SEI as well. The Scheme was introduced in 2002 and provides funding, through community based organisations, to those on low income for the installation of energy efficiency measures in their homes. Applicants should see http:// www.sei.ie/, telephone 1 850 534 534 or phone my office on 01 618 3057 for further detail on how to apply to community groups involved in the programme.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Dublin Bus should have a Commuter Belt Bus Day

Deputy Aine Brady has suggested that Dublin Bus should have a special 'Commuter Belt Bus Day' in the near future to market the Bus as a reliable and frequent mode for Transport for Commuters in North Kildare. Deputy Brady made her suggestion at the Joint Oireachtas Transport Committee meeting attended by the Management of Dublin Bus and Bus Eireann.

'Since the completion of the road works at the junction of the N4 with the M50, the effective completion of the road works at the N4 / Lucan Junction and the provision of a Bus Lane from Lucan all the way into the City Centre, the Bus Service has the potential to be an efficient mode of transport to Dublin, from the Towns of Maynooth, Leixlip and Celbridge. Travel time should be much reduced than it was 12 months ago, when construction work was at its height.' stated Deputy Brady.

'As a regular user of Public Transport, I have found the train service to be very good. It is now time that we market the Bus and I sincerely hope that Dublin Bus will set in place a 'Commuter Belt Bus Day', have a reduced one day rate, even if it is only a 20 or 30% reduction for that day, and advertise the service with its enhanced service times.'

'I strongly believe that if people try the Bus, if Dublin Bus seek suggestions from its customers on how the service can be improved, commuters will leave the car at home and use public transport. Recently, Dublin Bus have responded positively to representations I have made on behalf of their customer to have certain Bus routes improved. These improvements not only assisted the user of the service, but it also will bring revenue benefits to Dublin Bus.' concluded Deputy Brady.

Over &24.5 million for regional and local roads in Kildare – Brady

Local TDs and councilors ignore Lisbon Treaty covenant call for Ireland

Last December, as part of a nationwide campaign, we sent the following covering letter and covenant to all twenty two local TDs, county councilors and Leixlip town councilors in north Kildare:

Re: Covenant between Irish Public Representatives and the People of Ireland.

Dear Public Representative,

I attach herewith a copy of above covenant for your consideration and signature.

Last June, after a full and open democratic debate, the people of Ireland decisively voted to reject the Lisbon Treaty. With a turnout of 53%, nearly one million voters cast No ballots – a clear 53.4% majority of the poll. However, it is now becoming increasingly clear that the EU bureaucrats and Big Power elites, with the compliance of our Government, is refusing to honour the people's decision and are insisting that the Irish be forced to vote again on the same treaty.

To present again the Lisbon Treaty, dressed up with some aspirational declarations or clarifications, would be both fundamentally undemocratic and legally fraudulent. Only a new treaty with legally binding protocols on Irish concerns regarding neutrality, workers' rights, tax codes, commissioners, etc. would be a creditable alternative. Anything less can only serve to increase the democratic deficit between the EU and the peoples of its individual States and, in particular for Ireland, add to the considerable cynicism towards politics of which you as elected representatives will be keenly aware.

We believe that all local TDs, county councilors, and town commissioners, by virtue of the fact that you hold public office as a result of the same democratic process that rejected the Lisbon Treaty, have a special role and responsibility to ensure that the Government fully respects the decision of 12 June. In particular, we hold that this responsibility applies equally to public representatives who campaigned for either a Yes or No vote last June.

In the interests of the integrity of democratic politics we respectfully request that you sign and return enclosed covenant.

Regretfully, we now have to advise the local electorate that only one of the twenty two elected politicians responded to our letter and covenant. It is our view that the refusal of twenty one public representatives to respond displays a blatant disregard by them for the democratic system. They are well resourced with generous funding from taxpayers to respond to constituency requests of this nature. Are we to deduce that their silence reflects a mute compliance with the diktat from Brussels to a supine Government and a political establishment who all failed to side with their own people?

For the record, Bernard Durkan TD was the single representative who did respond. He did so in an unrepentant Yes fashion. We fundamentally disagree with his reasoning and have written back to him accordingly. But at least he had the decency to reply!

It is becoming increasingly clear that the electorate must again lead while the politicians fail and fear to respect the people's verdict. No means No to Lisbon.





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Editorial

April 2009

What a weekend for Irish sport and it was badly needed to lift the spirits of the Irish nation! At least we know that we are good at two things: entertainment and sport. The parade in Dublin was such a colourful sight to behold, even if I only saw it on television. But our own parade here in Maynooth was a credit to the organisers, the participants and to the huge crowd that turned out to watch. Congratulations are due to all those involved – particularly to the dedicated committee who work so hard year after year. Congratulations also to the office staff and the supervisor.

The week of Patrick's Day brought a certain amount of soul searching and self-reflection in various branches of the media. Who are we? Where are we going? Watching the leprachaun hats, the tri-coloured faces, I wonder are we self-fulfilling the "stage Irish" image of ourselves? After 12 years of the skinny latte society, flash new cars every year - what have we got to show for all the money that sloshed around? Very little as we look at the state of hospitals, schools and public transport -whether this means buses or trains. Most of the money went on tax cuts and road building. When the word "infrastructure" is mentioned - this means roads or, more specifically, motorways. Everything else comes after the road system. But where do we go from here? Tourism is an obvious industry but what have we got to offer now? Small villages and seaside town scarred with houses and apartment blocks, the green iconic image of the countryside scarred by huge unsustainable motorways. Is there a vision anywhere for our future? Ideology seems a dirty word. But now we need vision and ideology more than ever.

There is a report elsewhere in the Newsletter of the last Community Council meeting and the address given by Prof. John Hughes, president of NUIM. He attended at the invitation of the Council and outlined the future plans for the University. His presentation was very illuminating and informative. One of the final points he made was the danger of the rationalisations planned by the Government and the possible threat to the existing third level institutions in general. The University provides 800 jobs and puts €70m into the local community and we certainly hope that there will be no diminution in its status or any effect from the current economic climate. Education is one of the only ways out of this downturn and any interference with the system, at any level, is not only retrograde but downright irresponsible. The decisions made in haste at present could have very serious ramifications in the future. There is the danger of rash slashing that we could live to regret.

Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council Meeting 9th March 2009

The meeting began with a presentation by Prof. John Hughes, President of the National University of Ireland, Maynooth and this was followed by a question and answer session. The President was accompanied by Mr Frank Fitzmaurice Director of Corporate Services in NUIM for the past two years. The Chairman, Colm Ó Cearúil, said that the initial contact with the College had been made through the Planning and Development committee.

Prof. Hughes said that the University has come a long way since the '60s and emphasised that 75% is dedicated to culture, Arts and Social Sciences. In 2008 NUIM was named University of the Year, and it has been the fastest growing University in Ireland. There are over 9,000 students, in three Faculties, but this increase will soon peak – only a further 200-300 students will be taken in.

The University has the highest points in Arts and Science as well as the highest research income per academic in Ireland. It is the only university with particular contacts with Intel such as Global Education Partner and Innovation Value Institute. Intel has invested heavily in these and NUIM offers an Engineering MA for them, including people from the States. There will be future growth in spin-out, spin-in companies, in licensing technology and start up companies, this is bringing business to the area. There will be more part-time students and there is a new business and law degree.

He stressed the fact that Universities are under threat, the cuts are extensive and amalgamations/closures are possible. NUIM gives 800 jobs and brings €70m annually into the economy.

Frank Fitzmaurice said that Maynooth is the only university town in Ireland and outlined future plans. It is the intention to bring campus closer to the town, to link both campuses and the town. He outlined the major developments: New Library, Arts and Social Science Building, Carton Innovation Camp, Student Apartments, Restaurant and signature buildings close to the Kilcock Road.

The Arts/Social Science building will begin now and be ready in July 2010. There will be no theatre as there was a shortfall in the available funding. Carton Park will have research projects, developing products and incubator and start-up companies. The Apartments will add about 350 beds near playing pitches. A new restaurant is required because of the recent fire. The signature buildings are some years away, 2-5 years, because of the funding issues.

The council members raised a number of issues and questions:

The library could be connected electronically with the local library.

Building workers will be kept on-site during construction.

There is a traffic management report pending and a strategy will be developed for traffic/parking, they are trying to promote cycling and walking.

The College had looked at buying property in the town but it had been too expensive in the past.

The President spoke about the Carton development was it necessary – incubation business should be separate from education. He said that the area in Carton is derelict, screened and near the river. No trees will be felled, no impact on cultural aspect. He praised the beauty of the environment of Carton and pointed to the pristine nature of the South Campus and gardens to show their care of Heritage. NUIM had a space for archives in Castletown. Frank Fitzmaurice said that they were also interested in a connection between the H. Field developments at Parson Street and the campus and the railway. St Patrick's were independent but involved. There was a plan for a boulevard on the Kilcock Road and a question over the existing footbridge.

There were reports from the various committees of the Council, including the St Patrick's Day Parade. J. McGinley said that the floats were nearly double that of last year. There is a full report on the Parade on Pages 32 and 34.

A serious matter was raised by P. Croghan of the Tidy Towns committee –the havoc caused by the sewerage works with their areas all torn up and with no reference J. McGinley explained that the contractor began work without approval, without an archaeologist although they were working in a zone of archaeological protection around the College etc. Work had now stopped – the council agreed that the Tidy Towns committee should write a letter demanding that their work should be reinstated and that the Executive would send this to Kildare County Council.

D. Cullen of the Planning and Development committee raised two important issues. She had contacted Meath County Council regarding the changes to the Carton Park plans – they were too large to photocopy. The Meath draft local area plan included the two Smart Parks one at Moygaddy and Carton. The Plan was only publicised in the Meath Chronicle. The committee were told that they could make a submission even though the date had passed. It was agreed that the committee would make the submission and that the Executive would back this. The second issue also concerned Meath County Council who had a planning application for 500 houses in the Maynooth Environs. The public meeting was held in Dunboyne and the display period was over. This was only one and a half kilometres from Maynooth and there was no coordination with Co. Kildare. They would be dependent on services from Kildare. After a long discussion it was decided that a letter would be sent from the committee and then endorsed by the Executive. It was emphasised that there was no onus on Meath Co. Co. to contact Kildare.

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Gardening

Gardening in April — Growing your own vegetables

good, healthy vegetable plot is essential if you're planning to grow your own. This guide gives you all the information you need to set up a successful plot and shows you one way of rotating your crops to give you years of happy vegetable gardening.

Choosing your vegetables

Deciding what to grow is one of the best things about vegetable growing, but it's important to choose carefully and not get too carried away. Choose vegetables you really like, and look out for interesting varieties that you can harvest progressively. This will ensure that you have a ready supply of delicious vegetables throughout the growing season.



Vegetables can be ordered into four main groups, so choose the vegetables you like from each of these groups.

Group one

Potatoes, beetroot, carrots, chicory, artichokes, parsnips and salsify

Group three

Peas, all types of beans

Group two

Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, kale, swede and turnips

Group four

All other vegetables and salad crops

Plot rotation

Once you've made your selection, divide up your plot into four beds. Grow vegetables in four separate beds, grouped according to our guide. The reason for this 'grouping' is that you should not grow the same vegetable in the same place year after year. You may find other suggestions of which crops to put where, but the important thing to know is that continuous cropping of the same plant can exhaust the soil of nutrients and pests and diseases can build up.

The answer to this potential problem is consistent plot rotation: in your second year of vegetable growing, your vegetables will 'move up' one bed. Your group two vegetables will be planted where the group three vegetables previously were, group three moves to the group four bed and so on. This allows the soil to recover, and the rotation can even be beneficial to future vegetables: for example, the nitrogen that peas and beans naturally deposit in the soil is perfect for encouraging growth in cauliflowers and cabbages.

Top tips

When you're laying out your vegetable plot, bear in mind these starter tips:

- * Beds about 1.2m (4ft) wide with paths all around are perfect, because you can water and weed without having to tread on the bed.
- * Leave sufficient space between the beds to allow easy access to the plants. A path with a hard surface the width of a wheelbarrow is ideal.
- * Make sure there is a source of water nearby. It may be worth investing in an outdoor tap or installing a rainwater butt nearby.
- * If your soil is poor or doesn't drain well, consider building raised beds. By creating a retaining wall from bricks or old railway sleepers, you can add a thick layer of organic material that will improve the soil. In addition, raised beds are easier to tend and don't need digging over in the autumn.
- * If you've only got a small space, choose early or dwarf vegetable cultivars as they require less space and can be planted closer together.



THE ORIGIN OF THE EASTER BUNNE




Postcard from 1915

Dike the origin of Easter, the Easter Bunny has roots that go back to pre-Christian, Anglo-Saxon history. The holiday was originally a pagan celebration that worshipped the goddess Eastre. She was the goddess of fertility and springtime and her earthly symbol was the rabbit. Thus the pre-Christian Anglo-Saxons worshipped the rabbit believing it to be Eastre's earthly incarnation.

When the Anglo-Saxons were converted to Christianity, the pagan holiday, which occurred around the same time as the Christian memorial of Jesus' resurrection from the dead, was combined with the Christian celebration and given the name Easter.

The bunny as an Easter symbol seems to have its origins in Germany, where it was first mentioned in German writings in the 1500s. The first edible Easter bunnies were made in Germany during the early 1800s. And were made of pastry and sugar.

So this is yet another Hollywood started fad? Wrong, Hollywood (or Irving Berlin) got that idea from somewhere. It is believed that the Easter Parade had its beginning in the 1870s, in New York. The Easter Parade in New York was and still is an extremely popular event. Originally the church goers would carry Easter flowers from St. Thomas's Church to St. Luke's Church. In this one street parade it became a traditional rite of spring to be seen in your new spring fashions which included hats. The hats were getting larger and larger and were decorated with more and more flowers, lace, ribbon, and birds nests were all used to decorate an Easter bonnet. The parade route then extended from Madison Square to Central Park.

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Easter Recipes

uíck Roast Lamb Ingredients

- 4 lamb chops , or cutlets
- 400g new potatoes
- 250g large carrots cut into big chunks
- 1 tbsp oil, plus a little more for the lamb
- 1 sprig rosemary, leaves chopped
- 100ml red wine
- 100ml lamb stock, (from a cube is fine)
- redcurrant jelly
- green beans, or other veg, to serve

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 220C/fan 200C/gas 7. Put the potatoes and carrots onto a baking tray, toss with the oil and rosemary, then season well. Roast for 15 mins on the top shelf until the veg is golden and almost tender.
- 2. Meanwhile, make the gravy. Put the wine and stock into a small pan, then boil until reduced by about two-thirds. Stir in the redcurrant jelly, season and keep warm.
- 3. Rub the lamb in a little oil, then season. Tuck the lamb in amongst the veg, then return to the oven for 8-10 mins, turning the lamb halfway through. Serve with the redcurrant gravy.

aster Bíscuíts

Preparation time: 10 minutes

Cooking time: 15 minutes

280g plain flour

Makes 10 biscuits

Ingredients

- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 140g unsalted butter
- 140g castor sugar
- 55g currants
- 1 whole medium egg, beaten
- grated zest of 1 lemon

Method

- Pre heat the oven to 200 · C, Gas 6. 1.
- Rub the butter into the plain flour carefully, then 2. add the baking powder.
- 3. Place into a bowl and add the sugar, lemon zest, currants and egg and mix well into a dough.
- 4. Roll out on a floured surface and cut out 10, 8cm x ¼ cm thick discs.

- 5. Place onto a lightly greased baking sheet and bake in the pre heated oven for 15-18 minutes, or until golden brown all over.
- 6. Remove from the oven and leave to cool slightly, before finally removing to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 7. Store in an airtight container.

uick & Easy Easter Egg Cake



Ingredients

- 1 Packet Ouick Cake Mix Plain or Chocolate
- Up to 225g of leftover Easter Egg (broken into pieces)
- Any Smarties or Buttons or chopped Mars Bars! ٠

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180° C/350° F/Gas 4. Put paper Cases in the bun tins.
- 2. Prepare mixture as per instructions. Finally, stir in the broken Easter egg and sweets. If liked some sweets may be placed on top of buns before baking

trawberry and Oatmeal Dessert

Ingredients

- 50g/2oz Porridge Oatflakes
- 450g/1lb Strawberries
- 150ml/1/4 pt Greek Yoghurt
- 1 tbl Sugar
- 300ml/1/2pt Double Cream
- 50g/2oz Castor Sugar

Method

- Toast oatflakes under preheated grill until lightly 1. browned. Allow to cool.
- 2. Mash the strawberries with the sugar. Whip the cream and fold in the yoghurt, castor sugar and all but 2 tablespoons of the oatflakes. In glasses, laver the strawberries and cream mixture. Sprinkle remaining oatflakes on top. Decorate with a strawberry. Chill. Serves approx 4, depending on size of glasses.
- 3. Strawberries may be replaced with any other fruit of your choice.

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Pet Corner

Ret Rabbits

R abbits are often known affectionately by the pet name bunny or bunny rabbit, especially when referring to young, domesticated rabbits. Originally, the word for an adult rabbit was coney or cony, while rabbit referred only to the young animals. Male rabbits are called **bucks and females does**.

Pet rabbits kept indoors are referred to as house rabbits. House rabbits typically have an indoor pen or cage and a rabbit-safe place to run and exercise, such as an exercise pen, living room or family room. Rabbits can be trained to use a litter box and some can learn to come when called. Domestic rabbits that do not live indoors can also often serve as companions for their owners, typically living in an easily accessible hutch outside the home. Some pet rabbits live in outside hutches during the day for the benefit of fresh air and natural daylight and are brought inside at night.



Whether indoor or outdoor, pet rabbits' pens are often equipped with enrichment

activities such as shelves, tunnels, balls, and other toys. Pet rabbits are often provided additional space in which to get exercise, simulating the open space a rabbit would traverse in the wild. Exercise pens or lawn pens are often used to provide a safe place for rabbits to run.

A pet rabbit's diet typically consists of unlimited **hay, a small amount of pellets, and a small portion of fresh vegetables.**

Rabbits are social animals. Rabbits as pets can find their companionship with a variety of creatures, including humans, other rabbits, guinea pigs, and sometimes even cats and dogs. **Rabbits do not make good pets for small children** because they do not know how to stay quiet, calm, and gentle around rabbits. As prey animals, rabbits are alert, timid creatures that **startle easily**. They have fragile bones, especially in their backs, that require support on the tummy and bottom when picked up. Children 10 years old and older usually have the maturity required to care for a rabbit.

Appeal from the ISPCA— Be a Buddy to a Bunny

Many rabbits come into the care of the ISPCA, when the novelty of cleaning and caring for the rabbit wears off with its owners. As rabbits can live up to eight years, owning a rabbit is a large commitment for a family to consider. As Easter approaches and the shelves in the supermarkets are beginning to fill with chocolate eggs, the ISPCA are asking you to please consider a **thoughtful gift**. Instead of buying one Easter Egg by buying a



vital gift of food or bedding it would mean that rabbits in their care could get a second chance at being loved and respected.

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Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

Question

My employer plans to reduce my working week. Is there any extra payment I can get towards supporting my family and paying my mortgage?

Answer

If you are working a three-day week or less, you may qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit for the other days, provided you meet the other conditions.

You must be under 66 years of age, be unemployed for at least 3 days in 6, and have enough social insurance (PRSI) contributions. You must also be capable of work, available for work and genuinely seeking work.

Apply at your Social Welfare Local Office (SWLO). To save time, you can download the application form (UP 1) from www.welfare.ie and fill it in as far as possible before you call to the office.

If you do not qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit, you may be able to get Family Income Supplement (FIS). This is a payment for families at work on low pay, including single-parent families.

You must have at least one child who normally lives with you or is financially supported by you. Your child must be under 18 years of age or between 18 and 22 years of age and in full-time education. You (and/or your spouse or partner) must be working a total of 19 hours or more per week (or 38 hours per fortnight).

If you already get FIS, you may now be entitled to a higher rate of payment.

You will need to fill in the application form (FIS 1) and send it to the FIS Section, Department of Social and Family Affairs, Social Welfare Services Office, Government Buildings, Ballinalee Road, Longford. Enclose two recent payslips, your latest P60 form and a copy of your current Certificate of Tax Credits.

You may also qualify for Mortgage Interest Supplement. This is a weekly means-tested payment to help with the interest portion of your mortgage repayments in the short term. N.B. If you or your spouse/partner are working more than 30 hours per week, you will not qualify for Mortgage Interest Supplement.

You will not get help with the portion of your mortgage repayments that pays off the actual loan and house insurance. Contact your mortgage lender to discuss repaying the actual loan.

Apply to the Community Welfare Officer at your local health centre.

Question

I am earning much less than I did last year but I don't qualify for a medical card. Is there any other support I can get towards my family's medical bills?

Answer

Even though you cannot get a medical card, you and your family may qualify for a GP Visit Card, which entitles you to visit your family doctor for free. However, any prescribed drugs associated with the visit are not free. You should apply for a Drugs Payment Scheme card (see below) to help with these costs.

As with the medical card, you must meet income guidelines and be ordinarily resident in Ireland – that is, live here and intend to stay here for at least a year. The GP Visit Card income limits are 50% higher than those for the medical card.

The application form is the same as that for a medical card. You can get it at your Local Health Office or health centre, or download it from www.hse.ie. Return the completed form to your Local Health Office or health centre.

The Drugs Payment Scheme (DPS) applies to people who do not have a full medical card. Under the DPS you and your family only have to pay a maximum monthly amount for all prescribed drugs, medicines or appliances that you use. This monthly maximum has been set at \in 100 for 2009.

The DPS scheme is limited to people who are ordinarily resident in Ireland.

You can get a registration form from your pharmacy or your Local Health Office. Return it to the Local Health Office, which then issues a DPS card for each person named. Show this card whenever you have a prescription filled. The pharmacist will not charge you for anything over the limit of €100 in any calendar month.

You do not have to register with a particular pharmacy. If you need to use two or more pharmacies in a month, you may pay more than €100 in total. You can claim back the excess amount from your Local Health Office.

If you are paying income tax, you can claim tax relief on your (and your family's) medical expenses. Keep all your receipts and record all the amounts on Form MED 1. Download this form from www.revenue.ie, order a copy on Revenue's leaflet line Lo-call 1890 306 706 or get it from any Revenue office. You can also apply for this tax relief online – see www.revenue.ie for details.

Question

My name is not on the electoral register which was published in February. I will turn 18 in April. How can I register to vote in the elections in June?

Answer

European elections (5 June 2009) you can apply now to be entered in the supplement to the 2009/2010 Electoral Register. To ensure that you are registered in time, you should make sure that the completed application form reaches your local authority (County or City Council) by Monday 18 May 2009.

You can download the application form (RFA2) from www.checktheregister.ie or ask your local authority to post it to you.

There are detailed notes accompanying the form. It is important to read them carefully and follow the instructions so that you will be registered correctly and in time to vote.

As well as filling in details of your name, address, citizenship and date of birth, you should indicate if you want to be on the edited register. This version of the register can be used for non-statutory purposes such as direct marketing. You should tick the "opt-out" box if you do not want to be on the edited register.

When you have completed the first half of the form, you should go to your local Garda Station to have your identity confirmed and get the form signed. You should bring photographic identification with you – for example, a passport, a student card or a Garda Age Card. You may also be asked for evidence of your address. You should sign the form in the presence of a member of the Garda Síochána, who will then stamp it for you.

If you cannot go to the Garda Station, you may be able to complete the form at the office of your local authority. You will need similar identification, and you will have to say in writing why you cannot go to the Garda Station.

If you have a physical illness or disability which prevents you from going to the Garda Station or local authority office, you can ask your doctor to complete part of the form.

You should send the completed form directly to your local authority. It would be useful if you could enclose a copy of your birth certificate or another proof of age.

If you will be aged 18 by polling day for the local and

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
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

Question

I have heard that there are new grants for roof insulation. How do they work?

Answer

There is a new national grants scheme for homeowners who invest in certain energy efficiency improvements, such as roof insulation. The scheme is administered by Sustainable Energy Ireland (SEI). It specifies the types of work covered and the maximum grants for each. Grant approval must be in place before any materials are bought or work begins. However, you can have a Building Energy Rating (BER) carried out ahead of grant approval.

The grants will be paid out after the work is completed and you (the homeowner) have paid the contractor. If the cost of the work (including VAT) is less than the maximum grant amount, the actual cost will be reimbursed.

The types of work and the maximum grants for each are listed in the table below.

Type of work covered	Maximum grant
Roof insulation	€250
Cavity wall insulation	€400
Internal wall dry lining	€2,500
External wall insulation	€4,000
Replacement high-efficiency (greater than 90%) gas or oil-fired boilers with heating controls upgrade	€700
Heating controls upgrade	€500
Building Energy Rating (BER) – you can get a BER grant if you have a BER carried out before and after the works are completed	€200

The grant amount in your first application must be at least \in 500. This means, for example, that you cannot get a grant if you only insulate your roof. You must get one of the other works done as well in order to qualify for a grant. N.B. The BER grant cannot form part of this \in 500 amount.

The scheme will be open for applications from homeowners on 23 March 2009. In the meantime, you can register your interest at Callsave 1850 927 000 or by email to hes@sei.ie. For more information, see the Sustainable Energy Ireland website www.sei.ie.

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT

What is Supported Employment?

Supported Employment is a concept, which enables people with disabilities to be employed in paid jobs in the open labour market. Supported Employment provides support to jobseekers with disabilities and their employers and co-workers. The support given allows individuals with disabilities to become and remain gainfully employed. People with a wide range of disabilities, e.g. physical, sensory and intellectual disabilities as well as people with mental health difficulties, have become successfully employed using the Supported Employment model. In short, Supported Employment:

- Focuses on individual skills and abilities.
- Supports the individual to identify employment opportunities.
- Works in partnership with individuals, their families and employers to achieve successful outcomes for all clients.
- Promotes inclusion through employment.
- Is a professional and free service to people with disabilities and employers.
- Has enabled hundreds of people with disabilities in Ireland to secure employment.

Who is Eligible for Supported Employment?

The service is open to all persons with a disability who are "Job Ready". For the purpose of the Supported Employment Programme, job readiness is defined as "a person who has the necessary training, education, motivation and/or ability to pursue work/career in the open labour market"

How does The Programme Work?

Supported Employment has four main phases:

Phase A: Vocational Profile & Needs Assessment.

When someone is referred to Supported Employment, they will be allocated an employment specialist called a Job Coach who will prepare a Vocational Profile and also carry out a "Needs Assessment" to help identify the type of job the jobseeker would like to do.

Phase B: Job Sourcing & Development.

The Job Coach will attempt to identify suitable jobs, carry out job analysis, and help to market the jobseeker's abilities to prospective employers.

Phase C: Matching the Jobseeker with a Suitable Employer.

Providing the jobseeker with necessary support and coaching in the workplace. The Job Coach will support both the jobseeker and the employer.

Phase D: Aftercare and Follow Up.

To provide an aftercare service for clients and employers where applicable. The amount of support provided should decrease over time as the employee learns the skills required for the job and adapts to the workplace.

How do I access The S.E. Programme?

Supported Employment is nationwide. In Kildare the service is provided by the *Kildare Coalition of Supported Employment Ltd. (KCSE)* which is based at Lower Main Street, Kilcullen, Co Kildare. Referrals for the service are made through FÁS. Therefore in order to access Supported Employment you should first call into your local FÁS office and register with them and request the help of Supported Employment.

Council Replies to Cllr. McGinley's Motions on Traffic Management:

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply to his motion to install a roundabout at the Junction of the Meadowbrook Link Road/Straffan Road or if that was not possible to move the lights from Lidl to the junction:

"The management of traffic in Maynooth is monitored on a daily basis in the Traffic Management Centre and all issues are given appropriate consideration.

The suggestion to install a roundabout at this junction is not considered appropriate. Problems for turning traffic at this location have been identified and traffic signals are considered to be an improvement for all users of this junction. A number of planning applications have received planning conditions to install a new signalised arrangement at this junction. A source of funding from within the County Council has not been identified to date.

The SCOOT system installed in the town recently has sufficient capacity to link the existing traffic signals at the entrance to LIDL with the Meadowbrook Link Road junction in the future."

Cllr.John McGinley pointed out that with Dublin Bus proposing to move their terminus from this location it would be much easier and cheaper to install a roundabout. John will continue to press for a roundabout or lights at this dangerous junction.

Johns Campaign to Have the Traffic Lights at the Glenroyal Removed:

John got the following reply from the Council:

"Further to investigation of your query by technical staff, I can confirm that:

There are no plans to switch off the SCOOT adaptive control system in the Traffic Management Centre at the location in question. However, it should be noted that the issue will be reviewed as part of the general traffic management of the town during the year.

This set of traffic lights forms part of the wider area traffic management plan for the area. It is unwise to view this junction in isolation to other signals in the area.

Due to the nature of traffic signals, there will always be a perceived delay for users.

Traffic Management Centre staff continue to closely monitor the situation in the town on a daily basis. The Council is solely interested in improving traffic management for all users, including vulnerable road users."

Celbridge Road/Straffan Road Junction:

Maxol have applied for Planning Permission 08/2173 to re-vamp their shop at this junction.

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council that it be made a Planning Condition that the left turning lane at the Junction of Celbridge Road/Straffan be lengthened by Maxol removing the sharp angle on their boundary

wall. This would allow cars to freely use the already existing green filter.

John has also asked that it be made a condition that Maxol extend the footpath from their premises to the bus stop on the Celbridge Road. At present pedestrian customers of Maxol Shop have to walk on the mud on the Celbridge Road or on the Road which of course is hazardous.

Safety Measures on Rathcoffey:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion:

"Further to a preliminary design and discussions with the NRA it was recommended that prior to any final design a stage 1 and 2 safety audit would be carried out for this project. The cost of such an audit would be in the region of €3,000 and as no funding has been allocated to this project no further progress has been made."

Cllr. McGinley pointed out that the Area Committee had unanimously agreed that this project should be funded from the Deficit in Infrastructure Funds but, unfortunately the Council Management have done away with this Fund. However, John will continue to look for these essential safety measures to be put in place to the Football Pitches and the houses on the Rathcoffey road.

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motions for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

1. Removal of Graffiti Sought:

" What steps are being taken to remove the graffiti from walls at Kingsbry, Parklands, Rockfield, The Teenage Activity Area and other locations in Maynooth and what discussions have taken place with the Gardai to prevent graffiti from being sprayed in the first place?"

2 Safety Measures Sought at Entrance to the Public Car Park:

"That double yellow lines be painted on the left hand side of the entrance to the Public Car Park in Maynooth in order to prevent motorists from parking at this extremely dangerous corner."

Since submitting this motion the Council painted yellow lines. Unfortunately, they are 12m too short and John will be asking for this mistake to be corrected.

3. Safety Measures Sought for Moyglare Road:

"That HGV's be banned from Moyglare Road, Maynooth and that traffic calming speed cushions be installed on the road in the interest of public safety."

4. Improvements Sought for Old Greenfield:

"That the following works be carried out in Old Greenfield, Maynooth:

 That the hedge at the side of house number 861 be pruned so as to make it easier for people to use the footpath, particularly those on wheelchairs, and that this small area be given a general clean up.
 That the hedge along the bottom of Old Greenfield Lane be trimmed on both sides and that a general clean up be carried out in an effort to get rid of the rats and to remove the magnet for litter."

5. Removal of Concrete Tank on the Green at The College Gates

"When will the concrete tank on the green in front of the College Gate/Geraldine Castle, Maynooth be removed and will there be any structure over ground when this is done?

Straffan Wood Housing Estate

At the request of Cllr. John McGinley the Council has asked Albany Homes to repair the 12 lights that are out of order and the leak on the footpath at No. 7 The Avenue.

Teenage Activity Area & Fitness Zone at The Harbour Field

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update on 11 March:

"The contractor is due back here next week to complete the works. The reinstatement of the grass areas will be done when the ground dries out

more. It is too wet at the moment."

Serious Litter on the Slip Road to the M4 Eastward:

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following reply from the Council on 3 March:

"We are organising a clean up of the motorway and this slip road within

the next week or two."

STAGG DENOUNCES PUBLIC SERVICE TAX IN DAIL

Speaking on a Labour Private Members Motion in the Dail on Wednesday February 18th, which sought the suspension of Government Plans to impose a pension levy on Public Servants and the recommencement of negotiations with the social partners, Deputy Emmet Stagg denounced the Governments attack on Public Servants.

In his speech Deputy Stagg stated that he valued the Public Service and those who worked in it and he deplored the denigration of the workers by the Government and the Media in recent months. An orchestrated campaign of half truths and downright lies culminated in the unfair and severe wage cuts dressed up as a pension levy. The most oft repeated lie was that public service workers did not pay for their pensions.

Deputy Stagg further stated that the levy was unfair and inequitable in that it targeted one section of the community. Every Public Service Worker who contacted me is prepared to pay their fair share to rescue the economy, but whatever is done must be worked out on a fair and equitable basis across all of society and not on a sectional basis as is the case with the levy. Public Servants are angry that they and the public service they provide have been vilified as lazy and overpaid by the Government and the Media. They are angry that the bankers and speculators, who caused the malaise are aetting off scot free and are walking off with golden handshakes and pensions of which the Public Service could not dream. They are angry at the attempt by the Government to drive a wedge between Public and Private Sector workers with misinformation and lies.

Concluding his speech Deputy Stagg stated that the Labour Party supports the Public Service and its workers. We reject this crude, unfair measure and call for its withdrawal and for the reconvening of the talks with the social partners with a view to finding the savings needed where all will share the burden equally.

STAGG WELCOMES GOVERNMENT UTURN ON MAYNOOTH B.N.S.

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the U Turn by the Minister for Education following the announcement that a grant of \in 360,000 is to be made to Maynooth Boys National School for the building of 3 permanent classrooms at the school.

The allocation of the funding will stated Deputy Stagg, provide 1 additional classroom and the removal of 2 prefabricated classrooms. This will bring the number of classrooms at the school up to 18 and will help to reduce overcrowding in the school. The plan to make the school a three stream school with 24 classrooms has been dropped for the present because of the cessation of building in the Maynooth area and the school authorities are happy with this Deputy Stagg has been advised.

Commenting on the decision Deputy Stagg stated that he welcomed the Ministers change of heart on the required extension to Maynooth Boys National School. Only as recently as the 12th February last, the Minister announced the School Building Programme for 2009 which excluded the required extension to Maynooth B.N.S. That was an extraordinary decision given the fact that the school had the highest priority band rating in the Department assigned to major capital projects.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg congratulated the Principal, teachers and Parents Association on successfully forcing the Ministers hand on the funding.

AS UNEMPLOYMENT DOUBLES IN KILDARE IN PAST YEAR STAGG CALLS FOR RELEASE OF PENSION RESERVE MONEY FOR EMPLOYMENT GENERATION

With the Publication of the Live Register figures for Kildare by the CSO which show that Unemployment in the County has more than doubled in the past year rising from 7,110 at the end of February 2008 to 14,428 people at the end of February 2009, a rise of 102%, Deputy Emmet Stagg has called for the use of funds held in the National Pension Reserve Fund to create jobs and stem the tide of Unemployment in the State.

The monthly figures continue to shock everybody stated Deputy Stagg but the figures for the Maynooth Exchange showing an increase of 128% in the past year, compared to a national average of 87%, show how hard the commuter belt areas are being hit.

The Government have no plan to reverse the trend in Unemployment continued Deputy Staga, Their Governance of the Economy remains fixated on bringing Public Expenditure under control at all costs and bailing out the disgraced bankers. If we can give €7 Billion to the Bankers we surely are capable of devising Labour intensive projects to get people back to work whilst at the same time providing social capital in improving conditions for pupils in our schools, the disabled and elderly in their homes and for society by bringing forward urban regeneration. Why leave the €11 Billion in Reserve when we can expand Public Work Programmes throughout the State. In addition to getting people back to work the Exchequer will save enormous amounts of money as the average cost to the Exchequer in terms of Social Welfare Assistance and taxes foregone is in the order of €20,000 per worker.

The Government stated Deputy Stagg want suggestions from the Opposition in relation to the mini-budget in April. We are prepared to play our part but only if our suggestions are taken seriously and if the Government accepts that an Economic Plan means rebooting the Economy through Investment in Job Creation as well as looking at Tax Changes.

DELAYS IN PROCESSING UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS SIMPLY UNACCEPTABLE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the Minister for Social Welfare for the unacceptable delays in processing claims for Jobseekers Benefit and Jobseekers Allowance at the Maynooth Labour Exchange Office.

Figures provided recently stated Deputy Stagg show that on average it takes 4.73 weeks to process an application for Jobseekers Benefit whilst it takes 10 weeks to process an application for Jobseekers Allowance. These waiting times are just unacceptable and its high time the Minister ensured that satisfactory staffing levels existed in both the Maynooth Exchange and the Ballyfermot Local Social Welfare Office where claims are decided upon.

During 2008 two additional staff were recruited to both the Maynooth Exchange and the Ballyfermot Office but from the figures on waiting times this is simply not enough to cater for the huge increase in those signing on in Maynooth which rose by 128% in the past year.

In addition to the delays in processing Jobseekers Claims, Deputy Stagg stated that Community Welfare Officer workloads have doubled in the past 12 months because of the large number of applications for assistance with rent and mortgage payments but also because of the delay in processing unemployment payments. The delays in processing Jobseeker Claims are affecting the delivery of this service also.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to raise the issue further with the Minister as staffing levels are simply inadequate to deal with the entitlements of those who have lost their jobs. 

New novel by former Maynooth teacher features Úna Bhán as 17th Century rebel

The medium of the historical novel is used to great effect by Patrick Devaney to dramatise the life and times of Úna Bhán MacDermot of Moylurg in Co. Roscommon. Many will have heard the legendary tale of Úna's ill-fated love affair with Tomás Láidir Costello: her father refused to allow them to marry and Úna died of a broken heart; Tomás used to swim to Trinity Island in Lough Key to keep vigil at her grave, resulting in his death from pneumonia; he was buried beside Úna and two trees grew over their graves, which intertwined to form a lovers' knot.



Using a novelist's license in his latest book, 'Úna Bhán, Flaxen-Haired Rebel', Patrick Devaney paints a very different picture of Úna. Far from being a "garden rose" or a "gold candle on the queen's table", as portrayed by her poet-lover Costello, Devaney depicts Úna as a courageous but troubled young woman who demands to be treated as an equal in the male-dominated world of the 17th Century. She becomes a rebel committed to driving the foreigners out of Ireland. Like her heroine, Joan of Arc, she dresses in doublet, breeches and jerkin, the male attire of her day, and traverses Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim, Cavan and Fermanagh in pursuit of her goal.

Textbook accounts of the defeat of the Irish in the 1642 Battle of Ballintober tell of a soldier pulling a cap from the head of a fallen Irish fighter to reveal the long flaxen tresses of a woman. In his graphic account of the battle Devaney identifies this woman as the dying Úna Bhán. There is no romantic resting place for Úna's body in this story: "Perhaps the New Gall had removed it before they withdrew or perhaps wolves had devoured it, for wolves were still plentiful in those days."

The Úna Bhán story is a sequel to Patrick Devaney's critically acclaimed novel 'Through the Gate of Ivory', which describes the Gaelic way of life in pre-Cromwellian Ireland. Scholarly reviewers agree that the period details in both books are superbly presented. Ciaran Parker, the distinguished historian and author of 'County Cavan', states in a recent review that: "The historical aspect is drawn with awe-inspiring accuracy", and goes on to note that "the well-drawn characters are ... rounded, three-dimension creations...They...express the tensions inherent in living in a world whose demise they anticipated but could do little or nothing to assuage." He also refers to the "very complex character" of the heroine: Úna is "frustrated at her perceived inferiority to males", whose cowardice inspires her identification with Joan of Arc. The unrequited love of the narrator, Daibhí, for Úna is an important motif in the novel, which, however, is much more than "a doomed love story".

In case anybody gets the impression that this 200-page book is just a turgid recreation of historical incidents, it is anything but. The narrative combines fine storytelling with an easy, pacy manner which vividly describes events and characters. I completely agree with Ann Dunne of the Irish Independent who wrote. "If only school history books were this much fun!"

Patrick Devaney, who retired from teaching in Maynooth Post-primary in 2002, now lives with his wife Cheryl in Co. Cavan. As well as the aforementioned 'Through The Gate of Ivory' (Lilliput Press), he has published four novels for teenagers: 'Rua the Red Grouse' (Kildanore), and 'The Stranger and the Pooka', 'The Psychic Edge', and 'Tribal Scars' (all by Mentor Press).

Fitzpatrick welcomes new steps to assist small enterprises

"Details of additional measures will be announced shortly."

"It is vital that every practical support possible is given to the small business sector. They form a vital part of our economy and are valuable employers. In these tough economic times we must try to protect and promote small enterprise," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

New jobs for north Kildare with expansion of Hewlett Packard - Fitzpatrick

North Kildare Fianna Fail TD and Government Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick has welcomed the news that 500 jobs are to be created locally with Hewlett Packard.

"At a time when the economy is contracting it is very encouraging that these jobs are coming to north Kildare."

"I know that the Government, in particular the Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise and the IDA are working hard to secure all possible investment for Ireland. "HP will make an investment of €18million in their Global Service Desk operation in the Liffey Park Technology Campus and this will be supported by the IDA and the growth plans will include the creation of a research, development and innovation capability for HP's global service desk."

"I know that the Government and the IDA will provide every possible support and encouragement to any other companies wishing to invest here," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Bankers will be held to account - Fitzpatrick

Bankers involved in any kind of wrongdoing that added to the difficulties that the financial institutions now find themselves in will be fully held to account, according to local Fianna Fáil TD Michael Fitzpatrick.

"There is understandably a lot of anger out there about the lack of sufficient regulation in the banking industry but I want to assure people that anyone found to been involved in any kind of wrongdoing will be fully held to account."

"The Government must give due process to each of the individuals involved. All the facts must be firmly established before any action is taken."

"But every element of suggested wrongdoing in the banking sector is being investigated extensively and those found guilty of wrongdoing will face severe penalty."

"The problems stemmed from the actions of a small number of people. The people working in Kildare banks are in no way responsible for the events of recent weeks and that is important to remember."

"Under the Recapitilisation Scheme, total pay of senior banking executives in Bank of Ireland and Allied Irish Bank will be reduced by 33 per cent, and further cuts are also expected to be made."

"There is suggestion in some quarters that Fianna Fáil only nationalised Anglo Irish Bank in order to 'bail out' developers. This is not true. Had the Government not nationalised Anglo Irish Bank and the bank had gone bust, most of the bad debt would be written off which would have cost the Irish taxpayer not millions but billions."

"The reason the Government nationalised the bank was to put some stability into the bank. Now in turn those billions of euro in bad debt will be pursued and this is in the best interests of the taxpayer." "When a bank goes bust, a liquidator would step in and would normally only recover 10-15 per cent of the bad debt. That situation would have had dire consequences for this country."

"The Government have no fear or favour of any individual either investing or involved in any collusion in the Irish banking sector. All bad debtors will be rigorously chased whether that individual be a developer or otherwise."

"In relation to AIB and Bank of Ireland, it is every individual in the State that the Government are guaranteeing, and with the \in 3.5 billion investment in each bank codes of conduct and safeguards are established between Government and the banks whereby banks cannot re-possess homes without having due regard to the new code of conduct set down by Government."

"Money will now be available again within the banks for business loans and first time buyers. Strict controls and regimes will be in place from here on in."

"The events of the last number of weeks are truly unprecendented and I hope that we will never see events like this again. I have full confidence in the Taoiseach Brian Cowen TD and the Minister for Finance, Brian Lenihan TD, to ensure that strict regulations are put in place to see that the likes of this can never happen again," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Recommended cap on bankers salaries must be agreed to – Fitzpatrick

Fianna Fáil TD for Kildare North and Convenor of the Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick has welcomed the news that the Government is seeking a salary cap of €500,000 on bankers' salaries.

"The Minister for Finance Brian Lenihan TD has written to those financial institutions covered by the State bank guarantee scheme seeking a salary cap of €500,000 on bankers salaries, saying that any deviation from this figure should only be made in exceptional circumstances."

"The request has come from the Minister on the back of the publication of a report by the Covered Institutions Remuneration Oversight Committee which recommended the salaries, bonuses and pension levels for bank chief executives, chairs and ordinary board members."

"The sum of \in 500,000 that the Minister has requested is lower than the sum recommended by the Committee. (Continued on page 57)

It should be noted that Germany and the United States have also capped the salaries of executives in bailed out banks."

"When the taxpayer is bailing out these banks it has had a real affect on public confidence to hear about the salaries into the millions of top executives. At a time when families are under increasing financial pressure, these capped salaries simply must be agreed to."

"I hope that the participating banks respond quickly to the Minister's request," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Regional Planning Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area-closing date for submissions Monday, March 30th 2009.

Regional Planning Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area cover seven different Councils, including Kildare County Council. It is a policy document which aims to direct the future growth of the Greater Dublin Area, ensuring sustainable and good planning in the right places, protecting sensitive or environmentally important locations. The guidelines inform and direct the City and County Development Plans of each of the Councils.

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick urges interested organisations, business interests, community and environmental groups and the general public to submit their key concerns, suggestions and ideas on what they would like Kildare to look like, where investment should be focused.

"These guidelines give direction to the County Development Plans of each of the local Councils and also seek to guide central Government departments on issues such as investment in water services, new road and public transport, health investment and new schools, said Deputy Fitzpatrick.

He further added that "the guidelines also inform State bodies such as Irish Rail, the ESB so that they can make decisions. The aim is to ensure a match between where people live and work and the services needed to support them".

The closing date for submission is March 30th 2009. More information is available on www.rpg.ie

Planning and Development Act should be changed to Facilitate Greater Consultation and Reduce Conflict between Minister for Environment and County Councils.

Provisions of the Planning and Development Act 2000 should be improved to enable more discussion and

consultation between local authorities and the Department of the Environment when City and County plans are being drawn up. This would lead to fewer disagreements between Local Authorities and the Department of the Environment and result in more timely and effective local planning.

These are some of the key findings contained in a report published by the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Environment, Heritage and Local Government. "The findings of the report recommend a clear process whereby this form of discord could be avoided in the future", according to Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick who is a member of this committee.

The report states that the Planning and Development Act should be amended to allow for a period of consultation involving the Department, local authorities and general public, should there be a direction to vary a County Development Plan. Furthermore, new development plans should not be initiated within two years of local council elections. This measure is to facilitate continuity, by ensuring that the councillors who commenced the plan are still in office when the plan is to be completed.

"The recommendations contained in this report should considerably assist the process of co-ordination between local and central governments. In future, more collaboration is needed to bring about a more efficient working relationship between local authorities and government departments. This relationship is crucial to ensure effective and successful local administration", added Michael.

The recommendations of the report will be passed on to the Minister for Environment, Heritage and Local Government to advise him regarding any changes to the legislation.

The report itself will be laid before the Houses of the Oireachtas.

County Development Plans provide a framework for land use, development, strategic planning, conservation and heritage. It provides objectives, standards and development controls which will be applied to all development within the County.

Job Seekers Entitlement delays raised with Minister - Brady

Deputy Áine Brady has raised the issue of the waiting time that some Kildare people are currently experiencing in obtaining their job seekers benefits and allowances, with the Minister for Social Affairs, Mary Hanafin T. D.

'I am fully aware that staff at our Social Affairs Offices are working extremely hard to process the rising number of applications for Job Seekers Allowances and other entitlements. Most people are securing their entitlements in a timely fashion. Last month, the average processing time for Jobseeker benefit is two weeks and Jobseekers allowance was five weeks with almost 2000 staff nationwide working in Social Affairs processing these claims. The average processing time, in the Maynooth office, is 2.77 weeks for Jobseeker Benefit.'

'However, I do know from my clinics that there are a small number of applications who are waiting too long for their entitlements. I understand that, in some of these cases, it relates to incomplete information being on people's P 45's. I have asked the Minister to check out these types of delays.'

'It is important that people who have lost their jobs are given all their entitlements as soon as possible. The Minister for Social Affairs has also assured me that her Department and the Department of Enterprise and the Department of Education are co-operating to create more jobs and training opportunities for those losing their jobs.'

' The Government has established a €4 million scheme to assist Apprentices who are out of work, and enable FÁS to implement an Employer Based Redundant Apprentice Rotation scheme. This scheme will assist Apprentices gain the required experience to progress to the next off-the-job phase or to complete their apprenticeship. Details of the scheme can be obtained from on the **FÁS website** <u>www.fas.ie</u> or **FÁS Jobs Ireland at Free phone 1800 611 116** or **FÁS offices in Athlone 090 6486590**.' stated Deputy Brady.

'Anyone who is under financial pressure while awaiting a decision on their claims can apply to their local Community Welfare Officer for Supplementary Welfare Allowance.' concluded Deputy Brady.

School funding boost for Maynooth – Brady

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

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Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council Meeting 9th March 2009

The meeting began with a presentation by Prof. John Hughes, President of the National University of Ireland, Maynooth and this was followed by a question and answer session. The President was accompanied by Mr Frank Fitzmaurice Director of Corporate Services in NUIM for the past two years. The Chairman, Colm Ó Cearúil said that the initial contact with the College had been made through the Planning and Development committee.

Prof. Hughes said that the University has come a long way since the '60s and emphasised that 75% is dedicated to Culture, Arts and Social Sciences. In 2008 NUIM was named University of the Year, and it has been the fastest growing University in Ireland. There are over 9,000 students, in three Faculties, but this increase will soon peak – only a further 200-300 students will be taken in.

The University has the highest points in Arts and Science as well as the highest research income per academic in Ireland. It is the only university with particular contacts with Intel such as Global Education Partner and Innovation Value Institute. Intel has invested heavily in these and NUIM offers an Engineering MA for them, including people from the States. There will future growth in spin-out, spin-in companies, in licensing technology and start up companies, this is bringing business to the area. There will be more part-time students and there is a new business and law degree.

He stressed the fact that Universities are under threat, the cuts are extensive and amalgamations/closures are possible. NUIM gives 800 jobs and brings €70m annually into the economy.

Frank Fitzmaurice said that Maynooth is the only university town in Ireland and outlined future plans. It is the intention to bring campus closer to the town, to link both campuses and the town. He outlined the major developments: New Library, Arts and Social Science Building, Carton Innovation Camp, Student Apartments, Restaurant and signature buildings close to the Kilcock Road.

The Arts/Social Science building will begin now and be ready in July 2010. There will be no theatre as there was a shortfall in the available funding. Carton Park will have research projects, developing products and incubator and start-up companies. The Apartments will add about 350 beds near playing pitches. A new restaurant is required because of the recent fire. The signature buildings are some years away, 2-5 years, because of the funding issues.

The council members raised a number of issues and questions:

The library could be connected electronically with the local library. Building workers will be kept on-site during construction.

There is a traffic management report pending and a strategy will be developed for traffic/parking, they are trying to promote cycling and walking, The College had looked at buying property in the town but it had been too expensive in the past.

The President spoke about the Carton development was necessary – incubation business should be separate from education. He said that the area in Carton is derelict, screened and near the river. No trees will be felled, no impact on cultural aspect. He praised the beauty of the environment of Carton and pointed to the pristine nature of the South Campus and gardens to show their care of Heritage. NUIM had a space for archives in Castletown.

Frank Fitzmaurice said that they were also interested in a connection between the H. Field developments at Parson Street and the campus and the railway. St Patrick's were independent but involved. There was a plan for a boulevard on the Kilcock Road and a question over the existing footbridge.

There were reports from the various committees of the Council, including the St Patrick's Day Parade. J. McGinley said there the floats were nearly double that of last year, Derrinstown stud was the main sponsor, Carton House had a float and also contributed. Willie Kiernan and George O'Connor gave their services free of charge. Thorntons sponsored a band (\in 800) and gave the trailer. There will be a full report after the Parade takes place.

A serious matter was raised by P. Croghan of the Tidy Towns committee –the havoc caused by the sewerage works with their areas all torn up and with no reference. J. McGinley explained that the contractor began work without approval, without an archaeologist although they were working in a zone of archaeological protection around the College etc. Work had now stopped – the council agreed that the Tidy Towns committee should write a letter demanding that their work should be reinstated and that the Executive would send this to Kildare County Council.

D. Cullen of the Planning and Development committee raised two important issues. She had contacted Meath County Council regarding the changes to the Carton Park plans – they were too large to photocopy. The Meath draft local area plan included the two Smart Parks one at Moygaddy and Carton. The Plan was only publicised in the Meath Chronicle. The committee were told that they could make a submission even though the date had passed. It was agreed that the committee would make the submission and that the Executive would back this.

The second issue also concerned Meath County Council who had a planning application for 500 houses in the Maynooth Environs. The public meeting was held in Dunboyne and the display period was over. This was only one and a half kilometres from Maynooth and there was no coordination with Co Kildare. They would be dependent on services from Kildare. After a long discussion it was decided that a letter would be sent from the committee and then endorsed by the Executive. It was emphasised that there was no onus on Meath Co Co to contact Kildare.

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May in the Garden

Grow crops in pots

You may not have room for a vegetable patch or time for an allotment, but many delicious varieties of salad, vegetable and fruit will thrive in containers and don't take up much space. To grow crops on patios, balconies, windowsills and roof gardens.

What to do

- * Buy ready grown plants of sweet pepper, chilli pepper, cherry tomato and aubergine, strawberries and herbs or try cut salad mixes grown from seed.
- * Mix a handful of water-retaining crystals into your compost and fill your pot to the top. Gently tap to settle the compost and firm down with your fingertips. Leave a 2cm (1in) gap between the compost and the top of the pot for watering.
- * Scoop out compost in the centre to leave a hole slightly bigger than the rootball of your plant.
- * Gently remove plant from pot and place in hole. Replace compost around the plant and firm, making sure the surface of the plant is level with the top of the compost.
- * If growing from seed, check the instructions on the packet. Either raise in small pots before planting into larger ones or scatter across the surface of the compost and water in.
- * For larger fruit bushes such as blueberries, figs, peaches and apricots, select a larger pot and make sure you check the compost requirements on the plant label.

Plant up a growing bag

Growing bags are also an ideal way to grow tomatoes, aubergines, chillies and cucumber on sunny patios and balconies, as well as in the greenhouse. This easy care guide will show you what to do.

Despite only measuring 35cm x 95cm (13in x 37in), growing bags have enough space for three vegetable plants that will provide you with enough food for several meals over the summer. Plant two to three plants in each bag during spring. Bags were traditionally used under glass and were introduced as an alternative to planting directly into greenhouse soil. Not having permanent borders meant the space could be used more efficiently throughout the year and plants would not become infected by soil-borne diseases. Today, they are still ideal for growing plants in the greenhouse, but are also perfect in a sunny spot outdoors

What to grow

Growing bags are ideal for plants that don't have deep roots, such as tomatoes, cucumbers, sweet peppers, chilli peppers, aubergines and courgettes. Plant two to three plants in each bag during spring. Alternatively, cut a long panel in the top of the bag and sow salads in rows. Endive, lettuce, basil and rocket can be sown from spring to late summer.

If growing salads, prepare the bag as before and cut out a long panel on top of the bag. Plant or sow in rows across the width of the bag.

After care

When taller growing or top-heavy crops are 20cm (8in) high, push a cane into the bag next to each plant. Tie the plant to the cane and attach the cane to a frame. This will prevent the plants from toppling over in the wind or if they become top heavy. Keep the compost moist and feed plants such as aubergine, tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers with a high potash fertiliser when flowers appear - this will ensure you get the plumpest fruit. When crops have finished, split the bag open and recycle the compost as a soil conditioner in the garden.

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Pet Corner



The Red Squirrel

The Red Squirrel is found throughout the country. It is smaller than the Grey Squirrel and found in a wide variety of habitats, ranging from coniferous forests to parklands. They feed mostly on seeds and berries. Although it is believed that the squirrel can use its fore-limbs for a variety of activities, recent research shows that the squirrel must first pick up a food item (e.g. nut) with its teeth and then transfer it to its paws while in a hunched position. This is clearly an ingrained action. Red Squirrels are known to hoard food items from times of plenty to be used at a later date.

Red squirrels are more difficult to observe than Grey Squirrels. One reason for this is their tendency to spend a greater amount of time high up in coniferous trees. One of the few places left to see red squirrels in Dublin is the National Botanic Gardens in Glasnevin. The Red Squirrel is a protected species under the Wildlife Act, 1976.

The Grey Squirrel



The Grey Squirrel is an introduced species. Although confined mostly to the north and east of the country, the Grey Squirrel is becoming the squirrel most commonly seen in our woodlands and parks. Much has been written about the effect the Grey Squirrel is having on our native Red Squirrels. It is true that they are larger and aggressive and many people believe that the decrease in population of our Red Squirrels is due to the Grey Squirrel. However, the situation is much more complex. Red Squirrels prefer large coniferous woodlands while Grey Squirrels prefer mixed and broadleafed woods. Contrary to most beliefs, the Red Squirrel is not dependent on acorns. In fact, they find them somewhat toxic. As large tracts of coniferous woodlands disappear, this

breaks up the habitat of Red Squirrels making it more difficult for them to hold territories. Grey Squirrels feed on acorns and are more omnivorous and in areas where both co-exist, appear to be more successful. Grey Squirrels have filled the vacuum left by the latest Red Squirrel decline.

Both Red and Grey Squirrels are active by day, sleeping by night in their nest or "drey". Both have two litters per year, with an average of three or four per litter. The young leave the nest about 7 or 8 weeks after they are born. Red and Grey Squirrels do not interbreed.

Squirrels, both Red and Grey, are responsible for removing the bark from the growing tips of branches on trees (particularly beech and sycamore) to enable them feed on the sugar rich sap beneath. This damage can be quite severe, making them the enemy of foresters. Gamekeepers suspect the Grey Squirrel of taking the eggs of pheasants.

The report of The Irish Squirrel Survey Of 2007 called for the protection of the red squirrel and for the control of grey squirrel populations. Over the past decade the grey squirrel has spread to 26 counties throughout Ireland. It is now found west of the Shannon, in Leitrim and Roscommon, where it had not previously been found.

The red squirrel is extinct in Meath, Westmeath, Carlow and Kilkenny. The report warned that if the grey squirrel is left unchecked the hardwood industry and the conservation of native woodlands could suffer. The Report also said that the native red squirrel could be wiped out by a virus carried by the grey squirrel.

Question

My working hours have been reduced and I am probably going to lose my job. Where can I get information about what to do?

Answer

The Citizens Information Board has just launched a dedicated website www.losingyourjob.ie, covering all the information you need if you lose your job.

The website provides information on all aspects of losing your job or having your pay or hours reduced, including the services, benefits and entitlements available to you. It has been specially designed around the needs of people who are newly unemployed or who, while still at work, are dealing with reduced hours and/or reduced pay.

www.losingyourjob.ie is based on content from www.citizensinformation.ie, the Government website provided by the Citizens Information Board. This site provides public service information for Ireland.

The topics covered by www.losingyourjob.ie include:

- Working reduced hours or receiving reduced pay
- Redundancy and leaving work
- Getting a social welfare payment
- Money and tax issues, including debt issues
- Supports available for rent or mortgage payments
- Options for education and training
- What you need to know when going back to work
- Leaving Ireland to move to countries inside or outside the EU

In conjunction with the new website, the Board has also published a handy reference leaflet, entitled Have you lost your job? giving an overview of what you can do if you have lost your job.

Question

I got a total of \in 1,100 Early Childcare Supplement for my son in 2008 but I believe the rules have changed. What is the situation now? He is nearly 5 years old.

Answer

Up to the end of 2008 Early Childcare Supplement (ECS) was worth \in 1,100 per year. It was paid quarterly, in arrears, in respect of all children for whom Child Benefit was paid, up to the month following the child's 6th birthday. The last quarterly payment of \in 275 was made in December 2008, covering the quarter October-December 2008.

For January and February 2009 the rate of ECS was $\in 1,104$ per child per year, or $\in 92$ per month. It was only paid in respect of children aged less than 5½. It also changed to being paid monthly, in arrears, on the second Monday of each month.

For example, you will have received February's payment on Monday 9 March.

From March 2009 the rate is €83 per month per child, up to and including the month the child reaches 5 years of age. As payments are made a month in arrears, you will get your last payment the month after your son's 5th birthday.

Question

My 75-year-old mother got a letter from the HSE about her medical card, asking for details of her income. She gets a Widow's Pension of €230.30 a week, plus €200 a month from a private pension. She also has some savings, on which she earns interest. Will she lose the medical card? What should she do?

Answer

All existing medical cards for people over 70 were valid until 2 March 2009. Since then, they continue to be valid if the holder's income is below the relevant limit.

Your mother will only have to reply to the HSE's letter if her gross income is more than \in 700 a week or \in 36,500 a year. If it is not, she can simply keep her card, and does not have to contact the HSE. Gross income means pensions, earnings, interest from capital and all other sources of income.

We can calculate your mother's total pension income as follows:

Widow's Pension	Private pension (weekly equiva- lent)	Total weekly	Total yearly
€230.30	€46.15	€276.45	€14,375.40

This is well below the limits of €700 a week or €36,500 a year. Whatever savings she has would

have to be quite large to bring her up to these limits.

For example, if she had \in 50,000 in savings, the first \in 36,000 would be ignored, so only \in 14,000 would be taken into account. An interest rate of 4% would yield \in 560 per year or \in 10.77 per week to add to her pension of \in 276.45. She would still be well below the income limits and could continue to use her medical card.

If her income did go above the limits, she would have the following options:

Apply for a Drugs Payment Scheme (DPS) card, which would cover all but the first €100 per month of prescribed drugs, medicines or appliances: and Record all her medical expenses on a Form Med 1 (available from www.revenue.ie or Lo-call 1890 306 706) and claim tax relief on them at the end of the year: or

Apply for a discretionary medical card on the basis of her personal circumstances

N.B. People over 70 who exceed the medical card income limits will also exceed the GP Visit Card limits. As a result, people over 70 cannot get a GP Visit Card. If they qualified on the GP Visit Card means test, they would have kept their medical card.

Question

I work five mornings a week, Monday to Friday. What time off should I get for St Patrick's Day and the Easter period?

Answer

St Patrick's Day (17 March) is a public holiday. It fell on a Tuesday in 2009. As a half-time employee you were entitled to a half-day's paid leave on that day, unless your employer had nominated one of the following alternatives at least 14 days before the public holiday:

An extra half-day's pay

An extra half-day of annual leave A paid half-day off within a month Easter Monday is also a public holiday. It falls on 13 April in 2009. As with St Patrick's Day, you are entitled to a half-day's paid leave on Easter Monday, unless your employer nominates one of the above options at least 14 days before.

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and businesses close, you have no automatic entitlement to time off work in respect of Good Friday. Check the position with your employer.

There are nine public holidays in Ireland each year:

New Year's Day (1 January) St Patrick's Day (17 March) Easter Monday (movable) First Monday in May, June and August Last Monday in October Christmas Day (25 December) St Stephen's Day (26 December)

Public holiday entitlements apply to employees even if they are not usually scheduled to work on the day of the public holiday. The entitlement is pro-rata (one-fifth of weekly pay or hours).

N.B. As a part-time worker, you must have worked more than 40 hours in the five weeks before a public holiday to be eligible for public holiday entitlements.

Information about public holiday entitlements is available from the National Employment Rights Agency (NERA) which operates a Lo-call information helpline on 1890 808 090. NERA's website is www.employmentrights.ie.

If you have a complaint in relation to holiday entitlements, contact a Rights Commissioner at the Labour Relations Commission, Tom Johnson House, Haddington Road, Dublin 4, Lo-call 1890 220 227, www.lrc.ie.

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


Features Meadow in Summer Time

How to Search more effectively with Google

n some cases you will be disappointed by the results you get from a search engine. The search engine blindly sums up all sorts of unrelated pages that contain your keyword. You may be unable to find the exact information you need.

Here are some frequently occurring problems, and several things you can do to improve your search results.

At other times a search will yield too many results. When this happens, you can try to: fine-tune your search by using more than one keyword or by using a synonym your search to web pages in the English language. In this way you can prevent *Google* from 'muddying' your search results by presenting web pages in other languages; search by using a directory instead of a search engine. For example when trying to do a search using a very broad keyword, such as the word *animals*, try instead to search within a topic, subject or category.

To search by topic:

- Surf to www.google.ie
- Click more v
- Click Even more >>
- Click <u>Directory</u>

Now you will see an overview of all the various topics. If you click one of the topics, you will see a number of categories. Clicking a category will lead you to further additional sub-categories. Eventually you will reach a page where you can choose several links that will lead to your specific subject.

The Google Toolbar

If you frequently use Google, you may want to install the *Google Toolbar* to help you use *Google* more readily when working in *Internet Explorer*.

- 1. Click the Address Bar
- 2. Type: http://toolbar.google.com
- 3. Press Enter
- 4. You will see the *Google Toolbar* installation screen
- 5. Click Install Google Toolbar 6



- 6. Click to remove checkmark by 'Set Google as default search'.

Google Toolbar will be installed and *Internet Explorer* opens a new window. You will see that the *Google Toolbar* has been added to the *Internet Explorer*.

- Block pop-up windows as you browse the web
- Quickly spellcheck text you type into any web field
- Save and paste the personal information you regularly enter into online forms
- Instantly access maps of addresses you find online
- Translate English words into the foreign language of your choice by hovering your mouse over them.

Sir John Betjeman, Sir John Piers, and the Westmeath Examiner!

D id you know that the former British poet laureate, Sir John Betjeman, had his third ever poem printed by the Westmeath Examiner, back in 1937.

Some 150 copies of **"Sir John Piers"** were printed for Betjeman, who wrote it under the pseudonym Epsilon.

The poem is based on the true story of Sir John Piers of Tristernagh, who engaged in a bet with a friend, that he would seduce the new wife of a friend of his, Lord Cloncurry, who lived at what's now The Lyons Estate, near Hazelhatch, in Kildare. The Annals of Westmeath report that this affair had its conclusion in the Court of the Kings Bench, where Lord Cloncurry, the injured party, successfully sued Piers for "criminal conversation" a euphemism for something a bit more....private, say, than conversation.

Piers scarpered to the Isle of Man – losing his recognisances in the process, and was eventually forced to pay up everything he had. He did return to Ballynacargy, he eventually lost the cottage he had built himself there, in the Encumbered Estates Court.

The poem, suggesting the words Piers may have used in his seduction of Lady Cloncurry says:

"I love your brown curls, black in rain, my colleen,

I love your grey eyes, by this verdant shore

Two Derravaraghs to plunge into and drown me,

Hold not those lakes of light so near me more."

It refers to Lough Ennel, to Lord Belvedere, to Glencara, to Sunderlin of Baronstown, to Portloman, to Tristernagh.

But his lordship is gayer than ever before, He laughs like the ripples that lap the lake shore, Nor thinks that his bride has the slightest of fears Lest one of the guests be the Baronet Piers.

A curricle rolling along on the grass, The servants make way to allow it to pass, A high-stepping grey and the wheels flashing yellow And Sir John in the seat, what a capital fellow!

Huzza for Sir John! and huzza for the f^{*}te, For without his assistance no f^{*}te is complete; Oh, gay is the garland the ladies will wreathe For the handsomest blade in the County Westmeath.

The harness is off with a jingle of steel, The grey in the grass crops an emerald meal, Sir John saunters up with a smile and a bow And the Lady Cloncurry is next to him now.

Her eyes on the landscape, she don't seem to hear The passing remark he designs for her ear, For smooth as a phantom and proud as a stork The Lady Cloncurry continues her walk.

Recipes



75g/3ozs Self Raising Flour 75g/3ozs Butter 150g/5ozs Castor Sugar Grated Rind of 1 Lemon 2 Eggs 100g Packet Ground Almonds 1 Teaspoon Almond Essence For Decoration 25g/1oz Icing Sugar 25g/1oz Toasted Flaked Almonds.



Method:

Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Lightly grease and base line an 18/20cms/7/8inch sandwich tin. Beat butter, sugar and lemon rind until light and fluffy. Gradually whisk in the eggs.

Gently stir in alternate spoonfuls of flour and ground almonds, then stir in the almond essence. Transfer to prepared tin and spread evenly. Bake for about 30/40 minutes until risen and golden brown or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean.

Leave to settle in the tin for 5 minutes, then turn onto a wire tray to cool.

Dust top of the cake with icing sugar, mark into slices, then, scatter the toasted almonds over.

G ranny's Apple Cake

Ingredients:

225g/8ozs Self Raising Flour 175g/6ozs Margarine 175g/6ozs Sugar 3 Eggs 1 level teaspoon Cinnamon (optional)

3 Apples (peeled & cored)

Method:

Beat margarine and sugar together.

Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition.

Stir in the sieved flour and cinnamon, if used. Roughly chop the 3 apples and stir into the mixture.

Place into a greased and base lined 900g/2lb loaf tin.

Bake in a pre-heated oven at 190°C/375°F/Gas 5 for 30 minutes approx.

Allow to stand in tin for about 5 minutes, then turn onto a wire tray to cool.

Summer Classic - Salad Nicoise

Ingredients:

150g Greens Beans
2 Tomatoes
4 Eggs
1 Lettuce
12 Small New Potatoes
20 Black Olives
1 tbsp Chopped Parsley
2 Cans of Tuna or 400g of Fresh Tuna

Vinaigrette:

50ml Red Wine Vinegar Pinch of Salt and Pepper 1 tbsp Water 2 tsp Dijon Mustard 1 tsp Crushed Garlic 1 Shallot 150ml Olive Oil 1 Baguette



Instructions:

Make the vinaigrette by mixing some chopped garlic, diced shallots and red wine vinegar before combining with a fork until all the ingredients have been mixed together evenly. Hard boil your eggs for 9 minutes in boiling salted water before removing and allowing them to cool down. Peel the eggs and set to one side.

Using a jug or pouring bottle add the olive oil into the mixture in a slow consistent stream until all the oil has been added and it is a smooth consistency.

Cook the new potatoes in some boiling salted water for about 15 minutes or until they are soft when you insert a small knife. Remove the potatoes from the water and cool under cold running water.

Repeat the same process of cooking in boiling water before cooling down under cold running water with the beans. The beans should only take 5/6 minutes.

Remove the tuna from the fridge and allow it to come to room temperature as you start to make the salad.

Mix the quartered tomatoes, black olives, green beans, halved new potatoes and halved peeled eggs in a large bowl very carefully.

Heat your grill pan or barbecue to an extremely high heat. Season the tuna with salt and pepper. Sear the tuna on each side for one minute on the extremely high heat so as the tuna is seared on the outside and pink in the middle. Remove the Tuna from the grill and cut into thin slices against the grain.

Wash your salad and place into a bowl along with your vegetables and sliced tuna.

Drizzle the dressing over the salad and serve immediately.



Following on from last month where we showed the devastation caused to the three open spaces in Maynooth as a result of the sewerage system upgrade works we are pleased to advise that there is better news this month. Following a letter written to Mr. Michael Malone, Kildare County Manager, we have been asked to come up with proposals to reinstate the areas involved. We cannot prevent works that are needed in the town but the very nature of these works (involving tunnelling) meant that much more damage than what was expected occurred. We must acknowledge the support of a number of local Councillors to ensure that our proposals will be agreed. The opportunity exists for the people of Maynooth to have work done in these areas that would previously have been difficult to achieve. Maynooth Tidy Towns have come up with proposals and we will be involving local residents in finalising the plans. There is an urgent need to bring the plans forward for agreement with Kildare County Council as the works are due for completion in July 2009 and the contractor will then go off site.



We are very dependent on your support to fund our projects such as the hanging baskets. Money is not easy to get and we are always appreciative of what you can afford to give us. We will be collecting at a number of shops as well as at the church gate. The time of year has come again where we have to make the application for the National Competition. Community groups in Maynooth receive funds under Intel Ireland 2008 'Matching Grant Initiative'

S o mark the Intel Corporation's 40th Anniversary a new approach was conceived where Intel employees undertook voluntary activities in the community the corporation would give a grant for each hour worked under the company's 2008 'Matching Grant Initiative'. This initiative, which was part of an Intel global 'one million volunteer hour' 2008 challenge, involved Intel employees in Ireland giving voluntary time to local community organisations throughout the course of last year. While the original target given to the employees in Ireland was 35,000 hours which was an increase on the usual annual level of around 7,500 hours, such was the interest in the scheme that a total of 56,000 hours was achieved by the Irish staff. The impact was two fold in the sense that the work was done for us and at the same time we received a grant for each hour worked stated Paul Croghan who co-ordinated the Maynooth programme of work.

Maynooth Community Council representatives attended a ceremony in Intel on April 1st when we were presented with a cheque for US \$4,245 by Jim O'Hara head of Intel Ireland. On behalf of all the groups that received support in Maynooth we would like to both thank and congratulate the Intel employees. While the "Intel Involved" community support programme has run for many years with many community groups being supported over the years, the company's 2008 'Matching Grant Initiative' has raised the bar in terms of how Intel supports the local community Paul Croghan commented. The reach of the projects this year also stretched well beyond the local areas with a number of national voluntary organizations benefitting from support.

Maynooth Community Council would like to single out one Intel employee who was an immense support to us this year as we moved office to the Tesco complex. Patrick Ennis a young man who lives in Celbridge saved us substantial costs in our office move as well as devised and delivered specialist training for the office staff and of course gained us significant funds under the 2008 'Matching Grant Initiative'.



Sewerage Upgrade Works in Maynooth


At the Leixlip Area Committee Meeting on 20 March, Councillors were given a presentation on the Lower Liffey Valley Regional Sewerage Scheme (LLVRSS) by Council Officials and David Conor of Tobin Consulting Engineers. Cllr. John McGinley and the other Councillors asked that an Information Meeting be held in Maynooth so that the public, Tidy Towns and the Business Community could get information on the works and make their views known. This meeting was held on the evening of the 31st March in the Glenroyal and all houses in Maynooth were notified in advance.


The meeting was attended by four engineers representing the Council and one engineer from the contractor, Ward & Burke. It was a very positive and worthwhile meeting. Cllr. McGinley was given the following assurances:

- The contractor agreed that there would be no noise related work between 8pm and 8am.
- All re-instatement would be at least to the standard of what was there beforehand. The Tidy Towns were asked to submit their preferred re-instatement for the little Pound and to make suggestions for Pound Park/ The Green.
- The Tidy Towns Committee to outline what they want the Council to put in a letter for the Tidy Towns Adjudicators so that the Sewerage Works does not impact on the scoring for Maynooth.
- The large pipe at the Castle/College Gates green will be removed when the tunnelling is finished and all that will be left there will be a manhole cover. The work is held up at present as Ministerial Approval has to be given for a Heritage Site such as this.
- The timing of the Surface Water Sewerage Works on Main Street and Back Lane to be carried out so as not to impact on students going to their Leaving Cert Exams. The works on the South Side of Main Street from the Avenue Cafe to The Roost will take place from the 18th June to the 9th July and the works on Back Lane will take place from the 17th June.
- All of the work in Maynooth to be completed by Mid July.
- Positive consideration is being given to Cllr. John McGinley's request to have the "Bandstand" moved to NUIM

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That Ward & Burke Construction Ltd. be asked to move the "Bandstand" from Pound Park/The Green, Maynooth, to the agreed location on NUIM grounds, as a gesture of goodwill to the residents of the area who have suffered great disruption as a result of the Lower Liffey Valley Regional Sewerage Scheme (LLVRSS)."

Temporary Provision of Additional Car Parking Capacity in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley and his fellow Councillors asked Council Officials some time ago to approach TESCO with a view to leasing the largely unused old car park. Councillors were advised at the Area Meeting on 20 March that TESCO had refused to lease any of the car park as they would need it for busy times such as Christmas. This extraordinary response by TESCO was condemned by John and his fellow Councillors as the Council leasing the car park was a win win for all concerned. The Council officials were asked to approach TESCO again as any problems with their peak time shopping at Christmas could be overcome very easily.

Possible Provision of Car Parking beside St. Mary's Catholic Church

Also, Cllr. John McGinley and his fellow Councillors had asked Council Officials to approach the owners of the derelict site beside the Church with a view to leasing it for use as a Council car park and for Church goers. Councillors were advised at the Area Meeting on 20 March that the owners had refused to lease the site. In Cllr. John McGinley's view it is completely unacceptable that the owners of this eyesore should refuse to co-operate with the council.

Cllr. McGinley has repeated his view to the Council that the site sign is an unauthorised development and that it is also a dangerous and derelict site that children are able to gain access to. John has asked the Council to take action against the site owner and hopefully there will a positive outcome where we all gain.

Reply to Cllr. McGinley's Motion on the Removal of Graffiti:

John was given the following reply to his motion:

"In May 2008 Pobal introduced funding to community groups for a graffiti reduction programme and this was brought to the attention of all the county's Tidy Town Groups at the time. It appears from the Pobal website (www.pobal.ie) that the programme may still be in operation.

Environment Section does not have the resources to remove graffiti from property."

John was further advised that the funding from Pobal is not available to County Councils and only community groups such as Tidy Towns or Residents' Association can apply. John asked that the Council remove the graffiti form the new Teenage Activity Area in the Harbour Field as soon as possible as it is an eyesore and if left there will only encourage more vandalism.

Reply to Cllr. McGinley's Motion on Banning HGV's & Putting Traffic Calming on Moyglare Road

At the March Leixlip Area Committee meeting of the Council John got the following reply to his motion:

"Traffic counts on this road carried out in September 2008 show HGV traffic at less that 5%. This level of HGV traffic would not be considered excessive and would be in keeping with recorded levels on other roads in the area. The difficulty with prohibiting traffic from using certain routes is that the displaced traffic must use alternative routes. This aspect would have to receive attention before any consideration would be given to the introduction of a HGV ban.

With regard to traffic calming, I regret to inform the committee that the traffic calming budget for the county is extremely limited and a number of projects have already been prioritised which will fully expend the monies available."

John then proposed that the Council make a case to the Dublin Transportation Office (DTO) for funding as the Moyglare Road is unique in Ireland as it has Schools at all three levels off it i.e. NUIM, Post Primary and Boys School. The DTO fund traffic calming at schools and the case for extending the traffic calming on Moyglare Road, in John's opinion, is very good. His proposal was agreed and the Council will now write to the DTO as requested.

Extension of Yellow Lines at the Entrance to the Council Car Park is Needed

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to extend the recently painted yellow lines at the entrance to the Council car park at Supervalu by a further 12m in order to stop cars from parking in a dangerous and illegal manner at this corner.

Left Turning Lane Sought for Exit to Straffan Road from Greenfield Estate/Shopping Centre:

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That a left turning lane be constructed at the exit of Greenfield Estate onto the Straffan Road in order to make it easier for the Estate Residents and customers of Greenfield Shopping Centre to exit safely."

Status of Noise Abatement Measures on M4

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following question for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"What is the current status of the introduction of noise abatement measures on the M4, particularly at Maynooth?"

REVIEW OF 2008 ALLOCATION OF DISABLED GRANTS SHOWS KILDARE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST

Deputy Emmet Stagg sought information from the Minister for Housing in relation to the amounts sought by each Local Authority for the Operation of the Disabled Grants Scheme and Housing Aid for the Elderly Scheme in 2008 and the amount subsequently allocated to each Local Authority.

The Minister has advised Deputy Stagg that Estimated Demand for the Schemes in 2008 totalled €158 Million and the total allocated including Local Authority Expenditure amounted to €95 Million, roughly 60% coverage of the estimated demand.

On two levels stated Deputy Stagg the figures show that Kildare is being discriminated against, the amount allocated compared to the amount sought and the allocation to Counties with Low Populations. Astoundingly in some instances Local Authorities were allocated more funding than the estimated demand for the schemes when they originally supplied figures to the Department in 2007, namely Cavan County Council, Kerry County Council , Laois County Council, Leitrim County Council , Offaly County Council, Roscommon County Council and Waterford County Council

Kildare Co. Council estimated that demand in 2008 would be \in 8,305,000 and the total allocation in 2008 was a paltry \in 2,717,064, only 33% of the amount sought. This compares to Carlow County Council receiving 79%, Clare County Council 92%, Longford County Council 60%, Westmeath County Council 91%, South Dublin County Council 80%, Limerick County Council 69%. Other areas did worse than Kildare such as Sligo County Council 29% and Wicklow County Council 25%. These figures show clearly that the allocation of resources to Kildare and other Counties is entirely discriminatory declared Deputy Stagg.

When you look at population figures Kildare with 186,000 people was allocated $\in 2.7$ Million, Laois with a population of 67,000 people was allocated $\in 2.6$ Million, Cavan with a population of 64,000 people was

allocated €2.2 Million and Carlow with a population of 51,000 people was allocated €2.2 Million. This again shows that Kildare is being discriminated against stated Deputy Stagg.

These grants stated Deputy Stagg are to provide basic services such as downstairs bedrooms and toilets for people who are disabled or with serious heart or respiratory problems to ensure they can live at home. The grants cover the installation of walk in showers or stair-lifts. They also cover door/window/ roof repairs and more importantly rewiring of old houses for elderly people.

With a waiting list of over 500 grant applications in Kildare, valued at some \in 7 Million, it is critical that Kildare gets a fair share of the allocations in 2009 to give people the opportunity of some comfort whilst living in the community and Deputy Stagg stated that he would be raising the iniquitous and scandalous allocations with the Minister.



Government supporting enterprise and employment with supplementary budget - Fitzpatrick

Supporting enterprise and employment has been a focus of this Government's supplementary budget according to local Fianna Fail TD, and Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"The Government is conscious that securing employment and creating new jobs is vital if we are to reverse the economic downturn. This is why this supplementary budget is focusing on job creation and supporting enterprise."

"The Budget made provision for in excess of €500 million for capital investment in enterprise through IDA Ireland, Enterprise Ireland, the County and City Enterprise Boards and Science Foundation Ireland. In doing so, the Government has prioritised investment in the most productive sectors of our economy and has invested in the creation of jobs by cementing the foundations of export led recovery and growth."

"This Budget also provides €100 million for the establishment of an Enterprise Stabilisation Fund that will enable our internationally trading companies survive the current global downturn by supporting their drive to reduce costs and gain sales in recession hit overseas markets."

"The creation of the National Asset Management Agency will also free up banks to lend to small businesses again by taking over the bad debts from banks."

"The Government is maintaining the largest per capita capital investment programme in Europe of \in 3.1billion which will assist the creation and maintenance of jobs in the construction sector. In addition the Government made \in 100 m available last October for sustainable energy and the green economy and this will assist and support the creation of 7,000 jobs. The school building and modernisation programme is expected to create 3,000 jobs with an investment of \in 613.5m."

"The Government is also keen to support the up-skilling of workers and the supplementary budget will now provide 128,000 training places for the unemployed through FÁS and the Job Search/National Employment Action Plan referral capacity has nearly doubled from 6,500 to 12,250 cases per month."

"The Government increased the number of Short Course places by 51,000 in February, bringing the total to 78,000 and an additional 12,015 places were announced in this Budget brining the number to 92,000 training places."

"Redundant apprentices will benefit from an additional 700 places on a new Institutes of Technology training programme, which means that approximately 3,400 redundant apprentices in total will now be able to progress their apprenticeships."

"An additional 400 places provided for in the budget will increase the number of places on Community Employment Scheme to 22,700 this year."

"This Budget also outlined a new work experience scheme, the details of which are currently being finalised, which will provide 2,000 six-month places to those who are unemployed and it will include the placement of graduates."

"A pilot training programme of 277 places at a cost of €1 million is to also be introduced for sustaining vulnerable (*Continued on page 52*)

employment. Under this programme workers who are placed on a three-day week and receiving social welfare payments for the days they are not working will receive 2 days training a week for a period of 52 weeks. Again the details of this will be finalised shortly."

"The Department of Enterprise with the Department of Education and Science will be also provide 1,500 third level places on a part time basis to the unemployed so that they may pursue a third level qualification."

"All of these measures are designed to support the unemployed, support their up-skilling and retraining to ensure that they are best placed to take advantage of any available employment opportunities."

"Being prepared for the up-turn that will inevitably come is vital. In the meantime it is crucial to encourage and support businesses and those who are unemployed and I am pleased that the Government has outlined these practical measures to do so," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Changes in payments to TDs and Senators welcomed - Fitzpatrick

Kildare North Fianna Fail TD, Michael Fitzpatrick has welcomed the announcement that there will be considerable changes in the payments to members of the Oireachtas following the supplementary Budget announced by Minister for Finance, Brian Lenihan TD.

"TDs and Senators will take a 10% reduction in all expenses other than mileage where a 25% reduction has already taken place. Payments to the Chairs of Oireachtas Committees will be halved and payments to committee Vice-Chairs and Convenors will be abolished. TDs will no longer receive long service payments or increments.

Former Ministers will not receive pensions while they are still serving as members of the Oireachtas. TDs and Senators who avail of paid leave of absence as teachers will not longer be able to avail of the arrangement whereby they can keep the difference between their teacher's salary and the cost of employing a replacement."

"All of these payments on top of regular salaries seemed like unnecessary expenditure in these difficult economic times and I am pleased that the Minister has made these necessary changes."

"It is vital that the public can see that members of

the Oireachtas are going to be hit by measures in this Budget. It is up to us to lead by example and I think it was important that the Minister reformed the system of payments and expenses to Ministers, TDs and Senators."

"I hope that these changes will go some small way to help restore public confidence in public representatives. The country is going through a difficult period and it is important that we as politicians play our part too. We are all tightening our belts now and I hope these changes will help save the taxpayer a substantial sum in the years to come," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

New National Asset Management Agency to free up funding for business

The Government has provided for a new National Asset Management Agency (NAMA) to assist in the functioning of the banking system which will benefit small businesses and consumers according to member of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee and Kildare North Fianna Fail TD, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"It is vital that banks are actively encouraged to start lending to small business in particular, to help to protect jobs and stimulate growth in the local economy. Banks provide the lifeblood of the economic system and small and medium sized enterprises provide the lifeblood of our local economy."

"If banks do not lend to individuals and businesses the economy will contract even further, jeopardising jobs and livelihoods."

"It is vital that banks are given a clean bill of health if they have big loans that cannot be serviced and allowed to strengthen their balance sheets and increase the flow of credit, particularly to small and medium sized enterprises."

"The Government, through NAMA will purchase the land and development at an economic price that reflects the current economic climate. Both the developers and banks will take a significant loss where they were originally purchased at an inflated price. NAMA will realise these assets over time in a way that protects the taxpayer."

"NAMA will not allow developers or other borrowers to get out of paying their loans they will have to repay what they owe, just as if the loan was with their original lender. It simply allows that original lender to free up extra monies to continue to lend."

"It is expected that the value of these loans will be in the region of \in 80 to \in 90 billion and will be considerably less than the original full value of the loans as NAMA will take into account the current values or property, land or developments. The original lender will have to take on these losses."

"While this move will increase the national debt, NAMA will try to cost the servicing the debt from income accruing from the assets. The debt itself will be repaid from funds raised from the sale of assets or the repayment of the loans by the existing customer."

"The Government has taken this move to ensure the stability of the Irish financial system and promote lending while also seeking to protect the interests of the taxpayers."

"This measure is not designed to save developers it is designed to increase the capability of banks and financial institutions to lend to stimulate economic growth which is vital for the future of local industry and jobs," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick. -

On-line application of facility for 2009 Single Farm Payment Scheme now open – Fitzpatrick Fianna Fail TD for Kildare North, Michael Fitzpatrick has welcomed the news that the on-line application facility for the 2009 Single Farm Payment applications

is now up and running.

"Applications for the 2009 Single Farm Payment will be taken with the Department of Agriculture's on-line application facility. Applications for the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme, and all other area based schemes, including the new Upland Sheep Payment can now also be made on line."

"This on-line facility is a further indication of the Department's commitment to make applying for grants as easy as possible for farmers and minimise the time and red tape around applications."

"The on-line application form also helps to reduce the potential mistakes or errors made by farmers and helps to prevent delays as the form has inbuilt compulsory fields helping to reduce errors or omissions. Incorrect paper forms need to be returned to the applicant slowing down the payment of the grant."

"The Minister tells me that almost 25,000 farmers are already registered with the Department to use the on-line facility and a further 25,000 have nominated an agent to fill in the form on their behalf. I am especially pleased that the option of nominating an agent has had such a strong take up. The Minister recognised that some applicants may not have access to or be comfortable using an on-line facility. To ensure that this did not prove to be a barrier to using the on-line application, agents can be appointed by the applicant to fill out the form."

"Kildare farmers who have yet to sign up for the online facility can make enquiries via the website <u>www.agfood.ie</u> or by telephoning the lo-call number, 1890 252 118," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Kildare Business to benefit from EU Recovery Plan - Fitzpatrick

Kildare businesses will benefit from a new EU wide recovery plan agreed by European leaders including the Taoiseach, Brian Cowen and Foreign Affairs Minister Micheál Martin, according to local Fianna Fáil TD and Government Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"I will be remaining in close contact with both the Taoiseach and the Foreign Affairs Minister during this period to ensure that concerns of people in Kildare are addressed before we vote in a new referendum," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

Planning and Development Act should be changed to Facilitate Greater Consultation and Reduce Conflict between Minister for Environment and County Councils.

Provisions of the Planning and Development Act 2000 should be improved to enable more discussion and consultation between local authorities and the Department of the Environment when City and County plans are being drawn up. This would lead to fewer disagreements between Local Authorities and the Department of the Environment and result in more timely and effective local planning.

These are some of the key findings contained in a report published by the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Environment, Heritage and Local Government. "The findings of the report recommend a clear process whereby this form of discord could be avoided in the future", according to Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick who is a member of this committee.

The report states that the Planning and Development Act should be amended to allow for a period of consultation involving the Department, local authorities and general public, should there be a direction to vary a County Development Plan. Furthermore, new development plans should not be initiated within two years of local council elections. This measure is to facilitate continuity, by ensuring that the councillors who commenced the plan are still in office when the plan is to be completed.

"The recommendations contained in this report should considerably assist the process of coordination between local and central governments. In future, more collaboration is needed to bring about a more efficient working relationship between local authorities and government departments. This relationship is crucial to ensure effective and successful local administration", added Michael.

The recommendations of the report will be passed on to the Minister for Environment, Heritage and Local Government to advise him regarding any changes to the legislation.

The report itself will be laid before the Houses of the Oireachtas.

County Development Plans provide a framework for land use, development, strategic planning, conservation and heritage. It provides objectives, standards and development controls which will be applied to all development within the County. 

Budget 2009 - Free pre-school year will help families who need it most and protect local jobs - Brady

The introduction by the Government in the Supplementary Budget of a free pre-school year has been welcomed by local Fianna Fáil TD Áine Brady.

The scheme is expected to benefit some 70,000 children every year.

"The provision of a free pre-school year will help families who most need assistance and it will also crucially help maintain jobs in the childcare sector."

"This aim of the scheme is to provide one year of quality pre-school education to children in the year prior to entry into primary school."

"The provision of a year's free pre-school to all children will promote equality of opportunity at the most important development stage of children's lives. Regardless of income or ability to pay, all children will be entitled to avail of this pre-school service." stated Deputy Brady.

"Children enrolled in playschools will receive free pre-school provisions of 3 hours per day, 5 days each week over a 38 week year."

"All children aged between 3 years and 3 months and 4 years and 6 months at September 1 each year will be eligible."

"All community and private pre-school services which meet the requirements of the scheme will be invited to apply for entry to the scheme and all notified pre-school services will be contacted by the Office of the Minister for Children and Youth Affairs by the end of May."

"The Minister for Children and Youth Affairs Barry Andrews TD will be introducing the scheme from January of next year. A helpline will be in place with effect from Monday, 20th April to answer queries from parents and childcare providers in relation to the operation of the new Scheme. The number is 1 890 30 30 39. "

"Fianna Fail in Government has prioritised investment in childcare, dedicating some €1 billion in developing childcare infrastructure over the last decade. This significant investment in infrastructure has made it possible to introduce this pre-school year," concluded Deputy Brady.

Boost for Kildare small and medium sized firms expected – Brady

Income levy – Briefing Note – Budget 2009

Doubling of the three income levy percentage rates

The new percentages will be 2%, 4% and 6%

Lowering the income levy thresholds/entry points for the new income levy rates

Proportionate - higher levy rates apply on the higher segments of income

The lowest income levy will now apply for the first time to people earning between \in 15,028 and \in 18,304.

Where one earns from $\in 15,028$ up to and including $\in 75,035$ one pays 2% on <u>all</u> of one's income from $\in 1$ to $\in 75,035$ inclusive.

e.g. if someone earns $\in 16,000$ per annum, that person will pay 2% on all of that $\in 16,000$, not just the portion from $\in 15,028$ to $\in 16,000$.

(but someone on a medical card will be exempted from the levy)

Additional impact of new income levy rates

Rounded figures used in following tables and examples to illustrate additional impact

Gross annual salary – all income	Extra impact	Gross impact
€15k - €18k	+2%	2% (Wage earners at this level paying a levy for the first time)
€18 - €75k	+1%	2%
Gross annual salary –	higher segments of income

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
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The Recession: the EU made it possible and the Lisbon Treaty would make it Worse

In June 2008 the Irish people rejected the Lisbon Treaty because of fundamental concerns on neutrality, company taxation, human rights, Ireland's right to a permanent Commissioner and the transfer of greater powers to the Big States.

With the Government, the political and business elites now committed to do the bidding of the Brussels bosses and rerun the referendum. They will hope to convince the electorate that without the 'generosity' of Brussels that Ireland will never recover from the present financial and economic crisis.

However, it was EU financial and monetary policies that facilitated the recession in the first place as is evident the following:

1. EU control of Irish interest rates costs us dear

In 1998, just prior to Ireland joining the Euro, our GDP growth stood at 8.7% and inflation was at a low of 2.2%. To discourage excessive borrowing the Irish Central Bank pegged interest rates at a prudent 6.2%. We handed over control of interest rates to the European Central Bank in Frankfurt, naively believing they would set rates to suit all the economies across the EU. However, this didn't suit the German and French economies and by 2000 interest rates had dropped to 4.5%. Stripped of the responsibility for domestic fiscal disciplines Ireland's brave banker fraternity were soon fueling the building sector boom. This proved highly lucrative for them and their new best friends – the developers and speculators – but it also resulted in rampant house price inflation and massive mortgages for homeowners.

2. Pay cuts required because of EU monetary policy

We all agree that the enormous salaries paid to bankers and politicians need to be slashed, but why the need to cut the modest salaries of PAYE workers? Due to a sharp drop in the value of the currencies of our largest trading partners, the UK and US, Irish exports have suffered a loss of competitiveness in those markets. The logical action to take is to devalue our currency accordingly, thereby making our exports cheaper and imports dearer. As a result Irish workers are being subjected to crude and humiliating pay cuts with many unscrupulous employers taking full advantage of vulnerable workers.

3. The recession has shown Lisbon Treaty to be both flawed and out of date

The Lisbon Treaty was conceived when globalization and financial capitalism were the buzzwords and the 'idea of the all-powerful market which wasn't to be impeded by any rules or political intervention' was at its zenith. At its heart, Lisbon promotes an "open market economy with free competition". Protocol six of the treaty states: "The internal market as set out in Article (1-3)...includes a system ensuring that competition is not distorted."

4. Budget deficit bullies

Our budget deficit is expected to rise to an 11% ratio of GDP. EU rules oblige member states to keep GDP ratios under 3% but this has proven impossible for most members. Ireland, with the highest ratio in Europe, has been given until 2013 by the EU Commission to get the deficit to below 3%. Given the severity of Ireland's position the economic pain involved in reducing State spending on essential services and levying further taxes on PAYE workers to meet the EU target may prove intolerable for citizens to bear. Therefore, the pace and manner of sorting the budget deficit should be a matter for the Dáil to decide, not the Brussels bureaucrats. However, faced with Irish non-compliance the Commission is empowered to impose fines, as per regulations incorporated into the Lisbon Treaty.

5. Ireland has "nothing to fear except fear itself"

While Ireland has serious economic challenges to overcome, all is not doom and gloom. Our long-term growth potential remains intact with ready access to relatively unlimited labour, capital, skills and land resources. By over-focusing us on our current budget deficit and mocking the Irish for falling foul of policies facilitated by the EU in the first place, the selfsame EU elites are hoping that financial stress will force Ireland to seek help from fellow euro members and that the Irish electorate, cowed by strong recession will cave in and adopt Lisbon II. *http://www.people.ie*

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



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

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Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council meeting 11 May 2009

Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

Well-being and mental health of our young people.

Chairperson, Colm O Cearúil, expressed the Community Council's great sadness at the recent tragic events in Maynooth and other nearby towns involving young people. He offered the Council's condolences to the families of the young people involved. It was agreed that the Community Council will seek advice on taking an initiative towards helping address this issue.

Membership and attendance drive.

Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin, Community Council secretary, said that it was time for the Council to remind all the local organisations, groups and bodies, such as residents associations, sports clubs, schools, colleges, and so on, that they are entitled to elect delegates to the Community Council. She pointed out that, due to their membership size, many residents associations are entitled to elect two or even three delegates. It was agreed that the Council will contact local organisations and encourage them to participate.

Important issues face Maynooth at the moment: the mental health and well-being of our young people, the development of the university town project, preservation of our heritage, proper planning for our town, traffic problems, and many more. It is very important that the community is actively interested and involved in these issues, and important that everyone in the community is aware that they can influence things for the better if they participate.

The Festival.

Hilda Dunne, Local History Group, said that Maynooth festival will be called the 'Geraldine Cultural Festival' this year. Andrew McMullon, Festival Committee, outlined some of the programme planned for this year. Included will be events at the Castle, with recitals by the Band, cultural presentations, and theatre. A final programme will be advertised nearer the event.

Noise in the Lyreen area.

Deirdre Cullen, Lyreen Residents Association, raised the problem of loud noise emissions from extraction/ generator plants in the residential part of the town centre. She said there was a very severe instance of this at present in the Lyreen area, running '24/7', which is causing great distress to nearby residents, some of whom live within a few feet of the machinery. This kind of noise causes distress and disturbance to residents in their houses and gardens, and also interferes with street-life, and the general ambience of the town centre. She said that proper town planning would foresee this sort of problem and ensure it didn't occur.

20g/¾oz butter 2 spring onions, sliced 1 clove garlic, crushed ½ red chilli, seeds removed (prevents it from being too spicy) and finely chopped 4 king prawns, cooked, and peeled, tails left on small handful coriander leaves ½ lime, juice only

Method

1. Melt the butter in a saucepan over a medium heat and add the spring onion, garlic and chilli and cook for one minute.

2. Add prawns and heat through.

3. Transfer the prawns, spring onion, garlic and chilli onto a serving dish, scatter over the coriander leaves and drizzle with the lime juice.

$\ensuremath{\bigotimes}$ riental sticky Chicken Wings and Drumsticks

Ingredients

- 6 chicken drumsticks, preferably free-range
 6 chicken wings, preferably free-range
 For the marinade:
 2 tbsp clear honey
 3cm/1¼ in piece of fresh ginger, peeled and grated
 1 garlic clove, crushed
 2 tsp soy sauce
 3 tbsp orange marmalade
 ½ tsp grated orange zest
- 1 tbsp sesame oil

Method

1. Slash the chicken drumsticks three to four times each with a sharp knife and place in a non-metallic bowl with the chicken wings. Mix together all of the marinade ingredients and pour over the chicken. Leave to marinate for at least 2 hours, or overnight if you can, turning occasionally.

2. Once it has marinated, place the chicken on the barbecue over medium-hot coals and cook for about 20 minutes, brushing with any marinade left in the dish as it cooks. If it's colouring too quickly, move to a cooler part of the barbecue to cook more gently. It's important you cook the chicken all the way through.

Beef Bourguignon Kebabs

900g/2lb sirloin or rump steak, cut into 4cm/1½in cubes 225g/8oz rind less smoked streaky bacon 18 button onions, peeled 24 button mushroom, wiped olive oil for brushing salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the Marinade:

- 5 tbsp red wine
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 2 shallots, finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
- 12 small fresh bay leaves
- 12 x 25cm/10in flat metal skewers

Method

1. Mix together the ingredients for the marinade and pour it into a non-metallic dish. Stir in the steak, cover and leave to marinate at room temperature for 2 hours or in the fridge overnight.

2. The next day stretch the bacon rashers on a board with the back of a knife. Cut each rasher in half and roll up tightly.

3. Drop the button onions into a pan of boiling water and cook for 2-3 minutes until just tender. Drain and refresh in cold water.

4. Thread the cubes of beef, the onions, bacon rolls, mushrooms and bay leaves from the marinade alternately on to the skewers. Brush the mushrooms and the onions with a little extra olive oil and then season the kebabs well with salt and pepper.

5. Barbecue the kebabs over medium-hot coals for 6 minutes, turning and basting with the leftover marinade now and then.

Summertime Favourite Avocado Chilli Dip

6 green chillies, skinned, seeds removed, chopped 3 tbsp milk

250g/8oz cream cheese

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 ripe avocados, peeled, seeded, mashed

Coping with Pet Loss

A nyone who considers a pet a beloved friend, companion, or family member knows the intense pain that


A accompanies the loss of that friend. Intense grief over the loss of a pet is normal and natural. Don't let anyone tell you that it's silly, crazy, or overly sentimental to grieve! People who don't understand the pet/owner bond may not understand your pain. You have a right to feel pain and grief! Someone you loved has died, and you feel alone and bereaved.

One needs time to work through grief and loss before attempting to build a relationship with a new pet. If your emotions are still in turmoil, you may resent a new pet for trying to "take the place" of the old, for what you really want is your old pet back. Children in particular may feel that loving a new pet

is "disloyal" to the previous pet. When you do get a new pet, avoid getting a "lookalike" pet, which makes comparisons all the more likely. Don't expect your new pet to be "just like" the one you lost, but allow it to develop its own personality. Never give a new pet the same name or nickname as the old one. Avoid the temptation to compare the new pet to the old one. It can be hard to remember that your beloved companion also caused a few problems when it was young! A new pet should be acquired because you are ready to move forward and build a new relationship-rather than looking backward and mourning your loss. When you are ready, select an animal with whom you can build another long, loving relationship-because this is what having a pet is all about!



The Hare

If its glance it is easy to mistake a hare for a rabbit, particularly at a distance. The best way to tell the difference is by the hare's longer, black-tipped ears, and longer, more muscular hind legs. Both hares and rabbits have a split lip, or hare-lip, although there are slight differences. A rabbit's top lip is split up to the nostrils, but has a layer of skin to cover the gums. A hare's top lip is split so that the gums are visible. As a result, the top 'buck' teeth may protrude, particularly in old age.

From the moment of birth, hares live out in the open. For the first weeks of their life, the leverets instinct is to lie completely still in their 'milking forms'. Like most mammals born in the open, leverets have a coat of fur and are soon fully mobile. This

is in complete contrast to rabbits, which are born naked, blind and helpless in the security of a burrow. To keep warm the hare has a thick coat, which is white on the underside and reddish-brown above, flecked with tawny gold, black and white to camouflage it. Like a rabbit it has a sensitive nose and a split or hare-lip. The average life-span of a hare is two and a half years. Hares are not, as a rule, sociable; but they do show an intense interest in each other during the mating season. Groups of individuals, consisting of several males called jack-hares, will pursue a female (doe) in a chaotic, free-for-all display. During their dispute over the doe the jacks have boxing matches. They rise up on their hind legs, box and batter each other with their forepaws and turn in circles with their hind legs thumping the ground.

The hare's large eyes have a very glassy quality. The eyes are on the side of the head and so give good wide field vision, they can also look backwards. Sometimes, when being chased, the hare will run straight into a net or other object, since it suffers from a blind spot immediately in front.

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June in the Garden

Superior of the second start to see the fruits of your labours. Herbaceous borders come alive with colour and the vegetable patch is full of fresh pickings.

Flower garden

Lilies

Potted lilies will be growing quickly now and as their flowers start developing they will need some support. Push several canes into the compost around the edge of the pot, linking them up with string to provide stability. If border lilies are not supported by neighbouring plants, use stakes around these too.

Roses

Sprinkle rose fertiliser around roots to encourage strong growth and a good flower display. Water in if rain does not fall within a couple of weeks or hoe into the soil, taking care not to harm the roots.

Bearded iris

Once irises have finished flowering in June, congested clumps can be lifted, divided and replanted. Reduce the leaf area by half and replant so that the rhizomes rest at the soil surface. Use our guide to dividing irises to get the best results from your plants.

Primulas

Dig up large clumps now and divide into individual plants, each with leaves and roots. Replant into newly prepared soil.

Summer bedding plants

Plant out tender bedding plants once all danger of frost has passed. If they have been grown in the greenhouse, harden off in a cold frame for a few days before planting out. Pots and trays of bedding plants can be placed on the patio during the day, but moved back under cover at night. Give them a boost by watering them in with liquid fertiliser.

Lupins and early perennials

Remember to cut off the old flower stems before they start to set seed. This will tidy the appearance of the plant but as an added bonus may even encourage a second flush of flowers. Also keep a watchful eye out for lupin aphids which should be controlled with an insecticide if necessary.

Greenhouse Cuttings

As soon as cuttings taken earlier in the season have produced a good root system, or plants have outgrown their pots, pot them into a slightly larger pot. Try and use the same compost as they were potted in before. Don't overfill with compost, but leave a gap at the top of the pot that can be watered into.

Fuchsias

Many young plants, including fuchsias, benefit from having their shoot tips pinched out to encourage branching. If left, shoots can grow very long and lanky, while pinching out creates bushier plants with more stems that ultimately carry more blooms.

Take cuttings

Take cuttings of geraniums, fuchsias, coleus and other houseplants.

Hippeastrum

Pick off dead flowers and seed-heads, unless you are aiming to save seed for new plants. Let the stem die down naturally, then cut it away neatly at its base.

Feed containerised plants

Most composts only contain sufficient nutrients to feed plants for about four to six weeks after potting up. Potted plants will then benefit from a weekly liquid feed to promote strong growth and generous flowering and fruiting. Learn the best way to feed your plants with our handy guide.

Greenhouse shading

Paint greenhouses with a shading paint or put roller blinds or shade netting in place for hot days.

Tomatoes

Tap the blooms on greenhouse tomatoes to improve pollination.

Kitchen garden Vegetable seedlings

Thin out rows of vegetable seedlings growing from earlier sowings, such as beetroot, lettuce and radish. Final spacings are usually indicated on seed packets. Congested seedlings never reach their full potential, as they distort one another as they grow, resulting in a much smaller crop. Carefully pull out unwanted seedlings, leaving the rest at the desired spacing, then water the row to settle the soil back around the roots of the remaining ones. Crops to sow outside in early June include runner beans, dwarf French beans, kohl rabi, carrots, marrows, cauliflowers, peas, ridge cucumbers, sweet corn, swede, lettuce, endive, squashes and spinach.

Bird control

Spread nets over soft fruit bushes, such as currants, and over strawberries growing in rows or in containers. Once blackbirds and other birds find fruits to their taste they will return again and again and will quickly strip plants of unprotected fruit.





Reinstatement Plans for "The Green" and the "Small Pound"

Maynooth Tidy Towns has received a commitment from Kildare County Council that these two areas as well as the area outside Maynooth Castle will be fully reinstated following completion of the sewerage treatment works upgrade. It is unfortunate that it was necessary for the contractors to go into these areas but as the work involved tunnelling these areas were in the firing line. 

# DIY Beauty Ways to Care for your Hair

Solution of the oily scalp secretion which gives it gloss and luster. Beauty is not so much a matter of color where hair is concerned. If your hair has a fine glow, a rich sheen, is thick and long, it will be beautiful irrespective of its pigmentation. Hair often makes an otherwise plain person beautiful. If you have the least suspicion of a curl in your hair, brushing around rather than straight will bring it out. Do not worry if you shed your hair. It is natural for the hair to shed — and to keep right on growing in again. Only see to it that the in growth is equal to the loss by shedding.

Most hair troubles could be prevented in the start by ordinary good care of the hair, and the maintenance of the state of general good health. Of course, various diseases affect the hair: fever dries it out and makes it fall; . Some skin diseases have the same effect. In general, if you are healthy, broadly speaking, your hair will be healthy too.

**Dandruff**—What we have to deal with in dandruff is a horny layer cast off by the scalp. This layer thickens, closes the pores, diminishes the hair's oil supply, and prevents the perspiration glands from getting rid of waste. Soon the hair loses tone and colour, and is covered with whitish powder. Then it starts to itch and fall. In an advanced state of the disease, the hair falls out, and blood crusts form on the scalp as a result of scratching. Digestive disorders, toxic elements in the blood or local irritation may cause dandruff, and it is communicable.

## Monsignor Hugh Connolly, President of St Patrick's College, Maynooth.



Or onsignor Connolly is a priest of Diocese of Dromore, born in September 1961. He is a native of Burren near Warrenpoint, Co Down where his sister, Rosemary, runs a well known solicitor's practice. He is a former student of Abbey Christian Brothers School, Newry and was ordained in Maynooth in June, 1987. As a young priest he studied for his Doctorate in moral *theology* at the Gregorian University, Rome which he completed in 1991.

Before being appointed President of Saint Patrick's College in 2007, he was Professor of Moral *Theology* and had been Registrar and Vice-President. The College comprises the Pontifical University where 400 students study *Theology*, and the National Seminary where 70 seminarians prepare for priesthood.

He particularly enjoyed his time teaching in the Pontifical University. He believes that *Theology* students discover a family-like bond with fellow students, and this is helped by the small College atmosphere of Saint Patrick's where lecturers and students interact very closely. As a result, past students have a great affection for the College, and tend to stay in touch after graduation. Students of the Pontifical University also have the benefit of the larger community, as they share the campus with the 7,000 students of the National University of Ireland, Maynooth.

Most students of the College come straight from school, but several students of *Theology* in Maynooth have already had careers or raised families and want to return to study, sometimes having missed the opportunity first time round. These students may be older than their teachers, and are a most welcome addition to the College, and enrich the whole community with their wisdom and experience.

At a personal level, Monsignor Connolly likes to travel, and each summer heads off with a rucksack, often to South America. He is very adept at languages, and can speak Spanish, French and Italian and is working on his Portuguese.

During the Easter break from his presidential duties, he went to Lourdes with the *Pilgrimage Trust*, where young people with disabilities are given a holiday. He finds this work very rewarding, and is constantly amazed by the generosity of the young helpers who accompany the young people. Each group is accompanied by a nurse, a doctor and a chaplain.

Monsignor Connolly has authored a book, published in 1995, on the *Irish Penitentials* and in 2002 published the volume *Sin* in the New Century *Theology* series. Monsignor Connolly was Executive Secretary of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference from 1991 to 1997.



### Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

#### Question:

I have been made redundant and am now on Jobseeker's Benefit. I plan to start a business with my lump sum. What information and support can I get?

#### Answer:

You may qualify for the new 1-year Short-term Enterprise Allowance, introduced on foot of the Supplementary Budget in April 2009.

This new scheme allows people who qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit (with 104 PRSI contributions paid in the past 2 years) or who have been awarded statutory redundancy to get immediate access to Back to Work Enterprise Allowance (BTWEA) Payment while setting up a business. This will be payable for the duration of your Jobseeker's Benefit entitlement (that is, either 9 or 12 months).

Enterprise Ireland may help if your business meets the criteria of a "High Potential Start-up". These criteria are listed on <u>www.enterprise-ireland.com</u>. You may also be able to get workspace in one of the Community Enterprise Centres funded by Enterprise Ireland.

Your local City or County Enterprise Board (CEB) may be able to provide support. Your business must have the capacity to be commercially viable, and the CEBs give priority to enterprises in the manufacturing or internationally traded services sectors. The sort of help they provide includes capital grants, employment grants and feasibility study grants. <u>www.enterpriseboards.ie</u>.

#### Question:

I am buying my first home shortly and rely on getting Mortgage Interest Relief on my repayments. Will I still get this relief after the Supplementary Budget.

#### Answer:

You are referring to the new changes to Mortgage Interest Relief which were announced in the Supplementary Budget on 7th April 2009.

With effect from 1 May 2009, Mortgage Interest Relief is being discontinued for all mortgages after the seventh year. However, these are special transitional measures in 2009 for people who have had a mortgage for more then 7 years.

The Government has announced that it plans to review the scheme and eventually abolish the relief.

In your case, as a first-time buyer, you will be entitled to Mortgage Interest Relief at a rate of 25% for the first and second years of your mortgage.

For the third, fourth and fifth years, you will get relief at 22.5%.

For the sixth and seventh years, you will get relief at 15%.


Under the new changes brought in by the Supplementary Budget, your entitlement to Mortgage Interest Relief will end after the seventh year.


#### Question:

What is Domiciliary Care Allowance? How do I apply? Is there a means test?

#### Answer:

The Domiciliary Care Allowance (DCA) is a monthly payment made to the carer of a child (aged under 16) with a severe disability who lives at home. The disability must be likely to last for at least one year, and the child must

need constant care and supervision that is substantially more than that normally needed by a child of the same age. There is no means test.

Up to 1 April 2009, the DCA scheme was run by the Health Service Executive (HSE). The administration of the scheme is moving from the HSE to the Department of Scoil and Family Affairs (DSFA). Since 1 April 2009, the DSFA from September 2009.

Before this transfer, the means of the child (but not of the carer) were assessed and the payment could be reduced. From now on, neither the child's means nor the carer's own means are taken into account.

The full rate of DCA in 2009 is  $\in$  309.50 per month. You can also get a Respite Care Grant (currently  $\in$  1,700) which is paid during each year.

You may get a half-rate payment if your child is in residential care and goes home for 2 or more days a week, for example, if he/she attends a residential service from Monday to Friday and goes home at weekends.

There is no restriction on the number of children for whom you may claim DCA and Respite Care Grant. In other words, if you are caring for more than one eligible child, you may claim the payments for each child).

DCA does not affect your entitlement to Child Benefit. You may also qualify for Carer's Benefit or Carer's Allowance if you meet the relevant conditions.

To apply, you need form Dom Care 1. To get this, you can text "FORM DCA" and your name and address to 51909; download from <u>www. Welfare.ie</u>; ask at your Social Welfare Local Office or Citizens Information Centre; or Lo-call 1890 202 325. Fill in parts 1 to 5 of the application form and have your child's doctor complete parts 6 and 7. Attach any relevant reports or assessments, and send the form to Domiciliary Care Allowance Section— address on form.

#### Question:

I am applying for a driving test. What does it cost and how long is the wait?

#### Answer:

The Road Safety Authority has increased fees for driving tests with effect from 7th April 2009. The driving test fee is now €75 for the following classes of vehicle:

- Car (category B)
- Moped (category M)
- Motorcycle (Categories A, A1)
- Works Vehicle (category W)

The new fee is  $\in$ 110 for the following classes of vehicle:

- Truck (category C)
- Bus (Category D)

The national average waiting time for driving tests is now less than ten weeks, so you can expect to be called for your test within a few weeks of applying. Depending on where you live, the waiting time for your test may be as little as six weeks.

A new IT system is being introduced shortly. This will enable customers to book their driving tests online. It will also allow them to choose the most suitable date, time and location.



#### Use your votes to defend Irish national and local democracy and rebuke Brussels

People's Movement is a non-party political movement that seeks to extend popular sovereignty and to promote democratic values in Irish life. We oppose attempts by the EU to further extend its control to all levels of society and seek to counteract its dominance of Irish political and economic life. In particular, we oppose the attempt to overturn the Irish decision of June 2008 to reject the Lisbon treaty in a Lisbon Two referendum threatened for next October. Therefore, we view the elections of 5 June as an opportunity for the electorate to send a strong message to the Brussels bureaucrats and to the compliant Irish political elites that the people of Ireland are not for turning on their rejection of Lisbon.

We know that Brussels and the Irish Yes side intend to use the recession to frighten the electorate into hoping that by granting more powers to the EU we will be saved from economic meltdown – despite the fact that it was the policies of Brussels and their Irish supporters that caused the problems in the first place. Accordingly, we wish to remind voters of how the recession was caused and what is at stake with the Lisbon Treaty. Furthermore, we urge voters to raise these issues with political canvassers, demand that their parties change their support for the failed EU policies and critically analyse each candidate's position on a second Lisbon referendum before casting your votes on 5 June.

All 27 EU Members are in economic crisis. Ireland is worse than most because of the borrowing binge, which was encouraged by the cosy cartel of Irish bankers and our elite political parties. Europe's biggest hitters, Germany and France, dominate European Central Bank policies but for Ireland this meant:

**Bank interest rates out of kilter for the Irish economy:** Frankfurt set rates at too low a level during the 'Celtic Tiger' years. Cheap money fed the property boom. It made billionaires of developers and the banksters – but resulted in rampant house price inflation and massive mortgages for homeowners.

**Falling exports due to over-valued euro:** Over 70% of our exports go to the UK, the US and outside the eurozone. The Irish Exporters Association reported total exports in 2008 fell by  $\in$ 6 billion and that the 6% decline to the UK can mainly be accounted for by the 33% depreciation in sterling against the euro. But the ECB failed to act because it doesn't suit Germany and France to devalue the euro. The resultant massive job losses in Ireland are of little concern to them.

Why the Pay Cuts and job losses? Because the euro was not devalued our Government and employers have embarked upon a crude 'internal devaluation'. Private sector employees and public and civil servants together have suffered savage reductions in pay. In turn demand for goods and services has collapsed and, bereft of banking facilities, small and medium enterprises are haemorrhaging jobs at an alarming rate. Unemployment will soon exceed 500,000. All are, pension values, investments, profits, social welfare entitlements, etc.

**Tax increases and service cuts:** the EU has Ireland given until 2013 to get our debt to GDP ratio down to 3% and the Government has set about achieving this with a vengeance. Yes, we need to sort out the deficits, but most economists now say it will take a generation to sort out the financial mess at the banks and government finances. Deflating the economy now with more taxes and cut backs can only lead to further economic and social carnage.

**EU-supported bailout for the bankers:** evidence has emerged that Finance Minister Lenihan coordinated his Emergency budget and the setting up of a National Asset Management Agency with EU officials. It seems the EU intend to use Ireland as a testing ground for a 'bad' bank, a device which will shift the banks' losses of up to 90 billion euro to the Irish State. If this works (or they get away with it) the NAMA concept may well be employed elsewhere in the EU. Most economists are opposed to NAMA and see temporary nationalisation as the only workable solution.

#### The Lisbon Treaty - out of date and fatally flawed

The Lisbon Treaty is the very embodiment of the EU's neo-liberal dogma, which assumes that banks and markets are at their most efficient when unfettered. It was conceived ten years ago when globalisation and financial capitalism were rampant. The whole world now knows to its bitter cost how disastrous such policies were.

We urgently need the EU and the ECB's euro policies to take real account of Ireland and other smaller countries' economic needs and make provision for our unique economic conditions. But Lisbon provides for increased legal powers for the ECB and states:

'The ECB...shall have legal personality, shall enjoy in each member state the most extensive legal capacity accorded to legal persons under its laws.

And it compounds the unequal relationship for smaller states by declaring:

'the votes in the Governing Council shall be weighted according to the national central banks' shares in the subscribed capital of the ECB.'

Germany and France, whose populations total 147ml. and together command a GDP wealth, in millions of dollars, of 6,533,250 - as compared to Ireland's 273,328 - will always call the shots at the ECB. Clearly, Lisbon copper fastens Big States control of the ECB and condemns the smaller states to a future of permanent disadvantage. The rules governing the ECB must be changed.

We urge voters to raise these critical issues with local and Euro candidates and cast their highest preferences for those who opposed the Lisbon Treaty or who oppose holding another referendum before exercising their preferences for the other Candida

#### Provision of Youth Cafe

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to speed up the provision of a Youth Cafe at TESCO. Maynooth residents will be aware that as part of the Planning Permission granted for the new TESCO a Unit measuring 4,500 sq. ft. in area has to be provided for community use. Cllr. McGinley got agreement in principle that a Youth Cafe would be provided for. John has also been in regular contact with Kildare Youth Services and they have advised him that an area of 1000 to 1500 sq. ft. is all that is required for the Youth Cafe. Council Officials will decide what other community uses will be catered for that would not be in conflict with the Youth Cafe. John has suggested that the remaining 3,000 sq. ft. could accommodate a Theatre and Performing Arts Centre.

#### Cllr. McGinley Gets TESCO Hoarding Removed

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley TESCO have removed the ugly hoarding from in front of the old car park.

Its removal will mean that Dublin Road will be more attractive to the Tidy Town Adjudicators and also that people will see that the individual shops are still open for business.

#### Provision of Additional Parking at Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following Progress Report from the Council:

"Further discussions have taken place with Tesco and I have made contact with two landowners who would be interested in providing an "all day" pay parking facility. Negotiations are ongoing at present."

#### Eyesore Beside St. Mary's RC Church

Cllr. John McGinley asked the Council to take action to have the large sign advertising the owner of this derelict site removed as it was unauthorised. It is very disappointing that the owner only removed the Advertising and left the hoarding in place. In addition the owner has refused to lease the site on a temporary basis to the Council for use as a car park.

John has again asked the Planning Department of the Council to take appropriate action now as it could have a negative impact on the scoring for the Tidy Towns Competition if the hoarding is not removed and the site cleared up as a matter of urgency.

#### Proposal to Ban HGVs from Moyglare Road Maynooth and Install Speed Cushions

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion:

"Due to the constricted financial climate, it is expected that funding from the DTO/DoT will be severely curtailed, as in other Government Departments. The DTO has funded both the Traffic Management and Public Transport Interchange Plans in the town and until these schemes progress to public consultation, no funding for implementation measures are expected.

In order to examine the area of Moyglare Road, the scope of the Traffic management Plan would need to be extended to include this area towards the county boundary. Until this happens, it is not possible to determine what affect changes to the traffic management regime in the area will have on the wider catchment area."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the Council should not predetermine the actions of the DTO and that a strong case should be made to them seeking funding for traffic calming for this road which is unique in Ireland in that it has first level, second level and third level educational facilities.

#### Removal of the "Bandstand:"

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That Ward & Burke Construction Ltd. be asked to move the "Bandstand" from Pound Park/The Green, Maynooth, to the agreed location on NUIM grounds, as a gesture of goodwill to the residents of the area who have suffered great disruption as a result of the Lower Liffey Valley Regional Sewerage Scheme (LLVRSS)."

#### John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"It would be inappropriate for Water Services as Project Managers to raise this suggestion. It is not relevant to the scope of the works and would result in increased contract costs."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the reply was total rubbish. He said that the Park has to be completely refurbished as a result of the Sewerage Works and that it would be a waste of money doing so unless the "Bandstand" was removed. Maynooth Tidy Towns are in agreement with John on this. Demolishing it and using it for scrap would not cost much as the Contractors are already on site. John has already identified savings on the contract as it included surface water drainage for Leinster Street even though this was provided only last year. So it is wrong for the Council to say that there would be increased contract costs.

### Constructing a Left Turning Lane at the Exit from Greenfield Estate onto the Straffan Road.

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That a left turning lane be constructed at the exit of Greenfield Estate onto the Straffan Road in order to make it easier for the estate residents and customers of Greenfield Shopping Centre to exit safely."

#### John was given the following reply:

"I regret to inform the Committee that there is no funding available in the Roads Maintenance budget for this work. This request will be referred to the Roads Design team for their comments."

John asked that he be given the cost of the work so that funding can be addressed.

#### Noise From the M4;

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"What is the current status of the introduction of noise abatement measures on the M4, particularly at Maynooth?"

#### John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"No noise abatement measures are currently planned for the M4. The Noise Action Plan for County Kildare has been forwarded to the County Manager for approval. The action plan sets out a strategy for the treatment of environmental noise within the county over the next five years. However, any resulting noise mitigation will be dependent on the provision of funding."

John asked that the NRA be asked to put a low noise thin wearing course of asphalt macadam (similar to that on the N7) on the M4 between Leixlip and Kilcock now. The existing surface is 15 years old and it is due a new coating anyway.

#### **Enforcement of the Litter Laws:**

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion (Continued on page 55)

for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That Kildare County Council strictly enforces the Litter Laws in Maynooth, particularly as it relates to litter on the footpaths outside fast food premises."

#### John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"The Litter Warden continues to monitor the litter in Maynooth. The area is visited approximately four times per week. Indeed during 2008, 93 litter fines were issued for the Maynooth area and included were fines for fast food premises. In 2009 there were 25 litter fines issued for the Maynooth area."

John stated that the footpaths outside fast food premises and pubs were a disgrace and that there was no evidence of proper enforcement of the Litter Laws.

#### Provision of a New Footpath and Public Lighting From TESCO to the Halting Site.

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That a new footpath and public lighting be extended on the South Side of the Dublin Road from TESCO to Blacklion Halting Site in the interests of public safety and that it be made a condition of any Planning Granted under 09/396 (LF Properties Ltd.) to provide same."

He was supported by all the other Councillors at the Area Meeting on 15 May. Officials stated that they could not comment in public on a Planning Application.

#### **Restoration of the Car Activation of the Pedestrian Lights at Kingsbry:**

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Why will the Council not re-commission the Loop on the Pedestrian Signals at Kingsbry, Maynooth?"

#### John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"The vehicle loop at the pedestrian signals at Kingsbury, Maynooth was decommissioned early last year due to safety concerns. Allowing pedestrian crossings to be controlled by vehicle sensors on side roads is considered to be unsafe and not standard practice. If there are problems with traffic exiting the side roads the safe and standard practice is to put in place a full signalised junction, subject to a study of the environment and all vehicle and pedestrian movements in the area. Unfortunately there are no resources available, at this time, to carry out such a study or to install or maintain additional signalised crossings."

John stated that the reply was total nonsense as cars exiting from Kingsbry have been activating the lights for the last 15 years and there was no question of safety concerns then. Indeed the new system is a safety hazard. The other Councillors agreed with John.

### Switching on The New Pedestrian Lights at Cluain Aoibhinn:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Why is Finance Section holding up the switching on of the Pedestrian Lights on the Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth, whose installation was completed in February?"

#### John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"A payment was issued to ESB in March, however, due to administrative difficulties this payment was returned and had to be redrawn. This has now taken place and it is hoped that the lights will be switched on shortly."

John stated that it is an awful pity that it took over three months to get a payment of  $\in$  385.90 to the ESB to make a connection for lights that cost  $\in$  40,000.

John has also contacted the ESB on the 15 May asking them to carry out the work as soon as possible.

#### Removal of Graffiti from Harbour Field Area, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Please source or seek funding for removal of graffiti in the area on the grounds that action now will deter further appearances."

"Graffitti removal in the playground is being funded from the playground maintenance budget in the current year's estimates. Graffitti removal has been an ongoing process since the start of the year."

#### Straffan Wood Taking in Charge

It was agreed at the Leixlip Area Committee on 14 May that a recommendation would go to the full Council to take Straffan Wood housing estate in charge provided that the issue regarding the areas to be transferred to the Management Company has been clarified with the Developer.

#### STAGG AND McGINLEY SUGGEST MODIFICATIONS TO PROPOSAL FOR DUBLIN ROAD, MAYNOOTH

Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley have suggested modifications to the planning proposal for 226 apartments in 4 and 3 Storey Blocks on the Dublin Road, Maynooth. The Carton Avenue Action Plan does allow for taller buildings on this particular site but Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have indicated that three Storeys is the maximum acceptable. They also pointed out that with the removal of the 4th Storey from the two Blocks on the Western edge of the site the applicants should incorporate a roof on each of the blocks in line with the Heritage of Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley also pointed out in their submission that if these modifications were made that they would not pursue the planning file further within the planning process.

We await the reaction of the Planners and the applicants to our suggestions.

#### 44% REDUCTION IN REGIONAL AND LOCAL ROAD GRANTS FOR KILDARE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the decision by the Minister for Transport to slash the Regional and Local Road Grant Allocations to Kildare Co. Council by 44%, down from an allocation of  $\in$ 28,178,630 in 2008 to a revised allocation in 2009 of  $\in$ 15,769,264, following the Supplementary Budget on April 7th last.

Nationally the Total Grants allocated to all Local Authorities in the State fell by 26% and Deputy Stagg stated that Kildare seems to have been targeted for special treatment by the Minister and the Government with an additional 18% cut.

The cuts now imposed, stated Deputy Stagg, see €.5

of a million taken from the Clane/Kilcock Improvement Scheme and a further €3 million taken from restoration improvement projects throughout the County. €4.5 million of funding has been withdrawn from the Enfield/Edenderry Improvement Scheme which means that even if An Bord Pleanala give the CPO the go ahead this year work will not commence on this seriously deficient major road.

Last February then backbench T.D. Aine Brady welcomed the original grant to Kildare for these works, whilst ignoring the fact that originally the figures were cut by 13%. This further cut of an additional 31% is staggering and shows a contempt by this Government for the people of the County.

When FF and Green Canvassers call to your homes over the next five weeks you should ask them why Kildare has suffered so severely in the bailout of the

Bankers and Developers concluded Deputy Stagg.

#### **COUNCIL HOUSING BUDGET SLASHED BY 44%**

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted angrily to the announcement of the Capital Allocation for Local Authority Housing for Kildare Co. Council which sees funds slashed by 44% since 2008.

In 2008 stated Deputy Stagg the allocation to Kildare Co. Council was  $\in$ 45 Million and the 2009 allocation is only  $\in$ 25 Million. This reduction in funding for the building/purchase of Local Authority Housing is a 44% reduction whilst Nationally funding has been cut by 27%. Again as in the allocation of roads funding where Kildare lost out significantly one has to ask why Kildare is being punished so harshly by this Government.

With just under 4,000 housing applicants on Kildare Co. Council's Housing Waiting List and with the building industry in serious decline the allocation by the Government will impact severely on those who cannot afford to provide their own housing accommodation and on workers in the building industry.

In addition to the Governments attack on traditional council housing there has also been a reduction in funding for the Voluntary and Co-operative Sector of 24% in Kildare, down from €13 Million in 2008 to €9.835 Million this year. Nationally funding for this sector fell by 18% so again Kildare is being targeted for higher cuts than elsewhere.

Minister of State Aine Brady welcomed these allocations on May 1st and stated she was *delighted to welcome this important funding*. I now pose the question to her – How can your Government stand over a 44% reduction in Kildare against a 27% cut Nationally in Council Housing funding.

In any event Deputy Stagg stated that funding should not have been cut at all as the retention of the National Budget of just over a Billion Euro for Council Housing in 2008 would have given the building industry a boost.

### ALLOCATION OF DISABILITY AND HOUSING ADAPTATION GRANTS ROTTEN TO THE CORE

Reacting to the announcement of an allocation of €1,870,000 to Kildare Co. Council for Disabled Person Grants, Housing Adaptation Grants and Mobility Grants, Deputy Emmet Stagg has claimed that the allocation of the Grant money nationwide is Rotten to the Core.

The Grant to Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg covers less than a third of the current waiting list of Grants sought by Disabled and Elderly people which presently stands at €5,731,000 and involves 587 individuals and families. Theses stated Deputy Stagg are very real people who have suffered a disability and need downstairs accommodation, or are elderly people who require stairlifts or level access showers. Others on the waiting list are elderly people whose homes require rewiring, central heating or replacement of substandard doors and windows.

It will take at least three years to meet existing demands in Kildare which is placing an incredible strain on disabled people and our senior citizens who have a right to live with some modicum of comfort in their homes.

The really galling thing about this is how Kildare's Elderly and Senior Citizens are treated compared to those in other Counties stated Deputy Stagg. Simply comparing the allocations to population we see a clear inequality which is typical of FF political life:

Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to question the Minister further in relation to the allocation of these funds because its time that Disabled and Elderly people in Kildare received a fair share of the funds available.

### GOVERNMENT ABANDONS CARE OF THE ELDERLY

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of elderly people awaiting admission to a Public Nursing Home in Co. Kildare and the number of people on the waiting list for Home Care Packages. The HSE have advised Deputy Stagg that there are 188 people on the waiting list for long stay beds in Co. Kildare, 18 of whom are in Acute Hospitals and 94 who are living in the Community. Of those living in the Community 12 require extended care as soon as possible. The remaining 76 are in Private Nursing Homes with inadequate levels of subvention. In relation to the Home Care Packages there are 160 people on the waiting list.

The figures show that the Government are not prepared to put in place resources to care for our Senior Citizens when they are unable to care for themselves or remain in the Community. Even the scheme of Home Care Packages, specifically designed to allow senior citizens to remain in their local community with assistance is at a standstill with no new Home Care Packages approved in 2009 to date. The really shocking figure stated Deputy Stagg is that 94 people deemed eligible for Long Term Care are living in the Community, placing immense pressure on families to care for them without adequate training or back up assistance. The fact that 12 of these require extended care as soon as possible, with no place available for them is nothing short of scandalous treatment of our Senior Citizens.

The only answer to this continuing problem is a major investment in Public Nursing Homes based in our larger towns along the lines of the Maynooth Community Care Unit. The investment would provide jobs in construction, provide the badly needed care for our Senior Citizens and remove families from the clutches of the Profit driven Private Nursing Homes. That is Labour's answer but regrettably FF and the Greens simply don't care enough concluded Deputy Stagg.



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



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### **Community Council Notes**

#### Maynooth Community Council meeting 11 May 2009

Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

#### Well-being and mental health of our young people

Chairperson, Colm O Cearúil, expressed the Community Council's great sadness at the recent tragic events in Maynooth and other nearby towns involving young people. He offered the Council's condolences to the families of the young people involved. It was agreed that the Community Council will seek advice on taking an initiative towards helping address this issue.

#### Membership and attendance drive

Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin, Community Council secretary, said that it was time for the Council to remind all the local organisations, groups and bodies, such as residents associations, sports clubs, schools, colleges, and so on, that they are entitled to elect delegates to the Community Council. She pointed out that, due to their membership size, many residents associations are entitled to elect two or even three delegates. It was agreed that the Council will contact local organisations and encourage them to participate.

Important issues face Maynooth at the moment: the mental health and well-being of our young people, the development of the university town project, preservation of our heritage, proper planning for our town, traffic problems, and many more. It is very important that the community is actively interested and involved in these issues, and important that everyone in the community is aware that they can influence things for the better if they participate.

#### **The Festival**



As this involved shift work the environment did not suit him so in 1989 he again went back to stud work and racing stables working for Mr. Frank Dunne at Hamwood Stud Dunboyne and remained there until 1993. He applied for a position at Saint Mary's Boys National School Maynooth where he now works as Caretaker.

Dominic married Ann Nevin from Ballygoran in 1975 and they have two sons Mark and Alan.



## **Pet Corner**

## Keeping Budgies As Pets

Budgies are colourful, attractive, sociable birds that are easy to keep and look after. They originate from Australia and can live up to 15 years - so choosing one as a pet is a long-term commitment. They can be kept alone but prefer the company of their own species. If kept indoors they will need regular daily exercise outside their cage and are at their most active during the daytime, sleeping once it gets dark.

**Housing:** Budgies can be housed indoors in a large wire cage with a plastic base or outdoors in a purpose-built aviary. The cage should have some horizontal bars on it to allow climbing – this means many round cages are unsuitable. Bars should be no wider



than 12mm apart to prevent escape. Kept outdoors, your aviary should allow room for the birds to fly around properly. Budgies kept indoors will need to be let out of their cage daily to exercise – make sure you keep all doors and windows closed when you do this. **Covering the cage with a cloth at night** will encourage your Budgie to settle down for sleep. You should provide a bath for your bird, either fixed to the outside of the cage or a shallow bowl placed inside the cage – although some birds may prefer to be sprayed with tepid water instead. The cage should also contain plenty of toys to keep your Budgie amused, particularly if it is kept on its own.

**Feeding:** Budgies in the wild eat a wide range of seeds, grains, and vegetation. A good-quality Budgerigar / Parakeet mix makes a good basic diet although supplements may also be required such as cuttlefish which acts as a vitamin supplement, environmental enrichment, and also helps grind the beak down. Small pieces of fresh fruit and vegetables may also be given as treats and fresh drinking water should always be available. Certain foods can be harmful to your Budgie - **avoid giving your pet lettuce, avocado, lemon, potato, or any sweets or drinks designed for human consumption.** 

**Exercise & Entertainment:** Budgies are intelligent and inquisitive birds that enjoy playing and climbing. Toys are essential to stimulate them mentally and physically – especially important for birds kept on their own. Budgies can also be taught to mimic sounds and talk. If they hear the same words repeatedly from the same person they may pick them up and **begin mimicking** the words or phrases. A solitary bird will need more attention and affection than a pair or group and should be handled every day.

**Handling:** With patience, Budgies can become quite tame although it is essential they are trained from an early age, and by one person only. The first step is to get the bird used to being stroked inside its cage – use a stick or perch, not your hands. **Start by gently stroking its chest a couple of times a day**, then encourage it to jump onto the stick. Next, repeat the whole process through the door of the cage rather than the bars. Finally, repeat again, using your hands this time instead of the stick. This is a gradual process that may take several weeks but usually works in the end.

To pick up your Budgie, ensure your palm covers its back and wings while your middle and index finger surround the bird's neck. Be gentle – Budgies will bite if they feel stressed. If catching an aviary bird use a padded rim net and never try to catch it in mid flight - always wait until it is perched safely.

**Health:** Budgies can catch Scaly Beak, a contagious condition that requires immediate treatment by a vet. As with all birds, if you are worried about any aspect of your Budgie's health, seek advice from an your veterinarian. For a healthy life, your Budgie needs the following:

- A good balanced diet with no sudden changes
- Plenty of toys to keep them amused
- Water bottle and feed bowls cleaned daily
- O Their nails clipped several times a year ask your vet for advice
- A daily bath essential for their preening activities
- Regular exercise outside their cage

# Neil Diamond

N eil Diamond was born Neil Leslie Diamond, also known as the Jewish Elvis, and The Diamond Cutter. He was born on the 24th January 1941. Neil's origin was in New York City, New York USA. The styles of songs he sang were Rock, Pop, Folk and country. His occupation as a singer and songwriter and musician stretched over many decades. During his career he played guitar and piano. The pitch he sang at was and is Baritone. His career started in 1958 to the present.

#### Early life and Career

Neil Diamond was born in Brooklyn New York, to a Jewish / Polish family. the son

of a dry-goods merchant. He grew up in several homes in the New York City Borough of Brooklyn, attending Erasmus Hall and Abraham Lincoln schools. There he took part in the SING! and sang in the school choir with Barbara Streisand. Diamond's first recording contract was billed as "Neil and Jack" an Everly Brothers type duo, where Diamond appeared with a high school friend. Diamond spent his early career as a songwriter in the Brill Building. His first success as a songwriter came in November 1965 with the song "Sunday and Me" performed by Jay and the Americans.

#### The 1970's

After Diamond had signed a deal with MCA Records label, of Universal Pictures' present company, he moved to Los Angeles, California in 1970. In 1972 Neil played ten sold out concerts at the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles. At the concert performed on Thursday, August 24, which was recorded and released as the live double album *Hot August Night,* Diamond thanked the people in the audience for their participation in the making of the album. A few weeks later in 1972, Diamond performed a serious of one-man concerts on 20 consecutive nights at the Winter Gardens Theatre in New York. Every one if these concerts sold out. The album Hot August Night was considered his best yet and has become a classic. In 1976 he released *Beautiful Noise,* produced by the Band's Robbie Robertson. On thanksgiving night, in 1976, Neil made an appearance at the Band's farewell concert, The last Waltz. He performed one song "Dry Your Eyes".

#### 1990"s to Present

During the 1990's Neil Diamond would produce six studio albums. He would cover many classics from the movies and from the famous Brill Building song writers. He also released two Christmas Albums, the first hit number eight on the Billboard's Album chart. The 1990's and 2000's saw a resurgence in Diamond's popularity. " Sweet Caroline" became a popular sing-along at sporting events. Diamond's song "America" was used in Promotional advertisements for the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City. On December 31, 2005 Diamond appeared on Dick Clark's New Year's Rockin' Eve 2006. In 2007, Diamond was inducted into the Long Island Music Hall of Fame.

#### Personal Life

He married school teacher Jaye Posner in 1963. They divorced in 1969. They had two daughters. In December 1969 he married Marcia Murphy (his manager at the time). They had two children, both sons. Diamond's second marriage ended in 1995. From 1996 until 2008 Diamond had a 12-year relationship with Australian Rachel Farley, having met her while she handled marketing during his 1996 Australian tour.

#### Charitable Work

In April 1992, Diamond worked with Australian artist Sharon Davidson to launch the Hands Up Project of Artists For Life. After viewing the considerable damage caused by Hurricane Ike in 2008 in Oak Island Texas, Neil set up a charitable fund for the victims of the hurricane.

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

#### Mainéar an Mhuilinn, Maigh Nuad.

T agann an logainm "Maigh Nuad" ó Mhaigh an Taoisigh Cheiltigh áitiúil Nuada. B'é Nuada Airgeadlámh an Ceannaire Ceilteach sa cheantar seo. De réir na miotaseolaíochta chaill sé a ghéag i gcath agus rinne Dian Cecht

lámh airgid dhó. Dé réir na ndlíthe Ceilteacha bhí ar an Taoiseach a bheith iomlán ina chorp, le gach ball beatha a bheith slán aige nó aici.

Thóg na Gearaltaigh caisleán anseo i 1176. B'é Muiris Mac Gearailt an chéad ridire Angla-Normannach i Maigh Nuad. Bhí an chéad láthair chosanta den déantús móta agus báile ar an láthair seo agus tógadh an Dún ag tús an 12ú chéad . Ba láthair iontach é seo don Dún toisc go ritheann An Laidhrín (fo-abhainn d'abhainn an Rí) ar an teorainn thuaidh agus go bhfuil fo-abhainn eile ag sní ar na teorainneacha theas agus thoir.

I 1328 tá cur síos ar an suíomh mar seo a leanas.' Caisleán cloiche, halla le cistin cheann tuí, bácús, gairdín, feirm, bóitheach, stábla, túirín, scioból, colmlann agus muileann. Is é seo an chéad chur síos ar taifead ar an láthair ina bhfuil Ionad Siopadóireachta Mhainéar an Mhuilinn. Bhí droichead thar An Laidhrín mar cheangal idir an caisleán agus an muileann.

Gabhadh an caisleán i 1535 agus is ann a chur fear Ionad an Rí faoi go dtí athreimniú na nGearaltach i 1550. Rinne Richard Boyle, 1ú Iarla Chorcaí, athair céile Seoirse 16ú Iarla Chill Dara athchóiriú agus méadú ar an gcaisleán ach rinneadh damáiste don chaisleán i rith an chogaidh i 1640. Bhailigh an tIarla leis ón gcaisleán go gairid ina dhiaidh sin agus tháinig droch-chaoi ar an áit, níor fhill siad ar Mhaigh Nuad go ceann céad bliain ina dhiadh sin.

I lár an seachtú haois déag bhí dhá mhuileann ar an láthair, iad lonnaithe ar an dá thaobh den Laidhrín. Bhí ceann amháin ag déanamh coirce agus an ceann eile ag déanamh plúir. ## Features

#### Manor Mills Maynooth

Maynooth or Maigh Nuad ( the plain of Nuada) is named after a mythological figure in Irish history. The medieval village was developed in the eighteenth century as an estate village by the Fitzgeralds who become earls of Kildare and dukes of Leinster. The first Fitzgerald, Maurice, was an Anglo- Norman knight who was granted the district surrounding Maynooth in 1176. While the original defensive settlement would have been of the motte and bailey type, the stone keep of Maynooth Castle probably began in the late twelfth century. The site was an ideal location for a fortified castle as it was bounded on the north by the Lyreen stream, a contributory of the Rye Water and on south and east by a small Tributary.

In 1328 the site was described as containing a 'stone castle, hall with kitchen , thatch covered hall, bake house, vault in newly built garden, grange [barn or farm ], cow byre, stable, turret, ditch, garden gate, laggard gate, dovecot [and] mills'. This is the first recorded listing of the existence of mills on the site which is now occupied by Manor Mills Shopping Centre. A bridge over the Lyreen connected the castle complex with the mills area. As old station asserts that the back will of the manorial mill was the front wall of the castle mill. The castle was captured in a siege in 1535. Lord Deputies lived there afterwards and the Earl of Kildare returned in the 1550's. Having being renovated and enlarged by Richard Boyle, 1st earl of Cork, Father – in -law to George the 16th earl of Kildare, the castle was damaged again in the wars of the 1640's. It appears that the earl left soon afterwards and the castle fell into ruins. The family did not return again for c. 100 years.

By the mid-seventeenth century there were two mills on the site (one in disrepair) and over years buildings were damaged on each side of the mill race which was drawn from Lyreen. Theses included kilns, offices, stores and stables. Sluices were also added. In the mid – nineteenth century one of the mills was involved in the production of flour and the second in the production of corn. However, time took its toll and within a short period, the flour mill was in bad repair while the corn mill was not in use. The property was still in the hands of the duke of Leinster whose family had returned to Maynooth and set up residence in Carton House at the eastern end of the town.

A short time later a Mr Edward Kavanagh took over the running of Manor Mills. His family was already wellknown in the milling and corn trade in Dublin. The man who founded the mill besides the ivy-covered castle ruin saw it finally established. In time, the business passed to his son, Edward and then to another member of the family, called William and finally it passed onto the fourth generation of the family Thomas Kavanagh. The mill wheel was built by Thomas Smith millwright of Celbridge c. 1850. It was installed in the mill race and continued by power the grinding mill until well into the nineteenth century.

During the milling season it was a common sight throughout Ireland to see lines of donkeys and carts loaded with sacks of grain making their way to and queuing patiently outside the local mill. In this way it was also a social event, giving the men time to chat and exchange gossip and in some cases even time to visit the local hostelry. Over time, tractors with trailers and then trucks replaced the old carts. When the property mill until and into the nineteenth century. The mill wheel remained in the site.

While the diameter of a mill wheel was important, it was the volume of flow of water provided the mill with its working power. While some wheels were powered by water from above, others were powered by water from below. The most powerful wheels ( the ones with the highest horse power) were the ones with the greatest breadth of bucket, contained with diameter and fall of water.

How do you work out the horse power of a working mill wheel? During the Mid-Nineteenth century when government surveyors visited every millowner in the country –all 2,600 of them – they were given instructions. "When a bucket –wheel has been properly constructed, the cubical content of water discharged per minute multiplied by .001325 and by the fall will give the effective horse power'. In addition a mill's grinding capacity also depended on the number and size of the millstones with which it opened. And all this before the invention of the calculator!.

Over time, the old mill wheel and grinding stones together with the donkey's and carts outlived their usefulness and were discarded in favour of more modern methods. And over time, what had once been Fitzgerald's Manor Mills in the thirteenth century gave way to Kavanaghs' Manor Mills in the Nineteenth century which in turn gave way Manor Mills Shopping Centre in the Twenty –first century.

## July in the Garden

#### **Essential tasks for July**

Although maintenance is key in July, you can still introduce new bedding plants to keep your garden looking bright and beautiful throughout summer

#### **Flower garden**

Trim Clematis montana if large and overgrown. Pinch out the growing tips of basket and container plants to encourage them to produce bushy even growth and lots of flowers. Encourage chrysanthemum shoots to branch out and carry more blooms by pinching out shoot tips from June to early July. This technique is called stopping.

#### Sow seeds

Biennials, such as foxgloves, sweet williams, Canterbury bells and forget-me-nots, should be sown as soon as fresh seed is available.

#### Pests and diseases

Use a forceful jet from a garden hose to knock aphids off water lilies and other garden plants. Spray roses to protect them against problems with mildew, blackspot or rust.

#### Summer bedding plants

Finish planting out summer bedding plants in borders, baskets and containers. Fill gaps with large argyranthemums, fuchsias or pelargoniums.

#### Cut down early-flowering perennials

Remove faded flowers on perennials such as lupins and delphiniums. Early pruning often encourages a second flush of flowers late in the season. Cut the flower-spike down to just above a new shoot or leaf, and give each plant a generous liquid feed to encourage fresh growth. Remove the seedheads from aquilegia to prevent them from spreading.

#### Greenhouse

All potted plants need a daily check for watering. Add a full-strength liquid feed once a fortnight or a dilute one more regularly. If you find that watering is taking up too much of your time, follow our tips to help you water more effectively.

#### Ventilation

Open ventilators and doors every morning, but close them again on cool evenings. Do check that birds or cats aren't getting in, use netting if necessary.



#### **Growing bags**

Never let crops in growing bags go short of water. Standing the bags on gravel trays or on reservoirs with wicks through the base can prevent drying out.

#### Cuttings

Pot on rooted cuttings of pelargoniums, argyranthemums, fuchsias and other plants as soon as the roots have filled their pots. Take cuttings from the non-flowering shoots of shrubs and climbers.



#### Herbs

Woody stemmed herbs such as sage and thyme produce lots of fresh healthy new shoots at this time of year, which will quickly root if taken as cuttings. Learn the best way to take cuttings of woody stemmed herbs.

#### Harvesting

Harvest beetroot and other crops while they are still young and tender. Early potatoes will be ready to harvest soon. Check one plant first to assess the crop size. Leave them to develop further if the potatoes are too small, and water the rows every week.

#### Fruit crops

Enjoy the fruits of your labours by picking rhubarb, strawberries, raspberries, currants, cherries and gooseberries. Remember to net fruit bushes to keep birds away, but it is important to check the netting daily to ensure that no birds have become trapped.

#### Sweet corn

Plant out pot-grown sweet corn. Place the plants in blocks, not rows, spacing them out about 45cm (18in) apart each way.

#### Crops to sow

From June to early July the following vegetable crops can be sown directly outside: lettuce and salad leaves, radishes, kohl rabi, spring cabbage and endive, plus dwarf French beans for a late crop. Winter spinach can be sown from July to September.

#### Water onions

Never let onions go short of water or their yield will be severely reduced. Water plants thoroughly once or twice a week if conditions are dry, and keep down weed competition by hand or using a hoe.

#### **Cordon-trained fruit**

Side shoots on cordon gooseberries and currants should be pruned back to about five leaves or 10cm (4in) long.

#### **Fruit trees**

The natural June drop will thin out a heavy fruit crop to some degree, but it is worth lending a hand. Pick off any small, damaged or diseased fruits to leave those remaining spaced 10cm (4in) apart.





#### EU parliament elections: a further shunt to the right at Brussels

While the most notable outcome in the Irish results were the successes for Joe Higgins and the Labour Party, in contrast, the overall result was characterised by further advances for the conservative European People's Party (EPP). They have won the elections for the third consecutive time in a row, with 267 out of 736 seats. Their champion, José Manuel Barroso, is now expected to continue as President of European Commission and we can expect more free-market policies that have crippled the Irish economy. Long gone now is the social Europe of the 1990s to which many Irish people were attracted. Cruel financial rectitude and mass unemployment will be the hallmarks of this meaner EU regime.

#### Never mind the guarantees – it's the economy now

Since Ireland's NO to Lisbon in June 2008, our government has engaged itself in phoney negotiations with Brussels to secure what can only be legally worthless guarantees on ethical issues, tax sovereignty and our neutral status. These fake concessions are supposed to bamboozle voters into overturning their position of last year. However, this process is not only duplicitous but also out of date - due to the international financial and economic tsunami that has engulfed Irish society.

The up-to 60 billion euro bank bailouts, the soon-to-be-exceeded 500,000 dole queues, the tax and levies hikes, etc. are all as a direct consequence of the neo-liberal, EU-promoted policies that were slavishly followed by successive Irish governments and greedily implemented by our banking and business elites. All of this has now exposed further fatal flaws within the Lisbon Treaty pertaining to its financial provisions. Ireland and other peripheral countries in the eurozone have suffered from the European Central Bank's policies on interest and exchange rates that have been set at levels suited to French and German economic conditions. To correct this bias against Ireland we must again reject Lisbon for it contains the following clause which copper fastens French and German control of the controlling body of the ECB:

## 'the votes in the Governing Council shall be weighted according to the national central banks' shares in the subscribed capital of the ECB.'

The only way that smaller states can escape a future of permanent disadvantage within the ECB is to have Lisbon's ECB clauses scrapped and a new mechanism created to reshape banking policies that genuinely provide financial stability for all within the eurozone. It is on such issues that the Lisbon Two referendum debates must be centred!

#### European trade unionists also want Lisbon changed

At a conference held on May 27-28, the European Trade Union Confederation (ETUC) called on the European Council to adopt an unambiguous and binding commitment to fundamental social rights as part of the guarantees to be given to Ireland ahead of the second referendum on the Lisbon Treaty. Their letter to the Council stated:

You will see that we are calling for a bigger Recovery Plan, better coordinated and directed action at European level, no return to the 'casino' capitalism which has caused the crisis, and for a Social Progress Protocol to be added to the EU treaties, with a revised Posted Workers Directive, to correct the present, worrying unbalance between the free movement of services and collective bargaining at national level.


#### Sound man Eamon – no Lisbon Two

The Labour leader, Eamon Gilmore, is deservedly Ireland's most popular political leader: his independent and straight-talking stance in holding government and banking bosses to account for their disastrous policies has found favour with the public. For this he and his colleagues have been rewarded at the recent polls. He was also spot on when he said after the result of the referendum last year that Lisbon is dead and should not be revisited. "I do not think there is any question of treaty being put a second time to the people." Mindful of the increasingly anti-worker and right wing direction of the EU, we urge Eamon and his party to stand firm on his principled stand of respecting the Irish people's decision of June 08 and give courageous leadership against Lisbon Two.

Eamon, James Connolly's words, "*The cause of Labour is the cause of Ireland, the cause of Ireland is the cause of Labour"*, are most prescient at this critical juncture in Irish history.

#### Parents urged to apply now for Back to School Clothing & Footwear Allowance

Over 140,000 families with school-going children are expected to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance this summer, according to Minister for Social and Family Affairs Mary Hanafin T.D. This scheme will see parents being assisted with the back to school costs through payments of  $\in$ 200 or  $\in$ 305 depending on the age of their children. Minister Hanafin urged eligible families to apply in plenty of time, in order to

ensure that they receive payment before the new school year starts. "**Probably the furthest thing from most** parents' minds this week is the start of the new school year. But we know that families always find this a pressurised time financially, so I would urge them now to take the time to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance, as it can take 6-8 weeks to process applications and receive payment."

The number of children benefitting from the scheme has increased over the past number of years, rising from 161,000 in 2006 to over 200,000 last year. Given increased income thresholds and the increase in the numbers on the Live Register, the numbers likely to benefit this year are expected to be over 250,000 children. Expenditure on the scheme this year is expected to be €68million.

Minister Hanafin said in the changes introduced in the Budget this year "means that an estimated 18,000 more families will benefit as the income thresholds for entitlement to the scheme were increased by  $\in$ 50." This brings the income limits for the allowance for parents with one child to  $\in$ 560 for couples and  $\in$ 407 for those parenting alone.

Another special measure which was introduced in the Budget was an additional allowance of €215 payable to 18 year olds in full time education for whom, the half rate Child Benefit is now applied. Total back to school payment in respects of children aged 18 is €520. The scheme is administered on behalf of the Department by the Community Welfare Division of the Health Service Executive, with staff in place now to deal with claims. A person may qualify for payment of an allowance if they are in receipt of a Social Welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement), or Health Service Executive payment, are participating in an approved employment scheme or attending a recognised education and training course and have household income at or below certain set levels. Minister Hanafin said "the purpose of the household income limit is to ensure that the allowance is directed at those with the greatest need."

The mobile text service now makes it even quicker for parents to apply for the relevant forms. For those who are eligible, they can now apply by text message to request an application form.

Applications for the allowance can be made between the beginning of June and the end of September each year. A person may qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear scheme if they are:

getting a Social Welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a Health Service Executive (HSE) payment or taking part in an approved employment schemes or training courses: and

getting a Qualified Child Increase with their social welfare payment and their household income is within the limits in either of the tables below.

## Applications for Working Training Programmes now accepted

The Minister of State at the Department of Health, Aine Brady TD, has stated that FAS is now accepting applications for both the Work Placement Programme and a pilot Short Time Working Training Programme, both of which were announced recently.

'Both of these programmes, which are aimed at assisting the unemployed and those on a reduced working week, were contained in April's Supplementary Budget.'

"With the increasing numbers of people who are unemployed this Government is continuing to develop and put in place new programmes that will enhance the work experience and training opportunities for people that are becoming unemployed.'

¹Last March, I met with the Tánaiste and proposed that we have such programmes. I also made contact with FAS and the Minister for Social and Family Affairs to discuss such schemes. I am delighted that these

programmes are now available and they will enhance the skills of the people that are now find themselves unemployment.'

'From 2nd June FÁS local offices will be taking applications from people who are interested in either Programme, with a view to placing them or commencing their training within a period of weeks.'

'These schemes will bring valuable experience to many and enable people to benefit fully from an economic upturn, when it comes, as it well'

'Traditionally social welfare payments for jobseekers were conditional on the recipient actively seeking work. These new schemes waive that requirement and see us move from welfare for unemployment to welfare to work." Concluded Minister Brady.



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## **Editorial-August**

For the third year in a row it seems that summer has decided to abandon Ireland. Although not as wet as the last two summers, it is certainly far from what people were looking forward to. The country and the county could do with some clement weather with the bad news that continues to buffet the people week after week. The drop in income coupled with unemployment means that the option of escaping to a sun holiday is not as easy an option as it was in the past.

The early Irish believed that bad weather, as well as famine, war and other ailments were a sign of bad kingship or leadership. Many of our old Irish stories give accounts of the landscape reacting to the bad decisions or judgments of the early kings resulting in their loss of kingship. Perhaps there is something to be said for an enforced change of government every five or seven years – if only to give the ruling party some time to recover from the pressures of governing. The present lot seems exhausted and completely bereft of ideas or remedies.

The issue of increasing crime was a muchdiscussed item at the most recent Community Council meeting. Crime will rise throughout the country as unemployment increases. Therefore, the recommendations of the McCarthy "An Bord Snip Nua" report to cut the number of gardai stations in the country in half does not fill one with confidence that this crime rise will be dealt with.

It is difficult to find anything positive in all the 'doom and gloom' that the An Bord Snip report brought with it. The announcement of Intel and they will be letting 300 people go shortly is bad news for the county and for North Kildare in particular and shows that no industry or business is immune to the dreadful recession that haunts us. The anger of the last number of months seems to be replaced by a numbed silence as if we are traumatized, or simply a desire to leave. A number of people have said this recently - that all they want to do now is leave. But the option of emigration that sent our well-educated workforce abroad during the eighties is not as readily available this time. The country itself will have to cope with a growing number of highly educated young people now unemployed who are not used to bad times and one wonders what will become of them and how they will react to the increasingly depressing state of Ireland.

It is important that we do not lose sight of those areas in which we, the Irish, excel, namely tourism, culture and the old-fashioned idea of 'Ireland of the welcomes'. Most of these got lost in the consumerism of the Celtic Tiger and, as a result of rampant development some of our beautiful tourist attractions have been over-run and destroyed. If we are to develop the area of 'cultural tourism' as recommended by the Minister, Martin Cullen, we will have to take a long, hard look at ourselves and what we value. One shining light in the last short while was the much-vaunted visit of Real Madrid and that they stayed right here at Carton House in Maynooth. We didn't see them but we are assured that they were actually there!

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## **Community Council Notes**

## Maynooth Community Council meeting 8 July 2009

## Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

#### Anti-social behaviour and crime in Maynooth

Paul Croghan, Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, reported that a large number of newly planted trees on the Kilcock Road had been vandalised, and pointed out that this particular sort of vandalism was not usual in Maynooth. Concerns have been expressed about anti-social behaviour and crime in local estates, and in Maynooth town centre, by a number of Community Council members at recent meetings. The Community Council has agreed to take steps to highlight this problem and to seek more effective action by the Gardai. The Council will ask residents' associations and other organisations to outline the specific problems in their local areas. The Council plans to invite local Gardai to discuss the issues raised by this survey at a forthcoming Council meeting. Many members felt that if the laws concerning under-age and public drinking were actually enforced in Maynooth, then a large percentage of anti-social behaviour and crime incidents would be eliminated.

#### Need for premises and facilities for clubs and organisations in Maynooth

The urgent need for a community centre in Maynooth was highlighted by Josie Moore, Senior Citizens Group, and by members of Maynooth Scouts. Both organisations have been without adequate premises and facilities for some time. The Scouts have suggested that facilities could be provided for their club at the Harbour Field, within the terms of the Local Area Plan for that area. Maynooth has a large number of organisations with wide-ranging needs – for example, An Nuada Players have been looking for theatre space for some time - and a number of different kinds of community space are urgently needed.

#### Youth mental health and suicide prevention

Maynooth Community Council has wanted to help in some way with the issues of youth mental health and suicide prevention in our area, and members of the Council's executive committee have sought advice from a number of organisations. The HSE has invited the Community Council to participate in a new initiative on these issues, and the Council hopes to provide a community perspective and to help create community links to the process as the initiative gets going.

#### The Irish language stream at Maynooth Post Primary School

Colm Ó Cearúil, Chairperson of Maynooth Community Council, expressed concern that Junior Certificate students in Maynooth Post Primary School's Irish language stream would not be able to take maths through Irish this year. Council members stressed that the Irish stream was a unique and very important asset to Maynooth Post Primary School, both academically and culturally, and they wished to see it continue and flourish. Members supported Colm Ó Cearúil in his hope that the Irish language stream might expand to include a Leaving Certificate class in the future.

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# **Freddie Mercury**

Freddie Mercury was born Farrokh Bulsara on the 5th September 1946. His country of origin was Mumbai, India. He was an Indian British singer, song - writer. He played the piano, keyboards and the guitar. He was best known for being lead singer of the rock group **QUEEN**. As a performer, he was known for his vocal prowess and flamboyant performances.

In 1954, at the age of eight, Freddie was shipped to St. Peter's School, a boarding school for boys in Panchgani near Bombay (Now Mumbai) India. At St. Peter's he was a bright student who excelled at several sports.

He was especially adept at boxing, with a strong left hook. At school, he formed a popular school band, called the Hectics, for which he played the piano. It was also at St. Peter's where he began to call himself **"FREDDIE".** Mercury remained in India with his grandparents and aunt. He completed his education in India at St. Mary's ISC-Mumbai. At the age of 17, Mercury and his family fled from Zanzibar as a result of the 1964 Zanzibar Revolution.



As a child, Mercury listened to a considerable amount of Indian Music, and one of his early influences was the Bollywood playback singer Lata Mangeshkar. Regarded as one of the best vocalists and front men in the history of music, Mercury's vocal range spanned three octaves. Mercury wrote ten out of seventeen songs on the *Queen's Greatest hits* album. Mercury is noted for his live performances which were often delivered to stadium audiences around the world. He displayed a highly theatrical style that often evoked a great deal of participation from the crowd.

As a young boy in India, Mercury received formal piano training up to Grade IV. Later on , while living in London, he learned Guitar, as much of the music he liked was Guitar orientated. In addition to his work with Queen, Mercury put out two solo albums and several singles. His solo work was not so commercially successful. Mercury's two full albums outside the band were Mr. Bad Guy, and Barcelona.

In the early 1970's Mercury had a long time relationship with girlfriend named Mary Austin, whom he had met through guitarist Brian May. He lived with Mary Austin for many years. However, by the mid-1970's he began an affair with a male record executive at Elektra Records, This ultimately resulted in the end of his relationship with Mary Austin.

According to his partner Jim Hutton, Mercury was diagnosed with AIDS in the Spring of 1987. Around that time, Mercury also claimed in an interview to have tested negative for the virus. On 22nd November 1991, Mercury called Queen's manager Jim Beach over to his Kensington home, to discuss a public statement. He made his statement the next day on the 23rd of November. A little over 24 hours after issuing the statement, Freddie Mercury died on 24th November 1991 at the age of 45 years. The official cause of his death was bronchial pneumonia resulting from AIDS. Although he had not attended religious services in years, Mercury's funeral service was conducted by a Zoroastrian priest. Mercury was a Parsi. The Parsis are " Iranian of the larger of the two Zoroastrian communities of the Indian sub-continent" and Indian- based Zoroastrian community.

A Statue in Montreux, Switzerland ( by sculptor Irena Sedlecka ) has been erected as a tribute to Mercury. It stands 3 metres high overlooking Lake Geneva and was unveiled on the 25th November 1996 by Freddie's father and Montserrat Cabellé. Beginning in 2003 fans from around the world gather in Switzerland annually to pay tribute to the singer as part of the "Freddie Mercury Montreux Memorial Day" on the first weekend of September.

In his will, Mercury left the vast majority of his wealth, including his home and recordings royalties, to Mary Austin, and the remainder to his parents and sister. He further left £500,000 to his chef Joe Fanelli, £500,000 to his personal assistant Peter Freestone, £100,000 to his driver Terry Giddings, and £500,000 to Jim Hutton. Hutton moved back to the Republic of Ireland in 1995, where he still lives. He was involved in a 2000 biography of Mercury, Freddie Mercury The UNTOLD STORY. In 2006 Hutton gave an interview to celebrate what would have been Mercury's 60th Birthday.

He was a really truly remarkable artist of our times.





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
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F or many years I struggled to control my weight, due in no small part to a poor diet. I ate anything and everything and unfortunately the majority of my choices were poor because I never looked at the labels on the side of the packets which would have told me their nutritional value.

As I am a chronic **Psoriasis sufferer** and have used every cream imaginable that might help alleviate the problem, which didn't, after being told by the specialist years earlier that there was no known cure, I decided that I would tackle the problem by making changes to my diet. But how could I do this?, I knew no-one who could advise me on how to go about it. However, as I used to do some of my shopping in the health shop, and the assistant was a Nutritional Therapist, I asked her if she could help me. The first thing she asked me to do was for the following week, was to keep a record of everything I ate from the time I got up in the morning to when I went to bed at night and record how I felt after. I did this and handed it back the following week. She spoke to me and told me in no uncertain terms that my eating habits had to change. Of course secretly I knew this myself but nothing could have prepared me for the shock of what was to follow.

Following the first of many consultations, I had to make wholesale changes to my diet. Out went the grills, sweets, crisps, breads, cakes, fast foods, my favourite tipple which was Guinness, pork of any description and chocolate. In came the **new diet mung beans, kidney beans, broccoli, cauliflower, brown rice as it's easier to digest, cous cous, fish preferably mackerel, salmon un-smoked and a number of supplements that would help my digestive tract to recover.** The above was only a taster of the changes that I had to make. I had to drink at least 1.5 to 2 litres of water a day as this would help the bowels to function much easier. I also had to walk for at least half an hour a day as this too was good in helping with my blood circulation.

I started the diet mid September 2007 and at that time I weighed 14 stone 6 lbs and I had a 36 inch to a 38 inch waist which was far too heavy for a man of my size as I am only 5 foot 5 in height. I set out with determination that I would do this as my weight and my Psoriasis could get out of control and then there was the danger of things like obesity and heart disease. Also I suffered quite frequently from heavy nose bleeds and some quite heavy . Over time, and as the weeks and months passed, I found it easier to eat things I would not normally have eaten. I invested in a steamer and got away from the less conventional way of boiling as this was seen to remove important nutrients from the vegetables. Some of the items I found myself steaming were things like carrots, leeks, turnips, celeriac which has a very strong taste, red onions and garlic which are seen as an anti septic and which protect against colds and flu. In the beginning I thought I would die from my diet change. I invested in a juicer . At lunchtime there I was drinking a mixture of my sticks of celery, carrots and some fruits combined that I had just juiced. In the juicer I also mixed celery, beetroot, courgette, cucumber, carrots, mango, apple, cut off a bit of root of ginger which gave the juice a bit of a bite and I even stuck in some pear. By the time I was finished juicing there was a multitude of flavours in it and it was dark maroon in colour courtesy I think of the beetroot. Sticks of celery and carrot were used to dip in hummus which can be bought in stores like Tesco and Londis. You can make it yourself but it has to be made exactly to a smooth paste like texture. It's made from chickpeas and lemon juice and one or two other ingredients.

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#### How I Ate Myself Healthy

By Christmas 07, I was feeling really good in both mind and body. I was doing a VTOS course in Leixlip and making rice and salads for the lunch. From 14st. 6 lbs, I went down to 12st. 2 lbs. It was a good feeling to have accomplished so much in so little time. My condition, which was deteriorating fast before I made some changes, was now beginning to move in the right direction. I was drinking the water the way I was told to as this would help my bowel get rid of waste a lot easier. Water is a good way of cleaning out the system, true you might be running to the



loo more often than you'd like but in the long run, internally you begin to feel much better and much healthier. **During the early part of September, I attended an event at the RDS in Dublin called "The Rude Health Show."** At this, a number of food experts and indeed doctors as well, gave talks on how best to manage your health. One of the people that I got speaking to was **Jan de Vries who is a well known authority on health issues throughout the British Isles and beyond.** He has published many books on health issues including Psoriasis and how best to tackle the problem. I had read one of his books particularly the piece he wrote on Psoriasis as it had information in it that would help me in the long run on how best to manage my condition. I bought some of his books to find out more information about this condition and how best to improve the symptoms, which might someday clear up this persistent problem completely.

In October I will be two years on this particular diet, and even though I have made yet more changes, I feel some of the decisions I have made have not been altogether the right ones. For instance, I tend to eat a lot more rice cakes then I should and find I am not eating enough veggies which is a very important part of this diet. I am eating quite a lot of chicken and while this might not be seen by many as a bad thing, the chicken I eat is not of the organic or free range variety which I was advised to eat. Not a wise move I have to admit. Yes I do eat a healthy breakfast which consists of oatmeal porridge, a mixture of sunflower, sesame, pumpkin and linseeds– all of which are different kinds of seeds mixed together. I also add brazil nuts cut up and mix them in with the seeds.

I am still chopping and changing to see which other health benefits might best help me in my fight to beat this fairly common complaint, but I definitely think by eliminating certain foods and introducing food which you wouldn't have even considered is the way to go. Don't get me wrong I'm not saying going to the doctor is a bad thing, quite the contrary, I just think that by making such changes, taking into account that everything nowadays is sprayed with pesticides, insecticides and every other kind of contaminant, people just have to watch and then wash thoroughly everything including veggies as this too could be doing harm to your digestive system. Hopefully I might have helped some of you out there unfortunate enough like me to suffer from this chronic condition and may have given you a few ideas on an alternative way of fighting this debilitating disease.

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#### **Pet Corner**





Ithough its closest relations are other carnivores like the Otter and the Marten, the Badger is for all the world Ireland's bear. It has a similar shape and a low centre of gravity and frequently adopts bearlike attitudes. Its favourite food is earthworms and other invertebrates but a variety of berries, fruits and nuts are also taken. Small mammals and other animals are also occasionally killed and eaten.

Adult Badgers are usually less than a metre in length but are very heavy for their size. The striking black-andwhite head pattern and greyish body fur give the Badger a singular appearance. The under body is blackish as are the large paws. The Badger's claws are more than an inch long and are used to great effect by the burrowing and foraging animal. They leave an unmistakeable print in soft ground.

Badgers are nocturnal though they may be seen at dawn and dusk going to and from the sett. A sett is an underground tunnel usually opening out into a network of tunnels which may be occupied by several Badgers. The entrance is often in woodland and reasonably adjacent to agricultural land where earthworms and other food can be sought. Characteristically there is a communal toilet outside, near to the sett entrance; old bedding material (dried grasses, leaves and moss) is deposited outside too. These are good indicators of an occupied sett.

Young Badgers, from one to five (per litter) are produced in early spring and nurtured by the adults for about two months. Some young may overwinter with the adults in their sett. The Irish name Broc is used universally as a term of endearment for the Badger and it is affectionately regarded in story and folklore. It is ironic that so much abuse has been levelled at this harmless animal as well. Badger baiting - a barbaric activity in which a captive Badger is pitted against a series of dogs - still occurs in parts of the country despite public outcry.



# Recipes — Marinades & Dressings

#### Lemony Mediterranean Marinade



- Juice and grated rind of 1
   lemon
- 2 Crushed garlic cloves
- Freshly ground black
   pepper
- 1 Stem chopped fresh rosemary

Mix all the ingredients and marinate chicken for up to an hour and fish for just an hour.

#### Tikka Marinade

- 2 Tablespoons of natural yoghurt
- 1 teaspoon tikka paste
- 2 Tablespoon chopped coriander

Mix yoghurt, tikka paste and coriander, add chicken and leave in the fridge for one hour or over night.

#### Minty Yoghurt Marinade

- Juice and grated rind of lemon
- 2 tablespoons natural yoghurt
- 4 tablespoons chopped mint
- Freshly ground black pepper

Mix lime, yoghurt pepper and half the mint together, marinate chicken or lamb and then sprinkle the rest of the mint when cooked.

#### **Basic Mayonnaise**

- 2 egg yolks (at room temperature)
- 2tsp white wine vinegar
- 1tsp English mustard
- 2tsp Dijon mustard
- tsp salt
- Freshly ground white pepper
- 100ml olive oil mixed with 200ml vegetable oil
- Juice of half a lemon (optional)

Put the egg yolks, white wine vinegar, mustards and salt and pepper into a stainless steel or glass bowl on a damp cloth to stop it slipping (don't use an aluminium bowl, otherwise it will make the mayonnaise go grey).

#### Honey and Mustard Dressing

- 1 tbsp French mustard
- 1 tbsp honey
- 1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
- 1 tsp balsamic vinegar
- 2 tbsp cider vinegar
- 6 tbsp sunflower oil
- salt and pepper, to taste

Put the mustard, honey, garlic, balsamic and cider vinegar in a food processor and whiz together. With the motor still running, pour the oil in through a funnel.

Season with salt and pepper and serve.

#### French Dressing with Lemon

- Ingredients:
- 3/4 cup vegetable oil or olive oil
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Put all ingredients in a jar with a screw-top lid. Cover jar and shake vigorously to blend well. Chill dressing for 8 hours or overnight. Shake well before using.

#### Maríe Rose Sauce

- 4tbsp mayonnaise
- 2tbsp Double cream
- 1tbsp tomato ketchup
- 1tsp Worcestershire sauce
- Sqeeze lemon juice
  - Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper



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#### A Definitive Guide to Websites

T his article is intended to give a broad overview of the Internet and Websites for beginners. Just about everybody now has heard of the Internet. But what is the difference between the Internet and websites? What are the elements of a website? Hopefully, I can help you understand a little more.

The Internet is an ever expanding collection of websites. Just like your computer is a collection of software, i.e. Operating System, Internet Browser, Email Program. However, the Internet on the other hand expands at around 10 million web pages per day. Google currently indexes approximately 8 billion web pages. You can gain access to the Internet by using your computer an Internet Browser (Internet Explorer or Firefox) and a subscription with an Internet Service Provider (ISP). Some popular ISPs in Ireland are Eircom, Digiweb, Irish Broadband. They provide a service that allows you to connect to the Internet. You then use a browser to view web pages. Contrary to popular believe, the browser is not the Internet, it is just a device used to view web pages on the Internet.

A website is collection of web pages and other media. A website is stored on a server, which is just a powerful computer that serves the website to the Internet. Once a website is stored on a server it is then available to anyone on the Internet. The company that owns the server is called a hosting company. If you were having a website built then you would need a hosting company in order to store and serve your website.

A website will always have a website address or otherwise known as a URL. A typical URL would be google.com or dakor.ie. A website address is a user friendly way to remember a website name, otherwise you would have to remember an I.P. address. Just imagine trying to remember the I.P. of my website, http:// 208.113.223.92 instead of www.dakor.ie. When you type in a URL into your browser the Internet goes to work and looks up the I.P. address associated with the URL. The I.P. address tells your browser where the server is located and what website you are looking for. Of course, all of this is done in split seconds and then the website is displayed on your browser.

There are three main elements to a website: design, navigation, and content. A lot of business owners tend to primarily focus on the website design. However, It is important to have a good mix of all three elements. If a website looks good but is difficult to navigate or does not have good content then the visitors will probably not come back for a second visit. If a website has a lot of content but the navigation falls short of expectations then it will frustrate the visitors which means they probably will not come back for a second visit.

A website has six seconds to keep a visitor's attention. In those six seconds the visitor will evaluate the design and navigation to decide if it is worth investing time in exploring the website further. They quickly calculate whether the time invested in staying on the website will provide a good return of finding what they are looking for.

The design of the website is important but tends to receive an over-weighted importance to the owner of the website. A website design should represent the company culture and the products or services. As a website is a visual medium the colour scheme should be chosen based on the target market. For example, if a website is about monster trucks then a bad colour scheme would be pastels, a flower shop should not have a black background.

The content of a website is just as important as design. Content of a website is one of the deciding factors of search engine ratings. Search engines and visitors love to find a diverse range of content on a website. However, the content should all be pertaining to the same theme.

Without navigation the Internet would not have survived. Navigation is the element of a website that helps visitors access other sections of a website. The navigation of a website is the visual representation of the content structure. The most common structure is top-down design, this allows for the most general category to be displayed as the primary navigation. The visitor then decides which element in the navigation to select that will result in them finding what they are looking for. When a general element is selected more detailed options will be presented based on that element.

So the next time you visit a website, be conscious of the three elements of design, navigation and content. Think about the design, does it match the product/ service. Is it easy to navigate around the website, does it have a search facility? Did you use it? Why did you use it and not the navigation? Did you find additional information on the website that you didn't know before? Will you return to that website?

# ENJOY YOUR BARBECUES WITH SAFE FOOD THIS SUMMER



Its that time of year again and hopefully this year we get the weather to enjoy the outdoors. Before you get excited about having a barbecue there are a few things you need to know about the safest way to cook your food. Preparation is the key to safe food, and the first thing to do is make sure your barbecue is clean and well set up. If it's a gas bbq make sure you leave the lid open while it heats up as gas can build up and cause the lid to blow, but once its hot you can start right away. With a charcoal bbq you must wait till the coals have settled down and the flames have gone, if you don't the food will burn on the outside and stay raw in the middle. The best way to make sure food like pork,

sausages, chicken and burgers are cooked through is to start them indoors and finish on the bbq. Steaks are fine as they will cook easily. The important thing to remember is that all food that has been chopped or minced must be cooked through, stick a fork in the thickest part and make sure all juices run clear. When using frozen food make sure it has thawed out fully beforehand, and if cooking for a lot of people and you all want to eat together keep the cooked food in a hot oven not on the table in the sun. Keep all salads in the fridge till you need them as bacteria can build up in the heat especially on mayonnaise, always wash your hands when going from one food to the next. Don't put cooked food onto a surface where you had raw meat unless you clean and sterilise it first, just remember its common sense most of the time and if your at a picnic bring sterilising wipes for your hands and put all packaging in the nearest bin as bacteria can transfer to your food. It might sound like a lot to do but its better then food poisoning and only takes planning. Below are tips at a glance and some tips for marinades. **Have a great summer.** 

## Tips for a Good Barbecue

- Light the barbecue well in advance, make sure its hot and flames have died down
- Make sure you wash your hands
- Thaw all frozen food, preferably in the fridge
- Keep all **food in the fridge** till needed, or cool-box if on a picnic.
- Keep raw and cooked **food separate**.
- Never put cooked food on a surface that had raw food unless it has been cleaned properly.
- **Turn food regularly** and move it round to ensure its cooked through.
- Don't use the **same marinade that raw food** has been in for other food.
- Check that the juices run clear by **piercing the thickest part.**
- With gas bbq make sure you leave the **lid open** while its heating as a build up of gas can make it blow.
- **Never use petrol** to light the bbq, only recommended fluids.
- Take care not to spill fluid anywhere.
- Keep the area clear and **don't wear loose clothes,** try a fire resistant apron.
- **Don't leave the bbq unattended at any time** especially if children are there as splashes can hurt them.
- Finally be safe and enjoy your bbq



#### Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

#### Question

My employer wants to reduce my working hours because of a decline in her business, but I have nothing in writing from her. What should I do?

#### Answer

A reduction in working hours is a change to your contract of employment. It cannot happen unless both you and your employer agree to it. You should ask your employer for details of the reduced business activity, who else has been asked to reduce their working hours and what were the criteria for selection.

You should also ask your employer to give you written details of the proposed change to your contract, including a review date. You should respond to her in writing. If you accept the change, you should stress that your acceptance is temporary. At the review date the change can be reconsidered and you can ask to return to the original terms and conditions of your contract.

If you agree to work fewer hours, you may qualify for some financial supports, depending on your circumstances. These include jobseeker payments, Family Income Supplement and Mortgage Interest/Rent Supplement.

If your hours or pay are reduced to less than half the normal weekly amount, this is called a "short-time situation". This must be a temporary situation and your employer must notify you before it starts, ideally by using Part A of form RP9. Your employer can put you on short time if it is in your contract of employment or if it is custom and practice in your workplace. Otherwise your employer should not put you on short time without your agreement. However, if you do not agree, you may be made redundant.

If the short-time situation continues for 4 weeks or more, or for 6 weeks in a period of 13 weeks, you may claim a redundancy lump sum. If you do this you are considered to have left your job voluntarily and so you will lose any right to notice or pay in lieu of notice from your employer.

#### Question

My daughter's uniform for her new school is very expensive. Can I get any payment to help with it?

#### Answer

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance (BTSCFA) is available to families on certain social welfare or other State payments to help with the costs of school clothes and footwear. You may also claim for children aged 18-22 who are in full-time education if you are on a social welfare payment that includes a Qualified Child Increase for them. The scheme runs from June to the end of September each year.

If you are getting a social welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a payment from the Health Service Executive (HSE) you are eligible for BTSCFA if your weekly income is below the following thresholds:

	Couple	Lone parent
1 child	€560	€407
2 children	€586	€433
3 children	€612	€459
4 children	€638	€485
Each additional child	€26	€26

If you are on a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or are getting a Back to Education Allowance, you are also eligible. The allowance is also available to people on employment schemes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance, Rural Social Scheme and Revenue Job Assist if their gross weekly household income is less than  $\in$ 317.43 (the threshold for keeping secondary benefits). If they do not meet this condition they can apply under the normal income limits given above.

The allowance paid is  $\in$  200 for each child aged 2-11 years before 1 October 2009 and  $\in$  305 for each child aged 12-22 years before 1 October 2009.

Application forms are available at your local health centre. Where you send the form depends on the county you live in - ask at the health centre.

#### Question

I have been working for ten years but am about to lose my job. I believe I am eligible for Jobseeker's Benefit. How do I go about applying for this payment?

#### Answer

You apply at your Social Welfare Local Office. Contact your Social Welfare Local Office to find out if you can get an appointment. (However, not all Local Offices have an appointment system.)

It is important to apply on the first day that you become unemployed because you will not get paid for the first three days of your claim. If possible, get the application form UP 1 in advance, and fill it in as far as you can. You can get this form from www.welfare.ie, from Lo-call 1890 202 325 or from your post office, Social Welfare Office or Citizens Information Centre. You will need to gather the following information and documents:

1. Your Personal Public Service Number (PPSN)	2. Proof of identity: passport or long form birth certificate, plus driver's licence; bank book, post office book or credit union book; rent book or bank card
3. The PPSNs of your spouse or partner and of your children	4. Your most recent end-of-year statement of PRSI and tax paid (P60)
5. Your P45 or a letter from your employer confirming the last day you worked	6. Proof of address: household bills, rent book or tax document
7. Proof of efforts to get work: ads you have answered, copies of applications and responses	8. Income details for yourself, your spouse or partner
9. Names and dates of birth of your dependent children	10. Letter from the school or college for any child aged over 18 and in full-time education

If you can't get all of the documents you need immediately, you should still apply for Jobseeker's Benefit, as any delay may result in your losing payment.


#### Question

Having graduated from university a year ago, I still cannot get work as I have no work experience to build on. I am living on Jobseeker's Allowance. Is there any scheme whereby I can get work experience and keep my payment?

#### Answer

You may be interested in the new Work Placement Programme being run by FÁS. This programme will provide six months' work experience for 2,000 unemployed people who have been getting

Jobseeker's Allowance for the last six months. Stream 1 of the programme has 1,000 places for graduates and Stream 2 provides 1,000 places for other unemployed people, with 250 of these places being reserved for people aged under 25. Placements will be allocated to each FAS region according to the number of people on the Live Register in that region.

The work placements will last for 6 months. While you are on the programme you will continue to get your Jobseeker's Allowance.

To be eligible for Stream 1 you must:

- Be unemployed and getting Jobseeker's Allowance for at least 6 months
- Have graduated before 2009
- Have been awarded a qualification at level 7 or higher on the National Framework of Qualifications

To be eligible for Stream 2 you must be unemployed and getting Jobseeker's Allowance for at least 6 months.

If you are interested in participating in the Work Placement Programme you should apply to your local FÁS office. FÁS will refer you to an employer who is registered as a provider with the programme. The employer may interview you as a potential participant.

Placements will be allocated on a 'first come, first served' basis



# August in the Garden

#### August in the garden

August is the month for getting the best out of your garden, with very little work you can get bigger crops of apples. With some careful summer pruning you can encourage better growth and keep your trees in shape.

#### Prune summer apple trees



- Cut back leading shoots by half to encourage growth of side shoots only pruning new seasons growth, cut just above a leaf.
- Cut back all remaining side shoots to three leaves from base of this seasons growth

#### Its time to

- Pick gooseberries when ripe. If they're still green and hard leave a bit longer
- Spray apples and gooseberries for mildew
- Lift early potatoes
- Pick mangetout, peas and beans
- Keep all fruit and veg watered
- Give shrubs and perennial a liquid feed
- Take cuttings from non-flowering shoots on hydrangeas
- Feed roses to keep them flowering
- Be vigilant for signs of lily beetle, vine weevil and other problem pests
- Watch out for ants and flush them out of containers by drenching them with water.
- Some chemical sprays work but only inside.



#### Water Feature


Water adds something special to a garden, it doesn't have to be very big so here is a pond in a pot, ideal for miniature waterlilies and other small aquatic plants. Its quick and easy and requires minimal care.

#### Here's How

- Get an old tin bath or something similar, make sure its waterproof, put some bricks around the bottom for plant level.
- Put a layer of aquatic compost into planting baskets and poison plants in them, its better to stick to two or three types.
- Fill in around the roots with more compost and press firmly. Water thoroughly to settle compost and top off with a layer of pea gravel. Do all baskets this way.
- Fill your container two-thirds with water and carefully lower the baskets in, standing them on the bricks.
- Place larger plants at the back if its against the wall or in the middle if its out in the open.
- Top up the water to about 3cms from the top and add a large stone to break the surface for birds to drink
- Now relax and enjoy your water feature.

#### Problem weeds

- Dock weed is the hardest to remove, you must remove them from the root, try spraying with total weed killer when their small.
- Stinging nettles can survive through winter, so need to be dug out as soon as they appear, if they persist use a weed killer but cut them down first.

# Things to do During These Recessionary Times

**S** am sure that if you're like me all this talk of recession is enough to drive anyone around the bend. Don't despair if you feel down or depressed because there are no jobs out there. Why not just go out there and avail of the courses that are available. While there are few opportunities, one of the better ones to try is the Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme or V.T.O.S. for short.

V.T.O.S. is a course which gives adults an opportunity to improve upon what skills they may have, or even those who have no skills at all, a way of getting back into the workforce. The course covers a wide range of topics from computers, languages, office and administration and believe it or not you can even do your Leaving Certificate in English and Maths if you so wish. You can keep all your benefits and you even get a travel allowance. The course caters for people of all ages and the rewards gained (provided you are willing to put in the effort) can be great. It is also a good way of boosting your confidence as your belief begins to grow stronger. I have just completed a two year VTOS course in Leixlip and while there were times when I found the course tough going I really enjoyed the experience and I would recommend that if you haven't done it then you should get out there and do it. It is a good way of improving ones self-esteem while at the same time making new friends. One of the reasons for my going back to education was so that it would exercise the brain as I had forgotten virtually everything that I had been taught ten years previously. I also wanted to improve on my computer skills and my typing which was very poor.

One of the subjects I chose for my second year was Desk Top Publishing. This module covers everything you want to learn about the print media. We made Birthday cards, Christmas Cards, Wedding Invitations etc. The course also included the analysis of pages on newspapers both broadsheet and tabloid. The idea of the analysis is to show you how you might approach an article and how best you might tackle it hopefully by not making similar mistakes to the ones that you spotted while doing your analysis, while you're putting it together. Everything is covered on the course and by finishing time you can even pick out printing mistakes that certain big name newspapers might make. Other subjects I studied during my second term were Text Production, Payroll, Intercultural Studies and Information and Administration.

This was my second time to do this course. No you don't get any more than two years as a V.T.O.S. student, but you can go on as a post-leaving cert student. The one thing here is that you do not qualify for any payments from the social welfare and you may need part time employment as a way of making ends meet. However if you're on a pension you could go in as a student as a way of going back into meaningful employment. Many students choose to go on to third level education where they can go on to further their education. If you feel you're particularly strong in a particular area for instance say you'd like to do database and you feel there are areas in that subject that you don't feel comfortable with why not just get down to your local V.T.O.S centre and see if they have a place available. It might just change your life. The best way of finding more information about V.T.O.S. and other courses is by contacting your local Citizens Information Service Centre.

#### Maynooth no longer in IBAL League

The latest results for the Irish Business Against Litter League released in June did not include Maynooth for the first time in four years as the town was not included in the list of centres to be judged in 2009. Maynooth, Newbridge and Athy were the County Kildare towns that were judged for the previous three years and from 2009 Naas, Leixlip and Celbridge are the three towns representing the county.

So how did Maynooth fare in the league which aims to highlight areas that have a problem with litter by rating the areas from "clean to European Norms" down to "seriously littered"?

In the first judging back in 2005 Maynooth was the 12th cleanest town out of the thirty judged. In 2006 we came second lowest and were designated as a "litter blackspot", but in 2008 the result improved so that in our last few results Maynooth was "clean to European Norms" finishing the year as the 22nd cleanest town out of the fifty- five judged.

#### Trees damaged on the Kilcock Road at NUI, Maynooth

Vandalism is something that thankfully is not prevalent in Maynooth as far as Tidy Towns is concerned. However a number of trees on the Kilcock Road planted by NUI, Maynooth were badly damaged last month necessitating in the need to remove them. It is difficult to understand the motivation for this action as the area is not a heavy pedestrian area and consequently it would seem as if somebody went out to do this intentionally. The crime is most likely recorded on the CCTV cameras in the area so a prosecution could follow.

#### Maynooth Tidy Towns acknowledge Intel Matching Grants support

As one of the groups supported for many years by staff from Intel (Ireland) under the community involvement programme we know the value of the generosity of the local Intel staff that helps us out. As part of the Intel Foundation forty years celebrations we received additional support last year as an addition to get the work done we also got funding ( $\in$ 761) for the number of hours Intel employees spent with us.

#### Sewerage Works reinstatement works should be completed this year

Maynooth Tidy Towns together with representatives of local residents in the Lyreen area and other interested organisations continue to be involved in working with Kildare County Council and the contractor to progress the completion of the restoration works for the public open spaces that were damaged as part of this contract.

#### Best Estates and Shop Front Competitions 2009

Another year is upon us and judging for these competitions run by Maynooth Tidy Towns is imminent. Remember that the judging is aimed at rewarding efforts made in the year to improve the residential areas and for the shop fronts the overall appearance of the premises is what the judges are looking at. As usual all decisions are made by an experienced independent judge on behalf of Maynooth Tidy Towns.

#### National Competition Result

As Maynooth is at a certain level in the National Tidy Towns competition we receive two visits from the judges. The final judging can take place at any time up to the 31st August. Please continue to support the efforts made to keep the town clean and tidy for another few weeks at least.

"That immediate steps be taken to clear up the dumping at the 6 boarded up vacant Council houses at Old Greenfield, Maynooth and that re-refurbishing of the 6 houses be carried out without any further delay."

John was advised that the dumped material would be removed and the other good news is that the Council have got funding to carry out Energy Efficient Works on 15 houses in the Estate. The work will involve replacing windows and doors and wall insulation. The Council will have to move residents out of the houses while the work is being carried out.

#### The Square, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley raised the following motion at the Celbridge Area Committee meeting on 10th July:

"When will proper maintenance of the cobble stones in The Square, Maynooth be carried out"?

John was given the following reply by the Area Engineer:

"Some cobbles that were loose have been taken to the Council yard and these will be replaced when the manpower is available. Where additional cobbles are missing they cannot be replaced, as there are no cobblestones in stock."

Cllr. John McGinley showed the Area Engineer photos of the shoddy workmanship that has been used to date in replacing the cobbles i.e. a bucket of cement thrown in the hole. He again asked that proper re-instatement of the cobble stones be carried out and that the Area Engineer can buy extra cobbles if there are none in stock.

#### Removal of the "bandstand"

At the meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare Co. Council held on Friday 10th July, Cllr. John McGinley again raised the removal of the Bandstand from The Green by way of Motion.

The good news is that John's persistence has paid off and that Council have issued instructions for the removal of the Bandstand. Council Officials have assured John that it will be removed before re-instatement of The Green takes place.

The Bandstand has been a persistent source of annoyance to residents and a gathering point for antisocial activity.

#### Moyglare Hall

At the meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of Kildare Co. Council held on Friday 10th July, Cllr. John McGinley raised the following motion:

"When will the Council be asking Mycete Construction to complete the footpath in Moyglare Hall, Maynooth, in line with Clause 28 of Planning Permission 02/2491 and in line with the drawings submitted?"

The Councils Planning Control Engineer, Willie Hannigan gave Cllr. McGinley the following reply:

"The plans submitted for Moyglare Hall show a pedestrian link from the estate on to the Moyglare Road adjacent to the Eircom depot. This footpath is included in the fourth and final phase of the development. The developer has until 15/08/2012 to complete this footpath.

Building Control Section has been in contact with the developer regarding the provision of this pedestrian link at the earliest possible date.

It would be premature and unsafe to provide the pedestrian link in advance of the building works in the vicinity of the pedestrian link. **However, the developer has undertaken to revise the phasing of the development to include the area around the proposed pedestrian link in the next phase of the development**.

At this point it is not possible to put a timeframe on the provision of the pedestrian link as it is dependent on the completion of the building works in the vicinity of the pedestrian link. The Area Committee will be kept informed of progress on this matter."

Cllr. McGinley made the point that it would help the developer with sales of houses/apartments if the footpath was completed and Mr. Hannigan agreed to highlight this point in his talks with the Developer.

#### **Provision of Allotments**

Cllr. McGinley has again asked the Council to provide allotments for rent on the 10 acres of Council land at Blacklion. He pointed out that this land has been lying barren for the past 30 years and the demand for allotments in Maynooth is very high.

#### STAGG PLEADS WITH HARNEY TO REVERSE CUTS IN CRUMLIN HOSPITAL

Addressing the Dail on a Fine Gael Private Members Motion seeking the reversal of cuts in Our Lady's Hospital for Sick Children in Crumlin, Deputy Emmet Stagg pleaded with the Minister for Health to find the money for the bailout of the banks and builders from somewhere other than the Budget of Our Lady's Hospital.

In his address Deputy Stagg pointed out that recently the House debated the horrific abuse of children at the hands of the religious and the State and that the House resolved that no such thing would ever be allowed to happen again. Whilst that debate was taking place, the Minister for Health was withdrawing money from the Children's Hospital, which forced the closure of wards and a life saving operating theatre. If the action is not reversed, it will cause severe suffering, prolonged pain and misery to innocent, sick children.

Pulling no punches Deputy Stagg stated that the closure of a life saving operating theatre is most likely to be the cause of children dying unnecessarily. Deputy Stagg stated that Harney had put in place a system that empowers an unaccountable quango to use taxpayers money as it sees fits. It is not only a shame or disgrace, it is a crime to allow little children to suffer unnecessary pain and misery and even avoidable death. The Minister and her Fianna Fail backers who keep her in office are responsible and Deputy Stagg stated that he would not like to have the consequences of her actions on his conscience.

Deputy Stagg then outlined the cases of two children from his own Constituency whose mothers were seriously concerned at the delay in vital procedures for their children. Both families have the fullest praise for the nurses and staff in Crumlin Hospital but the Minister`s resources limitation makes them fearful that their special children will suffer further.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that these and other children had suffered enough and he pleaded with her to find the money for the banks and builders from somewhere other than the budget for Our Lady's Hospital. If she has an ounce of human kindness, she will surely do so. If she is not mindful to heed his plea, Deputy Stagg asked that she would at least heed the pleas of the mothers of the children.

#### STAGG DISAPPOINTED AT REVISION OF NEWTOWN HALL PERMISSION GO AHEAD FROM AN BORD PLEANALA

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his disappointment at the decision by An Bord Pleanala to grant planning permission for 5 Three Storey Blocks of Apartments/Duplex Complexes comprising 89 units in lieu of previously granted planning permission for 62 houses at the rear of Newtown Hall Estate, Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg had along with his colleague Cllr. John McGinley appealed Kildare Co. Council's original decision to grant planning permission for this proposal because of the impact the building heights would have on the character of the area which comprises two storey houses and 3 three storey buildings, built under the existing permission. They felt that the creation of a line of 8 three storey blocks to the rear of the estate would have been excessive and visually obtrusive.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the present economic climate may change the developers minds about this proposal and they may yet revert to normal housing, as we have seen in a number of cases recently in Maynooth, but unfortunately that is now out of our hands.

#### TIME FOR DIRECT ACTION ON UNEMPLOYMENT AS NUMBERS SIGNING ON IN MAYNOOTH QUADRUPLES IN 2 YEARS

Following the publication of the CSO figures for those signing on at Maynooth Labour Exchange at the end of June, 2009, which shows a quadrupling of those on the live register from 1,519 in May 2007, to 5,982 people at the end of June, 2009, Deputy Emmet Stagg has reiterated his call for the Government to invest in job protection and creation as the best way of stimulating the Economy from its present crisis.

There are now more people signing on in the Maynooth Labour Exchange, 5982 people, than there were unemployed in the whole of Kildare in May 2007 when the number of people unemployed stood at 5,411 people, stated Deputy Stagg.

Since the Economic crisis eventually dawned on this Government they have bailed out the bankers with taxpayers money and have imposed stringent measures to try and bring our Public Finances into line, but stated Deputy Stagg they have failed miserably to bring about a comprehensive job protection and creation policy. This is a shocking indictment of their narrow minded focus. The Labour Party has proposed the following measures to help Job Protection and Job Creation:

• The establishment of a National Investment Bank to invest in our own future and help create and protect jobs by ensuring access to credit for small business.

• A major school building programme to take 40,000 children out of prefabs and put them into proper classrooms.

• Increase Investment in the National House Insulation Programme.

• Getting rid of the Red Tape attached to Grants for businesses seeking to start news businesses or expand existing ones.

• Renationalisation of Eircom to provide a suitable vehicle for immediate roll out of Broadband Nationwide.

• Measures, including tax breaks, to assist employers to retain workers in employment and to take people off the live register.

Significant investment in education and training places for those losing jobs and those going straight from school into unemployment.



#### Kildare holidaymakers to enjoy cheaper mobile calls - Fitzpatrick

Kildare people heading for holiday resorts in Europe can now enjoy cheaper mobile phone calls and texts thanks to the EU, according to local Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"The introduction of cheaper roaming charges from July 1st is just one of several initiatives which the EU has brought in to make holidaying and travelling across the continent cheaper from Kildare."

"From this week the cost of text messages has been cut from 29 cent in some cases to just 13 cent. Phone calls are being reduced to 43 cent a minute when making a call and 19 cent a minute when receiving a call. In addition the EU is committed to cutting costs even further within the next two years."

"Kildare families heading for Spain, Greece, Italy and other European hotspots over the coming weeks already enjoy a number of benefits because of Ireland's membership of the EU:

The Euro – the cost and burden of Foreign Exchange is gone for most travel within the EU Medical Cover – when in another EU States we have the same access to emergency treatment as any local person

Cheap Flights- EU competition rules have paved the way for big decreases in the cost of air fares

"These benefits are not only good for holidaymakers, but there are also good for business across Europe and jobs in Kildare."

"Following on the success of tackling mobile phone charges the EU has now turned its attention to the problem of the wide range of mobile phone chargers on the market. The Union has reached an understanding with 10 mobile phone manufacturers to develop a single charger for Europe."

"Ahead of the Autumn Referendum on Lisbon there will be much debate on our future role in Europe, I will be remaining in close contact with my colleague the Minister for Foreign Affairs Micheál Martin to ensure we have access to the facts before voting," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

## Lisbon Treaty would copper-fasten Neo-liberalism

There are three aspects to Neo-liberalism: an ideology; a set of institutions; set of policies. The latter are written into the Lisbon Treaty/EU Constitution. From 1980 Neo-liberalism was a dominant ideological force until it unravelled in 2007 with the onset of the current international financial crisis. In other words, the EU is seeking to enshrine Neo-liberalism into its institutions at time when this range of economic policies has been shown to have failed.

Neo-Liberalism is essentially

Liberalisation: tearing down all trade barriers, which leads to the dominance of powerful multi-national corporations

Privatisation: turning more of the economy into profitmaking bodies

Price Stabilisation: very afraid of inflation. If wealth is held in large pools of money, then inflation is the big danger. Hence financial interests are more powerful in the neoliberal context. The driving down of prices brings with it unemployment, which naturally impacts on working people.

Each of these tenets of neo-liberalism is to be found in the Lisbon Treaty and its fundamental commitment to crude market forces is contained in Article 120:

The Member States and the Union shall act in accordance with the principle of an open market economy with free competition, favouring an efficient allocation of resources...

This highlights that the ethos neo-liberalism is at the heart of the treaty and represents an extreme version of unbridled capitalism. It is undiluted in its formulation.

### Liberalization of trade and finance

Foundations are laid for globalised trade and investment in Article 206:

The Union shall contribute, in the common interest, to the harmonious development of world trade, the progressive abolition of restrictions on international trade and on foreign direct investment, and the lowering of customs and other barriers."

This article goes further than the World Trade Organisation's (WTO) agreements on fair trade between countries, and it goes way beyond the conservative consensus. The foundations of financial globalisation are contained within the treaty. Article 63 bans measures by nation states to protect their vital interests:

"All restriction on the movement of capital between member states and between member states and third countries shall be prohibited"

### Privatisation of state companies and public services

Everything is to be subject to the mantra of competition. Article 106 states:

Undertakings entrusted with the operation of services of general economic interest or having the character of a revenue-producing monopoly shall be subject to the rules contained in the Treaties, in particular to the rules on competition...

In line with this, the ESB was recently forced to put up its prices to make it worthwhile for private enterprise to "compete" and prepare this essential national company for early privatisation. Moreover, this Article provides for services, such as public ambulance services, to levy fees and, we could therefore see the creation of private ambulance services.

Public companies are denied state aid. – *Aer Lingus for example* 

### **Price stabilization**

Article 127 of Lisbon states:

The primary objective of the European System of Central Banks (hereinafter referred to as 'the ESCB') shall be to maintain price stability

This is in stark contrast to President Obama's policies. The US Federal Reserve Bank is charged with maintaining price stability *and employment. Again the Lisbon Treaty is to the right of conservative consensus.* 

Crucially, The European Central Bank is not accountable to democratic control. Article 130 states:

the European Central Bank, nor a national central bank, nor any member of their decision-making bodies shall seek or take instructions from Union institutions, bodies, offices or agencies, from any government of a Member State or from any other body.

Neo-liberalism is opposed to state or democratic influence in the markets. Accordingly, Article 130 highlights the democratic deficit within the EU and Lisbon Treaty.

In order to address the economic crisis, it is vital that nation states regulate the financial sector. The Lisbon Treaty either prohibits this or deems it unwelcome.

Furthermore, it has become necessary to have a stimulus package against unemployment through coordinated Govt spending. This is not facilitated in this treaty. Lisbon is a creature of a discredited and bankrupt ideology.

# Brady urges eligible Parents to apply now for Back to School Clothing & Footwear Allowance

Over 140,000 families nationally with school-going children are expected to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance this summer, according to local TD and Minister of State at the Department of Health Aine Brady T.D.

'This scheme will see parents being assisted with the back to school costs through payments of €200 or €305 depending on the age of their children.' Stated Minister Brady.

"Probably the furthest thing from most parents' minds this week is the start of the new school year. But we know that families always find this a pressurised time financially, so I would urge them now to take the time to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance, as it can take 6-8 weeks to process applications and receive payment."

Minister Brady said in the changes introduced in the Budget this year **"means that an estimated 18,000** more families will benefit as the income thresholds for entitlement to the scheme were increased by €50." This brings the income limits for the allowance for parents with one child to €560 for couples and €407 for those parenting alone.

Another special measure which was introduced in the Budget was an additional allowance of €215 payable to 18 year olds in full time education for whom, the half rate Child Benefit is now applied. Total back to school payment in respects of children aged 18 is €520.

The scheme is administered on behalf of the Department by the Community Welfare Division of the Health Service Executive, with staff in place now to deal with claims. A person may qualify for payment of an allowance if they are in receipt of a Social Welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement), or Health Service Executive payment, are participating in an approved employment scheme or attending a recognised education and training course and have household income at or below certain set levels. Minister Hanafin said "the purpose of the household income limit is to ensure that the allowance is directed at those with the greatest need."

### Statement by Áine Brady TD - N4 Leixlip to M50 Road Scheme

Local TD and Minister of State Aine Brady has welcomed the opening of the upgrade Dual Carriageway between Leixlip and the M50 on the N4, a project that was on time and on Budget. Minister Brady made her comment after attending the opening of the Road on Monday 6th July.

'The €75m upgrade of the 7 Km Dual Carriage will bring benefits to both Bus and Car Commuters, with reduced travels, increased road safety and improved driver comfort. I understand that travel time is reduced by upto 30 minutes in peak times as a result of this upgrade. Bus Companies should also see improved efficiencies as a result of the works.'

'The project involved the upgrade of the Interchange at Newcastle / Lucan eliminating a major bottleneck, widening the lanes from a 2 lane to a 3 lane Dual Carriage and providing a Bus Lane.'

'Commuters effectively now have free flow access to the M50, Dublin Airport and the N11. The M50 upgrade works are progressing, increasing the capacity of the orbital route with the provision of an extra lane and providing a free flow interchange with the M3, and M1. These works will be completed by the end of 2010, providing further relief for our commuters.'

'These works, when fully completed, will also ensure that our goods and services will have easier access to Dublin Port and Dublin Airport, thus assisting Kildare businesses to compete. In recent years, we have seen significant improvement to our road network and the Government is committed to further improvements.'

'I am conscious that we now must focus on having a free flow interchange at Newlands Cross to reduce travel times for Commuters using the N7 from Naas, Clane, Celbridge area. I have made representations to have this work commence as soon as possible.' concluded Minister Brady.

# Brady urges Public to make submission to Local Area Plans

Local TD, and Minister of State, at the Department of Health and Children, Aine Brady, has urged residents, community groups and business organisations to make submissions to the Local Area Plans for Leixlip, Celbridge and Collinstown which are now on view. 'The Celbridge, Leixlip and Collinstown Local Area Plans are now on public display at the Celbridge Library (Celbridge Plan), Leixlip Library, Captain's Hill and the Town Clerk's Office in Newtown House (Leixlip and Collinstown). They can also be viewed on Kildare County Council's website <u>www.kildare.ie/</u> <u>countycouncil</u> or in their office at Aras Cill Dara, Naas.'

'It is important that local people have a say and shape the future of the community they live in. Previously Area Plans have concentrated too much on residential development and did not give adequate thought to Community Facilities, including Youth Cafes.'

'We must use this as an opportunity to retro fit the Community, Public Transport and Youth Facilities that the Council did not cater for in previous plans. While significant progress has been made in recent times with regard to Car Parking at Celbridge's Hazel Hatch and at Louisa Bridge Rail Stations, Car Parking at Confey Rail Station should be addressed in these plans.'

'Since getting elected, I have fought hard to maintain and improve our current Bus Service for Leixlip and Celbridge areas. However, previous plans did not make adequate provision for Buses to service some newly populated areas, by not providing for Bus Turning Circles or Bus Bays. I have made representations to Iarnrod Eireann and Dublin Bus to engage with Kildare Co Co in relation to public transport infrastructure.'

'Local Area Plans, must also focus on how we can nurture local businesses and make them more competitive. The Celbridge, Collinstown and Leixlip area is home to Large Multinational IT Companies and we should use this as an opportunity to designate the area as an IT Hub with a view to attracting further inward investment.'

'We cannot change the past, but we can shape the future of the area and I urge as many residents as possible to view the respective plans and make submissions. Submissions or observations in writing should be marked 'Celbridge Local Area Plan' or 'Leixlip Local Area Plan' or 'Collinstown Local Area Plan' and addressed to Mary Foley Administrative Officer, Forward Planning, Kildare County Council, Aras Chill Dara, Naas, Co. ### Three Local Schools to benefit from Broadband Investment says Brady

Local Minister of State, Áine Brady TD, has stated that three local post primary schools in North Kildare will benefit from the Governments investment in Broadband Infrastruicture, as these schools will be equipped with a 100 Mbits per second of Broadband connectivity.

'Maynooth Post Primary School, Salesian College in Celbridge and the Convent of Mercy on the Sallins Road, Naas will all be included in the 100mpbs Post Primary Schools Project, which will deliver high-speed broadband connectivity to these schools. It is part of an investment of some  $\in$ 16 million nationally for up to 80 schools taking part in the Project throughout the country.'

'Under the existing Schools Broadband Programme, primary and post-primary schools in Ireland can access a basic level of broadband connectivity. This 100mpbs Post Primary Schools Project marks the next phase in the Government's target to develop our schools as world-class centres of e-learning. It also in line with the Next Generation Broadband Strategy which was published this week.'

'Providing our schools with high-speed wireless connectivity opens up a whole new world of learning for our children. We are taking online learning out of the confines of the computer room. In classrooms and corridors, students and teachers will potentially be able to carry out interactive chemistry experiments and access demonstrations and exhibitions from all over the world.

'A class learning French in Dublin could talk in real time with a class in France. A Leaving Cert Physics student will be able to take part in Ivy League lectures and experiments. With this level of connectivity, the opportunities for interaction and collaboration are unlimited." concluded Minister Brady.

### Minister Brady launches Consultation Phase of National Positive Ageing Strategy

The Minister for Older People and Health Promotion, Áine Brady TD, will tomorrow (Thursday, 18th June, 2009) launch the consultation phase of the National Positive Ageing Strategy. The Minister said that the new Strategy will set the strategic direction for all future policies, programmes and services for older people in Ireland. She is seeking written submissions from individuals (of any age), institutions, agencies, organisations and groups by 24 September.

The preparation of the Strategy takes forward the commitment in the *Programme for Government 2007–2012* to better recognise the position of older people in Irish society, and the Minister said that it will be informed by the UN Principles on Ageing: Independence, Dignity, Self-Fulfillment, Participation and Care.

She indicated that issues relevant to the development of the Strategy include those relating to older people's participation in society, the way services are organised and are used by older people; income, health and social care, housing, transport, education and employment.

The Minister emphasised that the Strategy must be developed within the constraints posed by the present fiscal situation. "It is not the intention that the Strategy will propose new service developments; rather it will set the strategic direction for future policies, programmes and services for older people," she stressed.

Minister Brady said that she looked forward to having as many views as possible to inform the development of the new Strategy. She said that she particularly wanted to hear from older people on how they use services and how those services are organised.

The Minister pointed out that this is the first time that such a wide-ranging strategy will be prepared here. Previous plans have predominantly focussed on health and care services whereas this Strategy will ultimately lead to operational plans by a range of Government Departments. She added that as well as her own Office, ten other Government Departments and the Central Statistics Office are involved in preparing the Strategy.

### Closing date for receipt of submissions: Thursday, 24 September, 2009. Home Energy Saving Scheme still open for Business says Brady 17th June 2009

The Minister of State at the Department of Health, Áine Brady TD, stated this week that funding is still available to homeowners under the Home Energy Saving Scheme for a range of measures to make homes more energy efficient.

'To-date, 352 Home Owners in Kildare have availed of grants under the scheme. Nationally, it has proven to be a very popular scheme with over €16 million in insulation grants being paid to approximately 12,000 homes.'

'While Kildare has many newly constructed home, there still is a large proportion of older homes which are less energy efficient and would benefit from reducing the heat loss by installing any one of a range of measures including roof and cavity wall insulation, heating control upgrades as well as high efficiency boiler upgrades among others.' stated Minister Brady.

'This Energy Scheme offers grants of up to **40% of the typical cost** of energy efficiency upgrade measures. Homeowners who avail of the full range of measures can expect to save approximately €700 **per annum**. Owners of homes built **prior to 2006** can now apply online at <u>www.sei.ie/hes</u> or contact Sustainable Energy Ireland on **1 850 927000**. I would encourage Kildare Home owners to check the scheme out.' concluded Minister Brady.

# Local University must play key role in Job retention and Job creation says Brady

NUI Maynooth must play a key role in retaining the jobs we have in Kildare and also act as a stimulus for further job creation according to local TD and Minister Áine Brady who organised a meeting between, recently appointed Minister with responsibility for Innovation, Conor Lenihan TD and the College Authorities.

'Recently, following my request, the Minister of State at the Department of Enterprise with responsibility for Innovation met with the College so that he and his Department were briefed on the work that is on-going in the area of Innovation and Commercialisation of Research at the College and its developing links with Industry. A knowledge provider like NUI Maynooth, will be key to attracting further inward investment to the area and maintaining existing jobs by fostering Innovation and ensuring that the University's research strategy is relevant to Industry.' stated Minister Brady.

'The University is now working very closely with Industry. Last year the college signed over 18 research collaborations with various companies, giving a total of 50 ongoing research contracts with industry. Their partnership with Intel, for example, involves the provision of a Masters in Engineering programme for all senior Intel engineers throughout the world. Commercialisation is taken very seriously at NUI Maynooth and they in recent years have broken down barriers to facilitate an almost seamless working relationship with Industry.' stated Minister Brady.

' NUI Maynooth are opening their doors to showcase how they can work with both the SME sector and the larger multinational enterprises, to their mutual benefit.'

'Grants of €5,000 to €500,000 from Enterprise Ireland are now available to companies that wish to develop and commercialise Research ideas with academic experts at universities like NUI Maynooth. Following recent budgets, significant tax breaks are available for companies investing further in research and development. In 2008 alone NUI Maynooth completed six license deals with businesses and helped 'spin out' one brand new company from its campus – Socowave – which now employs ten people.' stated Minister Brady.

'The twinning of industry with academia will be the foundation of the future success of the Irish, and indeed Kildare's, economy. Strategic research partnerships between industry and academia can stimulate innovation, create high quality employment and deliver a competitive advantage to our industry.'

'I am committed to working with all the relevant stakeholders in improving the college's links with, not alone Industry, but also the local community in Kildare. The college must not alone be seen as a traditional educator but also as a valuable resource for Kildare - for our community and for our Enterprises' concluded Minister Brady.

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
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
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
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# **Editorial-September**

The schools will be returning as this *Newsletter* goes to print and the College will also be welcoming its new first year students as well as the returning body of students. There is still no canteen after the disastrous fire that gutted the previous one and this will be a cause for concern for all those attending the University. There will be a greater increase in student numbers again this year and there are incentives for more mature students to return to education due to the economic downturn.

Maynooth is a relatively quiet town during the summer months and it will be a shock to the system, and the traffic, when the thousands of students return to us in September. With this will return all the parking and traffic problems that the town experiences during the School/College year. There is a growing pressure for parking spaces in the town for commuters using the train and for residents trying to shop locally apart from the problem of the College cars spilling onto the Kilcock Road.

In our neighbouring county of Meath, a new scandal has emerged concerning the ill-fated M3 at Tara. Despite campaigners efforts to bring to the public's attention that the M3 would be tolled twice, before reaching the M50, this has not made headlines until this week when both the Irish Independent and the Meath Chronicle ran articles on the issue. The scandal is that the NRA and the Government have done a deal with the contractors of the motorway, Eurolink, to ensure that they will not lose money on the tolls. If the traffic volumes do not reach the expected levels then the Government, that is the tax payer, us, will have to compensate the toll company. This 'sweetheart deal' is a new one in the context of Public Private Partnerships, so far as we know. It does not apply to the M4/M6 for example where the arrangement is the opposite – that the toll company will compensate the Government (us) if the traffic figures exceed what is expected.

This may not seem relevant to those of us in Maynooth, Kildare but it is. Why would anyone who has to commute to Dublin live in Meath when they can live in Kildare, particularly North Kildare? We are serviced by a decent public transport system, both bus and rail. We may moan about it but there is no denying that it exists. If the deal with Eurolink is to follow its logical conclusion then the railway line to Navan, planned to open in 2015, becomes more difficult. Why put a railway line in competition with a motorway that seems likely not to reach the expected traffic volumes. Couple this with Noel Dempsey's advice, Primetime programme, March 2005 prior to the byelection, that people use the old N3 to avoid the tolls and one must wonder why the M3 was necessary in the first place. Meath commuters will continue to drive to Maynooth to use our car-parking spaces, our trains and buses. And the country will be paying for the shortfall in tolls

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# First Day of School

T he first day at school is certainly a big event in the life of a young child but it can be an even bigger event in the lives of their parents!

When your child starts school everything changes and it is normal to have a range of feelings such as excitement that your child is making a big step towards growing up as well as a sense of loss that he/ she is moving away from you towards independence. Most parents also feel a little anxious and worried about what to expect and about how their child will cope without them, particularly if they are going through the experience for the first time.

As a parent, the most important thing you can do to ensure the transition goes well is to take time to prepare yourself and your child so that you feel confident and relaxed about the first day.

### Preparing your child

• Talk to your child about starting school well in advance. If you are feeling anxious, try not to let your child see it. Rather, be positive and matter of fact about what you say – starting school is just another happy event in his/her life, which will give him / her opportunities to play with new children and to learn new things.

• Books about children starting school are a great way of preparing children for the school experience.

• During the summer take a trip with your child to the school building to see he/she knows exactly where he/she will be going.

• The experience of mixing with other children in a structured setting such as a preschool, crèche or playgroup will really help your child settle into school more easily. If you haven't done so already, try and enrol your child in such a group, even for an hour or two a day, so that they get used to being separated from you for a little while and learn to enjoy the company of other children.

• For a few weeks prior to school, it is also helpful to get into a 'school like' routine. For example, rising a little earlier and even introducing a regular table activity, such as drawing in the mornings, so your child is beginning to get used to a set routine.

• Work with the school. Schools usually have very good procedures about helping children settle into the first day. They often have an introductory session for parents and children to come down to see the school and a special routine for the children on the first day. Find out what your school plans to do – remember they are used to supporting the parents as much as the children on the first day of school!

### Easing first day anxiety

Make sure you have all the practical preparations done the day before so that you have time in the morning to be there for your child. Most children are very excited on the first day of school, but if your child is anxious, gently reassure him/her about meeting new friends and doing new things and remind him/her that you will be back at lunchtime.

When leaving your child at the school, follow the teachers lead about when to leave and don't linger too much - a kiss and a wave good bye is usually enough, reminding your child that you will be back soon. Remember that though some children appear a little distressed, most settle really quickly once the parent is gone.

After school do not have too much planned as your children is likely to be tired (especially for the first few days) as they adjust to the new routine. Have some playtime with them, take an interest in what happened in school and give them space to chat, but don't pressure them to say too much.

### Settling into the school routine

Going to school everyday is a big change for children and a routine that can take some time to adjust to. Though some children might handle the first day and even the first week very well, sometimes problems emerge in the second or third week. The novelty of going to school has worn off or the child is feeling tired or unsure about going. At these times, it is important to be gently reassuring, focusing on the good things in school but to gently insist they go to school.

Set up time after school to chat and listen to your child so you can see if there is any particular reason for their reluctance. Also, make sure they have a relaxed routine in the evenings and are getting enough sleep, as simple tiredness from the emotional demands of school is often the issue. Finally, if problems persist, talk to the teacher to see what you can do together to help your child settle. Generally, most of these initial hiccups pass and children settle into a good school routine.

## Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

### Question

How do I get a higher education grant? How much is it worth?

### Answer

The Higher Education Grants Scheme provides means-tested grants to eligible students on approved courses. It is administered by the local authorities. You can download the application form from www.studentfinance.ie or get it from your local authority. For the academic year 2009/10 the application should be submitted to your local authority by 31 August 2009.

The scheme is also available to students who are attending full-time undergraduate courses of at least two years' duration in publicly funded third-level institutions in other EU member states, with certain exceptions.

Eligibility is based on income for the tax year 2008. The family income limits for 2009/10 were not yet available at time of writing – see www.studentfinance.ie for updates. The limits for 2008/9 are below.

The limits are increased by a further  $\in$ 4,815 where there are two family members in full-time third-level education, and a further  $\in$ 4,815 for each additional person.

The maintenance grant rates for 2009 are as follows:

The adjacent rate is paid if you normally live 24 km or less from your college. Mature students will receive the non-adjacent rate in all cases.

There are special rates of maintenance grants for disadvantaged students:  $\in$ 6,690 (non-adjacent) and  $\in$ 2,680 (adjacent). The income limit for 2008/9 is  $\in$ 20,147. There is also a Fund for Students with Disabilities – see www.studentfinance.ie for details.

### Question

I am a widow in my late seventies and find it hard to get to the bank. I want to put my son's name on my bank accounts so that he can get money out for me. Will this affect my entitlement to a DIRT refund or my son's tax liability?

### Answer

Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT) is deducted at source from interest paid on deposits held by banks, building societies, credit unions and the Post Office Savings Bank.

You can claim a refund of DIRT if you are aged 65 or over during the year and if your gross income from all sources is less than  $\in$ 20,000 (or  $\in$ 40,000 for a married couple).

In general, joint accounts where one of the account holders is aged 65 or over will only qualify for the refund of DIRT where the other account holder is that person's spouse. However, if you appoint your son as an agent to operate your bank accounts on your behalf, and if he is named as an account holder for this purpose only, you will continue to qualify for the refund provided that your beneficial ownership of the accounts is not affected.

When making the DIRT refund claim to Revenue, you should include a declaration that you are beneficially entitled to all of the interest paid in respect of your bank deposits.

Your son's tax liability is not affected, as he is operating solely as your agent and will not have any beneficial ownership of the money.

### Question

A neighbour's mother died recently. She was getting an Invalidity Pension and my neighbour believes he can continue to collect the pension for 6 weeks. Is this right?

### Answer

This is a common misunderstanding. The only person who could claim the six weeks' payment after the death of he pensioner would be the spouse or partner of the deceased person, and then only if the deceased person had been getting a payment (Increase for a Qualified Adult) for the partner or spouse.

If there is a spouse or partner in this position, they should contact the appropriate section within the Department of Social and Family Affairs as soon as possible following the death. The section to contact depends on the type of payment the deceased person received. For Invalidity Pension, it would be the Social Welfare Services Office, Government Buildings, Ballinalee Road, Longford.

They should enclose the death certificate (if available) or a death notice from a newspaper with the application, as well as the payment book(s) or any related cheque(s). They should not cash any existing cheques or vouchers from the pension book. When the Department has received these documents, it will issue a cheque for the amount of the six weeks' payment.

However, if your neighbour was getting Carer's Allowance or Carer's Benefit in respect of his mother, he will continue to get this payment for 6 weeks after her death. He will have to notify the Department of the death. The address for Carer's Allowance and Carer's Benefit is also Social Welfare Services Office, Government Buildings, Ballinalee Road, Longford.

### Question

After almost a year on Jobseeker's Allowance, I want to upskill in order to improve my chances of getting a job. Are there any part-time college courses available, and is there any financial support for someone in my situation?

### Answer

An extra 2,500 part-time third-level places for unemployed people were announced in the Supplementary Budget of April 2009. This scheme will start in September 2009 and provide 1,500 places on undergraduate courses and 1,000 places on postgraduate courses. The courses will focus on getting people back to work by upskilling or reskilling them to meet the needs of exporting sectors such as medical devices, biopharmaceuticals, international financial services and the food sector.

The undergraduate places will be on a range of certificate and degree courses leading to qualifications at levels 6, 7 and 8 on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ). These levels cover Advanced and Higher Certificates, Bachelor degrees and Higher (*Continued on page 6*)

Diplomas. The places are intended mainly for people with level 4, 5 or 6 qualifications. The places for graduates will be for part-time postgraduate diplomas or conversion courses.

To qualify for a place on one of these courses you must have been getting Jobseeker's Benefit (JB) or Jobseeker's Allowance (JA) for six months on 1 September 2009. You may be able to keep your JB or JA under the Part-time Option of the Back to Education Programme. The Part-time Option scheme requires that you must continue to be available for and genuinely seeking work. This requirement to be available for work takes precedence over course attendance in cases where there is a conflict between the two.

As these are part-time courses, you will not be eligible for a third-level education maintenance grant or the Back to Education Allowance. There are no tuition fees for the courses, but postgraduate students may have to pay a nominal charge.

Details of the courses and how to apply should be available from your local FÁS and social welfare offices from late July 2009. The courses will start in September and October 2009.


**Be heavy handed:** this isn't a sports massage. Apply your first layer with light, even circular motions. You can always go back and apply another layer if you want to go darker.

# **PROFESSOR JOHN SWEENEY**

Prof John Sweeney of NUI Maynooth, Chosen as the new President of An Taisce

RELAND'S LEADING expert on climate change, Prof John Sweeney of NUI Maynooth, has been chosen as the new president of An Taisce in succession to botanist and broadcaster Éanna Ní Lamhna.

Scottish-born Prof Sweeney is a member of the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which was jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007 along with former US vice-president Al Gore.

He has been a lecturer at the geography department of NUI Maynooth since 1978, specializing in climatology and environmental resource management, and currently leads a number of research projects examining various aspects of climate change in Ireland.

His most recent report for the Environmental Protection Agency, prepared by the Irish Climate Analysis and Research Units at NUI Maynooth, projected that temperatures in Ireland will increase by more than two degrees by the end of the century with significant changes in rainfall.



A graduate of the University of Glasgow, where he was awarded a PhD in 1980, Prof Sweeney has taught and carried out research at universities in North America and Africa. He has also been involved in curriculum development at second and third levels.

Over the past 30 years he has published some 60 scientific papers, edited or co-authored four reports on the likely impacts of climate change here and served as a contributing author and editor of the IPCC's influential Fourth Assessment, published in 2007.

An Taisce's national chairman, Charles Stanley-Smith, said Prof Sweeney "brings a deep appreciation of the human and social impact that the changes will bring and indeed introduced revolutionary concepts of integrated spatial planning as part of the response".

"Climate change will be the greatest challenge to both our natural and built heritage and to our future survival. Every issue that An Taisce will approach in future will have climate change at its core. John's knowledge and high public profile will be invaluable to us."



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# September in the Garden

# F lower Garden

Add plants for autumn interest. Create a striking feature in your borders by using some plants that look good during the autumn months. One of the best plants to choose is Sedum spectabile 'Brilliant' which produces masses of flat, bright pink flower-heads on upright stems with succulent, glaucous leaves. Grow sedums in full sun in a well-drained soil and divide every few years to improve flowering. Other plants which are also good at this time of year include **Ornamental Grasses, Heleniums** and **Perennial Asters, Michaelmas daisies**.

# Plan for Spring

Plant up patio pots or borders with **Erysimum**, more commonly known as **Wallflowers**, for a cheery spring show. Although they can be grown on their own, try planting tall-growing Tulip bulbs in a contrasting colour first and planting the Wallflowers over the top. The Tulips will then grow up through them to provide an extra layer of height and colour.

# Deadheading

Deadhead **Roses** as the blooms fade, cutting off the flowers just above the uppermost leaf on the stem. Trim back **Lavender** bushes after flowering to remove the old blooms and shoot tips, taking care not to cut back too heavily into any old wood. Removing faded flowers from perennials and annual plants will also ensure a continued display of blooms.

# ttend to bedding

Give bedding displays, hanging baskets and pots a little attention to ensure their display lasts well into autumn. Pick over plants twice a week to remove any faded blooms, keep watering daily and control pests when you find them. Any tender plants you want to save for next year can also be potted this month, so they are established and ready to bring under cover when the weather turns cooler.

# Support Perennials

Put plant supports around tall, late-flowering perennials to prevent them from being damaged by autumn winds. Create your own plant support.

# G reenfly checks

Look out for greenfly on winter-flowering pansies and other plants. Treat with a suitable insecticide.

# H ardwood stem cuttings

Take stem cuttings of roses in early September by pushing cut stems straight into the soil in a nursery area of the garden, where they can be left to root and develop for about a year. Most types of rose can be propagated from cuttings, especially the rambling types. Just take a length of stem, removing the soft tip above a leaf joint, and cut below a joint at the base, removing all but the top three leaves. Then push the 30cm (12in) cutting into the soil to about half its length.

# **G**^{ladioli}

Enjoy gladioli spikes in the garden or cut them for displays in the house. Spray plants with a suitable insecticide if **thrips start to be a nuisance**. When flowering is over, the corms can be lifted, cleaned, labelled and stored carefully for planting out again next spring.

# Lilies

Buy Lily bulbs as soon as you find them for sale and plant them straight away. Propagate Asiatic lilies, such as Lilium 'Angela North', L. 'Ariadne' and L.'Enchantment' by picking the small bulbils from their leaf joints and growing them on.

# Vegetables (September - October)

Choose the mild weather curing this period to plant or transplant the following: beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, lettuce, mustard, onions, radishes, spinach and turnips. Plant your second planting of fall crops such as collards, turnips, cabbage, mustard and kale.

Refurbish mulch to control weeds, and start adding leaves and other materials for the compost pile. Store your manure under cover to prevent leaching of nutrients.

Water deeply and thoroughly to prevent drought stress. Pay special attention to new transplants. Harvest mature green peppers and tomatoes before frost gets them -- it may not come until November, but be ready.

Harvest herbs and dry them in a cool, dry place.

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# Simple Recipes for September

# C hilli Con Carne

## Ingredients;

- 1lb/450g of minced beef/lamb
- 1 onion, finely chopped carrots, peas, peppers, mushrooms etc
- 1/2 tin tomatoes
- 1 beef cube
- 1 teaspoon chilli powder
- 2 dessertspoons tomato sauce
- 1 clove of garlic (crushed)
- 1/2 tin of kidney beans or 1 tin of baked beans
- 1 dessertspoon of flour

## Method

Chop onion and garlic.

Dissolve beef cube in a 1/4 pt/150ml of boiling water. Put minced beef/lamb in dry frying pan. There is sufficient fat in mince for frying. Cook for 20-25 minutes over a low heat until well browned, stirring all the time.

Add onions and garlic to the pan and cook for 2 to 3 minutes. Sprinkle on the flour and chilli powder and cook for 1-2 minutes, stirring all the time.

Add beef stock, tomato sauce and tinned tomatoes. Bring to the boil.

Add kidney beans/baked beans to mince. Simmer for 20 minutes.

# **B** eef Casserole

## Ingredients

- 11/2 lb / 675g round beef steak/rib steak
- 1 dessertspoon cooking oil
- 1 large onion, peeled and chopped
- 1oz / 25g corn-flour
- 7 mushrooms, sliced
- 3 carrots, sliced
- pinch of salt & Pepper
- 1 pt/575ml beef stock (2 stock cubes dissolved in 1pt/575ml of warm water)
- 1 tablespoon tomato puree

## Method

Pre-heat the oven to 170°C / 325°F / Gas Mark 3. Trim the beef and cut it into thin strips about 2 inches in length.

Heat the oil and fry the chopped onion, mushrooms and carrots for 2-3 minutes. Place in casserole dish. Fry the beef strips until brown. Place in the casserole dish. Mix the corn-flour with the juice in the pan and cook for 2-3 minutes.

Remove from heat and stir in the stock.

Bring to the boil, add the tomato puree, salt and pepper.

Add to the casserole dish and cook for 11/2 hours.

# F^ramily Shepherd's Pie

## **Ingredients:**

- 900g/2lb potatoes, peeled and diced
- 300g/10oz carrots, peeled and sliced
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil
- 100g/4oz onion, peeled and chopped
- 450g/1lb lean minced beef or lamb
- 1 tin tomatoes chopped.

### Method

Cook the potatoes and carrots in boiling water and until tender (about 20 minutes).

Meanwhile heat the vegetable oil in a small saucepan and sauté the onion until softened.

Add the minced meat to the onion and sauté, stirring occasionally, until browned all over.

Add the tinned tomatoes. Cover, bring to the boil and then simmer for about 20 minutes.

When the potatoes and carrots are cooked, drain them and return to the saucepan and mash until smooth. Spoon the carrot and potato mixture on top of the minced meat mixture and bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes, until the top starts to brown. **Suitable for freezing.** 

# For best flavour and texture, don't freeze the following foods:

Milk products: they'll curdle.

Boiled eggs: the whites get watery.

Custards: they'll lose texture, get lumpy.

Mayonnaise: it may separate.

**Fresh tomatoes:** their high water content causes them to collapse when thawed.

**Fresh Strawberries**: they also have a high water content and go mushy when thawed.



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## The Dangers Associated with Smoking 🐘

Possibly one of the best things to happen during the Celtic Tiger Economy I think was legislation which made it illegal for people to smoke in public places be it in the workplace or any other public place and that includes on buses, trains and aeroplanes if you pardon the pun. Other chemicals containing deadly toxins used in the production of cigarettes are "Methanol- a fuel used by the aviation industry,* 

### Polonium 210 - a radioactive element used in the making of nuclear weapons and an atomic heat source and finally Formeldehyde- which causes cancer and can damage your Skin, Lungs and Digestive System. Embalmers use it in preserving dead bodies. There are other deadly chemicals but the above named is just a taste of the many deadly components used in the manufacture of cigarettes.

The chances of contracting cancer through smoking increases as you get older and is significantly higher among middle aged men and women. And it doesn't just apply to older people, even children can be affected as a result of what's called passive smoking. Problems such as asthma, emphysema and other chest infections can be caught as a result of the dreaded cigarette or as it is often more commonly called "the cancer stick."

According to statistics carried out worldwide a person dies every 6.5 seconds through the effects of cigarette smoking. **That means that 1.5 million people die needlessly every year** through the effects of cigarette smoking which is a frightening thought.

# Seven thousand people die in this country yearly from smoke related illnesses and thousands more are affected either one way or another through chest related illnesses brought about by smoking.

Because of the health risks associated with smoking it can speed up the aging process. As a person gets older smokers are likely to suffer from the following symptoms— thickening of the arteries, blood clots and are in danger of developing cancer of the mouth, larynx, cervix, oesophagus as well as the bladder, pancreas and kidneys. They are also more likely to show symptoms of a lack of athleticism, wheezing of the chest, coughing and nausea. Eventually they will suffer from an increased resistance to a flow of oxygen to the lungs as well as stained teeth and fingers. There is also likely to be a strong odour of tobacco smoke off their clothes. Smoking will not only affect your health but it will hit you in the pocket as well. Not only are they expensive to buy but the health issues that have to be addressed as a result of smoking will also have to be dealt with.

## Tips to Help Reduce Household Bills

W ith the economic doom and gloom sweeping Ireland and with the help of the budget adding salt to our wounds everyone is tightening their purse strings... even more! So in an effort to help combat those dreaded monthly household bills here are a few tips to help keep some 'yo yo' in your pocket.

- Check all your doors and windows for sneaky draughts the biggest culprit of wasted heat.
- * May seem silly but change your light blubs! Invest in some **Low energy bulbs** as they last up to 15 times longer than a normal light bulb and provide the same lighting for a quarter of the running cost.
- * It sounds ridiculous but if a room **is not occupied then the light should be off**. This sounds easy, but how often do we leave a room thinking we'll be back in a minute and then completely forget that we left the light on.
- * This also sounds like common sense but is easily forgotten -unplug all electrical devices not being used. Many appliances, especially PC's, TV's and mobile phone chargers use up power on stand by.
- * Place heavy furniture like bookshelves, and sofas against exterior walls to help block off cold air.
- * When cooking use lids on pots and pans to reduce cooking times. For example **never boil water in an uncovered pan** as it boils faster and use less energy in a covered pan.
- * Wash your dishes rather than use a dishwasher.
- * Hang your clothes on a clothes line or buy a clothes horse if you live in an apartment. If you are urban living and are not allowed place your laundry on the balcony, buy some pegs to pin your clothes to the clothes horse and leave out early in the morning or late in the evening. Tumble dryers are notorious for racking up energy units. Plus they ruin your clothes!
- * Use less water during the day. Simple steps such as turning off your water while you brush your teeth and **taking shorter showers** can save you money on your water bill. You can also save water and money by only running your washing machine or dishwasher when it is fully loaded.
- * Perform home repairs in a timely fashion. Problems such as leaky taps, leaky pipes or windows that do not shut fully can slowly increase the amount of money that you spend on water, heating and cooling.

## **Pet Corner**

The Hedgehog

The hedgehog is also known as the "urchin" or "hedgehog". This is due to the animal's pig-like snout. The name "hedgehog" dates from around 1450 and it has generally replaced the older "urchin". The name urchin is often applied to a mischievous child because the urchin or hedgehog was believed to be a mischievous elf in disguise. It is thought that the hedgehog was introduced to Ireland around 1700,



quite possibly as a source of food. Hedgehogs are very common throughout the country but we seldom see them. The reason for this is that they are nocturnal, i.e. they sleep during the day and are active at night. They sleep under logs and tree roots or under heaps of leaves or in burrows. Generally if you see a hedgehog out in daylight, it is a sick one. If you come across a hedgehog, it will instinctively curl up into a ball and the spikes stand out in every direction. The hedgehog does this to protect those parts of it's body that are not protected by spines. Very few predators are able to penetrate this defence. Its main predator is the badger.

Hedgehogs are good climbers and can climb over ivy-covered garden walls. If they fall from a height, they immediately curl into a ball as they fall to land unhurt, cushioned by the thick layer of spines. We all like to see hedgehogs visit our gardens. They are often called the gardener's friend, because they eat slugs and snails thereby reducing the need to use slug pellets. This is a good example of biological pest control (using one species to remove another). If you want to put out additional food for visiting hedgehogs, make sure NOT to give them bread and milk. The milk can make them very sick, maybe even kill them. The best food you can give them is tinned dog or cat food, and always leave out a bowl of fresh water for them.

As you move into summer, hedgehogs in your garden may become more noisy. On warm moist summer nights you may be lucky enough to see and hear mating hedgehogs. They seem to ignore humans and you can watch them without disturbing them. So enjoy them at this time of year, because come next October or November they will have hibernated and will spend the winter sleeping.





## Ennis makes it easy for Maynooth but Blues are brutal

MAYNOOTH MONASTEREVIN 1-5

MAYNOOTH passed their first test in this year's intermediate championship with flying colours after a comprehensive nine point win against Monasterevin.

Scoring just one point in the first half Monasterevin were made look like students who hadn't studied for their exams as Maynooth outplayed, out-thought and out-muscled them during an excruciating hour of football for Paul Bealin's side.

Bealin must have been scratching his head in disbelief when the Blues were kept scoreless for 22 minutes and scored just once in the opening half.

Maynooth hit 1-7 without reply during 17 blistering minutes that established their credentials as serious title contenders.

Pierre Ennis was the star of the show, hitting 1-3 in the first six minutes and getting a further four points to make for an individual tally that was enough to beat the losers on its own.

All over the field Maynooth were hungry for the ball and with complete dominance in midfield they wrestled for every breaking ball like their lives depended on it. With a huge workrate that their opponents could never match, the winners made the most of every opportunity although they could hardly believe the ease with which they took control.

At the interval the match was good as over, the gap 11 points and the score 1-9 to a measly 0-1 after 30 minutes Monasterevin will have to forget if they're to make any headway in the championship.

After Ennis hit 1-3, Niall Naughton and Vinny Hanrahan added a point each until Maynooth's top scorer took over again with two more points from play before Monasterevin finally got off the mark courtesy of Colm McCabe.

Maynooth's determination was such that they finished the half with another brace of points, this time Karl Ennis clipping two fine scores, one from play and one from a free.

Things could only improve for the losers after the break because they couldn't get any worse and an influx of subs, four by the 42nd minute, gave them a badly needed makeover.

They attacked with more purpose and Wayne Carter netted with six minutes to go the Blues were only playing for pride.

Even that was in poor supply for Maynooth finished this hiding with three more points before the end, again Karl Ennis found the range with two more good scores to take his tally to four from wing back while Vinny Hanrahan cleverly fisted over his second point of game.

Maynooth will have to be considered as live championship contenders after this display and with a second round clash with lowly Eadestown next up they already look to have one foot in the quarter-finals.

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## Whitney Houston

W hitney Elizabeth Houston (born August 9, 1963) is an American recording artist, actress, and former fashion model. A relative to several prominent soul singers, including her mother Cissy Houston, cousins Dee Dee and Dionne Warwick, and godmother Aretha Franklin, Houston began singing at her New Jersey church as a member of a junior gospel choir at age eleven. After she began performing alongside her mother at night clubs in the New York City area, she was discovered by Arista Records label head Clive Davis.

Houston spent some of her early life touring night clubs with her mother and while Cissy was performing she would occasionally get on stage and perform with her mother. Rolling Stone Magazine praised the new talent, calling her " one of the most exciting new voices in years "while The New York Times called the album "an impressive, musically conservative showcase for an exceptional vocal talent". Houston's second album, Whitney, was released in June 1987.



Houston was a supporter of Nelson Mandela and the anti-apartheid movement. During her modelling career days, the singer refused to work with any agencies who did business with a then apartheid South Africa. In June 1988, during the European leg of the tour, Houston joined other musicians to perform a set at Wembley Stadium in London to celebrate a then imprisoned Nelson Mandela's 70th Birthday. Over 72,000 people filled Wembley Stadium, and over a billion people tuned in worldwide as the rock concert raised \$1 Million for charities while bringing awareness to apartheid. In 1989, Houston formed the Whitney Houston Foundation For Children, a non profit organization that has raised funds for the needs of childrens issues around the world. The organization cares for homelessness, children with cancer and AIDS, and other self-empowerment.


Whitney Houston married Bobby Brown on July 18 1992. She has one daughter by him called Bobbi Kristina Houston Brown. Houston appeared in her first staring role in the feature film The Body Guard in 1992. In 1995, Houston starred alongside Angela Bassett, Loretta Devine, and Lela Robson in her second film *Waiting to Exhale;* a motion picture about four African American women struggling with relationships. Houston played the leading role Savannah Jackson, a TV producer in love with a married man.

In August 2001, Houston signed the biggest record deal in music history with Arista/BMG. She renewed her contract for \$100 million to deliver six new albums, on which she would also earn royalties.

Whitney Houston separated from Bobby Brown in September 2006. The following month, on October 16th 2006 Houston filed for divorce from Brown. On February 1st, 2007 Houston asked the court to fast track their divorce. The divorce became finalised on the 24th April, 2007.

In March 2007, Clive Davis announced that the singer would be heading back to the studio to record her first album in four years.

Whitney Houston's debut is currently listed as one of Rolling Stone's Greatest Albums of all time and on The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame's Definite 200 List. Houston's grand entrance into the music industry is considered one of the 25 musical milestones of the last 25 years according to USA Today. In 1997, the Franklin school in East Orange, New Jersey was renamed The Whitney E. Houston Academy School. In 2001, Houston was awarded the first annual Lifetime Achievement Award by BET.









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



## FLOWER ARRANGING

### A single flower is a beautiful flower.

Everywhere you look it seems all you see are big and even bigger floral arrangements. Some of them are even downright scary! Little arrangements have their place too, especially the littlest of them all...a single stem. While a single rose or other flower in a bud vase is always elegant, use single blooms in a wide variety of places in many different ways can also be elegant. Place single blooms in tiny vases and containers, float smaller blooms in wineglasses, teacups or other small containers and float larger blooms in bowls or other wide containers. Sometimes a single bloom can be the most elegant and distinctive arrangement .



#### Think beyond vases when looking for a container.

Do not be afraid of placing a floral arrangement in a container that is not a typical vase. Flower arrangements that are unique and using a unique container are very easy to do. Consider any open container for holding flowers. Even items that won't hold water can be used as vases simply by placing a smaller vase, bottle, or other container inside it. Use our imagination look around your house and see what you can use. What about the old teapot that you never use?

#### Always cut flowers with a sharp knife or pair of scissors

A very common mistake people make is using a dull pair of scissors or cutting knife…or even worse their fingers…to "cut" flowers either in the garden or when trimming them to fit into an arrangement. A sharp edge is needed to make a sharp even cut that will allow water to enter the flower stems. A ragged edge actually inhibits water and food absorption and will make your flowers fade faster.

### Flower arrangements don't have to be "perfect".

Forget the extravagant arrangements. While they might be nice for very formal occasions, smaller arrangements can have just as much, if not more appeal, charm, and beauty. As long as you like the arrangement, and as long as it makes you happy, it is indeed a "perfect" arrangement.

#### Remember that flowers smell.

You need to keep the scent of flowers in mind when you are making arrangements. Many a dinner party was spoiled by the table centerpiece which was so strongly scented that every dish tasted like the flowers and have made party guests sick by the strong scents of gardenias or lilies in a small or hot room. Remember that even pleasantly scented flowers can be problematic in tight quarters, hot rooms, or on the dinner table. On the opposite side of pleasant smelling flowers lie what we affectionately call "the stinkers". Some flowers just don't smell good, or don't smell good to other people. A flower that smells mildly unpleasant in the garden or florists shop might smell very unpleasant when arranged in a small room or when all you can smell is the flower arrangement.

#### Keep your flowers in a cool location.

There are few things prettier than a bright bouquet of flowers in a sparkling crystal vase set in a sunny location. As pretty as that flower arrangement is, it won't last long at all in such a warm environment. The cooler the location, the longer your flowers will last. Keeping flowers away from direct sunlight, large lights, heating vents, heaters, active fireplaces, stoves, and even appliances will help them last longer. If you just have to keep an arrangement in a warm location change the water frequently using very cold water and even add an ice cube or two to the arrangement every so often and your flowers will last longer.

#### Fitzpatrick welcomes €250 million Government Subsidy Scheme to protect vulnerable jobs

The Government has established a €250 million Employment Subsidy Scheme that will see payments being made to employers in order to protect vulnerable jobs in the productive sector of the economy according to Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee and Fianna Fail TD for Kildare North, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"This Scheme will see employers being paid a subsidy by the Government to keep on employees as they come under increasing pressure to make redundancies."

"These payments will be vital in protecting up to 27,400 jobs across the country and they will help keep companies functioning and producing in the future interests of the country's exporting potential."

"The Employment Subsidy Scheme will provide a subsidy of €9,100 per employee over 15 months to qualifying exporting enterprises in the manufacturing and/or internationally traded services sectors."

"To qualify, enterprises must be judged to be vulnerable in the current economic climate, but viable in the medium to long term. The assessments will be made by Enterprise Ireland."

"Companies must also employ more than 10 full-time employees, have export sales of at least 30 per cent, and they must not have been in difficulty on July 1 2008 in order to be included in the scheme."

"Over fifteen months, the Employment Subsidy Scheme will provide a maximum subsidy of  $\in$ 200 per full-time employee per week for the first twenty-six weeks, reducing to  $\in$ 150,  $\in$ 100 and  $\in$ 50 respectively for each of the subsequent 13-week periods."

"Under State Aid rules the maximum subsidy payable to any one enterprise, or group of related enterprises, for the duration of the scheme is €500,000 There may be certain reduction on this amount where companies have been approved funding under the temporary aid framework or received de minimise aid."

"This Scheme in addition to the  $\in$ 100 million Enterprise Stabilisation Fund put in place by the Government earlier this year. It is vital that we continue to do everything we can to protect jobs in order to support a faster return to sustainable growth."

#### Mental Health Services in Kildare

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick has received the following response from the Health Service Executive to his enquiry on Mental Services in County Kildare"

The mental health service in the north of the county is divided into two sectors, each with a multidisciplinary mental health team. The North West sector is based in Kilcock and serves the area between Kilcock and Maynooth and Derrinturn, whilst the North East Team is based in Celbridge and services the area between Celbridge and Leixlip. The teams share a Day Hospital in Celbridge and a Day Centre in Kilcock, and a Day Centre in Carbury. In addition, the north of the county operates the only homecare team in the Local Health Office area and this has a significant impact on admissions and length of stay in the acute in-patient facility at the Lakeview Unit, Naas Hospital.

All the services in Kildare West-Wicklow Mental Service are operated and managed in the spirit of "Vision for Change". The services operate on a multidisciplinary basis in line with the Vision for Change but as yet do not have the full staffing levels as suggested under the Vision for Change programme.

The Health Service Executive is attempting to reorganise all of its services in order to meet the requirements of strategies under the Vision for Change and the Primary Care Strategy but also need to work within existing resources."

Deputy Fitzpatrick welcomed this response from the Health Service Excutive and their commitment to continue to improve the Mental Health Services in County Kildare.

#### Employment Subsidy Scheme to assist viable but vulnerable companies says Brady

The Employment Subsidy Scheme, introduced by the Government last week, is designed to assist viable companies, that export their products or services, protect vulnerable jobs in these current difficult trading conditions according to Local TD and Minister of State, Aine Brady.

'The Employment Subsidy Scheme will provide a subsidy of €9,100 per employee over a fifteen month period to qualifying exporting companies in the manufacturing and/or internationally traded services sectors. Qualifying companies must be judged vulnerable in the current economic climate but viable in the medium to long term, and the scheme is being coordinated by Enterprise Ireland.' stated Minister Brady.

'This Scheme will assist employers retain their workers, their knowledge base and skills-base and also assist in protecting much needed employment. Details of the Scheme can be obtained from my office or from Enterprise Ireland.'

'The Government has recently announced a number of schemes designed to protect jobs or give training opportunities to Graduates and others. These include the  $\in$ 100 million Enterprise Stabilisation Fund which was put in place by the Government in April of this year to assist companies that are experiencing financial difficulties. The Graduate Placement Scheme, taken together with the Work Placement Programme, is designed to enhance the work experience and training opportunities for people that are becoming unemployed.'

'I would urge any company, that feels that they would benefit from the Employment Subsidy Scheme to contact Enterprise Ireland. The closing date for applications for the Employment Subsidy Scheme, which is a temporary measure, is 4 September 2009 and interested enterprises may apply online at the dedicated website **www.employmentsubsidy.ie** or, for enterprises supported by IDA Ireland, contact their IDA Ireland Project Officer directly.' concluded Minister Brady.

#### Brady urges eligible Parents to apply now for Back to School Clothing & Footwear Allowance

Over 140,000 families nationally with school-going children are expected to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance this summer, according to local TD and Minister of State at the Department of Health Aine Brady T.D.

`This scheme will see parents being assisted with the back to school costs through payments of €200 or €305 depending on the age of their children.' Stated Minister Brady.

#### "Probably the furthest thing from most parents' minds this week is the start of the new school year. But we know that families always find this a pressurised time financially, so I would urge them now to take the time to apply for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance, as it can take 6-8 weeks to process applications and receive payment."

more families will benefit as the income thresholds for entitlement to the scheme were increased by  $\in$ 50." This brings the income limits for the allowance for parents with one child to  $\in$ 560 for couples and  $\in$ 407 for those parenting alone.

Another special measure which was introduced in the Budget was an additional allowance of  $\in$ 215 payable to 18 year olds in full time education for whom, the half rate Child Benefit is now applied. Total back to school payment in respects of children aged 18 is  $\in$ 520.

The scheme is administered on behalf of the Department by the Community Welfare Division of the Health Service Executive, with staff in place now to deal with claims. A person may qualify for payment of an allowance if they are in receipt of a Social Welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement), or Health Service Executive payment, are participating in an approved employment scheme or attending a recognised education and training course and have household income at or below certain set levels. Minister Hanafin said "the purpose of the household income limit is to ensure that the allowance is directed at those with the greatest need."

#### Straffan School get works approval says Brady

Local TD and Minister of State Aine Brady, has been informed by the Minister for Education, Batt O'Keeffe TD, that Straffan National School has received approval to carry out some minor works at their school.

'Straffan NS has received funding, under the contingency fund 2009, to carry out minor works at the school.'

#### CCTV to cover Cycle Racks at Maynooth Rail Station says Brady

## Carton House - Maynooth A Brief History

Carton House is situated about one mile from Maynooth beside the Galway Road. This great house is nestled among a most beautiful setting of trees and lawns. The Rye Water weaves its way through the estate lands until it joins the river Liffey at Leixlip.

The demesne is surrounded by a five mile long wall and there are five lodge houses dotted along the boundary. On the demesne itself is the famous Shell Cottage which was built for Lady Emily FitzGerald, a quaint cottage which once had a thatched roof and is decorated outside and within with seashells. All this makes Carton a truly magnificent and breathtaking sight.

The original house was built in the early seventeenth century by a member of the Talbot family of Malahide. Sir William Talbot had obtained the lease of Carton's lands from Gerald, fourteenth earl of Kildare in 1603. In 1691 his son, Col. Richard Talbot, who also became Duke of Tyrconnell died at Limerick. That same year his lands were forfeited to the crown. In 1703, the house was sold at auction and was bought by Major-General Richard Ingoldsby (he was at one time a Lord Justice of Ireland). Richard's son Thomas died in 1731, and so Carton passed into the hands of his cousin Henry Ingoldsby who sold the lease back to the nineteenth earl of Kildare - Robert Fitzgerald.



The great German architect Richard Castle was asked to make conversions to the house in order to make it a more comfortable abode. In 1744 the earl of Kildare died. He left Carton to his widow, Lady Mary

O'Brien, but she immediately signed the house over to her son James, the twentieth Earl of Kildare. In 1766 he became the first Duke of Leinster.

James married Emily Lennox, a daughter of the second Duke of Richmond. They removed the straight avenues and created a more natural parkland to surround their house. Lady Emily is noted to have had a passion for spotted cows and she kept a collection at Carton, taking great pleasure in watching them graze upon the lawns.

Two of the more important rooms in Carton house are the Saloon and the Chinese Room. The Saloon has a beautiful plaster ceiling which depicts 'The Courtship of the Gods'. It was created by the famous Lafranchini brothers. It is probably one of their first works in Ireland, dating from 1739. The other important room in the house which still maintains it's eighteenth century look, the Chinese Room, is decorated with panels of Chinese wallpaper and is embellished with gilt wood. It is not unlike the layout of the print room in Castletown House.

In 1815 Lord Gerald FitzGerald, third Duke of Leinster House (his Dublin residence) hired the eminent Cork architect, Richard Morris to make alterations to Carton House.

Later Carton was to fall out of the hands of the FitzGerald family due to the rashness of the seventh Duke of Leinster, Lord Edward FitzGerald. An extravagant young man with many debts, he sold his birthright in 1910 to a moneylender. He stipulated that should he inherit the Dukedom, he would receive £1,000 for life. He lived until 1979. His elder brother died in 1922. The second son, Lord Desmond died on active service in France in 1916. Thus Carton was lacking in the funds it needed for its upkeep. In 1949 it was sold to Lord Brocket.

Although it is not open to the public throughout the year, visits can be arranged through Maynooth College Visitors Centre. The centre is opened from May to September.

## Lisbon Treaty and Bord Snip facilitate return of Water Rates

In the 1980s and 1990s successive Governments and County Councils imposed refuse and water charges on householders. In response residents nationwide resisted the charges on the basis that they were a form of double taxation as they, through PAYE taxes, had already paid for these services. In Maynooth and north Kildare resistance included large public meetings, a protest march along Main St. and a campaign of withholding of payment. In response Kildare Co. Co. conducted a reign of intimidation with mass legal actions, withdrawal of refuse collections and disconnection of water supply. Thanks, in the main, to the gallant efforts of residents' action groups a compromise was eventually reached which included the scrapping of water charges and introduction of tax relief for refuse charges.

However, if Government adopts the Bord Snip recommendations water charges will be reintroduced. Colm McCarthy's July report calls for a cut of  $\in$ 100m in the Exchequer contribution to the Local Government Fund and states:

> "The Group considers that local authorities should be self-financing in the longer term and that Exchequer support should be replaced with increased revenue generation from local sources, including such measures as may be suggested by the Commission on Taxation in its forthcoming Report, and increased cost recovery levels for appropriate services. Charging for domestic water services would be consistent with this approach, and should in the Group's view be within the remit of a single national water authority".

So, not only are water charges to return but they are also to be taken away from democratically elected local councils and this vital public utility is to be handed over to some class of an unaccountable authority or powerful corporation. Also, the above extract hints at the later introduction of rates on family homes!

And this is where the Lisbon Treaty comes in: the purpose of Bord Snip is to identify savings of up to  $\in$ 5.3 billion for the Government that it intends to cut from public spending, at the behest of the EU

Commission. Ireland has been given until 2013 to get the deficit of debt/GDP ratios below 3%, as per EU rules enshrined in the Lisbon Treaty. Yes, the public finances need to be sorted, but given the severity of Ireland's position a longer time frame and a socially acceptable consensus on how that is to be achieved should be a matter for the Dáil to decide, not for Brussels bureaucrats to dictate. Furthermore, on the ownership of the proposed water single authority, the Lisbon Treaty is quite explicit. Article 106, states:

#### "Undertakings entrusted with the operation of services of general economic interest or having the character of a revenue-producing monopoly shall be subject to the rules contained in the Treaties, in particular to the rules on competition..."

In the light of the experience of Eircom and Aer Lingus, the impact of EU competition rules will mean that such a water authority will be privatized, and that Kildare Co. Co.'s social function of supplying water will be supplanted by a corporation (probably foreignowed), Chief among the primary purposes of the authority will be the creation of profits for its new owners.

Such an outcome would represent a fundamental threat to the quality of Irish life. NO to Lisbon II on 2 October will require the negotiation of a new Treaty and allow for the removal of such provisions. Only such an outcome will enable residents to continue to hold their local authority to account for the provision of a secure and safe water supply.



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
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## **Editorial-October**

A s we go to print, the new students are arriving in Maynooth, hundreds of them on top of the thousands that the town accommodates already, and we welcome them all. Four hundred mature students are signed on for First Year; the Government are encouraging the newly unemployed to go to College. This year students do not pay fees but there is a strong possibility that those choosing to attend third level education next year will be paying for this supposed privilege.

The early retirement scheme for third level teachers/ lecturers was so popular that the Department of Finance had to withdraw the offer in the second week of September. It is not a healthy sign that senior staff are desperate to leave and the pattern is repeated throughout the public service; senior detectives are leaving and taking their knowledge and insight with them.

As the country faces three hurdles, NAMA, Lisbon 2 and the budget, the population seems paralysed by the enormity of the financial problems that face the economy, sorry, the country. Sometimes, listening to politicians, journalists and commentators, it seems that Ireland/Éire is not a republic or a country but just an economy. In the past fifteen years, there has been so much emphasis on this economy, we have forgotten community, arts, culture, heritage and everything that made us what we are.

The parents of the eighties hardly envisaged their children facing a financial crisis that is even worse that the one that they battled themselves. What makes people really angry is that no-one takes responsibility in Ireland, no-one resigns when wastage, corruption and incompetence is exposed. Perhaps we are all complicit in this dirty quagmire. We treat our TDs as our personal MABS advisors; we won't re-elect them unless they get us whatever we want; be it a medical card, a house to which we are entitled, a rezoning ... forgetting that their job is to legislate not to dispense favours. They don't resign because we re-elect those who do wrong.

Whistle-blowers are not welcome in Ireland – just look at how long it took FÁS to act on an insider anonymous letter. There are very few offices that deserve the respect that goes to the Comptroller and Auditor General as they expose the incredible wastage by certain of our politicians. We get the Government we deserve and it says a lot about us as a people.

It is difficult to find any positive news but the latest Tidy Towns report on Maynooth makes encouraging reading. There is great praise for the lack of litter, the estates, the approach road and compliments to the committee for their great work. We would like to extend our congratulations to them as well and call for more volunteers to help them.

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# **Community Council Notes**

### Maynooth Community Council meeting 14 September 2009

#### Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

#### 1. Tidy Towns Competition

Paul Croghan, Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee, reported an improved result for Maynooth in this year's Tidy Towns Competition, despite the upheaval caused to some of our local green areas during the recent drainage works. Maynooth scored particularly well for Overall Development Approach and Landscaping. Paul said that this was encouraging for the future, given the circumstances this year, and reminded the meeting that the Tidy Towns Committee has an ongoing need for new volunteers. He said that working with fellow volunteers each week was very rewarding and fun, and encouraged people to join in for next season.

#### 2. Scouts at Geraldine Hall

Cynthia Gallagher, Maynooth Scouts, said that the Scouts have made arrangements to have use of the Geraldine Hall as their Den - a very suitable location as it is beside the Harbour Field. Cynthia reported a big increase in Scout membership this year, and said that the Scouts are seeking adult volunteers to help with their activities. She said that the Geraldine Hall would also be available for other groups. This was welcomed by other Community Councillors, some of whom remembered attending 'hops' and other social events there many years ago! It was suggested that the Hall might become a suitable venue for Local History Group events in the future.

#### 3. 'Community Gathering' event on suicide prevention

Deirdre Cullen, Community Council PRO, announced a forthcoming seminar being organised by the HSE's working group on Mental Health and Suicide Prevention in North East Kildare. The seminar, entitled 'Community Gathering – Promoting Mental Health and Suicide Prevention in North East Kildare' will take place on Saturday 10th October at the Glenroyal Hotel, Maynooth, from 2.00pm to 5.30pm. It is aimed at young people, parents and all members of the community in Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge and Kilcock, and surrounding areas.

The keynote speaker will be Craig Hodges, from Headstrong, and there will be a presentation from Community Action on Suicide, Clondalkin. There will also be workshops on the SPHE program in schools, effective communication across the generations, peer-mentoring, and safety and social networking via the internet and mobile phone.

Maynooth Community Council is involved in the working group which is organising this seminar, along with the HSE, Celbridge Mental Health Association, National Educational Psychological Services, Turas le Cheile, and other groups. All members of the community are welcome to attend.

#### 4. Youth Café

Councillor John McGinley reported progress on the plan for a Youth Café, Theatre and Arts Centre at the Tesco site on Dublin Road and anticipated that a premises would be developed during the next phase of the Tesco Development, in 2011.



# **DIY FOR BEAUTIFUL HAIR**

#### For Volume

Mix the juice of one lemon with 100 ml of water and put into a spray bottle. Spray lightly through your hair, then blow dry. The acidity of the lemon juice swells the strands giving volume. Remember though if out in the sun the lemon will lighten your hair so take this into consideration.



#### Ran out of shampoo?

Beat two fresh eggs in a cup of warm water. Massage the mixture through your hair. Leave on for ten to fifteen minutes then rinse with tepid water.

#### Problem with dandruff?

Dissolve some Aspirin in a dandruff shampoo and the problem will clear up fast.

#### For dehydrated hair

Blend an egg, a tablespoon of olive oil and a quarter of cucumber in a food mixer. Cover your hair with the mixture and leave for ten minutes. Rinse with lukewarm water and you will be left with softer silkier hair!

#### To tame curly hair

Use just a 5 cent size (depending on hair length) of olive oil and mix it with your favourite styling product. Voila!! Tamed curly hair.

#### Washing hair

When washing your hair with beer, what you need to do is mix up one part beer and three parts water and pour over your hair for the final rinse and you'll be left with super-shiny hair'.

Always after a wash, rinse your hair with vinegar and warm water and leave for 3 minutes and rinse for beautiful shiny hair.

If you've done your own permanent dye job and the colour is far too strong use fairy liquid as shampoo, as it strips the colour out quicker than normal shampoo.

Put real mayonnaise, not miracle whip, on your hair over night with a plastic cap. This promotes stronger strands and growth.

Old rags can create perfect ringlets with damp hair-simply cut into strips and wrap 2inch sections of hair around and leave over night.

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# Senator Edward Kennedy

dward Moore "Ted " Kennedy was born on the 22nd February, 1932 and he died on the 25th August 2009 in the United States of America. He was a United States Senator from Massachusetts and a member of the Democratic Party. In office since November 1962, Kennedy served nine terms in the Senate. At the time he was the second most senior member of the Senate since Robert Byrd of the West Virginia, and the third-longest– serving senator of all time. He was manager in his brothers John's successful 1960 successful campaign for president, then worked as an assistant district attorney for Suffolk County, Massachusetts.. He was seriously injured in a Plane crash in 1954 and suffered back pain for the rest of his life. He was chairman of the Senate Health, Education, Labour, and Pensions Committee.



Ted Kennedy was the youngest of nine children by Joseph P. Kennedy Sr. and Rose Fitzgerald. He had attended ten different schools by the time he was eleven years old. Ted Kennedy

entered Harvard University College and in his Spring Semester was assigned to the athlete– oriented Winthrop House, where his brother's also lived. Kennedy enlisted in the United States Army in June of 1951. Following basic training at Fort Dix, he requested assignment to Fort Holabird for Army intelligence training. After a few weeks he left without explanation and went to Camp Gordon for training in the Military Police Corps. In 1952, he was assigned to the honour guard at SHAPE in Headquarters in Paris.

While still at school, Ted Kennedy met Virginia Joan Bennett, known as Joan, while delivering a speech at Manhattan College in October. She was a senior there, had worked as a model and won beauty contests, but was unfamiliar with the world of Politics. They were married by Cardinal Francis Spellman on November 29, 1958, in Bronxville, New York. They had three children together: Kara Anne, Edward Jr. and Patrick.

Ted Kennedy was sworn in to the senate on November 7th 1962. On November 22 1963, he was presiding over the Senate, task given to junior members, when an aide rushed in to tell him that his brother John. F. Kennedy had been shot. Ted flew to the family home to tell his stroke afflicted father that his son had been shot.

Ted Kennedy finally threw his hat into the ring for the Democratic nomination in the 1980 presidential election by launching an unusual, insurgent campaign against the Incumbent Jimmy Carter. The Chappaquiddick incident became a more significant factor than the staff expected, with several newspaper columnists and editorials criticizing Kennedy's answers on the matter. Chappaquiddick hurt Kennedy badly among Catholic voters. During a St. Patrick's Day Parade the day before, Kennedy had to wear a bullet-proof vest due to assassination threats as hecklers yelled "Where's Mary Jo?" at him. Carter crushed Kennedy on polling day, winning 155 of 169 delegates. His Presidential campaign was over. In January 1981, Ted and Joan announced they were getting a divorce. The proceedings were generally amicable, and she received a reported \$4 million dollar settlement when the divorce was granted in 1982.

Kennedy had an easy time with his re-election to the Senate in 2000, as Republican lawyer and entrepreneur Jack. E. Robinson 111 was sufficiently damaged by his past personal record that Republican state party officials refused to endorse him. Kennedy got 73% of the general election vote, with Robinson splitting the rest with Libertarian Carla Howell.

Kennedy remained neutral as the 2008 Democratic nomination battle between Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton and Senator Barack Obama intensified, as his friend Chris Dodd was also running. Kennedy gave an endorsement to Obama on January 28, 2008, despite appeals by both Clintons not to do so. It was a move that was seen as a symbolic passing of the torch. Kennedy said that it was "time again for a new generation of leadership," and compared Obama's ability to inspire with that of his fallen brothers.

On May 17, 2008 Kennedy suffered a seizure, and then another one as he was rushed from the Kennedy Compound to Cape Cod Hospital and then by Helicopter to Massachusetts General Hospital. On May 20, Doctors announced that Ted Kennedy had a malignant glioma, a type of cancerous brain tumour.

On January 20, 2009, Kennedy attended Barack Obama's presidential inauguration in Washington. Unfortunately he suffered a seizure at the luncheon immediately afterwards. He was taken via wheelchair from the Capital building, and then by ambulance to Washington Hospital Centre.

However, by June 2009 Kennedy had not cast a Senate vote in three months, and his health had forced him to retreat to Massachusetts where he was undergoing another round of chemotherapy.

Kennedy died of brain cancer on Tuesday, August 25 2009, at his home in Hyannis Port, Massachusetts.

#### Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

#### Question

How do I ensure that I will be able to vote in the Lisbon Treaty referendum?

#### Answer

All Irish citizens aged 18 or over on polling day and living in the State are entitled to vote in referendums.

For you to exercise your right to vote, you must be registered with your local authority (County or City Council). You can check the Electoral Register for 2009/2010 at www.checktheregister.ie. Copies of the Register are also held in Local Authority Offices, Post Offices, Garda stations and Public Libraries.

If your details do not appear you can apply to be included in the supplement to the Electoral Register. To be registered in time to vote in the referendum on 2 October 2009, you should ensure that the completed application form reaches your local authority by Tuesday 15 September 2009.

If you are on the register but have moved address from one Dáil constituency or local electoral area to another, you will need application form RFA3. You can download this from www.checktheregister.ie or ask your local authority to post it out. If your details are not on the Register at all you will need form RFA2, available in the same way. To amend incorrect details, use form RFA1.

There is a Postal Voters List which you can register on if you cannot go to a polling station because of a physical illness or disability, because you are a full-time student living away from home, because of your occupation or because you are in prison. There are special arrangements for members of the Defence Forces and the Foreign Service who are stationed overseas, and for their spouses. There is also a Special Voters List for people living in hospitals, nursing homes or similar institutions who wish to vote at these locations.

These lists come into force on 15 February each year. Your application must be received on or before 25 November of the previous year. However, as in the case of the main Electoral Register, you may apply for inclusion in a supplement to the postal or special voters lists at any time. These supplements close at a specified time in respect of each election or referendum. The postal and special voters supplements for the Lisbon Treaty referendum are now closed.

#### Question

I have just applied for a medical card but I am concerned that my savings are too high. How are my savings means-tested? I am single.

#### Answer

The Health Service Executive (HSE) has published detailed guidelines for the assessment of means for both the medical card and the GP Visit Card. The **income** guidelines vary for people under and over 70 but **Capital** (savings) is assessed in the same way for both. The guidelines are available on www.hse.ie.

As you are single, the first  $\in$  36,000 of savings or similar investments is disregarded. (For a couple this would be  $\in$  72,000.)

The next €10,000 is counted as income of €1 per €1,000 per week.

The next  $\in 10,000$  is counted as income of  $\in 2$  per  $\in 1,000$  per week.

Any amount in excess of this is counted as income of  $\notin 4$  per  $\notin 1,000$  per week.

Alternatively, if you wish, you can have the actual interest rate applied if you provide a certificate of interest paid on savings in the last full calendar year.

If your money is held in fixed-term or long-term savings products that apply the interest after a fixed number of years, the HSE can take account of the interest earned in the year of maturity of the investment. Alternatively, if you wish, the HSE can apply the national rate to determine the income. The calculation of interest includes Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT).

If any of your savings or investments come from certain State compensation schemes, they are not assessable and are disregarded in the means test.

#### Question

The business I work for is closing down and redundancy is being mentioned. I am here as a temp for the last three years but I am paid by an employment agency. Am I entitled to a redundancy payment?

#### Answer

If you are paid by the agency, you are what is called an "agency worker" – that is, a person who has an agreement with an agency to work for another person.

For the purposes of the redundancy legislation, whoever pays your wages will normally be considered to be your employer. Therefore, as the employment agency pays your wages you will not be entitled to a redundancy payment.

While agency workers do not have the same employment rights as other workers, they do have certain rights under the following employment laws:

- Unfair Dismissals Acts 1977 to 2007
- Redundancy Payments Acts 1967 to 2007
- Minimum Notice and Terms of Employment Acts 1973 to 2005
- Organisation of Working Time Act 1997

- Payment of Wages Act 1991
- Maternity Protection Acts 1994 and 2004
- Employment Equality Acts 1998 to 2008

It is important for you to know who is responsible for ensuring compliance with the legislation – the agency or the firm for which you work. This depends on which rights you are seeking to enforce. Under the unfair dismissals legislation, for example, the employer is the business you work for rather than the agency. Compliance with health and safety requirements is also the responsibility of the business.

#### Question

I have been renting a flat for the last five months but have just lost my job and will be living on Jobseeker's Benefit until I find another one. Can I get some help with my rent in the meantime?


#### Answer

There is a special payment called Rent Supplement, which is paid to people living in private rented accommodation who cannot provide for the cost of their accommodation from their own resources. In general, you will qualify for this payment if your only income is a social welfare or Health Service Executive (HSE) payment and you satisfy the other conditions.

The Supplementary Budget (April 2009) made changes to the Rent Supplement scheme. One of the changes is that entitlement to the payment is now restricted to people who are existing tenants for at least six months or who are on a local authority housing list following a full housing assessment. This change came into effect on 27 July 2009. As you have only been renting for five months, you will not be regarded as eligible for Rent Supplement for another month, unless you have been assessed and placed on a housing list.

When you have been renting for six months, you may be eligible for Rent Supplement if the accommodation is suitable for your needs and the rent is below the maximum rent level set for your area. Apply to the Community Welfare Officer (CWO) at your local health centre. The CWO will decide if you are eligible for Rent Supplement and calculate the amount you will get.

Your weekly income after paying rent must not fall below a minimum level known as the Supplementary Welfare Allowance rate. For a single person aged over 20, this is currently  $\in$ 204.30, which is the same rate as Jobseeker's Benefit.

When the CWO calculates your level of Rent Supplement it will be reduced by at least  $\in$ 24. This is because you must pay a "Household Contribution" of at least  $\in$ 24 towards your rent. You may pay more than  $\in$ 24 because you are also required to contribute any additional assessable means that you have over and above the Supplementary Welfare Allowance rate towards your rent.

Rent Supplement is paid to you weekly or monthly by cheque, Electronic Fund Transfer or post draft, usually in arrears.



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

#### **Overall Development Approach:**

Thank you for your comprehensive application and welcome to the Tidy Towns competition 2009. Maynooth Tidy Towns has a steady set of 16 volunteers, with much shared experience, and new members joining in recent years, although the rate of newcomers joining has slowed. Your set up is well organised and a social event in January starts this year. Fundraising may be a challenge this year as the local businesses usually donate for the floral displays. Valuable contributions have come from a wide base, notably the Intel community involvement, local Supervalue and Glenroyal Hotel. There exists excellent partnerships with local schools and the neighbouring town. There is a good rolling 5-year plan submitted with a clear vision for the town. It would be good to include indicative costs of projects listed, to assist with your own planning, and to give an indication of lead partner for projects, although this is included in cases which refer to the various liaison persons within Tidy Towns. There seem to be a few instances where conditions of planning permissions are not being applied by developments until the Tidy Towns press for it, whereas this should be a role for development control within local authority. The sewage upgrade works underway is causing huge disruption but it will be worth it and there is huge potential for improving areas through reinstatement afterwards. Well done and keep up the good work!

#### The Built Environment:

The tree lined avenue of Maynooth is a delight, with the imposing castle and St. Patrick's college at the end, it's a wonderfully planned town. There are some fine buildings in the college, and fine churches. The lovely buildings on the Dublin Road unfortunately have inappropriate signage such as at the row with the Euro saver shop. The solicitor's sign at entrance to town has letters missing which does catch the eye as its in such a prominent spot. The shopfronts on main street are mostly very well presented, with Elite Confectionery, Coonan's auctioneers, Brady's, Caulfield's and the Mill Cellar all worth a mention. The red and white shop at Dublin end has a nice frontage and traditional metalwork in the window, but the current sign does not do it justice, its possibly a shop

for car related products but difficult to tell. Is this the old hardware shop? There used to be an interesting slanted glass frontage along here which is sadly gone. I note the large derelict house at main junction/ Parson St. is to be restored which is good. Larine House looks very well on the square, as does the hard landscaping here. There are a couple of new restaurants which have a classy, elegant appearance—The Avenue and Greene's. Some lovely restored and brightly painted cottages were noted in Leinster Cottages and Cross Lane. It is a pity that a large heritage building going towards Dillon's Row is not looking its best and there are interesting features in the frontage such as railings. While others along here are delightful, and the old stone walls were noted, as they were in many places throughout the town.

#### Landscaping:

It is great to see the Mill Wheel retained as a feature in the new shopping complex. An information panel would be appropriate here to inform on its significance. Carton Avenue is a wonderful asset for the town but the notice board here needs some attention as the info could not be seen clearly. The rain may be getting inside. The cottages on Convent Lane were decked out with brackets for the hanging baskets but no baskets as yet. I would suggest removing the brackets if they are not being used. Otherwise these are a delightful row of well presented houses. The planters in the square were bare and awaiting plants. The square is a modern feature of hard landscaping that is unusual and attractive.

The trees at the Tesco boundary are good and help to soften and screen the complex. The ground is still rough where they have been planted and it would be good to see this finished off.

Nice job on the grotto in St. Mary's church.

#### Wildlife and Natural Amenities:

There is a plan for this section which, when put into action should gain you marks. The presentation from the Heritage Officer in 2008 no doubt boosted your understanding of biodiversity and what you wanted to achieve, as did consultations with wildlife expert provided through Kildare County Council. The idea of a panel at the Parson St. river is a good one, as this area could be misconceived as being untidy, whereas the bankside vegetation could be good natural habitat. Some concern was raised over machinery working near the river opposite the Manor Mills. There was quite a bit of sediment dislodges into the watercourse as part of the sewage works and this was reported to the council at the time as there was potential to impact negatively on fisheries. The canals and rivers are excellent local amenities which can be managed for complimentary multi-purposes of reaction and biodiversity.

#### Litter Control:

There was no litter on any approaches, very good for a town this size, and none in the residential areas or the main street. There was quite a bit of litter however on the back lanes, mostly of broken glass and a few items which did not appear to have been there a long time. Overall excellent litter management in place. The clean up after dogs signs were noted. Again, the partnership approach of working with neighbouring town and Intel is applauded, as is the linkage with National Spring Clean. The problem you face with bin lids disappearing is a shame and good luck in finding a solution. Hopefully the council cutbacks will not mean illegal dumping response times are delayed.

#### Waste Minimisation:

Well done to the schools and all involved in the greenschools programme, for achieving awarded flags and for the on-going links with the Tidy Towns committee. The University action on waste prevention is also noted, as is the new green waste composting initiative at Rail Park.

Further marks could be gained here by promotion of waste prevention through workshops or seminars, for example, on home composting. There are a host of events and initiatives that could be applied and are described in the Race Against Waste handbook.

#### Tidiness:

Very tidy, well marked roads, paths and cycleways throughout. While many lane buildings have been restored, there are several derelict sites mostly used as parking bays with a profusion of no parking signs and graffiti. Traffic in town is a challenge, and plans for more parking spaces are noted. There are a few unsightly building sites around town, but the Leinster Arms has made good efforts on effective screening. There's a noticeable hoarding opposite the Manor Mills complex, and the sewage works underway are causing disruption throughout town. Pity the entrance to the college is blocked. I'm sure all the residences look forward to when they are finished! The plans for old parish hall are noted and welcomed!

#### **Residential Areas:**

There are very nice floral displays at entrance to Cluain Aoibhin, and lovely houses and gardens out the front, but the estate in the back looks tired and quite unkempt. This is also the case with Meadowbrook, with some properties neglected and overgrown weeds at kerbs. This appears to be the challenge of having a large number of rental properties, many inhabited only during the college term. Has there been any approach to landlords to chip in for maintenance of estates? There was some graffiti evident in Beaufield/College Green but no litter so some progress is being made here. The stream running through Meadowbrook is a good amenity and natural bankside vegetation provides good wildlife habitat. Newtown Lawns and Castle Dawson appear well cared for. The profusion of new build, empty houses and apartments, is a sad sight, but a common one throughout the country at this time. Moyglare Abbey is very neat and well cared for, with lovely name signs for different sections within. Pebble Hill has some great natural hedgerows at the back and summer plants along the entrance road add a touch of colour. Lyreen Park also very neat, and the lovely name sign at O'Neill Park was noted.

#### Roads, Streets and Back Areas:

All approaches clean and litter free. From the Straffan/motorway side generally very good once over the bridge with very neat, clean edges and cyclepaths. Marvellous new nameplate at motorway entrance to the town, a nice way to mark the 50th anniversary of the competition.


Coming from Dillion's Row direction, there are so many new builds, not all of tasteful design, but the stone wall in front of charming cottages provides attractive entrance to town. From Kilcock side, the university is a mighty presence and looks very well, with the trees along the entrance and vista into the modern north campus. The new shopping complex is smart and frontage of Aldi screened by lovely old stone wall on this approach.

Resurfacing works needed on the laneways after damage from machinery for the sewage upgrade works.

#### **General Impression:**

A fine town, laden with history but with vibrant presence. Many excellent facilities and amenities, well integrated town. Challenges are in residential areas with short-term residents, traffic management, and disruption from developments. A strong, well organised committee should continue to achieve good results in competition. Good luck!.


Stuart Lane together with John Conroy and Hilda Dunne headed up the committee which included well know local writer Mary O'Donnell and poet Ann Egan.

# Recipes for Halloween

# Halloween Tea Brack

#### Ingredients:

- 225g / 8oz Self Raising Flour
- 375g packet of Fruit Mix
- 300ml / 1/2 pint Cold Tea
- 125g / 4oz Caster Sugar
- 1 Egg (beaten)
- Good pinch Mixed Spice
- Ring or other Charms
- Honey or Golden Syrup (for decoration)

#### Method:

- * Place fruit and tea in bowl and leave to soak overnight.
- * Add sugar, egg, flour and mixed spice and mix well.
- * Wrap ring and any other 'charms' in greaseproof paper and stir into mixture.
- * Transfer to a greased and base lined 20cm/8" round cake tin or 900g/2lb loaf tin.
- * Bake in a pre-heated oven 170°C/325°F/Gas 3 for approx. one hour or until risen and firm to the touch.
- * Cool on a wire tray. When cold, wrap in greaseproof paper and keep for two days before cutting.
- * Melted honey or golden syrup may be brushed over brack before cutting.

# H alloween Cupcakes

#### **Ingredients:**

- •175g/6oz/6 tablespoons Self Raising Flour
- •125g/4oz/4 tablespoons Caster Sugar
- •125g/4oz Margarine
- 2 Eggs
- •2 tablespoons Cold Water

# Acit

#### Method:

- * Pre-heated to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6.
- * Put bun paper cases into bun tray.
- * Place flour, sugar, margarine, eggs and water into a bowl. Beat all ingredients together with an electric mixer or wooden spoon until the mixture is smooth.
- * Put heaped teaspoons of mixture into each bun case.

- * Place in the oven on the top shelf and bake for about 15 minutes until golden.
- * Cool on a wire tray. When cold, decorate as liked!

#### **Decoration Idea:**

Chocolate cupcake (body) Canned chocolate icing

Chocolate sprinkles (hair)

2 pieces of eye-type sweets ( use Bassett's Liquorice Allsorts)

1 package of black string lace liquorice (legs)

### Dumpkin Cauldron

#### Ingredients:

- 1 pumpkin, 25cm/10" in diameter
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 6 chicken thighs, skinned, boned and chopped
- 2 leeks, trimmed, washed and sliced
- 1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
- 2 red peppers, seeded and sliced
- 120g/4oz smoked streaky bacon, de-rinded and chopped
- 30g/1oz plain flour
- 570ml/1 pint chicken stock
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped
- salt and pepper

#### Method:

- Heat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5.
- * Take the top off the pumpkin to make a lid and scoop out the seeds. Cut away the flesh from the insides, making sure you do not cut through the skin. Cut the pumpkin flesh into 1cm/½in cubes.
- Heat the oil in a large pan and quickly fry the chicken until golden but not coloured. Remove.
- * Add the leeks, garlic, peppers and bacon to the pan and cook for 3-4 minutes until the vegetables are starting to soften. Stir in the flour and cook for 1 minute. Stir in the stock, bring to the boil and season well. Add the chicken, pumpkin cubes, bay leaf and cinnamon stick.
- * Pour the mixture into the pumpkin and put the lid on. Lightly oil the skin of the pumpkin with a little more oil and place on a baking sheet. Bake in the oven for 45 minutes until the chicken is cooked through and the stew is piping hot.
- * Stir in the chopped parsley and serve straight out of the pumpkin cauldron.







# Are You in Control of your Website?

website is an important marketing tool in today's modern business. It increases the company's visibility and enables communication with a global audience. It can be a powerful instrument or it can be a stagnant brochure.

Websites are often built without any thought of future upgrades or modifications. The business owner gets excited about creating a company website and spends a lot of time ensuring the right design, pictures and content that portrays the company's products or services. However, all too often, once the website is launched, it is forgotten about. Left as an artist would leave a painting. Yet, a website is not the same as a painting. It is an organic, expandable marketing device.

A stagnant website, a website that is not regularly updated, may lose search engine position and customer's attention. Search engines like Google seek out and award websites that update their content on a regular basis. They give the website a higher ranking because they assume the company must be actively trading if they are adding new content or modifying older content. Search Engines like Google understand that the customer searching for a company or product will appreciate a website with a lot of content that is kept fresh. A visitor will only return to a website if there is something new to see. They might stay on a website in order to learn more about a product, but it would be highly unlikely that they would keep coming back if the content is not updated or continuously improved.

Continuous improvement to a website can be achieved either by paying a web development company to make the changes or by installing a Content Management System (CMS) into the website so that the website owner can change their own content. Some web development companies provide website maintenance contracts for a monthly fee. A contract of this nature will give the website owner a certain amount of hours of website modifications or enhancements for the month. The website owner will inform the web development company of what changes are needed and provide the content to them. The web development company will then make those changes at a discounted hourly rate. On the other hand, having a content management system will cut out the web development company and put the website owner back in control of their website again. With a customer friendly CMS, the website owner will stay in control of their own website. A Content Management System (CMS) is a software application that controls all elements of a website. It allows a user with little or no knowledge of programming or markup languages to create and manage website content. Contrary to popular believe, a CMS cannot be attached to a website. A CMS is used as a building tool for a website. If a website does not currently have a CMS system then one would need to be installed and the website would need to be rebuilt. The right CMS will give the website owner almost full control over their website. They will be able to modify content, upload images and PDF's, add images to a webpage, add new webpages and even create a new section of their website. The CMS will also facilitate the business owner to write blogs or news items, update products on an

E-commerce website and even email out newsletters. All of this can be achieved without any prior knowledge of programming or website technology.

#### Advantages of a Content Management System (CMS)

The advantages of having a CMS system on your website can be seen immediately. First and foremost, it puts the business owner back in control of their website. The business owner and their staff manage the content creation of the website, reduced costs can be realised by taking charge of this service, communication with clients is improved, testing marketing material is simplified, customer service is enhanced, and the website becomes expandable and modifiable.

#### Changes can be made anywhere, anytime

Other advantages of having a CMS system on a website is that the website owner can make immediate changes to their website from anywhere at anytime. This removes any bottlenecks that could occur if the company has a web team or hires a web company on retainer.

#### **Restricted User Accounts**

A good CMS system will also provide user accounts that can restrict access to certain areas of the website administration. This will allow the website owner to set up an account for staff members and allow them access to a specific section, i.e. the Blog section. A restricted account will prevent them from editing content which they are not authorised to change.

#### **Design is Preserved**

All CMS systems store the content of the website in a database, this helps to separate the design from the content. Content from all authors is then displayed consistently throughout the website using the same design. The website owner does not need to worry about a staff member breaking the website as they cannot make modifications to any of the design.

#### Navigation automatically modified

A good CMS system will automatically adjust the menu items when a new webpage is added. Of course the website owner will have the option of having the webpage display on the menu system or not. This will also prevent broken links in the menu, as the system will automatically remove the link to the menu if the webpage is removed.

#### Cooperation

Making use of groups and user accounts the website owner can assign certain tasks to individuals or groups. This encourages faster updates and ownership of content. Collaboration among authors is enhanced and accountability is generated.

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# October in the Garden

### Flowers

N ights with freezing temperatures return in October. Some gardeners welcome the first killing frost and look forward to more time for relaxing or planning next year's gardens. Others wish to prolong the season and are prepared to cover tender plants whenever freezing temperatures are predicted.



Sheets or lightweight tarps spread loosely over plants such as petunias, begonias or impatients will trap the heat stored in the ground overnight and prevent freezing damage. Sometimes plants protected for one or two nights will keep growing and blooming for several more weeks until the really cold weather arrives.

Tropical plants are becoming popular additions to many decks, patios and porches. As the name implies these plants have no frost tolerance and must be brought indoors or covered before any freezing temperatures. Some plants such as hibiscus and mandevillas can be carried over the winter in your home next to a patio door or large window where they will receive good light.

Tulips provide more spring colour than nearly any other plant and are best planted in October. Drifts of a dozen or more bulbs of one variety make the most impact and can be easily planted by digging the whole planting area 6"- 8" deep, space the bulbs according to the package directions, fill in the soil and water well. Bulb fertilizer may also be incorporated below the bulbs.

Garden cleanup in the Autumn should include removing any diseased plant tops but healthy perennials, ornamental grasses and some annuals can be left standing for winter interest, to catch snow and provide seeds for birds.


### Trees

Late Autumn is the best time to plant trees. Although a tree looks asleep when its leaves have fallen, its roots grow a bit whenever the ground temperature is above freezing and the sun is shining. So if you plant then, it has the chance to grow new roots before it needs to put out leaves and flowers in spring. More roots mean a greater ability to find food and water, so the tree is less likely to be stressed the summer after planting. It is therefore healthier, better able to resist disease and will grow away more strongly. Trees that bleed or are susceptible to disease if pruned in the spring may be pruned now. This includes maples, birch, black walnut, oaks, honey locust and

mountain ash. Prune young trees to a single central leader; remove broken, crossed or rubbing branches; and gradually remove lower branches. Always make proper pruning cuts just beyond the branch collar but not leaving stubs.

### October Gardening To Do List

- Finish planting container-grown trees and shrubs
- Plant needle-bearing evergreens early in the month
- If the month is dry, repeat the September soaking
- Check ties on trees, and loosen any that look tight
- Cover compost to keep it warm and working
- Cut back on feeding houseplants (do not feed dormant houseplants)
- OProtect roses for winter
- Cover perennial, vegetable, bulb, and strawberry beds for winter
- O Plant summer-blooming shrubs and vines
- Protect tender plants from frost
- Plant your bulbs indoors for a Christmas


# Features

The walk helped raise funds for the club and proved a huge hit with everyone involved in what was a unique event. See all the pictures in next month's newsletter.



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

On 2 October we will be voting on precisely the same Lisbon Treaty as we rejected last year. Not a comma of it has been changed.

#### What about those "Guarantees"?

EU leaders have agreed a list of statements that do not change the Treaty in any way but reiterate what it already says. They are not legally binding under EU law; and even if they did become legally binding in the form of a protocol in the future, as planned, British PM, Gordon Brown, confirmed: "The protocol clarifies but does not change the content and application of the Treaty ... Treaty assurances have made explicit what was implicit in the Treaty already." Furthermore, there is no legal obligation on member-states to stick to their word, and the present EU governments cannot guarantee their successors will deliver on the pledge. So, think of a post-dated cheque - the value of which is questionable and the signatories to which may well no longer be valid when the bearer attempts to cash it at some unknown future date. Now you have the guarantees sussed!

Below are eleven solid reasons to vote NO to Lisbon. They have been checked for legal accuracy by authorities on European and Irish constitutional law.

**More Power to the Big Powers**: It would radically shift control towards the Big States by basing EU law-making primarily on population size. At present EU laws are made on the basis of a "double majority" system - a simple majority of the 27 EU States (14 or more), as long as between them they have a weighted majority of 255 out of a total of 345 votes. Under this system the Big States have 29 votes each and Ireland has 7. Under Lisbon EU laws would be made by a majority of States (at least 55%, 15 or more), as long as they have 65% of the total EU population between them (Art.16 TEU). This change would double Germany's voting power in making EU laws from its present 8% to 17%, increase Britain's, France's and Italy's from 8% to 12% each, and halve Ireland's vote to 0.8%.

**Ireland's Commissioner:** It would abolish our present right to "propose" and decide whom our Commissioner is, by replacing it with a right to make "suggestions" only, leaving it up to the incoming Commission President to decide. The EU Prime Ministers have promised each State a permanent Commissioner, but what is the point of us continuing to have a Commissioner post-Lisbon when the Irish Government can no longer decide who that Commissioner would be?

**Workers' rights:** It would copper-fasten the Laval and related judgements of the EU Court of Justice, which put the competition rules of the EU market above the right of trade unions to enforce pay standards higher than the minimum for migrant workers. At the same time, Lisbon would give the EU full control of immigration policy (Art.79 TFEU).

**EU Taxes:** It would permit the EU to impose its own EUwide taxes directly on us for the first time in order to raise its own resources for the EU itself, without the need of further Treaties or referenda (Art.311 TFEU). **Intel Corporation:** It would amend the existing treaties to give the EU exclusive power as regards rules on foreign direct investment (Arts.206-7 TFEU) and give the EU Court of Justice the power to order the harmonisation of national indirect taxes if it judges that these cause a *"distortion of competition"* (Art.113 TFEU, *Protocol 27 on the Internal Market and Competition*). These steps would threaten Ireland's 12.5% corporation profits tax and could undermine employment at Intel and other local US companies.

**From EEC to a Federal EU State** (Art.1 TEU). It would make the EU legally separate from and superior to its 27 Member States and would sign international treaties with other States in all areas of its powers (Arts.1 and 47 TEU; *Declaration 17 concerning Primacy*). It would turn Ireland into a regional state with the EU's Constitution and laws having legal primacy over the Irish Constitution and laws in any cases of conflict between the two. Ireland would thus formally cease to be a sovereign independent State in its own right in the international community of States.

Irish vetoes in over 30 new policy areas would be abolished: including public services, crime, justice, policing, immigration, energy, transport, tourism, sport, culture, public health, the EU budget, climate change etc.

A self-amending Treaty: it would permit the EU Prime Ministers and Presidents to shift most remaining EU policy areas where unanimity is required and a national veto still exists - for example on tax harmonisation - to qualified majority voting on the EU Council of Ministers, without need of further EU Treaties or referendums (Art. 48 TEU).

**No popular mandate for EU President:** only heads of States can appoint the new super EU President for up to five years without allowing voters any say as to who he or she would be. This would thereby abolish the present six-month rotating EU presidencies (Art.15 TEU).

**Further EU militarisation:** it would require Ireland to *"progressively improve their military capabilities"* (Art.42.3 TEU) and to aid and assist other Member States experiencing armed attack *"by all the means in their power"* (Art.42.7 TEU).

**No to Lisbon is the best No to NAMA**: This madcap scheme, whereby Irish taxpayers take on bad debts of private banks in the hope they will start lending money again to businesses and citizens, is being pushed by EU's Central Bank. Only a vote against Lisbon can save the country from the Government's bail out of bankers and developers.

Finally, we urge voters to remain focused on the actual contents of the Treaty and not to be swayed by scare tactics or false promises. After all, it's only the Treaty we'll be voting on not the urgings of the politicians, bankers and big business bosses, from Brussels to Leinster House, who have led us into the worst recession since the Great Depression.

#### The "Bandstand" is Gone

#### **Council Agree to Provide Allotments in Maynooth**

The Council have agreed to Cllr. John McGinley's proposal to develop allotments for rent at the Council 10 acres of land at Blacklion. John was given the following reply to his motion at the Area Committee on 11 September:

"Further to the report to the July Meeting regarding the development of allotments at the Wonderful Barn and Maynooth Road. It is proposed to develop allotments of 100, 150 & 200 sq.m in size. Regarding the management of the allotments it is proposed that the allotments would be rented on an 11 month license annually and that all allotment holders will be required to form a management committee to administer the running of the allotments. A design for the layout of both sites including the exact layout and number of the varying sizes of plots and the costs for constructing the site is being worked on and will be presented at a future meeting of the area committee."

#### **Provision of Additional Parking in Maynooth**

The Area Committee was advised by Council Officials that no progress had been made in securing additional parking spaces in Maynooth. Neither the Mill Centre nor TESCO were prepared to lease Parking spaces to the Council. Cllr. John McGinley had previously made in very clear that he would not agree to Pay Parking being introduced without Long Term Parking and additional parking spaces being provided.

As residents will be aware most spaces in our only Public Car Park, beside Super Valu, are taken up by train commuters from early morning. Iarnrod Eireann have failed miserably to meet their obligation to provide enough parking spaces for their customers.

#### LISBON IS ABOUT A BETTER EUROPE: NOTHING MORE, NOTHING LESS

Speaking at the press launch of the Brussels based group 'Europe for Ireland' Labour MEP Proinsias De Rossa said: "Nothing in the Lisbon Treaty threatens the people of Ireland in any way. On the contrary, the Charter of Fundamental Rights places new obligations on Europe in its decision-making to defend, uphold and respect these social, political and human rights.

"These rights apply equally to all - men, women, and children, young and old, workers of all kinds, employed and unemployed, farmers and those working in the fishing industry. A yes vote is not a judgment on the Irish Government. It is a vote for a better Europe, nothing more, nothing less.

"The hardcore NO campaigns are driven by fear and loathing of the European Union. They promote fear amongst those already fearful for their future. Their real agenda is to stop in its tracks the development of a more democratic Europe, in the hope that the Union will unravel. That is the objective of the United Kingdom Independence Party (UKIP) which wants instead a European Free Trade Area without European environmental or workplace protections. Small states like Ireland would sink without trace in such an arrangement.

"Meanwhile Cóir also wants the Union to go away. They hate everything the European Union stands for: equality, pluralism, tolerance of difference, and respect for all. They hark back to a time when you tipped the forelock to your 'betters' and lived behind walls of censorship, protectionism and isolation, or got to hell out of it to England.

"The outcome of a YES will be a more progressive Europe, while a NO vote victory will strengthen the reactionaries in Ireland and in Europe. Already in the European Parliament a combination of Eurosceptics and neo-Nazis are stronger as a result of Europe marking-time since the defeat of the European reforms in Ireland, France and Holland.

"An inability to deal effectively with the economic crisis will lead to confidence in the Union continuing to decline, and the drift towards protectionism, already perceptible, will quicken. That is not in the interest of Ireland's work force or its farming or fishing communities or in Ireland's interest generally. Ireland needs to be able trade freely with the rest of Europe, but on the basis of common environmental and workplace standards agreed by all and applying to all with the force of law. Otherwise we cannot survive. *"Neither Ireland nor Europe can afford the political turmoil that rejection of the Lisbon Treaty will lead to. A YES vote is critical because we urgently need Europe to end the last decade of navel-gazing and get stuck into tackling the jobs and financial crisis, the climate change and the global poverty and hunger crisis."*

#### Planning permission for New St Patrick's School in Celbridge to be lodged says Brady

The application for Planning permission for the New St Patrick's School in Celbridge has been lodged with Kildare Co. Co. according to local TD and Minister of State, Aine Brady.

'In recent months, I have been in regular contact with the Minister for Education, Batt O'Keeffe TD, to bring this issue to a conclusion. Recently, the Minister for Education, following a meeting I had with him, gave approval to Kildare VEC to purchase the 3 acre site for the new school.'

'I understand from Kildare VEC, that the application for planning permission for the new school has been lodged with Kildare Co Co, which edges the project closer to a conclusion.'

'In 2006, following a meeting I had with the then Minister for Education, Mary Hanafin, her Department gave approval for the new school for Celbridge, a year ahead of the proposed date for approval, which eased the pressure for school places. This has significantly improved the capacity for primary school places in Celbridge and has improved the educational infrastructure in the town.'

'The school is currently located adjacently to Celbridge GAA. I would like again like to compliment all those involved in process to date, and I will continue to maximise the pressure on the Department and Kildare VEC to bring the project to its next stage, as soon as possible.' concluded Minister Brady.

Fianna Fail TD for Kildare North and Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick. "New regulations will see new rights for shareholders as they access company information. Shareholders will now be able to vote at general meetings electronically so they can participate without being present."

"The new regulations are designed to increase the understanding, activism and engagement of shareholders with the companies that they own by increasing transparency and making shareholder participation simpler."

"The regulations will also oblige companies to answer shareholder's questions at general meetings, oblige them to public documents and information regarding a general meeting on their website including the votes taken; allow shareholders representing at least 5% of the voting shares to call a general meeting; allowing shareholders representing at least 3% of the voting shares in a company the right to put items on the agenda and table draft resolutions for a general meeting and strengthening shareholders' rights in relation to the appointment of proxies at general meetings."

"The new regulations will apply to companies that have their registered office in the State and whose shares are admitted to trading on a regulated market situated or operating within the EU."

"This is good news for shareholders as it will increase their rights in the companies in which they hold shares and compel companies to be more open and transparent in their dealings with their shareholders," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

### School Grant Increases

Recent remarks on the withdrawal of the book grant in some schools conveniently ignore the **increases in funding** for the day-to-day running of schools announced in last year's Budget.

These increases give schools greater flexibility in how they use their funding.

In giving each school one grant instead of a number of separate grants for different purposes, each school now has total flexibility on how to use it.

The Department, through a formal circular to schools, has made it clear that capitation funding can be used to

provide school books where it's a priority for the school.


The increase of  $\in$ 21 per pupil brings the grant to  $\in$ 200 per pupil and means that primary schools are getting more funds this year than last year.

The capitation grant for post-primary schools was increased by  $\in$ 14 per pupil bringing it to  $\in$ 345 per pupil.

In addition, the ancillary services grant for primary schools has been increased to  ${\in}155$  per pupil.


Taken together, these increases mean that primary schools eligible for the full ancillary services grant receive  $\in$ 355 per pupil - or almost  $\in$ 25 extra - in this school year to cover their day-to-day running costs.

Voluntary secondary schools will get an increase in the school services support grant of  $\in$ 8 per pupil bringing it to  $\in$ 212 per pupil.

# The Story of Halloween

Schemen is one of the oldest holidays with origins going back thousands of years. The holiday we know as Halloween has had many influences from many cultures over the centuries. 

As they danced around the the fires, the season of the sun passed and the season of darkness would begin.

When the morning arrived the Druids would give an ember from their fires to each family who would then take them home to start new cooking fires. These fires would keep the homes warm and free from evil spirits. The November 1st festival was called Samhain (pronounced "sow-en"). The festival would last for 3 days. Many people would parade in costumes made from the skins and heads of their animals. This festival would become the first Halloween.

During the first century the Romans invaded Britain. They brought with them many of their festivals and customs. One of these was the festival know as Pomona Day, named for their goddess of fruits and gardens. It was also celebrated around the 1st of November. After hundreds of years of Roman rule the customs of the Celtic's Samhain festival and the Roman Pomona Day mixed becoming 1 major fall holiday.

The next influence came with the spread of the new Christian religion throughout Europe and Britain. In the year 835 AD the Roman Catholic Church would make November 1st a church holiday to honour all the saints. This day was called All Saint's Day, or

Hallowmas, or All Hallows. Years later the Church would make November 2nd a holy day. It was called All Souls Day and was to honour the dead. It was celebrated with big bonfires, parades, and



people dressing up as saints, angels and devils.

But the spread of Christianity did not make people forget their early customs. On the eve of All Hallows, Oct. 31, people continued to celebrate the festivals of Samhain and Pomona Day. Over the years the customs from all these holidays mixed. October 31st became known as All Hallow Even, eventually All Hallow's Eve, Halloween, and then - Halloween. The Halloween we celebrate today includes all of these influences, Pomona Day's apples, nuts, and harvest, the Festival of Samhain's black cats, magic, evil spirits and death, and the ghosts, skeletons and skulls from All Saint's Day and All Soul's Day.

### Halloween

Halloween is here again this year so be aware of this scary night.

As soon as the darkness draws near, many spirits will drool with their fright, Strange faces will call

to each door looking for apples and nuts at their fill, These little monsters we




How to make it:

What you'll need: Cardboard Dark turtleneck or sweatshirt hoodie Dark leggings Two dark socks or dark knit gloves Construction paper or fabric (to match colour of turtleneck and leggings)	Plastic headband Pencil (to draw cat ear patterns with) Scissors Tacky glue or hot glue gun Long socks Large safety pins Craft paint or markers, optional Face paints or makeup

Draw cat ears on the cardboard. Cut out the ears. Cover with construction paper or fabric using glue. Attach the ears to the plastic headband. It might be helpful to have a bent "tab" built into the ears before gluing, so that they stay attached and perky!





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## **Editorial-November**

In these days of difficult economic circumstances it is heartening to hear that there is some good news for the town of Maynooth. Plans are in train for a Youth Café to be located in the town. This is accompanied by the news that the Scouts are interested in developing and looking after the Geraldine Hall: they will also make the Hall available to other community groups if these plans go ahead. Both these issues were discussed and welcomed at the recent Community Council Meeting. Another important, and related, event was the Community Gathering on suicide prevention that took place on October 10th in the Glenroyal Hotel. It is absolutely essential that the Teen Café development goes ahead to give the teenagers of Maynooth a focal point in which they can meet, socialise and discuss their lives and problems. Because of the downturn in the economy the development levies that were gathering when huge expansion was taking place have now dried up and many of the related plans have been put to one side.

By the time the Newsletter goes to print the expected visitors from Canet en Rousillion, who are interested in twinning, will have come and gone to Maynooth. There have been many plans in the past to twin the town to similar town abroad and perhaps this will come to fruition.

The ongoing sagas of FÁS and the Ceann Comhairle over the past number of months did not stop the Green Party from propping up the Coalition Government. This is despite the fact that there is no commitment in the agreement between the parties not to tax the most vulnerable in society. The Greens have dragged an agreement from Fianna Fáil not to bring in fees for third level education but there is no commitment not to raise the registration fee that now stands at approximately €1,500. This will continue to climb and will replace the deferred fees. The heads of the Universities are generally in favour of the re-introduction of fees for students but how this will benefit the colleges is difficult to understand. Surely, if fees are re-introduced, the Government will simply take away completely the subsidies paid per student to the Universities. If students pay fees, they will also demand a much higher level of services from the different institutions. In view of the fact that these same heads of Universities who refused to take a cut in their salaries – it is surprising that the student population is not more vocal and protesting loudly at the cuts taking place in the Universities throughout the country. Perhaps they realise that protesters are simply ignored in Ireland, whether they are right or wrong.

## Maynooth Community Council Notes

## Maynooth Community Council meeting 12 October 2009

Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

#### Maynooth Teen Café

Labour Party County Councillor John McGinley told the meeting that Tesco Development Phase 2 was unlikely to be completed before 2011/12 and that the promised community-use premises would not become available till then. However, suitable premises for a new Teen Café/Youth Centre in Maynooth had now been found in the town centre. Some funding was available for this project, and many members of the community have expressed an interest in helping to establish the Café.

John is setting up two committees of people willing to become involved, one of adults and one of teenagers, and anyone interested in helping is invited to join in. The meeting welcomed this development and agreed to set up a Community Council sub-committee to work on this issue. Facilities for teenagers have been particularly lacking in Maynooth for many years, and the Youth Café initiative ties in, in a very timely way, with the present initiatives on the promotion of positive mental health among young people.

#### **Ongoing Community Response re. Mental Health Promotion and Suicide Prevention**

Community Council PRO Deirdre Cullen reported that the 'Community Gathering' promoting positive mental health and suicide prevention among young people in North East Kildare, held on 10 October, was very successful.

Presentations were made by Craig Hodges, Headstrong, on the Australian experience, and by Fr. John Dunphy and Kay Healy, North Clondalkin Community Action on Suicide Group, outlining how the community responded to a perceived rise in suicides among young people in Clondalkin, and the role that drug abuse plays in the mental health of young people in that area. The workshops included an interesting discussion of a 'peer-mentoring' scheme for young people in Athboy, and a discussion of the Social Personal Health and Education programme in schools. Feedback on this last topic suggested that parents needed to be more informed about this programme so as to be able to have a positive input, and that the course might be 'revamped' so that young people would engage with it more seriously.

What happens next, how this positive-mental-health-promotion initiative goes forward, is up to all of us in the community, as well as to professionals working in the field—we all need to work together. The Community Response Sub-Group, which organised the seminar, will meet later this month, and hopes to draw members of the wider community into the initiative. Meanwhile, anyone interested in becoming active in this initiative can leave their contact details at the Maynooth Community Response Sub-Group, along with many other organisations, and plans to set up a working sub-committee on this issue in the near future.

#### **Crime and Anti-social Behaviour**

Maynooth Community Council Chairperson Colm Ó Cearúil reminded the meeting that, following concerns expressed by many community councillors, the Community Council wanted to take an initiative on the issues of crime and anti-social behaviour in Maynooth. Councillor John McGinley pointed out that there is already a Safety group working on these issues in Maynooth. It was decided to invite this group to a Community Council meeting in the near future, with a view to assisting them and collaborating with them in the future.

#### Visit of Town Councillors from Canet en Rousillion, France

Colm Ó Cearúil reported that a delegation of Town Councillors from Canet en Rousillion, in France, would be visiting at the end of the month, with a view to twinning their town with Maynooth. This delegation is particularly interested in education, sport and tourism.

#### **Rathcoole Community Council Incinerator Campaign Fund**

Secretary Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin told the meeting that Rathcoole Community Council had written to Maynooth Community Council seeking financial assistance towards the legal fees they have incurred in their successful appeal to An Bord Pleanála against a proposal to build an incinerator in their area. They pointed out that nearby areas such as Maynooth have been protected against poisonous emissions and dioxins by their action. It was decided that the Community Council executive would see what could be done to assist Rathcoole in some way.

## Maynooth Community Library Maynooth Film For All

Maynooth Film for all Club's next film is The Lemon Tree and takes place @ 7.45 in John Hume Lecture in NUI Maynooth on 4th November. This is a multifaceted drama straddling the Palestinian- Israeli divide that's full of irony, generosity, anger and pure crow-pleasing optimism. Winner - audience Award, Berlin International Film Festival 2008.



# Go See The Book of Maynooth!

The handwritten book of Maynooth is currently on display in the Maynooth Community Library. The Newsletter will feature some of the writings and images from the book over the coming months.

The concept of the Book of Maynooth was originated by the late Stuart Lane of Kilcock early in the year 2000. The idea, based on The Great Book of Ireland (1991), was to create a single handwritten book which would contain a representative collection of poems and other writings by authors from the area together with examples of work of local visual artists.

Stuart Lane together with John Conroy and Hilda Dunne headed up the committee which included well know local writer Mary O'Donnell and poet Ann Egan.



The authors were required to handwrite their work on a piece of vellum that and was later bound in high quality leather at Marley Park.

The Newsletter would like to thank Stuart's family, John and Hilda as well as Caoilfhionn Murphy (local artist) for giving us permission to reproduce the writings and artwork in the book.

The inclusion in the Newsletter brings renewed attention to the book that may encourage people in the community to go and see the book to get a proper sense of not only its literary content but also the workmanship and visual beauty of the item itself.

This months feature "A Last Ride Through The Hill Field 1904", a true story written by Hilda Dunne concerning her aunt's journey from Ladychapel to Maynooth to join the Presentation Convent at Maynooth.

## Book of Maynooth

## A Last Ride Through The Hill Field 1904

Elizabeth looking out the window of the bedroom she shares with her sisters, felt the heat rising towards her from the cobble-stoned farmyard, outside the byre, the cats lay stretched out, replete after the dishes of warm milk which paddy the cowman gave them daily after milking.

The swallows dive bombing them were ignored, but the felines mood would change as they got hungry and small piles of feathers in the corners of the barn told their own tale. She crosses the landing, passing her parents room where she and her siblings were born, moved down the stairs past the grand-father clock which has boomed in the births and deaths of generations of her family.

She paused to stare into the drawing room where mama played the piano on winter's evenings, then into the front parlour where visitors were received before running down the back hall, towards the pantry where gleaming preserving pans stood on their edges on the shelves, into the kitchen where a black leaded range gleamed radiating heat all year. The coal it burned came by train from Dublin to Maynooth, then by horse and cart. Looking into the back parlour which served as a school room, Elizabeth remembered her early schooling before heading off to boarding school and the happy hours she spent playing with her youngest brothers Frank, four years and Ebbie five years and if mama was away bringing the couple of foxhound puppies in to join in the fun.

In the outer farm yard she collected a bridle from the coach house and went into the stables, her grey mare "Cratloe Castle" whinned with delight when she saw her mistress, who then led the animal out and in to the Chapel fields. She leapt astride instead of side saddle, coaxing her into a canter and then galloped in full flight, Elizabeth with her long fair hair billowing out behind, sailed over the ditch and down the hill field, knowing Mama if watching, would have a fit at the sight of her daughter taking such liberties. Two hours later Elizabeth was sitting with Mama & Papa in the pony and trap on her way to join the local convent an enclosed order where she would spend her life teaching the local children.

It would be forty-four years before she saw her home again when John Charles, the Arch Bishop lifted the ban enclosing the order; in that time the Copper Beech Trees grew to maturity, her parents and some of her siblings had died, and she only three miles away never got to say good-bye to them when they were laid to rest at Lady Chapel Grave Yard.



# eek, Onion and Potato Soup

#### Ingredients:

- 4 large leeks
- 1 medium onion, chopped
   small
- 175 g Frozen Mashed Potato
- 1 oz (25 g) butter
- 11/2 pints (850 ml) stock,
- 10 fl oz (275 ml) milk
- salt and freshly milled black pepper



Begin by trimming the leeks, discarding the tough outer layer. Now split them in half lengthways and slice them guite finely, then wash them thoroughly in two or three changes of water. Drain well. In a large, thick-based saucepan, gently melt the butter, then add the leeks, onions and potatoes, stirring them all round with a wooden spoon so they get a nice coating of butter. Season with salt and pepper, then cover and let the vegetables sweat over a very low heat for about 15 minutes. Add the stock and milk, bring to simmering point, cover and let the soup simmer very gently for a further 20 minutes or until the vegetables are soft - if you have the heat too high the milk in it may cause it to boil over. Put the whole lot into a blender. Leave it to cool a little first, and blend to a purée. Return the soup to the saucepan and reheat gently, tasting to check the seasoning. Add a swirl of cream or crème fraîche before serving and sprinkle with freshly snipped chives or parsley.

## rísh Stew

#### Ingredients:

- 1-11/2 kg neck or shoulder of lamb
- Bouquet of parsley, thyme and bayleaf (tied together with twine)
- 3 large onions, finely chopped
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 3-4 carrots, chopped into bite-sized pieces
- 1 small turnip, chopped into bite-sized pieces
- Some small new potatoes, peeled and quartered, or large potatoes, peeled and chopped
- 75-100g cabbage, shredded
- Finely chopped parsley and dash of Worcester Sauce

#### Method:

Remove the meat from the bone, trim off all the fat and cut into cubes. Keep the bones, place the meat in a pot, cover with cold salted water. Bring to the boil, drain and rinse the lamb.

In a fresh pot put the meat, bones, bouquet of herbs, onions, seasoning, carrots, leeks and turnip and cover with water. Simmer gently for one hour. Skim off the foam as it rises. (This is very important for the final flavour and appearance of the stew.) Add the potatoes and continue cooking for 25 minutes. For the last 5 minutes add in the cabbage. When the meat and vegetables are cooked remove the bones and bouquet for herbs. Stir in the chopped parsley and a dash of Worcester sauce. Serve in deep bowls with soda bread.



#### Ingredients:

- 675g / 1 1/2 lbs Autumn Fruits (cooking apples, blueberries, etc.)
- 175g / 6oz Self Raising Flour
- Pinch of Cinnamon
- 125g / 4oz Margarine (at room temperature)
- 125g / 4oz Light Brown Sugar
- 2 Eggs
- 4 tablespoons Cold Water
- Sugar to sweeten fruit

#### Method:

Preheat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas 5. Lightly grease an ovenproof pie dish.

Peel, core and slice apples. Mix the fruit used and place in the prepared pie dish; sweeten with sugar.

Put the remaining ingredients into a large mixing bowl and using the "all in one" method, beat all ingredients together until smooth.

Spread over the fruit and bake until nicely risen and golden brown, about 40 minutes. Serve hot with custard, cream or ice cream.

## **Kylie Minogue**

Wie Ann Minogue was born on the 28th of May 1968 in Melbourne Australia. She is an Australian pop singer, songwriter and actress. After beginning her career as a child actor on Australian television, she achieved recognition through her role in the television soap Neighbours, beginning her career as a recording artist in 1987. Her first single , "Loco-Motion " spent seven weeks in the Australian single charts and became the highest selling single of the year. She was the first child of Ronald Charles and Carol Ann Jones. She has one sister Danni also a singer and actress and one brother called Brendan who works as an news cameraman.



Her singles were well received but after four albums her record sales were declining and she left Stock, Aitken & Waterman in 1992. Minogue returned to prominence in 2000 with the single "Spinning Around" and the dance-oriented album *Light Years*, and she performed during the closing ceremonies of the 2000 Sydney Olympics. Minogues' breast cancer diagnosis in 2005 led to the postponement of the remainder of her "Showgirl" — The Greatest Hits Tour and her withdrawal from the Glastonbury Festival. Her hospitalisation and treatment in Melbourne resulted in a brief but intense period of media coverage, particularly in Australia, where the Prime Minister issued a statement supporting Minogue.

On July 8 2005 she made her first public appearance after her surgery, when she visited a children's cancer ward at Melbourne Royal Children's Hospital. She returned to France where she completed her chemotherapy treatment at the institute of Gustav-Roussy in Villejuif near Paris. In December 2005 Minogue released a digital –only single, "*Over the Rainbow*", a live recording from her "*Showgirl*" Tour. Her children's book, "*The Showgirl Princess*" written during her period of convalescence, was published in October 2006, and her perfume, "Darling" was launched in November.

## 2006-present Showgirl : The Homecoming Tour, X and Kylie X2008.

In November 2006, Minogue resumed her *Showgirl* :The *Homecoming Tour* with a performance in Sydney. She had told the journalists before the concert that she would be highly emotional, and she cried before dedicating the "*Especially for You*" to her dad a survivor of prostate cancer.

In February 2007, Minogue and Olivier Martinez announced that they had ended their relationship, but remained on friendly terms. Minogue was reported to have been saddened by false accusations of Martinez disloyalty. She defended Martinez, and acknowledges the support he had given during her treatment for breast cancer, commenting " he was always there, helping with the practical stuff and being positive. In late September 2008 Minogue made her Middle East debut as the headline act at the opening of Atlantis. The Palm, and exclusive hotel resort in Dubai, and from November, she continued with her *Kylie 2008* Tour , taking the show to cities across South America, Asia and Australia. The tour visited 21 countries, and was considered a success, with ticket sales estimated at \$70,000,000.

She hosted the 2009 *Brit Awards* on 18 February 2009 with James Corden and Mathew Home. She is scheduled to embark upon her first North America tour, which will include shows in the U.S. and Canada during September and October 2009.

Minogue has been inspired by and compared to Madonna. In January 2007 Madame Tussaud's in London unveiled its Fourth waxwork of Minogue, only Queen Elizabeth 11 has more models created. On 23 November 2007, a bronze statue of Minogue was unveiled at Melbourne Docklands for permanent display. Kylie always shines at what she does and she is a wonderful symbol of our modern times.







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



## November in the Garden

## Perennials, Annuals, and Bulbs



Pot up some Spring flowering bulbs for indoor colour during the winter. Store the pots in a cool, dark place, until new growth emerges from the soil, and then move them to a bright window.

Continue to watch for insect or disease damage and take the necessary steps to control the problem.

#### Make leaf mould

Most leaves can be turned into leaf mould, but some take longer to compost than others. Oak, alder and hornbeam will soon rot down, while sycamore, beech, horse chestnut and sweet chestnut take a little longer. Leaves from conifers and evergreen plants will take between two and three years to compost and are best added in small quantities only, shredding them first to help speed up composting.

If you only have a small garden, you can save them in bin liners, but if you have the space - and a lot of leaves to collect - try building a leaf bin.

## Prepare the greenhouse for winter

Before the winter sets in, clean the exterior of the greenhouse by washing the panes of glass with warm water and a sponge.

## Minding our feathered friends

If you're a bird lover, one of the best things that you can do to help wild birds through a difficult winter is to provide a source of fresh water in freezing conditions. When temperatures plummet, it can be



difficult for wild birds to find a source of water. If you keep a plastic sheet in your birdbath to help you remove frozen water and replace it regularly with fresh, the birds will find it.

Many people like to supplement their garden birds' diet with extra food – especially in the winter. This can be a real life-saver in harsh weather. What benefits the birds also benefits the human inhabitants of the house, by the addition of beautiful wild creatures and hours of entertainment.

There is also an important knock-on effect for the organic gardener – birds will get used to searching for food in your garden and will search for greenfly, caterpillars and snails during the rest of the year.

Make sure that the canes of your climbing roses and other vining plants are securely

fastened to their supports. Winter winds can whip and severely damage unprotected plants. Don't tie them so tightly that the string or twist-tie cuts into the stem. I recommend using a length of an old nylon stocking because it will stretch as the plant grows, rather than cutting into the stem, as string will do.

Mound five to six inches of soil around the bases of your hardy fuchsias and roses. Use soil from another part of the garden, rather than risking damage to the roots by digging around the base of the plant.

Cut Chrysanthemum stems to 2-3 inches from the soil once they have begun to die back.

## Fruits and Vegetables

Cut the tops off your asparagus plants, and add a winter dressing of aged manure to the bed.

Cover strawberries two inches deep with hay or straw.

Secure your raspberry canes to stakes to protect them from being whipped by the wind.

#### Lawns

If you haven't already applied an Autumn or Winter type of lawn fertilizer (20-9-9), now is the time to do it. This encourages good root development and helps improve the colour of the lawn. Lime can also be applied, if needed.

Give your lawn a good raking to lift away accumulations of debris.

Keep leaves raked from the lawn. They should be composted. Alternatively, you can just mow over them, turning them to a mulch which adds important nutrients back to the lawn.

## House Plants

Winter heating dries the air out in your home considerably. Help your house plants survive by misting them or placing the pots on a pebble filled tray of water to ensure adequate humidity and moisture.

# FLOWER ARRANGING Using Floral Foam Effectively

C hoose the right foam for the flowers you are using. Generally, green waterretaining foam is for fresh flowers and foliage, whilst the brown stiffer foam is for dried or artificial flowers.

Always soak your foam in a bucket or large bowl - never under the tap as this can leave dry spots inside the foam which can't be detected from the outside. This can cause stems to wilt. Fill your bucket or bowl with fresh water, then drop the foam onto the water. Allow it to take up the water naturally (this takes only around 20 seconds for today's modern foams). Do not push the foam under the water. When the top of the foam is level with the surface of the water, take it out immediately and allow it to drain. Over soaking can cause the foam to break up in use.



For traditional arrangements, always cut your floral foam so that it is about 1" higher than the rim of your container. This allows plant material to be arranged more naturally, with some stems flowing down to the sides and front of the arrangement. If the foam is level with the rim of the container, then you can only arrange your stems sticking upwards, resulting in a stiff, unnatural look.

When pushing stems into the foam, make sure that the bottom of the stem stays in contact with it. This means that if you push a flower in too far, don't just pull it up, as this will leave an air-pocket under the stem, causing it to wilt. Always start another hole.

Keep the foam supplied with water daily. Plant material uses the water stored in the foam, and once this has dried out, the flowers will wilt.

When using anchor tape to secure your foam into position, try squeezing it together as it passes over the foam - this will make it narrower and give you more room on the foam. How many times have you tried to insert a stem, only to find tape?

If your floral foam fills the rim of the container, there will be no room to add water without it spilling over the edge of the container. You can get round this by cutting a V shaped notch in the foam before inserting it into the container. It will then be easy to pour water into the notch without it spilling over.

Although it's tempting, never re-use foam. If your foam already has holes from a previous arrangement, then you could be putting your stems into thin air! This will create an air lock under the stem, causing it to wilt.

If you have soaked your foam, but find you have more than you need, then keep any left over foam in a plastic bag until you need it. Once soaked foam has dried out, it becomes very difficult to soak again. If you're really desperate, then soaking the foam in very hot water will help it to take up the water again.

I have found that the best way to make arrangements with daffodils, tulips, and other very soft stemmed flowers it to cut the flower to the size you require and then press a straw into the stem, then cut the straw leaving enough to press into your foam.,

## ANIMALS IN DANGER OF EXTINCTION

## The Giant Panda

High in dense bamboo forests in the misty, rainy mountains of south western China lives one of the world's rarest mammals, the Giant Panda, also called the Panda. Only about 1,000 of these black and white relatives of bears survive in the wild. Pandas eat almost nothing but bamboo shoots and leaves and used to be able to move quite easily from one mountain top to another in search of food. The valleys are mostly inhabited by people. Pandas are shy and they don't venture into areas where people live. This restricts pandas to very limited areas. The most serious threat to the panda is loss of habitat. Already confined to small remote areas in the mountains of China, much of their natural lowland habitat has been destroyed by farmers, development and forest clearing, forcing them further



upland and reducing and fragmenting their habitat. This fragmentation of habitat is detrimental to the panda's ability to find food.

To save Panda habitat, the Chinese government has set aside 12 nature preserves where bamboo flourishes and giant pandas are known to live. Fragile Panda habitat will be protected from development by people and also from damage caused by cattle, sheep and goats as they graze on any emerging seedlings and trample the thin mountain soil. Efforts are being made to introduce Pandas to new areas not currently occupied by it in order to expand its habitat. Strips of land, called bamboo corridors, have been created to help pandas migrate or move from one area to another. This technique opens more habitat to pandas. When pandas move greater distances to find mates, they can spread their genes further in the population.

## The Mountain Gorilla

Youngsters tumble, climb, and run playing follow the leader. Another group plays a rowdy game of king of the mountain. Several adults watch the action, relaxing nearby. Is this a playground scene at school? No, guess again. It's a lush mountain forest high in the Virunga mountains of Africa, and the playmates are young mountain gorillas under the watchful eyes of their mothers.

Mountain gorillas have been on the brink of extinction for decades. There are just 700 mountain gorillas left in the wild and it is estimated that 200 of those live in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). The other populations live in Rwanda and Uganda.



The situation for mountain gorillas has not improved despite the best efforts of conservation organizations around the world. In July 2007, four mountain gorillas were found slain in the DRC. The rangers who protect the gorillas in the DRC's Virunga National Park have been unable to even visit the gorilla groups in the past three months, as fighting by rebel groups has become too intense. In the past decade more than 100 rangers have lost their lives trying to protect the gorillas and many had not been paid by the government for years.

Saving the mountain gorilla is important, not just because it's an incredible animal, but also because the tourist income can make a real difference to the lives of the people living in the area. Rwanda's main tourist attraction is its mountain gorillas and the money and visitors they attract have helped fuel the country's economy. The communities living near the mountain gorillas protected areas are also benefiting directly.

Dian Fossey, the American zoologist known throughout the world from the movie "Gorillas in the Mist," is credited with the first successful anti poaching efforts in the gorillas' park. Beginning in 1963, she and her staff regularly patrolled the forest and removed snares set to capture antelope and other animals. Although gorillas were not the poachers' main targets, snares often trapped gorillas and they lost a hand or a foot to infection. Fossey's efforts were too successful for her own personal safety, and she made the ultimate sacrifice 20 years after her work began: she was murdered in 1985, presumably by poachers.

- Captain Philip Byrne made his 100th appearance for the Kildare County in all competitions in the sides 1-0 victory over Finn Harps on 21 April 2007 while Alan Byrne made his 100th appearance for the club in the 1-0 defeat to Cobh Ramblers in Saint Colmans Park on October 6th.
- In 2008 Kildare County were to suffer their biggest ever loss and record their biggest ever victory in the space of under a week. The thoroughbreds suffered a 6-0 defeat to Dundalk and less than 7 days later beat Monaghan United 4-0.
- In 2009 Kildare County after losing their licence were allowed play in the First Division in place of Cobh Ramblers on



February 16th. Kildare County were themselves in financial difficulties and were forced to slash the players wage bill in order to survive.

Their worst defeat came against Sporting Fingal who put eight past the hapless goalkeeper in front of a home crowd at Station Road. The final straw for the man in charge came in Century Homes Park

after a 5-1 drubbing to Monaghan who were also winless and only on 1 point before that match.

### Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

#### Question

My working week was reduced to 3 days a while ago and I get Jobseeker's Benefit (JB) for the days that I don't work. I have been informed that the JB payment is due to end shortly. Can I re-qualify for this payment after working a 3-day week for the next 13 weeks? What are my options?

#### Answer

You are referring to the general rule whereby someone who has used up their entitlement to Jobseeker's Benefit may re-qualify by working and paying the appropriate PRSI contributions for at least 13 weeks.

However, in order to qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit you need to have suffered a "substantial loss of employment". When you originally went on a reduced working week you would have satisfied this condition. However, if your employment pattern has not changed during the course of your JB claim you are now classified as a part-time worker for the purposes of assessing any new claim. As a result, the 3 days that you don't work will no longer be regarded as substantial loss of employment, and you will not re-qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit after 13 weeks of part-time work.

Depending on your earnings and your family circumstances, you may be able to apply for Jobseeker's Allowance for the 3 days that you don't work. Alternatively, you may qualify for Family Income Supplement (FIS) which is a payment from the Department of Social and Family Affairs to help people at work on low incomes to support their families.

While you are still getting Jobseeker's Benefit, you may qualify for a place on the new Short-Time Working Training Programme (run by FÁS) and continue to get your Jobseeker's Benefit. The programme allows participants to improve or add to their skills. The training offered is flexible, in order to allow people to complete the courses if they return to full-time work. Places are limited. Contact your local FÁS office.

#### Question

Having lost my job, I am about to apply for Jobseeker's Benefit. As I live in a very remote area, it will be hard for me to travel to sign on every week. Are there any concessions for people in my position? Also, how do I collect my payment?

#### Answer

In general, people claiming Jobseeker's Benefit are required to go to their Social Welfare Local Office once every 4 weeks (not weekly) and declare that they are still unemployed and looking for work. This is called "signing on". The Social Welfare Local Office gives each person a date and a time to sign on each month.

This general arrangement applies to people who live 10 miles or less from their nearest Social Welfare Local Office.

There are special arrangements for people who live over 10 miles from their nearest Social Welfare Local Office. If you live this far away, you may be allowed to sign on every 12 weeks instead.

Your Jobseeker's Benefit will be paid weekly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs, but you do not have to call to the Social Welfare Local Office to collect it. You can collect it from your nearest Post Office each week.



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

When collecting your payment, you must bring valid photographic identification with you, such as your driving licence, your passport or a registration card issued by the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB). Staff working in the Post Office may ask to see your photo ID before giving you your payment.

#### Question

I am setting up my own business and will need to pay self-employed PRSI. How do I register for this? What does self-employed PRSI cover? How do I continue contributing if my business closes?

#### Answer

Up to 2007, people starting self-employment were required to register as self-employed with the Department of Social and Family Affairs by completing form SE3, as well as registering with the Revenue Commissioners.

However, since 2007 it is no longer a requirement to register separately with the Department. When you register as self-employed with the Revenue Commissioners you will automatically be registered for PRSI. You will find information on registering as self-employed (using form TR1) in booklet IT 48 Starting in Business. Both form and booklet are available on www.revenue.ie.

When you are registered for PRSI you will pay at Class S. This class applies to self-employed people, including certain company directors, people in business on their own account and people with income from investments and rents. It doesn't cover you for jobseeker, illness or disability payments, but it does cover you for the following social insurance payments:

- Widow's and Widower's (Contributory) Pension
- Guardian's Payment (Contributory)
- State Pension (Contributory)
- Maternity Benefit
- Adoptive Benefit
- Bereavement Grant

If your business closes and you stop being selfemployed, or if your annual income falls below  $\in$ 3,174, and you are under age 66, you may apply to become a voluntary contributor.

Voluntary contributions give cover for the pensions that you were covered for when you were last working and paying compulsory PRSI. To become a voluntary contributor after self-employment, you must have worked and paid PRSI for at least 260 weeks and apply within 12 months after the end of the tax year during which you last paid PRSI.

#### Question

My parents have been getting the free TV licence, electricity allowance and similar benefits for several years. However, my father died recently. Can my mother still claim these benefits? She is in her early sixties and now lives alone.

#### Answer

You are referring to the Household Benefits Package, which covers a Telephone Allowance worth  $\in$ 26 per month as well as an electricity or gas allowance and a free TV licence.

Since your late father was getting the Household Benefits Package and your mother is aged between 60 and 65, she may now qualify for the Household Benefits Package in her own right by availing of a special concession for widowed people in this age group.

She must be getting one of the following payments:

- State Pension (Transition)
- Widow's/Widower's (Contributory) Pension
- Widow's/Widower's (Non-Contributory) Pension
- One-Parent Family Payment (Widows/Widowers)
- Widow's or Widower's Pension under the Occupational Injuries Benefits Scheme
- An equivalent social security pension/benefit from a country covered by EU Regulations or from a country with which Ireland has a Bilateral Social Security Agreement
- An ordinary Garda Widow's Pension from the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform She may have to produce documentary evidence proving that your late father was getting the Household Benefits Package.

She will have to change the TV licence, electricity and telephone accounts into her own name.



# Maynooth 4-6 Celbridge 3-5

The Maynooth Camogie team successfully defended their Championship title with a superb but hard earned victory over Celbridge played in Donore on Sunday last 27/9/09. It was a game which epitomised all the skills of the game- the highest standard of striking, catching in the air. hooking and blocking and some classic solo runs to boot. Celbridge playing against the wind in the first half settled very quickly into their stride and scored a goal and point within 5 minutes with Sinead Cummins raising a green flag and Nicole McDonagh notching a point from the 30 yard mark. Maynooth midfielder Grainne Hoban helped by some superb work from Stephanie Gavin responded with a fine point from play in the 7th minute. # THEY MADE IT TO CROKER

**The Sabbath** was meant to be a day of rest but before the country had risen from its bed the 99 walkers from Maynooth GAA club had already travelled seven miles.

For the last stretch into Croker he had to carry the boat on his back, where he was joined by Maynooth footballer Paul Flood and his baby's buggy. Flood could have done with a push himself but he had to grin and bear the final half mile of the 15 mile route. When they reached Cross Guns bridge, hurling chairman Aidan Sinnott was basking in the sunshine. "When you've got great legs you should show them off," he said with his trademark Wexford wit. "It's a great day for the club and the community. We had a great chat on the way in – we talked about football and hurling and NAMA."

Speaking of money, the north Kildare GAA club made close on  $\leq 20,000$  from their efforts, each walker raising a minimum of  $\leq 200$ . Club organiser Eamon O'Flaherty was delighted with the event, in particular the efforts of dual star Joe Brennan and club chairman Colm Nolan (the deadly duo also help to manage the club's under-16 hurling team). Brennan, rising late from his bed as usual, had to jog most of the way and Nolan kept him company despite giving away a couple of decades in age.

When Croker came into view the cameras flashed and the crowds roared. RTÉ's Marty Morrissey was assailed by the marching mob, he roared "the Crom Abú" and Pat Nevin knew that his work was done. "Now can I go to work?" asked Morrissey when Maynooth had finishing posing with him. Next up was former GAA president Nickey Brennan.

### "If there's a replay, I'll walk it with ye," he promised.

**Finally,** current president Christy Cooney broke from his hectic schedule, which included a meeting with An Taoiseach Brian Cowen at 12.17 (some watches had him meeting Maynooth at 12.16), and wished everyone well as they negotiated the toughest part of the day – getting home for a pint.

As the great Pat Nevin often says, winners' medals aren't put into your hand they're printed on your heart. On Sunday the Crom Abú walked back in time and proudly felt the hand of history on their chests.

### NEW KILDARE GARDA DIVISION - WORST MANNED GARDA DIVISION IN THE STATE

Deputy Emmet Stagg sought information from the Minister for Justice in relation to the number of Gardai assigned to each Garda Division in the State.

Disappointingly the figures show, stated Deputy Stagg, that the New Kildare Garda Division is the worst manned Garda Division in the State when comparing the number of Gardai per Division on 31st August, 2009, with the population at the time of the 2006 Census. In the response to Deputy Stagg the Minister did state that the Commissioner was in the process of re-aligning Garda Divisional Boundaries to make them coterminous with local authority boundaries. However whilst there may still be some areas of Counties included in different Garda Divisions not associated with their County, the sorry picture portrayed of Garda numbers in Kildare cannot be affected in any meaningful way by the Ministers assertion.

**Maynooth Labour News** 

Here are some examples of Garda Ratio`s to population (Cities Excluded):

These figures show that our Garda Force in Kildare has been systematically discriminated against stated Deputy Stagg. There are Gardai assigned to Counties for Historical Reasons who should be assigned to the Kildare Division. A review of the Kildare and Meath figures shows a very similar problem where there has been massive population growth but little to correct the ratio of Gardai to population levels.

The end result of all this is that Gardai in the Kildare Division are under pressure to deliver a proper service to the Public, a service that is paid for through Taxes.

For many years now Deputy Stagg stated that he had been raising this issue with former Minister for Justice's and Garda Commissioners but it seems that nobody wants to act to reassign Garda to where they are required based on Crime Levels and Population Levels.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would raise the issue further with the Commissioner once more to see if the people of Kildare can get the Policing Service they require and deserve.

## Provision of a Teen Cafe in Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley has been campaigning for a Teen Cafe for Maynooth for some time. John's original intention was to have it in the TESCO community unit granted under the Planning Permission for their new Store. However the downturn in the economy has delayed the construction of this building and it is not now likely to be ready for at least two years.

As we need this teenage facility now more than ever the County Council agreed to Cllr McGinley's proposal to seek an alternative premises that could be used in the meantime. The Council are at a very advanced stage in securing such a premises and it is an ideal location. It is John's view that we need an Adult Committee and a Teenage Committee in order to progress the Project. The Community Council agreed at its meeting on 12 September to set up a Sub Committee specifically for the Teen Cafe and Cllr. McGinley will convene a meeting shortly of those who have expressed an interest. Please contact John if you are interested in developing this facility.

Also, we need a Teenage Committee. If you are an interested teenager or you know of one who may be interested please get them to contact John and he will arrange a meeting where the teenagers can elect their own Committee.

### **Allotments At Blacklion**

As regular readers will know the Council have agreed to Cllr. John McGinley's proposal on the provision of allotments at Blacklion, Maynooth

More details on the allotments will be provided at the December Area Meeting. It is intended to make them available for use next year. John will advise residents of the details through his Newsletter Notes and E mail Distribution List.

### **Provision of Additional Parking in Maynooth**

Cllr. John McGinley was advised at the Area Meeting on 9 October that the Council were actively engaged with an interested party on the provision of additional parking in Maynooth. If this comes to a satisfactory conclusion the Council can then implement a Pay Parking Scheme for the town.

### Provision of a Roundabout or Traffic Lights at the Meadowbrook Link/Straffan Road Junction:

Cllr. McGinley got the following reply to his question asking "What progress has been made on the installation of a roundabout or traffic lights at the junction of Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Link Road?

"A planning application which impacts on this junction has been recently granted with a condition to signalise the junction. Traffic management has had preliminary discussions with the developer in relation to this proposal."

Cllr. McGinley stated that he would prefer a roundabout at this location as we already have more than enough traffic lights in Maynooth. John asked that action be taken without any further delay as it is a very dangerous junction and it is an accident waiting to happen.

Extension of the Bus Service to Moyglare Hall

Cllr. McGinley got the following reply to his question asking "What progress has been made with Dublin Bus in extending their Service to Moyglare Hall Estate, Maynooth?

"I have not yet received a definitive response form Dublin Bus. I will follow up on this matter and brief the members should any progress be made."

John asked that the matter be again taken up with Dublin Bus as they say that they are awaiting a response from the Council.

Maynooth Local Area Plan Deferred

The Maynooth Local Area Plan has been deferred pending the completion of the County Development Plan at the end of 2010.

### STAGG CALLS FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR DISBILITY AND HOUSING ADAPTATION GRANTS

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Housing in relation to the provision of additional funding to Kildare Co. Council to clear the large backlog for Disabled Persons grants, Housing Adaptation Grants for the Elderly and Mobility Grants.

Last May Deputy Stagg stated a sum of  $\in$ 1,870,000 was allocated for such grants to Kildare Co. Council despite the fact that the Waiting List for such grants in Co. Kildare stood at  $\in$ 5,371,000 and involved 587 individuals and families. These stated Deputy Stagg, are very real people who have suffered a disability and need downstairs accommodation, or are elderly people who require stair-lifts or level access showers. Others on the waiting list are elderly people whose (Continued on page 53)

homes require rewiring, central heating or replacement of substandard doors and windows.

It will take at least 3 years to meet existing demands in Kildare which is placing an incredible strain on disabled people and our senior citizens who have a right to live with some modicum of comfort in their homes.

The Minister in his response to Deputy Stagg indicated that he would review the funding position in the event of any under-spend by other local authorities.

Deputy Stagg indicated that he was disappointed with the Ministers response as he clearly does not recognise the crisis facing many elderly and disabled people throughout the County. A special allocation is required to clear the backlog once and for all and he indicated that he intended to raise the mater further with the Minister for Housing.

### STAGG SLAMS HARNEY TREATMENT OF CHILDREN ON HEARING TESTS

Deputy Emmet Stagg again questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the waiting times for Hearing Tests for children in Newbridge and Tallaght Health Centres.

The HSE responding to Deputy Stagg on behalf of the Unaccountable Minister for Health has indicated that the waiting times for hearing tests for children in Newbridge Health Centre (which serves Maynooth) is approximately 13 months and for Tallaght Health Centre (which serves Leixlip and Celbridge) the waiting time is 16 months.

Deputy Stagg has described the waiting times as scandalous when compared with a wait of just 3 to 4 weeks in June 2006 for hearing tests for children. The delay will cause damage to children in their early developmental years and is an attempt by this Right Wing Minister for Health and friend of the Bankers and Developers to effectively privatise the service by forcing already financially stressed parents to seek private appointments because of the delays in the Public Service. It is quite unacceptable for Harney to use children in this way in her quest to ruin Public Health Services.

In view of the shocking treatment of such children Deputy Stagg has indicated that he will be demanding the holding of additional clinics to clear the backlog which has been allowed to build up.

### Disabled Parking Bays at schools.

Michael Fitzpatrick T.D.

By way of a Dail Question, Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick asked the Minister for Education and Science what National and Second Level Schools in Kildare North have disabled parking bays.

In his reply Minister Batt O'Keeffe stated that the Department of Education Technical Guidance Documents require that all new school buildings and extensions are designed to cater for persons with varying ranges of physical ability and to ensure that they are not disadvantaged by design limitations. These guidance documents state that at least one car-parking space, near the main school entrance, should be provided for disabled users and the number of reserved spaces should be in accordance with the Building Regulations and the National Disability Authority guidelines. Parking provision should be as stated in the guidance documents, subject to the planning requirements of the relevant Local Authority.

In the case of older schools, where the school authority is not in a position to provide the required amount of parking spaces for disabled users, application under the Emergency Works Scheme may be made to the Department of Education for funding to provide same.

I would ask Principals to look at the parking facilities at their schools with a view to improving disabled parking.

# Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick welcomes the extended Rural Transport Programme in the Renewed Programme for Government.

The Rural Transport Programme has been extended to every county in Ireland.

The provision of a full-scale transport system in rural areas using the network expertise of Bus Éireann, the physical infrastructure and personal resources of the school transport system and the financial resources currently being spent on transport by the HSE and the Department of Education is to be explored.

"This is a clear commitment in the renewed programme for government to a continuation and expansion of the Rural Transport scheme", added Deputy Fitzpatrick.

### New Scheme of Community Support for Older People to be launched in October.

Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick welcomes the announcement by John Curran T.D. Department of Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs that the Review of the Community Support Scheme for Older People will be completed this month.

In 2009 3,695 people benefited from the Community Support for Older People Scheme and overall 100,000 have benefited from the Scheme since its inception in 1996.

The Review has had in excess of 100 written submissions to date, in addition some 100 Community Groups contributed to the review through a telephone survey conducted by Department of Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs.

The Department Officials also met representatives of An Garda Siochana at national and local level, the Fire Services, Officials of other Government Departments and the Health Service Executive, along with other interested parties. The main priority was to deal with issues surrounding with welfare and security of Older

People and to establish what other measures might be implemented to improve the administration and operation of the scheme.

"I would urge all Communities to support the new Reviewed Scheme for Older People and to ensure the Older and more vulnerable members of our community are fully protected" said Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick.

### <u>Fuel Allowance being paid to customers from</u> <u>this week-</u>Over €400million to be spent on fuel support.

Minister Mary Hanafin has today announced that some 334,000 long-term social welfare recipients are this week set to receive additional weekly payments under the Department of Social and Family Affairs Fuel Allowance scheme. Almost €220million is being spent on this scheme alone in the coming months.

This Government has extended the payment this year by 2 weeks to 32 weeks and also increased the weekly rate by  $\in$ 2 to  $\in$ 20 per week, added Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick. "Customers will see this additional amount in this week's payment and it will continue until the end of April", he added. "We recognise the additional pressures there are on people dependent on social welfare payments during the winter months.

The weekly rates payable are  $\in$ 20 (Fuel Allowance) and  $\in$ 23.90 in Smokeless Fuel areas. The vast majority of people eligible are state pensioners, widows and people with disabilities, who are more vulnerable to the effects of cold weather.

The Fuel Allowance can also be paid alongside the Household Benefits package which provides support for people over 66 years of age and certain other people under that age who are in receipt of a social welfare type payment or fulfil a means test. The Household Benefits package includes the electricity allowance or the gas allowance.

Fitzpatrick welcomes Government efforts to reduce waiting times for Jobseeker claims

Kildare North Fianna Fail TD Michael Fitzpatrick has welcomed Government efforts to reduce the waiting times for those seeking Jobseeker payments.

"There are a number of offices around the country where there are unacceptably long delays in processing claims and the Department of Social and Family Affairs have put a number of measures in place to deal with this."

"The national average processing times are currently 4 weeks for Jobseekers Benefit and just over 7 weeks for Jobseekers Allowance, which is a means tested payment."

"Means testing claims is a detailed and complex process. Waiting times for some offices is longer than the average and this is not acceptable."

"I am aware that there were difficulties when staff were required to change their working conditions and take on extra responsibilities. I know that while some disagreements remain that staff in Kildare are dedicated to the task in hand and I am sure that the remaining dispute will be resolved shortly."

"Since May 2008, some 350 extra staff have been assigned to local Social Welfare offices, new Local Office Support Units and the Departments Inspectorate, 190 have since January 2009.


"Included in these extra staff were 16 Social Welfare Inspectors who were assigned in March 2009 to various locations around the country to undertake means testing and other work associated with processing claims for the jobseekers allowance."

"Local Office Central Support Units have also benefited from an extra 68 posts in 6 locations."

"Local offices around the country have benefited from 110 posts some of which have been filled by temporary staff, pending the assignment of permanent staff. In addition arrangements are also in train to allocate a further 24 Inspector posts."

"I know that the Department will continue to monitor staffing levels and the time taken to process claims. Losing a job is often a difficult and distressing time, particularly for those who have never experienced unemployment. It is vital that we make the system of claiming benefits as speedy and accessible as possible to support those who need it. I will be in touch with the Minister regarding the position in Kildare. I am keen to ensure that local staff be given support should they require it," concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

# The magnificent 10,000 and Intel's cruel blow

On behalf of the activists of the *People's Movement*'s I wish to applaud the No voters of Maynooth who combined with citizens in Kildare North to register in excess of 10,000 votes against Lisbon 2.

Together we refused to bow to the combined might of the Brussels bureaucracy, the supine Irish political establishment, the brash business bosses and the media (with honourable exceptions) who spared no expense and showed no respect for the democratic process in reversing the decision of the electorate in June 08.


Overall, the result cannot reasonably be described as determining the will of the people; rather it represents the fear of the people. Hundreds of thousands of voters went to the polls with heavy hearts and cast reluctant Yes ballots.

Commentators and historians will, in time, collect and analyse all the black arts of politics and constitutional illegalities employed by the Yes side. No doubt their findings will include: the intervention of the European Commission; part funding of Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and Labour by their sister parties in the European Parliament; the Irish Government's unlawful use of public funds; the blatant bias of the Referendum Commission and its reduction to a thinly-veiled arm of Government propaganda; a no-limits spend by Intel, Ryanair and other companies, in possible breach of Irish company and tax law.

Jim O'Hara's thanks to Yes voters: 240 compulsory redundancies in Intel

Although Intel announced these redundancies last July, before General Manager Jim O'Hara's intervention into the Lisbon campaign, the fact that they were immediately imposed within a week of the referendum result was cruelly insensitive. Indeed, implementation meetings between management and staff commenced on the Sunday evening – barely twenty four hours after the official Yes verdict – in direct contradiction to the Yes side's promise that adopting Lisbon would save Irish jobs. It is puzzling that as Intel continues to develop new generation chips it was unable to retrain and re-deploy FABs 10 and 14 staff into growth areas. Given that Mr. O'Hara spent hundreds of thousands of euro on Intel's Lisbon campaign, would this money not have been better spent in staff upskilling? In terms of morale within the company's 4,000-strong workforce the redundancies represent a serious failure of corporate management practice. And in terms of the local community the arrival of significant extra numbers to join the 6,185 already signing on at the Maynooth Welfare Office, these redundancies highlight that beneath the shadow of the Intel Campus north Kildare has now become an unemployment black spot. Thank you, Mr. O'Hara.

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

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# **EDITORIAL-DEC/JAN 2010**

The government must be wondering what they have done wrong to deserve all the bad luck, the country is sinking under the weight of the water and we didn't even qualify for the Soccer World Cup. We all have great memories of previous football campaigns, the feel-good factor, the empty streets as everyone watched the matches, Irish flags everywhere and a united community. But we are living in a very different Ireland now. For many years before the formation of Maynooth Community Council John Read worked with Ted Kelly and Liam Bean to produce a monthly issue of Maynooth Newsletter. Early in the 1970's Maynooth Community Council was set up under the auspices of Fr. O'Higgins, Chairperson and John Barnwell on the Committee as well as John Read, Tom McMullon, Liam Bean and Ted Kelly along with other members of the community. The idea was to secure for the community the use of the Geraldine Hall and the Newsletter was set up. John sold the newsletter outside the church no matter what the weather was like. The Council carried on for a few years but disintegrated when there was no movement or sign of the Hall being handed over. John Read, Leo Bean and Ted Kelly felt that the most important role of the Council was the Newsletter and they dedicated a lot of time and effort into ensuring that events occurring in Maynooth were covered each month.

John Read was a leading member during this period and his efforts shouldn't be forgotten. John was also a founder member of Maynooth Credit Union as well as working with C.I.E. for many years and he was also a member of the Maynooth Badminton Club. John was very involved with the community and served it well.

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# Maynooth Community Council Notes

### Maynooth Community Council meeting 9 November 2009

Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

### **Future of Geraldine Hall**

The proposed handing over of the lease of the Geraldine Hall by the County Council to the Scouts was discussed. There were differing opinions as to the appropriate use of the Hall. Colm Ó Cearúil, Chairperson, was of the view that the Hall should not be given exclusively to the Scouts, and that its use should not be under their sole control. He pointed out that the Scouts would have a 99-year lease on the Hall. The Community Council had, he said, put detailed plans to Kildare County Council a few years previously, proposing that the Geraldine Hall would form the core of a Community Centre and Community Council offices building. This was seen as part of the Action Area Plan adopted by KCC for the Harbour area of Maynooth. Many long-standing Community Council members had understood that the use of the Hall for community and cultural purposes had been agreed.

Councillor John McGinley (Labour), said that had been the original plan for the Hall. But this would not happen now as there were no funds for the Harbour AAP, and he said that all six Local Area County Councillors supported giving the lease of the Hall to the Scouts. Terry Nealon (An Nuada Players) had hoped that the Geraldine Hall would be developed to contain a theatre and arts centre, but said he would support the Scouts' use of the Hall since there was no other money available to restore it. He would have to look elsewhere for a theatre site. Tom McMullon, Vice-Chairperson, said that as a member of the Community Council he had a long-standing interest in the Hall. He would like to see it as a 'Public Forum'. The Scouts were admirable, he said, but he would like to see what was being proposed.

C. Ó Cearúil asked if the 'heritage' part of the Geraldine Hall could be vested in the Community Council, and asked to what extent the community would have use of the Hall. J. McGinley said it would take €100,000 to restore the Hall and the Community Council did not have this kind of money. Peter Garrad (Scouts) said the community could have use of the Hall during the day when the Scouts were not using it.

In response to a query from Deirdre Cullen, PRO, who asked if the Hall would sometimes be made available during the evening, P. Garrad said that the 'heritage' part of the building would be available on some evenings. T. McMullon welcomed this, and D. Cullen suggested that the Local History Group would be one suitable user of the 'heritage' building in the evenings. She asked if the Scouts would be prepared to present their plans and drawings to the Community Council for feedback and comment, before submitting them in a planning application. P. Garrad agreed that the Scouts would present their plans before sending them in.

J. McGinley proposed that the Community Council support the Scouts getting the lease of the Hall. The proposal was seconded by P. Garrad. A vote was taken by a show of hands, and a majority was in favour of the Scouts use of the Hall.

### NUIM to present plans for New Library

Frank Fitzmaurice, Director of Corporate Services, N.U.I.M., will make a presentation at the next Community Council meeting, on 14 December, outlining the proposals for re-development of the N.U.I.M. library and ancillary development works on the Kilcock Road.

### **Canet Twinning Project**

C. Ó Cearúil reported that the Canet town-twinning visit had been very successful and that the Canet visitors were anxious to take the process to the next phase. An ad hoc committee had been working on this project up to now, but a sub-committee would now be set up. H. Dunne (Local History Group) and T. Nealon agreed to join. P. Garrad said there were no scouts in Canet itself but they would help. It was agreed to seek membership and support from the local sports groups: Rugby, GAA, Soccer, and others such as the schools, who might participate in exchanges etc. T. Nealon noted that the lack of facilities in Maynooth was shown up during the visit, and that the visitors asked him where the cinema and theatre were. J. McGinley said that twinning is very expensive and that the sub-committee should check the feasibility of the idea. C. Ó Cearúil said he would seek funding and support from Kildare County Council.

### Parking causing problems at Moyglare Road

Mattie Callaghan (Tidy Towns Committee) said that they had complained to the local KCC engineer, Eilis Murray, about parking on the Moyglare Road near the schools tearing up the verges. Cars were also parking at bollards, making pedestrians have to walk on the road. C. Ó Cearúil said the Community Council had written to KCC asking for a traffic management plan for that area, but nothing had been done. He also said the nearby land opposite Manor Mills was an eyesore. Josie Moore (Senior Citizens) said the Catholic Diocese should buy this land for use as a car park for churchgoers.

# Town Twinning of Canet en Roussillon and Maynooth.

The recent visit by the delegation from Canet to Maynooth was an outstanding success. The community of Maynooth rose to the occasion by showcasing our town and left the delegates with the desire to formally sign the twinning charter between

our two towns in 2010. The exercise reinforced for us the value of all Maynooth has to offer to both residents and visitors.

On Sunday the 25th of October the delegation was welcomed to Maynooth by Mayor of Kildare, Councillor Colm Purcell at an official reception sponsored by Kildare County Council in the Glenroyal Hotel. Speaking in French, Irish and English the Mayor spoke of the benefits of town twinning and how he was pleased to see Maynooth becoming part of the twinning programme enjoyed by most other major towns in the county. A lecture entitled, The History of Maynooth was delivered by eminent local historian Mary Cullen in which she recounted the history of Maynooth from the twelfth century to modern times in an interesting and enlightening manner. The theme of Maynooth and the French Connection was delivered by Mr. Declan O' Connor and

subsequently delivered in French by Ms. Ann Kelly. The Rita Doyle Junior and Senior troupe of Irish dancers delighted and entertained the assembled guests and dignitaries with their exhibition of traditional Irish dancing. A lively and entertaining night of traditional music was provided by local musicians Push for Porter, go raibh fada buan sibh!

On Monday morning the delegates were given a guided tour of the twelfth century Maynooth Castle courtesy of Ms. Catherine O' Connor of The Office of Public Works. We appreciate that the O.P.W. opened the castle especially on a bank holiday Monday and made staff available for the guided tour. We then brought the visitors from the twelfth century to the twenty first century, when Nobel Prize winner and Head of Climatology Research in the National University of Ireland Maynooth Professor John Sweeney showed the delegation the cutting edge technology and methods used by N.U.I.M. in researching climate change. Esquires in the Manor Mills shopping centre a fair-trade café provided refreshments to our guests courtesy of the proprietor Mr. John Dunne. Ms Rita Edwards from the Maynooth History Group explained the significance and history of the millwheel in the context of the Mill in Maynooth. In the afternoon Mr. Bruno Canet who is a member of the Canet fire service took special

interest in the fire drill performed by Maynooth fire service in the Harbour field. A rapport was established between the firemen and after gifts were exchanged a commitment to establish a relationship between the two stations was agreed upon by representatives of both stations. Mr. Paul Croghan

gave a talk on the history of the Royal canal and its influence upon the development of the town. The delegation was most impressed by the playground facilities in the harbour field and especially by the exercise area for senior citizens which they hope to replicate in Canet. Carton Avenue was the next port of call and a viewing of the plague erected by Kildare County Council to commemorate the French Revolution and its influence on subsequent Irish history. The flora, fauna and recreational value of Carton Avenue were examined and appraised. The delegation then had the opportunity to view the magnificent walks and facilities of Carton House in the falling hours of daylight. In the evening a historical tour of Carton House was provided by Mr. Conor Mallaghan where the delegation and dignitaries attended a dinner hosted

by the Mallaghan family. The seal of the town of Canet was presented to the Cathaoirleach of Maynooth Community Council by the Ms. Emmanuelle Garbani de Lacvivier, Councillor Delegate to twinning to formalise the relationship between Maynooth and Canet. Minister Áine Brady congratulated the representative of Maynooth and Canet for bringing the venture to fruition and wished the project every success in the future

On Tuesday morning the delegates were afforded the

opportunity to view and study The Book of Maynooth in Maynooth Library. The Book was written in 2000, to commemorate the millennium and contains works by local writers, poets and artists. The delegates were then treated to a guided tour of St. Patrick's College by Mr. Dominic Mc Namara. The College was built in 1795 for the education of the native population and is one of the jewels in the crown of the Maynooth cultural landscape. We watched with pleasure as the delegation stood in awe, enthralled by the works of art in the College Chapel.



Our visitors were shown the manuscripts housed in the Russell Library and given a demonstration on the precise technique of restoring damaged manuscript paper.

The visitors were duly impressed and were revived by the hospitality and welcome extended by the College. Our busy afternoon schedule brought us to the offices of N.U.I.M. where Professor Jim Walsh, Vice-President of N.U.I.M. explained the composition and work of the University to the delegation. Professor Walsh outlined the future plans for the University and its role in Irish society. The delegates expressed particular interest in the Universities French, Spanish, English, Law, Geography, Information Technology, Research & Development and Sports Departments. Students from Canet attend Perpignam University and the possibility of developing links between the two bodies will be explored. A warm welcome was extended to the delegation by the staff of M.C.C. office. The supervisor of the office Ms. Marie Gleeson spoke of the success of the project and was looking forward to the continued working relationship between our two towns. The flag of Canet was presented to the office as a symbol of the relationship between our two towns. The Maynooth G.A.A. club was the venue for a demonstration of hurling which the delegates found to be most interesting and enjoyable. Ms Hilary McCabe was on hand to educate the visitors on the role of the club in the life of the town and the role of the G.A.A. in the life of the nation. On Monday evening the delegation were permitted to attend a public meeting, with observer status convened by Councillor John Mc Ginley to establish a youth café in Maynooth. It afforded an opportunity to observe democracy in action in Maynooth. The grand finale of presentations was by Mr. Fergus White who explained a visual display of photographs entitled Maynooth through the ages. Ireland's involvement in European affairs during World War 2 / The Emergency was recounted to our visitors in French. In their farewell address the delegation highlighted how grateful they were to the community of Maynooth for such a warm welcome. They stressed how educational and informative the visit had been and that they were looking forward to reporting back to the Council of Canet their positive experience of Maynooth.

I wish to take the opportunity to thank all who helped make the visit a success. When called upon the community of Maynooth rose to the challenge to showcase our town. The exercise had the effect of reminding us of what Maynooth has to offer. The town of Maynooth is now a major urban centre with a population of over 21,000, composed of over 12,500 residents, complemented by a student population of over 8,500. We have matured as a town but we have also matured as a community in that we feel secure enough to give and receive that which is best with our twin town in the south of France, Canet en Roussillion.




"Thank you, Father. 'Tis a very, merry Christmas!"

#### Question

I was made redundant from my job a few months ago and since then I have been looking for jobs but haven't found anything yet. I'd like to do some unpaid voluntary work to keep my skills up. How would this affect my Jobseeker's Benefit payment?

#### Answer

If you want to do voluntary work and continue to get Jobseeker's Allowance or Jobseeker's Benefit, you must apply under the voluntary work option before you start the work. The decision is made by a Deciding Officer in your Social Welfare Local Office. In considering an application, the Deciding Officer will look in particular at two things: whether the work is voluntary within the meaning of the scheme and whether you would continue to satisfy the statutory conditions for getting the jobseeker's payment (which include the requirement that you are available and looking for work).

A number of factors are taken into account when determining whether the work involved is voluntary. These include:

• The aims and standing of the voluntary organisation (they can be national or local voluntary groups)

- The type of work involved
- The weekly number of hours worked

Examples of unpaid voluntary work a jobseeker may do include assisting youth clubs, care groups, church groups, sports groups, cultural organisations and local residents' associations.

When considering whether you continue to meet the conditions of your jobseeker's payment the Deciding Officer will need to be satisfied that you are available to take up employment, if offered it, and that you are making genuine efforts to find work. This applies whether the voluntary work is full or part-time.

To apply, fill in an application form (VW1), which is available from your Social Welfare Local Office.

#### Question

I've been working in Ireland on a work permit but have just been made redundant from my job. Will I be able to apply for another work permit?

#### Answer

If you are working on a work permit and lose your job through redundancy you should notify the Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment and return your work permit. From 28 August 2009 there are new provisions for newly redundant people who were working on a work permit.

#### If you have had a work permit for 5 years:

If you have been made redundant after working on a work permit for 5 consecutive years you no longer need a permit to work in Ireland. You should apply to your local immigration officer who will

issue you with a stamp 4 immigration permission for one year. This permission may be renewed annually and it allows you to take up any employment but not self-employment. (Within the Dublin District immigration officers are based in the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB), and outside Dublin in the local Garda District Headquarters.)

### If you have held a work permit for less than 5 years:

The Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment will allow you a period of 6 months to find another job. When you find another job you have to apply for a new work permit. A labour market needs test is not required. If you were made redundant from a job on the list of ineligible categories you may apply for a new work permit for a job on that ineligible list.

You should contact your local immigration officer to confirm your immigration status. If you have more than 6 months before your immigration permission expires, you can reside in Ireland under your stamp 1 permission for a further 6 months. If you have less than 6 months' immigration permission you can have your immigration permission extended to 6 months which means you will have to pay €150 for a new GNIB card. If you have not found a new job after 6 months you will be expected to leave Ireland. If you then get an offer of employment in Ireland you may apply for a new work permit.

#### Question

What is the Fair Deal Scheme for nursing home care and how does it work?

#### Answer

The Nursing Homes Support Scheme, often referred to as the "Fair Deal", is a new scheme of financial support for people who need longterm nursing home care. It covers all types of nursing homes including approved private nursing homes, voluntary nursing homes and public nursing homes, (such as HSE Community Hospitals and Community Nursing Units). It comes into operation on 27 October 2009.

If you are currently in a **private** nursing home you can opt to continue your current arrangement or you can apply for the Fair Deal Scheme. The arrangements for people currently in **public** nursing homes do not change but new applicants are assessed under the Fair Deal.

There are three steps to applying for the scheme. First of all you apply for a *Care Needs Assessment*. This is carried out by healthcare professionals, for example, a nurse, and will consider whether you can be supported to continue living at home or whether long-term nursing home care is more appropriate.

You must be assessed as needing long-term nursing home care to be eligible for State support. People who are already in nursing homes when the scheme starts do not need to have a care needs assessment carried out.

The next step is a *Financial Assessment*. This looks at your income and assets to work out what your contribution to your care will be. You contribute 80% of your income and 5% of the value of any assets you own each year. (If the assets include land and property the contribution based on these assets can be deferred and not paid during your lifetime. If the assets include your home or, in certain cases, a farm, the deferred contribution based on these assets is capped at 15% or three years of contributions at 5%.) The HSE will then pay the balance of your cost of care. For example, if the cost of your care is €1,000 and your weekly contribution is €300, the HSE will pay the weekly balance of €700. This payment is called State support.

The next step is *choosing your nursing home*. The HSE will give you a list of nursing homes. This list includes public, voluntary and approved private nursing homes. You can choose care in any nursing home on the list provided that the home can cater for your particular needs and has a place for you.

#### Question

What are credited contributions?

#### Answer

If you are an employee, Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) deductions are made from your earnings each week. Your PRSI contributions to the Social Insurance Fund can help you to qualify for social insurance payments, such as Jobseeker's Benefit and State Pension (Contributory).

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

A credited social insurance contribution is a contribution given to you without a PRSI payment. Some social welfare payments, including pension payments, allow you to combine your paid and credited contributions to help you qualify for a social insurance payment.


To qualify for a credit you must have worked and paid at least one PRSI contribution at PRSI Class A, B, C, D, E, or H and have paid or credited contributions in either of the last two completed tax years. For example, if you are applying for credits in 2009 you must have paid or credited contributions in either 2008 or 2007. If there is a gap of more than two completed tax years you must work and pay contributions for a further 26 weeks before you qualify for credited contributions.

Credits are usually awarded at the same rate as your last paid PRSI contribution. Your credits will only help you to qualify for the social insurance payments appropriate to your PRSI Class. For example, if your last paid PRSI contribution was Class A your credits will be for Class A. If however, your last PRSI contribution was at Class B your credits will be for Class B.

You get credits automatically if you are fully unemployed and getting Jobseeker's Benefit. You can continue to get credits if you have used up your entitlement to Jobseeker's Benefit and qualify for Jobseeker's Allowance. You must have paid or credited PRSI contributions in either of the last two tax years to get credits with Jobseeker's Allowance.

Under certain circumstances you may be awarded credits without receiving any payment. This may apply, for example, if you have used up your entitlement to Jobseeker's Benefit and do not qualify for Jobseeker's Allowance. In this case, you can 'sign' for credits (provided you are available and looking for work). You can also continue to get credits if you are taking part in approved education or training schemes.

# Christmas Crafts

#### Fresh Pine Centrepiece

S f you're lucky enough to have a pine or spruce tree, you may be able to trim enough branches to make these beautiful pine centrepieces for almost no cost. Fresh boughs can also be found where Christmas trees are sold, or at craft stores and garden centres.



Material:	
Container for centrepiece (bowl, planter, etc)	Floral wire
Floral foam for fresh flowers	Candle
Candle holder ( any sort will do)	Waterproof glue
Fresh Pine and Spruce branches	Faux Snow or white paint & Paint Brush

Glue the floral foam to the centre of your dish. . Allow the glue to dry completely. Place your candle holder in the centre of your foam and add enough water to completely saturate the floral foam.



Glue the floral foam to the centre of your dish. You could use a regular glass soup bowl about 11 inches wide. Allow the glue to dry

completely. Place your candle holder in the centre of your foam as shown here and add enough water to completely saturate the floral foam.



Begin inserting pieces of pine as shown at right, beginning at the outside edge of the foam and working your way toward the centre until you reach about one inch from the outside of your candle ring.

With the empty space surrounding your candle holder, insert small pieces of spruce staying far enough away from the candle holder (about a quarter inch) so that you can easily lift your candle holder out of the piece and re-insert it. Add any springs of pine or spruce throughout the arrangement to cover any hollow areas.

To add pine cones to your arrangement, simply wrap floral wire around the bottom of your cone, and twisting the wire to secure it to the cone. Leave enough excess wire so that you can insert the wire into the foam. Refer to the photos for placement of pine cones. Half of the pine cones used in each arrangement has white snow added to the edges of the cones. To do this, simply paint on a little faux snow (white paint works too) along the edges of the pine cones.

Add a few Berries or simply add a few artificial floral leaves. Place your candle in the holder and you're all done.

This arrangement costs very little to make and make s a wonderful gift.

### December in the Garden

#### Go Green with your Christmas Tree

The use of evergreens to decorate homes dates back to pagan times, when they were considered to be a symbol of eternal life. They were used as decoration during the winter solstice, a celebration of light and rebirth. This year, consider purchasing a living Christmas Tree for your home. They really aren't that much more expensive than a cut tree. This is an excellent way to improve your landscape, and at the same time, save a tree. Before bringing a living tree into the house, water it thoroughly. Living Christmas Trees should not be kept in the house for any longer than 10 days.



Acclimatise the tree to being outdoors again for a month.

- Start off with the tree in a sheltered area with some natural light a porch, conservatory or garage and gradually move the tree down the garden to a more exposed area.
- If you have a very large garden and want to plant your tree in a lawn, choose a location in full sun, as this will ensure an even shape to your tree.
- Then dig a square hole, one spade deep. Cultivate the soil, paying attention to creating good drainage.
- Fill the hole and plant the tree on the resulting mound, making sure that the root collar is at ground level, not below this will improve the tree's chances of survival.
- Keep an area up to 1m (3.5ft) around the tree completely weed free mulch with bark. If planted in the lawn, this area should be up to 2m (6.6ft) around the tree.

#### Caring for house plants during the winter.

If ouse plants need varying amounts of water and fertilizer at different times of the year. They need the most during summer when light levels are high and days are long. They need the least during the short days of winter. The primary reason for this is light. Light fuels plant growth. More light allows more growth, which results in a greater demand for water and nutrients. When light is limited, the need for water and nutrients decreases dramatically. Therefore, it becomes easy to overwater and over fertilize during the winter months. Excess water and fertilizer can kill a plant by damaging the root system.

Overwatering can suffocate roots by eliminating oxygen, and excess fertilizer can burn roots.

It is never wise to water on a set schedule. Rather, allow the potting soil to tell you when watering is needed. Check to see if the soil is a moist 1-inch deep by inserting your finger into the potting mix. Don't water unless the mix is dry. Another method of determining when to water is the weight of the pot. Use the former method to determine how light the pot should be before watering.

Another common mistake homeowners make with houseplants is fertilizing during the winter in order to perk plants up. This is the exact opposite of what should be done. Remember it is a lack of light that gives plants the doldrums, not a lack of fertilizer. Therefore, it is best not to fertilize at all during the middle of winter (December-January)

#### Perennials, Annuals, and Bulbs.



f you potted up some bulbs, such as **hyacinths**, **daffodils or tulips**, last September for winter forcing, keep an eye on them. Make sure they remain moist, and in the dark until they have established their root systems.

It is possible that they have already filled their containers with roots and that the new top growth has begun. If this is so, bring them into the house and set them in a cool room, in

indirect light. After a week or so, move them into bright light, and watch them go to town!

### Chrístmas Recípes



#### Smoked Salmon & Avocado Terrines

#### **Ingredients:**

- 450g of thinly sliced smoked salmon
- * 100g of mild goat's cheese, broken into small pieces
- * 3 tbsp snipped chives
- * 3 large ripe avocados, peeled, stoned and finely chopped
- * 3 tbsp lemon juice
- * Sunflower oil for greasing
- * Sweet chilli sauce for drizzling
- * Salad leaves and vinaigrette to garnish

#### Method:

Lightly oil 8 small ramekins. Line with cling film, then the salmon (either 1 large or 2 smaller slices), allowing plenty of overhang. Gently mix together the cheese, chives and avocado with the lemon juice and plenty of seasoning. Spoon into the salmon-lined ramekins, press down, fold over the overlapping salmon, then cling film to seal in the mixture. Can be made the night before, but if making on the day they should be chilled for at least 4 hrs. On the day, gently lift the terrines out of the ramekins using

the cling film, then remove the film. Place the terrines on plates with some baby salad leaves tossed in a little vinaigrette. Drizzle the terrine and plate with sweet chilli sauce. Serve on their own or with toast.

#### All-in-one Fruit Cake Recipe

**Important :** All ingredients must be at room temperature.

- 175g/6 oz butter or margarine, softened
- * 175 g/6 oz soft brown sugar
- * 3 eggs
- * 15 ml/1 tbsp golden syrup
- * 100 g/4 oz glace cherries
- * 100 g/4 oz sultanas
- * 100 g/4 oz raisins
- * 225 g/8 oz/2 cups self-raising flour
- * 10 ml/2 tsp ground mixed spice
- * 2 tablespoons whiskey
- * Makes one 20 cm / 8 in cake

#### Method:

Place all the ingredients in a bowl and beat together until well blended, or process in a food processor. Spoon into a greased and lined 20 cm/8 in cake tin and bake in a preheated oven at 160°C/325°F/gas mark 3 for 1.5 hours until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Leave in the tin for 5 minutes, then turn out on to a wire rack to finish cooling.

#### Mulled Wine

#### Serves 6 - 8

Preparation and cooking times Ready in 10 minutes plus infusing time



#### Ingredients:

		*	4 tbsp Clear Honey
*	1 Bottle of Red	*	3cm piece of Root
	Wine		Ginger
*	150ml Grand	*	chopped
	Marnier	*	¹ / ₂ tsp Whole
*	100ml Brandy		Cloves
*	1 Orange peeled	*	1 Cinnamon Stick
*	1 Lemon peeled		

#### Method:

Slowly heat the alcohols in a large saucepan and gently simmer for about 10 minutes. Add the orange and lemon peels, honey, ginger and spices, then remove from the heat and let it infuse for at least 20 minutes. Before serving, reheat gently, then strain into a jug.

#### Simple Mince Pies

#### Ingredients:

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
- 350g/12oz Cream Plain Flour
  - 225g/8oz Butter (at room temperature)
  - 125g/4oz Golden Caster Sugar
- 1 jar Mincemeat
- 1 small Egg (beaten) optional for brushing
- * Icing Sugar for dusting

#### Method:

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°C/Gas 6. Lightly grease two bun trays. Place flour into a large mixing bowl. Rub in the butter, then mix in the sugar. Bring the mixture together to form a ball! Do not add any liquid, keep bringing the dough together and it will form a ball.

Press small walnut sized pieces of pastry into each section of two patty tins. Put a teaspoon of the mincemeat into the centre. Take slightly smaller pieces of pastry than before and pat them out between your hands to make round lids, big enough to cover the pies. Top pies with the lids, pressing the edges together to seal – you do not need to seal them with milk, egg or water as they will stick on their own! If liked they may be brushed with the beaten egg.

Bake for about 20 minutes until golden. Leave to cool in tin for 5 minutes, then remove to a wire tray. To serve, dust with icing sugar.

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

#### Alternative Christmas Recipes!!!

If like me you suffer from certain food allergies and have to steer clear of certain foods, don't despair as there are many ways of overcoming this either by going to your local bookshop or surfing the internet for information. Here are a few recipes that you might try over the festive season.

# **Broccoli Cream Cheese & Pear and Almond Soup:**

1 x 250g head of broccoli
1 large onion
2 white parts of leek, chopped
40g butter
855ml vegetable stock
150g low fat soft cheese
2 x 15ml spoons fine oatmeal
4 ripe pears
175g toasted, flaked almonds
570ml milk
salt and freshly ground black pepper

1. Trim the broccoli into tiny florets, chop the stalks quite small.

In a large saucepan, melt the butter and add the chopped leeks, onion and broccoli stalks (leave aside the florets for later).

Stir well and leave to sweat for ten minutes. Then add chopped pears.

2. Stir in the oatmeal, almonds and milk a little at a time, stirring well after each addition.

When the milk is stirred in, add the stock and seasoning.

Whisk well and simmer gently for ten minutes. While the soup is cooling, steam the broccoli florets for about 5 minutes.

3. Pour the soup and place the soft cheese into a food processor, and blend until smooth. Return the soup to a rinsed out pan, add the broccoli florets and re-heat gently, adjusting the seasoning.

4. Serve with crusty French bread.

#### **Rosemary Roast Potatoes with Garlic:**

10 medium potatoes4 x 5ml spoons dried rosemary, crushed1 wine glass of olive oil (extra virgin)

4 Garlic cloves, crushed

Scrub potatoes in their skins and cut into four. Steam for ten minutes, then toss in olive oil, rosemary and crushed garlic. Place the potatoes on a warmed baking tray and roast in hot oven for 30 minutes at 190°C/375°F/ Gas Mark 5.

Serve immediately, the outside should be crunchy.

# Chestnut & Chocolate Ice-Cream with Apricot Sauce:

225g bitter chocolate
4 x 15ml spoons maple syrup
225g canned chestnut purée
1.2 Lt. double cream, whipped
2 x 15ml spoons kirsch
3 free range egg whites (optional)
225g whole canned chestnuts in syrup, drained (save a few for decoration)

1. Melt the chocolate into maple syrup, over a pan of hot water. Blend well together and stir into the chestnut purée. Beat in the cream and kirsch. Whisk the egg whites until stiff and then fold into the mixture (optional). Freeze for two hours in a shallow tray covered with foil.

2. Scrape out and blend in a mixer until smooth. Put in a bowl and stir in the chopped chestnuts. Spoon into a mould, cover and freeze for 30 minutes before serving. Loosen the mould by slipping into hot water. Turn onto serving dish, decorate with reserved chestnuts, cut in half, and apricot sauce.

#### For the Sauce:

450g tinned apricots in natural juice 2 x 15ml spoons apple juice concentrate

3. Strain the apricots from their juice in the tin. Place apricots and apple juice concentrate together, and blend in food processor until smooth (should be a runny purée consistency).

4. Serve with ice-cream. Enough for ten portions, small amounts as it is very sweet.

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# **Maynooth GAA News**

#### MAYNOOTH'S FOOTBALLERS WINNING RUN CONTINUES.

A late goal from Pierre Ennis put the gloss on another fine Maynooth victory in the Leinster intermediate championship as a difficult trip to Dundalk on Sunday 22 November, ended with a rather easy 1-8 to 0-1 victory for the Crom Abu against the home side St Malachy's.

Conor Canning was the only scorer in an amazing first half, dominated by the wind, and the winners led by 0-1 to 0-0 at the interval. Maynooth got on top midway through the second, now playing with the breeze and some fine scores helped them build a cushion before sub Michael Fahey set up Ennis for the goal in the  $58^{th}$  minute.

After that victory against St Malachy's Maynooth have home advantage for the final against Westmeath champions, Tubberclair, which was due to be played on Sunday 6 December.

Maynooth completed an historic Kildare intermediate double after the football team saw off Kilcullen on Saturday, 17 November. They won convincingly by a ten point margin, 3-14 to 0-13. It was a double following the previous win last weekend.

Interestingly the same double was also completed 10 years ago in 1999.

A first half goal from Karl Ennis ensured Maynooth led by 1-6 to 0-6 at half-time although Kilcullen were in touch and causing problems but a 32nd goal from Conor Canning, when brilliantly volleyed the ball past Kilcullen keeper Paddy Meagher when Pierre Ennis' handpass put him through although a goal looked impossible. With a six point lead for most of the second half Michael Fahey wrapped things up for the Crom Abu in the 56th minute with a simple goal when Niall Naughton's effort for a point hit the bar and rebounded to the grateful Fahey, who was only on the field a few moments. Fahey added a point before the end to round off an impressive victory. Pierre Ennis picked up the man-of-the-match award after Cillian Carr had collected the Hugh Campion trophy.

#### Pet hazards around the Christmas tree.





# If you are getting a new pet— Please do not get it until after Christmas.



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

 ¶ he secretary of the Community Council, Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin had a book launched on the early literature of Ireland on Monday afternoon, 9th November. Conor Newman, Chairman of the Heritage Council and lecturer in archaeology in NUI, Galway, launched the book entitled, An Introduction to Early Irish Literature, in the John Paul 11 library, National University of Ireland, Maynooth. The librarian, Cathal McCauley, and the Head of the School of Celtic Studies, Dr Tadhq Ó Dúshláine spoke in praise of the book before Dr Ní Bhrolcháin spoke briefly to those present. She is a senior lecturer in the School of Celtic Studies and the event was attended by past and present students as well as colleagues from Galway and Dublin. Emmet Stagg TD was also present. The book is mainly designed for students of the subject, those studying the early Medieval Irish period but it is also suitable for the general public who have an interest in the literature of pre-Norman Ireland. You can learn more about those stories that we heard in school - Cú Chulainn, Finn mac Cumaill, Cormac mac Airt. This exciting and readable book introduces the reader to the wonderful world of early Irish myth and legends. Read about shaman-poets and druids, mythology, the heroic sagas like the Cattleraid of Cooley. Find out about the early festivals, gods and goddesses of the Tuatha Dé Danann and the heroic biography of kings of Tara and heroes - their births, boyhood deeds, how they found their wives and their dramatic deaths. Read about the famous women - goddesses, gueen Medb of Connacht, the tragic story of Deirdre and her lover as well as other worldly visits to strange and wonderful lands and much more.

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### Books By Maynooth Authors



#### B uying a book by a local author or about your local area makes an ideal and meaningful Christmas gift.

It is interesting and heart warming to see that the recession has not affected the literary output of our local writers. In fact I would say that we have seen an increase in such activity over the last few months. I would like to highlight some authors and their works and would like to remind readers that these publications would make ideal Christmas gifts.

One of our local and more senior and long serving community members Peter Cullen has brought out a book on his life before and after coming to Maynooth. The book **"Loughourna to Laraghbryan"** is an interesting memoir. At 83 years of age the author has remarkable powers of recall and has an engaging and relaxed style of telling a story. This book will be of particular interest to those who have been living in Maynooth for a number of years as they will identify with the characters, events and places mentioned.

Maynooth Town Local History Group has two publications which are available in the Maynooth Bookshop. **"Myths and Memories"** gives descriptions and historical backgrounds to the local graveyards in the area, there are more that one would think. Exploring Maynooth is a practical handbook for walkers that describes a range of walking routes around Maynooth including length and time of the walks.

Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin's book **"An Introduction to early Irish Literature"** published by Four Courts Press was launched recently in the JPII Library NUI Maynooth. Muireann who is on the staff of the Irish Department at NUI Maynooth and has been a long time resident of Maynooth, was involved in the setting up and continues to be part of the Community Council. Muireann is also a high profile activist with the Save Tara Campaign. This book discusses the rich written heritage of the Old and Middle Irish period, 600 – 1200, and is suitable for students of medieval Ireland as well as the general reader who wants to learn about the stories, poetry and themes of early Irish literature.

Screenwriter Patricia Groves has written a book entitled **"Petticoat Rebellion".** Published by Mercier Press, the book explores the life of the Anna Parnell and her relationship with her brother. Anna Parnell was an enigmatic character but Groves has successfully brought her to life as well as giving the international and national political context in which



Anna Parnell lived and operated in. Patricia has also made some short movies, check out Trish Groves' webpage at http://www.facebook.com/trishgroves.

Rob Kitchen's book **"The Rule Book"** is a real page turner. Rob is a director of a research institute at NUI Maynooth and has a number of academic publications to his credit. This is his first work of fiction, a whodunit described as a 'police procedural novel' set in and around Dublin. Readers will be interested to note that some of the events take place at Maynooth College.

Martina Reilly has several books and plays to her credit. Most of us will have heard of this author as she has had good media exposure. She is a writer of adult and teen fiction. Her latest offering is **"The Wish List"** an adult fiction with the ingredients of "Love, romance and finding unexpected friends" Martina has been involved in various local drama projects including those of the Nuadha Players. For more information check out Martina and her literary output at http://tinareilly.info/.

For those readers who are interested in the spiritual domain, Lorna Byrne has brought out an autobiography **"Angels in my hair".** Published by Random Press it describes Lorna tells the reader that "she sees angels and spirits; that they are her constant companions". She has received glowing testimonials from such people as Jim Corr, Daniel O'Donnell and William Roche of Coronation Street. Lorna divides her time between Kilkenny and Maynooth.

Another publication worthy of mention Maynooth: **"Irish Historic Towns Atlas"**, produced by Arnold Horner and published by the Royal Irish Academy (1995). This publication would make an ideal gift for those interested in the historical development of Maynooth town. A brilliant source of reference, that outlines the history of the Town, College and Carton, a must for anyone interested in pursuing a local history project. Some other towns covered in the series include Trim, Kildare, Mullingar, Kells and Athlone.

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

## Christmas Craft -How to make a Chocker Necklace

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## Materials Needed

Measuring tape
Scissors
Thick velvet ribbon, 1 to 2 inches wide
Velcro
Hot glue gun
Decorative accessories



- * Measure the width of your neck using a measuring tape.
- * Add two inches to the width of your neck; this is the length you will need to cut the ribbon to make your necklace. Adding two inches is necessary to make sure you have some breathing room in the necklace when you're wearing it.
- * Cut the ribbon to size. Also cut a square about  $\frac{1}{2}$  or  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch in length of the Velcro.
- * Glue one side of the Velcro on one end of the ribbon and the opposite side on the other end. You can also sew the Velcro on if you want to ensure its security on the ribbon.
- * Decorate your necklace by sewing on a , a teardrop-shaped bead pendant or a cameo broach in the centre of the ribbon. You can also use hot glue to affix some burnished crystals or beads.

In 1993 he got fully involved with the G.A.A. Club especially the second team. He was also involved with the Credit Union at this time.



## Update on the Provision of a Teen Cafe in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley acted as conveynor on behalf of the Community Council in calling a meeting of people interested in setting up a Teen Cafe.

The meeting was held in the Glenroyal on 27 October and Cllr. McGinley gave the following address to those in attendance:

"The purpose of the meeting tonight is to elect a Chairperson and Secretary in order to progress the Teen Cafe proposal.

First of all I would like to give you some background information on how we got to where we are on the provision of community facilities in the town.

Around three years ago the Community Council made a submission to Kildare County Council for an Arts Centre and Community Facilities at the Geraldine Hall. This proposal was based on wide-ranging consultation and research conducted by Maynooth Community Centre Partnership, Maynooth Action Strategy, Maynooth Community Council and Maynooth Arts Forum. The proposal catered for a Theatre and Arts Centre, Senior Citizens and Youth Cafe, with Maynooth Community Council being the Anchor Tenant. This proposal was consistent with Kildare County Council's Maynooth Action Area Plan of February '06.

The intention was that the Community Centre would be built by the Developers of the Harbour Area as the community gain for the people of Maynooth. There were five different developers and the Plan was that they would act as one and produce a Five Star development for this central part of the town. Unfortunately one of the developers jumped ship and decided to go it alone with a truly awful proposal that was eventually rejected by An Bord Pleanala.

However, everything was held up for two years and as a result the peak of the Celtic Tiger was missed and there was now no chance of the project being funded by the developers in the short to medium term.

So we had to go to Plan B.

In January '08 the County Council's Planning Department helped to provide a possible alternative venue.

It was a Condition of the Planning for the new TESCO premises that TESCO would provide Unit 16 on the first floor for community use. It is 485 sq.m and the end use of the space would be decided by the Council's Director of Services.

I suggested to the County Council that the space be divide one third for the Teen Cafe and the other two thirds for the Theatre, now that the possibility of them being provided at the Geraldine Hall by developers was no longer probable.

On the 16th July I had a meeting with Director of Services, Peter Minnock and Des O'Sullivan from Kildare Youth Services (KYS) and Mary Haughey from the Health Service Executive (HSE). The intenion of the County Council is to fully involve KYS, HSE and another body called Cill Dara ar Aghaidh in the development and ongoing running of the Teen Cafe.

At the meeting on 16 July last Peter Minnock advised us that the TESCO Community unit would not now be available for use for another two years because of the economic downturn.

*I suggested that we look for an immediate meeting with TESCO to see how we could bring things forward. I made the following suggestions:* 

1. Instead of providing us with the free unit would TESCO develop a Teen Cafe and Theatre at the Geraldine Hall instead?

Would TESCO make available an existing space on a temporary basis for a Teen Cafe? On the 23 July Peter Minnock, Cllr. Senan Griffin and myself had a meeting with two of TESCO's senior people Louise Phillips and Michael Sullivan.

Unfortunately, the TESCO reps stated that my suggestion for the Geraldine Hall was a non runner.

TESCO stated that they would consider my proposal for temporary Teen Cafe on an existing unit further. They made the point that it would have to be fitted out at our cost and then all would have to move to the new unit after a year.

*It was agreed that we would meet again on the 21 September.* 

The other Area Councillors also attended the meeting on 21 September.

TESCO's Louise Phillips stated that the best case senario for completion of the community unit was mid 2011. A TESCO Board decision has to be made before construction can begin. The principle to build is still there.

In order to provide a premises for the Teen cafe in the meantime TESCO considered renting a portacabin but the rental is prohibitive.

It was suggested that we pursue the rental of a suitable premises elsewhere in the town and both Cllr. Griffin and myself contacted estate agents to see what was available. A suitable premises has been identified. It is 2100 sq. ft. and the County Council believe that it would be ideal for a Teen Cafe and because it is so big we might also be able to incorporate a Theatre and Performing Arts Centre. At the Community Council Meeting two weeks ago I proposed that the Community Council set up a Sub-Committee in order to help progress the Project and that brings us to the meeting here tonight.

Also, the good news is that The Scouts are very interested in refurbishing the Geraldine Hall for their use and also for other community groups. They are in direct discussions with the Council's Director of Services, Peter Minnock and your local County Councillors on progressing the Project."

Those present the elected Hugh Gallagher as Chairperson and Deirdre Cullen as acting Secretary. Hugh proposed and it was agreed that a Public Meeting should be held in order to elect as broad a Committee as possible. This meeting is likely to take place in early December and it will be advertised widely.

Extension of Dublin Bus service to Moyglare Hall Estate, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the Area Meeting on 5 November:

"The Transportation Department has contacted Dublin Bus to determine their timescale for the delivery of the extension of their services. A number of civil engineering works required on the Moyglare Road has been identified and a request to the Dublin Transportation Office for capital funding to undertake this work to the benefit of bus passengers in the area will be prepared once a reply is received from Dublin Bus."

Reinstatement of green areas in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update at the Area Meeting on 5 November:

"This work is being carried out as part of the Lower Liffey Valley Regional Sewerage Scheme Network Contracts. A reinstatement plan was drawn up following consultation with Maynooth Tidy Towns Committee and Leinster Cottages Residents Association.

Reinstatement of Pound Park has commenced. The Bandstand has been dismantled and transported to storage. The foundations of the Bandstand have

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been removed. The contractor has started installing the base of the footpath in the park. Over the next fortnight the construction of the footpath and paved areas as well as installation of bollards will be completed. Once the above work is completed a landscaper will carry out topsoiling and seeding.

A price has been received from the contractor for the planned reinstatement of The Little Pound. An instruction has been issued to proceed with this work. The work is currently being scheduled.

The Contractor is scheduled to recommence tunnelling works next week from the drive shaft in the green area outside the main entrance to Maynooth College. Tunnelling will take approximately three weeks followed by manhole construction which will take one and a half weeks. Reinstatement is scheduled to be complete by early December."

# Cllr McGinley again calls for the Traffic Lights at the Glenroyal to be Switched OFF

As most residents will know there was traffic chaos in Maynooth during the first week in November. The Gardai had to take charge of Traffic Control at the Glenroyal/Straffan Road junction because of the inability of the traffic signals to do so. At the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council on 5 November Cllr. McGinley again demanded that the traffic lights at the Glenroyal be switched OFF as they are doing more harm that good. John asked that the North/South pedestrian signals remain. The Council Officials replied as follows:

"There is an identified fault with the wireless communication signals within the town of Maynooth. The repair of this fault has been costed and it is expected that this fault will be repaired this month. It is expected that within a period of 4 weeks the SCOOT system will revert to running to optium effect."

Junction of Greenfield Estate/Shopping Centre with Straffan Road

Cllr. John McGinley's motion to the Area Committee asked:

What is the estimated cost of providing a left turning lane at this busy junction?

He got the following ridiculous reply:

"The Traffic Management Section do not agree that a left turning lane is required at this junction. The provision of a widening scheme for a minor road, cul-de-sac, will involve using private land and will also have a detrimantal impact on pedestrians on the Main Straffan Road needing to cross the widened side road. The needs of vulnerable road users in the are would be considered in preference to users of a cul-de-sac."

As the engineer who gave the reply had obvisouly looked at the wrong junction Cllr. asked to meet him/ her on site.

# ADULT AND CHILD PSYCHOLOGIST SERVICE IN KILDARE ON ITS KNEES

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of Adult Psychologists and Child Psychologists currently employed in Co. Kildare and the number of psychologists who would be required to meet existing demands.

The HSE responding to Deputy Stagg stated that at present there were 9 Psychologists employed but indicated that the numbers required to meet existing demands in Kildare would be 36 psychologists. A further 3 psychologists are to be recruited shortly.

Deputy Stagg has described the figures as startling where we effectively have a service operating at 25% of the level required. In effect the Government is condemning both adults and children to continued distress unless relatives or parents can afford private psychologists. This stated Deputy Stagg is nothing short of scandalous and given the present economic conditions under which people are living the demands on the service are only going to increase.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would raise the insufficient level of service with the Minister for Health further.

# **522 PEOPLE AWAITING ASSESSMENT FOR OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY IN KILDARE**

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of people in Co. Kildare who were awaiting assessment for Occupational Therapy.

The HSE responding to Deputy Stagg on behalf of the Minister indicated that there were 288 adults awaiting assessment and 234 children awaiting assessment for Occupational Therapy.

These figures stated Deputy Stagg show that the Government and the Minister for Health simply do not care about the welfare of people requiring Occupational Therapy. 7 posts remain vacant in the service and the HSE will not recruit additional Occupational Therapists.

Occupational Therapy is a vital component in assisting people to rehabilitate following an accident or stroke and the delay in assessment obviously delays the provision of assistance and their final recovery.

Deputy Stagg stated that he would question the Minister for Health in relation to the failure to fill the vacant posts in the service in Kildare.

#### LABOUR MOTION SEEKING TWO YEAR MORATORIUM ON FAMILY HOME REPOSSESSIONS VOTED DOWN BY GOVERNMENT

Deputy Emmet Stagg has expressed his disappointment at the decision by the Government to vote down a Labour Party Private Members Motion which was debated in the Dail on Tuesday 3rd and Wednesday 4th November, and which sought the introduction of a two year moratorium on family home repossessions.

The motion if passed stated Deputy Stagg would have given borrowers who were making reasonable efforts to meet their obligations to pay their mortgage some sense of comfort given the strained economic times we live in. It would have removed the element of fear for those making serious efforts to pay their mortgages. It would have shown that the Government is not joined at the hip with the bankers and developers who are getting €54 Billion under NAMA. Separately this measure, if it had been agreed upon, could have been a crucial element in securing an agreement for national recovery given the harsh measures before us now which the public are expected to take.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that the very people who drove the Housing Market to unsustainable heights, forced young couples into purchasing overpriced properties, gave developers and bankers a free rein, are now the ones who will not step in and take reasonable measures to protect those making an effort to pay their mortgage. Fianna Fail should be ashamed of themselves for abandoning ordinary people at this time of economic crisis.

#### Dail Transcript of Speech by Deputy Emmet Stagg Wednesday November 4th Labour Private Members Motion Seeking two-year moratorium on family home repossessions

**Deputy Emmet Stagg:** I thank Deputy Ciarán Lynch and the Labour Party for putting this motion before the House.

During the period of financial madness, large numbers of families were forced to purchase their homes 50 miles to 70 miles from their workplaces and communities at high prices. A high percentage of them have recently lost their jobs or businesses and are no longer able to pay the high mortgages on their homes. The finance houses, banks, building societies and sub-prime lenders will take off their sheep's clothing and be seen for the greedy wolves that they are, mercilessly pursuing the home owner for every last penny due. Home owners will be dragged before the courts where their homes will be taken from them and be left then with the further debt arising from the negative equity on their homes.

The Labour Party motion, if passed and implemented, would take the first steps in preventing this inevitable scenario. Last night I listened to the Minister of State, Deputy Martin Mansergh, reading a script outlining the Government's position. I was somewhat surprised the Office of Public Works has taken over responsibility for housing. His speech was pathetic. It refused to accept or recognise the reality of the crisis facing thousands of families whose homes are threatened, instead claiming there was no practice of mass evictions in modern Ireland. It stressed we should be careful lest we upset the banks as it may affect our credit rating.

Either the Government is blind to reality or it could not give a damn about the little people. The Government could find €54 billion to bail out the banks and its friends, the developers and builders. As far as those home owners in trouble are concerned, it is a case of let the devil take the hindmost. For this Government, the home owner with a mortgage he cannot pay is the hindmost and can go to the devil.

Deputy Willie Penrose in a forceful contribution to this debate described the financial carousel that faced the home seeker during our period of financial madness when second-hand council houses could change hands for up to €500,000. Home buyers were faced with the might and resources of the finance houses and developers only to be poorly served by the

surveyors and solicitors they hired. Banks with their sheep's clothing on shovelled money at the home buyers, convincing them to buy now before there was another increase in price.

In one instance I know of in my area, a developer increased the price of houses in one day by  $\notin 20,000$  per unit. The banks sanctioned the extra loans and mortgages over the mobile telephones of purchasers. The response was simply, "Get in quick, no problem with the extra money". I am sure some bank manager got a bonus for that nice deal. The builder certainly did.

The sheep's clothing is off now and we can see the greedy wolves for what they are while the Government says not to disturb the bankers. All of this could have been prevented and avoided. The Government played a key role in creating and magnifying the problem which is now a crisis. If the Government had implemented the Kenny report on building land, thereby controlling its price, regulated the financial institutions and not adopted the McCreevy light-finger regulation, none of this would have occurred. Of course, Fianna Fáil never had any intention of doing so as it would have offended their paymasters in the Galway Races tent. Now the home owner must pick up the tab and is abandoned by the Government. The Fianna Fáil-Green Party Government has been derelict in its duty.

The stark reality is that tens of thousands of families are unable to pay their mortgages. They must be housed somewhere which they can afford. Instead of them swelling the lists for RAS, rent subsidy or social housing, the Labour Party argues the best option is to let them stay where they have already established their homes with their families. In turn, they should be allowed to pay what they can afford and when their situation improves they can resume full payments on their mortgages.

Unfortunately, during our period of financial madness, houses were used as a common commodity to be speculated on, to invest in and to increase the wealth of those already well-off. If the speculators are in trouble now, they will not get any sympathy from me. A home is not just a piece of real estate or property. A home is usually a once-in-a-lifetime purchase where families put down roots and become part of a community. It is where family members love one another and children are born and reared to adulthood. It is the place where members of a family are protected, cared for and can feel secure. A home is a permanent place of shelter, the roof over one's head and the place to where everyone returns. The right to a home is a basic human right. To treat a home as just another piece of property that can be given or taken away at the behest of a financial institution is immoral. It is the denial to that right to a home and shelter. I urge the Government to seriously think again before rejecting this Labour Party motion.

I have a Business in Maynooth for the last ten years called **Maynooth Express Cabs.** I re-mortgaged my house to buy this business and things were good until about two years ago.

I have 45 drivers operating out of my office of which 95% are local people from Maynooth and surrounding areas.

We have a major issue with taxis coming from Dublin, Naas, etc. standing for hire all over the main street and even outside our entrance. I do not have a problem with the Taxis when they operate legal, driving up and down until they are flagged down. On any given night an unofficial rank is set up on the main street, which I have pictures to prove. I have been onto the Taxi regulator and local Garda,

Our business is been effected by this. From January unless something is done we may have to close at 8p.m. every night.

A lot of families will be effected by this including my own. The Regulator says he only has limited staff for the whole country to deal with situations like this.

If they started issuing a fine for  $\in$ 250 they would not be long about covering their wages. The local Garda are on hand trying to do what they can but limited staff is not helping.

## Good news for Kildare homeowners facing mortgage difficulties -Fitzpatrick

## Fitpatrick urges Kildare firms to apply for new jobs support

Kildare firms should examine if they are eligible for a new Government offer to support jobs which are viable but under threat by the current economic challenges, according to Fianna Fáil TD and Convenor of the Oireachtas Enterprise Committee, Michael Fitzpatrick.

"Following confirmation that 435 firms nationwide are to receive support to maintain over 7,400 jobs the Government is now opening up a second round of the scheme. Kildare firms which are considered vulnerable but viable can receive  $\in$ 9,100 over 15 months for each qualifying employee."

It will be managed by Enterprise Ireland which has been working hard to support medium and small sized firms in Kildare and throughout the country. These firms traditionally form the backbone of our economy."

"A special website has been established at <u>www.employmentsubsidy.ie</u> and details of the second round will be made available here in the coming days as well as through Enterprise Ireland offices."

"I would encourage all Kildare companies, especially those who may have not been eligible for the first round, to examine the new conditions and see if they are eligible for a scheme which is aimed at keeping jobs in our communities", concluded Deputy Fitzpatrick.

## Grants under the Scheme of Community Support for Older People recommence says Brady

'Great credit is due to the invaluable work carried out by the local community organisations in promoting and operating the Scheme of Community Support for Older People.' concluded Minister Brady

"The Fair Deal scheme aims to make long term nursing home care accessible and affordable whether in a voluntary, public or private care home and will free families from anxiety over financial commitments for the care of their loved ones." stated Minister Brady who steered the Legalisation through the Houses of the Oireachtas.Noting that an initial 12,000 applications are expected, Minister Brady urged those wishing to avail of

The Minister also identified that, depending on a person's capacity to apply for the Nursing Home Loan, a person may, from today, apply for the appointment of a care representative through the Circuit Court.

# New measures to protect family home welcome – Minister Brady

The Government is set to introduce new measures to protect family homes for those who face difficulties in paying their mortgages according to Kildare North Fianna Fail TD and Minister of State, Aine Brady.

"As part of the reviewed Programme for Government we were keen to address the difficulties faced by many families in meeting their mortgage commitments following loss of income following redundancy, job loss or reduced hours."

"It is essential that greater flexibility is provided for the family home. New measures that will be brought in include reduced rates; longer maturity dates; rolling up of outstanding interest; the bank taking an equity interest in the home or the bank taking ownership and leasing it back to the resident with rent payments coming off the loan."

"Many families in the commuter belt are experiencing real hardship and anxiety due to changes to their financial circumstances. There are over 14,000 people now receiving mortgage interest supplement, an increase of over 75% since the end of 2008. This is a real indication of the level of difficulties out there."

"I raised the issue of Kildare homeowners facing difficulties with the Minister for Finance and I am pleased that practical measures are due to be introduced and that protecting the family home is to be prioritised," concluded Minister Brady.

# Grants still available under Home Energy Saving Scheme says Brady.

Local TD and Minister of State, Aine Brady, has urged Householders, as winter approaches, to check out the Home Energy Saving Scheme as Grants are still available to improve the energy efficient of their homes.

'The Home Energy Saving (HES) scheme provides grants to homeowners who are interested in improving the energy efficiency of their home in order to reduce their energy and heating costs. The scheme is open to all owners of existing houses built before 2006. Sustainable Energy Ireland administers the scheme.'

'It is also providing, on a National Basis, employment opportunities for over 5000 construction workers and BER assessors.'

'Assistance will be provided by way of fixed grants towards the costs of implementing energy efficiency measures. The types of measures currently eligible under this scheme are roof insulation, wall insulation, high efficiency boilers and heating control upgrades.'

'Grants from €250 to €4000 are available under the different categories and details of the scheme can be obtained from Sustainable Energy Ireland on 1850 927000, www.sei.ie , e-mail hes@sei.ie .' concluded Minister Brady.

## Funding for ICT Equipment for North Kildare Schools says Brady

Local TD and Minister of State, Aine Brady, has been informed by the Minister for Education and Science, Batt O'Keeffe TD, that four Schools in North Kildare will receive grants for ICT equipment over the coming days as part of the Government's continuing efforts to make technology an integral part of the learning process.

'St Patrick's School in Celbridge will receive €13,500, Maynooth Girls Primary School will receive €10,000, Maynooth Educate Together will receive €4,500 and Gaelscoil Nas Na Riogh, Piper's Hill, Naas will receive €7,500.' stated Minister Brady after meeting with Minister O'Keeffe last Wednesday.

'The money will be transferred to the school's accounts over the next week or so and they will receive by email documentation and guidelines regarding the procurement of the equipment such as computer hardware, software and digital equipment under the scheme. The grant will enable schools to equip these new classrooms with information and communications technology."This investment comes on top of the announcement earlier this year that St.

'I have been informed that the Department of the Environment will be allocating an additional capital

allocation to Kildare County Council of €663,750, for the payment of Housing Adaptation Grants for People with a Disability, Housing Aids for Older People, & Mobility Aids Grant.' Stated Minister Brady.

The announcement was made following a meeting between Minister Brady and Minister Finneran on the issue last week.

`Earlier this year, over  $\in$ 1.8m was allocated to Kildare Co Co for the scheme and this  $\in$ 663,000 is a significant addition to that allocation.'

'A housing adaptation grant is available to eligible people, where changes need to be made to a home to make it suitable for a person with a physical, sensory or intellectual disability or mental health difficulty to live in.' stated Minister Brady.

'It will also act as a local stimulus package for small contractors and provide valuable local employment.' Concluded Minister Brady.
