



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

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Community Council Notes

Maynooth Community Council meeting 11 May 2009

Among the issues raised and discussed at the meeting were the following:

Well-being and mental health of our young people.

Chairperson, Colm O Cearúil, expressed the Community Council's great sadness at the recent tragic events in Maynooth and other nearby towns involving young people. He offered the Council's condolences to the families of the young people involved. It was agreed that the Community Council will seek advice on taking an initiative towards helping address this issue.

Membership and attendance drive.

Muireann Ni Bhrolcháin, Community Council secretary, said that it was time for the Council to remind all the local organisations, groups and bodies, such as residents associations, sports clubs, schools, colleges, and so on, that they are entitled to elect delegates to the Community Council. She pointed out that, due to their membership size, many residents associations are entitled to elect two or even three delegates. It was agreed that the Council will contact local organisations and encourage them to participate.

Important issues face Maynooth at the moment: the mental health and well-being of our young people, the development of the university town project, preservation of our heritage, proper planning for our town, traffic problems, and many more. It is very important that the community is actively interested and involved in these issues, and important that everyone in the community is aware that they can influence things for the better if they participate.

The Festival.

Hilda Dunne, Local History Group, said that Maynooth festival will be called the 'Geraldine Cultural Festival' this year. Andrew McMullon, Festival Committee, outlined some of the programme planned for this year. Included will be events at the Castle, with recitals by the Band, cultural presentations, and theatre. Andrew hopes to organise a 'Battle of the Bands' for local rock bands. He'll also be organising football, a talent competition, a poster competition for children, table quizzes, and more. A final programme will be advertised nearer the event.

Noise in the Lyreen area.

Deirdre Cullen, Lyreen Residents Association, raised the problem of loud noise emissions from extraction/ generator plants in the residential part of the town centre. She said there was a very severe instance of this at present in the Lyreen area, running '24/7', which is causing great distress to nearby residents, some of whom live within a few feet of the machinery. This kind of noise causes distress and disturbance to residents in their houses and gardens, and also interferes with street-life, and the general ambience of the town centre. She said that proper town planning would foresee this sort of problem and ensure it didn't occur.

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Summer Recipes



pring Onion Chilli Prawns

Ingredients

20g/3/4oz butter

2 spring onions, sliced

1 clove garlic, crushed

½ red chilli, seeds removed (prevents it from being too spicy) and finely chopped

4 king prawns, cooked, and peeled, tails left on small handful coriander leaves ½ lime, juice only

Method

- 1. Melt the butter in a saucepan over a medium heat and add the spring onion, garlic and chilli and cook for one minute.
- 2. Add prawns and heat through.
- 3. Transfer the prawns, spring onion, garlic and chilli onto a serving dish, scatter over the coriander leaves and drizzle with the lime juice.



Ingredients

6 chicken drumsticks, preferably free-range 6 chicken wings, preferably free-range

For the marinade:

2 tbsp clear honey

3cm/11/4 in piece of fresh ginger, peeled and grated

- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 2 tsp soy sauce
- 3 tbsp orange marmalade
- 1/2 tsp grated orange zest
- 1 tbsp sesame oil

Method

- 1. Slash the chicken drumsticks three to four times each with a sharp knife and place in a non-metallic bowl with the chicken wings. Mix together all of the marinade ingredients and pour over the chicken. Leave to marinate for at least 2 hours, or overnight if you can, turning occasionally.
- 2. Once it has marinated, place the chicken on the barbecue over medium-hot coals and cook for about 20 minutes, brushing with any marinade left in the dish as it cooks. If it's colouring too quickly, move to a cooler part of the barbecue to cook more gently. It's important you cook the chicken all the way through.

eef Bourguignon Kebabs

Ingredients

900g/2lb sirloin or rump steak, cut into 4cm/1½in cubes

225q/8oz rind less smoked streaky bacon

18 button onions, peeled

24 button mushroom, wiped

olive oil for brushing

salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the Marinade:

5 tbsp red wine

3 tbsp olive oil

1 tbsp tomato purée

2 shallots, finely chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley

12 small fresh bay leaves

12 x 25cm/10in flat metal skewers

Method

- 1. Mix together the ingredients for the marinade and pour it into a non-metallic dish. Stir in the steak, cover and leave to marinate at room temperature for 2 hours or in the fridge overnight.
- 2. The next day stretch the bacon rashers on a board with the back of a knife. Cut each rasher in half and roll up tightly.
- 3. Drop the button onions into a pan of boiling water and cook for 2-3 minutes until just tender. Drain and refresh in cold water.
- 4. Thread the cubes of beef, the onions, bacon rolls, mushrooms and bay leaves from the marinade alternately on to the skewers. Brush the mushrooms and the onions with a little extra olive oil and then season the kebabs well with salt and pepper.
- 5. Barbecue the kebabs over medium-hot coals for 6 minutes, turning and basting with the leftover marinade now and then.

Summertime Favourite Avocado Chilli Dip

6 green chillies, skinned, seeds removed, chopped

3 tbsp milk

250g/8oz cream cheese

1 clove garlic, minced

3 ripe avocados, peeled, seeded, mashed

3 tbsp sour cream

- 1. Blend all ingredients together until creamy.
- 2. Allow to sit for at least an hour to blend flavours.

Pet Corner

Coping with Pet Loss

nyone who considers a pet a beloved friend, companion, or family member knows the intense pain that accompanies the loss of that friend. Intense grief over the loss of a pet is normal and natural. Don't let anyone tell you that it's silly, crazy, or overly sentimental to grieve! People who don't understand the pet/owner bond may not understand your pain. You have a right to feel pain and grief!

Someone you loved has died, and you feel alone and bereaved.

One needs time to work through grief and loss before attempting to build a relationship with a new pet. If your emotions are still in turmoil, you may resent a new pet for trying to "take the place" of the old, for what you really want is your old pet back. Children in particular may feel that loving a new pet



is "disloyal" to the previous pet. When you do get a new pet, avoid getting a "lookalike" pet, which makes comparisons all the more likely. Don't expect your new pet to be "just like" the one you lost, but allow it to develop its own personality. Never give a new pet the same name or nickname as the old one. Avoid the temptation to compare the new pet to the old one. It can be hard to remember that your beloved companion also caused a few problems when it was young! A new pet should be acquired because you are ready to move forward and build a new relationship-rather than looking backward and mourning your loss. When you are ready, select an animal with whom you can build another long, loving relationship-because this is what having a pet is all about!

The Hare





It first glance it is easy to mistake a hare for a rabbit, particularly at a distance. The best way to tell the difference is by the hare's longer, black-tipped ears, and longer, more muscular hind legs. Both hares and rabbits have a split lip, or hare-lip, although there are slight differences. A rabbit's top lip is split up to the nostrils, but has a layer of skin to cover the gums. A hare's top lip is split so that the gums are visible. As a result, the top 'buck' teeth may protrude, particularly in old age.

From the moment of birth, hares live out in the open. For the first weeks of their life, the leverets instinct is to lie completely still in their 'milking forms'. Like most mammals born in the open, leverets have a coat of fur and are soon fully mobile. This

is in complete contrast to rabbits, which are born naked, blind and helpless in the security of a burrow. To keep warm the hare has a thick coat, which is white on the underside and reddish-brown above, flecked with tawny gold, black and white to camouflage it. Like a rabbit it has a sensitive nose and a split or hare-lip. The average life-span of a hare is two and a half years. Hares are not, as a rule, sociable; but they do show an intense interest in each other during the mating season. Groups of individuals, consisting of several males called jack-hares, will pursue a female (doe) in a chaotic, free-for-all display. During their dispute over the doe the jacks have boxing matches. They rise up on their hind legs, box and batter each other with their forepaws and turn in circles with their hind legs thumping the ground.

The hare's large eyes have a very glassy quality. The eyes are on the side of the head and so give good wide field vision, they can also look backwards. Sometimes, when being chased, the hare will run straight into a net or other object, since it suffers from a blind spot immediately in front.

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June in the Garden

une is a rewarding month in the garden as you start to see the fruits of your labours. Herbaceous borders come alive with colour and the vegetable patch is full of fresh pickings.

Flower garden

Lilies

Potted lilies will be growing quickly now and as their flowers start developing they will need some support. Push several canes into the compost around the edge of the pot, linking them up with string to provide stability. If border lilies are not supported by neighbouring plants, use stakes around these too.

Roses

Sprinkle rose fertiliser around roots to encourage strong growth and a good flower display. Water in if rain does not fall within a couple of weeks or hoe into the soil, taking care not to harm the roots.

Bearded iris

Once irises have finished flowering in June, congested clumps can be lifted, divided and replanted. Reduce the leaf area by half and replant so that the rhizomes rest at the soil surface. Use our guide to dividing irises to get the best results from your plants.

Primulas

Dig up large clumps now and divide into individual plants, each with leaves and roots. Replant into newly prepared soil.

Summer bedding plants

Plant out tender bedding plants once all danger of frost has passed. If they have been grown in the greenhouse, harden off in a cold frame for a few days before planting out. Pots and trays of bedding plants can be placed on the patio during the day, but moved back under cover at night. Give them a boost by watering them in with liquid fertiliser.

Lupins and early perennials

Remember to cut off the old flower stems before they start to set seed. This will tidy the appearance of the plant but as an added bonus may even encourage a second flush of flowers. Also keep a watchful eye out for lupin aphids which should be controlled with an insecticide if necessary.

Greenhouse

Cuttings

As soon as cuttings taken earlier in the season have produced a good root system, or plants have outgrown their pots, pot them into a slightly larger pot. Try and use the same compost as they were potted in before.

Don't overfill with compost, but leave a gap at the top of the pot that can be watered into.

Fuchsias

Many young plants, including fuchsias, benefit from having their shoot tips pinched out to encourage branching. If left, shoots can grow very long and lanky, while pinching out creates bushier plants with more stems that ultimately carry more blooms.

Take cuttings

Take cuttings of geraniums, fuchsias, coleus and other houseplants.

Hippeastrum

Pick off dead flowers and seed-heads, unless you are aiming to save seed for new plants. Let the stem die down naturally, then cut it away neatly at its base.

Feed containerised plants

Most composts only contain sufficient nutrients to feed plants for about four to six weeks after potting up. Potted plants will then benefit from a weekly liquid feed to promote strong growth and generous flowering and fruiting. Learn the best way to feed your plants with our handy guide.

Greenhouse shading

Paint greenhouses with a shading paint or put roller blinds or shade netting in place for hot days.

Tomatoes

Tap the blooms on greenhouse tomatoes to improve pollination.

Kitchen garden Vegetable seedlings

Thin out rows of vegetable seedlings growing from earlier sowings, such as beetroot, lettuce and radish. Final spacings are usually indicated on seed packets. Congested seedlings never reach their full potential, as they distort one another as they grow, resulting in a much smaller crop. Carefully pull out unwanted seedlings, leaving the rest at the desired spacing, then water the row to settle the soil back around the roots of the remaining ones. Crops to sow outside in early June include runner beans, dwarf French beans, kohl rabi, carrots, marrows, cauliflowers, peas, ridge cucumbers, sweet corn, swede, lettuce, endive, squashes and spinach.

Bird control

Spread nets over soft fruit bushes, such as currants, and over strawberries growing in rows or in containers. Once blackbirds and other birds find fruits to their taste they will return again and again and will quickly strip plants of unprotected fruit.

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



Reinstatement Plans for "The Green" and the "Small Pound"

Maynooth Tidy Towns has received a commitment from Kildare County Council that these two areas as well as the area outside Maynooth Castle will be fully reinstated following completion of the sewerage treatment works upgrade. Judging can take place anytime so it would be appreciated if you could be extra careful in ensuring that you do not cause any issues that will impact negatively on Maynooth's score.



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



DIY Beauty Ways to Care for your Hair

ealth, strength and beauty of hair depends primarily on its nerve vigor and the good circulation of the oily scalp secretion which gives it gloss and luster. Beauty is not so much a matter of color where hair is concerned. If your hair has a fine glow, a rich sheen, is thick and long, it will be beautiful irrespective of its pigmentation. Hair often makes an otherwise plain person beautiful. And practically every woman, if she cares to make the effort, may have beautiful hair.

The hair should never be worn **"done up"** constantly. This is injurious because every part of the hair should have frequent air and sun baths. For normal shampoo employ Castile, tar or vegetable soaps, and Green soap for oily hair. A good egg shampoo may be made of an egg, thoroughly beaten, one tablespoon alcohol, four ounces bay rum, a pinch of borax, and four ounces of Castile soap mixed in a pint of hot water, to be used when cool.

If you have the least suspicion of a curl in your hair, brushing around rather than straight will bring it out. Do not worry if you shed your hair. It is natural for the hair to shed — and to keep right on growing in again. Only see to it that the in growth is equal to the loss by shedding.

Most hair troubles could be prevented in the start by ordinary good care of the hair, and the maintenance of the state of general good health. Of course, various diseases affect the hair: fever dries it out and makes it fall; . Some skin diseases have the same effect. In general, if you are healthy, broadly speaking, your hair will be healthy too.

Dandruff—What we have to deal with in dandruff is a horny layer cast off by the scalp. This layer thickens, closes the pores, diminishes the hair's oil supply, and prevents the perspiration glands from getting rid of waste. Soon the hair loses tone and colour, and is covered with whitish powder. Then it starts to itch and fall. In an advanced state of the disease, the hair falls out, and blood crusts form on the scalp as a result of scratching. Digestive disorders, toxic elements in the blood or local irritation may cause dandruff, and it is communicable.

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Monsignor Hugh Connolly, President of St Patrick's College, Maynooth.



onsignor Connolly is a priest of Diocese of Dromore, born in September 1961. He is a native of Burren near Warrenpoint, Co Down where his sister, Rosemary, runs a well known solicitor's practice. He is a former student of Abbey Christian Brothers School, Newry and was ordained in Maynooth in June, 1987. As a young priest he studied for his Doctorate in moral *theology* at the Gregorian University, Rome which he completed in 1991.

Before being appointed President of Saint Patrick's College in 2007, he was Professor of Moral *Theology* and had been Registrar and Vice-President. The College comprises the Pontifical University where 400 students study *Theology*, and the National Seminary where 70 seminarians prepare for priesthood.

He particularly enjoyed his time teaching in the Pontifical University. He believes that *Theology* students discover a family-like bond with fellow students, and this is helped by the small College atmosphere of Saint Patrick's where lecturers and students interact very closely. As a result, past students have a great affection for the College, and tend to stay in touch after graduation. Students of the Pontifical University also have the benefit of the larger community, as they share the campus with the 7,000 students of the National University of Ireland, Maynooth.

Most students of the College come straight from school, but several students of *Theology* in Maynooth have already had careers or raised families and want to return to study, sometimes having missed the opportunity first time round. These students may be older than their teachers, and are a most welcome addition to the College, and enrich the whole community with their wisdom and experience.

At a personal level, Monsignor Connolly likes to travel, and each summer heads off with a rucksack, often to South America. He is very adept at languages, and can speak Spanish, French and Italian and is working on his Portuguese.

During the Easter break from his presidential duties, he went to Lourdes with the *Pilgrimage Trust*, where young people with disabilities are given a holiday. He finds this work very rewarding, and is constantly amazed by the generosity of the young helpers who accompany the young people. Each group is accompanied by a nurse, a doctor and a chaplain.

Monsignor Connolly has authored a book, published in 1995, on the *Irish Penitentials* and in 2002 published the volume *Sin* in the New Century *Theology* series. Monsignor Connolly was Executive Secretary of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference from 1991 to 1997.

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

Maynooth Citizens Information Centre Know Your Rights

Question:

I have been made redundant and am now on Jobseeker's Benefit. I plan to start a business with my lump sum. What information and support can I get?

Answer:

You may qualify for the new 1-year Short-term Enterprise Allowance, introduced on foot of the Supplementary Budget in April 2009.

This new scheme allows people who qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit (with 104 PRSI contributions paid in the past 2 years) or who have been awarded statutory redundancy to get immediate access to Back to Work Enterprise Allowance (BTWEA) Payment while setting up a business. This will be payable for the duration of your Jobseeker's Benefit entitlement (that is, either 9 or 12 months).

Enterprise Ireland may help if your business meets the criteria of a "High Potential Start-up". These criteria are listed on www.enterprise-ireland.com. You may also be able to get workspace in one of the Community Enterprise Centres funded by Enterprise Ireland.

Your local City or County Enterprise Board (CEB) may be able to provide support. Your business must have the capacity to be commercially viable, and the CEBs give priority to enterprises in the manufacturing or internationally traded services sectors. The sort of help they provide includes capital grants, employment grants and feasibility study grants. www.enterpriseboards.ie.

Question:

I am buying my first home shortly and rely on getting Mortgage Interest Relief on my repayments. Will I still get this relief after the Supplementary Budget.

Answer:

You are referring to the new changes to Mortgage Interest Relief which were announced in the Supplementary Budget on 7th April 2009.

With effect from 1 May 2009, Mortgage Interest Relief is being discontinued for all mortgages after the seventh year. However, these are special transitional measures in 2009 for people who have had a mortgage for more then 7 years.

The Government has announced that it plans to review the scheme and eventually abolish the relief.

In your case, as a first-time buyer, you will be entitled to Mortgage Interest Relief at a rate of 25% for the first and second years of your mortgage.

For the third, fourth and fifth years, you will get relief at 22.5%.

For the sixth and seventh years, you will get relief at 15%.


Under the new changes brought in by the Supplementary Budget, your entitlement to Mortgage Interest Relief will end after the seventh year.

Question:

What is Domiciliary Care Allowance? How do I apply? Is there a means test?

Answer:

The Domiciliary Care Allowance (DCA) is a monthly payment made to the carer of a child (aged under 16) with a severe disability who lives at home. The disability must be likely to last for at least one year, and the child must

need constant care and supervision that is substantially more than that normally needed by a child of the same age. There is no means test.

Up to 1 April 2009, the DCA scheme was run by the Health Service Executive (HSE). The administration of the scheme is moving from the HSE to the Department of Scoil and Family Affairs (DSFA). Since 1 April 2009, the DSFA from September 2009.

Before this transfer, the means of the child (but not of the carer) were assessed and the payment could be reduced. From now on, neither the child's means nor the carer's own means are taken into account.

The full rate of DCA in 2009 is €309.50 per month. You can also get a Respite Care Grant (currently €1,700) which is paid during each year.

You may get a half-rate payment if your child is in residential care and goes home for 2 or more days a week, for example, if he/she attends a residential service from Monday to Friday and goes home at weekends.

There is no restriction on the number of children for whom you may claim DCA and Respite Care Grant. In other words, if you are caring for more than one eligible child, you may claim the payments for each child).

DCA does not affect your entitlement to Child Benefit. You may also qualify for Carer's Benefit or Carer's Allowance if you meet the relevant conditions.

To apply, you need form Dom Care 1. To get this, you can text "FORM DCA" and your name and address to 51909; download from www.Welfare.ie; ask at your Social Welfare Local Office or Citizens Information Centre; or Lo-call 1890 202 325. Fill in parts 1 to 5 of the application form and have your child's doctor complete parts 6 and 7. Attach any relevant reports or assessments, and send the form to Domiciliary Care Allowance Section—address on form.

Question:

I am applying for a driving test. What does it cost and how long is the wait?

Answer:

The Road Safety Authority has increased fees for driving tests with effect from 7th April 2009. The driving test fee is now €75 for the following classes of vehicle:

- Car (category B)
- Moped (category M)
- Motorcycle (Categories A, A1)
- Works Vehicle (category W)

The new fee is €110 for the following classes of vehicle:

- Truck (category C)
- Bus (Category D)

The national average waiting time for driving tests is now less than ten weeks, so you can expect to be called for your test within a few weeks of applying. Depending on where you live, the waiting time for your test may be as little as six weeks.

A new IT system is being introduced shortly. This will enable customers to book their driving tests online. It will also allow them to choose the most suitable date, time and location.

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




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Use your votes to defend Irish national and local democracy and rebuke Brussels

People's Movement is a non-party political movement that seeks to extend popular sovereignty and to promote democratic values in Irish life. We oppose attempts by the EU to further extend its control to all levels of society and seek to counteract its dominance of Irish political and economic life. In particular, we oppose the attempt to overturn the Irish decision of June 2008 to reject the Lisbon treaty in a Lisbon Two referendum threatened for next October. Therefore, we view the elections of 5 June as an opportunity for the electorate to send a strong message to the Brussels bureaucrats and to the compliant Irish political elites that the people of Ireland are not for turning on their rejection of Lisbon.

We know that Brussels and the Irish Yes side intend to use the recession to frighten the electorate into hoping that by granting more powers to the EU we will be saved from economic meltdown – despite the fact that it was the policies of Brussels and their Irish supporters that caused the problems in the first place. Accordingly, we wish to remind voters of how the recession was caused and what is at stake with the Lisbon Treaty. Furthermore, we urge voters to raise these issues with political canvassers, demand that their parties change their support for the failed EU policies and critically analyse each candidate's position on a second Lisbon referendum before casting your votes on 5 June.

All 27 EU Members are in economic crisis. Ireland is worse than most because of the borrowing binge, which was encouraged by the cosy cartel of Irish bankers and our elite political parties. Europe's biggest hitters, Germany and France, dominate European Central Bank policies but for Ireland this meant:

Bank interest rates out of kilter for the Irish economy: Frankfurt set rates at too low a level during the 'Celtic Tiger' years. Cheap money fed the property boom. It made billionaires of developers and the banksters – but resulted in rampant house price inflation and massive mortgages for homeowners.

Falling exports due to over-valued euro: Over 70% of our exports go to the UK, the US and outside the eurozone. The Irish Exporters Association reported total exports in 2008 fell by €6 billion and that the 6% decline to the UK can mainly be accounted for by the 33% depreciation in sterling against the euro. But the ECB failed to act because it doesn't suit Germany and France to devalue the euro. The resultant massive job losses in Ireland are of little concern to them.

Why the Pay Cuts and job losses? Because the euro was not devalued our Government and employers have embarked upon a crude 'internal devaluation'. Private sector employees and public and civil servants together have suffered savage reductions in pay. In turn demand for goods and services has collapsed and, bereft of banking facilities, small and medium enterprises are haemorrhaging jobs at an alarming rate. Unemployment will soon exceed 500,000. All are, pension values, investments, profits, social welfare entitlements, etc.

Tax increases and service cuts: the EU has Ireland given until 2013 to get our debt to GDP ratio down to 3% and the Government has set about achieving this with a vengeance. Yes, we need to sort out the deficits, but most economists now say it will take a generation to sort out the financial mess at the banks and government finances. Deflating the economy now with more taxes and cut backs can only lead to further economic and social carnage.

EU-supported bailout for the bankers: evidence has emerged that Finance Minister Lenihan coordinated his Emergency budget and the setting up of a National Asset Management Agency with EU officials. It seems the EU intend to use Ireland as a testing ground for a 'bad' bank, a device which will shift the banks' losses of up to 90 billion euro to the Irish State. If this works (or they get away with it) the NAMA concept may well be employed elsewhere in the EU. Most economists are opposed to NAMA and see temporary nationalisation as the only workable solution.

$The\ Lisbon\ Treaty-out\ of\ date\ and\ fatally\ flawed$

The Lisbon Treaty is the very embodiment of the EU's neo-liberal dogma, which assumes that banks and markets are at their most efficient when unfettered. It was conceived ten years ago when globalisation and financial capitalism were rampant. The whole world now knows to its bitter cost how disastrous such policies were.

We urgently need the EU and the ECB's euro policies to take real account of Ireland and other smaller countries' economic needs and make provision for our unique economic conditions. But Lisbon provides for increased legal powers for the ECB and states:

'The ECB...shall have legal personality, shall enjoy in each member state the most extensive legal capacity accorded to legal persons under its laws.

And it compounds the unequal relationship for smaller states by declaring:

'the votes in the Governing Council shall be weighted according to the national central banks' shares in the subscribed capital of the ECB.'

Germany and France, whose populations total 147ml. and together command a GDP wealth, in millions of dollars, of 6,533,250 - as compared to Ireland's 273,328 - will always call the shots at the ECB. Clearly, Lisbon copper fastens Big States control of the ECB and condemns the smaller states to a future of permanent disadvantage. The rules governing the ECB must be changed.

We urge voters to raise these critical issues with local and Euro candidates and cast their highest preferences for those who opposed the Lisbon Treaty or who oppose holding another referendum before exercising their preferences for the other Candida

A helpline will be in place with effect from Monday, 20th April to answer queries from parents and childcare providers in relation to the operation of the new Scheme. The number is 1 890 30 30 39."

Provision of Youth Cafe

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Council to speed up the provision of a Youth Cafe at TESCO. Maynooth residents will be aware that as part of the Planning Permission granted for the new TESCO a Unit measuring 4,500 sq. ft. in area has to be provided for community use. Cllr. McGinley got agreement in principle that a Youth Cafe would be provided for. John has also been in regular contact with Kildare Youth Services and they have advised him that an area of 1000 to 1500 sq. ft. is all that is required for the Youth Cafe. Council Officials will decide what other community uses will be catered for that would not be in conflict with the Youth Cafe. John has suggested that the remaining 3,000 sq. ft. could accommodate a Theatre and Performing Arts Centre.

Cllr. McGinley Gets TESCO Hoarding Removed

Following representations from Cllr. John McGinley TESCO have removed the ugly hoarding from in front of the old car park.

Its removal will mean that Dublin Road will be more attractive to the Tidy Town Adjudicators and also that people will see that the individual shops are still open for business.

Provision of Additional Parking at Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley got the following Progress Report from the Council:

"Further discussions have taken place with Tesco and I have made contact with two landowners who would be interested in providing an "all day" pay parking facility. Negotiations are ongoing at present."

Eyesore Beside St. Mary's RC Church

Cllr. John McGinley asked the Council to take action to have the large sign advertising the owner of this derelict site removed as it was unauthorised. It is very disappointing that the owner only removed the Advertising and left the hoarding in place. In addition the owner has refused to lease the site on a temporary basis to the Council for use as a car park.

John has again asked the Planning Department of the Council to take appropriate action now as it could have a negative impact on the scoring for the Tidy Towns Competition if the hoarding is not removed and the site cleared up as a matter of urgency.

Proposal to Ban HGVs from Moyglare Road Maynooth and Install Speed Cushions

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his motion:

"Due to the constricted financial climate, it is expected that funding from the DTO/DoT will be severely curtailed, as in other Government Departments. The DTO has funded both the Traffic Management and Public Transport Interchange Plans in the town and until these schemes progress to public consultation, no funding for implementation measures are expected.

In order to examine the area of Moyglare Road, the scope of the Traffic management Plan would need to be extended to include this area towards the county boundary. Until this happens, it is not possible to determine what affect changes to the traffic management regime in the area will have on the wider catchment area."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the Council should not predetermine the actions of the DTO and that a strong case should be made to them seeking funding for traffic calming for this road which is unique in Ireland in that it has first level, second level and third level educational facilities.

Removal of the "Bandstand:"

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee of the Council:

"That Ward & Burke Construction Ltd. be asked to move the "Bandstand" from Pound Park/The Green, Maynooth, to the agreed location on NUIM grounds, as a gesture of goodwill to the residents of the area who have suffered great disruption as a result of the Lower Liffey Valley Regional Sewerage Scheme (LLVRSS)."

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"It would be inappropriate for Water Services as Project Managers to raise this suggestion. It is not relevant to the scope of the works and would result in increased contract costs."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the reply was total rubbish. He said that the Park has to be completely refurbished as a result of the Sewerage Works and that it would be a waste of money doing so unless the "Bandstand" was removed. Maynooth Tidy Towns are in agreement with John on this. Demolishing it and using it for scrap would not cost much as the Contractors are already on site. John has already identified savings on the contract as it

included surface water drainage for Leinster Street even though this was provided only last year. So it is wrong for the Council to say that there would be increased contract costs.

Constructing a Left Turning Lane at the Exit from Greenfield Estate onto the Straffan Road.

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That a left turning lane be constructed at the exit of Greenfield Estate onto the Straffan Road in order to make it easier for the estate residents and customers of Greenfield Shopping Centre to exit safely."

John was given the following reply:

"I regret to inform the Committee that there is no funding available in the Roads Maintenance budget for this work. This request will be referred to the Roads Design team for their comments."

John asked that he be given the cost of the work so that funding can be addressed.

Noise From the M4;

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"What is the current status of the introduction of noise abatement measures on the M4, particularly at Maynooth?"

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"No noise abatement measures are currently planned for the M4. The Noise Action Plan for County Kildare has been forwarded to the County Manager for approval. The action plan sets out a strategy for the treatment of environmental noise within the county over the next five years. However, any resulting noise mitigation will be dependent on the provision of funding."

John asked that the NRA be asked to put a low noise thin wearing course of asphalt macadam (similar to that on the N7) on the M4 between Leixlip and Kilcock now. The existing surface is 15 years old and it is due a new coating anyway.

Enforcement of the Litter Laws:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion

for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That Kildare County Council strictly enforces the Litter Laws in Maynooth, particularly as it relates to litter on the footpaths outside fast food premises."

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"The Litter Warden continues to monitor the litter in Maynooth. The area is visited approximately four times per week. Indeed during 2008, 93 litter fines were issued for the Maynooth area and included were fines for fast food premises. In 2009 there were 25 litter fines issued for the Maynooth area."

John stated that the footpaths outside fast food premises and pubs were a disgrace and that there was no evidence of proper enforcement of the Litter Laws.

Provision of a New Footpath and Public Lighting From TESCO to the Halting Site.

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"That a new footpath and public lighting be extended on the South Side of the Dublin Road from TESCO to Blacklion Halting Site in the interests of public safety and that it be made a condition of any Planning Granted under 09/396 (LF Properties Ltd.) to provide same."

He was supported by all the other Councillors at the Area Meeting on 15 May. Officials stated that they could not comment in public on a Planning Application.

Restoration of the Car Activation of the Pedestrian Lights at Kingsbry:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Why will the Council not re-commission the Loop on the Pedestrian Signals at Kingsbry, Maynooth?"

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"The vehicle loop at the pedestrian signals at Kingsbury, Maynooth was decommissioned early last year due to safety concerns. Allowing pedestrian crossings to be controlled by vehicle sensors on side roads is considered to be unsafe and not standard

practice. If there are problems with traffic exiting the side roads the safe and standard practice is to put in place a full signalised junction, subject to a study of the environment and all vehicle and pedestrian movements in the area. Unfortunately there are no resources available, at this time, to carry out such a study or to install or maintain additional signalised crossings."

John stated that the reply was total nonsense as cars exiting from Kingsbry have been activating the lights for the last 15 years and there was no question of safety concerns then. Indeed the new system is a safety hazard. The other Councillors agreed with John.

Switching on The New Pedestrian Lights at Cluain Aoibhinn:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Why is Finance Section holding up the switching on of the Pedestrian Lights on the Rathcoffey Road, Maynooth, whose installation was completed in February?"

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"A payment was issued to ESB in March, however, due to administrative difficulties this payment was returned and had to be redrawn. This has now taken place and it is hoped that the lights will be switched on shortly."

John stated that it is an awful pity that it took over three months to get a payment of €385.90 to the ESB to make a connection for lights that cost €40,000.

John has also contacted the ESB on the 15 May asking them to carry out the work as soon as possible.

Removal of Graffiti from Harbour Field Area, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Leixlip Area Committee:

"Please source or seek funding for removal of graffiti in the area on the grounds that action now will deter further appearances."

John was given the following reply at the Area Meeting on 15 May:

"Graffitti removal in the playground is being funded from the playground maintenance budget in the current year's estimates. Graffitti removal has been an ongoing process since the start of the year."

Straffan Wood Taking in Charge

It was agreed at the Leixlip Area Committee on 14 May that a recommendation would go to the full Council to take Straffan Wood housing estate in charge provided that the issue regarding the areas to be transferred to the Management Company has been clarified with the Developer.

STAGG AND McGINLEY SUGGEST MODIFICATIONS TO PROPOSAL FOR DUBLIN ROAD, MAYNOOTH

Deputy Emmet Stagg and his colleague Cllr. John McGinley have suggested modifications to the planning proposal for 226 apartments in 4 and 3 Storey Blocks on the Dublin Road, Maynooth. The Carton Avenue Action Plan does allow for taller buildings on this particular site but Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley have indicated that three Storeys is the maximum acceptable. They also pointed out that with the removal of the 4th Storey from the two Blocks on the Western edge of the site the applicants should incorporate a roof on each of the blocks in line with the Heritage of Maynooth.

Deputy Stagg and Cllr. McGinley also pointed out in their submission that if these modifications were made that they would not pursue the planning file further within the planning process.

We await the reaction of the Planners and the applicants to our suggestions.

44% REDUCTION IN REGIONAL AND LOCAL ROAD GRANTS FOR KILDARE

Deputy Emmet Stagg has criticised the decision by the Minister for Transport to slash the Regional and Local Road Grant Allocations to Kildare Co. Council by 44%, down from an allocation of €28,178,630 in 2008 to a revised allocation in 2009 of €15,769,264, following the Supplementary Budget on April 7th last.

Nationally the Total Grants allocated to all Local Authorities in the State fell by 26% and Deputy Stagg stated that Kildare seems to have been targeted for special treatment by the Minister and the Government with an additional 18% cut.

The cuts now imposed, stated Deputy Stagg, see €.5

of a million taken from the Clane/Kilcock Improvement Scheme and a further €3 million taken from restoration improvement projects throughout the County. €4.5 million of funding has been withdrawn from the Enfield/Edenderry Improvement Scheme which means that even if An Bord Pleanala give the CPO the go ahead this year work will not commence on this seriously deficient major road.

Last February then backbench T.D. Aine Brady welcomed the original grant to Kildare for these works, whilst ignoring the fact that originally the figures were cut by 13%. This further cut of an additional 31% is staggering and shows a contempt by this Government for the people of the County.

When FF and Green Canvassers call to your homes over the next five weeks you should ask them why Kildare has suffered so severely in the bailout of the

Bankers and Developers concluded Deputy Stagg.

COUNCIL HOUSING BUDGET SLASHED BY 44%

Deputy Emmet Stagg has reacted angrily to the announcement of the Capital Allocation for Local Authority Housing for Kildare Co. Council which sees funds slashed by 44% since 2008.

In 2008 stated Deputy Stagg the allocation to Kildare Co. Council was €45 Million and the 2009 allocation is only €25 Million. This reduction in funding for the building/purchase of Local Authority Housing is a 44% reduction whilst Nationally funding has been cut by 27%. Again as in the allocation of roads funding where Kildare lost out significantly one has to ask why Kildare is being punished so harshly by this Government.

With just under 4,000 housing applicants on Kildare Co. Council's Housing Waiting List and with the building industry in serious decline the allocation by the Government will impact severely on those who cannot afford to provide their own housing accommodation and on workers in the building industry.

In addition to the Governments attack on traditional council housing there has also been a reduction in funding for the Voluntary and Co-operative Sector of 24% in Kildare, down from \in 13 Million in 2008 to \in 9.835 Million this year. Nationally funding for this sector fell by 18% so again Kildare is being targeted for higher cuts than elsewhere.

Minister of State Aine Brady welcomed these allocations on May 1st and stated she was *delighted to welcome this important funding*. I now pose the question to her – How can your Government stand over a 44% reduction in Kildare against a 27% cut Nationally in Council Housing funding.

In any event Deputy Stagg stated that funding should not have been cut at all as the retention of the National Budget of just over a Billion Euro for Council Housing in 2008 would have given the building industry a boost.

ALLOCATION OF DISABILITY AND HOUSING ADAPTATION GRANTS ROTTEN TO THE CORE

Reacting to the announcement of an allocation of €1,870,000 to Kildare Co. Council for Disabled Person Grants, Housing Adaptation Grants and Mobility Grants, Deputy Emmet Stagg has claimed that the allocation of the Grant money nationwide is Rotten to the Core.

The Grant to Kildare Co. Council stated Deputy Stagg covers less than a third of the current waiting list of Grants sought by Disabled and Elderly people which presently stands at €5,731,000 and involves 587 individuals and families. Theses stated Deputy Stagg are very real people who have suffered a disability and need downstairs accommodation, or are elderly people who require stairlifts or level access showers. Others on the waiting list are elderly people whose homes require rewiring, central heating or replacement of substandard doors and windows.

It will take at least three years to meet existing demands in Kildare which is placing an incredible strain on disabled people and our senior citizens who have a right to live with some modicum of comfort in their homes.

The really galling thing about this is how Kildare's Elderly and Senior Citizens are treated compared to those in other Counties stated Deputy Stagg. Simply comparing the allocations to population we see a clear inequality which is typical of FF political life:

Deputy Stagg stated that he intended to question the Minister further in relation to the allocation of these funds because its time that Disabled and Elderly people in Kildare received a fair share of the funds available.

GOVERNMENT ABANDONS CARE OF THE ELDERLY

Deputy Emmet Stagg questioned the Minister for Health in relation to the number of elderly people awaiting admission to a Public Nursing Home in Co. Kildare and the number of people on the waiting list for Home Care Packages. The HSE have advised Deputy Stagg that there are 188 people on the waiting list for long stay beds in Co. Kildare, 18 of whom are in Acute Hospitals and 94 who are living in the Community. Of those living in the Community 12 require extended care as soon as possible. The remaining 76 are in Private Nursing Homes with inadequate levels of subvention. In relation to the Home Care Packages there are 160 people on the waiting list.

The figures show that the Government are not prepared to put in place resources to care for our Senior Citizens when they are unable to care for themselves or remain in the Community. Even the scheme of Home Care Packages, specifically designed to allow senior citizens to remain in their local community with assistance is at a standstill with no new Home Care Packages approved in 2009 to date. The really shocking figure stated Deputy Stagg is that 94 people deemed eligible for Long Term Care are living in the Community, placing immense pressure on families to care for them without adequate training or back up assistance. The fact that 12 of these require extended care as soon as possible, with no place available for them is nothing short of scandalous treatment of our Senior Citizens.

The only answer to this continuing problem is a major investment in Public Nursing Homes based in our larger towns along the lines of the Maynooth Community Care Unit. The investment would provide jobs in construction, provide the badly needed care for our Senior Citizens and remove families from the clutches of the Profit driven Private Nursing Homes. That is Labour's answer but regrettably FF and the Greens simply don't care enough concluded Deputy Stagg.


